ABOUT US

For the first time since 1976, when the Kentucky Colonels basketball team ceased operations, Louisville is poised to field a top-tier professional sports franchise in 2021 when launching a National Women's Soccer League (NWSL) expansion team.

Racing Louisville FC will be run by Soccer Holdings, LLC, the same organization behind Louisville City FC, the two-time USL Championship-winning men's side. Both Racing and LouCity will play at Lynn Family Stadium and train at a nearby 30,000 square foot facility where ground has been broken.

Introduction of the NWSL to Louisville, which has experienced immense success on the pitch already with two-time USL Championship winner Louisville City FC, will bring to Lynn Family Stadium household names prominent in winning the United States the 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup

EXECUTIVE BIOS



BRAD ESTES PRESIDENT

A Louisville native, Brad Estes has served multi-billion dollar corporations and closely held family businesses with a finance and operating background before leading his hometown's top professional sports franchise. As president of Soccer Holdings, LLC, Estes oversees both the USL Championship club Louisville City FC and Racing Louisville FC, a 2021 newcomer to the top-tier National Women's Soccer League. Estes' career stops include stops as Chief Financial Officer of Smoothstone IP Communications and Vice President of Finance for Trilogy Health Services before he served as President of Neace Ventures. After assisting the Club as a consultant for a year, Estes signed on with Soccer Holdings full time in 2017. The St. Xavier High School graduate received an Accounting Degree from Marshall University while playing football for the Thundering Herd. Estes completed his education in 2002 with an MBA from the University of Louisville.

JAMES O'CONNOR EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT OF DEVELOPMENT

The former coach at Louisville City from 2015-2018 and coach at Orlando City in 2018-2019, O'Connor brings a wealth of experience in soccer at all levels. O'Connor was crucial in the development of Louisville City when the club began in 2015, helping the club win its first USL Championship Title in 2017, knocking off the Swope Park Rangers in a historic match at Louisville Slugger Field. Prior to coaching Louisville City and Orlando City, the Dublin, Ireland, native played for the Irish Under-21s while beginning his career with Stoke City from 1996-2003. He was part of West Bromwich Albion from 2003-2005, playing on loan at Burnley from 2004-05 before becoming part of Burnley's club from 2005-2008. After three seasons at Sheffield Wednesday, O'Connor moved to Orlando City in the MLS, working as a player-coach for Orlando City during his final season. Louisville City began as an affiliate of Orlando City, and when Orlando City sold their rights to their USL Pro team to Soccer Holdings in Louisville, O'Connor was tabbed to become Louisville City's first head coach.






LYNN FAMILY STADIUM

Lynn Family Stadium in Louisville, Ky., is the largest soccer-specific stadium in the region with seating locations for 11,600 fans and a capacity of 15, 304.

Home to Louisville City FC of the USL Championship and the NWSL's Racing Louisville FC, the stadium boasts 18 luxury suites, premium seating amenities like club and loge seats along with ledge tables, and a massive safe-standing supporter section.

The venue, owned by Soccer Holdings, LLC, and managed by ASM Global, is also available for concerts, festivals, and community events.





TRAINING FACILITY

Soccer Holdings, LLC, parent company of the USL Championship's Louisville City FC and NWSL's Racing Louisville, broke ground Aug. 4, 2020 on its new training facility targeted to open in the spring 2021.

Showcasing ownership's investments in local professional soccer, the facility -- just two miles east of the recently opened Lynn Family Stadium at Champions Park off River Road -- will house the operations to both clubs along with the accompanying youth academies.

"It's hard to believe in 2015 we started out as this little fledging club trying to make pro sports work in a town where pro sports hadn't been that successful," Soccer Holdings president Brad Estes said of the facility. "As you pivot away from surviving and sustainability, you want to get to the point to where you're thinking about flourishing. That's what this training center's going to allow us to do."

The 30,000 square foot center is being built AML Construction. On the property, three natural grass fields will accompany four turf fields fashioned by The Motz Group. Stadium lighting will allow for play at night, and the club plans to make the facility open to other community events.

In addition to locker room spaces for the pro clubs, the facility will include gym and workout areas, a kitchen, dining hall and media room. The building's layout also houses Soccer Holdings' front office staff.

"To actually have our own training center — for us to attract elite-level talent on the female side — brings tremendous opportunity for us as an organization," added James O'Connor, Executive Vice President of Development. "It's not just for the professional aspect but for the whole community. We've got four turf fields we genuinely want the community to use."

CHRISTY HOLLY HEAD COACH

On Wednesday, August 12, 2020, Racing Louisville FC, which begins National Women's Soccer League play in 2021, announced the appointment of Christy Holly as the team's first head coach.

Holly brings prior NWSL coaching experience to his role, and the native Irishman more recently had a hand in helping the United States win the 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup as an opposition analyst for U.S. Soccer.

Holly traveled extensively in advance of the World Cup, scouting potential rivals for the United States. His diligence — in the form of lengthy reports delivered to the coaching staff — paid off when the USWNT successfully defended its title.

Prior to working with U.S. Soccer, Holly rose from assistant to head coach for Sky Blue FC, the NWSL franchise in Harrison, N.J. Holly guided a young Sky Blue FC roster to a 7-8-5 mark in 2016, narrowly missing the playoffs with a roster that featured Rookie of the Year Raquel Rodriguez in the midfield. Holly left Sky Blue FC mid-2017 before resurfacing with U.S. Soccer, for which he has also served as an assistant for the women's U-23 and U-17 teams.

Holly coordinated with Executive Vice President of Development, James O'Connor, on building Racing Louisville FC's inaugural roster. Key events included the 2020 NWSL Expansion Draft in November and the 2021 NWSL College Draft that took place in January.

GARY CURNEEN ASSISTANT COACH

Curneen who, as with Holly, is a native of Northern Ireland, worked for two seasons on the Chicago Red Stars' staff after a stint as Division 1 California State University Bakersfield's head coach. A self-described student of the game, Curneen holds a UEFA A License and is the published author of "The Modern Soccer Coach 2014" detailing emerging trends in his industry.

SERGIO GONZALEZ

GOALKEEPERS COACH

Sergio Gonzalez has joined Racing after a stint as Indiana University's women's associate head coach coach. He boasts more than two decades of coaching experience, including eight years with both women's and men's Big 10 Conference programs. Internationally, he has also coached goalkeepers for the U-16 and U-17 national teams.

Her 49 wins between the posts at Georgia are still tied for the most in school history. Betos ended her career with the Bulldogs boasting 316 saves and 26 shutouts. She began her professional career with the Atlanta Silverbacks in the W-League and was the 2009 W-League Goalkeeper of the Year. The 34th overall pick in the 2013 NWSL Supplemental Draft, Betos made seven appearances for the Seattle Reign that season before being traded to the Portland Thorns. With Portland in 2015, Betos posted a standout campaign starting 14 games, becoming the first goalkeeper to score a goal in the NWSL and earning 2015 NWSL Goalkeeper of the Year honors. Betos had short stints with Australian side Sydney FC and Norwegian side Vålerenga. In 2018, she made her return to the NWSL with the Seattle Reign, now known as OL Reign.



Bristol City named her its Women's Player of the Year just before the season's end. Having graduated from Aston Villa's academy to the first team in 2017, Salmon bagged 7 goals that year across 12 appearances in the FA Women's Super League 2. The following season, Salmon signed with Manchester United, which loaned her to FA Women's Championship member Sheffield United. There, Salmon added 7 more goals to her resume.

Salmon moved to Bristol City for the 2019-2020 campaign. She led the club with 5 goals, including the only tally in a 1-0 away victory Jan. 5 over her former club, Manchester United, to mark Bristol's first victory of the season. In addition to her WSL accomplishments in 2020-2021, Salmon helped Bristol City to the FA Women's League Cup before a defeat to powerhouse Chelsea.

INTERNATIONAL: Salmon has represented England at both the U-17 and U-19 levels. While wearing the captain's armband for the UEFA Women's U-17 Championship in 2018, Salmon registered a hat trick against Italy to secure her team a place in the knockout rounds. In February, Salmon received her first senior national team call up and cap when she subbed on in a victory over Northern Ireland.



Collegiately, she registered 33 goals in 61 appearances at Louisiana State University before transferring to the University of Colorado for her senior season, adding 12 more goals in 20 games. Baucom previously played in the NWSL for the Houston Dash, signing as a national team replacement player in the summer of 2019.

International: The Scottsdale, Ariz., native came up as a youth international, logging time with the United States U-15, U-16, U-19, and U-20 teams.



NWSL MEDIA POLICY

Media credentials and access will be granted only to individuals with a legitimate working function at a game, training session or event. The bearer must be on a specific assignment. Credentials are non-transferable. Any unauthorized use of a credential subjects the bearer to ejection from the stadium. Resale or attempted resale is grounds for seizure and cancellation.

The following actions may result in seizure of credential and/or ejection of its wearer from the stadium or training facility:

- Requesting autographs at any time.
- Taking photographs with players/coaches
- Using credential for family or friends of a working media member
- Conduction of unauthorized interviews
- Unprofessional behavior (Cheering in the press box, consumption of alcoholic beverages, failure to abide by posted rules, etc.)

Treatment of Credentialed Media

Postgame Media Access: Players from both teams will be available to media post-game in a mix-zone located outside the team locker rooms or in a location near the field of play. The mix-zone will begin 10 minutes after the conclusion of the match. Locker rooms will not be open to media at any point.

Team PR directors should be present to indicate the beginning and end of media access to players, and ensure media have access to the head coach and players after the match. All players are highly encouraged to be available to media post-game.

All regulations about post-game media access should be clearly communicated to team staff and security to ensure a secure environment.

No individuals other than League or Club representatives shall be allowed in Club locker rooms following a game.

Under no circumstances shall any club and/or its players discriminate in any fashion against an accredited member of the media based upon race, creed, sex or national origin.

Seating Access: Accredited media members will have access to the stadium, professional workrooms and stadium seating, if available. During the match, accredited media will have access to the press box which will be restricted to only those accredited media members.

In addition, each stadium should have a Press Box capable of seating no less than TEN (10) people, with separate areas for working press and electronic broadcasters, and sufficient power outlets for all needs. If possible, all accredited media members should be given a seat in the press box.

All credentialed media shall be seated in media seating areas, consistent with treatment afforded comparable media. In addition, all members of the media are to be afforded equal treatment and access to facilities and personnel, regardless of sex.

When the press box is fully occupied by working media, referee assessors or in-stadium observers shall be provided seating with a desk or table shielded from the weather and a vantage point to view replays (if available) from any telecast. The specific location may be determined by the Home Team but must provide these minimum accommodations.

In order to maintain the integrity of the working press box, seating is specifically reserved for media members. All other individuals (including player agents, VIP's and administrators) should be seated in overflow booths or assigned stadium seats.



Traveling Media: Members of the working media who travel with a visiting team are not to be treated in a discriminatory manner with regard to seating or any other privilege or facility accorded to the home media. Comparable seating and equipment should apply to home and road media (print and electronic).

Media Access to Practice: Clubs are encouraged to make all practices open to media. If a practice is closed, clubs must grant a 15-minute media access period at the start or end of practice, as well as making the coach and players available for interviews following the conclusion of practice. Clubs are strongly encouraged to ensure that ballwork is at least part of the 15-minute access period. If practices are open to the media, as defined above, they must be open to all media; if practices are closed to the media, they must be closed to all media.

Clubs violating the media access policies on practice days will be subject to fines or other discipline at the discretion of NWSL Commissioner Jeff Plush.

Guidelines for Photographers and Camera Operators: All photographers and television camera operators must stay behind the field boards at all times, unless released by the on-site photo marshal. The only exception to the field board rule will be when a staff photographer, a national rights-holder or NWSL has a crew at a game. These entities will be allowed to shoot from the area between the field boards and the touch lines in the area bounded by the top of the 18-yard box and the end line.

Each photographer will be permitted to use one monopod — but no tripods. No seats other than "lawn-type" photographer seats will be permitted.

Stand-alone remote units will not be permitted at any time on or around the goal posts. Units mounted on the top of field boards behind the end line will be permitted at the stadium's discretion, provided the equipment does not interfere with the clear display of the field board and does not impede the operation of broadcast equipment.

Live television crews located on the baseline or sideline will be limited to two (2) people — a camera operator and a cable-puller — and ENG crews will be limited to one (1) person. In either case, the crew must maintain actual possession of the camera and any other equipment during all game action. Cameramen and cable-pullers from all television crews must remain off the playing field at all times.

Photographer Access to field: Photographers and camera operators shall be permitted in the area between the field boards and the touch lines in the area bounded by the top of the 18-yard box and the end line (a C-shape that extends from the top of the 18, back behind the goal, and to the top of the 18 on the opposite side of the field).

Once situated, no movement between the two halves of the field shall be permitted until halftime. Changes in this policy will be allowed in cases where stadium facilities dictate alterations. No photographers shall be allowed to move from end to end on the bench side of the field.

Photographer Identification: In addition to their regular credential, it is strongly recommended that photographers and camera crews be issued with colored bibs or armbands. This makes them easy to identify, and they would presumably enjoy quick and easy access to their designated areas. This will necessitate a special area in or near the stadium where they can pick up their bibs, on presentation of their accreditation, either the day before the match or on game day, at the time media gates are opened. If they are not to be allowed to keep the bib, then it should be exchanged for a press card to be picked up following the game, or else signed out.

Photography Work Area: A work area should be provided for photographers, near the field where appropriate, with high-speed internet access. The size of the room may vary, but it should be sizeable enough for at least 5 – 10 people to work on desktops/tables. Like the press section of the stands, the photographers' work room should have sufficient electrical sockets and compatible with the equipment being used for transmission.

Accreditation: Care should be taken when processing credential requests for photographers shooting for commercial agencies. NWSL does not permit the accreditation of photographers shooting specifically for commercial agencies. However, since many agencies offer editorial and commercial sales options (Getty Images, AP, Reuters, etc.) this must be handled on a case-by-case basis.



Non-Rights Holder Video Guidelines

Video Footage: All rights to match footage including all applicable copyrights belong to NWSL and its rights holders who broadcast each specific match. NWSL has one rights holders that will broadcast select matches in 2017: Lifetime. If an organization is interested in recording video footage at a NWSL match for non-news gathering purposes they should contact NWSL Communications.

Television Broadcasters

Game Action: Television broadcasters can use footage of NWSL events obtained either via 1) their own recording or 2) action dubbed from a NWSL rights holder broadcast (Lifetime) with credit only in connection with its regularly scheduled news programming within a week of the game. This footage should not exceed two (2) minutes. Highlights aired as part of a continuous news program should not be longer than one (1) minute per 30-minute segment. Credits: NWSL Media / Lifetime (for the Game of the Week); NWSL Media (for all other games).

Filming – Game Action: For televised events, non-rights holders / ENG cameras may record the first 15 minutes of each half (from 00:00 to 15:00 and 45:00 to 60:00 on the game clock). For non-televised events, non-rights holders / ENG cameras may record the entire game but are still subject to the aforementioned limits. This includes events that are web streamed live online.

Filming – Interviews and Scene Sets: There is no limit to the gathering of footage pre-game, at halftime and post-game. All footage gathered is subject to the usage guidelines indicated in this document.

Filming – In Seating Area: Video cameras looking to shoot in the concourse or seating area must contact home team and NWSL in advance of the event for approval.

Previews or Advances: In advance of a NWSL event, television broadcasters can use two (2) minutes of archival game action to preview an upcoming event. In the local/regional markets, broadcasters should mention the time and location of the game along with their report. Outside of the local markets, broadcasters should mention the time and broadcast information.

Television Broadcasters' Web Sites: Video produced for air as part of regular programming that is simulcast or archived online must be accompanied by a link to NWSLsoccer.com. Content produced exclusively for the Internet is subject to the guidelines for Online Video.

Online Video

Game Action: Online organizations (including print publications that post video online) are not permitted to film or use game action video without prior written approval by NWSL Media. Game action includes any footage of the field, teams, etc., following the beginning of the television broadcast window. Only video of off-field activities (i.e. interviews, training sessions) may be recorded.

Non-Game Video: Any video posted online that is recorded as part of media access is limited to the use of eight (8) minutes per day/activity date. Online video may not incorporate integrated advertising and must be accompanied by links to NWSLsoccer.com.

Professional Presentation: Online video is expected to be recorded, edited and presented in a professional manner. Video must be presented/hosted on an organization's website, and not solely on a site provided by a third-party (i.e. YouTube, Vimeo, Facebook, etc.).

Online Video Sites: Organizations who regularly post video to online video sites (i.e. YouTube, Vimeo, etc.) may not include advertising with video gathered as a result of media access. Allowing users to embed these videos is not permitted, and the description of any video must include a link to NWSLsoccer.com.
