EXECUTIVE STAFF



ARTHUR M. BLANK

Owner & Chairman

Arthur M. Blank is owner of Atlanta United FC, Atlanta's first Major League Soccer team awarded by the league on April 16, 2014. Alongside Minnesota United, the two expansion teams join MLS for the 2017 season, bringing the league's total to 22 teams.

Perhaps best known as co-founder of The Home Depot, Arthur Blank's Family of Businesses portfolio currently includes the Atlanta Falcons; Atlanta United; PGA TOUR Superstore; The Arthur M. Blank Family Foundation; Mountain Sky Guest Ranch; AMB West, LLC; and AMB Group, the parent company of his for-profit businesses. Blank and the Falcons, in partnership with the city of Atlanta and state of Georgia, are the private funders of the Mercedes-Benz Stadium, which will open in 2017. The stadium will be operated by Atlanta Falcons Stadium Company,

a newly-created company also owned by AMB Group, and be home to the Falcons and Atlanta United.

While diverse in nature, all of Blank's businesses are run based on a common set of core values, which focus on developing customer relationships, treating associates with respect, and supporting communities.

Blank is widely known in the business community for his success in building the world's largest home improvement retailer. He co-founded The Home Depot in 1978 and retired from the company as co-chairman in 2001. At the time of his retirement, The Home Depot was a component of the Dow Jones Industrial Average and one of Fortune magazine's "Global Most Admired Companies." During Blank's last year as CEO of the company, The Home Depot ranked first in social responsibility in an annual survey conducted by Harris Interactive, Inc.

Blank believes in the importance of making a difference - professionally and personally. In addition to the company's financial success, during his 23 years with The Home Depot the company donated more than \$113 million to communities, and Home Depot associates provided hundreds of thousands of

hours of personal volunteer time. Blank is applying the same business acumen and values in building his competitive, successful and community-oriented businesses today.

Blank is also dedicated to his own giving back. Through his generosity, The Arthur M. Blank Family Foundation has granted more than \$300 million to support early childhood development, education, the arts, and parks and green-space. The foundation also leads giving programs for each of the for-profit businesses in Blank's portfolio.

Blank is recognized throughout the country for his personal and professional achievements. In 2012, he received an honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from the University of Georgia. In 2011, Blank was the recipient of the Freeing Voices, Changing Lives Award from the American Institute for Stuttering. In 2010, he was presented the Four Pillar Award - representing the principles of quality, responsibility, vision and integrity - by the Council for Quality Growth.

In 2008, he received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree from the University of South Carolina Beaufort, and in 2006 he was named Distinguished American by the Walter Camp Football Foundation,

which every year recognizes an individual who has utilized his or her talents to attain great success in business, private life or public service. Also in 2006, Blank was inducted into the Junior Achievement U.S. Business Hall of Fame, and was awarded an honorary degree of Doctor of Humanities from Furman University. In 2005, he was named National Entrepreneur of the Year by Ernst & Young.

In 2003, for the second time in three years – and the only time in the publication's 30-year history – Blank was named Georgia's Most Respected CEO by Georgia Trend magazine, and in 2002 he was inducted into Georgia State University's Business Hall of Fame. Among other previous honors, Babson College inducted Blank into its Academy of Distinguished Entrepreneurs in 1995 and conferred on him an hon-

orary degree of Doctor of Laws in 1998.

Recognizing the long-time support from Blank and his businesses for the U.S. Military, the Georgia National Guard named Blank the Honorary Regiment Commander of the Georgia Army National Guard Infantry Regiment. Blank will serve in this position for two years and is the first civilian to hold this honorary title.

In 2016, Sports Business Journal named Blank one of the 50 Most Influential People in Sports in recognition of his influence and work across the sports and business industries.

Blank serves on the Board of Trustees of The Carter Center, Inc.; The Board of Trustees of The Cooper Institute; and the Board of Trustees of The First Tee.

In September 2001, Blank joined the faculty of Em-

ory University's Goizueta Business School as its first Distinguished Executive in Residence. He now serves as a Goizueta Executive Fellow. Blank also served as the 2003 Chairman of the Metro Atlanta Chamber of Commerce.

A native of Flushing, N.Y., Blank received a B.S. Degree in Business Administration with Distinction from Babson College, where he was active in a wide variety of extracurricular activities.

Arthur and Angie Blank's marriage in June of 2016 brought together their respective families, including nine children and five grandchildren.

Consistent with the way he approaches work and life, his favorite T-shirt appropriately reads, "There is no finish line."

STEPHEN CANNON

CEO, AMB Group

Steve Cannon was named chief executive officer of AMB Group, LLC Dec. 21, 2015, assuming the day-to-day leadership of the company's for-profit businesses. Cannon leads all business operations of the National Football League's Atlanta Falcons; Atlanta United of Major League Soccer; Atlanta Falcons Stadium Company, the developer of Mercedes-Benz Stadium; PGA TOUR Superstore; and Mountain Sky Guest Ranch.

Prior to joining AMB Group, Cannon served as president

and chief executive officer of Mercedes-Benz USA (MBUSA) and was responsible for leading operations that generated record sales with annual revenues exceeding \$20 billion. During his tenure, MBUSA achieved a first-ever No. 1 ranking on the American Customer Satisfaction Index and was also lauded as one of the best places to work by Fortune Magazine five years in a row. Cannon oversaw MBUSA's successful headquarters relocation from New Jersey to the metro Atlanta area, in addition to crafting a sports sponsorship strategy that closely aligned the premium brand with properties reflective of its category leadership and brand position.

Cannon began his automotive career in 1991 as executive assistant to the president and CEO of Mercedes-Benz of North America (predecessor to MBUSA). From there, he moved to Stuttgart, Germany and joined a small team tasked with the development, manufacturing and launch of

the M-Class, the first Mercedes-Benz SUV ever made in, and for this market. Following his time in Germany, Cannon served as director of marketing for Debis Financial Services (later Daimler Financial Services). He also served as principal for The Richards Group, one of the largest independent full-service advertising agencies in the U.S. before re-joining MBUSA in 2007 where he served as the vice president of marketing for MBUSA from June 2007 until he was promoted to president and CEO in 2012.

Cannon graduated with honors from the United States Military Academy at West Point (B.S., Economics). He is Airborne Ranger qualified and served as 1st Lieutenant in West Germany during the fall of the Iron Curtain. During his time in the Army, he also served five years as an artillery officer.

DARREN EALES

President

Atanta United announced the appointment of Darren Eales as President on Sept. 10, 2014. He joined the club several months later, following a transition period with Tottenham Hotspur Football Club, a world-renowned English Premier League team.

A former Ivy League Player of the Year, NSCAA All-America and U.S. professional soccer player, British-born Eales previously served as executive director at Tottenham. In this role, he touched on all major aspects of soccer operations, including the club's overall soccer strategy, succession planning, player acquisitions, performance analysis, first team administration, player development, academy and medical supervision.

While at Tottenham, Eales helped to negotiate and execute all player transfers, including playing a key role in the 2013 world record transfer fee sale of Gareth Bale to Real Madrid. During Eales' four-year tenure with Spurs, the team

qualified for European competition every season, reached the quarterfinals of the UEFA Champions League in 2011, and reached the quarterfinals of the UEFA Europa League in 2013.

A barrister specializing in sports law, Eales has legal experience in a variety of areas from intellectual property and employment to contractual issues and dispute resolution. While at Tottenham, he served on numerous high-profile soccer governing bodies and panels across Europe and within England. Prior to joining Tottenham in 2010, Eales served as in-house legal counsel, director and club secretary at West Bromwich Albion Football Club for four years. West Brom is recognized within the Premier League as a well-run and financially stable club.

In Atlanta, Eales has already mirrored his extensive experience at Tottenham, including new facility development and community involvement. After having participated in the final planning stages for Tottenham's state-of-the-art training ground, which opened in 2012, Eales has led the club's development of its \$60 million training facility in Marietta. Slated to open in April, it will be one of the top training facilities in MLS.

Eales has also spearheaded the club's on-field progression, hiring three integral members to join the technical staff, including former U.S. Men's National Team

captain Carlos Bocanegra as technical director, former FC Barcelona and Argentine National Team manager Gerardo "Tata" Martino as head coach, and former Orlando City SC general manager Paul McDonough as director of soccer operations.

Raised by his father as a Chesterfield FC fan, Eales has been immersed in soccer all his life. After playing in the Academy at Cambridge United FC in England, he moved to the US on a soccer scholarship, spending one year at West Virginia University before transferring to Brown University. At Brown, he went on to become Ivy League Player of the Year, NSCAA First-Team All-America, COSIDA Academic All-American of the Year and USA Today Student Athlete of the Year, before graduating with a degree in economics. In 2012, he was inducted into the Brown University Athletics Hall of Fame.

Following his university play, Eales remained in the US, playing for the Hampton Roads Mariners and Hershey Wildcats in the USISL and the New York Centaurs in the A-League. When injuries cut short his professional playing career, he returned to England and earned a MA in Law at Cambridge University. In 2000, he qualified as a barrister, and then spent six years practicing law at 2 Temple Gardens Chambers in London, where he is still a door tenant.



CARLOS BOCANEGRA

Technical Director

Carlos Bocanegra was named technical director of Atlanta United FC on March 2, 2015. Along with President Darren Eales, Bocanegra oversees day-to-day non-coaching soccer operations of the first team, including development and implementation of a worldwide scouting network and oversight of player wellness and rehabilitation.

Former captain of the United States Men's National Team for six seasons, two-time Major League Soccer Defender of the Year and 2010 World Cup team captain, Bocanegra retired from play in 2014 after an esteemed 15-year

career in professional soccer. Thanks to his diverse playing career, ranging from the highest levels of club and international soccer, Bocanegra has helped identify and recruit Atlanta United's inaugural roster, which features 14 players outside of MLS who have experience in a country's top division.

A California native, Bocanegra attended collegiate soccer powerhouse UCLA and was drafted by the Chicago Fire as the No. 4 overall pick in the 2000 MLS Superdraft. Starting in his first year as a professional, Bocanegra helped lead Chicago to the 2000 MLS Cup final and two Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup championships in 2000 and 2003. He won the MLS Rookie of the Year Award in 2000 and quickly became one of the top MLS defenders, winning back to back MLS Defender of the Year Awards in 2002 and 2003.

In 2004, he signed with English Premier League club Fulham where he played four seasons during which he became one of the few U.S. players to captain both

club and country simultaneously. Following his time with Fulham, Bocanegra moved to France's Ligue 1 where he played for Rennes and Saint-Etienne until he joined Rangers of the Scottish Premier League until 2013. In July 2013, he officially returned to MLS to play for Chivas, where he finished his career holding the all-time record for most international goals scored by a U.S. defender.

Bocanegra was selected to the 2006 and 2010 FIFA World Cup teams where he appeared in six matches. He's tied for 10th all-time in U.S. Soccer history with 110 caps, and is tied among U.S. players for career World Cup qualifying appearances with 31. He also helped lead the U.S. to two Gold Cup victories in 2002 and 2007 and he scored an impressive 14 goals during his international career. He served as captain for the U.S. team 64 times during his international career on the backline, and he played under elite coaches including Bruce Arena, Bob Bradley and Jurgen Klinsmann.

Atlanta United announced Paul McDonough as Director, Soccer Operations on Dec. 16, 2015. Prior to joining Atlanta United, McDonough served as Senior Vice President, Soccer Operations for Orlando City SC where he managed operations for the first team and development

Academy programs, developed and implemented the club's scouting network and managed player contract negotiations, transfer and loan agreements. As a key front office executive, McDonough helped lead Orlando City in its first MLS season.

Since joining Atlanta, McDonough has played an integral role in assembling the club's inaugural roster. Along with president Darren Eales and technical Director Carlos Bocanegra, McDonough has built Atlanta's roster from scratch, helping identify and recruit players from more than 15 different countries, and through various different player acquisition mechanisms, all while navigating Major League Soccer's salary cap restrictions. Prior to his time in Orlando,

McDonough spent two years as Director of Global Soccer with Wasserman Media Group where he represented professional soccer players in MLS and abroad. He began his career in collegiate coaching serving as an assistant coach at Wake Forest University, University of South Carolina and University of Connecticut.

McDonough works with Bocanegra on player acquisitions, building the scouting network, player salary cap management and strategy and the club's day-to-day player operations and management. McDonough also manages the club's state-of-the-art training ground in Marietta, including its design, construction and operations process.

VP, Business Operations

Ann Rodriguez was named Vice President - Business Operations of Atlanta United FC on June 22, 2015.

Rodriguez is responsible for overseeing the day-to-day business operations of the franchise, including sales, marketing, ticket operations, fan experience and sponsorship. She also works closely with AMB Sports & Entertainment leaders in managing the cross functional groups

providing shared services and expertise in communications, public relations and community relations for the Atlanta Falcons, Atlanta United FC and Mercedes-Benz Stadium.

Rodriguez joins Atlanta United FC from NextGen Angels, an investment group focused on early-stage companies, where she most recently served as Senior Vice President in their Washington, D.C. office. In this capacity, Rodriguez was involved in marketing, partnerships, strategy and organizational design, and driving business growth.

Prior to joining NextGen Angels, Rodriguez was Global Category Director for soccer and lacrosse at Under Armour, where she led Under Armour's entry into the Barclay's Premier League with Tottenham Hotspur Football Club, and secured Colo Colo of Chile as the brand's first soccer

team in South America. Rodriguez also led strategy for the apparel division and worked on projects in product development, operations and distribution.

Before joining Under Armour, Rodriguez served as Vice President of Sales and Marketing for the San Jose Earthquakes, where she led the ticket and sponsorship sales teams and was integral in developing club branding, fan experience models and venue development.

A native of Annapolis, MD, Ann has a B.A. degree in Ecology & Evolutionary Biology from Princeton University and an M.B.A. from Stanford Graduate School of Business. She has also served as a faculty member at Georgetown University's sports industry management program and as an assistant professor at George Washington University's FIFA World Cup 2010 class in South Africa.

Atlanta Falcons Stadium Company and Atlanta United.

Geoffroy spent the previous eight seasons as the Falcons' Controller and has a strong background in sports business management, accounting, finance, risk management and operations.

Working in financial analysis and operations for all departments within AMBSE, Geoffroy and his dedicated staff are a busy team supporting 98 multi-functional departments and contributing to the launch of Atlanta United, Mercedes-Benz Stadium and the overall growth of AMBSE.

Geoffroy began his career in the finance department of the NBA's Boston Celtics before moving to an accounting role with the

NHL's New Jersey Devils. During his time in New Jersey, the Devils won the 1995 Stanley Cup Championship. He then returned to the Celtics, and after a total of nine seasons as Director of Accounting & Operations, became the Chief Financial Officer and Chief Operating Officer of International Healthcare.

Geoffroy also serves in the Greater Atlanta community as a board member of The Link Counseling Center and Children's Healthcare of Atlanta Gwinnett Community Advisory Board.

TECHNICAL STAFF



GERARDO MARTINO

Head Coach

Gerardo “Tata” Martino was announced as Atlanta United’s inaugural head coach on Sept. 27, 2016. A former professional player and coach at the highest levels of both club and international football, Martino has most notably led the Argentina National Team, Paraguay National Team and La Liga’s FC Barcelona during his prestigious 20-year coaching career.

Martino has quickly made an impact in Atlanta, helping recruit Designated Players Miguel Almiron and Josef Martinez, who hail from Paraguay and Venezuela, respectively, to join Atlanta United during the MLS offseason. A pair of highly-sought after playmakers, Atlanta United’s promising young duo, in addition to fellow Designated Player and Argentine Hector “Tito” Villalba, is widely considered to be one of the best young cores in MLS as each player is 23-years-old or younger.

Before Atlanta, Martino most recently managed the Argentina National Team from 2014 to 2016. He led Argentina back to the No. 1 FIFA World ranking in July 2015, breaking an eight-year drought for the nation since their last top ranking in June 2008. Under Martino’s leadership, Argentina also appeared in the Copa America final in back-to-back years in

2015 and 2016 while finishing with a 20-4-5 overall record. Martino was the manager of Paraguay from 2006 to 2011, where he led La Albirroja to their best World Cup finish, advancing past the Round of 16 for the first time ever in South Africa in 2010. During his time at Paraguay, Martino was named the 2007 South American Coach of the Year after a strong showing in Copa America and World Cup Qualifying.

At the club level, Martino’s most recent position was at FC Barcelona from 2013-14, where Martino’s team won 13 out of its first 14 league matches and was eventually drawn into a frenzied three-way battle for La Liga’s title as Barcelona finished second with a league-high 100 goals and league-best +67 goal differential. Prior to that, Martino managed Newell’s Old Boys from 2011 to 2013, immediately turning around a club heading for relegation by finishing in sixth place in the Torneo Final (the second half of the Argentine football season) in 2012. The following season, Newell finished in second in the Torneo Inicial (first half of the Argentine season) before winning the Torneo Final in 2013. That same year, he also led the club to the semifinals of the 2013 Copa Libertadores.

Martino also starred at Newell’s Old Boys as a player, where he still holds the club record for games played. During his time with the Old Boys, Martino helped guide the club to three Argentine Primera Division titles before the attacking midfielder was eventually moved to CD Tenerife, of Spain’s La Liga.

In addition to his widely-regarded coaching credentials, Martino brought a first-class staff to Atlanta United as well. Joining Martino is a wide array of domestic and internationally experienced coaches, led by assistant coaches Jorge Theiler and Dario Sala. Theiler, who has played and coached with the Argentine National Team, has worked with Martino since their playing days at Newell’s Old Boys in the 1980s. Sala, also Argentine, played for some of the top South American clubs for 12 years before departing for MLS for six seasons with FC Dallas. Martino also added four additional staff members with extensive national team experience including Manuel Alfaro (Argentina), Aron Hyde (USA), Rodolfo Paladini (Venezuela) and Damian Silvero (Argentina).



JORGE THEILER // Assistant Coach

Jorge Theiler was named Atlanta United's Assistant Coach on Nov. 13, 2016. He previously worked at Newell's Old Boys (2008-2015) where he was the club's coordinator of youth teams. He brings 20-plus years of coaching experience in addition to more than a decade of playing experience.

Theiler played alongside Atlanta United Head Coach Gerardo Martino with Newell's Old Boys in the 1980s and won the 1987-88 Primera Division with Newell's. He represented the Argentina National Team at the Pan American Games in 1983 and in the 1987 Copa America.

He began his coaching career with Newell's in 1995 as coach of the U-18, U-17 and U-16 teams. He continued in a similar role for three seasons before moving to Almirante Brown where he was an assistant coach under Martino (1997-98). He remained an assistant under Martino with Platense (1999) and Cordoba (2000-2001) before he joined River Plate in 2002 where he served as a youth coach through 2004.

Theiler became a head coach at Libertad (2004) and Cordoba (2005) before taking up an assistant position with the Argentina Youth National Teams.



DARIO SALA // Assistant Coach

Dario Sala was named Atlanta United's Assistant Coach on Nov. 13, 2016. A native of Argentina, Sala spent 12 years playing professional football as a goalkeeper with some of the best clubs in South America including San Lorenzo, River Plate and Newell's Old Boys of Argentina and Deportivo of Colombia. He then moved to MLS, signing with FC Dallas in 2005 where he spent six years.

With FC Dallas, Sala notched 39 wins in 100 appearances. In his first full season in 2006, Sala backboned FC Dallas to the club's first-ever first place finish in the Western Conference. He finished with career-highs in wins (14), saves (93) and goals against average (1.24). During Sala's career with Dallas, the club also reached the finals in the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup and MLS Cup.

Sala brings extensive experience in U.S. Soccer. After retirement in 2010, Sala spent time as a player agent before being named general manager of Jacksonville Armada of NASL in 2014. Sala led the club during their expansion season in 2015.



ARON HYDE // Goalkeeper Coach

Aron Hyde was named Atlanta United's Goalkeeper Coach on Nov. 13, 2016. Prior to Atlanta, he spent two years with the U.S. Soccer Federation as a goalkeeper coach, both with the youth and men's national teams. He also spent six seasons as the goalkeeper coach with Chicago Fire (2010-15).

Manuel Alfaro was appointed as Fitness Coach for Atlanta United on Nov. 13, 2016. He joins Atlanta after working as physio for the Argentina National Team under head coach Gerardo Martino since 2014. DAMIAN SILVERO // Video Analyst

Damian Silvero was named the Atlanta United Video Analyst on Nov. 13, 2016. Silvero joins head coach Gerardo Martino in his move from the Argentine National Team, where Silvero was the first team video analyst for the past three years. 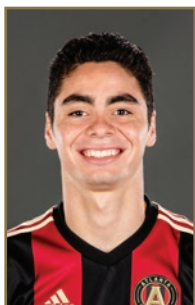

Almirón started his career with Paraguayan power Cerro Porteño, signing with the club at 14 years old while most recently playing in Argentina with Lanús. Across all competitions, Almirón has 86 appearances with 10 goals. Almirón has been a fixture in Paraguay's National Team camp, making six combined appearances in 2018 FIFA World Cup Qualifying and the 2016 Copa America Centenario.

2016 (Lanús): Almirón led Lanús to two major championships, including just their second-ever Primera Division title during the shortened 2016 campaign. During that season, Almirón appeared in 13 games and scored three goals to lead Lanús to the top of the table. 2015 (Cerro Porteño): Almirón registered a career-high five goals in just 19 games as he helped Cerro Porteño capture the Primera Division Torneo

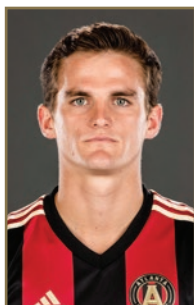
Apertura Championship and a second place finish in the Torneo Clausura.

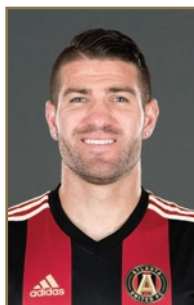

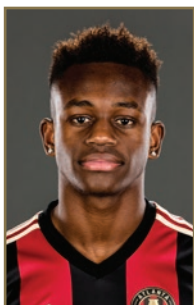

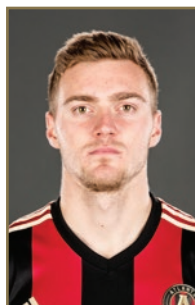

The Germany native was named Big East Co-Offensive Player of the Year (2016), First Team All-Big East (2016), Big East All-Tournament Team (2016, 2015, 2014) and Big East All-Rookie Team (2013). He spent nine years in the English Premier League, most recently playing for Middlesbrough before spending the previous eight seasons with Aston Villa. Guzan began his career in MLS with Chivas USA where he played four seasons from 2005-2008, making 78 starts and leading them to the playoffs three times. In 2008 he transferred to Aston Villa, tallying 144 appearances in the top-flight of English football. Guzan made 171 appearances across all competitions during his time with the Villans.

2016/2017 (Middlesbrough): Guzan signed with newly promoted Middlesbrough ahead of the 2016-17 season after Villa were relegated to the Championship following the 2015-16 season. He made five combined appearances. Guzan made his debut with the club Aug. 21 in a league match against Sunderland, leading his team to a 2-1 win. He made two more starts in the Premier League against West Bromwich (Aug. 28) and Leicester City (Jan. 2). Both matches ended in a 0-0 draw. Jones tallied more than 100 goals across all competitions between his time in England, Abu Dhabi and Trinidad and Tobago. His most caps came with Stoke City where he appeared 130 times and scored 31 goals. A long-time captain of the Trinidad and Tobago national team, Jones is the seventh most capped player in team history (83) and is sixth all-time in goals with 23.

In two league matches Jones netted three goals, one against Police FC (Nov. 4) and a brace against Point Fortin (Nov. 19). Jones played in two CONCACAF Champions League matches with Central, scoring once against MLS side Sporting Kansas City (Aug. 17). He played the full 90 minutes in both contests, the second against the Vancouver Whitecaps (Sept. 26).

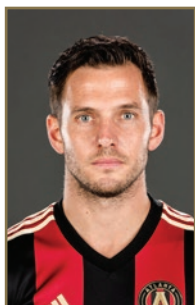

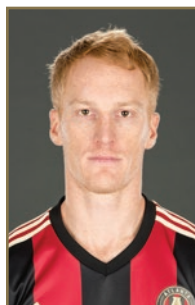

Jeff Larentowicz joins Atlanta United with more than 300 MLS Regular Season appearances, while scoring 37 goals and adding 18 assists from the midfield position. Among field players, he ranks No. 11 all-time in minutes played (27,640) and No. 19 in appearances (324). Larentowicz has played in at least 23 games each year since the 2006 MLS season. Along with his extensive MLS experience, Larentowicz also carries a tremendous amount of success as his teams have won the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup (2007), four MLS Eastern Conference Championships (2005, 2006, 2007, 2010) and the MLS Cup (2010). 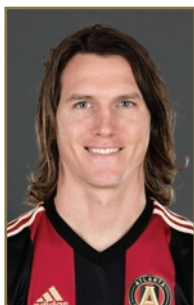

Loyd has also appeared for the United States Men's National Team with three caps.

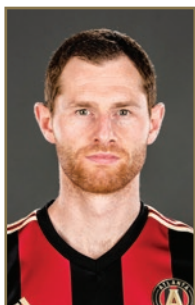

He finished with four goals and six assists with his most outstanding performance coming against Blackpool on April 30 when he scored the opening goal and later recorded two assists in a 4-0 win. 2014/2015 (Wigan): McCann was featured in the starting lineup 11 times in 17 league matches, scoring twice. Wigan was relegated to League One after finishing in the bottom three of the Championship.

2013/2014 (Wigan): McCann signed with Wigan Athletic on June 26, 2013 after the expiration of his contract with Burnley. He appeared in 27 league matches and scored twice.

2012/2013 (Burnley): McCann started in 40 of his 41 league appearances and matched his previous year's goal total with four. The Burnley captain had a career day against Bristol City on Oct. 23 when he dished out two assists and scored a game-winning header in the 90th minute for a 4-3 victory. He finished the season with eight assists.

2011/2012 (Burnley): In his first full season since the 2008/2009 season, McCann was named cap-

tain of Burnley by manager Eddie Howe. He started in 45 of his 46 league appearances. McCann recorded the first brace of his professional career against Ipswich on Nov. 29 in a 4-0 rout. He finished the year with four goals and four assists in league play.

2007/2008 (Burnley): McCann started in 34 of his 35 appearances, netting five goals for the season. He recorded his first senior assist against Colchester United on Sept. 1 which put his side ahead 3-1 in the 63rd minute as the game ended in a 3-2 Burnley victory.

2006/2007 (Burnley): McCann played in 38 matches, starting in 24. He scored five goals, including a game-winning header in the 90th minute against Ipswich (Nov. 4).

2005/2006 (Burnley): After progressing through the youth academy, McCann made his professional debut for Burnley against Coventry City on Aug. 13, coming on as a substitute in the 12th minute. He scored his first senior goal against Ipswich Town on Sept. 27 in a 3-0 victory. He appeared in 23 league matches and started in 15.

Tyrone Mears comes to Atlanta after two successful seasons with Seattle that ended in winning the 2016 MLS Cup. A native of Manchester, England, Mears spent the majority of his career playing in England's Premier League and Championship prior to joining MLS in 2015. The veteran fullback played more than 200 matches in England, beginning his career with Manchester City in 2001. Mears then enjoyed stays with Preston North End (2002-06), West Ham United (2006-07), Derby County (2007-09), Burnley (2009-2011) and Bolton Wanderers (2011-14). During his two seasons with Burnley, Mears played alongside now-teammate Chris McCann, who captained the team.

2016 (Seattle Sounders FC): In 2016, Mears cemented his reputation as one of the league's top fullbacks, making 32 starts and ranking No. 2 on the team in minutes behind Jordan Morris, and No. 11 in the league (2835). He anchored the Seattle defense which finished No. 7 in goals allowed and No. 6 in shots on goal allowed. Mears assisted two goals, one that set up a game-tying goal against Orlando City during a 3-1 win (Aug. 7) and the other that opened the scoring in the final match of the season against Real Salt Lake in a 2-1 win (Oct. 23). **PLAYOFFS:** Mears started and played the full 90 minutes in all six of Seattle's post-season matches, including the 2016 MLS Cup final against Toronto FC which ended in a penalty shootout victory for the Sounders. He made his club and Premier League debut when he started in the season opener against Charlton on Aug. 19. In January of 2007, West Ham loaned Mears to Championship side Derby until the end of the 2006/2007 season. 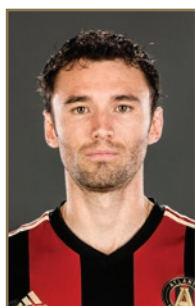

Michael Parkhurst joins Atlanta United as a veteran of Major League Soccer with more than 200 appearances. He served as Columbus' captain for the past three seasons and has been capped by the U.S. Men's National Team 25 times. In addition to four MLS All-Star selections (2005, 2007, 2008, 2014), Parkhurst's decorated career includes being named the 2007 MLS Defender of the Year, a 2007 MLS Best XI selection and the MLS Fair Play award recipient three different seasons (2007, 2008, 2014). He's also a durable defender, appearing in at least 33 games during each of his three seasons with Crew SC.

2016 (Columbus): Parkhurst made 34 appearances (34 starts) for Crew SC in his third season as the club's Captain, adding two assists while starting every regular-season match. He helped the club keep its first clean sheet of the season at Chicago (March 19) and its second against Houston (April 23). He notched his first assist of his 2016 campaign against Montreal (May 7). He helped Crew SC keep its third clean sheet of the season at Toronto (May 21). He was part of a shutout effort in a start against Montreal (June 18). Parkhurst made his 200th career MLS regular-season appearance by starting against D.C. He was voted to the MLS All-Star Game First XI and started against Scottish powerhouse Celtic FC, playing 83 minutes in MLS' 2-0 victory. **PLAYOFFS:** Parkhurst started and played all 90 minutes in each of the Revs' four postseason games on their way to a third-straight appearance in the MLS Cup title game. Jacob Peterson is an 11-year MLS veteran with 246 career appearances and 147 starts. He joins Atlanta United after spending the last five seasons with Sporting Kansas City, where he registered 13 goals and seven assists in 108 appearances. Designated as a midfielder, Peterson can be deployed in a multitude of positions including attacking midfielder and winger, a spot where he blossomed with SKC. Peterson has enjoyed a long career in MLS including stops with Sporting KC (2012-16), San Jose Earthquakes (2011), Toronto FC (2010-11) and Colorado Rapids (2006-09). Only twice in his 11-year career has Peterson appeared in less than 20 matches. His most recent run with SKC was one of the most successful stretches in club history, reaching the playoffs in all five seasons with Peterson on the team, including pinnacle moments such as winning the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup twice, in 2012 and 2015, and an MLS Cup in 2013.

2016 (Sporting Kansas City): Peterson started 18 of 21 appearances, recording a career-high six goals and one assist. He came off the bench in the 69th minute to record an assist and score the game-winning goal in a 2-1 win over Orlando City SC (May 15), becoming the fourth player in Sporting KC history to notch a goal and an assist as a substitute. Open Cup: Peterson started and played 90 minutes in a 2-1 extra time win over Minnesota United FC (June 15). MLS Cup Playoffs: Peterson was a second-half

substitute in a 1-0 knockout round loss at Seattle Sounders FC (Oct. 27).

2015 (Sporting Kansas City): Peterson started 15 of 26 appearances, recording one goal and two assists. He scored the final goal in a 3-1 win at Toronto FC (Aug. 8), his first goal since July 26, 2014, when he also scored at BMO Field against his former club. A former No. 3 overall pick in the 2015 MLS SuperDraft, Williams joined Atlanta after spending the last two MLS seasons with Montreal Impact. He played the entire 2016 season on loan with the Charleston Battery where he was the club's leading scorer. The Portmore, Jamaica native has represented the National Team at the U17 and U23 levels and he made his senior team debut in 2016.

2016 (Charleston Battery): Williams spent the 2016 season on loan from Montreal Impact with USL team Charleston Battery. He scored in his debut as a substitute, a game-winning goal in the 93 minute for a 1-0 win over FC Cincinnati (Feb. 27). Williams scored six goals in his first nine games with Charleston and ultimately featured 27 times, starting in 22 matches. He finished as the Battery's leading scorer with 10 goals.

2015 (Montreal Impact): After being drafted No. 3 overall in the 2015 MLS SuperDraft by the Montreal Impact, Williams made his MLS debut against Orlando City on March 28, coming on as a substitute in the 84 minute. He was loaned to USL team FC Montreal where he played seven games –

starting in all of them – and registered one assist (Charleston on May 14). Williams appeared in one other MLS league game against D.C. United (Sept. 26), entering as a sub in the 92 minute.

2014 (Orlando City U23, PDL): Williams tallied seven goals and one assist in 11 games. He helped his team to a fourth round berth in the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup after scoring three times, twice during the penalty shootout that finished 12-11 against the Charleston Battery. Orlando City U23's fell to the Portland Timbers 3-0 in the fourth round matchup.

COLLEGE: Williams played three seasons with the University of Central Florida, recording 18 goals – including seven game-winning goals – and five assists in 51 games, 46 as a starter. He was a unanimous selection to the American Athletic Conference all-conference first team in 2014. Williams was also the 2013 American Athletic Conference Player of the Year.

INTERNATIONAL: Williams represented the U17 Jamaican National Team, playing in three games at the 2011 U17 FIFA World Cup. He made his senior team debut on Nov. 13, 2016 in a Caribbean Cup Qualifier against Suriname. Williams started and played 89 minutes in the 1-0 win.

**TONY ANNAN // Academy Director**

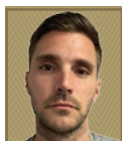
Atlanta United hired Tony Annan as Academy Manager in April 2016 and promoted him to Academy Director on Dec. 14, 2016. Annan has two decades of experience coaching in Atlanta, and is founder of the Georgia United DA program. He also worked in scouting and coaching with the U.S. Soccer Federation. Assuming the role of Academy Director, Annan has established the Atlanta United Academy since the program's inception. Since the academy began play in August 2016, more than 15 youth players have been called up to Youth National Teams, including some in residency full-time with the U17 National Team. A 20-year veteran in youth development in the Atlanta market, Annan recently passed both the U.S. Soccer Academy Director's Course and the prestigious Elite Formation Coaching License (EFCL) Course making him one of the most qualified Academy coaches in the U.S. and one of only six coaches to hold both licenses. He has also successfully coached the Academy's U16 squad to a No. 1 ranking. Annan will oversee all aspects of the academy program including planning, curriculum development, strategy, structure and organizational operations.

**KRISTOFER BERTSCH // Academy Coach**

Kris Bertsch is currently the head coach of the U-14s. He joins Atlanta United from the University of Louisville where he served as Assistant Head Men's Soccer Coach beginning in 2015. During Bertsch's tenure, the Cardinals achieved a top 10 national ranking during the 2015 season. Prior to Louisville, Bertsch was the Associate Head Men's Soccer Coach at Xavier University (2010-15) and Syracuse University (2009-10) and served as Director of Soccer Operations at the University of Connecticut (2005-09). He was a starting midfielder for American University Men's Soccer Team from 1999-02 and was selected to the FC Delco Hall of Fame as a youth player. Bertsch is currently a USSF 'A' License Coach.

**STEVEN COVINO // Academy Coach**

Steven Covino currently works with the Academy's U-12s. He joins Atlanta United from Alleycats Soccer Club in Albany, N.Y. where he served as the club's technical director. He played his collegiate career at Siena College where he went on to serve as assistant coach for the men's soccer program. Covino also spent one year as an assistant coach at the University of Hartford and is a featured coach in US Soccer's online 'F' License. Covino is currently a USSF 'B' Licensed Coach.

**LIAM CURRAN // Academy Coach**

Liam Curran is currently the head goalkeeper coach for Atlanta United Academy teams. He most recently served as Clemson University Assistant Coach from 2012-16. During his time with the Tigers, the squad became 2015 NCAA National Finalists, 2014 ACC Tournament Champions and 2014 ACC Atlantic Division Champions. He also served as University of Akron Goalkeeper Coach (2010-12) for the 2011 MAC Champions, 2010 NCAA National Champions and 2010 MAC Championship squad. Curran has coached and mentored four professional goalkeepers including former Clemson GK Andrew Tarbell (San Jose Earthquakes; selected No. 8 overall in 2016 MLS SuperDraft), former Clemson GK Chris Glodack (Tampa Bay Rowdies), former Clemson GK Cody Mizell (Charlotte Independence), and former Akron GK David Meves (Puerto Rico FC). Curran brings strong pedigree in goalkeeper coaching, and is well versed in performance analysis. He holds an NSCAA Advanced Diploma.



MATTHEW LAWREY // Academy Coach

Matthew Lawrey currently serves as a head coach for the U-12s. He joins Atlanta United from the Richmond Strikers, one of the premier youth franchises in Virginia. Lawrey played his collegiate career at the University of Mary Washington where he went on to serve as Assistant Coach for the men's soccer program. Lawrey also served as youth coach at Stafford Soccer Club and Prince William Soccer Inc. in Virginia and was voted

Positive Coaching Alliance Double-Goal National Coach of the Year in 2013. Lawrey is currently a USSF 'A' License Coach.



MICHAEL LYNCH // Academy Coach

Michael Lynch currently serves as the head coach of the U-13s. He was a key member of U.S. Soccer's Olympic Development Program where he assisted in sending numerous players to regional and national team levels. Lynch also served as a collegiate coach with Clayton State University where he helped lead the women's team to the most successful season in school history. Lynch has robust ties to multiple college programs, and also brings a strong

background in performance analysis to enhance player development. Lynch played youth soccer in England and professionally in Ireland and Finland before moving to the U.S. to obtain his degree and play for Clayton State. Lynch is currently a USSF 'A' License Coach.



RODRIGO RIOS // Academy Coach

Rodrigo Rios currently serves as the head coach of the U-12s. He is a former Chilean U-20 and U-23 National Team player and spent four years playing for NASL's Atlanta Silverbacks (2005-08). He went on to become the club's Director of Soccer in 2010. Fluent in English and Spanish, Rios has played a key role in head coach Gerardo Martino's introduction to Atlanta United, including serving as an integral coach and translator during Atlanta's 2017

preseason. Rios also coached youth soccer at Norcross Soccer Academy and continued in youth coaching with the United Football Academy. He was awarded "Coach of the Year" for the state of Georgia in 2013 and is currently a USSF 'A' License Coach.

/// MLS SEASON

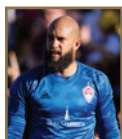
- In 2017, the 22 MLS teams will play a 34-game regular season schedule, 17 at home and 17 away.
- The 2016 season saw an influx of high-profile global stars with international experience, including the signings of Nicolas Lodeiro (Seattle Sounders FC), Jelle Van Damme (LA Galaxy), Ashley Cole (LA Galaxy), and U.S. Men's National Team players Tim Howard (Colorado Rapids) and Alejandro Bedoya (Philadelphia Union).
- 2016 was the second year in a new eight-year, landmark television and media rights partnership in the United States with ESPN, FOX Sports and Univision, highlighted by destination dates and times. With the addition of prominent international television partners, MLS is now among the most widely distributed soccer leagues in the world. MLS has broadcast agreements with Globosat in Brazil, Sky Sports in the UK, Letv Sports in mainland China, Abu Dhabi Media in the Middle East and North Africa, BeIN Sport in SE Asia and Australia, Fuji TV in Japan, FOX Sports Africa and pan-European broadcaster Eurosport -- reaching more than 150 countries and territories.
- 2016 saw MLS reach an all-time high in average attendance (21,692 - an increase of 40 percent from 2006), total attendance (7,375,287) and sellouts (162 - previous record was 161 in 2015). MLS is the sixth-best attended professional soccer league in the world by average attendance.

/// PLAYERS

In 2016, MLS clubs were home to players born in 59 countries outside the United States and Canada, demonstrating the diversity of Major League Soccer. Among the five major team professional sports leagues in the United States, MLS is the most diverse. **A description of several notable MLS players slated to play in 2017 follows:**



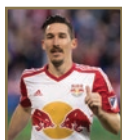
Sebastian Giovinco (Toronto FC): The Italian international has led MLS in combined goals and assists and was named to the Best XI team in both his seasons in the league. After a record-breaking first year in MLS in 2015, Giovinco took home the 2015 Landon Donovan Most Valuable Player award after setting a new single-season record for most combined goals and assists (38). Giovinco guided Toronto all the way to 2016 MLS Cup and is Toronto's all-time leading goal scorer.



Tim Howard (Colorado Rapids): A mid-season acquisition from English side Everton, Howard's return to MLS proved triumphant as he guided the Colorado Rapids to the Western Conference Championship. The Designated Player was a finalist for MLS Goalkeeper of the Year and tied for the league lead with two penalty kick saves in the regular season in addition to his two penalty saves in the Conference Semifinals. Howard's form in Colorado saw him earn the starting goalkeeper spot for the U.S. Men's National Team, where he starred in Copa America Centenario and 2018 World Cup Qualifying matches.



Nicolas Lodeiro (Seattle Sounders FC): Lodeiro sparked a historic turnaround for Seattle after a mid-season transfer from Argentine club Boca Juniors, helping the club become 2016 MLS Cup Champions after scoring four goals in three postseason matches. In 13 regular season games for Sounders FC, Lodeiro scored four goals and added a team-high eight assists en route to being named a Newcomer of the Year finalist. A member of the Uruguay National Team, Lodeiro has played in two World Cups (2010, 2014) and three Copa Americas (2011, 2015, 2016).



Sacha Kljestan (New York Red Bulls): An MVP finalist in 2016, Kljestan led MLS with 20 assists, the second highest mark ever in league history and most since the second assist rule was changed in 2003, and added six goals. The midfielder's tremendous form with the Red Bulls earned him a call back with the U.S. Men's National Team, where he factored heavily in 2018 World Cup Qualifying play.



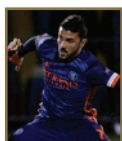
Giovani dos Santos (LA Galaxy): In his first full season in MLS, dos Santos led the Galaxy in goals and assists, becoming one of only two players league wide to register double digit totals in both categories. Dos Santos previously played for Tottenham Hotspur FC in England's Barclays Premier League, and Villarreal CF and FC Barcelona in La Liga. Internationally, dos Santos reentered Mexico's selection with call-ups for 2018 World Cup Qualifiers on the back of his tremendous form in MLS.



Kaká (Orlando City SC): The 2007 FIFA World Player of the Year and 2002 World Cup champion captained Orlando City SC through the team's first two seasons in MLS. The Brazilian powerhouse improved upon his inaugural MLS season with nine goals and a team-leading 10 assists in 2016 for an Orlando City SC squad that finished the year second in average attendance (31,324) behind league-leaders Seattle Sounders FC.



Jozy Altidore (Toronto FC): Altidore helped lead Toronto FC to 2016 MLS Cup, the team's best ever postseason finish, with five goals and four assists recorded. The former Villarreal CF and Sunderland player finished the season with 10 goals, all within Toronto's final 14 matches of the regular season. The 27-year-old striker has appeared in two World Cups (2010, 2014) while earning regular U.S. Men's National Team call-ups.



David Villa (New York City FC): Villa, named a 2016 MLS MVP finalist after scoring 23 goals, helped lead NYCFC to its first ever postseason appearance. Villa is one of the league's most dangerous strikers over the past two years, notching a combined 41 goals to tie the league lead over that span. Spain's all-time leading goal scorer, Villa has played in three World Cups (2006, 2010, 2014) including a first-place finish in the 2010 tournament. Before arriving to MLS, Villa suited up for Valencia, Barcelona and Atletico Madrid, where he won a combined three La Liga titles (2011, 2013, 2014).



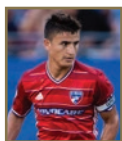
Jordan Morris (Seattle Sounders FC): One of the most heralded Homegrown Player signings in league history, the 2016 AT&T Rookie of the Year scored an American rookie record with 12 regular season goals to lead Sounders FC to 2016 MLS Cup, where the Cascadia Club went on to win the title. The 22-year-old Morris has 12 caps for the U.S. Men's National Team with the squad compiling an undefeated 5-0 record in matches where the rising star appeared in during 2016.



Bradley Wright-Phillips (New York Red Bulls): The England native has been on fire since his arrival to MLS in 2013, becoming the first player in league history to register two 20-plus goal seasons after dropping a Golden Boot-winning 24 goals in 2016. Wright-Phillips' 68 goals scored since 2014 are the most ever over a three-year span in MLS history. The former Manchester City and Southampton player was named to his second MLS Best XI team (2014, 2016) while being named an MVP finalist this season.



Ignacio Piatti (Montreal Impact): The skilled midfielder helped Montreal become the first of two Canadian clubs to advance to the Conference Championship round of the MLS Cup Playoffs after a tremendous start to the postseason in which he scored three goals and added an assist. Piatti finished the season with career-best 17 goals along with six assists. Piatti previously won Copa Libertadores in 2014 and the 2013 Primera Division title while playing for San Lorenzo in his native Argentina.



Mauro Diaz (FC Dallas): One of the top playmakers in the league, Diaz guided FC Dallas to two titles in 2016, capturing the 2016 U.S. Open Cup and Supporters' Shield titles. Dallas became the first team in league history to record consecutive 60-plus point seasons behind Diaz's team-best 13 assists in 2016. The 25-year-old finished his fourth season with FC Dallas following a move from Argentine club River Plate.

/// INVESTORS

Major League Soccer is structured as a single, limited liability company (single-entity). In the single-entity business structure, club operators own a financial stake in the League, not just their individual team.

The MLS investors are:

Anschutz Entertainment Group (AEG): Investor-operator of the Houston Dynamo and LA Galaxy (other domestic sports business ventures include the Staples Center, The Home Depot Center, the NBA's Los Angeles Lakers and the NHL's Los Angeles Kings).

Hunt Sports Group: Investor-operator of FC Dallas (other sports business ventures include the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs and NBA's Chicago Bulls).

Red Bull Company Limited: Investor-operator of Red Bull New York. The Austrian company produces the world's leading energy drink. Other sports investments include a NASCAR team, Red Bull Salzburg, extreme sports and Formula One auto racing.

Maple Leaf Sports & Entertainment: Investor-operator of Toronto FC (other sports business ventures include the NHL's Toronto Maple Leafs, NBA's Toronto Raptors and Air Canada Center).

OnGoal, LLC: Investor-operator group of Sporting Kansas City consists of five Kansas City-area residents led by Cerner Corporation executives Neal Patterson and Cliff Illig.

D.C. United Holdings: Investor-operators of D.C. United are Erick Thohir, Jason Levien and William H.C. ("Will") Chang. Chang holds ownership interest in Major League Baseball's San Francisco Giants,

while Thohir has a controlling stake in F.C. Internazionale Milano of the Italian Serie A.

John Fisher and Lew Wolff: Investor-operator of the San Jose Earthquakes joined MLS as an expansion team in the Western Conference for the 2008 season. Fisher and Wolff are the principle owners of MLB's Oakland Athletics.

Andell Holdings, LLC: Investor-operator of the Chicago Fire. Andell Holdings is a private investment firm with global business and investment interests led by Andrew Hauptman.

Joe Roth, Adrian Hanauer, Drew Carey and Paul Allen (Vulcan Sports and Entertainment): Investor-operators of Seattle Sounders FC consist of Hollywood producer Joe Roth, local entrepreneur Adrian Hanauer, television personality Drew Carey and Microsoft co-founder Paul Allen (owner of VSE that operates the NFL's Seattle Seahawks and NBA's Portland Trailblazers).

Keystone Sports and Entertainment, LLC: Investor-operators of Philadelphia Union include iStar Financial Chairman & CEO Jay Sugarman, veteran sports executive Nick Sakiewicz, Christopher and Robert Buccini and David Pollin, founding partners of The Buccini/Pollin Group.

Golden Boy Productions and Brener International Group: Mexican-American boxing icon Oscar De La Hoya and Gabriel Brener together invested in the Houston Dynamo and now own 50 percent of the club.

Greg Kerfoot, Jeff Mallett, Steve Luczo and Steve Nash: Investor-operators of the Vancouver Whitecaps FC include Greg Kerfoot (founder of software company Business Objects), Jeff Mallett (former Yahoo! President and COO and owner of English club Derby County FC), Steve Luczo (President and CEO of Seagate Technology) and Steve Nash (current NBA player and Vancouver native).

Peregrine, LLC: Investor-operator group of the Portland Timbers consists of former U.S. Treasury Secretary and CEO of Goldman Sachs Hank Paulson and his son, Merritt Paulson, a professional sports entrepreneur.

Free 2 Play Holdings: Joey Saputo is the principal Investor-Operator of the Montreal Impact. The Saputo Family is the founder of Saputo, a major international dairy products company.

Precourt Sports Ventures LLC: Investor-operator group of the Columbus Crew. PSV is a privately held investment and management firm focused on sport-entertainment business led by Managing Partner Anthony Precourt.

City Football Group US Holdco LLC: Investor-operator group of New York City Football Club consists of a partnership of Manchester City Football Club and the New York Yankees. Manchester City will be the majority owner of the new club. As an investor, the Yankees will be an active member of the ownership group. Team to begin play in 2015.

/// STADIUMS

Major League Soccer has elevated the sport's stature in North America by building soccer-specific stadiums. In 1999, the League began moving aggressively to create custom-made venues for its teams that generate the atmosphere and intimacy the game deserves. The seating capacity for these stadiums is between 18,000 and 30,000 and the stadiums share design concepts with some of the finest soccer venues in the world. In 2016, 15 of 20 MLS clubs played their home games in stadiums built with soccer in mind, with the number growing to 16 in July 2017. **The existing MLS soccer stadiums are:**



MAPFRE Stadium (Columbus, Ohio): Opened in 1999 as the home of the Columbus Crew. Built by the Hunt Family, this stadium has hosted two All-Star Games, two MLS Cups and many important U.S. National Team games.



StubHub Center (Carson, Calif.): Opened in 2003 and is the luxurious home of the LA Galaxy. Hosted MLS All-Star Game and several MLS Cups.



Toyota Stadium (Frisco, Texas): Opened in 2005 as the home of FC Dallas. Hosted MLS Cup 2005 and MLS Cup 2006. A 145-acre multipurpose sports complex with 17 tournament-grade fields.



Toyota Park (Bridgeview, Ill.): Located just 15 minutes south of downtown Chicago, the handsome venue debuted in 2006 and hosted the Sierra Mist All-Star Game with Chelsea FC competing against the MLS All-Stars.



BMO Field (Toronto, Canada): Toronto FC began play in MLS in 2007 and was host of the 2008 MLS All-Star Game and MLS Cup 2010.



Dick's Sporting Goods Park (Commerce City, Colo.): The Colorado Rapids' stadium opened in 2007 and is the centerpiece of a 24-field soccer complex believed to be one of the world's largest, and hosted the 2015 AT&T MLS All-Star Game.



Rio Tinto Stadium (Sandy, Utah): Real Salt Lake's stadium opened in 2008 and was the host of the 2009 MLS All-Star Game.



Red Bull Arena (Harrison, N.J.): The New York Red Bulls state-of-the-art stadium, inaugurated in 2010, is located 10 miles from midtown Manhattan. It features a dynamic form roof—a curving structure that wraps the entire 25,189-seat stadium in an elegant metal shell.



Talen Energy Stadium (Chester, Penn.): This world-class waterfront stadium located just over 15 miles from Center City, Philadelphia. Built at the foot of the Commodore Barry Bridge, this 18,500-seat stadium is the home to Philadelphia Union and was inaugurated in 2010. PPL Park hosted the 2012 AT&T MLS All-Star Game on July 25, 2012.



Providence Park (Portland, Ore.): Already steeped in sports and entertainment history, Providence Park underwent a \$31 million renovation to create an exciting and authentic soccer facility. Hosted the 2014 AT&T MLS All-Star Game.



BC Place (Vancouver, Canada): Vancouver began their inaugural season in MLS at Empire Field before moving into the new BC Place Stadium in downtown Vancouver on October 2, 2011 when the club hosted its rival, Portland Timbers. BC Place has made improvements to the stadium with soccer fans in mind. The revitalized stadium seats 21,000 fans during regular season MLS matches.



Children's Mercy Park (Kansas City, Kansas): The \$180 million plus, state-of-the-art, soccer-specific stadium seats 18,467 soccer supporters and features a dramatic canopy roof that covers every seating section. The stadium features 36 suites and five clubs, including the innovative Members Club. Hosted the 2013 AT&T MLS All-Star Game and MLS Cup 2013



BBVA Compass Stadium (Houston, Texas): Houston Dynamo's new downtown Houston stadium, which seats 22,000, opened on May 12, 2012.



Stade Saputo (Montreal, Canada): Montreal Impact began their inaugural season in MLS at Olympic Stadium moving into the renovated Stade Saputo on the Olympic grounds in June of 2012.



Avaya Stadium (San Jose, California): San Jose Earthquakes begin its 2016 campaign in its brand new Avaya Stadium (capacity: 18,000) for the second season. The European-inspired building is the first cloud-enabled venue in Major League Soccer and is among the most technologically advanced stadiums in the world.



Opening in 2017:

Mercedes-Benz Stadium (Atlanta, Georgia): Upon completion in 2017, Mercedes-Benz Stadium will be a world-class sports and entertainment facility and home to Atlanta United and the National Football League's Atlanta Falcons. Atlanta United is scheduled to play the first-ever sporting event in the state-of-the-art stadium on July 30, 2017.

/// TELEVISION

The 2017 season, the third of an eight-year television and media rights partnership with ESPN, FOX Sports and Univision, will continue to showcase new, consistent national television schedules, expanded live game streaming and innovative season-ending schedule enhancements – giving fans more opportunities than ever to engage with MLS content.



Sky Sports in the UK, pan-European broadcaster Eurosport, Globosat in Brazil, Abu Dhabi Media in the Middle East and North Africa, Letv Sports in mainland China, beIN SPORTS across Southeast Asia and Australia, FOX Sports Latin America and FOX Sports Africa, together with ESPN, broadcast select games across their international platforms, and are part of the ever-growing portfolio of MLS' global broadcast partnerships.

Every MLS match is televised in 2017, either nationally or regionally, and most are available to stream through MLS LIVE.

U.S. OPEN CUP

LAMAR HUNT U.S. OPEN CUP



Dating back to 1914, the U.S. Open Cup is the oldest cup competition in United States soccer and is the third longest-running soccer tournament in the world.

Open to all affiliated amateur and professional teams in the United States, the annual U.S. Open Cup is a 100-plus-year-old single-elimination tournament.

The U.S. Open Cup is very similar to domestic cup competitions popular throughout Europe, South America and the rest of the world. Cup competitions, which usually run concurrent with a country's league season, are open in the early stages to any club that qualifies, giving local amateur teams a chance to compete against the best teams a country has to offer.

In leagues like the English Premier League, Serie A in Italy and the Bundesliga in Germany, cup competitions are prestigious tournaments waged between countries' strongest teams such as Manchester United, AC Milan and Bayern Munich, and smaller teams like the amateur French side Calais that made it to the finals of the 2000 Coupe de France only to fall to defending champions Nantes on an injury time penalty kick. Watford F.C. in England, was another small-time

club that hit it big in 1984 by making it all the way to the F.A. Cup Final. Unfashionable Chesterfield of the Second Division (the third flight in England) advanced to the semifinals of the 1997 F.A. Cup in England before finally losing. And the U.S. has seen its share of Cinderella runs, the most recent of which saw amateur side Cal FC advance past two professional clubs (Division III USL Pro side Wilmington Hammerheads and Division I MLS team Portland Timbers) on its march to the Round of 16 in 2012.

The winner of each country's domestic cup competition, in addition to taking home the prize money, is automatically placed into a tournament to compete against neighboring countries' cup winners.

In 1999, the U.S. Open Cup was renamed the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup to honor the long-time soccer supporter and pioneer. Hunt, who died in 2006, was one of the sport's first major ownership figures in the United States and is a member of the National Soccer Hall of Fame. His family continues to operate FC Dallas in Major League Soccer.

The winning team of the U.S. Open Cup has its name engraved on the Dewar Challenge Trophy, which has been permanently retired and remains at U.S. Soccer House in Chicago.

/// OPEN CUP FACTS

- Founded for the 1913-14 season, the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup is the oldest soccer competition in the United States and is the third longest-running soccer tournament in the world.
- In 1999, U.S. Soccer renamed the tournament after Lamar Hunt, a founding member of both Major League Soccer (MLS) and the North American Soccer League (NASL). Hunt is also a member of the National Soccer Hall of Fame, as well as the Pro Football Hall of Fame and the International Tennis Hall of Fame.
- Similar to other domestic cups worldwide, the U.S. Open Cup is a knockout-style tournament with home field determined by a coin toss.
- The annual tournament is open to all amateur and professional soccer teams in the United States. In 2016, 91 teams from eight different leagues participated.
- Based on the United States soccer league system, teams in respective leagues are awarded automatic byes into certain rounds. MLS teams are automatically awarded byes into the Fourth Round (consisting of 32 teams). Teams in the second-tier of American soccer – NASL – are awarded byes into the Third Round.
- All teams within the top three tiers of the U.S. Soccer system (MLS, NASL, USL) are automatically qualified for the tournament. Teams in lower tiers have to qualify for the tournament based on certain criteria in their respective leagues.
- This excludes teams that are owned and operated by MLS franchises – including Bethlehem Steel FC, as well as many other “2” franchises, such as New York Red Bulls or Toronto FC. Those teams are not eligible to play in the U.S. Open Cup.
- The amount of participants in the main draw of the tournament has grown in consecutive years since 2011, growing from 40 to 64 (2012) to 68 (2013) to 80 (2014) to 91 (2015).
- For the 2016 Cup, the winner (FC Dallas) was awarded \$250,000. The runner-up (New England Revolution) was awarded \$60,000.

ATLANTA UNITED INAUGURAL SEASON: THE BEGINNING OF

On April 16, 2014, it was announced that Atlanta once again would welcome the world's most popular sport to the epicenter of the Southeast.

The city was the largest metropolitan area without a Major League Soccer (MLS) franchise, but now has Atlanta United as its official home team. The club took to the pitch for the very first time on Feb. 11 at Finley Stadium against the hosting Chattanooga FC for a preseason match. On Sunday, March 5 at 7 p.m., Atlanta United will play host to the New York Red Bulls at Georgia Tech's Bobby Dodd Stadium in the regular-season opener. It will mark the first time major professional soccer has been played in Atlanta since 1981 with the Atlanta Chiefs of the National Professional Soccer League (NPSL) and the North American Soccer League (NASL).

Owner Arthur Blank worked for more than 10 years to bring soccer back to the city, and his dream has become a reality.

"This is something that will help elevate our league," MLS Commissioner Don Garber said in the introductory news conference. "It will also elevate our sport in the entire Southeast, which is something that is very important to us strategically."

WINNING TRADITION

The city already has a history of success that Blank, President Darren Eales and head coach Gerardo Martino are eager to recreate. The Atlanta Chiefs were the first Atlanta professional sports franchise

to win a title, capturing the NASL championship in 1968 and establishing themselves as the premier soccer club in the United States. Atlanta also stunned international soccer fans that year, twice beating the prestigious English League club Manchester City.

Blank spoke to more than 4,000 fans at the SOHO Lounge in midtown Atlanta on July 7, 2015 during the club's official launch party.

"We are here for you," Blank said in front of a large crowd. "This is your team. I promised three things: to put a winning team on the field, to provide a great match-day experience for our fans and to entrench this club into the community. We're on our way to fulfilling those promises, and I look forward to sharing the excitement of building this club with our incredible supporters."

STARTING FROM SCRATCH

Every great soccer team has a specific style of play. On Sept. 27, 2016, Atlanta United named Gerardo "Tata" Martino as the club's inaugural head coach and lead tactician in charge of keeping the players in good form and extracting the most from his 18-player game-day squad.

"We are delighted that a manager of Gerardo's caliber and pedigree will be leading our team into our inaugural season," said Eales. "His deep experience and success at both the club and international levels speak for itself, and his vision and approach aligns very well with our club philosophy. We're confident

in his ability to help build a winning culture both on and off the pitch.”

Martino, 54, managed the Argentina National Team from 2014-2016 and has had stops at FC Barcelona (2013-14) and Newell's Old Boys (2011-13). Martino's beliefs fell in line with the United front office, including technical director Carlos Bocanegra.

“They shared with me their ideas, objectives, and stadium plans, and I understood that this was a unique proposal that I couldn't pass up,” said Martino. He also spoke of having the opportunity to make sure the club has the same philosophy, not only the first team, but also the academy.

ROSTER CONSTRUCTION

Martino will have talent on the United roster, which features a blend of experienced veterans and talented youth.

On Jan. 25, goalkeeper Alexander Tambakis became the club's first player signed in Atlanta United history. Months later, long-term pieces were added with 18-year-old Ghanaian striker Jeffrey Otoo and 16-year-old midfielder Andrew Carleton. Carleton, a Powder Springs-native, became the club's first home-grown player. Atlanta proceeded to sign Locust Grove-native Chris Goslin, 16, as another homegrown player Oct. 6 and 18-year-old forward Brandon Vazquez on Dec. 2. Carleton, Goslin and Vazquez are all fixtures on U.S. Youth National Teams.

Expected to play major roles are 29-year-old Wigan Athletic midfielder Chris McCann, 32-year-old striker Kenwyne Jones of the English Premier League and two MLS veterans -- 33-year-old midfielder Jeff Larentowicz and 30-year-old winger Jacob Peterson. Atlanta used its Designated Player spots to bring in play-makers, adding Argentine forward Hector “Tito” Villalba, Paraguayan midfielder Miguel Almiron and Venezuelan forward Josef Martinez.

In the MLS SuperDraft on Jan. 13, Atlanta United selected defender Miles Robinson from Syracuse University with the No. 2 pick and Julian Gressel, a midfielder from Providence College, with the No. 8 pick.

On Jan. 25, Atlanta signed 32-year-old goalkeeper Brad Guzan, who spent the last nine years playing in the English Premier League between Aston Villa and Middlesbrough, while earning 53 caps with the United States Men's National Team.

HOMECOMING

After opening the inaugural season at Historic Grant Field at Georgia Tech's Bobby Dodd Stadium, Atlanta United will begin play at the club's permanent home Mercedes-Benz Stadium on July 30. The match against Orlando City SC will be nationally televised on FOX and will kick-off at 4:30pm. A fervent fan base is ready to back Atlanta United. Eales assured the Atlanta-Journal Constitution's Doug Roberson that “Atlanta is a sports city, and Atlanta loves soccer. You can't argue with it.”

Locker Rooms & Boxes: Stadium features separate locker rooms for football and soccer teams. The soccer locker rooms and adjacent clubs are designed to allow teams to have a traditional walk together through the clubs and onto the pitch. CHILDREN'S HEALTHCARE OF ATLANTA TRAINING GROUND



Scheduled to open in of April, The Children's Healthcare of Atlanta Training Ground is a \$60 million state-of-the-art training center in Marietta, Ga.

Once completed, the training ground will be a best-in-class facility and will rival top international training centers.

Located on Franklin Gateway, the 33-acre site will include a 30,000 square-foot team headquarter building and six full-sized training fields, including both natural grass and artificial turf. The facility will be home to Atlanta United's first team and academy teams and will house Atlanta United front office and technical staff.

"We are committed to building the best club in MLS, and that begins with creating a training environment that cultivates a winning attitude," said Atlanta United owner Arthur Blank. "This facility will not only enable our players to develop at the highest level, it will provide opportunities for up-close experiences for our fans and allow our club to make a significant impact in the community."

The training ground will hold open training sessions and tournaments, as well as host visiting national and international clubs. Designed by Atlanta-based architecture firm TVS Design, it will be home to the club's youth academy, first team players and club staff. The site was designed with the idea of giving academy players the chance to observe and interact with the first team on a regular basis.

"Youth development will play a critical role in the overall success of our club," said Atlanta United president

Darren Eales. "We put a lot of thought into the design of the training ground to ensure that it provided our first team with a top-flight training environment, as well as an open, collaborative and aspirational atmosphere for our young academy players."

Construction on the training center began in February of 2016. The project brought in \$60 million in private investment and created 80 jobs at the site in Marietta.

Sustainability was also a priority when planning began on the training ground. The Children's Healthcare of Atlanta Training Ground will be the first MLS training facility to achieve Leadership in Energy and Design (LEED) certification, a designation based on a building's resource efficiency.

The site will utilize high-efficiency water fixtures to achieve more than a 40 percent water-use reduction and will utilize well water instead of municipally provided water to irrigate the playing fields. Two quick-charge, electric vehicle charging stations will also be installed on site.

In an effort to promote health and wellness, the training ground will be a tobacco free campus, feature an edible garden on-site to be used in the center's cafeteria and provide bottle filling stations that will reduce the use of plastic bottles and educate athletes and spectators on the importance of hydration.

On February 28, 2017, Atlanta United announced Children's Healthcare of Atlanta as the club's official pediatric healthcare system and the naming partner of its new training ground. Children's Healthcare of Atlanta is ranked among the top children's hospitals in the country, and is home to a nationally ranked sports medicine program.

BOBBY DODD STADIUM



Georgia Tech's storied football facility has been a cornerstone of college football for 103 years. Cozily nestled amid Atlanta's skyscrapers, Bobby Dodd Stadium at Historic Grant Field is easily one of the nation's most unique settings for college football.

Originally built in 1913 by members of the Georgia Tech student body, Bobby Dodd Stadium at Historic Grant Field is the oldest on-campus stadium in NCAA Division I Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS).

During the 2013 season, Georgia Tech celebrated the 100th anniversary of Grant Field.

Georgia Tech's football facility was known as Grant Field until April 1988, when the Georgia State Board of Regents voted to add the name Bobby Dodd Stadium in honor of the legendary coach who guided the Ramblin' Wreck to its most illustrious football era. A member of the National Football Foundation College Football Hall of Fame, Dodd compiled a 165-64-8 record from 1945-66,

and tutored 21 All-Americans as he led Tech to 13 bowl trips during his 22-year stay as head coach. Dodd served as Tech's director of athletics from 1951-76 and then worked as a consultant for the alumni association until his death in 1988 following a 57-year association with the Institute.

The name change was the first for the facility since it was named Hugh Inman Grant Field in 1914 after a gift from John W. Grant, a member of the Tech Board of Trustees and a well-known Atlanta merchant.

The Grant family did not give the land on which Grant Field is built. However, they did give the initial \$15,000 used in 1913 to build the first permanent concrete stands on the west side of the field. In gratitude for the gift, the Board of Trustees named the field Hugh Inman Grant Field in memory of Grant's deceased son.

Tech actually began playing football on this site in 1905, but in 1913, the original concrete West Stands were largely built by Tech students and seated 5,600. The concrete East Stands were completed in time for the 1924 season. A year later, the South Stands were finished, bringing the seating capacity to approximately 30,000.

In 1947, the West Stands were rebuilt, which raised the capacity to 40,000, and a new press box was added. The North Stands were erected in 1958 to bring the seating to 44,105. A second deck was added to the East side in 1962, increasing capacity to 53,300. The facility was expanded again in 1967, when the West Stands were double-decked to bring capacity to 58,121. That project also included new press and photo levels, including an elevator.

Following the 1985 season, the historic South Stands, which formed the familiar U-shape on North Avenue, were razed. In their place is the William C. Wardlaw Center, a multi-purpose facility for Georgia Tech's athletic and academic departments that was opened in 1988. Seating capacity was reduced to 46,000.

A major renovation was completed prior to the 1992 season with the construction of the Bill Moore Student Success Center behind the West Stands, as well as the addition of 32 executive suites, the renovation of the President's Box and press level and the addition of the Roy Richards Festival concourse area under the West Stands.

Natural grass returned to Grant Field in 1995 after 24 seasons with artificial turf. The field was originally surfaced with AstroTurf in 1971 and resurfaced in 1979, and then new artificial All-Pro Turf was installed in 1988.

The venerable stadium added another chapter to its storied history with a new look and an expanded capacity in 2003 when a two-year expansion and renovation raised capacity to 55,000 seats and added numerous amenities. The \$75 million endeavor included the expansion and renovation of Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field and the rebuilding of Russ Chandler Stadium, Tech's 4,157-seat baseball facility.

The focal point of the project was the North End Zone structure, which seats 15,678 in two levels and also includes 10 luxury suites and the Howard Ector Letterwinners Lounge. The complex also features the 7,000-square foot Kim King Football Locker Room, a 3,300-square foot players' lounge, and coaches' offices that overlook Grant Field.

In addition to the rebuilt seating area, the lower east structure features 20 executive suites as well as 2,040 chair-backed club seats between the 25-yard lines and a private air-conditioned lounge for those patrons.

At the south end of Bobby Dodd Stadium, 2,970 seats were added in front of the Wardlaw Building, providing seating in the south end zone for the first time since 1985. The south end zone seating and the lower levels of the east and north stands form a three-sided bowl.

Construction began following the 2001 season, with the first phase completed for the 2002 season, when capacity was 43,719. The first phase saw the completion of the lower bowl seating in the south, east and north areas of the stadium.

A new natural grass playing surface and drainage system was installed, and the field was shifted approximately 30 feet to the north and 15 feet to the west. Program management was provided by Carter/ Turner, a joint venture of Carter & Associates and Turner Construction, while HOK Sport was the project's architect.

Georgia Tech continues to make improvements to the facility on a yearly basis. A new, larger video board and ribbon boards were installed just in time for the start of the 2009 season. Renovations were also done in 2009 on the Festival level of the west side and throughout the stadium.

In the summer of 2016, Georgia Tech partnered with Panasonic to replace all existing LED boards with new state-of-the-art screens and equipment.

Today's Bobby Dodd Stadium seats 55,000 fans in a modern, comfortable facility that embraces the tradition that has made Tech's venerable stadium a cornerstone of college football for a century.

Not only has Historic Grant Field been the site of legendary football games, the facility has also hosted major special events. In 1935, a standing-room only crowd of more than 50,000 packed Historic Grant Field to listen to a speech from Franklin Delano Roosevelt. Nelson Mandela gave a speech in the stadium in 1990 after being released from prison. In June 2015, Bobby Dodd Stadium hosted The Rolling Stones during their ZIP CODE Tour. It was the Stones' second concert at Bobby Dodd Stadium (1989). Other artists to perform at Bobby Dodd Stadium include Yes (1974), Bob Seger & the Silver Bullet Band (1977), Heart (1977), Cheap Trick (1977), Foreigner (1977), The Doobie Brothers (1978), Aerosmith (1979), Simon & Garfunkel (1983), New Kids On The Block (1990), and Jimmy Buffett (1993).

The Atlanta United Foundation (AUF) strives to make the game of soccer accessible and inclusive for individuals across the state of Georgia.

Through the global game of soccer, Atlanta United Foundation grant programs stress the importance of physical fitness while building a supportive culture of play and sportsmanship. AUF invests in nonprofit organizations that make soccer fun, exciting, and accessible for individuals who otherwise would not get to participate. AUF is an affiliated fund of the Arthur M. Blank Family Foundation.

In October, Atlanta United, grantee organization Soccer in the Streets and MARTA announced a community project to help develop grassroots soccer and provide life skills programs to Atlanta's underserved urban communities. The project, officially named 'Station Soccer - Five Points MARTA Station,' represents the first soccer field to be built inside the perimeter of a major urban transit station in the world.

For the 2017 season, AUF will focus on three main avenues to help non-profit groups in the form of access, resources, and support. AUF will provide equipment donations that remove barriers to participation for

high-need groups across the state as well as continue to look for innovative field proposals to provide free space for play. Lastly, AUF will focus on providing support to organizations looking to expand after school programs and youth soccer development.

As part of Major League Soccer, Atlanta United supports the league's community outreach initiative, MLS WORKS, to improve the community where we live and play by executing programs and campaigns that focus on cancer research and treatment, anti-discrimination, community service, health and wellness, environmental sustainability and accessibility to soccer.

The United Soccer League (USL) is the world's largest Division II professional soccer league, with 30 markets in 20 U.S.

states and two Canadian provinces for the 2017 season. In total, the USL reaches a population of 75 million people, fueling the growth of professional soccer across North America.

In 2016, over \$100 million were invested league-wide into stadium infrastructure to create venues that deliver an unforgettable fan and competitor experience. The USL has national media partnerships with ESPN and SiriusXM, and recently invested \$10 million to create USL Productions - which includes a state-of-the-art facility that will produce and distribute nearly 500 league

matches and over 1,000 hours of original content to national partners, local affiliates, USL's Match Center and international markets.

A growing league, the USL has more than doubled in size since 2014, with the Ottawa Fury FC, Reno 1868 FC and the Tampa Bay Rowdies scheduled to debut in 2017. Nashville SC is the first club set to join the league for 2018. Beyond league play, the USL regularly features international exhibitions against leading Premier League, LigaMX, and Bundesliga clubs, among others.

Headquartered in Tampa, Fla., the USL provides unparalleled club support with a growing team of almost 50 professionals across 17 departments, ranging from operations to marketing, communications, and sponsorship.

Charleston Battery is an American professional soccer club based in Charleston, South Carolina and the United Soccer League partner of Atlanta United. Founded in 1993, the team plays in the USL and, along with the Richmond Kickers, is the oldest continuously operating professional soccer club in the United States. In 1999, Charleston Battery moved into what is now known as MUSC Health Stadium, becoming the first non-Major League Soccer professional club in the United States to build its own stadium. Charleston Battery is one of the most successful lower division soccer teams in the nation, having previously won the USISL Pro League in 1996, the USL A-League in 2003, and the final season of the USL Second Division in 2010. In 2012, the team won the USL Pro Championship. In January 2016,



Atlanta United affiliated with the Battery forming a partnership. Per league rules as of 2015, every established MLS club must have a USL partner. Five Atlanta United players spent time with the Battery last season.
