The Unicoi State Park location has four Canvas Safari Tent accommodations.

Kingston Downs (2023)

Timberline's sixth location opened in January 2023 at Kingston Downs in Rome,

Georgia. Kingston Downs is a 5,000 acre private property on the Etowah River with a wedding

venue, guided hunting excursions and now also offers six Canvas Safari Tents as well as three Tiny Home Cabins.

Lake Blackshear at Georgia Veterans Memorial State Park (2023)

Timberline's seventh location opened in January 2023 inside Georgia Veterans Memorial State Park on beautiful Lake Blackshear near Cordele, Georgia. Timberline holds a contract with The Coral Group, North Georgia Mountain Authority and Georgia State Parks to offer Glamping services and operate six traditional campsites which Timberline has converted into Glampsites. The Lake Blackshear location has six Canvas Safari Tent accommodations.

Bid #024-43 for Glamping at River Forks Park and Campground

Timberline Glamping desires permission from Hall County Parks & Leisure to dedicate seven long term Glamping sites at River Forks Park & Campground, tent sites 11-16 and RV site 19B. This will be allowed in accordance with the "Responsibilities and Obligations" sections below.

Hotel/Motel Tax:

Depending on the county and state that Timberline is operating in, we defer to the local and state governments on direction of charging and paying a hotel/motel tax to the proper authorities.

Timberline Glamping Company's Obligations and Responsibilities:

- i. Will be responsible for advertising, booking, cleaning, security and upkeep of all of its Glamping equipment.
- ii. Will instruct guests to check in upon arrival to the campground and obtain appropriate passes and information.
- iii. Will provide Mobile Dump Tank Services and Kayak Rental services to

- Glamping and Camping guests within the park.
- iv. Agrees to abide by all State and Federal laws, all County ordinances, and all Park rules and regulations.

Expected Hall County Parks & Leisure Responsibilities:

- i. Will permit Timberline Glamping Personnel into the campground asneeded.
- ii. Will block and secure seven sites designated above in the Hall County River Forks Park and Campground as being for Glamping in the reservation system from January 1, 2023 to December 31, 2023.
- iii. Provide a suitable space agreeable to both parties for a TimberlineGlamping storage trailer/shed oncampground property.

Compensation:

- a. Timberline Glamping will pay Hall County Parks and Leisure a \$20 per day campsite use fee for RV site 19B and a \$15 per day campsite use fee for each Tent Site #11 #16. Hall County Parks & Leisure will adjust the Site Fee during any month in which: (a) the Park is closed, or (b) other Force Majeure Event prevents Timberline Glamping from conducting its operations; in which event the Site Fee for the effected sites will be reduced by a fraction, the numerator of which is the number of days such events prevent Timberline Glamping from conducting its operations in the Park and the denominator of which is the number of days in the month. All per day campsite use fees (Site Fees) will be due and payable to Hall County, Georgia by the 15th day of the month after they are incurred.
- b. Timberline Glamping will pay Hall County a commission fee equal to 10% of the Gross Total Nightly Rates each month. All commission fees will be due and payable to Hall County, Georgia by the 15th day of the month after they are incurred.

Gross Total Nightly Rates do not include:

- Sales tax collections,
- 2. Gratuities,
- 3. Pass through fees, which include:
 - a. Park admission fees collected by Timberline Glamping on behalf of Hall County Parks & Leisure.
- 4. Funds that were collected but have been refunded to the customer.
- 5. Cleaning fees charged to the customer that are passed through in their entirety to a third party cleaning service.

Insurance:

Timberline Glamping shall obtain and warrant to Hall County, Georgia that it has at least \$2 million dollars in commercial general liability coverage, automobile liability coverage, and workers' compensation coverage. Timberline Glamping will also provide a certificate of insurancenaming Hall County Government/ Hall County Parks & Leisure as additional insureds on its commercial general liability policy.

Equipment:

Timberline Glamping will provide all necessary equipment for its guests Glamping experience. Additional equipment (clean linens, cleaning supplies, etc.) will bestored on site at Timberline Glamping's storage trailer/shed and accessed when needed.

Property/Site Renovations and Upgrades:

Any property/site renovations and upgrades will require prior approval from Hall County Parks & Leisure before completion. This is to ensure that the integrity and compliance standards that Hall County Government and Hall County Parks & Leisure are held to, are maintained.

Unless otherwise agreed upon by both parties, prior to the initiation of any work, Timberline Glamping will solely be responsible for any costs, materials, and labor associated with any renovations and upgrades it initiates and completes.

Timberline Glamping will incur and pay the costs associated with having the electrical and water service established at RV site 19B, and in establishing the needed electrical service at the tent sites 11-16 and for Timberline Glamping's supply shed. These services will be provided by an approved contractor, and upon completion and once a receipt for services is tendered, the direct cost of establishing these services may be subtracted from Timberline Glamping's monthly payment.



EXHIBIT J

MANDATORY ETHICS AFFIDAVIT

For Compliance with Official Code 3.10.070 of Hall County

Contractors, consultants, and vendors of any service or commodity to Hall County, Georgia must read and affirm to adhere to the following ethics requirements.

3.10.070. – Ethics.

- A. It is the policy of Hall County to seek the best overall value when procuring goods and services. Toward this end, the county finds and declares that its objectives will best be achieved through an open, competitive process with a broad range of responsible vendors wishing to furnish products and services to the county. Hall County will establish and conduct a procurement program that maximizes service benefit to the community and awards contracts to vendors who offer the best quality and value.
- B. Hall County declares that county employees and officials, along with those wishing to do business with the county, have the shared responsibility for avoiding biased, anticompetitive, or unethical practices.
- C. Hall County employees, officials, and their family members are prohibited from seeking, requesting, or receiving any material payment, gift, job offer, security, promise of future benefit, or any other tangible or intangible thing of value when such receipt has the potential to influence a procurement decision or to gain undue advantage in a procurement competition.
- D. Prospective vendors must compete for county business within the parameters of the solicitation process and are prohibited from seeking to obtain inside information, attempting to skew the writing of specifications, or influencing a procurement decision through any means outside the process established for the particular solicitation. This principle applies to any contractor, subcontractor, representative, employee, or agent that may be associated with a procurement transaction.
- E. Bidders and proposers shall disclose on competitive bid responses any individual(s), firm(s), and/or county official(s) who do business with the county if there is an appearance of a conflict of interest.
- F. Ethical business practices are important, both, during a solicitation, and after the decision to grant an award. The county seeks to establish relationships with business partners whose ongoing ethical standards of business conduct are congruent with those outlined here. The purchasing manager, subject to the approval of the director of financial services, is charged with establishing methods for ongoing monitoring for non-compliance with these principles. The prohibition against the offering of or the acceptance of kickbacks, gratuities, payments or any other instrument of value extends beyond and outside any specific procurement or solicitation.
- G. A vendor's contract compliance history with Hall County and other contractual parties is a valid element in the decision to award a solicitation.
- H. Hall County stipulates that the furtherance of its strategic goals for job creation, stability and growth in the tax base, business retention, and other fiscal and economic development objectives may be considered during the procurement process. The purchasing manager, subject to the approval of the director of financial services, is authorized to establish procurement initiatives consistent with the

county's strategic economic development objectives. These procurement practices shall be applied consistently and equitably and shall have a direct relationship to the county's goals.

- I. Hall County employees, officials, and their family members are generally prohibited from participation in any procurement decision or any gain of undue advantage in a procurement competition as a result of contemporaneous employment with a potential or actual business partner.
- J. It is unethical for any county employee to purchase commodities or services from a county contract for personal use.
- K. With the exception of solicitations for the sale of real property, individuals, firms and businesses seeking an award of a Hall County contract may not initiate or continue any verbal or written communications regarding a solicitation with any county officer, elected official, employee or other county representative other than the purchasing associate named in the solicitation, or the county's financial advisor, between the date of the issuance of the solicitation and the date of the final contract award by the board of commissioners. The purchasing manager will review violations. If determined that such communication has compromised the competitive process, the offer submitted by the individual, firm or business may be disqualified from consideration for award. Solicitations for the sale of real property may allow for verbal or written communications with the appropriate Hall County representative.
- L. All county commissioners, officials, and employees shall adhere to the standards outlined in the Hall County Code of Ethics.
- M. (AMENDED) The purchasing division of the financial services department shall determine and implement methods of educating all prospective contractors, bidders, proposers, and vendors on the requirements and provisions of Code Section 3.10.070, including, but not limited to, requiring each prospective contractor, bidder, proposer, and vendor that expresses an intent to do business with the County to sign an affidavit attesting that they have read this Chapter and have more specifically also read Code Section 3.10.070." (Res. of 11-14-19(1), § 1(Exh. A))



ARTICLE #104 - NON-EXCLUSIVE RIGHTS:

The Contract is not exclusive. The County reserves the right to select other Contractors to provide the Services similar to those described in this Contract, during the term of the Contract should the need arise or the contractor fail to perform.

ARTICLE #105 - CONTRACT TERM:

- A. Initial Contract Term. This Contract is effective on the date of signature shown in ARTICLE #101 by all parties unless a future date is so noted on this contract. The term will last until job is complete from the date of execution, unless terminated by the parties pursuant to ARTICLE #107 REMEDIES AND CONTRACT PERFORMANCE, thereof.
- B. Contract Renewal. N/A The County shall have the option, in its sole discretion, to renew the Contract for up to Four (4), One (1) Year Renewal Options. The price, terms, and conditions in effect at the time of each renewal(s) shall remain the same unless the Contract is amended by mutual

agreement. Renewal(s) will depend upon the best interests of the County, available funding, and Contractor's performance. The County may execute its renewal options through the issuance of a Contract Renewal Document, with the evidence thereof in writing and signature by both Parties. The County does not accept nor acknowledge automatic renewals and shall have no obligations, payment or otherwise, associated therewith.

Contract Extension. N/A The County and the Contractor may enter into a Contract Extension term past the renewal period to continue the services if this Contract terminates, or is likely to terminate, prior to the making of a new award for the identified Services. The County may with the written consent of Contractor, extend this Contract for such period as may be necessary to afford the County a continuous supply of the identified Services for up to one (1) calendar year or portions thereof.

ARTICLE #106 - CONTRACT AMENDMENTS AND MODIFICATION:

This Contract can only be modified, amended, or added to in writing and fully executed by both parties hereto. This Contract document constitutes the sole and entire Contract and understanding between the parties as to the subject matter hereof, and no verbal promises have been made by either party in relation hereto.

ARTICLE # 107 - REMEDIES AND CONTRACT PERFORMANCE:

In the event that either party to this Contract breaches this Contract, including by failure to meet the timetables set forth herein, the non-breaching party shall provide written notice to the breaching party which describes the breach of this Contract. The party whose breach is alleged shall have thirty (30) days from the date of receipt of the written notice to cure the breach or to otherwise negotiate a resolution of the breach.

Contractor shall not be excused from compliance with the terms and obligations of the Contract. Epidemics and pandemics are not considered Force Majeure events by the County.

Neither party shall be held liable or responsible to the other party nor be deemed to have defaulted under or breached this Agreement for failure or delay in fulfilling or performing any obligation under this Agreement when such failure or delay is caused by or results from causes beyond the reasonable control of the affected party, including but not limited to fire, floods, embargoes, war, acts of war, insurrections, riots, strikes, lockouts or other labor disturbances, or acts of God; provided, however, that the party so affected shall use reasonable commercial efforts to avoid or remove such causes of nonperformance, and shall continue performance hereunder with reasonable dispatch whenever such causes are removed. Either party shall provide the other party with prompt written notice of any delay or failure to perform that occurs by reason of Force Majeure.

Definition: The term 'force majeure' as defined in Black's Law Dictionary, is 'an event or effect that can be neither anticipated nor controlled. It is a contractual provision allocating the risk of loss if performance becomes impossible or impracticable, especially as a result of an event that the parties could not have anticipated or controlled."

- B. Obligations beyond Contract Term. The Contract shall remain in full force and effect to the end of the specified term or until terminated or canceled pursuant to the Contract.

Contractor agrees that upon termination of this Contract for any reason, it shall provide sufficient efforts and reasonable cooperation and assistance to the County to ensure an orderly and efficient transition to the County or an alternative Contractor. Further, in the event that the County has entered into or enters into contracts with other Contractors related to the Services, Contractor agrees to cooperate fully with such other Contractors. Contractor shall not engage in any act that will interfere with the performance of work by any other Contractor.

ARTICLE # 108 - TERMINATION:

Either party may terminate this Contract by providing thirty (30) days written notice to the other party at any time. Should either party terminate this Contract prior to the date of automatic termination pursuant to section 4 above, Contractor shall provide the County with all deliverables up to the date of termination (30 days after the notice is provided), and the County shall pay the Contractor for all work properly performed in compliance with the terms of the Contract up to the date of termination.

- 3. The Contractor fails to make substantial and timely progress toward performance of the Contract.

The Contractor becomes subject to any bankruptcy or insolvency proceeding under federal or state law to the extent allowed by applicable federal or state law including bankruptcy laws; the Contractor terminates or suspends its business; or the County reasonably believes that the Contractor has become insolvent or unable to pay its obligations as they accrue consistent with applicable federal or state law.
- 5. The Contractor has failed to comply with applicable federal, state and local laws, rules, County ordinances, regulations and orders when performing within the scope of the Contract.
- 6. The Contractor has engaged in conduct that has or may expose the County or the State to liability, as determined in the County's sole discretion; or a material breach of the terms of the Contract by County upon County's failure to cure such material breach after written notice thereof has been delivered in accordance with ARTICLE #108.C. below constitutes cause for the Contractor to declare that the County is in default of its obligations under the Contract.

- 1. Immediately terminate the Contract for default without additional written notice;
- In the event of a breach by the Contractor, the County may procure substitute Services from another source and charge the difference between the Contract and the substitute Contract to the defaulting Contractor; and/or,
- 3. Enforce the terms and conditions of the Contract and seek any legal or equitable remedies.

C. Termination Due to Non-Availability of Funds.

This Contract will terminate immediately and absolutely if the County determines that adequate funds are de-appropriated such that the County cannot fulfill its obligations under the Contract, such determination being at the County's sole discretion and conclusive. County agrees to provide prompt written notice to Contractor in the event of any de-appropriation.

D. Termination due to Failure of Contractor to Act.

- The Contractor furnished any statement, representation, or certification in connection with the Contract or the bidding process, which is materially false, deceptive, criminal activity, incorrect or incomplete.

Failure of the Contractor to obtain, provide, maintain, and deliver the Performance and Payment Bonds (if required) as and when required under this Contract, or failure to comply with any requirement pertaining to the appropriate amounts thereof as set forth in ARTICLE #123 PERFORMANCE AND PAYMENT BOND REQUIREMENT.
- E. Payment Limitation in Event of Termination. In the event of termination of the Contract for any reason by either party, the County shall pay only those amounts, if any, due and owing to the Contractor for Services actually received

and accepted by the County up to and including the date of termination of the Contract and for which the County is obligated to pay pursuant to the Contract.

- F. The Contractor's Termination Duties. Upon receipt of notice of termination, the Contractor shall:
 - Cease work under the Contract and take all necessary or appropriate steps to limit disbursements and minimize costs and furnish a report within thirty (30) days of the date of notice of termination, describing the status of all work under the Contract, including, without limitation, results accomplished, conclusions resulting therefrom, and any other matters the County may require.

 - Cooperate in good faith with the County, its employees, agents, and Contractors during the transition period between the notification of termination and the substitution of any replacement Contractor; and
 - 5. Immediately return to the County any payments made by the County for goods and services that were not delivered by the Contractor.

ARTICLE # 109 - NO DEFENSE OR INDEMNIFICATION BY COUNTY:

The parties agree that the County shall not be responsible for defending or indemnifying any Contractor from any claim brought by any third party against the Contractor.

ARTICLE #110 - ASSIGNMENT AND DELEGATION BY CONTRACTOR:

The Contractor shall not assign or delegate this Contract, or any performance required by it, in whole or in part, without the prior express written consent of the County.

ARTICLE #111 - USE OF THIRD-PARTIES (Sub-Contractors):

This Contract is for the benefit of the parties hereto only and is not intended to benefit any third-party or give rise to any duty or causes of action for any third party. All restrictions, obligations and responsibilities of the Contractor under the Contract shall also apply to third parties such as sub-Contractors, if allowed in writing by the

County. Any Contract with a subcontractor must also preserve the rights of the County.

ARTICLE #112 - SUPERSEDES FORMER CONTRACTS

Unless otherwise specified in the Contract, this Contract supersedes all prior Contracts or Agreements between the County and the Contractor for the Services provided in connection with the Contract.

ARTICLE #113 - SEVERABILITY:

If any paragraph, sub-paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Contract is declared invalid or unconstitutional by any Court of competent jurisdiction or if the provisions of any part of this Contract as applied to any particular situation or set of circumstances shall be declared invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity shall not be construed to affect the remaining portions of this Contract not so held to be invalid or the application of this Contract to other circumstances not so held to be invalid.

ARTICLE # 114 - RECORDS:

- A. Public Records Request. The Georgia Open Records Act, as provided in O.C.G.A. § 50-18-70 et seq, requires procurement records and all other records received by or prepared or maintained on behalf of the County, shall be made open to public inspection, unless otherwise provided by law.
- B. Record Retention and Access. The Contractor shall maintain books, records, and documents in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and procedures and which sufficiently and properly document and calculate all charges billed to the County throughout the term of the Contract for a period of at least five (5) years following the date of final payment or completion of any required audit, whichever is later. Records to be maintained include both financial records and service records.

ARTICLE # 115 - ADDITIONAL TERMS:

- A. The County shall not be bound by any terms and conditions included in any Contractor's literature, packaging, invoice, catalog, brochure, technical data sheet, on-line representation, warranties or service level agreement or other document which attempts to impose any condition in variance with or in addition to the terms and conditions contained herein.
- B. The County shall not be bound to any Terms and Conditions of the Contractor that are only accessible by hyper-link. All Terms and Conditions must be in print and approved by the County.

ARTICLE # 116 - WAIVER:

The failure of any party hereto to seek a remedy for any alleged breach of this Contract shall not constitute a waiver of any claim, cause of action, or remedy allowed by Georgia law for breach thereof.

ARTICLE # 117 - CONTRACTOR AND COUNTY RIGHTS AND OBLIGATIONS:

- A. The County has the right at any time to require the Contractor to put an immediate stop to any procedure, or the use of any equipment (chemical, material, etc., if applicable) considered by the County to be hazardous (or toxic) to persons, buildings, or surfaces. The Contractor will utilize acceptable substitutes as quickly as possible. In the event of such replacement, Contractor shall notify County of any resulting replacement, (ii) introduce the individual serving as the replacement to County, and (iii) provide County with a résumé and any other information regarding the individual that may be reasonably requested by County.
- B. The County has the right to require the Contractor to reassign or remove any employee or subcontractor's employee from the premises temporarily or permanently when, in the County's sole opinion, the employee is not suitable. The County's decision on this matter shall be final, and Contractor will remove this employee immediately and replace with a person of at least equivalent training, experience and requisite qualifications as quickly as possible, subject to the County's prior approval.
- C. Contractor agrees to obtain prior written approval from the County for the use of sub-Contractors to provide the Services described in SCOPE OF SERVICES prior to subcontractor's performance of work.

ARTICLE # 118- INSURANCE REQUIREMENT:

A. Insurance Requirements. The Contractor must maintain and warrant to Hall County insurance policies at the Contractor's own expense and must furnish the County with a Certificate of Insurance (COI) providing evidence of proof of coverage at least in the amounts indicated in this subsection. The insurance certificate must list Hall County, Georgia, Hall County Landfill, as the certificate holder and as an additional insured under the commercial general, automobile and umbrella liability policies as follows: "Hall County Government, its Board of Commissioners, its officers, employees and agents, 2875 Browns Bridge Rd, Gainesville, GA 30504".

The policy must protect the Contractor and the County (as a Certificate Holder and Additional Insured) from any claims for bodily injury, property damage, or personal injury covered by the indemnification obligations set forth herein throughout the duration of the Contract.

The Contractor must maintain the following insurance coverage during the term of the Contract, in at least the minimum amounts set forth below, to cover all loss and liability for damages on account of bodily injury, including death therefrom, and injury to or destruction of property caused by or arising from any and all services carried on and any and all work performed by the Contractor pursuant to this Contract:

1. Workers Compensation Insurance (Occurrence) in the amounts of the statutory limits established by the General Assembly of the State of Georgia (A self-insurer must submit a certificate from the Georgia Board of Workers Compensation stating that the Contractor qualifies to pay its own workers compensation claims.). In addition, the Contractor must require all sub-Contractors occupying the premises or performing work under the Contract to obtain an insurance certificate showing proof of Workers Compensation Coverage with the following minimum coverage:

a.	Bodily injury by accident - per employee	\$ 100,000
b.	Bodily injury by disease - per employee	\$ 100,000
c.	Bodily injury by disease – policy limit	\$ 500,000

2. Commercial General Liability Policy with at least the following minimum coverage:

C.	General Aggregate Limit	\$3,000,000
d.	Products/Completed Ops. Aggregate Limit	\$2,000,000

Automobile Liability with at least the minimum coverage: \$1,000,000 Combined Single Limit to cover Any Vehicle, leased or rented by the Contractor

3. Umbrella Liability, Excess Liability per Occurrence \$2,000,000
Aggregate \$2,000,000

It shall be the responsibility of the Contractor to require all of its sub-Contractors to maintain Commercial General Liability insurance with business automobile liability coverage with companies and limits as stated above, and to provide a certificate evidencing that such insurance is in effect upon request. Endorsement must be provided with the insurance certificate.

- B. Insurance Certificates and General Requirements. No Contract performance shall occur unless and until the County receives required insurance certificates.
 - The insurance certificate must reference the Contract number assigned by the County and document that the liability coverage purchased by the Contractor includes contractual liability coverage to insure the indemnity agreement as stated herein.
- C. The Contractor understands and agrees that the foregoing policies will not be canceled, or not renewed or allowed to lapse for any reason until at least thirty (30) days prior written notice has been given to the County, or until such time as other valid and effective insurance coverage acceptable in every respect to the County and providing protection equal to protection called for in the policies referenced in this section shall have been received, accepted, and acknowledged by the County. Certificates of insurance showing such coverage to be in force shall be filed with the County prior to commencement of any work under the Contract. The foregoing policies shall be obtained from insurance companies licensed to do business in Georgia and, unless waived or modified in writing by the County, shall be an insurer with a minimum A.M. Best Rating of "A-". All such coverage shall remain in full force and effect during the term and any renewal or extension thereof. The insurance certificate must be submitted with this Contract.
- D. Waiver of Subrogation. There is no waiver of subrogation rights by either Party with respect to insurance.

ARTICLE # 119 - NO WAIVER:

A. Authority to Enter into Contract. The Contractor represents and warrants that it has full authority to enter into and perform its obligations under the Contract and that the Contract constitutes a legal, valid, and binding obligation upon the Contractor in accordance with its terms. The representatives of the parties hereto also represent and warrant that they are authorized to sign this Contract on behalf of each party hereto."

- B. Solicitation. The Contractor warrants that no person or selling agency (except bona fide employees or selling agents maintained for the purpose of securing business) has been employed or retained to solicit and secure the Contract upon an agreement or understanding for commission, percentage, brokerage or contingency.
- C. Vehicles and Equipment. With the exception of specified County Owned Equipment and Vehicles listed in Exhibit X, Contractor warrants that CDL drives will not use any other County owned vehicles or equipment in the performance of this Contract without express written consent. Contractor shall be responsible for providing all transportation necessary to deliver Services under the Contract.

ARTICLE # 120 - INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS & OWNERSHIP:

Contractor agrees it will not use the name or any intellectual property, including but not limited to, County trademarks or logos in any manner, including commercial advertising or as a business reference, without the expressed prior written consent of the County.

ARTICLE # 121 - COMPENSATION:

- A. The County will pay the Contractor for the Services provided pursuant to this Contract and in accordance with the prices quoted and conditions set forth in the Bidder's response on Exhibit C Mandatory Cost Proposal Worksheet, which is attached hereto and incorporated into this Contract as if fully set forth herein. Payments will be made monthly in arrears to the Contractor after acceptance of the Contractor's delivered Services by the County, and after receipt of undisputed invoice to the County.
- B. Prices quoted shall be firm and fixed throughout the term of this Contract, unless otherwise Amended or Modified by mutual agreement.
- C. Cost may be prorated for Services added or removed under this Contract to align cost with the remaining term of Contract.
- D. It is understood that this bid or proposal is made without collusion or fraud. Contractor understands and acknowledges that collusive bidding is a violation of state and federal law and may result in the cancellation of the Contract.

ARTICLE # 122 - COUNTY PAYMENT TO CONTRACTOR:

A. The County will issue a Notice to Proceed to the Contractor, and Purchase Order(s) (herein after 'PO'). The terms of this Contract shall be incorporated by

reference into any and all PO(s) issued prior to the expiration or termination of this Contract. The County will issue the PO by electronic mail (e-mail) to the Contractor's representative in *ARTICLE #103 - NOTICES*. A PO is considered "issued" when the e-mail containing the PO is sent by the County to the Contractor.

The Contractor shall not deliver any Services, equipment, devices, or components thereof until authorized in writing by the County through issuance of a PO, which shall provide a commencement Notice-to-Proceed date. Any work, including but not limited to travel, preliminary meetings, planning, etc., performed outside of the terms and conditions of and before the issuance of the PO will not be considered for payment. Contractors are not to begin work or ship any product on any verbal communication from within the County. The County will not be liable for payment for any work or product with the issuance of a verbal communication.

The Scope of Services shall remain in effect from the Notice to Proceed to completion of the project. The Parties agree that the County will not pay or otherwise compensate the Contractor for any Services, materials, equipment, devices or components thereof outside of the Scope of Work and/or beyond the term of this Contract, unless specifically authorized in writing as evidenced by an amendment (see ARTICLE #106 - CONTRACT AMENDMENTS &, MODIFICATION), a time extension letter, or as otherwise authorized by the County.

B. Invoice/Payment.

- Contractor shall invoice the County via email <u>each month</u> solely to accountspayable@hallcounty.org and only after the County inspects and accepts the Services provided. Receipt of the Services does not constitute acceptance. Invoice amounts shall not exceed the Contractor's pricing set forth in ARTICLE #102.
- 2. Each invoice shall include the Contractor's current "Remit to" address; a description of the Services provided; the invoice amount; the Contract number; and the associated PO number issued. Each properly prepared invoice must be sent in accordance with the instructions listed on the PO. Standard payment terms are net 30 days (N30) in arrears from the date the invoice is accepted, following delivery of the Services.
- 3. The County does not pay for services not yet received but only in arrears.
- 4. The Contractor shall be solely responsible for paying all costs, expenses and charges it incurs in connection with its performance under the Contract.

C. Unsatisfactory Performance; Delay of Payment.

 If the County determines that the quality of the Services provided are deficient, unacceptable, or unsatisfactory, the County's Project Manager identified in ARTICLE #103 shall issue a written notice to Contractor. Contractor agrees that upon receipt of the written notice, it shall make every effort to correct the deficiency (ies) within the timeframe prescribed therein. If the Contractor fails to timely correct the deficiencies, the County reserves the right to delay payment pursuant to this ARTICLE #122 or terminate the Contract (ARTICLE #108 – TERMINATION PROVISIONS).

- 2. Delay of Payment Due to Contractor's Failure. If the County determines that the Contractor has failed to perform or deliver any Services as required by the Contract, the Contractor shall not be entitled to any compensation under the Contract until such Services are delivered and accepted. In this event, the County may withhold that portion of the Contractor's compensation, which represents payment for Services that were not delivered. To the extent that the Contractor's failure to perform or deliver in a timely manner causes the County to incur costs, the County may deduct the amount of such incurred costs from any amounts payable to Contractor. The County's authority to deduct such incurred costs shall not in any way affect the County's authority to terminate the Contract.
- D. Set-Off Against Sums Owed by the Contractor. In the event that the Contractor owes the County any sum under the terms of the Contract, pursuant to any judgment, or pursuant to any law, the County may set off the sum owed by the Contractor against any sum owed to the Contractor, in the County's sole discretion.
- E. Final Payment. Contractor shall issue an invoice for final payment to the County no later than thirty (30) days following the expiration or termination date of the Contract.
- F. The Contractor must not "Factor or Assign Payments" to another or a financial institution. The County will only pay the party to whom it is contracted with. The County will not in any circumstances pay a third-party.

ARTICLE #123 - PERFORMANCE AND PAYMENT BONDS

The Contractor must furnish to the County a Performance Bond equal to one-hundred percent (100%) of the Contract's total initial term dollar amount, and additionally a Payment Bond equal to one-hundred percent (100%) of the total initial term dollar amount. After receipt of the bonds, the County will issue a Notice-to-Proceed. Only surety companies licensed to do business in the State of Georgia are acceptable. The Contractor is required to provide new bonds at the issuance of each Renewal Option Term(s) or Extension(s) that follow.

The County must receive all bonding instruments prior to the commencement of any work.

ARTICLE #124 - RETAINAGE (if applicable on this contract)

ARTICLE # 126 - NOTICE OF INTENT TO LITIGATE

Contractor hereby agrees not to file any civil action of disputes or claims relating to the Contract except after first giving thirty days (30) written notice to the County of the claim and the intent to initiate a civil action.

ARTICLE # 127- GEORGIA SECURITY AND IMMIGRATION COMPLIANCE ACT:

- A. By signing this Contract, the Contractor certifies that prior to and throughout the performance of all applicable work under this Contract it will remain in full compliance with all federal and state immigration laws, including but not limited to 8 U.S.C. § 1324a and the Georgia Security and Immigration Compliance Act (O.C.G.A. §13-10-90 et seq.), as amended by the Illegal Immigration Reform and Enforcement Act of 2011, regarding the verification of employment eligibility of employees under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986. Contractor will ensure that only persons who are citizens or nationals of the United States or non-citizens authorized under federal immigration laws are employed to perform services under this Contract or any subcontract or sub-subcontract hereunder.
- B. Contractor further certifies its compliance with the aforementioned federal and state immigration laws set forth by signing a sworn affidavit, the Georgia Security and Immigration Compliance Act Affidavit, notarized by an Official Notary Public, and obtaining the same affidavits from any sub-contractor providing services pursuant to this Contract.

This includes attorney fees, because of any liability imposed by law upon the County, except in cases of the County's sole negligence, sustained by any person(s) on account of bodily injury or property damage arising out of or in the consequence of this agreement.

ARTICLE # 134 - CONTRACT TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- All purchases must comply with The Official Code of Hall County Sections 3.10.010 3.10.190.
- 2. If any conflict or ambiguity arises between the Terms and Conditions herein, and The Official Code of Hall County, the latter will govern.
- 3. The Terms and Conditions set forth herein shall supersede and govern over all Contractor's Terms and Conditions or Service Level Agreements.
- 4. Hall County, Georgia, herein referred to as 'The County', retains the right to 'red-line' sections of the Supplier's Terms and Conditions if such are in conflict with the best interest of the County.
- 5. Acceptance of a Purchase Order (PO) and delivery of Goods or Services serves as the Supplier's full and complete acceptance of The County's Terms and Conditions.
- 6. The terms; supplier, vendor, bidder, offeror, Contractor, Contractor, designer, distributor, dealer or manufacturer or otherwise purveyor or source of supply or performance of service shall mean one-and-the-same, herein denoted as 'Supplier' for goods and 'Contractor' for services.
- 7. - 10. The Supplier shall transfer and deliver all goods or services described on the attached PO for the consideration set forth herein.
- 11. The Supplier shall only deliver goods and services as described on the PO and within the Scope of Work and the Supplier's Bid Response.
- 12. The County holds no obligation to pay for goods delivered or services rendered unless specified on a written Purchase Order or a Change Order of such.
- 13. The Supplier shall not construe any verbal consent to purchase goods or services as valid.
- 14. The County does not accept substitutions of services or goods that do not comply with the Scope of Work or Specifications set forth in the Purchase Order, Contract or Agreement, unless mutually agreed in writing by both parties.
- 15. The County does not accept automatic renewals with the exception of monthly subscription services.
- 16. The County only pays for services rendered in arrears. The County does not pay for services not yet rendered.
- 17. The County does not pay deposits towards goods ordered. Exceptions exist for custom made items (such as window coverings and blinds, or carpet, tile etc.), fabrication, decoration, or otherwise custom designed specifically for the County.

- 18. The County will accept backorders only if goods are out of stock and with prior written notice. Supplier's shall ship all quantities that it has in stock and hold orders for backorders.
- 19. The County participates in Cooperative Purchasing Agreements, State of Georgia Statewide Contracts, and other state, local, Intergovernmental Agreements, Memorandums-of-Understanding and other such Agreements.
- 20. In all cases, the jurisdiction shall be the State of Georgia, County of Hall, for arbitration or other legalities
- 21. Deliveries go to the ship-to addresses listed on the PO and within the time specified. The Supplier must follow instructions if multiple ship-to address exist on the PO.
- 22. Risk of loss of the goods shall pass to The County upon inspection and acceptance only.
- 23. Receipt of goods or services does not constitute acceptance.
- 24. Title to the goods shall remain with the Supplier until acceptance by The County.
- 25. The Supplier warrants that the goods are merchantable and that the Supplier has a legal right to deliver the goods and services and as described herein.
- 26. The County shall have the right to inspect all goods or services at the time and place of delivery.
- 27. Vendor agrees not to assign in full or part of the Contract to another party without the County's express written consent. Any attempted assignment or delegation shall void and make ineffectual for all purposes unless made in conformity with this paragraph.
- 28. The County is exempt from Federal Excise Tax and Georgia Sales and Use Tax.
- 29. This issuance of the PO shall not violate the Code of Ethics and Conflicts of Interest for Public Officers and Employees for Government Service set forth in the 2020 Section 45-1020 et seq. of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated and the Official Code of Hall County Section 3.10.070 governing Ethics.
- 30. All goods and services supplied pursuant to this PO shall, unless otherwise noted, must conform exactly to all of the descriptions, specifications, Exhibits and attachments contained in the Bid Solicitation upon which a PO is based and all the terms, conditions, and specifications of the Bid Solicitation are incorporated herein by reference and made a part hereof.
- 31. Any-and-all media production, recordings, videos, photography, artwork, plates, engravings, and other printed or digital media materials paid in full by The County is considered County property and shall be delivered to The County upon request.
- 32. Invoices submitted to The County will reflect the language of the PO with the PO Number printed on each invoice submitted.
- 33. In the event that a PO has an attached Contract or Agreement, the terms and conditions of the latter shall govern in the event of any conflict with these terms and conditions.
- 34. The Supplier may be suspended, terminated, or debarred if it is determined that the Supplier has made false certification(s) or has violated such certification(s) by failure to carry out the requirements herein.
- 35. The Supplier certifies that it and its subcontractors are not been debarred, suspended, or declared ineligible by any agency of the County, or State of Georgia or as defined in the Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) 48 C.F.R. Ch. 1 Subpart 9.4.
- 36. The Supplier certifies that the Supplier is not currently engaged in an active or pending lawsuit or other grievance, injunction, or levy against the County.
- 37. Goods are Free-On-Board (F.O.B.) destination and freight, shipping and delivery shall be pre-paid and added to the invoice as a separate line item.
- 38. The County does not pay late fees nor interest charges.

- 39. The Supplier shall charge the County the exact amount of freight, delivery, handling and insurance charges.
- 40. The County is not bound to any minimum or maximum quantity or dollar amount set by the Supplier
- 41. In the event there is a discrepancy between the unit price and extended price, the unit price shall govern.

Clarks Hill Lake, Georgia (2021)

Wildwood Park in Columbia County, near Augusta, Georgia on stunning Clarks Hill Lake.

Timberline Glamping will also provide a certificate of insurancenaming Hall County Government/ Hall County Parks & Leisure as additional insureds on its commercial general liability policy.

Equipment:

Timberline Glamping will provide all necessary equipment for its guests Glamping experience. Additional equipment (clean linens, cleaning supplies, etc.) will bestored on site at Timberline Glamping's storage trailer/shed and accessed when needed.

Property/Site Renovations and Upgrades:

Any property/site renovations and upgrades will require prior approval from Hall County Parks & Leisure before completion. This is to ensure that the integrity and compliance standards that Hall County Government and Hall County Parks & Leisure are held to, are maintained.

Unless otherwise agreed upon by both parties, prior to the initiation of any work, Timberline Glamping will solely be responsible for any costs, materials, and labor associated with any renovations and upgrades it initiates and completes.

Timberline Glamping will incur and pay the costs associated with having the electrical and water service established at RV site 19B, and in establishing the needed electrical service at the tent sites 11-16 and for Timberline Glamping's supply shed. These services will be provided by an approved contractor, and upon completion and once a receipt for services is tendered, the direct cost of establishing these services may be subtracted from Timberline Glamping's monthly payment.



MANDATORY ETHICS AFFIDAVIT

For Compliance with Official Code 3.10.070 of Hall County

Contractors, consultants, and vendors of any service or commodity to Hall County, Georgia must read and affirm to adhere to the following ethics requirements.

3.10.070. – Ethics.

- A. It is the policy of Hall County to seek the best overall value when procuring goods and services. Toward this end, the county finds and declares that its objectives will best be achieved through an open, competitive process with a broad range of responsible vendors wishing to furnish products and services to the county. Hall County will establish and conduct a procurement program that maximizes service benefit to the community and awards contracts to vendors who offer the best quality and value.
- B. Hall County declares that county employees and officials, along with those wishing to do business with the county, have the shared responsibility for avoiding biased, anticompetitive, or unethical practices.
- C. Hall County employees, officials, and their family members are prohibited from seeking, requesting, or receiving any material payment, gift, job offer, security, promise of future benefit, or any other tangible or intangible thing of value when such receipt has the potential to influence a procurement decision or to gain undue advantage in a procurement competition.
- D. Prospective vendors must compete for county business within the parameters of the solicitation process and are prohibited from seeking to obtain inside information, attempting to skew the writing of specifications, or influencing a procurement decision through any means outside the process established for the particular solicitation. This principle applies to any contractor, subcontractor, representative, employee, or agent that may be associated with a procurement transaction.
- E. Bidders and proposers shall disclose on competitive bid responses any individual(s), firm(s), and/or county official(s) who do business with the county if there is an appearance of a conflict of interest.
- F. Ethical business practices are important, both, during a solicitation, and after the decision to grant an award. The county seeks to establish relationships with business partners whose ongoing ethical standards of business conduct are congruent with those outlined here. The purchasing manager, subject to the approval of the director of financial services, is charged with establishing methods for ongoing monitoring for non-compliance with these principles. The prohibition against the offering of or the acceptance of kickbacks, gratuities, payments or any other instrument of value extends beyond and outside any specific procurement or solicitation.
- G. A vendor's contract compliance history with Hall County and other contractual parties is a valid element in the decision to award a solicitation.
- H. Hall County stipulates that the furtherance of its strategic goals for job creation, stability and growth in the tax base, business retention, and other fiscal and economic development objectives may be considered during the procurement process. The purchasing manager, subject to the approval of the director of financial services, is authorized to establish procurement initiatives consistent with the

county's strategic economic development objectives. These procurement practices shall be applied consistently and equitably and shall have a direct relationship to the county's goals.

- I. Hall County employees, officials, and their family members are generally prohibited from participation in any procurement decision or any gain of undue advantage in a procurement competition as a result of contemporaneous employment with a potential or actual business partner.
- J. It is unethical for any county employee to purchase commodities or services from a county contract for personal use.
- K. With the exception of solicitations for the sale of real property, individuals, firms and businesses seeking an award of a Hall County contract may not initiate or continue any verbal or written communications regarding a solicitation with any county officer, elected official, employee or other county representative other than the purchasing associate named in the solicitation, or the county's financial advisor, between the date of the issuance of the solicitation and the date of the final contract award by the board of commissioners. The purchasing manager will review violations. If determined that such communication has compromised the competitive process, the offer submitted by the individual, firm or business may be disqualified from consideration for award. Solicitations for the sale of real property may allow for verbal or written communications with the appropriate Hall County representative.
- L. All county commissioners, officials, and employees shall adhere to the standards outlined in the Hall County Code of Ethics.
- M. (AMENDED) The purchasing division of the financial services department shall determine and implement methods of educating all prospective contractors, bidders, proposers, and vendors on the requirements and provisions of Code Section 3.10.070, including, but not limited to, requiring each prospective contractor, bidder, proposer, and vendor that expresses an intent to do business with the County to sign an affidavit attesting that they have read this Chapter and have more specifically also read Code Section 3.10.070." (Res. of 11-14-19(1), § 1(Exh. A))



ARTICLE #104 - NON-EXCLUSIVE RIGHTS:

The Contract is not exclusive. The County reserves the right to select other Contractors to provide the Services similar to those described in this Contract, during the term of the Contract should the need arise or the contractor fail to perform.

ARTICLE #105 - CONTRACT TERM:

- A. Initial Contract Term. This Contract is effective on the date of signature shown in ARTICLE #101 by all parties unless a future date is so noted on this contract. The term will last until job is complete from the date of execution, unless terminated by the parties pursuant to ARTICLE #107 REMEDIES AND CONTRACT PERFORMANCE, thereof.
- B. Contract Renewal. N/A The County shall have the option, in its sole discretion, to renew the Contract for up to Four (4), One (1) Year Renewal Options. The price, terms, and conditions in effect at the time of each renewal(s) shall remain the same unless the Contract is amended by mutual

agreement. Renewal(s) will depend upon the best interests of the County, available funding, and Contractor's performance. The County may execute its renewal options through the issuance of a Contract Renewal Document, with the evidence thereof in writing and signature by both Parties. The County does not accept nor acknowledge automatic renewals and shall have no obligations, payment or otherwise, associated therewith.

Contract Extension. N/A The County and the Contractor may enter into a Contract Extension term past the renewal period to continue the services if this Contract terminates, or is likely to terminate, prior to the making of a new award for the identified Services. The County may with the written consent of Contractor, extend this Contract for such period as may be necessary to afford the County a continuous supply of the identified Services for up to one (1) calendar year or portions thereof.

ARTICLE #106 - CONTRACT AMENDMENTS AND MODIFICATION:

This Contract can only be modified, amended, or added to in writing and fully executed by both parties hereto. This Contract document constitutes the sole and entire Contract and understanding between the parties as to the subject matter hereof, and no verbal promises have been made by either party in relation hereto.

ARTICLE # 107 - REMEDIES AND CONTRACT PERFORMANCE:

In the event that either party to this Contract breaches this Contract, including by failure to meet the timetables set forth herein, the non-breaching party shall provide written notice to the breaching party which describes the breach of this Contract. The party whose breach is alleged shall have thirty (30) days from the date of receipt of the written notice to cure the breach or to otherwise negotiate a resolution of the breach.

If the breach has not been cured and the parties hereto have not resolved the issue described in the notice letter by thirty (30) days after receipt of the notice letter, the party authoring the letter shall be entitled to seek any and all remedies allowed by Georgia law, including damages, equitable relief, declaratory relief, specific performance, and/or seeking relief as to any bonds issued hereon. Additional provisions are;

A. Delay or Impossibility of Performance. Any failure or delay must be beyond the control of and without the fault or negligence of the Contractor. If the Services to be provided to the County are interrupted by a Force Majeure Event, as defined below, the County will be entitled to an equitable adjustment to the fees and other payments due to the Contractor under this Contract. If delay results from a subcontractor's negligent conduct or failure to perform, the

Contractor shall not be excused from compliance with the terms and obligations of the Contract. Epidemics and pandemics are not considered Force Majeure events by the County.

Neither party shall be held liable or responsible to the other party nor be deemed to have defaulted under or breached this Agreement for failure or delay in fulfilling or performing any obligation under this Agreement when such failure or delay is caused by or results from causes beyond the reasonable control of the affected party, including but not limited to fire, floods, embargoes, war, acts of war, insurrections, riots, strikes, lockouts or other labor disturbances, or acts of God; provided, however, that the party so affected shall use reasonable commercial efforts to avoid or remove such causes of nonperformance, and shall continue performance hereunder with reasonable dispatch whenever such causes are removed. Either party shall provide the other party with prompt written notice of any delay or failure to perform that occurs by reason of Force Majeure.

Definition: The term 'force majeure' as defined in Black's Law Dictionary, is 'an event or effect that can be neither anticipated nor controlled. It is a contractual provision allocating the risk of loss if performance becomes impossible or impracticable, especially as a result of an event that the parties could not have anticipated or controlled."

- B. Obligations beyond Contract Term. The Contract shall remain in full force and effect to the end of the specified term or until terminated or canceled pursuant to the Contract.
- C. Transition Cooperation with the County and Cooperation with other Contractors. Contractor agrees that upon termination of this Contract for any reason, it shall provide sufficient efforts and reasonable cooperation and assistance to the County to ensure an orderly and efficient transition to the County or an alternative Contractor. Further, in the event that the County has entered into or enters into contracts with other Contractors related to the Services, Contractor agrees to cooperate fully with such other Contractors. Contractor shall not engage in any act that will interfere with the performance of work by any other Contractor.

ARTICLE # 108 - TERMINATION:

Either party may terminate this Contract by providing thirty (30) days written notice to the other party at any time. Should either party terminate this Contract prior to the date of automatic termination pursuant to section 4 above, Contractor shall provide the County with all deliverables up to the date of termination (30 days after the notice is provided), and the County shall pay the Contractor for all work properly performed in compliance with the terms of the Contract up to the date of termination.

- A. Termination for Convenience. Following thirty (30) days written notice, either party may terminate the Contract in whole or in part for any reason without the payment of any penalty or incurring any further obligation to the Contractor.
- B. Termination for Cause. The occurrence of any one or more of the following events shall constitute cause for the County to declare the Contractor in default of its obligations under the Contract:

- The Contractor fails to deliver or has delivered nonconforming Services or fails to perform, to the County's satisfaction, any material requirement of the Contract or is in violation of a material provision of the Contract, including, but without limitation, the express warranties made by the Contractor.
- 2. The County determines that satisfactory performance of the Contract is substantially endangered or that a default is likely to occur.
- 3. The Contractor fails to make substantial and timely progress toward performance of the Contract.
- 4. The Contractor becomes subject to any bankruptcy or insolvency proceeding under federal or state law to the extent allowed by applicable federal or state law including bankruptcy laws; the Contractor terminates or suspends its business; or the County reasonably believes that the Contractor has become insolvent or unable to pay its obligations as they accrue consistent with applicable federal or state law.
- 5. The Contractor has failed to comply with applicable federal, state and local laws, rules, County ordinances, regulations and orders when performing within the scope of the Contract.
- 6. The Contractor has engaged in conduct that has or may expose the County or the State to liability, as determined in the County's sole discretion; or a material breach of the terms of the Contract by County upon County's failure to cure such material breach after written notice thereof has been delivered in accordance with ARTICLE #108.C. below constitutes cause for the Contractor to declare that the County is in default of its obligations under the Contract.
- C. Notice of Default. If either party causes one or more of the default events set out in ARTICLE #108, then either party shall issue a written Notice-of-Default to the party that causes one or more of the default events, requesting that the breach or noncompliance be remedied within the period of time specified in the party's Notice-of-Default to the Contractor. If the breach or noncompliance is not remedied within the period of time specified in the written notice, the non-breaching party may:

- 1. Immediately terminate the Contract for default without additional written notice;
- In the event of a breach by the Contractor, the County may procure substitute Services from another source and charge the difference between the Contract and the substitute Contract to the defaulting Contractor; and/or,
- 3. Enforce the terms and conditions of the Contract and seek any legal or equitable remedies.

C. Termination Due to Non-Availability of Funds.

This Contract will terminate immediately and absolutely if the County determines that adequate funds are de-appropriated such that the County cannot fulfill its obligations under the Contract, such determination being at the County's sole discretion and conclusive. County agrees to provide prompt written notice to Contractor in the event of any de-appropriation.

D. Termination due to Failure of Contractor to Act.

The County may terminate the Contract for any one or more of the following reasons effective immediately without advance notice:

- In the event that the Contractor must be certified or licensed as a condition precedent to providing the Services, the revocation or loss of such license or certification may result in immediate termination of the Contract effective as of the date on which the license or certification is no longer in effect.
- The County determines that the actions, or failure to act, of the Contractor, its agents, employees or sub-Contractors have caused, or reasonably could cause, life, health or safety to be jeopardized.
- The Contractor furnished any statement, representation, or certification in connection with the Contract or the bidding process, which is materially false, deceptive, criminal activity, incorrect or incomplete.
- 4. Failure of the Contractor to obtain, provide, maintain, and deliver the Performance and Payment Bonds (if required) as and when required under this Contract, or failure to comply with any requirement pertaining to the appropriate amounts thereof as set forth in ARTICLE #123 PERFORMANCE AND PAYMENT BOND REQUIREMENT.
- E. Payment Limitation in Event of Termination. In the event of termination of the Contract for any reason by either party, the County shall pay only those amounts, if any, due and owing to the Contractor for Services actually received

and accepted by the County up to and including the date of termination of the Contract and for which the County is obligated to pay pursuant to the Contract.

- F. The Contractor's Termination Duties. Upon receipt of notice of termination, the Contractor shall:
 - Cease work under the Contract and take all necessary or appropriate steps to limit disbursements and minimize costs and furnish a report within thirty (30) days of the date of notice of termination, describing the status of all work under the Contract, including, without limitation, results accomplished, conclusions resulting therefrom, and any other matters the County may require.
 - 2. Immediately cease using and return to the County, any personal property or materials, whether tangible or intangible, provided by the County to the Contractor.
 - Comply with the County's instructions for the timely transfer of any active files and work product produced by the Contractor under the Contract.
 - Cooperate in good faith with the County, its employees, agents, and Contractors during the transition period between the notification of termination and the substitution of any replacement Contractor; and
 - 5. Immediately return to the County any payments made by the County for goods and services that were not delivered by the Contractor.

ARTICLE # 109 - NO DEFENSE OR INDEMNIFICATION BY COUNTY:

The parties agree that the County shall not be responsible for defending or indemnifying any Contractor from any claim brought by any third party against the Contractor.

ARTICLE #110 - ASSIGNMENT AND DELEGATION BY CONTRACTOR:

The Contractor shall not assign or delegate this Contract, or any performance required by it, in whole or in part, without the prior express written consent of the County.

ARTICLE #111 - USE OF THIRD-PARTIES (Sub-Contractors):

This Contract is for the benefit of the parties hereto only and is not intended to benefit any third-party or give rise to any duty or causes of action for any third party. All restrictions, obligations and responsibilities of the Contractor under the Contract shall also apply to third parties such as sub-Contractors, if allowed in writing by the

County. Any Contract with a subcontractor must also preserve the rights of the County.

ARTICLE #112 - SUPERSEDES FORMER CONTRACTS

Unless otherwise specified in the Contract, this Contract supersedes all prior Contracts or Agreements between the County and the Contractor for the Services provided in connection with the Contract.

ARTICLE #113 - SEVERABILITY:

If any paragraph, sub-paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Contract is declared invalid or unconstitutional by any Court of competent jurisdiction or if the provisions of any part of this Contract as applied to any particular situation or set of circumstances shall be declared invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity shall not be construed to affect the remaining portions of this Contract not so held to be invalid or the application of this Contract to other circumstances not so held to be invalid.

ARTICLE # 114 - RECORDS:

- A. Public Records Request. The Georgia Open Records Act, as provided in O.C.G.A. § 50-18-70 et seq, requires procurement records and all other records received by or prepared or maintained on behalf of the County, shall be made open to public inspection, unless otherwise provided by law.
- B. Record Retention and Access. The Contractor shall maintain books, records, and documents in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and procedures and which sufficiently and properly document and calculate all charges billed to the County throughout the term of the Contract for a period of at least five (5) years following the date of final payment or completion of any required audit, whichever is later. Records to be maintained include both financial records and service records.

ARTICLE # 115 - ADDITIONAL TERMS:

- A. The County shall not be bound by any terms and conditions included in any Contractor's literature, packaging, invoice, catalog, brochure, technical data sheet, on-line representation, warranties or service level agreement or other document which attempts to impose any condition in variance with or in addition to the terms and conditions contained herein.
- B. The County shall not be bound to any Terms and Conditions of the Contractor that are only accessible by hyper-link. All Terms and Conditions must be in print and approved by the County.

ARTICLE # 116 - WAIVER:

The failure of any party hereto to seek a remedy for any alleged breach of this Contract shall not constitute a waiver of any claim, cause of action, or remedy allowed by Georgia law for breach thereof.

ARTICLE # 117 - CONTRACTOR AND COUNTY RIGHTS AND OBLIGATIONS:

- A. The County has the right at any time to require the Contractor to put an immediate stop to any procedure, or the use of any equipment (chemical, material, etc., if applicable) considered by the County to be hazardous (or toxic) to persons, buildings, or surfaces. The Contractor will utilize acceptable substitutes as quickly as possible. In the event of such replacement, Contractor shall notify County of any resulting replacement, (ii) introduce the individual serving as the replacement to County, and (iii) provide County with a résumé and any other information regarding the individual that may be reasonably requested by County.
- B. The County has the right to require the Contractor to reassign or remove any employee or subcontractor's employee from the premises temporarily or permanently when, in the County's sole opinion, the employee is not suitable. The County's decision on this matter shall be final, and Contractor will remove this employee immediately and replace with a person of at least equivalent training, experience and requisite qualifications as quickly as possible, subject to the County's prior approval.
- C. Contractor agrees to obtain prior written approval from the County for the use of sub-Contractors to provide the Services described in SCOPE OF SERVICES prior to subcontractor's performance of work.

ARTICLE # 118- INSURANCE REQUIREMENT:

A. Insurance Requirements. The Contractor must maintain and warrant to Hall County insurance policies at the Contractor's own expense and must furnish the County with a Certificate of Insurance (COI) providing evidence of proof of coverage at least in the amounts indicated in this subsection. The insurance certificate must list Hall County, Georgia, Hall County Landfill, as the certificate holder and as an additional insured under the commercial general, automobile and umbrella liability policies as follows: "Hall County Government, its Board of Commissioners, its officers, employees and agents, 2875 Browns Bridge Rd, Gainesville, GA 30504".

The policy must protect the Contractor and the County (as a Certificate Holder and Additional Insured) from any claims for bodily injury, property damage, or personal injury covered by the indemnification obligations set forth herein throughout the duration of the Contract.

The Contractor must maintain the following insurance coverage during the term of the Contract, in at least the minimum amounts set forth below, to cover all loss and liability for damages on account of bodily injury, including death therefrom, and injury to or destruction of property caused by or arising from any and all services carried on and any and all work performed by the Contractor pursuant to this Contract:

1. Workers Compensation Insurance (Occurrence) in the amounts of the statutory limits established by the General Assembly of the State of Georgia (A self-insurer must submit a certificate from the Georgia Board of Workers Compensation stating that the Contractor qualifies to pay its own workers compensation claims.). In addition, the Contractor must require all sub-Contractors occupying the premises or performing work under the Contract to obtain an insurance certificate showing proof of Workers Compensation Coverage with the following minimum coverage:

a.	Bodily injury by accident - per employee	\$ 100,000

It shall be the responsibility of the Contractor to require all of its sub-Contractors to maintain Commercial General Liability insurance with business automobile liability coverage with companies and limits as stated above, and to provide a certificate evidencing that such insurance is in effect upon request. Endorsement must be provided with the insurance certificate.

- B. Insurance Certificates and General Requirements. No Contract performance shall occur unless and until the County receives required insurance certificates.
 - The insurance certificate must reference the Contract number assigned by the County and document that the liability coverage purchased by the Contractor includes contractual liability coverage to insure the indemnity agreement as stated herein.
- C. The Contractor understands and agrees that the foregoing policies will not be canceled, or not renewed or allowed to lapse for any reason until at least thirty (30) days prior written notice has been given to the County, or until such time as other valid and effective insurance coverage acceptable in every respect to the County and providing protection equal to protection called for in the policies referenced in this section shall have been received, accepted, and acknowledged by the County. Certificates of insurance showing such coverage to be in force shall be filed with the County prior to commencement of any work under the Contract. The foregoing policies shall be obtained from insurance companies licensed to do business in Georgia and, unless waived or modified in writing by the County, shall be an insurer with a minimum A.M. Best Rating of "A-". All such coverage shall remain in full force and effect during the term and any renewal or extension thereof. The insurance certificate must be submitted with this Contract.
- D. Waiver of Subrogation. There is no waiver of subrogation rights by either Party with respect to insurance.

ARTICLE # 119 - NO WAIVER:

A. Authority to Enter into Contract. The Contractor represents and warrants that it has full authority to enter into and perform its obligations under the Contract and that the Contract constitutes a legal, valid, and binding obligation upon the Contractor in accordance with its terms. The representatives of the parties hereto also represent and warrant that they are authorized to sign this Contract on behalf of each party hereto."

- B. Solicitation. The Contractor warrants that no person or selling agency (except bona fide employees or selling agents maintained for the purpose of securing business) has been employed or retained to solicit and secure the Contract upon an agreement or understanding for commission, percentage, brokerage or contingency.
- C. Vehicles and Equipment. With the exception of specified County Owned Equipment and Vehicles listed in Exhibit X, Contractor warrants that CDL drives will not use any other County owned vehicles or equipment in the performance of this Contract without express written consent. Contractor shall be responsible for providing all transportation necessary to deliver Services under the Contract.

ARTICLE # 120 - INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS & OWNERSHIP:

Contractor agrees it will not use the name or any intellectual property, including but not limited to, County trademarks or logos in any manner, including commercial advertising or as a business reference, without the expressed prior written consent of the County.

ARTICLE # 121 - COMPENSATION:

- A. The County will pay the Contractor for the Services provided pursuant to this Contract and in accordance with the prices quoted and conditions set forth in the Bidder's response on Exhibit C Mandatory Cost Proposal Worksheet, which is attached hereto and incorporated into this Contract as if fully set forth herein. Payments will be made monthly in arrears to the Contractor after acceptance of the Contractor's delivered Services by the County, and after receipt of undisputed invoice to the County.
- B. Prices quoted shall be firm and fixed throughout the term of this Contract, unless otherwise Amended or Modified by mutual agreement.
- C. Cost may be prorated for Services added or removed under this Contract to align cost with the remaining term of Contract.
- D. It is understood that this bid or proposal is made without collusion or fraud. Contractor understands and acknowledges that collusive bidding is a violation of state and federal law and may result in the cancellation of the Contract.

ARTICLE # 122 - COUNTY PAYMENT TO CONTRACTOR:

A. The County will issue a Notice to Proceed to the Contractor, and Purchase Order(s) (herein after 'PO'). The terms of this Contract shall be incorporated by

reference into any and all PO(s) issued prior to the expiration or termination of this Contract. The County will issue the PO by electronic mail (e-mail) to the Contractor's representative in *ARTICLE #103 - NOTICES*. A PO is considered "issued" when the e-mail containing the PO is sent by the County to the Contractor.

The Contractor shall not deliver any Services, equipment, devices, or components thereof until authorized in writing by the County through issuance of a PO, which shall provide a commencement Notice-to-Proceed date. Any work, including but not limited to travel, preliminary meetings, planning, etc., performed outside of the terms and conditions of and before the issuance of the PO will not be considered for payment. Contractors are not to begin work or ship any product on any verbal communication from within the County. The County will not be liable for payment for any work or product with the issuance of a verbal communication.

The Scope of Services shall remain in effect from the Notice to Proceed to completion of the project. The Parties agree that the County will not pay or otherwise compensate the Contractor for any Services, materials, equipment, devices or components thereof outside of the Scope of Work and/or beyond the term of this Contract, unless specifically authorized in writing as evidenced by an amendment (see ARTICLE #106 - CONTRACT AMENDMENTS &, MODIFICATION), a time extension letter, or as otherwise authorized by the County.

B. Invoice/Payment.

- Contractor shall invoice the County via email <u>each month</u> solely to accountspayable@hallcounty.org and only after the County inspects and accepts the Services provided. Receipt of the Services does not constitute acceptance. Invoice amounts shall not exceed the Contractor's pricing set forth in ARTICLE #102.
- 2. Each invoice shall include the Contractor's current "Remit to" address; a description of the Services provided; the invoice amount; the Contract number; and the associated PO number issued. Each properly prepared invoice must be sent in accordance with the instructions listed on the PO. Standard payment terms are net 30 days (N30) in arrears from the date the invoice is accepted, following delivery of the Services.
- 3. The County does not pay for services not yet received but only in arrears.
- 4. The Contractor shall be solely responsible for paying all costs, expenses and charges it incurs in connection with its performance under the Contract.

C. Unsatisfactory Performance; Delay of Payment.

 If the County determines that the quality of the Services provided are deficient, unacceptable, or unsatisfactory, the County's Project Manager identified in *ARTICLE #103* shall issue a written notice to Contractor. Contractor agrees that upon receipt of the written notice, it shall make every effort to correct the deficiency (ies) within the timeframe prescribed therein. If the Contractor fails to timely correct the deficiencies, the County reserves the right to delay payment pursuant to this *ARTICLE #122* or terminate the Contract (*ARTICLE #108 – TERMINATION PROVISIONS*).

- 2. Delay of Payment Due to Contractor's Failure. If the County determines that the Contractor has failed to perform or deliver any Services as required by the Contract, the Contractor shall not be entitled to any compensation under the Contract until such Services are delivered and accepted. In this event, the County may withhold that portion of the Contractor's compensation, which represents payment for Services that were not delivered. To the extent that the Contractor's failure to perform or deliver in a timely manner causes the County to incur costs, the County may deduct the amount of such incurred costs from any amounts payable to Contractor. The County's authority to deduct such incurred costs shall not in any way affect the County's authority to terminate the Contract.
- D. Set-Off Against Sums Owed by the Contractor. In the event that the Contractor owes the County any sum under the terms of the Contract, pursuant to any judgment, or pursuant to any law, the County may set off the sum owed by the Contractor against any sum owed to the Contractor, in the County's sole discretion.
- E. Final Payment. Contractor shall issue an invoice for final payment to the County no later than thirty (30) days following the expiration or termination date of the Contract.
- F. The Contractor must not "Factor or Assign Payments" to another or a financial institution. The County will only pay the party to whom it is contracted with. The County will not in any circumstances pay a third-party.

ARTICLE #123 - PERFORMANCE AND PAYMENT BONDS

The Contractor must furnish to the County a Performance Bond equal to one-hundred percent (100%) of the Contract's total initial term dollar amount, and additionally a Payment Bond equal to one-hundred percent (100%) of the total initial term dollar amount. After receipt of the bonds, the County will issue a Notice-to-Proceed. Only surety companies licensed to do business in the State of Georgia are acceptable. The Contractor is required to provide new bonds at the issuance of each Renewal Option Term(s) or Extension(s) that follow.

The County must receive all bonding instruments prior to the commencement of any work.

ARTICLE #125 - VENUE AND GOVERNING LAW

The parties agree that this Contract shall be interpreted, construed, and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Georgia. To the extent that either party may bring a legal suit to enforce the terms of this Contract, including suit in equity, the parties agree and consent to file any such suit in the Superior Court of Hall County, Georgia.

ARTICLE # 126 - NOTICE OF INTENT TO LITIGATE

Contractor hereby agrees not to file any civil action of disputes or claims relating to the Contract except after first giving thirty days (30) written notice to the County of the claim and the intent to initiate a civil action.

ARTICLE # 127- GEORGIA SECURITY AND IMMIGRATION COMPLIANCE ACT:

- A. By signing this Contract, the Contractor certifies that prior to and throughout the performance of all applicable work under this Contract it will remain in full compliance with all federal and state immigration laws, including but not limited to 8 U.S.C. § 1324a and the Georgia Security and Immigration Compliance Act (O.C.G.A. §13-10-90 et seq.), as amended by the Illegal Immigration Reform and Enforcement Act of 2011, regarding the verification of employment eligibility of employees under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986. Contractor will ensure that only persons who are citizens or nationals of the United States or non-citizens authorized under federal immigration laws are employed to perform services under this Contract or any subcontract or sub-subcontract hereunder.
- B. This includes attorney fees, because of any liability imposed by law upon the County, except in cases of the County's sole negligence, sustained by any person(s) on account of bodily injury or property damage arising out of or in the consequence of this agreement.

ARTICLE # 134 - CONTRACT TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- All purchases must comply with The Official Code of Hall County Sections 3.10.010 3.10.190.
- 2. If any conflict or ambiguity arises between the Terms and Conditions herein, and The Official Code of Hall County, the latter will govern.
- 3. The Terms and Conditions set forth herein shall supersede and govern over all Contractor's Terms and Conditions or Service Level Agreements.
- 4. Hall County, Georgia, herein referred to as 'The County', retains the right to 'red-line' sections of the Supplier's Terms and Conditions if such are in conflict with the best interest of the County.
- 5. Acceptance of a Purchase Order (PO) and delivery of Goods or Services serves as the Supplier's full and complete acceptance of The County's Terms and Conditions.

Treatment Services is the agency umbrella encompassing all programs in our circuit. This allows for sharing of resources across programs and greatly increases our ability to provide services. Hall County absorbed some personnel associated with DUI Court under the General Fund budget in 2007 making the program a permanent fixture. Program participants are charged a monthly fee of \$40 to help offset some operational costs. The program has experienced a 74% increase in enrollments since 2020 which warranted additional services, consumables, and staff time than in previous years. The Treatment Services budget is made up of County General Fund, DATE Funds, participant fees, drug testing lab revenue, evaluations revenue, and grant awards. When federal funding ends, we are hopeful that County Commissioners will absorb the grant-funded positions and benefits under the General Fund budget. Additional assistance comes from Friends of Recovery, a nonprofit organization formed in 2006 to support Hall County's accountability court programs.

Facts and Issues:

DUI Court is one of six accountability court programs in Hall County. Along with Substance Abuse Services and the Drug Testing Lab, the programs are organized under one agency umbrella called Treatment Services. This allows for the sharing of resources such as office space, drug testing services, community policing efforts, and personnel. We do not have individual program budgets. Rather, the Treatment Services budget is made up of participant fees, fees from our evaluations and referrals program, revenue from the lab, DATE funds, grants, and the County's General Fund. In the Hall County office, we serve nearly 600 participants annually. Between regular office hours, in-house counseling groups, drug testing services for the courts and our customers, etc., we operate 7 days a week. We make all of this work together to provide efficient and effective programs for the participants we serve.

Criminal Justice Coordinating Council

The Criminal Justice Coordinating Council (CJCC) is designated by the Governor of Georgia as the State Administering Agency for criminal justice and victims' assistance programs. Created by the General Assembly (O.C.G.A. § 35-6A-2), the Council is comprised of twenty-four members representing various components of the criminal justice system.

Overview of the State of Georgia's Accountability Court Funding Program

The Council of Accountability Court of Judge (CACJ) was created in 2015 by the Georgia Legislature and by Governor Nathan Deal to provide courts with the critical funding necessary to support the growth of Accountability Courts in Georgia to reduce the prison population.

How to Apply

Interested applicants should review the FY'24 Solicitation Packet in its entirety, and submit the completed application, including the requested information and all required attachments, using the link provided to the court by CJCC on or before 5 p.m., March 3, 2023. Applications must be submitted using the required format; scanned or handwritten copies of the application will not be accepted. The CACJ and CJCC will release a pre-recorded FY'24 instructional grant webinar on or about Wednesday, February 1, 2023; interested applicants are encouraged to view the webinar. Additionally, CACJ and CJCC will host a FY'24 grant virtual question and answer webinar on Wednesday, February 8, 2023 at 12:00 pm. Any application that does not adequately answer all applicable questions will be considered incomplete and will not be reviewed for funding.

Match Requirement (12 percent CASH match)

Match Waiver: The CACJ may waive the match requirement upon a determination of fiscal hardship. To be considered for a waiver of match, a letter of request signed by the Authorized Representative or Program Judge must be submitted with the grant application defining the fiscal hardship. Fiscal hardship is defined in terms related to reductions in overall budgets, furloughing or reductions in force of staff or other similar documented actions by the local governing authority which have resulted in severe budget reductions. A match waiver request must be submitted as a separate attachment to the application and titled as the "Match Waiver."

NOTE: You do NOT need to match every item you are requesting but must supply a 12% match in the overall budget request. The match must be from one of the allowable categories.

The formula for calculating the match is:

Requested Grant Amount multiplied by 12 then divided by 88 = Required Match

Example:

12 percent match requirement: for a state award amount of \$100,000, match would be calculated as follows:

State Award x 12/88 = Match

Ex. \$100,000 x 12/88 = \$13,363.36

SECTION II: SOLICITATION PROCESS

Please read and understand the Certification for Accountability Court Funding attachment before completing the application. All accountability courts shall attend training and submit a proposed budget/narrative for all funds requested through this grant.

Existing Courts

Complete all sections of the application, unless noted otherwise.

Implementation Courts

Complete sections of the application to the best of your ability. The committee understands that you may not have all the answers yet but expects that you have thought through all of the issues related to each section of the application.

Application Review

Applications will be reviewed and assessed by the CACJ Funding Committee members and its designated representatives who will consider the following:

- 1. Past compliance with all financial and programmatic reporting requirements.
- 2. Overall quality and completeness of the application.
- 3. Demonstration of clear, measurable, and appropriate project goals.
- 4. Demonstration of need including geographic location, local demographics, local statistics, other financial resources, etc.
- 5. The use of evidenced-based treatment.

- 6. Responsiveness to peer review, certification, and treatment fidelity findings.
- 7. The use of other funding sources, including participant fees.
- 8. Adequate correlation between the cost of the project and the objective(s) to be achieved; and
- 9. Sharing resources among each accountability court within the circuit is strongly encouraged. All applications within each circuit will be reviewed together.

Only complete applications received by the deadline will be reviewed. When an application is received by the CJCC, there is no commitment on the part of the CACJ Funding Committee to fund an application or to fund it at the amount requested. All areas of the budget are subject to review and approval. Decisions related to these budget areas are based on both eligibility and reasonableness. The CACJ Funding Committee has full discretion to determine the reasonableness of budget items based on both objective and subjective decision-making tools. See "Restrictions on Use of Funds" subsection below to determine whether budget items requested are allowable prior to submitting your budget.

Applications for funding will undergo several reviews. At any point during these reviews, a decision not to fund a project or any part thereof may be made. These decisions are within the complete discretion of the CACJ Funding Committee.

Funding Decisions

All funding decisions related to CJCC applications received in response to this solicitation are made by the CACJ Funding Committee and are based on the availability of funding. The Council will inform the applicants of funding decisions through grant awards. Applicants should not make assumptions regarding funding decisions until they have received official written notification of awards or denials signed by the CJCC Council Director.

Once an award is made, the CACJ in conjunction with CJCC, maintains discretion to determine that a grantee is not compliant with applicable policies, and upon such a determination may terminate further funding and require reimbursement of grant funds to the CACJ.

Restrictions on Use of Funds

For this grant period, grant funds will not be allowed to be used for: out of state training, any part of a salary or pay supplements for state or county paid employees, office space, utilities, furniture (existing courts only), incentives, monthly cell phone charges, case management software (including maintenance and upgrades), vehicles, weapons, office supplies (existing courts only), construction projects and grant administrative overhead.

Supplantation

Funds must be used to supplement existing funds for program activities and cannot replace or supplant funds that have been appropriated for the same purpose.

Generally, supplanting occurs when a local government or program reduces local or other available funds for an activity specifically because state funds are available (or expected to be available) to fund that same activity. When supplanting is not permitted, any State grant funds may not replace any local, or other available funds that have been appropriated or allocated for the same purpose. In those instances when a question of supplanting arises, the applicant or grantee will be required to substantiate that the reduction in non-state resources occurred for reasons other than the receipt or expected receipt of state funds.

SECTION III: POST-AWARD REQUIREMENTS

Grant Acceptance

Grantees wishing to accept FY'24 funding must submit signed Acceptance Letters and Special Conditions to the CJCC Office, so it is *received* no later than 5 p.m., June 30, 2023. The CACJ Funding Committee will assume your court rejects its FY'24 award if these acceptance documents are not received by this submission deadline.

Special Conditions

At the time of the grant award, the CACJ Funding Committee will assign special conditions, as deemed appropriate for the program. The special conditions will outline the grantee's responsibilities, as well as state regulations that must be followed, as a condition of accepting the grant award for the approved program. The special conditions will be included in the award packet and must be reviewed, signed, and returned to CJCC by 5 p.m., June 30, 2023 (see above). One fourth of all awarded funding must be requested in that quarter's SER each reporting period. This means that the expenditure must be paid by your local funding agency and CJCC reimbursement has been requested within that reporting period. Any unused funds each quarter end will be retained by the CJCC to be managed by the CACJ. This is a reimbursement grant. If awarded funds, your court will be required to submit check stubs and copies of invoices to CJCC for reimbursement on a quarterly basis. Training is made available to each court that accepts grant funding. Please see www.cacj.georgia.gov for the training dates and attendee requirements. Expenses for training will be reimbursed by the CACJ Funding Committee.

Reporting Requirements

Recipients of this FY'24 grant award will be required to complete and submit SER and a CACJ electronic data submission report, due no later than 15 days after each quarter end. Failure to submit reports in a timely fashion could result in a 10% penalty that will be based on the initial grant award. Subgrantees are given a 10-day grace before any action is taken (applies to SER only). The electronic data submission reports will be generated using the state approved case management systems during FY'24. The CACJ will present implementation courts with the opportunity to select a state approved case management system on or about July 1, 2023.

The Superior, State, and Juvenile Court Judges brought together Drug Court, DUI Court, Mental Health Court, Family Treatment Court, and Substance Abuse Services in 2007 under one agency umbrella called Treatment Services. We've since added the Drug Screening Lab, Felony Probation Drug Court, Veterans Treatment Court, Parental Accountability Court, Dawson County Treatment Court, Dawson County HELP Program, and Dawson County Family Treatment Court. This has allowed for the sharing of resources across programs and has greatly increased our ability to provide services in each area. This has positively impacted all of the accountability court programs in that it has allowed some sharing of of office resources, drug screening supplies and services, and office personnel. The Treatment Services budget is made up of County General Fund, DATE Funds, participant fees, drug testing lab revenue, evaluations and referrals revenue, and grant awards. When federal funding ends, we are hopeful that County Commissioners will absorb the grant-funded positions and benefits under the General Fund budget due to the savings our court programs provide the County and State through jail-cost avoidance. Additional assistance comes to our programs from Friends of Recovery, a nonprofit organization formed in 2006 to support the circuit's accountability court programs. Through fundraisers and the solicitation of community funds, Friends of Recovery provides entry-fee scholarships for those participants needing residential drug and alcohol treatment, along with other services. Friends of Recovery also provides supplies for court graduation ceremonies and receptions, as well as an annual Christmas party for participants and their families where guests are treated to dinner, gifts for the children, musical entertainment, door prizes, and photos with Santa. In addition, funding will be continued by non-profit fundraising, participant fees, state and local appropriations, and revenue from the drug testing lab.

In the Hall County office, we have 36 full-time and 3 part-time employees and serve approximately 566 participants annually. Our Dawson County office operates with 6 full-time employees and serve approximately 120 participants annually. Between regular office hours, in-house counseling groups for Drug Court, Family Treatment Court, and the HELP Program, drug testing services for the courts and our customers, etc., we operate 7 days a week. Our drug testing lab analyzed approximately 34,100 drug screens in 2022. In 2022, we provided over 6,000 hours of treatment and experienced a 43% i ncrease in total program enrollments compared to 2021. We conduct on-going, onsite training for new and seasoned staff alike. We make all of this work together to provide efficient and effective programs for the participants we serve. As mentioned above, all of our accountability court programs are under one agency umbrella. While all of Treatment Services shares administrative (Director, Assistant Director, Receptionist) and drug testing lab staff, each program has staff specifically assigned to handle the daily operations of the program.

Each of our programs has been awarded grant funding through the Council of Accountabilty Court Judges (CACJ) since their creation in 2015. Funding is awarded on an annual basis beginning July 1 through June 30. There is a 12% match required for each grant which is fulfilled through county-funded personnel positions assigned to each court program.

The Case Manager position is currently occupied by Nathan Strong. He has been in this role since September 2013. He maintains the caseload of nearly 70 participants for the DUI Court program and is responsible for the tracking of participant progress, addate a dissemination, and accurate and timely maintenance of all spreadsheets. This position prepares, updates, and maintains participant files, as well as maintains databases and tracking systems for the program. The position provides support for the Coordinator in the day-to-day operations of the DUI Court Program and attends all staffing and court sessions. We have 28 hours/week of his salary budgeted in our operating budget and are reguesting the additional 12 hours per week

and full fringe benefits to keep the position full-time. DUI Court experienced a 13% increase in active census compared to 2021 and this position is critical to program operations. We are also requesting funding for a full-time Lab Technician position in this grant which will support all of the accountability court programs in our circuit. This position will collect, prepare, and analyze urine, sweat, and saliva drug screen for all participants assigned to the accountability court programs. Our lab collected and analyzed 34,100 screens in 2022 and is open 7 days per week. This position is vital to the overall operations of all accountability court programs in our circuit as we continue to experience census growth touting a 46% increase in overall program enrollments from 2021.

*The Coordinator's (Katie Bruner) salary is used for the grant match.

We wish to still provide treatment for these participants without it costing New Hope. Including individual treatment sessions, the rate would be \$1,400/year for 6 participants for at total of \$8,400.

We wish to purchase drug testing reagents to run on the Lab's analyzer to increase our drug testing capabilities. With grant funds, we can contribute to the agency resources and afford more screens for our participants through the purchase of these reagents. We would like to continue doing the following testing in-house: 6-AM (Heroin), Cocaine, ETG, Methadone, Opiates, THC, Tramadol, K2/Spice, Oxycodone, Buprenorphine, and Fentanyl. We are dividing the requests for reagents amongst our various grant applications to better share resources. DUI Court experienced a 13% increase in program census from 2021 which helps support our funding request.

DUI Court sends off close to 300 confirmation and specialty testing requests to Abbott Labs. Grant funding will allow us to be better equipped to respond to illicit drug use which is currently being undetected in our lab and serve more participants as census continues to grow.

Project Descriptions

Treatment Services is the agency umbrella encompassing all programs in our circuit. This allows for sharing of resources across programs and greatly increases our ability to provide services. Hall County absorbed some personnel associated with DUI Court under the General Fund budget in 2007 making the program a permanent fixture. Program participants are charged a monthly fee of \$40 to help offset some operational costs. The program has experienced a 74% increase in enrollments since 2020 which warranted additional services, consumables, and staff time than in previous years. Rather, the Treatment Services budget is made up of participant fees, fees from our evaluations and referrals program, revenue from the lab, DATE funds, grants, and the County's General Fund. In the Hall County office, we serve nearly 600 participants annually. Between regular office hours, in-house counseling groups, drug testing services for the courts and our customers, etc., we operate 7 days a week. We make all of this work together to provide efficient and effective programs for the participants we serve.

Approve the application of the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council for FY2024 Accountability Court Funding Program for the Drug Court for staffing, technical and professional services, supplies, and training in the amount of \$711,531.86, and if awarded, appoint the Grants Manager as the Program Designee and authorize the Chairman to execute all related application and award documents. An in-kind match of \$85,383.82 is required.

Treatment Services is the agency umbrella encompassing all programs in our circuit. This allows for sharing of resources across programs and greatly increases our ability to provide services. Hall County funds the Coordindaor, Lead Counselor, Counselor, and Case Manager positions under the General Fund budget making the program a permanent fixture. Program participants are charged a monthly fee of \$150 to help offset some operational costs. The Treatment Services budget is made up of County General Fund, DATE Funds, participant fees, drug testing lab revenue, evaluations revenue, and grant awards. When federal funding ends, we are hopeful that County Commissioners will absorb the grantfunded positions and benefits under the General Fund budget. Additional assistance comes from Friends of Recovery, a nonprofit organization formed in 2006 to support Hall County's accountability court programs. Drug Court is the largest program in our county serving nearly 200 participants across four tracks designed to address specific criminogenic and treamtent needs and is under the direction of two judges. This program provides nearly 3,000 hours of direct treatment annually which does not include individual or case management services which could easily add an additional 1,000 hours.

Facts and Issues:

Drug Court is one of six accountability court programs in Hall County. Along with Substance Abuse Services (evaluations and referrals program) and the Drug Testing Lab, the programs are organized under one agency umbrella called Treatment Services. This allows for the sharing of resources such as office space, drug testing services, community policing efforts, and personnel. We do not have individual program budgets. Rather, the Treatment Services budget is made up of participant fees, fees from our evaluations and referrals program, revenue from the lab, DATE funds, grants, and the County's General Fund. In the Hall County office, we have 39 employees and serve approximately 450 participants. Between regular office hours, inhouse counseling groups for Drug Court, Veterans Court, and the HELP Program, drug testing services for the courts and our customers, etc., we operate 7 days a week. Our drug testing lab conducts about 34,100 drug screens annually. We conduct on-going, onsite training for new and seasoned staff alike. We make all of this work together to provide efficient and effective programs for the participants we serve.

The Superior, State, and Juvenile Court Judges brought together Drug Court, DUI Court, Mental Health Court, Family Treatment Court, and Substance Abuse Services in 2007 under one agency umbrella called Treatment Services. We've since added the Drug Screening Lab, Felony Probation Drug Court, Veterans Treatment Court, Parental Accountability Court, Dawson County Treatment Court, Dawson County HELP Program, and Dawson County Family Treatment Court. This has allowed for the sharing of resources across programs and has greatly increased our ability to provide services in each area. This has positively impacted all of the accountability court programs in that it has allowed some sharing of of office resources, drug screening supplies and services, and office personnel. The Treatment Services budget is made up of County General Fund, DATE Funds, participant fees, drug testing lab revenue, evaluations and referrals revenue, and grant awards. When federal funding ends, we are hopeful that County Commissioners will absorb the grant-funded positions and benefits under the General Fund budget due to the savings our court programs provide the County and State through jail-cost avoidance. Additional assistance comes to our programs from Friends of Recovery, a nonprofit organization formed in 2006 to support the circuit's accountability court programs. Through fundraisers and the solicitation of community funds, Friends of Recovery provides entry-fee scholarships for those participants needing residential drug and alcohol treatment, along with other services. Friends of Recovery also provides supplies for court graduation ceremonies and receptions, as well as an annual Christmas party for participants and their families where guests are treated to dinner, gifts for the children, musical entertainment, door prizes, and photos with Santa. In addition, funding will be continued by non-profit fundraising, participant fees, state and local appropriations, and revenue from the drug testing lab.

In the Hall County office, we have 36 full-time and 3 part-time employees and serve approximately 566 participants annually. Our Dawson County office operates with 6 full-time employees and serve approximately 120 participants annually. Between regular office hours, in-house counseling groups for Drug Court, Family Treatment Court, and the HELP Program, drug testing services for the courts and our customers, etc., we operate 7 days a week. Our drug testing lab analyzed approximately 34,100 drug screens in 2022. In 2022, we provided over 6,000 hours of treatment and experienced a 43% i ncrease in total program enrollments compared to 2021. We conduct on-going, onsite training for new and seasoned staff alike. We make all of this work together to provide efficient and effective programs for the participants we serve. As mentioned above, all of our accountability court programs are under one agency umbrella. While all of Treatment Services shares administrative (Director, Assistant Director, Receptionist) and drug testing lab staff, each program has staff specifically assigned to handle the daily operations of the program.

Each of our programs has been awarded grant funding through the Council of Accountabilty Court Judges (CACJ) since their creation in 2015. Funding is awarded on an annual basis beginning July 1 through June 30. There is a 12% match required for each grant which is fulfilled through county-funded personnel positions assigned to each court program.

SECTION I: OVERVIEW AND INSTRUCTIONS

Criminal Justice Coordinating Council

The Criminal Justice Coordinating Council (CJCC) is designated by the Governor of Georgia as the State Administering Agency for criminal justice and victims' assistance programs. Created by the General Assembly (O.C.G.A. § 35-6A-2), the Council is comprised of twenty-four members representing various components of the criminal justice system.

Overview of the State of Georgia's Accountability Court Funding Program

The Council of Accountability Court of Judge (CACJ) was created in 2015 by the Georgia Legislature and by Governor Nathan Deal to provide courts with the critical funding necessary to support the growth of Accountability Courts in Georgia to reduce the prison population.

How to Apply

Interested applicants should review the FY'24 Solicitation Packet in its entirety, and submit the completed application, including the requested information and all required attachments, using the link provided to the court by CJCC on or before 5 p.m., March 3, 2023. The application is the only acceptable format for submitting the narratives and budget for this funding year. It is recommended that applicants allow adequate time to complete the application. Applications must be submitted using the required format; scanned or handwritten copies of the application will not be accepted. The CACJ and CJCC will release a pre-recorded FY'24 instructional grant webinar on or about Wednesday, February 1, 2023; interested applicants are encouraged to view the webinar. Additionally, CACJ and CJCC will host a FY'24 grant virtual question and answer webinar on Wednesday, February 8, 2023 at 12:00 pm. Any application that does not adequately answer all applicable questions will be considered incomplete and will not be reviewed for funding.

Match Requirement (12 percent CASH match)

Applicants must identify the source of the 12 percent non-state portion of the total project costs and how they will use match funds. Match is restricted to the same uses of funds as allowed for the state funds. Applicants may satisfy this match requirement with cash only (no in-kind services).

Match Waiver: The CACJ may waive the match requirement upon a determination of fiscal hardship. To be considered for a waiver of match, a letter of request signed by the Authorized Representative or Program Judge must be submitted with the grant application defining the fiscal hardship. Fiscal hardship is defined in terms related to reductions in overall budgets, furloughing or reductions in force of staff or other similar documented actions by the local governing authority which have resulted in severe budget reductions. A match waiver request must be submitted as a separate attachment to the application and titled as the "Match Waiver."

NOTE: You do NOT need to match every item you are requesting but must supply a 12% match in the overall budget request. The match must be from one of the allowable categories.

The formula for calculating the match is:

Requested Grant Amount multiplied by 12 then divided by 88 = Required Match

Example:

12 percent match requirement: for a state award amount of \$100,000, match would be calculated as follows:

State Award x 12/88 = Match

Ex. \$100,000 x 12/88 = \$13,363.36

Applications will be reviewed and assessed by the CACJ Funding Committee members and its designated representatives who will consider the following:

- 1. Past compliance with all financial and programmatic reporting requirements.
- 2. Overall quality and completeness of the application.
- 3. Demonstration of clear, measurable, and appropriate project goals.
- 4. Demonstration of need including geographic location, local demographics, local statistics, other financial resources, etc.
- 5. The use of evidenced-based treatment.

- 6. Responsiveness to peer review, certification, and treatment fidelity findings.
- 7. The use of other funding sources, including participant fees.
- 8. Adequate correlation between the cost of the project and the objective(s) to be achieved; and
- 9. Sharing resources among each accountability court within the circuit is strongly encouraged. All applications within each circuit will be reviewed together.

Only complete applications received by the deadline will be reviewed. When an application is received by the CJCC, there is no commitment on the part of the CACJ Funding Committee to fund an application or to fund it at the amount requested. All areas of the budget are subject to review and approval. Decisions related to these budget areas are based on both eligibility and reasonableness. The CACJ Funding Committee has full discretion to determine the reasonableness of budget items based on both objective and subjective decision-making tools. See "Restrictions on Use of Funds" subsection below to determine whether budget items requested are allowable prior to submitting your budget.

Applications for funding will undergo several reviews. At any point during these reviews, a decision not to fund a project or any part thereof may be made. These decisions are within the complete discretion of the CACJ Funding Committee.

Funding Decisions

All funding decisions related to CJCC applications received in response to this solicitation are made by the CACJ Funding Committee and are based on the availability of funding. The Council will inform the applicants of funding decisions through grant awards. Applicants should not make assumptions regarding funding decisions until they have received official written notification of awards or denials signed by the CJCC Council Director.

Once an award is made, the CACJ in conjunction with CJCC, maintains discretion to determine that a grantee is not compliant with applicable policies, and upon such a determination may terminate further funding and require reimbursement of grant funds to the CACJ.

Restrictions on Use of Funds

For this grant period, grant funds will not be allowed to be used for: out of state training, any part of a salary or pay supplements for state or county paid employees, office space, utilities, furniture (existing courts only), incentives, monthly cell phone charges, case management software (including maintenance and upgrades), vehicles, weapons, office supplies (existing courts only), construction projects and grant administrative overhead.

Supplantation

Funds must be used to supplement existing funds for program activities and cannot replace or supplant funds that have been appropriated for the same purpose.

Generally, supplanting occurs when a local government or program reduces local or other available funds for an activity specifically because state funds are available (or expected to be available) to fund that same activity. When supplanting is not permitted, any State grant funds may not replace any local, or other available funds that have been appropriated or allocated for the same purpose. In those instances when a question of supplanting arises, the applicant or grantee will be required to substantiate that the reduction in non-state resources occurred for reasons other than the receipt or expected receipt of state funds.

SECTION III: POST-AWARD REQUIREMENTS

Grant Acceptance

Grantees wishing to accept FY'24 funding must submit signed Acceptance Letters and Special Conditions to the CJCC Office, so it is *received* no later than 5 p.m., June 30, 2023. The CACJ Funding Committee will assume your court rejects its FY'24 award if these acceptance documents are not received by this submission deadline.

Special Conditions

At the time of the grant award, the CACJ Funding Committee will assign special conditions, as deemed appropriate for the program. The special conditions will outline the grantee's responsibilities, as well as state regulations that must be followed, as a condition of accepting the grant award for the approved program. The special conditions will be included in the award packet and must be reviewed, signed, and returned to CJCC by 5 p.m., June 30, 2023 (see above). One fourth of all awarded funding must be requested in that quarter's SER each reporting period. This means that the expenditure must be paid by your local funding agency and CJCC reimbursement has been requested within that reporting period. Any unused funds each quarter end will be retained by the CJCC to be managed by the CACJ. This is a reimbursement grant. If awarded funds, your court will be required to submit check stubs and copies of invoices to CJCC for reimbursement on a quarterly basis. Training is made available to each court that accepts grant funding. Please see www.cacj.georgia.gov for the training dates and attendee requirements. Expenses for training will be reimbursed by the CACJ Funding Committee.

Reporting Requirements

Recipients of this FY'24 grant award will be required to complete and submit SER and a CACJ electronic data submission report, due no later than 15 days after each quarter end. Failure to submit reports in a timely fashion could result in a 10% penalty that will be based on the initial grant award. Subgrantees are given a 10-day grace before any action is taken (applies to SER only). The electronic data submission reports will be generated using the state approved case management systems during FY'24. The CACJ will present implementation courts with the opportunity to select a state approved case management system on or about July 1, 2023.

The Drug Court grant supports two full-time Lab Technician positions, four full-time Counselor positions, one full-time Case Manager position, and a full-time Clinical Evaluator position. Our program facilitates 28 in-house treatment groups weekly (2,184 hours of treatment annually) along with weekly case management and individual counseling sessions for all program participants. These positions are vital to the continued operation of Drug Court. The Case Manager is responsible for administrative management of approximately 100 patricipants while each counselor carries a case load of approximately 30 participants. The Clinical Evalutor conducts assessments for all participants referred to our Superior Court programs including Drug Court, HELP Program, and Veterans Treatment Court. We have seen an increased number of assessments being conducted, lower rates of denial, and faster enrollment periods since implementing this position in 2018. The two full-time Lab Technician positions are shared across all programs falling under the Treatment Services umbrella and are imperative to continued operation of the Drug Testing Lab. In comparison to 2021, Drug Court experienced a 21% increase in total participants served and increased overall treatment services by 2%. We are also planning for a 32% increase in program census in 2023-2024 as we are absorbing our REACT program into Drug Court. These positions are vital to the operation of our program as we do not contract with any private providers.

We wish to increase our surveillance presence by sending two Community Policing officers out an additional night a week. Our current budget allows for the officers (who work in pairs and average four-hour shifts at \$40/hour) to make visits one to two days a week for all seven of Hall County's accountability court programs.

We are requesting funds to assist with payment of initial administrative fees associated with Work Release for eligible participants. We began this campaign through supplemental grant funding in FY22 and have found this to be extremely beneficial in assisting clients with release from custody at a faster rate providing an overall cost-savings to our community. By removing this cost barrier, participants are able to save funds for residential treatment placement at a faster rate leading to faster release dates from incarceration. Additionally, we are putting plans in place for participants to repay some of these funds to a designated account which will be utilized to fully sustain this particular project without the need for future grant funding and make this opportunity avaiable for other participants. We anticipate being sustainable within two years and will not have a need to request grant funding for this partiular project at that time. \$316/participant x 30 participants = \$9,480

We wish to purchase drug testing reagents to run on the Lab's analyzer to increase our drug testing capabilities. With grant funds, we can contribute to the agency resources and afford more screens for our participants through the purchase of these reagents, We would like to continue doing the following testing in-house; 6-AM (Heroin), Cocaine, ETG, Methadone, Opiates, THC, Tramadol, K2/Spice, Oxycodone, Buprenorphine, and Fentanyl. We are dividing the requests for reagents amongst our various grant applications to better share resources. Drug Court experienced an 24% increase in overall drug testing services compared to 2021 and are preparing for a 32% increase in program census in the upcoming year which help support our funding request.

Currently, we have a contract with Abbott Labs to provide confirmation and specialty testing for our programs. Drug Court sends over 400 screens for confirmation/specialty testing annually. By increasing our request, we will be better equipped to respond to illicit drug use which is currently being undetected in our lab and serve more participants as census continues to grow. Drug Court experienced an 24% increase in overall drug testing services compared to 2021 and are preparing for a 32% increase in program enrollments in 2023-2024 which helps support our funding request.

Project Descriptions

Treatment Services is the agency umbrella encompassing all programs in our circuit. This allows for sharing of resources across programs and greatly increases our ability to provide services. Hall County funds the Coordindaor, Lead Counselor, Counselor, and Case Manager positions under the General Fund budget making the program a permanent fixture. Program participants are charged a monthly fee of \$150 to help offset some operational costs. The Treatment Services budget is made up of County General Fund, DATE Funds, participant fees, drug testing lab revenue, evaluations revenue, and grant awards. When federal funding ends, we are hopeful that County Commissioners will absorb the grant-funded positions and benefits under the General Fund budget. Additional assistance comes from Friends of Recovery, a nonprofit organization formed in 2006 to support Hall County's accountability court programs. Drug Court is the largest program in our county serving nearly 200 participants across four tracks designed to address specific criminogenic and treamtent needs and is under the direction of two judges. This program provides nearly 3,000 hours of direct treatment annually which does not include individual or case management services which could easily add an additional 1,000 hours.

Drug Court is one of six accountability court programs in Hall County. Along with Substance Abuse Services (evaluations and referrals program) and the Drug Testing Lab, the programs are organized under one agency umbrella called Treatment Services. This allows for the sharing of resources such as office space, drug testing services, community policing efforts, and personnel. We do not have individual program budgets. Rather, the Treatment Services budget is made up of participant fees, fees from our evaluations and referrals program, revenue from the lab, DATE funds, grants, and the County's General Fund. In the Hall County office, we have 39 employees and serve approximately 450 participants. Between regular office hours, in-house counseling groups for Drug Court, Veterans Court, and the HELP Program, drug testing services for the courts and our customers, etc., we operate 7 days a week. Our drug testing lab conducts about 34,100 drug screens annually. We conduct on-going, onsite training for new and seasoned staff alike. We make all of this work together to provide efficient and effective programs for the participants we serve.

Purpose of Request:		History:	

Approve the application of the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council for FY2024 Accountability Court Funding for the HELP Program to fund HELP staff, provide surveillance, counseling, drug testing, transportation and emergency housing in the amount of \$413,544.90, and if awarded, appoint the Grants Manager as Program Designee and authorize the Chairman to execute all related application and award documents. An in-kind match of \$56,392.49 is required.

The Georgia Accountability Court Funding Committee was created in 2012 by the Georgia Legislature and by Governor Nathan Deal to provide courts with critical funding necessary to support the growth of accountability courts in Georgia to reduce prison populations, which, in turn, saves taxpayer dollars. The Hall County HELP Program grant began in 2004.

Treatment Services is the agency umbrella encompassing all programs in our circuit. This allows for sharing of resources across programs and greatly increases our ability to provide services. Hall County absorbed some personnel associated with the HELP Program under the General Fund budget in 2007 making the program a permanent fixture. In 2022, the program experienced a 79% increase in enrollments compared to 2021. As our census grows, our need to retain staff and increase overall services is imperative. Program participants are charged a monthly fee of \$40 to help offset some operational costs. The Treatment Services budget is made up of County General Fund, DATE Funds, participant fees, drug testing lab revenue, evaluations revenue, and grant awards. When federal funding ends, we are hopeful that County Commissioners will absorb the grant-funded positions and benefits under the General Fund budget. Additional assistance comes from Friends of Recovery, a nonprofit organization formed in 2006 to support Hall County's accountability court programs.

Facts and Issues:

The HELP Program is one of (6) six accountability court programs in Hall County. Along with Substance Abuse Services and the Drug Testing Lab, the programs are organized under one agency umbrella called Treatment Services. This allows for the sharing of resources such as office space, drug testing services, community policing efforts, and personnel. We do not have individual program budgets. Rather, the Treatment Services budget is made up of participant fees, fees from our evaluations and referrals program, revenue from the lab, DATE funds, grants, and the County's General Fund. In the Hall County office, we serve over 500 participants annually. Between regular office hours, in-house counseling groups, drug testing services for the courts and our customers, etc., we operate 7 days a week. We make all of this work together to provide efficient and effective programs for the participants we serve. The Superior, State, and Juvenile Court Judges brought together Drug Court, DUI Court, Mental Health Court, Family Treatment Court, and Substance Abuse Services in 2007 under one agency umbrella called Treatment Services. We've since added the Drug Screening Lab, Felony Probation Drug Court, Veterans Treatment Court, Parental Accountability Court, Dawson County Treatment Court, Dawson County HELP Program, and Dawson County Family Treatment Court. This has allowed for the sharing of resources across programs and has greatly increased our ability to provide services in each area. This has positively impacted all of the accountability court programs in that it has allowed some sharing of of office resources, drug screening supplies and services, and office personnel. The Treatment Services budget is made up of County General Fund, DATE Funds, participant fees, drug testing lab revenue, evaluations and referrals revenue, and grant awards. When federal funding ends, we are hopeful that County Commissioners will absorb the grant-funded positions and benefits under the General Fund budget due to the savings our court programs provide the County and State through jail-cost avoidance. Additional assistance comes to our programs from Friends of Recovery, a nonprofit organization formed in 2006 to support the circuit's accountability court programs. Through fundraisers and the solicitation of community funds, Friends of Recovery provides entry-fee scholarships for those participants needing residential drug and alcohol treatment, along with other services. Friends of Recovery also provides supplies for court graduation ceremonies and receptions, as well as an annual Christmas party for participants and their families where guests are treated to dinner, gifts for the children, musical entertainment, door prizes, and photos with Santa. In addition, funding will be continued by non-profit fundraising, participant fees, state and local appropriations, and revenue from the drug testing lab.

In the Hall County office, we have 36 full-time and 3 part-time employees and serve approximately 566 participants annually. Our Dawson County office operates with 6 full-time employees and serve approximately 120 participants annually. Between regular office hours, in-house counseling groups for Drug Court, Family Treatment Court, and the HELP Program, drug testing services for the courts and our customers, etc., we operate 7 days a week. Our drug testing lab analyzed approximately 34,100 drug screens in 2022. In 2022, we provided over 6,000 hours of treatment and experienced a 43% i ncrease in total program enrollments compared to 2021. We conduct on-going, onsite training for new and seasoned staff alike. We make all of this work together to provide efficient and effective programs for the participants we serve. As mentioned above, all of our accountability court programs are under one agency umbrella. While all of Treatment Services shares administrative (Director, Assistant Director, Receptionist) and drug testing lab staff, each program has staff specifically assigned to handle the daily operations of the program.

Each of our programs has been awarded grant funding through the Council of Accountabilty Court Judges (CACJ) since their creation in 2015. Funding is awarded on an annual basis beginning July 1 through June 30. There is a 12% match required for each grant which is fulfilled through county-funded personnel positions assigned to each court program.

SECTION I: OVERVIEW AND INSTRUCTIONS

Criminal Justice Coordinating Council

The Criminal Justice Coordinating Council (CJCC) is designated by the Governor of Georgia as the State Administering Agency for criminal justice and victims' assistance programs. Created by the General Assembly (O.C.G.A. § 35-6A-2), the Council is comprised of twenty-four members representing various components of the criminal justice system.

Overview of the State of Georgia's Accountability Court Funding Program

The Council of Accountability Court of Judge (CACJ) was created in 2015 by the Georgia Legislature and by Governor Nathan Deal to provide courts with the critical funding necessary to support the growth of Accountability Courts in Georgia to reduce the prison population.

How to Apply

Interested applicants should review the FY'24 Solicitation Packet in its entirety, and submit the completed application, including the requested information and all required attachments, using the link provided to the court by CJCC on or before 5 p.m., March 3, 2023. The application is the only acceptable format for submitting the narratives and budget for this funding year. It is recommended that applicants allow adequate time to complete the application. Applications must be submitted using the required format; scanned or handwritten copies of the application will not be accepted. The CACJ and CJCC will release a pre-recorded FY'24 instructional grant webinar on or about Wednesday, February 1, 2023; interested applicants are encouraged to view the webinar. Additionally, CACJ and CJCC will host a FY'24 grant virtual question and answer webinar on Wednesday, February 8, 2023 at 12:00 pm. Any application that does not adequately answer all applicable questions will be considered incomplete and will not be reviewed for funding.

Match Requirement (12 percent CASH match)

Applicants must identify the source of the 12 percent non-state portion of the total project costs and how they will use match funds. Match is restricted to the same uses of funds as allowed for the state funds. Applicants may satisfy this match requirement with cash only (no in-kind services).

Match Waiver: The CACJ may waive the match requirement upon a determination of fiscal hardship. To be considered for a waiver of match, a letter of request signed by the Authorized Representative or Program Judge must be submitted with the grant application defining the fiscal hardship. Fiscal hardship is defined in terms related to reductions in overall budgets, furloughing or reductions in force of staff or other similar documented actions by the local governing authority which have resulted in severe budget reductions. A match waiver request must be submitted as a separate attachment to the application and titled as the "Match Waiver."

NOTE: You do NOT need to match every item you are requesting but must supply a 12% match in the overall budget request. The match must be from one of the allowable categories.

The formula for calculating the match is:

Requested Grant Amount multiplied by 12 then divided by 88 = Required Match

Example:

12 percent match requirement: for a state award amount of \$100,000, match would be calculated as follows:

State Award x 12/88 = Match

Ex. \$100,000 x 12/88 = \$13,363.36

SECTION II: SOLICITATION PROCESS

Please read and understand the Certification for Accountability Court Funding attachment before completing the application. All accountability courts shall attend training and submit a proposed budget/narrative for all funds requested through this grant.

Existing Courts

Complete all sections of the application, unless noted otherwise.

Implementation Courts

Complete sections of the application to the best of your ability. The committee understands that you may not have all the answers yet but expects that you have thought through all of the issues related to each section of the application.

Application Review

Applications will be reviewed and assessed by the CACJ Funding Committee members and its designated representatives who will consider the following:

- 1. Past compliance with all financial and programmatic reporting requirements.
- 2. Overall quality and completeness of the application.
- 3. Demonstration of clear, measurable, and appropriate project goals.
- 4. Demonstration of need including geographic location, local demographics, local statistics, other financial resources, etc.
- 5. The use of evidenced-based treatment.

- 6. Responsiveness to peer review, certification, and treatment fidelity findings.
- 7. The use of other funding sources, including participant fees.
- 8. Adequate correlation between the cost of the project and the objective(s) to be achieved; and
- 9. Sharing resources among each accountability court within the circuit is strongly encouraged. All applications within each circuit will be reviewed together.

Only complete applications received by the deadline will be reviewed. When an application is received by the CJCC, there is no commitment on the part of the CACJ Funding Committee to fund an application or to fund it at the amount requested. All areas of the budget are subject to review and approval. Decisions related to these budget areas are based on both eligibility and reasonableness. The CACJ Funding Committee has full discretion to determine the reasonableness of budget items based on both objective and subjective decision-making tools. See "Restrictions on Use of Funds" subsection below to determine whether budget items requested are allowable prior to submitting your budget.

Applications for funding will undergo several reviews. At any point during these reviews, a decision not to fund a project or any part thereof may be made. These decisions are within the complete discretion of the CACJ Funding Committee.

Funding Decisions

All funding decisions related to CJCC applications received in response to this solicitation are made by the CACJ Funding Committee and are based on the availability of funding. The Council will inform the applicants of funding decisions through grant awards. Applicants should not make assumptions regarding funding decisions until they have received official written notification of awards or denials signed by the CJCC Council Director.

Once an award is made, the CACJ in conjunction with CJCC, maintains discretion to determine that a grantee is not compliant with applicable policies, and upon such a determination may terminate further funding and require reimbursement of grant funds to the CACJ.

Restrictions on Use of Funds

For this grant period, grant funds will not be allowed to be used for: out of state training, any part of a salary or pay supplements for state or county paid employees, office space, utilities, furniture (existing courts only), incentives, monthly cell phone charges, case management software (including maintenance and upgrades), vehicles, weapons, office supplies (existing courts only), construction projects and grant administrative overhead.

Supplantation

Funds must be used to supplement existing funds for program activities and cannot replace or supplant funds that have been appropriated for the same purpose.

Generally, supplanting occurs when a local government or program reduces local or other available funds for an activity specifically because state funds are available (or expected to be available) to fund that same activity. When supplanting is not permitted, any State grant funds may not replace any local, or other available funds that have been appropriated or allocated for the same purpose. In those instances when a question of supplanting arises, the applicant or grantee will be required to substantiate that the reduction in non-state resources occurred for reasons other than the receipt or expected receipt of state funds.

SECTION III: POST-AWARD REQUIREMENTS

Grant Acceptance

Grantees wishing to accept FY'24 funding must submit signed Acceptance Letters and Special Conditions to the CJCC Office, so it is *received* no later than 5 p.m., June 30, 2023. The CACJ Funding Committee will assume your court rejects its FY'24 award if these acceptance documents are not received by this submission deadline.

Special Conditions

At the time of the grant award, the CACJ Funding Committee will assign special conditions, as deemed appropriate for the program. The special conditions will outline the grantee's responsibilities, as well as state regulations that must be followed, as a condition of accepting the grant award for the approved program. The special conditions will be included in the award packet and must be reviewed, signed, and returned to CJCC by 5 p.m., June 30, 2023 (see above). One fourth of all awarded funding must be requested in that quarter's SER each reporting period. This means that the expenditure must be paid by your local funding agency and CJCC reimbursement has been requested within that reporting period. Any unused funds each quarter end will be retained by the CJCC to be managed by the CACJ. This is a reimbursement grant. If awarded funds, your court will be required to submit check stubs and copies of invoices to CJCC for reimbursement on a quarterly basis. Training is made available to each court that accepts grant funding. Please see www.cacj.georgia.gov for the training dates and attendee requirements. Expenses for training will be reimbursed by the CACJ Funding Committee.

Reporting Requirements

Recipients of this FY'24 grant award will be required to complete and submit SER and a CACJ electronic data submission report, due no later than 15 days after each quarter end. Failure to submit reports in a timely fashion could result in a 10% penalty that will be based on the initial grant award. Subgrantees are given a 10-day grace before any action is taken (applies to SER only). The electronic data submission reports will be generated using the state approved case management systems during FY'24. The CACJ will present implementation courts with the opportunity to select a state approved case management system on or about July 1, 2023.

Counselor - These positions are responsible for conducting group and individual therapeutic sessoins for a case load of 30 participants minimum. They work directly with program participants to deliver approximately 8 hours of group treatment per week in addition to meeting with clients for individual therapy sessions, treatment planning, and ancillary care resourcing. Counselors attend weekly staffing and court sessions and are extremely integral team members as the program could not provide treatment without them. Case Manager - This position focuses primarily on the administrative tasks, record-keeping, and basic case management needed to support the HELP Program as a whole. Lab Technicians - These positions are critical to our lab operations as we collect urine specimens seven days a week and conduct testing for our ten accountability court programs, Probation, DFCS, Human Resources, DCS, etc. Due to the number of hours we collect specimens and the fact that we tested over 34,100 specimens in 2022, it is imperative to keep both full-time positions. The program experienced a 79% increase in enrollments from 2021 which, we believe, supports our request for these full-time positions in order to maintain program operations.

We wish to increase our surveillance presence by sending two Community Policing officers for a total of six visits per month. Our current budget allows for the officers (who work in pairs and average four-hour shifts at \$40/hour) to make visits one day a week for all seven of Hall County's accountability court programs. Officers visit participants from all programs during each shift to better utilize funds and available time.

We wish to purchase drug testing reagents to run on the Lab's analyzer to increase our drug testing capabilities. With grant funds, we can contribute to the agency resources and afford more screens for our participants through the purchase of these reagents. We would like to continue doing the following testing in-house: 6-AM (Heroin), Cocaine, ETG, Methadone, Opiates, THC, Tramadol, K2/Spice, Oxycodone, Buprenorphine, and Fentanyl. We are dividing the requests for reagents amongst our various grant applications to better share resources. Our program experienced a 5.2% increase in overall drug testing compared to 2020 which supports our funding request for additional drug testing reagents.

The HELP Program sends off appx. 600 confirmation and specialty testing requests to eLab (LifeHope Labs) annually. Our request allows us to respond to illicit drug use which is currently being undetected in our lab and serve more participants as census continues to grow. The program experienced a 4% increase in overall drug screening services in 2022 compared to the prior year.

The HELP Program targets individuals qualifying for severe and persistent mental illnesses which reqiure specific medications for symptom management. Oftentimes at program entry, participants are unable to pay for these necessary medications which may lead to noncompliance and relapse and recidivism occurances. We are requesting grant funding to provide medication cost assistance for appropriate participants. We will charge this fee back to participants with the understanding that it be paid back to the program prior to completion in order to generate a stream of revenue which will allow us to sustain this assistance program in the near future. We estimate a monthly cost of \$60 per participant x 12 months = \$750 x 5 participants = \$3,600.

We are requesting funding for travel reimbursement to the annual CACI conference scheduled for September 9-13, 2023 in Athens. We rare requesting funding for our MHC team members (Team A) and our Veterans Track team members (Team B). Additionally, we are requesting funding to facilitate Habilitation Empowerment Accountability Training (HEAT) for our agency which will directly benefit all of the accountability court programs in our circuit. The Hall Co. HELP Program participated in the pilot RED assessment during 2022 and found areas of disparity which need ot be addressed. By providing HEAT training, our staff will be appropriately equipped to provide programming targeting African-American males which is a population which we have historically failed in our programming. Grant funding would allow us to pay travel costs for facilitators to come to our area and train 12 staff members. The training will last 4 days and this overall cost includes airfare, ground transporation, lodging, per diem rates, participant workbooks, and certification cost.

Project Descriptions

Treatment Services is the agency umbrella encompassing all programs in our circuit. This allows for sharing of resources across programs and greatly increases our ability to provide services. Hall County absorbed some personnel associated with the HELP Program under the General Fund budget in 2007 making the program a permanent fixture. In 2022, the program experienced a 79% increase in enrollments compared to 2021. As our census grows, our need to retain staff and increase overall services is imperative. Program participants are charged a monthly fee of \$40 to help offset some operational costs. The Treatment Services budget is made up of County General Fund, DATE Funds, participant fees, drug testing lab revenue, evaluations revenue, and grant awards. When federal funding ends, we are hopeful that County Commissioners will absorb the grant-funded positions and benefits under the General Fund budget. Additional assistance comes from Friends of Recovery, a nonprofit organization formed in 2006 to support Hall County's accountability court programs.

The HELP Program is one of six accountability court programs in Hall County. Along with Substance Abuse Services and the Drug Testing Lab, the programs are organized under one agency umbrella called Treatment Services. This allows for the sharing of resources such as office space, drug testing services, community policing efforts, and personnel. We do not have individual program budgets. Rather, the Treatment Services budget is made up of participant fees, fees from our evaluations and referrals program, revenue from the lab, DATE funds, grants, and the County's General Fund. In the Hall County office, we serve over 500 participants annually. Program participants are charged a monthly fee of \$30 to help offset some operational costs. The Treatment Services budget is made up of County General Fund, DATE Funds, participant fees, drug testing lab revenue, evaluations revenue, and grant awards. When federal funding ends, we are hopeful that County Commissioners will absorb the grantfunded positions and benefits under the General Fund budget. Additional assistance comes from Friends of Recovery, a nonprofit organization formed in 2006 to support Hall County's accountability court programs.

Facts and Issues:

Family Treatment Court is one of six accountability court programs in Hall County. Along with Substance Abuse Services and the Drug Testing Lab, the programs are organized under one agency umbrella called Treatment Services. This allows for the sharing of resources such as office space, drug testing services, community policing efforts, and personnel. We do not have individual program budgets. Rather, the Treatment Services budget is made up of participant fees, fees from our evaluations and referrals program, revenue from the lab, DATE funds, grants, and the County's General Fund. In the Hall County office, we serve approximately 450 participants. Between regular office hours, in-house counseling groups, drug testing services for the courts and our customers, etc., we operate 7 days a week. We make all of this work together to provide efficient and effective programs for the participants we serve. FTC continues to experience census program growth and stability and serves an average of 80 participants each year. Our additional funding request for a full-time counselor offsets the cost requested in previous years for contract counseling services and will ensure quality, timely, and consistent treatment for all program participants.

The Superior, State, and Juvenile Court Judges brought together Drug Court, DUI Court, Mental Health Court, Family Treatment Court, and Substance Abuse Services in 2007 under one agency umbrella called Treatment Services. We've since added the Drug Screening Lab, Felony Probation Drug Court, Veterans Treatment Court, Parental Accountability Court, Dawson County Treatment Court, Dawson County HELP Program, and Dawson County Family Treatment Court. This has allowed for the sharing of resources across programs and has greatly increased our ability to provide services in each area. This has positively impacted all of the accountability court programs in that it has allowed some sharing of of office resources, drug screening supplies and services, and office personnel. The Treatment Services budget is made up of County General Fund, DATE Funds, participant fees, drug testing lab revenue, evaluations and referrals revenue, and grant awards. When federal funding ends, we are hopeful that County Commissioners will absorb the grant-funded positions and benefits under the General Fund budget due to the savings our court programs provide the County and State through jail-cost avoidance. Additional assistance comes to our programs from Friends of Recovery, a nonprofit organization formed in 2006 to support the circuit's accountability court programs. Through fundraisers and the solicitation of community funds, Friends of Recovery provides entry-fee scholarships for those participants needing residential drug and alcohol treatment, along with other services. Friends of Recovery also provides supplies for court graduation ceremonies and receptions, as well as an annual Christmas party for participants and their families where guests are treated to dinner, gifts for the children, musical entertainment, door prizes, and photos with Santa. In addition, funding will be continued by non-profit fundraising, participant fees, state and local appropriations, and revenue from the drug testing lab.

In the Hall County office, we have 36 full-time and 3 part-time employees and serve approximately 566 participants annually. Our Dawson County office operates with 6 full-time employees and serve approximately 120 participants annually. Between regular office hours, in-house counseling groups for Drug Court, Family Treatment Court, and the HELP Program, drug testing services for the courts and our customers, etc., we operate 7 days a week. Our drug testing lab analyzed approximately 34,100 drug screens in 2022. In 2022, we provided over 6,000 hours of treatment and experienced a 43% i ncrease in total program enrollments compared to 2021. We conduct on-going, onsite training for new and seasoned staff alike. We make all of this work together to provide efficient and effective programs for the participants we serve. As mentioned above, all of our accountability court programs are under one agency umbrella. While all of Treatment Services shares administrative (Director, Assistant Director, Receptionist) and drug testing lab staff, each program has staff specifically assigned to handle the daily operations of the program.

Each of our programs has been awarded grant funding through the Council of Accountabilty Court Judges (CACJ) since their creation in 2015. Funding is awarded on an annual basis beginning July 1 through June 30. There is a 12% match required for each grant which is fulfilled through county-funded personnel positions assigned to each court program.

SECTION I: OVERVIEW AND INSTRUCTIONS

Criminal Justice Coordinating Council

The Criminal Justice Coordinating Council (CJCC) is designated by the Governor of Georgia as the State Administering Agency for criminal justice and victims' assistance programs. Created by the General Assembly (O.C.G.A. § 35-6A-2), the Council is comprised of twenty-four members representing various components of the criminal justice system.

Overview of the State of Georgia's Accountability Court Funding Program

The Council of Accountability Court of Judge (CACJ) was created in 2015 by the Georgia Legislature and by Governor Nathan Deal to provide courts with the critical funding necessary to support the growth of Accountability Courts in Georgia to reduce the prison population.

How to Apply

Interested applicants should review the FY'24 Solicitation Packet in its entirety, and submit the completed application, including the requested information and all required attachments, using the link provided to the court by CJCC on or before 5 p.m., March 3, 2023. The application is the only acceptable format for submitting the narratives and budget for this funding year. It is recommended that applicants allow adequate time to complete the application. Applications must be submitted using the required format; scanned or handwritten copies of the application will not be accepted. The CACJ and CJCC will release a pre-recorded FY'24 instructional grant webinar on or about Wednesday, February 1, 2023; interested applicants are encouraged to view the webinar. Additionally, CACJ and CJCC will host a FY'24 grant virtual question and answer webinar on Wednesday, February 8, 2023 at 12:00 pm. Any application that does not adequately answer all applicable questions will be considered incomplete and will not be reviewed for funding.

Match Requirement (12 percent CASH match)

Applicants must identify the source of the 12 percent non-state portion of the total project costs and how they will use match funds. Match is restricted to the same uses of funds as allowed for the state funds. Applicants may satisfy this match requirement with cash only (no in-kind services).

Match Waiver: The CACJ may waive the match requirement upon a determination of fiscal hardship. To be considered for a waiver of match, a letter of request signed by the Authorized Representative or Program Judge must be submitted with the grant application defining the fiscal hardship. Fiscal hardship is defined in terms related to reductions in overall budgets, furloughing or reductions in force of staff or other similar documented actions by the local governing authority which have resulted in severe budget reductions. A match waiver request must be submitted as a separate attachment to the application and titled as the "Match Waiver."

NOTE: You do NOT need to match every item you are requesting but must supply a 12% match in the overall budget request. The match must be from one of the allowable categories.

The formula for calculating the match is:

Requested Grant Amount multiplied by 12 then divided by 88 = Required Match

Example:

12 percent match requirement: for a state award amount of \$100,000, match would be calculated as follows:

State Award x 12/88 = Match

Ex. \$100,000 x 12/88 = \$13,363.36

SECTION II: SOLICITATION PROCESS

Please read and understand the Certification for Accountability Court Funding attachment before completing the application. All accountability courts shall attend training and submit a proposed budget/narrative for all funds requested through this grant.

Existing Courts

Complete all sections of the application, unless noted otherwise.

Implementation Courts

Complete sections of the application to the best of your ability. The committee understands that you may not have all the answers yet but expects that you have thought through all of the issues related to each section of the application.

Application Review

Applications will be reviewed and assessed by the CACJ Funding Committee members and its designated representatives who will consider the following:

- 1. Past compliance with all financial and programmatic reporting requirements.
- 2. Overall quality and completeness of the application.
- 3. Demonstration of clear, measurable, and appropriate project goals.
- 4. Demonstration of need including geographic location, local demographics, local statistics, other financial resources, etc.
- 5. The use of evidenced-based treatment.

- 6. Responsiveness to peer review, certification, and treatment fidelity findings.
- 7. The use of other funding sources, including participant fees.
- 8. Adequate correlation between the cost of the project and the objective(s) to be achieved; and
- 9. Sharing resources among each accountability court within the circuit is strongly encouraged. All applications within each circuit will be reviewed together.

Only complete applications received by the deadline will be reviewed. When an application is received by the CJCC, there is no commitment on the part of the CACJ Funding Committee to fund an application or to fund it at the amount requested. All areas of the budget are subject to review and approval. Decisions related to these budget areas are based on both eligibility and reasonableness. The CACJ Funding Committee has full discretion to determine the reasonableness of budget items based on both objective and subjective decision-making tools. See "Restrictions on Use of Funds" subsection below to determine whether budget items requested are allowable prior to submitting your budget.

Applications for funding will undergo several reviews. At any point during these reviews, a decision not to fund a project or any part thereof may be made. These decisions are within the complete discretion of the CACJ Funding Committee.

Funding Decisions

All funding decisions related to CJCC applications received in response to this solicitation are made by the CACJ Funding Committee and are based on the availability of funding. The Council will inform the applicants of funding decisions through grant awards. Applicants should not make assumptions regarding funding decisions until they have received official written notification of awards or denials signed by the CJCC Council Director.

Once an award is made, the CACJ in conjunction with CJCC, maintains discretion to determine that a grantee is not compliant with applicable policies, and upon such a determination may terminate further funding and require reimbursement of grant funds to the CACJ.

Restrictions on Use of Funds

For this grant period, grant funds will not be allowed to be used for: out of state training, any part of a salary or pay supplements for state or county paid employees, office space, utilities, furniture (existing courts only), incentives, monthly cell phone charges, case management software (including maintenance and upgrades), vehicles, weapons, office supplies (existing courts only), construction projects and grant administrative overhead.

Supplantation

Funds must be used to supplement existing funds for program activities and cannot replace or supplant funds that have been appropriated for the same purpose.

Generally, supplanting occurs when a local government or program reduces local or other available funds for an activity specifically because state funds are available (or expected to be available) to fund that same activity. When supplanting is not permitted, any State grant funds may not replace any local, or other available funds that have been appropriated or allocated for the same purpose. In those instances when a question of supplanting arises, the applicant or grantee will be required to substantiate that the reduction in non-state resources occurred for reasons other than the receipt or expected receipt of state funds.

SECTION III: POST-AWARD REQUIREMENTS

Grant Acceptance

Grantees wishing to accept FY'24 funding must submit signed Acceptance Letters and Special Conditions to the CJCC Office, so it is *received* no later than 5 p.m., June 30, 2023. The CACJ Funding Committee will assume your court rejects its FY'24 award if these acceptance documents are not received by this submission deadline.

Special Conditions

At the time of the grant award, the CACJ Funding Committee will assign special conditions, as deemed appropriate for the program. The special conditions will outline the grantee's responsibilities, as well as state regulations that must be followed, as a condition of accepting the grant award for the approved program. The special conditions will be included in the award packet and must be reviewed, signed, and returned to CJCC by 5 p.m., June 30, 2023 (see above). One fourth of all awarded funding must be requested in that quarter's SER each reporting period. This means that the expenditure must be paid by your local funding agency and CJCC reimbursement has been requested within that reporting period. Any unused funds each quarter end will be retained by the CJCC to be managed by the CACJ. This is a reimbursement grant. If awarded funds, your court will be required to submit check stubs and copies of invoices to CJCC for reimbursement on a quarterly basis. Training is made available to each court that accepts grant funding. Please see www.cacj.georgia.gov for the training dates and attendee requirements. Expenses for training will be reimbursed by the CACJ Funding Committee.

Reporting Requirements

Recipients of this FY'24 grant award will be required to complete and submit SER and a CACJ electronic data submission report, due no later than 15 days after each quarter end. Failure to submit reports in a timely fashion could result in a 10% penalty that will be based on the initial grant award. Subgrantees are given a 10-day grace before any action is taken (applies to SER only). The electronic data submission reports will be generated using the state approved case management systems during FY'24. The CACJ will present implementation courts with the opportunity to select a state approved case management system on or about July 1, 2023.

The Clinical Case Manager positions are currently occupied by Brittany Williamson and Jessica Simmons. They maintain a collective caseload of nearly 70 participants for the Family Treamtent Court program and are responsible for the tracking of participant progress, data collection, data dissemination, and accurate and timely maintenance of all spreadsheets. These positions prepare, update, and maintain participant files, as well as maintain databases and tracking systems for the program. These positions also provide direct services to participants and assist with case management plans, weekly case management sessions, and access to services in the community. The full-time counselor position is currently occupied by Jodi Bell. She provides individual and group counseling for all program participants and delivers appx.18 hours of group treatment per week not including individual treatment hours. The counselor is responsible for completing individualed treatment plans with all participants, inputting data into the case management system, and attending all staffing and court sessions. FTC experienced a 22% increase in program census from 2021 which helps support the continued need for these existing full-time positions.

Project Descriptions

Treatment Services is the agency umbrella encompassing all programs in our circuit. This allows for sharing of resources across programs and greatly increases our ability to provide services. Hall County absorbed some personnel associated with Family Treatment Court under the General Fund budget in 2007 making the program a permanent fixture. Program participants are charged a monthly fee of \$30 to help offset some operational costs. The Treatment Services budget is made up of County General Fund, DATE Funds, participant fees, drug testing lab revenue, evaluations revenue, and grant awards. When federal funding ends, we are hopeful that County Commissioners will absorb the grant-funded positions and benefits under the General Fund budget. Additional assistance comes from Friends of Recovery, a nonprofit organization formed in 2006 to support Hall County's accountability court programs.

^{*}The Coordinator's (Marisa Sullens) salary is used for the grant match.

Family Treatment Court is one of six accountability court programs in Hall County. Along with Substance Abuse Services and the Drug Testing Lab, the programs are organized under one agency umbrella called Treatment Services. This allows for the sharing of resources such as office space, drug testing services, community policing efforts, and personnel. We do not have individual program budgets. Rather, the Treatment Services budget is made up of participant fees, fees from our evaluations and referrals program, revenue from the lab, DATE funds, grants, and the County's General Fund. In the Hall County office, we serve approximately 450 participants. Between regular office hours, in-house counseling groups, drug testing services for the courts and our customers, etc., we operate 7 days a week. We make all of this work together to provide efficient and effective programs for the participants we serve. FTC continues to experience census program growth and services an average of 80 participants each year. Our additional funding request for a full-time counselor offsets the cost requested in previous years for contract counseling services and will ensure quality, timely, and consistent treatment for all program participants.

EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

Director of Community Development and Infrastructure

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into this 9th day of March 2023, by and between **HALL COUNTY, STATE OF GEORGIA,** hereinafter called "the County", as party of the first part, and **Srikanth Yamala**, herein called "Employee", as party of the second part, both of whom agree as follows:

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the County desires to employ the services of said Srikanth Yamala as the Director of Community Development and Infrastructure of Hall County; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the governing board, hereafter called "Commission" to provide certain benefits, establish certain conditions of employment and to set working conditions of said Employee; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of Hall County to secure and retain the services of said Employee and provide inducement for him to remain in such employment, and to make possible full work productivity by assuring said Employee's morale and peace of mind with respect to future security, and to provide a just means of terminating the Employee's services at such a time as desired by the County Administrator, or his or her designee; and

WHEREAS, the Employee desires to accept employment as **Director of Community**Development and Infrastructure for Hall County;

NOW THEREFORE; in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

SECTION 1. <u>Duties</u>

The County hereby agrees to employ **Srikanth Yamala** as **Director of Community Development** and **Infrastructure**, to perform legally permissible functions and duties specified and assigned by the County Administrator or his or her designee.

EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

Director of Community Development and Infrastructure

SECTION 2. <u>Term</u>

- A. Nothing in this agreement shall prevent, limit, or otherwise interfere with the right of the County Administrator to terminate the services of this Employee at any time, subject only to the provisions set forth in SECTION 3 of this agreement. The Employee understands that he serves at the pleasure of the County Administrator.
- B. Nothing in the agreement shall prevent, limit, or otherwise interfere with the right of the Employee to resign at any time from his or her position with the County, subject to the provisions set forth in SECTION 3, Paragraphs B and C of this agreement.

SECTION 3. Termination and Severance Pay

- A. In the event the Employee is terminated pursuant to Paragraph B hereof and the Employee is willing and able to perform the duties of the position under this agreement, upon execution of a Separation Agreement and General Release, the Employer agrees to pay the Employee a lump sum cash payment equal to three (3) months aggregate annual salary, exclusive of other forms of compensation, less standard withholdings, in addition to the continuation of medical, dental, and vision insurance benefits during the three (3) month period immediately following the date of termination. However, in the event the Employee is terminated because the Employee has been convicted of a misdemeanor or a felony, or if the County determines that the Employee has engaged in unprofessional and improper practice, other than negligence, and breach of public trust, including but not limited to illegal acts involving personal gain, or moral turpitude, the County shall be entitled to terminate the Employee immediately without any severance pay, or medical, dental, and vision insurance continuation aside from COBRA.
- B. In the event the Employer at any point during the term of this agreement reduces the salary or other financial benefits of the Employee in a greater percentage than reductions to all other employees of Employer, or if Employer refuses, following a written request to comply with any provision benefiting Employee herein; or the Employee resigns following a suggestion, whether formal or informal, by the County Administrator that he resign, then, in that event, Employee may, at his option, be deemed to be terminated at the date of such reduction or refusal to comply within the meaning and context of the herein severance pay provision.

C. In the event the Employee voluntarily resigns his position with the County as **Director of**Community **Development and Infrastructure** then the Employee shall give the County

thirty (30) days written notice in advance, unless the parties otherwise agree. The provision
for severance pay and continuation of employment benefits detailed in SECTION 3,

Paragraph A shall not apply to a voluntary resignation.

SECTION 4. Termination Due to Disability

If the Employee is unable to perform his duties because of sickness, accident, injury, or mental incapacity, and no reasonable accommodations are available, the County shall have the option to terminate employment, subject to the severance pay requirements of SECTION 3, Paragraph A. However, the Employee shall be compensated for any accrued benefits, in accordance with current policies.

SECTION 5. Salary

The County agrees to pay the Employee for his services rendered, pursuant hereto, an annual base salary of \$185,000.00 payable in installments at the same time as other employees of the County are paid, except that the county may put in place cost reduction measures at any time and for any duration as required by a lack of financial resources. The base annual salary and benefits may be reviewed annually by the County Administrator and consideration for increases may be determined based upon the performance of the employee or consideration of providing a Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA).

SECTION 6. Performance Evaluation

The County Administrator, or his or her designee, shall review and evaluate the performance of Employee at least annually on the anniversary day of this agreement. Said review and evaluation shall be in accordance with criteria developed by the County Administrator, or his or her designee, and Employee. Performance criteria may be added to or deleted from, as the County Administrator, or his or her designee may from time to time determine. Further, the County Administrator, or his or her designee, shall provide the Employee with a written summary statement of the findings of the evaluation.

SECTION 7. Hours of Work

It is generally recognized that the position of **Director of Community Development and Infrastructure** involves the devotion of a great deal of time beyond typically recognized business hours.

SECTION 8. Outside Activities

The Employee shall devote his full time to the position described in this agreement. With the approval of the County Administrator, or his or her designee, the Employee may engage in teaching, consulting, or other non-employer related activities as long as he does not interfere with the execution of the duties of this position, or present a conflict of interest. Such consent must be obtained by advance approval, in writing, detailing the specifics of such activity.

SECTION 9. Political Activity

If the Employee announces as a candidate for any elective office during the duration of this contract, he will resign from Hall County employment immediately upon declaring candidacy as defined by state law. During the term of this contract, the Employee may not:

- A. Be involved in any political activity that would constitute a conflict of interest; including participation in any aspect of any local political campaign on behalf of one's self if intending to seek elected office, or other individual or in opposition to any candidate for office within Hall County; including municipal and/or county government office. This restriction includes but is not limited to displaying or distributing information, materials, or paraphernalia in support of any political candidate, party or organization.
- B. Knowingly solicit, accept, or receive political contributions from any person, to be used in support of or in opposition to any political candidate for election within Hall County, including municipal and/or county government office.
- C. Use, or promise to use, directly or indirectly, any official authority or influence, whether possessed or anticipated, to secure or attempt to secure for any person a job or other advantage for the purpose of influencing the vote or political action of any person.

Director of Community Development and Infrastructure

SECTION 10. Vehicle and Phone

Employee shall be provided an automobile allowance in the amount of \$800.00 per month, payable bi-weekly. A cellular phone dedicated solely for business usage may be provided by the Employer. In such case, the Employer shall be responsible for paying for and maintaining regular monthly service. Should the Employee desire to use their personal cellular phone for business purposes, Employer shall reimburse the Employee the amount of \$50 per month.

SECTION 11. Insurance Benefits

The County agrees to put in force and make premium payments for Medical, Dental, Vision, Short-Term Disability and Life Insurance policies on behalf of the Employee and if so elected, eligible dependents, at a level of coverage available to other County employees. The Employee may choose not to cover his dependents.

SECTION 12. Retirement Benefits

Provided that contributions are being made by the County, if the Employee elects, Hall County agrees to contribute 8% of annual compensation as defined by the retirement plan in addition to Employer matching contributions made on contributions by the Employee as received by other County employees, into a defined contribution plan, except that the County may reduce or suspend this contribution at any time and for any duration as required due to a lack of financial resources. Retirement contributions shall not be made on any severance pay provided by the Employer, paid in accordance with Section 3.

SECTION 13. Paid Time Off (PTO) or Vacation and Sick Leave

As applicable, the County will provide for Paid Time Off (PTO) or vacation and sick leave in the same manner as the accruals currently received by other County Employees. An additional three (3) weeks of vacation shall be provided upon execution of this agreement and placed in the employee's vacation additional accrual location in ADP. In the event that the County changes or adopts a new program for all employees, such changes shall also apply to the **Director of Community Development and Infrastructure**. Accrued PTO or vacation leave, whichever is applicable, shall be paid to Employee upon termination of employment.

SECTION 14. Dues, Subscriptions and Professional Development

- A. The County agrees to pay the Employee's annual membership dues, subscriptions and conference expenses incurred by the Employee in conjunction with the Employee's duties, not to exceed the budget and subject to prior approval by the County Administrator or his or her designee.
- B. The County agrees to pay the travel and subsistence expenses of the Employee for expenses related to maintenance of professional certifications, professional and official travel, meetings and occasions adequate to continue the professional development of the Employee and to adequately pursue necessary official and other functions for the department, not to exceed the budget and subject to prior approval by the County Administrator or his or her designee.

SECTION 15. Indemnification

The County shall defend, save harmless, and indemnify the Employee against any claim or demand or legal action, whether groundless or otherwise, arising out of an alleged act or omission occurring in the performance of the Employee's duties as **Director of Community Development and Infrastructure**. The County or its insurance carrier will pay the amount of any settlement or judgment agreed to or rendered against the Employee and the County may agree to such settlement or the payment of a judgment with or without the express consent of the Employee. Any defense and/or indemnification of the Employee by the County shall be subject to all of the terms and conditions found in the County's Defense and Indemnification ordinance/policy.

SECTION 16. General Provisions

- A. The text herein shall constitute the entire agreement between the parties. Any amendment hereto shall be in writing and be executed by both parties.
- B. This agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the heirs at law and executors of the Employee.
- C. If any provision, or any portion thereof, contained in this agreement is held unconstitutional, invalid, or unenforceable, the remainder of this agreement, or portion thereof, shall be deemed severable, shall not be affected, and shall remain in full force and effect.

Director of Community Development and Infrastructure

- D. This agreement will become effective on the 1st day of March 2023, and shall continue thereafter unless or until the agreement is terminated by either party as set forth herein.
- E. This agreement shall be executed in duplicate, each of which shall be deemed to be complete of itself and may be introduced into evidence or used for any purpose without the production of the other copy.

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into this 9th day of March 2023, by and between **HALL COUNTY, STATE OF GEORGIA,** hereinafter called "the County", as party of the first part, and **Bill Nash**, herein called "Employee", as party of the second part, both of whom agree as follows:

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the County desires to employ the services of said Bill Nash as the Director of Public Works and Utilities of Hall County; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the governing board, hereafter called "Commission" to provide certain benefits, establish certain conditions of employment and to set working conditions of said Employee; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of Hall County to secure and retain the services of said Employee and provide inducement for him to remain in such employment, and to make possible full work productivity by assuring said Employee's morale and peace of mind with respect to future security, and to provide a just means of terminating the Employee's services at such a time as desired by the County Administrator, or his or her designee; and

WHEREAS, the Employee desires to accept employment as **Director of Public Works** and Utilities for Hall County;

NOW THEREFORE; in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

SECTION 1. <u>Duties</u>

The County hereby agrees to employ **Bill Nash** as **Director of Public Works and Utilities**, to perform legally permissible functions and duties specified and assigned by the County Administrator or his or her designee.

Director of Public Works and Utilities

SECTION 2. <u>Term</u>

- A. Nothing in this agreement shall prevent, limit, or otherwise interfere with the right of the County Administrator to terminate the services of this Employee at any time, subject only to the provisions set forth in SECTION 3 of this agreement. The Employee understands that he serves at the pleasure of the County Administrator.
- B. Nothing in the agreement shall prevent, limit, or otherwise interfere with the right of the Employee to resign at any time from his or her position with the County, subject to the provisions set forth in SECTION 3, Paragraphs B and C of this agreement.

SECTION 3. Termination and Severance Pay

- A. In the event the Employee is terminated pursuant to Paragraph B hereof and the Employee is willing and able to perform the duties of the position under this agreement, upon execution of a Separation Agreement and General Release, the Employer agrees to pay the Employee a lump sum cash payment equal to three (3) months aggregate annual salary, exclusive of other forms of compensation, less standard withholdings, in addition to the continuation of medical, dental, and vision insurance benefits during the three (3) month period immediately following the date of termination. However, in the event the Employee is terminated because the Employee has been convicted of a misdemeanor or a felony, or if the County determines that the Employee has engaged in unprofessional and improper practice, other than negligence, and breach of public trust, including but not limited to illegal acts involving personal gain, or moral turpitude, the County shall be entitled to terminate the Employee immediately without any severance pay, or medical, dental, and vision insurance continuation aside from COBRA.
- B. In the event the Employer at any point during the term of this agreement reduces the salary or other financial benefits of the Employee in a greater percentage than reductions to all other employees of Employer, or if Employer refuses, following a written request to comply with any provision benefiting Employee herein; or the Employee resigns following a suggestion, whether formal or informal, by the County Administrator that he resign, then, in that event, Employee may, at his option, be deemed to be terminated at the date of such reduction or refusal to comply within the meaning and context of the herein severance pay provision.

Director of Public Works and Utilities

C. In the event the Employee voluntarily resigns his position with the County as **Director of Public Works and Utilities** then the Employee shall give the County **thirty (30)** days written notice in advance, unless the parties otherwise agree. The provision for severance pay and continuation of employment benefits detailed in SECTION 3, Paragraph A shall not apply to a voluntary resignation.

SECTION 4. Termination Due to Disability

If the Employee is unable to perform his duties because of sickness, accident, injury, or mental incapacity, and no reasonable accommodations are available, the County shall have the option to terminate employment, subject to the severance pay requirements of SECTION 3, Paragraph A. However, the Employee shall be compensated for any accrued benefits, in accordance with current policies.

SECTION 5. Salary

The County agrees to pay the Employee for his services rendered, pursuant hereto, an annual base salary of \$172,676.00 payable in installments at the same time as other employees of the County are paid, except that the county may put in place cost reduction measures at any time and for any duration as required by a lack of financial resources. The base annual salary and benefits may be reviewed annually by the County Administrator and consideration for increases may be determined based upon the performance of the employee or consideration of providing a Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA).

SECTION 6. Performance Evaluation

The County Administrator, or his or her designee, shall review and evaluate the performance of Employee at least annually on the anniversary day of this agreement. Said review and evaluation shall be in accordance with criteria developed by the County Administrator, or his or her designee, and Employee. Performance criteria may be added to or deleted from, as the County Administrator, or his or her designee may from time to time determine. Further, the County Administrator, or his or her designee, shall provide the Employee with a written summary statement of the findings of the evaluation.

Director of Public Works and Utilities

SECTION 7. Hours of Work

It is generally recognized that the position of **Director of Public Works and Utilities** involves the devotion of a great deal of time beyond typically recognized business hours.

SECTION 8. Outside Activities

The Employee shall devote his full time to the position described in this agreement. With the approval of the County Administrator, or his or her designee, the Employee may engage in teaching, consulting, or other non-employer related activities as long as he does not interfere with the execution of the duties of this position, or present a conflict of interest. Such consent must be obtained by advance approval, in writing, detailing the specifics of such activity.

SECTION 9. Political Activity

If the Employee announces as a candidate for any elective office during the duration of this contract, he will resign from Hall County employment immediately upon declaring candidacy as defined by state law. During the term of this contract, the Employee may not:

- A. Be involved in any political activity that would constitute a conflict of interest; including participation in any aspect of any local political campaign on behalf of one's self if intending to seek elected office, or other individual or in opposition to any candidate for office within Hall County; including municipal and/or county government office. This restriction includes but is not limited to displaying or distributing information, materials, or paraphernalia in support of any political candidate, party or organization.
- B. Knowingly solicit, accept, or receive political contributions from any person, to be used in support of or in opposition to any political candidate for election within Hall County, including municipal and/or county government office.
- C. Use, or promise to use, directly or indirectly, any official authority or influence, whether possessed or anticipated, to secure or attempt to secure for any person a job or other advantage for the purpose of influencing the vote or political action of any person.

Director of Public Works and Utilities

SECTION 10. <u>Vehicle and Phone</u>

Employee shall be provided an automobile allowance in the amount of \$700.00 per month, payable bi-weekly. A cellular phone dedicated solely for business usage may be provided by the Employer. In such case, the Employer shall be responsible for paying for and maintaining regular monthly service. Should the Employee desire to use their personal cellular phone for business purposes, Employer shall reimburse the Employee the amount of \$50 per month.

SECTION 11. <u>Insurance Benefits</u>

The County agrees to put in force and make premium payments for Medical, Dental, Vision, Short-Term Disability and Life Insurance policies on behalf of the Employee and if so elected, eligible dependents, at a level of coverage available to other County employees. The Employee may choose not to cover his dependents.

SECTION 12. Retirement Benefits

Provided that contributions are being made by the County, if the Employee elects, Hall County agrees to contribute 8% of annual compensation as defined by the retirement plan in addition to Employer matching contributions made on contributions by the Employee as received by other County employees, into a defined contribution plan, except that the County may reduce or suspend this contribution at any time and for any duration as required due to a lack of financial resources. Retirement contributions shall not be made on any severance pay provided by the Employer, paid in accordance with Section 3.

SECTION 13. Paid Time Off (PTO) or Vacation and Sick Leave

As applicable, the County will provide for Paid Time Off (PTO) or vacation and sick leave in the same manner as the accruals currently received by other County Employees. An additional three (3) weeks of vacation shall be provided upon execution of this agreement and placed in the employee's vacation additional accrual location in ADP. In the event that the County changes or adopts a new program for all employees, such changes shall also apply to the **Director of Public Works and Utilities**. Accrued PTO or vacation leave, whichever is applicable, shall be paid to Employee upon termination of employment.

Director of Public Works and Utilities

SECTION 14. Dues, Subscriptions and Professional Development

- A. The County agrees to pay the Employee's annual membership dues, subscriptions and conference expenses incurred by the Employee in conjunction with the Employee's duties, not to exceed the budget and subject to prior approval by the County Administrator or his or her designee.
- B. The County agrees to pay the travel and subsistence expenses of the Employee for expenses related to maintenance of professional certifications, professional and official travel, meetings and occasions adequate to continue the professional development of the Employee and to adequately pursue necessary official and other functions for the department, not to exceed the budget and subject to prior approval by the County Administrator or his or her designee.

SECTION 15. Indemnification

The County shall defend, save harmless, and indemnify the Employee against any claim or demand or legal action, whether groundless or otherwise, arising out of an alleged act or omission occurring in the performance of the Employee's duties as **Director of Public Works** and **Utilities**. The County or its insurance carrier will pay the amount of any settlement or judgment agreed to or rendered against the Employee and the County may agree to such settlement or the payment of a judgment with or without the express consent of the Employee. Any defense and/or indemnification of the Employee by the County shall be subject to all of the terms and conditions found in the County's Defense and Indemnification ordinance/policy.

SECTION 16. General Provisions

- A. The text herein shall constitute the entire agreement between the parties. Any amendment hereto shall be in writing and be executed by both parties.
- B. This agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the heirs at law and executors of the Employee.
- C. If any provision, or any portion thereof, contained in this agreement is held unconstitutional, invalid, or unenforceable, the remainder of this agreement, or portion thereof, shall be deemed severable, shall not be affected, and shall remain in full force and effect.

Director of Public Works and Utilities

- D. This agreement will become effective on the 1st day of March 2023, and shall continue thereafter unless or until the agreement is terminated by either party as set forth herein.
- E. This agreement shall be executed in duplicate, each of which shall be deemed to be complete of itself and may be introduced into evidence or used for any purpose without the production of the other copy.

Summary Analysis

The applicant is requesting use approval for the County Commission for the purpose of developing a 29 lot single family detached subdivision. Within the Residential I (R-I, $\underline{17.60}$) zoning district, subdivisions are uses permitted subject approval of the County Commission ($\underline{17.60.040}$). There is a concurrent request to rezone the property to Residential I (R-I, $\underline{17.60}$) zoning district for the purpose of developing a 29-lot subdivision.

Per <u>17.20.1210</u>, subdivision means the division of a tract or parcel of land into seven or more lots, building sites, or other divisions for the purposes of sale, legacy, a new street, or a change in existing streets, and includes resubdivision. Where appropriate to the context, subdivision also relates to the process of subdividing or to the land or area subdivided. The term shall also include the opening of a new street or road. The combination or recombination of portions of previously platted lots where the total number of lots is not increased and the resultant lots meet the standards of the county subdivision regulations is not included within this definition.

No variance were submitted as part of this request or identified by staff in a review of the application.

Based on the future land-use plan, staff finds the <u>requested use request consistent</u> with the residential future land use classification in <u>Comprehensive Plan</u>. Residential areas are characterized by moderate-density residential development and neighborhoods. Street networks are defined by curvilinear streets and green space is largely provided on individual lot. Future development will continue to be detached, single-family homes at moderate densities.

Zoning Analysis

The proposed use of a 29-lot subdivision is consistent with the residential future land use classification, which are characterized by moderate-density residential development at density of less than 2 units per acre. The development is subject to the Hall County stream buffer requirements. The current proposal shows the buffers are located within many if the individual lots, and some of the areas designated as "on-site sewage management area" on the conceptual include a portion of the 75FT impervious stream buffer. On-site systems cannot be located within the stream buffers so these lots may require reconfiguration to meet Environmental Health useable soil area requirements.

When considering a zoning amendment to the zoning maps, the following items must be considered:

- 1. Whether the zoning proposal will permit a use that is suitable in view of the use and development of adjacent and nearby property; The proposed use of a 29-lot subdivision is proposed adjacent to other Residential I (R-I, 17.60) to the south and east, and Agricultural Residential III (AR-III, 17.110) to the west and north. The proposed use is suitable in view of the use and development of adjacent and nearby properties; however, the proposed lot configuration may require revisions to accommodate on-site sewage systems and meet the stream buffer requirements.
- 2. Whether the zoning proposal will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property; The use proposal should not have an adverse effect on the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property. The environmental features on the site necessitate buffers that will protect the streams which bisect the property.
- 3. Whether the property to be affected by the zoning proposal has reasonable economic use as currently zoned. The property appears to be undeveloped and wooded. The property has reasonable economic values as currently zoned; allowable uses within the Agricultural Residential III (AR-III, 17.110) and Residential I (R-I, 17.60).
- 4. Whether the zoning proposal will result in a use which will or could cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, or utilities; The proposed development should not result in a use which could cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, or utilities. The density of the development is below the maximum density recommendation of 2 units per acre for the residential future land use classification found in the Comprehensive Plan.
- 5. Whether the zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the land use plan; The proposed use of a 29-lot subdivision is consistent with the residential future land use classification, which are characterized by moderate-density residential development at density of less than 2 units per acre.
- 6. The extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions; Staff has not identified that the existing property values have been impacted by the existing zoning.
- 7. The extent to which the destruction of the subject property's value under the existing zoning promotes the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public; Staff is unable to comment on the impact of property values without a full market analysis. Multiple factors impact property value including construction types, proposed uses, and maintenance. Often it is difficult to determine the effect of a development on adjacent properties until the development is completed.

- 8. The relative gain to the public as compared to the hardship imposed upon the individual property owner; Staff has not identified a hardship imposed on the property owner as the property is currently zoned.
- 9. The length of time the property has been vacant as zoned considered in the context of land development in the area in the vicinity of the property; The property is currently undeveloped and appears to have been this was for a number of years.
- 10. Whether there are other existing or changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property which give supporting grounds for either approval or disapproval of the zoning proposal; Staff is not aware of any changing conditions that affect the use and development of the property.
- 11. Whether the change would create an isolated district unrelated to the surrounding districts; The proposed development is adjacent to other Residential I (R-I, 17.60) zoned parcels
- **12.** Whether the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn in relation to existing conditions in the area; **There is no evidence that the present zoning district boundary is illogically drawn.**
- 13. Whether the change requested is out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole or the immediate neighborhood; The requested use approval is not out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole. While development has trended to smaller lot development recently, the proposed development is consistent with the surrounding development pattern.
- 14. Whether it is impossible to find adequate sites for the proposed use in districts permitting such use and already appropriately zoned; There are other properties within the County that support a moderate-density single-family residential uses based on the Future Land Use Map.
- 15. Whether the need for rezoning could be handled instead by a variance request to the [Planning Commission]; This request could not be handled by a variance request instead; a subdivision is a use subject to County Commission approval within the R-I district (17.60.040.I).
- 16. Whether there would be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from major modifications to the land if the request is granted; Any land disturbance activities on the property shall be required to go through the land development permitting process and as a result are subject to local, state, and federal regulations. As a result there should not be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from any modification to the land if the request is granted.
- 17. Whether there is reasonable evidence based upon existing and anticipated land use that would indicate a mistake was made in the original zoning of the property; There is no indication that a mistake was made in the original zoning of the property.

<u>Development Support and Constraints – Departmental / Agency Comments</u>

Hall County Environmental Health

An email dated December 13, 2022 from Emily McGahee states "All proposed lots must meet Hall County Board of Health Lot Size Resolution requirements."

Hall County Fire Marshal

An email dated December 15, 2022 John Hornick, NPQ Fire Inspector 1, Plans Review Lieutenant provided the following preliminary comments:

1) IFC Section 507, all buildings must be with in the 400' hose lay distance requirements from a fire hydrant as the truck travels. Fire hydrant(s) may have to be installed along the fire access route to meet the hose lay distance requirements.

Hall County Public Works and Utilities

In a memo dated December 14, 2022, from Srikanth Yamala, Director of Public Works and Utilities, provided the following comments:

Engineering:

This site may require a stormwater management report, should the site plan indicate the proposed development meets stormwater thresholds for impervious surface and/or disturbed acreage. Show buffer and impervious setback from wrested vegetation, not centerline of creek. Show flood Hall County studied and FEMA.

Traffic:

Roadways to meet Hall County Standards

Utilities

Hall County Sewer District, no gravity sewer available.

Proposed septic systems will require Health Department approval.

City of Gainesville Water Resources

In an email dated November 15, 2022, Nick Swafford, Permitting Services Manager, confirmed availability of water service for the property via a 6-inch water main on Springdale Forrest Boulevard.

Georgia Department of Transportation

No comments from GDOT for this item.

Excerpts from the minutes of the January 3, 2023 meeting

Conditions:

- 1. The development shall generally occur as depicted on the conceptual site plan dated 11-17-2022 and submitted to the Hall County Planning staff on 1-3-2023, as modified to limit the total lots to 27. Furthermore, described in the revised project narrative modified for compliance with zoning conditions and Hall County regulations. Revisions to the site plan can be approved by the Planning Director during the Development Review/Land Disturbance Permit process provided that the revisions do not:
 - a. Increase the number of lots;
 - b. Decrease required greenspace, amenity areas, or buffers;
 - c. Change the design or materials of the dwellings;
 - d. Decrease the minimum building setbacks;
 - e. Reduce required landscaping
 - 2. Architectural standards: All facades of all residences, shall be finished with brick, stone, stucco, wood siding, wood shakes, or fiber cement type siding. The front facades shall

- incorporate changes in building material, texture, and/or color. Vinyl siding on all residential and non-residential buildings shall be prohibited. Architectural elevations shall be submitted and approved by the Planning Director prior to approval of the Preliminary Plat.
- 3. All costs associated with any required right-of-way improvements shall be the Developer's responsibility.
- 4. All conditions of zoning shall be made part of any plats created for the property.
- 5. Standard Hall County plat review process shall be followed.
- 6. Standard Hall County Development Review and Land Disturbance Permit process shall be followed.
- 7. Development is subject to Hall County Stormwater Management regulations.
- 8. The Development must meet Hall County Environmental Health requirements for on-site systems. No system or drain field shall be located within the 75FT impervious stream buffer.
- 9. No variances in Hall County Development standards are granted.
- 10. Revise the conceptual prior to BOC meeting to show buffer and impervious setback from wrested vegetation, not centerline of creek and to show Hall County studied and FEMA flood plain.
- 11. The following statement regarding the potential impacts of agricultural operations in the area shall be made a part of any plat recorded on the property:

 "Owners, occupants, and users of property shown on this plat are hereby informed of the impacts associated with normal farming practices which may take place on adjacent and nearby property including, but not limited to, noise, odors, dust, the operation of machinery of any kind, the storage and disposal of manure, and the application of fertilizers, herbicides, and pesticides. Therefore, owners, occupants, and users of the property shown on this plat should be prepared to expect the effects of such practices."

This statement is intended to comply with application procedures established by the Governing Jurisdiction, and is intended to set forth a preliminary development plan for the Subject Property, to evaluate the proposed development and new zoning classification, conditional use and variances (if any), based upon factors set forth by the Governing Jurisdiction and is otherwise intended as the Written Evaluation for the Subject Property. The Applicant has provided all required information and has submitted the appropriate application fees. The requested Application meets all judicial and statutory requirements for approval.

The Applicant intends to develop the Subject Property for the Proposed Use, as more fully described in the Application, incorporated herein by this reference. Any zoning request, sketch plat, conditional use permit, and variance applications submitted concurrently with the Application are also incorporated herein by this reference. The zoning request, sketch plat, conditional use permit, and variance applications, along with all supplemental plans and documents are collectively referred to as the "Applicant's Proposal."

INTENDED USE

The Applicant requests to rezone the Subject Property to the Proposed Zoning for the Proposed Use with a Conditional Use Permit for a subdivision pursuant to Hall County Zoning Ordinance § 17.60.040 (I). Specifically, the Subject Property will be developed as a **29-unit, Single Family Detached Subdivision**.

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

The Governing Jurisdiction's Comprehensive Plan and the Future Development Map incorporated therein designates the Subject Property as located within the Residential Character Area. The zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the Comprehensive Plan. The Subject Property is located in the Lake Area Residential Character Area, which provides, "Future development will continue to be detached, single-family homes at low densities." The Proposed Use has a proposed density of 0.81 residential units per acre.



The Applicant's proposed density is in compliance with the Comprehensive Plan's recommendation of up to 1.0 dwellings per acre. See Comp. Plan p. 29.

IMPACT ANALYSIS.

When exercising the Governing Jurisdiction's zoning powers, consideration shall be given to the following factors associated with the use. The Applicant's Proposed Use satisfies all of these criteria as described below:

1. Whether the zoning proposal will permit a use that is suitable in view of the use, development and zoning of adjacent and nearby property.

The Proposed Use is compatible with the surrounding properties and land use, specifically the residential use by surrounding single family homes. The Proposed Use and proposed density are in keeping with the Comprehensive Plan's recommended zoning categories and proposed density of development.

2. Whether the zoning proposal will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property.

The Proposed Use will not adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby properties because the Proposed Use will allow for a residential use that is compatible with the surrounding residential uses. The value of the surrounding properties will be enhanced by the Subject Property's residences and site design.

3. Whether the property to be affected by the zoning proposal has a reasonable economic use as currently zoned.

The shape, size, and topography of the Subject Property necessitate rezoning of the Subject Property, as its steep topography and streams prevent development using the Current Zoning. With the limited buildable area available on the site, the Proposed Use is the only physically practicable or financially viable use for the Subject Property. There is no other physically practicable or financially viable use for the Subject Property than as proposed by the Applicant.

4. Whether the zoning proposal will result in a use which will or could cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, utilities, schools, police protection, fire protection, public health facilities or emergency medical service.

The Proposed Use will not result in a use that will cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, utilities, schools, parks, or other public facilities. The projected impact on schools and utilities will be in keeping with projected growth, and any applicable impact fees from the development will fund infrastructure improvements. The number of car trips and need for transportation facilities will be comparable to surrounding uses, and the developer will make improvements to surrounding rights-of-way as required by applicable regulations for project improvements.

See also the Applicant's Public Impact Analysis Below.



5. Whether the zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the future land use plan for the physical development of the area.

The zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the Comprehensive Plan. The Subject Property is located in the Lake Area Residential Character Area, which provides, "Future development will continue to be detached, single-family homes at low densities."

In this regard, the development will provide:

- Low-density residential
- Green Space
- Moderate pedestrian connectivity with sidewalks
- Moderate vehicular connectivity with curvilinear streets
- 6. The extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions.

The Subject Property does not have a reasonable economic use as currently zoned. The AR-III zoning category requires a minimum lot size of 43,560 square feet. Smaller lot sizes are necessary in order to develop a sufficient number of single-family dwellings at a sufficient price-point to make the project economically viable for redevelopment.

7. The extent to which the destruction of the subject property's value under the existing zoning promotes the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public.

A refusal by the Governing Jurisdiction to approve the Application, as requested by the Applicant, will impose a disproportionate hardship on the Applicant and owners of the Subject Property without benefiting any surrounding property owners. There is no reasonable use of the Subject Property except for development as proposed by the Applicant and there is no benefit to the public by requiring that the Current Zoning be maintained.

8. The relative gain to the public as compared to the hardship imposed upon the individual property owner.

IMPACT ON THE LOCAL POPULATION DENSITY PATTERN AND PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE

(A) Proposed Construction Phasing Schedule

Construction of the project is anticipated to occur over approximately 36 months. Upon issuance of Land Disturbance Permit, the Applicant anticipates the project will be developed within 12 months thereafter, and houses to be constructed over the following 24 months. During the first 12 months of construction, the site will be developed and platted as residential lots. Home construction will begin immediately upon the platting of the first phase of development and will continue to full build out through month 36.

Based upon the most currently available data, the Applicant estimates there will be 3.05 occupants per unit. Assuming this to be the case, the Applicant expects the population of the new development to be as follows:

(B) Public Road System

Permanent access to the subdivision will be from the ROW Access. All of the development's interior streets will be publicly-owned and maintained.

Traffic generated from the development will be in keeping with expected growth patterns and access to public thoroughfares will be at a location where sight distance is sufficient. All curb cuts shall be coordinated and approved by the Governing Jurisdiction and acceleration and deceleration lanes will be installed as required. All streets within the development will be constructed to conform to the Governing Jurisdiction's standards. Parking will be provided onsite as required by the Zoning Ordinance.

(C) County School System

The Table below estimates the number of school children expected to be generated by the project, based upon the ratio of the estimated number of school children in the Governing Jurisdiction to the estimated number of households in Hall County, then multiplying the quotient by the number of residential units in the Proposed Use. This factor is calculated to 0.33 students per household.

The numbers above are a planning factor used to project total student population and plan the need for new school facilities. However, the actual number of students who live in the proposed development may be more or less than the factor above, because the method of calculation uses a total number households countywide, with some households containing more than the average number of children and others comprised of zero children.

(D) Water and Waste Water Systems

The community's water needs will be served by the City of Gainesville. Please refer to the results of the water and sewer pre-application meeting, which has been submitted concurrently with this Written Evaluation. The community's sewer needs will be served through private septic.

(E) Utilities

With regard to public utilities, water, sanitary sewer, natural gas, electricity and cable are available to the Subject Property. The impact on public utilities is anticipated to be minimal. The Applicant will install underground utility lines within the development to serve the project on an as-needed basis.





Summary Analysis

The applicant is requesting use approval for the County Commission for the purpose of developing a 29 lot single family detached subdivision. Within the Residential I (R-I, $\underline{17.60}$) zoning district, subdivisions are uses permitted subject approval of the County Commission ($\underline{17.60.040}$). There is a concurrent request to rezone the property to Residential I (R-I, $\underline{17.60}$) zoning district for the purpose of developing a 29-lot subdivision.

Per <u>17.20.1210</u>, subdivision means the division of a tract or parcel of land into seven or more lots, building sites, or other divisions for the purposes of sale, legacy, a new street, or a change in existing streets, and includes resubdivision. Where appropriate to the context, subdivision also relates to the process of subdividing or to the land or area subdivided. The term shall also include the opening of a new street or road. The combination or recombination of portions of previously platted lots where the total number of lots is not increased and the resultant lots meet the standards of the county subdivision regulations is not included within this definition.

No variance were submitted as part of this request or identified by staff in a review of the application.

Based on the future land-use plan, staff finds the <u>requested use request consistent</u> with the residential future land use classification in <u>Comprehensive Plan</u>. Residential areas are characterized by moderate-density residential development and neighborhoods. Street networks are defined by curvilinear streets and green space is largely provided on individual lot. Future development will continue to be detached, single-family homes at moderate densities.

Zoning Analysis

The proposed use of a 29-lot subdivision is consistent with the residential future land use classification, which are characterized by moderate-density residential development at density of less than 2 units per acre. The development is subject to the Hall County stream buffer requirements. The current proposal shows the buffers are located within many if the individual lots, and some of the areas designated as "on-site sewage management area" on the conceptual include a portion of the 75FT impervious stream buffer. On-site systems cannot be located within the stream buffers so these lots may require reconfiguration to meet Environmental Health useable soil area requirements.

When considering a zoning amendment to the zoning maps, the following items must be considered:

- 1. Whether the zoning proposal will permit a use that is suitable in view of the use and development of adjacent and nearby property; The proposed use of a 29-lot subdivision is proposed adjacent to other Residential I (R-I, 17.60) to the south and east, and Agricultural Residential III (AR-III, 17.110) to the west and north. The proposed use is suitable in view of the use and development of adjacent and nearby properties; however, the proposed lot configuration may require revisions to accommodate on-site sewage systems and meet the stream buffer requirements.
- 2. Whether the zoning proposal will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property; The use proposal should not have an adverse effect on the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property. The environmental features on the site necessitate buffers that will protect the streams which bisect the property.
- 3. Whether the property to be affected by the zoning proposal has reasonable economic use as currently zoned. The property appears to be undeveloped and wooded. The property has reasonable economic values as currently zoned; allowable uses within the Agricultural Residential III (AR-III, 17.110) and Residential I (R-I, 17.60).
- 4. Whether the zoning proposal will result in a use which will or could cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, or utilities; The proposed development should not result in a use which could cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, or utilities. The density of the development is below the maximum density recommendation of 2 units per acre for the residential future land use classification found in the Comprehensive Plan.
- 5. Whether the zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the land use plan; The proposed use of a 29-lot subdivision is consistent with the residential future land use classification, which are characterized by moderate-density residential development at density of less than 2 units per acre.
- 6. The extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions; Staff has not identified that the existing property values have been impacted by the existing zoning.
- 7. The extent to which the destruction of the subject property's value under the existing zoning promotes the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public; Staff is unable to comment on the impact of property values without a full market analysis. Multiple factors impact property value including construction types, proposed uses, and maintenance. Often it is difficult to determine the effect of a development on adjacent properties until the development is completed.

- 8. The relative gain to the public as compared to the hardship imposed upon the individual property owner; Staff has not identified a hardship imposed on the property owner as the property is currently zoned.
- 9. The length of time the property has been vacant as zoned considered in the context of land development in the area in the vicinity of the property; The property is currently undeveloped and appears to have been this was for a number of years.
- 10. Whether there are other existing or changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property which give supporting grounds for either approval or disapproval of the zoning proposal; Staff is not aware of any changing conditions that affect the use and development of the property.
- 11. Whether the change would create an isolated district unrelated to the surrounding districts; The proposed development is adjacent to other Residential I (R-I, 17.60) zoned parcels
- **12.** Whether the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn in relation to existing conditions in the area; **There is no evidence that the present zoning district boundary is illogically drawn.**
- 13. Whether the change requested is out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole or the immediate neighborhood; The requested use approval is not out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole. While development has trended to smaller lot development recently, the proposed development is consistent with the surrounding development pattern.
- 14. Whether it is impossible to find adequate sites for the proposed use in districts permitting such use and already appropriately zoned; There are other properties within the County that support a moderate-density single-family residential uses based on the Future Land Use Map.
- 15. Whether the need for rezoning could be handled instead by a variance request to the [Planning Commission]; This request could not be handled by a variance request instead; a subdivision is a use subject to County Commission approval within the R-I district (17.60.040.I).
- 16. Whether there would be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from major modifications to the land if the request is granted; Any land disturbance activities on the property shall be required to go through the land development permitting process and as a result are subject to local, state, and federal regulations. As a result there should not be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from any modification to the land if the request is granted.
- 17. Whether there is reasonable evidence based upon existing and anticipated land use that would indicate a mistake was made in the original zoning of the property; There is no indication that a mistake was made in the original zoning of the property.

An email dated December 15, 2022 John Hornick, NPQ Fire Inspector 1, Plans Review Lieutenant provided the following preliminary comments:

1) IFC Section 507, all buildings must be with in the 400' hose lay distance requirements from a fire hydrant as the truck travels. Fire hydrant(s) may have to be installed along the fire access route to meet the hose lay distance requirements.

Hall County Public Works and Utilities

In a memo dated December 14, 2022, from Srikanth Yamala, Director of Public Works and Utilities, provided the following comments:

Engineering:

This site may require a stormwater management report, should the site plan indicate the proposed development meets stormwater thresholds for impervious surface and/or disturbed acreage. Show buffer and impervious setback from wrested vegetation, not centerline of creek. Show flood Hall County studied and FEMA.

Traffic:

Roadways to meet Hall County Standards

Utilities

Hall County Sewer District, no gravity sewer available.

Proposed septic systems will require Health Department approval.

City of Gainesville Water Resources

In an email dated November 15, 2022, Nick Swafford, Permitting Services Manager, confirmed availability of water service for the property via a 6-inch water main on Springdale Forrest Boulevard.

Georgia Department of Transportation

No comments from GDOT for this item.

Excerpts from the minutes of the January 3, 2023 meeting

Applicant's Presentation:

Randi Doveton, Planning Director, presented a summary of the request.

Joshua Scoggins, 202 Tribble Gap Road, Cumming, presented the request. The applicant addressed that the request was for 27 single-family detached homes, 0.76 units per acre. The homes will be served by septic.

Kenneth Evans, 3550 Springdale Forrest Circle, Gainesville, spoke in opposition. Concerns were developing, traffic, and safety.

Victoria Leming, 3369 Springdale Forrest Circle, Gainesville, spoke in opposition. Concerns were ordinances, narrow road, safety, and traffic.

Robert Campbell, **3419 Springdale Forrest Circle**, **Gainesville**, spoke in opposition. Concerns were safety, sharp and narrow roads, congestion,

Tracy Handl, 3427 Springdale Forrest Circle, Gainesville, spoke in opposition. Concerns were traffic, safety, differing home styles, and buffers.

Planning Commission Comments:

Mr. Braswell wanted clarification of the rear setback. The applicant stated it is 20 feet. Mr. Braswell questioned if there would be a homeowners association in place. The applicant stated that it could be looked into but it might be a requirement. Mr. Hunt questioned if a homeowners association is a county code. Ms. Doveton stated it is because of the watershed.

<u>Motion:</u> A motion to approve, with conditions was made by Mr. Hunt and seconded by Ms. Pilcher. Vote: 3-1 (Bell absent & Varner opposed)

Conditions:

- 1. The development shall generally occur as depicted on the conceptual site plan dated 11-17-2022 and submitted to the Hall County Planning staff on 1-3-2023, as modified to limit the total lots to 27. Furthermore, described in the revised project narrative modified for compliance with zoning conditions and Hall County regulations. Revisions to the site plan can be approved by the Planning Director during the Development Review/Land Disturbance Permit process provided that the revisions do not:
 - a. Increase the number of lots;
 - b. Decrease required greenspace, amenity areas, or buffers;
 - c. Change the design or materials of the dwellings;
 - d. Decrease the minimum building setbacks;
 - e. Reduce required landscaping
 - 2. Architectural standards: All facades of all residences, shall be finished with brick, stone, stucco, wood siding, wood shakes, or fiber cement type siding. The front facades shall

- incorporate changes in building material, texture, and/or color. Vinyl siding on all residential and non-residential buildings shall be prohibited. Architectural elevations shall be submitted and approved by the Planning Director prior to approval of the Preliminary Plat.
- 3. All costs associated with any required right-of-way improvements shall be the Developer's responsibility.
- 4. All conditions of zoning shall be made part of any plats created for the property.
- 5. Standard Hall County plat review process shall be followed.
- 6. Standard Hall County Development Review and Land Disturbance Permit process shall be followed.
- 7. Development is subject to Hall County Stormwater Management regulations.
- 8. The Development must meet Hall County Environmental Health requirements for on-site systems. No system or drain field shall be located within the 75FT impervious stream buffer.
- 9. No variances in Hall County Development standards are granted.
- 10. Revise the conceptual prior to BOC meeting to show buffer and impervious setback from wrested vegetation, not centerline of creek and to show Hall County studied and FEMA flood plain.
- 11. The following statement regarding the potential impacts of agricultural operations in the area shall be made a part of any plat recorded on the property:

 "Owners, occupants, and users of property shown on this plat are hereby informed of the impacts associated with normal farming practices which may take place on adjacent and nearby property including, but not limited to, noise, odors, dust, the operation of machinery of any kind, the storage and disposal of manure, and the application of fertilizers, herbicides, and pesticides. Therefore, owners, occupants, and users of the property shown on this plat should be prepared to expect the effects of such practices."

This statement is intended to comply with application procedures established by the Governing Jurisdiction, and is intended to set forth a preliminary development plan for the Subject Property, to evaluate the proposed development and new zoning classification, conditional use and variances (if any), based upon factors set forth by the Governing Jurisdiction and is otherwise intended as the Written Evaluation for the Subject Property. The Applicant has provided all required information and has submitted the appropriate application fees. The requested Application meets all judicial and statutory requirements for approval.

The Applicant intends to develop the Subject Property for the Proposed Use, as more fully described in the Application, incorporated herein by this reference. Any zoning request, sketch plat, conditional use permit, and variance applications submitted concurrently with the Application are also incorporated herein by this reference. The zoning request, sketch plat, conditional use permit, and variance applications, along with all supplemental plans and documents are collectively referred to as the "Applicant's Proposal."

INTENDED USE

The Applicant requests to rezone the Subject Property to the Proposed Zoning for the Proposed Use with a Conditional Use Permit for a subdivision pursuant to Hall County Zoning Ordinance § 17.60.040 (I). Specifically, the Subject Property will be developed as a **29-unit, Single Family Detached Subdivision**.

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

The Governing Jurisdiction's Comprehensive Plan and the Future Development Map incorporated therein designates the Subject Property as located within the Residential Character Area. The zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the Comprehensive Plan. The Subject Property is located in the Lake Area Residential Character Area, which provides, "Future development will continue to be detached, single-family homes at low densities." The Proposed Use has a proposed density of 0.81 residential units per acre.



The Applicant's proposed density is in compliance with the Comprehensive Plan's recommendation of up to 1.0 dwellings per acre. See Comp. Plan p. 29.

The area surrounding the Subject Property is developing as single-family residential homes, making continued agricultural use of the property increasingly difficult. The Proposed Use is in keeping with the Comprehensive Plan and with the changing use of the surrounding area.

12. Whether the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn in relation to existing conditions in the area.

The present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn in relation to existing conditions in the area surrounding the Subject Property. The area surrounding the Subject Property is developing as single-family residential homes, making continued agricultural use of the property more difficult. The Proposed Use is in keeping with the Comprehensive Plan and with the changing use of the surrounding area.

The Proposed Use is in keeping with the Comprehensive Plan and with the changing use of the surrounding area. The Proposed Use is in keeping with the scope and scale of development planned for by the Governing Jurisdiction's implementation strategy for public utilities, transportation improvements, and other capital improvement projects, such as parks, public safety, and schools.

The Subject Property does not have a reasonable economic use as currently zoned.

IMPACT ON THE LOCAL POPULATION DENSITY PATTERN AND PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE

(A) Proposed Construction Phasing Schedule

Construction of the project is anticipated to occur over approximately 36 months. Upon issuance of Land Disturbance Permit, the Applicant anticipates the project will be developed within 12 months thereafter, and houses to be constructed over the following 24 months. During the first 12 months of construction, the site will be developed and platted as residential lots. Home construction will begin immediately upon the platting of the first phase of development and will continue to full build out through month 36.

Based upon the most currently available data, the Applicant estimates there will be 3.05 occupants per unit. Assuming this to be the case, the Applicant expects the population of the new development to be as follows:

(B) Public Road System

Permanent access to the subdivision will be from the ROW Access. All of the development's interior streets will be publicly-owned and maintained.

However, the actual number of students who live in the proposed development may be more or less than the factor above, because the method of calculation uses a total number households countywide, with some households containing more than the average number of children and others comprised of zero children.

(D) Water and Waste Water Systems

The community's water needs will be served by the City of Gainesville. Please refer to the results of the water and sewer pre-application meeting, which has been submitted concurrently with this Written Evaluation. The community's sewer needs will be served through private septic.

(E) Utilities

With regard to public utilities, water, sanitary sewer, natural gas, electricity and cable are available to the Subject Property. The impact on public utilities is anticipated to be minimal. The Applicant will install underground utility lines within the development to serve the project on an as-needed basis.





Planning Commission Conditions:

- 1. The development shall be limited to a maximum of 6 lots. No further subdivision of any lot shall be permitted without additional action by the Hall County Board of Commissioners and the completion of a stormwater management report.
- Lots 1-5 shall be accessed through a common access drive per the amended site plan dated 1-30-23 and the enlarged driveway detail pan dated 1-19-23, and developed in accordance with common access driveways; minimum standards (12.40.220), subject to the review and approval of Hall County Engineering. Lot 6 shall be served by an individual driveway connecting directly to Shirley Road.
- 3. All Zoning conditions shall be part of any plat or site plans prepared.

A concurrent conditional use application is on this agenda. The items may be heard together but separate motions and votes are required since these are two distinct applications and agenda items. Should the variance request be denied the conditional use will not be possible as proposed.

Public Forum

There were no comments in support or opposition.

Summary Analysis

The applicant is requesting approval reduce the road frontage requirement from 150 feet to 50 feet in order to subdivide the 22.04± acres into a 6-lot subdivision. The submitted narrative explains that the applicant intends to subdivide the property into 6 building lots for high-end residential homes.

Lots 1 – 5 will each have 50 feet of frontage along Shirley Road and be served by a common access drive which connects to Shirley Road, rather than having their own individual driveway. Lot 6 will have an individual driveway. The submitted site plan shows a 20 foot wide t-shaped area labeled as a common access drive. It should be noted that this does not meet the requirements of common access driveways; minimum standards, (12.40.220). This section requires a common access driveway which terminates in a dead end to terminate in either a cul-de-sac with a paved radius of 25 feet, or another termination method that allows for vehicles to turn around safely and is acceptable to Hall County Engineering.

There is an existing residence on lot 3. Neither the site plan nor the narrative state if this home is to remain or be removed. The lot frontage and area is listed below:

Five (5) variances related to access will be required if the site plan, as presented, is approved because the proposal does not meet the requirements.

Per 16.050.040, access, in any subdivision not involving the construction of new roads and in any
minor subdivision (as defined by the Hall County zoning regulations), all new lots accessing a road
designated as an arterial or collector shall have a minimum frontage of 150 feet.

Per the requirements of $\underline{17.50.040}$, uses permitted subject to approval of the county commission, within the Vacation Cottage (V-C, $\underline{17.50}$) zoning district, subdivisions require Board of Commissioner approval. As such, there is a concurrent conditional use request being heard as part of this application.

Zoning Analysis

The Planning Commission is herby authorized to grant variances from the strict application of this Resolution upon proof by a preponderance of the evidence that <u>2.60.030.J</u> provided the request meets the criteria set forth in <u>2.60.030.K</u>.

- 1. There are extraordinary and exceptional conditions pertaining to the particular lot in question because of its size, shape or topography (the hardship must relate to the physical character of the lot and not to a personal or economic hardship); The subject property has approximately 603 feet of road frontage. It is not possible to subdivide the property into 6 building lots and for each lot to have 150 feet of frontage. The subject property is a large parcel, 22.04 acres, with limited road frontage and an existing dwelling.
- 2. The application of the requirements of this <u>Title 17</u> to this particular piece of property would create an unusual hardship; The applicant would not be able to subdivide the property as proposed. Without the requested variances, the maximum number lots would be 4.
- 3. Such conditions are peculiar to the particular piece of property involved and are not common to other properties in the neighborhood; and **No, the lot is similar to other properties in the neighborhood.**
- 4. Such conditions are not the result of any actions of the property owner; and **The applicant has** requested the variance to accommodate a 6 lot subdivision.
- 5. Relief, if granted, would not cause substantial detriment to the public good or impair the purposes and intent of <u>Title 17</u>; provided, however, that no variance may be granted for a use of land or building or structure that is prohibited by <u>Title 17</u> or for a conditional use which has been denied by the county planning commission. The road frontage requirement for collector roads is 150 feet so to minimize the number of curb cuts that slow down and impede the orderly flow of traffic. The utilization of a common access drive will mitigate the potential impacts of 6 building lots.

STATEMENT OF HARDSHIP

The Hall County Planning Commission has the authority, in specific cases, to grant variances from the terms of the Zoning Regulations when the variance will not be contrary to the public interest where, owing to special conditions, a literal enforcement of the Zoning Regulations will, in specific cases, result in unnecessary hardship and so that the resolution shall be observed, public safety and welfare secured, and substantial justice done. The authority to grant such variances shall be limited to those instances where a hardship is clearly established as required by the Zoning Regulations.

In all cases involving requests for residential variances from the terms of the Zoning Regulations, a plat or survey of the property prepared by a registered surveyor, architect, or engineer shall be required. Describe how each situation listed below relates to your application:				
1. There are extraordinary and exceptional conditions pertaining to the particular piece of property in question because of its size, shape or topography (the hardship must relate to the physical character of the lot and not to a personal or economic hardship). As is the case with many lake frontage properties, the amount of available road frontage is disproportional to the amount of lake frontage. The lake frontage can easily support 6 lots, based on minimum Army Corps of Engineer's criteria but the road frontage will only support a 3 lot subdivision.				
2. The application of the requirements of this resolution to this particular property would create an unusual hardship. A hardship will be created if the property owner is not allowd to fully subdivide the property based on the underlying zoning requirements. The property owner has				
offered to construct a common driveway in order to limit the number of driveways from 6 to 2.				
3. Such conditions are peculiar to the particular piece of property involved and not common to other properties in the neighborhood. That is, the application of the regulation would deprive the applicant of the rights commonly enjoyed by others in the neighborhood. Two other projects on Shirley Road, with lake frontage, have been approved with road frontages of less than 150'. The Summercrest S/D in 2016 and the Sosewood Property Group, LLC S/D in 2021.				
4. Such conditions are not the result of any actions of the property owner. The property owner has taken no actions which would faciliate the request for this variance.				
5. Relief, if granted, would not cause substantial detriment to the public good or impair the purposes and intent of this resolution provided; however, that no variance may be granted for a use of land or building or structure that is prohibited by this resolution. For example, granting the variance would not confer any special privilege that is denied by this regulation to other property in the same zoning district. If granted, this variance would not be detrimental as the result does not increase the density allowed by the underlying zoning. In fact, the resulting lot sizes are much larger than the minimum for the V-C zoning district. The specifes of this variance are unique to this property and and would not confer any other special privelege.

Project Narrative for Wilbanks Tract

LOCATION – 4676 Shirley Road, Gainesville, Georgia 30506 ACREAGE – 22.045 acres +/-APPLICANT – Rochester | DCCM

Summary

The accompanying application seeks a conditional use permit for a 6-lot (Minor) Subdivision in the existing VC zoning district. The site includes an existing 22.045 acre parcel located on Shirley Road in north Hall approximately 1.3 miles southeast of Mount Vernon Road (SR 283). The intent is to subdivide 6 lots of lake front property, with an average lot size of 3.6 acres, for high end residential homes. The proposed use is consistent with the Hall County Comprehensive Plan for "residential" use and appropriate for Hall County's Planned Residential Development (PRD) District and for this location. Completion of development is anticipated by 2025.

Site Description

The site has approximately 595 LF of frontage along Shirley Road The site is rectangular in shape with an average depth of 1,500 LF and average width of 600 LF. One Ephemeral Stream is located near the northwest side of the site. The site has approximately 1,900 LF of Lake Frontage on the northwestern boundary. Domestic water provided by the City of Gainesville and is located in the Shirley Road right-of-way. Individual, on-site sewage management systems will handle wastewater disposal. All other dry utilities are located within a reasonable distance for service extensions. There are no known impediments to the site's successful development for the purposes intended.

Adjacencies

The property is surrounded by residential zonings (PRD, AR-III & VC) to the north, east and south.

Access

Access to the property is proposed as a common, private driveway entrance onto Shirley Road with shared use between 5 lot owners. The common driveway easement is proposed in the location shown on the conceptual site plan. Lot #6 would be served with an individual driveway directly to Shirley Road. Ownership and maintenance of the drive will be through a mandatory homeowner's association. Each lot that contains a portion of the common drive will grant an access easement in favor of all the other lot owners. Concurrent with the Conditional Use Permit request, we are also requesting a variance from the minimum lot frontage of 150' to 50'.

REQUIRED CONSTITUTIONAL AND ANTE LITEM NOTICE

Georgia law and the procedures of Hall County requires the Applicant to raise Federal and State constitutional objections during the conditional use permit application process. While the Applicant anticipates a smooth application process, failure to raise constitutional objections at this stage may mean that the Applicant will be barred from raising important legal claims later in the process. Accordingly, the following constitutional objections are stated:

The portions of the Hall County Development Code, facially and as applied to the Property, which restrict the Property to any uses, conditions, land use designations, development standards, or to any zoning district other than that proposed by the Applicant are unconstitutional in that they would destroy the Applicant's property rights without first paying fair, adequate and just compensation for such rights, in violation of Article I, Section I, Paragraph I and Section III, Paragraph I of the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1983, and the Due Process Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

The application of the Hall County Development Code, facially and as applied to the Property, which restricts the Property to any uses, conditions, land use designations, development standards, or to any zoning district other than in accordance with the application as proposed by the Applicant is unconstitutional, illegal, null and void, constituting a taking of Applicant's Property in violation of the Just Compensation Clause of the Fifth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States; Article I, Section I, Paragraph I, and Section III, Paragraph I of the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1983; and the Equal Protection and Due Process Clauses of the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States denying the Applicant an economically viable use of its land while not substantially advancing legitimate state interests.

A denial of this Application would be unconstitutional under the Takings Clause of the Fifth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States and the Just Compensation Clause of Article I, Section III, Paragraph I of the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1983. A refusal by the Hall County Board of Commissioners to approve the zoning conditions as requested would constitute a taking of the Applicant's property.

A denial of this Application would constitute an arbitrary and capricious act by the Hall County Board of Commissioners without any rational basis therefore constituting an abuse of discretion in violation of Article I, Section I, Paragraph I and Section III, Paragraph I of the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1983, and the Due Process Clause of the Fourteenth


Amendment to the Constitution of the United States. A refusal to grant the conditional use request would lack objective justification and would result only from neighborhood opposition, which would constitute an unlawful delegation of the zoning power to non-legislative bodies in violation of the Georgia Constitution, Article IX, Section II, Paragraph 4.


A refusal by the Hall County Board of Commissioners to approve this Application for the Property in accordance with the criteria as requested by the Applicant would be unconstitutional and discriminate in an arbitrary, capricious and unreasonable manner between the Applicant and owners of the similarly situated property in violation of Article I, Section I, Paragraph II of the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1983 and the Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States. Any rezoning of the Property subject to conditions which are different from the conditions requested by the Applicant, to the extent such different conditions would have the effect of further restricting Applicant's utilization of the Property, would also constitute an arbitrary, capricious and discriminatory act in zoning the Property to a unconstitutional classification and would likewise violate each of the provisions of the State and Federal Constitutions set forth hereinabove.

I. CONCLUSION

A concurrent conditional use application is on this agenda. The items may be heard together but separate motions and votes are required since these are two distinct applications and agenda items. Should the variance request be denied the conditional use will not be possible as proposed.

Public Forum

There were no comments in support or opposition.

Summary Analysis

The applicant is requesting approval to subdivide the 22.04± acres into a 6-lot subdivision. Per the requirements of 17.50.040, uses permitted subject to approval of the county commission, within the Vacation Cottage (V-C, 17.50) zoning district, minor subdivisions require Board of Commissioner approval. The submitted narrative explains that the applicant intends to subdivide the property into 6 building lots for high-end residential homes.

Lots 1-5 will each have 50 feet of frontage along Shirley Road and will be served by a common access drive which connects to Shirley Road. Lot 6 will have an individual driveway. The submitted site plan shows a 30 foot wide t-shaped area labeled as a common access drive. It should be noted that this does not meet the requirements of common access driveways; minimum standards, (12.40.220). This section requires a common access driveway which terminates in a dead end to terminate in either a cul-de-sac with a paved radius of 25 feet, or another termination method that allows for vehicles to turn around safely and is acceptable to Hall County Engineering.

There is an existing residence on lot 3. Neither the site plan nor the narrative state if this home is to remain or be removed. The lot frontage and area is listed below:

Concurrent to this request, the applicant is requesting a road frontage variance for lots 1-5 from 150 feet to 50 feet.

Zoning Analysis

Per Planning Commission and Hall County Commission consideration and decision (17.380.060), the planning commission shall study the need and justification for the change based on a determination of the facts applicable to the particular case, and the following general lines of inquiry shall be considered, to wit:

- Whether the zoning proposal will permit a use that is suitable in view of the use, development and zoning of adjacent and nearby property; The proposed use is consistent with the use, development, and zoning of adjacent and nearby properties. The proposed lot size and development pattern is consistent with other nearby properties.
- Whether the zoning proposal will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property; The proposed use of a 6 lot subdivision will not adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby properties.
- 3. Whether the property to be affected by the zoning proposal has a reasonable economic use as currently zoned; Yes, the property has reasonable economic use as currently zoned, Vacation Cottage (V-C, 17.50), but no further subdivision of the property can occur without conditional use approval.
- 4. Whether the zoning proposal will result in a use which will or could cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, utilities, schools, police protection, fire protection, public health facilities or emergency medical service; The development of 6 building lots should not cause an excessive or burdensome use of the existing streets, transportation facilities, etc.
- 5. Whether the zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the future land use plan for the physical development of the area; The proposed use of a 6-lot subdivision is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan's future land use classification of Lake Area Residential. In this land use classification, the recommended density is 1 dwelling unit per acre; the current proposal is 0.27 units per acre.
- 6. The extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions; **All division of land within the V-C zoning classification requires approval from the Board of Commissioners.**
- 7. The extent to which the destruction of the subject property's value under the existing zoning promotes the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public; Staff is unable to comment on the impact of property values without a full market analysis. Multiple factors impact property value including construction types, proposed uses, and maintenance. Often it is difficult to determine the effect of a development on adjacent properties until the development is completed.
- 8. Whether the change requested is out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole or the immediate neighborhood; No, the request is not out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole.
- 9. Whether it is impossible to find adequate sites for the proposed use in districts permitting such use and already appropriately zoned; All subdivision within the Vacation Cottage (V-C, 17.50) zoning districts require conditional use approval, which would necessitate the same request on any property with that designation.
- 10. Whether there would be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from major modifications to the land if the request is granted; There are no significant changes proposed to the site. Further, any land disturbance activities on the property shall be required to go through the land development

permitting process, and as a result are subject to local, state, and federal regulations. As a result there should not be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from any modification to the land if the request is granted.

Project Narrative for Wilbanks Tract

LOCATION – 4676 Shirley Road, Gainesville, Georgia 30506 ACREAGE – 22.045 acres +/-APPLICANT – Rochester | DCCM

Summary

The accompanying application seeks a conditional use permit for a 6-lot (Minor) Subdivision in the existing VC zoning district. The site includes an existing 22.045 acre parcel located on Shirley Road in north Hall approximately 1.3 miles southeast of Mount Vernon Road (SR 283). The intent is to subdivide 6 lots of lake front property, with an average lot size of 3.6 acres, for high end residential homes. The proposed use is consistent with the Hall County Comprehensive Plan for "residential" use and appropriate for Hall County's Planned Residential Development (PRD) District and for this location. Completion of development is anticipated by 2025.

Site Description

The site has approximately 595 LF of frontage along Shirley Road The site is rectangular in shape with an average depth of 1,500 LF and average width of 600 LF. One Ephemeral Stream is located near the northwest side of the site. The site has approximately 1,900 LF of Lake Frontage on the northwestern boundary. Domestic water provided by the City of Gainesville and is located in the Shirley Road right-of-way. Individual, on-site sewage management systems will handle wastewater disposal. All other dry utilities are located within a reasonable distance for service extensions. There are no known impediments to the site's successful development for the purposes intended.

Adjacencies

The property is surrounded by residential zonings (PRD, AR-III & VC) to the north, east and south.

Access

Access to the property is proposed as a common, private driveway entrance onto Shirley Road with shared use between 5 lot owners. The common driveway easement is proposed in the location shown on the conceptual site plan. Lot #6 would be served with an individual driveway directly to Shirley Road. Ownership and maintenance of the drive will be through a mandatory homeowner's association. Each lot that contains a portion of the common drive will grant an access easement in favor of all the other lot owners. Concurrent with the Conditional Use Permit request, we are also requesting a variance from the minimum lot frontage of 150' to 50'.

While the Applicant anticipates a smooth application process, failure to raise constitutional objections at this stage may mean that the Applicant will be barred from raising important legal claims later in the process. Accordingly, the following constitutional objections are stated:

The portions of the Hall County Development Code, facially and as applied to the Property, which restrict the Property to any uses, conditions, land use designations, development standards, or to any zoning district other than that proposed by the Applicant are unconstitutional in that they would destroy the Applicant's property rights without first paying fair, adequate and just compensation for such rights, in violation of Article I, Section I, Paragraph I and Section III, Paragraph I of the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1983, and the Due Process Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

The application of the Hall County Development Code, facially and as applied to the Property, which restricts the Property to any uses, conditions, land use designations, development standards, or to any zoning district other than in accordance with the application as proposed by the Applicant is unconstitutional, illegal, null and void, constituting a taking of Applicant's Property in violation of the Just Compensation Clause of the Fifth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States; Article I, Section I, Paragraph I, and Section III, Paragraph I of the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1983; and the Equal Protection and Due Process Clauses of the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States denying the Applicant an economically viable use of its land while not substantially advancing legitimate state interests.

A denial of this Application would be unconstitutional under the Takings Clause of the Fifth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States and the Just Compensation Clause of Article I, Section III, Paragraph I of the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1983. A refusal by the Hall County Board of Commissioners to approve the zoning conditions as requested would constitute a taking of the Applicant's property.

A denial of this Application would constitute an arbitrary and capricious act by the Hall County Board of Commissioners without any rational basis therefore constituting an abuse of discretion in violation of Article I, Section I, Paragraph I and Section III, Paragraph I of the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1983, and the Due Process Clause of the Fourteenth


Amendment to the Constitution of the United States. A refusal to grant the conditional use request would lack objective justification and would result only from neighborhood opposition, which would constitute an unlawful delegation of the zoning power to non-legislative bodies in violation of the Georgia Constitution, Article IX, Section II, Paragraph 4.


A refusal by the Hall County Board of Commissioners to approve this Application for the Property in accordance with the criteria as requested by the Applicant would be unconstitutional and discriminate in an arbitrary, capricious and unreasonable manner between the Applicant and owners of the similarly situated property in violation of Article I, Section I, Paragraph II of the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1983 and the Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States. Any rezoning of the Property subject to conditions which are different from the conditions requested by the Applicant, to the extent such different conditions would have the effect of further restricting Applicant's utilization of the Property, would also constitute an arbitrary, capricious and discriminatory act in zoning the Property to a unconstitutional classification and would likewise violate each of the provisions of the State and Federal Constitutions set forth hereinabove.

Items 3 and 4, 4654 Shirley Road, Rochester: All proposed lots must meet Hall County Board of Health Lot Size Resolution requirements. The applicant was notified of EH requirements on 12.19.2022.

Item 5 and 6, 1600 Athens Hwy, Vargas: Must meet all Environmental Health commercial septic system permitting requirements. A detailed business plan must be submitted to Hall County Environmental Health for review. Additional items, including, but not limited to: recorded plat, soil evaluation, and septic system installation/modification may be required after review of business plan.

Item 7, 3675 Thompson Bridge Road, NGHS: Connection to public sewer required. Any abandoned well shall be properly closed as per Water Well Standards Act. Any abandoned septic tank shall be pumped by a State certified pumper/hauler and crushed/filled.

A companion conditional use application is on this agenda. The items may be heard together but shall require separate motions and votes since they are two separate applications and agenda items. Should the rezoning request be denied, the conditional use application is automatically denied but the chairman should specifically address this when the vote is taken.

Public Forum

There were no comments in support or opposition.

Summary Analysis

The applicant is requesting approval to rezone the subject parcel from Highway Business (H-B, <u>17.150</u>) to Light Industrial (I-I, <u>17.160</u>) for the purpose of operating a countertop manufacturing business with outdoor storage of inventory items located in the rear of the property. The applicant's narrative states that the less expensive marble will be stored outdoors, in an existing gravel parking lot. A 12 foot by 68 foot shed is proposed to provide cover for the marble.

The narrative continues to explain that there is an existing security fence around the rear of the property. The fence will be improved so that it is opaque, but specific details on how this will be accomplished were not included with the application. Any lighting or signage will be consistent with Hall County regulations. As part of the development process, a tree replacement plan will be submitted by the applicant, and will again be consistent with Hall County standards.

The applicant has submitted a concurrent application requesting conditional use approval for outdoor storage of inventory items within the Gateway Corridors Overlay District (GCOD, <u>17.420</u>). The applicant intends permission to use the existing gravel parking area for the storage of marble in this area.

Based on the future land-use plan, staff finds the <u>requested zoning designation consistent with the Comprehensive Plan's</u> future land use classification of a mixed use corridor. Mixed use corridors are anticipated to include retail activities, office based employment, and civic uses. Low-impact industrial or higher density residential only where the same is found on adjacent properties.

Zoning Analysis

The proposed use of a marble countertop manufacturing with outdoor storage of inventory items is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan's future land use classification of a mixed use corridor. In this corridor, low-impact industrial uses are permitted where the same is found on adjacent properties. Adjacent to the subject parcel to the south (tax parcel 15032 000013B) and east (tax parcel 15032 000036) are properties zoned

Planned Industrial Development (PID, $\underline{17.180.090}$). To the west is another Highway Business (H-B, $\underline{17.150}$) zoned parcel ($\underline{15032\ 000013E}$). To the west of parcel 15032 000013E is a Light Industrial (I-I, $\underline{17.160}$) zoned parcel ($\underline{15031\ 000013D}$).

When considering a zoning amendment to the zoning maps, the following items must be considered:

- Whether the zoning proposal will permit a use that is suitable in view of the use and development of adjacent and nearby property; Adjacent to the subject parcel to the south (tax parcel 15032 000013B) and east (tax parcel 15032 000036) are properties zoned Planned Industrial Development (PID, 17.180.090). To the west is another Highway Business (H-B, 17.150) zoned parcel (15032 000013E). To the west of parcel 15032 000013E is a Light Industrial (I-I, 17.160) zoned parcel (15031 000013D).
- 2. Whether the zoning proposal will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property; The proposed rezoning should not have an adverse effect on the use of adjacent or nearby properties. The adjacent parcels are already developed with non-residential uses, the majority of which are industrial in nature.
- 3. Whether the property to be affected by the zoning proposal has reasonable economic use as currently zoned. Yes, the current zoning designation of Highway Business (H-B, 17.150) has reasonable economic use with the uses permitted under section permitted uses (17.150.010).
- 4. Whether the zoning proposal will result in a use which will or could cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, or utilities; While it is difficult to fully assess the impact of a future development, as the property is already developed with a non-residential use, in a predominately industrial area, it is not anticipated that there would be an excessive or burdensome use of the existing streets, transportation facilities, or utilities.
- 5. Whether the zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the land use plan; The proposed use of a marble countertop manufacturing with outdoor storage of inventory items is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan's future land use classification of a mixed use corridor. In this corridor, low-impact industrial uses are permitted where the same is found on adjacent properties.
- 6. The extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions; **Staff has not** identified that the existing property values have been impacted by the existing zoning.
- 7. The extent to which the destruction of the subject property's value under the existing zoning promotes the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public; Staff is unable to comment on the impact of property values without a full market analysis. Multiple factors impact property value including construction types, proposed uses, and maintenance. Often it is difficult to determine the effect of a development on adjacent properties until the development is completed.
- 8. The relative gain to the public as compared to the hardship imposed upon the individual property owner; Staff has not identified a hardship imposed on the property owner as the property is currently zoned.
- **9.** or changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property which give supporting grounds for either approval or disapproval of the zoning proposal; **There are no known changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property.**
- **10.** Whether the change would create an isolated district unrelated to the surrounding districts; **No, the zoning change would not create an isolated district unrelated to the surrounding districts.**

- **11.** Whether the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn in relation to existing conditions in the area; **There is no evidence that the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn.**
- 12. Whether the change requested is out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole or the immediate neighborhood; The proposed use is not out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole. The subject property is part of a mixed use corridor as identified in the Comprehensive Plan.
- 13. Whether it is impossible to find adequate sites for the proposed use in districts permitting such use and already appropriately zoned; There are other properties within the County that support the proposed use based on the Future Land Use Map and existing zoning designations without requesting a rezoning.
- 14. Whether the need for rezoning could be handled instead by a variance request to the [Planning Commission]; No, the request could not be handled alternatively as a variance as the requested use is not permitted within the Highway Business (H-B, 17.150) zoning district.
- 15. Whether there would be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from major modifications to the land if the request is granted; There are no significant changes proposed to the site. Further, any land disturbance activities on the property shall be required to go through the land development permitting process, and as a result are subject to local, state, and federal regulations. As a result there should not be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from any modification to the land if the request is granted.
- **16.** Whether there is reasonable evidence based upon existing and anticipated land use that would indicate a mistake was made in the original zoning of the property; **There is no indication that a mistake was made in the original zoning.**

The subject property falls within the Gateway Corridors Overlay District (GCOD, <u>17.420</u>) which provides supplemental design standards for non-residential property development.

<u>17.380.050</u>. - Submission requirements for a rezoning requests have been met.

Stormwater will need to include all impervious that was added without a permit.

Need permit from GDOT for any driveway modifications.

Georgia Department of Transportation

In an email dated January 19, 2023, Parker Niebauer, D1TO Traffic Operations Supervisor, confirmed that this project will require GDOT coordination.

Gerardo Vargas (the "Applicant") respectfully submits this Narrative Report to the Hall County Board of Commissioners in support of an application for rezoning from HB zoning classification to I-I zoning classification in the Gateway Corridor Overlay district.

The primary use of this parcel is planned and intended to be used as marble countertop fabrication and installation business utilizing the existing building and other improvements on the property. The purpose of the rezoning is for the ability to have outdoor storage. This rear yard area has existing gravel; therefore, the applicant also requests a variance to allow this area to remain as gravel. The gravel has been there for many years but it is difficult to tell when it was installed. It appears that weeds and grass were growing through the gravel, it was cleaned up, and then the gravel was recently refreshed by previous property owner. The applicant did not install the gravel. If it is determined that the gravel was installed after stormwater management regulations were in place then this area will have to meet current stormwater requirements. The more expensive marble material will be stored inside while the less expensive marble will be stored outside. A 68' x 12' shed in the rear of the property is proposed for cover. The existing gravel in the rear will also be used for delivery area.

There is an existing security fence around the rear of the property. Improvements will be made to the existing fence so that it is opaque. Lighting will be LED security non-spill lighting and signage will concur with Hall County regulations. A tree replacement plan will be required and provided by the applicant. The proposed use is consistent with the uses in the immediate vicinity and with adjacent properties on Athens Hwy and will not have any adverse impacts to the environment.







A companion rezoning application is on this agenda. The items may be heard together but shall require separate motions and votes since they are two separate applications and agenda items.

Public Forum

There were no comments in support or opposition.

Summary Analysis

The applicant is requesting conditional use approval for outdoor storage of inventory items on a property located within the GCOD Overlay District (17.420). The applicant's narrative states that marble will be stored outdoors, in an existing gravel parking lot in the rear of the property. A 12 foot by 68 foot shed is proposed to provide cover for the marble.

The narrative continues to explain that there is an existing security fence around the rear of the property. The fence will be improved so that it is opaque, but specific details on how this will be accomplished were not included with the application. Any lighting or signage will be consistent with Hall County regulations. As part of the development process, a tree replacement plan will be submitted by the applicant, and will again be consistent with Hall County standards.

The applicant has submitted a concurrent application requesting to rezone the property from Highway Business (H-B, <u>17.150</u>) to Light Industrial (I-I, <u>17.160</u>) for the purpose of operating a countertop manufacturing business on the property. The outdoor storage of inventory items will be marble that will be store outside in a gravel lot located in the rear of the property.

The property was previously approved as a welding and fabrication shop, and a machine shop, per Tidemark record 99000

Based on the future land-use plan, staff finds the <u>conditional use request is consistent with the</u>

<u>Comprehensive Plan's</u> future land use classification of a mixed use corridor. Mixed use corridors are anticipated to include retail activities, office based employment, and civic uses. Low-impact industrial or higher density residential only where the same is found on adjacent properties.

Zoning Analysis

Per Planning Commission and Hall County Commission consideration and decision (17.380.060), the planning commission shall study the need and justification for the change based on a determination of the facts applicable to the particular case, and the following general lines of inquiry shall be considered, to wit:

- 1. Whether the zoning proposal will permit a use that is suitable in view of the use, development and zoning of adjacent and nearby property; The requested use is consistent with the industrial development pattern of the area. Properties to the east, west, and south are industrially zoned.
- Whether the zoning proposal will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property; As the adjacent properties are also industrially zoned the use or usability of adjacent or nearby property should not be effected.
- 3. Whether the property to be affected by the zoning proposal has a reasonable economic use as currently zoned; Yes, the current zoning designation of Highway Business (H-B, 17.150) has reasonable economic use with the uses permitted under section permitted uses (17.150.010).
- 4. Whether the zoning proposal will result in a use which will or could cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, utilities, schools, police protection, fire protection, public health facilities or emergency medical service; While it is difficult to fully assess the impact of a future development, as the property is already developed with a non-residential use, in a predominately industrial area, it is not anticipated that there would be an excessive or burdensome use of the existing streets, transportation facilities, or utilities.
- 5. Whether the zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the future land use plan for the physical development of the area; The proposed use of a marble countertop manufacturing with outdoor storage of inventory items is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan's future land use classification of a mixed use corridor. In this corridor, low-impact industrial uses are permitted where the same is found on adjacent properties.
- 6. The extent to which the destruction of the subject property's value under the existing zoning promotes the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public; Staff is unable to comment on the impact of property values without a full market analysis. Multiple factors impact property value including construction types, proposed uses, and maintenance. Often it is difficult to determine the effect of a development on adjacent properties until the development is completed.
- 7. Whether there are other existing or changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property which give supporting grounds for either approval or disapproval of the zoning proposal; There are no known changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property.
- 8. Whether the change requested is out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole or the immediate neighborhood; The proposed use is not out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole. The subject property is part of a mixed use corridor as identified in the Comprehensive Plan.
- 9. Whether it is impossible to find adequate sites for the proposed use in districts permitting such use and already appropriately zoned; There are other properties within the County that support the proposed

use based on the Future Land Use Map and existing zoning designations. All properties within the Gateway Corridors Overlay District (GCOD, <u>17.420</u>) require conditional use approval for outdoor storage.

10. Whether there would be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from major modifications to the land if the request is granted; There are no significant changes proposed to the site. Further, any land disturbance activities on the property shall be required to go through the land development permitting process, and as a result are subject to local, state, and federal regulations. As a result there should not be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from any modification to the land if the request is granted.

The subject property falls within the Gateway Corridors Overlay District (GCOD, <u>17.420</u>) which provides supplemental design standards for non-residential property development.

An email dated January 24, 2023 John Hornick, NPQ Fire Inspector 1, Plans Review Lieutenant states, "The Hall County Fire Marshal's Office has no comments regarding the storage building location as proposed."

Hall County Public Works and Utilities

In a memo dated January 23, 2023 from Srikanth Yamala, Director of Public Works and Utilities, provided the following comments:

Engineering:

Stormwater will need to include all impervious that was added without a permit.

Traffic:

Need permit from GDOT for any driveway modifications.

Utilities

No comment.

Georgia Department of Transportation

In an email dated January 19, 2023, Parker Niebauer, D1TO Traffic Operations Supervisor, confirmed that this project will require GDOT coordination.

Gerardo Vargas (the "Applicant") respectfully submits this Narrative Report to the Hall County Board of Commissioners in support of an application for rezoning from HB zoning classification to I-I zoning classification in the Gateway Corridor Overlay district.

The primary use of this parcel is planned and intended to be used as marble countertop fabrication and installation business utilizing the existing building and other improvements on the property. The purpose of the rezoning is for the ability to have outdoor storage. This rear yard area has existing gravel; therefore, the applicant also requests a variance to allow this area to remain as gravel. The gravel has been there for many years but it is difficult to tell when it was installed. It appears that weeds and grass were going through it and then it was cleaned up and the gravel was recently refreshed by previous property owner. The applicant did not install the gravel. If it is determined that the gravel was installed after stormwater management regulations were in place then this area will have to meet current stormwater requirements. The more expensive marble material will be stored inside while the less expensive marble will be stored outside. A 68' x 12' shed in the rear of the property is proposed for cover. 





Summary Analysis

The applicant is requesting to rezone the subject properties from Highway Business (H-B, <u>17.150</u>), Agricultural Residential III (AR-III, <u>17.110</u>), and Residential I (R-I, <u>17.60</u>) to Planned Office Development (POD, <u>17.180.070</u>) for the purpose of developing a mixed-use, office-institutional park. Per the narrative, this development will serve the future needs of Northeast Georgia Health Systems, (NGHS).

The narrative describes a phased development of five lots with future phases based on future demand along the growing Thompson Bridge Road / State Route 60 corridor. The proposed development will include 200,000 square feet of office area, through a combination of one and two-story buildings. The narrative states that parking will be provided per Hall County regulations, determined by the use. Additionally, shared parking may be utilized when there are no conflicts of operating hours.

Access to the site is proposed from both Thompson Bridge Road / State Route 60, and Price Road / State Route 136, subject to Hall County and Georgia Department of Transportation (GDOT) approval. The narrative states that the entrance onto SR 60 is proposed to be a right-in/right-out only where the SR 136 location is proposed to be a full access intersection. The property borders Southers Road to the south, where two driveway accesses are proposed. The intersection of Southers and Thompson Bridge Roads is already a full access intersection, with an existing left turn lane onto Thompson Bridge Road.

The narrative states that the project may contain a variety of uses consistent with those allowed in the Office Institutional (O-I, <u>17.130</u>) zoning district including the following uses: medical office buildings, outpatient surgical facility, and inpatient care facility (hospice unit). In addition to the medical and office uses, the applicant is proposing a limited amount of commercial space near the Price Road entrance for retail or retail service establishments.

The submitted site plan shows 5 proposed building lots, each containing a primary structure and associated parking. The lots are connected internally through a series of interparcel connections. The proposed lot configuration is as follows:

The site plan shows the proposed building setbacks and exterior buffer where adjacent to residential uses. A master signage plan and renderings were submitted for the development. The narrative notes that the site plan is conceptual in nature, and as such may require modifications during the engineering and development process. Modification to the locations and arrangements of buildings, roads, and other improvements which do not conflict with specific standards and requirements of these conditions may be made by the developer or end user so long as the modifications do not change the land use, increase the overall density of the project, or reduce any established exterior buffers or setbacks.

A number of variances have been requested by the applicant, both in relation to the standards of the Gateway Corridors Overlay District (GCOD, $\underline{17.420}$) and the Tree Protection ($\underline{17.280}$) for non-residential property development.

Specifically, the applicant has requested the following variances:

- Signage:
 - o Allow internally illuminated signs on the buildings and monument signs.

- Allow wall signs on all 4 sides of a buildings.
- Quantity: one (1) per Tenant, per Wall Elevation

 - Sign may be curved, angled (possibly greater than 60 degrees) or straight configuration, as needed
 - Stone sign structure will be approx. 6' above grade, however sign structure may be incorporated into a retaining wall which could increase overall height.
 - Sign Panels: 96 sq. ft. each, 1 per street elevation
 - 170 sq. ft. permanent banner frames to display 90 sq ft banners, 1 per street elevation.
 - Banners will be in place continuously and will change periodically.
- Allow one (1) Campus Entry Pylon at each Campus Entry Drive
 - Materials: Stone Base w/ fabricated aluminum sign cabinet
 - Sign Area: 96 sq. ft.
 - Height: 12 ft. above street grade
 - Setback: 5' from R/W
- Allow Building Monuments with Aluminum Pylon without masonry base
 - Sign Area: 64 sq. ft.
 - Height: 10 ft. above street grade
 - Setback: 5' from R/W
- Allow one (1) freestanding or building mounted Directory sign per building entry
 - Aluminum Pylon without masonry base
 - Sign Area: 44 sq. ft.
 - Height: 8' above street grade
- Building Orientation:
 - Allow buildings to orient inward and away from SR 60, provided no parking shall occur between the building and SR 60.
- Building Materials:
 - o Allow basic architectural theme as shown on attached renderings.
 - o Allow TPO roofing materials for any flat roof building areas.
- Hall County Tree Ordinance
 - The Applicant requests a variance from Chapter 17.280 of the Hall County Code of Ordinances. The Applicant commits to submitting a landscape plan (to include tree planting) with any Land Disturbance Permit for review by the Director

Based on the future land-use plan, staff finds the <u>requested zoning designation consistent</u> with the intent of a Mixed Use Activity Center as described in the <u>Comprehensive Plan</u>.

Zoning Analysis

The proposed development of a mixed-use, office-institutional along this portion of Thompson Bridge Road is consistent with the future land use classification of a Mixed Use Activity Center, as identified in the Comprehensive Plan.

When considering a zoning amendment to the zoning maps, the following items must be considered:

- 1. Whether the zoning proposal will permit a use that is suitable in view of the use and development of adjacent and nearby property; The proposed use is suitable in view of the uses and development of adjacent and nearby properties. The intersection of Thompson Bridge Road / SR 60 and Price Road / SR 136 is an area of the county currently experiencing both commercial and residential growth. Having access to medical facilities nearby is a logically progression of development in the region.
- 2. Whether the zoning proposal will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property; The proposed development should not have an adverse effect on the existing uses or usability of adjacent or nearby property. The proposed use will be subject to all applicable local, state, and federal development regulations.
- 3. Whether the property to be affected by the zoning proposal has reasonable economic use as currently zoned. The property has reasonable economic values as currently zoned; allowable uses within the Highway Business (H-B, 17.150), Agricultural Residential III (AR-III, 17.110), and Residential I (R-I, 17.60) zoning districts.
- 4. Whether the zoning proposal will result in a use which will or could cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, or utilities; As the end users have not been identified, it is difficult to determine the frequency and intensity of traffic using the site. The development does not trigger the need for a DRI review nor is a traffic study required as part of the rezoning application.
- 5. Whether the zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the land use plan; The proposal is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan and the future land use classification of an Activity Center.
- 6. The extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions; **Staff has not** identified that the existing property values have been impacted by the existing zoning.
- 7. The extent to which the destruction of the subject property's value under the existing zoning promotes the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public; Staff is unable to comment on the impact of property values without a full market analysis. Multiple factors impact property value including construction types, proposed uses, and maintenance. Often it is difficult to determine the effect of a development on adjacent properties until the development is completed.
- 8. The relative gain to the public as compared to the hardship imposed upon the individual property owner; Staff has not identified a hardship imposed on the property owner as the property is currently zoned.
- 9. Whether there are other existing or changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property which give supporting grounds for either approval or disapproval of the zoning proposal; This portion of the county is rapidly changing as both residential and commercial growth is occurring in the area.
- 10. Whether the change would create an isolated district unrelated to the surrounding districts; While there is not another parcel zoned Planned Office Development (POD, <u>17.180.070</u>) in the immediate vicinity, the proposal is consistent with the intended development pattern along the Thompson Bridge Road corridor as described by the Comprehensive Plan.
- **11.** Whether the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn in relation to existing conditions in the area; **There is no evidence the present zoning district boundaries or illogical drawn.**

- **12.** Whether the change requested is out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole or the immediate neighborhood; **No, the request is in scale with the needs of the county as a whole.**
- 13. Whether it is impossible to find adequate sites for the proposed use in districts permitting such use and already appropriately zoned; While there are potentially other areas in the county identified for this sort of development in the Comprehensive Plan, the applicant would still be required to go through a rezoning request to develop the project as proposed.
- 14. Whether the need for rezoning could be handled instead by a variance request to the [Planning Commission]; No, the need for rezoning could not be handled instead by a variance request to the Planning Commission. The proposed uses are not permitted in the current zoning districts.
- 15. Whether there would be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from major modifications to the land if the request is granted; Any land disturbance activities on the property shall be required to go through the land development permitting process, and as a result are subject to local, state, and federal regulations. As a result there should not be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from any modification to the land if the request is granted.
- 16. Whether there is reasonable evidence based upon existing and anticipated land use that would indicate a mistake was made in the original zoning of the property; There is no indication that a mistake was made in the original zoning.

Per the requirements of **Planned Office Development (POD, <u>17.180.070</u>)**, a planned office development should contain orderly, well-designed office and institutional uses upon a site that results in minimum impact upon the surrounding area. The site plans and building designs should produce a development that can be constructed to achieve maximum utilization of space while maintaining a low-intensity office character protected from more intensive commercial and industrial development and protecting any nearby residential uses. Such a development may also include a limited number of residential and commercial uses.

Additionally, applicant for planned office developments are required to submit the following information as part of the application:

- The site plan shall indicate the proposed size, location, number of stories and estimated number of
 employees in each office building. The applicant has provided all of the information with the
 exception of an estimate of the number of employees in each office building. Since the end users
 have not been identified, the applicant cannot provide the number of employees for each building.
- 2. A proposed development schedule and a listing of proposed uses shall be provided. The narrative states that initial development is expected to be completed by 2025, though as it is a phased development the entire site development will not be complete.

The subject property falls within the **Gateway Corridors Overlay District (GCOD, <u>17.420</u>)** which provides supplemental design standards for non-residential property development.

<u>17.380.050</u> submission requirements for a rezoning request have been met.

- 1) Lot 1-5 will require an underground water distribution line with fire hydrant(s) installed to meet the 400 foot hose lay distance requirements to each building as the fire truck travels.
- 2) Lot 1-5 dead end turnarounds greater than 150' will require an approved fire apparatus turnaround.
- 3) Any building requiring a fire protection system will be required to install a fire service vault for each building, see Gainesville Water fire service vault detail.
- 4) Fire access lane around building on lot 5 will require an approved asphalt or concrete surface, no gravel or turf surfaced fire lane will be accepted.
- 5) Lot 1-5 Aerial fire apparatus access roads shall have a minimum unobstructed with of 26 ft. exclusive of shoulders, in the immediate vicinity of the building or portion thereof."

Hall County Public Works and Utilities

In a memo dated January 23, 2023 from Srikanth Yamala, Director of Public Works and Utilities, provided the following comments:

Engineering:

This site may require a stormwater management report, should the site plan indicate the proposed development meets stormwater thresholds for impervious surface and/or disturbed acreage.

Traffic:

Permit from GDOT will be required from driveway connection. Driveways on Southers will require widening. Check distance between proposed driveways.

Utilities

Gainesville sewer district.

Georgia Department of Transportation

In an email dated January 19, 2023, Parker Niebauer, D1TO Traffic Operations Supervisor, confirmed that this project will require GDOT coordination.

APPLICANT – Northeast Georgia Health Systems, Inc. (NGHS)

Summary

The accompanying application seeks zoning district change from AR-III & H-B to POD for 43.887 acres +/- of undeveloped property located on Thompson Bridge Road (SR 60), Price Road (SR 136) and Southers Road in north Hall County. The intent is to develop a mixed-use, office-institutional park that will serve future needs of NGHS. The property may be developed in several phases on five lots, with future phases based on future demand in the growing SR 60 corridor. An aggregate square footage of 200,000 SF is requested, in a combination of one and two-story buildings. Parking will be provided per Hall County regulations based on the final usage of each lot. Shared parking may be utilized where there are no conflicts of operating hours. This narrative will propose a unified set of standards for project. The location and proposed use is consistent with the Hall County Comprehensive Plan's designation as an "Activity Center" and appropriate for Hall County's Planned Office Development (POD) District. Initial completion of development is anticipated by 2025.

Site Description

The site has approximately 1400 LF of frontage along Thompson Bridge Road (SR 60), 450 LF along Price Road (SR 136) and 650 LF along Southers Road. A portion of the site along SR 60 is located within the Gateway Corridor Overlay District. The site is comprised of five tax parcels and is irregular in shape. The eastern boundary of the site is primarily Thompson Bridge Road (SR 60) while the southern boundary is Southers Road. An unnamed tributary of Ada Creek is located on the south end of the site. The site contains both cleared areas and random stands of trees with rolling topography. Public water is available through the City of Gainesville and is located in the Thompson Bridge Road (SR 60), Southers Road and Price Road (SR 136) rights-of-way. City of Gainesville public sewer is located south of the property at the intersection of Southers Road. All other dry utilities are located within a reasonable distance for service extensions. There are no known impediments to its successful development for the purposes intended.


Adjacencies

The property is surrounded by residential zonings R-1 to the north and west and AR-II and to the east. The parcel to the east (across Thompson Bridge Road) contains a shopping center zoned PCD.

Access

Access to the property is planned from Thompson Bridge Road (SR 60) and Price Road (SR 136), subject to GDOT approval, and from Southers Road, subject to Hall County approval. SR 60 access is proposed as right-in/right-out only and the SR 136 location as a full access intersection. The intersection of Southers Road and Thompson Bridge Road is a full access intersection with an existing left turn lane. Two access points from Southers Road to the property are additionally proposed.

Additionally, and in addition to the uses listed above, we request a limited amount of commercial space (near the Price Road Entrance) for the following uses:

Retail or Retail Service Establishment (Pharmacy, Medical Device Sales)

DRI/Traffic Impact Study

- 1) Lot 1-5 will require an underground water distribution line with fire hydrant(s) installed to meet the 400 foot hose lay distance requirements to each building as the fire truck travels.
- 2) Lot 1-5 dead end turnarounds greater than 150' will require an approved fire apparatus turnaround.
- 3) Any building requiring a fire protection system will be required to install a fire service vault for each building, see Gainesville Water fire service vault detail.
- 4) Fire access lane around building on lot 5 will require an approved asphalt or concrete surface, no gravel or turf surfaced fire lane will be accepted.
- 5) Lot 1-5 Aerial fire apparatus access roads shall have a minimum unobstructed with of 26 ft. exclusive of shoulders, in the immediate vicinity of the building or portion thereof.
