## IMPORTANT - SUPPORT FOR OUR GREAT SPORT THOUGHTS FROM THE KCT CHAIRMAN - JIM BARTON

In the last two weeks we have become aware of some very disturbing news about the future of the Dewars Centre at Perth and the likelihood of curling at Perth continuing into the future. More recently, feedback from Perth and Kinross Council and Scottish Curling have given some grounds for optimism but the future of curling at Perth seems to be very much in the balance. I know that a lot of Kinross Curlers have contacted P&K Councillors urging support for continued curling at Perth. Kinross Curling will continue to take an active interest as things develop and stand ready to do what we can to support the cause.

The problems at Perth bring into focus how fortunate that we are at Kinross with the great staff team that we have and the fantastic support from our curlers. It's important though that we continue to look where we can make improvements so that we are best placed to operate effectively in what is likely to be an increasingly challenging environment.





### Famous Curling Stone is coming to Kinross.

Dunfermline Curling Club have been in discussion with the Board and a plan has been made to bring this ancient curling stone to be displayed at Kinross. To date it has been homed at Dunfermline Library and Museum. Dunfermline members were eager to find a more suitable home where the stone would have a higher profile

1696 Curling Stone

DUNFERMLINE.—A stone with DM:1696 carved on it. It weighs 66 lbs., and resembles the half of an egg cut long ways. It has an iron handle, run in with lead, is 38 inches in circumference Lengthways, and 30 inches measuring over top and round sole.

Extract from the Curling 2000 - 100 years of curling in Dunfermline and District publication ... this will be the first of a series of articles about the history of our clubs.

Dunfermline CC was founded in 1738. It is uncertain how long the people of Dunfermline had been curling. Records show that the winter of 1738/39 was extremely hard, with frost lasting from November through to February, and the Town Loch was poular with locals for curling and skating. The huge curling stone which used to be set before the chairman at social occasions is dated 1696 and must have taken a giant of a man to hurl.

The earliest available minute of the club is date 1784 when an anniversary dinner took place. There is no record of matches between 1785 and 1794, but the club met each year for a dinner. There is further unaccountable lapse in minutes from 1801 to 1827. In 1827 a meeting agreed to amalgamate with a club that had been instituted in 1777, but which had not met for over 20 years.... tbc

### **Message from the KCT Chairman -** continued from front page



At the start of last season we opened with a virtually completely new team running the rink with Ross as Rink Manager and Duncan as an Ice Technician. In November of 2022 we appointed Angie as Bar Manager and at the start of this season we appointed John as our resident chef. Together with the excellent part-time staff we have the team have been able to provide excellent quality ice and a really super bar and food service. At the start of this season we took the decision to significantly increase the extent and quality of the food that we could provide. Our extended menu, which is displayed on our website and on the tables in the lounge, is available from 11.00 am up to 6.00 pm every weekday and from 09.30 to 17:00 at weekends.

The increase in bar and food offering has, inevitably, required extra resources and staff costs but I am pleased to say that this has been balanced by increased in bar takings. Whilst this is good, we think that the bar has the potential to perform much better - but we need your support to achieve that.

We would like to build on the great club/cafe atmosphere that Angie and the team have developed and we think that knowing that

the bar will be open every day and serving food helps to do that.

So, to help us ensure that the lounge continues to be a vibrant and welcoming place to spend time, here are some things that we would like members to consider;

- think about ordering food (preferably pre-ordering) from time to time for either before or after your game.
- If you are meeting a friend or friends for a coffee or lunch, think about suggesting that you meet at the rink. You could also let friends know that they don't have to be curlers to enjoy our facilities.
- If your club doesn't do this already, think about ordering food before or after club bonspiels. John is very happy to talk to you about menu choices, including providing meals that aren't on the menu. There may also be discounts available if you wish to order a large number of the same meal that is on the menu; again, speak to John or Angie.

We are also planning to run more Saturday evening events. The Burns Night and Whisky tasting on 13<sup>th</sup> January was a great success and very enjoyable evening as was the Skins Event before Christmas. We are planning to hold at least one more event this season, look out for details.

We are also starting to plan for next season. If there is anything that you would like us to consider - something to do more of or less of? Something that we are not doing but could consider? - please let us know by talking to a board or staff member or emailing Angela at office@kinrosscurling,co,uk. Finally, AGM season will be upon us soon. If your club would like free use of the lounge for you AGM please get in touch and we'll see what we can do.

### **Four Nations**

Great to see three local curlers taking part in the Four nations at the Flower Bowl last weekend. Elaine Spain (Kinross ladies) Kim Dalland (Orwell Ladies) and Peter Lang (Forret) joined a 40 strong Scottish team.

Wales made up for their absence from last year's Four Nations by winning all three of their competitions at the Flower Bowl. Their closest match was against Ireland where they retained the Meikle Trophy by 31-30 over the four games. They also retained the Kay Trophy by beating England by 32-23 and regained the Big Bertha curling stone from Scotland by 37-17.

Ireland won their other two competitions, retaining the Turnbull Cup against England by 33-25 and the Marshall Millennium Trophy against Scotland by 31-27.


This left Scotland and England to share the two trophies which they competed for against each other. Scotland regained the Connie Miller Trophy by winning 23-14 and the English men regained the Tom Ballantyne by 50 shots to 29.



#### MEET ONE OF OUR INTERNATIONAL CURLERS

For everyone who doesn't know me so well. My name is Courtney Smith, I'm a registered nurse with a background in paediatrics and mental health. You'll have probably seen me pouring you a drink being the bar at Kinross rink. I grew up in Naseby New Zealand, home to the only dedicated indoor curling rink in the country. My Dad back home is a dedicated outdoor curler, curling every winter for Otago Central Curling Club. Most recently I have been living in Christchurch NZ, only a small five hours drive away from the closest curling rink. I would often be driving back to Naseby for a weekend of training. Despite this I still managed to have an amazing domestic season, winning the NZ Mixed fours, The NZ Mixed Doubles and being selected as 3rd for the New Zealand Women's team. This made me the first ever NZ curler to be representing NZ in all three codes in the international season.

Following the domestic season, I flew out here to Scotland as a part of the New Zealand Overseas Experience, set up by Kinross Local Peter de Boer. This experience is aimed at immersing New Zealand Curlers in the northern hemisphere season, with access to quality ice, coaches and individuals who have a love and knowledge for the sport. I have truly loved my time being here, I love being surrounded by people who love this sport, and getting to play in so many club matches is a dream! I also believe that the hard work put in by participants of the NZOE has contributed to New Zealand's successful season, qualifying for the Mens, Womens, and Mixed Doubles World Curling Championships.

For me this season would not have been possible without living here in Scotland, with my wonderful hosts Iain and Juia Cormack. Curling in New Zealand is an unfunded sport meaning we fund ourselves to compete overseas at these competitions. As part of this I am hosting a guiz night here in **Kinross on March 3<sup>rd</sup>** to raise funds to put towards the costs of competing at the Mixed doubles. For anyone who would like to come along there is more information at the rink! I'm so grateful for how supportive everyone has been since my arrival. I have felt so welcomed and this place is starting to feel like a second home for me. In March I'll be headed of to Canada for the women's World Curling Championships, before heading to Sweden in April for the World Mixed Doubles, with Anton Hood (NZ Mens Skip) and coach David Ramsey (Rambo). Following this I fly back home to NZ, to get back into working as a Nurse before our domestic season kicks off end of May. Thanks again for all your support, I couldn't do this without it.
