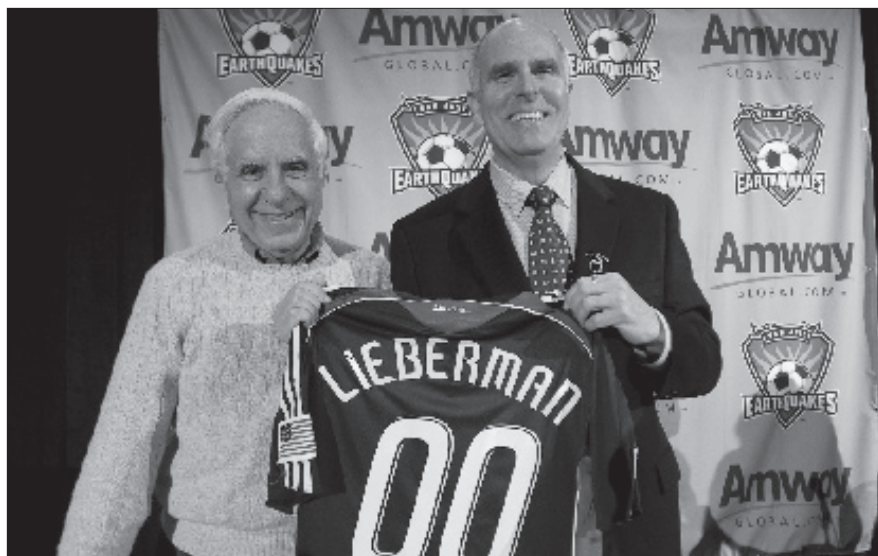

The San Jose Earthquakes and Amway Global announced a three-year partnership agreement on January 27 that will include Amway Global's name on the front of the Earthquakes jerseys beginning in 2009. 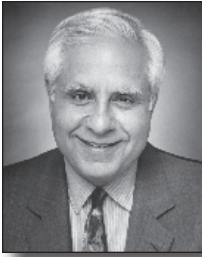

Lew Wolff
Investor-Operator



Lew Wolff is co-owner of the San Jose Earthquakes after exercising his exclusive option to bring the team back to the Bay Area on July 18, 2007. Wolff's entry into MLS came after a trip to the 2006 World Cup in Germany with his colleague, current Earthquakes President, Michael Crowley.

Wolff oversaw one of the top expansion seasons in MLS history last season in San Jose. He made four-million dollars of renovations to Buck Shaw Stadium at Santa Clara University, helping create one of the best and most intimate atmospheres in MLS. The newly improved Buck Shaw Stadium has a top quality grass game field and a turf practice field, a new state-of-the-art scoreboard and video screen. The upgraded facility also has a new Earthquakes locker room, new bleacher structure and brand new lighting system.

For over two years prior to the team's return, Wolff was instrumental in laying the groundwork for the return of the Earthquakes as an expansion franchise with its records, colors, and trophies intact. He has worked tirelessly over the last few years to find a stadium solution that will work for the team, its fans, and the community. Wolff is responsible for heading a proposal to build a state-of-the-art soccer stadium in San Jose with no public funding.

In October of 2008, Wolff was a key piece in the establishment of a strategic partnership with the English Premier League's Tottenham Hotspur Football Club. With the objective of creating a long-term bond between the two clubs, the partnership will primarily focus on both soccer and commercial development by exchanging and implementing the best practices from both organizations. The two clubs will also collaborate on community and charitable endeavors.

In September, the Silicon Valley Leadership Group presented Wolff with its prestigious "Community Cornerstone Award." The award is given to "a Silicon Valley leader who has displayed a lifetime of impeccable ethics, business achievement and community engagement."

Besides co-owning the Earthquakes, Wolff has been the co-owner and managing partner for the Oakland A's baseball team since 2005. Wolff is the founder of Wolff Urban Development and co-founder of Maritz-Wolff, entities that are involved in the development, acquisition and management of a wide range of commercial, office, parking and hotel properties in a number of California cities including San Jose, Los Angeles, Pasadena and Burbank to name a few.

Wolff's ownership interests in representative hotels and resorts include properties such as The Carlyle in New York City; Four Season Hotels in Nevis, West Indies, Houston, Austin, Carlsbad; The Ritz-Carlton in St. Louis; Fairmont Hotels in San Jose, San Francisco, Santa Monica and New Orleans; Rosewood managed hotels including The Mansion in Dallas, Little Dix Bay, Virgin Gorda, Inn of the Avasazi, Sante Fe plus other brands such as Hilton and Marriott. In addition, Maritz Wolff has a 50 percent interest in the Dallas-based Rosewood Management Company, which owns and operates luxury hotels throughout the world.

Wolff began his career in real estate economics and appraisal in his hometown of St. Louis, Mo. before relocating to Los Angeles. In addition to his real estate analysis work, he also served as the president of the 20th Century Fox Realty & Development Company where he managed Fox's worldwide real estate activities.

Wolff is a former minority owner of the St. Louis Blues, the Golden State Warriors and the San Jose Missions, a now-defunct minor league baseball team. He owns a bachelor's degree in business administration from the University of Wisconsin in Madison, a master's degree in business administration from Washington University in St. Louis and is also a member of the American Institute of Real Estate Appraisers (MAI).

Wolff resides in the Westwood section of Los Angeles with his wife, Jeane. The Wolffs have three children and three grandchildren.

Mike Crowley
President



Entering his second season as President of the Earthquakes, Mike Crowley will continue to oversee all aspects of the business. He emphasizes the importance of building a team with local community ownership and has been actively involved in securing a soccer specific stadium for the Earthquakes.

Under Crowley's leadership, the Quakes had a very successful 2008 season, as the team posted the third highest average attendance in Quakes history and the highest number of season tickets sold in the league. With Crowley at the helm, Earthquakes also saw an increase in sponsorship as the Quakes signed a multi-million dollar sponsorship deal with Amway Global. Crowley oversaw the four-million dollar renovations made to Buck Shaw Stadium at Santa Clara University and greatly influenced the establishing of a strategic partnership with the English Premier League's Tottenham Hotspur Football Club.

On the team side, he played an important role in the hiring of General Manager of Soccer Operations John Doyle and head coach Frank Yallop.

Crowley also serves as president of the Oakland Athletics. The 2008 season marks Michael Crowley's eleventh year with the Athletics' organization and his tenth as president after being named to the position on September 28, 1998. His tenure is the second longest among those who have served in the same capacity since 1968. A limited partner in the Athletics ownership group, Crowley is responsible for the overall day-to-day functioning of the Athletics' organization both on the business and baseball sides of the operation, working directly with Managing Partner Lew Wolff.

After spending three years in the San Jose office of Price Waterhouse and nine years with I.C.I./Fuller O'Brien Paints, Crowley joined the Athletics organization in July 1997 as vice president and chief financial officer. Considered a key figure in the A's resurgence as one of baseball's premier franchises, Crowley has been committed to fielding a championship caliber team with homegrown talent. He works closely with General

Manager Billy Beane on key player decisions and issues relating to the baseball operations overall objectives and philosophies.

In 1999, Crowley and his wife, Kathy, played a key role in implementing the Oakland A's Breast Cancer Awareness Day, which has raised close to \$875,000 for cancer-related causes over the last eight years. Crowley currently serves on the Bay Area Board of Trustees of the Knowledge is Power Program (KIPP), which aims to create a respected, influential and nationwide family of schools that are successful in helping educationally underserved students develop the knowledge, skills and character to succeed in college and in the competitive world beyond. He also served on the board of top business executives and community leaders which attempted to land the 2012 Summer Olympic Games in the Bay Area.

A native Californian, Crowley graduated from the University of Notre Dame in 1985 with a degree in business administration with an emphasis in accounting. He earned his MBA from Duke's Fuqua School of Business in 1992. In November of 2002, Crowley was named one of Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal's 40 Under 40", honoring the nation's top sport executives under the age of 40. Crowley resides in Cupertino with his wife Kathy and their three children.



David Alioto
Executive Vice-President



Executive Vice President of the San Jose Earthquakes David Alioto enters his third year with the team looking to build on the tremendous success of 2008. Alioto was the first employee hired in 2006 after owner Lew Wolff purchased the option to bring a team back to San Jose and he has been involved in every major decision in the expansion club's history since the team's return.

Alioto oversees all aspects of the newly created Major League Soccer franchise including venue development, hiring of all staff, budget management and P&L responsibility. He is also responsible for executing the financial, operational and organizational plan. In addition, Alioto oversees all aspects of sales development including corporate sales, ticket sales and new revenue opportunities. He is in charge of advertising and branding of the Earthquakes franchise including launch of the team name, logos and colors and website.

In 2008 under Alioto's guidance, the Quakes enjoyed great success on the business-side of the team operations. He oversaw the third-best attendance in Quakes history, while the Quakes also had the highest number of season ticket holders in team history. Under Alioto the club saw a significant increase in sponsorship, finishing 2008 with over 28 partners. His vision played a key role in the team's first jersey sponsorship agreement, as the Earthquakes signed a multi-million dollar, three-year deal with Amway Global for the sponsorship of the Quakes jersey.

While focusing mainly on the business side of the operations, Alioto was also instrumental in bringing General Manager of Soccer Operations John Doyle and head coach Frank Yallop to the Earthquakes.

Alioto's efforts were also fundamental to the successful four-million dollar renovation of Buck Shaw Stadium at Santa Clara University. In October of 2008, Alioto helped establish a strategic partnership with the English Premier League's Tottenham Hotspur Football Club.

He not only focuses on MLS but has also played a major role promoting three successful international events at the Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum in the past three years. The Mexican National Team has played two matches in Oakland, while the Mexican Olympic team played the Australian Olympic team in Oakland on March 2, 2008. All three games sold over 45,000 tickets with two of the matches selling out the capacity of 47,416 seats. He also helped bring the SuperLiga game between Chivas and Atlante soccer game to Buck Shaw Stadium on July 19, 2008, which was also a sell-out.

Alioto joined the Earthquakes organization after serving 15 years with the Oakland Athletics as the Vice President of Sales and Marketing. There, he oversaw all areas of the A's marketing efforts including advertising, ticket sales, corporate sales, promotions, luxury suites, customer service, spring training sales and operations. He played an instrumental role in developing the team's nationally acclaimed "Baseball: A's Style" advertising campaign prior to the 2000 season. Over his tenure, attendance grew from 1.1 million to 2 million plus.

A native of Salinas, Alioto is a graduate of the University of San Francisco, where he earned a Bachelor of Arts degree. He resides in Walnut Creek with his wife Debby and two soccer-playing sons, Justin and Conner.

John Doyle

General Manager of Soccer Operations



After a successful first year with the team, John Doyle enters his second season with the club as General Manager of Soccer Operations. In his role, Doyle is responsible for all aspects of the club's soccer operations, including the coaching staff, the first team and the club's player development programs.

In his first season with the club, Doyle put together one of the top coaching staffs in the league by hiring head coach Frank Yallop, assistant coach Ian Russell, goalkeeper coach Jason Batty and technical advisor Ronnie Ekelund. Along with Yallop, Doyle put together the team's roster from scratch starting with the 2007 MLS Expansion Draft. He also acquired long-time MLS standouts, Joe Cannon and Nick Garcia in trades prior to the season.

After a slow start in 2008, Doyle showed his resourcefulness by overhauling the team's attack during the international transfer window in July, signing English midfielder Darren Huckerby and former AS Roma midfielder Francisco Lima and trading for midfielder Arturo Alvarez and forward Scott Sealy. Those moves jump-started the Quakes attack and helped them put together a nine-game unbeaten streak from July 12-Sept. 27, the longest unbeaten streak in the league in 2008 and the second longest ever by an expansion team. The team finished the year with more wins (8), points (33) and goals scored (32) than any expansion team this decade. Defensively, the team allowed only 38 goals, the fourth lowest total in the league.

Doyle has been a part of the San Jose MLS team every season since its inception, working in a number of capacities. He and Michael Emenalo were signed as the first players in club history on Dec. 7, 1995 when the team was known as the San Jose Clash. The Fremont, Calif. native played five illustrious seasons as the captain of the Clash/Earthquakes and until 2003 held the team records for games played (132) and minutes played (11,385). A two-time MLS All-Star (1996, 1997), Doyle scored 11 goals and dished out 15 assists in his career. He was the 1996 MLS Defender of the Year and named to the League's Best XI that year.

Following his retirement at the end of the 2000 season, Doyle served as the television analyst from 2001-03, alongside current play-by-play voice John Shrader. He

was then hired on Jan. 22, 2004 as the assistant coach for Dominic Kinnear. With Doyle as the assistant coach, the Quakes made two consecutive playoff appearances and in 2005 won the Supporter's Shield. The 2005 team became just the second team in league history to record over 60 points. In 2005, he was the inaugural member of the San Jose Earthquakes Hall of Fame.

Doyle has also spent the past 10 years as the Director of Coaching for Mustang Soccer, where he is responsible for the training and development of coaches who oversee over 5,000 children from the Danville, Alamo, Walnut Creek and San Ramon areas. Doyle helped develop the Under-15 and Under-16 Red Bull National League, which gives elite youth soccer players the opportunity to compete against the best clubs in their region and across the country.

In 2003, Doyle was appointed the Technical Director of U.S. Super Y League where his duties included the implementation of the ODP program and all Youth National team selections for boys and girls Under-14 to Under-19. He was elected to the U.S. Soccer Board of Directors in 2001 and was named to the U.S. Soccer Technical Committee the following year. He holds an "A" coaching license from the U.S. Soccer Federation.

The former University of San Francisco All-American enjoyed one of the most decorated playing careers in United States soccer history. Doyle first began training with U.S. national team in 1987 and was a member of the squad until 1994. He played in the 1988 Seoul Olympics and the 1990 World Cup in Italy, as well as the 1991 CONCACAF Gold Cup. Doyle made 53 appearances for the U.S., scoring three goals and registering two assists.

At the club level, Doyle helped the San Francisco Bay Blackhawks win the 1991 APSL Championship. After playing in Sweden and Germany, Doyle returned to the U.S. to play and was named the 1995 APSL Defender of the Year while with the Atlanta Ruckus.

Doyle grew up in nearby Fremont, Calif. and starred at Washington High School. Doyle currently resides in Pleasanton with his wife Kaarin and their two children Jay and Kate.



Frank Yallop
Head Coach



Frank Yallop enters the second year of his second stint as the head coach of the San Jose Earthquakes in 2009. He also coached the Quakes from 2001-03 before serving as the head coach of the Canadian men's national team from 2004-06 and the Los Angeles Galaxy from 2006-07.

Under Yallop's guidance the Quakes made a very successful return to MLS in 2008 as the top expansion team of the last decade. The Quakes had more wins (8) and points (33) scored more goals (32) and allowed fewer goals (38) than any expansion team since 1998. The team also posted a nine-game unbeaten streak from July 12-Sept. 27, which was the longest unbeaten streak in the league in 2008 and the second longest ever by an expansion team. Yallop was a finalist for MLS Coach of the Year for his efforts. At the conclusion of the season, he was invited to coach MLS' Generation adidas team for a week of games in London.

The former Ipswich Town player and Canadian National team coach played an instrumental part in acquiring all of the players on the current roster, including 2008 MLS Newcomer of the Year Darren Huckerby and long-time Quake Ramiro Corrales, among others.

During his previous three seasons as head coach of the Earthquakes, Yallop won two MLS Cup Championships while posting a 41-25-18 record, which was the best mark in MLS during that stretch. Yallop was also named MLS Coach of the Year in 2001 after taking over a team that posted a league-worst 7-17-8 record in 2000 and leading them to the MLS Cup Championship in 2001. The former Canadian international defender is still the club's all-time leader in wins in club history (49). Yallop also coached the MLS All-Stars to a 3-2 win over the United States National Team in 2002.

Under Yallop during that stretch the Quakes broke numerous club records, including fewest goals allowed in a season (29) and most consecutive wins at home (12). Many players flourished under Yallop's tutelage, as the Quakes had 13 players named to the All-Star team in Yallop's three seasons and had five members selected

to the MLS Best XI team. Seven Earthquakes players also earned their first call-up to the senior men's national team for training camps during Yallop's first three seasons in San Jose.

Yallop began his coaching career in 1999 with the U.S. Project 40 team. He was an assistant coach to Tim Hankinson for the Tampa Bay Mutiny in 1999 and then he went to work with D.C. United in 2000 as the top assistant to then head coach Thomas Rongen.

Before he began his coaching career, Yallop spent almost 20 years playing in England and the United States as a tough defender. He signed his first professional contract at the age of 16 with Ipswich Town FC in England and in 1992 helped the team win the English First Division. He was twice named the team's most valuable player and Yallop scored game-winning goals in back-to-back games in 1993 to lead Ipswich to Premiership victories over Tottenham Hotspur and legendary side Manchester United.

He also played in MLS as a top defender for the Tampa Bay Mutiny from 1996 to 1998, where he earned the Mutiny's Defender of the Year award in 1997 and 1998. In 1996 Yallop helped the Mutiny to a league-best regular season record of 20-12 and in 1998 he scored the only goal of his MLS career.

Yallop made five appearances for English Youth National Teams and later played 52 times for the Canadian National Team, due to a 1989 change in FIFA rules allowing players to represent different countries providing they had not signed a professional contract during the time of their first appearance. With the exception of suspended time, Yallop was selected by Canada to play in every international match he was available for from his debut until November 1997.

Yallop has a United States Soccer Federation "A" coaching license and a FA Preliminary Badge.

He and his wife, Karen, have two sons, Jack and Samuel.

Ian Russell
Assistant Coach



Ian Russell returns to the Earthquakes for his second season as one of the top young assistant coaches in Major League Soccer. He will continue to work closely with Yallop in the preparation of daily training sessions, while also helping to coordinate the Quakes international and collegiate scouting efforts.

During his first year with the club, Russell helped the team make a very successful return to MLS which included the team posting the best record for any expansion team since 1998 with eight wins, 33 points and 32 goals scored. The Quakes also posted a nine-game unbeaten streak from July 12-Sept. 27, which was the longest unbeaten streak in the league in 2008 and the second longest ever by an expansion team.

In the offseason, Russell successfully completed the U.S. Soccer Federation "A" coaching license course.

A native of Seattle, Wash., Russell spent six seasons playing for the San Jose Earthquakes and seven total years in MLS. After being drafted in 2000, Russell appeared in 131 games for the Quakes, good for fifth in team history. A lightning-quick midfielder, he scored five goals and notched 20 assists, helping the Quakes win two MLS Cups in 2001 and 2003. He is ninth all-time in Quakes history in assists and is tied for first in club history in playoff appearances with 14. His best season with San Jose came in 2001 when he scored three goals and notched nine assists, while starting all 26 regular season games and all six playoffs games.

Russell also played three games in 2007 with the Los Angeles Galaxy under Frank Yallop.

Prior to joining the Earthquakes, Russell played for the Seattle Sounders of the USL First Division in 1998 and in 1999, winning the offensive MVP in 1999. Russell attended the University of Washington on a soccer scholarship and was a three-time (1995-97) All-Mountain Pacific Sports Federation first team selection.

Russell trained with Stockport County FC, England, when the team was still in the First Division. He also

spent time playing for Lech Poznan of the Polish First Division.

Russell began coaching while playing for the Seattle Sounders and has continued coaching in the Bay Area, including running camps and directing training sessions for numerous youth teams in the South Bay.



Ronnie Ekelund
Technical Advisor



Ronnie Ekelund returns to the San Jose Earthquakes in 2009 for his second season as a technical advisor. The Glostrup, Denmark native will continue to play an integral role in the team's daily training sessions. His knowledge from a nearly 20-year career playing in top leagues around the world makes him a valuable asset to Frank Yallop's technical staff.

Ekelund spent four seasons as a player with the Earthquakes from 2001-04, helping San Jose capture two MLS Cup Championships with his sublime passing skills and leadership. He finished his MLS career with 11 goals and 16 assists in 91 games.

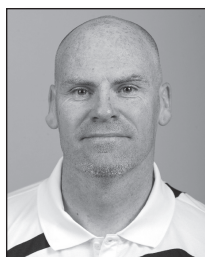
In 2001, he overcame a knee injury to play in 16 games in center midfield for the Quakes, as the team earned its first playoff berth since 1996. He then played in all six games to help San Jose capture its first championship. The following season, he scored six goals and registered eight assists and was named to the MLS Best XI team. His free kick goal against Columbus that season remains one of the top goals in team history.

In 2003, Ekelund scored a goal and recorded three assists, helping the Quakes post a team record 51 points on the way to the team's second MLS Cup title. Ekelund scored a goal in the 2003 MLS Cup Championship against the Fire.

Ekelund left the Quakes after the 2004 season and played one year with the California Cougars of the Major Indoor Soccer League. He was named an MISL All-Star for the 2005-06 season.

Prior to arriving in MLS, Ekelund enjoyed a long career in European soccer. He played for Brondby (Denmark), Barcelona (Spain), Southampton (England), Manchester City (England), Coventry City (England) and Odense (Denmark). Overall, he appeared in 135 games and scored 22 goals during his time in Europe after turning pro at age 15 with Brondby. Ekelund also played for Denmark at the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona.

He resides in Los Gatos with his wife Claire and daughters, Claudia and Ariana.



Jason Batty
Goalkeeper Coach



Jason Batty returns for his second season as the goalkeeper coach for the San Jose Earthquakes. The native of New Zealand came to the Earthquakes in 2008 after a number of years coaching youth and collegiate goalkeepers. He not only works day-to-day with the club's goalkeepers, but also plays a key role in opponent scouting.

Under Batty's tutelage in 2008, Joe Cannon had another outstanding season. Cannon ended the year as one of six players in MLS to play every minute of every game, recording a career-high 2,700 minutes. He led the league in saves with 124, ranked fifth in the league in goals against average with a 1.27 mark and finished fourth in

shutouts with nine, one behind the league leaders.

Prior to coming to the Quakes, Batty was the Director of Goalkeeping for Texas Premier SC, while serving as a coach for a number of soccer academies and camps. He previously served as an assistant coach and the goalkeeper coach for Dartmouth College.

As a player, he played professionally for 14 seasons in England, Singapore, New Zealand and the United States. He earned 55 caps for New Zealand's national team.

He and his wife, Jess, welcomed their first child, Ava, in 2008.

Bruce Morgan returns for his 14th season in MLS and his 12th as the San Jose Earthquakes head athletic trainer. Having spent the first ten seasons in San Jose (with the Clash/Earthquakes), Morgan is the only person who has been a part of every game (preseason, exhibition, regular season and postseason) in team history.

Morgan started his MLS career with the San Jose Clash in 1996 and was a fixture on the team until 2005 when the Earthquakes were relocated to Houston. Morgan joined the Houston Dynamo during the Earthquakes relocation to Houston in December 2005. He has been a part of four MLS Cup-winning teams, two with San Jose in 2001 and 2003 and two more with Houston in 2006 and 2007.

He returned to San Jose in 2008 to rejoin his former club. At the conclusion of the last season, Morgan assisted the training staff at the US National Training Camp held in Colorado in November.

A native of Northern California, Morgan earned his undergraduate degree from California State University Sacramento and his master's degree at the Univer-

sity of Arizona. As a member of the league's medical advisory panel (1996-2002), he assisted in the development of the policies and procedures manual which guides the practice of teams' medical staffs.

Prior to joining San Jose's staff in 1996, Morgan supervised a hospital-based out-reach athletic training program, served as a consultant to numerous youth athletic organizations in that capacity, including the North and Central Coast Sections of the California Interscholastic Federation and the California Youth Soccer Association (CYSA).

An avid reader, he has authored or co-authored articles appearing in a variety of publications, including the American Journal of Orthopedics, the Journal of Arthroscopy and the American Journal of Sports Medicine.

When not attending to the medical needs of the team, Morgan enjoys traveling and spent three weeks in the 2008 offseason traveling to Vietnam. He is also passionate about running, a passion which dates back over thirty years to his days spent as a member of his high school's cross country team.

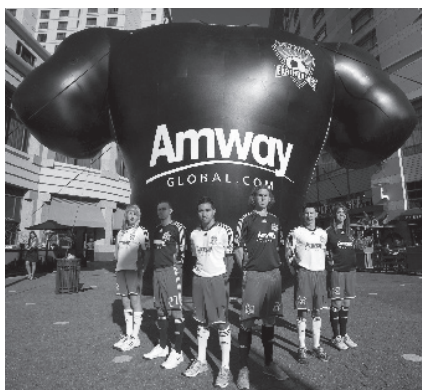

An athletic keeper, Cannon possesses great reflexes and reactions to frustrate opposing forwards. The Quakes defense starts with the former Santa Clara University star. With a knack for stopping one-on-one opportunities, he will again be counted on for a number of spectacular saves in 2009.

A good ball-winner, the Portland native scored a career-high two goals last season, including the dramatic game-winner against the Galaxy on Aug. 3. He is strong in the air, allowing him to command the defensive box and also pose a threat on all set pieces in the opponent's box. He should help the Quakes defense again rank among the league's best in 2009.

2008 SEASON NOTES

Best Expansion Team

The San Jose Earthquakes concluded the 2008 season with a 2-0 win over Toronto FC to cap the best season by an expansion team this decade. Including the San Jose Earthquakes, four expansion teams have entered the league since 2005. In 2005, Chivas USA and Real Salt Lake earned four and five wins, respectively, while Chivas picked up 18 points and RSL 20 points. In 2007, Toronto FC had six wins and 25 points for the entire season. The Earthquakes finished the year with the most wins (8) and points (33) for an expansion team this decade. They also scored more goals (32) and allowed fewer goals (38) than any of the four expansion teams this decade.

Huckerby Newcomer of the Year

After an outstanding first season with the San Jose Earthquakes, Major League Soccer announced that Quakes midfielder Darren Huckerby was named the 2008 MLS Newcomer of the Year. Huckerby joined the Earthquakes July 14 when the team acquired his rights from Toronto FC. The former Norwich City star immediately made an impact on the field scoring in his first two home matches. He scored six goals and notched four assists in 14 games with the Quakes and won the team's Most Valuable Player award. He also won the team's Budweiser Golden Boot award with his six goals. The native of Nottingham scored game-winning goals against the Kansas City Wizards on Aug. 30 and D.C. United on Sept. 6. After a strong month of September he was named Major League Soccer Player of the Month, scoring three goals and notching one assist in the month. In Huckerby's first eight matches with the team, the Quakes posted a 4-0-4 record, part of the Quakes league-high nine-game unbeaten streak.

Unbeaten in Nine

The Earthquakes posted the league's longest unbeaten streak this season and the second longest unbeaten run ever by an expansion team. The Chicago Fire had an 11-game unbeaten run as an expansion team in 1998. The streak was the third-longest unbeaten streak in team history. The team posted a 14-game unbeaten run from July 20-Oct. 15, 2005 and a 12-game unbeaten run from April 28-July 4, 2001.

Attendance Update

The San Jose Earthquakes posted one of their best years ever for attendance in 2008. The Quakes averaged 13,713 on the season in 2008. That total is the third-highest average attendance in team history. In 1996, the team averaged 17,232, and in 1999, the team averaged 14,959.

O'Brien Named Player of the Week

Quakes midfielder Ronnie O'Brien had a big night against the Revolution on Aug. 16. He scored two goals for San Jose and helped set up Ryan Johnson's second-half goal. He became the first Quakes player to score two goals in a game this season. For his efforts, he was named the MLS Player of the Week. He was the first Quakes player to earn the honor in 2008. He had not scored since April 19 when he netted the game-winner for the Quakes against Colorado. August 16 marked the first time in his MLS career that he scored two goals in a game.

Cannon Among the All-Time Leaders

Earthquakes goalkeeper Joe Cannon is among the all-time league leaders in Major League Soccer history in a number of goalkeeping categories. He ended the year third all-time in MLS in appearances (246), third in minutes (22,155), third all-time in saves (1026), second all-time in shutouts (65), fifth all-time in wins (92) and tied for seventh all-time in goals against average (1.30). For San Jose goalkeepers, Cannon is first in club history in appearances (131), first in minutes played (11,961), first in saves (558), first in wins (54), first in shutouts (35) and second in goals against average (1.26) and saves percentage (74.6). He also holds the team's all-time record for saves in a game with 12 on July 8, 2000 at Colorado.

Number 1000

Goalkeeper Joe Cannon became the fourth goalkeeper in MLS history to record 1,000 saves on Sept. 27. He made seven saves against Real Salt Lake. He now has 1,026 in his career.

Milestones

Ryan Cochrane played the 100th game in his MLS career against Real Salt Lake Sept. 27 ... Ramiro Corrales played his 200th career game in MLS versus Toronto FC Oct. 25 ... Jason Hernandez broke his career high for starts in a season with 28 by starting against Kansas City on October 18th. He had 24 in 2006 with Chivas USA.

A 4-0 loss to Real Salt Lake, in a driving Utah snowstorm, was enough to send the San Jose Earthquakes out of the 2008 Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup. Kyle Beckerman scored a pair of goals and Yura Movsisyan added a third as RSL had a 3-0 lead by halftime. Andy Williams rounded out the scoring with a late goal. The Quakes were under pressure early as RSL pushed forward from the opening whistle. San Jose continued to absorb the attacks from the home side, but a moment of concern came in the ninth minute. Ryan Cochrane and Jay Ayres collided in mid-air going up for a header. Both defenders fell instantly to the turf. After nearly five minutes on the ground both Cochrane and Ayres were helped up and walked off the field and to the Earthquakes locker room under their own power. Quakes manager Frank Yallop was forced into the two substitutions, bringing James Riley and Jason Hernandez. It wasn't until the 21st minute that Salt Lake beat Burpo. A corner kick taken by Williams found Matias Mantilla. The Argentinean dove to direct a weak header toward goal. The ball wasn't going to make it, so Beckerman rushed on and tapped the first goal of the game over a fallen Burpo. Twelve minutes later Beckerman skipped a turf-burning shot inside the near post for a 2-0 advantage. Within in the same minute RSL charged back down the field and Movsisyan slammed in a cross from Matias Cordoba, and RSL led 3-0. In the 65th minute, San Jose's Ned Grabavoy nodded a header just inches wide of the post. Shortly thereafter, play was stopped so that the white MLS game ball could be switched out for an orange ball as snow began blowing around Rice-Eccles Stadium. Andy Williams put a cap on the game as he poked RSL's fourth goal under a fallen Burpo in the 90th minute.

The San Jose Earthquakes showed little sign of their season-long offensive struggles beating the Honduras Olympic Team 4-0 in a friendly at Buck Shaw Stadium. Ned Grabavoy and Shea Salinas scored first-half goals for the Quakes, then Jovan Kirovski and Kei Kamara scored after the break as the Earthquakes eased to the win. San Jose took the lead in the 16th minute. A shot from the right wing by John Cunliffe was blocked by the defense, but the rebound fell to Grabavoy, who drilled it inside the right post from 25 yards out. In the 28th minute, a 30-yard blast from Salinas made it 2-0, San Jose, as he also beat Honduran goalkeeper Kevin Hernandez cleanly inside the right post. Like Grabavoy, it was Salinas' first goal of the year. The Earthquakes extended their lead in the 56th minute as Kirovski's looping header off a Matt Hatzke corner kick made it 3-0. It was yet another first goal of the season for a Quakes' player. In the 68th minute, after Honduran goalkeeper Kevin Hernandez saved a Kamara blast, Kirovski chased down the rebound near the end line and centered it for another shot by Kamara, who buried this chance from six yards out to make it 4-0.

The San Jose Earthquakes fell 2-1 to the Seattle Sounders at Buck Shaw Stadium in a friendly match. Jamil Roberts scored the lone goal for the Earthquakes. The Quakes went close again in the 16th minute, but Ryan Cochrane's header from a Jovan Kirovski corner kick was cleared off the line by the Sounders' Josh Gardner. San Jose was back on the attack, with Adam Smarte shooting just wide of goal in the 38th minute after Kelly Gray's long pass had found him in space. The Quakes finally broke through two minutes later on a Roberts header. Another long ball over the top saw goalkeeper Chris Eylander hesitate to come off his line, forcing Danny Jackson to concede a corner kick. San Jose took full advantage, as Roberts headed home Kirovski's pinpoint delivery at the near post. The second half began and it didn't take the Sounders long to draw level. In the 51st minute, former Quakes forward Roger Levesque's flick-on found Kenji Treschuk wide open in the box, and the Sounders' midfielder made no mistake, side-footing home from six yards. The Quakes nearly reclaimed the lead in the 61st minute when Shea Salinas' deft pass put Mikel Arce in alone on goal, but his shot shaved the outside of the post. Late in the game, San Jose hoped for some late heroics from their players, but it was Hugo Alcaraz-Cuellar who delivered the vital goal, firing home in the 85th minute from Sebastian Le Toux's centering feed.

On a night when the San Jose Earthquakes were intent on using their depth, their reserves delivered, defeating Club Deportivo FAS of El Salvador 2-1 at Buck Shaw Stadium. Mikel Arce and Jovan Kirovski scored in the first half, while Alejandro de la Cruz countered in the second half for the visitors. Amid some confusion, the Quakes went ahead against the run of play in the 25th minute. Davide Somma picked out Arce in the box, who backheeled the ball past FAS' keeper Jose Gonzalez. The play was initially judged to have been offside, but after consulting with his assistant, referee Edwin Jurisevic allowed the goal, and San Jose was ahead 1-0. The home side didn't have to wait much longer to add to their tally. Shea Salinas broke free down the right wing in the 42nd minute, and his inch-perfect cross was nodded home by Kirovski to make the score 2-0. Yallop brought on Michael Ghebru in place of Matt Hatzke to start the second half, and the German made his presence felt in the 49th minute, winning a penalty after a mistimed challenge from a FAS defender. Ghebru spurned the resulting spot kick however, smashing his attempt off the crossbar. The hour mark saw a flurry of substitutions with Michael Gustavson replacing Graczyk in the San Jose goal, while FAS brought on Hector Avalos, Carlos Aparicio and Jose Solis. The fresh legs saw FAS control possession, with most of the play going through the feisty de la Cruz, while San Jose were looking dangerous on the break. Yet it was the visitors who finally made a breakthrough in the 77th minute. Aparicio's free kick from the left wing found de la Cruz wide open in the box, and his glancing header left Gustavson with no chance.

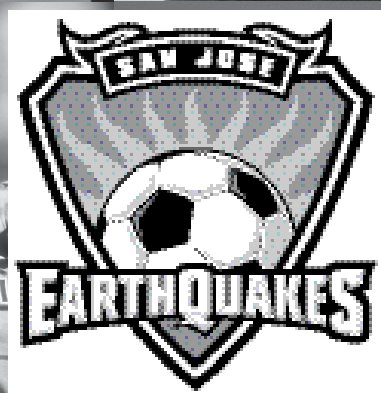
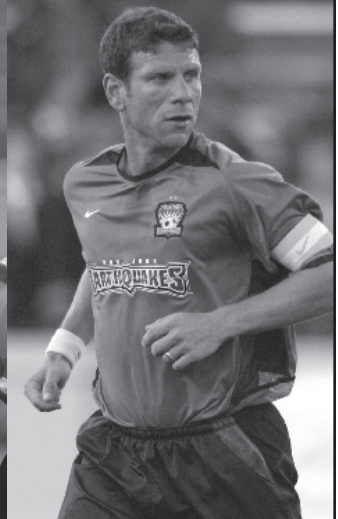

The Beginning (1994-1996)

The San Jose organization was established in 1994, when San Jose became a charter member of Major League Soccer on June 15. San Jose joined Boston, Columbus, Los Angeles, New York/New Jersey and Washington, D.C. as the first teams in MLS. Between November, 1994 and June 1995, Tampa Bay, Denver, Kansas City and Dallas were added as clubs and the San Jose team was assigned to the Western Conference.

The club began to take shape on August 1, 1995 when a Bay Area soccer icon, Peter Bridgwater, was named the President and general manager of the team. Bridgwater previously served as the owner and general manager of the North American Soccer League version of the San Jose Earthquakes, and was one of the founders of the Western Soccer Alliance in the mid-1980s. Bridgwater was also the Venue Executive Director for the San Francisco venue of World Cup 1994.

The San Jose MLS club began its history nicknamed the "Clash," a moniker it kept for four seasons before changing the name of the organization to "Earthquakes" prior to the 2000 season, embracing the name of the former NASL franchise that had been successful in the area throughout the 1970's and 1980's.

Laurie Calloway was named the first head coach in San Jose history December 7, 1995. Soon after, Calloway announced the first two members of the San Jose club: Bay Area native and U.S. National Team veteran John Doyle and Nigerian World Cup veteran Michael Emenalo.

1996: Excitement In San Jose

Throughout the early stages of 1996, San Jose remained busy attempting to field their first squad in the organization's history. The club received a huge boost when it was allocated U.S. National Team leading scorer Eric Wynalda on January 23, just one day after he became the all-time leading goal scorer in U.S. National Team history.

The team continued to take shape, as Paul Bravo was the club's first ever draft pick February 6 in the inaugural MLS Draft. Eleven days later, San Jose was involved in the first trade in league history, sending Rhett Harty and a first-round draft choice to the MetroStars for defender Troy Dayak.

Soon after the first draft, Calloway convened the team on the south campus of San Jose State University on March 1 for the club's first-ever training camp. San Jose was once again an integral part of the launching of MLS, hosting the MLS' Inaugural Game at Spartan Stadium before a crowd of 31,683 on April 6. The then-record crowd did not go away disappointed as San Jose won its first game on the first goal in MLS history courtesy of Wynalda, defeating D.C. United 1-0. One month later, the club made history again, as they hosted the Los Angeles Galaxy in a match that drew 31,728 fans to Spartan Stadium, setting the record for attendance at a sporting event in the city of San Jose.

San Jose went on to finish their first season with a 15-17 record and a tough three-game exit from the playoffs by the eventual MLS runners-up Los Angeles Galaxy. It was a season that saw the club host the one millionth fan to attend an MLS game and record the first



victory for an MLS team against an international opponent. The Clash defeated UNAM Pumas of the Mexican First Division 2-1 at Spartan Stadium June 12 to earn that distinction. Doyle went on to be recognized as the first MLS Defender of the Year after a stellar season, while also earning a spot on the MLS Best XI team. Missael Espinoza, a Mexican National Team standout, earned the Clash Budweiser MVP Award in that first season.

San Jose would continue with its international success, becoming the first MLS team to make a post-season international tour. The club split two games during a 13-day trip through China in late October and early November.

One player from the original team, Ramiro Corrales, remains with San Jose today. John Doyle, the first official member of the club, now serves as the Earthquakes general manager of soccer operations.

1997: A Star Emerges

San Jose finished the 1997 season with a 12-20 record and failed to make the playoffs. The Clash played through a mid-season coaching change that occurred when Brian Quinn replaced Calloway on June 25, 1997. At the time, the 37-year old Quinn became the youngest coach in MLS history and he finished the '97 campaign with a 7-10 record.

The 1997 team was led by first-year MLS player Ronald Cerritos. Cerritos would go on to become a fan favorite in San Jose, playing with the team for six seasons and becoming the club's all-time leading goal scorer. The Salvadoran set both an MLS and San Jose record with his 11-game point streak during the season, which helped him to be named to the MLS Best XI. Notable members of the '97 club were former head coach Dominic Kinnear and U.S. National Team star Eddie Lewis, then a second-year MLS midfielder. San

Jose also made its first appearance in the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup in 1997, defeating the Central Coast Roadrunners in their first match, before bowing out in the next round of the historic competition.

1998: Another Lean Season

The 1998 season was one of excitement tempered by frustration. Quinn led the team to a 13-19 record, good for 33 points in MLS. San Jose was forced to play the first three home games of the season at Stanford University after winter rains delayed the renovation on Spartan Stadium. When the club returned to Spartan, they faced the New England Revolution May 3, 1998 on a newly widened field that was 70 yards wide and 110 yards long.

Ronald Cerritos again led the team, putting in 13 goals to finish the season as the eighth leading goal-scorer in the league. During the 1998 season the pieces of the eventual 2001 MLS Cup Champions began to form at Spartan Stadium. Eventual 2002 MLS all-star Wade Barrett was drafted in the first round of the 1998 College Draft, and eventual 2002 MLS Goalkeeper of the Year Joe Cannon gained his first MLS experience. Cannon was called to the club from the A-League to serve as a back up for ten days before returning to soccer's minor leagues. Defender Richard Gough enjoyed an all-star season in 1998, as he was the only member of the team selected to play in the mid-season classic. The club was forced to play through May and June without forward Eric Wynalda, who was with the United States National Team at the World Cup in France. Wynalda appeared in two matches for the U.S. during the World Cup.

1999: The Kraft Era Begins

For the first three seasons of the League's history, the San Jose club had operated as a league-owned team. That arrangement changed November 18, 1998 when the Kraft Group Sports, the investor-operator of the New England Revolution and owner of the NFL's New England Patriots, took over operations of the team.



The change in ownership brought immediate change throughout the organization.

Kraft Group Sports assumed operation of the team January 4 and named Lynne Meterparel the general manager and Renato Capobianco as director of soccer. The 1999 season also marked the final year that the club would be known as the Clash, and the team retired the nickname by setting a club record for wins in a season with 19. Unfortunately, the team's 37 points saw them come up just short of a playoff spot for the third straight season.

However, the team did place three players in the All-Star game, as Cerritos, Lewis and defender Mauricio Wright were selected. Wright knocked in the game-winning goal in the mid-season classic off a Cerritos assist in the 84th minute. The 1999 season also saw Cerritos break his own goal-scoring record with 15 and Lewis establish a new high mark for assists, registering 14.

Lothar Osiander became the third head coach of the team when he took over for Quinn on September 16 with five games remaining in the season. Assistant coach Jorge Espinoza guided the team to two wins before Osiander, the former U.S. National Team coach, was able to join the team from coaching the MLS Project-40 team for the final three matches of the year.

Despite missing the post-season, San Jose continued building for the future. The 1999 season was the first season for four key members of the 2001 MLS Cup Championship squad. Midfielder Richard Mulrooney, defender Jimmy Conrad, goalkeeper Joe Cannon and midfielder Scott Bower all debuted over the course of the year, establishing the solid foundation of the club. Mulrooney was a finalist for the MLS Rookie of the Year award.

With precocious rookies arriving, San Jose parted ways with a piece of its past, loaning striker Eric Wynalda to Leon of the Mexican First Division for the early stages of the season and then sending him to the Miami Fusion via the MetroStars June 1 as part of the "future considerations" from an early season deal.

Ronald Cerritos again led the team in scoring and finished as the third leading scorer in MLS with 15 goals and 39 points. His bicycle kick assist to Alejandro Sequeira Sept. 4 also earned him the Nickelodeon Play of the Year. He was also named the MLS Player of the Month for September when he scored four goals and notched four assists as the team battled for a playoff spot. Solid midfielder Eddie Lewis was named to the MLS Best XI, becoming the third San Jose player ever to be so honored.

2000: Earthquakes Shake San Jose Again

The 2000 season marked the return of a soccer club with the Earthquakes nickname to the Bay Area. San Jose played its first season under the Earthquakes moniker, revamping the organization under the name of the NASL soccer team that had been so popular in the area in the 1970's and early 1980's.

The 2000 edition of the Quakes was not immediately able to rekindle the glory days of the club, missing out on the playoffs for a fourth straight year and finishing the season with a 7-17-8 record in the first season that MLS games finished as ties. The season began with

much promise after the allocation of Khodadad Azizi, a forward who played in the German Bundesliga and was the 1996 Asian Player of the Year. Azizi was selected to the All-Star team along with midfielder Dario Brose, but he managed to score just three goals in 20 games.

While Azizi and several new Quakes, including 2001 MLS Cup Champions Ian Russell and Jon Conway, were getting adjusted to the style of play under Osiander, San Jose was forced to part ways with one of its past stars. Eddie Lewis, the teams midfield star, was transferred to Fulham of the English First Division for a then MLS-record \$1.5 million transfer fee.

While the team struggled at times, the Earthquakes did manage to set an MLS record with 15 straight unbeaten matches at Spartan Stadium. The streak stretched from Aug. 21, 1999 – July 15, 2000. It was a mark that the club would equal just two seasons later.

With a defense led by the emerging force of goalkeeper Joe Cannon, the Quakes recorded a club record nine shutouts in 2000. Long-time Bay Area soccer legend John Doyle played his last game as a member of the club in 2000, finishing a highly-decorated career that included eight years as a member of the U.S. National Team and a spot in the 1988 Olympics and 1990 World Cup. Doyle is still amongst the Earthquakes club leaders in numerous statistical categories, including appearances, games started, minutes played and cautions.

Forward Abdul Thompson Conteh was recognized as the MLS Humanitarian of the Year for his efforts to raise awareness and funds for the victims of war in his native Sierra Leone.

In a move that would foreshadow the dramatic upheaval the club would soon undergo, Lynne Meterparel stepped down as the Earthquakes General Manager on October 4 after 21 months.

2001: That Championship Season

After several years of frustration, the San Jose club was able to deliver a true season to remember for its fans in 2001, a season that ended with the club capturing its first MLS Cup Championship. It was a roller coaster ride right from the start when a new operating group was introduced in January and it accelerated with the addition of a savvy coach and the signing of the brightest American star the sport has ever seen.

The San Jose Earthquakes experienced a re-birth in 2001 when it was announced that Silicon Valley Sports & Entertainment, the business and marketing arm of the NHL's San Jose Sharks, would become the operator of the club on January 10. In addition, Spartan Stadium was named the site of the 2001 MLS All-Star game the same day, and the stage was set for the Earthquakes historic season.

Just two days later, head coach Lothar Osiander was relieved of his duties. With the days leading to the draft and pre-season training rapidly approaching, Tom Neale was hired as the Earthquakes general manager Feb. 1. Frank Yallop became the fifth head coach in Earthquakes history when he was hired Feb. 2, giving him just two days in command prior to the MLS Superdraft.

Yallop wasted little time turning the Quakes into a contender, acquiring one of the league's best defend-



ers, Jeff Agoos, from D.C. United in exchange for two draft picks and Abdul Thompson Conteh. Yallop then received defender Zak Ilsen in a trade from Los Angeles for a draft pick and acquired high-scoring A-League forward Dwayne De Rosario as an allocated player.

Yallop's busy week was not over, however, as he drafted six players in the Feb. 5 SuperDraft, including Chris Carrieri with the number one pick and defender Eddie Robinson with the 20th selection. Yallop was able to solidify the Quakes midfield when he acquired Manny Lagos from Tampa Bay in exchange for two draft picks.

With a revamped Earthquakes team coming into focus, former Earthquakes player Dominic Kinnear was hired as an assistant coach Feb. 15. The coaching staff was also bolstered by the return of goalkeeper coach Tim Hanley, who had served in the same capacity from 1997-1999. Seven days after Kinnear's hiring, another important piece of the 2001 Earthquakes came together when Ramiro Corrales rejoined his original club, coming over in a trade with the MetroStars.

Perhaps the biggest announcement in Earthquakes history took place on March 29, when it was announced that then 19-year-old superstar Landon Donovan would join the club as an allocated player. Donovan, from Redlands, Calif., was well known in the soccer world, joining the Quakes from German Bundesliga club Bayer Leverkusen, with whom he signed a contract in 1999.

As the season was set to start with a sense of optimism never before experienced at Spartan Stadium, Yallop and the Quakes made two more major moves, signing Danish star in Ronnie Ekelund and bringing defender Troy Dayak back to the team.

Dayak was an original member of the club in 1996 and appeared in matches in 1997-1998 before succumbing to serious surgery on a bulging disk in his neck that took over two years to fully recover from.

The Quakes got off to a slow start in April before tearing through an undefeated stretch from late April to early July (7-0-5) to establish themselves as one of the best teams in the league.

MLS recognized the Quakes firepower, as a team

record six players were named to the MLS West All-Star team in July. A large crowd at Spartan Stadium watched the Quakes put on a mid-season show in the 6-6 game July 28. Ronald Cerritos, Joe Cannon, Troy Dayak, Manny Lagos, Jeff Agoos and Landon Donovan all represented the team, with Donovan taking home the MVP honors after thrilling the crowd with four goals.

Quakes general manager Tom Neale resigned a day before the All-Star game, but the team continued to roll along, finishing with a 13-7-6 record for the best winning percentage (.615) in club history. The team entered the final two games (both against the Los Angeles Galaxy) of the season trailing the Galaxy by two points in the Western Division standings. Tragedy struck the day the team was set to travel to Los Angeles for the first of their final two matches, as the terrorist attacks on New York City and Washington, D.C. put the country on hold. MLS canceled the remaining regular season games and the Quakes finished second in the Western Division and fifth overall in MLS, their best finish in club history. Overall, the Quakes winning percentage improved by .271 from 2000 to 2001, the third highest increase from one season to the next in league history.

The Earthquakes made this playoff appearance count, rolling over the Crew in the MLS Cup Playoff quarterfinals in two games, 3-1 and 3-0. The Quakes then faced the owners of MLS' best regular-season record, the Miami Fusion in the semifinals.

It was a hard-fought series, with Miami striking first with a 1-0 win in the first game off a goal in the 53rd minute from Preki. San Jose responded in the second game with a resounding 4-0 win at Spartan Stadium, setting the stage for one of the biggest games in Quakes history at Lockhart Stadium in Fort Lauderdale, Fla. on October 17.

The game was a tight, pressure-packed affair that headed into overtime deadlocked at zero. It remained that way until four minutes into the extra session when Richard Mulrooney curled in a corner kick from the right side. Standing on the back post in heavy traffic, Jimmy Conrad knocked the ball in the air toward the goalmouth, where a leaping Dayak powered the ball past Miami goalkeeper Nick Rimando for a 1-0 win and the Earthquakes first-ever trip to the MLS Cup Final.

It was an incredible week to be a member of the Earthquakes as the club prepared for MLS Cup 2001 in

Columbus, Ohio against their in-state rival Los Angeles Galaxy. In his first season as head coach, Frank Yallop was recognized for turning the club around from its last place finish in 2000 to the MLS title game with the Coach of The Year Award. First year Quake Jeff Agoos was named MLS Defender of The Year and a member of the MLS Best XI while Troy Dayak won the Ace Comeback Player of the Year Award for his dramatic recovery from neck surgery. As a team, the Earthquakes were recognized with the Fair Play Award.

MLS Cup 2001 would feature a similar Earthquakes sweep. Despite falling behind 1-0 on a Luis Hernandez goal in the 21st minute, San Jose responded with a world-class strike by Donovan in the 43rd minute. The team then won the first championship in club history on a golden goal by Dwayne De Rosario six minutes into overtime. De Rosario was rewarded with the MLS Cup MVP trophy, and the Earthquakes were finally able to call themselves MLS Cup Champions.

2002: Defending the Cup

The Quakes began the 2002 campaign in an unusual position. For the first time they were among the league favorites to win the championship. The team was well positioned for another run at the title, as MLS Defender of the Year Jeff Agoos and star forward Landon Donovan were returning. The team also made a major off-season move as it sent all-time leading scorer Ronald Cerritos to the Dallas Burn for the Burn's top goal scorer Ariel Graziani on Feb. 8. On the same day, the Quakes announced that Johnny Moore would serve as the new general manager. Moore had strong roots in the history of San Jose soccer, having played for the NASL Earthquakes from 1974-1977, while also serving as assistant general manager from 1974-1976. In 1977, Moore became the first person to serve as a player and general manager at the same time, helping the Quakes rank among the leaders in NASL in attendance.

With Frank Yallop and Dominic Kinnear in charge, 2002 turned out to be another fantastic season for San Jose. The team held first place overall in MLS from April 20-Sept. 13 and posted an MLS all-time best home record of 12-1-1 at Spartan Stadium. The Quakes posted a then MLS record 12-game winning streak at Spartan and a 15-game unbeaten streak at home that tied their own home unbeaten streak. At the end of the year, the Quakes finished with the second-best record in MLS and equaled the club record for points in a season with 45.

The Quakes also participated for the first time in the CONCACAF Champions Cup, where they advanced to the quarterfinals. The team swept CD Olimpia of Honduras in the Round of 16 1-0 and 3-1, but could not get by Mexican champion Pachuca CF, who won the two-game series 3-1 on aggregate.

Individually a number of Quakes shined both internationally and in the league. Jeff Agoos and Landon Donovan represented the United States at the 2002 World Cup with Donovan starting every game and scoring two goals. The U.S. shocked the world by advancing to the quarterfinals.

At home, Wade Barrett and Ronnie Ekelund earned spots on the MLS Best XI team, while Joe Cannon was named MLS Goalkeeper of the Year. For the

second straight season, six Quakes players participated in the MLS All-Star game (Jeff Agoos, Wade Barrett, Joe Cannon, Landon Donovan, Ariel Graziani, Richard Mulrooney). Frank Yallop earned the honor of coaching the MLS All-Stars in the game and his squad defeated the U.S. National Team 3-2. In 2002, Cannon set a club record with eight shutouts, while Graziani also broke a record by scoring six game-winning goals on his way to leading the team with 14 goals and five assists.

The playoffs were not as fruitful for the Quakes, however, as they were swept by the Columbus Crew, losing two games by 2-1 scores. Landon Donovan led the playoff charge with a goal and an assist, but his efforts were not enough as the Quakes were unable to defend their title.

2003: Return to Glory

After losing in the first round of the 2002 MLS Cup Playoffs, the Earthquakes went through a tumultuous off-season prior to 2003. Eight players left the team through trade or free agency, and the club re-loaded by bringing in nine new faces through the draft and shrewd trades. Starters Joe Cannon, Jimmy Conrad, Wade Barrett and Ariel Graziani would not be back for 2003.

The Quakes acquired Stanford All-American Todd Dunivant, 17-year-old Arturo Alvarez, Pac-10 Player of the Year Roger Levesque, forward Jamil Walker and goalkeeper Josh Saunders in the MLS SuperDraft. The team picked up Los Angeles Galaxy midfielder Brian Mullan in a trade, while also acquiring Craig Waibel (Waiver Draft) and Brian Ching (Supplemental Draft). After an injury to goalkeeper Jon Conway in preseason, Yallop and Kinnear signed Canadian National Team veteran Pat Onstad to man the net.

Yallop's squad had two setbacks prior to kicking off the regular season. First, CSD Municipal of Guatemala eliminated the Quakes from the CONCACAF Champions Cup in the round of 16 5-4 on aggregate. Second, projected starting forward Dwayne De Rosario, who had missed the preseason with a broken foot, suffered a torn lateral collateral ligament in his right knee and was expected to be out for the year.

Despite the difficulties suffered in preseason, the Quakes surprised the League by bursting out of the gate with a 4-0-2 record in their first six games to claim the top spot in the Western Conference. The team, however, continued to deal with adversity as a number of players went down with injuries while Landon Donovan, Richard Mulrooney, Pat Onstad and Arturo Alvarez all missed time due to national team commitments.

Overall in 2003, the Quakes lost over 100 man games to injuries and national team call-ups, but they battled through and held the top spot in the Western Conference for every week but one. Contributions came from every player on the roster. Rookies Todd Dunivant and Jamil Walker each notched eight points, setting the single-season rookie scoring record, while Arturo Alvarez scored a goal in his first career start. Brian Mullan and Brian Ching put together career years with each netting six goals, while Craig Waibel, another former Galaxy player, put up career highs in games played and minutes played.

With strong efforts from everyone, San Jose captured its first-ever regular season Western Conference

Championship with 51 points, a new club record. Pat Onstad and Landon Donovan were named to the Best XI team and Onstad was also recognized as the MLS Goalkeeper of the Year. The Canadian international rewrote the San Jose record book for goalkeepers, setting the club record for shutouts (9), wins (14), catch/punches (117), games played in goal (27) and goals against average (1.04). He also found himself among the league leaders in most goalkeeping categories, placing first in catch/punches (117), first in shutouts (9), second in goals against (1.04) and second in wins (14).

Donovan and Dwayne De Rosario also had two defining moments in 2003 as they notched the first two hat tricks in club history. Donovan got things started by netting the first Quakes hat trick on Sept. 20 against Kansas City and then De Rosario followed the next week with a hat trick of his own against the Dallas Burn. De Rosario scored his first goal of that game 11 seconds in, setting the record for the fastest goal in MLS history.

In the MLS Cup Playoffs, the Quakes started slowly with a 2-0 loss to the Los Angeles Galaxy in the first game of a two-game aggregate goal series and then they fell behind 2-0 in game just 13 minutes into game two. Facing a 4-0 aggregate goals deficit, Yallop's squad responded with the tenacity and desire shown all season, as they netted four unanswered goals in regulation, capped by Chris Ronér's 90th minute header. Rodrigo Faria, who arrived in a late season trade, scored the overtime winner setting off a celebration at Spartan Stadium. The 5-2 comeback win has since been called the "greatest game in MLS history."

The Quakes continued their run to the championship, coming back just six days after the miracle against the Galaxy to record another memorable victory in the Western Conference Championship. Against the Kansas City Wizards, the Quakes twice recovered from one-goal deficits in the second half to tie the game and send it to overtime to the delight of 16,108 fans at





Spartan Stadium. With only three minutes remaining in the overtime period, Landon Donovan sent the crowd into delirium with the game-winning goal off a pass from Ronnie Ekelund, giving San Jose its first-ever Western Conference Championship.

After coming from behind in their previous two playoff matches, the Quakes struck first in the MLS Cup against the Chicago Fire at The Home Depot Center. Ronnie Ekelund blasted a free kick past Fire goalkeeper Zach Thornton in the fifth minute, tying the MLS Cup record for the fastest goal in Cup history. Donovan stretched the lead to two goals by finishing off a Jamil Walker through ball in the 38th minute and the Quakes headed into halftime with a two-goal cushion. Onstad was outstanding in the first half with seven saves to hold Chicago scoreless.

The first 15 minutes following intermission saw back-and-forth action as three goals were scored during that interval and a penalty kick was called. DaMarcus Beasley scored for Chicago in the 49th minute, but Richard Mulrooney responded a minute later with a goal to stretch the lead back to two goals at 3-1. An own goal by Chris Ronér made it a 3-2 game and three minutes later Fire forward Damani Ralph was fouled in the penalty box to earn a penalty kick. Ante Razov stepped up to take the penalty and drove it to the lower left corner, but Onstad was there to make a momentum changing save. Donovan put the finishing touches on the Quakes second championship win in three seasons with a goal in the 71st minute from a Dwayne De Rosario cross. The Quakes four goals set and MLS Cup record, while the six combined goals were also a record.

The Earthquakes proved once again that they were the top team in MLS. From 2001-2003, San Jose has been the top team in MLS with two MLS Cup Championships and the best regular season record of 41-25-18.

2004: Kinnear Takes Charge

Despite coming off their second championship in three seasons, changes at the top were the big story heading into the 2004 season. In December 2003, head coach Frank Yallop stepped down from the Quakes to take over the Canadian National Team. In his place, the Quakes elevated assistant coach Dominic Kinnear to the top job and he brought in long-time San Jose player John Doyle to serve as his assistant coach. In late January 2004, changes continued as general manager Johnny Moore stepped down and was replaced by former U.S. World Cup star Alexi Lalas, who was named President and General Manager on January 27, 2004.

A successful draft by Kinnear and Doyle saw the team acquire local Santa Clara products defender Ryan Cochrane and goalkeeper Steve Cronin in the first round. The team also picked up midfielder Tighe Dombrowski from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee in the fifth round. Those draft picks served to bolster a team that brought back over 90 percent of the 2003 team. Manny Lagos, who was traded to Columbus for a third round pick, was the only starter not retained.

The 2004 season again saw the Quakes lose over 100 man games to injury and national team call-ups, and coupled with nine one-goal losses, San Jose finished 9-10-11 and fourth in the Western Conference. San Jose then faced Kansas City in the Western Conference Semifinals in a two-game series. After winning the first game 2-0 at home on goals by Dwayne De Rosario and Craig Waibel, Kansas City turned the tables in game two to beat the Quakes 3-0 and end their season.

While San Jose did not make it back to MLS Cup, the team accomplished a number of notable feats. It set club records by recording four straight shutouts from Aug. 14–Sept. 4, while also recording a club record 459-minute shutout streak. Kinnear's squad also broke the MLS record by going extending their unbeaten streak when scoring first at home to 46 games.

Individually, the Quakes had a number of outstanding performances and milestones. For the first time in club history, the Earthquakes had five players voted in as starters for the Sierra Mist MLS All-Star Game as Jeff Agoos, Brian Ching, Landon Donovan, Richard Mulrooney and Pat Onstad all earned spots on the West Squad. Ching scored in the game on assists from Mulrooney and Donovan, but the West fell 3-2.

Ching had a breakout year after recovering from a torn Achilles in 2003, as he scored a league-leading 12 goals and notched four assists to earn MLS Comeback Player of the Year honors and a spot on the RadioShack Best XI team. In another historic moment, Mulrooney set the club record for assists against the Los Angeles Galaxy on May 22 and finished the year with 44 assists. Mulrooney finished 2004 as the all-time leader in six categories, including games played (163), minutes played (14,204) and fouls suffered (354), among others.

The off-season saw more change as the Quakes lost star forward Landon Donovan, who decided to return to Germany to play for Bayer Leverkusen, which had exercised the option to retain Donovan after his four years in MLS.



2005: The Supporter's Shield

Coming off a disappointing 2004 season, head coach Dominic Kinnear helped return the Quakes to their winning ways in 2005, despite losing a number of long-time standout members of the club before the start of the season. Bringing in 18 new players, including returnees to the team, Ronald Cerritos and Wade Barrett, Kinnear led the Quakes to the greatest regular season in team history with an 18-4-10 record and 64 points clinching the club's first Supporter's Shield, despite losing over 100 man games to injury. Newcomers Ricardo Clark, Kelly Gray, Danny Califf, Mark Chung, Brad Davis and Alejandro Moreno all played big parts in the Quakes 2005 success.

The team set the MLS record for the fewest losses in league history with four and became the second team in MLS history to surpass 60 points in a season. San Jose also set club records in the following categories: winning streak (6 games), road winning streak (6 games), shutouts (12), most road shutouts (4), most road wins (9), unbeaten streak (14 games) and most consecutive shutouts at home (5). Kinnear's squad became the first team in MLS history to finish the regular season unbeaten at home (9-0-7), while stretching their all-time unbeaten streak at home to 18 games, another MLS record. San Jose posted a +22 goal difference, the best in team history with 53 goals scored and 31 allowed.

Despite the great regular season success, the Quakes were eliminated for the second straight season in the Western Conference Semifinals. After losing 3-1 on the road to the Los Angeles Galaxy in the first leg of the series, the Quakes could not comeback and fell 4-2 overall on aggregate.

Dwayne De Rosario had the best season of his five-year MLS career in 2005 to lead the Quakes. Moving from forward to attacking midfielder, the Canadian international recorded career-highs in goals (9) and assists (9) and finished runner-up in the Honda MLS MVP race. He also earned his second straight Sierra

Mist MLS Goal of the Year award for his spectacular free kick on Oct. 15 against the Los Angeles Galaxy.

Also having standout seasons for the Quakes were goalkeeper Pat Onstad and defender Danny Califf, who were both named to the RadioShack MLS Best XI team. Onstad was also named the MLS Goalkeeper of the Year for a season in which he led the league in wins (18), shutouts (12), goals against average (0.97) and save percentage (77.2). It was the second Goalkeeper of the Year award for the 37-year-old Canadian, who also moved into first place in team history with his 27th career shutout on Oct. 1 against New England. Califf helped stabilize the defense after coming over in a trade with the Galaxy, appearing in 20 games and scoring two goals. Along with Eddie Robinson, Califf helped form the most formidable central defense tandem in MLS.

Cerritos, the all-time leading goal scorer in team history, made a strong return to San Jose in 2005, after spending three seasons away from the team. Cerritos finished the year with six goals and eight assists to push his all-time totals to 61 goals and 47 assists, both team records. Cerritos notched his record-breaking 46th assist on August 6 against the Columbus Crew.

2005 also saw two original members of the team honored on the field at Spartan Stadium. The team inducted John Doyle as the inaugural member of the San Jose Earthquakes Hall of Fame, while Troy Dayak was honored in a post-game ceremony after announcing his retirement. Doyle's number was unveiled in Spartan Stadium along with a Hall of Fame banner at halftime of the team's Aug. 27 game against the Los Angeles Galaxy. Doyle was the first signing in the team's history on Dec. 7, 1995 and had a standout career with San Jose. The team captain during every year of his tenure, Doyle appeared in 132 games during his five seasons in San Jose and scored 11 goals and notched 15 assists. He was named the 1996 MLS Defender of the Year and made the MLS Best XI that year as well. The Fremont, Calif. native also earned a spot in the MLS All-Star Game in 1996 and 1997. Since his retirement following the 2000 season, Doyle spent three years as the color commentator on Quakes broadcasts before serving as the assistant coach in 2004 and 2005.

Dayak announced his retirement from the Earthquakes after spending eight seasons with the team and overcoming two potential career-ending injuries. Dayak played for San Jose from 1996-1998 and then returned to the team in 2001 after overcoming a severe neck injury that required surgery and torn knee ligaments. The former Livermore High School standout was a major factor in the Quakes 2001 MLS Cup Championship victory as he missed only one game in 2001 and was named the MLS Comeback Player of the Year, while also earning a spot on the MLS All-Star team. His overtime header against the Miami Fusion in the MLS Cup Playoff Semifinals sent San Jose to their first MLS Cup. Despite being hampered by injuries following that season, "The Beast" still helped San Jose win their second MLS Cup in 2003, while being one of MLS' elite teams in 2002, 2004 and 2005. He was honored on the Spartan Stadium field in a post-game ceremony on October 8, where he was presented a commemorative Earthquakes belt buckle.

On December 15, 2005, after the greatest regu-

lar season in team history with an 18-4-10 record and 64 points clinching the club's first Supporter's Shield, the Earthquakes were placed on hiatus by the League, with their players and coaching staff moving to Houston where they now play as the Houston Dynamo.

2006: The Rebirth Begins

On May 24, Lew Wolff, principal owner of the Oakland Athletics, purchased an exclusive option to acquire an MLS team and bring professional soccer back to the Bay Area. David Aliotti was named the Executive Vice President of the San Jose Earthquakes.

2007: The Earthquakes Return

On July 18, Lew Wolff activated an option for the rights to the San Jose Earthquakes and Major League Soccer granted them a new expansion team. The club started to take shape on Oct. 3, when John Doyle was named General Manager of Soccer Operations. On the same day, the Earthquakes unveiled their new uniforms and team logo. On Oct. 26 the Earthquakes announced Buck Shaw Stadium in Santa Clara as their temporary venue for the 2008, 2009 and 2010 seasons with some games being played at McAfee Coliseum in Oakland.

One of the biggest announcements for the new expansion team came on Nov. 5 when the Earthquakes named Frank Yallop their head coach. With Yallop aboard the Earthquakes selected ten players in the MLS Expansion Draft, including former Earthquakes defender Ryan Cochrane of the Houston Dynamo. Also selected were Clarence Goodson (FC Dallas), Ned Grabavoy (Columbus Crew), James Riley (New England Revolution), Joseph Vide (New York Red Bulls), Ivan Guerrero (Chicago Fire), Brian Carroll (D.C. United), Jason Hernandez (Chivas USA), Gavin Glinion (LA Galaxy), Chris Pozniak (Toronto FC). A few days later the Earthquakes acquired forward Kei Kamara from the Columbus Crew and goalkeeper Preston Burpo from Chivas USA. The Earthquakes then traded defender Brian Carroll to the Crew for Kamara and traded the club's fourth-round pick in the 2008 MLS Super Draft to

Chivas USA in exchange for Burpo.

On Nov. 29, the Earthquakes brought another familiar face to the club by naming Ian Russell the assistant coach.

Toward the end of the year, the Earthquakes had open tryouts in seven cities across Northern California looking for local talent. The tryout tour began on Nov. 3 and finished on Sunday, Dec. 2 with over 600 players trying out. The tour visited Sacramento, Santa Rosa, San Francisco, Salinas, Oakland, Walnut Creek and Hayward. There were 33 players selected from the tryout tour that participated in the Earthquakes invitation-only combine. These players competed with other players from United Soccer League and from other top colleges in the country for a spot on the Quakes reserve division team.

2008: Best Expansion Team of the Decade

The San Jose Earthquakes started 2008 with a flurry of activity. On Jan. 10, they acquired goalkeeper Joe Cannon from the Los Angeles Galaxy. Soon after the team acquired defender Nick Garcia from the Kansas City Wizards in exchange for the No. 1 overall pick in the 2008 MLS SuperDraft and then selected Shea Salinas with the 15th overall pick in the MLS SuperDraft.

The Quakes reported for preseason at the beginning of February and officially made their on-field return to the Bay Area on February 13, in a 1-0 preseason loss to the old version of themselves, the Houston Dynamo, at PAL Stadium in San Jose. Another familiar face returned to San Jose soon after, as the Earthquakes acquired midfielder Ramiro Corrales from the Houston Dynamo in exchange for allocation money.

On Feb. 26, the Earthquakes named former Quakes midfielder Ronnie Ekelund the technical advisor. A day later, the team acquired midfielder Ronnie O'Brien from Toronto FC in exchange for a first round draft pick in the 2009 MLS SuperDraft and allocation money.

The Quakes kept on building the team and on March 13, Jason Batty was named the goalkeeper coach. At the end of the month, the team signed Shea Salinas and acquired forward John Cunliffe. Prior to the opener against the Los Angeles Galaxy on April 3, the Earthquakes signed Eric Denton, Jay Ayres, Matt Hatzke, Adam Smarte, Jamil Roberts and Ryan Johnson.

The team opened their home schedule in front of over 20,000 fans at the Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum against the Chicago Fire on April 12. The Quakes won their first match on April 19 with a 2-0 road victory over the Colorado Rapids. Another milestone came on May 3 when the team opened its new home on the campus of Santa Clara University, Buck Shaw Stadium. The Quakes played to a 0-0 draw in front of a sold-out crowd of 10,515.

While the Quakes were back on the field, the team was not able to find its rhythm until midseason. To bolster the attack, John Doyle and Frank Yallop signed English forward Darren Huckerby, MLS veteran forward Scott Sealy, former AS Roma midfielder Francisco Lima and former Earthquakes player midfielder/forward Arturo Alvarez. The new signings paid off and the team posted a nine-game unbeaten streak from July 12-Sept.

27, the longest unbeaten streak in the league in 2008 and the second longest ever by an expansion team. That run got the Quakes back into the thick of the play-off race, but they were not able to get climb all the way back up the standings and were eliminated from the playoff chase on the penultimate weekend of the season.

During the 2008 season, the team earned a number of memorable victories, including a 2-1 victory over the Houston Dynamo on May 22 at Buck Shaw Stadium, a last-minute 3-2 win over the Los Angeles Galaxy at Oakland Alameda County Coliseum, a 4-0 win over the New England Revolution and a 2-0 road win over the eventual MLS Cup Champion Columbus Crew. The Quakes capped the season with a 2-0 win over Toronto FC on Oct. 25. The team also set a single-game attendance record on June 14 against the Los Angeles Galaxy, as 39,728 fans packed into Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum.

The Quakes saw standout performances from a number of players, including goalkeeper Joe Cannon and midfielder Darren Huckerby. Cannon led the league in saves and posted nine shutouts on the year and was also named the team's U.S. Soccer Foundation Humanitarian of the Year. Huckerby scored six goals and notched four assists in just 14 games to be named the MLS player of the month for September, MLS Newcomer of the Year and the Earthquakes Most Valuable Player. Jason Hernandez earned the team's Defensive Player of the Year award for his excellent play on the backline.

The Earthquakes made a very successful return to MLS as the top expansion team of the last decade. Under the guidance of head coach Frank Yallop, the Quakes had more wins (8), points (33) and goals (32) and allowed fewer goals (38) than any expansion team since 1998.

HISTORY OF THE EARTHQUAKES NAME

When the San Jose Major League Soccer club decided to change its name and look in 1999, it went into the past to do so. Reaching back to a previously successful soccer team in the area, the Clash became the Earthquakes. The previous incarnation of the Earthquakes played in the North American Soccer League from 1974-1984, and then in the Western Soccer Alliance from 1985-88. Those Earthquakes teams called Spartan Stadium home. The name Earthquakes originally came from a newspaper contest in the San Jose Mercury News, in which fans were encouraged to send in suggestions for the name of the soon-to-be formed San Jose franchise. The name Earthquakes was chosen by the team's management. Following are the results of those teams:

LAMAR HUNT U.S. OPEN CUP

Dating back to 1914, the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup is the oldest soccer cup competition in the United States and is among the oldest in the world. Open to all affiliated amateur and professional teams in the U.S., the annual Open Cup is a 91-year-old single-elimination tournament based on similar competitions played across the world concurrent with domestic league action. In 1999, the U.S. Open Cup was renamed the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup to honor the long-time soccer supporter and pioneer.

San Jose has participated in the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup on eight occasions (1997, 1998, 2000-2005), and has reached the quarterfinals seven times. The team reached the semifinals for the first time in team history in 2004, but fell 1-0 to the Kansas City Wizards on the road.

INTERNATIONAL COMPETITIONS

Since the team's inception in 1996, San Jose has played against a number of international foes, facing UNAM Pumas (Mexico), Bayer Leverkusen (Germany) and Sichuan Quan Xing (China) among others in exhibition matches both at home and on the road. The Quakes have a 5-8-5 record in exhibitions against international foes. In 2002, the Earthquakes took part in their first international competition, the 2002 CONCACAF Champions Cup. The Quakes qualified for the tournament by winning the 2001 MLS Cup and reached the quarterfinals of the competition before falling to Pachuca CF (Mexico) 3-1 on aggregate.

2005 marked the first season since 2001 that the Quakes did not participate in the Champions Cup as they competed from 2002-2004 in the prestigious tournament. In 2003, the team added another international tournament to its resume, the La Manga Cup. The La Manga Cup is played every year in La Manga in the Murcia region of Spain and has featured European powers like Rosenborg Trondheim and Dynamo Kiev.

MLS RULES OF COMPETITION

STRUCTURE: The 15 MLS teams are divided into two conferences:

Eastern Conference – Chicago Fire, Columbus Crew, D.C. United, Kansas City Wizards, New England Revolution, New York Red Bulls, Toronto FC

Western Conference – Chivas USA, Colorado Rapids, FC Dallas, Houston Dynamo, Los Angeles Galaxy, Real Salt Lake, San Jose Earthquakes, Seattle Sounders FC

SCHEDULE: Each team plays a 30-game regular season schedule. Each MLS team will play two games against the other 14 teams (one home, one away) accounting for 28 games of the season.

Two additional games against intra-conference rivals will complete each team's 30-game schedule.

POINT SYSTEM: Teams will receive three points for a win, one point for a tie and zero points for a loss.

REFEREES: All referees in MLS are National Referees assigned by the United States Soccer Federation. The Canadian Soccer Association assigns referees for all games played in Canada.

GAME CLOCK: The official game time for all Major League Soccer games will be managed on the field by the referee. If necessary, the referee may also allot extra time (a.k.a. "stoppage time") at the end of each period (first half, second half, and if applicable, first overtime period and second overtime period during playoff matches) to allow for injuries, time-wasting or other disturbances.

The stadium clock will display the time from 0:00 to 45:00 and from 45:00 to 90:00 (plus stoppage time where applicable in each half). For statistical purposes, the minutes for goals, substitutions, yellow cards, etc., will be listed from the first minute until the 90th minute. A goal scored at 15 minutes 10 seconds will be listed as having been scored in the 16th minute. Events occurring during stoppage time will follow the international norm by being demarcated with a "+" sign and the extra minutes. For example, a goal scored three minutes into first half stoppage time will be officially identified as happening at "48+".

GAME DAY ROSTERS: Each team can nominate 18 players for a game day roster. Teams are allowed three substitutions per game.

CAUTIONS AND SUSPENSIONS: A player will be suspended for one game upon receiving his fifth yellow card – regardless of the nature of the infraction which resulted in his being awarded a yellow card. A second suspension of one game would result after the awarding of an additional three cards as would a third suspension after the awarding of card number eleven. With the "Good Behavior" incentive it is possible for a player to have a caution expunged. If a player goes three games without receiving a yellow card, after an initial warning, the player will have one yellow card expunged. A player may take advantage of the "Good Behavior" incentive only once throughout the season.

MLS CUP PLAYOFFS FORMAT

WHO QUALIFIES: Eight teams qualify for the 2009 MLS Cup

Playoffs. Playoff berths will be determined by points in the standings upon the completion of the regular season. All 15 teams will have played 30 games.

- The top two teams in each conference qualify and are seeded 1 & 2 in their respective four-team playoff conference brackets.
- The four MLS teams with the next most points, regardless of conference, receive "wildcard" berths.
 - The four wildcard teams will be seeded according to conference first.
 - If more than four teams qualify from one conference, the team finishing lower than fourth in its conference will shift over to the other conference bracket.
 - A team switching conference brackets will be seeded below all other teams in its new conference playoff bracket.

PLAYOFF FORMAT: Conference Semifinal series are conducted in a home-and-home, aggregate-goal format. The lower seeded team in the Conference Semifinal hosts the first game. The winners of those four series advance to single-game Conference Championships that will determine the MLS Cup Finalists.

The team that scores the most goals in the home-and-home series advances to the single elimination Conference Championship. If the teams are tied after 180 minutes in the Conference Semifinal series, a 30-minute extra time period (divided into two 15-minute periods) will be played followed by kicks from the penalty mark, if necessary. The team with the higher seed between the two Conference finalists will host the Conference Championship game.

In the case of ties after 90 minutes of regulation in the Eastern and Western Conference Championship games and MLS Cup, 30 minutes of extra time (divided into two 15-minute periods) would be played followed by kicks from the penalty mark, if necessary, to determine the winners.

TEAM-STANDINGS TIE-BREAKING PROCEDURES

The team awarded the highest position in the MLS standings will be the team with the greatest number of points (3 points for a win, 1 point for a tie, 0 points for a loss). In the event that two teams finish the regular season with an equal number of points, the following system will be used to break the tie:

- 1) The highest position shall be awarded to the team with the better win/loss record in current regular season games against all other teams equal in points. (head-to-head competition)
- 2) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team with the greater goal difference against all other teams during the regular season. (goal differential)
- 3) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team scoring the greatest number of total goals against all other teams during the regular season. (total goals)
- 4) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the procedures described in this section shall be applied

MLS RULES OF COMPETITION

only to games played on the road by each team against all other teams during the regular season. (road 1-3)

- 5) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the procedures described in this section shall be applied only to games played at home by each team against all other teams during the regular season. (home 1-3)
- 6) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team with the fewest team disciplinary points in the League Fair Play table during the regular season.
- 7) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest

position in the standings shall be determined by the toss of a coin.

- 8) The first tiebreaker in a three-way tie is also head-to-head, but it is determined via points-per-game versus the other two teams. If two teams are tied in points-per-game head-to-head, the next tie breaker is goal difference.

NOTE: If two clubs remain tied after another club with the same number of points advances during any step, the tie breaker reverts to step 1 of the two-club format.

2009 MLS PLAYER RULES AND REGULATIONS SUMMARY

I. MLS ROSTER COMPOSITION

A Major League Soccer team's full roster is comprised of the Senior Roster and the Developmental Roster. The full roster shall exceed no more than 24 total players: 18-20 players on the Senior Roster and no more than four (4) players on the Developmental Roster. All 24 players are eligible for selection as part of the game-day squad during the regular season and playoffs.

(A) SENIOR ROSTER

Other than at specified times during preseason or through injury situations (e.g., a player added as either a disabled list replacement or a season-ending injury replacement), an MLS team shall have no more than 20 Senior Roster players at any time. The Senior Roster is comprised of the following players, who all count against a team's salary budget:

INTERNATIONAL PLAYERS

Each team is allotted eight (8) International slots, with the exception of Toronto FC who is allotted 13 International slots, five (5) of which may be used on domestic U.S. players. All International player slots are tradable, therefore a team may have more than or less than eight (8) International players on its roster.

DOMESTIC PLAYERS*

A domestic player is either a U.S. citizen, a permanent resident (green card holder) or the holder of other special status (e.g., refugee or asylum status).

* For Toronto FC, players with the legal right to work in Canada are considered domestic players (i.e., Canadian citizen, permanent resident, part of a protected class).

(B) DEVELOPMENTAL ROSTER

MLS teams shall not have more than four (4) Developmental players on their Developmental Roster at any time (unless a player is added as a disabled list replacement or season-ending injury replacement). Developmental players can be either Domestic or International and must be 25 years of age or younger during the calendar year of competition. These players do not count against a team's salary budget. They are signed to non-guaranteed contracts, and thus can be waived at any time. Teams are permitted an unlimited number of Developmental player signings during a given season to ensure all four Developmental Roster spots are occupied at any one time.

Generation adidas players and Domestic and International underclassmen form part of a team's Developmental Roster. They

are acquired by MLS teams through the SuperDraft, Lottery, Discovery or waiver system (see below) if they join the League after the SuperDraft.

For 2009, if a team has more than four (4) Generation adidas players on its Developmental Roster, then the additional Generation adidas players would be grandfathered and count against a team's 20-player Senior Roster (with no budget charge).

II. METHODS OF PLAYER ACQUISITION

MLS teams may acquire players and add them to their Senior and Developmental rosters via the following 13 mechanisms:

(A) ALLOCATIONS

The allocations will be ranked in reverse order of finish for the 2008 season, taking playoff performance into account. Seattle, as an expansion team, will have the top-ranked allocation at the beginning of 2009. The rankings will be separate and distinct from the allocation amounts and will only be relevant in the event two or more teams file a request for the same player on the same day, in the case of returning U.S. National Team players, or in other cases where the League, in its discretion taking into account all the circumstances, determines that the allocation rankings shall be applied. In such cases, priority will be granted to the team with the higher allocation ranking. Once the team uses its allocation ranking to acquire a player it will drop to the bottom of the list. The ranking itself can be traded provided part of the compensation received in return is another team's ranking. A team may move up or down in the rankings, provided that at all times each team is assigned a ranking (no team can have more than one ranking and no team can be without a ranking). The rankings will reset at the end of each MLS League Season.

A club receives allocation money for (1) poor performance during the preceding MLS regular season; (2) the transfer of a player to a club outside of MLS for value; (3) roster purposes due to expansion status; and/or (4) exceptional circumstances as approved by the Competition Committee.

Each year the MLS Competition Committee determines the allocation amount to be made available to each team. Allocation money can be traded by teams. Allocation money does not count against a team's salary budget and can be used:

- To sign players new to MLS (that is, a player who did not play in MLS during the previous season).

MLS RULES OF COMPETITION

- To re-sign an existing MLS player, with League approval.
- In connection with the exercise of an option to purchase a player's rights or the extension of a player's contract for the second year provided the player was new to MLS in the immediately prior year.

Allocation money cannot otherwise be used to buy down the salary budget number of players already under contract to the League, nor can allocation money be used to buy down the budget number of a Designated Player.

(B) DESIGNATED PLAYER

The Designated Player Rule allows the League to sign players (under the League's single entity system) whose salary will fall outside of the team salary budget and whose cost above the salary budget charge will be the financial responsibility of the club for which they play. A Designated Player's salary budget charge will be capped at \$415,000 per annum in 2009, but his actual compensation is higher. Each team initially received one Designated Player slot, and clubs are allowed to trade Designated Player slots. However, no team can have more than two Designated Players. The Designated Player Rule is a three-year initiative that will conclude after the 2009 MLS season when its future will be reviewed.

* Landon Donovan is the only remaining pre-existing high-salaried (grandfathered Designated Player) in the League. He will continue to be grandfathered and will not count as a Designated Player in 2009.

(C) SUPERDRAFT

These are players drafted by teams at the annual MLS SuperDraft, which consists of four rounds. In order to be eligible to be drafted, players must be: invited to participate in that year's MLS Player Combine; Generation adidas-signed players; or college players who no longer have college eligibility and are nominated by MLS teams. The selection order is determined as follows: The first six selections are from teams that did not qualify for the previous playoffs beginning with the team with fewest regular season points (3 points per win, one point per tie). The remaining eight positions are ranked by fewest regular season points among the teams that were eliminated in the same round of the previous year's MLS Cup Playoffs. An expansion team receives the first selection in each round.

A player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft and did not sign with the League, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to the player.

(D) TRADES

Players, rights to sign players, SuperDraft picks, allocation money, allocation ranking, Designated Player slots and International player slots may all be acquired and exchanged in trades approved by the MLS League Office provided all of the necessary rules regarding roster and salary budget compliance are met and the trade is consummated during the valid trading period. The trade window opened on November 26, 2008 and will close at the 2009 trade deadline of September 15, 2009 (in conjunction with the Discovery claim and roster freeze deadline).

(E) DISCOVERY SIGNINGS

Each team has the opportunity to make six Discovery signings per season (expansion teams have 10 Discovery signings in

their initial season). The last day for Discovery player signings is September 15, 2009 – coinciding with the roster freeze date and trade deadline. The six Discovery signings can be used to fill senior roster spots only. If multiple teams claim the same player using a Discovery, the team that filed the claim first will have first rights to the player. Discovery claims expire following each season. If the League and player are unable to reach an agreement during the season, the team that first filed the Discovery retains the right of first refusal in the event the player is later signed by the League.

(F) DEVELOPMENTAL ROSTER SIGNINGS

Teams are permitted an unlimited number of Developmental player signings during a given season to ensure all four Developmental Roster spots are occupied at any given time. International Player limits per team still apply.

(G) WAIVERS

A team may place a player on waivers at any time during the regular season at which point he is made available to all other teams. The waiver claiming period shall commence on the first business day after the League delivers notice to teams and shall expire at 5 p.m. EST on the second business day after the Waiver Period Commencement Date. The claiming period is 48 hours.

The Waiver Draft order is determined via points per game once all teams have played at least three MLS League games. If the waiver takes place prior to all teams playing in at least three League games, priority shall be granted based upon the prior year's performance, taking playoff performance first, with teams eliminated from playoff contention at the same stage separated according to their point totals through the end of the regular season, and new expansion teams shall be at the bottom of the waiver order. If there is more than one expansion team in a given year, they shall be listed in the reverse order of the SuperDraft order.

Once a team selects a player off waivers, that club is automatically moved to the bottom of the priority list for subsequent waiver selections in a given season, regardless of its points-per-game total. Players who may be placed on the MLS waiver wire are as follows:

- A player waived by an MLS team in the current season;
- A player who completed his college eligibility within the past season, who was not made available in the Super Draft;
- A player who has remaining college eligibility (and was not made available in the SuperDraft), but the League at its discretion and after taking into account exceptional circumstances determines the player may be offered an MLS contract;
- A player who has played in MLS previously where his last MLS team does not wish to exercise their right of first refusal, except in the case of returning U.S. National Team players as stated above.

(H) LOTTERY

Some players shall be assigned to MLS teams via the weighted Lottery process. Any team assigned a player through the lottery in any particular season shall not be assigned another lottery

player that season unless and until all teams have received a lottery player or have agreed to waive their option to participate in a Lottery. The players made available through lotteries include:

- (i) Generation adidas players signed after the MLS SuperDraft;
- (ii) Draft eligible players to whom an MLS contract was offered but who failed to sign with the League prior to the Draft.

The weighted lottery takes into consideration each team's performance over its last 30 regular season games and the most recent postseason. The team with the worst record over its last 30 regular season games (dating back to previous season if necessary and taking playoff performance into account) will have the greatest probability of winning the lottery. Teams are not required to participate in a lottery. Players are assigned via the lottery system in order to prevent a player from potentially influencing his destination club with a strategic holdout.

(I) EXTREME HARDSHIP CALL-UPS

Teams may add players to their roster in cases of "extreme hardship" as follows: (1) a team has less than two available goalkeepers or (2) a team has less than 15 available players. Extreme hardship call-ups are made on a game-by-game basis.

(J) SEASON-ENDING INJURY REPLACEMENTS

A team with a player lost to a season-ending injury can replace that player on its roster, while remaining responsible for the full amount of the injured player's salary. A player can be placed on the season-ending injury list once another player has been signed as a replacement (provided the team has budget space). International player limits still apply at the time a season-ending replacement is made (with the player being replaced not counting against those limits).

(K) SHORT-TERM INJURY REPLACEMENTS

A team with a player who has a short-term injury can replace that player on its roster, while remaining responsible for the full amount of the injured player's salary. A player can be placed on the short-term injured reserve list once another player has been signed as a replacement (provided the team has budget space). Note that the injured player will have to sit out a minimum of six MLS League matches before he can rejoin the team's roster. International player limits still apply at the time a short-term replacement is made (with the player being replaced not counting against those limits).

(L) RETURNING U.S. NATIONAL TEAM POOL PLAYERS

In the event a U.S. National Team pool player playing abroad returns to the U.S. and there is interest from multiple MLS teams, preference will be given first to a team prepared to use an allocation. If there is more than one team prepared to use an allocation on a particular player, the current season's allocation rankings as determined by the MLS Competition Committee would be used. In the event no team is willing to use an allocation, the player will be assigned via waivers.

(M) HOME GROWN PLAYERS

Eligible players must have resided with their parents in a team's "Home Territory" for at least one year prior to placement on a team's Home Grown Player list, subject to the Non-Home Terri-

tory exception. Pursuant to all rules regarding qualification as a Home Grown Player, these players may be added to a team's roster Senior or Developmental roster. At this time teams may add up to two players per year from their Home Grown Player list subject to MLS Competition Committee rules.

NOTE: No changes may be made to a team's active full roster during the period beginning on September 16, 2009 (day after Roster Freeze Date) through the day after MLS Cup. Nevertheless, a team may obtain players in accordance with the extreme hardship rules and procedures to replace players who are injured or otherwise legitimately unavailable after the Roster Freeze Date. Any other replacements after the Roster Freeze Date may only be made in exceptional circumstances in the League's sole and absolute discretion.

(III.) METHODS OF RELEASING PLAYERS

(A) WAIVERS

Teams may waive players based on performance at any time during the MLS season. Players on guaranteed contracts waived on or after July 1 of any year, however, will continue to have their salary budget count against the team's salary budget and the team waiving the player will not receive a replacement except under the normal player acquisition mechanisms. Players may not be waived while they are injured, unless the League reaches a settlement with the injured player for his release. In such a scenario, the settlement amount will be charged to the team's salary budget. Upon return to fitness, however, a player may be waived normally.

(B) TRANSFERS AND LOANS

An MLS player may be transferred or loaned at any time to a team outside the League (subject to that team's Federation's transfer window). The registration windows – the dates between which MLS may request the transfer certificate of an international player – are as follows:

January 21 – April 15 (Primary Window)
July 15 – August 14 (Secondary Window)

(C) CONTRACT EXPIRATION

When a player's contract expires, the player does not count against the roster or budget of the team in question. A team retains the rights to the player indefinitely following the expiration of a contract only if attempts were made to re-sign the player.

(IV.) PLAYER RIGHTS

The following explains the status of player rights in specific instances:

OUT OF CONTRACT PLAYERS / OPTIONS NOT PICKED UP: a team retains the right of first refusal to the player indefinitely only if attempts were made to re-sign the player.

DRAFTED BUT NOT SIGNED: a player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft and did not sign, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 immediately following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to sign the player.

PLAYER TRANSFERRED OUTSIDE MLS: If a team receives allocation money as a result of a player's transfer, the team does not retain a right of first refusal.

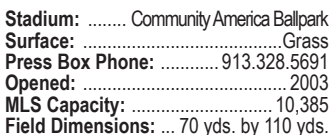

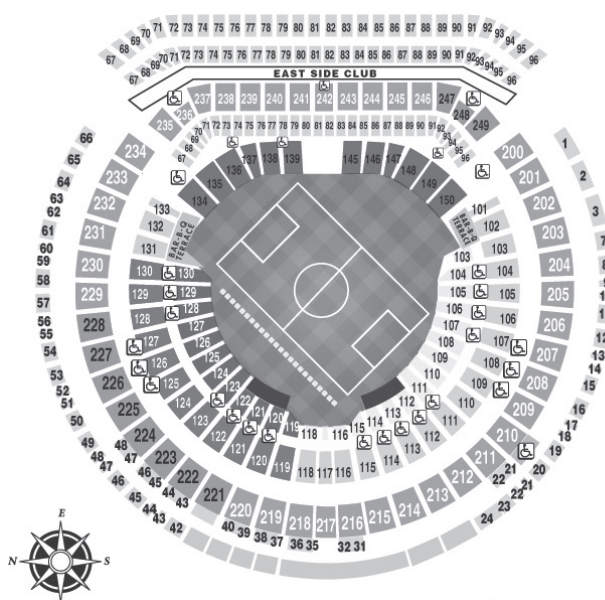

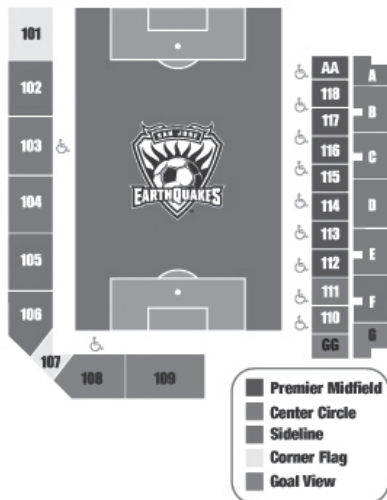

Buck Shaw Stadium

After a nearly four million-dollar renovation, Buck Shaw Stadium quickly became one of the most exciting venues for Major League Soccer in its first season in 2008. With an intimate setting and great sightlines, the fan experience at Buck Shaw ranks near the top of MLS.

The Earthquakes first game at the stadium on the campus of Santa Clara University took place before a sold-out crowd of 10,515 on May 3, 2008 against FC Dallas. The team sold over 90 percent of the tickets for the 12 games played in the regular season at Buck Shaw.

Named after former Santa Clara football coach, Lawrence T. "Buck" Shaw, Buck Shaw Stadium has served as a showcase for some of Santa Clara University's proudest athletic achievements since the facility opened in 1962. Besides serving as the home for the Bronco soccer teams, the 6,800-seat facility also housed Santa Clara baseball until 2005.

The stadium was dedicated on October 6, 1962, prior to the football game between Santa Clara and Occidental, but was first used in the Broncos' loss to UC Davis on Sept. 22, 1962. Buck Shaw Stadium earned national attention in 1996, when it played host to the NCAA Women's College Cup. The two-day attendance of 17,600 set a record for the event. In 1994, the facility served as the practice site for the Brazilian national team during the World Cup competition. The U.S. national team and the Japanese national team have also trained at Buck Shaw.



Oakland Alameda County Coliseum

Oakland Alameda County Coliseum has been the sight of a number of memorable soccer matches over the past three years since the Oakland Athletics ownership group invested in Major League Soccer. The venue hosted the sold-out match between the Mexican National Team against Ecuador with more than 47,000 fans in attendance in 2007. The following year, the Mexican Under-23 team played the Australian Under-23 team in front of another sold-out crowd.

In 2008, the Earthquakes played three matches at the Coliseum, attracting great crowds for all games. The Quakes returned to MLS against the Chicago Fire on April 12, 2008 in front of 20,038 fans. On June 14, 2008, the Earthquakes set their all-time attendance record for a non-doubleheader event against the Los Angeles Galaxy and David Beckham with 39,872 fans. The Galaxy's second appearance on August 3 drew 26,071 to the venue.

The Coliseum provides a memorable setting for any outdoor event. Recently having undergone a \$120 million renovation, the Coliseum plays host to international soccer games, concerts, conventions and other large gatherings in addition to serving as the home for the Oakland Athletics and Oakland Raiders.

Two of the A's World Championships have been won on the Coliseum's turf. The Coliseum's exceptional sight lines, fine weather and sizable staging areas have all contributed to its popularity among performers, promoters and the Bay Area public.

In October of 1995, the Coliseum began a \$120 million renovation project that added 22,000 new seats, 90 luxury suites, two private clubs and two state-of-the-art scoreboards.

The first crowd filled the Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum on Sept. 8, 1966, when the AFL's Oakland Raiders played the Kansas City Chiefs. The adjacent arena celebrated its grand opening on Nov. 9, 1966, when the Oakland Seals met the San Diego Gulls in hockey. In the ensuing 40-plus years, the facility has hosted every conceivable event in the entertainment history. Audiences numbering nearly 100 million have made the Coliseum and Arena the premier entertainment facilities in Northern California.

Earthquakes Season Credentials

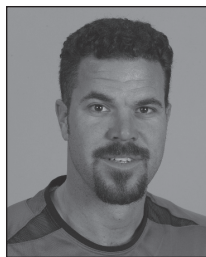

Troy Dayak
Color Analyst



Troy Dayak enters his second year handling color analyst duties for the San Jose Earthquakes after debuting on Comcast SportsNet broadcasts in 2008. His previous broadcasting work includes working as an analyst on Earthquakes radio broadcasts in 2005, as well as serving as an analyst for HDNet on MLS games.

Dayak spent parts of eight seasons as a player for the Earthquakes, starting his career with his hometown team in 1996. During that time, he established himself as one of the top defenders in the league and a fan favorite. Despite being setback by a number of career-threatening injuries, Dayak persevered to help lead the Earthquakes to MLS Cup titles in 2001 and 2003. He was also named MLS Comeback Player of the Year in 2001 and earned a spot on the all-star team that year.

Known as the "Beast", he made 129 appearances for San Jose in his career and remains in the top 10 in team history in appearances, starts and minutes played. He scored nine goals and recorded seven assists for the Quakes. He also scored one of the biggest goals in team history, netting the overtime game-winner against the Miami Fusion in 2001 to send the Quakes to their first-ever MLS Cup Final.

Dayak also spent time with the San Francisco Bay Blackhawks (APSL) and the San Francisco Bay Seals (A-League), while playing indoor soccer for the Cleveland Crunch and San Jose Grizzlies.

After his playing career, he was the first head coach for the California Cougars indoor soccer team in Stockton. Along with broadcasting, he serves as the Director of Coaching for Livermore Youth Soccer, while also providing training services around Northern California. In addition to coaching, Dayak owns and operates Dayak's Den Soccer Shop, which has locations in Tracy, Merced and shops on the way in Fremont and Livermore.
