The Masters 2023/24 - a few thoughts on the experience of a 'local' curlers.

What started out in the November Masters Qualifiers with four Kinross based teams was whittled down to two local rinks going into the Finals in early February. Skips, Scott Gormley and Bill Linton were allocated different sections, so there was a hope that they might meet at the latter stages of the Finals. The first two days saw good results from the Kinross challengers with all to play for.

Section B in the men's championship was open until the final draw with no less than three teams – Team Sharp, Team Linton (Bill Linton, Willie Nicol, Tom Jarvis, Les Wilson) (Kinross), and Team Clark (Rab Clark, Billy Howat) (Ayr) – on equal points at the end of Day 2.

Team Clark took the advantage in the morning of Day 3 with a win while their two opponents drew against each other. Another victory went Team Clark's way in the afternoon and the same applied for Team Sharp. With Team Linton falling to defeat versus Team Horton (Ken Horton, Mike Dick, Trevor Dodds, Jean Lesperance) (Curl Edinburgh), the matter was decided.

Over in Section A, Team Stark (Don Stark, Billy Johnston, Brian Fleming, Gary McFarlane, Eric Richardson) (Dewars, Perth) looked unstoppable early on. Winning all of their fixtures, they progressed to the play-offs in flying colours.

Team Gormley (Scott Gormley, Steve Wilcox, John Fingland, Mike Dougal) (Kinross) were the first chasers after Day 2, but two defeats on Day 3 saw them stagnant on six points. In contrast, Team Wilson (Peter Wilson, Graeme Adam, Alex Dickson, Jim Strang, Andrew McQuistin) (Dumfries) bounced back from a difficult couple of opening games with victory over Team Gray (John Kenny, Bill Gray, David Whyte, Neil Fyfe) (Curl Edinburgh) in the final draw that set them on equal points with Team Gormley. The decision went to ends with Team Wilson edging it on 22 to 20.

Team Clark were in excellent form in the semi-final and kicked things off with four points each in the first two ends. Team Wilson responded respectably with a three and a steal of one, but Team Clark were already in control and brought a 12-4 win home. Team Sharp and Team Stark were tied on points after five ends before Team Sharp took the advantage, scoring three and stealing two for a 9-4 triumph.

On to the final, where both teams had qualified from the same section containing Team Linton. Team Clark were first on the board with a two. Team Sharp responded with a single but followed it up with a score of three to take the lead. Singles were traded and the scores were level again with one end to go. Coming down with hammer, Team Sharp bagged a crucial point to snatch a 6-5 triumph for this English Seniors Champion.

So close for Teams Gormley and Linton, both finishing third in their sections and keeping the Kinross name to the fore in a National Competition.


Greenacres v Stirling was the first semi. Tied on three points each, the decision between Greenacres and Stirling went to stats and Greenacres had the advantage to progress to the finals.

In the second set of semi-finals it was Section B winners Kinross versus Section A runners-up Stranraer. The Teams A game was all square after six ends before Kinross took the advantage with a score of three that set them up for a 6-4 win. Stranraer were first on the board in the Teams B game, but a big score and steal put Kinross in front and they managed their lead for an 8-6 success. Finally, in the Teams C face-off, Kinross outscored Stranraer end-to-end twice to chip away to a 5-3 win.With three wins from three games, Kinross progressed to the finals where they were set to take on Greenacres.

Greenacres were first on the board in Final A with a single, but, after a blank, Kinross responded with a two followed by a steal and a force to take the advantage. Another three points went Kinross' way in End 6 and when they closed out the game with two single steals, the end result stood as 8-2.

Final B saw Kinross steal in the first two ends for an early three-points lead. However, Greenacres fought back with a score of three followed by two steals of their own to turn the game around. Kinross responded and cut the gap down to a point with one end to go, but, coming down with hammer, Greenacres took a point for a 7-5 win. The sides traded deuces to start off Final C before Kinross took control with a score of three followed by a steal of the same number and a steal of one. Greenacres managed to get a two on the board in End 7, but the game was already decided and 9-4 went down as the final result.

With two wins in the finals, Kinross clinched the Maxwell Trophy for 2024.

ANOTHER GREAT CONTRIBUTION FROM ONE OF OUR CLUBS - THANKS TO BILL RENNIE Notes on the History of Aberdour Curling Club

Researching the history of Aberdour Curling Club has thrown up a string of interesting facts, writes club member Bill Rennie.

The club was founded in 1818 and a full run of minutes from that time gives a fascinating insight into curling in the area over the past 200 years. The club's first president was the then Earl of Moray and curling was played on Otterston Loch which lies at Cockcairnie between Aberdour and Dalgety Bay. In its earliest years club members included the great and the good of Aberdour. One of its founding members was Admiral Sir Philip Durham who fought with Nelson at Trafalgar and was a pall bearer at his funeral. Club meetings in Aberdour were to be held on dates to be determined by the state of the moon, presumably to facilitate travel on foot or by horse.

In 1875 the club changed its name to Aberdour and Dalgety Curling Club to reflect its membership which was drawn from the two parishes either side of Otterston Loch. However, at the club's AGM in July 1882 the name was changed to Aberdour Curling Club, though no reason for the change is given in the minutes. The club continued to curl on Otterston Loch until 1903 when an artificial pond was constructed in the village, in the grounds of Hillside House. This proved to be more convenient for those members who lived in the village but not for those who were in Dalgety parish, or who lived in the vicinity of Otterston Loch. And, so, in 1909 the members living to the west of Aberdour formed a new club to be called the Otterston Loch Curling Club, to acknowledge that they would continue to curl on the loch rather than on the new artificial pond favoured by Aberdour CC.

The Otterston Loch Curling Club continued to thrive up to the outbreak of the Second World War after which Aberdour Curling Club carried the flag for curling in the village.

Though the minutes from the 19th and early 20th century record only male curlers as club members it's very likely that ladies also curled on Otterston Loch and by 1927 a number had formed themselves into the Cockcarnie Ladies Curling Club, one of the first ladies' clubs in **(Continued)**

Scotland. That number was actually very large, with the RCCC annual for 1929 - 30 listing more than 60 members, including 4 daughters from one family.

Like the Otterston Loch Curling Club the Cockcarnie Ladies Curling Club continued curling until the outbreak of war in 1939 but didn't continue after the war.

With the development of refrigeration technology and the ability to provide ice suitable for curling indoors a number of ice rinks were opened in Scotland in the early years of the 20th century. The first was Crossmyloof, in Glasgow which opened in 1907 as 'The Scottish Ice Rink'. Today's curlers will be aware that an indoor rink opened in Edinburgh, at Haymarket, in 1912 and from that date was regularly used by Fife curlers who travelled there by train. What is less known is that a second curling rink was opened at Lochrin, near Tollcross in Edinburgh, also in 1912 and Aberdour Curling Club played there regularly until the outbreak of war in 1914. Haymarket Ice Rink continued in use until 1978 but Lochrin Ice Rink never reopened after the war.

Many of our Kinross curlers will remember curling in the Millennium Grand Match, organised by the RCC across all of Scotland's indoor rinks in 2000. But there had been several earlier Grand Matches played indoors due to insufficient frost to allow play outdoors. For example, there was no Grand Match in 1903, 1904 or 1905. The first indoor Grand Match was played at Crossmyloof on 7 and 8 April 1908 though play was interrupted for a while when the plant failed. Indoor Grand Matches were again played at Crossmyloof in 1909 and 1911, in 1913 at Haymarket and in 1914 jointly at Haymarket and Crossmyloof. So the Millennium Grand Match on 8 January 2000 was not an original concept by the RCCC but a resurrection of a well established practice from earlier years.

The costs vary depending on the size of logo ranging from:

£600 per season (£500 per season for three year deal) + two sponsored stones

£800 per season (£750 per season for three year deal) + four sponsored stones

£1500 per season (£1200 per season for three year deal) + end of ice board, six sponsored stones and minimum of naming 1 sponsored competition

£2000 per season (£1500 per season for three year deal) + end of ice board, 8 sponsored stones and minimum of one sponsored competition and a rink league.
