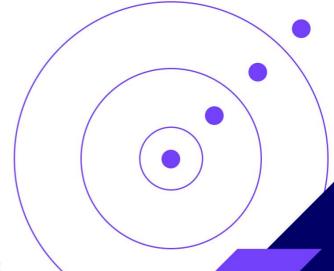

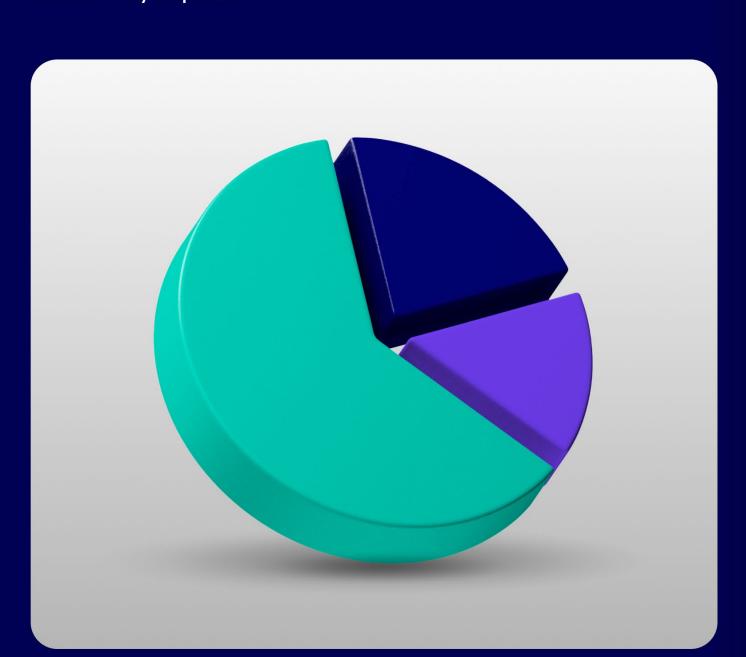

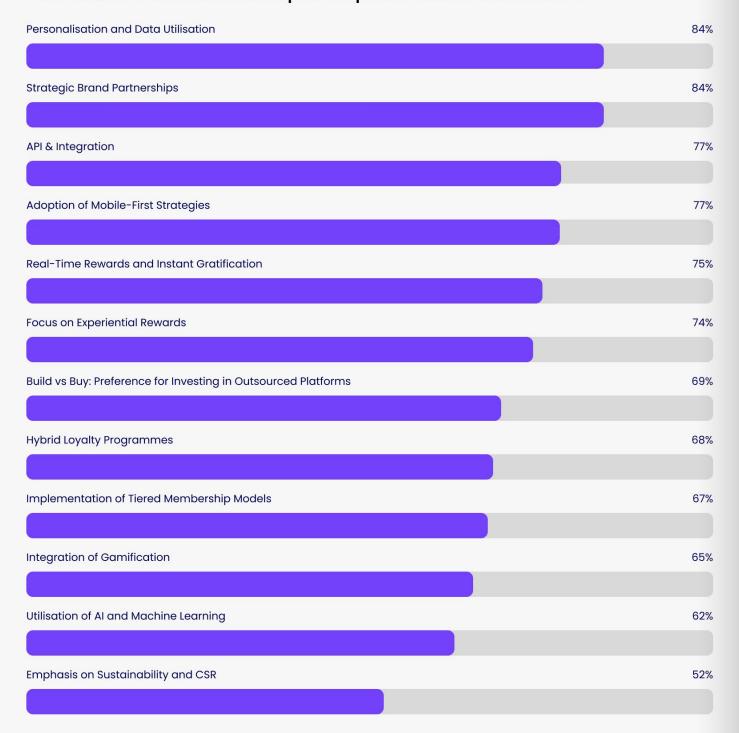

Areas of Investment: Quick Summary

In most conversations, technology-enabled personalisation and strategic partnerships emerged as top priorities, with both key areas scoring **84%** as future investments. Evidently, the market's focus remains on unique, data-driven customer experiences.

As for the technical foundation of loyalty programmes, there's a shift towards API integration and mobile-first strategies. 77% of businesses said they are prioritising seamless, accessible loyalty experiences that meet customers wherever they are.

Value-driven rewards also emerged as a key focus in discussions with **75%** centred on real-time rewards and instant gratification. Experiential rewards followed closely at **74%**, highlighting the need for programmes that balance transactional benefits with memorable experiences.

And whilst traditional programme mechanics still matter, businesses are actively reassessing their technology strategies. Notably, 69% of companies prefer outsourced solutions, favouring proven, scalable loyalty technologies over in-house development.

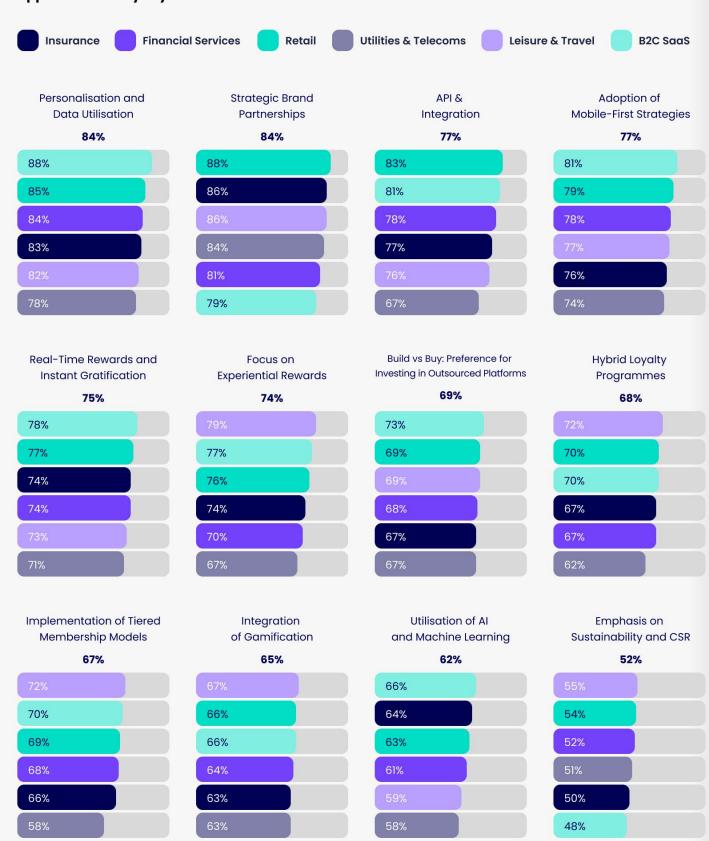
Finally, interest in emerging technologies varies. Gamification scored 65%, while AI and Machine Learning drew interest from 62% – although adoption remains cautious. Meanwhile, sustainability initiatives (52%) are gaining traction, signalling potential for differentiation in this space.

Industry Investment Analysis

The B2C SaaS & Technology sector leads in data-driven initiatives, with the highest adoption rates in personalisation (88%) and mobile-first strategies (81%). The sector's dominance in these areas stem from native digital capabilities and data-rich environments, which naturally support advanced personalisation efforts.

Retail maintains strong investment across multiple areas, particularly in strategic partnerships (88%) and API integration (83%). This reflects a clear focus on connected, omnichannel loyalty experiences. Given this aggressive investment strategy, we expect continued momentum in

Aligning with its core business of delivering memorable customer experiences, the Leisure & Travel sector is the top investor in experiential rewards (79%) and tiered memberships (72%). Notably, despite economic uncertainties, the sector continues to invest heavily in premium loyalty features. A strategic bet perhaps, that enhanced experiences will drive customer retention, even during challenging times.

In contrast, Utilities & Telecoms tend to take a more cautious approach to loyalty investments, particularly in technical infrastructure. Lower adoption rates in API integration (67%) and tiered memberships (58%) indicate a conservative stance on programme development. However, this approach could create a widening competitive gap, as customers increasingly expect seamless, digital-first loyalty experiences similar to those offered in other sectors.

The Insurance and Financial Services sector shows consistent investment across most areas, with personalisation (83-84%) and mobile strategies (76-78%) ranking as key priorities. Insurance companies, in particular, want to use personalisation to track and reward responsible behaviours, such as careful driving and improved home security.

KEY CONSIDERATION

Utilities, Telecoms, and Insurance businesses often limit value-added rewards to contract renewal periods. A "Last-minute loyalty" approach misses opportunities for year-round engagement, potentially compromising customer lifetime value in increasingly competitive markets.

Investment Priority Insights: Key Drivers

While our analysis identified 12 distinct areas of investment, we've focused on the key drivers behind those with the most compelling insights. This section summarises why organisations, across industries, are motivated to invest in loyalty.

Personalisation & Partnerships

Personalisation (36%) and strategic partnerships (35%) not only share the highest adoption rates but also rank closely in critical priority, highlighting their deep connection. This should be expected as brand partnerships play a crucial role in personalisation, enabling brands to co-create unique, highly relevant rewards that enhance tailored offerings.

Value Delivery Models

Instant gratification and experiential rewards hold equal critical priority levels (30% - 28%), showing a shared commitment to immediate value delivery and long-term engagement. Enterprises increasingly recognise that modern loyalty programmes require a balanced approach, one that provides both short-term rewards and lasting customer connections.

Technical Infrastructure

Mobile-first strategies and API integration also show distinct priority patterns. While 77% of businesses are investing in these areas, around one-third (32% and 31%) consider them critical to their roadmap. What were once considered "niceto-have" features have now evolved into essential infrastructure components.

Build vs Buy: Speed-to-Market

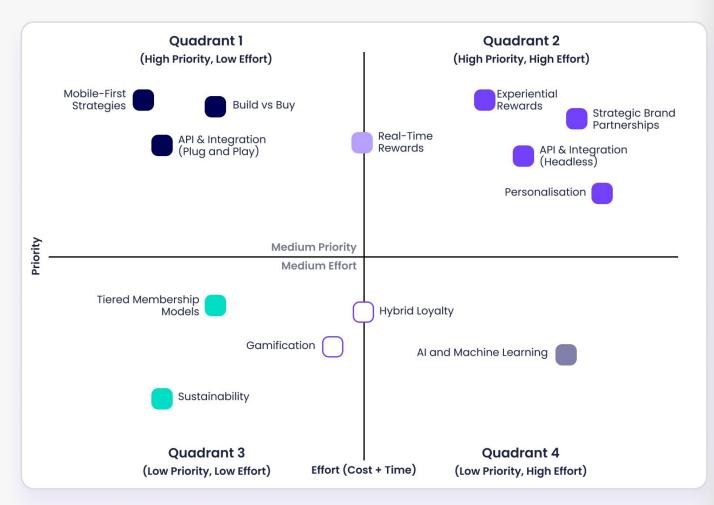
69% of businesses prefer outsourced solutions, with 28% considering them critical and 24% marking them a high priority. Speed-to-market was the decisive factor in most cases. Companies seek faster ways to launch new loyalty programmes or improve existing reward systems or even test them in new regions.

Quick Wins (High Priority, Low Effort)

> API & Integration (Plug and Play), Mobile-First Strategies, and Outsourcing Loyalty Solutions require minimal time investment, enabling businesses to implement them almost instantly while simultaneously developing longer-term initiatives.

Balanced Opportunities (Medium Priority, Medium Effort)

Real-Time Rewards, Hybrid Loyalty, and Gamification provide a pragmatic investment path with manageable implementation timelines, offering a well-balanced approach to loyalty innovation.

Strategic Investments (High Priority, High Effort)

Personalisation remains a cornerstone of modern loyalty programmes, with a growing emphasis on data-driven engagement and targeted rewards. It requires ongoing financial investment and dedicated resources.

The real challenge lies in the time required to implement the necessary technology, infrastructure, and analytics. Timelines extend further when brands invest in Alpowered predictive personalisation, which demands advanced segmentation models.

Strategic Brand Partnerships

Cost: High

Brand partnerships are now a critical component of loyalty programme success, offering differentiation and value that are often difficult for competitors to replicate. This is why they consistently rank as a top priority across

By expanding the rewards ecosystem, partnerships increase perceived value through highly relevant rewards while providing access to new customer segments. However, they require significant resources, from legal considerations to ongoing management, leading to lengthy implementation timelines.

API & Integration (Headless Solution)

Priority: High

API-driven loyalty solutions continue to evolve, with two distinct approaches emerging:

Headless API solutions rank highly because they offer maximum flexibility for brands looking to build a custom, future-proof loyalty ecosystem. They allow for seamless integration with future partners, extending a programme's long-term scope.

Because of these advantages, many businesses are willing to absorb the high upfront costs associated with headless APIs. However, implementation requires specialist technical expertise and longer deployment timelines.

API & Integration (Plug and Play)

Plug-and-play APIs provide pre-built loyalty functionality, allowing businesses to integrate with existing systems quickly and cost-effectively.

These solutions significantly reduce time-to-market, enabling brands to connect loyalty programmes to third-party platforms without the technical and financial demands of headless API solutions.

Adoption of Mobile-First Strategies

Priority: High

A mobile-first approach to loyalty is a high-value, quickwin strategy that aligns with consumer behaviour and delivers immediate results.

With most loyalty interactions now happening on mobile devices, businesses must provide seamless, app-like experiences across reward programmes, mobile websites, and digital wallets. It's a shift that's no longer optional. Customers expect convenience, speed, and frictionless interactions, and failure to meet these expectations risks disengagement.

The cost and implementation time for a mobile-first strategy can be relatively low, particularly with plugand-play solutions that come with built-in mobile capabilities.

Many businesses already have responsive digital infrastructures in place, reducing the need for extensive redevelopment. Although for those with legacy systems, transitioning to a mobile-first approach may require a greater investment.

Real-Time Rewards & Instant Gratification

Priority: High

The ability to deliver immediate, frictionless rewards has become a critical driver of engagement, with businesses increasingly investing in automated transaction processing and instant reward redemption. Consumers expect on-the-spot incentives, making real-time rewards essential for driving participation and positive behaviours.

From an investment perspective, real-time reward systems fall into the medium-cost, medium-time category due to the technical complexity of integration. Businesses that opt for in-house development face longer implementation timelines and higher costs due to the need for complex integrations with existing

While third-party solutions can shorten timelines, companies lacking strong loyalty infrastructure may still face extended deployment times.

Experiential Rewards

Priority: High

Experiential rewards are becoming a key differentiator, offering higher perceived value than traditional discounts or points. VIP events, exclusive access, and luxury perks strengthen emotional connections, enhancing brand loyalty in ways transactional rewards cannot.

However, high costs and operational complexity remain barriers. Managing non-tangible rewards requires careful curation, strong partnerships, and specialised fulfilment. While turnkey experiential reward platforms can streamline deployment, moderate implementation timelines are necessary to ensure seamless execution.

Build vs Buy: Preference for Outsourcing Loyalty Solutions

The shift toward outsourced loyalty solutions reflects growing demand for speed-to-market, cost efficiency, and scalability. SaaS-based platforms provide pre-built functionalities, allowing brands to launch or enhance loyalty programmes quickly without the resource strain of in-house development.

With lower upfront costs and shorter implementation timelines, outsourcing has become a high-priority, lowcost, and low-time investment for businesses looking to reduce complexity and scale efficiently.

Tiered loyalty programmes are a proven strategy for increasing customer lifetime value, particularly in industries like financial services, fitness, and subscriptions.

While low in implementation costs, their medium complexity stems from the need for careful segmentation. Businesses must ensure tier progression is both motivating and achievable to sustain long-term customer commitment and retention.

Gamification

Priority: Medium

Gamification is a high-potential tool for customer loyalty, yet is not widely used despite its ability to drive engagement and retention.

Sustained user interest requires well-structured mechanics, behavioural triggers, and ongoing content updates. Each of these demand moderate financial investment and continuous management. The need for careful integration and periodic refreshes places gamification as a medium-priority investment, best suited for brands seeking long-term participation

Al and Machine Learning

Priority: Medium

Al-driven personalisation is shaping the future of loyalty, delivering predictive engagement and hyperpersonalised experiences. However, its high cost and complexity make it a long-term investment rather than an immediate priority.

With significant infrastructure, data processing, and talent requirements, implementation timelines are lengthy, requiring structured data collection and model training. Many businesses are phasing in Al gradually, starting with predictive modelling before scaling to full automation.

Low Priority Investments

Sustainability

Sustainability-driven loyalty initiatives are gaining traction as brands seek to align with eco-conscious consumer preferences. While not yet a top priority, they offer differentiation, especially in sectors where environmental impact

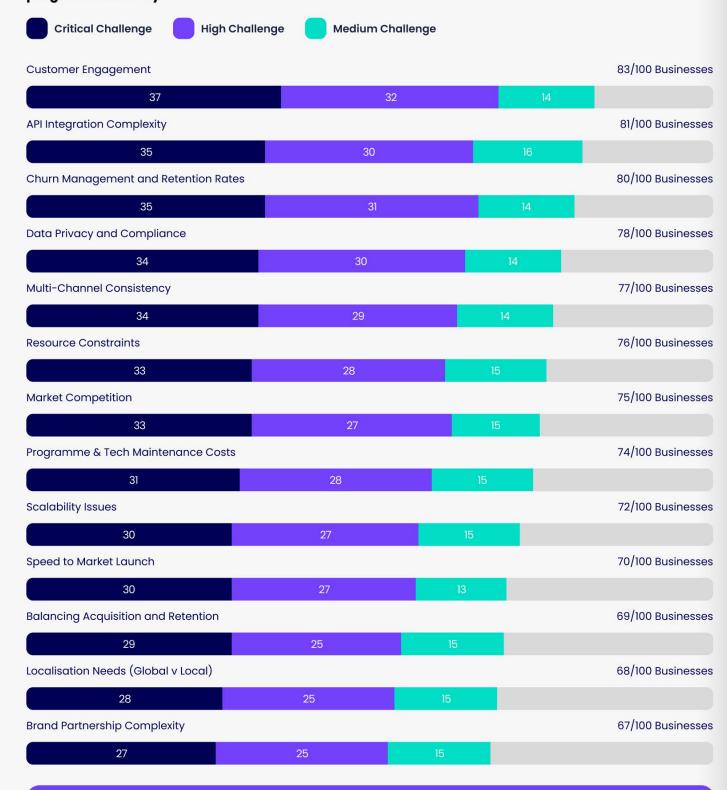

Key Business Challenges in Achieving Customer Loyalty and Programme Concerns

Our analysis highlights the most pressing challenges businesses face in managing loyalty programmes today.



KEY CONSIDERATION

While customer engagement leads as the top challenge (83%), the next three—API integration (81%), retention (80%), and data privacy (78%)—all hold similar critical ratings (34-35%). This suggests that businesses are struggling with multiple high-priority challenges rather than a single dominant issue

Business Challenges:Understanding Critical Priorities

We deepened our analysis on the challenges of achieving loyalty and programme concerns.

Customer Engagement

Customer engagement emerged as the top concern, with 83% of businesses citing it as a challenge and 37% marking it critical. Keeping customers actively engaged appears to remain the core challenge in loyalty.

Technical Infrastructure

API integration and technical infrastructure present equally pressing challenges. 81% of businesses struggle with integrating loyalty programmes into their existing tech stack (e.g., CRM systems), with 35% rating it critical. These technical hurdles directly impact the ability to deliver seamless experiences, likely contributing to the 77% of businesses struggling with multi-channel consistency.

C Churn Management & Increasing Retention Rates

Customer retention and churn management rank as the third most critical challenge, with 80% of businesses citing it as a concern and 35% considering it critical. Rising churn is driven by intensified competition, giving customers more choices and easier price comparisons. Additionally, inconsistent customer experiences and poorly aligned rewards further contribute to retention struggles.

Data Privacy & Compliance

Ensuring data privacy and compliance ranks as the fourth biggest challenge, affecting 78% of businesses, with 34% considering it critical. This likely reflects tightening regulations and increasing consumer awareness of data protection.

Multi-Channel Consistency

Managing loyalty programmes across multiple touchpoints is a growing challenge, with 77% of businesses citing it as a concern and 34% marking it critical. Businesses must now deliver seamless customer experiences across mobile apps, websites, and in-store interactions, requiring greater alignment and consistency.

E Resource Management

Resource constraints including the capacity to build, maintain, and support loyalty platforms affect 76% of enterprises. This challenge often has ripple effects, particularly on programme maintenance costs (74%) and scalability (72%), making it harder for businesses to expand or enhance their loyalty offerings using in-house solutions.

Market Competition

The challenge of market competition concerns 75% of businesses, with 33% considering it critical. As loyalty offerings become increasingly crowded, organisations struggle to differentiate their programmes.

Programme & Tech Maintenance

Ongoing programme and technology maintenance challenges 74% of businesses, with 31% seeing it as critical. Many struggle with the continuous investment needed to keep loyalty programmes both competitive and technically robust.

[] Scalability

72% of businesses cite scalability as a major challenge, with 30% rating it critical, reflecting the difficulty of expanding loyalty programmes, adding new features, and handling increased customer demand without compromising performance.

Speed-to-Market & Customer Balance

70% of businesses struggle with speed-to-market, and 30% rate it critical. This challenge ties closely to balancing acquisition and retention strategies (69% overall, 29% critical). Many businesses struggle to launch programmes quickly while maintaining focus on existing customer relationships, contributing to the 69% preference for outsourced solutions.

Balancing efforts between acquiring new customers and retaining existing ones is a challenge for 69% of businesses, with 29% rating it as critical. Industries like B2C SaaS (73%), leisure (70%), and financial services (70%) report some of the highest concern levels. The need to drive short-term growth while sustaining long-term loyalty creates a constant tension in loyalty strategy and resource allocation.

Cocalisation

68% of businesses face challenges with localisation, with 28% rating it critical. Striking the right balance between global consistency and local market relevance remains a significant hurdle for expanding enterprises.

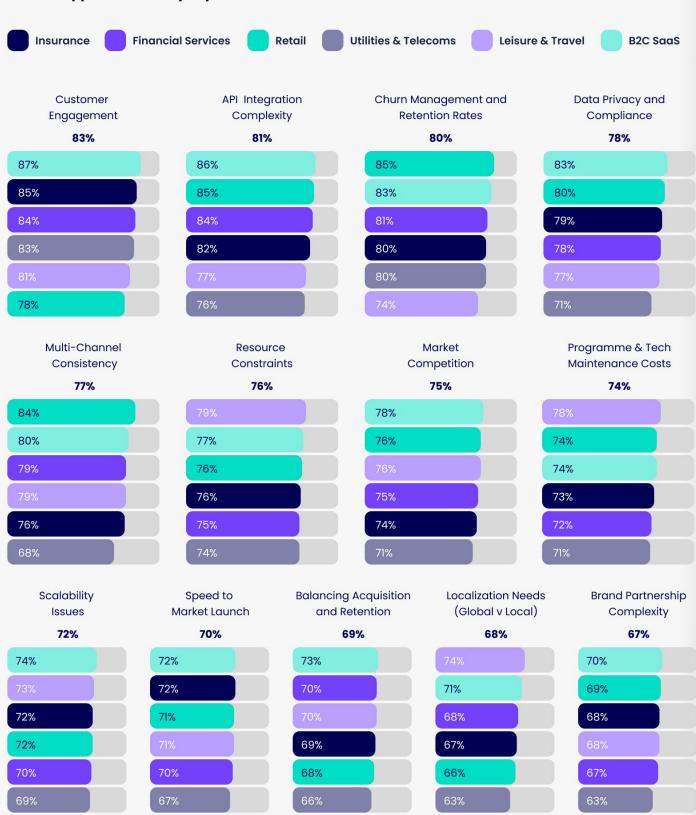
Partnership Management

Managing brand partnerships presents challenges for 67% of businesses, with 27% marking it critical. While partnerships enhance loyalty programmes, aligning goals and maintaining successful collaboration requires ongoing effort and coordination.

Examining challenge patterns across industries reveals sector-specific pain points and distinct approaches to loyalty.



Challenges by Industry Analysis

B2C SaaS & Technology

The B2C SaaS and Technology sector reports the highest intensity of challenges, particularly in customer engagement (87%) and API integration (86%). This is likely due to sophisticated customer bases with high digital expectations and complex technical requirements.

Retail

In Retail, churn management (85%) and API integration (85%) are the top concerns. As an omnichannel industry, seamless integration and consistency are fundamental to retention, yet these challenges persist despite significant investment.

Insurance

The Insurance sector follows a similar pattern. API integration (82%) and customer engagement (85%) rank as its biggest challenges, reflecting the struggle to modernise technical infrastructure while maintaining strong customer relationships. This challenge has intensified, as insurance interactions are infrequent, making each customer touchpoint critical.

Leisure & Travel

Leisure & Travel experiences moderate challenge levels, except in customer engagement (81%) and multi-channel consistency (79%). These challenges align with the sector's core focus on customer experience, suggesting that despite high investments in experiential features, persistent engagement difficulties remain.

Financial Services

Financial Services faces a high intensity of challenges across the board, with API integration (84%), customer engagement (84%), and churn management (81%) topping the list. The sector also reports significant concerns around multichannel consistency (79%) and data privacy (78%), reflecting the pressure to modernise infrastructure while meeting regulatory requirements and customer expectations. These broad challenge levels suggest financial services organisations are navigating both digital transformation and heightened competition simultaneously.

Utilities & Telecoms

Utilities & Telecoms report lower challenge scores across most areas. Customer engagement (83%) and churn management (80%) ranks as the top concern, though at a lower intensity compared to other industries. However, lower challenge scores may not indicate better performance, but rather the sector's lower investments in loyalty programmes (as noted earlier in the Industry Investment Analysis).

KEY CONSIDERATION

While challenge intensity varies by sector, all industries report their highest concern levels in customer engagement, API integration, and churn management (78-87%). These fundamental challenges transcend industry boundaries and will remain critical priorities in 2025, regardless of sector-specific nuances.

Affiliates & Brand Partnerships



What role does affiliate marketing play in driving customer loyalty for both advertisers and publishers? How does this work with loyalty programmes?

It used to be a simple transaction-driven model. But now it's turned into a dynamic ecosystem that's reshaping how brands build lasting relationships with customers. We can look at this from two perspectives.

It's an exciting time. Instead of being limited to their own rewards and a limited range of 3rd party offers, strategic affiliate partnerships serve as a powerful tool that diversifies and enriches the rewards experience. I'm seeing positive results for programmes that use brand to brand partnerships as a way to keep members engaged between traditional purchase cycles or as added value for subscription memberships. For example, telecom businesses partnering with tech brands to offer targeted discounts. Or health and fitness businesses teaming up with food nutrition partners to offer complementary rewards and incentives.

For Advertisers

Times are also interesting as they're tapping into these incredibly engaged, premium audiences through trusted platforms. Leveraging established relationships is integral for this model to succeed and I've seen conversion rates soar for advertisers that create exclusive offers specifically for loyalty programme members.

Strategic Alignment

Another crucial aspect of affiliate marketing is strategic alignment. It has become a major focus for partnering brands. The most successful partnerships are the ones where there's a natural fit between what the advertisers offer, what the members want, and how the loyalty programme positions itself. So when these elements align, you see a powerful ecosystem emerge which drives genuine long-term engagement.

Technology and Data

Technology integrations between our affiliate network platform and loyalty programme providers give us useful insights into member behaviour and preferences. With this information, publishers can fine-tune their offerings in realtime so that members get exactly what they want when they want it. It's basically responding to customer expectations the moment they emerge.

Currently, to better understand and anticipate customer needs, we're seeing a massive shift toward Al-led, real-time personalisation. For 2025 and beyond, I expect to see even more sophisticated partnership ecosystems emerge, where loyalty programmes can dynamically adjust offers, based on

How are brands leveraging partnerships through affiliate networks to enhance the value of their loyalty programmes?

I've seen some exciting ways publishers are getting the most out of their affiliate partnerships in their loyalty programmes. First off, hyper-relevant partner offers. Brands go beyond basic cashback offers, aiming to provide incentives and experiences that are much more likely to resonate with customers and develop an emotional connection with them. Rewards such as exclusive VIP access and personalised discounts on items they're actually interested in make loyalty programme members feel they're experiencing brands in truly

But perhaps most exciting for me is the monetisation potential. A well-structured affiliate partnership is a significant revenue driver. Negotiating competitive commission rates or a revenue share model from sales on partner sites originating from offers on a loyalty programme has a two-fold benefit. Driving revenue from advertisers and keeping your customers engaged through value added rewards.

What are the main challenges brands face when using affiliate marketing to support loyalty initiatives? How can an affiliate marketing network help them overcome this?

Working with countless partnerships across pretty much every sector, I've seen time and again the same pain points hindering programme success. There's quite a few and they vary. So, I'll break them down. These challenges are important to understand for brands that are considering partnerships in their loyalty initiatives.

Attribution Challenges

One of the biggest challenges in the partnership space is attribution tracking. Knowing how loyalty initiatives spread across various channels impact your partnerships is nothing short of complex. Luckily, affiliate networks have improved attribution models, helping brands to clearly track customer journeys from initial engagement through to repeat purchases.

Partnership Alignment & Quality

Finding partners whose values and audience genuinely match your brand isn't straightforward either. I've seen fantastic loyalty initiatives fall flat because partners were simply not aligned. Networks play a crucial role of providing rich data insights about potential partner performance and their audience demographics, making it easier for brands to identify ideal matches.

Customer Experience & Consistency

Delivering a consistent and seamless experience across multiple partner touchpoints also calls for greater integration. The good news is modern affiliate platforms provide standardised tools which help maintain consistency and reduce technical overhead. Members benefit too from smoother journeys as they engaged with partners via touchpoints that feel natural and relevant to the brand experience.

Creating attractive rewards sounds easy in principle. But maintaining sustainable returns is a delicate balance. Datadriven insights and flexible commission structures in networks help brands optimise their reward structures without compromising profitability. I've seen particularly strong results with brands using predictive analytics to adjust their offerings in real-time.

The Network Solution

What fascinates me about affiliate networks is their ability to address challenges holistically. Advanced technology and extensive partner ecosystems often seen in networks provide the necessary infrastructure, data insights, and expertise that brands need to overcome these hurdles. They're unified tracking solutions, quality partner matching, capabilities of streamlining integration, and their powerful optimisation tools, pave the way towards successful loyalty-driven partnerships. The key is having this comprehensive ecosystem that can adapt and scale as your loyalty initiatives evolve.

real-time member behaviour.

How critical is audience alignment between publishers and advertisers in ensuring that affiliate marketing drives loyalty?

It's absolutely critical. Otherwise it's difficult to build genuine loyalty through partnerships. Again, I'll break this down.

Building Trust and Relevance

Simply put; magic happens when publishers and advertisers are well-aligned. If they want authentic engagement, publishers should promote products and services that naturally resonate with their audience, rather than force irrelevant promotions. I've seen firsthand how customers are more likely to engage with, and remain loyal to brands that understand and meet their needs and values.

Driving Consistent Engagement

Engagement patterns are perhaps the most exciting part about well-aligned partnerships. Rather than seeing one-off interactions, we see customers repeatedly engaging with both the publisher's content and the promoted brand. It's seeing meaningful touchpoints strengthening the loyalty relationship in real-time.

Increasing Lifetime Value

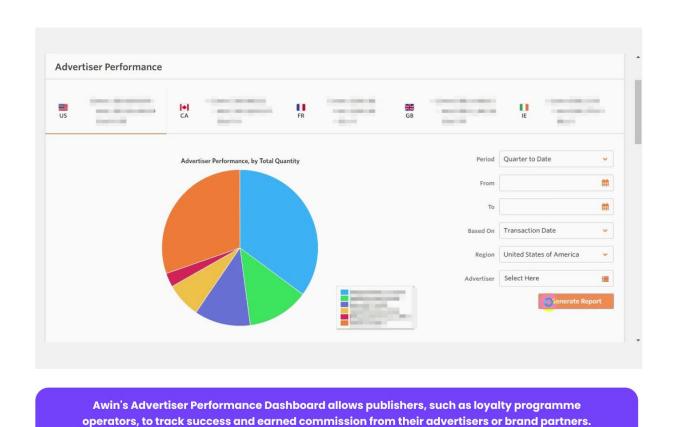
Data also shows that partnerships with strong audience alignment attract higher-quality customers too. Customers that aren't just making one-time purchases but more often than not are repeatedly buying, and demonstrating long-term retention potential to the brand by becoming loyalty programme members.

Avoiding Transactional Relationships

On the other hand, when there's a mismatch between publisher and advertiser audiences - you end up with short-term transactions rather than lasting relationships. Misaligned partnerships might drive initial sales, but they rarely convert into meaningful loyalty.

Creating Brand Advocates

In my experience, what sets successful brand partnerships apart from unsuccessful ones are the influx of brand advocacy. Organic advocacy creates a powerful compounding effect, driving both loyalty and sustainable growth. So the impact of audience alignment on loyalty cannot be overstated. It's the foundation that enables authentic engagement, drives higher customer lifetime value, and creates genuine brand advocacy.



This gives clear indicators on how well advertisers are aligned with your audience.

Looking at the year ahead, what innovations or developments do you anticipate in the affiliate-loyalty space?

From a network perspective, there's several directions for improving the synergy between loyalty programmes and affiliate partnerships.

Dynamic Personalisation Through AI

Currently, to better understand and anticipate customer needs, we're seeing a massive shift toward AI-led, real-time personalisation. For 2025 and beyond, I think we'll see the emergence of even more sophisticated partnership ecosystems, where loyalty programmes can dynamically adjust offers, based on real-time member behaviour. Networks need personalised offers in real-time, based on customer behaviour patterns I mentioned earlier. We're actually seeing a growing demand for systems that instantly adjust rewards and incentives based on member engagement data, so that brands make their loyalty programmes more responsive.

Cross-Industry Partnership Integration

The ability to seamlessly connect partners across different sectors is also essential. Networks need to provide the technical infrastructure for brands that want to create bundled rewards and unified experiences. We're seeing increasing demand for API solutions that can handle complex, multi-partner loyalty initiatives while maintaining consistent user experiences.

Experiential Rewards Evolution

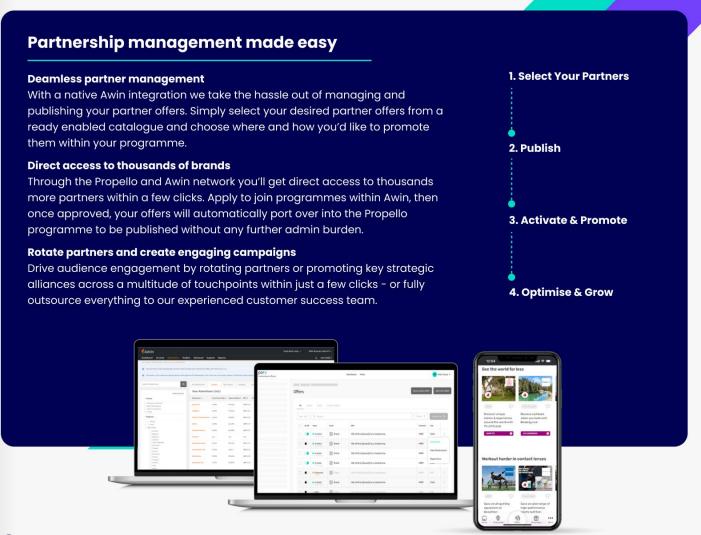
Traditional cashback and points systems are evolving into more sophisticated experiential offerings. In the future, networks need to develop more robust tracking and attribution models that handle complex reward structures. It could include better ways to measure the impact of exclusive events, early access, and VIP perks on long-term loyalty.

Sustainability and Values-Alignment

Supporting value-based partnerships needs to evolve.

Networks must develop better ways to verify and showcase partners' sustainability credentials and provide transparent reporting on the impact of these initiatives. This is a surefire way for brands to demonstrate authentic commitment to the values they share with their customers.

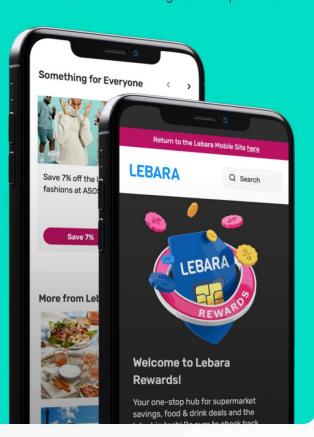
Lebara: **Build v Buy**

The data-driven approach allows us to make informed decisions about incentives that helps us maintain high customer retention level

How does your rewards platform fit into your loyalty marketing strategy for 2025 and beyond?

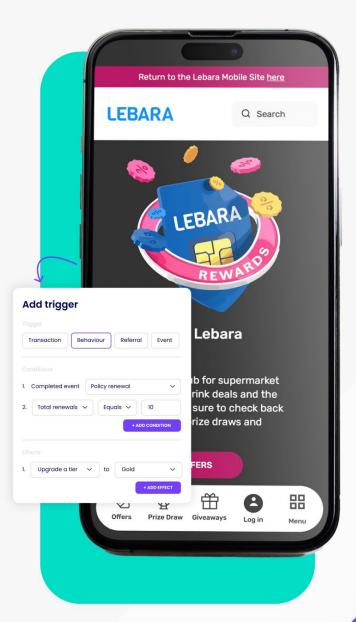

Investing in AI: The Competitive Advantage for Loyalty Leaders



Our report findings conclude that enterprise brands are making AI a top priority, with 62% investing in smarter loyalty programmes. Al and Machine Learning (ML) are transforming the way brands understand and engage customers, making loyalty programmes more predictive, personalised, and proactive than ever before. From anticipating customer churn to delivering hyperpersonalised rewards and engagement strategies, AI is unlocking new possibilities for brands to build deeper, more meaningful customer relationships.

Here, we speak with Mark Camp, CEO at Propello, to explore the key use cases of AI in loyalty programmes and discuss how this technology is reshaping customer engagement.

What role does Al play in predicting customer churn and taking preventive action?

Al, particularly its subset Machine Learning (ML), is a gamechanger in predicting customer churn. It can process vast amounts of data to detect patterns such as declining shopping frequency, fewer reward redemptions, or reduced engagement-all indicators of customer drop-off. The beauty of AI lies in Its ability to identify the issue at hand and help brands act on it. For example, if someone's at risk of leaving, the system can suggest a personalised offer like a discount or an exclusive reward. And since AI keeps learning as it goes, over time it gets better at spotting who's likely to churn and what works to keep them engaged. Meaning brands can stay ahead of the curve, building stronger relationships and keeping more customers engaged before they even think of churning.

How does Al enable deeper personalisation in loyalty programmes?

AI & ML assisted loyalty programmes take personalisation up to a whole other level. It uses data to understand each customer as an individual, things like their shopping preferences, browsing behaviour, when and how they engage with the brand. Effectively creating a detailed picture of what each person values.

With these insights AI can deliver hyper-personalised experiences— hyper-relevant recommendations, offering rewards tailored to the customer's interests, sending the right messaging and incentive prompts at times when customers are most likely to act. I'd even go as far as to say Al's focus will switch from past customers' behaviours to predicting what they will do next.

Scalability makes the implications even more exciting. For example, instead of relying on broad customer segments, Al can create millions of unique journeys at once. Every customer will feel like the rewards experience was designed just for them. This level of personalisation was perhaps considered merely in the realm of imagination a few years ago. Now, it's the next vehicle for driving customer loyalty like we've never seen before.

What innovations in Al-driven gamification or engagement have emerged recently?

AI & ML personalises gamified experiences in real time. So Instead of fixed challenges or rewards, engagement mechanics are tailored specifically to the individual. Adjusted difficulty levels, recommending challenges based on past behaviour, and of course, predicting what type of rewards will be most compelling to the individual.

We're also seeing AI enhance dynamic achievement-based incentives, where customers can unlock personalised milestones based on their specific interests or shopping patterns. Brands are using Al-driven engagement loops—like streak-based rewards, Al-powered treasure hunts that also factor in personal preferences to keep customers actively participating.

What fundamental shifts has AI brought to loyalty programmes compared to traditional models?

Al has transformed loyalty programmes from static, transactional systems into dynamic, intelligent ecosystems that evolve in response to customer behaviour. Where traditional programmes relied on fixed point structures and broad segmentation, AI enhances real-time personalisation, leads unmatched predictive engagement, and has the ability to automate at scale.

How do you see Al reshaping loyalty programmes in the next five years? What trends are you observing?

AI & ML is set to completely redefine how brands approach customer loyalty over the next five years. Referring back to how AI will anticipate what customers will do next instead of reacting to past actions.

We'll see tailored rewards delivered at optimal times and engagement nudges at the right moment. It can also learn to reward loyalty beyond the purchase cycle, rewarding advocacy and sustainability efforts. Instead of static points systems, as a result of ML, we'll see more fluid and adaptive models where customers are rewarded for a broader range of desirable actions.

With hyper-personalised offers, dynamically adjusted rewards, and engagement strategies, AI will be front and centre when it comes to deeper, more emotional connections. It's a brain like our own that never stops learning. The only difference is AI works 24/7. Constantly learning to understand customer sentiment, predict moments of disengagement, and respond in a way that feels genuinely thoughtful. Inasmuch that they'll be the face providing instant, personalised recommendations, resolving queries, and even gamifying interactions in the not-so-



Personalising the **Loyalty & Rewards Experience**

Our report findings reveal that 84% of enterprise brands will continue to invest in personalising the loyalty experience as a critical priority. Here, we speak with Nathan Armstrong, Loyalty & Brand Partnerships Consultant, at Propello.

What are the key components that make a loyalty programme truly personalised, and how do they differ from traditional approaches?

The days of simply offering one size fits all loyalty solutions are long gone. Personalised rewards actually mean something to customers because they are a direct response to customer preferences and buying patterns. To put it simply, personalised rewards make sense to the individual, and are relevant to their customer journey with the business.

Predictive analytics are also another break away from traditional approaches to rewarding customer loyalty. What makes AI and machine learning so exciting is their ability to anticipate what customers need before they even know they need it. I feel we are still in the initial phases of understanding truly how AI can be implemented to drive loyalty programme personalisation.

Dynamic segmentation allows us to look at real-time behavioural data instead of relying on static demographic data, which, let's be honest, doesn't tell us much. Meaning we can adapt our approach based on how customers are actually interacting with the programme and personalised rewards on offer.

Traditionally, loyalty programmes have relied on generic milestone-based rewards, but true personalisation shifts the focus to individual actions and behavioural changes. Instead of rewarding customers at fixed intervals, modern programmes recognise and respond to meaningful actions in real time. For example, if a customer makes a behaviour shift that positively impacts revenue—whether it's trying a new product, increasing frequency, or engaging with a new feature—they receive an immediate and relevant reward or message. This approach is timely, meaningful, and far more effective in driving engagement.



How can brands use behavioural insights to inform their loyalty strategies?

Again, I'd say personalised content. Couple with the right effective multi-channel communication tactics, they provide a foundation which drives engagement in loyalty programmes. We've covered this but it bears repeating because it's absolutely fundamental. When you understand individual patterns, you can create journeys that feel tailor-

We've also seen great success for brands that tap into customers' competitive instincts with gamification. Create the right challenges and milestones, and suddenly you've got customers actively engaging with your programme because they want to, not because they have to. In a similar vein, emotional triggers have allowed brands to build programmes around experiences or causes that customers genuinely care about. That's when loyalty becomes something more than just transactions. It becomes a relationship.

One of the most important (and powerful) tools in our arsenal is leveraging client data to indicate churn prediction. Spot signs of disengagement early and we can step in with targeted interventions before it's too late. It's always easier to keep a customer than win them back.

Lastly - but certainly not least - brand advocates. When you know who these people are - your frequent buyers, high spenders, and regular offer redeemers, you're onto your golden customers. Brands should treat them accordingly. They're the ones most likely to promote your business to others. By behaving that way, they essentially become a part of your business so it's best to bring all the stops out in your strategies. I'm talking exclusive early access to new features, VIP events, premium support channels, double points periods, surprise-and-delight rewards, and first dibs on limited-time partner offers.

How can brand to brand partnerships deliver more personalised loyalty experiences?

The key isn't about offering more choices but the right choices. When brands work together strategically, they gain a deeper understanding of their customers' behaviours, preferences, and needs. This allows them to craft rewards and experiences that feel tailored, relevant, and naturally integrated into a customer's lifestyle.

For example, if a brand knows its customers are prioritising sustainability, partnering with an eco-friendly retailer can make rewards feel highly personal and value-driven. But these partnerships can go beyond just offering aligned rewards—they can create richer experiences. An example might be a fitness brand teaming up with a meal subscription service, not just to cross-promote products but to offer an integrated wellness journey where workouts and nutrition rewards are seamlessly linked.

Done right, brand partnerships don't just enhance personalisation—they amplify loyalty itself, making every interaction feel more considered, more relevant, and more rewarding.



Why do some brands struggle to achieve meaningful personalisation despite having access to customer data?

The biggest issue for most businesses we speak to is actually inconsistent data integration. They've got their loyalty programme data sitting in one place, customer data in another, and they're not talking to each other. It's like having all the puzzle pieces but not putting them together.

Then there's the misalignment of rewards. Some brands get so caught up in what they think customers want, they forget to check what customers actually value. You need to let the data guide your decisions here.

What innovations in personalised loyalty are we likely to see in 2025

Al-driven hyper-personalisation is going to continue to be a hot topic. The advanced AI models we're developing now can deliver truly tailored offers in real time. Predictive loyalty programmes pave the way for proactive rewards, culminating into a perpetual engagement cycle. However, with the privilege of accessing such deep customer insights comes the responsibility to use them ethically and transparently. Loyalty should feel enhancing, not intrusive, and brands must ensure that personalisation serves the customer's best interests.

Loyalty Partnerships are also going to evolve in fascinating ways. We're seeing brands get much more sophisticated about how they use partnerships to deliver value and drive engagement for retention.

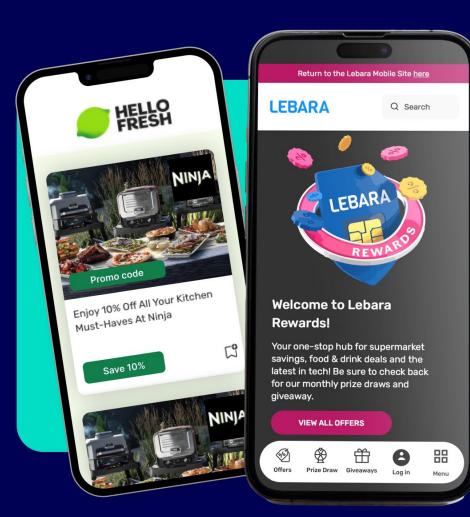
