- (9) The Bureau of Intelligence and Research of the Department of State;
- (10) The Office of Intelligence and Analysis of the Department of the Treasury;
- (11) The Office of Intelligence and Analysis of the Department of Homeland Security; or
- (12) Such other elements of any department or agency as may be designated by the President, or designated jointly by the Director of National Intelligence and the head of the department or agency concerned, as an element of the intelligence community.
- National security system, as defined in <u>44 U.S.C. 3552</u>, means any information system (including any telecommunications system) used or operated by an agency or by a contractor of an agency, or other organization on behalf of an agency—

RESOLUTION DECLARING CERTAIN RIGHT OF WAY ON AND NEAR CHESTNUT MOUNTAIN CIRCLE TO BE UNSERVICEABLE, AND APPROVING THE TRANSFER OF SAID UNSERVICEABLE RIGHT OF WAY WITH CUL-DE-SAC REQUIRMENT

WHEREAS, Hall County, Georgia currently possesses as part of the official County Road System certain real property consisting of right of way on and at the end of Chestnut Mountain Circle, Hall County, Georgia (hereinafter referred to as "the ROW property"), and more specifically described as approximately 0.401 acres of right of way at the end of Chestnut Mountain Circle which borders on property owned by the Lanier Christian Academy, Inc. and which right of way is more particularly described in the survey documents and plats attached hereto as Exhibit "A"; and

WHEREAS, the Hall County Board of Commissioners has determined that the ROW property is unserviceable as contemplated by Section 3.10.180 of the Hall County Code of Ordinances; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners desires to dispose of the ROW property pursuant to the requirements of Section 3.10.180 of the Hall County Code of Ordinances and State law; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners has determined that declaring the ROW property to be unserviceable pursuant to Section 3.10.180 of the Hall County Code of Ordinances would support the general welfare of the citizens of Hall County; and

WHEREAS, after declaring the said ROW property to be unserviceable, the Board of Commissioners believes that the sole party who can make use of the ROW property is Lanier Christian Academy, Inc. because it owns the surrounding land; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners has determined that a transfer of the ROW property to Lanier Christian Academy, Inc. would support the general welfare of the citizens of Hall County, provided that Lanier Christian Academy, Inc. agrees to keep and maintain a cul-de-sac at the end of Chestnut Mountain Circle and outside the gates of the school as required by County ordinances and as needed for turning around of emergency vehicles; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of Hall County, Georgia intends to approve the transfer of the said ROW property to Lanier Christian Academy, Inc. with the above cul-de-sac maintenance requirement so as to allow it to be put to productive community use by said organization and intends to authorize the Chairman or the Vice Chairman to execute any documents necessary to effectuate the transfer of the ROW property, subject to the review and approval of the County Attorney.

NOW THEREFORE, the Hall County Board of Commissioners determines and declares that the said Chestnut Mountain Circle right of way and cul-de-sac property (being more particularly described in Exhibit "A" hereto) is unserviceable pursuant to Hall County Code Section 3.10.180, cannot be used advantageously by the County, and is incapable of being used independently under applicable County land use regulations and ordinances, and the Board approves the transfer of the said Chestnut Mountain Circle ROW property to Lanier Christian Academy, Inc. provided that Lanier Christian Academy, Inc. agrees to keep and maintain a culde-sac at the end of Chestnut Mountain Circle and outside of the school's gates sufficient to comply with County requirements for necessary turning around of emergency vehicles, and provided that said cul-de sac requirement shall be memorialized by deed. The Board further authorizes the Chairman to sign any and all documents necessary to effectuate the ROW property transfer described herein, subject to the review and approval of the County Attorney.

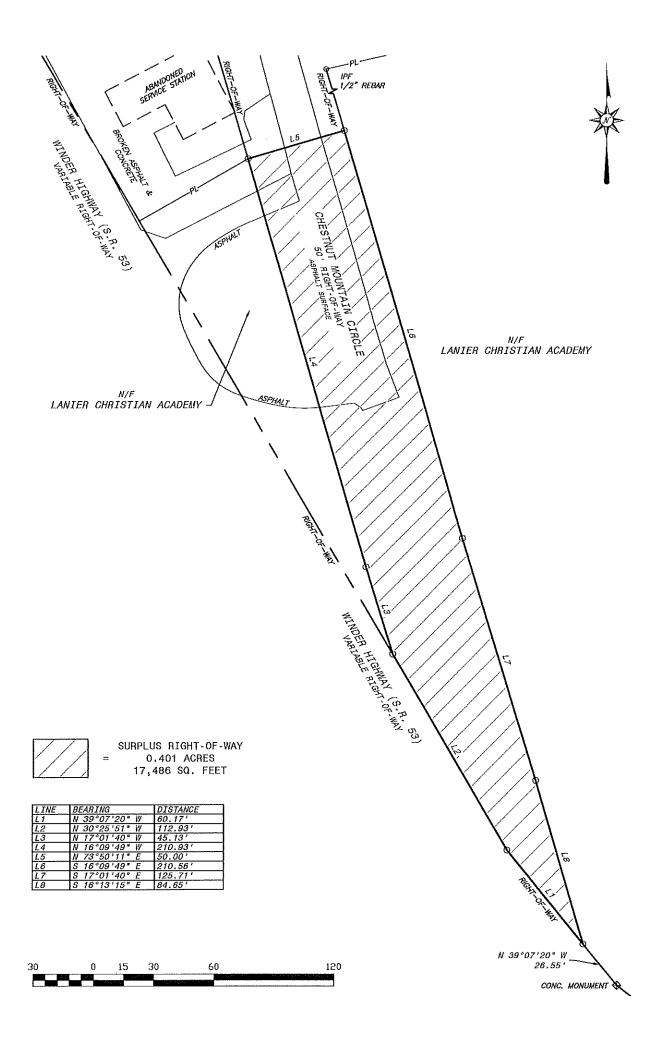

In the Matter of Juvenile Court Judge Salaries

Pursuant to the authority of O.C.G.A. § 15-11-52(b), the compensation of the Juvenile Court Judge is set by the Judges of the Superior Court with approval of the governing authority of the counties for which said Judge is appointed.

After consideration of Juvenile Court Judge salaries throughout the State of Georgia, and pursuant to a longstanding county judicial salary agreement that provides for a Juvenile Court Judge salary to be set at a percentage of the compensation set for a Superior Court judge, the undersigned deem it appropriate to modify the salary orders for the circuit's four existing Juvenile Court Judges, along with any future Juvenile Court Judge, until such time as a superseding order may be entered.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED, subject to the approval of the County Governing Authority, that the salary of any full-time Juvenile Court Judge duly appointed pursuant to O.C.G.A. § 15-11-50(b) shall receive an annual salary equal to 85 percent of the base salary received by a Superior Court judge in this circuit. The Superior Court base salary shall include the annual salary provided by the State of Georgia as well as any annual supplements provided by Hall County and Dawson County; the base salary shall *not* include the Accountability Court supplement provided by the State of Georgia pursuant to O.C.G.A. § 15-6-29.1. Any future adjustments made to the base salary of a Superior Court judge shall be made effective for the Juvenile Court Judge on the same date, unless an alternate date is set by separate order at that time by the Chief Superior Court judge.¹

In addition, the counties shall contribute 7.5% of the above annual salary to the Georgia Judicial Retirement Plan of the State of Georgia as required by law.

The annual salary and benefits shall be paid out of the General Fund of Hall and Dawson Counties in the ratio established by the previous Intergovernmental Agreement

¹ The most recent adjustment to the base salary of a Superior Court judge was made effective by the State of Georgia on July 1, 2024. In accordance with the provisions of this Order, the salaries of the Juvenile Court judges shall therefore also be made retroactively effective to July 1, 2024.

The parties also recognize the delays, expense, and difficulties involved in proving, in a legal or arbitration proceeding, the actual loss suffered by Owner if the Work is not completed on time. Accordingly, instead of requiring any such proof, Owner and Contractor agree that as liquidated damages for delay (but not as a penalty):
 - 1. Substantial Completion: Contractor shall pay Owner Five Hundred Dollars \$500 for each day that expires after the time (as duly adjusted pursuant to the Contract) specified above for Substantial Completion, until the Work is substantially complete.

2. Completion of Remaining Work: After Substantial Completion, if Contractor shall neglect, refuse, or fail to complete the remaining Work within the Contract Times (as duly adjusted pursuant to the Contract) for completion and readiness for final payment, Contractor shall pay Owner \$500 for each day that expires after such time until the Work is completed and ready for final payment.

- 3. Liquidated damages for failing to timely attain Substantial Completion, and final completion are not additive, and will not be imposed concurrently.
- B. If Owner recovers liquidated damages for a delay in completion by Contractor, then such liquidated damages are Owner's sole and exclusive remedy for such delay, and Owner is precluded from recovering any other damages, whether actual, direct, excess, or consequential, for such delay, except for special damages (if any) specified in this Agreement.

ARTICLE 4 - CONTRACT PRICE

- 4.01 Owner shall pay Contractor for completion of the Work in accordance with the Contract Documents, the amounts that follow, subject to adjustment under the Contract:
 - A. For all Unit Price Work, an amount equal to the sum of the extended prices (established for each separately identified item of Unit Price Work by multiplying the unit price times the actual quantity of that item).

The extended prices for Unit Price Work set forth as of the Effective Date of the Contract are based on estimated quantities. As provided in Paragraph 13.03 of the General Conditions, estimated quantities are not guaranteed, and determinations of actual quantities and classifications are to be made by Engineer.

- C. According to paragraph 13.02 of the General Conditions, all allowances are included in the abovementioned Lump Sum price.
 - 1. Contractor's costs for unloading and handling on the site, labor, installation costs, overhead, profit and other expenses contemplated for stated allowance amounts shall be included in the Contract Sum and not in the allowances.
 - 2. The Contractor shall cause work covered by these allowances to be performed for such amounts and by such persons as the Owner/Engineer may direct, but he will not be required to employ persons against whom he makes a reasonable objection. If the cost, when determined and approved by the Owner/Engineer, exceeds, or falls below the allowance, the Contract Sum shall be adjusted accordingly through a Change Order. The contractor is not entitled to overhead, profit, or mark-up on unutilized allowance funds. The amount of the Change Order shall reflect the difference between actual costs and the allowances.

ARTICLE 5—PAYMENT PROCEDURES

- 5.01 Submittal and Processing of Payments
 - A. Contractor shall submit Applications for Payment in accordance with Article 15 of the General Conditions. Applications for Payment will be processed by Engineer as provided in the General Conditions.
- 5.02 Progress Payments; Retainage
 - A. Owner shall make progress payments on the basis of Contractor's Applications for Payment on or about the 1st day of each month during performance of the Work as provided in Paragraph 5.02.A.1 below, provided that such Applications for Payment have been submitted in a timely manner and otherwise meet the requirements of the Contract. All such payments will be measured by the Schedule of Values established as provided in the General Conditions (and in the case of Unit Price Work based on the number of units completed) or, in the event there is no Schedule of Values, as provided elsewhere in the Contract.
 - 1. Prior to Substantial Completion, progress payments will be made in an amount equal to the percentage indicated below but, in each case, less the aggregate of payments previously made and less such amounts as Owner may withhold, including but not limited to liquidated damages, in accordance with the Contract.
 - a. 95% of the value of the Work completed (with the balance being retainage); and
 - b. 100% of cost of materials and equipment not incorporated in the Work (with the balance being retainage).

Upon Substantial Completion, Owner shall pay an amount sufficient to increase total payments to Contractor to 98% of the Work completed, less such amounts set off by Owner pursuant to Paragraph 15.01.E of the General Conditions, and less such amounts as Engineer shall determine as the value of Work to be completed or corrected as shown on the punch list of items to be completed or corrected prior to final payment.

ARTICLE 7-REPRESENTATIONS, CERTIFICATIONS, AND STIPULATIONS

- 7.01 Contractor's Representations
 - A. In order to induce Owner to enter into this Contract, Contractor makes the following representations:
 - 1. Contractor has examined and carefully studied the Contract Documents, including Addenda.
 - 2. Contractor has visited the Site, conducted a thorough visual examination of the Site and adjacent areas, and become familiar with the general, local, and Site conditions that may affect cost, progress, and performance of the Work.
 - 3. Contractor is familiar with all Laws and Regulations that may affect cost, progress, and performance of the Work.
 - 4. Contractor has considered the information known to Contractor itself; information commonly known to contractors doing business in the locality of the Site; information and observations obtained from visits to the Site; the Contract Documents; and the Technical Data identified in the Supplementary Conditions or by definition, with respect to the effect of such information, observations, and Technical Data on (a) the cost, progress, and performance of the Work; (b) the means, methods, techniques, sequences, and procedures of construction to be employed by Contractor; and (c) Contractor's safety precautions and programs.
 - 5. Based on the information and observations referred to in the preceding paragraph, Contractor agrees that no further examinations, investigations, explorations, tests, studies, or data are necessary for the performance of the Work at the Contract Price, within the Contract Times, and in accordance with the other terms and conditions of the Contract.
 - 6. Contractor is aware of the general nature of work to be performed by Owner and others at the Site that relates to the Work as indicated in the Contract Documents.

- 7. Contractor has given Engineer written notice of all conflicts, errors, ambiguities, or discrepancies that Contractor has discovered in the Contract Documents, and of discrepancies between Site conditions and the Contract Documents, and the written resolution thereof by Engineer is acceptable to Contractor.
- 8. The Contract Documents are generally sufficient to indicate and convey understanding of all terms and conditions for performance and furnishing of the Work.
- 9. Contractor's entry into this Contract constitutes an incontrovertible representation by Contractor that without exception all prices in the Agreement are premised upon performing and furnishing the Work required by the Contract Documents.

7.02 Contractor's Certifications

- A. Contractor certifies that it has not engaged in corrupt, fraudulent, collusive, or coercive practices in competing for or in executing the Contract. For the purposes of this Paragraph 7.02:
 - 1. "Corrupt practice" means the offering, giving, receiving, or soliciting of anything of value likely to influence the action of a public official in the Proposal process or in the Contract execution.
 - "Fraudulent practice" means an intentional misrepresentation of facts made (a) to influence the Proposal process or the execution of the Contract to the detriment of Owner, (b) to establish Proposal or Contract prices at artificial non-competitive levels, or (c) to deprive Owner of the benefits of free and open competition.
 - 3. "Collusive practice" means a scheme or arrangement between two or more Proposers, with or without the knowledge of Owner, a purpose of which is to establish Proposal prices at artificial, non-competitive levels.
 - 4. "Coercive practice" means harming or threatening to harm, directly or indirectly, persons or their property to influence their participation in the Proposal process or affect the execution of the Contract.

ARTICLE 8 – CONTRACT AMENDMENTS AND MODIFICATION

This Contract may only be modified, amended, or changed in writing and fully executed by both Parties hereto. This Contract constitutes the sole and entire Contract and understanding between the Parties as to the subject matter hereof, and no verbal promises have been made by either Party in relation hereto.

ARTICLE 9 – REMEDIES AND CONTRACT PERFORMANCE

In the event that either Party to this Contract breaches this Contract, including failure to meet the timetables set forth herein, the non-breaching Party shall provide a written Notice-to-Cure to the

breaching Party which describes the breach of this Contract. The breaching Party shall have thirty (30) days from the date of receipt of the written Notice-to-Cure the breach or to otherwise negotiate a resolution of the breach.

If the breach has not been cured and the Parties hereto have not resolved the issue described in the Notice-to-Cure by thirty (30) days after receipt of the letter, the Party authoring the letter shall be entitled to seek any and all remedies allowed by Georgia law, including damages, equitable relief, declaratory relief, specific performance, and/or relief as to any bonds issued hereon. Additional provisions are:

- A. Delay or Impossibility of Performance. Any failure or delay must be beyond the reasonable control of and without the fault or negligence of the Contractor. If the Services to be provided to the County are interrupted by a force majeure event, as defined below, the County will be entitled to an equitable adjustment to the fees and other payments due to the Contractor under this Contract. If delay results from a subcontractor's negligent conduct or failure to perform, the Contractor shall not be excused from compliance with the terms and obligations of the Contract.
- Neither Party shall be held liable or responsible to the other Party nor be deemed to have defaulted under or breached this Contract for failure or delay in fulfilling or performing any obligation under this Contract when such failure or delay is caused by or results from causes beyond the reasonable control of the affected Party including, but not limited to, fire, floods, embargoes, acts of war, civil unrest, insurrections, riots, strikes, lockouts or other labor disturbances, or acts of God; provided, however, that the Party so affected shall use reasonable commercial efforts to avoid or remove such causes of nonperformance, and shall continue performance hereunder with reasonable dispatch whenever such causes are removed. Either Party shall provide the other Party with prompt written notice of any delay or failure to perform that occurs by reason of force majeure.

Definition: The term "force majeure" as defined in Black's Law Dictionary is "an event or effect that can be neither anticipated nor controlled. It is a contractual provision allocating the risk of loss if performance becomes impossible or impracticable, especially as a result of an event that the Parties could not have anticipated or controlled."

- B. Obligations Beyond Contract Term. The Contract shall remain in full force and effect to the end of the specified term or until terminated or canceled pursuant to ARTICLE #108 TERMINATION PROVISIONS.
- C. Transition Cooperation with the County and Cooperation with Other Contractors. Contractor agrees that upon termination of this Contract for any reason, it shall provide STANDARD FORM OF AGREEMENT SECTION 00 52 13 Page 11 of 20

sufficient efforts and reasonable cooperation and assistance to the County to ensure an orderly and efficient transition to the County or an alternative Contractor. Further, if the County has entered into or enters into contracts with other Contractors related to the Services, Contractor agrees to cooperate fully with other such Contractors. Contractor shall not engage in any act that will interfere with the performance of work by any other Contractor(s).

ARTICLE 10 – TERMINATION PROVISIONS

The County may terminate this Contract by providing sixty (60) days written notice to the Contractor at any time. Should the County terminate this Contract prior to the date of automatic termination, Contractor shall provide the County with all deliverables up to the date of termination thirty (30) days after the Notice to Terminate is issued. The County shall pay the Contractor for all work properly performed in compliance with the terms of this Contract up to the date of termination.

- A. Termination for Convenience. Following sixty (60) days' written notice, the County may terminate the Contract in whole or in part for any reason without the payment of any penalty or incurring any further obligation to the Contractor.
- B. Termination for Cause. The occurrence of any of the following events shall constitute cause for the County to declare the Contractor in default of its obligations under the Contract:
 - 1. The Contractor fails to deliver or has delivered nonconforming Services or fails to perform, to the County's satisfaction, any material requirement of the Contract or is in violation of a material provision of the Contract including, but without limitation, the expressed warranties made by the Contractor.
 - 2. The County determines that Contractor's unsatisfactory performance substantially endangers completion or that default is likely to occur.
 - 3. The Contractor fails to make substantial and timely progress toward performance of the Contract.
 - 4. The Contractor becomes subject to any bankruptcy or insolvency proceeding under federal or state law to the extent allowed by applicable federal or state law including bankruptcy laws; the Contractor terminates or suspends its business; or the County reasonably believes that the Contractor has become insolvent or unable to pay its obligations as they accrue consistent with applicable federal or state law.
 - 5. The Contractor has failed to comply with applicable federal, state, and local laws, rules, County ordinances, regulations, and orders when performing within the scope of the Contract.

- 6. The Contractor has engaged in conduct that has or may expose the County or the State to liability, as determined in the County's sole discretion; or a material breach of the terms of the Contract by County upon County's failure to cure such material breach after written notice thereof has been delivered in accordance with ARTICLE #108.C below constitutes cause for the Contractor to declare that the County is in default of its obligations under the Contract.
- C. Notice of Default. If either Party causes any of the default events set out in ARTICLE #108 - TERMINATION PROVISIONS, then either Party shall issue a written Notice of Default to the Party that causes one (1) or more of the default events requesting that the breach or noncompliance be remedied within the period of time specified in the Notice of Default. If the breach or noncompliance is not remedied within the period of time specified in the written notice, the non-breaching Party may:
 - 1. Immediately terminate the Contract for default without additional written notice; and/or,
 - 2. In the event of a breach by the Contractor, the County may procure substitute Services from another source and charge the difference between the Contract and the substitute Contract to the defaulting Contractor; and/or,
 - 3. Enforce the terms and conditions of the Contract and seek any legal or equitable remedies.
- D. Termination Due to Non-Availability of Funds. This Contract will terminate immediately and absolutely if the County determines that adequate funds are deappropriated such that the County cannot fulfill its obligations under the Contract, such determination being at the County's sole discretion and conclusive. County agrees to provide prompt written notice to Contractor in the event of any de-appropriation.
- E. Termination due to Failure of Contractor to Act. The County may terminate the Contract for any of the following reasons effective immediately without advance notice:
 - 1. If the Contractor must be certified or licensed as a condition precedent to providing the Services, the revocation, suspension, or other loss of such license or certification may result in immediate termination of the Contract effective as of the date on which the license or certification is no longer in effect.
 - 2. The County determines that the actions, or failure to act, of the Contractor, its agents, employees, or subcontractors have caused, or reasonably could cause, life, health, or safety to be jeopardized.

- 3. The Contractor furnished any statement, representation, or certification in connection with the Contract or the bidding process, which is materially false, deceptive, criminal, or maliciously incorrect.
- 4. Failure of the Contractor to obtain, provide, maintain, and deliver the performance and payment bonds when required under this Contract, or failure to comply with any requirement pertaining to the appropriate amounts thereof as set forth in ARTICLE #123 – PERFORMANCE AND PAYMENT BONDS.
- F. Payment Limitation in Event of Termination. In the event of termination of the Contract for any reason by County, the County shall pay only those amounts, if any, due and owing to the Contractor for Services actually received and accepted by the County up to and including the date of termination of the Contract and for which the County is obligated to pay pursuant to the Contract.
- G. Contractor's Termination Duties. Upon receipt of a Notice of Termination, the Contractor shall:
 - 1. Cease work under the Contract and take all necessary or appropriate steps to limit disbursements and minimize costs and furnish a report within thirty (30) days of the date of Notice of Termination describing the status of all work under the Contract including, without limitation, results accomplished, conclusions resulting therefrom, and any other matters the County may require.
 - 2. Immediately cease use and return to the County any personal property or materials, whether tangible or intangible, provided by the County to the Contractor.
 - 3. Comply with the County's instructions for the timely transfer of any active files and work produced by the Contractor under the Contract.
 - 4. Cooperate in good faith with the County, its employees, agents, and Contractors during the transition period between the Notification of Termination and the substitution of any replacement Contractor.
 - 5. Contractor is to immediately return any payments made by the County for goods and services that were not delivered by the Contractor.

ARTICLE 11 -- NO DEFENSE OR INDEMNIFICATION BY COUNTY

The Parties agree that the County shall not be responsible for defending or indemnifying any Contractor from any claim brought by any third party against the Contractor.

ARTICLE 12 – ASSIGNMENT AND DELEGATION BY CONTRACTOR

The Contractor shall not assign or delegate this Contract, or any performance required by it, in whole or in part, without the prior expressed written consent of the County.

ARTICLE 13 – USE OF THIRD PARTIES (SUBCONTRACTORS)

This Contract is for the benefit of the Parties hereto only and is not intended to benefit any third party or give rise to any duty or causes of action for any third party. All restrictions, obligations, and responsibilities of the Contractor under the Contract shall also apply to third parties such as subcontractors, if allowed in writing by the County. Any Contract with a subcontractor must also preserve the rights of the County.

ARTICLE 14 – ENTIRE CONTRACT

This Contract, as executed and approved, shall constitute the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all other prior and contemporaneous statements, agreements, and understandings between the Parties. No written or oral statements, agreements, or understandings that are not set out, referenced, or specifically incorporated in this Contract shall in any way be binding or of effect between the Parties.

ARTICLE 15 – SEVERABILITY

If any paragraph, sub-paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Contract is declared invalid or unconstitutional by any Court of competent jurisdiction or if the provisions of any part of this Contract as applied to any particular situation or set of circumstances shall be declared invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity shall not be construed to affect the remaining portions of this Contract not so held to be invalid or the application of this Contract to other circumstances not so held to be invalid.

ARTICLE 16 – RECORDS

- A. Public Records Request. The Georgia Open Records Act, as provided in O.C.G.A. § 50-18-70 et seq, requires procurement records and all other records received by or prepared or maintained on behalf of the County shall be made open to public inspection unless otherwise provided by law.
- B. Record Retention and Access. The Contractor shall maintain books, records, and documents in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and procedures and which sufficiently and properly document and calculate all charges billed to the County throughout the term of the Contract for a period of at least five (5) years following the date of final payment or completion of any required audit, whichever is later. Records to be maintained include both financial records and service records.

ARTICLE 17 – ADDITIONAL TERMS

The County shall not be bound by any terms and conditions included in any Contractor's salesorders, literature, packaging, invoice, catalog, brochure, technical data sheet, on-line representation, warranties or service level agreement, or other document which attempts to impose any condition in variance with or in addition to the terms and conditions contained herein.

ARTICLE 18– WAIVER

The failure of any Party hereto to seek a remedy for any alleged breach of this Contract shall not constitute a waiver of any claim, cause of action, or remedy allowed by Georgia law for breach thereof.

ARTICLE 19 -- CONTRACTOR AND COUNTY RIGHTS AND OBLIGATIONS

- A. The County has the right at any time to require the Contractor to put an immediate stop to any procedure, or the use of any equipment, chemical, material, personnel, etc. considered by the County to be hazardous or toxic to persons, buildings, or surfaces. The Contractor will utilize acceptable substitutes approved by the County as quickly as possible. In the event of such replacement, Contractor shall (i) notify County of any resulting replacement, (ii) introduce the individual serving as the replacement to County, and/or (iii) provide County with a résumé and any other information regarding the individual that may be reasonably requested by County.
- B. The County has the right to require the Contractor to reassign or remove any employee or subcontractor's employee from the premises temporarily or permanently when, in the County's sole opinion, the employee is not suitable. The County's decision shall be final, and Contractor will remove the employee immediately and replace with a person of at least equivalent training, experience, and requisite qualifications as quickly as possible, subject to the County's approval.
- C. Contractor agrees to obtain prior written approval from the County for the use of subcontractors to provide the Services described in Scope of Work prior to subcontractor's performance of work.

ARTICLE 20– INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

The Contractor must procure and maintain insurance policies at the Contractor's own expense and must furnish the County with a certificate of insurance (COI) providing evidence of proof of coverage at least in the amounts indicated in this subsection. The COI must list "Hall County, Georgia" as the certificate holder and as an additional insured under the commercial general, automobile, and umbrella liability policies as follows: "County of Hall, its Board of Commissioners, officers, employees, servants, and agents, 2875 Browns Bridge Rd, Gainesville, GA, 30504". The policy must protect the Contractor and the County (as an additional insured) from any claims for bodily injury, property damage, or personal injury covered by the

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT

- 1. **PURPOSE:** The purpose of this Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between the Hall County Sheriff's Office (hereinafter referred to as "Sheriff's Office"), the Hall County Board of Commissioners (hereinafter referred to as "Commission"), and the Hall County School System (hereinafter referred to as "School System") is to institute and establish and maintain a School Security Program by providing Law Enforcement Services. This program consists of School Resource Officers in Middle and High Schools, School Resource Officers roving in areas as needed, School Security Officers roving in Elementary Schools and Security Officers at requested school events and functions.
- 2. BACKGROUND: Beginning with the 1999 2000 academic year the Sheriff's Office, the Commission, and the School System instituted and established a School Resource Officer / Security Program, which placed a Deputy Sheriff in each of the middle and high schools within the School System for the purpose of providing Law Enforcement Services for the School System. During the 2018 - 2019 academic year a K9 Officer was added. During the 2022 - 2023 academic year and additional School Resource Officer was added at the Lanier Career Academy. The School Resource Officer / Security Program has received overwhelming acceptance and support from the participating entities and the community in general. The School Resource Officer / Security Program has been extremely successful in creating a safe environment in the School System as well as providing the students with outstanding role models. It is the desire of the Sheriff's Office, the Commission, and the School System to fund and continue the School Resource Officer / Security Program and to understand the financial responsibility of each entity as to those expenditures of the School Resource Officer / Security Program not covered by grant monies.
- 3. **BY AND THROUGH AGREEMENT HEREIN,** the Sheriff's Office, the Commission, and the School System hereby agree to the following as it relates to the School System Security Program:

4. SERVICES PROVIDED:

- A. School Resource Officers: The Sheriff's Office will provide Law Enforcement Services to the School System by providing a School Resource Officer at each of the School Systems Middle Schools and High Schools, and four additional Officers to roam between Elementary Schools for a total of 20 School Resource Officers in the program, three of which have a K9 partner. The School System is responsible for all K9 expenses. The Sheriff's Office and School System together will continue to split salaries and benefits 70/30 for 18 positions (2 roving position's salaries/benefits will be the sole responsibility of the Sheriff's Office for FY2025).
- **B.** Crossing Guards: The Sheriff's Office will provide a part-time crossing guard at mutually agreed upon schools throughout the county at the same 70/30 split.
- **C. School Security:** Five (5) rotating extra duty Deputy's will be added this year (FY2025) to roam between Elementary Schools. These Five (5) Deputy's will be funded through an extra duty arrangement with the Sheriff's Office and School System at \$70/hour using the same 70/30 split for the complete 180-day school year.
- **D.** Event/Function Security: Extra duty job slots needed for Security at sporting events, dances, school system functions, etc. will be filled by Sheriff's Office Deputy's on an as needed basis as requested by the School System. These Deputy's will be funded through an extra duty arrangement with the Sheriff's Office and School System at \$50/hour using the same 70/30 split. Scheduling for these events will be handled by the Sheriff's Office and monthly reporting will be provided to the School System with worked details for these events.
- 5. FUNDING: For FY2025, which encompasses the 2024 2025 academic years, the total budget for the School Security Program will be projected at \$3,356,800. This will fund School Resource Officer's salaries, overtime, operating supplies, fuel, training costs, Crossing Guards, School Security, and Event/Function Security as requested. These funds shall be provided by the Commission and the School System based on the previously agreed upon 70% (School System) 30% (Commission) split. Thus, the School System will be responsible for \$2,349,760 and the Commission will be responsible for \$1,007,040. There is no Grant Funding for FY2025. If the total expenditures were to go over or are under the above projected budget for

whatever reason, this account will be reconciled at year end at the agreed upon 70/30 split. Monthly review of actual expenditures can be presented as requested.

- 6. **RECORDS:** All records pertaining to the School Security Program will be collected and maintained by the Sheriff's Office. These records shall include employee personnel files, monthly reports, and statistical data. All criminal reports will be maintained by the Sheriff's Office Records Division and will be subject to the Georgia Open Records Laws.
- 7. DURATION, MODIFICATION, AND TERMINATION: The Sheriff's Office, the Commission, and the School System desire to continue the School Security Program for FY2025, the 2024 2025 academic year. The Program may not be terminated during the fiscal year; however, the program may be terminated at the end of a fiscal year by either party. The party desiring to terminate the program shall notify the other parties of their intentions in writing 60 days prior to terminating the program and only at the conclusion of the fiscal year.
- 8. AUTHORITY: All Sheriff's Office personnel assigned to the School Security Program shall always remain under the chain of command and control of the Sheriff's Office.
- 9. FACILITIES AND EQUIPMENT: The School System will provide office space for each School Resource Officer at the respective school. All equipment and vehicles shall remain the property of the Sheriff's Office and shall be used and maintained in accordance with Sheriff's Office policy.
- 10. **EMPLOYMENT RIGHTS**: Sheriff's Office employees assigned to the School Security Program remain employees of the Sheriff's Office and shall not be penalized in any way for participating in the School Security Program. This includes all employment rights, promotional opportunities, training opportunities, or fringe benefits.
- 11. **REVIEW AND REVISION:** The School Security Program shall be reviewed annually by all parties. Any modifications to this agreement must be in writing and agreed upon by all parties. This Memorandum of Agreement shall remain in effect for the entire fiscal year of **2025**.
- 12. FORCE AND EFFECT: This MOA, which consist of 13 sections on 4 pages, will enter into effect upon the signature of all parties and will remain in effect until June 30, 2025.

Cottrell representative that supplied the paperwork submitted to process the original refund was wrong. The Contract is not exclusive. The County reserves the right to select other Contractors to provide the Services similar to those described in this Contract during the term of the Contract should the need arise, or the Contractor fail to perform.

ARTICLE #105 - CONTRACT TERM

For multi-year contracts, the term will be for five (5) years, with one (1) initial year followed by four (4) one-year renewal options. Renewals are not automatically renewed nor guaranteed.

ARTICLE #106 - CONTRACT AMENDMENTS AND MODIFICATION

This Contract may only be modified, amended, or changed in writing and fully executed by both Parties hereto. This Contract constitutes the sole and entire Contract and understanding between the Parties as to the subject matter hereof, and no verbal promises have been made by either Party in relation hereto.

ARTICLE #107 - REMEDIES AND CONTRACT PERFORMANCE

In the event that either Party to this Contract breaches this Contract, including failure to meet the timetables set forth herein, the non-breaching Party shall provide a written Notice-to-Cure to the breaching Party which describes the breach of this Contract. The breaching Party shall have thirty (30) days from the date of receipt of the written Notice-to-Cure the breach or to otherwise negotiate a resolution of the breach.

If the breach has not been cured and the Parties hereto have not resolved the issue described in the Notice-to-Cure by thirty (30) days after receipt of the letter, the Party authoring the letter shall be entitled to seek any and all remedies allowed by Georgia law, including damages, equitable relief, declaratory relief, specific performance, and/or relief as to any bonds issued hereon. Additional provisions are:

A. **Delay or Impossibility of Performance**. Any failure or delay must be beyond the reasonable control of and without the fault or negligence of the Contractor. If the Services to be provided to the County are interrupted by a force majeure event, as defined below, the County will be entitled to an equitable adjustment to the fees and other payments due to the Contractor under this Contract. If delay results from a subcontractor's negligent conduct or failure to perform, the Contractor shall not be excused from compliance with the terms and obligations of the Contract.

Neither Party shall be held liable or responsible to the other Party nor be deemed to have defaulted under or breached this Contract for failure or delay in fulfilling or performing any obligation under this Contract when such failure or delay is caused by or results from causes beyond the reasonable control of the affected Party including, but not limited to, fire, floods, embargoes, acts of war, civil unrest, insurrections, riots, strikes, lockouts or other labor disturbances, or acts of God; provided, however, that the Party so affected shall use reasonable commercial efforts to avoid or remove such causes of nonperformance, and shall continue performance hereunder with reasonable dispatch whenever such causes are removed. Either Party shall provide the other Party with prompt written notice of any delay or failure to perform that occurs by reason of force majeure.

Definition: The term "force majeure" as defined in Black's Law Dictionary is "an event or effect that can be neither anticipated nor controlled. It is a contractual provision allocating the risk of

loss if performance becomes impossible or impracticable, especially as a result of an event that the Parties could not have anticipated or controlled."

- B. Obligations Beyond Contract Term. The Contract shall remain in full force and effect to the end of the specified term or until terminated or canceled pursuant to ARTICLE #108 TERMINATION PROVISIONS.
- C. Transition Cooperation with the County and Cooperation with Other Contractors. Contractor agrees that upon termination of this Contract for any reason, it shall provide sufficient efforts and reasonable cooperation and assistance to the County to ensure an orderly and efficient transition to the County or an alternative Contractor. Further, if the County has entered into or enters into contracts with other Contractors related to the Services, Contractor agrees to cooperate fully with other such Contractors. Contractor shall not engage in any act that will interfere with the performance of work by any other Contractor(s).

ARTICLE #108 – TERMINATION PROVISIONS

The County may terminate this Contract by providing sixty (60) days written notice to the Contractor at any time. Should the County terminate this Contract prior to the date of automatic termination, Contractor shall provide the County with all deliverables up to the date of termination thirty (30) days after the Notice to Terminate is issued. The County shall pay the Contractor for all work properly performed in compliance with the terms of this Contract up to the date of termination.

- A. **Termination for Convenience**. Following sixty (60) days' written notice, the County may terminate the Contract in whole or in part for any reason without the payment of any penalty or incurring any further obligation to the Contractor.
- B. **Termination for Cause**. The occurrence of any of the following events shall constitute cause for the County to declare the Contractor in default of its obligations under the Contract:
 - 1. The Contractor fails to deliver or has delivered nonconforming Services or fails to perform, to the County's satisfaction, any material requirement of the Contract or is in violation of a material provision of the Contract including, but without limitation, the expressed warranties made by the Contractor.
 - 2. The County determines that Contractor's unsatisfactory performance substantially endangers completion or that default is likely to occur.
 - 3. The Contractor fails to make substantial and timely progress toward performance of the Contract.
 - 4. The Contractor becomes subject to any bankruptcy or insolvency proceeding under federal or state law to the extent allowed by applicable federal or state law including bankruptcy laws; the Contractor terminates or suspends its business; or the County reasonably believes that the Contractor has become insolvent or unable to pay its obligations as they accrue consistent with applicable federal or state law.
 - 5. The Contractor has failed to comply with applicable federal, state, and local laws, rules, County ordinances, regulations, and orders when performing within the scope of the Contract.
 - 6. The Contractor has engaged in conduct that has or may expose the County or the State to liability, as determined in the County's sole discretion; or a material breach of the terms of the Contract by County upon County's failure to cure such material breach after written notice thereof has been delivered in accordance with *ARTICLE #108.C* below constitutes cause for the Contractor to declare that the County is in default of its obligations under the Contract.
- C. Notice of Default. If either Party causes any of the default events set out in ARTICLE #108 - TERMINATION PROVISIONS, then either Party shall issue a written Notice of Default to the Party that causes one (1) or more of the default events requesting that the breach or

noncompliance be remedied within the period of time specified in the Notice of Default. If the breach or noncompliance is not remedied within the period of time specified in the written notice, the non-breaching Party may:

- 1. Immediately terminate the Contract for default without additional written notice; and/or,
- 2. In the event of a breach by the Contractor, the County may procure substitute Services from another source and charge the difference between the Contract and the substitute Contract to the defaulting Contractor; and/or,
- 3. Enforce the terms and conditions of the Contract and seek any legal or equitable remedies.
- D. Termination Due to Non-Availability of Funds. This Contract will terminate immediately and absolutely if the County determines that adequate funds are de-appropriated such that the County cannot fulfill its obligations under the Contract, such determination being at the County's sole discretion and conclusive. County agrees to provide prompt written notice to Contractor in the event of any de-appropriation.
- E. **Termination due to Failure of Contractor to Act.** The County may terminate the Contract for any of the following reasons effective immediately without advance notice:
 - If the Contractor must be certified or licensed as a condition precedent to providing the Services, the revocation, suspension, or other loss of such license or certification may result in immediate termination of the Contract effective as of the date on which the license or certification is no longer in effect.
 - 2. The County determines that the actions, or failure to act, of the Contractor, its agents, employees, or subcontractors have caused, or reasonably could cause, life, health, or safety to be jeopardized.
 - 3. The Contractor furnished any statement, representation, or certification in connection with the Contract or the bidding process, which is materially false, deceptive, criminal, or maliciously incorrect.
 - 4. Failure of the Contractor to obtain, provide, maintain, and deliver the performance and payment bonds (if required) when required under this Contract, or failure to comply with any requirement pertaining to the appropriate amounts thereof as set forth in ARTICLE #123 PERFORMANCE AND PAYMENT BONDS.
- F. **Payment Limitation in Event of Termination**. In the event of termination of the Contract for any reason by County, the County shall pay only those amounts, if any, due and owing to the Contractor for Services actually received and accepted by the County up to and including the date of termination of the Contract and for which the County is obligated to pay pursuant to the Contract.
- G. **Contractor's Termination Duties**. Upon receipt of a Notice of Termination, the Contractor shall:
 - Cease work under the Contract and take all necessary or appropriate steps to limit disbursements and minimize costs and furnish a report within thirty (30) days of the date of Notice of Termination describing the status of all work under the Contract including, without limitation, results accomplished, conclusions resulting therefrom, and any other matters the County may require.
 - 2. Immediately cease use and return to the County any personal property or materials, whether tangible or intangible, provided by the County to the Contractor.
 - 3. Comply with the County's instructions for the timely transfer of any active files and work product produced by the Contractor under the Contract.
 - 4. Cooperate in good faith with the County, its employees, agents, and Contractors during the transition period between the Notification of Termination and the substitution of any replacement Contractor.
 - 5. Contractor is to immediately return any payments made by the County for goods and services that were not delivered by the Contractor.

H. Liquidated Damages. In the event that the Contractor unreasonably delays completion of the services as per the term in Article 105, or who abandons the services before completion, or fails to haul as per the contracted hauling schedule as outlined in Attachment 1, then the Contractor shall pay the County liquidated damages equal to the contracted cost per haul, per location, per day for each non-completed but scheduled haul as outlined in the Exhibit C – Mandatory Cost Proposal Worksheet.

ARTICLE #109 - NO DEFENSE OR INDEMNIFICATION BY COUNTY

The Parties agree that the County shall not be responsible for defending or indemnifying any Contractor from any claim brought by any third party against the Contractor.

ARTICLE #110 – ASSIGNMENT AND DELEGATION BY CONTRACTOR

The Contractor shall not assign or delegate this Contract, or any performance required by it, in whole or in part, without the prior expressed written consent of the County.

ARTICLE #111 -- USE OF THIRD PARTIES (SUBCONTRACTORS)

This Contract is for the benefit of the Parties hereto only and is not intended to benefit any third party or give rise to any duty or causes of action for any third party. All restrictions, obligations, and responsibilities of the Contractor under the Contract shall also apply to third parties such as subcontractors, if allowed in writing by the County. Any Contract with a subcontractor must also preserve the rights of the County.

ARTICLE #112 - ENTIRE CONTRACT

This Contract, as executed and approved, shall constitute the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all other prior and contemporaneous statements, agreements, and understandings between the Parties. No written or oral statements, agreements, or understandings that are not set out, referenced, or specifically incorporated in this Contract shall in any way be binding or of effect between the Parties.

ARTICLE #113 – SEVERABILITY

If any paragraph, sub-paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Contract is declared invalid or unconstitutional by any Court of competent jurisdiction or if the provisions of any part of this Contract as applied to any particular situation or set of circumstances shall be declared invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity shall not be construed to affect the remaining portions of this Contract not so held to be invalid or the application of this Contract to other circumstances not so held to be invalid.

ARTICLE #114 – RECORDS

- A. Public Records Request. The Georgia Open Records Act, as provided in O.C.G.A. § 50-18-70 et seq, requires procurement records and all other records received by or prepared or maintained on behalf of the County shall be made open to public inspection unless otherwise provided by law.
- B. **Record Retention and Access.** The Contractor shall maintain books, records, and documents in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and procedures and which sufficiently and properly document and calculate all charges billed to the County

throughout the term of the Contract for a period of at least five (5) years following the date of final payment or completion of any required audit, whichever is later. Records to be maintained include both financial records and service records.

ARTICLE #115 - ADDITIONAL TERMS

The County shall not be bound by any terms and conditions included in any Contractor's salesorders, literature, packaging, invoice, catalog, brochure, technical data sheet, on-line representation, warranties or service level agreement, or other document which attempts to impose any condition in variance with or in addition to the terms and conditions contained herein.

ARTICLE #116 - WAIVER

The failure of any Party hereto to seek a remedy for any alleged breach of this Contract shall not constitute a waiver of any claim, cause of action, or remedy allowed by Georgia law for breach thereof.

ARTICLE #117 - CONTRACTOR AND COUNTY RIGHTS AND OBLIGATIONS

- A. The County has the right at any time to require the Contractor to put an immediate stop to any procedure, or the use of any equipment, chemical, material, personnel, etc. considered by the County to be hazardous or toxic to persons, buildings, or surfaces. The Contractor will utilize acceptable substitutes approved by the County as quickly as possible. In the event of such replacement, Contractor shall (i) notify County of any resulting replacement, (ii) introduce the individual serving as the replacement to County, and/or (iii) provide County with a résumé and any other information regarding the individual that may be reasonably requested by County.
- B. The County has the right to require the Contractor to reassign or remove any employee or subcontractor's employee from the premises temporarily or permanently when, in the County's sole opinion, the employee is not suitable. The County's decision shall be final, and Contractor will remove the employee immediately and replace with a person of at least equivalent training, experience, and requisite qualifications as quickly as possible, subject to the County's approval.
- C. Contractor agrees to obtain prior written approval from the County for the use of subcontractors to provide the Services described in Scope of Work prior to subcontractor's performance of work.

ARTICLE #118 – INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

The Contractor must procure and maintain insurance policies at the Contractor's own expense and must furnish the County with a certificate of insurance (COI) providing evidence of proof of coverage at least in the amounts indicated in this subsection. The COI must list "Hall County, Georgia" as the certificate holder and as an additional insured under the commercial general, automobile, and umbrella liability policies as follows: "County of Hall, its Board of Commissioners, officers, employees, servants, and agents, 2875 Browns Bridge Rd, Gainesville, GA, 30504". The policy must protect the Contractor and the County (as an additional insured) from any claims for bodily injury, property damage, or personal injury covered by the indemnification obligations set forth herein throughout the duration of the Contract. The Contractor must maintain the following insurance coverage during the term of the Contract, in at least the minimum amounts set forth below, to cover all loss and liability for damages or destruction of property caused by or arising from any and all services carried on and any and all work performed by the Contractor pursuant to this Contract:

Workers Compensation Insurance: Required for all contracts.

- \$500,000 Bodily Injury by Accident Each Accident
- \$500,000 Bodily Injury by Disease Each Disease
- \$500,000 Bodily Injury by Disease Each Employee

<u>Additional Provisions: Waiver of Subrogation</u>. The insurer agrees to waive all rights of subrogation against Hall County Board of Commissioners (BOC), its elected or appointed officers, officials, agents, authorized volunteers, and employees for losses paid under the terms of this policy which arise from work performed by the Named Insured for Hall County BOC. This provision applies regardless of whether or not Hall County BOC has received a waiver of subrogation from the insurer.

General Liability Insurance: Required for all contracts.

- \$2,000,000 General Aggregate
- \$2,000,000 Products & Completed Operations Aggregate
- \$1,000,000 Each Occurrence
- \$1,000,000 Personal & Advertising Injury
- \$500,000 Damages to Premises/Fire/Legal
- \$5,000 Medical Payments

<u>Commercial Auto Liability Insurance: Required for all contracts</u>, except for goods and/or services that are remote in nature and/or are delivered by a professional delivery service.

- \$1,000,000 Combined Single Limit Or \$500,000 per Person/\$1,000,000 per Occurrence
- \$100,000 Property Damage
- \$1,000 for Medical Payments (no fault coverage)

Additional Provisions:

- Uninsured motorist's coverage should be equal to the per occurrence limit except for contracts with other governmental entities.
- Coverage shall be included for any owned, leased, hired, or non-owned autos.
- For any contracts involving the transportation of hazardous materials, limited pollution endorsement ISO form CA9948 or its equivalent shall be on the policy.

Umbrella Liability Insurance: Required for all contracts.

\$1,000,000 per Occurrence

Additional Provisions: Required for all contracts.

- Underlying coverage shall be General Liability, Automobile Liability, and Employers Liability (Workers Compensation).
- Minimum limit of \$5,000,000 per occurrence for all contracts over \$1,000,000 or involving any special risks or high hazard activities.
- Minimum limit of \$5,000,000 for automobile coverage for any transportation contracts involving seniors, special education, transit services, students, or youths.
- Concurrent policy dates with primary liability policies except for workers compensation.

Pollution Liability. Required for all road construction projects, work near wastewater, solid waste lines, or any work that involves handling, transporting, disposing, or working with hazardous materials, pollutants, water reclamation facilities, waste management, or other potentially toxic chemicals.

- \$1,000,000 per Occurrence
- \$1,000,000 Aggregate

Additional Provisions:

 Minimum limit of \$5,000,000 per occurrence for all contracts over \$50,000,000 or involving any special risks or high hazard activities

<u>Professional Liability Insurance (Errors & Omissions)</u>: Required for all professional service contracts. This shall include any consultants, medical, legal, technical, insurance agents, or other professions that require proper licenses.

- \$1,000,000 Each Claim/Wrongful Act
- \$2,000,000 General Aggregate
- If written on a claim's made policy, the policy must be maintained for at least two (2) years after the completion of the work and/or contract.

ARTICLE #122 - COUNTY PAYMENT TO CONTRACTOR

A. The County will issue a Notice to Proceed ("NTP") and a Purchase Order(s) ("PO") to the Contractor. The terms of this Contract shall be incorporated by reference into any PO(s) issued prior to the expiration or termination of this Contract. The County will issue the NTP and PO(s) by electronic mail (e-mail) to the Contractor's representative in ARTICLE #103 – NOTICES. A PO is considered "issued" when the e-mail containing the PO is sent by the County to the Contractor.

The Contractor shall not deliver any Services, equipment, devices, or components thereof until authorized in writing by the County through issuance of a PO, which shall provide a commencement date. Any work including, but not limited to, travel, preliminary meetings, planning, etc. performed outside of the terms and conditions of and before the issuance of a PO will not be considered for payment. Contractors are not to begin work or ship any product on any verbal communication from the County. The County will not be liable for payment for any work or product with the issuance of a verbal communication.

The Scope of Services shall remain in effect from the NTP date to completion of the project. The Parties agree that the County will not pay or otherwise compensate the Contractor for any Services, materials, equipment, devices, or components thereof outside of the Scope of Work and/or beyond the term of this Contract, unless specifically authorized in writing as evidenced by an amendment pursuant to *ARTICLE #106 – CONTRACT AMENDMENTS AND MODIFICATION*, a time extension letter, or as otherwise authorized by the County.

B. Invoice/Payment

- 1. Contractor shall invoice the County via email each month solely to accountspayable@hallcounty.org and only after the County inspects and accepts the Services provided. Receipt of the Services does not constitute acceptance. Invoice amounts shall not exceed the Contractor's pricing set forth in *Exhibit C Cost Proposal.*
- 2. Each properly prepared invoice must be sent in accordance with the instructions listed on the PO. Each invoice shall include the Contractor's current "Remit to" address, a description of the Services provided, the invoice amount, the Contract number, and the associated PO number issued. Standard payment terms are net 30 days (N30) in arrears from the date the invoice is accepted, following delivery of the Services. The County does not pay for services not yet received but only in arrears.
- 3. The Contractor shall be solely responsible for paying all costs, expenses, and charges it incurs in connection with its performance under the Contract.

C. Unsatisfactory Performance/Delay of Payment

- If the County determines that the quality of the Services provided are deficient, unacceptable, or unsatisfactory the County's Project Manager identified in ARTICLE #103

 NOTICES shall issue a written Notice to Cure to Contractor. Contractor agrees that upon receipt of the written Notice to Cure it shall make every effort to correct the deficiency(ies) within the timeframe prescribed therein. If the Contractor fails to timely correct the deficiency(ies), the County reserves the right to delay or deny payment pursuant to this ARTICLE or terminate the Contract pursuant to ARTICLE #108 – TERMINATION PROVISIONS.
- 2. Delay of Payment Due to Contractor's Failure. If the County determines that the Contractor has failed to perform or deliver any Services as required by the Contract, the Contractor shall not be entitled to any compensation under the Contract until such Services are delivered and accepted. In this event, the County may withhold that portion of the Contractor's compensation, which represents payment for Services that were not delivered. To the extent that the Contractor's failure to perform or deliver in a timely manner causes the County to incur costs, the County may deduct the amount of such incurred costs as liquidated damages from any amounts payable to Contractor. The County's authority to deduct such incurred costs shall not in any way affect the County's authority to terminate the Contract.
- D. Set-Off Against Sums Owed by the Contractor. If the Contractor owes the County any sum under the terms of this Contract, pursuant to any judgment or pursuant to any law, the County may set off the sum owed by the Contractor against any sum owed to the Contractor, in the County's sole discretion.
- E. **Final Payment.** Contractor shall issue an invoice for final payment to the County no later than thirty (30) days following the expiration or termination date of the Contract.
- F. The Contractor must not factor or assign payments to another entity or a financial institution. The County will only pay the Party with whom it is contracted. The County will not under any circumstances pay a third party.

ARTICLE #123 -- PERFORMANCE AND PAYMENT BONDS

(Required for construction, renovation, and repair projects)

The Contractor must furnish to the County both a performance and payment bond, both equal to <u>one hundred percent (100%)</u> of the Contract's total award dollar amount. The County will only issue a Notice to Proceed after the bonds are received. Only surety companies licensed to do business in the State of Georgia are acceptable. The Contractor is required to provide new bonds at the issuance of each renewal option term(s) or extension(s) that follow.

The Contractor must provide all required bonding instruments to the County prior to the commencement of any work. The County will consider any work done prior to the receipt of bonding instruments as null and void and thus not eligible for compensation.

<u>ARTICLE #124 – RETAINAGE (Required for construction, renovation, and repair projects)</u> The County will retain and withhold funds from compensation in compliance with Georgia law. The County may hold up to <u>five percent (5%) retainage</u> throughout the entire project and will release said retainage at the point of completion and final acceptance by the County.

ARTICLE #125 - VENUE AND GOVERNING LAW

The Parties agree that this Contract shall be interpreted, construed, and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Georgia. Should either party bring a legal suit to enforce the terms of this Contract, including suit in equity, the Parties agree and consent to file any such suit in the Superior Court of Hall County, Georgia.

ARTICLE #126 - NOTICE OF INTENT TO LITIGATE

Contractor hereby agrees not to file any civil action of disputes or claims relating to the Contract except after first giving thirty (30) days written notice to the County of the claim and the intent to initiate a civil action.

ARTICLE #127 - GEORGIA SECURITY AND IMMIGRATION COMPLIANCE ACT (E-Verify)

- A. By signing this Contract, the Contractor certifies that prior to and throughout the performance of all applicable work under this Contract it will remain in full compliance with all federal and state immigration laws including, but not limited to, 8 U.S.C. § 1324a and the Georgia Security and Immigration Compliance Act (O.C.G.A. §13-10-90 et seq.), as amended by the Illegal Immigration Reform and Enforcement Act of 2011 regarding the verification of employment eligibility of employees under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986. Contractor will ensure that only persons who are citizens or nationals of the United States or non-citizens authorized under federal immigration laws are employed to perform services under this Contract or sub-subcontract hereunder.
- B. Contractor further certifies its compliance with the aforementioned federal and state immigration laws set forth by signing a sworn affidavit, the Georgia Security and Immigration Compliance Act Affidavit (herein known as *Exhibit E E-Verify Affidavit*), notarized by an Official Notary Public and incorporated herein by reference, and obtaining the same affidavit(s) from any subcontractor providing services pursuant to this Contract.

ARTICLE #128 – ORDER OF PRECEDENCE

In the event of any inconsistency, ambiguity, or conflict among the specific provisions of the Contract and the Contractor's response, the order of precedence shall be as follows:

- 1. Any amendments to the Contract, including all exhibits thereto.
- 2. The Contract itself, including all exhibits thereto.
- 3. Attachments appended to the Contract.
- 4. All other Contract attachments appended to the Contract.

ARTICLE #129 – CONTRACT EXHIBITS AND ATTACHMENTS

The Parties mutually acknowledge that all exhibits and attachments listed below made a part of this Contract, as though expressly written in the solicitation documents and the Bidder's response, are herein incorporated into this Contract by reference.

ARTICLE #130 - SALES TAX EXEMPTION STATUS

The County is exempt from State of Georgia and Local Sales and Use Tax. The Bidder understands and acknowledges that they are responsible for any sales and use tax they may incur. The Bidder will not charge the County any sales and use tax as a separate line item. The Contractor may request a copy of the County's Georgia Sales and Use Tax Exemption Certificate.

ARTICLE #131 - HOLD HARMLESS AGREEMENT

The successful respondent hereby agrees to indemnify, hold free and harmless Hall County Government, County Commissioners, its agents, servants, employees, officers, directors, elected officials, or any other person(s) against any loss or expense. This includes attorney fees because of any liability imposed by law upon the County, except in cases of the County's sole negligence, sustained by any person(s) on account of bodily injury or property damage arising out of or in the consequence of this Contract.

ARTICLE #132 - NOT A JOINT VENTURE

The County shall not be bound by any terms and conditions included in any Contractor packaging, invoice, catalog, brochure, technical data sheet, on-line representation, warranties or service level agreement, or other document which attempts to impose any condition in variance with or in the addition to the terms and conditions contained herein.

ARTICLE #133 -- CONTRACT TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- 1. All purchases must comply with the Official Code of Hall County Sections 3.10.010 3.10.190.
- 2. If any conflict or ambiguity arises between the terms and conditions herein and the Official Code of Hall County, the latter will govern.
- 3. The terms and conditions set forth herein shall supersede and govern over all Contractor's terms and conditions or service level agreements.
- 4. The County retains the right to "red line" sections of the Contractor's terms and conditions if such are in conflict with the best interest of the County.
- 5. Acceptance of a Purchase Order ("PO") and delivery of goods or services serves as the Supplier's full and complete acceptance of the County's terms and conditions.
- 6. The terms "supplier", "vendor", "bidder", "offeror", "Contractor", "designer", "distributor", "dealer" or "manufacturer" or otherwise purveyor or source of supply or performance of service shall mean one and the same, herein denoted as "supplier" for goods and "contractor" for services.
- 7. The terms "goods", "materials", "commodities", "components", "drawings", "drafts", "renderings", "plans" (physical or digital), software, SaaS, capital asset equipment, vehicles, heavy earth-moving or other equipment (purchased or leased), or other such deliverables are herein denoted as "goods" and shall mean one and the same.
- 8. "Services" shall mean all services, either financial, advisory, consultative, labor, staff augmentation, construction, rehabilitation, restoration, repair, support or maintenance, communication, telephony, internet, TV or streaming, pest control, grounds maintenance, custodial and janitorial, street or paved surfaces cleaning, drain cleaning, or otherwise where services are offered for consideration.
- 9. The Supplier shall transfer and deliver all goods or services described on the respective PO for the consideration set forth herein.
- 10. The Supplier shall only deliver goods and services as described on the respective PO and within the Scope of Work and the Supplier's bid response.
- 11. The County holds no obligation to pay for goods delivered or services rendered unless specified on a written PO or a Change Order of such.
- 12. The Supplier shall not construe any verbal consent to purchase goods or services as valid.
- 13. The County does not accept substitutions of services or goods that do not comply with the Scope of Work or specifications set forth in the PO, Contract, or Agreement, unless mutually agreed in writing by both Parties.
- 14. The County does not accept automatic contract renewals except for monthly subscription services.

- 15. The County does not pay deposits towards goods ordered. Exceptions exist for custom made items such as window treatments, floor coverings, pre-mixed paints and stains, fabrication, decoration, or otherwise custom designed products specifically for the County.
- 16. The County will accept backorders only if goods are out of stock and with prior written notice. Suppliers shall ship all quantities that it has in stock and hold orders for backorders.
- 17. The County participates in cooperative purchasing agreements, State of Georgia Statewide Contracts, and other state and local intergovernmental agreements, memoranda of understanding and other such agreements.
- 18. In all cases, the jurisdiction shall be the State of Georgia, County of Hall, for arbitration or other legalities.
- 19. Deliveries go to the ship-to addresses listed on the PO and within the time specified. The Supplier must follow instructions if multiple ship-to addresses exist on the PO.
- 20. The County shall have the right to inspect all goods or services at the time and place of delivery. The risk of loss of goods shall pass to the County upon completion and final acceptance of the project delivery.
- 21. Title to the goods shall remain with the Supplier until acceptance by the County. Receipt of goods or services does not constitute acceptance.
- 22. The Supplier warrants that goods are merchantable, and the Supplier has a legal right to deliver the goods and services and as described herein.
- 23. Contractor agrees not to assign, in full or in part, this Contract to another party without the County's expressed written consent. Any attempted assignment or delegation shall void and make ineffectual this Contract for all intents and purposes.
- 24. The County is exempt from Federal Excise Tax and Georgia Sales and Use Tax.
- 25. This issuance of a PO shall not violate the Code of Ethics and Conflicts of Interest for Public Officers and Employees for Government Service set forth in the 2020 Section 45-1020 *et seq.* of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated and the Official Code of Hall County Section 3.10.070 governing Ethics.
- 26. All goods and services supplied pursuant to a PO shall, unless otherwise stated, conform exactly to all the descriptions, specifications, exhibits, and attachments contained in the bid solicitation upon which a PO is based, and all the terms, conditions, and specifications of the bid solicitation are incorporated herein by reference and made a part hereof.
- 27. All media production, recordings, videos, photography, artwork, plates, engravings, and other printed or digital media materials paid for in full by the County are considered County property and shall be delivered to the County upon request.
- 28. If a PO has an attached Contract or Agreement, the terms and conditions of the latter shall govern in the event of any conflict with these terms and conditions.
- 29. The Supplier may be suspended, terminated, or debarred if it is determined that the Supplier has made false certification(s) or has violated such certification(s) by failure to carry out the requirements herein. Thus, the Supplier certifies that it and its subcontractors have not been debarred, suspended, or declared ineligible by any agency of the County, State of Georgia, or as defined in the Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) 48 C.F.R. Ch. 1 Subpart 9.4.
- 30. The Supplier certifies that it is not currently engaged in an active or pending lawsuit or other grievance, injunction, or levy against the County.
- 31. Goods are Free-On-Board (F.O.B.) destination and freight. Shipping and delivery shall be prepaid and added to the invoice as a separate line item. The Supplier shall charge the County the exact amount of freight, delivery, handling, and insurance charges the Supplier incurs.
- 32. The County does not pay late fees nor interest charges.
- 33. The County is not bound to any minimum or maximum quantity or dollar amount set by the Supplier.
- 34. In the event there is a discrepancy between the unit price and extended price, the unit price shall govern.

- 1. The property shall be developed in accordance with the site plan received June 14, 2024, and as described in the project narrative dated June 14, 2024, modified as necessary for compliance with conditions herein and development standards enforced at the time of site plan approval.
- 2. The development shall be served by sewer provided by the City of Flowery Branch.
- 3. The request before you is the request of Nabeel Group of Companies, Inc to amend conditions of zoning to allow a full access drive off McEver Road for a proposed gas station and convenience store. This item is located within Commission District 2.

At their August 5, 2024 meeting, the Hall County Planning Commission voted to recommend approval with twelve (12) conditions (4-0, Varner absent).

Staff recommendation: **Approval**, with conditions, as the proposed use is consistent with the previous approval.

There were **four (4) comments submitted** in advance of the Planning Commission meeting and seven (7) people spoke in opposition during the public hearing.

Planning Commission Conditions:

- 1. The property shall be developed in accordance with the site plan received June 14, 2024, and as described in the project narrative dated June 14, 2024, modified as necessary for compliance with conditions herein and development standards enforced at the time of site plan approval.

8-foot-tall evergreens staggered in two rows on four-foot centers and shall not be disturbed during construction.

Excerpts from the minutes of the August 5, 2024 meeting

Applicant's Presentation:

Katie Greenway, Planning and Zoning Administrator, presented a summary of the request.

Chuck Ross, 10 Lumpkin Street, Lawrenceville, presented the request.

Public Forum:

Cliff McGlamry, 6353 Lights Ferry Road, Flowery Branch, spoke in opposition. He stated that there are plenty of existing gas stations for this community and that he has concerns regarding the hours of operations, and the fast traveling traffic.

Win Fletcher, 5913 Thornhill Place, Flowery Branch, spoke in opposition. Concerns include the proposed turn lane on McEver Road, the line of sight from the Silverthorn subdivision, the roundabout that will keep traffic flowing past their subdivision entrance, and traffic safety.

Timothy Gail, 5918 Terrace Lakee Point, Flowery Branch, spoke in opposition. Concerns are pedestrian safety, the future land use designation not supporting this use, hours of operation, and noises.

Lila Weaver, 5806 Silverthorn Drive, Flowery Branch, spoke in opposition. Concerns are the continued growth on McEver Road, safety due to the sun blinding drivers in the morning coming out of the Silverthorn subdivision, increased traffic, and the speed limit on McEver Road.

Shelly Andrews, 5913 Thornhills Place, Flowery Branch, spoke in opposition. Concerns are inconsistency in the submitted site plan and changes in the conditions of zoning, the safety of the intersection at McEver and Lightsferry, general traffic safety, and the proposed diesel station shown on the site plan.

Jay Kelley, 6023 Terrace Lake Pointe, Flowery Branch, spoke in opposition. Concerns are changing the conditions that were previously approved for this property such as the berm, trees, fence and barbed wire.

Sally Marks, 5810 Silverthorn Drive, Flowery Branch, spoke in opposition. Concerns are the US EPA recommending 1,000 feet prior to being in close proximity of a sensitive area such as the pool for safety. She also spoke about her concern of bringing in human trafficking with the proposed gas station and convenience store.

Rebuttal

The applicant stated that the roundabout construction is to begin around July of next year, that the conditions require that the hours of operation end at 10pm every day, and that all EPA regulations will be followed. The applicant also stated that he was under the impression that the speed limit will decrease to 45 mph once the roundabout is prepared and that removing the requested condition will let them proceed with permitting, but it is subject to the board's approval.

Planning Commission Comments:

Mr. Braswell stated that there were comments in opposition submitted by Shawn Fields, Ron Cholaj, Alic Cholaj, and Donna Cash prior to the meeting. Ms. Garmon stated that the request was initiated by the applicants, not the county. Mr. Braswell stated that it is the right of the applicant to make the request and the applicant will cover the cost of this change. Mr. Hunt stated that approval of this amended condition will send them to the County Engineering Department for approval. Mr. Braswell stated that the site plan needs to have a revised date and conditions need to be added to the plan before going in front of the Board of Commissioners.

Summary Analysis

The applicant is requesting to amend zoning conditions on a 3.57± acre tract, currently zoned Highway-Business (H-B, 17.150), to allow for the implementation of one full access drive with a deceleration lane and left turn lane off McEver Road, and for one full access drive that does not include a deceleration lane or a left turn lane off Lights Ferry Road. The property is currently undeveloped.

The subject property was originally rezoned from Agricultural Residential-III (AR-III, 17.110) to Highway-Business (H-B, 17.150) on November 30, 2021, for the development of a gas station and convenience store with the following 9 conditions (ZON2021-0007):

- 1. The development shall be served by sewer provided by the City of Flowery Branch.
- 2. A fence, a minimum of 8 feet in height with barbed wire on top, shall be constructed on a berm, a minimum of 3 feet in height, along the entirety of the rear property line adjacent to Silverthorn Subdivision. The property buffer shall be 50 feet. Landscaping shall be a minimum of 8 foot tall evergreens staggered in two rows on four foot centers and shall not be disturbed during construction.
- 3. The fence shall not be constructed of wood. It shall be opaque and constructed out of PVC, vinyl chain link, or a similar material.

- 4. The applicant shall continue the screening behind the proposed convenience store with fast-growing evergreens from the northeastern corner following the proposed driveway to the western boundary line.
- 5. McEver Road shall be a right turn exit only and with the location determined by Hall County Traffic Engineering. The entrance shall be placed in a location that will allow Ms. Cash to access her own driveway.
- 6. All development shall adhere to the Gateway Corridor standards and all building materials and color shall be submitted to and approved by the Hall County Planning Director.
- 7. Applicant shall provide a topographic map and an updated site plan to the Board of Commissioners in advance of their meeting on October 28, 2021, so that staff may have time to review and comment.
- 8. The convenience store shall close at 10:00 p.m. and no deliveries shall take place after 10:00 p.m.
- 9. Sidewalks shall be required.

The applicant is requesting to amend the conditions of the Highway Business (H-B) zoning to allow for a full access drive and deceleration lane off McEver Road as well as a full access drive with no deceleration lane and no left turn lane off of Lights Ferry Road. Per the narrative, the applicant states that these modifications will optimize traffic flow and improve accessibility for the site.

The submitted site plan appears to be consistent with the previous application, with the distinction that the new site plan reflects the addition of a second fuel canopy with 3 diesel gas pumps. The narrative states that an 8 foot high fence constructed on a minimum 3 foot high berm will be installed; however, the narrative does not include the barbed wire on top as per Condition #2, nor is the fence or berm reflected on the site plan. Also, the site plan does not reflect the location of sidewalks as required by Condition #9.

Water services will be provided by the City of Gainesville Department of Water Resources with service confirmed in an email dated June 13, 2024. As the property falls within the Flowery Branch sewer district, a letter from the City of Flowery Branch dated June 13, 2024 states that the project could be served by sewer dependent on the following: "...expected sewer plant modifications and new plant are completed, [and] approval from city council and supporting departments [is granted]." If public sewer is not available, the Environmental Health Department will require the development to meet all commercial septic system permitting requirements.

Zoning Analysis

When considering a zoning amendment to the zoning maps, the following items must be considered:

- 1. Whether the zoning proposal will permit a use that is suitable in view of the use, development and zoning of adjacent and nearby property; The requested use is consistent with the previous approval for the rezoning of the property on November 30, 2021.
- 2. Whether the zoning proposal will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property; No, it is not anticipated that the proposed development will adversely affect adjacent properties. Coordination with and approval from Hall County Traffic Engineering is required to ensure all regulations are met.

- 3. Whether the property to be affected by the zoning proposal has a reasonable economic use as currently zoned; The property has reasonable economic use as currently zoned Highway Business (H-B, 17.150).
- 4. Whether the zoning proposal will result in a use which will or could cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, or utilities; It is not anticipated that the proposed zoning use will result in an excessive or burdensome use of existing infrastructure. The proposal has received availability letters for both water and sewer to serve this development.
- 5. Whether the zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the future land use plan for the physical development of the area; The zoning designation has been established by previous board action with the original approval of the development. The requested modification does not significantly impact the designated future land use of the area.
- 6. The extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions; **Staff is** unable to determine the extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions.
- 7. The extent to which the destruction of the subject property's value under the existing zoning promotes the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public; Staff is unable to comment on the impact of property values without a full market analysis. Multiple factors impact property value including construction types, proposed uses, and maintenance. Often it is difficult to determine the effect of a development on adjacent properties until the development is completed.
- 8. The relative gain to the public as compared to the hardship imposed upon the individual property owner; Staff has not identified a hardship imposed on the property owner as the property is currently zoned.
- 9. The length of time the property has been vacant as zoned considered in the context of land development in the area in the vicinity of the property; The property is undeveloped, and satellite imagery indicates that no development has existed on the property since 1999. Additionally, there are no records of building permits or land disturbance permits for the property.
- 10. Whether there are other existing or changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property which give supporting grounds for either approval or disapproval of the zoning proposal; Hall County Engineering currently has a planned project for the intersection of McEver Road and Lights Ferry Road which will incorporate a roundabout and realignment of Lights Ferry Road. These changes may or may not affect the use and development of the property.
- 11. Whether the change would create an isolated district unrelated to the surrounding districts; The current request to amend zoning conditions of the Highway Business (H-B, 17.150) zoning will not create an isolated district.

- 12. Whether the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn in relation to existing conditions in the area; There is no evidence that the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn.
- 13. Whether the change requested is out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole or the immediate neighborhood; The request is not out of scale with the needs of the immediate neighborhood or the county as a whole.
- 14. Whether it is impossible to find adequate sites for the proposed use in districts permitting such use and already appropriately zoned; The existing zoning of the subject site supports the proposed use; however, the proposal of a full access drive to the development from McEver Road requires the amendment of the existing zoning conditions.
- 15. Whether the need for rezoning could be handled instead by a variance request to the zoning board of adjustment; **The request could not be handled alternatively as a variance.**
- 16. Whether there would be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from major modifications to the land if the request is granted; Any land disturbance activities on the property shall be required to go through the land development permitting process, and as a result are subject to local, state, and federal regulations. As a result, there are no anticipated ecological or pollution impacts resulting from any modification to the land if the request is granted.
- 17. Whether there is reasonable evidence based upon existing and anticipated land use that would indicate a mistake was made in the original zoning of the property; **There is no indication that a mistake was made in the original zoning.**

The **Highway Business (H-B, 17.150) zoning district** allows for a variety of commercial uses to meet residents' needs. Development should conform to the existing character and development pattern of the surrounding area. The proposed use of a gas station and convenience store is consistent with the surrounding development pattern.

17.380.050. - Submission requirements

- A. Any person or persons requesting a change in the official zoning map or use subject to approval of the county commission shall file an application with a plat or map of the property attached thereto, together with payment of such fees set forth in chapter 17.30 to cover administrative and advertising costs, in the planning department office. Such person or persons or their authorized agent shall appear in person at the public hearing held to consider the district change. The proposal meets the requirement. The applicant has paid the appropriate fees and understands that someone must be present at both the Hall County Planning Commission meeting and the voting meeting of the Hall County Board of Commissioners.
- B. All applications for a change of zoning classification or use subject to approval of the county commission shall include:
 - 1. A narrative statement identifying the existing and proposed use of the property and addressing each of the criteria set forth in section 17.380.060.C of this section [chapter]. Proposal does provide a narrative outlining amendment of conditions

requested; however, the applicant has not prepared a response to each of the criteria listed in 17.380.060.C.

- 2. A site plan drawn to scale designating the area covered by the application and identifying existing and proposed buildings and uses, adjacent existing land uses, zoning on contiguous parcels, including those across an abutting public right-of-way, and any other significant site improvements proposed to accommodate the proposed use or buffer adjacent uses, etc., or a plat of the subject property where no specific land use is proposed. In cases where only a plat or map is provided and no land use is proposed, the planning commission and county commission shall evaluate the application based on the most intense possible land use permitted in the proposed district. The proposal does meet the requirement. The applicant has provided a site plan and included much of the necessary information to properly assess the development. However, information about adjacent parcels is limited.
- C. For any application for a slow rate land treatment system (see chapter 17.20), the following additional requirements apply. The proposed development intends to utilize public sewer and water; as such, this is not applicable. If public sewer is not available, the Environmental Health Department will require the development to meet all commercial septic system permitting requirements.
- D. For any application proposing the development of 100 or more residential dwelling units, a traffic impact study shall be submitted prior to consideration of the application by the planning commission. At the applicant's expense, the traffic impact study shall be prepared by a professional engineer in accordance with requirements established by the Hall County Engineering Department. The engineering department shall review the traffic impact study and forward any comments to the Hall County Planning Commission. The proposed development does not contain any residential dwelling units, and as such is exempt from this requirement

Development Support and Constraints

Hall County Environmental Health

In an email dated June 28, 2024, Emily McGahee stated "If public sewer not available, development must meet all Environmental Health commercial septic system permitting requirements if able to be permitted by Environmental Health. Wastewater treatment and disposal may be required to be permitted through EPD. Further determination will be made during the civil plan review process. A detailed business plan must be submitted to Hall County Environmental Health for review. Tourist Accommodation permit/plan review and/or Food Service permit/plan review may be required after review of business plan."

Hall County Fire Marshal

In an email dated July 2, 2024, John Hornick, NPQ Fire Service Plans Examiner 1, stated the following: "The Hall County Fire Marshal's Office has no comments as proposed."

Hall County Public Works and Utilities

In a memorandum from Public Works and Utilities dated July 05, 2024, Bill Nash, Director of Public Works, stated the following:

Engineering:

This site may require a stormwater management report should the site plan indicate the proposed development meets stormwater thresholds for impervious surfaces and/or disturbed acreage.

Traffic:

Driveway to be reviewed during plan review.

Utilities:

No Hall County sewer in area.

Georgia Department of Transportation

Dear Members of the Planning Commission,

I am writing to express my strong opposition to the proposed amendment to the zoning conditions for 5820 McEver Road, allowing the construction of a gas station and convenience store by the Nabeel Group of Companies Inc. As homeowners in the adjacent Silverthorn subdivision, we have several concerns based on local county and state zoning and environmental ordinances, which I believe support the rejection of this proposal.

Firstly, the proposed left turn in (middle lane) going northeast poses a significant traffic hazard. According to local traffic regulations, any development must not compromise the safety of existing road users. The curve on McEver Road, combined with the speed of traffic and the sun's position during winter, creates a dangerous situation for residents entering and exiting our neighborhood. This change is in direct conflict with the Hall County Zoning Ordinance's emphasis on maintaining safe and efficient transportation systems (Hall County Zoning Ordinance, Article 10).

Furthermore, the proximity of the gas station to our neighborhood pool raises serious concerns about environmental pollution and safety. The Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance for Hall County mandates that commercial developments must not negatively impact adjacent residential areas. The potential for fuel spills, water runoff, and increased noise and air pollution from late-night fueling and garbage truck activities directly contravenes these regulations. This development would also pose a risk of unauthorized access to our pool property, leading to safety and security issues.

Additionally, the proposal does not sufficiently address the required buffering and landscaping between the commercial site and our residential area. According to the Hall County Environmental Ordinances, adequate fencing, tree planting, and landscaping are mandatory to minimize visual and noise impacts. The proposed site plan lacks these essential features, further exacerbating the potential negative impact on our community.

The diesel pumping station proposed to be located near our pool is particularly concerning. Diesel exhaust contains harmful pollutants that can severely affect air quality and public health. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has guidelines that emphasize minimizing public exposure to diesel emissions, especially in residential areas. Allowing this diesel station would be a clear violation of these health guidelines and environmental standards.

Lastly, the proposed operating hours of the gas station will lead to increased noise and disturbances during late night and early morning hours, affecting the quality of life in our neighborhood. The Hall County Noise Ordinance sets strict limits on permissible noise levels, particularly during night-time hours. The expected increase in traffic and activity at the gas station would undoubtedly lead to frequent breaches of these noise limits.

In conclusion, the proposed gas station and convenience store at 5820 McEver Road present numerous risks and conflicts with existing zoning and environmental regulations. I urge the Planning Commission to consider these points carefully and reject the amendment to the zoning conditions. Protecting the safety, health, and quality of life for residents in our community should be the priority.

Excerpts from the minutes of the September 3, 2024 meeting

Applicant's Presentation:

Katie Greenway, Planning and Zoning Administrator, presented a summary of the request.

Naveen Kommineni, 1760 Marcia Overlook Drive presented the request. The applicant stated that there is an existing home on the property so they will only be adding four more homes. The applicant stated that two homes would be built off of Old Fork Road and two off of Brand Drive.

Public Forum:

Scott Jacobs, 2488 Old Fork Road, spoke in opposition. His concerns were that privately installed waterlines may be damaged during development, that there may be fire access issues due to road conditions, the use of homes as AirBNBs will create more trash and attract animals, and that the elevation change in this area is steep which will cause stormwater issues for neighboring properties.

Roger Rochat, 2485 Old Fork Road, spoke in opposition. His concerns included water runoff, inadequate infrastructure, and traffic and pedestrian safety.

Donovan Williams, 2485 Brand Drive, spoke in opposition. His concerns included property values, water runoff, road and environmental safety, possible damage to waterlines, and fire access issues.

<u>Rebuttal</u>

The applicant stated that the homes will be single-family site-built homes with no manufactured homes. Additionally, the applicant stated that engineering plans will be submitted showing proper silt fencing and that grading will be as minimal as possible for the development of the homes. Furthermore, he states that they intend to work with Gainesville Water to ensure no damage is done to existing waterlines.

Planning Commission Comments:

Mr. Braswell questioned if the water line would be extended on Old Fork Road. The applicant stated that the City of Gainesville Water Department will provide two new water meters but he is not sure if they will tap into the existing line. Mr. Varner questioned if the applicant would be willing to add a condition in regards to working with the City of Gainesville for water lines. Mr. Hunt questioned if the homes would have brick or stone. The applicant stated they would be 3-sided brick with stone on the front façade. Mr. Hunt questioned if the applicant is going to build and sell the homes. The applicant stated that was correct. Ms. Pilcher questioned the 24-inch pipe that runs under the road that appears to be the only drainage of the area into the cove. Ms. Pilcher questioned if the applicant will be responsible for maintaining the drainpipe. Ms. Garmon stated that the site will not require an LDP so additional drainage improvements may not be required. Mr. Hunt questioned if the applicant could build this request within the existing zone. Ms. Garmon stated that it would still have to go in front of the Board of Commissioners for approval of the subdivision.

Summary Analysis

The applicant is requesting to rezone 4.80± acres of property zoned Agricultural Residential III (AR-III, 17.110) and Vacation Cottage (V-C, 17.50) to Vacation Cottage (V-C, 17.50) (HZON24-0021). Concurrently, the applicant is requesting a conditional use subject to County Commission approval to subdivide the subject property into five (5) single-family residential lots (HZCU24-0028). The development is proposed at a density of 1.04 units per acre.

The subject property is zoned both Agricultural Residential III (AR-III) and Vacation Cottage (V-C). The property is currently developed with a single-family residence that was built in 1977, a storage building built in 1977, and a detached garage built in 1978. The residence and storage building are included on the proposed Tract 2 and the existing garage will be either removed or relocated within Tract 2 to comply with setbacks. Current access to the existing residence is off of Brand Road. This access will be removed and replaced by a new driveway off of Old Fork Road. The remainder of the property is undeveloped.

All proposed lots meet the minimum lot area and frontage requirements for Vacation Cottage (V-C, 17.50) as established in Table 17.240.010.

Per the submitted narrative, water service will be provided by the City of Gainesville Department of Water Resources with service confirmed by email on June 18, 2024. The development will also be serviced by individual, onsite septic systems.

No variances have been requested or identified as part of this request; therefore, any deficiencies identified as part of the plan will be required to comply with the respective zoning districts of the parcels.

Based on the future land use plan, staff finds the request *is consistent* with the Hall County Comprehensive Plan future land use designation of "Lake Area Residential" which supports low density residential development of up to one unit per acre. The intent of this land use category is to support the preservation of established neighborhoods and to support the creation of opportunities for permanent and vacation residences similar in land use patterns to Residential Areas but at lower residential densities. The Lake Area Residential designation envisions a maximum density of 1 dwelling unit per acre. The development has an overall proposed density of 1.04 units per acre.

Zoning Analysis – Rezone and Conditional Use

Per Planning Commission and Hall County Commission consideration and decision (<u>17.380.060</u>), the board shall study the need and justification for the change based on a determination of the facts applicable to the particular case, and the following general lines of inquiry shall be considered, to wit:

- (A) Rezone | from Agricultural-Residential-III (AR-III, 17.110) and Vacation Cottage (V-C, 17.50) to Vacation Cottage (V-C, 17.50)

 - Whether the zoning proposal will permit a use that is suitable in view of the use, development and zoning of adjacent and nearby property; The proposed rezoning and conditional use for a 5-lot single-family subdivision is consistent with the use, development and zoning of adjacent and nearby properties as neighboring parcels are similarly zoned Vacation Cottage (V-C, 17.50) and/or Agricultural Residential III (AR-III, 17.110).
 - 2. Whether the zoning proposal will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property; It is not anticipated that the proposed rezoning or subdivision will adversely affect adjacent properties.
 - **3.** Whether the property to be affected by the zoning proposal has a reasonable economic use as currently zoned; **Yes, the property has reasonable economic use as currently zoned**, **Vacation**

Cottage (V-C, 17.50) and Agricultural Residential III (AR-III, 17.110); however, the applicant cannot subdivide the property without approval by the Board of Commissioners.

- 4. Whether the zoning proposal will result in a use which will or could cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, utilities, schools, police protection, fire protection, public health facilities or emergency medical service; It is not anticipated that the proposed rezoning or subdivision will result in an excessive or burdensome use of existing infrastructure. The proposal has received an availability letter for public water and will utilize private on-site septic systems.
- 5. Whether the zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the future land use plan for the physical development of the area; The proposed use is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan and the "Lake Area Residential" land use designation. This land use designation envisions a maximum density of 1 dwelling unit per acre. The proposed development has an overall density of 1.04 units per acre. In addition, all proposed lots meet the minimum lot size required in the underlying zoning district.
- 6. The extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions; Staff is unable to determine the extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions.
- 7. The extent to which the destruction of the subject property's value under the existing zoning promotes the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public; Staff is unable to comment on the impact of property values without a full market analysis. Multiple factors impact property value including construction types, proposed uses, and maintenance. Often it is difficult to determine the effect of a development on adjacent properties until the development is completed.
- 8. The relative gain to the public as compared to the hardship imposed upon the individual property owner; Staff has not identified a hardship imposed on the property owner as the property is currently zoned.
- **9.** The length of time the property has been vacant as zoned considered in the context of land development in the area in the vicinity of the property; **The property is currently developed with a single-family residence and accessory structures.**
- 10. Whether there are other existing or changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property which give supporting grounds for either approval or disapproval of the zoning proposal; Staff is not aware of any changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property.

- 11. Whether the change would create an isolated district unrelated to the surrounding districts; The surrounding parcels consist of Agricultural Residential-III (AR-III) and Vacation Cottage (V-C) zoning. No isolated zoning district would be created if approved.
- 12. Whether the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn in relation to existing conditions in the area; There is no evidence that the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn.
- 13. Whether the change requested is out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole or the immediate neighborhood; No, the request is not out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole.
- 14. Whether it is impossible to find adequate sites for the proposed use in districts permitting such use and already appropriately zoned; The subdivision of land within the Vacation Cottage (V-C, 17.50) zoning district requires Board of Commissioner approval.
- 15. Whether the need for rezoning could be handled instead by a variance request to the [planning commission]; The request is for rezoning and a conditional use to subdivide the property into 5 single-family residential lots which could not be handled instead by a variance.
- 16. Whether there would be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from major modifications to the land if the request is granted; Any land disturbance activities on the property shall be required to go through the land development permitting process, and as a result are subject to local, state, and federal regulations. As a result, there should not be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from any modification to the land if the request is granted.
- **17.** Whether there is reasonable evidence based upon existing and anticipated land use that would indicate a mistake was made in the original zoning of the property; **There is no indication that a mistake was made in the original zoning.**

Dear Hall County Planning Commission:

Thank you for your careful consideration of this request. I think it's important to note some key concerns we have for this rezoning and conditional use request.

In stark contrast to Hall County's Future Development Guide for Lake Area Residential neighborhoods, the addition of 4 properties would increase the total SFDU's (single family dwelling units) by 26.6% on one parcel. As noted in the staff report by the Hall County Fire Chief, the road is already dangerous and inadequate for emergency vehicles and certainly dangerous for residents walking which is a specific draw to a "Lake Area Residential" neighborhood.

Additionally, it's stated in the staff report that the parcel subdivided as requested by the developer is 1.04 acres per dwelling which doesn't seem to be accurate with a 4.8-acre parcel being divided into 5 lots. It should be noted the request for VC allows for a smaller lot size and reduced setbacks. The property has a significant amount of topographic challenges which should require an environmental impact study given the run-off will directly impact the current water management and waste into Lake Lanier.

The neighborhood also has 2 additional lake front properties that are not developed in addition to another estate size lot that has exceptional lake views. Can we get clarification from utilities that additional taps beyond the two noted in the request from the developer can be added? This would be an important consideration since we know the value of the "lake front" lots will have a significantly higher value and tax base potential.

With the addition of some short-term rentals in the neighborhood, including the property in question, we have experienced a sharp increase in criminal activity. It could be a direct impact with the transitory nature of non-residents introduced to the location. While VC zoning permits such usage, that is not representative of the current neighborhood. The "Future Development Guide" specifically calls out the need to PRESERVE established neighborhoods.

The most recent 4 lots developed in the neighborhood all have 2024 tax assessments of \$600K - \$1.4mm in value. I respectfully ask the commission to consider the substantial impact to the values of the current properties. The developer is a non-resident of both the neighborhood and Hall County. It appears the intent is to maximize the number of units that can be placed on the parcel for the purpose of short and maybe long-term rentals. Again, it's well documented the impact to property values if the developer is allowed maximum density with properties not similar in quality or value of the surrounding properties.

Understanding the parcel in question is already zoned VC for a large portion, at a minimum, the current zoning would reduce the number of additional lots to 4 instead of 5 and would ask that the commission get clarity on the usage intent and quality of the development in question.

Thank you for protecting our property values and our families by closely evaluating this request.

1. Old Fork Rd is a short, narrow road with signs of deteriorating cracks and broken side edges in places. The ongoing usage by construction vehicles and delivery trucks for four newly constructed homes would further deteriorate the narrow road, requiring the road to be resurfaced and widened for the parade of heavy equipment for this construction plan.

2. Depending on the price point for these new homes, there is expected concern over their impact to the existing home values on Old Fork, Godfrey Way, and Brand Dr.

3. The possible addition of four more vacation rental homes on our short street and small neighborhood presents a reasonable concern to the amount of increased traffic traveling in and out on Old Fork Rd., impacting both safety and increase in road maintenance.

Major concerns about Old Fork Road project.

1. Density. Current residents are considered Lake Residential and low density. The proposal has five homes on less than 5 acres. Will the proposed property be consistent with existing homes?

2. Property values. What is the scope of buildings?(Size, with or without garages, ranch or multi story, basement, price range, etc.

3. Road condition. Old Fork Rd is steep, curvy and narrow. The existing road and shoulders would be considered in poor condition. The road would need to be widened plus a 3 inch overlay of asphalt. The traffic count would increase significantly with addition of two cars per household or 10 more cars twice daily accounting for 20 trips per day just for this project once completed. Construction traffic would deteriorate existing road.

4 Noise. There is potential noise related problems stemming from daily construction in close proximity to other homes.5. Water and sewer. City water and drilled wells accessibility. Adequate septic system lines plus additional backup plan for possible failure of system..

6. Safety. With the current and proposed traffic and the quick growth of delivery truck frequency, any and all pedestrian traffic would be at risk. (UPS, Prime, FedEx, grocery delivery Etc.)

Overall, I feel five homes on the property would cause undue stress on all county systems and services. Possible solutions: Limit to four homes total and approval from board in keeping with a finished project that will enhance our community.

Dear Ms Garmon

We write to oppose re-zoning of 2466 Old Fork Road. Our family has lived across the street for 42 years. Over the years, three family members have died...and a portion of their ashes have been sprinkled in family ceremonies around the property. Our youngest child grew up on the lake and got married by the lake. We love the place! We are now in our eighties. We enjoy morning walks on Old Fork Road. We enjoy the wildlife, deer, groundhogs, birds, trees and flowers. I have identified over 100 species of trees on or near our property. We greatly enjoy our privacy and quiet. We also enjoy our neighbors; some have direct access to the lake.

The proposed property for rezoning does not have direct access to the lake—and the proposed lots would have limited view of water. We are not eager to have neighbors trespassing our property to access the lake.

Construction activity of the order proposed by this re-zoning endangers all that we enjoy. Construction often damages neighbors' property. Recently, workers building a nearby house knocked down our mailbox. The trucks damage the narrow road and endanger our walking. Workers often thrown cans and other trash onto neighbors' property.

The road definitely requires widening so passenger vehicles can safely pass each other or construction trucks. Moreover, city water and fire engine protection need to be more readily available before considering expanding the community. We have dead end streets without turn around capacity for trucks, fire engines, or cars.

We knew the Donnie and Becky Stephens family who built and lived in the house. They too sought privacy and nature; sadly, he died of cancer. His widow and widowed mother still live. They lack any right to the property, but the proposed rezoning would be a loss of their and our mutual vision for the community that lives peacefully close to nature.

I would like to express my serious concerns regarding the planned rezoning/development of 2466 Old Fork Road.

Many of us only have a well to service our homes with water. Is there a 100% guarantee that adding wells uphill will not impact the water table downhill and therefore our wells? Additionally, will there be septic tanks needed as well? What are the implications of those drain fields on the water in our wells. I believe running city water to any dwellings should be required.

As is a matter of public record, all of the homes built in the last 5 years (and a few that already existed) are all valued at \$1,000,000 plus. Many of us have built/bought these properties as a legacy to leave for our children. I am concerned about these small properties being used as comparisons for valuation in the future. These properties should be required to conform to the surrounding properties.

What types of use are planned for this property? Single family homes, short term rentals, long term rentals? Vacation rentals make no sense at all as there is no lake access or view of the lake. Also, there is next to zero law enforcement presence here. Yes, if you call 911 someone will come, but not as a matter of a regular visible presence to deter negative activities.

Old Fork road is not wide enough to accommodate a pick up truck (which everyone around here owns) and a car. I drive a small, low car, pulling off the side isn't a possibility as in many places, it drops off. Widening of Old Fork would be a necessity and my understanding is there are water lines running very close to the road. What would be the plans for that?

Are there any thoughts to putting a turn around at the end of Brand Drive? I am vehemently opposed to that idea. We chose this property 20 years ago for the privacy it afforded. Making it easy for people to drive down here would deeply, negatively effect our quality of life.

Have all of you come and driven around this area to see what the local neighborhood is and the look and feel of this community? If not, I would suggest you take the time to make the effort so you can appreciate how the

people living in the immediate area would see what is being proposed at 2466 Old Ford Rd.

Dear Planning Commission Members,

I'm writing to express my concern and opposition to the proposed rezoning request and development in our neighborhood. This is in reference to the rezoning request for 2466 Old Fork Road to rezone from AR-III & V-C to V-C only.

My opposition centers around 5 key areas:

- Safety
- Property Values
- Environmental Concerns
- Rezoning not required
- Not in keeping with the spirit of the Hall Count land use master plan

Safety: The proposed changes would dramatically increase the traffic along Old Fork Rd. The road is already in disrepair and too narrow for traffic to pass without one or both vehicles needing to pull off. There's no shoulder or worse, a drop off, for most of the length of the road. Increased construction traffic will only make this worse and I'm concerned about the general safety of all vehicles on the road with the increased traffic during construction and after occupancy. At a minimum the road should be widened and the shoulder improved for safety.

Property Values: It is our current understanding from the developer that they will be placing small pre-manufactured buildings on this proposed rezoning site as opposed to homes that match the style and size of the other homes recently constructed in this area. There have been many studies that show the dramatic decrease in property value for surrounding homes when these types of homes are introduced. The area in question has seen a significant increase in property values because of the investment in larger homes. This is both good for the Hall County tax base and good for the neighborhood. Putting in a neighborhood of small cottages will reverse those gains and sabotage the investment and progress that we have been making. They will all be used as comps for new construction making it more difficult to acquire mortgages for the types of homes that have been going up.

Environmental Concerns: The proposed property has a very significant grade sloping towards the lake and to the creek running into the lake between Brand Dr and Ford White. Previous lawsuits have already been brought against developers for the clear cutting and construction that resulted in significant amounts of silt into the Sardis Creek area. This resulted in a very expensive de-silting operation in the lake in the cove directly adjacent to the proposed development. Septic runoff, additional well usage, clear cutting and other construction will only serve to make existing issues worse.

Rezoning Unnecessary: It is unclear as to exactly why this rezoning is even required other than the greed of the developers to squeeze in one more small lot to increase profits and density. They can ALREADY build "vacation cottage" sized homes with the current zoning restrictions. This entire rezoning request is unnecessary and a waste of the planning commission's and community time.

Not Part of the Master Plan: The current master plan states "PRESERVE established neighborhoods and CREATE opportunities for <u>permanent</u> and vacation residences similar in land use pattern..." Clearly a manufactured home community, with small lots and no lake access in an existing neighborhood is not preserving the neighborhood nor is it creating permanent or vacation residences in a similar manner. There is zero access or view of Lake Lanier for any of these homes and unlikely that they will be viewed as "vacation cottages" instead this will become a burden on the neighborhood and it is not in keeping with the spirit OR the letter of the Lake Area Residential master plan.

I appreciate your thoughtful consideration of the above points and look forward to the discussion on Sept. 3

The request before you is the request of Rashmiranjan Jyotiprakash for a use subject to county commission approval for a subdivision to establish a 5-lot single-family development. This item is located within Commission District 2.

At their September 3, 2024 meeting, the Hall County Planning Commission voted to recommend approval, with ten (10) conditions (3-1, Pilcher opposed and Sosebee absent).

Staff recommendation: Approval, with conditions, as the proposed rezoning is consistent with the Lake Area Residential future land use classification within the Comprehensive Plan.

There were **four (4) comments submitted** in advance of the Planning Commission meeting and three (3) people spoke in opposition during the public hearing.

- 1. The property shall be developed in accordance with the site plan dated August 5, 2024, and as described in the project narrative, modified as necessary for compliance with conditions herein and development standards enforced at the time of site plan approval.

Excerpts from the minutes of the September 3, 2024 meeting

Applicant's Presentation:

Katie Greenway, Planning and Zoning Administrator, presented a summary of the request.

Naveen Kommineni, 1760 Marcia Overlook Drive presented the request. The applicant stated that there is an existing home on the property so they will only be adding four more homes. The applicant stated that two homes would be built off of Old Fork Road and two off of Brand Drive.

Public Forum:

Scott Jacobs, 2488 Old Fork Road, spoke in opposition. His concerns were that privately installed waterlines may be damaged during development, that there may be fire access issues due to road conditions, the use of homes as AirBNBs will create more trash and attract animals, and that the elevation change in this area is steep which will cause stormwater issues for neighboring properties.

Roger Rochat, 2485 Old Fork Road, spoke in opposition. His concerns included water runoff, inadequate infrastructure, and traffic and pedestrian safety.

Donovan Williams, 2485 Brand Drive, spoke in opposition. His concerns included property values, water runoff, road and environmental safety, possible damage to waterlines, and fire access issues.

Rebuttal

The applicant stated that the homes will be single-family site-built homes with no manufactured homes. Additionally, the applicant stated that engineering plans will be submitted showing proper silt fencing and that grading will be as minimal as possible for the development of the homes. Furthermore, he states that they intend to work with Gainesville Water to ensure no damage is done to existing waterlines.

Planning Commission Comments:

Mr. Braswell questioned if the water line would be extended on Old Fork Road. The applicant stated that the City of Gainesville Water Department will provide two new water meters but he is not sure if they will tap into the existing line. Mr. Varner questioned if the applicant would be willing to add a condition in regards to working with the City of Gainesville for water lines. Mr. Hunt questioned if the homes would have brick or stone. The applicant stated they would be 3-sided brick with stone on the front façade. Mr. Hunt questioned if the applicant is going to build and sell the homes. The applicant stated that was correct. Ms. Pilcher questioned the 24-inch pipe that runs under the road that appears to be the only drainage of the area into the cove. Ms. Pilcher questioned if the applicant will be responsible for maintaining the drainpipe. Ms. Garmon stated that the site will not require an LDP so additional drainage improvements may not be required. Mr. Hunt questioned if the applicant could build this request within the existing zone. Ms. Garmon stated that it would still have to go in front of the Board of Commissioners for approval of the subdivision.

Summary Analysis

The applicant is requesting to rezone 4.80± acres of property zoned Agricultural Residential III (AR-III, 17.110) and Vacation Cottage (V-C, 17.50) to Vacation Cottage (V-C, 17.50) (HZON24-0021). Concurrently, the applicant is requesting a conditional use subject to County Commission approval to subdivide the subject property into five (5) single-family residential lots (HZCU24-0028). The development is proposed at a density of 1.04 units per acre.

The subject property is zoned both Agricultural Residential III (AR-III) and Vacation Cottage (V-C). The property is currently developed with a single-family residence that was built in 1977, a storage building built in 1977, and a detached garage built in 1978. The residence and storage building are included on the proposed Tract 2 and the existing garage will be either removed or relocated within Tract 2 to comply with setbacks. Current access to the existing residence is off of Brand Road. This access will be removed and replaced by a new driveway off of Old Fork Road. The remainder of the property is undeveloped.

All proposed lots meet the minimum lot area and frontage requirements for Vacation Cottage (V-C, 17.50) as established in Table 17.240.010.

Per the submitted narrative, water service will be provided by the City of Gainesville Department of Water Resources with service confirmed by email on June 18, 2024. The development will also be serviced by individual, onsite septic systems.

No variances have been requested or identified as part of this request; therefore, any deficiencies identified as part of the plan will be required to comply with the respective zoning districts of the parcels.

Based on the future land use plan, staff finds the request *is consistent* with the Hall County Comprehensive Plan future land use designation of "Lake Area Residential" which supports low density residential development of up to one unit per acre. The intent of this land use category is to support the preservation of established neighborhoods and to support the creation of opportunities for permanent and vacation residences similar in land use patterns to Residential Areas but at lower residential densities. The Lake Area Residential designation envisions a maximum density of 1 dwelling unit per acre. The development has an overall proposed density of 1.04 units per acre.

Zoning Analysis – Rezone and Conditional Use

Per Planning Commission and Hall County Commission consideration and decision (<u>17.380.060</u>), the board shall study the need and justification for the change based on a determination of the facts applicable to the particular case, and the following general lines of inquiry shall be considered, to wit:

- (A) Rezone | from Agricultural-Residential-III (AR-III, 17.110) and Vacation Cottage (V-C, 17.50) to Vacation Cottage (V-C, 17.50)
- (B) Use Subject to County Commission Approval | 5-lot single-family development
 - Whether the zoning proposal will permit a use that is suitable in view of the use, development and zoning of adjacent and nearby property; The proposed rezoning and conditional use for a 5-lot single-family subdivision is consistent with the use, development and zoning of adjacent and nearby properties as neighboring parcels are similarly zoned Vacation Cottage (V-C, 17.50) and/or Agricultural Residential III (AR-III, 17.110).
 - 2. Whether the zoning proposal will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property; It is not anticipated that the proposed rezoning or subdivision will adversely affect adjacent properties.
 - **3.** Whether the property to be affected by the zoning proposal has a reasonable economic use as currently zoned; **Yes, the property has reasonable economic use as currently zoned**, **Vacation**

Cottage (V-C, 17.50) and Agricultural Residential III (AR-III, 17.110); however, the applicant cannot subdivide the property without approval by the Board of Commissioners.

- 4. Whether the zoning proposal will result in a use which will or could cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, utilities, schools, police protection, fire protection, public health facilities or emergency medical service; It is not anticipated that the proposed rezoning or subdivision will result in an excessive or burdensome use of existing infrastructure. The proposal has received an availability letter for public water and will utilize private on-site septic systems.
- 5. Whether the zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the future land use plan for the physical development of the area; The proposed use is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan and the "Lake Area Residential" land use designation. This land use designation envisions a maximum density of 1 dwelling unit per acre. The proposed development has an overall density of 1.04 units per acre. In addition, all proposed lots meet the minimum lot size required in the underlying zoning district.
- 6. The extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions; Staff is unable to determine the extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions.
- 7. The extent to which the destruction of the subject property's value under the existing zoning promotes the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public; Staff is unable to comment on the impact of property values without a full market analysis. Multiple factors impact property value including construction types, proposed uses, and maintenance. Often it is difficult to determine the effect of a development on adjacent properties until the development is completed.
- 8. The relative gain to the public as compared to the hardship imposed upon the individual property owner; Staff has not identified a hardship imposed on the property owner as the property is currently zoned.
- **9.** The length of time the property has been vacant as zoned considered in the context of land development in the area in the vicinity of the property; **The property is currently developed with a single-family residence and accessory structures.**
- 10. Whether there are other existing or changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property which give supporting grounds for either approval or disapproval of the zoning proposal; Staff is not aware of any changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property.

- 11. Whether the change would create an isolated district unrelated to the surrounding districts; The surrounding parcels consist of Agricultural Residential-III (AR-III) and Vacation Cottage (V-C) zoning. No isolated zoning district would be created if approved.
- 12. Whether the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn in relation to existing conditions in the area; There is no evidence that the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn.
- 13. Whether the change requested is out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole or the immediate neighborhood; No, the request is not out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole.
- 14. Whether it is impossible to find adequate sites for the proposed use in districts permitting such use and already appropriately zoned; The subdivision of land within the Vacation Cottage (V-C, 17.50) zoning district requires Board of Commissioner approval.
- 15. Whether the need for rezoning could be handled instead by a variance request to the [planning commission]; The request is for rezoning and a conditional use to subdivide the property into 5 single-family residential lots which could not be handled instead by a variance.
- 16. Whether there would be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from major modifications to the land if the request is granted; Any land disturbance activities on the property shall be required to go through the land development permitting process, and as a result are subject to local, state, and federal regulations. As a result, there should not be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from any modification to the land if the request is granted.
- 17. Whether there is reasonable evidence based upon existing and anticipated land use that would indicate a mistake was made in the original zoning of the property; There is no indication that a mistake was made in the original zoning.

The proposal meets the requirement, and the applicant understands that someone must be present at both the Hall County Planning Commission meeting and the voting meeting of the Hall County Board of Commissioners.

- A narrative statement identifying the existing and proposed use of the property and addressing each of the criteria set forth in section 17.380.060.C of this section [chapter].
 The proposal does provide a narrative outlining the intent of the request; however, the applicant has not prepared a response to each of the criteria listed in 17.380.060.C.
- 2. A site plan drawn to scale designating the area covered by the application and identifying existing and proposed buildings and uses, adjacent existing land uses, zoning on contiguous parcels, including those across an abutting public right-of-way, and any other significant site improvements proposed to accommodate the proposed use or buffer adjacent uses, etc., or a plat of the subject property where no specific land use is proposed. In cases where only a plat or map is provided and no land use is proposed, the planning commission and county commission shall evaluate the application based on the most intense possible land use permitted in the proposed district. **The proposal meets this requirement.**
- C. For any application for a slow rate land treatment system (see <u>chapter 17.20</u>), the following additional requirements apply. **The proposed development will utilize public water and private on-site septic systems, as such, this is not applicable.**
- D. For any application proposing the development of 100 or more residential dwelling units, a traffic impact study shall be submitted prior to consideration of the application by the planning commission. At the applicant's expense, the traffic impact study shall be prepared by a professional engineer in accordance with requirements established by the Hall County Engineering Department. Development Support and Constraints / Departmental Comments

Hall County Environmental Health

In an email dated July 31, 2024, Emily McGahee stated, "All proposed lots must meet Hall County Board of Health Lot Size Resolution requirements. Please note that Zoning approval does not imply approval from other county departments. Further determination will be made during the plat review process. All proposed plats must be submitted to the Hall County Plat Review Team for review and approval prior to submittal to Clerk of Courts for recordation."

Hall County Fire Marshal

In an email dated July 30, 2024, John Hornick, NPQ Fire Service Plans Examiner 1, Lieutenant provided the following comments:

- 1) Old Fork and Brand Roads do not meet the 20-foot road width requirements in several locations as required by Fire Code.
- 2) Old Fork and Brand Roads end abruptly and have no approved turnaround as required by Fire Code.
- 3) The closest fire hydrant is located at 2406 Old Fork Road.

Dear Hall County Planning Commission:

Thank you for your careful consideration of this request. I think it's important to note some key concerns we have for this rezoning and conditional use request.

In stark contrast to Hall County's Future Development Guide for Lake Area Residential neighborhoods, the addition of 4 properties would increase the total SFDU's (single family dwelling units) by 26.6% on one parcel. As noted in the staff report by the Hall County Fire Chief, the road is already dangerous and inadequate for emergency vehicles and certainly dangerous for residents walking which is a specific draw to a "Lake Area Residential" neighborhood.

Additionally, it's stated in the staff report that the parcel subdivided as requested by the developer is 1.04 acres per dwelling which doesn't seem to be accurate with a 4.8-acre parcel being divided into 5 lots. It should be noted the request for VC allows for a smaller lot size and reduced setbacks. The property has a significant amount of topographic challenges which should require an environmental impact study given the run-off will directly impact the current water management and waste into Lake Lanier.

The neighborhood also has 2 additional lake front properties that are not developed in addition to another estate size lot that has exceptional lake views. Can we get clarification from utilities that additional taps beyond the two noted in the request from the developer can be added? This would be an important consideration since we know the value of the "lake front" lots will have a significantly higher value and tax base potential.

With the addition of some short-term rentals in the neighborhood, including the property in question, we have experienced a sharp increase in criminal activity. It could be a direct impact with the transitory nature of non-residents introduced to the location. While VC zoning permits such usage, that is not representative of the current neighborhood. The "Future Development Guide" specifically calls out the need to PRESERVE established neighborhoods.

The most recent 4 lots developed in the neighborhood all have 2024 tax assessments of \$600K - \$1.4mm in value. I respectfully ask the commission to consider the substantial impact to the values of the current properties. The developer is a non-resident of both the neighborhood and Hall County. It appears the intent is to maximize the number of units that can be placed on the parcel for the purpose of short and maybe long-term rentals. Again, it's well documented the impact to property values if the developer is allowed maximum density with properties not similar in quality or value of the surrounding properties.

Understanding the parcel in question is already zoned VC for a large portion, at a minimum, the current zoning would reduce the number of additional lots to 4 instead of 5 and would ask that the commission get clarity on the usage intent and quality of the development in question.

Thank you for protecting our property values and our families by closely evaluating this request.

The ongoing usage by construction vehicles and delivery trucks for four newly constructed homes would further deteriorate the narrow road, requiring the road to be resurfaced and widened for the parade of heavy equipment for this construction plan.

2. Depending on the price point for these new homes, there is expected concern over their impact to the existing home values on Old Fork, Godfrey Way, and Brand Dr.

3. The possible addition of four more vacation rental homes on our short street and small neighborhood presents a reasonable concern to the amount of increased traffic traveling in and out on Old Fork Rd., impacting both safety and increase in road maintenance.

Major concerns about Old Fork Road project.

1. Density. Current residents are considered Lake Residential and low density. The proposal has five homes on less than 5 acres. Will the proposed property be consistent with existing homes?

2. Property values. What is the scope of buildings?(Size, with or without garages, ranch or multi story, basement, price range, etc.

3. Road condition. Old Fork Rd is steep, curvy and narrow. The existing road and shoulders would be considered in poor condition. The road would need to be widened plus a 3 inch overlay of asphalt. The traffic count would increase significantly with addition of two cars per household or 10 more cars twice daily accounting for 20 trips per day just for this project once completed. Construction traffic would deteriorate existing road.

4 Noise. There is potential noise related problems stemming from daily construction in close proximity to other homes.5. Water and sewer. City water and drilled wells accessibility. Adequate septic system lines plus additional backup plan for possible failure of system..

6. Safety. With the current and proposed traffic and the quick growth of delivery truck frequency, any and all pedestrian traffic would be at risk. (UPS, Prime, FedEx, grocery delivery Etc.)

We write to oppose re-zoning of 2466 Old Fork Road. Our family has lived across the street for 42 years. Over the years, three family members have died...and a portion of their ashes have been sprinkled in family ceremonies around the property. Our youngest child grew up on the lake and got married by the lake. We love the place! We are now in our eighties. We enjoy morning walks on Old Fork Road. We enjoy the wildlife, deer, groundhogs, birds, trees and flowers. I have identified over 100 species of trees on or near our property. We greatly enjoy our privacy and quiet. We also enjoy our neighbors; some have direct access to the lake.

The proposed property for rezoning does not have direct access to the lake—and the proposed lots would have limited view of water. We are not eager to have neighbors trespassing our property to access the lake.

Construction activity of the order proposed by this re-zoning endangers all that we enjoy. Construction often damages neighbors' property. Recently, workers building a nearby house knocked down our mailbox. The trucks damage the narrow road and endanger our walking. Workers often thrown cans and other trash onto neighbors' property.

The road definitely requires widening so passenger vehicles can safely pass each other or construction trucks. Moreover, city water and fire engine protection need to be more readily available before considering expanding the community. We have dead end streets without turn around capacity for trucks, fire engines, or cars.

We knew the Donnie and Becky Stephens family who built and lived in the house. They too sought privacy and nature; sadly, he died of cancer. His widow and widowed mother still live. They lack any right to the property, but the proposed rezoning would be a loss of their and our mutual vision for the community that lives peacefully close to nature.

I would like to express my serious concerns regarding the planned rezoning/development of 2466 Old Fork Road.

Many of us only have a well to service our homes with water. Is there a 100% guarantee that adding wells uphill will not impact the water table downhill and therefore our wells? Additionally, will there be septic tanks needed as well? What are the implications of those drain fields on the water in our wells. I believe running city water to any dwellings should be required.

As is a matter of public record, all of the homes built in the last 5 years (and a few that already existed) are all valued at \$1,000,000 plus. Many of us have built/bought these properties as a legacy to leave for our children. I am concerned about these small properties being used as comparisons for valuation in the future. These properties should be required to conform to the surrounding properties.

What types of use are planned for this property? Single family homes, short term rentals, long term rentals? Vacation rentals make no sense at all as there is no lake access or view of the lake. Also, there is next to zero law enforcement presence here. Yes, if you call 911 someone will come, but not as a matter of a regular visible presence to deter negative activities.

Old Fork road is not wide enough to accommodate a pick up truck (which everyone around here owns) and a car. I drive a small, low car, pulling off the side isn't a possibility as in many places, it drops off. Widening of Old Fork would be a necessity and my understanding is there are water lines running very close to the road. What would be the plans for that?

Are there any thoughts to putting a turn around at the end of Brand Drive? I am vehemently opposed to that idea. We chose this property 20 years ago for the privacy it afforded. Making it easy for people to drive down here would deeply, negatively effect our quality of life.

Have all of you come and driven around this area to see what the local neighborhood is and the look and feel of this community? If not, I would suggest you take the time to make the effort so you can appreciate how the

people living in the immediate area would see what is being proposed at 2466 Old Ford Rd.

Dear Planning Commission Members,

I'm writing to express my concern and opposition to the proposed rezoning request and development in our neighborhood. This is in reference to the rezoning request for 2466 Old Fork Road to rezone from AR-III & V-C to V-C only.

My opposition centers around 5 key areas:

- Safety
- Property Values
- Environmental Concerns
- Rezoning not required
- Not in keeping with the spirit of the Hall Count land use master plan

Safety: The proposed changes would dramatically increase the traffic along Old Fork Rd. The road is already in disrepair and too narrow for traffic to pass without one or both vehicles needing to pull off. There's no shoulder or worse, a drop off, for most of the length of the road. Increased construction traffic will only make this worse and I'm concerned about the general safety of all vehicles on the road with the increased traffic during construction and after occupancy. At a minimum the road should be widened and the shoulder improved for safety.

Property Values: It is our current understanding from the developer that they will be placing small pre-manufactured buildings on this proposed rezoning site as opposed to homes that match the style and size of the other homes recently constructed in this area. There have been many studies that show the dramatic decrease in property value for surrounding homes when these types of homes are introduced. The area in question has seen a significant increase in property values because of the investment in larger homes. This is both good for the Hall County tax base and good for the neighborhood. Putting in a neighborhood of small cottages will reverse those gains and sabotage the investment and progress that we have been making. They will all be used as comps for new construction making it more difficult to acquire mortgages for the types of homes that have been going up.

Environmental Concerns: The proposed property has a very significant grade sloping towards the lake and to the creek running into the lake between Brand Dr and Ford White. Previous lawsuits have already been brought against developers for the clear cutting and construction that resulted in significant amounts of silt into the Sardis Creek area. This resulted in a very expensive de-silting operation in the lake in the cove directly adjacent to the proposed development. Septic runoff, additional well usage, clear cutting and other construction will only serve to make existing issues worse.

Rezoning Unnecessary: It is unclear as to exactly why this rezoning is even required other than the greed of the developers to squeeze in one more small lot to increase profits and density. They can ALREADY build "vacation cottage" sized homes with the current zoning restrictions. This entire rezoning request is unnecessary and a waste of the planning commission's and community time.

Not Part of the Master Plan: The current master plan states "PRESERVE established neighborhoods and CREATE opportunities for <u>permanent</u> and vacation residences similar in land use pattern..." Clearly a manufactured home community, with small lots and no lake access in an existing neighborhood is not preserving the neighborhood nor is it creating permanent or vacation residences in a similar manner. There is zero access or view of Lake Lanier for any of these homes and unlikely that they will be viewed as "vacation cottages" instead this will become a burden on the neighborhood and it is not in keeping with the spirit OR the letter of the Lake Area Residential master plan.

I appreciate your thoughtful consideration of the above points and look forward to the discussion on Sept. 3

Excerpts from the minutes of the September 16, 2024 meeting

Applicant's Presentation:

Katie Greenway, Planning and Zoning Administrator, presented a summary of the request.

Tyler Smith 340 Jesse Jewell Parkway, Gainesville, presented the request. The applicant is requesting to rezone a combined 114.147± acre tract zoned Agricultural Residential (AR-III, 17.110) to Planned Residential Development (PRD, 17.180.060) for the purpose of constructing a 256-unit residential development. The total density of the development will be 2.24 units per acre, containing a total of 198 detached single-family homes and 58 attached

townhomes. An existing residence (4621 Stanley Road, tax parcel 15044 000035D) located on Stanley Road will remain, and will be provided with access through the proposed development. This parcel is not included as part of the rezoning request.

Public Forum:

Mark Faul, 4567 Stanley Road, Flowery Branch spoke in opposition. Concerns raised were a missing hydrology report, density, traffic, negative impact on property values, and the entrances proximity to each other.

Albert Guth, 4589 Guth Road, Flowery Branch, spoke in opposition. Concerns were the construction entrance being located on the road where he lives and the possible impact on his well.

Tommy Channell, 4737 JM Turk Road, Flowery Branch, spoke in opposition. Concerns were stormwater runoff and the impact to nearby bridges, garage façade percentages, density being too high, and the possibility of new septic systems contaminating water.

Penni Ganyard, 2175 Silver Circle, Gainesville, spoke in opposition. She expressed the need for smart growth for the county. Concerns were overcrowding in schools, and the importance of following current rules.

Robert Payton, 5184 Stately Oaks Drive, Flowery Branch, spoke in opposition. Concerns were the amount of traffic for winding roads, the growth versus road capacity, and overcrowding in schools.

Janet Myers, 4859 Wildlife Way, Flowery Branch, spoke in opposition. Concerns were high density, decreased property values of surrounding areas due to incompatibility with the development, decreased quality of life, the incompatibility with the County's comprehensive plan, increased stormwater runoff, and overcrowding in schools.

William Doucher, 4789 JM Turk Road, Flowery Branch, spoke in opposition. Concerns were the application not matching the comprehensive plan, high density, and stormwater runoff. Mr. Doucher brought up how this applicant was denied last time they applied and despite the changes to their application, they should be denied again.

Rebuttal

The applicant clarified that the total density of the development is 2.25 units per acre as calculated by the engineers but the townhome density is 4.64 units per acre and 1.95 units per acre for the detached single-family homes. The applicant cited the traffic study which proposed northbound and southbound turn lanes on JM Turk Road. The applicant stated, if approved, they would go through the process of receiving a land development permit which ensures following all state and federal regulations.

Planning Commission Comments:

Mr. Hunt clarified that the garage would be 55% of the townhome front coverage. The applicant stated that was correct. Mr. Sosebee asked for the applicant to show where the construction and emergency access points would be. The applicant showed the main entrance would be off of JM Turk Road, the emergency access would be through Guth Road, and the construction entrance would be through an easement depicted on the site plan off of JM Turk Road. Ms. Pilcher wanted clarification that the 22 foot setback was from the back of the sidewalk and not the curb as mentioned in previous paperwork. The applicant acknowledge the

error and confirmed it would be from the back of the sidewalk. Mr. Braswell asked about the sewer location. The applicant indicated the planned location of the lift station.

Bret Clark, 129 Woodlake Drive, Gainesville, showed on the map that the lift station would be at the rear of the development. Mr. Hunt asked if the construction entrances would be through Guth Road and off of JM Turk Road. The applicant explained that the proposed turnaround at the end of Guth Road would be used as a staging area for workers to park vehicles and the entrance would be through an easement off of JM Turk Road. Mr. Hunt asked if the easement off JM Turk Road was recorded for the applicant's use. The applicant was unsure. Mr. Braswell asked about the construction phases. The applicant stated two phases of site work and three to four phases of vertical construction with the stormwater ponds being built first. Mr. Hunt asked the applicant to explain the improvements they intend to do on Guth Road to meet fire and county codes. The applicant stated they would follow the necessary requirements to gain the land development permit. Mr. Hunt asked if the applicant intended to keep Guth Road gravel which the applicant confirmed they would. Mr. Braswell asked if the emergency access entrance would only allow emergency personnel which the applicant confirmed it would be gated and stated that is why the cul-de-sac would be created on Guth Road. Ms. Pilcher expressed concern about the hammerheads on the townhome plans which the applicant stated were normal for townhome developments. Mr. Hunt asked the length of the hammerheads and the applicant stated that they are roughly 120 feet long. Mr. Braswell asked when the construction of the amenities would begin in relation to the whole development construction. The applicant stated that they would be constructed first, starting with the pool, cabana, and pickleball courts. Mr. Braswell asked for an explanation of the community garden. The applicant stated in other areas these were popular and it would be managed by the HOA but the homeowners would be planting and caring for the garden.

Motion: A motion to deny was made by Mr. Sosebee and seconded by Ms. Pilcher. Vote: 4-1 (Braswell opposed)

Staff recommends <u>DENIAL</u> of the applicant's request. However, if the Planning Commission sees fit to approve this application, staff recommends the following conditions:

- Development is approved as generally depicted on the site plan dated August 20, 2024, and as detailed in the project narrative dated August 20, 2024, modified as necessary for compliance with conditions herein and development standards enforced at the time of site plan approval.
- 2. The minimum heated floor area (HFA) shall be 1,800 square feet for single-family detached homes and 1,300 square feet for townhomes.

- 3. A 50-foot transitional buffer (planted or undisturbed) shall be maintained along all external property lines.
- 4. All single-family homes and townhomes shall provide two car garages and driveways to accommodate two cars for parking. Garage door width shall not exceed 55% of the width of the front façade of the single-family residences and a maximum garage door width of 55% of the front façade of the townhomes.
- 5. Residential driveways shall measure no less than 22 feet in length from the right-of-way to the front of the garage door. All other parking must meet the standards listed in 17.250 of the Official Code of Hall County.
- 6. The amenity area shall include a swimming pool, a dog park, and four (4) mail kiosks with adjacent parking as depicted on the proposed site plan date August 20, 2024, and shall be completed before 50% of the final buildout of the development.
- 7. The Declaration of Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions for the subdivision and the documents establishing the home owner's association shall be submitted for review. These documents shall include a provision that would assure maintenance of the amenity package through adequate assessment of the subdivision property and would provide for establishing a lien against any property failing to pay said assessment. These documents shall be recorded simultaneously with the final plat and/or prior to the sale of any lots within the subdivision.
- 8. All designated open space within the development shall be commonly held and maintained and shall not be the responsibility of any individual homeowner(s). This common open space ownership shall be included in the deeds created for each lot.
- 9. Access to the development shall be approved by the Hall County Engineering Department. Access to the property from Guth Road shall be limited to emergency vehicles only. The developer shall implement all recommendations of the traffic study, subject to final review and approval by both Hall County Engineering. The developer shall be responsible for any costs associated with these improvements.
- 10. The development shall be limited to a maximum of four (4) model homes prior to approval and recording of the final plat. Model home permits may be issued prior to Final Plat recording provided that hard surface (crusher run) access is provided, and fire protection (functioning hydrant) is located within 500 feet of any structure under construction. No certificate of occupancy permits shall be issued prior to Final Plat recording.
- 11. The proposed lift station shall be located on its own lot.
- 12. No variances or development exceptions are granted as part of this request that are not explicitly granted by Board approval. The development shall be compliant with the Official Code of Hall County, as well as any other agencies or reviewing departments, including, but not limited to Environmental Health, the Fire Marshal, and Hall County Engineering.

13. The following statement regarding the potential impacts of agricultural operation in the area shall be made a part of any plat recorded on the property:

"Owners, occupants, and users of property shown on this plat are hereby informed of the impacts associated with normal farming practices which may take place on adjacent and nearby property including, but not limited to, noise, odors, dust, the operation of machinery of any kind, the storage and disposal of manure, and the application of fertilizers, herbicides, and pesticides. Therefore, owners, occupants, and users of the property shown on this plat should be prepared to expect the effects of such practices."

14. All conditions of zoning shall be made a part of any plats or construction plans created for the subdivision

The following should be considered as exceptions to the Official Code of Hall County, and shall warrant further determination by the Board should it choose to approve the submitted narrative and site plan:

- Townhome Garage Doors
 - Garage doors shall constitute no more than 50 percent of the width of the individual townhouse unit.
 - The applicant is proposing that garage doors shall not exceed 55% of the width of the individual townhouse façade.
- Single Family Garage Doors
 - Garage doors shall constitute no more than 40 percent of the width of the individual townhouse unit.
 - The applicant is proposing that garage doors shall not exceed 55% of the width of the individual townhouse façade.
- 16.60.160. Width of right-of-way.
 - C. Standard cul-de-sac. The right-of-way shall extend to a minimum 60-foot radius measured from the center of the cul-de-sac, and the total width shall be evenly divisible by ten feet.
 - The applicant is proposing three eyebrow cul-de-sacs in Pods A & B.
 - The applicant is proposing four hammerhead cul-de-sacs in Pod C.

Summary Analysis

The applicant is requesting to rezone a combined 114.147± acre tract zoned Agricultural Residential (AR-III, 17.110) to Planned Residential Development (PRD, 17.180.060) for the purpose of constructing a 256-unit residential development. The total density of the development will be 2.24 units per acre, containing a total of 198 detached single-family homes and 58 attached townhomes. An existing residence (4621 Stanley Road, tax parcel 15044 000035D) located on Stanley Road will remain, and will be provided with access through the proposed development. This parcel is not included as part of the rezoning request.

Per the letter of intent and concept plan, the development will be composed of three pods. Pods A and B will be developed with detached single-family residences and Pod C will be developed with townhomes. It should be noted, the narrative refers to the townhomes as "cottages" as well; for the purpose of this report, the term "townhome" shall be used for Pod C. Per the narrative, the facades of all the residences will be finished with a combination of masonry, fiber cement and/or shake siding materials.

Pods A and B will consist of a total 198 detached single-family homes, with a proposed minimum lot size of 8,000 square feet and a minimum heated floor area of 1,800 square feet. Pod C will consist of 58 townhomes with a minimum heated floor area of 1,300 square feet. The overall density for the development is 2.25 dwelling units per acre.

The development will include a minimum of 32.3% of open space, which will include streams and associated buffers, planted buffers, a dog park, and a swimming pool. The site includes four mail kiosks located throughout, and an amenity site located within Pod B which will serve both the single-family residences and townhomes. It should be noted that any impervious area is not to be counted towards open space, including the pool as shown as open space on the submitted concept pool. The development will include 5-foot-wide sidewalks on both sides of the street, ensuring pedestrian connectivity within the development.

Access to the subdivision will be provided by reconfiguring where Stanley Road intersects with JM Turk Road. Stanley Road will also continue to provide access to outparcels 15044 00034 and 15044 000035D. Guth Road will be improved and utilized as a gated emergency-only entrance with a cul-de-sac.

A traffic impact study was conducted by SEI Engineering, Inc and Acampora Traffic LLC on May 23, 2023, and revised January 24, 2024. The study was based on 196 proposed detached single-family homes and 128 attached townhomes for a total of 324 homes. The study found the proposed subdivision will generate 188 trips in the morning peak hour, 260 trips in the evening peak hour, and 2,800 daily trips. The report found that the three studied intersections are expected to continue to operate acceptably after the proposed development is complete. As a result, no off-site mitigation is identified for the future build condition as a result of the proposed subdivision. The study confirms the need for a northbound right turn lane and a southbound left turn lane onto JM Turk Road at the proposed project entrance.

Per the narrative, water service will be provided by the City of Gainesville Department of Water Resources, and sanitary sewer services will be provided by Hall County Sewer. The developer intends to connect to utilities in the area via an onsite lift station. The availability of the water service was confirmed in a letter dated July 3, 2024. The availability of the sanitary sewer services was confirmed in a letter dated July 27, 2024.

The development standards for the project are described in the table below and are compared with the PRD requirements, (17.180.060):

Several variances have been identified as part of this request. Any deficiencies identified as part of the plan will be required to comply with the requirements of the PRD unless specially granted by the board in the conditions of approval.

Based on the future land-use plan, staff finds the requested zoning designation <u>is not consistent</u> with **the Hall County Comprehensive Plan future land use designation of "Residential".** The intent of this land use category is to preserve established neighborhoods and create new residential developments consistent with surrounding suburban densities. This land use designation envisions moderate density at 2 dwelling units per acre. The proposed development has an overall density of 2.24 units per acre.

Zoning Analysis

When considering a zoning amendment to the zoning maps, the following items must be considered by the Planning Commission and the Hall County Commission pursuant to 17.380.060:

- Whether the zoning proposal will permit a use that is suitable in view of the use and development of adjacent and nearby property; The zoning proposal for residential development is suitable given the established residential uses of the surrounding area. The proposed development has an overall density of 2.24 dwelling units per acre which exceeds the typical density of surrounding development.
- 2. Whether the zoning proposal will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property; The zoning proposal for residential development is compatible with the established residential uses of the surrounding area, although the proposed zoning classification of Planned Residential Development (PRD, 17.180.060) permits a higher density than that of nearby residential development.
- 3. Whether the property to be affected by the zoning proposal has reasonable economic use as currently zoned. The properties appear to have reasonable economic use as currently zoned. The property appears to have reasonable economic use as currently zoned.
- 4. Whether the zoning proposal will result in a use which will or could cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, or utilities; A traffic impact study found that the three study intersections are expected to continue to operate acceptably when the proposed development is complete. The study does confirm the need for a northbound right turn lane and a southbound left turn lane onto JM Turk Road at the proposed project entrance.
- 5. Whether the zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the land use plan; Although consistent with the "Residential" land use designation, the proposed use is not consistent with the Comprehensive Plan recommended maximum density of two dwelling units per acre. The proposed development is proposing a density of 2.24 dwelling units per acre.

- 6. The extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions; Staff is unable to determine the extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions.
- 7. The extent to which the destruction of the subject property's value under the existing zoning promotes the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public; Staff is unable to comment on the impact of property values without a full market analysis. Multiple factors impact property value including construction types, proposed uses, and maintenance. Often it is difficult to determine the effect of a development on adjacent properties until the development is completed.
- 8. The relative gain to the public as compared to the hardship imposed upon the individual property owner; Staff has not identified a hardship imposed on the property owner as the property is currently zoned.
- 9. The length of time the property has been vacant as zoned considered in the context of land development in the area in the vicinity of the property; Hall County property tax records show the properties are a mixture of vacant and developed parcels, which include a number of residential structures and accessory buildings that will be removed during the development of the project. The historic 1880's barn adjacent to JM Turk Road will remain on the property.
- Whether there are other existing or changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property which give supporting grounds for either approval or disapproval of the zoning proposal;
 Staff is not aware of any changing conditions that affect the use and development of the property.
- 11. Whether the change would create an isolated district unrelated to the surrounding districts; The proposed zoning is a Planned Residential Development (PRD, 17.180.080). Per the Official Code of Hall County, Planned Development Districts (17.180) are to be utilized as a "floating zone" which shall mean that areas will not be pre-designated as planned development districts but rather each such designation shall result from a specific and separate application for amendment. That being said, the proposed density is higher than that found on surrounding properties.
- Whether the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn in relation to existing conditions in the area; There is no evidence that the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn.
- 13. Whether the change requested is out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole or the immediate neighborhood; The proposed density is higher than that found on immediately surrounding properties; however, the use does not appear to be out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole, as there is a need for additional and varied housing types.
- 14. Whether it is impossible to find adequate sites for the proposed use in districts permitting such use and already appropriately zoned; There are other properties within the County that support a moderate-density single-family residential uses based on the Future Land Use Map, though the development as proposed cannot be developed in any of the existing residential or multi-family districts without Board of Commissioner approval.

- **15.** Whether the need for rezoning could be handled instead by a variance request to the [Planning Commission]; **The request could not be handled alternatively as a variance.**
- 16. Whether there would be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from major modifications to the land if the request is granted; Any land disturbance activities on the property shall be required to go through the land development permitting process and as a result are subject to local, state, and federal regulations. As a result, there should not be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from any modification to the land if the request is granted.
- 17. Whether there is reasonable evidence based upon existing and anticipated land use that would indicate a mistake was made in the original zoning of the property; There is no indication that a mistake was made in the original zoning.

A Planned Residential Development (PRD, 17.180.080) allows for more flexibility in the design and development of the property. This provides for a mixture of housing types and encourages maximum use of natural features through proper site planning measures. The development should conform to the existing character and development pattern of the surrounding area.

17.380.50. - Submission requirements for a rezoning request

- A. Any person or persons requesting a change in the official zoning map or use subject to approval of the county commission shall file an application with a plat or map of the property attached thereto, together with payment of such fees set forth in chapter 17.30 to cover administrative and advertising costs, in the planning department office. Such person or persons or their authorized agent shall appear in person at the public hearing held to consider the district change. Proposal meets the requirement. Applicant has paid the appropriate fees and understands that someone must be present at both the Hall County Planning Commission meeting and the voting meeting of the Hall County Board of Commissioners.
- B. All applications for a change of zoning classification or use subject to approval of the county commission shall include:
 - A narrative statement identifying the existing and proposed use of the property and addressing each of the criteria set forth in section 17.380.060.C of this section [chapter].
 Proposal provides a narrative outlining the intent of the development however, the applicant has not prepared a response to each of the criteria listed in 17.380.060.C.
 - 2. A site plan drawn to scale designating the area covered by the application and identifying existing and proposed buildings and uses, adjacent existing land uses, zoning on contiguous parcels, including those across an abutting public right-of-way, and any other significant site improvements proposed to accommodate the proposed use or buffer adjacent uses, etc., or a plat of the subject property where no specific land use is proposed. In cases where only a plat or map is provided and no land use is proposed, the planning commission and county commission shall evaluate the application based on the most intense possible land use permitted in the proposed district. Proposal meets the requirement. The applicant has provided a site plan and included the necessary information to properly assess the development.

- **C.** For any application for a slow rate land treatment system (see chapter 17.20), the following additional requirements apply. **The proposed development will utilize public sewer and water; as such, this is not applicable.**
- D. For any application proposing the development of 100 or more residential dwelling units, a traffic impact study shall be submitted prior to consideration of the application by the planning commission. At the applicant's expense, the traffic impact study shall be prepared by a professional engineer in accordance with requirements established by the Hall County Engineering Department. The engineering department shall review the traffic impact study and forward any comments to the Hall County Planning Commission. Proposal does meet the requirement. The traffic study found that the three study intersections are expected to continue to operate acceptably when the proposed development is complete. The study does confirm the requirement for a northbound right turn lane and a southbound left turn lane onto JM Turk Road at the proposed project entrance.

Development Support and Constraints – Departmental / Agency Comments

Hall County Environmental Health

In an email dated July 31, 2024, Emily McGahee stated "Public sewer. Any abandoned well shall be properly closed as per Water Well Standards Act. Any abandoned septic tank shall be pumped by a State certified pumper/hauler and crushed/filled."

Hall County Fire Marshal

In an email dated August 2, 2024, John Hornick, NPQ Fire Service Plans Examiner 1, Lieutenant stated, "The Hall County Fire Marshal's Office considers the plan conceptual in nature, and if approved may require modifications during the development review process."

Hall County Public Works and Utilities

In a memorandum from Public Works and Utilities dated August 1, 2024, Bill Nash, Director, stated the following:

Engineering: This site may require a stormwater management report should the site plan indicate the proposed development meets stormwater thresholds for impervious surfaces and/or disturbed acreage. Show stream buffer and impervious setback from wrested vegetation not centerline of stream. Show FEMA and Hall County studied Flood plains that are present on site.

Traffic: A left turn lane and decel lane will be required for the entrance. Any required roadway improvements will be the financial responsibility of the developer. A cul-de-sac should be provided for Guth Road at the proposed end of county maintenance.

Utilities: No sanitary sewer in area. 76,800 gallons per day residential this is in the Hall County service area.

Hall County Tax Assessor

In an email dated July 25, 2024, Cher Melendez, Specialized Assessment Manager stated, "Parcels 15043 000027 are in conservation use. Sending intent to breach letter on 08-9-24."

Georgia Department of Transportation

In an email dated July 30, 2024, Veronica Chavers, D1TO Civil Engineer 3, stated that GDOT coordination is not required.

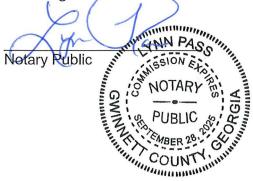

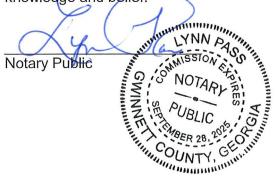

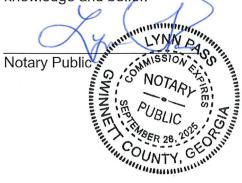

SUMMARY

The accompanying application seeks a rezoning from an existing zoning AR-III to PRD on Parcels 15043 000027, 000109, 000128, 15043 000201, 000127, 000035, 000043, 000035B, and 000100, for a total of 114.147 acres of undeveloped property located on Guth Road, J M Turk Road, and Stanley Road, in west Hall County. The intent is to develop a 256-unit residential development. The proposed rezoning will allow a feasible product to be supplied to the area that is consistent with the Hall County Comprehensive Land Use Plan for residential use, and appropriate for Hall County's Planned Residential Development (PRD) district for this location. ENTRY MONUMENT SIGNAGE

Applicant is requesting permission for an entry monument sign located on the southwest portion of the open space as shown on the Site Plan. The entrance may also include the following structural items: masonry walls, wood or PVC fencing, and illuminated signage in accordance with the Hall County sign ordinance, ornamental sculpture, landscaping, and irrigation. A rendering of the entry monument is attached.

CLUSTER MAILBOX UNIT (CBU)

The developer shall be responsible for providing 4 CBUs for regular mail service delivery. A CBU is a structure housing multiple mailbox units to serve each residential unit of the development for the express purpose of regular mail delivery provided by the USPS. Development, maintenance, location, and parking shall be governed by section 17.180.060.B.11 of the Hall County Code. A total of 94 parking spaces are to be constructed.

OPEN SPACE

The 30% open space requirement for the PRD standards is satisfied with 36.9 acres of open space as shown on the Site Plan (32.3%). Additionally, in the Open Space adjacent to J M Turk Road is a historic 1880's barn that will remain on the property.

BUFFERS AND SETBACKS

Along the perimeter of the lots, a 50 ft Planted Buffer can be seen on the Site Plan.

AMENITIES

Applicant is proposing an amenities area that will include a swimming pool, pool house, and pickle ball courts. The open space area in the east will serve as a dog park for the residents. The open space area to the northeast will serve as an HOA-maintained Community Garden for the residents of the development. Construction of the amenities will begin within twelve months of the final approved plat. During construction, there will be one construction trailer placed at the amenities area. Applicant is requesting to allow four model homes.

VARIANCE REQUESTED

Applicant is requesting to reduce full vehicular access to one entrance, with the second entrance to be provided for emergency access only. Applicant is also requesting to increase the width of the garage door of front-loaded cottage residences to 55% to the width of the individual unit. Applicant is requesting to allow eyebrow cul-de-sacs to be utilized. Applicant requests that hammerhead cul-de-sacs be utilized in the Residential Cottage Pod.

CONCEPTUAL MASTER PLAN

The development of the property shall be controlled by the Conceptual Master Site Plan (the "Site Plan") attached as Exhibit A. The Plan is considered conceptual in nature, and as such may require minor modifications during the engineering and development process. Modifications to the locations and arrangement of lots, roads, amenities, and other improvements that do not conflict with specific standards and requirements of these conditions may be made by applicant, so long as its modifications do not change the land use, increase the overall density of the project, or reduce any established exterior buffers or setbacks.

REQUIRED CONSTITUTIONAL AND ANTE LITEM NOTICE

Georgia law and the procedures of Hall County requires the Applicant to raise Federal and State constitutional objections during the PRD master plan application process. While the Applicant anticipates a smooth application process, failure to raise constitutional objections at this stage may mean that the Applicant will be barred from raising important legal claims later in the process. Accordingly, the following constitutional objections are stated:

The portions of the Hall County Development Code, facially and as applied to the Property, which restrict the Property to any uses, conditions, land use designations, development standards, or to any zoning district other than that proposed by the Applicant are unconstitutional in that they would destroy the Applicant's property rights without first paying fair, adequate and just compensation for such rights, in violation of Article I, Section I, Paragraph I and Section III, Paragraph I of the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1983, and the Due Process Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

The application of the Hall County Development Code, facially and as applied to the Property, which restricts the Property to any uses, conditions, land use designations, development standards, or to any zoning district other than in accordance with the application as proposed by the Applicant is unconstitutional, illegal, null and void, constituting a taking of Applicant's Property in violation of the Just Compensation Clause of the Fifth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States; Article I, Section I, Paragraph I, and Section III, Paragraph I of the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1983; and the Equal Protection and Due Process Clauses of the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States denying the Applicant an economically viable use 7 of its land while not substantially advancing legitimate state interests.

A denial of this Application would be unconstitutional under the Takings Clause of the Fifth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States and the Just Compensation Clause of Article I, Section III, Paragraph I of the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1983. A refusal by the Hall County Board of Commissioners to approve the zoning conditions as requested would constitute a taking of the Applicant's property.

A denial of this Application would constitute an arbitrary and capricious act by the Hall County Board of Commissioners without any rational basis therefore constituting an abuse of discretion in violation of Article I, Section I, Paragraph I and Section III, Paragraph I of the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1983, and the Due Process Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States. A refusal to grant the PRD zoning request would lack objective justification and would result only from neighborhood opposition, which would constitute an unlawful delegation of the zoning power to non-legislative bodies in violation of the Georgia Constitution, Article IX, Section II, Paragraph 4.

A refusal by the Hall County Board of Commissioners to approve this Application for the Property in accordance with the criteria as requested by the Applicant would be unconstitutional and discriminate in an arbitrary, capricious and unreasonable manner between the Applicant and owners of the similarly situated property in violation of Article I, Section I, Paragraph II of the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1983 and the Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States. Any rezoning of the Property subject to conditions which are different from the conditions requested by the Applicant's utilization of the Property, would also constitute an arbitrary, capricious and discriminatory act in zoning the Property to a unconstitutional classification and would likewise violate each of the provisions of the State and Federal Constitutions set forth 8 hereinabove.

ENTRY MONUMENT SIGNAGE

Applicant is requesting permission for an entry monument sign located on the southwest portion of the open space as shown on the Site Plan. The entrance may also include the following structural items: masonry walls, wood or PVC fencing, and illuminated signage in accordance with the Hall County sign ordinance, ornamental sculpture, landscaping, and irrigation.

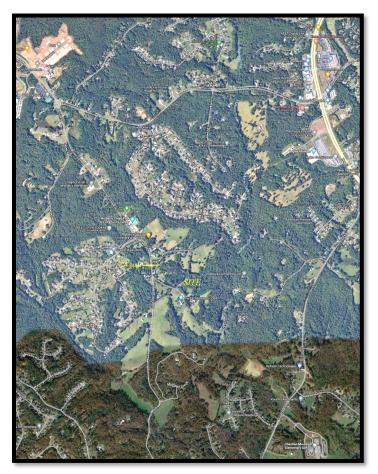


Figure 1 – Site Location Map

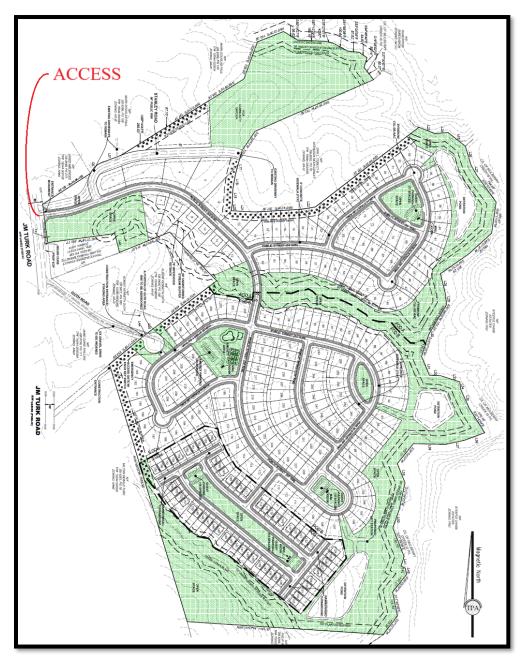


Figure 2 – Proposed Site Plan

The vehicular trips that will be generated by a proposed residential subdivision in Hall County, Georgia, were calculated. The site is located along the east side of JM Turk Road at Stanley Road, as shown in Figure 1. The development will consist of a 198 detached single family homes and 58 attached townhomes, for a total of 256 homes. The project will be served by one vehicular access on JM Turk Road at the current location of its intersection with Stanley Road. A second access will be provided at the end of Guth Road, which will be gated for emergency use only. The site plan is presented in Figure 2.

Trip generation is an estimate of the number of entering and exiting vehicular trips that will be generated by the proposed development. The volume of traffic that will be generated by the subdivision was calculated using the equations in the Institute of Transportation Engineers (ITE) *Trip Generation Manual, 11th Edition* (the current edition). ITE Land Use 210 – Single Family Detached Housing was chosen as representative of the detached houses and ITE Land Use 215 – Single Family Attached Housing was chosen for the townhomes. The trip generation is summarized in Table 1. A traffic impact study was prepared for a previous level of development on this site, which consisted of 196 detached homes and 128 townhomes, for a total of 324 homes. The trip generation for that previous level of development is also summarized in Table 1 to provide a comparison with the current proposal.

The currently-proposed subdivision will generate 153 trips in the morning peak hour, 220 trips in the evening peak hour, and 2,284 daily trips. This represents a decrease in volumes from the level of development evaluated in the traffic impact study of 35 less trips in the morning peak hour, 40 less trips in the evening peak hour, and 516 less daily trips.

Twenty-four hour traffic volume counts were collected on JM Turk Road at the proposed project access location for the original traffic impact study, in May 2023, then again for an updated traffic impact study for the project in January 2024. For this memorandum, another count was collected at the end of August 2024. These counts are summarized in Table 2.

Introduction

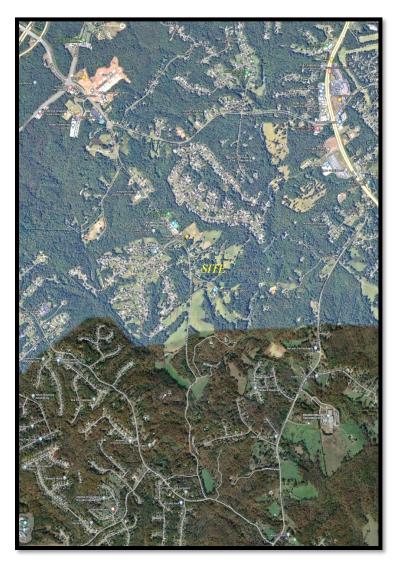


Figure 1 – Site Location Map

This study assesses the traffic impact of a proposed residential subdivision in Hall County, Georgia. The site is located along the east side of JM Turk Road at Stanley Road, as shown in Figure 1. The development will consist of 196 detached single family homes and 128 attached townhomes for a total of 324 homes. The project will be served by one vehicular access on JM Turk Road at the current location of its intersection with Stanley Road. A second access will be provided which will be gated for emergency use only.

The purpose of this traffic impact study is to determine existing traffic operating conditions in the vicinity of the proposed subdivision, project future traffic volumes, assess the impact of the subject development, then develop conclusions and recommendations to mitigate the project traffic impact and ensure safe and efficient existing and future traffic conditions in the vicinity of the project.

Existing Traffic Conditions

Existing traffic operating conditions in the vicinity of the proposed subdivision were assessed. The following is a description of existing transportation facilities, traffic volumes, and intersection operations.

Description of Existing Roadways

JM Turk Road is a two lane north-south road classified by the Georgia DOT as an urban major collector. The road begins at a roundabout at Martin Road, passes the subject site, and terminates at a side street stop sign controlled T-intersection at Cash Road. The road is winding, the terrain is gently rolling, and the posted speed limit is 45 mph. The cross section is rural with no shoulders, curb-and-gutter, or sidewalks. The road primarily serves accesses to homes and undeveloped land, with a community center and a winery a short distance north of the subject development site. A 24-hour bi-directional traffic volume count collected for this study in May 2023 on JM Turk Road at the project frontage revealed a northbound volume of 692 vehicles, a southbound volume of 724 vehicles, for a two-way volume of 1,416 vehicles. This study was subsequently updated in January 2024. As part of the update, a new 24-hour count was collected on JM Turk Road at the same location as the May 2023 count. The new count revealed a northbound volume of 685 vehicles, a southbound volume of 700 vehicles, for a two-way volume of 1,385 vehicles. The new count reveals a 2.2% decrease in volumes on JM Turk Road.

Pedestrian, Bicycle, and Transit Accessibility

There are no sidewalks or dedicated bicycle lanes along the adjacent roadway and there is no regularly scheduled mass transit in the area.

Existing Traffic Volumes

Existing full turning movement peak hour traffic volume counts were collected at the following intersections in the vicinity of the site:

- 1. Martin Road at JM Turk Road
- 2. JM Turk Road at Grandview Parkway
- 3. Cash Road at JM Turk Road

In addition to the intersection counts, 24-hour bi-directional counts were collected on JM Turk Road adjacent to the site, as described above.

The counts were collected on Tuesday, May 16, 2023, from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. and from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. Area schools were in session on the day on which the counts were recorded. The locations of the traffic counts are presented in Figure 2. It was noted above that the volume on JM Turk Road decreased from the May 2023 count collected for this study and an updated count collected on Thursday, January 18, 2024. Because the decrease in volume was small (-2.2%), it was decided to not adjust the May 2023 intersection volumes downward. This produces existing volumes, used in this analysis, which are slightly conservatively high.

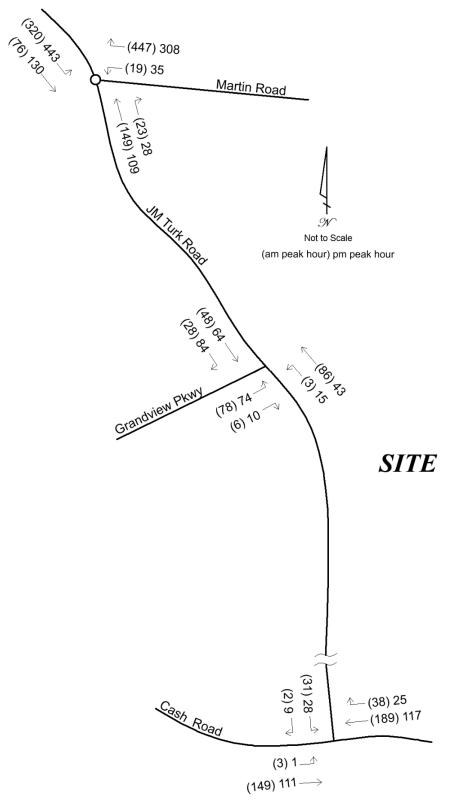


Figure 3 – Existing Weekday A.M. and P.M. Peak Hour Traffic Volumes

From the intersection turning movement count data, the highest four consecutive 15-minute interval volumes at each intersection, during each time period, were determined. These volumes make up the existing weekday a.m. and p.m. peak hour traffic volumes at each intersection and are shown in Figure 3. The raw count data is found in Appendix A.

Existing Intersection Operations

Existing traffic operations were analyzed at the counted intersections using Synchro software, version 12, in accordance with the methodology presented in the Transportation Research Board's 2022 *Highway Capacity Manual* 7th Edition (*HCM 7*). This methodology is presented in Appendix B. The analysis was based on the existing volumes, lanes, and control. The results of the analysis are shown in Table 1. Computer printouts containing detailed results of the existing analysis are located in Appendix C. Levels of service and delays are provided for each overall intersection and for each controlled approach or movement. Locations that operate unacceptably (LOS E or LOS F) are presented in bold type.

The existing analysis reveals acceptable operating conditions at the three study intersections. No mitigation is identified for the existing condition.



No-Build Traffic Conditions

A 2029 no-build condition was developed. This represents the traffic conditions that will exist in the future at the anticipated date of the build-out of the subdivision, but not including the subdivision's trips. The purpose of the analysis of this condition is to isolate the traffic impacts of the proposed development from background growth in volumes that are expected to occur in the area while the subdivision is under construction.

In order to develop no-build volumes, background growth factors were developed using historic Georgia DOT 24hour traffic counts that were collected in this area for the years 2018 through 2022 (the latest year for which data was available at the time of this study), as shown in Table 2.

Growth in the area has been moderate and positive. Each intersection experienced a decrease in volumes from 2019 to 2020. This is attributable to the COVID-19 pandemic and is considered an anomaly, and the growth the subsequent year is considered mostly a return to pre-pandemic conditions. The latest year saw modest-to-solid positive growth. Based on the growth trends identified in Table 2, and taking the pandemic into consideration, a 3.0% annual growth factor was applied to the existing volumes when projecting the future no-build volumes. The growth factor was applied for five years, for a total of 15.9% growth that will occur while the proposed subdivision is under construction. The existing traffic volumes were increased by the 15.9% growth factor. The results are the 2029 no-build traffic volumes that will be on the roadway network in the future when the proposed subdivision is completely developed, but excluding the subdivision's trips.

Programmed Transportation Infrastructure Improvements

The Gainesville-Hall Regional Transportation Plan 2020 and the Georgia DOT projects website were reviewed for programmed (scheduled and funded) and planned (anticipated) transportation infrastructure projects in the vicinity of the proposed development. No projects were identified.

No-Build Intersection Operations

The no-build condition includes the no-build traffic volumes, as described above. These were entered into the Synchro model and the 2029 no-build traffic operations were analyzed at the study intersections using Synchro 12 software in accordance with the HCM 7 methodology. The results of the no-build analysis are shown in Table 3. Computer printouts containing detailed results of the no-build analysis are located in Appendix D. Levels of service and delays are provided for each overall intersection and for each controlled approach or movement. Locations that operate unacceptably (LOS E or LOS F) are presented in bold type.

The no-build analysis shows a slight deterioration in operations due to anticipated growth in this area. However, operations and delays will continue to be acceptable and no mitigation is necessary for the no-build condition.



Project Traffic Characteristics

This section describes the anticipated traffic characteristics of the proposed subdivision, including a site description, how much traffic the project will generate, and where that traffic will travel.

Project Description

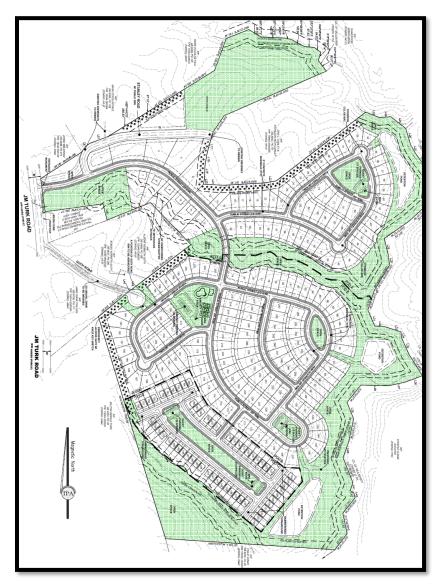


Figure 4 – Site Plan for Proposed Subdivision

The proposed development will consist of 196 detached single family homes and 128 attached townhomes for a total of 324 homes. The project will be served by one vehicular access on JM Turk Road at the current location of its intersection with Stanley Road. A second access will be provided which will be gated for emergency use only. The site plan is presented in Figure 4.

Trip Generation

Trip generation is an estimate of the number of entering and exiting vehicular trips that will be generated by the proposed development. The proposed subdivision will generate 188 trips in the morning peak hour, 260 trips in the evening peak hour, and 2,800 daily trips.

Trip Distribution and Assignment

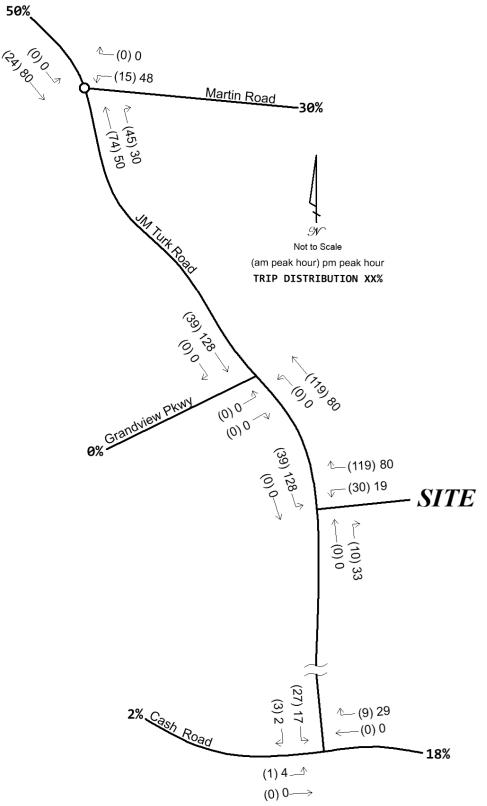


Figure 5 – Weekday A.M. and P.M. Peak Hour Project Trips and Distribution Percentages

The trip distribution percentages indicate what proportion of the project's trips will travel to and from various directions. The trip distribution percentages for the subdivision were developed based on the locations and proximity of likely trip origins and destinations including regional employment centers, retail and offices in the area, nearby schools, other regional trip attractors, and the major routes of travel in the area, notably Interstate 985, Spout Springs Road, and SR 53. The new project trips, shown in Table 4, were assigned to the roadway network based on the distribution percentages. The trip distribution percentages and the a.m. and p.m. peak hour trips expected to be generated by the proposed subdivision are shown in Figure 5.

Future Traffic Conditions

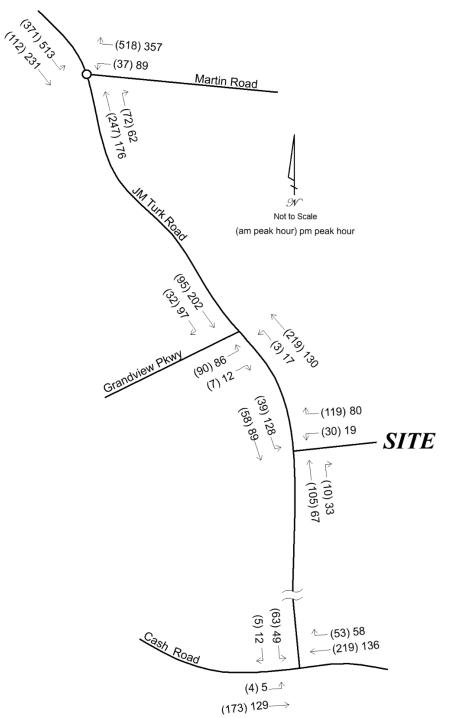


Figure 6 – Future Weekday A.M. and P.M. Peak Hour Volumes

The future volumes consist of the no-build volumes plus the trips that will be generated by the proposed subdivision. The future volumes are shown in Figure 6.

The Hall County Code was reviewed to determine auxiliary turn lane requirements at the project access on JM Turk Road. Code Section 16.60.290. – Deceleration lanes and left-turn lanes states:

- A. Subdivisions with greater than 24 lots will be required to have a deceleration lane constructed in accordance with current Hall County Engineering and Traffic Engineering specifications. The Hall County Traffic Engineer may waive or require the installation of a deceleration lane for subdivisions regardless of lot number based upon traffic and safety considerations.
- B. Left-turn lanes will be constructed in accordance with current Hall County Engineering and Traffic Engineering when warranted by the following table:

- C. The Hall County Traffic Engineer may waive or require the installation of a left-turn lane, regardless of average daily traffic (ADT) or number of lots, based upon traffic and safety considerations.
- D. For those developments that a turn lane is required and the development is proposed in phases, construction of the turn lane is required prior to platting 100 lots or more.
- E. Additional right-of-way and/or easements necessary for the installation of decel and/or left-turn lanes will be acquired by and will be the financial responsibility of the developer.
- F. A signed and recorded frontage and/or radius encroachment agreement with applicable property owners will be required if any portion of the access extends beyond the development's road frontage.

Based on 324 proposed homes, a northbound right turn lane is required on JM Turk Road at the project access and this study agrees with that requirement.

The counted 24-hour volume on JM Turk Road is 1,385 vehicles, so the number of lots above which a left turn lane is required is 175 lots. The proposed subdivision will include 324 homes with one access. Therefore, a southbound left turn lane will be required at the project access and this study agrees with that requirement.

One entering lane and one exiting lane should be provided in the project access. The exiting approach should be controlled by side street stop sign and accompanying stop bar.



Future Intersection Operations

An operational analysis was performed for the anticipated future project build-out at the study intersections and the project access using Synchro 12 software in accordance with the HCM 7 methodology. Table 6 presents the results of the future analysis. Computer printouts containing detailed results of the future analysis are located in Appendix E. Levels of service and delays are provided for each overall intersection and for each controlled approach or movement. Locations that operate unacceptably (LOS E or LOS F) are presented in bold type.

The future analysis with the addition of the proposed subdivision's trips reveals continued acceptable traffic operations and delays at the three study intersections, as well as the project access.

The project civil/site engineer should comply with all applicable design standards including sight distances, driveway spacing, turn lane storage and taper lengths, turn radii, driveway widths, islands, angles with the adjacent roadways, and grades.

Conclusions and Recommendations

This study assesses the traffic impact of a proposed residential subdivision in Hall County. The site is located along the east side of JM Turk Road at Stanley Road and the development will consist of 196 detached single family homes and 128 attached townhomes for a total of 324 homes. The project will be served by one vehicular access on JM Turk Road at the current location of its intersection with Stanley Road. A second access will be provided which will be gated for emergency use only. The following are the findings and recommendations of this study:

- 1. Existing traffic operations and delays are acceptable at the three study intersections. No mitigation is identified for the existing condition.
- 2. Traffic volume growth in this area has been positive and modest and this is expected to continue into the future. It is noted that JM Turk Road experienced a decrease in the counted 24-hour volumes for this study, from 2023 to 2024, of -2.2%
- 3. No programmed or planned roadway improvement projects were identified in this vicinity.
- 4. With the growth in background traffic volumes, delays will increase moderately in the no-build condition. However, all delays will continue to be acceptable and no mitigation is identified for the no-build condition.
- 5. The proposed subdivision will generate 188 trips in the morning peak hour, 260 trips in the evening peak hour, and 2,800 daily trips.
- 6. The future analysis with the addition of the proposed subdivision's trips reveals modest increases in delays at the study intersections. The three study intersections will continue to operate acceptably. Therefore, no off-site mitigation is identified for the future build condition as a result of the proposed subdivision.
- 7. A northbound right turn lane and a southbound left turn lane are required on JM Turk Road at the project access and this study agrees with those requirements.
- 8. One entering lane and one exiting lane should be provided in the project access. The exiting approach should be controlled by side street stop sign and accompanying stop bar.
- 9. The project civil/site engineer should comply with all applicable design standards including sight distances, driveway spacing, turn lane storage and taper lengths, turn radii, driveway widths, islands, angles with the adjacent roadways, and grades.

Intersection Analysis Methodology



Intersection Analysis Methodology

The methodology used for evaluating traffic operations at intersections is presented in the Transportation Research Board's 2022 *Highway Capacity Manual*, 7th Edition (HCM 7). Synchro 12 software, which emulates the HCM 7 methodology, was used for all analyses. The following is an overview of the methodology employed for the analysis of signalized intersections and roundabouts and stop-sign controlled (unsignalized) intersections. Levels of service (LOS) are assigned letters A through F. LOS A indicates operations with very low control delay while LOS F describes operations with high control delay. LOS F is considered to be unacceptable by most drivers, while LOS E is typically considered to be the limit of acceptable delay.

Signalized Intersections and Roundabouts – Level of service for a signalized intersection and a roundabout is defined in terms of control delay per vehicle. For signalized intersections and roundabouts, a composite intersection level of service is determined. The thresholds for each level of service are higher for signalized intersections and roundabouts than for unsignalized intersections. This is attributable to a variety of factors including expectation and acceptance of higher delays at signals/roundabouts, and the fact that drivers can relax when waiting at a signal as opposed to having to remain attentive as they proceed through the unsignalized intersection. The level of service criteria for signalized intersections and roundabouts are shown in Table A.

Unsignalized Intersections – Level of service for an unsignalized intersection is defined in terms of control delay per vehicle. Control delay is that portion of delay attributable to the control device and includes initial deceleration delay, queue move-up time, stopped delay, and final acceleration delay. The delays at unsignalized intersections are based on gap acceptance theory, factoring in availability of gaps, usefulness of the gaps, and the priority of right-of-way given to each traffic stream. The level of service criteria for unsignalized intersections are presented in Table B.

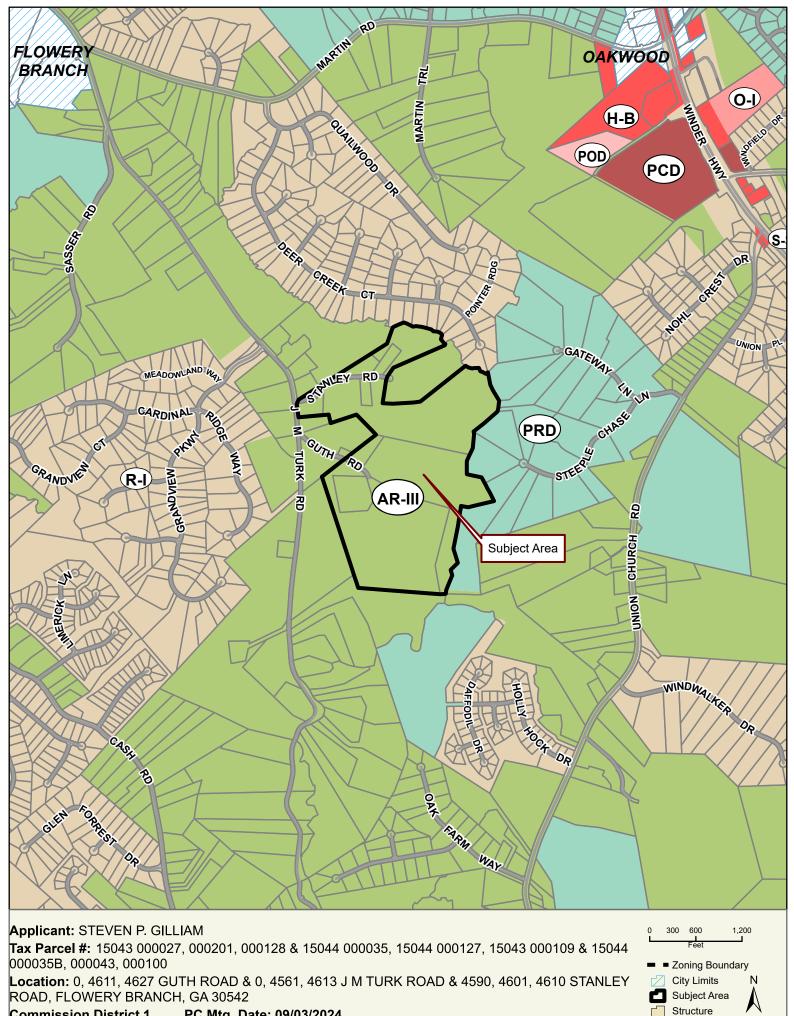

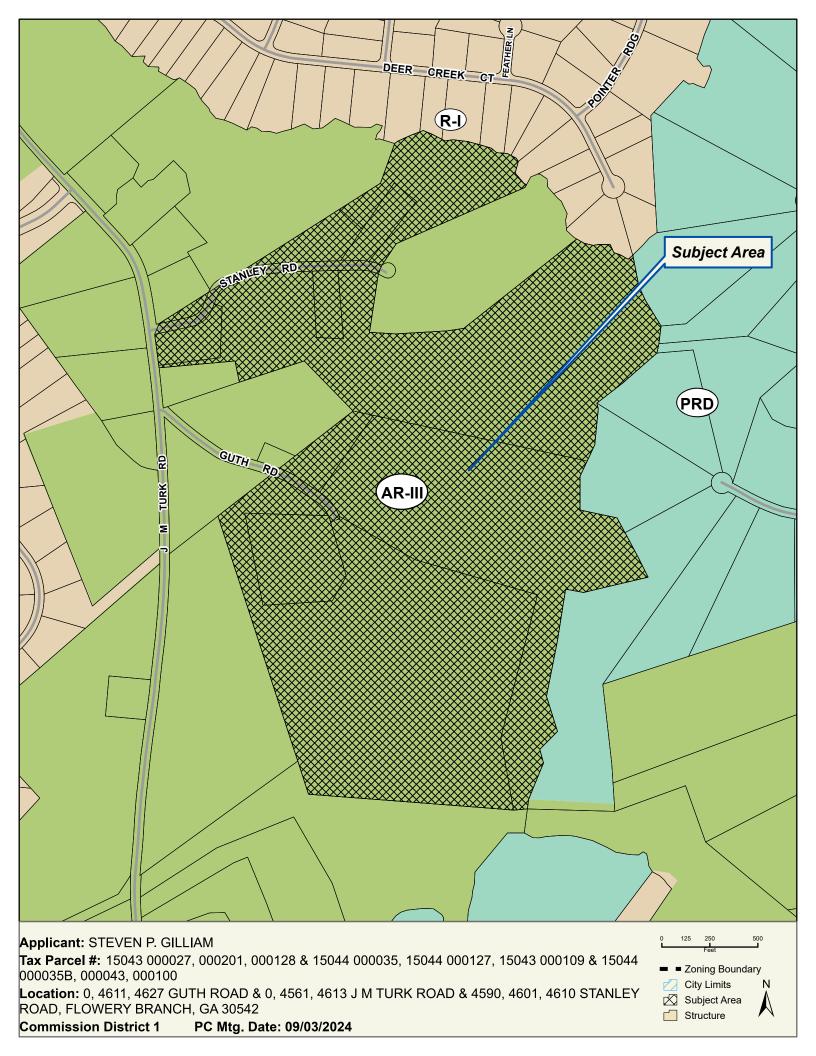

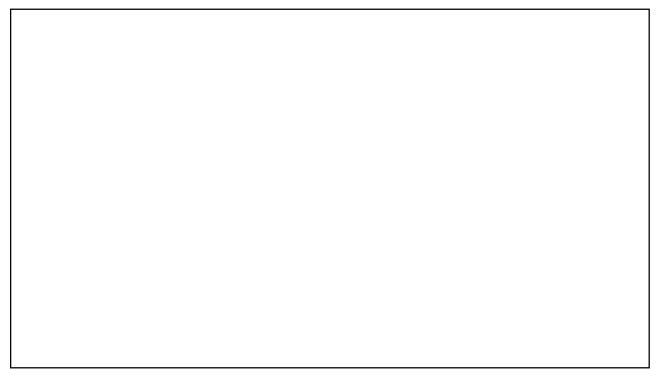

MILITARY TESTAMENTARY PREAMBLE: This is a MILITARY TESTAMENTARY INSTRUMENT prepared pursuant to Title 10 United States Code, Section 1044d, and executed by a person authorized to receive legal assistance from the military services. Federal law exempts this document from any requirement of form, formality, or recording that is prescribed for testamentary instruments under the laws of a state, the District of Columbia, or a territory, commonwealth or possession of the United States. Federal law specifies that this document shall be given the same legal effect as a testamentary instrument prepared and executed in accordance with the laws of the jurisdiction in which it is presented for probate. It shall remain valid unless and until the Testatrix revokes it.

LAST WILL AND TESTAMENT

OF

TAMMY LANE JONES

I, TAMMY LANE JONES, a resident of the State of North Carolina, make, publish and declare this to be my Last Will and Testament, revoking all wills and codicils at any time heretofore made by me. I live with my husband who is in the military service of the United States.

FIRST: I direct that the expenses of my last illness and funeral, the expenses of the administration of my estate, and all estate, inheritance and similar taxes payable with respect to property included in my estate, whether or not passing under this will, and any interest or penalties thereon, shall be paid out of my residuary estate, without apportionment and with no right of reimbursement from any recipient of any such property (including reimbursement under Section 2207B of the Internal Revenue Code).

SECOND: It is my desire that, upon my death, I be buried alongside those remains of my husband, if he shall predecease me, at Arlington National Cemetery, Arlington, VA, and if my husband does not predecease me, at a location to be determined by my husband or my heirs. I have not contracted for or paid for any funeral arrangements.

THIRD: I give all real estate owned by me at the time of my death, and all rights that I have under any related insurance policies, to my husband RANDY NATHANIEL JONES, if he survives me. The devise of real property under this Article THIRD is subject to any mortgages, deeds of trust or similar liens evidencing indebtedness which may exist upon my death.

FOURTH: I give all tangible personal property owned by me at the time of my death, including without limitation personal effects, clothing, jewelry, furniture, furnishings, household goods, automobiles and other vehicles, and all rights that I have under any related

insurance policies, to my husband RANDY NATHANIEL JONES, if he survives me, or if he does not survive me, to those of my children (LESLIE DIANE OVERBY, KELLY SUZANNE JONES and SAMANTHA MICHELLE MERRITT) who survive me, in substantially equal shares, to be divided among them as they shall agree, or if they cannot agree, as my personal representative shall determine.

FIFTH: I give all the rest, residue and remainder of my property and estate, both real and personal, of whatever kind and wherever located, that I own or to which I shall be in any manner entitled at the time of my death (collectively referred to as my "residuary estate"), as follows:

(a) If my husband RANDY NATHANIEL JONES survives me, to my husband outright.

(b) If my husband does not survive me, then to those of my children who survive me and to the issue who survive me of those of my children who shall not survive me, <u>per stirpes</u>.

(c) If my husband does not survive me and there shall be no issue of mine then living, I give my residuary estate to those who would take from me as if I were then to die without a will, unmarried and the absolute owner of my residuary estate, and a resident of the State of North Carolina.

SIXTH: If any property of my estate vests in absolute ownership in a minor or incompetent, my personal representative, at any time and without court authorization, may: distribute the whole or any part of such property to the beneficiary; or use the whole or any part for the health, education, maintenance and support of the beneficiary; or distribute the whole or any part to a guardian, committee or other legal representative of the beneficiary, or to a custodian for the beneficiary under any gifts to minors or transfers to minors act, or to the person or persons with whom the beneficiary resides. Evidence of any such distribution or the receipt therefor executed by the person to whom the distribution is made shall be a full discharge of my personal representative from any liability with respect thereto, even though my personal representative may be such person. If such beneficiary is a minor, my personal representative may defer the distribution of the whole or any part of such property until the beneficiary attains the age of eighteen (18) years, and may hold the same as a separate fund for the beneficiary with all of the powers described in Article EIGHTH hereof. If the beneficiary dies before attaining said age, any balance shall be paid and distributed to the estate of the beneficiary.

SEVENTH: I appoint my husband RANDY NATHANIEL JONES to be my personal representative. If my husband does not survive me, or shall fail to qualify for any reason as my personal representative, or having qualified shall die, resign or cease to act for any reason as my personal representative, I appoint SAMANTHA MICHELLE MERRITT as my personal representative. I direct that no personal representative shall be required to file or furnish any bond, surety or other security in any jurisdiction.



EIGHTH: I grant to my personal representative all powers conferred upon personal representatives and executors wherever my personal representative may act. I also grant to my personal representative power to retain, sell at public or private sale, exchange, grant options on, invest and reinvest, and otherwise deal with any kind of property, real or personal, for cash or on credit; to borrow money and encumber or pledge any property to secure loans; to pay any legacy or distribute, divide or partition property in cash or in kind, or partly in kind, and to allocate different kinds of property, disproportionate amounts of property and undivided interests in property among any parts, funds or shares; to determine the fair valuation of property; to compromise and release claims with or without consideration; and to employ attorneys, accountants and other persons for services or advice. The term "personal representative" wherever used herein shall mean the personal representatives, executors, executor, executrix or administrator in office from time to time.

NINTH: I direct that for purposes of this will a beneficiary shall be deemed to predecease me unless such beneficiary survives me by more than thirty days. The terms "child" and "children" as used herein include not only the child and children of the person designated, but also the legally adopted child and children of such person. The term "issue" includes not only the children and other issue of the person designated, but also the legally adopted child and children of such person.

TENTH: My husband has served in the Armed Forces of the United States. I therefore request that my personal representative make appropriate inquiries to ascertain whether there are any benefits to which I, my dependents or my heirs may be entitled by virtue of any military affiliation. I specifically request that my personal representative consult with a retired affairs officer at the nearest military installation, the Department of Veterans Affairs, and the Social Security Administration.

Address 4621 Stanley Rd Flower, Branch, GA 30542 I have property on Stanley Road (4621 Stanley Road) that is negatively impacted by the re-proposed development (Stanley & Guth Road). This letter is to document some of my opposition to the Stanley Road and Guth Road Properties, which follows:

- Excessive request for variances, along with a rezoning request.

- Negative impacts on surrounding and nearby properties in terms of lifestyle and property values.

- A flawed and outdated traffic analysis.

- Violations of important regulatory rules and ordinances (i.e., inconsistency with the area and the Hall County Development plans and written Hall County Guidance, the critical need for a usable secondary entrance to avoid 3,000 daily car trips in front of my properties on Stanley Road, failure to follow the regulatory rules for the regarding fire access distances from multiple entrances, abandonment of part of Stanley Road).

- Inconsistency with large agricultural operations in the immediate area.

- Inability of traditional retention ponds to manage the excessive runoff of water produced by the noncompliant proposed subdivision. Currently, there is a lot of erosion and flooding in the area.

Zoning guidelines are in place to protect property owners from this exact situation. They have asked for multiple exceptions, and some are just not safe for the public. Exceptions are for circumstances where there is a little consideration needed and is accepted by everyone that it effects. This is not the case.

When my neighbors and my family purchased our property, it was because we had some space away from the rest of the world. Twelve acres is not that much in the grand scheme of things, but it was our sanctuary. Now they are proposing about twenty-five homes surrounding half of my property. These homes will be on one-eighth-acre sites, which is not characteristic for the area at all.

The traffic that this will bring will overload J M Turk Rd, and the surrounding roads. The traffic analysis that was done was for one day, during Covid times. There were so few people active at this time that is not even close to being accurate. The road is considered a rural road and was not designed for this type of traffic.

The plan only has one entrance and exit, which is a clear violation of code. It is clear that a neighborhood of this size is required to have at least two entry/exits. It would be disastrous if an emergency took place with that many people trying to exit.

The area is home to Hall county's largest vineyard. There are multiple large tracks zoned for agriculture in the area as well. Several of my neighbors have tractors including myself which utilize the immediate roads.

The retention ponds planned will bring unwanted bugs to the area. This could be devastating to the local winery and its business. Not to mention the runoff will

overwhelm the local streams causing flooding downstream. Erosion has already been a problem in the area due to the previous growth in the area.

This proposal has been voted against once, please vote it down again. We have no local representation with the commissioners due to a conflict of interest with Ms. Cooper's seat and her being the realtor on the transaction. Please help keep Hall County rural, the way it was intended to be.

Any limitation on the time for presentation of the issues before the governing authority who have the power to zone and rezone is a violation of the guarantees of free speech under Article I, Section I, Paragraph 5 of the Constitution of the State of Georgia, 1983 and the First Amendment of the Constitution of the United States of America. Further, said limitations are in violation of the right to petition and assemble, in violation of Article I, Section I, Paragraph Six of the Constitution of Georgia, 1983 and the First Amendment of the Constitution of the United States of America as well as the due process clauses of the Constitution of Georgia, 1983 and the Constitution of the United States of America.

Thank you for your email. Below I have provided a response or a contact for someone who may assist you.

1. Hall County follows a standard process for reviewing applications. Initially, tentative packets are provided to staff and the public for their review. Following this, staff will provide feedback on the application to the Planning Department, after which a Staff Report is drafted. This report, along with the full packet and all comments, will be published 10 days prior to the Planning Commission meeting. The staff's assessment of the application will be available on our website on August 23rd, in the form of a staff report that includes all departmental comments at the end of the packet.

2. For Planned Development requests, variances do not need to be specifically highlighted unless they pertain to standards associated with the engineering department. Staff will carefully review the request and will identify any deviations from baseline standards in the staff report.

3. The process for road abandonment is handled by the Board of Commissioners. For further information, I recommend reaching out to Scott Puckett in the Engineering Department at spuckett@hallcounty.org, who can guide you through the process.

4. All traffic assessments are determined by the Hall County Traffic Engineer and the Board of Commissioners. Planning requires the submission of a traffic study, which will be reviewed and evaluated by Scott Puckett. Should you have any questions or concerns regarding this matter, please feel free to contact him directly at <u>spuckett@hallcounty.org</u>.

5. Unfortunately, this is outside the scope of Planning. For assistance, please reach out to the Hall County Traffic Engineer at <u>spuckett@hallcounty.org</u>.

6. The development has proposed a 50-foot buffer to help minimize its impact on neighboring properties. However, staff is unable to comment on the potential effects on property values without a comprehensive market analysis. Various factors, such as construction types, proposed uses, and ongoing maintenance, can influence property values. Regarding the public's ability to properly review the package, I have some questions:

1) There is no comment or assessment from Hall County staff determinations the proposed subdivision. Shouldn't the public see this by now to have adequate time to prepare a response? Apparently there is a planning Commission Meeting on Sept 3rd, which is less than 30 days for the public to review this important missing information. Is there a regulation on incomplete submitted applications?

2) There is no specific request for variances in the application that I see. Should that be made clear in this application? Is there a regulation on partial submitted applications?

3) Part of Stanley Road is proposed to be abandoned. Did Hall County or the applicant go through the proper procedures abandon part of Stanley Road? Can you please direct me to the appropriate regulation regarding Public Road abandonment?

4) The traffic analysis data was based on a 2023 road test. While the traffic report was edited in 2024, it is based on old data from May of 2023. This outdated underestimate of traffic does not include new high density subdivisions going in on Cash Road and other locations. Is there any regulatory information governing the data timeliness for this proposal?

5) Is there any regulation regarding how many cars can go in front of a house? This traffic analysis indicates that that 2,800 trips will be added a day to Stanley Road (page 14). Currently, there are about 20 car trips a day that pass my house. Is there a regulation that governs how many cars can be in front of a house within a two lane road within a subdivision?

6) Finally, according to this plan, my house will be looking at the back end of houses and my car headlights will be shining directly into planned homes at night. Further, this plan destroys my property value. What are the regulations governing these matters, if any.

Please consider this letter of opposition from Arrowquest Services Inc, doing Business as Mulberry Springs Vineyard and Winery. As re-proposed, the subdivision will cause substantial harm to the personal property located at 4567 & 4555 Stanley Road.

My opposition is based on:

- Inability of traditional retention ponds to manage the excessive runoff of water produced by the non-compliant proposed subdivision. Currently, there is a lot of erosion and flooding in the area.

- Inconsistency with large agricultural operations in the immediate area.

- Excessive request for variances, along with a rezoning request.
- Negative impacts on surrounding and nearby properties in terms of lifestyle and property values.
- A flawed and outdated traffic analysis.

- Violations of important regulatory rules and ordinances (ie, inconsistency with the area and the Hall County Development plans and written Hall County Guidance, the critical need for a usable secondary entrance to avoid 3,000 daily car trips in front of my properties on Stanley Road, failure to follow the regulatory rules for the regarding fire access distances from multiple entrances, abandonment of part of Stanley Road).

Dear Randi Doveton:

I have two properties on Stanley Road (4567 and 4555 Stanley Road) that are negatively impacted by the re-proposed development (Stanley & Guth Road). This letter is to document some of my opposition to the Stanley Road and Guth Road Properties, which follows:

1) <u>Water detention ponds</u> – The ponds are not visually done properly and do not control flooding or mosquito populations in dense areas.

- Detention ponds are not flood control – they all have overflow systems to allow excess water to be discharged into streams and wet land areas. Elah Valley has experienced extreme flooding from the recent development. The additional impervious space, which includes the footprint of a house, all the sidewalks and the roads, in the proposed development is extreme. The manmade ponds could not be designed properly on absorb all of the water runoff created by this project.

The Topography on Stanley Road is very steep – water will not soak into the ground, but rather head directly into the detention pond systems and the overflow mechanisms resulting in flooding.
There has been 5 feet of erosion on one of my properties (4567 Stanley Road - 17 acres) since the

Grandview development.

- Elah valley reports increased flooding after every major development.

Approximately 20% of the development includes impervious land such as sidewalks and roads.
 Once calculated properly, the re-proposed subdivision does not meet the proper required green space percentages.

- Ponds will be a major source of mosquitoes to residents in the area. If approved please require the developer to have underground detention ponds to control for mosquitoes. This would minimize the direct impact on the nearby winery and the people living in the area.

2) <u>Rural area zoned agricultural III</u>. Regular houses can go in on this current zoning consistent with AR-III zoning. There are many farms in the area.

- Tractor traffic in the area – at least 4 people have tractors within a $\frac{1}{2}$ mile area.

- Winery operations at 4555 Stanley Road will be hampered due to 3,000 car trips a day on Stanley Road

- Largest vineyard in Hall County just 350 feet from Stanley Road.

- Doesn't fit the area at all and is dangerous to truck and tractor access using Stanley Road.

3) <u>Approximately Seven variances requested is excessive</u>. - Why have rules if Hall County is going to grant approximately 7 exemptions to the rules. Such a submission makes a mockery of established review systems. If Hall County approves this extreme proposal, what wouldn't they approve?

4) Negative Impact on property values:

One version of this proposal results in diminished property value loss to the residents on 4621
Stanley Road, which will have 24 homes on 1/8 acre lots around his 11 acres. This is extreme.
The residents of 4567 Stanley Road) will be looking at the back side of 5 houses from his front porch.

- There is no 50 foot buffer from the subdivision from Lots 2 and 3 for the residents of 4567 Stanley Road. While there is a modified Stanly Road Street there, there is no 50 foot buffer and the residents of 4567 and 4555 Stanley Road will be shining his car lights into the back windows of homes are night. This will disturb potential neighbors and be a source of many problems for everyone.

- Many home owners will have high density housing around them and it will harm existing values.

- The modified Stanley Road in this proposal will cause residents of 4567 and 4555 Stanley Road to have to make an additional turn to get out of the subdivision. This will cause a decrease in property value.

- According to the traffic analysis by conducted by SEI Engineering, Inc and Acampora Traffic LLC on May 23, 2023, and revised January 24, 2024 there will 2,800 car trips produced by the reproposed high density subdivision. ALL OF THIS TRAFFIC WILL BE IN FRONT OF MY TWO PROPERTIES. I will have a difficult time getting out of my driveway, and my property values will be substantially decreased. If approved, please have another exit out of this highly dense subdivision. *I did not buy a rural property with substantial acreage to have major problems (3,000 car trips a day) with getting out of my personal dwellings*. This re-proposed subdivision does not fit the area.

5) <u>Flawed Traffic Analysis</u> – During the last submission, one of the Planning Commissioners asked for a more accurate traffic analysis during the Fall of 2023. Yet, no new data was collected or analyzed. According to the traffic analysis conducted by SEI Engineering, Inc and Acampora Traffic LLC on May 23, 2023, and revised January 24, 2024 there will 2800 car trips produced by the reproposed high density subdivision. There are many problems with this analysis:

1) The traffic data collected was on one day only: 23 May of 2023. The data is outdated and likely an underestimate of traffic flow patterns.

2) One day of traffic is not representative of the true situation. More data points in time are needed, particularly since the data collection was done during COVID times, when some people were encouraged to work from home.

3) The data does not include future approved developments such as the housing development replacing the old Alpaca Farm (148-units) a few miles from this proposed development or the Union Grove Subdivision in South Hall County and other developments currently being

constructed. These housing developments will put strain on the roads and were not included in the analysis.

6) <u>Violation of regulatory rules</u>. The re-proposed subdivision is in conflict with established regulatory rules, which follows:

A) The plan is inconsistent with Hall County Guidance (Planning & Zoning Rezoning Variances Special Uses <u>https://www.hallcounty.org/DocumentCenter/View/93/Guide-to-Planning-and-Zoning</u>, which states:

- Page 10: "Planned Residential Development (PRD) A Planned Residential Development may allow for a more flexible placement, arrangement and orientation of residential structures, the accompanying flexibility in the subdivision of land and the grouping of open space and accessory facilities such as garages and parking. It may also provide for a mixture of housing types (singlefamily, two-family, multi-family, etc.) according to a carefully drawn plan. The proposed residential development should make maximum use of natural features and, through proper site planning measures, it should conform to the existing character and development pattern of the surrounding **area**. Every effort should be made to preserve and **protect any existing residential uses from adverse impacts**, which might result from a higher density development." Image 1.

This re-proposed subdivision has lot sizes of 5,000 sq feet, or 1/8th of an acre. Meanwhile consists of multi-acre tracks. The proposal is not consistent with the existing character of an established winery and large acreage tracks. Further, the proposal does not protect existing residential uses from adverse impacts, such as changing the configuration of Stanley Road and the excessive traffic of 3,000 cars per day. Approval of this rezoning request would clearly violate Hall County's written policy.

B) The proposed development is not consistent with existing growth plans for Hall County. Please see the Opinion of Hall County Planning Staff.

C) <u>Second entrance needed and distances re-proposed is not complaint with current fire</u> <u>standards</u> – Ga. Comp. R. & Regs. r. 120-3-3-.04 State Minimum Fire Safety Standards with Modifications Georgia Administrative Code Department

Add a new section, Appendix D 107.1, as follows: Developments of one- or two-family dwellings where the number of dwelling units exceeds 120 shall be provided with two separate and approved fire apparatus access roads.

Add a new section, Appendix D 107.2, as follows: Where two fire apparatus access roads are required, they shall be placed a distance apart equal to not less than one-half of the length of the maximum overall diagonal dimension of the property or area to be served, measured in a straight line between accesses (See Image 2).

<u>Point one</u> – Common Sense suggests that a subdivision of 120 homes needs two entrances for general safety and to reduce congestion. This reproposed second entrance that is for emergency vehicles only is only useful during an emergency.

<u>Point two</u> - The overall diagonal dimension is about 3,675 and ½ that distance is about 1,838 feet. Thus, the entrances need to be at least 1,838 feet from one another (enclosure 1). None of the plans adequately address this safety and regulatory mandate.

D) The partial Abandonment of Stanley Road requires a separate process not conducted. After talking with Hall County traffic expert, Mr. Scott Puckett, he said any movement of the Stanley Road would invoke a regulatory procedure (12.20.050. - Procedure for road abandonment). The reproposed design of the road creates an additional turn for residents of 4567 and 4555 Stanley Road to simply exit the properties and exposes me to the full traffic load of the entire subdivision (nearly 3,000 cars), plus traffic from another street.

Thank you for considering my comments and concerns. The developer's re-request is very aggressive and inappropriate for the area. No one in the area wants this reproposed development. It simply doesn't fit the area and will cause harm to local folks and a local business. If approved, I will oppose this rezoning action legally in the most vigorous way possible. 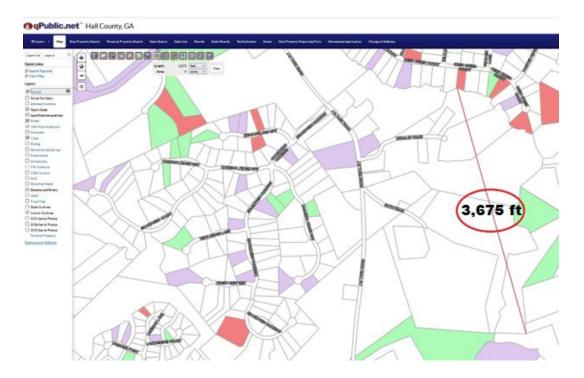

The overall diagonal dimension is about 3,675 and ½ that distance is about 1,838 feet. Thus, the entrances need to be at least 1,838 feet from one another. The rep-proposed entrances are about 300 feet from one another. Thus, the emergency entrance does not meet fire regulations. It is dangerous to approve re-proposed rezoning request without a proper distance appropriate secondary entrance.

This is in regards to the rezoning request from Agricultural to a Proposed Planned residential Development on Stanely, Guth and JM Turk Road, dated 1 July 2024. As a Business Owner, I urge denial of the proposed high density subdivision.

Mulberry Springs Vineyard and Winery is a Farm House winery. Farm wineries are allowed on AGRICULTURAL- RESIDENTIAL III (AR-3) zoning and are very popular with the public. Farm Wineries were also encouraged by the State of Georgia to promote Georgia Agriculture and employment. Hall County Commissioners granted approval of Mulberry Springs Vineyard and Winery on 5 May 2021. Mulberry Springs Vineyard and Winery and has a role in providing the following positive attributes to the Hall County Community:

- A google 4.9 star out of 5-star average review
- Within the last 6 months we received 25,010 views on Google Maps (image 1).
- The Largest Vineyard in Hall County providing an immersive experience for residents.
- Overwhelming positive support on Facebook with thousands of likes and/or and support from the Community.
- Member of Georgia Agrotourism (Dept of Agriculture, State of Georgia) supported by Department of Transportation Road signs.
- Employs 8 people and helps the economy.
- Provides a fantastic view for guests and helps create a positive image of Hall County.
- Provides a Park-like setting for residents; meanwhile, the County does not maintain this "park", and also collects substantial fees and taxes from the winery.

Unfortunately, the proposed subdivision on Stanley Road in Flowery Branch GA will directly hurt winery operations and may result in the closure of the winery. The re-proposed subdivision, is actually an urban island in a rural area, where the developers are requesting approximately 7 variances (which are exceptions to existing Hall County ordinances and rules). This high-density subdivision request is overly aggressive and will negatively impact the Mulberry Springs Vineyard and Winery in numerous ways. We strongly encourage you to deny the rezoning request of PRD from AR-3 Stanley Road for the following reasons:

Negative impact on Winery Operations and access at 4555 Stanley Road. The proposal, if approved, channels nearly 3,000 cars a day to use a small called Stanley Road, where some winery operations occur (image 2). This excessive proposed density using one road will severely damage the winery operations and alternatives for space will be dramatically more expensive. Any reconfiguration to allow winery truck and machine access will compete with subdivision traffic of about 3,000 car trips a



day (source = traffic analysis provided by the applicant). This is unreasonable. If this subdivision is approved a second usable entrance is needed. This is a rural area – there is even a Department of Transportation Tractor Sign a few feet from Stanley Road (image 3). There will be angry residents when slower truck and farm equipment competes with road space.

Views of Mulberry Springs are amazing – rezoning will destroy the views. People come to the winery to relax and get something they can't get at home, which is beautiful vistas and peacefulness. The winery location was specifically chosen for its views and the limited growth possibility near 4567 Stanley Road due to its odd triangular shape the likely impossibility of building houses on the Road, given typical Hall County setback rules. However, the proposed plan will allow houses to be seen from the winery and will destroy some of the pristine views that is becoming a rarity in Hall County. This will hurt the views of the largest Vineyard in Hall County and help destroy a valuable asset provided to the community. Further, the State of Georgia has declared Mulberry Springs Vineyard and Winery an official "Georgia Grown Agritourism site". This helps Georgia Tourism, and as a known landmark, it strengthens the image of Hall County. This subdivision proposal, with an average lot size of 5,000 square feet is grossly inconsistent with the State of Georgia agritourism designation of the nearby winery (image 4).

The plan has excessive housing density, beyond allowable rules, which may result in noise complaints. Part of the vineyard lies 400 feet from Stanley Road. The current plan is to move and abandon Stanley Road and have houses back up to 4567 Stanley Road, with limited setbacks. Thus, people may hear wine drinkers have conversations and wine drinkers may be bothered by dense subdivision noise. It goes both ways. Please note the current AR-3 density is manageable and consistent with the surrounding rural area and is allowed by the State of Georgia. However, PDR zoning is incompatible with winery operations and is setting up the winery for noise complaints. The decision to allow anything other than AR-3 zoning will jeopardize the future of the winery and will desecrate the \$800,000 investment in this beloved community gathering. Construction of a main tasting room is ongoing (permit: HCNEW24-0012) (Image 5). Approval of this re-zoning request is incompatible with the surrounding rural area and successful winery.

The plan is inconsistent with Hall County Guidance (Planning & Zoning Rezoning Variances Special Uses <u>https://www.hallcounty.org/DocumentCenter/View/93/Guide-to-Planning-and-Zoning</u>, which states:

- Page 10: "Planned Residential Development (PRD) A Planned Residential Development may allow for a more flexible placement, arrangement and orientation of residential structures, the accompanying flexibility in the subdivision of land and the grouping of open space and accessory facilities such as garages and parking. It may also provide for a mixture of housing types (single-family, two-family, multi-family, etc.) according to a carefully drawn plan. The proposed residential development should make maximum use of natural features and, through proper site planning measures, it should conform to the existing character and development pattern of the surrounding area. Every effort should be made to preserve and protect any existing residential uses from adverse impacts, which might result from a higher density development." Image 6.



This re-proposed subdivision has lot sizes of 5,000 sq feet, or 1/8th of an acre. Meanwhile the surrounding residents live on multi-acre tracks. The proposal is not consistent with the existing character of an established winery and large acreage tracks. Further, the proposal does not protect existing residential uses from adverse impacts, such as changing the configuration of Stanley Road and the excessive traffic of 3,000 cars per day. Approval of this rezoning request would directly violate Hall County's written policy.

Retention Ponds will create a breeding ground for mosquitos. Mulberry Springs Winery built an underground water detention pond that costs about \$50,000. This was to avoid the mosquito problems in an area where there are outdoor activities. The proposed high-density subdivision has 3 above ground detention ponds. These ponds will result in a breeding ground for disease (ie, West Nile virus, Zika...) and will severely contaminate the winery experience and hamper winery operations. The academic literature on this is significant (image 7). If the proposed subdivision is approved, <u>request the</u> <u>detention ponds be placed underground to protect the public and the winery.</u>

Please deny the zoning request. Homes could be built on the existing AR-3 zoning. No one rejects development on the current zoning of AR-3. This plan is grossly overly aggressive and hurts the look and feel of this valued rural area. It will also severely injure the Winery Operations and activities. According to a study done by the University of Georgia, the number one reason people visit wineriesfor the views and to connect with nature (Economic Contribution of Georgia Wineries and Vineyards, Prepared by: Kent Wolfe, Sharon P. Kane, and Karen Stubbs, University of Georgia, Center for Agribusiness and Economic Development, Center Report: CR-13-06, dated Sept 13th 2013 https://caed.uga.edu/content/dam/caes-subsite/caed/publications/center-reports/economiccontribution-wineries-georgia.pdf). Specifically, "scenery" is listed as the number 1 reason people go to wineries (table #1.6). Further, in 2013, it was documented that the impact of Georgia Wineries on the State economy was "sectors, along with visitor spending contributes up to \$81.6 million in output, 655.6 jobs throughout the state's economy, and \$4.1 million in state and local tax revenue". It is probably double that now due to the winery growth in the North Georgia Mountains and due to inflation within the last 10 years since the report was written. This high density subdivision proposal will undoubtedly diminish the winery due to a loss of "scenery". It will severely impair winery operations and promote future noise complaints all for the purpose maximizing lots of land on a proposed future movement of Stanley Road. Many people like the winery location because it saves them from driving long distances to visit other wineries. Thus, attendance at this winery is safer, more affordable and helps keep tax dollars in Hall County. This proposal is so aggressive and inappropriate for a rural area, I have been in communication with my State Representative's office.

For these reasons, this re-proposed development request should be denied:

- 1) harm to an established winery with good community support
- 2) hampered winery operations
- 3) destruction of valuable scenery
- 4) destruction of property value and investments made consistent with a rural area.
- 5) loss of rural area that helps people's well being,



- 6) a possible increase of noise complaints
- 7) possible economic loss to Hall County and an increase in mosquitos.
- 8) Violations of County rules, standards and reasonable traffic loads

Also, the proposal is inconsistent with the Hall County comprehensive Land Use Plan for this area and is counter to the quality of life for current and future homeowners and agri-businesses in the area, I urge the denial of the proposal of moving Stanley road and any rezoning change to an established rural area within Hall County. A non AR-3 zoning request would substantially hurt Mulberry Springs Vineyard and Winery.

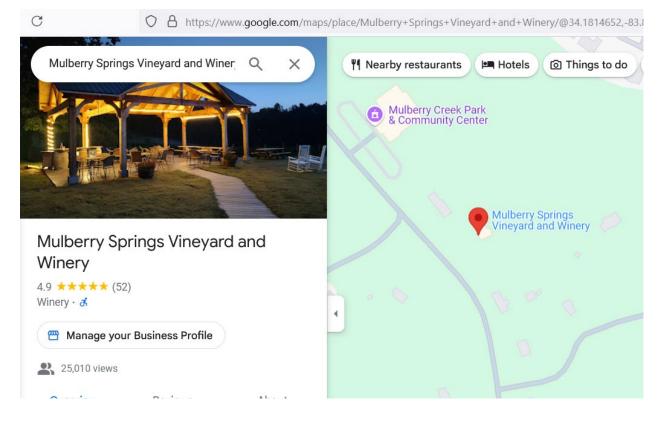

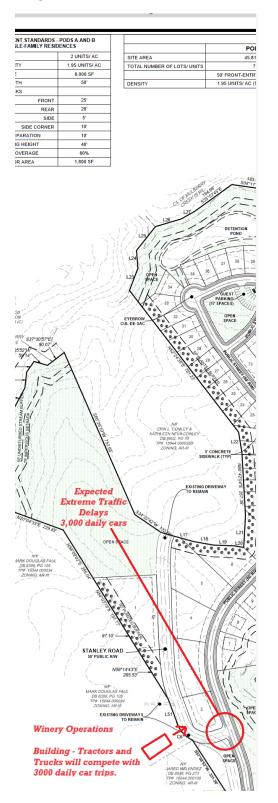

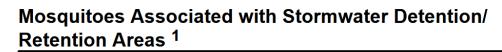

Mr. Chairman and Commissioners:

Once again, in an ongoing saga, I am writing to express concerns of the proposed project (listed above) in the J M Turk Road Community. It is not in opposition of the property owners that are selling their properties, but instead towards the developer and continued attempts to get variances around the Master Plan's density requirements for our area.

JM Turk Road is a rural country road. It meanders through farm land and large acreage residential areas. The road is named after a family of long-time residency in South Hall. This pastoral path has narrow sharp curves and drop off embankments and is one reason semi-trucks are prohibited from using this road.

The proposed project, which was soundly denied by the Planning Commission last year **5-0**, and more recently **4-1**, does not meet the density standard as prescribed in the Hall County Master Plan. Most residents are opposed to any high-density development that would cause a change to what is a unique setting for South Hall, but also the impact it would have on traffic, school population, a Georgia Ag Business adjacent to the property in question and the impact on the Mulberry Creek and its feeding tributaries.

The developer would have you believe that the proposed project fits in with their concept that South Hall is a glorified extension of Greater Atlanta. However, the proposed plan is not in compliance of the Hall County density requirement as outlined in the Master Plan.

Our community consists of homes and neighborhoods that have met the Master Plan's specification for our area. The following survey list examples based on the average of <u>one home per acre(s)</u>:

- ➢ Grandview Estates: .81 to 1.00 acre
- ➢ Quailwood: .96
- Homes on J. M. Turk Road nearest the round-about: 2.00
- Homes near Stanley Road: 1.7

- Homes presently built on 10 acres at the big bend on J.M. Turk: 2
- ➢ Homes in Elah Valley: 3 − 15 acres
- Homes past Elah Valley on J.M. Turk Rd. to Cash Rd: 4-6 acres
- Homes on Turk Rd. (from J.M. Turk Rd. to Cash Rd.: 1-2 acres

There are no homes or communities in this area that have two or more homes per acre.

The developer has made no changes to existing plan despite meeting with area residences last December (and the last Planning Commission meeting), other than closing off Guth Road for emergency services and knocking off a few homes down from 314 to 250+. Possible adjustments by the applicant are still requiring 2 or more units per acre plus townhouses (which does not meet the Master Plan recommendations). This does not address the community's concerns about density and impact on the quality of life in the area.

Previously, the developer says it will be spending 6-9 million dollars on sewer lines from JM Turk Road to Union Church Road. Therefore, it needs changes to the Master Plan providing enough homes to justify the sewer work. This is backward thinking. They are trying to say because of the infrastructure, a large development is needed. In addition, building a sewer line and station on a dangerous, windy steep road with sharp embankments will have adverse effects to the residents and community. Not to mention the various creek crossings. The previous attorney for the developer has indicated they do not have an alternative plan or willing to reduce the size of homes on the acreage. When suggested by a member of the Planning Commission to consider **one home on two acres**, which adheres to the view of most of our community, the applicant indicated that was not financially feasible. However, one wonders if Quailwood and Grandview could not be a model for them.

In addition, the continued development and unchecked population growth exposes our residents to the increase of flood hazards along the Mulberry Creek.

According to a 2016 US Geological Survey, any flood hazard maps that are based on stream flow data that is 10 years or older is not accurate. Our local government(s) need stream gage stations to provide updated records to help manage what infrastructure is needed to apply solutions to flooding and run-off.

In the past 2-3 years, the Mulberry Creek has flooded more than what was common in our community, Elah Valley (known by the locals as *The Bottoms*).

Now, whenever it rains, the creek comes within 3-4 feet of cresting its banks. The consistent damage to our roads and bridges has been expensive. The volume of water that continues to increase is the result of upstream uncontrolled growth.

In summary, residents are still strongly against the original proposal and changes that is being attempted once again. The major issue is the project does not muster and fit into the Master Plan density that is conducive for the J M Turk Community.

The impact of this size community on a small country road will impact all the property owners in this region. Most of the owners do not want it and I ask that this body accept the staff's **denial** for this project.

Please accept my letter of Opposition to the Proposed subdivision (entrance Stanley Road, no known rezoning number).

Mulberry Springs Winery is a State of Georgia approved agricultural tourism farm. It is a beloved facility that adds charm to Hall County. The agricultural property (zoned AR-3) is being used exactly as the zoning suggests. The winery represents a significant investment to the community, pays large licensing fees, taxes and employs people. The proposed subdivision will significantly impair winery operations and may result in the closure of the winery due to the following:

- **Extreme Negative Impact to Winery Operations**: The proposed subdivision EMBEDS 4555 Stanley Road within the proposed Subdivision, which houses some of the operations for the winery. Tractors and Trucks will compete with the expected traffic of 2,800 cars produced by the high-density housing.

- Views of Mulberry Springs are amazing – rezoning will destroy the views: Few public places are as peaceful as the winery in South Hall County. The high-Density Housing will significantly hurt the views of the winery and will result in fewer customers.

- **The plan has excessive housing density, beyond allowable rules**: This high-density housing with 1/4 acre lots will be EMBEDDED and ADJACENT to a 20 acre farm. Excessive traffic within one entrance will conflict with winery operations. Further, noise issues from the public and/or the winery are expected because the high-density proposed subdivision is so near the winery.

- **Retention Ponds will create a breeding ground for mosquito:** The proposed high density is on property with significant topographic issues. Very little rainwater will be able to soak into the ground, meaning the detention ponds will always be full and serve as a nesting ground for mosquitos. This will hurt winery participation.

- **Property Value Destruction.** The proposed subdivision will significantly lower property values in the entire area due to an extreme imbalance in zoning and density and will significantly harm winery operations. It will also ruin a large financial investment in the winery.

I plead with you to deny this application for rezoning and the entire project. Please let me know if you have any questions.

Mulberry Springs Vineyard and Winery, which is a Farm House winery. Farm wineries are allowed on AGRICULTURAL- RESIDENTIAL III (AR-3) zoning and are very popular with the public. Farm Wineries were also encouraged by the State of Georgia to promote Georgia Agriculture and employment. Hall County Commissioners granted approval of Mulberry Springs Vineyard and Winery on 5 May 2021. Mulberry Springs Vineyard and Winery and has a role in providing the following positive attributes to the Hall County Community:

- A google 4.9 star out of 5-star average review (image 1)
- Last Years we received 27,431 views on Google Maps.
- The Largest Vineyard in Hall County.
- Overwhelming support on Facebook with thousands of likes and/or and support from the Community.
- Active sponsor of local charity events.
- "Hidden gem" description of many.
- Member of Georgia Agrotourism supported by Road signs.
- Employs people and helps the economy.
- Provides a fantastic view for guests and helps create a positive image of Hall County.

Unfortunately, the proposed subdivision on Stanley Road in Flowery Branch GA will directly hurt all winery operations and may result in the closure of the winery. The proposed subdivision, is actually an urban island in a rural area, involving approximately 14 variances, which are exceptions to existing Hall County rules. This request is overly aggressive and will negatively impact the Mulberry Springs Vineyard and Winery in numerous ways. We encourage you to deny the rezoning request of PRD from AR-3 Stanley Road for the following reasons:

Negative impact on Winery Operations at 4555 Stanley Road. The proposal, if approved, an estimated 2,800 cars will be added to Stanley Road, where some winery operations occur (image 2) and agricultural equipment is stored (image 3) and an image of the massive vineyard (image 4). The winery uses an outbuilding on 4555 Stanley Road (image 5). This excessive proposed density using one road will severely damage the winery operations and alternatives for space will be dramatically more expensive. Any reconfiguration to allow winery truck and machine access will compete with subdivision traffic of about 2,800 car trips a day. This is a rural area – there is even a County Tractor Sign a few feet from Stanley Road (image 6). THERE WILL BE ANGRY RESIDENTS WHEN SLOWER TRUCK AND FARM EQUIPMENT COMPETES WITH ROAD SPACE. There should be 2 traffic functional entrances into the proposed subdivision, and those entrances should be about 1,800 feet apart, which is consistent with fire code regulations (Ga. Comp. R. & Regs. r. 120-3-3-.04 State Minimum Fire Safety Standards with



Modifications Georgia Administrative Code Department, Appendix D 107.1 and Appendix D 107.2) (image 7). Vehicles from the winery will struggle to depart from 4555, by having extra turns and competing with 2,800 automobiles a day.

Views of Mulberry Springs are amazing – rezoning will destroy the views. People come to the winery to relax and get something they can't get at home, which is beautiful vistas and peacefulness. In an age of excessive warehouses, the winery location was specifically chosen for its views and the limited growth possibility on Stanley Road due to its odd triangular shape the likely impossibility of building houses on the Road, given typical Hall County setback rules. However, the proposed plan will allow houses to be seen from the winery. This will hurt the views of the largest Vineyard in Hall County and help destroy a valuable asset to the community. Further, the State of Georgia has declared Mulberry Springs Vineyard and Winery an official "Georgia Grown Agritourism site". This helps Georgia Tourism. This subdivision proposal is inconsistent the State of Georgia agritourism designation (image 8).

The plan has excessive housing density, beyond allowable rules, which may result in noise complaints. Part of the vineyard lies 350 feet from Stanley Road. The current plan is to move Stanley Road and have houses backup to 4567 Stanley Road, with limited setbacks. Thus, people may hear wine drinkers have conversations and wine drinkers may be bothered by dense subdivision noise. It goes both ways. The excessive density and movement of Stanley Road puts winery operations at risk of receiving noise complaints and diminished winery patronage. Please note the current AR-3 density is manageable and consistent with the entire rural area and is allowed by the State of Georgia. However, PDR zoning is incompatible with winery operations and is setting up the winery for noise complaints. The decision to allow anything other than AR-3 zoning will severely injure the winery sales.

Retention Ponds will create a breeding ground for mosquitos. Mulberry Springs winery built an underground water detention pond that costs about \$50,000. This was to avoid the mosquito problems in an area where there are outdoor activities. The proposed high-density subdivision has many detention above ground detention ponds. These ponds will result in a breeding ground for disease (ie, West Nile virus, Zika...) and will likely severely hamper winery operations. The academic literature on this is significant (image 9). If the proposed subdivision is approved, request the detention ponds be placed underground to protect the public and the winery.

Property Value Destruction. Mulberry Springs Winery is an approved agricultural tourism farm by the State of Georgia and is a beloved facility that adds charm to the residents of Hall County. The agricultural property (zoned AR-3) is being used exactly as the zoning suggests. The winery represents a significant investment to the community, pays large licensing fees, taxes and employs people. The proposed subdivision will significantly destroy property values in the entire area due to an extreme imbalance and a difficulty in conducting transactions.

Please deny the zoning request. Homes could be built on the existing AR-3 zoning. No one rejects development on the current zoning of AR-3. However, this plan is grossly overly aggressive and hurts the look and feel of this valued rural area. It will also severely injure the Winery Operations and activities. According to a study done by the University of Georgia, the number one reason people visit wineries to for the views and to connect with nature (Economic Contribution of Georgia Wineries and Vineyards, Prepared by: Kent Wolfe, Sharon P. Kane, and Karen Stubbs, University of Georgia, Center for



Agribusiness and Economic Development, Center Report: CR-13-06, dated Sept 13th 2013 https://caed.uga.edu/content/dam/caes-subsite/caed/publications/center-reports/economiccontribution-wineries-georgia.pdf). Specifically, "scenery" is listed as the number 1 reason people go to wineries (table #1.6). Further, in 2013, it was documented that the impact of Georgia Wineries on the State economy was "sectors, along with visitor spending contributes up to \$81.6 million in output, 655.6 jobs throughout the state's economy, and \$4.1 million in state and local tax revenue". It is probably double that now due to the winery growth in the North Georgia Mountains and due to inflation within the last 10 years since the report was written. This very dense subdivision proposal will undoubtedly hurt the winery due to a loss of "scenery" and gross congestion on a small country road in Hall County. It will severely hamper winery operations and promote future noise complaints all for the purpose maximizing lots of land on a proposed future movement of Stanley Road. Many people like the winery location because it saves them from driving long distances to visit other wineries. This proposal is so aggressive and inappropriate for a rural area, I have been in communication with my State Representative's office.

For these reasons (harm to an established winery with good community support, hampered winery operations, destruction of valuable scenery, loss of rural area that helps people's well being, possible increase of noise complaints, possible economic loss to Hall County and an increase in mosquitos)) this rezoning request should be denied. Also, the proposal is inconsistent with the Hall County comprehensive Land Use Plan for this area and is counter to the quality of life for current and future homeowners and agri-businesses in the area, I urge the denial of the proposal of moving Stanley road and any rezoning change to an established rural area within Hall County. A non AR-3 zoning request would substantially hurt Mulberry Springs Vineyard and Winery. I can be reached at 678-472-6327.

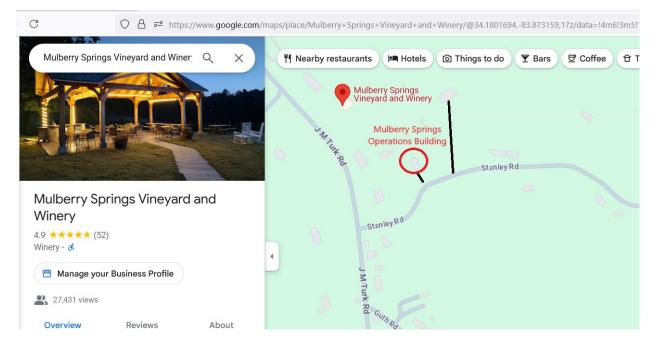

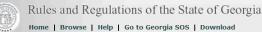
Rule 120-3-3-.01 Promulgation and Purpose

- (1) These rules and regulations of the Safety Fire Commissioner entitled, "Rules and Regulations for the State Minimum Fire Safety Standards" are promulgated to establish the State's minimum fire safety standards as specified in the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, (O.C.G.A.) Section <u>25-2-4</u>.
- (2) A primary purpose of these rules and regulations is to establish the state minimum fire safety standards and requirements for the prevention of loss of life and property from fire, panic from fear of fire, explosions or related hazards in all buildings, structures and facilities with the exception of one- and twofamily dwellings, one- and two-family row houses (townhouses) separated by a 2-hour fire wall and two- family townhouses separated by a 2-hour fire wall.

Rule 120-3-3-.02 Application

- (1) (a) Pursuant to O.C.G.A. <u>25-2-4</u>, rules and regulations adopted by the Safety Fire Commissioner shall have the force and effect of law and shall have statewide application as being the state minimum fire safety standards and shall not require adoption by a municipality or county. The governing authority of any municipality or county in this state is authorized to enforce the state minimum fire safety standards on all buildings and structures except one-family and two-family dwellings, one- and two-family row houses (townhouses) separated by a 2-hour fire wall and two-family townhouses separated by a 2-hour fire wall, and those buildings and structures listed in O.C.G.A. <u>25-2-13</u>, except as may be required or permitted by O.C.G.A. <u>25-2-12</u> and <u>25-2-12</u>.
 - (b) Pursuant to O.C.G.A. <u>25-2-13(f)</u>, the municipal governing authority in any incorporated area or the county governing authority in any unincorporated area of the state shall have the authority to enact such ordinances as it deems necessary to perform fire safety inspections and related activities for those buildings and structures not covered by O.C.G.A. <u>25-2-13</u>.
- (2) Whenever the provisions of this chapter of the Rules and Regulations of the Safety Fire Commissioner offer alternatives, as far as fire safety requirements are concerned, that were not permissible under previous editions of any Rules and Regulations of the Safety Fire Commissioner covering the same subject matter, the provisions of this chapter may be used by the authority having jurisdiction in determining whether a building is in compliance with the provisions of O.C.G.A. Title 25, Chapter 2, and the rules and regulations promulgated there under.

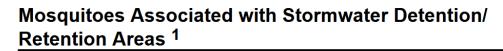

Please accept my letter of opposition to the Proposed subdivision (entrance Stanley Road) for the following reasons.

- **Extreme Negative Impact to quality of life**: The proposed subdivision EMBEDS two properties I own (4567 & 4555 Stanley Road) within the proposed high-density Subdivision. Residents living on Stanley Road will have to compete with 2,800 car trips to exit from their properties.

- A County Commissioner is a Real Estate Agent on the proposed high-density subdivision: The proposed property is in District 1 and the citizens are not going to get proper representation.

- Water Detention Ponds will not likely work in the area due to the steep terrain.

- The proposed High-Density development is inconsistent with the rural area.
- Excessive request for variances and overall rezoning.

I have two properties on Stanley Road (4567 and 4555 Stanley Road) that are severely impacted by the re-proposed high-density development with one entrance on Stanley Road. This Planned Residential Development was proposed in during the late summer of 2023 and withdrawn during April of 2024, because of a lack of support from Hall County staff, the Planning Commission and presumedly the Board of Commissioners. This new proposal has not changed much and continues to receive denial recommendations from Hall County Staff, the Planning Commission and the public. This letter is to document some of my opposition to the Stanley Road and Guth Road Properties, which follows:

1) This proposed development EMBEDS my properties within a high-density subdivision. None of the maps provided by applicant shows this, nor is it discussed by the applicant. Please see Image 1 and 2, that shows how I will have to drive through a high-density subdivision with an expected traffic flow of 2,800 cars per day (per the traffic study dated May 23, 2023 revised January 24, 2024) There is only one planned entrance for traffic in this high-density subdivision. This is the definition of poor planning by the applicant. Please note, no one buys 20 acres of agricultural land only to be EMBEDDED within, and ADJACENT to, a high-density subdivision, which is grossly inconsistent with the surrounding area. Lots that are 1/8 of an acre and smaller will be next to an active working farm of 20 acres. Approval of this high-density subdivision violates the implied promise of adherence to normal growth consistent with the zoning in the area, development commensurate with the area, Hall County's comprehensive plan

(<u>https://www.dca.ga.gov/sites/default/files/hall_co_compplan_2017.pdf</u>) and Hall County's written guidance on PRD

(https://www.hallcounty.org/DocumentCenter/View/3830/PZPublication) and simple respect for existing neighbors and future residents of the area.

2) A County Commissioner in District 1, Kathy Cooper is listed is the real estate agent on this proposed PRD, which is in District 1. Please see her conflict on interest form as image 3. As

indicated in the document (image 3), Ms. Cooper helped create this proposed high-density subdivision and stands to directly benefit from the project. Meanwhile, there are strong and consistent community opposition to the proposed high-density project. These actions warrant the Board of Commissioners voting down the high-density subdivision. Please see "ABUSE OF OFFICE, CONFLICTS OF INTEREST, AND ETHICAL STANDARDS, 2022 Association County Commissioners of Georgia (ACCG)", page 20

(https://www.accg.org/docs/handbook/Abuse%20of%20Power.pdf) and the court case Montgomery v. Atlanta.

3) <u>Water detention ponds</u> – The ponds are not visually done properly and do not control flooding or mosquito populations in dense areas.

- Detention ponds are not flood control – they all have overflow systems to allow excess water to be discharged into streams and wet land areas. Elah Valley has experienced extreme flooding from the recent development. The additional impervious space, which includes the footprint of a house, all the sidewalks and the roads, in the proposed development is extreme. The manmade ponds could not be designed properly on absorb all of the water runoff created by this project.

- The Topography on Stanley Road is very steep – water will not soak into the ground, but rather head directly into the detention pond systems and the overflow mechanisms resulting in flooding.

- There has been 5 feet of erosion on one of my properties (4567 Stanley Road - 17 acres) since the Grandview development. A small creek on my property forms when it rains heavy.

- Elah valley reports increased flooding after every major development.

 Approximately 20% of the development includes impervious land such as sidewalks and roads. Once calculated properly, the re-proposed subdivision does not meet the proper required green space percentages.

- Ponds will be a major source of mosquitoes to residents in the area. <mark>If approved please require the developer to have underground detention ponds to control for mosquitoes.</mark> This would minimize the direct impact on the nearby winery and the people living in the area.

4) <u>Rural area zoned agricultural III</u>. Regular houses can go in on this current zoning consistent with AR-III zoning. People are not opposed to that. There are many farms in the area, and thus, <mark>the State of Georgia placed a Cautionary Tractor sign on JM Turk Road, about 60 feet from the proposed development (Image 4).</mark>

- Tractor traffic in the area – at least 4 people have tractors within a $\frac{1}{2}$ mile area.

- Winery operations at 4555 Stanley Road will be hampered due to 2,800 car trips a day on Stanley Road

- Largest vineyard in Hall County just 350 feet from Stanley Road.

- Doesn't fit the area at all and is dangerous to truck and tractor access using Stanley Road.

5) <u>Approximately seven – fourteen variances requested is excessive</u>. - Why have rules if Hall County is going to grant approximately 7-14 exemptions to the rules (documented by Hall County staff). Such a submission makes a mockery of established review systems<mark>. If Hall County</mark> approves this extreme proposal, what wouldn't they approve?

7) Negative Impact on property values:

- One version of this proposal results in diminished property value loss to the residents on 4621 Stanley Road, which will have 24 homes on 1/8 acre lots around his 11 acres. This is extreme.

- The residents of 4567 Stanley Road) will be looking at the back side of 5 houses from his front porch.

- There is no 50 foot buffer from the subdivision from Lots 2 and 3 for the residents of 4567 Stanley Road. While there is a modified Stanley Road Street there, there is no 50 foot buffer and the residents of 4567 and 4555 Stanley Road will be shining his car lights into the back windows of homes are night. This will disturb potential neighbors and be a source of many problems for everyone.

- Many adjacent home owners will have high-density housing around them and it will harm existing values.

- The modified Stanley Road in this proposal will cause residents of 4567 and 4555 Stanley Road to have to make an additional turn to get out of the subdivision. This will cause a decrease in property value. This proposal EMBEDDS my properties within a high-density Subdivision. How can it not damage property values?

- According to the traffic analysis by conducted by SEI Engineering, Inc and Acampora Traffic LLC on May 23, 2023, and revised January 24, 2024 there will 2,800 car trips produced by the reproposed high density subdivision. ALL OF THIS TRAFFIC WILL BE IN FRONT OF MY TWO PROPERTIES. I will have a difficult time getting out of my driveway, and my property values will be substantially decreased. If approved, please have another exit out of this highly dense subdivision. *I did not buy a rural property with substantial acreage to have major problems (2,800 car trips a day) with getting out of my personal dwellings*. This re-proposed subdivision does not fit the area.

7) <u>Flawed Traffic Analysis</u> – During the last submission, one of the Planning Commissioners asked for a more accurate traffic analysis during the Fall of 2023. Yet, no new data was collected or analyzed. According to the traffic analysis conducted by SEI Engineering, Inc and Acampora Traffic LLC on May 23, 2023, and revised January 24, 2024 there will 2800 car trips produced by the reproposed high density subdivision. There are many problems with this analysis:

1) The traffic data collected was on one day only: 23 May of 2023. The data is outdated and likely an underestimate of traffic flow patterns.

2) One day of traffic is not representative of the true situation. More data points in time are needed, particularly since the data collection was done during COVID times, when some people were encouraged to work from home.

3) The data does not include future approved developments such as the housing development replacing the old Alpaca Farm (148-units) a few miles from this proposed development or the Union Grove Subdivision in South Hall County and other developments currently being constructed. These housing developments will put strain on the roads and were not included in the analysis.

8) <u>Violation of regulatory rules</u>. The re-proposed subdivision is in conflict with established regulatory rules, which follows:

A) The plan is inconsistent with Hall County Guidance (Planning & Zoning Rezoning Variances Special Uses <u>https://www.hallcounty.org/DocumentCenter/View/93/Guide-to-</u> Planning-and-Zoning, which states:

- Page 10: "Planned Residential Development (PRD) A Planned Residential Development may allow for a more flexible placement, arrangement and orientation of residential structures, the accompanying flexibility in the subdivision of land and the grouping of open space and accessory facilities such as garages and parking. It may also provide for a mixture of housing types (single-family, two-family, multi-family, etc.) according to a carefully drawn plan. The proposed residential development should make maximum use of natural features and, through proper site planning measures, it should conform to the existing character and development pattern of the surrounding area. Every effort should be made to preserve and protect any existing residential uses from adverse impacts, which might result from a higher density development." Image 5.

This re-proposed subdivision has lot sizes of 5,000 sq feet, or 1/8th of an acre. Meanwhile consists of multi-acre tracks. The proposal is not consistent with the existing character of an established winery and large acreage tracks. Further, the proposal does not protect existing residential uses from adverse impacts, such as changing the configuration of Stanley Road and the excessive traffic of 2,800 cars per day. Approval of this rezoning request would clearly violate Hall County's written policy.

B) The proposed development is not consistent with existing growth plans for Hall County. Please see the Opinion of Hall County Planning Staff.

C) <u>Second entrance needed and distances re-proposed is not complaint with current</u> <u>fire standards</u> – Ga. Comp. R. & Regs. r. 120-3-3-.04 State Minimum Fire Safety Standards with Modifications Georgia Administrative Code Department

Appendix D 107.1, as follows: <mark>Developments of one- or two-family dwellings where the number of dwelling units exceeds 120 shall be provided with two separate and approved fire apparatus access roads.</mark>

Appendix D 107.2, as follows: Where two fire apparatus access roads are required, they shall be placed a distance apart equal to not less than one-half of the length of the maximum overall diagonal dimension of the property or area to be served, measured in a straight line between accesses (See Image 6).

<u>Point one</u> – Common Sense suggests that a subdivision of 120 homes needs two entrances for general safety and to reduce congestion. This reproposed second entrance that is for emergency vehicles only is only useful during an emergency.

<u>Point two</u> - The overall diagonal dimension is about 3,675 and ½ that distance is about 1,838 feet. Thus, the entrances need to be at least 1,838 feet from one another (enclosure 1). None of the plans adequately address this safety and regulatory mandate.

D) The partial Abandonment of Stanley Road requires a separate process not

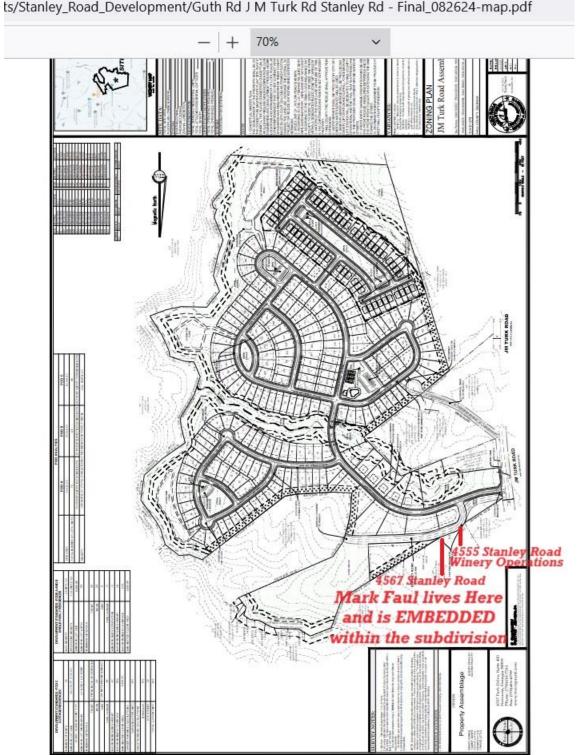
conducted. After talking with Hall County traffic expert, Mr. Scott Puckett, he said any movement of the Stanley Road would invoke a regulatory procedure (12.20.050. - Procedure for road abandonment). The reproposed design of the road creates an additional turn for residents of 4567 and 4555 Stanley Road to simply exit the properties and exposes me to the full traffic load of the entire subdivision (2,800 cars), plus traffic from another street.

Thank you for considering my comments and concerns. The developer's re-request is very aggressive and inappropriate for the area. The planned 10 October meeting represents the 12th meeting on this proposed high-density subdivision. It has negatively impacted the morale of nearly everyone in the area. No one in the area wants this reproposed development. It simply doesn't fit the area and will cause harm to local folks and a local business. 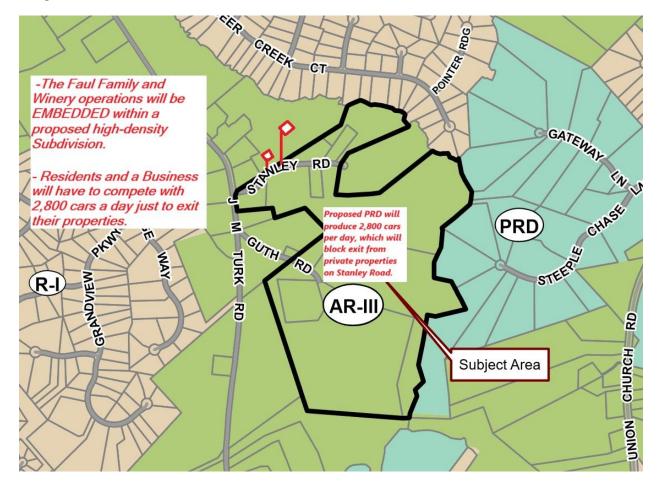

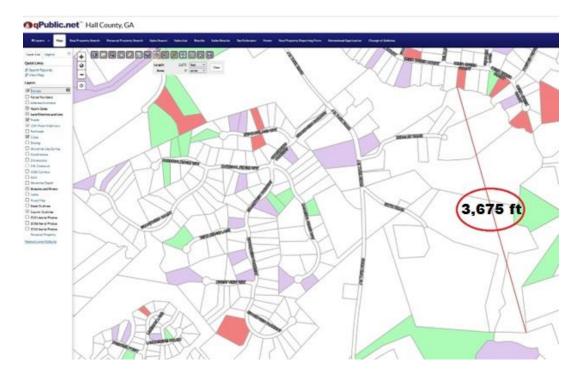

The rep-proposed entrances are about 300 feet from one another. Thus, the emergency entrance does not meet fire regulations. It is dangerous to approve re-proposed rezoning request without a proper distance appropriate secondary entrance.

Please accept my email of Opposition to the Proposed subdivision off of J M Turk Road. I want to propose to you a few points of opposition to this development:

- The development will produce rainwater waste from the neighborhood yards and roads that will pour directly into the Mulberry River. With recent commercial development such as the community center and Ingles shopping center, the river easily floods when there is decent rainfall. With the completion of Quailwood and Grandview we saw this beginning. This has led to costly repairs of the roads and bridges in the Elah Valley development that the homeowners within Elah Valley are responsible for. More rainwater will easily acerbate this problem. The current master site plan shows approximately 36 lots with space inside of the 75ft impervious setback off the Mulberry River and some of those have areas inside the 50' undisturbed buffer off the Mulberry. This is a major environmental concern.
- The developer is claiming a housing density of 2.24 units/acre; however, when the required setback/buffers and required stormwater ponds are taken out of the calculation, it gives a real density of approximately 3.6 units per usable acre. The PRD code states a density no grader than 2. Changes to the development plan should be made to bring the housing development more in line with the code.
- I have serious concerns about the septic system. A pumping station at the intersection of J M Turk and Cash Road has been discussed. The only open area is in a flood plain. A pumping station in a flood plain sounds like an environmental disaster waiting to happen. There is a pumping station in the development which is close to Mulberry River. Which I feel is risky. How is the sewage going to get from the development to the Cash Road pumping station? Is the plan to run sewage lines through private property? Will the developer compensate the property owners or will the government use eminent domain and take possession of the property that is needed? Every home between the development and Cash Road is on a well. Will the developer guarantee everyone homeowner their well will be kept protected from sewage contamination? This has never been explained to the local private land owners. I have brought this question up many times at the meeting at it never gets answered.
- I am not anti-development but this development does not fit the area. Many new homes have been built off of J M Turk which are large estate beautiful homes. A development such as Quailwood or Grandview should be proposed. Other developments of similar plans, starter homes and townhomes, are already being constructed on Union Church Road (3), Spouts Springs (4), and Highway 211 (1). We don't need another starter home development in the Cherokee Bluff / Flowery Branch school district. A starter home subdivision will not add to the ambience on J M Turk Road and should not share the same location as multi-million dollar estate homes. I am concerned about property values along J M Turk Road being negatively impacted.

I have attached a Word document detailing my other concerns on this proposal.

I beg you to deny this application for the project or at best table the application so that the developer can redo their plans and have the local property owner's questions answered. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me.

With the completion of Quailwood and Grandview we saw this beginning. This has led to costly repairs of the roads and bridges in the Elah Valley development. More rainwater will easily acerbate this problem.
- 2) The Planned Residential Development code calls out for a garage door that's no more than 40% of the overall front facade of a detached home and 50% of a townhome. This development is requesting 55% for both. Furthermore, the developer is claiming a housing density of 2.24 units/acre; however, when the required setback/buffers and required stormwater ponds are taken out of the calculation, it gives a real density of approximately 3.6 units per usable acre. The comprehensive plan states a density of 2.
- 3) The current master site plan shows approximately 36 lots with space inside of the 75ft impervious setback off the Mulberry Creek and some of those have areas inside the 50' undisturbed buffer off the Mulberry. This ties back to my first point.
- 4) How is the septic system going to be handled? A pumping station at the intersection of J M Turk and Cash Road has been discussed. The only open area is in a flood plain. A pumping station in a flood plain sounds like an environmental disaster waiting to happen. How is the sewage going to get from the development to the pumping station? Going to run sewage lines through private property? Will the developer compensate the property owners or will the government use eminent domain and take possession of the property that is needed? Every home between the development and Cash Road is on a well. Will the developer guarantee everyone homeowner their well will be kept protected

from sewage contamination? This has never been explained to the local private land owners.

- 5) This development does not fit the area. Many new homes have been built off of J M Turk which are large estate beautiful homes. A development such as Quailwood or Grandview should be proposed. Other developments of similar plans, starter homes and townhomes, are already being constructed on Union Church Road (3), Spouts Springs (4), and Highway 211 (1). We don't need another starter home development in the Cherokee Bluff / Flowery Branch school district. A starter home subdivision should not share the same location as multi-million estate homes.
- 6) The developers have requested 40' tall townhomes? The last townhome request (oddly enough, also with Steve Gilliam) was for 35' tall structures. Now we add another 5 feet in height to those? Really?? That is taller than many trees in the area.
- 7) Another variance is the developer wants a 22ft front yard set back. The PRD clearly calls for a minimum front yard setback of 25ft.
- 8) With the numerous new developments in the area (8 mentioned above and more in consideration), can Cherokee Bluffs / Flowery Branch truly handle the additional students? The South Hall school system is not capable of handling the influx of people coming in.

I want to encourage the planning commission to deny this development request. Thank you for your time and consideration.

I have property on Stanley Road (4621 Stanley Road) that is negatively impacted by the re-proposed development (Stanley & Guth Road). This letter is to document some of my opposition to the Stanley Road and Guth Road Properties, which follows:

- Excessive request for variances, along with a rezoning request.

- Negative impacts on surrounding and nearby properties in terms of lifestyle and property values.

- A flawed and outdated traffic analysis.

- Violations of important regulatory rules and ordinances (i.e., inconsistency with the area and the Hall County Development plans and written Hall County Guidance, the critical need for a usable secondary entrance to avoid 3,000 daily car trips in front of my properties on Stanley Road, failure to follow the regulatory rules for the regarding fire access distances from multiple entrances, abandonment of part of Stanley Road).

- Inconsistency with large agricultural operations in the immediate area.

- Inability of traditional retention ponds to manage the excessive runoff of water produced by the noncompliant proposed subdivision. Currently, there is a lot of erosion and flooding in the area.

Zoning guidelines are in place to protect property owners from this exact situation. They have asked for multiple exceptions, and some are just not safe for the public. Exceptions are for circumstances where there is a little consideration needed and is accepted by everyone that it effects. This is not the case.

When my neighbors and my family purchased our property, it was because we had some space away from the rest of the world. Twelve acres is not that much in the grand scheme of things, but it was our sanctuary. Now they are proposing about twenty-five homes surrounding half of my property. These homes will be on one-eighth-acre sites, which is not characteristic for the area at all.

The traffic that this will bring will overload J M Turk Rd, and the surrounding roads. The traffic analysis that was done was for one day, during Covid times. There were so few people active at this time that is not even close to being accurate. The road is considered a rural road and was not designed for this type of traffic.

The plan only has one entrance and exit, which is a clear violation of code. It is clear that a neighborhood of this size is required to have at least two entry/exits. It would be disastrous if an emergency took place with that many people trying to exit.

The area is home to Hall county's largest vineyard. There are multiple large tracks zoned for agriculture in the area as well. Several of my neighbors have tractors including myself which utilize the immediate roads.

The retention ponds planned will bring unwanted bugs to the area. This could be devastating to the local winery and its business. Not to mention the runoff will overwhelm the local streams causing flooding downstream. Erosion has already been a problem in the area due to the previous growth in the area.

This proposal has been voted against once, please vote it down again. We have no local representation with the commissioners due to a conflict of interest with Ms. Cooper's seat and her being the realtor on the transaction. Please help keep Hall County rural, the way it was intended to be.

My husband and I live off of Martin Rd. in Martins Crossing West. We are reaching out in regards to the potential rezoning in our area that would allow a high density housing development. This development would increase traffic exponentially on Martin Rd. As it is now Martin has a high volume of traffic which makes coming and going for residents extremely difficult and dangerous. The road doesn't handle the amount of traffic

it has now very well and if this rezoning takes place and high volume developments are allowed the traffic issues residents experience daily will only become even more unmanageable. If there is a car breakdown on Martin, drivers have no where to move their vehicles to except the narrow road shoulder found in only a few places and traffic backs up quickly. Dear Members of the Hall County Commission,

I am writing to express my strong opposition to the proposed housing development located primarily on Stanley and JM Turk Road in Flowery Branch. While I appreciate the need for new housing commensurate with the area (AR III zoning), I believe that this particular project would have detrimental effects on our community.

The proposed housing density is extreme (1/4 acre lots and smaller) in a predominately agricultural area. The infrastructure in our area as it exists today is not equipped to handle the increased population that this development would bring. Our roads are currently congested, and adding more homes would exacerbate these issues, leading to safety concerns for pedestrians and drivers alike. Moreover, local schools and public services may struggle to accommodate the influx of new residents, potentially compromising the quality of education and services we currently enjoy.

An additional concern that I have is that my family's home will be embedded in the proposed development. Myself, along with other residents on Stanley Road, will have trouble negotiating exit from our driveway, due to the estimated 2,800 cars a day that will be added in front of our house. This proposed project embeds Stanley Road residents within the subdivision. This is unprecedented and improper will harm property values. The proposal is grossly inconsistent with the guidance on Planned Residential Development, which states (https://www.hallcounty.org/DocumentCenter/View/3830/PZPublication) :

The proposed residential development should make maximum use of natural features and, through proper site planning measures, it should conform to the existing character and development pattern of the surrounding area. Every effort should be made to preserve and protect any existing residential uses from adverse impacts, which might result from a higher density development.

I urge the commission to consider the long-term implications of this housing development. Engaging with the community to explore alternatives that align with our shared values and priorities is crucial.

Representing all 15 homeowners of the Elah Valley subdivision as President of the Elah Valley HOA, I am providing this email to registering our subdivision's unanimous opposition to this re-proposed subdivision:

0, 4611, 4627 Guth Road & 0, 4561, 4613 J M Turk Road & 4590, 4601, 4610 Stanley Road | Rezone |on a 114.147± acre tract | Proposed Use: 256-unit residential development | Steven P. Gilliam, applicant

There have been minor changes to this proposal since the last go round - when the proposal was withdrawn at the April 23rd Board Of Commissioners meeting. The total number of homes since the last version of this proposal are reduced little, but still does not meet the the 2 homes per acre standard. The actual physical lot sizes proposed are tiny. The cottages/townhomes absolutely do not fit the surrounding housing character on J M Turk Road and would negatively impact our subdivision and the surrounding community.

This re-proposal does not meet the PRD definition - part of the PRD definition:

"The proposed residential development should make maximum use of natural features and, through proper site planning measures, it should conform to the existing character and development pattern of the surrounding area. Every effort should be made to preserve and protect any existing residential uses from adverse impacts, which might result from a higher density development."

The re-proposal does not confirm to the existing character and development patterns of the surrounding area, and does not preserve nor protect existing residential used from adverse impacts.

All the same objections raised by the Planning Commission to the previous proposal still apply to this re-proposal - when it was unanimously voted by the Planning Commission to recommend denial of approval for this proposal.

- Multiple requests for variances, along with a rezoning request itself

- The high density requires that a sewage line must be built over a long distance - all homes on J M Turk have a septic tank

Again in this re-proposal, the Planning Commission voted again to recommend denial of this re-proposal. It is frustrating that we have to go thru this all over again..... wasting time of the Hall County residents in this community negatively impacted by such a proposed development and wasting the time of the Hall County Planning Commission and Board of Commission.

Recall the 6-7 months the last round took with the many last minute withdrawals by the developer immediately before the Planning Commission meetings and Board of Commissioner meetings.

Having the previous proposal withdrawn just before the Hall County Board Of Commissioners meeting gave us concern that it would be back. I had corresponded with Beth Garmon about my concern at that time.

We have had a recent increase in new housing on J M Turk Rd over the last 3 years that provided property owners with market value land purchases and new homes built that meet the character, quality and low density of the surrounding area. Another Quailwood or Grand View Estates development would be consistent and in keeping with this area. This would be the type of development that is consistent with this community and have the full support of the residents. Drive down J M Turk Rd and see the latest new housing and it will be obvious to you.

It is alarming to residents of south Hall County the number of high density housing developments/townhouses over the last few years with very few, if any, low density higher quality housing developments. There should be a balance between keeping the unique and endearing character of Hall County and adding new housing. No one wants another Gwinnett County. If high density housing developments are being approved in lower density neighborhoods & areas of Hall County, why would developers propose low density higher quality housing developments?
