



Purpose of Request:

To establish a contract with a qualified contractor to provide elevator maintenance and repair services throughout the County's facilities.

Facts and Issues:

Two lower bids were received for this contract. At the request of Building Maintenance, we are not selecting Mowrey Elevator due to their inability to provide satisfactory service in the present contract cycle which has required calling in Premier Elevator to perform repairs. TK Elevator Corp (formerly Thyssenkrupp Elevator) previously had their contract cancelled in prior contract cycle at the instruction of Court Administration for non-performance in keeping the elevators operating in the Courthouse which also required Premier Elevator to complete repairs.

History:

Premier Elevator has previously held this contract and is in good standing with the County. They have regularly responded to implement emergency repairs when contracted vendors have failed to perform adequately.

CONTRACT AGREEMENT RFP #21-236 ON CALL PROFESSIONAL SERVICES – STORMWATER PIPE LINING SERVICES

This Agreement made and entered into this 1 day of October, in the year 2 021; by and between The City of Johns Creek, Georgia, having its principal place of business at 11360 Lakefield Drive, Johns Creek, Georgia 30097 and Federal EC, LLC. ("Contractor"), 504 Allatoona Hills Drive, Woodstock, GA 30189.

WHEREAS, the City hereby contracts with Federal EC, LLC for the furnishing of professional services in connection with the Project, for the furnishing of such services more particularly described herein in consideration of these premises and of the mutual covenants herein set forth. By executing this Agreement, the Contractor represents to City that it is professionally qualified to do this Project and is licensed to practice services by all public entities having jurisdiction over "Contractor" and the Project; and

WHEREAS, the City of Johns Creek has caused Request for Proposals #21-236 to be issued soliciting proposals from qualified Contractors to furnish all items, labor services, materials and appurtenances called for by them in accordance with this proposal. Selected Contractor is required to provide the services as called for in the specifications; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor submitted a response to the RFP #21-236; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor submitted a response to the RFP# 21-236 and the Contractor's submittal was deemed by the City of Johns Creek to be the most advantageous per the scope of services dated August 24, 2021.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and promises contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

1.0 Definition

As used in this Agreement, the following terms shall have the meanings ascribed herein unless otherwise stated or reasonably required by the Agreement, and other forms of any defined words shall have a meaning parallel thereto.

- City: The City of Johns Creek.
- Contractor: The individual or corporation identified on page 1 to labor, materials, and equipment to perform pipe lining construction services.
- Contract Documents: Those documents so identified in the Agreement for the Project, including all
 associated documents. All terms defined in the General Conditions of the Agreement for professional
 services of the Project shall have the same meaning when used in this Agreement unless otherwise

- specifically stated or in the case of a conflict in which case the definition used in this Agreement shall prevail in the interpretation of this Agreement.
- Contract Sum: The total amount payable by City to Contractor for performance of the Work in accordance with the Contract Documents.
- Contract Time: The number of days allotted in the Contract Documents for achieving Substantial Completion of the Work.
- Professional Services: The services, labor, materials, supplies, work, administration, if applicable, and all other acts, duties, and services required of Contractor under this Agreement together and any awarded project Task Order's with such other services as City may require pursuant to the terms of this Agreement.
- Project Manager: The person employed by City and designated to act as the City's representative
 for the Project.
- Scope of Services: That work as defined and identified with a time schedule in Exhibit A (Scope of Services) attached hereto and incorporated herein.

2.0 Key Personnel

The City of Johns Creek is entering into this Agreement and has relied upon Contractor's providing the services of the Key Personnel, if any, identified as such in the body of the Agreement. No Key Personnel may be replaced or transferred without the prior approval of the City's authorized representative. Any Contractor personnel to whom the City objects shall be removed from City work immediately. The City maintains the right to approve in its sole discretion all personnel assigned to the work under this Agreement.

3.0 Compensation

- 3.1 Pricing: The Contractor will be paid for the goods and services sold pursuant to the Contract in accordance with the RFP and final pricing documents as incorporated into the terms of the Contract. Unless clearly stated otherwise in the Standard Contract, all prices are firm and fixed and are not subject to variation. Prices include, but are not limited to, freight, insurance, fuel surcharges, and customs duties. The prices quoted and listed on the attached Cost Proposal, a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit B and incorporated herein, shall be firm throughout the term of this Contract.
- 3.2 Billings: If applicable, and unless the RFP provides otherwise, the Contractor shall submit, on a regular basis, an invoice for goods and services supplied to the City under the Contract at the billing address specified in the Purchase Instrument or Contract. The invoice shall comply with all applicable rules concerning payment of such claims. The City shall pay all approved invoices in arrears and in accordance with applicable provisions of City law. Unless otherwise agreed in writing by the parties, the Contractor shall not be entitled to receive any other payment or compensation from the City for any goods or services provided by or on behalf of the Contractor under the Contract. The Contractor shall be solely responsible for paying all costs, expenses, and charges it incurs in connection with its performance under the Contract. Standard payment terms: Net-30.
- 3.3 Delay of Payment Due to Contractor's Failure: If the City in good faith determines that the Contractor has failed to perform or deliver any service or product as required by the Contract, the Contractor shall not be entitled to any compensation under the Contract until such service or product is performed or delivered. ADOPTING THE ITEMS OF ANTICIPATED FUNDING SOURCES BASED ON
THE ESTIMATED 2022 TAX DIGEST AND AFFIRMING THAT EXPENDITURES
IN EACH DEPARTMENT MAY NOT EXCEED APPROPRIATIONS, AND
PROHIBITING EXPENDITURES FROM EXCEEDING ACTUAL FUNDING SOURCES:

WHEREAS, the Hall County Board of Commissioners ("Board") is the governing authority of said County; and

WHEREAS, the Board has been presented a Proposed Budget which is the County's financial plan for said fiscal year and includes all projected revenues and allowable expenditures; and

WHEREAS, an advertised public hearing has been held on the 2023 Proposed Budget, as required by State and Local Laws and regulations; and

WHEREAS, the Board resolves that the Proposed 2023 Budget shall in all cases apply to and control the financial affairs of County departments and all other agencies subject to the budgetary and fiscal control of the governing authority; and

WHEREAS, each of the Funds has a balanced budget, such that anticipated funding sources equal proposed expenditures; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that this 2023 Budget is hereby adopted specifying the anticipated funding sources for each Fund and making appropriations for proposed expenditures to the departments or organizational units named in each fund.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that expenditures of any Operating Budget Fund or Capital Budget Fund shall not exceed the appropriations authorized by this budget and amendments thereto or actual funding sources, whichever is less.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all expenditures of any Operating Budget Fund or Capital Budget Fund are subject to the policies as established by the Board of Commissioners and the County Administrator; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certain Capital Project Budgets are adopted as specified herein, as multiple-year project budgets as provided for in O.C.G.A. § 36-81-3(b)(2); and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Direct and Indirect Cost Allocations and Contributions as appropriated in any Fund within the various accounts of a Department or Agency are restricted for the express purpose as designated; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that transfers of appropriations in any Fund among the various accounts within a Department or Agency shall require only the approval of the Director of Financial Services so long as the total budget for each Department or Agency is not increased.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the 2023 Budget shall be amended so as to adapt to changing governmental needs during the fiscal year as follows: Any increase in appropriations in any Fund for a Department or Agency, whether through a change in anticipated revenues in any Fund or through a

transfer of appropriations among Departments or Agencies, shall require the approval of the Board of Commissioners, except in the following cases where authority is granted to:

1. The Director of Financial Services to:

- a. Allocate funds to appropriate Departments from insurance proceeds for the replacement or repair of damaged equipment items;
- b. Allocate funds from the established Capital Trials Reserve to appropriate Departments within the Judicial System for Capital Cases;
- c. Allocate funds from the established Elections Reserve to appropriate Departments for unexpected election expenses;
- d. Authorize preparation and submission of applications for grant funding; however, acceptance of all grant awards is subject to the approval of the Board of Commissioners;
- e. Adjust revenue and appropriation budgets between capital projects as necessary to incorporate grant awards approved by the Board;
- f. Approve transfers of appropriations within capital projects and allocate funds previously approved, or, as appropriate, transfer appropriations among fiscal years for projects as necessary to allow completion of each project and cover existing obligations/expenses in accordance with the intent and actions of the Board; however, in no case shall appropriations exceed actual available funding sources;
- g. Adjust revenue and appropriation budgets to incorporate collected revenue at the capital fund contingency project level and project specific levels in accordance with the intent and actions of the Board; however, in no case shall appropriations exceed actual available funding sources;
- h. Allocate allowable costs of services provided by a governmental unit on a centralized basis to its Departments and Agencies as defined by the Hall County Cost Allocation Plan;
- i. Allocate funds from Non-Departmental Operating Contingencies for amounts up to \$50,000 in accordance with the intent and actions of the Board of Commissioners; however, in no case shall appropriations exceed actual available funding sources; allocate funds from established reserves for leave balances at retirement, salary adjustments and reclassification to Department and Agency as necessary to provide funding for compensation actions, reductions in force and retirement incentives; transfer funds resulting from salary savings or transfer balances resulting from under expenditures in operating accounts to Non-Departmental reserves to fund accrued liabilities and expend funds within Non-Departmental reserve to reduce said accrued liabilities.

2. The County Administrator to:

- a. Allocate funds from Non-Departmental Operating Contingencies for amounts over \$50,000 in accordance with the intent and actions of the Board of Commissioners; however, in no case shall appropriations exceed actual available funding sources;
- b. Transfer funds from Department or Agency budgets to Contribution to Capital Projects for amounts up to \$50,000;
- c. Transfer funds within a capital fund from fund or program contingencies and/or savings in existing projects to establish new projects for amounts up to \$100,000;
- d. Transfer funds to establish new projects related to economic development within a capital fund from fund or program contingencies and/or savings in existing projects;
- e. Approve additional appropriations for and / or transfers within capital projects and / or operational needs as it relates to items approved for funding within The American Rescue Plan federal allocation for Hall County Government.

- f. Allocate funds from Non-Departmental Contingencies to Department or Agency budgets to provide funding for approved compensation actions;
- g. Reallocate funding among projects approved by the Board as allowed by authorizing documents.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that such amendments shall be recognized as approved changes to this resolution in accordance with O.C.G.A. 36-81-3. These authorities for transfers of appropriations shall not be used as an alternative to the normal budget process and are intended to be used only when necessary to facilitate the orderly management of projects and/or programs; transfers approved under these authorities may not be used to change the approved scope or the objective of any capital project.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the 2023 Budget contains 1,816.5 authorized positions. The Board shall approve increases in authorized positions. Vacant authorized positions may be reallocated within the same department or reassigned to another department and filled authorized positions may be reassigned at the same grade level between departments with the authorization of the County Administrator. The following compensation policies remain in effect for the 2023 Budget:

- 1. All vacant authorized positions require the approval of the Human Resources Director and Financial Services Director to recruit and hire;
- 2. County's Retirement Contributions of 2% to the 401A shall be included and up to an additional 6% match to the 401A account depending upon the employee's participation in the 457 account:
- 3. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board authorizes and directs any and all actions necessary to amend the County's Retirement Plan documents to appropriately reflect the contributions as stated above in item 2; and to modify the auto escalation increase as stated in the 457 plan documents;
- 4. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board shall, for the current budget year reserve a portion of the General Fund and the Special Revenue Funds' Fund Balance at a level equal to the accrued vacation liabilities of the County.
- 5. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board has authorized a \$ 5,000 supplement for each employee affected by the increase in salary for Superior Court Judges effective April 1, 2022.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that authority and authorization is delegated to the County Administrator and Human Resources Director to review, establish, modify, change, maintain, and implement policies, rules, structure, criteria, etc. to benefit plans, which shall include, but is not limited to, health premiums and retiree contributions for staff (both active and retiree status) and Board of Commissioners.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board shall maintain the General Fund, Fire Services Fund, Emergency Services Fund, Development Services Fund, and Parks & Leisure Services Fund; unreserved, undesignated fund balance at a level of at least fifteen to twenty-five percent and/or three months of the operating expenditures of each of the respective funds. The level of unreserved, undesignated fund balance in each fund will be reviewed by the Administrative Staff annually to ensure the appropriateness of reserve amounts and may be changed by the Board of Commissioners by written Resolution. Excess funds in the fund balance above the noted threshold may, with the approval of the Board, be transferred to the Capital Projects Fund to fund capital projects, or appropriated for other non-recurring purposes.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that budgets for all Operating Funds of the County are presented as Operating Budgets and/or funds expected to be expended during the current fiscal year. These budgets are the maintenance and operations of each of the Departments and Agencies within those funds.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board is adopting a Fiscal Year 2023 Capital Budget and five year Capital Improvement Plan with a total project length budget (see attached schedule.) There are separate funds maintaining line item budgets for Capital Outlay, representing large asset purchases that have a useful life of two (2) years or more and a value of greater than \$5,000. The various Capital Budgets represent the expected fiscal year 2023 expenditures and five subsequent fiscal years for the projects approved by the Board of Commissioners and/or voter referendum.

WHEREAS, Hall County has imposed and collected an additional penalty sum of 5 percent of the original fine for any criminal offense or any criminal ordinance violation; and

WHEREAS, the Hall County Financial Services Department has maintained these funds in a special revenue fund, segregating them, as required, from the County's general operating revenues; and

WHEREAS, the State has designated the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council its body to promulgate rules governing the approval of victim witness assistance programs, and having approved the programs of the Hall County Solicitor, Gateway Domestic Violence, My Sister's Place, Georgia Legal Aid – Gainesville, and Children's Center for Hope and Healing; and

WHEREAS, the each of the aforementioned programs has petitioned the Hall County Board of Commissioners for this limited funding in Fiscal Year 2023.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Hall County Board of Commissioners, in its process of reviewing and approving the Fiscal Year 2023 Budget, establishes the following funding levels for each of the victim witness programs from the local victim witness funds held or to be collected by the County for Fiscal Year 2023.

V. General Requirements:

- 1. The contractor shall be responsible for all work performed in support of this contract. Hall County allows the use of sub-contractors under this contract to fulfill the scope of work. Sub-contractors shall perform no work, unless pre-approved by the County. Sub-contractors should be disclosed within the bid at the time of bid submissions. If the bidder intends to use a sub-contractor to fulfill one entire segment of this contract, then the bidder should submit to the County references for the sub-contractor. Once the County has awarded the contract, the contractor cannot change sub-contractors without seeking pre-approval from the County. The County reserves the right to check all references and conduct background checks on any changes to sub-contractors and/or workers performing work under this contract. Sub-contractors shall be paid at the same labor rate and same materials marked up rate as stated on bid schedule. The contractor shall be wholly responsible for the quality of their sub-contractor's work. The contractor shall not award more than seventy-five (75) percent of the work to sub-contractors on any project, without prior approval of the County Representative.
- 2. The contractor shall provide all equipment, tools, and/or services required to complete specified work. Hall County will reimburse for custom equipment rentals at cost only, no markup allowed. All equipment rentals require pre-approval by County staff.
- 3. The Contractor shall not accept any request for Landscape Maintenance Services projects or change orders without communication with the Hall County Purchasing Division.
- 4. Any and all change order requests by the Contractor, must be submitted in writing and approved through the Hall County Purchasing Division. For any work performed outside the contract agreement for which compensation over and above the agreement occurs; there must be an accompanying approved change order. If work is done before issuance of change order approval and revised purchase order, the change may be rejected or denied for compensation.
- 5. Contractor shall provide copies of the following Licensing with their bid response:
 - Valid Business License
 - Commercial Applicators License
 - Contractors Application License
- 6. Mandatory Pre-Bid Site Inspections: Contractors shall be responsible for confirming site conditions and dimensions by attending a pre-bid site inspection on <u>Tuesday and Wednesday / September 14, 2021 and September 15, 2021</u> supervised by Fire Services Support Services Division Chief, Donald Petering. Each landscaped site must be visited and inspected. Your firm will be considered non-responsive if each site is not visited and inspected. Additional price revisions for recalculation of site dimensions will not be accepted after the award of contract.

VI. Specifications

1. Turf Care:

A. Mowing:

- Considering topography, the Contractor is required to use the proper moving equipment to provide a high-quality cut.
- At no time are any mowers to exceed 7 mph on any turf area due to the increased risk of an unexpected injury to staff. Mowers must have shrouds

in the down position at all times.

- No abrupt turning or sliding of equipment which results in turf damage shall occur.
- Contractor shall be responsible for mowing drainage ponds, drainage ditches, retention ponds, lakes, etc. to the "then existing" water's edge. The Contractor shall make mowing adjustments in response to fluctuating water levels.
- All mowed areas are to be cut with a rotary type mower with sharp blades giving the mowed area a neat and clean cut. Mowing equipment shall have cutting blades maintained in optimal condition to ensure grass is evenly cut without a "tearing" and/or scalping effect, which would negatively affect growth, health and appearance of grass. Grass clipping must not be discharged toward the water.

Mowing Restrictions:

- When operating equipment near pedestrian and vehicular traffic areas, the equipment operator must be aware of individuals and the flow of traffic. When pedestrians or vehicular traffic is present, Contractors staff must either stop work or angle equipment away from pedestrians or vehicular traffic. Pedestrians and vehicular traffic shall not be impeded, harmed, and/or damaged.
- All mowers should remain on grassed shoulders when in operation, without a deck being raised, so as not to create hazards for the traveling public or to interfere with the travel lanes.

B. Clippings Removal / Handling:

- "Litter/Debris Removal" Prior to and day of commencement of work (mowing, edging, trimming, and/or pruning) for each location indicated for each Service Area, the Contractor shall inspect the service area location and remove all litter and debris. The Contractor shall be required to remove all litter, trash, leaves, branches, and any and all other accumulated debris prior to mowing, edging, trimming, and/or pruning.
 - Litter and debris may consist of paper, plastic, boxes, bottles, cans, cigarette butts, tires, rubber pieces, mattresses, appliances, lumber, metal pieces, hubcaps, vehicle parts, fallen tree/bush branches, and palm fronds, leaves, trimmed vegetation on paved surfaces, animal carcasses, and other items not considered normal to turf.
- All vegetative debris, including, but not limited to, grass clipping, fallen tree/bush branches, pruning debris, shall be removed from County property after each service. The use of bagging attachments is recommended, but not required.
- All litter and debris must be deposited into trash bags prior to being placed into disposal vehicles. Larger pieces such as ladders, tires, mattresses, etc., may be directly deposited into disposal vehicles.

- Parking lots, driveways, walks, and any other similar areas present on the grounds shall be cleaned of cuttings and debris by use of power and/or hand equipment.
- Additional litter removal cycles may be requested by the County between mowing cycles. Contractors must include this service in the overall proposed costs. No additional line items or contract amendments will be issued for this service.

C. Trimming / Edging:

- Areas inaccessible by mowers shall be cut by string trimmers. Trimming shall
 be done around buildings, in front of, behind, under or around, and beyond
 roadside obstacles, around landscaped beds, along curb bullnoses, roadway
 curbs, walls, fences, established/planted trees, non-landscape area shrubs
 and wildflower areas to provide an attractive appearance.
 - Roadside Obstacles shall be defined as posts, buildings, lights, signs, tree, public utility installations, sprinkler heads, valves, and otherwise where needed and in concurrence with each mowing.
- Herbicides shall be used to treat buffer areas around the obstacles such as buildings, pole, etc. This is necessary to guard against damage by string trimmers.
- Trimming shall be done by hand carried equipment, or by equipment that will not cause damage to public or private property.
- If an area has inadequate vegetative cover; has damaged vegetation such as rutted or eroded areas; or has fragile soils that are likely to be rutted or eroded by mowing equipment, trimming of vegetation shall be conducted by hand carried trimming equipment.
- All cracks and joints in concrete, asphaltic concrete surfaces, and brickwork shall be cleaned by trimming and are to be blown and <u>sprayed</u> with herbicide.
- Maximum herbicidal kill line shall not exceed four (4) inches.

D. Aeration:

- All lawn areas shall be aerated annually.
- Coring type aerators shall be used.
- Fescue lawns shall be done in September.

E. Fertilization, Lime, and Mineral Placement:

- All landscaped areas require, adequate fertilization, lime, and mineral placement to ensure that all vegetation is healthy and growing vigorously. Amount of fertilizer, lime, and minerals depend on species, length of growing season, soils, and rainfall. Distribution should ensure an even supply of nutrients for the entire year. Nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium percentages must follow local recommendations.
- F. Over Seeding: Report must be submitted when the below is completed.
 - Fescue lawns shall be over seeded in the fall in conjunction with aeration and fertilization listed above.
 - K-31 tall fescue seed shall be used.
 - Seed shall be applied at a rate of three (3) to five (5) pounds per 1,000 sq. ft.

G. Application of Herbicide and Pesticide:

- Before any herbicide or pesticide is used on any County landscaped site, it
 must be pre-approved for use by the County Project Manager or their
 designee. Contractor must provide the County with updated listing of all
 chemicals and copies of Material Data Safety Sheets (MSDS) or Safety Data
 Sheets (SDS).
- Any time that herbicides or pesticides are being applied, the Contractor must at all times employ and have on-site an employee who has a valid State of Georgia pesticide license to perform and/or supervise the application of chemicals. Proper signage must be placed in sprayed areas prior to application to notify about upcoming application and also prior to leaving site after application. Signage must have essential Contractor contact info and spray ingredients listed on it.
- Herbicides and pesticides shall be of the best quality obtainable, properly labeled with guarantee analysis, and brought to each job site in the manufacture's original container, or appropriate and properly labeled secondary container. All shall be environmentally safe and comply with all federal, state and local environmental regulations, polices and statutes.
- No herbicide or pesticide is to be applied at, near or along any drainage inlets, pipes or grates. Do not spray if winds are sustained at 15 MPH or greater.
- A hood covering the herbicide or pesticide spray applicator wand must be used. Contractor shall take all precautionary measures to ensure all herbicide or pesticide treatments will not take place during high winds or rainstorms that may allow herbicide spray onto native or off target species. Pre-emergent and selective herbicides are recommended.
- Certain vegetation may not receive pre-emergent applications to avoid damage.
- Herbicides shall not be used in areas where their use will cause or promote erosion, i.e. near a body of body of water.
- No herbicide is to be applied around any ornamental grass species.
- Fescue lawns shall be treated with a pre-emergent herbicide in late winter and early spring.
- Post emergent herbicides shall be used to control broadleaf weeds during the growing season.

H. Disease and Insect Inspection:

 Disease and insect control of vegetation will be carried out when disease or insects are inflicting noticeable damage, reducing vigor of vegetation, or whenever the situation could be considered a bother to the public.

2. Landscape Plants, Planting Beds and Natural Areas:

A. Trimming and Pruning:

- Shrubs and trees of up to 4" caliper and 12' height, shall be trimmed and pruned by the Contractor.
- Limbs hanging into right of way shall be cut back in aesthetic fashion to ensure uniform mass. No branches shall overhang sidewalks.
- All dead laying branches/palm fronds or hanging dead branches/palm fronds must be removed with each service.

 Any sick, diseased or damaged vegetation must be punctually reported to the County Project Manager or their designee.

B. <u>Bedding for Landscaped Areas</u>:

- The perimeters of all planting beds and natural areas shall be trenched 4" deep and maintained year round.
- Remove and replace mulch and/or pine straw in beds two separate times per year; however, this amount may vary based upon needs of the County. The Project Manager shall provide reapplication dates to Contractor on an as needed basis.
- The color of mulch for landscape sites will vary. The Project Manager shall specify the desired color of mulch at each site before initial placement and before every mulch reapplication.

C. Weed Control:

- Planting beds and natural areas shall be treated with herbicide and hand weeded to remove weeds year round.
- Undergrowth in natural areas shall be controlled by mechanical and post emergent herbicidal means year round.

3. Traffic Control:

- At a minimum, abide by the <u>Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices</u>
 (<u>MUTCD</u>), current edition, for traffic control guidance. All service operations
 Shall install applicable Maintenance of Traffic (MOT) signage and cones.
- If for any reason that any equipment/vehicles should be in the traveling lane, a shadow vehicle with crash attenuator shall be used. The use of an Arrow Board may also be applicable according to the GDOT Index being utilized.
- Operations may be restricted when, in the opinion of the County Project Manager or their designee, the continuance of the work would seriously hinder traffic or is unsafe

4. Facility Restrictions:

- Fire Stations may be maintained between the hours of 7:00 A.M and 7:00 P.M., Monday Saturday.
- Fire Training Center/Vehicle Shop may be maintained between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M., Monday Friday
- Emergency Services Complex may be maintained between the hours of 7:00 A.M and 7:00 P.M., Monday Saturday
- No landscaping employees shall be allowed in the inside of a fire station living quarters or apparatus bay unless accompanied by a Fire Services representative.
- 5. <u>Service Locations</u>: The specifications of this RFQ/P cover the Hall County locations identified on Attachment A. Additional locations may be added as required by the County. A price revision will be negotiated for any approved site revisions.

6. Quality Acceptance:

Any areas that are not mowed due to insufficient overlap of the mowers

or depression of the vegetation by the mowing equipment will not be accepted and must be mowed again.

• Mowing Height to Be Followed:

Grass Type	Minimum Cut Height	Max Cut Height
Fescue	3"	3" to 4"
Bermuda or Zoysia	1"	2"

- Contractor shall report Performance deficiencies to the County within twenty (24) hours of identification.
- Correct Mowing Service Quality Acceptance deficiencies no later than twenty-four (24) hours following receipt of a County issued Contract Breach Notice.
- Scalping and rutting of the turf constitutes a performance deficiency and must be repaired at no cost to the County before the next mowing cycle.
- If the Contractor's work does not meet the completion target per the contract requirements, the Contractor shall promptly take such action as is necessary to remedy the delay, and shall submit promptly to the Department for approval a supplementary schedule or corrective action plan demonstrating the manner in which the delay will be remedied. Any increase in cost incurred in remedying a delay which is not excusable under the contract shall be borne by the Contractor.
- Damages: Damage to trees, plants, any components of the irrigation system, buildings, structures, parked vehicles or other property of the County or the public which occurs during the performance of contracted services, shall be reported immediately by the Contractor's Staff to the County Project Manager, or their designee. A written incident report must be completed and submitted by the Contractor within twenty-four (24) hours of the event. The County Project Manager or their designee will supply report forms, as required, for Contractors to report any damages. Damages during times that County Offices are closed shall be reported to the Police Department Duty Officer with a request to call the County Project Manager or their designee, as necessary.

If applicable, the County Project Manager or their designee, shall determine the cost of necessary repairs or replacement and advise the Contractor in writing. Where damages are involved, the County Project Manager and the Contractor shall mutually agree on an acceptable cost. The Contractor shall be afforded the opportunity to have repairs made or provide replacement as approved by the County or shall punctually issue reimbursement within a time frame approved by the County. All such matters shall be put forth in writing and signed by both parties.

4. Price Proposal

- A complete service price proposal is requested in a separate sealed envelope for the purpose of reviewing costs after the selection committee has reviewed all proposals.
- Price Proposal Scoring: The County may utilize lowest cost, lowest total cost, and total cost of ownership (TCO) or greatest savings to determine the most competitive cost proposal. The cost proposal may be scored on an overall basis or at the category/subcategory/line level (as applicable) relative to other proposals. The Contractor deemed to have the most competitive cost proposal overall, as determined by the County, will receive the maximum weighted score for the cost criteria. In the alternative, in the event the cost proposal is scored at the category, subcategory or line level, the County may assign the maximum score per category/subcategory/line for the most competitive proposal at that level. Other proposals will receive a percentage of the weighted score based on the percentage differential between the most competitive cost proposal and the specific proposal in question.

Note: Failure to meet the requirements of this section shall result in a proposer being deemed "non-responsive", and the entire submittal will be rejected.

All qualification submittals will be evaluated in accordance with applicable Hall County rules, regulations, and laws. Evaluation of firms submitting statements of qualification for this project will be based on qualifications, experience, and performance on past projects along with references. During the evaluation process, the selection committee and the County reserve the right, when it may serve the County's best interest, to request information or clarification from proposers or to allow corrections of errors or omissions.

IX. Selection Process:

The selection process will include a Selection Committee. The committee will evaluate the proposals and qualifications presented by the interested proposers (Step One). If necessary, the committee will schedule interviews of the "short-listed" consultants (Step Two). The County reserves the right to conduct site visits or to invite contractors to present their proposal factors/technical solutions to the Evaluation Team. Unless prohibited by federal, state, county, or local laws and/or ordinances, all Contractor requested presentations shall be performed in an in-person meeting. An oral presentation or product demonstration is not a negotiation and Contractors are not permitted to revise their responses as part of the presentation and/or demonstration. Cost proposals and related cost information must not be discussed during the oral presentation of the contractor's technical solution.

X. Evaluation and Award

X.1 Technical Proposal Introduction

All of the items described in this section are service levels and/or terms and conditions that the County expects to be satisfied by the selected contractor. Each contractor must indicate its willingness and ability to satisfy these requirements in the appropriate worksheets.

X.1.1 Mandatory Requirements

As specified with each requirement listed in the <u>Mandatory Response Worksheet</u>, the contractor must indicate whether its proposal meets the individual requirements by marking either a providing an answer and/or attaching the requested documents in the response block(s) provided. Responses to the Mandatory Response Worksheet are not scored. They are used to determine if a Contractor is both Responsible and Responsive.

X.1.2 Mandatory Scored Response

As specified with each requirement listed in the Mandatory Scored Response Worksheet, the contractor must indicate whether it will meet the individual requirement (if any) and provide a supporting narrative in the space provided. To be considered responsive, responsible and eligible for award, any and all requirements identified in the Mandatory Scored Response Worksheet must be met. There may be rare instances in which an item within the Mandatory Scored Response Worksheet does not create an individual requirement which must be met, but, instead, merely requires a response. All requirements labeled "Mandatory Scored" must be met by the contractor. Failure to meet any mandatory scored requirements may result in disqualification of the proposals. X.2 Cost Proposal Introduction

The cost proposal will be evaluated and scored in accordance with Section X of this RFQ/P. By submitting a response, the contractor agrees that it has read, understood, and will abide by the following instructions/rules:

- 1. The submitted cost proposal must include all costs of performing pursuant to the resulting contract; and
- 2. All quantities and/or estimates are for information or tabulation purposes only and;
- 3. No warranty or guarantee is expressed or implied on the volume of products and/or services that the County may require through the negotiated contract period and;

X.2.1 Cost Scoring

The County may utilize lowest cost, lowest total cost, and total cost of ownership (TCO) or greatest savings to determine the most competitive cost proposal. The cost proposal may be scored on an overall basis or at the category/subcategory/line level (as applicable) relative to other proposals. The contractor deemed to have the most competitive cost proposal overall, as determined by the County, will receive the maximum weighted score for the cost criteria. In the alternative, in the event the cost proposal is scored at the category, subcategory or line level, the County may assign the maximum score per category/subcategory/line for the most competitive proposal at that level. Other proposals will receive a percentage of the weighted score based on the percentage differential between the most competitive cost proposal and the specific proposal in question.

X.4 Selection and Award

The County reserves the right to: (a) waive minor irregularities, variances or non-material defects in a response; (b) reject any and all responses, in whole or in part; (c) request clarifications from Contractors; (d) request resubmissions from all Contractors; (e) award in whole, in part; or by line item and (f) take any other action as permitted by law. The County reserves the right to provide for similar and/or additional services from other companies if the County so deems necessary. If the County elects to exercise this right, the contract awarded under this solicitation shall remain in effect as for to all terms, agreements, and conditions without penalty or diminution of ongoing services as contained therein. Contractor agrees and understands that any contract awarded pursuant to this solicitation shall not be construed as an exclusive arrangement and further agrees that the County may, at any time, secure similar or identical services, or award more than one contract under this solicitation, at its sole option.

The primary intent of this RFQ/P is to identify a <u>single</u> source to provide all of the needed goods and/or services; however, the County reserves the right to make <u>split</u> awards.

XI. Quantities

None of the user departments, individually or collectively, shall be required to utilize a contract to any minimum or maximum amount during the life of a contract issued as a result of this invitation. The County, when entering into a service contract, reserves the right to solicit for bid any single service or group of like service needs covered by such a contract, separately from said contract when deemed advantageous to the County to do so.

XII. Exception to Contract and Order of Preference

Exception to Contract

By submitting a proposal, each contractor acknowledges its acceptance of the RFQ/P specifications, and the contract terms and conditions without change. If a contractor takes exception to a contract provision or Solicitation Requirement, the contractor must state the reason for the exception and state the specific contract language it proposes to include in place of the provision. Any exceptions to the contract must be uploaded and submitted as an attachment to the contractor's response. Proposed exceptions must not conflict with or attempt to preempt mandatory requirements specified in the RFQ/P.

In the event the contractor is selected for potential award, the contractor will be required to enter into discussions with the County to resolve any contractual differences before an award is made. These discussions are to be finalized and all exceptions resolved within the period of time identified in the schedule of events. Failure to resolve any contractual issues will lead to rejection of the contractor. The County reserves the right to proceed to discussions with the next best ranked contractor.

The County reserves the right to modify the contract to be consistent with the apparent successful offer, and to negotiate other modifications with the apparent successful contractor. Exceptions that materially change the terms or the requirements of the RFQ/P may be deemed non-responsive by the County, in its sole discretion, and rejected. Contract exceptions which grant the contractor an impermissible competitive advantage, as determined by the County, in its sole discretion, will be rejected. If there is any question whether a particular contract exception would be permissible, the contractor is strongly encouraged to inquire via written question submitted to the Issuing Officer prior to the deadline for submitting written questions as defined by the Schedule of Events.

Order of Preference

In the case of any inconsistency or conflict among the specific provisions of the executed contract (including any amendments accepted by both the County and the Contractor attached hereto), the RFQ/P (including any subsequent addenda and written responses to bidders' questions), and the Contractor's Response, any inconsistency or conflict shall be resolved as follows:

- (i) First, by giving preference to the specific provisions of the executed contract.
- (ii) Second, by giving preference to the specific provisions of the RFQ/P.
- (iii) Third, by giving preference to the specific provisions of the Contractor's Response, except that objections or amendments by a contractor that have not been explicitly accepted by the County in writing shall not be included in this Contract and shall be given no weight or consideration.

XIV. Terms and Conditions – Request for Qualifications/Pricing with Price Proposals

Changes: No change will be made to this Request for Qualifications/Pricing except by written
modification by the County Purchasing Office. Requests for interpretation or changes must be
in writing and received at least (10) ten calendar prior to the time set for opening of the
proposals.

The County reserves the right to order work changes in the nature of additions, deletions or modifications without invalidating the Contract, and agrees to make corresponding adjustments in the contract price and time for completion. Any and all changes must be authorized by a written contract amendment issued by the County's Purchasing Division. Work shall be changed and the contract price and completion time shall be modified only as set out in the written change order. Any adjustment in the contract price resulting in a credit or a charge to the County shall be determined by mutual agreement of the parties before starting the work involved in the change.

- 2. Signing of Proposal: Failure to sign your proposal in "original form" will force your bid to be declared as "non-responsive" and not considered for award.
- 3. Bid Acceptance Time: Bids requiring acceptance by the County in less than ninety (90) calendar days could be rejected, unless so stated and accepted by the County.

- 5. Withdrawal of Bids: Bids may be withdrawn by written request only, if the request is received prior to the time and date set for the opening of bids. No bid may be withdrawn for a period of ninety (90) days after time has been called on the date of opening.
- 6. Bonds and/or Security Deposit:
 - 6.1. Independent Contractors: The proposer represents to Hall County that he is fully experienced and properly qualified to perform the functions provided herein and that he/she is properly equipped, organized, and financed to perform such functions. The proposer shall finance his/her own operations hereunder, shall operate as an independent contractor and not as an agent of hall county and nothing contained in this Request for Qualifications/Pricing or a contract resulting from same shall be construed to constitute the proposer or any of his/her employees, servants, agents, or subcontractors as a partner, employee, servant, or agent of the county nor shall either party have any authority to bind the other in any respect; it being intended that each shall remain an independent contractor.
- 22. Assignment of Contractual Rights: It is agreed that the successful proposer will not assign, transfer, convey, or otherwise dispose of a contract that results from this Request for Qualifications/Pricing or his/her right, title, or interest in or to the same, or any part thereof, without written consent of the County.

- 24. Change Orders: Any and all change order requests by the successful bidder must be approved through the Hall County Purchasing Policy. Any work performed outside the contract agreement for which compensation over and above the agreement occurs; there must be an accompanying approved change order. If work is done before change order approval, the change may be rejected or denied for compensation.
- 25. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY Chapter 1

Hall County's Comprehensive Plan, Hall County Forward, is a policy document that presents the community's primary goals for achieving its long-range vision for growth and development in the unincorporated portions of the county. This executive summary presents Plan Highlights and Putting the Plan into Action. The first section, Plan Highlights, provides a brief overview of the 'Community Vision,' including key goals organized by 'Vision Theme.' Putting the Plan into Action summarizes the steps and players involved in the plan's implementation.

Plan Highlights

Recognizing Hall County will continue to grow in population at a steady pace, this plan is intended to balance opportunities for economic growth with the desire to maintain rural character. This plan also acknowledges the need to plan in more specific detail for green space protection, historic resource preservation and promotion, and coordinated economic development.

The Community Vision, as described by detailed strategies in Chapter 3 and the Future Development Guide in Chapter 4, are summarized below by primary goals organized by three Vision Themes: Social and Economic Development, Development Patterns and Resource Conservation. These themes are intended to organize and represent citizens' ideas and concerns related to the topics of economic development, community revitalization, housing, land use, natural resources and historic resources.

Social and Economic Development (SED) Goals

SED Goal 1: Supporting existing businesses and focus recruitment efforts on technology businesses and industry

SED Goal 2: Stimulate revitalization activities and redevelopment of aging properties

Resource Conservation (RC) Goals

RC Goal 1: Protect water resources and improve water quality

RC Goal 2: Support and partner with local organizations to protect the environment

RC Goal 3: Develop and implement a coordinated plan for a linked system of protected greenspace and trails

RC Goal 4: Promote and protect Hall County's history

Development Patterns (DP) Goals

DP Goal 1: Promote rural development patterns in the North and East Hall areas

DP Goal 2: Maintain greenspace in new development

DP Goal 3: Protect and enhance established neighborhoods



Putting the Plan into Action

Adopting a comprehensive plan may seem like the end of the process, but actually it represents the beginning of a new phase – implementation. Implementing the plan requires an understanding of the plan recommendations and tools available for putting the plan to work for Hall County. In short, the plan is a tool that provides a policy basis for:

- Budgeting
- Local land use regulation
- Coordination among local governments, state and federal agencies, utilities, regional agencies
- Detailed plans for specific functions
- Promotion and economic development



Budgeting

The Implementation Program (see Chapter 5) outlines the overall strategy for achieving the Community Vision for future development and for implementing the Future Development Guide. A 5-year Community Work Program (CWP) prioritizes the recommended strategies and assigns responsible parties to each. As presented, it provides elected officials and staff with a prioritized "to-do" list in addition to providing a policy guide.

The Board of Commissioners and administrative staff should consult the CWP each year when developing their annual budget. The CWP prioritizes each strategy and can guide future investment. Items listed in the CWP include recommended programs, regulations, studies, community improvements or investments, or other programs/initiatives.

Land Use Regulation

The policy basis for land use regulation occurs in two specific ways. First, the Future Development Guide provides a tool for evaluating rezoning requests. Second, local zoning and subdivision regulations sometimes require amendments based on the Comprehensive Plan recommendations.

Future Development Map

The Future Development Guide (see Chapter 4) consists of the Future Development Map and Character Area Policy. The Future Development Map assigns a unique Character Area to each parcel in Hall County. The Character Area Policy describes with text and illustrations the vision for growth and development for each Character Area shown on the map. The Future Development Map is used to guide future rezonings; proposed zone change requests are reviewed for consistency with the Character Area Policy associated with the Future Development Map.

Zoning and Subdivision Regulations

Evaluation and adoption of changes to regulations that address land use and development is a common follow-up after adoption of a comprehensive plan. The purpose of any updates to the Hall County Zoning Ordinance and/or Subdivision Regulations is to ensure that local regulatory tools support the implementation of the Future Development Map and specified goals in this plan.

Intergovernmental Coordination

The policy basis for coordination occurs in two major components. First, county departments should coordinate their plans with that of the Comprehensive Plan. Second, coordination should occur between Hall County government and other entities, whether at the local (public or private), regional, or state level.

Public Service Delivery

The County should review or develop service plans to ensure that they support the goals of the Comprehensive Plan. This includes ensuring that future facilities are planned to meet the service demand promoted by the plan. For example, future planning to offer suburban-scale sewer services should be consistent with areas shown on the Future Development Map (and described in the Future Development Guide) as supporting residential and employment growth.

Coordination

This plan provides the opportunity for the County, municipalities and other entities to view future needs from a common policy playbook. For example, private developers, the Georgia Department of Transportation (GDOT), and economic development agencies can each see that the community has designated specific areas for future growth and specific areas for rural preservation. As a result, these entities should be able to work together to ensure that their projects and policies support the Community Vision.

Detailed Plans for Specific Functions

Functional plans address specific government services such as parks, recreation, and economic development. This plan recommends preparation of several stand-alone plans that are coordinated with and supplement the Comprehensive Plan. These individual plans can address issues and concerns raised by stakeholders during the public planning process in greater detail than a comprehensive plan.

Parks and Greenspace Master Plan

An expanded update to the 2008 Hall County Parks and Recreation Master Plan can provide an opportunity to address and integrate greenspace and trails into the county-wide plan. This comprehensive update to the existing recreation plan can help Hall County identify potential opportunities for permanently protecting greenspace and evaluate greenway opportunities and trail connections, including expansion of the Highlands to Islands Trail system.

Economic Development Plan

A county-wide plan can provide a mechanism for the County and its municipalities to coordinate economic development goals and efforts in conjunction with the Greater Hall Chamber of Commerce. In general, an Economic Development Plan sets policy direction for economic growth and identifies strategies, programs, and projects to improve the economy.


Historic Preservation Plan

A Historic Preservation Plan can help Hall County protect historic resources and identify ways to promote its heritage as an economic development tool. Both the 2012 Historic Resources Survey of unincorporated Hall County (prepared by the University of Georgia's College and Environment Design) and the public-private Healan's-Head's Mill restoration project can inform the planning process.

East-West Corridor Study

An East-West Corridor Study in the North Hall area can determine the viability of a new connection to relieve congestion on Dawsonville Highway and also establish next steps in project development. This study could be conducted in partnership with the Gainesville-Hall Metropolitan Planning Organization, the federally mandated transportation planning agency.

INTRODUCTION Chapter 2



Hall County is projected to experience continued growth and investment over the next 20 years. In an effort to meet the community's future needs, the County coordinated the efforts of its citizens to create a community vision for future development that will be guided by the County's Comprehensive Plan: Hall County Forward.

Purpose

Hall County Forward represents the growth and development policy for unincorporated Hall County, as expressed by a Future Development Map and supporting goals and implementation strategies. This plan also serves the purpose of meeting the intent and requirements of the Georgia Department of Community Affairs' (DCA) "Standards and Procedures for Local Comprehensive Planning," as established on March 1, 2014. Preparation of a plan in accordance with these standards is an essential requirement in maintaining status as a Qualified Local Government (QLG). QLG status allows communities to be eligible for state assistance programs. This plan allows Hall County to retain its QLG status; each municipality has its own comprehensive plan that it maintains and updates.

Scope

This plan addresses economic development, housing, natural and historic resources, land use and development patterns, and community revitalization. These 'planning elements' are organized into three Vision Themes (see Chapter 3) for the purpose of expressing community goals and implementing strategies. They are addressed as individual components in the Community Assessment (see Appendix C), which provides a summary of existing local conditions and trends that were used in the identification of community needs and opportunities.

It is important to note that the topic of transportation is addressed in the Gainesville-Hall Regional Transportation Plan: 2020 Update (RTP Update). The Regional Transportation Plan is the Gainesville-Hall Metropolitan Planning Organization's transportation strategy for the region and is incorporated by reference in this plan to satisfy DCA's "Standards and Procedures for Local Comprehensive Planning" related to transportation.

Why We Plan

Comprehensive planning is an important management tool for promoting a strong, healthy community. A comprehensive plan is a significant policy document that guides the physical development of a community it can be used to promote orderly and rational development so the county can remain physically attractive and economically viable while preserving important natural and historic resources.

The comprehensive plan allows the community to become more certain about where development will occur, what it will be like, when it will happen, and how the costs of development will be met. It helps the County invest its money wisely in infrastructure such as roads, sewer service, parks and green space, and other facilities to maintain and improve residents' quality of life as well as economic development prospects.

Hall County Forward represents these and additional ideas discussed during the public participation process. It lists county-specific needs and opportunities, supporting goals and strategies, desired development patterns and land uses, and a 5-year prioritized work program to implement the plan.

Community Participation and Plan Development

Creating a functional comprehensive plan begins with defining a common vision for the future development of the community. A community vision is the overall image of what the community wants to be and how it wants to look at some point in the future. It is the starting point for creating a plan and actions to implement the plan. A successful visioning process requires meaningful participation from a wide range of community stakeholders.

Visioning Process

The Visioning Process, or citizen participation process, for this update of Hall County Forward included participation from residents and stakeholders. Two public workshops, two stakeholder committee meetings, and an online survey provided opportunities for input, as described in this section.

Kick-Off Meeting (Public Meeting #1)

The county-wide Kick-Off Meeting took place on March 14, 2022 at the Hall County Government Center. The planning process, schedule, and future public involvement opportunities were presented to the public, who were invited to provide comment and ask questions about the process. The comments along with the results of a map exercise identifying assets, opportunities, and areas for improvement from the meeting can be viewed in Appendix B.

Draft Plan Open House (Public Meeting #2)

The draft plan open house meeting was held on April 11, 2022 at the Hall County Government Center. The planning process, schedule, and a review of previous community input were presented to the public. The public was invited to ask questions, provide comments, and to participate in an input activity to gather information for the next phase of the plan update. A summary of the comments received can be viewed in Appendix B.

Community Survey

A 5-question online community survey was developed and promoted as another forum for providing public input. It was open between March 14 and April 11, 2022, and hard copies were made available at the Kick-Off Meeting and Draft Plan Open House. 116 responses were received. The results of the survey can be viewed in Appendix B.

Outreach Methods

Throughout the planning process, print and online flyers were created and distributed to announce and promote public meetings. Meeting announcements and presentations, as well as draft plan materials, were posted on the Hall County Government website.

Chapter Summaries

The sequence of chapters in this plan is structured to follow the planning process, which can be thought of as answering the questions "Where do we want to be in 20 years?" followed by "How do we get there?" The plan is organized into the following chapters:

The chapters that follow this introductory chapter are summarized below:

Chapter 3: Community Vision

The Community Vision reflects the community's vision for growth and development for the next 20 years. This vision, which was developed with an extensive public visioning process, is defined by Vision Themes. The Vision Themes organize primary needs and opportunities and corresponding goals and strategies under the following headings: Development Patterns, Resource Conservation, and Social and Economic Development. These themes address the planning topics of land use and housing (Development Patterns), natural and historic resources (Resource Conservation), and economic development and neighborhood revitalization. The listed strategies are used to create the Implementation Program chapter.

Chapter 4: Future Development Guide

The Future Development Guide defines the community's desired development patterns and guides future decision-making related to the physical development of the community. It is comprised of a Future Development Map and supporting Character Area Policy.

The Future Development Map section presents the recommended character areas for the entire county. The Character Area Policy section describes the intent, general characteristics, application, primary land uses, and design principles for each Character Area, which are areas with unique quality worth preserving or areas that have been identified with the potential to develop into something new or different.

Chapter 5: Implementation Program

The Implementation Program identifies specific actions necessary to achieve the community's vision. This chapter incorporates the strategies presented within the Community Vision and Future Development Guide chapters into a plan of action. The Implementation Program includes ordinances, programs, community improvements or investments, additional plans or studies, administrative systems and financing arrangements or other initiatives to be put in place to implement the Comprehensive Plan. The Community Work Program prioritizes strategies to be implemented over the next five years and assigns responsible parties, identifies potential funding sources, and provides a timeline for completion of each. Chapter 5 also details the specifics of maintaining the Comprehensive Plan in accordance with state requirements.

COMMUNITY VISION Chapter 3

Hall County is a growing community with unique needs and opportunities related to its development patterns and projected future growth. The Community Vision chapter uses a series of Vision Themes to describe a shared 'community vision' - what the community envisions for its future - in terms of identified needs and opportunities that are addressed by recommended goals and strategies.

Vision Themes

The Vision Themes organize primary needs/opportunities identified during the planning process as needing to be addressed, followed by goals and strategies that in turn address these needs and opportunities. Vision Themes represent the ideas and concerns of participants in the planning process and narrow the big picture vision to specific strategies that aim to make the Community Vision a reality. Recommended strategies are presented in the Implementation Program chapter as specific action items to be undertaken by the County.

Community Vision Themes:

- Social and Economic Development
- Development Patterns
- Resource Conservation

These themes generally address the planning topics of land use and housing (Development Patterns), natural and historic resources (Resource Conservation), and economic development and community revitalization (Social and Economic Development).

Social and Economic Development (SED)

Primary Needs and Opportunities

Promote opportunities for clean industry, higher-paying jobs, and small businesses – During the Visioning Process, many economic development issues or ideas touched on these themes. The Greater Hall Chamber of Commerce is the economic development 'agency' for all of the county and has numerous programs, initiatives and committees that routinely address ways to recruit and retain businesses and train the local workforce to compete for desired new employers. The county and municipalities support the Chamber's efforts, which includes provision of public infrastructure such as sewer. Further coordination among the Chamber and local governments in Hall County could result in a county-wide Economic Development Plan that would address specific topics of concern or interest to each jurisdiction.

Revitalize existing commercial/industrial areas - Revitalization of existing areas and buildings, in addition to focused expansion of new industrial uses, was identified during the Visioning Process as a need. Areas include those that were identified in the 2012 Gainesville-Hall County Urban Redevelopment Plan; they include the Chicopee Mill area on Atlanta Highway and Athens Highway, both of which are currently not within the boundaries of approved Opportunity Zones or Less Developed Census Tracts. Such a designation could provide tax incentives for businesses to locate or expand by creating a minimum number of jobs.

Facilitate neighborhood revitalization efforts – During the development of Hall County Forward, a neighborhood level study of the Morningside Heights area was undertaken to identify residents' concerns and goals for the traditionally underserved community east of downtown Gainesville. Recommendations for the area are intended to be implemented as a coordinated effort between Hall County and the Concerned Citizens of Gainesville/Hall County civic organization, a group of neighborhood residents that represent the study area of Morningside Heights, Black and Cooley Drive, and Gaines Mill Road.

Goals and Strategies

SED Goal 1: Support existing businesses and focus recruitment efforts on technology business and industry

SED Strategy 1.1: Continue to work with the Greater Hall Chamber of Commerce in support of their economic development activities, including workforce development initiatives with local education partners and the Existing Industry Program, which includes the Small Business Council

SED Strategy 1.2: Evaluate development review and permitting processes to assess the ease of "doing business" in Hall County

SED Strategy 1.3: Extend sewer to targeted business/industrial development locations, consistent with the Future Development Map and the county's sewer system master plans

SED Strategy 1.4: Utilize the Comprehensive Plan in the process to update the South Hall County Sewer System Master Plan and the North Hall County Sewer System Master Plan

SED Strategy 1.5: Partner with the Chamber of Commerce and the Hall County Joint Municipal Association to prepare a county-wide Economic Development Plan

SED Strategy 1.6: Coordinate with the Lake Lanier Convention and Visitors Bureau to promote agritourism in the county

SED Goal 2: Stimulate revitalization activities and redevelopment of aging properties

SED Strategy 2.1: Coordinate with the Georgia Department of Community Affairs to apply the Less Developed Census Tract designation in the Chicopee Mill area, which would allow businesses that create five or more jobs to participate in the Georgia Job Tax Credit Program

SED Strategy 2.2: Submit a new application to the Georgia Department of Community Affairs for Opportunity Zone designation for the Candler Road area, which includes the Athens Highway corridor in the Morningside community; such a designation allows new or existing businesses to benefit from tax credits upon creating a minimum number of jobs

Development Patterns (DP)

Primary Needs and Opportunities

Balanced future development that preserves rural areas and greenspace – Protection of North and East Hall's rural character, including farms and greenspace, was cited as an issue during the Visioning Process. As Hall County grows, there will be pressures on these rural areas to transition to neighborhood development at suburban densities, especially due to current zoning that sets a minimum lot size of 1.5 acres in most agriculture and residential zoning districts. Given the uncertainty of amending the zoning ordinance to significantly increase minimum lot size requirements, focus can be paid to land use policy (as illustrated by the Future Development Map and the Future Development Guide), regulations (open space requirements and design; tree protection), sewer infrastructure planning, and research of greenspace preservation measures to preserve rural areas.

Protect existing neighborhoods while supporting future home options – Encroachment of commercial uses on neighborhoods and loss of open space and tree cover are viewed by the community as having the potential to impair the local quality of life. During the Visioning Process, many residents also indicated a desire to promote larger lot sizes and single-family homes, while many others identified a real need for housing options. Local regulations can address these issues to an extent; however, coordination with other groups and local governments to pool resources and ideas related to county-wide housing issues and needs may be beneficial.

Promote quality corridor development - Concerns along major road corridors include encroachment of commercial or industrial uses into residential areas, as well as aesthetic concerns due to predominant outdoororiented uses (outdoor displays, storage, sales) along several commercial corridors in the county. In addition, future corridors that may be needed to reduce traffic congestion should be designed to consider the context of existing land uses, environmental features, and the built environment (i.e. "context-sensitive design"). One example is a potential east-west connector to serve as an expansion to the planned Sardis Connector from SR 60/Thompson Bridge Road to SR 365.

Goals and Strategies

DP Goal 1: Preserve rural character and development patterns in North and East Hall areas

DP Strategy 1.1: Use the Future Development Map to guide planning for sewer infrastructure projects, limiting future service to targeted development locations and avoiding areas intended to support agricultural and low-density residential uses as well as Conservation-designated areas

DP Strategy 1.2: Evaluate and promote options for the permanent conservation of land during the development of the Parks and Greenspace Master Plan (an update of the 2008 Parks and Recreation Master Plan)

DP Strategy 1.3: Require an "Agricultural Use Notice" statement on final plats to inform the owner, occupants and uses of a property adjacent to an agricultural use or zoning classification that there may be potential impacts from lawful agricultural operations; consider similar language for zoning proposals and building permits

DP Strategy 2.1: Evaluate the effectiveness of the County's tree protection standards and Conservation Subdivision Design Option and identify potential amendments, as needed

DP Strategy 2.2: Incorporate minimum open space requirements into the Planned Development zoning classifications (residential, commercial, office and industrial)

DP Goal 3: Protect and enhance established neighborhoods

DP Strategy 3.1: Evaluate minimum buffer standards in the Zoning Ordinance to ensure they are sufficient where commercial or industrial uses abut residential properties

DP Strategy 3.2: Maintain residential use (or agricultural) as the primary land use along roadways that do not have a Corridor designation on the Future Development Map

DP Goal 4: Create quality new development

DP Strategy 4.1: Amend regulations to incorporate common conditions of zoning (conditions that are routinely approved as part of a rezoning and are not currently found in the Zoning Ordinance) that are used to ensure a high quality of development and the provision of adequate infrastructure by an applicant

DP Strategy 4.2: Evaluate use and outdoor storage and display standards of the Gateway Corridor Overlay District to ensure uses requiring outdoor storage/display are appropriately located and screened

DP Strategy 5.1: Review existing regulations for impediments to special housing needs and opportunities such as senior housing, accessory dwelling units, and affordable housing

DP Strategy 5.2: Discuss and coordinate housing-related needs and initiatives with the City of Gainesville, Habitat for Humanity, and other public or private stakeholders to maximize the use of financial and staff resources

DP Goal 6: Coordinate transportation and land use planning

DP Strategy 6.1: Prepare an East-West Corridor Study to determine the viability of a new connection for relieving congestion on Dawsonville Highway and also establish next steps in project development

DP Strategy 6.2: Use the 2014 Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan to identify and prioritize projects that can connect neighborhoods with parks, schools, or other activity centers

Resource Conservation (RC)

Primary Needs and Opportunities

Protection of water resources - Given the significance of Lake Lanier, protecting its water quality is a primary concern of many property owners, residents, business owners, and users of the lake. The County has local development standards in place for protecting water quality and it complies with the Regional Water Plan (Metropolitan North Georgia Water Planning District). However, additional coordinated efforts can help to prevent pollutants from entering the lake and its tributaries, especially as the county continues to grow. These efforts include partnerships with local organizations on environmental initiatives and studies.

Protection of greenspace – During the Visioning Process, many citizens expressed an interest in permanently protecting some areas of the county from development, resulting in property remaining in its natural state or being utilized for trails or other passive recreation. An expanded update to the county's 2008 Park and Recreation Master Plan can provide a mechanism for addressing greenspace needs, tools, and funding sources. The plan can also provide an opportunity to integrate ideas and ongoing efforts of the Chamber of Commerce's Greenspace Committee with county level planning for parks and recreation.

Potential for heritage tourism – The Healan's-Heads' Mill restoration project and Cherokee Bluffs Park promote awareness of the county's history and have the potential to be a regional draw. Development of a Historic Preservation Plan, which would utilize a 2012 Historic Resources Survey among other resources, can identify additional ways of protecting and promoting the county's history in order to contribute to residents' quality of life and to the local economy.

RC Goal 1: Protect water resources and improve water quality

RC Strategy 1.1: Implement the recurring County-specific action items in the Metropolitan North Georgia Water Planning District's (MNGWPD) Water Resources Management Plan (the 2009 Watershed Management Plan, Water Supply and Water Conservation Management Plan, and Wastewater Management Plan elements are currently in effect; a 2017 update is in final draft form)

RC Strategy 1.2: Evaluate the steps needed to return highly treated wastewater to Lake Lanier to support long-term sustainable water use, as recommended in the Metropolitan North Georgia Water Planning District's (MNGWPD) Water Resources Management Plan (April 2017 draft)

RC Strategy 1.3: Participate in the update to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' Master Plan for Lake Lanier; the plan is intended to provide guidance for the management, protection, and preservation of the lake's environment while allowing a balanced use of the shoreline

RC Strategy 1.4: Evaluate opportunities to place additional litter traps in waterways (similar to the Flat Creek Bandalong Litter Trap installed by Hall County/City of Gainesville in 2016) to curb the amount of pollutants entering Lake Lanier

RC Strategy 1.5: Review the zoning and subdivision regulations for any impediments to low impact development (LID) or 'green infrastructure' approaches to stormwater management, which can lower the amount of untreated stormwater discharging to surface waters; assess findings to identify potential regulatory modifications

RC Strategy 1.6: Update local wastewater master plans to address both sewer and septic systems in accordance with the requirements of the regional Water Resources Management Plan

- RC Strategy 1.7: Coordinate with the Georgia Environmental Protection Division (GAEPD) on the Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) implementation plan for Lake Lanier; the GAEPD plan is intended to outline stakeholder actions that can address existing water quality impairments
- RC Strategy 1.8: Research the requirements needed to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program's (NFIP) Community Rating System (CRS) Program to potentially reduce flood insurance rates for property owners
- RC Strategy 1.9: Establish buffer requirements for the portion of the Chattahoochee River not under the jurisdiction of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, consistent with the Georgia Department of Natural Resources' rules for river corridor protection
- RC Goal 2: Support and partner with local organizations to protect the environment
 - RC Strategy 2.1: Maintain partnerships with organizations that monitor water quality of Lake Lanier and its tributaries, including Chattahoochee Riverkeepers and the University of North Georgia
 - RC Strategy 2.2: Promote public awareness of annual events such as Lake Lanier Association's Shore Sweep and Keep Hall Beautiful's Team UP 2 Clean UP Event
 - RC Strategy 2.3: Leverage SPLOST funds to address shoreline erosion and abandoned vessel removal on Lake Lanier, working in conjunction with Lake Lanier Association, the Georgia Department of Natural Resources, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and private donors
 - RC Strategy 2.4: Partner with and promote Hall County Schools' recycling events as well as Keep Hall Beautiful's recycling initiatives
 - RC Strategy 2.5: Partner with the City of Gainesville on pollution prevention activities, including public outreach through TV 18 and online media, and identifying additional opportunities for litter traps in waterways that have public access
 - RC Strategy 2.6: Continue to support and promote Green Hall Alliance and its efforts to enhance public awareness and support of environmental stewardship and sustainability practices in the community
 - RC Strategy 2.7: Coordinate with the local office of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) National Resources Conservation Office to identify eligible projects for federal Section 319(h) Nonpoint Source Implementation Grants; grant awards can fund projects that will reduce pollutants and improve water quality in impaired waters
 - RC Strategy 2.8: Maintain high standards in county-wide recycling efforts and protecting the environment by utilizing innovative ideas to operate and maintain the county landfill
- RC Goal 3: Develop and implement a coordinated plan for a linked system of protected greenspace and trails
 - RC Strategy 3.1: Prepare a Parks and Greenspace Master Plan (a comprehensive update to the county's 2008 Parks and Recreation Plan), resulting in recommendations that will address parks, recreation, trails and greenspace
 - RC Strategy 3.2: Create a process that identifies land for permanent protection based upon a standard set of criteria, such as the recreational, ecological, environmental, aesthetic, cultural, historic or agricultural

- value; this process will be developed and described in the Parks and Greenspace Master Plan

 - RC Strategy 4.1: Prepare a Historic Preservation Plan to promote general awareness of historic resources throughout unincorporated Hall County, prioritize protection for different resources, and encourage heritage tourism as an economic development tool

 - RC Strategy 4.5: Coordinate with the Convention and Visitors Bureau and the Chamber of Commerce to promote the Healan's-Head's Mill Visitor's and Heritage Center upon its completion.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENT GUIDE Chapter 4




A key component of the comprehensive planning process is the creation of the Future Development Guide. The guide includes the Future Development Map, which depicts unique Character Areas that describe the type of development and land uses desired for particular areas. This guide – in addition to the goals and strategies presented in Chapter 3 – explains and helps illustrate the 'community vision' for growth and development in Hall County.

The Future Development Guide includes the three section shown below:

- Future Development Map
- Character Area-Based Planning
- Character Area Policy

Future Development Map

The Future Development Map is used to identify the geographic location of the Character Areas within Hall County. The Character Areas are described in detail later in this chapter. The Future Development Map is intended to help guide decision making related to the physical location of development and where the most appropriate scale and intensity of development should occur. While the map recommends land uses and development patterns for a 20-year planning horizon, it is important that it is regularly reviewed to determine if amendments are needed based on changing market and demographic trends or local goals. At a minimum, the plan is required by the Georgia Department of Community Affairs to be updated every five years.



Relationship of Future Development Map to Zoning

County zoning consists of a zoning map that assigns a zoning classification (one of the county's agricultural, residential, commercial, industrial or planned development districts) to every property. A zoning ordinance describes these classifications, including their allowable land uses and requirements for how buildings, parking, landscaping, signs and other site features may be placed on a parcel.

The zoning map and zoning ordinance provide properties in Hall County with certain rights to development, while the Comprehensive Plan's Future Development Map serves as a guide to the future development of property. The Future Development Map (see page 18) and Character Area Policy (beginning below) should be used as a guide for future rezoning decisions undertaken by the County.

Character Area Based Planning

Character Area based planning focuses on the way an area looks and how it functions. Tailored strategies are applied to each area, with the goal of enhancing the existing character/function or promoting a desired new character for the future.


Character Areas are organized by Community Elements. These elements represent the four basic types of development - the primary 'building blocks' of a community - and include Open Space, Neighborhoods, Centers and Corridors. The table below summarizes general characteristics of each element as well as their application on the Future Development Map as specific Character Areas. The Character Areas are further described beginning on page 21.

Character Area Policy

Character Areas shown on the Future Development Map are described on the following pages. Each page presents a 'Character Area Policy' that represents and describes the Character Area in terms of the desired development pattern and supporting implementation strategies.

Each Character Area Policy presented in the narrative incorporates the following components:

- **Intent** describes the policy intent of each Character Area, specifically to preserve, maintain, enhance and/or create a desired character.
- **General Characteristics** provides a general overview of desired development pattern in terms of characteristics that are more specifically addressed in the Design Principles.
- **Application** provides a general description of areas where the Character Areas can be found or appropriately applied based on characteristics of the land and infrastructure.
- **Primary Future Land Uses** lists appropriate land uses that support the desired mix and/or type of land uses in a Character Area.
- Design Principles describes the form, function and character of physical elements of the Character Area. This includes density/ intensity, greenspace, transportation and infrastructure (public utilities).
- **Strategies** are the implementation measures needed to achieve the desired development patterns for the character area. They reference strategies identified in Chapter 3: Community Vision.

Conservation

Intent: PRESERVE environmentally sensitive areas, park land, and dedicated greenspace (open space and greenways) maintained in its natural state.

General Characteristics: Conservation Areas are public or privately- owned properties intended to be protected for natural area conservation and passive recreation purposes. They are areas of the county not suited for development, aside from passive recreation and historic interpretation uses.

Application: Conservation Areas are located throughout Hall County, represented primarily by floodplain areas, park land, and publicly and privately owned land in its natural state (green space). The areas include United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) land around Lake Lanier, as well as the historic Healan's-Head's Mill property that is owned by Hall County and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Rural

Intent: PRESERVE the existing rural character, including agricultural uses and large-lot residential uses, as well as natural and historic features.

General Characteristics: Rural Areas are characterized by agricultural and very lowdensity single-family residential uses. The development pattern includes larger areas of undeveloped or cultivate land with large distances between buildings and deep setbacks from two-lane roads. Natural features include extensive tree cover and open space areas due to limited development, as well as waterways that include the Chattahoochee River, the Cedar Creek Reservoir and streams.

Application: Rural Areas primarily represent private agricultural, large-lot residential or undeveloped land in the northeastern and east portions of Hall County, which includes the North Oconee Watershed Protection District. These areas are located outside of the County's sewer service area. Extension of sewer lines into Rural Areas should be discouraged in order to limit development pressures on the area. Future development should be compatible with the rural character, which includes a high degree of open space and greenspace. This includes the use of conservation subdivisions to maximize the amount of open space in new residential developments that develop under current zoning that allows minimum lot sizes of 1.5 acres.

Rural Residential

Intent: PRESERVE the established residential/ rural character and **CREATE** a transition between Rural Areas and development in Residential Areas.

General Characteristics: Rural Residential Areas are characterized by low-density singlefamily residential uses with deep setbacks from the road. Future development should continue to reflect lower density detached single-family residential uses, and neighborhood design should incorporate a high percentage of open space (i.e. 'Conservation Subdivision' design).

Application: Rural Residential Areas are generally located in northwestern Hall County, as well as portions of East Hall County and the Chestnut Mountain/Candler area. Future residential development is intended to accommodate densities that are higher than are appropriate for Rural Areas but less than the more densely developed areas classified as Residential.

Primary Future Land Uses

- Low-density detached single-family residential uses (including the use of Conservation Subdivision design that sets aside a high percentage of open space within a new neighborhood)
- Agriculture
- Civic benefit uses such as places of worship, schools, community centers, parks, county services
- Greenways and trails

Residential

Intent: PRESERVE established neighborhoods and CREATE new residential development consistent with surrounding suburban densities.

General Characteristics: Residential Areas are characterized by moderate-density residential development and neighborhoods. Street networks are defined by curvilinear streets and green space is largely provided on individual lots but neighborhood open space and/or park amenities may also be provided. Pedestrian connectivity is moderate, where sidewalks may be internal to a neighborhood but may not currently connect nearby parks and schools.

Future development will continue to be detached, single-family homes at moderate densities, with opportunities for variations in housing size and types through the Planned Development District zoning classification.

New development should provide opportunities for open space/greenspace, including shared areas for the benefit of residents and ample tree cover.

Application: Residential Areas are located in South Hall County. This area is located inside the County's sewer service area and is currently served by public sewer or will have access to it as infrastructure continues to be installed by the County.

Primary Future Land Uses

- Moderate density residential uses
- Greenways and trails
- Civic benefit uses such as community centers, libraries, places of worship and schools

Implementation Strategies (see Chapter 3)

Lake Area Residential

Intent: PRESERVE established neighborhoods and CREATE opportunities for permanent and vacation residences similar in land use patterns to Residential Areas but at lower residential densities.

General Characteristics: The Lake Area

Residential category includes low-density residential development and neighborhoods. Land use patterns are similar to Residential Areas, and there is orientation toward Lake Lanier in terms of development and flexibility in use of single-family homes. The area includes the 500-feet buffer around the lake, wherein properties have the potential to be zoned Vacation Cottage District in order for single-family homes to be used as shortterm vacation rentals.

Future development will continue to be detached. single family homes at low densities in addition to less intensive agricultural uses that are found in the northwestern part of the area.

Application: Lake Area Residential Areas include portions of the county adjacent to or near Lake Lanier, including parts of Murrayville/ Sardis, Gainesville, and South Hall areas. These areas are located outside of the County's sewer service area, but public water is available.

Community Crossroads

Intent: MAINTAIN and CREATE access to local goods and services at major intersections throughout the community.

General Characteristics: Community Crossroads are characterized by clustered commercial development around the intersection of prominent roads. The general development pattern is compact, with standalone or multiple businesses on a site, depending on the location. In more rural areas, a single business typically occupies a property; the building is located close to the street with parking that may be located to the front, side or year. In developed, suburban areas, buildings may be located in a small shopping center and vehicular and pedestrian access is available to multiple businesses.

In areas designated as "Rural" future development of Community Crossroads should emphasize the compact, small scale development that supports the immediate surrounding area, including residences and agricultural uses. In "Neighborhood" designated areas, future development of Community Crossroads should emphasize connectivity and be organized in a compact form around a major intersection.

Application: Community Crossroads are found at intersections of prominent roads in Rural, Rural Residential, and Residential areas where some commercial development is currently concentrated or there is the potential to serve the local area.

Activity Centers

Intent: ENHANCE and **CREATE** concentrated commercial uses, employment centers and mixed use development in defined areas that are served by a network of paths and streets suitable for pedestrians as well as cars.

General Characteristics: Activity Centers are characterized by compact, walkable, higher density developments. These areas provide additional employment opportunities and support residential uses (e.g. townhomes, loft apartments, condominiums) that can contribute to a live-work environment but are not consistent with the rural or suburban development patterns found in much of the county. Future development should also emphasize high quality building and site design, including dedicated open / civic space.

Application: Activity Centers are classified into four categories: Commercial (I-985 interchange and Cleveland Hwy/Brookton Lula area); Employment (at GA 365 and Lula Road); Mixed Use (see Residential and Lake Area Residential Areas); and Neighborhood Revitalization (Morningside Heights Area).

Primary Future Land Uses

 - I-985 commercial uses serving local and regional users, supporting University of North Georgia

Corridors

Intent: ENHANCE and **MAINTAIN** well-functioning, attractive corridors that facilitate vehicular traffic flow and pedestrian/bicycle connectivity, serve local needs, and coordinate land use patterns without encroaching on adjacent neighborhoods. Also, CREATE employment opportunities where a location benefits from interstate access or supports industrial-focused development patterns.

General Characteristics: Corridors in Residential and Rural Residential areas, and multi-jurisdictional corridors (Atlanta Highway and Browns Bridge Road), are generally those roadways that are intended to accommodate a variety of nonresidential uses without encroaching upon or replacing adjacent residential neighborhoods. Non-residential uses along corridors in Residential and Rural Areas should be located in close proximity to Community Crossroads or Activity Centers. Access should be from secondary roads so as not to impede traffic flow, and adjacent businesses should share interparcel access.

Corridors with interstate or rail access that support industrial or more intensive commercial uses are intended to provide additional larger-scale employment generators. Corridors adjacent to Lake Lanier should accommodate lake-oriented commercial uses with effective screening, where appropriate.

Application: Corridors are located throughout Hall County and are classified into three categories: Mixed-Use, Employment, and Lake Supportive.

Primary Future Land Uses

- Mixed-Use Corridor: Retail activities, officebased employment, civic uses, single-family residential
 - Low-impact industrial or higher density residential only where the same is found on adjacent properties



Description of Specific Actions

This description of specific actions provides additional information related to recommended regulatory updates (i.e. zoning, subdivision regulations), and new and updated plans. Each description for the regulations and plans references the specific strategies presented in Chapter 3, and the descriptions for the regulatory changes also cite the Character Areas implemented by the specific action.

Regulatory Updates

Evaluation and adoption of changes to land use and development regulations is a common follow-up after completion of a comprehensive plan. The purpose of updates to local regulations is to ensure that local governments' development tools support and implement the goals and strategies outlined in Chapter 3: Community Vision, as well as the Character Areas and development patterns described in Chapter 4: Future Development Guide. The following tasks are recommended, which may result in the need to amend land use and development regulations:

- Require an "Agricultural Use Notice" statement on final plats to inform the owner, occupants and uses of a property adjacent to an agricultural use or zoning classification that there may be potential impacts from lawful agricultural operations; consider similar language for zoning proposals and building permits (DP Strategy 1.3)
- Evaluate the effectiveness of the County's tree protection standards and Conservation Subdivision Design Option and identify potential amendments, as needed (DP Strategy 2.1)
- Incorporate minimum open space requirements into the Planned Development zoning classifications (residential, commercial, office and industrial) (DP Strategy 2.2)
- Evaluate minimum buffer standards in the Zoning Ordinance to ensure they are sufficient where commercial or industrial uses abut residential properties (DP Strategy 3.1)
- Amend regulations to incorporate common conditions of zoning (conditions that are routinely approved as part of a rezoning and are not currently found in the Zoning Ordinance) that are used to ensure a high quality of development and the provision of adequate infrastructure by an applicant (DP Strategy 4.1)
- Evaluate use and outdoor storage and display standards of the Gateway Corridor Overlay District to ensure uses requiring outdoor storage/display are appropriately located and screened (DP Strategy 4.2)
- Where roadways cross both county and city lines, evaluate corridor-specific standards and design guidelines applied by the municipalities to identify any requirements that could enhance the County's requirements (DP Strategy 4.3)
- Review existing regulations for impediments to special housing needs and opportunities such as senior housing, accessory dwelling units, and affordable housing (DP Strategy 5.1)
- Review the county's zoning and subdivision regulations for any impediments to low impact development (LID) or 'green infrastructure' approaches to stormwater management, which can lower the amount of untreated stormwater discharging to surface waters; assess findings to identify potential regulatory modifications (RC Strategy 1.5)
- Establish buffer requirements for the portion of the Chattahoochee River not under the jurisdiction of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, consistent with the Georgia Department of Natural Resources' rules for river corridor protection (RC Strategy 1.9)

Detailed Planning Studies

Functional plans that address a community facility/service or planning topic and small area / master plans that focus on a specific geographic area may be prepared and adopted as implementing measures of the Comprehensive Plan. These are more detailed planning studies to meet certain goals described within the plan. The facility improvements recommended by these plans will conform to the overall Comprehensive Plan. The following planning studies are recommended, with the supporting strategy from Chapter 3 identified:

Economic Development Plan

A county-wide plan can provide a mechanism for the County and its municipalities to coordinate economic development goals and efforts in conjunction with the Greater Hall Chamber of Commerce. In general an Economic Development Plan sets policy direction for economic growth and identifies strategies, programs, and projects to improve the economy.

• Partner with the Chamber of Commerce and the Hall County Joint Municipal Association to prepare a county-wide Economic Development Plan (SED Goal 1.5)

Historic Preservation Plan

A Historic Preservation Plan can help Hall County protect historic resources and identify ways to promote its heritage as an economic development tool. Both the 2012 Historic Resources Survey of unincorporated Hall County (prepared by the University of Georgia's College and Environment Design) and the public-private Healan's-Head's Mill restoration project can inform the planning process.

• Prepare a Historic Preservation Plan to promote general awareness of historic resources throughout unincorporated Hall County, prioritize protection for different resources, and encourage heritage tourism as an economic development tool (RC Strategy 4.1)

East-West Corridor Study

An East-West Corridor Study in the North Hall area can determine the viability of a new connection to relieve congestion on Dawsonville Highway and also establish next steps in project development. This study could be conducted in partnership with the Gainesville-Hall Metropolitan Planning Organization, the federally mandated transportation planning.

• Prepare an East-West Corridor Study to determine the viability of a new connection for relieving congestion on Dawsonville Highway and also establish next steps in project development (DP Strategy 6.1)

Neighborhood Revitalization Study

During the development of Hall County Forward, a neighborhood level study of the Morningside Heights area was undertaken to identify residents' concerns and goals for the traditionally underserved community east of downtown Gainesville. Recommendations for the area are listed below and are intended to be implemented as a coordinated effort by Hall County and the Concerned Citizens of Gainesville and Hall County, Georgia. Representative examples for certain items are also included to assist with implementation.

- Consistently enforce county codes pertaining to outdoor storage and junk items, inoperable vehicles, and litter (SED Strategy 2.3a)
- Increase Sheriff's patrols to address the high frequency of cars running all-way stops and to prevent criminal activity (SED Strategy 2.3b)
- Assess the ability to form a local Neighborhood Watch, with the assistance of the Sheriff's Office Public Information and Community Services Unit (SED Strategy 2.3c)

- Evaluate the best long-term measures for addressing speeding on local streets based on input from the Hall County Traffic Engineering Neighborhood Traffic Calming Program and the Sheriff's Office (SED Strategy 2.3d)
- Prioritize sidewalk and street lighting needs based on frequency of use and access to local transit stops (SED Strategy 2.3e)
- Continue to identify properties suitable for federal Community Home Investment Program (CHIP) and Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP) grants to assist with home repairs/rehabilitation and to provide affordable housing opportunities (SED Strategy 2.3f)
- Evaluate options for providing clean-up opportunities in addition to annual Keep Hall Beautiful neighborhood clean-up, such as temporary placement of containers in accessible areas for disposal of bulky or hazardous items (tires, white goods) (SED Strategy 2.3g)
- Identify homes suitable for Homes for Heroes and/or the Federal Housing Administration's (FHA) Officer Next Door programs to reduce the costs of purchasing a home and encourage law enforcement officers to live in the community (SED Strategy 2.3h; models include the Cities of Statesboro and Atlanta; also Habitat for Humanity's Secure Neighborhood Initiative)
- Identify potential "pocket parks" and trail connections during the update to the county's Parks and Recreation Plan (SED Strategy 2.3i)
- Coordinate with the Hall County Master Gardeners to establish planted gateways and community gardens, either as permanent or temporary uses of properties (SED Strategy 2.3); a local model is Jubilee Farm Community Garden in Gainesville; also Westview (Atlanta) Community Garden)
- Research methods for recruiting a small-scale grocery store to the area; one example is a Dollar General Market, which offers a wider variety of produce and dry groceries (SED Strategy 2.3k)
- Submit a new application to the Georgia Department of Community Affairs for Opportunity Zone designation that would include the Athens Highway corridor; such a designation allows new or existing businesses to benefit from tax credits upon creating a minimum number of jobs (SED Strategy 2.31)
- Evaluate opportunities for using County-owned property in the area for a neighborhood park (SED) Strategy 2.3m)
- Improve coordination with the City of Gainesville on zoning, development, and code enforcement issues that relate to properties inside the city limits but are adjacent to the Morningside area (SED Strategy 2.3n)
- Research the potential for establishing a non-profit Community Development Corporation (CDC), which could allow interested residents to undertake economic development and residential development activities (SED Strategy 2.30; models include the following Atlanta neighborhood-based groups: Cabbagetown Initiative CDC, Summech CDC, Reynoldstown Revitalization Corporation, Peoplestown Revitalization Corporation)
- Conduct quarterly meetings with Concerned Citizens of Gainesville and Hall County board members and County leadership/staff (SED Strategy 2.3p)
- Discuss and coordinate housing-related needs and initiatives with the City of Gainesville, Habitat for Humanity, and other public or private stakeholders to maximize the use of financial and staff resources (SED Strategy 2.3q)
- Evaluate the justification for a traffic signal warrant study at the Gaines Mill Road/Athens Highway intersection with the Georgia Department of Transportation (SED Strategy 2.3r)

Plan Maintenance

The Board of Commissioners is responsible for maintaining Hall County Forward to accurately reflect current community conditions and the community's vision and priorities for the future. Specific requirements for amendments and updates are described in the Rules of Georgia Department of Community Affairs (DCA) Chapter 110-12-1 "Minimum Standards and Procedures for Local Comprehensive Planning".

Annual Review

County staff will provide a status of the plan implementation to the Board of Commissioners on an annual basis. Specifically, the Community Work Program will be reviewed to identify the current status of the implementation measures and an informal progress report will be prepared. If the County chooses, the annual review process can be used to undertake a formal annual update (see below).

Plan Amendments

According to the DCA rules, the local government determines when a plan amendment is necessary to address changing circumstances that may have detracted from the usefulness of the plan as a guide to local decision-making.

Updates to the Comprehensive Plan

At a minimum, a plan update must be completed every five years, in accordance with the Local Comprehensive Plan Recertification Schedule maintained by DCA. An annual update option is provided for communities wanting to update their plan on a more frequent basis. The annual update requires submittal of a new fifth year for the Community Work Program (CWP) and any changes needed for the other years of the CWP, and if needed, changes can be made to other elements of the Comprehensive Plan. For communities collecting impact fees, an annual update of the CWP is required.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS ELEMENT Chapter 6

The Hall County Capital Improvements Element (CIE) was adopted April 2022.

HALL COUNTY FORWARD | Comprehensive Plan

The CIE plays a significant role in the implementation of an annual / master budget by providing the link between planning and budgeting for capital projects / equipment purchases. The CIP process precedes the overall annual budget process and is used to develop the capital portion of the annual budget.

The Capital Improvement Plan is an overall six-year plan (current adopted budget plus the succeeding five planning years) that details anticipated capital expenditures and their correlations to approved sources of funding. By approving the CIE, the Hall County Board of Commissioners acknowledges that these projects and acquisitions represent a reasonable interpretation of the upcoming needs for the County, and that the projects and acquisitions contained in the first year of the plan are suitable for inclusion in the upcoming budget.

The capital improvement plan is simply that – a plan. As such, capital projects and equipment purchases are subject to change based on new or shifting service needs, special financing opportunities, emergency needs, or other directives or priorities established by the Hall County Board of Commissioners and County Administration. Because priorities can change, capital expenditures included in future planning years are not guaranteed for funding, and will be subject to further review until that year's respective budget is legally adopted.









What do you think are the top five most important goals for Hall County in the near and long-term future?

Steering Committee Meeting #1

Steering Committee Meeting #2

The objectives of the second steering committee meeting held on April 1, 2022 were to review the results from both the first steering committee meeting and first public meeting and get input on updates to the Community Work Program for 2022-2026. The result of this meeting was to keep the work plan as-is, and to use the Planning Areas developed in 2017 as a start for district planning within the county. The committee also provided guidance on strategies for the public input process for Phase 2 of the plan update.

Public Meetings

Public Meeting #1

The first public meeting was held on March 14, 2022 at the Board of Commissioners Meeting Room at the County Government Center. 16 people attended the meeting. The meeting was kicked off by a brief presentation that discussed the planning process, scope, demographic changes since 2017, and an explanation of input activities. A few minutes were set aside to answer questions.

After the presentation, participants were asked to identify existing assets using green dots, opportunities using yellow dots, and areas that need improvement using red dots using maps that broke the county into four areas: North Hall, South Hall, East Hall, and West Hall. The maps showed where schools, parks, city limits were located for reference. The results of this exercise were intended to get initial input that would carry over into the next phases of long-range planning. The maps and narratives can be found on the following pages.




Comment cards were offered for participants to give their thoughts about other topics not covered in the meeting.

The comments given by participants include the following:

- The city/county boundaries are too confusing!
- Amtrak train could be an asset if coordinated with Atlanta and destinations north. Trains in the northeast and west coast are used effectively for tourism, commuting,
- Ensure Lake Lanier and its associated parks and amenities are preserved and protected.
- Walkability needs to be reviewed at all high traffic areas, especially in South Hall.
- We need more bicycle lanes or ways to encourage bicycling as an option versus using cars.
- No plans for Candler Road. No plans for workforce or affordable housing.
- Need to keep improving pedestrian and cycling accessibility and safety, most main roads are dangerous.
- Need to minimize curb cuts on SR 365. Do not choke traffic flow in accommodating industry.
- Start greenspace preservation now before population overwhelms rural Hall County.
- Need more connectivity walking paths, sidewalks, bike trails/lanes - throughout county especially closer to Gainesville and attractions.





Public Meeting #2

The second public meeting was held on April 11, 2022 at the Board of Commissioners Meeting Room at the Hall County Government Center. Three people attended the meeting. The meeting began with a brief presentation that discussed the planning process, scope, review of results from the last public meeting, the survey, and an explanation of input activities. Because there was a small group, significant time was allotted to open conversation and question answering.

After the presentation, participants were asked to give input on the 2017 character area plans for the purpose of informing the next phase of long-range planning. Boards were set up around the room for each of the eight character areas that showed the map of the locations, descriptive text of the design principals and the primary future land uses, and example images. Participants were asked to add a green dot on elements they like or agree with; a red dot for elements they do not like or disagree with; and a sticky note for specific comments. There were comment cards provided for more detailed responses. A summary of the responses are shown on the right.





Community Responses / Questions

- The scale of the Character Area Maps is too small, making it difficult to decipher the exact areas that the maps are covering. The maps need to be divided into sections that can be enlarged to show more detail.
- Where is growth appropriate? There are concerns about population growth and its relationship to jobs and housing and commuting patterns.
- Transportation is important to study in relation to land use patterns.
- How will the new inland port affect traffic and truck transportation? Potential issues need to be addressed.
- How is affordable housing defined? There are a high amount of chicken farms in the County, is there affordable housing available for the employees?
- What do the demographic trends indicate for the types/amount of housing in the County? Younger people want to own but do not want to do the upkeep of a house. Where are certain higher density housing types appropriate?
- The planning team needs to reach out to manufacturing company stakeholders in the next phase.


This section summarizes the socioeconomic characteristics of Hall County, its cities and the unincorporated area, past and future.

Population and Household Growth

Hall County's population is growing faster than Georgia's population with over 70,000 new residents in roughly the last two decades. The total estimated 2022 population is 210,802 with a projection of reaching 383,214 by 2050. The growth rate from years 2000-2022 is 1.9% in comparison to Georgia's 1.3% growth rate.

Similar to the trends with population growth, the households in Hall County are also increasing faster than Georgia overall. The growth rate of Hall County is 1.9% and Georgia's overall rate at 1.3%. Population and households are increasing at the same rate.

Over two-thirds of Hall County residents live in the unincorporated portions of the county. Gainesville is the largest municipality in the county, with over 20% of the county population.





Population Characteristics

The population of Hall County has a greater share of white residents and Hispanic/Latino residents than Georgia overall. Hispanic/Latino residents represent 30% of the County. Hall County also has a slightly higher number of Asian residents than Georgia's statistics. However, there are significantly fewer Black/African American residents living in Hall County than the remainder of Georgia. Almost 20% of the county identified as "Some Other Race Alone" suggesting that there is a relatively large multi-cultural population. This category was higher than all others except for white alone. The generational/age makeup of Hall County is overall very similar to Georgia.









There are currently a total of 100,733 employees that work in Hall County. The largest employment sectors in Hall County include:

- Production
- Sales
- Management
- Transportation
- Construction

There are a total of 100,733 jobs in Hall County and 97,610 working residents. The commuting patterns show that over half (58%) of the employees working in the county commute in from elsewhere. Of the total working residents, 56% commute out each day. For employees commuting out, Gwinnett County, GA is the destination with the highest percentage of commuting employees at 15%. Alternatively, Gwinnett County also provides the highest percentage at 11% of the total employees commuting into Hall County each day. The majority (79%) of commuting employees drove alone on their commutes. A minimal amount of people used public transportation. Transportation recommendations in the next phase will need to consider these commuting trends.

Commuting Patterns





Household Income Distribution







Land Use

Existing Land Uses

This section describes the nature of existing land use in Hall County in terms of different land use types. The Existing Land Use Map (see next page) displays county-wide existing land use, defined as the current use of parcels of land and categorized as described in the Existing Land Use Categories table below. The Existing Land Use Map was developed through a process of GIS analysis that involved tax digest data from Hall County, aerial photography from various sources, and ground-truthing.

Predominant land uses in unincorporated Hall County are agricultural and residential. Approximately 56% of land is classified as agricultural use, and 39% residential. North and East Hall County include large tracts of agricultural land, as well as large-lot residential uses. Agricultural uses are also scattered through much of unincorporated Hall County. Single-family residential development (lower density suburban development) is most predominant in South Hall and the Gainesville Area, extending northward into the Chestnut Mountain/ Candler and Murrayville/Sardis areas. The areas of most intense development in Hall County include concentrations of commercial uses in incorporated areas and industrial development following interstate and rail corridors.







Community Revitalization Needs


During the development of *Hall County Forward* in 2017, a neighborhood-level study of the Morningside Heights area was undertaken to identify residents' concerns and goals for the traditionally underserved community east of downtown Gainesville. A neighborhood-level workshop was held to gather ideas, comments, and concerns for the future of the Morningside Heights, Gaines Mill Road, and Black and Cooley Drive areas. Residents of the area, which abuts I-985 east of Downtown Gainesville, shared their thoughts about local housing, development, connectivity, pedestrian safety, parks and open space, and public infrastructure.


The following series of maps summarize existing conditions in the area, as documented in 2017. As shown in the Study Area map on the next page, the Morningside Heights, Gaines Mill Road and Black and Cooley Drive neighborhoods abut the Gainesville city limits. Existing land uses are primarily detached single-family homes with residential or agricultural zoning designations, and numerous lots are vacant or contain abandoned buildings in disrepair. Some commercial and industrial uses are found along Athens Street. Several churches are located along Floyd Road, which provides one of two entrances into the Morningside Heights area. The Beulah Rucker Museum, which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, is located at the southeastern edge of the neighborhood. Pedestrian connectivity is limited (see green line on Pedestrian Connections Map), with a sidewalk along the length of Floyd Road and some sidewalk segments in the western portion of the study along Old Athens Road and Athens Street that provide access to only a few of the Gainesville Connection bus stops that are in the area.

Recommendations for the area are described in Chapter 5: Implementation Program.









Natural Resources

Environmental Planning Criteria

In order to protect the state's natural resources and environment, the Georgia Department of Natural Resources (DNR) developed Rules for Environmental Planning Criteria (Chapter 391-3-16). These minimum standards and procedures, also known as Part V Criteria, are required under the Georgia Planning Act to be used by local communities in the development of comprehensive plans. In addition, the Georgia Department of Community Affairs' (DCA) Minimum Standards and Procedures for Local Comprehensive Planning (Chapter 110-2-1) require local governments to review the Part V Criteria to determine if there is need to adapt development regulations to address protection of the following natural resources:

- Water Supply Watersheds
- Groundwater Recharge Areas
- Wetlands
- **Protected Rivers**
- Protected Mountains

The Compliance with State Environmental Planning Criteria table in this section indicates whether these natural resources are present in Hall County and if the County has implemented protection efforts.

Regional Water Plan


DCA's Minimum Standards and Procedures for Local Comprehensive Planning require local governments to review the Regional Water Plan when preparing a comprehensive plan to determine whether additional or modified regulations/actions are needed. The Metropolitan North Georgia Water Planning District (MNGWPD) coordinates regional planning efforts that address long-term water quality protection and adequate water supply. Its member jurisdictions include 15 counties and 95 cities. In June 2017 a consolidated Water Resource Management Plan was approved by MNGWPD.

Other Natural Resources

Floodplains

A floodplain is any land area susceptible to being inundated by water from any source. Floodplains serve three major purposes: natural water storage and conveyance, water quality maintenance, and groundwater recharge. Unsuitable development can prevent floodplains from serving their purpose. For example, any fill material placed in the floodplain eliminates essential water storage capacity, causing water elevation to rise, resulting in the flooding of previously dry land. Hall County's 100-year floodplains are shown on the Natural Resources Map on page 90. The 100-year floodplain is an area that will be inundated by the flood event having a 1-percent chance of being equaled or exceeded in any given year.

The County has adopted a Floodplain Management/Flood Damage Prevention ordinance, which sets forth standards for development within the floodplain. A community's floodplain management activities, including having effective ordinances in place, can make it eligible to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program's (NFIP) Community Rating System (CRS). The CRS program is a voluntary incentive program that recognizes and encourages activities that exceed the minimum NFIP requirements. Depending upon the level of participation, flood insurance premium rates for policyholders can be reduced up to 45%. Hall County currently does not participate in the CRS program.

Impaired Waters

The Clean Water Act requires the Georgia Environmental Protection Division (GAEPD) to monitor the quality of fresh water rivers, streams and lakes. Waterbodies that do not support their designated uses (e.g. recreation, water supply, aquatic life) due to poor water quality are included on a list of impaired waters, also known as the 303(d) list of waters. Impairments must be addressed through the development of a Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL), which sets a pollutant budget and outlines strategies for corrective action.

Lake Lanier is composed of five segments, one of which (Browns Bridge Road/SR 369) is on the 303(d) list for chlorophyll a. Chlorophyll a is a pigment in algae that is used as an indicator of the potential presence of nutrients in a waterbody that causes excess algal growth. The State of Georgia includes this segment of Lake Lanier on its list of priority waters for protection; however, a TMDL will be written for the entire lake.

Greenspace

In 2005, the Gainesville-Hall Chamber of Commerce undertake a strategic planning initiative that identified several "Big Ideas" for creating a desired vision for the county by the year 2030. One of the Big Ideas was creation of the Greenspace Initiative, a group of volunteers that has been active in greenspace planning and advocacy, as well as the development of the Highlands to Islands multi-use trail system. In 2013 the committee developed a Greenspace Report and Greenspace Vision Map, which proposes a series of greenways, areas for accommodating additional regional parks, and watersheds and viewsheds for protection. The report's recommendations include the creation of a prioritized, phased implementation plan that gradually increases the amount of the county as permanently protected greenspace (whether trails, parkland, conservation easement, etc.) from 6.6% to 20%.

Historic Resources

Inventory of Historic Resources

Historic resource surveys provide a working base for communities in devising a local preservation strategy. In 2012 a survey of unincorporated Hall County was conducted by FindIT, a state-wide cultural resource survey program sponsored by the Georgia Transmission Corporation (GTC) in partnership with the Georgia Department of Natural Resources (DNR), Historic Preservation Division (GA SHPO). The program is housed in the College of Environment + Design at the University of Georgia.

The Historic Resources Map in this section shows the locations of the surveyed resources, which include buildings and cemeteries. The buildings are categorized by age: those built before 1900; between 1900 and 1950; and, after 1950. The public can view the resources and detailed information from the survey on DNR's official web-based database system: NAHRGIS (Natural, Archaeological, and Historic Resources Geographic Information Systems).

National Register of Historic Places

The National Register of Historic Places (National Register) is the official list of the nation's historic and archaeological resources worthy of protection. A program of the U.S. Department of the Interior's National Park Service, the National Register is intended to identify, evaluate and protect historic places. As an honorary designation, National Register status places no obligations or restrictions on private owners. However, in order to take advantage of incentive-based preservation programs such as the 20% Federal Historic Preservation Tax Incentives Program, rehabilitation projects must retain a property's historic character by following the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation.

The National Register includes two historic resources in unincorporated Hall County (see Historic Resources Map): Healan's-Head's Mill and the Beulah Rucker School / House.

Healan's-Head's Mill


Located on Whitehall Road at the North Oconee River, the 1850 grist mill (and supporting buildings on the 4-acre property) was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1990. It was purchased by Fred and Burnice Healan in the 1960s and used as an antiques store.

In 2003, Hall County purchased the mill and four acres of surrounding land using grant funding from the Trust for Public Land. The County, along with a group of interested citizens (known as Friends of Healan's-Head's Mill), is undertaking a multi-phased project to restore the mill. Plans include stabilization (see photo at right), which is being funded by the 2015 Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax (SPLOST) referendum.

Future phases include additional property acquisition, renovations to make the mill operational, and construction of a Visitor's and Heritage Center and walking trails in close proximity to the mill.

Beulah Rucker School / House

The c. 1915 Georgian cottage is located at 2110 Athens Highway, which is located in the Morningside Heights community. The building was used as a house and school by Beulah Rucker, a noted educator who established a school for African-American children. The school was one of only a few available to African American children and at one time was the only high school. It was listed on the National Register in 1995. It was rehabilitated by the Educational Foundation and Museum of Beulah Rucker Inc. and is currently in use as a museum.

Transportation

Overview

The Gainesville-Hall Metropolitan Planning Organization (GHMPO) consists of the entirety of Hall County and a portion of western Jackson County. In addition to the two (2) counties, GHMPO coordinates with nine (9) local municipalities (Town of Braselton, City of Buford, Town of Clermont, City of Flowery Branch, City of Gainesville, City of Gillsville, City of Hoschton, City of Lula, and City of Oakwood). A small portion of Forsyth and Gwinnett Counties are also within the GHMPO planning area; however, this area is managed by the Atlanta Regional Commission (ARC), Atlanta's MPO. GHMPO manages a small portion of Hall County for the ARC through agreement. In May 2020, the GHMPO adopted their Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) which identifies short- and long-term strategies for the management and improvement of the regional transportation network. This resulting plan complies with the federal requirements established by the Federal Highway Administration's (FHWA) Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act (FAST Act). The FAST Act mandates a 20-year minimum planning horizon and the creation of a financially feasible list of transportation projects. This comprehensive plan references the RTP as Hall County Forward's Transportation Element. The following is a basic overview of the county's transportation network based on the 2020 RTP.

Road Network

Overview


The road network within Hall County spans the majority of the two-county area, with a high-capacity interstate (I-985) and a substantial network of US and State roadways. The most significant regional connection, I-985, provides northeast/southwest connections especially southward toward the Atlanta urbanized area. The road network is the primary mode of transportation; however, freight is also conveyed by rail through the region.

Functional Classification

Nationwide, the transportation system is divided into seven (7) functional classifications that are used to categorize the system by type of roadway. Functional Classification is a method used by GDOT to identify roadways based on their characteristics and use. The map on page 96 presents the GHMPO roadway functional classifications. Using the accepted GDOT Functional Classifications, the GHMPO road network can be described using seven (7) categories:

- Interstate Highest classification of arterial created for mobility, long distance travel, and limited
- Freeway/Expressway Similar to interstates with limited access and a generally divided bidirectional travel
- Principal Arterial Focus on mobility but adjacent land uses can be served by the roadway
- Minor Arterial Typically create connections to the larger arterial system and serve moderate length trips
- Major and Minor Collector Both collector types have a great deal of overlap, but each generally is designed to serve as a connection between local roads that the arterial network
- Local Roads Generally designed to service short trips and prevent cut through traffic.

GHMPO is home to a variety of roadway classifications and sizes serving local and regional trips. Using information available from GDOT with review of existing conditions, the table below depicts the through lane counts and corresponding length in miles.


The map on the right has been developed to depict the road network and the locations of the differing lane numbers. The majority of the 3-4 lane roadways are the US and SRs located nearby the urbanized areas, including I-985 (two-lanes each direction). The only two (2) roadways where identified with over five (5) lanes are segments of SR 347/Friendship Road, and SR 53. As shown in the table above, the majority of the roadways are 1-2 lanes.


Level of Service

Level of Service (LOS) is a metric used to determine how well a roadway is handling current vehicle volumes and speeds. LOS is divided into six (6) measures, A-F, where A indicates a roadway with the ability to handle additional capacity and F indicates a roadway that is unable to handle the current vehicle volumes. A depiction of the LOS categories can be seen on the map on page 99 while descriptions of the levels are described in the table below. Using the available roadway characteristics, a model was created by GDOT to depict the approximate LOS conditions throughout the planning area in the 2015 Base Year. These 2015 base year conditions are depicted within the graphic on page 100.

Level of Service Designation	Description
А	Free flow with individual users virtually unaffected by the presence of others in the traffic stream.
В	Stable flow with a high degree of freedom to select speed and operating conditions but with some influence from other users.
С	Restricted flow which remains stable but with significant interactions with others in the traffic stream. The general level of comfort and convenience declines noticeably at this level.
D	High-density flow in which speed and freedom to maneuver are severely restricted and comfort and convenience have declined even though traffic flow remains stable.

Gainesville-Hall MPO 2020 RTP: Roadway Lane Counts (2017)






LOS F - Significant Delay, Roadway Substantially Exceeding Capacity

Fortunately, the 2015 model shows the majority of the major corridors throughout GHMPO with LOS C or better. The corridors with worse LOS are dispersed within the planning area, with smaller segments being identified with the urbanized areas and longer segments in the unincorporated areas. Due to the high-level scale of the model outputs, this data should be used in conjunction with local knowledge and site-specific studies for verification.

Transit

Public transportation is an important feature for urbanized areas and is a growing consideration within the GHMPO planning area. Currently there is one main transit provider in Hall County, Hall Area Transit.

Hall Area Transit

Hall Area Transit (HAT) used to operate a fixed route bus system named the Gainesville Connection. The Gainesville Connection primarily served the City of Gainesville with routes extending into the City of Oakwood and unincorporated Hall County. The Gainesville Connection service has since been replaced with WeGo, a rideshare transportation service that uses a smartphone application and a fleet of 10 to 12 passenger vans to transport users around town. It started only operating in the City of Gainesville, but in summer 2021, service was expanded to unincorporated Hall County.

Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities

Bicycle and Pedestrian travel and safety is a very important feature of the transportation network. Recreation and transportation safety can be improved by the development of designated bike lanes and paved trails/sidewalks. The creation of paved trails/side paths can promote development and generate economic boosts in the areas surrounding these trails through increased recreation and use. Bike lanes and other bicycle safety infrastructure are generally recommended to be implemented along roadways where the separation of cyclists and motor vehicles is necessary to improve safety. The GHMPO completed the Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan originally in 2006 and completed an update to this plan in 2014. The purpose of the GHMPO Bicycle and Pedestrian plan was to identify exiting facilities and make recommendations for improvement of the multimodal network. As the MPO continues to grow, it is recommended that the proposed projects within the Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan be implemented and that the Plan be regularly updated to ensure its priorities are in line with future conditions. Existing pedestrian and bicycle facilities are depicted on the map on page 102.

Pedestrian Network

Sidewalks are the most prevalent non-motorized facility throughout GHMPO and are generally found in the municipalities. The most significant sidewalk networks are located within the Gainesville, Oakwood, and Flowery Branch municipalities.

Bicycle Network

Currently, only two (2) areas of designated bike lanes have been developed within GHMPO. The first is a one (1) mile stretch of bike lanes along Atlanta Highway near the intersection of I-985, and the second is a newly completed bridge over I-985 along HF Industrial Parkway. Additionally, paved shoulders (wider than 4 ft) are dispersed throughout the area, providing additional areas for cyclists to potentially use.


Side Paths and Paved Trails

Several side paths/paved trails have been developed within GHMPO located primarily within Gainesville and along Friendship Road in southern Hall County. Two (2) recent trail studies have recently been completed. The first focused on an area in Gainesville evaluating a connection between the Midtown Greenway and Chicopee Trail. The second study was focused on South Hall evaluating potential connections between the Chicopee Trail and Friendship Road. The table below shows the approximately length of the bicycle and pedestrian facilities within the GHMPO.

Rail


GHMPO is home to two (2) major rail lines, Norfolk Southern and CSX. Norfolk Southern bisects GHMPO by traveling primarily north/south, with an additional extension heading through Gillsville. CSX travels primarily east/west entering GHMPO from Jackson County near Talmo. Both of these railways meet near the center of Gainesville. The map on the facing page depicts the existing railroad network within GHMPO.

Freight

Freight volumes are continuing to increase within the GHMPO area. In 2018, GHMPO completed the Regional Freight Study which analyzed existing conditions and developed a framework to monitor and improve upon the freight network. This study assessed existing and forecasted top trading partners of Hall County as shown in the table below.

In addition to the planning efforts of GHMPO, both Hall and Jackson County have prioritized the development of industrial sites alongside major roadways to encourage additional growth in this area.

The Freight Plan identified the existing freight land uses over 10 acres within GHMPO and found that over 90% of the applicable areas were listed within Hall County. Outside of GHMPO, Jackson County is also focusing on the development of industrial lands nearby I-85 to encourage growth. The Regional Freight Study resulted in a three-tier freight network to classify freight routes within the area. These routes are listed below and shown on the map on the facing page.

- Tier 1 Interstate System within GHMPO comprised of I-985 and I-85
- Tier 2 –National Highway System (NHS) Roadways that have been identified as beneficial to freight movement
- Tier 3 –Non-NHS roadways identified by their connection to freight based land uses of 10 acres or

Though freight will use much of GHMPO's road network, these three tiers help designate areas for future improvement and to encourage freight to use these designated roadways. Since completion of the GHMPO Regional Freight Plan, the State of Georgia and Georgia Ports Authority announced the development of a new inland port in northern Hall County. Planning for the new inland port that will be located off SR 365 has been incorporated into the development of the RTP update, including within the GDOT travel demand model.

Airports

Currently, GHMPO is home to only one (1) public use airport, Lee Gilmer Memorial Airport (KGVL). KGVL is a non-towered airport that is owned and operated by the City of Gainesville. The airport maintains two (2) paved runways and offers 81 T-Hangers and 12 corporate hangars for private use. Alternatively, GHMPO residents have the option to take commercial passenger flights from Ben Epps Airport in Athens or Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport.

Applicant Proposal

The applicant is requesting to rezone a portion of 3504 Coker Road from Agricultural-Residential-IV (AR-IV) to Residential-I (R-I) in order to subdivide the property into ten (10) lots to be developed with single-family homes. The narrative states that each lot will be a minimum of 35,000 square feet in size; eight (8) will measure 125 feet by 280 feet and two (2) will be of an irregular shape yet still meet the 35,000 square foot requirement. The applicant proposes to develop the property with site-built single-family residences served by public water and individual septic tanks. The development will be served by a new street along the southern boundary of this property to provide each lot with appropriate road frontage.

The proposed road measures 1396.61' in length, and is proposed to branch off of the existing Coker Road and end in a cul-de-sac at the back of the subject property.

History and Existing Land Uses

The subject property is approximately 10.0± acres and is part of a larger 27.29± acre tax parcel zoned Agricultural Residential-IV (AR-IV). The surrounding properties are zoned AR-IV and are developed with a mixture of single family and agricultural uses. To the northeast of the subject property is Harmony Woods subdivision, which is developed with single-family homes on approximately one (1) to two (2) acre lots. Other surrounding properties are large AR-IV tracts developed with a mixture of single family and agricultural uses. The subject property is developed with a 1,669 square foot single family residence built on 1971 as well as a mobile homes and two (2) chicken houses. This appears to be the original zoning per Hall County records.

Comprehensive Plan Land Use Designation

The subject property is located within the "Rural Residential" future land use designation. This land use designation is characterized by low-density single-family residential uses with deep setbacks from the road. Future development should continue to reflect lower density detached single-family residential uses, and neighborhood design should incorporate a high percentage of open space (i.e. 'Conservation Subdivision' design).

The request is inconsistent with the Comprehensive Plan as the minimum density recommended for the rural residential future land use designation is 1 dwelling unit per 1 - 1.5 acres, depending on public water availability.

Development Support and Constraints

Hall County Environmental Health

In an email dated May 4, 2021 Emily McGahee commented: "All proposed lots must meet Hall County Board of Health Lot Size Resolution requirements."

Hall County Fire Services

The subject parcel is located approximately 4.5 miles from Hall County Fire Station #1, located at 2460 Athens Highway. The nearest fire hydrant is in the right-of-way of Coker Road approximately 120 feet from the north east corner of the subject property and approximately 291 feet from the south east corner of the subject property.

Hall County Public Works and Utilities

In a memorandum dated May 6, 2021, Srikanth Yamala, Director of Public Works and Utilities, stated the following:

Engineering

As this subdivision is greater than 6 lots on an existing road, a stormwater management report prepared by a professional engineer will be required.

Traffic Engineering

No comment.

Utilities

No comment.

Hall County Tax Assessors

No comments were provided.

Gainesville Water Resources

The Hall County GIS shows that public water is available to the subject property along Coker Road.

Georgia Department of Transportation

In an email dated April 26, 2021, Jonathan Peevy, Assistant District Traffic Engineer, indicated that this project will not require GDOT coordination.

Zoning Analysis

- The proposed use request is **inconsistent** with the Comprehensive Plan.
 - Per the Hall County Comprehensive plan, this area is characterized by low-density single-family residential uses with deep setbacks from the road. Future development should continue to reflect lower density detached single-family residential uses, and neighborhood design should incorporate a high percentage of open space. The target density for this area is 1 dwelling unit per 1 1.5 acres, depending on public water availability.
- §17.20.1210 of the Hall County Zoning Regulations defines a *major subdivision* as the division of a tract or parcel of land into two or more lots, building sites or other divisions for the purpose of sale, legacy, a new street or a change in existing streets, and includes re-subdivision.

- Within the R-I zoning district, subdivisions are listed as a permitted use.
- §17.240.010 of the Official Code of Hall County designates lots within an R-I zoning district to be a minimum of 35,000 square feet in size.
 - o The proposed lots meet this requirement.
- §17.240.010 of the Official Code of Hall County designates lots within the R-I zoning district to have a minimum 50 feet of lot frontage when along local roadways.
 - Coker Road is classified as a local road and there is a proposed road that will serve the majority of lots.
- §17.16.010 of the Official Code of Hall County lists permitted uses within R-I districts as: site-built single-family detached dwelling units; Class A single-family detached industrialized dwelling units; non-commercial accessory residential uses, including but not limited to a private garage, detached home workshop, swimming pool. Or greenhouse, all of which shall be incidental to the use of the property as a residence; home offices; agricultural or horticultural uses.
- The site plan and narrative do not show or mention a centralized postal unit, which is required by the United States Postal service.
 - o This item will be expected to be included with development plans for the subdivision.

Staff Recommendation

Staff recommends **denial** of the applicant's request but if the board see fit to approve, the following conditions shall apply:







We oppose the rezoning of 3504 Coker Road, 27 acres of open pasture to an 18 lot subdivision for the following reasons:


1- As proposed the plan does not adequately protect adjacent properties.

As comparison the Thousand Oaks Subdivision was originally timberland, and has wooded borderlines, the 3504 property is open pasture without natural buffers on the property line. All natural water runoff from the 27 acres flows through the cattle pastures, feeds the fish pond, and creek watering gaps for the cattle.

Grading and leveling for roads, home sites, and utilities will have significant immediate negative impact on the "Hall County approved" pond, its fish, and cattle watering gap.

The cooperative land use by the owners provides grass fed cattle for auction and personal use, the stocked (pellet fed) fish pond also provides a food source, and is a pursuit of happiness.


The current fencing on the 3504 border is designed for cattle containment not to prevent human trespassers. To keep trespassers from coming in contact with livestock, and other natural and man-made hazards on the farm, the appropriate fencing would have to be installed along the entire border of 3504. We should not have to incur costs of this upgrade.

3- Although the proposed rezoning may conform to the Hall County Comprehensive Land Use Plan, can the board provide any current infrastructure impact studies which support the current rate of concentrated housing being approved in the Tadmore, Gillsville Highway area, and specifically the 3504 property?

Our position is this additional development would cause even more excessive and burdensome increased vehicle traffic on the existing streets, utilities, schools, police protection and enforcement of existing laws and county codes. 4- Additional existing and changing conditions that affect the development of 3504 are increasing exponentially based on the rate of rezoning to Residential in the area.

On March 25, 2022 it was reported "The Hall County Commission approved at its meeting Thursday evening a rezoning request allowing for a subdivision on Gillsville Highway with 399 single-family detached homes and townhomes."

5- The development of 3504 without environmental buffers and holding ponds will pose significant residential pollution and ecological impact to the adjacent properties. There will undoubtedly be lawn fertilizer, road surface petroleum based and other chemical runoff from the subdivision. The current proposal calls for septic tanks which inevitably leak or overflow which also poses a pollution concern.

Not only does this pollution affect the cattle farm and fish pond, area air quality but it also threatens the natural water fowl, migratory birds, fish, aquatic life and wildlife habitats around the property.

For all the aforementioned reasons we oppose the rezoning development as presented.

We are open to compromise regarding ideas that would eliminate or strongly mitigate our concerns.

The road network is comprised of 3 internal cul-da-sac roads. The site also includes non-programed open space areas, and stormwater detention ponds. Two streams that feed into Deaton Creek begin on the property though there is no flood plain. The property will be served by sanitary sewer from Hall County and public water will be provided by the City of Gainesville. In addition to the narrative, the applicant submitted an entry monument concept which includes both stone and brick features, with the name of the subdivision in the middle.

A traffic study prepared by Marc R. Acampora, PE, LLC and dated February 11, 2022 studied the intersections of Union Church Road at Winder Highway/SR 53, Union Church Road at Union Circle, and Union Church Road at Old Winder Highway/SR 211. In addition to the intersection counts, a 24-hour bi-directional count was collected on Union Church Road along the subject property frontage. All counts were collected on Tuesday, February 1, 2022. Area schools were in session on the day on which the counts were recorded.

The following are the findings and recommendations of this study:

1. The existing analysis reveals overall generally acceptable traffic operations, but one location that operates unacceptably. At Union Church Road at Union Circle, the eastbound stop sign

controlled approach incurs high delays in the a.m. peak. The volumes at this intersection call for the addition of a northbound left turn lane and an eastbound right turn lane or a change in control to a roundabout or a signal. This intersection is a good candidate for a roundabout and a single-lane roundabout would allow the intersection and all approaches to operate at LOS A. The identified lanes or change in control are system improvements that are needed whether or not the proposed subdivision is developed.

- Traffic volume growth trends in this area have been generally positive and moderate and this is expected to continue into the future. A five year build-out horizon to 2027 was chosen for construction and sales of the homes. Market conditions will dictate this timeline.
- 3. No-build operations at the study intersections will be comparable to the existing, with the same one failing location. A roundabout at the Union Church Road / Union Circle intersection would allow the intersection and all approaches to operate at LOS A with no-build volumes.
- 4. The proposed subdivision will generate 108 new trips in the a.m. peak hour, 145 new trips in the p.m. peak hour, and 1,465 new 24-hour weekday trips.
- 5. The future condition will see operations comparable to the no-build condition. The recommendations identified for the existing and no-build conditions will continue to be appropriate in the future build condition. No offsite mitigation is necessitated by this project.
- 6. Hall County Code requires a northbound right turn lane and southbound left turn lane on Union Church Road at each project access.
- 7. It is recommended that one entering and one exiting lane be provided in both accesses. The exiting approaches should be controlled by side street stop sign and accompanying stop bar.
- 8. The project civil engineer should comply with applicable access design standards including sight distances, turn lane storage and taper lengths, turn radii, roadway widths, and grades.

History and Existing Land Uses

The subject property is 50.75± acre in size and zoned Agricultural-Residential-III (AR-III). The property is undeveloped. The majority of the property is wooded, and two streams are located on the southern portion of the site.

Surrounding properties to the north and south are zoned AR-III and are developed with low-density residential or agricultural uses. To the west across Union Church Road is Steeple Chase Estates, zoned PRD, and to the east is undeveloped agricultural land, zoned AR-III.

A heated floor analysis of the area surrounding the subject property provided the following information:

Comprehensive Plan Land Use Designation

The subject area falls within the "Residential" future land use designation. Residential areas are characterized by moderate-density residential development and neighborhoods. Street networks are defined by curvilinear streets and green space is largely provided on individual lots but neighborhood open space and/or park amenities may also be provided. Pedestrian connectivity is moderate, where sidewalks may be internal to a neighborhood, but may not currently connect nearby parks and schools.

Future development is intended to be detached, single-family homes at moderate densities (2 dwellings per acre), with opportunities for variations in housing size and types through the Planned Development District zoning classification. New development should provide opportunities for open space/greenspace, including shared areas for the benefit of residents and ample tree cover.

The proposed density of the new development is 2.98 units per acre.

The request is inconsistent with the Comprehensive Plan.

Development Support and Constraints

Hall County Environmental Health

In an email dated April 7, 2022 Emily McGahee states "No Comment. Public sewer."

Hall County Fire Services

The subject parcel is located approximately 2.2 miles from Hall County Fire Station 12, located at 4890 Winder Highway. There is a fire hydrant located in front of the property along Union Church Road.

Hall County Public Works and Utilities

In a memorandum dated April 14, 2022, Bill Nash, Interim Director of Public Works and Utilities, stated the following:

Engineering:

- The site may require a stormwater management report should the site plan indicate the
 proposed development meets stormwater thresholds for impervious surfaces and/or
 disturbed acreage. Show stream buffer and impervious setback from wrested vegetation
 not centerline of stream.
- Mail kiosk must meet Hall County standards.
- No parking allowed in right-of-way.
- Applicant is required to perform a historic and cultural evaluation before approval.

Traffic:

- Traffic impact study required prior to consideration (County Code 17.380.050 paragraph 4) additional comments/ recommendations may be necessary based on the study.
- Left and right (decel) turn lanes will be required (County Code 16.60.290).
- Recommend any proposed/required secondary access be gated, emergency access only.
- Proposed northern access does not appear to meet spacing requirements with Steeple Chase Lane, location may need to be modified.

Utilities:

All proposed developments requiring sanitary sewer shall be required to produce a preliminary

layout and description of the proposed sanitary sewer provisions in order to connect to the existing Hall County sanitary sewer system. All provisions for sanitary sewer construction must be approved by the Director of Public Works prior to submitting for a land disturbance permit.to rezoning.

Hall County Tax Assessors

No comment provided.

Gainesville Water Resources

A letter from the City of Gainesville Water Resources confirms the availability of water service to the property with capacity to serve the 150 proposed lots. The confirmation of water availability is good for one year.

Georgia Department of Transportation

In an email dated April 13, 2022 Parker Niebauer, D1TO Traffic Operations Supervisor, provided the following comment: "Request trip gen, request counts for SR 53 @ Union Church Rd."

Zoning Analysis

- The proposed density of the development is 2.98 units per acre. The recommended density is 2
 units per acre for property served by public sewer systems within a Planned Residential
 Development zoning district.
- A PRD allows for more flexibility in the design and development of the property. This provides for a mixture of housing types and encourages maximum use of natural features, through proper site planning measures. The development should conform to the existing character and development pattern of the surrounding area.
 - §17.180.060.B.2.a Lot area. Minimum lot area standards of 8,000 square feet for lots served by sanitary sewer.
 - The request **does not meet** the minimum lot area standards. The applicant is proposing a minimum lot size of 6,250 square feet.
 - §17.180.060.B.2.b Lot width. Minimum lot width of 50 feet for detached single-family residences.
 - The request meets the minimum width standards.
 - §17.180.060.B.2.c Setbacks The PRD district requires the following standards for detached single-family residences:
 - Minimum front yard setback from the property line of 25 feet
 - The applicant is proposing a 20 foot front yard setback, which does not meet the standard.
 - Minimum side yard setback from the property line of 5 feet
 - The applicant is proposing a 5 foot side setback, which **meets** the standard.
 - Minimum rear yard setback from the property line of 20 feet
 - The applicant is proposing a 20 foot rear yard setback, which meets the standard.
 - §17.180.060.B.5 Buffers: A minimum 50 foot planted buffer shall be established along the perimeter of all property boundaries adjacent to residential and/or non-residential

zoning districts to ensure that the planned residential development is appropriately screened.

- The applicant is proposing a 50 foot landscape buffer along the exterior boundaries; this meets the standard.
- §17.180.060.B.6 Landscape requirements requires that all requirements §17.280, Tree Protection, shall be met, and in addition, a minimum of 2 trees per lot shall be provided or preserved in the front, side, or rear yard. Trees that are provided or preserved to meet the two trees per lot may not be counted toward the overall development's tree density unit requirements.
 - The applicant has include any information related to street trees. It cannot be determined if the standard is met.
- §17.180.060.B.7.b requires that all PRDs construct sidewalks on both sides of the streets that are a minimum of five feet wide.
 - The applicant has include any information sidewalks. It cannot be determined if the standard is met.
- §17.180.060.B.8 requires that there shall be a minimum of at least thirty percent (30%) of the gross tract area provided in open space.
 - The applicant is proposing a minimum of 33.5% open space to remain within the development; this meets the standard.
- §17.180.060.B.9.a provides architectural standards for all planned residential developments. Alternatively, detailed architectural design guidelines and standards can be submitted by the applicant to include garage types and placement, elevations of all sides, building materials, etc. All facades of all residences, including single-family, two-family, and/or multi-family, and any non-residential buildings shall be finished with brick, stone, stucco, wood siding, wood shakes, or fiber cement type siding. The front facades shall incorporate changes in building material, texture, and/or color. Vinyl siding on all residential and non-residential buildings shall be prohibited.
 - The applicant has not included any information related to the architectural standards for the development. It **cannot be determined** if the standard is met.
- §17.180.060.B.9.b.i Garage doors shall be oriented towards the street. Garage doors shall be positioned between five and 20 feet behind the front wall plane of the residence, extending no more than 40 percent of the width of the residence.
 - The application does not indicate the orientation of garage doors in relation to the front wall plane of the residence or the percentage the garage would comprise of the front façade width of the residence. It cannot be determined if the standard.
- §17.180.060.B.11 relates to the United States Postal Service (USPS) policy that all new subdivisions and new phases of existing subdivisions are required to provide *Cluster mailbox unit (CBU)* for regular mail service delivery. A CBU is a structure or shelter housing multiple mailbox units to serve each residential dwelling of the development for the express purpose of regular mail delivery provided by the USPS.
 - The application includes a mail kiosk within the proposed development; this meets
 the standard.

Ridgeline Land Planning, Inc. is requesting to rezone 50.2364 acres located at 4670 Union Church Rd from AR-III to PRD. The proposed rezoning is to allow development of a Residential single-family community. The Hall County Future Development Map designates this area for future residential growth. The community will consist of 150 homes at a density of 2.98 units per acre, and over 30% open space. The proposed community is bordered to the Nort, East, and South by AR-III zoned property. To the west there are AR-III and PRD zoned properties. The proposed community will provide a 50-foot exterior buffer as required by Hall County PRD ordinance to protect adjacent properties. This request is proposing a lot dimension of 50' x 125' with 20' front setbacks, 20' rear setbacks, and 5' side setbacks. The applicant is proposing a minimum heated floor area of 2,000 square feet for single story homes and 2,200 square feet for two story homes. Facially and as applied to the Property, the application of Hall County ordinances or Comprehensive Plan which restrict the Property to any zoning classification, conditions, uses, or to any development other than that proposed by the Applicant is unconstitutional, illegal, null, and void, constituting a taking and/or damaging of Applicant's Property by denying the Applicant all economically viable use of its land while not substantially advancing legitimate state interests in violation of the United States Constitution's Just Compensation Clause of the Fifth Amendment and the Equal Protection and Due Process Clauses of the Fourteenth Amendment and the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1983.

The denial of this application would be an arbitrary and capricious act by Hall County without any rational basis, thus constituting an abuse of discretion in violation of the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1983 and Due Process Clauses of the Fourteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution.

A major concern of our residents is that their forever homes will be devalued greatly due to the possible building of starter tract housing in such close proximity to Steeplechase Estates. Furthermore, residents agree that this type of housing is <u>definitely not in keeping with the character of the large lots and established homes in this area.</u>

At the Planning Commission meeting, the builder's representative was asked by Commissioners if they could possibly build nicer homes that would be more suitable for this area. He responded saying that (and I quote) "the company would could not make enough money if they did that".

When addressing this comment with Steeplechase residents, they responded by stating that "this company would be making money on our backs and devaluing our homes in the process.

Questions neighbors have about Ridgeline's plans:

- 1. In order for the builder to save money, will all these homes be just alike or similar?
- 2. Will any of the proposed homes be rentals or rentals to purchase?

Road safety is a very worrisome concern for Steeplechase residents. It is estimated that with four more subdivisions ... Union Grove, the Alpaca farm, Reveille and now this new one up for approval, that there may well be over 2,000 additional drivers daily on Union Church Road, a narrow and winding road with no shoulders. Todd Casper of the Hall County Sheriff's Office states that there have been 24 accidents just between the short span between Cash Road and Union Place Road between 10/16 and 4/22.

As it stands now, to the right of Steeplechase Lane, there is a large hump in the highway that drivers must come over. With very limited sight distance, our residents must always <u>look to the right last</u> and quickly "gun it" to safely enter the road. We are already constantly having to back up to avoid being hit by cars speeding over this hump. Because we have some new and inexperienced drivers in Steeplechase, we are especially anxious about this situation.

With a major increase in traffic projected, residents ask that Commissioners work with the DOT to take steps to make the intersection either a three way stop, put in speed bumps, or grade down this dangerous hump. Additionally, they request that the access roads to the proposed subdivision be aligned so that they will not cause additional safety issues.



Applicant Proposal

The applicants are requesting permission for a use subject to County Commission approval for a farm-style dog daycare, boarding facility with the potential for family and community events on an Agricultural-Residential-IV (AR-IV) zoned property. The subject property is 30.62± acres in size and developed with 2 mobile homes, a barn, and various outbuildings. The applicants intend to purchase the subject property and convert it into the commercial kennel use.

The narrative describes the applicant's vision of creating a farm-style dog daycare and boarding facility, including a family style dog park with families and their dogs can play with their dogs in a safe environment. The narrative states that the subject property has previously been used as a horse farm and is entirely fenced. They intend to use approximately 2-3 acres of the property at a time for the dog daycare. The number of dogs shall be limited to 50 for daycare services and 20 for overnight boarding. The applicant also states that certain dogs are not permitted at their facility, including, German Shepherds, Pit Bulls, Doberman Pinschers, Rottweilers, and Presa Canaros.

The proposed hours of operation are between 8:00am to 6:00pm daily, with a daily shuttle service used to pick up dogs within the area. Staff will be on the property before and after the public hours for the care of the dogs. The dogs will be kept in pens, or runs on the property with access to both shade and water. If there is inclement weather than the existing barns will be used for shelter.

The applicant intends to utilize the existing signage on the rock wall at the entrance of the property, updating it with their name. The applicant also notes that the existing office and bathrooms for the horse farm will be remodeled but remain office and bathroom space.

History and Existing Land Uses

The subject property is developed with two mobile homes, a barn, and various other outbuildings. The property is primarily open fields, with trees lining the streams which cross the property. The adjacent properties are medium to large agricultural and residential tracts of land. Across the street are 9 properties zoned Residential-I (R-I) that range in size from 1 to 1.83 acres and are developed with site built single family residences

Comprehensive Plan Land Use Designation

The subject area falls within the "Rural Residential" land use designation. This designation is characterized by agricultural and very low-density single-family residential uses. The primary future land use includes agricultural/forestry uses, low-density detached single-family residences, civil benefits such as parks and places of worship, and greenways and trails.

Development Support and Constraints

Hall County Environmental Health

In an email dated April 29, 2022, Emily McGahee states: "Must meet all Environmental Health commercial septic system permitting requirements. Further determination will be made during the civil plan review process. A detailed business plan must be submitted to Hall County Environmental Health for review. Additional items, including, but not limited to: recorded plat, soil evaluation, existing septic system evaluation, or septic system installation/modification may be required after review of business plan. Tourist Accommodation permit/plan review and/or Food Service permit/plan review may be required after review of business plan."

Hall County Fire Services

The subject property is located approximately 3.1 miles from Hall County Fire Station #15, located at 4219 Autry Spur Road. There is fire hydrants located approximately 350 feet from the southern property line, in front of 4321 Hunter Road.

Hall County Public Works and Utilities

In a memo dated April 29, 2022, Bill Nash, Interim Director of Public Works and Utilities, provided the following comment:

Hall County Tax Assessors

No comments were provided.

Gainesville Water Resources

The Hall County GIS shows that public water ends at the southern boundary of the property and could likely be access if it was needed.

Georgia Department of Transportation

This project will not require GDOT coordination.

Zoning Analysis

- 1. The proposed use is consistent with the comprehensive plan.
- 2. §17.20.620 of the Hall County Zoning Regulations defines a commercial kennel as any place in or at which more than four adult dogs (or cats) are kept for the purpose of sale, boarding, care, breeding or training and for which any fee is charged. A commercial kennel shall be located on not less than five acres of land in the residential zoning districts. The raising of four or fewer adult dogs (or cats) would be inherently allowed in all residential zones that allow a commercial kennel.
 - The applicant's request for a dog daycare and boarding facility on a 30.62± acre property fits the definition of a commercial kennel.
- 3. §17.240.060 of the Hall County Zoning Regulations states that in a commercial kennel, no structure, including outside runs, for the keeping of dogs or cats shall be constructed closer than 200 feet to a property line.
 - The applicant's site plan does not indicate the proposed location for outdoor runs, so it cannot be determined the setback distance to property lines.
 - The existing barn, which will be used for boarding and in events of inclement weather, is approximately 165 feet to the front property line, 415 feet to the northern property line, 420 feet to the southern property line, and 855 feet to the rear property line. A variance would be required.
- 4. §17.120.040 of the Hall County Zoning Regulations requires commercial kennels to be approved by the County Commission in the AR-IV zoning district.
- 5. The residential and agricultural tracts in the surrounding area are predominantly larger acreage tracts.

Variances to the Official Code of Hall County

Staff recommends **approval** of the following variance:

- 1. §17.240.060 requires that no structure, including outside runs, for the keeping of dogs or cats shall be constructed closer than 200 feet to a property line.
 - a. This shall apply to the existing barn only.

Applicant's Presentation:

Randi Doveton, Planning Director, presented a summary of the request.

Megan Partrick, 143 Woodlake Drive, Gainesville, presented the request. The applicant is proposing a doggy day care and boarding with a shuttle service that a will pick up and drop off dogs from their homes. The applicant stated that they hope to have occasional events for people to take their dogs and socialize.

Rebuttal

The applicant stated that there would only be three employees at most at the location since there will be a shuttle transporting the dogs to and from the location. The applicant stated that the events would only be occasional. Ms. Pilcher asked if the events were only for customers. The applicant stated they will also advertise it on social media to promote their business.

Public Forum:

Michael Lance, 4303 Hunter Road, Gainesville, spoke in opposition. Concerns were traffic overflow and no paving on Hunter Road.

Emily Lance, 4303 Hunter Road, Gainesville, spoke in opposition. Concerns were no paving on Hunter Road and traffic.

Planning Commission Comments:

The applicant stated the hours of operation for the doggy daycare were Monday - Friday, 8 am - 6 pm. The applicant stated the dogs will be picked up on the shuttle between 7 am - 9 am and dropped off between 3 pm - 5 pm. Mr. Braswell stated that there will have to be some boundaries when it comes to events due to the location being off a narrow unpaved road. Mr. Varner questioned if one event per quarter would work for the applicants. The applicant said yes. Mr. Braswell stated that it

would be best to not have the shuttle bus running on Hunter Road during school bus pickup and drop off times.

<u>Motion:</u> A motion to approve, with conditions was made by Mr. Hunt and seconded by Mr. Bell. Vote: 5-0

Conditions:

- Development shall be as generally depicted on the proposed plan and narrative as submitted.
 - 2. A variance to the 200 foot setback requirement shall be approved for the existing barn so that it may be utilized as shelter for the dogs in inclement weather.
 - 3. All outdoor runs utilized for the business shall meet the 200 foot setback requirement or a variance shall be obtained.
 - 4. As stated in the applicant's narrative, the following dog breeds are not permitted at their facility, German Shepherds, Pit Bulls, Doberman Pinschers, Rottweilers, and Presa Canaros.
 - 5. The proposed use shall be limited to the submitted narrative and site plan, and shall exclude any and all breeding activities.
 - 6. There shall be a maximum of 50 dogs for the daycare facility and 20 for overnight boarding.
 - 7. Unsupervised outdoor dog activity shall be limited to proposed business hours only, 8:00 am 6:00 pm daily. Office operation for boarding shall be from 8:00 am 6:00 pm, Monday Sunday and Doggy day care shall operate from 8:00 am 6:00 pm, Monday Friday.

Bark Camp Farm exists to serve the Hall County community by providing a world class, farm-style dog daycare and boarding facility. We have a shuttle service to pick up dogs within our area of service and then drop them off at the farm to run, play with friends and our staff, and be a dog. We believe dogs were meant to run and we want to give the pets of our community a fun, safe, and wide open area to do just that.

Vision

Our vision is to create a farm-style dog daycare and boarding facility that can be enjoyed by the dogs of our community. We also envision creating a family friendly farm-style dog park where families and individuals can come play with their dogs in a safe and open environment. Our hope is to host events that serve our community in a dog-friendly way.

Service Description

To provide a convenient, safe, and fun farm for dogs to run and roam freely. Our premium service will provide transportation to and from the dog owner's home and/or place of work. We will also provide spacious boarding for dogs.

- 1. History of what was there.
 - 1. It is our understanding that 4294 Hunter Road has been used as a horse farm for several decades. It has also been used as a horse boarding facility and farm. There are also 2 mobile homes on the property currently rented. This farm is just under 31 acres and has been fenced and cross fenced. The fencing parameters will allow our dogs to run freely in a safe and guarded environment. We plan to utilize 2-3 acres at a time and transition dog runs periodically to allow for more exploration and discovery.
- 2. Neighboring Properties:
 - 1. Neighbor to the south fronting on Jim Hood Road trains police dogs.

2. Neighbor to the north owns 46 acres in one tract and 6 acres in another tract. Her





- 3. There is a corporate neighbor to the east across the street that recently bought 7 houses on 9 acres. Houses are used as rental houses.
- 3. Limit the number of dogs.
 - 1. Our target limit number of dogs for daycare services is 50 per day. For overnight boarding our initial limit is 20 dogs per night.
- 4. Bark Camp Farm reserves the right to deny certain breeds from using our facilities and dog parks/runs. While not exhaustive, our policies prohibit German Shepherds, Pit Bulls, Doberman Pinschers, Rottweilers, and Presa Canarios. Our policies also allow us the right to quarantine and prohibit any dog that shows aggression towards other dogs or humans.
- 5. Maximum days of stay.
 - 1. The maximum days of stay for overnight boarding is 10 days. Boarded dogs will be put away for the night between 7-8pm after they are fed and let out. They will be fed and let out between 6-7am and then spend the rest of the day roaming and playing with daycare dogs.
- 6. Percentage of time inside vs. outside.
 - 1. Weather permitting all boarding dogs will participate in the farm-style daycare offered. For inclement weather we will also utilize the existing horse barn for an indoor obstacle course, dog park, and cooldown/hydration area. Shade and hydration stations available throughout the dog runs and play areas.
- 7. Hours of operation.
 - 1. 8AM to 6PM for Daycare Operation with staff on site earlier and later at times.
- 8. Signage. The existing property has a rock wall and Ravan Farms sign embedded in it. We will utilize this with our new sign.
- 9. Access. Hunter Road is a short gravel road that runs from HWY 129 to Jim Hood Road. There are 3 gravel driveways from Hunter Road into this 30+ acre tract. We will use the existing gravel driveways for our proposed uses.

- 5. This conditional use approval shall be granted for this applicant only and shall be applicant specific.
- 6. All external lighting shall meet Hall County standards specified in code.

Applicant Proposal

The applicant is requesting a Use Subject to County Commission approval for a self-storage warehouse facility on a 4.75± acre parcel zoned Highway Business (H-B). According to the

narrative, the proposed development will consist of 6 mini-storage buildings, totaling 21,040 square feet of storage area, and plans to convert the existing residence into an office for storage management. Additionally, the applicant intends to utilize a gravel area in the southwest corner of the property for boat and RV storage. The business will include U-Haul rentals with these vehicles to be parked behind the remodeled office.

The applicant's narrative states that the storage building fronting Candler Road will include full height brick masonry on the front and sides of the building, with no roll-up doors fronting the roadway, to be in compliance with the Gateway Corridors Overlay District (GCOD) standards. The remaining 5 buildings will be constructed of typical factory finish colored metal wall/roof panel construction with roll-up doors. The narrative states that the terrain of the property slopes away from the road and that the first storage building will conceal the others from view from the road.

The applicant proposes to plant the front of the property with trees and shrubbery and evergreen trees (Green Giant Arborvitae) will be planted along the side property lines to provide a buffer/screening.

Ornamental fencing with brick column accents will border the side fronting Candler Road, with black vinyl chain link located along the side and rear property lines to secure the facility. Lighting will be provided by Jackson EMC in the storage areas. There is a proposed monument sign to be constructed from materials matching the decorative fencing positioned perpendicular to Candler Road/State Route 60. The sign will be externally illuminated with non-spill up lighting for nighttime visibility. The masonry for the sign will not exceed 13 feet in width and 10 feet in height with the sign area proposed to be 8 foot by 4 foot/32 square feet.

The proposed hours of operation for the management office are Monday – Friday 9:00am to 5:00pm and Saturdays from 9:00am to 12:00noon. Customers will have 24/7 access to the storage area through a gate.

History and Existing Land Uses

The subject property measures approximately 4.75± acres and is zoned Agricultural Residential-IV (AR-IV). This appears to be the original zoning designation. Records from Hall County Tax Assessors indicate that there is one single-family residence which was constructed in 1938.

The subject property was rezoned to Highway Business (H-B) on December 12, 2019 for the proposed use of a self-storage warehouse development with five conditions:

- The development shall conform substantially with the proposed site plan and narrative, modified as necessary for compliance with current development standards at time of site plan approval.
- 2. All development of the property shall conform with §17.420, Gateway Corridors Overlay District (GCOD) standards.
- 3. All conditions of zoning shall be made a part of any plat of the property.
- 4. The front of the property shall be bordered by a decorative wrought iron style fence with masonry column accents. The remainder of the property shall be fenced per GCOD standards. The fencing is subject to the approval of the Planning Director.

5. There shall be a 25 foot landscaped buffer in accordance with the GCOD standards where the property abuts a residential or agricultural property.

The surrounding properties are zoned AR-IV, with the property to the southwest being occupied by Myers Elementary School. To the north along Candler Road is a Dollar General store, which is zoned Highway Business (H-B). Across Candler Road and the train tracks is both AR-IV and Heavy Industrial (I-II) zoned property.

Comprehensive Plan Land Use Designation

The subject area falls within the "Employment Corridor" future land use designation. These corridors have been identified as having the potential to enhance and maintain well-functioning, attractive corridors that facilitate vehicular traffic flow and pedestrian/bicycle connectivity, serve local needs, and coordinate land use patterns without encroaching on adjacent neighborhoods. Also these corridors intend to create employment opportunities where a location benefits from interstate access or supports industrial-focused development patterns.

The subject parcel also falls within the Gateway Corridors Overlay District (GCOD) and is supplemental to the underlying zoning district classifications. The GCOD governs non-residential property development standards.

The request is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan.

Development Support and Constraints

Hall County Environmental Health

In an email dated April 29, 2022, Emily McGahee provided the following comment: "A detailed business plan must be submitted to Hall County Environmental Health for review. Must meet all Environmental Health commercial septic system permitting requirements if septic system is required."

Hall County Fire Services

The subject property is located approximately 0.6 miles from Hall County Fire Station #9 located at 5040 Poplar Springs Road, Gainesville. The nearest fire hydrant is located just south of the property along Candler Road, approximately 25 feet away.

Hall County Public Works and Utilities

Per a memo dated April 28, 2022, from Bill Nash, Interim Director of Public Works and Utilities, the following comments were provided:

Engineering

The site may require a stormwater management report, should the site plan indicate the proposed development meets stormwater thresholds for impervious surfaces and/or disturbed acreage. Show stream buffer and impervious setback from wrested vegetation, not centerline of creek.

Traffic Engineering

Driveway would be permitted by GDOT.

Utilities

Located in Gainesville-Hall County joint sewer district. Currently, Hall County has no sanitary sewer in this area.

Hall County Tax Assessors

No comment provided.

Gainesville Water Resources

Public water is available from the City of Gainesville along Candler Road.

Georgia Department of Transportation

In an email dated April 26, 2022, Parker Niebauer, D1TO Traffic Operations Supervisor for the Georgia Department of Transportation, acknowledged that this project would require GDOT coordination.

Zoning Analysis

- The applicant is requesting a Use Subject to County Commission approval in order to develop a 21,040 square foot self-storage facility.
 - The proposed use is consistent with the Hall County Comprehensive Plan.
- §17.240.040 of the Official Code of Hall County provides standards for setbacks from arterial streets.
 - Specifically, no structure may be placed less than 100 feet from the center line of an arterial street.
 - It cannot be determined if this standard as met, but it appears that the proposed storage building is located approximately 70 feet from the centerline of Candler Road.
- In 2007, the Hall County Board of Commissioners adopted the Gateway Corridors Overlay District (GCOD) standards as part of the Official Code of Hall County. The GCOD governs non-residential property development standards.
 - A self-storage facility is a conditional use subject to county commissioner approval within the Gateway Corridor Overlay District. This application addresses this approval requirement.
- §17.420.050.C. of the Official Code of Hall County provides standards for transitional buffers for properties within the GCOD.
 - Specifically, a transitional buffer shall be required along and inside the property line of a non-residential property abutting a residentially zoned property. Where a commercial zoning district abuts property zoned for single-family residential or agricultural use, the minimum width shall be 25 feet.
 - The site plan shows a 25 foot buffer along the southern, western, and the rear portion of the northern property line where it is adjacent to AR-IV zoned parcels. This standard is met.
 - Transitional buffers that are 25 feet in width or greater shall meet at least two of the three following criteria: be planted with a staggered double row of evergreen trees at least six feet in height, a single row of deciduous shade trees at least two inches caliper dbh, (minimum 30 feet height at maturity) and two staggered rows of evergreen shrubs

at least three feet in height, planted a maximum of four feet on center, or other arrangement approved by the director that provides a dense visual screen.

- The applicant has indicated that Green Giant Arborvitae evergreen trees will be planted to provide buffer and screening, but there was no detailed landscape plan submitted so it cannot be determined if this standard is met.
- §17.420.050.D. of the Official Code of Hall County provides standards for other landscaping requirements, including building perimeter walls, street frontage, loading and service areas, and screening of storage and accessory equipment.
 - Based on the submitted narrative and site plan it cannot be determined if these standards are met.
- §17.420.050.E. of the Official Code of Hall County provides standards for parking lot design including paving materials and landscaping requirements.
 - Specifically, §17.420.050.E.3 requires all parking areas to be paved with asphalt or concrete.
 - The proposed boat and RV storage area is proposed to be gravel and as such does not meet this standard and a variance would be required.
- §17.420.050.F. of the Official Code of Hall County provides standards for outdoor lighting for the development. The applicant has stated that the lighting would be provided by Jackson EMC but has not detailed the proposed type of lighting.
 - Only incandescent, florescent, metal halide, low-pressure sodium, or color corrected, high-pressure sodium may be used. The same type of lighting must be used for the same or similar types of lighting on any one site.
 - It cannot be determined if this standard is met.
- §17.420.050.G of the Official Code of Hall County discusses interparcel access.
 - Interparcel access, joint driveways, cross access drives and access easements shall be strongly encouraged for adjacent non-residential development along an arterial or collector street, except where the director determines that they are unfeasible because of topographic or other site-specific constraints.
 - There is no proposed interparcel access between this development and the Dollar General property to the north. This standards is not met.
- §17.420.050.H. of the Official Code of Hall County provides detailed architectural standards for non-residential buildings, including the use of a common palette of building materials maintained for all sides of principal buildings.
 - Building materials used for all four sides of new or reconstructed buildings are restricted to the following: brick, stone, split-face block/concrete masonry unit (CMU, restricted to 50 percent of the surface area of each side of a principal building), stucco (restricted to 50 percent of the surface area of each side of a building), glass and glass block. Exposed metal is prohibited, as is exposed or painted concrete block and precast concrete walls.
 - The applicant has requested a variance from this standard and is proposing that the building closest to Candler Road meet the GCOD standards but all elevations of the remaining self-storage building include metal. No elevations were included as part of the application. This does not meet GCOD standards and a variance would be required.
- §17.420.060. of the Official Code of Hall County discusses sign standards for the Gateway Corridor Overlay district.
 - There is a proposed monument sign to be constructed from materials matching the decorative fencing positioned perpendicular to Candler Road/State Route 60. The sign will be externally illuminated with non-spill up lighting for nighttime visibility. The

masonry for the sign will not exceed 13 feet in width and 10 feet in height with the sign area proposed to be 8 foot by 4 foot/32 square feet.

- The maximum height of the sign and square footage of the sign face based upon gross floor area of the building:
 - 0—10,000 sq. ft. of gross floor area
 - o 32 sq. ft. (each side)
 - o 8 ft. above street grade
 - 10,001—50,000 sq. ft.
 - o 48 sq. ft. (each side)
 - o 8 ft. above street grade
 - 50,001—100,000 sq. ft.
 - o 64 sq. ft. (each side)
 - 10 ft. above street grade
 - Over 100,000 sq. ft.
 - o 96 sq. ft. (each side)
 - o 12 ft. above street grade
- Additionally, §17.270.030.M outlines the standards for the supporting structures a sign. Specifically, supporting structures of natural finish brick masonry, stone masonry, or wood shall not be counted in the sign area, provided that:
 - a. Such structures do not extend more than one foot above or two feet beyond the ends of the sign;
 - The proposed height of the monument is 10 feet and the proposed width is 13 feet. This does not meet the standard as the sign area is only proposed to be 8 feet in width and 4 feet in height. A variance would be required.
 - b. The height of the combined sign and supporting structure does not exceed the maximum height allowed in this chapter; and
 - The proposed height of 10 feet exceed the maximum height of 8 feet above grade. This does not meet the standard and a variance would be required.
 - c. The area of the combined sign and supporting structure does not exceed twice the area of the sign itself.
 - The combined sign and supporting structure is 132 square feet, which does exceed twice the area of the sign itself. This does not meet the standard and a variance would be required.

Variances to the Official Code of Hall County

Based upon the applicant's narrative and submitted materials, the following variances would be needed for the project as described. Staff recommends **denial** to the following variances to maintain the integrity of the Gateway Corridors Overlay District standards:

- 1. §17.240.040 requires that no structure be placed less than 100 feet from the center line of an arterial street.
- 2. §17.420.050.E.3 requires all parking areas to be paved with asphalt or concrete.
- 3. §17.420.050.H.2 requires the use of a common pallet of building materials for all four sides of principal buildings.
- 4. §17.270.030.M and §17.420.060 provide the sign standards for this development.

Staff Recommendation

Staff recommends approval of the applicant's request with the following conditions:

- 1. The development shall conform substantially with the proposed site plan and narrative, modified as necessary for compliance with current development standards at time of site plan approval.
- 2. All development of the property shall conform with §17.420, Gateway Corridors Overlay District (GCOD) standards.
- 3. No variance to the Official Code of Hall County are granted as part of this request.
- 4. All conditions of zoning shall be made a part of any plat of the property.
- All exterior architectural standards of the Gateway Corridors Overlay District shall be subject to review and approval of the Planning Director prior to site plan and building permit approval.
- 6. Any change of ownership of the property or substantial change to the proposed use will require a new use permit application to be submitted for review as specified in the Hall County Code of Ordinances.

Excerpts from the minutes of the May 16, 2022 meeting

Applicant's Presentation:

Randi Doveton, Planning Director, presented a summary of the request.

James Irvin, 164 Professional Drive, Baldwin, presented the request. The applicant stated that the owner would like to only have masonry siding on three sides of the first building adjacent to Candler Road because it was the only building visible from the road. The applicant presented a rendering of the fence facing Candler Road. The applicant stated they are willing to make the buildings 20 feet wide rather than 22 feet to give an extra 10 foot front buffer. The applicant stated they would like gravel area in the back for an open RV and boat storage. The applicant stated that the gravel area will not be visible from the road.

Jay Wilhoite, 1044 Poem House Road, Gainesville, presented the request.

Danny Crane, 207 East Fork Lane, Pendergrass, presented the request.

Public Forum:

There were no comments in support or opposition.

Planning Commission Comments:

Mr. Bell questioned if the property was visible to the school in the back. Mr. Hunt stated that the property line next to the school is fairly vegetated. Mr. Irvin stated that they have planted various trees for that purpose. Mr. Bell stated that it would be best to let the buildings meet Gateway standards and let them have the 30 foot setback with quality buildings. Mr. Braswell stated that he agreed and would like to see a quality development. Mr. Wilhoite stated that they would prefer metal panels because they are easier to replace if there is damage over time and if a vehicle hits brick masonry it will be more damage to customer vehicles. Mr. Hunt stated that there was no problem with the gravel parking in the back due to the vegetation buffer already in place from the neighboring back property. Mr. Crane wanted to make a comment that beyond the power line easement there is

very low visibility. Mr. Wilhoite presented the proposed sign for the facility. Mr. Wilhoite stated that the sign would be 10 to 11 feet wide and under 8 feet high and the surface area will be 48 square feet. Mr. Braswell stated that would be allowed under Gateway standards.

The existing use of the property located at 2654 Candler Rd., Gainesville is a primarily undeveloped lot with the exception of a small house situated in the northeast corner, adjacent Dollar General. The lot is deeded 4.75 +/- acres with Dollar General located to the north and Meyers Elementary School to the southern border. Property is currently zoned AR-IV and requesting rezoning to H-B for conditional use of self-storage units and RV/boat storage.

We propose a total of 6 mini-storage units totaling 21,340 SF on the property and convert the existing structure to an office for rental management. RV & boat storage would be located at the indicated gravel area at the SW corner of the property. U-Haul parking to be situated behind office building in the asphalt lot. Stormwater detention area to be located at rear of property.

The storage building fronting Candler will include full height brick masonry at front and sides with no roll-up doors fronting roadway to create a sense of place that is aesthetically appealing in keeping with GCOD standards. Mini-storage units behind the first will be typical factory finish colored metal wall/roof panel construction with roll-up doors. Property terrain slopes away from road and designed in such a way the first storage building will conceal the others from view from the road. There is a 13'-0" drop in elevation from the road to the first storage building. Landscaping beds, trees and shrubbery will be planted along front setback, and evergreen trees (Green Giant Arborvitae) will be planted at side setbacks of property for buffer/screening.

Ornamental fencing with brick column accents will border the side fronting Candler Road, with black vinyl chain link located at the sides and rear to secure the property. Light poles will be provided by Jackson EMC at storage areas. Monument signage to be constructed from matching/complimentary brick masonry to be positioned perpendicular to SR60 at the entrance. Monument signage including masonry to not exceed 13'-0" W x 10'-0" H with signage to be approximately 8' x 4'.

INTRODUCTION

The Parties to this Agreement mutually desire to enter into this Agreement to document their agreement to landscape and maintain a roughly circular property located in the center of a roundabout traffic intersection located in Hall County, Georgia currently owned by the County in fee simple (the "Property"), so as to allow the County to initially landscape and plant the Property in exchange for an agreement by the Company to perform ongoing future landscaping and maintenance of the same Property. The Property, which is located in close proximity to one or more developments or future developments of the Company, is illustrated and reflected in the document attached hereto as Exhibit A. In consideration of the terms and conditions contained herein and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged by the Parties, the Parties hereto agree as follows.

AGREEMENT

1. County Responsibilities

For and in consideration of the valuable promises made herein by the Company, the County agrees to initially provide full landscaping and planting for the Property which is illustrated and

reflected in the document attached hereto as Exhibit A, consisting of the center portion of a roundabout traffic intersection. The initial landscaping and planting shall be completed in general conformity with the Landscape Planting Plan on Sheet L-3 of Exhibit A and shall be completed no later than one year after the date that this Agreement is fully executed by all parties hereto.

2. Company's Responsibilities

For and in consideration of the valuable promises made herein by the County, the Company agrees to pay to the County the sum of \$100,000.00 within 30 days of the date that this Agreement is fully executed by the parties, and to be solely responsible for maintenance and landscaping of the Property illustrated and reflected in the document attached hereto as Exhibit A, consisting of the same center portion of the roundabout traffic intersection, following the County's initial landscaping and planting of the Property. The ongoing maintenance and landscaping by the Company shall be to a commercially reasonable standard consistent with the initial delivery of the Property as depicted in Exhibit A and shall be accomplished in a manner acceptable to the County. The Company agrees to allow the County to provide reasonable input into the style and character of any ongoing landscaping and maintenance. The Company's ongoing maintenance and landscaping of the Property shall be limited to the landscaping shown on Exhibit A and shall not include the ongoing maintenance of any hardscaping located on the Property or of any curbs, sidewalks, hardscaping, or roads associated with the adjacent roundabout traffic intersection.

3. Termination

Either Party may terminate this Agreement for any reason upon thirty (30) days' written notice to the other Party. Upon termination of this Agreement, the County shall assume any costs of providing electrical and water service to the Property and shall assume the responsibility for the ongoing maintenance and landscaping of the Property to a commercially reasonable standard consistent with the initial delivery of the Property as depicted in Exhibit A.

4. Severability

If any paragraph, sub-paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Agreement is declared invalid or unconstitutional by any Court of competent jurisdiction or if the provisions of any part of this Agreement as applied to any particular situation or set of circumstances shall be declared invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity shall not be construed to affect the remaining portions of this Agreement not so held to be invalid or the application of this Agreement to other circumstances not so held to be invalid.

5. Venue

The Parties agree that this Agreement shall be interpreted, construed, and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Georgia. To the extent that any party brings suit to enforce the terms of this Agreement, including suit in equity, the parties agree and consent to file any such suit in the Superior Court of Hall County, Georgia.

6. Modification

This Agreement may not be modified, amended, or added to except in writing fully executed by the Parties hereto. This Agreement constitutes the sole and entire agreement and understanding between the Parties as to the subject matter hereof, and no verbal promises have been made by any Party in relation hereto.

7. Third Parties

This Agreement is for the benefit of the Parties hereto only and is not intended to benefit any third party or to give rise to any duty or causes of action for any third party.

8. Immunities

No provision of this Agreement is intended to nor shall it be construed to in any way waive any immunities, protections, or defenses to liability provided to any Party hereto by the laws of the State of Georgia or by federal law.

9. Authorization

The Parties hereto specifically represent and certify that they have the power and authority under law to enter into this Agreement, and that the signatories below are authorized to sign this Agreement on behalf of each Party hereto.

10. Remedies

In the event that any Party to this Agreement breaches this Agreement, the non-breaching Party or Parties shall provide written notice to the breaching Party which describes the breach of this Agreement. The Party whose breach is alleged shall have 30 days from the date of receipt of the written notice to cure the breach or to otherwise negotiate a resolution of the breach. If the breach has not been cured and the Parties hereto have not resolved the issue described in the notice letter by 30 days after receipt of the notice letter, the Party or Parties authoring the letter shall be entitled to seek any and all remedies allowed by Georgia law.

11. No Waiver

The failure of any Party or Parties hereto to seek a remedy for any alleged breach of this Agreement shall not constitute a waiver of any claim, cause of action, or remedy allowed by Georgia law for breach hereof.

12. Successors and Assigns

This Agreement shall be binding upon the successors and assigns of the Parties hereto to the extent permitted by Georgia law.







It is the Intent of the Hall County Board of Commissioners to procure the services of a qualified firm to assist in the facilitation of treatment for the various programs comprising Hall County Treatment Services.

- A. <u>Scope:</u> To provide Hall County Treatment Services with a guaranteed bid price for a 12-month period. This contract will begin upon contract execution and be in effect until June 30, 2023. The successful bidder may be allowed two (2) annual one (1) year renewals of this contract all upon the same terms and conditions.
- B. <u>Contract Administration:</u> The contract administrator for this invitation and any contract(s) or purchase order(s) arising as a result of this invitation will be Julie Dorough, Buyer. All questions concerning this invitation and any questions unable to be resolved by user departments arising during the contract period are to be addressed to contracts administrator at jdorough@hallcounty.org.
- C. <u>User Departments:</u> Successful bidder will be required to deliver services and items covered by this invitation on an "as needed basis" during the life of contract from various departments who will be authorized to use this service during contract period.
- D. Quantities: None of the user departments, individually or collectively, shall be required to utilize a contract to any minimum or maximum amount during the life of a contract issued as a result of this invitation. The County when entering into a contract, reserves the right to solicit for bid any single service or group of like needs covered by such a contract, separately from said contract when deemed advantageous to the County to do so.
- E. <u>Vendor Information:</u> The services or items offered shall be comparable with the detailed requirements listed below (unless otherwise noted). Proposals for alternate services or products must be accompanied by a product brochure or specification sheet. The "H. Bidder's Response" section is used to verify compliance to item specifications and/or requirements. Any deviations from specifications or requirements must be noted by bidder in the section "K. 1. Basic Requirements

- Treatment Provider shall be an approved provider through Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Disabilities (DBHDD).
- Treatment Provider shall have qualified, certified (CACI, CACII, NCACI, NCACII or other State recognized certification for treatment of substance use disorders) and/or licensed (LPC, LMSW, PhD, or other appropriate licensure related to treatment of substance use disorders) staff who provide services.
- Treatment Provider will utilize State approved, evidence based curriculum and will ensure fidelity. Counselors providing group facilitation will have been trained in the specific curriculum and have obtained certification, if required.
 - o Evidence-based curriculums may include but are not limited to:
 - Moral Reconation Therapy (MRT)
 - Thinking for a Change
 - Anger Management for the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Clients (SAMHSA)
 - Relapse Prevention
 - Living in Balance
 - Matrix
 - Prime Solutions
 - Seeking Safety
 - Cognitive Behavioral Interventions for Substance Abuse (CBI-SA)
 - Curriculum schedule will be determined by Treatment Services policies and in collaboration with Treatment Provider.
- Treatment Provider shall assist in the facilitation of treatment for the various programs
 comprising Treatment Services. Facilitation of services will be held at set days and times
 based on specific programs and services will be rendered at Treatment Services' office
 building or Treatment Provider location(s) depending on specific program. Group days,
 times, and locations are subject to change at the discretion of Treatment Services based on
 program needs and available resources. Any changes will be discussed with Treatment
 Provider in advance.
- Treatment Provider shall provide a treatment liaison to participate on the various court teams, as assigned. The liaison will serve as the point of contact between the Treatment Provider, Treatment Services, and the court team. The liaison will attend staffing and court sessions, Probation Revocation hearings, policy meetings, etc. as assigned.
 - The treatment liaison will be provided with the dates, times, and locations for all scheduled staffing sessions, court sessions, policy meetings, Probation Revocation hearings, etc.
 - o The treatment liaison will provide weekly updates to their assigned court team via email, phone, case management database, or at staff meetings. He/she will notify the court coordinator of any program infraction (ie. missed treatment sessions, missed individual treatment appointment, etc.) within 24 hours. Treatment liaison will notify court coordinator of any incident involving a participant expressing suicidal/homicidal ideations, threatening behaviors, behavior indicating that a participant in under the influence of drugs or alcohol, medical emergencies, etc. immediately via phone or email.
- Treatment Provider shall include per hour cost of services for those participants who require additional treatment.

- Bid shall consist of service cost to participants prorated over the course of participation in
 the program AND breakdown of rate per group, individual therapy session, case
 management session and/or non-clinical task (i.e. administrative time, attendance at
 staffing, etc) if billed directly to Treatment Services instead of to individual participants. Bid is
 to be given without drug screening included (Treatment Services will provide all drug
 screening services.)
- Bid may be awarded to multiple providers at the county's discretion.
- Treatment Provider shall bid on providing services to both English and Spanish speaking populations depending on program needs.
- Treatment Provider shall agree to undergo audits conducted by Treatment Services to
 ensure clinical and programmatic fidelity as outlined by the standards set forth by Council of
 Accountability Court Judges.
- Treatment Provider reserves the right to blend participants of certain court programs as
 population fluctuates into alternative service based groups. This serves to enhance
 programming and ensure existence, specifically if the population falls below five (5)
 participants. This will be discussed with Treatment Services prior to occurrence.

2. General Services

- Treatment Provider may provide counselors to facilitate group and individuals sessions for the various programs comprising Treatment Services. These sessions will take place at Treatment Services located at 2318 Browns Bridge Road, Gainesville, Georgia 30503.
 Treatment Services will provide all materials and curriculum required for these sessions.
 Counselors will report at a specified time for group preparation and will attend debriefing with staff.
- Treatment Provider staff will input clinical notations into a specified case management database within 24 hours of service rendered. The data base will be provided by Treatment Services.
- At a minimum, provider must be able to facilitate 15 hours of group therapy (each group between 1-1.5 hours in length) weekly. Program scheduled are based on various programs within Treatment Services and are subject to change based on court need and population.

Vendor Information

Background

New Hope Counseling was founded in 1996 with the primary goal to make counseling affordable to ALL persons in needs of outpatient services. New Hope provides outpatient programming for the treatment of addictive diseases and their emotional, mental and behavioral consequences. New Hope also facilitates outpatient domestic violence programming to those charged with utilizing power and control tactics. Our focus is to encourage clients to change behavior through insight and understanding while working toward fulfilling the needs of the judicial system, social services, or their employer. Our goal is to facilitate growth and change for those who desire it, and a safe environment in which to experience self-acceptance.

Over the past 26 years, New Hope has worked hard to establish relationships with local agencies, including the court system, probation offices, parole, Department of Family and Children Services, as well as local attorneys and other agencies. Communication and flexibility with our referral sources is a key ingredient in our philosophy of treatment and have been integral components to the success of our agency.

New Hope Counseling is a DBHDD certified treatment provider offering DBHDD ASAM Level I treatment to first & multiple offenders in both of our locations. New Hope has two state certified clinical evaluators on board offering this individualized service to all levels of offenders. New Hope Counseling is also a state certified Family Violence Intervention Program provider offering behavior modification to those charged under the Family Violence Act.

In addition to serving the many local agencies previously mentioned, New Hope Counseling currently has contracts with the following agencies:

- > Hall County Treatment Services Accountability Court Programming outpatient treatment provider
- ➤ US Federal Probation outpatient treatment provider
- > Hall County State Court Veteran's Treatment Court outpatient treatment provider
- > State of Georgia Division of Family & Children Services outpatient treatment provider

In the past, we have developed a program specifically for state probationers in the Gainesville area to address their alcohol and drug issues at a time when minimal treatment at an affordable cost was

available to a mandated clientele. We also created and implemented the substance abuse treatment curriculum for a local RSAT program that continues successfully today.

Additionally, New Hope Counseling worked directly with the Hall County DUI Court in its early stages — from Inception to implementation. We were also a partner in the start-up and implementation of three DUI courts in Northeast Georgia — Hall, Dawson, and Forsyth Counties, as well as the Drug Court in Forsyth County. New Hope Counseling is familiar with and understands the dynamics of structured court programs. We also understand the need to consistently evaluate and refine the processes of the program — from court review to drug screening, to staying abreast of the most recent trends in treatment and offender laws in Georgia.

Outpatient programming at New Hope has been developed throughout the years to meet the needs of the mandated population. Our state certified substance abuse groups consist of 6 - 52 week curriculums in an effort to address the needs of clients who are at various stages of substance abuse and dependency. Additionally, our program sessions are 1-hour, 2-hours and 3-hours in length in order to meet programming requirements for probation, parole, DFCS, & ASAM levels of care. Our Gainesville location can accommodate a maximum of 12 hours of outpatient treatment a week, offering a blend of day, night, and weekend availability.

New Hope Counseling also provides the state certified Family Violence Intervention Program, which consists of the state mandated 24 week curriculum of 1.5 hours of group per week. There are also day, night, and weekend options available for this program as we take into consideration the varying needs of our clients. We also offer an anger management program curriculum published by SAMHSA. Staff is trained in the most current, evidence-based counseling modalities, including Moral Reconation Therapy, Seeking Safety, TREM, the Matrix Model, Prime Solutions, Duluth Model, Turning Points, & Living In Balance. Our agency prides itself on working to meet the needs of both our referral sources and our clientele — we will work just as hard to meet the present and ongoing needs of Hall County Treatment Services, if chosen as the treatment provider.

Statement of Work

If selected as the Hall County Treatment Services treatment provider, New Hope Counseling agrees to maintain the necessary certifications, staff, & facilities to provide the requested treatment services. New Hope Counseling maintains a DBHDD certified treatment provider offering DBHDD ASAM Level I treatment to first & multiple offenders in both of our locations. Two state certified clinical evaluators are also on board offering this individualized service to all levels of offenders.

New Hope Counseling agrees to furnish all labor, materials, and equipment necessary to provide substance abuse treatment and other services identified for the participants of the Hall County Treatment Services Programs, as required. New Hope also agrees to be available for audits at any time at the county's request.

Staffing

New Hope Counseling has a staff consisting of more than 20 qualified individuals. If selected to provide services, New Hope agrees to provide the following staff:

- 1) a qualified staff person to fulfill all responsibilities of the liaison position, including attendance at twice monthly staff meetings and court sessions;
- 2) a qualified staff person to assist the court liaison
- 3) one qualified counselor for every 15 participants.

Additional staff will be secured to provide services to Hall County Treatment Services as needed.

The initial contact with New Hope Counseling is key in determining the level of care needed for an individual. Primary Patient Care Coordinator is Amanda Hardin and another staff member to be determined at the time of award. The following descriptions are a representation of New Hope's ability to provide the services that are required to make the partnership with Hall County Treatment Services a success.

Amanda Hardin received her Master's in Clinical Counseling from Brenau University in 2005 and is credentialed as a Licensed Professional Counselor and Family Violence Intervention Program facilitator. She is also a DBHDD certified Clinical Evaluator for first and multiple offenders and is in process of certification as a Risk Reduction Instructor. She is currently serving as GACAs Secretary and has been involved in the Hall County Domestic Violence Task Force for five years. She also serves as the secretary for Friends of Recovery or FOR, the board that assists with supporting the Hall County Treatment Services accountability court programs. Amanda became the Director of New Hope Counseling six years ago. Since becoming Director, New Hope has expanded services to include a Risk Reduction Program, as well as trauma services for our local veterans. She has been providing counseling services for 20 years and has a background in out-patient programming for substance abuse, domestic violence, anger management, and cognitive skills. At New Hope, Amanda is instrumental in program coordination, curriculum development, staffing, and marketing. She will diligently work to ensure that counselors assigned to Hall County's program will receive direction, supervision, and training on a regular basis. Amanda also oversees the group facilitators of the court teams to ensure that measures are in place to provide an accurate flow of information in a timely

fashion. She makes regular court appearances and works directly with Hall County Treatment Services in tracking the DUI Court participants. Amanda also conducts Clinical evaluations for New Hope, as well as assisting with staff issues.

Linda McClure is a Licensed Professional Counselor (LPC) and Certified Professional Credentialing Specialist (CPCS). She received her Master of Education in Community Agency Counseling from Clemson University in 1998. Her background includes previous experience as a Mental Health and Substance Abuse Counselor with multiple local mental health agencies and an Intake Counselor and supervisor with a local psychiatric facility. She has invaluable experience with crisis intervention. She has over twenty years experience as a counselor working with a diverse client population. Linda has also been providing clinical supervision to New Hope's counseling staff since 2007.

Margaret Amoss, LPC, received her Master's Degree in Clinical Counseling from Brenau University in 2009. She has seven years experience in the substance abuse field. Margaret began her counseling experience working with adults with developmental disabilities at Lanier Village Estates, a retirement community in Gainesville, Georgia. She also worked at Chestatee Hospital as the lead counselor for a day partial program for adults with developmental disabilities for 2 years. Margaret began working with New Hope Counseling in February 2010. Since that time, she has been an alcohol and drug education facilitator, anger management facilitator, evaluator, and individual counselor. She has training in brainspotting and other trauma related techniques.

Sydney Saylors is an APC licensed clinician with a Master's of Science degree from Brenau University in Clinical Counseling, received in 2020. She will be eligible to sit for licensure in August of 2022. She began as an intern at New Hope Counseling in May 2019 and was hired on as a counselor in April 2020. While obtaining her degree, she also completed an internship working with a local psychologist completing neuropsychological assessments and reports for a local private school. She has been an individual counselor, evaluator, group facilitator since joining New Hope Counseling.

We strive to ensure that all facilitators are educated in their field and have appropriate credentials. This is a sampling of our staff. Many of New Hope's staff are currently pursuing credentials as a CAC/CADC or FVIP facilitators and are enrolled in the necessary classes to complete this certification process. New Hope supports individuals in becoming credentialed and assists in tuition payment of the CAC/CADC and FVIP education requirements and clinical supervision. New Hope has contracted with a Certified Professional Credentialing Specialist (CPCS) to provide weekly supervision to those facilitators on the LPC track. Currently, supervision is held every Thursday. Also, New Hope Counseling is an approved internship site for many graduate level programs in the counseling field - North Georgia College, Brenau University and Mercer University. Currently, New Hope utilizes multiple interns pursuing their Master's Degrees in Psychology and Counseling. Each intern holds individual client caseloads, conducts witnessed urine drug screens, and is familiar with the disease concept and Alcohol and Drug Education. Interns are under direct supervision at all times and are required to have a minimum of one hour supervision on-site weekly, in addition to two hours of weekly group supervision at the college. All staff that New Hope appoints to Hall County Treatment Services will be seasoned in alcohol and drug counseling and have appropriate education credentials. Documentation of credentials is available upon request.

All New Hope staff sign agreements to follow the code of ethics from both NAADAC & GACA with the understanding that violation of these ethics can result in immediate termination from their contractual agreement.

Staffing - Spanish Services

New Hope Counseling currently has one Spanish speaking counselor on staff, a state certified Clinical Evaluator. While there are no group services currently provided in Spanish, New Hope Counseling will recruit Spanish speaking counselors in an effort to provide a depth of staff necessary should there be a need for this population.

Curriculum

New Hope Counseling has trained facilitators in specific substance abuse curricula which include *The Matrix Model, Living In Balance, Prime Solutions, Moral Reconation Therapy, Seeking Safety, TREM* (Trauma Recovery and Empowerment Model), *STAR* (Strategic Trauma and Abuse Recovery), and *Thinking for a Change*. Additionally, we have developed our own alcohol and drug curriculum, a hybrid of The Matrix Model and Living in Balance, which includes but is not limited to, substance abuse education, the concept of addiction, relapse, spirituality, anger management, problem solving, communication and some co-occurring issues such as depression and anxiety. New Hope Counseling will utilize the assigned treatment curricula the Hall County Treatment Service's programs require. Through our contracts New Hope has consistently sent appropriate staff to the local Court trainings sponsored by the CJCC & other county & DBHDD training opportunities.

Confidentiality

Upon entering treatment with New Hope Counseling, all participants sign a release of information authorizing our agency to release information to, and obtain information from, the Hall County Treatment Services. A release will also be obtained for any probation officers, parole officers, or attorneys as needed. Any releases or consent forms signed will follow HIPAA guidelines and regulations.

New Hope prides itself on prompt and immediate notification to referral sources of any non-compliance issues related to participants. Hall County Treatment Services will be notified immediately

of attendance, drug screen results, participation issues, etc. New Hope further agrees to report and provide all treatment information to the Hall County Treatment Services and its affiliates as requested.

All participant records are protected by 42 CFR Section 2.31, which states as follows:

"This information has been disclosed to you from records protected by Federal Confidentiality. The Federal rules prohibit you from making any further disclosure of this information unless further disclosure is expressly permitted by the written consent of the person to whom it pertains or as otherwise permitted by 42 CFR PART 2. A general authorization for the release of medical or other information is NOT sufficient for this purpose. The Federal rules restrict any use of this information to criminally investigate or prosecute any alcohol or drug abuse patient."

New Hope currently provides group sign-in sheets, fee information, and treatment progress and recommendations at each court staffing. Documentation of any facilitator concerns about a participant or any unusual or inappropriate behavior during individual or group services is also provided. New Hope will continue to provide this information, along with any additional information that the Hall County Treatment Services may request. Weekly group progress notes are also available to Hall County Treatment Services at any time.

Additional Facilitation Services

New Hope Counseling agrees to provide qualified facilitators for group and individual counseling for the various programs that comprise Hall County Treatment Services. As referenced earlier, these facilitators are educated in their field and have appropriate credentials. When providing services, staff will be required to input clinical notations into the specified case management database provided by Treatment Services within 24 hours of service rendered. Should there be a need for additional staff to meet the needs of Treatment Services; New Hope will recruit additional staff members in an effort to provide all requested services. It is understood that these additional services may be provided at the Hall County Treatment Services location or at the New Hope Counseling location, as per the request of Treatment Services.

Treatment Liaison

New Hope Counseling agrees to furnish a Treatment liaison that will be responsible for the administrative duties associated with the program. This would include, but not be limited to, weekly communication with the Treatment Services team, attendance at court staffings, and tracking attendance, participation, and overall progress of participants. This liaison will be the point of contact for all participants in the program, addressing questions, concerns, and issues as they arise. This liaison will be at a minimum a Master's level clinician, a Bachelor's level with an appropriate amount of experience, or a certification holder within the field of substance abuse. New Hope will defer to Hall County Treatment Services for clarification of any changes or additional responsibilities included in this role. Compensation for this position can be funded in two ways; the cost can be passed on to the participants or the county can be billed for these services. A specific cost analysis can be found in the Cost Proposal for both of these options.

New Hope's Director, Amanda Hardin, LPC, will be involved at every level of this role from the award of contract until this role is filled & established with qualified staff. Ms. Hardin will also be available for supervision and assistance to this role throughout the contract, should it be awarded to New Hope.

Facility

New Hope Counseling's Gainesville offices are located at 316 and 322 Spring Street, approximately 2 blocks from the Hall County Courthouse. All of our facilities are available for inspection by Hall County at any time.

Should Hall County request the use of our facility, each classroom at the Spring Street location has a capacity of 15 people with 5 classrooms available, in addition to private rooms for individual counseling. All facilities have restrooms available for participant use. A floor plan showing the total size of the building and the designated space to be committed to the Hall County Treatment Services may be found in the Appendix.

New Hope Counseling agrees to house a "locked" container to collect payments should the Court deem New Hope responsible for fee collections. This locked container is currently located in the group entrance stairwell at 322 Spring Street. New Hope also agrees that only the New Hope Liaison, Amanda Hardin, will have access to this locked box. This provides a system that is easily accessible to the participants as well as ensuring a secure method of retrieving the contents.

Memorandum of Understanding

If selected as the treatment provider for Hall County Treatment Services, New Hope agrees to submit to a formal contract or Memorandum of Understanding with Hall County Treatment Services that operationally defines the details of services New Hope will provide.

If selected as a treatment provider for Hall County Treatment Services, New Hope further agrees to furnish a Certificate of Liability Insurance in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence, as outlined in the Terms and Conditions of the Bid.

Beginning in FY20, the Department of Human Services (DHS) transitioned to a new state-wide contract and pricing agreement. Treatment Services was awarded a non-standard contract to provide drug testing services for our local DFCS offices which was extended for FY21, FY22 and FY23. From 2015-2020, Treatment Services collected and analyzed 4,448 screens for DFCS averaging 741 screens per year. Although COVID restrictions significantly impacted DFCS operations in 2020, Treatment Services Drug Testing Lab never ceased operations and continued to collect a total of 443 screens. From January-June 2021, we have collected a total of 282 screens for DFCS which is higher than the monthly average in 2020.

- (2) No part of any Federal funds contained in this Contract shall be used to pay the salary or expenses of any grant or contract recipient, or agent acting for such recipient, related to any activity designed to influence legislation or appropriations pending before the Congress or any State legislature.
- C. The Contractor further agrees to complete a criminal history report including fingerprint record checks of all Foster Parents, residential and group home staff from the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) and the Georgia Crime Information Center (GCIC). The Contractor must obtain satisfactory results of criminal history report before the placement of a child. If the Contractor's Foster Parent fails to successfully pass the criminal history check, such individual will not be qualified to perform any services under this contract. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE AGREEMENT

This Business Associate Agreement (hereinafter referred to as "Agreement is made and entered into by and between the Georgia Department of Human Services (hereinafter referred to as "DHS") and Hall County Georgia (hereinafter referred to as "Contractor") as an annex to Contract No. 42700 – 040C – DS23 – 00966 between DHS and Contractor (hereinafter referred to as "Contract"). The effective date of this Agreement shall be the date the Contract is executed by Contractor.

WHEREAS, DHS is required by the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, Public Law 104-191 ("HIPAA"), to enter into a Business Associate Agreement with certain entities that provide functions, activities, or services involving the use of Protected Health Information, as defined by HIPAA;

WHEREAS, Contractor, under the Contract provides functions, activities, or services involving the use of Protected Health Information, as defined by HIPAA, and individually identifiable information ("PHI") protected by other State and Federal law;

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual promises, covenants and agreements contained herein, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, DHS and Contractor (each individually a "Party" and collectively the "Parties") hereby agree as follows:

- 1. Terms used but not otherwise defined in this Agreement shall have the same meaning as those terms have in HIPAA and in Title XIII of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act, or "HITECH"), Public Law 111-5, and in the implementing regulations of HIPAA and HITECH. Implementing regulations are published as the Standards for Privacy and Security of Individually Identifiable Health Information in 45 C.F.R. Parts 160 and 164. Together, HIPAA, HITECH, and their implementing regulations are referred to in this Agreement as the "Privacy Rule and Security Rule." If the meaning of any defined term is changed by law or regulation, then this Agreement will be automatically modified to conform to such change. The term "NIST Baseline Controls" means the baseline controls set forth in National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) SP 800-53 established for "moderate impact" information.
- 2. Except as limited in this Agreement, Contractor may use or disclose PHI only to the extent necessary to meet its responsibilities as set forth in the Contract provided that such use or disclosure would not violate the Privacy Rule or the Security Rule, if done by DHS. Furthermore, except as otherwise limited in this Agreement, Contractor may:
 - A. Use PHI for internal quality control and auditing purposes.
 - **B.** Use or disclose PHI as Required by Law.

- C. Use and disclose PHI to consult with an attorney for purposes of determining Contractor's legal options with regard to reporting conduct by DHS that Contractor in good faith believes to be unlawful, as permitted by 45 C.F.R. § 164.502(j)(1).
- 3. Contractor warrants that only individuals designated by title or name on Annex F-1 and Annex F-2 will request PHI from DHS or access DHS PHI in order to perform the services of the Contract, and these individuals will only request the minimum necessary amount of information necessary in order to perform the services.
- 4. Contractor warrants that the individuals listed by title on Annex F-1 require access to PHI in order to perform services under the Contract. Contractor agrees to send updates to Annex F-1 whenever necessary. Uses or disclosures of PHI by individuals not described on Annex F-1 are impermissible.
- 5. Contractor warrants that the individuals listed by name on Annex F-2 require access to a DHS information system in order to perform services under the Contract. Contractor agrees to notify the Project Leader and the Access Control Coordinator named on Annex F-2 immediately, but at least within 24 hours, of any change in the need for DHS information system access by any individual listed on Annex F-2. Any failure to report a change within the 24-hour time period will be considered a security incident and may be reported to Contractor's Privacy and Security Officer, Information Security Officer and the Georgia Technology Authority for proper handling and sanctions.
- 6. Contractor agrees that it is a Business Associate to DHS as a result of the Contract, and warrants to DHS that it complies with the Privacy Rule and Security Rule requirements that apply to Business Associates and will continue to comply with these requirements. Contractor further warrants to DHS that it maintains and follows written policies and procedures to achieve and maintain compliance with the HIPAA Privacy and Security Rules and updates such policies and procedures as necessary in order to comply with the HIPAA Privacy and Security Rules that apply to Business Associates. These policies and procedures shall be provided to DHS upon request.

- Not request, create, receive, use or disclose PHI other than as permitted or required by Α. this Agreement, the Contract, or as required by law.
- B. Establish, maintain and use appropriate administrative, physical and technical safeguards to prevent use or disclosure of the PHI other than as provided for by this Agreement or the Contract. Such safeguards must include all NIST Baseline Controls, unless DHS has agreed in writing that the control is not appropriate or applicable.
- C. Implement and use administrative, physical and technical safeguards that reasonably and appropriately protect the confidentiality, integrity and availability of the electronic protected health information that it creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of DHS. Such safeguards must include all NIST Baseline Controls, unless DHS has agreed in writing that the control is not appropriate or applicable.
- D. In addition to the safeguards described above, include access controls that restrict access to PHI to the individuals listed on Annex F-1 and Annex F-2, as amended from time to time, and shall implement encryption of all electronic PHI during transmission and at rest.
- E. Upon DHS's reasonable request, but, no more frequently than annually, obtain an independent assessment of Contractor's implementation of the NIST Baseline Controls and the additional safeguards required by this Agreement with respect to DHS PHI, provide the results of such assessments to DHS, and ensure that corrective actions identified during the independent assessment are implemented.
- F. Mitigate, to the extent practicable, any harmful effect that may be known to Contractor from a use or disclosure of PHI by Contractor in violation of the requirements of this Agreement, the Contract or applicable regulations. Contractor shall bear the costs of mitigation, which shall include the reasonable costs of credit monitoring or credit restoration when the use or disclosure results in exposure of information commonly used in identity theft.

- G. Ensure that its agents or Subcontractors to whom it provides PHI are contractually obligated to comply with at least the same obligations that apply to Contractor under this Agreement, and ensure that its agents or Subcontractors comply with the conditions, restrictions, prohibitions and other limitations regarding the request for, creation, receipt, use or disclosure of PHI, that are applicable to Contractor under this Agreement and the Contract.
- H. Except for "Non-Reportable Incidents," report to DHS any use or disclosure of PHI that is not provided for by this Agreement or the Contract of which it becomes aware. Non-Reportable Incidents are limited to the following:
 - i. the unintentional acquisition, access, or use of PHI by a workforce member of Contractor acting under the authority of Contractor, so long as the PHI is not further acquired, accessed, used or disclosed in an impermissible manner;
 - ii. the inadvertent disclosure of PHI from a person designated in Annex F-1 or Annex F-2 as authorized to access DHS PHI to a workforce member of Contractor who is not designated in Annex F-1 or Annex F-2 but is authorized to access other Protected Health Information maintained by Contractor, so long as the information is not further acquired, accessed, used or disclosed in an impermissible manner.
- I. Make an initial report to DHS in writing in such form as DHS may require within three (3) business days after Contractor (or any Subcontractor) becomes aware of the unauthorized use or disclosure. This report will require Contractor to identify the following:
 - The nature of the impermissible use or disclosure (the "incident"), which will include a brief description of what happened, including the date it occurred and the date Contractor discovered the incident;
 - ii. The Protected Health Information involved in the impermissible use or disclosure, such as whether the full name, social security number, date of birth, home address, account number or other information were involved;
 - iii. Who (by title, access permission level and employer) made the impermissible use or disclosure and who received the Protected Health Information as a result:
 - iv. What corrective or investigational action Contractor took or will take to prevent further impermissible uses or disclosures, to mitigate harmful effects, and to prevent against any further incidents;
 - v. What steps individuals who may have been harmed by the incident might take to protect themselves; and
 - vi. Whether Contractor believes that the impermissible use or disclosure constitutes a Breach of Unsecured Protected Health Information.

Upon request by the DHS HIPAA Privacy and Security Officer or the DHS Information Security Officer, Contractor agrees to make a complete report to DHS in writing within two weeks of the initial report that includes a root cause analysis and a proposed corrective action plan. Upon approval of a corrective action plan by DHS, Contractor agrees to implement the corrective action plan and provide proof of implementation to DHS within five (5) business days of DHS's request for proof of implementation.

J. Report to the DHS HIPAA Privacy and Security Officer and the DHS Agency Information Security Officer any successful unauthorized access, modification, or destruction of PHI or interference with system operations in Contractor's information systems as soon as practicable but in no event later than three (3) business days of discovery. If such a security incident resulted in a use or disclosure of PHI not permitted by this Agreement, Contractor shall also make a report of the impermissible use or disclosure as described above.

Contractor agrees to make a complete report to DHS in writing within two weeks of the initial report that includes a root cause analysis and, if appropriate, a proposed corrective action plan designed to protect PHI from similar security incidents in the future. Upon DHS's approval of Contractor's corrective action plan, Contractor agrees to implement the corrective action plan and provide proof of implementation to DHS.

- K. Upon DHS's reasonable request and not more frequently than once per quarter, report to the DHS Agency Information Security Officer any (A) attempted (but unsuccessful) unauthorized access, use, disclosure, modification, or destruction of PHI or (B) attempted (but unsuccessful) interference with system operations in Contractor's information systems. Contractor does not need to report trivial incidents that occur on a daily basis, such as scans, "pings," or other routine attempts that do not penetrate computer networks or servers or result in interference with system operations.
- L. Cooperate with DHS and provide assistance necessary for DHS to determine whether a Breach of Unsecured Protected Health Information has occurred and whether notification of the Breach is legally required or otherwise appropriate. Contractor agrees to assist DHS in its efforts to comply with the HIPAA Privacy and Security Rules, as amended from time to time. To that end, the Contractor will abide by any requirements mandated by the HIPAA Privacy and Security Rules or any other applicable laws in the course of this Contract. Contractor warrants that it will cooperate with DHS, including cooperation with DHS privacy officials and other compliance officers required by the HIPAA Privacy and Security Rules and all implementing regulations, in the course of performance of this Contract so that both parties will be in compliance with HIPAA.
- M. If DHS determines that a Breach of Unsecured Protected Health Information has occurred as a result of Contractor's impermissible use or disclosure of PHI or failure to comply with obligations set forth in this Agreement or in the Privacy or Security Rules, provide all notifications to Individuals, HHS and/or the media, on behalf of DHS, after the notifications are approved by DHS. Contractor shall provide these notifications in accordance with the

security breach notification requirements set forth in 42 U.S.C. §17932, 45 C.F.R. Part 160, & 45 C.F.R. Part 164, Subparts A, D & E, as of their respective Compliance Dates, and shall pay for the reasonable and actual costs associated with such notifications.

In the event that DHS determines a Breach has occurred, without unreasonable delay, and in any event no later than thirty (30) calendar days after Discovery, Contractor shall provide the DHS HIPAA Privacy and Security Officer a list of Individuals and a copy of the template notification letter to be sent to Individuals. Contractor shall begin the notification process only after obtaining DHS's approval of the notification letter.

- N. Make any amendment(s) to PHI in a Designated Record Set that DHS directs or agrees to pursuant to 45 C.F.R. §164.526 within five (5) business days after request of DHS. Contractor also agrees to provide DHS with written confirmation of the amendment in such format and within such time as DHS may require.
- O. In order to meet the requirements under 45 C.F.R. § 164.524, regarding an individual's right of access, within five (5) business days following DHS's request, or as otherwise required by State or Federal law or regulation, or by another time as may be agreed upon in writing by DHS, provide DHS access to the PHI in an individual's Designated Record Set. However, if requested by DHS, Contractor shall provide access to the PHI in a Designated Record Set directly to the individual to whom such information relates.
- P. Give the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (the "Secretary") or the Secretary's designees access to Contractor's books and records and policies, practices or procedures relating to the use and disclosure of PHI for or on behalf of DHS within five (5) business days after the Secretary or the Secretary's designees request such access or otherwise as the Secretary or the Secretary's designees may require. Contractor also agrees to make such information available for review, inspection and copying by the Secretary or the Secretary's designees during normal business hours at the location or locations where such information is maintained or to otherwise provide such information to the Secretary or the Secretary's designees in such form, format or manner as the Secretary or the Secretary's designees may require.
- Q. Document all disclosures of PHI and information related to such disclosures as would be required for DHS to respond to a request by an Individual or by the Secretary for an accounting of disclosures of PHI in accordance with 45 C.F.R. § 164.528. By no later than five (5) business days of receipt of a written request from DHS, or as otherwise required by State or Federal law or regulation, or by another time as may be agreed upon in writing by the DHS HIPAA Privacy and Security Officer, Contractor shall provide an accounting of disclosures of PHI regarding an Individual to DHS. If requested by DHS, Contractor shall provide an accounting of disclosures directly to the individual. Contractor shall maintain a record of any accounting made directly to an individual at the individual's request and shall provide such record to DHS upon request.
- R. In addition to any indemnification provisions in the Contract, indemnify DHS, its officers and employees from any liability resulting from any violation of the HIPAA Privacy and

Security Rules or Breach that arises from the conduct or omission of Contractor or its employee(s), agent(s) or subcontractor(s). Such liability will include, but not be limited to, all actual and direct costs and/or losses, civil penalties and reasonable attorneys' fees imposed on DHS.

S. For any requirements in this Agreement that include deadlines, pay performance guarantee payments of \$300.00 per calendar day, starting with the day after the deadline and continuing until Contractor complies with the requirement. Contractor shall ensure that its agreements with Subcontractors enable Contractor to meet these deadlines.

9. DHS agrees that it will:

- A. Notify Contractor of any new limitation in DHS's Notice of Privacy Practices in accordance with the provisions of the Privacy Rule if, and to the extent that, DHS determines in the exercise of its sole discretion that such limitation will affect Contractor's use or disclosure of PHI.
- B. Notify Contractor of any change in, or revocation of, authorization by an Individual for DHS to use or disclose PHI to the extent that DHS determines in the exercise of its sole discretion that such change or revocation will affect Contractor's use or disclosure of PHI.
- C. Notify Contractor of any restriction regarding its use or disclosure of PHI that DHS has agreed to in accordance with the Privacy Rule if, and to the extent that, DHS determines in the exercise of its sole discretion that such restriction will affect Contractor's use or disclosure of PHI.
- D. Prior to agreeing to any changes in or revocation of permission by an Individual, or any restriction, to use or disclose PHI, DHS agrees to contact Contractor to determine feasibility of compliance. Following the receipt by DHS of a written cost estimate, DHS agrees to assume all costs incurred by Contractor in compliance with such special requests.
- 10. The Term of this Agreement shall be effective on the Effective Date and shall terminate when all of the PHI provided by DHS to Contractor, or created or received by Contractor on behalf of DHS, is destroyed or returned to DHS, or, if it is infeasible to return or destroy PHI, protections are extended to such information, in accordance with the termination provisions in this section.
 - **A. Termination for Cause.** Upon DHS's knowledge of a material breach of this Agreement by Contractor, DHS shall either:
 - i. Provide an opportunity for Contractor to cure the breach of Agreement within a reasonable period of time, which shall be within thirty (30) calendar days after receiving written notification of the breach by DHS;
 - ii. If Contractor fails to cure the breach of Agreement, terminate the Contract upon thirty (30) calendar days' notice; or

iii. If neither termination nor cure is feasible, DHS shall report the breach of Agreement to the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services.

B. Effect of Termination.

- i. Upon termination of this Agreement, for any reason, DHS and Contractor shall determine whether return of PHI is feasible. If return of the PHI is not feasible, Contractor agrees to continue to extend the protections of this Agreement to the PHI for so long as the Contractor maintains the PHI and shall limit the use and disclosure of the PHI to those purposes that made return or destruction of the PHI infeasible. If at any time it becomes feasible to return or destroy any such PHI maintained pursuant to this paragraph, Contractor must notify DHS and obtain instructions from DHS for either the return or destruction of the PHI.
- ii. Contractor agrees that it will limit its further use or disclosure of PHI only to those purposes DHS may, in the exercise of its sole discretion, deem to be in the public interest or necessary for the protection of such PHI, and will take such additional actions as DHS may require for the protection of patient privacy and the safeguarding, security and protection of such PHI.
- iii. This Effect of Termination section survives the termination of the Agreement.
- 11. Interpretation. Any ambiguity in this Agreement shall be resolved to permit DHS to comply with applicable laws, rules and regulations, the HIPAA Privacy Rule, the HIPAA Security Rule and any rules, regulations, requirements, rulings, interpretations, procedures or other actions related thereto that are promulgated, issued or taken by or on behalf of the Secretary; provided that applicable laws, rules and regulations and the laws of the State of Georgia shall supersede the Privacy Rule if, and to the extent that, they impose additional requirements, have requirements that are more stringent than or have been interpreted to provide greater protection of patient privacy or the security or safeguarding of PHI than those of the HIPAA Privacy Rule.
- 12. No Third-Party Beneficiaries. Nothing express or implied in this Agreement is intended to confer, nor shall anything herein confer, upon any person other than the Parties and the respective successors or assigns of the Parties, any rights, remedies, obligations or liabilities whatsoever.
- 13. All other terms and conditions contained in the Contract and any amendment thereto, not amended by this Agreement, shall remain in full force and effect.


