Forming the Union



February 28, 2008 – Keystone Sports and Entertainment LLC, the ownership group of iStar Financial CEO Jay Sugarman, veteran sports executive Nick Sakiewicz and Christopher and Robert Buccini, founding partners of The Buccini/Pollin Group, are accompanied by Major League Soccer Commissioner Don Garber as MLSPhilly2010 is announced as the 16th MLS club.



December 1, 2008 – Ground is broken on PPL Park, the state-of-the-art soccer-specific stadium to serve as the home of Philadelphia Union. The stadium is the anchor of a broader revitalization project planned for the Chester waterfront that includes corporate and retail properties.

May 11, 2009 – A press conference held at City Hall reveals the name and crest for MLSPhilly2010. Chairman/Owner Jay Sugarman, along with Team President Tom Veit, Philadelphia Mayor Michael Nutter and Commissioner Garber, unveil Philadelphia Union and its crest, featuring the snake and shield.



May 29, 2009 – Peter Nowak, a Major League Soccer legend who won championships as both a player and coach, is named the Team Manager of Philadelphia Union during a press conference held in the lobby of The Wharf at Rivertown, soon-to-be home of the club's front office.



July 13, 2009 – Philadelphia Union announce a comprehensive partnership with Comcast-Spectacor, a Philadelphia-based sports and entertainment company, to manage the new stadium, provide concessions and catering and support ticket sales.

September 29, 2009 – YSC Academy is selected as the official youth development partner of Philadelphia Union.

November 9, 2009 – John Hackworth, formerly of the United States Men's National Team Technical Staff, is announced as Coach and Youth Development Coordinator for Philadelphia Union.

November 13, 2009 – Philadelphia Union unveil their first-ever home game jersey.

November/December 2009 – More than 1,400 aspiring soccer players participate in Open Tryouts in Late November and early December. The sessions are held at both Mercer County Park in New Jersey and the University of Pennsylvania's Rhodes Field. Ultimately, no trialists made the final roster.

November 25, 2009 – Team Manager Peter Nowak and the rest of the technical staff have their day to shine during the Expansion Draft. The club selects the maximum 10 players as outlined by Expansion Draft rules.



December 8, 2009 – The first 11 players in Philadelphia Union history are introduced to the fan base at Tir Na Nog Pub at 16th and Arch Streets in Philadelphia.

December 18, 2009 – Rob Vartughian, former assistant coach at the University of Maryland, joins the Philadelphia Union Technical Staff as Assistant Coach/Goalkeeper Coordinator.

December 21, 2009 – Philadelphia Union name Reading United AC (formerly Reading Rage) of the USL PDL as their exclusive minor league affiliate club.

January 14, 2010 – The Union selects Danny Mwanga with the first overall pick in the 2010 MLS SuperDraft. Also selected are Amobi Okugo (sixth overall), Jack McInerney (seventh overall), Toni Stahl (2nd round), Kyle Nakazawa (3rd round) and Brian Perk (4th round).



January 21, 2010 – JP Dellacamera, long-time commentator of ABC and ESPN's Major League Soccer coverage, is announced as the play-by-play man for the inaugural season.

January 28, 2010 – Philadelphia Union and 6abc announce a multi-year partnership which will give 6abc broadcast rights to many of the club's games, including re-broadcasting of all games on 6abc's digital channel, the Live Well HD Network.

February 3, 2010 – The schedule is announced for the inaugural season, with Philadelphia Union opening PPL Park on June 27 against Seattle Sounders FC. The first-ever club game will be March 25 at Seattle, and the first game in Philadelphia is April 10 against D.C. United (Lincoln Financial Field).

February 24, 2010 – Keystone Sports and Entertainment LLC and PPL EnergyPlus announce an 11-year naming rights deal for Chester Stadium, to be named PPL Park. PPL EnergyPlus will also serve as the exclusive energy partner of the Philadelphia Union.

March 1, 2010 – Harrisburg City Islanders are announced as the exclusive USL-2 affiliate club of Philadelphia Union, adding to the current player development model.

March 25, 2010 – Philadelphia Union play first-ever MLS match against Seattle Sounders FC at Qwest Field, a 2-0 loss in front of 36,300 fans.

April 10, 2010 – Philadelphia Union play first home game at Lincoln Financial Field, a 3-2 win over D.C. United. Sebastian Le Toux scores the first goal in club history en route to the first hat trick. 34,870 fans witness the first win in Philadelphia Union history.



April 21, 2010 – Chester's own Widener University is announced as the official University of Philadelphia Union, PPL Park and the Union's youth soccer partners, Eastern Pennsylvania Youth Soccer Association (EPYSA) and Delaware Youth Soccer Association (DYSA).

May 19, 2010 – Team announces that all 12,000 season tickets have been sold out.

May 29, 2010 – Philadelphia Union gets their first road win against Houston Dynamo by a score of 3-2.

June 26, 2010 – Philadelphia Union launches new website a day before the opener at PPL Park.



June 27, 2010 – PPL Park is opened in a match against Seattle Sounders FC. Philadelphia Union scored three second-half goals to rally back from a 1-0 halftime deficit and win 3-1. The first Union goal at PPL Park came off the foot of Sebastien Le Toux on a penalty kick in the 55th minute. Fred scored the first game-winning goal in PPL Park history in the 79th minute.



July 14, 2010 – Philadelphia Union win 1-0 at PPL Park in first-ever European friendly against Scottish Premier League club Celtic FC.

July 19, 2010 – Sebastien Le Toux, Philadelphia Union M/F, is selected to the MLS All-Star team by Head Coach Bruce Arena. At the break, Le Toux leads the league in combined goals and assists.

July 21, 2010 – English Premier League powerhouse Manchester United wins friendly 1-0 against Philadelphia Union at Lincoln Financial Field.

September 1, 2010 – Philadelphia Union defeat Chivas de Guadalajara of the Mexican First Division in a 1-0 friendly.

September 11, 2010 – Union secure first-ever shutout against Chicago Fire. GK Brad Knighton earned the clean sheet and Sebastien Le Toux scored the lone goal in the 1-0 victory.

September 21, 2010 – Philadelphia is awarded a \$50,000 grant by the Pepsi Refresh Project to fund a full-size natural grass field for the youth of Chester, Pa.

October 24, 2010 – Sebastien Le Toux sets new MLS record for a single player's involvement in his club's goals, tallying 14 goals and 11 assists, accounting for 71.4% of the team's goals.

November 3, 2010 – Sebastien Le Toux receives the XBOX 360 Individual Fair Play Award, given to the player who exhibits the best sportsmanship and receives the least amount of cards throughout the season.

November 18, 2010 – Sebastien Le Toux is named to Major League Soccer's Best XI.

December 17, 2010 – Philadelphia Union hire Diego Gutierrez, a former MLS player, as the Head of Scouting and Player Development.

December 22, 2010 – Philadelphia Union sign their first homegrown player, 15-year-old MF Zach Pfeffer.

December 27, 2010 – MLSSoccer.com awards F Sebastien Le Toux with the Assist of the Year.

January 11, 2011 – Philadelphia Union and Bimbo Bakeries USA announce a four-year partnership agreement to be the official jersey sponsor of the Union and all other team apparel.



January 13, 2011 – Philadelphia Union select three players at the 2011 MLS SuperDraft in Baltimore, Md. They select GK Zac MacMath (5th overall), MF Michael Farfan (23rd overall), and Levi Houapeu (41st overall)



March 3, 2011 – Philadelphia Union announced the launch of their Philadelphia Union Soccer Schools, the official soccer camps of the Union. The youth summer camp program will run throughout July and August at four area locations. Boys and girls ages 6-14 will get to experience a top level professional environment as they participate in skills development, contests, station work, scrimmages and game action.



March 10, 2011 – Philadelphia Union add Comcast SportsNet and the Comcast Network to their family of local television partners, joining current Union broadcast partner 6abc to air all Philadelphia Union games that are not televised nationally.

July 15, 2011 – Philadelphia Union host the first ever River Cup, where the front office face the supporters group Sons of Ben in charity match, raising \$25,000.

July 20, 2011 – Philadelphia Union defeat the English Premier League side Everton 1-0 on a goal from 17-year-old Christian Hernandez in front of 18,582 fans at PPL Park.

August 12, 2011 – Philadelphia Union sign 22-year-old Freddy Adu, reuniting him with manager Peter Nowak, who was the head coach of D.C. United during Adu's first years in the MLS.

August 17, 2011 – Union host first-ever Supporters Summit August 17. Over 200 members of Sons of Ben attend the first ever Philadelphia Union Supporters Summit, an open forum with the leaders of the Union and the MLS.

October 20, 2011 – Philadelphia Union sign a deal with CBS RADIO's SportsRadio 610 WIP, giving the Union their first-ever radio partner. SportsRadio 610 WIP will broadcast live 17 Union matches in 2012.

October 30, 2011 – Philadelphia host the Houston Dynamo for the first playoff game in franchise history in front of 18,539 fans at PPL Park.

January 12, 2012 – Philadelphia Union select three players at the MLS SuperDraft in Kansas City, Mo. They select Chandler Hoffman (13th overall), Greg Jordan (32nd overall) and Raymon Gaddis (35th overall).



January 24, 2012 Major League Soccer announces that Philadelphia will be the host city for the 2012 AT&T MLS All-Star Game on July 25, with the match between the league's top players and a renowned international club to be played in Chester, Pa., at PPL Park. Philadelphia Mayor Michael A. Nutter and City of Chester Mayor John Linder joined MLS Commissioner Don Garber and Philadelphia Union CEO & Operating Partner Nick Sakiewicz for the announcement at City Hall.



January 27, 2012 – Philadelphia Union announce a strategic partnership with Costa Rica's Deportivo Saprissa that focuses on player development and training methodology, as well as best practices in commercial, stadium and financial operations.

February 18, 2012 – The Philadelphia Union draw 1-1 with the Orlando City Lions during their first preseason game at the Citrus Bowl.

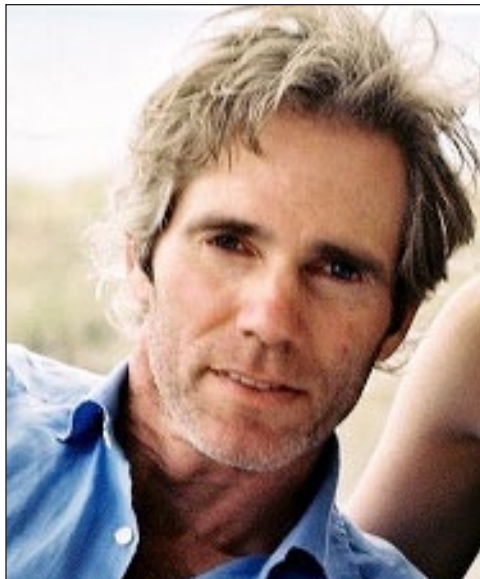

Jay Sugarman is the Chairman and Founding Owner of the Philadelphia Union and Keystone Sports and Entertainment LLC. Guided by Mr. Sugarman's focus on long term success, Keystone has been putting in place the people and elements needed to create an extraordinary soccer club and entertainment company for supporters throughout the Greater Philadelphia Region and beyond. 2012 will mark the Union's third season as a member of Major League Soccer's Eastern Conference and second full season in Keystone's newly built \$122 million stadium, PPL Park.

Mr. Sugarman is also Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of iStar Financial (NYSE:SFI), a leading provider of custom-tailored capital to high-end private and corporate owners of real estate in the United States which he formed in 1993 and took public in 1998. iStar's current \$10 billion portfolio of real estate interests is located in most major markets throughout the United States and includes interests in the office, industrial, multifamily, hotel, land and entertainment sectors. Prior to forming iStar Financial and its predecessors, Mr. Sugarman managed private investment funds on behalf of the Burden family, a branch of the Vanderbilts, and the Ziff family.

Mr. Sugarman graduated summa cum laude from Princeton University, where he was nominated for valedictorian and received the Paul Volcker Award in Economics. He received his M.B.A. with high distinction from Harvard Business School, graduating as a Baker Scholar and recipient of the school's academic prizes for both finance and marketing.

**Nick Sakiewicz**

CEO & Operating Partner



A native of Passaic, New Jersey Nick Sakiewicz (pronounced Suh-kev-itch) grew up playing on pitches and playgrounds of that North Jersey working class town. A first generation American he acquired his soccer education playing in the diverse ethnic clubs throughout the northeast. Now, 16 years after joining Major League Soccer as a founding executive, Sakiewicz is the CEO & Operating Partner of Keystone Sports and Entertainment LLC. It is his passion that drives the organization. It is his insight and expertise that created the environment that enabled the club to build PPL Park, a picturesque, soccer-specific stadium on the banks of the Delaware River in Chester, Pa., at a time when elsewhere, other entrepreneurs were delaying and even shutting down projects.

Prior to helping to create Keystone Sport and Entertainment LLC, Sakiewicz enjoyed a diverse and successful business career, in manufacturing, retail, real estate and financial services, in addition to sports management. In the years immediately preceding the formation of the parent company of Philadelphia Union, he was the President of AEG New York. As such, Sakiewicz was responsible for operating AEG's sports, entertainment and real estate assets, including the development and construction of Red Bull Arena, a new, state-of-the-art stadium and mixed use development in Harrison, New Jersey. Among his successes with AEG, was his role in the record-setting \$100-million sale of the New York/New Jersey MetroStars to Red Bull Energy Drink Company of Austria.

Earlier, Sakiewicz had been the President and General Manager of the MetroStars, serving in that capacity for five seasons from 2000–2005. The year before he took over, the club won just seven games during the 1999 season. After a complete overhaul of the organization and in his first season, the MetroStars went 17-12-3 en route to capturing the MLS Eastern Division title. In 2001, another winning season put the club into the playoffs in consecutive seasons for the first time in their history. Following the 2002 season, Sakiewicz hired fellow New Jersey native and current U.S. Men's National Team Head Coach Bob Bradley from the Chicago Fire. Under Bradley, the MetroStars reached the finals of the 2003 U.S. Open Cup and returned to the MLS playoffs in 2003 and 2004, making it four out of five seasons under the leadership of Sakiewicz that they participated in the post-season. On the business side, Sakiewicz built the MetroStars "Red and Black" brand and AEG New York into one of the most successful Major League Soccer organizations consistently ranking the team in the top 3 in ticket and sponsorship sales. During his tenure there, the club increased corporate sponsorship revenues more than 500% and grew attendance every season—two extraordinary feats, despite not owning its own stadium.

A two-time MLS Executive of the Year, Sakiewicz garnered his first award in 1999 as President and General Manager of the League-owned Tampa Bay



Mutiny. In his three-plus seasons in Tampa, he led the Mutiny on a steady path of growth in both season ticket and sponsorship sales and helped the Mutiny secure a new multi-year lease with Raymond James Stadium. Sakiewicz has had a successful history and proven track record in recognizing, signing and developing young talent. Among those whose careers he has touched, are: Tim Howard (Everton), Clint Mathis (retired), Steve Ralston (retired) and Eddie Gaven (Columbus Crew) as well as savvy big-name international veterans under the tight player salary controls of MLS such as Tab Ramos (USA), Carlos Valderamma (Colombia), Youri Djorkaeff (France), Adolfo Valencia (Colombia), Lothar Matheus (Germany) and Amado Guevara (Honduras).

As a collegiate goalkeeper at the University of New Haven, he earned NCAA All-American honors in 1981 and All-New England honors each season from 1980-83. He is a member of the UNH Hall of Fame and still holds every major goalkeeping record at the school. He was part of the player pool for the 1980 Olympic Team, but the team was never selected by the coach and Philadelphia soccer icon Walt Chyzowych, after President Carter decided to boycott the '80 games in Moscow.

Sakiewicz went on to play professionally with F.C. Nantes in the French First Division as a developmental player. In 1983, he played for legendary coach Dr. Joe Machnik with the New York Arrows of the Major Indoor Soccer League. The following season, he was back in Europe, playing for F.C. Belenenses of the Portuguese First Division. After recovering from a serious leg injury he later played one more season for the Tampa Bay Rowdies in the APSL during the 1989 season, and then retired from professional soccer.





The Buccini/Pollin Group

The Buccini/Pollin Group is a full service real estate acquisition, development and management company with primary offices in Wilmington, Delaware and Washington, D.C. The firm constructs, owns and manages office buildings, hotels, multi-family residential communities, retail space and parking garages.

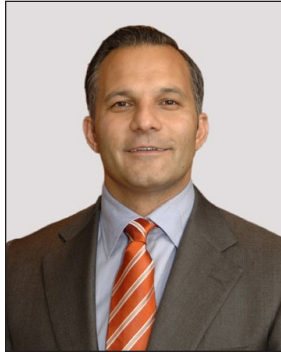

Working in tandem with CEO and Operating Partner Nick Sakiewicz, Debusschere managed all relationships with key political, banking and construction partners relating to the PPL Park construction project and following the opening of PPL Park in June of 2010, is now responsible for ongoing stadium operations. In addition, Debusschere oversees Keystone Sports and Entertainment's operating budget and all financial, treasury, accounting, insurance, human resource and IT related matters.

A Certified Public Accountant and Certified Treasury Professional, Debusschere has amassed more than a decade of vast and varied financial expertise prior to joining Keystone Sports and Entertainment. He began his career as an auditor and business advisor at

PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP where he achieved the role of Manager and was most recently an Assistant Vice President at Philadelphia Insurance Companies, where his broad range of responsibilities covered budgeting and finance, treasury, SEC reporting and accounting.

Technical Staff



Peter Nowak

Executive Vice President of Soccer Operations/Team Manager



Peter Nowak's storied soccer journey began in Pabianice, a small town in Poland, at a time closed behind the Iron Curtain. He left home at the age of 15 to pursue his soccer dreams, which have led him to Philadelphia. Responsible for all facets of the club's training and on-field performance, Nowak has established similar programs for all related youth and minor league partners and affiliates as he enters his third year as team manager. In March 2011, Nowak added Executive Vice President of Soccer Operations to his title as a representation of his extensive duties as they relate to all soccer operations within the Union organization.

After working to refine his playing skills in Turkey and Switzerland, Nowak moved to Germany to become a member of Dynamo Dresden. It was his next stop, however, where Nowak really hit his stride. In 1994, he signed with the Bundesliga, first with FC Kaiserslautern and later 1860 Munich, where he played until 1998. During the 1995-96 season, Nowak was voted the Bundesliga's Best Playmaker, as well as the Polish Player of the Year.

In 1998, Nowak moved to the United States and joined the Chicago Fire for the team's inaugural MLS season. He promptly established himself as one of the best players in the League, leading the Fire to a MLS Cup ('98) and two US Open Cups ('98, '00). Nowak patrolled the Fire midfield for 114 league games, registering 26 goals and 48 assists. He played with Chicago for five seasons and retired in 2003.

Nowak worked in the Fire front office for one season, before moving back to coaching in 2004 when he was hired as head coach of D.C. United. In his first season in D.C., he guided a side that had finished no better than fourth in the Eastern Conference the previous four seasons, to a MLS Cup Championship, with a 3-2 victory over the Kansas City Wizards. With the victory, Nowak became and still remains, the only man in League history to win a MLS Cup as both a player and a head coach. Additionally, he became the first head coach in all major American sports in the last half-century to win a championship within two years of retiring as a player.

In 2005, as part of its 10th anniversary celebration, Major League Soccer named Nowak to its All-Time Best XI, a selection of the best 11 players in the history of the League. In three years with United, Nowak led the club to a record of 42-27-25, while winning the Supporters' Shield for best regular season record in 2006, with a 15-7-10 mark.

During his illustrious playing career, Nowak served as the captain of the Polish National Team for three years, playing in 24 games and scoring three goals. In 2005, Polish President Aleksander Kwansniewski rewarded Nowak for his contributions made to his homeland, bestowing the prestigious Cavalier Cross of Merit of the Republic of Poland.

That international experience no doubt helped as he moved on to become an assistant to United States Men's National Team Head Coach Bob Bradley, who had been his coach in Chicago. Nowak also served as head coach of the U-23 National Team, where together with Bradley, they coached over 70 players and orchestrated the USA's championship run to a title in the 2007 CONCACAF Gold Cup.



John Hackworth

Coach



After two years with the United States Men's National Team, Coach John Hackworth reunited with Team Manager Peter Nowak in 2010 and has been key in creating a style and level of commitment for all who wear Philadelphia Union colors, from the first team all the way down the ladder in the youth program.

Hackworth spent two years alongside Nowak as an assistant to Head Coach Bob Bradley, and helped guide the USMNT to a first place finish in group play in World Cup Qualifying and a second place finish in the 2009 FIFA Confederations Cup. In addition to his position with the USMNT, Hackworth also served as the Development Academy Technical Director in U.S. Soccer's player development initiative that launched in 2007.

Prior to joining the USMNT staff, he spent more than six years with the U.S. Under-17 Residency Program in Bradenton, Fla. Hackworth served as head coach of the 2005 and 2007 World Cup teams, leading the squad to a fifth place finish in the 2005 U-17 World Cup and winning CONCACAF qualifying in both '05 and '07. While in Bradenton, he was instrumental in helping the maturation of some of the best young professionals, including Michael Bradley, Jonathan Spector, Jozy Altidore, and a large number of Union players. In 2008, Hackworth was recognized for his contribution to the game of soccer, earning the United States Olympic Committee Developmental Coach of the Year Award.

Hackworth was a top level college coach for nine years, spending four as the head coach at the University of South Florida and five years as the top assistant at Wake Forest. During his tenure at USF, he helped the Bulls to a 47-32-2 (.592) record and two NCAA Tournament appearances (1998 and 2001). In 1998, Hackworth's squad won the Conference USA Tournament championship and a share of the C-USA regular season title. For his efforts, Hackworth was tabbed the league's Coach of the Year.

Born and raised in Dunedin, Fla., Hackworth graduated from Wake Forest in 1992, helping his coach and Philadelphia soccer icon Walt Chyzowych lead the club to a No. 3 ranking nationally in 1991 and 1992. He went on to play professionally for the Carolina Dynamo of the A-League in 1997, a team that finished as national runners-up.



Rob Vartughian

Assistant Coach/Goalkeeper Coordinator



Perhaps no one has had more success in the country at grooming some of the nation's top goalkeepers than Assistant Coach/Goalkeeper Coordinator Rob Vartughian. In seven seasons with the University of Maryland men's soccer team, he helped the Terps to seven straight NCAA tournament appearances, four College Cups, two NCAA national championships and a pair of ACC Championships.

In his time with Maryland, Vartughian has guided the careers of young goalkeepers with great success, including the Union's 2011 MLS SuperDraft First Round selection Zac MacMath and former Union 'keeper Chris Seitz. Both MacMath and Seitz made crucial saves to lead the Terps to an NCAA Championship in their respective freshman seasons.

Vartughian was instrumental in not only working with the keepers, but was heavily involved with all aspects of the program. His efforts helped land recruiting classes that were annually considered among the best in the country. Recognized as one of the nation's top assistant coaches, he was an integral part of the player development of over 25 MLS Superdraft picks.

In addition to his duties with the Terps, Vartughian has been a goalkeeper coach at the national level and involved with several of the U.S. national teams. Since 2008, he has served as an assistant coach with the U-15 National Team in various camps both domestically and internationally. Vartughian also served as the goalkeeper coach for the United States U-23 Olympic team that traveled to Japan in preparation for the 2008 Olympic in Beijing. In Nov. 2011, Vartughian served as a goalkeeper coach with the U-23 Olympic and U-20 National Teams that travelled to Germany. He also serves as a scout for the U.S. Soccer Development Academy and in 2006 was head coach of the Maryland Boys (1990's) ODP team that captured a national championship.

Prior to his work at College Park, Md., Vartughian worked as an assistant at Penn, where, as both the men's and women's goalkeeping instructor, his keepers earned All-American and All-Ivy Player of the Year accolades. During his tenure, both the Quakers' men's and women's teams went on to win Ivy League titles in 2001 and 2002.

Vartughian played for St. Bonaventure University from 1996-99, graduating with a degree in accounting and finance before heading to Wake Forest in 2000 to begin graduate work in education. During his three seasons with the Bonnies, he set records for shutouts in a single season and career goals-against average. He finished his career as the starting goalkeeper at Wake, where he made 72 saves on the year.

Raised in North Brunswick, N.J., Vartughian played for both the Major Indoor Soccer League's Philadelphia Kixx and the A-League's Hampton Roads Mariners and Charleston Battery. He spent 2001 with the South Jersey Barons Division III United Soccer League team.



Diego Gutierrez

Sporting Director



Diego Gutierrez joined Philadelphia Union's technical staff in August of 2010 as the Head of Scouting and Player Development. Gutierrez, a 13 year veteran of Major League Soccer, brings an extensive pool of domestic and international contacts that help the club identify talent worldwide. Among his duties, he assists Team Manager Peter Nowak with player acquisitions, roster management, salary cap, and also manages the club's international partners and relationships.

The Colombian midfielder is quite familiar with MLS, having spent most of his professional career in the League with the Chicago Fire and Kansas City Wizards (now Sporting KC). A League original drafted by Kansas City in 1996, he was taken by the Fire in the 1997 Expansion Draft. Gutierrez has won a total of four U.S. Open Cups, four conference titles, and one MLS Cup, a feat that he accomplished alongside then teammate Nowak in 1998. In 256 regular season appearances, he has amassed 12 goals and 49 assists. For him accomplishments, Soccer America named Gutierrez among the decade's best in

both the 1990's and 2000's. Upon retirement in 2008, Gutierrez was the recipient of the MLS' Commissioner's Award, the League's highest honor.

After becoming a United States citizen in 2000, Gutierrez received his first cap with the U.S. National Team against South Korea on December 9, 2001.

Gutierrez was the recipient of the 2010 Jerry Yeagley Award for Exceptional Personal Achievement by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America, which recognizes a current or former collegiate soccer player who has achieved extraordinary accomplishments and has demonstrated the qualities of sportsmanship, integrity and strong work ethic.

Off the field, Gutierrez has a rich philanthropic and humanitarian background, supporting over half a dozen organizations on national, regional, and local levels. He serves as a national spokesperson for the Nothing But Nets malaria campaign, is a current member of the U.S. Soccer Foundation's Player Advisory Council and served on the Presidential Council for Fitness and Sport, appointed by the President of the United States, until May 2010. In September of 2009, Gutierrez became just the second soccer player (Pele being the other) to be inducted into the World Humanitarian Hall of Fame. He was also named the 2007 U.S. Soccer Federation/MLS Humanitarian of the year.



Josh Gros

Team Coordinator



Josh Gros knows what it takes to win a Major League Soccer Championship. A four-year starter for D.C. United, Gros, Team Manager Peter Nowak and Alecko Eskandarian led the Black and Red to the 2004 MLS Cup in their first season. Now in his third season as Team Coordinator, Gros' primary responsibilities involve many areas of team operations and administration.

Selected by D.C. United in the 2004 MLS SuperDraft, Gros was immediately inserted into the starting lineup, becoming the club's first draft pick to log more than 2,000 minutes. Known for his tireless work ethic, the Rutgers graduate logged over 9,000 minutes in 110 games, resulting in nine goals and 14 assists. Gros earned a cap with the U.S. Men's National Team in a 2-0 victory over archrival Mexico on February 7, 2007. An unfortunate series of concussions forced the 2006 MLS All-Star into early retirement at the end of the 2007 season.

Prior to returning to MLS, Gros spent 18 months working as a civil engineer for VIKI, Inc., in Virginia. He continued to stay involved in soccer, however, serving as an assistant coach with the Northern Virginia Royals of the USL Premier Development League.

Tim Cook

Equipment Director



Equipment Director Tim Cook enters his third season with Philadelphia Union after spending three years with the United States Men's Senior National Team. Having worked with some of the nation's best players and coaches throughout all levels of U.S. Soccer, including Clint Dempsey, Landon Donovan, Tim Howard and Philadelphia Union's own Peter Nowak and John Hackworth, Cook brings a world of experience to the City of Brotherly Love.

Raised in Sacramento, Calif., Cook graduated from Cal State Fullerton with a degree in kinesiology in 2007. Immediately after graduation, he took a job with U.S. Soccer and outfitted the USMNT through CONCACAF World Cup qualifying round. The national team enjoyed one of its most successful stretches in history during Cook's tenure, winning silver medals in both the Confederations Cup and the Gold Cup last year.

Paul Rushing

Head Athletic Trainer



Head Athletic Trainer Paul Rushing enters his third season with Philadelphia Union after spending five years as a certified athletic trainer for ATHLETICO, INC. Rushing was assigned to the U.S. U-17 Residency Program in Bradenton, Fla., where he previously worked with Coach John Hackworth and a large number of Union players.

Prior to his work with the U-17's, Rushing spent three years at the IMG/Bollettieri Sports Academies, where he worked with closely with both the men's and women's soccer programs. Certified in First Aid and CPR, he also served as a personal trainer, creating and monitoring customized diet and weight training programs.

A graduate of Western Illinois University Rushing served in the United States Navy as a Second Class Petty Officer and earned numerous service medals during his eight-year service.

Brendan Burke

Head Reserve Team Coach
and Assistant Youth Director



Brendan Burke enters his second year as head coach of Philadelphia's Reserve League team and Assistant Youth Director, after spending four years as head coach of the Reading United A.C. PDL squad. He brings to Philadelphia a resume rich with experience coaching and playing at virtually every level of the game.

Burke is Reading United's most successful coach in the club's 15-year history with a 50-12-10 record and two trips to the PDL National Final Four in four years. He has built a program that has recently seen some of the nation's top talent come to train and play for Reading before entering the professional ranks. CJ Sapong, MLS Rookie of the Year 2011, Andrew Wenger and Billy Schule, 2011 MAC Hermann Trophy Finalists and Luke Mulholland, 2011 USL Pro Rookie of the Year are all examples of Burke's success. As a result of his accomplishments with Reading Burke was nominated to the 2010 PDL Coach of the Year.

On top of his responsibilities with the Union reserves and the first team, he continues to coach Reading United, serving also as Assistant GM to the PDL side.



Alecko Eskandarian

Youth Technical Director



Alecko Eskandarian is entering his second season with Philadelphia Union after an 8 year playing career in MLS which ended when he was forced to retire due to injuries. In 2010, he served as an assistant coach of the University of Virginia men's soccer team before joining the Union staff. In 2011 Eskandarian oversaw the Union's academy under the direction of Coach John Hackworth.

Since the Union's program was launched in April 2010, the academy has seen overwhelming success with over 550 of the area's top youth receiving training at YSC. Eskandarian will continue to oversee the Union's U-16 and U-18 academy teams in an effort to provide "a path to PPL Park."

Eskandarian's move to Philadelphia brings another familiar face to the Union coaching staff. A former MLS-All Star and MLS Cup MVP, Eskandarian played under Nowak for three seasons at D.C. United, winning the MLS Cup in 2004. The forward was capped once for the US National team and also represented the United States at the U-17, U-20, and U-23 levels.

2011: Signed with Philadelphia Union on August 12 on a free transfer from Benfica... Made his debut vs. FC Dallas on August 13, starting and playing 62 minutes... Featured in 11 games during the 2011 season, starting six and logging 609 minutes. Scored two goals and assisted one more during the campaign... 2011 MLS Cup Playoffs: Played in both of Philadelphia's playoff games, coming off the bench in both and logging 37 minutes... Named the 6th player on Major League Soccer's 24 under 24 list.

2011: In his fourth loan away from Benfica, Adu moved to Çaykur Rizespor on February 1 in the Turkish second-division (Bank Asya 1. Lig)... Debuted on February 20, assisting twice and receiving the Man of the Match... Scored his first goal for the club on March 6... Adu netted four goals in 13 appearances with Rizespor, consistently breaking into the starting XI.

2010: In January Adu joined U.S. national teammate Eddie Johnson in Greece when he signed an 18-month loan with Aris FC. He made his debut on January 31, coming on as a substitute and assisting a 90th-minute Eddie Johnson goal... On February 14 Adu scored his first goal in Europe since 2007 when he got the game winner against Ergotelis in stoppage time of the first half.

2009: Returned to Portugal after his spell in France and signed a season-long loan with Belenenses. The loan was cut short in December after just three League appearances and one appearance in the Portuguese Taça da Liga.

2008: In July Adu joined French club AS Monaco on a season-long loan with an option to join the team at the end of the stint, which was eventually rejected by Monaco... Made nine appearances all as a substitute.

2007: Transferred to Real Salt Lake on December 11... During 11 games in Utah Adu scored once and assisted twice, starting ten times for a total of 899 minutes...

Midway through his stint with Real Salt Lake, his rights were bought by SL Benfica in the Portuguese Liga for a reported \$2,000,000... He debuted with the Portuguese squad on August 14 against Copenhagen as a substitute in a UEFA Champions League qualifying match. During his time with Benfica, Adu scored two goals in 11 appearances...

2006: Started 29 out of 32 games logging 2,521 minutes... Cemented his position as a starter in the D.C. lineup, scoring two goals and assisting eight... 2006 MLS Cup Playoffs: Started all three of United's post season matches for a total of 224 minutes, cautioned once... Scored five goals and three assists during the regular season... Became the youngest player to score in MLS history in a 3-2 loss to MetroStars on April 17... Won the MLS goal of the week with his second half goal vs. LA Galaxy in week eight... 2004 MLS Cup Playoffs: Played in three post season games logging a total of 87 minutes and notching a game winning assist vs. the MetroStars in the quarterfinals... Named to the MLS All-Star team as a commissioner's pick.

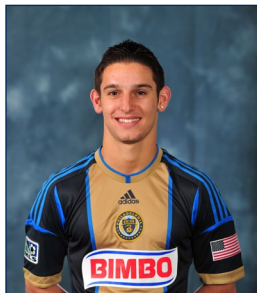

Philadelphia Union 1, Reading United 1

May 31, 2011 – Don Thomas Stadium

On a hot and muggy Tuesday night in Reading Pa., the Philadelphia Union played to a 1-1 draw with Reading United AC in front of 1,373 onlookers at Don Thomas Stadium.

Just when it looked like the Union would walk away victorious for the second straight year against their PDL affiliate, Old Dominion University midfielder Chris Harmon struck from distance in second half stoppage time to cancel out a first half goal from Gabriel Farfan, who also scored Philadelphia's first goal in league action this weekend.

For most of the first half, United were able to contain a Union starting lineup that was unchanged from Saturday's 6-2 win vs. Toronto FC aside from goalkeeper Zac MacMath starting in place of Faryd Mondragon.

In the 36th minute, the Union had a golden opportunity to tally first. Breaking free along the right flank, defender Sheanon Williams sent in a cross to Danny Mwanga, who guided an uncontested header over the bar.

Reading had a chance of their own to break the deadlock in the 40th minute when University of Pennsylvania product Christian Barreiro laid a through ball off to Sean Peckham, but the midfielder's cross went through the area untouched.

In the 45th minute, Farfan broke the scoreless draw, heading home a Justin Mapp cross from the left touchline to give Philadelphia a 1-0 lead heading into the break.

Wholesale changes in the second half for Philadelphia saw all but Nakazawa and MacMath come off for a lineup featuring first teamers Ryan Richter, Juan Diego Gonzalez, Zach Pfeffer, Roger Torres, Jack McNerney and Chris Agorsor, to go along with academy product Jimmy McLaughlin and Reading United members David Rodriguez and Matt Baker, who switched kits for the evening after featuring for the Union in reserve play this weekend.

In the second half, the Union threatened to double the lead on several occasions, but were unable to finish their chances.

MacMath preserved Philadelphia's shutout in the 66th minute when he came out to deny Will Bates' breakaway opportunity, but Reading would find their equalizer in

the waning moments of the match.

Harmon's goal, assisted by Steve Neumann, knotted the match at one goal apiece, a result that would stand despite a late chance for Roger Torres, who fired from beyond the area just wide of the far post.

Philadelphia Union 1, Everton 0

July 21, 2011 – PPL Park

CHESTER, Pa. – It took a 17-year-old unsigned player to lead the Philadelphia Union past a top-tier English Premier League club.

In front of 18,582 fans at PPL Park, Christian Hernandez, the Union's U-17/18 Academy Player of the Year, scored the only goal to lift Philly past Everton F.C., 1-0, in a high-profile international exhibition.

Hernandez, a midfielder, entered the game in the 71st minute and fired a left-footed shot into the back of the net after Everton failed to clear the ball out of the box in the 87th minute.

Fellow academy star Jimmy McLaughlin also gave the Union a spark as a second-half sub, as did teenage rookie Zach Pfeffer, whose initial shot from point-blank range was stopped before Hernandez pounced on the clearance attempt.

Although the game didn't count toward the MLS standings, Union fans were still energetic watching their exciting young players, even with the absence of Everton starting goalkeeper Tim Howard, a star on the United States Senior Men's National team, who did not make the trip with Everton.

Nevertheless, the Toffees still started many of their regulars, including captain Phil Neville and their leading scorer from a year ago, Tim Cahill. Jan Mucha, the starter for Slovakia in the 2010 World Cup, manned the net in Howard's place.

The Union, meanwhile, rested many of their regulars while giving rare starts to exciting playmakers Roger Torres and Jack McNerney and the keys to the net to Zac MacMath, who didn't need to make a save.

But even with a young team out there, the Union still looked composed and creative through much of the



game, while Everton, despite a stroke or two of brilliance, looked like they were in preseason form.

In the first half, Philly enjoyed a couple of decent scoring chances, on headers from striker Danny Mwanga and defender Carlos Valdes, who later hit a good strike just wide moments before the break.

The Union got even younger in the second half, subbing in a trio of rookies – defender Ryan Richter, midfielder Michael Farfan and goalie Thorne Holder – before later inserting Pfeffer, McLaughlin and Hernandez. 30-year-old Juan Diego Gonzalez, who has yet to play in a league match, also got in to anchor the backline alongside fellow veteran Stefani Miglioranza, who was wearing the captain's armband vs. the Toffees.

In the 74th minute, Holder made a huge save on a redirected shot from Everton's Apostolas Vellios to keep the game scoreless.

Mwanga had a couple more good attempts that went just wide in the second half.

The Union are now 3-1 all-time against international teams, having beaten Celtic FC and Chivas de Guadalajara and losing to Manchester United last season.

Philadelphia Union 1, Real Madrid 2

July 23, 2011 – Lincoln Financial Field

PHILADELPHIA – Real Madrid will leave the United States without any preseason losses – barely.

Capping off a mostly dominant performance through the Herbalife World Football Challenge, the La Liga powerhouse edged the Philadelphia Union 2-1 in front of 57,305 fans at Lincoln Financial Field on Saturday night.

Real Madrid, who earlier this week routed the LA Galaxy and Chivas de Guadalajara, end their US tour with a perfect 3-0 mark, but definitely had the most trouble with a scrappy Union squad that hung right in there with one of the world's best teams on a blistering hot evening in Philly.

Before wearing down, however, Real Madrid asserted their dominance early – although they were aided by some uncharacteristic mistakes by the Union defense, one of Major League Soccer's stingiest units.

In the second minute, Philly right back Sheanon Williams stumbled trying to track a long ball from Real's Xabi Alonso, allowing José María Callejón to run onto the ball and blast it into the back corner of the net.

Then, in the 11th minute, Union center back Carlos Valdés failed to clear the ball as Real's Karim Benzema gathered it near the sideline and delivered a pass to Mesut Özil, whose great first touch split the defense in the box. Özil then fired a shot past Union goalkeeper Faryd Mondragón to give the visitors a quick 2-0 lead to the pleasure of the large amount of pro-Real fans in the stands.

Mondragón, though, later showed why he'll be representing the Union in Wednesday's All-Star Game, saving a close-range shot from Callejón, who was vying for his second goal of the match.

The Union, to their credit, were not entirely outplayed in the first half either, despite trailing 2-0 at the halftime break.

In the 19th minute, Carlos Ruiz sprung Sébastien Le Toux free with a great through ball, but Le Toux, who's been snakebitten all season in finding the back of the net, was thwarted by Real star goalie Iker Casillas. Later, Ruiz's breakthrough attempt fell apart when his first touch was a little bit too much.

The Union also had a couple of promising crosses across the face of the net that didn't materialize.

Both teams made plenty of changes in the second half, with the Union bringing in many of their reserves and Real Madrid bringing in some of their star attractions, including Cristiano Ronaldo and Kaká.

Interestingly enough, though, it was the Union that looked like the more creative team for much of the second 45, and Ronaldo, a failed bicycle attempt aside, did not produce any jaw-dropping moments as he's prone to do.

In the 80th minute, rookie Michael Farfan's cheeky chip shot from just outside the box – off a pass from Danny Mwanga, who showcased his nifty ballhandling abilities throughout the evening – trimmed Real's lead to 2-1.

And in the final minutes, Real Madrid looked to be back on their heels, especially as Philly's Roger Torres fired a shot just high and wide in the 90th minute. Philly striker Jack McNerney then nearly tied the game in stoppage time, but Real Madrid substitute goalie Tomas Mejías made a sprawling save.

HARRISBURG, Pa. – The Philadelphia Union went into the halftime break down 2-0 to the Harrisburg City Islanders on Wednesday, setting up five consecutive second half goals en route to a 5-3 Union victory at Skyline Sports Complex. The friendly was the second annual meeting between Philadelphia and their USL Pro affiliate.

Justin Mapp scored a goal and registered two assists, Roger Torres tallied a goal and an assist, and 16-year-old Zach Pfeffer netted his first non-preseason goal in the most prolific scoring half of Philadelphia's short history.

The game started off quickly when Harrisburg were awarded a free kick just outside Philadelphia's area, setting up Nelson Becerra for the first goal of the match. The midfielder struck the ball well, past Union goalkeeper MacMath and into the back of the net for a 1-0 lead in the sixth minute.

The Islanders added to their lead in the 19th minute. A combination of quick passes found Becerra, who deftly chipped from the top of the box over the defense to Andrew Welker, who finished low and hard for a 2-0 advantage.

The second half began with an entirely new Philadelphia team, and the eleven substitutions immediately changed the dynamic of the game. Just three minutes into the half, Justin Mapp broke down the left flank and finished a tight-angled shot to cut the deficit in half.

Moments later, in the 49th minute, Mapp made his impact felt again, assisting on a goal from La Salle University graduate Ryan Richter to level the match at 2-2.

High pressure from Zach Pfeffer paid off in the 60th minute when the midfielder forced a turnover in Harrisburg's half. The 16-year-old broke free and slotted the ball into the right corner for an easy finish.

In the 76th minute, Harrisburg's hopes of a comeback were dashed, courtesy of an attack crafted by Mapp. The

midfielder, who looked lively the entire half, brought the ball down the left side and swung it in to find an open Torres, who confidently re-directed the cross to make it 4-2.

The Union were not done yet. 21-year-old Englishman Joe Tait, on trial for Philadelphia, proved too big of a presence in the box when Torres' corner found him in the 78th minute. The defender rose high to meet the service and headed it home for a 5-2 lead.

In the 85th minute, Harrisburg narrowed the lead to 5-3 when David Schofield fired from 30 yards out past recently reacquired goalkeeper Thorne Holder.

The win moves the Union to 1-0-1 all-time against the Islanders after the two sides played to a 1-1 draw last year.

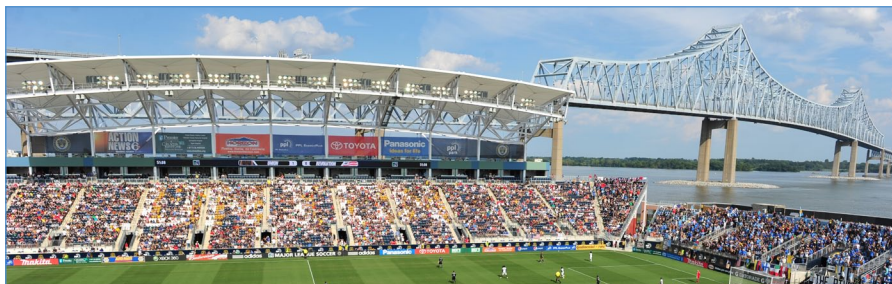

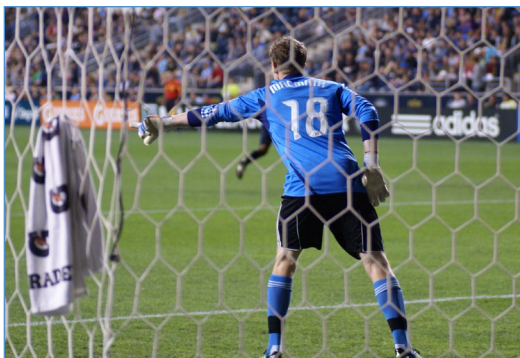

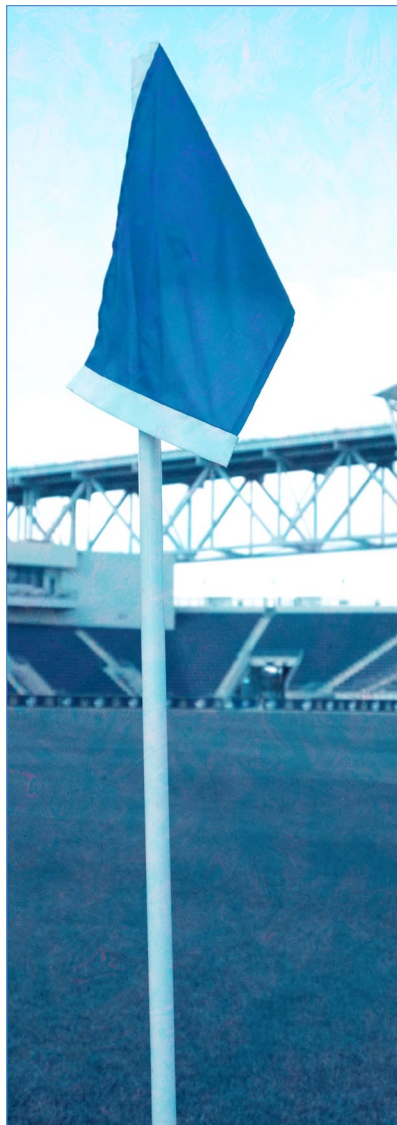

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER RULES OF COMPETITION

STRUCTURE: The 19 MLS teams are divided into two conferences:

Eastern Conference – Chicago Fire, Columbus Crew, D.C. United, Houston Dynamo, Sporting Kansas City, Montreal Impact, New England Revolution, New York Red Bulls, Philadelphia Union, Toronto FC.

Western Conference – Chivas USA, Colorado Rapids, FC Dallas, LA Galaxy, Portland Timbers, Real Salt Lake, San Jose Earthquakes, Seattle Sounders FC, Vancouver Whitecaps FC.

SCHEDULE: Each team plays a 34-game regular season schedule; 17 home games, 17 away games.

Western Conference – 24 in-conference + 10 out-of-conference games:

Western Conference teams will play each West opponent three times (24 games):

- West teams will play four conference opponents twice at home and once away
- They will play the other four conference opponents once at home and twice away.
- The home and away games will be reversed in 2013.

Western Conference teams will play each East opponent once each (10 games):

- Five of these will be at home and five will be away.
- The East opponents each team faces at home and away will be reversed in 2013.

Eastern Conference – 25 in-conference + 9 out-of-conference games:

Eastern Conference teams will play 25 games against other East teams:

- East teams will play seven conference opponents three times each (21 games) and
- Two conference opponents twice each (four games).

Eastern Conference teams will play each West opponent once each (9 games):

- Some will play four at home and five away while others will play five at home and four away.

The West opponents each team faces at home and away will be reversed in 2013.

POINT SYSTEM: Teams will receive three points for a win, one point for a tie and zero points for a loss.

REFEREES: All referees in MLS are either USSF (United States Soccer Federation) or CSA (Canadian Soccer Association) National Referees. All MLS games played in the US will be assigned by USSF and all games played in Canada will be assigned by CSA.

GAME CLOCK: The official game time for all Major League Soccer games will be managed on the field by the referee. If necessary, the referee may also allot extra time (a.k.a. “stoppage time”) at the end of each period (first half, second half, and if applicable, first overtime period and second overtime period during playoff matches) to allow for injuries, time-wasting or other disturbances.

The stadium clock will display the time from 0:00 to 45:00 and from 45:00 to 90:00 (plus stoppage time where applicable in each half). For statistical purposes, the minutes for goals, substitutions, yellow cards, etc., will be listed from the first minute until the 90th minute. A goal scored at 15 minutes 10 seconds will be listed as having been scored in the 16th minute. Events occurring during stoppage time will follow the international norm by being demarcated with a “+” sign and the extra minutes. For example, a goal scored three minutes into first half stoppage time will be officially identified as happening at “48+”.

GAME DAY ROSTERS: Each team can nominate 18 players for a game day roster. Teams are allowed three substitutions per game.

CAUTIONS AND SUSPENSIONS: A player will be suspended for one game upon receiving his fifth yellow card – regardless of the nature of the infraction that resulted in his being awarded a yellow card. A second suspension of one game would result after the awarding of an additional three cards, as would a third suspension after the awarding of card number eleven. With the “Good Behavior” incentive, it is possible for a player to have a caution expunged. If a player goes three games without receiving a yellow card, after an initial warning, the player will have one yellow card expunged. A player may take advantage of the “Good Behavior” incentive only once throughout the season.



MLS CUP PLAYOFFS: FORMAT

WHO QUALIFIES: Ten teams, the top five in points from each conference at the end of the regular season, qualify for the 2012 MLS Cup Playoffs.

The fourth and fifth place teams in each conference will play a single knockout game, the winner of which will advance to the Conference Semifinals and face the first place team in the conference.

The four Conference Semifinals will be decided by two-game aggregate series, with the lower seed hosting the first leg and the higher seed hosting the second leg. If the aggregate score is tied after 180 minutes of play, two 15-minute extra time periods will be played in their entirety, followed by penalty kicks, if necessary.

The two Conference Championships will be decided by a two-game aggregate series, with the lower seed hosting the first leg and the higher seed hosting the second leg. If the aggregate score is tied after 180 minutes of play, two 15-minute extra time periods will be played in their entirety, followed by penalty kicks, if necessary.

MLS Cup will be a single championship match hosted by the higher seed. If the score is tied after 90 minutes of play, two 15-minute extra time periods will be played in their entirety, followed by penalty kicks, if necessary.

TEAM-STANDINGS TIE-BREAKING PROCEDURES

The team awarded the highest position in the MLS standings will be the team with the greatest number of points (three points for a win, one point for a tie, zero points for a loss). In the event that two teams finish the regular season with an equal number of points, the following system will be used to break the tie:

- 1) The highest position shall be awarded to the team with the better win/loss record in current regular season games against all other teams equal in points. (head-to-head competition)
- 2) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team with the greater goal difference against all other teams during the regular season. (goal differential)
- 3) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team scoring the greatest number of total goals against all other teams during the regular season. (total goals)
- 4) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the procedures described in this section shall be applied

only to games played on the road by each team against all other teams during the regular season. (road 1-3)

5) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the procedures described in this section shall be applied only to games played at home by each team against all other teams during the regular season. (home 1-3)

6) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team with the fewest team disciplinary points in the League Fair Play table during the regular season.

7) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position in the standings shall be determined by the toss of a coin.

8) The first tiebreaker in a three-way tie is also head-to-head, but it is determined via points-per-game versus the other two teams. If two teams are tied in points-per-game head-to-head, the next tie breaker is goal difference.

NOTE: If two teams remain tied after another teams with the same number of points advances during any step, the tie breaker reverts to step 1 of the two-team format.

2012 MLS PLAYER RULES AND REGULATIONS SUMMARY

I. MLS ROSTER COMPOSITION

A Major League Soccer club's first team roster is comprised of up to 30 players. All 30 players are eligible for selection to each 18-player game-day squad during the regular season and playoffs.

Salary & Budget:

Players occupying roster spots 1-20 count against the club's 2012 salary budget of \$2,810,000, and are referred to collectively as the club's Salary Budget Players.

o Roster spots 19 and 20 are not required to be filled, and teams may spread their salary budget across only 18 Salary Budget Players. A minimum salary budget charge will be imputed against a team's salary budget for each unfilled senior roster slot below 18.

o The maximum budget charge for a single player is \$350,000.*

o A Designated Player over the age of 23 counts as \$350,000 against the club's salary budget, unless the player joins his club in the middle of the season, in which case his budget charge will be \$175,000.



o A Designated Player 20 years old or younger** (referred to as Young Designated Players or Young DPs) to counts as \$150,000 against the club's salary budget

o A Designated Player 21-23 years old** counts as \$200,000 against the club's salary budget.

o The budget charge for the midseason signing of a Young DP is \$150,000 and this amount cannot be lowered with allocation funds.

o Clubs will not have to buy the third DP roster slot to accommodate a Young Designated Player whereas clubs are normally required to buy that slot for a one-time fee of \$250,000.

o Clubs are responsible for all amounts above the budget charge for all Designated Players.

* See section entitled Allocation Money below, under Player Acquisition Mechanisms, for details on buying down a player's budget charge.

** Age of player is determined by year (not date) of birth.

Players occupying roster spots 21-30 do not count against the club's salary budget, and are referred to collectively as the club's Off-Budget Players (maximum of 10 per team).

o All Generation adidas players are Off-Budget players.

o Players occupying roster spots 1-24 will earn at least \$44,000 in 2012.

o Players occupying roster spots 25-30 will earn at least \$33,750 in 2012.

o Clubs may elect to leave up to two of these roster spots (25-30) vacant and use \$35,000 for each empty spot as allocation money.

o Clubs may sign up to two Homegrown Players contracts above the minimum salary and similar to Generation adidas player contract amounts.

Age Designations:

Any player making \$33,750 must be under the age 25 (does not turn 25 or older in 2012).

Domestic/International:

In 2012, a total of 152 international slots are divided among the 19 clubs. Each club began with eight international slots, which are tradable. There is no limit on the number of international slots on each club's roster.

o The remaining roster slots must belong to domestic players. For clubs based in the United States, a domestic player is either a U.S. citizen, a permanent resident (green card holder) or the holder of other special status (e.g., refugee or asylum status).

The three MLS clubs based in Canada – Montreal Impact, Toronto FC and Vancouver Whitecaps FC – began with eight international slots, but their domestic slots may be filled with either Canadian or U.S. domestic players.

o MLS clubs based in Canada are required to have a minimum of three Canadian domestic players on their rosters.

o Players with the legal right to work in Canada are considered Canadian domestic players (i.e., Canadian citizen, permanent resident, part of a protected class).

NOTE: The terms Homegrown and Generation adidas are used to describe mechanisms by which players are acquired. They are not roster designations. All players' roster slots are determined by their compensation and/or age as outlined above.

II. PLAYER ACQUISITION MECHANISMS

MLS teams may acquire players and add them to their rosters via the following mechanisms:

(A) ALLOCATION RANKING

The allocation ranking is the mechanism used to determine which MLS club has first priority to acquire a U.S. National Team player who signs with MLS after playing abroad, or a former MLS player who returns to the League after having gone to a club abroad for a transfer fee. The allocation rankings may also be used in the event two or more clubs file a request for the same player on the same day when the discovery period opens in December. The allocations will be ranked in reverse order of finish for the 2011 season, taking playoff performance into account.

Once the club uses its allocation ranking to acquire a player, it drops to the bottom of the list. A ranking can be traded, provided that part of the compensation received in return is the other club's ranking. At all times, each club is assigned one ranking. The rankings reset at the end of each MLS League season.

Allocation Money

Allocation money is a resource available to clubs in addition to their respective salary budgets.



A club may receive allocation money for:

- (1) failure to qualify for the MLS Cup Playoffs;
- (2) the transfer of a player to a club outside of MLS for value;
- (3) expansion status;
- (4) qualification for the CONCACAF Champions League;
- (5) trading in up to two Off-Budget roster spots;
- (6) funds from purchased third designated player roster spots.

Each year the MLS Competition Committee determines the allocation amount to be made available to each club. Allocation money can be traded by clubs. Allocation money does not count against a club's salary budget and can be used:

To sign players new to MLS (that is, a player who did not play in MLS during the previous season).

To re-sign an existing MLS player, subject to League approval.

To "buy-down" a player's salary budget charge below the League maximum of \$350,000.

In connection with the exercise of an option to purchase a player's rights or the extension of a player's contract for the second year provided the player was new to MLS in the immediately prior year.

NOTE: To protect the interests of MLS and its clubs during discussions with prospective players or clubs in other leagues, amounts of allocation money held by each club will not be shared publicly.

(B) DESIGNATED PLAYER

The Designated Player Rule allows clubs to acquire up to three players whose salaries exceed their budget charges, with the club bearing financial responsibility for the amount of compensation above each player's budget charge. Designated Player slots may be used to acquire players new to MLS or to retain current MLS players, subject to League approval.

In 2012, a Designated Player over the age of 23** will carry a salary budget charge of \$350,000, unless the player joins his club in the middle of the season, in which case his budget charge will be \$175,000.

A Designated Player 20 years old or younger** counts as \$150,000 against the club's salary budget and a Designated Player 21-23 years old counts as \$200,000

against the club's salary budget.

Clubs have the option of "buying down" the budget charge of a Designated Player with allocation money. The reduced charge may not be less than \$150,000.

The budget charge for the midseason signing of a young Designated Player (23 years old and younger) is \$150,000 and this amount cannot be lowered with allocation funds.

Each club has two Designated Player slots and clubs are allowed to "purchase" a third Designated Player slot for a one-time fee of \$250,000 that will be dispersed in the form of allocation money to all clubs that do not have three Designated Players. Clubs will not have to buy the third DP roster slot to accommodate Designated Players 23 years old and younger.

Designated Player slots are not tradable.

** Age of player is determined by year (not date) of birth.

(C) SUPERDRAFT

The 2012 MLS SuperDraft, held Jan. 12 in Kansas City, Mo., consisted of two rounds of 19 picks for a total of 38 player selections. A supplemental draft was held Jan. 17 via teleconference and consisted of four rounds of 19 picks

The majority of draft prospects are NCAA college seniors who have exhausted their college eligibility. Generation adidas players and non-collegiate international players are also eligible for selection in the SuperDraft and supplemental draft. Clubs may nominate players for the League's draft-eligible list, and only players from that list may be selected.

Generation adidas is a joint program between MLS and adidas that is dedicated to developing exceptional domestic talent in a professional environment. Each year, a handful of top domestic underclassmen and youth national team players are signed to the league and placed in the SuperDraft through this program. Generation adidas players also receive an educational stipend.

Draft Order: The Montreal Impact held the first overall selection in the 2012 MLS SuperDraft as expansion clubs are always given the top spot in the SuperDraft and the Supplemental Draft. The next eight selections went to clubs that did not qualify for the 2011 MLS Cup Playoffs beginning with the club with fewest regular season points (3 points per win, one point per tie). The remaining ten positions were ranked by fewest regular



season points among the teams that were eliminated in the same round of the MLS Cup Playoffs.

Unless claimed on waivers, a player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft or supplemental draft and did not sign with the League, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to the player.

(D) TRADES

Players, SuperDraft and Supplemental draft picks, allocation money, allocation rankings, and international player slots may all be exchanged in trades approved by the MLS League Office, provided all of the necessary rules regarding roster and salary budget compliance are met and the trade is completed during a valid trading period. No trades may occur after the Roster Freeze Deadline of September 15, 2012 at 5 p.m. ET.

(E) DISCOVERY SIGNINGS

Clubs may make discovery claims on players not yet under MLS contract who are not subject to the allocation ranking or lottery mechanisms.

Each club has the opportunity to make six discovery signings per season (expansion teams may make 10 discovery signings in their inaugural season). A club may have up to 10 discovery claims on unsigned players at any time and may remove or add players at any time. The last day for discovery player signings is September 15, 2012 – coinciding with the roster freeze date and trade deadline.

The six discovery signings can be used to fill senior roster spots only. If multiple clubs claim the same player using a discovery, the club that filed the claim first will have first rights to the player. Discovery claims expire following each season. If the League and player are unable to reach an agreement during the season, the club that first filed the discovery retains the right of first refusal in the event the player is later signed by the League.

Note: To protect interests of MLS clubs in scouting and negotiations with prospective players, the League office will not publicize the names of players on club discovery lists, nor specify if a discovery claim has been filed on a particular player.

(F) HOMEGROWN PLAYER SIGNINGS

A club may sign a player to his first professional contract without subjecting him to the MLS SuperDraft if the

player has trained for at least one year in the club's youth development program and has met the League's Homegrown Player criteria. Players joining MLS through this mechanism are known as Homegrown Players.

There is no limit to the number of Homegrown Players a club may sign in a given year.

(G) RE-ENTRY PROCESS

The 2012 Re-Entry Process will commence after MLS Cup. The priority order for the Re-Entry Draft is reverse order of finish in 2012, taking into account playoff performance.

Available to all teams in Stage 1 of the Re-Entry draft will be:

1. Players who are at least 23 years old and have a minimum of three years experience in MLS whose options were not exercised by their clubs (available at option salary for 2013).
2. Players who are at least 25 years old with a minimum of four years of MLS experience who are out of contract and whose club does not wish to re-sign them at their previous salary (available for at least their 2012 salary).
3. Players who are at least 30 years old with a minimum of eight years of MLS experience who are out of contract and whose club does not wish to re-sign them (available for at least 105% of their 2012 salary).

Players who are not selected in Stage 1 of the Re-Entry Draft will be made available in Stage 2. Clubs selecting players in Stage 2 will negotiate a new salary with the player.

Players who remain unselected after Stage 2 will be available to any MLS club on a first come, first serve basis.

(H) WAIVERS

A team may place a player on waivers at any time during the regular season at which point he is made available to all other teams. The waiver claiming period shall commence on the first business day after the League delivers notice to teams and shall expire at 5 p.m. EST on the second business day after the Waiver Period Commencement Date. The claiming period is 48 hours.

The Waiver Draft order is determined via points per game once all teams have played at least three MLS League games. If the waiver takes place prior to all teams playing in at least three League games, priority shall be granted based upon the prior year's performance,



taking playoff performance first, with teams eliminated from playoff contention at the same stage separated according to their point totals through the end of the regular season. New expansion teams shall be at the bottom of the waiver order.

Once a team selects a player off waivers, that club is automatically moved to the bottom of the priority list for subsequent waiver selections in a given season, regardless of its points-per-game total. Players who may be placed on the MLS waiver wire are as follows:

- (i) A player waived by an MLS team in the current season;
- (ii) A player who completed his college eligibility within the past season, who was not made available in the SuperDraft or Supplemental Draft;
- (iii) A player who has remaining college eligibility (and was not made available in the SuperDraft or Supplemental Draft), but the League at its discretion and after taking into account exceptional circumstances determines the player may be offered an MLS contract;
- (iv) A player who has played in MLS previously where his last MLS team does not wish to exercise their right of first refusal, except in the case of returning U.S. National Team players as stated above.
- (v) A player who was drafted in the SuperDraft or supplemental draft, and who after a trial with the club is not offered a contract by the first Monday of June.

(I) LOTTERY

Some players shall be assigned to MLS teams via the weighted Lottery process. Any team assigned a player through the lottery in any particular season shall not be assigned another lottery player that season unless and until all teams have received a lottery player or have agreed to waive their option to participate in a Lottery. The players made available through lotteries include:

- (i) Generation adidas players signed after the MLS SuperDraft;
- (ii) Draft eligible players to whom an MLS contract was offered but who failed to sign with the League prior to the Draft.

The weighted lottery takes into consideration each team's performance over its last 34 regular season games and the most recent postseason. The team with the worst record over its last 34 regular season games (dating back to previous season if necessary and taking playoff performance into account) will have the

greatest probability of winning the lottery. Teams are not required to participate in a lottery. Players are assigned via the lottery system in order to prevent a player from potentially influencing his destination club with a strategic holdout.

(J) EXTREME HARDSHIP CALL-UPS

Teams may add players to their roster in cases of "extreme hardship" as follows: (1) a club with three goalkeepers on its 30-man roster, but has less than two available goalkeepers or (2) a team has less than 15 available players. Extreme hardship call-ups are made on a game-by-game basis.

(K) SEASON-ENDING INJURY REPLACEMENTS (Season Ending Injury List)

A team with a player lost to a season-ending injury can place the player on the Season Ending Injury List and replace that player on its roster, while remaining responsible for the full amount of the injured player's salary. A player can be placed on the season-ending injury list once another player has been signed as a replacement (provided the team has budget space). International player limits still apply at the time a season-ending replacement is made (with the player being replaced not counting against those limits).

(L) SHORT-TERM INJURY REPLACEMENTS (Disabled List)

A player who has a short-term injury can be placed on the Disabled List once another player has been signed as a replacement (provided the team has budget space). The team will remain responsible for the full amount of the injured player's salary on the salary budget. Note: the injured player will have to sit out a minimum of six MLS League matches before he can rejoin the team's roster.

International player limits still apply at the time a short-term replacement is made (with the player being replaced not counting against those limits).

NOTE: No changes may be made to a team's active full roster during the period beginning on September 16, 2012 (day after Roster Freeze Date) through the day after MLS Cup. Nevertheless, a team may obtain players in accordance with the extreme hardship rules and procedures to replace players who are injured or otherwise legitimately unavailable after the Roster Freeze Date. Any other replacements after the Roster Freeze Date may only be made in exceptional circumstances in the League's sole and absolute discretion.



(III.) METHODS OF RELEASING PLAYERS

(A) WAIVERS

Teams may waive players based on performance at any time during the MLS season. Players with guaranteed contracts will continue to have their salary budget charge applied to the team salary budget, subject to any settlement. Players on semi-guaranteed contracts can be waived prior to July 1 of any year and free up the corresponding budget space. If a player on a semi-guaranteed contract is waived after July 1, his salary budget charge will count against the team's salary budget and the team waiving the player will not receive a replacement except under the normal player acquisition mechanisms. Any settlement amount will be charged to the team's salary budget.

(B) TRANSFERS AND LOANS

An MLS player may be transferred or loaned at any time to a team outside the League (subject to that team's Federation's transfer window), subject to the consent of the player.

The registration windows – the dates between which MLS may request the transfer certificate of a player under contract in another country – are as follows:

January 21 – April 15 (Primary Window)

June 27 – July 27 (Secondary Window)

(C) CONTRACT EXPIRATION

When a player's contract expires, the player does not count against the roster or budget of the team in question. Subject to the Re-Entry Draft rules, a team retains the rights to the player indefinitely following the expiration of a contract only if attempts were made to re-sign the player.

(D) BUYOUT OF GUARANTEED CONTRACT

Teams may have the ability to buyout one guaranteed player as follows:

- A Team may buy out one (1) guaranteed player (including a DP's) contract during the off-season and free up the corresponding budget space. Such a buyout is at the particular MLS Team's own expense.
- A Team may not free up budget space with a buyout of a player's salary budget charge during the season. Such a buyout will be conducted by the League and count on a Club's budget in a manner consistent with current MLS guidelines.

(IV.) RIGHT OF FIRST REFUSAL

Right of first refusal grants one MLS club the first opportunity to add a player to its roster in the event that the player signs with MLS. Holding a right of first refusal applies only within MLS and does not indicate holding of the player's International Transfer Certificate.

OUT OF CONTRACT PLAYERS / OPTIONS NOT PICKED UP:

Subject to the Re-Entry Draft rules, a team retains the right of first refusal to the player indefinitely only if attempts were made to re-sign the player.

DRAFTED BUT NOT SIGNED: A player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft or supplemental draft and did not sign, or who as of the first Monday in June is not offered a contract after a trial and clears waivers, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 immediately following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to sign the player.

PLAYER TRANSFERRED OUTSIDE MLS: If a team receives allocation money as a result of a player's transfer, the team does not retain a right of first refusal.



Miscellaneous



Sons of Ben

The passion and fraternity of the Sons of Ben combine to create a truly unique soccer experience. More than two years before the 16th Major League Soccer club was awarded to Philadelphia, the SoB's, as they are affectionately called, were already lobbying MLS for a team in the City of Brotherly Love. The League had always wanted to have a team in Philadelphia, the fourth largest TV market in the country, due to its rich soccer traditions rooted in both ethnic communities and the surrounding suburbs.

In 2006, there were rumblings about a team coming to the Philadelphia area. A small group of soccer fans had already formed the core of the SoB's to lobby MLS, but they wanted to be larger and more inclusive. They hoped the announcement would come in 2007, so they hurriedly began designing a logo and making an effort to reach 100 members.

Something was going on, but it was hard to define. Then a series of articles appeared locally and in the well-respected British soccer publication *FourFourTwo* about a growing supporters group in Philly – for a team that did not yet exist! Suddenly these SoB's were a global sensation. It set off a chain reaction of interest and membership grew to 500 by August. By November,

there were 1,000 members and nearly 100 Sons of Ben attended MLS Cup 2007 in Washington, D.C. They were the fourth largest supporters group there! Only supporters groups of the two competing teams and the local D.C. United faithful were larger.

Ownership was in constant contact with Sons of Ben President & Founder, Bryan James, as it continued to develop its business plan. The group began circulating a petition and helped the club capture nearly 7,000 signatures to present to key state government officials as evidence that there was overwhelming public support for professional soccer.

The inaugural season of Philadelphia Union has come and gone and the SoB's were with the club every step of the way. As the finishing touches were being put on PPL Park, the Union played most of their matches from late March to late June on the road. There were, however, two home matches played at Lincoln Financial Field, home of the Philadelphia Eagles, on April 10 vs. D.C. United and May 15 against FC Dallas. The SoB's were out in full force for both matches, eager to see the team they lobbied so diligently for finally take the field. The turnout was tremendous, but it was only the beginning of something much bigger.

On June 27, the Sons of Ben descended on the Chester



waterfront for the first-ever match at PPL Park, a showdown against the 2009 expansion Seattle Sounders FC. Songs and chants filled the parking lots hours before the match, and followed the supporters into the stadium as they took their rightful place at the east end of the stadium. They dubbed their home "The River End," and it developed a unique character all its own.

Watching a match from The River End is an ongoing commitment of support. SoB's spend the entirety of the match standing, singing and chanting for the club. Often times, the chants and songs have a personalized theme, with some being dedicated to their beloved players and others aimed at the opposing team.

But the support extends far beyond game day. The Sons of Ben were the largest supporters group at the 2011 MLS SuperDraft in Baltimore, Md. They packed Fado Irish Pub & Restaurant for the announcement of the signing of Faryd Mondragon and Carlos Valdes. They even attended preseason practice sessions at YSC Sports Complex in Wayne, Pa. before the club headed to warmer weather.

As the third season for Philadelphia Union approaches, the Sons of Ben are ready to embark on another journey with hopes for a playoff berth. Although they are an independent and separate entity, they have become an

invaluable member of the Philadelphia Union family. The technical staff and the players embraced the enthusiasm that came from The River End last season, and expect nothing less in 2012.

River Cup

Philadelphia Union held the inaugural River Cup charity match in 2011, where the team's staff faced off against the Sons of Ben at PPL Park. The match raised \$25,000, which went to one of the Union's community partners, Chester City United, a local youth soccer organization. The match was another significant investment in the youth of Chester, a city that has struggled in recent years.

On the field, the front office claimed the River Cup and a year's worth of bragging rights with their 2-1 victory over the SoBs. Hundreds of fans as well as over a dozen Union players were on hand to enjoy the match, which will become an annual event.

Although the staff were victorious in the first-ever River Cup, the real winners were Chester City United. The proceeds of 2011, and many years to come, will make a difference in the lives of local children by getting them involved in soccer and giving them a positive social outlet at a young age.





Major Molly's Army

Major Molly's Army, a team of energetic and passionate women, serve as promotional ambassadors for the club. Named for Revolutionary War heroine, Molly Pitcher, the Major Mollies can be seen at all Philadelphia Union home games and events and are available for appearances upon request.

As legend has it, during the Revolutionary War at the Battle of Monmouth, Mary Ludwig proved to be a true heroine by bringing pitchers of water to Continental Soldiers dying of heat and thirst, earning her the nickname "Molly Pitcher".

When Molly's husband died during the battle, the passionate patriot joined the men on the front lines, taking up arms and manning her husband's cannon. After the battle, General George Washington, and future president, rewarded the courageous woman by naming her a non-commissioned officer, after which she was referred to by soldiers as "Sergeant Molly" or "Major Molly".

Fans should watch out for The Molly Cam at all Union home games for a chance to be featured on Philadelphia Union's website. Major Mollies will look to be capturing fans enjoying the pre-game festivities, marching into the stadium and rooting on the Union during the match.

Union/YSC Development Model “the Path to PPL Park”

Since the club's inception, identifying and nurturing gifted young athletes has been a fundamental building block of Philadelphia Union's overall plan. In the fall of 2009, the club selected YSC Academy to provide an extraordinary development program for players 8-12 years old at its facility in Wayne, Pa. and satellite sites throughout the Delaware Valley. For Philadelphia Union CEO & Operating Partner Nick Sakiewicz, it was imperative to create a program and work with a partner that would satisfy the needs of these young people in this critical phase of their soccer development. YSC Academy Founder Richie Graham is someone whose culture and philosophy mirrored that of Philadelphia Union.

As the third year of the partnership begins, a four phase development model is now in place to put young athletes on “the Path to PPL Park.” The first three phases

are elements of the Union Academy which provides free training and competition opportunities for elite youth players under a “club-neutral” format. This unique program enables gifted players and youth clubs everywhere to receive guidance and skill development under the watchful eye of world class coaches like Peter Nowak, John Hackworth, Rob Vartughian and Brendan Burke of Philadelphia Union, along with Youth Technical Director Alecko Eskandarian and YSC Director Iain Munro. The program focuses on providing a strong start to a child's soccer education and appreciation of the game.

Step I in the Union Academy is the YSC Union Juniors program (ages 8-12), followed by the Union Juniors Academy (ages 13-14), and culminating with the Union Youth Academy (ages 15-18). The most innovative of the three elements of the Union/YSC Model is Step III. The Union Youth Academy is a Youth Development Affiliation (YDA) program that gives elite players at YDA clubs a direct and authentic link to the professional game and

their clubs valuable oversight and guidance from Union/ YSC Technical Staff.

The goal is for these players to take what they learn, back to their Eastern Pennsylvania Youth Soccer Association (EPYSA) and Delaware Youth Soccer Association (DYSA) clubs and school teams and put it all into action. In this way, these hungry young athletes will connect to the pros and envision themselves as professionals, aspiring to play for Philadelphia Union.

Ultimately, the fourth and final step of the progression is a spot on Philadelphia Union's First or Reserve Teams and/or one of their professional affiliate partners, Harrisburg City Islanders (USL-PRO) or Reading United (PDL).

TEAM AFFILIATIONS

In late December of 2009, Reading United AC (formerly the Reading Rage) became Philadelphia Union's exclusive minor league affiliate in the USL's Premier Development League. Along with Philadelphia Union providing coaching and clinical support, the Union/ YSC Development Program is also a part of this relationship. Collectively, it ushers in a new era of growth and soccer development throughout Berks County.

On March 1st, 2010, the Harrisburg City Islanders joined the growing Philadelphia Union family. Harrisburg's partnership with the club, established them as the exclusive USL Second Division affiliate of Philadelphia Union. Like the arrangement with Reading United, player development is the primary component of the partnership with the City Islanders. The idea being to create a culture through training and competing with a commitment to playing attacking and attractive football for supporters to enjoy at all levels.

PPL Park

PPL Park, a state-of-the-art 18,500-seat Major League Soccer stadium, serves as Philadelphia Union's home. The catalyst for a spectacular \$500 million waterfront revitalization project, PPL Park is expected to "KickStart Chester" by bringing renewed life and vitality to a historic location in need of a spark. Public support from the State of Pennsylvania, Delaware County and the City of Chester reinforced private support for the mixed-use development, which is helping to drive a "renaissance on the river" in Chester. The stadium is located just five miles south of the Philadelphia International Airport at the southwest corner of the base of the Commodore Barry Bridge, with easy access to major roadways such as I-95, I-476, US-322 and PA-291. Additionally, the Northeast Corridor Amtrak, Conrail and SEPTA rail lines run two train platforms within a short distance from the site.

A multipurpose facility that has features 29 luxury suites, a full-service club restaurant and a built-in concert stage, PPL Park is the ideal destination for any type of event. An expansive grass and promenade area surrounds the building and is perfect for tailgating and outdoor music festivals. The natural grass surface that covers the 120 x 75 yard field is suitable for both soccer and football. The sideline roofs were designed to protect fans from the elements without obstructing the scenic view of the Commodore Barry Bridge and the Delaware River from their seats.

Since opening its doors on June 27, 2010, PPL Park has played host to various collegiate soccer games, the "Battle of the Blue" featuring Villanova University and University of Delaware football and the 2011 USA Sevens Collegiate Rugby Championship. In 2012, the park will against host the USA Sevens Collegiate Rugby Championship, as well as the NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse Quarterfinals in May.

PPL Park has been recognized on multiple occasions, winning awards from Mid Atlantic Construction Magazine for "Best Sports/Recreation Project of the Year," the Delaware County Planning Commission for outstanding land projects in the County and the NCS4 Facility Achievement Award that honors venues that excel in safety and security operations.







Philadelphia Union Broadcasting

Philadelphia Union broadcast partners 6abc, Comcast SportsNet and The Comcast Network will again team up to televise all Union games that are not shown nationally, with all matches being broadcast in high definition. WPVI-TV/6abc continues in its third season as the Union's official broadcast partner and will air three of the team's 34 total matches this season, while Comcast SportsNet and The Comcast Network, now in their second season, will air 19 matches.

The Union's weekly magazine show entitled "State of the Union," which airs Friday nights on The Comcast Network and Comcast SportsNet, returns for its second season. Air times are scheduled for 7:00 p.m. on The Comcast Network and 11:30 p.m. on Comcast SportsNet. Hosts Amy Fadool, Bob Rigby and a variety of other guests will give fans an inside view of the Union both on and off the field.

The Union also signed its first-ever radio partner in CBS RADIO's SportsRadio 610 WIP, with 17 matches being broadcast in 2012, either home or away. In addition, SportsRadio 610 WIP will partner with the team to produce a weekly one-hour soccer show that will run through the end of the season in November. Fans will be able to listen to game action or weekly programming on-air, on www.cbsphilly.com or through the Radio.com application on a variety of mobile devices.



JP Dellacamera, Play-By-Play

JP Dellacamera, a long-time commentator of ABC and ESPN's Major League Soccer broadcasts, enters his third season as Philadelphia Union's play-by-play commentator.

Recognized as one of the leading authorities on international soccer in the United States, Dellacamera has called six FIFA World Cups for a variety of networks and four FIFA Women's World Cups. Originally from Waltham, Mass., his extensive soccer experience includes working some of the most famous soccer leagues and tournaments in the world, including UEFA Champions League finals and the 1999 Women's World Cup, which was the most watched soccer telecast in U.S. television history. Dellacamera has also called games for Major League Soccer's Columbus Crew and New York Red Bulls.

Dellacamera's lengthy broadcasting career also includes work in college basketball and the NHL. From 2003- 2009, he served as the TV play-by-play voice of the NHL's Atlanta Thrashers on Turner Sports and Fox Sports Network affiliates.



Bob Rigby, Color

Considered to be among the most talented goalkeepers to take the pitch for the United States, Philadelphia soccer legend Bob Rigby will lend his expertise to Philadelphia Union in his second year as the club's sideline reporter.

The first ever American born soccer player to be featured on the cover of Sports Illustrated, Rigby was an All-American at East Stroudsburg University and was the top pick in the North American Soccer League's (NASL) 1973 draft. He led the Philadelphia Atoms to a League title in his first season behind his impressive 0.62 goals against average and went on to play He went on to play 12 seasons in the NASL with many of soccer's elite, including Pele, George Best and Eusebio.

Rigby played on the U.S. Men's National Team and traveled to the 1972 Summer Olympics, although he did not appear in any matches. He played in his with game the National Team on November 3, 1973 against Haiti and went on to earn a total of six caps with USMNT.

After retiring from professional soccer, Rigby went on to teach and coach soccer at Ridley High School in Folsom, Pa. He later earned his master's in counseling psychology at Chestnut Hill College and returned to Ridley as the district's crisis counselor. Rigby implemented a program designed to help students suffering from substance abuse, mental health and/or domestic abuse problems.

Media Policy

CREDENTIALS

Season media credentials will be issued to established newspapers, magazines, television, radio stations and websites making reasonable requests. To qualify, an outlet must cover at least 15 of the club's home games. Requests for day of game credentials must be made in writing to Aimee Cicero, acicero@philadelphiaunion.com, at least 24 hours prior to the match. Those that have not done so will not be granted access. Because of limited space, it is impossible to grant freelance photographers access unless assigned to shoot for a specific story or project.

ROAD CREDENTIALS

Members of the Philadelphia Union's media traveling to road games should submit requests for credentials to the Communications Department no later than five (5) business days prior to the road game.

MEDIA WILL CALL

Members of the media needing credentials at the game must pick up passes at the Media Will Call gate at PPL Park. Each person must pick up his or her own credentials and present corresponding photo identification. Media Will Call opens two hours prior to the scheduled kickoff. All media must enter through the press gate entrance located near the west side of the stadium. Media credentials will not be honored at any other entrance. All credentials are non-transferable. Any unauthorized use will result in ejection from PPL Park and confiscation of the credentials.

BROADCAST

In making requests for broadcast credentials, please specify requirements for spotters and/or statisticians. These services must be arranged in advance. Broadcast locations are located on the PPL Park press level.

PARKING

A limited number of parking passes are available for working media. Members of the media seeking parking passes are advised to make their requests no later than 1:00 p.m. the day prior to the game. Please note that Philadelphia Union will not be able to accommodate all requests, especially if the request is made after the deadline specified above.

A limited number of TV news trucks will be allowed to park along the Southeast quadrant of PPL Park. TV trucks which provide satellite, uplink or microwave functions will need to make prior arrangements with a member of Global Spectrum's staff.

PRESS BOX

The press box at PPL Park is located along the west side of the stadium on the third floor. The press box will open two hours before kickoff. Admittance is limited to working media members with valid credentials and is intended for the purpose of providing a work place for writers, reporters, broadcasters and game personnel. It is imperative that even season pass holders notify the Communications Department of their intention to cover



a game in order to receive press box seating. Family members and guests will not be accommodated in the press box. Abuse of press box press privileges will result in forfeiture of a press pass.

TELEPHONE/WIRELESS ACCESS

Several pool phones are placed throughout the press box. Remember, pool phones are to be shared. Courtesy hard lines are available in the photo room. PPL Park offers wireless internet access in all areas of the press box. The access is free of charge and works with all Wi-Fi enabled computer equipment.

GAME NOTES/STATISTICS

Game notes and statistics will be available in the press box. Statistics will be distributed to each seat at halftime and following the game. Periodic announcements will also be made during the game.

LOCKER ROOM ACCESS

Approximately 15 minutes following the conclusion of the game, a postgame news conference will be held in the news conference room next to the locker rooms on the field level. At the end of the news conference, the locker room will be open to media. Philadelphia Union and visitor locker rooms are located near the south end of the stadium on the field level. Your cooperation and professional courtesy is asked in maintaining a proper working atmosphere for postgame interviews. Absolutely no autographs are allowed during media access periods. Only those individuals that are working members of the press will be granted access to the locker room. Family members and guests are not permitted.

Media cell phones- No media may use a cell phone at any time inside the locker room. Media members may carry their cell phones into the locker room but may not use them to place or take calls or to take photos.

FIELD ACCESS

Only working newspaper, magazine and network TV photographers and club/stadium officials with the proper FIELD ACCESS sticker are permitted on the field during the game. Press Box Passes will not be honored for field admittance at any time, unless authorized by Philadelphia Union.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Still photographers holding proper credentials may position themselves along either endline at field level. Immediately prior to each match, photographers who wish to shoot the traditional pre-game team photo will be escorted on cue to the midfield sideline by photo marshals. Photographers will be instructed to walk only on the sidelines-never on the field of play-en route to these temporary sideline positions. Once team photos have been taken, photographers will be directed to quickly return to their endline photo positions. During

the match, photographers are advised that they have restricted freedom of movement. At no time during the game can photographers shoot from directly behind the goal. Also, movement from one end of the field to the other is allowed only at halftime on the sideline opposite the team benches. Still photographers DO NOT have access to the locker room at any time.

PHOTOGRAPHER PHOTO BIBS

Each accredited photographer will be issued a specially designed photo bib/vest provided by Philadelphia Union for identification purposes as a mandatory supplement to the credential. The photo bib serves as a temporary access control device and must be returned to the photo marshals area at the end of each match. The photo bib must be worn at all times while present at any photo position. Photographers in authorized shooting positions or not wearing a bib risk suspension of their credential.

MEALS

Food and beverages are available to working members of the media in the Media Dining Room on the press level. Dining tickets will be distributed at media check-in and only those that have been given a ticket are authorized to eat.

DURING THE WEEK

Training Access

During the regular season, training sessions typically run three hours and usually begin at 11:00 a.m. Training times can, and frequently do, vary. Members of the media who intend to cover training sessions on a regular basis should call the Philadelphia Union Communications Department to obtain the latest training schedule information and arrange interviews. Training sessions will, in general, be open to the media for the first 15 minutes, but they may be closed at the discretion of the Technical Staff. No media members are allowed into the locker room before, during or after training sessions.

Interviews

Interviews that require advance preparations or special accommodations by a Philadelphia Union player or staff member should be made by calling or e-mailing Philadelphia Union Communications Department.
