

THE CIVILIZATION OF ANCIENT EGYPT"

ONE of the most fantastic and appealing things about the story "She" is the ancient civilization it describes. Actually, however, the details of this civiliza-



tion are far from the realm of fantasy. They are more nearly a literal description of the civilization of Ancient Egypt.

Among the oldest and vet most advanced civilizations known, ancient Feynt was originally called Kemi-the Black Land Sinister as this sounds, undoubtedly it referred to the rich black soil of the land rather than to any mystery or evil of the times. Actually, the people of this civilization were neither fierce nor cruel, but patient, hard working folk who despised all foreign lands and ways. That they had reason for their contempt, there can be little doubt, for while a great part of the rest of the world was living in superstitious savagery, the Egyptians had built for themselves a culture and a science that is only now being fully appreciated. Their astronomers knew far more than the European star-gazers who followed them by three or four thousand years. In fact, there are many who believe that we are just beginning to learn more of the universe than was known by these

For example, the Great Pyramid, one of the seven wonders of the ancient

early neonle

world, is a remarkable monument to a ancient Egyptian science. It is an amazing fact that the location of the pyramid seems to have been chosen because it is the mathematical center of the land area of the earth How these early people were able to determine this remains one of the great unsolved mysteries of science.

Because, in their religion, the Egyptians believed their dead lived on in earthly bodies, elaborate means of embalming were developed by them. Everyone knows and marvels at the existence, after so many centuries, of well-preserved Egyptian murmies, yet the methods by which they were embalmed represented one of

the most jealously guarded secrets of all time and even today it remains an unsolved mystery. So much of the Ancient Egyptiah culture baffles us, even today, that a whole new branch to science, Egyptology, has sprung up with no other purpose than to unravel the history of their great culture. Much has been learned by our Egyptolecities, yet as each new fact is uncovered
