TRAINING SESSION GUIDELINES

Media who plan to attend a training session are encouraged to alert the MNUFC communications team (Director of Public Relations, Eric Durkee at eric.d@mnufc.com or 651.270.8755; PR Manager, Jessica Lopez at jessica.l@mnufc.com or 413.207.1928) by 6 p.m. CT the evening prior to the session.

Media will be alerted to any changes in training field locations. MNUFC generally trains at the National Sports Center in Blaine, Minnesota (1700 105th Ave NE, Blaine, MN 55449).

Media should plan to park in the North Main Lot or Lot A next to the Sports Hall at the National Sports Center. Parking in the back lot (Lot B) is prohibited.

Media will be allowed to photograph/film training for a maximum of 15 minutes either at the beginning or end of the session. MNUFC reserves the right to close a training session at any time.

All MNUFC players and coaches will be made available for interviews for 15 minutes upon the conclusion of each training session, unless otherwise noted.

As per MLS Media Access Policy, the following actions may result in seizure of credential and/or ejection of its wearer from the training facility:

- Requesting autographs at any time.
- Taking personal photographs with players/coaches.
- Using credential for family or friends of working media members.
- Conducting unauthorized interviews.
- Unprofessional behavior (consumption of alcoholic beverages, failure to abide by posted rules, etc.).

MATCH DAY GUIDELINES

To receive a press credential to an MNUFC match, submit a request via the form at MNUFC.COM/news/media-credential-request no later than 48 hours prior to kickoff. Press credentials may be given on a single-match or full-season basis. The above form must be submitted for every single-match credential.

ALL MEDIA/PHOTO PERSONNEL

Credentials and photo bibs can be picked up from the Dodge County entrance of TCF Bank Stadium beginning two hours prior to kickoff. Please be prepared to present photo identification upon arrival. MNUFC staff representatives at the check-in desk can help with any questions regarding access.

The press box and working area can be accessed via the elevators at Dodge County. These areas will be open two hours prior to kickoff. The photo work room is located in room G054 (see map on page 9).

Please use the east field tunnel for access to the east half of the pitch and the north visiting team tunnel for access to the west side of the pitch. The north visiting tunnel can be accessed by heading north from the field tunnel and following the hallway to the west past the locker rooms (see map on page 9).

When behind pitch-side seats, photographers/media must not interfere with fans or their viewpoints in any way.

The post-match press conference will be held by the locker rooms in room G054 (see map on page 9).

The MNUFC locker room will be open to media 15 minutes after the final whistle.

As per MLS Media Access Policy, the following actions may result in seizure of credential and/or ejection of its wearer from the stadium:

- Requesting autographs at any time.
- Taking personal photographs with players/coaches.
- Using credential for family or friends of working media members.
- Conducting unauthorized interviews.
- Unprofessional behavior (consumption of alcoholic beverages, failure to abide by posted rules, etc.).

MEDIA CREDENTIAL ONLY

Only MNUFC staff can issue a credential to media/photo personnel.

Media with a credential have access to the press box, locker rooms and post-match press conference room G054 (see map on page 9).

MEDIA CREDENTIAL & GREEN PHOTO BIB

In addition to a credential, MNUFC staff will issue a green bib to any media/photo personnel who have been granted pitch access (including all photographers/videographers).

• Please return this bib to Dodge County upon exiting the building.

Photographers are allowed on the sidelines for a limited time:

 During non-play periods, such as pre-match, starting XI photos and halftime.

Photographers must otherwise stay behind the 18-yard box and outside of LED field boards (see blue sections on map on page 9).

Non-rights-holding videographers are allowed to shoot video for the first 15 minutes of each half.

MEDIA CREDENTIAL & GOLD PHOTO BIB

In addition to a credential, MNUFC staff will provide a gold bib for team photographers and limited media/photo personnel (national rights-holder or MLS Digital) who have been granted extra privileges.

Photographers are allowed anywhere on the pitch during periods of non-play (pre-match, halftime, etc.).

Photographers are allowed anywhere in designated sideline and endline spaces throughout the match.

Photographers must otherwise stay behind all field boards while the ball is in play (see blue sections on map).





DR. BILL MCGUIRE MANAGING PARTNER

Before Dr. McGuire purchased MNUFC, at the time known as Minnesota Stars FC, professional soccer in Minnesota was in jeopardy. After the NASL took over ownership of the team in 2011, it won the league's first championship, but was still on the verge of folding. Then, former league commissioner David Downs reached out to Dr. McGuire to save the team.

Interested in seeing the squad for himself, Dr. McGuire attended several matches, culminating in the home leg of the 2012 Soccer Bowl. Inspired by the atmosphere and excitement of the fans, he purchased the team following the 2012 season.

Dr. McGuire began grooming the franchise for success, using inspiration from a visit to Bayern Munich, one of Germany's top clubs. The following March, the team was rebranded as Minnesota United FC. Dr. McGuire went to work building it not only to survive, but to thrive, on and off the field, expanding the front office and building partnerships with local businesses.

As the club's accomplishments began to pile up, Dr. McGuire started working toward building an MLS franchise. He brought together a largely local ownership group, comprised of Twins owner, Jim Pohlad; Timberwolves owner, Glen Taylor; and Carlson board member, Wendy Carlson Nelson, in addition to other prominent Minnesota families. The group began to work with MLS to bring MNUFC to the highest level of the game in the U.S. and secure the future of soccer in Minnesota.

On March 25, 2015, MLS awarded Minnesota United the league's 23rd franchise. For Dr. McGuire, it was an emotional moment, having seen his team go from the brink of folding to the top league in the U.S. and Canada in just two years. The team's inaugural season featured historic moments, sellouts at TCF Bank Stadium and a burgeoning match day atmosphere that ranks among the best in the league.

Dr. McGuire and the ownership group have continued to raise the profile of the club and its community by building a privately-funded, soccer-specific stadium. Allianz Field will revitalize the area, bringing in new corporate, retail and residential spaces. The stadium will be completed for the 2019 season in the Midway neighborhood of St. Paul.

Showing his commitment to the community, Dr. McGuire's philanthropic efforts include donations to the Guthrie Theater and Walker Art Center.



CHRIS WRIGHT

Minnesota United hired Chris Wright as the franchise's first Chief Executive Officer in September 2017. As CEO, Wright oversees both the business and sporting sides of the organization. Wright comes to the club following 13 seasons as President of the Minnesota Timberwolves and the Minnesota Lynx and 26 years with the organization.

With the Wolves and Lynx, Wright oversaw both teams' business operations and over 140 employees. An engaged member of the Twin Cities' corporate community, Wright was integral to forming the organizations' most closely integrated partnerships, including those with Target, Mayo Clinic, US Bank, Federated Insurance and Jack Link's. Additionally, he has been heavily involved in the current renovation of Target Center, a \$140 million project that began in the spring of 2016 and will be completed later in the 2017-18 season. Wright also led the 2014 sales efforts and development of Mayo Clinic Square, a state-of-the-art practice and performance facility that is widely recognized as an innovative and highly successful model for sports franchises.

For much of his tenure, Wright led the business planning and strategic direction for all business units associated with the Timberwolves and Lynx. He is recognized for establishing the Minnesota Lynx in the Twin Cities market, including helping the team realize unprecedented growth in ticket sales and corporate partnerships. These efforts have defined the Lynx as the recognized model for women's professional sports, an undisputed leader in the WNBA both on and off the court, and an important asset to our community. A true believer that a healthy collaborative culture is a winning culture, Wright helped author the purpose statement, Be A Pack: Believe, Inspire, Unite.

In his native England, Wright played and coached in various professional and semi-professional soccer leagues. When he first arrived in the United States, he served as general manager for Major Indoor Soccer League teams, the Pittsburgh Spirit (1981-86) and the Minnesota Strikers (1986-87). Following that, he acted as a consultant working on bids for major national and international events, including the programming of the widely recognized National Sports Center in Blaine — home of the Minnesota United Training Ground — before becoming its first director.

Wright graduated from Carnegie College of Physical Education in Headingly, Leeds, Yorkshire, England. He is very involved in and consults with many local charities and youth sports programs.



MANNY LAGOS SPORTING DIRECTOR

Lagos was appointed as the first Sporting Director in club history in January 2016. Prior to holding this position, he worked as Head Coach of Minnesota United, taking the helm in 2010 and accruing a 78-52-59 record over six seasons, including winning the 2011 NASL championship.

The youngest of eight children, Manny began his professional career as a member of the Minnesota Thunder, where he played for seven years alongside his brother, Gerard, and under his father, Buzz, who coached and founded the team. Manny scored 29 goals with the Thunder and, in 1994, was named USL MVP, netting 18 goals and providing nine assists. Both Manny and Gerard were inducted into the USL Hall of Fame prior to the former leaving to play in MLS.

Lagos also received attention at the national team level as a member of the 1992 U.S. Olympic team. He scored the winning goal in a 3-1 victory over Kuwait, the U.S. team's only win of the tournament. He also made three appearances with the national team under the leadership of Bruce Arena.

During the inaugural MLS season in 1996, Lagos joined the NY/NJ MetroStars. He went on to play for five MLS clubs during his career: the MetroStars, Chicago Fire, Tampa Bay Mutiny, San Jose Earthquakes and Columbus Crew SC.

Lagos retired from professional soccer in June 2005. He entered the administrative side of the sport in January 2006, when he assumed the role of Director of Soccer Operations for the Thunder, where he emphasized youth development. An occasional broadcaster, he served as color commentator for Sirius XM Radio during the 2006 World Cup.

Lagos is a two-time winner of the NASL's Coach of the Year award, given to the best coach in the league, as voted on by the media. His first came in 2011, when he led Minnesota to the Soccer Bowl title after barely making the playoffs. He earned the award again in 2014, as MNUFC won both the spring and combined season championship.

In his final season, Lagos put together the most successful offensive team in the modern era of the NASL, scoring a record 55 goals. He led the squad to the postseason for the fifth time in six seasons, qualifying by virtue of having the best remaining record, not including the spring and fall champions.

AMOS MAGEE DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

Magee was named MNUFC Director of Player Personnel in November 2016. An experienced player and coach with an eye for talent, he joined Minnesota following three years as an assistant coach with D.C. United.

In his current role, Magee works closely with Sporting Director Manny Lagos to develop the Loons' sporting vision as it pertains to certain soccer curriculum. Additionally, he is responsible for vertically integrating this vision from the academy system to the first team.

A native of St. Paul, Magee played high school soccer with Lagos at St. Paul Academy and went on to attend Wesleyan University, where he became the school's all-time leading scorer, with 35 goals and 85 overall points for the Cardinals.

He spent nearly his entire professional career with the Minnesota Thunder and was the club's all-time leading scorer, with 64 goals. Magee also featured for the Tampa Bay Mutiny and Chicago Fire in MLS.

He retired as a player in 2004, but spent a portion of that year as a player-assistant coach. Magee then returned to coach the Thunder from 2006-08. In December 2007, he was asked to coach the US Maccabi team in the 2007 Pan American Maccabi Games in Buenos Aires, Argentina. There, he led the team to the gold medal.

In 2009, after leaving Minnesota, Magee was named Director of Soccer Development for Portland Timbers FC, at the time still in the USL. In 2011, he helped oversee the Timbers' move to MLS as a part of the first-team coaching staff and as a lead coach of the reserve team.

Magee joined D.C. United in 2014, where he was a first-team assistant coach and coach of the club's under-23 side.

In addition to developing the sporting vision with Lagos and the rest of the sporting staff, Magee is responsible for assisting in scouting players from across the globe and works closely with the coaching staff to construct a competitive roster that represents the club's technical vision, culture and community.

ADRIAN HEATH

In November 2016, Minnesota announced that Heath would be the club's coach for the 2017 Major League Soccer season. Heath was most recently head coach of Orlando City SC and has over 20 years of managerial experience in the U.S. and England.

Hailing from Staffordshire, England, Heath enjoyed an 18-year professional soccer career before entering into coaching. The midfielder's journey began with Stoke City and included a notable career at Everton, where he scored 71 goals in 226 appearances, won two league titles, an FA Cup and a UEFA Cup Winner's Cup in 1985. In 1989, Heath went on to play for Espanyol in Spain, then returned to England to play for Manchester City, and Burnley, where he eventually transitioned into the role of player-manager in 1996.

The Englishman spent the next 11 years coaching in England for clubs such as Burnley, Sheffield United and Coventry City, before a chance encounter with Phil Rawlins brought him to the United States in 2008.

Rawlins, the former Stoke City director, met with Heath in his hometown of Newcastle-under-Lyme, where the two discussed Rawlins' dream of setting up a football club in the U.S., and — serendipitously for Heath — Rawlins needed a manager.

Heath accepted the role and was named the Head Coach of the Austin Aztex, Rawlins' USL expansion franchise. The team spent two years in Austin, before relocating to Orlando in 2010, becoming Orlando City.

In just four years under Heath in its new city, Orlando City won two USL Pro championships and three Commissioner's Cups. The USL club under Heath also tallied two U.S. Open Cup victories over MLS opposition.

Orlando City launched into Major League Soccer in 2015 and Heath's influence helped build the club for a very successful inaugural MLS season. The club finished seventh in the Eastern Conference, falling just short of clinching a berth in the 2015 MLS playoffs.

COACHING STAFF



MARK WATSON ASSISTANT COACH

Watson, a former Canadian national team defender and assistant coach, brings a wealth of MLS experience to MNUFC, having played for MLS teams, including Seattle Sounders FC, Vancouver Whitecaps FC and D.C. United. Additionally, Watson managed the San Jose Earthquakes before joining Orlando City as an assistant under Heath in 2014.

During his tenure at San Jose, Watson helped guide the team to a playoff berth in 2010 and the club's second Supporters' Shield in 2012. He was named interim head coach in June 2013 and closed the season with the best record in MLS at 11-5-3.

In addition to his MLS experience, Watson previously served as assistant coach with the Canada under-20 and senior teams, as well as several years as an assistant with the USL PRO's Charleston Battery.



IAN FULLER
ASSISTANT COACH

Fuller brings seven years of coaching experience to Minnesota and a history of championships. In 2010, his first year as a player-assistant coach, he helped lead the Charleston Battery to become regular-season and playoff champions in USL-2. Fuller joined Orlando City of USL PRO the following year, winning two championships and two Commissioner's Cups in three years. He transitioned to being a full-time coach in 2014 and remained with the club during its first MLS season in 2015.

Fuller first joined Minnesota's coaching staff in 2016 as an assistant and was reunited with Heath, his head coach on Orlando's staff, for the 2017 MLS season.



JOHN PASCARELLA
GOALKEEPING COACH

Pascarella arrives at Minnesota from Des Moines Menace of the Premier Development League (PDL), where he served as manager since January 2017.

Prior to his time in PDL, Pascarella spent eight seasons with Sporting Kansas City. Starting as a goalkeeper and fitness coach from 2009–2011, he then transitioned to become an assistant coach during an incredibly successful time in the franchise's history. He helped guide Sporting KC to a club-record six-straight playoff appearances, including the 2013 MLS Cup championship and the 2012 and 2015 Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup titles.

Pascarella played professional soccer for nine seasons across the United States and Peru before beginning his coaching career as the goalkeeper coach at the University of Maryland in 1998. He also spent time with the Northern Virginia Royals of the PDL and the U.S. Olympic Development Program, also in Virginia.



JARRYD PHILLIPS HEAD OF FITNESS AND SPORTS SCIENCE

As Minnesota United's Head of Fitness and Sport Science, Phillips serves as the first team's fitness coach as well as overseeing the conditioning and sports performance programs for our academy.

A native of Johannesburg, South Africa, Jarryd joined Minnesota United from Seattle Sounders FC, where he held a similar position in their first team technical staff. Carter moved into the world of professional soccer in 2001, when he joined the Chicago Fire as Director of Player Development. He then split duties as Assistant Coach and Director of Youth Development with the Pittsburgh Riverhounds before taking over as the team's head coach halfway through the 2002 season.

He came to Minnesota for the first time in 2003, when he joined the Thunder's coaching staff, taking a similar split role before starting up the program at Shattuck-St. Mary's in 2005.

Carter has been honored throughout his career for his outstanding work. He has won coach of the year awards with multiple organizations, including United Soccer Coaches (previously NSCAA) and the United States Youth Soccer Association (USYSA), and three-straight COY awards for the USSF Development Academy. He also serves as a committee member on United States Soccer's Development Academy Leadership Group.

ABOUT MICHAEL BOXALL

New Zealand international Boxall joined MNUFC on July 12, 2017 after representing his country at the 2017 FIFA Confederations Cup in Russia. He proceeded to start 12 of 12 matches to close out the season, adding experience and positional depth to the team with his flexibility along the backline, where he can play as either a right-sided center back or right back.

Boxall is no stranger to MLS, after being selected first overall in the 2011 MLS Supplemental Draft by Vancouver Whitecaps FC ahead of its inaugural MLS season. He made 19 league appearances for Whitecaps FC that year, starting 18 of them, and helped the team to the Canadian Championship final, where it fell 3-2 on aggregate to Toronto FC.

In July 2012, Boxall joined Wellington Phoenix in the Australian A-League. He mainly featured off the bench, but came into his own during the 2014–15 campaign, during which time he had a pair of goals and an assist in 18 appearances to help the club to a spot in the postseason.

His move to SuperSport United in the South African Premier Division came the following season. Boxall immediately adopted a key role for the club, featuring in nearly every match over two seasons. He helped lead the team to back-to-back Nedbank Cup titles, toppling South African powerhouse Orlando Pirates in both championship matches.

Boxall began his career in his home country with Central United FC (where he won the 2007 Northern Premier League title) and Auckland FC (where he won the New Zealand Football Championship). He was named Auckland City Young Player of the Year in 2006 and 2007.

The defender came to the U.S. to attend the University of California Santa Barbara, where he played four seasons for the Gauchos. He was named first-team All-Big West in 2009 and won the 2010 Big West Defender of the Year award. Boxall played his high school soccer at Mount Albert Grammar School, winning league titles in 2004 and 2005, in addition to a first-place finish at the national tournament in 2005.

INTERNATIONAL: Boxall has 31 appearances for the New Zealand national team since making his debut in 2011. He has mainly featured in international friendlies, but in recent years he has become a mainstay in World Cup qualifying matches as well. He got his first international assist on October 11, 2016 against the United States, tying the match at 1-1 late in the second half.

ABOUT MARC BURCH

Burch is a 12-year MLS veteran with over 225 regular-season appearances. In 2016, the left back set career highs with Colorado Rapids in games started (27) and minutes played (2,443). He followed that up with an appearance in the MLS Team of the Week during Week 3 of the 2017 season, tallying an assist in Colorado's 2-2 draw with MNUFC. Burch was traded to the Loons on March 31 of that year.

The trade marked a turning point for Minnesota, as Burch brought sorely needed experience to the expansion team's defense. He swiftly slotted into Head Coach Adrian Heath's preferred XI and featured in 10 matches for the Loons before a mid-June injury forced him to the sidelines for three months.

On June 20, Burch underwent successful bilateral sports hernia surgery, and on September 13, he made his return to the match-day roster as an unused substitute at Vancouver Whitecaps FC. Burch returned to the starting XI for the 3-2 victory at Montreal Impact three days later. In total, he started 14 of 15 games for MNUFC and played 1,232 minutes during the 2017 campaign.

Burch was drafted by LA Galaxy in 2006 and played for Columbus Crew SC, D.C. United and Seattle Sounders FC before joining the Rapids in 2014. While on D.C. United, he won an MLS Supporters' Shield in 2007 and the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup in 2008.

The defender spent three seasons of college soccer with the University of Evansville, during which time he also featured for the U.S. under-18 national team, playing with the U20s in the summer of 2003. He was a three-time All-Missouri Valley Conference pick and a first-team NSCAA All-Midwest selection as a sophomore. Burch then played for the University of Maryland, with whom he won the College Cup in 2005, scoring the winner on a 25-yard free kick against New Mexico.

In high school, Burch was named Ohio Gatorade Player of the Year as a senior, following a career that saw him score 79 goals and notch 81 assists en route to two state titles. He also led his club team, Team Dayton, to a U17 national title in 2001.

ABOUT FRANCISCO CALVO

At just 25 years old, Calvo has the potential to be a familiar name in Minnesota for years to come. Whether playing at left back or center back, the MNUFC captain does well to stretch the pitch and create imbalances in the attack. He thrives with teams that possess the ball, but is athletic enough to push up the pitch with ease and stay with his marks when under pressure.

During his first season with the Loons, Calvo started 27 of 27 matches. He scored two goals on the year, including the first in a comeback 2-2 draw with Vancouver Whitecaps FC and an 81st-minute header in a 3-2 defeat at San Jose Earthquakes. Calvo also earned a spot in the MLS Team of the Week in Week 13 for his role in Minnesota's clean-sheet win over Orlando City SC.

A standout for his club and country in defense and on set pieces, Calvo made a name for himself at Saprissa by scoring goals from set plays. In 28 matches during the 2016 season, he tallied nine goals and one assist, with six strikes in league play. An integral member of the Saprissa defensive line, he was a consistent starter in 2016 and helped the club earn a place in the CONCACAF Champions League quarterfinals. In 2015, he scored two goals in the first leg of the Torneo de Invierno final, leading Saprissa to its 32nd title. Calvo has also spent time with Herediano, Perez Zeledon, Danish champions Nordsjælland (January to summer 2013) and Santos de Guapiles at senior level.

His youth career also kicked off at Saprissa, where he featured from 2005 to 2010 before moving to the U.S. to study at San Jacinto College.

INTERNATIONAL: Calvo joined MNUFC alongside fellow Costa Rica international, Johan Venegas. The pair are well acquainted, having both represented their country, with Calvo earning his first cap in 2011. Calvo has 33 appearances with the Costa Rica national team, scoring three goals. He started all five of Costa Rica's 2017 Gold Cup matches, scoring once en route to a semifinal appearance, where Los Ticos lost 2-0 to the United States. Calvo has ambitions of making the 2018 FIFA World Cup roster with Costa Rica, who face Brazil, Switzerland and Serbia in Group E.

ABOUT SAM CRONIN

Cronin brings nine years of experience to MNUFC in his holding-midfield role and was an immediate asset to the Loons upon being traded from Colorado on March 31, 2017. He provided relief from the center of the pitch and started 18 of 18 games for the expansion side, but ended his season early due to injury.

He first joined the league in 2009, when he was selected second overall by Toronto FC in the MLS SuperDraft. Cronin played a year and a half with the Reds before being traded to San Jose Earthquakes. He made over 140 appearances for the Quakes over the next three-plus seasons, scoring five goals, winning the 2012 MLS Supporters' Shield and being voted the team's most valuable player in 2013.

Cronin signed with Colorado Rapids in 2015 and made his first MLS All-Star appearance that same year. He helped lead the Rapids to a second-place finish in the Western Conference and a spot in the MLS Cup Conference Finals.

The defensive midfielder played college soccer at Wake Forest University, where he started 98 of 98 games across his career and was named first-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference and a MAC Hermann Trophy Finalist as a senior. Prior to joining the Demon Deacons, Cronin played his high school soccer at Mount Tabor High School in Winston-Salem, North Carolina and won all-conference, all-region, all-state, all-south, Metro Conference Player of the Year and 2003 NSCAA Youth adidas All-American accolades.

ABOUT ETHAN FINLAY

United States international Finlay joined MNUFC on August 9, 2017 and debuted with the club on August 20 at Seattle Sounders FC, scoring his first goal in a 2-1 defeat. He surged from there on out, contributing two assists in a 2-1 victory at Chicago Fire, the lone goal in a 1-1 draw with Philadelphia Union, the match-winning assist in the 3-2 victory at Montreal Impact and the third goal in the 4-1 win over FC Dallas. In total, the Duluth native notched three goals and three assists in 11 appearances (11 starts) for the Loons during their inaugural campaign.

The midfielder started his professional career with Columbus Crew SC, where he spent six years after being selected No. 10 overall in the 2012 MLS SuperDraft. He first broke out under Head Coach Gregg Berhalter in 2014, leading Crew SC in goals (11) and assists (seven) en route to sharing the club's Budweiser Golden Boot. Finlay then became the second player in Columbus history to tally double figures in goals (12) and assists (13) in 2015 – enough to earn him a spot in the MLS Best XI and an MLS All-Star appearance that year.

Finlay started 79 of 79 matches over his four-year career at Creighton University, scoring 43 goals and leading the Bluejays to their first College Cup appearance since 2002 and a record of 21-2-1 during his senior season. Among many accolades, he was named a MAC Hermann Trophy Finalist, first-team NSCAA All-American, three-time first-team All-Midwest Region and two-time Missouri Valley Conference (MVC) Player of the Year. Additionally, he led the MVC in match-winning goals all four years of his career (20 of 43).

The winger totaled 98 goals and 59 assists and was honored as an NSCAA Youth All-American during his time at Marshfield High School in Marshfield, Wisconsin. He also played club soccer for FC Milwaukee, winning four state championships, two regional titles and sealing third- and second-place finishes at nationals.

INTERNATIONAL: Finlay has earned three caps for the U.S. He was first called up in January 2016 under then-Head Coach Jurgen Klinsmann and went on to debut in a friendly match against Iceland later that month. As a substitute, he provided the game-winning assist for Jozy Altidore in the 89th minute against Canada in his second appearance with the national team.

ABOUT MIGUEL IBARRA

Ibarra returned to Minnesota ahead of the 2017 season after a year and a half with Club Leon in Liga MX. During his earlier tenure with MNUFC (2012-15), he earned a pair of NASL Best XI appearances, a Golden Ball Award (MVP) and was the first U.S. lower-division player to be called up to the U.S. national team since 2005.

In the club's first year in MLS, he scored three goals and contributed four assists in 29 appearances (20 starts), including tallying two assists in the 2-0 victory over Sporting Kansas City en route to an MLS Team of the Week appearance in Week 10.

Ibarra first signed with the Loons in 2012. He had been drafted by the Portland Timbers in the MLS Supplemental Draft that same year, but was not signed by the club. In his first year as a professional, he helped Minnesota make its second-straight NASL championship appearance.

In October 2014, Ibarra became the first lower-division player to be called up to the U.S. national team since 2005, coming in as a late substitute against Honduras. He was called up for international duty four consecutive times, making three appearances – including one start – for his country.

Ibarra was transferred to Club Leon of Mexico's Liga MX in June 2015, having played nine matches for Minnesota that season. He made eight appearances for Leon in his first campaign, scoring once.

The winger played two years of college soccer at Taft College, where he was named Central Valley Conference MVP, before transferring to the University of California Irvine. With UC Irvine, he was named Big West Co-Offensive Player of the Year and first-team All-Big West as a senior, leading the team to its third NCAA tournament berth and Big West regular-season and tournament titles. Ibarra was also a two-time Offensive MVP at Lancaster High School and featured for club side Lancaster Rattlers.

INTERNATIONAL: Ibarra has made three appearances for the U.S. since October 2014, with one start. He was the first U.S. lower-division player to be called up to the national team since 2005.

ABOUT IBSON

MNUFC retained the services of veteran Ibson for the 2018 season following a superb inaugural MLS campaign in 2017. The Brazilian midfielder has been a vital part of the club for three years since joining in 2015 following time in Brazil and across Europe.

In 2017, Ibson ranked among the players with the most touches per 90 minutes across MLS and started 29 of 31 matches. He was also second among MNUFC assist-givers with six during the season. He has proven an exceptional possession player with unmatched control in tight spaces, and his ability to beat defenders and to use technical footwork to help open up space for teammates and create chances further down the pitch. Additionally, his distribution and dedication have been second to none and a critical piece of Minnesota's transition play.

"He's a natural footballer, beautiful first touch, great vision, great awareness," said Head Coach Adrian Heath in August 2017. "When we had the little run of games where we started to win games at home - I think he was the fulcrum for that. He was a catalyst for a lot of the good stuff we did."

After an impressive start to his career with Flamengo in Brazil, Ibson joined FC Porto in 2005. He made 53 appearances for the Portuguese club, seeing the pitch in both Primeira Liga play and a handful of matches in the UEFA Champions League.

He was loaned back to his home club Flamengo for three years while still under contract with Porto, taking the Brazilian league by storm upon his return with a career-high 15 goals in 2008.

Ibson moved back to Europe to sign with Spartak Moscow in 2009. He saw the bulk of his minutes there in 2010, scoring four times, including two goals in Champions League play.

After three years in Russia, Ibson once again returned to Brazil, where he played for some of the nation's top teams, including Santos, Corinthians and once more Flamengo.

Finally, he came to Minnesota in 2015, making an immediate impact with the club by scoring six times in his first season en route to a spot in the NASL Best XI.

ABOUT BRENT KALLMAN


Woodbury native Kallman has spent his entire professional career with Minnesota since first joining the club in 2013. With his signing in January 2017, he became the first Minnesotan to join the Loons in MLS. He made 23 appearances (23 starts) during the inaugural season, contributing two goals and captaining the side on a number of occasions.

The central defender has taken on a tremendous amount of leadership and earned high praise from Head Coach Adrian Heath, who described his performances as "excellent" midway through 2017, adding that "there's not many [players]" he would swap out for Kallman in MLS. He was a mainstay in Minnesota's defense in 2016 and 2017, using his speed and strength to take down attackers. His height is a huge asset on both ends of the pitch, clearing lofted balls out of the MNUFC penalty area and nodding crosses into the opponent's net. Never one to back down, he frequently makes incisive runs through the midfield and deep into enemy territory.

Prior to joining Minnesota, Kallman played four seasons at Creighton University, leading the Bluejays to back-to-back College Cup appearances. He saw limited playing time in his first season with MNUFC, featuring in just one match. But his upside in the professional game was clear and he proved his value as a dual-threat player in 2015, scoring his first professional goal late on in the campaign.

Kallman attended Woodbury High School, where he lettered in soccer, tennis, basketball and football, earning first-team all-state and all-conference in the former as a senior. He was also a member of the Minnesota Olympic Development Program.

ABOUT MATT LAMPSON

Lampson joined MNUFC on January 19, 2018 as a part of an MLS SuperDraft trade that included the 15th overall pick, \$75,000 in General Allocation Money and \$100,000 in Targeted Allocation Money. ABOUT KEVIN MOLINO

Trinidad and Tobago international Molino was Orlando City SC's first MLS signing and rejoined forces with Head Coach Adrian Heath when he moved to MNUFC in a major inter-league trade on January 26, 2017. He is a strong, technical player through the midfield and can dribble past defenders to create opportunities in front of goal.

Molino has worked closely with Heath during his career, having played under the Loons' manager from 2011 through 2016 in Orlando. In 30 appearances (30 starts) under the gaffer for MNUFC during the 2017 season, Molino contributed seven goals and a team-high nine assists. He earned a spot on the Team of the Week in Week 7 for his assist in the 2-2 draw with Houston Dynamo and in Week 21 for his two-assist effort in the 4-0 victory over D.C. United. In Week 31, Molino was named MLS Player of the Week — a first for any Minnesota United player in MLS — and earned another spot on the Team of the Week after scoring the winner in a 3-2 result at Atlanta United.

The midfielder began his career in the TT Pro League with San Juan Jabloteh and Ma Pau SC before coming stateside to join Orlando in USL. He mainly featured in a supporting role, setting up teammates with assists rather than going at goal himself. But in 2014, the club's final USL season, Molino went on a tear, scoring a league-record 20 goals in the regular season and leading the club to its third Commissioner's Cup in four years.

His transition to MLS was virtually seamless and he looked poised to continue his USL form in America's top flight. However, Molino suffered a torn ACL during a friendly early that year, forcing him to miss the remainder of the 2015 campaign. He returned in 2016 and took MLS by storm, scoring 11 goals and contributing eight assists to tie Kaka for the most points on Orlando's roster.

INTERNATIONAL: Molino was a rising star at the youth international level and has been a mainstay in the Trinidad and Tobago lineup ever since. He has 19 goals in 43 appearances, including two hat tricks, both in Caribbean Cup qualifying.

ABOUT CHRISTIAN RAMIREZ

Ramirez was Minnesota United's leading scorer during the team's inaugural season in MLS, notching 14 goals in 30 appearances (27 starts), including a second-half brace in the 4-2 victory over Real Salt Lake and the match-winner versus Orlando City SC among other impressive performances. He was forced into an immediate starting role with MNUFC before the start of the 2014 season, after first-choice forward Pablo Campos went down with an ACL injury during a preseason trip to England. Ramirez silenced his critics with a spinning shot and goal inside the box just minutes into his club debut. A tally of 20 goals that year earned him his first of two Golden Boot awards with the team.

Ramirez proved to be one of the Loons' most valuable players during his NASL career. He made 92 consecutive appearances across all competitions for Minnesota, missing just one game due to injury in the 2016 season. His consistent contributions to Minnesota's success have earned him three-straight NASL Best XI awards. He has carried that form into MLS and has now featured in 125 matches for the club across both leagues.

The forward made 24 appearances over two years with the University of California Santa Barbara before transferring to Concordia University Irvine. There, he racked up 44 goals and 18 assists in two years, putting up fantastic numbers in each season. In 2012, he was named first-team NAIA All-American and the Golden State Athletic Conference Player of the Year, with 23 goals and six assists during that campaign.

ABOUT RASMUS SCHULLER

Schuller is an active member of the Finland national team and joined the Loons after playing in the top leagues of his home country and Sweden. He was loaned to Helsingin Jalkapalloklubi (HJK) on August 9 for the latter part of the 2017 MLS season, but has since rejoined MNUFC for the 2018 campaign.

Though he primarily plays in a more defensive role in the midfield, Schuller is not afraid to make forays into the opposing penalty area. He has a deft touch that has allowed him to net several spectacular goals during his career so far.

Schuller turned pro at age 17, signing with FC Honka in his hometown of Espoo, Finland. He made 63 appearances for the club, helping it reach Europa League qualifying for three straight seasons.

He was transferred to Finnish giant HJK in early 2012 and, despite the high-pressure environment, was a huge success with the country's top club. He scored 10 goals in 88 appearances en route to three consecutive league titles and helped HJK become the first Finnish club to reach the Europa League group stage.

Following the 2015 season, Schuller transferred to BK Hacken in Sweden's Allsvenskan. He featured in roughly half of the side's league matches in 2016, scoring his first goal for the club in the final match of the season.

INTERNATIONAL: Schuller has made 25 appearances for Finland at the senior level since 2013. He featured with the U21 and U19 national teams as well.

ABOUT BOBBY SHUTTLEWORTH

Shuttleworth was traded to MNUFC from New England Revolution on February 15, 2017. In 33 appearances (32 starts) for the Loons during the 2017 season, he managed 116 saves — second among MLS keepers on the year — five shutouts and two penalty stops.

The goalkeeper was an MLS Team of the Week member in Week 8 after making three saves en route to the Loons' first shutout in MLS, a 1-0 result over Colorado Rapids. He earned another spot in Week 10 with a second clean sheet and third win of the campaign, notching seven saves in a 2-0 victory over Sporting Kansas City.

Shuttleworth spent eight seasons with the New England Revolution from 2009-2016, totaling 127 appearances, 124 starts, 34 shutouts, 344 saves and a 46-53-28 regular-season record. ABOUT JEROME THIESSON

Thiesson spent six seasons with FC Luzern in the Swiss Super League, where he started 204 of 222 matches in league play — scoring two goals and adding one more in 10 cup games with the club — before joining MNUFC in February 2017.

The defender arrived at FC Luzern after spending four years with AC Bellinzona, a lower-division Swiss Super League club from the country's Italian-speaking region. One of the main qualities Minnesota United prized in going after Thiesson was his ability to play either right or left back.

ABOUT JOHAN VENEGAS

Costa Rica international Venegas was first acquired by Montreal Impact from L.D. Alajuelense in August 2015. After featuring in 12 matches in his debut season in MLS, the attacker struggled to earn a starting spot in his first full campaign in the league, despite shining for his country at the 2016 Copa America Centenario and then against the United States in a November World Cup qualifier.

During his career, Venegas has also played for Costa Rican clubs Puntarenas, Santos de Guapiles and Barrio Mexico.

INTERNATIONAL: At the international level, Venegas is a regular member of the Costa Rica national team, scoring nine goals in 44 matches. He made his senior debut on September 3, 2014 against Nicaragua in the Copa Centroamericana, scoring his first career goal that game before helping Los Ticos win the tournament. He appeared in four 2015 CONCACAF Gold Cup games and two out of three Copa America Centenario matches.

MINNESOTA'S SOCCER HISTORY

AN ERA BEGINS

In 1976, professional soccer came to the North Star State with the arrival of the Minnesota Kicks. The club played in the North American Soccer League (NASL) and shared the Metropolitan Stadium in Bloomington with the Minnesota Twins and Vikings. The Kicks started hot, winning the Western Division title, placing second in the Soccer Bowl and posting an average attendance of 23,121 in its first season.

For the next four years, the Kicks were dominant, winning their division each year and peaking with an average attendance of 32,775 in 1977. The team's standout star was Alan Willey, an incisive English striker known as "The Artful Dodger" who finished his career as the NASL's third leading scorer. But just five years after their first season, the Kicks were forced to fold due to financial difficulties.

In 1984, soccer returned to Minnesota when the NASL's Fort Lauderdale Strikers were relocated and rebranded the Minnesota Strikers. The next year, the NASL folded and the Strikers joined the Major Indoor Soccer League. They played at the Metrodome until 1988, at which time the team returned to Fort Lauderdale.

THE THUNDER ROLLS

In 1990, Minnesota once again became home to professional soccer when the Minnesota Thunder joined the United States Interregional Soccer League after competing for four years as an amateur team. Playing their matches at the National Sports Center in Blaine and run by Buzz Lagos, the team won its division and reached the finals in each of its first two seasons.

Over the next decade and a half, the team hit many highs, including their first victory over an MLS side when they defeated the LA Galaxy in the fourth round of the U.S. Open Cup in 2004. Following the 2009 season, the Thunder left the USL to become a part of the reinstated NASL, but were forced to fold before the next season could begin.

THE STARS SHINE

Following the dissolution of the Thunder, the National Sports Center decided to start its own second division team. The team was christened the NSC Minnesota Stars and their first match as members of the provisional USSF D2 came against the Vancouver Whitecaps on April 11, 2010. In 2011, the team was purchased by the NASL and joined that league, eventually knocking off the Tampa Bay Rowdies and the Carolina RailHawks on the way to winning the NASL Soccer Bowl with the smallest payroll in the league. The team that nobody wanted had just won the cup.

They ended their next season unsure of their future, but impressed by the passion of the fans and the atmosphere at NSC, Dr. Bill McGuire purchased the club in late 2012. The team would be reborn as Minnesota United FC in March of 2013.

THE LOONS BEGIN THEIR JOURNEY

More than just a new name, Minnesota United carried with it a clear mission: to pull together all the legacies of professional soccer in the state and become a rallying point for the sport to the diverse communities of Minnesota. The new badge incorporated elements integral to the identity of the state: the North Star, the blue stripe of the Mississippi, the gray of the Iron Range and, of course, the loon.

In 2014, MNUFC captured the Spring Season Championship and finished with the best overall record in the NASL. The club notched victories over Mexico's U21 national team and Swansea City of the English Premier League in international friendlies played in front of record crowds at NSC. Then, on March 25, 2015, Minnesota United announced it would become the 23rd team in MLS. The Loons would play their first MLS match on March 3, 2017 against the Portland Timbers.

THE JOURNEY CONTINUES IN MLS

A major component of Minnesota United's move to MLS was the promise of a soccer-specific stadium and in late June 2017, initial work began at the site of what will be the new permanent home for MNUFC

Set to be complete in 2019, Allianz Field, in the Midway neighborhood of St. Paul, will have an initial capacity of 19,400. Average attendance at TCF Bank Stadium already exceeds this number. It will become a beacon for soccer throughout the region and will be the first stadium in Minnesota built without a direct public subsidy.

If the last four decades of soccer in Minnesota have shown anything, it's that long journeys don't have just one starting point — they begin again and again. Yet through all the twists and turns, a foundation was laid. MNUFC is building on that foundation and elevating the sport and its culture not only on the pitch, but within the community.

ABOUT MNUFC ACADEMY

Functioning as a unique, top-tier program within the state of Minnesota and the designated MLS youth home territory, the Minnesota United FC Academy is a destination for select, high-potential talent referred from the region's youth clubs.

The Development Academy was created in 2007 by U.S. Soccer, following a comprehensive review of elite player development in the United States and around the world. The Academy program's philosophy is based on increased training, fewer total games and the use of international rules of competition. Today, over 150 clubs across the U.S. have been granted an Academy license and are members of the Development Academy.

Major League Soccer requires all MLS clubs to operate an academy program as part of their club's player development strategy. In addition, MLS organizes and conducts the Generation adidas Cup, open only to academies from MLS clubs.

MNUFC launched the first phase of its academy with the U13 and U14 age groups in 2017. Over the coming years, the club will have teams at the U15, U17 and U19 levels.

Provide a superior soccer education within a professional club environment, where young, talented athletes can realize their potential by embracing the philosophy, values and culture of Minnesota United, in the process growing into quality individuals, respected teammates and outstanding players with the potential to become professional athletes.

ABOUT TCF BANK STADIUM

TCF Bank Stadium is a state-of-the-art stadium located on the campus of the University of Minnesota. The facility opened in 2009 and is the home of the Minnesota Golden Gophers football team. The venue has been the home of the Minnesota Vikings (2013-2015) and will be the home field of Minnesota United for the 2018 season.

The main high-definition video display in the stadium is one of the largest in college sports at approximately 48 feet high by 108 feet wide. It boasts Daktronics HD-16 technology.

The University achieved LEED certification (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) for TCF Bank Stadium, making it the first LEED certified college football stadium in the country. The certification is achieved by accumulating credits for various environmental and sustainable efforts in design and construction.

The stadium is a temporary home for Minnesota United, as the club is currently constructing Allianz Field in the Midway neighborhood of St. Paul, set to open in spring 2019.

A NEW HOME FOR SOCCER IN MINNESOTA

On February 24, 2016, Minnesota United FC unveiled stadium renderings for the new home of Major League Soccer in Minnesota: Allianz Field. The 19,400-seat stadium will boast the latest in amenities and technology while also being sustainably designed to minimize environmental impact and energy usage.

The club broke ground on the new stadium on December 12, 2016.

On July 25, 2017, Minnesota United and Allianz Life Insurance Company of North America (Allianz), a leading provider of retirement and protection solutions, announced a multi-year naming rights sponsorship agreement for the team's new soccer stadium in St. Paul, Minnesota.

Scheduled to complete construction in time for the start of the 2019 MLS season, Allianz Field joins seven other Allianz-sponsored stadiums located in some of the most dynamic cities around the world. As the newest landmark in the greater Minneapolis/St. Paul area, Allianz Field will be among the most state-of-the-art soccer stadiums in North America and a place where members of the Twin Cities community can gather for a variety of events, ranging from MLS and global exhibition matches to youth soccer and community celebrations.

CAPACITY

Allianz Field will initially hold approximately 19,400 fans with avenues for expansion in the future. Included in the United seating plan is safe standing space in a dedicated Supporters' Section along with a variety of suites, club seats, loge boxes and general seating.

360-DEGREE CANOPY

Fan sections will be covered by a 360-degree canopy that will serve two purposes: to keep the noise of the crowd contained within Allianz Field and to protect fans from the elements throughout a match. Approximately 85% of the crowd will be protected from inclement weather by a translucent polymer mesh rainscreen.

INTIMATE SEATING

Allianz Field is being built with fans as the top priority. As such, every seat in the stadium will provide fantastic sight lines to all the action on the pitch. The closest seat will be 17 feet away from the pitch, while the farthest seat from the sideline will be just 125 feet away — providing one of the most intimate settings in all of professional sports. The steep rake (33.4 degrees in the upper bowl and 34.75 degrees in the Supporters' Section) will put fans right on top of the action.

FIELD HEATING SYSTEM

Like Target Field, Allianz Field will use a hydronic field heating system to keep the grass in optimal shape even during early spring and late fall matches. The comprehensive climate control system for the grass includes an advanced drainage system that will harness and re-use stormwater, minimizing discharge.

LED LIGHTING

LED lighting outside Allianz Field will allow it to change colors, light intensity and patterning to reflect the festivities inside as well as shift to represent initiatives and ideas of the club. The elegant "flow" design concept will dazzle soccer fans and Minnesotans alike as it simultaneously blends in and stands out in a reinvigorated Midway neighborhood.

DISTRIBUTED ANTENNA SYSTEM

Never miss a call, never miss a moment — Allianz Field will allow fans to follow along online and post their favorite moments of the match flawlessly on social media platforms.

LOCATION

Whether walking, driving, biking or taking public transportation, getting to Allianz Field is easy and convenient. Centrally located on a major light rail and bus rapid transit lines as well as highway access, you can arrive from anywhere with ease.

GREEN SPACE

For celebrations pre-match, post-match and throughout the week, Allianz Field will lend itself to soccer fans and all Minnesotans. The stadium is designed to revitalize a 34-acre site, including a 1.5-acre green space surrounding the stadium to bring a touch of nature to Midway. Allianz Field is designed to be bird-safe, with energy efficient and sustainable features.

COMMUNITY

Allianz Field will help to revitalize a historic Saint Paul neighborhood. The stadium will be built on the former location of Metro Transit's bus barn — a long vacant area. A plan to restore the neighborhood around the stadium will bring new jobs and more visitors to the region while providing easy access to fans of the diverse soccer culture of Minnesota.

Allianz Field will play host to all Minnesota United home matches, and could also be used for concerts, youth soccer matches and other sporting events.

FUNDING

Allianz Field is being privately funded by the Minnesota United ownership group without any taxpayer-supported subsidies. Minnesota United will be the first professional team in Minnesota to construct a stadium without a direct public subsidy and is dedicated to providing fans with a dynamic match day facility with natural grass that is accessible to all people and communities. To support the site, the city of Saint Paul will provide \$18 million in infrastructure improvements surrounding the stadium.

Private Commitments to the Community:

- Purchase the MLS expansion franchise (at a cost of \$100 million dollars).
- Make annual rent payments to the Met Council worth a total of \$29 million over the course of 50+ years.
- Build a first-class MLS soccer facility through private funding (estimated at \$150 million).
- Coordinate development opportunities around the stadium.

TRANSPORTATION

Allianz Field in the Midway neighborhood of Saint Paul will offer unique opportunities for fans to ride or walk to matches. Located just 7.5 miles from downtown Minneapolis and 5 miles from downtown St. Paul, Allianz Field is centrally located to reach fans throughout the Twin Cities area.

Car – The stadium is located along I-94, which cuts through Minneapolis and Saint Paul. Fans from across the state can hop on the highway and drive directly to Allianz Field.


Bus – Metro Transit A Line service and local bus Route 16 allow transportation options most of the day for commuters along the University and Snelling routes.

Light Rail - The Green Line light rail transit line has a stop at the stadium site.

Bike – Live within biking range of the proposed site? Perfect! Allianz Field is designed to store bikes safely and encourage green travel to and from the facility.

Park-and-Ride – Minnesota United is committed to making access to the stadium as easy as possible. Plans are being made to provide a park-and-ride experience similar to that of the State Fair for Minnesota United matches.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER

Minnesota United FC plays in North America's top professional soccer league, Major League Soccer (MLS). The league features 23 teams from across the United States and Canada.

After a successful bid to host the World Cup in 1994, the United States Soccer Federation (USSF) founded MLS to bring a top-level soccer league back to the country for the first time since 1984, when the original NASL folded. The league was set to begin play in 1996 with 10 teams: Colorado Rapids, Columbus Crew (SC), D.C. United, Dallas Burn (FC Dallas), Kansas City Wiz (Sporting Kansas City), Los Angeles Galaxy, New England Revolution, NY/NJ MetroStars (New York Red Bulls), San Jose Clash (Earthquakes) and Tampa Bay Mutiny.

The league's first match was played on April 6, 1996 as the San Jose Clash played D.C. United in front of 31,000 fans at Spartan Stadium. The league drew large crowds in its opening season, in part because of attracting severals star players from the 1994 World Cup.

Today, the league has expanded to 23 teams, including Minnesota United and Atlanta United – who joined in 2017 – and Los Angeles FC, which enters the league this year.

As MLS has grown, more clubs have moved from playing in shared American football venues into soccer-specific stadiums. Columbus Crew SC was the first team to move into a soccer-specific stadium by opening MAPFRE Stadium in 1999. When Minnesota's Allianz Field opens in 2019, there will be 20 soccer-specific stadiums in MLS.

LEAGUE FORMAT

The league is split into two conferences: East and West. Each team plays 34 games during the season, 17 at home and 17 on the road. Teams will face each conference opponent twice, with one match at home and one away. Western Conference teams will play an additional intra-conference game, while Eastern Conference sides will play two. All clubs face each non-conference opponent once. The top six teams in each conference qualify for MLS Cup Playoffs at the end of the year.

The postseason begins with the third through sixth seeds in each conference playing in a knockout round. The winners advance to the Conference Semifinals to play the first and second seeds in the conference. This round, the format switches to a two-match aggregate series, with the team that scores the most goals over the series moving on. The same format is used for the Conference Finals. The winner of each Conference Final moves on to the MLS Cup Final. The final is a single match, hosted by the team with the best regular-season record, with the winner declared MLS Cup Champion.



HISTORY AND FORMAT

Founded in 1914, the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup is the oldest soccer tournament in America and the third-longest-running open soccer tournament in the world. The tournament follows a single elimination knockout format and consists of clubs from MLS, NASL, USL, and many amateur teams from across the country. The tournament lasts nine rounds, running from April to September.

The 2017 Open Cup featured a record 99 teams from across the U.S. Soccer ranks, from amateur teams up to MLS. More teams are added from higher up the soccer pyramid as the tournament progresses, starting with adult club teams in the preliminary rounds. Local and regional amateur teams that qualified for the tournament will enter in the first round. Teams qualifying from national amateur leagues, like the NPSL and PDL, will join in later rounds followed by teams from USL and MLS as the tournament progresses.

The 2018 tournament will be the 105th edition of the Cup. More details on the 2018 tournament will be released at a later date.

The champion receives a \$250,000 prize and a berth in the 2019 CONCACAF Champions League. The runner-up is awarded \$60,000 and the team that advances the furthest from each division, besides MLS, will receive \$15,000.

Sporting Kansas City is the reigning champion after defeating the New York Red Bulls to claim its fourth title.

The Chicago Fire, Seattle Sounders and Sporting Kansas City have the most titles of teams currently in operation, with four each. The all-time record belongs to Bethlehem Steel and Maccabi Los Angeles, who won five cups each while they were active.
