

EXECUTIVE BIOGRAPHIES



JOHN FURLONG EXECUTIVE CHAIR

John Furlong has been involved with athletics all his life. A former Canadian squash champion, Furlong has competed at the international level in squash, basketball, and European handball.

A long-time member of the Canadian Olympic Committee, he has led many high profile sport organizations in Canada. Furlong joined Vancouver Whitecaps FC in April 2012 as executive chair – the most senior position of the club's executive team.

This comes after his term as chief executive officer of the Vancouver Organizing Committee for the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games (VANOC). From the very beginning, Furlong envisioned that the Games could be a true nation builder that would help improve the fabric of Canadian society.

In an interview with the Canadian Press, IOC President Jacques Rogge remarked at how Vancouver had taken on the Games in a way that was "unheard of in the Olympic movement." The Games had become a catalyst for national unity, he said, and Furlong was a big part of that.

Prior to his appointment as the organizing committee's CEO, Furlong was the president and chief operating officer for the Vancouver 2010 Bid Corporation. He became the bid's international face and key spokesperson,

tirelessly clocking more than 1.2 million miles in his travels to promote the bid.

Over the years, Furlong, an Officer of the Order of Canada and Member of the Order of British Columbia, has received many honours for his service to sport.

To name a few, he was recognized by The Globe and Mail as Canada's Nation Builder of 2010, as one of the top 25 most transformational living Canadians, and was named Canadian of the Year by The Canadian Club. That same year, he was dubbed Marketer of the Year and Sports Media Canada's Sports Executive of the Year.

In 2009, both The Globe and Mail and the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation named Furlong Canada's Most Influential Sport Figure. Around the Rings Magazine listed Furlong as one of the world's top five most influential Olympic officials in both 2009 and 2010, and he's also Sport BC's Sportsman of the Decade.

For his service to sport in Canada over a lifetime, Furlong was acclaimed as the 2004 Canadian Sport Awards' Sport Leadership winner. He has also won Vancouver's most prestigious tourism award for the promotion of Vancouver around the world.

Outside of sports, Furlong has been awarded honorary doctorate degrees in law (2) and technology (1) from the University of British Columbia, The Justice Institute of BC, and BCIT, and an honorary doctorate in tourism and hospitality from Niagara University, New York, USA.

Born in Tipperary, Ireland, Furlong has five children and 11 grandchildren. His book Patriot Hearts – Inside the Olympics that changed a country, became an instant national bestseller when it was released on February 12, 2011 — the one-year anniversary of the Games.





BOB LENARDUZZI

PRESIDENT

Bob Lenarduzzi has been involved with Whitecaps FC for nearly four decades, excelling as a player, coach, general manager, director of soccer operations, and now president. Playing with his hometown Whitecaps FC (1974-1984), Lenarduzzi was the North American Soccer League's all-time leader in games played with 312. He was the only Canadian to win the North American Player of Year, and in 1979, he was a key member of Vancouver's championshipwinning team. He represented Canada 47 times as a player, helping them qualify for the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics and the 1986 FIFA World Cup in Mexico. For his efforts, Lenarduzzi was named among CONCACAF's top 30 players of the past century. As a player/coach, he won four straight Canadian Soccer League championships and was twice named CSL Coach of the Year. He went on to coach Canada's men's national team from 1992 to 1997.

Lenarduzzi served as the general manager and director of soccer operations of Vancouver 86ers and Whitecaps FC from 1988 to 1993, and 1998 to 2007. In 2000, he received the USL First Division Executive of the Year award, while he was also a member of the FIFA U-20 World Cup Canada 2007 Steering Committee.

Lenarduzzi has been inducted into the North American Soccer Hall of Fame, the Canadian Soccer Hall of Fame, the British Columbia Sports Hall of Fame, and the United Soccer Leagues Hall of Fame. In 2005, he received the Order of British Columbia – the highest form of recognition that the province can extend to its citizens – for his contribution to the sport of soccer.



RACHEL LEWIS
CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER

Rachel Lewis has been in the field of sport and event management for over a decade, joining Vancouver Whitecaps FC in 2003 as director of event management and stadium development. In 2007, she assumed the role of chief operating officer.

Prior to joining Whitecaps FC, Lewis spent three years with Vancouver's PGA Tour Stop, the Air Canada Championship. As tournament director, she was responsible for overseeing all day-to-day operations. Lewis also represented BMO Financial Group as project manager for their sponsorship of the BMO Financial Group Canadian Women's Open. She holds a BA (honours) from the University of Victoria and an MBA from the University of British Columbia.

Lewis has a strong passion for community. She currently sits on the Board of Directors and Executive Committee of the Gastown Business Improvement Society, and is a member of the International Women's Forum. Lewis is also a former Director of Kidsport Canada and Sport BC, and is a former Trustee with the BC Sports Hall of Fame and Museum. She also volunteered as a member of the FIFA U-20 World Cup Canada 2007 Steering Committee. In 2008, Lewis was recognized as a recipient of the Business in Vancouver "40 Under 40" awards, while in 2011, she was named one of "BC's 100 Women of Influence" by The Vancouver Sun.



DON FORD

VICE PRESIDENT FINANCE & ADMINISTRATION

Don Ford joined Whitecaps FC as vice-president of finance and administration in January 2011 after four years with the Vancouver Organizing Committee for the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games (VANOC).

At Whitecaps FC, Ford is responsible for the financial management of the club, including financial planning, reporting, and accounting. He also manages the financial relationships with Major League Soccer (MLS) and the external financial community.

Prior to joining Whitecaps FC, Ford was the director of revenue finance for VANOC, where he oversaw the implementation of all aspects of the organizing committee's revenue streams. Ford has also worked as a senior manager in the audit and assurance practice for the Vancouver office of PriceWaterhouseCoopers LLP, serving the forestry, technology, and retail sectors.

Born in Alberta and raised in Ontario, Ford is an active recreational hockey player and golfer. He holds a Bachelor of Commerce (honours) from Queen's University and is a Chartered Accountant and Certified Public Accountant (Illinois).

GREG ANDERSON

DIRECTOR. PROFESSIONAL TEAMS

Greg Anderson joined Whitecaps FC in 2004. As director of the club's professional teams, he is primarily responsible for the management of the men's first team.

Anderson completed an MBA at the Thunderbird School of Global Management in 2003, during which time, he was invited to join the United Nations Graduate Study Program.

Anderson also holds a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Western Ontario. Anderson and his wife have a four year old daughter, Ella.







PHIL ADAMS DIRECTOR, CORPORATE PARTNERSHIP

Phil Adams has been actively involved in Canada's major sports and events industry for well over twelve years. Prior to joining Vancouver Whitecaps FC as Director, Corporate Partnerships, he spent over eight years with the BC Lions of the Canadian Football League first as Director of Sponsorship for the 2005 Grey Cup and most recently as Director, Corporate Partnerships.

Prior to the Grey Cup, Adams worked as Olympic Project Manager for RBC Financial Group, Canada's largest financial institution. where he was responsible for managing RBC's sponsorship of Vancouver's bid to host the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games as well as the company's innovative RBC Olympians program, designed to provide valuable work experience for some of Canada's top Olympic athletes. Initially a regional pilot program of five athletes. Adams was tasked with expanding the RBC Olympians program nationally immediately following Vancouver's successful bid. Today, over 30 Olympic athletes are part of the program.

Prior to his role with RBC. Adams was Manager of Business Development at the Air Canada Championship. Greater Vancouver's stop on the PGA Tour. His role with the ACC included overseeing sponsorship and corporate hospitality as well as supporting the Steering Committee regarding PGA Tour player recruitment and player agent relations, working to convince the world's best golfers to play in Greater Vancouver.

Adams takes an active role in the community, working on a number of charitable and community initiatives. He is a previous member of the Board of Trustees for the BC Sports Hall of Fame, a past member of the Board of Directors for Kids Up Front Vancouver, and has most recently volunteered his time as a coach for Richmond Youth Soccer.



JANET BATTLE DIRECTOR, PARTNERSHIP MARKETING

Janet joined Vancouver Whitecaps FC in the fall of 2010, in lead-up to the team's launch into Major League Soccer. In her role as Director, Partnerships Marketing, Janet is responsible for providing strategic direction in the servicing, marketing, and relationship management of club

Prior to joining the club, Battle was Manager of Olympic Hospitality for Bell, where she played an integral role in the development of Bell's Olympic hospitality programs in both Beijing and Vancouver. Additionally, she managed corporate branding in regards to the Olympic and Paralympic Games across multiple categories including venues, collateral, outfitting, and premiums.

Battle has also worked with two other professional sports leagues, the NHL (Vancouver Canucks) and the NBA (Vancouver and Memphis Grizzlies). She spent four years with the Memphis franchise working as part of the group responsible for the relocation of the Grizzlies franchise from Vancouver to Memphis in a single off-season.

Battle is passionate about sport, and over the years has served on committees for the 2006 IIHF World Junior Championships, the 2007 FIFA U-20 World Cup, and the Tour de Gastown.

In her spare time, Battle supports the local music scene. She and her son Trevor live in Vancouver.



COLBY FACKLER DIRECTOR, SALES

Colby Fackler joined Whitecaps FC in February 2012 as director of corporate partnerships, bringing a wide range of sponsorship and sports industry experience to the club. In August 2012, Fackler moved over to lead the sales team as Director, Sales,

Prior to joining Whitecaps FC, he worked as the senior director of corporate sales with Comcast Spectacor's FrontRow Marketing, providing commercial rights management for Abbotsford Heat of the American Hockey League (AHL), and the Abbotsford Entertainment & Sports Centre.

Additional experience includes roles at Sport BC, Vancouver Canucks (National Hockey League), and Inventa Promotions, as well as a teaching role in the Entertainment Business Program at Vancouver Film School, Fackler is also a member of the executive committee and board of trustees for the BC Sports Hall of Fame. He became a new father in March 2012 to son Quinn.



CARLY JOKIC DIRECTOR, COMMUNICATIONS & BROADCAST

Carly Jokic joined Whitecaps FC as director of communications and broadcast in March 2011. She holds more than 15 years of communications and marketing experience in both public and private sectors in organizations ranging from 20 to 1,500 people with revenues up to \$800 million.

Prior to joining Vancouver Whitecaps FC, Jokic was with the Vancouver Organizing Committee for the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games (VANOC). A key part of the communications senior management team. Jokic acted as communications liaison for all 65 corporate sponsors for day-to-day and long-term issues management and strategic communications planning. A primary link to the CEO office, she also managed a broad variety of crucial programs - such as the launch of the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic medals, the infamous Red Mittens campaign, and the launch of the Canadian team uniform.

Prior to VANOC. Carly managed communications for the Vancouver Convention Centre in preparation for major facility expansion, and also held a wide range of roles at leading high technology corporations, including Sophos Inc., Xantrex Technology Inc., Absolute Software, and Dynapro Systems Inc.

Jokic majored in English at Simon Fraser University and holds a Management Certificate in Marketing Communications (with honours) from BCIT. She is a member of CPRS and IABC, a frequent guest speaker at BCIT marketing and PR classes, and a long-time volunteer for the Canadian Cancer Society's Camp Goodtimes.





DAN LENARDUZZI
DIRECTOR, SOCCER DEVELOPMENT

Dan Lenarduzzi has been involved in the game, both as a player and executive, throughout much of his life.

Born and raised in Vancouver, Lenarduzzi followed his two older brothers, Bob and Sam, into professional soccer with Whitecaps FC at the age of 18. This made the Lenarduzzis the first three brothers in North America to play on the same professional sports team.

Before joining the team, Lenarduzzi made his way up through the British Columbia youth soccer system with Vancouver's Grandview Legion and the BC provincial team program. In 1979, he led the Canadian U-20 national team to qualification for the FIFA U-20 World Cup, having been named a tournament all-star at the qualifying tournament in Honduras. Other accomplishments include his role as captain of the Canadian side at the U-20 World Cup in Japan, and being a professional player with Whitecaps FC from 1978 to 1982.

In his current role with Whitecaps FC, Lenarduzzi, who has a business degree in marketing and communications from the British Columbia Institute of Technology (BCIT) and has 10 years of marketing industry experience, oversees the club's Residency and women's teams, in addition to other player development programs, and community camps and clinics.



JAMIE LEVCHUK DIRECTOR, EVENTS

Jamie Levchuk joined Whitecaps FC as director of events in June 2012. He works on all aspects of MLS, women's, and Residency home matches, and Whitecaps Foundation events.

Levchuk has a BSc from Simon Fraser University, and possesses over 14 years of event management experience at various organizations, including the Rick Hansen Foundation, Vancouver Organizing Committee for the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games, Vancouver Canucks, and Rugby Canada.

Most recently, Levchuk worked as the managing director of the Rick Hansen Relay, leading the team that planned and delivered the nine-month cross-Canada event in celebration of the 25th Anniversary of Rick's 'Man in Motion' World Tour.



MIKKEL STROJER DIRECTOR, MARKETING

Vancouver Whitecaps FC is built on a European club model with a development path from grassroots to the professional level.

Whitecaps FC's community soccer system forms the foundation of the model helping to grow the game by reaching over 21,000 youth through a combination of free community, school, and pre-game clinics.

Whitecaps FC's player development program is the next step for many in the community soccer system. Local and regional camps, academies, and showcase events offer aspiring players of all levels the opportunity to further develop their skills under the guidance of professional Whitecaps FC coaches. These programs reach over 7,000 youth and provide a scouting network for player selection to Whitecaps FC teams.

Although not operated by the club, the EA Sports BC Soccer Premier League is included as an important piece of the club's development model. Eight founding franchises representing more than 80 per cent of the BC population will field boys and girls teams from U-13 to U-18. At this regional level of high performance programming, young players have the opportunity to be scouted and invited in for Whitecaps FC professional development programs. The EA Sports BC Soccer Premier League also connects players and clubs with other resources and training opportunities. This type of league platform is essential both as a development league and as a structured marketing tool to grow and professionalize the

Vancouver Whitecaps FC's area of professional development begins with Whitecaps FC Academy Centres and continues to evolve out of a commitment to identify and develop players for future professional athletic pursuits within the club, nationally, and abroad. Whitecaps FC Academy Centres provide an environment for prospective elite players to develop, and also provide the training ground for the next step - Girls Elite and Residency programs.

Whitecaps FC Residency is a full-time, fully funded, player development program unlike any other in North America. Residency is designed to maximize a player's potential on and off the

pitch through a "soccer lifestyle" philosophy linking technical and personal development. U-16 and U-18 Residency teams compete in the United States Soccer Development Academy (USSDA).

Girls Elite is a funded, full-time U-18 player training development program for players who have been identified to move beyond community club soccer. Girls Elite helps to ensure that highly talented players have exposure to scouting and signing opportunities for colleges and universities across North America.

Whitecaps FC's first team is the top of the club model and where players aspire to reach. Residency players can enter the MLS first team development environment that includes training and competitive opportunities with the MLS side and matches in both the MLS Reserve and United Soccer Leagues (USL) Professional Development League (PDL).

Developing top Canadian players not only benefits Vancouver Whitecaps FC but also our national team programs. As players move through the club model, the Canadian Soccer Association has access to the talent pool to represent Canada in any number of international friendlies and tournaments.

Vancouver Whitecaps FC play in beautiful BC Place. Significant renovations to the stadium were completed in September 2011, before the 'Caps moved to their new downtown Vancouver home.

The 'Caps have a proud history with BC Place. On June 20, 1983, in what was the first ever sporting event to be played in the stadium, a sold-out crowd of 60,342 saw the 'Caps defeat Seattle Sounders 2-1.

Now in its second incarnation, BC Place includes a state-of-the-art retractable roof, new synthetic FIFA-approved 2-Star Field Turf, as well as the second largest centrally hung electronic scoreboard in North America. Additional soccer-specific renovations -

designed to increase the intimacy of the venue - include modular floor-level hospitality areas, floor-level Pitchside club seats which bring fans closer to the action, and an upper deck draping system that limits the capacity of the stadium to 21,000 seats (from 54,313).

The completed stadium also features improved access for persons with disabilities, and the redevelopment of all common spaces, concessions, washrooms, exterior plazas, media facilities, dressing rooms, and general public areas, as well as a comprehensive refurbishment of all suites, and the establishment of a club seat section.

Whitecaps FC are committed to building a world-class training facility for players, coaches, and referees, on a 30 to 40-acre footprint at the University of British Columbia. The National Soccer Development Centre (NSDC) will provide access to leading sport science programs and new development opportunities for soccer clubs throughout the province of British Columbia.

The \$32.5 million capital project, which includes a commitment of \$17.5 million from the BC provincial government, will serve as the training base for Whitecaps FC's men's team, the club's full-time Residency program, youth sides, and visiting teams.

As the club's training base from February 2013, the world-class facility will include a new state-of-the-art fieldhouse and the construction, refurbishment, and improvement of five fields - three grass and two artificial turf - at UBC's Thunderbird Park. Completion of the NSDC project will be in advance of the 2015 FIFA Women's World Cup in Canada.

Training sessions at home will typically run from 10 a.m. to 11:45 a.m. with media availability to follow each practice.

After serving as Vancouver Whitecaps FC's assistant coach for two seasons, Carl Robinson was appointed the 15th head coach in club history on December 16, 2013.

A former English league and Major League Soccer central midfielder that made over 50 international appearances of Wales, Robinson brings seven years of MLS experience as a player and assistant coach to the 'Caps head coaching gig.

Robinson, 37, first joined Whitecaps FC as an assistant coach in January 2012 after a distinguished playing career that included more than a decade in the top two divisions in England, as well as five seasons in MLS with Canadian rivals Toronto FC and New York Red Bulls. Additionally, he served as a player/assistant coach in his second and final season in New York. Robinson holds a Union of European Football Associations (UEFA) Pro License – the highest and final coaching qualification available.

The Welshman joined Toronto FC for their

inaugural MLS season in 2007 and served as co-captain in each of his three seasons with the club. In total, Robinson made 74 appearances for the Southern Ontario outfit and was twice named the club's most valuable player. In 2010, Robinson moved to New York Red Bulls, where he made a total of 12 appearances for the MLS Eastern Conference outfit before deciding to hang up his boots at the end of the 2011 campaign.

Prior to moving to MLS, Robinson spent 12 years playing in England, having started his career as a youth trainee at Wolverhampton Wanderers FC. Between 1995 and 2002, Robinson made over 180 appearances for Wolves, even though the midfielder made his English league debut while on loan with English League One club Shrewsbury Town FC during the 1995-96 season.

On July 24, 2002, Robinson moved to England's South Coast when he joined Portsmouth FC on a free transfer. He was part of the Pompey side that won promotion to the English Premier League during the 2002-03 season, with the midfielder making 20 appearances for the club. His time with Portsmouth included loan spells away from Fratton Park with five different English League Championship clubs.

They included Sheffield Wednesday FC and Walsall FC during the 2002-03 campaign and Rotherham United FC, Sheffield United FC, and Sunderland AFC in the 2003-04 season. Robinson made a permanent move to Sunderland on June 10, 2004, where he added to his seven loan appearances with a further 50 appearances in one-and-a-half seasons with the Wearside club. He helped the North East English outfit win promotion to the English Premier League as 2004-05 champions of the English League Championship.

He remained at Sunderland until January 17, 2006, when he moved to East Anglia to join English League Championship side Norwich City FC for an undisclosed fee following a loan spell with The Canaries that season. He remained with Norwich City for another 12 months, earning a total of 54 appearances for the club, before moving to MLS and Toronto FC. A native of Llandrindod Wells, Wales, Robinson made 52 senior international appearances for his country between 1999 and 2009. His senior



international debut came as a late substitute in qualifying for the 2000 UEFA European Championship (EURO 2000) in Belgium and the Netherlands, as Wales earned 2-1 away win over Belarus on September 4, 1999.

PROFILE

A no-nonsense central defender who has represented the Republic of Ireland at international level, Andy O'Brien arrived at Whitecaps FC on August 1, 2012 from English League Championship side Leeds United AFC – where he made 38 appearances and scored two goals in the span of two seasons. A native of Harrogate, England, O'Brien comes to MLS after making 300 appearances in the English Premier League with Bradford City AFC, Newcastle United FC, Portsmouth FC and Bolton Wanderers FC. The dual British-Irish citizen also played in the UEFA Champions League with Newcastle United and was a member of the Republic of Ireland's 2002 FIFA World Cup squad.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER

2013: The Irishman started all 16 of his MLS appearances in 2013, including the first 13 games of the season. The experienced defender also played every minute for Vancouver in the club's four Amway Canadian Championship matches. Among his highlights, O'Brien was named Budweiser man of the match for his defensive efforts versus San Jose Earthquakes on April 6. 2012: O'Brien made his MLS debut when he replaced injured captain Jay DeMerit

during the first half of Whitecaps FC's 2-1 home win over Real Salt Lake on Aug. 11. His first MLS start came during Whitecaps FC's 2-0 home defeat to FC Dallas on Aug. 15. O'Brien then started Whitecaps FC's first-ever match in the MLS Cup Playoffs on Nov. 1, as Vancouver fell 2-1 at defending champions LA Galaxy in the Western Conference Knockout Round. Overall, he made nine appearances for Whitecaps FC during their historic 2012 campaign.

FNGLAND

2011-12: O'Brien's second and final season with Leeds United was challenging, with the defender making just six total appearances for the club across the League Championship and League Cup competitions. Six of those appearances included four starting roles. In January, he revealed he had been seeking treatment for depression in 2011. After returning to training in February, O'Brien came on as a 74th minute substitute in the 2-1 loss away to Coventry City on February 14, but he did not play for the team again and was subsequently put on the transfer list by manager Neil Warnock in May 2012.2010-11: O'Brien was loaned out to Leeds United from Bolton Wanderers in October but his move to the Yorkshire club was made official in January





2011. During this campaign, he made 32 appearances for Leeds (who finished seventh in the club's return to the League Championship division) in all competitions and scored two goals, the first of which occurred in a 2-2 draw with Hull City in November 2010. His second goal came in a 3-2 loss at Millwall in April 2011. 2009-10: O'Brien started six matches for Bolton Wanderers in the English Premier League and complemented that with three appearances (including two starts) for Wanderers in the FA Cup. O'Brien came on as a second half substitute in the fifth round match-up against Tottenham Hotspur on February 14 that finished in a 1-1 draw. In the replay ten days later at White Hart Lane, O'Brien scored an own goal as Spurs eliminated Bolton in a 4-0 romp, 2008-09: O'Brien made 34 appearances (30 of them were starting roles) for Bolton in the English Premier League and scored one goal, which came against Chelsea at Stamford Bridge in a thrilling 4-3 defeat in April. Bolton finished the EPL season in 13th spot. O'Brien started in Bolton's only FA Cup appearance for the year, which was a 2-1 third round defeat away to Sunderland in January. In August 2008, O'Brien came on as a first-half replacement in the League Cup clash at home to Northampton Town, which Bolton surprisingly lost 2-1. 2007-08: O'Brien signed with Bolton Wanderers on August 13, 2007 and went on to have a memorable first year with the club. He started in 31 English Premier League matches. Perhaps the biggest highlight for O'Brien this season was playing for Bolton in the UEFA Cup, in which he made eight appearances. O'Brien played in the epic 2-2 draw away to German giants Bayern Munich in the group stage. Bolton progressed to the Round of 32, where O'Brien played a pivotal role throughout 180 minutes to steer his team to a stunning 1-0 aggregate win over Spanish club Atletico Madrid. In the next round, he captained the Wanderers in the first leg of their Round of 16 battle with Sporting Lisbon but missed the second leg in Portugal which saw Sporting win 1-0 and move into the quarterfinals 2-1 on aggregate. He also played in Bolton's FA Cup third-round defeat at home to Sheffield United as well as their League Cup fourth-round loss to Manchester City, which also took place at the Reebok Stadium. His strong season was punctuated in May when Wanderers supporters named him The Bolton News Player of the Season following a poll held by the local newspaper. 2006-07: In what turned out to be his last season at Portsmouth, he made three appearances for Pompey in the Premier League and two appearances in the League Cup competition. 2005-06: After leaving Newcastle

United, O'Brien made 32 appearances (all of them starts) for new club Portsmouth in the Premier League, FA Cup and League Cup and was key in helping the club climb out of the relegation zone just before the season ended. 2004-05: In his final season at Newcastle United, O'Brien made 23 Premier League appearances (including 21 starts) and scored two goals across consecutive matches - one was in a 4-2 loss away to Aston Villa on August 28 and the other occurred during the 3-0 home win over Blackburn Rovers on September 11. Newcastle would eventually finish a disappointing 14th in the EPL. During Newcastle's deep FA Cup run, O'Brien came on a second-half substitute in the 2-0 win away to Yeading in the third round before starting in the next round against Coventry City, with the Magpies prevailing 3-1. O'Brien's next appearance in the FA Cup competition was as a second-half replacement in the 4-1 defeat to Manchester United in the semifinal in Cardiff. O'Brien also registered 11 appearances in the UEFA Cup for the Magpies, which included starting roles in both legs of their victorious Round of 16 match-up with Greek club Olympiakos. He also started the first leg against Sporting Lisbon in the quarterfinal before coming on as a replacement in the second leg in Portugal, which Sporting won to secure a 4-2 win on aggregate, 2003-04; O'Brien started 27 of his 28 Premier League appearances and scored one goal - the opener in Newcastle's 3-1 home win over Fulham in January - as the Geordies finished a respectable fifth in the competition. O'Brien also featured in 13 matches in Europe. He started the two UEFA Champions League third round qualifying matches against Partizan Belgrade - which Newcastle lost on penalty kicks. In the UEFA Cup. O'Brien was a constant for the Magpies in their exciting run to the semifinal stage of the knockout tournament, where they were eliminated by Didier Drogba's Marseille. In the FA Cup, O'Brien played the full 90 minutes in Newcastle's 2-1 loss at Liverpool in the fourth round, 2002-03: In his second full season with Newcastle United, O'Brien started in all of the 26 Premier League games as the Magpies finished third in the Premier League race. O'Brien also registered 12 appearances (including 11 starts) in Newcastle's second-ever UEFA Champions League campaign. In the first group stage. O'Brien played twice against Juventus and was in the line-up that shut out the Italian giants 1-0 at St. James Park in October to keep their European dream alive. In the second round group stage, O'Brien came up against another Italian powerhouse team in FC Internazionale

(Newcastle drew 2-2 at the San Siro in one of their two battles in March) as well as Spanish glamour club FC Barcelona. Newcastle failed to progress from this group. 2001-02: In his first full season with Newcastle, O'Brien started 31 Premier League matches, made three substitute appearances and scored two goals to help the black-and-whites end the season in fourth place. O'Brien also made a total of five appearances in the FA Cup (during which he scored his first and only FA Cup goal) and four in the League Cup. O'Brien made just one appearance in Europe, coming on as a secondhalf substitute in Newcastle's thrilling 4-4 draw with French club Troyes in the second leg of the now-defunct UEFA Intertoto Cup Final. (Troyes won the trophy on away goals). One of O'Brien's two goals in the EPL this season came in the form of an equalizer against Arsenal at Highbury in December, which Newcastle went on to win 3-1, while the other was scored in the 6-2 mauling of Everton at home in March. O'Brien scored his one and only FA Cup goal in the fourth-round 4-2 win at Peterborough United in January. O'Brien's and Newcastle's FA Cup campaign ended with a 3-0 Round 6 replay defeat away to Arsenal in March. In the League Cup, Newcastle were eliminated by Chelsea at the quarterfinal stage, four months prior to their FA Cup demise. 2000-01:O'Brien finished the season at Newcastle United after Bradford City sold him to the Magpies in March. At St. James' Park, O'Brien started nine matches and scored his first goal for the black-and-whites in a 1-1 draw at Sunderland on April 21. Newcastle finished the season in 11th spot. O'Brien began the season at Bradford City and made 18 EPL appearances. He also played one FA Cup match (the Bantams were knocked out by Middlesborough in the third round in January) as well as four matches in the UEFA Intertoto Cup. With City under financial duress and in a relegation dogfight, O'Brien (who amassed 133 league appearances for the club) was sold to Newcastle for a club record £2 million fee. 1999-00: O'Brien started 36 out of a maximum 38 English Premier League matches and found the back of the net in a 3-2 home win over Watford in January. Bradford staved off relegation thanks to a 1-0 win over Liverpool in the last match of the season. O'Brien also featured in two FA Cup matches and two League Cup matches, with Bradford only managing to reach the fourth round and third round of those knockout Cup competitions respectively.1998-99: O'Brien became a part of history in his third season at Bradford City, as the Bantams finished second in the Football League First Division and thus secured

promotion to the Premier League for the first time in almost 80 years. O'Brien also made one FA Cup and three League Cup appearances this season. 1997-98: O'Brien started 23 of the 26 matches he featured in for Bradford City in the Football League First Division. The Bantams could only finish around mid-table in the 24team league. O'Brien also made one FA Cup appearance. 1996-97:After progressing through the club's junior ranks, O'Brien made his senior debut in October against Queens Park Rangers in what was Bradford City's first season of Football League First Division action in several decades. O'Brien went on to amass a total of 22 League appearances and even scored two goals. He also played in three FA Cup matches.

YOUTH/AMATEUR

O'Brien began his career at St John Fisher Catholic High School in his hometown of Harrogate. He then joined Leeds United's academy and played in the same youth side as Harry Kewell and Jonathan Woodgate before the club released him at the age of 14. He was then snapped up by Bradford City in 1994 and immediately joined their junior set-up.

INTERNATIONAL

O'Brien has dual British-Irish citizenship and once represented England at both U-18 and U-21 level. He played one match for England's U-21 team and didn't disappoint, nullifying the influence of striker Thierry Henry in a friendly win over France in Derby in February 1999. However, just two months after that breakthrough performance, the then 19-yearold O'Brien was selected for the Republic of Ireland's Under-21 team for a friendly with Sweden. He was able to make the switch to play for Ireland because he did not represent England in a championship match. O'Brien went on to play eight matches for the Ireland U-21 team in 1999. In 2001. O'Brien's consistent performances in defence for Newcastle United were rewarded with a first senior international cap for the Republic of Ireland in a friendly away to Estonia. He featured in qualifying for the 2002 FIFA World Cup and was included in the Ireland squad for the showpiece event in Korea and Japan. O'Brien also played several qualifying matches for the 2006 FIFA World Cup, and scored his only international goal in a 1-0 friendly win against Portugal in February 2005. His 26th and final senior match for Ireland occurred against Cyprus in October 2006. He announced his retirement from international soccer before he was due to face Brazil in an international friendly in Dublin in February 2008.

Named Canadian U-17 Player of the Year in 2010 and 2011, the native of Kitchener, Ontario, first joined the club's

Residency program on Sept. 7, 2010. Alderson is currently on a season-long loan at USL PRO side Charleston Battery.

A speedy goalscorer with game-changing qualities, striker Darren Mattocks joined Whitecaps FC after being drafted second overall in the 2012 Major League Soccer SuperDraft hosted in Kansas City, Missouri. A two-year standout at the University of Akron, Mattocks helped the Zips to the 2010 NCAA College Cup title as a freshman. The native of Portmore, Jamaica, signed a Generation adidas contract with MLS on Dec. 20, 2011.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER

2013: In his sophomore season, Mattocks recorded three goals in 20 MLS appearances for Whitecaps FC. The Jamaican scored at Houston Dynamo on March 23, then followed up with a pair of timely insurance goals in two first-time victories for the 'Caps, first in a 3-1 win over LA Galaxy on May 11, then in a 2-0 win over Seattle Sounders FC on July 6. Other highlights include being named to MLS's '24 under 24' list for the second consecutive season, ranking 12th on the list. Mattocks also appeared in all four Amway Canadian Championship

matches, starting on three occasions. 2012: Mattocks was selected second overall in the MLS SuperDraft by Whitecaps FC on Jan. 12. He then topped MLSsoccer.com's '24 Under 24' list for the season on Sept. 21 before being named Whitecaps FC's Most Promising Plaver in the club's end-of-season awards. With nine goals in all competitions during his first season, Mattocks became the first rookie player to win the Domenic Mobilio Golden Boot as Whitecaps FC's top goalscorer during the campaign. After a promising preseason, the striker made his MLS debut for Whitecaps FC as a late substitute during a 2-0 home win over Canadian archrivals and league expansion club Montreal Impact on Mar. 10. The Jamaican replaced fellow striker Eric Hassli in the dving stages of the season opener. Mattocks scored his first professional goal in the Amway Canadian Championship, as Whitecaps FC won 3-1 at home to North American Soccer League side FC Edmonton in the second leg of their semifinal on May 9. Vancouver won the semifinal series 5-1 on aggregate. Mattocks then made his first professional start during Whitecaps FC's 2-2 home draw with Pacific Northwest rivals Seattle Sounders FC on May 19. Mattocks' first MLS goal came on May 26, as he equalized during Whitecaps FC's 1-1 draw at Pacific Northwest rivals Portland Timbers, Mattocks then became the first Whitecaps FC player to have a two-goal match in MLS that season when he scored twice in a 3-1 home win over Houston Dynamo on June 10. He then scored the match winner in a 1-0 victory at Colorado Rapids on July 4 before scoring both goals in a 3-2 defeat at Toronto FC on July 11. finished second in scoring in NCAA Division I with 21 goals in 22 appearances with the Zips. His efforts made him a semifinalist for the Missouri Athletic Club Hermann Trophy as the top male player in NCAA Division I soccer that vear. He was named Mid-American Conference (MAC) Player of the Year and to the All-MAC First Team for a second straight year. A five-time MAC Player of the Week, Mattocks found the back of the net more than twice in a single match on six occasions. He registered his second career hat-trick for Akron during a 3-0 victory at the University of Tulsa on Sept. 24 before striking his third career hat-trick during the Zips' 5-2 win at the University of Buffalo on Oct. 21. In the NCAA Championship Tournament, Mattocks scored the third goal in Akron's 3-1 home win over Northwestern University in the first round on Nov. 17. In the second round, the Caribbean forward scored twice - including the match winner as the Zips defeated sixth-seeded Southern Methodist University 3-2 at home to reach the 'Round of 16'. Akron's quest to defend their NCAA College Cup title ended at the 'Round of 16' stage following a 1-0 away defeat to College Cup finalists in the University of North Carolina at Charlotte on Nov. 27. 2010: As a freshman, Mattocks led Akron to the NCAA College Cup title - the first Division I national championship to be won in any sport by a University of Akron varsity team. He was named MAC Newcomer of the Year after finishing third in NCAA Division I scoring (second among freshmen) with 18 goals in 25 appearances for the Zips. The striker's efforts also earned him Freshman All-American honours with College Soccer News, Goal.com. Soccer America, and Top Drawer Soccer, as well as a spot on the All-MAC First Teem. PROFILE

A United States international that played in every match of his country's campaign at the 2010 FIFA World Cup in South Africa, Jay DeMerit became Whitecaps FC's first Major League Soccer signing on Nov. 18, 2010. The native of Green Bay, Wisconsin, joined Vancouver after six seasons with England's Watford FC, where he served as club captain. Prior to the club's inaugural MLS season in 2011, DeMerit became Whitecaps FC's first MLS captain and the 20th men's team captain since the club's first season in 1974.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER

2013: The captain had a tough start to his 2013 season, rupturing his Achilles tendon only six minutes into the season opener which left him sidelined for the majority of the season. After months of hard work, DeMerit returned to action on September 14, replacing an injured Brad Rusin in the 31st minute and going on to earn Budweiser Man of the Match honours in a gritty 0-0 draw on the road against San Jose Earthquakes. The hard-nosed centre back went on to play all 540 minutes of the remaining six matches, leading the team to shutouts on September 21 in Montreal, and on October 27 at home to Colorado. 2012: In Whitecaps FC's second match of the season, DeMerit scored his first goal in MLS, as he headed home the match winner in an historic 1-0 away win over Chivas USA on Mar. 17. The result was Vancouver's first away win in MLS. His performances through the first half of the season earned DeMerit a fan selection to the MLS All-Star First XI on July 8. As the first Whitecaps FC player to appear at an MLS All-Star Game, DeMerit put in an impressive 90-minute display for the MLS All-Stars, as they defeated UEFA Champions League holders Chelsea FC 3-2 at PPL Park in Chester, Pennsylvania, on July 25. DeMerit then earned his first MLS assist when he set up Kenny Miller's first goal in the league during Whitecaps FC's 2-1 defeat at Portland Timbers on Aug. 25. The centre back's performance in Vancouver's regular season finale - a 0-0 draw at Real Salt Lake on Oct. 27 - earned him a spot in MLSsoccer.com's Team of the Week for Week 33. DeMerit then started Whitecaps FC's first-ever match in the MLS Cup Playoffs

on Nov. 1, as Vancouver fell 2-1 at defending champions LA Galaxy. 2011: DeMerit started as centre back on his and Vancouver's MLS debut on Mar. 19, as Whitecaps FC defeated Canadian rivals Toronto FC 4-2 at Empire Field. The centre back also appeared in both legs of the Nutrilite Canadian Championship final versus Toronto FC on May 18 and July 2, with Whitecaps FC falling 3-2 on aggregate. Despite battling with injuries during the early part of the year, DeMerit appeared in nearly two-thirds of Whitecaps FC's regular-season matches during their inaugural MLS season, starting all but one of his 21 appearances for the Blue and White..

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER RESERVE LEAGUE

2011: Returning from injury, DeMerit played the first half in Whitecaps FC reserves 2-1 home win over Seattle Sounders FC reserves on Aug. 9 at Swangard Stadium.

ENGLAND

2009-10: The centre back made 27 league appearances in his sixth and final season with Watford, with the Hertfordshire club finishing 16th in the League Championship standings. He also appeared in Watford's 5-0 defeat at Chelsea FC in the third round of the English FA Cup on Jan. 3, 2010. DeMerit's time in English soccer ended after his Watford contract expired at the end of the season, 2008-09: DeMerit made 32 league appearances in his fifth season with Watford, as The Hornets finished 13th in the League Championship standings. He was part of the club's run to the English League Cup quarterfinals, while his only goal that season coming in the fourth round of the English FA Cup, as Watford defeated Crystal Palace FC 4-3 on Jan. 24, 2009, 2007-08: The centre back helped Watford back to the League Championship playoffs after a sixth-place finish in the standings. Though DeMerit served the second half of the season as club captain, Watford's hopes of an English Premier League return were ended in the playoff semifinals when they lost 6-1 on aggregate to Hull City FC. His only goal that season came on Boxing Day (Dec. 26, 2007) in a 2-2 home draw versus Cardiff City FC. 2006-07: Playing in the top flight of English soccer. DeMerit and Watford endured a difficult season, as The Hornets finished bottom of the





English Premier League standings and were subsequently relegated back to the League Championship. The defender, however, helped Watford reach the semifinals of the English FA Cup before losing to Manchester United FC. He had two goals in the Premier League that season versus Portsmouth FC (Nov. 18, 2006) and Blackburn Rovers FC (Jan. 23, 2007). 2005-06: Under the stewardship of manager Adrian Boothrovd, who replaced Lewington in Mar. 2005. DeMerit helped Watford earn promotion to the English Premier League as winners of the League Championship playoffs after a third-place finish in the standings. His three goals that season included the match-winner in the promotion playoff final at the Millennium Stadium in Cardiff, Wales, on May 21, 2006. The Hornets defeated Leeds United FC 3-0, with DeMerit earning the 'Man of the Match' award, 2004-05: The centre back made the move to English league soccer when he signed a one-vear contract with second-tier League Championship side Watford FC following a twoweek trial. DeMerit's move to The Hornets came after he impressed then Watford manager, and former Vancouver Whitecaps FC midfielder, Ray Lewington during a preseason friendly in July 2004. The defender played against Watford as a trialist with semi-professional outfit Northwood FC of the seventh-tier Isthmian League Premier Division. DeMerit made his Watford debut in the first round of the English League Cup, as The Hornets defeated Cambridge United 1-0 at home on Aug. 24, 2004. The centre back made over 30 appearances in league and cup play during his first season with Watford, helping the Hertfordshire club to the English League Cup semifinals, where they eventually fell to Liverpool FC. He scored three goals in the League Championship that season. Those goals came against Crewe Alexandra FC (Jan. 15, 2005). Ipswich Town FC (Feb. 22, 2005), and Leicester City FC (Mar. 15, 2005). 2003-04: DeMerit's start in English soccer came in the ninth tier with Southall FC of the Combined Counties Football League. Southall are based in the London borough of Ealing.

UNITED SOCCER LEAGUES PREMIER **DEVELOPMENT LEAGUE**

2001: The defender appeared in Chicago Fire Premier's inaugural season in the PDL. Known then as Chicago Fire Reserves, DeMerit led the Illinois-based outfit to a first-place finish in the Great Lakes Division of the PDL's Central Conference. The fire reached the Central Conference playoff final before losing 1-0 to Sioux Falls Spitfire.

COLLEGE

DeMerit enjoyed a stellar four-year NCAA Division I career with the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC). 2001: With the MCC renamed the Horizon League, DeMerit had another fine season for the Flames in his senior year. He was again named to the NSCAA All-Midwest Region First Team and the All-Horizon League First Team after appearing in every match for UIC that year. His four goals include strikes in three straight matches versus University of Detroit Mercy (Oct. 26), University of Wisconsin Milwaukee (Nov. 3), and Loyola University Chicago (Nov. 10). 2000: The defender was named to the NSCAA All-Midwest Region First Team, and for a second time, the All-MCC First Team after a fine junior year with the Flames. For a second straight season, DeMerit made the MCC All-Tournament Team after leading UIC to a second MCC men's soccer title. The Flames also reached the 'Sweet 16' of the NCAA Tournament before losing 6-0 to Stanford University on Nov. 25. 1999: The centre back's sophomore season with the Flames earned him a spot in the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) All-Midwest Region Second Team and the All-Midwestern Collegiate Conference (MCC) First Team. DeMerit made the MCC All-Tournament Team after leading the Flames to their first MCC men's soccer title and the NCAA Tournament. This included the match-winner in the MCC Tournament quarterfinal win over Cleveland State University. He also earned a spot on the MCC's Academic All-Conference Team. 1998: As a freshman, DeMerit appeared in all 17 matches for the Flames, with 10 of those appearances coming in the defensive backline. His only goal that season was the match-winner in a 2-1 overtime victory at local rivals Loyola University Chicago.

INTERNATIONAL

Though not selected to appear for his country at youth international level, DeMerit's rise as a defender in England led to his establishment as a senior international with his native United States. Senior: The centre back made his USA debut during a goalless draw versus Guatemala in Frisco, Texas, on Mar. 28, 2007. The defender then appeared in Group B victories over Guatemala (June 7, 2007) and Trinidad & Tobago (June 9, 2007), as the USA went on to claim the 2007 CONCACAF Gold Cup title. Later that summer, DeMerit was also a member of the USA squad that appeared at the 2007 Copa America in Venezuela. He

a start in the 4-1 defeat to South American giants Argentina on June 28, 2007. He was then involved in 2010 FIFA World Cup qualifying in 2008 before appearing for his country at the 2009 FIFA Confederations Cup. DeMerit helped the Americans to the final of the competition in South Africa, with the centre back appearing in all three Group B matches versus Italy (June 15, 2009), Brazil (June 18, 2009), and Egypt (June 21, 2009). He then started the USA's historical 2-0 victory over reigning European champions Spain in the semifinals on June 24. 2009. DeMerit was then selected to the USA's 23-player squad for the 2010 FIFA World Cup and started all four of his country's matches in South Africa. He appeared in the draws versus England (June 12, 2010) and Slovenia (June 18, 2010) before taking part in the famous 1-0 victory over Algeria (June 23, 2010) that clinched top spot for the Americans in Group C. DeMerit's World Cup campaign ended in the Round of 16 when the USA lost 2-1 in extra time to Ghana on June 26, 2010. The centre back then appeared in the USA's 1-1 friendly draw versus Argentina in East Rutherford, New Jersey, on Mar. 26, 2011, and the 1-0 friendly defeat to Paraguay in Nashville, Tennessee, on Mar. 29. 2011.

HIGH SCHOOL/AMATEUR

DeMerit played youth soccer with Howard Hurricanes Soccer Club in his hometown of Green Bay, Wisconsin, before joining a team called Green Bay 7 Up until he was 20 years of age. The defender also had a stellar soccer career with Bay Port High School in his hometown of Green Bay, Wisconsin, As a iunior and senior, he led the Pirates in goals. assists, and points. As a senior, he was named Metro Player of the Year by the Green Bay Press Gazette newspaper, while he also earned All-Bay Conference First Team, all-state, and allmetro honours as a junior and senior. DeMerit was also a top athlete for the Pirates in track & field and basketball.

PERSONAL

Born and raised in Green Bay, Wisconsin, DeMerit attended Hillcrest Elementary School in nearby Oneida, Wisconsin, before studying at Bay Port High School. In 2002, the centre back completed a degree in industrial design at the University of Illinois at Chicago. His parents are Karen and John DeMerit. On August 25, DeMerit married Canadian Olympic Ski Cross Gold Medalist Ashleigh McIvor; the couple tied the knot in Whistler.

INTERESTING FACTS

A man of many interests, DeMerit enjoys painting and playing bass guitar when not concentrating on his soccer career. He is also an owner/partner of an interactive digital media company called 'Songwhale', which is based in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and part owner of two clothing companies called SECT Wear and Sasha Moon. The centre back also owns Villain's Bar and Grill in Chicago, Illinois, and is also involved in an online fitness company called The Regimen. The defender is a big fan of the NFL's Green Bay Packers, while he also enjoys watching the UEFA Champions League.

PROFILE

A talented centre back. Leverón joined Whitecaps FC on February 19, 2013 after spending the past three years with Honduran side Club Deportivo Motagua. The young defender brings international experience, having already made more than 20 appearances for the Honduran men's national team.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER

2013: The Honduran international started all 18 of his appearances. In every start, Leveron played all 90 minutes for the 'Caps. Made his MLS debut on May 4 in a 2-0 loss at Real Salt Lake. Leverón also played every minute for Whitecaps FC in all four of the club's Amway Canadian Championship matches. The 5-foot-11 defender was named Budweiser Man of the Match twice in 2013, first on July 3 in a 1-1 draw versus Sporting Kansas City and then again on July 29 in Vancouver's 1-0 loss to Philadelphia Union.

HONDURAS

2009-2012: Over four seasons with Club Deportivo Motagua in the Liga Nacional, the 5-foot-11, 160-pound centre back appeared in 83 matches and scored nine goals. During his time with the Blue Eagles the team won the Honduran Liga Nacional in 2009-10 with Leverón playing alongside current Celtic star Emilio Izaquirre and Honduran World Cup squad member Georgie Welcome. Leverón also competed in the CONCACAF Champions League in both 2010-11, when Motagua were knocked out by Toronto FC in the preliminary round, and 2011-12 when they progressed to the group stage before being eliminated.

INTERNATIONAL


Leverón has represented the Honduran national team at both youth and senior men's national team levels. In 2007 he captained the U-17 squad in the Pan American games in Rio de

Janeiro, Brazil, where he scored 3 goals in as many games. He also represented the U-17 national team in the 2007 FIFA U-17 World Cup in South Korea, and in 2009 represented the U-20 side in the 2009 FIFA U-20 World Cup in Egypt. In 2010, Leverón made his debut for the senior national team by coming on as a second half substitute in a friendly match against Venezuela. In 2011, Leverón played every match in Honduras' successful Copa Centroamericana campaign, scoring a decisive goal in the semifinal against El Salvador to set up the final match against Costa Rica where Honduras lifted the trophy for the third time in their history.

Later that year, Leverón was also included in the Honduras squad for the 2011 CONCACAF Gold Cup in which Los Catrachos to the semifinals. Last summer, Leverón captained his country's side in the 2012 Summer Olympics as Honduras progressed from their group, beating a muchfancied Spanish side en-route. They were knocked out in the quarterfinals by eventual finalists Brazil by a narrow margin despite having two players sent-off.

INTERESTING FACTS

Leverón was crowned champion of the 2013 Whitecaps FC ping-pong tournament, defeating teammate Kenny Miller in the final.

PROFILE

A left fullback who can also play in midfield, defender Jordan Harvey joined Whitecaps FC after being acquired in exchange for allocation money from Major League Soccer rivals Philadelphia Union on July 7, 2011.

An experienced MLS campaigner with over 100 appearances in the league, the native of Mission Viejo, California, started his career with Colorado Rapids after being selected in the first round (ninth overall) of the 2006 MLS Supplemental Draft. Harvey scored the 10,000th goal in MLS history on June 19, 2013 against Chivas USA.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER

Harvey then started Whitecaps FC's first-ever match in the MLS Cup Playoffs on Nov. 1, as Vancouver fell 2-1 at defending champions LA Galaxy. 2011: After spending the first half of the season with Philadelphia Union, Harvey started all 14 of his league appearances for Whitecaps FC that year. His Vancouver debut came in a 2-1 away defeat to former club Colorado Rapids on July 9. He then made his home debut in the Herbalife World Football Challenge friendly, as Whitecaps FC suffered a 2-1 defeat to English Premier League club Manchester City FC at Empire Field on July 18. He then recorded two assists in the 4-2 home win over Chicago Fire on Aug. 7 before assisting on Camilo Sanvezzo's consolation goal during a 2-1 away defeat

appearance in MLS when he started Whitecaps FC's 3-1 home defeat to Pacific Northwest rivals Seattle Sounders FC on Sept. 24. Playing as a left-sided midfielder. Harvey recorded assists on goals by Camilo and Long Tan during Whitecaps FC's 2-1 home win over D.C. United at BC Place on Oct. 12. Before joining Whitecaps FC on July 7. Harvey started all 16 of his appearances in his second season with Philadelphia, with the defender recording an assist on Gabriel Farfan's opening goal during a 6-2 victory at Toronto FC on May 28. He also started both of the Union's MLS matches versus Whitecaps FC that year. This included Philadelphia's 1-0 home win over Vancouver on Mar. 26 and the Union's 1-0 away defeat to Whitecaps FC on June 18. Harvey also appeared in the Union's play-in round defeat away to MLS Eastern Conference rivals D.C. United in the Lamar Hunt US Open Cup. He also assisted on Jack McInernev's equalizing goal, as the Union won 2-1 at Eastern Conference rivals New England Revolution on Aug. 28, 2009: In his second and final season of action with Colorado Rapids, Harvey started all but one of the club's 30 league matches that season, as Colorado missed the MLS Cup Playoffs after finishing sixth in the Western Conference standings. The defender scored goals in a 4-2 home win over University of California, Berkeley (Oct. 17); a 3-0 home win over Stanford University (Oct. 19); a 5-0 victory at home to Oregon State University (Nov. 9): and a 1-0 home win over California State University, Fresno (Fresno State) (Nov. 15). Harvey missed the postseason with UCLA after representing the United States at the 2003 FIFA U-20 World Cup in the United Arab Emirates. 2002: A freshman member of the Bruins' NCAA

Division I championship-winning side. Harvey started seven of his 13 appearances in his first season with UCLA, registering an assist during a 2-1 victory over Fresno State on Oct. 13. He was an All-Pac-10 honourable mention selection, despite missing UCLA's last three Pac-10 matches, as he was on international duty with the USA U-20 squad. The Americans qualified for the 2003 FIFA U-20 World Cup in the United Arab Emirates in Nov. 2002.

INTERNATIONAL

Harvey represented the United States at youth international level from U-14 to U-20. U-20: The defender helped the USA qualify for the 2003 FIFA U-20 World Cup and made a late substitute appearance at the final tournament in the United Arab Emirates, as Thomas Rongen's side defeated South Korea 2-0 on Dec. 5, 2003. The Americans won Group F and reached the quarterfinals before falling 2-1 in extra time to Argentina on Dec. 12, 2003. U-17: Harvey served as co-captain of the USA U-17 squad. having been a member of his country's U-17 Residency program. He led John Ellinger's side to the 2001 FIFA U-17 World Cup in Trinidad & Tobago and made two starts in Group B. This included a 1-0 defeat to Japan on Sept. 14, 2001, and a 5-3 defeat to eventual winners France on Sept. 16, 2001. The USA missed out on reaching the quarterfinals after finishing bottom of Group B. In 2000, Harvey scored his first international goal during a 4-1 victory over arch-rivals Canada.

HIGH SCHOOL/AMATEUR

A soccer standout at Capistrano Valley High School in his hometown of Mission Viejo, California, Harvey was the first player from the state to win America's Gatorade National High School Boys Soccer Player of the Year award in 2001. Fellow Whitecaps FC teammate Lee Nguyen went on to win the accolade in 2004. As a member of the Cougars, Harvey earned Parade All-American honours as both a junior and senior. He also played youth soccer for Strikers FC in nearby Irvine, California.

PERSONAL

Harvey was born and raised in the southern Orange County city of Mission Viejo, California. His parents are Jack and Jill Harvey and he says that his dad's moustache is the best one you will ever see. His brother was the captain of their surfing team in high school and his sister's four daughters are all named after gems - Ruby, Pearl, Opal, and Garnet. The defender attended Capistrano High School where he was awarded the Gatorade National Player of the Year as a

senior, which he says sparked his dream to be a professional player. During his free time, he enjoys playing the guitar - his favourite artists include Jack Johnson and Ben Harper. Harvey also enjoys spending time with his family and friends. As a student at UCLA, the defender majored in sociology. In November 2013. Harvey got engaged to singer/actress Kimberly Caldwell.

INTERESTING FACTS

When not concentrating on his soccer career. Harvey's favourite pastimes are baseball, paddle boarding, and checking out the Vancouver restaurant scene. Harvey supports the Garth Brooks Teammates for Kids Foundation. For his avid work in the community, the California native was named the club's 2013 Humanitarian of the Year at the annual BMO player awards.

A guick and agile winger, Kekuta Manneh joined Whitecaps FC after being selected fourth overall in the 2013 MLS SuperDraft. Prior to joining Whitecaps FC, the Gambian striker played for Austin Aztex of the USL PDL. Manneh scored his first MLS goal for Whitecaps FC on April 27, 2013 versus FC Dallas.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER

2013: Manneh had a memorable rookie season with Whitecaps FC, scoring six goals and recording two assists in 20 appearances. The Gambian made his first start for the club on opening day, playing the first 45 minutes against Toronto FC on March 2 at BC Place.

His first goal for the club came on April 27 when he ignited the 'Caps comeback in a 2-2 draw against FC Dallas, scoring the first goal before assisting on Camilo's equalizer. His second goal came on July 14, as he came off the bench to seal a 3-1 win over Chicago Fire. The biggest moment of the season for Manneh was a hat-trick versus Seattle Sounders FC on October 9. At 18-years-old at the time, Manneh became the youngest player in MLS history to record a hat-trick. The young striker went on to make a second consecutive start away at Colorado Rapids on October 19, scoring a sublime goal on 32 minutes. A proven goalscorer that has represented his native Scotland at the international level. Kenny Miller became Whitecaps FC's fourth Designated Player signing in the club's Major League Soccer history on July 16, 2012. The native of Edinburgh, Scotland, comes to MLS after spells with Scottish giants Rangers FC and Celtic FC, as well as several seasons in the English Premier League.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER

2013: In 21 appearances during his second MLS season with Whitecaps FC, Miller netted eight goals and recorded one assist while also finishing in a tie for third in the league with five game-winning goals. His first goal of the season came in the 'Caps second match, stealing the ball and burying the winning goal in a 2-1 victory over Columbus Crew on March 9. Miller provided another game-winning goal versus New York Red Bulls on June 1 to give the 'Caps their first road victory of the 2013 season. The Scotsman also scored on March 30, when he came off the bench to net a consolation goal in a 2-1 loss at Chivas USA. The experienced striker bagged two sensational goals, both of which were nominated for MLS Goal of the Week, en route to a 4-3 victory over New England Revolution on June 15. His performance against the Revolution saw him named MLS Player of the Week. Among his other notable moments,

Miller scored the game-winning goal in the 'Caps' historic 2-0 victory over Seattle Sounders FC on July 6. It didn't take long for him to find the net again, as he scored an insurance goal in a 2-0 home win over San Jose Earthquakes on July 10. Finally, Miller successfully converted a penalty kick at Montreal Impact on September 21 to help pave the way to a 3-0 Whitecaps FC victory. In the Amway Canadian Championship, Miller made one appearance, starting the final match for Whitecaps FC in a 2-2 draw against Montreal Impact. 2012: Miller started eight of his 14 appearances during his first season in MLS with Whitecaps FC. The striker made his league debut as a late substitute on July 22, as Whitecaps FC defeated San Jose Earthquakes 2-1 at BC Place. He made two more substitute appearances before making his first MLS start during Whitecaps FC's 2-0 home defeat to FC Dallas on Aug. 15. Miller then scored his first goal in MLS during Whitecaps FC's 2-1 defeat at Portland Timbers on Aug. 25. His second MLS goal was his first at BC Place, as Whitecaps FC drew 2-2 with Colorado Rapids on Sept. 23. He then assisted on Gershon Koffie's match-winning goal during Whitecaps FC's 4-0 home win over Chivas USA on Oct. 3. Miller then appeared as a second-half substitute in Whitecaps FC's first-ever match in the MLS Cup Playoffs on November 1, as Vancouver fell 2-1 at defending champions LA Galaxy.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER RESERVE LEAGUE

2012: Miller made two starts for Whitecaps FC reserves during his first season with the club, with his first start in a 'Caps uniform coming in the MLS Reserve League on July 23. The striker played the first half of Whitecaps FC reserves' 3-1 home defeat to Chivas USA reserves at UBC Thunderbird Stadium.

ENGLAND

2011-12: Following a brief spell with Bursaspor, Miller returned to British soccer when he joined English League Championship side Cardiff City FC for an undisclosed fee on July 26, 2011. His 11 goals in 50 total appearances for the South Wales outfit included a two-goal performance in Cardiff City's 2-1 home win over Southampton FC on Sept. 28, 2011. The striker's efforts helped The Bluebirds to the end-of-season promotion playoffs after their sixth-place finish in the English League Championship standings. Cardiff City missed out on promotion to the English Premier League after falling 5-0 on aggregate to eventual playoff winners West Ham United FC in the two-leg semifinals. Miller's winning goal in a 2-0 quarterfinal win at home to English Premier League side Blackburn Rovers FC on Nov. 29, 2011, helped Cardiff City to the first-ever English League Cup final, where they fell to English and European giants Liverpool FC 3-2 on penalties after a highly-dramatic 2-2 extra-time draw at Wembley Stadium on Feb. 26, 2012. 2007-08: After starting the season with Scotland giants Celtic FC, Miller returned to English soccer when he joined newly-promoted English Premier League side Derby County FC on the final day of the European summer transfer window (Aug. 31, 2007). The striker started all 30 of his EPL appearances for The Rams that season, with two of his four league goals coming in both EPL clashes versus Newcastle United FC (Sept. 17 & Dec. 23, 2007). Despite his efforts, Derby County were relegated back to the English League Championship after one season in the EPL. Miller also scored in two clashes with English League Championship side Sheffield Wednesday FC (Jan. 6 & 22, 2008), as Derby County advanced to the fourth round of the English FC Cup. 2005-06: Miller's fifth and final season with Wolverhampton Wanderers FC saw the Black Country club come within eight points of the promotion playoff places in the English League Championship (seventh place) after scoring 10 goals in 35 league appearances that year. This included two goals in a 4-0 victory at Crewe Alexandra FC on Sept. 27, 2005. He also scored against English League Two side Chester City FC (Aug.

Miller also scored in a 4-2 victory at English League Two outfit Rochdale FC in the English League Cup first round and appeared in rounds three and four of the English FA Cup. 2003-04: In Wolves' first campaign in the English top flight for 20 years. Miller made 25 league appearances for the Black Country club. He scored a memorable match winner in a 1-0 home win over Manchester United FC on Jan. 17, 2004, before striking a late equalizer in a 1-1 home draw with Liverpool FC on Jan. 21, 2004. Miller's debut season in the English Premier League ended with Wolves being relegated back to the English League Championship. He also scored in the 2-0 home win over English League Championship side Burnley FC in the English League Cup third round on Oct. 28, 2003, before scoring both goals in in a 2-0 home win over English League Two side Kidderminster Harriers FC in the English FA Cup third round replay on Jan. 13, 2004, 2002-03: Miller helped Wolves return to the English top flight for the first time in nearly two decades as promotion playoff winners in the English League Championship following a fifth-place finish. In 43 league appearances, the striker's 19 goals included a hat-trick during a 4-0 home win over Crystal Palace FC on Mar. 1, 2003, Miller also scored the third goal in Wolves' 3-0 victory over Sheffield United FC in the English League Championship promotion playoff final at the Millennium Stadium in Cardiff, Wales, on May 26, 2003. He also scored in a penalty shootout defeat at English League Championship rivals Rotherham United FC in the English League Cup second round on Oct. 1, 2002, as well as three goals during Wolves' run to the English FA Cup quarterfinals. This included two goals in a 4-1 home win over fellow English League Championship promoted side Leicester City FC in the fourth round on Jan. 25, 2003, 2001-02: After making three substitute appearances with Scottish giants Rangers FC. Miller made the move to England when he joined Wolves on a three-month loan on Sept. 6, 2001. That switch

to the Black Country outfit became permanent when Wolves paid Rangers £3 million to secure the striker's services on Dec. 13, 2001, with Miller signing a four-and-a-half contract. A broken collarbone restricted Miller to 22 league appearances and two league goals that season. He scored in a 3-2 victory at Gillingham FC on Sept. 18, 2001, and in a 3-0 victory at Walsall FC on Sept. 21, 2001. With a third-place finish in the English League Championship standings, Wolves appeared in the promotion playoff semifinals, where Miller appeared as a substitute in both legs of a 3-2 aggregate defeat to Norwich City FC on Apr. 28 and May 1, 2002. His English FA Cup debut came as a substitute during a 1-0 defeat at English League Championship rivals Gillingham FC in the third round on Jan. 5, 2002.

The striker helped Bursaspor to a third-place finish in the Turkish Süper Lig standings, and with it, a spot in the third qualifying round of the UEFA Europa League for the 2011-12 season

2010-11: Miller enjoyed a productive end to his second spell with Scottish giants Rangers FC after scoring 21 goals in 18 appearances for the Scottish Premier League (SPL) champions. This included hat-tricks versus former club Hibernian FC (Aug. 22, 2010) and Kilmarnock FC (Nov. 20, 2010). The striker also made a substitute appearance in the quarterfinals of Rangers' successful run to their 27th Scottish League Cup title, as the Glasgow-based outfit won 2-0 at SPL rivals Kilmarnock FC on Oct. 27, 2010. Miller also appeared in all six Group C matches in the UEFA Champions League, as Rangers faced the likes of English giants Manchester United FC and Spain's Valencia CF. Miller scored in the Old Firm club's final group match to earn a 1-1 draw at his future club in Turkish champions Bursaspor on Dec. 7, 2010. Rangers finished third in Group C and qualified for the knockout stages UEFA Europa League that season. His final match for The Gers was in the SPL - a 4-0 home win over Hamilton Academical FC on Jan.



Among his five two-goal matches in the league were both goals in a 2-1 home win over former club Celtic FC in the Old Firm derby on Oct. 4, 2009. Miller also clinched Rangers' 26th Scottish League Cup title by scoring the match winner in the final at Hampden Park, at The Gers defeated SPL rivals St. Mirren FC 1-0 on Mar. 21, 2010. Miller also contributed to Rangers' 33rd Scottish FA Cup title with two goals in a 4-0 victory at Scottish Third Division side Forfar Athletic FC in the fifth round on Feb. 18, 2009, and a goal in a 3-0 win over SPL rivals St. Mirren FC on Apr. 25, 2009. 2007-08: Before moving to newly-promoted English Premier League side Derby County FC, Miller concluded his short career with Scottish giants Celtic FC

INTERNATIONAL

Miller has made more than 65 appearances for Scotland at the senior international level, scoring 17 goals along the way and serving as team captain for many of those matches. The striker announced his retirement from international duty on August 23, 2013. Miller first made his debut for the Scots on April 25, 2001 when he came on as a substitute in the 80th minute of a 1-1 friendly result against Poland. His first international goal came on March 29, 2003. as the Edinburgh native scored the winner in a 1-0 victory against Iceland at Hampden Park in Glasgow, Scotland. The striker was called up for Scotland's friendly versus England at Wembley stadium on August 14, 2013, starting the match and scoring Scotland's second goal of the evening in his side's eventual 3-2 loss to the Three Lions.



PROFILE

A hard-nosed box-to-box midfielder, Reo-Coker joined Whitecaps FC on February 21, 2013 after completing a short spell at English Football League Championship side Ipswich Town. He has represented England at the U-21 level and captained English clubs Wimbledon FC, Aston Villa, Bolton Wanderers and West Ham United.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER

2013: In his first season in MLS, Reo-Coker led the team in starts (31), minutes (2,817), and was tied for the lead in appearances (32) with Camilo Sanvezzo and Young-Pyo Lee. The experienced midfielder also scored one goal while tying for fourth on the team with four assists on the season, with all of his points coming in victories. Reo-Coker made his Whitecaps FC debut on March 9 when he came on at halftime of Vancouver's season opening match at BC Place, spurring the home side on to a 1-0 victory over Toronto FC. The experienced midfielder recorded his first assist when he set-up Russell Teibert for the opening goal in a 3-1 win over LA Galaxy on May 11. In one of the 'Caps more exciting matches of the season on June 15, Reo-Coker also tallied an assist on Jordan Harvey's goal in a 4-3 win over New England Revolution. On August 10, Reo-Coker put in a Budweiser Man of the Match performance, assisting on both goals in a 2-0 victory over San Jose Earthquakes at BC Place. The bullish midfielder scored his first goal for the club on October 9, putting the final touch on a 4-1 road victory over Cascadia rivals Seattle Sounders FC. Additionally, Reo-Coker appeared in three of the 'Caps four Amway Canadian Championship matches, playing the full 90 minutes on each occasion.

2012: Reo-Coker had a short spell with Ipswich Town in the Championship, making nine starts in 11 appearances. 2011-12: In July 2011, Reo-Coker joined Premier League outfit Bolton Wanderers as a free agent following the end of his contract with Aston Villa. He made his debut on the first day of the new season as Wanderers beat newly promoted QPR 4-0 away from home. Reo-Coker scored his first goal for the Trotters in the 2-1 away win against local rivals Blackburn Rovers. On March 17, 2012, Reo-Coker captained his side in an FA Cup quarterfinal away to Tottenham Hotspurs when, in the 41st minute, team-mate Fabrice Muamba suffered a cardiac arrest on the pitch. The match was abandoned and Bolton lost the re-arranged match 3-1. On the final day of the season, Wanderers managed only a draw 2-2 against Stoke City, meaning that they had been relegated by a single point. 2010-11: Reo-Coker made 34 appearances for Aston Villa as the team finished ninth in the Premier League. When club captain Stylian Petrov was ruled out of action for two months with an injury, new manager Gerard Houllier announced that Reo-Coker would be captain in Petrov's absence. 2009-10: Reo-Coker made only 12 appearances in his third season with Villa, 2008-09: Reo-Coker played a key role in a successful season for Aston Villa as they finished sixth in the Premier League and reached the round of 32 in the UEFA Cup. He made 34 appearances in all competitions and enjoyed a rare double goalscoring week in September 2008 when he scored in consecutive games against Tottenham Hotspur in a 2-1 win, his first Premier League goal for Villa, and PFC Litex Lovech in the first round of the UEFA Cup. 2007-08: On July 5, 2007 Aston Villa paid West Ham United £8.5 million for Reo-Coker's services. The Croydon native missed only two league games all season for Villa. In a League Cup tie against Wrexham,

win, On January 21, 2008 Reo-Coker captained the side in a league game away to Liverpool in the absence of regular captain Gareth Barry. 2006-07: Reo-Coker was a mainstay in the West Ham United lineup in the 2006-07 Premier League season. He played in both legs of their UEFA Cup first round loss against Serie A outfit Palermo and also played 35 matches in the Premier League as the team narrowly avoided relegation on the final day of the season. 2005-06: Following the previous season's promotion, West Ham United exceeded expectations in the Premier League with Reo-Coker playing a key role as team captain en-route to a ninthplace finish in the league table. Reo-Coker scored five league goals, including a goal on the opening day of the season in a 3-1 win against Blackburn Rovers. The team did particularly well in the FA Cup, reaching the final for the first time in 26 years. Reo-Coker captained the side out against Liverpool at Millennium Stadium in Cardiff. Wales, in what turned out to be a classic FA Cup final, with a last minute wonder goal from Steven Gerrard equalizing the match at 3-3 and preventing Reo-Coker and West Ham from lifting the cup. Ultimately, Liverpool finally triumphed on penalties, 2004-05; Reo-Coker played a key part of West Ham United's team that won promotion from the Football League Championship. In his first season in professional football he made 36 appearances and scored 2 goals.

Reo-Coker was first named to England's U-21 squad for a 2004 UEFA U-21 Championship qualifying match against Turkey in October, 2003. He went on to make 23 appearances the U-21 squad, scoring one goal. On March 24, 2007 Reo-Coker captained the England U-21 team against their Italian counterparts and in the process becoming the first Englishman to captain a side at the rebuilt Wembley Stadium. Reo-Coker went on to captain England U-21 in the 2007 UEFA U-21 Championship where they reached the semifinals before losing to eventual winners the Netherlands. As a young player, the Londoner was also on England's U-20 national team in 2005. Although having made an appearance for the senior national team, Reo-Coker was named as a standby for the 2006 World Cup but was replaced by Phil Neville following a back injury.

A tall forward with great potential, the native of El Paso, Texas, had previously trained with Vancouver's USSF D-2 Pro League squad in Aug. 2010.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER

2013: Salgado missed the duration of the 2013 MLS season while recovering from a right foot fracture. 2012: Salgado was #23 in MLSsoccer. com's '24 Under 24' list for the season on Sept. 10. He assisted on Eric Hassli's first goal of the season during the first leg of Whitecaps FC's Amway Canadian Championship semifinal, as Vancouver won 2-0 at North American Soccer League side FC Edmonton on May 2. He also assisted on Alain Rochat's first goal of the season during a 2-2 home draw with Pacific Northwest rivals Seattle Sounders FC on May

19. After suffering a broken foot with the United States U-20 national team on June 6. Salgado had to wait more than five months before his next MLS appearance. On Oct. 21, he was a late substitute in Whitecaps FC's 1-0 home defeat to Portland Timbers. Highly involved in club and community initiatives off the pitch during the season, Salgado was named Whitecaps FC's Humanitarian of the Year. 2011: Salgado was selected first overall in the MLS SuperDraft by Whitecaps FC on Jan. 13. Despite being a foreign national under 18 years of age, the striker was made available for selection by Whitecaps FC after FIFA, the Canadian Soccer Association, and the United States Soccer Federation approved Salgado's International Transfer Certificate on Mar. 25. Salgado started five of his 14 appearances during his rookie season in MLS, with his league debut coming as a late substitute in Whitecaps FC's 3-1 defeat at Houston Dynamo on Apr. 10, as he replaced goalscorer Camilo in Vancouver's attack. Following his recovery from a broken foot, Salgado made his first start in a Whitecaps FC uniform in over four months on Oct. 12, as the 'Caps reserves fell 6-0 at LA Galaxy reserves, 2011:Salgado appeared in all but two of Whitecaps FC reserves' matches that season. The striker scored on his debut in the MLS Reserve League, as Salgado earned Whitecaps FC reserves a 1-1 home draw with Chivas USA reserves on Apr. 17. Salgado also scored a consolation goal in Whitecaps FC reserves' 2-1 away defeat to LA Galaxy reserves on June 20. He then assisted on Michael Nanchoff's goal, as Whitecaps FC reserves claimed a 2-1 home win over Seattle Sounders FC reserves on Aug. 9. The result at Swangard Stadium was Vancouver's first-ever win in the Reserve League. He also spent time with the club's U-17 squad, where in Jan. 2010, Salgado was named Player of the Tournament in South America's U-17 Copa Libertadores competition. 

Morales, 28, comes to Vancouver having played the last two seasons with Spain's La Liga side Málaga CF. The 5-foot-11, 170-pound Chilean midfielder started 13 of his 22 league appearances and scored four goals with the club from southern Spain.

PROFILE

An attack-minded player who can play on the left side of midfield, Russell Teibert joined Whitecaps FC's Major League Soccer roster after signing a Generation adidas contract as a Home Grown player on Mar. 17, 2011. The native of Niagara Falls, Ontario, was one of four players to join Whitecaps FC Residency during its second year of existence. Named Canadian U-17 Player of the Year in 2008 and 2009, Teibert joined the program on Sept. 10, 2008. 2013 has been a year to remember for Teibert: ever since scoring two goals to propel the 'Caps to victory on May 11, the midfielder has found himself to be a regular part of Martin Rennie's starting XI; he also starred in Team Canada's 1-0 loss to Martinique in the Gold Cup.

PROFILE

A right fullback with four years of MLS experience under his belt, Steven Beitashour ioined Whitecaps FC on January 27, 2014 after being acquired from Western Conference rivals San Jose Earthquakes, Well respected amongst his peers. Beitashour was named an MLS All-Star during the 2012 season. Born to Iranian parents. Beitashour made his debut with the Iranian senior men's national team in 2013.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER

2013: After sitting out the first seven matches of the season. Beitashour started each of San Jose's final 27 MLS matches, scoring one goal and recording three assists. The defender's three assists came on May 5 against Toronto FC, May 11 against Seattle, and June 1 against Real Salt Lake. His lone goal in 2013, and the second goal of his MLS career, came on August 24 against FC Dallas. Beitashour also made one start for the Earthquakes in the 2013-14 CONCACAF Champions League, playing the full 90 minutes in a 1-0 win over Guatemalan side CD Heredia in the club's final group stage match on October 23. The victory allowed San Jose to advance to the guarterfinals, 2012: Started all 33 of his MLS appearances, missing only a single match for the 2012 Supporter's Shield winners. His six assists were the third highest total on the team, and only one off of his career high set the previous year. In the U.S. Open Cup. Beitashour appeared in all three matches for San Jose, starting twice and recording one assist. Among his highlights from the 2012 season was a selection to the MLS All-Star team, where he started alongside Whitecaps FC captain Jay DeMerit and played the full 90 minutes in a 3-2 win over English Premier League side Chelsea FC. Come playoff time. Beitashour started both of the Quakes' Western Conference semifinal matches as they fell to eventual MLS Cup champions LA Galaxy. 2011: In his second MLS season, Beitashour started all 19 of his appearances while leading the team with seven assists - which was also tied for a league high among defenders. A start against Chicago Fire on September 10 would begin a stretch of eight consecutive MLS starts to end the season, a streak that would extend to 30 consecutive starts until July 22. 2012 at BC Place. Also made two starts in U.S. Open Cup qualifying, playing 120 minutes in a 1-0 shootout win against Portland Timbers on May 3, and another 120 minutes in a 3-2 shootout defeat against Chicago Fire on May 24, 2010: Was drafted in the second round of

the 2010 MLS SuperDraft (30th overall) by his hometown San Jose Earthquakes. During his rookie season. Beitashour would start seven of his eight MLS appearances. He scored his first career MLS goal on April 24, on the road in a 3-2 defeat against Chivas USA, In U.S. Open Cup qualification, played 107 minutes in a 4-3 shootout defeat to Real Salt Lake on April 14.

INTERNATIONAL

A dual American-Iranian citizen. Beitashour chose to represent Iran when he was called into camp for 2015 AFC Asian Cup qualification. He made his debut in Iran's 2-1 win over Thailand. coming on as a 76th minute substitute for Hossein Mahini. He made his first start and recorded his first assist for Iran in the ensuing match, again against Thailand, a 3-0 victory that ensured their qualification to the 2015 AFC Asian Cup. Beitashour then went on to start the next match as well, a 4-1 victory over Lebannon.

Prior to committing to Iran, Beitashour had been called into one camp with the United States men's national team, getting the call from head coach Jurgen Klinsmann in August of 2012.

HISTORICAL INFORMATION

CLUB HISTORY

On December 11, 1973, then general manager Denny Veitch announced that Vancouver would join the North American Soccer League (NASL) for the 1974 season. Thus, the Vancouver Whitecaps were born.

In 1979, the club became Vancouver's only professional sports team to win a major North American championship when they won the NASL Soccer Bowl title. By 1984, however, instability forced the NASL to suspend operations and the Whitecaps folded that year.

In 1986, professional soccer returned to Vancouver when the 86ers were launched following the formation of the Canadian Soccer League (CSL). The 86ers then won the first of four-straight CSL championships in 1988 before the league folded in 1992 after just six seasons in existence. As a result, the 86ers joined the American Professional Soccer League in 1993.

In 1997, BC Lions owner David Braley purchased the club from Milan Ilich before selling it to local businessman David Stadnyk in 2000. It was under Stadnyk that the franchise name was changed back to the Whitecaps that same year.

Following the departure of Stadnyk as owner midway through the 2002 season, a search committee led to Greg Kerfoot taking ownership of the club on November 13, 2002, with success arriving soon after. Whitecaps FC were crowned United Soccer Leagues First Division (USL-1) champions in 2006 before head coach Teitur Thordarson triumphed in his first season as men's team head coach when he led the club to the 2008 USL-1 title.

On March 18, 2009, Vancouver were announced as the 17th team to join Major League Soccer (MLS) for 2011. Their inaugural season in MLS started triumphantly on March 19, 2011, as Whitecaps FC defeated Canadian arch-rivals Toronto FC 4-2 at Empire Field. Despite a difficult first season in North America's top flight, Whitecaps FC made a renovated BC Place their new home in October 2011.

Whitecaps FC women, meanwhile, enjoyed success of their own in the USL W-League, as they were crowned champions in 2004 and 2006. In 2008, Whitecaps FC Residency played their inaugural season in the USL Premier Development League and reached the playoff semifinals before falling to eventual champions

Thunder Bay Chill.

Launched in 2007, the Residency program has produced players for Whitecaps FC's MLS roster and the Canadian national team program. With an expanded Residency structure, Whitecaps FC became the first and only Canadian club to join America's premier youth academy system - the United States Soccer Development Academy (USSDA). The club's U-18 Residency squad enjoyed a memorable first season (2011-12) in the USSDA, as they reached the U-17/18 championship final before falling 3-2 to FC Dallas Academy in Houston, Texas, on July 22, 2012.

On September 6, 2012, Whitecaps FC joined the government of British Columbia and the University of British Columbia (UBC) in announcing the construction of the National Soccer Development Centre (NSDC) on the campus of UBC. As the club's training base from spring 2013, the world-class facility will include a new state-of-the-art fieldhouse and the construction, refurbishment, and improvement of five fields - three grass and two artificial turf - at UBC's Thunderbird Park. Completion of the NSDC project will be in advance of the 2015 FIFA Women's World Cup in Canada.



AMWAY CANADIAN CHAMPIONSHIP



Formed as a competition in 2008, the Amway Canadian Championship (formerly the Nutrilite Canadian Championship) was developed by the Canadian Soccer Association along with four of Canada's professional clubs including three Major League Soccer (MLS) teams - Montreal Impact, Toronto FC, and Vancouver Whitecaps FC as well as FC Edmonton of the North American Soccer League (NASL). Currently in its fourth year of existence, the winner of the annual tournament not only claims the Voyageurs Cup as Canadian champions, they also earn Canada's lone spot in the CONCACAF Champions League. A 24-club competition that involves the top sides from North America, Central America, and the Caribbean, the CONCACAF Champions League qualifies the confederation's representative for the annual FIFA Club World Cup.

The first Canadian Championship tournament took place in 2008, with Montreal surprising many by claiming the inaugural title ahead of the more-fancied Toronto FC. The Whitecaps campaign that year did not go according to plan, as a pair of defeats to the Impact left Vancouver with an uphill battle to win the Vovageurs Cup. To their credit, the 'Caps did play an important role in the eventual outcome of the 2008 tournament after claiming a famous away win over Toronto FC before drawing with the MLS club at Swangard Stadium. Montreal went on to have an impressive campaign in the inaugural CONCACAF Champions League, as they reached the quarterfinals.

The 2009 competition started disappointingly for the Whitecaps following a tournamentopening defeat at Toronto FC. Vancouver would bounce back to challenge the MLS club for the title after back-to-back wins over Montreal, and a famous 2-0 victory over TFC at Swangard. Despite those efforts, the 'Caps missed out on winning the Voyageurs Cup on goal difference, as Toronto FC recorded a remarkable 6-1 win over the Impact in Montreal in the competition's final match. TFC went on to the preliminary round of the 2009-10 CONCACAF Champions League as Canadian champions, where they failed to reach the competition's group stages after losing 1-0 on aggregate to Puerto Rico Islanders.

The 2010 Canadian Championship saw the Whitecaps go undefeated in four tournament matches, but again come up short to Toronto FC for the national crown. The 'Caps began the tournament with two home matches, a 1-1 draw with Montreal and a 0-0 result against TFC. Vancouver looked to be on their way to a crucial away win at Montreal in their third match, but the Impact came back for a 1-1 draw that ended the 'Caps title hopes and handed TFC the Vovageurs Cup for the second straight season. The blue and white finished with a 0-0 result in Toronto, giving them four draws in four matches. TFC improved their performance in the regional tournament, making the group stage of the 2010-11 CONCACAF Champions League, but failed to make it to the knockout round. In 2011 the inclusion of FC Edmonton to the

annual tournament lead to a switch from the previous round-robin format which was replaced by a home-and-away semifinal stage, followed by a home-and-away championship final series. In their first Canadian Championship tournament as an MLS club. Vancouver Whitecaps FC held a one goal lead over Montreal Impact after the first leg of the semifinals at Stade Saputo. During the second leg at their home stadium Empire Field, Vancouver gave up a late penalty to make the series 1-1 on aggregate, but pulled off some late heroics by scoring a goal in overtime to clinch a place in the final series by a score of 2-1 on aggregate.

Toronto FC had a clean sweep in their two semifinal matches against FC Edmonton defeating the NASL side 0-3 in Edmonton before taking the series 4-0 on aggregate at BMO Field.

The final series between Vancouver and Toronto began with a 1-1 draw between the two MLS sides at Empire Field. The 'Caps looked on their way to securing their first ever championship, leading in the second-leg match by a score of 1-0 after 60 minutes at BMO field before the game was abandoned due to unplayable field conditions. Those ambitions were short lived as TFC went on to defeat Whitecaps FC 2-1 in the rescheduled second-lea match to win the series by a score of 3-2 on aggregate. It was the third straight Voyageurs Cup for TFC who also received the lone berth into the CONCACAF Champions League.

After defeating Real Esteli of Nicaragua in preliminary qualifying, Toronto FC placed second in Group C of the CONCACAF Champions League, to advance to the quarterfinals against MLS side LA Galaxy. TFC recorded a surprising 4-3 aggregate win over their highly-fancied American rivals, but their campaign ended in the semifinals against Mexican club Santos Laguna, losing 7-3 on aggregate which included a 6-2 drubbing in the second lea in Torreon.

The 2012 Amway Canadian Championship (ACC) again featured a four-team format with clubs being seeded based on their 2011 league results in Major League Soccer (MLS) and the North American Soccer League (NASL) respectively. Western Canadian foes Vancouver Whitecaps FC and FC Edmonton squared off for the first time over two legs on May 2 and 9, with Whitecaps FC eliminating the Alberta club 5-1 on aggregate. Meanwhile, Threetime defending champions Toronto FC ousted Canadian rivals Montreal Impact courtesy of a 2-0 home win in the second leg. The first leg of the ACC final occurred on May 16 at BC Place,

with Whitecaps FC needing a stoppage time equalizer from Eric Hassli to take a 1-1 draw to BMO Field for the second lea. On home turf. TFC made it four Canadian Championships thanks to a late goal from midfielder Reggie Lambe. At the CONCACAF Champions League, TFC bowed out in the group stage at the hands of new nemesis Santos Laguna.

The 2013 ACC followed the same format from the previous year with clubs being seeded based on their 2012 league results. Because Whitecaps FC finished with the best record, they began their ACC run against FC Edmonton in the two-legged semifinal while Toronto FC met Montreal Impact in the other.

On April 24. Whitecaps FC ACC run began with a 3-2 win over FC Edmonton at Commonwealth Stadium and on May 1 ended with a 2-0 win at BC Place to secure their spot in the final against Montreal Impact. The Impact defeated ACC five-time defending champions Toronto FC in the final leg, after TFC took the first game at BMO Field 2-0, to end their semifinal playoff game 6-0 which secured the Impact to a place in the final on a 6-2 aggregate. Heading to the final ACC home-and-away series for the fifth consecutive time since 2009, the 'Caps played to a 0-0 draw against Montreal Impact at Stade Saputo on May 15. The final took place two weeks later on May 29 at BC Place where the Impact came from behind thanks to a Hassoun Camara header in the 84th minute to secure a 2-2 draw and earn the Impact the Vovageurs Cup title by virtue of away goals. In the 2013-14 CONCACAF Champions League, Montreal were unable to make it out of the group stages even though all three teams were tied on six points, the bowed out over goal differential.

The 2014 ACC will include new North American Soccer League (NASL) Canadian side Ottawa Fury FC. With now five teams competing for the Voyageurs Cup, a quarterfinal will take place between FC Edmonton and Ottawa Fury FC. The winner of the home-and-away series will move on to the semifinal and face Montreal Impact, who has the first seed in the ACC. Toronto FC and Whitecaps FC will verse each other in the second semifinal series.

The final will again be held over two matches on XXX and XXX, with the winner earning qualification to the 2014-15 CONCACAF Champions League, which in turn determines the confederation's representative at the 2015 FIFA Club World Cup.





CASCADIA CUP

The Cascadia Cup represents one of the most passionate derby rivalries in North America. Known for the region of North America that Vancouver, Seattle, and Portland represent, the Cascadia Cup was created by the supporters of Vancouver Whitecaps FC, Seattle Sounders FC. and Portland Timbers. Officially founded in 2004, the origins of the cup date back to when all three clubs were members of the United Soccer Leagues First Division. The combined fan-based organizations of the three clubs came together to produce the two-foot-tall silver Cascadia Cup, which is awarded annually to the team with the best head-to-head record in regular season matches between their Pacific Northwest rivals.

Whitecaps FC hold the distinction of winning the first-ever Cascadia Cup title in its founding year. From 2004 until 2008, all three clubs competed for the cup in USL-1 play, with Vancouver raising the cup again in 2005 and 2008, while Seattle claimed the title in 2006 and 2007.

For 2009 and 2010, the Cascadia Cup format was briefly altered following Seattle Sounders FC's move to MLS. It meant the trophy would be contested solely between the 'Caps and Timbers for two seasons at the North American second division level. During that period, Portland won their first Cascadia Cup in 2009 before defending their title in 2010.

2011 marked a return to the original three-club format for the competition after Whitecaps FC and the Timbers joined MLS. Fan-based organizations for both clubs renewed their rivalry with Seattle supporters, as the three clubs renewed their derby battles in regular season action. Sounders FC would go on to win their third Cascadia Cup, and their first since 2007, after coming from behind to win away matches in Vancouver and Portland and earning draws against both sides in Seattle. Last season's success tied Sounders FC with Whitecaps FC for the most Cascadia Cup victories with three each.

With the inclusion of expansion side Montreal Impact into MLS bringing the total number of clubs in the league to 19, a new conferencebased schedule was created for 2012, emphasizing local rivalries and increasing the number of head-to-head games played between

conference teams to three matches-a-side. The new schedule format meant the Pacific Northwest rivals played a differing number of home and away matches this year, with Portland hosting both Vancouver and Seattle twice. Vancouver hosting Seattle twice and Portland once, and Seattle hosting both clubs only once each. Despite the unbalanced number of home and away games, the three fan-based organizations agreed that all regular season matches between the sides wouldcount equally towards determining the Cascadia Cup winner.In the last Pacific Northwest match-up of the 2012 season. Portland Timbers defeated Whitecaps FC 1-0 in Vancouver to overtake Seattle in the standings and clinch their third Cascadia Cup. meaning all three clubs each have three Cups to their names.

In 2013, the teams once again played each other three times. For the first time since 2008, Whitecaps FC clinched the Cascadia Cup to become the first club to have won the title four times. Down to the final match, it was thanks to Portland Timbers FC and their 2-1 defeat of Seattle Sounders FC at home that helped the 'Caps to win the cup.

In 2014 the teams will play each other X times. In the event of a tie at the end of the regular season, the club with the greater number of points earned in matches between the teams concerned will be deemed the Cascadia Cup winner. If the teams still cannot be separated, then the side with the greater goal difference in matches between said teams will be taken into account. After that, the team with the most goals in matches between the concerned clubs will determine the winner.



2014 MLS PLAYER RULES AND REGULATIONS

I. MLS ROSTER COMPOSITION

A Major League Soccer club's first team roster is comprised of up to 30 players. All 30 players are eligible for selection to each 18-player game-day squad during the regular season and playoffs.

SALARY & BUDGET:

- Players occupying roster spots 1-20 count against the club's 2012 salary budget of \$2,810,000, and are referred to collectively as the club's Salary Budget Players.
- Roster spots 19 and 20 are not required to be filled, and teams may spread their salary budget across only 18 Salary Budget Players. A minimum salary budget charge will be imputed against a team's salary budget for each unfilled senior roster slot below 18.
- The maximum budget charge for a single player is \$350,000.*
- A Designated Player over the age of 23 counts as \$350,000 against the club's salary budget, unless the player joins his club in the middle of the season, in which case his budget charge will be \$175,000.
- A Designated Player 20 years old or younger** (referred to as Young Designated Players or Young DPs) to counts as \$150,000 against the club's salary budget
- ▶ A Designated Player 21–23 years old** counts as \$200,000 against the club's salary budget.
- ▶ The budget charge for the midseason signing of a Young DP is \$150,000 and this amount cannot be lowered with allocation funds.
- Clubs will not have to buy the third DP roster slot to accommodate a Young Designated Player whereas clubs are normally required to buy that slot for a one-time fee of \$250,000.
- ▶ Clubs are responsible for all amounts above the budget charge for all Designated Players.
- Players occupying roster spots 21-30 do not count against the club's salary budget, and are referred to collectively as the club's Off-Budget Players (maximum of 10 per team).

- All Generation adidas players are Off-Budget players.
- ▶ Players occupying roster spots 1-24 will earn at least \$44,000 in 2012.
- Players occupying roster spots 25-30 will earn at least \$33,750 in 2012.
- Delubs may elect to leave up to two of these roster spots (25-30) vacant and use \$35,000 for each empty spot as allocation money.
- ▶ Clubs may sign up to two Homegrown Players contracts above the minimum salary and similar to Generation adidas player contract amounts.

AGE DESIGNATIONS:

Any player making \$33,750 must be under the age 25 (does not turn 25 or older in 2012).

DOMESTIC/INTERNATIONAL:

- In 2012, a total of 152 international slots are divided among the 19 clubs. Each club began with eight international slots, which are tradable. There is no limit on the number of international slots on each club's roster.
- The remaining roster slots must belong to domestic players. For clubs based in the United States, a domestic player is either a U.S. citizen, a permanent resident (green card holder) or the holder of other special status (e.g., refugee or asylum status).
- The three MLS clubs based in Canada -Montreal Impact, Toronto FC and Vancouver Whitecaps FC – began with eight international slots, but their domestic slots may be filled with either Canadian or U.S. domestic players.
- MLS clubs based in Canada are required to have a minimum of three Canadian domestic players on their rosters.
- Players with the legal right to work in Canada are considered Canadian domestic players (i.e., Canadian citizen, permanent resident, part of a protected class).

NOTE: The terms Homegrown and Generation adidas are used to describe mechanisms by which players are acquired. They are not roster designations. All players' roster slots are determined by their compensation and/or age as outlined above.

II. PLAYER ACQUISITION MECHANISMS

MLS teams may acquire players and add them to their rosters via the following mechanisms:

(A) ALLOCATION RANKING

The allocation ranking is the mechanism used to determine which MLS club has first priority to acquire a U.S. National Team player who signs with MLS after playing abroad, or a former MLS player who returns to the League after having gone to a club abroad for a transfer fee. The allocation rankings may also be used in the event two or more clubs file a request for the same player on the same day when the discovery period opens in December. The allocations will be ranked in reverse order of finish for the 2011 season, taking playoff performance into account.

Once the club uses its allocation ranking to acquire a player, it drops to the bottom of the list. A ranking can be traded, provided that part of the compensation received in return is the other club's ranking. At all times, each club is assigned one ranking. The rankings reset at the end of each MLS League season.

ALLOCATION MONEY

Allocation money is a resource available to clubs in addition to their respective salary budgets.

A club may receive allocation money for:

- (1) failure to qualify for the MLS Cup Playoffs;
- (2) the transfer of a player to a club outside of MLS for value;
- (3) expansion status:
- (4) qualification for the CONCACAF Champions
- (5) trading in up to two Off-Budget roster spots;
- (6) funds from purchased third designated player roster spots.

Each year the MLS Competition Committee determines the allocation amount to be made available to each club. Allocation money can be traded by clubs. Allocation money does not count against a club's salary budget and can be used:

- To sign players new to MLS (that is, a player who did not play in MLS during the previous
- To re-sign an existing MLS player, subject to League approval.
- To "buy-down" a player's salary budget charge below the League maximum of \$350,000.

In connection with the exercise of an option to purchase a player's rights or the extension of a player's contract for the second year provided the player was new to MLS in the immediately prior year.

NOTE: To protect the interests of MLS and its clubs during discussions with prospective players or clubs in other leagues, amounts of allocation money held by each club will not be shared publicly.

(B) DESIGNATED PLAYER

The Designated Player Rule allows clubs to acquire up to three players whose salaries exceed their budget charges, with the club bearing financial responsibility for the amount of compensation above each player's budget charge. Designated Player slots may be used to acquire players new to MLS or to retain current MLS players, subject to League approval.

In 2012, a Designated Player over the age of 23** will carry a salary budget charge of \$350,000, unless the player joins his club in the middle of the season, in which case his budget charge will be \$175,000.

A Designated Player 20 years old or younger** counts as \$150,000 against the club's salary budget and a Designated Player 21-23 years old counts as \$200,000 against the club's salary

Clubs have the option of "buying down" the budget charge of a Designated Player with allocation money. The reduced charge may not be less than \$150,000.

The budget charge for the mid-season signing of a young Designated Player (23 years old and younger) is \$150,000 and this amount cannot be lowered with allocation funds.

Each club has two Designated Player slots and clubs are allowed to "purchase" a third Designated Player slot for a one-time fee of \$250,000 that will be dispersed in the form of allocation money to all clubs that do not have three Designated Players. Clubs will not have to buy the third DP roster slot to accommodate Designated Players 23 years old and younger. Designated Player slots are not tradable.

^{*} See section entitled Allocation Money below, under Player Acquisition Mechanisms, for details on buying down a player's budget charge.

^{**} Age of player is determined by year (not date) of birth.

(C) SUPERDRAFT

The 2012 MLS SuperDraft, held Jan. 12 in Kansas City, Mo., consisted of two rounds of 19 picks for a total of 38 player selections. A supplemental draft was held Jan. 17 via teleconference and consisted of four rounds of 19 picks.

The majority of draft prospects are NCAA college seniors who have exhausted their college eligibility. Generation adidas players and non-collegiate international players are also eligible for selection in the SuperDraft and supplemental draft. Clubs may nominate players for the League's draft-eligible list, and only players from that list may be selected.

Generation adidas is a joint program between MLS and adidas that is dedicated to developing exceptional domestic talent in a professional environment. Each year, a handful of top domestic underclassmen and youth national team players are signed to the league and placed in the SuperDraft through this program. Generation adidas players also receive an educational stipend.

Draft Order: The Montreal Impact held the first overall selection in the 2012 MLS SuperDraft as expansion clubs are always given the top spot in the SuperDraft and the Supplemental Draft. The next eight selections went to clubs that did not qualify for the 2011 MLS Cup Playoffs beginning with the club with fewest regular season points (3 points per win, one point per tie). The remaining ten positions were ranked by fewest regular season points among the teams that were eliminated in the same round of the MLS Cup Playoffs.

Unless claimed on waivers, a player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft or supplemental draft and did not sign with the League, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 following the draft in question. after which the team loses the rights to the player.

(D) TRADES

Players, SuperDraft and Supplemental draft picks, allocation money, allocation rankings, and international player slots may all be exchanged in trades approved by the MLS League Office, provided all of the necessary rules regarding roster and salary budget compliance are met and the trade is completed during a valid trading period. No trades may occur after the Roster Freeze Deadline of September 15, 2012 at 5 p.m. ET.

(E) DISCOVERY SIGNINGS

Clubs may make discovery claims on players not yet under MLS contract who are not subject to the allocation ranking or lottery mechanisms. Each club has the opportunity to make six discovery signings per season (expansion teams may make 10 discovery signings in their inaugural season). A club may have up to 10 discovery claims on unsigned players at any time and may remove or add players at any time. The last day for discovery player signings is September 15, 2012 - coinciding with the roster freeze date and trade deadline.

The six discovery signings can be used to fill senior roster spots only. If multiple clubs claim the same player using a discovery, the club that filed the claim first will have first rights to the player. Discovery claims expire following each season. If the League and player are unable to reach an agreement during the season, the club that first filed the discovery retains the right of first refusal in the event the player is later signed by the League.

Note: To protect interests of MLS clubs in scouting and negotiations with prospective players, the League office will not publicize the names of players on club discovery lists, nor specify if a discovery claim has been filed on a particular player.

(F) HOMEGROWN PLAYER SIGNINGS

A club may sign a player to his first professional contract without subjecting him to the MLS SuperDraft if the player has trained for at least one year in the club's youth development program and has met the League's Homegrown Player criteria. Players joining MLS through this mechanism are known as Homegrown Players. There is no limit to the number of Homegrown

Players a club may sign in a given year.

(G) RE-ENTRY PROCESS

The 2012 Re-Entry Process will commence after MLS Cup. The priority order for the Re-Entry Draft is reverse order of finish in 2012, taking into account playoff performance.

Available to all teams in Stage 1 of the Re-Entry draft will be:

- 1. Players who are at least 23 years old and have a minimum of three years experience in MLS whose options were not exercised by their clubs (available at option salary for 2013).
- 2. Players who are at least 25 years old with a minimum of four years of MLS experience who are out of contract and whose club does not wish to re-sign them at their previous salary (available for at least their 2012 salary).
- 3. Players who are at least 30 years old with a minimum of eight years of MLS experience who are out of contract and whose club does not wish to re-sign them (available for at least 105% of their 2012 salary).

Players who are not selected in Stage 1 of the Re-Entry Draft will be made available in Stage 2. Clubs selecting players in Stage 2 will negotiate a new salary with the player.

Players who remain unselected after Stage 2 will be available to any MLS club on a first come, first serve basis.

(H) WAIVERS

A team may place a player on waivers at any time during the regular season at which point he is made available to all other teams. The waiver claiming period shall commence on the first business day after the League delivers notice to teams and shall expire at 5 p.m. EST on the second business day after the Waiver Period Commencement Date. The claiming period is 48 hours.

The Waiver Draft order is determined via points per game once all teams have played at least three MLS League games. If the waiver takes place prior to all teams playing in at least three League games, priority shall be granted based upon the prior year's performance, taking playoff performance first, with teams eliminated from playoff contention at the same stage separated according to their point totals through the end of the regular season. New expansion teams shall be at the bottom of the waiver order.

Once a team selects a player off waivers, that club is automatically moved to the bottom of the priority list for subsequent waiver selections in a given season, regardless of its points-per-game total. Players who may be placed on the MLS waiver wire are as follows:

- (i) A player waived by an MLS team in the current season:
- (ii) A player who completed his college eligibility within the past season, who was not made available in the SuperDraft or Supplemental
- (iii) A player who has remaining college eligibility (and was not made available in the SuperDraft or Supplemental Draft), but the League at its discretion and after taking into account exceptional circumstances determines the player may be offered an MLS contract;
- (iv)A player who has played in MLS previously where his last MLS team does not wish to exercise their right of first refusal, except in the case of returning U.S. National Team players as stated above.
- (v) A player who was drafted in the SuperDraft or supplemental draft, and who after a trial with the club is not offered a contract by the first Monday of June.

(I) LOTTERY

Some players shall be assigned to MLS teams via the weighted Lottery process. Any team assigned a player through the lottery in any particular season shall not be assigned another lottery player that season unless and until all teams have received a lottery player or have agreed to waive their option to participate in a Lottery. The players made available through lotteries include:

- (i) Generation adidas players signed after the MLS SuperDraft;
- (ii) Draft eligible players to whom an MLS contract was offered but who failed to sign with the League prior to the Draft.

The weighted lottery takes into consideration each team's performance over its last 34 regular season games and the most recent postseason. The team with the worst record over its last 34 regular season games (dating back to previous season if necessary and taking playoff performance into account) will have the greatest probability of winning the lottery. Teams are not required to participate in a lottery. Players are assigned via the lottery system in order to prevent a player from potentially influencing his destination club with a strategic holdout.





(J) EXTREME HARDSHIP CALL-UPS

Teams may add players to their roster in cases of "extreme hardship" as follows: (1) a club with three goalkeepers on its 30-man roster, but has less than two available goalkeepers or (2) a team has less than 15 available players. Extreme hardship call-ups are made on a game-by-game basis.

(K) SEASON-ENDING INJURY REPLACEMENTS (SEASON ENDING INJURY LIST)

A team with a player lost to a season-ending injury can place the player on the Season Ending Injury List and replace that player on its roster, while remaining responsible for the full amount of the injured player's salary. A player can be placed on the season-ending injury list once another player has been signed as a replacement (provided the team has budget space). International player limits still apply at the time a season-ending replacement is made (with the player being replaced not counting against those limits).

(L) SHORT-TERM INJURY REPLACEMENTS (DISABLED LIST)

A player who has a short-term injury can be placed on the Disabled List once another player has been signed as a replacement (provided the team has budget space). The team will remain responsible for the full amount of the injured player's salary on the salary budget. Note: the injured player will have to sit out a minimum of six MLS League matches before he can reioin the team's roster.

International player limits still apply at the time a short-term replacement is made (with the player being replaced not counting against those limits).

NOTE: No changes may be made to a team's active full roster during the period beginning on September 16, 2012 (day after Roster Freeze Date) through the day after MLS Cup. Nevertheless, a team may obtain players in accordance with the extreme hardship rules and procedures to replace players who are injured or otherwise legitimately unavailable after the Roster Freeze Date. Any other replacements after the Roster Freeze Date may only be made in exceptional circumstances in the League's sole and absolute discretion.

(III.) METHODS OF RELEASING PLAYERS

(A) WAIVERS

Teams may waive players based on performance at any time during the MLS season. Players with guaranteed contracts will continue to have their salary budget charge applied to the team salary budget, subject to any settlement. Players on semi-guaranteed contracts can be waived prior to July 1 of any year and free up the corresponding budget space. If a player on a semi-quaranteed contract is waived after July 1, his salary budget charge will count against the team's salary budget and the team waiving the player will not receive a replacement except under the normal player acquisition mechanisms. Any settlement amount will be charged to the team's salary budget.

(B) TRANSFERS AND LOANS

An MLS player may be transferred or loaned at any time to a team outside the League (subject to that team's Federation's transfer window), subject to the consent of the player.

The registration windows – the dates between which MLS may request the transfer certificate of a player under contract in another country are as follows:

January 21 - April 15 (Primary Window) June 27 - July 27 (Secondary Window)

(C) CONTRACT EXPIRATION

When a player's contract expires, the player does not count against the roster or budget of the team in question. Subject to the Re-Entry Draft rules, a team retains the rights to the player indefinitely following the expiration of a contract only if attempts were made to re-sign the player.

(D) BUYOUT OF GUARANTEED CONTRACT

Teams may have the ability to buyout one guaranteed player as follows:

- A Team may buy out one (1) guaranteed player (including a DP's) contract during the offseason and free up the corresponding budget space. Such a buyout is at the particular MLS Team's own expense.
- A Team may not free up budget space with a buyout of a player's salary budget charge during the season. Such a buyout will be conducted by the League and count on a Club's budget in a manner consistent with current MLS guidelines.

(IV.) RIGHT OF FIRST REFUSAL

Right of first refusal grants one MLS club the first opportunity to add a player to its roster in the event that the player signs with MLS. Holding a right of first refusal applies only within MLS and does not indicate holding of the player's International Transfer Certificate.

OUT OF CONTRACT PLAYERS / OPTIONS NOT PICKED UP

Subject to the Re-Entry Draft rules, a team retains the right of first refusal to the player indefinitely only if attempts were made to re-sign the player.

DRAFTED BUT NOT SIGNED

A player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft or supplemental draft and did not sign, or who as of the first Monday in June is not offered a contract after a trial and clears waivers, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 immediately following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to sign the

PLAYER TRANSFERRED OUTSIDE MLS

If a team receives allocation money as a result of a player's transfer, the team does not retain a right of first refusal.

2014 MLS RULES OF COMPETITION

I. MLS ROSTER COMPOSITION

A Major League Soccer club's first team roster is comprised of up to 30 players. All 30 players are eligible for selection to each 18-player game-day squad during the regular season and playoffs.

SALARY & BUDGET:

- Players occupying roster spots 1-20 count against the club's 2014 salary budget of \$3,100,000, and are referred to collectively as the club's Salary Budget Players.
- oRoster spots 19 and 20 are not required to be filled, and teams may spread their salary budget across only 18 Salary Budget Players. A minimum salary budget charge will be imputed against a team's salary budget for each unfilled senior roster slot below 18.
- oThe maximum budget charge for a single player is \$387,500.*
- * See section entitled Allocation Money below, under Player Acquisition Mechanisms, for details on buying down a player's budget charge.
- ** Age of player is determined by year (not date) of birth.
- Players occupying roster spots 21-30 do not count against the club's salary budget, and are referred to collectively as the club's Off-Budget Players (maximum of 10 per team).
- oAll Generation adidas players are Off-Budget
- oPlayers occupying roster spots 1-24 will earn at least \$48,500 in 2014.
- oPlayers occupying roster spots 25-30 will earn at least \$36,500 in 2014.
- oClubs may sign up to two Homegrown Players contracts above the minimum salary and similar to Generation adidas player contract amounts.

AGE DESIGNATIONS:

• Any player making \$36,500 must be under the age 25 (does not turn 25 or older in 2014).

DOMESTIC/INTERNATIONAL:

In 2014, a total of 152 international slots are divided among the 19 clubs. Each club began with eight international slots, which are tradable. There is no limit on the number of international slots on each club's roster.

- oThe remaining roster slots must belong to domestic players. For clubs based in the United States, a domestic player is either a U.S. citizen, a permanent resident (green card holder) or the holder of other special status (e.g., refugee or asylum status).
- The three MLS clubs based in Canada -Montreal Impact, Toronto FC and Vancouver Whitecaps FC - began with eight international slots, but their domestic slots may be filled with either Canadian or U.S. domestic players.
- oMLS clubs based in Canada are required to have a minimum of three Canadian domestic players on their rosters.
- oPlayers with the legal right to work in Canada are considered Canadian domestic players (i.e., Canadian citizen, permanent resident, part of a protected class).

NOTE: The terms Homegrown and Generation adidas are used to describe mechanisms by which players are acquired. They are not roster designations. All players' roster slots are determined by their compensation and/or age as outlined above.

II. PLAYER ACQUISITION MECHANISMS

MLS teams may acquire players and add them to their rosters via the following mechanisms:

(A) ALLOCATION RANKING

The allocation ranking is the mechanism used to determine which MLS club has first priority to acquire a U.S. National Team player who signs with MLS after playing abroad, or a former MLS player who returns to the League after having gone to a club abroad for a transfer fee.* The allocation rankings may also be used in the event two or more clubs file a request for the same player on the same day when the discovery period opens in December. The allocations will be ranked in reverse order of finish for the 2013 season, taking playoff performance into account.

Once the club uses its allocation ranking to acquire a player, it drops to the bottom of the list. A ranking can be traded, provided that part of the compensation received in return is the other club's ranking. At all times, each club is assigned one ranking. The rankings reset at the end of each MLS League season.

*Designated Players of a certain threshold - as determined by the League - are not subject to allocation ranking.

ALLOCATION MONEY

Allocation money is a resource available to clubs in addition to their respective salary budgets.

A club may receive allocation money for:

- (1) Failure to qualify for the MLS Cup Playoffs;
- (2) The transfer of a player to a club outside of MLS for value:
- (3) Expansion status:
- (4) Qualification for the CONCACAF Champions League;
- (6) Funds from purchased third designated player roster spots.

Each year the MLS Competition Committee determines the allocation amount to be made available to each club. Allocation money can be traded by clubs. Allocation money does not count against a club's salary budget and can

- •To sign players new to MLS (that is, a player who did not play in MLS during the previous
- To re-sign an existing MLS player, subject to League approval.
- •To "buy-down" a player's salary budget charge below the League maximum of \$387,500.
- In connection with the exercise of an option to purchase a player's rights or the extension of a player's contract for the second year provided the player was new to MLS in the immediately prior year.

NOTE: To protect the interests of MLS and its clubs during discussions with prospective players or clubs in other leagues, amounts of allocation money held by each club will not be shared publicly.

(B) DESIGNATED PLAYER

The Designated Player Rule allows clubs to acquire up to three players whose salaries exceed their budget charges, with the club bearing financial responsibility for the amount of compensation above each player's budget charge. Designated Player slots may be used to acquire players new to MLS or to retain current MLS players, subject to League approval.

In 2014, a Designated Player over the age of 23** will carry a salary budget charge of \$387,500, unless the player joins his club in the middle of the season, in which case his budget

charge will be \$193,750.

A Designated Player 20 years old or younger** counts as \$150,000 against the club's salary budget and a Designated Player 21-23 years old counts as \$200.000 against the club's salary budaet.

Clubs have the option of "buying down" the budget charge of a Designated Player with allocation money. The reduced charge may not be less than \$150,000.

The budget charge for the midseason signing of a young Designated Player (23 years old and younger) is \$150,000 and this amount cannot be lowered with allocation funds.

Each club has two Designated Player slots and clubs are allowed to "purchase" a third Designated Player slot for a one-time fee of \$150,000 that will be dispersed in the form of allocation money to all clubs that do not have three Designated Players. Clubs will not have to buy the third DP roster slot to accommodate Designated Players 23 years old and younger.

Designated Player slots are not tradable.

** Age of player is determined by year (not date) of birth.

(C) SUPERDRAFT

The 2014 MLS SuperDraft consisted of four rounds of 19 picks for a total of 76 player selections. The first two rounds took place on Jan. 16 in Philadelphia and the final two rounds took place on Jan. 21 via conference call.

The majority of draft prospects are NCAA college seniors who have exhausted their college eligibility. Generation adidas players and non-collegiate international players are also eligible for selection in the SuperDraft, Clubs may nominate players for the League's drafteligible list, and only players from that list may be selected.

Generation adidas is a joint program between MLS and adidas that is dedicated to developing exceptional domestic talent in a professional environment. Each year, a handful of top domestic underclassmen and youth national team players are signed to the league and placed in the SuperDraft through this program. Generation adidas players also receive an educational stipend.

Draft Order: The first nine selections went to the clubs that did not qualify for the 2013 MLS Cup Playoffs beginning with the club with fewest regular season points (3 points per win, one point per tie). The remaining ten positions were





ranked by fewest regular season points among the teams that were eliminated in the same round of the MLS Cup Playoffs.

Unless claimed on waivers, a player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft and did not sign with the League, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to the player.

(D) TRADES

Players, SuperDraft picks, allocation money, allocation rankings, and international player slots may all be exchanged in trades approved by the MLS League Office, provided all of the necessary rules regarding roster and salary budget compliance are met and the trade is completed during a valid trading period. No trades may occur after the Roster Freeze Deadline of September 15, 2014 at 5 p.m. ET.

(E) DISCOVERY SIGNINGS

Clubs may make discovery claims on players not yet under MLS contract who are not subject to the allocation ranking or lottery mechanisms.

Each club has the opportunity to make six discovery signings per season (expansion teams may make 10 discovery signings in their inaugural season). A club may have up to 10 discovery claims on unsigned players at any time and may remove or add players at any time. The last day for discovery player signings is September 15, 2014 - coinciding with the roster freeze date and trade deadline.

The six discovery signings can be used to fill senior roster spots only. If multiple clubs claim the same player using a discovery, the club that filed the claim first will have first rights to the player. Discovery claims expire following each season. If the League and player are unable to reach an agreement during the season, the club that first filed the discovery retains the right of first refusal in the event the player is later signed by the League.

Special Discovery Players: Each team may have only one Special Discovery signing per year. Special Discovery signings will occupy one of a team's six Discovery Player slots. Teams may amortize the total amount of acquisition costs over the term of the player's contract as long as the amortized amount and the player's salary do not exceed the Maximum Salary Budget Charge.

Note: To protect interests of MLS clubs in scouting and negotiations with prospective

players, the League office will not publicize the names of players on club discovery lists, nor specify if a discovery claim has been filed on a particular player.

(F) HOMEGROWN PLAYER SIGNINGS

A club may sign a player to his first professional contract without subjecting him to the MLS SuperDraft if the player has trained for at least one year in the club's youth development program and has trained 80 days with the academy during that year. Players joining MLS through this mechanism are known as Homegrown Players.

There is no limit to the number of Homegrown Players a club may sign in a given year.

(G) RE-ENTRY PROCESS

The Re-Entry Process will commence after MLS Cup. The priority order for the Re-Entry Draft is reverse order of finish in 2014, taking into account playoff performance.

Available to all teams in Stage 1 of the Re-Entry draft will be:

- 1. Players who are at least 23 years old and have a minimum of three years experience in MLS whose options were not exercised by their clubs (available at option salary for 2014).
- 2. Players who are at least 25 years old with a minimum of four years of MLS experience who are out of contract and whose club does not wish to re-sign them at their previous salary (available for at least their 2014 salary).
- 3. Players who are at least 30 years old with a minimum of eight years of MLS experience who are out of contract and whose club does not wish to re-sign them (available for at least 105% of their 2014 salary).

Players who are not selected in Stage 1 of the Re-Entry Draft will be made available in Stage 2. Clubs selecting players in Stage 2 will negotiate a new salary with the player.

Players who remain unselected after Stage 2 will be available to any MLS club on a first come, first serve basis.

(H) WAIVERS

A team may place a player on waivers at any time during the regular season at which point he is made available to all other teams. The waiver claiming period shall commence on the first

business day after the League delivers notice to teams and shall expire at 5 p.m. EST on the second business day after the Waiver Period Commencement Date. The claiming period is 48 hours.

The Waiver Draft order is determined via points per game once all teams have played at least three MLS League games. If the waiver takes place prior to all teams playing in at least three League games, priority shall be granted based upon the prior year's performance, taking playoff performance first, with teams eliminated from playoff contention at the same stage separated according to their point totals through the end of the regular season. New expansion teams shall be at the bottom of the waiver order.

Once a team selects a player off waivers, that club is automatically moved to the bottom of the priority list for subsequent waiver selections in a given season, regardless of its points-per-game total. Players who may be placed on the MLS waiver wire are as follows:

NOTE: No changes may be made to a team's active full roster during the period beginning on September 16, 2014 (day after Roster Freeze Date) through the day after MLS Cup. Nevertheless, a team may obtain players in

accordance with the extreme hardship rules and procedures to replace players who are injured or otherwise legitimately unavailable after the Roster Freeze Date. Any other replacements after the Roster Freeze Date may only be made in exceptional circumstances in the League's sole and absolute discretion.

(III.) METHODS OF RELEASING PLAYERS

(A) WAIVERS

Teams may waive players based on performance at any time during the MLS season. Players with guaranteed contracts will continue to have their salary budget charge applied to the team salary budget, subject to any settlement. Players on semi-guaranteed contracts can be waived prior to July 1 of any year and free up the corresponding budget space. If a player on a semi-guaranteed contract is waived after July 1, his salary budget charge will count against the team's salary budget and the team waiving the player will not receive a replacement except under the normal player acquisition mechanisms. Any settlement amount will be charged to the team's salary budget.

(B) TRANSFERS AND LOANS

An MLS player may be transferred or loaned at any time to a team outside the League (subject to that team's Federation's transfer window), subject to the consent of the player.

The registration windows – the dates between which MLS may request the transfer certificate of a player under contract in another country – are as follows:

February 18 – May 12 (Primary Window)

July 8 – August 6 (Secondary Window)

INTRALEAGUE LOANS: Teams may loan a player to another MLS team subject to the following:

- (i) The player must be 24 years old or younger at the time of the loan.
- (ii) Each MLS team may only loan one player per season.
- (iii) The loan must be initiated during the Primary Transfer Window.
- (iv) The player must remain with his new team for the entire MLS Season.
- (v) Players may not compete against their former Team during the MLS Season while on loan (includes MLS games and all other competitions).

(vi) Intraleague loans may include an option to make permanent.

(C) CONTRACT EXPIRATION

When a player's contract expires, the player does not count against the roster or budget of the team in question. Subject to the Re-Entry Draft rules, a team retains the rights to the player indefinitely following the expiration of a contract only if attempts were made to re-sign the player.

(D) BUYOUT OF GUARANTEED CONTRACT

Teams may have the ability to buyout one guaranteed player as follows:

- A Team may buy out one (1) guaranteed player (including a DP's) contract during the offseason and free up the corresponding budget space. Such a buyout is at the particular MLS Team's own expense.
- A Team may not free up budget space with a buyout of a player's salary budget charge during the season. Such a buyout will be conducted by the League and count on a Club's budget in a manner consistent with current MLS guidelines.

(IV.) RIGHT OF FIRST REFUSAL

Right of first refusal grants one MLS club the first opportunity to add a player to its roster in the event that the player signs with MLS. Holding a right of first refusal applies only within MLS and does not indicate holding of the player's International Transfer Certificate.

OUT OF CONTRACT PLAYERS / OPTIONS NOT PICKED UP: Subject to the Re-Entry Draft rules, a team retains the right of first refusal to the player indefinitely only if attempts were made to re-sign the player.

DRAFTED BUT NOT SIGNED: A player who was drafted by a particular team through the SuperDraft and did not sign, or who as of the first Monday in June is not offered a contract after a trial and clears waivers, is placed on that team's "College Protected List" until the second December 31 immediately following the draft in question, after which the team loses the rights to sign the player.

PLAYER TRANSFERRED OUTSIDE MLS: If a team receives allocation money as a result of a player's transfer, the team does not retain a right of first refusal.

MLS DIGITAL MEDIA POLICIES

AS OF DEC. 15, 2011

The Digital Media Policy applies without exception to online activities by all media organizations and other entities and individuals that have been granted working media credentials or photo credentials (each, a "Media Member") in order to cover Major League Soccer games (where at least one MLS team participates) and associated events (each, a "MLS Game"). From time-to-time, MLS may (in its sole discretion) designate certain non-MLS Game events to be excluded from these MLS Dicital Media Policies.

NO MEDIA MEMBER MAY USE VIDEO, PHOTOGRAPHS OR LIVE BLOGS (AS DEFINED BELOW) OF MLS GAMES FOR COMMERCIAL PURPOSES WITHOUT THE EXPRESS WRITTEN CONSENT OF MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER, L.L.C. ("MLS").

VIDEO AND AUDIO CONTENT

GAME

No Media member may post, transmit or otherwise exhibit game video, other than through MLS QuickKicks, without the express written permission of MLS.

NON-GAME

In accordance with the following usage restrictions and conditions, a Media Member may post, transmit or exhibit a reasonable number of non-game video and audio content, including but not limited to practices, interviews with MLS employees, including players, and press conferences.

USAGE RESTRICTIONS FOR GAME AND NON-GAME AUDIO AND VIDEO CONTENT

- Such video or audio content may not be archived for more than 72 hours without team or League approval.
- The page featuring the audio/video must provide links to MLSsoccer.com, FutbolMLS. com and the corresponding team site. For example: For more info, go to www. MLSsoccer.com and www.(teamname).com.
- No integrated advertising is permitted. Footage may appear on pages with banners and contextual ads, but the ads may not be related in any way to the MLS video /audio content.

PHOTOGRAPHS

A Media Member may post a reasonable number, as determined by MLS, of photographs each day on its Website. Any photograph posted on a Media Member's Website or otherwise transmitted online may be used only for editorial coverage of the MLS Game and not for any commercial, advertising or promotional purpose.

WRITTEN CONTENT

Online reports concerning MLS Games while they are in progress ("Live Blogs") are subject to following conditions:

- Live Blogs must contain original commentary so as not to undercut the authorized Match Tracker at MLSsoccer.com.
- Live Blogs must provide television and radio broadcast information for that MLS Game. For example: "Tonight's MLS Game is being broadcast live on (name of television/radio station)."
- Live Blogs may not use any audio, video or graphic simulations of MLS Game action. A Media Member may post a reasonable number of photographs together with the Live Blog.

COPYRIGHT

Any and all copyrights, trademarks and other proprietary interests in and to MLS Games, MLS and each of its teams, and accounts and descriptions of each MLS Game shall remain vested solely with Major League Soccer, L.L.C. (or its designated licensees).

COMPLIANCE

MLS reserves the right to take action against any Media Member who does not comply with this policy, including without limitation, revoking such Media Member's credentials.

AMENDMENTS TO THE NEW MEDIA POLICY

MLS may amend this MLS Digital Media Policy at anytime in its sole and absolute discretion.
