# Preface

In the autumn of 1982 I met Leo Hurwitz for the first time. His film DIALOGUE WITH A WOMAN DEPARTED had its première in Stockholm and at the same time the Cinemateque at the Swedish Film Institute presented a retrospective of his most important films.

At that time I was in the final editing stage of my film COURAGE TO LIVE, and I only left the editing room to go to the showings of Leo Hurwitz' films. Seeing them was something like a revelation for me. They gave me a lot of inspiration. This was something quite new and refreshing in the field of documentary film making.

I was also lucky enough to meet Leo Hurwitz personally and to invite him to my editing room. We had long talks about film and art – but also about trees and love, and about death and renewing life, both in reality and in film.

In the winter of 1986 I invited Leo Hurwitz to Stockholm to give a seminar at the Dramatic Institute under the title "Film and Art". A second seminar under this title was given in the summer of 1987. This gave me an even deeper possibility to listen to and to understand Leo's thoughts about film as a unique expression of art.

From that time on I had the idea at the back of my mind of making a film about Leo, to

In March 1990 I succeeded in doing so. I went to New York with the film photographer Maria Brännström and spent a week together with Leo in his apartment in Manhattan, talking, filming, listening to music, filming...

I think some angels sent us there at this very time, because just a few weeks after our visit it was found that Leo was seriously ill and we would not have been able to do it later.

When I returned home I discovered that there was more interesting material with Leo telling about his films and his work than I could ever use in a film about him. So the idea arose of making a "Leo Hurwitz Collection", where his films would be collected on video cassettes and commented on by him. This would give him the opportunity to talk more extensively about his work and thoughts and in direct connection to the films.

I went back to New York, this time with Ulf Berggren, and put the idea to Leo. We discussed it for a whole week and Leo gave the project his full support and was quite happy about it. Even if he was very weak at that time he saw to it that copies of all his films were sent to Sweden for transferring onto video. He also gave me a booklet of poems and drawings, some of which I present here.

That occasion – in October 1990 – was the last time I saw Leo. He died in January 1991.


And now, in presenting this "Leo Hurwitz Collection" I am both grateful and happy to do so. Grateful that I have had the opportunity to meet Leo – and to film him. And happy that I

can now pass this on to others – the opportunity of meeting with one of the very best, one of the most alive in this hard field of film making.

I also want to express my thanks to my collaborator in the editing, Lena Westerberg, who has been at my side during long and patient work.

# Biography

Leo Tolstoy Hurwitz was born in Brooklyn, New York in 1909 as the youngest of eight children, his parents being Russian immigrants.

He became interested in making films during his studies at Harvard College, from which he graduated in 1930.

He returned to New York during the Depression. He earned a living as still photographer, free-lance writer, editor, book reviewer and seized every opportunity to make films. One such opportunity was a group of photographers and film makers called The Film and Photo League. Leo Hurwitz joined the group and started documenting the times in newsreels and films like the hunger march (in HUNGER 1932) and the Scottsboro case (in SCOTTSBORO 1933).

In 1934 Leo Hurwitz, together with Ralph Steiner and a few others, founded a production coop called NYKino. Others joined, among them Henri Cartier-Bresson and Paul Strand. Hurwitz, Steiner and Strand worked as cameramen for Pare Lorentz on THE PLOW THAT BROKE THE PLAINS for the US Resettlement Administration.

Together with Strand, and others from NYKino, Hurwitz founded Frontier Films, the first independent (non-profit) company in America to produce documentary films and to explore the aesthetic boundaries of the medium. The life of Frontier Films was six years, 1936-1942. Some of its productions include: HEART OF SPAIN, CHINA STRIKES BACK and NATIVE LAND. The outbreak of World War II and the difficulty of distribution brought about its end.

During the war Leo Hurwitz wrote scripts for the Committee of InterAmerican Affairs and the Office of War Information and edited a film for the Navy, shot by Paul Strand, TOMORROW WE FLY. For a "brief spell", as he once described it, Leo Hurwitz was also under contract as writer-director to David O. Selznick in California.

During the early experimental years of television Leo Hurwitz was working as producer-director for CBS Television and as Chief of the News and Special Events Department he developed the format for CBS-TV News programs. He left CBS to produce STRANGE VICTORY. After that, which was during the McCarthy period, Leo Hurwitz was black-listed and his career in television was halted.

For some time though he was working for the United Nations, serving as Director of Film Production and producing eight films in the series THIS IS THE UNITED NATIONS.

Together with the cameraman Fons Ianelli he made the first two films in the "cinéma vérité" technique – EMERGENCY WARD and THE YOUNG FIGHTER – working with a handheld sync camera and a tape recorder.

He was also involved in the production of Biberman's SALT OF THE EARTH.

In 1956, with the support of Film Polski, he and Peggy Lawson made THE MUSEUM AND THE FURY about the German concentration camps and in 1960 he went to Israel and as the only reporter was allowed to cover the Eichmann trial for American, British and German television.

He was one of the founders of the Screen Directors International Guild and later he and six colleagues brought suit against the Screen Directors Guild of America when the SDIG merged with the DGA, forcing the DGA to remove the loyalty oath from its membership application.

But it was not until 1964 that Hurwitz was officially accepted to work for American television again – on a film about the death of John F. Kennedy called ESSAY ON DEATH, which was also the start of his cooperation with Manny Kirchheimer. They continued to make films for National Educational Television, THE SUN AND RICHARD LIPPOLD and IN SEARCH OF HART CRANE. For the American Federation of Arts, Leo Hurwitz and Peggy Lawson made four films under the common title THE ART OF SEEING.

In 1969 Leo Hurwitz was invited to be Chairman of the Graduate Institute of Film and Television, New York University and served as Head of the Institute and Professor of Film until he retired in 1974.


During his last two years at the Graduate Institute he began working on his magnum opus DIALOGUE WITH A WOMAN DEPARTED, a work which was completed in 1980 and awarded the International Film Critics' Prize

at the Berlin Film Festival in 1981.

He participated at a number of retrospective screenings of his films during the seventies and eighties in both the USA and in Europe.

Leo Hurwitz was married three times: first to Jane Dudley (by whom he had a son, Tom, who has also become a film maker), later to Peggy Lawson and finally to Nelly Burlingham.

He died in Manhattan, New York in 1991, while still working on a script for a feature film on the life of John Brown.
