A BEGINNING BEYOND IMAGINATION

A dream come true, only bigger and more magical than anyone could've imagined.

In its first season, the Seattle Sounders FC proved to be fantasy futbol in the flesh. Eye-popping achievements all around, from the field to the fans to the club's community outreach. Everything and everyone the Sounders FC touched seemingly turned to rave green. And green is good.

"Arguably one of the best expansion launches in all of pro sports," said MLS Commissioner Don Garber.

Proof of that success is found everywhere.

A championship banner hangs from the Qwest Field rafters and a trophy sits in the team offices.

Led by a 53-piece marching band, fans flooded the streets of Pioneer Square for the March to the Match and then filed into the stadium, filling every available seat for each and every home MLS match—16 consecutive sell-outs.

The collective passion of this club and its supporters is clearly evident from afar: the pulsating, scarf-waving sea of green is a sight to behold, and to hear the roar firsthand can send shivers up the spine. American soccer has never seen or felt anything like it.

Certainly the club ownership was confident that the World's Game would take hold in Seattle. Soccer had long ago taken root in the community and its first

Kingdome were now parents and coaches themselves. Sounders FC was welcomed with a firm embrace.

Twenty-two thousand season tickets were sold and the club responded by twice increasing stadium capacity to accommodate the demand. Listening to its fans has been part of the franchise's fabric since its inception.

The people chose the team name and, during the first season, the season ticket holders and other paying members voted to name themselves (Members

pro team, the Sounders of the NASL, had been enthusiastically supported. Later, the proponents of the sport helped push through an initiative to build a world-class venue, Qwest Field.

By 2009, the hunger for an MLS team was ravenous. They didn't need glitz or added incentive; their appetite for soccer was authentic. The kids who had tagged along with parents and coaches to the

Alliance) and the band (Sound Wave). They also elected representatives to serve on the advisory council to club leadership. The Alliance realized the vision of Drew Carey, owner. Carey conceived the notion of a Democracy in Sports movement in which supporters would have a voice in the club's direction.

The partnership between club and community was ever-present. Players and coaches volunteered nearly a 1,000 hours of service. They signed shirts and scarves and exchanged hugs and handshakes with fans after games, training sessions and wherever there was a congregation. Together, Sounders FC nation raised over \$100,000 for local charities and set an MLS record by raising more than \$22,000 for the "Nothing But Nets" program.

Majority owner Joe Roth, a movie producer, believed that Sounders FC could be successful on and off the field. However, if the

first season's story had been presented beforehand as a screenplay, Roth might have rejected it out of hand for reading too much like a fairytale. Yet fantasy became reality, indeed.

Sounders FC shot off the mark, becoming the first expansion team to win its first three games, and it did so without allowing a goal. Seattle coach Sigi Schmid delivered to the fans an XI that was instantly cohe-

sive, fearless and attack-minded.

Schmid had been an integral ingredient to successful sides of the past, winning two MLS Cups and a record number of regular season and playoff games. But after basking in the total Sounders FC experience of opening night, he was nearly overwhelmed.

"It was everything you dreamed," he said following the nationally-televised, 3-0 victory over New York. "It was a beautiful result. The crowd was outstanding. The atmosphere was tremendous."

Whereas most of the players had arrived in the Emerald City as strangers just a few weeks earlier, from those ranks a folk hero was born with every winning feat.

A young Colombian forward with a flair for the unexpected, Fredy Montero came first, scoring three goals in the first two matches. No sooner had stylish Swedish midfielder Freddie Ljungberg made his first start and he had scored his first goal, pointing the way to a 2-0 win before a hostile capacity crowd in Toronto.

A Northwest native, goalkeeper Kasey Keller, made his return home one for the league record books, refusing to allow a goal for his first 375 minutes.

Sounders FC finished the first half of the season with the fewest losses of any first-year team, and the demand to see games had never been greater. Capacity was increased to over 32,000 and still every night was sold out.

A seemingly endless sun-drenched summer saw huge throngs in excess of 65,000 turnout for friendlies with Chelsea and Barcelona, plus a pair of dramatic performances in U.S. soccer's longest-running competition, the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup.

A penalty kick in the 89th minute pushed the Rave Green past Kansas City and into the Cup semifinal. There, they worked their magic once more, equalizing in the dying seconds of regulation and scoring the winner in overtime. Through to the Open Cup Final, Seattle summoned a performance for the ages.

Playing on the road 2,700 miles from home and

depleted by injuries, Sounders FC faced cup holders D.C. United. Aggressive from the outset, the visitors eventually broke through twice in the second half to win, 2-1. Saluting the hundreds of supporters who had made the long trip from Washington to

Washington, D.C., the players hoisted the trophy aloft. Hours later, in the middle of the Seattle night, scores more greeted the team's flight home and kissed the cup.

With the cup came a greater confidence and, facing four road trips in the final six matches, that boost proved pivotal. They won three of those four, most notably ending a record 22-game home unbeaten streak by Columbus and coming from a goal down at Kansas City to seal a playoff spot. Finally, before the largest and loudest home crowd to date, Seattle defeated FC Dallas, 2-1, to finish with the fourth-best point total overall.

Schmid addressed the stadium afterward, praising them for a partnership that had resulted in a storybook season. "You," said Schmid as his eyes surveyed the sea of green, "have been the best fans in Major League Soccer, hands down."

Minutes later, before turning his attention to a postseason confrontation with Houston, he reflected further. "The support that we've gotten from the city, the love that they've showered upon our team and the organization—and hopefully what we've returned to them as well—we just want this to continue. I don't want to wake up if this is a dream."



MILESTONES

July 17, 1997 – The building of Qwest Field is made possible by the passage of a \$300 million public funding package by Washington state voters based on the promise to keep the Seahawks and bring professional soccer to Seattle.

November 12, 2007 – Drew Carey visits George & Dragon, a local soccer pub, to announce a new MLS team in Seattle. Later that same day he raises the 12th Man Flag at a Seahawks game.



November 13, 2007 - After securing an ownership agreement with Hollywood movie studio executive Joe Roth, Seattle Sounders owner Adrian Hanauer, actor and comedian Drew Carey and Vulcan Sports & Entertainment, Major League Soccer's Commissioner Don Garber announces Seattle as MLS' 15th club. The team names Adrian Hanauer General Manager of Soccer Operations, and season ticket membership deposits go on sale.

November 14, 2007 – Team announces more than 3,000 season ticket memberships have been sold.

November 19, 2007 – Team announces more than 6,500 season ticket memberships have been sold.

December 12, 2007 – Team announces more than 10,000 season ticket deposits have been sold.

March 24, 2008 – MLS Seattle names former Seahawks Vice President Gary Wright as Senior Vice President of Business Operations, overseeing all business operations for the club including ticket sales, corporate partnerships, community outreach, charities, fan experience and marketing of the team.



January 24, 2008 – MLS Seattle hires MLS original Chris Henderson to serve as Technical Director, assisting General Manager Adrian Hanauer in all areas of

soccer operations, including scouting, player management, coaching decisions, and the youth system.

February 22, 2008 – MLS Seattle and Washington Youth Soccer hire Darren Sawatzky to help identify and develop elite local talent.

March 25, 2008 – MLS Seattle takes lead with democracy in sports, as the club announces fans will have the opportunity to vote for team name. The options include: Seattle Alliance, Seattle FC, Seattle Republic, and Write-In Vote for those fans passionate about another name.



April 7, 2008 - Votes are in and MLS Seattle announces the club to be named Seattle Sounders FC. Nearly 15,000 fans registered their vote during the four-day election with approximately 50% of the voters submitting a write-in name, 80% of which included a derivative of the name Sounders. The name Sounders has been identified with soccer in the Seattle community since 1974. That same day the colors and badge for Seattle Sounders FC are revealed.

April 29, 2008 - Sounders FC announces ticket pricing and dedicated web site.

April 30, 2008 – With 14,700 season ticket memberships purchased to date, Seattle Sounders FC announces season ticket packages to be based on an 18-match home schedule with prices starting as low as \$288 for a full-season ticket package. All home matches to be played at Qwest Field with a seating capacity designated for 24,500.

May 7, 2008 – Seattle Sounders FC signs French forward, and member of USL First Division Seattle Sounders, Sebastien Le Toux to a multi-year contract. Le Toux is the first player to sign with the club.

May 16, 2008 – Seattle Sounders FC launches the club's Members Association, activating the promise of owner Drew Carey to involve the fans in the decision-making process of the team. Carey to serve as the association's chairman. Eventually on November 21, FSN becomes the presenting sponsor of the Members Association later named the Alliance.

May 28, 2008 – Seattle Sounders FC announces a multi-year partnership with Microsoft Corp. and Xbox 360 video game and entertain-



ment system. The landmark deal is highlighted by the 'Xbox 360 LIVE' logo featured prominently on the Sounders FC jersey.

May 31, 2008 – Sounders FC merchandise becomes available online and through team Pro Shop.

June 1, 2008 – Sounders FC holds percussion and brass band auditions at Qwest Field.

July 21, 2008 – Seattle Sounders FC and BELO reach a multi-year television partnership agreement to broadcast Sounders FC games on KONG 6/16 and KING 5. Every home and away Sounders FC match to be broadcast live on KONG 6/16 or KING 5, except those broadcast nationally. Each broadcast will feature an exclusive pregame show and a postgame wrap-up. BELO will also produce a weekly show. Former "Voice of the Sonics," Kevin Calabro, to serve as club's play-by-play announcer for all Sounders FC matches.



August 14, 2008 - Seattle Sounders FC signs celebrated goalkeeper Kasey Keller. The Olympia native and U.S. team captain becomes the second player to sign.

September 5, 2008 - Gambian midfielder Sanna Nyassi becomes the third player to sign with Seattle Sounders FC.



October 28, 2008 - After 10 years in the English Premier League, Swedish player Freddie Ljungberg signs with Seattle Sounders FC as Designated Player.

November 21, 2008 - Sounders FC announces a partnership with FSN which will broadcast a weekly magazine show and replays of matches.

November 26, 2008 - Ten players including Eugene, Oregon, native and U.S. National Team forward Nate Jaqua are selected in the MLS Expansion Draft.

December 2, 2008 – ESPN announces that Sounders FC will open the 2009 season against New York Red Bulls on the Xbox Pitch at Qwest Field on Thursday, March 19.



December 4, 2008 – A fashion show at WaMu Theatre featuring Hollywood models and Sounders FC players unveils the team's kit, training gear and off-the-field adidas apparel.

December 5, 2008 – Sounders FC supporters vote to name their members association the Sounders FC Alliance and the team's marching band the Sound Wave.

December 16, 2008 – Two-time MLS Coach of the Year Sigi Schmid signs to become first Sounders FC coach after leading Columbus to both the 2008 Supporters' Shield and MLS Cup title.



December 22, 2008 – Sounders FC hires former USL-1 Sounders head coach Brian Schmetzer as top assistant coach.

December 29, 2008 – Sounders FC names former USL-1 Sounders Coach Tom Dutra as goalkeeper coach.

January 9, 2009 – Sounders FC announces David Tenney as fitness coach.

January 15, 2009 – Sounders FC and Bonneville Seattle Radio Group reach a multi-year partnership to broadcast all Sounders FC home and away matches, as well as pre and post game shows, on News Talk 97.3 KIRO FM. Bonneville and Sounders FC also joined forces to produce a weekly 30-minute Sounders FC show on the new 710 ESPN Seattle.



January 15, 2009 – The Sounders FC selects Steve Zakuani with first overall pick in the 2009 MLS SuperDraft. The team also selects Evan Brown (2nd round), Jared Karkas (3rd) and Michael Fucito (4th).

January 20, 2009 – Seattle Sounders FC completes its coaching staff with the addition of Ezra Hendrickson as an assistant coach.

January 21, 2009 – Sounders FC holds the first practice in franchise history at the Virginia Mason Athletic Center.

February 12, 2009 – Enhanced SoundersFC.com launched with integrated online community.

February 22, 2009 – Sounders FC announces season ticket sales have exceeded 20,000.

March 2, 2009 – Sounders FC announces single game tickets to inaugural home opener sold out, and that seating will be expanded to 32,400 for March 19 match vs. New York.

March 6, 2009 – Sounders FC announces Spanish media partnership with Bustos Media.

March 11, 2009 – MLS and Sounders FC announce 2009 MLS Cup to be played on the Xbox Pitch at Qwest Field on November 22. All season ticket packages include a ticket to the League's 14th annual championship game.



March 19, 2009 – Sounders FC wins inaugural game 3-0 over New York in front of 32,523 fans. Fredy Montero scored twice and assisted on a Brad Evans' goal.

April 1, 2009 – Fredy Montero named March Player of the Month after scoring his third goal in first two matches in 2-0 home win over Real Salt Lake.

April 4, 2009 – Sounders FC becomes first MLS expansion team to start 3-0-0 after winning inaugural road match, 2-0, at Toronto FC.



April 25, 2009 – Seattle becomes first MLS team to attract more than 28,000 to four consecutive matches. Keller sets record for consecutive scoreless minutes to open season, breaking old mark of 375.

May 26, 2009 – Sounders FC advances to third round of U.S. Open Cup after winning second straight play-in game, 1-0, over Colorado before capacity crowd at Starfire Sports Stadium.

June 20, 2009 – At 5-3-7, Seattle finishes first half of season with fewest losses of any expansion team.

June 28, 2009 – Stadium capacity expanded to beyond 32,400 with addition of seats in south end of lower bowl.

July 11, 2009 – Sounders FC reaches four games above .500 after first comeback win, 2-1, over Houston.



July 13, 2009 – Kasey Keller and Freddie Ljungberg named to MLS All-Stars First XI, Fredy Montero and Jhon Kennedy Hurtado later added to all-stars roster.



July 18, 2009 – A crowd of 65,372 witnesses first international friendly, versus English FA Cup holder Chelsea.

July 21, 2009 – Sounders FC earns a place in Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup Final by coming from behind to defeat Houston, 2-1, after extra time, before record Starfire crowd.

July 25, 2009 – Unbeaten run in MLS reaches six games with draw against Eastern Conference leader Chicago.

August 5, 2009 – A worldwide TV audience and Pacific Northwest record crowd of 66,848 watch

Seattle face reigning European champion FC Barcelona.

August 15, 2009 – Sounders FC wears blue kit for first time and defeats L.A. Galaxy, 2-0, to end three-game road trip.

September 24, 2009 – Seattle chosen to host 2010 MLS First Kick against Philadelphia Union.

October 3, 2009 – Sounders FC ends MLS record 22-game home unbeaten run by Columbus, winning 1-0.

October 17, 2009 – Sounders FC defeats Kansas City, 3-2, and becomes first expansion team since 1998 to clinch an MLS playoff berth.

October 24, 2009 – Sigi Schmid becomes MLS all-time coaching win leader (125) with 2-1 win over FC Dallas and Sounders FC breaks MLS season attendance record.

October 29, 2009 – Sounders FC draws with Houston, 0-0, in first MLS Playoffs game in front of 35,807 fans.

November 10, 2009 – Fredy Montero named MLS Newcomer of the Year.

November 22, 2009 – MLS Cup attendance of 46,011 is second-largest for a neutral final and eight front office individuals and departments earn MLS Club Executive Awards.



September 2, 2009 – Sounders FC becomes the second expansion team to win U.S. Open Cup with 2-1 win over D.C. United at RFK Stadium.

JOE ROTH

MAJORITY OWNER



Joe Roth is the majority owner of the Seattle Sounders FC. His vision to establish Seattle as the soccer capital of the U.S. was a significant catalyst in the Sounders first-year success. His foresight has also led to his long-standing achievement in the film and entertainment industry.

As founder of Roth Films, Inc., his current films include producer of *Alice in Wonderland*, starring Johnny Depp, Anne Hathaway and directed by Tim Burton, scheduled for release on March 5, 2010, and as the executive producer of the Tom Cruise and Cameron Diaz action/adventure picture *Knight and Day* scheduled for a 2010 summer release.

During his career in the entertainment industry, Roth has served as chairman of both The Walt Disney Studios and Twentieth Century Fox. In May of 2000, he founded Revolution Studios which released 46 feature films between 2001 and 2007, including *Black Hawk Down*, which won two Academy Awards®, and *XXX*, which earned more than \$275 million worldwide, as well as *Anger Management*, *Daddy Day Care*, *Hellboy*, *13 Going On 30*, *White Chicks*, *The Forgotten*, *Rocky Balboa*, *Across the Universe* and *The Waterhorse*.

He has also directed six films, the most recent include *America's Sweethearts*, *Christmas with the Kranks* and *Freedland*.

In 2004, Mr. Roth was the Emmy Award® nominated producer of the 76th Annual Academy Awards, which received 10 Emmy Award® nominations, including one for Outstanding Variety, Music or Comedy Special, and won an Emmy for Outstanding Directing for a Variety, Music or Comedy Program.

From August 1994 through January 2000, Roth ran Walt Disney Studios, first as Chairman of the

Walt Disney Motion Pictures Group, then, beginning in April 1996, as Chairman of The Walt Disney Studios. He led the studio to worldwide market dominance over the five years with an industry-leading 18 films grossing over \$100 million domestically. Three of those films – *The Sixth Sense*, *Toy Story 2* and *Armageddon* – grossed more than \$200 million in the United States alone. Roth helped to build Buena Vista International into the market leader, finishing first in market share five times in six years, the only company to gross over one billion dollars in each of those years. The studio's 1999 Best Picture nominees, *The Insider* and *The Sixth Sense*, led Disney to an industry-leading 17 Academy Award® nominations.

From 1992 to 1994, Roth, with Roger Birnbaum, headed Caravan Pictures, which produced such hits as *While You Were Sleeping*, *Angels in the Outfield* and *The Three Musketeers* for Disney.

Before establishing Caravan Pictures, Roth served as Chairman of Twentieth Century Fox from July 1989 until November 1992. During his tenure at the studio, the company made such successful films as *Home Alone*, *Home Alone 2: Lost in New York*, *Die Hard 2*, *Sleeping with the Enemy*, *Mrs. Doubtfire*, *My Cousin Vinny*, *White Men Can't Jump*, *Edward Scissorhands*, *The Commitments* and *The Last of the Mohicans*.

Prior to Twentieth Century Fox, Roth was a highly-successful independent producer/director, co-founding Morgan Creek Pictures, for which he produced such films as *Young Guns*, *Dead Ringers*, *Major League* and *Bachelor Party*. Roth directed both *Streets of Gold* and *Revenge of the Nerds II* for Twentieth Century Fox, and *Coupe De Ville* for Universal Pictures.

Equally noted for his diverse civic and charitable activities, Roth has received various awards such as the 1991 Variety Clubs Man of the Year award, the 1996 Humanitarian Award from the NCCJ, the 1997 American Museum of Moving Image Award and was honored in 1998 by APLA and the National Multiple Sclerosis Society. Roth was also the recipient of the 2004 Dorothy and Sherrill C. Corwin Human Relations Award from the American Jewish Committee, and is an active supporter of the AIDS alliance.

A lifelong fan, player and coach, Roth now wishes to further his association with soccer by taking the professional game in America to a much higher level of competitiveness and visibility.

A New York City native, Roth grew up in the soccer hotbed of Long Island and played from age 10 into his first two years of college. He saw action for both Bowling Green and Hofstra before a career-ending leg injury. He graduated from Boston University in 1970.

Roth has three children, Zach, Julia and David. He was involved in coaching his son Zach's team for 15 years.

ADRIAN HANAUER

OWNER & GENERAL MANAGER



Adrian Hanauer first kept the flame of professional soccer alive in Seattle before helping to reignite the community's passion for the game with the arrival of a Major League Soccer expansion franchise for 2009. Hanauer is both an owner and the Sounders FC general manager.

Under Hanauer's leadership, the Sounders FC achieved instant success during the inaugural season. Seattle won the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup and became the first MLS expansion team to reach the playoffs in 11 years, while finishing with the League's fourth-best record (12-7-11, 47 points). Four players made the MLS All-Star team and five were named finalists for League year-end awards, with Fredy Montero voted Newcomer of the Year.

Since 2001, Hanauer has been associated with the highest level of soccer played in Seattle. He first joined the ownership group of the Sounders franchise in the United Soccer League's First Division, and later became majority shareholder and general

manager. His first season in that role, 2002, was rewarded with Seattle going 23-4-1—the second-best record in league history. From 2004 to 2007, the Sounders played in the USL-1 championship game three times, winning twice (2005, 2007) and also taking a Commissioner's Cup (best record) in 2007.

Hanauer has over 20 years of business experience in a variety of other industries. On numerous occasions he has made early stage investments in technology companies with interests in advertising, infrastructure, and wireless communications. Hanauer co-founded Curious Office Partners, which invests in and incubates early stage technology companies. He was a seed stage investor in aQuantive Inc, the largest interactive advertising company which was later acquired by Microsoft for \$6 billion US, and he was also an early investor in Amazon.com.

Hanauer also brings a great deal of "brick and mortar" business experience. The Hanauer family owns Pacific Coast Feather Co., the nation's largest manufacturer of pillows, comforters, and bedding products. He also owns one of the largest chains of picture framing companies in the United States, as well as a small chain of pizza restaurants.

Involved in many organizations in Seattle, Hanauer sits on the Board of Trustees for the Museum of History and Industry. He has also sat on the advisory board of The University of Washington Intercollegiate Sports Master's Degree Program.

Hanauer's interest in soccer began at the age of 3, and he saw his first NASL Sounders game at the age of 8. He went on to play for Mercer Island High School and remains active in the Greater Seattle Soccer League.

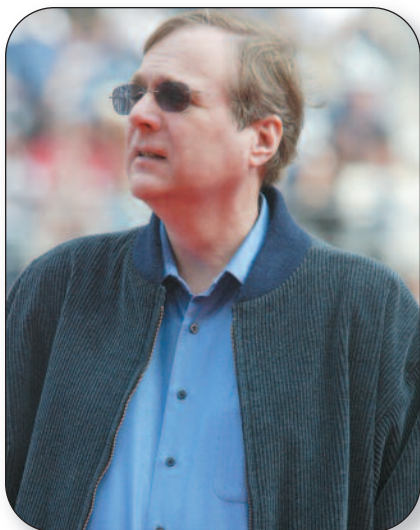
In addition to his interest in Sounders FC, Hanauer also is a board member of England's Cambridge United Football Club, currently of the English Conference (fifth tier). While with the USL Sounders, Hanauer promoted international matches, most notably an exhibition between Real Madrid and D.C. United which attracted a record Seattle crowd of 66,612 to Qwest Field in 2006. The Sounders also arranged friendlies featuring Mexico's Club America and Britain's Sunderland, Cardiff City FC and Preston North End.

Hanauer, 44 (2/7/1966) enjoys skiing, snowboarding, traveling and playing soccer. He is a graduate of the University of Washington and lives in Seattle.



PAUL G. ALLEN

OWNER



Paul G. Allen helped bring major league soccer to the northwest when his Vulcan Sports and Entertainment joined the ownership group behind the Sounders FC. The announcement in 2007 was the result of years of work and enthusiasm on behalf of Seattle soccer fans.

Allen had visions of world-class soccer in his hometown soon after purchasing the Seattle Seahawks of the National Football League. Allen bought the club to save pro football in Seattle after the former owners threatened to move the team to southern California.

On June 17, 1997, voters of Washington State approved "Referendum 48" authorizing a public/private partnership to construct a stadium, exhibition center, and parking facilities. One of the keys to the success of the vote was statewide support from the soccer community and its hope to see professional soccer return to the northwest.

Growing up in the Seattle, Allen's passion for sports began when he attended University of Washington football games. As years passed, a fondness toward the Seahawks developed.

"From the beginning of this process, my goals have been to work with the community to create a lasting asset for our future; and to ensure the long-term success of the Seahawks," said Allen at the time of purchasing the franchise. He also wanted to "create a world-class facility for the state of Washington."

That became a reality in 2002 with the opening of the Seahawks Stadium and Exhibition Center, renamed Qwest Field and Qwest Field Event Center in 2004. An open air facility which many critics argue is the best venue in the National Football League, Qwest Field is home to over 300 events annually including soccer, Supercross, concerts, graduation ceremonies, and trade shows.

"It exceeds the vision we had originally," Allen said shortly after the opening of the stadium. "We had a bunch of goals about trying to create a really intimate stadium that would be great for the fans, to have elegant architecture, and I think we've ended up with a fantastic facility."

Allen is an active investor and philanthropist. He co-founded Microsoft with Bill Gates in 1976 and continues to be an innovator in the world of business and technology. He is founder and chairman of Vulcan Inc., which oversees his philanthropy and business interests, and he owns the NBA's Portland Trail Blazers.

Allen has been named one of the top philanthropists in America - with lifetime giving totaling \$1 billion, almost exclusively to communities in the northwest. Allen gives back to the community through The Paul G. Allen Family Foundation, which strengthens communities and supports vulnerable populations in the areas of arts and culture, human services, opportunities for youth, and scientific advancement. In 2003 he pledged \$100 million for creation of the Allen Institute for Brain Science in Seattle. The nonprofit Allen Institute was founded as an innovative and unprecedented resource for neuroscientists around the world. In 2006 the Allen Institute completed its inaugural project, the Allen Brain Atlas — Mouse Brain. The mouse brain atlas is a Web-based, three-dimensional map of gene expression in the mouse brain which is accessible online at no cost to researchers. Detailing more than 21,000 genes at the cellular level, the Atlas continues to help lead scientists to new insights about neurological function and disease. In 2008 the Allen Institute announced three new major atlas projects - the Allen Brain Atlas (ABA)—Human Brain, ABA—Developing Mouse Brain, and ABA—Mouse Spinal Cord. The new atlases are designed to accelerate brain and spinal cord research, dramatically advancing the field of neuroscience.

Inspired by growing up in the era of the "space race," with its Mercury, Gemini, and Apollo missions, Allen underscored his passion for rocketry by sponsoring the development of SpaceShipOne, the first privately funded spacecraft to successfully attain suborbital space. He founded the Experience Music Project, Seattle's popular and critically acclaimed interactive music museum; the Science Fiction Museum and Hall of Fame and the Flying Heritage Collection -- a collection of rare World War II aircraft restored to flying condition. Allen's Vulcan Productions has produced films including *Where God Left his Shoes*, *Hard Candy* and *Far From Heaven*. The company's award-winning documentary work includes the *Evolution* series on PBS, *The Blues*, executive produced by Martin Scorsese in conjunction with Allen and Jody Allen and *Rx for Survival—A Global Health Challenge™* in partnership with WGBH/NOVA. In 2010, Vulcan Productions co-produced PBS' *This Emotional Life*, a critically acclaimed, three-part series that explored improving our social relationships, learning to cope with depression and anxiety, and becoming more positive, resilient individuals.

DREW CAREY

OWNER



Drew Carey is a stand-up comic turned actor and producer and is now regarded as American soccer's most recognizable supporter. Carey is a minority owner of Seattle Sounders FC and serves as chairman of Sounders FC Alliance, the club's member association.

Carey was selected last summer to serve on the USA Bid Committee, a non-profit organization created to prepare a successful application to host the FIFA World Cup™ in 2018 or 2022 on behalf of the United States Soccer Federation.

Carey had the distinction of having two hit shows simultaneously: the long-running comedy "The Drew Carey Show," which ran from 1995-2004, and the improv/sketch show "Whose Line Is It

Anyway?" on which he was host and a producer. The success of that show led to the creation of "Drew Carey's Improv All-Stars," an improv group that performs in showrooms across the country. In July 2007, Carey was named the host of THE PRICE IS RIGHT, America's longest running game show.

While in the Marine Reserves, his military buzz cut and black wide-rim glasses became part of his trademark look. He began his successful career as a comedian in April of 1986 at the Cleveland Comedy Club. One of his first big breaks was competing on Star Search '88. In 1991, Carey landed a spot on HBO's 14th Annual Young Comedians Special and appeared on The Tonight Show with Johnny Carson. Carey openly credits Carson with launching his career. He received a Star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame in 2003.

Carey's interest in soccer began while attending an L.A. Galaxy game in 2003. Shortly after, he started seeing every professional game he could find time for, including European league games and U.S. National Team qualifying games. He learned more about the game and, during a later visit to Spain, saw the Barcelona FC team in action. He also worked as a press photographer during the 2006 World Cup in Germany, his efforts chronicled on a Travel Channel show entitled Drew Carey's Sporting Adventures and his photos have appeared in numerous publications.

During his travels Carey became fascinated with the empowerment of supporters at such clubs as Barcelona and Real Madrid, where leadership positions are voted upon by the members. He brought that idea to Sounders FC, where members will vote on various matters, most notably the fate of the general manager every four years. Carey is also the driving force for Seattle's 53-piece marching band, Sound Wave. Carey, 52 (5/23/58), is a native of Cleveland, Ohio.

TOD LEIWEKE

CEO VULCAN SPORTS & ENTERTAINMENT



Tod Leiweke was instrumental in bringing Major League Soccer to Seattle and fulfilling a promise made by Paul Allen to bring professional soccer to Qwest Field. As CEO of Vulcan Sports & Entertainment, Leiweke oversees all aspects of the Seattle Seahawks and manages Allen's minority ownership interest for Seattle Sounders FC. He is also president of First & Goal Inc., which operates Qwest Field and Event Center for the state of Washington.

On March 1, 2007, Allen appointed Leiweke to head a new entity, Vulcan Sports and Entertainment, an organization which envelopes Sounders FC, the Seahawks, First and Goal Inc., the Portland Trail Blazers and Rose Garden. Initially, Leiweke served as Seahawks CEO since June 2003.

The 2010 MLS season marks Leiweke's 28th in professional sports. In 2009, Leiweke returned to his roots, launching Sounders FC and under his direction the club set a new MLS season record for attendance. He played soccer as a youth in the sport's bastion, St. Louis. In 1981 he joined two of his brothers, Tracey and Tim, in operating the Kansas City Comets of the Major Indoor Soccer League. The Comets proved to both successful on the field and popular with spectators, drawing capacity crowds to Kemper Arena. Leiweke later became general manager of another MISL franchise, the New York Arrows, located on Long Island.

Soon after arriving in Seattle, Leiweke sought to engage Seahawks fans in a meaningful way and to make good on Allen's promise to bring top-flight soccer to Qwest Field. In 2005, Qwest Field was named by The Sporting News as the finest venue in the National Football League. That year was historic both on and off the field. In addition to winning the NFC Championship and advancing to the team's first Super Bowl, the Seahawks won the

2005 NFL Sports Fan's Quality Award as the league's "Fan Friendliest" team. During the annual NFL meetings, Commissioner Paul Tagliabue commented on the extraordinary support and involvement of Seahawks fans.

In 2006 under Leiweke's direction, the Seahawks sold season tickets for the first time since the early 1990's and developed Blue Pride, the team's season ticket waiting list. By the end of the 2008 NFL season, Seattle had extended its sell-out streak at Qwest Field to 52 consecutive games. It is also generally regarded as the loudest stadium in the NFL, and Leiweke has stated it will soon become the loudest in MLS. Sounders FC has established a league record for season ticket sales more than six months before the first home game.

Leiweke's vision is an organization that is committed on behalf of its fans to winning in the stadium and in the community. Leiweke chaired a 2008-09 United Way campaign that raised more than \$100 million to help fight family homelessness. The campaign was capped with a "Climb for the Community" of Mt. Ranier (14,410 ft ASL) along side the Commissioner of the NFL Roger Goodell. The climb raised more than \$400,000. Leiweke was instrumental in forming the "Spirit of 12" Partnerships with the Seahawks. Teaming with Qwest Communications, the partnership benefits the American Heart Association, Boys & Girls Clubs Washington State Association, Camp Fire USA, Treehouse, and YMCA of Greater Seattle. Leiweke serves as a board member on a number of Washington-based organizations including Washington CEO Roundtable, YMCA of Greater Seattle, and The Space Needle. He was a leader in launching the annual Boeing Classic golf tournament in 2005 and serves as co-chair of the Executive Committee. The tournament has raised over \$2.3 million its first five years with the primary beneficiary being The Heart Institute at Virginia Mason Medical Center.

Before joining Vulcan Sports & Entertainment, Leiweke served as president of the Minnesota Wild and chief operating officer of Minnesota Sports & Entertainment (MSE). The Sports Fans of America Association, Inc. awarded the Wild its 2003 NHL Sports Fan's Quality Award to the Wild as the league's "Fan Friendliest" team. In an ESPN survey conducted in 2003, Minnesota was ranked No. 1 for stadium experience and No. 2 for fan relationships among 123 sports franchises. The Wild played to sellouts for every game in their first four seasons.

Prior to joining the Wild, Leiweke served as the inaugural executive director of The First Tee organization which welcomed underprivileged youth into the world of golf through the development of golf facilities throughout North America. Leiweke has also held executive positions with the PGA TOUR, the NHL's Vancouver Canucks and the NBA's Golden State Warriors. His older brother Tim Leiweke is also actively involved in MLS as President and CEO of AEG, which operates both the L.A. Galaxy and Houston Dynamo.

JOHN RIZZARDINI **COO SEAHAWKS, SOUNDERS FC** **AND FIRST & GOAL**



In 2007, John Rizzardini assumed the position of Chief Operating Officer for the Seahawks, Sounders FC and First & Goal Inc. In this role, his priorities are to increase revenue in primary areas of corporate partnership, tickets, broadcast, suites, retail and promotions.

He also oversees the day-to-day business operations for the teams that include branding, game presentation, HR, website and customer service. Rizzardini oversees management of the operations of Qwest Field and Qwest Field Event Center and the Theater. He originally joined the Seahawks front office in August of 2003, as Vice President of Marketing and Customer Sales. In 2006, Rizzardini was promoted to Senior Vice President and Chief Marketing Officer. Before joining the Seahawks, he served three years as Senior Vice President of Sales & Marketing for the National Hockey League's Vancouver Canucks and Orca Bay Sports & Entertainment. Prior to joining the Canucks, Rizzardini was Executive Vice President of the Los Angeles Arena Corporation, parent company of the Staples Center, the Los Angeles Kings, and the Los Angeles Galaxy of Major League Soccer. His professional career began with the Golden State Warriors where he served in a number of capacities from 1986 to 1995, including the last four as Vice President of Marketing and Ticket Sales. He is a graduate of Cornell College and holds a Master's Degree in Sports Management from Western Illinois. Rizzardini serves on the Boards of the Seattle University Center for the Study of Sport and the Seattle Sports Commission.

KAREN HARRISON **CFO** **SEAHAWKS, SOUNDERS FC AND** **FIRST & GOAL**



Karen Harrison is responsible for the financial oversight of the Seahawks, First & Goal Inc., and Seattle Soccer LLC. She is charged with establishing budgets, forecasting and managing cash flow. She also oversees the teams' financial reporting and analysis as well as reporting to the Public Stadium Authority. Another aspect

of this position is analyzing and handling economic challenges and opportunities as they relate to the National Football League and Major League Soccer. She also oversees the teams' information technology departments. Harrison originally joined the Seahawks in 1991 as a staff accountant and was promoted to her current

position in May 2009. In 1990, Harrison was loaned to the Seahawks from the public accounting firm Arthur Andersen & Company to assist in the Seahawks accounting department before being hired full time the following year. Promoted to controller in 1997, Harrison was promoted to Finance Director of the Seahawks in 2003 and added the same responsibility for First & Goal Inc., in 2005. Was selected to attend the Inaugural Stanford Executive Education NFL Program for Managers in 2003. Harrison grew up in the North Seattle area before moving overseas where she lived in Tehran, Iran, from 1974-78. She returned to the states and graduated from Seattle's Nathan Hale High School at the age 16. Went on to earn a B.A. in Accounting from Seattle University. Lives in Maple Valley, Wash., with her two labs Sprocket and Mazie.

GARY WRIGHT **SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT** **BUSINESS OPERATIONS**



Wright oversees all business operations for Sounders FC including ticket sales, corporate partnerships, community outreach, charities, fan experience, communications and marketing of the team. In his first year, Wright helped spearhead one of the most successful launches of a franchise, as Sounders FC

set a new MLS season record for attendance with an average of 30,897, and received the Doug Hamilton MLS Executive of the Year award. Prior to joining Sounders FC, Wright retired from the Seattle Seahawks after serving the franchise for 33 years, including the final 21 as a vice president. Wright originally joined the Seahawks in 1976 as director of publicity. He was named public relations director in 1982 and added the title of vice president in 1987. He was chosen by Hall of Famer Steve Largent to be his presenter at Largent's July 1995 induction ceremonies. Wright assisted the National Football League's media relations staff at 23 Super Bowls. Upon his retirement, the Seattle Seahawks named the press box at Qwest Field the Gary Wright Press Box in his honor. Wright spent two seasons prior to joining the Seahawks as the publicity director for the Southern California Sun of the World Football League and as league publicity director. Wright also served as vice president of operations for the Phoenix Racquets of World Team Tennis. Wright was the sports information director at Long Beach State University and coached football and basketball while teaching history and journalism in high school after graduating from Long Beach State. Wright is also a member of the Glendale College and Northwest Football Halls of Fame. He has instructed sports management classes at the University of Washington and Seattle University. He and his wife, Ann, have a family that includes their two grown sons, Larry and Steve; their wives Katy and Michelle; and five grandchildren, Owen, Fiona, Audrey, Stella and Maxwell.

Dave Pearson has more than 21 years of communication experience in professional sports. Promoted to vice president of communications and broadcasting on April 29, 2008, Pearson is responsible for managing the public image and overall communications strategy for the Seahawks and the

Sounders FC while serving as the primary liaison for local and national media outlets and broadcast partners for the Seahawks. He also oversees all radio broadcasts, preseason telecasts, team-produced radio and television shows, publications and website content for both clubs. As vice president, he also assumes various responsibilities revolving around game day operations at Qwest Field. Under his direction, the Seahawks Communications Department has been nominated by the Pro Football Writers of America for the coveted Pete Rozelle Award four times (1999, 2005-07). Seattle received the most nominations twice and won the award in 2007. Under his leadership, MLS recognized the Sounders FC Communications Department as the best in the league for 2009. The Seahawks Broadcasting Department has won two Emmy's for its preseason game broadcast. After beginning his career in 1989 as an intern in the Seahawks Public Relations Department, the Tacoma, Wash., native worked for the Houston Oilers two seasons (1990-91). From 1992-93 he was the assistant PR director for the Los Angeles Rams before returning to Houston as PR director prior to the 1994 season where he would help manage the team's transition to Tennessee. Pearson earned a degree in media relations and interpersonal communications from Pacific Lutheran University. He and his wife, Beth, have two children, Allie and Chase, and reside in Mill Creek.

CHRIS HENDERSON TECHNICAL DIRECTOR



One of the first Sounders FC acts was the hiring of Chris Henderson as technical director in January of 2008. Henderson assists the team's general manager, Adrian Hanauer, in all areas of soccer operations, including scouting, player management, coaching decisions and the youth system.

Under the leadership of Hanauer and Henderson, the Sounders FC achieved instant success during the inaugural season. Seattle won the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup and became the first MLS expansion team to reach the playoffs in 11 years, while

finishing with the League's fourth-best record (12-7-11, 47 points). Four players made the MLS All-Star team and five were named finalists for League year-end awards, with Fredy Montero voted Newcomer of the Year. Henderson is regarded as one of the most successful players ever produced by the state of Washington, having represented the U.S. at the international level 79 times and winning championships in both MLS and the NCAA. An MLS original, Henderson played 11 seasons for five teams. Upon his retirement following the 2006 season, he was league record-holder in four categories, including career games played (317) and started (304). He currently ranks No. 2 in those areas, as well as minutes played (26,242). Henderson still shares the MLS single game assist record (four assists for Kansas City in 1999) and his 80 regular-season assists is No. 8 all-time. He finished his career with 51 goals. Henderson joined Seattle after spending the 2007 season as an assistant coach for Kansas City under Curt Onalfo. Henderson began his MLS career with Colorado for their inaugural season in 1996 and he would play six full seasons for the Rapids with five of those squads reaching the playoffs. He set club records for career appearances and assists, and in 1997 earned a spot in the MLS All-Star Game and also help Colorado reach the MLS Cup Final. Henderson achieved a career high for goals (11) and again made the All-Star Game to begin his second stint for the Rapids in 2002. From 1999-2000 he played in Kansas City, helping the Wizards win the 2000 MLS Cup. That season he played in a career-high 38 games, scoring 10 goals and adding nine assists. He spent the 2001 season with the Miami Fusion before returning to Colorado. He was traded during the 2005 season to Columbus and completed his career with New York in 2006. Henderson played two seasons at UCLA, helping the Bruins win an NCAA championship and earning All-America honors in 1990. He connected on penalty kicks during tiebreaker wins in both the semifinal and final. Earlier that year, Henderson began senior international play prior to the 1990 World Cup. At age 19, he was the youngest member of the United States roster. He was also a member of the 1992 U.S. Olympic Team and an alternate on the 1994 and 1998 World Cup squads. He set a team record with five assists in 1993 and ranks 10th in career assists (10). In 2004, the Chris Henderson Foundation was launched, giving grants to fight Leukemia and to underprivileged children. He was named his MLS club's Humanitarian of the Year for both Colorado and New York. Born in Edmonds, Wash., Henderson, 38 (12/11/1970), attended Everett's Cascade High School where he earned the 1989 Washington Gatorade Player of the Year award. He played for the FC Seattle Storm in 1989 and began his professional career with Germany's FSV Frankfurt (1994-95) and Norway's Staebak (1995). He is married to Dee and has two children, Aidan and Annellee. His younger brother, Sean, played for UCLA, the USL Sounders and three seasons in MLS.



GRANT CLARK TEAM ADMINISTRATION DIRECTOR



As Team Administrator, Grant Clark oversees the team's preseason training camps, team travel, scheduling and administrative issues. He works closely with the coaching staff and players in the day-to-day operation of the team. Clark came to Sounders FC after serving as an account executive for the Universal Sports Group, a professional coaching service provider. The previous five years he spent with U.S. Club Soccer as the Western Regional Manager. From 1995 through 1999, Clark worked as Director of Business and Team Administration for San Jose Clash/Earthquakes, acting as the primary financial and administrative liaison within the team and MLS. In 2002, Clark served as the Director of Coaching for the Bainbridge Island Youth Soccer Club and was named Boys Coach of the Year. He holds a U.S. Soccer Federation 'A' level coaching license. Clark is a graduate of UCLA, where he played under Sigi Schmid, served as the team captain and is the three-time recipient of the team's Most Inspirational Player Award. He currently resides on Bainbridge Island with his wife, Dawn, and children Ian, Andria and Skye.

VINCE JOHNSON TEAM SERVICES DIRECTOR



Vince Johnson works closely with Grant Clark assisting in the day-to-day operations of the team, in addition to managing the Sounders FC facility and equipment issues. He also acts as the main liaison with the visiting team and MLS referees while they are in Seattle. Vince joined Seattle Sounders FC after working five seasons with the USL Seattle Sounders. Vince's duties with the USL Sounders comprised of game operations, team administration and all ticketing preparation and distribution. During Major League Soccer's 2003 season, Vince was an operations intern at the MLS League Office in New York City. He assisted with the run-up and execution of both the MLS All-Star Game and MLS Cup 2003. Vince graduated from Washington State University with a degree in Sport Management and was bestowed the "Most Outstanding Senior" award his final year at WSU. Born and raised in Seattle, Vince now lives in the Georgetown area of the city.

RANDY NOTEBOOM HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER



Randy Noteboom joined the Sounders FC staff following three seasons as the head athletic trainer for the USL-1 Sounders, from 2006-08. He is also a staff physical therapist and clinical specialist for Virginia Mason Sports Medicine, which he joined in 1985. Noteboom has also taught a number of courses on the care and prevention of injuries. He graduated from the University of Washington in 1980 with a degree in kinesiology and a degree in physical therapy from the University of Puget Sound in 1985. He received his athletic training certification from the NATA in 1982.

CHRIS CORNISH ASSISTANT ATHLETIC TRAINER



Chris Cornish enters his second year with the Sounders FC after gaining experience in the MLS with FC Dallas and D.C. United, and in the EPL with Fulham FC. Cornish, originally from Surrey, England, received his degree in Sports Therapy from the University of Hertfordshire. He worked as a sports therapist for Watford FC Academy and Kingstonian FC before going to Montana State University Billings, where he earned his Master's in athletic training while playing two seasons for the Yellowjackets. Cornish played soccer at the semi-professional & collegiate level. He holds an FA coaching license.

BART WILEY DIRECTOR OF BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

SIGI SCHMID



Named the first head coach of Seattle Sounders FC on Dec. 16, 2008, and is recognized as one of the most successful coaches in MLS history. Since 1999, Schmid's teams have won eight major titles, including two MLS Cups.

Schmid is the most successful active coach in MLS history and a two-time coach of the year. This past 2009 season he guided the Sounders FC to the playoffs, becoming the first expansion team since 1998 to make the postseason. The Sounders FC finished its first season with a regular season record of 12-7-11.

On September 2, 2009, Schmid's Sounders FC team defeated D.C. United, 2-1, to win the team's first trophy - the U.S. Open Cup.

In 2008, Schmid led his former club, the Columbus Crew to both its first MLS Cup and Supporters' Shield (best regular season point total), earning MLS Coach of the Year.

From 1999 through 2004 Schmid's L.A. Galaxy teams won four major competitions: 2002 MLS Cup, 2002 MLS Supporters' Shield, 2001 U.S. Open Cup and the 2001 CONCACAF Champions Cup.

He was voted the MLS Coach of the Year in his first season, 1999. Altogether, his Galaxy teams were 79-53-32 and reached the MLS Cup final four times and won three division crowns.

Schmid ranks No. 1 in MLS career victories (125), one ahead of Bob Bradley (124), current U.S. National Team coach. In his eleventh season, Schmid's teams have won 125 games, lost 93 and tied 68. His combined postseason win total (19) from L.A. and Columbus is the highest in MLS history. Schmid (286) has surpassed Bradley's MLS record of 272 career games coached.

Schmid is the only man in MLS history to coach two different teams to MLS Cup titles. He is one of two to coach in four MLS Cup finals (Steve Nicol).

Twice Schmid has served as U.S. Under-20 National Team head coach, most recently in 2005 at the FIFA World Championships. Schmid was an assistant to Bora Milutinovic on the Americans' 1994 World Cup team. He also was head coach for the 1991 World University Games and 1995 Pan American Games.

Scores of Schmid's UCLA players have played professionally and internationally, including Sounders FC technical director Chris Henderson (1989-90). Others include Brad Friedel, Cobi Jones, Paul Caligiuri, Eddie Lewis and Carlos Bocanegra.

Schmid first forged a winning tradition at his alma mater, UCLA. After serving as an assistant, he was elevated to head coach of the Bruins in 1980, beginning a 19-year run at the helm. His first NCAA championship was won in 1985 at Seattle's Kingdome.

UCLA went on to claim two more national titles in 1990 and '97. Schmid was named national coach of the year following the '97 championship. When he left to take over the Galaxy, his UCLA teams had accumulated a record of 322-63-33.

Schmid is a member of both the National Soccer and UCLA halls of fame.

Born in Tuebingen, Germany, Schmid relocated with his family to the U.S. in 1956, and to Torrance, Ca., in 1962. He was a four-year starter at UCLA (1972-75). He graduated with a B.S. degree in economics in 1976 and later earned a M.A. in business administration from the University of Southern California. Schmid is a Certified Public Accountant.

He and his wife, Valerie, maintain a residence in Manhattan Beach. He has four children: Erik, Lacey, Kurt and Kyle. Kurt completed his first season in MLS as a Sounders FC assistant coach and scout in 2009. Kyle completed his career at UC Irvine in 2008.

BRIAN SCHMETZER

ASSISTANT COACH

Brian Schmetzer was named the top assistant coach for Sigi Schmid's staff on December 22, 2008. He is one of the Puget Sound soccer community's most recognizable figures after playing and coaching for the region's top professional franchises since 1980.

Schmetzer, 47, served seven seasons as the head coach of the Sounders' United Soccer Leagues First Division club. He guided Seattle to USL-1 championships in 2005 and 2007, and U.S. Open Cup semifinal advancements in 2007 and 2008.

Schmetzer has nine years of experience coaching and 15 years of playing at the professional level. He was a member of six championship teams during that span.

Schmetzer was head coach of the USL-1 Sounders from 2002-07. In addition to the two league championships, his teams also twice won the Commissioner's Cup for the best record and qualified for the playoffs six of seven years. He was chosen USL-1 Coach of the Year in 2002 after going 23-4-1. The Sounders were league runners-up in 2004. His overall regular season record was 100-57-41.

Previously, he was assistant to Fernando Clavijo with the Seattle SeaDogs from 1996-97.

Seattle won the Continental Indoor Soccer League title in 1997.

A Seattle native, Schmetzer signed with the Sounders' North American Soccer League franchise following his graduation from Nathan Hale High School in 1980. He played three seasons as a midfielder for Seattle before going to Tulsa for the final NASL season in 1984. Schmetzer was coached by his father as a youth and his team won seven out of 10 state youth championships.

Schmetzer signed with the San Diego Sockers in 1984 and played seven seasons in the Major Indoor Soccer League with San Diego (1984-88), Tacoma (1988-90) and St. Louis (1990-91). He was a member of San Diego's MISL championship teams in 1985, 1986 and 1988. He returned to Seattle for the Sounders' inaugural A-League season in 1994 before completing his playing career with the SeaDogs from 1995-96.

In 1985, Schmetzer played on loan to FC Seattle, scoring twice in a 2-1 friendly win over Brazil's Santos. While with Tacoma and FC Seattle, Schmetzer's teammates included younger brothers Andy and Walter. Schmetzer has three children, Daniela, Colin and Kian. He enjoys cooking and outdoor activities.



TOM DUTRA

GOALKEEPER COACH

Tom Dutra was named the Sounders FC goalkeeper coach on December 29, 2008, and is recognized locally for his work in developing young keepers as well as training established professionals.

Dutra, 37, served two seasons as keeper coach under Brian Schmetzer for the USL Sounders. Schmetzer serves as head coach Sigi Schmid's top assistant.

Dutra has worked with Kasey Keller, the Sounders FC keeper, since 2002. Dutra conducted 1-on-1 training sessions to prepare Keller for his return to Europe each summer. Under Dutra's guidance the past two years, Chris Eylander twice led USL-1 in saves and finished second in shutouts.

At the amateur level, Dutra served two seasons

(2007-08) as assistant coach for Saint Martin's University and was an assistant for five seasons (2002-06) at Pacific Lutheran. He was director of goalkeeping for Washington ODP in 2008 and served on the state ODP staff from 2002-04. Dutra was the goalkeeping director for Washington Premier FC from 2001-06 and also at Blackhills FC from 2001-08.

During his time with Washington Premier, Dutra worked with more than a dozen keepers who have played at the Division I collegiate level. Among those was Tally Hall, a member of the U.S. Youth National Team pool and currently playing for Esbjerg of the Danish Superliga (first division).

Dutra played four seasons in the A-League,

first as a backup to Marcus Hahnemann on the Sounders' 1996 championship team. He later started for New Orleans and Lehigh Valley (Pa.).

Born and raised in Olympia, Dutra graduated from Timberline High School. He was a member of

the youth national team program before sustaining a fractured leg. His career resumed in 1995 with the Oregon (Salem) Surge of the USISL Pro Division.

Tom is married to Molli and they have two children, Tanner and Maggie.



Ezra Hendrickson was announced as an assistant coach on January 20, 2009, after completing a 14-year professional career, including 12 seasons in Major League Soccer.

Hendrickson played parts of eight seasons for Sigi Schmid, including three in Columbus prior to his retirement. Hendrickson appeared in 266 regular season matches with 225 starts. Playing on defense, he scored 23 goals and added 30 assists. He also played in 32 postseason games with five goals and three assists.

Hendrickson was a member of three MLS Cup championship teams, winning two with Schmid. Together, they won the 2002 MLS Cup with the Los Angeles Galaxy and the 2008 MLS Cup in Columbus. Hendrickson was also with the champion D.C. United team in 2004.

A native of the island of St. Vincent in the Caribbean, Hendrickson began his career in 1997 with the New York MetroStars, before joining the Galaxy later that season. He totaled six seasons in Los Angeles, where he won the 2000 CONCACAF

Champions Cup scoring two goals in a 3-2 victory, and the 2001 Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup, scoring one goal in a 2-1 victory. He was named Galaxy's Most Valuable Player for the 2001 season.

Hendrickson went to Dallas in 2003 and began the next season with the A-League's Charleston Battery before joining D.C. United for its run to the 2004 MLS Cup. After starting all 31 appearances in 2005 for expansion Chivas USA, Hendrickson was acquired by Columbus in early 2006.

Kurt Schmid was named the Seattle Sounders FC scout and assistant coach on March 12, 2009.

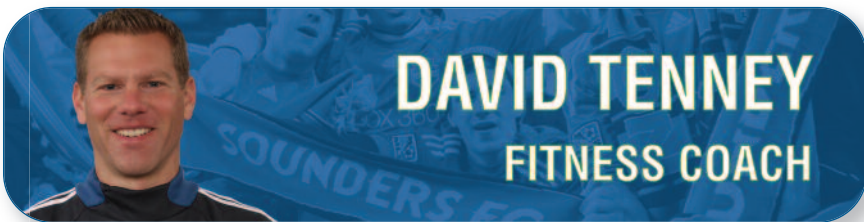

While at George Mason, Tenney also served as director of coaching for the Washington Freedom youth teams from 2004-06 and as Maryland's girls director of ODP, winning two ODP National

Championships (2005 and 2006). Tenney's playing career features both collegiate and indoor professional honors. At Virginia Tech (1989-91), he served as team captain the final two seasons. As the Hokies' goalkeeper, he was voted Metro Conference Defensive MVP in 1989.


ALL ABOARD THE MAGIC BUS

It was a magical first season of MLS soccer in Seattle. The supporters and home match atmosphere of Sounders FC are becoming legend. In September, the team lifted its first cup and clinched a place in the MLS Cup Playoffs.


Seattle was the first expansion team in 11 seasons and the second overall to clinch a winning record in its first season. It became the third expansion team to make the playoffs and the first since 1998. Miami and Chicago each qualified that year. The only other club to post a winning mark in its inaugural year was the Fire in 1998. Chivas USA finished above .500 and made the playoffs in its second year (2006). Miami (2001) and Real Salt Lake (2008) each needed four years to finish with winning records.

Sounders FC is the third first-year franchise in the modern era to win the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup, matching the achievement of D.C. United in 1996 and Chicago, an expansion MLS team in 1998. During the final two months of the season, Seattle won the Open Cup, ended an MLS record 22-game home unbeaten streak by Columbus, and defeated the hottest team in the league, FC Dallas. Seattle finished the regular season with an unbeaten record (3-0-3) in six matches against the top three teams in MLS: Columbus (1-0-1), Houston (1-0-1) and Los Angeles (1-0-1).



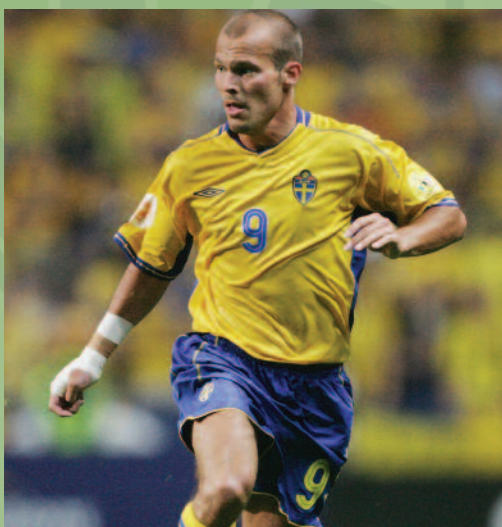

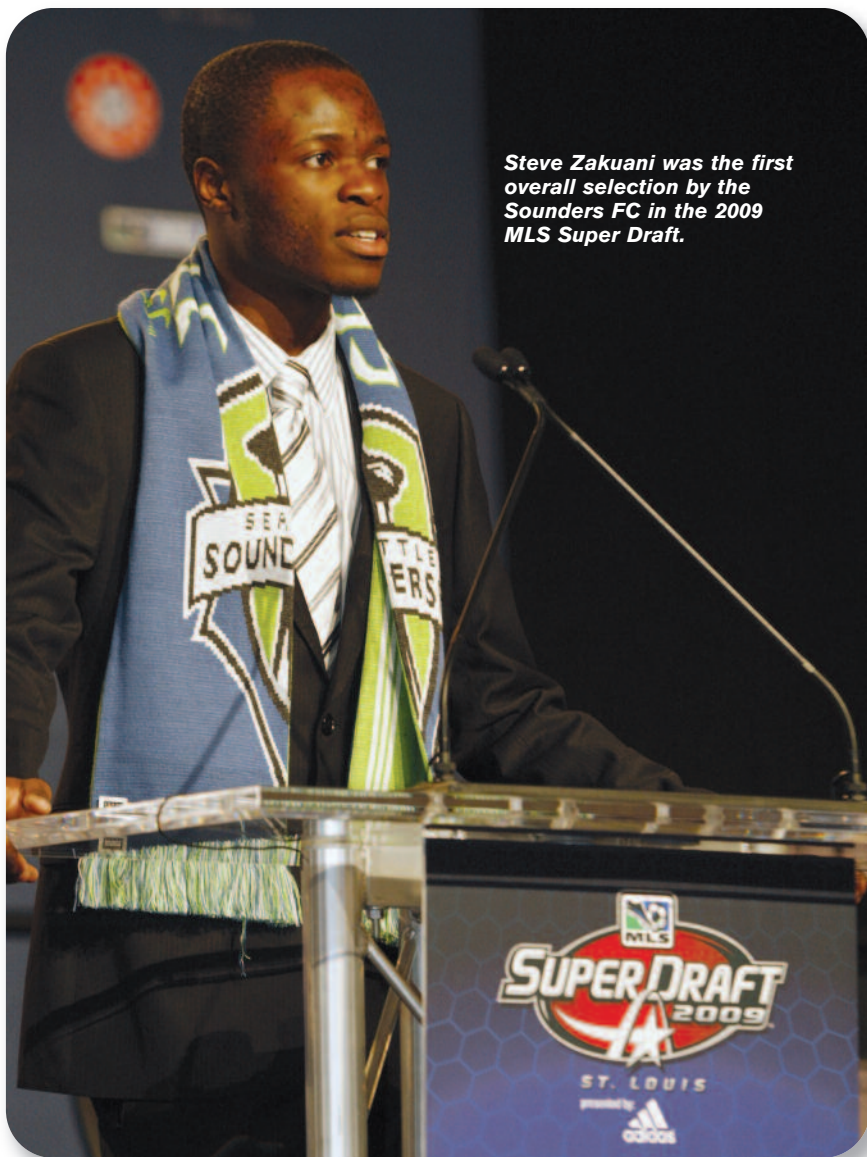

2009 LAMAR HUNT U.S. OPEN CUP

Seattle became the third first-year franchise in the modern era to win the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup.

Seattle's achievement of claiming the Open Cup in its first season equaled that of D.C. United in 1996 and Chicago, an expansion MLS team in 1998.

The Sounders FC cup run contributors featured a distinctive USL-1 flavor. All six former members of Seattle's fore-runner pro-franchise saw action in games in the play-in phase or tournament proper. In fact, they figured in nine of the 12 goals scored. Sebastian Le Toux scored two goals and two assists in the play-in rounds, scored the game-winner in a quarter-final win over Colorado, and had the game-winning assist to Roger Levesque in the Cup Final.

In addition to his game-winner in the Cup Final Levesque also scored the opening goal at Portland in the third round and assisted on Nate Jaqua's equalizer versus Houston. Stephen King scored three goals in cup play, including the over-time winner against the Dynamo.

The Sounders FC earned one of the four U.S. slots in the 2010-11 CONCACAF Champions League by virtue of the Cup Final victory. The Open Cup winner receives an automatic spot in the Champions League preliminary round. The other berths are determined by the outcome of the MLS regular season and playoffs. CONCACAF is the game's governing body for North America, Central America and the Caribbean.

Daniel Sturridge and Frank Lampard scored first-half goals as Chelsea FC of the English Premier League prevailed in a friendly played before 65,372. It

was the third-largest figure for a professional soccer match played in Seattle. FA Cup holders Chelsea, under new manager Carlo Ancelotti, opened the scoring in the 12th minute of the match when Sturridge received a pass from midfielder Florent Malouda and curled his 16-yard shot inside far post, past goalkeeper Kasey Keller. Sturridge also assisted on Lampard's goal. His pass put Nicolas Anelka deep into the right side of the box, and Anelka's ball back into the crease was finished by Lampard in the 35th minute. Seattle finished with an 11-3 advantage in corner kicks but was out-shot by Chelsea, 13-10. Two of Seattle's three closest scoring chances involved Freddie Ljungberg. In the 33rd minute, his 25-yard free kick was tipped over the bar by Chelsea keeper Petr Cech. Just before halftime, Ljungberg's long drive toward goal was blocked by defender Alex. In the 73rd minute, Sounders FC winger Sanna Nyassi broke through against Chelsea reserve keeper Henrique Hilario, only to have his chip sail just over the right post.

Lionel Messi scored two first-half goals to lead the reigning European champions in a friendly played before a record crowd of 66,848.

The attendance was the largest for a professional soccer match played in Seattle. The previous mark was 66,830 for a 2006 friendly between Real Madrid and D.C. United. Messi, a 22-year-old Argentine midfielder who would later be named 2009 world player of the year, opened the scoring in the 21st minute of the match with a composed, curling 25-yard shot past Kasey Keller following a pass by Xavi Hernandez. Xavi also assisted on Messi's second goal. Messi brought down the ball inside the 6-yard box and quickly poked it left-footed under Keller. Jeffren Suarez and Pedro Rodriguez scored in the second half for Barcelona. A Rodriguez cross set up Jeffren Suarez at the far post in the 75th minute and Rodriguez converted a rebound from a Suarez shot past Seattle goalkeeper Terry Boss in the 89th. Freddie Ljungberg produced Seattle's best scoring chance in the first half. Barcelona keeper Jose Manuel Pinto's weak clearance was taken by Ljungberg but his 18-yard drive went wide left. Defender Leo Gonzalez played his first match for the Sounders FC after signing July 2. He missed a month while with the Costa Rican National Team for the CONCACAF Gold Cup.

WHAT

Major League Soccer is the top-flight professional soccer league in the United States and was founded in 1996, after the country hosted the 1994 FIFA World Cup. MLS kicks off its 15th season on March 25, 2010 with the League's 16th and newest team, Philadelphia Union, making their debut. MLS continues to grow as teams in Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada and Portland, Oregon will become the 17th and 18th clubs in 2011.

SEASON

- The 2010 MLS regular season opens March 25 and ends Oct. 24. The MLS Cup Playoffs begin Oct 28. MLS Cup 2010, the League's championship game, will take place Nov. 21.
- In 2010, the 16 MLS teams will each play a 30-game regular season and eight teams will advance to the MLS Cup Playoffs. The top two teams in each conference, plus four "wild cards" with the most points after 30 games, regardless of conference, will qualify. The team that finishes with the most regular season points is awarded the Supporters' Shield.
- For the first time in its history, MLS will not play League games during the group phase of the 2010 FIFA World Cup. The group phase includes the first 48 games of the 64-game tournament that begins on June 11, 2010 in South Africa. The last MLS game prior to the World Cup will be played June 10 and MLS play resumes June 24 after the final group phase game. No MLS games are scheduled on the days of either World Cup Semifinal or the World Cup Final.
- More than 38 million fans have attended regular season games in MLS' 14-season history.
- In the 2009 MLS All-Star Game, the MLS All-Stars played English Premier League side Everton to a 1-1 draw before losing in penalty kicks at Rio Tinto Stadium, home of Real Salt Lake. MLS now has five victories and the one defeat in PKs against international opponents in All-Star Games. The 2010 MLS All-Star Game will be held at Reliant Stadium in Houston in late July, featuring an international opponent to be announced.
- In 2010, 10 of the 16 MLS teams will play in stadiums that were custom built for MLS clubs during the past decade. More soccer stadiums are scheduled to be completed during the next few years (More on stadiums below).

PLAYERS

In 2009, MLS clubs featured 141 players born in 53 countries outside the United States, demonstrating the diversity of Major League Soccer. Among the five major team professional sports leagues in the United States, MLS is the most diverse. About two-thirds of the entire MLS player pool is U.S.-born. A description of several notable MLS players follows:

- **Juan Pablo Ángel** (New York Red Bulls): Colombian forward was a standout with Aston Villa in England before joining the Red Bulls as a Designated Player in 2007. Has scored 46 goals in three seasons in MLS.
- **David Beckham** (Los Angeles Galaxy): Former Real Madrid/Manchester United midfielder and current English national team midfielder led the Galaxy to MLS Cup 2009.
- **Jimmy Conrad** (Kansas City Wizards): Veteran defender was a standout for the U.S. World Cup team in Germany in 2006. He's a four-time MLS Best XI member.
- **Dwayne De Rosario** (Toronto FC): De Rosario, from Scarborough, Ontario, is one of the League's most exciting and dangerous playmakers. He is the only two-time MLS Cup MVP winner.
- **Julian de Guzman** (Toronto FC): Former Deportivo de La Coruña (La Liga in Spain) standout and Canadian national team star signed with Toronto in September 2009.



- **Landon Donovan** (Los Angeles Galaxy): Considered the best American player today, Donovan, 27, is the all-time leader in goals and assists for the U.S. Men's National Team, a three-time MLS Cup winner and the League's 2009 Volkswagen Most Valuable Player.
- **Luis Angel Landín** (Houston Dynamo): The 24-year old Mexican forward signed with Houston in August 2009 as the team's first Designated Player. Began his career at Mexican powerhouse Pachuca and had stints with Morelia and Cruz Azul. Has five appearances with the Mexican National Team.
- **Freddie Ljungberg** (Seattle Sounders FC): A former standout with Arsenal and West Ham United of the English Premier League, Ljungberg was a member of the MLS Best XI during his first season in the League.
- **Guillermo Barros Schelotto** (Columbus Crew): The Argentine playmaker was named the League's Volkswagen MVP in 2008 and was also named the MLS Cup 2008 MVP after leading the Crew to their first MLS title. He recorded a League-high 19 assists in 2008 and was recently re-signed for the 2010 season.
- **Taylor Twellman** (New England Revolution): The 2005 MLS MVP and Budweiser Golden Boot winner. Entering 2010, Twellman had scored more MLS regular season goals (111) than any player since he joined the League in 2002. He is expected to return to action in 2010 after playing just 10 matches the last two seasons due to concussions.
- **Kasey Keller** (Seattle Sounders FC): Former U.S. International goalkeeper returned to the United States to play in MLS with his hometown club after a long and successful career in Europe with teams in the German Bundesliga, Spain's La Liga and most recently the English Premier League.
- **Fredy Montero** (Seattle Sounders FC): The 22-year old was the 2009 MLS Newcomer of the year as his 12 goals ranked third in MLS in 2009. He came to MLS from the Colombian First Division where he led the League in scoring twice.

INVESTORS

Major League Soccer is structured as a single, limited liability company (single-entity). In the single-entity business structure, club operators own a financial stake in the League, not just their individual team. The MLS investors are:

- **Phil Anschutz & the Anschutz Entertainment Group (AEG)**: Investor-operator of the Houston Dynamo and Los Angeles Galaxy (other domestic sports business ventures include the Staples Center, The Home Depot Center, the NBA's Los Angeles Lakers and the NHL's Los Angeles Kings).
- **The Hunt Family (Hunt Sports Group)**: Investor-operator of FC Dallas and the Columbus Crew (other sports business ventures include the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs and NBA's Chicago Bulls).
- **The Kraft Family (Kraft Soccer)**: Investor-operator of the New England Revolution (other sports business ventures include the NFL's New England Patriots).
- **Kroenke Sports Enterprises**: Investor-operator of the Colorado Rapids (other sports business ventures include the NBA's Denver Nuggets, NHL's Colorado Avalanche and NFL's St. Louis Rams).
- **SCP Worldwide**: Investor-operator of Real Salt Lake. Chairman David W. Checketts is the former president of the NHL's New York Rangers, the NBA's New York Knicks and Madison Square Garden (other sports business ventures include the NHL's St. Louis Blues).
- **Jorge Vergara & Antonio Cue**: Investor-operator of Chivas USA (other sports business ventures include soccer club Chivas de Guadalajara in Mexico and soccer club Saprissa in Costa Rica).
- **Red Bull Company Limited**: The Austrian company that produces the world's leading energy drink owns Red Bull New York. Other sports investments by Red Bull include a NASCAR team, Red Bull Salzburg, extreme sports and Formula One auto racing.
- **Maple Leaf Sports & Entertainment**: Investor-operator of Toronto FC (other sports business ventures include the NHL's Toronto Maple Leafs and the NBA's Toronto Raptors).

STADIUMS:

Major League Soccer has elevated the sport's stature in North America by building soccer-specific stadiums. In 1999, the League began moving aggressively to create custom-made venues for its teams that generate the atmosphere and intimacy the game deserves. The seating capacity for these stadiums is between 18,000 and 27,000 and the stadiums share design concepts with some of the finest soccer venues in the world. In 2010, 10 of the League's 16 teams will compete in stadiums built specifically for professional soccer. Red Bull Arena, home of the New York Red Bulls, and Philadelphia Union's new stadium open this season, and the Kansas City Wizards new venue is slated to open in 2011. In addition, the Portland and Vancouver MLS teams will move into stadiums renovated for 2011. The existing soccer-specific stadiums in MLS are:

- **Columbus Crew Stadium (Columbus, Ohio):** Opened in 1999 as the home of the Columbus Crew. Built by the Hunt Family, this stadium has hosted two All-Star Games, MLS Cup and many important U.S. National Team games.
- **The Home Depot Center (Carson, Calif.):** Opened in 2003 and is the luxurious home of both the Los Angeles Galaxy and Chivas USA.
- **Pizza Hut Park (Frisco, Texas):** Opened in 2005 as the home of FC Dallas. Hosted MLS Cup 2005 and MLS Cup 2006. A 145-acre multipurpose sports complex with 17 tournament-grade fields.
- **TOYOTA PARK (Bridgeview, Ill.):** Located just 15 minutes south of downtown Chicago, the handsome venue debuted in 2006 and hosted the Sierra Mist All-Star Game with Chelsea FC competing against the MLS All-Stars.
- **BMO Field (Toronto, Canada):** Toronto FC began play in MLS in 2007 and has sold out every regular season home game at the urban venue.
- **Dick's Sporting Goods Park (Commerce City, Colo.):** The Colorado Rapids' stadium opened in 2007 and is the centerpiece of a 24-field soccer complex believed to be one of the world's largest.
- **Rio Tinto Stadium (Sandy, Utah.):** Real Salt Lake's stadium opened in 2008 and was the host of the 2009 MLS All-Star Game.
- **Red Bull Arena (Harrison, NJ):** The New York Red Bulls state-of-the-art stadium is located 10 miles from midtown Manhattan. It features a dynamic form roof—a curving structure that wraps the entire 25,189-seat stadium in an elegant metal shell.
- **Philadelphia Union's stadium (Chester, PA):** This world-class waterfront stadium located just over 15 miles from Center City, Philadelphia. Built at the foot of the Commodore Barry Bridge, this 18,500-seat stadium will be the home to MLS' newest team and host its first MLS match on June 27, 2010 as Union host the Seattle Sounders FC.

TELEVISION

- MLS has long-term national television agreements in the United States with ABC and ESPN, Univision, Fox Soccer Channel and Fox Sports en Español. In Canada, MLS matches are televised on CBC, Rogers SportsNet and The Score.
- All MLS teams have regional television agreements.
- Every MLS match will be televised in 2010, either nationally or regionally, and most are available live on www.mlssnet.com.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER RULES OF COMPETITION

STRUCTURE: The 16 MLS teams are divided into two conferences:

Eastern Conference – Chicago Fire, Columbus Crew, D.C. United, Kansas City Wizards, New England Revolution, New York Red Bulls, Philadelphia Union, Toronto FC

Western Conference – Chivas USA, Colorado Rapids, FC Dallas, Houston Dynamo, Los Angeles Galaxy, Real Salt Lake, San Jose Earthquakes, Seattle Sounders FC

SCHEDULE: Each team plays a 30-game regular season schedule. Each MLS team will play two games against the other 15 teams (one home, one away) accounting for the 30 games of the season.

POINT SYSTEM: Teams will receive three points for a win, one point for a tie and zero points for a loss.

REFEREES: All referees in MLS are either USSF (United States Soccer Federation) or CSA (Canadian Soccer Association) National Referees. All MLS games played in the US will be assigned by USSF and all games played in Canada will be assigned by CSA.

GAME CLOCK: The official game time for all Major League Soccer games will be managed on the field by the referee. If necessary, the referee may also allot extra time (a.k.a. “stoppage time”) at the end of each period (first half, second half, and if applicable, first overtime period and second overtime period during playoff matches) to allow for injuries, time-wasting or other disturbances.

The stadium clock will display the time from 0:00 to 45:00 and from 45:00 to 90:00 (plus stoppage time where applicable in each half). For statistical purposes, the minutes for goals, substitutions, yellow cards, etc., will be listed from the first minute until the 90th minute. A goal scored at 15 minutes 10 seconds will be listed as having been scored in the 16th minute. Events occurring during stoppage time will follow the international norm by being demarcated with a “+” sign and the extra minutes. For example, a goal scored three minutes into first half stoppage time will be officially identified as happening at “48+”.

GAME DAY ROSTERS: Each team can nominate 18 players for a game day roster. Teams are allowed three substitutions per game.

CAUTIONS AND SUSPENSIONS: A player will be suspended for one game upon receiving his fifth yellow card – regardless of the nature of the infraction which resulted in his being awarded a yellow

card. A second suspension of one game would result after the awarding of an additional three cards as would a third suspension after the awarding of card number eleven. With the “Good Behavior” incentive it is possible for a player to have a caution expunged. If a player goes three games without receiving a yellow card, after an initial warning, the player will have one yellow card expunged. A player may take advantage of the “Good Behavior” incentive only once throughout the season.

MLS CUP PLAYOFFS FORMAT

WHO QUALIFIES: Eight teams qualify for the 2010 MLS Cup Playoffs. Playoff berths will be determined by points in the standings upon the completion of the regular season. All 16 teams will have played 30 games.

The top two teams in each conference qualify and are seeded 1 & 2 in their respective four-team playoff conference brackets.

The four MLS teams with the next most points, regardless of conference, receive “wildcard” berths.

The four wildcard teams will be seeded according to conference first.

If more than four teams qualify from one conference, the team finishing lower than fourth in its conference will shift over to the other conference bracket.

A team switching conference brackets will be seeded below all other teams in its new conference playoff bracket.

PLAYOFF FORMAT: Conference Semifinal series are conducted in a home-and-home, aggregate-goal format. The lower seeded team in the Conference Semifinal hosts the first game. The winners of those four series advance to single-game Conference Championships that will determine the MLS Cup Finalists.

The team that scores the most goals in the home-and-home series advances to the single elimination Conference Championship. If the teams are tied after 180 minutes in the Conference Semifinal series, a 30-minute extra time period (divided into two 15-minute periods) will be played followed by kicks from the penalty mark, if necessary. The team with the higher seed between the two Conference finalists will host the Conference Championship game.

In the case of ties after 90 minutes of regulation in



the Eastern and Western Conference Championship games and MLS Cup, 30 minutes of extra time (divided into two 15-minute periods) would be played followed by kicks from the penalty mark, if necessary, to determine the winners.

TEAM-STANDINGS TIE-BREAKING PROCEDURES

The team awarded the highest position in the MLS standings will be the team with the greatest number of points (3 points for a win, 1 point for a tie, 0 points for a loss). In the event that two teams finish the regular season with an equal number of points, the following system will be used to break the tie:

- 1) The highest position shall be awarded to the team with the better win/loss record in current regular season games against all other teams equal in points. (head-to-head competition)
- 2) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team with the greater goal difference against all other teams during the regular season. (goal differential)
- 3) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team scoring the greatest number of total goals against all other teams during the regular season. (total goals)

- 4) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the procedures described in this section shall be applied only to games played on the road by each team against all other teams during the regular season. (road 1-3)
- 5) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the procedures described in this section shall be applied only to games played at home by each team against all other teams during the regular season. (home 1-3)
- 6) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team with the fewest team disciplinary points in the League Fair Play table during the regular season.

If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position in the standings shall be determined by the toss of a coin.

The first tiebreaker in a three-way tie is also head-to-head, but it is determined via points-per-game versus the other two teams. If two teams are tied in points-per-game head-to-head, the next tie breaker is goal difference.

NOTE: If two clubs remain tied after another club with the same number of points advances during any step, the tie breaker reverts to step 1 of the two-club format.

SEATTLE SOUNDERS (1974-1983)

The tradition of professional soccer and the Sounders brand began with the arrival of the North American Soccer League expansion franchise. For 10 seasons they were successful and entertaining on the field, attracting some of the league's largest crowds. Just as importantly, the original Sounders created a legacy of developing local players capable of reaching the highest levels of the game.

In some respects, the Sounders paved the way for Seattle securing an NFL expansion franchise a year later. The founding ownership group featured six of the same partners, including Lamont Bean, Howard S. Wright, Lynn Himmelman, David Skinner, Lloyd Nordstrom and Herman Sarkowsky.

The Sounders played their first two seasons outdoors and under the Space Needle. Located on the Seattle Center campus, Memorial Stadium provided a central location and an intimate setting, although the crowds soon outgrew the initial 13,000-seat capacity. In fact, Seattle was the first NASL team to draw a sellout and did so for nine of the final 16 games at Memorial.

With the completion of the Kingdome, the Sounders moved south in 1976, and a sold-out preseason game against Pele and the Cosmos which set a North American attendance record of 58,128.

From the outset, the Sounders played an energetic, entertaining style while utilizing British veterans and young, mostly local, North American players. Although it won only two division titles, Seattle finished with winning records in seven of 10 seasons, twice reached the championship game, Soccer Bowl, and in 1980 the Sounders won 25 matches – the most in NASL history.

In each Soccer Bowl, Seattle met the star-studded New York Cosmos. The 1977 final marked the final competitive game for Pele. The Sounders only major trophy was the 1981 Trans-Atlantic Challenge Cup, a midseason tournament involving the Cosmos, England's Southampton and Scotland's Celtic.

The NASL and Sounders peaked in popularity by 1980, and over the following two seasons attendance declined while the number of teams dropped from 24 to 13. Seattle bowed out after the 1983 season, and a year later the league halted operations.

FC SEATTLE STORM (1984-90)

It can be argued that the rebirth of professional soccer in North America began with FC Seattle. In 1984, a year after the original Sounders folded, a new team surfaced with a new objective: to cultivate the best local talent and test it against the best in the business.

Funded by Eastside businessman Bud Greer and with former Sounders player and coach Jimmy Gabriel serving as coaching director, FC Seattle's approach was to create a pyramid system of youth teams feeding a senior men's program. That philosophy ran counter to the NASL era, when foreigners comprised the bulk of the roster and domestic players were in the minority.

Beginning with a summer series of friendlies against NASL teams and the U.S. National Team at Memorial Stadium, FC Seattle held its own and attracted an average of 6,669 fans. The first win came in Vancouver against the Whitecaps, 2-1.

In 1985, the stakes were raised and a league took root. With the NASL now disbanded, clubs from Europe, Mexico and South America were brought to Seattle. However, when British teams faced a worldwide travel ban, FC Seattle was forced to band together with other fledgling clubs to form the Western Soccer Alliance. That became the forerunner of the American Professional Soccer League or, as it was more widely known, the A-League.

Drawing on a mixture of former Sounders and stars from both Seattle Pacific and Washington collegiate programs, Seattle played a mixture of league and foreign exhibitions through 1988. That campaign culminated with Seattle winning the Western Soccer League championship and, later, making a five-match postseason tour of England. The Storm nickname was adopted prior to the 1989.

In 1990, the WSL merged with the East Coast's American Soccer League to form the APSL. In all there were 22 teams, but in 1991, with costs rising due to nationwide travel, membership fell to only nine clubs, and Seattle was not among them. After going dormant, it ceased operations altogether in 1992, although the brand was resurrected and used by an entry in the regional Pacific Coast League through 1995.

SEATTLE SOUNDERS (1994-2008)

In 1994, the World Cup was coming to America and, riding the resulting new wave of enthusiasm, professional soccer returned to Seattle after a three-year absence. The Sounders name was revived and the club, owned by Scott Oki and coached by Alan Hinton, joined the American Professional Soccer League.

From the outset, the Sounders nucleus was largely formed by homegrown talent. Hinton tapped into the college players being produced at both Seattle Pacific and Washington, and added experience in the form of past pros with local connections.

When Seattle won the 1995 A-League championship in its second season, eight of the 13 players who saw action originally came from the surrounding area's youth leagues. In 1996, when the Sounders repeated, nine starters were local products. Player/coach Neil Megson had been with both the original Sounders and Tacoma Stars for a total of nine seasons.

MLS opened play in 1996, and the A-League was thereafter classified as second division. Consequently, many of the top players were lured elsewhere. The Sounders remained competitive, qualifying for the playoffs in all but two of their 15 seasons and winning five divisional crowns.

In 2002 under the management of new majority investor Adrian Hanauer and the coaching of Brian Schmetzer, the club reached for new goals. Hanauer led the local effort to land a new MLS team and also moved the team from Memorial Stadium to the newly-completed Qwest Field. In fact, in the stadium's first event, the Sounders played to a USL record crowd of 25,515.

On the field, Seattle won a club-record 23 games in Schmetzer's first season. From 2004-07, it advanced to the USL championship game three times, winning twice. In U.S. Open Cup play, the Sounders eliminated four MLS teams in reaching back-to-back semifinals in 2007 and '08.

QWEST FIELD



In 1996, Paul G. Allen obtained an option to purchase the Seattle Seahawks and launched a campaign to win public support for a new world-class football/soccer stadium and exhibition center. Six years later, the dream became reality as the Seahawks opened the 2002 preseason against the Indianapolis Colts in new Seahawks Stadium, renamed Qwest Field on June 2, 2004. The facility, built atop of the site of the Kingdome, is not only home to the Seahawks, but the stadium accommodates many levels of soccer competition, including Major League Soccer, amateur, international, World Cup and collegiate soccer.

Qwest Field is designed with a 67,000 seat capacity, with 5,000 additional seats available for special events, and 1,400 seats for fans with disabilities. With a roof covering 70 percent of the seating area, fans enjoy wide, comfortable seats with sideline seating a mere 52 feet from the playing field and end-zone seats just 40 feet from the action. The facility also features a dozen elevators and expansive concourses with an ample provision of concessions stands and restrooms.

In 2009, Qwest Field was awarded the "Event Recycling Award" from the Washington State Recycling Association. As a host for over 300 events and more than 1.5 million visitors annually, Qwest Field and Qwest Field Event Center recycled 35% of more than 1,000 tons of waste material generated; including paper products, plastics, co-mingled metals, wood and compost. - 63 restrooms (799 toilets/364 urinals) – twice as many as the Kingdome
- 1,400 seats for people with disabilities and their companions – compared to 70 at the Kingdome
- 10,000 cubic yards of concrete – equal to a 3' sidewalk from Seattle to Boise, ID
- 3,756 miles of cable – could reach from Seattle to just beyond the Panama Canal
- Over 800 televisions
- 12 elevators — compared to three at the Kingdome
- The roof is 760 feet long – the same as three Boeing 747's parked end-to-end
- The roof is 210,000 square feet – enough to cover 3.5 football fields
- 50 concession stands/47 beer concessions – twice as many per person as the Kingdome
- The FieldTurf production used more than 35,000 recycled ground-up tennis shoes and 30,000 recycled ground-up tires
- The roof contains 5,700 tons of steel – equal to 35 Statues of Liberty or 1,000 Orca whales
- 100% of the concrete from the Kingdome was processed and recycled (50% built into Qwest Field)
- Wide concourses offer outstanding views of the Seattle skyline, Safeco Field, the Cascades and Mt. Rainier, Puget Sound and the Olympic Mountains.
- There is a 2,000 car garage – part of 6,500 parking spaces near Qwest Field.

QWEST FIELD FUNDING

The \$430 million facility is owned by the public and was funded by a private-public partnership. Private contributions totaled at least \$130 million, while the public contributed up to \$300 million through a lottery and a variety of taxes generated by events in the stadium/exhibition center.

A breakdown of the funding package:

- \$130 million private investment led by Paul Allen
- \$127 million from new, sports related games, similar to the Mariners' baseball-themed scratch games
- \$101 million in sales taxes collected in King County attributable to events in the stadium/exhibition center
- \$56 million from facility admission and parking taxes
- \$15 million from extending King County's share of the existing hotel-motel tax
- \$1 million per year of in-kind advertising for the new lottery games will be provided by Paul Allen
- All excess stadium revenues will fund youth athletic facilities throughout Washington State in addition to a \$10 million contribution from Paul Allen
- Paul Allen agreed to pay for any construction cost overruns
- As an added measure, the debt on the Kingdome was retired, freeing property taxes for other purposes

FIRST & GOAL INC.

In June of 1997, Washington State voters approved a funding package to build a new football/soccer stadium and exhibition center. With that, Paul G. Allen and Football Northwest created First & Goal Inc., an entity that represented the interests of Qwest Field in the construction of the new stadium and now manage the stadium and event center on a daily basis.

STARFIRE SPORTS COMPLEX



Starfire Sports Complex is the official training facility and administrative home of the Seattle Sounders FC. Starfire Sports is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization located in Tukwila, Washington, whose mission is to inspire, encourage, and empower youth through participation in sports. In order to accommodate the Sounders FC, Starfire Sports expanded to include four additional soccer fields and a state of the art locker room lounge area in 2009.

The main Starfire Sports Complex, offers eight outdoor soccer fields: four full-size FIELDturf™ fields, four grass fields varying in

size, four head tennis courts, plyo-metric and soccer circuit training facilities, and one MOD-sized FIELDturf™ field designed for skills or goal keeper training.

Starfire Sports Stadium offers seating for over 3,000 people with covered and uncovered grandstands, a full video Pro-Star scoreboard, and a press box with a full PA system.

The new Sounders FC training complex consists of two FIELDturf™ MOD sized fields that are 85 x 50 yards, one oversized FIELDturf™ field that is 75 x 120 yards, and one oversized grass field measuring 80 x 120 yards with additional areas for skills training. All FIELDturf™ fields are lighted with a state of the art lighting system from MUSCO®.

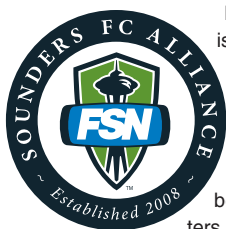
The Starfire Sports Complex also includes an 80,000 square foot Athletic Center Building housing two FIELDturf™ indoor fields that are 75 x 175 feet, locker rooms, team meeting and film study areas, an academic study room with computer/internet access and a food court with outdoor deck seating. The Athletic Center also contains a Soccer West retail location, MAD Pizza restaurant and bar, Café Siena, and the Starfire Sports administrative offices.

SOUNDERS FC ALLIANCE

OVERVIEW



In the ongoing commitment to the fans, the Seattle Sounders FC Alliance is the only members association in professional sports in the United States to offer its members a voice in club matters. Every member has a vote in determining the direction of the club. By purchasing season tickets, fans are automatically a member of the association and able to receive all benefits. In addition, non-season ticket memberships are available for a fee of \$125. Members receive voting privileges, a pin for years of membership, a membership card, discount at team shops, information on matters relating to the association and the team, and an invitation to the annual meeting and season review highlight film premier.

FSN serves as presenting sponsor of the Alliance.

ALLIANCE COUNCIL

Council members are elected on an annual basis with terms extending from March to November. Members interested in participating on Council must receive a minimum of 25 votes from other members of the Alliance. The Alliance Council meets two times per year in addition to the annual all-members meeting held at the conclusion of each season.

Each Council member serves as a liaison between members and the ownership group.

Five (5) Council members will also be chosen by ownership to serve on the Sounders FC Advisory Board – a board made up of ownership, technical staff, corporate partners, and members of the soccer community. Advisory board meetings take place on a quarterly basis with the annual meeting serving as the fourth quarter Advisory Board meeting.



YOUTH DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM



The Sounders FC Youth Development Program in cooperation with Washington Youth Soccer will feature three unique programs in 2010. Those programs include; Four 5 week Youth Development Sessions, Boys & Girls High School Prep Camp, as well as annual Coaching Symposiums.

Each program is designed with specific goals in mind. YDP & High School Training sessions focus on topics relevant to every aspiring young player. Training is open to all goalkeepers, defenders, midfielders, and strikers. SFC Youth Development Programs are instructed by the finest coaches in the northwest, and designed for the serious soccer player. Through encouragement, motivation, and appropriate pressure, the coaches will work to advance the individual game of each participant..

SOUNDERS FC CAMP PROGRAM

Sounders FC found great success both on and off the pitch in 2009. While the players found the net on the field, SFC Camps launched the largest camp system in Major League Soccer. SFC Camp Programs will strive to build on that success in 2010.

Sounders FC will host camps across the state of Washington and across the Region in 2010. The Sounders FC Camp Program features an extensive 10 week Summer Camp Program, Spring Break Camps, as well as Team Camps.

The camp system is ideal for the beginning to intermediate player, focusing on applying both the technical and tactical pieces of the game. Sounders FC offer a half-day program for ages 4-15, and full-day camp for ages 7-15. All campers will learn from elite high school, college, professional, and former professional players/coaches.

- Shale is a sedimentary rock formed under intense pressure. As the dark gray in the Sounders FC palette, it signifies an iron resolve.

SOUNDERS FC BROADCASTING

TELEVISION



Every home and away Sounders FC match will be broadcast live on KING-6/16 or KING-5, except those broadcast nationally. Each broadcast will feature an exclusive pregame show and a postgame wrap-up. KING-5 also produces a weekly show.

The Seattle Sounders FC and FSN reached a multi-year agreement last year that increases the broadcast exposure for soccer fans in the Northwest. FSN will also serve as the presenting sponsor of the Sounders FC Alliance, which provides the team's supporters one of the most integrated and unique connections to the franchise in all of sports.

FSN will own the distribution rights for a variety of ancillary programming featuring Sounders FC, which include match replays and team shows, both on the network and via on-demand (VOD). FSN gains the exclusive right to replay Sounders FC.

As the presenting sponsor of the Sounders FC Alliance as well as the team's series of youth community events, FSN has extended its commitment not just to the team and its fans, but to the greater soccer and sports communities throughout the Northwest.

Bonneville Seattle Radio Group will again broadcast all Sounders FC home and away matches on News Talk 97.3 KIRO FM.

News Talk 97.3 KIRO FM will air Sounders FC match broadcasts as well as pre and postgame shows on 97.3 KIRO FM. Bonneville and Sounders FC will also join forces to produce a weekly 60-minute Sounders FC show on 710 ESPN Seattle.

Turn left onto West Valley Hwy/Interurban Ave S/WA 181 N. Continue to follow Interurban Ave S. Turn right on to Fort Dent Way. Go over bridge and enter park.

MEDIA POLICY

CREDENTIALS

Season media credentials will be issued to recognized newspapers, magazines, television and established radio stations making reasonable requests. To qualify, an outlet must cover 18 of the club's home games. Because of limited photo credentials, it is impossible to grant freelance photographer access unless assigned to shoot for a specific story or project.

ROAD CREDENTIALS

Members of the Sounders FC's media traveling to road games should submit requests for credentials to the Communications Department no later than five (5) business days prior to the road game.



MEDIA WILL CALL

Members of the media needing to pick up passes at the game will find the Media Will Call booth located at the Southwest corner of Qwest Field. Each person must pick up his or her own credential and present corresponding photo identification. Media Will Call opens two hours prior to the scheduled kickoff. All media must enter through the press gate entrance located at the Southwest Entrance. Media credentials will not be honored at any other entrance. All credentials are non-transferable, and any unauthorized use will subject the bearer to ejection from Qwest Field and confiscation of the credentials.

BROADCAST

In making requests for broadcast credentials, please specify requirements for spotters and/or statisticians. These services must be arranged in advance, and once they are made the statisticians must be compensated whether used or not. Broadcast booth locations are located in the Qwest Field press box.

PARKING

A limited number of parking passes are available for working media. Members of the media seeking parking passes are advised to make their requests as early as possible. Please note that that Sounders FC will not be able to accommodate all requests.

A limited number of TV news trucks will be allowed to park on the Qwest Field east access road. TV trucks which provide satellite, uplink or microwave functions will need to make prior arrangements with Kurt Shaffer, Director of Technical Services for First & Goal, Inc.

PRESS BOX

The Gary Wright Press Box at Qwest Field is located on the suite level on the west side of Qwest Field. The press box will open two hours before kickoff. Admittance is limited to working media members with valid credentials. The press box is intended for the purpose of providing a work place for writers, reporters, broadcasters and game personnel. It is imperative that season pass holders notify the communications staff of their intention to cover a game in order to receive press box seating. Family members and guests will not be accommodated in the press box. Abuse of press box press privileges will result in forfeiture of a press pass.

TELEPHONE/WIRELESS ACCESS

Several pool phones are placed throughout the press box. Remember pool phones are to be shared. Courtesy hard lines are available in the photo room. Qwest Field offers wireless internet access in all areas of the press box and photographers' work room. The access is free of charge and works with all wi-fi enabled computer equipment. Media wishing to pay for dedicated LAN connections should be made through the Communications Department.

GAME NOTES/STATISTICS

Game notes and statistics will be available in the press box. Statistics will be distributed to each seat throughout the game at halftime and 10 minutes following the game. Periodic announcements will also be made during the game.

LOCKER ROOM ACCESS

Following the conclusion of the game, a postgame news conference will be held in the NFL Visiting Media Room near both the Home and Visiting Locker Rooms in the south end of Qwest Field. At the end of the news conference the locker room will be open to media. Sounders FC and visitor locker rooms are located near the Southeast tunnel on the field level. Your cooperation and professional courtesy is asked in maintaining a proper working atmosphere for postgame interviews. Absolutely no autographs are allowed during media access periods.

Media cell phones - No media may use a cell phone at any time inside the locker room. Media members may carry their cell phones into the locker room but may not use them to place or take calls, or to take photos.



FIELD ACCESS

Only working newspaper, magazine and network TV photographers and club/stadium officials are permitted on the field during the game. Press Box passes will not be honored for field admittance at any time, unless authorized by Seattle Sounders FC.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

ENG crew and still photographers holding proper credentials may position themselves along either endline at field level. Immediately prior to each match, photographers who wish to shoot the traditional pre-game team photo will be escorted on cue to the midfield sideline by photo marshals. Photographers will be instructed to walk only on the sidelines—never on the field of play—en route to these temporary sideline positions. Once team photos have been taken, photographers will be directed to quickly return to their endline photo positions. During the match, photographers are advised that they have restricted freedom of movement. At no time during the match can photographers shoot from directly behind the goal. Also, movement from one end of the field to the other is allowed only at halftime on the sideline opposite the team benches. Still photographers DO NOT have access to the locker rooms at any time.

PHOTOGRAPHER PHOTO BIBS

Each accredited photographer will be issued a specially designed photo bib/vest provided by Sounders FC for identification purposes as a mandatory supplement to the credential. The photo bib serves as a temporary access control device and must be returned to the photo marshals area at the end of each match. The photo bib must be worn at all times while present at any photo position. Photographers in unauthorized shooting positions or not wearing a bib risk suspension of their credential. All photographers are required to wear a vest that must be obtained prior to the match in the Photographers' Workroom.

PHOTOGRAPHERS' WORKROOM

The Photographers' work area is located at the back of the press box.

MEALS

Food and beverages are available to working members of the media in the Press Box and Photographers' Workroom.

DURING THE WEEK

Training Access

During the regular season, training sessions typically run 75-90 minutes and usually begin at 10 a.m. Training times can and frequently do vary. Members of the media who intend to cover training sessions on a regular basis should call the Sounders FC Communications Department to obtain the latest training schedule information. Training sessions will, in general, be open to the media, but they may be closed at the discretion of the head coach. No media members are allowed into the locker room before, during or after training sessions.

Interviews

Interviews that require advance preparations or special accommodations by a Sounders FC player or staff member should be made by calling or e-mailing the Sounders FC Communications Department.
