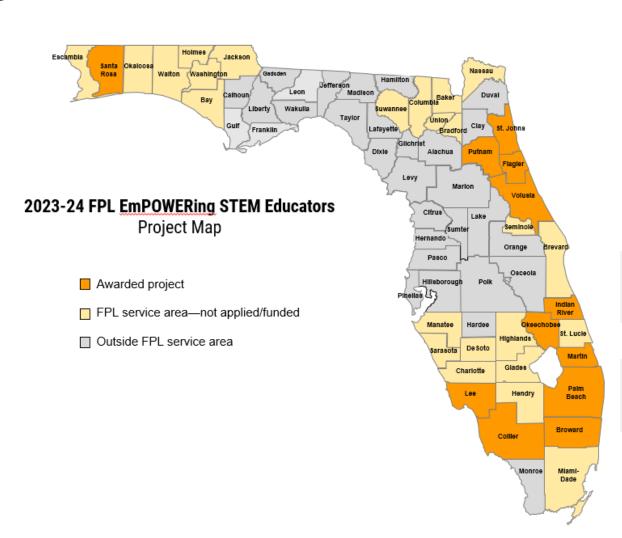

Empowering STEM Through SECME

Challenges:

- Teachers are feeling overwhelmed. They attended webinars and trainings and even started event activities in the classroom but did not compete.
- Students not committing to attending events or failing to show up.

Lessons Learned:

- Having lead teachers be the main contributors/instructors during webinars really helped others gain guidance and resources.
- Teachers need better tie-in to curriculum standards to gain admin support and feel appreciated.
- Need a better incentive to get students to commit to attending the event.





Empowering STEM Through SECME

- Impact
 - Allowing teachers to include students during PD really improved the quality of the projects presented
 - Having a web site to showcase projects really increased interest from other schools for next year.

EmPOWERing the Next Generation Through Success in STEM

- Introduction of an Integrated Science curriculum where teachers worked together to plan, implement and ensure successful student progression into future Biology curriculum
- Successes
 - Use of observation worksheets and same day debrief pending each observation.
 - Lead Teachers participated in cooperative planning for implementation of new Biology curriculum.
 - Feeder middle school instructors were able to observe classrooms of IGCSE Chemistry and AICE Marine Science instructors

"As a new teacher with some experience, I was able to be introduced to both new teaching methods and new classroom management methods. These are new methods that I have not seen inside a classroom. Since having my own class, I do not have as much time to spectate other teachers or classes, so this gave me the opportunity to do so."







EmPOWERing the Next Generation Through Success in STEM

- Challenges
 - Differing bell schedules between middle and high school longer class times at the high school allow for lengthier activities/lessons vs. middle school
 - Change in CFL program leadership
 - Substitute teacher availability for observation days
- Impact
 - Two teachers were new to teaching entirely, but they felt supported and encouraged throughout the school year, gaining mentors and new lessons to implement in their own classrooms.

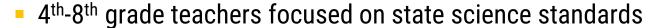

- Implementation of standards-aligned lessons



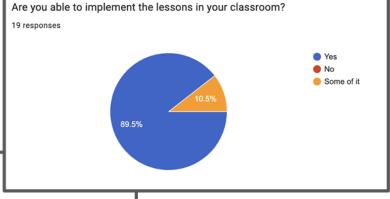


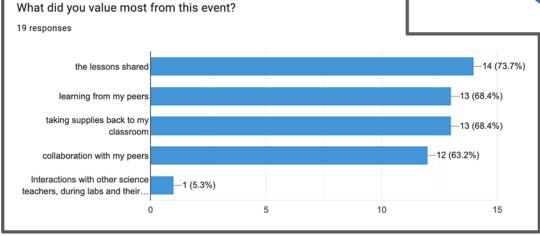

- Purpose: Building capacity among Algebra I teachers to ensure 90% of students enrolled earn a passing score on the EOC by end of 9th grade
- Strategies:
 - Utilized <u>Building Thinking Classrooms in Mathematics</u> by Peter Liljedahl
 - Integrated ELL scaffolding and notetaking strategies in daily lessons
 - Lesson Plan Cycle: Study & Plan; Teach, Observe & Debrief; Revise;
 (Re)teach & Report

Successes:

- Teacher indicated being part of this PLC encouraged them to grow as professionals
- Teachers expressed appreciation for the opportunity to collaborate with peers
- Teachers noticed the benefit in student engagement and academic discourse through vertical learning
- Students developed confidence in math skills
- Nearly doubled the number of students who passed EOC exam

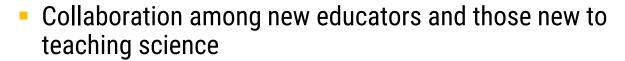

- Implementation of learned collaborative strategies
- Teachers reported an increase in student engagement and participation
- Building capacity as teachers gained knowledge of the science content
- Created a safe and innovative environment for teachers to support and learn from one another

Challenges:

 Aligning the face-to-face workshop content with the content being taught in the classroom







Peers in Public Practice: Bringing Science to Life

Jennifer Borges, District Science Coordinator Lisa Rhodes, Executive Director, Education Foundation of Martin County

- 22 teachers participated in two workshop days and one classroom instruction observation day with feedback after delivering one of the four lessons and new strategies they learned during the interactive workshop days presented by lead teachers -- 4 days of collaborative learning with 25 teachers from 10 schools
- Challenges:
 - Leadership changes led to priority shifts and ultimately a change in our original program plan
 - Scheduling during the school day and on Saturdays proved challenging

"This format allows for growth of my professional practice and gets teachers away from the 'teaching in a bubble' feeling or 'on an island' feeling. Sharing a lesson was good, observing other lessons was great."

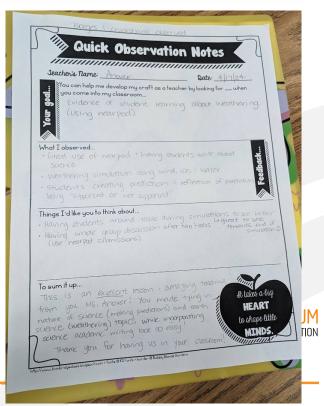
Lessons Learned:

- A bend in the road is not the end of the road...
- Scheduling workshop sessions immediately after school hours brought an increase in teacher availability
- This year's eventual success laid the scheduling groundwork for our next year's proposal--providing two workshop sessions in the fall and again in the spring with a classroom observation day after each will allow us to double our reach and impact.

Successes:

- Teachers enjoyed having time to learn from each other and coming away with materials needed to implement learned strategies and classroom lessons
- Teacher leads were empowered when identified as experts in their field and provided the platform to share their knowledge and skill sets with their peers
- Both leads and observers appreciated having the time to watch observing teachers deliver classroom instruction with immediate debriefing sessions and peer encouragement







STEM Together: Enhancing Kindergarten Through Peer Learning

- Use of STEM kits to engage teachers and students
- Challenges:
 - Making lessons fit in a 30-40 min time slot
- Lessons Learned:
 - Make sure everything was well prepared in advance
 - Build in time for student inquiry

- Teacher Successes:
 - Decreased amount of lesson preparation
 - Brought standards to life by making material engaging
 - Deeper understanding of the science
 - Explanation for New and Inexperienced teachers is easy to follow
- Student Successes:
 - Increased student engagement
 - Improved critical thinking skills
 - Fostered curiosity and inquiry skills as well as creativity in students
 - Helped with collaboration and communication skills
 - Increased hands-on learning

Challenges:

- Time Constraints: Finding time for teachers to observe one another can be difficult due to busy schedules and existing teaching responsibilities.
- Logistical Issues: Coordinating observation schedules and ensuring minimal disruption to the learning process can be challenging.
- Curriculum Rigor: Observations might reveal gaps in curriculum rigor or coherence, necessitating significant adjustments that can be daunting to implement.
- Resource Availability: Differences in resource availability between classrooms can impact the feasibility of integrating observed practices into one's own curriculum.

Lessons Learned:

- Curriculum Review: Regular curriculum reviews and updates, informed by observations, can enhance rigor and coherence, ensuring that all students receive a high-quality education.
- Resource Sharing: Promoting the sharing of resources and materials among teachers can facilitate the adoption of effective practices observed in other classrooms, enhancing overall curriculum delivery.

Project Successes:

- Enhanced Teaching Practices: Observing other teachers helped introduce STEM teachers to new instructional strategies and techniques, which they can adapt and implement in their own classrooms to improve student engagement and learning outcomes.
- Collaborative Learning: The initiative fostered a culture of collaboration and continuous professional development among teachers, enabling them to share ideas, resources, and best practices.
- Insight into Student Perspectives: Observing different classrooms provided educators
 with a better understanding of diverse student needs and behaviors, helping them to tailor
 their instruction more effectively.
- Cross-Disciplinary Integration: By observing teachers from other subjects and content areas, STEM educators identified opportunities to integrate cross-disciplinary approaches, enriching their curriculum and making connections between STEM and other fields more explicit for students.



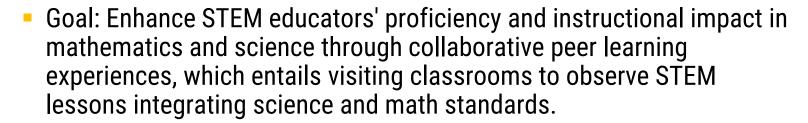






Nurturing STEM Excellence

- Educators recognized the value of collaboration and peer support in professional growth.

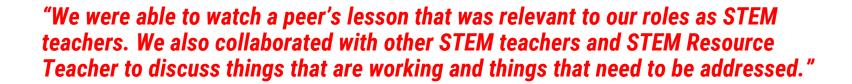






Nurturing STEM Excellence

 - Watching peer teachers use the Osmos with students allowed participants to learn new strategies and gain resources to increase student engagement and math gains.

EmPOWERing STEM Educators in St. Johns County

- Purpose: Increase teacher knowledge and broaden their STEM instructional practices to engage, motivate, and educate students in courses covered by the General Science Certification Exam: Biology, Physical Science Honors, Environmental Science, Earth Space, and middle school science courses.
- Eight teachers passed the Middle School General Science Certification Program

 Challenges: Coordinating teachers' schedules and ensuring substitute coverage in classrooms when attending in-person sessions.

- Veteran teachers were inspired.





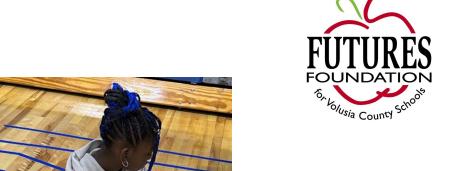
Student Engagement With STEM

"I saw students that usually did nothing, become the helpers. I saw that they understood the concepts but not in the traditional way."







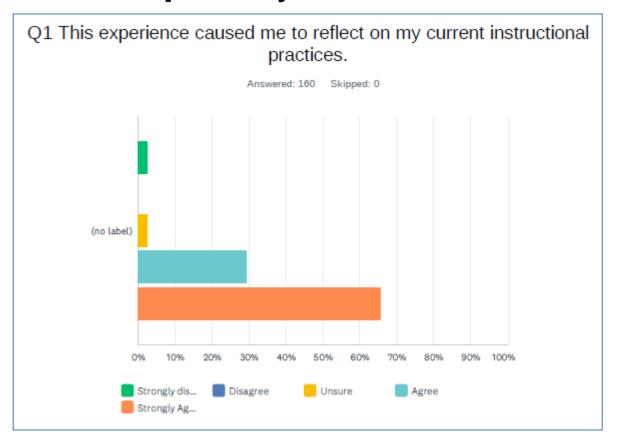

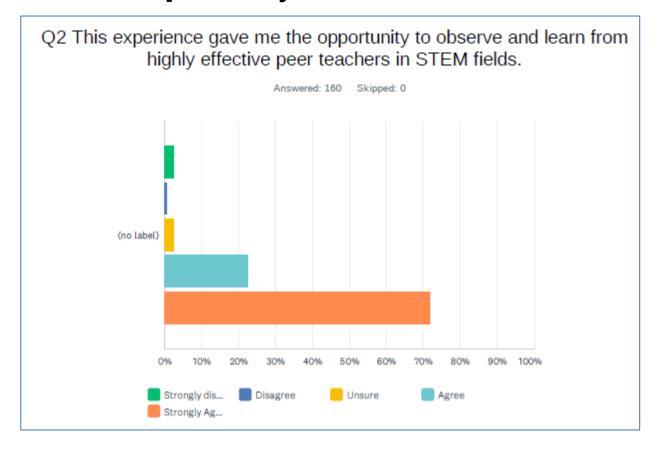
Teacher Follow-up Survey Results







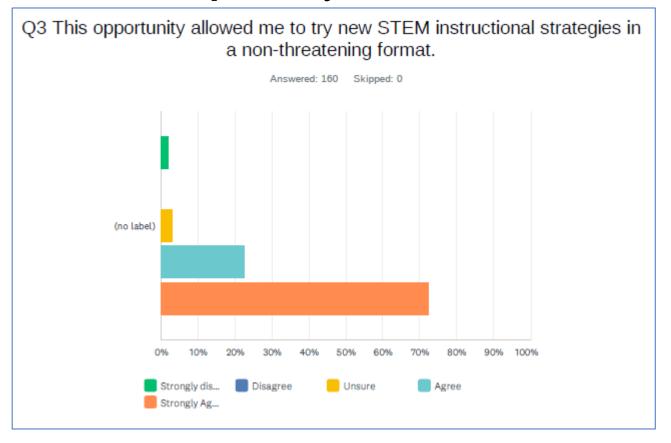
Teacher Follow-up Survey Results







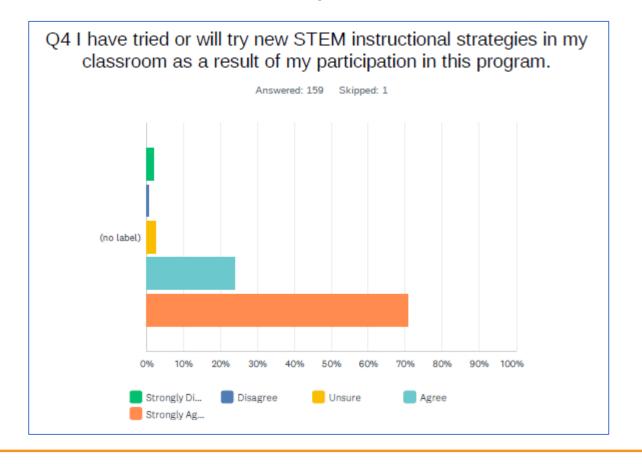
