SOUNDERS FC: CHAMPIONS AT LAST



The story of Seattle Sounders FC's MLS Cup-winning year is one that even Hollywood producers might consider too far-fetched to be believed. The comeback by Seattle, a club all but written off more than halfway through the season, to reach the crown defied all outside expectations and conventional logic. But before the team became champions, they had a tough road to travel, beginning before the season itself even started.

Despite an early coup in signing forward Jordan Morris to a Homegrown contract, securing the services of the talented rookie over SV Werder Bremen of Germany's Bundesliga, Sounders FC's excitement was quickly tempered by the unexpected departure of offensive juggernaut Obafemi Martins, who left the team for the Chinese Super League just two weeks from the start of the season. Seattle stumbled out of the gate, first being eliminated from the Scotiabank CONCACAF Champions League by Liga MX's Club América before beginning the regular season, where the club dropped its first three matches. The struggles only continued from there. Seattle hit its lowest point in midsummer, after a disappointing 3-0 road loss to Sporting Kansas City on July 24. The team's record fell to 6-12-2, good for just 20 points from 20 matches, and Seattle found itself in jeopardy of missing the postseason for the first time in its eight MLS seasons.

In the wake of the loss to Sporting KC, Sounders FC decided to part ways with Sigi Schmid, the team's longtime Head Coach. Named as interim replacement was Brian Schmetzer, a Seattle native who had coached the USL-era Seattle

Sounders to two titles in the mid-2000s and had served as Schmid's right-hand man since the club's inaugural MLS season in 2009. Despite Seattle's record, Schmetzer and others in the building kept their sights aimed high.

"When I sat with Brian after it was announced that he was going to be the interim head coach, I said, 'All we need to do is double our output,'" said Garth Lagerwey, Sounders FC's General Manager and President of Soccer, in November. "We averaged one point a game for the first 20 games. You've got about three months. If we average two points per game the rest of the way, we've got a shot at this thing."

Schmetzer put the onus on his players to take control of their season and received a fresh spark in the form of Uruguayan Nicolás Lodeiro. Seattle signed the 27-year-old Boca Juniors veteran just days after Schmetzer took over, adding a player who had previously suited up alongside the likes of Carlos Tevez, Luis Suárez and Edinson Cavani for the Uruguayan National Team. Lodeiro instantly proved his worth, revitalizing Seattle's attack by

pulling the strings for forwards Morris and Clint Dempsey. The tide quickly began to turn.

In Schmetzer's second match at the helm, a Clint Dempsey hat trick on the road against Orlando City SC led Sounders FC to the first of three consecutive victories, the first time all season they had accomplished that feat. Things were looking up heading into the end of August, and making the playoffs no longer seemed unattainable, but then Seattle took another hit. Dempsey was diagnosed with an irregular heartbeat that sidelined him indefinitely and ended his season. Following that worrisome news, the Rave Green visited the defending-champion Portland Timbers just days later and fell 4-2 to their archrivals. The Portland match was not without a bright spot, however, as hulking defender Román Torres, a Panamanian National Team captain, substituted in during the second half to see his first game action since tearing his ACL in September 2015.

Over the final nine games of the season, with Torres patrolling the backline alongside Chad Marshall, Seattle allowed only seven goals and recorded four shutouts, nearly doubling their efficiency from the first 26 matches of the season. Despite the loss of Dempsey, Seattle continued to fight its way up the Western Conference standings. In early September, the team had been ranked ninth of 10 teams. By the time Decision Day – the final match of the regular

season – rolled around, Sounders FC had climbed into postseason position. To secure its spot above the red line, all the Rave Green needed to do was defeat Real Salt Lake at home. That's exactly what they did, jumping to fourth in the West and clinching a home playoff date with Sporting Kansas City. Under Schmetzer's guidance, Seattle finished its remaining regular-season schedule 8-2-4, averaging exactly, as Lagerwey had hoped, two points per game.

While many pundits considered Seattle's mere postseason qualification to be a comeback story in itself, the team wasn't quite ready to stop there, and the players entered the Knockout Round with only one goal: advance.

Hosting Sporting KC on a stereotypical cold, rainy Seattle evening, Sounders FC started off slowly. Kansas City proved a tough opponent, often challenging Seattle's backline, but was ultimately unable to find a breakthrough. With the match scoreless in the 88th minute, Sounders FC found an unlikely goal from an even more unlikely source: Nelson Valdez. The veteran forward had not scored in 24 matches during the regular season, yet there he was, much maligned and snakebitten, heading in a Joevin Jones cross to give Seattle a 1-0 win. It was perhaps the most important goal of Sounders FC's season to that point.





“I’ve been feeling like I’ve had a big mountain on top of me for the whole season, and finally, with the goal, that mountain has gone away and the pressure has been relieved,” Valdez said in his emotional post-match interview. Seattle overcame its first playoff obstacle, but a much more formidable task loomed in the Western Conference Semifinals, where Seattle would take on FC Dallas, winner of both the 2016 Supporters’ Shield and the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup.

The 2016 Western Conference Semifinals was a matchup between the league’s best team and its hottest team, and it was all but decided in an eight-minute span in the first leg at CenturyLink Field.

Sounders FC hosted the opening bout of the home-and-home aggregate series, and Seattle all but ended it with a dizzying stretch of three goals early in the second half. After a scoreless first 45 minutes, Seattle came out of the break on fire. Valdez scored for the second time in as many games, but there was barely time to celebrate before Lodeiro scored back-to-back strikes minutes later, sending Sounders FC to Texas with a 3-0 aggregate lead. Dallas brought the house in the return leg, scoring early and putting pressure on Seattle, but Lodeiro came through again. The Uruguayan scored off a brilliant steal and pass from defender Tyrone Mears to effectively seal the series win and send Seattle to the Western

Conference Championship for the third time in franchise history.

The club had more good news to announce during the semifinals stretch, as Schmetzer was officially hired as the full-time head coach, much to the delight of the Sounders FC faithful. But even in the midst of the celebration, the team knew there was more work ahead and focused on its opponent for the conference championship.



The final team standing in the way of Sounders FC and its first MLS Cup appearance was a Colorado Rapids side that had finished with the league's second-best record and stingiest defense.

Playing at CenturyLink Field in the first leg of the series, the Rapids took an early lead off a deflected shot from outside the area, but Morris answered for Seattle on a rebound off the post to equalize.

Lodeiro then scored his fourth playoff goal on a second-half penalty kick, securing a 2-1 lead for Schmetzer's club as it traveled to Colorado for the second leg. Despite the Seattle lead, Colorado remained confident and Sounders FC knew that the next match wouldn't be easy.

"[We're going to] bring them into altitude and asphyxiate them in the 60th minute," Rapids Head Coach Pablo Mastroeni said after the first leg, referencing the intense altitude advantage that led Colorado to an undefeated home record in 17 regular-season matches (11-0-6).

Seattle wouldn't have any of it, however, as the team came out ready to fight. Morris turned in his gutsiest performance of the season as he battled not only the altitude, but also flu-like symptoms that had overtaken him in the 48 hours prior to the match. Willing his way through a brutal contest, the Mercer Island native burst forward in the 56th minute to score the all-important away goal to put Colorado on the ropes. The Rapids could not find an answer and dropped their first home match of the 2016 campaign. Seattle advanced 3-1 on aggregate, earning its first Western Conference Championship and, more importantly, its first trip to MLS Cup.

As Seattle embraced its championship berth, the team and the entire Puget Sound region held its collective breath, waiting for the results in the Eastern

Conference, where Toronto FC and the Montreal Impact had one leg left to play.

TFC was down 3-2 to Montreal after the first match, but the tenacious Reds gave a commanding performance in the second leg, adding five goals to take a 7-5 aggregate victory. The stage was now set: Seattle would be traveling to face a red-hot Toronto side north of the border. Like Sounders FC, Toronto was also seeking its first MLS Cup title and had been one of the most dangerous teams in the playoff field. As the third seed in the East, the Reds had made easy work of the Philadelphia Union in the Knockout Round before dismantling New York City FC in the Eastern Conference Semifinals and outlasting Montreal to advance to MLS Cup. TFC boasted U.S. Men's National Team stars Michael Bradley and Jozy Altidore, as well as 2015 MLS MVP Sebastian Giovinco.

Sounders FC traveled to Toronto as the underdogs, a familiar ethos they had embraced since Brian Schmetzer took over in late July. Every game had essentially been a playoff game as the regular season wound down, and it was no different on this frigid night in Ontario. Toronto controlled much of the match in front of a sold-out crowd of 36,000-plus. A number of dedicated Sounders FC supporters made the trip east, but the crowd was overwhelmingly painted red. Every time Toronto created an opportunity, the

stadium collectively gasped before sighing as near miss after near miss ensued. While TFC played doggedly, it was unable to find a breakthrough, as Seattle's backline bent, but did not break, and the match was forced into two 15-minute extra-time periods.

Every championship game needs a hero, and it took this match 118 minutes to find one. Sounders FC goalkeeper Stefan Frei had been magnificent down the stretch of the regular season and throughout the playoffs, and he had been especially busy all evening parrying away shot after Toronto shot. And then, with two minutes left in the second extra-time period, Altidore rose and headed a cross to the far post, an arching shot looked to be a sure goal. Frei took a step to his left, planted his feet hard and sprang full-extension, reaching the shot with the tips of his fingers and pushing it away to safety. Announcers and the crowd alike were stunned. "The Save," as it would come to be called, was a split-second moment that defined the match. But the team's work still wasn't done.

The match went to penalty kicks, with TFC taking a 4-3 advantage into the bottom of the fifth round. Nicolás Lodeiro, who had lifted the team time and again since his arrival in July, stepped up to the line. A conversion would send the shootout into sudden death. A miss would crown TFC. Lodeiro, ever the professional, knocked in a convincing shot. The Cup

wasn't decided yet. In the top of the sixth round and now in sudden death, an attempt from Toronto's Justin Morrow hit the crossbar and set the stage for Seattle to claim victory.

Next in line to kick was defender Román Torres. The Panamanian's return had been crucial to Sounders FC's late-season success, and he now had the opportunity to capture the club's first MLS Cup title. Torres stepped up and confidently sent the ball down the center of the goal. Toronto goalkeeper Clint Irwin misjudged the shot's direction and could only watch as the ball sailed past him. Torres saw his

kick was good before it hit the back of the net. He lifted his arms in euphoria and sprinted to the far corner of the stadium – swarmed by teammates as he ran – to celebrate with the Sounders FC faithful who had made the trip and now witnessed history.

In a season that at times seemed lost, littered with obstacles, disappointment and setbacks, Seattle did the unthinkable. As captain Osvaldo Alonso lifted the Philip F. Anschutz Trophy for the stadium to view and with Rave Green confetti covering the pitch, it finally sank in. Seattle Sounders FC: 2016 MLS Cup Champions.

ADRIAN HANAUER

OWNER

Adrian Hanauer first kept the flame of professional soccer alive in Seattle before helping to reignite the community's passion for the game with the arrival of a Major League Soccer expansion franchise in 2009.

Owner of Seattle Sounders FC, Hanauer also served as the club's General Manager prior to the appointment of Garth Lagerwey in January of 2015, leading the organization to extraordinary success during its first six years of MLS history. During that span, Sounders FC claimed one Supporters' Shield and four Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cups, while simultaneously setting the seven-highest single-season attendance totals in North American soccer history.

In 2016 the club once again led North American soccer on the attendance front, averaging 42,636 fans per home match, and under Hanauer's leadership Sounders FC claimed its first MLS Cup. After reaching the postseason in every year of its MLS existence, Seattle finally ascended to the league's summit by defeating Toronto FC at BMO Field on December 10, 2016.

Under Hanauer, Sounders FC became just the third team in the 99-year history of the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup to win three consecutive championships (2009, 2010, 2011), and just the second to qualify for four consecutive finals (2009, 2010, 2011, 2012). This success helped Hanauer be retained as the team's General Manager in the first-ever fan vote in American professional sports history. A total of 13,755 votes were submitted during the two-month window and he received 96.3-percent of the votes for retention. Hanauer was also honored as the 2012 Executive of the Year at the 78th MTR Western Sports Star of the Year Awards, given to an individual for contributions to the success of the regional sports industry.

Hanauer has not only guided Seattle to success on the field, but he is largely responsible for the club's off-the-field achievements as well. Sounders FC topped its own year-over-year MLS attendance record for five consecutive seasons, averaging 44,038 in 2013, over 20,000 more than the next-closest team. Seattle hosted the second-largest crowd for a standalone MLS match when 67,385 packed CenturyLink Field for a Cascadia Cup game against Portland that same year, with the club registering even higher marks in

Since 2001, Hanauer has been associated with the highest level of soccer played in Seattle. He first joined the ownership group of the Sounders franchise in the United Soccer League's First



Division, and later became Majority Shareholder and General Manager. His first season in that role, 2002, was rewarded with Seattle going 23-4-1 — the second-best record in league history. From 2004-2007, the Sounders played in the USL-1 championship game three times, winning twice (2005, 2007) and also taking a Commissioner's Cup (best record) in 2007.

Hanauer has more than 20 years of business experience in a variety of other industries. On numerous occasions he has made early stage investments in technology companies with interests in advertising, infrastructure and wireless communications.

Hanauer co-founded Curious

Office Partners, which invests in and incubates early-stage technology companies. He was a seed stage investor in aQuantive Inc., the largest interactive advertising company which was later acquired by Microsoft for \$6 billion U.S., and he was also an early investor in Amazon.com.

Hanauer brings a great deal of brick-and-mortar business experience to Sounders FC. The Hanauer family owns Pacific Coast Feather Co., one of the nation's largest manufacturer of pillows, comforters, and bedding products. He also owns one of the largest chains of picture-framing companies in the United States.

An active and engaged member of the greater Seattle community, Hanauer spearheads the RAVE Foundation, a non-profit organization working to build small and innovative soccer fields dedicated for free play in neighborhoods throughout the city. Additionally, Hanauer served as the Honorary Chair for Washington Youth Soccer's 50th anniversary celebration in 2016.

Hanauer's interest in soccer began at the age of three, and he saw his first NASL Sounders game at the age of eight. He went on to play for Mercer Island High School and remains active in the Greater Seattle Soccer League.

In addition to his interest in Sounders FC, Hanauer is one of the largest shareholders of England's Cambridge United Football Club, currently playing in England's League Two (fourth tier). While with the USL Sounders, Hanauer promoted international matches, most notably an exhibition between Real Madrid and D.C. United that attracted a then-record Seattle crowd of 66,612 to CenturyLink Field in 2006. Hanauer attended the University of Washington.

JOE ROTH

OWNER

Owner of Seattle Sounders FC, Joe Roth's vision to establish Seattle as the soccer capital of the U.S. was a significant catalyst in the success of Sounders FC over its first eight years in Major League Soccer. His foresight has also led to his long-standing achievement in the film and entertainment industry.

As founder of Roth Films, Inc., his recent films include producer of *OZ: The Great and Powerful* with Director Sam Raimi for Disney, *Snov White and the Huntsman* with Director Rupert Sanders for Universal and *Alice in Wonderland* for Disney with Director Tim Burton, starring Johnny Depp. Additional productions include *Maleficent*, starring Angelina Jolie for Disney, and *Million Dollar Arm*, starring Jon Hamm for Disney.



During his career in the entertainment industry, Roth has served as chairman of both The Walt Disney Studios and Twentieth Century FOX. In May of 2000, he founded Revolution Studios which released 46 feature films between 2001 and 2007, including *Black Hawk Down*, which won two Academy Awards®, and *XXX*, which earned more than \$275 million worldwide, as well as *Anger Management*, *Daddy Day Care*, *Hellboy*, *13 Going On 30*, *White Chicks*, *The Forgotten*, *Rocky Balboa*, *Across the Universe* and *The Waterhorse*.

He has also directed six films, the most recent include *America's Sweethearts*, *Christmas with the Kranks* and *Freedomland*.

In 2004, Roth was the Emmy Award-nominated producer of the 76th Annual Academy Awards, which received 10 Emmy Award® nominations, including one for Outstanding Variety, Music or Comedy Special, and won an Emmy for Outstanding Directing for a Variety, Music or Comedy Program.

From August 1994 through January 2000, Roth ran Walt Disney Studios, first as Chairman of the Walt Disney Motion Pictures Group, then, beginning in April 1996, as Chairman of The Walt Disney Studios. He led the studio to worldwide market dominance over the five years with an industry-leading 18 films grossing over \$100 million domestically. Three of those films – *The Sixth Sense*, *Toy Story 2* and *Armageddon* – grossed more than \$200 million in the United States alone. Roth helped to build Buena Vista International into the market leader, finishing first in market share five times in six years, the only company to gross over one billion dollars in each of those years. The studio's 1999 Best Picture nominee, *The Insider*

and *The Sixth Sense*, led Disney to an industry-leading 17 Academy Award® nominations.

From 1992 to 1994, Roth, with Roger Birnbaum, headed Caravan Pictures, which produced such hits as *While You Were Sleeping*, *Angels in the Outfield* and *The Three Musketeers* for Disney.

Before establishing Caravan Pictures, Roth served as Chairman of Twentieth Century FOX from July 1989 until November 1992. During his tenure at the studio, the company made such successful films as *Home Alone*, *Home Alone 2: Lost in New York*, *Die Hard 2*, *Sleeping with the Enemy*, *Mrs. Doubtfire*, *My Cousin Vinny*, *White Men Can't Jump*, *Edward Scissorhands*, *The Commitments* and *The Last of the Mohicans*.

Prior to Twentieth Century FOX, Roth was a highly successful independent producer/director, co-founding Morgan Creek Pictures, for which he produced such films as *Young Guns*, *Dead Ringers*, *Major League* and *Bachelor Party*. Roth directed both *Streets of Gold* and *Revenge of the Nerds II* for Twentieth Century FOX, and *Coupe De Ville* for Universal Pictures.

Equally noted for his diverse civic and charitable activities, Roth has received various awards such as the 1991 Variety Clubs Man of the Year Award, the 1996 Humanitarian Award from the NCCJ, the 1997 American Museum of Moving Image Award and was honored in 1998 by APLA and the National Multiple Sclerosis Society. Roth was also the recipient of the 2004 Dorothy and Sherrill C. Corwin Human Relations Award from the American Jewish Committee, and is an active supporter of the SIDS alliance.

A lifelong fan, player and coach, Roth now wishes to further his association with soccer by taking the professional game in America to a much higher level of competitiveness and visibility.

A New York City native, Roth grew up in the soccer hotbed of Long Island and played from age 10 into his first two years of college. He saw action for both Bowling Green and Hofstra before a career-ending leg injury. He graduated from Boston University in 1970.

Roth has four children, Zack, Julia, David and Robert. He was involved in coaching his son Zack's team for 15 years.

PAUL G. ALLEN

OWNER

Paul G. Allen helped bring Major League Soccer to the Northwest when Vulcan Sports and Entertainment joined the ownership group behind the Sounders FC. The 2007 announcement that the Sounders FC would become an MLS team was the result of years of work and enthusiasm on behalf of soccer fans.

A Seattle native, Allen's passion for sports began when he attended University of Washington football games with his father. His enthusiasm for the game and love of his hometown were two of the reasons he purchased the National Football League's Seattle Seahawks in 1996, a move that saved the team from being relocated to Southern California. In 2014, the Seahawks became Super Bowl XLVIII champions after defeating the Denver Broncos.

Allen had visions of world-class soccer in Seattle soon after purchasing the Seahawks. On June 17, 1997, Washington state voters approved "Referendum 48" to authorize a public/private partnership to construct a stadium, exhibition center and parking facilities in downtown Seattle. One of the keys to the success of the vote was statewide support from the soccer community and its hope to one day see professional soccer, played at the highest level, return to the Northwest.

"From the beginning of this process, my goals have been to work with the community to create a lasting asset for our future and to ensure the long-term success of the Seahawks," said Allen at the time of purchasing the franchise. He also wanted to create a world-class facility for the state of Washington.

That dream became a reality in 2002 with the opening of the Seahawks Stadium and Exhibition Center, renamed CenturyLink Field and CenturyLink Field Event Center in 2011. An open-air facility which many critics argue is the best venue in the NFL, CenturyLink Field is home to more than 165 events annually ranging from soccer, to Supercross, concerts, graduation ceremonies and trade shows. In 2013, CenturyLink Field became the loudest NFL stadium when it broke the Guinness World Record for loudest crowd at an outdoor stadium.

"It exceeds the vision we had originally," Allen said shortly after the opening of the stadium. "We wanted to create an intimate, elegantly designed stadium that would be great for the fans, and I think we've ended up with a fantastic facility."

Allen has spent his career tackling some of the world's biggest challenges and pushing the boundaries of what's possible. Through both for-profit and philanthropic investments, he has sparked important developments and innovations in the areas of science, technology, education, conservation, the arts and community improvement. Allen first made his mark in Seattle when he co-founded Microsoft with Bill Gates in 1975, and he continues



to be an innovator in the world of business and technology to this day. He is founder and chairman of Vulcan Inc., which oversees his philanthropic and business interests, and he owns the National Basketball Association's Portland Trail Blazers.

With lifetime giving totaling more than \$1.5 billion, Allen is included among the world's leading philanthropists who have pledged to donate the majority of their fortunes to charity. His giving is channeled through The Paul G. Allen Family Foundation, which works to catalyze change, transform lives and strengthen communities by supporting arts and culture, youth engagement, community development, social change and scientific and technological advancement.

He also gives directly, including

\$281.8 million to Washington since 1990.

In addition to his business and philanthropic efforts, Allen has a true love of science. He created the Allen Institute for Brain Science in Seattle in 2003 to accelerate understanding of the human brain in health and disease. The Institute has generated groundbreaking online public resources, including interactive atlases of the mouse and human brain that have become indispensable research tools for scientists worldwide. In 2012, Allen pledged \$300 million to significantly expand the Institute's scientific programs. In 2013, he launched the Allen Institute for the Artificial Intelligence to explore critical questions in AI.

His love of science reaches to the far ends of the universe. In 2004, Allen funded SpaceShipOne, the first privately-backed effort to successfully put a civilian in suborbital space. And in 2011, he got back into the space business with the formation of Strato-launch Systems, which is developing a revolutionary airborne launch system.

His award-winning film company, Vulcan Productions, develops and supports media projects that help audiences understand the world around them and respond to challenges. Vulcan Productions' projects include the Interdependence Movement Annual Film Award-winning *Girl Rising*; the 2013 Sundance Film Festival Official Selection *Pandora's Promise*; the Emmy Award-winning *Rx for Survival—A Global Health Challenge*; the Peabody Award-winning *Judgment Day: Intelligent Design*; the PBS series *This Emotional Life*; and the PBS series *The Blues*.

Allen is also the founder of the Museum of Pop Culture (MoPOP), Seattle's critically acclaimed interactive museum of music, popular culture, science fiction and fantasy; the Flying Heritage Collection, an assemblage of rare World War II aircraft restored to flying condition and shared with the public; and the Living Computer Museum, a collection of restored vintage timesharing computer equipment in Seattle's SoDo district. *Idea Man*, Allen's 2011 memoir, was a New York Times bestseller.

DREW CAREY

OWNER

Drew Carey is a stand-up comic turned actor and producer, and is now regarded as American soccer's most recognizable soccer supporter. Carey is an owner of Seattle Sounders FC and serves as chairman of the Sounders FC Alliance, the club's member association.

Carey had the distinction of having two hit shows simultaneously: the long-running comedy "The Drew Carey Show," which ran from 1995-2004, and the improv / sketch show "Whose Line Is It Anyway?" on which he was host and a producer. The success of that show led to the creation of "Drew Carey's Improv All-Stars," an improv group that performs in showrooms across the country. In July 2007, Carey was named the host of "The Price Is Right," America's longest-running game show.

While in the Marine Reserves, his military buzz cut and black wide-rim glasses became part of his trademark look. He began his successful career as a comedian in April of 1986 at the Cleveland Comedy Club. One of his first big breaks was competing on Star Search '88. In 1991, Carey landed a spot on HBO's 14th Annual Young Comedians Special and appeared on The Tonight Show with Johnny Carson. Carey openly credits Carson with launching his career. He received a



Star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame in 2003.

Carey's interest in soccer began while attending an LA Galaxy game in 2003. Shortly after, he started seeing every professional game he could find time for, including European league games and U.S. National Team qualifying games. He learned more about the game and, during a later visit to Spain, saw FC Barcelona in action. He also worked as a press photographer during the 2006 FIFA World Cup in Germany, his efforts chronicled on a Travel Channel show entitled "Drew Carey's Sporting Adventures," and his photos

have appeared in numerous publications. During his travels Carey became fascinated with the empowerment of supporters at such clubs as Barcelona and Real Madrid, where leadership positions are voted upon by the members. He brought that idea to Sounders FC, where members vote on various matters, most notably the fate of the general manager every four years. Carey is also the driving force for Seattle's 53-piece marching band, Sound Wave. Carey is a native of Cleveland, Ohio and currently resides in Los Angeles.



GARTH LAGERWEY

GENERAL MANAGER & PRESIDENT OF SOCCER

As Sounders FC General Manager and President of Soccer, Garth Lagerwey oversees all soccer operations, including technical staff management, player personnel and transactions, scouting and the oversight of S2 and the Sounders FC Academy system. Like Adrian Hanauer before him, Lagerwey holds a position that is subject to fan vote every four years as part of the Sounders FC Alliance Charter. Under Lagerwey's guidance, Seattle claimed its first MLS Cup on December 10, 2016, defeating Toronto FC on penalties to earn the club's first title.

Lagerwey joined Sounders FC on January 6, 2015 after more than seven successful seasons with Real Salt Lake. Originally hired by RSL on September 19, 2007, Lagerwey held the title of General Manager and Senior Vice President of Soccer Operations through the 2014 season, where he served as architect of the team that claimed the 2009 MLS Cup and an appearance in the 2010-11 CONCACAF Champions League Final. He guided the Claret and Cobalt from a last-place finish in the Western Conference in 2007 to seven straight MLS Cup Playoff appearances from 2008-14, accumulating a 101-68-63 record under his leadership. In 2013, RSL also made an appearance in the MLS Cup Final and the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup Final. Lagerwey's RSL also became the first MLS club to finish runner-up in the CONCACAF Champions League, falling to Liga MX side



Monterrey in the 2010-11 tournament final.

Intimately involved in Major League Soccer circles since the league's inception in 1996, Lagerwey had a five-year career as a goalkeeper for the Kansas City Wizards (1996), the Dallas Burn (1997-98), and Miami Fusion FC (1999-2000). He made 51 career appearances and 46 starts, accumulating a 25-22-0 record.

Lagerwey joined Real Salt Lake from the law firm of Latham & Watkins, LLC, where he served as an associate in the Corporate Department of the firm's Washington, D.C. office. A graduate of both Duke University (BA, 1994)

and Georgetown University Law School (JD, 2004), Lagerwey's experience in the practice's Sports, Media & Entertainment; Investment & Strategic Ventures; and Mergers & Acquisitions divisions included assistance in a client's acquisition of a minority portion of the NHL's St. Louis Blues, the majority owner of which is SCP Worldwide; the buying and selling of companies in a variety of fields; and extensive fund formation and management of the investment funds for the Carlyle Group, with emphasis in the energy sector.

Lagerwey's sharp wit and knowledge of American soccer at all levels made him a natural fit in the media realm, getting his start by filling in as a guest writer for Sports Illustrated and SI.com writer Grant Wahl's weekly soccer column. Lagerwey traded his pen for a microphone upon retirement and served as an analyst for D.C. United's television broadcasts on Comcast SportsNet during parts of seven MLS seasons (2001-2007), in addition to being an analyst for XM Satellite Radio's 2006 FIFA World Cup daily show and seeing spot duty on New England Revolution TV and radio broadcasts.

The Elmhurst, Illinois native lives in Seattle with his wife Hilary and sons Bennett and Finn.



CHRIS HENDERSON

VICE PRESIDENT OF SOCCER & SPORTING DIRECTOR

CHRIS HENDERSON

One of the first Sounders FC acts was the hiring of Chris Henderson in January of 2008. As Vice President of Soccer & Sporting Director, Henderson assists the team's General Manager and President of Soccer, Garth Lagerwey, in all areas of soccer operations, including scouting, player management, coaching decisions and the club's youth system.

Under Henderson, Sounders FC achieved instant success from the start, which manifested in the club's first MLS Cup trophy in December 2016. Seattle became the first MLS club to win three consecutive Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup titles (2009, 2010, 2011) and advanced to a fourth-straight final in 2012. Seattle also became the first MLS expansion team since the league began expanding in 2005 to reach the postseason in each of its first seven campaigns. In 2014, the club took home another U.S. Open Cup title and its first Supporters' Shield. Henderson was instrumental in signing forward Obafemi Martins in 2013, who went on to become the club's second all-time leading goal-scorer and runner-up to the 2014 MLS MVP.

Since 2009, Sounders FC players have been selected to the MLS All-Star team 22 times, including DeAndre Yedlin in 2013 – the first rookie to receive the honor since 2005. Henderson has also helped bring some of the world's top talent to MLS in former U.S. National Team Captain Clint Dempsey, and MLS Newcomers of the Year Fredy Montero (2009) and Mauro Rosales (2011). Henderson also brought in one of the league's premier midfielders in four-time team MVP Osvaldo Alonso, and has continued to develop local talent with the signings of Homegrown Players.

Henderson is regarded as one of the most successful players ever produced by the state of Washington, having represented the U.S. at the international level 79 times and winning championships in both MLS and the NCAA. An MLS original, Henderson played 11 seasons for five teams. Upon his retirement following the 2006 season, he was the league record-holder in four categories, including career games played and started. Henderson still shares the MLS single-game assist record (four assists for Kansas City in 1999) and his 80 regular-season assists is No. 10 all-time. He finished his career with 51 goals.

Henderson joined Seattle after spending the 2007 season as an assistant coach for Kansas City. Henderson began his MLS career with Colorado for its inaugural season in 1996, and he would play six full seasons for the Rapids, with five of



those squads reaching the playoffs. He set club records for career appearances and assists, earning Team MVP honors in 1996, an MLS All-Star appearance in 1997, when he also led the team in scoring and also helped Colorado reach the MLS Cup Final. Henderson achieved a career-high with 11 goals and again made the All-Star Game to begin his second stint for the Rapids in 2002. From 1999-2000 he played in Kansas City, leading the Wizards in scoring in their 2000 MLS Cup-winning run. That season, he played in a career-high 38 games, scoring 10 goals and adding nine assists.

He spent the 2001 season with the Miami Fusion, where he was the club's Humanitarian of the Year, before returning to Colorado. He was traded during the 2005 season to Columbus and completed his career with New York in 2006. A UCLA Hall of Fame inductee in 2016, Henderson helped the Bruins win an NCAA championship and earned All-America honors in 1990. He connected on penalty kicks during tiebreaker wins in both the semifinal and final. Earlier that year, Henderson began senior international play prior to the 1990 World Cup. At age 19, he was the youngest member of the United States roster. He was also a member of the 1992 U.S. Olympic Team and an alternate on the 1994 and 1998 World Cup squads. He set a team record with five assists in 1993 and has 10 career assists. Henderson was just the second player to have competed for the U.S. National Team on every level (U-16, U-20, Olympics, Youth World Cup, World Cup).

In 2004, the Chris Henderson Foundation was launched, giving grants to fight Leukemia and to underprivileged children. He was named the 2004 MLS W.O.R.K.S. Humanitarian of the Year and his club's Humanitarian of the Year at Colorado, Miami and New York.

Born in Edmonds, Washington, Henderson, 43, attended Everett's Cascade High School where he earned the 1989 Gatorade National Player of the Year Award. He played for the FC Seattle Storm in 1989 and began his professional career with Germany's FSV Frankfurt (1994-95) and Norway's Staebak (1995). Henderson is married to his wife Noree and has two children, Aidan and Annelise, as well as two stepchildren, Sofia and Ava. His brother, Pat, played right back for the NASL Sounders for Alan Hinton. His younger brother, Sean, played collegiately at UCLA and for the USL Sounders under Brian Schmetzer before spending three seasons in MLS.

BART WILEY

CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER

Promoted to Chief Operating Officer in 2014 from his previous role as Vice President of Business Operations, Bart Wiley oversees all business operations for Sounders FC, including sales, marketing, corporate partnerships, communications, broadcast and digital-related content, international marketing and community outreach.

Under his guidance, Seattle has garnered unprecedented business-related success for a North American soccer club, including the top eight single-season attendance totals in MLS history, culminating in an active sellout streak of 146 consecutive matches. Sounders FC's 2016 average attendance per-match was good for second in the Americas last season, with the club holding firm amongst the top 30 clubs in global football attendance for the past two seasons. Wiley previously spent four seasons as Director of Business Development for Sounders FC, receiving the MLS Operations Director of the



Year Award for his efforts during the club's inaugural MLS campaign in 2009. Wiley served six seasons as General Manager of the USL Sounders, where he was responsible for the day-to-day business operations of the club.

Previously, he worked as Director of Communications for 711, Net Inc., Director of Publicity for NASCAR Busch Grand National Division driver Bobby Hillin and as publicist for former Major League Baseball player Brett Butler. Wiley has spoken at conferences all over the world including the Sport is Fantastic conference in Australia, CRM and Fan

Engagement in England and Sports Marketing and Selling Tickets in Japan. Wiley has represented Sounders FC across the globe at numerous conferences and special events, including events in the United Kingdom, Japan and Australia.



TAYLOR GRAHAM**VICE PRESIDENT OF BUSINESS OPERATIONS**

Taylor Graham enters his sixth year with the organization following nine years of professional soccer, including the final three with Sounders FC. As Vice President of Business Operations, Graham oversees youth soccer programs, community outreach, game operations, as well as working closely

with supporter groups, Alliance Council and CenturyLink Field.

Graham was a seven-year MLS defender for Kansas City (2003-2004), New York (2006-2007) and Seattle (2009-2011). He was also a member of the 2005 and 2007 USL-1 Seattle Sounders championship teams and was named USL-1 Defender of the Year in 2005. A graduate of Stanford University, Graham was also named the club's Humanitarian of the Year in 2009 and is currently a board member on the Make-A-Wish Foundation of Alaska and Washington.

RYAN GUSTAFSON**VICE PRESIDENT OF BUSINESS STRATEGY & DEVELOPMENT**

Ryan Gustafson is the Vice President of Business Strategy & Development for Sounders FC. In his role, Gustafson is responsible for developing strategy for revenue growth, overseeing the Club's CRM and business analytics, and providing support to senior management on overall strategic and financial

planning. He also oversees the Club's suites and premium ticket sales department.

Prior to joining the club, Gustafson was the Vice President of Strategy and Innovation for the San Diego Padres from 2013-2016 where he oversaw the Club's CRM & business analytics, financial projections and special projects. Gustafson also spent time with Major League Baseball's Commissioner's Office, and worked in ticket sales and customer service for the Seahawks and Sounders FC from 2008-2010.

Gustafson graduated with an MBA from Harvard Business School in 2012, as well as Bachelor Degrees in Business and Economics from the University of Puget Sound in 2008 where he played baseball. He grew up in Bellevue, Wash., and currently resides in Seattle.

THEO HODGES**VICE PRESIDENT OF TICKET SALES & SERVICE**

Theo Hodges enters his second season with Sounders FC as Vice President of Ticket Sales and Service. He oversees all aspects of Sounders FC season membership sales, membership retention, group sales and single match ticket initiatives. Prior to joining Sounders FC, Theo spent two years

with the Atlanta Hawks as Sr. Director of Premium and New Membership Sales. During his tenure, he managed the sales process for all premium suite inventory for over 130 annual events at Philips Arena. The Hawks were also No. 1 among 30 NBA teams in new full season plans sold for the 2015-2016 season while he was with the team. He spent six seasons with the Kansas City Royals as Director of Sales, where he helped drive revenue in season, group, premium and single game ticket sales. She is also a long-tenured member of the Highline Schools Foundation Board of Trustees, and serves as a youth mentor and advocates for equity in education and access to sports and the arts. She is a former All-American soccer player at the University of Puget Sound and holds a USSF "B" Coaching License. She currently lives in Burien with her husband, Travis, and their daughter.

TOM RILEY

VICE PRESIDENT OF FINANCE



Tom Riley is the Vice President of Finance for Seattle Sounders FC. In this position, Riley spearheads the club's financial reporting, planning and oversight.

From 2006 to 2015, Riley ran his own management and financial consulting firm, which was focused on

early stage startups in Seattle. In the community, he currently serves as a board member of the Breakthrough Institute, a research institute changing how people think about energy and the environment. Wright helped lead Sounders FC to a fifth-straight league attendance record in 2013 with an average of 44,038, including a crowd of 67,385 for the Portland Timbers match on August 25 – the second-largest attendance for a standalone match in league history.

Prior to joining Sounders FC, Wright retired from the Seattle Seahawks after serving the franchise for 32 years, including the final 21 as a Vice President. Wright originally joined the Seahawks in 1976 as Director of Publicity. He was named Public

MARC NICHOLLS**ACADEMY DIRECTOR**



BRIAN SCHMETZER





Brian Schmetzer HEAD COACH

After leading Sounders FC to one of the most improbable comebacks in MLS history, Brian Schmetzer was named the club's second-ever Head Coach on November 2, 2016. Upon assuming the interim manager role on July 26, 2016 following the departure of Sigi Schmid, Seattle sat in ninth place in the Western Conference with a 6-12-2 record. Under Schmetzer, Sounders FC finished the season with an 8-2-4 record and a fourth-place finish, becoming the first team in MLS history to make the MLS Cup Playoffs after having 20 or fewer points through the first 20 matches of the season. Less than five months after taking over as Head Coach, the club won its first-ever MLS Cup.

A longtime Sounders FC assistant and former USL Sounders manager, Schmetzer entered his eighth season as Top Assistant Coach in 2016, a position he retained since December 22, 2008. He is one of the Puget Sound soccer community's most recognizable and respected figures after playing and

coaching for the region's top professional franchises since 1980.

Schmetzer served seven seasons as the Head Coach of the Sounders' United Soccer League's First Division club from 2002-2008 before making the jump to MLS. He guided Seattle to USL-1 championships in 2005 and 2007, and Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup semifinal advancements in 2007 and 2008.

Schmetzer has 14 years of coaching experience and a 15-year background playing at the professional level. He was a member of six championship teams during that span. In addition to the two USL championships, his teams also twice won the Commissioner's Cup for the league's best record (2002, 2007), while also qualifying for the playoffs six of seven years. He was chosen USL-1 Coach of the Year in 2002 after going 23-4-1. The Sounders were league runners-up in 2004. His overall regular season record in the USL era was 100-57-41.

Previously, he was assistant to former United States National Team defender Fernando Clavijo with the Seattle SeaDogs from 1996-1997. Seattle won the Continental Indoor Soccer League title in 1997.

A Seattle native, Schmetzer was coached by his father, Walt, as a youth. His team won seven out of 10 state youth championships. He signed with the Sounders' North American Soccer League franchise following his graduation from Seattle's Nathan Hale High School in 1980. He played three seasons as a midfielder for Seattle before going to Tulsa for the final NASL season in 1984.

Schmetzer signed with the San Diego Sockers in 1984 and played seven seasons in the Major Indoor Soccer League with San Diego (1984-1988), Tacoma (1988-1990) and St. Louis (1990-1991). He was a member of San Diego's MISL championship teams in 1985, 1986 and 1988. He returned to Seattle for the Sounders' inaugural A-League season in 1994 before completing his playing career with the SeaDogs from 1995-1996.

In 1985, Schmetzer played on loan to FC Seattle, scoring twice in a 2-1 friendly win over Brazil's Santos. While with Tacoma and FC Seattle, Schmetzer's teammates included younger brothers Andy and Walter.

Schmetzer and his wife Kristine have six children between them.

Tom Dutra CLUB DIRECTOR OF GOALKEEPING

Tom Dutra was named the Sounders FC Goalkeeper Coach on December 29, 2008, and is recognized locally for his work in developing young keepers as well as training established professionals.

Dutra previously served two seasons as Goalkeeper Coach under Brian Schmetzer for the USL Sounders.

In 2013, Dutra managed four goalkeepers, three of which started in the regular season. He helped Austrian keeper Michael Gspurning to another strong campaign, finishing second in club history with 10 shutouts (T-5th in MLS) while posting 12 wins. Dutra also trained Marcus Hahnemann in preparation for his return to MLS in 2012. In 2014, Hahnemann's set the record for the longest lapse between league appearances in MLS history (14 years and 39 days) and made eight total appearances across all competitions.

Dutra worked with retired Sounders FC keeper Kasey Keller for a decade, conducting one-on-one training sessions to prepare Keller for his return to Europe each summer. Under Dutra's guidance, Chris Eylander twice led USL-1 in saves and finished second in shutouts, and was also named the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup Player of the Tournament in 2008. Keller captured that same award in 2009.

At the amateur level, Dutra served two seasons (2007-08) as Assistant Coach for Saint Martin's University and was an assistant for five seasons (2002-06) at Pacific Lutheran. He was Director of Goalkeeping for Washington ODP in 2008 and served on the state ODP staff from 2002-04. Dutra was the Goalkeeping Director for Washington Premier FC from 2001-06 and also at Blackhills FC from 2001-08.


During his time with Washington Premier, Dutra worked with more than a dozen keepers who have

played at the Division I collegiate level. Among those was Tally Hall, the starting keeper for two-time MLS Cup runner-up Houston Dynamo.

Dutra played four seasons in the A-League on the Sounders' 1996 championship team.

Born and raised in Olympia, Dutra graduated from Timberline High School. He was a member of the U.S. Youth National Team program before sustaining a fractured leg. His career resumed in 1995 with the Oregon Surge of the USISL Pro Division.

Gonzalo Pineda ASSISTANT COACH

After a one-year hiatus following the retirement of his 13-year professional career, Gonzalo Pineda returned to Sounders FC as an Assistant Coach on January 19, 2017. The 34-year-old brings a wealth of experience to the coaching staff, with a playing career that included over 200 appearances in Mexico from 2002-2013 before two successful seasons in MLS. Pineda joined Sounders FC prior to the 2014 season, making 56 league appearances over two seasons and recording four goals and nine assists.

The central midfielder began his professional career with UNAM Pumas, where he spent three seasons and captured the 2004 Liga MX Clausura and Apertura titles. He joined Chivas Guadalajara in 2006, where he made over 100 appearances in three seasons before separate one-year loan stints with San Luis, Cruz Azul, Puebla and Queretaro. With Sounders FC, Pineda was an integral part of the 2014 squad that won the Supporters' Shield and Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup.

Born in Mexico City, Pineda earned 44 career caps for the Mexican National Team and participated in the 2006 FIFA World Cup in Germany, where he made four appearances as Mexico advanced to the Round of 16. His lone international goal came in 2-1 loss to Colombia during the 2005 CONCACAF Gold Cup.

Following his retirement on January 7, 2016, Pineda joined Univision, working as a soccer analyst for the American Spanish-language national broadcast network.

Pineda lives with his wife, Reyna, and their two children.



Djimi Traore
ASSISTANT COACH

Djimi Traore enters his second season as an Assistant Coach for Sounders FC, where he specializes with defenders.

Traore played professionally from 1996-2014, starting with French club Laval until 1999. The centerback then moved onto Liverpool, where he made 88 appearances over the next seven seasons. In 2005, Liverpool won the UEFA Champions League on penalty kicks against Milan. Traore started the match at left back and played all 120 minutes.

From 2006-2007, Traore made 11 appearances for English side Charlton Athletic FC, and then played in 13 matches for Portsmouth from 2007-2009. Traore went on loan to Rennes of France in 2008 and England's Birmingham City in 2009.

From 2009-2011, Traore played for AS Monaco FC of Ligue 1, where he made 36 appearances. Traore played with Marseille for 11 matches in 2011-2012 before joining the Rave Green.

With Seattle, Traore appeared in 42 league matches on the backline. He scored a notable goal on a 30-yard volley during a CONCACAF Champions League quarterfinal match against Tigres, in addition to a late game-winning volley against Sporting Kansas City on May 8, 2013.

Born in France, Traore made six appearances for the Mali National Team from 2004-2006.

David Tenney enters his third season as Director of Performance & Sports Science after spending the previous five seasons as fitness coach. He is one of Major League Soccer's most respected and progressive minds in sports science.

Tenney implemented the Catapult GPS program which measures player movement in games and practices, as well as the Omegawave technology that tests player's heart rate variability and state of readiness before and after participation.

Prior to joining Sounders FC, Tenney served as both Fitness and Goalkeeper Coach in Kansas City in 2007 and 2008, helping the Wizards reach the postseason both years. Kansas City reached the Conference Finals in 2007. He also holds an "A" license from the Czech Republic FA and NSCAA 'Premier' Diploma.

Prior to MLS, Tenney held the same dual role with the George Mason University men's and women's teams for two seasons. In 2006, Mason advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in 12 years.

While at George Mason, Tenney also served as Director of Coaching for the Washington Freedom youth teams from 2004-06 and as Maryland's girls Director of ODP, winning two ODP National Championships (2005 and 2006). Tenney's playing career features both collegiate and indoor professional honors. At Virginia Tech (1989-91), he served as team captain the final two seasons. As the Hokies' goalkeeper, he was voted Metro Conference Defensive MVP in 1989.

His professional career began overseas with Germany's SV Linx (1992-93) and FC Rastatt (1993-94). He returned home to play for the Washington Warthogs of the Continental Indoor Soccer League from 1994-97 and held franchise records for saves, wins and minutes played for







2016 (Seattle): Alfaro made six appearances and one start as a rookie in 2016 after being selected in the Second Round of the 2016 MLS SuperDraft. 

PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE

2016 (Seattle): In one of the most productive seasons of his career, Alonso matched a career high with three goals while setting a new personal best with four assists. He started each of his 32 matches, marking the fourth time in his eighth years with the Rave Green that he played in at least 30 league fixtures. His goals came against Real Salt Lake (March 12), LA Galaxy (September 25) and Vancouver Whitecaps FC (October 2). The Sounders FC original also recorded two assists in a 5-0 rout over FC Dallas (July 13). For his efforts, Alonso was voted Team MVP for the fifth time in nine seasons. The club's all-time leader in minutes in both the regular season and postseason, Alonso started all six of the club's matches in the MLS Cup Playoffs. The midfield terror led MLS with 85 tackles won and 272 duels won, while finishing first among field players with 275 recoveries. Arguably the most active player in the league, Alonso also led MLS with 2,795 touches (more than 400 ahead of second place), 2,214 passes (more than 250 ahead of second place), 2,012 passes completed (nearly 300 ahead of second place) and a 93.33% passing accuracy.

2015 (Seattle): Alonso made 21 starts in 22 league appearances in central midfield, becoming the first player in franchise history to accumulate 15,000 career minutes with the club. Maintaining his position as one of the most effective central midfielders in the league, Alonso led the MLS among qualifying players with a 92.32 percent passing accuracy. On May 24, Alonso combined for 232 passes with midfielder Gonzalo Pineda, which ranked first in MLS for passes among two teammates in a single match in 2015.

2014 (Seattle): Alonso started in 33 of 34 MLS regular season games, including a club-record 150th career appearance against New England (May 11). Across all competitions, Alonso appeared in

39 matches, netting two goals and adding two assists. Alonso was selected to the MLS All-Star team for the fourth consecutive season. In April, he recorded his first assist of the season in a 4-4 draw at Portland (April 5) and scored in a 3-1 win vs Portland in the quarterfinals of the U.S. Open Cup (July 9). He scored his third career playoff goal in a 1-1 draw against FC Dallas in the First Leg of the Western Conference Semifinals. Alonso was named to the MLS Team of the Week in Week 9.

2013 (Seattle): Alonso was voted team MVP by his teammates for the fourth straight season after starting all 26 appearances and logging 2,179 minutes. He scored his lone goal of season in 2-1 loss versus Portland (November 2) in the First Leg of the Western Conference Semifinals. Alonso recorded his only assist of season in 4-2 win versus FC Dallas (May 18). Alonso was named an inactive MLS All-Star, marking his third consecutive All-Star season. He became the first player in club history to start 110 matches (Portland on March 6) and play 10,000 minutes (New England on April 13). He set the club record with his 120th appearance in 4-0 win versus San Jose (May 11). He started all 33 appearances and finished fifth on the team with 2,803 minutes across all competitions. He missed four games from June 8 – July 6 with a quadriceps strain.

2012 (Seattle): Alonso was named to MLS Best XI for the first time in his four-year career after a stellar season in the midfield, leading the team with 30 starts. He compiled a team-high 2,688 minutes in regular season play, the second-highest total by a field player in franchise history behind his 2011 total. Alonso was named an MLS All-Star for the second straight season and voted team MVP for the third straight year. His lone goal of the season came on a 65th minute game-winner at Colorado (July 28) when he volleyed a 12-yard shot into the back of the net. In the 2012 U.S. Open Cup, he earned Player of the Tournament honors after scoring four goals and two assists in four games, including the winner versus Atlanta (May 30) and a 30-yard volley against California FC (June 5). He totaled five goals and five assists while leading the team with 42 starts and 3,749 minutes across all competitions.

2011 (Seattle): Alonso led Sounders FC field players with 33 appearances and 2,891 minutes (ranked 12th among field players in MLS). He played the full 90 minutes in each of his 32 MLS starts. Alonso scored a career-high three goals and matched his high with three assists. He scored the game-winner at Portland (July 10) by converting his first career penalty. He ranked second in the club with 54 shots. For his performance, he was selected as an MLS All-Star for the first time. He scored both goals in a 2-2 draw at Comunicaciones (September 27) in a CCL Group Stage match. He was named U.S. Open Cup Player of the Round for his performance in the final (added late goal in 2-0 win over Chicago). In all, he made 43 appearances and 40 starts across all competitions.

2010 (Seattle): Alonso returned from injury to help Seattle post the league's best record in the second half of the season. He started 23 of his 25 appearances in the regular season and playoffs, matching his 2009 totals with one goal and three assists. He scored the game-winner versus Chivas USA (October 15). He missed eight games due to a quadriceps strain (May 8) and returned versus FC Dallas (July 11). Seattle was 11-3-5 in regular season matches when he played at least 45 minutes. He also appeared in two U.S. Open Cup and five CONCACAF Champions League matches.

2009 (Seattle): A tenacious ballwinner, Alonso started 28 of his 29 appearances in the regular season and playoffs. He played the full 90 minutes in 26 games, and all 210 minutes in both playoff games against Houston (October 29, November 8). After missing three matches with a quadriceps strain, he returned to score on a long-range blast versus D.C. United (June 17). Alonso finished with

one goal and three assists. All three assists came during his first two matches. He appeared in two U.S. Open Cup games, including 90 minutes in the final.

2008 (Charleston): He earned 2008 first team All-USL First Division honors and was voted the league's Rookie of the Year. Alonso scored four goals and added two assists to lead Charleston to the first round of the USL-1 playoffs. He started 31 games in all competitions and scored one goal in the postseason. Alonso scored two goals in U.S. Open Cup play, helping the Battery reach the championship final, where it fell to D.C. United. Previously he played three seasons (2005-07) for FC Pinar del Rio, winning the Cuban championship in 2006.

INTERNATIONAL

Alonso represented Cuba 17 times at the senior level, scoring two goals. He made his debut for the senior Cuban National Team in a Caribbean Nations Cup match against the Turks & Caicos Islands in September 2006. Alonso served as captain of the U-23 National Team during qualification for the 2008 Olympics.

PERSONAL

Alonso is married to Liang Perez, and has three children. He is the son of Osvaldo Alonso and Maria de los Angeles. He left the Cuban National Team in June of 2006 during the CONCACAF Gold Cup in Houston prior to a match against Honduras. He gained full U.S citizenship on June 16, 2012. His favorite sport other than soccer is baseball.

PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE

2016 (Seattle): One of the most decorated players in American soccer history, Dempsey scored eight goals and added two assists in his 17 league matches in 2016. He also had a brace in the first leg of the Scotiabank CONCACAF Champions League Knockout Round against Club America (February 23). In addition to goals in home contests versus Montreal (April 2), San Jose (May 7) and FC Dallas (July 13), Dempsey had a pair of multi-goal games. At Orlando City, he became the first player in club history to record two hat tricks (August 7). In his final appearance, the forward bagged a brace against rival Portland (August 21). On August 26, Dempsey was diagnosed with an irregular heartbeat and sidelined from club and country competitions for the remainder of 2016. With the USMNT, Dempsey made 10 appearances and scored four goals in 2016. At the Copa America Centenario, Dempsey led the Stars and Stripes with three goals and three assists, as he led the host nation to a fourth-place finish. He has 52 career goals with the USMNT, which puts him just five goals behind Landon Donovan for first all-time for the U.S. National Team.

2015 (Seattle): Dempsey started each of his 23 regular season and postseason appearances. In league action, Dempsey ranked second on the club with 10 goals and paced the Rave Green with 10 assists. He was one of four players in MLS to record 10 goals and 10 assists in 2015 and the only one to accomplish this feat in each of the past two seasons. Dempsey's 61 shots ranked first on the club, while his 27 attempts on-target finished one behind team-leader Obafemi Martins. Of his 10 goals, four of them were game-winners – the highest mark on the club – while he also led the team with four match-winning assists. Dempsey netted a brace in the season-opener against the New England Revolution (March 8), including a converted penalty kick for his first tally of 2015. The following match, Dempsey scored the fastest goal in club history 23 seconds into a loss to the

San Jose Earthquakes (March 14). Dempsey led Sounders FC with two goals in the 2015 MLS Cup Playoffs. In the Western Conference Knockout Round against the LA Galaxy, Dempsey recorded the fastest postseason goal in club history with a scoring tally in the fifth minute (October 28). In the first leg of the Western Conference Semifinals, Dempsey scored the game-winning goal on a free kick in the 86th minute (November 1). It was the club's only free kick goal across all competitions in 2015. As a key contributor to the United States Men's National Team, Dempsey recorded seven goals in six matches during the 2015 CONCACAF Gold Cup, earning Golden Boot honors. Dempsey was named to the MLS All-Star Fan XI, MLSsoccer.com Team of the Week three times and earned one AT&T Goal of the Week honor.

2014 (Seattle): Dempsey played in 31 total matches in 2014 for the Rave Green, including 26 regular season matches on 23 starts. His career-high 15 goals ranked second on the team and tied-seventh in MLS. Of his 15 goals, five were game-winners, and two came on penalty kicks. He also tallied 10 assists, including five game-winners, which tied-second in MLS. Dempsey became the fifth player in club history to score a hat trick in a 4-4 draw at Portland (April 5). From March 8-April 26, Dempsey scored (8) or assisted (3) in a league-high six straight matches. He was voted to 2014 MLS All-Star Fan XI. In the U.S. Open Cup final against Philadelphia, Dempsey scored the game-winning goal in the 3-1 victory (September 16). During the MLS Cup Playoffs, Dempsey appeared in all four matches—he scored a half-volley in the Second Leg of the Western Conference Championship, which Seattle won, 2-1, but lost on aggregate. As the captain for the United States Men's National Team, Dempsey started all four 2014 World Cup games and scored two goals, including the fastest goal for USA in World Cup history, 29 seconds into a 2-1 victory against Ghana. He was named to the MLS Team of the Week three times: Week 5, Week 6, and Week 8. In Week 5 and Week 6, he was also named the MLS Player of the Week.

2013 (Seattle/Tottenham): Dempsey made nine appearances and six starts for Seattle after signing as a Designated Player on August 3. He scored his first Sounders FC goal in the regular season

finale, a 1-1 draw versus LA (October 27). Dempsey recorded his first club assist in 2-0 win versus Colorado (October 30) in the knockout round of the MLS Cup Playoffs. He finished sixth on the team with 32 shots, averaging 4.42 shots per 90 minutes (led team). Dempsey made his club debut in a 2-1 win at Toronto (August 10) when he came on in the 34th minute for an injured Obafemi Martins and finished with a team-high five shots. He made his first start for Seattle in a 3-1 loss at Houston (August 17). Dempsey was introduced to Sounders FC fans during pregame ceremony of match vs. FC Dallas (August 3).

2012-13 (Fulham/Tottenham): Dempsey was named the U.S. Soccer Male Athlete of the Year for the second consecutive time and third overall. He moved to Tottenham Hotspur on the final day of the summer transfer window, and scored seven goals with six assists in 29 league appearances. His first goal for the club was the game winner in a 3-2 win on September 29 against Manchester United at Old Trafford. He made 16 league appearances to start the season, starting 12 and scoring four goals.

2011-12 (Fulham): Dempsey was named U.S. Soccer Male Athlete of the Year for the second time of his career. He played every minute of every Premier League match with Fulham and started each game in the Europa League, in which he tallied 17 goals and six assists in all competitions. His goal in the 85th minute (December 5) against Liverpool gave Fulham a 1-0 win and set the record (37) for most goals by an American in the EPL, surpassing Brian McBride. He scored a goal and notched an assist in the 6-0 win against Queen's Park Rangers (October 2). Dempsey added two goals in the 3-0 victory against Dnipro Dnipropetrovsk in the Europa League.

2010-11 (Fulham): He finished the campaign as Fulham's leading goal scorer with 12 tallies and a career-high 37 appearances in the Premier League, including 42 appearances in total. As a result, he was voted the 2010-11 Player of the Year for Fulham by the fans. He played in every match to open the campaign, including 20 starts in 22 total appearances. In the first half of the season, he already had eight goals in league play and nine in all competitions. Every goal he scored came in either a victory or a draw for Fulham. He scored both goals in the 2-0 victory against Wigan (October 30).

2009-10 (Fulham): Dempsey finished the season with 43 appearances in all competitions, including 12 in the Europa League. He had nine goals in all competitions, and seven in the EPL. The wonder strike against Juventus on March 18 that put his team in the quarterfinals of the Europa League was voted the 2010 BBC London Sporting Moment of the Year. His appearance against Hamburg in the Europa League semifinal on April 22 made him the first American to play in that stage of a European competition since DaMarcus Beasley in the Champions League in 2005 for PSV. He logged 34 minutes in the return leg a week later. Dempsey scored in back-to-back games, netting the tying goal in the 2-2 draw at Manchester City on October

25 and the last goal in the 3-1 win against Liverpool six days later. He added a brace in the 3-0 win on November 25 against Blackburn.

2008-09 (Fulham): Dempsey started every match in all competitions for Fulham after the new year. He finished the season with seven goals, helping Fulham to a seventh place finish – their best ever in the EPL – and a spot in the Europa League. He registered two goals in the 3-1 win on April 12 at Manchester City. His first brace in English soccer came when he netted two goals against Chelsea during a 2-2 draw at Craven Cottage (December 28). He started eight games of Fulham's nine-game Premier League unbeaten run to close out 2008. Dempsey opened his goalscoring account on the season with a crucial equalizer against Portsmouth at Fratton Park. Originally, he began the season as a substitute for Fulham, but forced his way into the starting lineup after a series of good performances in the fall.

2007-08 (Fulham): In his first full season with Fulham, he was featured in 36 of the team's 38 games. Dempsey scored six goals on the season and added two assists to become the team's top scorer in the Premier League. After being thrust into a role as a striker after Brian McBride's injury, he responded admirably, netting goals in three consecutive Premier League games against Aston Villa, Tottenham and Wigan. He was also named as Player of the Month for August by Fulham's supporters group. Dempsey helped Fulham narrowly escape relegation on the final day of the season with a 1-0 win against Portsmouth.

2006-07 (Fulham): Dempsey made the jump across the Atlantic, joining Fulham, where he played with fellow Americans Carlos Bocanegra and Brian McBride. Though he struggled to break into the team at first, he came on strong in the final weeks of the season and scored the club's most vital goal of the season: His goal against Liverpool on May 5 effectively saved Fulham from relegation, as it gave them three points and took them away from the drop zone. In total, he made 10 appearances in midfield for the team, scoring one goal.

2006 (New England): Due to World Cup duty and injury, Dempsey was limited to only 21 appearances. However, he still tallied eight goals for the club, and added four assists. Dempsey was named to the MLS Best XI and was also a starter in the All-Star Game against Chelsea.

2005 (New England): Dempsey posted 10 goals and nine assists in 26 regular-season games, which was good for second on the team-scoring charts. His fourth-minute goal against Chicago in the Eastern Conference Championship sent the Revolution to their second MLS Cup final. He collected a host of honors from MLS, including being named to the MLS Best XI and started the All-Star game. Dempsey was chosen as the MLS Player of the Month for April after scoring four goals and adding three assists in five games.

2004 (New England): Dempsey won MLS Rookie of the Year after a remarkable first season with the New England Revolution. He played in 24 of

30 games, finishing tied for third on the team with seven goals scored and fifth in points with 15. He helped the Revolution advance to the Eastern Conference Championship before falling to D.C. United 4-3 on penalty kicks. He earned his first appearance as a substitute in the 83rd minute on April 3 against L.A., and started the first game of his MLS career, playing 90 minutes on April 17 vs. San Jose. Dempsey scored the first goal of his MLS career in the 12th minute against the MetroStars (April 25).

INTERNATIONAL EXPERIENCE

Dempsey made his first international appearance for the United States Men's National Team on November 17, 2004 versus Jamaica. He scored his first goal on May 28, 2005 against England. In 2005, Dempsey appeared in 13 games, including four CONCACAF Gold Cup matches to help the U.S. win its third title. Dempsey made his first World Cup appearance in 2006, scoring two goals. The following year, Dempsey was named U.S. Soccer's Male Athlete of the Year after scoring three goals and helping the team win another CONCACAF Gold Cup title. In 2009, Dempsey surpassed the 50-cap mark while posting a career-high 14 starts. At the 2010 World Cup, Dempsey scored the game-tying goal against England in the World Cup opener, and attempted the fourth most shots of any player in the group phase. Dempsey led the team with five goals in 2011. He secured Jurgen Klinsmann's first win with the match's lone goal on October 8. The following year, Dempsey posted a career-high six goals, including five in the semifinal round of World Cup qualifying, with three of them serving as game-winners. In 2013, Dempsey started all 10 appearances for USA

and matched his career-high with six goals. He is currently tied for the all-time U.S. lead with 13 goals in World Cup Qualifying. This past year, USA's captain scored the fastest goal in American World Cup history, and the fifth fastest in all-time World Cup history, with a goal 30 seconds into the match against Ghana on June 16, 2014. He scored another goal in group play to trail Landon Donovan by one goal for most in American World Cup history. In all, Dempsey has scored 52 international goals, which ranks second in U.S. history, on 130 appearances.

COLLEGE

As a three-year star at Furman and forward, he was in the top four on the team in scoring in each of his three years for the Paladins, finishing with 17 goals and 19 assists for 53 points in 62 games. During his time at Furman, he helped lead his team to a pair of Southern Conference titles and two NCAA Tournament appearances, including a berth in the third round in 2002 and a top 10 national ranking. He was selected to the NSCAA Second Team All-America squad in 2002 and was an All-Southern Conference selection all three years, along with being a two-time NSCAA All-South region choice.



PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE

2016 (Seattle): One of two players remaining from the original 2009 squad, Evans appeared in 23 league matches, making 21 starts. He began the season on the club's backline, slotting in at central defender alongside Chad Marshall. By season's end, Evans proved his versatility as a midfielder, as well. He scored the 24th goal of his MLS career in a 2-1 win at Vancouver Whitecaps FC with an 81st minute penalty-kick winner (October 2). One of the most efficient spot-takers in league history, Evans improved to 11/11 all-time in penalty-kick attempts across all competitions for Seattle. This reliability also came in clutch during the MLS Cup, when Evans led off for Seattle with a converted attempt from the spot.

2015 (Seattle): The Sounders FC captain appeared in 28 league matches (27 starts), in addition to 90 minutes of action in the Knockout Round of the MLS Cup Playoffs against the LA Galaxy (October 28). Known for his versatility and consistency, Evans moved from his previous position in the midfield to centerback prior to the 2015 season. Although Evans was shuffled back to the midfield for four matches at the end of the summer, he returned to the central defense role by season's end. In his seventh year with Sounders FC, Evans helped anchor a stout defensive unit that allowed just 36 goals during the regular season – tied for the best mark in MLS. Evans converted his lone penalty kick attempt of the regular season in a 2-1 win against the Portland Timbers (August 30). Evans recorded an assist on Chad Barrett's equalizer three minutes into second half stoppage-time against the LA Galaxy (October 4), as well as an additional assist in a 3-0 win against FC Dallas (June 13). During the Group Stage of the 2015-2016 Scotiabank CONCACAF Champions League, Evans scored the latest goal in club history (in regulation) with a converted penalty kick seven minutes into stoppage time in a 2-1 win against CD Olimpia (August 19). Across all competitions, Evans is now 10/10 in penalty kicks for Sounders FC. Evans was called into the United States Men's National Team on June 23 for the CONCACAF Gold Cup

and appeared in three matches for the Stars and Stripes in 2015. He recorded an assist on the game-winning goal in a friendly against top-ranked Germany on June 10. For his charitable efforts, Evans was named Sounders FC's Humanitarian of the Year and finished runner-up for the 2015 MLS WORKS Humanitarian of the Year.

2014 (Seattle): Evans appeared in 26 regular season matches, including 22 starts, plus all four MLS Cup Playoff matches and each of the five U.S. Open Cup matches. He made his 150th career MLS appearance at Vancouver (May 24). Against MLS competition, Evans tallied five assists, including three first-half assists against Chivas USA, which tied the MLS record (September 3). The midfielder made his first two career starts at left back versus FC Dallas (May 7) and New England (May 11). Evans scored the game-winning goal on a penalty kick in a 5-0 route over PSA Elite in the U.S. Open Cup (June 18). In the Second Leg of the Western Conference Championship, Evans scored a goal in the 25th minute. Prior to the World Cup, Evans was called into the United States Men's National Team 30-man camp. He was named to the MLS Team of the Week in Week 22.

2013 (Seattle): Evans made 24 appearances and 21 starts in his seventh MLS season while balancing consistent National Team duty. He tied his career-high with five assists (second on team) and finished tied-fourth on club with four goals. Evans matched his career-high with 37 shots, set previously in 2008. He scored the first-half winner in a 2-0 win versus Colorado (October 30) in Knockout Round of MLS Cup Playoffs. In addition, Evans recorded an assist in a 2-1 loss versus Portland (November 2) in the Western Conference Semifinals. He scored two goals and two assists in a three-game stretch versus Chivas USA (July 28), versus FC Dallas (August 3), and at Toronto (August 10). Evans became the third player in club history to appear in 100 regular season games at San Jose (July 13). Evans assisted on Obafemi Martins' game-winner in 2-0 win versus D.C. United (July 3). He recorded two assists in a 4-2 win versus FC Dallas (May 18), the first multi-assist game of his career. Evans scored his first goal of the season at Real Salt Lake (March 30). Evans converted both penalty kicks versus FC Dallas (August 3) and versus New York (September 29), making him a perfect seven-for-seven in his career.

His 94th minute PK versus FC Dallas (August 3) is tied for the latest goal in club history. He finished the season with five goals and six assists in 30 appearances across all competitions.

2012 (Seattle): Evans set career-highs in games played and starts (29) in 2012, scoring four goals and four assists. He was named MLS Player of the Week for Week 33 after scoring two goals versus FC Dallas (October 21) and playing multiple defensive positions versus Real Salt Lake (October 17). He converted a penalty kick in a 2-0 win versus Houston (March 23), improving to five-for-five in his career. Evans assisted on Fredy Montero's goal at New York (July 15) and Eddie Johnson's goal vs. Vancouver (August 18). He recorded a goal and an assist in a 6-2 win at Chivas USA (August 25). In addition, Evans scored twice in CCL play, including the game-winners vs. Santos Laguna (March 7) and at Marathon (September 19).

2011 (Seattle): Evans came back from a knee injury to play in 20 games, starting 17. He tied a career-high with five goals and set a career-high with five assists. Evans scored his first brace and added an assist in win over Toronto FC (August 30). For his effort, he was named to the MLSsoccer.com Team of the Week. Evans was a team-best three-for-three on penalties and ranked second on the team with four game-winning assists. He scored the equalizing goal with penalty versus Vancouver (September 24) in game that clinched Cascadia Cup.

2010 (Seattle): In 11 starts on 12 appearances, Evans scored one goal and recorded a career-high

three assists. He missed second half of season due to injury. His last match was versus D.C. United (June 10). Evans' only goal was the eventual game-winner in the 12th minute of 2010 MLS First Kick versus Philadelphia (March 25).

2009 (Seattle): Evans started 27 of his 29 appearances, including all 210 minutes in both playoff games against Houston (October 29, November 8). He played the full 90 minutes in 26 games. Evans saw most action in central midfield but was also used on the right. By season's end, he ranked fourth on the team in goals with three, including the game-winner in final home game vs. FC Dallas (10/24), and added two assists. All three goals came at home. He scored the second goal in franchise history against New York Red Bulls (March 19).

2008 (Columbus): Evans played in 26 games, starting 18, for the MLS Cup champion. He started and played the full 90 minutes in all four playoff games for Columbus. Evans scored the game-winning goal in the 2-0 semifinal second leg win over Kansas City (November 8). He scored five goals and added one assist during the regular season, finishing fourth on the team in scoring. The first goal of his MLS career was the game-winner at San Jose (May 10).

2007 (Columbus): Evans was selected in the second round of the SuperDraft (15th overall) by Columbus. He appeared in four games, starting one. He made his first career start at New York (May 19). Evans made his MLS and Crew debut versus New York (April 7). In addition, he started all four reserve division appearances.

During the 2016 league campaign, Frei recorded a 14-13-6 mark in 33 matches with eight shutouts. He displayed one of the most impressive goalkeeping streaks in league history during the playoffs, in which he led a stifling defense to four shutouts in six matches. In the 2016 MLS Cup Final, Frei recorded seven saves, including an outstretched, one-handed tip on Jozy Altidore's header in extra time. During the penalty-kick shootout, Frei made one save and another hit the crossbar en route to winning MLS Cup MVP honors.

2015 (Seattle): In his second year between the posts for Seattle, Stefan Frei earned Sounders FC

Frei recorded his career-high 10th win at Chicago Fire (June 7). He made a season-high five saves at Montreal (March 23). In the U.S. Open Cup, Frei went 3-0-0 with one shutout. During the MLS Cup Playoffs, Frei started all games, posting a 1-1-2 record with one shutout. Frei was a nominee for MLS Comeback Player of the Year.

2013 (Toronto FC): Frei appeared in one game for Toronto FC, a 1-0 loss at Chicago (October 19).





In the 2016 MLS Cup Playoffs, Lodeiro became the club's all-time leading postseason scorer after tallying four goals, all in a three-match span. He scored a brace in Seattle's decisive 3-0 win over Supporters' Shield champion FC Dallas in the first leg of the Western Conference Semifinals, then added a crucial away goal in the second leg to secure advancement. He also scored the game-winner in the first leg of the Western Conference Championship against Colorado, and converted his spot kick in the penalty-kick shootout against Toronto in the MLS Cup Final.

2016 (Boca Juniors): In his final season with the Argentine side, Lodeiro made six starts in nine appearances. He recorded three goals in the 2016 campaign for the Blue and Gold.

2015 (Boca Juniors): After wrapping-up his tenure with Corinthians, Lodeiro joined Boca Juniors, which is the most successful club in Argentine history with 65 titles. The midfielder made 21

appearances, including 17 starts, in which he scored three goals. Notably, Lodeiro netted a goal against River Plate in the Superclasico. The club secured a domestic double as Boca Juniors topped Rosario Central in the 2015 Copa Argentina Final, in addition to finishing first in the Primera Division.

2014 (Corinthians / Botafogo): Lodeiro started the campaign with Botafogo, where he appeared in five matches. After joining fellow Brazilian club Corinthians in May, Lodeiro made seven appearances, including three starts, for the Sao Paulo-based club.

2013 (Botafogo): In his only full season with Botafogo, Lodeiro scored six goals and added three assists in 27 total appearances. Notably, Lodeiro recorded a brace in a 2-1 home win versus Cruzeiro on June 1. The club won the Campeonato Carioca in 2013 and qualified for the 2014 Copa Libertadores for the first time in 18 years.

2012 (Botafogo / Ajax): Lodeiro began the season in the Eredivisie with Ajax, where he scored two goals and added six assists in 13 league matches, plus another goal against Dinamo Zagreb in the UEFA Champions League group stage. The midfielder signed with Brazil's Botafogo in July, where he scored two goals and recorded six assists in 19 matches.

2011 (Ajax): Due to an injury sustained in the 2010 FIFA World Cup, Lodeiro didn't play a club match in 2011.

2009-2010 (Nacional / Ajax): In his final season with his boyhood club, Lodeiro scored seven goals and added four assists. On December 13, Lodeiro played in his final game for Nacional, in which he recorded two goals and an assist in a 5-2 win over Cerrito. The club won all eight matches that he appeared in. Nacional also competed in the 2009 Copa Libertadores. After finishing first in its group, Nacional reached the semifinals before falling to eventual winner Estudiantes. Lodeiro had three goals in the tournament. Lodeiro signed with Ajax in January, before making his club debut in a reserve role against FC Twente on February 7. He went on to make eight substitute appearances, including an assist versus Venlo on April 11, as Ajax finished second in the Eredivise.

2008-2009 (Nacional): Lodeiro made two appearances as a substitute in the 2008 edition of the Copa Libertadores. The club was eliminated by Sao Paulo in the Round of 16. In league play, Lodeiro made 20 appearances, including two goals.

2007-2008 (Nacional): In his first professional season, Lodeiro made 15 appearances for Nacional. He made his debut against Fenix on August 19.

INTERNATIONAL EXPERIENCE

Since 2009, Lodeiro has been a part of the Uruguayan National Team, earning 48 caps and

scoring three goals. In 2010, he was part of the country's FIFA World Cup team that fell to the Netherlands in the tournament's Semifinal Round. The following year, Lodeiro and Uruguay claimed the Copa America trophy, South America's international football championship. Lodeiro represented his nation in the 2012 Olympic Games in London before making another FIFA World Cup run with Uruguay in Brazil in 2014. He most recently represented his nation at the 2016 Copa America Centenario in the United States.



PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE

2016 (Seattle): Sounders FC's 2016 Defender of the Year, Marshall had one of the most impressive campaigns of his established MLS career. With 30 league appearances, all of which were starts, Marshall reached the 30-match benchmark for the third time in the past four seasons, and matched his career best with four goals. He scored in consecutive matches against Houston and Philadelphia in April, and added another in a loss at Portland (July 17). On September 28, Marshall bagged the game-winner in a 1-0 win over Chicago. The only defender to win MLS Player of the Month in 2016, Marshall earned the honor in September, in addition to MLSsoccer.com Team of the Week recognition in Week 6, 23, 28 and 30. In the postseason, Marshall played each minute at center back for the Rave Green, as he won his second MLS Cup. In January, he was called to Bruce Arena's USMNT January Camp.

2015 (Seattle): In his second season with Sounders FC, Marshall started 28 of his 29 league appearances, in addition to the full 300 minutes of postseason action. He scored his third career postseason goal in the 90th minute of the Western Conference Semifinals' second leg against FC Dallas, which at the time put the Rave Green in position to advance to the Western Conference Championship. Marshall was named to the 2015 MLS All-Star Gameday Roster and played 45 minutes. He was named the MLSsoccer.com Team of the Week on three occasions: Week 5, Week 9 and Week 29.

2014 (Seattle): Marshall, who was named MLS Defender of the Year for the third time, started in all 31 MLS matches he appeared in. He made his club debut in the season opener versus Sporting Kansas City (March 8), and recorded his first club point with an assist at Chivas USA (April 19). Against Philadelphia, Marshall scored the game-winning goal. In addition, Marshall tied his career-high with three assists. Marshall played in all 360 minutes of the four postseason matches, plus three additional

U.S. Open Cup matches. He was named to the MLS All-Star roster for the third time in his career. He was named to the MLS Team of the Week three times: Week 3, Week 7, and Week 24.

2013 (Columbus): In his 10th season with Columbus, he made 30 starts at center back and scored one goal, while capturing the club's Defender of the Year honors. Marshall became the first Crew player in club history and the 46th field player in MLS history to record 20,000 minutes in regular-season action in the match against Philadelphia (April 6). He missed four matches with a right hamstring strain and later started in the international friendly against Wigan Athletic (July 13). He was issued a yellow card that led to a Dynamo penalty kick goal in the 10th minute at Houston (August 3), but suffered a foul that led to Federico Higuain's game-winning penalty kick in the 62nd minute against New York (August 10). He captained the club in the match against Houston (September 4). Marshall left the match in the 28th minute of the match at Sporting KC (September 7) with a left quad contusion, but returned for the next match at Montreal (September 14) and scored his first goal of the season on a header. He made his 250th career appearance in a start at FC Dallas (September 29), becoming the first Crew player to do so.

2012 (Columbus): Marshall's ninth professional season was a milestone year for the veteran as he played his 200th career match for the Crew in the season opener at Colorado on March 10. He surpassed Mike Clark for first place on the Crew's all-time minutes played list at Philadelphia (August 29). At Chicago on September 22, Marshall became the Black & Gold's all-time leader in starts with his 222 starts. The veteran finished the season with two goals in 24 appearances, all of which were starts.

2011 (Columbus): The veteran defender started in 32 matches in his first season as the Crew's captain, recording one assist. Marshall was named to MLSsoccer.com Team of the Week four times. He also started in the Crew's postseason match at Colorado.

2010 (Columbus): Marshall appeared and started in 24 matches to tally one goal and record two assists. He was named to the 2010 MLS All-Star First XI squad, the second-straight year Marshall earned the honor. He missed three matches due

to International duty, narrowly missing a spot on the United States 2010 FIFA World Cup roster. In addition, he started in both playoff matches against Colorado. Marshall started three matches in CONCACAF Champions League play. He started in three matches in the Crew's run to the 2010 U.S. Open Cup Final.

In the 2009-10 CONCACAF Champions League, Marshall started in two matches in which he recorded one assist, the game-winner, on August 26.

2008 (Columbus): Marshall started all 29 games in which he appeared to help the Crew to the 2008 MLS Supporters' Shield. In a return to form, Marshall was selected as the 2008 MLS Defender of the Year and named to the 2008 MLS Best XI squad, scoring four goals and registering two assists. Three of his goals were game-winners. The defender started all four matches in the Crew's run to the 2008 MLS Cup title. He scored twice in the playoffs, the tying goal in the Eastern Conference Championship against Chicago on November 13 and the game-winner in MLS Cup against New York on November 23. Marshall also started and went the full 90 minutes in the U.S. Open Cup Qualifier against Real Salt Lake on May 27.

2007 (Columbus): Marshall appeared in 12 games, 11 of them starting assignments, while missing 17 games due to concussions. He scored two goals, June 3 at Chicago and June 23 at LA. He started both games in which he appeared in Reserve action and scored one goal in a 1-1 tie vs. Chivas USA on May 13.

2006 (Columbus): Marshall appeared in 26 games, starting 25 in 2006. He scored one goal, on April 8 at Colorado, and one assist, May 6 at Real Salt Lake, which was on the game-winning goal. Marshall appeared in both of the Crew's matches in the 2006 U.S. Open Cup, starting one. He scored the lone Crew goal in 2-1 extra-time loss at D.C. on August 1 in Round of 16.

2005 (Columbus): In his second season, Marshall appeared in 30 games, all of them starts, and tallied one goal on July 9 against San Jose, and three assists on the season. Marshall started and played the entire 120 minutes in the Crew's 3-1 overtime loss to FC Dallas on August 3 in the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup.

2004 (Columbus): As a rookie, Marshall appeared in 28 matches, 27 of them starts, as one of the league's top newcomers to help the Crew to the 2004 MLS Supporters' Shield. He was a finalist for MLS Rookie of the Year honors. Marshall made his MLS debut on April 17 at Kansas City, when he became youngest Crew player ever to start a game (erased later in the season by Danny Szetela). Marshall later became the youngest Crew player ever to tally an assist (also later erased later in the season by Szetela) with his first career MLS point against New England on July 17. Marshall played all 180 minutes of the of the Eastern Conference Semifinal series vs. New England and started both games in the Crew's Open Cup campaign.



INTERNATIONAL

Marshall has represented the U.S. at the Men's National Team, U-23, U-20 and U-17 levels. Marshall has earned 11 caps to tally one goal for his country. He notched his first goal in his first career cap on March 9, 2005 in a friendly against Columbia. He started all six matches of the 2009 CONCACAF Gold Cup, helping the U.S. to a second place finish. On January 29, 2016, Marshall earned his first cap in over seven years in a 0-0 draw with Serbia in an international friendly.

COLLEGE

A standout for two seasons at Stanford, Marshall appeared in 40 games, 39 of them starts, including the 2002 NCAA Men's College Cup final. He collected eight points, on three goals and two assists. In 2003, Marshall was a First Team All-Pac 10 selection as a sophomore, when he started all 19 games in which he appeared to score one goal and an assist for three points. He was selected to the 2003 NSCAA All-Far West Region second team. Marshall had a strong freshman campaign in 2002, earning Soccer America Freshman of the Year and second-team All-Pac 10 honors. Soccer America named Marshall the top college recruit in the country. Marshall made 12 appearances at the U-17 level. He started two games at the 2001 FIFA World Youth Championship in Trinidad & Tobago and started all three matches at the 2001 CONCACAF Under-17 World Championship qualifying tournament. His first international goal was the game winner in a 2-1 win against Jamaica in the tournament opener on April 18, 2001. 2009 LAMAR HUNT U.S. OPEN CUP

Seattle became the third first-year franchise in the modern era to win the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup. Seattle's achievement of claiming the Open Cup in its first season equaled that of D.C. United in 1996 and Chicago, an expansion MLS team in 1998. The Sounders FC cup run contributors featured a distinctive USL-1 flavor. All six former members of Seattle's forerunner pro-franchise saw action in games in the play-in phase or tournament proper. In fact, they figured in nine of the 12 goals scored. Sebastian Le Toux scored two goals and two assists in the play-in rounds, scored the game-winner in a quarterfinal win over Colorado, and had the game-winning assist to Roger Levesque in the Cup Final.

In addition to his game-winner in the Cup Final, Levesque also scored the opening goal at Portland in the third round and assisted on Nate Jaqua's equalizer versus Houston. Stephen King scored three goals in cup play, including the overtime winner against the Dynamo.

2010 LAMAR HUNT U.S. OPEN CUP

Playing before a record crowd in the tournament's 97-year history, Sounders FC repeated as Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup champions in 2010.

Sanna Nyassi scored twice as Seattle came from behind at home to defeat the Columbus Crew, 2-1, and became the first team in 27 years to successfully retain the Cup. Sounders FC had defeated D.C. United in the 2009 final. The New York Pancyprian Freedoms won back-to-back titles in 1982-83.

The crowd of 31,311 shattered the attendance record for the Cup Final. The largest previous attendance in the 97 years of the tournament was 21,583 for the 1929 game in Brooklyn.

After tying the game in the 38th minute, Nyassi scored the game-winner in the 66th minute. Steve Zakuani's header from a Fredy Montero cross caromed off the crossbar and Nyassi crashed home the rebound from eight yards.

Sounders FC used a total of 22 players during its Cup run, with striker Nate Jaqua leading the Rave Green into the Final. Jaqua scored in each of the first three matches, including a brace against both the L.A. Galaxy in the quarterfinal round and Chivas USA in the semifinal. He finished as the tournament's co-leader with five goals and was named the competition's outstanding player.

2011 LAMAR HUNT U.S. OPEN CUP

In 2011, Sounders FC became the first team in 42 years and fourth altogether to win the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup three consecutive years.

A crowd of 35,615 fans packed CenturyLink Field—breaking the 98-year-old tournament's attendance record for the second straight year—and watched Seattle defeat the Chicago Fire 2-0 in the final. Fredy Montero broke a scoreless tie in the 78th minute when he rebounded a Jeff Parke header after it was saved by Chicago keeper Sean Johnson, then hammered it into the back of the net. Osvaldo Alonso sent the Sounders faithful into a frenzy when he added the finishing touch—a goal in the 96th minute after weaving his way through multiple defenders. Kasey Keller's shutout was highlighted by four saves.

Montero was named Player of the Tournament after scoring three goals, including the game-winning scores in the semifinal and final. Mike Fucito added two goals and Nate Jaqua recorded a goal and two assists. In addition to his performance in the final, Keller also shut out FC Dallas in the semifinal game.

The last team to win three consecutive US Open Cup championships was Greek American out of New York from 1967-1969. Before that, only Stix, Baer and Fuller from St. Louis had won three straight from 1933-1935 and the Fall River Marksmen from 1930-1932.

2012 U.S. OPEN CUP

Three-time defending U.S. Open Cup champions Sounders FC looked to make a historic run at a fourth straight Open Cup championship, a feat never accomplished in the tournament's 99-year history. Seattle got off to a fast start, defeating NASL side Atlanta Silverbacks, 5-1, and amateur side Cal FC, 5-0, in the tournament's opening two rounds at Starfire Sports Complex. The team then traveled to San Francisco and knocked off the league-leading San Jose Earthquakes at Kezar Stadium, then downed Chivas USA, 4-1, to advance to the finals against Sporting Kansas City.

Zach Scott's header tied the final at 1-1 in the 86th minute, but the Rave Green ultimately fell in penalty kicks, 3-2, ending its historic run at a fourth straight Open Cup Championship.

Sounders FC outscored their opponents 16-3 over the five games and improved its record to 17-0-2 all-time in Open Cup play. Osvaldo Alonso's four goals and two assists earned him Player of the Tournament.

2013 LAMAR HUNT U.S. OPEN CUP

After four-straight appearances in the U.S. Open Cup Final, Seattle saw its 19-game (17-0-2) unbeaten streak in Cup play snapped in a third round loss to the Tampa Bay Rowdies.

Georgi Hristov scored the lone goal as Seattle Sounders FC fell to the Tampa Bay Rowdies, 1-0, in the third round of the 2013 Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup. It marks the first Open Cup loss in club history for Seattle (17-1-2) after advancing to the final the previous four years, winning three straight titles from 2009-11. In the 75th minute, Hristov tapped in a rebound after Marcus Hahnemann made a diving save on a Luke Mulholland shot deep inside the box. It was just the third time Sounders FC has allowed the first goal in an Open Cup match, and in both games the Rave Green came back to win 2-1 (7/21/09 vs. HOU and 10/5/10 vs. CLB).

2014 LAMAR HUNT U.S. OPEN CUP

Seattle avenged its first-ever loss in Cup play last season by claiming its fourth Open Cup in six seasons. Behind the captivating performance by Kenny Cooper, who was named Player of the Tournament, Sounders FC advanced on four matches at Starfire Sports before defeating Philadelphia Union, 3-1, in overtime, to hoist the trophy at PPL Park. Seattle began the tournament with a 5-0 victory over amateur side PSA Elite, then advanced on penalty kicks against the San Jose Earthquakes. In the quarterfinal, Seattle topped rival Portland Timbers, 3-1, then downed Chicago Fire, 6-0. 2015 LAMAR HUNT U.S. OPEN CUP

However, a week later, Seattle saw its Champions League run end in the second leg after Santos exploded for six goals in a convincing 6-1 win in Torreón, Mexico.

The Rave Green built off its success in the 2011-12 CONCACAF Champions League by once again advancing to the knockout round of the 2012-13 tournament. In the tournament's new eight-group format, Seattle needed to win its group to advance to the knockout round. Matched up with Caledonia of Trinidad and Marathon of Honduras, Sounders FC cruised to the group win, going 4-0-0 and outscoring opponents 12-5. The Rave Green scored three goals in each game and allowed just one goal from the run of play. Sammy Ochoa led the way with four goals and Andy Rose added one goal and three assists.

Seattle was one of only three clubs to go undefeated in the group stage and entered the knockout round as the No. 3 seed. Sounders FC took on Tigres of the Mexican Primera Division in the tournament's quarterfinals, falling 1-nil in the first leg before mounting an impressive 3-1 home win in the second leg to advance to the semifinals. With the series win, Sounders FC became the first MLS team to oust a Mexican team from the tournament.

In its first-ever semifinals, Seattle faced Santos Laguna in a rematch of the 2011-12 quarterfinals. After falling behind 1-0 in the home leg, Sounders FC earned a 1-1 draw on the road, ultimately losing the series, 2-1.



SEATTLE SOUNDERS (1974-1983)

The tradition of professional soccer and the Sounders brand began with the arrival of the North American Soccer League expansion franchise in 1974. For 10 seasons they were successful and entertaining on the field, attracting some of the league's largest crowds. Just as important, the original Sounders created a legacy of developing local players capable of reaching the highest levels of the game.

In some respects, the Sounders paved the way for Seattle securing an NFL expansion franchise a year later. The founding ownership group featured six of the same partners, including Lamont Bean, Howard S. Wright, Lynn Himmelman, David Skinner, Lloyd Nordstrom and Herman Sarkowsky.

The Sounders played their first two seasons outdoors and under the Space Needle. Located on the Seattle Center campus, Memorial Stadium provided a central location and an intimate setting, although the crowds soon outgrew the initial 13,000-seat capacity. In fact, Seattle was the first NASL team to draw a sellout and did so for nine of the final 16 games at Memorial.

With the completion of the Kingdome, the Sounders moved south in 1976, and a sold-out preseason game against Pele and the New York Cosmos set a North American attendance record of 58,128.

From the outset, the Sounders played an energetic, entertaining style while utilizing British veterans and young, mostly local, North American players. Although it won only two division titles, Seattle finished with winning records in seven of 10 seasons, twice reached the championship game, Soccer Bowl, and in 1980 the Sounders won 25 matches – the most in NASL history.

In each Soccer Bowl, Seattle met the star-studded Cosmos. The 1977 final marked the final competitive game for Pele. The Sounders only major trophy was the 1981 Trans-Atlantic Challenge Cup, a midseason tournament involving the Cosmos, England's Southampton and Scotland's Celtic.

The NASL and Sounders peaked in popularity by 1980, and over the following two seasons attendance declined while the number of teams dropped from 24 to 13. Seattle bowed out after the 1983 season, and a year later the league halted operations.

FC SEATTLE STORM (1984-90)

It can be argued that the rebirth of professional soccer in North America began with FC Seattle. In 1984, a year after the original Sounders folded, a new team surfaced with a new objective: to cultivate the best local talent and test it against the best in the business.

Funded by Eastside businessman Bud Greer and with former Sounders player and coach Jimmy Gabriel serving as coaching director, FC Seattle's approach was to create a pyramid system of youth teams feeding a senior men's program. That philosophy ran counter to the NASL era, when foreigners comprised the bulk of the roster and domestic players were in the minority.

Beginning with a summer series of friendlies against NASL teams and the U.S. National Team at Memorial Stadium, FC Seattle held its own and attracted an average of 6,669 fans. The first win came in Vancouver against the Whitecaps, 2-1.

In 1985, the stakes were raised and a league took root. With the NASL now disbanded, clubs from Europe, Mexico and South America were brought to Seattle. However, when British teams faced a worldwide travel ban, FC Seattle was forced to band together with other fledgling clubs to form the Western Soccer Alliance. That became the forerunner of the American Professional Soccer League or, as it was more widely known, the A-League.


Drawing on a mixture of former Sounders and stars from both Seattle Pacific University and University of Washington collegiate programs, Seattle played a mixture of league and foreign exhibitions through 1988. That campaign culminated with Seattle winning the Western Soccer League championship and, later, making a five-match postseason tour of England. The Storm nickname was adopted prior to the 1989 season.

In 1990, the WSL merged with the East Coast's American Soccer League to form the APSL. In all there were 22 teams, but in 1991, with costs rising due to nationwide travel, membership fell to only nine clubs, and Seattle was not among them. After going dormant, it ceased operations altogether in 1992, although the brand was resurrected and used by an entry in the regional Pacific Coast League through 1995.

SEATTLE SOUNDERS (1994-2008)

In 1994, the World Cup was coming to America and, riding the resulting new wave of enthusiasm, professional soccer returned to Seattle after a three-year absence. The Sounders name was revived and the club, owned by Scott Oki and coached by Alan Hinton, joined the American Professional Soccer League.

From the outset, the Sounders nucleus was largely formed by homegrown talent. Hinton tapped into the college players being produced at both Seattle Pacific and Washington, and added experience in the form of past pros with local connections.

When Seattle won the 1995 A-League championship in its second season, eight of the 13 players who saw action originally came from the surrounding area's youth leagues. In 1996, when the Sounders repeated, nine starters were local products. Player/coach Neil Megson had been with both the original Sounders and Tacoma Stars for a total of nine seasons.

MLS opened play in 1996, and the A-League was thereafter classified as second division. Consequently, many of the top players were lured elsewhere. The Sounders remained competitive, qualifying for the playoffs in all but two of their 15 seasons and winning five divisional crowns.

In 2002 under the management of new majority investor Adrian Hanauer and the coaching of Brian Schmetzer, the club reached for new goals. Hanauer led the local effort to land a new MLS team and also moved the team from Memorial Stadium to the newly-completed CenturyLink Field. In fact, in the stadium's first event, the Sounders played to a USL record crowd of 25,515.

On the field, Seattle won a club-record 23 games in Schmetzer's first season. From 2004-07, it advanced to the USL championship game three times, winning twice. In U.S. Open Cup play, the Sounders eliminated four MLS teams in reaching back-to-back semifinals in 2007 and '08.

SEATTLE SOUNDERS FC 2



Announced on October 14, 2014, Sounders FC 2 is the Sounders FC USL side. Known as S2, the team represents a link between the Sounders FC Academy and Sounders FC First Team. Playing its home matches at Starfire Stadium, S2 emphasizes development and community involvement, and provides a consistent and competitive professional environment for promising Academy players and certain First Team players to progress. The team operates under the management of Sounders FC and the Sounders Community Trust.

The club performs under the direction of legendary MLS defender Ezra Hendrickson. Hendrickson's staff includes Assistant Coach John Hutchinson, who enters his first season in USL after a robust professional career in Australia.

The 2017 campaign sees the schedule jump to 32 matches, after 30 contests were held in 2016 and 28 in 2015. For the third consecutive season, S2 opens the campaign with a home match against Sacramento Republic FC. The following week, S2 hosts rival Portland Timbers 2 at Starfire Stadium. The regular season concludes with three road contests, including the finale on October 15 at OKC Energy FC.

UNITED SOCCER LEAGUE



The USL is the strongest U.S. men's professional soccer league on the field and the most sophisticated one off the field and in support of Major League Soccer (MLS). Through aggressive and deliberate growth in adding teams fully capable of meeting USL and U.S. Soccer standards, the USL is building a robust, national professional soccer league in a

format that promotes the benefits of regional league play. In 2013, the USL began a groundbreaking partnership with MLS to grow the professional game at all levels in the U.S. and Canada. In addition to league play, USL teams compete in the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup as well as various domestic and international exhibitions. The USL is the longest-standing pro league affiliate member of U.S. Soccer.

SOUNDERS COMMUNITY TRUST



The first organization of its kind in USL, the Sounders Community Trust is a charitable, fan and supporter-managed, non-profit organization that is being formed to assume a 20-percent interest of Sounders FC 2. The Trust will elect one representative to sit on the Second Team Executive Board with the purpose of both influencing and supporting the direction of Sounders FC through S2, as well as helping support access to soccer in the community.



THREE S2 PLAYERS ADDED TO FIRST TEAM



In January 2017, Sounders FC announced the signing of Cameroonian defender **Nouhou Tolo**. The 19-year-old joins the First Team following a 2016 campaign in which he appeared in 24 games for Sounders FC 2, the club's USL side.

"Nouhou performed admirably for S2 last season and we're excited to add him to the First Team roster in 2017," said Sounders FC General Manager & President of Soccer Garth Lagerwey. "It's important that we continue to build players up through our developmental pipeline, and here is another good example of a young player who earned his opportunity to represent the First Team."

Tolo, 19, started all 24 of his appearances for S2 last season, leading the team with 2,061 minutes and helping the USL side to a 9-13-8 record in its second campaign. The Douala, Cameroon native joined S2 in April of 2016 from Cameroonian side Rainbow FC. In February 2017, he was called-in to Cameroon's U-20 side ahead of the U-20 Africa Cup of Nations in Zambia.

On March 2, 2017, Sounders FC signed midfielders **Zach Mathers** and **Jordy Delem**.

The pair of young central midfielders join the Seattle First Team after playing for S2 throughout the 2016 season.

Mathers, 22, recorded three goals and four assists in 19 appearances for S2 last season. The midfielder played in three matches for Sounders FC in the 2016 Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup after earning short-term agreements to join the senior squad. A three-time All-ACC selection at Duke, Seattle selected Mathers in the Second Round (35th overall) in the 2016 MLS SuperDraft.

Delem, 23, made 19 appearances for S2 in 2016 and recorded an assist in a 1-1 draw against Whitecaps FC 2 on August 6. The Martinique international joined S2 after playing for Club Franciscain of Martinique's Championnat National League and France's AC Arles-Avignon B squad. The versatile defensive midfielder has 32 caps and five goals for the Martinique National Team.

SEATTLE SOUNDERS FC ACADEMY

ACADEMY OVERVIEW

The Seattle Sounders FC Academy's aim is to play an integral role in promoting the long-term vision of the club by producing Homegrown Players comparable with the world's elite. The Sounders FC Academy's U-16 and U-18 teams play in the U.S. Soccer Development Association (USSDA), a national league for the top youth club programs in the United States, providing an environment to produce the next generation of national team players. The Sounders FC Academy teams joined USSDA in February 2010 and played their first matches in October 2010 at Starfire Sports.

The Sounders FC Academy program has already started to translate to the first team, as the club has inked nine Homegrown Players since 2012: DeAndre Yedlin (2012), Aaron Kovar (2014), Sean Okoli (2014), Victor Mansaray (2015), Darwin Jones (2015), Jordan Schweitzer (2016), Jordan Morris (2016), Seyi Adegoya (2017) and Henry Wingo (2017).

ESTABLISHING EARLY ROOTS

Sounders FC has expanded its Academy in recent years, with teams at the U-14 and U-15 levels as well as additional programming with the Sounders Discovery Program for those at the U-12 and U-13 age groups. By training and competing at an earlier age the club is able to accelerate developmental growth in order to reach the ultimate goal of developing first team players.

OFF TO COLLEGE

As a byproduct of this development the Sounders FC Academy provides each player with a great deal of exposure to top colleges. Approximately 90% of Academy graduates have signed with Division I college programs. The Sounders FC Academy program has sent players to perennial powers such as UCLA, Stanford, Wake Forest and Duke as well as local stalwarts UW and Seattle University.

INDIVIDUAL SUCCESS

Beyond getting attention at the college level, the Sounders FC Academy players are also getting tabbed by the U.S. National Team for matches at the youth and senior levels. DeAndre Yedlin earned his first senior team call-up in January 2014 and was the first Homegrown Player to represent the U.S. in the 2014 FIFA World Cup. After two stellar years in MLS, Yedlin was transferred to Tottenham Hotspur of the Barclays Premier League following the 2014 season. Jordan Morris made his full international debut in the fall of 2014 for the USMNT and became the first college player to score for the United States in 24 years when he recorded a goal in the 49th minute against Mexico on April 15, 2015. In all, Morris has 14 appearances with two goals and one assist for the USMNT. Several other players have been also courted by the National Team, including Paul Christensen, Jamael Cox, Ryan Herman, Aaron Kovar, Jalen Markey, Victor Mansaray, Sean Okoli and Oscar Zepeda.

The Sounders FC Academy program also boasts three previous Gatorade Washington State Players of the Year in Nick Palodichuck (2010), Aaron Kovar (2011) and Jordan Morris (2012).

OFFICIAL YOUTH PARTNERS



Seattle United became the first Official Youth Club Partner in Western Washington for Seattle Sounders FC on November 17, 2015. The partnership provides new programming, coaching education and unique interactions through Sounders FC events. The partnership will also see Sounders FC and Seattle United partner in a new jointly operated program to provide boys and girls under the age of 13 the chance to train and be developed under the Sounders FC technical staff and scouts, as well as participating in Sounders FC Academy trainings. The partnership also allows Seattle United players an opportunity to be placed in Sounders FC Academy teams.



Twin City Youth Soccer Association became Sounders FC's first out-of-state youth partner on December 1, 2015. The partnership with Twin City includes North Carolina-based Sounders FC events, summer camps and Sounders FC ID Camps – where young players can be recognized and brought into the club at an early age – as well as coaching education and club business support, among other unique programming. Additionally, the collaboration also allows Twin City players an opportunity to be placed on Sounders FC Academy teams.



Spokane Soccer Club Shadow, the largest youth soccer organization in Eastern Washington, joins Seattle United and North Carolina's Twin City Youth Soccer Association as youth partners of the Sounders FC Academy in an organizational effort to expand and improve its youth development infrastructure through strategic partnerships with youth soccer organizations. Sounders FC and SSC Shadow agreed to an initial partnership in May 2016, which enabled the club to extend its youth developmental infrastructure into a strategic pipeline. Now as an official youth partner, the ties are being strengthened between the greater Spokane area and the state's lone MLS club.



Eastside FC, the premier soccer club of the Eastside Youth Soccer Association (EYSA) - the first association organized within the Washington State Youth Soccer Association (WSYSA) – became an official youth partner with Sounders FC on March 11, 2016. Eastside FC comprises of more than 70 teams competing at the highest level locally, regionally and nationally. The club has a history of players, coaches and directors connected to Sounders FC, including Homegrown Player Jordan Morris, who played with the '94 squad from U-11 to U-17 and won six Washington State titles. The

partnership provides a clear pathway for players to compete at the next level, exclusive access with Sounders FC coaching education and curriculum and the addition of rave green into the new Eastside FC kit. Eastside FC looks to incorporate the ideas and practices of the Sounders FC Academy into its developmental model. The club attributes its long-running success to dedicated and professional coaches, a highly structured curriculum for player development and best-in-class facilities.



PAC NW the premier soccer club of the Greater Renton Youth Soccer Association and Kent Youth Soccer Association, became an official youth partner with Sounders FC on March 1, 2016. PAC NW FC comprises of more than 60 teams competing at the highest level locally, regionally and nationally. The partnership provides a clear pathway for players to compete at the next level, and exclusive access to Sounders FC coaching education and curriculum.



ACADEMY

The Central Washington Sounders (CWS), formerly known as Central Washington Soccer Academy, is the premier club of Central Washington. The club joins out-of-market affiliates Spokane Soccer Club Shadow and North Carolina's Twin City, in addition to local agreements with Seattle United, Eastside

FC and Pacific Northwest Soccer Club, as Sounders FC continues to grow its developmental reach. With CWS as an official youth partner, Sounders FC will provide coaching education opportunities, a unique, integrated curriculum and a direct pipeline for players into Sounders Academy. Currently, CWS has 464 participants, ranging from the U-6 Junior Developmental Academy through the U-19 premier club. The club recently announced an expansion into North Central Washington as it looks to identify and develop talent outside of its current reach under the guidance of Sounders FC.



Central California Aztecs (CCA) serves a sprawling area in Central California as a premier youth development destination, and joins North Carolina's Twin City Youth Soccer Association as Sounders FC's two out-of-state agreements. With CCA as a youth affiliate, Sounders FC will provide coaching education opportunities, a unique, integrated curriculum and a direct pipeline for players into Sounders Academy.

Currently, CCA features 45 teams, including a competitive academy program from the U-12 level through U-18. The Aztecs covers a region stretching from Lancaster to Bakersfield to Fresno – a driving distance radius of two hours.

SOUNDERS FC ACADEMY HOMESTAY

The Seattle Sounders FC Homestay Program allows talented future stars from outside the Seattle-metro area to join the Sounders FC Academy in residency by spending the school/academy year in a homestay with a family close to the Academy's training ground at Starfire Sports in Tukwila, Washington.

Hosted Academy players are provided with warm and welcoming environments, their own furnished room and board and involvement in day-to-day family activities.



XBOX PITCH AT CENTURYLINK FIELD



In 1996, Paul G. Allen obtained an option to purchase the Seattle Seahawks and launched a campaign to win public support for a new world-class football/ soccer stadium and exhibition center. Six years later, the dream became reality as the Seahawks opened the 2002 preseason against the Indianapolis Colts in Seahawks Stadium, renamed Qwest Field on June 2, 2004. After seven seasons, the stadium was renamed CenturyLink Field on June 23, 2011.

The CenturyLink Field stadium complex includes CenturyLink Field and the 200,000 sq. ft. CenturyLink Field Event Center. The versatile Event Center is often converted into an intimate music theater to host a wide array of musical acts from Paul Simon to Snoop Dogg. CenturyLink Field and CenturyLink Field Event Center host approximately 185 events that attract more than two million attendees annually. In 2011, the stadium served as host to U2 with more than 70,000 fans in attendance, the largest attended event since the stadium opened in 2002.

RECENT UPGRADES

*In 2012, two Mitsubishi Electric Diamond Vision video displays were installed. The new video displays introduced fans to a new and enhanced viewing experience.

*In 2013, capital improvements to the stadium included an expanded and re-designed retail store with an increased footprint from 3,000 to 7,400 square feet and 30 new mobile points-of-sale in addition to a new Beer Hall featuring 14 different selections. FGI installed 47 new digital menu boards and HD TVs to provide flexibility in pricing and menu and 40 additional fixed and portable points of sale.

* In 2014, the Seahawks and Verizon made significant enhancements to the wireless network at CenturyLink Field to provide fans with free open access to Wi-Fi. Super Bowl XLVIII Roman Numerals were installed in the Northwest Plaza.

*Named after the concept of completeness, Revolution 360, the FieldTurf installed prior to the 2016 season, is an improved version of the market-leading Revolution fiber. Revolution 360 maintains the high-performing UV and softness properties of its predecessor, while significantly improving its durability and resilience.

CENTURYLINK FIELD FACTS & FIGURES

- CenturyLink Field, CenturyLink Field Event Center and WaMu Theater host more than 165 events per year that attract more than two million attendees
- FGI employs over 800 staff for the 10 Seahawks game days and over 400 staff for the 18 Sounders FC matches each season
- 68,000 fixed seats
- 1,400 seats for people with disabilities and their companions – compared to 70 at the Kingdome
- 63 restrooms (799 toilets/364 urinals) – twice as many as the Kingdome
- 100% of urinals are retrofitted with low-flow fixtures, saving more 1.3 million gallons of water every year.
- 12 elevators — compared to three at the Kingdome
- 50 concession stands and 47 beer concessions – twice as many per person as the Kingdome
- 97% of the concrete from the Kingdome was processed and recycled (35% built into CenturyLink Field)
- 2,000 car garage
- Six electric vehicle chargers - four in north lot and two in the garage
- Events hosted in the CenturyLink Field Event Center have generated more than \$2.1M for Common School Fund

CENTURYLINK FIELD FUNDING

The \$430 million facility is owned by the public and was funded by a private-public partnership. Private contributions totaled at least \$130 million, while the public contributed up to \$300 million through a lottery and a variety of taxes generated by events in the stadium/exhibition center.

A breakdown of the funding package:

- \$130 million private investment led by Paul G. Allen
- \$127 million from new, sports related lottery games, similar to the Mariners' base-ball-themed scratch games
- \$101 million in sales taxes collected in King County attributable to events in the stadium/event center
- \$56 million from facility admission and parking taxes
- \$15 million from extending King County's share of the existing hotel-motel tax
- \$1 million per year of in-kind advertising for the new lottery games will be provided by Paul G. Allen
- All excess stadium revenues will fund youth athletic facilities throughout Washington State in addition to a \$10 million contribution from Paul G. Allen
- \$14 million of the public contribution will come from interest earned on the \$50 million private contribution from Paul Allen
- Paul G. Allen agreed to pay for any construction cost overruns
- As an added measure, the debt on the Kingdome was retired, freeing property taxes for other purposes

FIRST & GOAL INC.

In June of 1997, Washington State voters approved a funding package to build a new football/soccer stadium and exhibition center. With that, Paul G. Allen and Football Northwest created First & Goal Inc., to manage the stadium and event center on a daily basis.

FGI RESOURCE CONSERVATION PROJECT

In 2011, FGI implemented an energy conservation project that included the installation of a vast rooftop solar array; performance monitoring and other smart technologies, including high-efficiency lighting, mechanical system upgrades and ultra-low flow water fixtures; an LED stadium arch lighting system; and six electrical vehicle charging stations. The project was led by Seattle-based McKinstry.

The project has reduced annual utility costs by 25% percent and carbon emissions by 1,666 metric tons per year; the equivalent of removing 319 cars from the roadway, or powering 161 homes.

In addition to these conservation efforts, FGI recycled or composted 96% of all facility waste in 2014 (including 5,000 gallons of cooking oil that was converted to biodiesel fuel) and eliminated the use of over 27,000 gallons of cleaning chemicals by switching to an Electronically Activated Water cleaning system.

SOUNDERS FC ALLIANCE



OVERVIEW

The Seattle Sounders FC Alliance was established in 2008 as the first members association in professional sports in the United States. The Alliance exists to offer its members a voice in their Club. By purchasing season tickets, fans are granted automatic membership to the Alliance and are able to receive all associated benefits. Members receive voting privileges, a discount at team shops, information on matters relating to the Alliance and the team, and an invitation to the Annual Business Meeting, which includes a question and answer session with owners and management.

ALLIANCE COUNCIL

Alliance Council Members are elected from within The Alliance and serve for up to a two-year term. The Alliance Council represents the diversity of The Alliance.

The Alliance Council, which meets monthly, serves as a liaison between Alliance Members and Sounders FC Ownership. In addition to working with the Club on matters which impact the Alliance and fans at large, the Council creates opportunities to have a voice within the Club, assists in facilitating the General Manager vote, works to strengthen fan engagement and collaborates regarding the Sounders FC Annual Business Meeting.

COUNCIL ACCOMPLISHMENTS

2016 – WOMEN'S JERSEYS

Led by Stephanie Steiner, a working group engaged to improve the shape, length, sleeves and, most importantly, to change the neckline of women's jerseys to be more closely aligned with team jerseys.

2017 – STARS FOR ALL CAMPAIGN

Early January, before the season even began, the Alliance Council mapped out a multi-step plan to encourage MLS to reverse its decision that championship stars would be placed only on authentic men's jerseys. The decision was rescinded and all jerseys – authentic and replica – are allowed stars through the end of this year. Alliance Council will continue to monitor the decision.

2018 – TEAM KIT

A small subgroup worked with Sounders FC's Front Office to provide input on fabric and color in addition to defining neck tape, jock tag and neck hit detail.

ACCESSIBILITY

The Alliance Council believes that getting General Manager & President of Soccer Garth Lagerwey in front of fans is vital. His post-match chalk talk was recapped on the Alliance Council blog, and the group supported a Facebook Live event.

CONSTITUTION

The Alliance Council believes that the fundamentals of its constitution guide the group and should be revisited on a regular basis as the Alliance Council grows, matures and as the Alliance expects more from the Council. Updates are expected to be ratified in 2017.

VOICE OF THE FANS

Council continued to be vocal and represent the voice of the fan to the Front Office. This was especially so for conversations about mobile ticketing, clear bags and MLS rule changes to stadium access.

Previous years have been equally fruitful:

2015

In early 2015, with the hiring of a new General Manager, Alliance Council opened and reviewed rules surrounding the General Manager Vote and Recall Process to ensure that the club would always be in a position to hire the best candidate for the position, and to protect Democracy in Sports: the Alliance's ability to have a say in the direction of their Club.

2012

In 2012, Council members started planning the Alliance Scarf Design contests which fans still enjoy. Council members helped create Sounders 40th Anniversary celebrations.

2011

Council crafted a Constitution and Bylaws for the Alliance and requested a Charter from the club for future operations. These were ratified by general vote of the Alliance in 2011.

2009

Alliance Council members planned the 2009 Supporters Summit as part of the MLS Cup festivities. Members of Council have advised the club on game day experience decisions and help plan the annual business meeting.

BADGE:

GOLDEN SCARF



TELEVISION



Following a year in which the club's MLS Cup Final set league and local records for rating and viewership, Sounders FC continues to provide its fans an array of ways to follow the team, continuing its relationship with Q13 FOX (KCPQ-Channel 13) and JOEtv (KZJO-Channel 22) as the regional television home of the Rave Green.



Highlights of Sounders FC's partnership with Q13 FOX and JOEtv include a 30-minute pre-match show and 30-minute post-match wrap-up following each locally telecast contest, two 30-minute Sounders FC specials during the 2017 season and a weekly segment during Friday's "Q It Up" sportscast throughout the season. Pre-match and halftime shows will be hosted once again by Jackie Montgomery, alongside broadcast analysts Taylor Graham, Marcus Hahnemann, Peter Fewing and Steve Zakuan. Sounders legend Zach Scott is also welcomed this season as a special contributor to matchday television broadcasts, joining for occasional appearances.



Additionally, *ROOT SPORTS* returns as the live out-of-market home of Sounders FC regional broadcasts, bringing eight live matches to households throughout Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Alaska. *ROOT SPORTS* is also set to re-air Sounders FC matches regionally throughout the network's five-state regional footprint.



Sounders FC has partnered with Sinclair Broadcast Group to air Sounders FC Spanish-language programming for the second consecutive year in 2017, including 10 MLS match telecasts on Univision-Seattle (KUNS-TV), hosted by play-by-play voice Jaime Mendez and analyst Diego Arrija. As part of the agreement,

Sinclair is set to again air 15 episodes of Sounders FC en Acción, a 30-minute recap show on Univision-Seattle hosted by Mendez, airing Saturday evenings at 4:00 p.m. PT.

RADIO



Bonneville Seattle Radio Group returns as the English radio home of Sounders FC, with KIRO Radio 97.3 FM set to carry home and away matches once more. In addition to match broadcasts, KIRO Radio 97.3 FM is carrying pre and post-match shows surrounding most Sounders FC contests, once again

hosted by Jason Rantz with a rotating panel of analysts that include Wade Webber, Pete Fewing and Danny Jackson, among others. Additionally, a 60-minute Sounders FC-focused show on KIRO Radio 97.3 FM will air at 9:00 p.m. PT every Thursday evening throughout the season featuring Rantz and Matt Johnson.



The club also continues its partnership with El Rey 1360 AM as the Spanish-language home for Sounders FC matches in 2017. With play-by-play voice "Zuper" Mario Rodriguez and analyst Felipe Maqueda on the call, El Rey 1360 AM is set to carry all 34 Sounders FC matches during the 2017 season. El Rey 1360

AM also provides 30-minute pre-match and post-match shows as part of their matchday coverage, as well as a 30-minute weekly radio show, Somos Sounders FC, airing Saturday mornings at 10:30 a.m. PT.

A native of Dublin, Ireland, Costigan holds a UEFA A coaching license following a professional playing career that included stops with Bray Wanderers, Monaghan United and the Portland Timbers during the club's USL era.

Keller capped his playing career with the 2011 MLS Goalkeeper of the Year Award while also earning MLS Best XI honors, serving as Sounders FC captain and earning an All-Star selection in each of his three MLS seasons. From 1991 to 2008, the Olympia native played in Europe while accumulating U.S. Men's National Team goalkeeping records for most caps (102), wins (53) and shutouts (47). Keller played in three of the world's strongest topflight leagues throughout his career: England's Premiership, Spain's La Liga and the German Bundesliga. A graduate of the University of Portland, Keller and his wife, Kristin, have twins, Chloe and Cameron.

MATT JOHNSON **PLAY-BY-PLAY COMMENTATOR**



Matt Johnson enters his second season as a play-by-play voice for Sounders FC, having previously served on the club's radio team as both a play-by-play commentator and as a pre-match, halftime and post-match radio host from 2009-2014. During that period, he also hosted Sounders FC Weekly, the club's weekly 60-minute radio show on the Bonneville family of networks. The Seattle-native also spent 11 seasons with the Seattle Seahawks as Executive Producer of Seahawks Radio Network and worked three Super Bowls (XL, XLVIII, XLIX). In addition to his time with the Seahawks, Johnson has an extensive radio broadcast background after working at Seattle's Sports Radio 950 KJR from 1996-2005. A lifelong fan of the beautiful game, Johnson has been to the last six FIFA World Cups, attending over 40 individual FIFA World Cup matches since 1994, in addition to 2008 UEFA Champions League Final, 2008 UEFA Cup Final and FA Cup Final. Johnson currently resides in Queen Anne.

BROADCASTING

Across Sounders FC's regional television and radio broadcasts, a rotating host of talent is set to provide additional commentary throughout the 2017 season.

STEVE ZAKUANI was the club's first MLS SuperDraft pick when he was selected first overall in 2009. The Akron standout went on to score 17 goals and added 17 assists for the Rave Green during his career in Seattle, and Zakuani is now a contributor across Sounders FC's broadcast and digital platforms.

MARCUS HAHNEMANN, a local goalkeeper who played soccer for top-tier clubs in Europe from 1999-2012, joined the broadcast team after retiring as a Sounder in 2014. Hahnemann, who has nine caps for the U.S. Men's National Team, began his career as a USL Sounder and finished his run with Sounders FC from 2012-2014. He now performs both radio and television duties for the Rave Green.

TAYLOR GRAHAM, Sounders FC Vice President of Business Operations, also makes appearances on Rave Green broadcasts. The Stanford graduate played professional soccer from 2003-2011, including productive runs with the Sounders through both the end of the club's USL era and the launch of its MLS franchise.

PETE FEWING enters his 24th season as Head Coach for Seattle University's men's soccer team in 2017. In 2015, he led the RedHawks to their first-ever Division I Sweet 16 appearance. A fixture in the Seattle soc-

cer community, Fewing is a regular on both television and radio broadcasts for the Rave Green.

JACKIE MONTGOMERY enters her fifth full season with Sounders FC's broadcast team. She previously worked for FOX Sports and Fuel TV, in addition to freelance work with ESPN, NBC Sports and CBS Sports.

WADE WEBBER played in professional American leagues from 1986-1999, including tenures with the Seattle Storm in 1990 and the USL Seattle Sounders from 1994-1996. The local defender is also the U-15 Head Coach in the Sounders FC Academy, and is a staple of the club's radio coverage.

DANNY JACKSON, an English defender, played for the USL Sounders from 2003-2008. He scored two goals in 113 appearances for the club, and now contributes to the club's radio coverage.

ZACH SCOTT joins for periodic appearances in pre-match, halftime and post-match coverage in 2017. Scott, known as "Mr. Sounder," needs little introduction to the Seattle faithful. Having retired following the championship-winning 2016 season, Scott spent a total of 15 years with the Sounders at the USL and MLS levels, earning an MLS title, two USL titles, four U.S. Open Cups and a Supporters' Shield.



MEDIA POLICY

CREDENTIALS

Season media credentials will be issued to recognized newspapers, magazines, television and established radio stations making reasonable requests. The club does not grant freelance photographers access unless assigned to shoot for a specific story or project, unless otherwise approved via Sounders FC Communications.

ROAD CREDENTIALS

Members of the Sounders FC's media traveling to road games should submit requests for credentials to the Communications Department no later than five (5) business days prior to the road game.

MEDIA WILL CALL

Members of the media needing to pick up passes at the game will find the Media Will Call booth located at the southwest corner of CenturyLink Field. Each person must pick up his or her own credential and present corresponding photo identification. Media Will Call opens three hours prior to the scheduled kickoff. All media must enter through the press gate entrance located at the southwest entrance. Media credentials will not be honored at any other entrance. All credentials are non-transferable, and any unauthorized use will subject the bearer to ejection from CenturyLink Field and confiscation of the credentials.

PARKING

A limited number of parking passes are available for working media. Members of the media seeking parking passes are advised to make their requests as early as possible. Please note that Sounders FC will not be able to accommodate parking all requests.

A limited number of TV news trucks will be allowed to park on the CenturyLink Field east access road. TV trucks that provide satellite, uplink or microwave functions will need to make prior arrangements with Sounders FC Communications.

BROADCAST

In making requests for broadcast credentials, please specify requirements for spotters and/or statisticians. These services must be arranged in advance, and once they are made the statisticians must be compensated whether used or not. Broadcast booths are located in the Gary Wright Press Box.

PRESS BOX

The Gary Wright Press Box at CenturyLink Field is located on the suite level on the west side of the stadium. The press box will open three hours before kickoff. Admittance is limited to working media members with valid credentials. The press box is intended for the purpose of providing a work place for writers, reporters, broadcasters and game personnel. It is imperative that season pass holders notify the Communications Department of their intention to cover a game in order to receive press box seating. Family members and guests will not be accommodated in the press box. Abuse of press box press privileges will result in forfeiture of a press pass.

TELEPHONE / WIRELESS ACCESS

Several pool phones are placed throughout the press box. Remember pool phones are to be shared. Courtesy hard lines are available. CenturyLink Field offers wireless internet access in all areas of the press box. The access is free of charge and works with all Wi-Fi-enabled computer equipment. Media wishing to pay for dedicated LAN connections should contact the Communications Department.

GAME NOTES / STATISTICS

Game notes and statistics will be available in the press box. Statistics will be distributed to each seat throughout the game at halftime and 10 minutes following the final whistle. Periodic announcements will also be made during the game.

MEDIA POLICY

LOCKER ROOM ACCESS

Following the conclusion of the game, a postgame news conference will be held in the Sounders FC Media Room near both the home and visiting Locker Rooms in the south end of CenturyLink Field. Sounders FC and visitor locker rooms are located near the southeast tunnel on field level. Your cooperation and professional courtesy is asked in maintaining a proper working atmosphere for postgame interviews. Absolutely no autographs are allowed during media access periods.

Media cell phones - No media may use a cell phone at any time inside the locker room. Media members may carry their cell phones into the locker room to use as recording devices but may not use them to place or take calls, or to take photos.

FIELD ACCESS

Only working newspaper, magazine and network TV photographers and club/stadium officials are permitted on the field during the game. Press Box passes will not be honored for field admittance at any time, unless authorized by Seattle Sounders FC.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

ENG crew and still photographers holding proper credentials may position themselves along either endline at field level. Immediately prior to each match, photographers who wish to shoot the traditional pre-game team photo will be escorted on cue to the midfield sideline by photo marshals. Photographers will be instructed to walk only on the sidelines - never on the field of play - en route to these temporary sideline positions. Once team photos have been taken, photographers will be directed to quickly return to their endline photo positions. During the match, photographers are advised that they have restricted freedom of movement. At no time during the match can photographers shoot from directly behind the goal. Also, movement from one end of the field to the other is allowed only at halftime on the sideline opposite the team benches. Still photographers DO NOT have access to the locker rooms at any time.

PHOTOGRAPHER PHOTO BIBS

Each accredited photographer will be issued a specially designed photo bib/vest provided by Sounders FC for identification purposes as a mandatory supplement to the credential. The photo bib serves as a temporary access control device and must be returned to the photo marshals area at the end of each match. The photo bib must be worn at all times while present at any photo position. Photographers in unauthorized shooting positions or not wearing a bib risk suspension of their credential.

PHOTOGRAPHERS' WORKROOM

The photographers' work area is located at the back of the press box.

MEALS

Food and beverages are available to working members of the media in the press box, with meals served in the southwest loft.

DURING THE WEEK

Training Access:

During the regular season, training sessions typically run 75-90 minutes and usually begin at 10:30 a.m. PT. Training times can and frequently do vary. Members of the media who intend to cover training sessions on a regular basis should call the Sounders FC Communications Department to obtain the latest training schedule information. Training sessions will, in general, be open to the media, but they may be closed at the discretion of the head coach. No media members are allowed into the locker room before, during or after training sessions.

Interviews:

Interviews that require advance preparations or special accommodations by a Sounders FC player or staff member should be made by calling or emailing the Sounders FC Communications Department.


