Despite the challenges the pandemic presented, the Rays continued to make an impact on the field and in the community. 162 LANDING

In 2012, the Rays introduced a new seating area to commemorate the team's dramatic clinching of the 2011 AL Wild Card in Game 162, the final day the regular season. The Seminole Hard Rock Tampa 162 Landing is located off Left Field Street at the point where Evan Longoria's 12th-inning walk-off home run landed, clinching the Rays third postseason berth. The entrance to the area is open to the public, and includes a timeline chronicling the events at Tropicana Field and Oriole Park at Camden Yards from that historic evening. The area also features a screen with video highlights and interviews, as well as unique photos and displays, all surrounding Game 162.





STUART STERNBERG / PRINCIPAL OWNER

The 2021 season is the 16th under the leadership of Principal Owner Stuart Sternberg, who assumed control of the franchise in October 2005. Today, the massive rebranding of the club entering 2008 marks a watershed for two distinct eras of Rays baseball.

In the 13 seasons since then, the Rays own the 5th-best record in baseball at 1,081-924 (.539) and have made six trips to the postseason, including three AL East division titles (2020, 2010, 2008) and two World Series appearances (2020, 2008). During this span, only three clubs (Dodgers, Yankees, Cardinals) have reached the postseason more often than the Rays, and only two (Dodgers, Giants) have competed in more World Series. This success comes after the Devil Rays amassed the majors' worst record at 645-972 (.399) over the club's first decade of existence.

"Sternberg is the connective tissue running through the two [World Series] teams," wrote Richard Justice on MLB.com. "His taking over the Rays in 2005 began one of the great turnarounds in baseball history, from one of the least successful franchises to one of the best."

Sternberg has built an organization that encourages experimentation and nurtures new ideas. In 2008 and again in 2019, *Baseball America* named the Rays its MLB Organization of the Year. This environment has cultivated some of the top leadership talent across the game, including numerous managers and general managers for both small- and large-market teams.

"You want to know why they have so many innovative strategies?" wrote *Tampa Bay Times* columnist John Romano. "Because owner Stu Sternberg is not constantly looking over their shoulders, tallying up every success and failure."

The ingenuity extends to other areas of the business, as well. In June 2019, Sternberg and the Rays introduced an innovative plan for the team to build new home ballparks in both Tampa Bay and Montreal and divide its home games across both geographies.

Sternberg takes great pride in the organization's community service and commitment to its employees. Under his leadership, an employee-first culture defines the organization. It is fostered through myriad initiatives, including a wellness program and a staff-led service group, the Employee Community Outreach Team (ECOT). As part of this commitment to community, all employees are urged to spend one paid day each month volunteering. To date, total volunteer hours for the organization exceed 38,500.

Over the past four years, Sternberg and his partners have invested more than \$20 million of capital improvements to Tropicana Field—including new LED lights throughout the stadium; an overhauled food, beverage and retail space; and the Left Field Ledge. Since 2005, the Rays total investment in upgrading Tropicana Field is more than \$50 million.

Under his direction, the Rays have implemented a wide variety of fan-friendly policies. The organization was the first major league team to convert its ballpark to a cash-free facility, reducing wait times by up to 50 percent at concession and retail locations. The Rays commitment to technology and innovation has continued in recent years, and accelerated in the wake of COVID-19, with investment in new technologies and building systems to support mobile ticketing, mobile payments and promote a contactless and frictionless fan journey. The Rays also have been rated by ESPN as one of the most affordable experiences in all of sports.

Sternberg serves as chairman of MLB's Strategic Planning Committee. He is also a member of both MLB's Executive Council and its Diversity and Inclusion Board. Additionally, Sternberg is a member of the board of advisors of Moffitt Cancer Center.

Prior to his ownership of the Rays, Sternberg spent 25 years in the financial securities industry, serving as a partner in Spear, Leeds & Kellogg and then as a partner and managing director at Goldman Sachs, from which he retired in 2003. Sternberg and his wife, Lisa, have four children. He resides in St. Petersburg.





MATT SILVERMAN / PRESIDENT

Matt Silverman enters his 18th season with the Rays and 13th as team president. Together, he and Brian Auld lead the club's operations both internally and externally, including an innovative "Sister City" plan for the team to build new home ballparks in both Tampa Bay and Montreal and share its home games across both geographies.

Silverman returned to the team president role in the fall of 2017 after serving three seasons (2015-17) as president of baseball operations. He was first promoted to team president in October 2005 at the age of 29, and over the next nine years guided the franchise through the most progressive growth stage in its history. At the top of the list is the revitalization of the Rays. In the fall of 2007, Silverman directed a complete organizational rebranding including a new name, colors, uniforms and logo, a bright yellow sunburst.

While steering the baseball operations department, Silverman oversaw significant leadership changes, both on the field and in the front office. During this time, he and his staff engineered 36 trades involving nearly 100 players, restocking the organization's minor league pipeline (including the July 2017 signing of Dominican shortstop Wander Franco, now the game's consensus No. 1 prospect). In December 2014, he hired Kevin Cash to become the fifth manager in Rays history. In November 2016, he elevated Erik Neander and others within the baseball operations department. One year later, his move back to team president completed the transition of baseball leadership, passing the baton to Neander as the team's top-ranking baseball official. Neander and Cash would eventually be recognized as MLB Executive of the Year and AL Manager of the Year, respectively.

Silverman is board chairman of Starting Right, Now, which helps homeless high school students reach their potential. He is in his eighth year as the first chairman of the board of the Positive Coaching Alliance Tampa Bay, a national nonprofit providing youth and high school athletes a positive, character-building youth sports experience. He also serves on the board of the Rays Baseball Foundation.

Prior to joining the Rays, Silverman worked closely with Stuart Sternberg at Goldman Sachs and orchestrated Sternberg's purchase of controlling interest in the franchise. In 2018, Silverman and Auld oversaw the Rays purchase of the Tampa Bay Rowdies USL soccer team, based in St. Petersburg. They now also serve as vice chairmen of the Rowdies, overseeing all franchise operations.

The Dallas native first met Auld in high school, and they graduated one year apart. He holds a bachelor of economics degree from Harvard University. Matt and his wife, Andrea, reside in St. Petersburg with their three daughters: Alexa, Samantha and Casey.

BRIAN AULD / PRESIDENT

Brian Auld begins his 16th season with the Rays and his seventh in his current position as team president. Together, he and Matt Silverman lead the club's operations both internally and externally, including an innovative plan for the team to build new home ballparks in both Tampa Bay and Montreal and divide its home games across both geographies.

In his tenure as team president, Auld has brought a renewed focus to the Rays mission—to energize the community through the magic of Rays baseball—by redoubling the Rays commitment to its community and to its employees.

Under Auld's leadership, the Rays have developed a thriving workplace culture. In addition to paid parental leave, adoption benefits, paid volunteer time and a wellness initiative, the Rays created a \$10 minimum wage for all part-time employees.

In 2018, Auld and Silverman oversaw the Rays purchase of the Tampa Bay Rowdies USL soccer team, based in St. Petersburg. They now also serve as vice chairmen of the Rowdies, overseeing all franchise operations.

Prior to Auld's promotion to team president, he oversaw a wide spectrum of the team's business operations, including the human resources, information technology, marketing, ticket sales, fan experience and stadium operations departments. Auld joined the Rays in June 2005 as director of planning and development, where he worked closely with Silverman to define organizational priorities and assist with the transition in ownership. Soon after, he played a key role in establishing the Employee Community Outreach Team (ECOT). All Rays staff may spend up to one paid workday each month volunteering in the community and ECOT assists by finding opportunities.

Before joining the Rays, Auld attended Harvard Business School, where he earned his MBA focusing on managing human capital, marketing and finance. Auld's previous work experience includes serving as lead teacher and director of development for the East Palo Alto Charter School in California.

Born in Berkeley, Calif., Auld received a bachelor's degree in economics and master's degree in education from Stanford University, where he also captained the lacrosse team. He and Silverman met in high school in Dallas, and graduated one year apart. Brian is proud to claim that he once trekked to the bottom of Mount Everest.

He currently serves on the board of directors of the Rays Baseball Foundation, Big Brothers Big Sisters of Tampa Bay and CEOs Against Cancer. In addition, he serves on the Heart Ball Cabinet for the American Heart Association, the Sports Advisory Council for Special Olympics Florida and the executive committees of the Tampa Bay Partnership and the St. Petersburg Economic Development Corporation, where he also serves on the Tropicana Field Site Redevelopment committee.

He and his wife, Molly, reside in St. Petersburg and are proud parents of two daughters, Lucy and Mia, and a son, Jack.

Established in April 2008, the Rays Employee Community Outreach Team provides invaluable, voluntary man hours to community service agencies that enhance or improve the quality of life in the communities it serves. ECOT's philanthropic efforts give the Rays a year-round, goodwill presence in the community. Service projects are chosen from ideas suggested by employees.

"As part of our Employee Community Outreach Team program, we encourage all employees to take one paid day each month to volunteer in the community," said Rays President Brian Auld.

In total, Rays employees have logged more than 38,500 volunteer hours split between monthly ECOT events and other ongoing projects, including Meals On Wheels, Big Brothers Big Sisters mentoring program and time spent at the Ronald McDonald House.





MELANIE LENZ / CHIEF DEVELOPMENT OFFICER

Melanie Lenz was named chief development officer in January 2018. Lenz joined the Rays in November 2006 and was responsible for managing the design and construction of the Rays spring training facility in Charlotte County. In addition to the management of capital projects for the Rays, she oversees the organization's key strategic initiatives including the Rays brand extension within the television market, management of key business relationships, business analytics activities and long-term facilities planning.

BASEBALL OPERATIONS



ERIK NEANDER

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, BASEBALL OPERATIONS & GENERAL MANAGER

Erik Neander (nee-ANN-der) enters his fifth season as senior vice president of baseball operations and general manager, and his fourth season as the club's top-ranking baseball official. He was named to his current post on Nov 4, 2016, and one year later Matt Silverman shifted to team president after a three-year stretch as president of baseball operations.

As the leader of baseball operations, Erik collaborates with all areas of the department to set the vision and expectations for the entire operation. In addition to working to sustain a people-first culture, he directly oversees functional areas, including player evaluation and procurement, the major league coaching and support staff, and roster and staff management. He and his group assembled a club that proved itself as the American League champions by any measure in 2020: they went a league-best 40-20, won the powerhouse AL East by seven games and in the postseason conquered the Blue Jays, Yankees and Astros to reach the World Series. The Rays captured their third division title (2010, 2008) and second pennant (2008), and have now played in back-to-back postseasons for the second time in club history (2010-11). Since Neander moved into his current role, the Rays have improved their winning percentage in each of the last four seasons—a claim that no other team can make.

"I think that the Rays are an example of what's great about our game," Commissioner Rob Manfred told the *Tampa Bay Times* last October. "And what I mean by that is that there's lots of different ways to put together a roster that can be really, really effective. And I think the fact that the Rays have done it with more limited resources than almost any other club is a phenomenal accomplishment. It's a credit to their ingenuity, their talent, their innovation."

In just over four years as general manager, Erik and his staff have engineered 72 major league trades involving a total of 174 players, including a club-record 20 trades in 2018. Of the 40-man roster and 60-day IL, 34 players have been acquired since he was appointed GM (and 22 via trade). Among those trade acquisitions are 2020 ALCS MVP Randy Arozarena, Tyler Glasnow, Austin Meadows, Ryan Yarbrough, Nick Anderson, Ji-Man Choi, Yandy Diaz, Manuel Margot, Francisco Mejia and Luis Patiño. The 28-man 2020 World Series roster included 22 players acquired on Erik's watch, 14 of them via trade.

Even more talent is on the way. The Rays enter 2021 ranked by *Baseball America* as the No. 1 farm system in the game for a second straight season. MLB.com placed eight Rays prospects on its preseason Top 100 list, most of any team. Seven of those eight prospects were acquired by Erik's staff, including international signing Wander Franco (No. 1 overall), draft picks Brendan McKay (No. 72) and Shane McClanahan (No. 84) and trade acquisitions Patiño (No. 19), Arozarena (No. 34), Xavier Edwards (No. 85) and Shane Baz (No. 90).

Over the past three seasons, the Rays own the 5th-best record in baseball at 226-158 (.589)—a 95-win pace over a 162-game season. In 2019, the team's accomplishments—including a 96-66 record that fell one win shy of the franchise record—earned industry acclaim for both Neander and the organization. Erik was selected by his peers as the second recipient of Major League Baseball's Executive of the Year Award, following Oakland's Billy Beane (2018), and earned a similar honor as *Sporting News* Executive of the Year. The Rays were recognized as *Baseball America's* 2019 Organization of the Year.

Neander, who turns 38 in May, begins his 15th season in the Rays organization. Much of his past experience focused on player personnel, departmental administration, research and development, the amateur draft and major league operations. He joined the Rays in January 2007 as a baseball operations intern and was hired full-time in October 2007. He was later promoted to manager, baseball research and development in 2009, director of baseball operations prior to the 2012 season and vice president of baseball operations in October 2014.

Prior to joining the Rays, Erik worked for Baseball Info Solutions. The Oneonta, N.Y. native graduated from Virginia Tech with a bachelor's of science in food, nutrition and exercise. He and his wife, Jessica, reside in Tampa with their sons, Penn and Corbin; daughter, Eden; and their rescue animals.





PETER BENDIX / VICE PRESIDENT, BASEBALL DEVELOPMENT

Peter Bendix was promoted to vice president of baseball development in October 2019 and begins his 13th season with the Rays. In this role, Peter assists Erik Neander in all aspects of baseball operations, including player evaluation and procurement, roster management and long-term thinking, as well as the day-to-day functions of the major league club and the department overall. He oversees the baseball systems, baseball research and development and baseball operations groups, while working closely with other departments to help facilitate learning and development. Before his promotion to vice president, Peter spent four seasons as director of baseball development, serving as a liaison for baseball research and development to all other aspects of the organization, with a primary focus on the major league club. He first joined the Rays as an intern in January 2009, and was later promoted to assistant of baseball operations and coordinator of baseball research and development. Peter played baseball and tennis while growing up outside of Cleveland, and claims to be an excellent ping-pong player. CARLOS RODRIGUEZ VICE PRESIDENT, PLAYER DEVELOPMENT & INTERNATIONAL SCOUTING

Carlos Rodriguez enters his 11th season with the Rays and his second as vice president of player development and international scouting. In this role, Rodriguez reports to Erik Neander and assists in all areas of baseball operations, while overseeing the club's player development system, baseball performance science, international scouting and academy operations. From 2015 through 2019, Rodriguez served as director of international scouting, following three years as director of Latin American scouting (2012-14). During this stretch, he played a key role in scouting and signing José Alvarado, Vidal Bruján, Diego Castillo, Yonny Chirinos, Wander Franco, Moisés Gómez, Ronaldo Hernández and Jesús Sánchez, among others. Rodriguez joined the Rays in the fall of 2010 as a professional and international scout after four seasons with the Blue Jays as an area scout. In 2009, he signed Yan Gomes from Barry University, the first Brazilian-born player to reach the major leagues. Rodriguez also spent a season as an intern for the Brewers. A native of Puerto Rico, Rodriguez attended the University of North Florida where he played and served as an assistant coach. He graduated in 2004 with a degree in business, double majoring in international business and economics. He and his wife, Omayra, reside in Tampa with their daughter, Eva Marie.



BOBBY HECK / SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE GENERAL MANAGER

Bobby Heck was named special assistant to the general manager in January 2018 and enters his ninth season in the Rays organization. He joined the Rays as a special assignment scout prior to the 2013 season, and was promoted to special assistant, baseball operations in the summer of 2015. Previously, Bobby served six years as the assistant general manager and scouting director for the Astros, during which time the Astros drafted Jason Castro, Carlos Correa, Delino DeShields, Mike Foltyniewicz, Dallas Keuchel, J.D. Martinez, George Springer and many other major leaguers. He also spent a combined 12 years scouting for the Rangers and Brewers. Bobby graduated from Florida International University, and earned a master's degree in sports management from St. Thomas (Fla.) University. A former minor league catcher in the Athletics system, he now resides in Winter Garden, Fla., with his wife, Nicole. Their daughter, Jordyn Reed, is a sportscaster for the ABC affiliate in Rochester, Minn.





R.J. HARRISON / SENIOR ADVISOR, SCOUTING/BASEBALL OPERATIONS

R.J. Harrison was one of the first hires by the Rays organization when he joined the club in September 1995. He enters his 45th season in pro baseball, and 26th with the Rays. He served as director of scouting from 2005-15 after one year as assistant director of scouting. Harrison previously served the club as western U.S. crosschecker, national crosschecker and national scouting coordinator. In January 2020, he was honored as a Legend of Scouting by the Professional Baseball Scouts Foundation. Prior to joining the Rays, Harrison spent five seasons as an area scout for the Mets and eight seasons as a manager or coach in the Mariners and Giants organizations. He was drafted as a catcher by the St. Louis Cardinals in 1975 and was a member of the Florida State League champion St. Petersburg Cardinals that season. He converted to pitcher the following year and played six more seasons in the Cardinals and Mariners systems before moving to the dugout. Harrison is a graduate of Arizona State University and played in two College World Series. He and his wife of 42 years, Jane, have two daughters, Lauren and Anna, and a granddaughter, Roxana. They reside in Phoenix, Ariz.



MITCH LUKEVICS SENIOR ADVISOR, PLAYER DEVELOPMENT/BASEBALL OPERATIONS

Mitch Lukevics begins his 47th season in pro ball, 26th with the Rays and second in his role as senior advisor, player development/baseball operations. From 2006-19, he served as director of minor league operations. Lukevics joined the Rays in November 1995, serving as pitching coach for the Gulf Coast League team for one year before he was named assistant to player development and scouting in 1997. In 2012, Minor League Baseball presented Mitch with the prestigious Sheldon "Chief" Bender Award, presented to a baseball executive with distinguished service who has been instrumental in player development. In 2016, he was inducted into the Florida State League Hall of Fame. The 1975 White Sox second-round pick worked in the Chicago farm system as a pitching coach (1981-85) and minor league administrator (1986-88) before directing the Yankees minor league operations from 1989-95. As a pitcher, Lukevics was 24-5 at Penn State, where he earned a degree in health and physical education. As a freshman in 1973, he hurled 8.1 innings in a 3-1 loss to Arizona State in the Nittany Lions' College World Series opener. He spent six seasons pitching in the White Sox system. Lukevics has been a member of the board of trustees for the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues since 2008. Mitch is the father of two children, Matt and Megan, and the grandfather of four: Matt Jr., Billy IV, Audrey and Saddle. He and his wife, Frances, were married in July 2014.



DENARD SPAN / SPECIAL ASSISTANT, BASEBALL OPERATIONS

Denard Span joined the Rays full-time as special assistant of baseball operations in December 2020. In this role, he will leverage his experience as a player to help multiple departments within baseball operations build better programs and processes. He will also serve as a mentor and sounding board to players at all levels. Denard spent 11 seasons in the majors as an outfielder with the Twins (2008-12), Nationals (2013-15), Giants (2016-17), Rays (2018) and Mariners (2018). He hit a combined .281 and collected 1,498 hits, 72 3B, 71 HR and 185 SB. He tied for the NL lead with 184 hits in 2014, and led his league in triples in 2009 and 2013. A Tampa native who grew up attending games at Tropicana Field, he was selected by the Twins in the first round (20th overall) of the 2002 Amateur Draft out of Tampa Catholic High School. He starred on the Crusaders 2001 state championship team, and was inducted to the school's Hall of Fame in 2010. He also created the Denard Span Foundation to serve and empower single parent households through transportation, education and grocery programs. Denard and his wife, Anne, live in Tampa with their sons, DJ and Jace.





KEVIN IBACH / SENIOR DIRECTOR, PRO PERSONNEL & PRO SCOUTING

Kevin Ibach begins his second season as senior director of pro personnel and pro scouting, and his ninth season with the Rays. He was named director of pro scouting in November 2015 after previously serving as a pro scout with the Rays since 2012. He supervises the Rays major league and professional scouting departments, managing the flow of information between scouts and the baseball operations department. Ibach is entering his 21st season in professional baseball. DID YOU KNOW?

A GLOBAL GAME

On 2020 Opening Day, 28.1 pct. of all major leaguers were born outside the 50 United States, spanning 20 countries and territories. This figure has grown from an internationally-born figure of 16.9 pct. in 1995. On 2017 Opening Day, an all-time record 29.8 pct. of all major league players represented countries outside of the U.S. by birthplace.

WITH MLB'S PRELIMINARY APPROVAL, IN JUNE 2019 THE RAYS ANNOUNCED AN INNOVATIVE PLAN TO BUILD NEW HOME BALLPARKS IN BOTH TAMPA BAY AND MONTREAL AND DIVIDE ITS HOME GAMES ACROSS BOTH GEOGRAPHIES.

Since assuming ownership of the team in 2005, it has been Stuart Sternberg's priority to build a new ballpark and secure the team's future in Tampa Bay. In 2007, the team proposed a 35,000-seat ballpark at historic Al Lang Field in St. Petersburg; however, there was an absence of political and corporate support for the plan. Most recently, the organization attempted to build a 31,000-seat fixed-roof ballpark in Tampa's Ybor City neighborhood. That pursuit ended in December 2018 after again failing to secure the necessary public and corporate support for the ballpark.

The “Sister City” or “Shared Season” plan proposed by the Rays in June 2019 would divide its home games across Tampa Bay and Montreal. It would have the team spend spring training and the first portion of its home season in Tampa Bay, then play its remaining home games in Montreal (although no official scheduling parameters have been set). The Rays would play home games in

each city during its best weather months, and it would allow for both new venues to be intimate, open air ballparks.

Both Tampa Bay and Montreal have deep histories with Major League Baseball, and this concept offers each the opportunity to secure it permanently. Both would enjoy the best of what baseball can provide a hometown, and together they would fuel the team and improve its competitive prospects. Both markets would also benefit from the tourism, business and cultural connections that would develop between Tampa Bay and Montreal.

Many of the finer points of the concept still need to be worked out, including the future name of the team and how postseason games would be shared among the two markets. The Rays are currently exploring the feasibility of this Sister City concept. Its Tropicana Field lease with the City of St. Petersburg expires after the 2027 season.

THE TAMPA BAY RAYS ARE COMMITTED TO BEING A STRONG COMMUNITY PARTNER AND ENERGIZING OUR COMMUNITY THROUGH THE MAGIC OF RAYS BASEBALL.

The Rays Baseball Foundation, a 501(c)(3) organization and the official charity of the Rays, is dedicated to improving the lives of those in need within our community, focusing primarily on education, youth development, wellness and social responsibility. Key contributors to the foundation include Rays owners, players, corporate partners, fans and employees.

SCHOLARSHIPS

In response to the COVID-19 crisis, the Rays Baseball Foundation and Rowdies Soccer Fund donated \$1.4 million and counting in financial support to nonprofit organizations throughout Tampa Bay, with 81 agencies receiving funding. This includes \$275,000 through the COVID-19 Relief Grant Program, \$110,000 in Community Fund Grants and \$405,000 in Community Partnership Grants. Over 4.1 million meals were donated to Feeding Tampa Bay through the Rays and Rowdies Virtual Food Drive campaign, with over 1 million meals served through Feeding Tampa Bay's mega mobile pantry hosted in Tropicana Field's parking lots. 400 meals were provided to Ronald McDonald House Charities of Tampa Bay's St. Pete East House, while Rays concessions partner, Levy, donated \$190,000 of food and beverage items to local organizations.

Additionally, the Rays established a fund of \$1 million for Tropicana Field gameday staff who were impacted by the changes to the 2020 season due to the coronavirus pandemic.

SOCIAL JUSTICE

The Rays committed \$100,000 annually to support causes that fight systemic racism within our country. With the goal of amplifying the important, ongoing work done by those on the front lines of this effort, the Rays launched a social justice microsite, highlighting the Racial Equity

Grant Program, BIPOC businesses in Tampa Bay, educational resources ranging from museums to print and digital media, and local social justice and community development organizations.

VOTING INITIATIVE

Ahead of the November 2020 elections, the Rays launched raysbaseball.com/elections as a comprehensive guide for fans and the electorate. The page aimed to bring awareness to important dates and deadlines and provide information about various aspects of the voting process including voter registration, vote-by-mail and early voting, with links to nonpartisan, educational resources. The Rays also offered Tropicana Field to the Pinellas County Supervisor of Elections for use in any capacity to increase access to voting during an election period complicated by COVID-19, and the facility was deemed a vote-by-mail ballot drop-off site throughout early voting. Additionally, a Racial



Equity Grant was awarded by the Rays Baseball Foundation to the League of Women Voters of the St. Petersburg Area for its work to increase voting access in the underrepresented neighborhoods surrounding Tropicana Field, including a get-out-the-vote campaign entitled Roll to the Polls which encouraged mail-in ballot drop-off by all modes of transportation ahead of Election Day.

PROGRAMS

HOME RUN CLUB

In 2010, the Big Game James Club was started by James and Ryane Shields. The club, later to be named the Home Run Club in 2013, consists of a donated suite for foster children and their families. Even though founders James and Ryane Shields are no longer members of the Rays organization, their legacy of advocating for children in foster care lives on. The club continues to offer a sense of stability and belonging to hundreds of foster children. Each season, over 500 foster children have become club members. Two participating organizations have hosted events resulting in numerous adoptions for local foster children.

RAYS JERSEY PROGRAM

Since 2014, the Rays Jersey Program has outfitted more than 80,000 Tampa Bay area tee-ball players and coaches with jerseys and caps. The program covers more than 80 different leagues in nine area counties and has saved the leagues more than \$1 million in equipment costs. As a result of these savings, officials from some of the participating leagues have noted that they have the ability to pass these savings along to participant families. They have also been able to repair their scoreboards, provide upgrades to dugouts, add fencing for fields, purchase additional equipment and grounds crew supplies and repair concession stands and other areas of their facilities.

READING WITH THE RAYS

Since 2006, the Rays Baseball Foundation's summer reading program, Reading with the Rays, has encouraged kids to avoid summer reading loss by participating in a fun and interactive reading program over the summer months. More than 350,000 Tampa Bay area students from nine surrounding counties have participated since its inception. The program is made possible through a partnership with the *Tampa Bay Times* Newspaper in Education, the Rays and public library systems in Charlotte, Citrus, Hernando, Hillsborough, Manatee, Pasco, Pinellas, Polk and Sarasota counties.

TEAM SMILE

Since 2018, the Rays have partnered with Team Smile, an advocacy group that partners

dental professionals with professional athletic organizations to provide life-changing dental care to underserved children in their communities. In 2018-19, the Rays hosted more than 400 children from the Boys & Girls Clubs of the Suncoast and local foster care groups for a free dental day at Tropicana Field. The children received dental work completely free of charge, including X-rays, screening and educational material on how to protect their teeth. The value of care provided totaled almost \$170,000.

The Rays, in partnership with United Concordia Dental, provided hundreds of local area children with dental hygiene kits in 2020.

SOUTH ST. PETERSBURG NEIGHBORHOOD INITIATIVE

The Rays launched the South St. Petersburg Neighborhood Initiative in response to the tragic 2009 shooting death of 8-year-old Paris Whitehead in south St. Petersburg, an underserved community that borders Tropicana Field. This program benefits the following organizations and initiatives:

Since 2008, the Rays Baseball Foundation has teamed up with local partners to provide more than \$2 million in college scholarships to students participating in the Take Stock in Children program in Hillsborough, Manatee, Pasco, Pinellas and Sarasota counties. The foundation also funds the Academy Prep Centers for Education Scholarships in Tampa, St. Petersburg and Lakeland, the St. Petersburg College Foundation First Generation Scholars, Barry Jones Memorial Scholarship and the Don Zimmer Memorial Scholarship.

GRANTS

COMMUNITY FUND GRANT PROGRAM

The Rays Community Fund Grant Program provides assistance to local nonprofits in the Tampa Bay region. These grants help enhance and



support current programs offered by community-based nonprofit organizations. The foundation has invested more than \$1.8 million in over 350 local nonprofits through this program.

COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

The Rays Baseball Foundation is proud to maintain long-standing partnerships with key community organizations throughout Tampa Bay. The foundation provides over \$500,000 in grants each year to established community partners in support of existing programs that serve our region.

RAYS IN THE COMMUNITY

ECOT

The Rays Employee Community Outreach Team (ECOT) was established in 2008 to provide invaluable volunteer hours to community service agencies that enhance or improve the quality of life in the communities they serve. In total, Rays employees have logged more than 38,500 volunteer hours to support nonprofits in the Tampa Bay region.

IN-KIND DONATIONS

Each year, the Rays donate thousands of tickets, suites, experiences and autographed memorabilia to assist organizations in our nine neighboring counties to raise funds for their respective causes.

PLAY BALL

The goal of Rays Play Ball is to celebrate youth baseball and softball while simultaneously encouraging participation in all forms of the game. The Rays do this through support of Rays RBI Tampa and Burg Baseball, the Rays Jersey Program, field renovations and many Play Ball events, like Play Ball Day and Play Ball Weekend.

On July 27, 2019, the Rays hosted the first Baseball Magic Clinic. Almost 100 children from Buddy Baseball and the Miracle League of Pinellas County completed various stations, receiving instruction on hitting, pitching and fielding.

PLAYER & RAYS WIVES PROGRAMS

TUESDAY'S CHAMPION

Before every Tuesday home game at Tropicana Field, the Rays host a child from the Make-A-Wish Foundation or Children's Dream Fund at the ballpark as a part of a special program called "Tuesday's Champion." The kids, accompanied by their families, are invited to participate in a VIP experience which includes being on the field during batting practice, where they can meet and interact with Rays players and coaches. They are then treated to dinner in the Rays Club before

taking the field and throwing out the ceremonial first pitch. Along with these experiences, they are given a personalized jersey and a bat to commemorate the experience. The children selected for the program are battling life-threatening illnesses and occasionally come straight from the hospital for this special experience.

While Tuesday's Champions were unable to visit Tropicana Field in 2020, Rays players and coaches supported critically ill children through a virtual "Rays OFF the Runway" event, benefiting the Children's Dream Fund. The event, which would have typically been a fashion show featuring Rays players and coaches with their significant other, was reimagined into a new opportunity for the dream children and fans to meet the Rays in a virtual setting. Over 700 viewers tuned in and over \$37,000 was raised to make dreams come true for children with life-threatening illnesses.

KIERMAIER'S KIDS

In 2019, with a \$25,000 donation to the Children's Dream Fund, Kevin Kiermaier and his wife, Marisa, fulfilled the dreams of six children—"Kiermaier's Kids"—who are living with life-threatening illnesses. The Kiermaier's Kids' dreams included meeting Mickey Mouse, visiting Disney World to meet the princesses, setting sail on a Disney cruise, attending a Queen concert, a full car makeover and a new, fully equipped tool shed.

LOWE'S HOME RUNS FOR HOPE


For every home run Rays infielder Brandon Lowe hits, he and his wife, Madison, will donate \$100 to the Crisis Center of Tampa Bay. The Rays Baseball Foundation will also contribute \$100 per home run in support of Lowe's "Home Runs for Hope" campaign. RAYS WIVES



He led the club to a 40-20 (.667) record, the best winning pct. in club history. Cash captured his first AL East title as manager and led the Rays to the second AL pennant in franchise history. He is baseball's 3rd-longest tenured manager with his current team behind Bob Melvin (Athletics) and Terry Francona (Indians).

X-RAY REPORT

- As manager of the defending AL champions, Cash will manage the AL All-Star Team at Truist Park in Atlanta and will get to bring the Rays coaching staff along with him...previously he was selected to join Terry Francona's staff for the 2017 All-Star Game at Marlins Park and AJ Hinch's staff for the 2018 All-Star Game at Nationals Park.
- Cash was announced as 2020 AL Manager of the Year on MLB Network by his close friend, Indians Manager Terry Francona...Tito, who had Cash as a player in Boston and bullpen coach in Cleveland, said, "I'm so proud of you.... He's getting better and better. I'm thrilled for his family."
- Kevin and his family volunteer at Johns Hopkins All Children's Hospital in St. Petersburg...14-year-old Camden, the oldest daughter of Kevin and his wife, Emily, had open-heart surgery at the same hospital in 2007, when she was only 17 months old...the couple has two other children: daughter Ella (13) and son J.D. (8).
- Became the eighth manager in major league history to lead his hometown team to the World Series—and only the second in the last 30 years joining Brooklyn native Joe Torre, who led the Yankees to six World Series from 1996–2003... others: STL Whitey Herzog (1972, 1985, 1987), MIL Harvey Kuenn (1982), PHI Dallas Green (1980), STL Red Schoendienst (1967, 1968), STL Johnny Keane (1964) and PIT Bill McKechnie (1925).
- In 2020, he made history in becoming the first person to play in the Little League World Series in Williamsport, Pa. (Northside Little League in Tampa) and manage a team to the Fall Classic... he is the only current major league manager to have played in the Little League World Series.
- He is one of six current major league managers to play in the College World Series (Florida State), joining CHC David Ross (Florida, 1998; Auburn,

1997), BOS Alex Cora (Miami, 1994-96), DET AJ Hinch (Stanford, 1995), CLE Terry Francona (Arizona, 1980) and OAK Bob Melvin (Cal, 1980).

MANAGING & COACHING CAREER

- His career 454-416 (.522) record is the best winning pct. of any manager in club history...named the fifth manager in Rays history on Dec 5, 2014, and is the 2nd-longest tenured behind his predecessor, Joe Maddon (2006-14)...on Oct 9, 2018, agreed to a contract extension through the 2024 season with a club option for 2025...would pass Maddon in tenure on Opening Day 2024.
- In 2020, captured his first division title as a manager and steered the Rays to a second consecutive postseason and third straight winning season...their 40-20 (.667) record was the best winning pct. in franchise history...it was the fourth consecutive season the Rays improved their winning pct., all under his watch.

- Named AL Manager of the Year by the BBWAA, receiving 22 of 30 first-place votes...became the second manager in Rays history to win the award, following Joe Maddon in 2008 and 2011.
- His .667 winning pct. was the 3rd-highest for a BBWAA Manager of the Year since the award was introduced in 1983...trailed SEA Lou Piniella (.716) in 2001 and NYY Joe Torre (.704) in 1998.



- ◆ Became the fifth AL manager to record three consecutive top three finishes in BBWAA Manager of the Year balloting...joined MIN Ron Gardenhire (2002-04, 2008-10), LAA Mike Scioscia (2007-09), OAK Art Howe (1999-2002) and OAK Tony La Russa (1988-90)...his win in 2020 followed third-place finishes in 2018-19.
- ◆ Survived 15 different players (11 pitchers) being placed on the injured list in the shortened 2020 season, excluding the COVID-19 Related IL... this included three from their season-opening starting rotation (Chirinos, Morton, Yarbrough), seven of their planned Opening Day bullpen (Alvarado, Anderson, Beeks, Drake, Kittredge, Poche, Roe) and four starting position players (Choi, Diaz, Meadows, Zunino)...the Rays injured list peaked at 13 players on Sep 1, tying the club record...from Aug 9-Sep 1, their injured list grew from four to 13 players—and they went a major-league-best 18-4 (.818) over that stretch.

- ◆ The Rays won the division despite no pitcher qualifying for the ERA leaderboard, one of five teams in major league history to do so along with the 2020 Dodgers, 2020 Braves, 2018 Dodgers and 2017 Astros...Cash used seven pitchers who entered spring training as non-roster invites, including five of them for at least 25 IP (Curtiss, Fleming, Loup, Slegers, Thompson).
- ◆ Used 12 different pitchers to record a save, tying the major league record held by the 1973 Rangers who finished 6th in the AL West...six pitchers recorded their first career save (Banda, Curtiss, Garcia, Kittredge, Sherriff, Thompson).
- ◆ Used 59 different batting orders in 60 games.
- ◆ Served a 1-game suspension on Sep 2 at NYY, the first of his career, for his postgame comments the night before...after Aroldis Chapman threw

at Mike Brosseau's head in the 9th inning on Sep 1, Cash stated "I have a whole damn stable full of guys that throw 98 miles per hour."

- ◆ Managed the Rays to the second AL pennant in franchise history...won "winner take all" games in the ALDS vs. NYY and ALCS vs. HOU.
- ◆ At 42 years old, was the youngest manager to reach the World Series since Ozzie Guillén (41) and the White Sox swept the Astros in 2005.
- ◆ Has been ejected 11 times as Rays manager, 3rd in club history behind Joe Maddon (37) and Larry Rothschild (15).
- ◆ Three other current managers are former members of his coaching staff: Rocco Baldelli (Twins), Charlie Montoyo (Blue Jays) and Derek Shelton (Pirates)...Montoyo and Baldelli were both hired away on Oct 25, 2018...became the first manager to lose two members of his coaching staff to big league managing jobs in one offseason since FLA Jim Leyland after winning the 1997 World Series.
- ◆ At age 41 in 2019, was the youngest AL East manager to lead his team to the postseason since 1995, when NYY Buck Showalter (age 39) and BOS Kevin Kennedy (age 41) both did it...was the 3rd-youngest manager/head coach among the three major franchises in Tampa Bay sports history to reach the postseason...Buccaneers head coach Jon Gruden won Super Bowl XXXVIII (2002-03) at age 39, and Lightning head coach Guy Boucher advanced to the 2011 NHL Eastern Conference Finals at age 39...was also the first native to the Tampa Bay area to lead one of these three franchises to the postseason.
- ◆ Spent the 2015-18 seasons as the majors' youngest manager until Rocco Baldelli was hired by the Twins...was hired the day before his 37th birthday, and became the youngest manager since AJ Hinch piloted the 2009 D-backs at the age of 34.
- ◆ Is the sixth Tampa-born manager in major league history, and second to manage the Rays... that list includes Hall of Famers Al Lopez and Tony La Russa, Lou Piniella (for whom Cash played in 2005), Dave Miley and John Hart.
- ◆ Is the second Florida State University alumnus to manage the Rays, joining the franchise's first manager, Larry Rothschild.
- ◆ For two seasons (2013-14) before joining the Rays, served as the bullpen coach for the Indians under Terry Francona, whom he played for in Boston (2007-08, 2010)...in his two seasons there, Indians pitchers posted the AL's 4th-best ERA at 3.69, just behind the Rays (3.65)...Indians pitchers also led the majors in strikeouts those two seasons and fanned a then-major-league-record 1,450 batters in 2014.



- ◆ Finished his playing career with Triple-A Round Rock in the Rangers organization in 2011... after the minor league season, he served as an advance scout for the major league team for the rest of 2011 and was at Tropicana Field the night Evan Longoria hit his walk-off homer in "Game 162" to send the Rays to the postseason.
- ◆ In 2012, he was a major league advance scout for the Blue Jays.

PLAYING CAREER

- ◆ Played professionally for 12 seasons with six organizations from 2000-11, including parts of eight seasons in the majors with five different teams from 2002-10...played all but 20 games in his career with AL East teams...played for four of the five teams in the division...appeared in 241 games (189 starts), all at catcher.
- ◆ Threw out 26.7 pct. (43 of 161) of attempted base stealers in his career...the major league average during his career was 24.4 pct.
- ◆ Caught two seasons in the Rays organization, including 13 games with the major league club in 2005...became the second former Devil Rays/Rays player to manage in the major leagues, joining Ozzie Guillén (White Sox/Marlins)... since then, Mickey Callaway (Mets), Gabe Kapler (Phillies/Giants), Dave Martinez (Nationals) and Rocco Baldelli (Twins) have joined this group.
- ◆ Started for the U.S. team in the Futures Game in Milwaukee in 2002 and later that year was a September call up by the Blue Jays.
- ◆ Delivered his first major league hit on Sep 11, 2002 at CLE, a single off Dave Burba...his first home run came the next season on Sep 27 vs. CLE off Terry Mulholland.
- ◆ Was in the Opening Day lineup for the Blue Jays in 2004 and started a career-high 50 games...was

the Jays regular catcher until mid-May, when he went on the injured list with a rib injury... returned in June and served as a backup to Gregg Zaun the rest of the season...threw out 42.4 pct. (14 of 33) of attempted base stealers, 4th-best among major league catchers (min. 50 starts).

- ◆ Acquired by the Devil Rays from the Blue Jays for Chad Gaudin at the 2004 Winter Meetings in Anaheim...was up with the Devil Rays in 2005 for 39 days (June 13-July 22) replacing veteran Charles Johnson, who was released...homered in his first at-bat as a Ray, and remains one of 14 who have done that...it came on June 15 vs. MIL off Victor Santos...in that same game, he caught Hideo Nomo's 200th career win, automatically qualifying Nomo for Meikyukai, one of Japan's two baseball halls of fame...of his 5 hits as a Ray, two were home runs...Cash's only other homer as a Devil Ray came off Hall of Famer Randy Johnson on June 21 at NYY in a 20-11 loss.
- ◆ Was on the 40-man roster for former Rays Manager Joe Maddon's first spring training camp in 2006, but spent the entire season at Triple-A Durham and never played for Joe... signed a minor league contract with the Red Sox after the season.
- ◆ Received World Series rings from the 2007 Red Sox and 2009 Yankees...joined the Red Sox for the last six weeks of the 2007 season when catcher Doug Mirabeli went on the injured list... was on the Red Sox ALDS roster, but did not play.
- ◆ Started 42 games for the Red Sox in 2008, including all 30 of Tim Wakefield's starts...homered in Game 4 of the ALCS vs. TB at Fenway Park off Andy Sonnanstine...was in the visitors' dugout at Tropicana Field when the Rays clinched the AL pennant with a 3-1 win in Game 7.
- ◆ Was up with the Yankees for two weeks in 2009 (May 12-27) and appeared in 10 games while Jorge Posada was on the injured list.
- ◆ In his last major league season in 2010, he was traded from the Astros back to the Red Sox on July 1 when catchers Jason Varitek and Victor Martinez went on the injured list...in the final start of his career on Oct 2 vs. NYY, he played a key role in a Red Sox win that helped propel the eventual AL East champion Rays into a first-place tie with the Yankees with a game to play...his bases-loaded walk in the 8th inning tied the game that was eventually won, 7-6, by the Red Sox.

AMATEUR CAREER

- ◆ Played infield in high school and college...played three seasons at Florida State University...his junior year (1999), hit .317 (80-for-252) with 14 HR



and 58 RBI, earning second team All-ACC honors... named Most Valuable Player of the Tallahassee Regional in the 1999 College World Series.

- ◆ Kevin, his father, Mike, and his late uncle, Ron, all played in the College World Series; Ron with Florida State in 1970 and Mike with Georgia Southern in 1973...all three were infielders... Mike was drafted in the 27th round by the Giants in 1974 and played five seasons in the Giants and Phillies chains...in 1976 with Fresno in the Class-A California League, he had 22 HR and 102 RBI...only one other player in the Giants organization hit more home runs that season: Bobby Murcer hit 23 with the big league club... Ron played two seasons in the majors with the Tigers (1973-74) and hit .297 in 34 career games.
- ◆ At FSU, he played in the first-ever Devil Rays game, a spring exhibition at Al Lang Field on Feb 26, 1998...Cash played first base for FSU and went 0-for-2 in the Devil Rays 6-3 win.
- ◆ Undrafted out of FSU in 1999...he spent that summer with the Falmouth Commodores in the Cape Cod League, where he was named the team's Most Valuable Player...that summer he went to Manager Jeff Trundy and volunteered to move from infielder to catcher after illness and injury

sidelined the team's two catchers...Kevin threw out two baserunners in his first inning behind the plate, and the position switch stuck.

- ◆ On Aug 7, 1999—the same day Wade Boggs delivered his 3,000th career hit at Tropicana Field—he signed as a non-drafted free agent with the Blue Jays...he then worked with Ernie Whitt to develop his craft behind the plate.
- ◆ Graduated from Gaither High School in North Tampa, where he was All-State in 1996 under coach Frank Permy, who retired in 2014 after 31 years at the school and passed away in April 2020...was cut from the school's fall team his sophomore season.
- ◆ Grew up in Tampa and was a member of the Tampa Northside Little League team that advanced to the 1989 Little League World Series in Williamsport, Pa. ...he was one of three 11-year-olds on a team of 12-year-olds...Kevin's Northside team was later invited to play in the first "game" ever played at Tropicana Field (then the Florida Suncoast Dome)...the youngsters played a Wiffle ball contest as part of the dome's opening ceremonies in February 1990...his father was an original Rays season ticket holder.



POSITION PLAYED **Catcher, Pitcher**

BORN **7/14/63** in Martins Ferry, OH

RESIDES **St. Cloud, FL**

TENURE **This is his 36th season in professional baseball, 30th as a coach or scout, 12th in the Rays organization.**

COACHING CAREER

- Is the longest tenured member of the Rays coaching staff, as he begins his 12th season on the staff and 10th full season as bullpen coach... is the seventh bullpen coach in Rays history and the longest tenured...joined the Rays as assistant to the pitching coach on Dec 17, 2009...midway through the 2011 season began filling in for bullpen coach Bobby Ramos, who was ill, and officially replaced him on Nov 30, 2011.
- In 2020, the Rays bullpen ranked 3rd in the majors with 269.2 IP...Rays relievers recorded 25 wins, 2nd in the majors behind the Dodgers (26)...they ranked 3rd in bullpen ERA (3.37), behind the Athletics (2.72) and Dodgers (2.74)... the Rays used 12 different pitchers to record a save, tying the record held by the 1973 Rangers.
- Prior to joining the Rays, he spent 18 years with the Astros organization, where he served as either a coach or scout, including the last three seasons as pitching coach for the Double-A Corpus Christi Hooks in the Texas League.
- Was the pitching coach for the Class-A Salem Avalanche, the Astros affiliate in the Carolina League, from 2003-06...served in the same

capacity for Class-A Michigan for two seasons and had previously coached their Gulf Coast League and Appalachian League affiliates... served as a scout from 1991-93, and combined coaching and scouting duties at various other times with the Astros.

PLAYING CAREER

- Selected by the Brewers in the 20th round of the 1981 Amateur Draft as a catcher out of Buckeye South High School in Rayland, Ohio.
- After two years in the Brewers system, switched to pitcher and was signed by the Royals, where he remained for four years.

PERSONAL & MISC.

- Has a degree in biology from Ohio University.
- Was all-state in baseball, football and basketball at Buckeye South...inducted into the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Hall of Fame in 2014.
- Resides in St. Cloud, Fla., with his wife, Carol, and their two children, Sarah and Clayton... Clayton is committed to pitch at the University of North Florida next year.

TENURE **This is his 10th season in professional baseball, ninth with the Rays, third as a coach.**

COACHING CAREER

- ◆ Enters his third season coaching at the major league level...named process and analytics coach on Dec 4, 2018...in this role, he works to improve decision-making processes and practice methods, and gather feedback from players and coaches alike.
- ◆ Begins his ninth season with the Rays, eighth full-time...spent two seasons (2017-18) as director of analytics, overseeing the club's research efforts and coordinating improvements to decision-making processes.
- ◆ Joined the Rays as an intern in January 2013, before earning promotions to assistant and then analyst in baseball research and development.
- ◆ Is the first Canadian-born coach in Rays history.
- ◆ Interned with the Blue Jays baseball operations department in 2012.

PERSONAL & MISC.

- ◆ His nickname is J-Money.
- ◆ Earned a mathematics degree from Princeton University.
- ◆ Played three years of club hockey at Princeton, primarily as a goalie and occasionally as a forward.
- ◆ His cousin, Mike Cammalleri, played 15 seasons as a center/wing in the NHL for the Kings, Canadiens, Flames, Oilers and Devils.
- ◆ In July 2019 in Toronto, he was featured on CTV National News—being interviewed by a reporter also named Jon Erlichman.

DID YOU KNOW?

RAYS ALL-TIME EJECTION LEADERS

Joe Maddon leads the list with 37 ejections while Carl Crawford and B.J. Upton lead Rays players with five. Thirty-eight of the Rays 179 ejections all-time have come against the Red Sox. The Rays had eight players/coaches ejected and the Red Sox none on Aug 29, 2000.

BORN **4/14/76** in Columbus, OH

RESIDES **Cuyahoga Falls, OH**

TENURE **This is his 24th season in professional baseball, 17th in the Rays organization, ninth as a coach or instructor, third as a major league coach.**

COACHING CAREER

- Enters his third season coaching at the major league level...on Dec 4, 2018, was named the Rays second major league field coordinator, replacing Rocco Baldelli who filled the newly-created role in 2018 before he was hired as manager of the Twins...in this role, he assists Manager Kevin Cash and bench coach Matt Quatraro during games, works defensively with catchers and focuses on continued development of major league players.
- Spent the previous six seasons (2013-18) as the Rays minor league catching coordinator...entered the coaching ranks in 2012 as manager of the Gulf Coast League Rays.
- Is the sixth to join the Rays coaching staff after playing for Tampa Bay, following Rocco Baldelli, Wade Boggs, Kevin Cash, Dave Martinez and Ozzie Timmons.

PLAYING CAREER

- Spent 14 seasons catching professionally, including parts of seven years in the majors with the Devil Rays (2001-02), Marlins (2006-08) and Phillies (2009-10)...appeared in a total of 40 games, and his rookie status was still intact during his seventh and final major league season...made his only Opening Day roster with the 2008 Marlins.
- Appeared in 8 games with the Rays...made his major league debut on Sep 8, 2001 at OAK and delivered a pinch-hit single in his first at-bat...in his first career start, Sep 23 at TOR, caught a 1-0 shut-out by Joe Kennedy (7 IP) and Esteban Yan (2 IP).
- Delivered a 10th-inning walk-off single in the Phillies 2009 regular season finale, a 7-6 win...the Phillies advanced to the World Series that year, and while he wasn't included on the post-season roster he traveled with them all the way through their Game 6 loss to the Yankees in the World Series.

- Had 100 SB in the minors, including 28 SB in 1998, but never attempted one in the majors.
- Selected as a shortstop by the Devil Rays in the 23rd round of the 1997 Amateur Draft out of Kent State University...was assigned to Rookie-level Princeton where he played for Charlie Montoyo, and committed 33 errors in 65 games at short-stop...in January 1998, farm director Tom Foley called him and asked if he would come to St. Pete to give catching a try—a position he had never played in his life—working with Bill Evers...only a few weeks later, he was added to big league camp after another catcher's injury...he backed up Toby Hall in Class-A Charleston that year and eventually the position change stuck.
- Was a Durham teammate of Kevin Cash (2005), Matt Quatraro (2002) and Ozzie Timmons (2000).
- Previously selected by the Astros in the 64th round of the 1994 Amateur Draft out of Steubenville (Ohio) High School, but did not sign.

PERSONAL & MISC.

- Is fully adept communicating in sign language, as both his parents are deaf.
- He and his wife, Shannon, have two daughters, Cameron and McKenna.

DID YOU KNOW?

ALL-STAR GAMES

The 2021 All-Star Game will be held on Tuesday, July 13 at Truist Park in Atlanta. As the defending American League champions, the AL team will be led by Manager Kevin Cash and the Rays coaching staff. It is the third time Atlanta has hosted the Midsummer Classic. The Rays are the only current club yet to host one.

The pandemic-shortened 2020 season was the first summer in 75 years without an All-Star Game. In 1945, no Midsummer Classic was played due to World War II.

As of 2018, there will be no ESPN Sunday Night Baseball game on the Sunday before the All-Star Game, as stipulated in the latest update to the Collective Bargaining Agreement. On Thursday, July 15, the Red Sox will visit the Yankees with the other 28 clubs resuming play on Friday. Prior to 2018, the schedule was clear the Thursday following the All-Star Game.

The 2022 All-Star Game will be played at Dodger Stadium.

THIRD BASE COACH

RODNEY LINARES

Rodney Linares (lih-NAHR-ehs)



OPENING DAY AGE **44**

POSITION PLAYED **Infielder**

BORN **8/7/76** in **Brooklyn, NY**

RESIDES **San Pedro de Macoris, DR**

TENURE **This is his 25th season in professional baseball, 23rd as a coach or manager, third as a major league coach.**

COACHING CAREER

- Named the seventh third base coach in Rays history on Nov 21, 2018, replacing Matt Quatraro who had been named bench coach...follows Greg Riddoch (1998-99), Billy Hatcher (2000), Terry Collins (2001), Tom Foley (2002-14), Charlie Montoyo (2015-17) and Quatraro (2018).
- Prior to joining the Rays, he spent 21 years in the Astros organization, including the last 12 as a manager...compiled a 761-694 (.523) record managing Triple-A Fresno (2018), Double-A Corpus Christi (2015-17), Class-A Lancaster (2012-14), Class-A Lexington (2010-11) and Rookie-level Greenville (2007-09)...managed José Altuve, Carlos Correa, Alex Bregman, J.D. Martinez and many other future big leaguers.
- In 2018, managed Fresno to an 82-57 (.590) record, winning the Pacific Coast League North Division title...named the PCL's Best Manager Prospect by *Baseball America*.
- Guided his teams to the postseason in six of his last seven seasons...led Corpus Christi to the two winningest seasons in franchise history (2015-16) and was named Texas League Manager of the Year in 2015...won a pair of California League

championships (2012, 2014) and was named the league's Manager of the Year in 2012.

- Was involved with the Dominican Winter League for 13 straight seasons (2006-18)...this included time as a manager for the Aguilas Cibaenas (2018), Gigantes del Cibao (2017) and Estrellas de Oriente (2016).
- Began his coaching career in 1999 as a coach and scout for the Astros Dominican Republic operations and remained in that role through the 2004 season...served as the hitting coach at Lexington from 2005-06.

PLAYING CAREER

- Former infielder was originally signed by the Tigers in 1997 and spent parts of two seasons in the minors in the Tigers and Astros (1998) systems.

PERSONAL & MISC.

- His father, Julio Linares, is the Astros senior advisor for Latin American development and has been part of the organization since 1973.
- Has three sons: Steven, Ryan and Milan.

DID YOU KNOW?

INSTANT REPLAY

The first seven years (2014-20) of expanded instant replay have allowed MLB to get more calls correct, especially in key, game-changing situations. Over these seven years, the overall timing of instant replay has been reduced from 1:46 in 2014 to 1:25 in 2020.

Of 526 reviews in the 2020 regular season leaguewide, there were 104 "confirmed" (19.8 pct.), 181 "stands" (34.4 pct.) and 223 "overturned" (42.4 pct.). An additional 18 were "rules check" or "record keeping."

CHAD MOTTOLA

Charles Edward Mottola (muh-TOLE-uh)OPENING DAY AGE **49**POSITION PLAYED **Outfielder**BORN **10/15/71 in Augusta, GA**RESIDES **Orlando, FL**

TENURE **This is his 30th season in professional baseball, 14th as a coach or instructor, eighth in the Rays organization, seventh as a major league coach.**

COACHING CAREER

- Enters his fifth full season as Rays hitting coach...named to the post on Sep 6, 2016, replacing Derek Shelton, and filled the role for the last 24 games of the season...is the seventh hitting coach in franchise history, following Steve Henderson (1998, 2006-09), Leon Roberts (1999-2000), Wade Boggs (2001), Milt May (2002), Lee Elia (2003-05) and Shelton (2010-16).
- The 2020 Rays averaged 4.82 R/G, their highest since 2010 (4.95)...they finished among AL leaders with 197 XBH (2nd), 105 2B (2nd), 12 3B (tied for 1st), 243 BB (2nd) and 48 SB (4th)...the Rays led the AL in runs as late as the end of play on Sep 2 and were tied for the major league lead as late as the end of play on Aug 13.
- The Rays had 18 different players with a homer, most in the majors...from Aug 12 through season's end, the Rays ranked 3rd in the AL with 66 HR behind the White Sox (73) and Blue Jays (72).
- Joined the Rays organization in 2014 as a minor league hitting coordinator and remained in that role for three seasons until his promotion to major league hitting coach.
- Was the hitting coach for the Blue Jays under Manager John Gibbons in 2013...prior to that, spent three seasons (2010-12) as hitting coach for the Blue Jays Triple-A affiliate, the Las Vegas 51s...after his playing career ended in 2007, he served as a coach for the GCL Blue Jays for one season and a roving hitting instructor for the Jays in 2009.

PLAYING CAREER

- During his 16-year pro career as an outfielder he played in exactly 1,800 games in the minors and 59 games in the majors over parts of five seasons with the Reds (1996), Blue Jays (2000, 2006), Marlins (2001) and Orioles (2004)...spent time in eight different organizations and was

signed three different times as a free agent by the Blue Jays.

- Elected to the Triple-A International League Hall of Fame on Jan 28, 2020...spent nine seasons in the IL with six different franchises...won the Governors' Cup with Charlotte in 1999 and IL MVP honors with Syracuse in 2000.
- Was a 10th-round pick by the Orioles out of St. Thomas Aquinas High School in Fort Lauderdale, but attended the University of Central Florida...selected by the Reds in the first round (fifth overall) of the 1992 Amateur Draft, immediately before the Yankees drafted Derek Jeter.
- Was a teammate of Rays Manager Kevin Cash in 2002 at Triple-A Syracuse.
- Hit 4 HR in the majors, including 2 HR off former Cy Young Award winner Fernando Valenzuela while a rookie with the Reds in 1996...his last homer came off current Bally Sports Sun color analyst Brian Anderson, on June 30, 2004 at KC, helping the Orioles to a 13-4 win.

AMATEUR CAREER

- In 1992, became the first player in UCF history to be selected in the first round of MLB's Amateur Draft...finished his collegiate career with a .331 avg., 23 HR and 148 RBI in 177 games.
- As a junior in 1992, earned first team All-American honors after leading the Knights with 52 runs, 7 3B, 14 HR and 143 total bases...his 14 HR in 1992 are still tied for 8th all-time on the school's single-season list.

PERSONAL & MISC.

- Met his wife, Emily, at UCF, and they married in January 2005...they have two kids, Luke (15) and Elle (12).

DID YOU KNOW?

TRIPLE PLAYS

The Rays have pulled off three triple plays in club history. The most recent came on Sep 27, 2011 vs. NYY when Russell Martin grounded into a 5-4-3 triple play (Evan Longoria to Ben Zobrist to Sean Rodríguez).

On Sep 2, 2006 vs. SEA, the Rays pulled off their second triple play, the first at Tropicana Field, in the top of the 1st inning. With runners on first and third, J.P. Howell threw a strike on a 3-2 count to Raul Ibañez for the first out. Catcher Dioner Navarro threw the ball to shortstop Ben Zobrist to get Adrián Beltré, who was running from first on the pitch. Zobrist then threw back to Navarro to nail José López as he tried to score from third to complete the triple play. It was the first 2-6-2 triple play in major league history.

On Sep 13, 2002 at TOR, the Rays executed the first triple play in club history (L-4-6-3) with Dewon Brazelton on the mound in his major league debut.

Rays opponents have also turned three triple plays, and Sean Rodríguez was the batter in the two most recent. Both of Rodríguez's were of the 5-4-3 variety—April 17, 2014 vs. NYY and Aug 16, 2011 at BOS—making him the first player to hit into a pair of triple plays since ATL Chipper Jones (2007, 1996) and before that, SD Tony Gwynn (1995, 1991). In 2011, Rodríguez became the first player since STL Gregg Jefferies in 1993 to hit into a triple play and participate in one defensively in the same season.

On June 11, 2006 at KC, the Royals turned a 8-1-6-5 triple play when Russell Branan's apparent sacrifice fly was nullified upon appeal, when it was ruled that Aubrey Huff had left third base early on the tag-up. Rocco Baldelli was also caught on the play trying to advance from first to second base.

COACHING CAREER

- ◆ Begins his fourth season as the Rays pitching coach...hired on Oct 3, 2017 as the eighth pitching coach in franchise history, following Rick Williams (1998-2000), Bill Fischer (2000-01), Jackie Brown (2002), Chris Bosio (2003), Chuck Hernandez (2004-05), Mike Butcher (2006) and Jim Hickey (2007-17).
- ◆ The 2020 Rays ranked 3rd in the majors with a 3.56 ERA...this marked the second consecutive season the Rays finished among the majors' top three in ERA, and the fourth straight season they finished among the top ten.
- ◆ No Rays pitcher qualified for the ERA leaderboard...Tyler Glasnow led the club with 57.1 IP...the Rays became one of four teams in major league history to win a pennant without a qualifying pitcher, along with the 2020 Dodgers, 2018 Dodgers and 2017 Astros...the Rays used 12 starting pitchers, tied for 4th in the majors...they used 12 pitchers to record a save, tying the major league record held by the 1973 Rangers.
- ◆ During his three years as pitching coach, the Rays have a 3.68 ERA and .231 opp avg., both 3rd in the majors behind the Dodgers and Astros...the Rays introduced the opener concept in May 2018 and since then have gone 65-43 in 108 games when using one (including postseason).
- ◆ Spent three seasons (2015-17) as the pitching coach for Triple-A Durham...in three seasons under Snyder, Bulls pitchers combined for a 3.61 ERA and twice established strikeout records...in 2016, they set an International League record with 1,287 SO...in 2017, they shattered their own record with 1,421 SO—an all-time mark for Minor League Baseball...this mark has been passed by other clubs in recent seasons.
- ◆ In his five seasons as a minor league pitching coach, he worked with 23 pitchers who would later graduate to the major leagues.

- ◆ Has spent the entirety of his coaching career in the Rays system...began as the pitching coach for Short-A Hudson Valley in 2012...promoted to Class-A Bowling Green in 2013...served as a pitching coordinator in 2014.

PLAYING CAREER

- ◆ Pitched professionally for 11 seasons, including parts of five years in the majors with the Royals (2003, 2005-06) and Red Sox (2006-08)...in 2007, his only full season in the majors, compiled a 3.81 ERA over 46 relief apps and was named to the Red Sox World Series roster...did not pitch in their 4-game sweep over the Rockies.
- ◆ He and Kevin Cash were teammates for the Red Sox during the 2007-08 seasons, and Cash caught him for 6 games in 2007.
- ◆ Underwent five surgeries in his playing career, including two that sidelined him for an entire season...missed 2001 due to Tommy John surgery, and 2004 due to a torn right labrum repair.
- ◆ Selected by the Royals in the first round (seventh overall) of the 1999 Amateur Draft out of the University of North Carolina.
- ◆ Originally selected by the Rays in the 27th round of the 1996 Amateur Draft out of Riverview High School in Sarasota, but did not sign...lettered in baseball, basketball, swimming and golf in high school.

PERSONAL & MISC.

- ◆ His father, Donald, played basketball at Rice University from 1970-72.
- ◆ Switch-hit all the way through college.
- ◆ He and his wife, Victoria, have one son, Luke (4).

BULLPEN AREA

- ◆ Ball lodging on, under or in the bullpen seating area: out of play. A ball is deemed to be lodged when it goes in or behind equipment or seating or, in the umpire's judgment, is deemed otherwise unplayable.
- ◆ Ball enters the bullpen seating area and rebounds out of the seating area: in play.


CATWALKS, LIGHTS AND SUSPENDED OBJECTS

- ◆ Batted ball strikes catwalk, light or suspended object over fair territory:
 - Batted ball that strikes either of the lower two catwalks, lights or suspended objects in fair territory: home run.
 - Batted ball that is not judged a home run and remains on a catwalk, light or suspended object: two bases.
 - Batted ball that is not judged a home run and strikes a catwalk, light or suspended object in fair territory shall be judged fair or foul in relation to where it strikes the ground or is touched by a fielder. If caught by fielder, batter is out and runners advance at own risk.
- ◆ Batted ball strikes catwalk, light or suspended object over foul territory: dead ball.

- Named the seventh first base coach in Rays history on Nov 3, 2017, following Billy Hatcher (1998-99, 2003-05), José Cardenal (2000-01), Lee May (2001-02), George Hendrick (2006-14), Dave Martinez (2007, as a fill-in for Hendrick, who was recovering from knee surgery) and Rocco Baldelli (2015-17)...also serves as an assistant hitting coach alongside Chad Mottola and provides baserunning instruction.
- Has spent his entire coaching career in the Rays system...before being named to the major league staff, spent two seasons as the hitting coach for Triple-A Durham (2016-17)...coached seven seasons with Double-A Montgomery (2009-15), one with Class-A Columbus (2008) and one with Short-A Hudson Valley (2007).
- Is one of four major league coaches in Rays history who were born in the Tampa Bay area, following Manager Kevin Cash (Tampa), former Manager Lou Piniella (Tampa) and former pitching coach Chuck Hernandez (Tampa).

PLAYING CAREER

- Played 16 seasons professionally as an outfielder, highlighted by parts of five seasons in the majors with the Cubs (1995-96), Reds (1997), Mariners (1999) and Devil Rays (2000)...this included stints in the Japanese Central League (2001), Mexican League (2005) and independent Atlantic League (2003-06).
- Played his final stint in the majors with the Devil Rays in 2000, finishing his major league career on a 9-game hitting streak and batting .341 (14-for-41) with 4 HR and 13 RBI in 12 games...earned a September call up with the Rays after a career year for Durham, where he hit 29 HR and led the International League with 104 RBI and 100 runs to earn IL All-Star honors.

- His final career home run came on Sep 28, 2000 at Tropicana Field, off NYY Roger Clemens.
- In his first career plate appearance, on Opening Day 1995 at CIN, drew a pinch-hit, bases-loaded walk against Chuck McElroy...according to Stats LLC, was the third player since data is available (1974) to draw a pinch-hit, bases-loaded walk in his first career plate appearance, along with BOS Carlos Quintana on Sep 16, 1988 vs. NYY and MTL Bob Pate on June 2, 1980 vs. CHC.
- Was in uniform for the opening of Safeco Field, on July 15, 1999 vs. SD, after being called up from Triple-A Tacoma earlier that day.
- Hit 301 HR in his professional career, including independent ball, Mexico and Japan.

PERSONAL & MISC.

- Since May 29, 2018 at OAK, when he began doing 10 push-ups in the dugout for every run the Rays score, he has tallied 16,560 push-ups...that includes postseason.
- Has an unofficial fan club in the seats closest to his first base coaching box...they've brought him cupcakes, ordered Timmons jerseys and worn masks with his likeness.
- Selected by the Cubs in the fifth round of the 1991 Amateur Draft out of the University of Tampa, where he was a two-time NCAA Division II All-American selection.
- Selected by the White Sox in the 44th round of the 1988 Amateur Draft out of Brandon (Fla.) High School, but did not sign.

JOSEPH BENGE / HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER

Joseph, 43, begins his 11th season in the Rays organization, fourth as head athletic trainer. He is the fourth head athletic trainer in club history, following Jamie Reed (1997-2002), Ken Crenshaw (2003-05) and Ron Porterfield (2006-17). He spent the previous six years (2012-17) as minor league medical coordinator, overseeing all minor league athletic trainers and rehabilitation with minor league players while assisting the major league club. Joe joined the organization in 2011 as the athletic trainer for Triple-A Durham, following 10 seasons as an athletic trainer in the Orioles system (2001-10), reaching Double-A Bowie during his final four seasons there. He was named the 2015 Minor League Athletic Trainer of the Year by the Professional Baseball Athletic Trainers Society (PBATS) and served as athletic trainer for the World Team at the All-Star Futures Game in San Diego the following year. He graduated from Loyola (Md.) College with a bachelor's degree in biology in 1999, and received his master's degree in kinesiology from Fresno Pacific University in 2010. Joe resides in Sarasota and has one daughter, Isla (10).



MARK VINSON / FIRST ASSISTANT ATHLETIC TRAINER

Mark, 44, begins his 11th season as assistant athletic trainer for the major league club and fourth as first assistant athletic trainer. He enters his 16th season in the Rays organization. Before joining the major league staff, he spent three seasons (2008-10) as the medical athletic training coordinator, overseeing all minor league athletic trainers and rehabilitation with minor league players while assisting the major league club. Prior to serving as athletic trainer for Triple-A Durham in 2007 and Double-A Montgomery in 2006, Mark spent four years (2001-04) as an athletic trainer in the Rangers system. He received a degree in athletic training from Bluefield (Va.) College and earned a master's degree at the University of Virginia in 1999. He has been a certified athletic trainer (ATC) since 1998 through the National Athletic Trainers' Association as well as a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist (CSCS) since 2000. Tyler enters his 13th season in the Rays organization and first as the head home clubhouse and equipment manager. He previously served as home equipment manager for three seasons (2018-20) and umpires' locker room attendant and home clubhouse attendant for eight seasons (2010-17). Tyler first joined the organization as a bat boy during the 2009 season. He graduated from Southern New Hampshire University with a bachelor's degree in sport management and business studies. He and his wife, Regina, reside in Tampa with their son, Caleb (3), and newborn daughter, Vivian.



BRANDON RICHESIN / HEAD VISITING CLUBHOUSE MANAGER

"Tank," 45, begins his 22nd season in the Rays organization and first as visitors' clubhouse manager. Prior to 2021, he served as a visitors' clubhouse attendant upon joining the organization in 2000. He has been selected to work six All-Star Games and the 2013 and 2017 World Baseball Classic. Tank graduated from Florida State University in 1998 with a bachelor's degree in social science and worked four years as a student manager for the Seminoles football team. Tank resides in Gulfport.

DID YOU KNOW?

ALL-STAR BALLOTING

In 2019, Major League Baseball introduced a revamped All-Star balloting process that features two phases of fan voting to determine the starting position players. The top three vote-getters at each position (and top nine outfielders) from the primary phase advance to The Starters Election. Fans then elect nine starters to the AL All-Star Team and eight to the NL squad.

The pitchers and reserves for both All-Star teams—totaling 23 for the AL and 24 for the NL—will be determined through a combination of player balloting and selections made by the Commissioner's Office. The managers of the teams that played in the previous year's World Series then choose the batting orders and starting pitchers.

Also introduced in 2019, should the All-Star Game go to extra innings, both clubs begin the 10th inning—and all subsequent innings—with a runner on second base.

Since the first All-Star Game in 1933, selection of the All-Stars has shifted on several occasions between fans, players, managers and MLB. In 1933-34, selection of the All-Star teams was up to the fans, who could vote for All-Stars through newspaper ads featuring official ballots. From 1935-46, each league's eight managers selected the participants while the All-Star managers chose the starters. Balloting for the starting lineups, tabulated by the Associated Press, returned to the fans from 1947-57. However, a case of ballot-stuffing by Cincinnati fans in 1957 prompted Commissioner Ford Frick to make player selection the privilege of managers, players and coaches from 1958-69.

Commissioner Bowie Kuhn returned voting to the fans in 1970. Since then, All-Star fan balloting has developed into the largest voter participation program in the U.S. outside of state and national elections.

DID YOU KNOW?

THE SAVE RULE / ADOPTED IN 1969

Rule 10.20: Saves for Relief Pitchers

Credit a pitcher with a save when he meets all three of the following conditions:

- [1] He is the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club; and
- [2] He is not the winning pitcher; and
- [3] He qualified under one of the following conditions:
 - (a) He enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitches for at least one inning.
 - (b) He enters the game, regardless of the count, with the potential tying run either on base, or at-bat, or on deck (that is, the potential tying run is either already on base or is one of the first two batsmen he faces); or
 - (c) He pitches effectively for at least three innings.

DID YOU KNOW?

ROBERTO CLEMENTE AWARD

Since 1971, Major League Baseball has annually presented an award that recognizes a player who best exemplifies the game of baseball through sportsmanship, community involvement and positive contributions to his team.


In 1973, following the tragic death of Roberto Clemente, the award was named to honor the man whose spirit and goodwill will always be remembered. The 12-time All-Star and Hall of Famer was killed in a plane crash in 1972 delivering food and medical supplies to earthquake victims of Nicaragua. The award recognizes those individuals who truly understand the value of helping others.

A panel of baseball dignitaries, including Vera Clemente and Commissioner Rob Manfred, annually selects the winner from a list of 30 candidates, one from each major league club. These local winners are announced in September on Roberto Clemente Day. The winner of the national Roberto Clemente Award is announced during a pregame ceremony at the World Series. Past winners include Edgar Martínez, Jamie Moyer, Jim Thome, Derek Jeter, Curt Schilling, Al Leiter, Tony Gwynn, Willie Mays, Ozzie Smith and Cal Ripken Jr. The Rays were represented on the ballot by Charlie Morton in 2020.





40-MAN ROSTER



The Rays used their entire roster in 2020, employing 59 different lineups in 60 games—including the first lineup in modern major league history to feature exclusively left-handed hitters. They had a major-league-leading 18 different players hit a homer and finished among American League leaders with 197 extra-base hits (2nd), 243 walks (2nd) and 48 stolen bases (4th). Entering the 2021 season, the Rays will lean on ALCS MVP Randy Arozarena and All-Stars Brandon Lowe and Austin Meadows.



X-RAY REPORT

- ◆ Willy showed off his culinary skills for Rays fans by teaching Bally Sports Sun reporter Tricia Whitaker how to prepare *tostones* (fried plantains) and salami, one of his favorite snacks, in a virtual edition of Rays All-Access produced while under quarantine last year...he presumably shared them with roommate Manuel Margot.
- ◆ Last spring, Willy often spent his evenings in Port Charlotte reading by the waterfront and enjoying the sunset...he most recently finished *Pedro*, a memoir penned by fellow Dominican and Hall of Fame pitcher Pedro Martínez.
- ◆ While in San Diego for the postseason, Willy was assigned to Fernando Tatis Jr.'s locker...the two also share a nickname, with Willy sometimes known as "The Kid" and Tatis, "El Niño."
- ◆ Willy has trained with 12-time All-Star shortstop Barry Larkin in past offseasons and credits Larkin with helping him find consistency in his game, especially with his glove...he also attributes his defensive strides to his work with Rays third base coach Rodney Linares and a rigorous series of drills they do together.
- ◆ Willy likes to spend time during the offseason in the Dominican visiting the mountains and experiencing nature, especially its rivers and beaches.
- ◆ As a kid, Willy and his friends loved to play down by the river...he would occasionally sneak out of the house at night to go there despite being caught multiple times by his parents.

2020 SEASON

- ◆ Appeared in 54 games and made 51 starts, all at shortstop, in his second full season in the

majors...hit .319/.396/.596 (15-for-47) vs. LHP and .308/.449/.615 (12-for-39) with RISP.

- ◆ Led the team and tied for 9th in the AL with 15 2B...led the majors with 14 2B through Sep 2, but after that only had one in his last 18 games.
- ◆ His 74 SO were most on the team and 5th in the AL...struck out in 33 of 67 AB (49.3 pct.) in his last 18 games, from Sep 4 through season's end.
- ◆ Hit .330 (35-for-106) with 7 HR on the road, compared to .165 (13-for-79) with 1 HR at home.
- ◆ His 9 errors tied for most among AL shortstops.
- ◆ Was the youngest player on the Rays Opening Day roster for a second consecutive year.
- ◆ On Aug 16 at TOR, gave the Rays a 7-5 lead in a 7-inning game with a 2-run homer in the 8th inning, the first extra-inning homer of his career...it was the first scheduled 7-inning game to go to extras in 2020...therefore, he became the first player under the modified rules to hit an extra-inning homer in the 8th or 9th inning.
- ◆ On Aug 30 at MIA, hit a grand slam in the 5th inning, upheld after the Marlins challenged that he passed a runner on the bases...was the second grand slam of his career, following June 4, 2019 at DET...became the second shortstop in club history with multiple grand slams (while playing the position), joining Ben Zobrist (both in 2008).
- ◆ Recorded multiple hits in four consecutive games from Aug 30-Sep 2, the longest such streak of his career...totaled 10 hits in 17 AB.
- ◆ **POSTSEASON:** Started all 20 games at shortstop...hit .136 (8-for-59) with 13 BB, all unintentional...only four players in major league history had more unintentional walks in a single postseason: FLA Gary Sheffield (20) in 1997, LAD



Max Muncy (20) in 2020, BOS Mark Bellhorn (14) in 2004 and SF Barry Bonds (14) in 2002.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Over the 2019-20 seasons, has a .310 avg. (117-for-377) on the road and 22 of his 28 HR (78.6 pct.) have come away from Tropicana Field, highest rate in the majors (min. 20 HR).
- In his age-23 season in 2019, became the youngest Ray to hit 20 HR since Evan Longoria (33) in 2009...all 20 HR came as a shortstop, passing Brad Miller (19) in 2016 for the club record... only two other players as young as Adames hit at least 20 HR while playing shortstop: NYY Gleyber Torres (25) and SD Fernando Tatis Jr. (22).
- His 152 games led the team and his 145 starts at shortstop were 4th-most in the AL behind OAK Marcus Semien (161), BOS Xander Bogaerts (153) and TEX Elvis Andrus (146)...it was the 3rd-most in club history behind Julio Lugo (155) in 2005 and Yunel Escobar (149) in 2013.
- Was errorless in 86 chances over his last 31 games...totaled 12 Defensive Runs Saved, tied with OAK Marcus Semien and LAA Andrelton Simmons for most among AL shortstops.
- Hit .303/.375/.528 (82-for-271) with 15 HR in 77 games on the road and .204/.253/.304 (53-for-260) with 5 HR in 75 games at home.
- His first 9 HR came on the road, becoming the second player in franchise history to hit his first 9 HR of a season on the road, joining Gerald Williams (9) in 2000.
- Hit .329 (53-for-161) with 11 HR out of the No. 9 spot...his 11 HR tied for the major league lead and were a club record, passing Curt Casali (7) in 2015 and Yunel Escobar (7) in 2013.
- At 23 years, 207 days, was the youngest Opening Day starting shortstop in club history, passing Reid Brignac (25.075) in 2011 vs. BAL.
- On June 4 at DET, hit his first career grand slam, off Buck Farmer in the 8th inning...was the fifth grand slam by a shortstop in club history... at 23 years, 275 days, was the youngest Ray to hit a grand slam since Wil Myers (22.194) on June 22, 2013 at NYY.
- On June 11 vs. OAK, recorded the 13th steal of home in franchise history, as part of a double steal with Kevin Kiermaier.
- **POSTSEASON:** Homered in Games 3-4 of the ALDS vs. HOU, the first Ray to homer in back-to-back games in the postseason since B.J. Upton in Games 5-6 of the 2008 ALCS at vs. BOS.
- In Game 4 vs. HOU, threw out José Altuve at home in the top of the 4th inning, then homered to lead off the bottom of the 4th...became the first player in postseason history to throw out a runner at the plate (excluding force-outs) and then lead off the next half inning with a homer...his home run hit the D-ring catwalk, the third time a fair ball struck a catwalk in the postseason.
- In 2018, appeared in 85 games and made 80 starts (72-SS, 8-2B) over three stints with the Rays, his first career major league action...took over as the starting shortstop after Adeiny Hechavarría was designated for assignment on Aug 1...led the team in starts at shortstop.
- Ranked among AL rookie leaders in avg. (.278, 4th), on-base pct. (.348, 3rd), multi-hit games (22, tied for 7th) and walks (31, 7th).
- Named to the Topps Major League All-Rookie Team, the first Rays shortstop to earn the honor.
- Was the second rookie middle infielder in franchise history to hit double-digit homers, following Brendan Harris (12) in 2007.
- Committed a team-high 14 errors...his 13 errors at shortstop tied for 5th-most in the AL.
- Entered August batting just .200 (23-for-115), but from Aug 1 through season's end hit .329/.405/.480 (47-for-173)...ranked 4th in the AL in avg. over that stretch, trailing BOS Mookie Betts (.363), BOS J.D. Martinez (.346) and CLE Michael Brantley (.337), and 1st among AL rookies.
- Made his major league debut on May 22 vs. BOS...at 22 years, 262 days, became the youngest position player to make his major league debut for the Rays since Wil Myers on June 18, 2013 at BOS and youngest infielder since Reid Brignac on July 4, 2008 vs. KC...became the youngest shortstop to homer in his major league debut since CHC Starlin Castro (20.044) in 2010.



- ◆ Nick broke his nose in elementary school after he was tripped by a classmate while running and collided with a brick wall.
- ◆ He didn't play organized football from 9th-11th grade, but suited up as a senior at outside linebacker and kicker...his preferred kicking style was straight-toed and he wore square-toe cleats.
- ◆ As a kid, Nick competed at BMX and keeps the trophies at his dad's house...his love of extreme sports also includes snowmobiling.

2020 SEASON

- ◆ Made 19 apps in his first full season with the Rays...missed 13 games from Aug 20-Sep 3 while on the injured list (right forearm inflammation).
- ◆ Finished with a 0.55 ERA (16.1-IP; 1-ER) and .091 opp avg. (5-for-55), including a .034 opp avg. (1-for-29) against right-handed batters...struck out 26 of his 58 BF (44.8 pct.).

- ◆ Named first team All-MLB, joining OAK Liam Hendriks as the two relievers selected...the teams were selected with voting split between fans and an MLB-appointed panel of experts, including media, former players and executives.

- ◆ Led the Rays bullpen with 6 saves, converting each of his chances...limited opponents to a .061 avg. (2-for-33) in save opportunities.
- ◆ Among pitchers with as many innings (16.1), his 0.55 ERA ranked 6th in the majors while his .091 opp avg. ranked 3rd behind KC Jesse Hahn (.071) and MIL Devin Williams (.090).

- His 110 SO (in 65 IP) tied BOS Matt Barnes for 3rd-most in the majors as a reliever, trailing MIL Josh Hader (138) and OAK Liam Hendriks (122)... his 110 SO in relief was 8th all-time by a rookie—among those above him on the list are ATL Craig Kimbrel (127) in 2011, ATL Steve Bedrosian (114) in 1982 and LAD Pedro Martínez (113) in 1993.



- Chris is a fixture on the St. Petersburg food and coffee scenes...after his return was announced, Chris tweeted, "Joey Brooklyn's, Old Northeast Pizza, Sea Salt, Karma, Bodega, Bandit, Intermzzo, Rollin' Oats, Mother Kombucha, Kahwa, Made Coffee, Rococo and many more... can't wait to be a regular again."
- He saved the voicemail from Manager Kevin Cash welcoming him back to the club and listened to it several times in the days after signing with the Rays "just to remind myself it was real"...Cash's message was excitement for himself and for his son, J.D., who is a big Archer fan.
- Chris created the nonprofit Archway Foundation (archwayfoundation.com) in his hometown of Clayton, N.C., to teach youth that the legacy they leave behind should not be one of fortune or fame, but rather a legacy of generosity, integrity and passion...Archway donates to Raleigh-area nonprofits, and during the holiday season the foundation provides food and gifts to local families in need...he hopes to create a community center one day.
- Along with the Archway Foundation, Chris has partnered with the Players Alliance and Players Coalition...the Players Alliance focuses on growing the game in African-American communities while the Players Coalition uses legislative changes to improve the lives of black and brown people in the United States...Chris also partnered with Goalsetter to promote financial literacy among economically underprivileged young people in south St. Petersburg.
- As a 2-year-old, was adopted by his maternal grandmother and her husband, Donna and Ron Archer...he met his biological father in 2013.

- Chris was cut from his 7th grade baseball team... he decided to attend every one of their home games that season in order to identify the skills he needed to improve and sharpen to make the team in 8th grade.
- When the Rays traveled to Cuba in 2016, Chris had the chance to meet President Barack Obama...the Commander in Chief greeted him, "Hey, Arch," and told him he appreciated his thoughtful interviews about visiting Cuba.

2020 SEASON

- Experienced neck tightness at the beginning of spring training and did not make his Grapefruit League debut until March 6.
- Underwent thoracic outlet surgery on June 2, performed by Dr. Robert Thompson at Washington University in St. Louis...missed the entire season.
- Became a free agent after the Pirates declined his \$11 million option on Oct 31.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Ranks 2nd in Rays history with 1,146 SO behind James Shields (1,250)...ranks 2nd in starts, 3rd in innings pitched and 4th in wins, one shy of tying Scott Kazmir for 3rd...has double-digit strikeouts in 28 starts with the Rays, most in club history.
- In 2019, his 23 starts were his fewest since his rookie season in 2013...missed time from April 27-May 14 with right thumb inflammation...his season ended after a start of 1 IP on Aug 20 vs. WAS due to right shoulder inflammation.
- Served a 5-game suspension in April for intentionally throwing at CIN Derek Dietrich.



- ◆ On June 11 at ATL, yielded 5 HR to tie a Pirates record, including 4 HR in the 2nd inning... marked the first instance of a Pirates pitcher yielding 4 HR in a single frame since data is available (1969)...this was matched by Derek Holland in the 1st inning on Aug 8, 2020 vs. DET.
- ◆ Allowed at least 1 HR in 10 consecutive starts from April 21–June 22, the longest such streak by a Pirate since Josh Fogg (10) in 2002.
- ◆ In **2018**, went 6-8 with a 4.31 ERA (148.1-IP, 71-ER) and 162 SO in 27 starts between the Rays and Pirates...traded on July 31, ending an 8-year run in the Rays organization.
- ◆ Became the first pitcher in Rays history to make four consecutive Opening Day starts (2015-18), and tied James Shields (2008-10, 2012) for the most Opening Day starts in club history.
- ◆ Was on the injured list for the first time in his career from June 3–July 8 (left abdominal strain).
- ◆ On July 22 vs. MIA, recorded 13 SO in the penultimate start of his first stint with the Rays... it was the 2nd-most of his career behind his club-record-tying 15 SO on June 2, 2015 at LAA.
- ◆ On Aug 3 vs. STL, made his Pirates debut and received no decision...on Aug 8 at COL, recorded his first win with the Pirates.
- ◆ Underwent a procedure to repair a bilateral hernia on Nov 27, performed by Dr. William Meyers in Philadelphia.
- ◆ In **2017**, made 34 starts to tie for the major league lead and club record...made the AL All-Star Team, his second career selection, and pitched for Team USA in the World Baseball Classic.
- ◆ Became the second Rays pitcher to make at least 30 starts in four straight years, joining James Shields (6) from 2007-12.
- ◆ Became the third Rays pitcher with at least three straight years of 200 IP, joining James Shields (6) from 2007-12 and David Price (3) from 2010-12.
- ◆ His 249 SO ranked 4th in the majors behind BOS Chris Sale (308), WAS Max Scherzer (268) and CLE Corey Kluber (268)...led the majors for a third straight year in strikeouts on the slider (179).
- ◆ According to the Elias Sports Bureau, became the first pitcher in major league history with three consecutive losing seasons despite recording at least 200 SO each year.
- ◆ Pitched to a 3.26 ERA (106-IP, 38-ER) at home and a 4.97 ERA (96-IP, 53-ER) on the road.
- ◆ On April 2 vs. NYY, made his third consecutive Opening Day start and recorded his first career Opening Day win, 7-3 over Masahiro Tanaka... threw the first pitch of Major League Baseball's 2017 season, the second Ray ever to do that, joining Victor Zambrano (2004 vs. NYY in Tokyo).
- ◆ Recorded 58 SO in May, breaking the club record previously held by David Price (54) in June 2014.
- ◆ On Aug 17 at TOR, recorded the 1,000th strikeout of his career by fanning Ezequiel Carrera in the 4th inning...joined James Shields (1,250) and David Price (1,065) as the only Rays to get there.
- ◆ **WORLD BASEBALL CLASSIC:** Started Team USA's opening game on March 10 vs. Colombia and retired all 12 BF on 41 pitches (30 strikes)... Team USA went on to win, 3-2, in 10 innings...he returned to the Rays after that game, and Team USA went on to win its first WBC championship.
- ◆ **ALL-STAR GAME:** Was added to the AL All-Star Team as one of several replacements, but did not pitch...was his second All-Star selection.
- ◆ In **2016**, led the AL with 19 losses, which tied SD/CWS James Shields for most in the majors...tied CWS Chris Sale for 2nd in the AL with 233 SO, behind DET Justin Verlander (246)...led the AL as late as Sep 16, but was passed by Verlander after the Rays switched to a six-man rotation following the return of Alex Cobb.
- ◆ His 19 losses were a club record, ahead of Tanyon Sturtze (18) in 2002...prior to 2016, no major league pitcher recorded 19 losses since KC Darrell May (19) in 2004...they were the most by a pitcher who was an All-Star the season prior since ATL Phil Niekro (20) in 1979.
- ◆ Ranked among AL leaders in starts (33, tied for 4th), walks (67, 8th) and SO/9 IP ratio (10.42, 2nd).
- ◆ Led the AL with a 2.65 ERA (102-IP, 30-ER) at home despite a 3-10 record...his 2.12 R/9 IP of support at home was the lowest in the majors... his 10 losses set a club record, passing David Price (9) in 2011 and Rolando Arrojo (9) in 1999.
- ◆ On April 3 vs. TOR, his 12 SO set a club record for Opening Day and were the most in the majors on Opening Day since SEA Félix Hernández on April 2, 2007 vs. OAK...became the first pitcher to record at least 12 SO on Opening Day and lose since STL Bob Gibson in 1975 vs. MTL.
- ◆ In **2015**, earned his first All-Star selection and set a club record with 252 SO, which ranked 2nd in the AL behind CWS Chris Sale (274) and 4th in the majors...his 34 starts led the majors.
- ◆ Finished 5th in the AL Cy Young voting with 29 points in the 7-4-3-2-1 voting system.
- ◆ Ranked 6th in the AL with a 3.23 ERA...held opponents to a .220 avg. (4th), .282 OBP (8th) and .331 SLG (3rd).



- ◆ Became the seventh pitcher in the modern era (since 1900) to record 250 SO without posting a winning record...four of the previous six were Hall of Famers: HOU/CAL Nolan Ryan (three times), PHI Steve Carlton in 1983, ATL Phil Niekro in 1977 and CWS Ed Walsh in 1910.
- ◆ Allowed 0 ER in 10 of his 34 starts, a club record and tied with HOU Dallas Keuchel and TEX Yovani Gallardo for most in the AL.
- ◆ Went 9-5 on the road, and his 9 wins tied for 2nd in the AL behind DET/TOR David Price (11)... went 6-0 with a 0.89 ERA (40.2-IP, 4-ER) in his first six road starts, the longest road winning streak to start a season in club history.
- ◆ In *Baseball America's* annual Best Tools survey of major league managers, he was named the AL's No. 3 Pitcher and No. 1 Slider...Keith Law of ESPN.com rated Archer as the No. 1 Slider in the majors, as well as the No. 3 Fastball behind CIN Aroldis Chapman and WAS Max Scherzer.
- ◆ On April 6 vs. BAL, made his first Opening Day start and second Opening Day roster, but lost 6-2 to Chris Tillman...his own throwing error on the first play of the game led to an unearned run.
- ◆ In April, led the AL with 37 SO and ranked 3rd with a 0.84 ERA—a club record for April and the 2nd-lowest of any month in club history behind his own 0.73 ERA in July 2013...compiled streaks of 28.2 IP and a club-record 4 starts without allowing an earned run, April 11-26.
- ◆ From May 27–June 2, became the first Ray to record 12 SO (or more) in back-to-back games—and the second pitcher in the modern era (since 1900) to record at least 12 SO and 0 BB in back-to-back starts, joining 19-year-old Mets rookie Dwight Gooden in 1984...six weeks later, LAD Clayton Kershaw became the third...from May 27–June 7, became the first player in the modern era to record double-digit strikeouts and 0 BB in three consecutive starts, according to the Elias Sports Bureau—but Kershaw has turned the trick twice since then.
- ◆ On June 2 at LAA, his 15 SO tied James Shields' club record from Oct 2, 2012 vs. BAL and set a club mark for strikeouts in a road game.
- ◆ On July 29 vs. DET, lost a duel with Justin Verlander, 2-1, despite the longest individual perfect game bid in Rays history...retired his first 19 BF until an infield single in the 7th inning.
- ◆ On Aug 20 at HOU, pitched his third career shutout, including 11 SO on 98 pitches...became the first AL pitcher to throw a 1-hit shutout with double-digit strikeouts and fewer than 100 pitches since NYY David Cone finished a perfect game on July 18, 1999 vs. MTL.



WILL VRAGOVIC / TAMPA BAY RAYS

- ◆ On Sep 11 vs. BOS, struck out seven consecutive batters to tie the club record.
- ◆ **ALL-STAR GAME:** Selected to the All-Star Game as a result of the Player Balloting, his first career selection...pitched a scoreless 5th inning before allowing a leadoff homer to Andrew McCutchen in the 6th...was the first run allowed by a Rays pitcher in All-Star Game history.
- ◆ In **2014**, led the Rays with 32 starts and 194.2 IP in his first full major league season...his 0.55 HR/9 IP ratio remains a club record.
- ◆ Pitched to a 2.77 ERA (149.1-IP, 46-ER) over his last 24 starts, beginning on May 16.
- ◆ On April 2, the Rays announced an eight-year contract extension for Archer—the first six years (2014-19) guaranteed, plus club options for the 2020 and 2021 seasons...the deal was worth a guaranteed \$25.5 million, with a maximum value of \$43.75 million...it is the longest commitment the Rays have made to a pitcher.
- ◆ In **2013**, saw his first extended action in the majors and finished 3rd in the AL Rookie of the Year balloting behind teammate Wil Myers and BOS/DET José Iglesias...received one first-place vote, five second-place votes and 15 third-place votes for 35 points in the 5-3-1 point system.



- ◆ Min. 100 IP; led AL rookies with a 3.22 ERA, 1.13 WHIP and .226 opp avg. ...ranked 2nd with 128.2 IP and 3rd with 9 wins...achieved this despite not joining the Rays until June 1.
- ◆ Named AL Pitcher of the Month and AL Rookie of the Month for July, going 4-0 with a 0.73 ERA (37-IP, 3-ER) in 5 starts...remains the lowest ERA for a calendar month in franchise history.
- ◆ Went 3-0 with a 1.23 ERA (22-IP, 3-ER) in 3 starts against the Yankees, becoming the first rookie with 3 wins over them in a single season since TEX Kevin Brown (3) in 1989.
- ◆ **POSTSEASON:** Made 2 apps out of the bullpen... in Game 1 of the ALDS at BOS, recorded a pair of strikeouts and did not allow a run in 1.1 IP...in Game 4 at home, entered in the 9th inning and faced one batter, a sac fly by Dustin Pedroia.
- ◆ In **2012**, made 6 apps (4 starts) over two stints with the Rays, his first career major league action...spent the rest of the season with Triple-A Durham, where he was named the Rays Minor League Pitcher of the Year and led the International League with 139 SO.
- ◆ On June 20 at WAS, went 6 IP in his major league debut opposite Stephen Strasburg and took the loss...yielded 3 runs on 3 hits in a 31-pitch 1st inning, but his next 5 IP were scoreless and hitless...his debut snapped the Rays streak of 232 games started by a pitcher they drafted.
- ◆ On Sep 13 at BAL, went 3.2 IP in relief and took the loss as he allowed a walk-off single to Manny Machado in the 14th inning...escaped a bases-loaded, 0-out jam in the 13th, capped by strikeouts of Matt Wieters and Nate McLouth to end the frame...entered the game and struck out as a pinch-hitter in the 11th when Ryan Roberts left after fouling a ball off his foot...became the first pitcher to enter an AL game as a pinch-hitter and remain in the game to pitch since BOS Joel Finch on July 25, 1979 vs. OAK.
- ◆ On Sep 19 vs. BOS, recorded his first career win in his fifth career outing and fourth start.
- ◆ Ranked by *Baseball America* as the No. 2 prospect in the Rays system following the season... the publication also tabbed him as having the Best Slider in the organization for a second consecutive year.
- ◆ Spent most of **2011** with Double-A Montgomery but earned a Aug 26 promotion to Durham, where he made 2 starts to finish the season... went 9-7 with a 4.09 ERA (147.1-IP, 67-ER) in 27 starts between the two levels.
- ◆ Traded from the Cubs to the Rays on Jan 8 in an eight-player deal involving Matt Garza.
- ◆ In **2010**, was named the Cubs Minor League Pitcher of the Year...went 15-3 with a 2.34 ERA (142.1-IP, 37-ER) in 28 apps (27 starts) between Class-A Daytona and Double-A Tennessee.
- ◆ Ranked 3rd among all minor league pitchers in wins, 7th in ERA and 3rd in opp avg. (.200).
- ◆ Recorded a 7-game winning streak, May 8-June 27, before his promotion to Tennessee...did not allow an earned run in his first 31.1 IP at the Double-A level.
- ◆ Ranked by *Baseball America* as the No. 1 prospect in the Cubs system following the season...the publication also tabbed him as having the Best Slider in the organization.
- ◆ Pitched for Team USA's Pan American Qualifying Team in October...on Oct 11, earned a second-round win over top-seeded Cuba... recorded 10 SO in six scoreless innings.
- ◆ In **2009**, totaled 119 SO and did not allow a home run in 109 IP for Class-A Peoria, his first season in the Cubs organization...in **2008**, held opponents to a .050 avg. (3-for-60) with RISP and 2 outs with Class-A Lake County...traded by the Indians to the Cubs in the Mark DeRosa deal following the season...was winless (0-7) in his first 12 professional starts before defeating the GCL Braves on July 27, **2007**.

- Randy achieved folk hero status last October, when he was named ALCS MVP as a rookie and set numerous major league records for a single postseason...one of his secret weapons may be a conspicuous piece of footwear—cowboy boots, from Brent Honeywell Jr.'s wardrobe—which made frequent appearances during his historic postseason run...the “power boots” began their journey into legend while playing in Mexico... Randy would frequently borrow a teammate's pair of boots when his bat needed extra pop, claiming he homered each day he put them on...the result was 14 HR in the Mexican Winter League that season.
- Randy's feet were again the focus as he faced off against teammate Brett Phillips in a pair of dance battles after the Rays clinched the division and later the ALDS...some disagreement exists on who emerged victorious overall, but the general consensus says the series was split 1-1...Randy himself claimed the win in round two, declaring on Instagram, “Today, I took home the crown. I won my rematch.”
- Randy played two years of professional baseball in Cuba, where he earned the nickname *El Cohete Cubano*, or “The Cuban Rocket,” for his lightning speed...he earned \$4 a month during his first season (later \$38) and at age 19 led Pinar del Río in stolen bases...he was left off the roster for the 2015 Caribbean Series out of concern that he would defect...he defected to Mexico later that same year, prompted in part by the passing of his father in 2014.
- Soccer was his first love...his younger brother, Raiko, is a professional goalkeeper who signed with the USL's Tampa Bay Rowdies for the 2021

season after playing three seasons for Mexican clubs, most recently for the *Cafetaleros de Chiapas* (The Coffee Growers)...the two originally began playing the opposite sport and switched paths professionally...Randy's baseball career didn't begin until his soccer coach dropped him off at a baseball practice to help a local team short on players.

- When asked which players he admired growing up, Randy told the media “My favorite player is Randy Arozarena,” after mentioning Yuli Gurriel... when asked for his take on Randy's remarks, Manager Kevin Cash said, “I agree with him.”
- Randy battled a prolonged COVID-19 diagnosis in the early part of the 2020 season which prevented him from participating in baseball activities with the team...to stay fit, he crafted a home fitness regimen of 300 push-ups a day and three square meals of chicken and rice...the result was 15 pounds of added muscle.

2020 SEASON

- Appeared in 23 games and made 17 starts (12-LF, 4-DH, 1-RF) after his Aug 30 recall, when 1B/DH José Martínez was traded to the Cubs...from the date of his recall through season's end, ranked 3rd among AL rookies with 7 HR and 15 runs and tied for 3rd with 4 SB.
- Was on the alternate training site COVID-19 Related IL/Rehab from July 22–Aug 29.
- Hit all 7 HR in September, which led the team and tied for 7th in the AL...fell 4 PA shy of qualifying in September, but his .678 SLG would have ranked 3rd in the AL and his 1.055 OPS would have ranked 4th...also led the team in September with 14 runs and 11 RBI (tied with Nate Lowe).

- ♦ Hit .400 (8-for-20) with 4 HR vs. LHP.
- ♦ Hit 4 HR in his first 16 AB with the Rays and was the first player in club history with 4 HR in his first 16 AB of a season, passing Steven Souza Jr. (3) in 2016, Sean Rodriguez (3) in 2014, Evan Longoria (3) in 2009 and Jorge Cantú (3) in 2005.
- ♦ He also became the first player in franchise history to hit 4 HR in his first 16 career at-bats with the Rays, passing in-season acquisitions Lucas Duda (3) in 2017 and Chris Gomez (3) in 2001.
- ♦ Recorded a pair of multi-HR games, both in a span of 15 games, on Sep 6 vs. MIA and Sep 23 at NYM...became the fastest in club history with a pair of multi-HR games, coming in his 25th and 39th career games...broke the mark previously held by Curt Casali (49th and 50th career games).
- ♦ On Aug 30 at MIA, was recalled from the alternate training site and made his Rays debut as a defensive replacement in left field.
- ♦ On Aug 31 at NYY, made his first start with the Rays and started out of the leadoff spot for the first time in his career...recorded his first hit as a Ray, a 6th-inning single off Nick Nelson, and stole second base with 2 outs in the inning.
- ♦ On Sep 2 at NYY, hit his first homer as a Ray, against Jordan Montgomery in the 1st inning.
- ♦ On Sep 6 vs. MIA, hit solo homers in the 1st and 6th innings for his first career multi-HR game... became the fourth Cuban-born player with a

multi-HR game for the Rays, joining Yandy Díaz, Yunel Escobar and José Canseco (twice).

- ♦ On Sep 23 at NYM, recorded his second multi-HR game, with a go-ahead, 2-run homer off Michael Wacha in the 6th inning and a solo shot off Steven Matz in the 9th.
- ♦ In the season finale on Sep 27 vs. PHI, was originally written into the starting lineup at second base, which would have been his debut in the infield...a late lineup change (sore foot for Manuel Margot) forced him back to the outfield.
- ♦ Ranked by *Baseball America* as the No. 17 overall prospect in the minors following the season... was the No. 2 prospect in the Rays system.

- ♦ **POSTSEASON:** Enjoyed a historic postseason, batting .377/.442/.831 (29-for-77) with 10 HR and 14 RBI in 20 games (all starts) and setting major league records for a single postseason in home runs, hits, extra-base hits (14, tied) and total bases (64)...the previous record was 8 HR by TEX Nelson Cruz in 2011, HOU Carlos Beltrán in 2004 and SF Barry Bonds in 2002.
- ♦ His 10 HR are the most in a Rays postseason career, ahead of Evan Longoria (9).
- ♦ Hit 3 HR in the ALDS, 4 HR in the ALCS and 3 HR in the World Series, tying the major league record for most career postseason series with 3 HR (or more)...joined Babe Ruth, Mickey Mantle, Carlos Beltrán and José Altuve.
- ♦ Recorded five 3-hit games, passing HOU José Altuve in 2017, STL Albert Pujols in 2004, SEA



Edgar Martinez in 1995 and SEA Jay Buhner in 1995 for the most in a single postseason.

- ◆ Homered in Games 1-3 of the ALDS against the Yankees...became the third Ray to homer in three consecutive postseason games, joining Evan Longoria (4) in 2008 and Carlos Peña (3) in 2008.
- ◆ Named Most Valuable Player of the ALCS, the first rookie position player to win MVP of a League Championship Series or World Series...only three other rookies (all pitchers) had been named MVP of a League Championship Series: BAL Mike Boddicker (1983), FLA Liván Hernández (1997) and STL Michael Wacha (2013).
- ◆ In Game 7 vs. HOU, became the first Rays rookie to homer in a "winner take all" game and became the first major league rookie with a go-ahead homer in a Game 7 since FLA Miguel Cabrera in the 2003 NLCS at CHC.



- ♦ Jalen and his family are heavily involved with their local church...he hopes to one day travel on mission trips to places such as Malawi—a land-locked country in eastern Africa.
- ♦ He was college teammates with Colin Poche and bullpen catcher Jean Ramirez at Arkansas.
- ♦ Jalen grew up a diehard Razorback fan and still watches as many of their games as he can...his all-time favorite Razorbacks are Darren McFadden, Felix Jones, Ronnie Brewer and Joe Johnson...Arkansas men's basketball won a national title in 1993, the year he was born, and he often re-watched the game on tape with his dad.
- ♦ He and his wife, Brie, have two children: Breckly (4) and Jack (3).

2020 SEASON

- ♦ Underwent Tommy John surgery on Sep 2, performed by Dr. Keith Meister in Arlington, Texas...returned home to Arkansas to begin his initial phases of rehab.
- ♦ Placed on the 45-day IL on Aug 26...at the time of the injury, his 19.1 IP led major league relievers and his 26 SO ranked 2nd among relievers behind CLE James Karinchak (31).
- ♦ Recorded 4 outs (or more) in nine of his 12 apps and went 2 IP (or more) four times.
- ♦ In his last 10 apps, from July 30-Aug 25, went 1-1 with a 2.51 ERA (14.1-IP, 4-ER).
- ♦ Made his second straight Opening Day roster.
- ♦ On Opening Day vs. TOR, struck out Cavan Biggio and Vladimir Guerrero Jr. in the 7th inning and struck out the side in the 8th...his

5 SO tied his own Opening Day club record among relievers, after doing it in 2019 vs. HOU.

- ♦ On July 27 vs. ATL, his 7 SO tied for the 2nd-most of his career and were one shy of matching his career high...recorded 3 SO in the 6th inning, 2 SO in the 7th and 2 SO in the 8th.
- ♦ On Aug 19 at NYY, inherited 2-on, 1-out in the 9th inning and struck out Miguel Andújar and Thairo Estrada for his second career save.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- ♦ In **2019**, made 33 apps (3 starts) over two stints with the Rays: Opening Day–June 27 and July 16 through season's end...totaled 104.1 IP including 92 IP out of the bullpen, 2nd-most among major league relievers behind TOR Sam Gaviglio (95.2).
- ♦ Went 5-0 with a 2.78 ERA (64.2-IP, 20-ER) in his first 20 apps, from March 28–July 16...this stretch gave him a 10-game winning streak spanning two seasons with the Rays, the longest streak of winning decisions in club history.
- ♦ Became the 12th pitcher since Baseball Reference data is available (1908) to begin his career for a team with 10 consecutive winning decisions...joined a list that includes TOR Roger Clemens (11) in 1997 and LAD Fernando Valenzuela (10) in 1980-81.
- ♦ Went 1-3 with a 6.81 ERA (39.2-IP, 30-ER) over his last 13 apps (3 starts) beginning on July 22.
- ♦ Went 3 IP (or more) in 19 consecutive relief apps from April 18–Aug 31...was also used as a starter three times over that stretch, but went 0-2 with a 10.95 ERA (12.1-IP, 15-ER) in those 3 starts.
- ♦ Allowed 11 HR over his last 16 apps (3 starts) spanning 48.1 IP, compared to 1 HR in his first 17 apps, all in relief, spanning 56 IP.



- Optioned to Triple-A Durham on June 28, the day after an 18-inning win at MIN...in his last 12 apps before the option, was 5-0 with a 2.30 ERA (47-IP, 12-ER), including 8 apps of 1 run (or fewer).
- Made his first career Opening Day roster and pitched in the 5-1 loss vs. HOU, the only reliever used by the club...his 5 SO were the most by a Rays reliever on Opening Day, a record he would tie again in 2020.
- On April 10 at CWS, went 3 IP for his first career save...his only run allowed came on a groundout off the bat of Yonder Alonso in the 9th inning.
- On May 1 at KC (G1), did not allow a run in 6.2 IP, the longest scoreless relief app in the AL since SEA Blake Beavan (6.2 IP) on June 6, 2013 vs. NYY and tied for the 2nd-longest in club history behind Rob Bell (7 IP) on June 19, 2004 at ARI...entered to start the 2nd inning, and retired 12 straight following a hit batter and walk in the 3rd...his only hit allowed was a 7th-inning double to Martin Maldonado.
- On July 22 vs. BOS, made his second career start, first as a Ray, and snapped his club-record 10-game winning streak...his 8 runs allowed tied his Rays debut for a career high.
- On Aug 3 vs. MIA, his 3 HBP were the most by a Rays pitcher in over 13 years, since Casey Fossum (3) on April 7, 2006 at TOR.
- On Aug 25 at BAL, yielded 7 runs on a career-high 11 hits, the most hits allowed by a reliever in franchise history.
- In **2018**, made 2 apps (1 start) for the Red Sox and 12 apps for the Rays, his first career major league action...acquired by the Rays from the Red Sox on July 25 for Nathan Eovaldi.
- Started for the Red Sox in his major league debut on June 7 vs. DET, exactly four years after he was selected in the 12th round of the 2014 Amateur Draft...yielded 6 runs in 4 IP and suffered a 7-2 loss to Matthew Boyd...struck out his first batter faced, JaCoby Jones, but yielded 5 runs in the 1st inning...made a relief appearance for the Red Sox on July 10 vs. TEX, yielding 3 runs in 2.1 IP.
- Served as a long reliever for the Rays, primarily following an opener...went at least 2 IP in all 12 apps, including 9 apps of at least 3 IP, 5 apps of at least 4 IP and 4 apps of at least 5 IP.
- Went 5-0 after the trade, matching Juan Cruz (2011) for most wins by a Rays pitcher in a season without recording a loss.
- Made his Rays debut on July 28 at BAL, totaling 3.1 IP, 10 hits and 8 runs...threw 82 pitches and allowed 13 of 21 BF to reach base safely...was the third pitcher to allow at least 8 runs in his

- Rays debut, following Luis de los Santos (9) on July 20, 2002 at TOR and Juan Guzmán (8) on April 7, 2000 vs. CLE...at the time, the 10 hits tied for most in club history among relievers.

- ◆ Mike is "obsessed" with his dog, Doc, a border collie...he earned the name for being highly intelligent...Mike adopted him at 8 weeks old in 2017 while with Class-A Bowling Green.
- ◆ He grew up a Cubs fan in northwest Indiana, known locally as "The Region"...his godfather was an executive at the *Chicago Tribune*, which owned the team at the time...Mike lived a young fan's dream with gifted seats near the dugout and behind the plate, and the occasional field pass.

- ◆ Was on the active roster for the entire season, appearing in 36 games and making 23 starts (8-3B, 7-1B, 7-2B, 1-LF)...sixteen of his 23 starts came against left-handed starters.



X-RAY REPORT

- While playing part of last year's postseason in San Diego, the Rays were housed in the Padres clubhouse for several weeks...Diego was given former Rays teammate Emilio Pagán's locker, and found Emilio had left him a short note of welcome.
- Diego is the youngest of 10 children...he has six brothers and three sisters.
- He was signed in 2014 at 20 years old...in 2018, *Baseball America* wrote that 54.9 pct. of major league players who were signed as amateurs out of the Dominican Republic or Venezuela were signed at age 16...the majority of international prospects to reach the major leagues were signed by age 18.
- Diego is known to cook for his teammates...he learned to cook as a 10-year-old by watching his mother in the kitchen...he once shared his special family recipe of chicken, rice and plantains in a cooking video on the Rays Twitter account.

2020 SEASON

- Yielded only 4 runs in 22 apps spanning 21.2 IP in his second full season...all but three of his outings were scoreless, including his first 9 apps and last 6 apps.
- All 4 runs allowed were on homers...yielded 2-run homers to NYY Gio Urshela (1 run charged to Trevor Richards) and TOR Lourdes Gurriel Jr. and a solo homer to NYY Clint Frazier.
- Opponents hit .156 (12-for-77) against him, 10th among AL relievers.

X-RAY REPORT

- While on the mound against the Yankees on July 18, 2019, Yonny's 1-2 pitch to ring up Brett Gardner in the 2nd inning sparked Yankees Manager Aaron Boone's "savages" tirade with home plate umpire Brennan Miller...the exchange included Boone pointing toward Yonny, shouting, "That guy is a good pitcher."
- He was never considered a highly-touted international prospect, instead signing with the Rays for \$100,000 when he was 18 years old.
- As a child, Yonny would play a game similar to baseball that replaced the ball and bat with *chapitas*, or bottle caps, and a broomstick.

2020 SEASON

- Underwent Tommy John surgery on Aug 24, performed by Dr. Koco Eaton in St. Petersburg.
- Limited to 3 apps (all starts) due to two stints on the injured list...sidelined from Aug 3-15 due to right triceps inflammation...returned on Aug 16 to start the second game of a doubleheader at TOR, going 2.2 IP...placed on the 10-day IL (torn right UCL) on Aug 19, retroactive to Aug 17, and transferred to the 45-day IL on Aug 22.
- Made his third Opening Day roster and started the club's fifth game of the season.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- In **2019**, ranked 3rd on the Rays staff with 9 wins and 133.1 IP, trailing Charlie Morton and Ryan Yarbrough in both categories.
- Min. 100 IP, ranked among AL leaders in WHIP (1.05, 4th), opp avg. (.225, 8th) and BB/9 IP ratio

(1.89, 7th)...his 0.99 WHIP before the All-Star break was the 2nd-best in club history among qualifiers, behind James Shields (0.98) in 2011.

- In *Baseball America's* annual Best Tools survey of major league managers, coaches and executives, was ranked as having the AL's Best Changeup.
- Reinstated from the 10-day IL (right middle finger inflammation) on Sep 21, missing six weeks...his rehab assignment consisted of four bullpen sessions and two simulated games.
- Went 6-5 with a 3.54 ERA (104.1-IP, 41-ER) in 18 starts, compared to 3-0 with a 4.97 ERA (29-IP, 16-ER) in 8 apps in relief...made 13 straight apps as a starter, May 27-Aug 4, before the injury.
- Was 5-2 with a 3.10 ERA (69.2-IP, 24-ER) in 14 apps (10 starts) at home, yielding 3 ER (or fewer) in all but one outing and 2 ER (or fewer) 10 times.
- Became the third Rays pitcher to start a season with consecutive starts of 5 IP (or more) and 2 hits (or fewer), following Jake Odorizzi in 2015 and Matt Moore in 2013...on March 31 vs. HOU, went 7 IP and his only run allowed was a 3rd-inning homer by Jake Marisnick...went five scoreless in his next start on April 7 at SF.
- On April 17 vs. BAL, became the third pitcher in franchise history to make a scoreless relief app of at least 5 IP and allow 1 hit (or fewer), joining Ryan Yarbrough on May 4, 2018 vs. TOR and Esteban Yan on April 13, 1998 vs. MIN...his only hit allowed was a 2-out double in the 2nd inning.
- On May 27 vs. TOR, his only baserunners allowed in 5 IP were a pair of 2nd-inning walks...was the fourth time in franchise history a pitcher did not allow a hit in a start of 5 IP (or more), joining Blake Snell (5 IP) on Aug 10, 2018,



Nathan Eovaldi (6 IP) on May 30, 2018 at OAK and Matt Garza (9 IP) on July 26, 2010 vs. DET.

- ◆ Made seven consecutive quality starts from June 7–July 12, the longest such streak by a Ray since Jake Faria (7) from June 7–July 14, 2017... went 2-2 with a 2.93 ERA (46-IP, 15-ER) over that stretch, but the Rays went 2-5 in those games.
- ◆ On June 7 at BOS, retired his first 15 BF on 50 pitches, escaped a bases-loaded, 1-out jam in the 6th inning with back-to-back strikeouts and was replaced after eight scoreless and 101 pitches... it was the longest perfect game bid of his career and tied for the longest no-hit bid of his career.
- ◆ His start against the Red Sox was the seventh time in club history a Rays pitcher went eight scoreless at Fenway Park... was the third visiting pitcher since 2010 to allow 2 hits (or fewer) in a scoreless start of 8 IP (or more) at Fenway Park, joining two other Rays: Drew Smyly (8 IP) on April 19, 2016 and Matt Moore (9 IP) on July 22, 2013... was the first rightly to do this since SEA Félix Hernández on April 11, 2007.
- ◆ **POSTSEASON:** Was on the Rays roster for the ALDS against the Astros but did not pitch.
- ◆ In **2018**, made 18 apps (7 starts) over two stints with the Rays, his first career major league action... was on the major league roster from Opening Day–June 3—which included a stint on the 10-day IL—and June 24 through season’s end.
- ◆ Went 5-2 with a 2.83 ERA (57.1-IP, 18-ER) and .233 opp avg. (48-for-206) in 11 apps out of the bullpen and 0-3 with a 4.73 ERA (32.1-IP, 17-ER) and .288 opp avg. (36-for-125) in 7 starts.
- ◆ Was 4-0 with a 2.89 ERA (37.1-IP, 12-ER) over his final 7 apps of the season, all in relief.

- ◆ On April 5 at BOS, became the fifth Ray to go at least 5 IP and not allow a run in his first career start, joining Matt Moore (5 IP) in 2011, Scott Kazmir (5 IP) in 2004, Doug Waechter (9 IP) in 2003 and Jason Standridge (6.1 IP) in 2001... joined Scott Kazmir (6 IP) in 2004 and Steve Trachsel (9 IP) in 2000 as the only Rays with a scoreless outing of at least 5 IP in their first career game at Fenway Park... according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he was the first pitcher to make his first career start at Fenway Park and not allow a run in at least 5 IP since ATL Kyle Davies debuted on May 21, 2005 (5 IP).
- ◆ Placed on the 10-day IL on May 1 with a right forearm strain, retroactive to April 29... was reinstated from the injured list and optioned to Durham on June 4... was on the minor league injured list, June 22–July 7, with right shoulder inflammation.
- ◆ From Aug 4–Sep 15, became the first pitcher since Baseball Reference data is available (1908) to go at least 5 IP in eight consecutive apps, with all of them coming in relief.
- ◆ On Aug 9 vs. BAL, recorded his first career win, entering in the 3rd inning... allowed a 2-out single in the 3rd, then retired 10 straight batters before a 7th-inning homer by Renato Núñez.

- ◆ In **2017**, named Minor League Pitcher of the Year by the Rays Baseball Operations department... spent the majority of the season with Durham, earning a May 2 promotion from Double-A Montgomery... went a combined 13-5 with a 2.73 ERA (168.1-IP, 51-ER) in 27 apps (26 starts).
- ◆ Led Rays minor leaguers in innings... tied for 2nd in wins, one shy of José Mujica (14)... ranked 3rd with 141 SO and 4th in ERA.

- ♦ His 12 wins tied for the most among Rays minor leaguers and his 3.36 ERA ranked 9th.
- ♦ In 2015, went 5-5 with a 1.82 ERA (79.1-IP, 16-ER) in 15 apps (13 starts) between Charlotte, Short-A Hudson Valley and Bowling Green... was unbeaten (3-0) in 14 apps (2 starts) with Rookie-level Princeton in 2014.

X-RAY REPORT

- ◆ Ji-Man was recognized as his hometown of Incheon's citizen of the year for 2020...the award goes annually to the person who best represents the city...Ji-Man donated 20,000 sterile masks to the Incheon community last year.
- ◆ Ji-Man became the first Korean-born position player to appear in a World Series, and his jersey from Game 2 (his first start) is on display in the "Autumn Glory" exhibit at the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum in Cooperstown.
- ◆ He went home to South Korea during the 2020 shutdown, but returned to the U.S. with gifts... Ji-Man had a small batch of personally-branded hand sanitizer to share, with "Overcome COVID-19" and his name and likeness on the label.
- ◆ Ji-Man is terrified of ghosts and believes to have had many encounters with them, including hugs and whispers...his first ghostly encounter in baseball came while recovering from back surgery in 2011, when he felt a "spirit" on his chest and awoke as he felt the bed slump...he had another encounter at the Pfister Hotel in Milwaukee, where a number of major leaguers have claimed to experience the paranormal.
- ◆ Over the winter, Ji-Man visited a youth baseball club in Chungju, South Korea...he worked with them on fundamentals, gave instruction and helped them with soft-toss and drills...he is one of five active major leaguers born in South Korea... his 39 career home runs rank 4th all-time among Korean-born players, behind Shin-Soo Choo (213), Jung Ho Kang (46) and Hee-Seop Choi (40).
- ◆ Ji-Man attracted international attention during the 2020 postseason for his defensive acrobatics, especially his ability to do the splits...he credits

pilates for his flexibility...before Game 4 of the World Series, he joked "a lot of people think I'm a gymnast instead of a baseball player."

- ◆ Rays fans' love for Ji-Man was on display in Game 4 of the 2019 ALDS at Tropicana Field... groups of fans were heard chanting his name in the parking lot and later the entire ballpark joined in the chant during his at-bats...the moment was later commemorated with an officially-licensed T-shirt and Ji-Man used the audio as his walk-up music last year.

2020 SEASON

- ◆ Appeared in 42 games and made 32 starts (31-1B, 1-DH) before suffering a left hamstring strain on Sep 12 vs. BOS, ending his regular season... returned in time for the start of the postseason.
- ◆ Began the season as a switch-hitter but last batted right-handed on Aug 14 at TOR, then abandoned the switch-hitting experiment.
- ◆ Hit .300/.404/.500 (12-for-40) with 5 2B, 1 HR and 6 RBI in his last 13 games (11 starts).
- ◆ Went 5-for-7 with 2 2B, 2 HR and 4 RBI against Gerrit Cole...both his homers as a left-handed batter came off Cole, and was the only player in the majors to homer off him twice...in his career including postseason, is 10-for-21 (.476) with 3 2B, 4 HR, 10 RBI and 5 BB against Cole.
- ◆ Made his fourth Opening Day roster and third straight, but did not start vs. Hyun Jin Ryu.
- ◆ On July 26 vs. TOR, batted right-handed for the first time in his major league career and homered in his second at-bat from that side, coming in the 6th inning off Anthony Kay.



- ♦ Prior to the homer off Kay as a right-handed batter, Choi had hit 36 HR in his career—the most of any player before hitting a home run from the opposite side since Stats LLC data is available (1974)...Choi logged 861 PA as a left-handed batter before his first plate appearance as a right-handed batter—3rd-most of any player since 1974 before “switching sides” behind CHC Javier Báez (2,394 PA as a righty, first hit lefty on Aug 8, 2019 at CIN against a position player pitching) and TEX Geno Petralli (1,898 PA as a lefty, first hit righty on July 24, 1992 at BAL).
- ♦ According to MLB.com’s Sarah Langs, Choi’s 861 PA batting lefty were the most from one side of the plate before hitting a homer from the other side since CLE Hal Trosky in 1935.
- ♦ Is the only Korean-born player to homer from both sides of the plate.
- ♦ After his right-handed homer, reporter Jeff Passan said on *Baseball Tonight*: “Ji-Man Choi is the most interesting man in baseball.”
- ♦ On Aug 31 at NYY, reached base in all 5 PA, tying a career high...recorded 3 hits, including a 2-run homer off Gerrit Cole in the 1st inning.
- ♦ **POSTSEASON:** Hit .250/.412/.425 (10-for-40) with 2 HR and 4 RBI in 18 games (12 starts).
- ♦ Homered off Gerrit Cole in Game 1 of the ALDS vs. NYY in addition to twice in the regular season...was the second player in the modern era (since 1900) to homer in three different games against a pitcher coming off of a 300-SO season, according to Stats LLC...the other was CIN Deron Johnson off LAD Sandy Koufax in 1964.
- ♦ Became the first Korean-born position player to appear in a World Series.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- ♦ In 2019, appeared in 127 games and made 106 starts (92-1B, 14-DH) in his first full season... missed the minimum 10 days on the injured list from July 3-12 due to a left ankle strain.

- ♦ Hit .250 (23-for-92) with RISP, but .314 (16-for-51) with RISP from May 30 through season’s end.
- ♦ Hit 8 HR in his last 26 games (23 starts), compared to 11 HR in his first 101 games (83 starts)... his 19 HR passed his total (17) from his first three seasons combined...his 6 HR in September were his most in a calendar month in his career.
- ♦ Made his first career Opening Day start.

- ♦ On Aug 18 vs. DET, hit a 2-run, walk-off single off Joe Jiménez in the 9th inning, his second career walk-off hit, following Sep 10, 2018 vs. CLE.
- ♦ On Sep 11-12 at TEX, reached base in a franchise-record 10 consecutive plate appearances, going 3-for-3 with 7 BB...this streak was matched by Yandy Diaz from Aug 20-23, 2020... was the second Ray to reach five times (or more) in back-to-back games, joining José Canseco from June 30–July 1, 1999 at BOS.
- ♦ On Sep 11 at TEX, reached base in all 5 PA and recorded the second multi-HR game of his career, following Aug 4, 2016 vs. OAK (with LAA)...hit a game-tying, 3-run homer in the 2nd inning and a solo homer in the 9th...his first homer was the third of his career off a lefty.
- ♦ On Sep 24 vs. NYY, hit a walk-off, solo homer off Cory Gearrin to start the 12th inning, the second walk-off homer of his career.
- ♦ **POSTSEASON:** Grounded out in the 9th inning as a pinch-hitter in the AL Wild Card Game at OAK...started at first base for all 5 games of the ALDS against the Astros and finished with 7 BB in 22 PA...his 7 BB were the most in a Division Series since SF Barry Bonds (8) in 2003.
- ♦ In Game 3 of the ALDS vs. HOU, hit a 3rd-inning solo homer off Zack Greinke.
- ♦ Split the 2018 season between the Brewers and Rays organizations...acquired in mid-June and played 49 games with 45 starts (44-DH, 1-1B) for the Rays...after joining the team, hit .269/.370/.506 (43-for-160) with 8 HR and 27 RBI.



- ♦ Hit a pinch-hit grand slam on June 9 at PHI, his final at-bat with the Brewers...was the sixth pinch-hit grand slam hit by a Brewer since Baseball Reference play-by-play data is complete (1974)...turned a 3-2 deficit to a 6-3 lead.
- ♦ On July 21 vs. MIA, his first home run as a Ray came in the 9th inning off Kyle Barraclough and went 460 feet, according to StatCast...it was the longest by a Ray at home since StatCast started tracking them beginning in 2015.
- ♦ On Sep 7 vs. BAL, hit the second grand slam of his career, in the 6th inning off Ryan Meisinger.
- ♦ On Sep 10 vs. CLE, hit a walk-off, 2-run homer off Brad Hand, giving the Rays a 6-5 win...it was his first career walk-off hit, and it was the 15th homer of his career and first off a left-handed pitcher...his walk-off homer was the third in franchise history by a left-handed hitter off a left-handed pitcher, joining Jake Bauers on June 24, 2018 vs. NYY (Chasen Shreve) and Gabe Gross on June 1, 2008 vs. CWS (Matt Thornton).
- ♦ Was optioned to Triple-A Durham after the trade...recalled on July 10 and made his Rays debut the next day vs. DET, going 2-for-4.
- ♦ Spent the majority of the **2017** season with Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre, aside from a short stint with the Yankees in July.
- ♦ Hit a 2-run homer in his Yankees debut on July 5 vs. TOR and a 2-run homer in his second game, July 7 vs. MIL...became the eighth player since Baseball Reference data is available (1908) to homer in his first 2 games with the Yankees.
- ♦ Was designated for assignment on July 19 and outrighted to Triple-A on July 23.



X-RAY REPORT

- ◆ Yandy was twice caught and arrested while attempting to defect from Cuba, each time jailed for 21 days...on the third attempt, he and friend Leandro Linares waited in tall grass until their motorized raft arrived...they set out at around 2 a.m. and arrived in the Dominican Republic at about 2 p.m. the next day...Yandy reports to have seen sharks swimming alongside the raft.
- ◆ Yandy hasn't seen his family in Cuba since he defected...he calls his mother, Elsa Maria Fernández, who still lives there, almost every day and says she influenced him to play baseball.
- ◆ His father, Jorge, played with inaugural Rays pitcher Rolando Arrojo for Villa Clara in the Cuban National Series and eventually defected to play a brief stint in the minor leagues...Yandy would later play for Villa Clara as well.
- ◆ Four days before homering twice in front of 54,005 fans at the 2019 AL Wild Card Game, Yandy was playing in his first action since fracturing his foot two months earlier...it was in front of an empty stadium in an Instructional League scrimmage...Rays senior advisor Mitch Lukevics was at both games and told the *Tampa Bay Times*, "Just amazing. You could not find two more opposite settings"...when asked by MLB.com about the stress of playing in front of such a large crowd, he responded, "There were people with guns when I played in Cuba."
- ◆ He is a gym rat whose muscles have been featured in *Men's Journal*...he began weightlifting when he was 12 years old.
- ◆ Per the *Tampa Bay Times*, teammate Joey Wendle once saw Yandy swing a bat that had pennies taped around the barrel and "still crush balls as far as I could hit with a regular bat."

2020 SEASON

- ◆ Appeared in 34 games and made 30 starts (22-3B, 6-DH, 2-1B) before suffering a right hamstring strain on Aug 31, ending his regular season...returned in time for the start of the postseason.
- ◆ At the time of his injury, ranked 2nd in the AL with a .428 OBP and 3rd with 23 BB...according to StatCast, his 18 opposite-field hits through Aug 31 tied for most in the majors.
- ◆ Hit .355/.444/.452 (33-for-93) with 3 2B, 2 HR and 11 RBI in August...min. 75 PA, led the AL in on-base pct. and ranked 2nd in avg....this came on the heels of a 2-for-21 start through 7 games.
- ◆ Made 7 starts batting leadoff and reached base safely leading off the 1st inning five times.
- ◆ Hit .325/.460/.425 (13-for-40) with 2 outs.
- ◆ Walked in each of his first 7 games, the longest streak of his career and the longest streak to start a season in club history, passing Gabe Gross (5) in 2009...was the first player in the majors to start a season in this fashion since CIN Jonny Gomes (8) and ATL Jason Heyward (8) in 2011.
- ◆ Reached base safely in his first 22 games, the 2nd-longest streak to start a season in franchise history behind Rocco Baldelli (24) in 2003...hit .301 (22-for-73) with 17 BB during the streak.
- ◆ Went 16 games (15 starts) before his first RBI, the longest stretch by a Ray to start the season since Logan Morrison (28) in 2016.
- ◆ Both homers came in back-to-back games from Aug 20-21 at NYY, vs. TOR...hit 2 HR in a stretch of 3 AB after going 110 AB without one.
- ◆ Made his third Opening Day roster...started at first base after Opening Day starts at third base in 2017 (with CLE) and 2019 (with TB).



- On Aug 24 vs. TOR, snapped a streak of reaching base in a club-record-tying 10 straight plate appearances...matched Ji-Man Choi's streak from Sep 11-12, 2019 at TEX...recorded 6 hits, including 2 HR, and 4 BB over that span.
- On Aug 28 at MIA, hit a go-ahead, RBI single off Brad Boxberger in the 8th inning, the latest in a game he ever delivered a go-ahead hit...the next night, delivered a go-ahead, RBI single in the 6th.

- In **2019**, limited to 79 games due to three stints on the injured list, the third of which cost him over two months...hit 14 HR in 347 PA for the Rays, compared to 1 HR in 299 PA over two seasons with the Indians...became the 11th Cuban-born player in franchise history.
- Sustained a left foot contusion on July 22 vs. BOS, when he fouled a ball off his foot with the Rays trailing 9-4 in the 9th inning...did not return until the final game of the regular season.
- While progressing back from his left foot injury, felt an increase of pain while taking ground balls prior to the game on Aug 7...CT scan results revealed an uncommon hairline fracture of the navicular bone in his left foot.
- Sidelined from May 20-June 1 with a left hand contusion and from June 17-26 with right hamstring discomfort.
- Hit .500 (8-for-16) with 1 2B, 2 HR and 3 BB leading off a game and .337 (28-for-83) with 5 HR and 10 RBI out of the leadoff spot in the order.
- On March 29 vs. HOU, hit his first home run as a Ray, a solo shot in the 6th inning off Gerrit Cole...since StatCast was introduced in 2015, his homer tied for the club's lowest by launch angle (17°), joining Brad Miller on June 17, 2016 vs. SF.
- On April 7 at SF, homered off Drew Pomeranz for the first leadoff homer of his career.
- On May 11 vs. NYY, hit a solo homer off CC Sabathia in the 3rd inning and a 3-run shot off Nestor Cortes Jr. in the 8th for the first multi-HR game of his career...his 4 RBI were a career high.

- On July 2 vs. BAL, pinch-ran and scored in the 6th inning and walked and scored in the 7th... became the second player in franchise history to score multiple runs without an official at-bat, joining Geoff Blum on Aug 29, 2004 at OAK.
- On July 18 at NYY (G1), was the second of back-to-back homers with Austin Meadows to lead off the 1st inning...it was the second time in club history Rays hitters hit back-to-back homers to lead off a game, following June 15, 1998 vs. TOR (Quinton McCracken, Wade Boggs).
- **POSTSEASON:** Started at first base in the AL Wild Card Game at OAK and started the first 3 games of the ALDS against the Astros, one as the designated hitter and two at third base...was replaced in the 3rd inning of Game 3.
- Hit leadoff in the Wild Card Game and homered in the 1st and 3rd innings, becoming the fifth Ray with a multi-HR game in the postseason and the first to do it in a "winner take all" game.
- Was the 10th player in postseason history with a multi-HR effort in a "winner take all" game but only the second out of the leadoff spot, joining BOS Johnny Damon in Game 7 of the 2004 ALCS...became the first leadoff hitter to homer in each of his first 2 AB of a postseason.

- In **2018**, appeared in 39 games and made 26 starts (15-DH, 6-1B, 5-3B) over two stints with the Indians...was on the active roster from June 20-23 and Aug 12 through season's end.
- In his season debut on July 20 at TEX, went 4-for-6 with 2 RBI in an 11-inning win...was the first Indians player with 4 hits in his season debut since David Dellucci in 2009.



- Oliver was enrolled in the United States Naval Academy studying quantitative economics for two years prior to being selected by the Orioles in the 2008 Amateur Draft...he was permitted to withdraw from the Academy to pursue baseball... had he returned as a junior, he would have been obligated to fulfill a five-year commitment of military service following graduation...was the second from the Naval Academy to make the majors, one month after Cardinals reliever Mitch Harris.
- While at the ballpark, Oliver can usually be found working out with headphones on... instead of music, however, he prefers to listen to some of his favorite podcasts.

2020 SEASON

- Limited to 11 apps due to an Aug 9–Sep 14 stint on the injured list for right biceps tendinitis... pitched in six of the club's last 12 games after his reinstatement.
- Pitched to a 3.38 ERA (5.1-IP, 2-ER) in 5 apps before the injury and a 7.94 ERA (5.2-IP, 5-ER) in 6 apps after returning...yielded a 2-run homer in his first outing off the injured list and a second 2-run homer in his fourth app after his return.
- Made his third Opening Day roster, following 2017 with (BAL) and 2018 (with MIL).
- Recorded 2 saves on the season-opening 5-game homestand, the first of a major league record 12 Rays pitchers with one in the shortened season.

- ◆ Voted the club's Outstanding Rookie by the Tampa Bay Chapter of the BBWAA.



X-RAY REPORT

- ◆ ESPN's Jeff Passan reported last year that Tyler would look at photos of Martin Shkreli to make himself angry before starts...Shkreli made news in 2015 when his company, Turing Pharmaceuticals, was found price-gouging medication...he was later sentenced to seven years in prison for securities fraud in 2017... Tyler has found new ways to motivate himself but still holds Shkreli in low regard.
- ◆ Tyler and his older brother, Ted, are close friends but have always been competitive...in an interview from the World Series, Ted told ABC Action News that Tyler would often pout when he lost as a kid and say "I just want Taco Bell"... "So I think that it's poetic justice that he ended up giving Taco Bell to the entire country," Ted said of Tyler allowing a steal by Mookie Betts in Game 1, which triggered the chain's "Steal a Base, Steal a Taco" promotion.
- ◆ He is a huge fan of gangster rap/trap music...he has "No Juice" tattooed on the inside of his lip—a nod to rapper Boosie that he got as an inside joke with former Pirates roommate Rodarrick Jones.
- ◆ He is a bit of an adrenaline junkie with experiences like a 55-foot cliff jump in Hawaii and bungee jumping in Thailand under his belt... he hopes to pursue skydiving once his baseball career is finished.
- ◆ Tyler implements a regular meditation regimen twice daily...he sits in a quiet room and focuses on his breathing in an effort to center his mind and keep things simple.
- ◆ Tyler won a silver medal in the high jump at the USATF Junior Olympics held in Miami in 2003... he and the winner recorded the same jump height (1.4m) but his opponent received the

tiebreaker...Ted also competed and took bronze in his age group...Tyler is still able to execute a standing backflip.

- ◆ Tyler is 6'8" and wears a size 16 shoe...his Players' Weekend nicknames have stayed true to that theme, opting for "Mini Horse" in 2018 and "Baby Giraffe" in 2019...he grew 11 inches between his freshman and senior years in high school and separated a growth plate in his right shoulder in the process...he was not in his high school rotation until midway through his junior season.
- ◆ As a young teen, Tyler once threw water balloons at cars from the top of a Subway restaurant...he was disappointed to learn one of the balloons burst on the local police chief's wife's windshield.
- ◆ Everything Tyler owns essentially fits in one suitcase...he doesn't like to stay in the same place for long and enjoys staying on the move.
- ◆ He was voted "funniest" by his classmates in his senior class superlatives.
- ◆ He spent four years in the Scouts.
- ◆ His mother, Donna, was a gymnast at Cal State Fullerton, then coached Cal State Northridge to a Division II national championship in 1982.
- ◆ Graduated from William S. Hart (Calif.) High School, which produced former Rays pitcher James Shields, though Tyler has never met him... Trevor Bauer, Mike Montgomery, Pat Valaika and Bob Walk also graduated from there.

2020 SEASON

- ◆ In his second full season with the Rays, led the team with 57.1 IP and 91 SO and tied for 2nd with 5 wins behind Pete Fairbanks (6).
- ◆ Went 5-0 with a 3.00 ERA (42-IP; 14-ER) and 64 SO in his last 7 starts beginning on Aug 19...this



stretch lowered his season ERA from 7.04 to 4.08...all 5 wins came over his last 6 starts.

- ◆ His active 5-game winning streak is his longest since winning a career-high six consecutive decisions from March 30–May 3, 2019.
- ◆ His 91 SO were 4th in the AL behind CLE Shane Bieber (122), CWS Lucas Giolito (97) and NYY Gerrit Cole (94)...min. 50 IP, his 14.28 SO/9 IP ratio led the majors and was the 2nd-highest in club history behind Brad Boxberger (14.47) in 2014.
- ◆ According to the Elias Sports Bureau, his 81 SO through his first 50 IP of the season were the 2nd-most by a starting pitcher in major league history behind CLE Shane Bieber (82) in 2020.
- ◆ Ended the season with 7 SO (or more) in eight straight starts, the longest such streak in club history...passed David Price (June 24–July 30, 2012) and Scott Kazmir (July 24–Aug 25, 2007).
- ◆ Hasn't lost on the road since Sep 22, 2018 at TOR, going 7-0 with a 1.96 ERA (64.1-IP, 14-ER) in 12 starts since then...min. 10 starts, is the only pitcher in the majors that did not suffer a road loss during the 2019-20 seasons.
- ◆ Limited batters to a .120 avg. (10-for-83) in at-bats ending with the curveball, 5th in the majors (min. 25 AB)...recorded 48 SO on a swing-and-miss against his curveball, most in the majors...totaled 58 SO with the pitch, 2nd in the majors behind HOU Framber Valdez (60)...his avg. spin rate of 2,938 rpm on his curveball was 8th-highest in the majors (min. 100 curveballs thrown).

- ◆ His avg. fastball velocity, according to Fan-Graphs, was 97.0 mph, 2nd in the AL (min. 50 IP) behind CWS Dylan Cease (97.5)...reached 100 mph three times, including a career-high 100.9 mph on Sep 18 at BAL...it was the fastest pitch for a Rays non-opener starting pitcher since pitch velocities are available (2008), passing Edwin Jackson (100.5) on Sep 8, 2008 at BOS.
- ◆ Got 73 swings-and-misses against his fastball, 7th in the majors and 4th in the AL.
- ◆ Made his fourth straight Opening Day roster.
- ◆ On Aug 25 vs. BAL, recorded a career-high 13 SO, the most by a Rays pitcher since Blake Snell (13) on April 2, 2019 vs. COL...recorded a career-high 24 swings-and-misses, the most by a Rays pitcher since Snell (25) on July 21, 2019 vs. CWS—

and Snell (five times) is the only Ray with more swings-and-misses in a game in the pitch-tracking era (2008)...retired his last 11 BF including nine of his last 10 BF on strikeouts.

- ◆ On Aug 31 at NYY, went six scoreless innings and his first hit allowed was an infield single to DJ LeMahieu with 1 out in the 6th inning.
- ◆ **POSTSEASON:** Went 2-3 with a 6.28 ERA (28.2-IP, 20-ER) in 6 starts...the Rays won his first 3 starts and lost the last three...yielded 9 HR, a major league record for a single postseason...the previous mark was 8 HR by HOU Justin Verlander in 2019 and LAD Clayton Kershaw in 2017.
- ◆ In Game 2 of the Wild Card Series vs. TOR, his only runs allowed in 6 IP were a pair of solo homers to Danny Jansen.
- ◆ In Game 2 of the ALDS vs. NYY, recorded a Rays postseason-record 10 SO...allowed a Giancarlo Stanton solo homer to lead off the 2nd inning and a 3-run homer to Stanton in the 4th.
- ◆ For the second consecutive postseason, started a decisive Game 5 of the ALDS opposite Gerrit Cole...according to Stats LLC, it marked the second time two starting pitchers matched up in two different "winner take all" games...they joined MIL Lew Burdette and NYY Don Larsen, who faced each other in Game 7 of the 1957 World Series and in Game 7 of the 1958 World Series...started on 2 days' rest after throwing 93 pitches in 5 IP of Game 2...became the first pitcher in Rays postseason history to start 2 games on fewer than 4 days' rest in between...faced the Yankees once through the batting order and did not allow a run or hit, but walked two and got 2 outs on 3-0 pitches.
- ◆ Suffered the loss in Game 4 of the ALCS at HOU and Games 1 and 5 of the World Series against the Dodgers...pitched to a 8.22 ERA (15.1-IP, 14-ER) and yielded 5 HR in those 3 starts.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- ◆ Since March 30, 2019, the Rays are 19-4 in his last 23 starts in the regular season...they went 9-2 in his 11 starts in 2020, including wins in his last eight starts to finish the season.
- ◆ In **2019**, was one of the best pitchers in the majors before suffering a right forearm strain in mid-May...at the time of his stint on the injured list, ranked among AL leaders (min. 40 IP) in ERA (1.86, 1st), WHIP (0.91, 2nd), BB/9 IP ratio (1.68, 3rd) and SO/BB ratio (6.11, 3rd).
- ◆ Reinstated from the 60-day IL on Sep 8, with a 1.46 ERA (12.1-IP, 2-ER) in 4 starts after that.

- His avg. fastball velocity was 97.0 mph, according to FanGraphs...his max velocity, according to StatCast, was 100.4 mph in his season debut.
- Went 6-0 with a 1.47 ERA (43-IP, 7-ER) and 46 SO through his first 7 starts...according to Stats LLC, was the second AL pitcher since ERA became an official stat in 1913 to go 6-0 (or better) with a sub-1.50 ERA and 45 SO (or more) over his first 7 starts, joining BOS Roger Clemens in 1991.
- Yielded 2 runs (or fewer) in his first 7 starts and became the first pitcher in club history to start the season with seven consecutive starts of 5 IP (or more) and 2 runs (or fewer)...the previous record was held by Matt Moore (5) in 2013.
- Named AL Pitcher of the Month for April, though the winners were based on stats covering both March and April...it marked the third straight month a Rays pitcher won it, following Blake Snell in August and September 2018, during his Cy Young Award-winning campaign...the Rays became the first team to claim three in a row since MIN Johan Santana won it in July, August and September 2004...joined Matt Moore in 2013 as the only pitchers in club history with 5 wins before the end of April...yielded 1 run in 5 IP in his only start in March, and went 4-0 with a 1.74 ERA (31-IP, 6-ER) in 5 starts in April...min. 25 IP; it was the 3rd-lowest April ERA in club history behind Chris Archer (0.84) in 2015 and Moore (1.13) in 2013.
- On May 3 at BAL, went 7 IP to match a career high and made the longest scoreless start of his career...retired his first 11 BF before a Dwight Smith Jr. 2-out single in the 4th inning...faced two batters over the minimum in 7 IP.
- On May 10 vs. NYY, was replaced after 5.1 IP with right forearm tightness.
- **POSTSEASON:** Took the loss in both starts...in his postseason debut in Game 1 of the ALDS at HOU, his only runs allowed in 4.1 IP came on a 2-run homer by José Altuve, his last batter faced, to break a scoreless tie...in the decisive Game 5 at HOU, yielded 4 runs on 5 hits in the 1st inning.

- On Sep 17 at TEX, recorded his first win with the Rays...went 6 IP and did not allow a hit until Isiah Kiner-Falefa singled with 2 outs in the 5th inning...both hits allowed were infield singles.
- Began the **2017** season in the majors, his first career Opening Day roster...was with the Pirates for two stints, spending three months with Triple-A Indianapolis in between.
- On May 2 at CIN, all 3 runs allowed came within his first 3 BF, going 6 IP for his first career win...hit a 2-run single in the 4th inning and worked a bases-loaded walk in the 7th.
- Optioned to Indianapolis on June 10 and remained there through the series loss to Durham in the International League postseason...from June 15—the date of his first start with Indianapolis—through the end of the season, led all of minor league baseball with 140 SO.



X-RAY REPORT

- Rich ended the 2020 season as baseball's oldest active pitcher, and 2nd-oldest player behind LAA Albert Pujols...if he appears in a game for the Rays on May 24 or later, he would become the oldest player in franchise history...that distinction is currently held by Wade Boggs, who appeared in his last game at 41 years, 73 days...Boggs also is the oldest Ray to appear as a pitcher (41 years, 56 days), but Hill will become the oldest true pitcher in Rays history when he debuts, passing Brian Shouse (41 years, 5 days) in 2009.
- Rich said of his stint in independent ball in 2015: "I'm not 100 percent sure when I'll retire...I'll probably be pitching until I'm 70, like Bill Lee"... he was released by the Nationals in June 2015 but had no intention of retiring...he ditched his sidearm delivery and asked a Red Sox executive to watch him throw at his former high school in Massachusetts...he warmed up with his nephew's American Legion team and impressed the Red Sox, who ended up signing him to a minor league deal after two dominant starts for the independent Long Island Ducks...the bobbleheads from his short stint in the independent league sell for between \$50-60 on eBay.
- Rich and his wife, Caitlin, married in 2007 and their first son, Brice, was born in 2011...their second son, Brooks, was born the day after Christmas in 2013 but passed away as an infant due to a rare set of brain disorders and kidney failure...Rich and Caitlin intend to set up scholarships in Brooks' name in the future.
- Rich is the youngest of five children and was born 14 years after his next-youngest sibling...in elementary school, he responded to a question on what he wanted to be growing up with "Major League Baseball player"...he learned the

curveball grip from his brother, Lloyd Jr., who pitched for Division III Colby College.

2020 SEASON

- Opened the season in the Twins starting rotation as a result of the delayed season from the COVID-19 pandemic...entered spring training recovering from left elbow surgery that repaired a partial tear of the ulnar collateral ligament.
- Allowed 2 runs (or fewer) in seven of 8 starts, including his last six...pitched to a 2.38 ERA (22.2-IP, 6-ER) in his final 4 starts.
- Missed time from July 31-Aug 18 while on the 10-day IL for left shoulder inflammation.
- Started the Twins fifth game of the season, pitching five scoreless innings and recording the win on July 29 vs. STL...at 40 years, 140 days, became the oldest lefty to start and win a game for the Twins since Terry Mulholland (41.187) in 2004.
- Became the second 40-year-old in club history to allow 2 hits (or fewer) in a start of at least five shutout innings...joined Johnny Niggeling (40.074), who did so for the Washington Senators on Sep 22, 1943 vs. STL-AL (G1).

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Since signing with the Red Sox as a 35-year-old following a stint in independent ball in 2015, is 43-22 with a 2.92 ERA (505-IP, 164-ER) and 584 SO in 95 apps (94 starts) in the majors.
- Since 2016, ranks among major league leaders (min. 400 IP) in ERA (3.01, 8th), WHIP (1.09, 9th) and opp avg. (.208, 4th).
- Holds a 3.06 ERA (53-IP, 18-ER) over 13 career postseason apps (12 starts).



- In **2019**, made 13 starts in an injury-riddled season for the Dodgers...missed spring training and almost all of April with a left knee injury...was on the 60-day IL from June 20–Sep 11 with a left forearm strain.
- Named the Tony Conigliaro Award winner by the Boston Chapter of the BBWAA...the award is named for the former Red Sox outfielder and presented annually to the major league player who best overcomes a major, often life-altering obstacle and continues to thrive through the adversity.
- **POSTSEASON:** Started Game 4 of the NLDS at WAS and did not factor in the decision...yielded 1 run on 2 hits and 4 BB in 2.2 IP.
- Underwent October surgery on his left elbow to repair a partial tear of the ulnar collateral ligament, performed by Dr. Jeffrey Dugas in Birmingham, Ala.
- Signed with the Twins on Dec 31.
- In **2018**, led the Dodgers with 11 wins despite two stints on the injured list (blister).
- After returning on June 19 from his second stint on the 10-day IL, went 10-3 with a 3.08 ERA (108-IP, 37-ER) in 19 apps (18 starts).
- **POSTSEASON:** Made 4 apps (3 starts) and helped the Dodgers win the NL pennant...went 0-0 with a 2.16 ERA (16.2-IP, 4-ER) and yielded 2 runs (or fewer) in all 3 starts...allowed 1 run in 6.1 IP in Game 4 of the World Series vs. BOS.
- In **2017**, recorded a career-high-tying 12 wins and his 166 SO were his most since 2007 (183).
- Was on the 10-day IL twice for a blister on his left middle finger.
- Named NL Pitcher of the Month for July, going 4-0 with a 1.45 ERA (31-IP, 5-ER) in 5 starts...had a career-high-tying 11 SO on July 1 at SD.
- On Aug 23 at PIT, his perfect game bid was lost on a fielding error by 3B Logan Forsythe to lead off the 9th inning...took a no-hitter into the 10th of a 0-0 game and lost it on a walk-off homer by Josh Harrison, his first batter faced in the frame...it marked the first time in major league history a walk-off home run broke up a no-hitter, according to the Elias Sports Bureau...became the first pitcher to lose a no-hit bid in the 10th inning (or later) since MTL Pedro Martínez took a perfect game into the 10th on June 3, 1995 at SD and was replaced after a leadoff double.
- **POSTSEASON:** Made 4 starts for the NL champions and went 0-0 with a 2.55 ERA (17.2-IP, 5-ER)...started twice in the World Series, with the Dodgers losing Game 2 but winning Game 6 to avoid elimination.
- In **2016**, recorded a career-high 12 wins between the Athletics and Dodgers...between the two organizations, ranked 2nd among major league pitchers (min. 100 IP) with a 2.12 ERA, behind LAD Clayton Kershaw (1.69).
- On April 4 vs. CWS, made his first career Opening Day start...yielded 4 runs (2 ER) in 2.2 IP, with all 4 runs coming in the 3rd inning...marked the Athletics shortest Opening Day start since Barry Zito (1.1 IP) in 2006.
- Named AL Pitcher of the Month for May, going 5-1 with a 2.13 ERA (38-IP, 9-ER) in 6 starts.
- Was on the injured list twice, missing all of June with a left groin strain and July 20–Aug 23 with a blister on his left middle finger...traded to the Dodgers while on the 15-day IL on Aug 1.
- At the time of the trade, led the AL (min. 75 IP) with a 2.25 ERA and 0.24 HR/9 IP ratio and ranked 2nd with a .201 opp avg.
- Won a career-high nine consecutive decisions spanning 11 starts from May 7–Sep 10.
- On Sep 10 at MIA, made his third start after returning from the blister issue and was replaced after seven perfect innings and 89 pitches...marked the first time in the modern era (since 1900) a pitcher was replaced with a perfect game bid of 7 IP (or more) still in tact.

- Began the **2015** season in the Nationals organization and ended it with the Red Sox, playing for the Long Island Ducks in the independent Atlantic League in between.

High School, but did not sign.

- Of undergoing his fourth elbow surgery this offseason, Brent tweeted: "I'm a baller. And have had way worse. I'm feeling good. I owe it to the game of baseball to keep pushing."
- Although not on the active roster, he may have contributed to the 2020 postseason in a major way...Randy Arozarena wore Brent's boots for good luck during his historic October run.

- ◆ Kevin and his wife, Marisa, are expecting their second child in March, a sibling for Karter (2).
- ◆ For the second straight year, Kevin received the Paul C. Smith Champion Award last season—given to the club's most exemplary professional... he joined John Flaherty as the only Rays to be recognized with the honor by the Tampa Bay Chapter of the BBWAA in back-to-back years.
- ◆ He set a personal best when he hauled in a 43-pound buffalo carp at 2 a.m. while bowfishing in Wisconsin in 2019...he made the catch from his custom boat, christened "Outlaw Bowfishing" or "The OB" for short...his previous best was 38 pounds from the year before.
- ◆ Kevin works closely with the Children's Dream Fund—a foundation based in St. Petersburg that makes dreams come true for children with life-threatening illnesses...Kevin donated \$25,000 to sponsor six children, known as "Kiermaier's Kids," whose experiences included trips to Disney World, a Queen concert and working on cars...he was also the 2019 Rays nominee for the Roberto Clemente Award and allocated the associated charitable gift to the Ronald McDonald House in St. Petersburg.
- ◆ Kevin works out with the University of Tampa baseball program during a typical offseason...to show his gratitude, he donates gloves, bats and cleats, and treats the team to several steak dinners each year...Rays first base coach and UT product Ozzie Timmons also works with the program over the winter, giving outfield, base-running and hitting instruction.
- ◆ His older brother, Dan, was promoted to head groundskeeper for the Cubs ahead of the 2020 season...he's been with the Cubs since 2016...

Kevin was disappointed that changes to the 2020 schedule prevented him from tearing up his brother's turf.

- ◆ Kevin maintains his claim as "Tampa's most dedicated Purdue fan" ...after two All-American seasons in junior college, he originally signed a letter of intent to play for the Boilermakers before signing with the Rays.

2020 SEASON

- ◆ Tied for 3rd among major league outfielders with 10 Defensive Runs Saved, behind TEX Joey Gallo (13) and MIN Byron Buxton (11).
- ◆ His six outfield assists tied for 3rd in the majors and were one shy of the major league leaders, TOR Teoscar Hernández and BOS Alex Verdugo.
- ◆ Avoided the IL for the first time since 2015.
- ◆ Was one of four players in the majors with multiple walk-off hits, joining CHC Javier Báez, CLE César Hernández and CIN Joey Votto...both came in a span of 22 games (20 starts), compared to one in his first 682 career games (622 starts).
- ◆ Both walk-off hits were against the Blue Jays, becoming the fifth player in franchise history with two walk-off hits against the same team in a single season...joined José Lobaton (2013 vs. TOR), Johnny Damon (2011 vs. MIN), B.J. Upton (2007 vs. TOR) and Travis Lee (2003 vs. BAL).
- ◆ Homered in three straight games from Aug 30–Sep 1 at MIA/NYY, his only 3 HR in the regular season...it was the fourth time in his career he homered in three straight games, first since Sep 12-15, 2017 vs. NYY/BOS...this came on the heels of opening the season without a homer in 85 AB.
- ◆ Hit .270 (20-for-74) with 3 HR on the road, compared to .156 (10-for-64) with 0 HR at home.



- ◆ Made his sixth straight Opening Day roster, all starts in center field...with his sixth Opening Day start, tied for 3rd in club history behind Evan Longoria (9) and Carl Crawford (8).
- ◆ On July 26 vs. TOR, snapped a 0-for-11 skid to start the season with a walk-off, 2-run triple in the 10th inning off Shun Yamaguchi.
- ◆ On Aug 22 vs. TOR, delivered a walk-off single in the 10th inning off Anthony Bass for a 5-4 win.

- ◆ Since the start of his first full season in the majors (2015), his 121 Defensive Runs Saved lead major league outfielders and are the 2nd-most in the majors behind Andrelton Simmons (123).
- ◆ Despite only 729 career games at the major league level, his 135 Defensive Runs Saved already rank 7th since the metric was introduced by Baseball Info Solutions in 2003.
- ◆ Is one of eight players to win a Gold Glove after being drafted in the 30th round or later and the sixth to win it at least three times.
- ◆ Leads the AL with 44 3B since 2014, and ranks 3rd in the majors since then behind Dee Strange-Gordon (49) and Charlie Blackmon (46)...ranks 2nd in Rays history behind Carl Crawford (105).
- ◆ In **2019**, claimed the Rawlings AL Gold Glove Award for center field...won the award over finalists BOS Jackie Bradley Jr. and LAA Mike Trout...marked his third Gold Glove Award, tying Evan Longoria for the most in club history.
- ◆ Became the third center fielder to win three (or more) Gold Glove Awards since Rawlings began awarding them to individual outfield positions in 2011, joining Adam Jones (2012-14) and Ender Inciarte (2016-18).
- ◆ His 13 Defensive Runs Saved were the most among AL center fielders, ahead of MIN Byron Buxton (10) and CLE Oscar Mercado (10).
- ◆ In *Baseball America's* Best Tools survey of major league managers, coaches and executives, was ranked as the AL's 2nd-best Defensive Outfielder behind MIN Byron Buxton and 2nd-best Outfield Arm behind OAK Ramon Laureano.
- ◆ Was on the 10-day IL (thumb) from July 21-30, his fourth consecutive year with an injury, though his 129 games were his most since 2015.
- ◆ Hit 14 HR, one shy of tying his career high, and tied for 8th in the majors with 7 3B.
- ◆ On May 23 at CLE, hit an inside-the-park, 3-run homer in the 6th inning...was the second inside-the-park homer of his career, following May 31, 2014 at BOS (off Alex Wilson).

- ◆ In **2018**, missed significant time for a third consecutive season...missed 57 games from April 16–June 18 with a torn ligament in his right thumb.
- ◆ Despite the missed time, ranked 3rd in the AL with 9 3B, one shy of teammate Mallek Smith and CWS Yolmer Sánchez.
- ◆ Won his second Wilson Defensive Player of the Year Award in center field (2016)...despite his missed time, his 13 Defensive Runs Saved in center field tied for 3rd in the majors to MIL Lorenzo Cain (18) and ATL Ender Inciarte (17).
- ◆ On the first pitch on Opening Day vs. BOS, caught a fly ball in left-center to rob Mookie Betts...covered 129 feet in 6.3 seconds, according to StatCast, and was awarded a 5-Star Catch... was given a 6 pct. catch probability.
- ◆ On June 25 vs. WAS, hit the second grand slam of his career, off Gio Gonzalez...was the first time a Rays lefty hit a grand slam off a left-handed pitcher since Matt Joyce on May 25, 2012 at BOS...it was the fourth time in club history the Rays got a grand slam from a leadoff hitter.
- ◆ In **2017**, established a career high in home runs for a third consecutive year.
- ◆ Appeared in 98 games with 95 starts, all in center field...was on the injured list from June 9–Aug 17 with a right hip fracture, missing 61 games.
- ◆ After being reinstated from the 60-day IL, hit .306/.352/.517 (45-for-147) with 5 2B, 1 3B, 8 HR and 19 RBI in 36 games (35 starts).
- ◆ Ranked 2nd among major league center fielders with 22 Defensive Runs Saved.
- ◆ Despite his 22 DRS, his 6 errors ranked 3rd among major league center fielders...all six came from April 26–June 8, matching his total from his previous 235 games...three of his errors led to "little league home runs"...made 3 errors in the 4-game series from May 8-11 vs. KC.
- ◆ On March 20, signed a six-year contract with a club option for 2023...the deal was worth a guaranteed \$53.5 million and could raise to \$66.15 million with the option and incentives.

- ◆ On April 19 vs. DET, his 4 runs were a career high and the most by a Ray since Wil Myers exactly three years prior—on April 19, 2014 vs. NYY.
- ◆ On May 31 at TEX, his 9th-inning homer was the sixth time in club history there was a game-tying homer with 2 outs in the 9th inning, first since Dan Johnson on Sep 28, 2011 vs. NYY ("Game 162").
- ◆ On Sep 15 vs. BOS, made a diving catch in the 9th inning and leaping catch in the 10th, robbing



Jackie Bradley Jr. and Mookie Betts of extra-base hits...homered in the 14th, the third time in club history there was a game-tying homer in extras and the latest in a game the Rays ever got one.

- ◆ In **2016**, claimed the Rawlings AL Gold Glove Award for center field for a second straight year...won the award over finalists TOR Kevin Pillar and BOS Jackie Bradley Jr.
- ◆ Joined SEA Ichiro Suzuki (2001-02) as the only AL outfielders to win a Gold Glove in each of their first two full seasons in the majors, dating back to when the awards were first presented in 1957.
- ◆ Won the Wilson Defensive Player of the Year Award in center field.
- ◆ His 25 Defensive Runs Saved led major league center fielders and ranked 2nd among all players behind BOS Mookie Betts (30).
- ◆ Established career highs with 21 SB and 40 BB despite missing 48 games with a left hand fracture...his 12 HR were a career high at the time.
- ◆ Returned from the injured list for the club's first game after the All-Star break...in the second half, his 7 outfield assists tied HOU Jake Marisnick for most among AL center fielders.
- ◆ On May 21 at DET, sustained two fractures in his left hand while diving for James McCann's single in the 5th inning...underwent surgery on May 24, performed by Dr. Doug Carlan in St. Petersburg...played a pair of rehab games for Class-A Charlotte and was reinstated from the injured list on July 15 vs. BAL.
- ◆ Compiled a career-long 13-game hitting streak from Aug 27-Sep 9, batting .407 (22-for-54).

- ◆ On Sep 16 at BAL, robbed Hyun Soo Kim of a potential grand slam in the 7th inning as the ball deflected off his glove and fell to the warning track for a RBI single.
- ◆ In **2015**, claimed his first Rawlings Gold Glove Award...won the award over finalists TOR Kevin Pillar and LAA Mike Trout...was later announced as the Rawlings AL Platinum Glove Award winner as the best defender at any position.
- ◆ Named Defensive Player of the Year in the Esurance MLB Awards.
- ◆ Led all major league players with 38 Defensive Runs Saved—the highest mark since 2003, when Baseball Info Solutions started tracking it.

- ◆ Led major league center fielders with 15 outfield assists, one shy of the club record for a center fielder (B.J. Upton in 2008).
- ◆ Ranked 3rd in the AL with 7.4 Wins Above Replacement, trailing only LAA Mike Trout (9.4) and TOR Josh Donaldson (8.8).
- ◆ On April 24 vs. TOR, circled the bases on an error by Steve Tolleson...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he was the first player in club history to score on a four-base error and the first to do it in the majors since NYM Jason Bay on April 21, 2011 vs. HOU.
- ◆ On Aug 31 at BAL, robbed Manny Machado of a leadoff homer in the 1st inning...just two weeks earlier, on Aug 14 at TEX, he robbed Prince Fielder of a potential home run.
- ◆ Recorded his first walk-off RBI on Sep 20 vs. BAL, when he delivered an infield single in the 9th inning off Zack Britton.
- ◆ For the second straight year, was the Rays recipient of the MLB Alumni Association's Heart and Hustle Award...the award honors active players who demonstrate a passion for the game of baseball and best embody the values, spirit and tradition of the game...it is also the only award in MLB that is voted on by former players.
- ◆ Appeared in 108 games in **2014**, including 89 starts (57-RF, 32-CF)...min. 100 games, his .450 SLG and .765 OPS both led the team...began the season with Triple-A Durham and had two brief stints in the majors (April 11-12, May 17-21) before being recalled for good on May 28.
- ◆ Was one of three finalists for the Rawlings AL Gold Glove Award for right field, won by BAL Nick Markakis...was one of three rookies chosen as a Gold Glove finalist, along with CIN Billy Hamilton and BOS Jackie Bradley Jr.
- ◆ Named to *Baseball America's* All-Rookie Team, alongside outfielders HOU George Springer and CIN Billy Hamilton.
- ◆ His 8 3B led AL rookies and were the most by a Rays rookie since Akinori Iwamura posted a club-rookie-record 10 3B in 2007.
- ◆ Min. 100 games, his .450 SLG ranked 3rd among AL rookies, trailing CWS José Abreu (.581) and MIN Danny Santana (.472)...it was the highest by a Rays rookie since Evan Longoria (.531) in 2008.
- ◆ On April 12 at CIN, in his first major league start, threw out Joey Votto at home...the assist preserved a 1-0 lead for Alex Cobb and the Rays held on to win by the same score.
- ◆ Collected his first major league hit on May 17 at LAA, an infield single off C.J. Wilson...the next day, hit his first career homer, a 2-run, oppo-



site-field shot in the 7th inning off Mike Morin... earlier in that game, made a leaping catch against the right-center field wall to rob Erick Aybar of extra bases and earn the top Web Gem on ESPN's *Baseball Tonight*.

- ♦ Hit an inside-the-park home run on May 31 at BOS, the first player to do so within his first 10 games since CWS Joe Borchard in 2002... became the first visiting player to hit an inside-the-park home run at Fenway Park since BAL David Newhan on July 21, 2004.
- ♦ Claimed the No. 1 spot on ESPN *SportsCenter's* Top 10 Plays twice in a span of 10 days...on June 11 vs. STL, his bases-loaded, inning-ending diving catch in right-center field robbed Peter Bourjos...on June 20 vs. HOU, dove for a George Springer foul ball near the Rays bullpen.
- ♦ On July 9 vs. KC, went 4-for-4 with a grand slam, the first Rays rookie to record 4 hits and a slam... became the first rookie since Baseball Reference data is available (1908) with 4 hits and a grand slam from the No. 9 spot in the batting order.
- ♦ Despite playing only 34 games for Durham, was ranked by *Baseball America* as the Best Defensive Outfielder in the International League in its Best Tools survey.
- ♦ In 2013, was used as a late-inning defensive replacement in the Game 163 tiebreaker at TEX and the AL Wild Card Game at CLE.
- ♦ Was not included on the ALDS roster.
- ♦ Selected off the Durham roster on Sep 30, the day of Game 163...became the first player to make his major league debut in a single-game tiebreaker and just the second to make his major league debut in his team's 163rd game of a season (or later), according to the Elias Sports Bureau... the other was NYY Elvio Jiménez in their 164th and final game of the 1964 season.
- ♦ Caught Joe Maddon's attention in spring training when he delivered a 2-run double in the Rays spring home opener and hustled into second base after being accidentally tripped by the first baseman...was a minor league call up that day as the Rays played split-squad games.
- ♦ Spent most of the season at Double-A Montgomery before a late-July promotion to Durham...hit a combined .295 (150-for-508) with 89 runs and 21 SB in 136 games.
- ♦ Named Most Valuable Player for Montgomery by the Rays Baseball Operations department, batting .307 (114-for-371) in 97 games.
- ♦ Named to the Southern League midseason and postseason All-Star teams.

- ♦ Started all eight of the Bulls postseason games and scored a team-high 6 runs...delivered a 2-run homer and RBI single in the Bulls 7-0 win at Pawtucket (Red Sox), clinching the Governors' Cup.
- ♦ Named Defensive Player of the Year by the Rays Baseball Operations department for a second consecutive year.
- ♦ Ranked by *Baseball America* as the No. 10 prospect in the Rays system following the season... the publication also tabbed him as the Best Defensive Outfielder and Best Outfield Arm in the organization.
- ♦ Started the 2012 season with Class-A Charlotte, but missed 63 games due to a pair of injuries... broke his left middle finger on a bunt attempt in the second game of the season...returned in June, but 10 days later broke the hamate bone in his right hand on a swing...received a late-season promotion to Durham.
- ♦ Played 23 games for the Phoenix Desert Dogs in the Arizona Fall League.
- ♦ In 2011, recorded a career-high 27 SB for Class-A Bowling Green...played for the Canberra Cavalry in the Australian Baseball League...ranked by *Baseball America* as the Best Defensive Outfielder in the organization following the season...in 2010, hit a team-high .303 for Rookie-level Princeton...his 7 3B ranked 2nd in the Appalachian League.

AMATEUR CAREER

- ♦ Selected in the 31st round (941st overall) of the 2010 Amateur Draft...only four players in club history have been drafted later and reached the majors with the Rays: Ryan Garton (34th round) in 2012, Joey Gathright (32nd round) in 2001, Chad Gaudin (34th round) in 2001 and Travis Phelps (89th round) in 1996.
- ♦ In 2010, as a sophomore at Parkland College in Champaign, Ill., he hit .426 with 17 HR, 71 RBI and 91 runs in 56 games while the Cobras finished 5th in the nation with a 50-13 record.
- ♦ As a freshman in 2009, hit .429 with 13 3B, 13 HR, 50 RBI and 84 runs in 54 games...the Cobras won the National Junior College championship with a 49-9 mark.



- Brandon and Austin Meadows, along with their wives, were roommates last spring in Port Charlotte...Brandon received an urgent call from his wife, Madison, to say a brush fire was threatening their neighborhood...Meadows was scratched from that day's lineup as the two rushed home...he said, "I felt like I was in NASCAR. Last thing we heard was 'we can't get out, there's smoke everywhere' and I was terrified what might actually happen"...the fire destroyed 220 surrounding acres but the couples safely returned to the house the next day.
- Brandon stayed in shape waiting for the 2020 season to begin by taking batting practice in a homemade garage setup...Madison, a former softball standout at Maryland, threw to him... he posted a clip of her working up-and-in on Twitter and she shared it, asking, "Why did you not show me dicing you with my cutter?"
- Brandon is the unofficial taste-tester for Sweet and Lowe Bakery, a home business Madison started in June 2020 after photos of her desserts gained traction on her social media accounts... she creates custom bakes out of their kitchen... Brandon sometimes pitches in with the dishes.
- He and Madison built a country home in College Grove, Tenn. ...they live there in the offseason with their dog, Collie, a miniature bernedoodle—a mix of a Bernese mountain dog and poodle.
- Brandon maximizes the power potential in his body by implementing a routine of drills using bands and bungee cords to promote posture, balance and the transfer of energy...he uses these to create awareness and feel with his swing.
- Brandon launched the "Home Runs for Hope" program in 2019...for each home run Brandon

hits, he and Madison donate \$100 to the Crisis Center of Tampa Bay, matched by the Rays Baseball Foundation...his 14 HR last season raised \$2,800...mental health has heavily impacted his family and he wants to ensure no one feels helpless when dealing with mental health issues.

- Brandon discovered his key to success while in the minor leagues, which he shared with the *Tampa Bay Times*... "A big thing has been eating applesauce. When I got to Triple-A Durham, I was struggling and they had those GoGo squeezes in the fridge and I was like, 'Ah, applesauce. I haven't had a lot of fruits lately.' Had one, ended up hitting a home run. Had 3 hits that day. And I was like, 'I've got to have applesauce tomorrow.' The next day, I [homered twice], and I just absolutely took off."

2020 SEASON

- Won the Don Zimmer Award, given to the club's Most Valuable Player...was the second player to win Outstanding Rookie and then MVP the next season, joining Jorge Cantú in 2004-2005.
- Named second team All-MLB, with NYY DJ LeMahieu receiving first team honors...the teams were selected with voting split between fans and an MLB-appointed panel of experts, including media, former players and executives.
- Ranked among AL leaders in homers (14, tied for 7th), slugging pct. (.554, 9th) and OPS (.916, 8th)... led the team in those categories as well as runs (36), hits (52), RBI (37) and extra-base hits (25).
- Hit .317 (19-for-60) with 4 HR and 9 RBI in his last 18 games after ending an 0-for-22 slump.
- Appeared in 56 games and made 49 starts (35-2B, 7-RF, 4-LF, 3-DH).

- Hit the 30th homer of his career in his 146th game, the 3rd-fastest Ray to get there, according to Stats LLC, behind Evan Longoria (126th career game) and Jonny Gomes (133rd game)...recorded his 100th RBI in his 151st game, 2nd-fastest in club history behind Longoria (135th game).
- Became the first Rays player with 8 HR through 24 games since Carlos Peña (10) in 2009.
- Hit 6 HR vs. LHP, the most "left-on-left" homers in the majors...had six vs. lefties in 2018-19.
- Made his second consecutive Opening Day roster but did not start.
- On July 25 vs. TOR, hit a go-ahead, 2-run triple in the 8th inning...marked the first time the Rays hit a go-ahead triple that late in a game since Denard Span on Opening Day 2018 vs. BOS.
- On Aug 9 vs. NYY, his game-tying solo homer off James Paxton in the 7th inning was the second of back-to-back homers with Mike Brosseau.

- **POSTSEASON:** Hit .118 (9-for-76) with 4 HR and 8 RBI in 20 games (19 starts)...all 4 HR came in his last 9 games, including three in the World Series.

- In Game 4 vs. LAD, hit a go-ahead, 3-run homer off Pedro Báez in the 6th inning.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- In 2019, named to the AL All-Star Team...voted the club's Outstanding Rookie by the Tampa Bay Chapter of the BBWAA...his 17 HR ranked 3rd in club history for a rookie, behind Evan Longoria (27) in 2008 and Jonny Gomes (21) in 2005, despite 68 games on the injured list.
- Finished 3rd in the AL Rookie of the Year race behind unanimous winner HOU Yordan Álvarez and BAL John Means.

- ♦ Fouled a ball off his right shin on July 2 vs. BAL, sustaining a right shin bone bruise, then was removed from his Aug 21 rehab game with Triple-A Durham with a left quadriceps strain, a separate and unrelated injury...reinstated from the 60-day IL on Sep 22, appearing in 6 games (5 starts) to end the season.
- ♦ At the time of his injury, led the Rays with 16 HR and 49 RBI and ranked 2nd among major league rookies in both categories...his 16 HR tied Evan Longoria in 2008 for the most by a Rays rookie before the All-Star break...was on pace to break the club rookie record for homers before his injury.
- ♦ In *Baseball America's* annual Best Tools survey of major league managers, coaches and executives, was ranked as the AL's 2nd-best Defensive Second Baseman behind NYY DJ LeMahieu.

- ♦ Named AL Rookie of the Month for April, the first Ray to win it since Wil Myers in September 2013...the winners were based on stats covering both March and April...led AL rookies in March/April with a .289 avg., .350 OBP, .567 SLG, .917 OPS, 17 runs, 26 hits, 6 HR, 12 XBH and 17 RBI.
- ♦ Made his first Opening Day roster, starting at designated hitter and batting cleanup.
- ♦ On April 12 at TOR, hit a pair of 2-run homers for the first multi-HR game of his career...his first homer reached the 500 Level at Rogers Centre, becoming the smallest player, by both height and weight, ever to homer to the 500 Level.

X-RAY REPORT

- ◆ Manuel navigated personal adversity during the 2020 season...he and his family were inside a rental car that caught fire, needing a bystander's help to safely escape before the car exploded...his father, Enmanuel, passed away in August after a bout with COVID-19...his father was a close friend and mentor, and the two spoke often before and after games...in his second game back from the bereavement list, he notched 4 hits and drove in what would be the winning run.
- ◆ Manuel and Willy Adames formed a close bond in their first season as teammates; rooming together, cooking and helping each other stay ready during the shutdown...Adames helped Manuel overcome the challenges he faced personally and professionally.
- ◆ He made one of the postseason's top grabs last year, crashing over the right field railing at Petco Park during Game 2 of the ALCS...he also belted a 3-run homer earlier in the game...when asked which was his favorite, he said, "Definitely the home run. The home run didn't hurt"...soon after, the catch was commemorated with an officially-licensed T-shirt.
- ◆ He twice made headlines late in his rookie season for his large pieces of bubble gum...in an August game against the Phillies, his gum fell out of his mouth and caused a brief delay when the batter and pitcher noticed it on the center field grass...just over a month later, he managed to keep his gum in his mouth but casually blew a bubble while tracking down a fly ball.
- ◆ Manuel began riding horses at a young age...he was afforded the opportunity to do so as his late father worked on a farm...he still finds time to

ride his own horse named Pencoté...he described it as his "favorite thing to do" to the *San Diego Union-Tribune*.

- ◆ Manuel has nine brothers and two sisters...three of his brothers signed minor league deals in the states before him: Emilio (Dodgers), "Junior" (Indians) and Pedro (Athletics).
- ◆ Manuel and his wife, Rachell, married on Christmas Eve 2016...they have two sons, Diamond (3) and Matthew (1).

2020 SEASON

- ◆ Acquired from the Padres early in spring training...appeared in 47 games and made 37 starts (18-CF, 10-RF, 9-LF)...after a slow start, hit .321/.374/.411 (36-for-112) in 36 games (28 starts) from Aug 10 through season's end.
- ◆ Was on the bereavement list from Aug 4-6 following the death of his father, Enmanuel...placed on the COVID-19 Related IL on Aug 7 for intake screening and reinstated on Aug 9.
- ◆ Tied for 2nd in the AL with 12 SB behind KC Adalberto Mondesi (24)...had 10 SB in 14 games from Aug 25-Sep 15, tied for most in the majors.
- ◆ Was the only Ray with a bunt hit and had five of them, tied for 4th in the majors.
- ◆ Hit .294 (25-for-85) in 27 games on the road and .233 (14-for-60) in 20 games at home.
- ◆ Hit .556 (15-for-27) in 7 games (6 starts) against the Red Sox, with multiple hits in his first 5 starts...was the third player in club history with multiple hits in five straight starts against them, joining Aubrey Huff (6) from Aug 3-12, 2004 and Carl Crawford (5) from May 2-10, 2009.



- ◆ Made his fourth consecutive Opening Day roster...started on Opening Day in left field, after his first three came in center field (with SD).
- ◆ On Aug 10 at BOS, his 4 hits passed his total from his first 11 games (9 starts) combined (3)... became the first visiting player with 4 hits (or more) in his Fenway Park debut since BAL Jonathan Schoop in 2014.
- ◆ Added a second 4-hit game in the series finale on Aug 13 at BOS...totaled 10 hits in the 4-game series at Fenway Park, tied for the 2nd-most by a Ray in a single series behind Carl Crawford (11) from Aug 6-9, 2007 at DET.
- ◆ On Aug 25 vs. BAL, his 2nd-inning homer was his first since Sep 11, 2019 vs. CHC (with SD), going 107 AB in between...was the second of back-to-back homers with Hunter Renfroe.
- ◆ **POSTSEASON:** Hit .276/.344/.552 (16-for-58) with 5 HR and 11 RBI in 19 games (18 starts)... since RBI became an official stat (1920), he and NYY Giancarlo Stanton in 2020 are the only players with at least 10 RBI in the regular season to match or exceed their total in the postseason.
- ◆ In Game 1 of the Wild Card Series vs. TOR, hit a 2-run homer off A.J. Cole in the 7th inning and joined Evan Longoria in Game 1 of the 2008 ALDS vs. CWS as the only Rays to homer in their first career postseason game...became the third Rays hitter all-time with multiple hits in his first career postseason game, joining Longoria and Akinori Iwamura in 2008.
- ◆ In Game 2 of the ALCS vs. HOU, hit a 3-run homer in the 1st inning...crashed over the right field railing to make an inning-ending catch in the 2nd on a foul ball by George Springer.
- ◆ In Game 6 of the ALCS vs. HOU, became the first player in major league history to have a multi-HR game in the postseason after hitting 1 HR (or fewer) during the regular season, according to the Elias Sports Bureau...it was the sixth multi-HR game in Rays postseason history.
- ◆ In the 4th inning of Game 5 vs. LAD, attempted the 14th straight steal of home in World Series history...was the first attempt since STL Lonnie Smith was caught in Game 6 of the 1982 World Series vs. MIL and only the fifth attempt since 1922...he came within inches of completing the first successful straight steal of home in a World Series game since BRO Jackie Robinson in Game 1 of the 1955 World Series at NYY.

- ◆ Signed a one-year, incentive-laden contract with the Red Sox during spring training...was recovering from a flexor strain in his right arm at the time of the COVID-19 shutdown.
- ◆ Struggled to bounce back from injury and ultimately opted out of the season on July 19.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- ◆ Over the 2018-19 seasons, went 7-3 with a 2.21 ERA (106-IP, 26-ER) and 134 SO in 85 relief apps... was used eight times as a starter over that span.
- ◆ Since the start of the 2014 season, has gone 14-0 with a 3.13 ERA (112-IP, 39-ER) in 29 apps (17 starts) in September...it is the 2nd-longest September winning streak in major league history, according to the Elias Sports Bureau, behind Randy Johnson (19) in 1993-99.
- ◆ In **2019**, limited to 35 apps (8 starts) due to two stints on the injured list for right elbow inflammation...landed on the 10-day IL for the second time on Aug 31, ending his season.
- ◆ His first 8 apps came from the starting rotation... went 3-1 with a 1.96 ERA (23-IP, 5-ER) in his first 4 starts and 0-3 with a 12.00 ERA (18-IP, 24-ER) in his next 4 starts...moved to the bullpen on May 12 and spent the rest of the season in relief.
- ◆ Underwent a non-surgical procedure to clean up scar tissue in his elbow in December.
- ◆ In **2018**, pitched exclusively out of the Astros bullpen...ranked 4th among AL relievers with a 1.99 ERA and tied for 8th in strikeouts (94)... held right-handed batters to a .135 avg. (19-for-141), 4th in the AL (min. 50 IP).
- ◆ Made 2 apps for the MLB All-Star Team in the Japan All-Star Series.



- ◆ **POSTSEASON:** Made four scoreless apps spanning 4 IP...was the winning pitcher in Game 3 of the ALDS at CLE as the Astros finished off a series sweep...pitched in Games 1, 3 and 4 of the ALCS against the Red Sox.
- ◆ Opened the **2017** season on the 10-day IL following a bout of dead arm in spring training...pulled from his first rehab start with Triple-A Fresno after suffering a posterior impingement of his right elbow...transferred to the 60-day IL on June 8 and reinstated on July 22.

X-RAY REPORT

- When he was young, Brendan would call his father, Bruce, on his way home from work several times a week to ask him to go to a local field and take batting practice...he'd hit every ball in the bucket, then the two would pick them up and do it again.
- Brendan's travel ball coach predicted he would play Division I baseball when he was just 12 years old...his father responded, "Let's wait and see"...to this day, when his father sees the coach, he doesn't miss the chance to say, "I told you."
- He made his varsity debut as a freshman in high school...his first at-bat resulted in a 2-run single and he completed an immaculate 1st inning by striking out the side on nine pitches...the game was called after one inning due to snow.
- Brendan's parents bought a gently-used Saturn sedan to travel to his baseball commitments when he was young...when they got rid of it, it had close to 200,000 miles racked up with routine trips from western Pennsylvania to tournaments in North Carolina and South Carolina and 1,000-mile round trips to Louisville when Brendan's Cardinals were at home...he bought them a new car after he was drafted.

2020 SEASON

- Underwent left labrum surgery, performed by Dr. Neil ElAttrache in Los Angeles, on Aug 19 and missed the entire season.
- Ranked by *Baseball America* as the No. 7 prospect in the Rays system following the season...the publication also tabbed him as having the Best Control in the organization for a third consecutive year.
- His rookie status is still intact entering 2021.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- In **2019**, made 13 apps (11 starts) on the mound, a start at designated hitter and was used as a pinch-hitter three times in his first major league action...was with the Rays for five stints: June 29–July 5, July 13 (26th Man), July 19, July 31–Aug 19 and Sep 3 through the end of the season.
- Pitched to a 1.69 ERA (16-IP, 3-ER) through his first 3 starts, but after that went 1-4 with a 6.82 ERA (33-IP, 25-ER) in 10 apps (8 starts).
- Held left-handed batters to a .220/.250/.320 (11-for-50) line without a homer...righties hit .284/.344/.527 (42-for-148) with 8 HR, all coming over a stretch of 7 starts from July 5–Aug 19.
- Allowed 1 BB (or fewer) in each of his first 6 starts, passing Nathan Eovaldi (5) for the longest streak by a traditional starter beginning his Rays career.
- On June 29 vs. TEX, made his major league debut, retired his first 16 BF and only allowed 1 hit over six scoreless innings...it was the longest scoreless outing for a Ray making his major league debut, passing Scott Kazmir (5 IP) on Aug 23, 2004 at SEA...his outing tied SEA Ken Cloude on Aug 9, 1997 vs. CWS and CIN Wayne Simpson on April 9, 1970 at LAD for the 2nd-longest perfect game bid in a debut in the expansion era (since 1961)...the major league record is held by PIT Nick Kingham (6.2 IP) on April 29, 2018 vs. STL...Brendan's only hit allowed was a 1-out, 6th-inning single by Danny Santana that left the bat at 66.8 mph, according to StatCast.
- Was the second AL pitcher since Baseball Reference data is available (1908) to allow 2 baserunners (or fewer) in a scoreless start of 6 IP (or more) in his debut, following MIL Steve Woodard on July 28, 1997 vs. TOR (G1).
- Was the 6th-fastest in franchise history to make his major league debut as a Ray after being



drafted by the club, according to the Elias Sports Bureau...he was also the fastest to do so in more than a decade, since David Price made his major league debut on Sep 14, 2008 at NYY after being selected No. 1 overall in the 2007 Amateur Draft.

- ◆ Became the fifth lefty to make his major league debut for the Rays as a starter, first since Blake Snell on April 23, 2016 at NYY...at 23 years, 193 days, was the youngest starting pitcher used by the Rays since Snell's debut (23.141).
- ◆ Was the seventh pitcher selected in the first round by the Rays to reach the majors with the club, joining Ryne Stanek (No. 29 in 2013), Blake Snell (No. 52 in 2011), David Price (No. 1 in 2007), Jeff Niemann (No. 4 in 2004), Dewon Brazelton (No. 3 in 2001) and Jason Standridge (No. 31 in 1997).
- ◆ Was the first Rays college draft pick to make his debut for the club as a starter since Jeff Niemann on April 13, 2008 vs. BAL.

- ◆ On July 1 vs. BAL, appeared in his second game, batting eighth as the designated hitter...was the fourth player since 1913 to begin his career with a start as a pitcher and a non-pitcher within his first 2 games, according to Stats LLC...joined LAA Shohei Ohtani in 2018, WAS Syd Cohen in 1934 and STL/WAS Carl East from 1915-24.
- ◆ On July 5 vs. NYY, yielded a 1st-inning solo homer to Aaron Judge, his second batter faced, for the first run allowed in his career.
- ◆ On Aug 13 at SD, yielded 6 BB, the most by a Rays pitcher since Blake Snell (7) on June 19, 2018 at HOU...his 3 BB in the 1st inning alone matched his total from his first 6 starts combined.
- ◆ On Sep 15 at LAA, recorded his first career hit, a pinch-hit single off Ty Buttrey in the 8th inning.
- ◆ On Sep 22 vs. BOS, hit his first career homer, a pinch-hit, solo shot off the D-ring catwalk off Trevor Kelley in the 9th inning...was the third Ray to hit his first career homer as a pinch-hitter, joining Taylor Motter on May 17, 2016 at TOR and Tim Beckham on April 11, 2015 at MIA.

- ◆ Went 6-0 with a 1.10 ERA (73.2-IP, 9-ER) in 15 apps (13 starts) in the minors, including 3-0 with a 0.84 ERA (32-IP, 3-ER) in 7 apps (6 starts) with Durham...min. 70 IP, his 1.10 ERA ranked 2nd among all minor league pitchers.
- ◆ Was on Durham's 7-day IL from Aug 23-30 with left shoulder fatigue.
- ◆ Named the organization's Minor League Pitcher of the Month for both April and May.
- ◆ Recorded a scoreless streak of 29 IP spanning two levels, beginning on May 4 vs. Double-A Mobile and ending on June 3 vs. Triple-A Norfolk.
- ◆ Was on the AL roster for the SiriusXM All-Star Futures Game, but did not play due to his major league promotion.
- ◆ Ranked by *Baseball America* as the No. 14 overall prospect in the minors following the season...was the No. 2 prospect in the Rays system...named to *Baseball America's* Minor League All-Star Team.

X-RAY REPORT

- ◆ Austin and Brandon Lowe, along with their wives, shared a house during spring training last year...just before a scheduled game, Brandon received an urgent call from his wife and relayed, "Dude, our neighborhood is on fire"... Austin was scratched from the lineup and the two rushed to their rental home...the fire consumed 220 acres around the Rotonda West area in Port Charlotte, but the two were able to safely return to the house the next evening.
- ◆ Austin and his wife, Alexis, adopted their golden retriever, Maylee, in 2017...Maylee helped his swing stay sharp during quarantine, running down balls as he took casual batting practice.
- ◆ He loves to fish, and the biggest fish he has ever caught was in Florida: an 80-pound tarpon that took an hour to reel in...when Austin and Alexis got married in 2018, their cake was decorated to look like a fish leaping out of the water...the cake read: "To my Catch of a Lifetime."
- ◆ His brother, Parker, is an outfielder selected by the Tigers in the second round of the 2018 Amateur Draft...four and a half years younger, Parker is two inches taller than Austin...Austin was able to watch Parker's selection on television...as kids, Austin broke Parker's collarbone on a trampoline bouncing him over the gate...the two work out together in the offseason.
- ◆ Austin and Parker both wore No. 16 for the Grayson High School baseball team...the Rams jointly honored the brothers' success by retiring their number at a ceremony on the field in 2019...the school commemorated the moment by unveiling a sign shaped like a jersey, bearing their shared name and number.

- ◆ Austin's dad, Kenny, played football and baseball at Morehead State, earning first team All-Ohio Valley Conference honors as a third baseman... his mother, Staci, played softball for Georgia Southern and then Georgia State.
- ◆ Austin grew up rooting for Atlanta sports teams, especially the Braves, and calls Chipper Jones his favorite player.

2020 SEASON

- ◆ Limited to 36 games in the season following his breakout campaign...began the season on the COVID-19 Related IL and was reinstated on Aug 4...placed on the 10-day IL (left oblique strain) on Sep 18 and missed the rest of the regular season.
- ◆ Saw his season avg. drop from .244 to .205 over his 14 games (13 starts) in September...hit .140 (7-for-50) with 23 SO during the month.
- ◆ In his season debut on Aug 4 vs. BOS, recorded a pair of hits, including a RBI triple.
- ◆ On Sep 10 vs. BOS, snapped a career-long 0-for-18 skid with a RBI double in the 5th inning.

- ◆ In Game 5 of the ALDS vs. NYY, hit a game-tying, solo homer off Gerrit Cole in the 5th inning, the seventh game-tying postseason homer in club history and first in a "winner take all" game...it was the third game-tying homer when facing



elimination, joining Evan Longoria in Game 3 of the 2013 ALDS vs. BOS and Rocco Baldelli in Game 5 of the 2008 World Series at PHI.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- In 2019, in his first full season as a Ray, was named co-winner of the Don Zimmer Award as the club's Most Valuable Player along with Charlie Morton, the first tie in the award's 22-year history...the award was chosen by the Tampa Bay Chapter of the BBWAA...led the team with 83 runs, 33 HR, 89 RBI, a .291 avg. and a .558 SLG...was also selected via Player Balloting to the AL All-Star Team, the first of his career.

- Ranked among AL leaders in triples (7, tied for 5th), slugging pct. (.558, 6th) and OPS (.922, 8th).
- Became the 10th player in franchise history with a 30-HR season, and the 2nd-youngest to do it behind 23-year-old Evan Longoria (33) in 2009...his 33 HR were the 2nd-most in the AL by a player age-24 or younger, behind NYY Gleyber Torres (38)...his 33 HR were the 2nd-most by a Rays outfielder (min. 50 pct. of games there) behind Aubrey Huff (34) in 2003.
- Twenty of his 33 HR came against AL East opponents, including 8 HR against the Blue Jays...it was the most in Rays history against Toronto.

- Named AL Player of the Week for April 8-14, the first Ray to win it since Steven Souza Jr. from April 17-23, 2017...hit .545/.630/1.182 (12-for-22) with 2 2B, 4 HR and 12 RBI in 6 games (5 starts)...led the AL in avg., on-base pct., slugging pct. and RBI, tied for 1st in hits and ranked 3rd in homers.
- Homered in three consecutive games from April 9-12 at CWS/TOR...was the second player in franchise history with at least 3 hits and 1 HR in three consecutive games, joining Evan Longoria from June 25-27, 2008 at FLA/PIT...finished this stretch with 10 hits, 4 HR and 9 RBI—the first leadoff hitter to reach all those numbers in a 3-game span since RBI became an official stat in 1920, according to Stats LLC.

- ◆ On April 12 at TOR, hit solo homers in the 1st and 3rd innings for the first multi-HR game of his career...his second homer was the 21st to reach the 500 Level at Rogers Centre since it opened in 1989 and fourth by a left-handed hitter—until Brandon Lowe did it later in the inning...they were the second and third Rays to hit one there, joining José Canseco on April 12, 1999.
- ◆ Was on the 10-day IL from April 21–May 9 due to a right thumb sprain.
- ◆ On May 18 at NYY, hit a go-ahead solo homer in the 11th inning off Luis Cessa, his first career extra-inning homer...was the second time in franchise history the Rays hit an extra-inning homer at Yankee Stadium, following Carlos Peña on May 6, 2009 (10th inning off Phil Coke).
- ◆ Recorded 7 hits, 2 HR and 6 RBI over 2 games from May 26–27 at CLE, vs. TOR...according to Stats LLC, the only other times in club history a player matched those numbers over a 2-game span were Meadows from April 9–10 at CWS and Ben Zobrist on April 28, 2011 at MIN (DH).

- ◆ On July 14 at BAL, homered off Tom Eshelman in the 3rd inning to snap his homerless drought at 143 AB...his homer was the fourth by a Ray to land on Eutaw Street, joining Logan Morrison on July 1, 2017, Aubrey Huff on Aug 21, 2003 and Ben Grieve on Aug 20, 2002.
- ◆ On July 18 at NYY (G1), was the front end of back-to-back homers with Yandy Diaz to lead off the game, his fourth career leadoff homer...it was the second time in club history the Rays hit back-to-back homers to lead off the 1st inning.
- ◆ On Aug 23 at BAL, tied a career high with 4 RBI, all coming on the first grand slam of his career, off Ty Blach in the 2nd inning.
- ◆ Went on a career-high 16-game hitting streak from Sep 1–18, the longest by a Ray since Tommy Pham (17) from Aug 21–Sep 14, 2018...hit .407 (24-for-59) with 8 HR and 19 RBI during the streak.
- ◆ Named AL Player of the Week for Sep 2–8, becoming the third in club history to earn multiple Player of the Week honors in one season, joining James Shields (2) in 2011 and Evan Longoria (3) in 2009...hit .522/.593/1.130 (12-for-23) with 2 2B, 4 HR and 8 RBI in 7 games (6 starts)...led the AL in avg., on-base pct., slugging pct. and total bases (26), tied for 1st in hits, homers and runs (9) and tied for 2nd in RBI.
- ◆ On Sep 18 at LAD, hit a go-ahead, solo homer in the 11th inning, the second extra-inning homer

- ◆ **ALL-STAR GAME:** Selected to the All-Star Game as a result of the Player Balloting, his first career selection in his first full season in the majors...at 24 years, 2 months, became the club's youngest All-Star since Matt Moore (24 years, 0 months) in 2013 and youngest position player since Evan Longoria (23 years, 9 months) in 2009.
- ◆ Finished 4th among AL outfielders in the Primary Round of All-Star Game voting, behind LAA Mike Trout, HOU George Springer and HOU Michael Brantley...advanced to the Starters Election, but finished 8th among the nine AL outfielders in that stage.
- ◆ Entered the All-Star Game in the 4th inning as a defensive replacement and played two innings in left field and one inning in right...grounded out to first base in his only at-bat.

- ◆ Ranked by *Baseball America* as the No. 44 overall prospect in the minors following the season...was the No. 2 prospect in the Pirates system...the publication also tabbed him as the Best Athlete and for having the Best Strike-Zone Judgment in the organization.
- ◆ Started the **2016** season with Double-A Altoona, making his season debut on April 25 and earning

a June 18 promotion to Triple-A Indianapolis...including a rehab assignment with Short-A West Virginia, hit .266/.333/.536 (82-for-308) with 25 2B, 11 3B, 12 HR and 47 RBI in 87 games.







- ◆ He learned English in large part thanks to the help of fellow Padres pitching prospect MacKenzie Gore...MacKenzie also helped him develop his curveball...Padres player development staff described their relationship like brothers...the two constantly pushed each other through multiple levels of the Padres system.
- ◆ Baseball is a family game for Luis...his grandfather introduced him to the game at 3 years old...his uncle and father both played in his hometown of Cartagena, but Luis never got to watch them play...he initially split time between pitching and shortstop, but realized his future was in pitching when he was 15 or 16 years old.



X-RAY REPORT

- Following his heroics in the World Series, he deployed Kevin Kiermaier-inspired imaginary airplane wings and careened around the outfield before he was dogpiled by teammates...the thrill and excitement was almost too much for him, as he nearly passed out and needed an IV before recovering to finish his media rounds...“Here I am, talking to the boys,” he told Ken Rosenthal, between gasps for air...“Man, baseball is fun!”
- His spikes from that magical moment in Game 4 of the World Series are on display at the “Autumn Glory” exhibit at the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum in Cooperstown.
- Brett split a pair of dance battles last season against Randy Arozarena...straw polling indicates Brett was victorious after the Rays clinch of the AL East, but couldn’t complete the sweep in their rematch following the ALDS.
- He claimed No. 35 after Nate Lowe was traded to the Rangers...the number was worn by childhood friend, Nate Richardson, who was one of four students and one of three from Seminole High killed in a car crash in 2009...the number was taken in previous stops with the Brewers and Royals...after his draft selection, he wrote a letter on Nate’s MySpace page including “I want to make a promise right here, Nate, if I make it to the big leagues that first game when I walk out onto the field I’ll be wearing the No. 35 so your parents and our friends and family will not only see me but will also remember you and what you meant to the city of Seminole, as well.”
- Brett split the \$40,000 he earned last year through appearances and video game events among various charities throughout the Tampa Bay area...some of the organizations he contributed to include Providing Advocacy and Recognizing Capabilities (PARC), the Children’s

Dream Fund, Carlton Manor, Pet Pal Animal Shelter, Largo’s Central Park Performing Arts Center and the Specialty Fit Foundation.

- Brett grew up a Rays fan living in nearby Seminole...he attended his first Rays Fan Fest at Tropicana Field at just 2 years old.
- Macho Man Randy Savage was his neighbor during middle and high school before he passed away...Randy would frequently stop Brett on his way home from school and invite him to play basketball at his house...Brett never won.
- In 2018, when he played at Tropicana Field for the first time as a major leaguer, Section 127 became the unofficial “Brett Phillips Area”...his sister reserved 200 seats, but an estimated 1,000 friends and family purchased tickets.
- His enthusiastic laugh is legendary around the game, with teammates who aren’t aware beforehand sometimes caught completely off guard...“Nothing can prepare you for it,” said Brandon Lowe...a video created by the Brewers showcasing his excitable sense of humor regularly makes the rounds on social media as people discover his laugh for the first time.

2020 SEASON

- Acquired from the Royals on Aug 27 and placed on the COVID-19 Related IL for intake screening...reinstated on Sep 4 and remained on the active roster through season’s end.
- Became the third product of Seminole High School to play for the Rays, following Casey Kotchman (2011) and Bobby Wilson (2015-16).
- Appeared in 17 games and made 8 starts (7-RF, 1-CF) for the Rays...hit .150 (3-for-20) but all 3 hits tied the game or gave the Rays the lead.
- On Sep 4 vs. MIA, made his Rays debut as a pinch-runner and stole third base.



- On Sep 17 at BAL (G1), hit a RBI triple in the 2nd inning for his first hit with the Rays.
- On Sep 25 vs. PHI, hit a game-tying homer in the 6th inning, his first since July 27 at DET (with KC)...also singled in the 2nd and walked twice.

- Colin and his fiancée, Jessica, purchased a home in Tampa last October...the two plan to be married this November in Dallas.
- He won his school's third grade spelling bee to earn the right to compete at the district level, where he was subsequently "destroyed" and made an early exit.
- Colin was called up to make his debut for the second game of a doubleheader in Boston...the move was not official until the first game concluded, so he was not permitted in the Rays clubhouse until that time...as the first game ended, he was still sitting in an Uber ride in traffic...he eventually got out and walked from the downtown hotel to Fenway Park with his large Rays bag as Red Sox fans streamed the opposite direction...he arrived drenched in sweat 40 minutes before the game and was on the mound in the 2nd inning.
- He only played basketball up to his freshman year of high school, but has been able to dunk since his senior year...the first time he dunked

on someone was at a local gym, just in time for his best friend's dad to walk in and witness it—the only person he knew who did.

- Colin was college teammates with Jalen Beeks and bullpen catcher Jean Ramirez at Arkansas.

2020 SEASON

- Underwent Tommy John surgery on his left elbow on July 29, performed by Dr. Keith Meister in Arlington, Texas.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- In 2019, selected from Triple-A Durham on June 8, between games of a doubleheader at BOS, and made his major league debut in the second game...stayed in the majors the rest of the season, making a team-high 51 apps over that span.

roughly 10 hours from Cincinnati in a rental car to join the Rays in the Bronx.

- ◆ Ryan has faced adversity his entire life...growing up in Culver City near Los Angeles often left him "terrified"...grisly violence was visible around him, including gang warfare and their encounters with law enforcement...his father dealt with drug, alcohol and gambling problems, leading to erratic and sometimes borderline abusive behavior before passing away in 2012 from blood cancer...Ryan only recently began discussing his background openly.
- ◆ His maternal grandparents, Helen and Seymour Wildfeuer, were Polish Holocaust survivors...Helen was imprisoned at Auschwitz and Seymour was in Bergen-Belsen...he learned of it after discovering the number tattooed on his grandmother's arm...Ryan enthusiastically accepted the offer to pitch for Israel in the qualifying rounds for the 2017 World Baseball Classic.
- ◆ In spring 2017, his Cardinals teammates chipped in and paid for a rental car for Ryan after learning that he walked a mile back and forth to the field from his rental condo...Ryan declined when initially approached about it, so the clubhouse arranged it as a surprise.
- ◆ Ryan faced Kevin Kiermaier during Players' Weekend in 2017...the encounter gained traction on social media, as the two nicknames selected resulted in a "Sherriff" vs. "Outlaw" matchup...Kiermaier reached on a fielder's choice.

2020 SEASON

- ◆ Made 10 apps, all scoreless, spanning two stints with the Rays...was on the active roster from Aug 26-Sep 3 and Sep 10 through season's end.
- ◆ Struck out two in 9.2 IP and did not record a strikeout in his first 7 apps...was the 3rd-longest streak for a Rays pitcher without a strikeout

to start the season behind Xavier Cedeño (9) in 2017 and Dan Jennings (8) in 2017.



2021 AMATEUR DRAFT

The annual First-Year Player Draft is scheduled for July 11-13. For the first time, it will be held as part of the All-Star Game festivities in Atlanta. The first day of the draft, which has been moved to Sunday this year, will again air exclusively on MLB Network.

The Rays hold the No. 28 overall selection. In 2020, the Rays selected RHP Nick Bitsko out of Central Bucks East (Penn.) High School with the No. 24 overall selection.

This year is the 57th Amateur Draft and the 26th draft in Rays history. It was on June 8, 1965 that the Oakland Athletics selected Arizona State outfielder Rick Monday with the first-ever pick. Since its inception, over 67,000 players have been selected in the First-Year Player Draft. The Rays have made 1,231 of those. Among the major sports, baseball was the last to adopt a draft. The NFL was first in 1936, followed by the NBA in 1947 and NHL in 1962.



X-RAY REPORT

- Six Rays staffers, including Kevin Cash and Erik Neander, slipped away from the Winter Meetings in San Diego in 2019 to drive to Los Angeles and meet with Yoshi in person following an introductory phone call...the Rays presented a 20-page information guide on the team and Tampa Bay area in an effort to elevate his interest in signing...the group met at a facility owned by Nolan Arenado, who shared the same agent.
- Yoshi became the fourth Japanese-born player in Rays history, following Hideo Nomo (2005), Akinori Iwamura (2007-09) and Hideki Matsui (2012)...Iwamura is the only other Japanese-born player to begin his major league career with the Rays—he signed a three-year contract after playing with the Tokyo Yakult Swallows.
- Yoshi spent 10 seasons with the Yokohama DeNA BayStars in Japan's Nippon Professional Baseball Organization...following his signing with the Rays, Yokohama shared a 2-minute, 25-second farewell video on social media saying, "a samurai from Yokohama is making the move to Tampa Bay"...the number five in Kanji is pronounced 'go,' meaning the length of the video could be read as "two-two-go."
- During his at-bats, Yoshi's home crowd would extend their arms and chant: "Up high into the sky of Yokohama, hit a home run, Tsutsugo!"
- Yoshi wore No. 25 for seven of his 10 seasons in NPB...the number was bestowed to him by former teammate and fellow NPB star Shuichi Murata...the gesture is seen as a great honor.
- He was named Yokohama's youngest team captain in franchise history in 2015.
- He has a fraternal twin sister who he says "looks nothing like me"...her talents favor tennis.

- Yoshi picked up "some broken Spanish" during his time playing for the Leones del Escogido in the Dominican Winter League...he says it is his hidden talent.

2020 SEASON

- Appeared in 51 games and made 42 starts (19-DH,12-LF, 11-3B) in his first major league season...led the team and ranked 2nd among major league rookies with 26 BB behind SEA Kyle Lewis (34)...tied for 3rd among rookies with 27 runs and tied for 4th with 8 HR.
- Hit leadoff seven times, all in his last 10 games.
- Had a higher avg. against lefties (.243) than righties (.183), but 35 of his 42 starts came vs. RHP.
- On Opening Day vs. TOR, homered off Hyun Jin Ryu in the 5th inning, his first career hit...became the sixth Japanese-born player to homer in his major league debut, joining LAD Kenta Maeda in 2016, CHC Kosuke Fukudome in 2008, SEA Kenji Johjima in 2006, NYM Kazuo Matsui in 2004 and STL Keith McDonald in 2000...he was the first Japanese-born player to homer on Opening Day since MIL Nori Aoki in 2013 and first in the AL since NYY Hideki Matsui in 2010.
- Was the 24th player to homer in his Rays debut, first since Willy Adames in 2018...became the sixth Ray to homer in his major league debut, joining Adames, Brandon Guyer in 2011, Elijah Dukes in 2007, Delmon Young in 2006 and Brent Abernathy in 2001.
- On Aug 1 at BAL, flied into a double play to lead off the 10th inning—the first leadoff double play in MLB history, according to Elias Sports Bureau.
- **POSTSEASON:** Hit .125 (2-for-16) in 8 games (3 starts)...made his postseason debut in a Game 1 start in the Wild Card Series vs. TOR, going



0-for-2...also started Game 3 of the ALDS at NYY and Game 4 of the ALCS at HOU.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Over the 2016-19 seasons, led NPB with 139 HR and ranked 3rd with 372 RBI...hit .293/.401/.574 (566-for-1,931) over that stretch...made the Central League All-Star Team in five consecutive years from 2015-19.

third rehab start after 2.1 IP due to fatigue and was scratched from a potential fourth rehab start due to renewed oblique discomfort.

- ♦ At the time of his injury, was tied for 2nd in the NL with 8 wins and ranked 10th with a 3.20 ERA.
- ♦ Took the loss in his season debut but won eight consecutive decisions spanning 12 starts from April 7–June 9, the longest streak of his career.
- ♦ On June 3 vs. PIT, lost a no-hitter when pinch-hitter Colin Moran singled to lead off the 9th inning on his 111th and final pitch...marked the second time in his career he took a no-hitter into the 9th, following Sep 24, 2013 vs. WAS.
- ♦ In **2017**, made a career-high-tying 30 starts and recorded a career-high 158 SO...his 0.92 HR/9 IP ratio was the 3rd-lowest in the NL.
- ♦ Went 4-1 with a 1.93 ERA (32.2-IP, 7-ER) in 5 starts in July...ranked among NL leaders in wins (tied for 1st), WHIP (0.83, 2nd) and ERA (6th).
- ♦ On July 1 vs. WAS, pitched six scoreless innings and recorded the win on his 26th birthday... was the 21st time a Cardinals starter won on his birthday and the seventh to do so in a scoreless outing...reached 500 career strikeouts in his 106th game, tying Steve Carlton as the 2nd-fastest Cardinals pitcher to reach the milestone behind Lance Lynn (101 career games).

- ♦ Pitched a 9-inning shutout on July 18 at NYM, the first of his career.
- ♦ In **2016**, went 7-7 in 27 apps (24 starts), finishing the season on a 5-game winning streak on the heels of a career-high seven consecutive losing decisions...was on the injured list from Aug 9–Sep 13 with right shoulder inflammation.
- ♦ Made 4 apps (1 start) after being reinstated and pitched to a 17.55 ERA (6.2-IP, 13-ER)...this stretch increased his season ERA from 4.45 to 5.09.

- ♦ In **2014**, made the Cardinals Opening Day roster for the first time and started their second game of the season...limited to 19 starts with a stint on the 60-day IL for a right shoulder stress reaction.
- ♦ On April 23 at NYM, recorded a career-high 10 SO but issued a then-career-high 5 BB...his first 9 outs came via strikeout...was the fourth time since Baseball Reference data is available (1901) a pitcher reached double-digit strikeouts in an outing of 4 IP (or fewer).
- ♦ **POSTSEASON**: Surrendered the series-ending 3-run homer to Travis Ishikawa in the 9th inning of Game 5 of the NLCS at SF...marked his first game action since Sep 26 at ARI, and the first time he pitched in relief in the postseason.
- ♦ Was on the postseason roster for the NLDS against the Dodgers but did not pitch.
- ♦ In **2013**, reached the majors in his second professional season, making 15 apps (9 starts) for the Cardinals...was the fastest in club history to debut after being drafted since Cris Carpenter was selected in 1987 and debuted in May 1988.
- ♦ Was on the active roster from May 30–June 13, Aug 10-29 and Sep 3 through season's end.



- On May 30 vs. KC, made his major league debut and yielded 1 run in 7 IP but did not factor in the decision...was in line for the win until the Cardinals bullpen allowed 3 runs in the 9th inning of a 4-2 loss...the game included 5 hours, 32 minutes of rain delays and ended at 3:14 a.m.
- On June 11 at NYM, recorded his first career win in his third start, yielding 2 runs in 6 IP.
- On Sep 24 vs. WAS, in his final start of the regular season, allowed an infield single to Ryan Zimmerman to lose a no-hitter after 8.2 IP.
- Made 15 starts for Triple-A Memphis and was named to the Pacific Coast League midseason All-Star Team...threw 22 pitches and retired all 5 BF in relief, claiming the PCL's Top Star Award.

- His scoreless streak ended at 18.2 IP in the World Series...it remains the longest postseason scoreless streak by a rookie in major league history.



- ◆ He was honored by the Philadelphia Sports Writers Association (PSWA) with its Native Son Award in 2019...other winners of the award include Mike Piazza, the NBA's Kyle Lowry and U.S. women's soccer standout Carli Lloyd.
- ◆ Joey received his bachelor's degree in pre-physical therapy at West Chester and was named first team CoSIDA Academic All-American in 2012...prior to being drafted by the Indians, he planned to attend school for physical therapy and had gone as far as applying to a

- ◆ Was the Rays recipient of the MLB Alumni Association's Heart and Hustle Award...the award honors active players who demonstrate a passion for the game of baseball and best embody the values, spirit and tradition of the game...it is also the only award in MLB that is voted on by former players.

- ◆ His 24 hits through the end of April tied for 3rd for a rookie in club history, behind Rocco Baldelli (40) in 2003 and Delmon Young (26) in 2007.
- ◆ On April 9 at CWS, hit his first homer as a Ray, coming in the 5th inning off Miguel González.

X-RAY REPORT

- Ryan conducted a 12-day holiday giveaway through his Instagram account (@yarbro48) following the 2020 season...each day, he posted a question with a prize, such as a signed baseball, offered to the top response...the idea came as a result of Ryan looking for ways to engage with fans after not being able to do so last season.
- Ryan and his wife, Nicole, donated a collection of school supplies, hygiene products and uniforms to Campbell Park Elementary last year... they also partnered with Buddy Brew Coffee in Tampa to deliver coffee and pastries to the St. Joseph's Children's Hospital critical care unit during the initial quarantine.
- With the popular Reading with the Rays program restricted to a virtual setting, Ryan took up the mantle as its top reader in 2020...he recorded himself reading three different children's books and the videos were shared on a variety of digital platforms.
- Ryan's alma mater, Old Dominion, lines its outfield wall with photos of major leaguers that have come through the program...Ryan and Rays bench coach Matt Quatramo were both invited back for a banquet in honor of being added to the wall in January 2019.
- He grew up a Rays fan and kept some 2008 World Series gear in his bedroom of his Lakeland home, which he found after he was acquired in a four-player trade from the Mariners...he admired David Price, James Shields and Scott Kazmir as a youngster, and still has a Kazmir jersey he received as a 15-year-old hanging in his closet.
- Ryan and Nicole were married in 2019 at the Omni Hotel and Resort at ChampionsGate...past and present Rays in attendance included Austin

Meadows, Austin Pruitt, Mallex Smith, Ryne Stanek and Shane McClanahan...former Rays pitcher Jake Faria was a groomsman.

- Nicole won a national championship in lacrosse with Florida Southern in 2016...she began playing when she was eight but happily retired from the sport when her collegiate career ended.
- Ryan and Nicole own a 3-year-old chocolate lab named Cooper.

2020 SEASON

- Totaled 11 apps (9 starts), with his first 8 apps coming from the starting rotation.
- Missed a start while on the 10-day IL for left groin tightness from Aug 29-Sep 6.
- Allowed 2 runs (or fewer) in seven of his 11 apps, including four scoreless outings, but yielded 4 runs (or more) in his other 4 apps.

- ◆ Made his third straight Opening Day roster, first as a regular member of the starting rotation.
- ◆ On Sep 15 vs. WAS, pitched in relief for the first time since Aug 6, 2019 vs. TOR...followed opener John Curtiss and his only run allowed in 5.2 IP was a RBI groundout in the 6th inning...marked his first win since Aug 11, 2019 at SEA.
- ◆ **POSTSEASON:** Went 1-0 with a 3.68 ERA (14.2-IP, 6-ER) in 5 apps (2 starts).

- ◆ NYM Roger McDowell (14) in 1986 and the most by a lefty reliever since DET John Hiller (17) in 1974...was one shy of matching NYG Hoyt Wilhelm (15) in 1952 for the major league record by a rookie reliever.
 - ◆ Led AL rookies with 147.1 IP and 128 SO...was the third Ray to lead AL rookies in wins, joining Wade Davis in 2010 and Rolando Arrojo in 1998.
 - ◆ Went 14-4 with a 3.72 ERA (118.2-IP, 49-ER) in 32 apps out of the bullpen and 2-2 with a 4.71 ERA (28.2-IP, 15-ER) in 6 starts.
 - ◆ His 118.2 IP out of the bullpen were the most for any reliever since TOR Duane Ward (127.2 IP) in 1990 and the most for a rookie reliever since TOR Mark Eichhorn (157 IP) 1986...broke the club record previously held by Rick White (105.2 IP) in 1999...made 23 relief apps of at least 3 IP, most for a pitcher since Eichhorn (26) in 1986...his 18 relief apps of at least 4 IP were the most since BOS Bob Stanley (18) in 1982.
 - ◆ Yielded a team-high 18 HR, including 15 HR out of the bullpen, most among major league relievers and a club record among relievers.
 - ◆ Three of his 16 wins came against the Yankees, joining Chris Archer in 2013 as the only rookies in franchise history to do that.
 - ◆ Spent nearly the entire season on the active roster...was optioned to Durham on April 29 but recalled on May 1 due to an injury...did not appear in a game for the Bulls.
 - ◆ On March 31 vs. BOS, made his major league debut in relief, yielding 1 run in 4 IP...did not factor in the decision of a 3-2 loss.
 - ◆ On April 28 at BOS, recorded his first career win, replacing Yonny Chirinos with the bases loaded



and no outs in the 3rd inning without allowing a run to score...yielded an RBI single to Hanley Ramirez in the 4th and solo homer to Rafael Devers in the 5th, but left with a 7-5 lead.



X-RAY REPORT

- ◆ Mike and his wife, Alyssa, have two children: Rhett (1) and Paisley, who was born in March 2020...their beagle, Zoey, and Australian shepherd, Sadie, round out the family...a silver lining to last year's delayed season was that Mike was home for several months around Paisley's birth.
- ◆ Following his return from paternity leave on April 22, 2019, Mike remarked to media pregame that he hoped to benefit from newfound "dad strength"...he later belted his first home run of the season in the 7th inning—a tie-breaking 2-run shot...after the game, he told the *Tampa Bay Times*: "It was something special. And then to get the [photos of Rhett watching] and everything afterward, it's the icing on the cake."
- ◆ Mike's parents met in Italy while playing in the country's premier baseball and softball leagues...his father, Greg, was selected by the Yankees in the 1981 Amateur Draft and is a southeast crosschecker for the Reds...his mother, Paola, was a catcher on the Italian national softball team...she was born in Bologna, Italy, and taught him to speak a little Italian as a kid, but he lost it as he grew older.
- ◆ Mike and Alyssa were married in October 2012, after his junior season at Florida...they left the next day for their "honeymoon" in Arizona for Mike to participate in the Arizona Fall League.
- ◆ Mike grew up a Marlins fan and has memories of attending games at Joe Robbie Stadium, now Hard Rock Stadium.

2020 SEASON

- ◆ Appeared in 28 games and made 25 starts, all at catcher, in an injury-shortened season...placed

on the 10-day IL (left oblique strain) on Aug 29, retroactive to Aug 26, and reinstated on Sep 20.

- ◆ Recorded 3 HR and 9 RBI in his final 14 games, after 1 HR and 1 RBI in his first 14 games.
- ◆ Struck out in 37 of 84 PA (44.0 pct.), 4th in the majors (min. 50 PA)...the highest rate for a qualified hitter was MIN Miguel Sanó (43.9).
- ◆ Eight of his 11 hits (72.7 pct.) went for extra bases (4-2B, 4-HR), including eight of nine before hitting a pair of singles in his final start.
- ◆ Hit .045 (1-for-22) against left-handed pitching and his only hit was a 3-run homer on Aug 20 at NYY, off Luis Avilan...hit .189 (10-for-53) with 4 2B, 3 HR and 7 RBI against righties.
- ◆ Hit .250 (3-for-12) with 1 2B, 2 HR and 4 RBI in 5 games (all starts) against the Yankees and .127 (8-for-63) with 3 2B, 2 HR and 5 RBI in 23 games (20 starts) against all other opponents...doubled and homered in separate games off Gerrit Cole.
- ◆ Made his sixth Opening Day roster and fifth active roster, all starts at catcher.
- ◆ On Aug 19-20 at NYY, homered in back-to-back games for the first time since Aug 7-10, 2019 (2)...the second of these was a 3-run homer in the 6th inning, helping the Rays complete a 3-game sweep and take over first place in the division.
- ◆ **POSTSEASON:** Hit .170 (9-for-53) with 4 HR and 8 RBI while starting 18 of the club's 20 games at catcher...his 4 HR tied KC Salvador Perez in 2015, BOS Jason Varitek in 2003, NYM Mike Piazza in 2000 and OAK Gene Tenace in 1972 for the 2nd-most by a catcher (while playing the position) in a single postseason behind CLE Sandy Alomar (5) in 1997.



- ◆ Became the first player in major league history to hit under .150 in the regular season and then hit multiple homers in the postseason.
- ◆ In Game 2 of the Wild Card Series vs. TOR, hit a 2-run homer off Hyun Jin Ryu in the 2nd inning...became the third catcher in franchise history to hit a postseason homer, joining José Lobaton's walk-off homer in Game 3 of the ALDS vs. BOS and Kelly Shoppach's multi-HR game in Game 1 of the 2011 ALDS vs. TEX.
- ◆ Homered in Games 2 and 7 of the ALCS vs. HOU, both of Lance McCullers Jr.—and these 2 HR went a combined 884 feet...in Game 7, became the first Rays catcher to homer in a “winner take all” game...became the eighth catcher (9th time) all-time to homer in a Game 7, first since CHC David Ross in the 2016 World Series.
- ◆ After becoming a free agent, re-signed with the Rays on Dec 17 for a one-year, \$2 million contract with a club option for 2022.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- ◆ In 2019, hit a then-career-low .165 (44-for-266) in his seventh major league season, first with the Rays...min. 200 AB, his .165 avg. was 3rd-lowest in the majors and 2nd-lowest in club history.
- ◆ Threw out 34.1 pct. (14 of 41) of attempted base stealers, the 3rd-best eraser rate in the majors behind PHI J.T. Realmuto (43.0) and CLE Roberto Pérez (37.0)...his 8 Defensive Runs Saved ranked 3rd among AL catchers, behind Pérez (30) and TOR Danny Jansen (12).



RAYS & MLB VISIT CUBA

On March 20-22, 2016, the Rays traveled to Havana, Cuba, after being selected via lottery to be the first Major League Baseball team to visit Cuba since the 1999 Orioles. The voyage coincided with the historic diplomatic visit of President Barack Obama, the first sitting U.S. President to visit Cuba since Calvin Coolidge in 1928. Among the 55,000 in attendance at Estadio Latinoamericano for the March 21 contest were many dignitaries, including President Obama and the First Lady, Cuban President Raúl Castro, Cuban-born stars Luis Tiant and José Cardenal, MLB Commissioner Rob Manfred, Derek Jeter and Joe Torre. The Rays defeated the Cuban National Team, 4-1.

There were 22 Cuban-born players on 2020 Opening Day rosters, the 3rd-most of any country behind the U.S. and Venezuela. The Rays have had 13 Cuban-born players in franchise history, including Randy Arozarena and Yandy Díaz.

THREE-BATTER MINIMUM

Beginning in 2020, the starting pitcher and any relief pitcher must pitch to a minimum of three batters, until the batters are retired or reach base, or until the half-inning is over. An exception exists if the substitute pitcher sustains injury or illness which, in the Crew Chief's judgment, incapacitates him from pitching. This rule was created in an effort to reduce the number of pitching changes and, in turn, cut down the average game time.

SPECIAL SEATS

Fans at Tropicana Field will notice two golden seats, one white seat and one seat memorialized with a plaque in the right field seating area. The golden seat in the third row of Section 148 is the location where the Rays first home run landed, a two-run shot hit by Wade Boggs off DET Justin Thompson in the 6th inning of the Rays inaugural game on March 31, 1998. The other golden seat, in Section 144, marks the spot where Boggs' 3,000th hit landed, a two-run home run off CLE Chris Haney on Aug 7, 1999. The white seat in Section 140 (Row T, Seat 10) marks the spot where Dan Johnson's two-out, 9th-inning, game-tying home run landed against the Yankees in Game 162 of the 2011 season. Three innings later, Evan Longoria hit a walk-off homer to left field giving the Rays an 8-7 win, clinching the AL Wild Card.

Finally, on July 11, 2015, the Rays dedicated a special seat above the right field walkway that will always remain empty in remembrance of prisoners of war (POW) and those missing in action (MIA). Then-president of baseball operations Matt Silverman and pitcher Matt Moore joined World War II veteran and former POW Andrew H. Hines Jr. and Rep. David Jolly of the 13th Congressional District in the pregame ceremony.

MAJOR LEAGUE WAIVER RULES

There are two types of waiver requests: outright waivers and unconditional release waivers. Both types are irrevocable. Outright waivers are required for a major league club to assign a player outright to a minor league club. Unconditional release waivers can be secured at any point during the year to release a player. After the July 31 trade deadline, the only way clubs can acquire major league players until after the World Series is through waiver claims—a new rule introduced in 2019.

DID YOU KNOW?

CATWALK RUNDOWN

The four catwalks located above the playing surface at Tropicana Field are labeled the A-, B-, C- and D-rings, with the lowest being the D-ring. Any fair ball that hits the lower two catwalks (C, D) is a home run. A fair ball that hits one of the top two catwalks (A, B) is in play. Any fair ball that stays on one of the top two catwalks is a ground-rule double. A foul ball that hits one of the catwalks is a dead ball.

- ◆ The **D-ring** ranges from 59 feet above the playing surface in CF to 121 feet behind home plate.
- ◆ The **C-ring** ranges from 99 feet in CF to 146 feet behind home plate.
- ◆ The **B-ring** ranges from 142 feet in CF to 173 feet behind home plate.
- ◆ The **A-ring** ranges from 181 feet in CF to 194 feet behind home plate.

In 23 seasons, 181 fair balls have hit catwalks: C-ring (96), B (41), D (38), A (6). This includes two during the relocated Rangers-Astros series in 2017 due to the devastation caused by Hurricane Harvey. Not included in that total is one fair ball that struck the roof, off the bat of MIN Miguel Sanó on Aug 7, 2016.

Four fair balls have hit catwalks in the postseason: Evan Longoria homered off the C-ring in Game 1 of the 2008 ALDS vs. CWS, B.J. Upton homered off the C-ring in Game 6 of the 2008 ALCS vs. BOS, Willy Adames homered off the D-ring in Game 4 of the 2019 ALDS vs. HOU and TOR Danny Jansen homered off the D-ring in Game 2 of the 2020 AL Wild Card Series.

Seven times in Tropicana Field history, a fair ball has hit a catwalk and not come down: TEX Joey Gallo, June 30, 2019 (D-ring); TB Avisail García, April 18, 2019 vs. BAL (D-ring); TB John Jaso, Sep 17, 2015 vs. BAL (C-ring); BOS David Ortiz, Sep 17, 2008 (D-ring); BOS Jason Bay, Sep 15, 2008 (C-ring); Carlos Peña, May 26, 2008 vs. TEX (B-ring); and José Canseco, May 2, 1999 vs. DET (B-ring).

Evan Longoria is the all-time leader in fair balls off the catwalk (11) and catwalk home runs (8). Alex Rodriguez and David Ortiz hit the catwalks five times, most of any visiting players. Carlos Peña hit the catwalks five times in 2007, most by any player in one season. All told, 39 different Rays have hit balls off the catwalks in the regular season: Evan Longoria (10), Jonny Gomes (8), Carlos Peña (8), Greg Vaughn (6), Fred McGriff (4), Steven Souza Jr. (3), José Canseco (3), Ben Grieve (3), Willy Adames (2), Curt Casali (2), Carl Crawford (2), Vinny Castilla (2), Avisail García (2), Travis Lee (2), Rocco Baldelli (1), Tim Beckham (1), Corey Dickerson (1), Logan Forsythe (1), Nick Franklin (1), Aubrey Huff (1), John Jaso (1), Matt Joyce (1), Pete LaForest (1), Brandon Lowe (1), Brendan McKay (1), Brad Miller (1), Logan Morrison (1), Eduardo Perez (1), Tommy Pham (1), Sean Rodríguez (1), Jared Sandberg (1), Kelly Shoppach (1), Grady Sizemore (1), Paul Sorrento (1), Bubba Trammell (1), B.J. LET'S PLAY TWO!

The Rays have played 34 doubleheaders in their history, going 5-14-15 (W-L-T). They are 2-4-7 in traditional doubleheaders and 3-10-8 in split doubleheaders. The five times they swept a doubleheader occurred on Sep 17, 2020 at BAL, May 1, 2014 at BOS, June 24, 2012 at PHI, April 28, 2011 at MIN and Sep 23, 2008 at BAL.

Four of these doubleheaders occurred at Tropicana Field, all of them traditional, and each time they split the twin bill.

- ◆ The first Tropicana Field doubleheader, Sep 30, 2004 vs. DET, was a result of games rescheduled due to Hurricane Frances four weeks prior. They lost the first game, 8-0, and won the second, 6-4.
- ◆ On June 10, 2017 vs. OAK, the Rays hosted MLB's first scheduled twin bill since July 16, 2011 (Angels at Athletics). They won the first game, 6-5, on a 10th-inning walk-off single by Evan Longoria. Forty minutes later, they began the next game, a 7-2 loss.
- ◆ On Sep 3, 2019 vs. BAL, the series finale was moved up a day as part of a doubleheader as Hurricane Dorian approached. The Rays lost the first game, 4-2, and won the second, 2-0.
- ◆ On Aug 8, 2020 vs. NYY, a schedule change due to the COVID-19 pandemic prompted a doubleheader. The Rays lost the first game, 8-4, and won the second, 5-3.



DID YOU KNOW?

STORMY WEATHER

The Rays have had games affected by five hurricanes:

- ◆ **Hurricane Dorian (Sep 2-4, 2019):** MLB moved up the Rays-Orioles series finale to be part of a traditional doubleheader on Sep 3—just the third doubleheader in Tropicana Field history. The Rays split the twin bill, and won two of three games in the series.
- ◆ **Hurricane Irma (Sep 11-13, 2017):** MLB moved the three-game series against the Yankees from Tropicana Field to Citi Field in New York. The Rays lost two of three games. It was the fifth time in baseball history that weather concerns forced the relocation of games to a neutral site—but the second in a span of two weeks.
- ◆ **Hurricane Jeanne (Sep 26, 2004):** The Rays and Blue Jays were canceled at Tropicana Field with the storm approaching. The previous night's game, which began at 6:16 p.m., was played with the caveat that no inning could start after 9:15 p.m. The curfew was a precaution to make sure the Blue Jays were able to fly out of Florida after the game.
- ◆ **Hurricane Frances (Sep 3-5, 2004):** MLB postponed two games against the Tigers (Sep 4-5), and the Tigers left St. Pete after the Sep 3 series opener to avoid the storm. The Rays were scheduled to play a Labor Day doubleheader at Yankee Stadium on Sep 6, but were unable to leave Tampa International Airport until 3 p.m. that day. They arrived in New York at 5:25 p.m. and played a single game that night, a 7-4 loss which began at 7 p.m. The postponed game was eventually made up in New York on Sep 23. The Rays and Tigers played (and split) a doubleheader on Sep 30—the first of three ever played at Tropicana Field.
- ◆ **Hurricane Gordon (Sep 17, 2000):** The Rays and Athletics were postponed at Tropicana Field with the storm bearing down. Instead of playing that afternoon, the Athletics flew to Baltimore. The game was never made up, one of three such games in club history.

In addition, Tropicana Field served as a neutral host for a similar situation, as the Rangers-Astros series Aug 29-31, 2017 was moved from Houston due to the devastation caused by Hurricane Harvey. The Astros won two of three games.

The season was shortened to 60 games as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic...Opening Day, which was originally scheduled for March 26, took place on July 24...the Rays won their third AL East title, swept the Blue Jays in the AL Wild Card Series and won "winner take all" games against the Yankees and Astros to advance to the World Series for the second time...the Rays finished the regular season with the best winning pct. in club history...they averaged 4.82 R/G, their highest since 2010 (4.95), and ranked 3rd in the majors with a 3.56 ERA...the Rays had 12 pitchers with a save, tying the major league record set by the 1973 Rangers...from Aug 9–Sep 1, their injured list grew from four to a club-record-tying 13 players—and they went a major-league-best 18-4 (.818) over that stretch.

The Rays advanced to the postseason for the fifth time in club history, third as a Wild Card...they won the AL Wild Card Game in Oakland before falling to the Astros in a decisive Game 5 in the ALDS...they recorded their seventh 90-win season in 12 years as the Rays, and their 96 wins fell one shy of the club record (2008)...the Rays used 57 players and 33 pitchers, both setting single-season club records...they led the AL with a 3.65 ERA, becoming the first team in major league history to lead their league in ERA while using at least 33 pitchers...the Rays bullpen led the majors with a 3.66 ERA...the Rays went 48-33 on the road, a team record for road wins in a season...the Rays ended the regular season with a club-record 39 players on their active roster.

2018 / 90-72, .556, 3rd, -18.0

The Rays finished with 90 wins, their most since 2013 (92) and tops in the majors among teams missing the postseason...the Rays became the first team in AL history to start 3-12 or worse and finish at least 10 games over .500...they set single-season club records by using 17 starting pitchers and 23 rookies...according to Stats LLC, the Rays were the first team in major league history to use at least 23 rookies and finish at least 18 games over .500...Blake Snell captured the AL Cy Young Award...while popularizing the "opener" concept, the Rays bullpen combined for 824.1 IP, shattering the major league record by 167.1 IP, ahead of the 2012 Rockies (657 IP)...the club's avg. increased by 13 points and on-base pct. increased by 16 points over 2017, both the largest improvements in the majors.

2017 / 80-82, .494, 3rd, -13.0

The Rays finished with a 12-win improvement over 2016, matching the 2nd-largest increase in club history...they used a then-club-record 53 players, as 23 players served 27 stints on the injured list and three times a club-record-tying 13 players were on the injured list...they hit a club-record 228 HR but ranked 25th in the majors and 14th in the AL with 694 runs...48 pct. of their runs scored via the home run, the highest rate in club history...the win in the regular season finale was the 1,500th win in franchise history.

2016 / 68-94, .420, 5th, -25.0

The Rays finished with their fewest wins since 2007, due in part to a 3-24 stretch between June 16–July 16, the worst 27-game stretch by any AL club in a season since the Tigers began the 2003 season at 3-25...the offense had a then-club-record 536 XBH and then-club-record 216 HR but scored only 672 runs, joining the 2016 Mets (218 HR, 671 runs) as the first two teams in major league history to hit at least 200 HR and score fewer than 700 runs...they went 13-27 (.325) in 1-run games, the worst mark in franchise history.

2015 / 80-82, .494, 4th, -13.0

The Rays finished 6 games out of a postseason berth despite making 145 roster moves during the season...21 players spent a total of 26 stints on the injured list...rookie manager Kevin Cash was forced to use a then-club-record 18 rookies...the Rays went a major-league-worst 2-13 (.133) in extra innings...Rays starters led the AL with a 3.63 ERA, the third time in five years they did so.

2014 / 77-85, .475, 4th, -19.0

The Rays went 41-40 on the road, their fifth straight season of playing .500 or better in road games...they were 24-42 after 66 games, but went 53-43 the rest of the way...this included a 37-19 stretch to climb to 61-61 on Aug 15, becoming the fourth team in major league history—second Rays team—to reach .500 after being 18 games below...Rays pitchers recorded 22 shutouts, the most by an AL team since the 1972 Athletics (23), one year before the DH rule was instituted...Rays starters posted a 3.48 ERA, best mark by a sub-.500 team since the 1983 Rangers.

2013 / 92-71, .564, 2nd, -5.5, Wild Card

The Rays reached the postseason in their 163rd game, winning a tiebreaker at Texas, the 14th team



in major league history to reach in that fashion... they won the AL Wild Card Game in Cleveland before falling to the Red Sox in 4 games in the ALDS...it was their fourth postseason trip in six years...with only 59 errors, the Rays and Orioles (54) both broke the all-time mark for fewest errors in a season...the Rays committed 55 fewer errors than in 2012 (114), the biggest drop by any team since the 1964 Washington Senators (55)...Rays pitchers posted the lowest opp avg. (.240) in the AL for the fourth straight season, the first AL staff to do so since the 1982-85 Tigers.

2012 / 90-72, .556, 3rd, -5.0

The Rays won their 90th game on the final day, giving them three straight seasons of 90 wins or more...despite being the youngest among the three major sports franchises in Tampa Bay, the Rays became the first to record five straight winning seasons...the 577 runs allowed were fewest by an AL team since the 1990 Athletics (570)...the Rays led the majors with a 3.19 ERA, .228 opp avg. and 1,383 SO, joining the 1999 Red Sox as the only teams in the last 30 years to lead the AL in all three categories...their .228 opp avg. was the lowest by an AL team in the DH era (since 1973)...David Price won the club's first AL Cy Young Award.

2011 / 91-71, .562, 2nd, -6.0, Wild Card

The Rays advanced to the postseason for the third time in four seasons, first time as the AL Wild Card winner...they were 9 GB of playoff contention through Sep 3 and came back to clinch a postseason berth on the final day of the season...the 9-game deficit is the largest any team has overcome in September to advance to the postseason...the Rays became the third major league team (first AL team) to advance to the postseason after starting the season 0-6 and just the second team to advance to the postseason after starting 1-8...the Rays used 16 rookies, tying the club record (2001) at the time.

2010 / 96-66, .593, 1st, +1.0

With 96 wins, the Rays led the AL in wins for the first time and won their second AL East title... they were a major-league-best 47-34 on the road, marking the team's first winning season on the road in club history...they became the second team in modern major league history (since 1900) to score 800 runs (802) while hitting .250 or lower (.247), joining the 1991 Tigers...the offense walked a club-record and major-league-high 672 times and became just the fifth team all-time to lead the AL in walks and strikeouts in the same season and make the postseason...the Rays became the second team all-time to reach the postseason after being no-hit twice in one year, joining the 1917 White

Sox...the Rays and Yankees were separated by no more than 2.5 games every day after July 27.

2009 / 84-78, .519, 3rd, -19.0

With 84 wins, the Rays became just the eighth team all-time to win 180 games over two seasons after losing 180 games the previous two seasons...the Rays recorded a club-record 194 SB and then-club-record 199 HR...only one other team in major league history surpassed 190 HR and 190 SB in the same season: the 1996 Rockies...the Rays used just seven different starting pitchers, fewest in the majors and tied for fewest in club history (2010).

2008 / 97-65, .599, 1st, +2.0

In their first season as the "Rays," the club shocked the world by capturing the AL pennant...they became just the second team in major league history to advance to the postseason after owning the worst record in the majors the year before, joining the 1991 Braves...their 97 wins were the most ever by a team that finished the previous season with the majors' worst record...the Rays improved 31 games from 2007, the 3rd-greatest turnaround in AL history...they became the second team all-time to win 95-plus games a year after losing 95-plus...the Rays lowered their ERA from a major-league-worst 5.53 in 2007 to 3.82, the 4th-greatest turnaround in the modern era (since 1900).

2007 / 66-96, .407, 5th, -30.0

Led by AL strikeout champion Scott Kazmir, Rays pitchers topped the league with 1,194 SO...the Rays became the first team to lead the AL in strikeouts and post the league's highest ERA (5.53)...the bullpen pitched to a 6.16 ERA, the first bullpen since the 1953 Tigers to record an ERA in excess of 6.00.

2006 / 61-101, .377, 5th, -36.0

The Rays became the first team in major league history to lose 100 games or more and have a winning record at home (41-40)...beginning on July 1, the Rays went 3-33 (.086) away from Tropicana Field, the worst road record after July 1 in modern major league history (since 1900).

2005 / 67-95, .414, 5th, -28.0

The Rays fashioned a 39-34 (.534) record after the All-Star break, an improvement of .219 pct. points over their 28-61 (.315) mark before the All-Star break...it marked the AL's 4th-best turnaround behind the 1935 St. Louis Browns (+.279), 2001 Athletics (+.267) and the 1944 Tigers (+.222)... they finished with a .274 team avg., tying the best in franchise history and 3rd-best in the majors behind the Red Sox (.281) and Yankees (.276).



2004 / 70-91, .435, 4th, -30.5

On June 26, the Rays became the first team in history to climb over .500 after being 18 games or more under .500...they were 10-28 on May 19, but went 26-7 in their next 33 games to improve to 36-35...through May 19, the Rays had the worst record in the majors (10-28)...over the next seven weeks (May 20-July 7), they had the best record at 32-13...the Rays won a club-record 12 consecutive games, June 9-22, and lost 12 straight, Aug 27-Sep 10, joining the 1987 Brewers as the only teams in major league history to win 12 or more in a row and lose 12 or more in a row in the same season.

2003 / 63-99, .389, 5th, -38.0

Tampa native Lou Piniella returned home, and in his first year as Rays manager led them to an 8-game improvement over 2002...the Rays were just 7 games under .500 after the All-Star break (31-38), compared to 28 games under in the first half (32-60)...the Rays played 90 games decided by 2 runs or fewer and went 39-51 in them.

2002 / 55-106, .342, 5th, -48.0

The Rays became the first team to lose 100 games in back-to-back seasons since the 1977-79 Blue Jays and reached 100 losses quicker than any AL club since the 1949 Senators...they lost 16 games after leading in the 8th or 9th inning, including 10 with 1 out or 2 outs in the 9th.

2001 / 62-100, .383, 5th, -34.0

The Rays became the first AL team to lose 100 games since the 1996 Tigers, but they went 24-23 starting on Aug 10...they were 27-61 during the first half and 35-39 in the second half.

2000 / 69-92, .429, 5th, -18.0

Due to injuries, the Rays employed 38 players by May 28...through the team's first 79 games, the Rays lost José Canseco (heel), Vinny Castilla (rib, back), Greg Vaughn (hamstring) and Gerald Williams (hip) for a combined total of 84 days due to injury...the Rays had the "Hit Show" (Canseco, Fred McGriff, Vaughn, Castilla) in the lineup together for only 38 of 109 games before Canseco was claimed off waivers by the Yankees on Aug 7.

1999 / 69-93, .426, 5th, -29.0

The Rays suffered the most injuries in the majors, as 18 different players totaled 22 stints on the injured list after Opening Day...15 of the Rays 25-man Opening Day roster spent time on the injured list, including eight of the 11 pitchers and four of the five pitchers in the season-opening starting rotation.

1998 / 63-99, .389, 5th, -51.0

The Rays finished in the AL's top five in fielding pct. (2nd) and ERA (4th), the only expansion team to ever make that claim in its first season...they became the first expansion team ever to go 4 games over .500 at any point in their first season when they were 10-6 on April 19...the Rays became the third expansion team among the four major sports (MLB, NFL, NHL, NBA) to reach 4 games over .500 at any point in their first season...the NHL's Philadelphia Flyers (15-9-5) and the Los Angeles Kings (10-6-3) both did it in 1967...the Vegas Golden Knights (5-1-0) joined this list in 2017.

RAYS CHRONOLOGY

MARCH 9, 1995

At a meeting in West Palm Beach, Fla., baseball owners officially welcome the Tampa Bay Devil Rays and Arizona Diamondbacks as the 13th and 14th expansion teams in major league history by a vote of 28-0.

APRIL 27, 1995

The Rays and the City of St. Petersburg agree on a 30-year lease for the team to play their home games at the ThunderDome.

JULY 19, 1995

Chuck LaMar is named Rays Senior Vice President of Baseball Operations and General Manager.

SEPTEMBER 26, 1995

The Rays sign their first player: pitcher Adam Sisk, a 6-foot-4 righthander from Edison Community College in Fort Myers, Fla.

MAY 7, 1996

The Rays announce they will become the first team in the modern era (since 1900) to host spring training in their home city in 1998. The NL's St. Louis Cardinals will leave after training in St. Petersburg since 1946.

JUNE 3, 1996

The Rays begin their first mini-camp as 24 players, all minor league free agents signed before the Amateur Draft, assemble at the Huggins-Stengel complex in St. Petersburg under the watchful eye of the Rays coaching staff directed by field coordinator Tom Foley.

JUNE 4, 1996

Outfielder and first baseman Paul Wilder becomes the Rays first-ever draft pick as the team participates in its first Amateur Draft. Rays Managing Partner Vince Naimoli announces the selection while in the team's "war room" at the Stouffer-Vinoy Resort in St. Petersburg. The Rays eventually select 97 players, the fifth-highest total ever taken in the history of the Amateur Draft.

JUNE 19, 1996

The first Rays game is played. A Gulf Coast League record crowd of 7,582 are on hand at Al Lang Stadium as the GCL Devil Rays host their Yankee counterparts. A 10-1 loss can't dim the festive atmosphere nor the unbridled affection

that is showered down on the young Rays. The game was carried live by News Radio 970 WFLA and SportsChannel Florida. Eighteen-year-old righthander Pablo Ortega throws the first Rays pitch (a ball).

JUNE 19, 1996

Butte Copper Kings infielder Jim Kerr hits the first home run in Rays history in their Pioneer League opener against Idaho Falls.

JUNE 20, 1996

The first win in the history of the Rays organization, a 4-3 triumph over the Gulf Coast League Astros. Eighteen-year-old Jose Rodriguez from the Dominican Republic gets the win.

OCTOBER 3, 1996

Tropicana Field is born. The Rays and Tropicana Dole Beverages North America of nearby Bradenton, Fla., announce an agreement to rename the ThunderDome.

OCTOBER 7, 1996

Vince Naimoli and St. Petersburg Mayor David Fischer preside over the official groundbreaking ceremony for a 15-month, \$63 million renovation of Tropicana Field.

JANUARY 16, 1997

The Rays are voted into the AL by a 28-2 count among MLB owners, becoming the Junior Circuit's 15th franchise. The decision is announced at the owner's meetings in Phoenix.

SEPTEMBER 9, 1997

The Rays organization celebrates the first championship as Manager Bill Evers' St. Petersburg Rays beat Vero Beach, 5-1, at Al Lang to win the Class-A Florida State League Championship.

OCTOBER 15, 1997

MLB approves a resolution creating a 16-team NL and a 14-team AL for the 1998 season, meaning the Rays will be located in the AL East Division.

NOVEMBER 7, 1997

Florida Marlins pitching coach Larry Rothschild is named the first Rays manager.



NOVEMBER 11, 1997

The Rays acquire outfielder Mike Kelly from the Cincinnati Reds for a player to be named later. Kelly becomes the first player to be added to the 40-man major league roster. This is the Rays first-ever trade involving a major league player.

NOVEMBER 18, 1997

The Rays select 35 players in the Major League Expansion Draft. The Rays select left-handed pitcher Tony Saunders from the Marlins with the first pick in the draft.

FEBRUARY 15, 1998

The Rays first major league spring training camp opens. Fifty-one players, including 41 pitchers, take the field at 9:35 a.m. for a three-hour workout at the Rays Spring Training Complex in St. Petersburg. The day is also marred by the team's first injury as catcher Cesar Devarez suffers a dislocated left knee cap.

FEBRUARY 26, 1998

The first spring training game involving Rays major leaguers takes place. The Rays beat Florida State University at Al Lang Stadium. The Rays use 30 players in the win over FSU and rally from a 3-1 deficit with a five-run 8th inning. Matt White is the Rays starting pitcher and Jason Johnson gets the win.

MARCH 2, 1998

Tampa Bay wins its first major league spring training game, 6-2, over the visiting Royals. Lefty Ryan Karp is the winner as the Rays win it with a four-run rally in the 7th inning.

MARCH 27, 1998

In the first game at Tropicana Field, the Rays beat Atlanta, 5-0, in an exhibition game that draws 26,519. Rolando Arrojo beats Tom Glavine and Russ Mormon hits the first home run, a 380-foot shot to left-center.

MARCH 31, 1998

It all begins. The Rays lose to the Tigers, 11-6, in Tampa Bay's first official major league game before 45,369 fans. It remains the largest home crowd in franchise history.

APRIL 1, 1998

"Say hello to victory, Tampa Bay," says Rays radio voice Paul Olden as the Rays win for the first time, 11-8, over Detroit. Cuban ace Rolando Arrojo is the winner in his major league debut.

JUNE 21, 1998

Raymond, the team's mascot, debuts prior to the Rays-Red Sox game at Tropicana Field.

AUGUST 7, 1999

Wade Boggs homers at Tropicana Field off Indians lefthander Chris Haney for his 3,000th career hit. Boggs is the first to reach the milestone with a home run.

APRIL 18, 2001

Hal McRae is named the second manager in club history, replacing Larry Rothschild.

OCTOBER 28, 2002

Tampa native Lou Piniella is named manager of the Rays.

MARCH 30, 2004

The Rays open the major league season at the Tokyo Dome in Japan with an 8-3 win over the Yankees in front of 55,000 and a national TV audience.

JUNE 26, 2004

The Rays beat the Marlins, 6-4, and become the first team in history to climb over .500 after being 18 or more games below .500. The Rays were 10-28 on May 19, but 26-7 in their next 33 games to get to 36-35.

OCTOBER 6, 2005

Stuart Sternberg becomes the principal owner of the Rays and takes control of the operation of the organization. Matt Silverman is named club president. Sternberg announces that the team will offer free parking at all Rays home games in 2006, making the Rays the only major league baseball franchise to offer free parking on all team-owned lots.

NOVEMBER 3, 2005

The Rays announce that Andrew Friedman will oversee the Rays baseball operations efforts and that former NL Executive of the Year Gerry Hunsicker will be brought on to assist Friedman.

NOVEMBER 15, 2005

The Rays name Angels bench coach Joe Maddon as the fourth manager in team history.

DECEMBER 2005

The Rays begin a \$10 million refurbishment of Tropicana Field. Bathrooms are renovated, 35,000 seats are cleaned and painted, concrete walls are



covered with stucco and drywall, the suite and club sections are upgraded, new directional signs and outdoor awnings are added and a new sound system is installed. Concourses are converted into interactive fun zones for all fans.

SEPTEMBER 20, 2006

The Rays and the Board of County Commissioners of Charlotte County, Fla., formally sign a 20-year agreement for the Rays to conduct spring training at a renovated Charlotte Sports Park beginning in February 2009.

JANUARY 2007

For the second consecutive year, improvements are made to Tropicana Field. The changes—estimated at \$8 million and paid for by the club—include a new look to the exterior of the stadium and a state-of-the-art 36'-by-64' full-color scoreboard. The FieldTurf surface installed before the 2000 season is replaced by the very latest FieldTurf product.

MAY 15-17, 2007

In another step toward creating a more regional presence for the team, the Rays play the first regular season major league games ever in Orlando and sweep the Rangers in a three-game series at The Ballpark at Disney's Wide World of Sports Complex.

NOVEMBER 8, 2007

The organization launches new uniforms, new colors, a new icon and a new name—the Rays. The rebranding effort begins with a fashion show in downtown St. Petersburg and a free concert by Hollywood's Kevin Costner and his band Modern West. Approximately 7,000 attend the event at Straub Park.

SEPTEMBER 9, 2008

The Rays call up Dan Johnson from Durham, who arrives at Fenway Park at game time. His 2-run, pinch-hit homer in the 9th off Jonathan Papelbon gives the Rays a 5-4 win, keeping them in first place over the Red Sox.

SEPTEMBER 20, 2008

The Rays defeat the Twins, 7-2, at Tropicana Field in front of a national TV audience and clinch their first postseason appearance.

SEPTEMBER 26, 2008

The Rays lose at the Tigers, 6-4, but clinch the AL East title when the Red Sox lose to Yankees, 19-8.

OCTOBER 19, 2008

Matt Garza starts it and rookie David Price finishes it as the Rays win Game 7 of the ALCS, 3-1, to clinch the AL pennant in front of 40,473 at Tropicana Field.

OCTOBER 22, 2008

The Rays host the Phillies in their first World Series game, becoming just the second team in major league history to compete in the World Series a year after having the worst record in the majors.

FEBRUARY 25, 2009

The Rays play the Reds in their first spring training game at Charlotte Sports Park after training in St. Petersburg for 11 years. Carl Crawford gets the first hit in the newly renovated park, but the Rays manage only three other hits and fall, 7-0.

JULY 26, 2010

Matt Garza throws the first no-hitter in franchise history in a 5-0 win over the Tigers at Tropicana Field.

OCTOBER 3, 2010

The Rays clinch their second AL East title on the last day of the regular season, breaking a tie with the Yankees. The Yankees lose at the Red Sox, clinching it for the Rays who later win, 3-2, in 12 innings at the Royals.

SEPTEMBER 28-29, 2011

It's been called the greatest day of the regular season in major league history. The Red Sox lose at 12:02 a.m. and the Rays beat the Yankees 8-7 on a walk-off home run by Evan Longoria at 12:05 a.m. As a result, the Rays win the AL Wild Card, completing the greatest September comeback ever.

NOVEMBER 14, 2012

The Baseball Writers' Association of America announces left-handed pitcher David Price as the winner of the 2012 AL Cy Young Award.

SEPTEMBER 30, 2013

The Rays win the 14th tiebreaker game in major league history, 5-2 over the Rangers, punching a post-season ticket for the fourth time in six years. David Price becomes the fifth pitcher in baseball history to earn a complete-game victory in a one-game playoff.

DECEMBER 3, 2013

The Rays announce a major upgrade to Tropicana Field to significantly enhance the fan experience, creating a 360-degree pedestrian circulation around the lower seating bowl at Tropicana Field.



JUNE 4, 2014

The Rays beloved Senior Advisor Don Zimmer passes away at age 83.

OCTOBER 14, 2014

Matt Silverman is named president of baseball operations, replacing Andrew Friedman, who had recently accepted a similar role with the Dodgers. Brian Auld is named team president following Silverman.

DECEMBER 5, 2014

Tampa native Kevin Cash is named the fifth manager in club history.

JANUARY 14, 2016

By a 5-3 vote, St. Petersburg City Council members agree to give the Rays three years to search for a new stadium site in Pinellas and Hillsborough counties.

MARCH 20-22, 2016

The Rays travel to Havana, Cuba to play the Cuban National Team in an exhibition at Estadio Latinoamericano, joining the 1999 Orioles as the only major league clubs to play a game in Cuba in the last 57 years. The Rays prevail, 4-1, before an estimated 55,000 fans—including President Barack Obama, First Lady Michelle Obama and Cuban President Raúl Castro. Obama's visit is the first by a sitting U.S. President since Calvin Coolidge in 1928.

SEPTEMBER 11-13, 2017

The forecast for Hurricane Irma's arrival in Florida prompts Major League Baseball to move a three-game series with the Yankees from Tropicana Field to Citi Field. It is believed to be only the fifth time in the history of MLB that weather concerns required the relocation of games to a neutral site.

NOVEMBER 1, 2017

Matt Silverman moves from president of baseball operations back to the team president role, sharing the title with Brian Auld. The move completes the transition of baseball leadership, passing the baton to senior vice president of baseball operations/general manager Erik Neander as the top-ranking baseball official.

DECEMBER 20, 2017

The Rays complete a five-player trade sending 3B Evan Longoria to the San Francisco Giants. Longoria departs as the longest-tenured player in franchise history after spending nearly 10 seasons in a Rays uniform. He leaves as the club's all-time leader with 1,435 games, 261 HR, 892 RBI, 338 2B, 618 XBH, 780 runs, 569 BB and 2,630 total bases.

NOVEMBER 14, 2018

The Baseball Writers' Association of America announces left-handed pitcher Blake Snell as the winner of the 2018 AL Cy Young Award.

JUNE 25, 2019

During a press conference at the Dalí Museum, principal owner Stuart Sternberg introduces an innovative plan for the team to build new home ballparks in both Tampa Bay and Montreal and divide its home games across both geographies.

SEPTEMBER 27, 2019

In Toronto, the Rays beat the Blue Jays, 6-2, to clinch their fifth trip to the postseason.

OCTOBER 2, 2019

The Rays win the AL Wild Card Game in Oakland and advance to the Division Series for the fifth time in franchise history.

MARCH 20, 2020

MLB announces the suspension of spring training and the delay of the 2020 regular season due to the COVID-19 pandemic. MLB announces an abbreviated 60-game format for 2020 on June 23.

SEPTEMBER 23, 2020

The Rays clinch their third AL East title with an 8-5 win over the Mets at Citi Field.

OCTOBER 17, 2020

The Rays advance to the World Series for the second time in franchise history with a 4-2 win over the Astros in Game 7 of the ALCS. The entire series is played at Petco Park in San Diego due to health, safety and competitive considerations as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

OCTOBER 24, 2020

In one of the wildest finishes in postseason history, the Rays win Game 4 of the World Series in Arlington in walk-off fashion, 8-7. A Brett Phillips single and two Dodgers errors on the play allow Kevin Kiermaier and Randy Arozarena to score the tying and winning runs.

DEVIL RAYS INAUGURAL GAME

ST. PETERSBURG, FLA. – Hall of Famers Ted Williams, Stan Musial, Al Lopez and Monte Irvin threw out the ceremonial first pitches and minutes later, at 5:08 p.m. on March 31, 1998, Major League Baseball was born in Tampa Bay as Wilson Álvarez delivered a ball to Tigers leadoff hitter Brian Hunter. Álvarez retired the Tigers 1-2-3 in the 1st inning, then nine of the next 13 batters hit safely. The Rays fell behind 11-0 in the 5th inning before Wade Boggs hit a 2-run homer off Justin Thompson in the 6th to account for the first 2 runs in Rays history. The Devil Rays rallied for 4 runs in the 9th inning and left the tying run in the on-deck circle when Paul Sorrento struck out to end the game. Tampa native Luis Gonzalez hit the first home run at Tropicana Field and added a single and double.



Rookie Rolando Arrojo earned the win in his major league debut and Fred McGriff had three run-scoring hits including a 2-run single in the Rays decisive 3-run 8th inning. The Rays batted around in the 4th and 8th innings (they batted around four times in the 3-game series). 2-out, RBI singles by Wade Boggs and McGriff helped the Rays jump ahead in the 4th inning after trailing 3-2. The Rays got a hit in every inning except the 5th.

102 YEARS OF MLB IN ST. PETERSBURG

HIS SEASON MARKS THE 102ND YEAR MAJOR LEAGUE BASEBALL HAS HAD A PRESENCE IN ST. PETERSBURG, DATING BACK TO 1914 WHEN THE ST. LOUIS BROWNS OPENED SPRING TRAINING WORKOUTS.

MLB has also had a presence in St. Pete every year since travel restrictions during World War II prohibited teams from traveling south for spring training from 1943-45.

Nine teams have trained in St. Petersburg: the St. Louis Browns (1914), Philadelphia Phillies (1915-18), Boston Braves (1922-37), New York Yankees (1925-42; 1946-50; 1952-61), St. Louis Cardinals (1938-42; 1946-97), New York Giants (1951), New York Mets (1962-87), Baltimore Orioles (1993-95) and the Devil Rays/Rays (1998-2008).

In 1910, a former Pittsburgh laundry owner named Al Lang moved to St. Petersburg to benefit his health. He soon became interested in the local economy and focused on trying to help the sagging tourism industry. As a baseball fan, he believed the answer was to attract a major league team for spring training.

Lang convinced the St. Louis Browns, under manager Branch Rickey, to move to St. Petersburg in 1914. A baseball committee, formed to attract a major league team to the city, raised \$20,000 to buy a large tract of land for a ballpark. The site chosen for the field was Coffee Pot Bayou in St. Pete, where a 2,000-seat grandstand was built.

The first game between two major league teams in St. Petersburg took place on March 27,

1914 as the Grapefruit League was established. The Browns hosted the Chicago Cubs, who were training in Tampa and made the trip by steamboat across Tampa Bay. The Cubs won, 3-2. James Leslie (Hippo) Vaughn was the winning pitcher for the Cubs as an estimated 4,000 looked on.

The resourceful Lang helped engineer a new ballpark, Waterfront Park—located at the approximate site where the parking lot for Al Lang Field is today—and a new arrival, the Boston Braves, christened the new park in 1922. The Yankees joined the Braves in St. Pete in 1925. They would remain for all but four years until 1962, when Casey Stengel and the expansion New York Mets moved in and the Yankees went to Fort Lauderdale.

When the Boston Braves left for Bradenton in 1937, the St. Louis Cardinals came to St. Petersburg the following year and would stay 57 of the next 60 years, missing only the war years.

Minor league baseball in the city began in 1920 as the St. Pete Saints entered the Florida State League.

There was one other professional league in St. Petersburg prior to the Rays arrival in 1998. The Senior Professional Baseball Association—a league of former major leaguers who were 35 years of age or older—sprang up for one season, 1989-90. The St. Pete Pelicans were the first and only league champions.



2020 RAYS POSTSEASON REVIEW

A.L. CHAMPS

The Rays won the AL pennant for the second time in franchise history (2008), but lost the World Series to the Dodgers...they set a major league record by playing 20 postseason games, thanks in part to the expanded playoff format...the Rays were the ninth team in major league history to play a "winner take all" game in the Division Series and League Championship Series but only the third to win both, joining the 2012 Giants and 1981 Dodgers.

♦ The Rays clinched a post-season spot on Sep 17, won the AL East on Sep 23 and secured the No. 1 seed on Sep 26...it marked the second time in club history the Rays finished with the best record in the AL (2010).

PLAYOFF PAD

With the exception of the Wild Card Series, where the higher seed hosted each game, the rest of the postseason was played at neutral sites due to health, safety and competitive considerations in the COVID-19 pandemic...the Rays spent 17 nights in San Diego for the ALDS and ALCS before flying to Arlington to the World Series, which was played in front of a limited capacity.

POWER BALL

The Rays hit 34 HR, the most in a single postseason in major league history...67.1 pct. (53 of 79) of the Rays runs came on home runs, compared to 41.5 pct. (120 of 289) in the regular season...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, this was the highest rate for a team in a single postsea-

THE GREAT RANDINO

Rookie Randy Arozarena enjoyed a historic post-season, batting .377/.442/.831 (29-for-77) with 10 HR and 14 RBI in 20 games (all starts) and setting major league records for a single postseason in home runs, hits, extra-base hits (14, tied) and total bases (64)...the previous record was 8 HR by TEX Nelson Cruz in 2011, HOU Carlos Beltrán in 2004 and SF Barry Bonds in 2002.

- ♦ He was named Most Valuable Player of the ALCS, the first rookie position player to win MVP of a League Championship Series or World Series.

♦ His 10 HR are the most in a Rays postseason career, ahead of Evan Longoria (9).

FRENCH POETRY

In Game 5 of the ALDS vs. NYY, Mike Brosseau hit a go-ahead, solo homer off Aroldis Chapman in the 8th inning to end a 10-pitch at-bat...it was his second time facing Chapman after he was nearly hit in the head by a 100.5 mph pitch on Sep 1 at NYY.

- ♦ He entered as a pinch-hitter in the 6th and became the third player in postseason history to enter as a sub and deliver a go-ahead homer in a "winner take all" game, joining NYY Aaron Boone's walk-off in Game 7 of the 2003 ALCS vs. BOS and PIT Hal Smith in Game 7 of the 1960 World Series vs. NYY.

2019 RAYS POSTSEASON REVIEW

PHOTO FINISH

The Rays entered the final week of the regular season tied with the Indians for the AL's second Wild Card spot, then won four consecutive games to clinch a postseason berth for the fifth time in franchise history and first time in six seasons...they held at least a share of one of the AL's five postseason spots for 167 of 186 days (89.8 pct), including 29 consecutive from Sep 1 through season's end after finishing a 3-game sweep of the Wild Card-contending Indians...the Rays were in contention to host the Wild Card Game until losing the penultimate game of the season.

25 > 54,005

Through eight seasons under the Wild Card Game format, the Rays joined the Yankees and Giants as the only teams to win it twice...the Rays advanced to the Division Series with a 5-1 win over the Athletics in front of 54,005 at the Oakland Coliseum, the highest attendance for a Wild Card Game under the new format...it was the highest attendance for a Rays game (regular season or postseason) since Sep 14, 2008 at NYY (54,279), which was in the final month of games at Old Yankee Stadium.

♦ *The Rays held a lead from the fifth pitch of the Wild Card Game through the final pitch, after Yandy Diaz hit a leadoff homer...it was the first postseason leadoff homer in franchise history and second in Wild Card Game history, following MIN Brian Dozier in the 2017 AL Wild Card Game at NYY.*

ELIMINATED BY A.L. CHAMPS

The Rays pushed the eventual AL champion Astros to a decisive fifth game in the ALDS, with the home team winning every game...the Rays outscored the Astros, 14-4, in 2 games at Tropicana Field but lost the 3 games at Minute Maid Park by a combined 15-4 score...it was the second time in franchise history the Rays forced a decisive Game 5 after trailing 0-2, losing both series (2010 ALDS)...Game 5 was the fourth time in a stretch of nine days that the Rays played in a potential elimination game...the Rays fell behind, 4-0, in the bottom of the 1st inning after allowing hits to the first four Astros batters and five of the first six.

POWER SURGE

The Rays hit 4 HR in the Wild Card Game and 4 HR in Game 3 of the ALDS, twice tying their single-game postseason record...the Rays, who hit the fewest homers among the AL's five postseason clubs, totaled 11 HR in six postseason games...all 11 HR came in the club's 4 games when facing elimination, a major league record for homers in elimination games in a single postseason.

CHARLIE 2.0

In his first season with the Rays, Charlie Morton went 2-0 with a 0.90 ERA (10-IP, 1-ER) in two post-season starts...with his win in the Wild Card Game, he became the first pitcher in major league history to record the win in three "winner take all" playoff games...he defeated his former team in Game 3 of the ALDS, helping the Rays avoid elimination...it was his fourth career win in a potential elimination

game, tied for the most in major league history... he won Game 7 of the ALCS the following year to extend both of these postseason records.

CUBAN SMOKE

Yandy Diaz was reinstated from the 60-day IL for the last game of the regular season and hit leadoff in the Wild Card Game...he homered in the 1st and 3rd innings, becoming the fifth Ray with a multi-HR game in the postseason and the first to do it in a "winner take all" game.

♦ *Diaz was the 10th player in postseason history with a multi-HR effort in a "winner take all" game but only the second out of the leadoff spot, joining BOS Johnny Damon in Game 7 of the 2004 ALCS...he became the first leadoff hitter in major league history to homer in each of his first 2 AB of a postseason.*

2013 RAYS POSTSEASON REVIEW

POSTSEASON THE HARD WAY

With a 5-2 win at Texas in a Game 163 tiebreaker on Sep 30, the Rays became the 14th team to enter the post-season via a tiebreaker and only the second in the Wild Card era (since 1995) to win a tiebreaker game on the road (1999 Mets)...road teams had been 1-5 previously...the Rays advanced to the ALDS by winning 3 games in which they would have been eliminated had they lost—all over a four-day span in three different cities...in Game 162 on Sep 29 at TOR, the Rays avoided a third consecutive loss to remain tied with Texas in the standings...the Rays snapped the Rangers 7-game win streak on Sep 30 at TEX in Game 163 and the Indians 10-game win streak in the AL Wild Card game on Oct 2 at CLE...the Rays advanced to the postseason for the fourth time in club history, all coming in a six-season span from 2008-13.

SHUTOUT AT CLEVELAND

The Rays blanked the Indians, 4-0, in the AL Wild Card Game behind Alex Cobb, Joel Peralta, Jake McGee and Fernando Rodney...it was the Indians 44th postseason home game in their history, but only the second time they were shut out...the Rays snapped the Indians winning streak covering the last 10 games of the regular season...earlier in the regular season, the Rays snapped Toronto's 10-game streak...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, the Rays became the first team to snap two 10-game winning streaks (or longer) in one season since the 2006 Rockies (Dodgers-11, Athletics-10).

DONE IN BY THE WORLD CHAMPS

The Rays lost the ALDS to the Red Sox, 3-1...Rays starting pitchers allowed 18 R/16 ER in 17.1 IP in the series and Rays batters hit .179 (5-for-28) with RISP...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, the Rays lone win—in Game 3 at Tropicana Field—was only the second postseason game in which a team took a lead in the bottom of the 8th inning, surrendered it in the 9th and won it in the bottom of the 9th...the first was Game 7 of the 1960 World Series—the Pirates trailed the Yankees, 7-4, entering the bottom of 8th inning, scored 5 runs to take a 9-7 lead, allowed 2 runs in the top of the

ICE CREAM MAN

In the Rays 5-4 win in Game 3 of the ALDS, catcher José Lobaton became just the 13th player to hit a walk-off home run in a postseason elimination game...he was the first AL player to do it since BOS David Ortiz in Game 4 of the 2004 ALCS vs. NYY... Lobaton, known for eating ice cream after hitting a home run, also became just the third player to hit a walk-off home run to avoid being swept in a postseason series...he joined Ortiz in 2004 and BOS Trot Nixon in Game 3 of 2003 ALDS vs. OAK.

- ◆ *Lobaton's homer was hit into the Rays Touch Tank, the third home run to land there and first by a Rays player...the previous times were by DET*

Miguel Cabrera on June 30, 2013 and LAD Luis Gonzalez on June 24, 2007.

HAPPY BIRTHDAY

In Game 3 of the ALDS, Evan Longoria homered on his 28th birthday, becoming the second player in major league history to hit a postseason homer on his birthday...he joined KC Willie Mays Aikens, who hit 2 HR in Game 1 of the 1980 World Series.

NINE FOR NINE

In the Rays 3-1 loss in Game 4 of the ALDS, Rays Manager Joe Maddon used nine pitchers, which set a major league postseason record at the time for a 9-inning game...this has since been broken by the Padres, who used 11 pitchers in their 12-3 loss in Game 3 of the 2020 NLDS vs. LAD.

2011 RAYS POSTSEASON REVIEW

THIRD TIME IN FOUR YEARS

The Rays advanced to the postseason for the third time in a span of four seasons (2008-11), first time as the AL Wild Card...during that span only two other teams made as many postseason appearances: Phillies (4) and Yankees (3)...the Rays became the third major league team and first AL team to advance to the postseason after starting the season 0-6, and just the second major league team to advance to the postseason after starting 1-8...the 1995 Reds won the NL Central after starting 0-6 and 1-8, and the 1974 Pirates won the NL East after starting 0-6.

HISTORIC COMEBACK

The Rays became the first team in major league history to be at least 9 GB of a playoff berth in September and make the postseason...the Rays were 9 GB of playoff contention on Sep 3...the 2011 World Series champion Cardinals were 8.5 GB on Sep 5...the Rays were 16-8 and the Red Sox were 6-18 over the last 24 games of the regular season, starting Sep 4.

RAYS vs. RANGERS, PART II

For the second year in a row, the Rays lost to the Rangers in the ALDS...the Rays actually outscored the Rangers, 21-16, but lost the series, 3-1...in these two series, the visiting teams went 8-1...the Rays went 3-1 with 26 runs and 21 XBH at Texas, but 0-5 with 8 runs and 8 XBH at home.

MATT MOORE

At 22 years, 104 days, Matt Moore became the youngest starting pitcher in major league history to win his team's first game of the postseason...previously that mark was held by CIN Gary Nolan (22 years, 129 days) in the 1970 NLCS...Moore did not allow a run in 7 IP in the Rays 9-0 win over the Rangers in Game 1 of the ALDS at TEX...he allowed 2 hits, 2 BB and recorded 6 SO while throwing 98 pitches.

♦ Moore became the fifth rookie starter to win his team's first game of the postseason and the first to do it since NYY Jim Beattie in Game 1 of the 1978 ALCS over the Royals...he also became the first rookie in major league history to go at least 7 IP and allow no runs and 2 hits (or fewer) in a postseason game...he remains the 2nd-youngest pitcher to ever do that, behind NYY Waite Hoyt (22 years, 27 days) in Game 2 of the 1921 World Series vs. the New York Giants.

• His .091 opp avg. (3-for-33) remains the 2nd-lowest by a rookie in the postseason (min. 10 IP), topped only by PIT Bruce Kison in 1971 (.088)...remains one of 15 rookies all-time to post a sub-1.00 ERA in the postseason (min. 10 IP)...he was the first to do that since NYY Orlando Hernández in 1998.

JAMES SHIELDS

The 29-year-old started and lost Game 2 of the ALDS at Texas, 8-6...he took a 3-0 lead into the 4th inning but allowed 5 runs that frame, which included 2 HBP and 2 WP...he remains the only pitcher in major league history with 2 HBP and 2 WP in a postseason game...it was the first time in his career (in 190 regular and postseason starts) with 2 HBP in an inning and only the second time he threw 2 WP in an inning, following July 6, 2007 at KC...his line: 5 IP, 8 H, 7 R/ER, 0 BB, 6 SO.

REMARKABLE ROOKIES

Matt Moore and Jeremy Hellickson started Game 1 and Game 4 of the ALDS...the Rays were the 10th team, first since the 2007 Rockies, to use two rookie starters in the postseason...the Rays had seven rookies on their 25-man postseason roster.

2010 RAYS POSTSEASON REVIEW

2010 POSTSEASON

The Rays won the AL East for the second time in three years...after the current divisional format was adopted in 1994, the Rays became the first team other than the Yankees to win two AL East championships in a full 162-game season...with 96 wins, the Rays led the AL in wins for the first time and finished 2nd in the majors to the Phillies (97)...in addition, the Rays became:

- ♦ The first team in major league history to endure 10 straight losing seasons, then make the postseason two of the next three seasons.
- ♦ The first team to average 90-plus wins over three consecutive seasons after 10 straight losing seasons.
- ♦ The fourth team to average 90-plus wins over three seasons after averaging 90-plus losses the three previous seasons, joining the 1996–2001 Athletics, 1975–80 Brewers and 1988–93 Braves.

RANGERS DEFEAT RAYS IN ALDS

For the first time in major league history, the road team won every game of a postseason series...the Rays became the first team in major league history to lose three home games in any 5-game postseason series...it was the first ALDS to reach 5 games in five years—since the Angels won at home over the Yankees in 2005.

- ♦ The Rays became the third team to force a Game 5 in a best-of-five series after losing the first 2 games of the series at home...the 1981 Brewers (vs. New York) and 2001 Yankees (vs. Oakland) did it before them...a Division Series was necessary in 1981 due to the split season.
- ♦ The Rays became the 11th team to force a Game 5 in a 5-game series after losing the first 2 games (home or road)...the Rays were the first team since the 1981 Brewers to force a Game 5 after an 0-2 start and lose Game 5.

DAVID PRICE AND CLIFF LEE

Price had 14 SO and 0 BB in the series, and Lee had 21 SO and 0 BB...no pitchers in baseball history have totaled more strikeouts without allowing a walk in a postseason series than Lee and Price...ATL Kevin Millwood (2002 NLDS) and CLE Andrew Miller (2016 ALCS) have since tied Price's mark.

- ◆ Price lost to Lee twice at home in the series, posting a 4.97 ERA (12.2-IP, 7-ER)...he went 9-2 with a 1.96 ERA (114.2-IP, 25-ER) at home during the regular season...prior to the series, he was 4-0 with a 1.79 ERA (45.1-IP, 9-ER) in 7 starts vs. former Cy Young Award winners, and the Rays won all 7 games.
- ◆ At the time, Lee set an ALDS record with 21 SO and tied SD Kevin Brown in 1998 for the overall LDS record...this record is now held by HOU Gerrit Cole (25) in 2019...Rangers pitching set a Division Series record at the time with 55 SO, topping the 1998 Padres (49 SO vs. HOU)...the 2001 Indians (48 vs. SEA) held the previous ALDS record...the Rangers staff posted a 2.40 ERA (45-IP, 12-ER), including a 1.15 ERA (31.1-IP, 4-ER) by Rangers starters.

ODDS AND ENDS

- ◆ The battery of Wade Davis and John Jaso in Game 4 marked the first time in 63 years a team started a rookie pitcher and a rookie catcher in a postseason win...in Game 7 of the 1947 World Series, the Yankees defeated the Brooklyn Dodgers, 5-2, with a battery of Spec Shea and Yogi Berra.
- ◆ Carlos Peña became the first player in history with a single, double, triple and home run in four consecutive postseason at-bats (last 2 AB of Game 3 and first 2 AB of Game 4).

2008 RAYS POSTSEASON REVIEW

2008 POSTSEASON

Only one team in major league history lost more games than the Rays (96) the year before going to the World Series: the 1991 Braves, who were 65-97...the Rays were the second team in major league history and the fifth team in the four major sports to advance to its league's championship series the year after having the worst record in the league...the others to do that: 1991 Braves, 1958-59 Minneapolis Lakers, 1958-59 Toronto Maple Leafs and 1949-50 New York Rangers.

RAYS SET A.L. POSTSEASON HOMER MARK

The Rays hit 26 HR in the postseason, an AL record at the time...the previous record was 24, by the Angels in 2002...that mark remained one shy of the major league record until the 2020 postseason, when the Rays hit 34 HR and the Dodgers hit 30 HR...the Rays had 10 different player hit a postseason homer.

Matt Garza went 2-0 with a 1.38 ERA (13-IP, 8-H, 2-ER, 6-BB, 14-SO) in the ALCS...he won Game 3

and Game 7 for the Rays...it was the 11th time that a pitcher won ALCS MVP honors (10th different pitcher)...at 24, Garza became the youngest pitcher to ever win ALCS MVP honors, passing Mike Boddicker (26) of the 1983 Orioles.

DAVID PRICE







REMEMBERING A TRAILBLAZER

Andrés Reiner passed away on Aug 3, 2016, at age 80. Hired by the organization in 2006, Andrés was instrumental in reorganizing how the Rays approached recruiting and signing players in Latin America. He played a major role in the building of the Rays academies in Venezuela and the Dominican Republic.

Andrés transformed how baseball was scouted in Venezuela when he opened the country's first baseball academy for the Astros in 1989. Though many are aware of the 25 young men from that program who reached the big leagues, including Johan Santana, Bobby Abreu and Carlos Guillén, fewer know about the managers and coaches in minor league baseball who were influenced by

Andrés. The Rays have several staff members who were signed by Andrés as players, including field coordinator Alejandro Freire, pitching coordinator Jorge Moncada, Durham coach Reinaldo Ruiz and GCL Rays coach Germán Meléndez.

Andrés pioneered the cultural transition programs in professional baseball. These are programs the Rays have established for young men signed in Latin America. The Rays stand with many others in tribute to a man who dedicated his life to growing our game and mentoring others to do the same.





EXPANDING INTERNATIONAL OPERATIONS

B ASEBALL HAS TRULY BECOME A GLOBAL GAME. TODAY, MORE THAN ONE-FOURTH OF ALL MAJOR LEAGUERS WERE BORN OUTSIDE OF THE UNITED STATES.

As a result, the Rays have expanded the reach of their international operations. With the signing of Japanese third baseman/outfielder Yoshi Tsutsugo in December 2019, the Rays now have players from 14 countries—Aruba, Australia, Brazil, Canada, Colombia, Cuba, Curaçao, Dominican Republic, Germany, Japan, South Korea, Mexico, Nicaragua and Venezuela—in addition to those from the United States.

While the organization spans the globe in search of talent, the main focus is in the Dominican Republic and Venezuela, where Tampa Bay operates baseball academies.

In 2006, shortly after the ownership group led by Stuart Sternberg took control of the club, the Rays agreed to a partnership with the Los Angeles Dodgers in which the two organizations would share Campo Las Palmas in the Dominican Republic, long considered the gold standard for Dominican facilities. Campo Las Palmas was home to the Rays baseball academy and a summer league team until early 2009 when the organization inaugurated a new academy located on the property adjacent to the Dodgers. The complex has two full diamonds and a half field, clubhouse, gym, covered batting cages, classrooms, a dining area and living facilities which can accommodate up to 92 players. In 2018, the program claimed its first Dominican Summer League (DSL) title.

In 2007, the Rays opened their Venezuelan

baseball academy in Guacara, 100 miles west of Caracas. In addition to baseball fields, the Venezuelan academy includes a dining area and dormitory which can accommodate 56 players. The Rays played in the Venezuelan Summer League (VSL) in 2007 as part of a co-op team with the Cincinnati Reds before forming a team of their own in 2008. The program won VSL championships in 2009 and 2011. The VSL closed its operations after the 2015 season, prompting the Rays to add a second team in the DSL in 2016.

In 2019, Carlos Rodriguez was promoted to vice president, player development and international operations. He enters his second season overseeing both areas. Likewise, Steve Miller enters his second season as director, international scouting, running the department and overseeing all scouts. Patrick Walters enters his second season as director, international operations, overseeing all operations at the Latin American academies. Brad Budzinski was added to the staff in 2018 as an international crosschecker, and area scout Victor Rodriguez, responsible for South Florida, also adds international crosschecking to his duties in 2021.

Ronnie Blanco, former general manager of the Magallanes baseball club in the Venezuelan professional league and the Rays long-time director of Venezuelan operations, is assistant director, international operations.

The Rays maintain scouting programs in

the Dominican Republic, supervised by Daniel Santana, crosschecked by Rigo De Los Santos and staffed by scouts Miguel De La Cruz, Felix Fermin Jr., Remmy Hernandez and Jorge Pérez; Venezuela, crosschecked by William Bergolla and scouts Juan Castillo, Carlos León, Marlon Roche and Frank Tineo; Colombia, coordinated by Angel Contreras and scout Alexander Zuniga; Curaçao, led by Chairon Isenia; Panama, with Gustavo Zapata; and Mexico, with Jesus Valdez and Karla Espinoza, Mexico's first female scout.

The Rays have also expanded scouting efforts in the Pacific Rim, Europe and Australia. Tateki "Bori" Uchibori, who served as an interpreter for former Tampa Bay infielder Akinori Iwamura, scouts for the Rays in Japan and Korea. In 2016, Joe Park was added to the Korean scouting staff. Keith Hsu covers Taiwan and John Gilmore enters his 12th year as an international consultant assisting in coverage all over the world.

With rising numbers of international players,

the Rays have also developed programs in the U.S. and in their Latin American academies to educate players and create cultural awareness. Today, these programs cater to international and domestic players alike and have grown to include language training, life skills, professional development and education on social issues. These programs are overseen by George Pappas, assistant director, minor league operations. Jairo De La Rosa, a former player in the Rays organization who has served as Latin American cultural coordinator since 2013, is responsible for player programming in the Latin American academies. Lenore Sutton, who has taught Rays players since 2009 and today serves as education coordinator, is responsible for programming player education at the Rays domestic affiliates. The education program is also supported by Isha Rahman, assistant, minor league operations, and Milton Jamail, who begins his 15th year in the organization and second as advisor, player education.



DEWAYNE STAATS

Dewayne anchors the Emmy Award-winning Bally Sports Sun telecast this year, his 46th season broadcasting major league baseball and 24th with the Rays. Dewayne has also handled play-by-play for FOX Sports national baseball coverage. He has broadcast more than 6,000 MLB games in his career, including nine no-hitters. Before joining the Rays, he spent three years calling play-by-play for a variety of ESPN sports broadcasts. He began his major league play-by-play career as the radio and TV voice of the Astros from 1977-84, then for the Cubs from 1985-89. He was the lead play-by-play announcer for the Yankees from 1990-94, and spent the 1994-95 seasons calling the action for The Baseball Network (ABC/NBC). Dewayne began his baseball career as the radio voice of the Oklahoma City 89ers (1973-74). In 1975-76 he was sports director at KPLR TV in St. Louis and received an Emmy nomination. A 1975 graduate of SIU-Edwardsville, where he began his sports career with WSIE Radio, Dewayne earned Distinguished Alumnus of the Year honors in 1987 and was inducted into its Alumni Hall of Fame in 2010. Dewayne was named a finalist for the Ford C. Frick Award, presented annually by the National Baseball Hall of Fame, in 2012, 2013, 2016 and 2019. He was named the 2013 Florida Sportscaster of the Year by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association. In 2015, Dewayne authored *Position to Win: A Look at Baseball and Life From the Best Seat in the House*, which chronicles his life and career in sports broadcasting. Dewayne was inducted into the Tampa Bay Sports Club Hall of Fame in 2018. He and his wife, Carla, support a number of causes, including military combat veterans via their 501(c)(3) charity W.A.R. (Warriors at Rest). He has two daughters, Stephanie Wheeler and Alexandra, and three grandchildren: Gabriel, 16; Zachary, 13; and Evie, 10.



BRIAN ANDERSON

Brian enters his 11th season as full-time television color analyst on Bally Sports Sun and his 13th season as part of the Rays broadcast. Brian previously served on the major league staff as assistant to the pitching coach, working under Jim Hickey from March 2008 through the 2009 season. He also filled in as broadcaster for the Indians on Sports Time Ohio and hosted a weekly highlights show while recovering from injury in 2007. Brian spent 13 seasons pitching in the majors with the Angels, Indians, Royals and Diamondbacks, and was a member of the latter's 2001 World Champion team. He was selected third overall by the Angels in the 1993 Amateur Draft and the following season was named the *Sporting News* AL Rookie of the Year. He was also selected by the Diamondbacks as their first pick in the 1997 Expansion Draft. Brian was inducted to the Greater Cleveland Sports Hall of Fame on Sep 30, 2015 and made his acceptance speech by phone during the Rays broadcast. He and his wife, Jessica Marie, reside in Tampa. Brian has four children: Rylyn Mae, 16; Jackson James, 14; Harper Marie, 5; and Baker James, 2.



TRICIA WHITAKER

Tricia begins her third season on the Bally Sports Sun telecast as the in-game reporter and host of select feature episodes. She is a two-time Emmy Award recipient, receiving accolades for hosting 2020's "Salute to the Troops" pregame special, as well as for a 2018 production on the legacy of Peyton Manning. Prior to joining the Rays broadcast, the Stuart, Fla. native spent four years covering local sports with the CBS affiliate in Indianapolis, including the Indiana Pacers, IndyCar racing, college basketball and the Indianapolis Colts. Her career experience also includes a two-year stint covering professional and collegiate teams, including the Brewers, for the ABC affiliate in Green Bay. Her professional career began as a web reporter with the Indiana Pacers and Indiana Fever. Tricia graduated from Indiana University with a degree in communications. She has returned to teach sports broadcasting at IU's media school as an adjunct professor for the past four years.





RICH HOLLENBERG

Rich enters his eighth season covering the Rays on television with the Bally Sports Sun broadcast team. In 2020, he won a Suncoast Sports Emmy Award for hosting the "Salute to the Troops" pregame special. He began his broadcast career as a sports anchor with the ABC affiliate in Great Falls, Mont. in 1995, then served as the sports director with Time Warner Cable (now Spectrum Sports) in Clearwater from 1995-97, where he received a CableACE award for the best local sports program. Rich was also host of "H.S. Sports Extra" for WTVT FOX-13 from 1996-98, the in-arena voice for the Tampa

Bay Lightning and Tampa Bay Storm from 1999-2002 and a host for a variety of other regional programs. He spent a number of years as a national reporter for NFL Network as well. During the baseball offseason, Rich handles college basketball play-by-play duties on ESPN Networks. Rich earned a bachelor's degree in broadcast journalism from the Newhouse School at Syracuse University in 1993. A New Jersey native, Rich has called the Tampa Bay area home for 26 years. ORESTES DESTRADE

Orestes begins his 10th season as a pre- and postgame host for Bally Sports Sun and an in-game sideline analyst for select Rays home games. In 2017, Orestes and his Bally Sports Sun crew won a Suncoast Sports Emmy Award for "Demo Day," a one-time special program that aired during a Rays home game. Prior to joining the Rays broadcast, Orestes worked for ESPN as a host on *Baseball Tonight* and an analyst for the Little League World Series for five years. He also hosted live weekday radio sports talk shows on XM Radio and ESPN Radio, in addition to making several appearances on ESPN Deportes' TV and

radio programs. Orestes covered the 2014 and 2015 World Series for Univision Deportes as their lead studio analyst. Orestes spent 15 seasons in pro baseball with the Yankees, Pirates, Seibu Lions of the Japanese Pacific League and the Marlins as a designated hitter, first baseman and outfielder. He led NPB in home runs for three consecutive seasons (1990-92) and was named Most Valuable Player of the 1990 Japan Series. He was a member of the Marlins inaugural 1993 season, leading the team with 20 HR and 87 RBI. Born in Santiago de Cuba, Cuba, Orestes and his family immigrated to Miami in 1968 when he was six years old. He and his wife, Drisana, reside in Tampa. Orestes has four children: Danielle, 33; Devin, 29; Armando, 16; and Bella, 13.



DOUG WAECHTER

Doug begins his seventh season providing in-depth pitching analysis as a member of Bally Sports Sun's pre- and postgame shows. In 2017, Doug and his Bally Sports Sun crew won a Suncoast Sports Emmy Award for "Demo Day," a one-time special program that aired during a Rays home game. Doug is a St. Petersburg native and graduate of Northeast High School. Prior to being selected out of high school by the Devil Rays in the third round of the 1999 Amateur Draft, he had signed a letter of intent to play football at the University of South Florida. With his 2003 debut, he became the first St. Petersburg

native to play for the Rays. He remains one of three Rays players born in St. Petersburg, along with Casey Kotchman and Ryan Weber. In his first major league start, on Sep 3, 2003 at Tropicana Field, he pitched a 2-hit shutout against the Mariners. He spent six years in the majors with the Devil Rays, Marlins and Royals and 11 seasons overall in professional baseball. Doug coaches his two children, Kaden (13) and Karsyn (11), in baseball and softball, and is a realtor in the Tampa Bay area. In 2004, he was presented a key to the city of St. Petersburg by Mayor Rick Baker. Doug and his wife, Kristin, reside in St. Petersburg with their children.

ANDY FREED

Andy returns to the booth for his 17th season with the Rays broadcast team, which was voted tops in the American League by subscribers of *The Athletic* in 2020. He joined the Rays after serving as the voice of the Triple-A Pawtucket Red Sox for four seasons. Andy was also the voice of the Double-A Trenton Thunder (Red Sox) for five seasons (1996-2000) and was inducted into the Trenton Baseball Hall of Fame in 2018. He began his play-by-play career with the St. Lucie Mets of the Class-A Florida State League in 1994-95. Andy's baseball radio career began as a broadcast assistant with the Orioles

flagship station WBAL conducting postgame interviews for all home games during the 1990-93 seasons. His other play-by-play experience includes college basketball for ESPN Regional (2004-present), Providence College (2003-05) and Rider University (1996-2001). He also broadcast for The College of New Jersey football and Baltimore Spirit soccer. Freed is a graduate of Towson State (Md.) University, where he called basketball, football and lacrosse during his time at school. Andy was named 2015 Florida Sportscaster of the Year by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association. He enthusiastically works with the ALS Association. In addition to reciting Lou Gehrig's famous speech at Tropicana Field every year on "ALS Night," he emcees various local events, including their annual "Ride to Defeat ALS." DAVE WILLS

Dave enters his 17th season in the Rays radio booth, voted best in the American League by *The Athletic* subscribers last season. He came to the Rays after 11 seasons as part of the White Sox radio broadcast team primarily hosting the pre- and postgame shows. His first play-by-play action came with the Class-A Kane County Cougars of the Midwest League from 1991-95, where he was the franchise's first radio voice. Dave was the radio voice of University of Illinois-Chicago men's basketball from 1997-2005 and has also done some television play-by-play for the Flames. He also anchored the pre- and post-

game shows for Notre Dame football and basketball, and served as co-host of the Kevin White Show while with ESPN Radio 1000 (Chicago). From 2000-05, Dave did television work with Comcast's Sports Weekly high school highlight show. Dave served as the pitching coach/recruiting coordinator with Elmhurst (Ill.) College in 1989, and as interim head coach at the University of Chicago in 1990. He owns bachelor's degrees in speech communication and urban studies from Elmhurst, where he played baseball for three years. In 2016, Dave was inducted into the Irish-American Baseball Hall of Fame at the former Foley's Pub and Restaurant in New York City. He participates in the Hillsborough County Great American Teach-In and assists with Rays community efforts, among them Tampa Bay's Buddy Baseball League. NEIL SOLONDZ

Neil begins his 10th season on the Rays Baseball Network as host of the pre- and postgame shows, *This Week in Rays Baseball*, fill-in play-by-play voice and studio analyst. Before joining the Rays full time, Neil was the radio voice of the Triple-A Durham Bulls from 2004-11, and filled in on the Rays pre- and postgame show from 2010-11. While with Durham, he broadcast the Triple-A All-Star Game and the Triple-A National Championship Game to a nationwide audience. Before the Bulls, Neil broadcast minor league games for the Class-A Lakewood BlueClaws (Phillies) and Quad City River

Born in Nicaragua, Enrique came to the United States at age 10 and attended the St. Augustine School for the Blind. He called his first professional action in 1989 for the Jacksonville Expos, and then served as color commentator for the St. Petersburg Pelicans of the Senior Professional Baseball League. Prior to that, he was the public address announcer for seven years for Florida College baseball in Tampa. He also appeared as a regular contributor on *Solamente Pelota* ("Only Baseball") on SiriusXM, hosted his own show on WQBN 1300 AM and has been a guest analyst on USF Spanish broadcasts and on baseball broadcasts and talk shows in Managua, Nicaragua. He has also called action for the Tampa Bay Storm of the Arena Football League (2003-05) and served as the Spanish voice for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2002-03. Enrique owns a communications degree from the University of South Florida. He delivered the keynote address at the Florida School for the Deaf and Blind's 100th commencement in May 2014. His wife, Debbie, closely assists him on the broadcasts. The two reside in St. Petersburg.



RICARDO TAVERAS





Because the 2020 season was played without fans, the Rays installed 18"x30" cardboard cutouts made of Coroplast. Over the past four years, Rays ownership has invested more than \$20 million in capital improvements to the facility. This includes new LED lights and an overhauled food, beverage and retail space.

- ◆ Although unable to host fans in 2020, Tropicana Field was put to much use leading up to the 2021 season. The site hosted entertainment events such as semi-weekly World Wrestling Entertainment, Inc. (WWE) productions and the Jurassic Quest dinosaur experience. Community-focused efforts included serving as an official ballot-drop location and facilitating 7,100 weekly COVID-19 tests administered by Pinellas County Emergency Management.
- ◆ Prior to the 2020 season, Tropicana Field transitioned to exclusive use of mobile tickets in order to improve ballpark security, limit fraudulent entry and reduce paper waste. Tropicana Field was also announced as the first cash-free sports venue in North America in 2019.
- ◆ Knotless safety nets were installed from the inside of the dugouts to the far ends of the dugouts in 2017 and then extended out to the ends of Sections 125 and 126 two years later.
- ◆ Originally named the Florida Suncoast Dome, Tropicana Field's 1.1 million square feet include unique design features and fan amenities found nowhere else in the major leagues.
- ◆ The venue opened to the public on March 3, 1990, at a cost of \$138 million. It became the ThunderDome in 1993 with the arrival of the National Hockey League expansion franchise, the Tampa Bay Lightning. It was renamed Tropicana Field on Oct 4, 1996, in accordance with a naming rights agreement between the Rays and Bradenton's Tropicana Dole Beverages.
- ◆ Since 2005, the Rays have invested an estimated \$50 million into capital improvements at Tropicana Field.
- ◆ In 2019, the existing field lights were replaced with energy-efficient LED lights, enhancing on-field playability and in-game entertainment.
- ◆ In 2018, the Rays partnered with Levy to overhaul the food, beverage and retail experience, including "food halls" and a renovated team store.
- ◆ Between 2013-14, the Rays added 360-degree pedestrian circulation around the lower seating bowl. The improved circulation provides easier access to and from ballpark gates, concessions and activity areas throughout the facility.
- ◆ Over 2006-07, the Rays invested more than \$18 million toward ballpark improvements, including the creation of the Rays Club and the installation of new video boards and a sound system.
- ◆ Tropicana Field is also the world's only professional sports facility that features live rays. The 10,000-gallon Rays Touch Tank opened in 2006, and is located just behind the right-center field wall. There are over 20 cownose rays that fans can touch during the game through a unique partnership with the Florida Aquarium.



- ◆ Tropicana Field and Toronto's Rogers Centre both feature an artificial surface and all-dirt base paths. Only four other artificial turf ballparks have ever featured all-dirt base paths: Houston's Astrodome (1966-71), San Francisco's Candlestick Park (1971), Pittsburgh's Three Rivers Stadium (1970-72) and St. Louis' Busch Stadium (1970-76).
- ◆ The Rays installed new Shaw Sports Turf ahead of the 2019 season, the seventh surface in 22 seasons. They began play in 1998 on AstroTurf, went to a FieldTurf surface in 2000 and FieldTurf's improved product in 2007. In 2011, AstroTurf installed Game Day Grass 3D-60 H. The first of three Shaw Sports Turf surfaces was installed in advance of the 2017 season.
- ◆ Tropicana Field features the world's largest cable-supported domed roof following the demolition of the Georgia Dome in 2017. It's made of six acres of translucent, Teflon-coated fiberglass and supports itself with 180 miles of cables connected by struts. Opposing forces of tension and compression keep the roof in an arc. Tropicana Field's roof is slanted at a 6.5-degree angle, drop-

ping from 225 feet above second base to 85 feet at the center field wall. The slanted roof reduced the overall construction costs and decreased the volume of air under the dome by 16.8 million cubic feet, decreasing the amount of air requiring climate control. It is built to withstand winds of up to 115 miles per hour.

- ◆ Though originally built for baseball, there have been 15 other varieties of sporting events held there. These include hockey, basketball, football, sprint car racing, gymnastics, soccer, tennis, weight lifting, wrestling, table tennis, karate, motorcycle racing, equestrian events, track and figure skating.
- ◆ In addition to the 2008 World Series, the facility was also home to the 1999 NCAA Basketball Final Four featuring Duke, Ohio State, Michigan State and eventual-champion Connecticut. The largest crowd to date—47,150—appeared at the Aug 11, 1990 concert featuring New Kids on the Block. It is currently home to college football's East-West Shrine Game.

SKIP MILOS / TAMPA BAY RAYS

On Sep 20, 2006, the Rays and the Charlotte County Board of Commissioners signed a 20-year agreement for the team to conduct spring training at Charlotte Sports Park, the spring training home of the Texas Rangers from 1987–2002. Following an 18-month renovation, the park became the Rays official spring home on Feb 25, 2009, when Tampa Bay hosted the Cincinnati Reds. The Rays went on to set the club spring training attendance record and sold out eight home games in their first season in Charlotte County. In 2014, readers of *USA Today* voted Charlotte Sports Park their favorite spring training destination.

■ IMPROVEMENTS

Prior to the 2020 spring season, the Rays funded \$2.5 million in facility improvements, resulting in 27,000 square feet of new or renovated spaces primarily aimed at increasing and modernizing the amount of indoor player training space on site. Changes included a state-of-the-art training facility and climate-controlled batting cages.

■ SIZE

82 acres, including the ballpark and 5½ practice fields. The practice fields are home to minor league spring training games and the GCL Rays.

■ ARCHITECT

Populous, formerly known as HOK Sport Facilities Group, Inc. (Kansas City, Mo.)

■ FINANCING

The \$27.2 million renovation and expansion project was funded by the Charlotte County Board of Commissioners' unanimous approval (4-0) of a fifth-cent tourism

tax, a contribution from the Rays and a \$15 million grant from the Florida Sports Foundation and the State's Office of Tourism.

■ SEATING CAPACITY

The ballpark features a diversity of seating areas, including over 5,000 fixed seats and two berm areas and other general admission areas that can accommodate over 1,000 additional fans, all within an intimate ballpark setting. The stadium capacity is 6,823.

■ PLAYER FACILITIES

A 44,000-square-foot, two-story clubhouse building beyond right field features locker rooms for Rays major and minor league players and houses the Rays Player Development center. The nearby Athletic Performance Center opened ahead of the 2020 spring season and features 10,500 square feet of continuous training space.

■ TEAM STORE

Located just inside the entry gate behind home plate, a

2,800-square-foot team store is open daily during spring training.

■ VIDEO BOARD

A new 15'6" by 36' HD video board from Daktronics was installed in 2017.

■ BASEBALL BOARDWALK

A 19,000-square-foot wooden concourse stretches around the outfield to provide 360-degree pedestrian circulation. It also features a full-liquor tiki bar with seating for up to 69 fans at a time.

■ GROUP SEATING

Three party areas located on the boardwalk are available to groups and can seat a total of 276 fans. Suites are also available for group purchase on a per-season or per-game basis.



- ◆ Scorecard from Sergio Romo's first career start on May 19, 2018 in the club's debut of the opener.
- ◆ Helmet worn by Evan Longoria on Aug 1, 2017 when he hit for the cycle.
- ◆ Bat used by Evan Longoria on Sep 28, 2011 to hit a Wild Card-clinching 12th-inning home run.
- ◆ Cap worn by Matt Garza and a ball from his no-hitter on July 26, 2010, the only no-hitter in Rays history.
- ◆ Spikes worn by Carl Crawford to steal a single-game record of six bases on May 3, 2009.
- ◆ Spikes worn by B.J. Upton in the 2008 World Series and the bat he used to hit 4 HR in the ALCS against the Red Sox.
- ◆ Ball hit by Rocco Baldelli to establish a rookie record for hits (39) in a month, April 2003.
- ◆ Jersey, cap, spikes and batting gloves worn by Wade Boggs on Aug 7, 1999 to record his 3,000th career hit, as well as game tickets and lineup cards.




