The Solid Waste Trust Fund (SWTF) Grant Program supports projects that reduce waste, abate and recycle scrap tires, and support statewide recycling initiatives.

Recycling and Waste Diversion (RWD) Grant

The Recycling and Waste Diversion (RWD) Grant supports a wide range of projects, including recycling and waste diversion infrastructure, hub and spoke development, hard-to-recycle materials, recovery of additional materials, waste reduction, and innovation.

Tire Products (Tire) Grant

The Tire Products (Tire) Grant funds projects that incorporate scrap tire-derived products into paving, trail, and playground surfaces or that identify innovative uses for these products through research.

Scrap Tire Abatement Reimbursement (STAR) Grant

The Scrap Tire Abatement Reimbursement (STAR) Grant reimburses eligible applicants for the direct costs associated with recycling tires abated in their communities. Projects include right-of-way cleanups, scrap tire collection events, and illegal scrap tire site abatement projects.

Eligibility

Counties, municipalities, or any combination of the same, public authorities, agencies, commissions, or institutions are eligible to apply and receive funding.

Nonprofit or private organizations are not eligible to apply for funding; however, they may partner with eligible applicants on projects.

FY 2026 Grant Cycle

Details on the FY 2026 grant cycle will become available Summer 2025.



Recycling and Waste Diversion Grant

The RWD Grant was first announced in state fiscal year (FY) 2023. EPD conducted outreach efforts along with the Keep Georgia Beautiful Foundation, Georgia Recycling Coalition, Association of County Commissioners, Georgia Municipal Association, and the Georgia Chapter of Solid Waste Association of North America to reach eligible entities.

In FY 2023, 42 applications were received amounting to \$14.7 million in grant award requests. EPD awarded 21 grantees a total of \$2.7 million. Projects included infrastructure developments in Dodge County and recycling equipment in the City of Chatsworth.

In FY 2024, the RWD Grant awarded a total of \$1.8 million to eight grantees. These projects included a composting program at Georgia Tech and the construction of new recycling facilities in the Cities of Johns Creek and Centerville.

In FY 2025, EPD awarded seven projects a total of \$3.1 million. These projects included the development of a Center for Hard to Recycle Materials (CHaRM) in the City of Atlanta and a Styrofoam diversion campaign on Tybee Island to prevent contamination along Georgia's coastline.

Metrics – as of April 15, 2025

Awarded RWD Grant projects have diverted over 1,800 tons of materials from Georgia's landfills. This includes:

- 429 tons of plastic
- 256 tons of cardboard/paper
- 109 tons of glass
- 40 tons of household hazardous waste
- 41 tons of hard-to-recycle materials
- 759 tons of organics that were then composted

Dodge County

Dodge County built a facility to store and bale cardboard. This was the first recycling program in the county. The county also placed collection containers and have diverted 80 tons of cardboard.



City of Chatsworth

The City of Chatsworth built a new facility to collect and bale recyclable materials, a project which is expected to divert 279 tons of recyclable materials over the next five years.



City of Norcross

The City of Norcross hosted a hazardous waste collection event that resulted in a 20% decrease in the contamination of recycling bins. A total of 115 vehicles participated, diverting 1.4 tons.



Athens-Clarke County

The Athens-Clarke County launched Georgia's first residential compost collection program. They purchased a truck and collection carts and have composted 430 tons of organics.



Floyd County

Floyd County installed a shredder to process plastics and paper. The shredder is unique in that it can process books, a hard-to-recycle material. Floyd County has increased plastic bale weight by 40% and recycled 216 tons of books.



University of Georgia

UGA studied the recycling habits of their students to identify strategies for waste reduction. Dining halls were identified as a target, and UGA is now participating in Athens-Clarke County's composting program.



Tire Products Grant

The overwhelming success of the RWD Grant led to the development of the Tire Products (Tire) Grant, and the expansion of the Scrap Tire Abatement Reimbursement (STAR) Grant (described on the following page).

Scrap tires have long since been banned from entering Georgia's landfills, and diversion of scrap tires has been encouraged through the STAR Grant. However, EPD wanted to create a second scrap tire related grant with an emphasis on circular economy and promoting manufacturing of products made from scrap tires.

First announced in FY 2024, the Tire Grant received sixteen applications amounting to \$2.2 million in grant award requests from sixteen applicants. EPD awarded eleven projects a total of \$1.4 million. These projects included roadway paving projects in Floyd and Gwinnett Counties, a research project by Georgia Southern University, and playground renovations in the City of Cedartown.

In FY 2025, EPD awarded 11 projects a total of \$1.7 million. These projects included roadway paving projects in Meriwether and Paulding counties and accessible playground resurfacing projects in multiple counties and school districts.

Metrics – as of April 15, 2025

The Tire Grant has awarded:

- 12 pour-in-place playground or sports field projects
- 6 roadway/paving projects
- 3 pour-in-place walkway projects
- 1 research project

These projects have utilized 73 tons of tirederived products, which is equivalent to 6,500 passenger tires.

City of Douglasville

The City of Douglasville resurfaced an alleyway located in the city's historic downtown using 7 tons of tire-derived products, providing a sustainable solution to erosion problems.



Georgia Southern University is researching options to increase the percentage of tire-derived materials used in asphalt. The results of their study will be shared with the tire industry.

Floyd County

Floyd County repaved a section of road using 3.6 tons of tire-derived products, making the road safer for residents.
Floyd County is the only community to participate in all three SWTF Grants in the same year.

Moultrie Colquitt

Moultrie-Colquitt County installed surfacing and swing mats across the county using 13 tons of tire-derived products, creating an ADA accessible playground.

Gwinnett County

Gwinnett County resurfaced a section of a highly traveled road using 1 ton of tirederived products, providing an efficient and sustainable solution for a road in disrepair.

Fulton County Schools

Fulton County Schools created an ADAaccessible playground using 5 tons of tire-derived products. EPD attended the ribbon cutting facilitated by Fulton County Schools.

City of Cedartown

The City of Cedartown installed pour-in place surfacing using 6 tons of tire-derived products, creating an ADA-accessible playground.















Scrap Tire Abatement Reimbursement Grant

The STAR Grant funds the removal, transportation, and processing of scrap tires cleaned up from right-of-way cleanups, scrap tire collection events, and illegal scrap tire site abatement projects.

Unlike the RWD and Tire Grants, the STAR Grant is noncompetitive and accepts applications all year round. Eligible applicants may receive up to the maximum cap of funding per state FY. The cap is currently set at \$75,000. EPD periodically reevaluates the cap and adjusts for inflation.

Metrics – As of April 15, 2025

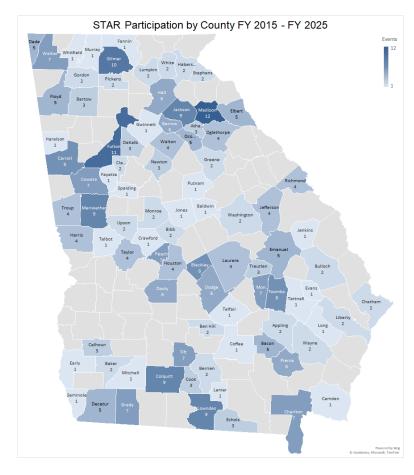
Reimbursements to local governments participating in the STAR Grant have more than doubled since FY 2021.

- FY 2021 \$325,582 in reimbursements & 1,740 tons of scrap tires recycled
- FY 2022 \$650,926 in reimbursements & 2,562 tons of scrap tires recycled
- FY 2023 \$676,933 in reimbursements & 2,291 tons of scrap tires recycled
- FY 2024 \$730,404 in reimbursements & 2,496 tons of scrap tires recycled

EPD estimates reimbursing \$1.5 million to recycle 5,900 tons of scrap passenger tires based on applications processed for FY 2025.

Another way EPD supports local governments with scrap tire abatement is through statewide abatement contracts. EPD procures contracts to clean up illegal scrap tire sites throughout the state. This saves entities from having to expend time, money, and other resources to clean up these sites in their communities. Between FY 2021 and FY 2025, EPD has abated and recycled 185,876 passenger tires at 53 sites throughout the state, saving entities \$829,979.

Since its start in FY 2015, the STAR Grant has awarded \$4.3 million to entities for a total of 363 projects, resulting in the removal and recycling of 1,583,850 passenger tires statewide.

Grady County

Grady County held a scrap tire collection event in January 2025. This event was Grady County's ninth time participating in the STAR Grant, and they removed and recycled 195 tons of passenger tires.



City of Savannah

The City of Savannah conducted a rightof-way clean-up project throughout FY 2024 which removed and recycled 297 tons of passenger tires from along the city's roads.



Carroll County

Carroll County held a scrap tire collection event in November 2024. This event was Carroll County's tenth time participating in the STAR Grant. They removed and recycled 23 tons of passenger tires.



Georgia EPD's Tire Products Grant



The Tire Products (Tire) Grant furthers the goals for the SWTF by providing financial support to projects in Georgia to reduce solid waste, support manufacturing and market development for scrap tires, and encourage innovation.

There are two project tracks eligible for Tire Grant funding. Applicants must choose the project track and may not apply for more than one in the same grant cycle.

Tire-derived Products

Eligible projects utilize tire-derived products (TDP) in place of virgin materials. Awarded grant funds pay for direct costs related to the incorporation of TDP and associated services into projects. TDP may be used in projects including, but not limited to:

- Paving
- Poured playgrounds or trails
- Mats, pavers, and tiles
- Courts for schools or parks
- Traffic related products

Research of New and/or Innovative Uses for Scrap Tires

Eligible projects include those that identify innovative uses and/or conduct research, tests, or develop beneficial uses or products derived from scrap tires.

Eligibility

Local government entities, including counties, municipalities, or any combination of the same, public authorities, agencies, commissions, or institutions are eligible to apply and receive funding.

Tire Products Grant Portal

The State of Georgia has negotiaed the Opioid Settlements with the Third Wave Secondary Manufacturers named, and in order to participate in the settlements, Hall County must sign a Memorandum of Understanding and Combined Subdivision Participation and Release Form.

Facts and Issues:

Proposed nationwide settlement agreements ("Opioid Settlements") have been reached that would resolve opioid litigation brought by the states, local political subdivisions, and special districts against eight opioid manufacturers, Alvogen, Amneal, Apotex, Hikma, Indivior, Mylan, Sun, and Zydus (the "Manufacturers"). The Opioid Settlements require the settling Manufacturers to pay hundreds of millions of dollars to abate the opioid epidemic. The Opiod Settlements will provide a maximum of approximately \$720 million in cash to participating states and subdivisions to remediate and abate the impacts of the opioid crisis. The Opioid Settlements will provide funds to Hall County, as a participating entity, to assist with the County's response to the opioid crisis.

Options:

The County must make an election to participate in the Opioid Settlements. An election to participate in the settlements will allow the County to receive its portion of settlement funds from the manufacturers.

The governmental entity identified above ("Governmental Entity"), in order to obtain and in consideration for the benefits provided to the Governmental Entity pursuant to each of the settlements which are listed in paragraph 1 below (each a "Secondary Manufacturer's Settlement" and collectively, "the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements"), and acting through the undersigned authorized official, hereby elects to participate in each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements, release all Released Claims against all Released Entities in each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements, and agrees as follows.

- 1. The Participating Entity hereby elects to participate in each of the following Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements as a Participating Entity:
 - a. Settlement Agreement for Alvogen, Inc. dated April 4, 2025.
 - b. Settlement Agreement for Apotex Corp. dated April 4, 2025.
 - c. Settlement Agreement for Amneal Pharmaceuticals LLC dated April 4, 2025.
 - d. Settlement Agreement for Hikma Pharmaceuticals USA Inc. dated April 4, 2025.
 - e. Settlement Agreement for Indivior Inc. dated April 4, 2025.
 - f. Settlement Agreement for Viatris Inc. ("Mylan") dated April 4, 2025.
 - g. Settlement Agreement for Sun Pharmaceutical Industries, Inc. dated April 4, 2025.
 - h. Settlement Agreement for Zydus Pharmaceuticals (USA) Inc. dated April 4, 2025.
- 2. The Governmental Entity is aware of and has reviewed each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements, understands that all capitalized terms not defined in this Combined Participation Form have the meanings defined in each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements, and agrees that by executing this Combined Participation Form, the Governmental Entity elects to participate in each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements and become a Participating Subdivision as provided in each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements.
- 3. The Governmental Entity shall promptly, and in any event no later than 14 days after the Reference Date and prior to the filing of the Consent Judgment, dismiss with prejudice any Released Claims that it has filed against any Released Entity in each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements. With respect to any Released Claims pending in *In re National Prescription Opiate Litigation*, MDL No. 2804, the Governmental Entity

authorizes the Plaintiffs' Executive Committee to execute and file on behalf of the Governmental Entity a Stipulation of Dismissal with Prejudice for each of the manufacturers listed in paragraph 1 above substantially in the form found at https://nationalopioidsettlement.com/additional-settlements/.

- 4. The Governmental Entity agrees to the terms of each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements pertaining to Participating Subdivisions as defined therein.
- 5. By agreeing to the terms of each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements and becoming a Releasor, the Governmental Entity is entitled to the benefits provided therein, including, if applicable, monetary payments beginning after the Effective Date.
- 6. The Governmental Entity agrees to use any monies it receives through each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements solely for the purposes provided therein.
- 7. The Governmental Entity submits to the jurisdiction of the court and agrees to follow the process for resolving any disputes related to each Secondary Manufacturer's Settlement as described in each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements.¹
- 8. The Governmental Entity has the right to enforce each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements as provided therein.
- 9. The Governmental Entity, as a Participating Subdivision, hereby becomes a Releasor for all purposes in each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements, including without limitation all provisions related to release of any claims,² and along with all departments, agencies, divisions, boards, commissions, districts, instrumentalities of any kind and attorneys, and any person in his or her official capacity whether elected or appointed to serve any of the foregoing and any agency, person, or other entity claiming by or through any of the foregoing, and any other entity identified in the definition of Releasor, provides for a release to the fullest extent of its authority. As a Releasor, the Governmental Entity hereby absolutely, unconditionally, and irrevocably covenants not to bring, file, or claim, or to cause, assist or permit to be brought, filed, or claimed, or to otherwise seek to establish liability for any Released Claims against any Released Entity in each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements in any forum whatsoever. The releases provided for in each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements are intended by the Parties to be broad and shall be interpreted so as to give the Released Entities in each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements the broadest possible bar against any liability relating in any

way to Released Claims and extend to the full extent of the power of the Governmental Entity to release claims. Each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements shall be a complete bar to any Released Claim against that manufacturer's Released Entities.

- 10. The Governmental Entity hereby takes on all rights and obligations of a Participating Subdivision as set forth in each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements.
- 11. In connection with the releases provided for in each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements, each Governmental Entity expressly waives, releases, and forever discharges any and all provisions, rights, and benefits conferred by any law of any state or territory of the United States or other jurisdiction, or principle of common law, which is similar, comparable, or equivalent to § 1542 of the California Civil Code, which reads:

General Release; extent. A general release does not extend to claims that the creditor or releasing party does not know or suspect to exist in his or her favor at the time of executing the release that, if known by him or her would have materially affected his or her settlement with the debtor or released party.

A Releasor may hereafter discover facts other than or different from those which it knows, believes, or assumes to be true with respect to the Released Claims in each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements, but each Governmental Entity hereby expressly waives and fully, finally, and forever settles, releases and discharges, upon the Effective Date, any and all Released Claims that may exist as of such date but which Releasors do not know or suspect to exist, whether through ignorance, oversight, error, negligence or through no fault whatsoever, and which, if known, would materially affect the Governmental Entities' decision to participate in each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements.

- 12. The Governmental Entity understands and acknowledges that each of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements is an independent agreement with its own terms and conditions. Nothing herein is intended to modify in any way the terms of any of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements, to which Governmental Entity hereby agrees, aside from the exceptions in paragraph 13 below. To the extent this Combined Participation Form is interpreted differently from any of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements in any respect, the individual Secondary Manufacturer's Settlement controls.
- 13. For the avoidance of doubt, in the event that some but not all of the Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements proceed past their respective Reference Dates, all releases and other commitments or obligations shall become void *only as to* those Secondary Manufacturers' Settlements that fail to proceed past their Reference Dates. All releases and other commitments or obligations (including those contained in this Combined Participation Form) shall remain in full effect as to each Secondary Manufacturer's Settlement that proceeds past its Reference Date, and this Combined Participation Form need not be modified, returned, or destroyed as long as any Secondary Manufacturer's Settlement proceeds past its Reference Date.

State of Georgia and Local Governments: Memorandum of Understanding Concerning National Settlements with Alvogen, Inc., Amneal Pharmaceuticals LLC, Apotex Corp., Hikma Pharmaceuticals USA Inc., Indivior Inc., Viatris Inc., Sun Pharmaceutical Industries, Inc., and Zydus Pharmaceuticals (USA) Inc.

Foreword

This Memorandum of Understanding between the State of Georgia *ex rel*. Chris Carr, Attorney General (the "State"), and certain Georgia Local Government entities ("LGs") concerns the harms visited upon Georgia's citizens and the State itself by certain manufacturers, distributors, and pharmacies ("Opioid Defendants") of prescription opioids.

To address these harms, the State and certain LGs separately initiated litigation meant to hold Opioid Defendants accountable.

On December 31, 2021, the State entered into settlements with Opioid Defendants McKesson Corporation, AmerisourceBergen Corporation, Cardinal Health, Inc., Johnson & Johnson, Janssen Pharmaceuticals, Inc., Ortho-McNeil-Janssen Pharmaceuticals, Inc., and Janssen Pharmaceutica, Inc. (together, the "National Distributor and J&J Settlements"). The State has since entered into settlements with Teva Pharmaceutical Industries Ltd., Allergan Finance, LLC, Walmart Inc., CVS Health Corporation and CVS Pharmacy, Inc., Walgreen Co., and The Kroger Co.

Thereafter, the State and participating LGs entered into a Memorandum of Understanding to memorialize an agreement that would enable them to maximize the monetary help received from the National Distributor and J&J Settlements to address harms visited upon Georgia's citizens and the State itself in the opioid crisis (the "2022 MOU"). The State and participating LGs also entered into MOUs regarding the settlements with Teva Pharmaceutical Industries Ltd., Allergan Finance, LLC, Walmart Inc., CVS Health Corporation and CVS Pharmacy, Inc., Walgreen Co., and The Kroger Co.

On or about April 4, 2025. eight drug manufacturers, including Alvogen, Inc., Amneal Pharmaceuticals LLC, Apotex Corp., Hikma Pharmaceuticals USA Inc., Indivior Inc., Viatris Inc., Sun Pharmaceutical Industries, Inc., and Zydus Pharmaceuticals (USA) Inc. (together, "Third Wave Manufacturers") entered into

Settlement Agreements with certain Settling States, governmental subdivisions, and other entites ("Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements"). The State of Georgia and LGs are eligible to join the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements.

During May 2025, the State opted into the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements. The LGs have until October 8, 2025, to opt in to the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements.

This Memorandum of Understanding ("Third Wave Memorandum" or "Third Wave MOU") aims to memorialize an agreement between the State and certain LGs that will enable them to maximize the monetary funds received from the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements to remediate the harms caused by the opioid crisis. The processes outlined in this Memorandum in large part replicate processes required under the 2022 MOU. Except where the terms are different, the processes used in administration of the 2022 MOU shall be utilized for administration as required under this Memorandum.

I. Definitions

Capitalized terms shall have the same definitions as in the 2022 MOU with the exception of:

- a. "Legislative Bar" means O.C.G.A. § 10-13B-1 et seq.
- b. "Local Government Opioid Funds" means the funds allocated to local governments pursuant to Section II of this Memorandum.
- c. "Opioid Funds" means the total monetary amounts obtained through the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements as defined in this Third Wave MOU which are allocated to Georgia and its Participating Local Governments under the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements.
- d. Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements means the settlement agreements dated April 4, 2025, for each of the Third Wave Manufacturers and available at https://nationalopioidsettlement.com/additional-settlements/.
- e. "Parties" shall mean the State and the Participating Local Governments.

- f. "Participating Local Governments" shall mean:
 - (i.) all litigating subdivisions listed on Exhibits "C" of the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements, and
 - (ii.) nonlitigating subdivisions listed on Exhibits "G" of the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlementsthat choose to sign on to the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements and this Memorandum.
- g. "Released Entities" means the entities defined as such in the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements.
- h. "State Opioid Funds" means the funds allocated to the State pursuant to Section II of this Memorandum.
- i. "Trust" means the Georgia Opioid Crisis Abatement Trust, approved by the Gwinnett County Superior Court on February 16, 2023.
- j. "Trustee" means the Trustee of the Georgia Opioid Crisis Abatement Trust.

II. Allocation between State and Local Governments

- a. The Participating Local Governments shall collectively receive 25% of the Opioid Funds as their full allocation of Local Government Opioid Funds for all claims past and future of the Participating Local Governments. Local Government Opioid Funds shall be paid to a Settlement Fund Administrator as defined in the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements and distributed pursuant to the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements, with the following additional conditions:
 - (i) If a county which is a Participating Local Government under this Memorandum has a sheriff who is a Subdivision listed in the Opioid Settlement, at least 9.45% of the Opioid Funds paid to that county under the terms of the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements in which the sheriff agreed to participate shall be allocated to that county's sheriff to be used for Approved Purposes;

- (ii.) If a county which is a Participating Local Government under this Memorandum has a hospital which is a Subdivision listed in the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements, at least 2% of the Opioid Funds paid to that county under the terms of the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements in which the hospital agreed to participate shall be allocated to the hospital to be used for Approved Purposes; and
- (iii.) If a county which is a Participating Local Government under this Memorandum has a school district which is a Subdivision listed in the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements, at least 1% of the Opioid Funds paid to that county under the terms of the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements in which the school district agreed to participate shall be allocated to the school district to be used for Approved Purposes.
- b. The State shall receive 75% of the Opioid Funds as its full allocation of State Opioid Funds.
- c. Of the State's 75% share, after the payment of litigation fees and costs owed to the State's outside counsel pursuant to the agreement entered into on September 10, 2018, or as may be amended, 60% of the remaining funds shall be transferred by the receiving state agency through the Office of Planning and Budget to the State Treasury and spent at the direction of the State Legislature for Approved Purposes by appropriation and in compliance with the terms of the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements and this Memorandum. The remaining 40% after payment of fees and costs shall be transferred to the Trust by the receiving state agency and shall be expended by the Trustee on a regional basis ("Regional Distribution") as set forth in the Declaration of Trust, the 2022 MOU, and this Third Wave MOU.
 - (i.) For purposes of the Regional Distribution under the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements, the Regions shall be the same as established pursuant to the 2022 MOU, including Qualifying Block Grantees.

- (ii.) Each Qualifying Block Grantee shall receive its allocation of the Regional Distribution via a direct block grant so long as it certifies that it has sufficient infrastructure to provide opioid abatement services.
- (iii.) The Trustee shall use the same allocation model as used under the 2022 MOU for the Regional Distribution.
- (iv.) The Regional Advisory Councils established pursuant to the 2022 MOU shall have the same duties and responsibilities in connection with the funds allocated to the Trust pursuant to this Third Wave MOU as under the 2022 MOU, including reporting requirements and making themselves available to consult with the Government Participation Mechanism and with Participating Local Governments to best determine how funds will be spent for opioid remediation within the established Regions. In every instance the Trustee shall retain final authority over Regional Distributions.

III. Funds to be used for Approved Purposes; Clawback and Recoupment

- a. With the exception of administrative expenses as allowed under the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements, funds set aside for attorneys' fees and costs for State of Georgia outside counsel, and funds set aside for attorneys' fees for Local Government outside counsel pursuant to Section VI of this Memorandum, State Opioid Funds and Local Government Opioid Funds shall be used for Approved Purposes.
- b. Funds are to primarily (no less than 70 percent) be used for future abatement purposes. Funds used to reimburse the Parties for past abatement expenses may not be used to reimburse past Medicaid expenses or any other expense that would be subject to a federal clawback, recoupment, or similar mechanism.
- c. The State and Participating Local Governments shall work cooperatively to ensure the funds are spent within the spirit of this Memorandum and the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements, and shall further work cooperatively to actively defend the funds from federal clawback and/or recoupment, including, but not limited to, actively

participating in any administrative procedure or other case or process related to defense of the funds from federal clawback and/or recoupment. In the event the federal government initiates and successfully claws back any Opioid Funds related to the Settlement, such amounts shall first be deducted from the total disbursements to be made to both the State and Local Governments in the calendar year the clawback claim is successfully made and shall thereafter be deducted from the total disbursements to be made in any subsequent calendar year if necessary. After such deduction, the allocation between the State and Participating Local Governments described in Section II of this Memorandum shall be applied to the remaining funds for the current calendar year or any subsequent calendar year if applicable. Deduction of amounts from the total disbursements shall include reimbursement of any amounts paid by the State or withheld from amounts due to the State as the result of a clawback and/or recoupment.

IV. Compliance and Reporting

- a. The Trustee shall provide an up-to-date accounting of payments into or out of the Trust and/or its subaccounts upon written request of the State or a Participating Local Government. The State, together with the Trustee, shall provide an annual report detailing: (1) the amounts received by the State and deposited into the State Treasury and the amounts remitted to the Trust; (2) the allocation of any awards approved, listing the recipient, amount awarded, programs funded, and disbursement terms; and (3) the amounts actually disbursed. The State and Trustee shall also include an assessment of how well resources have been used by the State and the Participating Local Governments to abate opioid addiction, overdose deaths, and the other consequences of the opioid crisis. The State shall publish its annual report and all Regional Advisory Council annual reports on its website.
- b. Expenses of the Trustee shall be deducted first from interest earned on funds held by the Georgia Opioid Crisis Abatement Trust, and then, if necessary, may be deducted from the corpus of Trust funds. Administrative expenses of the State shall be paid from or reimbursed out of State Opioid Funds as allowed under the terms of the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements.

- c. The Trustee and the State shall endeavor to keep such expenses reasonable in order to maximize the funding available for opioid abatement.
- d. Each Regional Advisory Council shall provide a report annually to the Trustee and Government Participation Mechanism detailing: (1) the amount received by each local government within the Region; (2) the allocation of any awards approved, listing the recipient, amount awarded, programs funded, and disbursement terms; and (3) the amounts actually disbursed and approved allocations. Each Participating Local Government within each Region shall provide any information necessary to facilitate such reporting to a single regional delegate selected by the Region to provide its annual report.
- e. If the State believes that any Participating Local Government has used funds for a non-approved purpose, it may request in writing the documentation underlying such alleged improper use of funds. If any ten (10) Participating Local Governments believe the State has used funds for a non-approved purpose, they may request jointly in writing the documentation underlying such alleged improper use of funds.
- f. The State and Participating Local Governments may object in writing to the Trustee to an allocation or expenditure on the basis that the allocation or Trust expenditure is inconsistent with Section III of this Memorandum or violates Section IV.c of this Memorandum regarding reasonable expenses of the Trustee.
- g. Any party to this Memorandum who receives a written request sent pursuant to IV.f or IV.e shall have 21 days to respond to such request, which may be extended by mutual consent.
- h. A party who makes a written request pursuant to IV.f may file an action in the Superior Court of Gwinnett County within one year of its objection seeking a determination as to the validity of the objection.
- i. If, after a written objection made pursuant to IV.e, it appears to the State that a Participating Local Government has spent funds on non-approved

purposes, the State may seek and obtain an injunction in the Superior Court of Gwinnett County prohibiting the Participating Local Government from spending further funds on non-approved purposes, and ordering the return of monies spent on non-approved purposes. So long as any such action is pending, distribution of any funds to the relevant Participating Local Government shall be suspended and held in trust by the Trustee or national Settlement Fund Administrator and shall only resume after the action is resolved. Once the action is resolved, suspended payments to the Participating Local Government shall resume, less any amounts ordered returned that have not yet been returned as of the date of the resumption of suspended payments.

j. Attorney's fees and costs are not recoverable in actions brought under this Section.

V. Litigation Bar

a. All Parties expressly acknowledge that this Third Wave MOU qualifies under O.C.G.A. § 10-13B-2(a)(4)(E) and that the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements are state-wide opioid settlements as that term is defined in O.C.G.A. § 10-13B-2(4).

VI. Attorney's Fees; Costs and Expenses

a. Section VII of the 2022 MOU is incorporated by reference as though fully set forth herein.

VII. Future Agreements and Negotiations

a. Nothing in this Memorandum shall bind the Parties concerning any future opioid settlements other than the ones expressly contemplated in (1) this Memorandum or (2) any amendments to this Memorandum made pursuant to Section VIII.b. Other than those Released Entities who are parties to the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements, the Parties are free to engage in settlement negotiations with any Opioid Defendants without prior consent or participation of any other party to this Memorandum.

The Parties shall endeavor, insofar as is reasonably practicable, to keep b. each other apprised of future negotiations concerning future opioid settlements. Nothing in this provision shall require the parties to violate any duty, obligation, or promise of confidentiality, non-disclosure agreement, common interest agreement, court order concerning nonnon-disclosure obligation disclosure, or similar negotiations regarding future opioid settlements. For the avoidance of doubt, LGs shall not be required to disclose, among other things, any information relating to negotiations between groups of local governments and Opioid Defendants, and the State shall not be required to disclose, among other things, any information relating to negotiations between states or groups of states and Opioid Defendants.

VIII. Miscellaneous

- a. This Memorandum shall be governed by Georgia law.
- b. The Parties may make amendments to this Memorandum as necessary. Amendments shall be in writing and shall require the consent of all Parties to this Memorandum. Proposed amendments shall be circulated to all Parties through designated contacts provided in their Acknowledgement, after which Parties shall have 30 days to agree or object to the proposed amendment. Parties who do not respond shall be deemed to have consented to the amendment for purposes of this Section VIII.b.
- c. Jurisdiction and venue regarding any disputes between or among the Parties concerning this Memorandum or the interpretation thereof shall lie in the Superior Court of Gwinnett County, Georgia.
- d. This Memorandum terminates automatically with respect to the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements in the event such settlements are terminated by the parties to it.
- e. By entering into this Memorandum, a local government agrees to participate in the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements.

f. If less than 65% of the litigating LGs participate in the Third Wave Manufacturer Settlements, this Memorandum is voidable by the State.

ARTICLE #101 - INTRODUCTION

This Contract for Fire Station #8 Bay Door Replacement (hereinafter
"Services") is made and as entered into as of

WHEREAS, Contractor is an entity that is legally registered and qualified and holding any such licenses and certifications as may be required to render Services to do business in the State of Georgia. County and Contractor are known individually as a "Party" and collectively as the "Parties", and,

WHEREAS, nothing contained in this Contract shall be construed to convert the Contractor or any of its employees, agents, into a partner, employee, or agent of the County, nor shall either Party to this Contract have any authority to bind the other in any respect, and.

WHEREAS, Contractor represents that it complies with the State of Georgia requirements for corporations and has signified a willingness to provide Services to the County and the County has relied on such representation, and,

WHEREAS, the Parties mutually desire to enter into this Contract to document the provision of Services by the Contractor to the County in exchange for payment as compensation; and,

WHEREAS, this contract will become legally binding upon signature and execution by both Parties; and,

WHEREAS, any documents, exhibits, attachments, plans, or references are all incorporated herein by reference, and,

NOW THEREFORE, and in consideration of the mutual promises, terms, conditions, covenants, and agreements made as expressed and contained herein, or attached, incorporated, and made a

part hereof, and other good and valuable consideration expressed by a valid offer and acceptance, the receipt and sufficiency of which the Parties hereby acknowledge, the Parties hereto agree as follows:

ARTICLE #102 - CONTRACT

ARTICLE #104 - NON-EXCLUSIVE RIGHTS

The Contract is not exclusive. The County reserves the right to select other Contractors to provide the Services similar to those described in this Contract during the term of the Contract should the need arise, or the Contractor fail to perform.

ARTICLE #105 - CONTRACT TERM

The term will be for five (5) years, with one (1) initial year followed by four (4) one-year renewal options. Renewals are not automatic nor guaranteed.

ARTICLE #106 - CONTRACT AMENDMENTS AND MODIFICATION

This Contract may only be modified, amended, or changed in writing and fully executed by both Parties hereto. This Contract constitutes the sole and entire Contract and understanding between the Parties as to the subject matter hereof, and no verbal promises have been made by either Party in relation hereto.

ARTICLE #107 - REMEDIES AND CONTRACT PERFORMANCE

In the event that either Party to this Contract breaches this Contract, including failure to meet the timetables set forth herein, the non-breaching Party shall provide a written Notice-to-Cure to the breaching Party which describes the breach of this Contract. The breaching Party shall have thirty (30) days from the date of receipt of the written Notice-to-Cure the breach or to otherwise negotiate a resolution of the breach.

If the breach has not been cured and the Parties hereto have not resolved the issue described in the Notice-to-Cure by thirty (30) days after receipt of the letter, the Party authoring the letter shall be entitled to seek any and all remedies allowed by Georgia law, including damages, equitable relief, declaratory relief, specific performance, and/or relief as to any bonds issued hereon. Additional provisions are:

A. Delay or Impossibility of Performance. Any failure or delay must be beyond the reasonable control of and without the fault or negligence of the Contractor. If the Services to be provided to the County are interrupted by a force majeure event, as defined below, the County will be entitled to an equitable adjustment to the fees and other payments due to the Contractor under this Contract. If delay results from a third-party's negligent conduct or failure to perform, the Contractor shall not be excused from compliance with the terms and obligations of the Contract.

Neither Party shall be held liable or responsible to the other Party nor be deemed to have defaulted under or breached this Contract for failure or delay in fulfilling or performing any obligation under this Contract when such failure or delay is caused by or results from causes beyond the reasonable control of the affected Party including, but not limited to, fire, floods, embargoes, acts of war, civil unrest, insurrections, riots, strikes, lockouts or other labor disturbances, or acts of God; provided, however, that the Party so affected shall use reasonable commercial efforts to avoid or remove such causes of nonperformance, and shall continue performance hereunder with reasonable dispatch whenever such causes are removed. Either Party shall provide the other Party with prompt written notice of any delay or failure to perform that occurs by reason of force majeure.

Definition: The term "force majeure" as defined in Black's Law Dictionary is "an event or effect that can be neither anticipated nor controlled. It is a contractual provision allocating the risk of loss if performance becomes impossible or impracticable, especially as a result of an event that the Parties could not have anticipated or controlled."

- B. Obligations Beyond Contract Term! The Contract shall remain in full force and effect to the end of the specified term or until terminated or canceled pursuant to ARTICLE #108 TERMINATION PROVISIONS.
- C. Transition Cooperation with the County and Cooperation with Other Contractors. Contractor agrees that upon termination of this Contract for any reason, it shall provide sufficient efforts and reasonable cooperation and assistance to the County to ensure an orderly and efficient transition to the County or an alternative Contractor. Further, if the County has entered into or enters into contracts with other Contractors related to the Services, Contractor agrees to cooperate fully with other such Contractors. Contractor shall not engage in any act that will interfere with the performance of work by any other Contractor(s).

ARTICLE #108 - TERMINATION PROVISIONS

The County may terminate this Contract by providing sixty (60) days written notice to the Contractor at any time. Should the County terminate this Contract prior to the date of automatic termination, Contractor shall provide the County with all deliverables up to the date of termination thirty (30) days after the Notice to Terminate is issued. The County shall pay the Contractor for all work properly performed in compliance with the terms of this Contract up to the date of termination.

- A. Termination for Convenience. Following thirty (30) days' written notice, the County may terminate the Contract in whole or in part for any reason without the payment of any penalty or incurring any further obligation to the Contractor.
- B. **Termination for Cause**. The occurrence of any of the following events shall constitute cause for the County to declare the Contractor in default of its obligations under the Contract:
 - The Contractor fails to deliver or has delivered nonconforming Services or fails to perform, to the County's satisfaction, any material requirement of the Contract or is in violation of a material provision of the Contract including, but without limitation, the expressed warranties made by the Contractor.
 - 2. The County determines that Contractor's unsatisfactory performance substantially endangers completion or that default is likely to occur.
 - 3. The Contractor fails to make substantial and timely progress toward performance of the Contract.
 - 4. The Contractor becomes subject to any Bankruptcy or insolvency proceeding under federal or state law to the extent allowed by applicable federal or state law including Bankruptcy laws; the Contractor terminates or suspends its business; or the County reasonably believes that the Contractor has become insolvent or unable to pay its obligations as they accrue consistent with applicable federal or state law.
 - 5. The Contractor has failed to comply with applicable federal, state, and local laws, rules, County ordinances, regulations, and orders when performing within the scope of the Contract.
 - 6. The Contractor has engaged in conduct that has or may expose the County or the State to liability, as determined in the County's sole discretion; or a material breach of the terms of the Contract by County upon County's failure to cure such material breach after written notice thereof has been delivered in accordance

- with ARTICLE #108.C below constitutes cause for the Contractor to declare that the County is in default of its obligations under the Contract.
- C. Notice of Default. If either Party causes any of the default events set out in ARTICLE #108 TERMINATION PROVISIONS, then either Party shall issue a written Notice of Default to the Party that causes one (1) or more of the default events requesting that the breach or noncompliance be remedied within the period of time specified in the Notice of Default. If the breach or noncompliance is not remedied within the period of time specified in the written notice, the non-breaching Party may:
 - Immediately terminate the Contract for default without additional written notice; and/or,
 - in the event of a breach by the Contractor, the County may procure substitute Services from another source and charge the difference between the Contract and the substitute Contract to the defaulting Contractor; and/or,
 - 3. Enforce the terms and conditions of the Contract and seek any legal or equitable remedies.
- D. **Termination Due to Non-Availability of Funds.** This Contract will terminate immediately and absolutely if the County determines that adequate funds are deappropriated such that the County cannot fulfill its obligations under the Contract, such determination being at the County's sole discretion and conclusive. County agrees to provide prompt written notice to Contractor in the event of any deappropriation.
- E. Termination due to Failure of Contractor to Act. The County may terminate the Contract for any of the following reasons effective immediately without advance notice:
 - If the Contractor must be certified or licensed as a condition precedent to providing the Services, the revocation, suspension, or other loss of such license or certification may result in immediate termination of the Contract effective as of the date on which the license or certification is no longer in effect.
 - The County determines that the actions, or failure to act, of the Contractor, its agents, employees, have caused, or reasonably could cause, life, health, or safety to be jeopardized.
 - 3. The Contractor furnished any statement, representation, or certification in connection with the Contract or the bidding process, which is materially false, deceptive, criminal, or maliciously incorrect.
- F. Payment Limitation in Event of Termination. In the event of termination of the Contract for any reason by County, the County shall pay only those amounts, if any, due and owing to the Contractor for Services actually received and accepted by the County up to and including the date of termination of the Contract and for which the County is obligated to pay pursuant to the Contract.
- G. Contractor's Termination Duties. Upon receipt of a Notice of Termination, the Contractor shall:
 - Cease work under the Contract and take all necessary or appropriate steps to limit disbursements and minimize costs and furnish a report within thirty (30) days of the date of Notice of Termination describing the status of all work under the Contract including, without limitation, results accomplished, conclusions resulting therefrom, and any other matters the County may require.

- 2. Immediately cease use and return to the County any personal property or materials, whether tangible or intangible, provided by the County to the Contractor.
- 3. Comply with the County's instructions for the timely transfer of any active files and work produced by the Contractor under the Contract.
- 4. Cooperate in good faith with the County, its employees, agents, and Contractors during the transition period between the Notification of Termination and the substitution of any replacement Contractor.
- 5. Contractor is to immediately return any payments made by the County for goods and services that were not delivered by the Contractor.

ARTICLE #109 - NO DEFENSE OR INDEMNIFICATION BY COUNTY

The Parties agree that the County shall not be responsible for defending or indemnifying any Contractor from any claim brought by any third party against the Contractor.

ARTICLE #110 - ASSIGNMENT AND DELEGATION BY CONTRACTOR

The Contractor shall not assign or delegate this Contract, or any performance required by it, in whole or in part, without the prior expressed written consent of the County.

ARTICLE #111 - USE OF THIRD PARTIES

This Contract is for the benefit of the Parties hereto only and is not intended to benefit any third party or give rise to any duty or causes of action for any third party. All restrictions, obligations, and responsibilities of the Contractor under the Contract shall also apply to third parties, if allowed in writing by the County. Any Contract with a third-party must also preserve the rights of the County.

ARTICLE #112 - ENTIRE CONTRACT

This Contract, as executed and approved, shall constitute the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all other prior and contemporaneous statements, agreements, and understandings between the Parties. No written or oral statements, agreements, or understandings that are not set out, referenced, or specifically incorporated in this Contract shall in any way be binding or of effect between the Parties.

ARTICLE #113 - SEVERABILITY

If any paragraph, sub-paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Contract is declared invalid or unconstitutional by any Court of competent jurisdiction or if the provisions of any part of this Contract as applied to any particular situation or set of circumstances shall be declared invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity shall not be construed to affect the remaining portions of this Contract not so held to be invalid or the application of this Contract to other circumstances not so held to be invalid.

ARTICLE #114 - RECORDS

A. Public Records Request. The Georgia Open Records Act, as provided in O.C.G.A. § 50-18-70 et seq. requires procurement records and all other records received by or prepared or maintained on behalf of the County shall be made open to public inspection unless otherwise provided by law.

B. Record Retention and Access. The Contractor shall maintain books, records, and documents in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and procedures and which sufficiently and properly document and calculate all charges billed to the County throughout the term of the Contract for a period of at least five (5) years following the date of final payment or completion of any required audit, whichever is later. Records to be maintained include both financial records and service records.

ARTICLE #115 - ADDITIONAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

The County shall not be bound by any terms and conditions included in any Contractor's sales-orders, literature, packaging, invoice, catalog, brochure, technical data sheet, online representation, warranties or service level agreement, or other document which attempts to impose any condition in variance with or in addition to the terms and conditions contained herein.

ARTICLE #116 - WAIVER

The failure of any Party hereto to seek a remedy for any alleged breach of this Contract shall not constitute a waiver of any claim, cause of action, or remedy allowed by Georgia law for breach thereof.

ARTICLE #117 - CONTRACTOR AND COUNTY RIGHTS AND OBLIGATIONS

- A. The County has the right at any time to require the Contractor to put an immediate stop to any procedure, or the use of any equipment, chemical, material, personnel, etc. considered by the County to be hazardous or toxic to persons, buildings, or surfaces. The Contractor will utilize acceptable substitutes approved by the County as quickly as possible. In the event of such replacement, Contractor shall (i) notify County of any resulting replacement, (ii) introduce the individual serving as the replacement to County, and/or (iii) provide County with a résumé and any other information regarding the individual that may be reasonably requested by County.
- B. The County has the right to require the Contractor to reassign or remove any employee from the premises temporarily or permanently when, in the County's sole opinion, the employee is not suitable. The County's decision shall be final, and Contractor will remove the employee immediately and replace with a person of at least equivalent training, experience, and requisite qualifications as quickly as possible, subject to the County's approval.
- C. Contractor agrees to obtain prior written approval from the County for the use of sub-contractor(s) to provide the Services described in Scope of Work prior to subcontractor(s) performance of work. Such non-disclosure of sub-contractors may result in non-payment for Services.

ARTICLE #118 - INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

The Contractor must procure and maintain insurance policies at the Contractor's own expense and must furnish the County with a certificate of insurance (COI) providing evidence of proof of coverage at least in the amounts indicated in this subsection. The COI must list "Hall County, Georgia" as the certificate holder and as an additional insured under the commercial general, automobile, and umbrella liability policies as follows: "County of Hall, its Board of Commissioners, officers, employees, servants, and agents, 2875 Browns Bridge Rd, Gainesville, GA, 30504". The policy must protect the Contractor

and the County (as an additional insured) from any claims for bodily injury, property damage, or personal injury covered by the indemnification obligations set forth herein throughout the duration of the Contract. The Contractor must maintain the following insurance coverage during the term of the Contract, in at least the minimum amounts set forth below, to cover all loss and liability for damages or destruction of property caused by or arising from any and all services carried on and any and all work performed by the Contractor pursuant to this Contract:

Workers Compensation Insurance: Required for all contracts.

This provision applies regardless of whether or not Hall County BOC has received a waiver of subrogation from the insurer.

ARTICLE #122 - COUNTY PAYMENT TO CONTRACTOR

A. Upon Contract Execution, the County will issue a Notice to Proceed ("NTP") and a Purchase Order ("PO") to the Contractor. The terms of this Contract shall be incorporated by reference into any PO(s) issued prior to the expiration or termination

of this Contract. The County will issue the NTP and PO(s) by electronic mail (e-mail) to the Contractor's representative in ARTICLE #103 – NOTICES.

The Contractor shall not deliver any Services, equipment, devices, or components thereof until authorized in writing by the County. Any work including, but not limited to, travel, preliminary meetings, planning, etc. performed outside of the terms and conditions of and before the issuance of a NTP will not be considered for payment. Contractors are not to begin work or ship any product on any verbal communication from the County. The County will not be liable for payment for any work or product with the issuance of a verbal communication.

The Scope of Services shall remain in effect from the NTP date to substantial completion of the project. The Parties agree that the County will not pay or otherwise compensate the Contractor for any Services, materials, equipment, devices, or components thereof outside of the Scope of Work and/or beyond the term of this Contract, unless specifically authorized in writing as evidenced by an amendment pursuant to ARTICLE #106 – CONTRACT AMENDMENTS AND MODIFICATION, a time extension letter, or as otherwise authorized by the County.

B. Invoice/Payment

- Contractor shall invoice the County via email each month sent solely to accountspayable@hallcounty.org and only after the County inspects and accepts the Services provided. Receipt of the Services and/or materials do not constitute acceptance. Invoice amounts shall not exceed the Contractor's pricing set forth in Exhibit C – Mandatory Cost Proposal Worksheet.
- 2. Each properly prepared invoice must be sent in accordance with the instructions listed on the PO. Each invoice shall include the Contractor's current "Remit to" address, a description of the Services provided, the invoice amount, the Contract number, and the associated PO number issued.
- Standard payment terms are net 30 days (N30) in arrears from the date the invoice is accepted. The County does not pay for services not yet received but only in arrears except by written acceptance of pre-payment or deposit.
- 4. The Contractor shall be solely responsible for paying all costs, expenses, and charges it incurs in connection with its performance under the Contract.
- 5. Contractor must submit Applications for Payment (Pay Apps) in accordance with the Conditions of the Contract.
- 6. If monthly progress payments are agreed upon, then County will make such payments upon inspection of services completed by the County's Project Manager. Additionally, the County may employ Engineers of Record.
- 7. Prior to Substantial Completion, progress payments in an amount equal to 95% of the value of the work completed and 95% percent of the value of materials and equipment not incorporated in the Work but delivered and suitably stored, in each case, the aggregate of payments previously made.
- 8. Retainage payments shall be paid by County after final acceptance of work.

C. Unsatisfactory Performance/Delay of Payment

- 1. If the County determines that the quality of the Services provided are deficient, unacceptable, or unsatisfactory the County's Project Manager identified in ARTICLE #103 NOTICES shall issue a written Notice to Cure to Contractor. Contractor agrees that upon receipt of the written Notice to Cure it shall make every effort to correct the deficiency(ies) within the timeframe prescribed therein. If the Contractor fails to timely correct the deficiency(ies), the County reserves the right to delay or deny payment pursuant to this ARTICLE or terminate the Contract pursuant to ARTICLE #108 TERMINATION PROVISIONS.
- 2. Delay of Payment Due to Contractor's Failure. If the County determines that the Contractor has failed to perform or deliver any Services as required by the Contract, the Contractor shall not be entitled to any compensation under the Contract until such Services are delivered and accepted. In this event, the County may withhold that portion of the Contractor's compensation, which represents payment for Services that were not delivered. To the extent that the Contractor's failure to perform or deliver in a timely manner causes the County to incur costs, the County may deduct the amount of such incurred costs as liquidated damages from any amounts payable to Contractor. The County's authority to deduct such incurred costs shall not in any way affect the County's authority to terminate the Contract.
- D. **Set-Off Against Sums Owed by the Contractor.** If the Contractor owes the County any sum under the terms of this Contract, pursuant to any judgment or pursuant to any law, the County may set off the sum owed by the Contractor against any sum owed to the Contractor, in the County's sole discretion.
- E. **Final Payment.** Contractor shall issue an invoice for final payment to the County no later than thirty (30) days following the expiration or termination date of the Contract.
- F. The Contractor must not factor or assign payments to another entity or a financial institution. –The County will only pay the Party with whom it is contracted. The County will not under any circumstances pay a third party.

ARTICLE #123 - PERFORMANCE AND PAYMENT BONDS (if required) Not applicable.

ARTICLE #124 - RETAINAGE (If required)

Not applicable.

ARTICLE #125 - VENUE AND GOVERNING LAW

The Parties agree that this Contract shall be interpreted, construed, and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Georgia. Should either party bring a legal suit to enforce the terms of this Contract, including suit in equity, the Parties agree and consent to file any such suit in the Superior Court of Hall County, Georgia.

ARTICLE #126 - NOTICE OF INTENT TO LITIGATE

Contractor hereby agrees not to file any civil action of disputes or claims relating to the Contract except after first giving thirty (30) days written notice to the County of the claim and the intent to initiate a civil action.

ARTICLE #127 - GEORGIA SECURITY AND IMMIGRATION COMPLIANCE ACT (E-Verify)

- A. By signing this Contract, the Contractor certifies that prior to and throughout the performance of all applicable work under this Contract it will remain in full compliance with all federal and state immigration laws including, but not limited to, 8 U.S.C. § 1324a and the Georgia Security and Immigration Compliance Act (O.C.G.A. §13-10-90 et seq.), as amended by the Illegal Immigration Reform and Enforcement Act of 2011 regarding the verification of employment eligibility of employees under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986. Contractor will ensure that only persons who are citizens or nationals of the United States or non-citizens authorized under federal immigration laws are employed to perform services under this Contract or any subcontract or sub-subcontract hereunder.
- B. Contractor further certifies its compliance with the aforementioned federal and state immigration laws set forth by signing a sworn affidavit, the Georgia Security and Immigration Compliance Act Affidavit (herein known as Exhibit E E-Verify Affidavit), notarized by an Official Notary Public and incorporated herein by reference providing services pursuant to this Contract.

ARTICLE #128 - ORDER OF PRECEDENCE

In the event of any inconsistency, ambiguity, or conflict among the specific provisions of the Contract and the Contractor's response, the order of precedence shall be as follows:

- 1. Any amendments to the Contract, including all exhibits thereto.
- 2. The Contract itself, including all exhibits thereto.
- 3. Attachments appended to the Contract.
- 4. All other Contract attachments appended to the Contract.

ARTICLE #129 - CONTRACT EXHIBITS AND ATTACHMENTS

The Parties mutually acknowledge that all exhibits and attachments listed below made a part of this Contract, as though expressly written in the solicitation documents and the Bidder's response, are herein incorporated into this Contract by reference.

ARTICLE #130 – SALES TAX EXEMPTION STATUS

The County is exempt from State of Georgia Local Sales and Use Tax. The Bidder understands and acknowledges that they are responsible for any sales and use tax they may incur. The Bidder will not charge the County any sales and use tax as a separate line item. The Contractor may request a copy of the County's Georgia Sales and Use Tax Exemption Certificate.

ARTICLE #131 - HOLD HARMLESS AGREEMENT

The successful respondent hereby agrees to indemnify, hold free and harmless Hall County Government, County Commissioners, its agents, servants, employees, officers, directors, elected officials, or any other person(s) against any loss or expense. This includes attorney fees because of any liability imposed by law upon the County, except in cases of the County's sole negligence, sustained by any person(s) on account of bodily injury or property damage arising out of or in the consequence of this Contract.

ARTICLE #132 - NOT A JOINT VENTURE

The County shall not be bound by any terms and conditions included in any Contractor packaging, invoice, catalog, brochure, technical data sheet, on-line representation, warranties or service level agreement, or other document which attempts to impose any condition in variance with or in the addition to the terms and conditions contained herein.

ARTICLE #133 - CONTRACT TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- All purchases must comply with the Official Code of Hall County Sections 3.10.010 3.10.190.
- 2. If any conflict or ambiguity arises between the terms and conditions herein and the Official Code of Hall County, the latter will govern.
- 3. The terms and conditions set forth herein shall supersede and govern over all Contractor's terms and conditions or service level agreements.
- 4. The County retains the right to "red line" sections of the Contractor's terms and conditions if such are in conflict with the best interest of the County.
- 5. Acceptance of a Purchase Order ("PO") and delivery of goods or services serves as the Supplier's full and complete acceptance of the County's terms and conditions.
- 6. The terms "supplier", "vendor", "bidder", "offeror", "Contractor", "designer", "distributor", "dealer" or "manufacturer" or otherwise purveyor or source of supply or performance of service shall mean one and the same, herein denoted as "supplier" for goods and "Contractor" for services.
- 7. The terms "goods", "materials", "commodities", "components", "drawings", "drafts", "renderings", "plans" (physical or digital), software, SaaS, capital asset equipment, vehicles, heavy earth-moving or other equipment (purchased or leased), or other such deliverables are herein denoted as "goods" and shall mean one and the same.
- 8. "Services" shall mean all services, either financial, advisory, consultative, labor, staff augmentation, construction, rehabilitation, restoration, repair, support or maintenance, communication, telephony, internet, TV or streaming, pest control, grounds maintenance, custodial and janitorial, street or paved surfaces cleaning, drain cleaning, or otherwise where services are offered for consideration.
- 9. The Supplier shall transfer and deliver all goods or services described on the respective PO for the consideration set forth herein.
- 10. The Supplier shall only deliver goods and services as described on the respective PO and within the Scope of Work and the Supplier's bid response.
- 11. The County holds no obligation to pay for goods delivered or services rendered unless specified on a written PO or a Change Order of such.
- 12. The Supplier shall not construe any verbal consent to purchase goods or services as valid.
- 13. The County does not accept substitutions of services or goods that do not comply with the Scope of Work or specifications set forth in the PO, Contract, or Agreement, unless mutually agreed in writing by both Parties.
- 14. The County does not accept automatic contract renewals except for monthly subscription services.
- 15. The County does not pay deposits towards goods ordered. Exceptions exist for custom made items such as window treatments, floor coverings, pre-mixed paints and stains, fabrication, decoration, or otherwise custom designed products specifically for the County.

- 16. The County will accept backorders only if goods are out of stock and with prior written notice. Suppliers shall ship all quantities that it has in stock and hold orders for backorders.
- 17. The County participates in cooperative purchasing agreements, State of Georgia Statewide Contracts, and other state and local intergovernmental agreements, memoranda of understanding and other such agreements.
- 18. In all cases, the jurisdiction shall be the State of Georgia, County of Hall, for arbitration or other legalities.
- 19. Deliveries go to the ship-to addresses listed on the PO and within the time specified. The Supplier must follow instructions if multiple ship-to addresses exist on the PO.
- 20. The County shall have the right to inspect all goods or services at the time and place of delivery. The risk of loss of goods shall pass to the County upon completion and final acceptance of the project delivery.
- 21. Title to the goods shall remain with the Supplier until acceptance by the County. Receipt of goods or services does not constitute acceptance.
- 22. The Supplier warrants that goods are merchantable, and the Supplier has a legal right to deliver the goods and services and as described herein.
- 23. Contractor agrees not to assign, in full or in part, this Contract to another party without the County's expressed written consent. Any attempted assignment or delegation shall void and make ineffectual this Contract for all intents and purposes.
- 24. The County is exempt from Federal Excise Tax and Georgia Sales and Use Tax.
- 25. This issuance of a PO shall not violate the Code of Ethics and Conflicts of Interest for Public Officers and Employees for Government Service set forth in the 2020 Section 45-1020 et seq. of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated and the Official Code of Hall County Section 3.10.070 governing Ethics.
- 26. All goods and services supplied pursuant to a PO shall, unless otherwise stated, conform exactly to all the descriptions, specifications, exhibits, and attachments contained in the bid solicitation upon which a PO is based, and all the terms, conditions, and specifications of the bid solicitation are incorporated herein by reference and made a part hereof.
- 27. All media production, recordings, videos, photography, artwork, plates, engravings, and other printed or digital media materials paid for in full by the County are considered County property and shall be delivered to the County upon request.
- 28. If a PO has an attached Contract or Agreement, the terms and conditions of the latter shall govern in the event of any conflict with these terms and conditions.
- 29. The Supplier may be suspended, terminated, or debarred if it is determined that the Supplier has made false certification(s) or has violated such certification(s) by failure to carry out the requirements herein. Thus, the Supplier certifies that it and its sub-Contractors have not been debarred, suspended, or declared ineligible by any agency of the County, State of Georgia, or as defined in the Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) 48 C.F.R. Ch. 1 Subpart 9.4.
- 30. The Supplier certifies that it is not currently engaged in an active or pending lawsuit or other grievance, injunction, or levy against the County.
- 31. Goods are Free-On-Board (F.O.B.) destination and freight. Shipping and delivery shall be pre-paid and added to the invoice as a separate line item. The Supplier shall charge the County the exact amount of freight, delivery, handling, and insurance charges the Supplier incurs.
- 32. The County does not pay late fees nor interest charges.

- 33. The County is not bound to any minimum or maximum quantity or dollar amount set by the Supplier.
- 34. In the event there is a discrepancy between the unit price and extended price, the unit price shall govern.

Fire Rescue is requesting to remount three (3) ambulances. Ten-8 is the Osage Ambulance dealer, and we were approved in the capital budget to purchase/remount three (3) ambulances on the latest year model of Ford F-550 4x4 diesel chassis. Ten-8 has priced the job using the FSA Contract #FSA25-VEF19.0 Item #258.

The price for all vehicles of \$1,073,481.00 includes a discount for purchasing our old chassis. If we choose to keep the chassis Hall County will be responsible for shipping the chassis back to Hall County.

The lead time is 24-28 months.

This includes three (3) new Ford F-550 193" W.B. 4x4 diesel chassis and the remounting of three (3) of our existing module/patient compartments from three (3) existing ambulances.

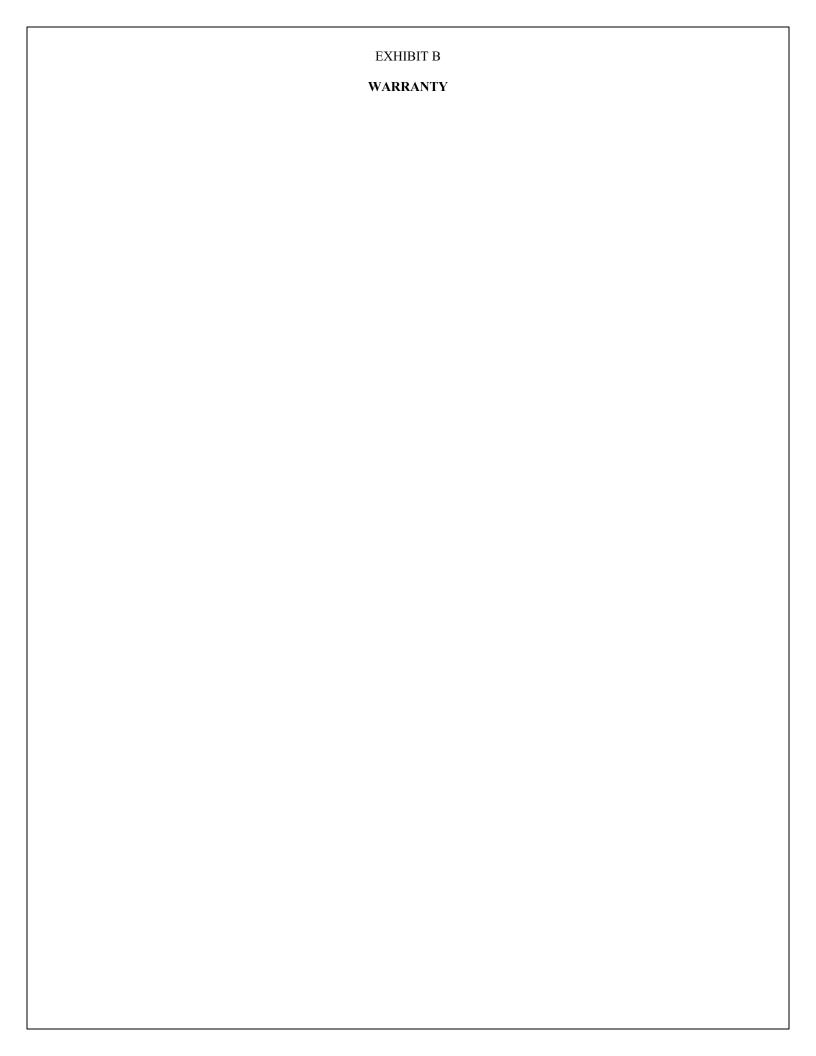

PURCHASING TERMS AND CONDITIONS

These Purchasing Terms and Conditions, together with the Equipment Proposal and all attachments (collectively, the "Agreement") are entered into by and between Ten-8 Fire & Safety, LLC, a Florida company ("Company") and Customer (as defined in Ten-8 Fire & Safety LLC's Equipment Proposal document) and is effective as of the date specified in Section 3 of these Purchasing Terms and Conditions. Both Company and Customer may be referred throughout this document individually as a "party" or collectively as the "parties."

1. Definitions.

- a. "Acceptance" has the same meaning set forth in Company's Equipment Proposal.
- b. "Company's Equipment Proposal" means the Equipment Proposal provided by Company and prepared in response to Customer's request for proposal for a fire apparatus, associated equipment or an ambulance.
- c. "Cooperative Purchasing Contract" means an Agreement between Company and a public authority, including without limitation, a department, division, agency of a municipal, county or state government ("Public Authority"), that adopts or participates in an existing agreement between Company and another non-party customer (including, but not limited to such non-party customer's equipment proposal, its applicable exhibits, attachments and purchasing terms and conditions), often referred to as a "piggyback arrangement," which is expressly agreed to, in writing, by Company. Company has sole discretion to determine whether it will agree to such a Cooperative Purchasing Contract.
- d. "Delivery" means when Company delivers physical possession of the Product to Customer.
- e. "Manufacturer" means the Manufacturer of any Product.
- f. "Prepayment Discount" means the prepayment discounts, if any, specified in Company's Equipment Proposal.
- g. **"Product"** means the fire apparatus and any associated equipment, or ambulance manufactured or furnished for Customer by Company pursuant to the Specifications.
- h. "Purchase Price" means the Total price set forth in the Quotation, adjusted for the final net price for the chassis charged by the original equipment manufacturer set forth in the final invoice submitted to the Company by the manufacturer. Additionally, if transportation charges are included in the Purchase Price, any changes in transportation charges shall be borne by Customer. Unless otherwise stated herein, Company shall not be responsible for switching, handling, loading, sorting, storage, demurrage, or any other transportation or peripheral charges. If any tax, public charge, tariff, duty, or increase in such taxes or tariffs, is now, or shall be, assessed, levied, or imposed upon, or with respect to the sale of Product by Company or the Manufacturer to Customer or upon any sale, delivery, or other action taken under any validly accepted order for Product, or upon the export or import of such Product by Company or Manufacturer, or if any change shall be made in the custom house or railway classification of such Product or in existing freight rates applicable thereto, the burden of such charge or change shall be borne by the Customer.
- i. "Purchasing Terms and Conditions" means these Purchasing Terms and Conditions; however, if the Company's Equipment Proposal or the Customer's related Purchase Order states that it is governed by a Cooperative Purchasing Agreement, "Purchasing Terms and Conditions" shall mean those terms and conditions set forth in the applicable Cooperative Purchasing Agreement.
- j. "Specifications" means the general specifications, technical specifications, training, and testing requirements for the Product contained in Company's Equipment Proposal and its Exhibit A (Proposal Option List or for ambulance sales, the Quotation, or Order Form, as applicable), prepared in response to Customer's request for such a proposal.
- 2. <u>Purpose</u>. This Agreement sets forth the terms and conditions of Company's sale of the Product to Customer.
- 3. <u>Term of Agreement</u>. This Agreement will become effective on the date of Acceptance as defined in Company's Equipment Proposal ("Effective Date") and, unless earlier terminated pursuant to the terms of this Agreement, it will terminate upon Delivery and payment in full of the Purchase Price.
- 4. <u>Purchase and Payment</u>. Customer agrees to pay Company the Purchase Price for the Product(s). The Purchase Price is in U.S. dollars. Where Customer opts for a Prepayment Discount that specifies that Customer will tender one or more prepayments to Company, Customer must provide each prepayment within the time frame specified in the Equipment Proposal in order to receive the Prepayment Discount for that prepayment installment. To the

- extent permitted by applicable law, Company may in its sole discretion charge a convenience fee if Customer elects to pay the Purchase Price by means of a credit card.
- 5. Representations and Warranties. Customer hereby represents and warrants to Company that the purchase of the Product(s) has been approved by Customer in accordance with applicable general laws and, as applicable, Customer's charter, ordinances and other governing documents, and funding for the purchase has been duly budgeted and appropriated.

6. <u>Cancellation/Termination</u>.

- a. Fire Equipment and Apparatus Sales. In the event this Agreement is cancelled or terminated by Customer before completion, Company may charge Customer a cancellation fee. The following charge schedule is based on costs incurred by Manufacturer and Company for the Product, which may be applied and charged to Customer: (a) 12% of the Purchase Price after the order for the Product(s) is accepted and entered into Manufacturer's system by Company; (b) 22% of the Purchase Price after completion of approval drawings by Customer, and; (c) 32% of the Purchase Price upon any material requisition made by the Manufacturer for the Product. The cancellation fee will increase in excess of (c) in this Section 6, accordingly, as additional costs are incurred by Manufacturer and Company as the order progresses through engineering and into the manufacturing process.
- b. <u>Ambulance Sales</u>. This Section 6 for Cancellation/Termination does not apply to Ambulance Sales. An order for an ambulance cannot be cancelled or terminated once Company receives and processes Customer's Acceptance of Company's Equipment Proposal.
- 7. <u>Delivery</u>. The Product is scheduled to be delivered as specified in the Delivery Timing section of the Equipment Proposal ("Delivery Timing"), which will be F.O.B. Company's facility. The Delivery Timing is an estimate, and Company is not bound to such date unless it otherwise agrees in writing. Company is not responsible for Delivery delays caused by or as the result of actions, omissions or conduct of the Manufacturer, its employees, affiliates, suppliers, contractors, and carriers. All right, title and interest in and to the Product, and risk of loss, shall pass to Customer upon Delivery of the Product(s) to Customer.
- 8. <u>Standard Warranty</u>. The manufacturer warranties applicable to this Agreement, if any, are attached to Company's Equipment Proposal as Exhibit A and are incorporated herein as part of the Agreement.
 - a. <u>Disclaimer</u>. EXCEPT AS OTHERWISE SET FORTH IN THIS AGREEMENT, COMPANY, INCLUDING ITS PARENT COMPANY, AFFILIATES, SUBSIDIARIES, AND THEIR RESPECTIVE OFFICERS, DIRECTORS, EMPLOYEES, SHAREHOLDERS, AGENTS OR REPRESENTATIVES DO NOT MAKE ANY REPRESENTATIONS OR WARRANTIES, EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, WITH RESPECT TO THE PRODUCTS PROVIDED UNDER THIS AGREEMENT, WHETHER ORAL OR WRITTEN, EXPRESS, IMPLIED OR STATUTORY. WITHOUT LIMITING THE FOREGOING DISCLAIMER, ANY IMPLIED WARRANTY OR CONDITION OF MERCHANTABILITY, IMPLIED WARRANTY AGAINST INFRINGEMENT, AND IMPLIED WARRANTY OR CONDITION OF FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE ARE EXPRESSLY EXCLUDED AND DISCLAIMED. STATEMENTS MADE BY SALES REPRESENTATIVES OR IN PROMOTIONAL MATERIALS DO NOT CONSTITUTE WARRANTIES.
- 9. <u>Limitation of Liability.</u> COMPANY WILL NOT BE LIABLE FOR ANY INCIDENTAL, CONSEQUENTIAL, INDIRECT, ECONOMIC, PUNITIVE, SPECIAL OR EXEMPLARY DAMAGES ARISING FROM OR IN ANY WAY CONNECTED WITH THIS AGREEMENT WITHOUT REGARD TO THE NATURE OF THE CLAIM OR THE UNDERLYING THEORY OR CAUSE OF ACTION (WHETHER IN CONTRACT, TORT, STRICT LIABILITY, EQUITY OR ANY OTHER THEORY OF LAW) ON WHICH SUCH DAMAGES ARE BASED. COMPANY'S LIMIT OF LIABILITY UNDER THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE CAPPED AT THE TOTAL AMOUNT OF THE MONIES PAID BY CUSTOMER TO COMPANY UNDER THIS AGREEMENT.

- 10. Force Majeure. The request before you is from Brayden Carter Brock, LLC to rezone from Agricultural Residential 1 (AR-1) to Light Industrial (I-1) for heavy equipment storage. This item is located within Commission District 3.

At their August 18, 2025 meeting, the Hall County Planning Commission voted to recommend approval, with six (6) conditions (5-0).

Staff recommendation: **Denial,** as the proposed use is not consistent with the "Suburban Neighborhood, Medium Density" future land use classification within the Comprehensive Plan.

There was one (1) comment submitted in opposition in advance of the Planning Commission meeting and one (1) person spoke in favor during the public hearing.

James Irvin, 164 Professional Drive, Baldwin, presented the request. The applicant is requesting to rezone a 13.17± acre tract from Agricultural Residential 1 (AR-1) to Light Industrial (I-1) to allow for heavy equipment storage in association with a dumpster rental business. In 2018, Hall County approved a land disturbance permit to allow fill material from road projects to be placed on the property for future development (HDV2018-00029). No other permits have been issued to the property since that time. Currently, there is a "Parcel Condition" on the property from Hall County Engineering dated February 21, 2025, stating that the original land disturbance permit still requires the submission of an as-built survey and that a letter to that effect was sent to the applicant on February 21, 2025.

Public Forum:

Jodi White, 5166 Whitehall Road, Lula, spoke in favor of the application as she believes the proposed development is sufficiently screened and set back from the roadway, and the application is a good use of the property in this area.

<u>Motion:</u> A motion to approve, with conditions was made by Frank Sosebee and seconded by André Castleberry. Vote: 5-0

Summary Analysis

The applicant is requesting to rezone a $13.17\pm$ acre tract from Agricultural Residential 1 (AR-1) to Light Industrial (I-1) to allow for heavy equipment storage in association with a dumpster rental business.

According to a 2019 county approved plat, the property was previously developed with two single-wide mobile homes; however, the mobile homes have been removed and the property appears to be occupied by dump trucks, roll-off containers, and various vehicles. There are no demolition permits on record for the removal of the two mobile homes.

In 2018, Hall County approved a land disturbance permit to allow fill material from road projects to be placed on the property for future development (HDV2018-00029). No other permits have been issued to the property since that time. Currently, there is a "Parcel Condition" on the property from Hall County Engineering dated 2/21/2025, stating that the original land disturbance permit is still pending the submission of an as-built survey and that a letter was sent to the applicant on February 21, 2025.

The surrounding properties are zoned and developed as outlined below:

North: Suburban Shopping (S-S): Current location of the applicant's business office for Ameri-

South: Agricultural Residential 1 (AR-1): Mix of undeveloped & developed with single-family

West: Planned Industrial Development (PID): Septic company (ZON2015-00041)

Agricultural Residential 1 (AR-1): Developed with single-family residences

Properties in the general vicinity zoned Planned Industrial Development (PID) or with historical light industrial uses include:

- 1. 2610 Old Cornelia Highway, 3.07± acres rezoned on Octobe 22, 2015 from Agricultural Residential III (AR-III) and Light Industrial (I-I) to Planned Industrial Development (PID) for a septic company with caretaker residence (ZON2015-00041).
- 2. 2660 Old Cornelia Highway, 8.01± acres zoned Agricultural 1 (AR-1) that had a business license issued for Brown's Garage, a motor vehicle towing and automotive repair business, since February 27, 1979 (BUS-0000510).

The applicant has a concurrent request to rezone the adjacent property at 2630 Old Cornelia Highway, the location of the current office for Ameri-Can, from Suburban Shopping to Light Industrial to allow a sign manufacturing and printing business (HZON25-0035).

Per the submitted narrative, the applicant is requesting to rezone the subject parcel to Light Industrial (I-1) to allow construction of a 12,000 square foot building with associated outdoor storage area for the business Ameri-Can, which provides roll-off dumpster rental, portable storage container rentals, and dump truck services. Per the narrative, the company has approximately 15 company vehicles, 5 equipment trailers, and 5-6 pieces of grading/construction equipment. Most of these items will be stored behind the building. The narrative states that there will be no more than 10 roll-off cans or storage containers on site at any one time.

Per the submitted site plan, the driveway will be paved, as well as a 50 foot area around the sides of the proposed building. Additional gravel areas are identified to the east and south of the building. The site plan identifies 7 parking spaces at the front of the building, as well as a 10 foot landscape strip along the front property line along with 50 foot vegetated buffers along those portions of the property abutting residentially-zoned properties. The parking, landscape strip and buffer meet the requirements of the Hall County Unified Development Code.

Water service will be provided by the City of Gainesville Department of Water Resources as confirmed in an email dated June 20, 2025. Sanitary sewer service will be provided by an on-site septic system.

Based on the future land use plan, staff finds the special use request <u>is not consistent</u> with the Comprehensive Plan's future land use classification of Suburban Neighborhood, Medium Density. The intent of this future land use designation is for medium-density, single-family housing (attached or detached). It should be located where there is existing water and sewer infrastructure, or where future infrastructure is expected to be located.

Zoning Analysis – Rezone

When considering a zoning amendment to the zoning maps, the Planning Commission must study the need and justification for the change based on a determination of the facts applicable to the particular case, and the following general lines of inquiry must be considered:

- a. Whether the zoning proposal will permit a use that is suitable in view of the use, development and zoning of adjacent and nearby property; The historical uses and zoning of adjacent property is industrial in nature.
- b. Whether the zoning proposal will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property; It is not anticipated that the use would adversely affect adjacent or nearby property, provided required buffers are maintained.
- c. Whether the property to be affected by the zoning proposal has a reasonable economic use as currently zoned; **The property has reasonable economic use as currently zoned.**
- d. Whether the zoning proposal will result in a use which will or could cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, utilities, schools, police protection, fire protection, public health facilities or emergency medical service; ; The proposed rezoning is not expected to cause an excessive or burdensome use of the existing streets, transportation facilities, utilities, schools, police protection, fire protection, public facilities, or emergency medical service. The property is served by Hall County sewer and City of Gainesville public water.
- e. Whether the zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the future land use plan for the physical development of the area; The proposed use is not consistent with the Comprehensive Plan future land use designation of Suburban Neighborhood, Medium Density.
- f. The extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions; **Staff is** unable to determine the extent to which property values are affected by the existing zoning restrictions.
- g. The extent to which the destruction of the subject property's value under the existing zoning promotes the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public; Staff is unable to comment on the impact of property values without a full market analysis. Multiple factors impact property values including construction types, proposed uses, and maintenance. Often it is difficult to determine the effect of a development on adjacent properties until the development is completed.
- h. The relative gain to the public as compared to the hardship imposed upon the individual property owner; Staff has not identified a hardship imposed on the property owner as the property is currently zoned.
- i. The length of time the property has been vacant as zoned considered in the context of land development in the area in the vicinity of the property; According to GIS imagery, two mobile homes were removed between 2023 and 2025. A land disturbance permit was issued on July 10, 2018 to allow fill material from road projects to be placed on the property for future development (HDV2018-00029).
- j. Whether there are other existing or changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property which give supporting grounds for either approval or disapproval of the zoning proposal; Staff is not aware of any changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property.

- k. Whether the change would create an isolated district unrelated to the surrounding districts; The proposed zoning, Light Industrial (I-1), would not create an isolated district as an adjacent property is zoned Planned Industrial Development (PID).
- I. Whether the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn in relation to existing conditions in the area; There is no evidence that the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn.
- m. Whether the change requested is out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole or the immediate neighborhood; **No, the request is not out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole.**
- n. Whether it is impossible to find adequate sites for the proposed use in districts permitting such use and already appropriately zoned; There are other properties within the County that support light industrial uses based on the Future Land Use Map and the current zoning map; however, the development as proposed requires rezoning approval by the Board of Commissioners.
- o. Whether the need for rezoning could be handled instead by a variance request to the Planning Commission; The request could not be handled alternatively as a variance.
- p. Whether there would be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from major modifications to the land if the request is granted; Any land disturbance activities on the property shall be required to go through the land development permitting process, and as a result are subject to local, state, and federal regulations. As a result, there are no anticipated ecological or pollution impacts resulting from any modification to the land if the request is granted.
- q. Whether there is reasonable evidence based upon existing and anticipated land use that would indicate a mistake was made in the original zoning of the property; **There is no indication that a mistake was made in the original zoning.**

- 2. All applications for a change of zoning classification or use subject to approval of the County Commission must include:
 - A narrative statement identifying the existing and proposed use of the property and addressing each of the criteria set forth in this Sec. 11.2. The proposal provides a narrative

outlining the intent of the development; however, the applicant has not prepared a response to each of the criteria listed in 11.2.6.E.2.

- b. A site plan drawn to scale designating the area covered by the application and identifying existing and proposed buildings and uses, adjacent existing land uses, zoning on contiguous parcels, including those across an abutting public right-of-way, and any other significant site improvements proposed to accommodate the proposed use or buffer adjacent uses, etc., or a plat of the subject property where no specific land use is proposed. In cases where only a plat or map is provided and no land use is proposed, the Planning Commission and County Commission may evaluate the application based on the most intense possible land use permitted in the proposed district. The proposal meets the requirement.
- c. For any application for a slow rate land treatment system as defined in 7.6.9.D.1, additional requirements apply. **This standard is not applicable to the applicant's request**
- d. For any application proposing the development of 100 or more residential dwelling units, a traffic impact study must be submitted prior to consideration of the application by the County Commission. At the applicant's expense, the traffic impact study must be prepared by a professional engineer in accordance with requirements established by the Hall County Engineering Department. The Engineering Department must review the traffic impact study and forward any comments to the County Commission. This standard is not applicable to the applicant's request.

Georgia Department of Transportation

In an email dated July 21, 2025, Nakia Nembhard, GDOT Civil Engineer 3, stated that GDOT coordination is not required.

In a memo dated July 18, 2025, Bill Nash, Director of Public Works and Utilities, provided the following comments:

This site may require a stormwater management report should the site plan indicate the proposed development meets stormwater thresholds for impervious surfaces and/or disturbed acreage. Show stream buffer and impervious setback from wrested vegetation not centerline of stream.

Traffic:

Commercial driveway required.

Utilities:

Sewer in City of Gainesville.

Hall County Fire Marshal

In an email dated July 14, 2025, John Hornick, NPQ Fire Service Plans Examiner 1, provided the following comments:

- 1. The proposed 12,000SF building location is greater than the 500-foot hose lay distance requirement from the nearest fire hydrant. If approved an 8-inch water main and fire hydrant will have to be installed to meet the 500-foot hose lay distance requirement from the fire hydrant to the building.
- 2. The Hall County Fire Marshal's Office considers the plan conceptual in nature and if approved may require modifications during the development review process.
- 3. The use of the proposed 12,000SF building has not been identified in the narrative report. Depending on the use additional life safety requirements could be required.

The proposed use is for Ameri-Can dumpster rental service for commercial "roll-off" construction dumpsters.

Ameri-Can dumpster rental is currently located on the adjacent property at 2630 Old Cornelia Hwy. The property owner wishes to move this business for more area for truck and equipment storage and allow a sign shop to use the current building. If approved an 8-inch water main and fire hydrant will have to be installed to meet the 500-foot hose lay distance requirement from the fire hydrant to the building.
- 2. The Hall County Fire Marshal's Office considers the plan conceptual in nature and if approved may require modifications during the development review process.
- 3. The use of the proposed 12,000 SF building has not been identified in the narrative report. Depending on the use additional life safety requirements could be required.

- 3. The applicant/property owner shall place the public notice sign in a conspicuous location on the property not less than thirty (30) days and not more than forty-five (45) days prior to the public hearing.

The Planning Department shall post the legal advertisement and notify property owners within a 500ft radius to the subject property.

The request before you is from Brayden Carter Brock, LLC to rezone from Suburban Shopping (S-S) to Light Industrial (I-1) for a sign manufacturing and printing business. This item is located within Commission District 3.

At their August 18, 2024 meeting, the Hall County Planning Commission voted to recommend approval, with nine (9) conditions (5-0).

Staff recommendation: **Denial,** as the proposed use and zoning is not consistent with the "Suburban Neighborhood, Medium Density" future land use classification within the Comprehensive Plan.

There were one (1) comment submitted in opposition in advance of the Planning Commission meeting and no one spoke during the public hearing.

Mr. Irvin stated the applicant has recently decided to rent half of the building as office space and wished to make the Board aware of his intentions. Properties in the general vicinity zoned Planned Industrial Development (PID) or with historical light industrial uses include:

- 1. 2610 Old Cornelia Highway, 3.07± acres rezoned on October 22, 2015 from Agricultural Residential III (AR-III) and Light Industrial (I-I) to Planned Industrial Development (PID) for a septic company with caretaker residence (ZON2015-00041).
- 2. 2660 Old Cornelia Highway, 8.01± acres zoned Agricultural 1 (AR-1) that has had a business license issued for Brown's Garage, a motor vehicle towing and automotive repair business, since February 27, 1979 (BUS-0000510).

The applicant has a concurrent request to rezone the adjacent property at 2614 Old Cornelia Highway from Agricultural Residential 1 (AR-1) to Light Industrial (I-1) to allow heavy equipment storage in association with a dumpster rental business (HZON25-0035).

Per the submitted narrative, the applicant is requesting to rezone the subject parcel to Light Industrial (I-1) to be used for a sign manufacturing and printing business. The business would be located in an existing 5,997 square foot building, and would operate Monday through Friday from 8am to 5pm.

Per the submitted site plan, the existing driveway, parking lot and area along the east side of the building are paved. Five parking spaces are required and the site plan shows 15 spaces. The existing building meets all required setbacks of the current and proposed zoning districts and a 10 foot landscape strip is shown along the front property line.

One (1) **variance** related to the transitional buffer standards will be required if the site plan, as presented, is approved.

- 1. 8.2.1. <u>Buffer Requirements</u> Where an industrial use with no outdoor activity abuts residentially zoned property, a 30-foot wide vegetated buffer is required.
 - The applicant requests that no buffer be required along the eastern property line abutting a residentially zoned property. This does not meet the standard.

Based on the future land use plan, staff finds the rezoning request <u>is not consistent</u> with the Comprehensive Plan's future land use classification of Suburban Neighborhood, Medium Density. The intent of this future land use designation is for medium-density, single family housing (attached or detached). It should be located where there is existing water and sewer infrastructure, or where future infrastructure is expected to be located.

(A) Zoning Analysis – Rezone

When considering a zoning amendment to the zoning maps, the Planning Commission must study the need and justification for the change based on a determination of the facts applicable to the particular case, and the following general lines of inquiry must be considered:

- a. Whether the zoning proposal will permit a use that is suitable in view of the use, development and zoning of adjacent and nearby property; The property has been commercially zoned since 2000 and the historical use of a nearby property is industrial in nature. Another nearby property is Planned Industrial Development (PID). The adjacent property to the south and west has a concurrent rezoning request to Light Industrial (I-1).
- b. Whether the zoning proposal will adversely affect the existing use or usability of adjacent or nearby property; It is not anticipated that the use would adversely affect adjacent or nearby property provided required buffers are maintained.
- c. Whether the property to be affected by the zoning proposal has a reasonable economic use as currently zoned; **The property has reasonable economic use as currently zoned.**
- d. Whether the zoning proposal will result in a use which will or could cause an excessive or burdensome use of existing streets, transportation facilities, utilities, schools, police protection, fire protection, public health facilities or emergency medical service; The proposed rezoning is not expected to cause an excessive or burdensome use of the existing streets, transportation facilities, utilities, schools, police protection, fire protection, public facilities, or emergency medical service. The property is served by Hall County sewer and City of Gainesville public water.
- e. Whether the zoning proposal is in conformity with the policy and intent of the future land use plan for the physical development of the area; The proposed use is not consistent with the Comprehensive Plan future land use designation of Suburban Neighborhood, Medium Density.

- f. The extent to which property values are diminished by the existing zoning restrictions; **Staff is** unable to determine the extent to which property values are affected by the existing zoning restrictions.
- g. The extent to which the destruction of the subject property's value under the existing zoning promotes the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public; Staff is unable to comment on the impact of property values without a full market analysis. Multiple factors impact property values including construction types, proposed uses, and maintenance. Often it is difficult to determine the effect of a development on adjacent properties until the development is completed.
- h. The relative gain to the public as compared to the hardship imposed upon the individual property owner; Staff has not identified a hardship imposed on the property owner as the property is currently zoned.
- i. The length of time the property has been vacant as zoned considered in the context of land development in the area in the vicinity of the property; The existing commercial building was constructed in 1999 and businesses have continually operated from the site since that time.
- j. Whether there are other existing or changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property which give supporting grounds for either approval or disapproval of the zoning proposal; Staff is not aware of any changing conditions affecting the use or development of the property.
- k. Whether the change would create an isolated district unrelated to the surrounding districts; **The proposed zoning, Light Industrial (I-1), would create an isolated district.**
- I. Whether the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn in relation to existing conditions in the area; There is no evidence that the present zoning district boundaries are illogically drawn.
- m. Whether the change requested is out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole or the immediate neighborhood; **No, the request is not out of scale with the needs of the county as a whole.**
- n. Whether it is impossible to find adequate sites for the proposed use in districts permitting such use and already appropriately zoned; There are other properties within the County that support light industrial uses based on the Future Land Use Map and current zoning maps; however, the use as proposed requires rezoning approval by the Board of Commissioners.
- o. Whether the need for rezoning could be handled instead by a variance request to the Planning Commission; The request could not be handled alternatively as a variance.
- p. Whether there would be an ecological or pollution impact resulting from major modifications to the land if the request is granted; Any land disturbance activities on the property shall be required to go through the land development permitting process, and as a result are subject to local, state, and federal regulations. As a result, there are no anticipated ecological or pollution impacts resulting from any modification to the land if the request is granted.

q. Whether there is reasonable evidence based upon existing and anticipated land use that would indicate a mistake was made in the original zoning of the property; There is no indication that a mistake was made in the original zoning.

(B) **Zoning Analysis** – Variance to section 8.2.3

The Planning Commission may grant variances in individual cases of unnecessary hardship upon a finding of the board that:

- 1. There are extraordinary and exceptional conditions pertaining to the particular lot in question because of its size, shape, or topography (the hardship must relate to the physical character of the lot and not to a personal or economic hardship); The property is somewhat unusual as access to two adjacent residential properties is by way of a shared driveway that originates on the subject parcel; however, there is no hardship between the rear of the building and rear property line to prevent a 30 foot wide vegetated buffer from being established.
- 2. The application of the requirements of this UDC to this particular piece of property would create an unusual hardship; Requiring a 30 foot wide vegetated buffer along the entire length of the eastern property line would eliminate access to the two adjacent residential properties which utilize the driveway of the subject parcel; however, there is no hardship between the rear of the building and rear property line to prevent a 30 foot wide vegetated buffer from being established.
- 3. Such conditions are peculiar to the property involved and are not common to other properties in the neighborhood; The shared access between properties is peculiar to the property involved that is not common to other properties.
- 4. Such conditions are not the result of any actions of the property owner; The shared access between properties is not the result of any action of the current property owner.
- 5. Relief, if granted, would not cause substantial detriment to the public good or impair the purposes and intent of this UDC; provided, however, that no variance may be granted for a use of land or building or structure that is prohibited by this UDC or for a Conditional Use Permit which has been denied by the Planning Commission. Relief, if granted, will not impair the purposes and intent of the Unified Development Code of Hall County.

11.2.6.E - Submission requirements

1. Any person or persons requesting a change in the official zoning map or use subject to approval of the County Commission must file an application with a plat or map of the property attached thereto, together with payment of such fees set forth in this Sec 11.2. to cover administrative and advertising costs, in the Planning and Zoning Department office. Such person or persons or their authorized agent must appear in person at the public hearing held to consider the district change. The proposal meets the requirement. The applicant has paid the appropriate fees and understands that someone must be present at both the Hall County Planning Commission meeting and the voting meeting of the Hall County Board of Commissioners.

- 2. All applications for a change of zoning classification or use subject to approval of the County Commission must include:
 - a. A narrative statement identifying the existing and proposed use of the property and addressing each of the criteria set forth in this Sec. 11.2. The proposal provides a narrative outlining the intent of the development; however, the applicant has not prepared a response to each of the criteria listed in 11.2.6.E.2.
 - b. A site plan drawn to scale designating the area covered by the application and identifying existing and proposed buildings and uses, adjacent existing land uses, zoning on contiguous parcels, including those across an abutting public right-of-way, and any other significant site improvements proposed to accommodate the proposed use or buffer adjacent uses, etc., or a plat of the subject property where no specific land use is proposed. In cases where only a plat or map is provided and no land use is proposed, the Planning Commission and County Commission may evaluate the application based on the most intense possible land use permitted in the proposed district. The proposal meets the requirement.
 - c. For any application for a slow rate land treatment system as defined in 7.6.9.D.1, additional requirements apply. **This standard is not applicable to the applicant's request**
 - d. For any application proposing the development of 100 or more residential dwelling units, a traffic impact study must be submitted prior to consideration of the application by the County Commission. At the applicant's expense, the traffic impact study must be prepared by a professional engineer in accordance with requirements established by the Hall County Engineering Department. The Engineering Department must review the traffic impact study and forward any comments to the County Commission. This standard is not applicable to the applicant's request.

Statement of Hardship for 2630 Old Cornelia Hwy

1. There are extraordinary and exceptional conditions pertaining to the particular piece of property in question because of its size, shape or topography (the hardship must relate to the physical character of the lot and not to a personal or economic hardship).

The existing commercial building, which predates current zoning requirements, is situated in such a way that residential property owners must use a portion of the subject Light Industrial property for access to their homes. The physical configuration of the parcel and adjacent lots does not allow for alternative points of entry. Enforcing a 30' vegetative buffer would obstruct this shared access and make it physically impossible for adjacent residents to reach their properties, which demonstrates a hardship directly related to the physical layout and historic development of the site.

2. The application of the requirements of this resolution to this particular property would create an unusual hardship.

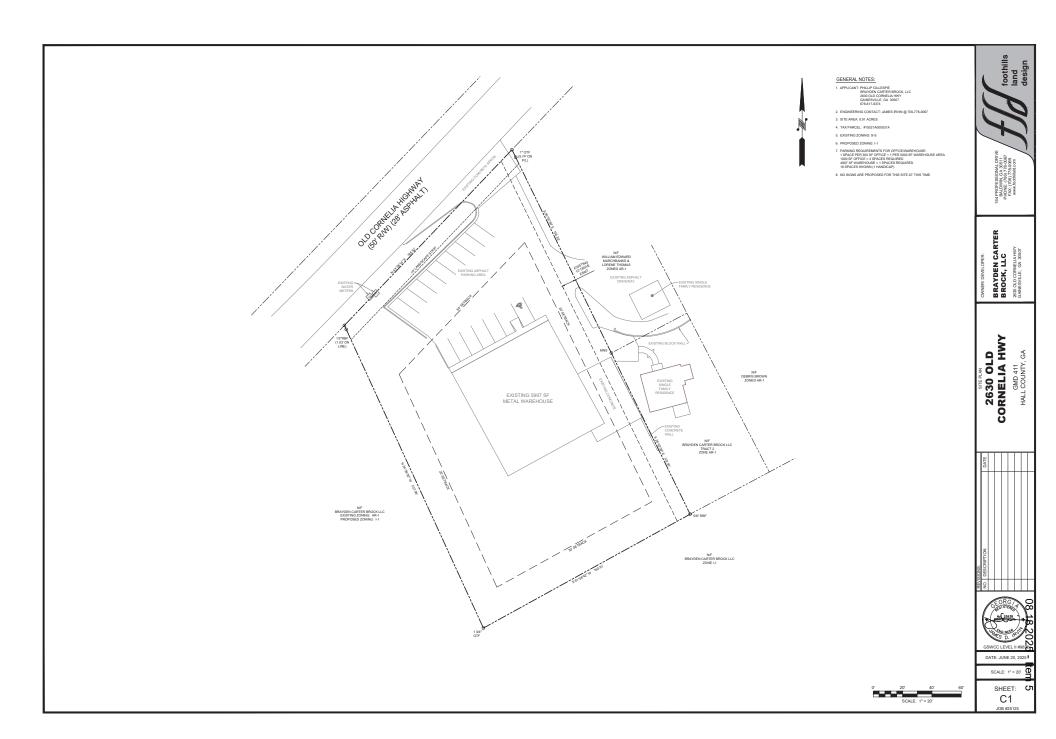
Applying the buffer requirement to this property would create an unusual hardship because it would effectively eliminate access for neighboring residential property owners. This requirement, if strictly enforced, would necessitate the installation of a physical barrier—vegetation—through an area that is actively and essentially used for ingress and egress. Such a condition is not only impractical but would result in functional and safety issues for both the applicant and nearby residents who have long depended on the existing access arrangement.

- 3. Such conditions are peculiar to the particular piece of property involved and not common to other properties in the neighborhood. That is, the application of the regulation would deprive the applicant of the rights commonly enjoyed by others in the neighborhood. Unlike typical industrial-residential adjacencies where separation is feasible, the continued existence and practical function of this property relies on accommodating access for adjacent residences. Requiring a vegetative buffer in this case would remove that shared function and strip both the applicant and neighboring residents of the practical rights to use and access their land as they have historically done. Other properties in the area do not share this access-dependent relationship and would not face the same restrictive outcome.
- 4. Such conditions are not the result of any actions of the property owner.

The hardship is not the result of actions by the current property owner. The building has existed and been in use for commercial purposes for many years as well as the access arrangement for neighboring residents. The need for a variance arises solely due to the existing configuration of the land and the surrounding development pattern, not due to any recent modifications or decisions made by the owner.

5. Relief, if granted, would not cause substantial detriment to the public good or impair the purposes and intent of this resolution provided; however, that no variance may be granted for a use of land or building or structure that is prohibited by this resolution.

Granting this variance would not be detrimental to the public good nor would it impair the intent of the zoning resolution. The planned use of the building will be a sign printing shop and represents a continuation of longstanding commercial activity on the property. Furthermore, denying the variance and enforcing the buffer would create logistical issues for neighboring residents. Allowing the variance preserves both access and safety, while also maintaining compatibility with the area's historical development pattern. It does not grant the applicant any special privileges not otherwise available to similar properties under similar conditions.

ARTICLE #104 - NON-EXCLUSIVE RIGHTS

The Contract is not exclusive. The County reserves the right to select other Contractors to provide the Services similar to those described in this Contract during the term of the Contract should the need arise, or the Contractor fail to perform.

ARTICLE #105 - CONTRACT TERM

The term will be forty-five (45) calendar days from the date of the issuance of a Notice to Proceed.

ARTICLE #106 - CONTRACT AMENDMENTS AND MODIFICATION

This Contract may only be modified, amended, or changed in writing and fully executed by both Parties hereto. This Contract constitutes the sole and entire Contract and understanding between the Parties as to the subject matter hereof, and no verbal promises have been made by either Party in relation hereto.

ARTICLE #107 - REMEDIES AND CONTRACT PERFORMANCE

In the event that either Party to this Contract breaches this Contract, including failure to meet the timetables set forth herein, the non-breaching Party shall provide a written Notice to Cure to the breaching Party which describes the breach of this Contract. The breaching Party shall have thirty (30) days from the date of receipt of the written Notice to cure the breach or to otherwise negotiate a resolution of the breach.

If the breach has not been cured and the Parties hereto have not resolved the issue described in the Notice to Cure by thirty (30) days after receipt of the letter, the Party authoring the letter shall be entitled to seek any and all remedies allowed by Georgia law, including damages, equitable relief, declaratory relief, specific performance, and/or relief as to any bonds issued hereon.

Additional provisions are:

A. Delay or Impossibility of Performance. Any failure or delay must be beyond the reasonable control of and without the fault or negligence of the Contractor. If the Services to be provided to the County are interrupted by a force majeure event, as defined below, the County will be entitled to an equitable adjustment to the fees and other payments due to the Contractor under this Contract. If delay results from a third-party's negligent conduct or failure to perform, the Contractor shall not be excused from compliance with the terms and obligations of the Contract.

Neither Party shall be held liable or responsible to the other Party nor be deemed to have defaulted under or breached this Contract for failure or delay in fulfilling or performing any obligation under this Contract when such failure or delay is caused by or results from causes beyond the reasonable control of the affected Party including, but not limited to, fire, floods, embargoes, acts of war, civil unrest, insurrections, riots, strikes, lockouts or other labor disturbances, or acts of God; provided, however, that the Party so affected shall use reasonable commercial efforts to avoid or remove such causes of nonperformance, and shall continue performance hereunder with reasonable dispatch whenever such causes are removed. Either Party shall provide the other Party with prompt written notice of any delay or failure to perform that occurs by reason of force majeure.

Definition: The term "force majeure" as defined in Black's Law Dictionary is "an event or effect that can be neither anticipated nor controlled. It is a contractual provision allocating the risk of loss if performance becomes impossible or impracticable, especially as a result of an event that the Parties could not have anticipated or controlled."

- B. **Obligations Beyond Contract Term**. The Contract shall remain in full force and effect to the end of the specified term or until terminated or canceled pursuant to *ARTICLE #108 TERMINATION PROVISIONS*.
- C. Transition Cooperation with the County and Cooperation with Other Contractors. Contractor agrees that upon termination of this Contract for any reason, it shall provide sufficient efforts and reasonable cooperation and assistance to the County to ensure an

orderly and efficient transition to the County or an alternative Contractor. Further, if the County has entered into, or enters into, contracts with other Contractors related to the Services, Contractor agrees to cooperate fully with other such Contractors. Contractor shall not engage in any act that will interfere with the performance of work by any other Contractor(s).

ARTICLE #108 – TERMINATION PROVISIONS

The County may terminate this Contract by providing thirty (30) days' written notice to the Contractor at any time. Should the County terminate this Contract prior to the date of automatic termination, Contractor shall provide the County with all deliverables up to the date of termination thirty (30) days after the Notice to Terminate is issued. The County shall pay the Contractor for all work properly performed in compliance with the terms of this Contract up to the date of termination.

- A. **Termination for Convenience**. Following thirty (30) days' written notice, the County may terminate the Contract in whole or in part for any reason without the payment of any penalty or incurring any further obligation to the Contractor.
- B. **Termination for Cause**. The occurrence of any of the following events shall constitute cause for the County to declare the Contractor in default of its obligations under the Contract:
 - 1. The Contractor fails to deliver or has delivered nonconforming Services or fails to perform, to the County's satisfaction, any material requirement of the Contract or is in violation of a material provision of the Contract including, but without limitation, the expressed warranties made by the Contractor.
 - 2. The County determines that Contractor's unsatisfactory performance substantially endangers completion or that default is likely to occur.
 - The Contractor fails to make substantial and timely progress toward performance of the Contract
 - 4. The Contractor becomes subject to any bankruptcy or insolvency proceeding under federal or state law to the extent allowed by applicable federal or state law including bankruptcy laws; the Contractor terminates or suspends its business; or the County reasonably believes that the Contractor has become insolvent or unable to pay its obligations as they accrue consistent with applicable federal or state law.
 - 5. The Contractor has failed to comply with applicable federal, state, and local laws, rules, County ordinances, regulations, and orders when performing within the scope of the Contract.
 - 6. The Contractor has engaged in conduct that has or may expose the County or the State to liability, as determined in the County's sole discretion; or a material breach of the terms of the Contract by County upon County's failure to cure such material breach after written notice thereof has been delivered in accordance with ARTICLE #108.C below constitutes cause for the Contractor to declare that the County is in default of its obligations under the Contract.
- C. Notice of Default. If either Party causes any of the default events set out in ARTICLE #108 TERMINATION PROVISIONS, then either Party shall issue a written Notice of Default to the Party that causes one (1) or more of the default events requesting that the breach or noncompliance be remedied within the period of time specified in the Notice of Default. If the breach or noncompliance is not remedied within the period of time specified in the written notice, the non-breaching Party may:
 - 1. Immediately terminate the Contract for default without additional written notice; and/or,
 - 2. In the event of a breach by the Contractor, the County may procure substitute Services from another source and charge the difference between the Contract and the substitute Contract to the defaulting Contractor; and/or,

- 3. Enforce the terms and conditions of the Contract and seek any legal or equitable remedies.
- D. **Termination Due to Non-Availability of Funds.** This Contract will terminate immediately and absolutely if the County determines that adequate funds are de-appropriated such that the County cannot fulfill its obligations under the Contract, such determination being at the County's sole discretion and conclusive. County agrees to provide prompt written notice to Contractor in the event of any de-appropriation.
- E. Termination due to Failure of Contractor to Act. The County may terminate the Contract for any of the following reasons effective immediately without advance notice:
 - If the Contractor must be certified or licensed as a condition precedent to providing the Services, the revocation, suspension, or other loss of such license or certification may result in immediate termination of the Contract effective as of the date on which the license or certification is no longer in effect.
 - The County determines that the actions, or failure to act, of the Contractor, its agents, employees, have caused, or reasonably could cause, life, health, or safety to be jeopardized.
 - The Contractor furnished any statement, representation, or certification in connection with the Contract or the bidding process, which is materially false, deceptive, criminal, or maliciously incorrect.
 - 4. Failure of the Contractor to obtain, provide, maintain, and deliver the performance and payment bonds (if required) when required under this Contract, or failure to comply with any requirement pertaining to the appropriate amounts thereof as set forth in ARTICLE #123 PERFORMANCE AND PAYMENT BONDS.
- F. Payment Limitation in Event of Termination. In the event of termination of the Contract for any reason by County, the County shall pay only those amounts, if any, due and owing to the Contractor for Services actually received and accepted by the County up to and including the date of termination of the Contract and for which the County is obligated to pay pursuant to the Contract.
- G. Contractor's Termination Duties. Upon receipt of a Notice of Termination, the Contractor shall:
 - Cease work under the Contract and take all necessary or appropriate steps to limit disbursements and minimize costs and furnish a report within thirty (30) days of the date of Notice of Termination describing the status of all work under the Contract including, without limitation, results accomplished, conclusions resulting therefrom, and any other matters the County may require.
 - 2. Immediately cease use and return to the County any personal property or materials, whether tangible or intangible, provided by the County to the Contractor.
 - 3. Comply with the County's instructions for the timely transfer of any active files and work product produced by the Contractor under the Contract.
 - Cooperate in good faith with the County, its employees, agents, and Contractors during the transition period between the Notification of Termination and the substitution of any replacement Contractor.
 - 5. Contractor is to immediately return any payments made by the County for goods and services that were not delivered by the Contractor.
- H. Liquidated Damages. In the event that the Contractor unreasonably delays completion of the project as per the term in ARTICLE #105 CONTRACT TERM or abandons the project before completion, the Contractor shall pay the County liquidated damages in the amount of three hundred fifteen dollars and 00/100 (\$315.00) per day until final completion.

ARTICLE #109 - NO DEFENSE OR INDEMNIFICATION BY COUNTY

The Parties agree that the County shall not be responsible for defending or indemnifying any Contractor from any claim brought by any third party against the Contractor.

ARTICLE #110 - ASSIGNMENT AND DELEGATION BY CONTRACTOR

The Contractor shall not assign or delegate this Contract, or any performance required by it, in whole or in part, without the prior expressed written consent of the County.

ARTICLE #111 - USE OF THIRD PARTIES

This Contract is for the benefit of the Parties hereto only and is not intended to benefit any third party or give rise to any duty or causes of action for any third party. All restrictions, obligations, and responsibilities of the Contractor under the Contract shall also apply to third parties, if allowed in writing by the County. Any Contract with a third-party must also preserve the rights of the County.

ARTICLE #112 - ENTIRE CONTRACT

This Contract, as executed and approved, shall constitute the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all other prior and contemporaneous statements, agreements, and understandings between the Parties. No written or oral statements, agreements, or understandings that are not set out, referenced, or specifically incorporated in this Contract shall in any way be binding or of effect between the Parties.

ARTICLE #113 – SEVERABILITY

If any paragraph, sub-paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Contract is declared invalid or unconstitutional by any Court of competent jurisdiction or if the provisions of any part of this Contract as applied to any particular situation or set of circumstances shall be declared invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity shall not be construed to affect the remaining portions of this Contract not so held to be invalid or the application of this Contract to other circumstances not so held to be invalid.

ARTICLE #114 - RECORDS

- A. Public Records Request. The Georgia Open Records Act, as provided in O.C.G.A. § 50-18-70 et seq, requires procurement records and all other records received by or prepared or maintained on behalf of the County shall be made open to public inspection unless otherwise provided by law.
- B. Record Retention and Access. The Contractor shall maintain books, records, and documents in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and procedures and which sufficiently and properly document and calculate all charges billed to the County throughout the term of the Contract for a period of at least five (5) years following the date of final payment or completion of any required audit, whichever is later. Records to be maintained include both financial records and service records.

ARTICLE #115 - ADDITIONAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

The County shall not be bound by any terms and conditions included in any Contractor's sales orders, literature, packaging, invoice, catalog, brochure, technical data sheet, on-line

representation, warranties or service level agreement, or other document which attempts to impose any condition in variance with or in addition to the terms and conditions contained herein.

ARTICLE #116 - WAIVER

The failure of any Party hereto to seek a remedy for any alleged breach of this Contract shall not constitute a waiver of any claim, cause of action, or remedy allowed by Georgia law for breach thereof.

ARTICLE #117 - CONTRACTOR AND COUNTY RIGHTS AND OBLIGATIONS

- A. The County has the right at any time to require the Contractor to put an immediate stop to any procedure, or the use of any equipment, chemical, material, personnel, etc. considered by the County to be hazardous or toxic to persons, buildings, or surfaces. The Contractor will utilize acceptable substitutes approved by the County as quickly as possible. In the event of such replacement, Contractor shall (i) notify County of any resulting replacement, (ii) introduce an individual serving as a replacement to County, and/or (iii) provide County with a résumé and any other information regarding an individual that may be reasonably requested by County.
- B. The County has the right to require the Contractor to reassign or remove any employee from the premises temporarily or permanently when, in the County's sole opinion, the employee is not suitable. The County's decision shall be final, and Contractor will remove the employee immediately and replace with a person of at least equivalent training, experience, and requisite qualifications as quickly as possible, subject to the County's approval.
- C. Contractor agrees to obtain prior written approval from the County for the use of subcontractor(s) to provide the Services described in Scope of Work prior to subcontractor(s) performance of work. Such non-disclosure of subcontractors may result in non-payment for Services.

ARTICLE #118 - INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

The Contractor must procure and maintain insurance policies at the Contractor's own expense and must furnish the County with a certificate of insurance (COI) providing evidence of proof of coverage at least in the amounts indicated in this subsection. The COI must list "Hall County, Georgia" as the certificate holder and as an additional insured under the commercial general, automobile, and umbrella liability policies as follows: "County of Hall, its Board of Commissioners, officers, employees, servants, and agents, 2875 Browns Bridge Rd, Gainesville, GA, 30504". The policy must protect the Contractor and the County (as an additional insured) from any claims for bodily injury, property damage, or personal injury covered by the indemnification obligations set forth herein throughout the duration of the Contract. The Contractor must maintain the following insurance coverage during the term of the Contract, in at least the minimum amounts set forth below, to cover all loss and liability for damages or destruction of property caused by or arising from any and all services carried on and any and all work performed by the Contractor pursuant to this Contract:

Workers Compensation Insurance: Required for all contracts.

- \$500,000 Bodily Injury by Accident Each Accident
- \$500,000 Bodily Injury by Disease Each Disease
- \$500,000 Bodily Injury by Disease -- Each Employee

Additional Provisions: Waiver of Subrogation. The insurer agrees to waive all rights of subrogation against Hall County Board of Commissioners (BOC), its elected or appointed

officers, officials, agents, authorized volunteers, and employees for losses paid under the terms of this policy which arise from work performed by the Named Insured for Hall County BOC. This provision applies regardless of whether or not Hall County BOC has received a waiver of subrogation from the insurer.

General Liability Insurance: Required for all service contracts.

- \$2,000,000 General Aggregate
- \$2,000,000 Products & Completed Operations Aggregate
- \$1,000,000 Each Occurrence
- \$1,000,000 Personal & Advertising Injury
- \$500,000 Damages to Premises/Fire/Legal
- \$5,000 Medical Payments

<u>Commercial Auto Liability Insurance: Required for all service contracts</u>, except for goods and/or services that are remote in nature and/or are delivered by a professional delivery service.

- \$1,000,000 Combined Single Limit Or \$500,000 per Person/\$1,000,000 per Occurrence
- \$100,000 Property Damage
- \$1,000 for Medical Payments (no fault coverage)

Additional Provisions:

- Uninsured motorist's coverage should be equal to the per occurrence limit except for contracts with other governmental entities.
- Coverage shall be included for any owned, leased, hired, or non-owned autos.
- For any contracts involving the transportation of hazardous materials, limited pollution endorsement ISO form CA9948 or its equivalent shall be on the policy.

Umbrella Liability Insurance: Required for all contracts.

- If written on a claim's made policy, the policy must be maintained for at least two (2) years after the completion of the work and/or contract.

ARTICLE # 119 - NO WAIVER

- A. Authority to Enter into Contract. The Contractor represents and warrants that it has full authority to enter and perform its obligations under the Contract and that the Contract constitutes a legal, valid, and binding obligation upon the Contractor in accordance with its terms. The representatives of the Parties hereto also represent and warrant that they are authorized to sign this Contract on behalf of each party hereto.
- B. **Solicitation**. The Contractor warrants that no person or selling agency (except bona fide employees or selling agents maintained for the purpose of securing business) has been employed or retained to solicit and secure the Contract upon an agreement or understanding for commission, percentage, brokerage or contingency.
- C. Vehicles and Equipment. Except for any specified County-owned equipment and vehicles listed herein, Contractor warrants that no Contractor employees, subcontractors, or others will use County-owned vehicles or equipment in the performance of this Contract without express written consent of the County. Contractor shall be responsible for providing all transportation and equipment necessary to deliver Services under the Contract.

ARTICLE # 120 - INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS and OWNERSHIP

The Contractor agrees it will not use the name or any intellectual property, including but not limited to, County trademarks or logos in any manner, including commercial advertising or as a business reference, without the expressed prior written consent of the County.

ARTICLE # 121 - COMPENSATION

- A. The County will pay the Contractor for the Services provided pursuant to this Contract and in accordance with the prices quoted and conditions set forth in the Bidder's response on *Exhibit C Cost Proposal Worksheet*, which is attached hereto and incorporated into this Contract as if fully set forth herein. Payments will be made monthly in arrears to the Contractor after acceptance of the Contractor's delivered Services by the County, and after receiving receipt of undisputed invoice to the County.
- B. Prices quoted shall be firm and fixed throughout the term of this Contract, unless otherwise amended or modified by mutual agreement.
- C. Cost may be prorated for Services added or removed under this Contract to align cost with the remaining term of Contract.
- D. It is understood that this proposal is made without collusion or fraud. Contractor understands and acknowledges that collusive bidding is a violation of state and federal law and may result in the cancellation of the Contract.

ARTICLE #122 - COUNTY PAYMENT TO CONTRACTOR

A. Upon Contract execution, the County will issue a Notice to Proceed (NTP) and a Purchase Order (PO) to the Contractor. The terms of this Contract shall be incorporated by reference into a PO issued prior to the expiration or termination of this Contract. The County will issue the NTP and PO by electronic mail (e-mail) to the Contractor's representative in ARTICLE #103 – NOTICES.

The Contractor shall not deliver any Services, equipment, devices, or components thereof until authorized in writing by the County. Any work including, but not limited to, travel, preliminary meetings, planning, etc. performed outside of the terms and conditions of and before the issuance of a NTP will not be considered for payment. Contractors are not to begin work or ship any product on any verbal communication from the County. The County will not be liable for payment for any work or product with the issuance of a verbal communication.

The Scope of Services shall remain in effect from the NTP date to substantial completion of the project. The Parties agree that the County will not pay or otherwise compensate the Contractor for any services, materials, equipment, devices, or components thereof outside of the Scope of Work and/or beyond the term of this Contract, unless specifically authorized in writing as evidenced by an amendment pursuant to ARTICLE #106 — CONTRACT AMENDMENTS AND MODIFICATION, a time extension letter, or as otherwise authorized by the County.

B. Invoice/Payment

- Contractor shall invoice the County via email each month sent solely to accountspayable@hallcounty.org and only after the County inspects and accepts the Services provided. Receipt of the Services and/or materials do not constitute acceptance. Invoice amounts shall not exceed the Contractor's pricing set forth in Exhibit C – Cost Proposal Worksheet.
- Each properly prepared invoice must be sent in accordance with the instructions listed on the PO. Each invoice shall include the Contractor's current "Remit to" address, a description of the Services provided, the invoice amount, the Contract number, and the associated PO number issued.
- 3. Standard payment terms are net 30 days (N30) in arrears from the date the invoice is accepted. The County does not pay for services not yet received but only in arrears except by written acceptance of pre-payment or deposit.
- 4. The Contractor shall be solely responsible for paying all costs, expenses, and charges it incurs in connection with its performance under the Contract.
- 5. Contractor must submit Applications for Payment (Pay Apps) in accordance with the conditions of the Contract.
- 6. If monthly progress payments are agreed upon, then County will make such payments upon inspection of services completed by the County's Project Manager. Additionally, the County may employ Engineers of Record.
- 7. Prior to substantial completion, progress payments in an amount equal to 95% of the value of the work completed and 95% percent of the value of materials and equipment not incorporated in the work but delivered and suitably stored, in each case, the aggregate of payments previously made.
- 8. Retainage payments shall be paid by County after final acceptance of work.

C. Unsatisfactory Performance/Delay of Payment

- If the County determines that the quality of the Services provided are deficient, unacceptable, or unsatisfactory the County's Project Manager identified in ARTICLE #103 NOTICES shall issue a written Notice to Cure to Contractor. Contractor agrees that upon receipt of the written Notice to Cure it shall make every effort to correct the deficiency or deficiencies within the timeframe prescribed therein. If the Contractor fails to timely correct the deficiency or deficiencies, the County reserves the right to delay or deny payment pursuant to this ARTICLE or terminate the Contract pursuant to ARTICLE #108 TERMINATION PROVISIONS.
- 2. Delay of Payment Due to Contractor's Failure. If the County determines that the Contractor has failed to perform or deliver any Services as required by the Contract, the Contractor shall not be entitled to any compensation under the Contract until such Services are delivered and accepted. In this event, the County may withhold that portion of the Contractor's compensation, which represents payment for Services that were not delivered. To the extent that the Contractor's failure to perform or deliver in a timely manner causes the County to incur costs, the County may deduct the amount of such incurred costs as liquidated damages from any amounts payable to Contractor. The County's authority to deduct such incurred costs shall not in any way affect the County's authority to terminate the Contract.

- D. Set-Off Against Sums Owed by the Contractor. If the Contractor owes the County any sum under the terms of this Contract, pursuant to any judgment or pursuant to any law, the County may set off the sum owed by the Contractor against any sum owed to the Contractor, in the County's sole discretion.
- E. **Final Payment.** Contractor shall issue an invoice for final payment to the County no later than thirty (30) days following the expiration or termination date of the Contract.
- F. The Contractor must not factor or assign payments to another entity or a financial institution. The County will only pay the Party with whom it is contracted. The County will not under any circumstances pay a third party.

ARTICLE #123 - PERFORMANCE AND PAYMENT BONDS

The Contractor must furnish to the County both a performance and payment bond, both equal to one hundred percent (100%) of the Contract's total award dollar amount. The County will only issue a Notice to Proceed after the bonds are received. Only surety companies licensed to do business in the State of Georgia are acceptable. The Contractor must provide all required bonding instruments to the County prior to the commencement of any work. The County will consider any work done prior to the receipt of bonding instruments as null and void and thus not eligible for compensation.

ARTICLE #124 - RETAINAGE

The County may retain and withhold funds from compensation in compliance with Georgia law. The County may hold up to five percent (5%) retainage throughout the entire project and will release said retainage at the point of completion and final acceptance by the County.

ARTICLE #125 - VENUE AND GOVERNING LAW

The Parties agree that this Contract shall be interpreted, construed, and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Georgia. Should either party bring a legal suit to enforce the terms of this Contract, including suit in equity, the Parties agree and consent to file any such suit in the Superior Court of Hall County, Georgia.

ARTICLE #126 - NOTICE OF INTENT TO LITIGATE

Contractor hereby agrees not to file any civil action of disputes or claims relating to the Contract except after first giving thirty (30) days written notice to the County of the claim and the intent to initiate a civil action.

ARTICLE #127 - GEORGIA SECURITY AND IMMIGRATION COMPLIANCE ACT (E-Verify)

A. By signing this Contract, the Contractor certifies that prior to and throughout the performance of all applicable work under this Contract it will remain in full compliance with all federal and state immigration laws including, but not limited to, 8 U.S.C. § 1324a and the Georgia Security and Immigration Compliance Act (O.C.G.A. §13-10-90 et seq.), as amended by the Illegal Immigration Reform and Enforcement Act of 2011 regarding the verification of employment eligibility of employees under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986. Contractor will ensure that only persons who are citizens or nationals of the United States or non-citizens authorized under federal immigration laws are employed to perform services under this Contract or any subcontract or sub-subcontract hereunder.

B. Contractor further certifies its compliance with the aforementioned federal and state immigration laws set forth by signing a sworn affidavit, the Georgia Security and Immigration Compliance Act Affidavit (herein known as *Exhibit E – E-Verify Affidavit*), notarized by an Official Notary Public and incorporated herein by reference providing services pursuant to this Contract.

ARTICLE #128 - ORDER OF PRECEDENCE

In the event of any inconsistency, ambiguity, or conflict among the specific provisions of the Contract and the Contractor's response, the order of precedence shall be as follows:

- 1. Any amendments to the Contract, including all exhibits thereto.
- 2. The Contract itself, including all exhibits thereto.
- 3. Attachments appended to the Contract.
- 4. All other Contract attachments appended to the Contract.

ARTICLE #129 - CONTRACT EXHIBITS AND ATTACHMENTS

The Parties mutually acknowledge that all exhibits and attachments listed below made a part of this Contract, as though expressly written in the solicitation documents and the Bidder's response, are herein incorporated into this Contract by reference.

ARTICLE #130 - SALES TAX EXEMPTION STATUS

The County is exempt from State of Georgia Local Sales and Use Tax. The Bidder understands and acknowledges that it is responsible for any sales and use tax it may incur. The Bidder will not charge the County any sales and use tax as a separate line item. The Contractor may request a copy of the County's Georgia Sales and Use Tax Exemption Certificate.

ARTICLE #131 - HOLD HARMLESS AGREEMENT

The successful respondent hereby agrees to indemnify, hold free and harmless Hall County Government, County Commissioners, its agents, servants, employees, officers, directors, elected officials, or any other person(s) against any loss or expense. This includes attorney fees because of any liability imposed by law upon the County, except in cases of the County's sole negligence, sustained by any person(s) on account of bodily injury or property damage arising out of or in the consequence of this Contract.

ARTICLE #132 - NOT A JOINT VENTURE

The County shall not be bound by any terms and conditions included in any Contractor packaging, invoice, catalog, brochure, technical data sheet, on-line representation, warranties or service level agreement, or other document which attempts to impose any condition in variance with or in the addition to the terms and conditions contained herein.

ARTICLE #133 - CONTRACT TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- 1. All purchases must comply with the Official Code of Hall County Sections 3.10.010 3.10.190.
- 2. If any conflict or ambiguity arises between the terms and conditions herein and the Official Code of Hall County, the latter will govern.
- 3. The terms and conditions set forth herein shall supersede and govern over all Contractor's terms and conditions or service level agreements.

- 4. The County retains the right to "red line" sections of the Contractor's terms and conditions if such are in conflict with the best interest of the County.
- 5. Acceptance of a Purchase Order ("PO") and delivery of goods or services serves as the Supplier's full and complete acceptance of the County's terms and conditions.
- 6. The terms "supplier", "vendor", "bidder", "offeror", "Contractor", "designer", "distributor", "dealer" or "manufacturer" or otherwise purveyor or source of supply or performance of service shall mean one and the same, herein denoted as "supplier" for goods and "Contractor" for services.
- 7. The terms "goods", "materials", "commodities", "components", "drawings", "drafts", "renderings", "plans" (physical or digital), software, SaaS, capital asset equipment, vehicles, heavy earth-moving or other equipment (purchased or leased), or other such deliverables are herein denoted as "goods" and shall mean one and the same.
- 8. "Services" shall mean all services, either financial, advisory, consultative, labor, staff augmentation, construction, rehabilitation, restoration, repair, support or maintenance, communication, telephony, internet, TV or streaming, pest control, grounds maintenance, custodial and janitorial, street or paved surfaces cleaning, drain cleaning, or otherwise where services are offered for consideration.
- 9. The Supplier shall transfer and deliver all goods or services described on the respective PO for the consideration set forth herein.
- 10. The Supplier shall only deliver goods and services as described on the respective PO and within the Scope of Work and the Supplier's bid response.
- 11. The County holds no obligation to pay for goods delivered or services rendered unless specified on a written PO or a Change Order of such.
- 12. The Supplier shall not construe any verbal consent to purchase goods or services as valid.
- 13. The County does not accept substitutions of services or goods that do not comply with the Scope of Work or specifications set forth in the PO, Contract, or Agreement, unless mutually agreed in writing by both Parties.
- 14. The County does not accept automatic contract renewals except for monthly subscription services.
- 15. The County does not pay deposits towards goods ordered. Exceptions exist for custom made items such as window treatments, floor coverings, pre-mixed paints and stains, fabrication, decoration, or otherwise custom designed products specifically for the County.
- 16. The County will accept backorders only if goods are out of stock and with prior written notice. Suppliers shall ship all quantities that it has in stock and hold orders for backorders.
- 17. The County participates in cooperative purchasing agreements, State of Georgia Statewide Contracts, and other state and local intergovernmental agreements, memoranda of understanding and other such agreements.
- 18. In all cases, the jurisdiction shall be the State of Georgia, County of Hall, for arbitration or other legalities.
- 19. Deliveries go to the ship-to addresses listed on the PO and within the time specified. The Supplier must follow instructions if multiple ship-to addresses exist on the PO.
- 20. The County shall have the right to inspect all goods or services at the time and place of delivery. The risk of loss of goods shall pass to the County upon completion and final acceptance of the project delivery.
- 21. Title to the goods shall remain with the Supplier until acceptance by the County. Receipt of goods or services does not constitute acceptance.
- 22. The Supplier warrants that goods are merchantable, and the Supplier has a legal right to deliver the goods and services and as described herein.
- 23. Contractor agrees not to assign, in full or in part, this Contract to another party without the County's expressed written consent. Any attempted assignment or delegation shall void and make ineffectual this Contract for all intents and purposes.

- 24. The County is exempt from Federal Excise Tax and Georgia Sales and Use Tax.
- 25. This issuance of a PO shall not violate the Code of Ethics and Conflicts of Interest for Public Officers and Employees for Government Service set forth in the 2020 Section 45-1020 *et seq.* of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated and the Official Code of Hall County Section 3.10.070 governing Ethics.
- 26. All goods and services supplied pursuant to a PO shall, unless otherwise stated, conform exactly to all the descriptions, specifications, exhibits, and attachments contained in the bid solicitation upon which a PO is based, and all the terms, conditions, and specifications of the bid solicitation are incorporated herein by reference and made a part hereof.
- 27. All media production, recordings, videos, photography, artwork, plates, engravings, and other printed or digital media materials paid for in full by the County are considered County property and shall be delivered to the County upon request.
- 28. If a PO has an attached Contract or Agreement, the terms and conditions of the latter shall govern in the event of any conflict with these terms and conditions.
- 29. The Supplier may be suspended, terminated, or debarred if it is determined that the Supplier has made false certification(s) or has violated such certification(s) by failure to carry out the requirements herein. Thus, the Supplier certifies that it and its sub-Contractors have not been debarred, suspended, or declared ineligible by any agency of the County, State of Georgia, or as defined in the Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) 48 C.F.R. Ch. 1 Subpart 9.4.
- 30. The Supplier certifies that it is not currently engaged in an active or pending lawsuit or other grievance, injunction, or levy against the County.
- 31. Goods are Free-On-Board (F.O.B.) destination and freight. Shipping and delivery shall be prepaid and added to the invoice as a separate line item. The Supplier shall charge the County the exact amount of freight, delivery, handling, and insurance charges the Supplier incurs.
- 32. The County does not pay late fees nor interest charges.
- 33. The County is not bound to any minimum or maximum quantity or dollar amount set by the Supplier.
- 34. In the event there is a discrepancy between the unit price and extended price, the unit price shall govern.
- 35. The Supplier certifies that it is not currently engaged in an active or pending lawsuit or other grievance, injunction, or levy against the County.
- 36. Goods are Free-On-Board (F.O.B.) destination unless otherwise denoted. Freight, shipping, and delivery shall be pre-paid and added to the invoice as a separate line item.
- 37. The County does not pay late fees nor interest charges.
- 38. The Supplier shall charge the County the exact amount of freight, delivery, handling, and insurance charges the Supplier incurs.
- 39. The County is not bound to any minimum or maximum quantity or dollar amount set by the Supplier.
- 40. In the event there is a discrepancy between the unit price and extended price, the unit price shall govern.
- 41. Any changes to a PO in quantity or dollar amount require a written change order issued by the County.

60654 ("COMPANY").

- 1.1 WHEREAS, the Customer requests Company to deliver services related to the accuracy of their tax roll and primary residence based homesteads/exemptions/credits/deductions ("Services").
- 1.2 WHEREAS, the Services will assist the Customer in fulfilling its statutory obligations under the state tax code;
- 1.3 WHEREAS, Company agrees to provide Services for the Customer under the terms of this Agreement;
- 1.4 WHEREAS, Company will provide said Services in exchange for the annual fee established in this contract

- 1.7 The Customer agrees to make available requested electronic versions of the most recent tax roll data, previous audit details where applicable, and exemption application forms where applicable, for the calendar years for which the Services to be performed are applicable. Such information will be provided within the law.
- 1.8 Company will provide its Services under state and local regulations that govern this Agreement. Subject to the terms hereof, Company will provide Customer with reasonable technical support services under Company's standard practice. The Company's standard practice is available at www.trueroll.io/terms or in writing upon request.

2. RESTRICTIONS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

2.1 The Customer will not, directly or indirectly: reverse engineer, decompile, disassemble or otherwise attempt to discover the source code, object code or underlying structure, ideas, knowhow or algorithms relevant to the Services or any software, documentation or data related to the Services; modify, translate, or create derivative works based on the Services or any software (except to the extent permitted by Company or authorized within the Services). If in the course of providing the Services Company receives any feedback from the Customer relating to the Services ("Customer Feedback"), Company is free to use such Customer Feedback. The Customer hereby assigns and agrees to assign all of its rights in the Customer Feedback to Company, without any right to compensation.

- 2.2 The Customer represents, covenants, and warrants that the Customer will use the Services only in compliance with Company's standard published policies located at https://www.trueroll.io/service-use-policy then in effect (the "Policy"), provided that the Policy is presented to the Customer, and all applicable laws and regulations. Although Company has no obligation to monitor the Customer's use of the Services, Company may do so and may prohibit any use of the Services it believes may be (or alleged to be) in violation of the foregoing.
- 2.3 The Customer will obtain and maintain any equipment and ancillary services needed to connect to, access or otherwise use the Services, including, without limitation, modems, hardware, servers, software, operating systems, networking, web servers (collectively, "Equipment"). The Customer will also maintain the security of the Equipment, the Customer account, passwords (including but not limited to administrative and user passwords) and files, and be responsible for all uses of the Customer account or the Equipment with or without the Customer's knowledge or consent.

CONFIDENTIALITY; PROPRIETARY RIGHTS

3.1 During the normal course of business, either party may disclose or make available information about its business affairs, products, confidential intellectual property, trade secrets, third-party confidential information, and other sensitive or proprietary information to each other, whether orally or in written, electronic, or other form or media/in written or electronic form or media, whether or not marked, designated, or otherwise identified as "confidential" (collectively, "Proprietary Information"). Proprietary Information of Company includes non-public information regarding features, functionality and performance of the Service. Proprietary Information of the Customer includes non-public data and other content, in any form or medium, provided by the Customer to Company to enable the provision of the Services, but that is not provided, collected or generated by Company ("Customer Data"). Proprietary Information does not include information that, at the time of disclosure is: (a) in the public domain; (b) known to the receiving party at the time of disclosure; (c) rightfully obtained by the receiving party on a non-confidential basis from a third party; or (d) independently developed by the receiving party. The receiving party shall not disclose the disclosing party's Proprietary Information to any person or entity, except to the receiving party's employees who have a need to know the Proprietary Information for the receiving party to exercise its rights or perform its obligations hereunder. Notwithstanding the foregoing, each party may disclose Confidential Information to the limited extent required (i) in order to comply with the order of a court or other governmental body, or as otherwise necessary to comply with applicable law (e.g., public record laws, freedom of information laws, etc); or (ii) to establish a party's rights under this Agreement, including to make required court filings. On the expiration or termination of the Agreement, upon written request the receiving party shall promptly return to the disclosing party all copies, whether in written, electronic, or other form or media, of the disclosing party's Proprietary Information, or destroy all such copies and certify in writing to the disclosing party that such Proprietary Information has been destroyed. However, the receiving party can retain Proprietary Information to the extent contained in deleted emails and electronic documents which are archived by or on behalf of the receiving party consistent with the receiving party's

standard archival processes but which, in the ordinary course of operations, are not accessible by the individuals who created or received such emails or documents. Each party's obligations of non-disclosure with regard to Proprietary Information are effective as of the Effective Date and will expire 5 years from the date first disclosed to the receiving party.

- 3.2 The Customer grants to Company the right to use Customer Data to the fullest extent necessary or useful for Company to perform Services offered by the Company, enforce this Agreement, and exercise Company's rights as stated herein. Company owns all Service Data. "Service Data". Service Data is defined as information and data that Company derives or aggregates from (a) Company's performance of the Services and operation of its software, all improvements, enhancements or modifications thereto, (b) any software, applications, inventions or other technology developed in connection with the implementation of the Services or support, (c) all intellectual property rights related to any of the foregoing, and (d) any data that is equivalent to, based on, or derived from the Customer Data and has been provided to the Customer as part of the Services.
- 3.3 Notwithstanding anything to the contrary, Company has the right to collect and analyze data and other information relating to the provision, use and performance of various aspects of the Services and related systems and technologies (including, without limitation, information concerning Customer Data and data derived therefrom), and Company will be free (during and after the term hereof) to (i) use such information and data to improve and enhance the Services and for other development, diagnostic and corrective purposes in connection with the Services and other Company offerings, and (ii) disclose such data solely in aggregate or other deidentified form in connection with its business. No rights or licenses are granted except as expressly set forth herein including the resale of the Customer's data granted to Company by the Customer which is expressly prohibited.

4. PAYMENT OF FEES

- 4.1 The Customer will pay Company the fees described in this contract or the applicable Proposal for the Services in accordance with the terms therein (the "Fees"). Company reserves the right to change the Fees or applicable charges and to institute new charges and Fees at the end of the Initial Term or then current renewal term, upon 30 days prior notice to the Customer (which may be sent by email). If the Customer believes that Company has billed the Customer incorrectly, the Customer must contact Company no later than 60 days after the closing date on the first billing statement in which the alleged error or problem appeared, in order to receive an adjustment or credit. Inquiries should be directed to Company's customer support department.
- 4.2 Company will bill through an annual invoice unless otherwise requested by customer, in which case, full payment for invoices issued in any given year must be received by Company 30 days after the mailing date of the invoice. If the Customer fails to make any undisputed payment when due, without limiting Company's other rights and remedies: (i) Company may charge interest on the past due amount at the rate of 1.5% per month calculated daily and compounded monthly or, if lower, the highest rate permitted under applicable law; (ii) the Customer will reimburse all expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees, incurred by Company to collect any undisputed, unpaid Fees owed by the Customer and (iii) if such failure

continues for 10 days or more, Company may terminate the contract under which the Fees are unpaid, terminate all Services, or suspend its performance of Services until the Customer pays the undisputed Fees in full. The Customer shall be responsible for all taxes associated with Services other than U.S. taxes based on Company's net income.

4.3 Company's goal is to provide the Customer with a value of at least equal to the Fee as provided in Section 4.1. for the Initial Term. If the value provided by the Services in the form of the total of both the back taxes collected and the assessed value added to the tax roll (collectively called "Total Revenue Value Received") that the Services help to discover is less than the Fee for the Initial Term, Company will refund the difference between the paid Fee and the Total Revenue Value Received after the Initial Term. In order to qualify for a refund, the Customer must, within 30 days of the end of the Initial Term submit proof that the Customer did apply Company's Services correctly and that the value added to the tax roll is less than the Fees paid for the Term and the back taxes on all discovered historically unqualified exemptions was attempted to be recovered to the full extent of the state's laws. All refunds are discretionary as determined by Company. To further clarify, Company will not provide refunds for requests made after the 30 day refund period from the end of the Initial Term and all Fee payments must be made on a timely basis.

5. TERM AND TERMINATION

- 5.1 The initial term of this Agreement commences as of the Effective Date. Unless terminated earlier pursuant any of the Agreement's express provisions, the term will continue in effect until one (1) year from such date (the "Initial Term"). This Agreement will automatically renew for additional successive one (1) year terms for up to a total of four (4) renewal terms unless earlier terminated pursuant to this Agreement's express provisions or either party gives the other party written notice of non-renewal at least [30] days prior to the expiration of the then-current term (together with the Initial Term, the "**Term**"). Each successive year renewal price increase shall be no greater than 5% of the previous year's fee. The Customer shall be notified in writing at least thirty (30) days prior to the end of the service Term should the price increase be greater than 5%.
- 5.2 In addition to any other remedies it may have, either party may terminate this Agreement upon a material breach of this Agreement by the other party (a) immediately, upon written notice to the other party, if the breach is non-remediable, or (b) 30 days after giving written notice to the other party if the other party has failed to cure a remediable breach or provide a written plan of cure reasonably acceptable to the non-breaching party.
- 5.3 Upon termination of this Agreement, Customer access to the Services will be immediately discontinued. The Company will securely archive all data associated with the Customer, including data provided by the Customer ("Customer Provided Data"), data generated or derived

through the Services ("Derived Data"), and data entered by end-users ("Customer Entered Application Data," such as notes entered into the application by Customer end-users). The archived data will be encrypted and retained in compliance with all applicable state-mandated record retention requirements.

- 5.4 This Agreement will remain active from the Effective Date until the date on which the Term between the parties expires or is terminated. Upon expiration or termination of the Agreement, the Customer will pay all due and unpaid Fees without further notice.
- 5.5 The rights and obligations of the parties set forth in this Section and in Sections which by their nature should survive termination will survive termination, including, without limitation, accrued rights to payment, confidentiality obligations, warranty disclaimers, indemnification and limitations of liability.

6. LIMITED WARRANTY AND DISCLAIMER

Company shall use reasonable efforts consistent with prevailing industry standards to maintain the Services in a manner which minimizes errors and interruptions in the Services. Services may be temporarily unavailable for scheduled maintenance or for unscheduled emergency maintenance, either by Company or by third-party providers, or because of other causes beyond Company's reasonable control, but Company shall use reasonable efforts to provide advance notice in writing or by e-mail of any scheduled service disruption. HOWEVER, COMPANY DOES NOT WARRANT THAT THE SERVICES WILL BE UNINTERRUPTED OR ERROR FREE; NOR DOES IT MAKE ANY WARRANTY AS TO THE RESULTS THAT MAY BE OBTAINED FROM USE OF THE SERVICES. EXCEPT AS EXPRESSLY SET FORTH IN THIS SECTION, THE SERVICES AND IMPLEMENTATION SERVICES ARE PROVIDED "AS IS" AND COMPANY DISCLAIMS ALL WARRANTIES, EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, INCLUDING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO, IMPLIED WARRANTIES OF MERCHANTABILITY AND FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE AND NON-INFRINGEMENT OF INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS, COURSE OF PERFORMANCE, COURSE OF DEALING AND USAGE OF TRADE.

7. INDEMNITY

- 7.1 Each party (the **"Indemnifying Party"**) shall defend and indemnify the other party (the **"Indemnified Party"**) only to the extent permitted by law from and against any damages, liabilities, losses, and costs, including reasonable attorney's fees (collectively, **"Losses"**) incurred by the Indemnified Party arising out of claims asserted by a third party against the Indemnified Party to the extent that the Losses are caused by the Indemnifying Party's breach of any of its obligations under this Agreement.
- 7.2 Company shall hold the Customer harmless from and against any Losses against out of any claim brought against the Customer for direct infringement by the Service of any United States intellectual property right existing as of the Effective Date; provided, Company is promptly notified of any and all threats, claims and proceedings related thereto and given reasonable assistance and the opportunity to assume sole control over defense and settlement; and further provided that such obligation will not apply to the extent any infringement arises

from (a) any use of the Services in a manner not authorized by this Agreement or Company, or (b) Company's modification of the Services as instructed by Customer. If a court makes a final, non-appealable determination that the Services are infringing, then Company will, at its expense: (y) modify the Services to be non-infringing without materially affecting Company's obligations to the Customer under this Agreement, or (z) obtain for the Customer a license to continue using the Services. If neither of the foregoing is commercially practicable, Company may terminate this Agreement and the Customer's rights hereunder and provide the Customer a refund of any prepaid, unused fees for the Service. This Section sets forth the Customer's sole and exclusive remedies for any claim of infringement related to the Services under this Agreement.

- (i) GOVERNING LAW. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Georgia without regard to its conflict of law provisions.
- (k) DISPUTE RESOLUTION. All disputes relating to the interpretation of this Agreement or the rights of the parties hereunder will be exclusively settled by arbitration administered by the American Arbitration Association ("AAA") under its Commercial Arbitration Rules; provided, however, the parties are not barred from seeking appeal within the AAA.
