### click smartly




## ignore offers

Watch out for products that claim to cure coronavirus or guarantee coronavirus prevention. Ignore online offers for vaccinations and home test kits. Scammers are trying to get you to buy products that aren't proven to treat or prevent the Coronavirus (COVID-19) online or in stores. At this time, there also are no FDAauthorized home test kits for the Coronavirus. Visit the FDA to learn more.

# give wisely

Thoroughly research organizations that are claiming to raise money for a coronavirus vaccine or to help victims. Do your homework when it comes to donations, whether through charities or crowdfunding sites. Don't let anyone rush you into making a donation. If someone wants donations in cash, by gift card, or by wiring money, don't do it.





# be patient

Don't respond to texts and emails about federal stimulus funds from the government. Anyone who tells you they can get you the money now is a scammer.
