THE WORLD'S GAME ARRIVES

The Dream

When Seattle was awarded the 15th Major League Soccer franchise on November 12, 2007, it marked both the successful finish of a sprint and a marathon.

For some, it may seem that the city's wait for the return of top-flight professional soccer was relatively short and simple. But, in fact, the arrival of the world's game had been in the making for many years and it required the participation of thousands throughout the state of Washington.

As evidenced by the record demand for Sounders FC season tickets, the fans were always ready. Yet, over a span of some 24 years, an integral piece was always missing.

Then, suddenly, in 2007 everything began falling into place: a respectable, growing league in MLS. A world-class venue for the game in Qwest Field. And, finally, an ownership group exhibiting rare vision, fan commitment and interest in taking the sport to an unprecedented level in America.

They are comprised by a unique blend of sports and entertainment know-how, including three self-confessed longtime soccer enthusiasts.

Majority stakeholder Joe Roth is a Hollywood heavyweight, having been a successful movie executive for 35 years. Better still, he has played, coached and loved soccer since his boyhood. Joining him are Adrian Hanauer, former majority owner of the USL Seattle Sounders; Paul Allen's Vulcan Sports & Entertainment (VSE); and actor/comedian Drew Carey.

"Why Seattle?" asked MLS Commissioner Don Garber. "Visionary ownership, a soccer-savvy and international, diverse city, and an ownership which understands how to operate a team. We're sure this will be a formula for success."

"Seattle is primed to become the home city of soccer in America," stated Roth. "I have lofty goals, but that's the bet I'm making. I believe my partners will be the ones who bring it home."

Milestones



July 17, 1997 – The building of Qwest Field was made possible by the passage of a \$300 million public funding package by Washington state voters based on the promise to keep the Seahawks and bring professional soccer to Seattle.

November 12, 2007 – Drew Carey visited George & Dragon, a local soccer pub, to announce a new MLS team in Seattle. Later that same day he raised the 12th Man Flag at a Seahawks game.



Ten years after the state's soccer community helped vote to fund the construction of a world-class stadium, VSE CEO Tod Leiweke is confident that Qwest Field will prove to be the sport's best venue.

"In 2009 it's going to be the loudest stadium in MLS," Leiweke said. "We have 24,500 seats in the lower bowl, and we believe they will be filled."

Leiweke praised the patience and persistence of the local soccer community. By the morning after the team's announcement, deposits had been made on 3,000 season tickets. Within a month, the number swelled to 10,000 and going into the inaugural season, Seattle boasts more than 19,000 season ticket holders.

Support of pro soccer in the Puget Sound region has never been in question. The original Sounders were among the North American Soccer League attendance leaders, averaging 18,300 between 1974-82. The reincarnation of the Sounders set a United Soccer League single-game record by attracting 25,515 to Qwest Field in 2002.

Community leaders had first attempted to secure an MLS charter franchise for 1996. Although there was sufficient fan interest, Seattle was without a suitable facility.

The Sports & Events Council endeavored to sustain the campaign's momentum, remaining mobilized for the next few years.

Enter Paul Allen.

The new owner of the NFL's Seahawks, Allen campaigned in the spring of 1997 for a new stadium to replace the Kingdome. The soccer community soon forged a relationship with Allen's organization, urging families throughout the state to approve the referendum. If it passed, then-MLS Commissioner Doug Logan promised an expansion team. With the help of soccer moms and dads, the stadium referendum won with 51.5 percent of the vote.

Seattle came very close to becoming the league's 13th team in 2005. Still, the pieces were beginning to fall into place. Hanauer and Leiweke worked in unison, welcoming high-profile international events and exhibitions, including Qwest capacity crowds to see Manchester United and Real Madrid.

And then one day in early 2007, Roth awoke with the desire to run an MLS team. Garber pointed him toward the Northwest. Roth landed in Seattle soon after.

The more he saw, the more he liked. From the Sounders legacy to the great success (more Washington players per capita than any other state) of the youth programs to the fact that Seattle is regarded as the gateway to Asia and the Pacific Rim.

"Soccer had many saviors," noted Fred Mendoza, a longtime soccer proponent who was appointed to the Public Stadium Authority by the governor. "They were all determined to keep the dream alive."

"There are so many people who should feel proud of being the foundation upon which we build MLS in Seattle," said Hanauer. "And there will be many more to come in the future as well."

November 13, 2007 - After securing an ownership agreement with Hollywood movie studio executive Joe Roth, Seattle Sounders owner Adrian Hanauer, actor and comedian Drew Carey and Vulcan Sports & Entertainment, Major League Soccer's Commissioner Don Garber announces expansion team Major League Soccer in Seattle as MLS' 15th club. The team names Adrian Hanauer General Manager of Soccer Operations, and season ticket membership deposits go on sale.



Democracy in Sports

While pouring the foundation of the Sounders FC, every effort is being made to make the fans part of the process.

Democracy in Sports is more than simply a philosophy for the Seattle MLS franchise. It's all about giving the supporters a voice, a say in the direction of the club.

It was the fans who mobilized and voted in overwhelming numbers in naming the team. They will vote for their own leaders on the Members Association Council, a group which will meet regularly with the owners and senior management.

Most significantly, the Sounders FC Members Association, now known as the Alliance, has a voice in who leads the team. Every four years, they can vote out the Seattle general manager.

Drew Carey is an owner and honorary chairman of the Alliance. It was Carey who first championed the concept of Democracy in Sports. He had seen European clubs such as FC Barcelona empowering its members in similar fashion.

"I'm very excited about what we're doing in Seattle," said Carey. "I hope this becomes a model for every professional sports organization in America."

It was apparent from the very beginning that Carey and his partners were sincere. He journeyed to a crowded local soccer pub to confirm an MLS team was coming to Seattle, doing so a full day before the official announcement.

Scores of youth players from the community were invited to greet the arrival of hometown hero Kasey Keller. Hours after the announcement of Freddie Ljungberg's signing, the supporters were gathered together for a forum with the Swedish star, majority owner Joe Roth, General Manager Adrian Hanauer and Tod Leiweke, CEO of Vulcan Sports & Entertainment.

Sounders FC and Qwest Field staff

have engaged fans in forming and growing supporters groups.

Most notably, the people were given the opportunity to name their club. In a true demonstration of democracy, the fans organized themselves, requesting that the ballot include a write-in option, in addition to three other suggestions from the club.

Nearly 15,000 votes were cast. More than 80 percent of the write-in votes were for some derivation of Sounders FC.


"It was a groundswell," said Roth. "I think it's a great start for the franchise. It's a great start for us as owners to trust the fans, to show that we are about democracy in sports and set-up situations in which fans have rights that they don't have with other American sports teams."

Hanauer is an owner and, as GM, resident of the hot seat. A fan himself, he knows that the more supporters are involved, the more passionate their support of the team on the field.

"This has always been the fans' team, and it will continue to be the fans' team," Hanauer said. "Our job is to carry the torch and be stewards of this franchise, but our dedication will be to the fans."

Through the Alliance, the Council and an Advisory Board comprised of community representatives, Sounders FC intend to always be listening, always be responsive.

"This is right on the money with what I originally envisioned," said Carey, "and what we're doing is pretty amazing. I really hope it catches on with other sports franchises. That's my big dream."





November 14, 2007 – Team announces more than 3,000 season ticket memberships have been sold.

November 19, 2007 – Team announces more than 6,500 season ticket memberships have been sold.

December 12, 2007 – Team announces more than 10,000 season ticket deposits have been sold.



March 24, 2008 – MLS Seattle names former Seahawks Vice President Gary Wright as Senior Vice President of Business Operations, overseeing all business operations for the club including ticket sales, corporate partnerships, community outreach, charities, fan experience and marketing of the team.



January 24, 2008 – MLS Seattle hires MLS original Chris Henderson to serve as Technical Director, assisting General Manager Adrian Hanauer in all areas of soccer operations, including scouting, player management, coaching decisions, and the youth system.




February 22, 2008 – Seattle MLS and Washington Youth Soccer hire Darren Sawatzky to help identify and develop elite local talent.



March 25, 2008 – MLS Seattle takes lead with democracy in sports, as the club announces fans will have the opportunity to vote for team name. The options include: Seattle Alliance, Seattle FC, Seattle Republic, and Write-In Vote for those fans passionate about another name.

April 7, 2008 - Votes are in and MLS Seattle announces the club to be named Seattle Sounders FC. Nearly 15,000 fans registered their vote during the four-day election with approximately 50% of the voters submitting a write-in name, 80% of which included a derivative of the name Sounders. The name Sounders has been identified with soccer in this community since 1974. That same day the colors and badge for Seattle Sounders FC are revealed.

April 29, 2008 - Sounders FC announce ticket pricing and dedicated web site.



April 30, 2008 – 14,700 season ticket memberships purchased to date, Seattle Sounders FC announces season ticket packages to be based on an 18-match home schedule with prices starting as low as \$288 for a full-season ticket package. All home matches to be played at Qwest Field with a seating capacity of 24,500.




May 7, 2008 – Seattle Sounders FC signs French forward, and member of USL First Division Seattle Sounders, Sebastien Le Toux to a multi-year contract. Le Toux is the first player to sign with the club.

May 16, 2008 – Seattle Sounders FC launch as the club's Members Association, activating the promise of owner Drew Carey to involve the fans in the decision-making process of the team. Carey to serve as the association's chairman. Eventually on November 21, FSN becomes the presenting sponsor of the Members Association now known as the



May 28, 2008 – Seattle Sounders FC announces a multi-year partnership with Microsoft Corp. and Xbox 360 video game and entertainment system. The landmark deal is highlighted by the 'Xbox 360 LIVE' logo featured prominently on the Sounders FC jersey.



May 31, 2008 – Sounders FC merchandise available online and through team Pro Shop.

June 1, 2008 – Sounders FC percussion and brass band auditions held at Qwest Field.



July 21, 2008 – Seattle Sounders FC and BELO reach a multi-year television partnership agreement to broadcast Sounders FC games on KING-6/16 and KING-5. Every home and away Sounders FC match to be broadcast live on KING-6/16 or KING-5, except those broadcast nationally. Each broadcast will feature an exclusive pregame show and a postgame wrap-up. BELO will also produce a weekly show. Former "Voice of the Sonics," Kevin Calabro, to serve as club's play-by-play announcer for all Sounders FC matches.



August 14, 2008 - Seattle Sounders FC sign celebrated goalkeeper Kasey Keller. The Olympia native and U.S. team captain becomes the second player to sign.



September 5, 2008 - Gambian midfielder Sanna Nyassi became the third player to sign with Seattle Sounders FC.



October 23, 2008 - Sounders FC announces open tryouts in three Washington cities that will be filmed into a reality television format aired on network television.

October 28, 2008 - After 10 years in the English Premier League, Swed-ish player Freddie Ljungberg signs with Seattle Sounders FC as Designated Player.



November 21, 2008 - Sounders FC announces a partnership with FSN which will broadcast a weekly magazine show and replays of matches.

November 26, 2008 - Ten players including Eugene, Oregon, native and U.S. National Team forward Nate Jaqua are selected in the MLS Expansion Draft.






December 4, 2008 – A fashion show at WaMu Theatre featuring Hollywood models and Sounders FC players unveiled the team's kit, training gear and off-the-field adidas apparel.



December 5, 2008 – Sounders FC supporters vote to name their members association the Sounders FC Alliance and the team's marching band the Sound Wave.



December 16, 2008 – Two-time MLS Coach of the Year Sigi Schmid signs to become first Sounders FC coach after leading Columbus to both the 2008 Supporters' Shield and MLS Cup title.



December 22, 2008 – Sounders FC hires former USL-1 Sounders head coach Brian Schmetzer as top assistant coach.



January 15, 2009 – The Sounders FC selected Steve Zakuani with first overall pick in the 2009 MLS SuperDraft. The team also selected Evan Brown (2nd round), Jared Karkas (3rd) and Michael Fucito (4th).

January 20, 2009 – Seattle Sounders FC completed its coaching staff with the addition of Ezra Hendrickson as an assistant coach.



December 29, 2008 – Sounders FC names former USL-1 Sounders Coach Tom Dutra goalkeeper coach.

January 5, 2009 – Chris Eylander, who led USL First Division goalkeepers in saves in 2007 and 2008, signs with Seattle Sounders FC.


January 9, 2009 – David Tenney announced as the Sounders FC fitness coach.

JOE ROTH

MAJORITY OWNER



Joe Roth is the founder of Revolution Studios and, as the majority owner of Sounders FC, brought top-flight professional soccer to Seattle, and foresees the Emerald City becoming the sport's North American capital.

During his career in the entertainment industry, Roth has served as chairman of both the Walt Disney Studios and Twentieth Century Fox. In May of 2000, He founded Revolution Studios which released 46 feature films between 2001 and 2007, including *Black Hawk Down*, which won two Academy Awards®, and *XXX*, which earned more than \$275 million worldwide, as well as *Anger Management*, *Daddy Day Care*, *Hellboy*, *13 Going On 30*, *White Chicks*, *The Forgotten*, *Rocky Balboa*, *Across the Universe* and *The Waterhorse*.

He has also directed six films, the most recent which include, *America's Sweethearts*, *Christmas with the Kranks* and *Freedomland*.

In 2004, Mr. Roth was the Emmy Award® nominated producer of the 76th Annual Academy Awards, which received 10 Emmy Award® nominations, including one for Outstanding Variety, Music or Comedy Special, and won an Emmy for Outstanding Directing for a Variety, Music or Comedy Program.

From August 1994 through January 2000, Roth ran Walt Disney Studios, first as Chairman of the Walt Disney Motion Pictures Group, then, beginning in April 1996, as Chairman of The Walt Disney Studios. He led the studio to worldwide market dominance over the five years with an industry-leading 18 films grossing over \$100 million domestically. Three of those films — *The Sixth Sense*, *Toy Story 2* and *Armageddon* -- grossed more than

\$200 million in the United States alone. Roth helped to build Buena Vista International into the market leader, finishing first in market share five times in six years, the only company to gross over one billion dollars in each of those years. The studio's 1999 Best Picture nominees, *The Insider* and *The Sixth Sense*, led Disney to an industry-leading 17 Academy Award® nominations.

From 1992 to 1994, Roth, with Roger Birnbaum, headed Caravan Pictures, which produced such hits as *While You Were Sleeping*, *Angels in the Outfield* and *The Three Musketeers* for Disney.

Before establishing Caravan Pictures, Roth served as Chairman of Twentieth Century Fox from July 1989 until November 1992. During his tenure at the studio, the company made such successful films as *Home Alone*, *Home Alone 2: Lost in New York*, *Die Hard 2*, *Sleeping with the Enemy*, *Mrs. Doubtfire*, *My Cousin Vinny*, *White Men Can't Jump*, *Edward Scissorhands*, *The Commitments* and *The Last of the Mohicans*.

Prior to Twentieth Century Fox, Roth was a highly successful independent producer/director, co-founding Morgan Creek Pictures, for which he produced such films as *Young Guns*, *Dead Ringers*, *Major League* and *Bachelor Party*. Roth directed both *Streets of Gold* and *Revenge of the Nerds II* for Twentieth Century Fox, and *Coupe De Ville* for Universal Pictures.

Among Roth's projects currently in production is the *Alice in Wonderland*, which is being directed by Tim Burton and starring, Johnny Depp and Anne Hathaway and is scheduled for a 2010 release.

Equally noted for his diverse civic and charitable activities, Roth has received various awards such as the 1991 Variety Clubs Man of the Year award, the 1996 Humanitarian Award from the NCCJ, the 1997 American Museum of Moving Image award and was honored in 1998 by APLA and the National Multiple Sclerosis Society. Roth was also the recipient of the 2004 Dorothy and Sherrill C. Corwin Human Relations Award from the American Jewish Committee, and is an active supporter of the AIDS alliance. Presently, Roth serves as a board member for the non-profit Save the Children.

A lifelong fan, player and coach, Roth now wishes to further his association with soccer by taking the professional game in America to a much higher level of competitiveness and visibility. A New York City native, Roth grew up in the soccer hotbed of Long Island and played from age 10 into his first two years of college. He saw action for both Bowling Green and Hofstra before a career-ending leg injury. He graduated from Boston University in 1970.

Roth and has three children, Zachary, Julia and David and was involved in coaching his son Zachary's team for 15 years.

ADRIAN HANAUER

OWNER & GENERAL MANAGER



Adrian Hanauer first kept the flame of professional soccer alive in Seattle before helping to reignite the community's passion for the game with the arrival of a Major League Soccer expansion franchise for 2009. Hanauer is both an owner and the Sounders FC general manager.

Since 2001, Hanauer has been associated with the highest level of soccer played in Seattle. He first joined the ownership group of the Sounders franchise in the United Soccer Leagues First Division, and later became majority shareholder and general manager. His first season in that role, 2002, was rewarded with Seattle going 23-4-1—the second-best record in league history. From 2004 to 2007, the Sounders played in the USL-1 championship

game three times, winning twice (2005, 2007) and also taking a Commissioner's Cup (best record) in 2007.

Hanauer has over 20 years of business experience in a variety of other industries. On numerous occasions he has made early stage investments in technology companies with interests in advertising, infrastructure, and wireless communications. Hanauer co-founded Curious Office Partners, which invests in and incubates early stage technology companies. He was a seed stage investor in aQuantive Inc, the largest interactive advertising company which was later acquired by Microsoft for \$6 billion US, and he was also an early investor in Amazon.com.

Hanauer also brings a great deal of "brick and mortar" business experience. The Hanauer family owns Pacific Coast Feather Co., the nation's largest manufacturer of pillows, comforters, and bedding products. He also owns one of the largest chains of picture framing companies in the United States, as well as a small chain of pizza restaurants.

Involved in many organizations in Seattle, Hanauer sits on the Board of Trustees for the Museum of History and Industry. He has also sat on the advisory board of The University of Washington Intercollegiate Sports Master's Degree Program.


Hanauer's interest in soccer began at the age of 3, and he saw his first NASL Sounders game at the age of 8. He went on to play for Mercer Island High School and remains active in the Greater Seattle Soccer League.

In addition to his interest in Sounders FC, Hanauer also is a board member of England's Cambridge United Football Club, currently of the English Conference (fifth tier). While with the USL Sounders, Hanauer promoted international matches, most notably an exhibition between Real Madrid and D.C. United which attracted the largest crowd in Seattle history (66,612) to Qwest Field in 2006. The Sounders also arranged friendlies featuring Mexico's Club America and Britain's Sunderland, Cardiff City FC and Preston North End.

Hanauer, 42 (2/7/1966) enjoys skiing, snowboarding, traveling and playing soccer. He is a graduate of the University of Washington, having majored in history, and lives in Seattle.

PAUL G. ALLEN

OWNER



Paul G. Allen helped bring major league soccer to the northwest when his Vulcan Sports & Entertainment joined the ownership group behind the Sounders FC. The announcement in 2007 was the result of years of work and enthusiasm on behalf of Seattle soccer fans.

Allen had visions of world-class soccer in his hometown since soon after purchasing the Seattle Seahawks of the National Football League. Allen bought the club to save pro football in Seattle after the former owners threatened to move the team to southern California.

On June 17, 1997 the voters of Washington State approved "Referendum 48" to authorize a public/private partnership to construct a stadium, exhibition center, and parking facilities. One of the keys to the success of the vote was statewide support from the soccer community and its hope to one day see professional soccer, played at the highest level, return to the northwest.

Growing up in the Seattle, Allen's passion for sports began as a young boy when he'd attend University of Washington football games. As years passed, a fondness toward the Seahawks developed.

"From the beginning of this process, my goals have been to work with the community to create a lasting asset for our future; and to ensure the long-term success of the Seahawks," said Allen at the time of purchasing the franchise. He also wanted to "create a world-class facility for the state of Washington."

That became a reality in 2002 with the opening of the Seahawks Stadium and Exhibition Center, renamed Qwest Field & Qwest Field Event Center in 2004. An open air facility which many critics argue

is the best venue in the National Football League, Qwest Field is home to over 300 events annually ranging from soccer, to Supercross, concerts, graduation ceremonies, and trade shows.

"It exceeds the vision we had originally," Allen said shortly after the opening of the stadium. "We had a bunch of goals about trying to create a really intimate stadium that would be great for the fans, to have elegant architecture, and I think we've ended up with a fantastic facility."

Allen is one of the nation's best-known and generous philanthropists. He co-founded Microsoft with Bill Gates in 1976 and continues to be an innovator in the world of business and technology. He is founder and chairman of Vulcan Inc., which oversees his philanthropy and business interests. He also is chairman of Charter Communications and owner of the NBA's Portland Trail Blazers.

Allen has been named one of the top philanthropists in America - with lifetime giving totaling more than \$900 million - and is committed to giving back to communities throughout the northwest. Allen gives back to the community through the Paul G. Allen Family Foundation, which strengthens communities and supports vulnerable populations in the areas of arts and culture, health and human services, opportunities for youth, and scientific advancement. In 2003 he pledged \$100 million for creation of the Allen Institute for Brain Science in Seattle. The nonprofit Allen Institute was founded as an innovative and unprecedented resource for neuroscientists around the world. In 2006 the Allen Institute completed its inaugural project, the Allen Brain Atlas—Mouse Brain. The mouse brain atlas is a Web-based, three-dimensional map of gene expression in the mouse brain which is freely accessible online and available at no cost. Detailing more than 21,000 genes at the cellular level, the Atlas continues to help lead scientists to new insights about neurological function and disease. In 2008 the Allen Institute announced three new major atlas projects -- the Allen Brain Atlas (ABA)—Human Brain, ABA—Developing Mouse Brain, and ABA—Mouse Spinal Cord. The new atlases are designed to accelerate brain, and spinal cord research, dramatically advancing the field of neuroscience.

Inspired by growing up in the era of the "space race," with its Mercury, Gemini, and Apollo missions, Allen underscored his passion for rocketry by sponsoring the development of SpaceShipOne, the first privately funded spacecraft to successfully attain suborbital space. He founded the Experience Music Project, Seattle's critically acclaimed interactive music museum; the Science Fiction Museum and Hall of Fame; Flying Heritage Collection -- a collection of rare World War II aircraft restored to flying condition; and, Vulcan Productions, the independent film production company behind *Hard Candy*, *Far From Heaven*, *"RX for Survival: A Global Health Challenge"* series on PBS, *"The Blues,"* executive produced by Martin Scorsese in conjunction with Allen and Jody Patton and the 2001 *"Evolution"* series on PBS. DREW CAREY

OWNER



Drew Carey is a comedian, actor and is now regarded as American soccer's most recognizable supporter. Carey is an owner of Seattle Sounders FC and serves as chairman of Sounders FC Alliance presented by FSN, the club's member association.

The host of *The Price is Right* on CBS, Carey

first gained popularity while starring in his own sitcom, *The Drew Carey Show*, and serving as host and producer of the U.S. version of *Whose Line Is It Anyway?* He has also hosted *The Power of 10* game show on CBS.

While in the Marine Reserves, his military buzz cut and black wide-rim glasses became part of his trademark look. He began his successful career as a comedian in April of 1986 at the Cleveland Comedy Club. One of his first big breaks was competing on *Star Search '88*. In 1991, Carey landed a spot on HBO's *14th Annual Young Comedians Special* and appeared on *The Tonight Show with Johnny Carson*. Carey openly credits Carson with launching his career. He received a Star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame in 2003.

Carey's interest in soccer began while attending an L.A. Galaxy game in 2003. He learned more about the game and, during a later visit to Spain, saw the Barcelona FC team in action. He also worked as a press photographer during the 2006 World Cup in Germany, his efforts chronicled on a Travel Channel show entitled *Drew Carey's Sporting Adventures*. He has regularly attended U.S. National Team qualifying games, both at home and on the road, and his photos have appeared in numerous publications.

During his travels Carey became fascinated with the empowerment of supporters at such clubs as Barcelona and Real Madrid, where leadership positions are voted upon by the members. He brought that idea to Sounders FC, where members will vote on various matters, most notably the fate of the general manager every four years. Carey is also the driving force for Seattle's 53-piece marching band, Sound Wave.

Carey, 50 (5/23/58), is a native of Cleveland, Ohio.



TOD LEIWEKE

CEO VULCAN SPORTS & ENTERTAINMENT



Tod Leiweke is in his seventh season with the organization and was instrumental in bringing Major League Soccer to Seattle and fulfilling a promise made by Paul Allen to bring professional soccer to Qwest Field. As CEO of Vulcan Sports & Entertainment, Leiweke oversees all aspects of the Seattle Seahawks and manages Allen's minority ownership interest for Seattle Sounders FC. He is also president of First & Goal Inc., which operates Qwest Field and Event Center for the state of Washington.

On March 1, 2007, Allen appointed Leiweke to head a new entity, Vulcan Sports and Entertainment, an organization which envelops Sounders FC, the Seahawks, First and Goal Inc., the Portland Trail Blazers and Rose Garden. Initially, Leiweke served as Seahawks CEO since June 2003.

The 2009 MLS season marks Leiweke's 27th in professional sports and a return to his roots. He played soccer as a youth in the sport's bastion, St. Louis. In 1981 he joined two of his brothers, Tracey and Tim, in operating the Kansas City Comets of the Major Indoor Soccer League. The Comets proved to both successful on the field and popular with spectators, drawing capacity crowds to Kemper Arena. Leiweke later became general manager of another MISL franchise, the New York Arrows, located on Long Island.

Soon after arriving in Seattle, Leiweke sought to engage Seahawks fans in a meaningful way and to make good on Allen's promise to bring top-flight soccer to Qwest Field. In 2005, Qwest Field was named by The Sporting News as the finest venue in the National Football League. That year was historic both on and off the field. In addition to winning the NFC Championship and advancing to the

team's first Super Bowl, the Seahawks won the 2005 NFL Sports Fan's Quality Award as the league's "Fan Friendliest" team. During the annual NFL meetings, Commissioner Paul Tagliabue commented on the extraordinary support and involvement of Seahawks fans.

In 2006 under Leiweke's direction, the Seahawks sold season tickets for the first time since the early 1990's and developed Blue Pride, the team's season ticket waiting list. By the end of the 2008 NFL season, Seattle had extended its sell-out streak at Qwest Field to 52 consecutive games. It is also generally regarded as the loudest stadium in the NFL, and Leiweke has stated it will soon become the loudest in MLS. Sounders FC has established a league record for season ticket sales more than six months before the first home game.

Leiweke's vision is an organization that is committed on behalf of its fans to winning in the stadium and in the community. Leiweke was instrumental in forming the "Spirit of 12" Partnerships with the Seahawks. Teaming with Qwest Communications, the partnership benefits the American Heart Association, Boys & Girls Clubs Washington State Association, Camp Fire USA, Treehouse, and YMCA of Greater Seattle. Leiweke serves as a board member on a number of Washington-based organizations including Washington CEO Roundtable, YMCA of Greater Seattle, and The Space Needle. He was a leader in launching the annual Boeing Classic golf tournament in 2005 and serves as co-chair of the Executive Committee. The tournament has raised over 2.3 million its first four years with the primary beneficiary being The Heart Institute at Virginia Mason Medical Center.

Before joining Vulcan Sports & Entertainment, Leiweke served as president of the Minnesota Wild and chief operating officer of Minnesota Sports & Entertainment (MSE). The Sports Fans of America Association, Inc. awarded the Wild its 2003 NHL Sports Fan's Quality Award to the Wild as the league's "Fan Friendliest" team. In an ESPN survey conducted in 2003, Minnesota was ranked No. 1 for stadium experience and No. 2 for fan relationships among 123 sports franchises. The Wild played to sellouts for every game in their first four seasons.

Prior to joining the Wild, Leiweke served as the inaugural executive director of The First Tee organization which welcomed underprivileged youth into the world of golf through the development of golf facilities throughout North America. Leiweke has also held executive positions with the PGA TOUR, the NHL's Vancouver Canucks and the NBA's Golden State Warriors. His older brother Tim Leiweke is also actively involved in MLS as President and CEO of AEG, which operates both the L.A. Galaxy and Houston Dynamo.

Leiweke, 49 (1/12/60), is married to Tara, with two children, Tyler and Tori.

Martha Fuller serves as senior vice president & CFO of Vulcan Sports & Entertainment, the parent company representing the interests of the Seahawks, Sounders FC, the Portland Trail Blazers, First & Goal Inc./Qwest Field and Event Center, and The Rose Garden. Her responsibilities

include the financial oversight, including budgeting, cash flow management, NFL economic issues, investments, facilities development, financial reporting and analysis, debt issuance, capital transactions, reporting to the Washington State Public Stadium Authority and risk management. Ms. Fuller also directs the organizations' political affairs and long-term strategic planning, as well as new business development opportunities for Vulcan Sports and Entertainment. Fuller, 46, came to Seattle in 2004, following two years as Director of Planning & Economic Development for the City of St. Paul, where she oversaw the city's housing and economic development portfolio – including the City's four-year, 5000-unit housing development initiative. In 1997, she was appointed the CFO of the NHL's Minnesota Wild expansion franchise, becoming the first female in the League's history to hold that position. At the Wild, she was responsible for negotiation of the Xcel Energy Center lease with the City of Saint Paul, related loan agreement with the State of Minnesota, various contracts relating to construction of the Xcel Energy Center, the purchase of the Minnesota Club building (home of the organization's offices), and the agreement under which an affiliate of the Wild manages the Xcel Energy Center and adjacent city convention facility. Fuller also developed and implemented the team's equity and debt financing arrangements, and oversaw the financial and legal transactions necessary for consummating the team's expansion agreement with the NHL. She began her career working for Arthur Andersen, then Andersen Consulting, from 1984-95, before moving on to become the Director of Finance for the City of St. Paul from 1995-97. Fuller serves as Chair of the American Heart Association's 2009 Seattle GoRed initiative and the Board of enterpriseSeattle, Vice Chair of the Board of the Humane Society of Seattle/King County, President of the Washington State Sports and Entertainment Facilities Operator Association and is a member of the Boards of the American Heart Association and the Seattle Chamber of Commerce. She is a summa cum laude graduate of Drake University. Fuller is married to Redmond, Washington Fire Chief Tim Fuller. They reside in downtown Seattle with their springer spaniel, Rustler.

In 2007, John Rizzardini assumed the position of Chief Operating Officer for the Seahawks, Sounders FC and First & Goal Inc. In this role, his priorities are to increase revenues in primary areas of corporate partnership, tickets, broadcast, suites, retail and promotions. He also oversees

the day-to-day business operations for the teams that include branding, game presentation, HR, website and customer service. Rizzardini oversees management of the operations of Qwest Field and Qwest Field Event Center and the WaMu Theater. One of the first Sounders FC acts was the hiring of Chris Henderson as technical director in January of 2008. Henderson assists the team's general manager, Adrian Hanauer, in all areas of soccer operations, including scouting, player management, coaching decisions and the youth system.

Henderson is regarded as one of the most successful players ever produced by the state of Washington, having represented the U.S. at the international level 79 times and winning championships in both MLS and the NCAA. An MLS original, Henderson played 11 seasons for five teams. Upon his retirement following the 2006 season, he was league record-holder in four categories, including career games played (317) and started (304). He currently ranks No. 2 in those areas, as well as minutes played (26,242). Henderson still shares the MLS single game assist record (four assists for Kansas City in 1999) and his 80 regular-season assists is No. 8 all-time. He finished his career with 51 goals. Henderson joined Seattle after spending the 2007 season as an assistant coach for Kansas City under Curt Onalfo. Henderson began his MLS career with Colorado for the inaugural season of 1996 and he would play six full seasons for the Rapids with five of those squads reaching the playoffs. He set club records for career appearances and assists, and in 1997 earned a spot in the MLS All-Star Game and also help Colorado reach the MLS Cup Final. Henderson achieved a career high for goals (11) and again made the All-Star Game to begin his second stint for the Rapids in 2002. From 1999-2000 he played in Kansas City, helping the Wizards win the 2000 MLS Cup. That season he played in a career-high 38 games, scoring 10 goals and adding nine assists. He spent the 2001 season with the Miami Fusion before returning to Colorado. He was traded during the 2005 season to Columbus and completed his career with New York in 2006. Henderson played two seasons at UCLA, helping the Bruins win an NCAA championship and earning All-America honors in 1990. He connected on penalty kicks during tiebreaker wins in both the semifinal and final. Earlier that year, Henderson began senior international play prior to the 1990 World Cup. At age 19, he was the youngest member of the United States roster. He was also a member of the 1992 U.S. Olympic Team and an alternate on the 1994 and 1998 World Cup squads. He set a team record with five assists in 1993 and ranks 10th in career assists (10). In 2004, the Chris

Henderson Foundation was launched, giving grants to fight Leukemia and to underprivileged children. He was named his MLS club's Humanitarian of the Year for both Colorado and New York. Born in Edmonds, Wash., Henderson, 38 (12/11/1970), attended Everett's Cascade High School where he earned the 1989 Washington Gatorade Player of the Year award. He played for the FC Seattle Storm in 1989 and began his professional career with Germany's FSV Frankfurt (1994-95) and Norway's Staebak (1995). He is married to Dee and has two children, Aidan and Annelise. His younger brother Sean played for UCLA, the USL Sounders and three seasons in MLS.

GRANT CLARK TEAM ADMINISTRATION DIRECTOR



As Team Administrator, Grant Clark oversees the team's preseason training camps, team travel, scheduling and administrative issues. He works closely with the coaching staff and players in the day-to-day operation of the team. Clark came to Sounders FC after

SIGI SCHMID

HEAD COACH

Sigi Schmid was named the first head coach of Seattle Sounders FC on December 16, 2008, and is recognized as one of the most successful coaches in MLS history. Since 1999, Schmid's teams have won six major titles, including two MLS Cups.

Schmid is the most successful active coach in MLS history and a two-time coach of the year. Last season, he guided the Columbus Crew to both their first MLS Cup and Supporters' Shield (best regular season point total), earning MLS Coach of the Year.

From 1999 through 2004 Schmid's L.A. Galaxy teams won four major competitions: 2002 MLS Cup, 2002 MLS Supporters' Shield, 2001 U.S. Open Cup and the 2001 CONCACAF Champions' Cup.

He was voted the MLS Coach of the Year in his first season, 1999. Altogether, his Galaxy teams were 79-53-32 and reached the MLS Cup final four times and won three division crowns.

Schmid ranks No. 2 in MLS career victories (113), behind only Bob Bradley (124), current U.S. National Team coach. In nine seasons, Schmid's teams have won 113 games, lost 86 and tied 57. His combined postseason win total (19) from L.A. and Columbus is the highest in MLS history.

At Columbus, Schmid inherited a sixth-place team. The Crew improved their win totals from eight to 11 in 2007 and to 17 in 2008. His three-year mark in Ohio was 34-33-25, culminating with the title.

Twice Schmid has served as U.S. Under-20 National Team head coach, most recently in 2005 at the FIFA World Championships. Schmid was an assistant to Bora Milutinovic on the Americans' 1994 World Cup team. He also was head coach for the 1991 World University Games and 1995 Pan

American Games.

Schmid has coached six of the current Seattle roster players at the pro, college or national team level. Peter Vagenas was a member of both championship teams at UCLA (1997) and the Galaxy (2002) and Brad Evans played for Schmid in Columbus. Nathan Sturgis was a member of the U-20 National Team in 2005 and Kasey Keller was with Schmid and the national B team in 1989.

Scores of Schmid's UCLA players have played professionally and internationally, including Sounders FC technical director Chris Henderson (1989-90). Others include Brad Friedel, Cobi Jones, Paul Caligiuri, Eddie Lewis and Carlos Bocanegra.

Schmid first forged a winning tradition at his alma mater, UCLA. After serving as an assistant, he was elevated to head coach of the Bruins in 1980, beginning a 19-year run at the helm. His first NCAA championship was won in 1985 at Seattle's Kingdome.

UCLA went on to claim two more national titles in 1990 and '97. Schmid was named national coach of the year following the '97 championship. When he left to take over the Galaxy, his UCLA teams had accumulated a record of 322-63-33.

Schmid is a member of both the National Soccer and UCLA halls of fame.

Born in Tuebingen, Germany, Schmid relocated with his family to the U.S. in 1956, and to Torrance, Ca., in 1962. He was a four-year starter at UCLA (1972-75). He graduated with a B.S. degree in economics in 1976 and later earned a M.A. in business administration from the University of Southern California. Schmid is a Certified Public Accountant.

He and his wife, Valerie, maintain a residence in Manhattan Beach. He has four children: Erik,



BRIAN SCHMETZER

ASSISTANT COACH

Brian Schmetzer was named the top assistant coach for Sigi Schmid's staff on December 22, 2008. He is one of the Puget Sound soccer community's most recognizable figures after playing and coaching for the region's top professional franchises since 1980.

Schmetzer, 46, joins Sounders FC following seven seasons as the head coach of the Sounders' United Soccer Leagues First Division club. He guided Seattle to USL-1 championships in 2005 and 2007, and U.S. Open Cup semifinal advancements in 2007 and 2008.

Schmetzer has nine years of experience coaching and 15 years of playing at the professional level. He was a member of six championship teams during that span.

Schmetzer was head coach of the USL-1 Sounders from 2002-07. In addition to the two league championships, his teams also twice won the Commissioner's Cup for the best record and qualified for the playoffs six of seven years. He was chosen USL-1 Coach of the Year in 2002 after going 23-4-1. The Sounders were league runners-up in 2004. His overall regular season record was 100-57-41.

Previously, he was assistant to Fernando Clavijo with the Seattle SeaDogs from 1996-97. Seattle won the Continental Indoor Soccer League title in 1997.

A Seattle native, Schmetzer signed with the Sounders' North American Soccer League franchise following his graduation from Nathan Hale High School in 1980. He played

three seasons as a midfielder for Seattle before going to Tulsa for the final NASL season in 1984.

Schmetzer was coached by his father as a youth and his team won seven out of 10 state youth championships.

Schmetzer signed with the San Diego Sockers in 1984 and played seven seasons in the Major Indoor Soccer

League with San Diego (1984-88), Tacoma (1988-90) and St. Louis (1990-91). He was a member of San Diego's MISL championship teams in 1985, 1986 and 1988. He returned to Seattle for the Sounders' inaugural A-League season in 1994 before completing his playing career with the SeaDogs from 1995-96.

In 1985, Schmetzer played on loan to FC Seattle, scoring twice in a 2-1 friendly win over Brazil's Santos. While with Tacoma and FC Seattle, Schmetzer's teammates included younger brothers Andy and Walter. Schmetzer has three children, Daniela, Colin and Kian. He enjoys cooking and outdoor activities.





TOM DUTRA

GOALKEEPER COACH

Tom Dutra was named the Sounders FC goalkeeper coach on December 29, 2008, and is recognized locally for his work in developing young keepers as well as training established professionals.

Dutra, 36, served two seasons as keeper coach under Brian Schmetzer for the USL Sounders. Schmetzer serves as head coach Sigi Schmid's top assistant.

Dutra has worked with Kasey Keller, the Sounders FC keeper, since 2002. Dutra conducted 1-on-1 training sessions to prepare Keller for his return to Europe each summer. Under Dutra's guidance the past two years, Chris Eylander twice led USL-1 in saves and finished second in shutouts.

At the amateur level, Dutra served two seasons (2007-08) as assistant coach for Saint Martin's University and was an assistant for five seasons (2002-06) at Pacific Lutheran. He was director of goalkeeping for Washington ODP in 2008 and served on the state ODP staff from 2002-04. Dutra was the goalkeeping director for Washington Premier FC from 2001-06 and also at Blackhills FC from 2001-08.


During his time with Washington Premier, Dutra worked with more than a dozen keepers who have played at the Division I collegiate level. Among those was Tally Hall, a member of the U.S. Youth National Team pool and currently playing for Esbjerg of the Danish Superliga (first division).

Dutra played four seasons in the A-League, first as a backup to Marcus Hahnemann on the Sounders' 1996 championship team. He later started for New Orleans and Lehigh Valley (Pa.).

Born and raised in Olympia, Dutra graduated from Timberline High School. He was a member of the youth national team program before sustaining a fractured leg. His career resumed in 1995 with the Oregon (Salem) Surge of the USISL Pro Division.

Tom is married to Mollie and they have two children, Tanner and Maggie.





EZRA HENDRICKSON

ASSISTANT COACH

Ezra Hendrickson was announced as an assistant coach on January 20, 2009, after completing a 14-year professional career, including 12 seasons in Major League Soccer.

Hendrickson played parts of eight seasons for Sigi Schmid, including three in Columbus prior to his retirement. Hendrickson appeared in 266 regular season matches with 225 starts. Playing on defense, he scored 23 goals and added 30 assists. He also played in 32 postseason games with five goals and three assists.

Hendrickson was a member of three MLS Cup championship teams, winning two with Schmid. Together, they won the 2002 MLS Cup with the Los Angeles Galaxy and the 2008 MLS Cup in Columbus. Hendrickson was also with the champion D.C. United team in 2004.

A native of the island of St. Vincent in the Caribbean, Hendrickson began his career in 1997 with the New York MetroStars, before joining the Galaxy later that season. He totaled six seasons in Los Angeles, where he also won the 2000 CONCACAF Champions Cup scoring two goals in a 3-2 victory, and the 2001 Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup, scoring one goal in a 2-1 victory. He was also named Galaxy's Most Valuable Player for the 2001 season.

Hendrickson went to Dallas in 2003 and began the next season with the A-League's Charleston Battery before joining D.C. United for its run to the 2004 MLS Cup. After starting all 31 appearances in 2005 for expansion Chivas USA, Hendrickson was acquired by Columbus in early 2006.

An All-American and business administration major at Drake University, Hendrickson first played professionally with New Orleans of the USISL Select League (1995-96). After earning his first international cap in 1995, he served 12 years as captain of the St. Vincent and the Grenadines national team.

Hendrickson earned his U.S. Soccer 'B' Coaching License in December of 2008. He is a resident of Layou, St. Vincent, and has one daughter, Xavia.





David Tenney was named the Sounders FC fitness coach on January 9, 2009. He is one of Major League Soccer's most respected and highly-regarded fitness coaches following two years in Kansas City.

During the 2007 and 2008 seasons Tenney served as both fitness and goalkeeper coach for the Wizards. He also holds an 'A' license from the Czech Republic F.A. and NSCAA 'Premier' Diploma.

Prior to MLS, Tenney held the same dual role with the George Mason University men's and women's teams for two seasons. In 2006, Mason advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in 12 years. He earned his B.I.S. in coaching science from George Mason in 2005.

While at George Mason, Tenney also served as director of coaching for the Washington Freedom youth teams from 2004-06 and as Maryland's girls director of ODP, winning two ODP National Championships (2005 and 2006). Tenney's playing career features both collegiate and indoor professional honors. At Virginia Tech (1989-91), he served as team captain the final two seasons. As the Hokies' goalkeeper, he was voted Metro Conference Defensive MVP in 1989.

His professional career began overseas with Germany's SV Linx (1992-93) and FC Rastatt (1993-94). He returned home to play for the Washington Warthogs of the Continental Indoor Soccer League from 1994-97 and held franchise records for saves, wins and minutes played for goalkeepers. He was with the Baltimore Blast of the NPSL from 1998-2000 and also starred for the Baton Rouge Bombers, earning second team All-ISL in 1998.

WHAT

Major League Soccer is the top-flight professional soccer league in the United States and was founded in 1996, after the country hosted the 1994 FIFA World Cup. Having recently finished its 13th season, MLS will kick off its 14th campaign on March 19, 2009. The League will see its 15th team, Seattle Sounders FC, debut this season. MLS continues to grow as Philadelphia will begin play in 2010 and multiple cities are bidding to become the homes of the next two clubs. MLS plans to announce the next round of expansion before the start of the 2009 regular season.

SEASON

- The 2009 MLS regular season opens March 19 and ends Oct. 25. The MLS Cup Playoffs begin Oct 29. MLS Cup 2009, the League's championship game, will take place Nov. 21 or 22. The site has yet to be determined.
- In 2009, the 15 MLS teams will each play a 30-game regular season and eight teams will advance to the MLS Cup Playoffs. The top two teams in each conference, plus four "wild cards" with the most points after 30 games, regardless of conference, will qualify. The team that finishes with the most regular season points is awarded the Supporters' Shield.
- More than 36 million fans have attended regular season games in MLS' 13-season history.
- In the 2008 Sierra Mist MLS All-Star Game, the MLS All-Stars defeated English Premier League side West Ham United at BMO Field in Toronto, home of Toronto FC. MLS is now 5-0 against international opponents in All-Star Games. The 2009 MLS All-Star Game will be held July 29 at Rio Tinto Stadium, home of Real Salt Lake, featuring an international opponent to be announced.
- In 2008, eight of the 14 teams played in soccer-specific stadiums that were custom built for MLS teams during the past seven years. Three new soccer stadiums are scheduled to be completed during the next two years (More on stadiums below).

PLAYERS

As of Sept. 9, 2008, MLS had 137 players born outside the United States, representing 51 different countries. About two-thirds of the entire MLS player pool is U.S.-born. A description of several notable MLS players follows:

- Juan Pablo Ángel (New York Red Bulls): Colombian forward was a standout with Aston Villa in England before joining the Red Bulls as a Designated Player in 2007. Has scored 33 goals in two seasons in MLS.
- David Beckham (Los Angeles Galaxy): Former Real Madrid/Manchester United midfielder and current English national team midfielder joined the Galaxy in 2007 as a Designated Player.
- Cuauhtémoc Blanco (Chicago Fire): One of the most popular athletes in Mexico, he joined the Fire in 2007 as a Designated Player. A two-time finalist for MLS MVP, he was named to the MLS Best XI in 2008.
- Jimmy Conrad (Kansas City Wizards): Veteran defender was a standout for the U.S. World Cup team in Germany in 2006. He's a four-time MLS Best XI member.
- Kenny Cooper (FC Dallas): The 6-foot, 3-inch, 210 pound forward ranked second in goals scored in

2008 with 18. He was an MLS All-Star and member of the MLS First XI team. The 24-year old Dallas, Texas product is one of the brightest young talents in the League.

- Dwayne De Rosario (Toronto FC): De Rosario, from Scarborough, Ontario, is one of the League's most exciting and dangerous playmakers. He is the only two-time MLS Cup MVP winner. De Rosario was traded to his hometown team, Toronto FC, from Houston in December, 2008.
- Landon Donovan (Los Angeles Galaxy): Considered the best American player today, Donovan, 26, is the all-time leader in goals and assists for the U.S. Men's National Team, a three-time MLS Cup winner and the League's 2008 Budweiser Golden Boot winner with 20 goals.
- Luciano Emilio (D.C. United): The 2007 winner of the Budweiser Golden Boot for most goals and the League MVP, this Brazilian striker became the first player since 2002 to score 20 goals in a season.
- Freddie Ljungberg (Seattle Sounders FC): A former standout with Arsenal and West Ham United of the English Premier League, Ljungberg was signed as Sounders FC's first Designated Player in October 2008. Ljungberg captained the Swedish National Team at the 2008 UEFA Championships.
- Guillermo Barros Schelotto (Columbus Crew): The Argentine playmaker was named the League's Volkswagen MVP in 2008 and was also named the MLS Cup 2008 MVP after leading the Crew to their first MLS title. He recorded a League-high 19 assists in 2008 and was recently re-signed becoming the Crew's first Designated Player.
- Taylor Twellman (New England Revolution): The 2005 MLS MVP and Budweiser Golden Boot winner. Entering 2008, Twellman had scored more MLS regular season goals (99) than any player since he joined the League in 2002.

INVESTORS

Major League Soccer is structured as a single, limited liability company (single-entity). In the single-entity business structure, club operators own a financial stake in the League, not just their individual team. The MLS investors are:

- Phil Anschutz & the Anschutz Entertainment Group (AEG): Investor-operator of the Houston Dynamo and Los Angeles Galaxy (other domestic sports business ventures include the Staples Center, The Home Depot Center, the NBA's Los Angeles Lakers and the NHL's Los Angeles Kings).
- The Hunt Family (Hunt Sports Group): Investor-operator of FC Dallas and the Columbus Crew (other sports business ventures include the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs and NBA's Chicago Bulls).
- The Kraft Family (Kraft Soccer): Investor-operator of the New England Revolution (other sports business ventures include the NFL's New England Patriots).
- Kroenke Sports Enterprises: Investor-operator of the Colorado Rapids (other sports business ventures include the NBA's Denver Nuggets, NHL's Colorado Avalanche and NFL's St. Louis Rams).
- SCP Worldwide: Investor-operator of Real Salt Lake. Chairman David W. Checketts is the former president of the NHL's New York Rangers, the NBA's New York Knicks and Madison Square Garden (other sports business ventures include the NHL's St. Louis Blues).
- Jorge Vergara & Antonio Cue: Investor-operator of Chivas USA (other sports business ventures include soccer club Chivas de Guadalajara in Mexico and soccer club Saprissa in Costa Rica).
- Red Bull Company Limited: The Austrian company that produces the world's leading energy drink owns Red Bull New York. Other sports investments by Red Bull include a NASCAR team, Red Bull Salzburg, extreme sports and Formula One auto racing.
- Maple Leaf Sports & Entertainment: Investor-operator of Toronto FC (other sports business ventures include the NHL's Toronto Maple Leafs and the NBA's Toronto Raptors).
- OnGoal, LLC: Investor-operator group of the Kansas City Wizards consists of five Kansas City-area residents led by Cerner Corporation executives Neal Patterson and Cliff Illig.
- D.C. United Holdings: Investor-operator of D.C. United is led by Victor MacFarlane and William H.C. ("Will") Chang. Chang holds ownership interest in Major League Baseball's San Francisco Giants.
- Lew Wolff and John Fisher: Investor-operator of the San Jose Earthquakes joined MLS as an expansion team in the Western Conference for the 2008 season. Wolff is a principle owner of the Oakland Athletics baseball club.
- Andrew Hauptman (Andell Holdings): Investor-operator of the Chicago Fire.
- Joe Roth, Adrian Hanauer, Drew Carey and Vulcan Sports and Entertainment (VSE): Investor-operators of Seattle Sounders FC (VSE's other sports business ventures include the NFL's Seattle Seahawks and NBA's Portland Trailblazers).
- Keystone Sports and Entertainment, LLC: The Philadelphia club will be owned by iStar Financial CEO Jay Sugarman, veteran sports executive Nick Sakiewicz and Christopher and Robert Buccini, founding partners of The Buccini/Pollin Group. The team begins play in 2010.
- Golden Boy Productions and Brener International Group: Mexican-American boxing icon Oscar De La Hoya and Gabriel Brener together invested in the Houston Dynamo and now own 50 percent of the club.

STADIUMS

Major League Soccer has elevated the sport's stature in North America by building soccer-specific stadiums. In 1999, the League began moving aggressively to create custom-made venues for its teams that generate the atmosphere and intimacy the game deserves. The seating capacity for these stadiums is between 18,000 and 27,000 and the stadiums share design concepts with some of the finest soccer venues in the world. In 2008, eight of the League's 14 teams will compete in stadiums built specifically for professional soccer. Real Salt Lake's new home, Rio Tinto Stadium, debuted October 9, 2008. Red Bull Arena, home of the New York Red Bulls, along with new homes for the Kansas City Wizards and the Philadelphia expansion team, are scheduled to open in 2010. The existing soccer-specific stadiums in MLS are:

- Columbus Crew Stadium (Columbus, Ohio): Opened in 1999 as the home of the Columbus Crew. Built by the Hunt Family, this stadium has hosted two All-Star Games, MLS Cup and many important U.S. National Team games.
- The Home Depot Center (Carson, Calif.): Opened in 2003 and is the luxurious home of both the Los Angeles Galaxy and Chivas USA.
- Pizza Hut Park (Frisco, Texas): Opened in 2005 as the home of FC Dallas. Hosted MLS Cup 2005 and MLS Cup 2006. A 145-acre multipurpose sports complex with 17 tournament-grade fields.
- TOYOTA PARK (Bridgeview, Ill.): Located just 15 minutes south of downtown Chicago, the handsome venue debuted in 2006 and hosted the Sierra Mist All-Star Game.
- BMO Field (Toronto, Canada): Toronto FC began play in MLS in 2007 and sold out every regular season home game at the urban venue.
- Dick's Sporting Goods Park (Commerce City, Colo.): The Colorado Rapids' stadium opened in 2007 and is the centerpiece of a 24-field soccer complex believed to be one of the world's largest.
- Rio Tinto Stadium (Sandy, Utah.): Real Salt Lake's stadium opened in 2008.

TELEVISION

- MLS has long-term national television agreements in the United States with ABC and ESPN, Univision, Fox Soccer Channel and Fox Sports en Español. In Canada, MLS matches are televised on CBC, Rogers SportsNet and The Score.
- All MLS teams have regional television agreements.
- Every MLS match will be televised in 2009, either nationally or regionally, and most are available live on www.mlsnet.com.

The portfolio of blue chip partners working with MLS to grow their business continues to expand with the growth of the League. A list of current sponsors, suppliers, and partners – including the year in which the partnership was formed – follows:

2009 MLS PLAYER RULES &

I. MLS ROSTER COMPOSITION

A Major League Soccer team's full roster is comprised of the **Senior Roster** and the **Developmental Roster**. The full roster shall exceed no more than 24 total players: 18-20 players on the Senior Roster and no more than four (4) players on the Developmental Roster. All 24 players are eligible for selection as part of the game-day squad during the regular season and playoffs.

(A) SENIOR ROSTER

Other than at specified times during preseason or through injury situations (e.g., a player added as either a disabled list replacement or a season-ending injury replacement), an MLS team shall have no more than 20 Senior Roster players at any time. The Senior Roster is comprised of the following players, who all count against a team's salary budget:

INTERNATIONAL PLAYERS

Each team is allotted eight (8) International slots, with the exception of Toronto FC who is allotted 13 International slots, five (5) of which may be used on domestic U.S. players. All International player slots are tradable, therefore a team may have more than or less than eight (8) International players on its roster.

DOMESTIC PLAYERS*

A domestic player is either a U.S. citizen, a permanent resident (green card holder) or the holder of other special status (e.g., refugee or asylum status).

* For Toronto FC, players with the legal right to work in Canada are considered domestic players (i.e., Canadian citizen, permanent resident, part of a protected class).

(B) DEVELOPMENTAL ROSTER

MLS teams shall not have more than four (4) Developmental players on their Developmental Roster at any time (unless a player is added as a disabled list replacement or season-ending injury replacement). Developmental players can be either Domestic or International and must be 25 years of age or younger during the calendar year of competition. These players do not count against a team's salary budget. They are signed to non-guaranteed contracts, and thus can be waived at any time. Teams are permitted an unlimited number of Developmental player signings during a given season to ensure all four Developmental Roster spots are occupied at any one time.

Generation adidas players and Domestic and International underclassmen form part of a team's Developmental Roster. They are acquired by MLS teams through the SuperDraft, Lottery, Discovery or waiver system (see below) if they join the League after the SuperDraft.

For 2009, if a team has more than four (4) *Generation adidas* players on its Developmental Roster, then the additional *Generation adidas* players would be grandfathered and count against a

team's 20-player Senior Roster (with no budget charge).

II. METHODS OF PLAYER ACQUISITION

MLS teams may acquire players and add them to their Senior and Developmental rosters via the following 13 mechanisms:

(A) ALLOCATIONS

The allocations will be ranked in reverse order of finish for the 2008 season, taking playoff performance into account. Seattle, as an expansion team, will have the top-ranked allocation at the beginning of 2009. The rankings will be separate and distinct from the allocation amounts and will only be relevant in the event two or more teams file a request for the same player on the same day, in the case of returning U.S. National Team players, or in other cases where the League, in its discretion taking into account all the circumstances, determines that the allocation rankings shall be applied. In such cases, priority will be granted to the team with the higher allocation ranking. Once the team uses its allocation ranking to acquire a player it will drop to the bottom of the list. The ranking itself can be traded provided part of the compensation received in return is another team's ranking. A team may move up or down in the rankings, provided that at all times each team is assigned a ranking (no team can have more than one ranking and no team can be without a ranking). The rankings will reset at the end of each MLS League Season.

A club receives allocation money for (1) poor performance during the preceding MLS regular season; (2) the transfer of a player to a club outside of MLS for value; (3) roster purposes due to expansion status; and/or (4) exceptional circumstances as approved by the Competition Committee.

Each year the MLS Competition Committee determines the allocation amount to be made available to each team. Allocation money can be traded by teams. Allocation money does not count against a team's salary budget and can be used:

To sign players new to MLS (that is, a player who did not play in MLS during the previous season).

To re-sign an existing MLS player, with League approval.

In connection with the exercise of an option to purchase a player's rights or the extension of a player's contract for the second year provided the player was new to MLS in the immediately prior year.

Allocation money cannot otherwise be used to buy down the salary budget number of players already under contract to the League, nor can allocation money be used to buy down the budget number of a Designated Player.

(B) DESIGNATED PLAYER

The Designated Player Rule allows the League to sign players (under the League's single entity system) whose salary will fall outside of the team salary budget and whose cost above the salary budget charge will be the financial responsibility of the club

for which they play. A Designated Player's salary budget charge will be capped at \$415,000 per annum in 2009, but his actual compensation is higher. Each team initially received one Designated Player slot, and clubs are allowed to trade Designated Player slots. However, no team can have more than two Designated Players. The Designated Player Rule is a three-year initiative that will conclude after the 2009 MLS season when its future will be reviewed.

* Landon Donovan is the only remaining pre-existing high-salaried (grandfathered Designated Player) in the League. He will continue to be grandfathered and will not count as a Designated Player in 2009.

(C) SUPERDRAFT

These are players drafted by teams at the annual MLS SuperDraft, which consists of four rounds. In order to be eligible to be drafted, players must be: invited to participate in that year's MLS Player Combine; Generation adidas-signed players; or college players who no longer have college eligibility and are nominated by MLS teams. The selection order is determined as follows: The first six selections are from teams that did not qualify for the previous playoffs beginning with the team with fewest regular season points (3 points per win, one point per tie). The remaining eight positions are ranked by fewest regular season points among the teams that were eliminated in the same round of the previous year's MLS Cup Playoffs. An expansion team receives the first selection in each round.

A player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft and did not sign with the League, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to the player.

(D) TRADES

Players, rights to sign players, SuperDraft picks, allocation money, allocation ranking, Designated Player slots and International player slots may all be acquired and exchanged in trades approved by the MLS League Office provided all of the necessary rules regarding roster and salary budget compliance are met and the trade is consummated during the valid trading period. The trade window opened on November 26, 2008 and will close at the 2009 trade deadline of September 15, 2009 (in conjunction with the Discovery claim and roster freeze deadline).

(E) DISCOVERY SIGNINGS

Each team has the opportunity to make six Discovery signings per season (expansion teams have 10 Discovery signings in their initial season). The last day for Discovery player signings is September 15, 2009 – coinciding with the roster freeze date and trade deadline. The six Discovery signings can be used to fill senior roster spots only. If multiple teams claim the same player using a Discovery, the team that filed the claim first will have first rights to the player. Discovery claims expire following each season. If the League and player are unable to reach an agreement during the season, the team that first filed the Discovery retains the

right of first refusal in the event the player is later signed by the League.

(F) DEVELOPMENTAL ROSTER SIGNINGS

Teams are permitted an unlimited number of Developmental player signings during a given season to ensure all four Developmental Roster spots are occupied at any given time. International Player limits per team still apply.

(G) WAIVERS

A team may place a player on waivers at any time during the regular season at which point he is made available to all other teams. The waiver claiming period shall commence on the first business day after the League delivers notice to teams and shall expire at 5 p.m. EST on the second business day after the Waiver Period Commencement Date. The claiming period is 48 hours.

The Waiver Draft order is determined via points per game once all teams have played at least three MLS League games. If the waiver takes place prior to all teams playing in at least three League games, priority shall be granted based upon the prior year's performance, taking playoff performance first, with teams eliminated from playoff contention at the same stage separated according to their point totals through the end of the regular season, and new expansion teams shall be at the bottom of the waiver order. If there is more than one expansion team in a given year, they shall be listed in the reverse order of the SuperDraft order.

Once a team selects a player off waivers, that club is automatically moved to the bottom of the priority list for subsequent waiver selections in a given season, regardless of its points-per-game total. Players who may be placed on the MLS waiver wire are as follows:

A player waived by an MLS team in the current season;

A player who completed his college eligibility within the past season, who was not made available in the SuperDraft;

A player who has remaining college eligibility (and was not made available in the SuperDraft), but the League at its discretion and after taking into account exceptional circumstances determines the player may be offered an MLS contract;

A player who has played in MLS previously where his last MLS team does not wish to exercise their right of first refusal, except in the case of returning U.S. National Team players as stated above.

(H) LOTTERY

Some players shall be assigned to MLS teams via the weighted Lottery process. Any team assigned a player through the lottery in any particular season shall not be assigned another lottery player that season unless and until all teams have received a lottery player or have agreed to waive their option to participate in a Lottery. The players made available through lotteries include:

Generation adidas players signed after the MLS SuperDraft;

Draft eligible players to whom an MLS contract was

offered but who failed to sign with the League prior to the Draft.

The weighted lottery takes into consideration each team's performance over its last 30 regular season games and the most recent postseason. The team with the worst record over its last 30 regular season games (dating back to previous season if necessary and taking playoff performance into account) will have the greatest probability of winning the lottery. Teams are not required to participate in a lottery. Players are assigned via the lottery system in order to prevent a player from potentially influencing his destination club with a strategic holdout.

(I) EXTREME HARDSHIP CALL-UPS

Teams may add players to their roster in cases of "extreme hardship" as follows: (1) a team has less than two available goalkeepers or (2) a team has less than 15 available players. Extreme hardship call-ups are made on a game-by-game basis.

(J) SEASON-ENDING INJURY REPLACEMENTS

A team with a player lost to a season-ending injury can replace that player on its roster, while remaining responsible for the full amount of the injured player's salary. A player can be placed on the season-ending injury list once another player has been signed as a replacement (provided the team has budget space). International player limits still apply at the time a season-ending replacement is made (with the player being replaced not counting against those limits).

(K) SHORT-TERM INJURY REPLACEMENTS

A team with a player who has a short-term injury can replace that player on its roster, while remaining responsible for the full amount of the injured player's salary. A player can be placed on the short-term injured reserve list once another player has been signed as a replacement (provided the team has budget space). Note that the injured player will have to sit out a minimum of six MLS League matches before he can rejoin the team's roster. International player limits still apply at the time a short-term replacement is made (with the player being replaced not counting against those limits).

(L) RETURNING U.S. NATIONAL TEAM POOL PLAYERS

In the event a U.S. National Team pool player playing abroad returns to the U.S. and there is interest from multiple MLS teams, preference will be given first to a team prepared to use an allocation. If there is more than one team prepared to use an allocation on a particular player, the current season's allocation rankings as determined by the MLS Competition Committee would be used. In the event no team is willing to use an allocation, the player will be assigned via waivers.

(M) HOME GROWN PLAYERS

Eligible players must have resided with their parents in a team's "Home Territory" for at least one year prior to placement on a team's Home Grown Player list, subject to the Non-Home Territory exception. Pursuant to all rules regarding qualification as a Home Grown Player, these players may be added to a team's roster Senior or Developmental roster.

At this time teams may add up to two players per year from their Home Grown Player list subject to MLS Competition Committee rules.

NOTE: *No changes may be made to a team's active full roster during the period beginning on September 16, 2009 (day after Roster Freeze Date) through the day after MLS Cup. Nevertheless, a team may obtain players in accordance with the extreme hardship rules and procedures to replace players who are injured or otherwise legitimately unavailable after the Roster Freeze Date. Any other replacements after the Roster Freeze Date may only be made in exceptional circumstances in the League's sole and absolute discretion.*

(III.) METHODS OF RELEASING PLAYERS

(A) WAIVERS

Teams may waive players based on performance at any time during the MLS season. Players on guaranteed contracts waived on or after July 1 of any year, however, will continue to have their salary budget count against the team's salary budget and the team waiving the player will not receive a replacement except under the normal player acquisition mechanisms. Players may not be waived while they are injured, unless the League reaches a settlement with the injured player for his release. In such a scenario, the settlement amount will be charged to the team's salary budget. Upon return to fitness, however, a player may be waived normally.

(B) TRANSFERS AND LOANS

An MLS player may be transferred or loaned at any time to a team outside the League (subject to that team's Federation's transfer window). The registration windows – the dates between which MLS may request the transfer certificate of an international player – are as follows:

January 21 – April 15 (*Primary Window*)

July 15 – August 14 (*Secondary Window*)

(C) CONTRACT EXPIRATION

When a player's contract expires, the player does not count against the roster or budget of the team in question. A team retains the rights to the player indefinitely following the expiration of a contract only if attempts were made to re-sign the player.

(IV.) PLAYER RIGHTS

The following explains the status of player rights in specific instances:

OUT OF CONTRACT PLAYERS / OPTIONS NOT PICKED UP: a team retains the right of first refusal to the player indefinitely only if attempts were made to re-sign the player.

DRAFTED BUT NOT SIGNED: a player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft and did not sign, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 immediately following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to sign the player.

PLAYER TRANSFERRED OUTSIDE MLS: If a

team receives allocation money as a result of a player's transfer, the team does not retain a right of first refusal.

STRUCTURE: The 15 MLS teams are divided into two conferences:

Eastern Conference – Chicago Fire, Columbus Crew, D.C. United, Kansas City Wizards, New England Revolution, New York Red Bulls, Toronto FC

Western Conference – Chivas USA, Colorado Rapids, FC Dallas, Houston Dynamo, Los Angeles Galaxy, Real Salt Lake, San Jose Earthquakes, Seattle Sounders FC

SCHEDULE: Each team plays a 30-game regular season schedule. Each MLS team will play two games against the other 14 teams (one home, one away) accounting for 28 games of the season.

Two additional games against intra-conference rivals will complete each team's 30-game schedule.

POINT SYSTEM: Teams will receive three points for a win, one point for a tie and zero points for a loss.

REFEREES: All referees in MLS are National Referees assigned by the United States Soccer Federation. The Canadian Soccer Association assigns referees for all games played in Canada.

GAME CLOCK: The official game time for all Major League Soccer games will be managed on the field by the referee. If necessary, the referee may also allot extra time (a.k.a. "stoppage time") at the end of each period (first half, second half, and if applicable, first overtime period and second overtime period during playoff matches) to allow for injuries, time-wasting or other disturbances.

The stadium clock will display the time from 0:00 to 45:00 and from 45:00 to 90:00 (plus stoppage time where applicable in each half). For statistical purposes, the minutes for goals, substitutions, yellow cards, etc., will be listed from the first minute until the 90th minute. A goal scored at 15 minutes 10 seconds will be listed as having been scored in the 16th minute. Events occurring during stoppage time will follow the international norm by being demarcated with a "+" sign and the extra min-

utes. For example, a goal scored three minutes into first half stoppage time will be officially identified as happening at "48+".

GAME DAY ROSTERS: Each team can nominate 18 players for a game day roster. Teams are allowed three substitutions per game.

CAUTIONS AND SUSPENSIONS: A player will be suspended for one game upon receiving his fifth yellow card – regardless of the nature of the infraction which resulted in his being awarded a yellow card. A second suspension of one game would result after the awarding of an additional three cards as would a third suspension after the awarding of card number eleven. With the "Good Behavior" incentive it is possible for a player to have a caution expunged. If a player goes three games without receiving a yellow card, after an initial warning, the player will have one yellow card expunged. A player may take advantage of the "Good Behavior" incentive only once throughout the season.

MLS CUP PLAYOFFS FORMAT

WHO QUALIFIES: Eight teams qualify for the 2009 MLS Cup Playoffs. Playoff berths will be determined by points in the standings upon the completion of the regular season. All 15 teams will have played 30 games.

The top two teams in each conference qualify and are seeded 1 & 2 in their respective four-team playoff conference brackets.

The four MLS teams with the next most points, regardless of conference, receive "wildcard" berths.

The four wildcard teams will be seeded according to conference first.

If more than four teams qualify from one conference, the team finishing lower than fourth in its conference will shift over to the other conference bracket.


A team switching conference brackets will be seeded below all other teams in its new conference playoff bracket.

PLAYOFF FORMAT: Conference Semifinal series are conducted in a home-and-home, aggregate-goal format. The lower seeded team in the Conference Semifinal hosts the first

game. The winners of those four series advance to single-game Conference Championships that will determine the MLS Cup Finalists.

The team that scores the most goals in the home-and-home series advances to the single elimination Conference Championship. If the teams are tied after 180 minutes in the Conference Semifinal series, a 30-minute extra time period (divided into two 15-minute periods) will be played followed by kicks from the penalty mark, if necessary. The team with the higher seed between the two Conference finalists will host the Conference Championship game.

In the case of ties after 90 minutes of regulation in the Eastern and Western Conference



Championship games and MLS Cup, 30 minutes of extra time (divided into two 15-minute periods) would be played followed by kicks from the penalty mark, if necessary, to determine the winners.

TEAM-STANDINGS TIE-BREAKING PROCEDURES

The team awarded the highest position in the MLS standings will be the team with the greatest number of points (3 points for a win, 1 point for a tie, 0 points for a loss). In the event that two teams finish the regular season with an equal number of points, the following system will be used to break the tie:

- 1) The highest position shall be awarded to the team with the better win/loss record in current regular season games against all other teams equal in points. (head-to-head competition)
- 2) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team with the greater goal difference against all other teams during the regular season. (goal differential)
- 3) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team scoring the greatest number of total goals against all other teams during the regular season. (total goals)
- 4) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the procedures described in this section shall be applied only to games played on the road by each team against all other teams during the regular season. (road 1-3)
- 5) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the procedures described in this section shall be applied only to games played at home by each team against all other teams during the regular season. (home 1-3)
- 6) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team with the fewest team disciplinary points in the League Fair Play table during the regular season.

If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position in the standings shall be determined by the toss of a coin.

The first tiebreaker in a three-way tie is also head-to-head, but it is determined via points-per-game versus the other two teams. If two teams are tied in points-per-game head-to-head, the next tie breaker is goal difference.






HISTORY OF SOCCER IN SEATTLE

SEATTLE SOUNDERS (1974-1983)

The tradition of professional soccer and the Sounders brand began with the arrival of the North American Soccer League expansion franchise. For 10 seasons they were successful and entertaining on the field, attracting some of the league's largest crowds. Just as importantly, the original Sounders created a legacy of developing local players capable of reaching the highest levels of the game.

In some respects, the Sounders paved the way for Seattle securing an NFL expansion franchise a year later. The founding ownership group featured six of the same partners, including Lamont Bean, Howard S. Wright, Lynn Himmelman, David Skinner, Lloyd Nordstrom and Herman Sarkowsky.

The Sounders played their first two seasons outdoors and under the Space Needle. Located on the Seattle Center campus, Memorial Stadium provided a central location and an intimate setting, although the crowds soon outgrew the initial 13,000-seat capacity. In fact, Seattle was the first NASL team to draw a sellout and did so for nine of the final 16 games at Memorial.

With the completion of the Kingdome, the Sounders moved south in 1976, and a sold-out preseason game against Pele and the Cosmos which set a North American attendance record of 58,128.

From the outset, the Sounders played an energetic, entertaining style while utilizing British veterans and young, mostly local, North American players. Although it won only two division titles, Seattle finished with winning records in seven of 10 seasons, twice reached the championship game, Soccer Bowl, and in 1980 the Sounders won 25 matches – the most in NASL history.

In each Soccer Bowl, Seattle met the star-studded New York Cosmos. The 1977 final marked the final competitive game for Pele. The Sounders only major trophy was the 1981 Trans-Atlantic Challenge Cup, a midseason tournament involving the Cosmos, England's Southampton and Scotland's Celtic.

The NASL and Sounders peaked in popularity by 1980, and over the following two seasons attendance declined while the number of teams dropped from 24 to 13. Seattle bowed out after the 1983 season, and a year later the league halted operations.

FC SEATTLE STORM (1984-90)

It can be argued that the rebirth of professional soccer in North America began with FC Seattle. In 1984, a year after the original Sounders folded, a new team surfaced with a new objective: To cultivate the best local talent and test it against the best in the business.

Funded by Eastside businessman Bud Greer and with former Sounders player and coach Jimmy Gabriel serving as coaching director, FC Seattle's approach was to create a pyramid system of youth teams feeding a senior men's program. That philosophy ran counter to the NASL era, when foreigners comprised the bulk of the roster and domestic players were in the minority.

Beginning with a summer series of friendlies against NASL teams and the U.S. National Team at Memorial Stadium, FC Seattle held its own and attracted an average of 6,669 fans. The first win came in Vancouver against the Whitecaps, 2-1.

In 1985, the stakes were raised and a league took root. With the NASL now disbanded, clubs from Europe, Mexico and South America were brought to Seattle. However, when British teams faced a worldwide travel ban, FC Seattle was forced to band together with other fledgling clubs to form the Western Soccer Alliance. That became the forerunner of the American Professional Soccer League or, as it was more widely known, the A-League.

Drawing on a mixture of former Sounders and stars from both Seattle Pacific and Washington collegiate programs, Seattle played a mixture of league and foreign exhibitions through 1988. That campaign culminated with Seattle winning the Western Soccer League championship and, later, making a five-match postseason tour of England. The Storm nickname was adopted prior to the 1989.


In 1990, the WSL merged with the East Coast's American Soccer League to form the APSL. In all there were 22 teams, but in 1991, with costs rising due to nationwide travel, membership fell to only nine clubs, and Seattle was not among them. After going dormant, it ceased operations altogether in 1992, although the brand was resurrected and used by an entry in the regional Pacific Coast League through 1995.

SEATTLE SOUNDERS (1994-2008)

In 1994, the World Cup was coming to America and, riding the resulting new wave of enthusiasm, professional soccer returned to Seattle after a three-year absence. The Sounders name was revived and the club, owned by Scott Oki and coached by Alan Hinton, joined the American Professional Soccer League.

From the outset, the Sounders nucleus was largely formed by homegrown talent. Hinton tapped into the college players being produced at both Seattle Pacific and Washington, and added experience in the form of past pros with local connections.

When Seattle won the 1995 A-League championship in its second season, eight of the 13 players who saw action originally came from the surrounding area's youth leagues. In 1996, when the Sounders repeated, nine starters were local products. Player/coach Neil Megson had been with both the original Sounders and Tacoma Stars for a total of nine seasons.

MLS opened play in 1996, and the A-League was thereafter classified as second division. Consequently, many of the top players were lured elsewhere. The Sounders remained competitive, qualifying for the playoffs in all but two of their 15 seasons and winning five divisional crowns.

In 2002 under the management of new majority investor Adrian Hanauer and the coaching of Brian Schmetzer, the club reached for new goals. Hanauer led the local effort to land a new MLS team and also moved the team from Memorial Stadium to the newly-completed Qwest Field. In fact, in the stadium's first event, the Sounders played to a USL record crowd of 25,515 in 2002.

On the field, Seattle won a club-record 23 games in Schmetzer's first season. From 2004-07, it advanced to the USL championship game three times, winning twice. In U.S. Open Cup play, the Sounders eliminated four MLS teams in reaching back-to-back semifinals in 2007 and '08.

XBOX PITCH AT QWEST FIELD



In 1996, Paul G. Allen obtained an option to purchase the Seattle Seahawks and launched a campaign to win public support for a new world-class football/soccer stadium and exhibition center. Six years later, the dream became reality as the Seahawks opened the 2002 preseason against the Indianapolis Colts in new Seahawks Stadium, renamed Qwest Field on June 2, 2004. The facility, built atop of the site of the Kingdome, is not only home to the Seahawks, but the stadium accommodates many levels of soccer competition, including Major League Soccer, amateur, international, World Cup and collegiate soccer.

Qwest Field is designed with a 67,000 seat capacity, with 5,000 additional seats available for special events, and 1,400 seats for fans with disabilities. With a roof covering 70 percent of the seating area, fans will enjoy wide, comfortable seats with sideline seating a mere 52 feet from the playing field and end-zone seats just 40 feet from the action. The facility also features a dozen elevators and expansive concourses with an ample provision of concessions stands and restrooms.

In addition to having perfect views of the field and surrounding areas, fans experience elements of diversity and culture in part of the Stadium Art Program. In 1998, a request for qualifications yielded a total of 254 responses from around the United States and Canada. After reviewing the full range of submissions, 12 artists and projects were selected. Today, the stadium includes nearly \$2 million worth of art.

QWEST FIELD FUNDING

The \$430 million facility is owned by the public and was funded by a private-public partnership. Private contributions totaled at least \$130 million, while the public contributed up to \$300 million through a lottery and a variety of taxes generated by events in the stadium/exhibition center.

A breakdown of the funding package:

- \$130 million private investment led by Paul Allen
- \$127 million from new, sports related games, similar to the Mariners' baseball-themed scratch games
- \$101 million in sales taxes collected in King County attributable to events in the stadium/exhibition center
- \$56 million from facility admission and parking taxes
- \$15 million from extending King County's share of the existing hotel-motel tax
- \$1 million per year of in-kind advertising for the new lottery games will be provided by Paul Allen
- All excess stadium revenues will fund youth athletic facilities throughout Washington State in addition to a \$10 million contribution from Paul Allen
- Paul Allen agreed to pay for any construction cost overruns
- As an added measure, the debt on the Kingdome was retired, freeing property taxes for other purposes

FIRST & GOAL INC.

In June of 1997, Washington State voters approved a funding package to build a new football/soccer stadium and exhibition center. With that, Paul G. Allen and Football Northwest created First & Goal Inc., an entity that represented the interests of Qwest Field in the construction of the new stadium and now manage the stadium and event center on a daily basis.



ALLIANCE COUNCIL

Council members are elected on an annual basis with terms extending from March to November. Members interested in participating on Council must receive a minimum of 25 votes from other members of the Alliance. The Alliance Council will meet two times per year in addition to the annual all-members meeting held at the conclusion of each season.

Each Council member will serve as a liaison between members and the ownership group.

Colors:

Sounder Blue (Pantone 647C)

- A reference to Puget Sound and the water that surrounds Seattle, which helps define its citizens.
- Blue signifies stability, strength and loyalty.

Rave Green (Pantone 370C)

- Definition: rave (adj): c: to talk with extreme enthusiasm <raved about its beauty>
- Green is a reference to the forests of the Pacific Northwest. It also represents the passionate, optimistic spirit of the community.

Cascade Shale (Pantone 433C)

- Cascade is a reference to the spectacular range of mountains on Seattle's eastern horizon.
- Shale is a sedimentary rock formed under intense pressure. As the dark gray in the Sounders FC palette, it signifies an iron resolve

TELEVISION



Every home and away Sounders FC match will be broadcast live on KING-6/16 or KING-5, except those broadcast nationally. Each broadcast will feature an exclusive pregame show and a postgame wrap-up. KING-5 will also produce a weekly show.

The Seattle Sounders FC and FSN reached a multi-year agreement that will increase the broadcast exposure for soccer fans in the Northwest. FSN will also serve as the presenting sponsor of the Sounders FC Alliance, which provides the team's supporters one of the most integrated and unique connections to the franchise in all of sports.

FSN will own the distribution rights for a variety of ancillary programming featuring Sounders FC, which include match replays and team shows, both on the network and via on-demand (VOD). FSN gains the exclusive right to replay Sounders FC.

As the presenting sponsor of the Sounders FC Alliance as well as the team's series of youth community events, FSN has extended its commitment not just to the team and its fans, but to the greater soccer and sports communities throughout the Northwest.

RADIO



The Seattle Sounders FC and Bonneville Seattle Radio Group partnered to broadcast all Sounders FC home and away matches on News Talk 97.3 KIRO FM.

News Talk 97.3 KIRO FM will air Sounders FC match broadcasts as well as pre and postgame shows on 97.3 KIRO FM. Bonneville and Sounders FC will also join forces to produce a weekly 30-minute Sounders FC show on the new 710 ESPN Seattle.

KIRO has received the highest national honor for radio – The Edward R. Murrow Award of Excellence for outstanding broadcasting achievement – five times, in 1982, 1989, 1991, 1996 and 2001. In 2005, 710 KIRO won more Edward R. Murrow awards than any other station in the United States.

710 ESPN Seattle, which debuts in April, 2009 will feature radio play-by-play and comprehensive coverage of the Seattle Seahawks and Seattle Mariners. 710 ESPN Seattle will broadcast a line-up of local Seattle-based sports news and sports talk programs, along with selected national-syndicated programs from ESPN Radio Network.

The Sounders FC have partnered with 1210 AM Ke Buena to broadcast matches in Spanish in the Seattle market.

PLAY-BY-PLAY



Announcer Kevin Calabro enters his 27th season in radio broadcasting and his first as the Sounders FC play-by-play announcer. The "Voice of the Sounders FC" can be heard on all television and radio broadcasts. He was the "Voice of the Seattle SuperSonics" for 21 years. Calabro has also been a play-by-play contributor for TNT, TBS and ESPN Radio broadcasts of the NBA. During the summer of 2000, he was selected by The Westwood One Radio Network to be the voice of the United States Men's 2000 Olympic Basketball Team. He was named "Sportscaster of the Year" for the state of Washington in 1997, 2000, 2001, 2002 and 2003 by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association of America.

Calabro began his professional-basketball broadcast career as one of the youngest play-by-play announcers in NBA history when he was hired at age 26 by the Kansas City Kings during the 1983-84 season. While in the Midwest, he worked at SportsTime, a regional cable outlet, and also took on the role of play-by-play announcer for the University of Missouri football and basketball teams. Calabro started his career at WIBC radio in Indianapolis where he did play-by-play for minor league hockey. During that time, Calabro also called basketball and football games for Purdue University.

He and his wife, Susan, are the parents of Anthony, Nick, Lauren and Joe.

MEDIA POLICY

CREDENTIALS

Season media credentials will be issued to recognized newspapers, magazines, television and established radio stations making reasonable requests. To qualify, an outlet must cover 18 of the club's home games. Because of limited photo credentials, it is impossible to grant freelance photographer access unless assigned to shoot for a specific story or project.

ROAD CREDENTIALS

Members of the Sounders FC's media traveling to road games should submit requests for credentials to the Communications Department no later than five (5) business days prior to the road game.

MEDIA WILL CALL

Members of the media needing to pick up passes at the game will find the Media Will Call booth located at the Southwest corner of Qwest Field. Each person must pick up his or her own credential and present corresponding photo identification. Media Will Call opens two hours prior to the scheduled kickoff. All media must enter through the press gate entrance located at the Southwest Entrance. Media credentials will not be honored at any other entrance. All credentials are non-transferable, and any unauthorized use will subject the bearer to ejection from Qwest Field and confiscation of the credentials.

BROADCAST

In making requests for broadcast credentials, please specify requirements for spotters and/or statisticians. These services must be arranged in advance, and once they are made the statisticians must be compensated whether used or not. Broadcast booth locations are located in the Qwest Field press box.

PARKING

A limited number of parking passes are available for working media. Members of the media seeking parking passes are advised to make their requests as early as possible. Please note that that Sounders FC will not be able to accommodate all requests.

A limited number of TV news trucks will be allowed to park on the Qwest Field east access road. TV trucks which provide satellite, uplink or microwave functions will need to make prior arrangements with Kurt Shaffer, Director of Technical Services for First & Goal, Inc. (kurtsh@firststandgoal.com or 206 381-7220).

PRESS BOX

The Gary Wright Press Box at Qwest Field is located on the suite level on the west side of Qwest Field. The press box will open two hours before kickoff. Admittance is limited to working media members with valid credentials. The press box is intended for the purpose of providing a work place for writers, reporters, broadcasters and game personnel. It is imperative that season pass holders notify this office of their intention to cover a game in order to receive press box seating. Family members and guests will not be accommodated in the press box. Abuse of press box press privileges will result in forfeiture of a press pass.

TELEPHONE/WIRELESS ACCESS

Several pool phones are placed throughout the press box. Remember pool phones are to be shared. Courtesy hard lines are available in the photo room. Qwest Field offers wireless internet access in all areas of the press box and photographers' work room. The access is free of charge and works with all wi-fi enabled computer equipment. Media wishing to pay for dedicated LAN connections should be made through the Communications Department.

GAME NOTES/STATISTICS

Game notes and statistics will be available in the press box. Statistics will be distributed to each seat throughout the game at halftime and 10 minutes following the game. Periodic announcements will also be made during the game.

LOCKER ROOM ACCESS

Following the conclusion of the game, a postgame news conference will be held in the NFL Visiting Media Room near both the Home and Visiting Locker Rooms in the South end of Qwest Field. At the end of the news conference the locker room will be open to media. Sounders FC and visitor locker rooms are located near the Southeast tunnel on the field level. Your cooperation and professional courtesy is asked in maintaining a proper working atmosphere for postgame interviews. Absolutely no autographs are allowed during media access periods.

Media cell phones - No media may use a cell phone at any time inside the locker room. Media members may carry their cell phones into the locker room but may not use them to place or take calls, or to take photos.

FIELD ACCESS

Only working newspaper, magazine and network TV photographers and club/stadium officials are permitted on the field during the game. Press Box Passes will not be honored for field admittance at any time, unless authorized by Seattle Sounders FC.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

ENG crew and still photographers holding proper credentials may position themselves along either endline at field level. Immediately prior to each match, photographers who wish to shoot the traditional pre-game team photo will be escorted on cue to the midfield sideline by photo marshals. Photographers will be instructed to walk only on the sidelines—never on the field of play—en route to these temporary sideline positions. Once team photos have been taken, photographers will be directed to quickly return to their endline photo positions. During the match, photographers are advised that they have restricted freedom of movement. At no time during the game can photographers shoot from directly behind the goal. Also, movement from one end of the field to the other is allowed only at halftime on the sideline opposite the team benches. Still photographers DO NOT have access to the locker rooms at any time.

PHOTOGRAPHER PHOTO BIBS

Each accredited photographer will be issued a specially designed photo bib/vest provided by Sounders FC for identification purposes as a mandatory supplement to the credential. The photo bib serves as a temporary access control device and must be returned to the photo marshals area at the end of each match. The photo bib must be worn at all times while present at any photo position. Photographers in unauthorized shooting positions or not wearing a bib risk suspension of their credential. All photographers are required to wear a vest that must be obtained prior to the game in the Photographers' Workroom.

PHOTOGRAPHERS' WORKROOM

Enter through the Southwest Media Entrance and proceed around the main concourse to the South. The Photographers' Workroom is located on the right, adjacent to the secured entrance to the locker room corridor. Follow the red tape line from the field entrance.

MEALS

Food and beverages are available to working members of the media in the Press Box and Photographers' Workroom.

DURING THE WEEK

Training Access

During the regular season, training sessions typically run 75-90 minutes and usually begin at 10 a.m. Training times can and frequently do vary. Members of the media who intend to cover training sessions on a regular basis should call the Sounders FC Communications Department to obtain the latest training schedule information. Training sessions will, in general, be open to the media, but they may be closed at the discretion of the head coach. No media members are allowed into the locker room before, during or after training sessions.

Interviews

Interviews that require advance preparations or special accommodations by a Sounders FC player or staff member should be made by calling or e-mailing the Sounders FC Communications Department.
