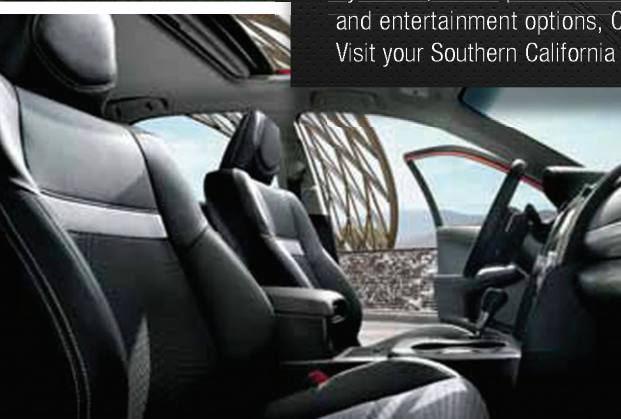

Already one of the most accomplished clubs in the history of MLS, the LA Galaxy enjoyed perhaps the greatest season in league history last year, repeating as Supporters' Shield winners and claiming a third MLS Cup. Now, as they prepare to enter their 17th season of play, the Galaxy will look to build upon last year's success and continue their quest for trophies. Already owning the most wins and the most points in MLS history, the AEG-owned Galaxy will now look to repeat as MLS Cup champions and become the first American team to win the CONCACAF Champions League.

Initially formed by LA Soccer Partners, the team played the inaugural 1996 season at Pasadena's Rose Bowl, which was filled to capacity for the opening game - a 2-1 win over the MetroStars behind goals from Cobi Jones and Arash Noamouz.

On June 16 of that inaugural season, more than 92,000 fans packed the Rose Bowl to see the Galaxy defeat the Tampa Bay Mutiny and the U.S. National Team play to a 2-2 draw with Mexico. That day's crowd of 92,216 was a league record that stood for more than ten years before being broken in 2006. The club has continued in that vein, and has held the league's average attendance a record nine times in the first 16 years of MLS, including six straight seasons (2003-08) after opening The Home Depot Center in 2003.

Led from the front by El Salvadoran playmaker Mauricio Cienfuegos, U.S. veteran Cobi Jones and Eduardo 'El Tanque' Hurtado, and a tight defensive unit organized by team captain Dan Calichman and Robin Fraser, with Mexican goalkeeper Jorge Campos, the team racked up a 19-13 record on their way to a Western Conference title and a berth in the inaugural MLS Cup against D.C. United in 1996.

In a game played in a torrential downpour in Foxboro, Mass., the Galaxy were up 2-0 on goals by Hurtado and Chris Armas before falling 3-2 on a golden goal header by Eddie Pope.

After a 1-7 start to the 1997 season, original head coach Lothar Osiander was replaced by assistant coach Octavio Zambrano, who led the team to a second place finish in the West with a 16-16 record before falling in the playoffs to the Dallas Burn.

In his first full season as head coach in 1998, Zambrano gave his team the chance to push forward in the attack from the opening kick until the final whistle. The players responded by netting 85 times in the regular season, setting an MLS record for goals in a season that still stands today. Cobi Jones (19 goals), Welton (17 goals) and Mauricio Cienfuegos (13 goals) all tallied career-highs for goals and the Galaxy scored three or more goals in 15 of their 32 games.

Offensive firepower however did not come at the expense of defense. Dan Calichman was lost early in the season to a broken leg, but the addition of Paul Caligiuri and the rise of goalkeeper Kevin Hartman allowed the team to hold their opponents to a league low 44 goals and post seven shutouts as the team rolled to a 24-8 record and an MLS record 68 points.

However, regular season success did not carry over into postseason play. After exacting playoff revenge on Dallas with a two-game sweep that saw LA outscore them 9-3, the Galaxy fell to the expansion Chicago Fire in a shootout finish at Soldier Field.

In October 1998, Anschutz Entertainment Group (AEG) purchased the Galaxy with a new vision to become "The club by which all others are measured". Upon taking over the club, AEG sought to shape the Galaxy into a brand on the local, national and international level.

By the end of AEG's first full season of ownership, the Galaxy were once again Western Conference champions, this time under new head coach Sigi Schmid, who replaced Zambrano after a 2-3 start to the season. The LA defense was once again the best in the league, allowing only 29 goals in 32 games.

Schmid led the team to a 20-12 record and berth in MLS Cup, but the curse of Foxboro Stadium continued to haunt the team as stalwart defender Robin Fraser was lost to a broken collarbone just minutes into the match and the Galaxy fell once again to D.C. United by a score of 2-0.

In their first full season under Schmid, the Galaxy finished the 2000 season second in the West with a 14-10-8 record, with the eight draws coming courtesy of the discontinuation of the shootout to settle regular season games that were tied at the end of 90 minutes.

While able to sweep the Tampa Bay Mutiny out of the playoffs, LA fell just shy of a return trip to MLS Cup as they were eliminated by the eventual champion Kansas City Wizards.

The Galaxy were finally able to take home some silverware in 2001, bringing home the first two championships in club history.

Playing in the 2000 CONCACAF Champions Cup, which was held ahead of the start of the 2001 MLS season, they knocked off Real Espana of Honduras and D.C. United to reach the final, where they took the regional title with a 3-2 win over Olimpia of Honduras.

In league play, a 14-7-5 record once again gave the team second place in the Western Conference and a chance to play for the previously unheard of 'Treble' of MLS Cup, U.S. Open Cup and CONCACAF Champions Cup titles. After disposing of the MetroStars and Chicago, Sigi Schmid's squad advanced to the MLS Cup, where they fell for a third time, this time to California rivals San Jose on an extra time goal from Dwayne DeRosario. Luis Hernandez and Landon Donovan traded first half strikes, leaving the game tied 1-1 at halftime. Neither side could find a breakthrough in the second half, sending the match to extra time where DeRosario would score the MLS Cup winning goal for the Earthquakes.



Despite still suffering from the sting of defeat in MLS Cup, the Galaxy were able to claim a second championship one week later, winning their first Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup title. Defender Danny Califf nodded home a golden goal winner in extra time of the Open Cup Final at Titan Stadium in Fullerton to give the Galaxy a 2-1 victory over the New England Revolution.

A month before the 2002 season, the Galaxy signed Guatemalan striker Carlos Ruiz, and the man nicknamed "El Pescadito" or "The Little Fish" immediately staked his claim as one of the top goal scorers in the history of MLS. He scored six times in his first four games with the club en route to an eventual team record tally of 24 goals on the year for Ruiz who would go on to be named MLS MVP.

The team ended the 2002 season 16-9-3 and in first place in the West, and advanced through the playoffs by demolishing Kansas City and Colorado. The MLS Cup was once again held in Foxboro, but this time it was at the new Gillette Stadium and the opposition was the hometown Revolution.

Playing before a packed house of mostly New England fans, the Galaxy and Revolution were scoreless at the end of 90 minutes. In extra time, it was Ruiz who gave LA their first MLS Cup championship, sliding onto a long cross from Tyrone Marshall and pushing the ball past goalkeeper Adin Brown for the game-winning golden goal, sending Galaxy fans into hysterics.

In 2003, the Galaxy moved to their new base at The Home Depot Center in Carson, but were forced to play their first eight games on the road while waiting for construction to be completed ahead of the June home opener. The club did not win a game on their season opening road trip and the schedule became even more crowded when they were selected to play against some of the best club sides in the world in that summer's FIFA Peace Cup in South Korea. As a result, the Galaxy struggled to achieve any sense of continuity and ended the season with a 9-12-9 record.

Facing the top-seeded San Jose Earthquakes once again in the postseason, the Galaxy claimed a 2-0 win at The Home Depot Center in the first leg of the new playoff system and traveled to Spartan Stadium with hopes of completing the upset. Those hopes were even higher after scoring twice inside the opening 15 minutes to lead 4-0 on aggregate. But the Earthquakes would go on to



score five straight goals, four in regulation and the winner in extra time, to take the series and eliminate the Galaxy en route to winning MLS Cup a few weeks later in Carson.

Before the 2004 season, longtime Galaxy legend Mauricio Cienfuegos announced his retirement. While the loss of the Salvadoran playmaker was difficult, Schmid was able to replace him with a pair of players in Austrian veteran Andreas Herzog and former U.S. international Jovan Kirovski. However, the Galaxy coach would not be there at the end of the season as he was replaced late in the season by former U.S. National Team head coach Steve Sampson.

Given the changes, the team did well to finish second in the Western Conference with an 11-9-10 record, and beat Colorado in the Western Conference Semifinals before falling to Kansas City in the Conference Championship.

A year later, despite struggling for much of the regular season, the Galaxy returned to their title winning ways, taking home both the U.S. Open Cup and a second MLS Cup. The addition of U.S. National Team star Landon Donovan buoyed the Galaxy while the emergence of young forward Herculez Gomez gave Donovan the

perfect partner up front. The pair combined to score 23 regular season goals with Gomez adding six tallies in the Open Cup, including the championship-winner in a 1-0 win over FC Dallas at The Home Depot Center.

In the MLS Cup Playoffs, Donovan and Gomez led the way as LA upset San Jose, who finished with the most points in the regular season. Donovan then added two more goals in the Western Conference Championship against Colorado, sending his new team back to MLS Cup where they would once again face the New England Revolution, with the newly-opened Pizza Hut Park in Frisco, Texas serving as the venue.

Just as in 2002, the two sides were scoreless after 90 minutes, only for the Galaxy to earn a victory courtesy of an extra time goal from a Guatemalan player. This time, it was a glorious volley from Guillermo 'El Pando' Ramirez - just his second goal of the season and the first from the run of play that gave the Galaxy a 1-0 victory and sent the MLS Cup trophy back to Los Angeles.

However, the joy of 2005 was soon replaced by a tumultuous 2006 that saw the tragic death of the club's President and General Manager Doug Hamilton on a flight back from Costa Rica where the Galaxy had just lost in the CONCACAF Champions Cup. The loss of the team's chief architect was felt on the field as well as the Galaxy struggled to defend their MLS Cup championship. In June, Frank Yallop was hired to replace Steve Sampson and he began to pull the club out of their early season struggles. However, a late season run, which included the club's capture of the Honda SuperClasico against Chivas USA, was not enough and LA missed the playoffs for the first time ever.

The Galaxy fared slightly better in the Open Cup, returning to the Final for the fourth time in six years, only to fail to defend their 2005 title, falling 3-1 to the Chicago Fire at Toyota Park.

The 2007 campaign started with a bang as the club announced in January that it had signed English midfielder David Beckham. One of the world's greatest players, Beckham would come to LA in July after finishing up his contract at Real Madrid, helping them win the La Liga Championship.

July also saw the Galaxy debut a new look, with the unveiling of the club's new brand, colors and logo. A classic look of white jerseys with navy blue piping, white shorts and white socks was used for the club's primary kit while navy blue and gold were featured on the secondary uniform. The Galaxy's new logo was a traditional navy blue crest which prominently featured a quasar, which is the heart of a Galaxy.

Despite making his LA debut in front of a sold out crowd and millions of viewers on ESPN, Beckham's first season in LA was blighted by injuries to both himself and the rest of the Galaxy squad. Once again, Frank Yallop's team put together a late season run, only to fall just short, losing their final game of the season in Chicago to miss out on a playoff berth by the narrowest of margins.

The 2007 season also saw the Galaxy's participation in the inaugural SuperLiga, which pitted the best teams in the United States against the best club teams in Mexico. The Galaxy finished at the top of their group to set up a semifinal meeting with D.C. United. Goals in that game from Beckham, his first for the club, and Landon Donovan sent LA through to the Final where they would meet Pachuca, who they had defeated in the tournament's first game one month earlier. The visitors from Mexico took an early lead in the Final, only for Chris Klein to equalize with an acrobatic bicycle kick deep into second half stoppage time, sending the game to extra time. The Galaxy had the better of the chances in the extra 30 minutes, but were unable to break the deadlock, forcing penalties where Pachuca would emerge victorious 4-3.

After the season, Yallop was released from his contract and replaced by former Dutch international Ruud Gullit, one of the game's all-time greats.

However, despite success early in 2008, the Galaxy struggled in the middle of the season, going a club record 12 games without a win and slipped to the bottom of the standings. Gullit left the club in August and was replaced by Bruce Arena, who was the architect of the D.C. United team that won the first two MLS Cups and who helped lead the U.S. National Team to the quarterfinals of the 2002 FIFA World Cup.

However, despite having a roster that included Landon Donovan, who led MLS with 20 goals in 25 games, Edson Buddle, who was third in MLS with 15 goals, as well as Beckham, MLS Rookie of the Year Sean Franklin and more, the Galaxy were unable to qualify for the MLS Playoffs for the third straight season.

The disappointment of missing the postseason in three consecutive years was finally put to rest a year later as the Galaxy returned to the MLS Cup Playoffs, though the path to get there was by no means straight forward.

The club opened the season with a 2-1-9 record, including a 10-game unbeaten streak, but still found themselves near the bottom of the Western Conference standings. However, a home win over Houston in late June kick started the Galaxy's season and they went on to finish 10-3-3 over the second half of the year. A late season 1-0 win over Chicago saw the club move into first place in the Western Conference for the first time in 15 months and they held that position until the end of the season, finishing the regular season in first place for the first time since 2002.

Perhaps the biggest key in the club's turnaround was a new look defense led by new acquisitions such as Gregg Berhalter, Todd Dunivant, Donovan Ricketts and 2009 MLS Rookie of the Year Omar Gonzalez, that allowed just 31 goals on the season. That figure was 31 fewer than they'd allowed in 2008, setting a new MLS record for the biggest defensive improvement.

With that group taking care of the defensive responsibilities, Landon Donovan was given a free reign to lead the LA attack and did just that. He finished the season with 12 goals and six assists, despite missing a month while at the FIFA Confederations Cup in South Africa, and was named the MLS MVP for the first time in his career. Shortly after Donovan returned from South Africa, the Galaxy were further bolstered by the return of David Beckham from a loan spell with AC Milan. Those two, along with Edson Buddle, who finished second on the team with five goals despite missing much of the season through injury, paced the Galaxy attack and terrified opposing defenders over the second half of the season.



The Galaxy opened the postseason with the Battle for Los Angeles against Chivas USA in their Western Conference Semifinal Series. A 2-2 draw in the first leg set the stage for a decisive second leg in which Donovan converted a second half penalty kick in front of a capacity crowd at The Home Depot Center, giving LA a 1-0 win and eliminating their rivals from the playoffs.

All that was left to stand between the Galaxy and a record sixth trip to MLS Cup was the Houston Dynamo. The 90 minutes of regulation (which included two delays for the stadium lights going out) was not enough to decide a winner as the game remained scoreless. Late in the first half of extra time, Gregg Berhalter scored his first-ever goal for the club to put LA in front. Donovan added a penalty kick, his 17th career postseason goal, making him the all-time leader in MLS playoff goals, late on to seal a 2-0 win for the Galaxy and send the club back to MLS Cup.

However, the resurgence would end there as the Galaxy fell on penalty kicks on a cold, wet night at Qwest Field in Seattle. Mike Magee scored just before halftime to give LA a 1-0 lead, but after the break things turned sour. Former Galaxy forward Robbie Findley scored to tie the game at 1-1 and goalkeeper Donovan Ricketts suffered a broken hand, forcing him to exit the game. Omar Gonzalez would also have to go off because of an injury before the game went to extra time. After 30 minutes of scoreless extra time, RSL would be crowned champions of MLS, winning 5-4 on penalty kick.

Spurred on by the disappointment of 2009, the Galaxy flew out of the gates in 2010, going undefeated in their first 12 games of the season with a 10-0-2 record. Edson Buddle was the key to that hot start, scoring nine of the club's first 10 goals on the year and earning a spot on the U.S. squad that went to South Africa for the World Cup.

But despite losing Buddle and captain Landon Donovan, who finished with a career-high 16 assists, for six weeks during the season, the Galaxy did not miss a beat thanks in large to their defense. Again led by Donovan Ricketts, who would be named the MLS Goalkeeper of the Year, the Galaxy allowed just seven goals over the first half of the season.

However, despite the July return of Buddle and Donovan, as well as the return from injury of David Beckham in September, the Galaxy were unable to match their results from the first half of the season in the second half.

They were however, able to maintain first place in the Western Conference all season long and claimed their first Supporters' Shield since 2002.

Bruce Arena's squad easily dispatched the Seattle Sounders FC in their Western Conference Semifinal Series, winning 1-0 in Seattle behind an Edson Buddle wonder goal and then claiming a 2-1 home win in the return leg for a 3-1 series win. That set up a matchup with FC Dallas at The Home Depot Center in the Western Conference Championship, with a berth in MLS Cup on the line.



The Galaxy came out flying on the night, only to be stymied by Kevin Hartman in the Dallas goal. Against the run of play, David Ferreira gave Dallas a 1-0 lead midway through the first half, shocking the home fans. Dallas would add two more in the second half, claiming a 3-0 win and abruptly ending the Galaxy season.

While the 2010 season, could be best described as a roller coaster, given the club's flying start and up and down finish, the 2011 campaign was a model of consistency. The club marched through the season, winning a second straight Supporters' Shield by going 19-5-10 for 67 points, which were the second most in MLS history.

David Beckham, Landon Donovan and Omar Gonzalez each earned spots on the All-Star Team and MLS Best XI with Sean Franklin and Juninho joining that trio on the All-Star Team and Todd Dunivant rounding out the club's Best XI quartet. Donovan Ricketts continued its sensational form, only to see injuries limit his availability. In his stead, Josh Saunders proved to be equally capable and struck his claim as one of the best goalkeepers in MLS.

The final piece of the championship puzzle arrived in mid-August with the signing of Ireland captain Robbie Keane. Despite missing a handful of games because of injury and international duty, the former Premier League legend added another element to the LA attack and helped the club win their group in the CONCACAF Champions League for the first time and repeat as Supporters' Shield winners.

The Galaxy continued that form into the postseason where they won all four of their games to win their first MLS Cup since 2005. After dispatching New York 3-1 on aggregate in the Conference Semifinal Series, thanks in large to a pair of Mike Magee goals, the Galaxy met with Real Salt Lake in the Western Conference Championship. Just as they had in MLS Cup 2009, the Galaxy opened up a 1-0 lead, only to see RSL equalize at 1-1. However, Magee came to the rescue again, scoring early in the second half to give his side a 2-1 lead before Keane rounded out the scoring in a 3-1 win, which set up a meeting with Houston at The Home Depot Center for MLS Cup.

Bruce Arena's team dominated the final, rarely allowing their opponents a look at goal. But despite creating a number of wonderful chances, LA could not break the deadlock until the 72nd minute. An A.J. DeLaGarza clearance was flicked on by Beckham, into the path of Keane, who cut past one defender and played a ball behind the Dynamo defense for Donovan, who clipped the ball past Tally Hall in just inside the far post to give his team a 1-0 win, starting the celebrations of more than 30,000 fans in Carson and providing the perfect ending to a near-perfect season.

A longtime executive with the NHL's Los Angeles Kings and AEG, Chris McGowan enters his first season as the Galaxy's Chief Operating Officer. McGowan, who is also the Kings' COO, was added to the Galaxy staff in February 2012. With the Galaxy, McGowan will oversee all of the club's day-to-day business operations and all aspects of the Galaxy front office, including sales and service, marketing, communications, broadcasting, community relations, sponsorship and game entertainment.

After first joining the Kings as an Account Executive in 1996, McGowan has developed an extensive background in the sales and marketing of sports and entertainment by working on a variety of large-scale events. He managed the Premium Seating (Luxury Suite and Club Seat) sales efforts for all of AEG's venues in Southern California including The Home Depot Center, STAPLES Center and NOKIA Theater. Under McGowan's leadership each of those venues set industry records for premium seating revenue. As the Senior Vice President for Sales and Marketing for AEG from 2003-2007, McGowan was responsible for sales and marketing efforts for many of AEG's Southern Californian properties, including the Kings, Los Angeles Riptide (Major League Lacrosse), AVP Southern California, WTA Tour Championships (Tennis), East West Bank Classic (Tennis), UCI Track Cycling at the ADT Event Center, Amgen Tour of California (Cycling), world championship Boxing matches at STAPLES Center and The Home Depot Center, U.S. Track & Field Championships, adidas Track Classic and more. CHRIS KLEIN
Vice President

After a standout 12-year career in MLS that saw him win MLS Cup in 2000 and set new MLS records for most consecutive games started and games played, Chris Klein retired from the game following the 2010 MLS season to become the Galaxy's Senior Director of the LA Galaxy Academy. He was officially named to that position in December 2010, before becoming a Vice President for the club in February 2012.

In his new role, Klein, will help arrange and organize the international friendlies that the Galaxy play each year while also serving as the club's lead on all MLS and community development related matters. Additionally, the St. Louis, Mo. native will continue to oversee the long-term financial and technical plan for the Academy, while building a strong presence in the local soccer community. Klein, who also sits on the board of the Hammarby Football Club in Sweden, representing AEG, a part owner of the club, is also in charge of developing and improving the Academy's training facilities and programs, coaching staff and recruitment program.

A four-time All-Star in MLS, Klein ranks fifth in league history with 333 career games played as a member of the Kansas City Wizards, Real Salt Lake and the Galaxy, who he joined in June 2007. In his time with the Galaxy, Klein appeared in more than 100 games in all competitions, scoring five times and adding 15 assists.

The 36-year-old, who holds his USSF "B" coaching license, began his MLS career in 1998 when he was selected by the Kansas City Wizards in the first round (4th overall) of the MLS College Draft. In eight years with the Wizards, Klein helped the club win their first MLS Cup in 2000, assisting on Miklos Molnar's game-winning goal as the Wizards defeated Chicago 1-0. An All-Star every year from 2002-05, Klein scored 39 goals and added 45 assists in his time with the club, while also helping them win the 2004 Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup. Klein is the only player in MLS history to win the league's Comeback Player of the Year award twice, doing so in 2002 and 2005 after twice recovering from serious knee injuries.

Prior to the start of the 2006 season, Klein was traded to Real Salt Lake, where he had eight goals and nine assists in 43 games for the club. He was on the move once again in June 2007 when he was acquired by the Galaxy in exchange for Robbie Findley and Nathan Sturgis.

Klein immediately established himself as one of the most reliable players in the Galaxy squad as he went on to set MLS records for consecutive games started (118) and games played (141) that still stand today. In 94 regular season appearances for the club, Klein had two goals and 15 assists, while adding a pair of goals in the 2007 SuperLiga. The second of these goals cemented his place in club lore, as his bicycle kick in the final seconds of second half stoppage time in the SuperLiga Final, tied the game at 1-1 and sent the match to extra time.

In addition to his play in MLS, Klein earned 22 caps with the U.S. National Team, scoring five goals and adding three assists. He made his international debut in a 2-0 win over Mexico on 10/25/2000 at the Rose Bowl and scored his first goal for the U.S. in his eighth appearance, a 4-0 win over Canada in January 2003. He two goals and two assists in six games for the U.S. in 2006, making his final appearance for his country in March of that year.

Klein played his college soccer at Indiana University, playing in 88 games during his four years with the Hoosiers. He finished his college career with 19 goals and 18 assists and led his team to the NCAA Tournament four times, including a berth in the College Cup Final in 1994 where they lost to Bruce Arena's University of Virginia.

The Home Depot Center is a 125-acre, \$150 million development in Carson, featuring state-of-the-art stadiums and facilities for soccer, tennis, track & field, cycling, lacrosse, rugby, volleyball, baseball, softball, basketball and other sports. Designated as an "Official U.S. Olympic Training Site," The Home Depot Center is the nation's most complete training facility for Olympic, amateur and professional athletes.

Created around a 27,000-seat soccer stadium, 8,000-seat tennis stadium, 10,000-seat track & field facility and a 2,450-seat indoor velodrome, the complex is located on the campus of California State University, Dominguez Hills. The Home Depot Center is home to Major League Soccer's LA Galaxy and Chivas USA. In addition, the site is the U.S. Soccer Federation's (USFS) national team training headquarters and the location of the United States Tennis Association's (USTA) USA High Performance National Training Center. The development is also designated as an official training site for USA Cycling and USA Track & Field.

Since opening on June 1, 2003, with the inaugural Home Depot Track & Field Invitational, The Home Depot Center has hosted some of the finest national and international competitions in the world. In the facility's first year of operation, it hosted the 2003 MLS All-Star Game, 2003 MLS Cup game and the 2003 FIFA Women's World Cup championship match. Since then, The Home Depot Center has hosted major soccer tournaments and matches, including the qualifying for the prestigious Copa Libertadores – InterLiga, SuperLiga, CONCACAF Men's & Women's Gold Cup matches, the World Series of Football and the annual Super Clásico, featuring Los Angeles' intra-city rivalry, the LA Galaxy versus Chivas USA. The Home Depot Center hosted the LA Women's Tennis Championships presented by Herbalife, a Premier Sony Ericsson WTA Tour event, showcasing tennis' most elite female athletes, from 2004 to 2009. The facility is also home to the nation's premier indoor velodrome and hosted the UCI Track Cycling World Cup Classics 2005–2007, and, in 2005, hosted the World Championships. Across three disciplines – soccer, tennis, cycling – more than 45 U.S. athletes who competed in the 2008 Beijing Olympics trained at The Home Depot Center in preparation for the Games, and more than 250 train annually at the facility.

The Home Depot Center's commitment to athletics and training also extends to the surrounding communities. Tennis courts, soccer training fields and a three-mile jogging trail with 12 fitness stations around the perimeter of the development is available to local residents as well as other facilities and amenities. Through foundations established by AEG-operated entities such as the Galaxy, the Los Angeles Kings (NHL) and STAPLES Center, more than \$5 million has been pledged to community organizations in the last seven years, including new donations targeting the local Carson community established by The Home Depot Center Charitable Foundation.

CARSON, CALIFORNIA

In 1782, the area now known as the city of Carson, California, was founded by Spanish soldier Juan Jose Dominguez. When Dominguez retired from military service in that year, the governor rewarded him with the first land grant in the history of California, a vast expanse of some 75,000 acres. This territory, named Rancho San Pedro, stretched from the Los Angeles River all the way west to the Pacific Ocean, encompassing what today would be the cities of Carson, Torrance, Redondo Beach, Lomita, Wilmington, and parts of San Pedro.

After suffering decades of neglect as an unincorporated part of Los Angeles County, the citizens of Carson went to the polls on February 6, 1968 to vote on whether to officially incorporate their community as an independent city. Almost 10,000 of the 17,531 registered voters in Carson cast a vote on that February morning. When the ballots were counted, the vote was 6,301 to 3,834 in favor of incorporation. Thus was the City of Carson born, the eighth-largest city in Los Angeles County.

Today, Carson is a vibrant city of approximately 90,000 people. Economic development has been a major goal for Carson over the last 35 years. The 1984 Los Angeles Olympics helped the city on its way by building a velodrome in Carson and staging the cycling events there. Although that velodrome is no longer in existence, a new one was built locally as part of the Home Depot Center complex on the campus of Cal State – Dominguez Hills.

Bruce Arena
General Manager and Head Coach

The reigning MLS Coach of the Year, and three-time MLS Cup winner, Bruce Arena enters his fifth season with the Galaxy. One of the most successful head coaches in U.S. National Team history, Arena led the Galaxy to their third MLS Cup last season, becoming the first coach in MLS-history to win three championships. He was named General Manager and Head Coach of the Galaxy on August 18, 2008, becoming the seventh coach in club history. In his dual role, Arena oversees all of the club's soccer operations in addition his responsibilities in coaching the first team.

Since joining the Galaxy, Arena has led the club to a 51-23-30 regular season record and a first place finish in the Western Conference each of the past three seasons, including the Supporters' Shield in 2010 and 2011. The 2009 and 2011 MLS Coach of the Year and a member of the National Soccer Hall of Fame, Arena completely re-hauled the club's roster prior to the start of the 2009 season, bringing in 16 new players while helping the Galaxy reach MLS Cup for the first time since 2005. Of the 34 players currently on the Galaxy roster, only five were with the club when Arena was hired, with one of those players, Edson Buddle, leaving the club in January 2011 before returning prior to the start of the 2012 campaign.

The all-time leader in wins amongst coaches in U.S. National Team history, Arena led the U.S. to the FIFA World Cup twice, including an historic quarterfinal berth in 2002 in Japan/Korea. Arena took over as head coach in November 1998 and was in charge for nearly eight years, collecting a 71-30-29 all-time record, while leading the U.S. to the CONCACAF Gold Cup title in 2002 and 2005, the 2000 Nike U.S. Cup championship, as well as a third place finish in the 1999 Confederations Cup in Mexico.

The 60-year-old has a career regular season record of 128-74-40 in MLS and a postseason mark of 22-6-4. His 128 career regular season wins are the second most in MLS history, while his 22 postseason wins are the most in league history, two more than Seattle's Sigi Schmid. The only coach in league history to win three championships, Arena is one of just two coaches, along with Schmid, to win both MLS Cup and the U.S. Open Cup.

Arena was the first coach in D.C. United history, joining the club for its inaugural season in 1996. He would spend three seasons with United, reaching MLS Cup three times, winning it twice, in addition to reaching the U.S. Open Cup Final twice and winning the tournament once. He also helped United become the first MLS team ever to win the CONCACAF Champions Cup and the Interamerican Cup, winning each in 1998.

After a slow start to their inaugural season, Arena helped re-vitalize United and led the club to a second place finish in the Eastern Conference. Then, after losing their first postseason game against the MetroStars, Arena and United won their next five games to win the inaugural MLS Cup, culminating with a 3-2 extra time win over the Galaxy in the rain at Foxboro Stadium.

Ten days later, United completed the "Double" by becoming the first MLS club ever to win the U.S. Open Cup, defeating the Rochester Rhinos 3-0.

Arena followed up that performance a year later by being named the MLS Coach of the Year for the first time after leading United to the best record in MLS and a second MLS Cup championship in as many years, defeating the Colorado Rapids 2-1 at RFK Stadium.

In 1998, his final season with United, Arena again led United to the Eastern Conference championship, finishing the regular season with the second best record in the league. But despite becoming the first MLS club to win the CONCACAF Champions Cup in August of that year and the Interamerican Cup, United fell in their bid for a third consecutive MLS Cup title, falling to the Chicago Fire.

Following the 2006 FIFA World Cup in Germany, Arena parted company with U.S. Soccer and returned to MLS when he was named the Sporting Director and Head Coach of the New York Red Bulls in August 2006. He spent a year and a half with the Red Bulls, compiling a 16-16-10 record while helping New York reach the postseason both years. He helped to develop young stars like Jozy Altidor and Dane Richards while also signing players like Juan Pablo Angel, who was a finalist for the MLS MVP award and the Newcomer of the Year Award in 2007.

Following a brief stint at the University of Puget Sound (1976), Arena was named the head coach at the University of Virginia, in 1978. He held that position for 18 years, helping the Cavaliers to five ACC Tournament Championships and five National Championships, including four in a row from 1991-1994.



Dave Sarachan
Associate Head Coach

A two-time MLS Cup winning coach, Dave Sarachan enters his fifth season as the Galaxy's Associate Head Coach after being hired by the club on August 18, 2008, the same day that Bruce Arena was named the club's General Manager and Head Coach. This is the fourth time in his coaching career that Sarachan has worked with Arena, having previously served as his assistant at the University of Virginia (1984-1988), D.C. United (1998-1999) and with the U.S. National Team (2000-2002). An invaluable member of the Galaxy coaching staff, Sarachan has helped lead his teams to MLS Cup five times in his 11 seasons as a coach in MLS.

A veteran coach with experience in college soccer and MLS as well as with the U.S. National Team, Sarachan, 57, began his coaching career as an assistant at the University of Rochester (1976-77) and Cornell (1983) before joining Arena's staff at Virginia in 1984. After five years with the Cavaliers, Sarachan returned to Cornell to become the school's head coach in 1989. In nine seasons with the Big Red, Sarachan compiled a 64-63-16 record, a pair of NCAA Tournament berths and an Ivy League Championship before moving to the professional game as an assistant coach with D.C. United.

After two seasons with United, during which he helped lead the club to an MLS Cup title in 1999, Sarachan joined forces once again with Arena, this time with the U.S. National Team. Sarachan helped the U.S. qualify for the 2002 FIFA World Cup in Japan/Korea where they had their best finish since 1930, reaching the Quarterfinals before losing to the tournament's eventual runner-up Germany.

Following the 2002 MLS season, Sarachan was named the head coach of the Chicago Fire, a position that he held for four and a half years, helping lead the Fire to the 2003 Supporters' Shield and that year's MLS Cup Final, while also winning the MLS Coach of the Year award that season. Sarachan also helped lead the Fire to a pair of U.S. Open Cup Championships in 2003 and 2006.

In his time with the Fire, Sarachan's teams had a record of 55-50-31 in regular season games and reached the postseason three times. Under his direction, the Fire never failed to at least reach the semifinals of the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup, reaching the Final three times and winning the tournament twice.

Prior to joining the Galaxy in August 2008, Sarachan served as the Director of Scouting for the United States Soccer Federation's Developmental Academy Program, where he worked to help identify many of the top young players throughout the nation.

A native of Rochester, N.Y., Sarachan is a graduate of Cornell University where he was an All-American soccer player, helping lead the Big Red to the NCAA Tournament as a senior. Prior to entering the coaching ranks, he played professionally in both the NASL, with the Rochester Lancers and the MISL with the Pittsburgh Spirit, Buffalo Stallions, Baltimore Blast and Kansas City Comets.

A native of Rochester, N.Y., Sarachan is a graduate of Cornell University where he was an All-American soccer player, helping lead the Big Red to the NCAA Tournament as a senior. Prior to entering the coaching ranks, he played professionally in both the NASL, with the Rochester Lancers and the MISL with the Pittsburgh Spirit, Buffalo Stallions, Baltimore Blast and Kansas City Comets.



Curt Onalfo
Assistant Coach/Reserve Team Head Coach

An MLS Cup winner as both a player and a coach, Curt Onalfo is back for his second season as the Galaxy's Assistant Coach and Reserve Team Head Coach. A former MLS head coach with Kansas City and D.C. United, Onalfo played his college soccer for Bruce Arena at the University of Virginia and then served as his assistant coach with the U.S. National Team from 2003-2006. He was hired by the Galaxy in January 2011 and played a central role in the club repeating as Supporters' Shield winners and capturing their third MLS Cup last season.

A Galaxy original, Onalfo played 13 games for the club in 1996, helping them reach the inaugural MLS Cup. He went on to play in 23 games in four years in the league, spending time with San Jose and D.C. United in addition to the Galaxy.

After retiring from MLS in 1999, Onalfo moved into the world of coaching as an assistant coach with D.C. United in 2001. He spent two years with United before moving onto the U.S. National Team as an assistant coach. In four years with the U.S., Onalfo helped the team win the 2005 CONCACAF Gold Cup and qualify for the 2006 FIFA World Cup in Germany.

Onalfo left the National Team shortly after the 2006 World Cup and got his first heading coaching job in MLS in November 2006 when he was hired by the Kansas City Wizards (now Sporting Kansas City). The 42-year-old spent two-and-a-half seasons as the Kansas City head coach, leading the team to the postseason twice after seeing them fail to qualify for the playoffs in the two seasons prior to his arrival. He had a 27-29-22 record in his time with Kansas City before leaving the club in August 2009. Four months later, in December 2009, Onalfo was back in MLS as he was named the new head coach for D.C. United, replacing Tom Soehn.

Onalfo remained United's head coach for eight months before leaving the club in August. He led United to the semifinal of the 2010 Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup and played a pivotal role in the growth and development of eventual MLS Rookie of the Year Andy Najar.

Originally born in Sao Paulo, Brazil, Onalfo played four years of college soccer at Virginia, helping the Cavaliers reach the NCAA Tournament four times and win a share of the National Championship in 1989. A two-time All-ACC First Team selection, Virginia had a 68-12-13 record in Onalfo's four years in Charlottesville, including the 1988 ACC Championship. In addition to his play with the Cavaliers, Onalfo was a member of the U.S. U-20 team that finished fourth at the 1989 World Youth Championships and a co-captain with the 1992 U.S. Olympic Team. He began his professional playing career in 1991 with FC La Ciotat in France and later went on to play in Mexico with Tampico FC before returning to the United States to play in MLS.

He was selected by the Galaxy in the inaugural MLS Player Draft and spent one season with the club before being traded to San Jose in 1997. A year later, he joined D.C. United, helping the club win the 1998 InterAmerican Cup and CONCACAF Champions Cup, as well as the 1999 MLS Cup before retiring at the end of that season.

Jovan Kirovski
Assistant Coach

After retiring as a player following the 2011 MLS season, Jovan Kirovski is in his first season as an assistant coach with the Galaxy. Hired by the club in January, Kirovski, who replaces Gregg Berhalter on Bruce Arena's staff, spent 20 years in the game as a player, enjoying a successful career in Europe before returning to the U.S. in 2004 to close out his career with an eight-year stint in MLS.

A native of Escondido, Calif., Kirovski began his professional soccer career in 1992 when he joined the youth ranks at Manchester United alongside players like David Beckham, Gary Neville and Paul Scholes. After four years with United, Kirovski moved to Germany, signing with Borussia Dortmund, where he became the first American to win the UEFA Champions League in May 1997. Seven months later, Kirovski became the first American to score a goal in the competition, doing so against Sparta Prague in December 1997 as Dortmund went on to reach the semifinals of the 1997-98 Champions League. He spent the 1998-99 season on loan with fellow German side FC Koln before heading to Portugal a year later when he signed with Sporting Lisbon. After one season in Portugal, Kirovski moved to England, spending one season in the Championship with Crystal Palace before moving on to the Premier League, signing with Birmingham City. He scored twice in 23 league matches for the Blues during the 2002/03 and 2003/04 seasons, helping them retain their Premier League status.

After more than a decade in Europe, Kirovski first arrived in MLS in February 2004, signing with the Galaxy. An All-Star in his first year with the club when he scored an MLS-career-high eight goals, Kirovski spent the first year and a half of his time in MLS with the Galaxy, tallying 12 goals and six assists in 48 games. He was traded to Colorado in September 2005 and helped the Rapids reach back-to-back Western Conference Championships in 2005 and 2006 before finishing as the club's top scorer in 2007. After 12 goals in 61 games for the Rapids, as well as the first postseason goal of his career, Kirovski was traded to San Jose in midway through the 2008 season before he returned to the Galaxy in November 2008. Back with his first MLS club, Kirovski became a key veteran contributor to the club's renaissance, playing in central midfield and occasionally up front. He played in 56 games over the last three seasons as well as five postseason matches in that time, scoring six goals and adding three assists as the Galaxy re-established themselves as the premier club in Major League Soccer. He finished his MLS career with 30 goals and 13 assists in 174 regular season games while helping his teams win a pair of Supporters' Shields and MLS Cup 2011 in the final two years of his plating career.

In addition to his club career, Kirovski, who holds his U.S. Soccer Federation's "A" coaching license, made 62 appearances with the U.S. National Team, scoring nine times for his country during an 11-year international career. He made his National Team debut in October 1994 and scored his first goal a month later in a 3-0 win over Jamaica. He helped the U.S. qualify for the World Cup in 1998, 2002 and 2006 while also appearing in the 1995 Copa America, the 1996 and 2000 CONCACAF Gold Cups as well as the 1999 and 2003 FIFA Confederations Cups. Kirovski collected his final cap in a U.S. uniform in April 2004, coming on as a second half substitute in a 1-0 win over Mexico in Dallas.



Ian Feuer
Goalkeeper Coach

An MLS Cup winner for the first time in 2011, Ian Feuer enters his sixth season as the Galaxy's Goalkeeper Coach after having been hired by the club on September 1, 2007. Feuer, who played professionally in both Europe and the United States, has played a pivotal role in the club's recent defensive improvements, working with returning starter Josh Saunders and 2010 MLS Goalkeeper of the Year Donovan Ricketts and helping the Galaxy equal an MLS record with 17 clean sheets last year, when they conceded a league-low 28 goals in 34 games.

The Las Vegas native was a member of the U.S. team at the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona and began his professional career in 1993 with Belgian side Club Brugge. He briefly returned to the United States later that year to play for the L.A. Salsa of the APSL. After his stint with the Salsa, the 39-year old returned to Europe in April 1994 when he signed with West Ham United of the English Premier League. After a brief loan spell at Luton Town, he was sold outright to the club in December 1995. He remained at the club, winning the Fans' Player of the Year Award in the 1995-96 season, until March 1998 when he again returned to the U.S., signing with the New England Revolution.

Feuer, who earned his first cap with the U.S. National Team against Morocco on March 18, 1992, appeared in and started 26 games for New England in 1998 before being traded to Colorado in February 1999. Feuer started 19 games for the Rapids that season, as well as each of the club's two postseason matches, keeping eight clean sheets while compiling a 1.22 goals against average. He returned to West Ham after the 1999 MLS season and spent the next three years in England with the Hammers.

In addition to his work with the Galaxy, Feuer, who currently resides in Southern California, Feuer served as the goalkeeper coach for the U.S. National Team for a camp at The Home Depot Center in September 2011. He also runs the Premier Goalkeeping Academy, which offers private coaching sessions and clinics to young goalkeepers, including members of the Galaxy Academy.



David Kammarman
Director of Soccer Operations

David Kammarman enters his fourth season with the Galaxy as the club's Director of Soccer Operations. Hired in February 2009, Kammarman works closely with Bruce Arena and the Galaxy coaching staff in the areas of player personnel, scouting, evaluation, agent and MLS communication and CBA compliance, as well as acting as a liaison between the front office and the coaching staff.

Kammarman joined the Galaxy following an extensive career in soccer in the United States where he worked with three other MLS clubs, the Chicago Fire, D.C. United, and the MetroStars (now New York Red Bulls) as well as with ESPN on their broadcasts of MLS and U.S. National Team games, including the 2006 FIFA World Cup in Germany.

A native of Laurel, Md. Kammarman played four years of college soccer at University of Delaware before joining the Delaware Wizards of the United Soccer League.

In 1996, Kammarman joined D.C. United where he served a variety of functions, first in media relations and assisting on the equipment staff under then-United head coach Bruce Arena. Kammarman spent three seasons with United when the club won two MLS Cup titles before joining the Chicago Fire and former United assistant coach Bob Bradley in 1999. From 1999-2002, Kammarman was the Fire's equipment manager as the club won the 2000 U.S. Open Cup and reached the 2000 MLS Cup Final.

Kammarman reunited with Bradley in 2003, moving to the MetroStars, first as the clubs equipment manager before being promoted to the technical staff as an assistant coach and Manager of Soccer Operations prior to the start of the 2004 season.

He remained in that role until August 2005 and joined ESPN in 2006. With ESPN, Kammarman spent five weeks in Germany and was responsible for research and scouting for the lead broadcast team, working on 20 matches including the Opening Game and World Cup Final in Berlin. He continued that role for all Major League Soccer and U.S. National Team games for in 2007.



Ben Yauss
Strength and Conditioning Coach

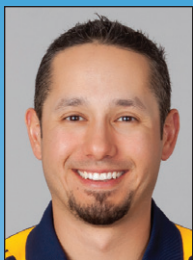
Ben Yauss enters his fourth season as Strength and Conditioning coach for the Galaxy. 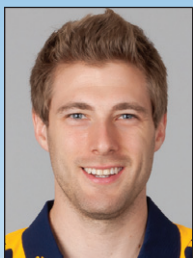

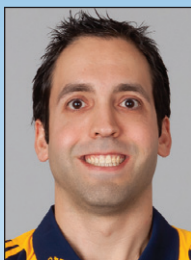

A dangerous goal scorer who had eight goals in all competitions for the Galaxy last year, Barrett was forced to miss MLS Cup after suffering a severe right foot injury just more than a week before the game. Strong in the air and good at holding the ball up, he formed an instant partnership with Robbie Keane last season and will look to continue that this season.

MLS Highlights

2011: Won his first MLS Cup after finishing second on the Galaxy with seven regular season goals and eight in all competitions. He tallied his second best single season totals in both goals and assists, tallying five assists in addition to his seven goals with the Galaxy going 8-0-0 when he scored and 4-1-0 when he recorded and assist. Helped the Galaxy win both legs of the SuperClasico against Chivas USA, scoring in each of LA's 1-0 wins. He scored his first goal in a Galaxy uniform on 4/17 at Chicago, tallying late in the first half of that 2-1 win on 4/17. He added a goal and an assist a week later at home against Portland on 4/23. Tallied the first multi-assist game of his MLS career on 5/14, setting up a pair of goals in the 4-1 home win over Sporting Kansas City. He missed two months of the season because of an ankle injury, but he scored just six minutes after returning to the field against Alajuelense in the Champions League. His goal in second half stoppage time at Columbus on 9/24 gave LA a 1-0 win and then he scored again in the 2-1 home win over Real Salt Lake on 10/1, a win that put the Galaxy on the verge of clinching the Supporters' Shield. That goal was the 40th of his MLS career. After finishing the year with a goal or an assist in five of his last six regular season games, he started each of LA's first three postseason games but was forced to miss MLS Cup after suffering a dislocated right foot in training ahead of that game. **2010:** Tallied seven goals and added two assists in 23 MLS games while also helping Toronto FC qualify for the CONCACAF Champions League for the first time in club history. The club's second leading goal scorer in the league, Barrett opened his 2010 goal account with a pair of goals against Chicago on 5/8 before adding single tallies in wins over New England and San Jose later in the month. He added three league goals and two assists over the final four months of the year, scoring against Philadelphia, Chivas USA and Seattle while collecting assists against Colorado and San Jose, though TFC was just 2-3-0 in those games. He added one goal in the Nutrilite Canadian Championship before adding one in both legs of their CONCACAF Champions League Preliminary Round series with Motagua. **2009:** In his first full season with Toronto, Barrett

scored five goals and added three assists in 29 games. Two of his five goals came in the 3-1 win at San Jose on 7/20 while he added single tallies at FC Dallas on 4/19, vs. Columbus on 5/2 and then in his return to Chicago on 9/26, while also adding two goals in the Nutrilite Canadian Championship. **2008:** Split the season between Chicago and Toronto after being traded to the Reds on 7/30. Between the two teams, he finished the season with 29 games played while scoring a career-high nine goals and seven assists, also a career-high. He had five goals and four assists in 16 games with the Fire before being traded. He scored in two of his first three games of the season and then added a pair of goals in a 5-1 win at New York on 5/28. He was on the scoresheet again in the Fire's next game, scoring his team's only goal in a 2-1 loss at home against D.C. United. His fourth and final assist in a Fire jersey came on 7/12 in a 2-1 win over Toronto FC, exactly 18 days before being traded to the club. Barrett made his Toronto debut on 8/3 vs. Dallas and then scored his first goal for the club a week later, tallying in a 1-0 win at Colorado on 8/9. He scored his first home goal on 8/23 against New England before adding an assist on 9/6 at The Home Depot Center against Chivas USA. He had his first multi-goal game for the club at New York on 10/4, tallying on either side of halftime, including the game-winner in a 3-1 win. **2007:** Recovered from injury to play in all 30 of the Fire's games in 2007, finishing with a team-best seven goals to win Chicago's Golden Boot. He scored twice in April before adding single tallies in each of the final five months of the regular season, leading the Fire to a 3-1-3 record in those seven games. He also added two assists in the regular season, including one in a 2-1 win over New England on 10/6 in which he scored the game-winning goal. In the postseason, Barrett started in all three of the Fire's games, scoring the first goal of his postseason career goal in the second leg of their Eastern Conference Semifinal Series win over D.C. United, helping the Fire to a 3-2 aggregate goal win. **2006:** Was limited to just 16 appearances in his second season with the Fire, finishing fourth on the team with five goals. He scored the first goal of the 2006 MLS season on 4/1, tallying in a 3-2 loss at FC Dallas. He added his second goal of the year at Kansas City on 5/6 before recording the first multi-goal game of his career on 6/28, scoring twice in a 22 minute appearance off the bench against Real Salt Lake. He scored his final goal of the year in a 3-0 win over Kansas City on 8/16 but played in just two more games the rest of the year because of injury. Barrett had one assist in the regular season and added another in the U.S. Open Cup as he helped the Fire win that year's tournament, defeating LA in the Open Cup Final. **2005:** Was selected by the Chicago Fire in the first round (3rd overall) of the MLS SuperDraft. He made his debut in their season opener on 4/2. He scored the first goal of his career on 5/28, helping the Fire to a 3-0 win at Real Salt Lake. He appeared in 20 games that season, making four starts and collecting four assists to go along with his goal. The first of those assists came in the third appearance of his career against San Jose on 4/16 before adding assists at LA and at home against Columbus and the MetroStars. He also appeared in nine Reserve Division games, scoring eight goals, which were tied for the second most in MLS.

College Highlights

Played two years at UCLA (2003-04), scoring 16 goals and adding 18 assists while helping the Bruins to a 34-6-3 record and a pair of NCAA Tournament berths. A two-time Second Team All-Pac-10 performer, Barrett was named the conference's Co-Freshman/Newcomer of the Year in 2003 when he finished second on the team with 10 goals and eight assists while starting 17 of the 23 games that he appeared in. One year later, Barrett had a team-best 10 assists and added six goals, despite missing a portion of the season while with the U.S. Under-20 National Team. He left school after his sophomore season to sign with MLS.

National Team

Barrett has one cap for the U.S., coming on as a second half substitute for Freddy Adu in the 1-0 win at Barbados on 6/22/08. That result gave the U.S. a 9-0 series win on aggregate. He has represented the U.S. at the U-18, U-20 and U-23, playing at the 2005 FIFA U-20 World Cup in Holland. He scored three of the four games that the U.S. played in, scoring once. That goal gave the U.S. a 1-0 win over Argentina in their first game of the tournament. One year earlier, Barrett scored three of the four goals scored by the U.S. at the Milk Cup in Northern Ireland.

An MLS All-Star and Best XI selection in 2011, Beckham enjoyed his best season with the club last year, setting a new career-high with 15 assists in MLS play and more than 20 in all competitions. Still one of the best in the world when it comes to crossing the ball or from set pieces, he shows now signs of slowing down as he closes in on his 20th season as a professional. He re-signed with the club in January 2012, agreeing to return to the club for two more seasons.

MLS Highlights

2011: Won his first MLS Cup and enjoyed his finest season since joining the Galaxy, tallying a career-best 15 assists in 26 regular season games. He was named to the All-Star Team for a second time while also earning his first berth on the MLS Best XI and being named the MLS Comeback Player of the Year. His 15 assists were the second most in MLS, one fewer than Houston's Brad Davis, with eight of those coming from set pieces. He had two assists in home wins over San Jose and Vancouver for his first multi-assists games in the regular season since April 2008. The Galaxy were 9-1-3 when Beckham recorded and assist and 2-0-0 when he scored a goal, tallying at home against Kansas City in a 4-1 win and at home against Chicago, scoring the game-winning goal direct from a corner kick on 7/9. He also tied a club record with 10 yellow cards on the season, leading to a pair of one game suspensions. He continued his strong form into the postseason, tallying an assist in all four of LA's games, giving him six assists in his last six playoff games. His first three assists in the MLS Cup Playoffs set up goals for Mike Magee, while three of his four assists came on game-winning goals. 2010: Missed much of the season while recovering from a torn Achilles tendon that he suffered while on loan with AC Milan, but managed to come back for the final seven games of the regular season, as well as the postseason. He suffered the injury in March and began training with the Galaxy in August before making his debut as a second half substitute on 9/11 vs. Columbus. That was his first appearance as a sub in MLS since 2007. Beckham made his debut in the starting lineup on 9/24 in a 2-0 loss vs. New York, playing the full 90 minutes. In LA's next game, on 10/3, he scored his first goal of the season, beating Zach Thornton with a freekick for the eventual game-winning goal in a 2-1 LA road win over Chivas USA. He recorded his first assist four days later, providing the corner kick for Edson Buddle to head home in a 1-0 win at Philadelphia on 10/7. Beckham added his second and final goal of the year late in the first half of the regular season finale against FC Dallas as LA erased a 1-0 deficit to win 2-1, giving the club a 5-2-0 record with Beckham in the lineup. With the Galaxy holding a 1-0 aggregate lead over Seattle heading into the second leg of their Western Conference Semifinal Series, Beckham recorded the first two assists of his MLS postseason career, setting up goals from Edson Buddle and Omar Gonzalez from freekicks, helping LA win 2-1 in the second leg of that series for a 3-1 win on aggregate. 2009: Returned to the Galaxy in July after spending the first half of the season on loan with AC Milan. He made his season debut on 7/16, playing 70 minutes in the 3-1 win at New York. He played

his first game at The Home Depot Center three days later, tallying two assists in the 2-2 draw with AC Milan. Beckham collected his first MLS assist of the season on 7/25, setting up Landon Donovan's first half goal in the 1-1 draw at Kansas City. He then scored the Galaxy's only goal in the 2-1 loss to Barcelona, scoring a freekick late in the first half. On 8/15 vs. Seattle, Beckham was sent off for the first time in his MLS career for a foul on Peter Vagenas. Two weeks later, he scored his first league goal of the season, scoring the game-winner late in a 1-0 win vs. Chivas USA on 8/29, clinching the SuperClasico title for LA. He added an assist in his next game out on 9/12 vs. FC Dallas and then had a goal and an assist in the 2-0 home win over Toronto FC on 9/19. The Galaxy were 7-3-3 after his arrival, earning Beckham his first postseason berth in MLS. In the playoffs, he started all four games, with his freekick in the first half of extratime of the Western Conference Championship vs. Houston leading to Gregg Berhalter's game-winning goal in the 103rd minute. At MLS Cup, he collected the first postseason assist of his MLS career, setting up Mike Magee's first half goal against Real Salt Lake. He went on to play the full 120 minutes in that game and converted his penalty kick in the game's deciding shootout. 2008: In his first full season in MLS, Beckham had a team-best 10 assists to go along with five goals in 25 games. Beckham scored the first goal of his MLS career nine minutes into the home opener against San Jose on 4/3, sending the Galaxy to a 2-0 win. He followed up that goal with the first multi-goal game of his MLS career with a pair of goals in the 2-2 draw at Real Salt Lake on 5/3. Beckham was named the MLS Player of the Week after each of those games and he added goals on 5/24 and 7/4 against Kansas City and New England respectively. He registered his only multi-assist game of the season on 4/19 vs. Houston, setting up a pair of Landon Donovan goals in a 2-2 draw. An MLS All-Star for the first time, he set up the All-Stars' first goal in the 3-2 win. He missed five games on the season, four because of National Team duty and one because of suspension after collecting six yellow cards. 2007: Arrived in Los Angeles in mid-July after completing his season with Real Madrid. Ankle and knee injuries limited Beckham to just five league appearances and two starts over the second half of the season. After making his Galaxy debut in the friendly against Chelsea on 7/21, he made his MLS debut as a second half substitute on 8/9 at D.C. United. He made his first start for the club six days later in the SuperLiga semifinal against D.C. United, scoring a goal, his first-ever for the club, and adding an assist in the 2-0 Galaxy win. A few days later, he played the full 90 minutes and collected two assists in a 5-4 loss at New York. A knee injury in the SuperLiga Final against Pachuca forced Beckham out after 33 minutes and ruled him out for six weeks before he returned for the final two games of the year.

Career Highlights

2010: Spent a second straight offseason on loan with AC Milan of the Italian Serie A. He joined the club in late December 2009 and was officially added to the roster in January. He made his season debut for the club in a 5-2 win over Genoa on 1/10. He made his Champions League debut for Milan on 2/16 against Manchester United, his first-ever game against his former club. On 3/14, Beckham suffered a torn left Achilles tendon in a game against Chievo Verona, forcing him to miss the rest of the season, as well as the 2010 World Cup. 2009: Spent the offseason on loan in Italy, playing with AC Milan. He joined the club during their winter break in Dubai, making his debut in a friendly against Hamburg. Beckham made his Serie A debut on 1/11 against Roma when he started for Milan in a 2-2 draw. He scored his first goal for the club in a 4-1 win over Bologna at the San Siro before adding another goal four days later in a 1-1 draw against Genoa. He helped the team to a third place finish, ensuring a berth in the Champions League. Beckham also featured for the club in the UEFA Cup, playing both legs of their series with Werder Bremen. 2003-07: Played four years at Real Madrid, helping lead the club to the 2006-07 La Liga title in his final year with the club. Beckham played in nearly 150 games in his four years with the club scoring 11 goals in all competitions. He made his La Liga debut against Real Betis in 2003 and scored just three minutes into the contest. He had scored his first-ever goal for the club just days earlier in the second leg of the Spanish Super Cup, when his late goal gave Real Madrid the trophy. 1991-2003: Spent 12 years at Manchester United, winning six Premier League titles, two FA Cup's and the 1999 UEFA Champions League while scoring more than 80 goals in almost 300 career appearances. After signing with the club as a trainee in 1991, Beckham made his United debut in September 1992 in a second round Rumbelows Cup match against Brighton and Hove Albion. Later that year he won an FA Youth Cup alongside players like Gary Neville, Paul Scholes and Nicky Butt that would form part of the core of great United teams of the future. He scored his first goal for the club in December 1994 in a Champions League match against Galatasaray. After a brief loan spell at Preston North End in 1995 that saw him score twice in five matches, Beckham made his Premier League debut against Leeds United in April 1995. He established himself in the United first team during the 1995-96 season scoring eight times in 40 games while helping United win the Premier League/FA Cup double. He helped United repeat as champions a year later and was named PFA Young Player of the Year for 1996 and finished second in the Player of the Year voting. Two years later he was at the heart of United's greatest-ever season as he played in a career-high 52 games as his club won the Treble, winning the Premier League, FA Cup and UEFA Champions League, with United defeating Bayern Munich 2-1 with a pair of late goals, both of which were set up by Beckham. He was named the runner-up for the FIFA World Player of the Year award in both 1999 and late in 2001 when he helped United win yet another Premiership title. Beckham scored a career-best 16 goals in all competitions during the 2001-02 campaign and went on to win a sixth Premier League championship a year later, in what proved to be his final season in Manchester.

National Team

Has appeared in 115 career games for England, scoring 17 times. On 3/28/09, he claimed his 109th cap, surpassing Sir Bobby Moore for the most England appearances all-time by a field player and the second most in National Team history. He is now just 10 caps shy of Peter Shilton's England record of 125 caps. More than 50 of Beckham's caps have come as the England captain, a role that he first claimed under Peter Taylor in November 2000 and held through the 2006 FIFA World Cup. He is the only England player ever to have scored in three separate World Cups (1998, 2002 and 2006) and was just the 21st player in history to have done so. Beckham made his national team debut as a 21-year old on 9/1/96 in a 3-0 win over Moldova. He scored his first England goal with a freekick against Colombia at the 1998 World Cup. In England's next game, a second round match against Argentina, Beckham was famously sent off as England fell on penalties. He was sent off once again against Austria in November 2005, making him the first England captain ever to receive a red card and the first England player ever to see red twice. In addition to his goal against Colombia, Beckham also scored against Argentina in the 2002 World Cup and against Ecuador in the 2006 World Cup. He missed the 2010 World Cup after suffering an Achilles injury, though he did travel with the team to South Africa. Beckham also appeared in the 2000 and 2004 European Championships, starting all seven of England's games at those two tournaments.

he was part of a squad that posted a 17-1-2 record, winning the MPSF title as well as a trip to the Regional Semifinals (Third Round) where they lost to Virginia. One season later, Boyens was named to the NCAA College Cup All-Tournament Team after guiding the Lobos to the NCAA Championship Game with a record of 18-2-3, though they lost to A.J. DeLaGarza and Maryland. He helped New Mexico to a third straight MPSF title in 2006, and was named a First Team All-American and a Hermann Trophy Semifinalist.

National Team

A member of New Zealand's team at the 2010 FIFA World Cup in South Africa, Boyens has collected 19 caps while playing for the All Whites. After playing for New Zealand's U-20's and U23's, Boyens made his full international debut in a 2-2 draw with Wales in May 2007. He played in two games at the 2009 FIFA Confederations Cup and then helped New Zealand qualify for the World Cup for the first time since 1982, though he did not play in any of his team's three games at the tournament as they went out in the group stage after drawing all three of their matches.

How Acquired: Selected by the Galaxy in the first round of Phase 2 of the 2011 MLS Re-Entry Process. Signed with the club on January 30, 2012.

An MLS veteran center back with World Cup playing experience, the Galaxy claimed Boyens from Chivas USA in the MLS Re-Entry Process. Physical and good in the air, he is expected to battle for a spot in the Galaxy starting lineup all season long.

MLS Highlights

2011: Signed with Chivas USA in February 2011 and made 12 league appearances for them, starting 10 games and scoring once while also being sent off once. He made his debut for the club in a 1-1 draw at Toronto FC on 4/2, playing the full 90 minutes in central defense. He started five straight games for the club before being sent off against Real Salt Lake on 5/7 after collecting two yellow cards. He returned to the lineup to face the Galaxy on 5/21 and then scored his first goal for Chivas USA, heading home a Heath Pearce corner kick in a 3-3 draw at Columbus on 5/28. However, injuries limited him to just five appearances over the final five months of the year. **2010:** Made three U.S. Open Cup appearances for the Red Bulls but did not play in any MLS games. He missed two months of the season while with New Zealand at the FIFA World Cup. **2009:** Appeared in and started 14 games for the Red Bulls including eight games over the final two months of the season. He missed significant portions of time while injured as well as while on international duty at the FIFA Confederations Cup in South Africa. **2008:** He was released by Toronto in April 2008 and signed with the New York Red Bulls a month later. He debuted for the club on 5/17 in a 1-1 home draw with Kansas City and went on to play in 19 regular season games as the Red Bulls reached the MLS Cup Playoffs. There, he played both legs of the Conference Semifinal Series with Houston, helping New York pull off the upset, but he was replaced in the starting lineup for the final two games of the postseason, including MLS Cup, by Carlos Mendes. **2007:** Selected by Toronto FC in the first round (10th overall) of the 2007 MLS SuperDraft, Boyens appeared in 23 games for the expansion club, making 21 starts while scoring once and adding an assist. Both the goal and the assist came in a 2-1 home win over Colorado as he set up Danny Dichio for TFC's first goal and then scored the eventual game-winner himself, heading home a Ronnie O'Brien corner kick. He was sent off twice during his rookie season, being shown red cards in a 1-1 draw with Kansas City on 7/1 and a 2-1 win over New York on 10/4.

College Highlights

Played three seasons at the University of New Mexico (2004-06), and was twice named Mountain Pacific Sports Federation Player of the Year, winning the award in 2004 and 2006. A three-time First Team All-MPSF and NSCAA All-Far West Region honoree, he tallied 11 goals and six assists in his time with the Lobos and helped lead them to the NCAA Tournament three times. One of the top goal scorers in Galaxy and MLS history, Buddle returned to Southern California when he re-signed with the Galaxy in February 2012 following a year in Germany. Powerful and good with the ball at his feet or when attacking crosses, he helps make the LA attack one of the most dangerous in MLS.

MLS Highlights

2010: Enjoyed his best season in MLS, scoring a career-high 17 goals to finish second in the league while being named the Galaxy MVP for the first time ever. An MLS All-Star for the second time in three years and a member of the MLS Best XI for the first time, Buddle scored each of LA's first seven goals on the season and nine of their first 10. Despite missing five games while with the U.S. National Team in South Africa for the 2010 FIFA World Cup, Buddle led the team in scoring all season long, scoring nine times in the first six games of the year. He had four multi-goal games in that time, scoring twice in home wins over Chivas USA(4/1), Real Salt Lake (4/17) and Philadelphia (5/1) as well as a road win at Houston (4/10). He scored in his first game back from the World Cup vs. Seattle on 7/4 and started all 16 regular season games that the Galaxy played after his return. His goal at Chivas USA on 10/3 was the 40th of his Galaxy career, making him the first player in MLS history to score 40 or more goals for two different teams. He added two goals in the postseason, tallying in each leg of the Western Conference Semifinal Series against Seattle for his first playoff goals since 2004. In the MLS regular season and postseason, the Galaxy were 13-1-1 when Buddle scored, compared to 7-7-4 when he did not. In addition to being voted the club's MVP and being a finalist for the MLS MVP award,

Buddle was also selected as the club's Humanitarian of the Year while also becoming the first player other than Landon Donovan or Carlos Ruiz to finish the season as the team's top scorer since 2001. **2009:** Finished second on the Galaxy in scoring, tallying five goals in 19 games for the club. He missed the first month of the season with a right quad strain, but returned to the field in late April. Buddle scored his first goal of the season late in a 1-1 draw vs. Kansas City on 5/30, and then added the game-winner a week later on 6/6 at Toronto FC, a game LA won 2-1., becoming the 15th player in MLS history to score 70 career regular season goals. After scoring in the Galaxy's 1-0 friendly win over CS Herediano on 6/9, he added his third league goal of the season on 7/11 at Chivas USA, heading home the only goal in LA's 1-0 win. Buddle played the 200th regular season game of his career at New York on 7/16, but suffered a right foot sprain a few days later in the friendly with AC Milan on 7/19. That injury forced Buddle to miss seven weeks of play, but he returned on 9/12 vs. FC Dallas to score his fourth goal of the season in a 6-3 loss. He was on the scoresheet again a week later, scoring his fifth and final goal of the season in a 2-0 win vs. Toronto FC on 9/19. In the playoffs, Buddle started all four of the Galaxy's games, including MLS Cup when he missed LA's final penalty kick attempt in the deciding shootout. **2008:** In his first full season with the Galaxy, Buddle enjoyed his best season in MLS as he finished third in the league with a career-high 15 goals. He was named to the MLS All-Star Team for the first time and entered the game as a second half sub in the 3-2 win over West Ham. Collected a pair of MLS Player of the Week awards after scoring hat tricks at FC Dallas on 5/18 and at San Jose on 6/14. Had 10 goals in a seven game span from 5/18-6/29. The Galaxy were 4-2-1 in that span and were 5-2-4 on the season when Buddle scored a goal. He added goals in each of the final two legs of the Honda SuperClasico on 7/10 and 8/14 before tallying three more goals in the final two months of the season. **2007:** Acquired by the Galaxy in mid-June from Toronto FC, Buddle went on to appear in 16 games for the club, tallying five goals to place second on the club for the season. He made an immediate impact upon joining the Galaxy, scoring in each of his first two games with the club vs. Real Salt Lake (6/17), just 25 minutes into his debut and vs. Columbus (6/23), making him the first Galaxy player since Diego Serna in 2003 to score in each of his first two games with the club. However, a re-emergence of an Achilles injury forced him to the sideline for most of July and early August. He returned in time to score late at New York on 8/18, a goal that tied the score at 4-4 in that game which the Red Bulls went on to win 5-4. Buddle was back on the scoresheet in the 3-1 win vs. Colorado on 9/8, tallying the game-winner in that game, but suffering a hamstring injury in the process, ruling him out for a month. Buddle was back on the field in time for the game vs. Toronto FC on 10/13 when he scored the game-winning goal in the 78th minute to give LA a 2-1 win. That goal also meant that Buddle scored against all three of his former clubs while with the Galaxy. He eclipsed the 10,000 career minutes played mark against Real Salt Lake on 9/1. Buddle also played in three SuperLiga games, two Reserve Division games and one Open Cup match for LA. Prior to joining the Galaxy, Buddle played 481 minutes in 10 games with Toronto FC, recording two assists. **2006:** Was acquired by the Red Bulls prior to the start of the season and scored six goals in 28 games, playing a career-high 2,112 minutes during his only year in New York. **2005:** Continued his strong form by scoring nine goals and adding two assists for the Crew, giving him 39 goals in four years. **2004:** Scored 11 goals to lead the team while also adding a pair of assists as Columbus pulled off the longest unbeaten streak in MLS history at 18 games to win the Supporter's Shield. He was twice named MLS Player of the Week, including once after scoring four goals in a 4-2 win over New York on 9/18. **2003:** Recorded his first double digit goalscoring season, tallying 10 goals and four assists in just 16 starts for the Crew. He also scored four of the Crew's six goals in the CONCACAF Champions Cup. **2002:** Helped the Crew win the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup in his second season, tallying nine goals and a career-high five assists while beginning to establish himself as one of the top young forwards in MLS. **2001:** After one season in the A-League, Buddle joined the Columbus Crew and tallied three goals in 17 appearances as a rookie. Made his MLS debut on 4/7 and scored the first goal of his career three games later at 5/16 at New England.

Career Highlights

2011-12: Joined FC Ingolstadt of the German 2. Bundesliga in January 2011, signing with the club on a free transfer. He scored on his debut for the club against MSV Duisberg and finished the season with three goals, helping Ingolstadt avoid relegation. He remained with the club for the first half of the 2011-12 season, scoring six times in 17 league games. He was released from his contract with the club in January 2012, allowing him to re-sign with the Galaxy. **2000:** Buddle appeared in 26 games with Long Island Rough Riders of the A-League, helping them win the Northeast Division Title. His 11 goals and four assists led the team in scoring and allowed him to be named a finalist for the A-League Rookie of the Year award.

Buddle played one season at State Fair Community College in Sedalia, Mo., helping lead the school to the 1999 NJCAA National Championship. He scored the title-clinching goal in sudden death overtime of the championship game, giving State Fair a 3-2 victory over Pima Community College.

National Team

Buddle has collected 10 caps with the U.S. National Team, scoring three times for his country. He made his international debut on 3/29/03, coming on as a second half substitute in a 2-0 win over Venezuela. His next appearance did not come for more than seven years when he was named in the preliminary squad for the 2010 FIFA World Cup. 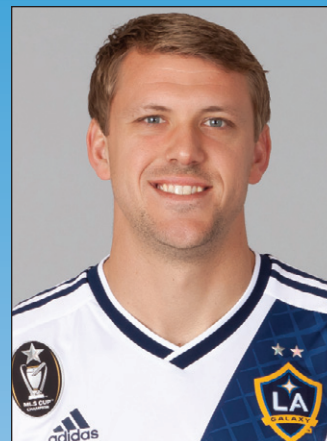

A powerful forward who is at his best when holding the ball up with his back to goal, Cristman provided valuable depth to the Galaxy's stable of forwards last year and will look to do so once again this season. His size and aerial ability provide the club with a clear target on set pieces.

MLS Highlights

2011: Was traded to the Galaxy from D.C. United two days before the 2011 MLS SuperDraft and played in 11 regular season games, scoring once and adding an assist. He missed the first three months of the season while recovering from offseason knee surgery, eventually making his LA debut on 6/3 vs. D.C. United. He scored his first goal for the club in the U.S. Open Cup loss to Seattle on 7/13 and then scored in the friendly defeat to Real Madrid three days later. Cristman's first MLS goal came later that month on 7/30, scoring LA's fourth and final goal in the 4-0 win at Vancouver on 7/30. Cristman, who also tallied twice in the Reserve League added a goal in the CONCACAF Champions League on 8/16, scoring his team's first goal in the 2-0 win over Motagua on 8/16. That goal was LA's first goal in the Champions League. He played in five of the club's six Champions League games and played in three of the club's four games during the MLS Cup Playoffs, making his first-ever postseason start in MLS Cup against Houston. He played 57 minutes in that game, taking three shots before being replaced by Chris Birchall. **2010:** Joined D.C. United in February in a trade with Kansas City and went on to play in 17 games, scoring twice and adding an assist. He scored the first goal of his United career on 5/29 in a 3-2 win vs. Chivas USA for his first goal in nearly two years. He added his second goal of the season two weeks later on 6/10, tallying the eventual game-winner in a 3-2 win at Seattle. He made his United debut as a second half substitute on 4/10 at Philadelphia and then recorded his first assist of the season in his second start, setting up Danny Allsopp's game-winning goal in a 2-1 home win over Kansas City on 5/5. However, he missed the final two months of the season through injury. **2009:** Was traded to Kansas City from New England in November 2008, but was limited to just 213 minute in five games with the Wizards. His season was cut short when he suffered a fractured metatarsal that eventually required surgery. **2008:** Scored a career-high six goals, adding an assist for the Revolution. Two of his six goals came in New England's 2-1 win at LA on 7/4. That was the second multi-goal game of his MLS career, and his first on the road. He also added goals against Houston, D.C. United, FC Dallas and Real Salt Lake, with the Revs going 3-1-1 when he scored. His six goals were the third most on the team, while his 16 starts were a career-high. He recorded an assist in the 2-1 win vs. D.C. United on 8/20, but soon suffered an injury that ruled him out for the rest of the season, only after helping New England become the first MLS team to win SuperLiga. **2007:** A finalist for the MLS Gatorade Rookie of the Year award, Cristman played in a career-high 28 games, scoring four times and adding four assists. After being selected by New England in the fourth round of the 2007 MLS SuperDraft, he made his MLS debut on 4/7 in a 1-0 loss at Chicago and scored his first career goal just over a month later in a 3-2 win at LA on 5/12. That goal tied the score at 1-1 early in the second half. Cristman added a pair of first half goals in a 3-3 draw with Columbus on 6/16 while

also scoring just minutes after coming on in a 2-0 home win over Kansas City on 8/2. His four goals and four assists were each tied for second amongst rookies that season. New England was 3-0-1 when he had an assist that season as they reached MLS Cup for the third straight season. One of eight players to appear in every game for the team, he finished the season with three goals, which were good for a tie for fourth on the squad, and an assist. The Aztecs were 3-0-0 when he had a goal or an assist in a game, tallying the game-winning goal in a 1-0 win over Air Force as well as a penalty kick against Cal State Fullerton. In SDSU's 4-1 win over Oakland, he had a goal and an assist for the first time in his career. **2009:** Was named an all-Pac-10 honorable mention for the first time after playing in 16 games for the Aztecs at right back. He made 12 starts on the season and recorded two assists, each of which came in overtime wins. One of the most versatile young defenders in MLS, DeLaGarza established himself as a first choice center back last season, playing a pivotal role in the club's defensive success. With Omar Gonzalez scheduled to miss much of the season because of a knee injury, DeLaGarza is set to take on more of a leadership role in the heart of the LA defense in 2012.

MLS Highlights

2011: Set new career-highs by starting in and appearing in 30 regular season games, playing 2,627 minutes, which were the second most on the team. An important figure in the Galaxy's success all season long, DeLaGarza appeared in 42 games in all competitions, with LA keeping a clean sheet in 20 of those matches. In addition to his 30 regular season appearances, DeLaGarza also started all four of the club's postseason games, six CONCACAF Champions League games and both games in the U.S. Open Cup. He had one assist in those 42 games, setting up Adam Cristman's goal in the 2-0 win vs. Motagua on 8/16. He was forced to leave the 0-0 draw with Seattle on 7/4 with a head injury and missed the 2-1 win vs. Chicago five days later, but was back on the field for the U.S. Open Cup loss at Seattle on 7/13. He was used primarily in central defense during the season, though he did see some time at right back. **2010:** One of the most versatile defenders on the squad, DeLaGarza appeared in 17 games during his second season in MLS, starting at left back, right back and in central defense. The Galaxy were 11-2-1 in the 14 games that he started, keeping a clean sheet in half of those games. He scored his first goal of the season in the 3-1 win vs. Philadelphia on 5/1, tallying just 51 seconds into that win. That goal was the fourth fastest goal in club history and also broke Edson Buddle's streak of having scored the club's first seven goals of the year. Over the final month of the regular season and into the postseason, DeLaGarza was used in central defense alongside Omar Gonzalez in place of the injured Gregg Berhalter. He started all three of the club's playoff games, while also playing in three Open Cup and Champions League games. **2009:** The Galaxy's second round draft pick in the 2009 MLS SuperDraft, DeLaGarza made an immediate impact during his rookie season, appearing in 22 games at both right back and left back. He made his debut in the season opening 2-2 draw vs. D.C. United on 3/22, playing the full 90 minutes at left back. In late May he became the club's starting right back following an injury to Sean Franklin and went on to start 16 consecutive games for the club at that position before suffering an injury himself vs. FC Dallas on 9/12. Before going off injured in that game, DeLaGarza scored the first goal of his MLS career, sliding home a rebound to tie the score at 2-2 just before half-time. The 22-year old recorded the first assist of his career two months earlier, crossing for Edson Buddle to head in the only goal of LA's 1-0 win at Chivas USA on 7/11. He was one of two Galaxy players to play the full 90 minutes against both AC Milan and

Barcelona in the club's summer friendlies. In the postseason, he replaced the injured Todd Dunivant for the Western Conference Championship vs. Houston, playing the full 120 minutes as the Galaxy won 2-0 in extra time. In MLS Cup, he came on for the injured Omar Gonzalez late in regulation and played all of extra time at right back.

College Highlights

A two-time National Champion at the University of Maryland, DeLaGarza appeared in 88 games during his college career, making 81 starts and recording two assists. He helped the Terrapins reach the NCAA Tournament in all four of his years in College Park, while also claiming the ACC Championship in 2008. The Terps' Co-Most Valuable Defensive Player award along with Omar González as a senior in 2008, DeLaGarza was also named to the College Cup All-Tournament Team and was Second Team All-ACC that season when he helped his team keep 15 clean sheets in 26 games, including seven in eight ACC and NCAA Tournament games. In the 2005 NCAA Tournament, he replaced the injured Kenny Bertz in the second half of the quarterfinal win over Akron and then started in the NCAA Semifinal and Final as Maryland won their first National Championship since 1968. Both of his assists at Maryland set up goals for fellow MLS players. His first assist came during his sophomore year in 2006 when he set up Jeremy Hall (now with Toronto FC) for a goal in a 2-0 win over Mt. St. Mary's. Then as a senior in 2008, he set up Graham Zusi (now with Sporting Kansas City) for the game-winning goal in the regular season finale against North Carolina.

National Team

DeLaGarza collected the first two caps of his international career in January 2012, playing the full 90 minutes at right back in a pair of 1-0 wins, beating Venezuela at home and also winning in Panama. This was the second straight season that DeLaGarza had been called in to the U.S. team for their annual January camp, though he did not play for the team against Chile in January 2011.

The Galaxy's all-time leading goal scorer and perhaps the best player in MLS history, Donovan is back with the Galaxy following a second loan spell at Everton this winter. Now entering his 12th season in MLS, the Galaxy MVP in 2011 and the MLS Cup MVP that season as well after scoring the championship-winning goal, Donovan will look to lead his team to the fifth MLS Cup title of his career.

MLS Highlights

2011: Won his fourth MLS Cup title and second with the Galaxy while repeating as Supporters' Shield winners. Once again voted the club's MVP, Donovan finished the season with 12 goals and three assists in the regular season despite missing 11 games because of injury and international duty. An All-Star for the 11th straight season and a member of the MLS Best XI, Donovan scored in five straight games from 4/23-5/25, tallying seven goals in that time. He finished the season with three multi-goal games, tallying twice in the home wins over Portland (4/23) and Sporting Kansas City (5/14) as well as road victory over Vancouver on 7/30, with LA winning all three of those games and Donovan factoring in eight of the 11 goals that the Galaxy scored in those matches. Donovan played the 250th game of his MLS career on 8/20 vs. San Jose and then scored the 115th regular season goal of his MLS career on 9/9, moving him into third place in MLS history. He added a goal in the CONCACAF Champions League,

scoring in the second half of the 2-0 home win over Motagua. He had three goals and an assist in the postseason, scoring in each of LA's final three playoff games, including MLS Cup , when he scored the championship-winning goal in the 72nd minute of the Galaxy's 1-0 win over Houston. That goal was the 20th of his postseason career, making him the first player in league history to tally 20 goals in the playoffs. **2010:** Set a new career-high with 16 assists while captaining the Galaxy to the Supporters' Shield for the first time in his career. Donovan also tallied seven goals on the season, good for the second most on the team, snapping his run of winning the club's Golden Boot award every year that he played for the Galaxy. His first goal vs. Chicago on 8/1 was the 100th goal of his MLS career, making him the sixth player in league history to score 100 regular season goals in his career. He added a second goal from the penalty spot in that game and then had two more goals late in a 2-1 win vs. D.C. United after scoring just three times in the first four months of the year. His second goal against D.C. United on 9/18 was the 71st regular season goal of his Galaxy career, moving him past Cobi Jones to become the club's all-time leading goal scorer. During the early part of the season, Donovan played a major role in helping Edson Buddle become one of the league's most dangerous goalscorers, tallying five of his nine assists in the first nine games of the year on Buddle tallies. Donovan did not miss a beat after returning from the World Cup at the start of July, immediately pairing with Buddle for LA's opening goal vs. Seattle on 7/4. In LA's game at Seattle two months earlier on 5/8, Donovan set a new career-high with three assists while also scoring his first goal of the year. He went on to score in three consecutive MLS games from 7/18 until 8/1, culminating with his multi-goal game vs. Chicago, his first since the 2009 Galaxy season opener. LA was 11-2-2 when Donovan tallied either a goal or an assist in a game, resulting in 35 of their league-best 59 points. An MLS All-Star for the 10th consecutive season, Donovan was also named to the MLS Best XI for the third straight season. **2009:** Was named the Volkswagen MLS MVP for the first time in his career as he scored a team-best 12 goals and added six assists. LA was 6-0-5 in games that Donovan scored as he helped lead the Galaxy to MLS Cup for the first time since 2005. Donovan tallied his only multi-goal game of the year in the season opener on 3/22 vs. D.C. United, scoring twice in the final 10 minutes to earn a 2-2 draw and had his only multi-assist game of the season two weeks later in a 3-2 loss vs. Colorado on 4/4. He either scored or assisted each of the Galaxy's first eight goals of the season and had six goals and four assists in 11 games before departing for the FIFA Confederations Cup. He missed five games while in South Africa before returning in early July. Shortly after his return, Donovan scored in three consecutive goals, tallying a goal and an assist on 7/16 at New York, a goal at Kansas City on 7/25 and at New England on 8/8. That goal was later voted the MLS Goal of the Week and Goal of the Year. During that streak, he tallied an assist in the 2-2 draw with AC Milan and was one of three players to play the full 90 minutes in the 2-1 loss to Barcelona. He later added goals in wins at Chicago (8/19), vs. Chicago (10/1) and vs. San Jose (10/24). In addition to his MLS MVP award, Donovan was also named the Galaxy's MVP and to the MLS Best XI for the second straight year. In the postseason, Donovan tied for the MLS lead with three goals in four games. One of three Galaxy players to play every minute of all four postseason games, he scored in both legs of the Western Conference Semifinal Series against Chivas USA and then added the game-clinching penalty in the Western Conference Championship against Houston. He recorded his first assist of the MLS Cup Playoffs in MLS Cup, setting up Mike Magee's first half goal. However, he missed his penalty attempt in the game's deciding shootout. **2008:** Won the Budweiser Golden Boot award with an MLS-best 20 goals while adding nine assists. He was named to the MLS All-Star Team for the eighth time in his MLS career and was a finalist for the Volkswagen MLS MVP award and was chosen as the Galaxy's MVP and Humanitarian of the Year. Donovan was named the April Player of the Month after scoring eight goals in four games in the month and won two of his league-best four Player of the Week awards in that month. He recorded the first two hat tricks of his Galaxy career on 4/26 vs. Chivas USA and 9/20 vs. D.C. United and added four other multi-goal games for a league-best six. Donovan tallied his only multi-assist game on 5/18, setting up two goals in the 5-1 win at FC Dallas. He also had a shot deflected into the goal for an own goal in that game. The Galaxy were 4-2-6 when he scored a goal and 2-1-3 when he scored more than one goal. **2007:** Led the Galaxy with eight goals and 13 assists on the season, meaning that he was involved in more than half of the club's goals on the year. The 13 assists set a then career-high for Donovan and were the second most in MLS. He was also the leading scorer at SuperLiga, tallying four goals in five games as LA reached the tournament Final. The Galaxy's U.S. Soccer Foundation Humanitarian of the Year, Donovan recorded his lone multi-goal game in the 2-0 win over Chicago on July 4. Both of those goals came from the penalty spot where Donovan was 5-for-6 on the year. Donovan's 13th assist of the year gave him 60 for his career, making him one of eight players in league history to have both 60 goals and 60 assists. He was named to the MLS All-Star Team for the seventh straight year. **2006:** Was named team MVP after tallying 12 goals and eight assists in 24 games. He missed eight games in the middle of the year while with the U.S. National Team at the 2006 FIFA World Cup in Germany but played all but one minute of his team's final 17 contests. Was named to the MLS All-Star Team for the sixth straight season. **2005:** Returned to Major League Soccer after a stint in Germany with Bayer Leverkusen. Had one of the best seasons of his career in his first campaign with the Galaxy, collecting 12 goals and 10 assists in 22 regular season games. He continued his torrid pace with four goals in four postseason games, including both of the club's tallies in a 2-0 win at Colorado that gave LA the Western Conference Championship. **2004:** Led the Earthquakes in assists with 10 and added six goals to lead San Jose to the post-season for the fourth consecutive season. **2003:** Named to the Radio Shack MLS Best XI and was the Earthquakes' Most Valuable Player after completing a stellar season in which he set a career-high with 12 goals and added six assists. He was twice crowned MLS Player of the Month (April and September) and scored his first career hat trick on 9/20 at KC. Was dominant again in the postseason, scoring four goals in four games, including two in a 4-2 win over Chicago in the MLS Cup where he became the first player ever to score more than one goal in the MLS Cup and was named MLS Cup MVP. **2002:** Scored seven goals and registered three assists in 20 games with the Earthquakes. Missed two months of the season while with the U.S. National Team at the 2002 FIFA World Cup in Japan/Korea but still finished second on the team in goals and was named as an MLS All-Star. **2001:** Proved to be one of the brightest stars in MLS in his rookie season. Led the club with 10 assists, a figure that remained a career-high until 2007, and added seven goals. Named MVP of MLS All-Star game after record-breaking four-goal performance. Established himself as a big game player, scoring five goals in six playoff matches, including one in the MLS Cup Final as the Earthquakes won their first-ever MLS Cup.

Career Highlights

2012: Returned to Everton for a two month loan, joining the club at the start of January and staying through late February. During his second spell at Goodison Park, Donovan helped his club record wins over Manchester City and Chelsea, tallying an assist in each of those games. He finished his time in England, having played in nine games, tallying six assists and helping Everton move into the top half of the Premier League table. Everton also advanced to the FA Cup Quarterfinals during Donovan's loan, winning three times in the competition with Donovan playing in wins over Tamworth and Fulham, tallying three assists in those contests. **2010:** Spend 10 weeks during the offseason on loan with Everton of the English Premier League, appearing in 13 games in all com-



petitions for the club. He made his debut on 1/8/10 in a 2-2 draw at Arsenal, setting up Everton's opening goal. He scored his first goal for the club in the 2-0 win vs. Sunderland on 1/27 and then added his second in his final game at Goodison Park on 3/7 as Everton defeated Hull City 5-1. In addition to playing in the Premier League, Donovan saw action in the FA Cup as well as the Europa League. **2008-09:** Spent the offseason on loan at Bayern Munich. He scored four goals in five friendlies before making his competitive debut for the club in the DFB Cup when he came on as a second half substitute in a 5-1 win over Stuttgart on 1/27. He made his Bundesliga debut for the club on 1/30 in a 1-0 loss at Hamburg. **2004-05:** After the 2004 MLS season, Donovan returned to Germany to re-join Bayer Leverkusen of the German Bundesliga. He appeared in seven games in three months with Leverkusen before signing with the Galaxy in March 2005. **1999-2001:** Signed a contract with Bayer Leverkusen in 1999 at the age of 17 after impressing with the U.S. Under-17 National Team. He played primarily with the Leverkusen reserves before joining the San Jose Earthquakes on loan in March 2001.

National Team

Donovan is the all-time leader in goals and assists with the U.S. National Team, scoring 46 goals and adding 47 assists in his 138 games with the Red, White and Blue. A seven-time Honda Player of the Year and four-time U.S. Soccer Male Athlete of the Year, Donovan won both awards in for the second straight year in 2010. One of the breakout stars at the 2010 FIFA World Cup, Donovan scored three times in the four games that the U.S. played in. His goal early in the second half against Slovenia on 6/18/10 helped spur his team onto a 2-2 draw in Johannesburg. Five days later, with the U.S. facing elimination, Donovan scored one of the most famous goals in the history of American soccer, slotting home a rebound late in second half stoppage time to give his team a 1-0 win and the top seed in Group C. In the Round of 16, Donovan's second half penalty kick helped the U.S. tie the score at 1-1, only for them to fall 2-1 to Ghana in extra time. He was on the field for all 390 minutes of the tournament; taking his total of World Cup games played to 12, which is a U.S. record, as are his five career World Cup goals. One year earlier in South Africa, at the Confederations Cup, he scored twice and added an assist, scoring against Italy and then again in the Final against Brazil, while also setting up Michael Bradley's goal in the 3-0 win vs. Egypt, as the U.S. reach the Final for the first time. He registered either a goal or an assist in eight of the 10 games that the U.S. played in the final round of World Cup Qualifying ahead of the 2010 FIFA World Cup. His 10 assists in 2009 set a new National Team record, while his second half goal at Honduras on 10/10/09 was the game-winning goal as the U.S. qualified for the World Cup. He scored the 35th goal of his National Team career in the 2-0 win over Sweden at The Home Depot Center on 1/19/08 to become the all-time leading scorer for the U.S. Donovan had his best season for his country in 2007 when he set a National Team record for points in a year by tallying 22 points on nine goals, including a hat trick against Ecuador in March, and four assists in 12 games. A fixture in the starting XI under Bruce Arena and Bob Bradley, Donovan appeared in and started every game during both the 2002 and 2006 FIFA World Cups, scoring in the 2-0 Quarterfinal win over Mexico in 2002. He made his National Team debut on 10/25/00, coming on as a second half substitute and scoring in a 2-0 win over Mexico. Donovan also represented the U.S. at the 2000 Sydney Olympics, scoring one goal to help lead the U.S. to a fourth place finish. Donovan also helped the U.S. to a fourth place finish in the 1999 FIFA U-17 World Championship in New Zealand. He claimed the Golden Ball as the tournament's most valuable player after scoring three goals in six games. Made his first-ever appearance for the U.S. at any level on 2/13/98 when he scored in a 2-1 loss to Mexico with the U-17's.

An MLS Best XI selection in 2012, Dunivant was undoubtedly the Galaxy's first left back last season, starting 43 of the club's 46 games in all competitions. Solid, dependable and never flashy, Dunivant's consistency and leadership has been a crucial element in the club's recent defensive success and will be called upon again this season given another crowded schedule and the injury to Omar Gonzalez.

MLS Highlights

2011: Named to the MLS Best XI for the first time in his career, Dunivant tied career-highs with 32 games played and started while playing a total of 2,880 minutes. He was a pivotal piece of the Galaxy's defensive success throughout the season, helping them tie the MLS record for shutouts in a season and allowing eight goals less than any other team. Dunivant also had four assists on the year, finishing third on the team. The four assists were his most in a single season since his rookie year in 2003 when he had six. He set up Juninho for the Galaxy's first goal of the season in the 1-0 win at Seattle on 3/15 while adding assists in the 2-2 draw with Toronto FC on 6/11, the 3-1 win at Colorado on 6/18 when he served as the club's captain for the first time ever, and in the 4-0 win at Vancouver on 7/30. He played his 200th regular season game in MLS on 6/18 at Colorado and his 100th game

with the Galaxy on 3/26 at Real Salt Lake. He played in 43 of the 46 games that the Galaxy played in all competitions, playing in all four postseason games en route to winning his third MLS Cup as well as all six of the club's Champions League matches, recording an assist on Mike Magee's goal in the 2-1 home win over Morelia on 9/28. **2010:** Was a near constant fixture on the left side of the Galaxy defense, appearing in 27 of the club's 30 regular season games. He scored his first goal of the season in the 4-0 win at Seattle on 5/8, heading home a Landon Donovan freekick for LA's third goal of the game. He also had one assist on the season, setting up Edson Buddle for his goal in the 2-2 draw with San Jose on 7/22. He started all 27 of the games that he played in, playing the full 90 minutes in 25 of those for a total of 2,409 minutes played, which were the third most on the team behind just Donovan Ricketts and Omar Gonzalez. He was in the lineup for 11 of the Galaxy's 12 regular season shutouts and the team was just 1-2-0 in the three games that he did not play in. Duvivant also scored the Galaxy's first goal in the friendly defeat against Real Madrid at the Rose Bowl, giving LA a 1-0 lead late in the first half. **2009:** Returned to the Galaxy in February and went on to appear in 25 games for the club, scoring one goal and adding two assists while also being named the club's U.S. Soccer Foundation/MLS W.O.R.K.S. Humanitarian of the Year. He missed all of the club's preseason and the first month of the regular season while recovering from ankle surgery. He made his season debut as a second half substitute at San Jose on 4/18 and then made his first start a week later, playing the full 90 minutes in the 1-1 draw at Colorado on 4/25. That game started a string of 22 starts in 23 games for Duvivant. During that run, he scored his first goal since 2006, tallying the only goal in LA's 1-0 win vs. Houston on 6/28. He added his first assist of the year a week later, setting up Alecko Eskandarian's goal in the 1-0 win vs. New England on 7/4. That was also his first assist since the 2006 campaign. He added a second one in the 1-0 win vs. Chivas USA on 8/29, setting up David Beckham for the game's only goal. In the playoffs, he played every minute of both games against Chivas USA, but missed the Western Conference Championship through injury. However, he returned in time to play all 120 minutes of MLS Cup at left back. **2008:** Made just nine appearances, five of those as a starter. His 412 minutes played were a career-low as a broken ankle in mid-June kept him out for the remainder of the season. However, he remained active off the field and in the community and was awarded Toronto FC's Humanitarian of the Year Award in November. **2007:** Joined Toronto FC on 6/27 from New York and made his TFC league debut on the road in Kansas City on 7/1. He played 1,600 minutes in 18 games after the trade and seven before it for a total of 25 games played. Made his home debut for the Reds on 7/25 in a friendly against English Premier League side Aston Villa, scoring a goal in a 4-2 loss. **2006:** Duvivant split the season between LA and New York, playing in 22 games for the two clubs. He scored a career-best two goals on the season, with both coming as a member of the Red Bulls. He made his New York debut on 7/19 at Columbus and tallied his first goal of the year on 8/26 in a 6-0 win over Real Salt Lake. He scored again a week later in a 2-2 draw at home against Kansas City. **2005:** Was acquired by the Galaxy before the season and made himself a permanent fixture for the club, winning the MLS Cup for a second time and his first U.S. Open Cup. He played every minute of each of the Galaxy's 32 MLS regular season games as well as all four playoff games for the club to become the first player in club history to accomplish the feat. He assisted on a Cobi Jones goal in a 2-2 draw with the MetroStars on 6/4 and then set up Mike Enfield in a 1-1 draw against New England a month later. **2004:** Appeared in just 16 games as a result of injury, making 13 starts for the Earthquakes. However, he was healthy enough to be back in the lineup during the MLS Cup Playoffs, playing the full 90 minutes in each of San Jose's two games. He was named his club's co-Humanitarian of the Year. **2003:** Duvivant was the first college senior taken in the draft when he was selected by San Jose with the sixth overall pick in the 2003 MLS SuperDraft and was an ever-present member of the MLS Cup winning side, appearing in and starting all 30 games for the Earthquakes. He made his Earthquakes and MLS debut 4/12 at Colorado, scoring the game-winning goal in 22nd minute. Duvivant recorded an assist on the fastest goal in MLS history 9/27 vs. Dallas, setting up Dwayne DeRosario just 11 seconds into a 5-2 win at Spartan Stadium on 9/27. That was one of his career-best six assists. He finished the season as one of just nine players in the league to start all 30 games and played more minutes (2,778) than any other non-goalkeeper in the league.

College Highlights

A four-year starter at Stanford, Duvivant earned First Team All Pac-10 honors for three seasons with the Cardinal. As a senior in 2002, Duvivant was the only athlete to receive both first-team All-American and first-team Academic All-American honors. He captained Stanford to the 2002 College Cup Final and the 2001 NCAA Semifinals and was named to the NCAA All-Tournament Team each year. He finished his Stanford career with nine goals and 28 assists in 81 games.

National Team

Duvivant has collected two caps with the U.S. National Team during his career. He earned first for the U.S. in a 5-0 win over Norway at The Home Depot Center on 1/29/06, collecting two assists on that day. He made his second appearance with the National Team on 2/10/06 in a 3-2 win over Japan in San Francisco.

One of the Galaxy's longest tenured players as he enters his fifth season with the club, Franklin remains one of the most athletic right backs in MLS and a key ingredient in the club's defensive success of late. He displayed his versatility last year as well, seeing time on the right side of midfield and not missing a beat, using his pace to get in behind the defense to create quality scoring chances.

MLS Highlights

2011: An important part of the Galaxy's MLS-best defense, Franklin also chipped in on the offensive end of the field, scoring the first four regular season goals of his MLS career. All four of his goals and three assists came in a seven game span from 7/20-9/9. He scored his first goal in MLS on 7/20 vs. Columbus, scoring the game's only goal in a 1-0 LA win. He added a second goal 10 days later in LA's 4-0 win at Vancouver. His final two goals came on 9/5 at Sporting Kansas City, which was the first multi-goal game of his career. Franklin, who split the season between right back and the right side of midfield, tallied assists in the win at Vancouver on 7/30, the home win over San Jose on 8/20 and the home win over Colorado on 9/9. LA were 4-0-1 when Franklin had a goal or an assist. He missed five of the final six regular season games of the year with a right knee injury, but he did return for the postseason and the regular season finale. He made two appearances in the Champions League and one in the U.S. Open Cup, leading LA to a perfect 3-0-0 mark in those games, setting up a goal for Chad Barrett in the win over Alajuelense on 8/25. **2010:** The Galaxy's first choice right back for much of the season, Franklin appeared in 25 games for the club in 2010, as well as all three of LA's postseason games, both Champions League games and one U.S. Open Cup game. He scored the first goal of his Galaxy career in the 2-1 win at Puerto Rico on 8/4 in the second leg of their CONCACAF Champions League Preliminary Round series. He scored a late game-winner in that game, but the Galaxy were eliminated on aggregate. Franklin also set a career-high with six assists on the season as he attacked throughout the year from his right back position. The Galaxy were a perfect 5-0-0 when Franklin had an assist, including a 4-1 win over Houston on 6/5 in which he had two. Franklin also added assists in home wins over Chivas USA on 4/1, Columbus on 9/11 and D. C. United on 9/18. His only assist away from The Home Depot Center came on Edson Buddle's second goal just before halftime in the 2-0 win at Houston on 4/10. Having also spent time in the mid-field, Franklin missed five games with an ankle injury early in the season, but started each of the last 20 games of the year, going the full 90 minutes in 19 of those games. **2009:** Missed more than four months of action after undergoing surgery to repair a torn right hamstring, but still recovered to play a pivotal role in the Galaxy's run to MLS Cup. Franklin made his 2009 debut in the season opening 2-2 draw vs. D.C. United on 3/22, playing the full 90 minutes at right back. He tallied his only assist of the season

two weeks later on 4/4 in the 3-2 loss vs. Colorado, setting up Alan Gordon's goal early in the second half. He was forced to exit the 1-1 draw vs. Columbus on 5/17 with what was diagnosed as a torn right hamstring, forcing him to undergo surgery later in the month and putting him on the Disabled List. Franklin returned to training in early September and was activated from the Disabled List on 9/15, making his return to the lineup four days later in a 2-0 win vs. Toronto FC. He played 90 minutes in that game and each of the final five games of the season. He was ever-present throughout the postseason for LA, where he was one of three players on the team to play all 390 minutes during the run to MLS Cup. **2008:** One of the stars of the Galaxy's 2008 campaign, he played in 27 of the club's 30 games en route to being named the Gatorade MLS Rookie of the Year and the Galaxy's Defender of the Year. Franklin was an unused substitute in the Galaxy's season opening defeat but would go on to become a permanent fixture in the heart of the club's defense. He made his MLS debut on 4/3 vs. San Jose, playing the full 90 minutes in central defense. He spent most of the season as a center back, despite being a natural right back, missing only two games in July with a knee injury. He tallied the first assist of his MLS career on 10/12, setting up Edson Buddle for a goal in the 3-2 win vs. Colorado.

College Highlights

A four-year star at Cal-State Northridge, Franklin started all 67 games in which he appeared during his college career, tallying two goals and 10 assists. He missed most of his senior season due to an off-season injury but returned to the backline for the last eight matches of the season. He scored his only goal of the year in the 3-2 loss to UC-Santa Barbara on 11/13 and was named to the 2007 All-Big West Conference First Team. He scored the first goal of his college career against UC Irvine as a junior on 10/11/2006, while placing fourth on team with four assists and third with 21 shots that season to be named All-Big West First Team and All-Far West Region Second Team. He had a career-best six assists as a sophomore in 2005, including the first of his collegiate career against Dartmouth on 9/5 to lead the Matadors and earn First Team All-Big West Conference and Third Team All-Far West Region honors. After redshirting during the 2003 season, Franklin was one of only two Matadors to start all 19 matches in 2004 to earn All-Big West Conference Second Team honors.

National Team

Franklin made his international debut in the 1-1 draw with Chile on 1/22/11, playing the full 90 minutes at right back in that game. He was called into the National Team's January camp ahead of that game. That was his second invitation to a January camp in the last three years, having also been a part of it in January 2009, only to be forced to leave the camp to undergo surgery to repair a bilateral sports hernia. He received his first call-up to the U.S. National Team in November 2008 ahead of the World Cup Qualifier against Guatemala, but he was not included in the squad for that game. He has also represented the U.S. with the Under-20 and Under-23 National Teams.

College Highlights

2011: Was limited to just 13 games as a senior after missing six games with a knee injury but still managed to earn All-Big West honors for the first time. A team captain for the second straight season, Garcia scored twice on the year with both goals coming on penalty kicks in the second half of a 3-0 win over UC Davis. He scored in the 68th minute and then again in the 77th for the first multi-goal game of his college career. His 32 shots were the third most on the team. **2010:** Tied for second on the team with two goals while also adding a career-best six assists. The six assists were the most on the team as were his 49 shots. **2009:** Returned from injury to play a career-high 20 games, starting all 20 of them for the Matadors. He tallied his only assist of the season at home against SMU while his 28 shots were the third-most on the team. **2008:** Suffered a season-ending injury in the first game of the year against Georgetown and redshirted the rest of the season. **2007:** A teammate of Sean Franklin's as a freshman, Garcia stepped in and played in 17 games, making 14 starts in midfield. An All-Big West Second Team honoree, Garcia scored game-winning goals in victories over UNLV and Cal State Fullerton with both games ending 1-0. Northridge also won both games that Garcia had an assist in, giving them a 4-0-0 record when he was on the scoresheet.

A veteran goalkeeper with MLS and NASL experience, Gaudette is looking to return to MLS for the first time since 2007. One of the best goalkeepers in the USL and NASL in recent years, Gaudette was a major contributor to the Puerto Rico Islanders recent success, following in the footsteps of Josh Saunders, who he will be attempting to back up in goal for LA this season.

MLS Highlights:

2007: Did not play in any regular season games during his final season with the Crew. **2006:** Started a career-high 11 games for the Crew in 2006, going 3-5-3 with a 1.18 goals against average and three clean sheets. He made his season debut in a 1-1 home draw with the Galaxy on 7/22 and tallied his first win on 8/19 in a 1-0 win at home over New York. **2005:** Was selected by the Columbus Crew in the first round of the 2005 MLS Supplemental Draft and went on to appear in six games for the club as a rookie. He made his MLS debut on 5/25, replacing the injured Jon Busch at halftime and making two saves in a 0-0 draw with the Galaxy. He would go on to start the next five games for the Crew, going 1-3-1 while recording his first win in a 1-0 home win over Colorado, which was also his first shutout as a pro.

Career Highlights

2008-2010: Signed with the Puerto Rico Islanders of the USSF Division 2 Pro League in 2008 and immediately became one of the top goalkeepers in the league. He led the Islanders to the best record in the league during the regular season and was selected as the Goalkeeper of the Year, tallying 10 shutouts and a 0.851 goals against average. However, the Islanders lost to Vancouver in the Final, denying Gaudette his first championship. The following season, Gaudette was a central figure in his team's run to the semifinals of the 2008/09 CONCACAF Champions League. He helped to knock off Alajuelense and Santos Laguna on the way to the semifinals, where they eventually lost to Cruz Azul on penalties. In the league, he recorded a 0.74 goals against average to go along with 15 wins and 12 shutouts as the Islanders finished third and returned to the playoffs. One year later, Gaudette helped Puerto Rico upset the Galaxy in the CONCACAF Champions League. That was his final season with the Islanders with Gaudette playing his final season with the Islanders, helping them earn the eighth and final playoff berth before rolling through the playoffs en route to their first championship. He finished his career with the club having appeared in 80 regular season games. **2011:** Signed with the NASL's Montreal Impact in February and went on to play in nine games for the NASL side. He made his debut in April in a 1-0 loss at Tampa Bay and recorded his first win on 5/1, keeping his second straight shutout in a 5-0 home win over Edmonton.

College Highlights

One of the best goalkeepers in St. John's history, Gaudette led the Red Storm to the NCAA Tournament four times from 2000-04 (he missed the 2001 season because of injury), including a berth in the 2003 College Cup Final. His 0.45 goals against average as a sophomore in 2002 is the second best in school history and Gaudette ranks in the top three in school history in all statistical categories for goalkeepers. He became the team's permanent starter in 2002 and allowed less than a goal per game in each season, keeping 27 shutouts and going 42-15-12 in that time.

A physically imposing force in the heart of the Galaxy defense, Gaul will add depth to LA's corps of central defenders as he continues to learn the position. Possessing a deadly and accurate left foot, Gaul spent the final two years of his college career playing up front, but now turns his focus to trying to stop goals from being scored rather than scoring them himself.

College Highlights

2011: Finished his college career by finishing second in the Missouri Valley Conference in scoring with 11 goals and four assists, including a goal and an assist in the NCAA Tournament. An NSCAA All-Midwest Region and All-Missouri Valley Conference selection, Gaul started all 23 games that the Braves played. Six of his 11 goals were game-winners, by far the most on the team, while his four assists were tied for the second most on the club. A MAC Hermann Trophy candidate, he opened the season with two goals and an assist in a win over Butler and then scored the game-winner in each of the Braves' next two games, giving him three game-winning goals to start the season. Gaul's timely goal scoring was essential for a Bradley team that saw all but two of their games on the season decided by a single goal. After setting up his team's equalizer on the opening round of the NCAA Tournament against Loyola-Chicago, his fourth assist of the season, Gaul scored his final goal of the year in the final seconds of regulation against Louisville in the Second Round of the NCAA Tournament, heading home a long throw in with just 26 seconds left in that game. **2010:** Moved to forward and set a career-high with 12 goals to go along with four assists in 22 games. He was named to the All-Missouri Valley Conference first team for the first time and established himself as one of the top forwards in the region. Five of his 12 goals were game-winners as he helped lead Bradley back to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in his career. Gaul had a goal and an assist in the second game of the year against Fairfield and kept on scoring from there. He had the first multi-goal game of his career against Alabama A&M in the Aces Soccer Classic, scoring twice two days after scoring once in a loss to East Tennessee State. He scored in three straight games in early October and then had four more goals and an assist in a three game run later that month. He scored the game-winning goal in an important late season win over Western Illinois and then tallied an assist on the game-tying goal in the second half of the Braves 3-2 upset of Creighton in the Missouri Valley Conference Semifinal, allowing them to then beat SIU Edwardsville in a penalty shootout to win the conference title. **2009:** Moved to defense, playing typically at left back but still finished second on the team with three goals while his four assists were tied for the team lead. He was named as an honorable mention All-Missouri Valley Conference selection while claiming the conference's Defensive Player of the Week award once and twice making all-Tournament teams. His first assist came in the season opening win over Northern Illinois and he added another in the 1-1 draw with Memphis three days later. Gaul recorded his first multi-assist game three days later, setting up a pair of goals in a 3-0 win over Mercer that gave him four assists in a three-game span. He scored his first goal of the season against Xavier and added tallies against Drake as well as Eastern Illinois, against who he scored the game's only goal for a 1-0 Braves win. **2008:** Finished second on the team as a freshman, scoring four goals and adding an assist while being used primarily in the midfield. Bradley's co-Newcomer of the Year, Gaul made his collegiate debut in a 4-0 win over Memphis, scoring his first goal in that game. He added single tallies against North Florida, Eastern Illinois and Central Arkansas as well as an assist against Xavier. The 2012 MLS Defender of the Year and a physical force in the center of the LA defense, Gonzalez has rapidly risen the ranks to become one of the best defenders not just in MLS, but in all of Galaxy history. However, the club will be forced to do without his aerial ability at both ends of the field for much of this season as he recovers from a torn ACL that he suffered while on loan in Germany in January.

MLS Highlights

2011: The 2011 MLS Defender of the Year, as well as the Galaxy's Defender of the Year and a member of the MLS Best XI, Gonzalez had two goals and an assist in 29 regular season games. With Gonzalez marshaling the center of defense, the Galaxy allowed the fewest goals in the league and equaled an MLS record with 17 clean sheets while adding two more in the playoffs and three in the CONCACAF Champions League. After missing the first three games of the year, Gonzalez returned to the field in April and scored his first goal of the season at Chicago on 4/17. He added a second goal against FC Dallas on 8/6 before tallying an assist at Kansas City on 9/5. Gonzalez also missed time in mid-July after breaking his nose, forcing him to miss the MLS All-Star Game, which he had been named as a starter for. He added a goal and an assist in the U.S. Open Cup and a goal in the Champions League as well. In the playoffs, Gonzalez played every minute of LA's four games, helping the club win their first MLS Cup since 2005. **2010:** The Galaxy's 2010 Defender of the Year and an MLS All-Star for the first time in his career, Omar Gonzalez had a breakout season for the Galaxy in 2010. A finalist for the MLS Defender of the Year award and a member of the league's Best XI, Gonzalez started 28 of the club's regular season games, as well as all three postseason games, leading the club in regular season games played and minutes played amongst all field players. He scored his first goal of the year in the 4-0 win at Seattle on 5/8 and then added his second on second half stoppage time of the 1-1 draw at Chicago on 9/4, heading home a Landon Donovan corner kick to save a point for LA. Gonzalez also added a goal in the postseason, scoring the game-winner in the second leg of the Western Conference Semifinal Series win over Seattle at The Home Depot Center when he headed a David Beckham freekick past Kasey Keller to give LA a 2-0 lead. He was booked a team-high eight times on the season and was forced to miss two games through suspension. These were the first two games of Gonzalez's MLS career that he missed and LA lost both games by 2-0 scorelines. He was the first Galaxy defender to be named to the Best XI since Chris Albright in 2005 and the first LA nominee to be named a finalist for the league's Defender of the Year award since Tyrone Marshall that same season. **2009:** The 2009 MLS Rookie of the Year, Gonzalez was the only Galaxy player to start all 30 of the club's regular season games. He made his MLS debut starting and playing all 90 minutes at center back in the season opening 2-2 draw vs. D.C. United on 3/22. He scored the first goal of his MLS career in the following game, heading home a Landon Donovan corner kick in the first half of a 3-2 loss vs. Colorado on

4/4. Gonzalez later added his first assist of his career on David Beckham's game-winning goal vs. Chivas USA on 8/29. He played the full 90 minutes in 29 of LA's 30 regular season games, missing just the final 28 minutes of the 1-0 vs. Houston on 6/28 because of injury. The 21-year-old led the Galaxy in both minutes played (2,672) and yellow cards (five), collecting his first in the 1-1 draw at FC Dallas on 5/23, while also setting new club rookie records for games started and minutes played and tying the record for games played by a rookie. He helped the Galaxy allow an MLS record 31 fewer goals than the season before and set a club record 12 clean sheets. In the postseason, Gonzalez started all four of the Galaxy's games, going the distance in each of the first three before being forced to exit late in regulation of MLS Cup because of an injury. He joined Sean Franklin as the only two players in club history to have been named MLS Rookie of the Year.

Career Highlights

Joined FC Nürnberg of the German Bundesliga on a six-week loan on January 5, but suffered a torn ACL in his left knee during his first training session with the club, ending the loan and forcing Gonzalez to return to the U.S. in order to undergo surgery.

College Highlights

A three year starter at the University of Maryland, Gonzalez started all 69 of the games in which he appeared in for the Terrapins, helping them win the NCAA Championship as a junior in 2008. Gonzalez finished his college career with seven goals and five assists before turning pro after his junior season. He had a career-high five goals to go along with one assist during his junior season in 2008 when he was named to the NSCAA/adidas All-American First Team and First Team All-ACC while also being named a semifinalist for the MAC Hermann Trophy, which is given out annually to the country's best college soccer player. In the NCAA Tournament, Gonzalez spearheaded a Maryland defense that allowed just one goal in five games and was named the College Cup Defensive MVP. He helped lead the Terrapins to 15 clean sheets in 26 games, including seven in eight games during the ACC and NCAA Tournaments. The 2007 ACC Defensive Player of the Year, Gonzalez was also named to Second Team All ACC and NSCAA/adidas All-American Third Team that season after claiming All-ACC Freshman Team and Soccer America Second Team All-Freshman honors the previous year. He scored his first career-goal in 2006 in a 4-1 win over Bucknell, also adding an assist in that game.

National Team

Gonzalez has collected two caps with the U.S. National Team, making his debut in a friendly against Brazil on August 10, 2010. He played 90 minutes in central defense in that game, which was the National Team's first since the end of the World Cup. He earned his second cap in January, starting and playing the opening 45 minutes in the 1-1 draw with Chile at The Home Depot Center. That was the second straight year that Gonzalez was called into the National Team's January camp. He was also part of a training camp with the U.S. in early February of 2011. He was originally listed in the U.S. squad for a camp in January 2012, but withdrew in order to begin his loan with FC Nürnberg. Prior to joining the Galaxy, Gonzalez represented the U.S. at the Under-17 and Under-20 levels. In 2005, he played for John Hackworth at the FIFA Under-17 World Cup in Peru. He appeared in two games at the tournament as the U.S. was eliminated in the Quarterfinals by the Netherlands. In 2007, he played for Bob Jenkins and the U.S. Under-20's at the Pan-American Games. He started all three games for the U.S., scoring twice in the 4-2 loss to Bolivia.

One of the longest tenured players on the club as he enters his fifth season in LA, he remains one of the most athletic players in Bruce Arena's squad.

MLS Highlights

2011: Played in 13 games for the Galaxy during the regular season, making a career-high five starts while recording two assists. Both assists came in the 3-0 home win over Vancouver on 9/17, setting up goals for Robbie Keane and Mike Magee. He also appeared in a pair of U.S. Open Cup games and three CONCACAF Champions League matches, however he missed the last month of the regular season and the postseason after rupturing a tendon in a finger on his left hand at New York on 10/4. **2010:** Made just eight appearances and two starts in his third season with the Galaxy, with both of the starts coming at right back, a position that he had not played before at the professional level. He made his season debut in the 2-1 win vs. Real Salt Lake on 4/17, replacing the injured Sean Franklin. He then came on for the injured A.J. DeLaGarza late in the 1-0 win at Colorado on 5/5 before starting the next two games. He was the right back for LA in the 4-0 win at Seattle on 5/8 and then again for the 0-0 home draw with Toronto FC on 5/15. The Galaxy allowed just one goal with him on the field in the regular season, with the club going 5-1-2 in the eight games that he played. He also saw action in three Open Cup or Champions League games, playing the full 90 minutes in both of LA's Open Cup games and also starting the 2-1 win at Puerto Rico on 8/4 in the second leg of their CONCACAF Champions League Preliminary Round Series. **2009:** Appeared in a career-high 19 games during his second season with the Galaxy, scoring one goal and establishing himself as one of Bruce Arena's first options off the bench. lies. He was a twice named to the USL First Division Team of the Week, doing so in Week 4 after scoring his first goal of the year in a 2-2 draw with Seattle and then again two weeks later when he scored one goal and set up a second in a 2-0 home win over California. Back for a third season with the Galaxy on loan from Sao Paulo, Juninho is a fan favorite whose partnership with David Beckham in central midfield last season was the impetus for the club's success. Equally tough tackling and gritty as he is creative and calm on the ball while also owning one of the best long range shots in MLS, his workrate in front of the back four allows his fellow midfielders the chance to push forward and cause problems for opposing defenses.

MLS Highlights

2011: Established himself as one of the top midfielders in MLS, earning a spot on the MLS All-Star Team for the first time and helping LA win MLS Cup. He appeared in 30 regular season games, scoring four goals and adding two assists while combining with David Beckham to form one of the best central midfield duos in Major League Soccer. He scored the Galaxy's first two goals of the season, scoring in the 1-0 win at Seattle (3/15) and the 1-1 draw vs. New England (3/20). He would add game-winning goals at Colorado (6/18), a game in which he also had an assist, and at home vs. FC Dallas (8/6). His impact was even more profound in the CONCACAF Champions League, where he scored the game-winning goal in each of LA's final two games in group play, giving the Galaxy a 2-1 home win over Morelia and a 1-0 win at Motagua, which gave LA a first place finish in Group A. The only Galaxy player to be sent off in both MLS and the Champions League, Juninho was then shown a red card after the end of the first game of the Conference Semifinal Series at New York. He missed the second game of that series but played the full 90 minutes in the Conference Championship win over Real Salt Lake and MLS Cup against Houston. 2010: One of the Galaxy's breakout stars in 2010, Juninho was a constant fixture in the center of the LA midfield in his first year with the club. He made his MLS debut in the season opening win over New England and went on to start 25 regular season games for the club. He missed three games after twice having to return to Brazil as a result of deaths in his family. He finished the year with two goals and two assists in MLS play while also adding a goal in the Open Cup, scoring the eventual game-winner against AC St. Louis in the Third Round of that competition on 6/29 for his first-ever goal for the club. He scored his first MLS goal a few days later, beating Kasey Keller from 35 yards out. That goal was later selected as the runner-up for the AT&T MLS Goal of the Year. He also added the eventual game-winner early in the second half of the regular season finale against FC Dallas on 10/24, a game that LA won 2-1. Just as each of his goals was a game-winner, both of his assists on the season helped to set up Edson Buddle for eventual game-winning goals. His first came in his fourth MLS game, setting up Buddle for his second goal in the 2-1 win vs. Real Salt Lake on 4/17 and then providing the final pass on Buddle's goal in the first half of the 1-0 win at New York on 8/14. Despite his size, Juninho is also a tough and tenacious tackler, collecting five yellow cards on the season, however, he played the final three months of the season without receiving one, meaning that he was able to avoid a suspension for yellow card accumulation.

Career Highlights

2012: Signed a contract extension with Sao Paulo and trained with the club ahead of the start of their 2012 season before re-joining the Galaxy in February. 2004-09: Played for Sao Paulo of the Brazilian Campeonato after originally joining the club in 2004. He came through the youth ranks of Sao Paulo, having played on the Sao Paulo team that won the U-17 Paulista Championship in 2006 and finished second at that year's Mundialito in Spain. He was also a member of the team that won the Super Group of the 2007 Dallas Cup, defeating Real Madrid and Chelsea en route to the title. In 2009, he was loaned out to Toledo in the First Division of the Brazilian Paraná Championship, playing there alongside both Alex Cazumba and Leonardo.

Now entering his first full season with the club, Keane's arrival helped to reenergize the Galaxy roster last season while his goal scoring and creative abilities were central to the club's success in the postseason. The captain of Ireland, meaning that he is expected to miss part of the season while at the European Championships, Keane is one of the most talented forwards in MLS and he will look to illustrate that this year.

MLS Highlights

2011: Signed with the Galaxy on 8/15 and made his debut five days later, scoring the team's first goal in a 2-0 home win vs. San Jose. He made his CONCACAF Champions League debut on 8/25 in a 2-0 win vs. Alajuelense and then scored his first goal in that competition at Morelia on 9/13, giving LA a 1-0 lead early in the second half. He looked to have scored a late winner in that game, only for the strike to be wrongly called back by the referee's assistant. Keane scored his second goal in MLS play four days later while also adding an assist in the 3-0 win vs. Vancouver on 9/17. He played just two more games for the club before the postseason, one in the Champions League at Alajuelense and at home vs. Real Salt Lake because of injuries and international duty, but he was fully fit for the MLS Cup Playoffs. He started all four games during the postseason, hitting the post or crossbar in each of the games with New York as well as the Conference Championship against Real Salt Lake. He scored his first postseason goal in the 68th minute of that game, giving his team a comfortable 3-1 advantage. He was back in the starting lineup for MLS Cup and helped set up Landon Donovan's game-winning goal to give LA a 1-0 win and their third MLS Cup championship. After the season, Keane played in all three of the club's international friendlies, scoring a team-best four goals on the Asia Pacific Tour.

Career Highlights

2012: Joined Aston Villa on loan ahead of the start of the 2012 MLS season. He made his debut for the club in a 1-1 draw with Everton on 1/14, facing Galaxy teammate Landon Donovan. He made his first start for the club a week later and scored twice, leading Villa to a 3-2 win. He went on to appear in seven games for the club, scoring his third and final goal for Villa against Newcastle. **2009-11:** Returned to Tottenham and scored 15 goals for the club in 49 games over the next three seasons. During that time he enjoyed a wildly successful loan to Celtic of the Scottish Premier League, scoring 16 goals in 19 games for the club while also spending time on loan at West Ham, scoring twice for them in 10 games during the 2009-10 season. **2008-09:** Keane signed with Liverpool in August 2008 and scored seven goals in 28 games for the club, including five in the Premier League, but he returned to Tottenham in January 2009. **2002-08:** Joined Tottenham Hotspur for the first time in August 2002 and instantly became one of their top goal scorers, tallying more than 100 goals in six seasons for the club, including a career-best 23 goals in 54 games during the 2007-08 campaign. A total of 80 of the 107 goals he scored were in the Premier League where he reached double figures in goals in all six seasons. His first spell at the club ended after helping Spurs win the League Cup in 2008, playing 102 minutes in that game while helping Spurs beat Chelsea 2-1 in extra time. **2000-02:** Joined Leeds United initially on loan in December 2000 and went on to score nine goals in 18 Premier League games for the club, helping them to a fourth place finish. After making his move to the club permanent, Keane scored nine goals in 33 games during the 2001-02 season but was then sold to Spurs early the following season. **2000:** Spent six months playing for Inter Milan in Serie A after signing for the club in July. He appeared in 14 games for the club in all competitions, scoring three times but was loaned to Leeds United in soon after arriving in Italy, limiting him to just six games in Serie A. **1999-2000:** Joined Coventry City early in the 1999-2000 Premier League season

and helped the Sky Blues to a 14th place finish, scoring 12 goals in 31 games in the league before being sold to Inter Milan ahead of the start of the following season. **1997-99:** Made his professional debut at the age of 17 for Wolverhpton Wanderers after rising through the club's youth ranks. He scored twice on his debut against Norwich City and scored more than 10 goals in each of his two full seasons with the club before being sold to Coventry City in 1999.

National Team

Ireland's all-time leader in goals and their current captain, Keane has 53 goals in 114 appearances for his country. A member of Ireland's Under-18 European Championship winning sides in 1998, Keane made his full international debut against the Czech Republic in March 1998 and scored his first goals for Ireland seven months later in a win over Malta in October. A member of Ireland's squad at the 2002 FIFA World Cup, he scored three times in four games at the tournament. His first came from a stoppage time equalizer against Germany before scoring his team's first goal in the 3-0 win over Saudi Arabia that booked Ireland a berth in the Round of 16. There, Ireland would face Spain and Keane would score a 90th minute penalty to tie the score at 1-1 and send the match to extra time and then penalties. He would convert his spot kick in the deciding penalty shootout but Ireland would lose 3-2 and were eliminated from the World Cup. He scored his 22nd and 23rd goals for Ireland in October 2004 to become the country's all-time leading goal scorer, tallying twice in a 2-0 home win over the Faroe Islands. He was appointed Ireland's captain in March 2006 and led Ireland to the playoffs for the 2010 FIFA World Cup, scoring six times in 12 qualifiers, only to see Ireland controversially lose to France in the playoffs. He collected his 100th cap for Ireland on 8/11/10 in a friendly with Argentina. He scored the 45th goal of his career for Ireland at home against Russia on 10/8/10 in a Euro 2012 qualifier with that being the first time in Ireland had lost a game when Keane scored a goal. He went on to score seven times in 11 qualifiers, including two in the playoff against Estonia to lead his team to a spot in the 2012 European Championships, their first major international tournament in 10 years. His eight goals for Ireland in 2011, which included the 50th of his career in a win over Macedonia, were the most of his international career in a single year.

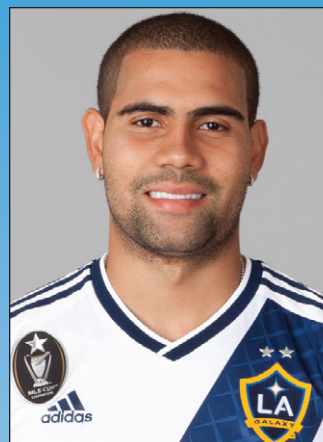
College Highlights

Back for a third season with the club, Leonardo is now a member of the Galaxy on a permanent basis after spending the last two years with the club on loan. A powerful and athletic center back, he missed much of last year after suffering a serious knee injury in April 2011 from which he continues to recover. His return to the field will help provide another physical force in defense in the absence of Omar Gonzalez.

MLS Highlights

2011: Started each of the first seven games of the year in central defense, helping LA to a 3-1-3 record. He played the full 90 minutes in each of those games, helping his team keep three clean sheets. He scored the first goal of his MLS career on 4/2, heading home a David Beckham freekick in a 1-0 home win over Philadelphia. However, he tore the ACL and LCL in his right knee in second half stoppage time of the 2-1 win at Chicago on 4/17. A breakout star in 2011, Magee's versatility allowed him to finish second on the club in goals, which included three in the postseason, while also becoming the club's unquestioned starter on the left side of midfield. For all of his attacking contributions however, Magee may be best known for his emergency spell in goal last year in San Jose, keeping the Earthquakes off the scoreboard and helping earn his team a tie and himself a permanent place in the heart of Galaxy fans.

MLS Highlights

2011: Tallied his best season in a Galaxy uniform, scoring 10 goals in all competitions and winning MLS Cup for the first time in his career. The only player on the club to score in the regular season, the postseason, the U.S. Open Cup and the CONCACAF Champions League, Magee finished third on the team with five regular season goals before adding three more in the postseason to finish as the joint top scorer in the MLS Cup Playoffs. He also added goals in the Open Cup and Champions League to join Adam Cristman and Omar Gonzalez as the only three players on the team to score in each of those competitions as well as the regular season. He scored twice in the 3-0 win vs. Vancouver on 9/17 for his first multi-goal game in exactly six years. He also added regular season goals at D.C. United on 4/9, and at home against FC Dallas on 8/6 and San Jose on 8/20 in addition to his goals at home against the L.A. Blues (6/28) and at home against Morelia in the Champions League on 9/28. His goal at home against FC Dallas was his first-ever goal for the club at home. The Galaxy were 8-0-1 when he scored a goal, including 3-0-0 in the playoffs when he scored in both legs of the Conference Semifinal Series against New York and then again in the Western Conference Championship win over Real Salt Lake. Two of those games were game-winning goals while his goal vs. New York in the second leg of the Conference Semifinal Series was the Series clinching goal. In addition to his offensive exploits, Magee also

had a memorable turn in goal on 6/25 at San Jose. He replaced Josh Saunders after he was shown a red card late in the first half and proceeded to make three saves in 48 minutes of action. He earned the MLS Save of the Week award and was voted the MLS Player of the Week. 2010: Limited to just 16 games because of injury, Magee finished the season with a goal and an assist in his second year with the Galaxy. He assisted on Edson Buddle's second half goal in the first leg of the Honda SuperClasico against Chivas USA on 4/1. He then scored his first goal of the year, finishing off a pass from Tristan Bowen to give LA a 1-0 win at FC Dallas on 5/20. However, he was forced to miss two and a half months of actual time while recovering from surgery to repair a sports hernia, missing eight games from 6/5-8/1. He returned to the field on 8/4 at Puerto Rico in the CONCACAF Champions League and then returned to MLS action on 8/14 at New York. He only started three of the club's 11 regular season games after being activated from the Disabled List on 8/13, but then started all three of the club's postseason games. 2009: Acquired by the Galaxy prior to the start of the 2009 season, Magee set a career-high and tied a team-high with six assists, while adding two goals in 23 games. He made his Galaxy debut in the season opener vs. D.C. United on 3/22 and scored his first goal for the club late in second half stoppage time of the 2-2 draw at Real Salt Lake on 5/6. Magee tallied his first assist four days later in a 1-1 draw at Seattle and added assists on 5/23 at FC Dallas, 6/20 at San Jose, 6/28 vs. Houston and 7/11 at Chivas USA. On 8/19, in his first game back in his native Chicago as a member of the Galaxy, Magee scored the game-winning goal and then assisted on Landon Donovan's second half tally. That was his first game with both a goal and an assist in nearly a year, dating back to 8/24/08 when he was a member of the Red Bulls. In the postseason, Magee started all four of the Galaxy's games and finished as the club's second leading scorer with two goals in 370 minutes of action. He scored LA's first goal of the playoffs in the 14th minute of Game One of the Western Conference Semifinals Series at Chivas USA. He then scored the Galaxy's only goal at MLS Cup 2009, beating Nick Rimando from close range late in the first half of that game. Magee, who became the 30th different player in MLS history to score a goal for his team in MLS Cup, also converted his penalty in the MLS Cup deciding shootout. 2008: Enjoyed his best season statistically since 2005, recording five goals and an assist. Converted a penalty kick in 2-0 win over San Jose on 4/27 for his first goal since 7/22/06. Magee scored in three-straight games during a three-game winning streak in August. The streak began with the game-winning goal in a 4-1 win vs. D.C. on 8/10. He added the game-winner in a 2-0 win over Toronto FC on 8/17 and then rounded out the scoring by tallying the Red Bulls' third goal in a 3-0 home win over Houston on 8/24. Magee also had an assist in that game, setting up Juan Pablo Angel for the game-winning goal after just eight minutes. He scored his final goal of the year in the 5th minute of a 5-4 loss to the Rapids on 9/27. 2007: Was limited to just seven games on the season after recovering from offseason knee surgery. He came on as a substitute in seven straight matches between 8/12-9/15, before a right knee injury forced him to miss the rest of this season. 2006: Magee tallied three goals and one assist in 17 games. He was limited to just nine starts as a result of injury, but he did score the game-winning goal in the second half of a 1-0 win over Kansas City at home on 7/22. He made his season debut on 4/20 vs. D.C. United, tallying an assist in a 4-1 loss, which was the first loss for the club as the New York Red Bulls. 2005: Set a then-career-high with five assists to go along with five goals on the season. Magee tallied the first multi-goal game of his career on 9/17 vs. New England, tallying two assists in a 5-4 win. The MetroStars were 4-1-4 when he tallied either a goal or an assist. 2004: Scored three goals and recorded four assists in 18 starts on the year. He scored the MetroStars' first goal of the season in a 3-1 win at Columbus on 4/3. Added a goal and an assist in a 2-1 win vs. LA at Giants Stadium on 6/19, scoring the game-winner in the 90th minute and scored the game-tying goal in the 3-2 win vs. New England on 9/11. 2003: He made his professional debut and became the youngest player in New York history at the time at 18 years, 222 days on 4/12 vs. Columbus in the season opener. At 18 years, 236 days, Magee became the youngest player to score a goal in New York history on 4/26 at Columbus, tallying the game-winning goal in a 1-0 win. He led the MetroStars in games played that season and was second on the team with a career-best seven goals to go along with two assists. He had the game-winning goal in a 1-0 win over the Galaxy on 6/21. Five of his seven goals were scored on the road, with the MetroStars going 4-1-2 in games that he scored in.

National Team

Magee began his National Team career in the Fall of 2000 during a two-year stay at the U.S. Under-17 residency camp in Bradenton, Fla. before being drafted by the MetroStars. He has also represented the U.S. U-18, U-20 and U-23 National Teams. He played for the U.S. at the 2001 Under-17 World Cup in Trinidad and Tobago, appearing in all three games for the Red, White and Blue and scoring a goal in a 5-3 loss to France. In 2003, he represented the U.S. at the Under-20 World Cup in the United Arab Emirates. He played in two games at the tournament, scoring the game-winning goal in the opening game of the tournament for the U.S., a 3-1 win over Paraguay. In late 2004 he was called into senior National Team camp for the first time. He has yet to earn his first cap.

The youngest player in club history ever to score a goal, McBean is one of the brightest young stars on a Galaxy roster that is heavy with veteran presence. Still just 17-years-old, McBean continues to grow and understand the game, allowing him to use his incredible skill set to his full advantage. Good in the air or with the ball at his feet, McBean's will look to play a bigger role with the club in his second season as a pro.

MLS Highlights

2011: Joined the Galaxy in January as the club's first Homegrown player since Tristan Bowen in 2008. He made his debut in the 18 man squad on 7/20 against Columbus, but he did not come on in that game. He made his first team debut four days later when he played the second half of the friendly against Manchester City as part of the Herbalife World Football Challenge. He made his MLS debut in the regular season finale against Houston, playing the full 90 minutes up front in that game to become the youngest player in club history ever to start and play in a game. He scored LA's only goal in the 88th minute of that game to become, at 16 years and 312 days old, the youngest player in club history to score a goal by more than two years. In addition, McBean led the Galaxy with four assists in the Reserve League, appearing in five game while making four starts.

Academy Highlights

2011: Continued to play for the Galaxy U-16's after signing with the first team, helping them win the first Development Academy championship in club history. He scored in the Semifinal win over Seattle after returning from the 2011 FIFA U-17 World Cup in Mexico. **2010:** Officially joined the Galaxy Academy U-16 team in the summer of 2010. Debuted for the team at the 2010 SUM U-17 Cup in Houston, playing in two of the Galaxy's three games at the tournament. He made his U.S. Soccer Development Academy debut in a 4-0 win over Real Salt Lake in Arizona, scoring a goal. He went on to record a team-best nine goals in 10 games for the Galaxy U-16's, helping them to a 10-0-1 record in Development Academy play, which was the best amongst all U-16 teams. McBean scored a goal in six of the 10 games that he played in, including a hat trick against South Carolina United FC at the annual Winter Showcase in Arizona. While at the Showcase, McBean also played in one of the Academy Select games, which brings a number of the nation's top young players together on the same field. In that game, McBean scored just five minutes after entering the match, leading his team to a 2-1 win.

National Team

Was named as one of 40 players selected for the U.S. Soccer Under-17 National Team Residency Program in January 2011, shortly before signing with the Galaxy. He travelled to Florida with the U-17's and made his international debut in a friendly in Montego Bay, Jamaica on 1/28/11. He made a series of friendly appearances ahead of the start of the CONCACAF Championships and then played in four of the five games that the U.S. played in the tournament, making two starts and setting up all three goals in the 3-0 win over Canada in the Final. The first of those two saves came off a Fredy Montero penalty, becoming just the second goalkeeper in MLS history and the first since 1999 to have the first save of his career be on a penalty kick. He had made his first team debut six days earlier on 6/29, playing the full 90 minutes in the 2-1 win over the L.A. Blues in the Third Round of the U.S. Open Cup. Sarvas scored in the second leg of that series, which was decided in a penalty shootout, with Sarvas converting his spot kick as well in his final game for the club. **2009-10:** Moved to Poland when he signed with Polonia Warsaw of the Polish Ekstraklasa, which is the top division of soccer in Poland. In a year and a half with the club, Sarvas appeared in 28 league games, scoring twice, while adding two more goals in six Europa League matches. **2008-09:** Joined his fourth and final Swedish team, Bunkeflo midway through the 2008 season but could not save them from relegation to the Sodra. He scored twice in 12 games for the club as they finished in 13th place and were relegated via a playoff. **2007-08:** Joined his third club in Sweden, signing with Mjallby of the Superettan, which is the second division of soccer in Sweden. In a year and a half with the club, appearing in 34 league games for the club and scoring four times. All four goals came during the 2007 season as Mjallby finished in ninth place in the league. **2005-06:** Joined Kristianstads of the Swedish Sodra Gotaland and spent two years with the club, appearing in nearly 50 league games for the club and scoring more than 20 goals and helping them earn promotion to the Sodra, which is the highest level of the third tier of Swedish soccer. **2004:** After beginning his career in his native Brazil playing for SC Corinthians Paulista and Noroeste, he moved to Europe for the first time, signing with Karlskrona AIF of the Swedish Sodra Gotaland and appearing in 22 games for the club and scoring three times.

The club's unquestioned first choice in goal entering the season for the first time in his career, Saunders showed full well last season that he is up for the challenge of playing in goal for the Galaxy. A big and physical presence in goal, Saunders commands his box and is a vocal leader behind a Galaxy defense that continues to grow and improve. At his best last year in the postseason, he will look to continue that progression throughout the 2012 campaign.

MLS Highlights

2011: Recorded the best year of his MLS career, setting new career-highs in all statistical categories while establishing himself as the club's top goalkeeper. He started the first three games of the season in place of the injured Donovan Ricketts, going 1-1-1 while keeping a clean sheet in the season opening 1-0 win at Seattle on 3/15. He returned to make three saves in a 4-1 home win over Sporting Kansas City before regaining the starting job on 6/3 when Ricketts left for international duty at the CONCACAF Gold Cup. He was 1-0-2 in the three games that Ricketts missed before being forced to make his only substitute appearances of the season, replacing Ricketts after he was injured midway through the first half of the 0-0 draw at San Jose on 6/25. However, he was only on the field for 19 minutes before being shown a red card for the first time in his career following a clash with the Earthquakes Steven Lenhart. Following his suspension, Saunders started 11 of the Galaxy's final 14 regular season games, going 9-1-1 in those matches and keeping six clean sheets. He finished the year with a 12-2-4 record, eight shutouts and a 0.93 goals against average, which was the second best in MLS behind only Ricketts. Saunders was also ever-present in the club's Champions League run, playing every minute of their six games, going 4-2-0 with three shutouts while only allowing four goals in those matches. In the playoffs, Saunders allowed just two goals and made 11 saves in four games as he led the Galaxy to their first MLS Cup since 2005. **2010:** Appeared in four games in all competitions, including one MLS game. He kept a clean sheet in the 0-0 home draw with Toronto FC on 5/15, making one save in place of the injured Donovan Ricketts. That shutout extended his run of not allowing a goal in MLS regular season play to 342 minutes. Saunders also played in both of the Galaxy's Open Cup games in 2010, keeping a clean sheet in the 2-0 win over AC St. Louis in the Third Round and then making five saves in the 2-0 loss at Seattle in the Quarterfinals. He made his final appearance of the season in the first leg of the CONCACAF Champions League Preliminary Round Series against Puerto Rico, a game LA lost 4-1. **2009:** Set then-MLS career-highs across the board, appearing in six regular season games for the Galaxy, including four starts with a 1.08 goals against average. He made his 2009 debut in the season opening 2-2 draw vs. D.C. United on 3/22, also starting in the 3-2 loss vs. Colorado on 4/4. He made three saves in 120 minutes of action against the Rapids in a U.S. Open Cup Play-In Game on 4/7 for his first clean sheet as a member of the Galaxy. He kept another clean sheet in a friendly against CS Herediano of Costa Rica on 6/9, but missed the next two regular season games

because of a right ankle injury. He returned to the bench for the 1-0 win vs. Houston on 6/28 and was back in the lineup on 7/4 vs. New England when Donovan Ricketts was away on international duty. Saunders tied a career-high with four saves in that game, earning his first shutout in MLS play in a 1-0 win. He helped the Galaxy earn another 1-0 win a week later on 7/11 at Chivas USA, making two saves. After allowing one goal in 45 minutes of action vs. AC Milan on 7/19, Saunders returned to the field at Kansas City on 7/25, replacing the injured Ricketts and not allowing a goal in 61 minutes of action. He then played the full 90 minutes in the friendly with Barcelona on 8/1, making five saves in a 2-1 loss. Saunders' final regular season appearance came on 8/19 in a 2-0 win at Chicago, when he played the final five minutes after again replacing an injured Ricketts. In the postseason, Saunders was on the bench for all four of the Galaxy's games, replacing Ricketts in the 66th minute after he suffered a broken hand. He made one save in his 54 minutes on the field and then made two saves in the penalty shootout. **2008:** Made his MLS debut after being acquired by the Galaxy in September on loan. Saunders joined the club on 9/13 and made his debut on 10/2 in a 1-0 loss at Columbus. He also played in the 3-2 win vs. Colorado on 10/12 and the 3-0 loss at Houston on 10/18 to finish with a 1-2-0 record and a 2.00 goals against average. He also appeared in one Reserve Division game, surrendering two goals in a 2-1 loss to Chivas USA on 9/28. **2005:** Won the MLS Cup and U.S. Open Cup Double with the Galaxy, appearing in one Reserve Division game. **2003-04:** Spent two seasons with the San Jose Earthquakes, winning the MLS Cup with the club as a rookie in 2003. However, he did not appear in any games for the club.

USL First Division Highlights

2008: Saunders enjoyed perhaps his best season in the USL, appearing in and starting 27 games before joining the Galaxy on loan in September. He kept 13 clean sheets in his 27 games, allowing only 33 goals on the season for a 1.22 GAA to go along with 95 saves. **2007:** Spent the season with the Puerto Rico Islanders, appearing in 22 regular season games and keeping six clean sheets while helping the Islanders reach the postseason for the second straight season. In the playoffs, Saunders led Puerto Rico to the first playoff series win in club history, keeping a clean sheet against Montreal at home to preserve a 5-3 aggregate victory. He made 71 saves and allowed just 26 goals in his 22 games with the club. **2006:** Played in 22 games in his fourth and final season with the Timbers. Saunders tallied a 1.49 GAA with a 5-11-5 record and four clean sheets as they missed the playoffs. **2005:** Started all 28 games on the season for Portland, collecting a 10-9-9 record with six clean sheets and a 1.50 GAA while leading his team to the First Round of the USL Playoffs where they were eliminated by Seattle 3-0 on aggregate. Played in 24 games for Portland, compiling a 16-5-2 record with six clean sheets and a 1.11 goals against average. He helped lead the Timbers to the postseason, only to be eliminated in the First Round 3-2 on aggregate by their rival, the Seattle Sounders. **2003:** On loan from San Jose, he appeared in 16 games for the Timbers, allowing 15 goals for a 0.90 GAA. He went 10-4-2 in his time with the club, keeping six clean sheets.

National Team

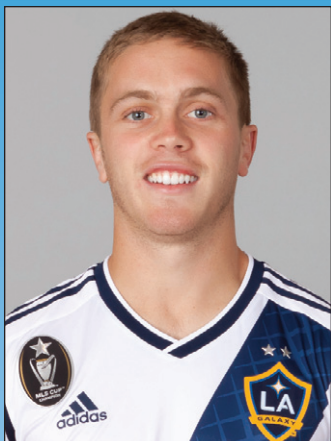
Collected two caps for the Puerto Rico National Team while playing for the Puerto Rico Islanders. He played the full 90 minutes in a pair of wins over Bermuda in January 2008, helping Puerto Rico record 2-0 and 1-0 wins. Saunders made eight saves in the two matches, which were the first back-to-back wins for Puerto Rico since 1993.

College Highlights

Saunders split his college career between Cal State-Fullerton and the University of California, spending his first two years at Fullerton before transferring north to Berkeley. He was a two-year starter at Cal, earning First Team All-Pac 10 honors in each of his seasons with the Bears. As a senior in 2002, Saunders was named the Pac 10 Player of the Year, becoming the first goalkeeper ever to win that award.

An ever-growing and improving option in the Galaxy midfield, Stephens is known for his versatility, which allows him to play anywhere in the midfield for Bruce Arena. Calm on the ball and tough in the tackle, he was one of the first options off the bench last season for the Galaxy and will look to expand upon that role in his third season with the club. He has also caught the eye of U.S. Under-23 head coach Caleb Porter, meaning that Stephens could find himself missing time with his club this season for Olympic Qualifying and possibly the London Olympics as well.

MLS Highlights

2011: Played in 33 games in all competitions in his second season with the Galaxy, tallying one assist while winning his first MLS Cup. His lone assist came in the regular season finale at Houston, setting up Jack McBean's late goal. One of Bruce Arena's first options off the bench, Stephens started 12 regular season games as well as two games in each the Open Cup and the Champions League. Made his postseason debut as a second half substitute in the second leg of the Western Conference Semifinal Series against New York. He was in the 18-man squad for 44 of the 46 games that the Galaxy played in all competitions. **2010:** An instant hit after being selected by the Galaxy in the first round of the 2010 MLS SuperDraft, Stephens led all MLS rookies with eight assists while also adding a goal in 25 games. He scored the first goal of his professional career early in the 2-0 win at Columbus on 5/29. He tied a club record with three assists in LA's 4-1 win vs. Houston on 6/5. That was one of two multi-assist games for Stephens, who set up two of his team's three goals in the 3-1 win vs. Philadelphia on 5/1. The Galaxy were 5-0-0 when he had an assist, with seven of his eight assists coming at The Home Depot Center, having tallied one in the 4-0 win at Seattle on 5/8, one in the 3-1 win vs. Seattle on 7/4 and one in the 2-1 win at Chivas USA on 10/3. His eight assists were the most by a Galaxy rookie since Clint Mathis had 10 in 1998 and were the most by an LA player other than David Beckham or Landon Donovan since Cobi Jones had eight in 2003. The only Galaxy player to play in the first 22 games of the year, he was in the 18-man squad for 28 of the club's 30 regular season games, while also making one appearance in the CONCACAF Champions League. He made his MLS debut as a second half substitute in the season opening win over New England and then was booked for the first time just a minute after entering his first Honda SuperClasico against Chivas USA on 4/1.

College Highlights

Played four years at UCLA, appearing in 81 games and making 78 starts for the Bruins. He scored 11 goals and added 20 assists while helping lead his team to the NCAA Tournament four times. As a junior in 2009, he set career-highs with seven goals and nine assists to be named the Pac-10 Player of the Year. His seven goals were the second most on the Bruins, with four of them coming on penalty kicks, including one in overtime to upset the #5 ranked University of California, while his nine assists tied him for the Pac-10 lead. Stephens tied a school record with four assists in a 6-1 win over San Diego State. He was also named to the All-Pac-10 First Team as a senior after tallying seven assists in 15 games while helping the Bruins reach the NCAA Quarterfinals. He was named the UCLA Rookie of the Year after appearing in all 24 of the team's games, making 22 starts as a freshman in

2006. He came off the bench for the first two games of the season but started the rest to be named to the Top Drawer Soccer All-Freshman first team and to Soccer America's All-Freshman second team. He scored his first collegiate goal just one minute into a 3-1 win over UC Santa Barbara. He also scored a goal in the NCAA semifinals as the Bruins defeated Virginia 4-0 to reach the College Cup Final.

Youth Academy

Played for the Galaxy's U-20 team, which competed in the USL Super-20 League, in both 2008 and 2009. He helped the Galaxy win the Pacific SoCal Division in 2008 and a second place finish in 2009. He also played for the Chicago Fire Super-20s in the 2008 Super-20 North American Finals, assisting on the game's opening goal as they went on to defeat the Toronto Lynx to claim the title.

National Team

Stephens has represented the United States at the U-15, U-16, U-17, U-18, U-20 and U-23 levels. A fixture in Caleb Porter's U-23 camps ahead of CONCACAF Olympic Qualifying, joining the team for camps in December, January and February ahead of the tournament in March. He was on the bench but did not appear in any of the U.S.'s three games at the 2009 FIFA U-20 World Cup in Egypt. He joined the U.S. Soccer Under-17 Residency Program in Bradenton, Fla. in 2004 and remained there through the 2005 Fall Semester when he enrolled at UCLA.

College Highlights

2011: Set career-highs with 23 games played and started, as well as five goals to go along with six assists to earn second team All-BIG EAST honors. He tallied assists in three of the first four games of the season before scoring his first goal of the year on 9/21 at Ohio State. That goal was the only one of the game as Louisville won 1-0. Walker then registered the first multi-goal game of his career, scoring twice in a 3-2 win at Indiana, including the game-winner in overtime. He later added goals against Cincinnati and Bradley, with that goal coming in the NCAA Tournament. Louisville were 9-1-0 when Walker had a goal or an assist, including a 2-0-0 mark in the NCAA Tournament when he had a goal and an assist, **2010:** Appeared in 21 games while making 19 starts as he earned third team All-BIG EAST honors. He set a career-high with seven assists, which were tied for the most on the team. He had his first multi-assist game in a 5-0 win over Appalachian State, setting up a pair of goals, while also scoring against BIG EAST rivals Providence and South Florida. However, he was forced to miss the first two games of the NCAA Tournament because of an injury that he picked up at the BIG EAST tournament, limiting his production during the run to the College Cup Final. **2009:** Returned from injury to score twice and add five assists while starting all 18 games that he played in. Used in midfield and defense, he had two goals and three assists in a five-game span from 9/27-10/14, scoring in a 6-0 win over DePaul and in a 4-0 win over Syracuse. Louisville were 5-0-1 when he had a goal or an assist, outscoring opponents 20-3 in those contests. A BIG EAST All-Tournament Team selection, Walker's five assists were second on the team while he also helped the team set a school record with 13 assists. **2008:** Redshirted after breaking two bones in his left foot ahead of the start of the season. **2007:** Started 20 of the 22 games that he appeared in as a freshman, tallying an assist in a 4-2 win over Kentucky. 2011 SEASON

Final Record: 19-5-10, 67 pts. (First, Western Conference)

The LA Galaxy enjoyed one of the greatest seasons in MLS history in 2011, repeating as Supporters' Shield winners and claiming their third MLS Cup title.

The season started promisingly with a 1-0 win at Seattle in the first game of the season, but the team struggled to find consistency through the month of March as injuries and absences took their toll. However, an undefeated April that saw the Galaxy give up just two goals in five games and never trail served notice to the league that the Galaxy were serious about retaining their spot at the top of MLS.

Following a heartbreaking loss at FC Dallas on May 1, the Galaxy went 14 consecutive league games without a loss, going 8-0-6 with eight shutouts in that time to take a commanding lead at the top of the Western Conference heading into August. Nine different players scored during that streak and four different goalkeepers had to be used, including Mike Magee in an unbelievable, award-winning emergency performance against San Jose on June 25, showing that the Galaxy had the depth to navigate the long season that still lay ahead.

After seeing their unbeaten streak snapped in Portland, the Galaxy bounced right back with league wins over FC Dallas and San Jose to maintain their standing at the top of the league. The win over the Earthquakes also saw the goal-scoring debut of Robbie Keane, who was signed by the club just before the end of the transfer window. Balancing their MLS schedule along with that of the CONCACAF Champions League was not an easy feat, but LA, who saw five players (David Beckham, who had a career-best 15 assists, Landon Donovan, Sean Franklin, Omar Gonzalez, the 2011 MLS Defender of the Year and Juninho) named to the MLS All-Star Team and four players (Beckham, Donovan, Todd Dunivant and Gonzalez) named to the MLS Best XI along with Coach of the Year Bruce Arena, continued to roll through the regular season, all but clinching the Supporters' Shield by the start of October.

In the MLS Cup Playoffs, the Galaxy, who were undefeated at home during the regular season, dispatched the New York Red Bulls 3-1 on aggregate in a chippy and hard fought Western Conference Semifinal Series, setting up a date with Real Salt Lake for a berth in MLS Cup. Landon Donovan gave the Galaxy a lead in the Conference Championship, only for RSL to answer right back. Early in the second half, Mike Magee scored in his third straight playoff game to put LA in front before Robbie Keane killed the game off with his first postseason goal, sending the Galaxy back to MLS Cup.

The Home Depot Center served as the host for MLS Cup and with a record crowd of more than 30,000 fans in attendance, there was only ever going to be one winner. After dominating play throughout the game, the Galaxy finally got the goal they deserved in the 72nd minute as Keane played in Donovan, who beat Tally Hall in the Houston goal to give LA a 1-0 win and their third MLS Cup.

In addition to their success in MLS, the Galaxy also achieved their goal of advancing past the group stage of the Champions League. Despite being placed in what was regarded as the toughest group in the competition, the Galaxy emerged victorious, going 4-2-0 for 12 points and a first place finish based on tiebreakers with Alajuelense and Morelia. LA were a perfect 3-0-0 in the competition at home and clinched their spot in the quarterfinals with a 1-0 win over Motagua in Honduras on the final day of the competition.

2010 SEASON

Final Record: 18-7-5, 59 pts. (First, Western Conference)

The LA Galaxy won their first Supporters' Shield since the 2002 season after finishing with a league-best 18-7-5 regular season record for 59 points. However, after dispatching the Seattle Sounders FC in their Western Conference Semifinal Series, LA was upset by FC Dallas in the Western Conference Championship at The Home Depot Center.

The Galaxy were undoubtedly the best team in MLS over the first half of the season, opening the year with an 11-game unbeaten run that saw them take 29 of a possible 33 points and outscore their opponents 20-3. Edson Buddle was the catalyst of that run, scoring nine of the club's first 10 goals en route to a career-high 17. His early season form caught the eye of U.S. National Team head coach Bob Bradley, who named Buddle in his squad for the summer's FIFA World Cup in South Africa, along with Galaxy captain Landon Donovan, who had a goal and nine assists, compared to Buddle's nine goals and two assists, in nine games before heading to South Africa.

With Buddle and Donovan away, Tristan Bowen and Jovan Kirovski stepped forward to lead the LA attack while the defense continued their astonishing improvement that began a year earlier. Eventual MLS Goalkeeper of the Year Donovan Ricketts kept seven clean sheets in the club's first 10 games, while Josh Saunders kept an eighth as the Galaxy threatened to shatter the MLS record for fewest goals allowed in league history. Playing in front of them, Omar Gonzalez continued to blossom into one of the top young defenders in MLS, earning a spot on the league's Best XI and being named the Galaxy's Defender of the Year, as well as a finalist for the MLS Defender of the Year award.

A 1-0 loss to Real Salt Lake in their final game before June's two-week World Cup break snapped the club's record start to the season but could not dampen the excitement that the Galaxy's stunning first half of the season had generated.

Early July saw the Galaxy welcome Buddle and Donovan, with the pair combining for the club's first goal just 19 minutes into a comprehensive 3-1 win over Seattle in front of a capacity crowd in Carson. However, the club struggled over the next two months, winning just two of their eight league matches while being eliminated from the U.S. Open Cup and CONCACAF Champions League.

With Real Salt Lake closing in on LA's position at the top of the Western Conference, the Galaxy received a welcome boost in mid-September with the return of David Beckham, who had been out since March with an Achilles injury. His return, combined with more timely goal scoring from Buddle and Donovan helped the Galaxy win five of their final seven regular season games and claim their first Supporters' Shield in eight years with a 2-1 win over FC Dallas on the final day of the season.

Despite taking the Supporters' Shield, the Galaxy were projected by many as underdogs in their Western Conference Semifinal Series against Seattle, who had been the best team in MLS over the second half of the year. However, an Edson Buddle wonder goal gave LA a 1-0 road win in the first leg at Qwest Field, while David Beckham set up a pair of goals a week later at The Home Depot Center as the Galaxy won 2-1 to take the series 3-1 on aggregate and set up a date with FC Dallas in the Western Conference Championship.

However, LA's amazing run would end there as Bruce Arena's side could not find a way past Kevin Hartman in the Dallas goal while David Ferreira, George John and Marvin Chavez each scored to give the visitors a 3-0 win and end the Galaxy's season one step shy of a return to MLS Cup.

2009 SEASON

Final Record: 12-6-12, 48 pts. (First, Western Conference)

The LA Galaxy snapped a three-year run of missing the postseason by winning the Western Conference Championship in 2009 and reaching MLS Cup. The Galaxy finished first in the Western Conference with a 12-6-12 record and dispatched Chivas USA and the Houston Dynamo in the Western Conference playoffs before falling on penalties to Real Salt Lake in MLS Cup 2009.

The Galaxy opened the season with a 2-1-9 record, including a 10-game unbeaten streak that saw the Galaxy go 2-0-8 following an early season loss to Colorado. But over the second half of the season, Bruce Arena's squad was able to turn many of those ties into wins and the club quickly vaulted up the Western Conference standings.

Landon Donovan was once again the attacking star for the Galaxy, scoring a team-best 12 goals to go along with six assists en route to being named the club and MLS Most Valuable Player. He was aided in the attack by Edson Buddle and Alan Gordon, as well as offseason acquisitions Jovan Kirovski and Mike Magee. During the campaign, Alecko Eskandarian was brought in to provide goals, while David Beckham returned from his loan spell at AC Milan to further bolster the LA attack.

But while that group was taking care of matters at one end of the field, it was in the defensive third that the biggest improvement was seen. First year goalkeeper Donovan Ricketts immediately became a fan favorite, combining with Josh Saunders for a club record 12 clean sheets and allowing 31 fewer goals than in the season before, setting a new MLS record.

That duo was helped out in large by a host of new faces, including 2009 MLS Rookie of the Year Omar Gonzalez, who combined with the 2008 Rookie of the Year Sean Franklin and his college teammate A.J. DeLaGarza to give the Galaxy one of the youngest and most talented backlines in MLS. Todd Dunivant and early season acquisition Gregg Berhalter provided a veteran influence in defense, as did the duo of Dema Kovalenko and Stefani Miglioranzi, who served as the link between the defense and the attack.

A 10-3-3 mark over the final four months of the regular season pushed the Galaxy to the top of the Western Conference standings for the first time since 2002 and set up a play-off meeting with Chivas USA.

Following a 2-2 draw in the opening game of the series, Landon Donovan scored to give the Galaxy a 1-0 win in front of a capacity crowd at The Home Depot Center and a berth in the Western Conference Championship against Houston.

That game was scoreless after 90 minutes and went to extra time, where Gregg Berhalter scored his first goal for the club to put LA up 1-0. Donovan added a late penalty to become the all-time leading scorer in the MLS Cup Playoffs, and send the Galaxy to MLS Cup 2009.

However, the dream of a third MLS Cup title would die in Seattle as, despite going ahead 1-0 through Mike Magee just before halftime, the Galaxy were unable to hold onto their lead. The score was tied after 90 minutes of regulation and 30 minutes of extra time, meaning that the match would be decided on penalties, where the Galaxy fell 5-4 to narrowly miss out on the MLS Cup championship.

2008 SEASON

Final Record: 8-13-9, 33 pts. (Sixth, Western Conference)

For the third consecutive season, the Galaxy failed to qualify for the MLS Cup Playoffs, finishing sixth in the Western Conference with a record of 8-13-9, despite scoring an MLS-best 55 goals on the season.

Despite a disappointing 4-0 loss to Colorado in the season opener, the Galaxy had a successful start to their first season under Ruud Gullit. Following their season opening loss, the club quickly found its footing and jumped to the top of the Western Conference standings. From May 18-June 14 the Galaxy won four of five games, scoring three or more goals in each win, to sit three points clear of their conference rivals. However, starting with a 3-3 home draw against Columbus on June 21, the Galaxy would go a club record 12 games (0-6-6) without a win and quickly faded from the postseason picture.

During that streak, on August 12, the club relieved General Manager Alexi Lalas of his responsibilities and Head Coach Ruud Gullit also left the club. A week later Bruce Arena was hired as the seventh coach in club history, bringing 2003 MLS Coach of the Year Dave Sarachan along with him as his Associate Head Coach.

That duo claimed their first win on September 20 with an emphatic 5-2 win over D.C. United, Arena's first club, with Landon Donovan scoring a hat trick and adding an assist. However, that result and a 3-2 win over Colorado in October were the Galaxy's only wins over the final four and a half months of the year and the club finished six points behind the final playoff spot, missing the postseason for the third straight season.

But despite the disappointing results, the 2008 season was full of individual honors for Galaxy players. Landon Donovan won the Budweiser MLS Golden Boot as the league's leading goalscorer with a career-high 20 goals to go along with nine assists. Donovan, who was also named the Galaxy's Most Valuable Player, had six multi-goal games in 2008 and was named the MLS Player of the Month in April and the MLS Player of the Week on four separate occasions. His fellow forward Edson Buddle was third in the league with 15 goals, which were also a career-high for the New York native. Both of those players were named to the MLS All-Star Team, which beat West Ham United 3-2 in Toronto, as was David Beckham who had five goals and a team-best 10 assists in his first full season with the Galaxy.

Sean Franklin, the Galaxy's first round pick in the 2008 MLS SuperDraft, was not named to the All-Star Team, but the Palmdale native did have an immediate impact on his new club. Franklin appeared in 27 games for the Galaxy and was named the club's Defender of the Year. Additionally, Franklin was named the Gatorade MLS Rookie of the Year, making him the first Galaxy player ever to win the award.

2007 SEASON

Final Record: 9-14-7, 34 pts. (Fifth, Western Conference)

For the second consecutive season, the Galaxy failed to qualify for the MLS Cup Playoffs, finishing fifth in the Western Conference with a record of 9-14-7.

The year began with a bang for LA as the club announced the signing of David Beckham in early January, making him the club's first-ever Designated Player. The England international agreed to join the club after the completion of his season with Real Madrid, meaning that he would miss the first half of his new club's season.

The Galaxy's schedule was weighed heavily toward the back end of the season, giving the club the opportunity to have Beckham in the lineup for more than half the season, but also creating a heavy schedule from mid-July on through the end of the campaign. The schedule had definite effects over the first three months of the season as LA, despite strong showings from Landon Donovan, who again led the team in scoring, Kyle Martino, Joe Cannon and rookie Ty Harden, stood at just 3-5-4 and had been knocked out of the U.S. Open Cup by the July All-Star break.

A July 21 friendly against Chelsea saw Beckham make his LA debut, but the team continued to struggle, despite drawing massive crowds in every market to which they traveled, and sat in last place in the Western Conference heading into mid-September when the tide began to turn.

Following a 2-2 draw at Real Salt Lake on Sept. 19, the Galaxy won five straight, with Gavin Glinton, Chris Klein, Edson Buddle, Carlos Pavan, Kyle Martino and Troy Roberts all scoring huge goals for the club to give the Galaxy a chance at postseason qualification. A draw with New York in the regular season home finale meant that Frank Yallop's squad would need a win in Chicago on the season's final day to reach the postseason. However, despite a spirited performance, the Fire grabbed a late goal to win 1-0 and end the Galaxy's 2007 campaign.

The Galaxy also took fans on a wild and memorable ride in the inaugural SuperLiga tournament, which pitted four MLS teams against their Mexican counterparts. Wins over Pachuca and FC Dallas, in a thrilling 6-5 encounter, saw the Galaxy win their group and set up a semifinal matchup with D.C. United. David Beckham scored his first-ever goal for the Galaxy, beating Troy Perkins with a freekick from 25 yards out, and then set up Landon Donovan to seal the win and set up a SuperLiga Final meeting with Pachuca. A first half own goal and an injury to Beckham could have been enough to kill off LA, but the players kept fighting and grabbed an equalizer with the final kick of regulation, as Chris Klein scored with an acrobatic overhead kick, sending the match to extra time. The Galaxy had the better of the play in the extra session but could not conjure up a winner, sending the match to penalties where Pachuca eventually came out victorious, winning 4-3 to win SuperLiga.

The 2007 season will also be remembered as the final season in the long and illustrious playing career of Cobi Jones. A true Galaxy legend, Jones retired after the 2007 season as the club's all-time leader in every statistical category for the club. The 37-year old reminded fans just how good he is with a series of sensational showings, perhaps none greater than his two-goal performance off the bench to earn LA a 2-2 draw with the Kansas City Wizards on July 7 after falling behind 2-0 early in the second half.

2006 SEASON

Final Record: 11-15-6, 39 pts. (Fifth, Western Conference)

The LA Galaxy finished the 2006 regular season as the fifth place team in Major League Soccer's Western Conference, ending the season with an 11-15-6 record and collecting 39 points. For the first time in club history, the Galaxy did not qualify for the MLS Playoffs, snapping the longest playoff streak in League history at ten seasons (1996-2005).

The year began with tragedy with the passing of the club's President and General Manager Doug Hamilton as he returned from Costa Rica after seeing the club play in the CONCACAF Champions' Cup. Just how much he meant to the Galaxy organization might not be as easy to understand. Hamilton was the architect of the Galaxy's two MLS Cups. A perennial candidate for MLS' Executive of the Year -- and the person for whom the league award is now named -- Hamilton played an integral part in bringing veteran players like Tyrone Marshall, Chris Albright and Landon Donovan to the Southland. His impact on the team -- and the void he left -- was immeasurable at the start of the '06 campaign.

Knowing that no one person could fill Hamilton's shoes, AEG's first step was to announce Alexi Lalas as the President and General Manager of the club. Lalas, who played for the Galaxy from 2001-2003, returned to the club as their top executive to oversee all business and soccer operations. He had spent the last year as President and General Manager of the New York Red Bulls (formerly the MetroStars) after serving as General Manager of the San Jose Earthquakes from 2004-2005. In addition, AEG promoted Tom Payne to Assistant General Manager to help oversee the business operations for the team.

On the field, Los Angeles opened the season looking to defend their 2005 MLS Cup championship, but a 1-0 loss to the New England Revolution foreshadowed the struggles to come as the club posted a 2-2-1 record over the first five games of the year. The season continued to slip away as the club went on a six-game losing streak, falling to last place in the conference with a 2-8-1 record.

On June 6, the Galaxy announced that head coach Steve Sampson had been relieved of his duties. A day later, the club introduced Canadian National Team and former San Jose Earthquakes head coach Frank Yallop as the club's new head coach, whose job would be to turn around the struggling side.

With Yallop at the helm, the Galaxy slowly began to respond going 0-2-2 in his first four games before stringing together the club's first three-game winning streak of the season. The team gained momentum and fought to make the playoffs, but a home-and-away series with FC Dallas to end the season proved too much as the teams split the two games, knocking L.A. out of the playoffs for the first time ever.

At The Home Depot Center, Los Angeles finished with the eleventh-best home record in MLS at 6-6-4. On the road, the Galaxy recorded the third-best record in the league with a 5-9-2 mark. The Galaxy posted a 7-10-3 record against fellow Western Division foes and a 4-5-3 record against teams outside its division.

Los Angeles led the league in attendance for the fourth consecutive time and seventh overall (1996, 1998, 2000, 2003, 2004, 2005, and 2006). The club welcomed 333,016 fans to the The Home Depot Center for an average of 20,814 per game, including three sellouts (4/1, 9/30 and 10/14). In addition, LA defeated the Houston Dynamo, 1-0, in front 70,550 at Reliant Stadium in a double header that also featured FC Barcelona (Spain) versus Club America (Mexico).

2005 SEASON

Final Record 13-13-6, 45 pts. (Fourth, Western Conference)

The Galaxy finished the regular season with a 13-13-6 record for 45 points and a fourth place finish in the Western Conference. The 2005 campaign can best be described as a season of ebbs and flows for the Galaxy, but with an impressive finish that saw the club win the U.S. Open Cup and MLS Cup championships.

By season's end, the team had finished exactly where it started – at .500 with a 13-13-6 record – including a stellar record of 10-3-3 at The Home Depot Center, third-best in MLS and an 11-8-1 record against Western Conference foes.

Los Angeles led the League in attendance for the sixth time, welcoming 387,256 fans to The Home Depot Center for an average of 24,204 per game.

In the offseason, Head Coach Steve Sampson and General Manager Doug Hamilton took charge of re-tooling the roster. The Galaxy acquired international reinforcements in Pablo Chinchilla (Costa Rica), Ednaldo da Conceicao (Brazil), Paulo Nagamura (Brazil), Guillermo "El Pando" Ramirez (Guatemala), Michael Umaña (Costa Rica), in addition to Americans Steve Cronin, Todd Dunivant and Herculez Gomez.

However, the biggest move was signing of U.S. National Team star Landon Donovan, preceded by the departure of Carlos Ruiz. In all, only 11 of the 28 players from the 2004 playoff roster remained as the team entered the 2005 playoffs.

A fast start, with only two losses through the first two months of the season (6-2-1) gave way to some difficult losses in June (1-3-2) and July (1-2-2). But it was during that time that the roster was ravaged by call-ups to national teams participating in the final round of CONCACAF qualifying to 2006 FIFA World Cup Germany.

The arrival of August provided yet another challenge, when the team entered the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup. Entering the prestigious knockout tournament in the fourth round, they defeated inter-city rivals Chivas USA 5-2, the San Jose Earthquakes 2-0 at Spartan Stadium, and the Minnesota Thunder 5-2, setting up the Galaxy's first ever Cup Final of any sort at The Home Depot Center. In the Open Cup Final, the Galaxy defeated FC Dallas 1-0 with a goal from Gomez, his sixth of the tournament.

In the playoffs, Los Angeles captured the club's second MLS Cup title with an unexpected run through the playoffs. The Galaxy opened by defeating the top seeded San Jose Earthquakes 3-1 at home and then earned a 1-1 draw on the road to advance 4-2 on aggregate. In the Western Conference Championship, the Galaxy beat the Colorado Rapids 2-0 with two strikes from Donovan to earn a fifth trip to the MLS Cup.

At the MLS Cup final, the unlikely hero was Guatemalan international Guillermo "El Pando" Ramirez, whose overtime volley propelled the Galaxy to their second championship in club history.

2004 SEASON

Final Record 11-9-10, 43 pts. (Second, Western Conference)

The Galaxy finished the regular season as the second place team in the Western Conference, ending the season with an 11-9-10 record and collecting 43 points in the process.

At The Home Depot Center, Los Angeles finished the season tied for the second best home record 8-2-5 in MLS. On the road, the Galaxy finished tied for the fourth best record in MLS at 3-7-5.

For the second consecutive season, the Galaxy topped Major League Soccer in average attendance with an impressive 23,809 per contest. In addition, the Galaxy became the first club in MLS history to draw more than 20,000 fans per game in thirteen of fifteen home games, including closing out the season with three consecutive sell out crowds for a total of five on the season.

The Galaxy jumped out to a quick start, going unbeaten in their first four games before finishing at 7-5-3, 24 pts over the first 15 games. It was stalwart forward Carlos Ruiz and offseason acquisitions, forward Jovan Kirovski and midfielder Andreas Herzog that sparked the club's fast start combining for 16 goals and seven assists. All three were later voted to the 2004 MLS All-Star squad along with teammates Chris Albright and Cobi Jones.

In the second half, the Galaxy won their first two games before going winless over the next seven games (0-2-5) and posted a 4-4-7 record for 19 points. On August 18, LA appointed former U.S. and Costa Rica National Team manager Steve Sampson as head coach. With seven games remaining in the season, Sampson needed only two games to get his first victory and helped the Galaxy clinch a playoff berth for the ninth straight season.

In the conference semifinal, the Galaxy lost the first leg on the road to the Colorado Rapids 1-0 before winning the return leg at home 2-0 to advance to the Western Conference Final. However, the Galaxy were unable to find a breakthrough against the home side, the Kansas City Wizards, losing 2-0 to end the club's postseason run.

2003 SEASON

Final Record 9-12-9, 36 pts. (Fourth, Western Conference)

The LA Galaxy finished the regular season as the fourth place team in the Western Conference, ending the season with a 9-12-9 record and collecting 36 points in the process. The 2003 season also marked the first time in Major League Soccer's eight year history that one team hosted both the Pepsi MLS All-Star Game and the MLS Cup final in the same season.

Los Angeles finished with a 9-3-3 record at home, the second-best home mark in MLS and led the league in attendance, drawing 329,752 fans to The Home Depot Center. That number was good enough for an average of 21,983, up 15.4 percent from the 19,047 they drew in 2002, the club's last season in the Rose Bowl.

Forced to play a league-record eight games at the start of the season on the road while construction was completed at The Home Depot Center, the defending MLS Cup Champions posted a 0-4-4 record over the first two months and went on to post an 0-9-6 road mark on the year.

In June, the team settled into a comfortable rhythm, posting a 3-1-2, including a record of 3-0-1 at the new cathedral for soccer in the Americas. July was a light month in league play for the Galaxy as the team spent nearly two weeks competing against some of the best club sides in the world at Peace Cup Korea 2003.

After returning stateside, the team ran off a 4-1-1 mark over the remainder of July and all of August, bolstered by a three-pronged strike force of Guatemalan Carlos Ruiz, Alejandro Moreno and mid-season acquisition, Diego Serna.

The Galaxy and The Home Depot Center presented the 2003 MLS All-Star Game on August 2. The All-Star Game was a hotly contested battle between a team of MLS All-Stars and Mexican club CD Guadalajara in front of a sold-out crowd of 27,000 that resulted in a 3-1 victory for the MLS side, thanks to MVP and hometown hero, Galaxy striker Carlos Ruiz.

In the last two months of the season, the Galaxy faded but were able to maintain their position in the MLS Cup Playoff race, despite posting losing records in September (1-3-0) and October (1-2-1). For the eighth time in club history, the Galaxy would qualify for the playoffs, only to come up against the top seeded San Jose Earthquakes.

In the first leg of the home-and-home, aggregate goal, conference semifinal at The Home Depot Center, the Galaxy would shock the Earthquakes 2-0. In the return leg in San Jose, LA would jump out to a 2-0 lead and a 4-0 aggregate goal lead, only for San Jose to respond in one of the best comebacks in MLS History, scoring five consecutive goals to knock LA out of the playoffs.

2002 SEASON

Final Record 16-9-3, 51 pts. (First, Western Conference)

The Galaxy captured their first MLS Cup Championship in 2002, defeating the New England Revolution, 1-0, on October 20 at Gillette Stadium. MLS MVP Carlos "El Pecadito" Ruiz scored the game-winning goal in the 113th minute, with assists from Tyrone Marshall and Chris Albright.

Signed just before the start of the season, Ruiz made huge waves in MLS by scoring a league-best 24 goals to become the first Galaxy player to win the league's MVP award. Ruiz's 24 goals on the season ranked fourth all-time in MLS and the striker also set a new league record for game-winning goals with nine strikes on the season.

The club finished their seventh MLS season with a league-leading 16-9-3 record and 51 points, claiming the Western Conference Championship and Supporters Shield. The Galaxy finished first in Western Conference play with an 8-5-3 record and in second place overall in conference play among all MLS teams. In non-conference play, Los Angeles finished second with a 8-4-0 record among Western Conference clubs, as well as second for the best non-conference record among all MLS teams.

At the Rose Bowl, Los Angeles finished the season with the second best home record 11-1-2 in MLS. On the road, the Galaxy finished tied for the fifth best record in MLS at 5-8-1.

LA also ranked second in the league in attendance for 2002, averaging 19,047 (up 10% from 2001) for a total of 289,663 fans at the Rose Bowl.

A slow start to the season saw the Galaxy play six straight overtime games from March 23 to May 4 and suffer a 5-0 loss to the MetroStars on June 15, the worst loss in club history. However, Head Coach Sigi Schmid changed the club's formation and refocused the defense, guiding the team to an 11-4-1 record for the balance of the season. The Galaxy also became the first team to win three consecutive games during the 2002 season and even went on to close out the season with four straight victories.

In the MLS Cup Playoffs, the Galaxy opened the conference semifinal against the Kansas City Wizards winning Game One in overtime 3-2 and Game Three 5-2, but lost Game Two 4-1 on the road to win the first to five points series 6-3. In the conference finals, the Galaxy swept past Colorado, winning Game One 4-0 at home and closing out the season with a 1-0 win in Game Two to advance to the championship.

Returning to the site of two previous MLS Cup defeats in Foxboro, Mass, the Galaxy looked to exercise a few ghosts against the New England Revolution. In overtime, off season acquisitions Ruiz, Marshall and Albright would combine for the game's only goal, giving the club its first MLS Cup Championship in three appearances.

Four days after their MLS Cup triumph, the Galaxy flew to Columbus for the U.S. Open Cup Final. Battling the fatigue of an overtime final and long travel, the Galaxy lost to the Crew 1-0 to miss out on the elusive Double.

2001 SEASON

Final Record: 14-7-5, 47 Points (First, Western Division)

The Galaxy finished their sixth MLS season with a record of 14-7-5, good for 47 points and first place in the Western Division and the third-best overall record in the league. The first place finish marked the fourth time the club has finished atop its division or conference. Despite a slow start, losing their first two matches of the season, the Galaxy battled back and finished the season on a high note, winning seven of their last nine games. At the Rose Bowl, Los Angeles finished tied for the third-best home record in the MLS at 9-3-1. They also had the third-best record on the road with a 5-4-4 mark. The Galaxy led the Western Division with a record of 7-3-0. Los Angeles also attained three milestones in 2001: their 300th goal, 100th victory and 1,000th point.

With a strong push by the Galaxy in 2001, the club advanced all the way to the MLS Cup, only to be defeated by the San Jose Earthquakes. Los Angeles, who defeated the Metrostars in the quarterfinals and the Chicago Fire in the semifinals to reach the MLS Cup, fell short in sudden death overtime, 2-1, to finish runner-up for the third time in MLS Cup.

The Galaxy established a team milestone on April 28, 2001, with their 300th goal. Cobi Jones, who scored the club's first goal on April 13, 1996, and is the team's all-time leading scorer, also established a personal milestone in this victory, 3-2, over the Colorado Rapids. The U.S. National Team star scored the 300th goal in club history in the 22nd minute. Jones took Peter Vagenas' pass, got a step on defender Lance Key and beat goalkeeper Adin Brown. With his second goal just before halftime, Jones became only the sixth player in league history to reach the 50-goal plateau. It was Jones' ninth multi-goal MLS game and his first since July 8, 2000 at Miami.

Los Angeles became the first team in MLS history to reach the 100-victory mark on June 23, 2001, in the 2-0 win over the Metrostars. The Galaxy, who won their inaugural game on April 13, 1996, when Cobi Jones and Arash Noamouz each scored in the 2-1 victory over the MetroStars, reached this mark at home in the Rose Bowl. Jones, along with Greg Vanney and Mauricio Cienfuegos, were the only remaining players from the first season's roster.

Despite falling in MLS Cup, the Galaxy were able to claim a championship, winning the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup. Danny Califf's golden goal in overtime gave the Galaxy a victory in the U.S. Open Cup championship, 2-1, over the New England Revolution on October 27 at Titan Stadium. The victory gives Los Angeles their first domestic championship. Alexi Lalas' golden goal in overtime gave the Los Angeles Galaxy a dramatic 1-0 U.S. Open Cup Semifinal victory over the Chicago Fire at Titan Stadium on August 22.

2000 SEASON

Final Record: 14-10-8, 50 points (Second, Western Division)

The Galaxy finished their fifth MLS season with a 14-10-8 record, good for 50 points and second place in the Western Division and the fifth-best overall record in the league. The runner-up finish marked only the second time in history the club had not finished in first place in its division or conference (the other time being 1997). A strong start (6-0-5) saw the Galaxy go unbeaten in 11 straight games, from March 18 to May 20, despite the club's lowest scoring season in five years (47 goals).

At the Rose Bowl, Los Angeles finished with the seventh-best home record in MLS at 8-3-5. On the road, the Galaxy recorded the third-best record in the league with a 6-7-3 mark. The Galaxy posted a 5-3-4 record against fellow Western Division foes and had the second-best record (behind Chicago) among MLS squads against teams outside its division (9-7-4).

Los Angeles led the league in attendance for the third time (1996 and 1998 were the others), welcoming 326,392 fans to the Rose Bowl for an average of 20,400 per game. The average attendance was up nearly 3,000 fans per game over 1999.

Despite a strong run by the Galaxy in 2000, which saw the club advance to the MLS Semifinals for the fourth time in five seasons, the team fell one game short of returning for its third MLS Cup. Los Angeles was defeated by the Kansas City Wizards in Game Three of the semifinals, losing in regulation and the sudden death mini-game, 1-0. The Galaxy fell for only the second time in a semifinal series, with both defeats coming at the hands of the eventual MLS Cup champions (Chicago Fire in 1998 was the other). In spite of not having home field advantage, the Galaxy tied Game One in Kansas City, 0-0, and returned to the Rose Bowl for a sudden death overtime win, 2-1. The victory in Game Two meant the Galaxy needed only a win or a tie to advance to the finals, but the Wizards came up big behind league MVP and Pepsi Goalkeeper of the Year Tony Meola. Earlier in the quarterfinals, Los Angeles dumped the Tampa Bay Mutiny, 2-0, to advance, marking the fourth time the club had swept a playoff series.

1999 SEASON

Final Record: 20-12, 54 points (First, Western Conference)

The Galaxy finished the season with a 20-12 record for 54 points and earned the Western Conference regular season title for the second consecutive season and third time in club history (1996, 1998 & 1999). A slow start to the season (2-3) and a lackluster performance from MLS' highest scoring team in 1998 (85 goals) saw head coach Octavio Zambrano relieved of his duties on April 22. In his place, Los Angeles named local college legend, Sigi Schmid as the club's new head coach. In his first year as head coach, Schmid led the Galaxy to a 17-9 record good for 49 points. After Schmid joined the Galaxy, Los Angeles went through a season-long transformation from a team with potential to a berth in MLS Cup '99, where they lost to D.C. United 2-0. For that, Schmid was named All Sport Coach of the Year. At the Rose Bowl, Los Angeles finished the season with the third-best home record 12-4 in MLS. On the road, the Galaxy was 8-8. The Galaxy tied for the best record against conference opponents with a 13-7 record and as the top club versus the East, notching a 7-5 record.

Los Angeles had four players who ranked among league leaders in several categories. Cobi Jones finished 16th among league scorers with eight goals and eight assists, good for 24 points. Jones, along with Carlos Hermosillo, finished tied for 15th among goal scorers with eight goals apiece. Mauricio Cienfuegos was among the league leaders in assists for the fourth year in a row as he recorded a personal-high 17 helpers to finish tied for second Cienfuegos also finished first in game-winning assists with eight. Goalkeeper Kevin Hartman had yet another record-breaking season, as he finished first among MLS netminders in goals-against-average (0.91), wins (20) and minutes played (2,870) and tied for first in shutouts (11) and games played (32).

In addition to Schmid's coaching accolade, the Galaxy took home lots of hardware from MLS in '99. Defender Robin Fraser and midfielder Cienfuegos were both named to the AT&T Best IX for the third time, while Hartman earned his first nod. Also, the Galaxy keeper was named Pepsi Goalkeeper of the Year and Fraser won the BIC Defender of the Year award.

1998 SEASON

Final Record: 24-8, 68 points (First, Western Conference)

The Galaxy started the 1998 campaign where it left off the 1997 regular season, on a hot streak, winning its first nine consecutive games to give the club an MLS-record 15-game regular season win streak. Los Angeles went on to finish the season with a franchise-best 24-8 overall mark, matching the league record for most wins in a season set by D.C. United on the same day (9/24/98). The 24 wins earned the Galaxy the Western Conference regular season title for the second time in the club's short three-year history (also 1996).

The club was 11-5 at home and an MLS-record 13-3 away from the Rose Bowl. Los Angeles enjoyed its most success against the Western Conference, going 16-4 (.800) against the West (8-2 at home, 8-2 on the road). The Galaxy also finished as the league's hottest team with an 8-2 mark in their last 10 games. The club went 6-4 in their final 10 home games, but won eight of their last 10 road tilts (8-2).

With 85 goals scored in 32 regular season games, the Galaxy demolished the MLS single-season scoring record of 70 goals (D.C. United in 1997). In fact, the Galaxy posted at least a two-goal margin of victory in 14 of its last 19 wins, including a three-goal margin in nine of the 19 victories. The Galaxy also recorded an MLS season-high 104 helpers for a total of 274 points (85-104=274). The club averaged 2.66 goals-per-game, including 3.38 GPG when recording a victory.

The Galaxy finished with not only the best scoring squad in Major League Soccer history tallying 85 goals, but also with the best defense, allowing a mere 44 goals with seven shutouts. The goal total marked the second time in the club's history that it held its opponents to 44 strikes. The Galaxy defensive corps allowed 1.38 goals per game, holding 21 of its 32 opponents to one goal or less in regulation. Furthermore, the 44 goals allowed by the Galaxy tied for second-best in MLS history (Columbus allowed 41 in 1997).

Galaxy goalkeeper Kevin Hartman was among league leaders in several goalkeeping categories. The 6-1, 174-pound netminder led the league in wins (22), tied for second in shutouts (7), and finished second among minutes leaders (2,544). Hartman, also known as "El Gato" for his catlike instincts around the net, finished second in the league with a 1.38 goals-against average.

The Galaxy posted their 24th win with a 1-0 victory in the season finale against the Chicago Fire, which proved to be a preview of the Western Conference Final. Los Angeles recorded an MLS-record 68 points, falling short of earning a full three points in just two of their 24 wins.

1997 SEASON

Final Record: 16-16, 44 points (Second, Western Conference)

Although the Galaxy started its season with a 1-7 record, the club was able to go 15-9 the rest of the way to qualify for the playoffs. Galaxy management relieved head coach Lothar Osiander of his duties on June 10, and the team proceeded to win five of their next seven games under former assistant coach Octavio Zambrano. Los Angeles swept all five matches in July, moving into fourth place in the Western Conference. The club held on to the last playoff spot until they made their rapid climb up the conference ladder in August and September.

The Galaxy went 11-5 after the All-Star break, earning 28 points to move from fifth to second in the Western Conference with 44 points to earn its second postseason berth. The club also hit the back of the net more frequently, outscoring opponents 38-22 during the 16 post-All-Star contests.

Los Angeles defeated Kansas City 2-0 at the Rose Bowl on September 28 to win its sixth consecutive game and capture second place in the Western Conference. The Galaxy offense went into high gear during the streak, outscoring opponents 18-5. The win over the Wizards put Los Angeles at a .500 record for the first time during the season. The club finished as the hottest team in the MLS, winning 10 of its last 15 games, including the final six in a row.

Under Zambrano, the Galaxy recorded a 13-7 record. The club also showed scoring prowess, outscoring its opponents 46-28 in the 20 games after the Ecuadorian native took over the coaching reins. The Galaxy earned just seven points in its first 12 games, but subsequently recorded 37 points in 20 games under Zambrano and earned home field advantage in the first round of the playoffs against the Dallas Burn.

The Galaxy's defense was once again among the league's best. The club finished the regular season giving up only 44 goals for a 1.38 goal average. Los Angeles' stingy defense was second behind the Columbus Crew (41 goals, 1.28). The Galaxy defense logged nine shutouts to lead the league just ahead of the Crew with eight and the Colorado Rapids with seven.

1996 SEASON

Final Record: 19-13, 49 points (First, Western Conference)

Divide the inaugural Major League Soccer season into thirds when talking about the Galaxy in 1996. Los Angeles won 12 games to begin the season, but a rough mid-season stretch where the Galaxy lost five straight games kept fans on the edge of their seats throughout the season. Finally, a late season surge enabled Los Angeles to capture the 1996 Western Conference crown with a 19-13 mark (49 pts.).

The Galaxy continued their hot streak in the playoffs, defeating the San Jose Clash 2-1 in a three-game playoff series prior to dispatching the Dallas Burn 2-0 on their way to the MLS title game. However, it was not meant to be as the Galaxy lost to D.C. United at MLS Cup '96, 3-2, in overtime at Foxboro Stadium. Despite the heartbreaking loss, the Galaxy returned home to a hero's welcome.

Ecuadorian striker Eduardo "El Tanque" Hurtado scorched opposing defenses in 1996, tallying 21 goals and seven assists for 49 points. The 6-3, 200-pound forward used his imposing physical size and nice touch around the goal to finish tied for second in MLS scoring. Two key reasons for Hurtado's success up front were the play of midfielders Mauricio Cienfuegos and Cobi Jones. Cienfuegos, a key member of El Salvador's National Team, blossomed into one of the MLS' elite playmakers. Jones' versatility allowed him to play in the midfield and score goals up front.

Mexican National Team goalkeeper Jorge Campos showed why he is considered one of the world's best goalkeepers, ranking first in MLS with a 1.20 goals against average. Campos, whose acrobatic style of play and colorful apparel have made him one of the world's most famous goalkeepers, also saw some time at forward and registered one assist. Campos attributed some of his statistical success to central defenders Dan Calichman and Robin Fraser. Calichman, a veteran of Japan's famed J-League, and Fraser, a physical player who brought great composure to Los Angeles's back line, provided the Galaxy with an experienced and organized defense. Fraser was joined by Hurtado and Cienfuegos on the inaugural MLS Best XI.

Thanks to Campos, Jones, Hurtado, Cienfuegos, Fraser, Calichman, and the other members of the 1996 squad, the Los Angeles Galaxy captured the attention of soccer fans throughout the country and around the world.

CONCACAF CHAMPIONS LEAGUE

Starting in August 2008, CONCACAF debuted the CONCACAF Champions League to decide who would be crowned the best club team in the region and represent CONCACAF in the FIFA World Club Cup.

The Galaxy were first entered in the CONCACAF Champions League in July 2010. As the reigning MLS Cup runner-up, the Galaxy were drawn into the Preliminary Round of the competition, where they met the Puerto Rico Islanders. LA were shocked in the first leg at home, losing 4-1, leaving them an uphill climb heading into the second leg on the road in Puerto Rico. The Galaxy were able to win that game 2-1 with Sean Franklin scoring the game-winning-goal for his first-ever goal for the club, but it was not enough and LA were eliminated by a score of 5-3 on aggregate.

After winning the Supporters' Shield in 2010, Bruce Arena's squad once again qualified for the Champions League, this time bypassing the Preliminary Round and being drawn into Group A with LA Alajuelense of Costa Rica, Club Motagua of Honduras and Monarcas Morelia from Mexico.

LA quickly raced out to the top spot in the group, winning home games over Motagua and Alajuelense before heading to Mexico to face Morelia. Looking for their first-ever win in Mexico in an official game, the Galaxy led 1-0 and appeared to take a 2-1 lead in the 90th minute, only to see Robbie Keane's goal waved off at one end of the field while the hosts went down the field and scored a winner of their own, stealing three points from the Galaxy.

Another road loss, this time in Costa Rica to Alajuelense, left the Galaxy in need of a win at home against Morelia in order to stay alive in the competition. They were able to get just that with Juninho scoring early in second half stoppage time to give LA a 2-1 victory. That win allowed the Galaxy to go to Honduras for the final group game knowing that a win would see them become just the second MLS team to win their group in the competition. Juninho was once again the hero, scoring a first half goal to give LA the 1-0 win that allowed them to finish in first place in the group on tiebreakers.

The Galaxy continue their quest for the 2011-12 CONCACAF Champions League title in March with a quarterfinal series against Toronto FC. If they can advance past that round, they will face the winner of the series between Santos Laguna and Seattle Sounders FC in the semifinals at the end of March and early April with the finals being held later that month.

In addition to playing in the 2011-12 Champions League, the Galaxy have also qualified for the 2012-13 edition of the tournament. CONCACAF unveiled a change to the format of the tournament in January 2012, announcing that the Preliminary Round had been eliminated and that the 24 qualifying teams will be divided into eight groups of three. All teams will play four Group Stage games with the eight group winners advancing to the quarterfinals next spring.

CHAMPIONS CUP

Prior to the creation of the CONCACAF Champions League, CONCACAF had hosted the Champions Cup every year since 1962. MLS teams began entering the competition in 1997 and did so for the next 12 years until the final installment of the tournament was completed in April 2008.

The Galaxy qualified for the Champions Cup five times from 1997-2008 and became the second MLS team to win it when they did so in January 2001.

After winning the Western Conference Championship in 1996, the Galaxy were entered into the 1997 Champions Cup where they would go on to reach the Final against Mexican side Cruz Azul. LA reached the final of the then 16-team tournament by defeating Santos Laguna (Mexico) 4-1 in the first round and knocking off Luis Angel Firpo (El Salvador) 2-1 in the quarterfinals. The Galaxy then defeated MLS rival D.C. United 1-0 in their own stadium in the semifinals to qualify for the Champions Cup Final. However, despite taking an early 2-0 lead over Cruz Azul in the Final, the Galaxy gave up five straight goals and eventually fell 5-3.

LA was back in the Champions Cup in 1999, but their involvement was short-lived as they fell to Mexican side Necaxa on penalties in a Play-In Game. However, one year later the Galaxy were able to make it back to the Champions Cup Final and went one step further, winning the tournament by defeating Olimpia of Honduras 3-2 in the final at Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum on January 21, 2001. The Galaxy reached the Champions Cup Final by edging past Real Espana of Honduras and D.C. United in the quarterfinals and semifinals respectively, with both wins coming via penalties.

In the final, Danilo Tosello gave the Central Americans a 1-0 lead after 34 minutes, only for Ezra Hendrickson to equalize two minutes later for LA. Two minutes later the Galaxy were in front as Cobi Jones tallied, giving LA a 2-1 halftime lead. However, just six minutes after the break, the Honduran side equalized through Robert Lima, much to the chagrin of the Galaxy faithful in attendance. But with the clock, creeping toward full time and the Galaxy appearing to be heading to extra time for the third straight game, Hendrickson notched his second goal of the contest, finishing a pass from Mauricio Cienfuegos, in the 78th minute to give LA a 3-2 lead which they would hold until the final whistle.

The Galaxy were back in the Champions Cup in 2003, facing CD Motagua of Honduras in the Round of 16. LA advanced through that series, claiming a 2-2 draw on the road before returning home and winning 1-0 in the second leg on a dramatic Alexi Lalas goal for a 3-2 win on aggregate. But that would be as far as the Galaxy would go as they were once again eliminated by Necaxa in the quarterfinals, falling 6-2 on aggregate. LA lost the first game 4-1 in Fullerton, Calif. before falling 2-1 in the return leg in Mexico.

LA qualified for the Champions Cup for the final time in 2006 when they fell to Deportivo Saprissa of Costa Rica in the quarterfinals. Despite looking like a team still in the early stages of preseason - and facing a team that placed third in the FIFA Club World Championship barely two months earlier - the Galaxy managed to scrape out a scoreless draw with Saprissa in the first leg of their quarterfinal at The Home Depot Center. In the return leg in Costa Rica on March 8, the Galaxy took a 2-0 lead into the half behind goals from Landon Donovan and Josh Gardner, but they could not hang on and dethrone the defending CONCACAF champion, falling 3-2 in extra time.

In addition to playing regular season games and traditional tournaments such as the CONCACAF Champions League, SuperLiga and the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup, the Galaxy also play friendlies in and out of season against teams from outside of MLS. Since 1996, the Galaxy have played in nearly 90 of these games, compiling a record of 38-23-27. In 2011, the Galaxy went 2-1-3 in international friendlies, playing to a 2-2 draw with Mexico's Club Tijuana before falling 4-3 on penalties in a preseason friendly in San Diego while also going 0-1-1 against Real Madrid and Manchester City as part of the Herbalife World Football Challenge. Following the completion of the MLS season, the Galaxy embarked on a three-nation postseason tour, winning in Indonesia and the Philippines before playing to a 2-2 draw in Australia against the Melbourne Victory, beating them 4-3 on penalties.

The LA Galaxy Academy is the official youth development program of the LA Galaxy. Officially launched in April 2007 with the goal of identifying and training the best young talent in the region and enabling people to achieve their life goals through the sport of soccer, the Academy features U-12, U-13, U-14, U-15, U-16 and U-18 teams under the tutelage of Chris Klein, who was named the Senior Director of the Galaxy Academy in December 2010.

The LA Galaxy Academy enables people to achieve their life goals through soccer. With the purpose of becoming the best soccer Academy in the United States, the Galaxy Academy U-16 and U-18 teams began play in the U.S. Soccer Development Academy, which features the top youth clubs from across the United States, in 2008.

The Galaxy U-16's reached the Development Academy Playoffs during their first season while the U-18's qualified for the post-season during the 2009/10 season, their second year of play. Last summer, the Galaxy U-16's once again reached the Academy Playoffs and were crowned U-16 National Champions for the first time ever after beating PA Classics 4-1 behind goals from Justin Dhillon, Sean Dhillon, Drew Murphy and Willie Raygoza.

The Academy also annually competes in the Generation adidas Cup, winning the U-17 competition for the first time in 2011 while also competing at the U-15 level. That same year, the Galaxy also began playing in the Southern California Developmental Soccer League, fielding U-12, U-13, U-14 and U-15 teams.

The primary objective of the Galaxy Youth Academy is to identify and develop local players who can make an impact as professionals with the Galaxy and contribute to the winning traditions of Major League Soccer's most storied franchise. The club strives to inspire in all Academy players discipline, character, respect and excellence both on and off the field. These qualities will assist players in achieving their personal goals and produce players worthy of wearing the Galaxy uniform. In addition to the personal growth of each of our Academy players, successful Academy teams will enhance the Galaxy brand in the local youth soccer community further contributing to the growth of the club.

The LA Galaxy Youth Academy provides an ideal training environment for developing players and gives those players the tools to succeed in the game at the next level. Players registered for at least 12 months in the Galaxy's Academy become eligible to sign a professional contract with the club as a Homegrown Player, without entering the MLS SuperDraft.

Since the formation of the Academy, the Galaxy have signed three players, Tristan Bowen, the first player in MLD history to sign directly from an Academy, Jack McBean, who became the youngest player in club history ever to score a goal, and Jose Villarreal, who was signed by the club in December. All three of those players, as well as a number of other players such as Justin Dhillon, Willie Raygoza, Mario Rodriguez, Jaime Villarreal and Riley Wolfe have received call-ups to various U.S. Youth National Teams since joining the Academy.

At all levels, Galaxy Academy teams train a minimum of three days a week in addition to their schedule of games. Additionally, the Academy is fully funded by the club, meaning that there are no costs involved for players, who receive expert coaching to go along with professional level equipment and training facilities.

Eddie Soto

Head Coach U-18's

An Assistant Coach at UCLA with more than 10 years of college coaching experience, Eddie Soto is in his third season as the Galaxy Academy's U-18 Head Coach. A native of Long Beach, Calif., Soto has spent the last seven years as an Assistant Coach for the Bruins, helping them reach the 2005 College Cup Final in his first year with the program. In 2011, the Bruins reached the College Cup Semifinals before falling on penalties to eventual champion North Carolina.

The second leading scorer in the history of Cal State Fullerton, Soto was a two-time All-American for the Titans. He scored 38 goals in his three years of college soccer, including a school record 18 as a senior in 1994. He helped Fullerton reach the NCAA Tournament quarterfinals that year, one year after leading them to the College Cup Semifinals for the first time in school history.

He began his college coaching career as an Assistant Coach for the women's soccer team at Long Beach City College in 1997, before returning to his alma mater as an assistant coach in 2001. Soto also spent time as an assistant coach for the women's soccer team at Long Beach State before joining Jorge Salcedo's staff at UCLA in 2006.

An assistant for the Galaxy Academy U-16's in 2009 before becoming the U-18 head coach in 2010, Soto was drafted by the MetroStars in the 1996 MLS Inaugural Player Draft and was then taken by San Jose in the 1998 MLS Supplemental Draft. He also played for the L.A. Salsa and Orange County Zodiac of the USISL.



Kenny Arena

Head Coach U-16's

A former MLS player and an Assistant Coach for the UCLA men's soccer team, Kenny Arena is in his fourth season as the Galaxy Academy's U-16 Head Coach. A native of Charlottesville, Va., Arena played at the University of Virginia before being selected by the MetroStars in the Fourth Round of the 2003 MLS SuperDraft. He spent two years with the MetroStars before joining D.C. United for the 2005 season.

He moved to the coaching realm in 2006 as a volunteer coach with the University of Virginia before being hired at George Mason University in 2007. After one season with the Patriots, Arena joined Jorge Salcedo's staff at UCLA, helping the Bruins win the Pac-10 title in 2008 and 2009, and reach the NCAA Tournament in each of his four years with the program, including a College Cup Semifinal berth in 2011.

A former member of the U.S. Youth National Team setup, Arena, who is the son of Galaxy General Manager and Head Coach Bruce Arena, played for his country at the 2001 World Youth Championships, scoring one goal at the tournament.

Prior to joining the Galaxy, the Carterton, England native had spent the previous six years helping to develop some of the top young players in Southern California as the Director of Coaching at the Newport Mesa Soccer Club and the Technical Director at the Tustin Premier Soccer Club. STRUCTURE:

The 19 MLS teams are divided into two conferences:

Eastern Conference – Chicago Fire, Columbus Crew, D.C. United, Houston Dynamo, Sporting Kansas City, Montreal Impact, New England Revolution, New York Red Bulls, Philadelphia Union, Toronto FC.

Western Conference – Chivas USA, Colorado Rapids, FC Dallas, LA Galaxy, Portland Timbers, Real Salt Lake, San Jose Earthquakes, Seattle Sounders FC, Vancouver Whitecaps FC.

SCHEDULE:

Each team plays a 34-game regular season schedule; 17 home games, 17 away games.

Western Conference – 24 in-conference + 10 out-of-conference games:

- Western Conference teams will play each West opponent three times (24 games):
 - o West teams will play four conference opponents twice at home and once away
 - o They will play the other four conference opponents once at home and twice away.
 - o The home and away games will be reversed in 2013.
- Western Conference teams will play each East opponent once each (10 games):
 - o Five of these will be at home and five will be away.
 - o The East opponents each team faces at home and away will be reversed in 2013.

Eastern Conference – 25 in-conference + 9 out-of-conference games:

- Eastern Conference teams will play 25 games against other East teams:
 - o East teams will play seven conference opponents three times each (21 games) and
 - o Two conference opponents twice each (four games).
- Eastern Conference teams will play each West opponent once each (9 games):
 - o Some will play four at home and five away while others will play five at home and four away.

The West opponents each team faces at home and away will be reversed in 2013.

POINT SYSTEM:

Teams will receive three points for a win, one point for a tie and zero points for a loss.

REFEREES:

All referees in MLS are either USSF (United States Soccer Federation) or CSA (Canadian Soccer Association) National Referees. All MLS games played in the US will be assigned by USSF and all games played in Canada will be assigned by CSA.

GAME CLOCK:

The official game time for all Major League Soccer games will be managed on the field by the referee. If necessary, the referee may also allot extra time (a.k.a. "stoppage time") at the end of each period (first half, second half, and if applicable, first overtime period and second overtime period during playoff matches) to allow for injuries, time-wasting or other disturbances.

The stadium clock will display the time from 0:00 to 45:00 and from 45:00 to 90:00 (plus stoppage time where applicable in each half). For statistical purposes, the minutes for goals, substitutions, yellow cards, etc., will be listed from the first minute until the 90th minute. A goal scored at 15 minutes 10 seconds will be listed as having been scored in the 16th minute. Events occurring during stoppage time will follow the international norm by being demarcated with a "+" sign and the extra minutes. For example, a goal scored three minutes into first half stoppage time will be officially identified as happening at "48+."

GAME DAY ROSTERS:

Each team can nominate 18 players for a game day roster. Teams are allowed three substitutions per game.

CAUTIONS AND SUSPENSIONS:

A player will be suspended for one game upon receiving his fifth yellow card – regardless of the nature of the infraction that resulted in his being awarded a yellow card. A second suspension of one game would result after the awarding of an additional three cards, as would a third suspension after the awarding of card number eleven. With the "Good Behavior" incentive, it is possible for a player to have a caution expunged. If a player goes three games without receiving a yellow card, after an initial warning, the player will have one yellow card expunged. A player may take advantage of the "Good Behavior" incentive only once throughout the season.

MLS CUP PLAYOFFS FORMAT

WHO QUALIFIES:

Ten teams, the top five in points from each conference at the end of the regular season, qualify for the 2012 MLS Cup Playoffs.

The fourth and fifth place teams in each conference will play a single knockout game, the winner of which will advance to the Conference Semifinals and face the first place team in the conference.

The four Conference Semifinals will be decided by two-game aggregate series, with the lower seed hosting the first leg and the higher seed hosting the second leg. If the aggregate score is tied after 180 minutes of play, two 15-minute extra time periods will be played in their entirety, followed by penalty kicks, if necessary.

The two Conference Championships will be decided by a two-game aggregate series, with the lower seed hosting the first leg and the higher seed hosting the second leg. If the aggregate score is tied after 180 minutes of play, two 15-minute extra time periods will be played in their entirety, followed by penalty kicks, if necessary.

MLS Cup will be a single championship match hosted by the higher seed. If the score is tied after 90 minutes of play, two 15-minute extra time periods will be played in their entirety, followed by penalty kicks, if necessary.

TEAM-STANDINGS TIE-BREAKING PROCEDURES

The team awarded the highest position in the MLS standings will be the team with the greatest number of points (three points for a win, one point for a tie, zero points for a loss). In the event that two teams finish the regular season with an equal number of points, the following system will be used to break the tie:

- 1) The highest position shall be awarded to the team with the better win/loss record in current regular season games against all other teams equal in points. (head-to-head competition)
- 2) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team with the greater goal difference against all other teams during the regular season. (goal differential)
- 3) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team scoring the greatest number of total goals against all other teams during the regular season. (total goals)
- 4) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the procedures described in this section shall be applied only to games played on the road by each team against all other teams during the regular season. (road 1-3)
- 5) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the procedures described in this section shall be applied only to games played at home by each team against all other teams during the regular season. (home 1-3)
- 6) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team with the fewest team disciplinary points in the League Fair Play table during the regular season.
- 7) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position in the standings shall be determined by the toss of a coin.
- 8) The first tiebreaker in a three-way tie is also head-to-head, but it is determined via points-per-game versus the other two teams. If two teams are tied in points-per-game head-to-head, the next tie breaker is goal difference.

NOTE: If two teams remain tied after another teams with the same number of points advances during any step, the tie breaker reverts to step 1 of the two-team format.

I. MLS ROSTER COMPOSITION

A Major League Soccer club's first team roster is comprised of up to 30 players. All 30 players are eligible for selection to each 18-player game-day squad during the regular season and playoffs.

Salary & Budget:

- Players occupying roster spots 1-20 count against the club's 2012 salary budget of \$2,810,000, and are referred to collectively as the club's Salary Budget Players.
 - o Roster spots 19 and 20 are not required to be filled, and teams may spread their salary budget across only 18 Salary Budget Players. A minimum salary budget charge will be imputed against a team's salary budget for each unfilled senior roster slot below 18.
 - o The maximum budget charge for a single player is \$350,000.*
 - o A Designated Player over the age of 23 counts as \$350,000 against the club's salary budget, unless the player joins his club in the middle of the season, in which case his budget charge will be \$175,000.
 - o A Designated Player 20 years old or younger** (referred to as Young Designated Players or Young DPs) counts as \$150,000 against the club's salary budget
 - o A Designated Player 21-23 years old** counts as \$200,000 against the club's salary budget.
 - o The budget charge for the midseason signing of a Young DP is \$150,000 and this amount cannot be lowered with allocation funds.
 - o Clubs will not have to buy the third DP roster slot to accommodate a Young Designated Player whereas clubs are normally required to buy that slot for a one-time fee of \$250,000.
 - o Clubs are responsible for all amounts above the budget charge for all Designated Players.

* See section entitled Allocation Money below, under Player Acquisition Mechanisms, for details on buying down a player's budget charge.

** Age of player is determined by year (not date) of birth.

- Players occupying roster spots 21-30 do not count against the club's salary budget, and are referred to collectively as the club's Off-Budget Players (maximum of 10 per team).
 - o All Generation adidas players are Off-Budget players.
 - o Players occupying roster spots 1-24 will earn at least \$44,000 in 2012.
 - o Players occupying roster spots 25-30 will earn at least \$33,750 in 2012.
 - o Clubs may elect to leave up to two of these roster spots (25-30) vacant and use \$35,000 for each empty spot as allocation money.
 - o Clubs may sign up to two Homegrown Players contracts above the minimum salary and similar to Generation adidas player contract amounts.

Age Designations:

- Any player making \$33,750 must be under the age 25 (does not turn 25 or older in 2012).

Domestic/International:

- In 2012, a total of 152 international slots are divided among the 19 clubs. Each club began with eight international slots, which are tradable. There is no limit on the number of international slots on each club's roster.
 - o The remaining roster slots must belong to domestic players. For clubs based in the United States, a domestic player is either a U.S. citizen, a permanent resident (green card holder) or the holder of other special status (e.g., refugee or asylum status).
- The three MLS clubs based in Canada – Montreal Impact, Toronto FC and Vancouver Whitecaps FC – began with eight international slots, but their domestic slots may be filled with either Canadian or U.S. domestic players.
 - o MLS clubs based in Canada are required to have a minimum of three Canadian domestic players on their rosters.
 - o Players with the legal right to work in Canada are considered Canadian domestic players (i.e., Canadian citizen, permanent resident, part of a protected class).

NOTE: The terms Homegrown and Generation adidas are used to describe mechanisms by which players are acquired. They are not roster designations. All players' roster slots are determined by their compensation and/or age as outlined above.

II. PLAYER ACQUISITION MECHANISMS

MLS teams may acquire players and add them to their rosters via the following mechanisms:

(A) ALLOCATION RANKING

The allocation ranking is the mechanism used to determine which MLS club has first priority to acquire a U.S. National Team player who signs with MLS after playing abroad, or a former MLS player who returns to the League after having gone to a club abroad for a transfer fee. The allocation rank–ings may also be used in the event two or more clubs file a request for the same player on the same day when the discovery period opens in December. The allocations will be ranked in reverse order of finish for the 2011 season, taking playoff performance into account.

Once the club uses its allocation ranking to acquire a player, it drops to the bottom of the list. A ranking can be traded, provided that part of the compensation received in return is the other club's ranking. At all times, each club is assigned one ranking. The rankings reset at the end of each MLS League season.

Allocation Money

Allocation money is a resource available to clubs in addition to their respective salary budgets.

A club may receive allocation money for:

- (1) failure to qualify for the MLS Cup Playoffs;
- (2) the transfer of a player to a club outside of MLS for value;
- (3) expansion status;
- (4) qualification for the CONCACAF Champions League;
- (5) trading in up to two Off-Budget roster spots;
- (6) funds from purchased third designated player roster spots.

Each year the MLS Competition Committee determines the allocation amount to be made available to each club. Allocation money can be traded by clubs. Allocation money does not count against a club's salary budget and can be used:

- To sign players new to MLS (that is, a player who did not play in MLS during the previous season).
- To re-sign an existing MLS player, subject to League approval.
- To "buy-down" a player's salary budget charge below the League maximum of \$350,000.
- In connection with the exercise of an option to purchase a player's rights or the extension of a player's contract for the second year provided the player was new to MLS in the immediately prior year.

NOTE: To protect the interests of MLS and its clubs during discussions with prospective players or clubs in other leagues, amounts of allocation money held by each club will not be shared publicly.

(B) DESIGNATED PLAYER

The Designated Player Rule allows clubs to acquire up to three players whose salaries exceed their budget charges, with the club bearing financial responsibility for the amount of compensation above each player's budget charge. Designated Player slots may be used to acquire players new to MLS or to retain current MLS players, subject to League approval.

In 2012, a Designated Player over the age of 23** will carry a salary budget charge of \$350,000, unless the player joins his club in the middle of the season, in which case his budget charge will be \$175,000.

A Designated Player 20 years old or younger** counts as \$150,000 against the club's salary budget and a Designated Player 21-23 years old counts as \$200,000 against the club's salary budget.

Clubs have the option of "buying down" the budget charge of a Designated Player with allocation money. The reduced charge may not be less than \$150,000.

The budget charge for the midseason signing of a young Designated Player (23 years old and younger) is \$150,000 and this amount cannot be lowered with allocation funds.

Each club has two Designated Player slots and clubs are allowed to "purchase" a third Designated Player slot for a one-time fee of \$250,000 that will be dispersed in the form of allocation money to all clubs that do not have three Designated Players. Clubs will not have to buy the third DP roster slot to accommodate Designated Players 23 years old and younger.

Designated Player slots are not tradable.

** Age of player is determined by year (not date) of birth.

(C) SUPERDRAFT

The 2012 MLS SuperDraft, held Jan. 12 in Kansas City, Mo., consisted of two rounds of 19 picks for a total of 38 player selections. A supplemental draft was held Jan. 17 via teleconference and consisted of four rounds of 19 picks.

The majority of draft prospects are NCAA college seniors who have exhausted their college eligibility. Generation adidas players and non-collegiate international players are also eligible for selection in the SuperDraft and supplemental draft. Clubs may nominate players for the League's draft-eligible list, and only players from that list may be selected.

Generation adidas is a joint program between MLS and adidas that is dedicated to developing exceptional domestic talent in a professional environment. Each year, a handful of top domestic underclassmen and youth national team players are signed to the league and placed in the SuperDraft through this program. Generation adidas players also receive an educational stipend.

Draft Order: The Montreal Impact held the first overall selection in the 2012 MLS SuperDraft as expansion clubs are always given the top spot in the SuperDraft and the Supplemental Draft. The next eight selections went to clubs that did not qualify for the 2011 MLS Cup Playoffs beginning with the club with fewest regular season points (3 points per win, one point per tie). The remaining ten positions were ranked by fewest regular season points among the teams that were eliminated in the same round of the MLS Cup Playoffs.

Unless claimed on waivers, a player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft or supplemental draft and did not sign with the League, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to the player.

(D) TRADES

Players, SuperDraft and Supplemental draft picks, allocation money, allocation rankings, and international player slots may all be exchanged in trades approved by the MLS League Office, provided all of the necessary rules regarding roster and salary budget compliance are met and the trade is completed during a valid trading period. No trades may occur after the Roster Freeze Deadline of September 15, 2012 at 5 p.m. ET.

(E) DISCOVERY SIGNINGS

Clubs may make discovery claims on players not yet under MLS contract who are not subject to the allocation ranking or lottery mechanisms.

Each club has the opportunity to make six discovery signings per season (expansion teams may make 10 discovery signings in their inaugural season). A club may have up to 10 discovery claims on unsigned players at any time and may remove or add players at any time. The last day for discovery player signings is September 15, 2012 – coinciding with the roster freeze date and trade deadline.

The six discovery signings can be used to fill senior roster spots only. If multiple clubs claim the same player using a discovery, the club that filed the claim first will have first rights to the player. Discovery claims expire following each season. If the League and player are unable to reach an agreement during the season, the club that first filed the discovery retains the right of first refusal in the event the player is later signed by the League.

NOTE: To protect interests of MLS clubs in scouting and negotiations with prospective players, the League office will not publicize the names of players on club discovery lists, nor specify if a discovery claim has been filed on a particular player.

(F) HOMEGROWN PLAYER SIGNINGS

A club may sign a player to his first professional contract without subjecting him to the MLS SuperDraft if the player has trained for at least one year in the club's youth development program and has met the League's Homegrown Player criteria. Players joining MLS through this mechanism are known as Homegrown Players.

There is no limit to the number of Homegrown Players a club may sign in a given year.

(G) RE-ENTRY PROCESS

The 2012 Re-Entry Process will commence after MLS Cup. The priority order for the Re-Entry Draft is reverse order of finish in 2012, taking into account playoff performance.

Available to all teams in Stage 1 of the Re-Entry draft will be:

1. Players who are at least 23 years old and have a minimum of three years experience in MLS whose options were not exercised by their clubs (available at option salary for 2013).
2. Players who are at least 25 years old with a minimum of four years of MLS experience who are out of contract and whose club does not wish to re-sign them at their previous salary (available for at least their 2012 salary).
3. Players who are at least 30 years old with a minimum of eight years of MLS experience who are out of contract and whose club does not wish to re-sign them (available for at least 105% of their 2012 salary).

Players who are not selected in Stage 1 of the Re-Entry Draft will be made available in Stage 2. Clubs selecting players in Stage 2 will negotiate a new salary with the player.

Players who remain unselected after Stage 2 will be available to any MLS club on a first come, first serve basis.

(H) WAIVERS

A team may place a player on waivers at any time during the regular season at which point he is made available to all other teams. The waiver claiming period shall commence on the first business day after the League delivers notice to teams and shall expire at 5 p.m. EST on the second business day after the Waiver Period Commencement Date. The claiming period is 48 hours. The Waiver Draft order is determined via points per game once all teams have played at least three MLS League games. If the waiver takes place prior to all teams playing in at least three League games, priority shall be granted based upon the prior year's performance, taking playoff performance first, with teams eliminated from playoff contention at the same stage separated according to their point totals through the end of the regular season. New expansion teams shall be at the bottom of the waiver order.

Once a team selects a player off waivers, that club is automatically moved to the bottom of the priority list for subsequent waiver selections in a given season, regardless of its points-per-game total. Players who may be placed on the MLS waiver wire are as follows:

- (i) A player waived by an MLS team in the current season;
- (ii) A player who completed his college eligibility within the past season, who was not made available in the SuperDraft or Supplemental Draft;
- (iii) A player who has remaining college eligibility (and was not made available in the SuperDraft or Supplemental Draft) but the League at its discretion and after taking into account exceptional circumstances determines the player may be offered an MLS contract;
- (iv) A player who has played in MLS previously where his last MLS team does not wish to exercise their right of first refusal, except in the case of returning U.S. National Team players as stated above.
- (v) A player who was drafted in the SuperDraft or supplemental draft, and who after a trial with the club is not offered a contract by the first Monday of June.

(I) LOTTERY

Some players shall be assigned to MLS teams via the weighted Lottery process. Any team assigned a player through the lottery in any particular season shall not be assigned another lottery player that season unless and until all teams have received a lottery player or have agreed to waive their option to participate in a Lottery. The players made available through lotteries include:

- (i) Generation adidas players signed after the MLS SuperDraft;
- (ii) Draft eligible players to whom an MLS contract was offered but who failed to sign with the League prior to the Draft.

The weighted lottery takes into consideration each team's performance over its last 34 regular season games and the most recent postseason. The team with the worst record over its last 34 regular season games (dating back to previous season if necessary and taking playoff performance into account) will have the greatest probability of winning the lottery. Teams are not required to participate in a lottery. Players are assigned via the lottery system in order to prevent a player from potentially influencing his destination club with a strategic holdout.

(J) EXTREME HARDSHIP CALL-UPS

Teams may add players to their roster in cases of "extreme hardship" as follows: (1) a club with three goalkeepers on its 30-man roster, but has less than two available goalkeepers or (2) a team has less than 15 available players. Extreme hardship call-ups are made on a game-by-game basis.

(K) SEASON-ENDING INJURY REPLACEMENTS

A team with a player lost to a season-ending injury can place the player on the Season Ending Injury List and replace that player on its roster, while remaining responsible for the full amount of the injured player's salary. A player can be placed on the season-ending injury list once another player has been signed as a replacement (provided the team has budget space). International player limits still apply at the time a season-ending replacement is made (with the player being replaced not counting against those limits).

(L) SHORT-TERM INJURY REPLACEMENTS

A player who has a short-term injury can be placed on the Disabled List once another player has been signed as a replacement (provided the team has budget space). The team will remain responsible for the full amount of the injured player's salary on the salary budget. Note: the injured player will have to sit out a minimum of six MLS League matches before he can rejoin the team's roster.

International player limits still apply at the time a short-term replacement is made (with the player being replaced not counting against those limits).

NOTE: No changes may be made to a team's active full roster during the period beginning on September 16, 2012 (day after Roster Freeze Date) through the day after MLS Cup. Nevertheless, a team may obtain players in accordance with the extreme hardship rules and procedures to replace players who are injured or otherwise legitimately unavailable after the Roster Freeze Date. Any other replacements after the Roster Freeze Date may only be made in exceptional circumstances in the League's sole and absolute discretion.

(III.) METHODS OF RELEASING PLAYERS

(A) WAIVERS

Teams may waive players based on performance at any time during the MLS season. Players with guaranteed contracts will continue to have their salary budget charge applied to the team salary budget, subject to any settlement. Players on semi-guaranteed contracts can be waived prior to July 1 of any year and free up the corresponding budget space. If a player on a semi-guaranteed contract is waived after July 1, his salary budget charge will count against the team's salary budget and the team waiving the player will not receive a replacement except under the normal player acquisition mechanisms. Any settlement amount will be charged to the team's salary budget.

(B) TRANSFERS AND LOANS

An MLS player may be transferred or loaned at any time to a team outside the League (subject to that team's Federation's transfer window), subject to the consent of the player.

The registration windows – the dates between which MLS may request the transfer certificate of a player under contract in another country – are as follows:

January 21 – April 15 (Primary Window)

June 27 – July 27 (Secondary Window)

(C) CONTRACT EXPIRATION

When a player's contract expires, the player does not count against the roster or budget of the team in question. Subject to the Re-Entry Draft rules, a team retains the rights to the player indefinitely following the expiration of a contract only if attempts were made to re-sign the player.

(D) BUYOUT OF GUARANTEED CONTRACT

Teams may have the ability to buyout one guaranteed player as follows:

- A Team may buy out one (1) guaranteed player (including a DP's) contract during the off-season and free up the corresponding budget space. Such a buyout is at the particular MLS Team's own expense.
- A Team may not free up budget space with a buyout of a player's salary budget charge during the season. Such a buyout will be conducted by the League and count on a Club's budget in a manner consistent with current MLS guidelines.

(IV.) RIGHT OF FIRST REFUSAL

Right of first refusal grants one MLS club the first opportunity to add a player to its roster in the event that the player signs with MLS. Holding a right of first refusal applies only within MLS and does not indicate holding of the player's International Transfer Certificate.

OUT OF CONTRACT PLAYERS / OPTIONS NOT PICKED UP: Subject to the Re-Entry Draft rules, a team retains the right of first refusal to the player indefinitely only if attempts were made to re-sign the player.

DRAFTED BUT NOT SIGNED: A player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft or supplemental draft and did not sign, or who as of the first Monday in June is not offered a contract after a trial and clears waivers, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 immediately following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to sign the player.

PLAYER TRANSFERRED OUTSIDE MLS: If a team receives allocation money as a result of a player's transfer, the team does not retain a right of first refusal.

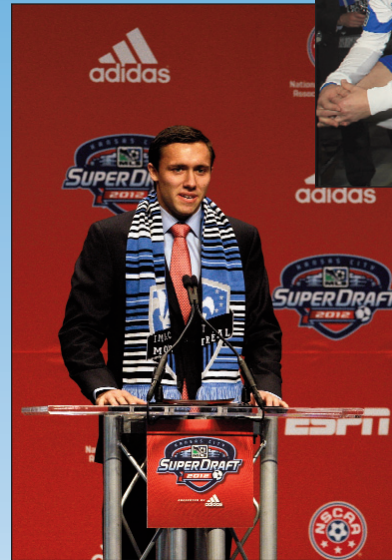

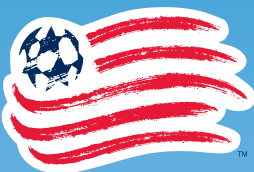

CREDENTIALS

MEDIA CHECK IN

All media must enter through the media gate entrance located at the far left of the Northwest Entrance. Media credentials will not be honored at any other entrance. All credentials are non-transferable, and any unauthorized use will subject the bearer to ejection from The Home Depot Center and confiscation of the credential.

These services must be arranged in advance, and once they are made, the statisticians must be compensated whether used or not. Broadcast booths at located on the second level of The Home Depot Center. Broadcasters can access the booths through the Southwest stairs or elevator on the West side of the stadium. In addition, media can access the broadcast level through the stairs located in the press box.

PARKING

The Galaxy will distribute a limited number of full season parking passes, while a small number of passes will be available on a per game basis. Members of the media seeking parking passes are advised to make their requests as early as possible. Please note that the Galaxy will not be able to accommodate all requests. Paid parking is available in Lot 10, 11, 12 and other stadium lots. TV news trucks will be allowed to park in Lot 17 located near the Southeast Entrance of the stadium. TV trucks which provide satellite, uplink or microwave functions will need to make prior arrangements with Calvin Spencer – Broadcast Manager at The Home Depot Center at 310-630-2017 to secure locations.

PRESS BOX

The Galaxy Communications Department will maintain the club's press box on the third level at midfield of The Home Depot Center. The press box will open two hours before kickoff and close approximately two-and-a-half hours after the completion of the game. Admittance is limited to working media members with credentials only. The professional intent of the press box is to provide a meeting and working place for writers, reporters, broadcasters and game personnel. It is imperative that season pass holders notify the Galaxy Communications Department of their intentions to cover a game in order to receive press box seating. Family members and guests will not be accommodated in the press box. Abuse of the press box and press privileges will result in forfeiture of your press pass.

TELEPHONE/WIRELESS ACCESS

The Home Depot Center offers wireless internet access in all areas of the press box and photographers' work room. The access is free of charge and works with all wi-fi enabled computer equipment. For those computers that do not have wi-fi capabilities, the press box and photographers' work room are equipped with charge-a-call phone lines for dial up access. Requests for individual telephone line or dedicated LAN connections should be made through the Galaxy Communications Department.

GAME NOTES / STATISTICS

Game notes and statistics will be available in the press box. Statistics will be distributed to each seat throughout the game at half-time and ten minutes following the game. The Galaxy Communications staff will distribute all statistics and materials from the Press Operations room in the press box. Periodic announcements will also be made during the game.

LOCKER ROOM ACCESS

The Galaxy locker room is not open pregame, but media members can request interviews with players before the game through the Galaxy Communications staff stationed outside the locker room. All interviews must be completed 60 minutes prior to the start of the game.

Following the conclusion of the match, a postgame press conference will be held in the TV Studio located off the main tunnel. At the end of the press conference or 15 minutes after the conclusion of the game, whichever comes first, the Galaxy locker room will be open to the media. Galaxy and visitor locker rooms are at the south end of the stadium on the field level. Your cooperation and professional courtesy is asked in maintaining a proper working atmosphere for postgame interviews. Absolutely no autographs are allowed during media access periods. Still photographs are not permitted in the locker room without prior consent of the Galaxy Communications Department.

MEDIA CELL PHONES: No media member may use a cell phone at any time inside the locker room. Media members may carry their cell phones into the locker room, but may not use them to place calls, take photographs or conduct interviews.

FIELD ACCESS

Only working newspaper, magazine and network TV photographers and club/stadium officials are permitted on the field during the game. Blue Print/Radio credentials will not be honored for field admittance at any time during the game, unless authorized by the LA Galaxy. Print/Radio credential holders will be able to access the field level after the completion of the game.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

ENG crews and still photographers holding proper credentials may position themselves along either endline and up to the six-yard box on the East sideline at field level. Immediately prior to each match, photographers who wish to shoot the traditional pregame team photo will be escorted to the West sideline by photo marshals. Photographers will be instructed to walk only on the sidelines – not on the field of play – en route to these temporary positions. Once team photos have been taken, photographers will be asked to return to their endline positions. During the match, photographers are advised that they have restricted freedom of movement. At no time during the match can photographers shoot from directly behind the goal. Also, movement from one end of the field to the other is allowed only at halftime on the sideline behind the team benches. Still photographers do not have access to the locker rooms at any time.

PHOTOGRAPHER BIBS

Each accredited photographer will be issued a photo bib/vest provided by the Galaxy for identification purposes and as a mandatory supplement to the credential. The photo bib serves as a temporary access control device and must be returned to photo marshals at the end of each match. The photo bib must be worn at all times while present at any photo position. Photographers found in unauthorized shooting positions or not wearing a bib risk suspension of their Galaxy credential. All photographers are required to wear a vest that must be obtained prior to the game in the Photographers' Work Room.

PHOTOGRAPHERS' WORK ROOM

The Photographers' Work Room is located on the field level of The Home Depot Center, at the south end of the stadium. To access this room, photographers are asked to enter the stadium through the Northwest Media Entrance and proceed around the main concourse to the Southeast corner above the main stadium bowl. Option 1: To the right the elevator will take you down to the field level, turn left and the photographers' work is located on the right in the main tunnel. Option 2: Turn left and proceed down section 140 and through the handicap seating into the main tunnel, turn left and proceed under the stadium, the photographers' work room will be half way up the tunnel on the right hand side. Option 3: Turn left and use the elevator underneath the Stadium Club. Once on field level, exit the elevator and the photo workroom will be located on your right.

MEALS

Food and beverages are available to working members of the media in the press box, on the third floor of The Home Depot Center, one hour prior to kickoff. A fee of \$5 is required for a full meal in the press box dining area.

DURING THE WEEK

TRAINING ACCESS

During the regular season, training sessions typically run 90 minutes and usually begin at 10 a.m. Training times can vary frequently do vary. Members of the media who intend to cover training sessions on a regular basis should call the Galaxy Communications Department to obtain the latest training schedule information. Training sessions will, in general, be open to the media, but they may be closed at the discretion of the head coach. No media members are allowed into the locker room before, during or after training sessions.

MEDIA PARKING ON TRAINING DAYS

All media members are asked to enter through Gate A, off Avalon Blvd., and to park in Lot 18, across from the Track and Field Stadium when attending Galaxy training sessions. Upon exiting Lot 18, media members can turn left and walk up the hill to Lot 17, through which they can access the team's training session on University Field #1. Members of the media who park in Lot 6, across from University Fields 1 and 2, during training sessions may be ticketed by California State University – Dominguez Hills.

INTERVIEWS

Interviews that need advance preparations or special accommodations by a Galaxy player or staff member should be made by calling or emailing the Galaxy Communications Department.

MARK ROGONDINO

Play-by-Play

Mark Rogondino returns for his eighth consecutive season on the Galaxy television broadcasts and his first as the club's play-by-play voice on Time Warner Cable Sports Net and KDOC. The Southern California native began his career with the Galaxy in 2005 serving as the club's sideline reporter before being moved up to the broadcast booth to serve as the club's color analyst from 2006-2011.

A regular on FOX Soccer, Rogondino has covered a number of different competitions for the network, including Major League Soccer and CONCACAF Champions League, during which he has called games alongside his new Galaxy analyst Cobi Jones. He has also called game from the Barclay's Premier League, various South American club tournaments such as Copa Libertadores and Copa Sudamericana, as well as Women's Professional Soccer, various international friendlies and much more.

In addition to his work in soccer, Rogondino has covered the NBA, college basketball, the Celebrity Players Golf Tour, the World Series of Poker and various high school sports for Fox Sports, as well as CBS College Sports Network, Comcast Sports, and The Mountain Network.

After being raised in San Diego, Rogondino played goalkeeper at Santa Barbara City College, before returning to Southern California for the remainder of his collegiate career at San Diego State University, playing for the Aztecs and earning a degree in Psychology.



COBI JONES

Color Analyst

A true Galaxy legend who scored the first goal in club history and spent 12 years representing the club as a player and then three more as an assistant coach, Cobi Jones returns to the Galaxy in 2012 as the analyst for all games on KDOC and Time Warner Cable Sports Net. One of the most recognizable names in soccer in Southern California, Jones is a member of the National Soccer Hall of Fame as well as the Galaxy's all-time leader in games played and assists.

He captained the Galaxy to their first-ever MLS Cup title in 2002 while also serving as the club's captain for their first Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup championship in 2001 and the 2000 CONCACAF Champions Cup, when LA were crowned the best club in the region. In 2005 he was part of the Galaxy's "double" winning team that won both the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup and MLS Cup, giving him five championships during his time with the club.

His impressive club career, which included stops in Brazil with Vasco de Gama and England with Coventry City, is matched by an illustrious career with the U.S. National Team. The all-time leader with 164 caps for the U.S., Jones played in the FIFA World Cup three times, leading his country to the tournament in 1994, 1998 and 2002. He scored 15 goals from midfield in his 12-year career with the National Team, helping them win the CONCACAF Gold Cup in 2002 while also playing at the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona following a successful college career at UCLA.

He retired from the game following the 2007 MLS season and joined the club as an assistant coach ahead of the 2008 campaign. He kept that role, while also serving as the interim head coach for one game following Ruud Gullit's departure in August 2008, through the 2010 campaign, after which he left the club to join the New York Cosmos as their Associate Director of Soccer.

In addition to his successful playing career in MLS and internationally, Jones is also experienced in the world of television, broadcasting games and serving as an in-studio analyst for ABC/ESPN, NBC and FOX, with who he called a number of the Galaxy's CONCACAF Champions League games in 2011.



ADRIAN GARCIA MARQUEZ

Play-by-Play

One of the most diverse sports broadcasters in the United States, Adrian Garcia Marquez joins Time Warner Cable Deportes as part of the LA Galaxy broadcast team in 2012. A venerable jack of all trades, Garcia Marquez has more than a decade of experience in the industry and has worked for professional and college sports teams in baseball, basketball, college football, football and soccer, in both English and Spanish.

A native of San Diego, Garcia Marquez got his first break on TV with the San Diego Flash of the now defunct A-League in 1998, calling the games on TV in Spanish while current LA Galaxy radio broadcaster Joe Tutino called the action in English.

After the Flash, Garcia Marquez moved on to host the San Diego Padres Pregame show for K-1040 AM in 1999. In 2000, he received his big break as the Spanish radio play by play man with the Oakland A's. Later that same year he was hired by ESPN International. At ESPN Deportes, Garcia Marquez was an announcer, reporter and analyst on programs such as NFL Primetime, Sunday Night Football, Monday Night Football, Wednesday Night Baseball and Sunday Night Baseball. In 2001, he was also named voice of the Boston Red Sox en Español. He then moved on to Univision and Telefutera, for whom he covered the 2002 FIFA World Cup in South Korea and Japan. After the World Cup, he headed back to his native Southern California to work for Telemundo Los Angeles as a sports anchor where he was named to the first ever U.S. based Spanish broadcast Olympic team, to do baseball and basketball for the 2004 games in Athens. After five years with KVEA and sister station KWHY, he moved on to FOX Deportes where he was their lead Major League Baseball play-by-play announcer, calling four World Series for the network, and was also featured as their top boxing announcer for Top Rank Boxing's 'Top Rank Live.'

As well as working for the biggest Spanish-language news outlets in the U.S., Garcia Marquez has worked for the San Diego Chargers, Los Angeles Angels of Anaheim, Los Angeles Dodgers, Los Angeles Clippers and USC Trojans. Adrian has also crossed over into English and worked for FSN Prime Ticket as a Dodgers reporter in 2007 and ESPN Radio AM 710 as a reporter and fill in co-host in 2008.

The Mexican-American announcer was recently named the new Spanish TV voice of the Los Angeles Lakers on Time Warner Cable Deportes beginning in the 2012-2013 NBA season.



FRANCISCO PINTO

Color Analyst

After more than a decade with Univision, Francisco Pinto joins Time Warner Cable Deportes to be a part of the LA Galaxy's broadcast team in 2012. Pinto, a former soccer player in his native country of Chile, best known for his 12 years with KMEX-TV, Univision's affiliate in LA, where he was a sports anchor for seven years before switching to news and becoming a host on the stations' morning newscast, Primera Edicion.

Pinto, who also spent three years as sports and news anchor at KUVS, Univision's affiliate for Modesto, Stockton and Sacramento area, has covered many of the biggest sporting events in the world, including two World Cups, in 2002 and 2006, several NBA Finals, Super Bowls, World Series and world title boxing matches. In 2002, Pinto was the only TV reporter from Los Angeles who was in New England when the Galaxy won its first MLS Cup. Pinto reported live before, during and after that historic day for the team. Pinto has also hosted The Rose Parade in Pasadena on two occasions and has been the recipient of several awards and has interviewed several dignitaries such as presidents and Nobel Prize winners.

A native of Concepcion, Chile, Pinto started his broadcasting career when in 1996. Prior to beginning his journalistic career, Pinto played soccer and squash in Chile. He played on the Reserve Teams for Deportes Concepcion. After studying Physical Education at the Universidad de Concepcion in Chile, he came to the U.S. and studied Sports Medicine at The Master's College in Santa Clarita, California.



JOE TUTINO

Play-by-Play

The 2012 campaign will be Joe Tutino's 16th season as the English radio voice of the LA Galaxy. A San Diego-native with more than two decades of experience in sports talk radio, Tutino will once again call all 34 regular season games for the club on KTLK 1150 AM. A longtime expert in the local soccer scene, Tutino was honored by Major League Soccer prior to MLS Cup 2011 for his longevity and service to the game.

In addition to calling Galaxy games, Tutino has also broadcast nearly every sport throughout Southern California. A graduate of the Columbia School of Broadcasting in Los Angeles, Tutino called matches for FOX Soccer and was the voice of the former A-League side, the San Diego Flash. In 1999, he made broadcast history alongside Rick Davis as they broadcast that year's MLS All-Star Game over the Armed Forces Radio Network, a first for the league. Additionally, he has served as the public address announcer for U.S. National Team games at Qualcomm Stadium and filled that same capacity for the inaugural game in Galaxy history on April 13, 1996 against the MetroStars at the Rose Bowl.

Tutino has also built two all sports radio stations (XTRA Sports 690, the first all sports station on the west coast and the Mighty 1090) and in 2005, he took on a new challenge becoming the Program Director of CASH 1700. In 2006, Tutino launched his very own company, Pioneer Broadcasting before returning to sports radio a year later, taking over as Director of Operations and Programming for XX Sports Radio (1090 AM/105.7 FM), Southern California's heritage sports talk station. In the fall of 2007, Tutino took on the added duties of midday co-host on XX Sports Radio, teaming with longtime colleague John Kentera and executing all responsibilities through fall 2008.



RALPH PEREZ

Color Analyst

For the sixth straight season Ralph Perez will serve as the color analyst for all home Galaxy radio broadcasts on KTLK 1150 AM as well as select road games.

Currently the head coach at the University of Redlands, a position he has held since May 2006, Perez also has experience coaching in MLS and with the U.S. National Team. After serving as an assistant coach with the MetroStars (now New York Red Bulls) during the first two years of MLS, Perez joined the Galaxy coaching staff in January 1998. He remained in that role until the end of the 2003 season, helping the Galaxy win three different trophies, including their first MLS Cup in 2002.

Perez has also extensive experience with the U.S. National Team, serving as an assistant coach at the 1990 FIFA World Cup in Italy while also working with the U.S. coaching staff at the 1994 World Cup that was held in the United States. Additionally, he was the head coach of the U.S. U-20 National Team at the 1989 Youth World Cup and was an adviser to the U.S. Olympic Team at the 1992 Barcelona Games, a team that featured current Galaxy coaches Ian Feuer and Curt Onalfo.

The New York native has also served as the head coach on the college level at Old Dominion, Santa Clara, Cal State-Fullerton, Cal State-Los Angeles and Whittier College.



ROLANDO GONZÁLEZ

Play-by-Play

The original Spanish-voice of the LA Galaxy, Rolando González is back in the broadcast booth for a 12th season with the club on ESPN Deportes Radio KWKW 1330 AM. González, who was the Galaxy's radio voice from 1996-2002, returned to the club in 2008, bringing over 45 years of broadcasting experience and will provide the radio play-by-play in Spanish. Known as "El Veloz" because of his rapid-fire play-by-play style, González also serves as host of the morning show LA Maquina Deportiva, "The LA Sports Machine," on ESPN Deportes Radio in addition to his work with the Galaxy.

A native of Escuintla, Guatemala, González has covered seven World Cups on three different continents, covering the action in Mexico (1970, 1986), Argentina (1978), Spain (1982), Italy (1990), USA (1994) and France (1998). González has also served as a reporter and analyst for the 1968 (Mexico City), 1976 (Montreal) and 1984 (Los Angeles) Olympics Games as well as a host of other major sporting events.

A graduate of the University of San Carlos in Guatemala (USAC) with a degree in Communications, González formed part of the team that broadcast games and provided analysis for the 1979 Pan American Games in Puerto Rico. González's vast experience in broadcasting includes covering the CONCACAF Championship in 1965 (Guatemala), 1967 (Honduras) and 1969 (Costa Rica) as well as numerous installments of the CONCACAF Gold Cup for KTNQ.

A Golden Mic recipient, González also has vast experience in television. He worked for Channel 3 and 7 in Guatemala and Channels 18, 52 and FOX Sports Americas in Los Angeles.



ARMANDO AGUAYO

Color Analyst

One of the most respected radio voices in the Southland, Armando Aguayo enters his fourth season as color analyst of Galaxy games on ESPN Deportes Radio KWKW 1330 AM. A former soccer player himself, Aguayo is also the station's Spanish voice of UCLA's football and men's basketball teams and NASCAR races at the California Speedway. He is also a host on the daily morning show, LA Maquina Deportiva, "The LA Sports Machine," on ESPN Deportes Radio.

Throughout an illustrious nearly 30-year career in sports radio, Aguayo has covered a wide range of major sporting events, including the CONCACAF Gold Cup, Mexican Soccer League, InterLiga, SuperLiga, Copa Libertadores, NCAA basketball and NCAA football as well as a number of championship boxing fights. He has also worked on FOX Deportes.

A native of Irapuato, Guanajuato, México, Aguayo started his radio career when he was 14, editing live, scripted commercials during the broadcast of his local team's soccer games. After a year playing with Irapuato's Third Division affiliate, during which time he injured his knee, Aguayo began taking Communications classes at El Colegio Nacional de Educación Pública and la Universidad Quetzalcoatl in Mexico. He came to Los Angeles when he was 20 and received his broadcaster's license in 1995.

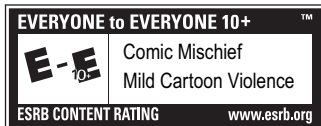
