The Consortium of Florida Education Foundations (Consortium) is proud to present the School District Education Foundation Matching Grant Program for 2025-2026. This grant program provides each school district--through their designated K-12 local education foundation or legislatively designated special school district--the opportunity to strengthen private/public partnerships by offering private donors the incentive of state matching funds.

Any private-sector donations raised prior to September 1, 2025, may be used to match state funds. In-kind donations are NOT match eligible. The funds may be used for a district-wide program or designated for one or more schools. The funds **may not** be expended for the construction of facilities or for the support of interscholastic athletics.

Program Policies and Requirements.

The requirements for participation in the School District Education Foundation Matching Grant Program are as follows:

- Eligible parties include local education foundation, in the absence of functioning education
 foundation the school district itself, or legislatively designated special school district participant
 (hereafter called "Participant). Only one party per public-school district in Florida, will be eligible to
 apply for the School District Education Foundation Matching Grant Program.
- Participants must submit to the Consortium a Certification of Cash Received form as a preliminary reservation when applications are submitted, as soon as possible, and by September 1, 2025. The certification form indicates that private contributions have been received by the foundation for use in the grant year July 1, 2025 June 30, 2026 and must be signed by the leader and a financial representative of the Participant. (Private funds that may have been collected in previous years, but designated for 2025-26, are eligible).
- All projects developed must support one or more of the following programmatic focus areas:
 - o literacy,
 - o increasing graduation rates,
 - career/technical education,
 - STEM education,
 - low-performing students,
 - and/or teaching quality.
 - New this year: Student Resiliency was requested but this proviso language has not yet officially been adopted as of June 6, 2025.
- The fiscal/programmatic year of the grant program runs July 1, 2025 June 30, 2026, unless otherwise specified.
- An online application must be submitted to the Consortium by September 1, 2025, to receive funds
 in the first round of distribution. If a Participant cannot meet that deadline, it must contact the
 Consortium so other arrangements can be made. Please note that by not meeting this deadline,

- release of funding may be delayed. Applications can be submitted online to the Consortium on a rolling basis between August 1 and September 1, 2025. *Mid-Year and Final Evaluation Reports of approved grant projects will be required*.
- One individual representing the Participant or school district <u>must</u> attend an annual training conducted by the Consortium prior to applying regarding the management of the School District Education Foundation Matching Grant Program. It is also advisable to participate in the <u>financial</u> <u>services workshop</u> conducted by the Comptroller's Office in the Department of Education, as all applicable rules apply to this funding.

Instructions for completing the application:

- One representative from each Participant will be given login information and password to the Consortium's online grant application portal. Applicants should keep track of login information for accessing saved applications. Partially completed applications can be saved and accessed at a later date.
- Separate applications must be submitted for each project considered for funding. Multiple projects/applications per applicant are accepted.
- All applications will be peer-reviewed and must indicate what specific outcomes will be measured.
- The Consortium reserves the right not to fund projects that may compromise the integrity of the program.
- If applicants are unable to meet the grant application deadline but would like to participate this grant year, they must contact Jayne Moraski at jaynemoraski@cfef.net for further instructions before September 1, 2025.

Documents required to be submitted with the online application:

- Certification of Cash Received Form
- Local school district strategic plan
- Copy of latest audit and management letter <u>OR</u> letter of exemption request (for Participants with annual revenue under \$250,000) and appropriate back-up documentation

Financial Policies and Explanations

- The first-round distribution amounts are determined by applying a \$10,000 base to each Participant
 plus using a calculated percentage of FTE representation for the eligible student population
 numbers to determine the remaining amount. First round distribution amounts were calculated
 using the most current FTE numbers distributed by the Department of Education in the spring prior
 to grant cycle.
- Per the attached Consortium Matching Grant Fiscal Accountability Policy:
 - Applicants are required to annually submit a copy of their most recent audit completed within the last year and a management letter prior to applying for Matching Grant funds for that year. In instances where findings are noted in the audit, the Consortium will require documentation that the appropriate measures have been taken to assure compliance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). For more information on GAAP, applicants may visit: http://www.accountingfoundation.org/gaap
 - Applicants with under \$250,000 annual revenue may request an exemption to the audit requirement annually, but they will agree to specific measures to ensure appropriate

oversight in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). The Consortium Executive Committee will be responsible for detailing these requirements and appropriate documentation which may include, but are not limited to: providing year-end financials; providing assurances from two or more Participant Organizations or school district leaders (executive director, president, treasurer) detailing the internal control measures in place; and confirming the ability to provide full documentation of project expenditures.

- The Consortium will randomly select one project from 1/5 of program participants each year and request back-up documentation of expenditures for the funded projects along with the final project evaluation due June 30. These projects will be chosen randomly from Participants that have not been part of this spot check process in the past five years. This spot-check will be documented and available upon request to the Florida Department of Education Program Manager who oversees the program. Recipients whose projects have been selected for a spot-check will be notified in writing at the time of Mid-Year Report deadline.
- Recipients are responsible for monitoring the financial requirements and limitations of the grant, including compliance with the audit requirements above.
- Public funds must be matched with an equal or greater amount of private funds in each submitted application budget.
- If not all eligible entities fully participate in the first application round of the Matching Grant program, a second round of grants will be offered to those that applied in the first round.
- In the event that Matching Grant Program funds are returned to the Consortium prior to the end of a
 grant cycle or otherwise unused by Participants following completion of the Second Round funding
 process, the Consortium shall allocate the remaining funds following the procedure detailed in the
 attached Allocation of Returned or Otherwise Unused Matching Grant Funds from Participant
 Organization policy.
- Each grant recipient (Participant awarded funding) is considered a sub-grant recipient for the State
 of Florida School District Education Foundation Matching Grant Program. As a sub-grantee,
 recipients are required to follow all the financial guidelines and requirements as detailed in the
 Green Book for the public match provided through this program. The Green Book is available at
 http://www.fldoe.org/core/fileparse.php/5625/urlt/0076985-2013greenbook.pdf.
- Payment cannot be made to individuals without receipt of services rendered. <u>In the case of classroom grants, grant checks cannot be made to individuals.</u> They must go to the schools or be managed in sub-accounts through the Participant or school district.
- Any non-allowable expenditures of projects become the responsibility of the foundation or school district.
- General administrative and indirect costs may NOT be charged to this grant.
- Unused public Matching Grant funds must be returned to the Consortium by the deadline set forth in the grant cycle timeline distributed to recipients.
- Since fiscal accountability is an important part of grant oversight, failure to follow these policies
 will result in retaining future grant funding until the recipient complies. Recipients will be provided
 their first-round allocation for the year following non-compliance and will have until the certification
 deadline to comply. Non-compliance is defined as recipients not submitting their audit, letter of
 exemption, expenditure documentation, or previous grant reports by the required deadlines. Should
 recipients still be in non-compliance, their first-round allocation will be forfeited and rolled into
 second round funding for all recipients in compliance to access.

**DEFINITIONS RELATIVE TO THE SDEF MATCHING GRANT PROGRAM APPLICATION

ACTIVITIES

Activities are what a program does with its inputs—the services it provides—to fulfill the program goals, and include mentoring, providing classroom equipment (or software, or supplies, etc.), providing teacher grants, etc. Activities result in outputs.

BASELINE

Your baseline number is the number you are starting with or trying to improve as an outcome. For example, if you are trying to increase standardized test scores, your baseline would be the test scores from the last testing period for your primary participants. If you are trying to increase teacher attitude toward utilizing more effective instructional practices, your baseline would be their attitude prior to participating in your program.

DISTRICT PLAN

Your application must align with your school district's current strategic plan OR if your project is more relevant to a specific School Improvement Plan (SIP), you may align with the SIP and describe that alignment in this application. Wherever you see the words "your district plan" in this application, it is referring to your school district's current strategic plan or school improvement plan that your project activities align with. You will be required to upload a copy of your school district strategic plan and/or relevant School Improvement Plan in the Organization Profile section of this grants platform prior to application submission. INPUTS

Inputs are resources a program uses to achieve program objectives, for example, staff, volunteers, facilities, equipment, curricula and money. A program uses inputs to support activities. The items/services in your budget are good indicators of what your inputs are.

OUTCOMES

Outcomes are measured benefits for participants during or after their involvement with the program. These are influenced by program outputs. They are what is different following the program. Why measure outcomes? To see if your program made a difference in the lives of people. This should be of interest to donors to your program.

- Initial Outcomes: The first benefits or changes to participants and include changes in knowledge, attitudes or skills.
- Intermediate Outcomes: These are changes in participants following the initial outcomes and include changes in behavior that result in new knowledge, attitudes or skills.
- Longer-Term Outcomes: These are the ultimate outcomes that the program desires to achieve for participants and include changes in condition or status.

OUTPUTS

Outputs are products of a program's activities, such as the number of trainings conducted, supplies distributed, tutoring sessions offered, or participants served. A program's outputs should produce desired outcomes for program participants.

PRIMARY/DIRECT PARTICIPANTS

These are people directly benefiting and/or receiving direct services from program activities and who you are measuring progress on. For example, in a program where you are trying to impact the reading scores of 12 low-performing students, but 10 other students have access to program materials, the low-performing students are your primary participants, and the other 10 are secondary participants. Primary participants does <u>not</u> mean students and teachers from primary schools.

SECONDARY/INDIRECT PARTICIPANTS

These are people benefiting indirectly from program services and activities. For example, in a teacher training program, the teacher is the primary participant and the students are secondary participants. Secondary participants does <u>not</u> mean students and teacher from secondary schools.

FAQs

REQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS RELATIVE TO THE SDEF MATCHING GRANT PROGRAM

What's new this year?

We now require two signatures for the matching certification document. We have also consolidated a few of the old guidelines documents.

We are waiting on notice from the Legislature to add a project category.

Proposed New Proviso Language

Funds in Specific Appropriation 93 are provided as challenge grants to public school district education foundations for programs that serve low-performing students, technical career education, literacy initiatives, Science, Technology, Engineering, Math (STEM) Education initiatives, increased teacher quality, and/ or increased graduation rates as provided in section 1011.765, Florida Statutes, and initiatives that advance student resiliency, citizenship, character and life skills development provided in section 1003.42(2)(n), Florida Statutes. The amount of each grant shall be equal to the private contribution made to a qualifying public school district education foundation. In-kind contributions shall not be considered for matching purposes.

Do I have to wait until I receive notification of grant award to begin work on my project?

No! Work on local projects can be anytime in this year's grant cycle, between July 1, and June 30.

What if I know we won't be able to meet a deadline?

We try to give you as much time and notice as possible to complete your application and reports—we have report deadlines for the DOE, too. Please do your best to adhere to given deadlines, but let us know ASAP if a report will be late.

When do we get our money?

60% of Matching Grant funds are typically disbursed by the State in September and the remaining 40% in January. The Consortium is committed to getting those funds out to you as quickly as possible once they are received in our account. Note: January disbursement is tied to mid-year report data.

We just received notification that we are the recipient of a local private foundation grant but we won't receive the check until AFTER the application deadline. What can we do?

Let the Consortium know that you wish to use these funds as part of your private match. With your Certification of Cash Received form, submit a letter from the funder stating that you are the recipient of the funds and approximate date you will receive them.

What if our District doesn't have a strategic plan?

You may: 1) Upload a current School Improvement Plan for the school that your project will impact and aligns with; OR 2) Upload a letter from Superintendent stating District's priority areas that show your project(s) alignment

What percent of administrative costs can we include in our application budget?

0%. You may, however, include specific staff time and resources directly spent on the project, as long as you can demonstrate the time and resources were dedicated solely to your project.

What if my final expenditure budget does not match the budget I included in my application?

No problem. Your application budget is your best guess on how you will spend the funds. In your final expenditure budget, show us how the funds were actually spent. We will look at proper use of funds as well as make sure you spent your total allocation over all your projects.

2025-26 Legislation Considerations Tips for Local Education Foundations in Planning Projects

LEFs are encouraged to confer with local school district attorneys in providing support for classroom materials. The Consortium will provide information as guidelines are developed by the Florida Department of Education. In the meantime, consider the following:

- Think about all the programs and projects that involve reading material, supplies or professional development that may be scrutinized. This includes classroom grant applications, training/professional development for school personnel and teacher resource stores.
- Provide disclaimers/reminders to demonstrate awareness of the need for compliance. Here is an example from our Marion County member:
 - "Please be sure all materials are in compliance with school procedures, district policy and state statutes for usage with your students."
- In the case of classroom grant programs, consider an approval process such as having reading material approved by the district media specialist. Our Volusia County member has the district's media specialist serve on their classroom grant committee specifically to screen books included in grant requests.
- Consider a "sign off" or check box on applications indicating the applicant is compliant with state and local regulations and policies with respect to curriculum and classroom activities/materials. You'll notice a similar statement for you to sign off on when you submit your MG application to the Consortium.
- State statute section 934.50, sub section 7 limits the drones that are allowed for purchase and use by state agencies. It appears that only drones on the <u>approved list</u> can be purchased. This could be problematic as drones on the approved list are not designed for classroom use and are more expensive.
