Hi Randi.

I spoke with Kathy Cooper, our district Commissioner, about this proposed Guth development and the process for our subdivision to provide our concerns about this proposed development. Kathy directed me to you to document our concerns and to describe the process for how we can present our concerns at the Planning Commission meeting tomorrow evening Oct 16. As the subdivision immediately adjacent to the proposed new subdivision, our concerns should be presented and considered by the Planning Commission.

Is there a list of presenters that we need to be added to for tomorrow's meeting?

Below I have documented and summarized the concerns provided by all of the homeowners in the Elah Valley subdivision that are unanimously against this proposed subdivision. Please provide these concerns to the Planning Commssion to review as part of their research about this proposed development.

I have copied Jim Graff from our subdivision who was appointed to represent the Elah Valley subdivision at the Planning Commission meeting tomorrow evening.

Response from the Elah Valley Subdivision against the proposed Guth Development – 324 homes on 117 acres

• Application to rezone the property from AR-111 to PRD for the purpose of building the proposed new subdivision.

This proposal should be denied. This development will be immediately adjacent to the Elah Valley subdivision, so it has a direct impact to our homeowners.

It is difficult to understand why such a development would even be proposed to the Hall County Planning Commission and the Board of Commissioners. This proposed development does not meet the Hall County comprehensive land use and development policies. It appears that the developer has a strategy to present such a development because they believe that the Planning Commission will not enforce the existing land use policies, or that by presenting this obvious out-of-line development, they can negotiate a revised development that still exceeds the current land use policies. This proposal should be denied.

This subdivision violates the Hall County Comprehensive Land Use Plan for this area.

The Hall County Comprehensive Land Use plan for our area is moderate density - 2 homes per acre. The current subdivision plan has 1.99 homes per acre for the free standing homes and over 8 homes per acre for the 129 town homes. The average taken in total is .36 acres per home lot. At 8 homes per acre the townhomes drastically violate the land use plan for this area. The 1.99 homes per acre for the free standing home lots is not an accurate portrayal of the lot size for free standing homes. The lot size for the free standing homes is much less than ½ acre. Flood plan areas, steep non buildable areas, retention ponds, and common areas are added to the total of actual lot sizes in order to build up to the 1.99 homes per acre metric computation. This development clearly does not meet the land use standards for this area. Why develop and document a land use plan if the county does not enforce it?

This proposed subdivision is not consistent with current and future land use for this area and is counter to the quality of life for current and future homeowners for this area.

As a subdivision itself, the Elah Vally homeowners are not against new subdivisions. We gladly share the ambiance and quality of life that we enjoy in this area. As this area continues to grow, the current homeowners and future homeowners make decision to move to this area specifically because of the nature of the area and the lower density of the homes.

We have already had recent subdivisions developed in this area: Grand View Estates and Quailwood. These subdivisions complement and align with the quality of life that attract people to this area. Allowing such a dense subdivision would be a negative contrast to the rest of the homes in the area, detracts from the quality of life of this area and is counter to the reason so many new people have moved to this area. It would also cause harm to the existing homeowners depressing the value of many homes – especially those adjacent to the proposed development, impacting recent homeowners and long time homeowners who bought into this area based on the nature of the area. There are other areas in Hall County that allow higher density subdivisions and the proposed subdivision should be reposition to those areas. This subdivision does not fit this area at all.

Guth Development - Additional water run-off into Mulberry Creek - Increased risk of flooding.

This issue, if not properly addressed, would have this new subdivision cause harm to existing homes in the area – specifically Elah Valley subdivision homes. A new subdivision development should not cause harm to existing homeowners. Any new proposed subdivision should not be allowed any additional rainwater run-off into the Mulberry Creek. Due to growing rainwater runoff from new developments, Elah Valley had to replace both bridges in our subdivision at a cost well over \$100,000. If additional run-off was allowed, we would incur damage to our bridges and roads. The DNR evaluation of increased risk of flooding only looks at issues that impact the stream bed and not necessarily the man-made structures such as our subdivision road bridges. I have attached pictures of the past flooding over our road and bridges.

Thank you for your consideration of our concerns about the proposed Guth Development.

We respectfully request that this application be denied.

Re: Proposed Rezoning to allow a development of 324 homes on J. M. Turk Road.

When I moved to J. M. Turk Road in 2003, it was a two-lane road filled with pastures of cattle and horses. The road was only paved from Martin Road to the 4700 block, where there is a sharp right turn leading to multiple hairpin turns, ending at Cash Road. When the road paving was completed, development began, including the Jehovah Witness Kingdom Hall, Grandview Estates, Mulberry Creek Community Center, The Farmhouse Wedding Venue, Mulberry Springs Vineyard & Winery and more single family homes. With regard to Grandview Estates, familes with cattle sold them to avoid the liability of familes living just over the fence from their herds.

Mulberry Creek Community Center offers a wide range of exercise programs, a children's playground and dog park. It is also a Hall County Voting location. It stays extremely busy, especially some evenings and weekends. At times, their parking lot is filled to capacity and cars are parked on both sides of the road out front. If each of the 324 proposed, high density homes has just a minimum of two cars, that would be nearly 650 additional cars traveling this narrow, two-lane road every day. According to the Hall County Sheriff's Office, there have already been 12 traffic crashes on the road since January of 2023.

There are facts about Mulberry Creek that should be noted. Water runoff from all properties on the road spills into the creek and flows downstream toward Cash Road. At times, the creek is partially dry and only a small amount of water flows downstream. However, in heavy rains, water runoff flows like a torrent, through our Elah Valley Subdivision, passing under our two bridges. It brings with it large logs and other debris, causing damage and erosion. In recent years, we have had to replace both bridges at a homeowners cost close to \$100,000. As the amount of water peaks, water flows over the bridges, making it risky to drive through it to access our homes. A car could easily be swept into the creek. Also, since both sides of the creek are eroding, multiple trees have fallen across the creek, creating a hazard for our children and animals. Additional water runoff from the proposed 324 homes would have a devastating effect on our subdivision, and, perhaps, other properties south of us.

Hopefully, this additional information will be helpful to you in making your rezoning decision.

As a homeowner, I again want to thank you and your firm for providing opportunities for community members to voice concerns regarding the proposed rezoning and housing development adjacent to JM Turk Road, Flowery Branch, Georgia.

As I previously shared with you, I am confident that you will accurately relay to your client the many concerns that were resolutely expressed during the December 18th, meeting at the Mulberry Creek Community Center. Below is a summary of those concerns and potential sequelae articulated by individuals and families whose properties proximate to this high-density housing development.

Concerns are as follows:

- Devaluation of surrounding properties as proposed town-, traditional, and estate homes are not at all comparable in value.
- Marked degeneration of quality of life due to:
 - Congestion related to increased traffic estimated at an additional >600 cars on a currently designated, sub-standard county road.
 - Threats to personal safety due to potential for increased vehicular crashes and pedestrian injuries and/or death.
 - o Irreparable ecological disruption due to radical change in topography resulting in destruction of current, fragile ecosystems.
 - o Potential demographic shifts previously seen as a pattern due to the transient population affiliated with similar developments.
- Substantial increase in housing density when compared to surrounding communities that are located on notably larger lots when compared to the proposed 2.6 homes per acre.
- Inadequate access for emergency vehicles endangering the well-being and safety of inhabitants while potentially exposing the county to liability.
- Due to heightened risk of erosion and run-off resulting from proposed development, the integrity and structure of current bridges would be threatened. Residents are adamant about this potential threat as bridges in the area were recently re-constructed at a significant cost.
- Overcrowding of currently maximized schools and inability to accommodate anticipated expansion of student influx.

As was clearly evident from community feedback, opinions and perspectives are deeply entrenched that this development would inflict degradation, harm, and risk.

As a resident of Quailwood subdivision, and in agreement with the majority in our community, I am writing to register strong opposition to the HZON23-0041 - rezoning for a Single-Family Subdivision located on the east side of JM Turk Road intersection with Guth and Stanley Roads. We understand the need for affordable housing in our city, however, we believe that this high-density development would have a detrimental impact on our community and the surrounding communities.

We believe that the lot size, home size, and location of this residential development may negatively result in economic, environmental, and social impacts on Quailwood, Grandview Estates, Martin Crossing, Laurel Oaks, and countless stand-alone homes along Martin, JM Turk, and Stanley Roads. We think these communities

would be better served alongside new residential homes and developments that a comparable in price, lot size, and home size.

The type and square footage of these proposed single-family residences and townhomes might drastically alter the aesthetic of our area, replacing the existing greenery and open spaces with a high-density housing complex. A development of this magnitude may also reduce environmental amenities causing significant environmental damage, destroying and displacing natural wildlife habitats, and increasing wildlife migration into residential communities.

We also think the proposed high-density development might be too large for this area. The increase in population density may place a strain on the existing infrastructure, possibly leading to increased traffic, congestion, pollution, road safety issues, and stress on our public & local services. High-density developments, like this one, may be better suited in areas where the infrastructure, schools, and public and local services can effectively support population growth.

Additionally, this development may harm property values in and around the surrounding areas. The influx of 300+ moderate-priced homes could lead to an increase in crime rate, diminution of property values, and generate lower home prices, making it difficult for current residents to sell their homes and move elsewhere.

On the other hand, given the desirability of our neighborhood and surrounding communities, this development may garner large profit margins for their stakeholders.

For years, South Hall has been growing at an all-time high. Rezoning and open lots have been filled with apartments, townhomes, and warehouses which impact the existing road network and public infrastructure. In our immediate area, we have personally experienced massive growth (as listed below) without enough infrastructure upgrades. We have experienced various tax increases, as shown in the substantial increases in property assessment taxes, without the new economic growth shouldering their share of the tax burden.

Dear planning Commission,

Our family has lived on this property since 1963 and have seen a lot of changes as the county has grown. My mother-in-law's father, Buddy Martin owned the property much earlier than this and provided a place for his family to live. It is now time to sell; my mother-in-law is now in her 80's and the property is too much for her to maintain anymore. Her husband passed a little over seven years ago and she now lives alone. The house is deteriorating, and very costly to maintain on her low fixed income. The house is just too large for one elderly person to maintain. After serving over 30 years in the military my wife and I will no longer move back either. Therefore, we made a family decision about three years ago to put the property up for sale. This would provide her with financial security and the ability to purchase or rent a smaller place that is maintained by a management company.

If anyone opposes this rezoning, I would like to point out a few facts:

Before Grandview subdivision was built, we were approached, and my family was unable to purchase the property. We understood at the time growth and development in our area was booming. We were approached at this time as well and offered a really good offer for our lands. We declined and understood change was inevitable and watched the development happen. If Grandview subdivision opposes the rezoning, Grandview had the same opportunity to purchase our property if they choose and they did not. When they developed the subdivision and traffic increased on the road just above us, we dealt with it.

We had the chance to purchase the property that Quailwood subdivision now sits on before the subdivision was built so we would not have to view all the houses from our property. However, we could not and did not purchase the property. We now see all the houses if we walk the back half of our properties. If the neighborhood behind us, (Quailwood) opposes this rezoning they could have purchased our property when it was on the market. This is the same subdivision that did not like the traffic on Martin Rd. When the county developed a plan to help with the traffic, this subdivision opposed the county's plan. The county changed the plan from additional lanes and instead added, a roundabout and some stop signs. If traffic comes up as a reason, they should not have fought with the county's plan and instead did what the county planned. Also, the additional exit has opened on Interstate 985 and this is where most of the traffic will transit anyway. Martin Rd will not see the traffic they were not worried about years ago.

A few years back the eleven plus acres that sits almost in the middle of our property went up for sale. Jerry Phillips, the owner at that time asked if we wanted to buy it. However, with the passing of my father-in-law a few years earlier we were not financially able too. Again, we understood the potential it might be developed and nothing we could do about it. Before putting our property up on the

market, we approached the new owners and provided them with the opportunity to purchase our property. However, they chose not too as well.

The other property owner that adjoins ours, owned by Mark Faul, approached us when the property was put on the market. However, he only wanted the property on the left side of Stanley Rd. This is the most desirable part of our property. He only offered enough to pay for the land, which did not take into account the valve of my mother-laws primary recidence. He has sense built a winery business directly behind us and therefore really has no standing.

To address the concern about number of residents per acre that I read in the paper. The extremely large apartment complex at the corner of Martin Rd and Atlanta Hwy well exceeds the number of units per acre and they are still building more.

In closing, we have lived at this location for over 60 years. We were here before any of the residents above that might oppose this rezoning. It is our right to sale our property, any of them could have purchased the property before we went under contract with the developer. My mother-in law should not be concerned she will not have enough money to support herself, deal with the difficulties of maintaining a house that is over sixty years old and become a burden on the family. Thank you for your time and consideration.

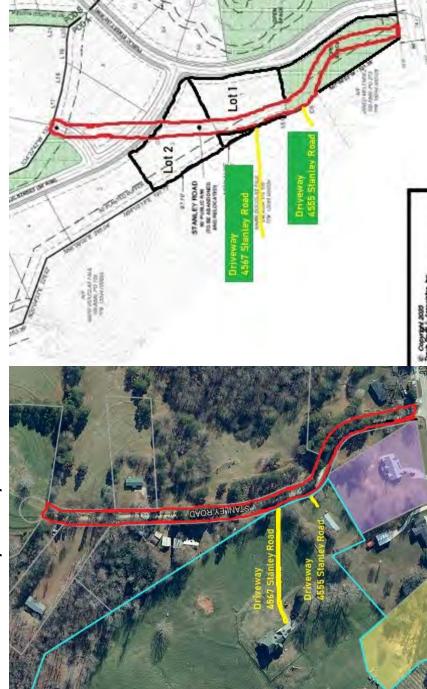

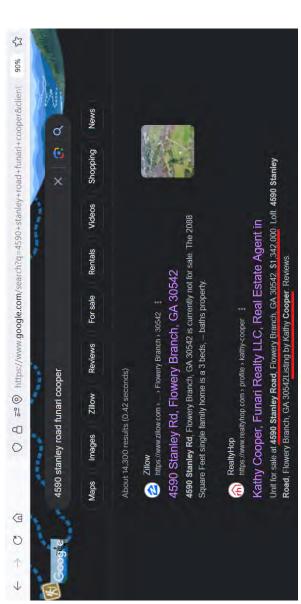

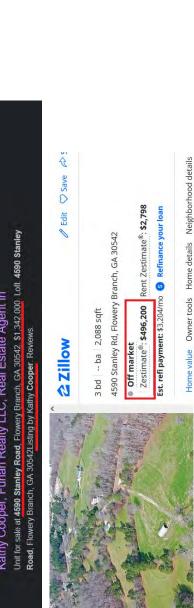

This letter is in regard to my opposition to the proposed 324 lot development on Stanley Road in Flowery Branch GA. The proposed development harms the local property owners and the community. I am strongly opposed to this development for the following reasons:

- 1. The proposed plan landlocks my property from Stanley Road. The developers want to move Stanley Road and put houses in from of my driveway, thus, blocking me from my personal residence (4567 Stanley Road) and my Barn (4555 Stanley Road). I found out about this only by reviewing the proposal. I have sought legal counsel and confirmed that landlocking is illegal and I would have a legal case against the anyone involved in depriving me access, or damaging the appearance to my property. Please see attached letter.
- 2. It is unethical for a County Commissioner to be a Real Estate Agent on this matter. Various actions, such as talking the landowner out of an attempt to purchase the property is unethical. Please see the presentation for additional details.
- 3. Large portions of this property have steep topography. There are 4 large detention ponds that would fill up very quickly and drain very slowly. This would create a mosquito haven for the area. Given the exemptions for personal residences in the water detention calculations, the water not be properly captured and will cause flooding downstream and mosquitos, which is a direct threat winery business located nearby and to all of the surrounding residents. The increase in mosquito population will introduce mosquito vector based diseases such as (West Nile Virus and the Zika Virus).
- 4. The proposed lot density exceeds what is reasonable for the area and what is legally permissible. There is no known local sewer access. Tractors run on these roads! Hall County's largest vineyard is about 400 feet from Stanley Road.
- 5. This area is a breeding area for the Barred Owl. We hear them almost every night. This friendly form of wildlife helps maintain the rodent population. If the proposal goes through, it will ruin the natural habitat for the Barred Owl and the quality of life will suffer.
- 6. The Traffic Analysis is deeply flawed. It is not a representative sample of traffic, as it includes counts from a one-day total. Also, the traffic increase will be on Stanley Road (estimated 300-1,200 fold). Stanley Road was not included in the analysis.
- 7. The proposed development is not consistent with existing growth plans for Hall County.
- 8. The proposed development has one way in and one way out. This is very dangerous for high density housing. An "emergency exit" is someone's driveway that is an unrecorded "handshake" easement in Hall County.

Unfortunately, the proposed subdivision and rezoning request on Stanley Road in Flowery Branch GA will directly hurt winery operations and may result in the closure of the winery. 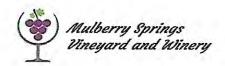

This request is overly aggressive and is asking to put 324 homes on 117 acres, and will negatively impact the Mulberry Springs Vineyard and Winery in numerous ways. We encourage you to deny the rezoning request of PRD from AR-3 Stanley Road for the following reasons:

The plan Landlocks Winery Operations at 4555 Stanley Road. The proposal, if approved, moves Stanley Road and landlocks property at 4555 Stanley Road where some winery operations occur (image 2). Implementation of this plan will severely damage the winery operations. Stanley Road is currently a small gravel road that handles farm equipment to allow winery trucks and machine access. If not landlocked a reconfigured Stanley Road will have farm equipment competing with subdivision traffic of about 1,000 cars (image 3).

Views of Mulberry Springs are amazing – rezoning will destroy the views. People come to the winery to relax and get something they can't get at home, which is beautiful vistas and peacefulness.



The winery location was specifically chosen for its views and the limited growth possibility on Stanley Road due to its odd triangular shape the impossibility of building houses on the Road, given setback rules. However, the proposed plan is to move Stanley Road and will allow many houses to be seen from the winery. This will hurt the views of the largest Vineyard in Hall County and help destroy a valuable asset to the community. Further, the State of Georgia has declared Mulberry Springs Vineyard and Winery an official "Georgia Grown Agritourism site". This high-density subdivision proposal is inconsistent the State of Georgia agritourism designation (image 4).

The plan has excessive housing density, beyond allowable rules, which may result in noise complaints. Part of the vineyard lies 400 feet from Stanley Road. The current plan is to move Stanley Road and have houses backup to 4567 Stanley Road, with limited setbacks. Thus, people may hear wine drinkers have conversations and wine drinkers may be bothered by dense subdivision noise. It goes both ways. The excessive density and movement of Stanley Road puts winery operations at risk of receiving noise complaints and diminished winery patronage. Please note, the current AR-3 density is manageable and consistent with the entire rural area and is normal zoning for Wineries throughout the State of Georgia. However, PDR zoning is incompatible with winery operations and is setting up the winery for noise complaints. The decision to allow anything other than AR-3 zoning will severely injure the winery sales.

Retention Ponds will create a breeding ground for mosquitos. Mulberry Springs winery built an underground water detention pond that costs about \$50,000. This was to avoid the mosquito problems in an area where there are outdoor activities. The proposed high-density subdivision has 4 detention above ground detention ponds. These ponds will be a breeding ground for disease (ie, West Nile virus, Zika...) and will likely severely hamper winery operations. If the proposed subdivision is approved, request the detention ponds be placed underground to protect the winery.

Please deny the zoning request. Homes could be built on the existing AR-3 zoning. No one rejects development on the current zoning of AR-3. This proposed plan is grossly overly aggressive and hurts the look and feel of this valued rural area. It will also severely injure the Winery Operations and activities. According to a study done by the University of Georgia, the number one reason people visit wineries to for the views and to connect with nature (Economic Contribution of Georgia Wineries and Vineyards, Prepared by: Kent Wolfe, Sharon P. Kane, and Karen Stubbs, University of Georgia, Center for Agribusiness and Economic Development, Center Report: CR-13-06, dated Sept 13th 2013 https://caed.uga.edu/content/dam/caes-subsite/caed/publications/center-reports/economiccontribution-wineries-georgia.pdf). Specifically, "scenery" is listed as the number 1 reason people go to wineries (table #1.6). Further, in 2013, it was documented that the impact of Georgia Wineries on the State economy was "sectors, along with visitor spending contributes up to \$81.6 million in output, 655.6 jobs throughout the state's economy, and \$4.1 million in state and local tax revenue". It is probably double that now due to the winery growth in the North Georgia Mountains and due to inflation within the last 10 years since the report was written. This very dense subdivision proposal will undoubtedly hurt the winery due to a loss of "scenery". It will severely hamper winery operations and promote future noise complaints all for the purpose maximizing lots of land on a proposed future movement of Stanley Road. Many people like the winery location because it saves them from driving long distances to

visit other wineries. This proposal is so aggressive and inappropriate for a rural area, I have been in communication with my State Representative's office (Representative Derrick McCollum).

For these reasons (harm to an established winery with good community support, hampered winery operations, destruction of valuable scenery, loss of rural area that helps people's well being, increase of noise complaints, possible economic loss to Hall County and an increase in mosquitos) this rezoning request must be denied. Also, the proposal is inconsistent with the Hall County comprehensive Land Use Plan for this area and is counter to the quality of life for current and future homeowners and agri-businesses in the area, I urge the denial of the proposal of moving Stanley road and any rezoning change to an established rural area within Hall County. A non AR-3 zoning request would substantially hurt Mulberry Springs Vineyard and Winery.

This is in regard to the planned 324 living units off of Stanley Road and Guth Road in South Hall County (application HZ023-0041). The public has had a chance to speak on the project and there is strong opposition in the records. Issues like density, traffic, flooding, school capacity, harm to neighboring farms and one business have been raised. The only one person in favor of the project benefits from the pending sale. Approximately 150 people have signed a petition and gone on record in opposition. From the meetings, what has been has not been clearly mentioned are the ethical issues underlying this proposal. The ethical issues are so extreme, that documentation is needed to augment the record. Known ethical issues follow:

Landlocking property: To even suggest this action was illegal and unethical. During the fall of 2023, Hall County government staff reviewed the application and found many objections with the rezoning request and recommended denial to the Hall County Planning Commission; however, the issue of landlocking my personal property was not one of the reasons for the denial recommendation. The applicant's map showed a different configuration of Stanley road, where I had no road access to my properties (4555 and 4567 Stanley Road) and new homes were placed blocking my driveways. Being faced with the threat of not being able to enter my properties, I contacted Hall County about the landlocking issue and they said I can state my case to Hall County Planning Board Commission. This initial answer was insufficient compared to the threat to the greatly diminished value of my personal property due to non-entry. Thus, I hired an attorney to examine the rezoning request with respect to the landlocking issue. Keith Whittiker's letter (an attorney) indicated that I was indeed landlocked and would be eligible for compensatory damages and attorney fees if the rezoning request was approved (enclosure 1). This letter shows the seemingly illegal and unethical actions of Mr. William Deihl. It was provided to Hall County on 16 October 2023 along with a letter of overall opposition to the subdivision that boarders about 1,300 feet of my land. A specific diagram of the landlocking issue is available as of that letter, which is provided as enclosure 2. I recontacted Hall County to ensure that the letter had been forwarded to the applicant for action and the opportunity to change or withdraw their rezoning plans to allow me access to my personal property on 16 October (enclosure 3) and was told that all

concerns were forwarded to the applicant and Mr. William Deihl (email dated 27 October). They had 3-5 weeks to reverse an illegal action and chose not to.

On 21 November 2023, Mr. William Deihl presented the proposed subdivision map showing me being landlocked was presented during this meeting (enclosure 4). No visual change was made on the map. On this landlocking issue, the Chairman of the Planning Commission, Chris Blackwell, questioned why the applicant would submit such a proposal and why Hall County government staff would allow the application to progress to the Planning process.

Mr. William Deihl had ample time (about one month) to change the rezoning presentation map and details but did not. At no time did Mr. William Deihl or anyone from the law firm representing an "unknown client" ever discuss any easements with me. They used the time to barter with Hall County to determine what they could get away with. On 18 December 2023, I asked Mr. William Deihl who the developer was and was told he could not share this due to "attorney client privilege". I did get verbal and written requests to purchase my property. This action may have been designed to scare me into selling. All of this is highly unethical and illegal.

Applicant mismatch on the public meetings on 18 December and 21 December 2023: Unethical switch of law firms results in non-binding actions for the original applicant. Mr. William Deihl, a representative from a new law firm (Smith Gambrell and Russell) was there to talk about the project. Please see enclosure 5. It is noted that the original applicant on the subdivision was from THOMPSON, O'BRIEN, KAPPLER & NASUTI, P.C. which was not the official applicant of the subdivision. This fact suggests the planning commission's requests were not adhered to and the answers to any questions cannot be effectively linked to the official subdivision application in front of Hall County for decision.

Emergency Road on land NOT owned: The applicant attempted to show the design of an emergency access location on a parcel they didn't own or have any current or future rights. This was illegal and highly deceptive. A map of the proposed subdivision shows an emergency access road from Rodge Little's property to join to Guth Road (enclosure 4). The pending sale of Mr. Rodger Littles's property does not include a usable roadway or driveway to Guth Road (enclosure 6). A check of the property records confirmed that the current driveway is actually owned by another property owner and there is no recorded easement for access to Mr. Little's property from Guth road, as shown on the presented map from the applicant. They knew this and were likely deceptive.

<u>Request for 5-7 variances</u>: Depending on which version is being discussed, the applicant asks for at least 5 variances that deviate from Hall County Code and Ordinances. We all have to follow ordinances and laws. Why is it acceptable for an organization who has no commitment to the community be allowed to skirt those rules that everyone else follows? Exceptions to the rules are exceptions, not the norm as stated during the meeting on 21 December 2023. How is granting this many exceptions to laws and ordinances be fair or ethical?

Mr. Deihl incorrectly stated that the proposed subdivision was similar to nearby established subdivisions: The applicant has stated that the proposed subdivision is consistent with subdivisions

with large homes (Grandview, Quail wood and Royal Lakes). As noted during the planning group, a Commissioner said this was not true. Some of the proposed homes are 1/4th the size of the stated comparable subdivisions. None are size comparable. This was dishonest or grossly misinformed.

Implied growth inconsistent with the area: It is unethical to have extreme growth inconsistent within the area. People purchase their homes with an expectation of future development around them, but that development should be consistent with the area. Hall county has an obligation to not harm people's property value by putting townhomes near large acreage tracks. To approve this project as presented, it would be injudicious to the surrounding residents. For example, Mr. Eric Conoly, who lives on 11 acres will be faced with 22 homes surrounding his 11 acre property. For my property, Stanley Road currently has about 10 cars on the road today, that is anticipated to increase to about 2,500 cars at mostly daylight hours. That is hundreds of cars an hour during the day compared to 10 cars a day on Stanley Road. This type of congestion is not typical for the area and is inconsistent with the buyer's original expectation of future growth. This applies to all land owners in the area, but disproportionately negatively impacts property value for the large land owners. This is a quiet rural area. Approval of any rezoning and this high density housing is a breach of implied promise of reasonable growth for all owners in the area.

County Commissioner is the real estate agent on the property (enclosure 7). This is highly unethical. Ms. Kathy Cooper may make hundreds of thousands of dollars from real estate commissions on this deal. Ms. Cooper has approached many land owners in the area to help create the assemblage and has worked to reject offers for part of the property. All of this is unethical and a commissioner deciding to recuse themselves from voting does not exonerate themselves from the ethical conflicts of representing his/her constituents. Specifically in Montgomery v. Atlanta the following was noted:

A city councilmember was also a large stockholder in a paving company that was awarded a contract by the City of Atlanta. Ultimately, the contract was ruled to be contrary to public policy and therefore illegal, even though (1) the councilmember in question did not participate in the vote to award the contract and (2) the councilmember resigned from council and the remaining councilmembers voted again to ratify the contract after his departure.97 Self-recusal from a vote does not remove the conflict of interest where financial matters and personal gain are involved.

New emergency access road on Guth road. Mr. Deihl said during the 21 December 2023 meeting that the Commissioner's statement on the requirement for 2 ways in and 2 ways out of a subdivision over 150 homes could not be found. Yet, the Georgia State law if very clear (enclosure 10 and Enclosure 11). Georgia Counties may not over-ride Georgia Law (minimum fire safety standards). A different map presented on 18 and 21 December 2023 clearly violates the Georgia law by not complying with the distances in the two right of ways needed for a proposed subdivision of 120 or more homes. Gwinnett County uses this code during their development review process. The first part of the law states:

7. Add a new section, Appendix D 107.1, as follows:

Developments of one- or two-family dwellings where the number of dwelling units exceeds 120 shall be provided with two separate and approved fire apparatus access roads.

The second relevant part of the law states:

Add a new section, Appendix D 107.2, as follows:

Where two fire apparatus access roads are required, they shall be placed a distance apart equal to not less than one-half of the length of the maximum overall diagonal dimension of the property or area to be served, measured in a straight line between accesses.

This proposed subdivision is 324 homes and thus 2 separate fire access roads are required. Also, the two roads must be indicated that the two entrances need to be ½ the length of the maximum overall diagonal dimension. The overall diagonal dimension is about 3,675 and ½ that distance is about 1,838 feet. Thus, the entrances need to be at least 1,838 feet from one another (enclosure 12). Mr. Deihl, an attorney, was either mistaken or deceptive in his identification of the proper applicable law.

Agricultural area inconsistent with high density automobile traffic. Many people own tractors in the area and occasionally those tractors are in operation on JM Turk Road and the surrounding area. Geogia Department of Transportation placed a tractor cautionary sign about 70 feet from the entrance of Stanley Road many years ago due to the farming activity in the area (enclosure 13). Excessive automobile traffic and tractors do not mix well together. The zoning change from Agricultural Residential to PRD will hurt farmers in the area. For example, the largest vineyard in Hall County is about 400 feet from Stanley Road and the road is used by farm equipment to process the tonnage of grapes produced by the property. Stanley Road will have 2,500 or so car traffic trips a day. It is imprudent to push a farmer out of business so a developer can make money. The farmer in this case is using his property in accordance with the current and appropriate zoning.

Downstream flooding of Elah Valley: During the December 21st meeting, Elah Valley area, which is prone to flooding, will suffer from this highly dense development. Over time, residents reported more flooding each time a new development was put in (enclosure 14). Mr. Deihl said that detention ponds will catch all of the water. This is not true. Detention ponds do not solve current ongoing flooding issues. Detention ponds capture some water and allow the silt and pollution to settle to the bottom.

There is an overflow valve in each pond that allows excessive water to drain downstream during rainfall. Despite providing the required detention and water quality infrastructure the runoff from the property will be impacted given the massive increase of impervious surfaces and the steep slopes of the site. It will be unethical to cause flooding downstream. No variances should be approved as it will inevitably harm downstream homes and property.

This summary of unethical actions in this proposal is not complete. Nonetheless, it is disturbing. This applicant cannot be trusted to do the right thing and adhere to rules during a planning review process. What will happen when no one is looking if the development goes in? The rezoning request should be denied on the ethics alone.

I have also reviewed the information you provided to me pertaining to the proposed development of the adjacent property, which proposal I understand is scheduled be presented to the Hall County Board of Commissioners for consideration.

The purpose of this letter is to provide to you my conclusions as to the potential effects of the proposed development on access to the Property based upon the above information. The development as presented would result in a complete loss of access to the Property from Stanley Road. Further, no other existing roads or driveways provide a means of access to the Property. Accordingly, the proposed development, if approved, will essentially landlock the Property as there are no other present or practical means of access.

If the proposed development is approved as presented to me, you will have potential legal and equitable claims including, but not necessarily limited to, claims of inverse condemnation, claims to reestablish access to and from the Property, and claims to recover your legal damages.

Conflicts Related to Business Transactions with the County: An Application of the Law

Board of Commissioners of Miller County v. Callan94

In this 2012 case, the court upheld a local home rule amendment that authorized the county to transact business with a commissioner. The board of commissioners, upon a majority vote, determined that the goods, services, or property could not be obtained for less and that the taxpayers' best interests would be served through the transaction. As such, the court ruled this local provision did not impair O.C.G.A. § 16-10-6 and, in fact, provided more protection against conflicts of interest.⁹⁵

Having a Financial Interest in Matters Coming Before the Board

A conflict of interest can also arise if a commissioner stands to realize a financial gain from a transaction between the county and other entities. For instance, this scenario may occur when the county awards contracts for goods and services. The courts have also ruled that conflicts of interest can exist if a commissioner stands to suffer a financial loss.

Potential Personal Financial Gain in Matters Coming before the Board: An Application of the Law

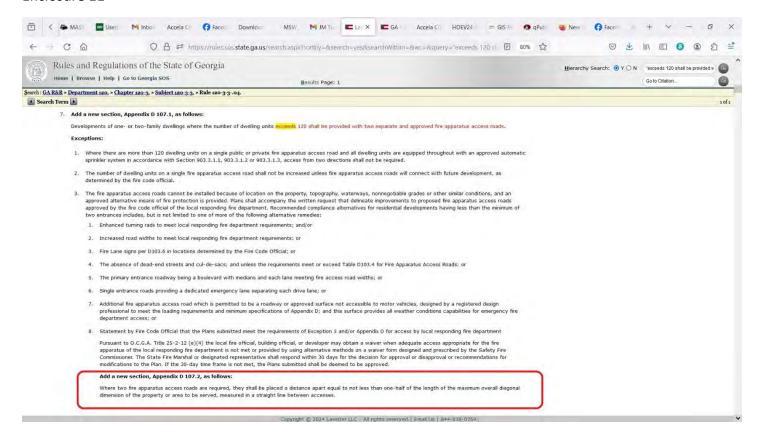

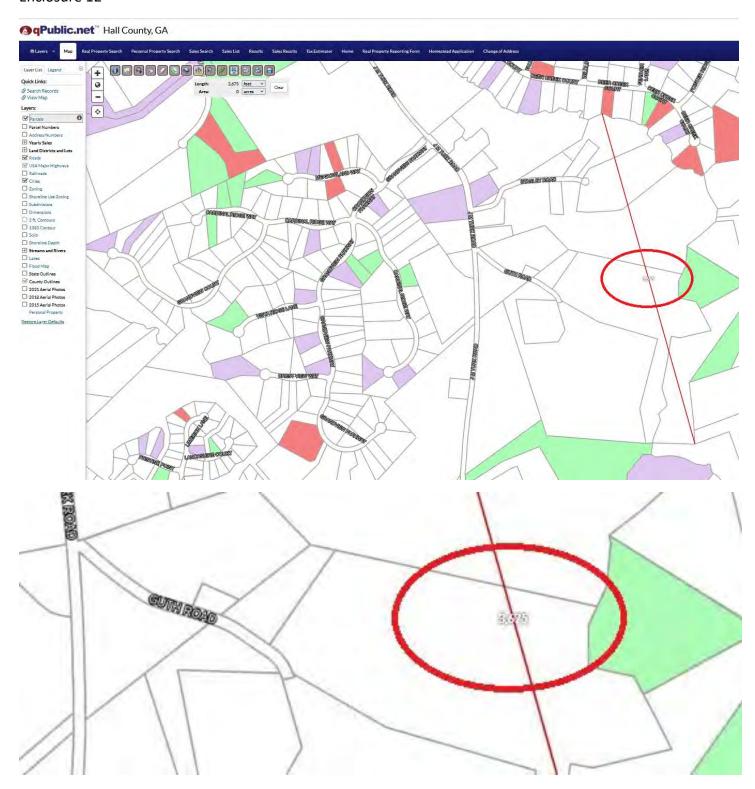
The courts have also invalidated paving contracts and related land acquisitions where the general contractor used a subcontractor owned in part by the city council president. Again, the fact the president abstained from the vote to award the contract was insufficient to eliminate the conflict of interest. Recounty commissioners must bear in mind that the courts will invalidate such transactions even if no monetary loss to the public is demonstrated, based on the very existence of the conflict of interest.



Rule 120-3-3-.04. State Minimum Fire Safety Standards with Modifications

Memorandum for Record - 21 Dec Meeting, Mulberry Creek Community Center, Flowery Branch GA, 6:30-7:30

This is in regard to the planned 324 living units off of Stanley Road. Please note after the November 20° meeting between the public, the planning commission and the applicant, the planning commission suggested that the applicant have a public meeting to answer any outstanding questions. The purpose of the memorandum is to transmit the information shared with the public by this new law firm, not associated with the original subdivision application.

On 21 December 2023, Mr. William Delhi, a representative from a new law firm (Smith Gambrell and Russell) was there to talk about the project. Please see attached. It is noted that the original applicant on the subdivision was from THOMPSON, O'BRIEN, KAPPLER & NASUTI, P.C. which was not the formal applicant of the subdivision. This fact suggests the planning commission's requests were not adhered to and the answers to any questions cannot be effectively linked to the formal subdivision application in front of Hall County for decision.

Residents brought up many issues such as:

- The residents were concerned about density and how this project does not match anything around the area. Many references were made to homes on Martin Road, Grandview and Quail Wood
- Traffic Concerns and the location of the Traffic Study.
- Residents were vocal about the loss of property value due to small homes going in around large acreage with large homes. The was no balance to the plan.
- Flooding concerns of Elah valley (it historically floods). It had been noted that new development in the area resulted in more flooding down river.
- 5) Specific questions about set back footage were asked.
- 6) Variations of density concerns were raised.
- 7) Guth road widening and service to the subdivision was mentioned.
- 8) Road competition with tractor traffic would lead to anger and car crashes.
- 9) Residents said that there were a lot of farm vehicles that would be competing with automobile traffic.
- 10) One entrance only would create huge congestion on Stanley Rd and it was unfair to people who lived on the road now. Traffic on Stanley Rd is 2-6 cars a day. Future traffic will be about 2,500 cars a day.

The representative from new law firm (not the original applicant) responded with:

- 1) No clear or concise answers.
- 2) Mr. Deihl only said that the area needed new housing.
- 3) Mr. Deihl said he was unclear on the setback footage requests.
- Mr. Deihl said that the law saying there was a need for 2 ways in and out of the subdivision was not found.

A hand vote showing favor and opposition to the project was taken at the end of the session. No one was in favor of the project and all 40 residents at the meeting were opposed to the project. The opinions were vocal and generally unanimous. No County official was present.

The Commission's Planning Staff has rightly concluded that the applicants plan is not consistent with the Hall County Comprehensive Plan for future land use designation, in that it exceeds the maximum density of 2 dwelling units per acre, for Residential future land use classification.

I am not opposed to my neighbors desire to sell their property for development. However, I continue to be opposed to their plan for the above reason.

Dear Council,

We are writing to express our strong opposition to the HZON23-0041 - rezoning for a Single-Family Subdivision located on the east side of JM Turk Road intersection with Guth and Stanley Roads. We understand the need for affordable housing in our city, however, we believe that this high-density development would have a detrimental impact on our community and the surrounding communities.

We believe that the lot size, home size, and location of this residential development may negatively result in economic, environmental, and social impacts on Quailwood, Grandview Estates, Martin Crossing, Laurel Oaks, and countless stand-alone homes along Martin, JM Turk, and Stanley Roads. We think these communities would be better served alongside new residential homes and developments that a comparable in price, lot size, and home size.

The type and square footage of these proposed single-family residences and townhomes might drastically alter the aesthetic of our area, replacing the existing greenery and open spaces with a high-density housing complex. A development of this magnitude may also reduce environmental amenities causing significant environmental damage, destroying and displacing natural wildlife habitats, and increasing wildlife migration into residential communities.

We also think the proposed high-density development might be too large for this area. The increase in population density may place a strain on the existing infrastructure, possibly leading to increased traffic, congestion, pollution, road safety issues, and stress on our public & local services. High-density developments, like this one, may be better suited in areas where the infrastructure, schools, and public and local services can effectively support population growth.

Additionally, this development may harm property values in and around the surrounding areas. The influx of 300+ moderate-priced homes could lead to an increase in crime rate, diminution of property values, and generate lower home prices, making it difficult for current residents to sell their homes and move elsewhere.

On the other hand, given the desirability of our neighborhood and surrounding communities, this development may garner large profit margins for their stakeholders.

For years, South Hall has been growing at an all-time high. Rezoning and open lots have been filled with apartments, townhomes, and warehouses which impact the existing road network and public infrastructure. In our immediate area, we have personally experienced massive growth (as listed below) without enough infrastructure upgrades. We have experienced various tax increases, as shown in the substantial increases in property assessment taxes, without the new economic growth shouldering their share of the tax burden.

I am writing to express my strong opposition to the rezoning application # HZON23-0041 off of J M Turk Rd, Flowery Branch, GA, which requests a change from Agricultural Residential III to Planned Residential Development (PRD). While I understand the importance of responsible development & growth in Hall county, I believe this particular proposal is deeply flawed & should not be approved for several reasons.

First and foremost, the proposed PRD is not compatible with the surrounding subdivisions. The character of this area has been established over the years, and introducing a PRD would disrupt the harmonious nature of our community. The size, density, and design of the PRD are not in line with the existing neighborhoods and would create an imbalance that is inconsistent with the current zoning and land use patterns. The proposed use is not consistent with the Hall Co

Comprehensive Plan recommended maximum density of two dwellings per acre which leads to many problems.
