2024-25 Futures in Focus Grant Guidelines

Local education foundations (LEFs) who were awarded funds in 23-24 are also eligible for this project but must serve new students for 2024-25.

- The intention of this grant is to fund participation in education and vocational-related activities leading to increased employment opportunities for Florida's middle/high school students with disabilities.
- The Consortium will fund approximately <u>20 projects across Florida (excluding Orange County) at \$5,000 to \$10,000 each for work through May 2025.</u>
- Submitted applications will be scored and ranked through a competitive review process that includes representatives from The Able Trust. (See reviewer scoring matrix below.)
- NOTE CHANGE FROM the 23-24 cycle: Eligible students include 8-12th grade students identified as having a disability documented by an IEP or 504 Plan. This program is not intended to engage elementary-aged students.
- Data collection REQUIREMENT: This grant requires awardees to collect a roster of students,
 - o Name
 - o Grade, and
 - School attended
 - Parent name
 - o Parent email or phone number
 - Address
- NOTE on funding source: These are public funds and NOT match eligible for the School District Education Foundation Matching Grant program or other publicly funded programs.
- Required project activities:
 - NOTE CHANGE FROM the 23-24 cycle: Engage a minimum of 25 eligible 8-12th grade students in project activities. [May have 6th and 7th grade students involved, but the minimum required student count must be based on 8th 12th graders].
 - Lead a minimum of four (4) experiences or activities based on <u>The Guideposts for Success</u> framework. At least two (2) of the experiences must be off-site (off school grounds).
 - o Introduce students to education pathway options:
 - Middle School -- Secondary education, Career and Technical Education, Pre-Apprenticeship, and other certification options
 - High School -- Postsecondary education options: certificate programs, apprenticeships, technical school, state college and/or university
 - Introduce students to in-demand or growth occupations and industries.
 - Connect students to relevant resources that will assist with education and employment, such as:
 - Florida Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (required)
 - CareerSource






- Agency for Persons with Disabilities
- FAFSA
- Academic Tutoring
- o Provide opportunities for development of self-esteem and leadership skills.
- Ensure students reflect on program experiences (i.e., group discussion, journaling, thank you letters, etc.)
- Awardees are <u>required</u> to demonstrate a partnership with <u>district ESE directors</u>.
- Allowable local project expenditures may include:
 - Classroom materials or equipment
 - Career exploration software, website support, or physical resources
 - o Transportation, food and entry fees for student college and/or industry trips
 - o Staff or contractor time for coordination, implementation, oversight, and reporting
- ALL project participants will be required to report on one or more of the following:
 - Student interest in postsecondary options
 - Tours/trips to postsecondary institutions
 - Tours/trips to growth industries
 - o Connection/meeting with representative from FDOE Department of Vocational Rehabilitation
- All applications must be submitted by the local education foundation.
- All awarded local education foundations are expected to participate in a Consortium Learning Community to share practices, resources, and ideas

July 17, 2024	Announcement of the 2024-2025 Futures in Focus opportunity to Consortium members
July 18, 2024	Application opens in Consortium grants management platform.
July 24, 2024	Informational webinar for member foundations.
August 5, 2024	Grant application opens online.
August 26, 2024	Deadline for application submission through Consortium online grants platform.
August 26 – September 10	Submitted applications reviewed and scored.
September 18-20, 2024	Awards announced via email and/or Fall Conference and project activities begin.
October 1, 2024	Awardee checks mailed.
November 1, 2024	A completed Student Enrollment Spreadsheet (provided by the Foundation) with a minimum of twenty-five (25) students aged 14-21. All Enrolled Students aged 14 and over will be referred to VR by The Able Trust. · A service delivery plan describing a minimum of four (4) activities, one of which must be an opportunity for students and families to connect with VR. · A description of student activities which will occur during the reporting period.
October 2024 - April 15, 2024	Learning Community meets approximately every 6 weeks to share information and leading practices
January 15, 2025	Mid-year report due from LEFs
March 1, 2025	Deliverable: Any additions to the Student Enrollment Spreadsheet · A description of student activities which have occurred during the reporting period.
April 30, 2025	Final reports due to Consortium via online grants management platform AND each LEF will provide: · Any additions to the Student Enrollment Spreadsheet · A description of student activities which have occurred during the reporting period. · A comprehensive narrative report that highlights each of the subgrants. · Report should include testimonial, picture, highlighted activity
