OUR HISTORY

On **December 11, 1973**, then general manager Denny Veitch announced that Vancouver would make a return to the old North American Soccer League (NASL) for the 1974 season. Thus, Vancouver Whitecaps FC were born.

Veitch's announcement, which was made on the top floor of a Davie Street hotel in downtown Vancouver, saw the return of professional soccer to the city after a two-year spell in late 1960's. In 1967, former Scotland manager Ian McColl was in charge of the Vancouver Royal Canadians in the United Soccer Association before the re-named Vancouver Royals took part in the NASL's inaugural season in 1968 after the United Soccer Association had merged with the National Professional Soccer League. The Royals were led that year by two legends of the game in former Hungary and Real Madrid star Ferenc Puskas and former England manager Sir Bobby Robson.

With the team name symbolizing the snow-capped mountains and the white crests of the waves along Vancouver's shoreline, Whitecaps FC started life in the NASL by playing in colours of red and white. As one of four clubs to play in the Western Division, Whitecaps FC played their first-ever match on **May 5**, **1974**, when they fell to a 2-1 home defeat to San Jose Earthquakes. Though an Empire Stadium crowd of 17,343 saw Jim Easton's side lose that day, defender Neil Ellett wrote his name in the history books by scoring Whitecaps FC's first-ever goal in the league.

Having missed the playoffs in 1974 and 1975, German coach Eckhard Krautzun replaced Easton for the 1976 campaign. In a side that included three-time 'World Superstars' champion Brian Budd, Whitecaps FC finished third in the Western Division of the NASL's Pacific Conference and made the postseason for the first time in club history. Their playoff appearance ended as soon as it began, as Vancouver lost 1-0 at Seattle Sounders on **August 18, 1976**. Seattle would repeat that playoff result the following year, with Whitecaps FC experiencing two coaching changes in 1977. Krautzun was replaced by defender and future Canadian national team head coach Holger Osieck before Englishman Tony Waiters took charge of the side before the season's end.

Come the 1978 season, Whitecaps FC had grown to become the city's top sports franchise, with Waiters leading the club to a first-place finish in the Western Division after a 13-match winning streak to end the regular season schedule. Their first-ever NASL playoff win came on **August 9**, 1978, with a 4-0 victory over Canadian rivals Toronto Metros-Croatia, while defender Bob Lenarduzzi was named North American Player of the Year. Though they lost their National Conference semifinal series to Portland Timbers, Vancouver soccer fans would be rewarded with success the following season.

1979 brought a change to the Whitecaps FC logo and colours, as the team dawned Blue and White for the first time that season. They also became Vancouver's first professional sports team to win a major North American championship when they won the NASL Soccer Bowl title with a 2-1 victory over Tampa Bay Rowdies at Giants Stadium in East Rutherford, New Jersey, on September 8, 1979. A squad that included the likes of Alan Ball, John Craven, Kevin Hector, Willie Johnston, Phil Parkes. and Trevor Whymark, Whitecaps FC finished top of the Western Division standings before embarking on a memorable playoff run to the league title. After defeating Dallas Tornado in the National Conference quarterfinals, Waiters' side faced Los Angeles Aztecs in the conference semifinals. A goal from Hector in



the decisive mini-game at Empire Stadium took
Whitecaps FC to the conference championship and a
thrilling series versus a star-studded New York
Cosmos side. After winning the first match in
Vancouver 2-0, the return game saw the Cosmos win
3-2 at Giants Stadium to force a mini-game and an
eventual shoot-out. Much to the disbelief of 44,109
Cosmos fans, Derek Possee scored the winning goal
in the shoot-out to send Whitecaps FC to the final.

Led to the championship by Whymark's two goals in the final versus Tampa Bay, Whitecaps FC returned home to the largest reception in British Columbia history. As many as 100,000 people lined Vancouver's Robson Street to salute their heroes during a championship parade on **September 9**, **1979**, with Carl Valentine famously announcing to supporters - "You are the number one fans, and we are the number one team!"

Whitecaps FC were unable to defend their title in 1980, however, with Waiters returning to the role of head coach after initially making way for fellow Englishman Bob McNab. Their first-round playoff defeat to Seattle was unfortunately repeated in the 1981 season, as Tampa Bay eliminated a Whitecaps FC side that were led by former Leeds United and Republic of Ireland star Johnny Giles. It was a disappointing outcome, considering Vancouver's first-place finish in the Northwest Division standings that year. In 1982, San Diego Sockers ended the Whitecaps FC season after winning two of three matches in their first-round playoff series.

Hopes were high for a second NASL title in 1983, as Vancouver played host to the Soccer Bowl championship match at the newly-built BC Place stadium. In fact, Whitecaps FC's 2-1 victory over Seattle on **June 20, 1983**, was the first sporting event to be played in BC Place. A sold-out crowd of 60,342 saw a young Peter Beardsley score Vancouver's two goals that day. Though Whitecaps FC finished top of the Western Division standings, another first-round playoff exit followed - this time to Toronto Blizzard. In fact, Vancouver's Canadian rivals reached the Soccer Bowl final at BC Place, but it was Tulsa Roughnecks that won the last-ever singlematch NASL championship with a 2-0 victory on

October 1, 1983.

The 1984 season proved to be the last year of existence for the NASL, with Whitecaps FC one of nine remaining clubs in the league that year. Former Whitecaps player Alan Hinton replaced Giles as head coach and led the team to a second-place finish in the Western Division. Vancouver's season, and even their existence as an NASL club, ended after a playoff semifinal series exit to eventual champions Chicago Sting. Their last home match was a 3-1 defeat to the Sting at BC Place on **September 23, 1984**. The club's final NASL game came five days later, as Whitecaps FC lost 4-3 in Chicago. Instability throughout the NASL meant the league had to suspend operations by the end of the season, and as a result, Whitecaps FC folded that same year.

Despite the NASL's demise, Canada's men's national team achieved great success when they qualified for the 1986 FIFA World Cup in Mexico. In an effort to build on that achievement, professional soccer was resurrected in Canada with the formation of the Canadian Soccer League (CSL). The dawn of the CSL also brought about the rebirth of the professional game in Vancouver, as the 86ers were launched after the West Coast Soccer Society was granted a CSL franchise on July 26, 1986. Named after the year of Vancouver's incorporation as a city (1886) and the vear of the club's founding (1986), the 86ers took to the field for the CSL's first-ever season in 1987. Led by player/head coach Bob Lenarduzzi and his assistant Alan Errington, the 86ers were triumphant in their inaugural CSL match, as they defeated Edmonton Brick Men 4-2 in front of 7,646 fans at Swangard Stadium in Burnaby, BC, on June 7, 1987. The 86ers went on to finish second in the Western Division standings that year before bowing out to inaugural league champions Calgary Kickers in the playoff semifinals.

A year later, under new owner Milan Ilich, the 86ers established themselves as a CSL powerhouse when they won the first of four-straight league championship titles. On **September 25, 1988**, Lenarduzzi formally hung up his boots as a player after leading his side to a 4-1 victory over Hamilton Steelers in front of a Swangard crowd of 6,443.

Hamilton were the 86ers opponents again in the CSL Mita Cup final on **October 1, 1989**, with Lenarduzzi's squad delighting a huge Swangard crowd of 7,942 with a 3-2 victory over the Steelers. The club also set a North American professional sports record by playing 46 consecutive matches without defeat (37 wins and nine draws) between **June 5, 1988**, and **August 8, 1989**. Those efforts were honoured in 2004, as the 86ers squad of 1989 were inducted into the BC Sports Hall of Fame and Museum.

1990 brought North American success to the 86ers. As CSL champions, Vancouver took on American Professional Soccer League (APSL) champions Maryland Bays for the 'Pepsi Cup' North American Club Championship match at Swangard on September 26, 1990. The 86ers won the title after a 3-2 extra-time victory, with the club's all-time leading goalscorer Domenic Mobilio scoring the match winner in the 117th minute. The 86ers then made it three CSL championship wins at home versus Hamilton on October 8, 1990, with Vancouver hammering the Steelers 6-1 in front of 6,348 fans at Swangard. Vancouver's fourth and final Mita Cup championship came on October 6, 1991, when the 86ers defeated Toronto Blizzard 5-3 at Swangard.

The CSL's last season of existence came in 1992, and unfortunately for 86ers fans, a fifth-straight title would elude their side. Despite finishing top of the regular season standings, Winnipeg Fury upset Vancouver in the two-game final series to win the final CSL championship before the league folded later that year. The 86ers also came up short in the first round of the 1992 'Professional Cup' North American Club Championship. Facing APSL champions Colorado Foxes over two legs, Vancouver suffered a heartbreaking 3-2 defeat in the first leg in Colorado on August 3, 1992, before the Foxes advanced to the final, as a 2-1 second-leg win at Swangard on August 11, 1992, secured a 5-3 aggregate victory for Colorado.

With the CSL at an end, the 86ers entered a new era when they became members of the APSL for the 1993 season. Fellow CSL club Toronto Blizzard and the newly formed Montreal Impact also joined the league that same year. With a new look, logo, and

colours (red, black, and white), the 86ers finished top of the APSL regular season standings before their season was abruptly ended in the playoff semifinals, as Los Angeles Salsa won 3-2 in a shootout at Swangard. The match was also Lenarduzzi's last as 86ers head coach, as he turned his sole focus to his other role as head coach of the Canadian men's national team after being appointed to that position in the spring of 1992.

Former Whitecaps FC, 86ers, and Canadian international Carl Valentine succeeded Lenarduzzi as head coach. After missing the playoffs in his first season in charge in 1994, Valentine led the 86ers to the postseason in 1995, where they lost to Seattle Sounders in the semifinals. Midfielder Giuliano Oliviero earned APSL Rookie of the Year honours that season. The 86ers missed the playoffs again in 1996, but their fortunes changed in 1997 after the APSL was re-named the A-League and was expanded from seven clubs to 24. There was also a change in ownership when Milan Ilich handed over the club to BC Lions owner David Braley. Though they finished fourth in the Western Conference. Pacific Division standings, Valentine's side reached the playoff semifinals before losing to eventual champions Milwaukee Rampage. The fall of 1997 also saw the return of Lenarduzzi to the club as general manager after his spell as Canadian national team head coach had come to an end.

Valentine's final two years in charge ended in similar fashion, as the 86ers saw both their 1998 and 1999 A-League seasons end with first-round playoff exits. One notable bright spot in 1999 was Niall Thompson's two league honours after he scored 20 goals and recorded 47 points that season.

The turn of the millennium saw former Whitecaps FC, 86ers, and Canadian national team striker Dale Mitchell named as the club's third head coach. He led the 86ers to the Western Conference playoff semifinals before falling 4-3 on aggregate to Minnesota Thunder. The year 2000 was significant for events off the pitch as well, with Braley selling the club to local businessman David Stadnyk in August of that year. Then on **October 26, 2000**, after widespread public support, the 86ers formally changed their



name back to the Whitecaps after Stadnyk purchased the naming rights from former NASL Whitecaps director John Laxton.

With a new logo and new-look Blue and White jerseys that were designed as a tribute to the 1979 NASL championship side, Mitchell earned A-League Coach of the Year honours in 2001 after leading Whitecaps FC to a first-place finish in the Western Conference standings. Unfortunately, their season ended when Hershey Wildcats defeated Vancouver in the playoff semifinals.

2001 also saw the birth of the club's new entry on the local soccer scene, as the Vancouver Breakers women's team were formed following a merger of the Vancouver Angels and Vancouver Lady 86ers teams. Playing in the top division of the W-League (W1), the Breakers finished top of the Western Conference before suffering heartbreak in the championship final when they lost 5-1 to Boston Renegades.

2002 proved to be an eventful year for the club. Former Portuguese international Tony Fonseca became Whitecaps FC head coach on **February 13**, **2002**, after Mitchell moved on to become head coach of Canada's U-20 men's national team. Fonseca led Whitecaps FC to the Western Conference playoff final before losing to eventual champions Milwaukee. It was also in 2002 that the Breakers women hosted the W-League championship tournament, with Vancouver finishing third after defeating Denver Lady Cougars in the third-place match.

Of more concern to Vancouver soccer fans was Stadnyk's decision to step down from his ownership of the club midway through the 2002 campaign. He handed over the club's rights to the league, who in turn, appointed Lenarduzzi as head of a search committee to find a new owner. Their search led to local businessman Greg Kerfoot taking ownership of Whitecaps FC on November 13, 2002. On February 24, 2003, the Whitecaps men and Breakers women were brought under a new club structure called Whitecaps Football Club (FC), with the set-up to include an extensive youth development program. 2003 also saw both Whitecaps FC teams'

seasons come to an end in the first round of the playoffs, as the Seattle Sounders men's and women's teams triumphed over their Pacific Northwest rivals.

Yet, it would not take long for success to bloom under the ownership and vision of Kerfoot. After announcing plans to build the Whitecaps Training Centre on the campus of Simon Fraser University on April 14, 2004, the Whitecaps FC women - who were led by head coach Chris Bennett - won their first W-League North American championship title with a penalty shootout victory over New Jersey Wildcats in Ottawa, Ontario. Fonseca's men, meanwhile, reached the Western Conference playoff final that season before falling 2-1 on aggregate to Seattle. Whitecaps Youth, however, sent five teams to the Super Y-League North American finals in 2004, with the U-13 Boys winning the championship title.

2005 brought more change. The A-League was re-named the United Soccer Leagues First Division (USL-1), while Whitecaps FC replaced Fonseca with American Bob Lillev as men's team head coach. The former Hershev Wildcats and Montreal Impact tactician led Vancouver to a third-place finish in the USL-1 standings before Richmond Kickers eliminated Whitecaps FC on penalties in the first round of the playoffs. The men's season did include a notable friendly result, as Whitecaps FC defeated English Premier League club Sunderland 3-0 at Swangard on July 16, 2005. Striker Jason Jordan also had a season to remember, as he was named the league's Most Valuable Player after leading USL-1 in goals (17) and points (37). The Whitecaps FC women, meanwhile, took third place at the W-League championship tournament after a 3-1 win over Central Florida Krush. On October 13, 2005, the club announced plans for a proposed soccer-specific stadium to be built on downtown Vancouver's central waterfront and rail lands.

A memorable year ensued for Whitecaps FC fans in 2006, as both the men's and women's teams claimed an unprecedented double of USL titles. Despite a fourth-place finish in the USL-1 standings, Lilley's side defeated Miami FC and Canadian rivals Montreal Impact to reach the championship final away to Rochester Raging Rhinos. On **September 30, 2006**,

Whitecaps FC won their first league title since the 1991 CSL championship with a 3-0 victory in Upstate New York. Earlier in the summer, the men's side defeated English League Championship club Cardiff City on penalties to win the inaugural Whitecaps Nations Cup tournament. Meanwhile, under the guidance of head coach Bob Birarda, the undefeated Whitecaps FC women claimed their second W-League championship title in three seasons with a 3-0 win over Ottawa Fury in the final at Swangard on August 6, 2006.

2007 saw Swangard play host to seven matches in the FIFA U-20 World Cup, with sell-out crowds of 10,000 taking in each of those games during the month of July. The Whitecaps FC seasons, however, proved not as eventful. The women missed the W-League playoffs for the first time in their history, while Lilley's tenure as men's team head coach ended following a disappointing campaign that saw Whitecaps FC finish seventh in the USL-1 standings and fall 3-1 on aggregate to Pacific Northwest rivals Portland Timbers in the playoff quarterfinals.

On a more positive note, it was in **September 2007** that the Whitecaps FC Residency program formally began under the guidance of managing director Thomas Niendorf. As North America's only full-time professional development set-up, the inaugural 18-player squad included several top Canadian youngsters, as well as Jamaican youth international Dever Orgill. The club's exposure was raised again on **November 7, 2007**, as Whitecaps FC played David Beckham and Major League Soccer (MLS) club Los Angeles Galaxy to a 0-0 draw in front of 48,172 fans at BC Place.

On December 11, 2007, Icelandic coach Teitur Thordarson became the 13th men's team head coach since the club's first season in the NASL back in 1974. Though 2008 was his first season in North America, the former Iceland international striker had a memorable campaign, as he led Whitecaps FC to their second USL-1 championship title in three seasons. Earlier in the season, Whitecaps FC surprised many with their 2-1 friendly win over David Beckham and MLS club Los Angeles Galaxy at Edmonton's Commonwealth Stadium on May 13,

2008. The men's team built on that friendly result to finish a point behind regular season champions
Puerto Rico Islanders before embarking on another memorable playoff run. They defeated Minnesota and Montreal on route to the club's first championship final at Swangard since the 1992 CSL season. In what was the first-ever USL-1 championship match to involve two clubs from outside of the United States, Whitecaps FC defeated Puerto Rico 2-1 in front of 5.822 fans on October 12, 2008.

2008 was also an important year in Canadian club soccer, as Whitecaps FC faced Montreal and MLS side Toronto FC in the inaugural edition of the Nutrilite Canadian Championship. Though back-to-back 2-0 defeats to the Impact hurt their chances of winning the Voyageurs Cup that year, Thordarson's side famously handed Toronto FC their first home defeat of the season with a 1-0 victory at BMO Field on Canada Day (July 1, 2008). Eight days later, Whitecaps FC completed their campaign with a late 2-2 draw versus TFC at Swangard. Montreal went on to win the inaugural tournament and represent Canada in the inaugural edition of the CONCACAF Champions League.

Whitecaps FC women, meanwhile, returned to the postseason after a year's absence, but ended up losing the Western Conference playoff final 1-0 to Seattle at Swangard on July 26, 2008. The match was also Birarda's last in charge of the women's team, as he parted company with the club on October 9, 2008. It was also in 2008 that the Whitecaps FC Residency squad reached the Premier Development League (PDL) semifinals in their inaugural season in the league before losing 2-1 to eventual champions Thunder Bay Chill. On November 25, 2008, Whitecaps FC and BC Soccer affiliate club Mountain WFC celebrated a Super Y-League North American championship when their U-16 Boys defeated New Jersey's TSF Academy 2-0 in the final in Tampa, Florida.

On **October 15, 2008**, Whitecaps FC submitted a bid to secure one of two MLS expansion teams for the 2011 season, having initially announced their bidding plans at a press conference in Vancouver on **July 25, 2008**. On **March 18, 2009**, MLS

commissioner Don Garber announced that Vancouver would be the home of the 17th team in MLS - led by an ownership team of Kerfoot, Steve Luczo, Jeff Mallett, and NBA basketball star Steve Nash. As an MLS expansion club, Whitecaps FC will play most their inaugural season at the Pacific National Exhibition's temporary 'Empire Field' stadium (formerly Empire Stadium) before moving to a renovated BC Place stadium in early October 2011.

With spirits high in the club following the MLS announcement, the 2009 season went down as one of the most eventful campaigns in club history. Thordarson re-shaped his squad by making several changes to his men's team roster, which included the departure of long-time servants Jeff Clarke, Jason Jordan, Steve Kindel, and Alfredo Valente. The side also began its preparations for their USL-1 championship title defence early, with training camp starting on **January 21, 2009**. In early March, Whitecaps FC embarked on their first-ever visit to the continent of Africa, as they took part in a three-match preseason trip to the United Republic of Tanzania.

Thordarson's young squad endured a challenging season in USL-1, with the side claiming the final playoff berth in the league standings after a seventhplace finish. Yet, true to their folklore as a successful playoff side, Whitecaps FC upset the formbook by defeating second-seeded Carolina RailHawks in the first round, then USL-1 regular season champions Portland Timbers in the semifinals. Their title defence. however, ended in disappointment after Canadian arch-rivals Montreal Impact won both legs of the USL-1 Championship Series in October 2009. Defeat to the Impact followed similar disappointment in the second edition of the Nutrilite Canadian Championship. Despite finishing level on points with Major League Soccer club Toronto FC in the threeclub competition, TFC won the title and Canada's lone spot in 2009-10 CONCACAF Champions League on goal difference - much in thanks to a stunning 6-1 victory at Montreal in the tournament's final match on June 18, 2009. At the end of the season, defender Geordie Lyall announced his retirement from professional soccer after 11 straight seasons with the club, while Todd Wawrousek moved on after three years as men's team assistant

coach before taking up a similar role at Crystal Palace Baltimore.

Though many unique experiences took place during the year, the men's team's season included several bright moments. Marcus Haber was the first Whitecaps FC player to be named USL-1 Rookie of the Year since Giuliano Oliviero back in 1995, while fellow striker Charles Gbeke finished as the league's top scorer with 12 goals. Another rookie in Wes Knight shared the league lead in assists with eight, while Jay Nolly became the first Whitecaps FC goalkeeper since Arnie Mausser in 1977 to appear in every minute of action in a single season, having played in all 40 matches for a total of 3.600 minutes. Other notable moments include Dever Orgill becoming the first player from the club's Residency program to score a men's team goal on May 16, 2009, and the club setting a new record of 13 sold-out matches at Swangard Stadium. The total surpassed the previous mark of 10 sold-out games back in the 1987 season.

The Whitecaps FC women were under new guidance. as Alan Koch became the fifth women's team head coach on April 20, 2009. The South African-born tactician then endured a tough first year in charge, as Vancouver missed the playoffs for only the second time in club history after a fifth-place finish in the W-League Western Conference standings. The Residency team also experienced a tough second season in the PDL, as they too missed the postseason after a sixth-place finish in an improved Western Conference, Northwest Division. Yet, 2009 turned out to be a fine year for the Whitecaps Prospects Women's team. After finishing second in the Pacific Coast Soccer League (PCSL) Premier Division, Jesse Symons' side won the PCSL's Dave Fryatt Challenge Cup with a 4-2 win over regular season champions Fraser Valley Action in Kelowna, BC, on July 26, 2009. Then as 'Team BC', the Prospects Women claimed British Columbia's fourth gold medal in women's soccer at the 2009 Canada Games in Prince Edward Island. In November 2009. two Whitecaps FC and BC Soccer 'Professional Development Partner' teams claimed Super Y-League North American championship titles. The U-16 Girls and U-16 Boys teams of Coastal WFC

earned the club's first-ever North American titles with penalty shootout victories in Tampa, Florida.

On November 10, 2009, Whitecaps FC brought an end to their time in USL-1 after 16 seasons in the league. As a member of the Team Owners Association (TOA), Whitecaps FC joined former USL-1 clubs Atlanta Silverbacks, Carolina RailHawks, Miami FC, Minnesota Thunder, and Montreal Impact, as well as former USL Second Division outfit Crystal Palace Baltimore, and expansion sides Athletic Club of St. Louis and FC Tampa Bay Rowdies in forming a new second-tier professional soccer league in the United States and Canada. As a tribute to the original NASL that existed between 1968 to 1984, the new league was formally named 'North American Soccer League' on November 23, 2009. Seven days later, former USI -1 club Rochester Rhinos also became. a member of the new NASL, while Canada earned a fourth professional team on February 9, 2010, when FC Edmonton announced they would join the NASL in 2011.

There was also change with the women's team, as former Jamaican international goalkeeper Hubert Busby Jr. succeeded Koch as the club's sixth head coach on **December 14, 2009**. As part of the club's long-term plan for women's player development, Busby and assistant coach Symons not only took charge of the Whitecaps FC W-League side, but also the club's U-18 Prospects Girls team from the 2010 season.

Meanwhile, the NASL's efforts to earn sanctioning as a Division II professional league in the U.S. - and therefore Canada - for the 2010 season, suffered a setback on **December 30, 2009**, as the United States Soccer Federation (USSF) voted unanimously to reject the applications of both the NASL and USL. The decision resulted in both the NASL and USL joining the USSF in forming and operating a 'Division 2' professional soccer league called 'United States Soccer Federation Division-2 Professional League (USSF D-2)' for the 2010 season on January 7. The one-year agreement saw the USSF oversee all league matters during the 2010 campaign, with American soccer's governing body working with the USL and NASL on day-to-day league activities.

It was also in 2010 that Whitecaps FC laid down their foundations for Vancouver MLS 2011. On **January 19, 2010**, former D.C. United head coach Tom Soehn joined the club as director of soccer operations, while former Canadian men's national team captain Colin Miller succeeded Todd Wawrousek as men's team assistant coach on **February 11, 2010**. On March 1, former Tottenham Hotspur executive director Paul Barber took charge as Whitecaps FC chief executive officer after being announced to the role on **November 24, 2009**.

In what was their final season at the North American second division level, Whitecaps FC finished second in the USSF D-2's NASL Conference standings, despite making several changes to their squad during the 2010 summer transfer window. Their solid defensive display saw Vancouver set a league low 22 goals conceded during the regular season. As the fifth seed in the USSF D-2 playoffs, Thordarson's squad defeated MLS expansion cousins Portland Timbers 2-1 on aggregate in the first round before their season ended abruptly in the semifinals to eventual league champions Puerto Rico Islanders, as Whitecaps FC fell 2-0 on aggregate. Two goals in extra time of the second leg from former Whitecaps FC striker Nicholas Addlery ended the club's era at Swangard Stadium after 24 consecutive seasons on October 17. 2010. Whitecaps FC were also left frustrated in the 2010 Nutrilite Canadian Championship, as four consecutive draws saw Vancouver finish second behind defending champions Toronto FC in the three-club competition. Then on October 28, 2010, captain Martin Nash ended his player career to become a member of the Whitecaps FC coaching staff.

The women's team enjoyed a successful 2010 W-League campaign under first-year coach Busby, who earned Coach of the Year honours after leading Whitecaps FC to a first-place finish in the W-League Western Conference standings with an undefeated record of 6W-0L-4D. On July 24, 2010, Busby led his side to the W-League Western Conference title with a 2-1 home win over two-time defending W-League champions Pali Blues, with Vancouver reaching the W-League 'Final Four' Championship Tournament

in Santa Clarita, California, as a result. Though they defeated top-seeded Hudson Valley Quickstrike Lady Blues 3-1 in the semifinals on **July 29, 2010**, Whitecaps FC missed out on a third W-League championship title when they lost 3-1 to Buffalo Flash on **July 31, 2010**. On **January 5, 2011**, one of the club's most popular women's team players, Kara Lang, brought her illustrious career to an end through injury.

2010 saw Whitecaps FC Residency endured a challenging third season in the PDL, with Craig Dalrymple taking interim charge of the side on May 7, 2010, following the departure of Thomas Niendorf back on February 25, 2010. Leading a young and inexperienced Residency side, Dalrymple's squad finished sixth in the highly competitive Western Conference, Northwest Division standings. Meanwhile, the Whitecaps FC Prospects Women enjoyed a perfect 16W-0L-0D PCSL regular season campaign, but were upset in the league's Dave Fryatt Challenge Cup tournament semifinals by hosts Coguitlam Metro-Ford Xtreme on July 24, 2010. Later in the year. Whitecaps FC and BC Soccer 'Professional Development Partner' side Coguitlam Metro-Ford U-15 Boys won a Super Y-League North American championship title.

Of course, 2010 was notable for many exciting events off the pitch, as Whitecaps FC built towards their inaugural MLS season in 2011. In the build-up to the 2010 FIFA World Cup in South Africa, the 'Whitecaps FC week of soccer' saw the club unveil their new brand and logo for MLS on **June 8, 2010**. Two days later, the club's new adidas MLS kit and Premier Founding Partner in Bell Canada were unveiled. This was followed by further partnership announcements in BMO Bank of Montreal (**October 27, 2010**), EA SPORTS (**November 29, 2010**), Budweiser (**January 26, 2011**), Kia (**March 2, 2011**)

On July 28, 2010, an important piece to the building of the Whitecaps FC MLS squad took place, as Vancouver won a coin toss over MLS expansion cousins Portland Timbers, which allowed the club to choose which player acquisition mechanism they wish to have first pick in during the MLS Expansion Priority Draft on August 23, 2010. Whitecaps FC

opted for the first overall selection in the 2011 MLS SuperDraft and top ranking for allocation and USSF D-2 Priority. Further MLS pieces were put in place on **September 2, 2010**, when Thordarson was confirmed as Whitecaps FC head coach for their inaugural MLS season. That was followed by the appointment of Dutchman Richard Grootscholten as the club's new technical director and head coach of the club's Residency program on **November 3, 2010**.

Whitecaps FC's first MLS signing was then confirmed on **November 18, 2010**, as USA World Cup star Jay DeMerit arrived in Vancouver after a successful spell in England. Five further players in Joe Cannon, Atiba Harris, Jonathan Leathers, Shea Salinas, and John Thorrington were added to Thordarson's squad during the MLS Expansion Draft on **November 24, 2010**, while Philippe Davies, Wes Knight, and Jay Nolly all earned MLS contracts with the club after being key performers for Whitecaps FC at the North American second division level. In particular, the signing of Davies on **November 26, 2010**, made him Vancouver's first-ever Canadian signing and homegrown player in MLS.

On January 8, 2011, former Chicago Fire head coach Denis Hamlett joined Thordarson's coaching staff as one of his assistants. The following week, Whitecaps FC used their first overall pick in the 2011 MLS SuperDraft to select USA U-20 international striker and Generation adidas signing Omar Salgado on January 13, 2011. NCAA Division I products Michael Nanchoff (eighth overall), Jeb Brovsky (19th overall), and Bilal Duckett (37th overall) also became part of the club's inaugural SuperDraft class.

On **January 24, 2011**, Whitecaps FC players and staff took to the pitch at their Empire Field home for the start of a two-month preseason campaign and preparations towards their first season as an MLS club, which begins at home to Canadian arch-rivals Toronto FC on **Saturday, March 19**.

EXECUTIVE BIOGRAPHIES

Paul Barber

Chief Executive Officer

Paul Barber joined Whitecaps FC in March 2010 from Tottenham Hotspur Football Club of the English Premier League. As Vancouver Whitecaps FC chief executive officer, Barber joins president Bob Lenarduzzi and chief operating officer Rachel Lewis in heading up the Whitecaps FC executive team, as the club enters their inaugural season in Major League Soccer (MLS). Barber is the primary representative within the club for the Vancouver Whitecaps FC ownership group.

Barber brings world-class experience and leadership to Whitecaps FC business and soccer operations, having spent five years as executive director of Tottenham Hotspur FC. Reporting to executive chairman Daniel Levy, Barber was responsible for all of the club's key operational divisions, including commercial areas, ticketing and hospitality, international tours and friendly matches, and the club's soccer development area, which included domestic and international coaching programs and soccer camps.

A former commercial and marketing director of The Football Association in England, Barber was responsible for developing programs for marketing, communications, and commercial affairs, including broadcast rights of the England national team and The FA Cup - the largest domestic knock-out cup competition in world soccer. He also extensively supported the development of women's, youth, and grassroots soccer in England, securing long-term and innovative sponsorship agreements with some of the world's leading consumer brands.

Barber's international soccer experience includes being a member of the England national team's official party that travelled to Japan and Korea for the 2002 FIFA World Cup, and to the 2000 UEFA European Championship in Belgium and Holland. With Tottenham Hotspur, he enjoyed the club's three successive years of UEFA European club football competition between 2006 and 2008, as well as Spurs' two consecutive appearances at the new Wembley Stadium in London for the English League Cup final in 2008 (versus Chelsea FC) and 2009 (versus Manchester United FC).

A lifelong Tottenham Hotspur fan and native of North London, Barber is a Football Association qualified coach and former amateur player. Though he and his family have relocated to Vancouver, Barber continues to sit on the board of Rose Bowl plc - parent company of Hampshire County Cricket Club - where he is a non-executive director.

Bob Lenarduzzi

President

Bob Lenarduzzi has been involved with Whitecaps FC for over three decades, excelling as a player, coach, general manager, director of soccer operations, and now president. Playing with his hometown Whitecaps FC (1974-1984), Lenarduzzi was the North American Soccer League's all-time leader in games played with 312. He was the only Canadian to win the North American Player of Year, and in 1979, he was a key member of Whitecaps FC's championshipwinning team. He represented Canada 47 times as a player, helping them qualify for the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics and the 1986 FIFA World Cup in Mexico. For his efforts, Lenarduzzi was named among CONCACAF's top 30 players of the past century. As a player/coach, he won four straight Canadian Soccer League championships and was twice named CSL Coach of the Year. He went on to coach Canada's men's national team from 1992 to 1997.

Lenarduzzi served as the general manager and director of soccer operations of Vancouver 86ers and Whitecaps FC from 1988 to 1993, and 1998 to 2007. In 2000, he received the USL First Division Executive of the Year award, while he was also a member of the FIFA U-20 World Cup Canada 2007 Steering Committee.

Lenarduzzi has been inducted into the North American Soccer Hall of Fame, the Canadian Soccer Hall of Fame, the British Columbia Sports Hall of Fame, and the United Soccer Leagues Hall of Fame. In 2005, he received the Order of British Columbia – the highest form of recognition that the province can extend to its citizens – for his contribution to the sport of soccer.

Rachel Lewis Chief Operating Officer

Rachel Lewis has been in the field of sport and event management for nearly a decade, joining Vancouver Whitecaps FC in 2003 as director of event management and stadium development. In 2007, she assumed the role of chief operating officer.

Prior to joining Whitecaps FC, Lewis spent three years with Vancouver's PGA Tour Stop, the Air Canada Championship. As tournament director, she was responsible for overseeing all day-to-day operations. Lewis also represented BMO Financial Group as project manager for their sponsorship of the BMO Financial Group Canadian Women's Open. She holds a BA (honours) from the University of Victoria and an MBA from the University of British Columbia.

Lewis has a strong passion for community. She currently sits on the Board of Directors and Executive Committee of Kidsport Canada, is a board member of the Gastown Business Improvement Society, is a former Director of Sport BC, and is a former Trustee with the BC Sports Hall of Fame and Museum. She also volunteered as a member of the FIFA U-20 World Cup Canada 2007 Steering Committee. In 2008, Lewis was recognized as a recipient of the Business in Vancouver "40 Under 40" awards, while in 2011, she was named one of "BC's 100 Women of Influence" by The Vancouver Sun.

Greg Anderson

Director of Professional Teams

Greg Anderson joined the Whitecaps FC front office in 2004, and was initially engaged with the proposed Whitecaps Waterfront Stadium and National Training Centre projects. Anderson is now responsible for the management of the men's first team. Anderson also sits on the Canadian Soccer Association board of directors.

Prior to joining the club, Anderson worked in pulmonary research at St. Paul's Hospital in Vancouver. In order to make a career change and explore his passions for sport and development, Anderson completed an MBA at the Thunderbird School of Global Management, during which time, he was invited to join the United Nations Graduate Study Program, where he had the opportunity to study and work abroad in France and Costa Rica. Anderson also holds a BSc in Biology from the University of Western Ontario.

Tommy Soehn

Director of Soccer Operations

Having been part of Major League Soccer since its inception in 1996, Tom Soehn brings a vast wealth of experience to his role as Whitecaps FC director of soccer operations. A native of Chicago, Illinois, Soehn joined the club on January 19, 2010.

With nine years' experience as a coach in MLS, including the last three of those seasons as head coach of D.C. United, Soehn's role will be to develop and oversee the creation and operation of the club's player scouting, identification, and recruitment system, as well as collaborate with the technical staff to formulate the roster for their inaugural MLS season in 2011.

Soehn comes to Whitecaps FC after six seasons on the coaching staff at D.C. United. From 2004 to 2006, he served as assistant coach to Peter Nowak at the Washington, D.C. outfit. During that time, United won both the 2004 MLS Cup title and the 2006 MLS Supporters' Shield as regular season champions. On December 21, 2006, Soehn succeeded Nowak as head coach and enjoyed a successful first season

with United, with the club defending their MLS Supporters' Shield title in 2007. His second season in charge saw United win the 2008 Lamar Hunt US Open Cup title before he led the club into the group stages of the inaugural (2008-09) CONCACAF Champions League. As Lamar Hunt US Open Cup winners, United returned to the CONCACAF Champions League for the 2009-10 season and reached the group stages for a second straight year. As United head coach from 2007 to 2009, Soehn registered a 55W-48L-31D record in all competitions, including an overall MLS record of 36W-31L-25D.

Prior to joining D.C. United, Soehn served as assistant coach with hometown club Chicago Fire. He first assisted current United States national team head coach Bob Bradley during both the 2001 and 2002 seasons before serving in the same role for then Fire head coach Dave Sarachan in 2003.

Soehn's time in professional soccer also included a distinguished 13-year playing career as a defender/ midfielder in both the indoor and outdoor game in North America. This included four seasons in MLS with Dallas Burn (now known as FC Dallas) and Chicago. After being selected in the second round (13th overall) of the MLS Inaugural Player Draft in February 1996, Soehn missed out on the league's first season of existence through injury before returning to action the next year, as Dallas won the 1997 Lamar Hunt US Open Cup title. In 1998, Soehn returned home to join expansion club Chicago following a mid-season trade from Dallas. He then helped the Illinois-based outfit to a memorable first year of existence, as the Fire won both the MLS Cup and Lamar Hunt US Open Cup titles that year. That was followed by another Lamar Hunt US Open Cup title with Chicago in 2000.

Soehn's playing career also included a spell in the old Canadian Soccer League with Ottawa Intrepid and Hamilton Steelers in 1989 and 1990. He then played a further three seasons in the old American Professional Soccer League (APSL) with Colorado Foxes from 1992 to 1994. During his time with Colorado, the defender/midfielder won two APSL championship titles in 1992 and 1993. He also claimed the 1992 'Professional Cup' North American

Club Championship with Colorado, with the Foxes defeating Whitecaps FC (known then as Vancouver 86ers) 5-3 on aggregate in the first round of the competition. Soehn also spent part of his career playing professional indoor soccer. This included spells with Wichita Wings in the Major Indoor Soccer League/Major Soccer League (1988 to 1992) and National Professional Soccer League (NPSL - 1993 to 1996), Denver Thunder (NPSL - 1992-93 season), and Las Vegas Dustdevils (Continental Indoor Soccer League - 1995 season).

Soehn and his wife Jean have four children named TJ, Payton, Sydney, and Addison.

Dan Lenarduzzi

Director of Soccer Development

Lenarduzzi has been involved in the game both as a player and executive. He was born and raised in Vancouver and followed his two older brothers. Bob and Sam, into professional soccer with Vancouver Whitecaps FC at the age of 18. This made the Lenarduzzi's the first three brothers in North America to play on the same professional sports team. Lenarduzzi played his way up through the British Columbia youth soccer system with Vancouver's Grandview Legion and the BC provincial team program. In 1979, he led the Canadian U-20 national team to qualification for the FIFA U-20 World Cup, having been named a tournament all-star at the qualifying tournament in Honduras. Other accomplishments include his role as captain of the Canadian side at the U-20 World Cup in Japan and professional player with the Whitecaps from 1978 to 1982. Lenarduzzi has a Business Degree in Marketing and Communications from the British Columbia Institute of Technology (BCIT), and 10 years in the marketing industry, including his own company. In his current role with Whitecaps FC, Lenarduzzi oversees the clubs Residency and Women teams in addition to other player development programs and community camps and clinics.

Roberto Cabrone Director of Sales

Roberto Cabrone has been a sales leader in the professional sports industry for more than 13 years. In both Canada and the United States, Cabrone has driven innovative revenue initiatives, developed and executed successful sales programs, and supported the teams' other business endeavours through cross-promotion activities. Cabrone has worked with the BC Lions (Canadian Football League), Vancouver Canucks (National Hockey League), Long Beach Ice Dogs and Victoria Salmon Kings (East Coast Hockey League).

Andrea Wilkinson Director of Partnerships

As the director of partnerships, Wilkinson leads an integrated corporate sponsorship sales and service team, which also drives the club's strategic philanthropic initiatives.

SOCCER DEVELOPMENT



Vancouver Whitecaps FC is modeled after a European-style football club with a development path and programming from grassroots to professional.

The Whitecaps Community Soccer System forms the foundation of the model, helping to grow the game and reaching over 21,000 youths through a combination of free community, school, and pregame clinics.

The Whitecaps Player Development Program is the next step for many of the Community Soccer System youth. Local and regional camps, academies, and showcase events offer aspiring players of all levels the opportunity to further develop their skills under the guidance of professional Whitecaps FC coaches. These programs reach over 7,000 youths and provide a scouting network for player selection to Whitecaps FC Prospect teams.

Whitecaps FC area of Professional Development begins with the Whitecaps FC Prospects and continues to evolve out of a commitment to identify and develop players for future professional athletic pursuits within our club and abroad. Whitecaps FC Prospects provide an environment for prospective elite players to develop and the training ground for the next step: senior women's team and Residency program.

The Whitecaps FC women's team is the pinnacle program for young female athletes to compete in the United Soccer Leagues (USL) W-League. Players are mixed with internationals to represent Whitecaps FC in elite competition in the W-League Western Conference.

Whitecaps FC Residency approaches the top of the model, where the best youth players from across Canada and the world are groomed for professional teams' placement through the integration of professional training and education. This includes participation in the USL Premier Development League during the summer. Residency players can be called into or signed with the men's first team during the season, as well as play in the MLS Reserve Division.

Exceeding Whitecaps FC Soccer Development is the First Team Operations. Whitecaps FC men's team are the top of the club model, with entry into Major League Soccer in 2011.

WHITECAPS FOUNDATION



Founded in 2003, the Whitecaps Foundation is a registered Canadian charity that aims to help create the fittest generation of BC youth by 2020. Through community and school clinics, camps and elite youth training, the Foundation inspires children to get active and eat healthily. In 2010 alone, Whitecaps Foundation programs reached almost 30,000 young people.

The Whitecaps Foundation supports all aspects of Vancouver Whitecaps FC's development programs. Whitecaps FC players take an active role in supporting Foundation initiatives, inspiring children to healthy, active living with school and community clinics, supporting the development of talented youth players, and acting as community ambassadors with appearances for local charities. Vancouver Whitecaps FC aims to be a significant community asset, the Whitecaps Foundation, supported by Whitecaps FC players, is the vehicle to make this happen.

In addition to youth programs, the Whitecaps
Foundation actively supports the Whitecaps FC
women's team, a group of highly talented, committed
amateur athletes. Blazing trails at the highest levels,
the 'Caps women side have significant representation
on the Canadian national team heading to this
year's FIFA World Cup. Through program support,
travel bursaries and other financial assistance, the
Whitecaps Foundation is helping to develop a new
generation of role models for girl soccer players
across the province.

STADIUMS AND FACILITIES

PNE EMPIRE FIELD TEMPORARY STADIUM



3311 East Hastings Street Vancouver, BC V5K 5J3 Capacity: 21,000 Field Size: 115 x 72 yards

With renovations to BC Place Stadium scheduled for completion in September 2011, Vancouver will begin their inaugural season in Major League Soccer by playing in a soccer configuration of 21,000-seat temporary stadium at the Pacific National Exhibition's Empire Fields. The temporary stadium is located on the site of the old Empire Stadium, which from 1974 to 1983 served as the original home of the Whitecaps when they played in the old North American Soccer League (NASL).

The Empire Fields temporary stadium was constructed in just 111 days by Nussli Special Events (Canada) using a modular design developed in Switzerland and officially opened on June 15, 2010. Its artificial playing surface is FIFA-approved 2-Star FieldTurf.

The BC Lions Football Club played their entire 2010 Canadian Football League (CFL) home season

at the stadium, with the first sporting event there being a June 20, 2010 preseason game against the Edmonton Eskimos which finished in a 32-36 loss in front of 24,763. The Lions then established the stadium attendance record of 27,528 in their league home opener on July 10, 2010 in an 18-37 loss to the Saskatchewan Roughriders. The Lions then lost three more games at the new stadium, before finally giving the facility its first win on September 11, 2010 in a 37-16 triumph over the Toronto Argonauts in front of 22,703.

Whitecaps FC will play 14 Major League Soccer (MLS) games and at least one Nutrilite Canadian Championship game at Empire Field before moving to BC Place Stadium in October. The final sporting event held at the stadium will be the 'Caps September 24, 2011, home game against Seattle Sounders FC.

The temporary stadium will be taken down following the completion of BC Place Stadium, however the playing surface and the four main lighting towers will remain as a legacy for community use.

BC PLACE STADIUM

Whitecaps FC will move to a renovated BC Place Stadium following the completion of the second phase of upgrades in 2011. The 'Caps first game will October 2, 2011, against Portland Timbers. The Whitecaps have a proud history with BC Place. In what was the first sporting event to be played in the stadium, a sold-out crowd of 60,342 saw the Whitecaps defeat Seattle Sounders 2-1 on June 20, 1983.

Phase one was completed for the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games. The \$65 million renovation for phase one included improved access for persons with disabilities, and the redevelopment of all common spaces, concessions, washrooms, exterior plazas, media facilities, dressing rooms, and general public areas. Phase one also included a comprehensive refurbishment of all suites, and the establishment of a club seat area.

Phase two of the renovation plans are currently underway and scheduled to be completed in September 2011. The first sporting event at the stadium will be on September 30, 2011, when the BC Lions will play the Edmonton Eskimos in a CFL regular season game. The \$458 million renovation for phase two includes the installation of a state-of-the-art retractable roof, as well as a centrally hung electronic scoreboard. Additional planned soccer-specific renovations - designed to increase the intimacy of the venue - include modular floor-level hospitality areas, floor-level seats (bringing fans closer to the pitch), and an upper deck draping that will effectively limit the capacity of the stadium to approximately 21,000 seats (from 59,000). The building plans also include a new synthetic FIFA-approved 2-Star FieldTurf.

TRAINING FACILITY



From the start of their inaugural season in Major League Soccer, Whitecaps FC will train at Empire Field for the foreseeable future. Training sessions at home will run from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m., with media availability to follow each session.

National Soccer Development Centre

Whitecaps FC are committed to building a worldclass training facility for not only players, but also for coaches and referees, on a 30 to 40-acre footprint in the Metro Vancouver region.

The National Soccer Development Centre (NSDC) will provide access to nation-leading sport science programs and new development opportunities for soccer clubs throughout the province of British Columbia.

The \$31.5-million capital project, which includes a commitment of \$17.5 million from the BC provincial government, will serve as the training base for the Whitecaps FC men's and women's teams, the club's full-time Residency program, youth sides, and visiting teams.

Plans for the NSDC also include a clubhouse for national and professional teams, a training facility, and several fields.

NUTRILITE CANADIAN CHAMPIONSHIP

Formed as a competition in 2008, the Nutrilite Canadian Championship was developed by the Canadian Soccer Association and Canada's three professional clubs - Montreal Impact, Toronto FC, and Vancouver Whitecaps FC. Currently in its third year of existence, the winner of the annual tournament not only claims the Voyageurs Cup as Canadian champions, they also earn Canada's lone spot in the CONCACAF Champions League. A 24-club competition that involves the top sides from North America, Central America, and the Caribbean, the CONCACAF Champions League qualifies the confederation's representative for the annual FIFA Club World Cup.

The first Nutrilite Canadian Championship tournament took place in 2008, with Montreal surprising many by claiming the inaugural title ahead of the more-fancied Toronto FC. The Whitecaps campaign that year did not go according to plan, as a pair of defeats to the Impact left Vancouver with an uphill battle to win the Voyageurs Cup. To their credit, the 'Caps did play an important role in the eventual outcome of the 2008 tournament after claiming a famous away win over Toronto FC before drawing with the Major League Soccer (MLS) club at Swangard Stadium. Montreal went on to have an impressive campaign in the inaugural CONCACAF Champions League, as they reached the quarterfinals.

The 2009 competition started disappointingly for the Whitecaps following a tournament-opening defeat at Toronto FC. Vancouver would bounce back to challenge the MLS club for the title after back-to-back wins over Montreal, and a famous 2-0 victory over TFC at Swangard. Despite those efforts, the 'Caps missed out on winning the Voyageurs Cup on goal difference, as Toronto FC recorded a remarkable 6-1 win over the Impact in Montreal in the competition's

final match. TFC went on to the preliminary round of the 2009-10 CONCACAF Champions League as Canadian champions, where they failed to reach the competition's group stages after losing 1-0 on aggregate to Puerto Rico Islanders.

The 2010 Nutrilite Canadian Championship saw the Whitecaps go undefeated in four tournament matches, but again come up short to Toronto FC for the national crown. The 'Caps began the tournament with two home matches, a 1-1 draw with Montreal and a 0-0 result against TFC. Vancouver looked to be on their way to a crucial away win at Montreal in their third match, but the Impact came back for a 1-1 draw that ended the 'Caps title hopes and handed TFC the Voyageurs Cup for the second straight season. The blue and white finished with a 0-0 result in Toronto, giving them four draws in four matches. TFC improved their performance in the regional tournament, making the group stage of the 2010-11 CONCACAF Champions League, but failed to make it to the knockout round.

This year, the annual tournament takes on a new format as NASL club FC Edmonton enter the fold for the first time. The old round-robin format of the competition has been replaced by a home-andaway semifinal stage, followed by a home-and-away championship final series. Vancouver Whitecaps FC, playing in the tournament for the first time as an MLS club, will face the Montreal Impact in one semifinal, while defending champions Toronto FC match up against newcomers FC Edmonton in the other semifinal. The 'Caps play the first leg at Montreal's Stade Saputo on Wednesday, April 27, before hosting the Quebec-based club at Empire Field on Wednesday, May 4. The two-leg championship final series will be played on Wednesday, May 18, and Wednesday, May 25.

FIRST TEAM

FIRST TEAM COACHES

TEITUR THORDARSON

PROFILE

With nearly four decades of experience in European soccer, Teitur Thordarson became Vancouver Whitecaps FC men team's head coach on December 11, 2007. Now entering his fourth season with the club, the former Iceland international was announced as Whitecaps FC's inaugural head coach for Major League Soccer (MLS) on September 2, 2010. Thordarson holds a Union of European Football Associations (UEFA) Pro Coaching License.

UNITED STATES SOCCER FEDERATION DIVISION-2 PROFESSIONAL LEAGUE

After signing a one-year contract extension on November 30, 2009, Thordarson led Whitecaps FC into their final season as a North American second division club in 2010. Plaving in the United States Soccer Federation Division-2 Professional League (USSF D-2), Thordarson led the club to a secondplace finish in the NASL Conference standings with a record of 10W-5L-15D, despite making several changes to his squad during the summer transfer window. This included a league low 22 goals conceded during the regular season. As the fifth seed in the USSF D-2 playoffs, Thordarson's squad defeated MLS expansion cousins Portland Timbers 2-1 on aggregate in the first round before seeing their campaign end abruptly in the semifinals versus Puerto Rico Islanders, as Vancouver fell 2-0 on aggregate. Thordarson was also left frustrated in the 2010 Nutrilite Canadian Championship, as four consecutive draws saw Whitecaps FC finish second behind defending champions Toronto FC in the threeclub competition.

UNITED SOCCER LEAGUES FIRST DIVISION

His first year in North American professional soccer

could not have gone much better. In a season that included victories over Major League Soccer clubs Los Angeles Galaxy (international friendly) and Toronto FC (Nutrilite Canadian Championship), Thordarson led the Whitecaps to a second-place finish in the USL First Division standings with a record of 15 wins, seven defeats, and eight draws. Under his guidance, the 'Caps then defeated Minnesota Thunder and Montreal Impact in two playoff series contests before claiming the club's second USL-1 championship title in three seasons with a 2-1 victory over Puerto Rico Islanders at Swangard Stadium on October 12, 2008.

Thordarson's second season in charge proved to be more of a challenge. After making several changes to the squad in the off-season, the Whitecaps endured a more difficult USL-1 regular season campaign, as they claimed the seventh and final playoff spot in the league standings. Though the odds were against the Blue and White making a postseason run, Thordarson's side upset second-seeded Carolina RailHawks and regular season champions Portland Timbers to reach the 2009 USL-1 Championship Series, where the club's championship title defence came to a disappointing end versus Canadian rivals Montreal Impact. It was also in Thordarson's second year in charge that the 'Caps suffered heartbreak in the 2009 Nutrilite Canadian Championship. Major League Soccer club Toronto FC edged Vancouver to Canada's lone spot in the 2009-10 CONCACAF Champions League on goal difference, despite both sides finishing the three-club competition with a 3W-1L-0D record. TFC's stunning 6-1 victory at Montreal on June 18, 2009, saw the MLS club claim their first-ever piece of silverware.

ICELAND

Before joining Whitecaps FC, Thordarson returned to his native Iceland to coach Knattspyrnufélag Reykjavíkur (KR Reykjavík or Reykjavík Football

Club) to a second-place finish in Iceland's top-flight Landsbankadeild, as well as a spot in the 2006 Icelandic Cup final.

INTERNATIONAL

With Estonia's national side, Thordarson helped the Baltic nation move up from 145th (January 1996) to 68th (November 1999) in the FIFA World Rankings. Though he was Estonia's first foreign coach since the country's independence in 1991, Thordarson's efforts in developing Estonian soccer earned him a medal from the President of Estonia in February 2000.

The turn of the millennium saw Thordarson return to the Norwegian game for a second spell with Brann. He led the club to a second-place finish in the 2000 Tippeligaen season, and spent two more seasons with the Bergen outfit before making a return to another former club in Lyn Oslo in 2003. His final two years in Norway saw him coach second division club U11/Kisa in 2004 and 2005.

SCANDINAVIA

Thordarson's extensive coaching resume spans over two decades. He started his career in 1987 with the last club he played for in Swedish outfit Skövde AlK. The following year, he landed his first head-coaching role in Norway's top-flight Tippeligaen when he joined SK Brann. He led the Bergen club to the 1988 Norwegian Football Cup final and spent the following two seasons at Brann before ending his first spell by moving to Lyn Oslo for two seasons in 1991. After a season with Norwegian second division club Grei Oslo, Thordarson took charge of Lillestrøm SK and led them to second and fourth-place Tippeligaen finishes in 1994 and 1995 respectively.

ESTONIA

In 1996, Thordarson moved to Estonia to become head coach of their national team and Estonian club FC Flora Tallinn. Under his direction, Flora were crowned champions of the Estonian Meistrilliga in the 1997-98 and 1998 seasons. He also led the club to Estonian Cup and Estonian Super Cup titles in 1998.

PLAYING CAREER

Before embarking on his extensive career in coaching, Thordarson enjoyed a successful playing career as a striker for nearly two decades. He signed his first professional contract when he joined hometown club Íróttabandalag Akraness in 1969. He went on to score 51 goals in 99 appearances for ÍA, with the striker claiming four Icelandic championship titles with the club between 1969 and 1976.

After a season with Swedish second division club Jönköpings Södra IF in 1977, Thordarson helped Östers IF to three league championships in Sweden's top-flight Allsvenskan between 1978 and 1981. He then made an influential move to French soccer when he joined Racing Club de Lens in 1981. It was at the northern French club that Thordarson scored 19 goals during the 1981-82 Ligue 1 season, with the striker finishing fourth in the French top-flight's goalscoring charts. It was also at Lens that Thordarson played for former Liverpool, Lyon, and France manager Gerard Houllier before he experienced the tutelage of another top coach in Arsene Wenger at Association Sportive de Cannes. In the early 1980's, the current manager of English Premier League giants Arsenal was an assistant coach at AS Cannes. Thordarson then had a spell in Switzerland with Yverdon-Sport FC before returning to Sweden in 1985 to complete his playing career with Östers IF and Skövde AIK.

A former Iceland national team captain, Thordarson also had an impressive international career, as he scored nine goals in 41 appearances for his country between 1972 and 1985.

COLIN MILLER

PROFILE

Inducted into the Canadian Soccer Hall of Fame and Museum in 2005, Colin Miller brings decades of experience as a player and coach to the role of Whitecaps men's team assistant coach. The former Canadian men's national team captain was appointed to Teitur Thordarson's coaching staff on February 11, 2010. In the spring of 2010, Miller briefly served as interim head coach of the Whitecaps FC Residency program. Miller's credentials include a Canadian Soccer Association 'A' License, as well as 'A' and 'B' Coaching Licenses from the Union of European Football Associations (UEFA).

UNITED STATES SOCCER FEDERATION DIVISION-2 PROFESSIONAL LEAGUE

In what was Whitecaps FC's final season as a North American second division club, Miller helped the Blue and White to a second-place finish in the NASL Conference of the United States Soccer Federation Division-2 Professional League (USSF D-2) and a semifinal berth in the playoffs. Working primarily on defensive matters, Miller's efforts resulted in a league low 22 goals conceded in USSF D-2 and a single-season club record of 18 shutouts.

UNITED SOCCER LEAGUES PREMIER DEVELOPMENT LEAGUE

Most recently, Miller served as head coach of the University of the Fraser Valley Cascades women's team, as well as head coach of the expansion Victoria Highlanders FC in the United Soccer Leagues Premier Development League (PDL). In what was their inaugural PDL season in 2009, Miller led the Vancouver Island outfit to a fifth-place finish in the league's Western Conference, Northwest Division standings with a record of 6W-6L-4D. Miller also worked recently with both the boys program at Langley United Youth Soccer Association and the girls program at Langley FC in the Fraser Valley.

His other significant coaching role was with the Abbotsford Soccer Association, where he served as head coach between 2000 and 2010. Miller played a key role in the development of the Fraser Valley club's elite players during the past decade, with his 'School of Excellence' considered to be one of the best player development programs in Canada. His efforts saw more than 40 players earn university scholarships across North America, while five of the club's youth teams qualified for Canadian Club Championship tournaments, with two of those sides winning their respective age-group titles. Miller also coached Abbotsford Soccer's PDL team (then known as Abbotsford Rangers) to a first-place finish in the league's Western Conference, Northwest Division standings in 2006.

INTERNATIONAL

With over a decade of experience as a professional coach, Miller's first coaching role came in Scotland with Hamilton Academical, where he served as player-manager between July 1998 and August 1999. His coaching resume includes a short spell as first-team coach at Derby County FC during the 2007-08 English Premier League season, as well as stints as an assistant to both the Canadian men's and women's national teams. Miller also served as interim head coach of the Canadian men's national team during three friendly matches versus Finland (October 11, 2003), Czech Republic (November 15, 2003), and Republic of Ireland (November 18, 2003).

PAYING CAREER

Before embarking on a career in coaching, Miller enjoyed a long and distinguished playing career that spanned two decades in Canada, England, and Scotland. He made 61 senior international appearances for Canada between 1983 and 1997, with his debut coming as an 18-year-old in a 2-0 friendly defeat to his birth nation Scotland on June 19, 1983. Not only did Miller serve as national team captain, he was also a member of the Canadian team that appeared at the 1986 FIFA World Cup in Mexico. The midfielder's appearances also included Canada's qualifying campaigns for the 1990, 1994, and 1998 FIFA World Cup tournaments. Miller also captained Canada at the 1982 CONCACAF U-20 Championship in Guatemala.

At club level, Miller started his career in the old North American Soccer League (NASL) with Toronto Blizzard, where he played three seasons between 1982 and 1984. Following the demise of the NASL, Miller moved back to Scotland and joined Rangers FC. With the Old Firm club, he won the 1985 Glasgow Cup after a 5-0 win over Queen's Park in the final, as well as the Scottish Premier Reserve League title during the 1985-86 season. The midfielder then headed south to England for a spell with Doncaster Rovers, where he appeared in both the 1986-87 and 1987-88 English Division Three (now League One) seasons with the South Yorkshire club before returning to Canada for his first spell with Hamilton Steelers of the old Canadian Soccer League (CSL) in 1988. Miller also played for the Southern Ontario outfit during the 1990 CSL campaign. The midfielder's longest club stint was in Scotland with Hamilton Academical, as Miller made close to 200 total appearances during his first spell with the club between September 1988 and March 1994. He remained in Scotland and played for St. Johnstone and Heart of Midlothian before winning the Scottish First Division title with Dumfermline Athletic during the 1995-96 season. Miller then had a spell with Ayr United before returning to Hamilton Academical as player-manager.

PERSONAL

Born in Law, Scotland, Miller grew up in Allanton, Scotland, before moving to East Vancouver when he was 10 years old. He currently resides in Abbotsford, BC, with his wife Maria and their two teenage children Ryan and Sarah.

DENIS HAMLETT

PROFILE

With over a decade's coaching experience in Major League Soccer, Denis Hamlett joined Whitecaps FC as an assistant coach on January 8, 2011. A former MLS player, Hamlett spent 12 years on the coaching staff at Chicago Fire, with his last two years in the role of head coach of the Illinois-based outfit. Hamlett holds a United States Soccer Federation 'A' Coaching License.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER

Following a spell as community relations' liaison with the Fire, Hamlett's coaching career started in 1998 when he became Chicago's second assistant coach for their inaugural MLS season. Serving under current United States national team head coach Bob Bradley, Hamlett helped the Fire claim a memorable double of MLS Cup and Lamar Hunt US Open Cup titles in the club's first year of existence. Chicago would also claim a second Lamar Hunt US Open Cup title and be runners-up for the MLS Cup in 2000. It was also in his role as Fire second assistant coach that Hamlett coached current Whitecaps FC director of soccer operations Tom Soehn.

In 2001, Hamlett became Chicago's first assistant coach, with Soehn joining the Fire coaching staff following his retirement from playing. Chicago made the playoffs in the 2001 and 2002 seasons before Dave Sarachan succeeded Bradley as Fire head coach in 2003. Hamlett then assisted the Fire to a third Lamar Hunt US Open Cup title and a runnersup spot for the MLS Cup that year. As first assistant coach, the Fire were also runners-up for the Lamar Hunt US Open Cup in 2004 before Chicago claimed the title for a fourth time in 2006.

Hamlett served a tenth season as Fire assistant coach in 2007 before succeeding Juan Carlos Osorio as Chicago's fourth head coach on January 11, 2008. In his two seasons as Fire head coach. Hamlett led Chicago to the MLS Eastern Conference Championship Final in both the 2008 and 2009 seasons, as well as the 2009 North American SuperLiga final. Following his departure from Chicago on November 24, 2009, Hamlett coached the men's soccer team at Chicago's Illinois Institute of Technology in the autumn of 2010. MLS player, Hamlett spent 12 years on the coaching staff at Chicago Fire, with his last two years in the role of head coach of the Illinois-based outfit. Hamlett holds a United States Soccer Federation 'A' Coaching License.

PLAYING CAREER

As a player, Hamlett enjoyed a fine NCAA Division I career with George Mason University. After playing his freshman year at the University of North Carolina Wilmington, Hamlett became a three-year starter for the Patriots between 1989 and 1991, with the former defender earning an induction into George Mason's Men's Soccer Hall of Fame in May 2006. In

1992, Hamlett embarked on a professional career with Fort Lauderdale Strikers of the old American Professional Soccer League. It was also in 1992 that the former defender started a professional indoor soccer career with Harrisburg Heat of the old National Professional Soccer League. He played two seasons with Harrisburg before joining Anaheim Splash of the Continental Indoor Soccer League in 1994.

After two seasons with Anaheim, Hamlett played in the inaugural MLS season of 1996 after being selected 12th overall in the league's Inaugural Player Draft by Colorado Rapids. His efforts for Colorado that season earned him the BIC Tough Defender of the Year Award. Hamlett's playing career was unfortunately cut short by injury in 1997.

PERSONAL

Born in Puerto Limón, Costa Rica, Hamlett was 10 years old when he moved to the United States with his family. They settled in Silver Spring, Maryland - close to Washington, DC - where he attended and played soccer for Albert Einstein High School in Kensington, Maryland. Hamlett and his wife Jackie currently reside in Chicago, Illinois and Vancouver, BC.

MIKE SALMON

PROFILE

With two decades of experience as a professional goalkeeper in England, Mike Salmon enters his third year as Vancouver Whitecaps FC men's team and Residency program goalkeeping coach. A highly qualified goalkeeping coach, Salmon holds an English Football Association Goalkeeping 'A' License and a Union of European Football Associations (UEFA) 'A' Coaching License.

UNITED STATES SOCCER FEDERATION DIVISION-2 PROFESSIONAL LEAGUE

Salmon's work during the 2010 season involved working with USSF D-2 Goalkeeper of the Year Nolly, as well as Thomas, and Dan Pelc from the men's team. He helped the Blue and White to a second-place finish in the NASL Conference of the United States Soccer Federation Division-2 Professional League (USSF D-2) and a semifinal berth in the playoffs. Salmon's work with the 'keepers resulted in

a league low 22 goals conceded in USSF D-2 and a single-season club record of 18 shutouts. Salmon also worked with Callum Irving and Sean Melvin in the Residency squad.

UNITED SOCCER LEAGUES FIRST DIVISION

In 2008, Salmon worked closely with goalkeepers

Prior to immigrating to Canada, Salmon served as the academy goalkeeper coach at English Premier League giants Arsenal FC. Between 2002 and 2007, Salmon's role at Arsenal involved coaching the club's young goalkeepers, with a particular focus on the U-18 keepers at the North London outfit. He was instrumental in the decision to bring the current young Arsenal first-team goalkeeper, Wojciech Szczesny, to The Gunners and played a large part in his development for two seasons prior to immigrating to Vancouver. Before joining Arsenal's youth development staff, Salmon also served as first-team goalkeeping coach at Gillingham FC between 2002 and 2004.

PLAYING CAREER

Salmon's long and well-traveled playing career began in 1980 when he signed as a youth trainee with Blackburn Rovers. After a loan spell with Chester City in 1982, Salmon made over 100 appearances for Stockport County between 1983 and 1986. Spells at Bolton Wanderers and Wrexham ensued before he embarked on a notable 10-year spell with Charlton Athletic in 1989. He made close to 150 appearances for The Addicks before joining his last club in Ipswich Town in 1999. He remained with the East Anglian outfit until his retirement in 2002. He made over 500 first team appearances during his 22 year playing career.

Born in Leyland, Lancashire, England, Salmon came to the attention of Whitecaps FC after moving with his family to Vancouver in October 2007. Salmon and his wife Katy live in North Vancouver, BC, with their two children Becky and Jack. Salmon interests include a variety of sports like golf, skiing, and snowboarding, as well as playing musical instruments like the guitar and piano.

PROFILE

A centre back that has represented his native New Zealand at both youth and senior international level, Michael Boxall joined Whitecaps FC after being taken as the first overall pick in the 2011 MLS Supplemental Draft on Jan. 18, 2011. The native of Auckland, New Zealand, enjoyed a stellar NCAA Division I career at University of California, Santa Barbara (UCSB).

NEW ZEALAND

As a teenager, Boxall played for several clubs in his hometown of Auckland, New Zealand. They included Ellerslie AFC and Three Kings United FC, who play in the Northern Region Football League (NRFL). As a member of Central United FC, the defender was named the club's Young Player of the Year in 2006 before leading the Auckland-based club to the NRFL Premier League title in 2007. It was also in the 2006-07 season that Boxall helped Auckland City FC to the New Zealand Football Championship title, with the centre back being named the club's Young Player of the Year at season's end.

COLLEGE

2010: As a senior, Boxall started all 21 of his appearances that season. He earned National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) and College Soccer News Third Team All-American honours, and was named Big West Conference Defender of the Year. He also made the All-Big West

Conference First Team for a second time and the All-Far West Region First Team after helping UCSB post 10 shutouts and a goals-against average of 0.77. He assisted on David Opoku's goal in a 2-0 home win over University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) on Sept. 24. 2009: As a junior, the centre back was named to the All-Big West Conference First Team after being one of only four players to start all 24 matches for the Gauchos, with Boxall setting a UCSB record for minutes played in a season at 2,185. He also helped the team set UCSB records for consecutive shutouts (six) and single season shutouts (16). He was also named to both the TopDrawerSoccer.com Team of the Week and College Soccer News National Team of the Week after leading UCSB to a pair of clean sheets versus Big West Conference rivals California State University, Northridge on Oct. 28 and University of California, Irvine on Oct. 31. Boxall's Ione UCSB goal was a match-winning header in a 1-0 victory over California State University, Northridge in the Big West Conference Championship semifinals on Nov. 11. He also recorded two assists that season, including David Walker's match winner in a 1-0 victory over Wofford College during the first round of the NCAA Championship on Nov. 19. 2008: Boxall appeared in all but one of his 21 appearances for UCSB, with the defender recording two assists in the process. His first assist set up Chris Pontius' equalizer in a 4-2 home win over University of Evansville on Sept. 18. He also recorded an assist on Nick Perera's equalizing goal during a 2-1 victory at University of California, Irvine on Oct. 4. His efforts that season earned him an All-Big West Conference Honourable Mention. 2007: Following in the tradition of previous New Zealanders to have played NCAA Division I men's soccer at UCSB, Boxall saw his freshman year cut short by a knee injury after the centre back started all but two of his 12 appearances for the Gauchos. During those 12 appearances, the defender helped UCSB concede only eight goals and register a 0.80 goals-against average.

INTERNATIONAL

Boxall has represented his native New Zealand at both the youth and senior international level. U-20: As a member of the Junior All-Whites, the centre back made 14 appearances for New Zealand's U-20 squad, including starts in all three of his country's Group C matches at the 2007 FIFA U-20 World Cup in Canada. They included defeats to Portugal (July 2, 2007) and Gambia (July 5, 2007) at BMO Field in Toronto, Ontario, and to Mexico (July 8, 2007) at Commonwealth Stadium in Edmonton, Alberta. U-23: In 2008, the defender helped the Oly-Whites qualify for their first-ever Men's Olympic Football Tournament in Beijing, China. His 12 appearances for New Zealand's U-23 Olympic squad included all three of his country's matches in Group C at the Beijing Olympics. After appearing as a substitute in the 1-1 draw with hosts China on Aug. 7, 2008, Boxall started New Zealand's 5-0 defeat to Brazil on Aug. 10, 2008, and 1-0 defeat to Belgium on Aug. 13, 2008. Boxall played centre back and right fullback at Mount Albert Grammar School (MAGS) in his hometown of Auckland, New Zealand. As Lions team captain during his senior year in 2006, the defender led MAGS to a second Knockout Cup title in three years, the Auckland Secondary School Soccer

Association Championship title, and a second-place finish at the New Zealand Secondary School Soccer Championship. During his time at MAGS, Boxall helped the Lions to league titles in 2004 and 2005, as well as a national championship title in 2005.

A goalkeeper with over a decade's worth of experience in Major League Soccer, Joe Cannon joined Whitecaps FC after being selected in the eighth round (16th overall) of the 2010 MLS Expansion Draft. A two-time MLS Goalkeeper of the Year, the former San Jose Earthquakes shot-stopper played for the previous edition of the Earthquakes (now Houston Dynamo), Colorado Rapids, and Los Angeles Galaxy. This included an MLS Cup title with San Jose in 2001.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER

2010: Cannon's third season with the Earthquakes saw him record an impressive six shutouts in 12 appearances. However, injury cut short his campaign in San Jose, as he suffered a broken left ankle in training on Aug. 17. He was unable to appear for the Earthquakes' first appearance in the MLS Cup Playoffs since their return to the league back in 2008, with San Jose reaching the Eastern Conference Championship before losing 1-0 at Cannon's former club and eventual MLS Cup champions Colorado Rapids on Nov. 13. On Nov. 24, Whitecaps FC acquired the goalkeeper during the 2010 MLS Expansion Draft. 2009: The 'keeper recorded three shutouts in 28 appearances with San Jose that season. In earning his third clean sheet of the season with the Earthquakes, Cannon passed Richard Mulrooney as the club's all-time leader in career starts (156) and minutes (14.211) following a 1-0 home win over New York Red Bulls on Oct. 3, 2008; Cannon

returned home to the Bay Area when the re-born San Jose Earthquakes acquired the keeper from Los Angeles Galaxy in exchange for allocation money on Jan. 10. He led MLS in saves with 124 and had nine shutouts in 30 regular season appearances. He was also one of only six players to appear in every minute of regular season action for his club (2,700). His service to the Bay Area community was awarded again with a second US Soccer Foundation Humanitarian of the Year award, 2007: In his lone season with Los Angeles Galaxy, Cannon registered five clean sheets in 29 appearances for the Southern California outfit. In what was David Beckham's first season with the Galaxy, the shot-stopper made his LA debut in a goalless draw at Houston Dynamo on Apr. 8. He then made his 200th MLS career appearance and earned his 55th career shutout in a 0-0 draw at expansion club Toronto FC on Aug. 5. Cannon finished his ninth season in MLS by sitting fourth all-time in league history in saves (902) and shutouts (56), while he sat fifth all-time among MLS keepers for wins (84) and save percentage (73.6). Cannon also started all five of the Galaxy's games in their march to the North American SuperLiga final that season. This included a clean sheet in the 2-0 semifinal win over D.C. United on Aug. 15. He then played the first half of the 0-0 draw between the Galaxy and then United Soccer Leagues First Division (USL-1) side Whitecaps FC at BC Place in Vancouver, BC, on Nov. 7. 2006: With seven shutouts in 28 appearances, Cannon enjoyed a productive

fourth and final season with Colorado, as he helped the Rapids back to the Western Conference Championship before they fell to eventual MLS Cup champions Houston Dynamo on Nov. 5. He was a finalist for the MLS Goalkeeper of the Year award and earned a third selection to the MLS All-Star Game, where he played the second half for the MLS All-Stars in a 1-0 victory over English Premier League giants Chelsea FC in Bridgeview, Illinois, on Aug. 5. Cannon was MLS Player of the Week in Week 25. He also earned his second selection to the MLS All-Star Game, as he played the second half for MLS All-Stars in a 3-2 win over the United States national team in Washington, DC, on Aug. 3. Cannon also started both matches of San Jose's Playoff Quarterfinal series defeat to Columbus Crew on Sept. 25 and 28. Cannon also made three starts for the Earthquakes in the CONCACAF Champions' Cup (now CONCACAF Champions League). They included both legs of their Round of 16 clash versus Honduras' Club Deportivo Olimpia on Mar. 13 and 16, as well as the guarterfinal, first leg, defeat away to Mexico's Pachuca Club de Fútbol on Apr. 17. 2001: His third season with the Earthquakes was a highly successful one for Cannon, as he led San Jose to their first-ever MLS Cup title. 1998: In his first season as a professional, Cannon made the All A-League Second Team after registering 12 clean sheets and a goals-against average of 0.80 as a member of former A-League club San Diego Flash. Compiling 21 wins and seven defeats, the keeper was named the club's Most Valuable Player that season after leading the Southern California outfit to top spot in the A-League's Western Conference, Pacific Division standings. San Diego eliminated Whitecaps FC (known then as Vancouver 86ers) in the playoff quarterfinals before the Flash fell to Minnesota Thunder in the Western Conference Final.

Cannon started his NCAA Division I career at University of California, Santa Barbara, where he played his freshman year for the Gauchos before transferring to Santa Clara University for his sophomore year in 1995. The keeper was a three-time All-West Coast Conference and two-time All-Far West Region selection before earning All-America honours as a senior for the Broncos in 1997. He finished his college career with a 0.94 GAA and 15 shutouts.

INTERNATIONAL

Senior: Cannon has made two appearances at the senior international level for the United States. His

USA debut came in a 2-1 friendly win over New Zealand in Richmond, Virginia, on June 8, with the keeper replacing Marcus Hahnemann in the second half and earning a clean sheet. His second and last appearance for his country came on Mar. 19, 2005, when he started the 1-0 friendly win over Honduras in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Cannon started his soccer career with Mountain
View Los Altos Soccer Club in Bay Area of Northern
California. In 1993, he helped Mountain View Los

Fluent in English and Spanish, Cannon enjoys playing golf and beach volleyball when not concentrating on his soccer career. His commitment to the community has seen him work with autistic children at the Independent Peer Socialization Training Program (IPSTP) in Santa Clara, California. In Dec. 1999, 2000, and 2001, the keeper also took part in the Oakland Ballet's 'Celebrity Nutcracker', while he was co-Grand Marshall at the San Jose Holiday Parade on Dec. 2, 2001. A member of a sporting family, his twin brother Jon played minor league baseball in the San Francisco Giants organization, while his younger brother Colt has been on the professional skateboarding circuit. U-20: Davies took part in two Florida-based training camps with Canada's U-20 national team in Dec. 2008 and Jan./ Feb. 2009. This included a goal in a 3-0 friendly win over Haiti on Dec. 18 and starting in the 1-0 defeat to the United States on Dec. 22. He also appeared in Watford's 5-0 defeat at Chelsea FC in the third round of the English FA Cup on Jan. 3, 2010. DeMerit's time in English soccer ended after his Watford contract expired at the end of the season. 2008-09: DeMerit made over 30 appearances in his fifth season with Watford, as The Hornets finished 13th in the League Championship standings. He was part of the club's run to the English League Cup quarterfinals, while his only goal that season coming in the fourth round of the English FA Cup, as Watford defeated Crystal Palace FC 4-3 on Jan. 24, 2009. 2007-08: The centre back helped Watford back to the League Championship playoffs after a sixth-place finish in the standings. Though DeMerit served the second half of the season as club captain. Watford's hopes of an English Premier

League return were ended in the playoff semifinals when they lost 6-1 on aggregate to Hull City FC. His only goal that season came on Boxing Day (Dec. 26, 2007) in a 2-2 home draw versus Cardiff City FC. 2006-07: Playing in the top flight of English soccer, DeMerit and Watford endured a difficult season, as The Hornets finished bottom of the English Premier League standings and were subsequently relegated back to the League Championship. The defender, however, helped Watford reach the semifinals of the English FA Cup before losing to Manchester United FC. He had two goals in the Premier League that season versus Portsmouth FC (Nov. 18, 2006) and Blackburn Rovers FC (Jan. 23, 2007). 2005-06: Under the stewardship of manager Adrian Boothrovd, who replaced Lewington in Mar. 2005. DeMerit helped Watford earn promotion to the English Premier League as winners of the League Championship playoffs after a third-place finish in the standings. His three goals that season included the match-winner in the promotion playoff final at the Millennium Stadium in Cardiff, Wales, on May 21, 2006. The Hornets defeated Leeds United FC 3-0, with DeMerit earning the 'Man of the Match' award. 2004-05: The centre back made the move to English league soccer when he signed a one-year contract with second-tier League Championship side Watford FC following a two-week trial. DeMerit's move to The Hornets came after he impressed then Watford manager, and former Vancouver Whitecaps FC midfielder, Ray Lewington during a preseason friendly

in July 2004. The defender played against Watford as a trialist with semi-professional outfit Northwood FC of the seventh-tier Isthmian League Premier Division. DeMerit made his Watford debut in the first round of the English League Cup, as The Hornets defeated Cambridge United 1-0 at home on Aug. 24, 2004. The centre back made over 30 appearances in league and cup play during his first season with Watford, helping the Hertfordshire club to the English League Cup semifinals, where they eventually fell to Liverpool FC. He scored three goals in the League Championship that season. Those goals came against Crewe Alexandra FC (Jan. 15, 2005), Ipswich Town FC (Feb. 22, 2005), and Leicester City FC (Mar. 15, 2005), 2003-04; DeMerit's start in English soccer came in the ninth tier with Southall FC of the Combined Counties Football League. DeMerit had another fine season for the Flames in his senior year. He was again named to the NSCAA All-Midwest Region First Team and the All-Horizon League First Team after appearing in every match for UIC that year. His four goals include strikes in three straight matches versus University of Detroit Mercy (Oct. 26), University of Wisconsin Milwaukee (Nov. 3), and Loyola University Chicago (Nov. 10). 2000: The defender was named to the NSCAA All-Midwest Region First Team, and for a second time, the All-MCC First Team after a fine junior year with the Flames. For a second straight season. DeMerit made the MCC All-Tournament Team after leading UIC to a second MCC men's soccer title. The Flames also reached the 'Sweet 16' of the NCAA Tournament

before losing 6-0 to Stanford University on Nov. 25. 1999: The centre back's sophomore season. with the Flames earned him a spot in the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) All-Midwest Region Second Team and the All-Midwestern Collegiate Conference (MCC) First Team. DeMerit made the MCC All-Tournament Team after leading the Flames to their first MCC men's soccer title and the NCAA Tournament. This included the match-winner in the MCC Tournament quarterfinal win over Cleveland State University. Nolly saw limited first-team action in his second MLS season. In a June 9 defeat away to Colorado Rapids, Nolly earned a clean sheet in the second half of the game after replacing Garlick at halftime. His only start of the campaign came in a 6-0 away defeat to New York Red Bulls on Aug. 26, where he made seven saves for the club. The goalkeeper also started RSL's two matches in the Lamar Hunt US Open Cup, as he faced former USL-1 club Virginia Beach Mariners in the third round on July 11 and MLS rivals Colorado in fourth round on Aug. 2. With RSL reserves, Nolly recorded four wins and two clean sheets in his nine appearances that season, 2005; Nolly was selected by expansion club Real Salt Lake (RSL) in the second round (22nd overall) of the 2005 MLS SuperDraft on Jan. 14. In his first start for RSL on May 14. Nolly recorded nine saves to earn the Utah-based club a 2-1 home victory over Los Angeles Galaxy. All-America Third Team. The keeper started playing organized soccer as a four-year-old with Club Columbine, who later merged with Lakewood United Soccer Club to form Colorado Rush Soccer Club in Littleton. He played as a midfielder/forward until the age of 13, when he changed his position to goalkeeper.

Nolly majored in Education at Indiana University before marrying his fiancée Alicia in her native Utah on Dec. 6, 2008. Though born in Florida, and raised in Maryland and Colorado, Nolly currently resides in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Though born in Kingstown on the island of Saint Vincent, Stewart grew up in the nearby suburb of Questelles. The midfielder/striker was a student at Intermediate High School in Kingstown from 2003 to 2009. Beforehand, Stewart studied at Kingstown Anglican Primary School.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

I. MLS ROSTER COMPOSITION

A Major League Soccer club's first team roster is comprised of up to 30 players. All 30 players are eligible for selection to each 18-player game-day squad during the regular season and playoffs.

Salary & Budget:

- Players occupying roster spots 1-20 count against the club's 2011 salary budget of \$2,675,000, and are referred to collectively as the club's Salary Budget Players.
- o Roster spots 19 and 20 are not required to be filled, and teams may spread their salary budget across only 18 Salary Budget Players. A minimum salary budget charge will be imputed against a team's salary budget for each unfilled senior roster slot below 18. o The maximum budget charge for a single player is \$335,000.*
- o A Designated Player counts \$335,000 against the club's salary budget, unless the player joins his club in the middle of the season, in which case his budget charge will be \$167,500.
- * See section entitled Allocation Money below, under Player Acquisition Mechanisms, for details on buying down a player's budget charge.
- Players occupying roster spots 21-30 do not count against the club's salary budget, and are referred to collectively as the club's Off-Budget Players (maximum of 10 per team).
- o All Generation adidas players are Off-Budget players.
- Players occupying roster spots 1-24 will earn at least \$42,000 in 2011.
- Players occupying roster spots 25-30 will earn at least \$32,600 in 2011.
- o Clubs may elect to leave up to two of these roster

spots (25-30) vacant and use \$35,000 for each empty spot as allocation money.

o Clubs may sign up to two Home Grown Players to Generation adidas contracts.

Age Designations:

 Any player making \$32,600 must be under the age 25 (does not turn 25 or older in 2011).

Domestic/International:

- In 2011, a total of 144 international slots are divided among the 18 clubs. Each club began with eight international slots, which are tradable. There is no limit on the number of international slots on each club's roster
- o The remaining roster slots must belong to domestic players. For clubs based in the United States, a domestic player is either a U.S. citizen, a permanent resident (green card holder) or the holder of other special status (e.g., refugee or asylum status).
- The two MLS clubs based in Canada Toronto FC and Vancouver Whitecaps FC – began with eight international slots, but their domestic slots may be filled with either Canadian or U.S. domestic players.
 MLS clubs based in Canada are required to have a minimum of three Canadian domestic players on their rosters.
- o Players with the legal right to work in Canada are considered Canadian domestic players (i.e., Canadian citizen, permanent resident, part of a protected class).

NOTE: The terms Home Grown and Generation adidas are used to describe mechanisms by which players are acquired. They are not roster designations. All players' roster slots are determined by their compensation and/or age as outlined above.

II. PLAYER ACQUISITION MECHANISMS

MLS teams may acquire players and add them to their rosters via the following mechanisms:

(A) ALLOCATION RANKING

The allocation ranking is the mechanism used to determine which MLS club has first priority to acquire a U.S. National Team player who signs with MLS after playing abroad, or a former MLS player who returns to the League after having gone to a club abroad for a transfer fee. The allocation rankings may also be used in the event two or more clubs file a request for the same player on the same day. The allocations will be ranked in reverse order of finish for the 2010 season, taking playoff performance into account.

Once the club uses its allocation ranking to acquire a player, it drops to the bottom of the list. A ranking can be traded, provided that part of the compensation received in return is another club's ranking. At all times, each club is assigned one ranking. The rankings reset at the end of each MLS League season.

Allocation Money

Allocation money is a resource available to clubs in addition to their respective salary budgets.

A club may receive allocation money for:

- (1) failure to qualify for the MLS Cup Playoffs;
- (2) the transfer of a player to a club outside of MLS for value;
- (3) expansion status;
- (4) qualification for the CONCACAF Champions League;

Each year the MLS Competition Committee determines the allocation amount to be made available to each club. Allocation money can be traded by clubs. Allocation money does not count against a club's salary budget and can be used:

- To sign players new to MLS (that is, a player who did not play in MLS during the previous season).
- To re-sign an existing MLS player, subject to League

approval.

- To "buy-down" a player's salary budget charge below the League maximum of \$335,000.
- In connection with the exercise of an option to purchase a player's rights or the extension of a player's contract for the second year provided the player was new to MLS in the immediately prior year.

NOTE: To protect the interests of MLS and its clubs during discussions with prospective players or clubs in other leagues, amounts of allocation money held by each club will not be shared publicly. (Similarly, most clubs in other countries do not announce the amount of money they plan to spend during a given transfer window.)

(B) DESIGNATED PLAYER

The Designated Player Rule allows clubs to acquire up to three players whose salaries exceed their budget charges, with the club bearing financial responsibility for the amount of compensation above each player's budget charge. Designated Player slots may be used to acquire players new to MLS or to retain current MLS players, subject to League approval.

In 2011, a Designated Player's salary budget charge will be \$335,000, unless the player joins his club in the middle of the season, in which case his budget charge will be \$167,500.

Each club has two Designated Player slots, and clubs are allowed to "purchase" a third Designated Player slot for a one-time fee of \$250,000 that will be dispersed in the form of allocation money to all clubs that do not have three Designated Players.

Designated Player slots are not tradable.

Clubs have the option of "buying down" the budget charge of a Designated Player with allocation money. The reduced charge may not be less than \$150,000.

(C) SUPERDRAFT

The 2011 MLS SuperDraft, held Jan. 13 in Baltimore, Md., consisted of three rounds of 18 picks for a total of 54 player selections. A supplemental draft was held Jan. 18 via teleconference and consisted of three

rounds.

The majority of draft prospects are NCAA college seniors who have exhausted their college eligibility. Generation adidas players and non-collegiate international players are also eligible for selection in the SuperDraft and supplemental draft. Clubs may nominate players for the League's draft-eligible list, and only players from that list may be selected.

Generation adidas is a joint program between MLS and adidas that is dedicated to developing exceptional domestic talent in a professional environment. Each year, a handful of top domestic underclassmen and youth national team players are signed to the league and placed in the SuperDraft through this program. Generation adidas players also receive an educational stipend.

Draft Order: Through the Expansion Priority Draft, Vancouver Whitecaps FC earned the first selection in the 2011 MLS SuperDraft while the Portland Timbers selected second. The next six selections went to clubs that did not qualify for the 2010 MLS Cup Playoffs beginning with the club with fewest regular season points (3 points per win, one point per tie). The remaining eight positions were ranked by fewest regular season points among the teams that were eliminated in the same round of the MLS Cup Playoffs.

Unless claimed on waivers, a player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft or supplemental draft and did not sign with the League, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to the player.

(D) TRADES

Players, SuperDraft and supplemental draft picks, allocation money, allocation rankings, and international player slots may all be exchanged in trades approved by the MLS League Office, provided all of the necessary rules regarding roster and salary budget compliance are met and the trade is completed during a valid trading period. No trades may occur after the Roster Freeze Deadline of

September 15, 2011 at 5 p.m. ET.

(E) DISCOVERY SIGNINGS

Clubs may make discovery claims on players not yet under MLS contract who are not subject to the allocation ranking or lottery mechanisms.

Each club has the opportunity to make six discovery signings per season (expansion teams may make 10 discovery signings in their inaugural season). A club may have up to 10 discovery claims on unsigned players at any time and may remove or add players at any time. The last day for discovery player signings is September 15, 2011 – coinciding with the roster freeze date and trade deadline.

The six discovery signings can be used to fill senior roster spots only. If multiple clubs claim the same player using a discovery, the club that filed the claim first will have first rights to the player. Discovery claims expire following each season. If the League and player are unable to reach an agreement during the season, the club that first filed the discovery retains the right of first refusal in the event the player is later signed by the League.

Note: To protect interests of MLS clubs in scouting and negotiations with prospective players, the League office will not publicize the names of players on club discovery lists, nor specify if a discovery claim has been filed on a particular player.

(F) HOME GROWN PLAYER SIGNINGS

A club may sign a player to his first professional contract without subjecting him to the MLS SuperDraft if the player has trained for at least one year in the club's youth development program and has met League criteria. Players joining MLS through this mechanism are known as Home Grown Players.

There is no limit to the number of Home Grown Players a club may sign in a given year.

(G) RE-ENTRY PROCESS

The 2011 Re-Entry Process will commence after MLS Cup. The priority order for the Re-Entry Draft is reverse order of finish in 2011, taking into account playoff performance.

2011 MLS PLAYER RULES AND REGULATIONS

Available to all teams in Stage 1 of the Re-Entry draft will be:

- Players who are at least 23 years old and have a minimum of three years experience in MLS whose options were not exercised by their clubs (available at option salary for 2012).
- 2. Players who are at least 25 years old with a minimum of four years of MLS experience who are out of contract and whose club does not wish to resign them at their previous salary (available for at least their 2011 salary).
- 3. Players who are at least 30 years old with a minimum of eight years of MLS experience who are out of contract and whose club does not wish to re-sign them (available for at least 105% of their 2011 salary).

Players who are not selected in Stage 1 of the Re-Entry Draft will be made available in Stage 2. Clubs selecting players in Stage 2 will negotiate a new salary with the player.

Players who remain unselected after Stage 2 will be available to any MLS club on a first come, first serve basis.

(H) WAIVERS

A team may place a player on waivers at any time during the regular season at which point he is made available to all other teams. The waiver claiming period shall commence on the first business day after the League delivers notice to teams and shall expire at 5 p.m. EST on the second business day after the Waiver Period Commencement Date. The claiming period is 48 hours.

The Waiver Draft order is determined via points per game once all teams have played at least three MLS League games. If the waiver takes place prior to all teams playing in at least three League games, priority shall be granted based upon the prior year's performance, taking playoff performance first, with teams eliminated from playoff contention at the same stage separated according to their point totals through the end of the regular season. New expansion teams shall be at the bottom of the waiver

order.

Once a team selects a player off waivers, that club is automatically moved to the bottom of the priority list for subsequent waiver selections in a given season, regardless of its points-per-game total. Players who may be placed on the MLS waiver wire are as follows:

- (i) A player waived by an MLS team in the current season:
- (ii) A player who completed his college eligibility within the past season, who was not made available in the SuperDraft or supplemental draft;
- (iii) A player who has remaining college eligibility (and was not made available in the SuperDraft or supplemental draft), but the League at its discretion and after taking into account exceptional circumstances determines the player may be offered an MLS contract:
- (iv) A player who has played in MLS previously where his last MLS team does not wish to exercise their right of first refusal, except in the case of returning U.S. National Team players as stated above.
- (v) A player who was drafted in the SuperDraft or supplemental draft, and who after a trial with the club is not offered a contract by the first Monday of June.

(I) LOTTERY

Some players shall be assigned to MLS teams via the weighted Lottery process. Any team assigned a player through the lottery in any particular season shall not be assigned another lottery player that season unless and until all teams have received a lottery player or have agreed to waive their option to participate in a Lottery. The players made available through lotteries include:

- (i) Generation adidas players signed after the MLS SuperDraft;
- (ii) Draft eligible players to whom an MLS contract was offered but who failed to sign with the League prior to the Draft.

2011 VANCOUVER WHITECAPSNICS PLAYER RULES AND REGULATIONS

The weighted lottery takes into consideration each team's performance over its last 30 regular season games and the most recent postseason. The team with the worst record over its last 30 regular season games (dating back to previous season if necessary and taking playoff performance into account) will have the greatest probability of winning the lottery. Teams are not required to participate in a lottery. Players are assigned via the lottery system in order to prevent a player from potentially influencing his destination club with a strategic holdout.

(J) EXTREME HARDSHIP CALL-UPS

Teams may add players to their roster in cases of "extreme hardship" as follows: (1) a club with three goalkeepers on its 30-man roster, but has less than two available goalkeepers or (2) a team has less than 15 available players. Extreme hardship call-ups are made on a game-by-game basis.

(K) SEASON-ENDING INJURY REPLACEMENTS

A team with a player lost to a season-ending injury can replace that player on its roster, while remaining responsible for the full amount of the injured player's salary. A player can be placed on the season-ending injury list once another player has been signed as a replacement (provided the team has budget space). International player limits still apply at the time a season-ending replacement is made (with the player being replaced not counting against those limits).

(L) SHORT-TERM INJURY REPLACEMENTS

A team with a player who has a short-term injury can replace that player on its roster, while remaining responsible for the full amount of the injured player's salary. A player can be placed on the short-term injured reserve list once another player has been signed as a replacement (provided the team has budget space). Note that the injured player will have to sit out a minimum of six MLS League matches before he can rejoin the team's roster. International player limits still apply at the time a short-term replacement is made (with the player being replaced not counting against those limits).

NOTE: No changes may be made to a team's active full roster during the period beginning on September

16, 2011 (day after Roster Freeze Date) through the day after MLS Cup. Nevertheless, a team may obtain players in accordance with the extreme hardship rules and procedures to replace players who are injured or otherwise legitimately unavailable after the Roster Freeze Date. Any other replacements after the Roster Freeze Date may only be made in exceptional circumstances in the League's sole and absolute discretion.

(III.) METHODS OF RELEASING PLAYERS

(A) WAIVERS

Teams may waive players based on performance at any time during the MLS season. Players with guaranteed contracts will continue to have their salary budget charge applied to the team salary budget, subject to any settlement. Players on semi-guaranteed contracts can be waived prior to July 1 of any year and free up the corresponding budget space. If a player on a semi-guaranteed contract is waived after July 1, his salary budget charge will count against the team's salary budget and the team waiving the player will not receive a replacement except under the normal player acquisition mechanisms. Any settlement amount will be charged to the team's salary budget.

(B) TRANSFERS AND LOANS

An MLS player may be transferred or loaned at any time to a team outside the League (subject to that team's Federation's transfer window), subject to the consent of the player.

The registration windows – the dates between which MLS may request the transfer certificate of a player under contract in another country – are as follows:

January 21 – April 15 (Primary Window) July 15 – August 14 (Secondary Window)

(C) CONTRACT EXPIRATION

When a player's contract expires, the player does not count against the roster or budget of the team in question. Subject to the Re-Entry Draft rules, a team retains the rights to the player indefinitely following the expiration of a contract only if attempts were made to

re-sign the player.

(D) BUYOUT OF GUARANTEED CONTRACT

Teams may have the ability to buyout one guaranteed player as follows:

- A Team may buy out one (1) guaranteed player (including a DP's) contract during the off-season and free up the corresponding budget space. Such a buyout is at the particular MLS Team's own expense.
- A Team may not free up budget space with a buyout of a player's salary budget charge during the season. Such a buyout will be conducted by the League and count on a Club's budget in a manner consistent with current MLS guidelines.

(IV.) RIGHT OF FIRST REFUSAL

Right of first refusal grants one MLS club the first opportunity to add a player to its roster in the event that the player signs with MLS. Holding a right of first refusal applies only within MLS and does not indicate holding of the player's International Transfer Certificate.

OUT OF CONTRACT PLAYERS / OPTIONS NOT PICKED UP: Subject to the Re-Entry Draft rules, a team retains the right of first refusal to the player indefinitely only if attempts were made to re-sign the player.

DRAFTED BUT NOT SIGNED: A player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft or supplemental draft and did not sign, or who as of the first Monday in June is not offered a contract after a trial and clears waivers, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 immediately following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to sign the player.

PLAYER TRANSFERRED OUTSIDE MLS: If a team receives allocation money as a result of a player's transfer, the team does not retain a right of first refusal.
