**Problem Identification** 

Hall County is located in North Georgia about 40 miles north of Atlanta. Hall County consists of 429 square miles. Roughly 393 square miles of land and 36 square miles of water are within Hall County boundaries. Hall County has a population of approximately 203,136. (Source: census.gov). This number swells during the daytime hours as Hall County is a hub for activity in this region of the state. Lake Lanier is located in Hall County and has 692 miles of shoreline. (Source: Lakelanierclub.com). Lake Lanier is a major attraction during the summer months, which greatly increases the volume of traffic on the roadways and increases the number of impaired drivers in Hall County. Hall County has one major interstate which travels the length of the county, that being 1985. (Interstate Source: https://data.census.gov/cedsci). Interstate 985 connects to the North Georgia Mountains, which in turn increases traffic on the roadways during the fall months of the year. This is due to a large volume of visitors traveling to stay in mountain cabins and observe the changing colors of the leaves. This is also attributed to why Hall County typically has more traffic crashes during the Fall months. Hall County is also the location of the newly planned inland port. This inland port will be located along the 1985/365 corridor just north of Gainesville. The inland port will take approximately 50,000 to 200,000 railroad boxcars per day from the Savannah Port by railway. These boxcars will then leave Hall County and be driven by tractor-trailer throughout the southeastern United States. Several large corporations have been completed in the Gateway Industrial Center, which is where the inland port will soon be fully completed in 2026. This has already added tremendously to the traffic volume in Hall County.

Due to the increased number of vehicles on the roadways of Hall County and the disregard for Georgia traffic law in several areas, the fatalities on Hall County roads have drastically increased prior to the implementation of the newest HEAT grant. With the help of the last HEAT grant in Hall County, we saw the number of fatalities and injury crashes being held to a minimum during that period of added enforcement, awareness and education. In 2017, Hall County had 31 fatalities. In 2018 Hall County had 26 fatalities and in 2019, during the grant, the fatalities were reduced to only 20. In 2020, there were 31 fatalities. In 2021 there were 30 fatalities and in 2022 there were 34 fatalities. In 2023, with the HEAT grant in place, Hall County saw its lowest number of fatalities in years with final data showing 16 fatalities. (Though GEARS shows 22, 6 of those were minor crashes improperly input as fatal. Those agencies have been contacted and are still working with Gears to get it corrected.) (Source: Hall County RMS-Record Management System). In 2024, Hall County saw another low fatality year with only 19 fatalities. As to the roadways in which these fatalities have occurred, we have seen the following: In 2017, 2 of the fatalities occurred on 1985, 8 occurred on county roadways and 21 occurred on state routes. In 2018, 2 of the fatalities occurred on 1985, 12 occurred on county roadways and 12 occurred on state routes. In 2019, 2 of the fatalities occurred in 1985, 5 occurred on county roadways and 13 occurred on state routes. In 2020, records show that 2 fatalities occurred on the interstate, 5 occurred on county roads and 22 occurred on state routes. One example of the fatalities was in 2021; it occurred on private property with a vehicle striking a subject in a wheelchair in a nursing home parking lot sidewalk. Data from 2022 shows that 3 of the fatalities occurred on 1985, 24 occurred on state routes and 7 occurred on county roads. In 2023, 5 of the fatalities happened on County Roads, 8 occurred on State Routes, and only 3 occurred on I-985/365 corridor. In 2024, 3 of the

State Routes and 6 occurred on County roads. (Source: Hall County RMS-Record Management System). As far as the causes of these crashes and why these crashes are occurring, in 2017, 3 of the 31, or 10 percent, of the fatal crashes were caused by speeding, or too fast for conditions, while 7 of the 31 or 23 percent were caused by an impaired driver. In 2018, 4 of the 26 fatalities, or 15 percent, were caused by excessive speed, and also 4 of the 26, 15 percent, were caused by an impaired driver. In 2019, 3 of the 20 fatalities, or 15 percent were caused by excessive speed, while 5 of the 20 or 25 percent were caused by impaired drivers. In 2020, 13 of the 31 fatalities, or 42 percent, were caused by excessive speed while 9 of the 31, or 29 percent, were caused by an impaired driver. In 2021, 7 of the 30 fatalities, or 23 percent, were caused by excessive speed while 15 of 30 or 50 percent were caused by an impaired driver. In 2022, 15 of the 34 fatalities, or 44 percent were caused by excessive speed while 8 of the 34 or 24 percent were caused by an impaired driver. Preliminary information shows that 6 of the 16 fatalities or 38 percent were caused by excessive speed while 3 of the 16, or 19% were caused by an impaired driver. In 2023 25% were pedestrians on the roadway, 6 of the 16 or 37% were caused by excessive speed, and 3 of the 16 or 18% were caused by an impaired driver. Also 4 of those fatalities were single rider motorcycles traveling way in excess of the speed limit, making 50% of fatalities for 2023 coming from aggressive speed motorcycles and pedestrians. In 2024, only 1 of the fatalities, 5%, was caused by DUI which is believed to be a testament to the HEAT grant working as intended. 5 of the fatal crashes or 26% were caused by speed. Another 6 or 31% were caused by failure to yield. In 2024, there were several freak fatalities, 1 occurred where a pedestrian in the roadway was struck by a train. Another occurred where an elderly female drove her golf cart off an embankment at her house and the golf cart landed on top of her in the roadway which turned fatal. Another 1 was a pedestrian struck, and we also had a child on a bicycle who ran a stop sign and was struck by a landscaping truck. The child was not wearing a helmet. From 2021 to 2022, data showed that Georgia went down almost 1.5% in total number of crashes from 454.269 to 447.437 and almost 4% from 2102 Fatalities to 2024 Fatalities. From 2021 to 2022. Hall County crash numbers indicated the opposite. Total crashes went up 3% from 9634 to 9944 while Fatalities went up also 13% from 30 to 34. In 2023 total crashes in Georgia were down about 2.6% from 447,438 to 435,862. Hall County saw a similar reduction in total crashes from 9,944 to 9,777 or about 1.6%. In 2023 Hall County saw a 53% reduction in fatalities from the previous year down to 16 from 34. In 2024, Georgia went down 2% in total crashes to 427,761 which was 8100 crashes lower. Hall County saw a similar reduction in total crashes from 9777 down to 9585, or about 2%. In 2024, Hall County saw a slight increase in fatal crashes after an incredibly low year in 2023. This increase of 3 fatalities equates to an 18% increase, though for Hall County that number is still relatively low in comparison to previous years. Fatalities in Georgia for 2024 went down about 7% with 135 less than in 2023. These numbers were collected from the GEARS as of 01/08/2024.

In 2024, Georgia's seatbelt usage rate increased slightly to 88.8%, a rate below 90% for the third year in a row after being above 90% for more than ten years. The latest Hall County usage rate is 94% as of December 16th, 2024. With the 20 fatalities in 2019, 7 were unrestrained. In 2020, 6 of the 31 fatalities were unrestrained, and in 2021 8 of the 30 fatalities were violating the occupant safety laws. This number lowered to 7 of 34 in 2022 and 3 of 16 in 2023. In 2024 10 of the 19 fatalities were unrestrained and that

accounts for about 53%.

Because of the number of fatalities that are occurring in Hall County, the number of fatalities that are caused by speed and impaired drivers and the number of people who are killed due to being unrestrained drivers or passengers, the Hall County Sheriff's Office is seeking the continued HEAT grant. The Hall County Sheriff's Office has had great success with reaching its goals in past grants and has become self-sufficient with all of these resources still being filled and still performing the duties of enforcement, awareness and education of Georgia Traffic Laws. With the HEAT grant, the Hall County Sheriff's Office will be able to utilize the goals of the grant in order to combat any increase in fatalities and injury crashes specifically reducing crashes related to impaired driving, speeding, distracted driving, seat belt usage, and other forms of aggressive driving in order to improve highway safety. All 2024 data is preliminary and has not been certified. **Program Assessment** 

When The Hall County Sheriff's Office first realized the gravity of our situation regarding vehicle fatalities, we noted the following: Not only had fatalities increased, but the majority of these fatalities were either caused by an impaired driver, a speeding driver, or an unrestrained occupant of a vehicle. We also noticed that it could be a combination of all three. In order to deter these fatalities, the Hall County Sheriff's Office has approached the problem with a mission focused on education, awareness, and enforcement. First, in the area of awareness, the Hall County Sheriff's Office has purchased 13 RADARSIGNS. These signs will display a violator's speed and will flash at the driver to "Slow Down" when a preset speed is programmed in the sign. These signs are placed throughout the county in areas predetermined by high crashes or citizen complaints. The sheriff's office has done studies with a "stealth stat" obtaining data and the RADARSIGN working as an awareness tool. We have found with RADARSIGN that the speeds are somewhere between 10% and 20% slower on that roadway when the sign is in use.

In the area of education, we have approached all of our local media outlets and presented them with the fatality statistics. As a result of these releases, several Atlanta area TV stations ran stories about our high number of traffic deaths and our desire to reduce those numbers. Next, we assigned a member of our traffic unit to write a short article every month about a traffic related matter. Initially, this article was released through social media and various other Hall County Government outlets. This article was later turned into a public safety announcement used by local media to address the issue. The traffic/HEAT supervisors continue to use the Hall County Facebook and Instagram pages to push educational material to its followers. To complete these public safety announcements, we work with our local government television channel. We have at times conducted a Traffic Tip Thursday which talks about topics associated with occupancy laws, speed awareness, impaired driving awareness and any other topic involving traffic safety. These are done on Access WDUN Radio and Glory 1330 Radio. In addition, we expanded the number trained in the CarFit for seniors' program. We have hosted several events and have had requests for more. To add to this program, we have approached our SafeKids Coordinator and asked them to join us at the same time to address child restraint to the same group of seniors. Additionally, we partner with SafeKids and do a car seat event once a month at our local Health Department.

In terms of our traffic enforcement unit's approach to enforcement, we have done several things. First, we have identified the area

with the previous month's highest number of traffic crashes. We require the enforcement activities to include one full shift in this area and conduct enforcement. Also, we bring the entire traffic unit together for one four-hour period to saturate this area. To add to this effect, we publicize this location and inform the public of our intent to have an increased enforcement presence in this area throughout that particular month. This is primarily handled through our social media outlets. The outcomes of these activities have been somewhat beneficial in the past. Through conducting an analysis before a concentrated patrol and another during and a month after a concentrated/saturated patrol, there has been as much as a 50 percent reduction in the number of traffic crashes. This number was observed while working state route GA 60, GA 11, and GA 332. The lowest reduction in the number of traffic crashes was seen while working the I985/GA 365 corridor, when only a 9 percent reduction in traffic crashes was seen. We recognize the need to work with the various municipal agencies in our county. We have done this by joining the Gainesville Police Department, Oakwood Police Department, and Flowery Branch Police Department in traffic check point ventures. We also have the benefit of a strong working relationship with the Georgia State Patrol in our area. We regularly ask them to join us for our concentrated patrols and other enforcement activities. We also do regular events with SafeKids and support MADD. Traffic supervisors also attend a quarterly TIME Task Force meeting and training to partner our working relationship with DOT and the handling or "TRIPing" of events involving the Interstate system and commercial vehicle crashes. We also utilize two 11.5 x 6ft Wanco message board signs to display all GOHS and other traffic campaigns like Click it or Ticket and Drive Sober or Get pulled over. As we move forward, we hope to continue to employ these same tactics and add activity to them. By using media outlets to make the public aware of the statistics and involving organizations such as CarFit and Safe Kids, we will continue to educate the public as much as possible. This combined with the public service announcements, awareness, education, and enforcement, we hope to reach out to our community and encourage safe driving practices. In the first 2 years of the newest HEAT Grant, Hall County has seen a tremendous decrease in fatalities like we have not seen in decades. In 2023, Fatalities dropped 54% from 34 in 2022 to just 16. In 2024, thanks to the HEAT grant, fatalities stayed fairly low with only 19 fatal crashes for the year. It is a testament to this grant doing what it was intended to do when the number of fatal crashes from a DUI driver in 2024 was only 1. We will continue to utilize the rubric of the past 2 years to hopefully keep the fatalities at a minimum.

Media Plan

The Hall County Sheriff's Office uses several media outlets to inform and educate the public. The Hall County Sheriff's Office will use the local newspaper which is the Gainesville Times to have a written article announcing the award of the HEAT Grant. The Sheriff's Office will also utilize a local internet news media outlet called Access North Georgia News. In addition, the Hall County Government in connection with the Gainesville City Government owns TV18, which is a local television cable channel, which will be used for both the announcement and would continue to be used by the traffic enforcement unit as an education tool. Also, the Hall County Sheriff's Office will be utilizing the HEAT Units to participate in the Georgia Car Fit for elders program and the Safe Kids program, which are both high visibility educational programs for the public. The Hall County Sheriff's Office also partners with WDUN Radio and GLORY 1330 Radio to have news stories and talk shows involving education and awareness of traffic law. One of these radio shows is "Traffic Tip Thursday" whereby an officer will appear on the talk show or go to a location to talk about Impaired Driving, Speed Awareness, Occupant Safety, Current Law on Passing a Stopped School Bus, How to Negotiate a Round-a-Bout, etc. In addition, the Hall County Sheriff's Office has partnered with Channel 2 and Channel 11, which are local Atlanta channels, in the promotion and announcement of programs the Hall County Sheriff's Office plans to use in order to deter the number of fatalities which are occurring in Hall County. In addition, the Hall County Sheriff's Office utilizes their Facebook Social Media platform to educate and make citizens aware of traffic related issues and problems, and inform them of educational events going on throughout Hall County during the year.

**Resource Requirements** 

The Hall County Sheriffs Office is requesting this grant to fund an enforcement effort focusing on alcohol and drug impaired driving, speeding, distracted driving, and occupant protection utilizing 5760 enforcement activity hours annually. Activity hours may also be used for educational events, attendance at the GOHS Highway Safety Conference, highway safety related training/certifications, etc. Activity hours will be filled with resources that hold the appropriate certifications on traffic enforcement equipment. Standardized Field Sobriety, RADAR, LIDAR, and ARIDE at minimum, will be required by resources that carry out activity hours. Activity hours will be utilized during identified peak hours for the enforcement of DUIs, Speeding, Distracted Driving, and Occupant Protection. Crash data will be used as a hot spot locator to target enforcement in high problem areas. Activity hours will be utilized to conduct and or participate in checkpoints and saturated patrols in identified areas throughout the County. Activity hours will also be utilized to complete the other goals and objectives of the project such as conducting educational events and participating in GOHS Campaigns and Network Meetings. Once funding is determined to be awarded, resources will be selected based on the minimum criteria and preference will be given to resources which exceed the minimum criteria. The Grantee would request fuel allowance and regular maintenance for these vehicles. The maintenance would only include regular oil changes and the cost of tires. The cost for one vehicle for the year will be \$3,000.00 with an extended cost for three vehicles being \$9,000.00 per year. A maintenance quote was provided by Hall County Fleet Maintenance much higher than this, however, the Hall County Sheriffs Office will provide the funds for any overages of this \$7500 per year. During enforcement activities, the cars and equipment already purchased in the first year of the grant will be used to enforce the traffic laws of the state of Georgia to reduce serious injury and fatality crashes. In addition to enforcement, vehicles will be used to travel to any events including educational events, attendance at the GOHS Highway Safety Conference, Highway safety related training/certifications, any GOHS sponsored monthly traffic network meetings, etc. The \$4500 in travel expenses will be used to attend any required GOHS sponsored events or activities. All of the resources which are requested are necessary. The Grantee will incur the cost of uniforms, and duty gear, including duty weapon, gun belt, radio, pepper spray, handcuffs, Tasers, etc. The Grantee will also provide office space for personnel, storage for documents and records, and office supplies. The Grantee will also incur the cost of administrative fees, by using current clerical staff and the current traffic Sergeant for

administrative duties. The Grantee will also provide all in car and portable communication radios along with GTAC military grade laptops in the vehicles. In the 2026 FY, the resources that have been provided by the grant will be used to surpass the goals set forth in the grant in the areas of education, awareness, and enforcement. There will be support for the MADD program, SafeKids, and the CarFit program. In addition, training will continue in order to increase knowledge in the areas of speeding, occupant safety, and impaired driving enforcement and awareness. Any HEAT Unit who is also a network coordinator may use the HEAT vehicle for LEL conferences. The Hall County HEAT Unit will establish an enforcement effort focusing on alcohol and drug-impaired driving, speeding, and occupant protection utilizing 5760 enforcement activity hours annually.
