Materials

SPAN 2002 uses *Ahora en Contexto*, the UWG SPAN 2002 Textbook. This is an in-house, open-access textbook created by professors at the University of West Georgia with the aid of a grant from Affordable Learning Georgia. The textbook is available as a PDF under

the Content tab in CourseDen. Additionally, there is an accessible PDF textbook and an accessible DOC textbook. If you need to print the textbook, we recommend you print from the regular PDF text.

We will make extensive use of the textbook throughout the course. I strongly recommend that you print out the textbook at the beginning of the semester, or that you print out the relevant pages as we move through the course. You may print the textbook however you see fit.

Print Services at UWG (previously called Pub & Print) offers several options for gaining access to a printed copy of the textbook. In order to purchase a printed copy of the textbook from Print Services, navigate to printstore.westga.edu. There are additional instructions on CourseDen.

You may order the textbook at any time throughout the semester, pending availability from Print Services. At checkout, you may choose to pick up your materials at Print Services or have them shipped to you.

CourseDen Materials

We will make videos, activities, assignments, exams, etc. available on CourseDen throughout the semester.

To use the materials on CourseDen, you need to be able to access the internet, open a PDF file (the textbook), play videos within CourseDen from YouTube and Video Note, complete online activities using the Quizzes feature of CourseDen, and upload brief videos and/or voice recordings to CourseDen.

- have the grammatical and cultural skills to be able to negotiate Spanish in all major time frames;
- give descriptions of objects, people, and places as well as to express feelings and opinions;
- speak and write about real and hypothetical circumstances;
- recognize and make informed judgments about the fine, literary, or performing arts from various Hispanic cultures.

You will also be able to use the language to:

- converse about situations in the past, present, and future;
- discuss daily activities, likes and dislikes;
- give advice and suggest group activities;
- express hope and desire as well as judgment and feelings;
- understand narration;
- read short essays and narratives and understand the main points of the texts;
- write compositions appropriate to the course content;
- have a basic knowledge of Hispanic cultural facts and vocabulary concerning technology, banking and finance, art and culture, the body and health, journalism and mass communications, as well as the legal and judicial systems in the Spanish speaking world.

Midterm	12.5%	Chapters 1-3 (cumulative)	<p>The midterm exam will give you the opportunity to demonstrate the knowledge and skills you have developed in the first three chapters.</p> <p>You will complete the midterm exam online via CourseDen. You will be able to access the exam during a 48 hour period. Once you open/begin the exam, you will have a maximum number of minutes to complete it prior to the close of the exam window. Do not open or begin an exam unless you plan to complete it at that time. I will not accept any late exams except under rare and unusual circumstances as determined by me. Please contact me immediately and early if you know beforehand that you will not be able to complete it. Final	12.5%	Chapters 1-5 (cumulative)	<p>The final exam will give you the opportunity to demonstrate the knowledge and skills that you have developed throughout the course. You will complete the final exam online via CourseDen in accordance with University policies as publicized on the Scoop. I will provide detailed instructions for completing the final exam at least two weeks prior to Final Exams week. I will not accept any late final exams except under rare and unusual circumstances as determined by me. Compositions (2)	14% (7% each)		<p>The compositions will give you the opportunity to demonstrate the written Spanish skills that you have developed at two points in the semester. They will allow you to creatively use the vocabulary and grammar that we have studied.</p> <p>Your instructor will provide instructions a minimum of one week before the due date of each composition. You will submit compositions via Assignments in CourseDen.</p> <p>I will not accept any late compositions except under rare and unusual circumstances as determined by me.</p> <p>For the compositions, the following non-exhaustive list of actions constitute cheating and may lead to a grade of 0% on a composition:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> --completing any part of the composition with the help of another person --using an online dictionary or translator for all or part of the composition --using grammatical constructions that are clearly more advanced than SPAN 1001-2001. <p>If I notice signs that you may have cheated, I will assign you a grade of a 0% on the exam. If you choose to contest the grade and prove there was no cheating, you will have a maximum of 5 calendar days to contact me by email (yfuentes westga.edu) to set up an appointment to discuss the exam.</p>
Oral exam	9%		<p>The oral exam will give you the opportunity to demonstrate the Spanish speaking skills that you have developed over the course of the semester.</p> <p>Your instructor will provide information regarding the format of the oral exam at least two weeks prior to the exam.</p>

Participation, preparation, and engagement	10%		In a face to face class attendance is mandatory and necessary and counts as part of the participation, preparation and engagement component of the overall final grade. In all classes and modalities, solid preparation, active participation and meaningful engagement are essential elements, and each will be evaluated and assessed on a weekly basis. The scheduled grabaciones and oral practices will count in this area.
Homework and discussions	10%		All activities assigned in CourseDen, as well as the scheduled Discussions will count towards this 10%.
Extracurricular activities (2)	5%		<p>5% of your final grade will be awarded for attending a minimum of two extra or co-curricular activities this semester. Throughout the semester, there will be ample in-person and virtual events that you can attend. These could include going to a tutoring session, watching films as part of the International Film Series, taking part in <i>Noche de juegos</i>, or other weekly activities.</p> <p>To earn credit for your participation in these events, you will be asked to submit a brief well-written paragraph (in English) that explains: 1) what you appreciated about the event, and 2) what you learned about Hispanic culture AND how the event increased your awareness of some aspect of contemporary American culture. These reflections are part of building your intercultural competence, a highly valued skill set by employers!</p>

- (2) have taken SPAN 2002 before and received a grade of D or lower, or
- (3) were placed into SPAN 2002 by taking the Spanish placement exam at the University of West Georgia or for another reason approved by the Program in International Languages & Cultures.
