

SARDIS PARK - A NEW MASTER PLANNED COMMUNITY FOR HALL COUNTY

4363 SARDIS ROAD, GAINESVILLE, GA 30506

February 2, 2024

- DLBP LLC is representing leading Grace of Georgia Developments LLC (the applicant) in petitioning to rezone 4363 Sardis Road (to be known as Sardis Park) from AR-III to PRD.
- 2. Sardis Park will be a master planned community to reach the demographic need of the Hall County community. Sardis Park will deliver 110 high-quality detached single-family homes set with a landscaped environment. Following the Planning Commission's consideration of the application on January 16, 2024, we have:
 - reduced the number of proposed lots from 125 to 110, reducing the density to 2.63 units per acre (Appendix 1 to this document is the amended site plan);
 - increased the lot size to a minimum of 8,000 square feet and increased lot widths;
 - sought additional input from a landscape specialist to produce further details of the landscape plan and strategy for the new community (Appendix 2 is the landscape plan);
 - prepared a tree screening packet (Appendix 3) to illustrate how the trees will serve as a visually effective buffer to shield the neighbors from Sardis Park; and
 - undertaken further analysis to confirm the likely number of children that will live in the new community and sought confirmation from the local schools that they have capacity to accommodate the demand that will be created.
- 3. This statement sets out further analysis that demonstrates that the application for rezoning can be supported. We hope that these points, along with the amendments to the proposal, and the further information to be submitted will kindly be considered by the Board of Commissioners at their meeting on February 22.

DENSITY, LANDSCAPING AND OPEN SPACE

- 4. We have reduced the number of proposed lots from 125 to 110, reducing the density to 2.63 units per acre. Lot sizes have increased to a minimum of 8,000 square feet to conform to all PRD requirements.
- 5. The master plan allows for 110 new homes on the property because it is proposed to be connected to an extended sewer (further details are below). Without this, on-site septic would be required which is worse for the environment. The cost of providing the extended sewer connection requires a higher number of new homes but, importantly, the minimum 8,000 square foot lot sizes will enable a better landscaping setting.
- 6. Specialist input has been provided by Kimley-Horn to prepare an additional plan to demonstrate the principles of the landscape and open space strategy. Further information is being prepared to be presented at the Board of Commissioners meeting. The key principles of the landscaping and open strategy are:
 - tree lined streets:
 - 50 evergreen buffer;
 - 3,894 linear feet (0.74 miles) of rural walking trails;
 - children's equipped play area;
 - outdoor exercise equipment; and
 - biodiversity enhancements such as native and species-rich planting.
- 7. The landscaping and open space will both quantitively and qualitatively provide a high-quality environment for the future residents, giving them access to on-site amenities and the opportunity for existing neighbors to use as well.
- 8. A concept master tree plan and a concept landscape master plan has also been produced to illustrate the landscape treatments for the open space, buffers, parks, and entry points.
- 9. A tree screening packet is provided that illustrates how evergreen and deciduous trees will naturally serve as a buffer that shields the surrounding community from the master planned community. An illustrative rendering and example imagery from current communities is included. Current trees and added trees will be utilized to ensure the effectiveness of the veil. Sardis Park will not negatively affect the community, but rather serve as an asset by utilizing nature-based design to protect both the privacy of the neighbors and the Sardis Park community.

PRECEDENT AND QUALITY

- 10. The proposal to develop the land at Sardis Road is bespoke and not easily replicated. This is because the design of the master plan has been informed by the particular characteristics of the site and the developer's approach.
- II. Firstly, Sardis Park will be served by an extended sewer via force main from the City of Gainesville. The cost of providing this infrastructure will be borne solely by the developer, and once operational the sewer will be transferred to the city as a public utility. Other properties will not be able to connect to the sewer because a force main is a high pressure closed system, which cannot accept intermediate connections unless designed to from the outset (which ours is not).
- 12. The bespoke nature of the master plan along with the architectural quality and enhanced landscaping, open space and environmental benefits will mean that the development will not be easily replicated by subdivisions on the surrounding properties.
- 13. However, we firmly believe that the quality of the new homes and their setting will result in an exemplar development that, as the new Comprehensive Plan is prepared, will 'raise the bar' for the design of new homes in the County.

EDUCATION CAPACITY

- 14. An analysis has also been conducted on the number of persons under 18 that Sardis Park would establish. Sourcing data from the United States Census Bureau into a formula, Sardis Park would 'yield' approximately 85 children under 18 when the development is fully built out.
- 15. It is clearly the case that with only approximately 20-25 children from the new community attending each of the elementary, middle and high schools (with no under 5s attending school of course), that there will be no harmful impact as the local schools can easily accommodate these numbers. This position has already been confirmed to us by Sardis Elementary School. It has a maximum capacity of 750 students and there are just 550 enrolled in the current academic year, and so it has a supply of 200 spaces. Therefore, Sardis Elementary is 200 students under maximum capacity some 26% of its capacity is not being used. So rather than being a burden, in fact the development of Sardis Park will be a boost to the school system, ensuring that the schools are being used efficiently and the new children contributing to the local community.

LEGAL CONTEXT AND OVERALL ACCORDANCE WITH THE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

16. Georgia state law requires rezoning decisions based on <u>all</u> aspects of the Comprehensive Plan and the Standards from the Zoning Law of Georgia. Sardis Park follows:

- Development Pattern and Resource Conservation standards within the Hall County Comprehensive Plan; and
- The History: Code 1981, § 36-67-2, enacted by Ga. L. 1985, p. 1178, § 1. § 36-67-3. within the Georgia zoning proposal review standards:

"In any local government which has established a planning department or other similar agency charged with the duty of reviewing zoning proposals, such planning department or other agency shall with respect to each of the matters enumerated in the Code section...with which the planning department or agency shall be required to make such investigation and recommendation shall be:

- i. Whether the zoning proposal will permit a use that is suitable in view of the use and development of adjacent and nearby property. Sardis Park satisfies the spirit and intent for a rural open space concept, as previously mentioned, due to the open space and tree protection and additions, the well-designed buffers, and the high-quality and rural feel of the proposed layout.
- ii. Whether the zoning proposal will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent and nearby property. The zoning proposal will not adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent and nearby property. Existing neighbors will still enjoy their homes and way of life, while having a well-buffered new neighborhood of finely crafted homes and amenities that will increase property values for all.
- iii. Whether the property to be affected by the zoning proposal has a reasonable economic use as currently zoned. The current zoning of AR-III has served little purpose recently, not being farmed or used for any agricultural purposes. The property is simply not large enough for large scale commercial agriculture uses, and those uses would involve noisy equipment, noxious odors, the use of large farm machinery in and out of the property, and other farming protocol requirements that would be more disturbing to neighbors, than a quiet, upscale residential neighborhood.
- iv. Whether the zoning proposal will result in a use which will or could cause an excessive or burdensome use of streets, transportation facilities, utilities, or schools. As referenced in sections 14-16 and provided in the traffic impact study, the proposed development will produce minimal impacts.
- v. If the local government has an adopted land use plan, whether the zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and <u>intent</u> of the land use plan. As aforementioned.
- vi. Whether there are other existing or changing conditions affecting the use and development of the property which give supporting grounds for either approval or disapproval of the zoning proposal." This relates to the growing population within Hall County.
 - 17. The goal for Hall County's Vision 2030 is to preserve the green space in Hall County and promote a "culture of wellness" within Hall County, as referenced in sections 10 and 12.

- 18. To reiterate, it is wholly appropriate for the Board of Commissions to approve a rezoning even after the planning staff and Planning Commission recommend denial, as is demonstrated in the rezoning case ZON2021-00039.
- 19. Sardis Park provides a sustainable development that appreciates privacy, rural characteristics, and exceeds the high-quality standards of Hall County, while catering towards a housing need for a growing population, as is evident via the Atlanta Regional Commission's projections and as stated in Hall County's Comprehensive Plan. As referenced in the Hall Chamber of Commerce's meeting on January 30, 2024, Hall County has the workforce, but not a place to live or "a place they [the Hall County community] want to live."
- 20. Based on the above reasoning, we request respectfully the approval of the rezoning of 4363 Sardis Rd, Gainesville, GA 30506 from AR-III to PRD.

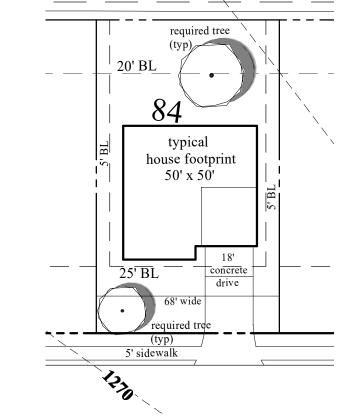

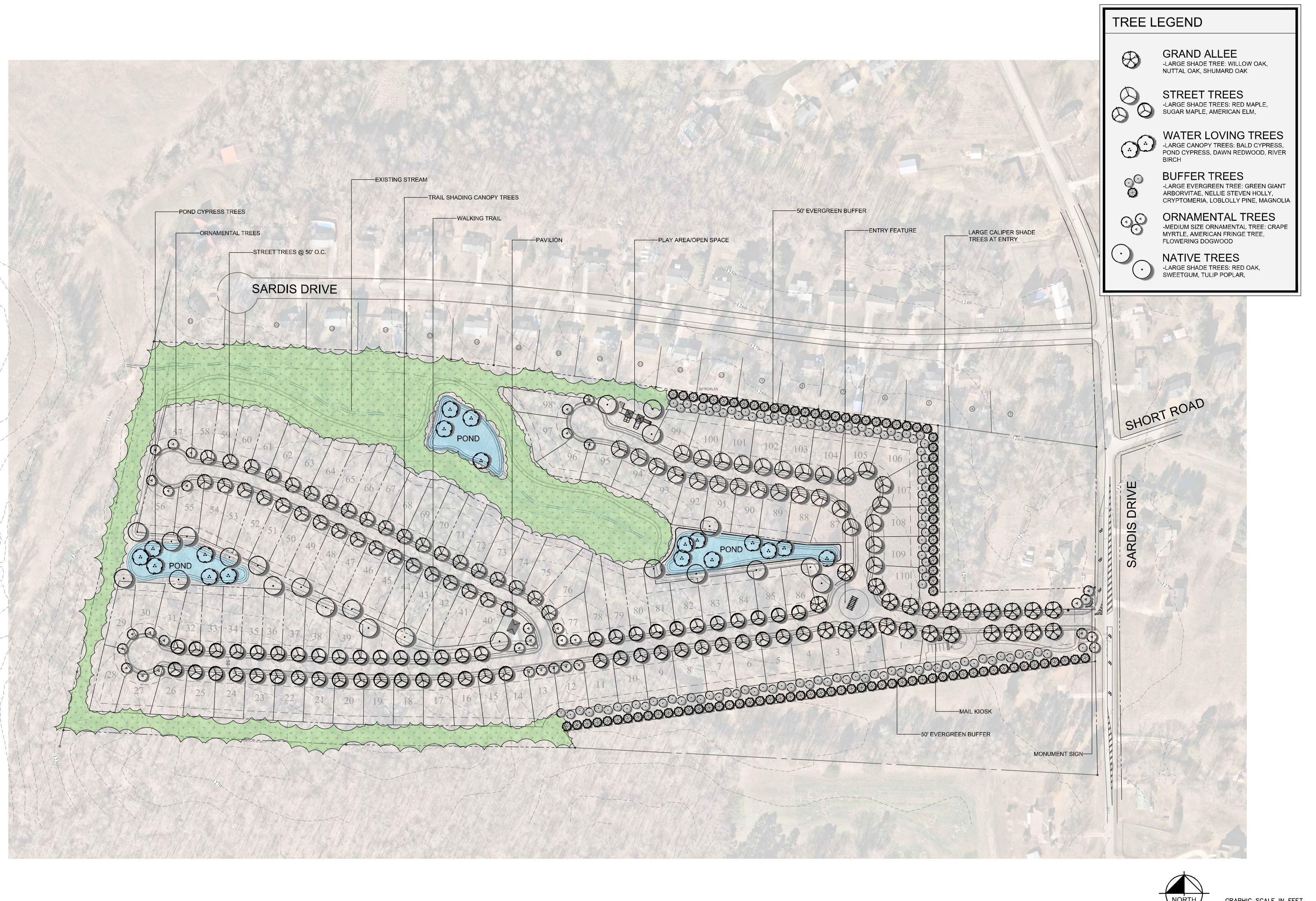


Typical Lot not to scale

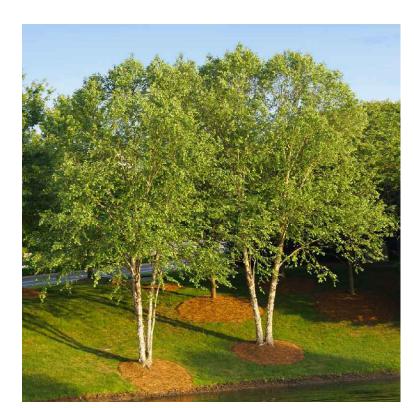

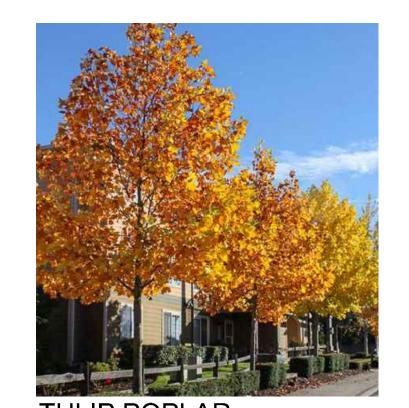
