COMING OF AGE

While it's true that many things grow better with age, the ongoing question is when do objects reach maturity?

When do people reach their prime? When should a business become profitable? How long must a venture be pursued before reaching for the prize?

For the family – the players, staff and fans – of Sounders FC, there's every indication that they are entering prime time. Three years into their journey, they are arriving way ahead of schedule on all fronts.

Most businesses forge a five-year plan to reach profitability. Seattle fans have filled the stands since Day One, with 50 consecutive sellouts while expanding capacity. Initially a shock color, Rave Green is ubiquitous, a staple of the Puget Sounder's wardrobe.

In most American sports, pro teams take an average of six seasons before

reaching the playoffs. Sounders FC have qualified for the MLS playoffs each of the first three years and lifted the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup three times—a feat managed only three other times in the tournament's 99-year history.

In league play, they have averaged more points per game with each successive season. On the international stage, Seattle is also pressing forward. They are the first MLS club to qualify for the CONCACAF Champions League in each of their first three campaigns. Better still, Sounders FC are improving in that competition, advancing to the group stage in 2010-11 and to the knockout rounds in 2011-12.

Such success is typically reserved for the most entrenched clubs. The soccer world is dominated by teams born in the 19th Century.

are a hundred years old at a minimum," says Sounders FC general manager Adrian Hanauer. "Ours is 15 years old. We're still trying to figure things out and learning who we are."

Yet it was determined well before the 2009 inaugural match that Sounders FC would not be taking baby steps.

"We set high standards, high goals, and went out and did everything we needed so we wouldn't live like an expansion team for the first 3-4 years," says Hanauer.

"Like the fans, I have to remind myself

that this club is still so young," admits coach Sigi Schmid. "The expectations were so high from the very beginning that our infancy was shortlived. We really viewed ourselves as an established club early on. We grew up fast and matured very early as a club."

Much of that maturation process was realized in 2011. Nothing came easily. In fact, it seemed as though Seattle was subjected to enough obstacles to torpedo not one. but two seasons.

It began just hours before the first match, with striker Blaise Nkufo parting ways with the club. Top scorer Fredy Montero sustained a fractured wrist. Sounders FC failed to win in any of the first four matches. It got worse.

A brutal tackle broke the leg of star winger Steve Zakuani and O'Brian White, Nkufo's heir apparent up top, was lost to blood clots in his leg. After 11 outings Seattle stood fifth in its division and had just three wins.

A lesser side might have succumbed. Instead, at that juncture, Sounders FC began forging a collective frame of mind to fight on, no matter what the circumstances. They were resolute. They would find a way to win.

Seattle broke down the walls of Real Salt Lake's home fortress, ending a MLSrecord 29-match home unbeaten streak. Playing down a man at Toronto, they won



on Montero's last-minute free kick. The wins began multiplying, the points piling up over 11 straight league and cup games without a defeat.

Hanauer credits technical director Chris Henderson, Schmid and the entire coaching staff for building a roster capable of withstanding injuries and fostering a mindset where players could focus on the objective at hand rather than the adversity surrounding them.

"Definitely we added a lot of maturity last year because of the various difficulties that we had to handle," says Schmid. "The team maintained their belief in themselves. We never lost faith in each other.

"When games weren't going our way, we stayed focused," he adds. "We had comeback wins. It might take until the final minute but we would find the right button to be successful in each game."

Further proof of Seattle's arrival came during August: Seven wins and a draw in eight starts. An extra-time victory in the Champions League. A stoppage-time rally at Kansas City. Playing without several regulars at Monterrey, yet becoming only the second MLS team to prevail on Mexican soil.

Sounders FC was winning every which way possible.

By early October, another Open Cup had been captured and the Rave Green were fast closing in the Supporters' Shield race. If not for a knee injury to talismanic midfielder Mauro Rosales, they might have made a deeper run toward MLS Cup. If there's an upside to a first-round exit, it's the resulting eagerness to begin again.

Approaching 2012, Sounders FC are a force to be feared. They possess three undeniable attributes of a budding champion: abundant talent, a positive belief system and a gnawing hunger for greater success.

"Our goal is to win as many games as we can and win the MLS Cup," Schmid



says. "There are 19 teams in the league and 18 teams will finish disappointed. We want to be the team that's happy, and we want to do it sooner than later."

The bond between Sounders FC players and their fans only grows stronger. The stadium was full and the spirit evident well before the first kick. From there the relationship has become symbiotic.

Wins and trophies beget bigger crowds, tremendous tifos and a passion never before seen from supporters on this continent. When their ranks swelled to more than 64,000 for retiring captain Kasey Keller's final home match, the world took notice.

Schmid said he and the team

have come to expect such displays, yet they will never take it for granted.

"We know they're going to be there for us every game," he says, "and they know we will fight the battle. The team and the fans are trying to meet each other's expectations at every match. From that standpoint I'm amazed every time I step on the field."

Hanauer repeatedly finds the stadium atmosphere astounding. "I'm continually blown away and proud of the history that's being made in soccer in this country."

Keller knows the community's connection to soccer and the Sounders name

began long ago, when he was just a boy on an Olympia farm. The history of the NASL and USL teams and the many people behind the scenes who have helped kick-start this phenomenon.

"I'm humbled not just for what the club has done for me and given me the opportunity to come home and finish my career is something that is just so incredibly special," Keller says. "You can ask my friends who were able to fly out, guys who've played around the world and they just can't believe it. They just are so proud of what's going on here in Seattle and I'm just proud to be a small piece of it."

For certain, what's happening in Seattle is special. The world's game has returned and been embraced with eyes and arms wide open. The club, spurred by such support and guided masterfully by its leaders, has become a source of pride both to the local community and the American soccer community at large.

Given the gains of the first three years, the trajectory for what comes next points to the sky as the limit.

"We've learned a lot of lessons," says Hanauer. "We have a good and deep team, a good and deep staff of coaches and support personnel. We have put ourselves in a position to be one of the best teams in MLS and we're confident in our ability to win. So I have a large degree of hope and confidence that we will be highly successful."

MILESTONES

July 17, 1997 – The building of CenturyLink Field is made possible by the passage of a \$300 million public funding package by Washington state voters based on the promise to keep the Seahawks and bring professional soccer to Seattle.

November 12, 2007 – Drew Carey visits George & Dragon, a local soccer pub, to announce a new MLS team in Seattle. Later that same day he raises the 12th Man Flag at a Seahawks game.



November 13, 2007 - After securing an ownership agreement with Hollywood movie studio executive Joe Roth, Seattle Sounders owner Adrian Hanauer, actor and comedian Drew Carey and Vulcan Sports & Entertainment, Major League Soccer's Commissioner Don Garber announces Seattle as MLS' 15th club. The team names Adrian Hanauer General Manager of Soccer Operations, and season ticket membership deposits go on sale.

November 14, 2007 – Team announces more than 3,000 season ticket memberships have been sold.

November 19, 2007 – Team announces more than 6,500 season ticket memberships have been sold.

December 12, 2007 – Team announces more than 10,000 season ticket deposits have been sold.

March 24, 2008 – MLS Seattle names former Seahawks Vice President Gary Wright as Senior Vice President of Business Operations, overseeing all business operations for the club including ticket sales,



corporate partnerships, community outreach, charities, fan experience and marketing of the team.

January 24, 2008 – MLS Seattle hires MLS original Chris Henderson to serve as Technical Director, assisting General Manager Adrian Hanauer in all areas of

soccer operations, including scouting, player management, coaching decisions, and the youth system.

February 22, 2008 – MLS Seattle and Washington Youth Soccer hire Darren Sawatzky to help identify and develop elite local talent.

March 25, 2008 – MLS Seattle takes lead with democracy in sports, as the club announces fans will have the opportunity to vote for team name. The options include: Seattle Alliance, Seattle FC, Seattle Republic, and Write-In Vote for those fans passionate about another name.

April 7, 2008 – Votes are in and MLS Seattle announces the club to be named Seattle Sounders FC. Nearly 15,000 fans registered their vote during the four-day election with approximately 50% of the voters submitting a write-in name, 80% of which included a derivative of the name Sounders. The name Sounders has been identified with soccer in the Seattle community since 1974. That same day the colors and badge for Seattle Sounders FC are revealed.

April 29, 2008 – Sounders FC announces ticket pricing and dedicated web site.

April 30, 2008 – With 14,700 season ticket memberships purchased to date, Seattle Sounders FC announces season ticket packages to be based on an 18-match home schedule with prices starting as low as \$288 for a full-season ticket package. All home matches to be played at CenturyLink Field with a seating capacity designated for 24,500.

May 7, 2008 – Seattle Sounders FC signs French forward, and member of USL First Division Seattle Sounders, Sebastien Le Toux to a multi-year contract. Le Toux is the first player to sign with the club.

May 16, 2008 – Seattle Sounders FC launches the club's Members Association, activating the promise of owner Drew Carey to involve the fans in the decision-making process of the team. Carey to serve as the association's chairman. Eventually on November 21, FSN becomes the presenting sponsor of the Members Association later named the Alliance.

May 28, 2008 – Seattle Sound ers FC an nounces a multi-year partnership with Microsoft Corp. and Xbox 360 video game and entertain-



ment system. The landmark deal is highlighted by the 'Xbox 360 LIVE' logo featured prominently on the Sounders FC jersey.

May 31, 2008 – Sounders FC merchandise becomes available online and through team Pro Shop.

June 1, 2008 – Sounders FC holds percussion and brass band auditions at CenturyLink Field.

July 21, 2008 – Seattle Sounders FC and BELO reach a multi-year television partnership agreement to broadcast Sounders FC games on KONG 6/16 and KING 5. Every home and away Sounders FC match to be broadcast live on KONG 6/16 or KING 5, except those broadcast nationally. Each broadcast will feature an exclusive pregame show and a postgame wrap-up. BELO will also produce a weekly show. Former "Voice of the Sonics," Kevin Calabro, to serve as club's play-by-play announcer for all Sounders FC matches.



August 14, 2008 – Seattle Sounders FC signs celebrated goalkeeper Kasey Keller. The Olympia native and U.S. team captain becomes the second player to sign.

September 5, 2008 – Gambian midfielder Sanna Nyassi becomes the third player to sign with Seattle Sounders FC.



October 28, 2008 – After 10 years in the English Premier League, Swedish player Freddie Ljungberg signs with Seattle Sounders FC as Designated Player.

November 21, 2008 – Sounders FC announces a partnership with FSN which will broadcast a weekly magazine show and replays of matches.

November 26, 2008 – Ten players including Eugene, Oregon native and U.S. National Team forward Nate Jaqua are selected in the MLS Expansion Draft.

December 2, 2008 – ESPN announces that Sounders FC will open the 2009 season against New York Red Bulls on the Xbox Pitch at Qwest Field on Thursday, March 19.



December 4, 2008 – A fashion show at WaMu Theatre featuring Hollywood models and Sounders FC players unveils the team's kit, training gear and off-the-field adidas apparel.

December 5, 2008 – Sounders FC supporters vote to name their members association the Sounders FC Alliance and the team's marching band the Sound Wave.

December 16, 2008 – Two-time MLS Coach of the Year Sigi Schmid signs to become first Sounders FC coach after leading Columbus to both the 2008 Supporters' Shield and MLS Cup title.

December 29, 2008 – Sounders FC names former USL-1 Sounders Coach Tom Dutra as goalkeeper coach.

January 9, 2009 – Sounders FC announces David Tenney as fitness coach.

January 15, 2009 – Sounders FC and Bon reville Seattle Radio Group reach a multi-year partnership to broadcast all Sounders FC home and away matches, as well as pre and post game shows, on News Talk 97.3 KIRO FM. Bonneville and Sounders FC also joined forces to produce a weekly 30-minute Sounders FC show on the new 710 ESPN Seattle.



January 15, 2009 – The Sounders FC selects Steve Zakuani with first overall pick in the 2009 MLS Super-Draft. The team also selects Evan Brown (2nd round), Jared Karkas (3rd) and Michael Fucito (4th).

January 20, 2009 – Seattle Sounders FC completes its coaching staff with the addition of Ezra Hendrickson as an assistant coach

January 21, 2009 – Sounders FC holds the first practice in franchise history at the Virginia Mason Athletic Center.

February 12, 2009 – Enhanced SoundersFC.com launched with integrated online community.

February 22, 2009 – Sounders FC announces season ticket sales have exceeded 20,000.

March 2, 2009 – Sounders FC announces single game tickets to inaugural home opener sold out, and that seating will be expanded to 32,400 for March 19 match vs. New York.

March 6, 2009 – Sounders FC announces Spanish media partnership with Bustos Media.

March 11, 2009 – MLS and Sounders FC announce 2009 MLS Cup to be played on the Xbox Pitch at CenturyLink Field on November 22. All season ticket packages include a ticket to the League's 14th annual championship game.



March 19, 2009 – Sounders FC wins inaugural game 3-0 over New York in front of 32,523 fans. Fredy Montero scored twice and assisted on a Brad Evans' goal.

April 1, 2009 – Fredy Montero named March Player of the Month after scoring his third goal in first two matches in 2-0 home win over Real Salt Lake.

April 4, 2009 – Sounders FC becomes first MLS expansion team to start 3-0-0 after winning inaugural road match, 2-0, at Toronto FC.



April 25, 2009 – Seattle becomes first MLS team to attract more than 28,000 to four consecutive matches. Keller sets record for consecutive scoreless minutes to open season, breaking old mark of 375.

May 26, 2009 – Sounders FC advances to third round of U.S. Open Cup after winning second straight playin game, 1-0, over Colorado before capacity crowd at Starfire Sports Stadium.

June 20, 2009 – At 5-3-7, Seattle finishes first half of season with fewest losses of any expansion team.

June 28, 2009 – Stadium capacity expanded to beyond 32,400 with addition of seats in south end of lower bowl.

July 11, 2009 - Sounders FC reaches four games above .500 after first comeback win, 2-1, over Houston.

May 26, 2010 – Sounders FC earned its first victory over an international opponent against Argentine power Boca Juniors in a friendly before 40,122.

July 18, 2010 – David Estrada's second-half strike was not enough for the shorthanded Sounders FC against the Scottish Premier League runner-up, Celtic.

July 27, 2010 – Goalkeeper Kasey Keller, midfielder Freddie Ljungberg and forward Fredy Montero selected inactive MLS All-Stars.

July 28, 2010 – Forward Fredy Montero becomes the first player in club history to score in international competition with his 40-yard strike against AD Isidro Metapan.



August 3, 2010 – Sounders FC qualifies for the CON-CACAF Champions League group stage with a 1-1 draw against AD Isidro Metapan in El Salvador.

August 4, 2010 – Forward Fredy Montero named MLS Player of the Month for July.

September 18, 2010 – Blaise Nkufo records the first hat trick in club history when he found the net three times on the road against the Columbus Crew.

October 5, 2010 – Seattle becomes the first club in 27 years, and first in MLS history, to repeat as Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup champions with its 2-1 win over the Columbus Crew in front of a record crowd of 31,311 at CenturyLink Field.

October 9, 2010 – With a 2-1 win at Kansas City, Sounders FC becomes the third club in league history to qualify for the MLS Cup Playoffs in its first two seasons.

October 12, 2010 – Mike Fucito and Nate Jaqua each scored in the first 18 minutes of the match as Sounders FC beat CD Chivas de Guadalajara in front of 41,047. Chivas, Mexico's most popular club, was coming off a runner-up finish in the Copa Libertadores.

October 15, 2010 – Sounders FC sets a new MLS single-season attendance record at 542,600, bringing the average to a record-breaking 36,173.

November 7, 2010 – Steve Zakuani becomes the first player in club history to score in the MLS Cup Playoffs with his strike against the L.A. Galaxy.

February 22, 2011 – Sounders FC announces it will participate in the inaugural Beach Soccer Club World Cup.

March 4-6, 2011 – Sounders FC hosts inaugural Cascadia Summit at Starfire Sports.

March 8, 2011 – Fredy Montero named MLS Humanitarian of the Month for March.

June 23, 2011 – Sounders FC opens the entire CenturyLink Field stadium for the first time in MLS. The match against New York drew a crowd of 46,065.

July 20, 2011 – The capacity crowd of 67,052 for the friendly against Manchester United broke the attendance record for any soccer match played in the Pacific Northwest.



July 30, 2011 – Sounders FC owner Drew Carey named the Grand Marshal of the 2011 Seafair Torchlight Parade.



August 6, 2011 – Sigi Schmid became first coach to win 150 regular season MLS matches with a 2-1 win at Sporting Kansas City.

August 23, 2011 – Sounders FC becomes the second MLS club to win a competitive match in Mexico with a 1-0 victory over reigning CONCACAF Champions League winners CF Monterrey.

September 17, 2011 – Sounders FC broke the season total attendance record when 36,242 showed up for the 47th consecutive sellout in a 3-0 win over D.C. United, bringing the season total to 553,987. Seattle has set a record in each of the previous two seasons.

September 23, 2011 – Sounders FC clinched berth in MLS Cup Playoffs for third straight season.

September 24, 2011 – Sounders FC wins Cascadia Cup with a 3-1 win at Vancouver. It was the first time all three teams competed for the cup in MLS.

September 27, 2011 – Sounders FC clinched advancement to the CONCACAF Champions League quarterfinal with a 2-2 draw at Guatemala's CSD Comunicaciones.



October 1, 2011 – Kasey Keller immortalized in five acre corn maze in Olympia, Wash.

October 4, 2011 – Sounders FC becomes first MLS club to win three consecutive U.S. Open Cup championships. Seattle is the fourth three-peat winner and first in 42 years.



October 15, 2011 – The attendance of 64,140 for the regular season home finale was the biggest crowd for a competitive soccer match in Pacific Northwest. It was the third-largest crowd for a stand alone match in MLS history. The mayor and governor also proclaimed the day "Kasey Keller Day."

November 15, 2011 – Kasey Keller named 2011 MLS Goalkeeper of the Year for his final season of professional soccer. Keller was also named to the MLS Best XI and Save of the Year for the second time.



November 15, 2011 – Mauro Rosales named 2011 MLS Newcomer of the Year after setting a club record with 13 assists.

November 18, 2011 – Sounders FC reveals new third kit "Super Cyan."

December 13, 2011 – Sounders FC Alliance Council and season ticket holders approve membership consitution and charter.

January 10, 2012 – Sounders FC announces Ross Fletcher as the Voice of the Sounders FC and Kasey Keller as broadcast analyst.

Joe Roth is the majority owner of the Seattle Sounders FC. His vision to establish Seattle as the soccer capital of the U.S. has been a significant catalyst in the Sounders success. His foresight has also led to his long-standing achievement in the film and entertainment industry.

As founder of Roth Films, Inc., his current films include producer of *OZ: The Great and Powerful* with Director Sam Raimi for Disney and *Snow White and the Huntsman* with Director Rupert Sanders for Universal. He most recently produced *Alice in Wonderland* for Disney with Director Tim Burton starring Johnny Depp. This summer he begins production on *MALEFICENT* starring Angelina Jolie for Disney.

During his career in the entertainment industry, Roth has served as chairman of both The Walt Disney Studios and Twentieth Century Fox. In May of 2000, he founded Revolution Studios which released 46 feature films between 2001 and 2007, including Black Hawk Down, which won two Academy Awards®, and XXX, which earned more than \$275 million worldwide, as well as Anger Management, Daddy Day Care, Hellboy, 13 Going On 30, White Chicks, The Forgotten, Rocky Balboa, Across the Universe and The Waterhorse.

He has also directed six films, the most recent include *America's Sweethearts, Christmas with the Kranks* and *Freedomland*.

In 2004, Mr. Roth was the Emmy Award® nominated producer of the 76th Annual Academy Awards, which received 10 Emmy Award® nominations, including one for Outstanding Variety, Music or Comedy Special, and won an Emmy for Outstanding Directing for a Variety, Music or Comedy Program.

From August 1994 through January 2000, Roth ran Walt Disney Studios, first as Chairman of the

Walt Disney Motion Pictures Group, then, beginning in April 1996, as Chairman of The Walt Disney Studios. He led the studio to worldwide market dominance over the five years with an industry-leading 18 films grossing over \$100 million domestically. Three of those films – *The Sixth Sense, Toy Story 2 and Armageddon* – grossed more than \$200 million in the United States alone. Roth helped to build Buena Vista International into the market leader, finishing first in market share five times in six years, the only company to gross over one billion dollars in each of those years. The studio's 1999 Best Picture nominees, *The Insider* and *The Sixth Sense*, led Disney to an industry-leading 17 Academy Award® nominations.

From 1992 to 1994, Roth, with Roger Birnbaum, headed Caravan Pictures, which produced such hits as While You Were Sleeping, Angels in the Outfield and The Three Musketeers for Disney.

Before establishing Caravan Pictures, Roth served as Chairman of Twentieth Century Fox from July 1989 until November 1992. During his tenure at the studio, the company made such successful films as Home Alone, Home Alone 2: Lost in New York, Die Hard 2, Sleeping with the Enemy, Mrs. Doubtfire, My Cousin Vinny, White Men Can't Jump, Edward Scissorhands, The Commitments and The Last of the Mohicans.

Prior to Twentieth Century Fox, Roth was a highly-successful independent producer/director, co-founding Morgan Creek Pictures, for which he produced such films as Young Guns, Dead Ringers, Major League and Bachelor Party. Roth directed both Streets of Gold and Revenge of the Nerds II for Twentieth Century Fox, and Coupe De Ville for Universal Pictures.

Equally noted for his diverse civic and charitable activities, Roth has received various awards such as the 1991 Variety Clubs Man of the Year award, the 1996 Humanitarian Award from the NCCJ, the 1997 American Museum of Moving Image Award and was honored in 1998 by APLA and the National Multiple Sclerosis Society. Roth was also the recipient of the 2004 Dorothy and Sherrill C. Corwin Human Relations Award from the American Jewish Committee, and is an active supporter of the SIDS alliance.

A lifelong fan, player and coach, Roth now wishes to further his association with soccer by taking the professional game in America to a much higher level of competitiveness and visibility.

A New York City native, Roth grew up in the soccer hotbed of Long Island and played from age 10 into his first two years of college. He saw action for both Bowling Green and Hofstra before a careerending leg injury. He graduated from Boston University in 1970.

Roth has three children, Zack, Julia and David. He was involved in coaching his son Zack's team for 15 years.

ADRIAN HANAUER

OWNER & GENERAL MANAGER



Adrian Hanauer first kept the flame of professional soccer alive in Seattle before helping to reignite the community's passion for the game with the arrival of a Major League Soccer expansion franchise in 2009. Hanauer is both an owner and the Sounders FC general manager.

Since 2001. Hanauer has been associated with the highest level of soccer played in Seattle. He first joined the ownership group of the Sounders franchise in the United Soccer Leagues First Division, and later became majority shareholder and general manager. In 2002, during his first season in that role, he was rewarded with Seattle going 23-4-1—the second-best record in league history. From 2004 to 2007, the Sounders played in the USL-1 championship game three times, winning twice (2005, 2007) and also taking the Commissioner's Cup (best record) in 2007.

Hanauer has over 20 years of business experience in a variety of other industries. On numerous occasions he has made early stage investments in technology companies with interests in advertising, infrastructure, and wireless communications. Hanauer co-founded Curious Office Partners, which invests and incubates early stage technology companies.

He was a seed stage investor in aQuantive Inc, the largest interactive advertising company which was later acquired by Microsoft for \$6 billion US, and he was also an early investor in Amazon.com.

Hanauer also brings a great deal of "brick and mortar" business experience. The Hanauer family owns Pacific Coast Feather Co., the nation's largest manufacturer of pillows, comforters, and bedding products. He also owns one of the largest chains of picture framing companies in the United States, as well as a small chain of pizza restaurants.

Involved in many organizations in Seattle, Hanauer sits on the Board of Trustees for the Museum of History and Industry. He has also sat on the advisory board of The University of Washington Intercollegiate Sports Master's Degree Program.

Hanauer's interest in soccer began at the age of three, and he saw his first NASL Sounders game at the age of eight. He went on to play for Mercer Island High School and remains active in the Greater Seattle Soccer League.

In addition to his interest in the Seattle Sounders FC, Hanauer also is a board member of England's Cambridge United Football Club, currently of the English Conference (fifth tier).

Hanauer, 45 (2/7/1966) enjoys skiing, snowboarding, traveling and playing soccer. He attended the University of Washington and lives in Seattle.



SOUNDERS FC

PAUL G. ALLEN

OWNER



Paul G. Allen helped bring major league soccer to the northwest when his Vulcan Sports and Entertainment joined the ownership group behind the Sounders FC. The announcement in 2007 was the result of years of work and enthusiasm on behalf of soccer fans.

Allen had visions of world-class soccer in his hometown soon after purchasing the Seattle Seahawks of the National Football League. Allen bought the club to save pro football in Seattle after the former owners threatened to move the team to southern California.

On June 17, 1997, the voters of Washington state approved "Referendum 48" to authorize a public/private partnership to construct a stadium, exhibition center, and parking facilities. One of the keys to the success of the vote was statewide support from the soccer community and its hope to one day see professional soccer, played at the highest level, return to the northwest.

Growing up in the Seattle, Allen's passion for sports began when he'd attended University of Washington football games with his father, he later became a basketball fan watching the Seattle Supersonics win the 1979 NBA Championship.

Allen bought the Seahawks in 1996 after community leaders asked him to save the team from being moved to Los Angeles.

"From the beginning of this process, my goals have been to work with the community to create a lasting asset for our future; and to ensure the long-term success of the Seahawks," said Allen at the time of purchasing the franchise. He also wanted to "create a world-class facility for the state of Washington."

That became a reality in 2002 with the opening of the Seahawks Stadium and and Exhibition Center, renamed CenturyLink Field and CenturyLink Field Event Center in 2011. An open air facility which many critics argue is the best venue in the National Football League, CenturyLink Field is home to over

165 events annually ranging from soccer, to Supercross, concerts, graduation ceremonies, and trade shows.

"It exceeds the vision we had originally," Allen said shortly after the opening of the stadium. "We had a bunch of goals about trying to create a really intimate stadium that would be great for the fans, to have elegant architecture, and I think we've ended up with a fantastic facility."

Allen is one of the nation's best-known and generous philanthropists. He co-founded Microsoft with Bill Gates in 1976 and continues to be an innovator in the world of business and technology. He is founder and chairman of Vulcan Inc., which oversees his philanthropy and business interests. He is the owner of the NBA's Portland Trail Blazers.

Allen has been named one of the top philanthropists in America - with lifetime giving totaling more than \$1 billion - and is committed to leaving a majority of his estate to support communities throughout the northwest and internationally. Allen gives back to the community through The Paul G. Allen Family Foundation, which strengthens communities and supports vulnerable populations in the areas of arts and culture, human services, opportunities for youth, and scientific advancement. He also gives directly, including \$256 million in 2010 to Washington State University's School for Global Animal Health. In 2003 he pledged \$100 million for creation of the Allen Institute for Brain Science in Seattle. The nonprofit Allen Institute was founded as an innovative and unprecedented resource for neuroscientists around the world. In 2006 the Allen Institute completed its inaugural project, the Allen Brain Atlas-Mouse Brain. The mouse brain atlas is a Webbased, three-dimensional map of gene expression in the mouse brain which is freely accessible online and available at no cost. Detailing more than 21,000 genes at the cellular level, the Atlas continues to help lead scientists to new insights about neurological function and disease. In 2008 the Allen Institute announced three new major atlas projects - the Allen Brain Atlas (ABA) — Human Brain, —Develop ing Mouse Brain, and - Mouse Spinal Cord. The new atlases are designed to accelerate brain, and spinal cord research, dramatically advancing the field of neuroscience.

Inspired by growing up in the era of the "space race," with its Mercury, Gemini, and Apollo missions, Allen underscored his passion for rocketry by sponsoring the development of SpaceShipOne, the first privately funded spacecraft to successfully attain suborbital space. He founded the Experience Music Project, Seattle's critically acclaimed interactive music museum; the Science Fiction Museum and Hall of Fame; Flying Heritage Collection - a collection of rare World War II aircraft restored to flying condition; and, Vulcan Productions, the independent film production company behind feature films like Hard Candy and Far From Heaven, and documentaries and PBS series, including This Emotional Life, Evolution, the Emmy Award-winning Rx for Survival: A Global Health Challenge; and the Peabody Awardwinning Judgment Day: Intelligent Design on Trial, and The Blues, executive-produced by Martin Scorsese in conjunction with Allen and Jo Lynn Allen.

DREW CAREY

OWNER



every professional game he could find time for, including European league games and U.S. National Team qualifying games. He learned more about the game and, during a later visit to Spain, saw the Barcelona FC team in action. He also worked as a press photographer during the 2006 World Cup in Germany, his efforts chronicled on a Travel Channel show entitled Drew Carey's Sporting Adventures and his photos have appeared in numerous publications.

During his travels Carey became fascinated with the empowerment of supporters at such clubs as Barcelona and Real Madrid, where leadership positions are voted upon by the members. He brought that idea to Sounders FC, where members will vote on various matters, most notably the fate of the general manager every four years. Carey is also the driving force for Seattle's 53-piece marching band, Sound Wave. Carey, 53 (5/23/58), is a native of Cleveland, Ohio and currently resides in Los Angeles.

Drew Carey is a stand-up comic turned actor and producer and is now regarded as American soccer's most recognizable supporter. Carey is a minority owner of Seattle Sounders FC and serves as chairman of Sounders FC Alliance, the club's member association. Carey served on the USA Bid Committee, a non-profit organization, created to prepare a successful application to host the FIFA World Cup ™ in 2018 or 2022 on behalf of the United States Soccer Federation.

Carey had the distinction of having two hit shows simultaneously: the long-running comedy "The Drew Carey Show," which ran from 1995-2004, and the improv/sketch show "Whose Line Is It Anyway?" on which he was host and a producer. The success of that show led to the creation of "Drew Carey's Improv All-Stars," an improv group that performs in showrooms across the country. In July 2007, Carey was named the host of THE PRICE IS RIGHT, America's longest running game show. He recently starred and co-produced DREW CAREY'S IMPROV-A-GANZA, a new original, improvised sketch comedy show for GSN.

While in the Marine Reserves, his military buzz cut and black wide-rim glasses became part of his trademark look. He began his successful career as a comedian in April of 1986 at the Cleveland Comedy Club. One of his first big breaks was competing on Star Search '88. In 1991, Carey landed a spot on HBO's 14th Annual Young Comedians Special and appeared on The Tonight Show with Johnny Carson. Carey openly credits Carson with launching his career. He received a Star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame in 2003.

Carey's interest in soccer began while attending an L.A. Galaxy game in 2003. Shortly after, he started seeing

On September 23, 2010, Paul G. Allen announced the appointment of Peter McLoughlin as president of the Seattle Seahawks, Sounders FC and First & Goal, Inc.

McLoughlin is responsible for all financial and business operations, sales and marketing, sponsorship, and administration of the Seattle Seahawks and Seattle Sounders FC. As president of First & Goal, he oversees management of CenturyLink Field and CenturyLink Event Center, and the Theater.

He serves as the Seahawks' representative on all NFL matters and at NFL meetings. He sits on NFL committees for Business Ventures, Stadium Security and Fan Behavior. He also represents Seahawks Chairman Paul Allen on the Digital Media Committee.

During McLoughlin's tenure, the Sounders FC have increased attendance while continuing to lead Major League Soccer. In 2011, Seattle supporters set new standards for MLS season attendance (654,431 total; 38,496 average) and single match records for the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup (35,615) and Pacific Northwest soccer (67,052 vs. Manchester United).

A crowd of 64,140, the third-largest singlegame attendance in MLS history, came to see Kasey Keller's final regular season match on October 15. By the end of the 2011 MLS season, the team sold out 50 consecutive matches. Seattle's average attendance of more than 38,496 ranks among the top 40 clubs in the world.

In 2011, McLoughlin and his team negotiated a stadium naming rights partnership extension with CenturyLink and a new multi-year partnership with Anheuser-Busch for the Seahawks and Sounders FC.

He has continued the initiative for stadium sustainability. Since his arrival, a solar array of 3,750 panels was installed on the roof of the CenturyLink Field Event Center which will reduce annual utility costs by 21 percent.

Before moving to Seattle, McLoughlin served as chief executive officer of the St. Louis Blues Enterprises from 2006-10. As CEO, he oversaw all business operations of the NHL Blues and Scottrade Center including sales, marketing and finance. During his tenure in St. Louis, the Blues achieved significant increases in total revenue, season-ticket holders, sponsorship sales and a dramatic reconnection with Blues fans. McLoughlin negotiated the arena naming rights agreement with Scottrade, a St. Louis-based investment firm, in time for the start of the 2006-07 NHL season. In addition, he negotiated a long-term extension with Fox Sports Network for Blues TV rights.

For 21 years prior to joining the Blues, McLoughlin served in a variety of executive roles at Anheuser-Busch. From 1998 to 2006, McLoughlin was vice president of Corporate Media and served as an officer of the company. He negotiated media agreements with television networks that included category exclusivity in 15 Super Bowls, 10 Olympics and dominant presence in MLB, NBA, NFL, NHL, NCAA and World Cup soccer telecasts. In addition, McLoughlin led negotiations for beer sponsorship of more than 80% of U.S. professional sports teams and stadiums, as well as league partnerships.

McLoughlin began his professional career at NBC Sports. From July 1979 to March 1984, he served as a senior unit manager at NBC Sports, where he managed production budgets and supervised on-site production of network programming. From March 1984 to October 1985, McLoughlin worked in NBC Sports Sales.

McLoughlin is a board member of The United Way of King County and Washington Round Table.

A graduate of Harvard University, he and his wife, Kelly, have five children and reside in Seattle.

KAREN BECKMAN CFO SEAHAWKS, SOUNDERS FC AND FIRST & GOAL



Karen Beckman is responsible for the financial oversight of the Seahawks, First & Goal Inc., and Seattle Soccer LLC. She is charged with establishing budgets, forecasting and managing cash flow. She also oversees the teams' financial reporting and analysis as well as reporting to the Public Stadium Authority. Another aspect of this

position is analyzing and handling economic challenges and opportunities as they relate to the National Football League and Major League Soccer. She also oversees the teams' information technology departments. Beckman originally joined the Seahawks in 1991 as a staff accountant and was promoted to her current position in May 2009. In 1990. Beckman was loaned to the Seahawks from the public accounting firm Arthur Andersen & Company to assist in the Seahawks accounting department before being hired full time the following year. Promoted to controller in 1997, Beckman was promoted to Finance Director of the Seahawks in 2003 and added the same responsibility for First & Goal Inc., in 2005. Was selected to attend the Inaugural Stanford Executive Education NFL Program for Managers in 2003. Beckman grew up in the North Seattle area before moving overseas where she lived in Tehran, Iran, from 1974-78. She returned to the states and graduated from Seattle's Nathan Hale High School at the age 16. Went on to earn a B.A. in Accounting from Seattle University. Lives in Maple Valley, Wash., with her two labs Sprocket and Mazie.

GARY WRIGHT SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT BUSINESS OPERATIONS



Wright oversees all business operations for Sounders FC including ticket sales, corporate partnerships, community outreach, charities, fan experience, communications and marketing of the team. In his first year, Wright helped spearhead one of the most successful launches of a franchise in american

sports history, as Sounders FC set a MLS season record for attendance with an average of 30,897, and received the Doug Hamilton MLS Executive of the Year award. In the club's second year, the team averaged 36,173 and earned the Sports Business Journal award for Professional Franchise of the Year. In 2011, the team's average attendance improved to

38,496 and Wright was honored as the Executive of the Year at the 77th Seattle Sports Star of the Year Awards. Prior to joining Sounders FC, Wright retired from the Seattle Seahawks after serving the franchise for 32 years, including the final 21 as a vice president. Wright originally joined the Seahawks in 1976 as director of publicity. He was named public relations director in 1982 and became the team's very first vice president in 1987. He was chosen by Hall of Famer Steve Largent to be his presenter at Largent's July 1995 induction ceremonies. Wright assisted the National Football League's media relations staff at 23 Super Bowls. Upon his retirement, the Seattle Seahawks named the press box at CentyryLink Field the Gary Wright Press Box in his honor. Wright spent two seasons prior to joining the Seahawks as the publicity director for the Southern California Sun of the World Football League and as league publicity director. Wright also served as vice president of operations for the Phoenix Racquets of World Team Tennis. Wright was the sports information director at Long Beach State University and coached football and basketball while teaching history and journalism in high school after graduating from Long Beach State. Wright is also a member of the Glendale College and Northwest Football Halls of Fame. He has instructed sports management classes at the University of Washington and Seattle University. He and his wife, Ann, have a family that includes their two grown sons, Larry and Steve; their wives Katy and Michelle; and five grandchildren, Owen, Fiona, Audrey, Stella and Maxwell.

LANCE LOPES SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT GENERAL COUNSEL



Lance Lopes was appointed to his position with Sounders FC in July 2008. In addition to his duties with Sounders FC, Lopes has oversight of First & Goal and he administers the legal affairs for the Seahawks and First & Goal since 2001. Prior to joining the Seahawks, he served seven years as gen-

eral counsel for the Green Bay Packers from 1993-2000, adding the title of Assistant Vice President from 1998-99 and Vice President from 1999-2000, during which time, his duties primarily involved salary cap administration and player contract negotiations. In 2000, he left the Packers to serve on the original management team of StubHub. Prior to working for the Packers, he worked at the law firms Helsell, Fetterman in Seattle and Cades, Schutte in Honolulu. He and his staff oversee the sales and service of all Seahawks, Sounders FC, CenturyLink Field and Theater ticketing including club seats, season tickets and group sales. In addition, Arnold is also responsible for managing all marketing and

advertising strategy, game presentation, promotions and brand strengthening efforts. He also oversees the Seahawks and Sounders FC retail sales and service efforts. The Sounders FC set a league record for a third consecutive year with an average attendance of 38,496, which includes 50-consecutive sellouts. The team also set a U.S. Open Cup attendance record for the second consecutive year with an attendance of 35,615. The Sounders FC Ticket sales team has been awarded the Ticket Sales Team of the Year in each of the team's three seasons (2009-11) by the MLS. Overseeing the Sounders FC retail operations, the club has led the MLS in sales from 2009-11. Arnold began his professional career as an intern in the Seahawks public relations department before joining the team's ticket sales department as an account executive from 1994-96. DAVE PEARSON VICE PRESIDENT COMMUNICATIONS & BROADCASTING



Dave Pearson has more than 22 years of communication experience in professional sports. Promoted to vice president of communications and broadcasting on April 29, 2008, Pearson is responsible for managing the public image and overall communications strategy for the Seahawks and the

Sounders FC while serving as the primary liaison

for local and national media outlets and broadcast partners for the Seahawks. He also oversees all radio broadcasts, preseason telecasts, team-produced radio and television shows, publications and website content for both clubs. As vice president, he also assumes various responsibilities revolving around game day operations at CenturyLink Field. Under his direction, the Seahawks Communications Department has been nominated by the Pro Football Writers of America for the coveted Pete Rozelle Award four times (1999, 2005-07). Seattle received the most nominations twice and won the award in 2007. Under his leadership, MLS recognized the Sounders FC Communications Department as the best in the league for 2009. The Seahawks Broadcasting Department has won two Emmy's for its preseason game broadcast. After beginning his career in 1989 as an intern in the Seahawks Public Relations Department, the Tacoma, Wash., native worked for the Houston Oilers two seasons (1990-91). From 1992-93 he was the assistant PR director for the Los Angeles Rams before returning to Houston as PR director prior to the 1994 season where he would help manage the team's transition to Tennessee. Pearson earned a degree in media relations and interpersonal communications from Pacific Lutheran University. He and his wife, Beth, have two children, Allie and Chase, and reside in Mill Creek.

CHRIS HENDERSON TECHNICAL DIRECTOR



One of the first Sounders FC acts was the hiring of Chris Henderson as technical director in January of 2008. Henderson assists the team's general manager, Adrian Hanauer, in all areas of soccer operations, including scouting, player management, coaching decisions and the youth system. Under

the leadership of Hanauer and Henderson, the Sounders FC achieved instant success during the inaugural season. Seattle became the first MLS club to win three consecutive Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup titles. Seattle also became the first MLS expansion team to reach the playoffs in each of its first three seasons. In the inaugural season, four players made the MLS All-Star team and five were named finalists for League year-end awards, with Fredy Montero voted Newcomer of the Year. Henderson was also instrumental in bringing the 2012 Newcomer of the Year, Mauro Rosales, to Sounders FC. Henderson is regarded as one of the most successful players ever produced by the state of Washington, having represented the U.S. at the international level 79 times and winning championships in both MLS and the NCAA. An MLS original, Henderson played 11 seasons for five teams. Upon his retirement following the 2006 season, he was league record-holder in four categories, including career games played (317; currently No. 6) and started (304; currently No. 2). Henderson still

shares the MLS single game assist record (four assists for Kansas City in 1999) and his 80 regularseason assists is No. 9 all-time. He finished his career with 51 goals. Henderson joined Seattle after spending the 2007 season as an assistant coach for Kansas City under Curt Onalfo. Henderson began his MLS career with Colorado for their inaugural season in 1996 and he would play six full seasons for the Rapids with five of those squads reaching the playoffs. He set club records for career appearances and assists, and in 1997 earned a spot in the MLS All-Star Game and also helped Colorado reach the MLS Cup Final. Henderson achieved a career-high for goals (11) and again made the All-Star Game to begin his second stint for the Rapids in 2002. From 1999-2000 he played in Kansas City, helping the Wizards win the 2000 MLS Cup. That season he played in a career-high 38 games, scoring 10 goals and adding nine assists. He spent the 2001 season with the Miami Fusion before returning to Colorado. He was traded during the 2005 season to Columbus and completed his career with New York in 2006. Henderson played two seasons at UCLA, helping the Bruins win an NCAA championship and earning All-America honors in 1990. He connected on penalty kicks during tiebreaker wins in both the semifinal and final. Earlier that year, Henderson began senior international play prior to the 1990 World Cup. At age 19, he was the youngest member of the United States roster. He was also a member of the 1992 U.S. Olympic Team and an alternate on the 1994 and 1998 World Cup squads. He set a team record with five assists in 1993 and has 10 career assists. In 2004, the Chris Henderson Foundation was launched, giving grants to fight Leukemia and to underprivileged children. He was named his MLS club's Humanitarian of the Year for both Colorado and New York. Born in Edmonds, Wash., Henderson, 41 (12/11/1970), attended Everett's Cascade High School where he earned the 1989 Washington Gatorade Player of the Year award. He played for the FC Seattle Storm in 1989 and began his professional career with Germany's FSV Frankfurt (1994-95) and Norway's Staebak (1995). He is married to Dee and has two children, Aidan and Annelise. His younger brother, Sean, played for UCLA, the USL Sounders and three seasons in MLS.

GRANT CLARK TEAM ADMINISTRATION DIRECTOR



As Team Administrator, Grant Clark oversees the team's preseason training camps, team travel, scheduling and administrative issues. He works closely with the coaching staff and players in the day-to-day operation of the team. Clark came to Sounders FC after serving as an account exec-

utive for the Universal Sports Group, a professional

coaching service provider. The previous five years he spent with U.S. Club Soccer as the Western Regional Manager. From 1995 through 1999, Clark worked as Director of Business and Team Administration for San Jose Clash/Earthquakes, acting as the primary financial and administrative liaison within the team and MLS. In 2002, Clark served as the Director of Coaching for the Bainbridge Island Youth Soccer Club and was named Boys Coach of the Year. He holds a U.S. Soccer Federation & level coaching license. Clark is a graduate of UCLA, where he played under Sigi Schmid, served as the team captain and is the three-time recipient of the team's Most Inspirational Player Award. He currently resides on Bainbridge Island with his wife, Dawn, and children Ian, Andria and Skye.

VINCE JOHNSON TEAM SERVICES DIRECTOR



Vince Johnson works closely with Grant Clark assisting in the day-to-day operations of the team, in addition to managing the Sounders FC facility and equipment issues. He also acts as the main liaison with the visiting team and MLS referees while they are in Seattle. Vince joined Seattle

Sounders FC after working five seasons with the USL Seattle Sounders. Vince's duties with the USL Sounders comprised of game operations, team administration and all ticketing preparation and distribution. During Major League Soccer's 2003 season, Vince was an operations intern at the MLS League Office in New York City. He assisted with the run-up and execution of both the MLS All-Star Game and MLS Cup 2003. Vince graduated from Washington State University with a degree in Sport Management and was bestowed the "Most Outstanding Senior" award his final year at WSU. Born and raised in Seattle, Vince now lives in the Georgetown area of the city.

RANDY NOTEBOOM HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER



Randy Noteboom joined the Sounders FC staff following three seasons as the head athletic trainer for the USL-1 Sounders, from 2006-08. In 2010, his staff was named by MLS as the Athletic Training Staff of the Year. He is also a staff physical therapist and clinical specialist for Virginia Mason

Sports Medicine, which he joined in 1985. He graduated from the University of Washington in 1980 with a degree in kinesiology and a degree in physical therapy from the University of Puget Sound in 1985. He received his athletic training certification from the NATA in 1982.

CHRIS CORNISH ASSISTANT ATHLETIC TRAINER



Chris Cornish enters his fourth year with the Sounders FC after gaining experience in MLS with FC Dallas and D.C. United, and in the EPL with Fulham FC. Cornish, originally from Surrey, England, received his degree in Sports Therapy from the University of Hertfordshire. He worked as

Named the first head coach of Seattle Sounders FC on Dec. 16, 2008, Sigi Schmid is recognized as one of the most successful coaches in MLS history. Since 1999, Schmid's teams have won nine major titles, including two MLS Cups.

Schmid is the most successful active coach in MLS history and a two-time Coach of the Year. In the 2011 season he guided the Sounders FC to the playoffs for the third consecutive year, becoming the first team in league history to reach the playoffs in its first three seasons.

The Sounders FC also became the first team in 42 years to win three straight Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup Championships when they beat Chicago, 2-0, in front of a record crowd on the Xbox Pitch at CenturyLink Field. Seattle defeated D.C. United, 2-1, on the road to win the 2009 title and Columbus at home, 2-1, to win the 2010 title. In 2008, Schmid led his former club, the Columbus Crew, to its first MLS Cup and Supporters' Shield, earning MLS Coach of the Year honors.

From 1999 through 2004 Schmid's L.A. Galaxy teams won four major competitions: 2002 MLS Cup, 2002 MLS Supporters' Shield, 2001 U.S. Open Cup and the 2001 CONCACAF Champions Cup.

He was voted the MLS Coach of the Year in his first season, 1999. Altogether, his Galaxy teams were 79-53-32 and reached the MLS Cup final four times and won three division crowns.

Schmid ranks No. 1 in MLS career victories (157). Overall, Schmid's record in MLS is 157-110-83. His combined postseason win total (20) is the second-highest in MLS history. Schmid (350) has surpassed Bob Bradley's MLS record of 272 career games coached.

Schmid is the only coach in MLS history to coach two different teams to MLS Cup titles. He is one of two to coach in four MLS Cup finals.

Twice Schmid has served as U.S. Under-20 National Team head coach, most recently in 2005 at the FIFA World Championships. Schmid was an assistant to Bora Milutinovic on the Americans' 1994 World Cup team. He also was head coach for the 1991 World University Games and 1995 Pan American Games.

Scores of Schmid's UCLA players have played professionally and internationally, including Sounders FC technical director Chris Henderson (1989-90). Others include Brad Friedel, Cobi Jones, Paul Caligiuri, Eddie Lewis and Carlos Bocanegra.

Schmid first forged a winning tradition at his alma mater, UCLA. After serving as an assistant, he was elevated to head coach of the Bruins in 1980, beginning a 19-year run at the helm. His first NCAA championship was won in 1985 at Seattle's Kingdome. UCLA went on to claim two more national titles in 1990 and '97. Schmid was named national coach of the year following the '97 championship. When he left to take over the Galaxy, his UCLA teams had accumulated a record of 322-63-33.

Schmid is a member of both the National Soccer and UCLA halls of fame. He was presented with the Walt Chyzowych Lifetime Achievement Award following the 2010 season.

Born in Tuebingin, Germany, Schmid relocated with his family to the U.S. in 1956, and to Torrance, Ca., in 1962. He was a four-year starter at UCLA (1972-75). He graduated with a B.S. degree in economics in 1976 and later earned a M.A. in business administration from the University of Southern California. Schmid is a Certified Public Accountant.

He and his wife, Valerie, maintain a residence in Manhattan Beach. He has four children: Erik, Lacey, Kurt and Kyle. Kurt is a Sounders FC assistant coach and scout. Kyle completed his career at UC Irvine in 2008.

Brian Schmetzer was named the top assistant coach for Sigi Schmid's staff on December 22, 2008. He is one of the Puget Sound soccer community's most recognizable figures after playing and coaching for the region's top professional franchises since 1980.

Schmetzer, 49, served seven seasons as the head coach of the Sounders' United Soccer Leagues First Division club. He guided Seattle to USL-1 championships in 2005 and 2007, and U.S. Open Cup semifinal advancements in 2007 and 2008.

Schmetzer has nine years of experience coaching and 15 years of playing at the professional level. He was a member of six championship teams during that span.

Schmetzer was head coach of the USL-1 Sounders from 2002-08. In addition to the two league championships, his teams also twice won the Commissioner's Cup for the best record and qualified for the playoffs six of seven years. He was chosen USL-1 Coach of the Year in 2002 after going 23-4-1. The Sounders were league runnersup in 2004. His overall regular season record was 100-57-41.

Previously, he was assistant to Fernando Clavijo with the Seattle SeaDogs from 1996-97. Seattle won

the Continental Indoor Soccer League title in 1997.

A Seattle native, Schmetzer signed with the Sounders' North American Soccer League franchise following his graduation from Nathan Hale High School in 1980. He played three seasons as a midfielder for Seattle before going to Tulsa for the final NASL season in 1984. Schmetzer was coached by his father as a youth and his team won seven out of 10 state youth championships.

Schmetzer signed with the San Diego Sockers in 1984 and played seven seasons in the Major Indoor Soccer League with San Diego (1984-88), Tacoma (1988-90) and St. Louis (1990-91). He was a member of San Diego's MISL championship teams in 1985, 1986 and 1988. He returned to Seattle for the Sounders' inaugural A-League season in 1994 before completing his playing career with the SeaDogs from 1995-96.

In 1985, Schmetzer played on loan to FC Seattle, scoring twice in a 2-1 friendly win over Brazil's Santos. While with Tacoma and FC Seattle, Schmetzer's teammates included younger brothers Andy and Walter. Schmetzer has three children, Daniela, Colin and Kian. He enjoys cooking and outdoor activities.



Tom Dutra was named the Sounders FC goalkeeper coach on December 29, 2008, and is recognized locally for his work in developing young keepers as well as training established professionals.

Dutra, 39, served two seasons as goalkeeper coach under Brian Schmetzer for the USL Sounders.

Dutra worked with Kasey Keller, the retired Sounders FC keeper, since 2002. Dutra conducted 1-on-1 training sessions to prepare Keller for his return to Europe each summer. Under Dutra's guidance, Chris Eylander twice led USL-1 in saves and finished second in shutouts.

At the amateur level, Dutra served two seasons

(2007-08) as assistant coach for Saint Martin's University and was an assistant for five seasons (2002-06) at Pacific Lutheran. He was director of goalkeeping for Washington ODP in 2008 and served on the state ODP staff from 2002-04. Dutra was the goalkeeping director for Washington Premier FC from 2001-06 and also at Blackhills FC from 2001-08.

During his time with Washington Premier, Dutra worked with more than a dozen keepers who have played at the Division I collegiate level. Among those was Tally Hall, a member of the U.S. Youth National Team pool and currently playing for the Houston Dynamo.

Dutra played four seasons in the A-League, first as a backup to Marcus Hahnemann on the Sounders' 1996 championship team. He later started for New Orleans and Lehigh Valley (Pa.).

Born and raised in Olympia, Dutra graduated from Timberline High School. He was a member of

the youth national team program before sustaining a fractured leg. His career resumed in 1995 with the Oregon (Salem) Surge of the USISL Pro Division.

Tom is married to Molli and they have two children, Tanner and Maggie.



Ezra Hendrickson was announced as an assistant coach on January 20, 2009, after completing a 14-year professional career, including 12 seasons in Major League Soccer.

Hendrickson played parts of eight seasons for Sigi Schmid, including three in Columbus prior to his retirement. Hendrickson appeared in 266 regular season matches with 225 starts. Playing defense, he scored 23 goals and added 30 assists. He also played in 32 postseason games with five goals and three assists.

Hendrickson was a member of three MLS Cup championship teams, winning two with Schmid. Together, they won the 2002 MLS Cup with the Los Angeles Galaxy and the 2008 MLS Cup in Columbus. Hendrickson was also with the champion D.C. United team in 2004.

A native of the island of St. Vincent in the Caribbean, Hendrickson began his career in 1997 with the New York MetroStars, before joining the Galaxy later that season. He totaled six seasons in Los Angeles, where he won the 2000 CONCACAF

Champions Cup, scoring two goals in a 3-2 victory, and the 2001 Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup, scoring one goal in a 2-1 victory. He was named Galaxy's Most Valuable Player for the 2001 season.

Hendrickson went to Dallas in 2003 and began the next season with the A-League's Charleston Battery before joining D.C. United for its run to the 2004 MLS Cup. After starting all 31 appearances in 2005 for expansion Chivas USA, Hendrickson was acquired by Columbus in early 2006.

An All-American and business administration major at Drake University, Hendrickson first played professionally with New Orleans of the USISL Select League (1995-96). After earning his first international cap in 1995, he served 12 years as captain of the St. Vincent and the Grenadines national team.

Hendrickson earned his U.S. Soccer 'A' Coaching License in December of 2008. He is a resident of Layou, St. Vincent, and has two daughters, Xavia and McKenzie.



Kurt Schmid was named the Seattle Sounders FC scout and assistant coach on March 12, 2009.

Prior to joining Sounders FC, Schmid was an assistant coach at the collegiate level, first at Saint Mary's College, then from 2007-08 at UC Irvine. In 2008, UC Irvine won both the Big West Conference regular season and tournament championship, and the Anteaters earned an NCAA tournament berth. All three were first-time achievements for the UCI program.

Schmid was a member of the Region IV ODP

boys coaching staff the past two years and also coached at West Coast FC. Previously he was a coach for South Bay Soccer Club. His coaching career began at South High School in Torrance, Calif.

Schmid, 29, played at Wake Forest and UCLA and was a member of the Bruins' 2002 NCAA Championship team. He is a graduate of UCLA with a degree in Business-Economics.

David Tenney was named the Sounders FC fitness coach on January 9, 2009. He is one of Major League Soccer's most respected and highly-regarded fitness coaches following two years in Kansas City.

Prior to joining Sounders FC, during the 2007 and 2008 seasons, Tenney served as both fitness and goalkeeper coach for the Wizards. He also holds an 'A' license from the Czech Republic F.A. and NSCAA 'Premier' Diploma.

Prior to MLS, Tenney held the same dual role with the George Mason University men's and women's teams for two seasons. In 2006, Mason advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in 12 years. He earned his B.I.S. in coaching science from George Mason in 2005.



2009 LAMAR HUNT U.S. OPEN CUP

Seattle became the third first-year franchise in the modern era to win the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup.

Seattle's achievement of claiming the Open Cup in its first season equaled that of D.C. United in 1996 and Chicago, an expansion MLS team in 1998.

The Sounders FC cup run contributors featured a distinctive USL-1 flavor. All six former members of Seattle's forerunner pro-franchise saw action in games in the play-in phase or tournament proper. In fact, they figured in nine of the 12 goals scored. Sebastien Le Toux scored two goals and two assists in the play-in rounds, scored the game-winner in a quarterfinal win over Colorado, and had the game-winning assist to Roger Levesque in the Cup Final.

In addition to his game-winner in the Cup Final Levesque also scored the opening goal at Portland in the third round and assisted on Nate Jaqua's equalizer versus Houston. Stephen King scored three goals in cup play, including the overtime winner against the Dynamo.

The Sounders FC earned one of the four U.S. slots in the 2010-11 CONCACAF Champions League by virtue of the Cup Final victory. The Open Cup winner receives an automatic spot in the Champions League preliminary round. The other berths are determined by the outcome of the MLS regular season and playoffs. CONCACAF is the game's governing body for North America, Central America and the Caribbean.

2010 LAMAR HUNT U.S. OPEN CUP

Playing before a record crowd in the tournament's 97-year history, Sounders FC repeated as Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup champions in 2010.

Sanna Nyassi scored twice as Seattle came from behind at home to defeat the Columbus Crew, 2-1, and become the first team in 27 years to successfully retain the Cup. Sounders FC had defeated D.C. United in the 2009 final, The New York Pancyprian Freedoms won back-to-back titles in 1982-83.

The crowd of 31,311 shattered the attendance record for the Cup Final. The largest previous attendance in the 97 years of the tournament was 21,583 for the 1929 game in Brooklyn.

After tying the game in the 38th minute, Nyassi scored the game-winner in the 66th minute. Steve Zakuani's header from a Fredy Montero cross caromed off the crossbar and Nyassi crashed home the rebound from 8 yards.

Sounders FC used a total of 22 players during its Cup run, with striker Nate Jaqua leading the Rave Green into the Final. Jaqua scored in each of the first three matches, including a brace against both the L.A. Galaxy in the quarterfinal round and Chivas USA in the semifinal. He finished as the tournament's co-leader with five goals and was named the competition's outstanding player.

By virtue of the victory Seattle once again earned a berth in the 2011-12 CONCACAF Champions League.

2011 LAMAR HUNT U.S. OPEN CUP

In 2011, Sounders FC became the first team in 42 years and fourth altogether to win the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup three consecutive years.

35,615 fans packed CenturyLink Field-breaking the 98-year-old tournament's attendance record for the second straight year—and watched Seattle defeat the Chicago Fire 2-0 in the final. Fredy Montero broke a scoreless tie in the 78th minute when he rebounded a Jeff Parke header after it was saved by Chicago keeper Sean Johnson, then hammered it into the back of the net. Osvaldo Alonso sent the Sounders faithful into a frenzy when he added the finishing touch—a goal in the 96th minute after weaving his way through multiple defenders. Kasey Keller's shutout was highlighted by four saves.

Montero was named Player of the Tournament after scoring three goals, including the game-winning scores in the semifinal and final. Mike Fucito added two goals and Nate Jaqua recorded a goal and two assists. In addition to his performance in the final, Keller also shut out FC Dallas in the semifinal game.

The last team to win three consecutive US Open Cup championships was Greek American out of New York from 1967-1969. Before that, only Stix, Baer and Fuller from St. Louis had won three straight from 1933-1935 and the Fall River Marksmen from 1930-1932. The tournament win clinches Sounders FC a birth into the 2012-13 CONCACAF Champions League.



In its first foray into international competition Sounders FC advanced to the group stage of the 2010-11 CONCACAF Champions League. Seattle won its two-match aggregate preliminary series, 2-1, over AD Isidro Metapan of El Salvador. It went on to finish fourth in Group C. CF Monterrey of Mexico and Costa Rica's CD Saprissa advanced out of Group C to the quarterfinal series, to be conducted in late February and early March 2011. Having won the 2010 U.S. Open Cup, the Rave Green will return to the Champions League again in 2011-12.

Mike Fucito finished as the leading Sounders FC scorer (tied for 13th overall) with three goals during the group stage. Topped by the crowd of 22,513 against Monterrey, Seattle supporters accounted for four of the top 11 crowds during the preliminary and group stage of the 2010-11 tournament.

 - ☐ West teams will play four conference opponents twice at home and once away
 - ☐ They will play the other four conference opponents once at home and twice away.
 - ☐ The home and away games will be reversed in 2013.
- Western Conference teams will play each East opponent once each (10 games):
 - □ Five of these will be at home and five will be away.
 - □ The East opponents each team faces at home and away will be reversed in 2013.

Eastern Conference – 25 in-conference + 9 out-of-conference games:

- Eastern Conference teams will play 25 games against other East teams:
 - East teams will play seven conference opponents three times each (21 games) and
 - ☐ Two conference opponents twice each (four games).
- Eastern Conference teams will play each West opponent once each (9 games):

Some will play four at home and five away while others will play five at home and four away.

The West opponents each team faces at home and away will be reversed in 2013.

POINT SYSTEM: Teams will receive three points for a win, one point for a tie and zero points for a loss.

REFEREES: All referees in MLS are either USSF (United States Soccer Federation) or CSA (Canadian Soccer Association) National Referees. All MLS games played in the US will be assigned by USSF and all games played in Canada will be assigned by CSA.

GAME CLOCK: The official game time for all Major League Soccer games will be managed on the field by the referee. If necessary, the referee may also allot extra time (a.k.a. "stoppage time") at the end of each period (first half, second half, and if applicable, first overtime period and second overtime period during playoff matches) to allow for injuries, time-wasting or other disturbances.

The stadium clock will display the time from 0:00 to 45:00 and from 45:00 to 90:00 (plus stoppage time where applicable in each half). For statistical purposes, the minutes for goals, substitutions, yellow cards, etc., will be listed from the first minute until the 90th minute. A goal scored at 15 minutes 10 seconds will be listed as having been scored in the 16th minute. Events occurring during stoppage time will follow the international norm by being demarcated with a "+" sign and the extra minutes. For example, a goal scored three minutes into first half stoppage time will be officially identified as happening at "48+".

GAME DAY ROSTERS: Each team can nominate 18 players for a game day roster. Teams are allowed three substitutions per game.

CAUTIONS AND SUSPENSIONS: A player will be suspended for one game upon receiving his fifth yellow card – regardless of the nature of the infraction that resulted in his being awarded a yellow card. A second suspension of one game would result after the awarding of an additional three cards, as would a third suspension after the awarding of card number eleven. With the "Good Behavior" incentive, it is possible for

a player to have a caution expunged. If a player goes three games without receiving a yellow card, after an initial warning, the player will have one yellow card expunged. A player may take advantage of the "Good Behavior" incentive only once throughout the season.

MLS CUP PLAYOFFS: FORMAT

WHO QUALIFIES: Ten teams, the top five in points from each conference at the end of the regular season, qualify for the 2012 MLS Cup Playoffs.

The fourth and fifth place teams in each conference will play a single knockout game, the winner of which will advance to the Conference Semifinals and face the first place team in the conference.

The four Conference Semifinals will be decided by two-game aggregate series, with the lower seed hosting the first leg and the higher seed hosting the second leg. If the aggregate score is tied after 180 minutes of play, two 15-minute extra time periods will be played in their entirety, followed by penalty kicks, if necessary.

The two Conference Championships will be decided by a two-game aggregate series, with the lower seed hosting the first leg and the higher seed hosting the second leg. If the aggregate score is tied after 180 minutes of play, two 15-minute extra time periods will be played in their entirety, followed by penalty kicks, if necessary.

MLS Cup will be a single championship match hosted by the higher seed. If the score is tied after 90 minutes of play, two 15-minute extra time periods will be played in their entirety, followed by penalty kicks, if necessary.

TEAM-STANDINGS TIE-BREAKING PROCEDURES

The team awarded the highest position in the MLS standings will be the team with the greatest number of points (three points for a win, one point for a tie, zero points for a loss). In the event that two teams finish the regular season with an equal number of points, the following system will be used to break the tie:

 The highest position shall be awarded to the team with the better win/loss record in current regular season games against all other teams equal in points. (head-to-head competition)

- 2) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team with the greater goal difference against all other teams during the regular season. (goal differential)
- If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team scoring the greatest number of total goals against all other teams during the regular season. (total goals)
- 4) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the procedures described in this section shall be applied only to games played on the road by each team against all other teams during the regular season. (road 1-3)
- 5) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the procedures described in this section shall be applied only to games played at home by each team against all other teams during the regular season. (home 1-3)
- 6) If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team with the fewest team disciplinary points in the League Fair Play table during the regular season.
- If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position in the standings shall be determined by the toss of a coin.
- 8) The first tiebreaker in a three-way tie is also head-to-head, but it is determined via points-per-game versus the other two teams. If two teams are tied in points-pergame head-to-head, the next tie breaker is goal difference.

NOTE: If two teams remain tied after another teams with the same number of points advances during any step, the tie breaker reverts to step 1 of the two-team format.

2012 MLS PLAYER RULES AND REGULATIONS SUMMARY

I. MLS ROSTER COMPOSITION

A Major League Soccer club's first team roster is comprised of up to 30 players. All 30 players are eligible for selection to each 18-player game-day squad during the regular season and playoffs.

Salary & Budget:

- Players occupying roster spots 1-20 count against the club's 2012 salary budget of \$2,810,000, and are referred to collectively as the club's Salary Budget Players.
 - □ Roster spots 19 and 20 are not required to be filled, and teams may spread their salary budget across only 18 Salary Budget Players.
 - A minimum salary budget charge will be imputed against a team's salary budget for each unfilled senior roster slot below 18.
 - ☐ The maximum budget charge for a single player is \$350,000.*
 - □ A Designated Player over the age of 23 counts as \$350,000 against the club's salary budget, unless the player joins his club in the middle of the season, in which case his budget charge will be \$175,000.
 - □ A Designated Player 20 years old or younger** (referred to as Young Designated Players or Young DPs) to counts as \$150,000 against the club's salary budget
 - □ A Designated Player 21-23 years old** counts as \$200,000 against the club's salary budget.
 - □ The budget charge for the midseason signing of a Young DP is \$150,000 and this amount cannot be lowered with allocation funds.
 - ☐ Clubs will not have to buy the third DP roster slot to accommodate a Young Designated Player whereas clubs are normally required to buy that slot for a one-time fee of \$250,000.
 - ☐ Clubs are responsible for all amounts above the budget charge for all Designated Players.
- *See section entitled Allocation Money below, under Player Acquisition Mechanisms, for details on buying down a player's budget charge.
- **Age of player is determined by year (not date) of birth.

- Players occupying roster spots 21-30 do not count against the club's salary budget, and are referred to collectively as the club's Off-Budget Players (maximum of 10 per team).
 - □ All Generation adidas players are Off-Budget players.
 - □ Players occupying roster spots 1-24 will earn at least \$44,000 in 2012.
 - □ Players occupying roster spots 25-30 will earn at least \$33,750 in 2012.
 - Clubs may elect to leave up to two of these roster spots (25-30) vacant and use \$35,000 for each empty spot as allocation money.
 - Clubs may sign up to two Homegrown Players contracts above the minimum salary and similar to Generation adidas player contract amounts.

Age Designations:

 Any player making \$33,750 must be under the age 25 (does not turn 25 or older in 2012).

Domestic/International:

- In 2012, a total of 152 international slots are divided among the 19 clubs. Each club began with eight international slots, which are tradeable. There is no limit on the number of international slots on each club's roster.
 - ☐ The remaining roster slots must belong to domestic players. For clubs based in the United States, a domestic player is either a U.S. citizen, a permanent resident (green card holder) or the holder of other special status (e.g., refugee or asylum status).
- The three MLS clubs based in Canada –
 Montreal Impact, Toronto FC and Vancouver
 Whitecaps FC began with eight international slots, but their domestic slots may be
 filled with either Canadian or U.S. domestic
 players.
 - MLS clubs based in Canada are required to have a minimum of three Canadian domestic players on their rosters.
 - Players with the legal right to work in Canada are considered Canadian domestic players (i.e., Canadian citizen, permanent resident, part of a protected class).



NOTE: The terms Homegrown and Generation adidas are used to describe mechanisms by which players are acquired. They are not roster designations. All players' roster slots are determined by their compensation and/or age as outlined above.

II. PLAYER ACQUISITION MECHANISMS

MLS teams may acquire players and add them to their rosters via the following mechanisms:

(A) ALLOCATION RANKING

The allocation ranking is the mechanism used to determine which MLS club has first priority to acquire a U.S. National Team player who signs with MLS after playing abroad, or a former MLS player who returns to the League after having gone to a club abroad for a transfer fee. The allocation rankings may also be used in the event two or more clubs file a request for the same player on the same day when the discovery period opens in December. The allocations will be ranked in reverse order of finish for the 2011 season, taking playoff performance into account.

Once the club uses its allocation ranking to acquire a player, it drops to the bottom of the list. A ranking can be traded, provided that part of the compensation received in return is the other club's ranking. At all times, each club is assigned one ranking. The rankings reset at the end of each MLS League season.

Allocation Money

Allocation money is a resource available to clubs in addition to their respective salary budgets.

A club may receive allocation money for:

- (1) Failure to qualify for the MLS Cup Playoffs;
- (2) The transfer of a player to a club outside of MLS for value;
- (3) Expansion status;
- (4) Qualification for the CONCACAF Champions League;
- (5) Trading in up to two Off-Budget roster spots;
- (6) Funds from purchased third designated player roster spots.

Each year the MLS Competition Committee determines the allocation amount to be made available to each club. Allocation money can be traded by clubs. Allocation money does not count against a club's salary budget and can be used:

 To sign players new to MLS (that is, a player who did not play in MLS during the previous season).

- To re-sign an existing MLS player, subject to League approval.
- To "buy-down" a player's salary budget charge below the League maximum of \$350,000.
- In connection with the exercise of an option to purchase a player's rights or the extension of a player's contract for the second year provided the player was new to MLS in the immediately prior year.

NOTE: To protect the interests of MLS and its clubs during discussions with prospective players or clubs in other leagues, amounts of allocation money held by each club will not be shared publicly.

(B) DESIGNATED PLAYER

The Designated Player Rule allows clubs to acquire up to three players whose salaries exceed their budget charges, with the club bearing financial responsibility for the amount of compensation above each player's budget charge. Designated Player slots may be used to acquire players new to MLS or to retain current MLS players, subject to League approval.

In 2012, a Designated Player over the age of 23** will carry a salary budget charge of \$350,000, unless the player joins his club in the middle of the season, in which case his budget charge will be \$175,000.

A Designated Player 20 years old or younger** counts as \$150,000 against the club's salary budget and a Designated Player 21-23 years old counts as \$200,000 against the club's salary budget.

Clubs have the option of "buying down" the budget charge of a Designated Player with allocation money. The reduced charge may not be less than \$150,000.

The budget charge for the midseason signing of a young Designated Player (23 years old and younger) is \$150,000 and this amount cannot be lowered with allocation funds.

Each club has two Designated Player slots and clubs are allowed to "purchase" a third Designated Player slot for a one-time fee of \$250,000 that will be dispersed in the form of allocation money to all clubs that do not have three Designated Players. Clubs will not have to buy the third DP roster slot to accommodate Designated Players 23 years old and younger.

Designated Player slots are not tradable.

** Age of player is determined by year (not date) of birth.



(C) SUPERDRAFT

The 2012 MLS SuperDraft, held Jan. 12 in Kansas City, Mo., consisted of two rounds of 19 picks for a total of 38 player selections. A supplemental draft was held Jan. 17 via teleconference and consisted of four rounds of 19 picks.

The majority of draft prospects are NCAA college seniors who have exhausted their college eligibility. Generation adidas players and noncollegiate international players are also eligible for selection in the SuperDraft and supplemental draft. Clubs may nominate players for the League's draft-eligible list, and only players from that list may be selected.

Generation adidas is a joint program between MLS and adidas that is dedicated to developing exceptional domestic talent in a professional environment. Each year, a handful of top domestic underclassmen and youth national team players are signed to the league and placed in the SuperDraft through this program. Generation adidas players also receive an educational stipend.

Draft Order: The Montreal Impact held the first overall selection in the 2012 MLS SuperDraft as expansion clubs are always given the top spot in the SuperDraft and the Supplemental Draft. The next eight selections went to clubs that did not qualify for the 2011 MLS Cup Playoffs beginning with the club with fewest regular season points (3 points per win, one point per tie). The remaining ten positions were ranked by fewest regular season points among the teams that were eliminated in the same round of the MLS Cup Playoffs.

Unless claimed on waivers, a player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft or supplemental draft and did not sign with the League, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to the player.

(D) TRADES

Players, SuperDraft and Supplemental draft picks, allocation money, allocation rankings, and international player slots may all be exchanged in trades approved by the MLS League Office, provided all of the necessary rules regarding roster and salary budget compliance are met and the trade is completed during a valid trading period. No trades may occur after the Roster Freeze Deadline of September 15, 2012 at 5 p.m. ET.

(E) DISCOVERY SIGNINGS

Clubs may make discovery claims on players not yet under MLS contract who are not subject to the allocation ranking or lottery mechanisms. Each club has the opportunity to make six discovery signings per season (expansion teams may make 10 discovery signings in their inaugural season). A club may have up to 10 discovery claims on unsigned players at any time and may remove or add players at any time. The last day for discovery player signings is September 15, 2012 – coinciding with the roster freeze date and trade deadline.

The six discovery signings can be used to fill senior roster spots only. If multiple clubs claim the same player using a discovery, the club that filed the claim first will have first rights to the player. Discovery claims expire following each season. If the League and player are unable to reach an agreement during the season, the club that first filed the discovery retains the right of first refusal in the event the player is later signed by the League.

NOTE: To protect interests of MLS clubs in scouting and negotiations with prospective players, the League office will not publicize the names of players on club discovery lists, nor specify if a discovery claim has been filed on a particular player.

(F) HOMEGROWN PLAYER SIGNINGS

A club may sign a player to his first professional contract without subjecting him to the MLS SuperDraft if the player has trained for at least one year in the club's youth development program and has met the League's Homegrown Player criteria. Players joining MLS through this mechanism are known as Homegrown Players.

There is no limit to the number of Homegrown Players a club may sign in a given year.

(G) RE-ENTRY PROCESS

The 2012 Re-Entry Process will commence after MLS Cup. The priority order for the Re-Entry Draft is reverse order of finish in 2012, taking into account playoff performance.

Available to all teams in Stage 1 of the Re-Entry draft will be:

- Players who are at least 23 years old and have a minimum of three years experience in MLS whose options were not exercised by their clubs (available at option salary for 2013).
- Players who are at least 25 years old with a minimum of four years of MLS experience who are out of contract and whose club does not wish to re-sign them at their previous salary (available for at least their 2012 salary).
- Players who are at least 30 years old with a minimum of eight years of MLS experience who are out of contract and whose club



does not wish to re-sign them (available for at least 105% of their 2012 salary).

Players who are not selected in Stage 1 of the Re-Entry Draft will be made available in Stage 2. Clubs selecting players in Stage 2 will negotiate a new salary with the player.

Players who remain unselected after Stage 2 will be available to any MLS club on a first come, first serve basis.

(H) WAIVERS

A team may place a player on waivers at any time during the regular season at which point he is made available to all other teams. The waiver claiming period shall commence on the first business day after the League delivers notice to teams and shall expire at 5 p.m. EST on the second business day after the Waiver Period Commencement Date. The claiming period is 48 hours.

The Waiver Draft order is determined via points per game once all teams have played at least three MLS League games. If the waiver takes place prior to all teams playing in at least three League games, priority shall be granted based upon the prior year's performance, taking playoff performance first, with teams eliminated from playoff contention at the same stage separated according to their point totals through the end of the regular season. New expansion teams shall be at the bottom of the waiver order.

Once a team selects a player off waivers, that club is automatically moved to the bottom of the priority list for subsequent waiver selections in a given season, regardless of its points-per-game total. Players who may be placed on the MLS waiver wire are as follows:

- A player waived by an MLS team in the current season;
- A player who completed his college eligibility within the past season, who was not made available in the SuperDraft or Supplemental Draft;
- A player who has remaining college eligibility (and was not made available in the SuperDraft or Supplemental Draft), but the League at its discretion and after taking into account exceptional circumstances determines the player may be offered an MLS contract:
- A player who has played in MLS previously where his last MLS team does not wish to exercise their right of first refusal, except in the case of returning U.S. National Team players as stated above.

SOUNDERS FC

A player who was drafted in the SuperDraft or supplemental draft, and who after a trial with the club is not offered a contract by the first Monday of June.

(I) LOTTERY

Some players shall be assigned to MLS teams via the weighted Lottery process. Any team assigned a player through the lottery in any particular season shall not be assigned another lottery player that season unless and until all teams have received a lottery player or have agreed to waive their option to participate in a Lottery. The players made available through lotteries include:

- Generation adidas players signed after the MLS SuperDraft;
- Draft eligible players to whom an MLS contract was offered but who failed to sign with the League prior to the Draft.

The weighted lottery takes into consideration each team's performance over its last 34 regular season games and the most recent postseason. The team with the worst record over its last 34 regular season games (dating back to previous season if necessary and taking playoff performance into account) will have the greatest probability of winning the lottery. Teams are not required to participate in a lottery. Players are assigned via the lottery system in order to prevent a player from potentially influencing his destination club with a strategic holdout.

(J) EXTREME HARDSHIP CALL-UPS

Teams may add players to their roster in cases of "extreme hardship" as follows: (1) a club with three goalkeepers on its 30-man roster, but has less than two available goalkeepers or (2) a team has less than 15 available players. Extreme hardship call-ups are made on a game-by-game basis.

(K) SEASON-ENDING INJURY REPLACE-MENTS (Season Ending Injury List)

A team with a player lost to a season-ending injury can place the player on the Season Ending Injury List and replace that player on its roster, while remaining responsible for the full amount of the injured player's salary. A player can be placed on the season-ending injury list once another player has been signed as a replacement (provided the team has budget space). International player limits still apply at the time a season-ending replacement is made (with the player being replaced not counting against those limits).

(L) SHORT-TERM INJURY REPLACE-MENTS (Disabled List)

A player who has a short-term injury can be placed on the Disabled List once another player has been signed as a replacement (provided the team has budget space). The team will remain responsible for the full amount of the injured player's salary on the salary budget. Note: the injured player will have to sit out a minimum of six MLS League matches before he can rejoin the team's roster. International player limits still apply at the time a short-term replacement is made (with the player being replaced not counting against those limits).

NOTE: No changes may be made to a team's active full roster during the period beginning on September 16, 2012 (day after Roster Freeze Date) through the day after MLS Cup. Nevertheless, a team may obtain players in accordance with the extreme hardship rules and procedures to replace players who are injured or otherwise legitimately unavailable after the Roster Freeze Date. Any other replacements after the Roster Freeze Date may only be made in exceptional circumstances in the League's sole and absolute discretion.

(III.) METHODS OF RELEASING PLAYERS

(A) WAIVERS

Teams may waive players based on performance at any time during the MLS season. Players with guaranteed contracts will continue to have their salary budget charge applied to the team salary budget, subject to any settlement. Players on semi-guaranteed contracts can be waived prior to July 1 of any year and free up the corresponding budget space. If a player on a semi-guaranteed contract is waived after July 1, his salary budget charge will count against the team's salary budget and the team waiving the player will not receive a replacement except under the normal player acquisition mechanisms. Any settlement amount will be charged to the team's salary budget.

(B) TRANSFERS AND LOANS

An MLS player may be transferred or loaned at any time to a team outside the League (subject to that team's Federation's transfer window), subject to the consent of the player.

The registration windows – the dates between which MLS may request the transfer certificate of a player under contract in another country – are as follows:

January 21 - April 15 (Primary Window)

June 27 - July 27 (Secondary Window)

(C) CONTRACT EXPIRATION

When a player's contract expires, the player does not count against the roster or budget of the team in question. Subject to the Re-Entry Draft rules, a team retains the rights to the player indefinitely following the expiration of a contract only if attempts were made to re-sign the player.

(D) BUYOUT OF GUARANTEED CONTRACT

Teams may have the ability to buyout one guaranteed player as follows:

A Team may buy out one (1) guaranteed player (including a DP's) contract during the off-season and free up the corresponding budget space. Such a buyout is at the particular MLS Team's own expense.

A Team may not free up budget space with a buyout of a player's salary budget charge during the season. Such a buyout will be conducted by the League and count on a Club's budget in a manner consistent with current MLS guidelines.

(IV.) RIGHT OF FIRST REFUSAL

Right of first refusal grants one MLS club the first opportunity to add a player to its roster in the event that the player signs with MLS. Holding a right of first refusal applies only within MLS and does not indicate holding of the player's International Transfer Certificate.

OUT OF CONTRACT PLAYERS / OPTIONS NOT PICKED UP: Subject to the Re-Entry
Draft rules, a team retains the right of first
refusal to the player indefinitely only if attempts
were made to re-sign the player.

DRAFTED BUT NOT SIGNED: A player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft or supplemental draft and did not sign, or who as of the first Monday in June is not offered a contract after a trial and clears waivers, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 immediately following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to sign the player.

PLAYER TRANSFERRED OUTSIDE MLS: If a team receives allocation money as a result of a player's transfer, the team does not retain a right of first refusal.



HISTORY OF SOCCER IN SEATTLE

SEATTLE SOUNDERS (1974-1983)

The tradition of professional soccer and the Sounders brand began with the arrival of the North American Soccer League expansion franchise. For 10 seasons they were successful and entertaining on the field, attracting some of the league's largest crowds. Just as important, the original Sounders created a legacy of developing local players capable of reaching the highest levels of the game.

In some respects, the Sounders paved the way for Seattle securing an NFL expansion franchise a year later. The founding ownership group featured six of the same partners, including Lamont Bean, Howard S. Wright, Lynn Himmelman, David Skinner, Lloyd Nordstrom and Herman Sarkowsky.

The Sounders played their first two seasons outdoors and under the Space Needle. Located on the Seattle Center campus, Memorial Stadium provided a central location and an intimate setting, although the crowds soon outgrew the initial 13,000-seat capacity. In fact, Seattle was the first NASL team to draw a sellout and did so for nine of the final 16 games at Memorial.

With the completion of the Kingdome, the Sounders moved south in 1976, and a sold-out preseason game against Pele and the Cosmos set a North American attendance record of 58,128.

From the outset, the Sounders played an energetic, entertaining style while utilizing British veterans and young, mostly local, North American players. Although it won only two division titles, Seattle finished with winning records in seven of 10 seasons, twice reached the championship game, Soccer Bowl, and in 1980 the Sounders won 25 matches – the most in NASL history.

In each Soccer Bowl, Seattle met the star-studded New York Cosmos. The 1977 final marked the final competitive game for Pele. The Sounders only major trophy was the 1981 Trans-Atlantic Challenge Cup, a midseason tournament involving the Cosmos. England's Southampton and Scotland's Celtic.

The NASL and Sounders peaked in popularity by 1980, and over the following two seasons attendance declined while the number of teams dropped from 24 to 13. Seattle bowed out after the 1983 season, and a year later the league halted operations.

FC SEATTLE STORM (1984-90)

It can be argued that the rebirth of professional soccer in North America began with FC Seattle. In 1984, a year after the original Sounders folded, a new team surfaced with a new objective: to cultivate the best local talent and test it against the best in the business.

Funded by Eastside businessman Bud Greer and with former Sounders player and coach Jimmy Gabriel serving as coaching director, FC Seattle's approach was to create a pyramid system of youth teams feeding a senior men's program. That philosophy ran counter to the NASL era, when foreigners comprised the bulk of the roster and domestic players were in the minority.

Beginning with a summer series of friendlies against NASL teams and the U.S. National Team at Memorial Stadium, FC Seattle held its own and attracted an average of 6,669 fans. The first win came in Vancouver against the Whitecaps, 2-1.

In 1985, the stakes were raised and a league took root. With the NASL now disbanded, clubs from Europe, Mexico and South America were brought to Seattle. However, when British teams faced a worldwide travel ban, FC Seattle was forced to band together with other fledgling clubs to form the Western Soccer Alliance. That became the forerunner of the American Professional Soccer League or, as it was more widely known, the A-League.

Drawing on a mixture of former Sounders and stars from both Seattle Pacific Univ. and Washington collegiate programs, Seattle played a mixture of league and foreign exhibitions through 1988. That campaign culminated with Seattle winning the Western Soccer League championship and, later, making a five-match postseason tour of England. The Storm nickname was adopted prior to the 1989 season.


In 1990, the WSL merged with the East Coast's American Soccer League to form the APSL. In all there were 22 teams, but in 1991, with costs rising due to nationwide travel, membership fell to only nine clubs, and Seattle was not among them. After going dormant, it ceased operations altogether in 1992, although the brand was resurrected and used by an entry in the regional Pacific Coast League through 1995.

SEATTLE SOUNDERS (1994-2008)

In 1994, the World Cup was coming to America and, riding the resulting new wave of enthusiasm, professional soccer returned to Seattle after a three-year absence. The Sounders name was revived and the club, owned by Scott Oki and coached by Alan Hinton, joined the American Professional Soccer League.

From the outset, the Sounders nucleus was largely formed by homegrown talent. Hinton tapped into the college players being produced at both Seattle Pacific and Washington, and added experience in the form of past pros with local connections.

When Seattle won the 1995 A-League championship in its second season, eight of the 13 players who saw action originally came from the surrounding area's youth leagues. In 1996, when the Sounders repeated, nine starters were local products. Player/coach Neil Megson had been with both the original Sounders and Tacoma Stars for a total of nine seasons.

MLS opened play in 1996, and the A-League was thereafter classified as second division. Consequently, many of the top players were lured elsewhere. The Sounders remained competitive, qualifying for the playoffs in all but two of their 15 seasons and winning five divisional crowns.

In 2002 under the management of new majority investor Adrian Hanauer and the coaching of Brian Schmetzer, the club reached for new goals. Hanauer led the local effort to land a new MLS team and also moved the team from Memorial Stadium to the newly-completed CenturyLink Field. In fact, in the stadium's first event, the Sounders played to a USL record crowd of 25,515.

On the field, Seattle won a club-record 23 games in Schmetzer's first season. From 2004-07, it advanced to the USL championship game three times, winning twice. In U.S. Open Cup play, the Sounders eliminated four MLS teams in reaching back-to-back semifinals in 2007 and '08.



XBOX PITCH AT CENTURYLINK FIELD



In 1996, Paul G. Allen obtained an option to purchase the Seattle Seahawks and launched a campaign to win public support for a new world-class football/soccer stadium and exhibition center. Six years later, the dream became reality as the Seahawks opened the 2002 preseason against the Indianapolis Colts in new Seahawks Stadium. The stadium was renamed Qwest Field in 2004 and in 2011 became CenturyLink Field. The facility, built atop the site of the Kingdome, is not only home to the Seahawks, but the stadium accommodates many levels of soccer competition, including Major League Soccer, amateur, international, World Cup and collegiate soccer.

CenturyLink Field is designed with a 67,000 seat capacity (38,500 for MLS regular season), with 5,000 additional seats available for special events, and 1,400 seats for fans with disabilities. With a roof covering 70 percent of the seating area, fans enjoy wide, comfortable seats with sideline seating. The facility also features a dozen elevators and expansive concourses with an ample provision of concessions stands and restrooms.

In 2009, CenturyLink Field was awarded the "Event Recycling Award" from the Washington State Recycling Association. As a host for over 300 events and more than 1.5 million visitors annually, CenturyLink Field and CenturyLink Field Event Center recycled 70 percent of more than 1,100 tons of waste material generated; including paper products, plastics, co-mingled metals, wood and compost. CENTURYLINK FIELD FACTS & FIGURES

- 67,000 fixed seats can be expanded to 72,000
- 63 restrooms (799 toilets/364 urinals) twice as many as the Kingdome
- 1,400 seats for people with disabilities and their companions – compared to 70 at the Kingdome
- 10,000 cubic yards of concrete equal to a 3' sidewalk from Seattle to Boise, ID
- 3,756 miles of cable could reach from Seattle to just beyond the Panama Canal

CENTURYLINK FIELD FUNDING

The \$430 million facility is owned by the public and was funded by a private-public partnership. Private contributions totaled at least \$130 million, while the public contributed up to \$300 million through a lottery and a variety of taxes generated by events in the stadium/exhibition center.

A breakdown of the funding package:

- \$130 million private investment led by Paul Allen
- \$127 million from new, sports related games, similar to the Mariners' baseball-themed scratch games
- \$101 million in sales taxes collected in King County attributable to events in the stadium/exhibition center
- \$56 million from facility admission and parking taxes
- \$15 million from extending King County's share of the existing hotel-motel tax
- \$1 million per year of in-kind advertising for the new lottery games will be provided by Paul Allen
- All excess stadium revenues will fund youth athletic facilities throughout Washington State in addition to a \$10 million contribution from Paul Allen
- Paul Allen agreed to pay for any construction cost overruns
- As an added measure, the debt on the Kingdome was retired, freeing property taxes for other purposes

FIRST & GOAL INC.

In June of 1997, Washington State voters approved a funding package to build a new football/soccer stadium and exhibition center. With that, Paul G. Allen and Football Northwest created First & Goal Inc., an entity that represented the interests of CenturyLink Field in the construction of the new stadium and now manage the stadium and event center on a daily basis.

STARFIRE SPORTS



Starfire Sports is the official training facility and administrative home of the Seattle Sounders FC. Starfire Sports is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization located in Tukwila, Washington, whose mission is to inspire, encourage, and empower youth through participation in sports. In order to accommodate the Sounders FC, Starfire Sports expanded to include four additional soccer fields and a state of the art locker room lounge area in 2009.

The main campus offers eight outdoor soccer fields: four full-size FiedTurf™ fields, four grass fields varying in size, four head tennis courts, plyo-metric and soccer circuit training facilities, and

one MOD-sized FieldTurf™ field designed for skills or goal keeper training. Starfire Sports Stadium offers seating for over 3,000 people with covered and uncovered grand-

stands, a full video Pro-Star scoreboard, and a press box with a full PA system.

The new Sounders FC training complex consists of two FieldTurf™ MOD sized fields that are 85 x 50 vards, one oversized FieldTurf™ field that is 75 x 120 yards, and one oversized grass field measuring 80 x 120 yards with additional areas for skills training. All fields are lighted with a state of the art lighting system.

Starfire Sports also includes an 80,000 square foot Athletic Center Building housing two FieldTurf™ indoor fields that are 75 x 175 feet, locker rooms, team meeting and film study areas, an academic study room with computer/ internet access and a food court with outdoor deck seating. The Athletic Center also contains a Soccer West retail location, MAD Pizza restaurant and bar, Café Siena, and the Starfire Sports administrative offices.

SOUNDERS FC ALLIANCE

OVERVIEW



In the ongoing commitment to the fans, the Seattle Sounders FC Alliance is the only members association in professional sports in the United States to offer its members a voice in club matters. Every member has a vote in determining the direction of the club. By purchasing season tickets, fans are automatically a member of the association and able to receive all benefits. In addition, non-season ticket memberships are available for a fee of \$125. Members receive voting privileges, a pin for years of membership, a membership card, discount at team shops, information on matters relating to the association and the

team, and an invitation to the annual meeting and season review highlight film premier.

ROOT Sports serves as presenting sponsor of the Alliance.

ALLIANCE COUNCIL

Council members are elected on an annual basis with terms extending from March to November. Members interested in participating on Council must receive a minimum of 25 votes from other members of the Alliance. The Alliance Council meets two times per year in addition to the annual all-members meeting held at the conclusion of each season.

Each Council member serves as a liaison between members and the ownership group.

Five (5) Council members will also be chosen by ownership to serve on the Sounders FC Advisory Board – a board made up of ownership, technical staff, corporate partners, and members of the soccer community. Advisory board meetings take place on a quarterly basis with the annual meeting serving as the fourth quarter Advisory Board meeting.

Sounders FC currently operates the largest and most unique camp system in Major League Soccer. MEDIA POLICY

CREDENTIALS

Season media credentials will be issued to recognized newspapers, magazines, television and established radio stations making reasonable requests. To qualify, an outlet must cover 18 of the club's home games. Because of limited photo credentials, it is impossible to grant freelance photographer access unless assigned to shoot for a specific story or project.

ROAD CREDENTIALS

Members of the Sounders FC's media traveling to road games should submit requests for credentials to the Communications Department no later than five (5) business days prior to the road game.

MEDIA WILL CALL

Members of the media needing to pick up passes at the game will find the Media Will Call booth located at the Southwest corner of CenturyLink Field. Each person must pick up his or her own credential and present corresponding photo identification. Media Will Call opens two hours prior to the scheduled kickoff. All media must enter through the press gate entrance located at the Southwest Entrance. Media credentials will not be honored at any other entrance. All credentials are will subject the bearer to ejection from CenturyLink Field and confiscation of the credentials.

BROADCAST

In making requests for broadcast credentials, please specify requirements for spotters and/or statisticians. These services must be arranged in advance, and once they are made the statisticians must be compensated whether used or not. Broadcast booth locations are located in the CenturyLink Field press box.

PARKING

A limited number of parking passes are available for working media. Members of the media seeking parking passes are advised to make their requests as early as possible. Please note that Sounders FC will not be able to accommodate all requests.

A limited number of TV news trucks will be allowed to park on the CenuryLink Field east

access road. TV trucks which provide satellite, uplink or microwave functions will need to make prior arrangements with Kurt Shaffer, Director of Technical Services for First & Goal, Inc. (kurtsh@firstandgoal.com or 206-381-7220).

PRESS BOX

The Gary Wright Press Box CenturyLink Field is located on the suite level on the west side of the stadium The press box will open two hours before kickoff. Admittance is limited to working media members with valid credentials. The press box is intended for the purpose of providing a work place for writers, reporters, broadcasters and game personnel. It is imperative that season pass holders notify the communications staff of their intention to cover a game in order to receive press box seating. Family members and guests will not be accommodated in the press box. Abuse of press box press privileges will result in forfeiture of a press pass.

TELEPHONE/WIRELESS ACCESS

Several pool phones are placed throughout the press box. Remember pool phones are to be shared. Courtesy hard lines are available in the photo room. CenturyLink Field offers wireless internet access in all areas of the press box and photographers' work room. The access is free of charge and works with all wi-fi enabled computer equipment. Media wishing to pay for dedicated LAN connections should contact the Communications Department.

GAME NOTES/STATISTICS

Game notes and statistics will be available in the press box. Statistics will be distributed to each seat throughout the game at halftime and 10 minutes following the game. Periodic announcements will also be made during the game.

LOCKER ROOM ACCESS

Following the conclusion of the game, a postgame news conference will be held in the NFL Visiting Media Room near both the Home and Visiting Locker Rooms in the south end of CenturyLink Field. At the end of the news conference the locker room will be open to media. Sounders FC and visitor locker rooms are located near the Southeast tunnel on the field level. Your cooperation and profes-



sional courtesy is asked in maintaining a proper working atmosphere for postgame interviews. Absolutely no autographs are allowed during media access periods.

Media cell phones - No media may use a cell phone at any time inside the locker room. Media members may carry their cell phones into the locker room but may not use them to place or take calls, or to take photos.

FIELD ACCESS

Only working newspaper, magazine and network TV photographers and club/stadium officials are permitted on the field during the game. Press Box passes will not be honored for field admittance at any time, unless authorized by Seattle Sounders FC.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

ENG crew and still photographers holding proper credentials may position themselves along either endline at field level. Immediately prior to each match, photographers who wish to shoot the traditional pre-game team photo will be escorted on cue to the midfield sideline by photo marshals. Photographers will be instructed to walk only on the sidelines-never on the field of play-en route to these temporary sideline positions. Once team photos have been taken, photographers will be directed to quickly return to their endline photo positions. During the match, photographers are advised that they have restricted freedom of movement. At no time during the match can photographers shoot from directly behind the goal. Also, movement from one end of the field to the other is allowed only at halftime on the sideline opposite the team benches. Still photographers DO NOT have access to the locker rooms at any time.

PHOTOGRAPHER PHOTO BIBS

Each accredited photographer will be issued a specially designed photo bib/vest provided by Sounders FC for identification purposes as a mandatory supplement to the credential. The photo bib serves as a temporary access control device and must be returned to the photo marshals area at the end of each match. The photo bib must be worn at all times while present at any photo position. Photographers in unauthorized shooting positions or not wearing a bib risk suspension of their credential. All photographers are required to wear a vest that must be

obtained prior to the match in the Photographers' Workroom.

PHOTOGRAPHERS' WORKROOM

The Photographers' work area is located at the back of the press box.

MEALS

Food and beverages are available to working members of the media in the Press Box and Photographers' Workroom.

DURING THE WEEK

Training Access

During the regular season, training sessions typically run 75-90 minutes and usually begin at 10 a.m. Training times can and frequently do vary. Members of the media who intend to cover training sessions on a regular basis should call the Sounders FC Communications Department to obtain the latest training schedule information. Training sessions will, in general, be open to the media, but they may be closed at the discretion of the head coach. No media members are allowed into the locker room before, during or after training sessions.

Interviews

Interviews that require advance preparations or special accommodations by a Sounders FC player or staff member should be made by calling or e-mailing the Sounders FC Communications Department.
