## about the author-cartoonist

Father Justin McCarthy is a slim, forty-year-old Franciscan friar who cartoons under the friendly by-line father MAC. Soft-spoken possessor of a delightful sense of humor, he brings to the nation's comic pages a new dimension of fun in the person of Brother Juniper.

Born in Boston, Justin McCarthy went to public school and attended Boston College. A budding art career was apparently nipped when he entered the Franciscan Order at the age of twenty. From the start he amused his Franciscan confreres with his "little friar" cartoons. He obtained his degree from St. Bonaventure University and was ordained to the priesthood in 1944.

Three years ago Father McCarthy received ecclesiastical permission to start his "cartoon apostolate." Since then he has been syndicated nationally (daily and Sunday). Brother Juniper is provoking laughter in Europe and South America as well. His devoted followers now number 15,000,000 but that figure rises constantly. And you will easily understand why when you meet Brother Juniper.



## Yes, Virginia, There Is a Brother Juniper

Almost everyone's heard of St. Francis. He's the saint who loved people—and birds, too.

What most people don't know is that the good saint had a real-life follower, name of Brother Juniper, who was the original good-humor man. The little fellow was quicksilver . . . he was sunbeams in burlap. He showed people they could be merry and still save their souls in the process.

St. Francis so admired this brand of sanctity that he used to say, "Would that I had a whole forest of such Junipers." This volume is our humble effort to provide the saint with a grove, if not a forest, of Junipers.

We've simply lifted Brother Juniper, a historic comic, from his thirteenth-century Umbrian context, fattened him up a few pounds, and placed him in a twentieth-century publisher's showcase.

Possibly some readers have already met B. J. on the comic page of the daily newspapers. For those who have not, a few character references might not come amiss. (Let me here confess that I do not know the little fellow really well . . . yet. Hardly a day goes by that he does not surprise me with a personality facet I did not know existed. And there is one faculty he has which baffles me completely: he can open his mouth and say something funny without taking a moment's thought. It takes me months to dream up the same punchline.)

Brother Juniper is a man of parts. At last count he was:

One part Friar Tuck Two parts Victor Moore Three parts George Bungle Four parts Everyman A pinch of Pogo A soupçon of Bishop Sheen

But mostly he's himself: optimistic, bustling (never lets any grass grow under his flagstones), hard-working, helpful, honest (with himself, his fellow man, and his God), genial, mischievous, long on good example if a trifle short on dignity, holy (without ever suspecting it), occasionally wistful, frequently a fall guy, and forever hilarious.

Like Jack Benny, he's a sort of undefeated underdog. If things go well, he's pleased; if they go ill, he's delighted. B. J. is, in a word, "unsinkable"!

For this can we envy him and for this can we honor him, as a lower-case St. Francis from upper Manhattan.

Should you wish to pay him a visit, he's a cinch to find. Always available at the usual intersection, corner of Grace and Main. If you'd like to know him better, I would suggest you approach him as the children do: with a smile. For they are on to his secret. They know he has never ceased to be one of themselves. . . . And of such is the kingdom of Heaven.


