## **Planning Commission Conditions:**

- 1. The property shall be developed in accordance with the site plan and narrative dated no later than August 4, 2025, modified as necessary for compliance with conditions herein and development standards enforced at the time of site plan approval with the exception of the following
  - a. The development shall provide 30 parking spaces.
  - b. The transitional buffer shall be increased to 25 feet on all sides except the right-of-way and include a 6 foot opaque privacy fence

- 2. Access to the development shall be approved by Georgia Department of Transportation (GDOT) and all traffic engineering standards shall be met. The developer shall be responsible for all associated costs with improvements necessary for the development.
- 3. No variances or development exceptions are granted as part of this request that are not explicitly granted by board approval. The development shall be compliant with the Unified Development Code of Hall County, as well as any other agencies or reviewing departments, including, but not limited to the Fire Marshal, and Hall County Engineering except when noted in these conditions.
- 4. All conditions of zoning shall be made a part of any plats created for the property.

The following statement regarding the potential impacts of agricultural operations in the area shall be made a part of any plat recorded on the property: "Owners, occupants, and users of property shown on this plat are hereby informed of the impacts associated with normal farming practices which may take place on adjacent and nearby property including, but not limited to, noise, odors, dust, the operation of machinery of any kind, the storage and disposal of manure, and the application of fertilizers, herbicides, and pesticides. Therefore, owners, occupants, and users of the property shown on this plat should be prepared to expect the effects of such practices."
- 6. Hours of operation are restricted to Monday Saturday 8:00 am to 8:00 pm and Sunday 11:00 am to 5:00 pm.
- 7. All training activities shall take place inside the facility.
- 8. All signage shall comply with GCOD standards.

# Excerpts from the minutes of the July 21, 2025 meeting

# **Applicant's Presentation:**

Katie Greenway, Planning and Zoning Administrator, presented a summary of the request.

**Eric Johansen, 3938 Oak Crossing Drive, Suwannee,** presented the request. The applicant is requesting to rezone a 2.22± acre tract from Agricultural Residential 1 (AR-1) to Highway Business (H-B) for an indoor recreation facility to provide training for professional wrestlers. The parcel is vacant and partially forested. The property also falls within the Gateway Corridor Overlay District (GCOD), which requires adherence to additional standards for nonresidential development.

## **Public Forum:**

**Lloyd Jackson Campbell, Jr., 6020 Cleveland Highway, Clermont,** spoke in opposition. Concerns raised were the possibility of the impact of development on an underground drainage pipe connecting the subject property to Mr. Campbell's property, which could cause flooding on his property. He stated that he does not believe a portion of the land is buildable due to it consistently being wet.

Two comments in opposition were received electronically.

#### **Planning Commission Comments:**

Mr. Hunt asked the applicant if they were aware of the water culvert. The applicant stated they were unaware but they were going to review the recently completed surveys and there would be site inspections completed as part of the development process. The applicant stated the lower area of the property would have a detention pond and stated the building inspections' phase would ensure there would not be water runoff. Mr. Hunt asked for clarification regarding the use of the gym. The applicant explained the gym would be used by a professional wrestler to train other wrestlers and for sports rehabilitation, and no membership or public use would be allowed. Mr. Hunt asked the applicant what are the intended hours of operation and the applicant stated Sunday to Saturday 8am to 8pm. Mr. Hunt offered the hours of 11am to 5pm on Sundays and the applicant was agreeable. Mr. Hunt asked how much on-site parking would be needed. The applicant stated approximately half but the design had to meet the UDC requirement for the use. Mr. Hunt and the applicant discussed reducing the layout to 30 parking spaces and increasing the transitional buffers between the surrounding properties from 15 feet to 25 feet plus a 6 foot high fence.

Mr. Braswell explained to the applicant that any required revisions to the concept plan based on the zoning conditions shall be subject to the approval of the Director of Planning and Zoning before the request goes before the Board of Commissioners. The amended site plan must be submitted to the Director for review within 10 business days of the Planning Commission's recommendation.

## Staff recommends APPROVAL of the applicant's request with the following conditions:

- 2. Access to the development shall be approved by Georgia Department of Transportation (GDOT) and all traffic engineering standards shall be met. The developer shall be responsible for all associated costs with improvements necessary for the development.
- 3. No variances or development exceptions are granted as part of this request that are not explicitly granted by board approval. The development shall be compliant with the Unified Development Code of Hall County, as well as any other agencies or reviewing departments, including, but not limited to the Fire Marshal, and Hall County Engineering.
- 4. All conditions of zoning shall be made a part of any plats created for the property.

## **Summary Analysis**

The applicant is requesting to rezone a 2.22± acre tract from Agricultural Residential 1 (AR-1) to Highway Business (H-B) for an indoor recreation facility. The parcel is vacant and partially forested. The property also falls within the Gateway Corridor Overlay District (GCOD), which requires the adherence to additional standards for nonresidential development.

The surrounding properties are zoned and developed as outlined below:

North: Agricultural Residential 1 (AR-1): Developed with a single-family home; and

Town of Clermont: Developed with Hall County Fire Station 2

East: Agricultural Residential 1 (AR-1): Developed with a single-family home South: Agricultural Residential 1 (AR-1): Developed with a single-family home; and

Town of Clermont: Developed with a church

West: Agricultural Residential 1 (AR-1): Undeveloped; and

Highway Business (H-B): Developed with a gas station

Per the submitted narrative and site plan, the applicant is requesting to rezone the subject parcel to Highway Business (H-B) to construct a professional wrestling training academy and gym. The proposed development will include a single-story 10,000± square foot building and 53 parking spaces. The submitted narrative states that the proposed building elevations will meet the GCOD standards.

Per the submitted site plan, a stormwater management pond will be located on the southwest portion of the property furthest away from Cleveland Highway. A 10 foot landscape strip and parking lot landscaping is depicted on the site plan, as well as a 15 foot transitional buffer along neighboring property lines which includes a 6 foot opaque fence.

Per the site plan, a single access point is proposed off Cleveland Highway with a 5 foot sidewalk leading into the development. A septic drain field area is proposed in the northern area of the property.

Water service will be provided by the City of Gainesville Department of Water Resources as confirmed in an email dated May 25, 2025. Sanitary sewer service will be provided by an on-site septic system.

The development standards for the project are identified in the table below compared to the GCOD requirements (6.2):

Based on the future land use plan, staff finds the special use request <u>is consistent</u> with the Comprehensive Plan's future land use classification of Business Nodes & Corridors. The intent of this future land use designation is for new development along these major road corridors and intersections to consist of higher-intensity commercial uses, low-intensity, consumer-facing industrial uses that house businesses that serve nearby communities, and with some higher density residential, where appropriate. Site designs should incorporate the Quality Development Principals, particularly natural resource protections and high-quality landscape installations, to the fullest extent possible.

## **Zoning Analysis**

When considering a zoning amendment to the zoning maps, the Planning Commission must study the need and justification for the change based on a determination of the facts applicable to the particular case, and the following general lines of inquiry must be considered:

- a. Whether the zoning proposal will permit a use that is suitable in view of the use, development and zoning of adjacent and nearby property; The proposed Highway Business (H-B) zoning district is consistent with the use, development, and zoning of adjacent and nearby properties.
- b. Whether the zoning proposal will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property; It is not anticipated that the use would adversely affect adjacent or nearby property provided required buffers are maintained.
- c. Whether the property to be affected by the zoning proposal has a reasonable economic use as currently zoned; **The property has reasonable economic use as currently zoned.**
- d. Whether the zoning proposal will result in a use which will or could cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, utilities, schools, police protection, fire protection, public health facilities or emergency medical service; The proposed rezoning is not expected to cause an excessive or burdensome use of the existing streets, transportation facilities, utilities, schools, police protection, fire protection, public facilities, or emergency medical service. The property is served by Hall County sewer and City of Gainesville public water.
- e. Whether the zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the future land use plan for the physical development of the area; The proposed use is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan and the Business Nodes & Corridors future land use designation.
- f. The extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions; **Staff is** unable to determine the extent to which property values are affected by the existing zoning restrictions.
- g. The extent to which the destruction of the subject property's value under the existing zoning promotes the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public; Staff is unable to comment on the impact of property values without a full market analysis. Multiple factors impact property values including construction types, proposed uses, and maintenance. Often it is difficult to determine the effect of a development on adjacent properties until the development is completed.
- h. The relative gain to the public as compared to the hardship imposed upon the individual property owner; Staff has not identified a hardship imposed on the property owner as the property is currently zoned.
- i. The length of time the property has been vacant as zoned considered in the context of land development in the area in the vicinity of the property; The property is vacant and there is no record of past development.

- j. Whether there are other existing or changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property which give supporting grounds for either approval or disapproval of the zoning proposal; Staff is not aware of any changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property.
- k. Whether the change would create an isolated district unrelated to the surrounding districts; **The proposed zoning, Highway Business (H-B), would not create an isolated district.**
- I. Whether the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn in relation to existing conditions in the area; There is no evidence that the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn.
- m. Whether the change requested is out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole or the immediate neighborhood; **No, the request is not out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole.**
- n. Whether it is impossible to find adequate sites for the proposed use in districts permitting such use and already appropriately zoned; There are other properties within the County that support Highway Business uses based on the Future Land Use Map; however, the development as proposed requires rezoning approval by the Board of Commissioners.
- o. Whether the need for rezoning could be handled instead by a variance request to the Planning Commission; The request could not be handled alternatively as a variance.
- p. Whether there would be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from major modifications to the land if the request is granted; Any land disturbance activities on the property shall be required to go through the land development permitting process, and as a result are subject to local, state, and federal regulations. As a result, there are no anticipated ecological or pollution impacts resulting from any modification to the land if the request is granted.
- q. Whether there is reasonable evidence based upon existing and anticipated land use that would indicate a mistake was made in the original zoning of the property; **There is no indication that a mistake was made in the original zoning.**

## 11.2.6.E - Submission requirements

- 1. Any person or persons requesting a change in the official zoning map or use subject to approval of the County Commission must file an application with a plat or map of the property attached thereto, together with payment of such fees set forth in this Sec 11.2. to cover administrative and advertising costs, in the Planning and Zoning Department office. Such person or persons or their authorized agent must appear in person at the public hearing held to consider the district change. The proposal meets the requirement. The applicant has paid the appropriate fees and understands that someone must be present at both the Hall County Planning Commission meeting and the voting meeting of the Hall County Board of Commissioners.
- 2. All applications for a change of zoning classification or use subject to approval of the County Commission must include:

- a. A narrative statement identifying the existing and proposed use of the property and addressing each of the criteria set forth in this Sec. 11.2. The proposal provides a narrative outlining the intent of the development; however, the applicant has not prepared a response to each of the criteria listed in 11.2.6.E.2.
- b. A site plan drawn to scale designating the area covered by the application and identifying existing and proposed buildings and uses, adjacent existing land uses, zoning on contiguous parcels, including those across an abutting public right-of-way, and any other significant site improvements proposed to accommodate the proposed use or buffer adjacent uses, etc., or a plat of the subject property where no specific land use is proposed. In cases where only a plat or map is provided and no land use is proposed, the Planning Commission and County Commission may evaluate the application based on the most intense possible land use permitted in the proposed district. The proposal meets the requirement.
- c. For any application for a slow rate land treatment system as defined in 7.6.9.D.1, additional requirements apply. **This standard is not applicable to the applicant's request**
- d. For any application proposing the development of 100 or more residential dwelling units, a traffic impact study must be submitted prior to consideration of the application by the County Commission. At the applicant's expense, the traffic impact study must be prepared by a professional engineer in accordance with requirements established by the Hall County Engineering Department. The Engineering Department must review the traffic impact study and forward any comments to the County Commission. This standard is not applicable to the applicant's request.

# **Development Support and Constraints**

## **Hall County Environmental Health**

In an email dated June 16, 2025, Emily McGahee stated, "Must meet all Environmental Health commercial septic system permitting requirements. A detailed business plan must be submitted to Hall County Environmental Health for review. Additional items, including, but not limited to: recorded plat, soil evaluation, and septic system installation may be required after review of business plan."

## **Georgia Department of Transportation**

In an email dated June 16, 2025, Nakia Nembhard, GDOT Civil Engineer 3, stated that GDOT coordination is required.

# **Gainesville-Hall Metropolitan Planning Organization**

In an email dated June 12, 2025, Joseph Boyd, MPO Director, provided the following comment: "This parcel is along US 129, which is expected to be widened with construction scheduled for 2040 (GH-035/PI0014129). Pre-engineering is scheduled for 2035, where further details, including right-of-way impacts, will be established."

# **Hall County Public Works and Utilities**

In a memo dated June 20, 2025, Bill Nash, Director of Public Works and Utilities, provided the following comments:

# **Engineering:**

This site may require a stormwater management report should the site plan indicate the proposed development meets stormwater thresholds for impervious surfaces and/or disturbed acreage.

# **Traffic:**

G-DOT coordination
Commercial driveway if no access to SR 11

# **Utilities**:

Clermont sewer service area.

# **Hall County Fire Marshal**

In an email dated June 13, 2025, John Hornick, NPQ Fire Service Plans Examiner 1, stated, "If approved the site development plan may require modifications during the development review process."
