ANDREW HAUPTMAN

OWNER, CHICAGO FIRE SOCCER CLUB



Andrew Hauptman became the second owner of the Chicago Fire Soccer Club after receiving approval from Major League Soccer in September 2007. Under his stewardship, the Fire has been a championship contender, making the MLS playoffs in 2007, 2008 and 2009 and was a major contender in SuperLiga 2009. Last year, the club hired Carlos de los Cobos as Head Coach with the intent of playing a more offensive-minded game. Disappointed with season results, the club went through an extensive review process during the off season with an eye toward rebuilding a winning team for the 2011 season.

Throughout his ownership tenure, Mr. Hauptman has worked to ensure the Fire is a world class organization on- and off-the pitch and has invested the resources to do so. He is focused on the growth of MLS domestically and abroad and the Fire organization in particular, invoking his philosophy of optimism, confidence and energy. He has high expectations for the club and is passionate about winning, preserving Fire tradition, and embracing the Chicago community. To grow the Fire brand and the club's revenues, Mr. Hauptman has improved the club's infrastructure and operations, and recruited top management and soccer talent. He played a key role in appointing former Fire star Frank Klopas as Fire Technical Director and bringing U.S. soccer star Brian McBride back to Chicago in 2008. His pioneering spirit is also evident in the significant investment and groundbreaking expansion of the youth development program.

The Fire is rebooting the club's first team this season by reconfiguring the coaching staff, technical team and processes. New hires include Mike Jeffries as Director of Player Personnel, Leo Percovich as assistant coach, and Tony Jouaux as the club's physical trainer. During the off-season, the technical staff traveled to more countries than all other seasons combined, visiting four continents to scout talent and build relationships.

Mr. Hauptman has also worked to invigorate the Fire's community efforts and recently formed the Chicago Fire Soccer Club Advisory Council to ensure the club is working closely and effectively with area businesses and non-profit organizations. The Chicago Fire Foundation has remained true to its mission of enriching the lives of the community's under-served youth. The Foundation has to-date provided over \$1.4 million in grants, contributions and in-kind support. In 2010, the "Kicks for Kids" program enabled over 8,000 children from nearly 70 local charitable organizations to attend a Chicago Fire game. In recognition of the club's overall community and charitable efforts, the Fire received the 2010 MLS W.O.R.K.S. Community Relations annual award.

Mr. Hauptman is the Chairman of Andell Holdings, a private investment firm and family office which he controls along with his wife Ellen Bronfman Hauptman. Founded in 1998, Andell's current activities are divided between direct investments in public and private companies and partnerships with top-tier investment managers around the globe. Mr. Hauptman oversees the firm's investment, operating and sports and entertainment businesses. Mr. Hauptman serves on Major League Soccer's Board of Governors, as well as the Competition and Media Committees. He serves on the board of directors of Sports Supply Group, the largest manufacturer, marketer and distributor of sporting goods products directly to the institutional and team sports marketplace, and serves as Chairman of Storage Mobility, the nation's largest franchisee of Portable On Demand Storage (PODS).

Mr. Hauptman has produced feature films through his production company, Andell Entertainment. His past films have included State of Play, starring Russell Crowe, Millions, directed by Danny Boyle and the Sundance feature, Safe Men.

He is Chairman and Co-Founder of City Year Los Angeles, a national program that engages 17- to 24-year-olds for a year of full-time service in an effort to combat the drop out epidemic, and serves as a Trustee of City Year's National Board. His many philanthropic and civic activities include oversight of the Hauptman Family Foundation; service on the Board of Trustees of The Charles Bronfman Prize and on the Advisory Board of Grassroot Soccer.

Mr. Hauptman holds a BA in History from Yale University and an MBA from Harvard University.

He lives with his wife Ellen and their two children in Los Angeles.



JAVIER LEON

MANAGING DIRECTOR, ANDELL SPORTS GROUP

Javier Leon is the Managing Director of Andell Sports Group, which oversees the sports and related assets for Andell Holdings. Mr. Leon oversees the business and operations of the Fire on behalf of owner Andrew Hauptman. He works closely with Fire President Julian Posada and the franchise's management team and staff to build and grow Andell's sports business, both in the local and international markets.

He is involved in strategic planning, marketing, as well as the development of Hispanic, community and public relations strategies and programs. Prior to joining Andell, Mr. Leon spent three years as the Chief Executive Officer for Chivas USA Enterprises in Los Angeles.

Before his work within the MLS, Mr. Leon spent 12 years in the investment banking world as a managing director for Merrill Lynch, Deutsche Bank, and ING-Bairings. He holds a bachelors degree from Claremont McKenna College and a Master of International Management from the University of California at San Diego.

Mr. Leon lives in Los Angeles with his wife and four children.

PRESIDENT, CHICAGO FIRE SOCCER CLUB

Julian Posada was named President of the Chicago Fire Soccer Club on September 16, 2010 and is entering his first full season as President of the Club. Posada serves as the Fire's top business executive leading the strategic planning and overall management of the club and stadium operations. Born in Michigan with two Colombian parents, Posada has lived and worked in Chicago as a top media and entertainment executive for nearly 20 years. As a dedicated and successful executive, Posada has also been consistently recognized by civic and community organizations for his creative and effective leadership, as well as his valuable contributions to the community.

Most recently, Posada served as Founder and President of Café Media, a multimedia company that targets second and third generation Hispanics through a combination of print, event, electronic and web platforms in Chicago as well as other cities. Prior to this, Posada was General Manager for Hoy, Chicago's only Spanish Daily Newspaper (Tribune owned and operated). Posada was responsible for the day-to-day activities of Hoy Chicago including editorial, sales, finance, marketing, circulation and production. In addition to launching Hoy Chicago, he was also part of the team that launched Hoy Los Angeles.

Posada has held senior level positions at Citibank in Colombia SA; he was a Principal at the J.C. Williams Consulting group; and he served as Director of Business Development at Querico.com as part of Ethnicgrocer.com.

Posada currently serves on numerous non-profit boards, including the Academy for Urban School Leadership, The Taproot Foundation, Public Allies, The Metropolitan Chicago YMCA and as a Trustee of National Louis University among various other boards and committees within the Hispanic community.

Additionally, he has received several awards and recognitions for his business achievements and community service. He served as a McCormick Tribune Media Fellow (2006), was a winner of Presstime's 20 under 40 (2007) and was selected by Chicago United as a Business Leader of Color (2007). Recently he was selected as a recipient of the Cook County State's Attorney's 2008 Arnold Mireles Community Empowerment Award and in 2009 he received the NSHMBA Briliante Award, as well as the 2010 Exito Award from HACE.

He earned an MBA from the J.L. Kellogg Graduate School of Management and a B.S. in Food Systems, Economics and Management from Michigan State University.

FRANK KLOPAS

TECHNICAL DIRECTOR

Frank Klopas returns to the Chicago Fire Soccer Club for his fourth season as the club's first Technical Director, overseeing roster development and scouting for the Chicago Fire first team. Klopas, a Chicago soccer legend, will build off his wealth of experience as a player in leagues both domestic and abroad and his coaching background to help direct the Chicago Fire toward the MLS Cup Playoffs.

Born September 1, 1966 in Prosimna, Greece, Klopas came to Chicago as a young boy and began his professional playing career when he signed with the Chicago Sting in 1984 at the age of 18. As a member of the Sting from 1984 until 1988, Klopas tallied 68 goals and 42 assists in 140 games and witnessed the Chicago club take home the 1984 NASL championship. His play with the Sting earned him a spot with the U. S. National Team from 1987 through 1996, recording 13 goals in 45 appearances over his nine years with the team.

After strong performances for the U.S. Men's National Team in the 1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul, South Korea, Klopas joined AEK Athens of Greece. He played for AEK four seasons, helping the team make two appearances in the European Cup and the UEFA Cup.

Klopas' play in Greece convinced head coach Bora Milutinovic to select him for the U.S. 1994 World Cup team. In late 1994, Klopas joined Apollon in Athens on loan for a half-season before returning to the U.S. in June of 1995 with the intent on joining Major League Soccer for its inaugural season. Klopas was allocated by MLS to the Kansas City Wizards in 1996, where he played two seasons before being traded to the Fire in 1998.

A member of the original Fire squad, Klopas helped the club capture the American double -- winning the MLS Cup and U.S. Open Cup in 1998. Klopas instantly went into the record books by notching the Fire's first two-goal effort in the team's first game at Soldier Field on April 4, 1998. Klopas was influential in helping the Fire take home the 1998 Open Cup title by scoring the 99th-minute golden goal game-winner.

On January 25, 2000, Klopas announced his retirement from playing professional soccer. Following his retirement he joined the Fire staff as assistant coach for the 2000 season. In 2004, Klopas was named Head Coach and general Manager of the MISL Chicago Storm, leading them to their first playoff appearance in 2005. Klopas is also founder and a coach for the F.C. Drive youth soccer club in Chicago.

In June 2004, Klopas was inducted into the Chicago Fire "Ring of Fire" Hall of Fame as well as the Illinois Soccer Hall of Fame in 2005. Klopas, 43, holds a United States Soccer Federation "A" license and lives in Chicago with his wife, Sophia.

DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

Mike Jeffries returns to the Fire after spending 2010 scouting for U.S. Soccer ahead of, and during, the 2010 FIFA World Cup. A long-time player and coach with experience in all levels of soccer, Jeffries will help guide the club's personnel decisions while assisting Technical Director Frank Klopas with scouting and player recruitment.

Jeffries first joined the Fire in the club's inaugural year of 1998 as an assistant coach for Bob Bradley. The Bethesda, MD product helped coach the Fire to the "American Double" in 1998 and served three seasons on Bradley's staff before accepting the head coaching position for the Dallas Burn (now FC Dallas).

In his three seasons as head coach of the Burn, Jeffries led Dallas to a record of 28-39-17 with playoff appearances in 2001 and 2002. Jeffries returned to the Men in Red as an Assistant Coach in 2008 under then Head Coach Denis Hamlett and helped lead the club to back-to-back Eastern Conference Finals.

Jeffries began his soccer career at Duke as a player from 1980-83, earning the prestigious Hermann Award in 1983. He played for the NASL Minnesota Strikers in 1984 before becoming the first American player selected in the MISL draft by the Minnesota Strikers. He played for the Strikers from 1984-88, and the Dallas Sidekicks in 1988. Jeffries was a member of the U.S. Men's National team in 1984-1985 earning three career appearances.

In addition to his experience in MLS, Jeffries coached at his Alma Mater Duke University (2006-2008), Southern Methodist University (2004), The A League's New Orleans Riverboat Gamblers (1995) the University of the Incarnate Word (2005) and began the LaFreniere Select Soccer Program in New Orleans where he served as Director of Coaching from 1992-1996.

Jeffries graduated from Duke University with a degree in electrical engineering and public policy. He has his "A" coaching license and a Master in Finance degree from Tulane University.

Born on May 20, 1962, Jeffries and his wife, Terry, have three children: Kaitlin, A.J. and Nathan.



HEAD COACH



CARLOS DE LOS COBOS

HEAD COACH

Carlos de los Cobos was named Chicago Fire's head coach on January, 11, 2010, bringing with him more than 30 years of international soccer experience as a coach and a professional player throughout Mexico and Central America. He has played on and coached in some of the World's largest competitions, including the World Cup and Olympic Games.

Prior to joining the Chicago Fire, de los Cobos spent four years as head coach of the El Salvador national team, where he helped them reach the final round of 2010 CONCACAF World Cup qualifying for the first time in 12 years. He's been credited with changing the international perception of El Salvador as it relates to football, along with reviving a national sentiment of pride within the country.

De los Cobos' coaching experiences also span Salvadoran powerhouse club CD FAS (2005-2006) and several of Mexico's top clubs, including: Querétaro FC in two stints (1993-1994 and 2004), Club Pachuca (1994), UANL Tigres (1994-1995), Club América (1996), CF Celaya (2001), Deportivo Irapuato (2003), and Lobos de UAP (2005).

In addition, he served as the head coach of the Mexican Olympic team (Atlanta 1996), the U-21 Mexican national team (Central American and Caribbean games - Maracaibo in 1998) winning a silver medal, and the U-23 Mexican national team (Central American and Caribbean games - San Salvador in 2002), earning another silver medal. He also shadowed Bora Milutinovic as the assistant coach of the Mexican national team to win the CONCACAF's 1996 Gold Cup, and served as Manuel Lapuente's right hand in winning the 1998 CONCACAF Gold Cup and participating in the 1998 World Cup in France.

A hardworking defender, de los Cobos began his playing career with Querétaro FC (1977-1978) before moving to giant Club América. During his 10-year stint with the Águilas (1979-1989), he anchored the defense to help lead the team to five league titles ('83/'84, '84/'85, '85 Prode - shortened league, '87/'88, and '88/'89) in what's called the club's "Golden Age".

With his performance at América, de los Cobos eventually received his call-up to represent the Mexican national team (1983-1986), where he accumulated 25 caps, appearing in the 1986 World Cup. He played an integral role in the team as it reached the quarter final stage (the farthest that Mexico has ever advanced in the country's history along with 1970) before being defeated by then West Germany in a penalty shootout, 4-1.

From 1989 to 1994, de los Cobos would spend time with two different clubs before retiring. He spent two stints with C.F. Monterrey (1989-1991 and 1992-1993) leading the team to a second-place finish during his second stay and two stints with Querétaro FC (1991-1992 and 1993-1994), where he ended his 17-year playing career.

Born on December 10, 1958 in Matamoros, Tamaulipas (Mexico), de los Cobos, along with colleague Martin Vasquez, will be the first Mexican full-time head coaches in MLS history. He and his wife, Mayte, have two children, Rafael and Paulina.

LEO PERCOVICH

FIRST ASSISTANT COACH

Leo Percovich, a veteran coach with MLS, La Liga and National Team experience is in his first year with the Chicago Fire Soccer Club. Percovich joins Head Coach Carlos de los Cobos' staff after spending the 2010 season with Toronto FC.

Percovich, 42, is a former Copa Libertadores and Uruguayan First Division champion. A native of Montevideo, Uruguay, he served as a goalkeeper coach with the Colorado Rapids (2006-2007) and Chivas USA (2008-2009) before joining Toronto FC as an assistant coach in 2009.

Percovich has trained under various coaches throughout Europe and Latin America, including spending time with club sides Real Madrid, Valencia, Stuttgart, Cruzeiro, and Pachuca as well as the national teams of Brazil, France, and Uruguay.

In his time as a player, Percovich made six appearances with the Uruguayan National Team during a professional career that saw him suit up for Nacional de Montevideo (1987-1993), Atlético Mineiro (1994), Guarani FC (1995), Fluminense FC (1995-1999), as well as Alianza de Lima in 2000 and Racing de Ferrol in 2001.



ARON HYDE

GOALKEEPER COACH

Aron Hyde returns for his second season as the goalkeeping coach for the Chicago Fire Soccer Club. Hyde has been integral in the rapid growth of the Fire's young, starting goalkeeper Sean Johnson, as evidenced by the 21-year-old's debut appearance for the U.S. Men's National Team this past January. In addition to training the Fire's goalkeeping core, the Birmingham, England product assists with scouting and player development.

The 28-year-old joined the Fire in 2010 after spending 2009 as an assistant coach with the University of Washington's men's team. Prior to joining the Huskies, Hyde worked as the Goalkeeping Coach for Seattle University's men's and women's soccer teams, from 2006-09.

Hyde previously coached for Seattle-based Emerald City FC where he served as assistant goalkeeper coach and head team coach for two of the boy's club teams. He has been involved as a Region IV Staff Coach, an NSCAA goalkeeping staff instructor and with the Washington state Olympic Development Program.

Hyde's vast playing experience includes spells with Walsall FC, Millwall FC, and Wycombe Wanderers in his native England. Stateside, he spent time at Judson College (NAIA). He currently possesses his USSF A and USSF Goalkeeping licenses, and is currently working towards the completion of his UEFA A Coaching License.

Hyde, who lives in Chicago, earned his Masters in Sport Administration and Leadership from Seattle University in 2009.

Tony Jouaux joins the Chicago Fire Soccer Club as its Strength and Conditioning Specialist. The 25-year-old previously served as a graduate assistant strength and conditioning coach at the University of Louisville. Jouaux will be responsible for developing and implementing strength, fitness and conditioning with the Fire first team.

While at Louisville, Jouaux worked with the men's and women's soccer teams and field hockey team. The former Auxerre youth player, worked closely with the men's soccer team as they advanced to the 2010 NCAA Championship game.

In addition to these roles, Sunderland serves as Technical Director/Head Coach of the Chicago Fire PDL, Super-20 and Juniors youth club.

Sunderland holds the USSF "A" License, USSF National "Youth" License, NSCAA Advanced National Diploma and the KNVB "Youth" Certificate. He joined the USSF National Instructional Staff in 2000 and the NSCAA Associate National Staff in 2002. He has been a member of the Illinois and Wisconsin ODP staffs as well as Region II boys and girls staffs.

His college coaching resume includes head coaching positions with the Men's and Women's programs at Wisconsin Lutheran College and Kendal College, as well as serving as the Men's Assistant Coach at Long Island University/CW Post College.

PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Since the launch of the Chicago Fire on October 8, 1997, the franchise has worked diligently to establish itself as the first professional soccer club in the United States to adopt a true "pyramid" of player development that gives young local talent the opportunity to advance from junior-level competitive training through to the first team. A renewed commitment from Fire owner Andrew Hauptman and head coach Carlos de los Cobos signal great things for the future growth of the fully-integrated Chicago Fire player development structure.

The Chicago Fire Premier (ZONE 3-Elite Level) PDL, Super-20, U19 and NPSL programs were added with teams competing in the United Soccer Leagues, National Premier Soccer League and IYSA competitions.

In 2007, the Chicago Fire announced the creation of the Chicago Fire Academy (ZONE 2-Growth Level) as an initiative for the advancement of professional development for U14, U16 and U18 boys within the Chicago market.

In 2003 the Chicago Fire Juniors (ZONE 1-Base Level) program was formed to train youth soccer players in a professionally run environment and has since expanded to included branches in Michigan, Mississippi, Indiana, Louisiana and Florida.

Completing the pyramid of player development, Chicago Fire Camps and Training, operated by Youth Elite Soccer (YES), form the entry level to Fire Player Development and programs include Summer Camps, Seasonal Training Programs and Regional Development Schools (RDS). The Chicago Fire is the only MLS club with a fully-integrated player development pyramid, from the recreation youth level all the way up to the first team MLS side.

FIRE ACADEMY OVERVIEW (ZONE 2 GROWTH LEVEL)

In July of 2007, the Chicago Fire announced the introduction of the Chicago Fire Academy (CFA) as its flagship Player Development program. The Academy was created to allow the Fire to develop local Chicagoland talent into potential MLS players. The Fire Academy technical staff scout the surrounding area each year to identify the most talented players ranging in age from 14 to 18. The pool of 65 players is assigned to a U-14, U-16 or U-18 team.

The Academy emphasizes the development of these players through professional-level training. Academy technical staff maintains an exclusive focus on the talented players that have aspirations to play at the highest level. The players are groomed in a professional manner receiving the same treatment and amenities as the first team. The CFA players have access to all of the facilities at TOYOTA PARK, an environment conducive to their growth and improvement. Players are able to use the same weight room, training room, practice fields, and locker room as the first team. Their training includes strength and conditioning, nutritional management, mental preparation, match and video analysis, and more. The players train year-round, usually 4-5 days per week, and play against other high-level talent from across the country.

2010 was a benchmark year for the program with the CFA becoming the first MLS academy to travel and train, in-full, with a MLS club during a preseason tour. By integrating its U-16 and U-18 clubs into MLS preseason, the Fire took the first real steps towards an all-encompassing program that incorporates the youth development game with the professional game. The year also saw the CFA become the first MLS Academy to be crowned National Champions when the U16 Academy team beat Cal Odyssey in Los Angeles to clinch the United States Development Academy U16 National title. To finalize a phenomenal 2010 season, Victor Pineda, a 17-year-old Bolingbrook native became the first Home Grown player in club history to be signed to a professional MLS contract. Also, he was the first player to benefit from the club's Pyramid of Player Development as Victor progressed from the Chicago Fire Juniors to the Academy and finally to the MLS roster.

Players in the Fire Academy participate in a training program that makes each individual eligible for the Major League Soccer Home Grown Talent Initiative. The Home Grown Talent Initiative is designed to allow teams to sign local players to MLS contracts without entering the MLS SuperDraft, strengthening the relationship between the Fire and the community. The Chicago Fire Academy allows players to participate at no cost to the player and the Academy does not jeopardize a player's NCAA eligibility. As members of the Academy, players are still allowed to compete for their respective high school programs, but not other club teams, as the player focuses on the Academy after their educational obligations. The Academy recruits players solely on their playing ability and potential and their desire to play professionally, regardless of their socio-economic background.

CFA 'MISSION STATEMENT'

To cultivate professional soccer players.

CFA 'Vision': To identify promising young soccer players, introduce them into a professional soccer environment with the purpose to advance the most talented of the field to the professional ranks of the Chicago Fire Soccer Club.

CFA 'Style of Play': The Chicago Fire brand of soccer is built upon the principles of play, it emphasizes a passing based creative attacking game balanced with aggressive adaptable defending, integrated by explosive, intelligent transition.

The Chicago Fire Juniors (CFJ)

First established in 2004 as the official youth soccer club of Major League Soccer's Chicago Fire, the Chicago Fire Juniors are the only professionally based network of youth soccer clubs in the United States. The Chicago Fire Juniors are part of the Chicago Fire (MLS) Player Development Program and are an integral piece of the Player Development Pyramid. This "Pyramid" creates a progressive developmental structure providing players with an opportunity to move from introductory, competitive and elite youth play into professional academy formats (Fire Academy U14, U16, U18) and professional development programs (Super 20, NPSL, PDL) – finally, onto the Fire MLS team. The Chicago Fire Juniors, in association with the Chicago Red Eleven of the women's W-League, replicate the Player Development Pyramid for females by providing young ladies the opportunity to play at a high level.

In 2010, the Chicago Fire saw a number of junior clubs join the CFJ family. CFJ North and CFJ NW Indiana signed up from the Chicago land area to support our hub club in Naperville and Wheaton, whilst CFJ Florida joined Louisiana, Michigan and Mississippi in promoting the Fire further afield. With a mission to 'lead the evolution of youth soccer' and vision to 'foster a culture of excellence both on and off the field of play and create an environment that develops players from grassroots to excellence', CFJ's benefit from the PLAYER, COACH and ADMINISTRATIVE expertise of a professional soccer club.

In becoming a Chicago Fire Juniors (CFJ) Club receive...

CFJ ADMINISTRATION

- ★ An initial strategic business consultation delivered by Director of Player Development, Chicago Fire Academy Director/MLS Assistant Coach and Director of Soccer and Team Development to identify 'ONE CLUB' philosophy and outline partnership guidelines.

CHICAGO FIRE PREMIER (ZONE 3 ELITE LEVEL)

Chicago Fire Premier is considered Zone 3 of the Fire Pyramid of Player Development and includes:

CHICAGO FIRE PDL

The Chicago Fire PDL side has been one of the most successful franchises in the United Soccer Leagues Premier Development League since joining the league in 2001 as the Chicago Fire Reserves. Over nine years of play, the team has had an evolution of name changes going from going to the Chicago Fire Premier in 2004, before becoming just the Chicago Fire in 2008. While the names have changed the constants for the Chicago Fire PDL has stamped its dominance on the league, compiling a 115-19-20 regular season record while helping to send 72 players into the professional ranks. In May 2010, former Fire PDL players Jay DeMerit, Ricardo Clark, Jonathan Spector and Brad Guzan joined former Fire First Teamers Carlos Bocanegra and DaMarcus Beasley on the U.S. Men's National Team roster for the 2010 FIFA World Cup in South Africa. DeMerit and Clark both played in the tournament, helping the U.S. to its first group championship since 1930 and the team's fourth advancement to the knockout stage of the tournament.

Some of the team's accomplishments in the past nine seasons include:

- * USL record 9-straight playoff appearances (2001-09)
- * 7 Division titles (2001-06, 2008)
- * 14 All-USL players
- * Highest winning percentage (.746) of all North American teams since 2001

- * 83 former players moving to the professional ranks both in the USA and Europe including Chicago Fire first team member Dasan Robinson

CHICAGO FIRE SUPER-20

The Chicago Fire Super-20 team was formed in 2007 and plays in the USL's Super-20 League. The Super-20 team provides the opportunity for the top 17-20 year old players in North America to play high level competition in the summer months, in conjunction with Premier Development League teams. With the creation of the Super-20 side, Chicago's youth development program has a bridge for players looking to make the progression from Academy teams to the higher PDL level. The Super-20 team had many accomplishments:

- * Hosted the 2009 and 2010 Super-20 League Championship in Rockford, IL
- * Midwest Division Champions for the fourth consecutive year.
- * Qualification for the Super-20 League Championship for third consecutive year
- * Striker Teal Bunbury (Akron University) and defender Aaron Maund (Notre Dame) selected to All-League Team
- * 10-0-0 Regular Season record
- * North American Champions (2008)
- * North American Finalists (2007, 2009, 2010)

CHICAGO FIRE NPSL

The Fire NPSL team is a key feature of the Chicago Fire Premier program and is an integral part of the clubs long term player development pyramid. Commonly referred to as the PDL 'reserve team', the side formed in 2008 and now regularly participates in the National Premier Soccer League (NPSL) Mid West Division. Although other NPSL teams generally include former and current University and College, foreign, amateur, ex-professional and youth players, the Fire specifically utilize the team to prepare college players for the PDL team. Players can obtain a place on the NPSL roster through open try-outs each May or as former Fire Juniors, Academy, U19, U20 or U23 player. The Chicago Fire NPSL team won the USASA U23 National Championship in 2010.

CHICAGO FIRE U19

Since the advent of the Chicago Fire Academy in 2007, as part of the Player Development pyramid in Zone 3, former academy players returning in their first summer back to participate in Zone 3 as home grown players play as a team in U19 USYSA National Championship competition. The U19 program has won the Illinois State Cup in all three years that the program has competed in 2008, 2009 and 2010 advancing to the National Regional level competition each year while compiling an overall record of 15-3-1 in three years of competition.


DIRECTOR OF SOCCER AND TEAM DEVELOPMENT

He was one of the two founding members of the Chicago Fire Premier, formerly called the Chicago Fire Reserves, from 2001-04. Dorn has served as the Director of Soccer since 2001 and President of the Fire Premier's parent organization, Chicago Fire Premier FC, from 2005 through 2010. During that time, 82 players have moved from the Fire Premier system to the professional level. Prior to joining the Fire, Dorn served as the head coach at Brother Rice High School in Chicago from 1994-97, as a volunteer assistant coach at Loyola University from 1997-98, Director of Soccer at Moraine Valley Community College from 1998-2000 and Director of Coaching for the Chicago Area Soccer League from 1998-2000. He received his USSF and NSCAA licenses in 1993 and 94.



LARRY SUNDERLAND

ACADEMY DIRECTOR/ASSISTANT 1ST TEAM COACH

As Academy Director, Larry Sunderland will develop curriculum guidelines, monitor player and staff development, coach and oversee all soccer-specific aspects of Chicago Fire player development. He also serves as Technical Director of the Chicago Fire PDL, Super-20 and Juniors youth club.

Sunderland holds the USSF "A" License, USSF National "Youth" License, NSCAA Advanced National Diploma and the KNVB "Youth" Certificate. He joined the USSF National Instructional Staff in 2000 and the NSCAA Associate National Staff in 2002. He has been a member of the Illinois and Wisconsin ODP staffs as well as Region II boys and girls staffs. His college coaching resume includes head coaching positions with the Men's and Women's programs at Wisconsin Lutheran College and Kendall College, as well as serving as the Men's Assistant Coach at Long Island University/CW Post College. Sunderland's professional playing career began in 1985 with the New York Express of the Major Indoor Soccer League. In 1986, he moved to the Milwaukee Wave of the National Professional Soccer League where he played until he joined the Chicago Power. In 1990-91 he was part of the Power's Championship team before briefly returning to Milwaukee in 1993. Sunderland ended his playing career in 1996.

STAN ANDERSON


ASSISTANT ACADEMY COACH/GK COACH

Tony Kees was named as the first member of the Fire Academy technical staff on July 23, 2007. He was awarded the 2007 Illinois and Midwest large High School Coach of the Year after concluding 24 years of service at James B. Conant High School in Hoffman Estates, Ill. Kees has served as an Illinois ODP head coach for 19 years, and the Director of Coaching of EG Arsenal for 16 years. He has spent the past two seasons as the Varsity Soccer Coach at Neuqua Valley High School in Naperville. His 2009 team was ranked the #2 team in the nation by ESPN Rise after completing an undefeated regular season. The Elk Grove native has a Bachelor's Degree in Education from Northern Arizona University, and holds a USSF National 'A' license ('97), the NSCAA Premiere Diploma ('98) and the KNVB Advanced Match Analysis Certificate ('01).



JON DOLINSKY

ASSISTANT ACADEMY COACH

Jon Dolinsky is a Chicago native and retired German-American player who played professionally in the MISL, ASL, USL, and AISA for 9 teams from 1978-1988. He was a first team All Star in 1981 while playing for the Rochester Flash. In January 1987, the Milwaukee Wave elevated Dolinsky to the position of player/coach. In 1988 he retired as an active player and remained the Wave coach through 1990, while being named the 1989 AISA Coach of the Year. He became coach of the Dayton Dynamo for the 1991 and 1992 seasons, advancing to the league championship in 1991. In 1995, he returned to his hometown and became an assistant coach with the Chicago Power. Following the season, he stepped out of the professional game to raise his family. He concentrated efforts on personal training and individual player development, training hundreds of young players from ages 6-10. He returned to the competitive side as a Director of Coaching for the Chicago Wind Soccer Club from 2004-2007. A four year starter on the Lewis University Soccer team, he holds a Bachelors Degree from Lewis, and is a member of the University's Athletic Hall of Fame, becoming the first soccer player inducted in 1985. Dolinsky holds a USSF "A" License and has four children.

MARK SPOONER

ACADEMY OPERATIONS/PLAYER DEVELOPMENT CO-ORDINATOR

In 2010, Mark Spooner came to the Fire having previously been the Director of Coaching for Chicago Fire Juniors (Michigan). Prior to joining the Fire Mark spent the 2009 season as the Head Coach of the Kalamazoo Outrage in the United Soccer Leagues PDL guiding them to a 11-2-3 record and a Great Lakes Divisional Championship. In 2008, Spooner was the assistant coach at Longwood University in Farmville, VA helping them to an 8-8-4 record and the school's first Division 1 conference championship of any sport. From 2006 - 2008 Spooner was the assistant coach at his Alma Mater Niagara University where he helped them to back to back playoff appearances. Spooner hails from Derby, England and prior to coming to the states spent two years with Northampton Town FC. In the summer of 2003, he was selected to the Great Britain team that competed in the World University Games in Daegu, Korea falling to eventual runners up Italy in the quarter finals. Spooner graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Sport Management from Niagara University in 2006. Spooner will serve as the head coach of the club's PDL and Super-20 sides in 2011.

2010 IN REVIEW

After falling just short of the 2009 MLS Cup Final, the Chicago Fire Soccer Club entered a new era in 2010 following the hiring of Mexican head coach Carlos de los Cobos in early January. Coming off two consecutive appearances in the MLS Eastern Conference Finals, the club saw its fortunes reversed during the course of 2010 as injuries decimated the 24-man roster for much of the season, with the end result seeing the Fire miss out on the MLS Cup Playoffs for just the second time in the club's 13-year history.

A regular season of ups and downs saw the club start the campaign winless through its first three matches, including a 2-1 Opening Night home loss to San Jose on April 10. The "Men in Red" rebounded exactly a week later, earning the first win of the season in a 2-0 victory at DC United, eventually climbing back to an even 2-2-2 record by May 1. Ironically, there was much to take out of a drab 4-1 loss at Toronto on May 8 as C.J. Brown, the last remaining "Fire Original" recorded his 350th appearance across all competitions for the Fire – third most all-time among MLS players with one team. Veteran midfielder Logan Pause also tallied just the second goal of his career, hitting a 30-plus yard bomb that was eventually voted by Fire fans as the club's Goal of the Year.

Following the trip north of the border, the club welcomed four world renowned international clubs to TOYOTA PARK to end the month of May. The Fire first welcomed Paris Saint-Germain, Red Star Belgrade and Legia Warsaw as part of the inaugural Chicago Sister Cities International Cup. The Fire fell 1-0 to PSG on May 19 before dropping a 3-0 result to Legia three days later. Just a week after, the "Men in Red" welcomed Italian giants A.C. Milan to TOYOTA PARK, dropping a 1-0 result to the Rosoneri in front of a sell-out crowd on May 30.

Returning to the MLS schedule, the Fire went undefeated in June, riding the goal scoring wave of Guatemalan international midfielder Marco Pappa. The third-year midfielder tallied the winner in a 2-1 win over the Philadelphia Union on June 5 before bagging both goals in the 2-2 draw with the Colorado Rapids on June 9 at TOYOTA PARK. With the league taking an 18-day break during the FIFA World Cup, the Fire returned to their league calendar with a visit to New England on June 27, with Pappa striking the game's only goal, his fourth of five Fire goals during the month. Though a long World Cup break gave players a needed rest, a two-day turnaround was difficult for the side as they hosted USL-2's Charleston Battery in the third round of the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup. Only able to dress 16 players, the Fire had a number of chances but played 120 minutes of scoreless soccer before eventually falling to the historic South Carolina-based side 3-0 on penalty kicks.

As June turned to July, the Fire dropped two narrow league results, first a 2-1 decision in Columbus on July 3 before dominating but coming up empty in a 1-0 loss to defending MLS Cup champions Real Salt Lake at TOYOTA PARK. Sitting with a disappointing 4-5-5 record, the club began looking for reinforcements as the team shifted attention to the club's second-straight SuperLiga campaign.

The tournament didn't start off well for the Fire as they fell 5-1 to Monarcas Morelia on July 14, with the lone bright spot being rookie defender Steven Kinney's first career professional goal in the 48th minute. The Fire followed up that performance with a 1-0 loss to the New England Revolution three days later. After the game, the Fire introduced Mexican international Nery Castillo as the second Designated Player in club history. Already eliminated, from the tournament, the Fire took on Pumas UNAM in the final group game, earning a 1-0 victory via a headed effort from defender Wilman Conde in the 35th minute.

Marco Pappa was selected as a starter for the first time in the 2010 MLS All-Star game vs. Manchester United on July 28 at Reliant Stadium in Houston, while Conde earned his second straight selection. The MLS All-Stars dropped a 5-2 result to the Red Devils.

Just before returning to the league schedule, the club acquired Swedish midfielder Freddie Ljungberg from Seattle on July 30, with the former Arsenal winger joining the club in Los Angeles the next day ahead of the clash with the table-topping LA Galaxy on August 1. At 21, Sean Johnson became the youngest player in club history to stand in net as he made his first MLS start in the match. Behind goals from Pappa, Collins John and Mike Banner, the Fire ran out to a 3-0 lead inside the first 19 minutes. Meanwhile, Ljungberg entered the match as a 58th minute sub while Johnson stood tall between the sticks, only surrendering two penalty kicks from Landon Donovan, making four saves in the 3-2 win.

MLS history was made a week later when the New York Red Bulls came to TOYOTA PARK with their three Designated Players: Juan Pablo Angel and the recently signed Thierry Henry and Rafael Marquez. All three started along with the Fire's Ljungberg and as Castillo made his club debut in the 56th minute, the night marked the first time five Designated Players graced the field during an MLS game. Though the stars made their presence known, it was again the young Fire goalkeeper who stole the show, making eight saves and earning his first MLS clean sheet in a 0-0 draw with Red Bull on August 8.

Nearly a month after falling 1-0 to New England in SuperLiga, the Fire welcomed the Revolution back to Toyota Park to close out the sides' season series. Falling behind early to a Marko Perovic strike, Fire midfielder Baggio Husidic equalized before the half. Returning from a six-month injury layoff, veteran striker Calen Carr scored the winner in the 85th minute to keep the side unbeaten in August.

While things looked up, the fate of the season likely came as the club dropped points late in the next three consecutive matches, falling 4-3 to Houston on August 21, 2-1 to Seattle on August 28 and conceding a stoppage time goal in a 1-1 draw with LA on September 4 at TOYOTA PARK. The day before the match with LA, veteran striker and U.S. Soccer legend Brian McBride announced his intention to retire at the end of the club's 2010 season.

Three losses and a draw in the middle of September put the Fire's playoff hopes on the brink before a 3-0 win at San Jose rescued them if only for a few days after dropping the reverse score line at Dallas on October 2.

Though not mathematically eliminated, the Fire returned to TOYOTA PARK to celebrate the club's 13th anniversary on October 8. The "Men in Red" gave the fans their birthday wish when they downed regional rival Columbus Crew 2-0 that night as midfielder Peter Lowry scored the club's 600th regular season goal. The next day, San Jose officially eliminated the Fire from playoff contention with a 2-0 win over DC United.

The Fire would go 1-1-1 in the remaining regular season matches, paying tribute to outgoing striker Brian McBride in his final home match at TOYOTA Park, a 0-0 draw with D.C. on October 16.

On October 22, a day before the final regular season match at Chivas USA, veteran defender CJ Brown announced that the match would be his last, bringing to end his 13 years of dedicated service to the club, in which the 1998 Supplemental Draft pick went on to play in 32,519 minutes across 371 matches.

In dedication to both Brown and McBride, the Fire closed out the 2010 campaign with one of the side's best performances, downing Chivas USA 4-1 at The Home Depot Center in Carson, CA. McBride got the scoring started with a beautiful back heel in the 40th minute, tallying his 80th MLS goal and the final one of his career.

Postseason honors were awarded the next month as veteran midfielder Logan Pause was named Team MVP, while retiring defender CJ. Brown took his second Defender of the Year honors as well as Section 8's Player of the Year award. With seven goals on the campaign Marco Pappa took the Budweiser Golden Boot and later won the 2010 MLS Goal of the Year for his strike against San Jose on April 10. Long-time Fire defender Dasan Robinson earned the 2010 Humanitarian of the Year award for his charitable work with Urban Initiatives.

IMPORTANT DATES IN FIRE HISTORY

DECEMBER 17, 1993: In fulfillment of U.S. Soccer's promise to FIFA, Alan Rothenberg announces the formation of Major League Soccer (MLS).

APRIL 9, 1997: Chicago is announced as one of the two MLS expansion teams for the '98 MLS season.

APRIL 9, 1997: Philip F. Anschutz becomes the Investor/Operator of the Chicago MLS franchise.

JUNE 24, 1997: Peter Wilt is named the first General Manager of the Chicago Fire.

OCTOBER 8, 1997: Coinciding with the 126th anniversary of the Great Chicago Fire, the team unveils its name, logo, uniform and colors at Navy Pier's Gateway Park.

OCTOBER 30, 1997: The Chicago Fire names former D.C. United assistant coach Bob Bradley as its first Head Coach.

NOVEMBER 6, 1997: The Fire selects its first 12 players during the 1997 MLS Expansion Draft in the Signature Room of the John Hancock Center.

DECEMBER 16, 1997: Polish national team captain Peter Nowak is allocated by MLS and joins the Fire as the team's first international player.

JANUARY 5, 1998: The Fire completes its first trade, acquiring D.C. United midfielder Jesse March in exchange for forward A.J. Wood.

JANUARY 27, 1998: The Fire acquires Mexican World Cup veteran Jorge Campos and midfielder Chris Armas via a trade with Los Angeles for Kevin Hartman and Danny Peña.

FEBRUARY 1, 1998: In the 1998 MLS Supplemental Draft, Chicago selects San Francisco Bay Seals (USL) defender C.J. Brown.

MARCH 21, 1998: The Fire takes the field for the first time against fellow expansion team Miami Fusion at Lockhart Stadium, defeating the Fusion 2-0 on goals by Roman Kosecki and Ritchie Kotschau.

APRIL 4, 1998: A crowd of 36,444 witness the Fire's inaugural home match at Soldier Field against the Tampa Bay Mutiny as local hero Frank Klopas scores both goals for Chicago in the historic 2-0 win.

OCTOBER 16, 1998: Chicago heads to Pasadena, CA for MLS Cup '98 after sweeping the Los Angeles Galaxy in the Western Conference finals.

OCTOBER 25, 1998: The Fire is crowned the MLS Cup '98 champion, dethroning two-time champion D.C. United with a 2-0 win before 51,350 fans at the Rose Bowl.

OCTOBER 30, 1998: The Fire becomes the second MLS team to win "The Double," defeating the Columbus Crew 2-1 in the U.S. Open Cup Final at Soldier Field after Frank Klopas tallies the game-winner in overtime.

OCTOBER 3, 1999: The Fire battles MLS rival D.C. United in the third-place game of the FC Champions Cup, but the teams draw 2-2 and receive third-place accolades.

FEBRUARY 6, 2000: In the first-ever MLS SuperDraft, Chicago selects Carlos Bocanegra from UCLA and U.S. U-17 international sensation DaMarcus Beasley via trade with Los Angeles.

MARCH 15, 2000: MLS allocates former Barcelona superstar and Bulgarian World Cup legend Hristo Stoichkov to Chicago.

MAY 6, 2000: Ante Razov records the Fire's first-ever hat trick as Chicago blanks Miami 3-0 at Lockhart Stadium.

AUGUST 9, 2000: Josh Wolff becomes the first Fire player ever to score four goals in a game as Chicago defeats Dallas 5-1 in the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup quarterfinals.

AUGUST 23, 2000: Chicago advances to its second Open Cup Final after Ante Razov and Josh Wolff tally in the Fire's 2-1 win over the Galaxy.

SEPTEMBER 6, 2000: Chicago defeats Columbus 3-1 at Soldier Field and is crowned the 2000 MLS Central Division Champion.

OCTOBER 6, 2000: Chicago earns its second trip to an MLS Cup Final after defeating the MetroStars 3-2 in Game 3 of the MLS Cup Playoff semifinals.

OCTOBER 15, 2000: Kansas City defeats the Fire 1-0 at MLS Cup 2000 in RFK Stadium despite a 22-6 shot advantage.

OCTOBER 21, 2000: The Fire is crowned the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup Champion for the second time in three years, defeating the Miami Fusion 2-1 at Soldier Field.

MAY 3, 2001: Chicago acquires U.S. National Team all-time leading scorer Eric Wynalda in a trade with New England for John Wolnyiec.

JULY 4, 2001: Chicago crushes defending champ Kansas City 7-0 at Arrowhead Stadium, marking the most lopsided win in team history. The win marked the largest shutout in MLS history and equaled the mark for largest margin of victory. Forward Jamar Beasley's goal 27 seconds into the match marked the fastest in team history.

AUGUST 22, 2001: Chicago drops a gut-wrenching 1-0 overtime result to the Los Angeles Galaxy in the 2001 Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup Semifinals.

SEPTEMBER 1, 2001: The Fire captures its second consecutive Central Division title with a 1-0 win over the MetroStars.

OCTOBER 17, 2001: The Fire is eliminated from the 2001 MLS Cup Playoffs, falling 2-1 to Los Angeles in the semifinals.

FEBRUARY 5, 2002: The Naperville City Council officially approves an agreement allowing the Fire to play at North Central College's Cardinal Stadium in 2002 and 2003 while Soldier Field undergoes renovations.

MARCH 20, 2002: The Fire plays its first match at Cardinal Stadium before a sold-out crowd, defeating Municipal of Guatemala 2-0 in the second leg of the Round of 16 of the FC Champions Cup, advancing to the quarterfinals.

JULY 10, 2002: Chicago defeats Monarcas Morelia of Mexico in the second leg of the Champions Cup quarterfinals 2-1 at Cardinal Stadium but is eliminated from the tournament on goal differential (3-2).

SEPTEMBER 22, 2002: The Fire defeats Columbus 2-1, advancing to the playoffs for the fifth consecutive year.

OCTOBER 2, 2002: The Fire loses 2-0 to New England in the MLS Cup quarterfinals.

OCTOBER 30, 2002: The Fire inks a partnership with Monarcas Morelia, marking the first time an MLS team partners with a team from Mexico's Division I League (Federacion Mexicana de Futbol).

NOVEMBER 4, 2002: The Fire names U.S. National Team top assistant coach Dave Sarachan as its second Head Coach.

DECEMBER 26, 2002: Chicago acquires Justin Mapp from D.C. United in exchange for Dema Kovalenko.

JANUARY 3, 2003: Chicago trades Peter Nowak to New England.

APRIL 26, 2003: The Fire announces the formation of the Chicago Fire Juniors.

JUNE 28, 2003: Former Fire captain Peter Nowak becomes the Fire's first inductee into the "Ring of Fire."

SEPTEMBER 23, 2003: The Fire advances to its third Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup Final in six years after defeating the LA Galaxy 3-2 in the semifinals at Cardinal Stadium.

OCTOBER 2, 2003: The Fire is named the 2003 Fan Friendliest MLS Team by the Sports Fans of America Association, becoming the first-ever MLS team to receive such honor.

OCTOBER 10, 2003: In the Fire's Soldier Field homecoming, 30,845 fans gather at the renovated lakefront venue to watch the "Men in Red" defeat Columbus 2-0.

OCTOBER 15, 2003: For the third time in team history, the Fire is crowned the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup Champion, defeating the MetroStars 1-0 on a goal by rookie forward Damani Ralph at Giants Stadium.

OCTOBER 18, 2003: The Fire wins its first-ever MLS Supporters Shield after defeating the Colorado Rapids 4-3 in the team's regular season home finale at Soldier Field.

NOVEMBER 14, 2003: Chicago is crowned Eastern Conference Champion and advances to its third MLS Cup Final after defeating New England 1-0 at Soldier Field on Chris Armas' "Golden Goal" in the 101st minute.

NOVEMBER 23, 2003: The Fire falls 4-2 to the San Jose Earthquakes in MLS Cup 2003 at The Home Depot Center.

January 25, 2004: The Fire, AEG and the Village of Bridgeview announce an agreement to build a world-class soccer stadium for the Fire by the year 2006.

MARCH 24, 2004: Chicago defeats Trinidad's San Juan Jabloteh 4-0 at Soldier Field, giving the Fire a 6-5 aggregate goals series win, advancing the club to the semifinals of the CONCACAF Champions Cup.

APRIL 21, 2004: The Fire defeats Costa Rica's Deportivo Saprissa 2-1 at Soldier Field, but is eliminated from the CONCACAF Champions Cup on aggregate goals 3-2.

MAY 3, 2004: The Fire announces the formation of the Chicago Fire Players Alumni Association.

MAY 5, 2004: Former forward Eric Wynalda becomes the first ex-Fire player to be elected into the National Soccer Hall of Fame. Wynalda elects to enter the Hall representing the Fire.

MAY 11, 2004: Former Fire player and local hero Frank Klopas is selected as the second inductee into the "Ring of Fire."

SEPTEMBER 22, 2004: The Kansas City Wizards deny the Fire the chance at back-to-back U.S. Open Cup titles, defeating Chicago 1-0 in overtime in the 2004 Final at Arrowhead Stadium.

OCTOBER 16, 2004: The Fire's postseason hopes are dashed by New England after dropping a 2-1 decision in Foxborough, MA, marking the first time the club misses the MLS Cup Playoffs.

NOVEMBER 30, 2004: The Fire breaks ground for its new stadium on 71st Street and Harlem Avenue in Bridgeview, IL.

JANUARY 30, 2005: Chicago sends all-time scoring leader Ante Razov to the Columbus Crew in exchange for defender and U.S. international Tony Sanneh.

FEBRUARY 8, 2005: Honduran and former English Premiership defender Ivan Guerrero signs with the Fire.

FEBRUARY 17, 2005: Chicago area standout and Canadian U-20 National Team forward Will Johnson signs with the Fire as a Discovery Player.

JULY 16, 2005: The Fire hosts a soccer doubleheader that sets a new all-time attendance mark, as 54,432 fans see the Fire tie Columbus 1-1 and Spanish power Real Madrid defeat legendary Mexican club Chivas de Guadalajara 3-1.

JULY 27, 2005: Chicago is defeated by Italian giant A.C. Milan 3-1 in the most high-profile international friendly in club history at Soldier Field.

NOVEMBER 29, 2005: The sod is installed at the Fire's new home in Bridgeview.

JANUARY 11, 2006: The Fire re-acquires "Fire Original" Diego Gutierrez via trade with Kansas City; Chicago sends midfielder Will John and its 19th overall pick at the 2006 SuperDraft to the Wizards.

APRIL 1, 2006: The Fire begins its MLS record nine-game road trip with a 3-2 loss at FC Dallas in the first match of the 2006 MLS season.

JUNE 9, 2006: The Fire announces a 10-year naming rights deal for its brand-new home, TOYOTA PARK.

JUNE 11, 2006: The Fire opens the doors to TOYOTA PARK to a limited audience for the team's first game in Bridgeview, as 12,941 season ticket holders, Bridgeview residents and VIP's see the Fire and New England Revolution fight to a thrilling 3-3 draw.

JUNE 25, 2006: In the Grand Opening match at TOYOTA PARK, an overflow crowd of 20,133 sees the "Men in Red" use goals by captain Chris Armas and midfielder Thiago to notch a 2-0 victory over the New York Red Bulls.

JULY 12, 2006: In the first-ever international friendly at TOYOTA PARK, Mexican powerhouse Club América scores late to record a 2-1 victory over the "Men in Red."

AUGUST 5, 2006: A record crowd descends upon TOYOTA PARK for the 2006 Sierra Mist MLS All-Star Game. Two-time defending Premiership champion Chelsea FC's cache of stars is not enough, as Dwayne DeRosario's second half goal lifts the MLS All-Stars to a 1-0 victory in front of 21,210 spectators in Bridgeview.

SEPTEMBER 6, 2006: A dominating 3-0 win over D.C. United in the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup Semifinals sends Chicago to the tournament's championship match for the fifth time in just nine appearances.

SEPTEMBER 23, 2006: Goals from Nate Jaqua, Andy Herron and Thiago propel the Fire to a 3-1 victory over the Los Angeles Galaxy in the 2006 Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup Final, giving the "Men in Red" their fourth victory in U.S. Soccer's national championship tournament.

OCTOBER 22, 2006: A national television audience sees the Fire defeat New England 1-0 in the first MLS Cup Playoff game in TOYOTA PARK history.

OCTOBER 28, 2006: The Fire sees its season end in dramatic fashion at New England, as the Revolution's 2-1 win in Game Two forces the Eastern Conference Semifinal Series into extra time, then penalty kicks. Chicago fell 4-2 in PK's, marking the third straight year the Fire's season ended at the hands of the Revolution.

JANUARY 12, 2007: The Fire heats up the MLS SuperDraft by making a draft-day deal that sends 2006 Fire/Budweiser Golden Boot winner Andy Herron to the Columbus Crew in exchange for the draft's second overall pick and forward Ryan Coiner. Chicago selects six players on the day, headed by Virginia defender Bakary Soumare.

APRIL 3, 2007: The Fire use their Designated Player spot to sign Mexican International Cuauhtémoc Blanco, a striker from Club América of the Mexican Primera División.

JUNE 20, 2007: Fire head coach Dave Sarachan is relieved of coaching duties. Assistant coach Denis Hamlett is appointed as interim head coach.

JULY 3, 2007: The Fire announce the formation of the Chicago Fire Soccer Academy, an elite player development initiative designed to identify and develop the best young talent within the Chicagoland area. The two Academy teams, U16 and U18, will participate in the U.S. Soccer Development Academy League.

JULY 6, 2007: Juan Carlos Osorio is appointed as the third head coach in club history. Osorio joins the Fire after serving as head coach of the Colombian side, Millonarios.

AUGUST 4, 2007: Former Fire head coach Bob Bradley is inducted into the prestigious "Ring of Fire". A halftime ceremony included fellow inductees Peter Wilt, Peter Nowak, and Frank Klopas presenting Bradley with a ring and unveiling his jersey flag inside TOYOTA PARK.

SEPTEMBER 6, 2007: Andell Holdings, a Los Angeles-based private investment firm with global business and investment interests controlled by Chairman and Chief Executive Officer Andrew Hauptman, announce the closing of the transaction for Andell to acquire AEG's interests in the Fire. Hauptman becomes the 13th investor/operator in Major League Soccer history.

OCTOBER 21, 2007: In front of 21,374 fans at TOYOTA PARK, the Fire defeat the Los Angeles Galaxy 1-0 off a goal from John Thorrington to clinch their ninth playoff berth in team history.

NOVEMBER 8, 2007: The Fire once again see their season ended by the New England Revolution as the "Men in Red" fall 1-0 in the Eastern Conference Championship Final at Gillette Stadium in Foxboro, Mass.

NOVEMBER 13, 2007: Five-year Fire captain and Fire/MLS Original Chris Armas announces his retirement from Major League Soccer after twelve seasons in the league.

JULY 1, 2008: Mike Banner scores two goals in the Fire's 4-1 win over the Cleveland City Stars in the third round of the 2008 Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup at TOYOTA PARK.

JULY 8, 2008: After two overtime periods, the Fire fall to D.C. United 2-1 in the quarterfinals of the Open Cup.

JULY 30, 2008: Fire trade Chad Barrett and the club's 2009 first round draft choice and conditional future considerations to Toronto FC for U.S. Soccer star Brian McBride.

JULY 30, 2008: Fire acquire midfielder Marco Pappa on loan from CD Municipal of Guatemala.

JULY 30, 2008: Fire down Everton FC 2-0 during an international exhibition match at TOYOTA PARK.

AUGUST 16, 2008: McBride makes his Fire debut coming off the bench in the second half of the 1-0 loss to D.C. United at TOYOTA PARK.

AUGUST 26, 2008: Dave Greeley is named president of the Fire.

OCTOBER 23, 2008: Chris Rolfe scores his first career hat trick in a 5-2 win over New York.

NOVEMBER 4, 2008: Fire advance to the Eastern Conference Final after defeating New England 3-0 at TOYOTA PARK.

NOVEMBER 12, 2008: The Fire fall in the Eastern Conference Final for the second consecutive season, suffering a 2-1 loss in Columbus against the Crew.

JANUARY 9, 2009: The Fire pick up their option for designated player Cuauhtemoc Blanco.

JANUARY 15, 2009: At the 2009 MLS SuperDraft, Fire select Baggio Husidic (20th overall), David Sias (43rd Pick overall), Jokull Elisabetarson (52nd overall), and Richard Jata (58th overall).

JANUARY 20, 2009: Assistant coach Chris Armas departs club after spending eleven seasons with the Fire as a player and coach.

JANUARY 24, 2009: Mike Matkovich is named assistant coach.

APRIL 29, 2009: Fire fall 2-1 to Club America in an international exhibition match played at TOYOTA PARK.

JUNE 9, 2009: Defender Brandon Prudeaux announces retirement effective at the end of the season.

JUNE 30, 2009: Fire fall to USL Second Division's Wilmington Hammerheads, 1-0 in the third round of the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup.

AUGUST 6, 2009: After advancing through the group stage and semifinals of their first SuperLiga tournament, the Fire fall 4-3 in penalty kicks to Tigres UANL in the final at TOYOTA PARK.

OCTOBER 22, 2009: Fire secure a postseason berth for the 11th time in 12 seasons with a 1-0 victory over Chivas USA at TOYOTA PARK.

NOVEMBER 14, 2009: In front of a record sell-out crowd at TOYOTA PARK the Fire fall on penalty kicks to Real Salt Lake in Eastern Conference Final, after playing to a scoreless draw over 120 minutes.

NOVEMBER 24, 2009: Fire part ways with head coach Denis Hamlett after two seasons.

JANUARY 11, 2010: Mexican coach Carlos de los Cobos is named the fifth head coach in Fire history.

JANUARY 14, 2010: Fire select five players in the MLS SuperDraft: midfielder Corben Bone (13th overall), defender Kwame Watson-Siriboe (26th overall), midfielder Drew Yates (29th overall), defender Steven Kinney (45th overall) and goalkeeper Sean Johnson (52nd overall).

MAY 8, 2010: Last remaining "Fire Original", defender C.J. Brown plays his 350th match across all competitions as the Fire draw FC Dallas 1-1 at Toyota Park.

MAY 19-22, 2010: The club hosts the first-annual Chicago Sister Cities International Cup, welcoming Paris Saint-Germain, Red Star Belgrade and Legia Warsaw to Toyota Park. The Fire fall 1-0 to PSG on May 19 and 3-0 to Legia Warsaw on May 22. Red Star Belgrade is crowned the tournament's first champion as they defeat PSG on penalties in the final on May 22.

MAY 30, 2010: The Fire welcome Italian power A.C. Milan to Toyota Park for the first time, falling 1-0 to the Rossoneri in front of a sold-out crowd of 20,356.

JULY 16, 2010: The Chicago Fire U15/16 Academy team wins the U.S. Soccer Federation Developmental Academy National Championship, drawing 1-1 with Cal Odyssey before besting the club 5-3 in penalties. The result made the Chicago Fire the first MLS club to see its Academy win a national championship since the inception of the USSF Development Academy in 2007.

JULY 17, 2010: The Chicago Fire unveil Mexican international Nery Castillo as the club's second-ever Designated Player between games of the SuperLiga doubleheader hosted at Toyota Park. Castillo joined the club on loan from Ukraine's Shakhtar Donetsk.

JULY 30, 2010: The Chicago Fire acquire Freddie Ljungberg from Seattle Sounders FC for a conditional selection in the 2011 or 2012 MLS SuperDraft. The transaction is the first trade of a designated player in Major League Soccer history.

AUGUST 8, 2010: The Chicago Fire and New York Red Bulls make history as they have five designated players play in one match. The Fire started Freddie Ljungberg and saw Nery Castillo make his club debut in the 61st minute while New York's Thierry Henry, Rafael Marquez and Juan Pablo Angel made up the numbers.

SEPTEMBER 3, 2010: Chicago Fire striker and U.S. Men's National team legend Brian McBride announces his intention to retire at the end of the 2010 MLS Season.

SEPTEMBER 16, 2010: Former Hoy and Cafe Media boss Julian Posada is named the club's fifth president, becoming the first-ever Latino president in Major League Soccer.

OCTOBER 8, 2010: Midfielder Peter Lowry scores the 600th goal in Chicago Fire regular season history on the club's 13th anniversary in the 30th minute of a 2-0 win over the Columbus Crew at Toyota Park.

OCTOBER 21, 2010: The last remaining "Fire Original", defender C.J. Brown announces he will retire following the club's regular season finale against Chivas USA. Brown ended his illustrious 13-year career in Chicago having played 371 games across all competitions -- third among players with one MLS team behind only Cobi Jones (392) and Jaime Moreno (424).

OCTOBER 28, 2010: Assistant coach Mike Matkovich and Strength and Conditioning Coach Alvaro Briones depart the club. Matkovich is later replaced by former Uruguayan international Leo Percovich while Briones is replaced by Tony Jouaux from the University of Louisville men's soccer team.

NOVEMBER 24, 2010: Midfielders Peter Lowry and John Thorrington are taken in the MLS Expansion Draft. Lowry was selected in the 7th round by the Portland Timbers while Thorrington went with in the 10th round to the Vancouver Whitecaps.

DECEMBER 20, 2010: The club selects veteran U.S. international defender Cory Gibbs from the New England Revolution in the second phase of the inaugural MLS Re-Entry Draft.

JANUARY 14, 2011: The club selects defender Jalil Anibaba (9th overall), forwards Jason Herrick (45th overall) and Davis Paul (51st overall) and trades for veteran goalkeeper Jon Conway during the 2011 MLS SuperDraft in Baltimore, MD.

LAMAR HUNT U.S. OPEN CUP

Since its founding in 1998, the stated mission of the Chicago Fire on the field has been to capture two trophies every year – the MLS Cup and the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup. This year is no different, and the Fire enter 2010 as the undisputed kings of the modern era of the tournament, having hoisted the coveted Dewar Trophy four times – 1998, 2000, 2003 & 2006 – in just thirteen years of play.

The U.S. Open Cup, which is recognized as U.S. Soccer's National Championship, is an annual competition open to all amateur and professional soccer teams affiliated with U.S. Soccer. The tournament has crowned a champion for 95 consecutive years dating back to 1914.

The Fire have taken pride in competing in the U.S. Open Cup, and its results reflect that mindset. Since 1998, the "Men in Red" have racked up an impressive 25-8-2 record in the Open Cup, which has helped the squad reach the semifinal round on seven out of twelve occasions and the tournament's final five times. The 2006 title marked the ninth time a team from Chicago won the Open Cup and made the Fire one of five teams to capture the crown at least four times in the tournament's nearly century-long history.

Within the U.S. Open Cup framework, teams compete in one of the following four categories: professional outdoor Division I (Major League Soccer), Division II (USSF Division 2) or Division III (USL Second Division); or Amateur Division (USL Premier Development League & U.S. Adult Soccer Association).

The U.S. Open Cup is a single-elimination tournament, with games tied after regulation being decided in two 15-minute overtime halves. If neither team scores during the overtime period, the winner is decided on penalty kicks. The team that advances the furthest from each level except Division I earns a \$10,000 cash prize. The runner-up takes home \$50,000, while the champion collects \$100,000. The winner also will have the team's name engraved on the historic Dewar Challenge Trophy, the oldest trophy in American team sports.

2011 MLS PLAYER RULES AND REGULATIONS

MLS ROSTER COMPOSITION

A Major League Soccer club's first team roster is comprised of up to 30 players. All 30 players are eligible for selection to each 18-player game-day squad during the regular season and playoffs.

SALARY & BUDGET:

Players occupying roster spots 1-20 count against the club's 2011 salary budget of \$2,675,000, and are referred to collectively as the club's Salary Budget Players.

- Roster spots 19 and 20 are not required to be filled, and teams may spread their salary budget across only 18 Salary Budget Players. A minimum salary budget charge will be imputed against a team's salary budget for each unfilled senior roster slot below 18.
- The maximum budget charge for a single player is \$335,000.*
- A Designated Player counts \$335,000 against the club's salary budget, unless the player joins his club in the middle of the season, in which case his budget charge will be \$167,500.
- * See section entitled Allocation Money below, under Player Acquisition Mechanisms, for details on buying down a player's budget charge.

Players occupying roster spots 21-30 do not count against the club's salary budget, and are referred to collectively as the club's Off-Budget Players (maximum of 10 per team).

- All Generation adidas players are Off-Budget players.
- Players occupying roster spots 1-24 will earn at least \$42,000 in 2011.
- Players occupying roster spots 25-30 will earn at least \$32,600 in 2011.

Clubs may elect to leave up to two of these roster spots (25-30) vacant and use \$35,000 for each empty spot as allocation money.

Clubs may sign up to two Home Grown Players to Generation adidas contracts.

AGE DESIGNATIONS:

Any player making \$32,600 must be under the age 25 (does not turn 25 or older in 2011).

DOMESTIC/INTERNATIONAL:

In 2011, a total of 144 international slots are divided among the 18 clubs. Each club began with eight international slots, which are tradable. There is no limit on the number of international slots on each club's roster.

- The remaining roster slots must belong to domestic players. For clubs based in the United States, a domestic player is either a U.S. citizen, a permanent resident (green card holder) or the holder of other special status (e.g., refugee or asylum status).

The two MLS clubs based in Canada – Toronto FC and Vancouver Whitecaps FC – began with eight international slots, but their domestic slots may be filled with either Canadian or U.S. domestic players.

- MLS clubs based in Canada are required to have a minimum of three Canadian domestic players on their rosters.
- Players with the legal right to work in Canada are considered Canadian domestic players (i.e., Canadian citizen, permanent resident, part of a protected class).

NOTE: The terms Home Grown and Generation adidas are used to describe mechanisms by which players are acquired. They are not roster designations. All players' roster slots are determined by their compensation and/or age as outlined above.

PLAYER ACQUISITION MECHANISMS

MLS teams may acquire players and add them to their rosters via the following mechanisms:

ALLOCATION RANKING

The allocation ranking is the mechanism used to determine which MLS club has first priority to acquire a U.S. National Team player who signs with MLS after playing abroad, or a former MLS player who returns to the League after having gone to a club abroad for a transfer fee. The allocation rankings may also be used in the event two or more clubs file a request for the same player on the same day. The allocations will be ranked in reverse order of finish for the 2010 season, taking playoff performance into account.

Once the club uses its allocation ranking to acquire a player, it drops to the bottom of the list. A ranking can be traded, provided that part of the compensation received in return is another club's ranking. At all times, each club is assigned one ranking. The rankings reset at the end of each MLS League season.



2011 MLS PLAYER RULES AND REGULATIONS

ALLOCATION MONEY

Allocation money is a resource available to clubs in addition to their respective salary budgets.

A club may receive allocation money for:

- (1) failure to qualify for the MLS Cup Playoffs;
- (2) the transfer of a player to a club outside of MLS for value;
- (3) expansion status;
- (4) qualification for the CONCACAF Champions League;

Each year the MLS Competition Committee determines the allocation amount to be made available to each club. Allocation money can be traded by clubs. Allocation money does not count against a club's salary budget and can be used:

- To sign players new to MLS (that is, a player who did not play in MLS during the previous season).
- To re-sign an existing MLS player, subject to League approval.
- To "buy-down" a player's salary budget charge below the League maximum of \$335,000.
- In connection with the exercise of an option to purchase a player's rights or the extension of a player's contract for the second year provided the player was new to MLS in the immediately prior year.

NOTE: To protect the interests of MLS and its clubs during discussions with prospective players or clubs in other leagues, amounts of allocation money held by each club will not be shared publicly. (Similarly, most clubs in other countries do not announce the amount of money they plan to spend during a given transfer window.)

DESIGNATED PLAYER

The Designated Player Rule allows clubs to acquire up to three players whose salaries exceed their budget charges, with the club bearing financial responsibility for the amount of compensation above each player's budget charge. Designated Player slots may be used to acquire players new to MLS or to retain current MLS players, subject to League approval.

In 2011, a Designated Player's salary budget charge will be \$335,000, unless the player joins his club in the middle of the season, in which case his budget charge will be \$167,500.

Each club has two Designated Player slots, and clubs are allowed to "purchase" a third Designated Player slot for a one-time fee of \$250,000 that will be dispersed in the form of allocation money to all clubs that do not have three Designated Players.

Designated Player slots are not tradable.

Clubs have the option of "buying down" the budget charge of a Designated Player with allocation money. The reduced charge may not be less than \$150,000.

SUPERDRAFT

The 2011 MLS SuperDraft, held Jan. 13 in Baltimore, Md., consisted of three rounds of 18 picks for a total of 54 player selections. A supplemental draft was held Jan. 18 via teleconference and consisted of three rounds.

The majority of draft prospects are NCAA college seniors who have exhausted their college eligibility. Generation adidas players and non-collegiate international players are also eligible for selection in the SuperDraft and supplemental draft. Clubs may nominate players for the League's draft-eligible list, and only players from that list may be selected.

Generation adidas is a joint program between MLS and adidas that is dedicated to developing exceptional domestic talent in a professional environment. Each year, a handful of top domestic underclassmen and youth national team players are signed to the league and placed in the SuperDraft through this program. Generation adidas players also receive an educational stipend.

Draft Order: Through the Expansion Priority Draft, Vancouver Whitecaps FC earned the first selection in the 2011 MLS SuperDraft while the Portland Timbers selected second. The next six selections went to clubs that did not qualify for the 2010 MLS Cup Playoffs beginning with the club with fewest regular season points (3 points per win, one point per tie). The remaining eight positions were ranked by fewest regular season points among the teams that were eliminated in the same round of the MLS Cup Playoffs.

Unless claimed on waivers, a player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft or supplemental draft and did not sign with the League, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to the player.

TRADES

Players, SuperDraft and supplemental draft picks, allocation money, allocation rankings, and international player slots may all be exchanged in trades approved by the MLS League Office, provided all of the necessary rules regarding roster and salary budget compliance are met and the trade is completed during a valid trading period. No trades may occur after the Roster Freeze Deadline of September 15, 2011 at 5 p.m. ET.

2011 MLS PLAYER RULES AND REGULATIONS

DISCOVERY SIGNINGS

Clubs may make discovery claims on players not yet under MLS contract who are not subject to the allocation ranking or lottery mechanisms.

Each club has the opportunity to make six discovery signings per season (expansion teams may make 10 discovery signings in their inaugural season). A club may have up to 10 discovery claims on unsigned players at any time and may remove or add players at any time. The last day for discovery player signings is September 15, 2011 – coinciding with the roster freeze date and trade deadline.

The six discovery signings can be used to fill senior roster spots only. If multiple clubs claim the same player using a discovery, the club that filed the claim first will have first rights to the player. Discovery claims expire following each season. If the League and player are unable to reach an agreement during the season, the club that first filed the discovery retains the right of first refusal in the event the player is later signed by the League.

Note: To protect interests of MLS clubs in scouting and negotiations with prospective players, the League office will not publicize the names of players on club discovery lists, nor specify if a discovery claim has been filed on a particular player.

HOME GROWN PLAYER SIGNINGS

A club may sign a player to his first professional contract without subjecting him to the MLS SuperDraft if the player has trained for at least one year in the club's youth development program and has met League criteria. Players joining MLS through this mechanism are known as Home Grown Players.

There is no limit to the number of Home Grown Players a club may sign in a given year.

RE-ENTRY PROCESS

The 2011 Re-Entry Process will commence after MLS Cup. The priority order for the Re-Entry Draft is reverse order of finish in 2011, taking into account playoff performance.

Available to all teams in Stage 1 of the Re-Entry draft will be:

- (1) Players who are at least 23 years old and have a minimum of three years experience in MLS whose options were not exercised by their clubs (available at option salary for 2012).
- (2) Players who are at least 25 years old with a minimum of four years of MLS experience who are out of contract and whose club does not wish to re-sign them at their previous salary (available for at least their 2011 salary).
- (3) Players who are at least 30 years old with a minimum of eight years of MLS experience who are out of contract and whose club does not wish to re-sign them (available for at least 105% of their 2011 salary).

Players who are not selected in Stage 1 of the Re-Entry Draft will be made available in Stage 2. Clubs selecting players in Stage 2 will negotiate a new salary with the player.

Players who remain unselected after Stage 2 will be available to any MLS club on a first come, first serve basis.

WAIVERS

A team may place a player on waivers at any time during the regular season at which point he is made available to all other teams. The waiver claiming period shall commence on the first business day after the League delivers notice to teams and shall expire at 5 p.m. EST on the second business day after the Waiver Period Commencement Date. The claiming period is 48 hours.

The Waiver Draft order is determined via points per game once all teams have played at least three MLS League games. If the waiver takes place prior to all teams playing in at least three League games, priority shall be granted based upon the prior year's performance, taking playoff performance first, with teams eliminated from playoff contention at the same stage separated according to their point totals through the end of the regular season. New expansion teams shall be at the bottom of the waiver order.

Once a team selects a player off waivers, that club is automatically moved to the bottom of the priority list for subsequent waiver selections in a given season, regardless of its points-per-game total. Players who may be placed on the MLS waiver wire are as follows:

- (1) A player waived by an MLS team in the current season;
- (2) A player who completed his college eligibility within the past season, who was not made available in the SuperDraft or supplemental draft;
- (3) A player who has remaining college eligibility (and was not made available in the SuperDraft or supplemental draft), but the League at its discretion and after taking into account exceptional circumstances determines the player may be offered an MLS contract;
- (4) A player who has played in MLS previously where his last MLS team does not wish to exercise their right of first refusal, except in the case of returning U.S. National Team players as stated above.
- (5) A player who was drafted in the SuperDraft or supplemental draft, and who after a trial with the club is not offered a contract by the first Monday of June.



2011 MLS PLAYER RULES AND REGULATIONS

LOTTERY

Some players shall be assigned to MLS teams via the weighted Lottery process. Any team assigned a player through the lottery in any particular season shall not be assigned another lottery player that season unless and until all teams have received a lottery player or have agreed to waive their option to participate in a Lottery. The players made available through lotteries include:

- (1) Generation adidas players signed after the MLS SuperDraft;
- (2) Draft eligible players to whom an MLS contract was offered but who failed to sign with the League prior to the Draft.

The weighted lottery takes into consideration each team's performance over its last 30 regular season games and the most recent postseason. The team with the worst record over its last 30 regular season games (dating back to previous season if necessary and taking playoff performance into account) will have the greatest probability of winning the lottery. Teams are not required to participate in a lottery. Players are assigned via the lottery system in order to prevent a player from potentially influencing his destination club with a strategic holdout.

EXTREME HARSHSHIP CALL-UPS

Teams may add players to their roster in cases of "extreme hardship" as follows: (1) a club with three goalkeepers on its 30-man roster, but has less than two available goalkeepers or (2) a team has less than 15 available players. Extreme hardship call-ups are made on a game-by-game basis.

SEASON-ENDING INJURY REPLACEMENTS

A team with a player lost to a season-ending injury can replace that player on its roster, while remaining responsible for the full amount of the injured player's salary. A player can be placed on the season-ending injury list once another player has been signed as a replacement (provided the team has budget space). International player limits still apply at the time a season-ending replacement is made (with the player being replaced not counting against those limits).

SHORT-TERM INJURY REPLACEMENTS

A team with a player who has a short-term injury can replace that player on its roster, while remaining responsible for the full amount of the injured player's salary. A player can be placed on the short-term injured reserve list once another player has been signed as a replacement (provided the team has budget space). Note that the injured player will have to sit out a minimum of six MLS League matches before he can rejoin the team's roster. International player limits still apply at the time a short-term replacement is made (with the player being replaced not counting against those limits).

NOTE: No changes may be made to a team's active full roster during the period beginning on September 16, 2011 (day after Roster Freeze Date) through the day after MLS Cup. Nevertheless, a team may obtain players in accordance with the extreme hardship rules and procedures to replace players who are injured or otherwise legitimately unavailable after the Roster Freeze Date. Any other replacements after the Roster Freeze Date may only be made in exceptional circumstances in the League's sole and absolute discretion.

METHODS OF RELEASING PLAYERS

WAIVERS

Teams may waive players based on performance at any time during the MLS season. Players with guaranteed contracts will continue to have their salary budget charge applied to the team salary budget, subject to any settlement. Players on semi-guaranteed contracts can be waived prior to July 1 of any year and free up the corresponding budget space. If a player on a semi-guaranteed contract is waived after July 1, his salary budget charge will count against the team's salary budget and the team waiving the player will not receive a replacement except under the normal player acquisition mechanisms. Any settlement amount will be charged to the team's salary budget.

TRANSFERS AND LOANS

An MLS player may be transferred or loaned at any time to a team outside the League (subject to that team's Federation's transfer window), subject to the consent of the player.

The registration windows – the dates between which MLS may request the transfer certificate of a player under contract in another country – are as follows:

- January 21 – April 15 (Primary Window)
- July 15 – August 14 (Secondary Window)

CONTRACT EXPIRATION

When a player's contract expires, the player does not count against the roster or budget of the team in question. Subject to the Re-Entry Draft rules, a team retains the rights to the player indefinitely following the expiration of a contract only if attempts were made to re-sign the player.

2011 MLS PLAYER RULES AND REGULATIONS

BUYOUT OF GUARANTEED CONTRACT

Teams may have the ability to buyout one guaranteed player as follows:

- A Team may buy out one (1) guaranteed player (including a DP's) contract during the off-season and free up the corresponding budget space. Such a buyout is at the particular MLS Team's own expense.
- A Team may not free up budget space with a buyout of a player's salary budget charge during the season. Such a buyout will be conducted by the League and count on a Club's budget in a manner consistent with current MLS guidelines.

RIGHT OF FIRST REFUSAL

Right of first refusal grants one MLS club the first opportunity to add a player to its roster in the event that the player signs with MLS. Holding a right of first refusal applies only within MLS and does not indicate holding of the player's International Transfer Certificate.

OUT OF CONTRACT PLAYERS / OPTIONS NOT PICKED UP

Subject to the Re-Entry Draft rules, a team retains the right of first refusal to the player indefinitely only if attempts were made to re-sign the player.

DRAFTED BUT NOT SIGNED

A player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft or supplemental draft and did not sign, or who as of the first Monday in June is not offered a contract after a trial and clears waivers, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 immediately following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to sign the player.

PLAYER TRANSFERRED OUTSIDE MLS

If a team receives allocation money as a result of a player's transfer, the team does not retain a right of first refusal.

COMMUNITY RELATIONS

Each year, the Chicago Fire Soccer Club along with its charitable arm, the Chicago Fire Foundation, continues to reinforce its leadership role in the community. The Fire is focused on its mission to remain a championship team with a social conscience. For the Fire, excellence on and off the field is a priority and the organization is dedicated not only to the success of the club, but also to the success of the surrounding community. The Chicago Fire is committed to providing the necessary leadership in developing programs that encourage young people to achieve their goals through education and lend a helping hand to the area's underprivileged individuals.



ILLINOIS HIGH SCHOOL SOCCER ALL-STATE ACADEMIC TEAMS

The Chicago Fire Soccer Club, in conjunction with the Illinois High School Soccer Coaches Association, names the Boys' High School Soccer All-State Academic Team each season. High School coaches from across the state nominate boys that have earned a G.P.A. of 'B' or higher, have been involved in their high school soccer program for a minimum of three seasons, as well as have participated in at least one other school or community related extra-curricular activity.

Twenty-two boys are selected to the All-State Academic First Team each Fall. Those selected to the All-State Academic First Team are honored at the Illinois High School Soccer Coaches Association All-State Banquet, while the Fire also recognizes the First Team student-athletes during a halftime ceremony at a home contest each summer. The Chicago Fire also recognizes dozens of additional students on its Special Mention and Honorable Mention teams.

"SCORING THROUGH EDUCATION"

'Scoring through Education' is a free, in-class incentive program designed to help motivate students to achieve educational success. The program, launched by the Fire in 2006 serves as a tool for K-8th grade teachers who seek unique tactics to help enhance their classroom activities.

Each participating teacher receives a Welcome Kit including fun classroom activities, tools to track their students' success and letters for parents. Over the course of the six-week program, teachers motivate their students to achieve the 3 goals they selected for their classroom. Once a student has achieved all three goals, he or she is rewarded with a ticket voucher to attend a 2011 Chicago Fire home game at TOYOTA PARK. To encourage family participation, the program also provides student's family members the opportunity to purchase additional tickets at a special value rate.

The program has grown tremendously since its inception and the 2010 "Scoring Through Education" program reached nearly 20,000 students from various Chicagoland area schools.

COMMUNITY SOCCER SERIES

The Chicago Fire holds a series of free soccer clinics throughout the summer in various Chicagoland neighborhoods. These clinics are open to athletes from around the community, ages 7-14. The series is designed to instruct young athletes on the technical elements of soccer, while educating them on physical fitness, health and wellness. Participants are separated into groups by age with sessions tailored to the varying skill levels. The clinics are instructed by Chicago Fire player development coaches and Chicago Fire players make special appearances to help promote the overall goal of the clinic and sign autographs for participants. Each participant also receives a free goody-bag, including a ticket voucher to a Chicago Fire home game at TOYOTA PARK and a Community Soccer Series t-shirt.

Some of the past recipients include Illinois Youth Soccer Association, Girls on the Run-Chicago, Street Soccer Chicago, The Leukemia and Lymphoma Society and Special Olympics.

STADIUM JERSEY AUCTIONS

At each Chicago Fire home game the Chicago Fire Foundation auctions off an autographed jersey from both a player from the Chicago Fire and a player from the visiting team. The auctions are held at the Chicago Fire Foundation tent located on the Northeast Concourse of the stadium. Bidding begins the moment gates open and continues through half-time, with all proceeds benefiting the Chicago Fire Foundation.

COMMEMORATIVE BRICK PROGRAM

For the sixth year in a row, fans are offered the once in a lifetime opportunity to purchase Commemorative bricks allowing them to leave their mark in TOYOTA PARK and Chicago Fire history. Bricks are strategically positioned near the main entrance of TOYOTA PARK. All proceeds from the Commemorative Brick program benefit the Chicago Fire Foundation.

WEB AUCTIONS

In an effort to reach Chicago Fire fans all around the world, fans have the opportunity to bid on unique autographed Chicago Fire memorabilia online through our Chicago Fire web auctions all year long. Some of these items include game-worn autographed jerseys, soccer balls, one-of-a-kind experiences and other unique merchandise. All proceeds benefit the Chicago Fire Foundation, the charitable arm of Chicago Fire Soccer Club.


THE 'RING OF FIRE'

The "Ring of Fire" tribute began in 2003 in an effort to honor members of the Chicago Fire who have made the team a successful organization and who displayed the qualities the club embodies: leadership, dedication and integrity. The Fire's unique Hall of Fame – the first created by a Major League Soccer club – began in 2003, when then-General Manager Peter Wilt chose former Fire midfielder and captain Peter Nowak to become the inaugural member. The Chicago Fire, in consultation with the current "Ring of Fire" members, select the next honoree.

Nowak chose a hometown hero into the select group in 2004 by nominating Fire forward and Chicago native Frank Klopas. Former Fire defender Lubos Kubik was bestowed the honor in 2005, while in 2006 the award went full circle with the induction of Wilt into the "Ring of Fire." In 2007, former head coach Bob Bradley was selected to join former Fire alumni in recognition for being the club's winningest coach of all time. In 2009, the Fire inducted MLS Original, 1998 MLS Cup Winner and seven-time MLS All-Star Chris Armas into the "Ring of Fire." In honor of each inductee, a banner with each member's name is emblazoned upon a large, jersey-style banner displayed on the east side of TOYOTA PARK.


2003 INDUCTEE: PETER NOWAK

As the Fire's first-ever international player signing in December of 1997, big things were expected from Nowak, the fiery ex-captain of the Polish National Team and veteran of the German Bundesliga. Nowak exceeded all expectations in the club's inaugural season of 1998, leading by example with his intelligent and gritty play and natural leadership abilities. Nowak capped his incredible first season with the club by earning MVP honors in the Fire's 1998 MLS Cup victory and just days later capturing the "double" with a win over the Columbus Crew in the 1998 U.S. Open Cup. Nowak also led the Fire to another Open Cup title in 2000 before retiring in 2002.



2004 INDUCTEE: FRANK KLOPAS

Klopas was signed by the Fire in 1998 and given a chance to end his professional career where it began – in his hometown. "Kid" Klopas played 40 games and scored 17 points on six goals and five assists for the "Men in Red" during the 1998 and 1999 seasons. Klopas ended the Fire's inaugural season in dramatic fashion with what still ranks as one of the club's most memorable moments on October 30, 1998, as his "golden goal" in overtime gave Chicago a 2-1 victory over the Columbus Crew in front of a rabid hometown crowd at Soldier Field.



2005 INDUCTEE: LUBOS KUBIK

After success in some of Europe's top leagues and internationally for his native Czechoslovakia, Kubik brought his skills to the Fire when he was signed on February 19, 1998. The Czech's steady presence on the ball, lethal left foot and world-class marking ability made him an instant leader and one of the most skillful players to ever take the field in Major League Soccer. Kubik's remarkable 1998 season ended with the defender receiving several accolades, including the 1998 Fire Defender of the Year and 1998 BIC MLS Tough Defender of the Year awards and a spot on the 1998 MLS Best XI Team.

2006 INDUCTEE: PETER WILT

Wilt was appointed as the Fire's first General Manager in June 1997 and had been the longest-tenured GM with the same MLS team prior to his departure in December 2005. In the club's inaugural season, he guided the Fire to a glorious year as the team captured both the MLS Cup and U.S. Open Cup in 1998. In a span of seven years, Wilt guided the club to seven domestic Cup Finals, capturing four championships (MLS Cup in 1998 and U.S. Open Cup in 1998, 2000 and 2003), three division titles (2000, 2001 and 2003) and the Supporters' Shield in 2003. Wilt's acumen for talent was second to none, as he acquired some of the world's best talent such as Nowak, Kubik and Bulgarian legend Hristo Stoitchkov, while also focusing on domestic stars such as Chris Armas, DaMarcus Beasley, Carlos Bocanegra, Justin Mapp, and Chris Rolfe, just to name a few – players that helped the Fire reach the MLS postseason for his first six seasons in charge from 1998-2003.




2007 INDUCTEE: BOB BRADLEY

Bradley patrolled the Fire sideline from the team's inaugural season in 1998 until 2002, posting an impressive record of 82-54-15 during the club's first five years. The former Fire boss also led the "Men in Red" to three championship victories in that time: the 1998 MLS Cup and the 1998 and 2000 Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cups. With Bradley at the helm, Chicago also finished also finished atop the Central Division in the 2000 and 2001 campaigns. While with the Fire, Bradley's 82 victories made him the winningest coach in MLS history, a title he still holds today with 124 MLS career wins overall through nine seasons, including stints with the MetroStars (2003-2005) and Chivas USA (2006).

2009 INDUCTEE: CHRIS ARMAS

After playing two seasons with the Los Angeles Galaxy in 1996 and 1997, the Adelphi University alum was acquired by the Chicago Fire prior to the team's inaugural 1998 season. During his first season with the Fire, he helped the MLS expansion side win both the 1998 MLS Cup and the 1998 U.S. Open Cup to capture the coveted "Domestic Double". Through the next nine seasons as a player in Chicago, Armas led the Fire to three more U.S. Open Cup Championships (2000, 2003, 2006) and helped the Fire reach the MLS Cup Finals in 2000 and 2003. The seven-time MLS All-Star finished his decorated playing career in 2007 having tallied 12 goals and 48 assists through 214 games. Armas ranks in the top 5 on the Fire's all-time list with 42 assists (2nd), 13 game-winning assists (2nd), 19,018 minutes played (3rd), 214 games played (3rd), and 212 games started (2nd). In 2008, Armas joined the Chicago Fire coaching staff as an assistant coach under Denis Hamlett, helping the Fire reach the 2008 Eastern Conference Finals.





SPARKY AND KIDS CLUB

SPARKY

The Chicago Fire Soccer Club is proud to have Sparky, the spirited Dalmatian with soccer ball spots, as the team's official mascot for a 13th season. Sparky's flair for dribbling, passing and scoring made him a natural to join the Fire prior to its inaugural season in 1998, and he's served on behalf of the "Men in Red" at every home game and dozens of community events and special corporate gatherings each year since. Sparky is branching out even more in the Chicagoland area as an ambassador for the team's official fan club, the Chicago Fire Kids Club. Sparky's contribution on the field and in the community has made him one of the most notable mascots in the Chicagoland area.



CHICAGO FIRE KIDS CLUB

Since 2003, The Chicago Fire Kids Club has been the official Chicago Fire supporters group exclusively for Fire fans age 14 and under. Membership is free of charge and Kids Club members can enjoy benefits such as:

CHICAGO FIRE SUPPORTER INFORMATION

Chicago Fire supporters' groups mostly occupy an area in Toyota Park known as "Section 8" stemming from its original location at pre-renovated Soldier Field. The name has stuck, despite changing stadiums and section numbers. At Toyota Park Section 8's physical section are 117/118. Fire supporters are well known domestically for their non-stop chanting, colorful tifo displays and undying support of the club - showing a spirit and devotion typically associated with fans of large clubs worldwide. Section 8 Chicago, the Independent Supporters' Association (ISA) for the Chicago Fire Soccer Club, works on behalf of all fans - affiliated supporters' groups and independent fans alike - to foster a true soccer community. The vision of the ISA is "...to unite all Chicago Fire fans, to create a dominant in-stadium force unseen in any American team sport and to establish a home field advantage whenever the Chicago Fire play." The ISA exists to supplement the efforts of independent fans, coordinate between the supporters groups and act as liaison between all fans and the Chicago Fire Soccer Club. As a non-profit organization, a board of directors is elected yearly at the Annual General Meeting in February by the assembled supporters.

MEDIA GUIDELINES

The Chicago Fire Soccer Club Communications Department looks forward to working with you during the 2011 season at TOYOTA PARK. Please review the following information regarding credentials, access to team functions, interview procedures, team publications and parking at TOYOTA PARK. These rules are typical of professional press boxes across the country.

CREDENTIALS

Media with 2011 Chicago Fire full season credentials will have access to all Fire home games, including exhibitions and Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup games.

INDIVIDUAL GAME CREDENTIALS

Requests for individual game credentials must be made at least 48 hours in advance on company letterhead and emailed to the Communications Department at: bhannan@Chicago-Fire.com

Any member of the media using media passes for unauthorized purposes or any manner deemed unsuitable by the Chicago Fire will have their credential revoked. All credentials are intended for the working media only and are non-transferable.

MEDIA GATE AND CHECK-IN

For the 2011 season, all media should enter through Gate A, located on the southwest side of TOYOTA PARK. Media Will Call will open two hours prior to each match. Parking is provided to all working media in Lot S1A (off of 71st St.) on the southwest side of the stadium.

MEDIA CENTER

The Media Center is located on the West side of the stadium. Take the press elevator on the northwest side to Level 2. The Media Center will be on the left hand side.

The press box is a working area. Only credentialed members of the media will be allowed in the press box. Cheering and loud noise of any kind will not be permitted in the press box.

ACCESS AT GAMES AND OTHER TEAM FUNCTIONS

Unless otherwise noted, credentialed media will be granted access to all team-related functions, including team training sessions, press conferences, and Fire home games.

Credentialed print, radio and internet reporters will have access to all the regular media areas (press box and locker room), with the exception of the field of play. TV crews are allowed access to all regular media areas, as well as on the field, however may not film from the press box. Crews are asked to shoot from behind the boards on the north and south end zones. The east side of the field is strictly off limits.

Still photographers are allowed in all regular media areas, with the exception of the locker room. All still photographers and TV camera personnel must wear a colored vest provided at Media Will Call (Gate A) or located within the TOYOTA PARK Photo Support Room (located on the east Side of the stadium). Locker rooms are off limits to still photographers at all times.

Freelance photographers will not be issued credentials unless special approval is granted by the Communications Department.

MEDIA GUIDELINES

WI-FI ACCESS/PHONE LINES

The Media Center will have complimentary wireless internet access available for all Chicago Fire Soccer Club events. Dedicated phone and hi-speed internet lines are available for reporters in the Media Center. – Please contact the Fire Media Relations Department at least two business days in advance for more details. A wireless internet/phone kiosk in the Media Center will also serve communication needs.

Photographers will have access to wireless internet in the TOYOTA PARK Photo Support Room, located just off the Media Press Conference Room on the stadium's east side. Dedicated phone and hi-speed internet lines are available for photographers in the Photo Support Room for a fee – please contact the Fire Media Relations Department at least two business days in advance for more details.

TEAM AVAILABILITY

Media will have access to players and coaches after all open training sessions. Media wishing to gain access to the team prior to training must first contact the Communications Department.

Players and coaches will be made available to the media in the main Fire locker room area up to 60 minutes prior to kickoff on game days, but media are asked to please contact a Fire Media Relations staff member in advance to make a request if at all possible. Training rooms, shower areas and coaches offices are off limits to members of the media at all times.

PARKING AT TOYOTA PARK
