CONTRACT

This Contract is between Sourcewell, 202 12th Street Northeast, P.O. Box 219, Staples, MN 56479 (Sourcewell) and Kubota Tractor Corporation, 1000 Kubota Drive, Grapevine, TX 76051 (Vendor).

Sourcewell is a State of Minnesota local government agency and service cooperative created under the laws of the State of Minnesota (Minnesota Statutes Section 123A.21) that offers cooperative procurement solutions to government entities. Participation is open to federal, state/province, and municipal governmental entities, higher education, K-12 education, nonprofit, tribal government, and other public entities located in the United States and Canada. Sourcewell issued a public solicitation for Utility, Transport, Golf, and Recreation Vehicles with Related Accessories, Equipment, and Services from which Vendor was awarded a contract.

Vendor desires to contract with Sourcewell to provide equipment, products, or services to Sourcewell and the entities that access Sourcewell's cooperative purchasing contracts (Participating Entities).

1. TERM OF CONTRACT

A. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Contract is effective upon the date of the final signature below.

B. EXPIRATION DATE AND EXTENSION. This Contract expires January 29, 2025, unless it is cancelled sooner pursuant to Article 22. This Contract may be extended up to one additional one-year period upon request of Sourcewell and with written agreement by Vendor.

C. SURVIVAL OF TERMS. Articles 11 through 14 survive the expiration or cancellation of this Contract.

2. EQUIPMENT, PRODUCTS, OR SERVICES

A. EQUIPMENT, PRODUCTS, OR SERVICES. Vendor will provide the Equipment, Products, or Services as stated in its Proposal submitted under the Solicitation Number listed above. Vendor's Equipment, Products, or Services Proposal (Proposal) is attached and incorporated into this Contract.

All Equipment and Products provided under this Contract must be new/current model. Vendor may offer close-out or refurbished Equipment or Products if they are clearly indicated in Vendor's product and pricing list. Unless agreed to by the Participating Entities in advance, Equipment or Products must be delivered as operational to the Participating Entity's site.

This Contract offers an indefinite quantity of sales, and while substantial volume is anticipated, sales and sales volume are not guaranteed.

B. WARRANTY. Vendor warrants that all Equipment, Products, and Services furnished are free from liens and encumbrances, and are free from defects in design, materials, and workmanship. In addition, Vendor warrants the Equipment, Products, and Services are suitable for and will perform in accordance with the ordinary use for which they are intended. Vendor's dealers and distributors must agree to assist the Participating Entity in reaching a resolution in any dispute over warranty terms with the manufacturer. Any manufacturer's warranty that is effective past the expiration of the Vendor's warranty will be passed on to the Participating Entity.

C. DEALERS, DISTRIBUTORS, AND/OR RESELLERS. Upon Contract execution, Vendor will make available to Sourcewell a means to validate or authenticate Vendor's authorized dealers, distributors, and/or resellers relative to the Equipment, Products, and Services related to this Contract. This list may be updated from time-to-time and is incorporated into this Contract by reference. It is the Vendor's responsibility to ensure Sourcewell receives the most current version of this list.

3. PRICING

All Equipment, Products, or Services under this Contract will be priced as stated in Vendor's Proposal.

When providing pricing quotes to Participating Entities, all pricing quoted must reflect a Participating Entity's total cost of acquisition. This means that the quoted cost is for delivered Equipment, Products, and Services that are operational for their intended purpose, and includes all costs to the Participating Entity's requested delivery location.

Regardless of the payment method chosen by the Participating Entity, the total cost associated with any purchase option of the Equipment, Products, or Services must always be disclosed in the pricing quote to the applicable Participating Entity at the time of purchase.

A. SHIPPING AND SHIPPING COSTS. All delivered Equipment and Products must be properly packaged. Damaged Equipment and Products may be rejected. If the damage is not readily apparent at the time of delivery, Vendor must permit the Equipment and Products to be returned within a reasonable time at no cost to Sourcewell or its Participating Entities. Participating Entities reserve the right to inspect the Equipment and Products at a reasonable

time after delivery where circumstances or conditions prevent effective inspection of the Equipment and Products at the time of delivery.

Vendor must arrange for and pay for the return shipment on Equipment and Products that arrive in a defective or inoperable condition.

Sourcewell may declare the Vendor in breach of this Contract if the Vendor intentionally delivers substandard or inferior Equipment or Products. In the event of the delivery of nonconforming Equipment and Products, the Participating Entity will notify the Vendor as soon as possible and the Vendor will replace nonconforming Equipment and Products with conforming Equipment and Products that are acceptable to the Participating Entity.

B. SALES TAX. Each Participating Entity is responsible for supplying the Vendor with valid taxexemption certification(s). When ordering, a Participating Entity must indicate if it is a taxexempt entity.

C. HOT LIST PRICING. At any time during this Contract, Vendor may offer a specific selection of Equipment, Products, or Services at discounts greater than those listed in the Contract. When Vendor determines it will offer Hot List Pricing, it must be submitted electronically to Sourcewell in a line-item format. Equipment, Products, or Services may be added or removed from the Hot List at any time through a Sourcewell Price and Product Change Form as defined in Article 4 below.

Hot List program and pricing may also be used to discount and liquidate close-out and discontinued Equipment and Products as long as those close-out and discontinued items are clearly identified as such. Current ordering process and administrative fees apply. Hot List Pricing must be published and made available to all Participating Entities.

4. PRODUCT AND PRICING CHANGE REQUESTS

Vendor may request Equipment, Product, or Service changes, additions, or deletions at any time. All requests must be made in writing by submitting a signed Sourcewell Price and Product Change Request Form to the assigned Sourcewell Contract Administrator. This form is available from the assigned Sourcewell Contract Administrator. At a minimum, the request must:

- Identify the applicable Sourcewell contract number;
- Clearly specify the requested change;
- Provide sufficient detail to justify the requested change;
- Individually list all Equipment, Products, or Services affected by the requested change, along with the requested change (e.g., addition, deletion, price change); and

• Include a complete restatement of pricing documentation in Microsoft Excel with the effective date of the modified pricing, or product addition or deletion. The new pricing

restatement must include all Equipment, Products, and Services offered, even for those items where pricing remains unchanged.

A fully executed Sourcewell Price and Product Request Form will become an amendment to this Contract and be incorporated by reference.

5. PARTICIPATION, CONTRACT ACCESS, AND PARTICIPATING ENTITY REQUIREMENTS

A. PARTICIPATION. Sourcewell's cooperative contracts are available and open to public and nonprofit entities across the United States and Canada; such as federal, state/province, municipal, K-12 and higher education, tribal government, and other public entities.

The benefits of this Contract should be available to all Participating Entities that can legally access the Equipment, Products, or Services under this Contract. A Participating Entity's authority to access this Contract is determined through its cooperative purchasing, interlocal, or joint powers laws. Any entity accessing benefits of this Contract will be considered a Service Member of Sourcewell during such time of access. Vendor understands that a Participating Entity's use of this Contract is at the Participating Entity's sole convenience and Participating Entities reserve the right to obtain like Equipment, Products, or Services from any other source.

Vendor is responsible for familiarizing its sales and service forces with Sourcewell contract use eligibility requirements and documentation and will encourage potential participating entities to join Sourcewell. Sourcewell reserves the right to add and remove Participating Entities to its roster during the term of this Contract.

B. PUBLIC FACILITIES. Vendor's employees may be required to perform work at governmentowned facilities, including schools. Vendor's employees and agents must conduct themselves in a professional manner while on the premises, and in accordance with Participating Entity policies and procedures, and all applicable laws.

6. PARTICIPATING ENTITY USE AND PURCHASING

A. ORDERS AND PAYMENT. To access the contracted Equipment, Products, or Services under this Contract, a Participating Entity must clearly indicate to Vendor that it intends to access this Contract; however, order flow and procedure will be developed jointly between Sourcewell and Vendor. Typically, a Participating Entity will issue an order directly to Vendor. If a Participating Entity issues a purchase order, it may use its own forms, but the purchase order should clearly note the applicable Sourcewell contract number. All Participating Entity orders under this Contract must be issued prior to expiration of this Contract; however, Vendor performance, Participating Entity payment, and any applicable warranty periods or other Vendor or Participating Entity obligations may extend beyond the term of this Contract. Vendor's acceptable forms of payment are included in Attachment A. Participating Entities will be solely responsible for payment and Sourcewell will have no liability for any unpaid invoice of any Participating Entity.

B. ADDITIONAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS/PARTICIPATING ADDENDUM. Additional terms and conditions to a purchase order, or other required transaction documentation, may be negotiated between a Participating Entity and Vendor, such as job or industry-specific requirements, legal requirements (e.g., affirmative action or immigration status requirements), or specific local policy requirements. Some Participating Entitles may require the use of a Participating Addendum; the terms of which will be worked out directly between the Participating Entity and the Vendor. Any negotiated additional terms and conditions must never be less favorable to the Participating Entity than what is contained in this Contract.

C. SPECIALIZED SERVICE REQUIREMENTS. In the event that the Participating Entity requires service or specialized performance requirements (such as e-commerce specifications, specialized delivery requirements, or other specifications and requirements) not addressed in this Contract, the Participating Entity and the Vendor may enter into a separate, standalone agreement, apart from this Contract. Sourcewell, including its agents and employees, will not be made a party to a claim for breach of such agreement.

D. TERMINATION OF ORDERS. Participating Entities may terminate an order, in whole or in part, immediately upon notice to Vendor in the event of any of the following events:

1. The Participating Entity fails to receive funding or appropriation from its governing body at levels sufficient to pay for the goods to be purchased;

2. Federal, state, or provincial laws or regulations prohibit the purchase or change the Participating Entity's requirements; or

3. Vendor commits any material breach of this Contract or the additional terms agreed to between the Vendor and a Participating Entity.

E. GOVERNING LAW AND VENUE. The governing law and venue for any action related to a Participating Entity's order will be determined by the Participating Entity making the purchase.

7. CUSTOMER SERVICE

A. PRIMARY ACCOUNT REPRESENTATIVE. Vendor will assign an Account Representative to Sourcewell for this Contract and must provide prompt notice to Sourcewell if that person is changed. The Account Representative will be responsible for:

- Maintenance and management of this Contract;
- Timely response to all Sourcewell and Participating Entity inquiries; and
- Business reviews to Sourcewell and Participating Entities, if applicable.

B. BUSINESS REVIEWS. Vendor must perform a minimum of one business review with Sourcewell per contract year. The business review will cover sales to Participating Entities, pricing and contract terms, administrative fees, supply issues, customer issues, and any other necessary information.

8. REPORT ON CONTRACT SALES ACTIVITY AND ADMINISTRATIVE FEE PAYMENT

A. CONTRACT SALES ACTIVITY REPORT. Each calendar quarter, Vendor must provide a contract sales activity report (Report) to the Sourcewell Contract Administrator assigned to this Contract. A Report must be provided regardless of the number or amount of sales during that quarter (i.e., if there are no sales, Vendor must submit a report indicating no sales were made).

The Report must contain the following fields:

- Customer Name (e.g., City of Staples Highway Department);
- Customer Physical Street Address;
- Customer City;
- Customer State/Province;
- Customer Zip Code;
- Customer Contact Name;
- Customer Contact Email Address;
- Customer Contact Telephone Number;
- Sourcewell Assigned Entity/Participating Entity Number;
- Item Purchased Description;
- Item Purchased Price;
- Sourcewell Administrative Fee Applied; and
- Date Purchase was invoiced/sale was recognized as revenue by Vendor.

B. ADMINISTRATIVE FEE. In consideration for the support and services provided by Sourcewell, the Vendor will pay an administrative fee to Sourcewell on all Equipment, Products, and Services provided to Participating Entities. The Administrative Fee must be included in, and not added to, the pricing. Vendor may not charge Participating Entities more than the contracted price to offset the Administrative Fee.

The Vendor will submit payment to Sourcewell for the percentage of administrative fee stated in the Proposal multiplied by the total sales of all Equipment, Products, and Services purchased by Participating Entities under this Contract during each calendar quarter. Payments should note the Vendor's name and Sourcewell-assigned contract number in the memo; and must be mailed to the address above "Attn: Accounts Receivable" or remitted electronically to Sourcewell's banking institution per Sourcewell's Finance department instructions. Payments must be received no later than 45 calendar days after the end of each calendar quarter. Vendor agrees to cooperate with Sourcewell in auditing transactions under this Contract to ensure that the administrative fee is paid on all items purchased under this Contract.

In the event the Vendor is delinquent in any undisputed administrative fees, Sourcewell reserves the right to cancel this Contract and reject any proposal submitted by the Vendor in any subsequent solicitation. In the event this Contract is cancelled by either party prior to the Contract's expiration date, the administrative fee payment will be due no more than 30 days from the cancellation date.

9. AUTHORIZED REPRESENTATIVE

Sourcewell's Authorized Representative is its Chief Procurement Officer.

Vendor's Authorized Representative is the person named in the Vendor's Proposal. If Vendor's Authorized Representative changes at any time during this Contract, Vendor must promptly notify Sourcewell in writing.

10. AUDIT, ASSIGNMENT, AMENDMENTS, WAIVER, AND CONTRACT COMPLETE

A. AUDIT. Pursuant to Minnesota Statutes Section 16C.05, subdivision 5, the books, records, documents, and accounting procedures and practices relevant this Agreement are subject to examination by Sourcewell or the Minnesota State Auditor for a minimum of six years from the end of this Contract. This clause extends to Participating Entities as it relates to business conducted by that Participating Entity under this Contract.

B. ASSIGNMENT. Neither the Vendor nor Sourcewell may assign or transfer any rights or obligations under this Contract without the prior consent of the parties and a fully executed assignment agreement. Such consent will not be unreasonably withheld.

C. AMENDMENTS. Any amendment to this Contract must be in writing and will not be effective until it has been fully executed by the parties.

D. WAIVER. If either party fails to enforce any provision of this Contract, that failure does not waive the provision or the right to enforce it.

E. CONTRACT COMPLETE. This Contract contains all negotiations and agreements between Sourcewell and Vendor. No other understanding regarding this Contract, whether written or oral, may be used to bind either party. For any conflict between the attached Proposal and the terms set out in Articles 1-22, the terms of Articles 1-22 will govern.

F. RELATIONSHIP OF THE PARTIES. The relationship of the parties is one of independent contractors, each free to exercise judgment and discretion with regard to the conduct of their

respective businesses. This Contract does not create a partnership, joint venture, or any other relationship such as master-servant, or principal-agent.

11. LIABILITY

Vendor must indemnify, save, and hold Sourcewell and its Participating Entities, including their agents and employees, harmless from any claims or causes of action, including attorneys' fees, arising out of the performance of this Contract by the Vendor or its agents or employees; this indemnification includes injury or death to person(s) or property alleged to have been caused by some defect in the Equipment, Products, or Services under this Contract to the extent the Equipment, Product, or Service has been used according to its specifications.

12. GOVERNMENT DATA PRACTICES

Vendor and Sourcewell must comply with the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minnesota Statutes Chapter 13, as it applies to all data provided by or provided to Sourcewell under this Contract and as it applies to all data created, collected, received, stored, used, maintained, or disseminated by the Vendor under this Contract.

If the Vendor receives a request to release the data referred to in this article, the Vendor must immediately notify Sourcewell and Sourcewell will assist with how the Vendor should respond to the request.

13. INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY, PUBLICITY, MARKETING, AND ENDORSEMENT

A. INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY

1. Grant of License. During the term of this Contract:

a. Sourcewell grants to Vendor a royalty-free, worldwide, non-exclusive right and license to use theTrademark(s) provided to Vendor by Sourcewell in advertising and promotional materials for the purpose of marketing Sourcewell's relationship with Vendor.

b. Vendor grants to Sourcewell a royalty-free, worldwide, non-exclusive right and license to use Vendor's Trademarks in advertising and promotional materials for the purpose of marketing Vendor's relationship with Sourcewell.

2. Limited Right of Sublicense. The right and license granted herein includes a limited right of each party to grant sublicenses to its and their respective distributors, marketing representatives, and agents (collectively "Permitted Sublicensees") in advertising and promotional materials for the purpose of marketing the Parties' relationship to Participating Entities. Any sublicense granted will be subject to the terms and conditions of this Article. Each party will be responsible for any breach of this Article by any of their respective sublicensees.

3. Use; Quality Control.

a. Sourcewell must not alter Vendor's Trademarks from the form provided by Vendor and must comply with Vendor's removal requests as to specific uses of its trademarks or logos.

b. Vendor must not alter Sourcewell's Trademarks from the form provided by Sourcewell and must comply with Sourcewell's removal requests as to specific uses of its trademarks or logos.

c. Each party agrees to use, and to cause its Permitted Sublicensees to use, the other party's Trademarks only in good faith and in a dignified manner consistent with such party's use of the Trademarks. Upon written notice to the breaching party, the breaching party has 30 days of the date of the written notice to cure the breach or the license will be terminated.

4. As applicable, Vendor agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Sourcewell and its Participating Entities against any and all suits, claims, judgments, and costs instituted or recovered against Sourcewell or Participating Entities by any person on account of the use of any Equipment or Products by Sourcewell or its Participating Entities supplied by Vendor in violation of applicable patent or copyright laws.

5. Termination. Upon the termination of this Contract for any reason, each party, including Permitted Sublicensees, will have 30 days to remove all Trademarks from signage, websites, and the like bearing the other party's name or logo (excepting Sourcewell's pre-printed catalog of vendors which may be used until the next printing). Vendor must return all marketing and promotional materials, including signage, provided by Sourcewell, or dispose of it according to Sourcewell's written directions.

B. PUBLICITY. Any publicity regarding the subject matter of this Contract must not be released without prior written approval from the Authorized Representatives. Publicity includes notices, informational pamphlets, press releases, research, reports, signs, and similar public notices prepared by or for the Vendor individually or jointly with others, or any subcontractors, with respect to the program, publications, or services provided resulting from this Contract.

C. MARKETING. Any direct advertising, marketing, or offers with Participating Entities must be approved by Sourcewell. Materials should be sent to the Sourcewell Contract Administrator assigned to this Contract.

D. ENDORSEMENT. The Vendor must not claim that Sourcewell endorses its Equipment, Products, or Services.

14. GOVERNING LAW, JURISDICTION, AND VENUE

Minnesota law governs this Contract. Venue for all legal proceedings out of this Contract, or its breach, must be in the appropriate state court in Todd County or federal court in Fergus Falls, Minnesota.

15. FORCE MAJEURE

Neither party to this Contract will be held responsible for delay or default caused by acts of God or other conditions that are beyond that party's reasonable control. A party defaulting under this provision must provide the other party prompt written notice of the default.

16. SEVERABILITY

If any provision of this Contract is found to be illegal, unenforceable, or void then both Sourcewell and Vendor will be relieved of all obligations arising under such provisions. If the remainder of this Contract is capable of performance, it will not be affected by such declaration or finding and must be fully performed.

17. PERFORMANCE, DEFAULT, AND REMEDIES

A. PERFORMANCE. During the term of this Contract, the parties will monitor performance and address unresolved contract issues as follows:

1. *Notification.* The parties must promptly notify each other of any known dispute and work in good faith to resolve such dispute within a reasonable period of time. If necessary, Sourcewell and the Vendor will jointly develop a short briefing document that describes the issue(s), relevant impact, and positions of both parties.

2. *Escalation.* If parties are unable to resolve the issue in a timely manner, as specified above, either Sourcewell or Vendor may escalate the resolution of the issue to a higher level of management. The Vendor will have 30 calendar days to cure an outstanding issue.

3. *Performance while Dispute is Pending*. Notwithstanding the existence of a dispute, the Vendor must continue without delay to carry out all of its responsibilities under the Contract that are not affected by the dispute. If the Vendor fails to continue without delay to perform its responsibilities under the Contract, in the accomplishment of all undisputed work, any additional costs incurred by Sourcewell and/or its Participating Entities as a result of such failure to proceed will be borne by the Vendor.

B. DEFAULT AND REMEDIES. Either of the following constitutes cause to declare this Contract, or any Participating Entity order under this Contract, in default:

- 1. Nonperformance of contractual requirements, or
- 2. A material breach of any term or condition of this Contract.

Written notice of default and a reasonable opportunity to cure must be issued by the party claiming default. Time allowed for cure will not diminish or eliminate any liability for liquidated or other damages. If the default remains after the opportunity for cure, the non-defaulting party may:

- Exercise any remedy provided by law or equity, or
- Terminate the Contract or any portion thereof, including any orders issued against the Contract.

18. INSURANCE

A. REQUIREMENTS. At its own expense, Vendor must maintain insurance policy(ies) in effect at all times during the performance of this Contract with insurance company(ies) licensed or authorized to do business in the State of Minnesota having an "AM BEST" rating of A- or better, with coverage and limits of insurance not less than the following:

1. Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability.

Workers' Compensation: As required by any applicable law or regulation.

Employer's Liability Insurance: must be provided in amounts not less than listed below: Minimum limits:

\$500,000 each accident for bodily injury by accident \$500,000 policy limit for bodily injury by disease \$500,000 each employee for bodily injury by disease

2. *Commercial General Liability Insurance*. Vendor will maintain insurance covering its operations, with coverage on an occurrence basis, and must be subject to terms no less broad than the Insurance Services Office ("ISO") Commercial General Liability Form CG0001 (2001 or newer edition), or equivalent. At a minimum, coverage must include liability arising from premises, operations, bodily injury and property damage, independent contractors, products-completed operations including construction defect, contractual liability, blanket contractual liability, and personal injury and advertising injury. All required limits, terms and conditions of coverage must be maintained during the term of this Contract.

Minimum Limits:

\$1,000,000 each occurrence Bodily Injury and Property Damage

\$1,000,000 Personal and Advertising Injury

\$2,000,000 aggregate for Products-Completed operations

\$2,000,000 general aggregate

3. *Commercial Automobile Liability Insurance*. During the term of this Contract, Vendor will maintain insurance covering all owned, hired, and non-owned automobiles in limits of liability not less than indicated below. The coverage must be subject to terms no less broad than ISO Business Auto Coverage Form CA 0001 (2010 edition or newer), or equivalent.

Minimum Limits: \$1,000,000 each accident, combined single limit 4. *Umbrella Insurance*. During the term of this Contract, Vendor will maintain umbrella coverage over Workers' Compensation, Commercial General Liability, and Commercial Automobile.

Minimum Limits: \$2,000,000

5. Network Security and Privacy Liability Insurance. During the term of this Contract, Vendor will maintain coverage for network security and privacy liability. The coverage may be endorsed on another form of liability coverage or written on a standalone policy. The insurance must cover claims which may arise from failure of Vendor's security resulting in, but not limited to, computer attacks, unauthorized access, disclosure of not public data – including but not limited to, confidential or private information, transmission of a computer virus, or denial of service.

Minimum limits: \$2,000,000 per occurrence \$2,000,000 annual aggregate

Failure of Vendor to maintain the required insurance will constitute a material breach entitling Sourcewell to immediately terminate this Contract for default.

B. CERTIFICATES OF INSURANCE. Prior to commencing under this Contract, Vendor must furnish to Sourcewell a certificate of insurance, as evidence of the insurance required under this Contract. Prior to expiration of the policy(ies), renewal certificates must be mailed to Sourcewell, 202 12th Street Northeast, P.O. Box 219, Staples, MN 56479 or sent to the Sourcewell Contract Administrator assigned to this Contract. The certificates must be signed by a person authorized by the insurer(s) to bind coverage on their behalf.

Failure to request certificates of insurance by Sourcewell, or failure of Vendor to provide certificates of insurance, in no way limits or relieves Vendor of its duties and responsibilities in this Contract.

C. ADDITIONAL INSURED ENDORSEMENT AND PRIMARY AND NON-CONTRIBUTORY

INSURANCE CLAUSE. Vendor agrees to list Sourcewell and its Participating Entities, including their officers, agents, and employees, as an additional insured under the Vendor's commercial general liability insurance policy with respect to liability arising out of activities, "operations," or "work" performed by or on behalf of Vendor, and products and completed operations of Vendor. The policy provision(s) or endorsement(s) must further provide that coverage is primary and not excess over or contributory with any other valid, applicable, and collectible insurance or self-insurance in force for the additional insureds.

D. WAIVER OF SUBROGATION. Vendor waives and must require (by endorsement or otherwise) all its insurers to waive subrogation rights against Sourcewell and other additional insureds for losses paid under the insurance policies required by this Contract or other

insurance applicable to the Vendor or its subcontractors. The waiver must apply to all deductibles and/or self-insured retentions applicable to the required or any other insurance maintained by the Vendor or its subcontractors. Where permitted by law, Vendor must require similar written express waivers of subrogation and insurance clauses from each of its subcontractors.

E. UMBRELLA/EXCESS LIABILITY/SELF-INSURED RETENTION. The limits required by this Contract can be met by either providing a primary policy or in combination with umbrella/excess liability policy(ies), or self-insured retention.

19. COMPLIANCE

A. LAWS AND REGULATIONS. All Equipment, Products, or Services provided under this Contract must comply fully with applicable federal laws and regulations, and with the laws in the states and provinces in which the Equipment, Products, or Services are sold.

B. LICENSES. Vendor must maintain a valid and current status on all required federal, state/provincial, and local licenses, bonds, and permits required for the operation of the business that the Vendor conducts with Sourcewell and Participating Entities.

20. BANKRUPTCY, DEBARMENT, OR SUSPENSION CERTIFICATION

Vendor certifies and warrants that it is not in bankruptcy or that it has previously disclosed in writing certain information to Sourcewell related to bankruptcy actions. If at any time during this Contract Vendor declares bankruptcy, Vendor must immediately notify Sourcewell in writing.

Vendor certifies and warrants that neither it nor its principals are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from programs operated by the State of Minnesota; the United States federal government or the Canadian government, as applicable; or any Participating Entity. Vendor certifies and warrants that neither it nor its principals have been convicted of a criminal offense related to the subject matter of this Contract. Vendor further warrants that it will provide immediate written notice to Sourcewell if this certification changes at any time.

21. PROVISIONS FOR NON-UNITED STATES FEDERAL ENTITY PROCUREMENTS UNDER UNITED STATES FEDERAL AWARDS OR OTHER AWARDS

Participating Entities that use United States federal grant or FEMA funds to purchase goods or services from this Contract may be subject to additional requirements including the procurement standards of the Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards, 2 C.F.R. § 200. Participating Entities may also require additional requirements based on specific funding specifications. Within this Article, all

references to "federal" should be interpreted to mean the United States federal government. The following list only applies when a Participating Entity accesses Vendor's Equipment, Products, or Services with United States federal funds. The Participating Entity must provide advance notification to Vendor if federal funds are being used for the purchase.

A. EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY. Except as otherwise provided under 41 C.F.R. § 60, all contracts that meet the definition of "federally assisted construction contract" in 41 C.F.R. § 60-1.3 must include the equal opportunity clause provided under 41 C.F.R. §60-1.4(b), in accordance with Executive Order 11246, "Equal Employment Opportunity" (30 FR 12319, 12935, 3 C.F.R. §, 1964-1965 Comp., p. 339), as amended by Executive Order 11375, "Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity," and implementing regulations at 41 C.F.R. § 60, "Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor." The equal opportunity clause is incorporated herein by reference. [Note - Vendor operates under California law and does not participate in or file Affirmative Action Plans.]

B. DAVIS-BACON ACT, AS AMENDED (40 U.S.C. § 3141-3148). When required by federal program legislation, all prime construction contracts in excess of \$2,000 awarded by nonfederal entities must include a provision for compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. § 3141-3144, and 3146-3148) as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 C.F.R. § 5, "Labor Standards Provisions Applicable to Contracts Covering Federally Financed and Assisted Construction"). In accordance with the statute, contractors must be required to pay wages to laborers and mechanics at a rate not less than the prevailing wages specified in a wage determination made by the Secretary of Labor. In addition, contractors must be required to pay wages not less than once a week. The non-federal entity must place a copy of the current prevailing wage determination issued by the Department of Labor in each solicitation. The decision to award a contract or subcontract must be conditioned upon the acceptance of the wage determination. The non-federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the federal awarding agency. The contracts must also include a provision for compliance with the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act (40 U.S.C. § 3145), as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 C.F.R. § 3, "Contractors and Subcontractors on Public Building or Public Work Financed in Whole or in Part by Loans or Grants from the United States"). The Act provides that each contractor or subrecipient must be prohibited from inducing, by any means, any person employed in the construction, completion, or repair of public work, to give up any part of the compensation to which he or she is otherwise entitled. The non-federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the federal awarding agency. Vendor must be in compliance with all applicable Davis-Bacon Act provisions.

C. CONTRACT WORK HOURS AND SAFETY STANDARDS ACT (40 U.S.C. § 3701-3708). Where applicable, all contracts awarded by the non-federal entity in excess of \$100,000 that involve the employment of mechanics or laborers must include a provision for compliance with 40 U.S.C. §§ 3702 and 3704, as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 C.F.R. § 5). Under 40 U.S.C. § 3702 of the Act, each contractor must be required to compute the wages of

every mechanic and laborer on the basis of a standard work week of 40 hours. Work in excess of the standard work week is permissible provided that the worker is compensated at a rate of not less than one and a half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of 40 hours in the work week. The requirements of 40 U.S.C. § 3704 are applicable to construction work and provide that no laborer or mechanic must be required to work in surroundings or under working conditions which are unsanitary, hazardous or dangerous. These requirements do not apply to the purchases of supplies or materials or articles ordinarily available on the open market, or contracts for transportation or transmission of intelligence. This provision is hereby incorporated by reference into this Contract. Vendor certifies that during the term of an award for all contracts by Sourcewell resulting from this procurement process, Vendor must comply with applicable requirements as referenced above.

D. RIGHTS TO INVENTIONS MADE UNDER A CONTRACT OR AGREEMENT. If the federal award meets the definition of "funding agreement" under 37 C.F.R. § 401.2(a) and the recipient or subrecipient wishes to enter into a contract with a small business firm or nonprofit organization regarding the substitution of parties, assignment or performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under that "funding agreement," the recipient or subrecipient must comply with the requirements of 37 C.F.R. § 401, "Rights to Inventions Made by Nonprofit Organizations and Small Business Firms Under Government Grants, Contracts and Cooperative Agreements," and any implementing regulations issued by the awarding agency. Vendor certifies that during the term of an award for all contracts by Sourcewell resulting from this procurement process, Vendor must comply with applicable requirements as referenced above.

E. CLEAN AIR ACT (42 U.S.C. § 7401-7671Q.) AND THE FEDERAL WATER POLLUTION CONTROL ACT (33 U.S.C. § 1251-1387). Contracts and subgrants of amounts in excess of \$150,000 require the non-federal award to agree to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. § 7401-7671q) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33 U.S.C. § 1251-1387). Violations must be reported to the Federal awarding agency and the Regional Office of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Vendor certifies that during the term of this Contract will comply with applicable requirements as referenced above.

F. DEBARMENT AND SUSPENSION (EXECUTIVE ORDERS 12549 AND 12689). A contract award (see 2 C.F.R. § 180.220) must not be made to parties listed on the government wide exclusions in the System for Award Management (SAM), in accordance with the OMB guidelines at 2 C.F.R. §180 that implement Executive Orders 12549 (3 C.F.R. § 1986 Comp., p. 189) and 12689 (3 C.F.R. § 1989 Comp., p. 235), "Debarment and Suspension." SAM Exclusions contains the names of parties debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded by agencies, as well as parties declared ineligible under statutory or regulatory authority other than Executive Order 12549. Vendor certifies that neither it nor its principals are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation by any federal department or agency.

G. BYRD ANTI-LOBBYING AMENDMENT, AS AMENDED (31 U.S.C. § 1352). Vendors must file any required certifications. Vendors must not have used federal appropriated funds to pay any person or organization for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a member of Congress, officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with obtaining any federal contract, grant, or any other award covered by 31 U.S.C. § 1352. Vendors must disclose any lobbying with non-federal funds that takes place in connection with obtaining any federal award. Such disclosures are forwarded from tier to tier up to the non-federal award. Vendors must file all certifications and disclosures required by, and otherwise comply with, the Byrd Anti-Lobbying Amendment (31 U.S.C. § 1352).

H. RECORD RETENTION REQUIREMENTS. To the extent applicable, Vendor must comply with the record retention requirements detailed in 2 C.F.R. § 200.333. The Vendor further certifies that it will retain all records as required by 2 C.F.R. § 200.333 for a period of 3 years after grantees or subgrantees submit final expenditure reports or quarterly or annual financial reports, as applicable, and all other pending matters are closed.

I. ENERGY POLICY AND CONSERVATION ACT COMPLIANCE. To the extent applicable, Vendor must comply with the mandatory standards and policies relating to energy efficiency which are contained in the state energy conservation plan issued in compliance with the Energy Policy and Conservation Act.

J. BUY AMERICAN PROVISIONS COMPLIANCE. To the extent applicable, Vendor must comply with all applicable provisions of the Buy American Act. Purchases made in accordance with the Buy American Act must follow the applicable procurement rules calling for free and open competition.

K. ACCESS TO RECORDS (2 C.F.R. § 200.336). Vendor agrees that duly authorized representatives of a federal agency must have access to any books, documents, papers and records of Vendor that are directly pertinent to Vendor's discharge of its obligations under this Contract for the purpose of making audits, examinations, excerpts, and transcriptions. The right also includes timely and reasonable access to Vendor's personnel for the purpose of interview and discussion relating to such documents.

L. PROCUREMENT OF RECOVERED MATERIALS (2 C.F.R. § 200.322). A non-federal entity that is a state agency or agency of a political subdivision of a state and its contractors must comply with Section 6002 of the Solid Waste Disposal Act, as amended by the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act. The requirements of Section 6002 include procuring only items designated in guidelines of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) at 40 C.F.R. § 247 that contain the highest percentage of recovered materials practicable, consistent with maintaining a satisfactory level of competition, where the purchase price of the item exceeds \$10,000 or the value of the quantity acquired during the preceding fiscal year exceeded \$10,000; procuring solid waste management services in a manner that maximizes energy and resource recovery;

and establishing an affirmative procurement program for procurement of recovered materials identified in the EPA guidelines.

22. CANCELLATION

Sourcewell or Vendor may cancel this Contract at any time, with or without cause, upon 60 days' written notice to the other party. However, Sourcewell may cancel this Contract immediately upon discovery of a material defect in any certification made in Vendor's Proposal. Cancellation of this Contract does not relieve either party of financial, product, or service obligations incurred or accrued prior to cancellation.

Sales coverage is in place for all 50 states as well as Canada by both our dealers and Kubota commercial sales team. Our typical dealer averages four sales representatives leading to dealer sales representation that conservatively averages over 4,000 representatives. Kubota in Canada has 154 dealer locations with similar sales force averages. Additionally Kubota directly employs 51 region sales managers, five district sales managers, and five division sales managers. This Kubota sales force is essential for educating and instructing dealers in promoting and supporting government and education entities. This combined sales effort will also drive new Sourcewell member growth and engagement.

In fact, Kubota dealers average over twice as many service technicians as sales representatives. With each Kubota dealer averaging 9 service technicians, Kubota's dealer network averages over nine thousand service representatives in the United States. Many of these have mobile service vehicles. 



RESOLUTION OBJECTING TO THE CITY OF BUFORD'S ANNEXATION OF THE PROPERTY OF AMY L. BARFIELD AND CHRISTOPHER W. WATFORD KNOWN AS HALL COUNTY TAX PARCEL 08153 000001

WHEREAS, Hall County has received a notice of filing with the City of Buford of a petition for annexation of the property of Amy L. Barfield and Christopher W. Watford located at 4470 Bennett Road, Buford, Georgia 30519 and bearing Hall County Tax Parcel Number 08153 000001 (the "Subject Property"); and

WHEREAS, the annexation petition seeks to rezone the Subject Property from Hall County's designation of Agricultural-Residential III (AR-III) (pt.) and Suburban Shopping (S-S) (pt.) to the City of Buford's designation of RA-200 Agriculture-Residence District; and

WHEREAS, the City of Buford has notified Hall County that the City intends to take action on the annexation and rezoning request on April 9, 2024; and

WHEREAS, the City of Buford previously notified Hall County on or about December 7, 2023, of the property owners' petition for annexation and rezoning of the Subject Property to the City of Buford's C-2 General Business District, which the County objected to by a Resolution dated January 11, 2024; and

WHEREAS, the property owners subsequently withdrew their original petition for annexation and rezoning and filed the current petition for annexation seeking a residential rezoning of the Subject Property under the City of Buford's zoning code, which will possibly be followed after annexation by a further request for rezoning to a commercial or industrial classification by the City of Buford in accordance with the property owners' original petition for annexation; and

WHEREAS, the proposed and anticipated rezoning by the City of Buford represents a substantially more intense or significantly different use of the Subject Property than allowed by Hall County's existing zoning of the property; and

WHEREAS, the proposed annexation and rezoning of the Subject Property is inconsistent with Hall County's Comprehensive Land Use Plan and Future Land Development Map; and

WHEREAS, the area has developed with detached single-family residential homes, several small retail establishments, two schools for elementary school-aged students, and undeveloped properties that are adjacent to the Subject Property, and the area is substantially residential and non-commercial in character; and

WHEREAS, the Hall County Board of Commissioners has carefully reviewed the annexation and rezoning request, and the Board has determined that annexation and rezoning to a more intense residential and possible future commercial or industrial classification is not in the best interest of the residents of Hall County; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia Code provides a procedure for resolving annexation disputes; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners wishes to avail itself of the remedies provided by the annexation dispute resolution process by objecting to this annexation and rezoning request;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF HALL COUNTY DOES HEREBY OBJECT to the City of Buford's annexation and rezoning of Hall County Tax Parcel Number 08153 000001 as requested by the owners Amy L. Barfield and Christopher W. Watford. This objection is based upon a material increase in burden on Hall County directly related to the proposed change in zoning and land use.

Based upon the information presented in the application for annexation provided by the City of Buford, Hall County specifically objects to the proposed change in zoning and land use that would result from the annexation as follows:

The application for annexation of the Subject Property, approximately $30.98 \pm$ acres, describes a rezoning from Hall County's AR-III and S-S Districts to the City of Buford's RA-200 District to allow continued use of the property as an agri-entertainment business known as the "Buford Corn Maze" and, allegedly, for use of the property in a manner consistent with the County's current zoning of the property. The "Buford Corn Maze" is a farm-based entertainment venue that has been in business at the Subject Property for approximately 10 years. Annexation and rezoning of the Subject Property by the City of Buford is not required to maintain operation of the business, as the property is currently approved under Hall County's current zoning regulations to operate the "Buford Corn Maze." A county-issued business license presently permits the operation of a corn maze, children's activities, food and pumpkin sales, hayrides, and a "haunted forest" at the site. Thus, annexation by the City of Buford and a change in zoning is not required to allow continued operation of the "Buford Corn Maze" through the end of its lease in 2027.

Secondly, in their petition for annexation, the owners of the Subject Property acknowledge that adjacent property located within the City of Buford is zoned industrial and that use of the Subject Property as a corn maze after 2027 is not the highest and best use of the property. Moreover, the owners seemingly acknowledge that a commercial and ultimately industrial zoning would better serve the property in relation to neighboring properties. This anticipated change in zoning to a more intense commercial or industrial use of the property would be in stark contrast to the current and surrounding uses permitted by Hall County under its AR-III and S-S zonings of the property. Therefore, the requested change in zoning of the property and the anticipated rezoning by the City of Buford to a commercial or industrial land use at a future time would create a material increase in burden upon Hall County directly related to the proposed change in zoning and land use. Hall County attaches the City of Buford's Notice of Intent to Annex and Rezone the Subject Property, the Application for Annexation and Rezoning, and the supporting documents served upon Hall County. *See* Exhibit A.

Additionally, the proposed and anticipated change in zoning and land use, as described in the application for annexation, would also result in a substantial change in the intensity of the allowable use of the property. Aerial photographs and maps of the area immediately surrounding the proposed annexation show that apart from a service station across the road there are no commercial buildings adjacent to the Subject Property. See Exhibit B. The proposed change in zoning of the Subject Property to the City of Buford's RA-200 District would permit more intensive usage of the property than currently allowed under Hall County's AR-III zoning, which covers most of the property. The City's RA-200 District allows for a higher density of occupation and provides for more inherent usages of the property than are currently allowed by the County's AR-III classification. If, as anticipated, the property is further rezoned to a commercial or industrial classification, such as C-2 or M-1 under the City of Buford's current zoning regulations, there would be nothing to prevent the property owners from converting the property or selling it for development into a seemingly limitless variety of commercial or industrial businesses whose existence and operation would be wholly inconsistent with the residential and small retail character of the surrounding properties. Thus, the proposed change in zoning and land use of the Subject Property would be significantly different from the uses currently permitted by Hall County on the property. See Chapters 17.110 and 17.140 of the Official Code of Hall County, Exhibit C. See Art XIII, Sec. 1300, 1308, and 1310 of the City of Buford Zoning Ordinance, Exhibit D.

Lastly, the proposed change in zoning and land use would also differ from the existing uses suggested for the Subject Property by Hall County's 2017-2037 Comprehensive Land Use Plan. As shown on the attached Hall County Future Development Maps, the Land Use Plan designates the Subject Property for Residential and Community Crossroads uses. *See* Exhibit E. The attached description of Residential uses seeks to preserve established residential neighborhoods and to create new residential developments consistent with surrounding suburban densities. The description of Residential uses notes that future development will continue to be detached single-family homes at moderate densities of two dwellings per acre. The attached description of

Community Crossroads uses seeks to maintain and create access to local goods and services at major intersections throughout the community. The description of Community Crossroads notes that future development for "neighborhood" designated areas should emphasize connectivity and organization in a compact form around a major intersection. The proposed change in zoning of the Subject Property to the City of Buford's RA-200 District is inconsistent with Hall County's intended future use of the property as a Community Crossroads area, as the City's RA-200 District discourages the subdivision of land for urban development that require urban services such as public water, sanitary sewers, and fire protection. Moreover, an entirely commercial or industrial classification, as anticipated, would further frustrate Hall County's future land-use intentions for the area. A review of the City of Buford's 2040 Comprehensive Plan and Future Land Use Map identifies the area adjacent to the Subject Property as part of the Quality Development Corridor for Lanier Islands Parkway and Industrial/Commercial Area. See Exhibit F. The attached descriptions of the Quality Development Corridor and Industrial/Commercial Area provide for mixed use, commercial and industrial uses at medium densities. The City of Buford's intended future land uses of the surrounding area are thus inconsistent with both the County's future land use plan, which provides for low to moderate-density residential, retail, or agricultural uses, as well as the property owners' request for rezoning of the property to the City's RA-200 District.

ARTICLE XIII

USE PROVISIONS

Section 1300. RA-200 Agriculture-Residence District

This district is comprised of land that has a predominantly rural character. It is the intent of the regulations of this Zoning District to discourage the subdivision of land for urban development requiring such urban services as a public water supply, sanitary sewers, and fire protection.

Within the RA-200 Agriculture-Residence District, the following uses are permitted:

- 1. Single-family dwellings.
- 2. Customary accessory buildings and uses.
- 3. Customary home occupations.
- 4. Customary agricultural uses including forestry, commercial greenhouses, plant nurseries and the raising and keeping of livestock, provided that no animal quarters are located closer than 100 feet to any property line.
- 5. Customary agricultural buildings and uses including farm ponds and fishing lakes and one- and two-family tenant houses, subject to all of the yard requirements of the Zoning District.
- 6. Parks and other similar public and semi-public buildings and land uses.
- 7. Kennel provided that no animal quarters are located closer than 200 feet to any property line.

Fur Farm – provided that no animal quarters are located closer than 200 feet to any property line.

Cattery – provided that no animal quarters are located closer than 100 feet to any property line.

8. Livestock sales pavilions or auction facilities, show rings or other arenas for the display, exhibition training or sale of livestock, provided that no animal quarters are located closer than 100 feet to any property line. Adequate off-street parking shall be provided for livestock trailers, recreation vehicles, etc., associated with the proposed use in addition to the minimum requirements of the Zoning Ordinance.

If the above uses meet any of the following criteria, a Special Use Permit would be required and all provisions for approval would be established as part of the granting of the Special Use Permit:

- a. The event is held more than three (3) days per month.
- b. Operation of the use beyond 6:00 p.m.
- c. A public address system is provided.
- d. Permanent concession facilities are provided.
- e. Portable restroom facilities are provided.
- f. Seating facilities for more than 100 people are provided.
- g. Parking facilities for more than 50 vehicles are provided.
- h. Admission fee is charged.
- 9. Public, semi-public and private golf and country clubs, golf driving ranges and fishing clubs.
- 10. Public utilities.
- 11. Riding stables are academies, including any place that regularly breeds, boards, trains, buys, sells, trades or lets for hire any horse, donkey, burro or mule, provided that no animal quarters are located closer than 100 feet to any property line.
- Farmers' markets for the sale of products and commodities produced on the premises provided that any structure for such sales shall be located no closer than 35 feet to any property line.
- 13. Temporary or portable saw mills provided no machine operation is located closer than 2000 feet to any property line.
- 14. The raising and keeping of household pets.
- 15. The raising and keeping of wild animals, provided that the owner or custodian of such wild animals has received an appropriate permit and meets all the requirements of the State of Georgia, and further provided that no animal quarter are located closer than 200 feet to any property line.

- 16. Churches, temples and synagogues provided:
 - a. They are located on a principal arterial, major arterial, minor arterial, major collector street or State Highway on a site of not less than five (5) acres with two hundred and fifty (250) feet of road frontage.
 - b. The buildings are located not less than fifty (50) feet from any street and not less than thirty (30) feet from any side or rear property line.
 - c. Parking is not provided in the front yard setback area.
 - d. If adjacent to residentially-zoned property, a buffer of at least fifty (50) feet wide shall be provided along the property lines adjacent to said zoning; provided, however, that this buffer may be reduced to no less than twenty (20) feet in width adjacent to the sanctuary building or "Sunday School" educational building and parking related to these buildings.
 - e. A church, temple or synagogue located in a manufactured building may be erected on the property for a period not to exceed three (3) years.

Within the RA-200 Agricultural-Residence District, the following uses may be permitted provided the applicant for such a development is granted a Special Use Permit by the Board of Commissioners after receiving recommendations from the Planning Director and Planning Commission and after a public hearing:

- 1. Private school.
- 2. A cemetery, provided the following conditions are met:
 - a. The cemetery may front only on a collector or major street or state highway, and the entrances and exists to it shall be only from the street on which it fronts.
 - b. The cemetery shall be bordered by a ten (10) foot wide buffer strip along all of its exterior property lines not bordering the frontage street and not extending into the required front yard.

The buffer strip shall be planted with evergreen trees or shrubs that grow at least eight (8) feet tall and provide an effective visual screen.

c. The cemetery is included in a Preliminary Subdivision Plat that has been approved by the Municipal-City of Buford Planning Commission.

- 3. Manufactured Homes.
- 4. Group Day Care Homes.
- 5. Veterinary clinic or hospital, provided that no portion of a building, structure, outdoor run or pen used to house or exercise animals is located closer than two hundred (200) feet to any property line.

6. Churches, temples and synagogues not meeting the minimum requirements for a permitted church, temple or synagogue within the district.

Section 1308. C-2 General Business District, Retail and Services Uses

Purpose:

The C-2 General Business District is intended to provide adequate space in appropriate locations along major streets, thoroughfares and at intersection for various types of business use. These uses should include the retailing of major goods and services, general office facilities and public functions that would serve a community area of several neighborhoods. Development of uses in the district characteristically occupies a large area because it is intended to serve a greater population and to offer a wider range of services. Orientation and expansion of this district should occur as an increase in depth at major intersections rather than as a strip-like extension along the street or thoroughfare.

Permitted Uses:

Only the following permitted uses shall be allowed in the C-2 General Business District and no structure shall be erected, structurally altered or enlarged for any use other than a use permitted herein with the exception of a) uses lawfully established prior to the effective date of the amendment; b) special uses as permitted herein; or c) accessory uses as defined in Article III, Definitions; or other uses which are clearly similar to and consistent with the purpose of this district.

- A. Retail and Service Uses:
 - 1. Antique shops.
 - 2. Animal hospitals or veterinary clinics.
 - 3. Art and school supply stores.
 - 4. Art galleries.
 - 5. Automotive parts stores (no on-premises installation).
 - 6. Bakeries.
 - 7. Banks or financial institutions. Drive-in/through facilities shall obtain a special use permit. See Special Use (19). Automatic tellers as accessory or freestanding use.
 - 8. Barber and beauty shops.
 - 9. Bicycle shops.

 - b. Said facility shall not be located on a parcel of land that is closer than 1,500 feet of any parcel of land which is either named or used for residential purposes, whether located inside or outside the corporate limits of the City.
 - c. Said facility shall not be located on a parcel of land that is closer than 1,500 feet of any parcel of land which a place of worship, school, governmental building, library, civic center, public park or playground is located, whether located inside or outside the corporate limits of the City.
 - d. Said facility shall not be located on a parcel of land that is closer than 1,500 feet of any parcel of land which contains another adult entertainment facility establishment, whether located inside or outside the corporate limits of the City.

B. Office Uses:

- 1. Accounting offices.
- 2. Architecture or engineering offices.
- 3. Doctor, dentist or chiropractor offices.
- 4. Insurance offices.
- 5. Law offices.
- 6. Medical clinics.

- 7. Other public or professional offices.
- 8. Real estate offices.

C. Public and Semi-Public Uses:

- 1. Churches, temples, and synagogues.
- 2. Clubs, lodges, fraternal institutions and meeting halls.
- 3. Government offices.
- 4. Post offices.
- 5. Public or semi-public buildings and land uses, parks, playgrounds or community centers.
- 6. Utility offices.
- D. Residential:
 - 1. Caretaker or watchman quarters as an accessory use.

E. Temporary Uses:

Within the <u>C-2 General Business District</u> only the following uses are permitted for a period not to exceed twenty (20) days or otherwise indicated provided: 1) written permission of the property owner is provided; 2) these uses are not located within fifty (50) feet to any public right-of-way; 3) a sign (not portable) may be erected on the property provided it does not exceed a total of sixteen (16) square feet to ten (10) feet in height and is not placed within twenty (20) feet of any public right-of-way; 4) adequate parking, ingress and egress are provided on site or written permission is obtained if provided on an adjoining property; and 5) a temporary permit is applied for an approved by the Department of Planning and Department. All other requirements for licenses and regulations of the City of Buford shall be met.

- 1. The sale of fruits and vegetables.
- 2. Charitable or non-profit events not to exceed four (4) days.
- 3. Christmas tree sales between November 15 and January 1.

- 4. The sale of any items in association with an existing business located on the premises as a principal use (i.e., sidewalk, parking lot or tent sales).
- 5. Carnival rides not to exceed fifteen (15) days provided no structure or equipment is located within five hundred (500) feet of any residential property lines.

A permit for any temporary use on the same property may not be applied for or renewed for a period of not less than six (6) months from the date of any prior approval of a temporary use. However, one ten (10) day extension of the twenty (20) day period may be granted by the Director of Planning and Development.

Special Uses:

Within the C-2 General Business District, the following uses may be permitted provided the applicant for such a development is granted a Special Use Permit by the Board of Commissioners after receiving recommendations from the Planning Director and Planning Commission and after a public hearing.

- 1. Auto body repair shops.
- 2. Auto repair shops or tire stores including lubrication or tune-up centers (full service and self-service).
- 3. Automotive sales lots and associated service facilities (new or used), provided such building contains at least 2,000 square feet of heated floor space.
- 4. Building materials sales with outdoor storage.
- 5. Recreation facilities (commercial outdoor, such as miniature golf courses, driving ranges, water slides, drive-in theaters or race tracks).
- 6. Contractor's offices using fencing for any purpose or contractor's offices with outside storage of equipment and materials. Any fencing shall be located in the rear yard provided the storage or equipment areas are screened with a six (6) foot high, one hundred (100) percent opaque fence.
- 7. Heavy equipment and farm equipment rental or sales and service.
- 8. Lawn mower repair shops.
- 9. Machine or welding, radiator or muffler repair shops.

- Animal hospitals provided they are located not less than three hundred (300) feet from any residential zoning district or use as measured from property line to property line.
- 13. Boat sales establishments (new or used).
- 14. Telecommunications tower.
- 15. Mini-warehouse storage facilities.
- 16. Boat storage facilities.
- 17. Any hotel or motel with guest rooms containing any two (2) or more of the following three (3) items: dishwasher, stove (cooktop), refrigerator.
- 18. Banks or other financial institutions with drive-in facilities.
- 19. Drive-in/through restaurants.
- 20. Tattoo parlors and body piercing establishments.
- 21. Vehicle rental establishments.
- 22. Car wash establishments.
- 23. Taxi cab establishments.
- 24. Office/warehouse condominiums.
- 25. Pay Day Loans/Check Cashing establishments.
- 26. Secondary residential uses are allowed in proposed multi-story, mixed use buildings and is limited to new construction provided:
 - a. Commercial, retail, and/or office uses are provided on the first floor of the building;
 - Residential uses are limited to the second and third story of such building with common floors/ceilings with the commercial development;

- c. The total heated residential floor area is not greater than two (2) times the total heated non-residential floor area;
- d. Garage parking is provided for the residential use within the building; and
- e. The City Commission approves a concept plan depicting the site plank, building elevations, and mix of uses for the overall development;
- f. Two (2) car garages shall be required for each residential unit and located in the rear of the building;
- g. Residential garbage pick-up shall be housed and presented for pick-up next to the garage (rear of dwellings) and shall not be placed outside in excess of twenty-four (24) hours prior to pickup. The City of Buford shall provide sanitation service.
- 27. Any retail or service establishment not specifically permitted herein, but which is similar to the listed uses, compatible with uses on adjoining property and which meets the intent and purpose of the District.

Other Provisions:

1. No outdoor storage or fencing except as otherwise provided herein.

<u>Section 1308.1 C-2 General Business District</u> - <u>Permitted Uses</u> - <u>Retail and Services</u> <u>Uses (36) Hotel and Motels</u> shall be subject to the following development regulations, to wit:

- 1. Each hotel/motel shall be accessed by patrons through a main or central lobby only with a minimum of 1,000 square feet;
- 2. Each guest room shall be accessed through an interior hallway and shall not have access to the exterior of the building (except through the central lobby);
- 3. Each hotel/motel must provide staff or management on duty twenty-four (24) hours a day;
- 4. Each motel/hotel building shall have a minimum roof pitch of six (6) in twelve (12);
- 5. Each motel/hotel shall provide an enclosed heated and air-conditioned laundry space with a minimum of three (3) washers and three (3) dryers (for patron use only);

6. Each motel/hotel footprint or site shall have a minimum area of two (2) acres;

- 4

- 7. Outside storage or parking or heavy equipment or construction related equipment is prohibited;
- 8. Banners or signs other than the hotel/motel marquee is prohibited on the subject premises; and
- 9. No business license shall be issued for any business operating from any guest room of the facility.

Items (1) through (9) shall apply to all hotel/motels and are not in lieu of any existing and/or more restrictive development regulations contained in this zoning classification or other ordinances and regulations of the City of Buford.

Section 1310. M-1. Light Industry District

The M-1 Light Industry District is comprised of lands that are located on or have ready access to a major street or state highway and are well adapted to industrial development but whose proximity to residential or commercial districts makes it desirable to limit industrial operations and processes to those that are not objectionable by reason of the emission of noise, vibration, smoke, dust, gas, fumes, odors or radiation and that do not create fire or explosion hazards or other objectionable conditions.

With the M-1 Light Industry District, the following uses are permitted:

1. Baking plants.

2. Building material or other outdoor storage yards, other than junk yards, if they meet the following requirements:

a. They shall not be located within a required front yard.

b. They shall be screened by a solid fence at least six (6) feet high.

c. If an outdoor storage yard is established in connection with a permitted building, it shall meet the above requirements.

3. Accessory uses such as retail business and service establishments. In addition to the limitations on "accessory use" imposed under "Article III, Definitions" such permitted accessory uses specifically exclude retail business, offices, and service establishments that could be construed as principal uses and include only those uses that are primarily intended for and used by patrons or occupants of the principal use to which said establishment is accessory.



- 9. Newspaper and printing plants.

Within the M-1 Light Industry District, the following uses may be permitted as a Special Use, subject to the approval of the Board of Commissioners after receiving recommendations from the Planning Director and Planning Commissioner and after a public hearing, if the conditions, including a site plan, and such other appropriate stipulated conditions that the Board of Commissioners may require are met:

- 1. Mini-warehouses.
- 2. Financial services/institutions.

- 3. Hotels and motels.
- 4. Day care facilities.
- 5. Churches, temples and synagogues.
- 6. Truck terminals.
- 7. Telecommunications towers.
- 8. Office/warehouse condominiums.



CHARACTER AREA: INDUSTRIAL/COMMERCIAL AREA

Existing character

The Industrial/Commercial character area is one of the most common in Buford. These parts of the city are characterized by commercial uses such as strip shopping centers, restaurants, large chain stores, and car dealerships; industrial uses include warehousing, manufacturing, and distribution facilities. Typically industrial/commercial parts of Buford experience significant vehicular and truck traffic, large building setbacks, extensive surface parking lots, and an overall low level of pedestrian orientation.

Vision for the Future

The highest priority for industrial/commercial areas should be to support business and commerce. This includes the efficient movement of freight, employees, and customerrelated traffic into, out of, and through the character area. Steps should be taken to ensure that new industrial development within the city is green and does not have negative impacts on Buford's environmental quality.








CHARACTER AREA: QUALITY DEVELOPMENT CORRIDOR



Addendum 3 - Revised Exhibit C (cost proposal) was posted to the County's website, but Crown Service Contractors failed to include this in its bid submission which prevented an accurate evaluation of its bid. CDC Design, Inc of Canton, GA and Tipton Construction of Gainesville, GA submitted a "no bid" in response to the Invitation For Bid.

ARTICLE #104 – NON-EXCLUSIVE RIGHTS:

The Contract is not exclusive. The County reserves the right to select other Contractors to provide the Services similar to those described in this Contract, during the term of the Contract should the need arise or the contractor fail to perform.

ARTICLE #105 – CONTRACT TERM:

Until substantial and final completion of Services according to the time schedule and after all subcontractor(s) and material suppliers' liens are satisfied.

ARTICLE #106 - CONTRACT AMENDMENTS AND MODIFICATION:

This Contract can only be modified, amended, or added to in writing and fully executed by both parties hereto. This Contract document constitutes the sole and entire Contract and understanding between the parties as to the subject matter hereof, and no verbal promises have been made by either party in relation hereto.

ARTICLE # 107 – REMEDIES AND CONTRACT PERFORMANCE:

In the event that either party to this Contract breaches this Contract, including by failure to meet the timetables set forth herein, the non-breaching party shall provide written notice to the breaching party which describes the breach of this Contract. The party whose breach is alleged shall have thirty (30) days from the date of receipt of the written notice to cure the breach or to otherwise negotiate a resolution of the breach.

If the breach has not been cured and the parties hereto have not resolved the issue described in the notice letter by thirty (30) days after receipt of the notice letter, the party authoring the letter shall be entitled to seek any and all remedies allowed by Georgia law, including damages, equitable relief, declaratory relief, specific performance, and/or seeking relief as to any bonds issued hereon. Additional provisions are:

- A. Delay or Impossibility of Performance. Any failure or delay must be beyond the control of and without the fault or negligence of the Contractor. If the Services to be provided to the County are interrupted by a Force Majeure Event, as defined below, the County will be entitled to an equitable adjustment to the fees and other payments due to the Contractor under this Contract. If delay results from a subcontractor's negligent conduct or failure to perform, the Contractor shall not be excused from compliance with the terms and obligations of the Contract. Epidemics and pandemics are not considered Force Majeure events by the County.
 - Neither party shall be held liable or responsible to the other party nor be deemed to have defaulted under or breached this Agreement for failure or delay in fulfilling or performing any obligation under this Agreement when such failure or delay is caused by or results from causes beyond the reasonable control of the affected party, including but not limited to fire, floods, embargoes, acts of war, civil unrest, insurrections, riots, strikes, lockouts or other labor disturbances, or acts of God; provided, however, that the party so affected shall use reasonable commercial efforts to avoid or remove such causes of nonperformance, and shall continue performance hereunder with reasonable dispatch whenever such causes are removed. Either party shall provide the other party with prompt written notice of any delay or failure to perform that occurs by reason of Force Majeure.

Definition: The term "Force Majeure" as defined in Black's Law Dictionary, is "an event or effect that can be neither anticipated nor controlled. It is a contractual provision allocating the risk of loss if performance becomes impossible or impracticable, especially as a result of an event that the parties could not have anticipated or controlled."

- **B.** Obligations beyond Contract Term. The Contract shall remain in full force and effect to the end of the specified term or until terminated or canceled pursuant to the Contract.
- **C. Transition Cooperation with the County and Cooperation with other Contractors**. Contractor agrees that upon termination of this Contract for any reason, it shall provide sufficient efforts and reasonable cooperation and assistance to the County to ensure an orderly and efficient transition to the County or an alternative Contractor. Further, in the event that the County has entered into or enters into contracts with other Contractors related to the Services, Contractor agrees to cooperate fully with such other Contractors. Contractor shall not engage in any act that will interfere with the performance of work by any other Contractor(s).

ARTICLE # 108 - TERMINATION:

The County may terminate this Contract by providing sixty (60) days written notice to the other party at any time. Should either party terminate this Contract prior to the date of automatic termination, Contractor shall provide the County with all deliverables up to the date of termination thirty (30) days after the Notice to Terminate is issued. The County shall pay the Contractor for all work properly performed in compliance with the terms of the Contract up to the date of termination.

- **A. Termination for Convenience**. Following sixty (60) days written notice, either party may terminate the Contract in whole or in part for any reason without the payment of any penalty or incurring any further obligation to the Contractor.
- **B.** Termination for Cause. The occurrence of any one or more of the following events shall constitute cause for the County to declare the Contractor in default of its obligations under the Contract:
 - 1. The Contractor fails to deliver or has delivered nonconforming Services or fails to perform, to the County's satisfaction, any material requirement of the Contract or is in violation of a material provision of the Contract, including, but without limitation, the express warranties made by the Contractor.
 - 2. The County determines that Contractor's satisfactory performance of the Contract substantially endangered or that default is likely to occur.
 - 3. The Contractor fails to make substantial and timely progress toward performance of the Contract.
 - 4. The Contractor becomes subject to any bankruptcy or insolvency proceeding under federal or state law to the extent allowed by applicable federal or state law including bankruptcy laws; the Contractor terminates or suspends its business; or the County reasonably believes that the Contractor has become insolvent or unable to pay its obligations as they accrue consistent with applicable federal or state law.
 - 5. The Contractor has failed to comply with applicable federal, state and local laws, rules, County ordinances, regulations and orders when performing within the scope of the Contract.

- 6. The Contractor has engaged in conduct that has exposed or may expose the County or the State to liability, as determined in the County's sole discretion; or a material breach of the terms of the Contract by County upon County's failure to cure such material breach after written notice thereof has been delivered in accordance with ARTICLE # 108.C below constitutes cause for the Contractor to declare that the County is in default of its obligations under the Contract.
- C. Notice of Default. If either party causes one or more of the default events set out in ARTICLE # 108, then either party shall issue a written Notice of Default to the party that causes one or more of the default events, requesting that the breach or noncompliance be remedied within the period of time specified in the party's Notice of Default to the Contractor. If the breach or non-compliance is not remedied within the period specified in the written notice, the non-breaching party may:
 - 1. Immediately terminate the Contract for default without additional written notice.
 - 2. In the event of a breach by the Contractor, the County may procure substitute Services from another source and charge the difference between the Contract and the substitute Contract to the defaulting Contractor; and/or,
 - 3. Enforce the terms and conditions of the Contract and seek any legal or equitable remedies.
- **D.** Termination Due to Non-Availability of Funds. This Contract will terminate immediately and absolutely if the County determines that adequate funds are de-appropriated such that the County cannot fulfill its obligations under the Contract, such determination being at the County's sole discretion and conclusive. County agrees to provide prompt written notice to Contractor in the event of any de-appropriation.
- **E.** Termination due to Failure of Contractor to Act. The County may terminate the Contract for any one or more of the following reasons effective immediately without advance notice:
 - 1. In the event that the Contractor must be certified or licensed as a condition precedent to providing the Services, the revocation or loss of such license or certification may result in immediate termination of the Contract effective as of the date on which the license or certification is no longer in effect.
 - 2. The County determines that the actions, or failure to act, of the Contractor, its agents, employees, or subcontractors have caused, or reasonably could cause, life, health or safety to be jeopardized.
 - 3. The Contractor furnished any statement, representation, or certification in connection with the Contract or the bidding process, which is materially false, deceptive, criminal activity, incorrect, or incomplete.
 - 4. Failure of the Contractor to obtain, provide, maintain, and deliver the Performance and Payment Bonds (if required) as and when required under this Contract, or failure to comply with any requirement pertaining to the appropriate amounts thereof as set forth in ARTICLE # 123 – PERFORMANCE AND PAYMENT BONDS.
- F. Payment Limitation in Event of Termination. In the event of termination of the Contract for any reason by either party, the County shall pay only those amounts, if any, due and owing to the Contractor for Services actually received and accepted by the County up to and including the date of termination of the Contract and for which the County is obligated to pay pursuant to the

Contract.

- **G.** The Contractor's Termination Duties. Upon receipt of notice of termination, the Contractor shall:
 - 1. Cease work under the Contract and take all necessary or appropriate steps to limit disbursements and minimize costs and furnish a report within thirty (30) days of the date of notice of termination, describing the status of all work under the Contract, including, without limitation, results accomplished, conclusions resulting therefrom, and any other matters the County may require.
 - 2. Immediately cease using and return to the County, any personal property or materials, whether tangible or intangible, provided by the County to the Contractor.
 - 3. Comply with the County's instructions for the timely transfer of any active files and work product produced by the Contractor under the Contract.
 - 4. Cooperate in good faith with the County, its employees, agents, and Contractors during the transition period between the notification of termination and the substitution of any replacement Contractor; and
 - 5. Contractor is to immediately return any payments made by the County for goods and services that were not delivered by the Contractor.
- **H.** Liquidated Damages. In the event that the Contractor unreasonably delays completion of the project, or abandons the project before completion, the Contractor shall pay the County liquidated damages an amount equal to the percentage of work not completed.

ARTICLE # 109 - NO DEFENSE OR INDEMNIFICATION BY COUNTY:

The parties agree that the County shall not be responsible for defending or indemnifying any Contractor from any claim brought by any third party against the Contractor.

ARTICLE #110 - ASSIGNMENT AND DELEGATION BY CONTRACTOR:

The Contractor shall not assign or delegate this Contract, or any performance required by it, in whole or in part, without the prior express written consent of the County.

ARTICLE #111 - USE OF THIRD PARTIES (SUB-CONTRACTORS):

This Contract is for the benefit of the parties hereto only and is not intended to benefit any third-party or give rise to any duty or causes of action for any third party. All restrictions, obligations, and responsibilities of the Contractor under the Contract shall also apply to third parties such as subcontractors, if allowed in writing by the County. Any Contract with a subcontractor must also preserve the rights of the County.

ARTICLE #112 - SUPERSEDES FORMER CONTRACTS:

Unless otherwise specified in the Contract, this Contract supersedes all prior Contracts or Agreements between the County and the Contractor for the Services provided in connection with the Contract.

ARTICLE #113 - SEVERABILITY:

If any paragraph, sub-paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Contract is declared invalid or unconstitutional by any Court of competent jurisdiction or if the provisions of any part of this Contract as applied to any particular situation or set of circumstances shall be declared invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity shall not be construed to affect the remaining portions of this Contract not so held to be invalid or the application of this Contract to other circumstances not so held to be invalid.

ARTICLE # 114 - RECORDS:

- **A. Public Records Request**. The Georgia Open Records Act, as provided in O.C.G.A. § 50-18-70 et seq, requires procurement records and all other records received by or prepared or maintained on behalf of the County, shall be made open to public inspection, unless otherwise provided by law.
- **B.** Record Retention and Access. The Contractor shall maintain books, records, and documents in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and procedures and which sufficiently and properly document and calculate all charges billed to the County throughout the term of the Contract for a period of at least five (5) years following the date of final payment or completion of any required audit, whichever is later. Records to be maintained include both financial records and service records.

ARTICLE # 115 - ADDITIONAL TERMS:

- A. The County shall not be bound by any terms and conditions included in any Contractor's literature, packaging, invoice, catalog, brochure, technical data sheet, on-line representation, warranties or service level agreement or other document which attempts to impose any condition in variance with or in addition to the terms and conditions contained herein.
- B. The County shall not be bound by any Terms and Conditions of the Contractor that are only accessible by hyperlink. All Terms and Conditions must be in print and approved by the County.

ARTICLE # 116 - WAIVER:

The failure of any party hereto to seek a remedy for any alleged breach of this Contract shall not constitute a waiver of any claim, cause of action, or remedy allowed by Georgia law for breach thereof.

ARTICLE # 117 - CONTRACTOR AND COUNTY RIGHTS AND OBLIGATIONS:

- A. The County has the right at any time to require the Contractor to put an immediate stop to any procedure, or the use of any equipment (chemical, material, etc., if applicable) considered by the County to be hazardous (or toxic) to persons, buildings, or surfaces. The Contractor will utilize acceptable substitutes as quickly as possible. In the event of such replacement, Contractor (i) shall notify County of any resulting replacement, (ii) introduce the individual serving as the replacement to County, and (iii) provide County with a résumé and any other information regarding the individual that may be reasonably requested by County.
- B. The County has the right to require the Contractor to reassign or remove any employee or subcontractor's employee from the premises temporarily or permanently when, in the County's sole opinion, the employee is not suitable. The County's decision on this matter shall be final, and Contractor will remove this employee immediately and replace with a person of at least equivalent training, experience, and requisite qualifications as quickly as possible, subject to the County's prior approval.
- C. Contractor agrees to obtain prior written approval from the County for the use of subcontractors to provide the Services described in *SCOPE OF SERVICES* prior to subcontractor's performance of work.

ARTICLE # 118 – INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS:

Workers Compensation Insurance: Required for all contracts

- a. \$500,000 Bodily Injury by Accident Each Accident
- b. \$500,000 Bodily Injury by Disease Each Disease
- c. \$500,000 Bodily Injury by Disease Each Employee

<u>Additional Provisions: Waiver of Subrogation.</u> The insurer agrees to waive all rights of subrogation against Hall County Board of Commissioners (BOC), its elected or appointed officers, officials, agents, authorized volunteers, and employees for losses paid under the terms of this policy which arise from work performed by the Named Insured for Hall County BOC; but this provision applies regardless of whether or not Hall County BOC has received a waiver of subrogation from the insurer.

General Liability Insurance: Required for all contracts.

- a. \$2,000,000 General Aggregate
- b. \$2,000,000 Products & Completed Operations Aggregate
- c. \$1,000,000 Each Occurrence
- d. \$1,000,000 Personal & Advertising Injury
- e. \$500,000 Damages to Premises / Fire / Legal
- f. \$5,000 Medical Payments

<u>Commercial Auto Liability Insurance: Required for all contracts</u>, except for Goods and/or Services that are remote in nature and/or are delivered by a professional delivery service.

- a. \$1,000,000 Combined Single Limit OR
- b. \$500,000 per Person
- c. \$500,000 per Occurrence
- d. \$100,000 Property Damage
- e. \$1,000 for Medical Payments (no fault coverage)

Additional Provisions:

- a. Uninsured motorists' coverage should be equal to the per occurrence limit except for contracts with other governmental entities
- b. Coverage shall be included for any owned, leased, hired, or non-owned autos
- c. For any contracts involving the transportation of hazardous materials, limited pollution endorsement ISO form CA9948 or its equivalent shall be on the policy

Umbrella Liability Insurance: Required for all contracts

a. \$1,000,000 per Occurrence

Additional Provisions:

- a. Underlying coverage shall be General Liability, Automobile Liability, and Employers Liability (Workers Compensation)
- b. Minimum limit of \$5,000,000 per occurrence for all contracts over \$1,000,000 or involving any special risks or high hazard activities
- c. Minimum limit of \$5,000,000 for automobile coverage for any transportation contracts involving seniors, special education, transit services, students, or youths.

d. Concurrent policy dates with primary liability policies except for workers compensation

<u>Cyber Insurance</u> (If applicable): Required for all software, computer hardware installation, data access, data integrations, data usage, cloud storage, SaaS, and or technology related contracts.

- a. \$1,000,000 Each Claim/Wrongful Act
- b. \$2,000,000 Annual Aggregate
- c. \$1,000,000 Business Interruption
- d. \$1,000,000 Data Recovery
- e. \$500,000 Cyber Extortion Expenses
- f. \$50,000 Cyber Extortion/Ransom Payments

Additional Provisions: (If applicable): Coverage shall include at a minimum:

- a. Information Security & Privacy Liability
- b. Regulatory Fines and Penalties
- c. Payment Card Industry (PCI) if credit cards and/or banking information is obtained or accessed
- d. Ransomware

Professional Liability Insurance (Errors & Omissions): Required for all professional service <u>contracts</u>. This shall include any consultants, medical, legal, technical, insurance agents, or other professions that require proper licenses.

- a. \$1,000,000 Each Claim/Wrongful Act
- b. \$2,000,000 General Aggregate

Builders Risk: (If Applicable) Recommended for most new construction projects

- a. With any construction project, Hall County should consider purchasing Builders Risk Coverage on a direct basis or have the contractor provide the coverage for projects under \$5,000,000 in value.
- b. For projects over \$5,000,000 in value, Hall County BOC should obtain Builders Risk Coverage on a direct basis to ensure coverage consistency and additional protections are made for Hall County BOC.

ARTICLE # 119 - NO WAIVER:

- A. Authority to Enter into Contract. The Contractor represents and warrants that it has full authority to enter into and perform its obligations under the Contract, and that the Contract constitutes a legal, valid, and binding obligation upon the Contractor in accordance with its terms. The representatives of the parties hereto also represent and warrant that they are authorized to sign this Contract on behalf of each party hereto.
- **B.** Solicitation. The Contractor warrants that no person or selling agency (except bona fide employees or selling agents maintained for the purpose of securing business) has been employed or retained to solicit and secure the Contract upon an agreement or understanding for commission, percentage, brokerage or contingency.
- **C.** Vehicles and Equipment. With the exception of any specified County Owned Equipment and Vehicles listed herein, Contractor warrants that no Contractor employees, subcontractors, or others will not use County owned vehicles or equipment in the performance of this Contract without express written consent. Contractor shall be responsible for providing all transportation

necessary to deliver Services under the Contract.

ARTICLE # 120 – INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS and OWNERSHIP:

Contractor agrees it will not use the name or any intellectual property, including but not limited to, County trademarks or logos in any manner, including commercial advertising or as a business reference, without the expressed prior written consent of the County.

ARTICLE # 121 - COMPENSATION:

- A. The County will pay the Contractor for the Services provided pursuant to this Contract and in accordance with the prices quoted and conditions set forth in the Bidder's response on <u>Exhibit C</u> <u>– Cost Proposal Worksheet</u>, which is attached hereto and incorporated into this Contract as if fully set forth herein. Payments will be made monthly in arrears to the Contractor after acceptance of the Contractor's delivered Services by the County, and after receipt of undisputed invoice to the County.
- B. Prices quoted shall be firm and fixed throughout the term of this Contract, unless otherwise Amended or Modified by mutual agreement.
- C. Cost may be prorated for Services added or removed under this Contract to align cost with the remaining term of Contract.
- D. It is understood that this bid or proposal is made without collusion or fraud. Contractor understands and acknowledges that collusive bidding is a violation of state and federal law and may result in the cancellation of the Contract.

ARTICLE # 122 - COUNTY PAYMENT TO CONTRACTOR:

A. The County will issue a Notice to Proceed (NTP) to the Contractor, and Purchase Order(s) (herein after "PO"). The terms of this Contract shall be incorporated by reference into any and all PO(s) issued prior to the expiration or termination of this Contract. The County will issue the PO by electronic mail (e-mail) to the Contractor's representative in ARTICLE #103 – NOTICES. A PO is considered "issued" when the e-mail containing the PO is sent by the County to the Contractor.

The Contractor shall not deliver any Services, equipment, devices, or components thereof until authorized in writing by the County through issuance of a PO, which shall provide a commencement Notice to Proceed date. Any work, including but not limited to travel, preliminary meetings, planning, etc., performed outside of the terms and conditions of and before the issuance of the PO will not be considered for payment. Contractors are not to begin work or ship any product on any verbal communication from within the County. The County will not be liable for payment for any work or product with the issuance of a verbal communication.

The Scope of Services shall remain in effect from the Notice to Proceed to completion of the project. The Parties agree that the County will not pay or otherwise compensate the Contractor for any Services, materials, equipment, devices, or components thereof outside of the Scope of Work and/or beyond the term of this Contract, unless specifically authorized in writing as evidenced by an amendment (see *ARTICLE #106 – CONTRACT AMENDMENTS AND MODIFICATION*), a time extension letter, or as otherwise authorized by the County.

B. Invoice/Payment

- 1. Contractor shall invoice the County via email each month solely to accountspayable@hallcounty.org and only after the County inspects and accepts the Services provided. Receipt of the Services does not constitute acceptance. Invoice amounts shall not exceed the Contractor's pricing set forth in *ARTICLE # 102*.
- 2. Each invoice shall include the Contractor's current "Remit to" address, a description of the Services provided, the invoice amount, the Contract number, and the associated PO number issued. Each properly prepared invoice must be sent in accordance with the instructions listed on the PO. Standard payment terms are net 30 days (N30) in arrears from the date the invoice is accepted, following delivery of the Services.
- 3. The County does not pay for services not yet received but only in arrears.
- 4. The Contractor shall be solely responsible for paying all costs, expenses and charges it incurs in connection with its performance under the Contract.
- C. Unsatisfactory Performance; Delay of Payment.
 - 1. If the County determines that the quality of the Services provided are deficient, unacceptable, or unsatisfactory, the County's Project Manager identified in *ARTICLE # 103* shall issue a written notice to Contractor. Contractor agrees that upon receipt of the written notice, it shall make every effort to correct the deficiencies within the timeframe prescribed therein. If the Contractor fails to timely correct the deficiencies, the County reserves the right to delay or deny payment pursuant to this Article or terminate the Contract (*ARTICLE #108 TERMINATION PROVISIONS*).
 - 2. Delay of Payment Due to Contractor's Failure. If the County determines that the Contractor has failed to perform or deliver any Services as required by the Contract, the Contractor shall not be entitled to any compensation under the Contract until such Services are delivered and accepted. In this event, the County may withhold that portion of the Contractor's compensation, which represents payment for Services that were not delivered. To the extent that the Contractor's failure to perform or deliver in a timely manner causes the County to incur costs, the County may deduct the amount of such incurred costs as liquidated damages from any amounts payable to Contractor. The County's authority to deduct such incurred costs shall not in any way affect the County's authority to terminate the Contract.
- D. **Set-Off Against Sums Owed by the Contractor**. In the event that the Contractor owes the County any sum under the terms of the Contract, pursuant to any judgment, or pursuant to any law, the County may set off the sum owed by the Contractor against any sum owed to the Contractor, in the County's sole discretion.
- E. **Final Payment.** Contractor shall issue an invoice for final payment to the County no later than thirty (30) days following the expiration or termination date of the Contract.
- F. The Contractor must not "Factor or Assign Payments" to another or a financial institution. The County will only pay the party with whom it is contracted. The County will not in any circumstances pay a third-party.

ARTICLE #123 – PERFORMANCE AND PAYMENT BONDS

The Contractor must furnish to the County both a Performance and Payment Bond, both equal to one hundred percent (100%) of the Contract's total initial award dollar amount. The County will only issue a Notice to Proceed after the bonds are received. Only surety companies licensed to do business in the State of Georgia are acceptable. The Contractor is required to provide new bonds at the issuance of each Renewal Option Term(s) or Extension(s) that follow.

The Contractor must provide all required bonding instruments to the County prior to commencement of any work. The County will consider any work done prior to the receipt of bonding instruments as null and void and thus not eligible for compensation.

ARTICLE #124 – RETAINAGE

The County will retain funds to be withheld from compensation in compliance with Georgia law. Hall County may hold up to <u>five percent (5%) retainage</u> throughout the entire project and will release said retainage at the point of completion and final acceptance by the County.

ARTICLE #125 - VENUE AND GOVERNING LAW

The parties agree that this Contract shall be interpreted, construed, and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Georgia. To the extent that either party may bring a legal suit to enforce the terms of this Contract, including suit in equity, the parties agree and consent to file any such suit in the Superior Court of Hall County, Georgia.

ARTICLE # 126 - NOTICE OF INTENT TO LITIGATE

Contractor hereby agrees not to file any civil action of disputes or claims relating to the Contract except after first giving thirty days (30) written notice to the County of the claim and the intent to initiate a civil action.

ARTICLE # 127- GEORGIA SECURITY AND IMMIGRATION COMPLIANCE ACT (E-Verify):

- A. By signing this Contract, the Contractor certifies that prior to and throughout the performance of all applicable work under this Contract it will remain in full compliance with all federal and state immigration laws, including but not limited to 8 U.S.C. § 1324a and the Georgia Security and Immigration Compliance Act (O.C.G.A. §13-10-90 et seq.), as amended by the Illegal Immigration Reform and Enforcement Act of 2011, regarding the verification of employment eligibility of employees under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986. Contractor will ensure that only persons who are citizens or nationals of the United States or non-citizens authorized under federal immigration laws are employed to perform services under this Contract or any subcontract or sub-subcontract hereunder.
- B. Contractor further certifies its compliance with the aforementioned federal and state immigration laws set forth by signing a sworn affidavit, the Georgia Security and Immigration Compliance Act Affidavit, notarized by an Official Notary Public, and obtaining the same affidavits from any sub-contractor providing services pursuant to this Contract.

ARTICLE # 128 - ORDER OF PRECEDENCE:

In the event of any inconsistency, ambiguity, or conflict among the specific provisions of the Contract and the Contractor's Response, the order of precedence shall be as follows:

1. Any amendments to the Contract, including all Exhibits thereto.

- 2. The Contract itself, including all Exhibits thereto.
- 3. Attachments appended to the Contract.

ARTICLE # 129 – CONTRACT EXHIBITS AND ATTACHMENTS:

The Parties mutually acknowledge that all Exhibits and Attachments listed below made a part of this Contract, as though expressly written in the IFB documents and the bidder's response, are herein incorporated into this contract by reference.

ARTICLE # 130 - ENTIRE CONTRACT:

This Contract, as executed and approved, shall constitute the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all other prior and contemporaneous statements, agreements, and understandings between the Parties. No written or oral statements, agreements, or understandings that are not set out, referenced, or specifically incorporated in this Contract shall in any way be binding or of effect between the Parties.

ARTICLE # 131 - VALIDITY:

If any paragraph, sub-paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, or any portion of this agreement shall be declared invalid or unconstitutional by any Court of competent jurisdiction, or if the provisions of any part of this agreement as applied to any particular situation or set of circumstances, shall be declared invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity shall not be constructed to affect the portions of this agreement not so held to be invalid or the application of this agreement to other circumstances not so held to be invalid. The parties hereby declare that the intent of the parties to this agreement is to provide for separate and divisible parts.

ARTICLE #132 - SALES TAX EXEMPTION STATUS:

The County is exempt from Federal Excise Taxes and from Georgia State and Local Sales and Use Taxes on the Services. The Contractor may request a copy of the County's Georgia Sales and Use Tax Exemption Certificate.

ARTICLE #133 - HOLD HARMLESS AGREEMENT

The successful respondent hereby agrees to indemnify, hold free and harmless, Hall County Government, County Commissioners, its agents, servants, employees, officers, directors and elected officials, or any other person(s) against any loss or expense. This includes attorney fees, because of any liability imposed by law upon the County, except in cases of the County's sole negligence, sustained by any person(s) on account of bodily injury or property damage arising out of or in the consequence of this agreement.

ARTICLE # 134 - CONTRACT TERMS AND CONDITIONS:

- 1. All purchases must comply with the Official Code of Hall County Sections 3.10.010 3.10.190.
- 2. If any conflict or ambiguity arises between the Terms and Conditions herein, and The Official Code of Hall County, the latter will govern.
- 3. The Terms and Conditions set forth herein shall supersede and govern over all Contractor's Terms and Conditions or Service Level Agreements.
- 4. The County retains the right to "red-line" sections of the Supplier's Terms and Conditions if such are in conflict with the best interest of the County.
- 5. Acceptance of a PO and delivery of Goods or Services serves as the Supplier's full and complete acceptance of the County's Terms and Conditions.
- 6. The terms supplier, vendor, bidder, offeror, Contractor, designer, distributor, dealer,

manufacturer, or otherwise purveyor or source of supply or performance of service shall mean one-and-the-same, herein denoted as "Supplier" for goods and "Contractor" for services.

- 7. - 27. The County is exempt from Federal Excise Tax and Georgia Sales and Use Tax.

- 28. This issuance of the PO shall not violate the Code of Ethics and Conflicts of Interest for Public Officers and Employees for Government Service set forth in the 2020 Section 45-1020 et seq. of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated and the Official Code of Hall County Section 3.10.070 governing Ethics.
- 29. All goods and services supplied pursuant to this PO shall, unless otherwise noted, must conform exactly to all of the descriptions, specifications, Exhibits, and attachments contained in the Bid Solicitation upon which a PO is based and all the terms, conditions, and specifications of the Bid Solicitation are incorporated herein by reference and made a part hereof.

Ga. Code Ann., § 15-12-7

§ 15-12-7. Compensation of court bailiffs and payment of expense allowance to jurors

Effective: April 29, 2014 Currentness

(a) The first grand jury impaneled at the fall term of the superior courts of the several counties shall fix:

(1) The compensation of court bailiffs in the superior courts of such counties for the next succeeding year, such compensation not to be less than \$5.00 per diem. The same compensation shall be allowed to bailiffs of the several state courts and special courts as is allowed bailiffs in the superior court of the county in which the state or special court is located;

(2) An expense allowance for trial or grand jurors in the superior courts of such counties for the next succeeding year not to be less than \$5.00 nor to exceed \$50.00 per diem. The same expense allowance shall be allowed to jurors of the several state courts and special courts as is allowed jurors in the superior court of the county in which the state or special court is located; and

(3) An expense allowance for grand jurors, such expense allowance not to be less than \$5.00 nor to exceed \$50.00 per diem.

(b) Any increase in the compensation of court bailiffs or increases in expense allowances for jurors fixed by a grand jury shall be subject to the approval of the governing authority of the county.

HARDWARE WARRANTY AGREEMENT BY AND BETWEEN DOMINION VOTING SYSTEMS, INC. AND HALL COUNTY, GA

This Hardware Warranty Agreement (the "Agreement") dated January 1, 2022, (the "Effective Date"), is made between Hall County, GA ("County") and Dominion Voting Systems, Inc. ("Dominion"). This Agreement may refer to Dominion and the County together as the "Parties," or individually as a "Party."

WHEREAS, the Secretary of State of the State of Georgia entered into a Master Solution Purchase and Services Agreement contract (the "State Contract") with Dominion on July 29, 2019;

WHEREAS, the State Contract authorizes the County to purchase voting system hardware warranties for voting system items purchased by the State of Georgia for use by the County;

WHEREAS, The County desires to purchase voting system hardware warranties;

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants contained herein, and in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth herein, Dominion agrees to sell voting system hardware warranties as described more fully below.

1. Composition of Agreement. Exhibit A is attached and incorporated herein by reference and forms a part of this Agreement. This Agreement consists of the general terms and conditions contained in the following sections, together with the Exhibit A. The total compensation payable under this Agreement shall be in accordance with the item prices incorporated within Exhibit A.

2. Definitions.

2.1. "Confidential Information" means those materials, documents, data, and technical information, specifications, business information, County information, or other information that a Party (the "Disclosing Party") maintains as trade secrets or confidential and which are disclosed to the other Party (the "Receiving Party") in tangible form marked as "confidential," or with words having similar meaning, which includes without limitation, Dominion software.

2.2. "<u>Hardware</u>" means the ImageCast[®] system hardware listed in Exhibit A of this Agreement.

2.3. "<u>Specifications</u>" means descriptions and data regarding the features, functions and performance of the Hardware, as set forth in user manuals or other applicable documentation provided by Dominion.

3. Term of Agreement. The Term of this Agreement shall begin on the Effective Date and shall continue until the first anniversary of the Effective Date. This Agreement shall automatically renew on an annual basis for an additional three (3) years, subject to the warranty fees and terms defined in Exhibit A. The County, at its sole discretion, may choose the terminate the Agreement prior to any annual renewal. Notification of termination must be in writing and provided to Dominion within forty-five (45) calendar days of expiration.

4. **Dominion's Responsibilities.** Dominion shall provide this Hardware warranty based upon the terms defined herein. Dominion shall provide invoices to County for the warranty items listed in Exhibit A and pursuant to the payment schedule described in Section 5 and Exhibit A.

5. County's Responsibilities. County shall pay invoices no later than thirty (30) calendar days from receipt of a Dominion invoice. Payments specified in this Section 5 are exclusive of all excise, sale, use and other sales taxes imposed by any governmental authority. If County is exempt from taxes, County shall supply Dominion with a tax exemption certificate or similar form demonstrating its exempt status upon request.

6. Warranties. The following warranties shall apply to the Hardware.

6.1. <u>Hardware Warranty Terms</u>. Dominion warrants that when used with the hardware and software configuration purchased through or approved by Dominion, each component of Hardware will be free of defects that would prevent the Hardware from operating in conformity in all material respects with its Specifications. The Hardware warranty shall remain in effect during the Term.

6.2. <u>Hardware Warranty Services</u>. If any Hardware component fails to operate in conformity with its specifications during the warranty period, Dominion shall provide a replacement for the Hardware component or, at Dominion's sole option, shall repair the Hardware component, so long as the Hardware is operated with its designated Dominion software and with third party products approved by Dominion for use with the Hardware. The following conditions apply:

- 6.2.1. County shall bear the shipping costs to return the malfunctioning Hardware component to Dominion, and Dominion shall bear the costs for shipping the repaired or replaced Hardware component to County.
- 6.2.2. The following services are not covered by this Agreement, but may be available at Dominion's current time and material rates:
 - 6.2.2.1. Replacement of consumable items including but not limited to batteries, toner¹, paper rolls, ribbons, seals, smart cards, and removable memory devices, scanner rollers, disks, etc.;
 - 6.2.2.2. Repair or replacement of Hardware damaged by of accident, disaster, theft, vandalism, neglect, abuse, or any improper use;
 - 6.2.2.3. Repair or replacement of Hardware modified by any person other than those authorized in writing by Dominion;
 - 6.2.2.4. Repair or replacement of Hardware from which the serial numbers have been removed, defaced or changed.
- 6.2.3. County is not authorized to provide or transfer any Hardware or other voting system component to a third party unless explicitly authorized in writing by Dominion. Providing or transferring Hardware will void the terms of the Warranty and shall be considered a breach of the Agreement.

¹ Toner will be included for Counties choosing the ICX warranty with annual replacement toner option.

6.3. <u>No Other Warranties.</u> DOMINION DISCLAIMS ALL OTHER WARRANTIES, AND REPRESENTATIONS, WHETHER WRITTEN, ORAL, EXPRESS, IMPLIED OR STATUTORY, INCLUDING ANY WARRANTY OF MERCHANTABILITY OR FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE AND ANY WARRANTY BASED ON A COURSE OF DEALING, COURSE OF PERFORMANCE OR USAGE OF TRADE.

7. Confidential Information.

- 7.1. Each Party shall treat the other Party's Confidential Information as confidential within their respective organizations and each Party shall be given the ability to defend the confidentiality of its Confidential Information to the maximum extent allowable under the law prior to disclosure by the other Party of such Confidential Information.
- 7.2. Subject to the requirements of the County's public record laws ("PRL"), neither Party shall disclose the other Party's Confidential Information to any person outside their respective organizations unless disclosure is made in response to, or because of, an obligation to any federal, state, or local governmental agency or court with appropriate jurisdiction, or to any person properly seeking discovery before any such agency or court.
- 7.3. Any specific information that Dominion claims to be confidential must be clearly marked or identified as such by Dominion. To the extent consistent with PRL, County shall maintain the confidentiality of all such information marked by Dominion as confidential. If a request is made to view such Confidential Information, County will notify Dominion of such request and the date the information will be released to the requestor unless Dominion obtains a court order enjoining such disclosure. If Dominion fails to obtain such court order enjoining such disclosure, the County will release the requested information on the date specified. Such release shall be deemed to have been made with Dominion's consent and shall not be deemed to be a violation of law or this Agreement.

8. Force Majeure. Should any circumstances beyond the control of Dominion or County occur that delay or render impossible the performance of any obligation due under this Agreement, such obligation will be postponed for the period of any delay resulting from any such circumstances, plus a reasonable period to accommodate adjustment to such extension or cancelled if performance has been rendered impossible thereby. Such events may include, without limitation, accidents; war, acts of terrorism; natural disasters; pandemic; labor disputes; acts, laws, rules or regulations of any government or government agency; or other events beyond the control of both Dominion and County. Neither Party shall be liable under this Agreement for any loss or damage to the other Party due to such delay or performance failures. Notwithstanding the foregoing, both Parties shall use commercially reasonable efforts to minimize the adverse consequences of any such circumstances. This Section shall not operate to excuse any Party from paying amounts that are owed pursuant to this Agreement.

9. Indemnification. Dominion, at its sole expense, will indemnify and defend the County, its officers, agents and employees from and against any loss, cost, expense or liability (including but not limited to attorney's fees and awarded damages) arising out of a claim, suit or action that the System infringes, violates, or misappropriates a Third Party's patent, copyright, trademark, trade secret or other intellectual property or proprietary rights.

10. Limitation of Liability. EXCEPT FOR THE INDEMNIFICATION OBLIGATIONS CONTAINED IN THIS AGREEMENT AND ANY WILLFUL MISCONDUCT OR GROSS NEGLIGENCE, DOMINION'S TOTAL AGGREGATE LIABILITY FOR ANY LOSS, DAMAGE, COSTS OR EXPENSES UNDER OR IN CONNECTION WITH THIS AGREEMENT, HOWSOEVER ARISING, INCLUDING WITHOUT LIMITATION, LOSS, DAMAGE, COSTS OR EXPENSES CAUSED BY BREACH OF CONTRACT, NEGLIGENCE, STRICT LIABILITY, BREACH OF STATUTORY OR ANY OTHER DUTY SHALL IN NO CIRCUMSTANCES EXCEED THE TOTAL DOLLAR AMOUNT OF THE AGREEMENT. NEITHER PARTY SHALL BE LIABLE TO THE OTHER PARTY FOR ANY LOSS OF PROFITS, LOSS OF BUSINESS, LOSS OF DATA, LOSS OF USE OR ANY OTHER INDIRECT, INCIDENTAL, SPECIAL OR CONSEQUENTIAL LOSS OR DAMAGE WHATSOEVER, HOWSOEVER ARISING, INCURRED BY THE OTHER PARTY OR ANY THIRD PARTY, WHETHER IN AN ACTION IN CONTRACT, NEGLIGENCE OR OTHER TORT, EVEN IF THE PARTIES OR THEIR REPRESENTATIVES HAVE BEEN ADVISED OF THE POSSIBILITY OF SUCH DAMAGES.

11. Assignment. Neither Party may assign its rights, obligations, or interests in this Agreement without the written consent of the other Party, providing however that Dominion may assign the proceeds of this Agreement to a financial institution without prior consent of the County.

12. Termination. In the event either Party violates any provisions of this Agreement, the nonviolating Party may serve written notice upon the violating Party identifying the violation and providing a reasonable cure period. Except as otherwise noted herein, such cure period shall be at least thirty (30) days. In the event the violating Party has not remedied the infraction at the end of the cure period, the non-violating Party may terminate this Agreement, and seek legal remedies for breach of contract as allowed hereunder. If the breach identified in the notice cannot be completely cured within the specified time period, no default shall occur if the Party receiving the notice begins curative action within the specified time period and thereafter proceeds with reasonable diligence and in good faith to cure the breach as soon as practicable, but in no event shall the cure period exceed sixty (60) days without written consent by the non-breaching party.

13. Legality and Severability. This Agreement and the Parties' actions under this Agreement shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, ordinances, rules, regulations, court orders, and applicable governmental agency orders. If any term or provision of this Agreement is held to be illegal or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected thereby and each term or provision of this Agreement shall be valid and enforceable to the fullest extent permitted by law. The Parties agree that any court reviewing this Agreement shall reform any illegal or unenforceable provision to carry out the express intent of the parties as set forth herein to the fullest extent permitted by law.

14. Choice of Law and Jurisdiction. Interpretation of this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Georgia, and the courts of competent jurisdiction located in the State of Georgia will have jurisdiction to hear and determine questions relating to this Agreement.

15. Waiver. Any failure of a Party to assert any right under this Agreement shall not constitute a waiver or a termination of that right or any provisions of this Agreement.

16. Notices. All notices required or permitted to be given hereunder shall be given in writing and shall be deemed to have been given when personally delivered or by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, addressed to the intended recipient or e-mailed as follows:

17. Independent Contractor. Dominion and its agents and employees are independent contractors performing professional services for the County and are not employees of the County. Dominion and its agents and employees shall not accrue leave, retirement, insurance, bonding, use of County vehicles, or any other benefits afforded to employees of the County as a result of this Agreement. Dominion acknowledges that all sums received hereunder are personally reportable by it for income tax purposes as self-employment or business income and are reportable for self-employment tax.

18. Entire Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement, understanding and representations between Dominion and the County, and supersede and replace all prior agreements, written or oral. No modifications or representations to the Agreement shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by duly authorized representatives of both the County and Dominion, and incorporated as an amendment hereto.

19. Third-Party Beneficiary. No person shall be a third-party beneficiary pursuant to this Agreement. No obligation of Dominion or County may be enforced against Dominion or County, as applicable, by any person not a party to this Agreement.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties have caused this Agreement to be executed as of the Effective Date above written.

STATEWIDE MUTUAL AID AND ASSISTANCE AGREEMENT

County/Municipality: Hall County

The State of Georgia is vulnerable to a wide range of natural and man-made disasters and emergencies. The Georgia Emergency Management Act, as amended (The Act) gives the local governments of the State the authority to make agreements for mutual aid assistance in emergencies. Pre-existing agreements for mutual aid assistance in emergencies help to ensure the timely provision of mutual aid assistance and the reimbursement of costs incurred by those parties who render such assistance.

This mutual aid agreement is entered pursuant to authorities contained in Articles I through III, Chapter 3, Title 38, Official Code of Georgia Annotated.

ARTICLE I STATEMENT OF AGREEMENT, DEFINITIONS AND AUTHORITIES

This Agreement is made and entered into between the participating political subdivisions, which approve and execute this Agreement, hereinafter called "Participating Parties" and the Georgia Emergency Management and Homeland Security Agency (GEMA/HS). For purposes of this Agreement, the following terms and expressions shall apply:

(1) "Agreement" means this agreement, generally referred to as the "Statewide Mutual Aid Agreement" (SWMAA).

(2) "Assistance" includes personnel, equipment, facilities, services, supplies and other resources furnished to a Requesting Party pursuant to this Agreement during an emergency or disaster.

(3) "Assisting Party" means a party that provides assistance pursuant to this Agreement during an emergency or disaster.

(4) "Authorized Representative" means a Participating Party's elected or appointed official or employee who has been authorized in writing by that party to request, to offer, or otherwise to provide mutual aid assistance.

(5) "Participating Party" means a county or municipality of the State of Georgia that has become party to this Agreement by its approval and execution of this agreement.

(6) "Participating Parties" means the combination of counties and municipalities that have become parties to this Agreement by their approval and execution of this Agreement.

(7) "Requesting Party" means a party that requests assistance pursuant to this Agreement during an emergency or disaster.

Any term or expression not defined in this Agreement shall have the meaning specified in the Georgia Emergency Management Act, as amended (the Act) and rules promulgated thereunder, unless used in a context that clearly suggests a different meaning.

ARTICLE II GENERAL PURPOSE

The purpose of this Agreement is to:

- 1. Provide the framework to support mutual assistance in managing an emergency or disaster occurring within any political subdivision that is a Participating Party, whether arising from natural disaster, technological hazard, human caused disaster, civil emergency, community disorders, insurgency, enemy attack, acts of terrorism, other significant events or homeland security activity; and
- 2. Identify those persons who are authorized to act on behalf of the Participating Party signing this Agreement as their Authorized Representative(s) concerning the provision of mutual aid resources and requests for mutual aid resources related to any mutual aid assistance sought from another Participating Party, or from or through the State of Georgia. Appendix A of this Agreement shall contain the name(s) of the Participating Party's Authorized Representative for purposes of this Agreement. Appendix A can be amended by the authorizing Participating Party as needed with no effect on the entire Agreement. All such amendments to Appendix A shall be done in writing and the Participating Party shall notify GEMA/HS and all other Participating Parties of such amendment within thirty (30) days.

ARTICLE III ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF PRINCIPLES

The prompt, full and effective utilization of resources of the Participating Parties, including any resources on hand or available from the State or Federal Government or any other source, that are essential to the safety, care and welfare of the people shall be the underlying principle on which all articles of this Agreement shall be understood.

In the event of a conflict between any provision of this Agreement and any existing intrastate mutual aid agreement affecting a Participating Party, the provisions of this Agreement shall be controlling.

On behalf of the governing authority of each political subdivision of this State participating in the Agreement, the director of emergency management of such political subdivision will be responsible for formulation of the appropriate mutual aid plans and procedures necessary to implement this Agreement.

<u>ARTICLE IV</u> <u>PARTICIPATING PARTY RESPONSIBILITIES</u>

(a) It shall be the responsibility of each Participating Party to formulate procedures and programs for intergovernmental cooperation in the performance of the responsibilities listed in this Article. In formulating such plans, and in carrying them out, each Participating Party, insofar as practical, shall:

(1) Protect and assure uninterrupted delivery of services, medicines, water, food, energy and fuel, search and rescue, and critical lifeline equipment, services, and resources, both human and material; and

(2) Inventory and set procedures for the loan and delivery of human and material resources, together with procedures for reimbursement.

(b) Whenever a Participating Party requires mutual aid assistance from another Participating Party and/or the State of Georgia, the Requesting Party may request assistance by:

(1) Contacting the Participating Party who is the owner/operator/employer of the supplies, equipment and/or personnel being sought for mutual aid assistance (the Assisting Party); or

(2) Contacting GEMA/HS to serve as the facilitator of such request for those resources being sought for mutual aid that are owned/operated/employed by Participating Parties (where such Participating Parties have submitted a record of those resources to GEMA/HS for such use); and/or, when such resources being sought for mutual aid are owned/operated/employed directly by the State of Georgia.

The provisions of this Agreement shall only apply to requests for assistance made by an Authorized Representative. Requests may be verbal or in writing. If verbal, the request must be confirmed in writing within 30 days of the verbal request. Requests shall provide the following information:

(1) A description of the emergency service function for which assistance is needed, such as but not limited to fire services, law enforcement, emergency medical, transportation, communications, public works and engineering, building inspection, planning and information assistance, mass care, resource support, health and medical services, damage assessment, volunteer and donated goods and search and rescue; and

(2) The amount and type of personnel, equipment, materials and supplies needed, and a reasonable estimate of the length of time each will be needed; and

(3) The specific place and time for staging of the Assisting Party's response and a point of contact at that location.

The Assisting Party will (a) maintain daily personnel time records, material records and a log of equipment hours (or miles, if appropriate) and (b) report work progress to the Requesting Party at mutually agreed upon intervals.

ARTICLE V LIMITATIONS

Any Participating Party requested to render mutual aid shall take such action as is necessary to provide and make available the resources covered by this Agreement in accordance with the terms hereof; provided that it is understood that the Participating Party who is asked to render aid may withhold resources to the extent necessary to meet the current or anticipated needs of the Participating Party's own political subdivision to remain in compliance with such Participating Party's policy, rule or law.

The Assisting Party's mutual aid resources will continue under the command and control of their own

supervisors, but the organizational units will be under the operational control of the emergency services authorities of the Requesting Party unless the Assisting Party approves an alternative.

In the event the Governor should declare a State of Emergency, any and all provisions of this Agreement which may conflict with the declared State of Emergency shall be superseded by the terms and conditions contained within the State of Emergency.

ARTICLE VI LIABILITY AND IMMUNITY

(a) In accordance with O.C.G.A. § 38-3-35(a), no political subdivision of the state, nor the agents or representatives of the state or any political subdivision thereof, shall be liable for personal injury or property damage sustained by any person appointed or acting as a volunteer emergency management worker or member of any agency engaged in emergency management activity. The foregoing shall not affect the right of any person to receive benefits or compensation to which he might otherwise be entitled under Chapter 9 of Title 34, Code Section 38-3-30, any pension law, or any act of Congress.

(b) In accordance with O.C.G.A. § 38-3-35(b), no political subdivision of the state nor, except in cases of willful misconduct, gross negligence, or bad faith, the employees, agents, or representatives of the state or any political subdivision thereof, nor any volunteer or auxiliary emergency management worker or member of any agency engaged in any emergency management activity complying with or reasonably attempting to comply with Articles 1 through 3, Chapter 3, Title 38, Official Code of Georgia Annotated; or any order, rule, or regulation promulgated pursuant to Articles 1 through 3 of title, or pursuant to any ordinance relating to precautionary measures enacted by any political provisions of Articles 1 through 3 of said chapter and title, or pursuant to any ordinance relating to precautionary measures enacted by any political subdivision of the state shall be liable for the death of or the injury to person or for damage to property as a result of any such activity.

(c) It is the express intent of the parties that the immunities specified in accordance with O.C.G.A. § 38-3-35 shall apply in addition to any other immunity provided by statute or case law.

ARTICLE VII RIGHTS AND PRIVILEGES

In accordance with O.C.G.A. § 38-3-30(a), whenever the employees of any Assisting Party or political subdivision are rendering outside aid pursuant to this agreement and the authority contained in Code Section 38-3-27, the employees shall have the same powers, duties, rights, privileges and immunities as if they were performing their duties in the political subdivisions in which they are normally employed.

ARTICLE VIII REIMBURSEMENT

In accordance with O.C.G.A. § 38-3-30(b), The Requesting Party shall be liable for any loss of or damage to equipment used or placed within the jurisdiction of the Requesting Party and shall pay any expense incurred in the operation and maintenance thereof. No claim for the loss, damage or expense shall be allowed unless, within 60 days after the same is sustained or incurred, an itemized notice of

the claim under oath is served by mail or otherwise upon the designated fiscal officer of the Requesting Party. Appendix B of this Agreement shall contain the name(s) of the Participating Party's designated fiscal officer for purposes of this Agreement. Appendix B can be amended by the authorizing Participating Party as needed with no effect on the entire Agreement. Appendix B can be amended by the authorizing Participating Party as needed with no effect on the entire Agreement. All such amendments to Appendix B shall be done in writing and the Participating Party shall notify GEMA/HS and all other Participating Parties of such amendment within thirty (30) days.

The Requesting Party shall also pay and reimburse the Assisting Party for the compensation paid to employees furnished by the Assisting Party during the time of the rendition of the aid, as well as the actual travel and per diem expenses of such employees while they are rendering the aid. The reimbursement shall include any amounts paid or due for compensation due to personal injury or death while the employees are engaged in rendering the aid. The term "employee," as used herein, shall mean, and this provision shall apply with equal effect to, paid, volunteer and auxiliary employees and emergency management workers.

Expenses to be reimbursed by the Requesting Party shall include the following:

(1) Labor costs, which shall include all usual wages, salaries, compensation for hours worked, mobilization and demobilization, the Assisting Party's portion of payroll taxes (as employer), insurance, accrued paid leave and other fringe benefits, but not those amounts paid or due as a benefit to the Assisting Parties personnel under the terms of the Georgia Workers Compensation Act; and

(2) Equipment costs, which shall include the fair rental value, the cost of fuel and other consumable supplies, service and repairs. If the equipment is damaged while in use under this Agreement and the Assisting Party receives payment for such damage under any contract for insurance, the Requesting Party may deduct such payment from any item or items invoiced; and

(3) Material costs, which shall include the total reasonable cost for the use and consumption of any and all consumable supplies delivered by the Assisting Party for the benefit of the Requesting Party; and

(4) Meals, lodging and other related expenses, which shall include charges for meals, lodging and other expenses relating to the provision of assistance pursuant to this Agreement shall be the actual and reasonable costs incurred by the Assisting Party.

The Assisting Party shall maintain records and submit invoices within 60 days for reimbursement as specified hereinabove and the Requesting Party shall pay the invoice no later than 30 days following the invoice date.

ARTICLE IX IMPLEMENTATION

This Agreement shall become operative immediately upon its approval and execution by GEMA/HS and any two political subdivisions of this State; thereafter, this Agreement shall become effective as to any other political subdivision of this State upon its approval and execution by such political subdivision.

Any Participating Party may withdraw from this Agreement by mailing notice of withdrawal, approved by the governing authority of such political subdivision, but no such withdrawal shall take effect until 30 days after the governing authority of the withdrawing political subdivision has given notice in writing of such withdrawal to the governing authorities of all other Participating Parties. Such action shall not relieve the withdrawing political subdivision from obligations assumed hereunder prior to the effective date of withdrawal.

Copies of this Agreement shall, at the time of their approval, be deposited with each of the respective Participating Parties and with GEMA/HS.

ARTICLE X TERM OF AGREEMENT

This Agreement, once executed, is valid until March 1, 2028. Agreement of the Participating Parties to extend the term of this agreement at any time during the last year of its original term or the last year of any subsequent four-year term shall extend the term of this agreement for four years. Each four-year extension shall constitute a separate agreement.

ARTICLE XI VALIDITY

If any provision of this Agreement is declared unconstitutional, or the applicability thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, the constitutionality of the remainder of this Agreement and the applicability thereof to other persons and circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

BETWEEN

THE LANIER TECHNICAL COLLEGE POLICE DEPARTMENT

AND

THE HALL COUNTY CENTRAL COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

FOR

MEETING THE COMMUNICATION NEEDS OF THE LANIER TECHNICAL COLLEGE POLICE DEPARTMENT TO COMPLY WITH STATE CERTIFICATION STANDARDS

The Lanier Technical College Police Department and the Hall County Central Communications Center seek to reach a mutual understanding with regards to the Lanier Technical College Police Department Communications needs as they proceed through State Certification. Both agencies agree this agreement merely documents what has already been in place.

The Lanier Technical College Police Department's 911 emergency call needs are provided in whole or in part by the Hall County Central Communications.

ARTICLE I

Hall County Central Communications agrees to maintain 24-hour, toll-free telephone access for emergency calls for service to the Lanier Technical College Police Department service area. The Lanier Technical College Police Department agrees to provide accurate agency contact information to the provider, ensuring the agency can be reached when needed. (GLECP 8.1)

ARTICLE II

Hall County Central Communications has established procedures for communications to and from field officers, to include:

- a. Specification of the circumstances requiring communications by field officers.
- b. The recording of the status of officers.
- c. The methods used for identifying officers during communications.
- d. Communication with interacting agencies.
- e. Criteria for the assignment of the number of officers in response to an incident.
- f. Circumstances that require the presence of a supervisor at the scene for the purpose of assuming command. (GLECP 8.2)

ARTICLE III

Hall County Central Communications shall ensure continuous communication between Lanier Technical College Police Department employees in the field and the dispatch function, so that on-duty officers have the means for constant communication. (GLECP 8.3)

ARTICLE IV

Hall County Central Communications dispatch function has the capability of immediate playback of recorded telephone and radio conversations while maintaining a continuous recording of radio transmissions and emergency telephone conversations within the dispatch function. Hall County Central Communications has a written directive establishing procedures for the following:

a. That recordings be retained in compliance with the Georgia Records

Retention Act guidelines as published by the Secretary of State's office.

- b. Secure handling and storage for recordings.
- c. Criteria and procedures for reviewing recorded conversations. (GLECP 8.4)

ARTICLE V

Hall County Central Communications has the capability to meet the Lanier Technical College Police Department needs for language translation services, for any callers who do not speak English. The provider also maintains TDD capabilities. (GLECP 8.5)

ARTICLE VI

- 1. This agreement shall be periodically reviewed by the parties.
- 2. This agreement will remain in effect until terminated by either party.
- 3. Either party may terminate this agreement upon a 30-day notice in writing to the other party.

ARTICLE VII

The signatures below shall represent the binding understanding between the Lanier Technical College Police Department and Hall County Central Communications. The signers below acknowledge and agree upon the terms and conditions as set forth in the Articles listed in this Memorandum of Understanding

EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT Assistant Director of Planning and Development

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into this 22nd day of February 2024, by and between **HALL COUNTY, STATE OF GEORGIA,** hereinafter called "the County", as party of the first part, and **Elizabeth Garmon**, herein called "Employee", as party of the second part, both of whom agree as follows:

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the County desires to employ the services of said Elizabeth Garmon as the Hall County Assistant Director of Planning and Development; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the governing board, hereafter called "Commission" to provide certain benefits, establish certain conditions of employment and to set working conditions of said Employee; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of Hall County to secure and retain the services of said Employee and provide inducement for her to remain in such employment, and to make possible full work productivity by assuring said Employee's morale and peace of mind with respect to future security, and to provide a just means of terminating the Employee's services at such a time as desired by the County Administrator, or his or her designee; and

WHEREAS, the Employee desires to accept employment as Assistant Director of Planning and Development for Hall County;

NOW THEREFORE; in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

SECTION 1. Duties

The County hereby agrees to employ **Elizabeth Garmon** as **Assistant Director of Planning and Development**, to perform legally permissible functions and duties specified and assigned by the County Administrator or his designee.

EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT Assistant Director of Planning and Development

SECTION 2. <u>Term</u>

- A. Nothing in this agreement shall prevent, limit, or otherwise interfere with the right of the County Administrator to terminate the services of this Employee at any time, subject only to the provisions set forth in SECTION 3 of this agreement. The Employee understands that she serves at the pleasure of the County Administrator.
- B. Nothing in the agreement shall prevent, limit, or otherwise interfere with the right of the Employee to resign at any time from her position with the County, subject to the provisions set forth in SECTION 3, Paragraphs B and C of this agreement.

SECTION 3. <u>Termination and Severance Pay</u>

- A. In the event the Employee is terminated pursuant to Paragraph B hereof and the Employee is willing and able to perform the duties of the position under this agreement, upon execution of a Separation Agreement and General Release, the Employer agrees to pay the Employee a lump sum cash payment equal to three (3) months aggregate annual salary, exclusive of other forms of compensation, less standard withholdings, in addition to the continuation of medical, dental, and vision insurance benefits during the three (3) month period immediately following the date of termination. However, in the event the Employee is terminated because the Employee has been convicted of a misdemeanor or a felony, or if the County determines that the Employee has engaged in unprofessional and improper practice, other than negligence, and breach of public trust, including but not limited to illegal acts involving personal gain, or moral turpitude, the County shall be entitled to terminate the Employee immediately without any severance pay, or medical, dental, and vision insurance continuation aside from COBRA.
- B. In the event the Employer at any point during the term of this agreement reduces the salary or other financial benefits of the Employee in a greater percentage than reductions to all other employees of Employer, or if Employer refuses, following a written request to comply with any provision benefiting Employee herein; or the Employee resigns following a suggestion, whether formal or informal, by the County Administrator that she resign, then, in that event, Employee may, at her option, be deemed to be terminated at the date of such reduction or refusal to comply within the meaning and context of the herein severance pay provision.

Assistant Director of Planning and Development

C. In the event the Employee voluntarily resigns her position with the County as Assistant Director of Planning and Development then the Employee shall give the County thirty (30) days written notice in advance, unless the parties otherwise agree. The provision for severance pay and continuation of employment benefits detailed in SECTION 3, Paragraph A shall not apply to a voluntary resignation.

SECTION 4. <u>Termination Due to Disability</u>

If the Employee is unable to perform her duties because of sickness, accident, injury, or mental incapacity, and no reasonable accommodations are available, the County shall have the option to terminate employment, subject to the severance pay requirements of SECTION 3, Paragraph A. However, the Employee shall be compensated for any accrued benefits, in accordance with current policies.

SECTION 5. Salary

The County agrees to pay the Employee for her services rendered, pursuant hereto, an annual base salary of **\$133,000.00** payable in installments at the same time as other employees of the County are paid, except that the county may put in place cost reduction measures at any time and for any duration as required by a lack of financial resources. The base annual salary and benefits may be reviewed annually by the County Administrator and consideration for increases may be determined based upon the performance of the employee or consideration of providing a Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA).

SECTION 6. <u>Performance Evaluation</u>

The County Administrator, or his designee, shall review and evaluate the performance of Employee at least annually on the anniversary day of this agreement. Said review and evaluation shall be in accordance with criteria developed by the County Administrator, or his designee, and Employee. Performance criteria may be added to or deleted from, as the County Administrator, or his designee may from time to time determine. Further, the County Administrator, or his designee, shall provide the Employee with a written summary statement of the findings of the evaluation.

Assistant Director of Planning and Development

SECTION 7. Hours of Work

It is generally recognized that the position of **Assistant Director of Planning and Development** involves the devotion of a great deal of time beyond typically recognized business hours.

SECTION 8. <u>Outside Activities</u>

The Employee shall devote her full time to the position described in this agreement. With the approval of the County Administrator, or his designee, the Employee may engage in teaching, consulting, or other non-employer related activities as long as she does not interfere with the execution of the duties of this position, or present a conflict of interest. Such consent must be obtained by advance approval, in writing, detailing the specifics of such activity.

SECTION 9. <u>Political Activity</u>

If the Employee announces as a candidate for any elective office during the duration of this contract, she will resign from Hall County employment immediately upon declaring candidacy as defined by state law. During the term of this contract, the Employee may not:

- A. Be involved in any political activity that would constitute a conflict of interest; including participation in any aspect of any local political campaign on behalf of one's self if intending to seek elected office, or other individual or in opposition to any candidate for office within Hall County; including municipal and/or county government office. This restriction includes but is not limited to displaying or distributing information, materials, or paraphernalia in support of any political candidate, party or organization.
- B. Knowingly solicit, accept, or receive political contributions from any person, to be used in support of or in opposition to any political candidate for election within Hall County, including municipal and/or county government office.
- C. Use, or promise to use, directly or indirectly, any official authority or influence, whether possessed or anticipated, to secure or attempt to secure for any person a job or other advantage for the purpose of influencing the vote or political action of any person.

Assistant Director of Planning and Development

SECTION 10. Vehicle and Phone

Employee's duties require the substantial use of their personal automobile during the term of employment. The County shall pay to the Employee, in addition to salary, a monthly vehicle allowance of \$433.33. A cellular phone dedicated solely for business usage may be provided by the Employer. In such case, the Employer shall be responsible for paying for and maintaining regular monthly service. Should the Employee desire to use their personal cellular phone for business purposes, Employer shall reimburse the Employee the amount of \$50 per month.

SECTION 11. Insurance Benefits

The County agrees to put in force and make premium payments for Medical, Dental, Vision, Short-Term Disability and Life Insurance policies on behalf of the Employee and if so elected, eligible dependents, at a level of coverage available to other County employees. The Employee may choose not to cover her dependents.

SECTION 12. <u>Retirement Benefits</u>

Provided that contributions are being made by the County, if the Employee elects, Hall County agrees to contribute 8% of annual compensation as defined by the retirement plan in addition to Employer matching contributions made on contributions by the Employee as received by other County employees, into a defined contribution plan, except that the County may reduce or suspend this contribution at any time and for any duration as required due to a lack of financial resources. Retirement contributions shall not be made on any severance pay provided by the Employer, paid in accordance with Section 3.

SECTION 13. Paid Time Off (PTO) or Vacation and Sick Leave

As applicable, the County will provide for Paid Time Off (PTO) in the same manner as the accruals currently received by other County Employees. In the event that the County changes or adopts a new program for all employees, such changes shall also apply to the **Assistant Director of Planning and Development**. Accrued PTO or vacation leave, whichever is applicable, shall be paid to Employee upon termination of employment.

SECTION 14. <u>Dues, Subscriptions and Professional Development</u>

- A. The County agrees to pay the Employee's annual membership dues, subscriptions and conference expenses incurred by the Employee in conjunction with the Employee's duties, not to exceed the budget and subject to prior approval by the County Administrator or his designee.
- B. The County agrees to pay the travel and subsistence expenses of the Employee for expenses related to maintenance of professional certifications, professional and official travel, meetings and occasions adequate to continue the professional development of the Employee and to adequately pursue necessary official and other functions for the department, not to exceed the budget and subject to prior approval by the County Administrator or his designee.

SECTION 15. <u>Indemnification</u>

The County shall defend, save harmless, and indemnify the Employee against any claim or demand or legal action, whether groundless or otherwise, arising out of an alleged act or omission occurring in the performance of the Employee's duties as **Assistant Director of Planning and Development**. The County or its insurance carrier will pay the amount of any settlement or judgment agreed to or rendered against the Employee and the County may agree to such settlement or the payment of a judgment with or without the express consent of the Employee. Any defense and/or indemnification of the Employee by the County shall be subject to all of the terms and conditions found in the County's Defense and Indemnification ordinance/policy.

SECTION 16. General Provisions

- A. The text herein shall constitute the entire agreement between the parties. Any amendment hereto shall be in writing and be executed by both parties.
- B. This agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the heirs at law and executors of the Employee.
- C. If any provision, or any portion thereof, contained in this agreement is held unconstitutional, invalid, or unenforceable, the remainder of this agreement, or portion thereof, shall be deemed severable, shall not be affected, and shall remain in full force and effect.

EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT Assistant Director of Planning and Development

- D. This agreement will become effective on the <u>5th</u> day of February, 2024, and shall continue thereafter unless or until the agreement is terminated by either party as set forthherein.
- E. This agreement shall be executed in duplicate, each of which shall be deemed to be complete of itself and may be introduced into evidence or used for any purpose without the production of the other copy.



 - b. All costs associated with any required right-of-way improvements shall be the Developer's responsibility.

Public Forum:

Wes Robinson, 200 E.E. Butler Parkway, Gainesville, spoke in opposition. Concerns were the agreement with neighboring property owners when rezoning was approved.

Summary Analysis

The applicant is requesting to amend conditions of a Planned Residential Development (PRD, <u>17.180.060</u>) on a combined 97.48± acres. The subject parcels were rezoned from Agricultural Residential-III (AR-III, <u>17.110</u>) to Planned Residential Development (PRD, <u>17.180.060</u>) on December 9, 2021 for a 195 lot single family development.

Per the submitted narrative and renderings, the applicant is requesting to allow for garages that extend up to 10 feet and 6 inches further than the habitable area of the first story toward the front property line and for the width of the garages to increase from the previously approved maximum width of 45% to 56%.

The amended development standards for the project are described in the table below and are compared with the current Planned Residential Development requirements, (PRD, <u>17.180.060</u>):

No other modifications to the originally approved zoning conditions were requested.

Based on the future land-use plan, staff finds the requested zoning designation <u>is *consistent*</u> with the Hall **County** <u>Comprehensive Plan</u>. The <u>Comprehensive Plan's</u> future land use designation for the subject parcels is "Residential." The intent of this land use category is to preserve established neighborhoods and create new residential development consistent with surrounding suburban densities. Future development is envisioned to consist of detached single-family homes at a density of no greater than two unit per acre.

Zoning Analysis

Per Planning Commission and Hall County Commission consideration and decision (<u>17.380.060</u>), the Planning Commission shall study the need and justification for the change based on a determination of the facts applicable to the particular case, and the following general lines of inquiry shall be considered, to wit:

- Whether the zoning proposal will permit a use that is suitable in view of the use, development and zoning of adjacent and nearby property; The proposed use associated with the requested amendment to the Planned Residential Development (PRD <u>17.180.060</u>) is similar in use, development and zoning of adjacent and nearby properties; however, higher in density.
- 2. Whether the zoning proposal will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property; No, it is not anticipated that the proposed amendment will adversely affect adjacent properties.
- 3. Whether the property to be affected by the zoning proposal has a reasonable economic use as currently zoned; Yes, the property has reasonable economic use as currently zoned, Planned Residential Development (PRD <u>17.180.060</u>).

- 4. Whether the zoning proposal will result in a use which will or could cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, utilities, schools, police protection, fire protection, public health facilities or emergency medical service; The amendment of conditions should not cause an excessive or burdensome use of the existing streets, utilities or public services.
- 5. Whether the zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the future land use plan for the physical development of the area; The proposed use is consistent with the <u>Comprehensive Plan's</u> future land use classification of Residential. In this land use classification, development is envisioned to consist of detached, single-family residences at a moderate density, not to exceed 2 dwelling units per acre. The applicant is proposing single-family residences at a density of 2 dwelling units per acre; however, the requested amendment is unrelated to approved density.
- 6. The extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions; Absent a market study, staff is unable to determine whether property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions.
- 7. The extent to which the destruction of the subject property's value under the existing zoning promotes the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public; **Staff is unable to comment on the impact** of property values without a full market analysis. Multiple factors impact property value including construction types, proposed uses, and maintenance. Often it is difficult to determine the effect of a development on adjacent properties until the development is completed.
- 8. The relative gain to the public as compared to the hardship imposed upon the individual property owner; **Staff has not identified a hardship imposed on the property owner as the property is currently zoned.**
- 9. The length of time the property has been vacant as zoned considered in the context of land development in the area in the vicinity of the property; Tax Parcels 15036A000001, 15036A000003 & 15036A000011 are currently developed with a single residence, with no record of improvements upon the land. The subject parcels were rezoned from Agricultural Residential-III (AR-III, <u>17.110</u>) to Planned Residential Development (PRD, <u>17.180.060</u>) in 2021, for the purpose of developing a 192 single-family development
- Whether there are other existing or changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property which give supporting grounds for either approval or disapproval of the zoning proposal;
 There are no known changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property.
- 11. Whether the change would create an isolated district unrelated to the surrounding districts; The current request is a conditional use request, and is intended to amend conditions of an existing PRD. Per the Official Code of Hall County, the Planned Development District (<u>17.180</u>) is to be utilized as a "floating zone" which shall mean that areas will not be pre-designated as planned development districts but rather each such designation shall result from a specific and separate application for amendment.

- 12. Whether the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn in relation to existing conditions in the area; **There is no evidence that the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn.**

The development should conform to the existing character and development pattern of the surrounding area.

<u>17.350.040.</u> - Submission requirements

An application shall be submitted to the planning department at least 30 working days prior to the date of the planning commission meeting or zoning board of adjustment meeting at which the application is to be considered. The completed application shall be accompanied by payment of such fee prescribed in <u>chapter</u> <u>17.30</u> hereof to cover administrative and advertising costs. The following items of information shall be supplied by the applicant as set forth in <u>chapter 17.350</u>. The applicant submitted to the planning department more than 30 days prior to the meeting date and has paid the application fee.

 - 1. The development shall generally occur as depicted on the site plan and described in the project narrative. Minimum lot standards shall be as follows:
 - a. Minimum lot width: 50 feet
 - b. Minimum lot depth: 125 feet
 - c. Minimum lot area: 6,250 square feet
 - d. Minimum average lot area: 8,000 square feet
 - e. Front setback: 20 feet from right of way with minimum of 25 feet from rear of sidewalk to face of garage
 - f. Side setback: 5 feet, subject to Fire Department approval

- g. Rear setback: 20 feet
- 2. There shall be no more than 125 total units in the development, equaling a density of 2.5 units per acre.
- 3. The following statement regarding the potential impacts of agricultural operations in the area shall be made a part of any plat recorded on the property: "Owners, occupants, and users of property shown on this plat are hereby informed of the impacts associated with normal farming practices which may take place on adjacent and nearby property including, but not limited to, noise, odors, dust, the operation of machinery of any kind, the storage and disposal of manure, and the application of fertilizers, herbicides, and pesticides. Therefore, owners, occupants, and users of the property shown on this plat should be prepared to expect the effects of such practices."
- 4. A 6-foot-tall wooden privacy fence will be constructed along the northern property line adjacent to parcel #15043 000203 within 60 days of issuance of the land disturbance permit (LDP).
- 5. The northern entrance depicted on the site plan nearest to Steeple Chase Lane shall be removed. The southern entry shall be the only entrance provided and shall include a deceleration lane.
- 2. The property shall be developed in accordance with the project narrative dated 11/16/2023 and site plan dated 6/21/2023, modified as necessary for compliance with conditions herein and development standards enforced at the time of site plan approval.
- 3. Front-entry garage orientation may be semi-flush with the front façade, measuring between 5 and 20 feet behind the front façade or extending the same measurement toward the street. Garage door width shall not exceed 43% of the width of the front façade of the residence.
- 4. Building elevations shall be composed of a mixture of cement siding, stone, and/or brick façade, with a minimum of brick or stone accents on the front of the homes. The balance of the home may be the same material or of fiber-cement material. Vinyl siding is prohibited. Homes shall be consistent with the submitted renderings. Final review and approval of building elevations is subject to the Director of Community Development and Infrastructure, or their designee.
- 5. The development shall be limited to a maximum of two (2) model homes prior to recording of the final plat.
- 6. All conditions of zoning shall be made a part of any plats or construction plans created for the subdivision.

Public Forum:

There were no comments in support or opposition.

Summary Analysis

The applicant is requesting to amend conditions of a Planned Residential Development (PRD, <u>17.180.060</u>). The subject parcel was originally rezoned from Agricultural Residential-III (AR-III, <u>17.110</u>) to Planned Residential Development (PRD, <u>17.180.060</u>) on June 22, 2022 for a 125 lot single-family development.

Per the submitted narrative and renderings, the applicant is requesting to allow for a semi-flush front entry garage that extends between five and twenty feet toward the street beyond the front façade of the

residence, as well as allowing for the garage door width to measure 43% of the front façade as opposed to 40%. Additionally, the applicant is requesting approval for two model home permits. The original rezoning application in 2022 did not include any specific architectural designs and therefore would be required to meet the standards of the PRD code.

The amended development standards for the project are described in the table below and are compared with the current Planned Residential Development requirements, (PRD, <u>17.180.060</u>):

Note: Items marked with an asterisk (*) do not conform to $17.180.060$.				

No other modifications to the originally approved zoning conditions were requested.

Based on the future land-use plan, staff finds the requested zoning designation <u>is *not consistent*</u> with the Hall County <u>Comprehensive Plan</u>. The <u>Comprehensive Plan's</u> future land use designation for the subject parcels is "Residential." The intent of this land use category is to preserve established neighborhoods and create new residential development consistent with surrounding suburban densities. Future development is envisioned to consist of detached single-family homes at a density of no greater than two unit per acre.

Zoning Analysis

Per Planning Commission and Hall County Commission consideration and decision (<u>17.380.060</u>), the planning commission shall study the need and justification for the change based on a determination of the facts applicable to the particular case, and the following general lines of inquiry shall be considered, to wit:

- 1. Whether the zoning proposal will permit a use that is suitable in view of the use, development and zoning of adjacent and nearby property; The proposed use associated with the requested amendment to the Planned Residential Development (PRD <u>17.180.060</u>) is similar in use, development and zoning of adjacent and nearby properties; however, higher in density.
- 2. Whether the zoning proposal will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property; No, it is not anticipated that the proposed amendments will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property.
- Whether the property to be affected by the zoning proposal has a reasonable economic use as currently zoned; Yes, the property has reasonable economic use as currently zoned, Planned Residential Development (PRD <u>17.180.060</u>).
- 4. Whether the zoning proposal will result in a use which will or could cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, utilities, schools, police protection, fire protection, public health facilities or emergency medical service; **The amendment of conditions should not cause** an excessive or burdensome use of the existing streets, utilities or public services.

- 5. Whether the zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the future land use plan for the physical development of the area; Garage door orientation is not specifically referenced within the Comprehensive Plan. The subject property falls within the "Residential" land use designation.
- 6. The extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions; Absent a market study, staff is unable to determine whether property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions.
- 7. The extent to which the destruction of the subject property's value under the existing zoning promotes the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public; **Staff is unable to comment on the impact of property values without a full market analysis. Multiple factors impact property value including construction types, proposed uses, and maintenance. Often it is difficult to determine the effect of a development on adjacent properties until the development is completed.**
- 8. The relative gain to the public as compared to the hardship imposed upon the individual property owner; Staff has not identified a hardship imposed on the property owner as the property is currently zoned.
- The length of time the property has been vacant as zoned considered in the context of land development in the area in the vicinity of the property; Tax parcel 15043 000001 is currently undeveloped, with no record of past improvements upon the land. The subject parcel was rezoned from Agricultural Residential-III (AR-III, <u>17.110</u>) to Planned Residential Development (PRD, <u>17.180.060</u>) in 2022.
- 10. Whether there are other existing or changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property which give supporting grounds for either approval or disapproval of the zoning proposal; There are no known changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property.
- 11. Whether the change would create an isolated district unrelated to the surrounding districts; The current request is a conditional use request, and is intended to amend conditions of an existing PRD. Per the Official Code of Hall County, the Planned Development District (<u>17.180</u>) is to be utilized as a "floating zone" which shall mean that areas will not be pre-designated as planned development districts but rather each such designation shall result from a specific and separate application for amendment.
- 12. Whether the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn in relation to existing conditions in the area; **There is no evidence that the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn.**
- 13. Whether the change requested is out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole or the immediate neighborhood; No, the request is not out of scale with the needs of the neighborhood or the county.

- 14. Whether it is impossible to find adequate sites for the proposed use in districts permitting such use and already appropriately zoned; There are no other properties within the county that are currently zoned to support the specific development being proposed without requiring zoning action.
- 15. Whether the need for rezoning could be handled instead by a variance request to the zoning board of adjustment; **No, the request could not be handled instead by a variance.**
- 16. Whether there would be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from major modifications to the land if the request is granted; Any land disturbance activities on the property shall be required to go through the land development permitting process, and as a result are subject to local, state, and federal regulations. As a result, there are no anticipated ecological or pollution impacts resulting from any modification to the land if the request is granted.
- 17. Whether there is reasonable evidence based upon existing and anticipated land use that would indicate a mistake was made in the original zoning of the property; **There is no indication that a mistake was made in the original zoning.**

A Planned Residential Development (PRD, <u>17.180.080</u>) allows for more flexibility in the design and development of the property. This provides for a mixture of housing types and encourages maximum use of natural features through proper site planning measures. The development should conform to the existing character and development pattern of the surrounding area.

<u>17.350.040.</u> - Submission requirements for a conditional use request

An application shall be submitted to the planning department at least 30 working days prior to the date of the planning commission meeting or zoning board of adjustment meeting at which the application is to be considered. The completed application shall be accompanied by payment of such fee prescribed in <u>chapter</u> <u>17.30</u> hereof to cover administrative and advertising costs. The following items of information shall be supplied by the applicant as set forth in <u>chapter 17.350</u>. The applicant submitted to the planning department more than 30 days prior to the meeting date and has paid the application fee.

17.380.050. - Submission requirements

- A. Any person or persons requesting a change in the official zoning map or use subject to approval of the county commission shall file an application with a plat or map of the property attached thereto, together with payment of such fees set forth in <u>chapter 17.30</u> to cover administrative and advertising costs, in the planning department office. Such person or persons or their authorized agent shall appear in person at the public hearing held to consider the district change. Proposal meets the requirement. Applicant has paid the appropriate fees and understands that someone must be present at both the Hall County Planning Commission meeting and the voting meeting of the Hall County Board of Commissioners.
- B. All applications for a change of zoning classification or use subject to approval of the county commission shall include:
 - A narrative statement identifying the existing and proposed use of the property and addressing each of the criteria set forth in section 17.380.060.C of this section [chapter].
 Proposal does provide a narrative outlining amendment request; however, the applicant has not prepared a response to each of the criteria listed in <u>17.380.060.C</u>.

- 2. A site plan drawn to scale designating the area covered by the application and identifying existing and proposed buildings and uses, adjacent existing land uses, zoning on contiguous parcels, including those across an abutting public right-of-way, and any other significant site improvements proposed to accommodate the proposed use or buffer adjacent uses, etc., or a plat of the subject property where no specific land use is proposed. In cases where only a plat or map is provided and no land use is proposed, the planning commission and county commission shall evaluate the application based on the most intense possible land use permitted in the proposed district. The applicant has submitted an approved rezoning site plan; however, information about adjacent properties has not been provided.
- C. For any application for a slow rate land treatment system (see <u>chapter 17.20</u>), the following additional requirements apply. **This standard is not applicable to the applicant's request.**
- D. For any application proposing the development of 100 or more residential dwelling units, a traffic impact study shall be submitted prior to consideration of the application by the planning commission. At the applicant's expense, the traffic impact study shall be prepared by a professional engineer in accordance with requirements established by the Hall County Engineering Department. The engineering department shall review the traffic impact study and forward any comments to the Hall County Planning Commission. A traffic impact study was conducted for the original proposed development in 2022. Suggested improvements have been included in the conditions of approval.


The applicant wishes to amendment the existing PUD zoning for 4670 Union Church Road to further clarify the typical product elevations and garage placement. The applicant seeks approval to (1) add the attached elevations to the PUD zoning showing garage placement, (2) add a condition for 2 early model home permits and (3) clarify the carriage-style garage doors may be up to 43% of the front façade of the home instead of 40%.

The homes will be consistent with the original application (the applicant is proposing a minimum heated floor area of 2,000 square feet for single story homes and 2,200 square feet for two story homes). This PRD modification application includes detailed architectural design guidelines and standards to replace PRD Code Section 17.180.060.(B) 9. Architectural standards. The original approved PUD zoning included only a lot exhibit and lacked a detailed product description and strict application of the ordinance may result in the homes encroaching, or not fitting, within the approved side setbacks without removing the typical 12" roof overhang, which is common in other PUD zonings and for higher-end homes in Hall County, generally.

Attached are the proposed product elevations that go with the lot exhibit garage placement that was approved on June 22, 2022.






PARTIAL FIRST FLOOR PLAN W/ OPT. 4' GARAGE EXT.

PARTIAL SECOND FLOOR PLAN



Staff recommends <u>DENIAL</u> of the applicant's request. However, if the Planning Commission sees fit to approve this application, staff recommends the following conditions:

- 1. The property shall be developed in accordance with the site plan dated December 5, 2023, and as described in the project narrative submitted on December 5, 2023, modified as necessary for compliance with conditions herein and development standards enforced at the time of site plan approval.
- 2. The development shall be limited to 125 residential units.
- 3. All residences and amenities within the development shall connect to Sardis Road right-of-way by internal sidewalks no less than five (5) feet in width constructed on both sides of all internal streets.
- 4. The minimum heated floor area (HFA) of each residential unit shall be 2,000 square feet.
- 5. Building elevations shall be composed of a mixture of cement siding, stone, and/or brick façade, with a minimum of brick or stone accents on the front of the homes. The balance of the home may be the same material or of fiber-cement material. Vinyl siding is prohibited. Homes shall be consistent with

the submitted renderings. Final review and approval of building elevations is subject to the Director of Community Development and Infrastructure, or their designee.

- 6. All designated open space within the development shall be commonly held, and not owned by any individual homeowner(s).
- 7. No less than 75% of the designated Open Space within the development shall be contiguous.
- 8. The recommendations of the traffic study, subject to the review and approval by Hall County Traffic Engineering, shall be implemented. Any cost associated with these improvements shall be the responsibility of the developer. No variances to traffic standards shall be granted as part of this request.
- 9. The development shall be served by public sewer, with the obtainment of all required easements and other construction costs such as a lift station and force main to be the responsibility of the developer.
- 10. All amenities depicted in the site plan submitted on December 5, 2023 are to be constructed within the development. The pocket park shall be constructed before more than 50% of certificates of occupancy are issued for the entire development.
- 11. The development shall be limited to a maximum of three (3) model homes per phase prior to approval and recording of the final plat.
- 12. All stream buffers must be fully maintained on homeowners' association common space and shall not encroach onto any individual residential building lot.
- 13. No variances or development exceptions are granted as part of this request that are not explicitly granted by board approval. The development shall be compliant with the Official Code of Hall County.
- 14. All conditions of zoning shall be made part of any plats created for the subdivision.

The following should be considered as exceptions to the Official Code of Hall County and shall warrant further determination by the Board, should it choose to approve the submitted narrative and site plan:

- 17.180.060.B.2.a Lot area.
 - Minimum lot area standards of 8,000 square feet for lots served by sanitary sewer.
 - The applicant has proposed a minimum lot size of 4,848 square feet, with an average lot size of 7,019 square feet.
 - The overall gross density not to exceed two units per acre. The minimum lot area for lots without access to sanitary sewer shall be determined by the requirements of the county environmental health department.
 - The applicant has proposed an overall gross density of 2.995 units per acre.
- 17.180.060.B.11.d Parking.
 - Parking shall conform to requirements specified in chapter 17.250, in addition to any parking and loading requirements or accessibility guidelines pertaining to the Americans with Disabilities Act. On-street parking is prohibited in all planned residential developments. Offstreet parking areas that make it necessary for vehicles to back out directly into a public road, street, or highway are prohibited in all planned residential developments. The following minimum parking ratios must be met for all cluster mailbox units (CBU's).
 - The applicant has proposed on-street parking spaces to serve the CBU.

Dale Morris, 199 Plus Road, Cleveland, spoke in favor. Spoke about the quality the development will bring to the area.

Barclay Fouts, 4315 Price Road, Gainesville, spoke in opposition. Concerns were character of the area, density, and PRD requirements.

Barron Grant, 4601 Will Wallace Road, Gainesville, spoke in opposition. Concerns were density.

Kylie Cochran, 4359 Sardis Road, Gainesville, spoke in opposition. Concerns were density, traffic, turn lane, and buffers.

Jeff Dale, 5934 Bark Camp Road, Murrayville, spoke in opposition. Concerns were inconsistency with the comprehensive plan, sewer route, and lot sizes.

Todd Clark, 4581 Will Wallace, Gainesville, spoke in opposition. Concerns were traffic and inconsistency with the comprehensive plan.

Summary Analysis

The applicant is requesting to rezone $41.74\pm$ acres of Agricultural Residential III (AR-III <u>17.110</u>) zoned property to Planned Residential Development (PRD, <u>17.180.060</u>) for the purpose of constructing a 125-lot single-family development with a gross density of 2.995± units per acre.

The submitted site plan and renderings depict two-story residences with footprints no less than 1,320 square feet, including attached garage space. The submitted planning statement notes that housing materials may include cedar shake, wood, brick, and stone, in addition to other materials permitted within Hall County design standards. Based on the three provided renderings, all homes will feature attached, front-entry garages suitable for two vehicles. The garage doors will be recessed from the front wall plane of each residence, and extend approximately 40% of the width of each house, based on staff scaling off the submitted renderings. The Planned Residential Development (PRD, <u>17.180.060</u>) standards dictate that front-entry garages shall be recessed at least five feet from the front wall plane, and the width of the garage shall be no greater than 40% of the width of the front of the residence (<u>17.180.060(B)(9)</u>). The applicant has not identified this as a variance from the PRD standards; therefore, without further action, either a variance is needed, or the homes must comply with this provision at the time of permitting.

Based on the submitted survey, the property is currently developed with a storage building, dirt/gravel driveway, and a fence through the middle of the property. Also located on the survey is a wooden building, which encroaches 4.4 feet across the northern property line as well as several encroaching fences to the north. The parcel is predominantly forested, and also features pasture in the eastern portion of the property. The survey also shows a pond contained by a dam on the northwest portion of the property, as well as a stream and associated stream buffers.

The concept plan submitted by the applicant shows a single access point to serve the development from Sardis Road, along which the subject parcel has 180.3 feet of frontage. The Hall County Traffic Engineer has provided comments that the proposed internal streets do not meet the construction standards of <u>Title 16</u>. Additionally, dual cul-de-sacs and on-street parking to serve the cluster mailbox unit (CBU), as depicted in the site plan, are not permitted.

The development will include 5-foot-wide sidewalks on both sides of the street to provide pedestrian connectivity between all residences and Sardis Road. A series of paved walking trails have also been proposed throughout the development as well as a pocket park near the development entrance.

The submitted documents indicate that a monument-type sign for the subdivision will be provided at the entrance. Per county sign regulations, residential sign area is determined by the number of lots within a development. Based on the application materials, the development will be limited to one monument-style entrance sign, not to exceed six feet in height, with a face no greater than 32 square feet in area (17.270.070(A)(2)).

Amenities for the community will include the pocket park and walking trails, in addition to accessible open space. The proposed walking trails will be connected by the sidewalks along internal roads.

Per the submitted narrative, sanitary sewer will be provided by the City of Gainesville, and the details of service are still being determined. It is unclear how a physical connection will be facilitated, since the nearest sewer line is located approximately one (1) mile to the east. A water line exists along Sardis Road, providing a nearby water connection.

The existing pond on the subject property is dammed upstream. All natural water features and the associated buffers would be commonly owned according to the submitted site plan.

Several variances have been identified as part of this request. Any deficiencies identified as part of the plan will be required to comply with the requirements of the PRD unless expressly granted by the board in the conditions of approval.

Based on the future land-use plan, staff finds the requested zoning designation is <u>not consistent</u> with the Hall County <u>Comprehensive Plan</u> future land use designation of "Lake Area Residential." The intent of this character area is to preserve established neighborhoods and create permanent and vacation residences. Future development will continue to be detached, single family homes at low densities. The Lake Area Residential designation envisions a maximum density of one (1) dwelling unit per acre, lower than the maximum density requirement within a Planned Residential Development (PRD, <u>17.180.060</u>) of two (2) dwelling units per acre. The development has proposed a density of 2.995 units per acre.

Zoning Analysis

When considering a zoning amendment to the zoning maps, the following items must be considered:

- 1. Whether the zoning proposal will permit a use that is suitable in view of the use and development of adjacent and nearby property; The zoning proposal may be suitable given the context of the surrounding area with respect to the land use, though the proposed development is denser than the surrounding development with an overall density of 2.995± units per acre. The surrounding area consists of low- and medium-density residential and agricultural uses, as well as vacant parcels. Sardis Heights, the residential subdivision directly to the north, has an overall density of 1.90± units per acre.
- 2. Whether the zoning proposal will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property; No, it is not anticipated that the proposed residential use will adversely affect adjacent properties.

- 3. Whether the property to be affected by the zoning proposal has reasonable economic use as currently zoned. The property appears to have reasonable economic use as currently zoned, Agricultural Residential III (AR-III <u>17.110</u>).
- 4. Whether the zoning proposal will result in a use which will or could cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, or utilities; The zoning proposal is not anticipated to result in an excessive or burdensome use of local infrastructure. A traffic study was conducted by Kimley Horn, and the needed improvements to Sardis Road have been identified. The installation of a southbound right turn lane into the development on Sardis Road has been recommended. No additional roadway improvements are recommended.
- 5. Whether the zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the land use plan; The proposed use is not consistent with the Comprehensive Plan and the "Lake Area Residential" land use designation. Density is envisioned to be a maximum of one (1) dwelling unit per acre. The proposed development has an overall density of 2.995± units per acre.
- 6. The extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions; Staff is unable to determine the extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions. The proposed development includes the removal of the existing wastewater treatment pond at the rear of the property.
- 7. The extent to which the destruction of the subject property's value under the existing zoning promotes the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public; Staff is unable to comment on the impact of property values without a full market analysis. Multiple factors impact property value including construction types, proposed uses, and maintenance. Often it is difficult to determine the effect of a development on adjacent properties until the development is completed.
- The relative gain to the public as compared to the hardship imposed upon the individual property owner;
 Staff has not identified a hardship imposed on the property owner as the property is currently zoned.
- **9.** The length of time the property has been vacant as zoned considered in the context of land development in the area in the vicinity of the property; Tax parcel <u>10075 000004</u> appears to be in an extended period of vacancy; the present storage building and driveway are in disrepair.
- **10.** Whether there are other existing or changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property which give supporting grounds for either approval or disapproval of the zoning proposal; **Staff is not aware of any changing conditions that affect the use and development of the property.**
- 11. Whether the change would create an isolated district unrelated to the surrounding districts; The proposed zoning is a Planned Residential Development (PRD, <u>17.180.060</u>). Per the Official Code of Hall County, Planned Development Districts (<u>17.180</u>) are to be utilized as a "floating zone" which shall mean that areas will not be pre-designated as planned development districts but rather each such designation shall result from a specific and separate application for amendment.
- **12.** Whether the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn in relation to existing conditions in the area; **There is no evidence that the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn.**
- **13.** Whether the change requested is out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole or the immediate neighborhood; **The proposed density is higher than that found on immediately surrounding properties,**

but in general, the request does not appear to be out of scale with the needs of the County as a whole, as there is a need for additional housing.

- 14. Whether it is impossible to find adequate sites for the proposed use in districts permitting such use and already appropriately zoned; There are other properties within the County that support high-density, single-family residential uses based on the Future Land Use Map, though the development as proposed cannot be developed in any of the existing residential or multi-family districts.
- **15.** Whether the need for rezoning could be handled instead by a variance request to the [Planning Commission]; **The request could not be handled alternatively as a variance.**
- **16.** Whether there would be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from major modifications to the land if the request is granted; **Staff is unable to determine the extent to which ecological and pollution impacts may occur as a result of the applicant's request.**
- 17. Whether there is reasonable evidence based upon existing and anticipated land use that would indicate a mistake was made in the original zoning of the property; There is no indication that a mistake was made in the original zoning.

A Planned Residential Development (PRD, <u>17.180.060</u>) allows for more flexibility in the design and development of the property. This provides for a mixture of housing types and encourages maximum use of natural features through proper site planning measures. The development should conform to the existing character and development pattern of the surrounding area.

17.380.050. - Submission requirements

- A. Any person or persons requesting a change in the official zoning map or use subject to approval of the county commission shall file an application with a plat or map of the property attached thereto, together with payment of such fees set forth in <u>chapter 17.30</u> to cover administrative and advertising costs, in the planning department office. Such person, or persons, or their authorized agent shall appear in person at the public hearing held to consider the district change. The proposal meets the requirement. The applicant has paid the appropriate fees and understands that someone must be present at both the Hall County Planning Commission meeting and the voting meeting of the Hall County Board of Commissioners.
- B. All applications for a change of zoning classification or use subject to approval of the county commission shall include:
 - 1. A narrative statement identifying the existing and proposed use of the property and addressing each of the criteria set forth in section 17.380.060.C of this section [chapter]. The proposal provides a detailed narrative outlining the intent of the development; however, the applicant has not prepared a response to each of the criteria listed in <u>17.380.060.C</u>.
 - 2. A site plan drawn to scale designating the area covered by the application and identifying existing and proposed buildings and uses, adjacent existing land uses, zoning on contiguous parcels, including those across an abutting public right-of-way, and any other significant site improvements proposed to accommodate the proposed use or buffer adjacent uses, etc., or a plat of the subject property where no specific land use is proposed. In cases where only a plat or map is provided and no land use is proposed, the planning commission and county commission shall evaluate the application based on the most intense possible land use permitted in the proposed district. **The proposal does meet the requirement. The applicant**

has provided a site plan and included much of the necessary information to properly assess the development. However, information about parcels on the opposite side of Sardis Road is limited.

- C. For any application for a slow rate land treatment system (see <u>chapter 17.20</u>), the following additional requirements apply. This standard is not applicable, as the site development does not include a slow rate land treatment system. The proposed development will be serviced by Gainesville Sewer.
- D. For any application proposing the development of 100 or more residential dwelling units, a traffic impact study shall be submitted prior to consideration of the application by the planning commission. At the applicant's expense, the traffic impact study shall be prepared by a professional engineer in accordance with requirements established by the Hall County Engineering Department. The engineering department shall review the traffic impact study and forward any comments to the Hall County Planning Commission. The proposal does meet the requirement. A traffic study has been conducted, identifying the needed improvements to Sardis Road in the form of a southbound right turn lanes. No additional roadway improvements are recommended. No off-site mitigation is identified for the future build condition as a result of the proposed subdivision.

Development Support and Constraints

Hall County Environmental Health

In an email dated December 11, Emily McGahee stated "No comment, public sewer."

Hall County Fire Marshal

In an email dated December 12, John Tucker, Deputy Fire Marshal, stated the following:

"There are no proposed hydrants in the subdivision."

Hall County Public Works and Utilities

In a memorandum from Public Works and Utilities dated December 15, 2023, Bill Nash, Director, stated the following:

Engineering:

This site may require a stormwater management report should the site plan indicate the proposed development meets stormwater thresholds for impervious surfaces and/or disturbed acreage. Show stream buffer and impervious setback from wrested vegetation, not centerline of stream.

Traffic:

Per Hall County code 16.60.290, a left turn lane (in addition to a decel lane) is required. Roadways depicted in the site do not meet Hall County subdivision regulations (Hall County Code Title 16). Any variances to these regulations will need to specific, justified and considered/approved during the rezoning process.

Dual cul-de-sacs depicted on one roadway is [sic] not permitted.

No parking spaces along roadways permitted. Mail kiosk site will need to be modified per our typical.

Utilities:

Hall County/ Gainesville Sewer District – no connection within feasible distance.

Georgia Department of Transportation

In an email dated December 14, Veronica Chavers, D1TO Civil Engineer 3, stated "No GDOT coordination required."

Excerpts from the minutes of the January 16, 2024 meeting

Applicant's Presentation:

Katie Greenway, Principal Planner, presented a summary of the request.

Artagus Newell, 2727 Paces Ferry Road, Atlanta, presented the request. The applicant stated that the development will utilize sewer from the City of Gainesville and will be constructed to service this development only. The applicant stated it would not establish a potential for other developments. The applicant stated it would be a traditional for-sale development and they will provide a stormwater report.

Dominic Lawson, 2727 Paces Ferry Road, Atlanta, presented the request.

Rebuttal

Mr. Lawson clarified that the development will not consist of townhomes. Mr. Lawson stated that the buffer running along Ms. Cochran's property will have a 50-foot planted buffer to screen the property and that a decel lane would not disturb their property.

Planning Commission Comments:

Mr. Braswell questioned what the applicants would do to satisfy fire requirements since they will not have a second entrance. Mr. Lawson stated that they will widen the road to 26 feet. Mr. Hunt questioned if there would be a Homeowners Association. Mr. Lawson stated there would be. Ms. Pilcher questioned what the development will do to traffic and pointed out that the sewer line extends very far. Ms. Pilcher stated that the development is out of character for the area. Mr. Lawson stated that the traffic study addressed the traffic concern and proved there would only be a couple of seconds delay. Ms. Pilcher stated that the green space is not usable since it is stream buffers. Mr. Lawson stated that a pervious walking trail was possible for the open space. Mr. Varner questioned if the applicants have reached out to the school district. Mr. Lawson stated they have not. Mr. Varner stated that they are already 1,200 over capacity and there needs to be a balance of resources in the community.

SARDIS PARK – A NEW MASTER PLANNED COMMUNITY FOR HALL COUNTY

4363 SARDIS ROAD, GAINESVILLE, GA 30506

February 2, 2024

- 1. DLBP LLC is representing leading Grace of Georgia Developments LLC (the applicant) in petitioning to rezone 4363 Sardis Road (to be known as Sardis Park) from AR-III to PRD.
- 2. Sardis Park will be a master planned community to reach the demographic need of the Hall County community. Sardis Park will deliver 110 high-quality detached single-family homes set with a landscaped environment. Following the Planning Commission's consideration of the application on January 16, 2024, we have:
 - reduced the number of proposed lots from 125 to 110, reducing the density to 2.63 units per acre (Appendix 1 to this document is the amended site plan);
 - increased the lot size to a minimum of 8,000 square feet and increased lot widths;
 - sought additional input from a landscape specialist to produce further details of the landscape plan and strategy for the new community (Appendix 2 is the landscape plan);
 - prepared a tree screening packet (Appendix 3) to illustrate how the trees will serve as a visually effective buffer to shield the neighbors from Sardis Park; and
 - undertaken further analysis to confirm the likely number of children that will live in the new community and sought confirmation from the local schools that they have capacity to accommodate the demand that will be created.
- 3. This statement sets out further analysis that demonstrates that the application for rezoning can be supported. We hope that these points, along with the amendments to the proposal, and the further information to be submitted will kindly be considered by the Board of Commissioners at their meeting on February 22.

DENSITY, LANDSCAPING AND OPEN SPACE

- 4. We have reduced the number of proposed lots from 125 to 110, reducing the density to 2.63 units per acre. Lot sizes have increased to a minimum of 8,000 square feet to conform to all PRD requirements.
- 5. The master plan allows for 110 new homes on the property because it is proposed to be connected to an extended sewer (further details are below). Without this, on-site septic would be required which is worse for the environment. The cost of providing the extended sewer connection requires a higher number of new homes but, importantly, the minimum 8,000 square foot lot sizes will enable a better landscaping setting.
- 6. Specialist input has been provided by Kimley-Horn to prepare an additional plan to demonstrate the principles of the landscape and open space strategy. Further information is being prepared to be presented at the Board of Commissioners meeting. The key principles of the landscaping and open strategy are:
 - tree lined streets;
 - 50 evergreen buffer;
 - 3,894 linear feet (0.74 miles) of rural walking trails;
 - children's equipped play area;
 - outdoor exercise equipment; and
 - biodiversity enhancements such as native and species-rich planting.
- 7. The landscaping and open space will both quantitively and qualitatively provide a highquality environment for the future residents, giving them access to on-site amenities and the opportunity for existing neighbors to use as well.
- 8. A concept master tree plan and a concept landscape master plan has also been produced to illustrate the landscape treatments for the open space, buffers, parks, and entry points.
- 9. A tree screening packet is provided that illustrates how evergreen and deciduous trees will naturally serve as a buffer that shields the surrounding community from the master planned community. An illustrative rendering and example imagery from current communities is included. Current trees and added trees will be utilized to ensure the effectiveness of the veil. Sardis Park will not negatively affect the community, but rather serve as an asset by utilizing nature-based design to protect both the privacy of the neighbors and the Sardis Park community.

PRECEDENT AND QUALITY

- 10. The proposal to develop the land at Sardis Road is bespoke and not easily replicated. This is because the design of the master plan has been informed by the particular characteristics of the site and the developer's approach.
- 11. Firstly, Sardis Park will be served by an extended sewer via force main from the City of Gainesville. The cost of providing this infrastructure will be borne solely by the developer, and once operational the sewer will be transferred to the city as a public utility. Other properties will not be able to connect to the sewer because a force main is a high pressure closed system, which cannot accept intermediate connections unless designed to from the outset (which ours is not).
- 12. The bespoke nature of the master plan along with the architectural quality and enhanced landscaping, open space and environmental benefits will mean that the development will not be easily replicated by subdivisions on the surrounding properties.
- 13. However, we firmly believe that the quality of the new homes and their setting will result in an exemplar development that, as the new Comprehensive Plan is prepared, will 'raise the bar' for the design of new homes in the County.

EDUCATION CAPACITY

- 14. An analysis has also been conducted on the number of persons under 18 that Sardis Park would establish. Sourcing data from the United States Census Bureau into a formula, Sardis Park would 'yield' approximately 85 children under 18 when the development is fully built out.
- 15. It is clearly the case that with only approximately 20-25 children from the new community attending each of the elementary, middle and high schools (with no under 5s attending school of course), that there will be no harmful impact as the local schools can easily accommodate these numbers. This position has already been confirmed to us by Sardis Elementary School. It has a maximum capacity of 750 students and there are just 550 enrolled in the current academic year, and so it has a supply of 200 spaces. Therefore, Sardis Elementary is 200 students under maximum capacity some 26% of its capacity is not being used. So rather than being a burden, in fact the development of Sardis Park will be a boost to the school system, ensuring that the schools are being used efficiently and the new children contributing to the local community.

LEGAL CONTEXT AND OVERALL ACCORDANCE WITH THE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

16. Georgia state law requires rezoning decisions based on <u>all</u> aspects of the Comprehensive Plan and the Standards from the Zoning Law of Georgia. Sardis Park follows:

- Development Pattern and Resource Conservation standards within the Hall County Comprehensive Plan; and
- The History: Code 1981, § 36-67-2, enacted by Ga. L. 1985, p. 1178, § 1. § 36-67-3. within the Georgia zoning proposal review standards:

"In any local government which has established a planning department or other similar agency charged with the duty of reviewing zoning proposals, such planning department or other agency shall with respect to each of the matters enumerated in the Code section...with which the planning department or agency shall be required to make such investigation and recommendation shall be:

- *i.* Whether the zoning proposal will permit a use that is suitable in view of the use and development of adjacent and nearby property. Sardis Park satisfies the spirit and intent for a rural open space concept, as previously mentioned, due to the open space and tree protection and additions, the well-designed buffers, and the high-quality and rural feel of the proposed layout.
- *ii.* Whether the zoning proposal will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent and nearby property. The zoning proposal will not adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent and nearby property. Existing neighbors will still enjoy their homes and way of life, while having a well-buffered new neighborhood of finely crafted homes and amenities that will increase property values for all.
- iii. Whether the property to be affected by the zoning proposal has a reasonable economic use as currently zoned. The current zoning of AR-III has served little purpose recently, not being farmed or used for any agricultural purposes. The property is simply not large enough for large scale commercial agriculture uses, and those uses would involve noisy equipment, noxious odors, the use of large farm machinery in and out of the property, and other farming protocol requirements that would be more disturbing to neighbors, than a quiet, upscale residential neighborhood.
- Whether the zoning proposal will result in a use which will or could cause an excessive or burdensome use of streets, transportation facilities, utilities, or schools. As referenced in sections 14-16 and provided in the traffic impact study, the proposed development will produce minimal impacts.
- v. If the local government has an adopted land use plan, whether the zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and <u>intent</u> of the land use plan. As aforementioned.
- vi. Whether there are other existing or changing conditions affecting the use and development of the property which give supporting grounds for either approval or disapproval of the zoning proposal." This relates to the growing population within Hall County.
 - 17. The goal for Hall County's Vision 2030 is to preserve the green space in Hall County and promote a "culture of wellness" within Hall County, as referenced in sections 10 and 12.

- 18. To reiterate, it is wholly appropriate for the Board of Commissions to approve a rezoning even after the planning staff and Planning Commission recommend denial, as is demonstrated in the rezoning case ZON2021-00039.
- 19. Sardis Park provides a sustainable development that appreciates privacy, rural characteristics, and exceeds the high-quality standards of Hall County, while catering towards a housing need for a growing population, as is evident via the Atlanta Regional Commission's projections and as stated in Hall County's Comprehensive Plan. As referenced in the Hall Chamber of Commerce's meeting on January 30, 2024, Hall County has the workforce, but not a place to live or "a place they [the Hall County community] want to live."
- 20. Based on the above reasoning, we request respectfully the approval of the rezoning of 4363 Sardis Rd, Gainesville, GA 30506 from AR-III to PRD.





Thank you so very much for all of the assistance with our rezoning request for 4363 Sardis Road. As part of following up on your email of November 21, 2023, DLBP is pleased to share the following updates:

- 1. Elevations: We have included photo elevations which show homes in a different County but with homes of similar design and facades. Please note, Hall County requirements for setbacks, etc. will be adhered to.
- 2. Typical lot layouts are shown, as prepared by DGM Land Planners. There are four typical lot layouts, due to varying sizes.
- 3. The 50' buffer is shown on the latest site-plan to be completely outside of the lots.
- 4. The site-plan has been amended, to show homes within the setbacks.
- 5. The 75' stream buffer is shown to comply with open space requirements.
- 6. The cluster mailbox is shown to be outside of the 50' buffer.
- 7. There is now one entrance sign, which is shown on the site-plan.
- 8. The open space amount is now 32.8%, comprising 13.7 acres, and exceeds the 30% PRD requirement.
- 9. The pathways are to be paved.
- 10. The traffic study is completed and part of the submittal.
- 11. The campaign contribution form has been submitted.
- 12. The applicant has come to an annexation agreement of the site with the City of Gainesville for public sanitary sewer from The City of Gainesville Water and Sewer Department, via force main from Walnut Grove Way. The sewer extension will be paid for by the developer, and then dedicated to the City of Gainesville

Water and Sewer Department. A force main is necessary, due to topographic changes from the low point (1,200') of the development to the high point (1,300') near Sardis, Price, and Short Roads. The force main, by its nature, will prevent any other tie-ins, and thus, would not open other parcels for development, nor public sewer access, but will only serve the development at 4363 Sardis Road.



B. SUMMARY AND CONCLUSIONS

- 1. This Planning Statement is the Summary of Intent for the rezoning application to the Hall County Planning Commission and Board of Commissioners (the "Council" or the "Commission") regarding a proposal for a Planned Residential Development at 4363 Sardis Road, Gainesville, GA 30506 (the "Site" or "Property"), with associated access, parking, landscaping, and site infrastructure, for which the applicant is seeking a rezoning to Planned Residential Development (PRD). The detailed application was developed with consideration of the Hall County 2040 and 2017-2037 Comprehensive Plan, the Future Land Use Map, and feedback from the surrounding Hall County and Gainesville community.
- 2. Sardis Park is a proposed planned residential development community that will bring full-time residents, families and communities together in a location that allows them to escape the hustle and bustle of the city life, while still enjoying Hall County's excellent schools, healthcare infrastructure, and access to Lake Lanier and the nearby north Georgia Mountains.
- The proposed community directly supports a growing need for housing among Hall County's growing population, which grew by approximately 84% between 2010 and 2022¹ with a 41% projected growth rate by 2050².
- 4. Within the Hall County market, home prices appreciated 21.1% in 2022, with low unemployment and high job growth fueling demand for housing. This has put pressure for new development on the county and its communities of Braselton, Buford, Flowery Branch, Gainesville, Gillsville, Lula, Oakwood, and Clermont. As Hall County's population grows, housing stock and choice must also expand to meet increased demand.
- The proposal consists of 125 single-family homes for sale at an average price point of \$465,000. City of Gainesville sewer will be extended as a force main to the site from Walnut Grove Way.

- 6. On November 06, 2023, a community engagement event was held where 98 letters were sent out to residents within 1,000 feet of the property. Eight people, comprising representatives from adjacent neighborhoods, attended a community engagement event. Two emails and one phone call were received about the proposal. The community attendees expressed interest in the proposal, understanding the potential benefits the development could bring to their community.
- 7. The proposal will be designed and operated through a strategic partnership of Grace of Georgia Developments LLC (the "applicant") and a development firm. The primary applicant, Grace of Georgia Developments LLC, is an Atlanta-based company with passion towards delivering skillfully planned and beautiful developments that integrate seamlessly within existing communities.
- 8. The proposal for PRD is designed to Grace of Georgia Developments LLC's highest standards to establish a high-quality, attractive, and close-knit environment and community for residents. Sardis Park will include single-family detached residences with private yards situated within a community development that features a pond, walking trail, and parks.
- 9. The housing materials include cedar shake, wood, brick, stone, and other materials that comply with Hall County's regulations. Vinyl will not be used.
- 10. This rezoning application includes considerations of the proposed development concept and its compatibility with existing planning, zoning, and land use objectives as well as its estimated impact on the surrounding community and services, traffic, landscaping and ecology, and stormwater management.

INTRODUCTION

- II. This Planning Statement is the Summary of Intent for the rezoning application of 4363 Sardis Road, Gainesville, GA 30506, from single-family agricultural-residential (AR-III) to Planned Residential Development (PRD) zoning.
- 12. The applicant wishes to deliver a nature-oriented single-family detached subdivision that provides a sense of place away from the busy city centers.




Figure 1: Sardis Park Site Aerial Plan

- 13. The partially wooded Site features a pond and is located approximately eight miles northwest of downtown Gainesville with Lake Lanier and the north Georgia mountains close by. These existing features are indicated on the site plan (figure 1).
- 14. The proposed PRD community will include 125 units with a pond as a water feature, porous paved woodland walking trail that compliments the water feature, and parks.
- 15. The master plan will encourage nature-oriented design with 32.8% open space at 13.7 acres and a density of 2.99 units per acre. All homes will include garages and a private yard.

C. THE SITE

- 16. Characteristics of the Site at 4363 Sardis Rd are as follows:
 - a. The Site area is 41.71 acres.
 - According to the FEMA Flood Map Service Center, the site is not located in a Flood Plain.




Figure 2: FEMA Flood Map Service Center

- c. The Site is currently zoned for agricultural-residential district (AR-III, singledetached dwellings, single-family manufactured homes, industrialized dwelling units, Class A), which would allow at least a 30,000 square feet lot size and one unit per acre with up to 41 homes without any rezoning approval being required.
- d. The Site falls within the "lake area residential" future development guide category.
- e. The Site is currently accessed directly via Sardis Road, which is a "major collector" roadway.
- f. A small approximately half acre pond is located in the northwest portion of the parcel.

g. The applicant will comply with all county requirements as stated in the municipal code.

Surrounding Area

17. The surrounding area is generally residential in character and semi-rural in nature. Less than two miles away, the new Treesort "resort-style" multifamily community is in preleasing. To the north and east there are single-family detached residential properties within the Sardis Heights neighborhood, which is classified as R3-Residential and zoned AR-III. To the west there is a 107.34-acre rural tract of land classified as V5-

Conservation Use and zoned AR-III. South adjacent is property classified as R3-Residential, zoned AR-III, single-family detached.

18. Nearby schools include:

- a. Chestatee High School (1.9 miles from the Site);
 - i. Number of students enrolled in the 2021-2022 school year: 1,266³
- b. Chestatee (Academy) Middle School (2.7 miles from the Site); and
 - i. Number of students enrolled in the 2021-2022 school year: 904⁴
- c. Lanier Elementary School (2.6 miles from the Site)
 - i. Number of students enrolled in the 2021-2022 school year: 478⁵.

Emergency Services

- 19. The Site is within the Hall County Fire District HCFD 3. The nearest fire department is circa 10 miles from the Site (470 Crescent Dr, Gainesville, GA 30501).
- 20. The Site is in the Hall County Police Precinct Area. The nearest police station is the Hall County Police Headquarters at 2859 Browns Bridge Rd, Gainesville, GA 30504 (circa 9.9 miles from the Site).

21. A new medical center is also planned within the vicinity as part of a proposed 200,000 square foot medical park⁶.

Utilities

- 22. The Site currently has access to water along Sardis Road.
- 23. There is no existing sewage network to the Site. However, Hall County and the City of Gainesville officials have confirmed the following:
 - a. The applicant has come to an annexation agreement of the site with the City of Gainesville for public sanitary sewer from the City of Gainesville Water and Sewer Department, via force main from Walnut Grove Way.
 - b. The sewer extension will be paid for by the developer, and then dedicated to the City of Gainesville Water and Sewer Department. A force main is necessary, due to topographic changes from the low point (1,200') of the development to the high point (1,300') near Sardis, Price, and Short Roads. The force main, by its nature, will prevent any other tie-ins, and thus, would not open other parcels for development, nor public sewer access, but will only serve the development at 4363 Sardis Road.
- 24. The Site also has electricity available.

D. THE PROPOSAL

- 25. Sardis Park will consist of 125 high-quality, single-family homes. Homes will feature a backyard, patios, and garages.
- 26. Sardis Park's master plan includes 13.7 acres of green space, comprising roughly 32.8% of the total plan area. This green space will feature walking trails, a pond, and parks. The entire Site will also be laid out to allow for and encourage appreciation of nature and open space, ensuring all residents can enjoy happy, healthy, and active lifestyles.
- 27. Originally, the planning application and site plan had below 30% open space. The applicant aims to provide a high-quality subdivision that appreciates green space and


considers the counties' and community's preferences. Therefore, the applicant increased open space to the 32.8%.

- 28. In order to reflect the property's woodland style, as well as reduce environmental impact of the development, the master plan features new tree plantings throughout the development and along the trail network.
- 29. The housing materials will comply with Hall County regulations and may include cedar shake, wood, brick, and stone, among other materials allowable via the Hall County design standards. Vinyl will not be used.
- 30. The proposal requires rezoning from the existing designation, AR-III, to a PRD designation.
- 31. Hours of construction operation will be Monday through Saturday from approximately8:00 AM until 5:00 PM.
- 32. There is one sign located near the entrance of the property in accordance with Hall County's design standards.
- 33. Though lighting is not yet finalized, all lighting will comply with Hall County's design standards.

Rationale

- 34. As the result of extensive site investigation, due diligence, and community discussion, the applicant firmly believes that 4363 Sardis Road is an appropriate location for a single-family residential neighborhood. The due diligence investigation has determined that a rezoning of the property from AR-III to PRD can be beneficial towards the community.
- 35. After researching various plots of available land, 4363 Sardis Road was identified as the most feasible location due to the high job and population growth in the desired area.
- 36. Sardis Park responds to a changing and growing market and population dynamic within the broader Atlanta Metropolitan area.

- 37. The region's familial population is also growing rapidly. In 2016, approximately 72% of Hall County households consisted of families⁷. By 2022 households grew to 82% with the number of familial households totaling just over 50,000⁸.
- 38. Hall County's growth forecast is approximately 63.5%, bringing the county's total population to over 328,058.





- 39. Sardis Park will provide suitable homes for families who wish to live comfortably in a community away from the major cities. This neighborhood adds a sense of place that allows residents to connect and form a community with one another, while providing a vacation-style permanent home.
- 40. The proposed unit count efficiently utilizes the developable area within the property while preserving 32.8% of the land area for green space, recreation areas, and a trail network. It also promotes a sense of community connection and neighborliness.
- 41. Sardis Park will activate the Property and provide a peaceful and comforting atmosphere that can be enjoyed by the community.




Figure 6: Surrounding Area of 4363 Sardis Rd

- 42. The property is located near retail, dining, services, places of worship, and community facilities, therefore supporting active lifestyles among residents while also enabling them to stay engaged within the community (figure 6).

- 43. After much research and analysis, the applicant believes that 125 units is the best option to provide the residents with a high quality of living, sense of place, stormwater and sewer management, and sense of connection within Hall County.
- 44. As the population of Hall County continues to grow, the demand for housing continues to increase. Therefore, the applicant believes that the conversion of zoning from AR-III to PRD is the most feasible option to balance the need for housing with the need to reduce environmental impact.
- 45. PRD is allowed in the Residential future land use categories throughout Hall County. The Residential future land use category, which applies to most other single-family residential areas within the county, allows two-units to an acre. The applicant is proposing 2.99 units to an acre, similar to nearby rezoning cases that requested PRD at 3.37 units per acre (3824/30/42 Price Rd, Gainesville, GA 30517). The applicant is able to serve the needs of the Gainesville Hall County community by offering a housing product that cannot be accommodated in nearby future land use designations.
- 46. The Site follows the overall character and intent of the Residential future land use designation by:

- a. Setting aside open space;
- Maintaining and creating connections between natural features (ie: the pond and trees via walking paths);
- c. Including community parks;
- d. And the inclusion and addition of public water and force main sewer.

E. PRE-APPLICATION ENGAGEMENT

- 47. An engagement program was initiated to:
 - Understand the detailed requirements of PRD developers in order to design a development plan that meets those requirements and also to gain evidence of why this Site is suitable and needed for such a development;
 - Engage with Hall County Officers so that they have knowledge and awareness of the project if they are approached by constituents or other members of the public;
 - c. Present the plan to elected representatives; and
 - d. Identify and present the plan to local community interest groups via a community engagement event at a time and day when residents are available.

Community Engagement

- 48. Community engagement is a critical component of any development plan, and the applicant intends to connect with the community at various stages of the project. Ahead of submitting this application, the applicant engaged the community by:
 - a. Sending written notifications on October 30, 2023, to 98 local neighbors within I,000 square feet of the perimeter of Sardis Park to invite them to a community engagement event;
 - b. Hosting a community engagement event on November 06, 2023, from 5:00 PM to 7:00 PM at Murrayville Branch of the Hall County Library system;
 - c. Concurrently with this, launching a website on October 31, 2023 (https://www.dlbp.us/sardis-road) with information about the proposal and an opportunity to comment on the proposal; and

- d. Analyzing comments and identifying how to amend the plan to incorporate the ideas and reflect the feedback received.
- e. Additional community engagement details are included in the Appendix.

Comments at the Community Engagement Open House:

49. Eight people, comprising representatives from all adjacent neighborhoods, attended the community engagement open house on November 06, 2023. Almost every person adjacent to the property and most effected by the proposal appeared at the event. The attendees of the open house showed interest in the proposal. Even though they are reluctant towards growth, they understand the need for housing and the benefits that the proposal could serve for their community. Overall, the community attendees

expressed their interest in the process and wanted to stay involved in the rezoning process.

- 50. District 4 Commissioner Powell was also invited to the event but was unable to attend.
- 51. Several attendees adjacent to the site were concerned about their privacy. The applicant took this feedback into consideration and opted to add a contingency requiring that residents in Sardis Park cannot build on the 50-foot buffer zones requirement.
- 52. Many residents expressed interest and excitement at the prospect of sewer being extended to Sardis Park, near their properties.

F. ANALYSIS

Compatibility with Hall County 2017-2037 Comprehensive Plan

53. This planned residential development aligns with the goals for the 2017-2037

Comprehensive Plan. The main considerations for the proposal are:

- The Community Vision
 - Social and Economic Development (SED);
 - Development Patterns (DP); and
 - Resource Conservation (RC).

Development Patterns (DP)

54. DP Goal 2: "Maintain greenspace in new development."

- a. This proposal maintains 32.8% greenspace, while integrating the space as a recreational area for the residents through pocket and entrance parks, a pond feature, and a walking trail.
- 55. DP Goal 3: "Protect and enhance established neighborhoods."
 - a. This proposal makes sure to provide the necessary buffers and sense of place that easily integrates this proposal into the surrounding community.
 - b. The proposal will supply high-quality homes with the addition of public sewer, which will enhance the proposed community and surrounding neighborhoods.
- 56. DP Goal 5.2: "Discuss and coordinate housing-related needs and initiatives with the City of Gainesville, Habitat for Humanity, and other public and private stakeholders to maximize the use of financial and staff resources."
 - After much due diligence, research on Hall County's growth and development patterns, and coordination with Hall County planning staff the applicant identified PRD as the most beneficial opportunity for this Site.
 - b. The addition of public sewer also provides a positive environmental impact compared to septic, since sewer can withstand excess water from rain, storms, and utility usage.

Resource Conservation (RC)

- 57. RC Goal I: "Protect water resources and improve water quality."
 - a. This proposal will protect the on-site pond to utilize as an aesthetic water feature.

Traffic Impact Study

- 58. Kimley Horn was engaged to produce a traffic study for Sardis Park. Kimley Horn conducted traffic counts on October 25, 2023, while school was in session, to analyze the potential traffic impacts of Sardis Park and associated vehicular traffic. The west side of Sardis Road and south of Short Road were studied in detail.
- 59. A more in-depth and detailed traffic study was conducted on November 10, 2023.
- 60. The findings concluded that the Site is predicted to accumulate 1,238 total daily traffic with 619 inbound trips and 619 outbound trips. The traffic study indicates that, during peak AM hour, the development will only generate 24 inbound trips and 67 outbound trips. During the PM hour, the development will generate only 77 inbound trips and 46 outbound trips.
- 61. The study found that it was unnecessary for any additional off-site improvements. However, a southbound right-turn deceleration lane along Sardis Road entering the development is recommended.

Stormwater

- 62. The site plan has been designed to meet and exceed all stormwater requirements, including attenuating stormwater runoff through the use of two distributed detention areas which are shown on the site plan. Developing the Site for PRD in accordance with the site plan ensures that there are no adverse stormwater impacts.
- 63. The developer will take the necessary actions to mitigate stormwater runoff, which include:
 - a. Providing stormwater detention/retention areas;
 - b. Minimizing impermeable surfaces; and
 - c. Planting vegetation and trees.

DLBP received comments last week from Hall County on 4363 Sardis Road (Sardis Park), to which we have undertaken efforts to address all questions raised. DLBP is committed to adhering to and exceeding the County's requirements and expectations, and we hope our continued efforts are reflected in our provisions and responses to the County.

1. We have included ten plus additional images of house and street elevations similar to what would be in Sardis Park. These images are reflective of the Hall County UDC section 17.180.060, which calls for garages to be recessed at least five feet in PRD zoning. Please note the images are from three different developments in

three nearby counties and so the precise details and dimensions may not correspond with your standards but they illustrate the quality of architecture, materials, landscaping and community feel that we intend for Sardis Park.

2. We have updated the site-plan to reflect a minimum 5,000 square foot lot. The site-plan is also updated to show full compliance with stream buffer setbacks, as per the Hall County Code, and our conversations and emails. This is much more in line with other developments similar to ours, which the County has seen recently. We have included an Excel sheet detailing the lot numbers and their respective lot sizes, as well detailed typical lot layouts.

3. The 50' undisturbed buffer with be a combination existing and planted vegetation, to give an effective visual screening between Sardis Park and the existing neighborhood. This also keeps a rural look and feel.

4. The dual cul-de-sac has been eliminated and replaced with a loop, comply with Engineering Standards of the Hall County UDC section 16.60.200.

5. A left turn lane from Sardis Road leading into Sardis Park, as per instruction from Hall County engineering. We have also shown fire hydrants spaced at 1,000', as per Hall County Code 18.080.040.

1.0 INTRODUCTION

This report presents the analysis of the anticipated traffic impacts associated with the proposed *4363 Sardis Road Residential* development, which is expected to be completed in 2026 (referred to herein as "build-out year"). The site is located west of Sardis Road and south of Short Road in unincorporated Hall County, Georgia. The site is currently undeveloped.

A trip generation memorandum (dated November 10, 2023) was previously submitted to Hall County with the rezoning application. Since that time, the overall site density has decreased. As currently envisioned, the 41.47-acre site is proposed to be developed and consist of 125 single-family residential lots. The site is proposed to be rezoned from AR-III (agricultural-residenital) to PRD (planned residential district).

This report summarizes the analyses of the following three (3) scenarios:

- 1. Existing 2023 Traffic Conditions
- 2. Projected 2026 No-Build Traffic Conditions (Existing 2023 Traffic Conditions, plus background traffic growth).
- 3. Projected 2026 Build Traffic Conditions (Projected 2026 No-Build Traffic Conditions, plus the traffic associated with the proposed *4363 Sardis Road Residential* development).


Figure 1 provides a location map of the project site. **Figure 2** provides aerial imagery of the project site. Additionally, a copy of the proposed site plan is provided in **Appendix A**.

2.0 STUDY AREA DETERMINATION

The study area consists of the following three (3) existing intersections:

- 1. Price Road (SR 136) at Sardis Road (unsignalized)
- 2. Price Road (SR 136) at Short Road (unsignalized)
- 3. Sardis Road at Short Road (unsignalized)

For purposes of the traffic impact study, Sardis Road is considered to have a north-south orientation. Price Road (SR 136) is considered to have an east-west orientation. Short Road is considered to have a north-south orientation at the intersection with Price Road (SR 136), and an east-west orientation at the intersection with Sardis Road.





3.0 EXISTING TRAFFIC CONDITIONS

3.1 ROADWAY CHARACTERISTICS

The roadways within the study network have the following characteristics:

<u>Price Road (SR 136)</u> is a two-lane undivided minor arterial with a posted speed limit of 45 MPH in the vicinity of the study network. GDOT counts taken west of Sardis Road indicated an AADT of 7,730 vehicles per day in 2022.

<u>Sardis Road</u> is a two-lane undivided major collector road with a posted speed limit of 45 MPH in the vicinity of the study network. GDOT counts taken south of Old Princeton Ridge and north of Waterman Drive indicated an AADT of 5,210 per day in 2022.

<u>Short Road</u> is a two-lane undivided local road with a posted speed limit of 30 MPH in the vicinity of the study network. There are no GDOT count stations located along Short Road.


3.2 EXISTING TRAFFIC VOLUMES

Vehicle peak hour turning movement counts were collected on Wednesday, October 25, 2023. The counts were performed during the AM period (7:00 AM to 9:00 AM) and the PM period (4:00 PM to 6:00 PM). The AM and PM peak hours for each intersection are shown in **Table 1**. Complete traffic count data is provided in **Appendix E**.

Per GDOT Policy issued on July 15, 2022, traffic forecasts based on new traffic count data collected after the start of the fall 2022 school year will no longer be required to follow COVID-19 policy procedures.

The complete traffic count data is provided in **Appendix E. Figure 3** illustrates the Existing 2023 traffic conditions for the AM and PM peak hours and the existing roadway geometry (intersection layout).



4.0 PROJECTED BACKGROUND (NON-PROJECT) TRAFFIC


Projected background (non-project) traffic is defined as the expected traffic on the roadway network in the future year(s) absent the *4363 Sardis Road Residential* development. The Existing 2023 peak hour traffic volumes were increased by 2.0% per year for three (3) years to account for the expected background growth in traffic through year 2026, build-out of the project.

Figure 4 illustrates the Projected 2026 No-Build peak hour traffic volumes at the study intersections.

4.1 FUTURE ROADWAY / INTERSECTION PROJECTS

The GDOT GeoPI system, Atlanta Regional Commission's *Atlanta Region's Plan*, City of Gainsville and Hall County SPLOST lists were researched to identify any currently programmed transportation projects within the vicinity of the proposed development that may impact the study network during the analysis period. One (1) project was identified which is located in the vicinity of the development.

The Sardis Road Connector Project (<u>PI#0003626</u>) is programmed within the vicinity of the development. The project is forecast to begin construction in 2025. The project involves the widening and reconstruction of multiple existing roads and streets, along with a new roadway alignment to provide a four-lane divided roadway between the intersection of Sardis Road at Chestatee Road and the intersection of Thompson Bridge Road (SR 60) at Mount Vernon Road (SR 283), for a total length of 3.55 miles. At the intersection of Sardis Road at Ledan Road south of the development, the existing single-lane roundabout will be expanded to a multi-lane roundabout. The programmed project fact sheet and concept layout are included in **Appendix F**.



5.0 **PROJECT TRAFFIC**

Project traffic used in this analysis is defined as the vehicle trips expected to be generated by the proposed development, and the distribution and assignment of that traffic through the study roadway network. This traffic impact study evaluated the impacts of adding the new trips generated by the proposed *4363 Sardis Road Residential* development.

5.1 PROJECT SITE ACCESS

Access to the site will be provided via one (1) currently proposed site driveways, which is shown on the proposed site plan in **Appendix A**. A brief description of the site driveway is as follows:

 Site Driveway A – A proposed full-movement driveway along Sardis Road located approximately 530 feet south of Short Road. Site Driveway A is proposed to operate under sidestreet stop-control.

The proposed site driveways provide vehicular access to the entire development. Internal, private roadways throughout the site provide access to all homes. Refer to the site plan in **Appendix A** for a visual representation of vehicular access and circulation throughout the proposed development.

5.2 TRIP GENERATION

Gross trips associated with the proposed development were estimated using the *Institute of Transportation Engineers' (ITE) Trip Generation Manual, 11th Edition, 2021,* using equations where available. Trip generation for the proposed development was calculated based the Single-Family Detached Housing land uses (ITE 210).


Table 2 summarizes the net trip generation for the proposed development upon full build-out in 2026. Due to the size, nature, and location of the proposed development, mixed-use, alternative mode, and pass-by reductions were assumed to be zero.





5.3 TRIP DISTRIBUTION AND ASSIGNMENT

The directional distribution and assignment of adding new trips (project trips) related to the proposed development was based on a review of land uses and population densities in the area, and a review of the existing travel patterns in the area. A detailed trip distribution and assignment is shown in **Figure 5**. Based on trip generation from **Table 2** and the anticipated trip distribution in **Figure 5**, new project trips were assigned to the study roadway network. **Figure 6** illustrates the new project trips distributed throughout the study network for the Projected 2026 Build conditions. **Figure 7** illustrates the Projected 2026 Build traffic volumes for the AM and PM peak hours. **Appendix C** provides intersection volume worksheets for all study intersections.







6.0 LEVEL-OF-SERVICE ANALYSIS

Level-of-service determinations were made for the weekday AM and PM peak hours for the study network intersections using *Synchro, Version 11. Synchro* software uses methodologies contained in the 6th Edition *Highway Capacity Manual* to determine the operating characteristics of an intersection. Capacity is defined as the maximum number of vehicles that can pass over a particular road segment or through a particular intersection within a specified period under prevailing roadway, traffic, and control conditions.

Level-of-service (LOS) is used to describe the operating characteristics of a road segment or intersection in relation to its capacity. LOS is defined as a qualitative measure that describes operational conditions and motorists' perceptions of a traffic stream. The *Highway Capacity Manual* defines six levels of service, LOS A through LOS F, with A being the best and F the worst.

LOS for signalized intersections are reported for the intersection as a whole. One or more movements at an intersection experience a low LOS, while the intersection as a whole may operate acceptably.

Levels-of-service for unsignalized intersections, with stop control on the minor street only, are reported for the side-street approaches and major street left-turns.

In addition to the Estimated 2023 conditions, an analysis was performed for the AM and PM peak hours under Projected 2026 No-Build and Build traffic conditions. The results of the LOS analysis are summarized for the AM and PM peak hours in **Table 3**. The *Synchro* analysis reports are included in **Appendix D**.

As shown in **Table 3**, the analysis indicates that under Existing 2023, Projected 2026 No-Build, and Projected 2026 Build conditions, all intersections are expected to operate at at an acceptable LOS during both the AM and PM peak hours. No off-site roadway improvements are recommended for intersection capacity purposes.

7.0 CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This traffic study evaluated the traffic impacts associated with the *4363 Sardis Road Residential* development, located west of Sardis Road and south of Short Road in unincorporated Hall County, Georgia. The development, which is approximately 41.47-acres in size, will include approximately 125 single family detached homes. The site is proposed to be rezoned from AR-III (agricultural-residenital) to PRD (planned residential district).

The study network, which consists of three (3) existing intersections and one (1) site driveway, was analyzed for the weekday AM and PM peak hours under Existing 2023 conditions, Projected 2026 No-Build conditions (three years of background traffic growth), and Projected 2026 Build conditions (Projected 2026 No-Build conditions plus traffic generated by the proposed *4363 Sardis Road Residential* development).

All intersections are expected to operate at an acceptable LOS during the AM and PM peak hours under Existing 2023, Projected 2026 No-Build, and Projected 2026 Build conditions. Additionally, the site driveway is expected to operate acceptably under the Projected 2026 Build conditions.

Recommendations based on the results of this study include system improvements and site access improvements. System improvements, or "No-Build" recommendations, are needed to serve the background road network traffic. Site access improvements, or "Build" recommendations, are needed to serve the background road network traffic plus the *4363 Sardis Road Residential* development traffic.

7.1 SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT RECOMMENDATIONS

Based on the results of this traffic impact study, Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. does not recommend any system (no-build) improvements to serve the No-Build traffic conditions (note: this would be the improvements needed to serve the traffic based on the existing conditions plus background growth, and NOT the proposed development).


7.2 SITE-ACCESS IMPROVEMENT RECOMMENDATIONS

Based on the results of this study, Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. recommends the following site-access improvements to serve the Projected 2026 Build traffic conditions (note: this would be the improvements needed to serve the traffic associated with the *4363 Sardis Road Residential* development).

- Intersection 4 Sardis Road at Site Driveway A
 - Per the site plan, construct a site driveway consisting of one (1) egress lane exiting the site and one (1) ingress lane entering the site.
 - Construct a southbound right-turn deceleration lane along Sardis Road entering the site.


As a nearby neighbor who would be clearly affected by this development, I strongly urge the Planning Commission to DENY this request.

SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT

THIS SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT (hereinafter, the "Agreement") is hereby made and entered into by and between HALL COUNTY, GEORGIA ("Hall County") and SHIRLEY M. COLLINS (hereinafter referred to collectively as "Owner") for the purpose of resolving all issues related to Hall County's acquisition of certain property in lieu of condemnation.

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, on January 2, 2020, the location and design of the White Sulphur Road Realignment Project (Federal Award ID Number 04-01-07651; P.I. No. 1162100) were approved by the Georgia Department of Transportation and will involve an approximately 3,900 square feet shift of the roadway east of the railroad and will include a twelve feet wide lane in both directions along with a thirty inches curb and gutter on each side, a left turn lane at the tie-in on the south end of the project, lighting, and easements;

WHEREAS, the Hall County Board of Commissioners (the "Board of Commissioners") has determined that the Project is for public road purposes as permitted by law; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners has further determined that to construct the Project it must acquire, by deed or by condemnation proceedings, certain rights of way and easements; and

WHEREAS, a portion of the properties necessary to be acquired is owned by the Owner; and

WHEREAS, descriptions of the entirety of the property owned by the Owner is reflected on the plans, attached hereto as <u>Attachment 1</u> and by reference made a part hereof (said property being hereinafter sometimes referred to as "Parcel 10" or "Subject Property"); and

WHEREAS, the property shown on <u>Attachment 1</u> is designated as Tax Parcel ID number

09108 000066 by the taxing authorities of Hall County; and

WHEREAS, Hall County has determined that the portion of Parcel 10 necessary to be acquired in connection with the construction of the Project is as follows:

(1) A right of way, on Parcel 10, for the purpose of acquiring, constructing, and maintaining a right of way along the portion of the Project, said right of way consisting of .105 acre, more or less. A metes and bounds description of said right of way is attached hereto as <u>Attachment 2</u>, and by reference made a part hereof;

WHEREAS, the parties have reached an Agreement with regard to the amount of just and adequate compensation to be received for all property rights to be acquired, as described above, and, in exchange for the receipt of such funds, the Owner has agreed to forever release, settle, dismiss and waive their claims related to or rising out of any Condemnation action; and

WHEREAS, before a condemnation action was filed, Hall County and the Owner agreed during negotiations that the total sum of \$18,000.00, for the right of way and permanent easements, along with fixtures, business loss, income, and any site improvements that would be directly impacted by the Project, is just and adequate compensation for the acquired interests and improvements thereon; and

WHEREAS, the parties have further agreed to purchase the remaining portion of Parcel 10 in its entirety, including all improvements, as part of the negotiated settlement in lieu of condemnation in the amount of \$282,000.00;

WHEREAS, the parties now desire to settle all claims and avoid any litigation related to Hall County's acquisition of the rights of way and easements required;

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the covenants and agreements herein contained and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt, adequacy and sufficiency of which are hereby expressly acknowledged by the parties hereto, Hall County and Owner, intending to be legally bound hereby, do covenant and agree as follows: Hall County shall pay the Owner, in an armed length transaction, a total of \$300,000.00. This total sum shall be for the property interests described herein and agreed by all parties to be just and adequate compensation for the acquired interests, described as follows: a) Hall County shall pay to Owner \$18,000 for the right of way and easement necessary for the Project, and any consequential, impact, or other damages resulting from Hall County's acquisition of said interests; and b) Hall County shall pay an additional \$282,000.00 for the remaining portion of Parcel 10, including all improvements, as a negotiated settlement to the acquisition.

2.

The Owner represents and Hall County has confirmed that no other person or entity has an interest in the Parcel 10 that would impact the conveyance of Parcel 10 and the interests described herein to Hall County.

3.

Pursuant to the terms of this Agreement and following approval by the Hall County Board of Commissioners, the parties will close on the purchase and sale of the acquired interests at the office of Stewart, Melvin & Frost, LLP, at a time mutually agreed upon by the parties, but in no event later than February 23, 2024.

4.

Owner shall have 180 days, which shall be until and including August 20, 2024, to vacate the premises. Owner agrees that upon the expiration of this period, she shall be a tenant at sufferance and subject to a dispossessory action without notice. Owner further agrees to allow all construction on the right of way and easements to continue unabated. The parties have read all the terms of this Agreement and understand and voluntarily accept and agree to all its terms, and that they have been adequately represented and advised by their own legal counsel. Further, the parties enter into this Agreement voluntarily and have not assigned to any other person or party any portion of their claims which are the subject of this Agreement, and the parties confirm that no other person or party is subrogated to any of their rights in this matter. Except as otherwise provided for herein, neither this Agreement nor any right, remedy, obligation, or liability arising hereunder or by reason hereof, shall be assignable by any party, without prior written consent of the other party. The terms and conditions of this Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the Owner and its heirs, successors, assigns, and transferees.

6.

This Agreement was negotiated and is being delivered, executed, and intended to be performed in the State of Georgia, and its terms and conditions shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of this state. The Superior Court of Hall County, Georgia, shall have jurisdiction to resolve any disputes, breaches, or other issues that may arise in association with this Agreement.

7.

The parties shall execute, deliver, acknowledge, or supply such further documents, instruments and assurances as shall be reasonably necessary or appropriate to carry out the full intent and purposes of this Agreement.

8.

The Agreement shall be constructed as if the Parties jointly prepared the same and any uncertainty or ambiguity shall not be construed or interpreted against the drafter.

9.

No representations as to tax consequences, if any, have been made in the provisions of this Agreement.

10.

All property taxes on the Subject Property for the current tax year shall be prorated between Owner and Hall County as of the closing date.
