July 31, 2008 – Timbers owner Merritt Paulson announces plans to submit an application for a Major League Soccer (MLS) expansion franchise to play at PGE Park. On the same day, MLS announces plans to add two additional clubs by 2011, bringing the league to 18 clubs.

September 3, 2008 – Joined by city and neighborhood representatives, fans and Portland State University for a press conference at PGE Park, Paulson urges public and government support for plans to bring a MLS team to Portland and unveils visual concepts of the PGE Park renovations.

October 7, 2008 – Through the Timbers' parent company, Shortstop, LLC, Paulson submits a formal bid to MLS for the acquisition of a Portland franchise.

"Today, on behalf of the greatest soccer fans in America, we submitted our formal application to bring Major League Soccer to Portland. We expect to get a response to our application no later than March of next year. In the meantime, we will continue to work with MLS, city officials and the community to turn this exciting idea into reality for Portland and Oregon."

December 10, 2008 – MLS Commissioner Don Garber and MLS President Mark Abbott visit Portland to meet with the city's MLS/ Triple-A Baseball Evaluation Advisory Task Force and elected city officials as a part of their review of Shortstop, LLC's bid to bring MLS to Portland.

March 10, 2009 – Following months of public debate and citizen review, Paulson and city leaders reach a preliminary agreement on a funding plan to improve PGE Park for MLS.



MARCH 20, 2009

In a celebratory press conference, Major League Soccer awards Portland an expansion franchise to begin play in 2011. The Timbers start accepting ticket deposits for the 2011 MLS season.

December 22, 2009 – The first renderings for the renovation of PGE Park for MLS are revealed. Highlights of the renovation include the construction of a new seating structure on the east side of the stadium.

January 18, 2010 – Gavin Wilkinson, the club's head coach and general manager at the time, is appointed the general manager/ technical director of the Timbers' MLS franchise.

January 21, 2010 – The city of Portland reaches a final agreement with Peregrine, LLC, the parent company of the Timbers' MLS franchise, on a final funding and renovation plan to improve PGE Park for MLS.







FEBRUARY 1, 2010

Phase I of renovation construction at PGE Park begins. The work, done by Turner Construction, included preparation for the foundation of the new grandstand on the east side of the stadium. Phase I construction was completed April 5, 2010.

February 3, 2010 – The Portland City Council today gives final approval to a plan to renovate PGE Park and bring MLS to the Rose City in 2011.

March 2, 2010 – Mike Golub is hired as the Timbers' chief operating officer to oversee all business operations for the club and its transition to MLS.

June 9, 2010 – The MLS Timbers announce their first Founding Partnership with Vancouver, Wash.-based Burgerville, the iconic chain of quick-service restaurants. In the days following the announcement, the Timbers and Burgerville celebrate the partnership with a tour around the Portland metro area with Burgerville's mobile kitchen.

June 12, 2010 – The club unveils its new MLS crest before thousands of soccer fans at Director Park in downtown Portland during halftime of the 2010 FIFA World Cup match between the United States and England.

June 25, 2010 – The Timbers reveal their full slate of MLS marks, including a secondary crest, a stand-alone axe application and a supporters-inspired-and-composed ligature design.

July 28, 2010 – MLS conducts its Expansion Priority Coin Toss between the Timbers and fellow 2011 MLS expansion club Vancouver Whitecaps FC to determine which club will have the first selection in the Expansion Priority Draft. The coin toss took place at halftime of the 2010 AT&T MLS All-Star Game on ESPN2; Vancouver won the toss.

August 3, 2010 – The Timbers announce that season tickets in 10 sections for the 2011 MLS season have sold out and that 20 of the 23 pavilion suites at PGE Park have been sold on a multi-year basis leading up to the club's inaugural MLS campaign.







AUGUST 11, 2010

A day after the historic announcement, John Spencer is introduced as the Timbers' first MLS head coach to local fans and media at the adidas America village in Portland. Spencer served as an assistant coach for the Houston Dynamo from 2006-10.

August 23, 2010 – In the MLS Expansion Priority Draft, the Timbers are awarded the first pick in the 2010 MLS Expansion Draft and the No. 2 overall pick in the 2011 MLS SuperDraft. Through the draft, Portland and Vancouver selected priority among eight different player-acquisition mechanisms.



The Timbers and Alaska Airlines announce a new partnership, in which Alaska Airlines becomes the official airline of the MLS club and the official jersey sponsor.



The Timbers defeat the Puerto Rico Islanders in their final home match at PGE Park as a second-division club. Ryan Pore scored the game-winning goal, dubbed by fans as the "sunflower goal," in a 1-0 victory before a sold-out crowd.

September 7, 2010 - Turner Construction begins Phase II of the substantial stadium renovation that included the creation of a full seating bowl surrounding the field, a new club lounge, an expanded public entry plaza, a state-of-the-art video scoreboard, a new team store and new player locker rooms and training facilities.

SEPTEMBER 21, 2010

MLS Commissioner Don Garber, Merritt Paulson and city of Portland officials commemorate the official groundbreaking at PGE Park at an event attended by Timbers season ticket holders.

October 10, 2010 – The Timbers' second-division era comes to a close as the team plays its final match – a 1-0 playoff victory over the Vancouver Whitecaps. The match was the second leg of a two-game, aggregate-goal playoff series.

October 18, 2010 – Papa Murphy's becomes the official pizza of the Timbers, as the two organizations announce a new multi-year partnership.



OCTOBER 19, 2010

During a morning press conference at The Nines Hotel in downtown Portland, Timbers General Manager/Technical Director Gavin Wilkinson introduces forward Bright Dike, goalkeeper Steve Cronin, midfielder Ryan Pore and forward Eddie Johnson as the first four player signings in the club's MLS history.

October 27, 2010 – The Timbers announce a founding partnership with KeyBank. In addition to becoming the Timbers' exclusive banking partner, the KeyBank Club and KeyBank Plaza will be featured as prominent additions to the newly renovated stadium.

November 17, 2010 – The Timbers launch the club's MLS website. Designed in conjunction with MLS Digital, the Timbers' website at www.portlandtimbers.com is the leading source for club news and content.





November 22, 2010 – Midfielder Jeremy Hall is acquired from the New York Red Bulls in the Timbers' first trade as and MLS franchise. In exchange, the Timbers sent their third-round pick in the 2011 MLS SuperDraft to New York.



NOVEMBER 21, 2010

MLS holds the 2010 MLS Expansion Draft for the Timbers and Whitecaps FC. The teams each selected 10 players in the 10-round draft. Portland selected midfielder Dax McCarty with the first overall pick, and among its selections also acquired defenders Eric Brunner and David Horst and midfielders Adam Moffat and Peter Lowry.

In a series of draft-day trades, the Timbers dealt McCarty and allocation money to D.C. United in exchange for defender Rodney Wallace and a fourth-round selection in the 2011 MLS SuperDraft. The Timbers also received an additional 2011 SuperDraft pick and allocation money in additional trades with Real Salt Lake and Colorado Rapids, respectively.



DECEMBER 1, 2010

The club's "We Are Timbers" billboard campaign takes shape. In the months leading up to First Kick 2011, the Timbers posted dozens of billboards around Portland featuring Timbers and local soccer fans with axes and chainsaws in a "No Pity" pose.

December 7, 2010 – Head coach John Spencer names his coaching staff for the Timbers' inaugural MLS season, appointing Trevor James and Amos Magee as assistant coaches and Adam Smith as the club's goalkeeper coach.

The Timbers introduce recently acquired players Peter Lowry, Eric Brunner, Adam Moffat and Rodney Wallace to a small group of season ticket holders and media at an event at the new Portland Timbers Downtown Team Store in Portland. The store, in its temporary location downtown, opened to the public officially a few days later on Dec. 10, 2010. <image><section-header>

International Airport, the Timbers and Alaska Airlines debut the team's official uniforms, training wear and apparel line that will be featured during the 2011 season. The event, named the "Runway on the Runway," was attended by some 1,000 fans and supporters.

December 13, 2010 – The Timbers receive a natural fourth-round pick in the 2014 MLS SuperDraft from the Houston Dynamo in exchange for defender Jordan Graye, who was previously selected in the Expansion Draft.

December 15, 2010 – The Timbers announce the signing of four players from the club's roster during the 2010 second-division season – defenders Mamadou "Futty" Danso and Kevin Goldthwaite and midfielders Kalif Alhassan and James Marcelin.

December 16, 2010 – The Timbers and Providence Health & Services-Oregon forge a new Founding Partnership. At the heart of the partnership is Providence Sports Care Center, an innovative, 12,000-square-foot, privately funded sports rehabilitation clinic located in the southeast corner of PGE Park. The new facility is part of the extensive renovation at the stadium in preparation for the 2011 MLS season.

December 17, 2010 – In a trade with D.C. United, the Timbers acquire 2006 MLS Goalkeeper of the Year Troy Perkins in exchange for goalkeeper Steve Cronin and allocation money. Perkins led United to back-to-back MLS Supporters' Shields in 2006 and 2007.

The Timbers launch "Stand Together," a new community investment platform. The program represents the relationship between the Timbers and their fans and signifies the team's strong commitment to supporting and standing by the Portland community both on and off the field.

December 20, 2010 – MLS unveils First Kick matchups for the 2011 regular season – the League's 16th season. The Timbers are scheduled to open their inaugural MLS season on the road against 2010 MLS Cup-champion Colorado Rapids at Dick's Sporting Goods Park.

December 21, 2010 – Local brewing company Widmer Brothers and the Timbers announce a new Founding Partnership. Widmer Brothers becomes the sponsor of the new viewing deck behind the south goal, establishing a presence at the newly renovated stadium.

January 3, 2011 – Season tickets for the Timbers' 2011 MLS season surpass the 10,000 mark, with season tickets in 33 different seating sections around the park sold out. Additionally, all 23 suites at the stadium have been sold on a multi-year basis.







JANUARY 13, 2011

In the 2011 MLS SuperDraft, the Timbers select 2010 Hermann Trophy award-winner Darlington Nagbe with the No. 2 overall pick. The club selected two players through the draft, and joining Nagbe was second-round pick defender Chris Taylor.

January 17, 2011 – General manager/technical director Gavin Wilkinson announces the signing of forward Kenny Cooper from German club TSV 1860 Munich. Cooper has 11 caps with the U.S. National Team and was an MLS All-Star and MLS Best XI selection in 2008 with FC Dallas.

January 18, 2011 – MLS holds its 2011 Supplemental Draft. The Timbers selected four players in the three-round draft – forwards Spencer Thompson and Raymundo Reza, midfielder Robby Lynch and defender Taylor Mueller.



JANUARY 20, 2011 More than 40 Timbers employees helped kick off the club's new partnership with Friends of Trees by repopulating a local hill with 60 young trees. Friends of Trees is one of the adopted nonprofit pillar partners for the Timbers' "Stand Together" program.



JANUARY 24, 2011 Under head coach John Spencer, the Timbers open their first preseason training camp as an MLS franchise with their first training session at the adidas America village in Portland.

January 25, 2011 – The Timbers and Tualatin Hills Park & Recreation District (THPRD) announce a 10-year partnership that is highlighted by the construction of a comprehensive training facility – the adidas Timbers Training Center – in Beaverton, Oregon.

January 26, 2011 – Goalkeeper Adin Brown and defender Steve Purdy sign with the Timbers; both were members of the club's USSF Division-2 Pro League squad in 2010.

JANUARY 27-29, 2011

In response to the popularity of the club's "We Are Timbers" billboard campaign, the Timbers host a free "We Are Timbers" photo shoot for fans at the Portland Timbers Downtown Team Store. Approximately 1,500 fans wait in line to have their photo taken in the likeness of the billboards during the three day event.

February 2, 2011 – Nearly six weeks from the start of the 2011 MLS campaign, the Timbers announce that more than 11,000 season tickets have been sold and that the club plans to cap season ticket sales at 12,000 for its inaugural season.

Unveiled at the fashion event in December 2010, the Timbers release their Rose City FC jerseys – the club's secondary kit – and apparel line, featuring adult and youth t-shirts, hooded sweatshirts, scarves, keychains, coffee mugs, pennants, decals, bumper stickers and temporary tattoos.



FEBRUARY 4, 2011

During a preseason camp in Ventura, Calif., the Timbers play the Ventura County Fusion to a 1-1 draw in the club's first preseason match as an MLS side. Midfielder Darlington Nagbe scored for the Timbers. Four days later, the Timbers play the LA Galaxy to a 1-1 draw in a preseason scrimmage at The Home Depot Center's track and field stadium during the trip to Southern California.





February 10, 2011 - Forward Kenny Cooper is introduced to fans and local media by Timbers Owner and President Merritt Paulson at the adidas America village in a morning news conference. He joined his Timbers teammates for preseason training the following day.

February 10, 2011 - MLS unveils the full 34-game, regular-season schedule for the Timbers' inaugural 2011 campaign, including three matches which will be broadcast nationally on either ESPN or ESPN2. Portland's MLS home debut is scheduled for April 14, against the Chicago Fire on ESPN2.

February 15, 2011 – The Timbers acquire midfielder Sal Zizzo in a trade with Chivas USA in exchange for allocation money as the club continues to build its inaugural-season roster.



FEBRUARY 16, 2011

The Timbers sign midfielder Freddie Braun and goalkeeper Jake Gleeson to their MLS roster. Both players were members of the Timbers' development team, the Portland Timbers U-23s, in 2010, and become the first Timbers development players to sign with the first team.



FEBRUARY 18, 2011

The Timbers and Oregon Youth Soccer Association (OYSA) announce a new integrated and innovative youth development program, which will become the foundation of the state's Olympic Development Program (ODP) and the MLS club's youth academy.

MARCH 4-5, 2011

Going up against their two biggest rivals, the Timbers emerge with a first-place finish in the preseason Cascadia Summit, beating Seattle Sounders FC 2-0 and drawing 1-1 with Vancouver Whitecaps FC at the Starfire Sports Complex in Tukwila, Wash.

March 7, 2011 - The Timbers sign Colombian forward Jorge Perlaza to their MLS roster after a successful training camp with the club. Perlaza scored 15 goals in 31 matches for Colombian club Deportes Tolima in 2010.

March 12, 2011 - The Timbers wrap up an undefeated preseason schedule, earning a 1-1 draw on the road against the San Jose Earthquakes to finish 2-0-6 in the preseason. The team's seven preseason goals were all scored by different players.



MARCH 14, 2011

The Timbers and JELD-WEN announce a historic naming rights partnership for the team's newly renovated home venue, now known as JELD-WEN Field. The multiyear deal provides naming rights for the iconic downtown Portland venue which annually plays host to Timbers home games, as well as other local sporting events. JELD-WEN, an Oregon-based manufacturing company employing about 2,500 Oregonians, also becomes the Official Window and Door Provider of the Timbers and MLS.







MARCH 19, 2011

The Timbers open their inaugural MLS season on the road against the Colorado Rapids at Dick's Sporting Goods Park. The Timbers would ultimately come up short in a 3-1 loss despite the first goal in Timbers MLS history, an 80th-minute free kick by forward Kenny Cooper. Two sections of Timbers Army supporters made the trip for the historic occasion.

March 21, 2011 - The Portland Timbers Community Fund awards \$30,000 in spring grants to six Portland-area, non-profit organizations - Camp Fire Columbia, Green Empowerment, Harper's Playground, OYSA's TOPSoccer Program, Playworks and SMART.

March 22, 2011 - The team announces that their home-opening match against the Chicago Fire on April 14 has sold out just hours after the team opens up single-game tickets for purchase at the JELD-WEN Field box office. Hundreds of Timbers fans stand in line up to six hours outside JELD-WEN Field on a Monday night for the opportunity to purchase tickets. The Timbers also announce the creation of a waiting list for 2012 season tickets with all 12,500 season tickets for 2011 already sold out.



MARCH 29, 2011

The Timbers earn their first win as an MLS franchise, defeating Chivas USA 2-0 in a Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup play-in match at Merlo Field on the University of Portland campus. After Chivas USA goes down a man due to a 43rd-minute red card, the Timbers finally break through with goals by Jack Jewsbury in the 84th minute and Eric Brunner in the 86th minute.





MILESTONES TO MLS



APRIL 2, 2011

Jack Jewsbury scored the equalizer for the Timbers in the 38th minute as Portland earned its first point as an MLS franchise with a 1-1 draw against the New England Revolution at Gillette Stadium in Foxborough, Mass. Forward Kenny Cooper and defender Jeremy Hall each earned an assist on the goal.



APRIL 12, 2011 The Oregon House of Representatives passed a resolution honoring the team's inaugural MLS season and first home match in Portland. It states that lawmakers "Recognize, honor and celebrate April 14, 2011, as 'Portland Timbers Day.'"

April 13, 2011 - Portland announces the signing of its first Designated Player, Colombian midfielder Diego Chara from Colombian first division side Deportes Tolima. Chara arrived in the United States in time to make his first appearance for the Timbers on April 23 against the LA Galaxy at the Home Depot Center in Carson, Calif.



APRIL 14, 2011

The Timbers opened the newly-renovated JELD-WEN Field with offensive fireworks in a 4-2 win over the Chicago Fire in front of a sold-out crowd of 18,627 fans. Colombian forward Jorge Perlaza netted two goals, including the first goal scored at JELD-WEN Field in the 29th minute, as the Timbers earned their first win of the 2011 season in their home opener.







MAY 6, 2011 Alaska Airlines introduces its

Alaska Airlines introduces its Portland "Timbers Jet" to a crowd of fans in "Soccer City, USA." The Boeing 737-700 paint theme combined two designs created by Paul Wright of Portland, Ore., and John Bode of San Mateo, Calif. The aircraft features the Timbers name and logo in the team's trademark colors along with a rising sun across the forward part of the fuselage.

May 14, 2011 - The rivalry is renewed between the Portland Timbers and Seattle Sounders FC in Major League Soccer. The first meeting between the two Cascadia rivals ends in a 1-1 draw at Qwest Field in Seattle, as Timbers defender Futty Danso scores the equalizer in the 65th minute.



MAY 21, 2011

Following a 1-0 victory over the Columbus Crew at JELD-WEN Field, the Timbers become the first MLS expansion team to win its first five home league matches. Defender Eric Brunner scored the game-winning goal over the Crew, his former team, in the 46th minute. Jack Jewsbury and Kalif Alhassan combined on a quickly-taken free kick to set up the goal.

June 8, 2011 - Six Timbers players - defenders Futty Danso and Rodney Wallace, midfielders Kalif Alhassan and Jack Jewsbury and forwards Kenny Cooper and Jorge Perlaza - were named to the voting ballot for the 2011 AT&T MLS All-Star Game on July 27, at Red Bull Arena.





June 27, 2011 - At a special event on the Concordia University campus, Timbers President Merritt Paulson presented a check for \$20,000 to University representatives on behalf of the club, a contribution toward the new Concordia University & Community Athletic Complex. Portland City Commissioner Nick Fish and Timbers Chief COO Mike Golub were also on hand to present the grant, which was received by Concordia student-athletes, University officials and Northeast United/Alameda Soccer Club youth athletes.

June 29, 2011 - The Portland Timbers Community Fund awarded \$40,000 in grants to 10 non-profit organizations, benefitting Albertina Kerr Centers, Bienestar, Columbia River United, Columbia Slough Watershed Council, Elevate Oregon, Incight Company, New Avenues for Youth, Inc., The Shadow Project, The Mentoring Project and Tualatin Hills Parks & Recreation District.



JULY 10, 2011 During halftime of the Timbers' home match against Seattle, MLS revealed on ESPN that Jack Jewsbury had been selected to the 2011 AT&T MLS All-Star First XI, becoming the club's first MLS All-Star. Jewsbury was one of the top votegetters at the midfield position based upon fan voting.



JULY 13, 2011

At a groundbreaking ceremony at Chapman School in Northwest Portland, the Timbers, adidas and the city of Portland presented youth players from Hillside Soccer Club a check for \$40,000 to help build a new playing field as part of the new Steve Brand Field.



JULY 16, 2011

The Timbers earned their first road win, a 1-0 victory over the Chicago Fire at TOYOTA Park in Bridgeview, III. Jack Jewsbury buried a penalty kick in the 25th minute and goalkeeper Troy Perkins made a season-high seven saves to help secure the result. The Fire played the final 27 minutes with 10 men after Yamith Cuesta earned his second yellow card.







JULY 27, 2011

Timbers midfielder Jack Jewsbury made a second-half appearance for the MLS All-Stars against England's Manchester United in the 2011 AT&T MLS All-Star Game at Red Bull Arena in Harrison, N.J. Manchester United defeated the MLS All-Stars, 4-0.

Aug. 3, 2011 - The Timbers defeated a talented LA Galaxy squad 3-0 in front of 18,627 fans at JELD-WEN Field. In the Galaxy's first trip to the Rose City with the likes of David Beckham, Landon Donovan and Juan Pablo Ángel in the lineup, the Timbers struck twice in the first half and defender Eric Brunner closed out the game with a header in the 68th minute.

Aug. 5, 2011 - Midfielder Jack Jewsbury was named the MLS W.O.R.K.S. Humanitarian of the Month for August. Jewsbury was recognized for his contributions toward tornado relief efforts in his hometown of Joplin, Mo., during the spring. Following the devastating tornado that hit Joplin on May 22, Jewsbury and the Timbers partnered with the American Red Cross to spearhead fundraising efforts, asking fans to donate money through a mobile text-in campaign and make in-stadium donations at JELD-WEN Field during the club's match against D.C. United on May 29 to go towards disaster relief.

Aug. 9, 2011 - Several Timbers players and members of the front office staff join Portland YouthBuilders staff and students to help build a new home for a Portland-area family. As part of the home build, the Timbers and MLS W.O.R.K.S. presented Portland YouthBuilders, a Timbers' community pillar partner, with a check for \$20,000.





MILESTONES TO MLS



AUGUST 20, 2011

Forward Jorge Perlaza logged a goal and an assist and midfielder Diego Chara scored his first goal of the season as the Timbers downed Cascadia-rival Vancouver Whitecaps FC 2-1 in front of 18,627 at a sold-out JELD-WEN Field. It was the first MLS meeting between the two sides. Portland would finish the 2011 campaign with a 2-1-1 record against its Cascadia rivals.

Aug. 23, 2011 - The Timbers announced an expanded seating capacity at JELD-WEN Field for two regular-season games. The additional seats raised the stadium's capacity to 20,323 for games against the New England Revolution on Sept. 16 and home finale against the Houston Dynamo on Oct. 14.

Sept. 2, 2011 - In what has become an annual tradition with Schoolhouse Supplies, the Timbers delivered 500 backpacks filled with school supplies to students at Portland Public Schools' Jason Lee Elementary School on the first day back to school.



SEPTEMBER 16, 2011

Playing in front of a sold-out crowd for every home match during the season, the Timbers opened extra seats at JELD-WEN Field and set an MLS team record for single-game attendance as 20,323 fans packed the stadium to see Portland defeat New England, 3-0.







OCTOBER 14, 2011

Under a steady rain, the Timbers battled the Houston Dynamo in the club's regular-season home finale at JELD-WEN Field. With a sellout crowd of 20,323, the Timbers sold out each of their 17 home league matches in their inaugural MLS campaign and totaled 320,051 fans. Despite a 2-0 loss in the match, the Timbers thanked the fans for their support during the season.

Oct. 18, 2011 - The Timbers announce the club has surpassed a staggering 97 percent renewal rate for 2012 season tickets. Additionally, the Timbers' Season Ticket Waiting List grows to over 5,000 fans.

Oct. 22, 2011 - The Timbers close their inaugural MLS season in dramatic fashion, as Futty Danso scored in second-half stoppage time in a 1-1 draw with Real Salt Lake at Rio Tinto Stadium. Trailing 1-0 into the final moments of the match, Danso was on the receiving end of a Brian Umony cross and the unmarked defender hammered in the equalizing goal.



OCTOBER 23, 2011

The Timbers celebrated accomplishments, performances and moments from their inaugural MLS season at the Stand Together Awards Banquet at The Nines in downtown Portland. Among the festivities, the club announced its 2011 awards, handing out 11 in total. Award winners were: Kalif Alhassan, Kenny Cooper, Jake Gleeson, Jack Jewsbury, Darlington Nagbe and Troy Perkins.



OCTOBER 26, 2011

Having sold out each of their 17 league matches during 2011 season, the Timbers announce an expanded seating capacity of over 20,000 at JELD-WEN Field for all home matches in 2012. The club also increases the number of season tickets available from 12,500 to 14,750 in its second MLS season.

Nov. 8, 2011 – Major League Soccer announced that the Timbers were the recipient of the 2011 Xbox 360 Team Fair Play Award, the club's first MLS team award.



NOVEMBER 16, 2011

Midfielder/forward Darlington Nagbe is named the winner of MLS's 2011 AT&T Goal of the Year for his juggle and volley into the top corner of the goal on July 2 against Sporting Kansas City at JELD-WEN Field. He becomes just the second rookie in MLS history (Damani Ralph, Chicago Fire - 2003) to win MLS Goal of the Year.



NOVEMBER 17, 2011

The Timbers announce that season tickets for the 2012 MLS season have sold out, capping seats at 14,750. Having surpassed a 97 percent renewal rate on season tickets and due to increased demand, the Timbers raise the number of season tickets available by more than 2,000. It was also announced that capacity for all home games at JELD-WEN Field in 2012 will be raised to over 20,000, accommodating additional season tickets as well as group and individual sales.



NOVEMBER 20, 2011

Prior to kickoff of MLS Cup 2011, MLS announces that Timbers COO Mike Golub won the Doug Hamilton Executive of the Year award at the league's year-end ceremony. In all, five executives from the Timbers won league honors after a stellar transition and first season in MLS in 2011. The club's award winners included Ryan Brach winning the MLS Corporate Partnership Executive of the Year, Joe Cote being named MLS Ticketing Executive of the Year and Cory Dolich receiving the MLS Marketing Executive of the Year. In addition, the Timbers won the MLS Operations Staff of the Year.







DECEMBER 6, 2011

Modeled by players Darlington Nagbe (left) and David Horst (right), the Timbers and adidas unveiled the club's official third uniform design, a retro-inspired jersey produced from 100 percent recycled materials. Designed and manufactured in Portland, the jersey features a number of signature design elements inspired by the rich history of the club.

Dec. 14, 2011 - Mike Toshack is appointed by head coach John Spencer as the Timbers' goalkeeper coach. Toshack joined the Timbers after three seasons with Toronto FC (2009-11). Toshack replaced previous goalkeeper coach Adam Smith, who a day prior, was named a director for the Timbers Academy.

Dec. 15, 2011 - Regarded as one of Colombia's top young players, 19-year old striker Jose Adolfo Valencia was acquired by the Timbers.



As part of MLSsoccer.com's "Best of 2011" series, Timbers broadcaster John Strong was awarded Major League Soccer's Broadcast Call of the Year, for his play-by-play of midfielder Darlington Nagbe's Goal of the Year-winning strike against Sporting Kansas City on July 2 at JELD-WEN Field.



Timbers U-23s product Brent Richards signs as the Timbers first Homegrown Player. A native of Camas, Wash., Richards registered 26 goals and 12 assists in 37 games with the U-23s. He also recorded 31 goals and 15 assists in an outstanding collegiate career at the University of Washington.

Jan. 5, 2012 - MLS unveils the Timbers' full 34-match 2012 regular-season schedule, featuring a slate of 12 nationally televised matches. Among the national TV broadcasts, the club's Sept. 15 matchup against rival Seattle Sounders FC is set to air live on NBC. The 2012 campaign features a new competition format for MLS, with clubs playing a conference-based schedule.

JANUARY 8, 2012

Timbers players and staff kick off "Dribble Oregon," presented by JELD-WEN Windows & Doors, a four-city tour across Oregon. Starting in Klamath Falls, the Timbers proceeded to visit the communities of Eugene/Springfield, Salem, and Bend in the month of January, holding youth clinics, participating in community events and meeting with fans in each city.



JANUARY 12, 2012

The Timbers select defender Andrew Jean-Baptiste from the University of Connecticut with the No. 8 overall pick in the 2012 MLS SuperDraft, held in Kansas City, Mo. Jean-Baptiste, a member of Generation adidas, led Connecticut to the finals of the BIG EAST championship tournament and the semifinals of the 2011 NCAA tournament.





Jan. 17, 2012 - The Timbers draft four players in the 2012 MLS Supplemental Draft, selecting goalkeeper Doug Herrick (St. Mary's College), midfielder Miguel Ibarra (UC-Irvine), defender Ryan Kawulok (Univ. of Portland) and midfielder Logan McDaniel (Loyola Marymount Univ.). Kawulok, a product of the Timbers U-23s, was selected No. 8 overall in the draft by Portland.



Under head coach John Spencer, the Timbers open 2012 preseason training camp in Portland, Ore., at JELD-WEN Field in preparation for the second season as an MLS club.

Jan. 26, 2012 - Former Timbers defender Cameron Knowles joins John Spencer's coaching staff as an assistant coach. Knowles played four seasons with the Timbers from 2007-10 and was a two-time USL First Division all-league selection.

Jan. 30, 2012 - The Timbers announce the signing of forward Kris Boyd as a Designated Player. He played 10 seasons in the Scottish Premier League with Kilmarnock and Rangers from 2001-10, becoming the league's all-time leading scorer with 164 goals in 296 league appearances. Boyd, a four-time SPL scoring champion, also has 18 caps with the Scotland National Team.



FEBRUARY 12, 2012

Timbers Owner and President Merritt Paulson is awarded the Slats Gill Award for Sportsperson of the Year at the 60th Oregon Sports Awards held in Beaverton. Paulson becomes just the second non-coach to receive the honor since its founding in 1957.



At a news conference held at JELD-WEN Field, Timbers formally introduce Designated Player and forward Kris Boyd to members of the media and fans. Following the event, Boyd participated in his first training session, less than 24 hours after arriving in Portland from Scotland.

ABOUT THE TIMBERS RETRO-INSPIRED THIRD KIT

On Dec. 6, 2011, the Portland Timbers and adidas unveiled the team's official third uniform design for the 2012 season. The retro-inspired jersey is produced from 100 percent recycled materials and was designed and manufactured in Portland.

"One of the greatest strengths of the Timbers is the rich history of the club," said Merritt Paulson, president of the Timbers. "With this third kit, we are paying homage to the teams and players that inspired our city to become Soccer City, USA."

The third uniform, created by adidas, features a number of signature design elements inspired by the rich history of the club. The retro-inspired design is highlighted by a green-collared jersey that takes inspiration from historic Timbers kits and pays homage to the long-standing tradition of the Timbers in Portland. A further nod to this rich past, and distinct from the team's primary and secondary kits, the Timbers' history-inspired secondary crest is included on the third kit.

The jersey also features unique call-outs to a script Timbers font from the North American Soccer League era of the club and an "Estd. 1975" mark to honor the year of the team's debut season in the NASL. The inside collar is inscribed "Designed and Manufactured in Portland, OR, USA" and features a recycled symbol.

Further, the club's official jersey partner, Alaska Airlines, joined in the spirit of the third-kit design. The Alaska Airlines name on the front of the third jersey features a sans serif typeface, identical to the script prominently featured across the carrier's fuselage in 1979 when the airline started regular jet service in Portland. The retro font was used for decades and preceded the well-known Alaska Airlines wind-script, used by the airline since the early 1990s, that is featured on the Timbers' primary and secondary shirts.

The third kit will be worn for select matches during the 2012 season; the Timbers will continue to feature their green primary jerseys and Rose City Red secondary kits in 2012.

MERRITT PAULSON OWNER & PRESIDENT

Merritt Paulson is the Owner and President of the Portland Timbers. On March 20, 2009, Major League Soccer (MLS) announced that the Timbers would become the league's 18th franchise, starting play in 2011.

Named to Sports Business Journal's exclusive "Forty Under 40" class of 2011 and 2012, Paulson's diligent efforts – an arduous process that began in 2008 – to bring a second major league sports franchise to Portland and to transform JELD-WEN Field into one of the most intimate sports venues in the country came to life during the Timbers' inaugural MLS season in 2011. Under Paulson's leadership, the Timbers sold out all of their regular-season home games (17 straight) in 2011, have developed award-winning marketing campaigns and community outreach programs and transformed the region's sporting landscape by creating one of the most authentic and exciting in-game experiences in sports.

Leading into their second MLS season, the Timbers achieved more than a 97 percent renewal rate on season tickets and quickly reached their expanded cap of 14,750 season tickets available for 2012. Additionally, the team has a Season Ticket Waiting List that numbered more than 6,500 fans, leading into the 2012 season.

With a successful inaugural MLS campaign both on and off the field, Paulson was awarded the Slats Gill Award for Sportsperson of the Year for 2011 by the Oregon Sports Awards. With the honor, he became just the second non-coach to be so-honored in the history of the award, the first since Harry Glickman of the Portland Trail Blazers in 1970.

Before assuming ownership of the team in 2007, Paulson was an executive at NBA Entertainment in New York, where he helped launch and develop NBA-TV and had responsibility for both marketing and business development efforts of NBA-TV and NBA LEAGUE PASS. He first moved to New York to join HBO on Demand and was part of the team that launched the first premium subscription video on-demand service.

Paulson graduated from Hamilton College with a B.A. in English and earned his Masters of Business Administration from Harvard Business School.

From a personal standpoint, Paulson, his wife and two daughters are thrilled to live in the Portland area and are passionate outdoor enthusiasts. Paulson is on the boards of the Oregon Chapter of The Nature Conservancy, the Oregon Sports Authority and Panthera.





MIKE GOLUB CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER

Timbers Chief Operating Officer Mike Golub has more than 25 years experience in professional sports marketing and management, including a wealth of experience in Portland and the Pacific Northwest.

Golub assumed the position of COO with the Timbers in March 2010 and helped lead the organization during its highly successful ascendancy to Major League Soccer. In his position, Golub oversees all business operations for the Timbers and was named the 2011 Doug Hamilton Executive of the Year in MLS in recognition of the team's remarkable and historic inaugural season in the league.

Under Golub's guidance, the Timbers have indelibly changed the landscape of sports in Portland, while becoming a national success story and a model professional sports franchise. The Timbers have sold out all of their regularseason games, forged industry leading corporate partnerships, created a Season Ticket Waiting List, introduced an award-winning community relations platform, Stand Together, and have created one of the best in-game stadium experiences in sports.

Previously, Golub served as the Chief Operating Officer for the NBA's Portland Trail Blazers from 2006-08, transforming the team's business and brand into one of the most successful in professional sports. With Nike (1996-99), he was a founding member and director of Nike Sports Entertainment, a global sports marketing division that established new strategic alliances and created and administered Nike-owned sporting events.

Golub also brings considerable experience in a variety of major league sports. He served as the Executive Vice President for the NBA's Memphis Grizzlies from 2000-05 and was the Senior Vice President of Business Operations and Chief Marketing Officer for the National Hockey League's New York Rangers prior to joining the Trail Blazers in October 2006. Golub managed the National Basketball Association's Events Division from 1991-96 and began his career in sports as a producer for Major League Baseball Productions.

Golub is immediate past Chair of the Board of Directors of the Portland Center Stage and serves on the Board of Directors of the Children's Cancer Association, Pioneer Courthouse Square, the Regional Arts & Culture Council and the Oregon Sports Authority. He also serves on the Board of Directors of Trusted Sports, Inc., based in Bend, Ore.

Mike his wife, Sam, and their two dogs reside in Portland.





GAVIN WILKINSON GENERAL MANAGER

Gavin Wilkinson, a long-time member of the Timbers organization and a former New Zealand international, serves as the club's General Manager; he was appointed on January 18, 2010. He first joined the club as a player for the Timbers' USL First Division side in 2001, before taking over as the head coach and general manager during the club's final years in the second division from 2007-10.

As head coach, Wilkinson assembled a 50-29-39 record over four seasons in the USL First Division/USSF Division-2 Pro League and was a two-time USL First Division Coach of the Year (2007, 2009). He guided the club to three postseason berths, including its only semifinals appearances as a second-division club in 2007 and 2009. Wilkinson oversaw Cascadia Cup (a fan-based derby between Portland, Seattle and Vancouver) titles in 2009 and 2010 and is also a two-time recipient of the FieldTurf Coach of the Year for the USL First Division (2007, 2009). A defender during his playing career, Wilkinson oversaw 39 shutouts in 118 regular-season matches.

He led the Timbers to one of the best seasons in USL First Division history in 2009, including a record-setting, 24game unbeaten streak and winning the Commissioner's Cup. The Timbers set a new single-season, league record with the impressive streak (14-0-10), surpassing the previous mark of 15 games set in 2005. The club's recordsetting run also ranks among the longest in U.S. Soccer history. Finishing in first place at 16-4-10 (58pts), Portland was awarded the Commissioner's Cup as the league's regular-season champion and earned a berth into the USL First Division semifinals.

Wilkinson's 13-year professional playing career included time with clubs in six different countries, including Portugal, Ireland, Hong Kong, Singapore and Australia. He joined the re-born Timbers for their inaugural United Soccer Leagues season in 2001, playing in each of the club's first six seasons and serving the dual role as a player/assistant coach from 2005-06. He finished his career ranked among the Timbers' USL franchise career leaders in games (124) and minutes played (10,181).

A New Zealand native, Wilkinson earned 38 caps with the New Zealand National Team and competed in the 1999 and 2003 FIFA Confederations Cups.

As general manager, Wilkinson started the Timbers' development team, called the Portland Timbers U-23s, in the fall of 2008. The Timbers U-23s compete in United Soccer Leagues' Premier Development League – the top U-23 league in North America – and won the PDL championship in just their second season in 2010, becoming the first undefeated champion in PDL history with a perfect 20-0-0 record through the regular season and playoffs. He was instrumental in starting the Timbers Academy programs, creating a complete development system for the club.

Wilkinson, who holds an "A" coaching license from USSF, founded the youth club Eastside United, based in Gresham, Ore., in 2001. He helped run the club as its coaching director for many years and now serves as an advisor for the club. In 2010, Eastside United FC's U-18 boys team ('91 Liverpool) won the U.S. Youth Soccer U-18 national championship and became the first youth club team from Oregon to win a national title since 1994.

He and his wife, Heather, have two children, Kienan and Brooke.

JOHN SPENCER HEAD COACH

BIOGRAPHY

Appointed the first head coach in the club's MLS history on Aug. 10, 2010, John Spencer completed his first season as head coach of the 2011 Portland Timbers by guiding the team to the brink of the MLS Cup playoffs.

A native of Glasgow, Scotland, Spencer led the Timbers through a successful opening MLS campaign, earning a 9-5-3 record at home - tied for third-best in the league - and nearly clinching a spot in the playoffs.

The third-youngest head coach in MLS for the 2011 season. Spencer helped one of the league's youngest rosters navigate the rigors of its first 34-game regular season while staying competitive in the Western Conference.

Under Spencer's tutelage, the Timbers became the first MLS expansion franchise to win their first five home games, and the first franchise to begin its home season with three straight wins since 1996. Portland's 11 wins in 2011 ranks tied for fourth all-time among expansion teams for wins in a season.

Prior to joining the Timbers, Spencer served as an assistant coach for the Houston Dynamo under head coach Dominic Kinnear for nearly five seasons (2006-2010). He helped lead the Dynamo to back-to-back MLS Cup championships in 2006 and 2007 as well as four consecutive playoff appearances. From 2006-08, Spencer also coached the Dynamo Reserves, guiding Houston's reserve squad to the 2008 MLS Reserve Division championship.

During an 18-year playing career, Spencer suited up

for such noted English clubs as Chelsea, Everton and Queens Park Rangers, and Scotland's Glasgow Rangers. As a striker, he most notably amassed 43 goals with English-power Chelsea from 1992-96.

In MLS, Spencer starred for the Colorado Rapids from 2001-04, becoming the only player to be the team's MVP and scoring leader in the same season more than once. The two-time MLS All-Star (2001, 2003) captained the Rapids to three straight playoff appearances from 2002-04. A two-time MLS Best XI selection, Spencer was inducted to the Rapids Gallery of Honor on Aug. 30, 2009.

Spencer, 41, was considered the Rapids' undeniable leader due to his skill and work ethic. During his time with Colorado, he played in 88 games and his 37 goals ranks among franchise career leaders. Spencer led the Rapids in goals scored twice, set the club's singleseason mark for goals (14) and career mark for assists (17).

At the international level, Spencer earned 14 caps with the Scotland National Team from 1994-97. He earned his first cap for Scotland against Russia on November 16, 1994, in Glasgow. During his international career, Spencer played against England at Wembley Stadium in the 1996 European Championship.

Spencer and his wife, Amanda, have three children, Chantelle, Brad and Dylan, and live in the Portland metro area. One of Spencer's favorite goal celebrations was to kiss his wedding ring in honor of his family.

ASSISTANT COACHES



AMOS MAGEE - ASSISTANT COACH

Amos Magee completed his first season as an assistant coach for the MLS Timbers, as well as the head coach of the Timbers Reserves squad in 2011. Previously, he was an assistant coach for two seasons with Portland's second-division club from 2009-10.

With the Timbers Reserves, Magee guided the team to a 6-2-2 record and the fourth-highest points total (20) in the MLS Reserve League. Under Magee's direction, the Timbers Reserves' 24 goals in 10 matches ranked second among all MLS Reserve teams in 2011 and the team finished the season on a six-match unbeaten streak.

Prior to joining MLS, Magee helped coach the second-division Timbers to back-to-back playoff appearances, win the 2009 USL First Division regular-season championship and assemble a league-record, 24-game unbeaten streak in 2009. Following a 13-year playing career, he joined the coaching ranks as a player/assistant coach in 2004 with the Minnesota Thunder of United Soccer Leagues. Magee served as the Thunder head coach from 2006-08 and also coached with the U.S. Maccabi Men's Open Team prior to joining the Timbers. In 2008, he led the U.S. Maccabi Men's Open Team to a gold-medal performance at the Maccabi Pan-American Games in Buenos Aires, Argentina.

A native of St. Paul, Minn., Magee spent most of his 13-year playing career with the Minnesota Thunder (1991-2004), but also played parts of three seasons in MLS with the Tampa Bay Mutiny (2000-01) and Chicago Fire (2001-02). A forward, he recorded 64 goals and 39 assists for the Thunder, becoming the club's all-time career scoring leader. Magee led the Thunder to six finals appearances and the USL First Division title in 1999; he was named the MVP of the finals with a pair of assists in the championship match. He was a two-time all-league selection, including a USL First Division All-League first-team nod in 1998. For his accomplishments as a player, he was inducted into the USL Hall of Fame in 2008 and is a member of the Minnesota Thunder Hall of Fame Class of 2005.

Magee had a standout collegiate career at Wesleyan University (Conn.) and finished as the school's all-time leading scorer. He was inducted into the Wesleyan University Athletics Hall of Fame in 2008. Magee holds a USSF 'A' coaching license. He married his wife, Charlotte Tuttle, in December 2010.



MIKE TOSHACK - GOALKEEPER COACH

Mike Toshack, a native of Prescott, Ontario, joined the Portland Timbers on December 14, 2011. Toshack, 46, and Timbers head coach John Spencer are reunited in Portland, as the two worked together previously on the coaching staff for the Houston Dynamo during the 2007 and 2008 seasons and helped Houston win MLS Cup 2007. Toshack has served as a goalkeeper coach in Major League Soccer for five seasons, including the last three with Toronto FC (2009-11).

Under his guidance, Toshack's goalkeepers have regularly ranked among MLS's top performers each season. In Houston, former goalkeeper Pat Onstad recorded the league's best goals-against average in 2007. During Toshack's time at Toronto FC, goalkeeper Stefan Frei was a

finalist for the 2009 MLS Rookie of the Year and finished among leaders in saves in 2010 and 2011.

Before working in Major League Soccer, Toshack was the director of goalkeeping for the Vancouver Whitecaps. He started the role in February 2005 and was responsible for the development and training of all goalkeepers in the club, from youth to the professional team. He served as an assistant coach with Vancouver when it won the USL First Division Champion-ship in 2006 and also spent time with the Montreal Impact as an assistant coach from 2002-03.

Toshack worked with leading youth club Mass Premier Soccer in Boston as its goalkeeping director, where he was responsible for the development of all goalkeepers for its Super Y-league teams as well as the Cape Cod Crusaders of the Premier Development League. From 1994-2003, Toshack was the Assistant Coach at St. Lawrence University in Canton, N.Y., and was part of the team that won the NCAA Division III championship in 1999. During his time in New York, Toshack also served as the goalkeeper coach with the Canadian U-20 National Team from 1998-2001. That position took him around the world, including a stop in Argentina where the 2001 FIFA U-20 World Youth Championships took place.



ASSISTANT COACHES



CAMERON KNOWLES - ASSISTANT COACH

Knowles, a former Timbers defender, was appointed as an assistant coach on Jan. 26, 2012. He played professionally for seven seasons, including four with Portland from 2007-10. The Auckland, New Zealand, native was originally drafted by Real Salt Lake in the 2005 MLS Supplemental Draft and played two seasons in MLS.

During his playing career with the Timbers, Knowles was a three-time USL First Division allleague selection and helped Portland claim the Commissioner's Cup in 2009 as the league's regular-season champion. He was a finalist for the league's Defender of the Year award in 2007. In total, Knowles played in 77 games for the Timbers, which ranks among the club's second-

division career leaders. Following the 2008 season, he was voted by fans as the Supporter's Player of the Year.

In 2007, Knowles led the league in minutes played (2,520) and anchored a backline which allowed the fewest goals (18) in a single season during the Timbers 10 seasons as a second-division side. He also played a key role in the Timbers' USL First Division record-setting 24-game unbeaten streak in 2009.

Knowles started his professional career in 2005 as a member of Real Salt Lake's inaugural MLS roster. His playing career also includes time in the North American Soccer League with the Montreal Impact during the 2011 season.

Knowles had a standout collegiate career at the University of Akron, where he was a two-time All-Mid-American Conference first-team selection. He led the Zips to a pair of conference championships (2002, 2004) and four straight NCAA tournament appearances (2001-04).

Dr. Jonathan E. Although he treats a wide variety of orthopaedic patients, Dr. Greenleaf is especially skilled in arthroscopic treatment of knees and shoulders and is a master instructor in both knee and shoulder surgery.

Dr. James Beckerman enters 2012 in his second season as the team cardiologist for the Timbers, he specializes in preventive cardiology and cardiac diseases in athletes. He is widely known from his appearances on TV shows such as "The Today Show" and "The Doctor Oz Show," discussing his book, The Flex Diet.

NIK WALD, ATC - HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER

Nik Wald enters his sixth season with the Timbers organization in 2012. He served as the club's head athletic trainer for the past five seasons, including seasons when the Timbers competed as a second-division side. A native of Eugene, Ore., Wald graduated from the University of Oregon with a degree in exercise and movement science in 2003. Wald lives in Portland with his wife, Stacie, and son, Chase.



KARIM DERQAOUI - STRENGTH & CONDITIONING COACH

Karim Derqaoui returns for a third season with the Timbers in 2012. Born in Morocco, Derqaoui earned a bachelor's and master's degree in exercise physiology from San Francisco State University; he wrote his master's thesis on preseason conditioning for soccer. He holds certifications from the American College of Sports Medicine and National Strength and Conditioning Association, and is certified in the Selective Functional Movement Assessment. Before the Timbers, Derqaoui conducted soccer-specific research, focusing on passing biomechanics and touch development. He has lived and studied in both Germany and France, and his personal interests include traveling and yoga.

In his career, Perkins has earned six caps with the U.S. Men's National Team and was the starting goalkeeper as the United States reached the finals of the 2009 CONCACAF Gold Cup. 2011: Was a strong presence in goal for the Timbers, making 29 consecutive starts from April 23-Oct. 2 ... Earned an MLS career-high nine shutouts, besting his previous mark of eight set in both 2006 and 2007 ... His nine shutouts were tied for third-best in the league ... Recorded three straight clean sheets Aug. 24-Sept. 16, and set Portland's MLS franchise-long shutout streak at 342 minutes without allowing a goal ... Don Garber is in his 13th season as the Commissioner of Major League Soccer, only the second person to ever hold the position. He also serves as the CEO of MLS' marketing arm, Soccer United Marketing.



I. MLS ROSTER COMPOSITION

A Major League Soccer club's first team roster is comprised of up to 30 players. All 30 players are eligible for selection to each 18-player game-day squad during the regular season and playoffs.

Salary & Budget:

- Players occupying roster spots 1-20 count against the club's 2012 salary budget of \$2,810,000, and are referred to collectively as the club's Salary Budget Players.
- Roster spots 19 and 20 are not required to be filled, and teams may spread their salary budget across only 18 Salary Budget Players. A minimum salary budget charge will be imputed against a team's salary budget for each unfilled senior roster slot below 18.
- The maximum budget charge for a single player is \$350,000.*
- A Designated Player over the age of 23 counts as \$350,000 against the club's salary budget, unless the player joins his club in the middle of the season, in which case his budget charge will be \$175,000.
- A Designated Player 20 years old or younger** (referred to as Young Designated Players or Young DPs) counts as \$150,000 against the club's salary budget
- A Designated Player 21-23 years old** counts as \$200,000 against the club's salary budget.
- The budget charge for the midseason signing of a Young DP is \$150,000 and this amount cannot be lowered with allocation funds.
- Clubs will not have to buy the third DP roster slot to accommodate a Young Designated Player whereas clubs are normally required to buy that slot for a one-time fee of \$250,000.
- o Clubs are responsible for all amounts above the budget charge for all Designated Players.

* See section entitled Allocation Money below, under Player Acquisition Mechanisms, for details on buying down a player's budget charge.

** Age of player is determined by year (not date) of birth.

- Players occupying roster spots 21-30 do not count against the club's salary budget, and are referred to collectively as the club's Off-Budget Players (maximum of 10 per team).
- All Generation adidas players are Off-Budget players.
 Players occupying roster spots 1-24 will earn at least
- \$44,000 in 2012.
 Players occupying roster spots 25-30 will earn at least \$33,750 in 2012.
- Clubs may elect to leave up to two of these roster spots (25-30) vacant and use \$35,000 for each empty spot as allocation money.
- Clubs may sign up to two Homegrown Players contracts above the minimum salary and similar to Generation adidas player contract amounts.

Age Designations:

Any player making \$33,750 must be under the age 25 (does not turn 25 or older in 2012).

Domestic/International:

- In 2012, a total of 152 International slots are divided among the 19 clubs. Each club began with eight international slots, which are tradable. There is no limit on the number of international slots on each club's roster.
- The remaining roster slots must belong to domestic players. For clubs based in the United States, a domestic player is either a U.S. citizen, a permanent resident (green card holder) or the holder of other special status (e.g., refugee or

asylum status).

• The three MLS clubs based in Canada – Montreal Impact, Toronto FC and Vancouver Whitecaps FC – began with eight international slots, but their domestic slots may be filled with either Canadian or U.S. domestic players.

- o MLS clubs based in Canada are required to have a minimum of three Canadian domestic players on their rosters.
- Players with the legal right to work in Canada are considered Canadian domestic players (i.e., Canadian citizen, permanent resident, part of a protected class).

NOTE: The terms Homegrown and Generation adidas are used to describe mechanisms by which players are acquired. They are not roster designations. All players' roster slots are determined by their compensation and/or age as outlined above.

II. PLAYER ACQUISITION MECHANISMS

MLS teams may acquire players and add them to their rosters via the following mechanisms:

(A) ALLOCATION RANKING

The allocation ranking is the mechanism used to determine which MLS club has first priority to acquire a U.S. National Team player who signs with MLS after playing abroad, or a former MLS player who returns to the League after having gone to a club abroad for a transfer fee. The allocation rankings may also be used in the event two or more clubs file a request for the same player on the same day when the discovery period opens in December. The allocations will be ranked in reverse order of finish for the 2011 season, taking playoff performance into account.

Once the club uses its allocation ranking to acquire a player, it drops to the bottom of the list. A ranking can be traded, provided that part of the compensation received in return is the other club's ranking. At all times, each club is assigned one ranking. The rankings reset at the end of each MLS League season.

Allocation Money

Allocation money is a resource available to clubs in addition to their respective salary budgets.

- A club may receive allocation money for:
- (1) failure to qualify for the MLS Cup Playoffs;
- (2) the transfer of a player to a club outside of MLS for value;
- (3) expansion status;
- (4) qualification for the CONCACAF Champions League;
- (5) trading in up to two Off-Budget roster spots;
- (6) funds from purchased third designated player roster spots.

Each year the MLS Competition Committee determines the allocation amount to be made available to each club. Allocation money can be traded by clubs. Allocation money does not count against a club's salary budget and can be used:

- To sign players new to MLS (that is, a player who did not play in MLS during the previous season).
- To re-sign an existing MLS player, subject to League approval.
- To "buy-down" a player's salary budget charge below the League maximum of \$350,000.
- In connection with the exercise of an option to purchase a player's rights or the extension of a player's contract for the second year provided the player was new to MLS in the immediately prior year.



NOTE: To protect the interests of MLS and its clubs during discussions with prospective players or clubs in other leagues, amounts of allocation money held by each club will not be shared publicly.

(B) DESIGNATED PLAYER

The Designated Player Rule allows clubs to acquire up to three players whose salaries exceed their budget charges, with the club bearing financial responsibility for the amount of compensation above each player's budget charge. Designated Player slots may be used to acquire players new to MLS or to retain current MLS players, subject to League approval.

In 2012, a Designated Player over the age of 23^{**} will carry a salary budget charge of \$350,000, unless the player joins his club in the middle of the season, in which case his budget charge will be \$175,000.

A Designated Player 20 years old or younger** counts as \$150,000 against the club's salary budget and a Designated Player 21-23 years old counts as \$200,000 against the club's salary budget.

Clubs have the option of "buying down" the budget charge of a Designated Player with allocation money. The reduced charge may not be less than \$150,000.

The budget charge for the midseason signing of a young Designated Player (23 years old and younger) is \$150,000 and this amount cannot be lowered with allocation funds.

Each club has two Designated Player slots and clubs are allowed to "purchase" a third Designated Player slot for a one-time fee of \$250,000 that will be dispersed in the form of allocation money to all clubs that do not have three Designated Players. Clubs will not have to buy the third DP roster slot to accommodate Designated Players 23 years old and younger.

Designated Player slots are not tradable.

** Age of player is determined by year (not date) of birth.

(C) SUPERDRAFT

The 2012 MLS SuperDraft, held Jan. 12 in Kansas City, Mo., consisted of two rounds of 19 picks for a total of 38 player selections. A supplemental draft was held Jan. 17 via teleconference and consisted of four rounds of 19 picks.

The majority of draft prospects are NCAA college seniors who have exhausted their college eligibility. Generation adidas players and non-collegiate international players are also eligible for selection in the SuperDraft and supplemental draft. Clubs may nominate players for the League's draft-eligible list, and only players from that list may be selected.

Generation adidas is a joint program between MLS and adidas that is dedicated to developing exceptional domestic talent in a professional environment. Each year, a handful of top domestic underclassmen and youth national team players are signed to the league and placed in the SuperDraft through this program. Generation adidas players also receive an educational stipend.

Draft Order: The Montreal Impact held the first overall selection in the 2012 MLS SuperDraft as expansion clubs are always given the top spot in the SuperDraft and the Supplemental Draft. The next

eight selections went to clubs that did not qualify for the 2011 MLS Cup Playoffs beginning with the club with fewest regular season points (3 points per win, one point per tie). The remaining ten positions were ranked by fewest regular season points among the teams that were eliminated in the same round of the MLS Cup Playoffs.

Unless claimed on waivers, a player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft or supplemental draft and did not sign with the League, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to the player.

(D) TRADES

Players, SuperDraft and Supplemental draft picks, allocation money, allocation rankings, and international player slots may all be exchanged in trades approved by the MLS League Office, provided all of the necessary rules regarding roster and salary budget compliance are met and the trade is completed during a valid trading period. No trades may occur after the Roster Freeze Deadline of September 15, 2012 at 5 p.m. ET.

(E) DISCOVERY SIGNINGS

Clubs may make discovery claims on players not yet under MLS contract who are not subject to the allocation ranking or lottery mechanisms.

Each club has the opportunity to make six discovery signings per season (expansion teams may make 10 discovery signings in their inaugural season). A club may have up to 10 discovery claims on unsigned players at any time and may remove or add players at any time. The last day for discovery player signings is September 15, 2012 – coinciding with the roster freeze date and trade deadline.

The six discovery signings can be used to fill senior roster spots only. If multiple clubs claim the same player using a discovery, the club that filed the claim first will have first rights to the player. Discovery claims expire following each season. If the League and player are unable to reach an agreement during the season, the club that first filed the discovery retains the right of first refusal in the event the player is later signed by the League.

NOTE: To protect interests of MLS clubs in scouting and negotiations with prospective players, the League office will not publicize the names of players on club discovery lists, nor specify if a discovery claim has been filed on a particular player.

(F) HOMEGROWN PLAYER SIGNINGS

A club may sign a player to his first professional contract without subjecting him to the MLS SuperDraft if the player has trained for at least one year in the club's youth development program and has met the League's Homegrown Player criteria. Players joining MLS through this mechanism are known as Homegrown Players.

There is no limit to the number of Homegrown Players a club may sign in a given year.

(G) RE-ENTRY PROCESS

The 2012 Re-Entry Process will commence after MLS Cup. The priority order for the Re-Entry Draft is reverse order of finish in 2012, taking into account playoff performance.

Available to all teams in Stage 1 of the Re-Entry draft will be:



- 1. Players who are at least 23 years old and have a minimum of three years experience in MLS whose options were not exercised by their clubs (available at option salary for 2013).
- Players who are at least 25 years old with a minimum of four years of MLS experience who are out of contract and whose club does not wish to re-sign them at their previous salary (available for at least their 2012 salary).
- 3. Players who are at least 30 years old with a minimum of eight years of MLS experience who are out of contract and whose club does not wish to re-sign them (available for at least 105% of their 2012 salary).

Players who are not selected in Stage 1 of the Re-Entry Draft will be made available in Stage 2. Clubs selecting players in Stage 2 will negotiate a new salary with the player.

Players who remain unselected after Stage 2 will be available to any MLS club on a first come, first serve basis.

(H) WAIVERS

A team may place a player on waivers at any time during the regular season at which point he is made available to all other teams. The waiver claiming period shall commence on the first business day after the League delivers notice to teams and shall expire at 5 p.m. EST on the second business day after the Waiver Period Commencement Date. The claiming period is 48 hours.

The Waiver Draft order is determined via points per game once all teams have played at least three MLS League games. If the waiver takes place prior to all teams playing in at least three League games, priority shall be granted based upon the prior year's performance, taking playoff performance first, with teams eliminated from playoff contention at the same stage separated according to their point totals through the end of the regular season. New expansion teams shall be at the bottom of the waiver order.

Once a team selects a player off waivers, that club is automatically moved to the bottom of the priority list for subsequent waiver selections in a given season, regardless of its points-per-game total. Players who may be placed on the MLS waiver wire are as follows:

- (i) A player waived by an MLS team in the current season;
- (ii) A player who completed his college eligibility within the past season, who was not made available in the SuperDraft or Supplemental Draft;
- (iii) A player who has remaining college eligibility (and was not made available in the SuperDraft or Supplemental Draft), but the League at its discretion and after taking into account exceptional circumstances determines the player may be offered an MLS contract;
- (iv) A player who has played in MLS previously where his last MLS team does not wish to exercise their right of first refusal, except in the case of returning U.S. National Team players as stated above.
- (v) A player who was drafted in the SuperDraft or supplemental draft, and who after a trial with the club is not offered a contract by the first Monday of June.

(I) LOTTERY

Some players shall be assigned to MLS teams via the weighted Lottery process. Any team assigned a player through the lottery in any particular season shall not be assigned another lottery player that season unless and until all teams have received a lottery player or have agreed to waive their option to participate in a Lottery. The players made available through lotteries include:

- (i) Generation adidas players signed after the MLS SuperDraft;
- (ii) Draft eligible players to whom an MLS contract was offered but who failed to sign with the League prior to the Draft.

The weighted lottery takes into consideration each team's performance over its last 34 regular season games and the most recent postseason. The team with the worst record over its last 34 regular season games (dating back to previous season if necessary and taking playoff performance into account) will have the greatest probability of winning the lottery. Teams are not required to participate in a lottery. Players are assigned via the lottery system in order to prevent a player from potentially influencing his destination club with a strategic holdout.

(J) EXTREME HARDSHIP CALL-UPS

Teams may add players to their roster in cases of "extreme hardship" as follows: (1) a club with three goalkeepers on its 30-man roster, but has less than two available goalkeepers or (2) a team has less than 15 available players. Extreme hardship call-ups are made on a game-by-game basis.

(K) SEASON-ENDING INJURY REPLACEMENTS (Season Ending Injury List)

A team with a player lost to a season-ending injury can place the player on the Season Ending Injury List and replace that player on its roster, while remaining responsible for the full amount of the injured player's salary. A player can be placed on the season-ending injury list once another player has been signed as a replacement (provided the team has budget space). International player limits still apply at the time a season-ending replacement is made (with the player being replaced not counting against those limits).

(L) SHORT-TERM INJURY REPLACEMENTS (Disabled List)

A player who has a short-term injury can be placed on the Disabled List once another player has been signed as a replacement (provided the team has budget space). The team will remain responsible for the full amount of the injured player's salary on the salary budget. Note: the injured player will have to sit out a minimum of six MLS League matches before he can rejoin the team's roster.

International player limits still apply at the time a short-term replacement is made (with the player being replaced not counting against those limits).

NOTE: No changes may be made to a team's active full roster during the period beginning on September 16, 2012 (day after Roster Freeze Date) through the day after MLS Cup. Nevertheless, a team may obtain players in accordance with the extreme hardship rules and procedures to replace players who are injured or otherwise legitimately unavailable after the Roster Freeze Date. Any other replacements after the Roster Freeze Date may only be made in exceptional circumstances in the League's sole and absolute discretion.



(III.) METHODS OF RELEASING PLAYERS

(A) WAIVERS

Teams may waive players based on performance at any time during the MLS season. Players with guaranteed contracts will continue to have their salary budget charge applied to the team salary budget, subject to any settlement. Players on semi-guaranteed contracts can be waived prior to July 1 of any year and free up the corresponding budget space. If a player on a semi-guaranteed contract is waived after July 1, his salary budget charge will count against the team's salary budget and the team waiving the player will not receive a replacement except under the normal player acquisition mechanisms. Any settlement amount will be charged to the team's salary budget.

(B) TRANSFERS AND LOANS

An MLS player may be transferred or loaned at any time to a team outside the League (subject to that team's Federation's transfer window), subject to the consent of the player.

The registration windows – the dates between which MLS may request the transfer certificate of a player under contract in another country – are as follows:

January 21 – April 15 (Primary Window) June 27 – July 27 (Secondary Window)

(C) CONTRACT EXPIRATION

When a player's contract expires, the player does not count against the roster or budget of the team in question. Subject to the Re-Entry Draft rules, a team retains the rights to the player indefinitely following the expiration of a contract only if attempts were made to re-sign the player.

(D) BUYOUT OF GUARANTEED CONTRACT

Teams may have the ability to buyout one guaranteed player as follows:

- A Team may buy out one (1) guaranteed player (Including a DP's) contract during the off-season and free up the cor responding budget space. Such a buyout is at the particular MLS Team's own expense.
- A Team may not free up budget space with a buyout of a player's salary budget charge during the season. Such a buy out will be conducted by the League and count on a Club's budget in a manner consistent with current MLS guidelines.

(IV.) RIGHT OF FIRST REFUSAL

Right of first refusal grants one MLS club the first opportunity to add a player to its roster in the event that the player signs with MLS. Holding a right of first refusal applies only within MLS and does not indicate holding of the player's International Transfer Certificate.

OUT OF CONTRACT PLAYERS / OPTIONS NOT PICKED UP: Subject to the Re-Entry Draft rules, a team retains the right of first refusal to the player indefinitely only if attempts were made to re-sign the player.

DRAFTED BUT NOT SIGNED: A player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft or supplemental draft and did not sign, or who as of the first Monday in June is not offered a contract after a trial and clears waivers, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 immediately

following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to sign the player.

PLAYER TRANSFERRED OUTSIDE MLS: If a team receives allocation money as a result of a player's transfer, the team does not retain a right of first refusal.

TRAINING SESSIONS

In general, training sessions are open to the media, though all or portions of individual sessions may be closed on occasion at the discretion of the technical staff. No media members are allowed in the locker room before, during or after training sessions. Upon its completion, the adidas Timbers Training Center, located at 6220 SW 112th Ave. in Beaverton, will be the site for a number of training sessions.

WIRELESS INTERNET ACCESS

The press box is fully equipped with wireless internet access. Media members will find tags with the network ID and password on the press table along with other game information packets.

LOCKER ROOM ACCESS

Fifteen minutes following the conclusion of the game, a postgame press conference will be held in the Media Conference Room on the field level. JELD-WEN FIELD RENOVATION



Already steeped in sports and entertainment history, JELD-WEN Field underwent a \$40 million renovation for Major League Soccer, making it the most intimate, exciting and authentic soccer facility in the United States. The renovation elevated the facility to MLS standards and enhanced the fan experience of attending an event by increasing the functionality of the venue and introducing new amenities.

JELD-WEN Field and Turner Construction, who oversaw the stadium's recent renovation project, were recognized by Engineering-News Record and named to the organization's list of the Best of the Best Projects for 2011. JELD-WEN Field earned the award for Best Sports/Entertainment project, recognized for its excellence in design and construction.

Some of the new features include the east side KeyBank Club, an expanded adidas Timbers Team Store, new concession stands and more group and family viewing decks. Additionally, the renovation helped the park's ability to be a year-round community center and play host to more than 250 events annually, including Portland State football and an array of youth sports and community-based events.

RENOVATION PROJECT DETAILS

FIELD

The playing surface shifted to the West and the North to make for a more intimate and closer-to-the-action feel. It also affords more space on the East and South sides of the stadium to create new seating areas. A new FieldTurf Duraspine Pro playing surface was installed as part of the renovation in advance of the 2011 MLS season, earning FIFA 2-Star recommended status on April 18, 2011.

NEW SEATING AREAS

A new seating area along the east side of the stadium was installed, running parallel to the east sideline and 18th Avenue. The top of the new stands begins at the widened public concourse at street level and extends down to the field. These new seats have industry-leading leg room and width, with a majority of the new seats covered by a new roof. More than 1,100 of the new seats are premium club seats, with the highest level of fan amenities, including a separate entrance and access to the new KeyBank Club restaurant.

VIEWS

The renovation design achieves the imperative of preserving substantial views into the stadium from 18th Avenue and to the city from within JELD-WEN Field.

WIDMER SOUTHERN FRONT

Contiguous to the new east side seating areas is the Widmer Southern Front, a bar area and seating/staging platform located behind the south goal. The area features four rows of fixed seating behind the goal, in addition to an expansive, 9,250-square-foot

area that serves as a unique new gathering place for fans, offering a variety of food and Widmer Brothers beverage options and a distinctive vantage point. During events, the Southern Front serves as a group picnic area and/or performance area. The area can accommodate concert staging, which increases JELD-WEN Field's ability to efficiently and cost-effectively host concerts.

EAST-SIDE AMENITIES AND PUBLIC AREAS

In conjunction with the construction of the new eastside seating area, several other new public areas were built, including:

• KeyBank Plaza - At the 18th Avenue and Morrison Street corner of JELD-WEN Field is the extended KeyBank Plaza. The existing open plaza was extended in to the stadium towards the field, where fans can catch a glimpse of the renovated stadium. During non-event times, the KeyBank Plaza is open to the public, with views of the field.

• adidas Timbers Team Store - A new 1,000 square-



foot team store now sits adjacent to the newly extended public plaza at 18th Avenue and SW Morrison. The store is open to the public during non-event hours.

• Concession Stands/Restrooms - New concession stands and restrooms were added on the east side concourse to service the new seating areas.

• KeyBank Club - As part of the new east side seating area, the new KeyBank Club will service the 1,100-plus midfield club seats. This 5,200 square-foot club has views to the field, private entrances and becomes the first sit-down restaurant in the 85-year history of the stadium. The club space is also available for rental for private functions during non-event times.

• Community Room - The new 2,200 square-foot Community Room was built adjacent to the KeyBank Club. This multi-purpose space can be used extensively for a variety of community and corporate events both during non-event hours and during events.

• Budweiser Balcony, Group and Family Decks - Integrated into the design of the new east-side seating areas are three new openviewing decks, including the Budweiser Balcony overlooking the northeast corner of the field. These areas provide excellent views to the field for groups and can also accommodate temporary bleacher seating to increase the capacity for larger events.

ACCESS ROAD

The access road connecting 18th Avenue to the playing field on the south end of JELD-WEN Field was widened and improved as part of the renovation, increasing the stadium's ability to host concerts and other non-sporting events by greatly increasing the speed and cost efficiency of event load-in and load-out.

PROVIDENCE SPORTS CARE CENTER

Integrated into the new east-side seating area is the new Providence Sports Care Center. Completely privately funded, this 12,000sq. ft. facility serves the neighborhood and provides daily activity on a year-round basis to the east side of the stadium.

LARGE FORMAT VIDEO/BROADCAST FACILITIES

To meet MLS requirements and industry standards, new video and broadcast facilities were included in the renovation. These include new camera positions and new permanent broadcast cabling. To enhance the fan experience, a new, 37-by-20-foot HD video scoreboard was installed at the south end of the stadium, new field-side LED boards were added to various areas of the seating bowl, and new television monitors were placed in the concourse to serve the new seating areas.

PRESS BOX

The existing press box was brought up to league requirements. New furniture, fixtures and equipment ("FF&E"), improved broadcast booths and press working areas, introduction of air conditioning/heat, and windows that open were all installed, bringing the press area up to industry standards.

TEAM AREAS

Both the Timbers locker room and training areas, and the visiting areas, were updated and improved to meet league requirements.

PROJECT TIMELINE

Foundation work for the new east- and south-side seating structures and other preparatory work commenced in February 2010. Construction work ceased during the Timbers' 2010 season and began again in September of 2010. All work was completed in time for the Timbers' home opener on April 14, 2011.

JELD-WEN FIELD

Originally built on top of a creekbed for just \$500,000 in 1926, JELD-WEN Field has played host to an array of historical events during its time. Those events, which date back before the construction of the stadium to the original Multhomah Field, are not just limited to the sporting landscape, but include notable political and entertainment occurrences as well.

Over the years, the names and games have changed, from football to baseball to soccer (and even ski jumping and dog racing). But some parts have stayed the same. Certain pieces of the stadium have been in place since the beginning; the upper seating bowl and wood benches still remain from the original construction of the facility over 85 years ago.

Now, after undergoing the largest-scale seating addition in its storied history, JELD-WEN Field is ready for a new, exciting chapter to be written on its illustrious timeline.

THROUGH THE YEARS

- **1893** The two-year-old Multnomah Amateur Athletic Club, now known as the MAC, leased this plot of pasture land in an area known as Tanner Creek Gulch and called it Multnomah Field. From the start, it was home to all popular outdoor athletic events of the day.
- **1909** Multhomah Field hosted the 27th President of the United States William H. Taft, with 20,000 school children in attendance.
- **1926** The stadium was formally dedicated on Oct. 9 as the University of Washington's football team beat the University of Oregon, 23-9. More than 24,000 fans were in attendance.
- **1933** Still searching for a main tenant to occupy the stadium, Oregon lawmakers approved parl-mutuel betting. The Multnomah Kennel Club became the stadium's lone major tenant until 1955.
- 1966 The MAC sold the stadium to the City of Portland for \$2.1 million.
- **1955** The Los Angeles Rams and New York Glants played the first overtime game in NFL history, with the Rams prevailing 23-17 in the exhibition contest.
- **1957** Elvismania hit Portland, as Elvis Presley played for 14,000 screaming fans. Arriving to Multnomah Civic Stadium in a white convertible Cadillac, The King put on a 40-minute show that



left the fanatical crowd in hysteria.

- **1977** Pele's New York Cosmos defeated the Seattle Sounders, 2-1, in Soccer Bowl '77 in front of a record 35,548 fans.
- **1980** Portland State quarterback Neil Lomax threw for seven firstquarter touchdowns in a 105-0 win over Delaware State.
- **1981** The stadium underwent a significant renovation, including the addition of a laminated, wood-beamed roof, rare in today's construction world because of the inflated cost of timber.
- **1985** The USFL's Portland Breakers played one season at Civic Stadium.
- **1991** Rodney McCray crashed through the "Flav-R-Pac" outfield sign chasing a fly ball, earning him blooper immortality.
- **2000** The stadium underwent its largest renovation as more than 750 tons of steel were added to the facility as part of substantial seismic upgrades to the park to bring minor league soccer and Triple-A baseball back to Portland.
- **2010** Foundation work began on converting the stadium into a soccerspecific facility in preparation for the Portland Timbers' first season in MLS in 2011.

This program, through the support of community-minded organizations and individuals, provides Timbers game tickets free-of-charge to those organizations that may benefit from them.

Schoolhouse Supplies Tools for Schools

Supporting education and decreasing the achievement gap for students in the Portland area are of great importance to the Portland Timbers. Through Schoolhouse Supplies and the Tools for Schools program, the Timbers have adopted Jason Lee Elementary School for the past seven years, providing backpacks filled with school supplies to more than 600 children enrolled at the school every year.

Thompson

SCOT THOMPSON serves as the Timbers Community Ambassador, a role he was appointed Jan. 19, 2011. He retired in 2010 after an eight year playing career, including seven seasons with the Timbers from 2004-10 in United Soccer Leagues. Thompson began his career in 2003, being selected by the LA Galaxy in the 2003 MLS SuperDraft. He first joined the Timbers in 2004 on loan and would go on to finish his career in Portland, becoming the club's career leader in games and minutes played during its USL era. The UCLA grad was a named No. 17 on USL's list of the Top 25 Players from the USL First Division in the 2000s and was a two-time all-league defender throughout his career. Thompson became a fan-favorite and was involved heavily with the team's community outreach efforts, earning the club's Community Player of the Year in 2010. Currently, Thompson is the director of operations for youth club BSC PORTLAND and the head coach of women's soccer at Oregon Episcopal School, coaching the team to the 2011 3A/2A/1A state championship. He and his wife, Meredith, live in Beaverton and have a son.



Bain

JOHN BAIN played five seasons with the Portland Timbers (1978-82) in the original North American Soccer League. He recorded 45 goals and 55 assists during his time with the club, becoming the Timbers career leader in scoring, goals and assists during their NASL era. For his on-field achievements, Bain was inducted into the Timbers Ring of Honor in 2011. Bain began his 20-plus-year playing career in 1972, with England's Bristol city and played most of his final 14 seasons indoors, with both the NASL indoor league and the Major Indoor Soccer League. He also served as a player/coach for the Timbers for two seasons (1989-90) during the club's brief stint in the American Professional Soccer League (APSL). He served as the head coach of professional indoor soccer club the Portland Pride of the CISL from 1993-96. As a youth coach, Bain led Mountain View High School to Washington state championships in back-to-back seasons in 1991 and 1992. Bain is currently the director of soccer operations for youth club Westside Metros and has coached at the club for over 10 years. Bain resides in Portland with wife, Shannon, and has four sons.

Brazeau

JIM BRAZEAU served as the goalkeeper coach for a total of eight seasons (2001-05; 2007-09) for the Timbers, while the club was a member of United Soccer Leagues. In addition to coaching for the Timbers, Brazeau has been at the helm of Pacific University's men's soccer program since 2000 and won the Northwest Conference title in 2010. His coaching career also includes time with Pacific University's women's soccer (2002-05), Oregon State University, Portland Community College and Jesuit High School. Brazeau played collegiately under former Timbers player and coach Jimmy Conway at Pacific University as a defender. He then followed Conway to help start the soccer program at Oregon State, where he played as a goalkeeper. His professional career spanned six seasons, playing for the Seattle Storm and indoor clubs the Washington Warthogs and Portland Pride of the CISL. Brazeau recorded the first shutout in CISL history. A Northwest native, Brazeau currently serves as the director of coaching at Willamette United Soccer Club. He and his wife, Wendy, have two children and reside in Portland.

BERNIE FAGAN was a defender for the Timbers for three seasons (1980-82) in the original North American Soccer League. His professional playing career spanned 16 years, including 10 years in England, where he won the FA Youth Cup with the U-18 side for club Sunderland AFC. Moving to the United States, Fagan had stints in the NASL with the Timbers, Seattle Sounders and Los Angeles Aztecs. He is currently in his 23rd year as the men's soccer head coach at Warner Pacific College (1982-91, 1997-present) and coached previously the women's soccer program at Portland State University from 1994-97. Fagan is the founder and head coach of Oregon Soccer Academy, a successful youth soccer club. He is also the director of the Bernie Fagan Soccer Camps, which began in 1993. He co-directed the Fred Meyer Soccer Camps with the late Clive Charles, a Timbers legend, from 1984-92. Fagan was the longtime director for Special Olympics Soccer USA from 1991-2004.

MICK HOBAN played four seasons with the NASL Portland Timbers (1975-78) and was the first contracted player in Timbers history. During his time with the club, he also served as its community relations manager. Hoban began his career as a defender with Aston Villa in 1970 and played eight seasons in the NASL for Atlanta, Denver and the Timbers. In 1973, Hoban gained his lone cap for the USMNT. After retiring in 1978, Hoban was hired by Blue Ribbon Sports, and started Nike soccer business. Hoban was the VP of Soccer Promotions at Umbro USA from 1988-95, and in 2000 helped form soccer consulting firm Soccer Solutions, LLC, with former Bayern Munich, Inter Milan star, and current U.S. Men's National Team coach Jürgen Klinsmann. Hoban now runs his own independent soccer marketing firm. He has also coached at the club level (Lake Oswego), as a member of the OYSA staff and served as a volunteer assistant coach at the University of Portland. Hoban has been strongly involved with volunteerism, lending his efforts to Special Olympics Oregon, the Alzheimer's Association of Oregon, Dynasty House, Harper's Playground, and the NSCAA. Mick and his wife, Linda, have two children and reside in Portland.



Morrison

LEE MORRISON played five seasons as a defender with the Timbers (2003-07) during their time in United Soccer Leagues. During his playing career, Morrison played in 113 games for Portland, which ranks among the club's career leaders during its USL era. His career included time in MLS with then-called Dallas Burn and Kansas City Wizards. A three-time All-American at Stanford University, Morrison graduated with a Bachelor's degree in international relations and was a first-round pick in the 2002 MLS SuperDraft by Dallas. Morrison has a wealth of international experience at the youth national team level as a member of the U.S. U-20 National Team and a captain on the U.S. U-18 National Team. Morrison lives in Portland, where he has been coaching with BSC PORTLAND for the past six years. He currently works in commercial real estate for Cushman & Wakefield.

TIMBER JOEY

Embedded in long-standing tradition, the Timbers feature a unique mascot. Free of costume, big feet or cartoon-like gimmicks, the Timbers' mascot is a true outdoorsman. With his chainsaw in tow, Joey Webber, known by fans as "Timber Joey," helps create a one-of-kind atmosphere at JELD-WEN Field.

The tradition of having an authentic lumberman as the club's mascot began in the 1970s when the Timbers competed in the North American Soccer League. Leading the way was Timber Jim (Jim Serrill), who created and continued several fan-favorite traditions during his 12 seasons as the club's mascot and icon (1978-82; 2001-07). Timber Jim captured the hearts of fans, hanging from rafters and light poles with his revved up chainsaw in hand.

Following Serrill's retirement in January of 2008, Webber has since carried on the club's match-day traditions and possesses an inspirational charisma, which can bring the crowd to its feet with a quick rev of the chainsaw. A beloved Timbers match-day tradition is the sawing of a slab off a log following every Timbers goal and presenting the slice to the goalscorer in a post-match ritual.

Webber was born and raised in the timber town of Philomath, Ore., where he attended the School of Forestry as a youth. He competed in state forestry and timber competitions and ranked in several events, including pole climbing, jack double bucking, axe throwing and log rolling. Growing up, Webber was also a competitive rugby player and was a member of the U.S. National Rugby Team's U-19 pool for two years. He also competed as a bare-back bronco rider in the Northwest Professional Rodeo Association and the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association.

When not in his trademark silver hard hat or Timbers suspenders, he operates his own construction company that specializes in concrete finishing and also serves as the security manager at a local restaurant.

HISTORY OF THE PORTLAND TIMBERS

PORTLAND TIMBERS - NORTH AMERICAN SOCCER LEAGUE (1975-82)

The world's game of soccer formally took ground in the city of Portland in the 1970s with the inception of a professional franchise in the Portland Timbers.

The Timbers' history begins in the spring of 1975, as an expansion club in the original North America Soccer League (NASL). The club's inaugural season in the NASL featured home crowds in excess of 20,000 fans and a surprising run that led the Timbers to Soccer Bowl '75, playing for the NASL title. The successes of that first season inspired a highly supportive and passionate fan base which has inspired a love for the game for generations of soccer fans, helping Portland earn the moniker "Soccer City USA."

As a member of the NASL, the Timbers entertained fans against some of the era's greatest players, including Pelé and Franz Beckenbauer. In fact, Pelé officially played his last professional soccer match in Portland at Civic Stadium at the end of the 1977 season. In just its third season as the home venue for Soccer City USA, Civic Stadium played host to Soccer Bowl '77 between Pelé's New York Cosmos and the Seattle Sounders on Aug. 28, 1977. At the time, the 35,548 on hand for the title match was the largest crowd to attend a Soccer Bowl.

The days of the NASL marked not only the beginning of the Timbers, but fostered what has become an iconic figure in the club's history. Jim Serrill, an actual lumberman by trade, volunteered to become the team's mascot in 1978. As "Timber Jim," he would establish himself in Portland's soccer lore with his charismatic charm and high-flying stunts, in which he dangled from the stadium rafters and climbed towering poles with his revved chainsaw in hand. Through the end of the Timbers' NASL tenure, he originated many fan-favorite traditions, including the sawing of a log slab after each goal scored by the Timbers.

Like many other NASL clubs at the time, the Timbers were stocked with European players. Midfielder John Bain, from Scotland, was the NASL Timbers' all-time leading scorer with 45 goals and 55 assists during his five seasons with the club. Several of the Timbers' standouts from this era had ties to the United Kingdom, including Manchester United product Willie Anderson, former Manchester City midfielder Jimmy Conway and head coach Vic Crowe, who managed England's Aston Villa and the Wales National Team prior to his time in Portland.

The original Timbers produced just two more playoff seasons (1978, 1981) following their appearance in the '75 Soccer Bowl. But, while a part of the NASL, Portland became home for several beloved Timbers players: Clive Charles, Mick Hoban, Bernie Fagan, Conway and Bain, who, following their playing careers, would help grow and develop the game of soccer in Oregon, first-hand.

The Timbers' last season in the NASL was in 1982, and just two years later, the league halted operations.

HISTORY OF THE PORTLAND TIMBERS

F.C. PORTLAND/PORTLAND TIMBERS (1985-90)

In the absence of the NASL, a number of smaller, more regional leagues filled the void for soccer fans across the United States. And in Portland, it was no different.

Unlike its NASL predecessors stocked with European imports, F.C. Portland first took the field in 1985 with a roster comprised primarily of local talent as one of four charter members of the Western Soccer Alliance Challenge Series. The 1985 season featured a seven-game season against the San Jose Earthquakes, F.C. Seattle and Victoria Riptides.

While F.C. Portland struggled on the field, the team's ability to showcase local players was one of its main successes during its six years of existence. F.C. Portland consistently featured some of the top performers, starting with Northwest native Brent Goulet.

After leading the Western Soccer Alliance in scoring the season prior, Goulet was crowned the six-team league's MVP in 1987 while attending Portland-based Warner Pacific College. The two-time all-league forward would go on to a professional career in Europe and would play for the U.S. National Team. He was the first of many local players for whom F.C. Portland would help launch playing careers.

Under new ownership of local businessman Art Dixon, F.C. Portland was renamed the Portland Timbers prior to the 1989 Western Soccer League season. With former NASL Timbers player John Bain at the helm as the team's player/manager, the Timbers posted an 11-5 record and reached the conference semifinals.

The Timbers would reap the benefit of the rise of the college soccer program at the University of Portland, and featured two UP standouts that 1989 season – goalkeeper Kasey Keller and forward Scott Benedetti. Keller, who would eventually star with the U.S. National Team, captured the Western Soccer League's MVP and Goalkeeper of the Year awards, while Benedetti, who won the league's scoring title in 1988, was named to the WSL All-League First Team.

Despite repeat all-league efforts from Bain and Gresham, Ore., native Benedetti in 1990, the Timbers finished their final WSL season with a record of 10-10. Following the season, the WSL merged with the American Soccer League, and as a result of the new enterprise, over half of its teams would close their doors prior to the 1991 campaign, including the Timbers.

HISTORY OF THE LOG SLAB TRADITION

"No, you can't bring chainsaws in to the stands. Are you crazy?" That's what former Timbers general manager Keith Williams said to Jim Serrill back in the late 1970s. At the time, little did Williams know that Serrill would become the team's long-time icon as "Timber Jim" and that his saw would establish a unique and beloved Timbers tradition – the cutting of the "log slab." After each goal scored by the Timbers at home, a slice is cut from the victory log behind the north goal and celebrated in a cloud of sawdust and cheered by the roar of a chainsaw and thousands of voices. The log slab is then paraded through the stands, and ultimately, presented to its rightful owner – the goal scorer – in a post-game ceremony. This time-honored tradition has helped make Timbers matches at JELD-WEN Field a one-of-a-kind soccer experience in the United States. Over the years, the players have changed, the uniforms have changed, and even the mascot has changed, but the tradition of cutting the log slab after each Timbers goal lives on, and the spirit of the "log slab" will continue to inspire Timbers fans for years to come.



HISTORY OF THE PORTLAND TIMBERS

PORTLAND TIMBERS - UNITED SOCCER LEAGUES (2001-10)

Almost 20 years after the final NASL season, a new era of Timbers soccer was born in 2001. As a member of United Soccer Leagues, the Timbers re-captured the hearts of Soccer City USA while competing in U.S. soccer's second division. With the USL Timbers, full-fledged professional soccer returned to the same ground where it started in the Rose City – a renovated Civic Stadium building named PGE Park.

With the re-emergence of the Timbers, Timber Jim made his return pitch-side. And along with Serrill came the same game-day events, stunts and traditions that fans loved from the NASL era, including the sawing of the log slab. Serrill would continue as the team's icon for its first seven years in USL.

Reaching the playoffs in each of their first two seasons in USL's A-League, the Timbers quickly established themselves among the league's elite clubs. In 10 seasons as a USL franchise, the Timbers produced eight winning seasons and made seven postseason appearances. It was an attention-grabbing season in 2004, in which the Timbers won the A-League regular-season championship and dominated league honors, paving the way for the club's success on the field and its rise in popularity.

A club rooted in history and tradition, the Timbers paid tribute to the late Clive Charles at a home game on Aug. 29, 2003. The legendary defender and Portland soccer pioneer had his No. 3 retired during a halftime ceremony that featured friends, teammates and colleagues of the Timbers great, who starred for the club's NASL franchise from 1978-81. Coincidently, the Timbers defeated the El Paso Patriots that same night, 3-0.

After 12 total seasons (1978-82; 2001-07) as the team mascot and icon, Timber Jim announced his retirement in early 2008. Serrill officially passed the chainsaw off to Joey Webber in an official induction ceremony during halftime of an exhibition game between the Timbers and Juventus Primavera on June 14, 2008. Webber has since carried on the club's match-day traditions and possesses an inspirational charisma, which can bring the crowd to its feet with a quick rev of his chainsaw.

In 2009, the Timbers turned in one of the best seasons in the history of the USL First Division (previously called the A-League). On their way to winning the USL First Division Commissioner's Cup as the regular-season champion that season, the Timbers assembled a record-setting, 24-game unbeaten streak (14-0-10). The Timbers' unbeaten streak of 2009 shattered the league's previous mark of 15 games set in 2005. The club's run also ranks among the longest unbeaten streaks in professional U.S. soccer history.

With a passionate and loyal supporters group in the Timbers Army, the Timbers' attendance at PGE Park more than doubled from 2004 to their final second-division season in 2010. With a Major League Soccer expansion franchise on the horizon, the Timbers drew 155,006 total regular-season fans in 2010, which was more than in any other season in the USL era. The Timbers welcomed their one millionth fan in their 10-year span as a second-division club during their 2010 regular-season home finale on Sept. 2, 2010 – a celebratory night and a fitting end to a memorable era for many in Soccer City USA.

TIMBERS ACADEMY & PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Rooted in the club's deep history, the Portland Timbers have a passion for developing both youth players and the sport of soccer in the region. Through partnerships established with Oregon Youth Soccer Association (OYSA) and Oregon's Olympic Development Program (ODP), the Timbers are building a comprehensive vertical development structure, which will allow players within the club's development territory a direct path from the youth levels to the top level of professional soccer in North America - Major League Soccer.

The Timbers Academy and the club's youth development programs are overseen by directors Mike Smith and Adam Smith as well as manager Erik Lyslo.

PORTLAND TIMBERS ACADEMY

The Timbers and OYSA have developed a new integrated and innovative youth development program, which serves as the foundation of Oregon's ODP and the MLS club's youth academy system. The program provides elite youth players advanced training and competitive opportunities throughout Oregon and Southwest Washington.

The collaborative partnership between the Timbers and OYSA provides Oregon with a nationally recognized boy's ODP program and a top-flight academy system to develop home-grown talent. The new program is designed to coexist with youth clubs and share in player development, allowing players to stay connected to their local clubs.

The Timbers Academy will commence in the fall of 2012, with teams competing in the U-16 and U-18 age brackets of the U.S. Soccer Development Academy. Timbers Academy teams will compete in the Northwest Division against other elite youth teams in the region, including academy teams from MLS clubs Seattle Sounders FC and Vancouver Whitecaps FC. The teams will also be a part of the annual Generation adidas Cup, facing off against academy teams from across MLS. Led by club-endorsed coaches, the Timbers Academy system will also offer youth players direct exposure to U.S. National Team coaches.

Additionally, the Timbers have future plans to form an elite girls division as part of the Oregon's ODP program and the club's academy structure.

TIMBERS REGIONAL TRAINING CENTERS

One of the major components of the Timbers development structure and the ODP program is the establishment of six Regional Training Centers throughout Oregon and Southwest Washington. The Regional Training Centers are organized and managed in partnership by the Timbers and OYSA, and located in the cities of Beaverton, Bend, Eugene/Salem, Gresham, Medford and Vancouver, Wash. Each Regional Training Center features a staff of clubendorsed coaches.

Under the Timbers-OYSA partnership, the Regional Training Centers were formed in the fall of 2011 and each center is designed to identify elite boy players in the U-12 to U-14 age groups in its designated area. From these training centers, a pool of players is chosen to form state ODP teams at various age levels for regional and national competitions.

adidas TIMBERS ALLIANCE

At the foundation of the development structure, the Timbers have formed the adidas Timbers Alliance, a strategic partnership with elite local youth clubs in the Timbers' development territory, designed to build unique working relationships and development opportunities to help channel the top youth players towards the Timbers' development programs and the Timbers Academy. The adidas Timbers Alliance includes three youth clubs in the Portland-metro area - the Eastside Timbers (formerly Eastside United FC), Vancouver United Timbers (formerly Columbia Timbers) and Westside Timbers (formerly Westside Metros).

As part of the alliance, the Major League Soccer club will share coaching resources and curriculum with alliance clubs in the development of both boys and girls youth players. Additionally, youth clubs in the alliance will be allowed the unique privilege of incorporating the Timbers brand into their club name and wear a special adidas Timbers Alliance badge as part of the uniform.

TIMBERS ACADEMY & PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

PORTLAND TIMBERS U-23s

The pinnacle of the Timbers Academy system is the club's top development team, the Portland Timbers U-23s, which competes in United Soccer Leagues' Premier Development League (PDL) – the top U-23 league in North America and consists of both professional and amateur teams.

Founded Nov. 11, 2008, the Timbers U-23s is an amateur team, which consists of standout players from college and youth programs throughout Oregon and across the country. Right from the beginning, the Timbers U-23s have been a contender in the PDL's Northwest Division, posting winning seasons and reaching the playoffs in each of their first two seasons in the league. In 2010, the Timbers U-23s assembled a historic season, recording a perfect 20-0-0 record through the regular season and postseason on their way to becoming the first undefeated champion in PDL history.

The Timbers U-23s have helped produced four first-team players in midfielder Freddie Braun, goalkeeper Jake Gleeson, defender Ryan Kawulok and forward Brent Richards. From Camas, Wash., Richards became the MLS Timbers' first Homegrown Player in 2012.

The Timbers U-23s are led by head coach Jim Rilatt, the 2010 PDL Coach of the Year. Rilatt has served as the team's head coach since its inaugural season in 2009.

In just their second season, the Timbers U-23s posted a perfect 20-0-0 record during the regular season and playoffs en route to winning the 2010 PDL Championship and becoming the first undefeated champion in league history.



BROADCAST INFORMATION

In 2012, the Timbers once again will have all 34 MLS regular-season matches broadcast live on both television and radio.

The Timbers will have 12 nationally televised matches in 2012, highlighted by the club's Sept. 15 matchup against rival Seattle at JELD-WEN Field broadcast live on NBC. Additionally, the Timbers play three matches on ESPN/ESPN2, six on the new NBC Sports Network and two on Galavisión (Spanish).

The remaining 22 matches will be broadcast across the Timbers' television partners *ROOT SPORTS*, KPTV and sister station KPDX; all games will be broadcast in high definition.

In February, the the club formed the Portland Timbers Television Network, which will afford supporters in the three addition Oregon markets the opportunity to watch all 34 regular-season matches. The Timbers are partnering with NTVZ/Central Oregon's CW in Bend, KEVU/MyNetworkTV in Eugene, and KFBI/My 48 in Medford to air the club's local package of live matches that originate on KPTV/Fox 12 in Portland.

Over the air, Sportsradio 750 AM The Game continues to be the Timbers' English flagship station. The club's Spanish-language broadcasts will air locally on La Pantera 940 AM and simulcast on KSND 95.1 FM, reaching fans from SW Washington to Eugene.

Again in 2012, select matches will air in Spanish on EstrellaTV, with simulcast audio from La Pantera 940 AM.

In addition to match broadcasts, 750 AM The Game is the home of the Timbers' weekly radio show, "Talk Timbers." Hosted by Timbers broadcaster and on-air personality, John Strong, "Talk Timbers" features interviews with coaches, players and team representatives and covers the latest club and league news.

BROADCASTERS



JOHN STRONG - PLAY-BY-PLAY BROADCASTER

Strong, a life-long Portland resident, returns for another season as the Timbers' playby-play broadcaster, his seventh as a member of the club's broadcast team. An on-air personality at Portland's Sportsradio 750 The Game, Strong is the host of the weekday show "Strong at Night" and has hosted "Talk Timbers," the team's weekly show, since its debut in 2009. Strong is also the update anchor and sidekick to host John Canzano on "The Bald Faced Truth" - the top-rated radio talk show in Oregon. He began his broadcast career as a student at Lake Oswego High School in 2002, and at the University of Oregon was the voice of the Ducks' women's soccer, women's lacrosse and softball teams. In all, Strong's play-by-play experience stretches across six different sports, including football, basketball and hockey. In January, Strong married wife, Nicole, who was a former All-Pac-10 soccer player at Washington State University. Fans can follow Strong on Twitter at @StrongMLS.

ROBBIE EARLE - TV ANALYST

Earle, a standout in the English Premier League and a Jamaican international during his playing career, enters his second season as an analyst on the Timbers broadcast team in 2012. Since he retired from playing in 2000, Earle has established himself as a versatile sports journalist working in print, radio, television and digital media. Earle has previously worked for ITV, the London Evening Standard, and numerous other major UK outlets. Aside from Timbers broadcasts, Earle also does soccer commentary and reporting for ESPN. Earle played in more than 600 league games and scored approximately 150 goals with Port Vale (1982-1991) and Wimbledon (1991-2000) during his playing days. Earle was born in England, but his heritage allowed him to play for the Jamaica National Team (1997-2000), which he captained for two years. He earned 33 caps and scored eight goals during his international career, including Jamaica's first goal in the FIFA World Cup in 1998.



FERNANDO SOBREVILLA - SPANISH PLAY-BY-PLAY BROADCASTER

Sobrevilla returns for a second straight season, and his third overall, as the Timbers' Spanish broadcaster in 2012. He was previously the Spanish voice of the Timbers in 2008, calling all 15 regular-season home matches that season when the club was a member of United Soccer Leagues. Sobrevilla, born in Peru, is a veteran in the radio industry and has worked in the Hispanic radio and TV industry for over five years. Sobrevilla lives in Portland with his wife, Anna, and plays Futsal in his free time.





ABOUT PORTLAND



Known as "The City of Roses," among other nicknames, Portland is the largest city in Oregon and the secondlargest in the Pacific Northwest. Located just 70 miles from the Pacific Ocean, Portland sits at the convergence of the Willamette (pronounced will-LAM-et) and Columbia Rivers. With more than 30 independently run breweries within city limits, including the renowned Widmer Brothers Brewery (the home of America's Original Hefeweizen), the next pint is rarely more than a block away.
