"Most teachers I know hate the idea of not including all students, or making a student feel as though they are not welcomed. think when we first heard Dr. Jeffries, I was hoping, like many teachers, to better understand how we can meet each of our students' needs. On one occasion he presented the desire for Americans, in our history, to find ways to stop the Black vote from mattering. I was concerned with his claim that the riots on Capitol Hill were due to the fact that White Americans did not want the Black vote to matter. This is contradictory to reports that the riot was due to a belief that the counting of votes was rigged and some illegal processes had occurred. What further bothered me was that he did not present real proof for this reasoning. I believe we need to do what is best for our students and in order to do this we need to gain more knowledge, however, this is best if we learn from multiple perspectives, NOT just on! I know after that presentation, several colleagues were uncomfortable with the presentation, but were afraid to say anything out of fear."

"I thought Jeffries had some good insights and experiences to share. However, I was concerned that he believes that racism should be taught across all subject areas, across all grades. I'm concerned that this constant focus on racism will do nothing to bring our students together. I am all for diversity, inclusion, and making sure students see themselves in books and in lessons, but if we are moving to a place where racism is being brought into every class, in all grades, I'm afraid it will only drive students apart and create a victim/sympathizer mentality. We seem to be moving away from the positive contributions and successes of the Black community, stories that inspire and lift up. I am also highly concerned by this quote: "It is especially important to reassure parents, especially white parents, that this isn't about shaming white children, blaming them for something they had no part in. They aren't responsible for what happened in the past or events today. But they are in fact responsible for cleaning up the mess we have made. They are responsible for tomorrow." This is not a problem for white children only. Racism and bullying spans across all races and we must teach all of our children to do their part to find ways to bring healing to our communities."

"When I was at Hyatts (MS) I remember a student teacher who was telling us that **communism can be a great thing** and that dictators like Stalin and Mao Zedong had the right ideas but just didn't execute them right."

"Social studies teacher showed kids this Marxist video. It was during world history lesson on the industrial revolution. Of course there was no alternate video shown about capitalism. ## Parent Testimonials

"This past February my son's 6th grade English class was learning simple writing composition. The example provided by their teacher was age appropriate for 11 year old students and easy to understand. But, **my son along with several others were assigned the topic, "Social Justice"** a bit more complicated subject. My son was quarantined at home so I stepped in to help him. The article from Newsela, highlighted violence by police and others against Black Americans. **The article stated that a white police officer from Kenosha, Wisconsin shot an unarmed Black man, Jacob Blake.** The article was factually incorrect and out of date. Jacob Blake admitted to being armed with a knife and resisting arrest. The prosecuting attorney on the case released the officer of any wrong doing. The article was also very opinionated with one quote stating, "And to the police: get some education and read your Bibles." I contacted the teacher to find out why an outdated incorrect source would be provided to our students and her response was that they use newsela and the articles are not always up to date. She did not replace the article for the class but told me that my student could choose an article of his liking. She continued to use the outdated, incorrect and terribly biased article to teach writing structure to her students. I shared the article with our Superintendent and our Director of Curriculum and they simply stated that teachers are permitted to select their own teaching materials."

Thousands continue cry for social justice during March on Washington anniversary By Associated Press, adapted by Newsela staff on 00.01.20

Following a week of protests and outrage over the police shooting of an unarmed Black man in Wisconsin, civil rights advocates in Washington, D.C. highlighted the violence by police and others against Black Americans. The event honored the 1963 March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom.

Thousands gathered August 28 near the steps of the Lincoln Memorial. It was there that the Reverend Martin Leibre King, Jr., edivered his historic "I Have A Dream" address, a vision of neial equality that remains elusive for millions of Americans.

ifty-seven years later, marchers gathered after another shooting by a white police officer of an unarmed Black man. This time, 29-year-old Jacob Blake was shot in Kenosha, Wisconsin, on August 23, sparking days of protests and violence. "I want to give apase for Black people in the crowd to say they are not OK," dumnane Wulliams said to the crowd. He works in New York Ory's government. "We are like the nameles grandmothers who got in the streets and said, "We will make you live up to what America says she is," Williams said. "We are here. We're not going anywhere." Activists Continue Their Grandparents Work

Activist Frank Nitty said he walked 750 miles for 24 days from Milwaukee, Wisconsin, to Washington for the march. He spoke about being persistent in the fight for justice.

"Are y'all tired? Because I'm tired," Nitty said. "They think this is a negotiation, but I came here to demand change. My grandson ain't gonna march for the same thines that nw granddaddy marched for."

March attendee Jerome Butler, 33 years old, of Washington echoed Nitty's thoughts. "My hope is that my son doesn't have to be out here in another 50 years protesting the same

Many marchers showed up wearing T-shirts with the image and words of the late congressman John Lewis. Before his death in July, Lewis was the last living speaker from the original March on Washington. That became one of the most fimous political allies in U.S. history. It was one of the largest gatherings at the nation's capital, with over 200,000 people calling for social change.

#### Demands Include Changes In How Police Do Their Jobs

At this year's march, Martin Luther King III, a son of the late civil rights icon, spoke along with the Reverend Al Sharpton. Sharpton's civil rights organization, the National Action Network, planned the event. They talked about the urgent need for policing reforms. They also called for condemning racial violence and demanding voting protections before the November general election.

"We've come to bear witness, to remain awake, to remember from where we've come and to carefully consider where we're going," King said. He thanked the people attending or watching on TV for joining them for the March on Washington.

"We're taking a step forward on America's rocky but righteous journey toward justice," he said.

"We didn't just come out here to have a show," Sharpton said. "Demonstration without legislation will not lead to change."

Sharpton assembled the families of an ever-expanding roll call of victims. Among them are Blake, George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Rayshard Brooks, Ahmaud Arbery, Trayvon Martin and Eric Garner.

Arbery and Martin were killed by white men with guns.

Similar Protests Are Held In Other States

#### In addition to Washington's march, the National Action Network organized events in other states. Robbie Williams, 67 years old, traveled to the march from Covington, Kentucky, and said

attending was her way of "speaking to my children and my people."

My message to my children is to stand up no matter what. And to the police: get some education and read your Bibles," Williams said. She added that she also wants Black communities to confront internal violence and unfair treatment of people who are gay.

#### Sharpton Also Seeks New Federal Laws

Sharpton also called for people to march on their U.S. senators' offices and demand their support of federal policing reforms. He said protesters should also demand better U.S. voter protections.

In June, the Democrat-controlled House of Representatives passed the George Floyd Justice In Policing Act. It would ban police use of stranglehold maneuvers and bring other reforms. Floyd, an unarmed Black man, died May 25 after a white police officer in Minnesota held his knee to Floyd's neck for nearly nine minutes, sparking weeks of protests across the country.

In July, following Lewisi death, Democratic senators reintroduced legislation that would restore a provision of the Voting Rights Act of 1965. That law was gutted by the U.S. Supreme Court in 2013. The law previously required states with a history of voter suppression to seek federal approval before changing voting regulations. Voter suppression includes efforts to keep people from voting, such as closing polls in certain neighborhoods.

Both measures are awaiting action in the Republican-controlled Senate. - old
