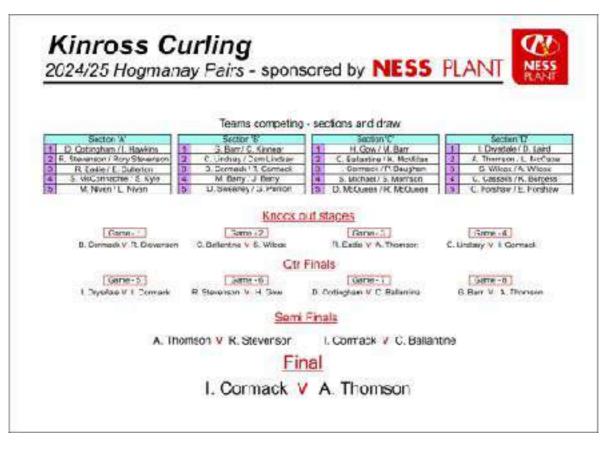

A men's team from Switzerland toured Scotland in January and were hosted by Fife & Kinross Area (Area 10 of Scottish Curling) on Saturday the 18th. The full day was spent at Kinross, with matches played morning and afternoon with a lunch inbetween, followed by a dinner event in the evening.

Ross and his ice team provided great ice as usual. Each of the 4 Provinces in Area 10 (East of Fife, West of Fife, Loch Leven and Cupar) fielded teams in both sessions. The morning session went the Area's way with 3 matches won to 1 defeat. By the afternoon, however, the Swiss had got the hang of the ice with 2 wins and a peel, although their 4th rink lost heavily. The final score was 62 shots to the Area and 47 to the Swiss.

For those Swiss sitting out the sessions, there were visits to St. Andrews in the morning led by David Roy (Cupar CC) including coffee in the R&A lounge, and to the Forth Bridges in the afternoon led by Jim Barton. Thanks to the Forth Bridges Control Centre and North Queensferry Heritage Trust for hosting the afternoon visit.

More important than the result on the ice was the friendship and camaraderie off the ice. Angie, John and the catering team laid on an excellent soup and sandwich lunch and then excelled themselves with a 3-course dinner for 60 people in the evening. ## The Sport Of Curling The Ultimate Activity For Increasing Your Life And Health Span?

How does participating in the sport of curling increase your life and health spans? here are two more aspects

#### Balance

Since the game is played on ice, keeping your balance is very important while you are traveling down the sheet and delivering a stone from the 'hack'. To develop a good balanced delivery, especially while wearing a Teflon slider on one foot, one has to engage all kinds of core stabilizing muscles. By engaging and strengthening these muscles it can make a big difference in your life and health spans. Strength is important, but stability/balance training should come first. Why? Stability is the secret sauce that allows you to create the most force in the safest manner possible.

There are studies that show that an inability to stand on one leg for 10 seconds in later life is linked to nearly double the risk of death from any cause within the next decade. Balance is so vital to longevity because it helps keep us agile and upright. Falls are the second leading cause of unintentional injury deaths worldwide, and balance is a protective factor against this.

#### Mental

The sport of curling has been aptly called "chess on ice." The comparison is pretty good as in chess, where "reading" the board is crucial, curling is won or lost by the strategy of calls and stone placement. In a study, researchers wanted to determine the survival advantage of elite athletes, compared to those engaged in mind sports such as chess. The conclusion was "Elite chess players live longer than the general population and have a similar survival advantage to elite competitors in physical sports." The study went on to state that "there is evidence suggesting that playing chess can reduce the risk of dementia, as well as physically alter the structure of the brain" and "when it comes to predicting longevity both fitness of mind and muscle appear to be important." Since curling blends both the physical and mental elements, one could see how beneficial the sport could be to your health and life spans.

During the game, team communication and the ability to make adjustments quickly are crucial for favourable outcomes. Research has shown that communication is crucial to keep the brain active and reduce the risk of cognitive decline. Continuously challenging your brain with mentally stimulating activities can help <u>maintain and improve cognitive abilities</u>. Engage in activities such as reading, puzzles, learning new skills, playing musical instruments, or engaging in strategic games. These activities engage many brain areas simultaneously and can enhance neuroplasticity, which is the brain's ability to adapt and form new connections. When it comes to brain health and cognitive abilities, regular use is key to preventing loss."

#### **ROBIN PARK - Memories about a fine curler.**

Robin Park, who died just after Christmas following recent surgery, had curled at Kinross since the late 1970s. He was a member of Boreland and Dunfermline Curling Clubs. Along with close neighbours in Inverkeithing he was a founder member of Boreland in 1979 and played a leading part in establishing the club as a force in local curling. He played competitively for Boreland in the old SAAB Super League at Kirkcaldy in the 1980s and later was a member of a rink that competed in an international bonspiel in the Spanish Pyrenees. He served as club President and was a colourful Lord's Officer at biennial club dinners. He was also a long time member of Dunfermline Curling Club and served as both Secretary and President. He represented the club as a member of a successful rink on the 2003 Strathcona Cup team in Canada.

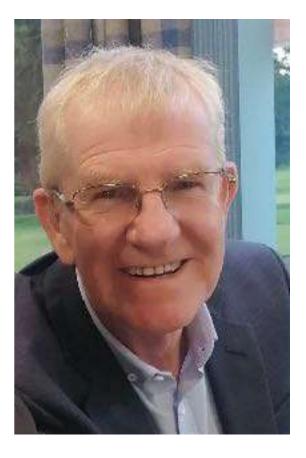
Robin's strong commitment to local curling, and his willingness to become involved in the wider organisation of curling, saw him serve for several years as Secretary of the West of Fife Province and then as President. He also spent a period assisting the RCCC in marketing.

One of the highlights of his time with Boreland came in a Province league match at Kirkcaldy where he skipped his rink to a rare 8 ender against Dalgety Bay. He later celebrated the event by buying and installing a new number plate for his car - N8 NDR.

But Robin's interests extended well beyond curling. He had been an excellent footballer in his youth and had been on the books of his local club, Motherwell, for a period. He was a keen Rotarian and had organised several charity fundraising events for the benefit of his local community. Music was also one of his passions and he was an accomplished pianist and singer, often entertaining fellow curlers at club events and at Burns' suppers. His attempt to master the accordion on one occasion was less successful, largely because he had mistakenly tried to play it upside down! Humour was never far from Robin.

Golfing trips to southern Spain with fellow Boreland curlers led to a love of the country and Robin and Sheila enjoyed many happy times in their villa on the edge of the golf course at Mijas Costa.

Robin Park was a remarkable and well loved character who enjoyed life to the full. He will be sadly missed by curlers and by his wider circle of friends and family.
