Jays Care Foundation, the charitable arm of the Toronto Blue Jays, uses baseball to teach life skills and create lasting social change for children and youth all across Canada. Jays Care provides opportunities to kids across the country facing some of the most pronounced barriers, including:

- Kids living in inner cities
- Kids living with disabilities
- Kids living in Indigenous and northern communities
- Girls without access to sport

In 2019, Jays Care will invest over \$7 million to level the playing field for over 65,000 #UnstoppableKids from coast to coast to coast.



JAYS CARE PROGRAMS

ROOKIE LEAGUE:

Across Canada, the Rookie League program is tailored to the specific needs, goals and assets of each community where it is run. For some communities, Rookie League is a year-round baseball league that meets weekly. For others, it is a baseball program that is integrated into an existing summer day camp. For all communities, Rookie League is designed to be a best-in-class experience that enables parents, caregivers and Elders to feel confident that their children are safe, active, surrounded by well-trained and inspiring local role models while engaging in activities that are specifically designed to help them learn essential life skills continuing to break barriers to accessible organized

CHALLENGER BASEBALL:

Challenger Baseball is an adaptive baseball program specifically designed to empower kids living with physical and/or cognitive disabilities. Through playing baseball, the program helps kids living with disabilities realize that they can and should participate in sport all while connecting players and families to a social network that is often lacking for children living with disabilities.

GIRLS AT BAT:

Girls At Bat is Jays Care's girls-only baseball program, designed for and by girls and young women with the goal of making playing and coaching baseball fun and safe for those who typically don't have the courage to get involved in team sports. By combining fun, challenging baseball skills with team-building exercises, Girls At Bat empowers girls with the confidence, self-esteem and leadership capacity they need to succeed on and off the field.



FIELD OF DREAMS:

To play is to learn! Field Of Dreams is Jays Care’s granting program dedicated to infrastructure development that provides a forum for youth to grow their life skills and physical activity. The Field Of Dreams program provides funding to design, refurbish and build safe spaces for children and youth across Canada. Jays Care has invested over \$7.5 million across 70 projects over the past five years.

RBI (REVIVING BASEBALL IN INNER CITIES):

Launched in 2018 in partnership with MLB, RBI is a school-based program intended to provide children in inner-city communities the opportunity to participate in organized baseball. The program is currently executed in Ontario and New Brunswick with plans underway to extend to additional areas. The program is implemented in schools identified as having limited access to sports programming.

HOME RUN SCHOLARS:

Home Run Scholars is an after-school program that provides a safe space for kids who reside in low-income, underserved communities. The program is designed to use the after-school hours to enhance physical health, emotional well-being and academic success for youth in Toronto Community Housing neighbourhoods. Participants also receive healthy nourishment thanks to The Spport Foundation.

TAKE ME OUT TO THE BALLGAME:

Take Me Out to the Ballgame helps remove barriers for kids so they can experience the magic of a Blue Jays game first-hand. Jays Care offers ballpark experiences through the Jays Care Community Clubhouse, ticket reallocation from our generous fans and through our partnership with Kids Up Front.



HOW OUR PROGRAMS WORK

- 1) Jays Care identifies the right partners
- 2) Together, we establish the pillar(s) we are working towards
- 3) We then co-design a program to achieve those goals (using baseball as a core vehicle)
- 4) Jays Care trains volunteers, coaches and front-line staff
- 5) Partner organizations deliver the program, Jays Care offers coaching and support

- Build knowledge
- Build skills
- Make connections
- Identify personal strengths and long term goals

Over time, this leads to a considerable impact on the lives of children and youth, including:

- Enhanced physical health
- Enhanced protective factors
- Improved behaviours after school
- Improved academic performance

CLUB OFFICERS



MARK SHAPIRO **PRESIDENT & CEO, TORONTO BLUE JAYS**

Now entering his 28th year in baseball, Mark Shapiro is widely recognized as one of MLB's top executives and a key leader for his meaningful contributions to all aspects of the game. Following 24 seasons within the Indians organization, he was appointed as President and CEO of the Toronto Blue Jays on November 2, 2015, where he oversees both the baseball and business operations for the club. His career in baseball began in January of 1992 when he joined the Indians as an assistant in Baseball Operations. Later he spent five seasons as the club's Director of Minor League Operations from 1994-1998, before becoming Vice President, Baseball Operations & Assistant General Manager from 1999-2001. Prior to joining the Blue Jays, Shapiro spent five seasons as President of the Cleveland Indians (2011-2015), after spending the previous nine as Executive Vice President and General Manager (2002-2010). Following both the 2005 and 2007 seasons, he was named the Sporting News Executive of the Year, the only active GM at the time in Major League Baseball to win the award twice. Shapiro was also named the Executive of the Year by Baseball America in 2005, and in 2007, was named to the elite "40 under 40" by Sports Business Journal, as well as being listed on Baseball America's "Ten to Watch" list. His leadership and impact goes beyond the club level, where he continues to be involved in various key initiatives led by the Office of the Commissioner. From 2010-2014, Shapiro served on Commissioner Selig's Special Committee for On-Field Matters, and was previously on the MLB Ticketing Committee, which examined marketplace issues relative to digital ticketing, alternative revenue sources and secondary ticketing market/dynamic pricing. In 2015, Commissioner Rob Manfred named him to the then newly-formed Competition Committee – a group under Manfred's Ownership Committee structure that continues to address on-field issues relative to Major League Baseball. In addition to the Competition Committee, he also currently serves on the Strategic Planning Committee and the Revenue Sharing Definitions Committee. The Baltimore, MD native played four years of football for the Princeton University Tigers, graduating in 1989 with a degree in history.



ROSS ATKINS **EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT, BASEBALL OPERATIONS & GENERAL MANAGER**

Ross Atkins was named the seventh general manager in franchise history on December 3, 2015. Prior to that, he spent his entire professional career with the Cleveland Indians organization after being selected in the 38th round of the 1995 draft as a right-handed pitcher. He joined the Indians' front office in 2000 following his playing career. Atkins has worked in Player Development over the last 15 seasons, with his most recent role as Vice President of Player Personnel, where he oversaw all elements of the Indians Player Development system. He previously served as Vice President of Player Development from 2011-2014 and as Director of Player Development from 2007-2010. His ascension in the Cleveland system also included three seasons, from 2004-2006, as the Director of Latin American Operations. Atkins spent four years playing baseball for Wake Forest University where he received a Bachelor's Degree in economics and was a member of the ACC honour roll. He now resides in Toronto with his wife, Christine, and their two daughters, Jane and Marita.



ANDREW MILLER **EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT, BUSINESS OPERATIONS**

Andrew Miller enters his fourth season with the Toronto Blue Jays after joining the club in May of 2016. In his current role, he directs the club's business operations and works closely with the other members of the executive leadership team on organizational strategy. Since joining the Blue Jays, Miller has been integrally involved in planning for Rogers Centre and Dunedin facility renovations, has led the implementation of new business departments focused on fan engagement, fan services and strategy and analytics and has overseen the enhancement of business-related systems and processes. Prior to joining the Blue Jays, Miller spent 10 seasons with the Cleveland Indians, with the final four as Senior Vice President of Strategy & Business Analytics. He began his baseball career in 2006 with the Indians, serving as Baseball Operations Assistant for the 2007 season and Assistant Director of Baseball Operations from 2008-2010, before being promoted to assist Mark Shapiro during his transition to team President. In his roles within Baseball Operations, Miller was involved in every aspect of the Cleveland's Major League team operations, focusing on financial, contractual and strategic elements of player acquisitions and negotiations. He was also instrumental in the development, construction and operations of Cleveland's Goodyear Player Development Complex in Arizona. Prior to joining the Indians in 2006, he spent nearly seven years working in the investment banking and venture capital industries before completing a JD-MBA at Northwestern University in 2007. Miller graduated with a BS in Business Administration in 1997 from the Haas School of Business at UC Berkeley, where he also spent four years as a left-handed pitcher on the Cal baseball team. Andrew's brother, Geoff, currently serves as the Mental Skills Coach for the Philadelphia Phillies and since 2005 has worked for several Major League Baseball teams including the Atlanta Braves, Los Angeles Angels, Pittsburgh Pirates and Washington Nationals. Miller now resides in Toronto with his wife, Jill, and their two children, Alana and Evan.





ROBERTO ALOMAR
SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE ORGANIZATION

A 12-time All-Star and 10-time Gold Glove winning second baseman, Roberto Alomar was elected to the Hall of Fame in a ceremony on July 24, 2011. He then received the 3rd highest vote total in history at 90% majority. Along with Roy Halladay, Alomar is one of only two players in Blue Jays history to have their number retired. Over his 17-year career, he batted .300 with a .371 on-base percentage and .443 slugging percentage with the San Diego Padres, Toronto Blue Jays, Baltimore Orioles, Cleveland Indians, New York Mets, Chicago White Sox and Arizona Diamondbacks. The switch-hitter totaled 2,724 hits, 1,508 runs, 504 doubles, 80 triples, 210 home runs, 474 stolen bases and 1,134 RBI. Alomar was a key contributor of the World Series Championship clubs in 1992 and 1993, earning MVP honours for his performance in the 1992 AL Championship Series. The 1998 MVP of the All-Star game in Denver, Colorado became just the 20th second basemen to enter the Hall of Fame. He also became the first Toronto Blue Jays

player to enter the Hall with a Blue Jays cap.



SANDY ALOMAR SR.
SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE ORGANIZATION

Sandy Alomar is entering his seventh season with the organization and his third as a consultant for the front office. He previously worked for Player Development in a consultant's role from 2013-2015. Alomar has been involved with professional baseball since 1961, making his Major League debut with the Milwaukee Braves in 1964 at the age of 20. The Puerto Rico native went on to play 15 seasons in the Majors and was recognized as a valuable defender who had the ability to play both the infield and outfield. Following his playing career, he became a Major League coach beginning in 1986 with the Padres where he coached his two sons, Sandy Jr. and Roberto. He later joined the Cubs, Rockies and Mets organizations in a variety of coaching capacities, including serving as the bench coach during the 2005, 2008 and 2009 seasons with New York. In addition to his role as a consultant, Alomar actively participates in the Blue Jays Baseball Academy initiatives which aims to develop baseball in Canada.



CARLOS DELGADO
SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE ORGANIZATION

Carlos Delgado joined the club in a consultant role in 2016 after having played 12 seasons for Toronto. The two-time All-Star (2000, 2003) remains the franchise leader in home runs (336), RBI (1,058), walks (827), slugging percentage (.556), OPS (.949), runs (889), total bases (2,786), doubles (343), extra base hits (690), times on base (2,362), hit-by-pitch (122), intentional walks (128) and at-bats per home run (14.9). In 2000, he was named the Hank Aaron Award winner and the Sporting News Player of the Year. Delgado became the 10th member of the Level of Excellence on July 21, 2013. He holds the record for most home runs (473) and RBI (1,512) among all Puerto Rican born players and is one of only six players in MLB history to hit 30+ home runs in 10 consecutive seasons (4th player to do so). The first baseman was inducted into the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame in 2015. In 2001, he established Extra Bases, a not-for-profit organization created to assist charities in Puerto Rico and other countries like Canada, US and Venezuela, among others to serve underprivileged youth and children. Through the organization, several significant contributions have been made to different causes in Puerto Rico and abroad, including a one million dollar donation to Special Olympics Canada.



PAT HENTGEN
SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE ORGANIZATION

Pat Hentgen was born November 13, 1968 in Detroit, Michigan. Along with Cito Gaston, was the first to be named a club ambassador. During his career, Hentgen was named the 1996 American League Cy Young Award winner and Sporting News Pitcher of the Year. In 14 seasons, he appeared in 344 games, posting a 131-112 record and an ERA of 4.32. The righty spent 10 seasons in a Blue Jays uniform, winning a career-best 20 games in his 1996 Cy Young season. He is one of five Blue Jays to win 20+ games in a season (Morris, Clemens, Wells, Halladay) and holds the Blue Jays record for wins on the road with Roy Halladay at 12. Hentgen appeared in the postseason on two occasions (Toronto-1993/St. Louis-2000). He started one World Series game in 1993 at PHI, picking up the win with six innings of one-run ball. He was also selected as an All-Star on three occasions (1993, 1994, 1997). Hentgen was the Blue Jays' Bullpen Coach during the 2011 and 2013 seasons. 2019 marks his seventh season as a Special Assistant.



PAUL QUANTRILL
SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE ORGANIZATION

Paul Quantrill was Born, November 3, 1968 and played 14 seasons in the Majors, appearing in 841 games with Boston, Philadelphia, Toronto, Los Angeles-NL, New York-AL, San Diego and Florida while posting a career 3.83 ERA. He led the league in appearances in each of 2001, 2002 and 2003. Quantrill was selected to the All-Star game in 2011 as a Blue Jay. He holds the Yankees record for appearances with 86 in 2004. The right-hander spent six seasons in a Blue Jays uniform from 1996-2001, going 30-34 with a 3.67 ERA. The London, Ontario native was inducted into the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame on June 19, 2010.





TIM RAINES
SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE ORGANIZATION

Born September 13, 1959 in Sanford, Florida, 2018 marks Tim Raines' seventh season with the Blue Jays and his second in this role. He previously held the position of Outfield/Baserunning Coordinator from 2013-2017. Raines was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame on July 30, 2017. He was also inducted into the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame in 2013. The outfielder spent 23 seasons in the Major Leagues with Montreal (1980-1990, 2001), Chicago-AL (1991-1995), New York-AL (1996-1998), Oakland (1999), Baltimore (2001) and Florida (2002). He hit .294 (2605 hits) with 170 home runs, 980 RBI, 808 stolen bases and a .385 OBP. Among the all-time leaders, he ranks 5th in stolen bases, 38th in walks and is tied for 80th in hits. Raines had his #30 uniform retired by the Expos on June 19, 2004. He made his managerial debut with Brevard County (A) in the Expos' organization, posting a 53-72 record in 2004. He then spent three seasons in the White Sox' organization, including two with the Major League club from 2005-2006. In 2005, Raines was the First Base Coach on the World Series Championship team and was Bench Coach in 2006. He now has four children and resides just outside of Phoenix, Arizona.

BUSINESS OPERATIONS



MARIO R. COUTINHO
VICE PRESIDENT, STADIUM OPERATIONS & SECURITY

Mario Coutinho was named to his current position in October of 2005, overseeing the management of all Event staff and Security operations including, Investigations, Threat/Risk Assessments, BCP and Emergency Response Planning. He is also responsible for securing large scale events at Rogers Centre, including all Blue Jays home games, concerts and special events. Coutinho graduated from the University of Toronto with a Bachelor of Science degree in 1985, after having undertaken his secondary schooling at Toronto's De La Salle College. He began his career with the Blue Jays Baseball Club working part-time in 1982 in game day operations. He gained employment on a full-time basis came in 1989 as the Club's Manager of Game Operations. Coutinho currently serves on the planning committee for the annual Toronto Police Emergency Management Symposium (since 2008). He is a strong supporter of collaborative partnerships between private/public organizations in emergency management and special event planning. Mario is a founding member of SAFE (South Area Facilities and Entertainment Group), serves on the Board of TAPPS (Toronto Associations of Police and Private Security) and participates in a number of key industry associations, including ASIS, OSAC, NCS4 (National Center for Spectator Sports Safety and Security – Advisory Board member) and SMA (Stadium Managers Association – Board Member, Operations and Membership Committee member).



MARK DITMARS
VICE PRESIDENT, CORPORATE PARTNERSHIPS

Mark Ditmars joined the Toronto Blue Jays organization in July, 2011. He spent 20 years with Labatt Breweries of Canada in various Sales and Marketing roles, including Director of Marketing and Brand Management for Bud Light and Budweiser where he developed marketing strategies for sports properties, including the NFL, Super Bowl, Formula 1 and NASCAR. Ditmars was formerly Vice President Sales for EMI Music Canada responsible for Sales Revenue of many artists, including Katy Perry, Coldplay, The Beatles and Pink Floyd through retail channels such as Walmart and iTunes. The graduate from the University of Windsor is a certified amateur coach through the Ontario Baseball Association, formerly coaching in the "AAA" Mississauga Majors and Twins organizations.



JUSTIN HAY
VICE PRESIDENT, TICKET SALES, SERVICE & OPERATIONS

Justin Hay was named to his current position in November of 2016. He oversees all ticketing for the Toronto Blue Jays and Rogers Centre including Ticket Sales & Service, Group Sales, Box Office/Support, Operations and Fulfillment. He began reporting directly to the President and CEO in 2007 and was promoted to Vice President in 2011. Shuber's responsibilities include the oversight and management of all legal matters affecting the organization, as well as certain relationships and business matters relating to Major League Baseball and the Blue Jays' intellectual property. Shuber provides ongoing legal, business and strategic advice and direction on a variety of different organizational imperatives (including broadcasting, baseball operations, ticketing, merchandising, marketing and corporate partnerships). He played central role in the design, development and implementation of the Blue Jays' current logos, uniforms and related branding elements, all of which were introduced in 2012. Shuber is currently supporting the project team involved in

the redevelopment of the Blue Jays Spring Training ballpark and associated player development facilities in Dunedin, Florida, and provides advice and assistance in connection with related negotiations, agreements and relationships. Shuber was called to the Ontario Bar in 1999. He attended Schulich School of Business MBA program in 2003 on Dean's Entrance Scholarship, completing core courses. TONY LACAVAL
SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, PLAYER PERSONNEL

Tony Lacava is entering his 17th year with the Blue Jays after joining the organization on October 15, 2002 as Assistant to the General Manager. He was named Assistant General Manager, Player Personnel in October of 2007, a role he held until spring of 2011 when he was appointed Vice President, Baseball Operations and Assistant General Manager. He was then appointed to the position of Senior Vice President of Baseball Operations and Assistant General Manager in December of 2015. Lacava also served as interim General Manager during the 2015 off-season. Following his playing career, he joined the Anaheim Angels organization as an Associate Scout in 1989. The resident of Oakmont, Pennsylvania was promoted to full-time duties as an Area Scout in 1991. He was promoted again in 1996 to the position of Regional Crosschecker, serving through 1999. Lacava joined the Atlanta Braves as the National Scouting Supervisor in 2000 and was named as the Director, Player Development for the Montreal Expos in September of that year, overseeing the club's Minor League field personnel and the farm teams. He also spent the 2002 season with the Cleveland Indians as the National Crosschecker. Lacava graduated from Central Catholic in 1979 where he played baseball. He then obtained an Associates Degree from Gulf Coast Community College before transferring to the University of Pittsburgh. He left Pitt after two years to sign with the Pittsburgh Pirates as a non-drafted free agent and spent two seasons in the club's Minor League system as an infielder with Bradenton and Greenwood in 1983, and Macon in 1984. Lacava was born on May 21, 1961 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and is now married with three children.



BEN CHERINGTON
VICE PRESIDENT, BASEBALL OPERATIONS

Ben Cherington was named Vice President of Baseball Operations on September 14, 2016. Prior to that, he was named Executive Vice President/General Manager of the Boston Red Sox on October 25, 2011, a position he held until August of 2015. This season will mark his 21st in Major League Baseball, two with Toronto, 17 with Boston (four as General Manager) and one with Cleveland. Going into his second year as Boston's GM, he led one of the biggest turn-around seasons in Major League Baseball history in 2013, as the Red Sox won the division with an American League-best 97-65 record, capturing the franchise's 8th World Series Championship. Following the historic season, Cherington was named Major League Baseball's Executive of the Year by both The Sporting News and the Boston Chapter of the BBWAA. Before being named GM, he served as Boston's Senior Vice President and Assistant General Manager from January of 2009-2011. From 2006 through 2008, Cherington served as Red Sox Vice President/Player Personnel, overseeing amateur scouting and player development. He previously served as Red Sox Director, Player Development from 2002 to 2006. Cherington began his professional baseball career with the Cleveland Indians as an advance scout in 1998 and joined the Red Sox organization in 1999 as a Mid-Atlantic area scout before becoming a baseball operations assistant that May. The native of Meriden, NH pitched for Lebanon (NH) High School and graduated with a degree in English from Amherst College, where he played four years of varsity baseball. He also spent a year as an assistant coach for his alma mater while working towards his master's degree from the University of Massachusetts' Sport Management Program. Cherington completed Harvard Business School's Program for Leadership Development in 2009. He joined Columbia's University Sports Management faculty, teaching a class on leadership during the spring semester in 2016. Ben and his wife, Tyler, have two daughters, Adwen and Harper.



JOE SHEEHAN
ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

Joe Sheehan was named Assistant General Manager on September 29, 2016. He originally started with the Blue Jays in November of 2010 as Baseball Information Analyst. On January 2, 2015, he was promoted to Manager, Baseball Research and Development, a role he held until his appointment as Director of Analytics in December of 2015. In that role, he was responsible for creating and communicating many of the advanced analytic metrics and processes used by the Baseball Operations staff. Sheehan helped develop the team's internal scouting software as well as other systems used across all levels of the department and is responsible for managing departmental statistical and scouting databases. He previously worked for the Pirates from 2009-2010, both as an intern and as a Baseball Operations Data Analyst, contributing analytic work to baseball operations decisions. Sheehan interned for Padres and Rockies in 2006 and 2008 respectively. He graduated from Oberlin College (Ohio) with a degree in Biology and played baseball at Oberlin from 2002-2006. Originally from Winchester, MA (outside Boston), Sheehan currently resides in Toronto.





ANDREW TINNISH
VICE PRESIDENT, INTERNATIONAL SCOUTING

Andrew Tinnish was named as Assistant General Manager on June 21, 2012 and oversees the club's International Scouting operations. He was elevated to the position of Assistant Scouting Director in September of 2006, a role he performed until his promotion to Director, Amateur Scouting on October 9, 2009, where he oversaw the direction of the Amateur Scouts in preparation for each season's Amateur draft. Tinnish was named an Area Scout for the Blue Jays, covering North Florida and Alabama, before being promoted to Scouting Coordinator in August of 2003. During July/August of 2002, he acted as Hitting Coach for Team Canada at the FISU World University Games in Italy. JEREMY REESOR
ASSISTANT DIRECTOR, BASEBALL OPERATIONS

Entering his seventh season with the Blue Jays and sixth in the Baseball Operations department, Jeremy Reesor was promoted to his current position in January of 2019. In his current role, he contributes to the team's decision making processes in all areas of Baseball Operations with a focus on applying analytical tools to the amateur draft, Major League transactions, and advance scouting. Reesor joined the Blue Jays in 2013 as a Field Conversion Technician before moving to Baseball Operations as an Analytics intern for the 2014 season. He was then hired as Assistant, Baseball Research prior to the 2015 season, working closely with the Amateur Scouting staff on coordination for the draft, as well as supporting the club's Analytics team. He was promoted to Coordinator, Baseball Research prior to the 2017 season and Manager, Baseball Research prior to the 2018 season. Reesor graduated with a BSc in Honours Biology from the University of Waterloo in 2012. Originally from Stouffville, ON, he currently resides in Toronto with his wife, Marie.

TORONTO BLUE JAYS OWNERSHIP

On March 26, 1976, the American League granted an expansion franchise to a group consisting of Labatt Breweries, Imperial Trust Limited and The Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce. Both Labatt Breweries and Imperial Trust each controlled 45% of the team. The C.I.B.C. had the other 10% of the club. Imperial Trust was a holding company set up by the late R. Howard Webster, who was instrumental in the granting of the franchise in 1976. The Webster family still maintained their share of the ownership until selling their 45% to Labatt in November, 1991. The ownership then consisted of John Labatt Limited, 90% and Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce, 10%. In June of 1995 John Labatt Limited was purchased by Interbrew S.A., Belgium's leading brewer.

In September of 2000, local ownership returned to the Toronto Blue Jays as Rogers Communications Inc. purchased 80% control of the franchise. John Labatt Limited (Interbrew) maintains a 20% interest while The Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce relinquished their stake. In January of 2004 Rogers Communications Inc. acquired the remaining 20% of the Club. Rogers Communications Inc. now owns 100% of the Toronto Blue Jays Baseball Club.

On November 29, 2004, the Toronto Blue Jays reached an agreement with Sportsco International to acquire the former SkyDome. The purchase price for the stadium, now known as Rogers Centre, was approximately \$25 million (CDN).





ANGUS MUGFORD **VICE PRESIDENT, HIGH PERFORMANCE**

Angus Mugford was appointed to oversee the formation of a new department by Mark Shapiro in 2015. This department is one of the first to exclusively focus on the holistic support of the development and performance of players, coaches and staff. Mugford oversees the integration of an interdisciplinary performance team, including sports medicine, strength and conditioning, mental performance, and nutrition with a sport science-based approach. He came to the Blue Jays from IMG (International Management Group), where he had served for over a decade, leading their external consulting through the IMG Institute. There he developed programs and oversaw mental conditioning and performance programs as part of IMG Academy, for professional and junior athletes and coaches, as well as US military special operations and executives. Mugford has a PhD from the University of Kansas and in 2015 he was elected by his peers as the president of the Association for Applied Sport Psychology (AASP), the leading professional organization for applied sport psychology consultants in the world. He has authored in many academic and professional publications, presented at conferences across the globe, and has a track record as a consultant on mental performance as well as leadership, culture change and human performance teams. Mugford is originally from the United Kingdom, but now lives in Florida with his wife Sarah and their sons, Will and Tom.



CLIVE BREWER **ASSISTANT DIRECTOR, HIGH PERFORMANCE**

Clive Brewer joined the organization in 2016 as the Assistant Director of High Performance – Programs. He previously consulted with a number of other organizations around the globe, such as Manchester United FC, USA Football, Wimbledon tennis championships, the UK Strength and Conditioning Association, Scotland National Rugby League, Liverpool Ladies FC, the International Association of Athletics Federations (IAAF), and IMG Academy. Brewer is a world recognized expert in athletic performance development and applied sports science. A total of 154 people submitted the name "Blue Jays" and a drawing was held to select a grand prize winner from those who submitted the name. Dr. William Mills of Etobicoke, Ontario, won a pair of season tickets for 1977 and an all-expenses paid trip for himself and his family to watch the Blue Jays at spring training in Dunedin, Florida. Nine runners-up also won season tickets.





2006-2008:

- Made his **MLB debut** on May 23, 2006 at TEX, going 3-for-3...Singled in his 1st career plate appearance and hit a two-run home run off **Vicente Padilla** in his next at-bat.
- Split 2007 and 2008 between Triple-A Salt Lake and the Angels.
- Hit .234 in 57G for the Angles in 2007...Batted .213 across 27G in 2008.

2009:

STIEB'S NO-HITTER

SEPTEMBER 2, 1990 AT CLEVELAND — TORONTO 3, CLEVELAND 0

DAVE STIEB chalked up his first no-hitter and the first in BLUE JAYS history as he stopped the Cleveland Indians on a sunny Sunday afternoon at Cleveland Stadium before a crowd of 23,640.

The game ended as Cleveland's Jerry Browne whacked a fly to right field where JUNIOR FELIX put the squeeze on it.

Stieb had a season high nine strikeouts and walked four over his 122-pitch afternoon.

There were no tough plays and only a couple of well hit balls. Closest the Tribe came to a hit was KEN PHELPS pulling a liner about three feet foul to open the eighth inning.

The BLUE JAYS and Stieb got their offensive support from FRED McGRUFF who hit two solo home runs and from MANNY LEE who doubled home KENNY WILLIAMS in the fifth inning.

Stieb had previously gone 8.2 innings, three times, protecting no-hitters. He had back-to-back attempts in September 1988; on September 24, 1988 at Cleveland Stadium, JULIO FRANCO had a bad hop single over second baseman MANNY LEE's head. In his next start, against Baltimore at Exhibition Stadium, JIM TRABER looped a single over first baseman FRED McGRUFF's outstretched glove hand. Both no-hit bids were lost on 2-2 pitches. STIEB also had a perfect game for 8.2 innings on August 4, 1989 vs the Yankees at SkyDome. ROBERTO KELLY doubled to left to break it up.

2008:

- Made his **MLB debut** for the White Sox on July 23, 2008, taking a no decision vs. TEX (4.0 IP, 7H, 4ER, 1BB, 7K).
- In his two Major League stints, went 2-5 over 13 outings (eight starts) with a 6.04 ERA.

PROFESSIONAL CAREER:

2014:

- Made his **MLB debut** on July 23 vs. BOS, tossing 2.0 innings while recording two strikeouts.
- Earned three saves in three opportunities...Became the 4th youngest pitcher in club history to record a save after collecting his 1st save on August 30 vs. NYY (2.0 IP, 0R, 0H, 3K).

2015:

- Earned his 1st win of the season and 1st victory as a starter on April 22 vs. BAL...Issued seven free passes, the first time since Sept. 8, 1995 that a Toronto starter walked 7+ batters and won the game (**Jeff Ware**, Sept. 8, 1995 - 8BB).
- On May 8 vs. BOS, marked the first time a Toronto starter tossed at least 7.0 scoreless IP while recording more walks (5) than strikeouts (3) in a start since May 6, 2010 at CWS (**Dana Eveland** - 7.0 IP, 4BB, 3K)...In fact, it was just the 2nd time it had happened for Toronto over the last 17 seasons (2001-2017).
- Tossed a career-high 8.0 innings on June 5 vs. HOU while allowing just one earned run...Did not issue a walk for the 1st time in his career as a starter.
- Was ejected for the 1st time in his career after hitting **Alcides Escobar** in the 8th inning on August 2 vs. KC.
- Earned his 1st postseason victory in Game 5 vs. TEX in the ALDS, becoming the youngest pitcher in franchise history to record a playoff win.

- Set an MLB record in with 11 home runs in the 9th inning or later (four more than any other player that season).
- His career-high 38 home runs were the most all-time by a Toronto switch-hitter and the most by any switch-hitter since **Mark Teixeira** hit 39 HR in 2011.

PROFESSIONAL CAREER:

2014:

- Joined the club on May 4 and made his **MLB debut** that night at PIT (0.2 IP, 1H, 1ER)...Made five appearances in relief before being optioned on May 18.
- Picked up his 1st Major League victory on May 6 at PHI...Entered in the 9th inning of a 5-5 tie, holding the Phillies scoreless...The Jays scored in the 10th for a 6-5 win.
- Was recalled to make his MLB debut as a starter on May 31 vs. KC and remained in the rotation for the balance of the season (made 20 starts)...Was one of three Blue Jays to post 6+ strikeouts with zero walks in their 1st career MLB start (6.0 IP, 5H, 1ER, 0BB, 6K), joining **Jose Nunez** (11K/0BB) vs. KC on July 9, 1987 and **Brett Cecil** (6K/0BB) vs. CLE on May 5, 2009.
- Earned three consecutive victories from July 19-29 while allowing just one run over 21.0 IP...Included was a one-hit, seven-inning performance on July 24 vs. BOS...Lost his no-hitter when **Shane Victorino** singled to lead off the 7th inning.
- Allowed just 0.45 HR/9 as a starter, the best figure on the staff...Only **Garrett Richards** with a 0.29 HR/9 had a better number in the AL among qualified pitchers.
- Became just the 9th Toronto rookie to throw a shutout of at least 9.0 IP on Sept. 8 vs. CHC (last: **Dave Bush** on Oct. 1, 2004 vs. NYY-2H)...Became just the 2nd Toronto rookie to toss a shutout without walking a batter (**Roy Halladay** - Sept. 27, 1998 vs. DET)...Became the 6th different Toronto rookie to record at least two, 9.0 IP outings in the same season (1st since **John Cerutti** in 1986)...The others are **Jerry Garvin** (9x, 1977), **Jim Clancy** (3x, 1977), **Dave Stieb** (6x, 1979) and **Phil Huffman** (2x, 1979).
- In his last appearance of the season, on Sept. 26 vs. BAL, worked 4.0 scoreless innings in relief to record his 1st career save...It marked the 7th time (6th different player) in club history that a pitcher has recorded at least 10 wins as a starter while collecting a save in the same season (last: **Shaun Marcum** in 2007 - 11 wins/1 save) and the 1st time by a rookie...Became just the 5th rookie pitcher in the Majors to accomplish the feat since 1990 (last: **Francisco Liriano** in 2006).
- Among rookies in 2014, ranked T-4th in wins (11) and 3rd in winning percentage (.647) despite ranking only T-10th in starts (20)...His 11 wins as a rookie are 5th most in team history and the most by a Blue Jay since **Ricky Romero** won 13 in 2009.

2015:

- Made four starts after returning from left knee surgery (torn ACL suffered in spring training)...With a 1.67 ERA, became the 4th Blue Jays pitcher to win each of his first four starts of a season with an ERA under 2.00, joining **Jimmy Key** in 1991 (1.86 ERA), **Pat Hentgen** in 1993 (1.67) and **Mark Buehrle** in 2014 (0.64).
- Became the 1st modern-era pitcher to win his first four starts of the season in September for a first place team.
- In his 1st career start in the playoffs (Game 2 of the ALDS vs. TEX), allowed three runs over the first two frames before retiring 15 of the next 18 batters.
- Allowed a career-high 11 hits in Game 3 of the 2015 ALCS vs. KC...Gave up four earned runs over 6.1 innings to earn his 1st career postseason win.

2016:

- Became the 3rd youngest pitcher (24.338) to make an Opening Day start for Toronto...**Drew Hutchison** (24.227) was the youngest in 2015 with **Todd Stottlemyre** (24.324) being 2nd youngest in 1990...At 5'8", he was the shortest Opening Day starting pitcher since 1971 (**Tom Phoebus**, San Diego - also 5'8")...Became just the 2nd pitcher in Blue Jays history to start a season opener and a home opener in the same season, joining **Jimmy Key** who did so in 1989.
- On April 3 at TB, came within three outs of joining **Jack Morris** in 1992 as the only Toronto starters with a complete game on Opening Day...At 8.0 IP, tied **Pat Hentgen** in 1997 for the 2nd longest start by a Blue Jay on Opening Day...At 24 years, 338 days, was the youngest MLB starter to go at least 8.0 IP on Opening Day since **Felix Hernandez** in 2009 (22 years, 363 days) and the youngest to pitch into the 9th frame since **Mark Mulder** in 2002 (24 years, 239 days).
- Allowed one run over 8.0 innings on May 1 at TB and was rewarded with the victory when Toronto scored four runs in the top of the ninth for a 5-1 win over the Rays...Had a then career-high nine strikeouts, the most ever by a Blue Jays pitcher on their birthday...Retired 17 of his last 18 batters faced.
- Suffered his 1st loss of the season on May 17 vs. TB, snapping a streak of 16 starts without a defeat...Had his nine-game winning streak snapped as well...The seven earned runs allowed set a career-high.
- Had his homerless innings streak at home snapped at 67.2 in his start vs. BOS on May 28...The home run to **Xander Bogaerts** also snapped a streak of 31.1 innings overall without allowing one...Marked the first home run given up to a BOS hitter in his career (37.0 IP).
- Suffered his first loss in seven career starts vs. BOS on June 4 at Fenway Park... Allowed 6+ ER in consecutive starts for the first time in his career...Walked a then career-high five batters, the first time he walked more than three in a start.
- Matched his season-high with 8.0 IP on July 20 at ARI and did not issue a walk when tossing at least 8.0 IP for the 2nd time in his career (also Sept. 8, 2014 vs. CHC).
- Struck out a career-high 13 batters on Aug. 1 at HOU, allowing just 1ER on three hits...Did not factor in the decision as the Jays lost 2-1 in 14-innings...Marked the 1st 10+ strikeout game of his career.
- Committed two errors for the 1st time in his career on Aug. 7 at KC...Became the 13th Toronto pitcher (15th time) to record multiple errors in a game and the first since **Josh Johnson** on July 3, 2013.
- Lost five consecutive starts for the first time in his career from Sept. 2-19, despite tossing quality starts in three of those outings.
- Finished the regular season with the MLB lead in ground ball percentage (61.4%).
- Started the 2016 Wild Card Game vs. BAL on Oct 4, allowing two runs over six innings, leaving in a 2-2 tie...The Jays went on to win 5-2 in 11 innings on a three-run walk-off **Edwin Encarnacion** home run.
- Suffered his 1st career postseason loss in Game 3 of the 2016 ALCS after allowing four earned runs over 5.1 innings.
- His .171 opponents' average was the 5th lowest among all pitchers in the playoffs (minimum 40 at-bats).



2017:

- Named MVP of the World Baseball Classic, posting a 1-1 record with a 2.35 ERA (4 ER/15.1 IP, 12 H, 2BB, 9K) for Team USA...Pitched a no-hitter until the first batter of the 7th inning (**Angel Pagan**) in the championship game, the only hit he allowed over 6.0+ innings to go along with one walk and three strikeouts in an 8-0 victory over Puerto Rico...His work in the final game also earned him the USABA International Performance of the Year Award in December.
- Ranked 1st in the Majors in ground ball percentage (62.9%) for the second straight year, and led all starters in ground ball to fly ball ratio (3.59).
- Also ranked 1st in the Majors with 34 ground-ball double plays, the 2nd most in a season all-time by a Toronto pitcher (**Dave Stieb** - 35 in 1980).
- Pitched 200+ innings for the second straight season, one of just seven pitchers to do so in both 2016 and 2017.
- Hurled 7+ innings 12 times while all other Toronto starters combined for 18 such outings.

- Put together a career-best six-game win streak over 10 starts from April 23-June 10 (2.77 ERA, 16BB/53K).
- Struck out a season-high 10 batters on April 28 vs. TB, his 2nd career 10+ strikeout game (13 SO on Aug. 1, 2016 at HOU).
- Threw a career-high 119 pitches over 7.2 scoreless innings on June 28 vs. BAL.
- Issued a career-high six walks on July 27, 2017 vs. OAK before being ejected in the 5th inning by HP umpire Will Little.
- Pitched 8.0 innings without allowing an ER on Aug. 11 vs. PIT, his longest outing without an ER since Sept. 8, 2014 vs. CHC (complete game shutout).
- Surrendered three homers for the 4th time in his career on Aug. 23 at TB (3rd time in 2017, last: June 22 at TEX).
- Left the game in the 2nd inning after being struck on the forearm by a **Mark Trumbo** line drive on Sept. 2 at BAL.
- Over his last 18 starts, limited opponents to just 8-HR while posting a 2.58 ERA...Over his last seven games, held left-handed hitters to a .145 AVG (8-for-55).

PROFESSIONAL CAREER:**2015:**

- Homered in his **MLB debut** on April 6 at NYY...Became just the 2nd player in club history to hit a HR as their 1st hit in their Major League debut that occurred on Opening Day...The only other Blue Jay to accomplish that feat was **Al Woods** in the club's very first game in 1977 vs. CWS (PH-HR)...It was the 4th time a Jay hit a HR in their ML debut (last: **J.P. Arencibia**, Aug. 7, 2010 vs. TB) and the 9th time for a Toronto player to record a HR as their 1st career hit...Marked the 1st player in MLB since **Jason Heyward** (2010) to hit a HR as his 1st hit in his MLB debut on Opening Day.
- Hit his 1st leadoff home run on April 17 vs. ATL, becoming the first Blue Jays rookie to do so since **Russ Adams** on Sept. 22, 2004.
- His .614 SLG in April was the highest for any second baseman since 1914 (**Jerry Coleman**-NYY was 2nd with a .575 SLG in 1949)...His 1.018 is the highest OPS by any Blue Jays rookie in the month of April.
- Earned AL Rookie of the Month honours for April...Led all rookies in hits (26), runs scored (17), home runs (6) and RBI (19) while posting a .325 average and a 1.018 OPS.
- On May 3 at CLE, hit his 1st career grand slam...Marked the 8th slam by a rookie in club history and first since **Brett Lawrie** on Aug. 10, 2011 vs. OAK.
- Collected his 1st career pinch-hit on July 26 at SEA, a single, in his 1st career opportunity.
- At the time of his placement on the DL on July 31, ranked 1st in 2B (18), RBI (35), 2nd in hits (66) and XBH (26), 3rd in BB (18), and 4th in HR (8) and total bases (108) among rookies.
- Was placed on the disabled list twice in 2015 with left shoulder inflammation (May 22-June 25 and July 31 through the end of the season)...Had exploratory surgery on September 23...Was discovered to have a pre-existing acromion bone non-union in his shoulder that is a condition known as an Os Acromiale (non-union of the acromion bone or additional bone in his shoulder)...Underwent surgery at end of October to stabilize the additional bone.

2016:

- Set career highs in runs (54), hits (123), doubles (28), home runs (11), RBI (50), walks (20), strikeouts (87) and stolen bases (4).
- Began the season rehabbing his injured left shoulder after offseason surgery...Appeared in nine Minor League games (Dunedin-4G, Buffalo-5G) on his rehab assignment where he hit .306 (11-for-36) with four doubles and eight RBI.
- Made his season debut on May 25 at NYY, going 1-for-4...It was his first Major League action since July 28, 2015 vs. PHI (left game due to a season-ending shoulder injury).

- Became the 3rd different player in club history to hit a leadoff home run in back-to-back games after doing so on Aug. 5-6... Was the first Blue Jays player to accomplish the feat since since **Jose Cruz Jr.** (April 22-23, 2000)...The only other Jay to do so was **Damaso Garcia** in 1983.
- Recorded his 1st career four-hit game, including his 1st career triple to leadoff the game, on Aug. 8 vs. TB...It was the first four-hit game by a Toronto second basemen at home since **Joe Inglett** on Aug. 21, 2008.
- Hit safely in a career-high 17 straight games from Sept. 3-20, the longest hitting streak by a Blue Jay in 2016...Hit .392 (29-for-74) over that span.
- Had a career-high 19 game on-base streak from Sept. 3-23...Over those 19 games, posted a line of .378/.400/.463.
- Made his postseason debut in the 2016 AL Wild Card Game, going 1-for-5...Singled in the bottom of the 11th inning and eventually scored the game-winning run on Edwin Encarnacion's 3R walk-off HR.
- Missed Games 2 and 3 of the 2016 ALDS due to a bone bruise in his right knee.
- Was forced to be removed from the 2016 ALCS roster following Game 1 due to a right knee injury, a separate injury from the one that forced him from the ALDS...Underwent offseason surgery to remove a small flap of cartilage that was caught in his right knee joint.

2017:

- Played in a career-low 50 games in before being placed on the DL on June 6 for the remainder of the season with a bone bruise on his right knee.
- Drove in a run with a single in the 9th inning on April 14 vs. BAL to end a career-long 0-for-29 hitless drought.
- Stole two bases for the 1st time in his career on April 27 at STL (GM2), one of two Blue Jays with a multi-steal game in 2017 (**Kevin Pillar** - April 19 vs. BOS).

- Put together a 13-game hitting streak from May 14-29, the longest by a Blue Jay in 2017.
- Doubled twice in three consecutive games from May 14-16, giving him 13 doubles in 17 games after hitting just one in his first 19 games...The 3G stretch was tied with **Odubel Herrera** for the longest multi-double streak in 2017.
- Hit his 2nd career grand slam on May 26 vs. TEX (also May 3, 2015 at CLE), becoming the 1st Toronto second basemen with multiple grand slams...Marked the first grand slam by a Toronto #8 hitter since **Brett Lawrie** on April 15, 2014 vs. MIN.
- Tied a career high with four hits on May 29 vs. CIN (also Aug. 8, 2016 vs. TB) while picking up his 16th double of the month.
- Led the Majors with 16 doubles in May (next closest player had 10)...Those 16-2B were T-4th most in any month by a second basemen in MLB history (**Billy Herman**, CHC-19 in July, 1935; **Brian Roberts**, BAL-17 in June 2008 and **Frankie Frisch**, STL-17 in May 1930)...It was the most doubles hit by any Toronto player in May and 3rd most in any month.
- Led the Majors with 20 XBH in May, the 2nd most by a Toronto player in May (**Edwin Encarnacion**-22 in 2014) and the most by any second basemen in club history for any month (previous: **Aaron Hill**-16 in Sept., 2009).
- Among the AL in May, ranked 4th in AVG (.364) and T-7th in hits (36)...Hit just .130 (10-for-77) with 3-XBH in April.

THAT'S A WRAP:

- The Blue Jays finished the 2018 season at 73-89...The .451 win percentage was their lowest since holding the same record in 2012...Wrapped up their campaign at 35.0 games back of the division-leading Red Sox, their largest deficit to end a season since 1980 (36.0 GB of NYY).
- The Jays started the year with a March/April record of 16-12, tied for 5th best in the AL and their best in an opening month since 2009 (15-9, .625)...Then went 9-19 in May, finishing the month without consecutive wins at any point...Had only three times previously gone a month without back-to-back wins (July, 1977; Sept., 1978; May, 1979)...The .321 win% was the club's lowest for the month of May since 1981 (.310).
- Toronto finished the unofficial first half at 43-52...The .453 win% ranked 31st among its 42 seasons...Completed the season by winning eight of their last 15 games.

HERE AND THERE:

- The Blue Jays finished with a home record of 40-41 for their first sub-.500 season at Rogers Centre since 2013 (40-41)...Hit 115 home runs at home, 2nd in the AL to only the Yankees (144).
- The Jays went 33-48 on the road, tied for 9th among AL clubs...Had a road ERA of 5.32, 2nd highest in the AL (BAL-5.70) and the highest in team history (1994: 5.28).

CLAIMING THE CLOSE ONES:

- After posting the AL's lowest win% in extra-inning games over the previous five seasons, the Blue Jays went 10-6 (.625) in extras during 2018 for the 4th best win% in the Majors and their best since a 13-4 record in 2011.
- The Jays went 23-17 in one-run games...The .575 win% was Toronto's 7th best all-time...Last had a winning record in one-run games in 2011, going 29-28 (.509) in those contests.
- The club also held a record of 9-3 in walk-off games, a season after posting a franchise-worst 7-15 record in such affairs...Came back to take 42 of their 73 victories...The 57.5% clip was the 2nd highest in team history (57.6% in 1978).

DIVISIONAL DEVELOPMENTS:

- Toronto won seven of its last 12 division games and ended up with an overall record of 30-46 against the AL East...Went 14-5 against Baltimore but were 6-13 vs. both New York and Tampa Bay while going 4-15 vs. Boston for their most losses in a season to a single team all-time...The .395 win% in division games was Toronto's lowest since holding the same record in 2013.

BO-ROOKIE CAMPAIGN:

- Ryan Borucki wrapped up his rookie season, posted a September ERA of 2.65 (10 ER/34.0 IP), 9th best among AL starters, with an opponents' average of .165, which was 4th best for the month.
- The 24-year-old's 11 quality starts last season tied Marco Estrada for the team lead and were the most by a Toronto rookie since Marcus Stroman tossed 14 in 2014...His 3.87 ERA ranked 6th best all-time by a Blue Jays rookie (min. 12 starts).

OH LOURDES:

- Lourdes Gurriel Jr. had multiple hits in 11 consecutive games from July 11-29...**The multi-hit streak was the longest in team history (Tony Fernandez: 9 in 1986).**
- The 24-year-old became the 7th player since 1900 to record a multi-hit streak of at least 11 games (last: Tony Perez - 11G in 1973) and the 1st rookie to do so...**His streak tied for the longest all-time by an AL batter, joining Shoeless Joe Jackson (1912) and Sam Rice (1925).**
- Gurriel Jr. also had hits in each of his 18 starts from June 21-Aug. 18, tied for the 4th longest streak in the Majors last season...Hit .423 (33-for-78) with 4-2B, 5-HR and 16-RBI over that span...**Batted .423 (30-for-71) over the course of July for the highest AVG in the AL...** Was named **AL rookie of the month**, the 7th player in team history to claim the honour.
- The shortstop batted .281 for the season, 4th best among AL rookies with at least 200 plate appearances...Recorded 70 hits over the course of his first 65 career games, tied for 4th most in team history.

SMOAKING SECTION:

- Justin Smoak reached the 25-HR mark for the 2nd time in his career, doing so in each of the last two seasons (38 in 2017)...Had a pair of walk-off homers (June 30 vs. DET and Sept. 12 vs. TB)...Recorded six 9th-inning HRs to tie for the MLB lead...Has connected for 16 9th-inning homers over the last two seasons, seven more than any other player.
- Smoak led the club with 77 RBI and had the most 3+ hit games (10)...Topped the AL with a .352 OBP and an .805 OPS as a first baseman while his .999 fielding percentage led all MLB first basemen.

GOING STREAKING:

- Kendrys Morales set a franchise record last season as he connected for eight home runs over seven games from Aug. 19-26...**His seven-game home run streak was the longest in franchise history (Jose Cruz Jr. - 6G in 2001), the longest streak in MLB last year (Matt Carpenter - 6G), and the longest ever by a switch-hitter...**The streak was tied for the 4th longest all-time, one back of the leaders (Ken Griffey Jr., Don Mattingly, Dale Long).



RANDAL RIPS UP THE BACK HALF:

- Randal Grichuk set a career high with 25 home runs last season (24 in 2016) and tied Justin Smoak for the team lead...Also set career bests with 32 doubles and 58 extra-base hits.
- Started the year batting .106 until he landed on the DL from April 30-May 31 with a right knee sprain...Batted .271 afterwards...Among AL hitters after the All-Star break, ranked T-4th in doubles (21), T-9th in home runs (14) and tied for 2nd in extra-base hits (36)...Had 11 of his last 12 hits go for extras, including 10 in a row from Sept. 15-28, which was one shy of the longest such streak in team history (Jose Cruz Jr. - 11 in 2000).

TELLEZ TALLIES:

- Rowdy Tellez was called up to the Blue Jays on Sept. 4 and made his MLB debut as a pinch-hitter on Sept. 5 vs. TB...Hit an RBI double on the 1st pitch he saw to become the 7th player in team history to record a hit on his 1st MLB pitch, and the 3rd in club history to have a pinch-hit extra-base hit in his 1st MLB plate appearance.
- The 23-year-old then doubled three times the following night, becoming the 1st player in the live-ball era to have an XBH in each of his first three MLB PA...Hit the 3rd double in the 8th inning to also become the 1st player with four XBH in his first five PA...Became the 1st Blue Jay all-time with four XBH in his first two games.
- After a pair of doubles on Sept. 7, Tellez hit his 1st MLB home run on Sept. 8 vs. CLE to become the 1st MLB player (since 1913) to record seven XBH in his first four career games...Became the 4th player in the live ball era to have each of his first seven hits go for extras... - Kevin Pillar hit the 40-double mark for the 1st time in his career, becoming the 25th player in team history to reach the plateau...Is one of eight Blue Jays all-time with 30+ doubles in four or more seasons.
- The center fielder also set personal bests with 59 RBI and 57 extra-base hits while his 15 home runs were one shy of tying a career high (16 in 2017)...Led the club with 36 multi-hit efforts as well.

PANN-ONE-HIT START:

- Thomas Pannone made his 1st MLB start on Aug. 22 vs. BAL and took a no-hitter into the 7th inning before allowing a leadoff single to Trey Mancini...Became the 1st Blue Jay to throw 6+ innings of no-hit baseball in his 1st MLB start (courtesy STATS) and the 6th pitcher in team history to allow just one hit in his 1st MLB start.

ALEDMYS ALL DIAZ:

- Aledmys Diaz was batting .216 (22-for-102) over 32 games when he hit the DL with a right ankle sprain on May 7...Returned to the lineup on June 1 and hit .278 (89-for-320) the rest of the way (98G)...Post All-Star break, went 56-for-193 (.290) with 15 doubles, 10 home runs and 32 RBI.
- Diaz set a career high last season with 18 homers (17 in 2016)...Homered in back-to-back games on five different occasions, after not doing so in either of his two seasons (190 games) prior to joining the Jays...Also played a personal-high 38 games (30 starts) at third base (4G, 3GS in 2017).

- Sean Reid-Foley became the 2nd Guam-born player in MLB history (also the Jays' John Hattig in 2006) to take the field when he made his 1st MLB start on Aug. 13 at KC...Was the 45th player in team history to make his MLB debut as a starter (last: Borucki - June 26, 2018 at HOU).

JANSEN JOINS THE JAYS:

- Danny Jansen slashed .275/.390/.473 with 21-2B, 1-3B, 12-HR and a team-leading 58 RBI over 88 games for Triple-A Buffalo last year...Was named team MVP...Was called up to Toronto on Aug. 12 and made his MLB debut a day later at KC...Went 2-for-3 to become the 19th player in team history with 2+ hits in his MLB debut, and the 4th catcher to do so...**Along with Reid-Foley, formed the 1st starting battery mates in team history to debut at the same time and the first in the AL since 1967,** when Billy Rohr pitched and Russ Gibson caught for the Red Sox at Yankee Stadium (*courtesy STATS*).

The City of Toronto is awarded a franchise in the American League on March 26, 1976 and name Peter Bavasi Executive Vice-President and General Manager on June 18. On August 12, the "Blue Jays" are selected by Directors from over 4,000 names and 30,000 entries in a "Name the Team" contest. Roy Hartsfield becomes the first on-field manager and catcher Phil Roof is purchased from the Chicago White Sox becoming the first player in franchise history.

On March 11, 1977 the Blue Jays play in their first spring training game, defeating the New York Mets in Dunedin, Florida by a 3-1 score. On April 7, 1977, 44,649 fans brave snow and freezing temperatures as the Blue Jays win their first ever regular season game 9-5 over the Chicago White Sox. Doug Ault becomes an instant hero hitting two home runs in the contest. In their inaugural season, highlights include a 19-3 win over the Yankees, with Roy Howell collecting nine RBI, while the home attendance of 1,701,052 sets a record for attendance by a first year expansion club.

Over the next two seasons in 1978-79 the Blue Jays see several firsts. Jim Clancy gets the 4-2 victory in front of 44,327 fans, which is marked by the pitcher starting the first Triple Play in franchise history. On June 26, 1978 the Blue Jays explode for a franchise high 24 runs. Bobby Mattick becomes the team's second manager on October 18, 1979. For his performance in 1979, SS Alfredo Griffin is named co-winner of the AL Rookie of the Year Award. From December 2-7 Toronto plays host to the Winter Meetings, the first held outside the United States.

1980s

The decade of the 1980's represented another birth for the franchise, as by the end of the decade the club rose from an expansion team to formidable AL East contender. Still in the early years in 1980 the club set a franchise record with 67 victories while pushing attendance past six million, an expansion record. Field manager Bobby Cox takes over the reins in 1982 and leads the club to new heights in his four years as manager. 1982 saw the club climb out of the basement for the first time in its history, winning 78 games to finish in a tie for 6th with Cleveland.


1983 marks a significant time as the Blue Jays finish over .500 for the first time in franchise history with an 89-73 record, good for 4th place, only nine games out of first. Notable performances include the first 100 RBI season by a Blue Jay (Willie Upshaw) and first 100 run scored season (Lloyd Moseby). The Blue Jays become only the second team in league history to win Player of the Week honours in three consecutive weeks, when Luis Leal, Dave Stieb and Lloyd Moseby turned the trick in May. The enthusiasm for the club continues to build as a record 9,104 season tickets are sold for the 1984 season. They see their club march up the standings for a second place finish at 89-73 solidifying their position as AL East contenders. Over the course of the season the Blue Jays would win 19 one-run contests in a row, while Cliff Johnson sets a then Major League record mark for pinch hit home runs with his 19th career shot. All of this is witnessed by 2,110,009 fans, which puts the Blue Jays in elite company as just the 18th franchise to top two million fans in a season.

PLAYOFF BOUND:

The ascent to AL East Champions is complete in 1985 as on the second to last day of the regular season the Blue Jays defeat the New York Yankees by a 5-1 score to secure their first postseason berth. During the 1985 season a Blue Jays ticket was a hot commodity. On July 27, the club sees average attendance top 30,000 per game for the first time. 47,686 fans show up for an October 4th contest vs. New York to set a single game mark, while final attendance reaches a new high of 2,468,925. Season ticket sales are capped at 11,500.

The Blue Jays first foray into the playoffs provides lots of drama and some solid learning experiences for future years. Jumping out to 2-0 and 3-1 series leads vs. the AL West

Champion Kansas City Royals, it appeared inevitable that the Blue Jays would make their first World Series appearance. Unfortunately, the Kansas City Royals had other ideas, coming from behind to become only the 5th club in Major League history to win a series after trailing 3-1. George Brett would lead the way, collecting several key hits while Jim Sundberg would deliver the decisive blow off Blue Jays ace Dave Stieb, with a bases clearing wind assisted triple off the top of the right field fence in Game 7.

Heading into 1986, season tickets are capped at 14,000 as the club celebrates its 10th anniversary. On July 10, Damaso Garcia becomes the first Blue Jay to record 1,000 hits in a Blue Jays uniform, while RHP Jim Clancy becomes the first to win 100 games for the franchise. Tony Fernandez becomes the first to punch out 200 hits in a season and RF Jesse Barfield earns the franchise its first Gold Glove award. The Blue Jays drop to 4th place in the East with an 86-76 record, as Jimmy Williams takes over as team manager.

MVP:

George Bell cements himself as the AL's best posting a .308 average with 47 home runs and 134 RBI to earn the honour as AL MVP in 1987. He became the first Blue Jay ever selected by fans to appear in an All-Star Game. The Blue Jays set several club marks, including a 10-home run game vs. Baltimore on September 14, with Ernie Whitt belting three. A franchise record 11-game winning streak begins on June 2, while attendance soars to 2,778,429. The attendance mark is an all-time high for any AL East club. On Canada Day, a single game record 47,828 pack their way into Exhibition Stadium in a contest vs. the New York Yankees. The season ends in shocking fashion as a 3.5 game lead is lost in the final week with seven consecutive losses. Four of the losses came to eventual champions Detroit, all of them by one run, including two in extra innings. On the season's final day, LHP Jimmy Key loses a 1-0 battle to Frank Tanana with the lone run coming from a wall-scraping

home run to left field by OF Larry Herndon in the 2nd inning. Key injuries to C Ernie Whitt and SS Tony Fernandez down the stretch proved to be too much to overcome. A 3rd place finish in 1988 (87-75) is highlighted by some individual accomplishments. George Bell begins the season the same way he left off his 1987 MVP campaign. He becomes the first player in Major League history to hit three home runs on Opening day and is the only player over the course of the season to earn two Player of the Week awards. Dave Stieb continues his dominance of AL hitters, flirting with no-hitters on three occasions, all three one-hitters, including back-to-back one-hitters on Sept. 24 and Sept. 30. Incredibly, both games see him lose the no-hitter with two outs in the 9th inning.

A SIGNIFICANT CHANGE:

1989 begins with Paul Beeston being named team President on January 10. On May 15, with the team sitting with a 12-24 record, manager Jimmy Williams is replaced by Cito Gaston on an interim basis. On May 28, the Blue Jays play their final game at Exhibition Stadium, defeating the White Sox 7-5. The team moves into the SkyDome and cap season tickets at 26,000. They open the SkyDome on June 5 with a loss to the Milwaukee Brewers. 49,501 watch the Blue Jays on September 16, to set a new record for home attendance. The Blue Jays would go on to post a 77-49 record under Cito Gaston and clinch their second division title. Dave Stieb posts two more one-hitters, and comes within one out of a perfect game vs. New York on August 4, when Roberto Kelly broke up the bid with a double.

BEEN HERE BEFORE:

For the second time in five seasons, the Blue Jays were East Division Champions, and would succumb in the Divisional Series, this time to the AL West Champ Oakland Athletics. The Blue Jays were no match for Rickey Henderson, as he batted .400 in the series with a 1.609 OPS and a LCS record eight stolen bases in the five game series. They were outscored 31-16 with the Blue Jays only victory coming in Game 3 behind Jimmy Key.

1990s

The Toronto Blue Jays entered the 90's as an established contender, looking to build on regular season performances that had yet to yield playoff success. With the state of the art SkyDome now their home, it was time to see this vision become reality.

In the first full season at SkyDome, and the first full season under Cito Gaston, the club would come up just short of a post-season berth, finishing two games behind the Red Sox with an 86-76 record. Set a Major League attendance record by passing the Dodgers 1982 mark on Sept. 19. Dave Stewart tosses SkyDome's first no-hitter, pitching for the Oakland A's

AND THEN HE WAS PERFECT:

On September 2, 1990, Dave Stieb would accomplish what had appeared so elusive, tossing his first and only no-hitter vs. the Cleveland Indians. Jerry Browne would line out to RF Junior Felix to end the contest.

1991 was a big year for the franchise in many ways. Chosen to host their first All-Star Game, 52,382 fans pack the SkyDome to see Jimmy Key pick up the win for the home side.

In December of 1990, the Blue Jays cement a deal that would change the fortunes of the club by acquiring future Hall of Famer Roberto Alomar and OF Joe Carter from San Diego in exchange for SS Tony Fernandez and 1B Fred McGriff. Another attendance mark is set and the four-million fan barrier is broken as 4,001,526 see the Blue Jays return to the postseason by winning the AL East with a 91-71 record. Tom Henke sets a then record for consecutive saves with 25. On May 1 in Texas, Nolan Ryan no-hits the Blue Jays for his 7th and final no-hitter.

THIRD TIME A CHARM:

The AL West Champion Minnesota Twins awaited in the AL Championship Series. The Blue Jays came home to Toronto with a 1-1 series split, primed to make their first World Series appearance. Unfortunately, an 11-inning heartbreaker saw the series tide turn as Mike Pagliarulo would homer off Mike Timlin to put the Blue Jays down 2-1. In Game 5, the Twins finished off the series by scoring three runs in the 8th inning, winning 8-5 and sending the Blue Jays home early once again.

Newly acquired RHP Jack Morris led the Blue Jays into the 1992 season by making his Major League record 13th consecutive Opening Day start. He tossed a complete game in a 4-2 win in Detroit. The Blue Jays set a Major League attendance record again in 1992 with 4,028,318 fans and clinched their fourth playoff berth on October 3.

Dave Winfield set a Blue Jays mark with 23 home runs as a DH while becoming the oldest player to register 100 or more RBI in a season.

TIME TO CELEBRATE:

An old foe awaited in the 1992 Championship series in the Oakland Athletics, a team very similar to the club that handled the Blue Jays just two seasons ago in the playoffs. The Blue Jays split the first two games at home before heading to Oakland for Games 4, 5 and 6. Juan Gonzalez gave the Blue Jays a 2-1 series lead before a dramatic Game 4 became the catalyst for the Blue Jays first ever World Series appearance. In Game 4, the Blue Jays found themselves down 5-1 after three and 6-1 heading into the 8th inning. They came within striking distance with a three-run 8th inning before Dennis Eckersley, the games widely known "best closer," attempted to close out the game in the 9th. With a man on, Roberto Alomar delivered the biggest hit in franchise history, belting a game-tying two-run home run to right field. The Blue Jays went on to win in 11 and then the series in six games.

More drama ensued in the Blue Jays' first World Series appearance as perennial playoff club, the Atlanta Braves, provided the opposition. After dropping the first contest, Game 2 saw backup C/INF Ed Sprague propel the Blue Jays to their first ever World Series win with a pinch-hit, two-run home run off Jeff Reardon in a 5-4 win. Game 3, the first World Series game played outside of the US, was noteworthy for "the catch" made by Devon White in the 4th inning, resulting in a near triple play. That was key in keeping the score tied at 2-2 in the 9th inning. Candy Maldonado drove in Roberto Alomar for the game-winner and a 3-1 series lead. Unable to close the series out in Game 5 the Blue Jays would need one more dramatic at-bat to bring the World Series to Canada. Tied in the 11th inning, Dave Winfield would double down the left field line to drive in two and when Mike Timlin tossed an Otis Nixon bunt to Joe Carter the long journey to World Series Champions had concluded.

In 1993 a record tying seven Blue Jays are selected to the All-Star team (Alomar, Carter, Hentgen, Molitor, Olerud, Ward, White). John Olerud flirted with a .400 average, going as late as August 2 at the .400 mark and eventually becoming the first Blue Jay to win a batting title. In fact, the top three spots at season's end belonged to the Blue Jays (Olerud – .363, Molitor – .332, Alomar – .326), the first time in 100 years this had occurred. The Blue Jays won the AL East again and on July 31 they acquired OF Rickey Henderson to propel them into another postseason run.

In the 1993 AL Championship Series, the Blue Jays and Chicago White Sox won two games on opposition soil before the Blue Jays reversed the trend and won Game 5 at SkyDome. In all six games, the team that scored first won the contest. Roberto Alomar once again led the way with a .316 average, including reaching base in all five plate appearances in Game 5. Dave Stewart closed out the series moving to 8-0 in ALCS play with a 6-3 victory.



In a highly entertaining series, the Blue Jays brought back-to-back championships to Canada, defeating the Philadelphia Phillies in six games. The series was highlighted by a classic Game 4 contest in Philadelphia on October 20, that saw the Blue Jays overcome 12-7 and 14-9 deficits with a six-run 8th inning. 10 men would come to the plate in the 8th, with Devon White tying the contest with a 2-out RBI triple. Rickey Henderson provided the game-winning hit in a contest that took four hours and 14 minutes to play. In Game 6 in Toronto, the Blue Jays trailed the Phillies, 6-5, entering the bottom of the 9th. Phillies closer LHP Mitch Williams allowed a walk to Henderson and a one-out single to Molitor be-



fore Joe Carter ended the series with a three-run home run to left field. The "You'll never hit a bigger home run in your life" quote was made famous by longtime Blue Jays announcer Tom Cheek.

The 1994 season ended prematurely on August 12 as a player strike began. It did not end until late April of 1995. The Blue Jays would not return to the postseason during the balance of the 90's, finishing as high as 3rd place in 1998 and 1999. Paul Beeston was named Canada's Baseball Man of the Year in 1994, while Howard Starkman picks up the Roberto Clement Award for Public Relations Excellence

in 1996. The Blue Jays opened their 20th season in Las Vegas vs. Oakland, a season where RHP Pat Hentgen began a string of three successive Blue Jays CY Young awards winners, with Roger Clemens winning in 1997 and 1998.

EXCELLENCE IS MEASURED:

The Blue Jays honour OF George Bell and RHP Dave Stieb by unveiling their names as the first on the Level of Excellence. Over the years, only the most prominent Blue Jays will see their names on the outfield facade. Joe Carter and Cito Gaston were added in 1999.

Cito Gaston ended a glorious run with the club after being relieved of his duties on September 24, 1997. During his tenure, the club won three divisional titles and two World Series.



Interleague play began in 1997 and the Blue Jays played the Montreal Expos in the regular season for the first time. The decade closed

out with some significant accomplishments after Gord Ash assumes the role of General Manager in 1998. The same year, Tony Fernandez became the all-time hits leader and Roger Clemens became just the 11th pitcher in MLB history to record 3,000 strikeouts. Shawn Green became the first Blue Jay to post 30 home runs and 30 stolen bases in 1998. Pat Hentgen was the 4th Blue Jay to win 100 games and Billy Koch posted his 31st save in 1999 to set a then AL Rookie record.

2000s:

Rogers Communications assumed control of the franchise in September of 2000. During the summer of the same year, the Blue Jays put on a power display becoming the first Ma-

tor League team to have four players with 20 or more home runs at the All-Star break (Delgado, Batista, Mondesi, Cruz). The 134 home runs at home set a new AL mark and the 244 home runs set a new franchise record. Carlos Delgado was named Sporting News Player of the Year.

2001 saw the club open the season with one game vs. the Texas Rangers in Puerto Rico. Raul Mondesi pulled off the first straight steal of home in franchise history and Carlos Delgado assumed the franchise lead in home runs, passing Joe Carter. Jeff Frye hit for the cycle on August 17, joining Kelly Gruber as the only Blue Jays to accomplish the feat.

Carlos Delgado's team record streak of 432 consecutive games came to an end on August 4, 2002. Pat Gillick was enshrined on the Level of Excellence on August 7, 2002. The 2002 campaign came to a close with 3B Eric Hinske named as the Rookie of the Year.

On June 15, 2003, Reed Johnson became only the fourth player in MLB history to hit a leadoff and walk-off home run in the same game. Roy Halladay won 15 straight decisions in 2003 on his way to a club-record 22 wins and a Cy Young award. On September 2, 2003, Carlos Delgado banged out four home runs

to become the 15th player in MLB history to accomplish the feat.

Legendary broadcaster Tom Cheek saw his streak of 4,306 consecutive games come to an end after the sudden passing of his father on June 3, 2004. Later in the season, Cheek was enshrined on the Level of Excellence. John Gibbons relieved Carlos Tosca of his duties on August 8, 2004. The final day of the season is overshadowed by the sudden passing



of longtime Blue Jay and current broadcaster John Cerutti. Vernon Wells picked up a Gold Glove Award in 2004 and 2005. On April 4, Tom Cheek called back-to-back home runs by Orlando Hudson and Vernon Wells in his last game as a Blue Jays broadcaster; he later passed away on October 9, 2005.

After key signings of RHP A.J. Burnett and LHP B.J. Ryan in 2006, the team went on to post its best finish of the decade, finishing in 2nd place with an 87-75 record. It marked the first time they placed higher than 3rd since the World Series winning clubs in 1992 and 1993. They saw five players go to the All-Star Game (Halladay, Ryan, Wells, Glaus, Rios).

The Blue Jays signed free agent Frank Thomas to a two-year contract in 2007. On June 28 in Minnesota, he became just the 21st player in MLB history to hit 500 career home runs, accomplish the feat with a 1st inning home run off Carlos Silva.

Roberto Alomar took centre stage once again on April 4, 2008 as he saw his name honoured with many Blue Jay greats on the Level of Excellence. Cito Gaston made his return to the dugout as he replaced John Gibbons as Manager with the team sitting with a 35-39 record. Gaston led the club to a 10-game winning streak in September, finishing with a 51-37 record the rest of the way in 2008. He was rewarded with a two-year contract following the season.

GM, JP Ricciardi, was replaced following the season by assistant Alex Anthopoulos on October 3. Aaron Hill and Adam Lind had stellar offensive seasons, earning both a Silver Slugger Award. Hill also was named Comeback Player of the Year, while Lind was recognized as the AL's best Designated Hitter, picking up the Edgar Martinez award.

2010s:

In 2010, Jose Bautista won the Hank Aaron award and a Silver Slugger award, after setting a club mark with 54 home runs. He became just the 16th player in MLB history to record 54 home runs and just the 7th player to post 50 home runs, 30 doubles and 100 walks in the same season. Overall, the team hit 257 home runs, tying them for the 3rd highest total in MLB history. Brandon Morrow turned in one of the most impressive performances in franchise history on August 8 vs. Tampa Bay. Morrow had his no-hitter ended with two outs in the 9th inning. However, he finished with a one-hitter and 17 strikeouts. Cito Gaston was honoured in the final home game with a pre-game ceremony on September 29, 2010.

THE HALL IS CALLING:

Roberto Alomar, a 12-time All-Star and 10-time Gold Glove winning second baseman, was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame by the Baseball Writers' Association of America on July 24, 2011 at the Clark Sports Center in Cooperstown, NY. The two-time World Series Champion,

donned the Toronto Blue Jays cap in the Hall, marking the first ever Blue Jays player to be elected into the Hall of Fame. Alomar, who was in his 2nd year on the ballot, received 523 votes which then represented the 3rd highest total in history, for a 90% majority.

John Farrell was appointed as the 12th manager in franchise history and led the club to an 81-81 record in his first season. Jose Bautista was once again the offensive leader, earning a second consecutive Hank Aaron award as the league's best hitter. He led the AL in home runs with 47, while also posting league leading numbers in walks (132), slugging % (.608) and OPS (1.056). Bautista became the first player to lead the Majors in the above categories since Barry Bonds in 2001, and the first AL player since Ted Williams in 1942. The fans also recognize his dominance by registering 7,454,753 All-Star votes, then the most in MLB history. In the minors, four of the Blue Jays affiliates make the playoffs, with two clubs (New Hampshire and Vancouver) winning league championships. Baseball America rated the Blue Jays minor league system fourth, up from 19th just one year prior. On November 18, 2011, the Blue Jays unveiled a new logo that brought the "blue" back to the Blue Jays, recognizing the classic Blue Jays look.

In June of 2012, Jose Bautista hit 14 home runs, 30 RBI, 22 walks and 24 runs scored in 27 games to capture his 5th career monthly award. He also finished tops in homers, RBI and slugging percentage (.750), T-1st in walks and extra-base hits (18). His 14 homers established a new club record for the most HR in any single month and marked the most in a calendar month by any player since Colorado's Troy Tulowitzki hit 15 round trippers in September 2010. It also was the most for an AL player since New York's Alex Rodriguez hit 14 home runs in April 2007. On Sept. 18, 2012, the club announced that they had entered into a Player Development

Contract with the Buffalo Bisons of the International League (AAA). On Oct. 21, 2012, the Blue Jays released Manager John Farrell from his contract as he was hired by the Red Sox to take over that same position with them, an agreement reached by both teams. On Nov. 19, 2012, the Blue Jays and Marlins complete the biggest trade in baseball history, measured in number of players changing hands, as Toronto acquires RHP Josh Johnson, LHP Mark Buehrle, SS Jose Reyes, IF/OF Emilio Bonifacio and C John Buck in exchange for C Jeff Mathis, SS Yunel Escobar, SS Adeiny Hechavarria, RHP Henderson Alvarez, LHP Justin Nicolino, OF Jake Marisnick and RHP Anthony Desclafani. On Nov. 20, the Blue Jays hired John Gibbons as Manager to take over for John Farrell. Gibbons became the second person to have two tenures as Blue Jays Manager, along with Cito Gaston. General Manager Alex Anthopoulos made another big splash in the off-season by acquiring the 2012 NL Cy Young award winner, RHP R.A. Dickey, from the New York Mets on Dec. 17, 2012, along with C Josh Thole and C Mike




Nickeas in exchange for two of Toronto's top prospects, C Travis d'Arnaud and RHP Noah Syndergaard along with C John Buck and OF Wuilmer Becerra.

Major League Baseball and Baseball Commissioner Allan H. (Bud) Selig named the Toronto Blue Jays as the 2012 recipient of the Commissioner's Award for Philanthropic Excellence, which was created in 2010 to annually recognize an extraordinary charitable and philanthropic effort of an MLB club.

Toronto had four players participate in the 2013 All-Star game along with Manager John Gibbons, who was one of the coaches selected by Jim Leyland. OF Jose Bautista, 1B Edwin Encarnacion, LHP Brett Cecil and RHP Steve Delabar represented the Blue Jays at the 2013 Classic. Delabar was the winner of the mlb.com Final Vote, becoming the first Toronto player to win with 9.6 million votes. On July 21, 2013, Carlos Delgado became the 10th member inducted into the Toronto Blue Jays Level of Excellence.

On Dec. 9, 2013, at the Winter Meetings, RHP Roy Halladay signed a contract with the Blue Jays. This agreement ensures that the legendary right-hander retired as a Toronto Blue Jay. Halladay finished a distinguished 16-year career with a record of 203-105 (.659 winning percentage) in 416 games, 390 starts with an ERA of 3.38. Roy is among the Blue Jays club leaders in many pitching categories, ranking 2nd in wins (148), strikeouts (1495) and shutouts (15), 3rd in ERA (3.43), starts (287), complete games (49) and innings pitched (2046.2). His 148-76 record as a Blue Jay resulted in a .661 winning percentage, the highest mark in club history.

Jose Bautista once again led the Majors in the 2014 fan voting (5,859,019) and made his 5th consecutive appearance at an All-Star Game. Joined Roberto Alomar as the only Toronto players to earn four consecutive starts. Bautista was named the AL captain for the HR Derby and was eliminated in the semi-final by the eventual winner, Yoenis Cespedes. His 10-HR in the 1st round was the most by any participant. On



Tom Cheek: Tom Cheek, who called the first 4,306 regular-season and 41 postseason games in Toronto Blue Jays history was selected as the 2013 recipient of the Ford C. Frick Award, presented annually for excellence in broadcasting by the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum. Cheek, who passed away on Oct. 9, 2005, was honored as part of Hall of Fame Weekend 2013 in Cooperstown, N.Y.



Alomar - Gillick HOF: Roberto Alomar was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in July of 2011, becoming the first and only member of the Blue Jays to have accomplished that feat. Alomar is joined by former Blue Jays General Manager, Pat Gillick, who was inducted in to the Hall of Fame on the same day. Gillick was instrumental in building the Blue Jays from an expansion team in 1977 to World Series Champions. Gillick was also responsible for bringing Alomar to Toronto, acquiring him in a trade with San Diego.



Sept. 8, 2014 vs. CHC, Bautista hit his 200th career HR as a Blue Jay, becoming just the 5th player in club history to accomplish the feat. Edwin Encarnacion led the Majors in May, 2014 with 16-HR, 22-XB, .763 SLG and 2nd with 33-RBI. The 16-HR in May set a club record for any month & was the most by any player in May since Barry Bonds hit a ML record 17-HR in 2001. The 16-HR in May is T-2nd on the all-time MLB list with Mickey Mantle (1956) and Mark McGwire (1998). It was the most hit in any month since Sammy Sosa hit 17-HR in August, 2001. Encarnacion became the first player in club history with four or more multi-home run games in a calendar month. His five multi-HR games in May tied an MLB record for most multi-HR games in any calendar month (Albert Belle: Sept., 1995 and Harmon Killebrew: May, 1959). He was named AL Player of the Month for May. On June 6, 2014 vs. STL, the Blue Jays celebrated the 25th anniversary of the Rogers Centre. Like they did back on June 5, 1989, they sent Jimmy Key to the mound to throw out the Ceremonial First Pitch to former catcher Ernie Whitt. Joining them to deliver the game's starting lineup was former Blue Jays Manager Cito Gaston, who managed the first game at the ballpark. On April 10, 2014 the Toronto Blue Jays announced the creation of the Howard Starkman Award to be presented annually to the Employee of the Year. Starkman officially retired on April 11 as the longest serving employee in the organization and was the inaugural recipient of the award named in his honour. On Sept. 10, the Toronto Blue Jays were named the winners of 2014 Steve Patterson Award for excellence in sports philanthropy, granted in recognition of the Jays Care Foundation's charitable and community efforts across Canada.

In 2015, the Blue Jays had Josh Donaldson, Jose Bautista and Russell Martin represent them in the 86th All-Star Classic. Donaldson was the MLB leading vote-getter setting an all-time record after accumulating 14,090,188 votes. He was the first Toronto third baseman and fourth Toronto infielder, to win a fan election, joining Roberto Alomar (1991-94), John Olerud (1993) and Carlos Delgado (2003). For Bautista, it marked his 6th straight overall All-Star selection (2010-2015), his first time being chosen by the players. For the 5th straight year he was selected as a starter, only Jay to accomplish that feat. His six All-Star appearances also represent the most by any Blue Jay (Roberto Alomar-5, Joe Carter-5). Prior to the July, 2015 trade deadline, GM Alex Anthopoulos pulled off four separate deals as Toronto acquired Troy Tulowitzki and LaTroy Hawkins from the Rockies on July 28. They acquired David Price from the Tigers on July 30 before adding Ben Revere from the Phillies and Mark Lowe from the Mariners on July 31. After that point, Toronto posted a record of 40-18 the rest of the way for the best record in baseball. On Aug. 31, 2015, Rogers Communications announced that Mark Shapiro has been appointed President and CEO of the Toronto Blue Jays and Rogers Centre, to take place following the completion of the team's 2015 season. Shapiro assumed the role from Paul Beeston, who retired at the end of the season. The team clinched their first division title since 1993 after defeating the Orioles in Baltimore by a score of 15-2 in Game 1 of a doubleheader. The victory ended the longest playoff drought by any team in professional sports. It marked the 6th time in franchise history to have won their division. The Blue Jays defeated the Texas Rangers in the best-of-5 Division Series after trailing 2-0. In the finale, Jose Bautista put Toronto out for good, crushing a 3R-HR in the 7th inning to break a 3-3 tie. Toronto would later lose their ALCS series vs. the Royals (4-2 in series). On Oct. 29, 2015, Alex Anthopoulos stepped down as Senior VP of Baseball Operations and GM. VP of Baseball Operations and Assistant GM, Tony Lacava was named Interim General Manager following Anthopoulos's departure. On Nov. 19, 2015, Josh Donaldson became just the second player in franchise history to win the AL MVP Award (George Bell in 1987). Donaldson finished with 23 first-place votes (385 points overall) as he had 81 more points than the 2nd place finisher (Mike Trout). On Dec. 3, 2015, Toronto named Ross Atkins as Executive Vice President of Baseball Operations and General Manager. He

became the seventh GM in franchise history. Tony LaCava was then promoted to the position of Senior Vice President of Baseball Operations and Assistant GM after serving as the Interim GM.

In 2016, the Blue Jays won the top wild-card position after going 89-73, representing the seventh postseason in franchise history (1985, 1989, 1991, 1992, 1993, 2015, 2016). That marked just the second time in club history to earn a postseason berth in consecutive seasons (last: 1991-1993). The Jays defeated the Orioles at Rogers Centre in the wild-card game on Tuesday, Oct. 4, after Edwin Encarnacion hit a game-winning walkoff three-run homer in the 11th inning. Toronto won the Division Series, 3-0, over Texas for their first ever postseason sweep. The Jays appeared in consecutive ALCS series in back-to-back seasons for just the second time in franchise history (1991-1993), but fell to the Cleveland Indians, 3-1, in the ALCS. Toronto drew 3,392,099 in attendance for an average of 41,878, which represented the most in the AL and third most in the Majors (LAD - 45,720; STL - 42,525), the highest total since 1994 (49,287). The pitching staff posted a 3.47 ERA on the road which represented the best mark in all of baseball and was the third lowest mark in franchise history (3.07 in 1981 and 3.16 in 1991). It also marked the second time that Toronto led the Majors in ERA on the road (last: 3.07 in 1981) and 3rd time to lead the AL (3.89 in 2008 and 3.16 in 1991). Aaron Sanchez led the American League in ERA at 3.00, becoming the 5th different Blue Jays pitcher to lead the AL in ERA, joining Roger Clemens (2x), Dave Steib, Juan Guzman and Jimmy Key. J.A. Happ was one of just three pitchers to finish the year with 20 wins (Rick Porcello-22, Max Scherzer-20) as he became the 6th different 20-game winner in club history (8th time), joining Roy Halladay (2x), Roger Clemens (2x), Jack Morris, Pat Hentgen and David Wells to accomplish that feat. It marked the second time that a LHP recorded 20 wins in a season (David Wells-20 in 2000). Edwin Encarnacion became only third player in club history to record for seasons of 35+HR and 100+RBI (4th time), joining Delgado (5x) and Bautista (4x). The Jays also averaged over 1 million viewers per game on TV nationwide (Sportsnet).

In 2017, Roberto Osuna and Justin Smoak represented the Blue Jays at the All-Star Game. At 22.352 years old, Osuna became the youngest player to appear in an ASG in team history. Smoak went 1-for-1 with a walk to become the third Blue Jay to reach base more than once in a Mid-Summer Classic contest. The first baseman hit a career-high 38 homers in 2017, the most all-time by a Toronto switch-hitter. He also set an MLB record with 11 home runs in the 9th inning or later. The team played in an AL-high 53 one-run games while suffering a club-record 15 walk-off losses and 14 extra-inning losses. Despite finishing 76-86, Toronto led the AL in attendance, selling 3,203,886 tickets.

In 2018, Lourdes Gurriel Jr. had multiple hits in 11 straight games from July 11-29. The multi-hit streak was the longest in team history and marked the seventh 11+ game multi-hit streak since 1900. The shortstop took AL rookie of the month for July with a .423 (30-for-71) average over the course of the month. Kendrys Morales also had a club-record streak as he homered in seven straight games from Aug. 19-26. The seven-game stretch was the longest ever by a switch-hitter and tied for 4th longest all-time, one back of the leaders. J.A. Happ was Toronto's lone representative at the All-Star Game and picked up the first save ever by a Blue Jay at the Mid-Summer Classic. Rowdy Tellez joined the club in September and became the first player in the live-ball era to have an XBH in each of his first three MLB plate appearances. He then became the first player to record seven doubles in his first seven career games and tied an MLB record with 10 XBH in his first 40 PA. The team set a franchise record, using 63 different players to get through 2018.

AMERICAN LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

TORONTO VS. KANSAS CITY (L, 3-4)

As the Blue Jays entered postseason play for the first time, they faced the Kansas City Royals in the first ever best-of-seven American League Championship Series. The Blue Jays, who finished nine games ahead of the Royals in the loss column, were the favourites and had the benefit of the extra home game.

GAME #1: Dave Stieb lived up to superstar billing, shutting out the Royals on three hits through eight innings with no base runner advancing past second base. The Blue Jays struck quickly with two runs in the second, three in the third and one in the fourth. The Blue Jays offense was sparked by 2-RBI performances from Ernie Whitt and Tony Fernandez.

GAME #2: A much more even affair with the Blue Jays eeking out a 6-5, 10-inning win. The Royals jumped into a quick 3-0 lead after three innings primarily on the strength of a two-run HR by Willie Wilson in the 3rd inning. The Blue Jays took the lead on a George Bell sacrifice fly in the 8th. The Royals rallied, however, in the 9th on a pinch-hit HR by Pat Sheridan with the go-ahead run being delivered in the 10th on a Frank White single. The Blue Jays won it in the bottom of the 10th on a two-out, two-run single by Al Oliver. On to Kansas City, the Blue Jays were up two games to none.

GAME #3: George Brett put on a baseball clinic going 4-for-4 with two home runs, three RBI with four runs scored en route to a 6-5 Royals win. Leading 5-2 after 4 innings, the Blue Jays squandered the lead for good in the 8th when Brett led off the inning with a single and eventually scored.

GAME #4: The Blue Jays moved to within one win of a World Series berth with a 3-1 come-from-behind victory. The Blue Jays won the game dramatically with three runs in the top of the 9th inning, with the big blow being a two-run pinch-hit double by Al Oliver.

GAME #5: LHP Danny Jackson went the distance, scattering eight Toronto hits in a 2-0 win as the Royals scored a run in each of the first two innings. The Blue Jays still led the series, 3-2.

GAME #6: The Blue Jays and Royals returned to Exhibition Stadium. Entering the 5th inning tied at 2-2, George Brett once again delivered the decisive blow with a solo HR. With 3.2 shutout innings of relief from Buddy Black and Dan Quisenberry, the Royals pulled even in the series for the first time at three games apiece.

GAME #7: Dave Stieb, the ace of the Toronto staff vs. the eventual Cy Young Award winner Bret Saberhagen. The Royals came out on top, 6-2, shellacking Dave Stieb for six runs in 5.2 innings with the difference maker being a wind-assisted, bases-clearing triple by Jim Sundberg to cap a four-run 6th inning.

The Kansas City Royals became only the 5th club in Major League history to trail a series three games to one and come back to win the series. The Blue Jays? They slumped immediately after scoring five runs in the 5th inning of Game 3, scoring only eight runs in the last 40 innings.



1989

AMERICAN LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

TORONTO VS. OAKLAND (L, 1-4)

For the second time in five seasons, the Blue Jays were American League East Division Champions. Toronto faced the Oakland Athletics who had the best record in the Major Leagues in 1989.

GAME #1: The Blue Jays surrendered 2-0 and 3-1 leads as the Athletics scored three times in the 6th and twice in the 8th to win, 7-3. In the 6th inning, Mark McGwire cracked a leadoff HR to tie the game and two runs scored when Carney Lansford's double play ball was botched. Dave Stewart allowed five hits over eight innings for the win.

GAME #2: The Athletics tallied twice in the 4th inning and three time in the 6th en route to a 6-3 win. Rickey Henderson was a one-man wrecking crew, going 2-for-2 with two runs scored and four stolen bases. Athletics' righthander Mike Moore allowed just three hits and an unearned run over seven innings of work.

GAME #3: The Blue Jays snapped a five-game post-season losing streak, dating back to 1985, with a convincing 7-3 win. The Blue Jays jumped on Athletics' starter Storm Davis for four runs on four hits in the 4th inning and salted the game away with another three runs in the 7th inning. Overcoming a 3-0 Athletics' lead, Mookie Wilson and Tony Fernandez paced the Blue Jays with two hits each, the latter with two doubles.



GAME #4: The Athletics took a commanding 3-1 lead in the series with a 6-5 win over the Blue Jays. Rickey Henderson was again a major catalyst with two home runs and four RBI. The Blue Jays collected 13 hits, 11 of which were singles and attempted to overcome a 5-2 deficit with a run in the 6th and 7th innings and two in the 8th.

GAME #5: The Blue Jays spotted the Athletics a 4-0 lead heading into the 7th inning before eventually losing the game, 4-3, and the best-of-seven series in five games. Trailing 4-1 after eight innings, the Blue Jays scored twice in the 9th inning on a leadoff HR by George Bell and a sacrifice fly by Kelly Gruber.

In essence it was Rickey Henderson defeating the Blue Jays, four games to one. Henderson batted .400, slugged 1.000, had a .609 on-base percentage and had an LCS-record eight stolen bases. The Blue Jays hit .242 as a team (compared to Oakland's .272) with only eight of their hits going for extra bases. They were outscored, 8-3, in the first three innings and 12-7 in the middle three before outscoring the Athletics, 11-6, in the final three frames. Unfortunately, it is virtually impossible to consistently battle back from an early-inning deficit. Although anything can happen in a "short series," the best team of the regular season continued their charted course into the postseason, winning eight of nine contests.

1991

AMERICAN LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

TORONTO VS. MINNESOTA (L, 1-4)

GAME #1: Toronto starter Tom Candiotti lasted just 2.2 innings and allowed five earned runs before being lifted in favour of David Wells. The Twins would not need to score another run. The Blue Jays rallied for a run in the 4th and three runs in the 6th on five consecutive hits off Twins starter Jack Morris. Those four runs would be all Toronto could muster as they lost 5-4 at the Metrodome.

GAME #2: The Blue Jays took an early lead as they jumped on Twins starter Kevin Tapani, scoring three times in the first three innings. Rookie Toronto starter Juan Guzman lasted 5.2 innings, allowing four hits and just two earned runs before the ball was handed to the bullpen. Tom Henke and Duane Ward combined for 2.1 innings of shutout relief and six strikeouts. Devon White scored three of the five Toronto runs as the Blue Jays won their only 1991 ALCS game, 5-2, in Minneapolis.

GAME #3: Joe Carter's 1st-inning home run and a Candy Maldonado double put the Blue Jays ahead 2-0 until the 6th, when the Twins were able to put their second run across the plate and tie the game, 2-2. Toronto starter Jimmy Key scattered five hits over six innings and allowed two earned runs. The game went into extra-innings and ended in dramatic fashion as Mike Pagliarulo, pinch-hitting for Scott Leius, homered to right off of Blue Jays reliever Mike Timlin. Toronto was retired 1-2-3 in their half of the 10th as the Twins defeated Toronto, 3-2, at SkyDome.

GAME #4: Toronto starter Todd Stottlemyre allowed seven hits through 3.2 innings before exiting with the Jays trailing, 4-1. The Twins' Kirby Puckett hit his first home run of the series and Dan Gladden collected three RBI on three hits to pace Minnesota to a 9-3 win at SkyDome. It was Jack Morris' second win of the ALCS as he pitched eight innings and allowed just two runs.

GAME #5: Kirby Puckett displayed his power once again as he homered in the 1st inning off Tom Candiotti to put the Twins ahead, 1-0. Toronto put together three runs in the 3rd and a pair in the 4th to take a 5-2 lead. However, Minnesota was able to post three runs in their half of the 6th inning and tie the game at five. Duane Ward was handed the loss for Toronto as he allowed three runs in the 8th. Toronto was shutdown by five shutout innings of Twins relief. Devon White, Roberto Alomar and Manuel Lee each collected a pair of hits in the losing effort as Minnesota took the American League crown with an 8-5 win.

1992

AMERICAN LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

TORONTO VS. OAKLAND (W, 4-2)

GAME #1: Home runs were the story of the game as Oakland used three of them to beat the Blue Jays, 4-3. The A's scored three runs in the 2nd inning off Toronto starter Jack Morris on back-to-back homers by Mark McGwire and Terry Steinbach. The 3-0 lead stood until Pat Borders homered off Dave Stewart in the Blue Jays' 5th, followed by a Dave Winfield homer in the 6th to make it a 3-2 contest. John Olerud tied the score, 3-3, in the bottom of the 8th with a two-out single off reliever Jeff Russell, scoring Winfield who had doubled in the previous at-bat. Harold Baines broke the tie with a solo shot to lead off the 9th and Dennis Eckersley shut down the Blue Jays in the home half of the final frame to seal the 4-3 Oakland victory.

GAME #2: The Blue Jays were able to rebound from a Game 1 loss as David Cone held the A's to just one run over 8.0 innings en route to a 3-1 win. Cone, the Major League's strikeout leader in 1992, fanned six as he collected his second career post-season victory. Mike Moore lasted seven innings in the losing effort for Oakland. Kelly Gruber doubled and hit a two-run homer in the 5th which would prove to be the winning runs. Closer Tom Henke came on for the save in the 9th, his first ever post-season save.

GAME #3: For the first time since 1985 vs. Kansas City, the Blue Jays put together a pair of wins in the postseason as they got past the A's, 7-5. Toronto starter Juan Guzman notched his second career LCS win in as many starts (1991 vs. Twins), lasting six innings before being lifted in favour of Duane Ward. Tom Henke earned his second save in as many games. Despite being outlit, 13-9, by the A's, four of Toronto's hits went for extra-bases, including solo homers from Alomar and Maldonado. The A's collected just one extra-base hit.

GAME #4: In what appeared at first to be a certain Oakland victory, the Toronto Blue Jays fought back to erase a five-run deficit late in the contest, sending the game into extra-innings. Oakland batted around and plated five runs in the 3rd inning as they jumped on Toronto starter Jack Morris. The A's added another run in the 6th to make it 6-1 score. Toronto began their comeback in the top of the 8th as they strung together five consecutive hits. By the end of the inning they trailed, 6-4. The A's were held off the board in the bottom of the 8th. In the top of the 9th, Devon White led off with a single that was misplayed, allowing him to get to third base. Roberto Alomar then homered off Dennis Eckersley to tie the game, 6-6. Toronto eventually won the game on a Pat Borders sacrifice fly and another Tom Henke in the 11th for the 7-6 victory.



GAME #5: Oakland starter Dave Stewart held the Blue Jays in check for nine innings, scattering seven hits and allowing just two runs as Oakland sent the series back to SkyDome. The complete game win was Stewart's first win of the 1992 postseason. The 6-2 loss for the Blue Jays ended their three-game win streak. David Cone took the L for Toronto as he lasted just 4.0 innings before Jimmy Key made his first appearance of the 1992 playoffs. Ruben Sierra homered and drove in three runs for the A's. Devon White notched three hits on the day, including a double, in the losing effort.

GAME #6: Toronto scored a pair of runs in the 1st inning on a Joe Carter home off A's starter Mike Moore. The Blue Jays then added four more runs in the 3rd, including a Candy Maldonado three-run homer to put Toronto ahead, 6-0. Blue Jays starter Juan Guzman went seven innings, allowing just five hits and striking out eight before the ball was handed to Duane Ward in the 8th with the score Toronto 7, Oakland 1. The A's managed a run in the top of the 8th but the home town Blue Jays secured the win as Tom Henke tossed a perfect 9th, sending Toronto to its first ever World Series with a 9-2 win.

WORLD SERIES

TORONTO VS. ATLANTA (W, 4-2)

GAME #1: In the first game of the 89th World Series, the Blue Jays suffered a 3-1 loss to the Atlanta Braves. Home runs were the story of the game as Toronto took an early 1-0 lead in the 4th inning on a Joe Carter solo homer off starter Tom Glavine. However, that was the only run Toronto scored. Jack Morris continued his shutout innings home vs. the Braves, extending it to 18.0 innings until a three-run homer by catcher Damon Berryhill in the 6th inning ended the streak. Glavine went the distance for the Braves to become the first pitcher to toss a complete game in a World Series opener since Jack Morris accomplished the feat in 1984 vs. San Diego.

GAME #2: Reserve catcher Ed Sprague proved to be the hero for the Blue Jays on this night at Fulton County Stadium. David Cone lasted just 4.1 innings, allowing four runs before exiting in favour of David Wells. Cone, however, contributed at the plate before being lifted with a pair of hits and an RBI. His two hits marked the first two-hit game by an AL pitcher in the World Series since Mickey Lolich went 2-for-4 on October 3, 1968. Heading into the 8th inning, the Blue Jays trailed, 4-2. Following a run in the top of the 8th, Toronto entered the final inning trailing by one. After a Pat Borders fly out, rookie Derek Bell (pinch-hitting for Manuel Lee) walked. Ed Sprague, then pinch-hitting for the pitcher Duane Ward, knocked a first-pitch offering from Jeff Reardon over the left-field fence to put the Blue Jays ahead, 5-4. Tom Henke was able to retire the Braves in the bottom of the 9th for the save.

GAME #3: The game marked the first time the World Series had been played outside of the United States as the series moved to SkyDome. In another pitching duel, Steve Avery and Juan Guzman both went 8.0 innings. Atlanta was kept off the board in the 4th with a splendid defensive effort. Devon White ran down a deep drive off the bat of David Justice that sent him into the wall to make the catch. White returned the ball to the infield where Terry Pendleton was doubled-up off first. The Blue Jays drew first blood in the bottom of the 4th inning as Joe Carter connected for his second homer of the series, a solo shot putting Toronto ahead 1-0. In the 6th inning, the Braves rallied to tie things at 1-1. Each team traded runs in the 8th, keeping the game knotted at 2-2. The Braves attempted a rally as Duane Ward came on to pitch the 9th. But after a key double play and a strikeout, the inning was over. In the home half of the 9th, Roberto Alomar led off with a single. After stealing second and a Dave Winfield sacrifice, Alomar stood at third with one out. Jeff Reardon came in to try to halt the Blue Jays' advance, but Candy Maldonado, with the bases loaded, hit a two-strike pitch to right-center field for a base hit, allowing Alomar to score the winning run.

GAME #4: In what was the third consecutive one-run game of the 1992 World Series, the Blue Jays posted a 2-1 win behind a strong pitching effort from starter Jimmy Key. Key went 7.2 innings, allowing just five hits and one earned run while striking out six Braves batters. Toronto earned its first run in the 3rd inning as catcher Pat Borders continued his post-season hit streak with a solo homer to left. The Jays doubled their lead in the 7th as Devon White drove in Kelly Gruber from second base. Atlanta managed to score a run in their half of the 8th as Ron Gant led off with a double and eventually scored on a Mark Lemke groundout. Tom Henke came in to pitch the 9th for Toronto and tacked up a 1-2-3 inning for his second save of the series.

GAME #5: The game began in similar fashion as the previous four. Entering the 5th inning, the contest was tied at 2-2. The Braves had collected a run in the 1st and 4th innings while the Blue Jays captured runs in the 2nd and 4th. The 5th frame went the way of the Braves as they crossed the plate five times to seal the victory and send the series back south for at least one more game. The Braves' half of the 5th inning began with two consecutive routine outs. An Otis Nixon single got the ball rolling and the Braves eventually loaded the bases on Toronto starter Jack Morris. Lonnie Smith stepped up to the plate and sent Morris' 1-2 offering over the right field wall for a grand slam, making the score 7-2. The score remained the same over the final four innings, making a winner out of John Smoltz.



GAME #6: The Toronto Blue Jays made history as they captured their first ever World Series to bring the Commissioner's Trophy outside of the United States for the first time. The 11-inning contest began with the Blue Jays scoring in the opening inning. Devon White led off the game with a single off starter Steve Avery. After a stolen base and a ground out by Alomar, White stood on third. Carter then drove him in with a sacrifice fly. Atlanta answered the call in its half of the 3rd as Deon Sanders scored his fourth run of the series. Toronto returned the favour immediately as it regained the lead with a run in the top of the 4th on a Candy Maldonado leadoff homer. The score remained that way until the bottom of the 9th when Atlanta shortstop Jeff Blauser tied the game, sending it into extra-innings. The 10th inning proved to be uneventful. In the eleventh, the Blue Jays led off with Key popping up for out number one. Devon White was hit by a Charlie Leibrandt offering. Alomar then singled to center, allowing White to move up to second. With two out, Dave Winfield stepped up to the plate and doubled down the left-field line, allowing White and Alomar to score for the 4-2 advantage. In the bottom of the 11th, Atlanta was able to score once with Jimmy Key on the mound. Mike Timlin then came in to pitch for the Blue Jays with pinch-runner Smoltz on third and two out. Otis Nixon attempted a drag-bunt up the first-base line, which was fielded by Timlin who threw to Carter at first in time for the final out.

AMERICAN LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

TORONTO VS. CHICAGO (W, 4-2)

GAME #1: The Blue Jays took a 2-0 lead in the 4th inning when third baseman Ed Sprague tripled to right field with Olerud and Molitor on base. Chicago then used its half of the inning to produce three runs on two hits as they sent nine men to the plate. Toronto starter Juan Guzman managed to hold the White Sox in check for six innings but walked eight batters and stranded 11 runners before exiting with a 5-3 lead. Jack McDowell lasted 6.2 innings, allowing thirteen hits and all seven Toronto runs before the White Sox relief corps came on to hold Toronto for the remainder of the game. Danny Cox worked a shutout 7th and 8th while allowing a lone single by Ozzie Guillen. Duane Ward came out for the 9th and walked the first two batters before striking out the side to end the Chicago threat.

GAME #2: Both clubs scored once in the opening inning, but it was the Blue Jays who would prevail as their two-run 4th provided the edge. The 3-1 win saw Toronto take a two games to none lead in the best-of-seven series. The 4th inning started with a pair of outs by Joe Carter and John Olerud. Paul Molitor then doubled off starter and loser Alex Fernandez. Next, Tony Fernandez singled to score Molitor and moved to second on the throw home. After an intentional walk to Ed Sprague, Pat Borders singled to second base but Joey Cora threw the ball away, allowing the third Toronto run to score. Dave Stewart worked six strong innings surrendering just four hits (all singles) and one run for his seventh career ALCS win against no losses. Al Leiter was credited with a hold as he pitched the 7th and 8th innings before closer Duane Ward came in to save the game in the 9th.

GAME #3: 19-game winner Pat Hentgen started for Toronto but could not collect a win on this day as Toronto suffered its worst defeat of the series, losing 6-1. The Blue Jays were able to hold off the White Sox attack until the third inning when they sent 10 players to the plate and combined for five runs on five singles. Hentgen lasted just three innings plus two batters before he was removed in favour of Danny Cox. Toronto scored their lone run in the bottom of the 3rd as Rickey Henderson scored from third on a Devon White single. Wilson Alvarez, the Chicago starter, pitched a complete game for his first career ALCS victory as he allowed seven hits while issuing two walks and striking out six. Tim Lincecum provided most of the offensive support for Chicago, going 4-for-5 with a run scored.

GAME #4: A two-run home run by center fielder Lance Johnson in the 2nd inning gave the White Sox a 2-0 lead over the Blue Jays. The light-hitting Johnson had not hit a home run since the 1992 regular season. Todd Stottlemyre, making his first start of the 1993 ALCS, lasted six innings for the home team but failed to hold onto a 3-2 lead that was handed to him in the 3rd when Toronto batted around on rookie starter Jason Bere. The right hander lasted just 2.1 innings before being pulled in favour of Tim Belcher. Stottlemyre allowed three more Chicago runs in the 6th, including a Frank Thomas solo homer and a Lance Johnson triple before departing. Roberto Alomar doubled home Henderson in the bottom of the 6th to cut the Chicago lead to 5-4, but the visiting White Sox added a single run off Al Leiter in the 7th and another off Mike Timlin in the 9th to seal the win by a 7-4 margin.

GAME #5: As was the case with each of the previous four games, the team that scored first emerged victorious. This time, Toronto scored the opening run when Rickey Henderson crossed the plate in the 1st inning after leading off the game with a double and a stolen base. Starting pitcher Jack McDowell allowed a Toronto run in the 2nd and 3rd before being lifted through just 2.1 innings. Meanwhile, Blue Jays starter Juan Guzman cruised through the first 4.1 innings without allowing a hit or a walk until Ellis Burks went deep to left field for what would be the only blemish on Guzman's slate that afternoon. He lasted seven innings, permitting just two hits while walking one and striking out six. Roberto Alomar reached base in all five plate appearances (three hits, two walks) to lead the Toronto attack. Tony Castillo worked a scoreless 8th, allowing a single and a base on balls. Duane Ward had some difficulty in the 9th. He struck out Joey Cora and Frank Thomas following a single to lead off the inning by Tim Lincecum. The righty then issued a two-run homer to Robin Ventura that brought Chicago within two. With the tying run at the plate, Ward struck out Bo Jackson to end the game and preserve the 5-3 Toronto win.

GAME #6: With his 7-0 record in ALCS play on the line, Blue Jays' starter Dave Stewart provided the win which put Toronto into their second consecutive World Series, as the Jays won, 6-3, over the White Sox. Toronto scored first with a pair of runs in the 2nd inning as a two-out single by catcher Pat Borders off Alex Fernandez cashed in John Olerud and Paul Molitor. The White Sox tied the game in the following inning when a bases-loaded walk by Frank Thomas and a fielder's choice by Robin Ventura scored two runs. Stewart managed to restrict the White Sox to just four hits and two earned runs before handing Duane Ward a 3-2 lead after 7.1 innings. Ward struck out the final two batters to end the eighth. The Blue Jays added to their lead as Devon White homered off reliever Scott Radinsky to make it a 4-2 contest. Toronto added two more runs before the inning was over as Paul Molitor tripled to center. Ward allowed his second home run of the series as Warren Newson hit a solo shot in the bottom of the 9th, but that was all the scoring that the Pale Hose could muster as the Blue Jays were crowned American League Champions for the second straight season.



WORLD SERIES

TORONTO VS. PHILADELPHIA (W, 4-2)

GAME #1: For the first time in baseball annals, the World Series began on Canadian soil. The Blue Jays fell behind 2-0 in the 1st inning as Phillies catcher Darren Daulton singled home a pair of runs off starting pitcher Juan Guzman. After holding Philadelphia in check in the top of the 2nd, Toronto rallied with two runs of its own on four singles off Curt Schilling. Both teams traded solo runs in the 3rd and 5th to keep the score knotted at 4-4. With one out in the bottom of the 6th, John Olerud took a first-pitch offering from Schilling over the right-field fence for a solo home run, putting Toronto ahead by one. Toronto scored what would prove to be the winning run in the bottom of the 7th as four consecutive hits by Borders, Henderson, White and Alomar produced an 8-4 lead heading into the 8th. Al Leiter, who would prove to be the winning pitcher, relieved Guzman to start the 6th and held the Phillies scoreless over 2.2 innings before turning the ball over to closer Duane Ward. Ward surrendered a run in the final inning as a Jim Eisenreich single scored John Kruk, who had led off the frame with a single and moved to second on an error. Ricky Jordan flied out to Joe Carter for the last out to put Toronto ahead, one game to none, with the 8-5 win.

GAME #2: The big inning would prove to be the Philly advantage on this night as a Jim Eisenreich three-run homer in the top of the 3rd capped a five-run inning that saw eight Philadelphia batters step up to the plate. Toronto starter and eventual loser, Dave Stewart, lasted six innings with all five earned runs coming in that third frame. Toronto answered the Philly onslaught with a pair of runs in the bottom of the 4th as Joe Carter connected for his first of two World Series home runs. Philadelphia starter Terry Mulholland allowed just three runs over 5.2 innings before handing the ball to the bullpen. Lenny Dykstra led off the 7th inning with a solo homer off reliever Tony Castillo to stretch the Philly lead to three as the visitors were now ahead, 6-3. Toronto scored a lone run in the 8th as Paul Molitor led off with a double and eventually scored on a John Olerud sac fly. Philly relievers Roger Mason (1.2 innings) and Mitch Williams (1.2 innings) closed out the game to preserve the 6-4 win and even the series.

GAME #3: The venue moved from SkyDome to Veteran's Stadium in Philadelphia for the next three contests. This game featured solid pitching by the Blue Jays combined with a potent offence. The visiting Blue Jays jumped on Philly starter Danny Jackson in the top of the 1st as Paul Molitor drove home a pair of runs with a triple. He would later score on a Carter sacrifice fly to right field. Molitor added a solo homer in the 3rd to make it 4-0. Starting pitcher Pat Hentgen pitched six innings and allowed just one run, that coming in the 6th as a two-out single by Eisenreich scored John Kruk who had reached base via a walk. The Blue Jays added another run in the top of the 6th as Roberto Alomar scored on a sac fly, after reaching base on a single and stealing second and third. Toronto continued to add to their lead as they scored three more runs in the 7th off reliever Ben Rivera. Alomar finished the night with four hits while Molitor had three of his own to go along with three runs and three RBI. Duane Ward surrendered a solo homer to Milt Thompson in the 9th to make the final score Toronto 10, Philadelphia 3.

GAME #4: In a slugfest, the Blue Jays put together one of the wildest comebacks in World Series history to beat the Phillies, 15-14, and take a 3-1 series lead. Toronto opened the scoring with three runs in the 1st off Philly starter Tommy Greene. But the home team would take advantage of four 1st-inning walks by starter Todd Stottlemire as they scored four times to move ahead, 4-3. Philadelphia added two more runs to their tally as Lenny Dykstra connected for his second homer of the series, a two-run shot in the next inning. The Blue Jays batted around in the 3rd and collected four runs to send Greene to the bench in favour of Roger Mason. Philadelphia then posted a five-run 5th that included home runs from Dykstra and Daulton to extend its lead to 12-7. Toronto countered with two runs in the top of the 6th as White and Alomar scored on a single and a ground out. The Phillies then added a run in the 6th and another in the 7th to make the score 14-9. However, the Phillies relief corps could not hold Toronto from making a comeback. In the top of the 8th, the Blue Jays sent 10 players to the plate. Devon White's triple with two out scored Pat Borders and Rickey Henderson to put Toronto ahead, 15-14. Mike Timlin started the 8th and struck out the first two batters he faced before Duane Ward came on to strikeout Dykstra to end the inning. In the 9th, Ward hurled a 1-2-3 inning for his second save of the series in a game that took four hours and 14 minutes to play and was the highest scoring game in World Series history. Tony Fernandez had five RBI in the game while White had four.

GAME #5: Curt Schilling shutout Toronto, 2-0, in what was the second ever shutout of the Jays in the postseason. Pitted against Blue Jays ace Juan Guzman, he allowed just five hits (all singles) and struck out six Toronto batters for his first World Series win. The Phillies scored the only run they would need in the 1st inning when Dykstra, who had walked to lead off the game, scored on a John Kruk ground-out. They added a second run in the very next inning as a pair of doubles cashed in Darren Daulton. In the eighth, the Blue Jays threatened with a pair of runners on base but a strikeout by Devon White, followed by a Roberto Alomar ground out, ended their attempt. Guzman was equal to the challenge as he went seven innings, allowing both Philly runs while fanning six. The win sent the series back to Toronto with the Blue Jays holding a 3-2 edge.

GAME #6: Toronto started their quest for a second straight World Series Championship early as they notched three runs off Philly starter Terry Mulholland in the bottom of the 1st inning. A run in the 4th and a solo home run by Molitor in the 5th put Toronto up 5-1. Dave Stewart, the Toronto starter, held the Phillies to just one run over his first six innings. In the seventh, he surrendered a three-run homer to Lenny Dykstra, which was his fourth home run of the series. That led to Stewart being pulled from the game. Reliever Danny Cox came in with none out and surrendered two more runs before the Phillies were halted by Al Leiter. The damage had been done and Philadelphia was now leading, 6-5. After leaving the bases loaded in the 8th, Toronto made World Series history by erasing a one-run lead in the bottom of the ninth. Mitch Williams came in to start the inning and walked Rickey Henderson who led off. After a Devon White fly out, Molitor singled to centre to put runners at first and second. Right fielder Joe Carter then stepped up to the plate. On a 2-2 offering from Williams, Carter homered over the left-field wall for a three-run home run and propelled Toronto to its second consecutive World Series Championship with an 8-6 win.



DIVISION SERIES

TORONTO VS. TEXAS (W, 3-2)

GAME #1: In Toronto's first post-season game since 1993, the team found itself down early as Texas got on the board first, scoring two runs in the 3rd inning. The Rangers then opened up a 4-1 lead after a two-run home run by Robinson Chirinos in the top of the 5th. Jose Bautista cut the lead to 4-3, hitting a solo home run in the 6th inning. That was as close as the Blue Jays would come though, as Rounched Odor added his own solo shot in the 7th to seal a 5-3 victory for Yovani Gallardo and the Rangers.

GAME #2: Both teams got on the board early as starters Cole Hamels and Marcus Stroman each allowed three runs over the first two innings. Toronto held a 4-3 lead entering the 8th inning until pinch-hitter Mike Napoli singled off of reliever Brett Cecil to score Delino DeShields to even the score at 4-4. The game remained tied until the 14th inning when the Blue Jays bullpen allowed two runs on four consecutive hits with two out in the inning. Toronto failed to respond in their half of the frame, giving the Rangers a commanding 2-0 series lead with the series heading to Texas.

GAME #3: With their team facing elimination, Troy Tulowitzki and Marco Estrada each put together remarkable performances to force a fourth game, after a Blue Jays 5-1 win over Texas. Tulowitzki collected four RBI in the contest, including a three-run home run in the 6th inning to put Toronto ahead, 5-0. Starter Marco Estrada allowed just one run on five hits over 6.1 innings pitched to record the win, the team's first in the postseason since Game 6 of the 1993 World Series.

GAME #4: Toronto took charge early, building a 7-0 lead behind starter R. A. Dickey, hitting three home runs off of Texas' Derek Holland before chasing him from the game in the 3rd inning. With two on in the 5th, Dickey exited the game with a 7-1 lead and David Price entered the game in relief. Despite allowing three runs over his 3.0 innings pitched, Price secured the win for Toronto, with Kevin Pillar adding three RBI in the 8-4 victory to send the series back to Rogers Centre.

GAME #5: Facing their third straight elimination game, the Blue Jays found themselves down early after starter Marcus Stroman allowed two runs over the first three innings. Toronto cut into the lead with one run on a Jose Bautista RBI double in the 2nd frame. The score remained 2-1 until the 6th when Edwin Encarnacion connected for a solo blast to tie the game at two. The Rangers retook the lead in the next frame after the ball struck the bat of Shin Soo Choo during Russell Martin's throw back to pitcher Aaron Sanchez. The ball deflected off the third baseline, allowing Delino DeShields to score from third. Although initially sent back to third, after much deliberation between umpires and both managers, John Gibbons and Jeff Bannister, the run stood, allowing the Rangers to take a 3-2 lead with the Blue Jays playing the game under protest. In the bottom of the 7th, Toronto's first three batters reached base following three consecutive errors by Rangers infielders. Josh Donaldson tied the game, hitting a sac fly to score Kevin Pillar. With two on and one out, Jose Bautista hit a three-run home run to put Toronto ahead, 6-3. Relievers Aaron Sanchez and Roberto Osuna held the Rangers scoreless over the next two innings to secure the team's third consecutive win and claim the series, 3-2.

AMERICAN LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

TORONTO VS. KANSAS CITY (L, 2-4)

GAME #1: The Blue Jays opened the second round of the playoffs by being shutout by the Royals in Kansas City. Toronto starter Marco Estrada allowed three runs over his 5.1 innings, including a solo home run by Salvador Perez in the 4th. The Toronto offense was stymied by KC starter Edinson Volquez and the Royals bullpen, being held to just three hits in the game. Kansas City added two more runs late in the game to secure a 5-0 victory and a 1-0 series lead.

GAME #2: Looking to tie the series at one game apiece, Toronto turned to David Price in Game 2. The Blue Jays starter cruised through the first six innings, retiring 18 consecutive batters at one point to set a new club playoff record. With the Blue Jays leading 3-0 in the 7th, the Royals bats came alive, scoring five runs off of Price. Kansas City tacked on another run in the 8th inning to take a commanding 6-3 lead. The Blue Jays left nine men on base and were shutout over the final 3.2 innings by the Royals bullpen.

GAME #3: Trailing 1-0 after the 1st inning, Toronto rallied and tagged Kansas City starter Johnny Cueto for eight runs, chasing him from the game in the 3rd. The Blue Jays took a 9-2 lead after a six-run 3rd inning, highlighted by a Troy Tulowitzki three-run home run and a two-run shot by Josh Donaldson. Toronto went on to add two more runs, including a solo home run by Ryan Goins, joining Donaldson and Tulowitzki as the only trio of Blue Jays teammates to each record three RBI in a single playoffs game in club history. The Royals struck for four runs in the 9th inning, but Toronto held on for an 11-8 victory.

GAME #4: Toronto starter R.A. Dickey lasted only 1.2 innings, the shortest start by any Blue Jays starter in franchise post-season history, after allowing five runs, including four in the opening frame. The Jays plated two in the 4th off of KC starter Chris Young, the only runs they scored in the contest. Kansas City added nine runs over the final three innings to trounce the Blue Jays, 14-2, in a game that saw Toronto infielder Cliff Pennington enter the game as a reliever to record the final out of the eighth inning, becoming the first position player to pitch in the MLB postseason.

GAME #5: Manager John Gibbons turned to Marco Estrada in hopes of keeping the season alive. Estrada did not disappoint, allowing just one run on three hits over 7.2 innings. Toronto held a one-run lead entering the 6th frame before breaking out for four runs in the inning, with three of those runs driven in by a Troy Tulowitzki double. Toronto added two more runs in the game while the bullpen held the Royals to just one hit over the final 1.1 innings of the game to secure the victory and send the series back to Kansas City.

GAME #6: In their fifth elimination game of the postseason, Toronto found itself down 2-0 after two innings as starter David Price surrendered two solo home runs. A solo shot by Jose Bautista in 4th cut the Jays' deficit in half. The Royals added another in the 7th inning before Bautista answered back with a two-run home run to tie the game, 3-3, in the 7th inning, becoming the first Blue Jay in franchise history to record a multi-home run game in the postseason. Kansas City retook the lead in the top of the 8th as Eric Hosmer singled off of Roberto Osuna to drive home Lorenzo Cain for the 4-3 advantage. In the top of the 9th, Toronto had runners on second and third with none out but failed to drive home either runner as Wade Davis struck out two before inducing a groundout by Josh Donaldson to end the series.

WILD CARD

TORONTO VS. BALTIMORE (W, 1-0)

After clinching a playoff berth on the final day of the regular season, Toronto found itself hosting the club's first ever Wild Card game vs. the Orioles. The Blue Jays opened the scoring in the 2nd inning, courtesy of a Jose Bautista solo shot off of Baltimore starter Chris Tillman. The Orioles then took the lead in the following frame on a two-run home run by Mark Trumbo off of Toronto starter Marcus Stroman. In the bottom of the 5th, Ezequiel Carrera singled to drive home Michael Saunders, who doubled to open the frame. The game remained tied at two, forcing extra innings. In the bottom of the 11th inning, with two runners on and one out, Edwin Encarnacion hit a three-run walk-off home run off of Ubaldo Jimenez to send the Blue Jays to the ALDS.

DIVISION SERIES

TORONTO VS. TEXAS (W, 3-0)

GAME #1: A rematch of the 2015 ALDS saw Toronto square-off at Texas. The game remained scoreless until the 3rd inning when the Blue Jays scored five runs with two outs, highlighted by a three-run triple by Troy Tulowitzki. Toronto added two more runs in the 4th and another three in the 9th, courtesy of a Jose Bautista three-run home run. Blue Jays starter Marco Estrada tossed eight scoreless innings before allowing a run in the 9th (8.1 IP, 4H, 6K), leading the Jays to a 10-1 victory and a 1-0 series lead.

GAME #2: Looking to go up 2-0 in the ALDS, the Blue Jays struck first, opening the scoring in the 2nd inning on a two-run home run by Troy Tulowitzki. The Rangers got a run back in the 4th to cut Toronto's lead to one. The Blue Jays answered with three solo shots by Kevin Pillar, Ezequiel Carrera and Edwin Encarnacion, off of Rangers starter Yu Darvish in the 5th inning to take a four-run lead. It marked the first time in club history to hit three home runs in a single inning in postseason play. Those five runs were all Toronto needed, winning the game, 5-3, to push Texas to the brink of elimination.

GAME #3: For the first time in the series the Blue Jays found themselves trailing in a game, after the Rangers opened the scoring by plating a run in the 1st inning. By the end of the inning the Jays found themselves, once again, in the lead, this time by a 3-1 score after a two-run home run by Edwin Encarnacion and a Russel Martin solo shot. The two teams each struck again in the 3rd frame, with Texas adding another run, courtesy of an Elvis Andrus home run, and the Blue Jays responding with another two of their own. The Rangers then took a 6-5 lead in the top of the 6th inning, having scored all six runs off of Toronto starter Aaron Sanchez. The Blue Jays once again tied the contest up in their half of the inning, with Troy Tulowitzki scoring on a passed ball. Both teams failed to plate another run, forcing the game into extra innings. In the bottom of the 10th, Josh Donaldson led off with a double, followed by an Edwin Encarnacion intentional walk. The next batter, Russel Martin, grounded into a fielder's choice with Donaldson moving up to third base on the play. On the throwing error by Texas second baseman Rougned Odor, Donaldson scored to win the game in a walk-off to sweep the series, 3-0.

AMERICAN LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

TORONTO VS. CLEVELAND (L, 1-4)

GAME #1: For the second consecutive season Toronto found itself in the ALCS, facing the Indians in a playoff series for the first time in club history. The game remained scoreless until the 6th inning when Francisco Lindor hit a two-run home run off of Marco Estrada. Those two runs would be the only ones scored in the game, with Toronto falling, 2-0, in the opening game. Estrada recorded his first career complete game in the loss, joining Jack Morris as the only Blue Jays pitchers in team history to throw a complete game in the postseason.

GAME #2: The Blue Jays once again found themselves trailing Cleveland after the Indians scored a run in the 2nd inning. Toronto tied the game in the following frame before seeing the lead relinquished in the bottom of the 3rd. The Blue Jays could muster only three hits in the contest, falling 2-1 in the game and into an 0-2 hole in the ALCS for a second straight year.

GAME #3: For the third consecutive game, the Indians opened the scoring, taking a 1-0 lead after the 1st inning. The Blue Jays responded in the 2nd, scoring a run of their own against the Cleveland bullpen, as starter Trevor Bauer was removed from the game after throwing only 21 pitches, which was due to a significant finger injury. After both teams exchanged runs, the Indians took the lead for good, scoring two more runs in the 6th off of Toronto starter Marcus Stroman. It marked the first time in franchise history that the Blue Jays found themselves down 0-3 in a post-season series.

GAME #4: Facing elimination for the second time in the playoffs, Toronto turned to Aaron Sanchez to keep their playoff hopes alive. For the first time in the series, the Blue Jays scored first and had their first lead of the ALCS. Cleveland cut their lead to 2-1 after the 5th inning. That would be as close as they would get with Sanchez allowing only two hits over his 6.0 innings of work. The Jays added two runs in the 7th on an Edwin Encarnacion bases-loaded single. They then tacked on one more in the 8th via a sacrifice fly from Kevin Pillar to take the game, 5-1.

GAME #5: For the fourth time over the five games, Cleveland jumped out to an early lead after scoring an unearned run in the 1st inning. Rookie Ryan Merritt shut the Toronto offense down for 4.1 innings, allowing only two hits. The Indians scored two more runs, both solo home runs off of Marco Estrada. The Blue Jays failed to muster any sort of offense, falling 3-0 in the game and 4-1 in the series.

NATIONAL BASEBALL HALL OF FAME



Roberto Alomar

SECOND BASEMAN

On July 24, 2011, thousands of Blue Jays fans were on hand in the village of Cooperstown, New York, to officially welcome Roberto Alomar to the Baseball Hall of Fame. It was a proud moment for the star second basemen, who was just the third Puerto Rican inductee, and the first Hall of Famer to be inducted as a member of the Toronto Blue Jays.

"My time in Toronto was the best of my career. It was with Toronto that we won two World Series together. You guys embraced me from day one. You were with me through ups and downs and I am so proud to represent you here in Cooperstown as the first Toronto Blue Jay inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame."

ROBERTO ALOMAR

In five seasons with the Blue Jays from 1991 through 1995, Alomar displayed sparkling defense while winning five straight Gold Gloves. He never hit less than .295 and finished third in the American League behind teammates John Olerud and Paul Molitor with a .326 average in 1993. His five-year mark of .307 gives him the highest lifetime average of any player in Blue Jays history. Over the course of his 17-year career, he hit .300 with a .371 on-base percentage. He totaled 2,724 hits, 1,508 runs, 504 doubles, 80 triples, 210 home runs, 474 stolen bases, and 1,134 RBI.

Tom Cheek

BLUE JAYS RADIO BROADCASTER

On July 27, 2013, Tom Cheek was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame as the 2013 recipient of the Ford C. Frick Award. This award is presented annually for excellence in broadcasting by the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum.

Cheek, who passed away on October 9, 2005, called the first 4,306 regular-season and 41 postseason games in Toronto Blue Jays history, including the club's two World Series victories, from Toronto's first contest until June 2, 2004. His wife, Shirley Cheek, was on hand with her family to accept the 2013 Ford C. Frick award for broadcasting excellence on behalf of her husband.

"Tom Cheek was the voice of summer for generations of baseball fans in Canada and beyond," said Hall of Fame President Jeff Idelson. "He helped a nation understand the elements of the game and swoon for the summer excitement that the expansion franchise brought a hockey-crazed nation starting in the late 1970s. He then authored the vocal narrative of a team that evolved into one of the most consistent clubs of the 1980s and 1990s. We are thrilled to celebrate Tom's legacy with baseball broadcasting's highest honour."

His call of Joe Carter's World Series-winning home run in Game 6 of the 1993 Fall Classic – "Touch 'em all Joe! You'll never hit a bigger home run in your life." – quickly became embedded in the hearts of Blue Jays fans around the globe.



RETIRED NUMBERS



Roberto Alomar

SECOND BASEMAN

Hall of Fame second baseman Roberto Alomar was given the Toronto Blue Jays highest honour on July 31, 2011 when his uniform number was retired in a pregame ceremony at Rogers Centre. Alomar's number 12 is the first number retired by the Blue Jays in their 37-year history. Jackie Robinson's number 42 was retired by Major League Baseball on April 15, 1997.

"Roberto is a very special part of the Toronto Blue Jays organization and arguably the greatest second baseman of all-time. His number deserves to be retired so that his contributions and excellence can stand as a model for all those who have the honour of wearing a Blue Jays uniform."

PITCHER

Eight-time All-Star Roy Halladay had his number raised to the rafters in a pregame Opening Day ceremony on March 29, 2018. His number 32 was just the second Blue Jays number to ever be retired, joining Roberto Alomar.

Doc's wife, Brandy, and two sons, Braden and Ryan, took the field with former Blue Jays players, Pat Hentgen, Chris Carpenter, Paul Quantrill, Scott Rolen, Jose Cruz Jr., Jason Fraser, Paul Spoljaric and Cito Gaston for the ceremony.

Halladay, who passed away in a plane crash on November 7, 2017, had his number 32 displayed as a commemorative patch on the left sleeve of all Blue Jays uniforms throughout the 2018 season.

Roberto Alomar

SECOND BASEMAN

ROBERTO ALOMAR was elected into the National Baseball Hall of Fame on January 5, 2011 – the first player in franchise history to achieve that honour. On July 24, 2011 was inducted in the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown along with the person who brought him over to Toronto from San Diego back in 1990, former Blue Jays GM Pat Gillick & RHP Bert Blyleven. Was selected on 90 percent of the ballots. Was acquired by Toronto along with OF Joe Carter in exchange for SS Tony Fernandez & 1B Fred McGriff from the San Diego Padres on December 5, 1990. Played five seasons in Toronto from 1990-1995, batted .307 with 55 HR, 342 RBI & 206 SB. In his time with the Blue Jays won two World Series Championships ('92 & '93), was named the ALCS MVP in '92 vs. Oakland, appeared in five all-star games ('91-'95), won five gold gloves ('91-'95) and was awarded a Silver Slugger in 1992. Appeared in 29 post-season games with the Blue Jays and batted .373 (44-118) with 18 runs, nine XBH, 18 RBI & 18 SB. Among the all-time Blue Jays second basemen ranks 1st in runs (447), 3B (35), RBI (338), AVG (.308), XBH (241) & SB (206). In 17 Major League seasons with San Diego, Toronto, Baltimore, Cleveland, New York Mets, Chicago White Sox & Arizona, batted .300 with 2,724 hits, 210 HR, 1,134 RBI & 474 SB. In 58 post season contests, batted .313 with four HR and 33 RBI.



Paul Beeston

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

PAUL BEESTON, a Welland, ON, native, is one of the Toronto Blue Jays founding fathers. He was the first employee of the Toronto Blue Jays, joining the club on May 10, 1976, only a month and a half after the granting of the Franchise. He became Vice-President of Business Operations in 1977, Executive Vice-President, Business in 1984, President and Chief Operating Officer in 1989 & Chief Executive Officer in 1991. His hard work and dedication have been recognized by many & in 1988, was named a Member of the Order of Canada. He was elected to the Board of Directors of the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1998 & then in 2002 was inducted into the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame. From 1997 until 2002, Paul was President & COO of Major League Baseball in New York City. He then returned to Toronto in 2002 & served on the board of a number of philanthropic endeavours. On October 14, 2008, was appointed CEO of the Toronto Blue Jays on an interim basis, responsible for the day-to-day operations of the baseball club & Rogers Centre. On October 27, 2009 had the interim tag lifted and was appointed CEO of the Toronto Blue Jays and Rogers Centre. Following the 2015 season, Paul retired as Mark Shapiro replaced him as President & CEO of the Toronto Blue Jays & Rogers Centre.



George Bell

OUTFIELDER

GEORGE BELL spent nine seasons with Toronto and ranks 3rd in club history in total bases (2201), RBI (740) and extra base hits (471). Is one of six players in the Club's history to have hit at least 200 home runs as a Blue Jay, ranking 6th with 202. In 1987, he was named the American League MVP, the only Blue Jay in club history to achieve the honour. That season he batted .308 with 47 home runs & 134 RBI. Made his first of two All Star appearances in 1987 when he became the first Blue Jay ever voted to the starting line-up. During his nine seasons, was a four-time club MVP, the Sporting News AL and Major League Player of the Year in 1987, a three-time Sporting News Silver Slugger, a two-time Sporting News All-Star team selection and the American League Player of the Week eight times. He also set a Major League record, hitting three home runs on Opening Day, April 4, 1988 at Kansas City.





Joe Carter

OUTFIELDER


JOE CARTER ranks 5th in club history in HR with 203 but will forever be remembered for just one, the 9th-inning blast on October 23 to win the 1993 World Series. In 1,039 games from 1991 to 1997 with Toronto, hit .257 with 578 runs scored, 218 doubles, 28 triples, 203 home runs, 736 RBI and 78 stolen bases. During his seven seasons he represented Toronto in five All-Star games including 1991 in Toronto, his first season with the Blue Jays after he was acquired from San Diego along with Roberto Alomar on December 5, 1990 in exchange for Tony Fernandez and Fred McGriff. Along with his tremendous on-field accomplishments, Joe and his wife were active off the field as the Diana & Joe Carter Foundation operated the "Jumpin' with Joe" program which provided needy children throughout the Toronto area with a day at Teen-Ranch, Christian Youth Camp and tickets for a Toronto Blue Jays game where Joe would speak to all of the children. He worked with many other charities including Ronald McDonald House and also hosted an annual charity golf tournament. In his 16-year Major League career, hit .259 with 432 doubles, 396 HR and 1,445 RBI while playing for the Chicago Cubs (1983), Cleveland Indians (1984-1989), San Diego Padres (1990), Toronto Blue Jays (1991-1997), Baltimore Orioles (1998) and the San Francisco Giants (1998).



Tom Cheek

BROADCASTER

TOM CHEEK, who called the first 4,306 regular-season and 41 postseason games in Toronto Blue Jays history, was selected as the 2013 recipient of the Ford C. Frick Award, presented annually for excellence in broadcasting by the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum. Cheek, who passed away after a lengthy and brave battle with brain cancer on Oct. 9, 2005, was honoured as part of Hall of Fame Weekend 2013, July 26-29 in Cooperstown, N.Y. He stood as the radio voice of the Blue Jays and, as one fan wrote, the "soundtrack of summer in Toronto" since the club's inception through 2004. He broadcast 4,306 consecutive regular season games (including 41 postseason contests) from 1977 through the midway point of the 2004 season when he was called away from the booth first by the sudden passing of his father and later by his own personal health problems. The banner in the Level of Excellence bearing his name, first unveiled in formal ceremonies held on August 29, 2004, is adorned with the number 4,306. That pays tribute to his longevity as the iron-man of baseball broadcasting. A veteran of the radio industry, he first joined the Blue Jays prior to the club's inaugural season after spending three seasons working on Montreal Expos broadcasts. Tom had been calling the balls, strikes and home runs starting with Doug Ault's big blasts on Opening Day in 1977. His call of Joe Carter's dramatic home run to win the 1993 World Series- "Touch 'em all Joe, you'll never hit a bigger home run in your life"- stands as one of the most memorable and famous moments in Canadian sports broadcasting history.



Carlos Delgado

FIRST BASEMAN

CARLOS DELGADO made his debut in 1993 and would remain with the club for 12 seasons finishing as the franchise leader in home runs (336), RBI (1,058), walks (827), slugging percentage (.556), OPS (.949), runs (889), total bases (2,786), doubles (343), extra base hits (690), times on base (2,362), hit-by-pitch (122), intentional walks (128) and at-bats per home run (14.9). The two-time All-Star (2000 and 2003) holds several Blue Jays single-season and career records. He won the Hank Aaron Award and Sporting News Player of the Year Award in 2000 and the Silver Slugger Award in 1999, 2000, and 2003.





Tony Fernandez

SHORTSTOP

TONY FERNANDEZ is the franchise leader in games (1,450), hits (1,583), 3B (72), and ranks 3rd in 2B (291), 3rd in AVG (.297), 4th in SB (172), 5th in runs (704), TB (2,198), and 6th in BB (439). Had four separate stints with the Blue Jays totalling 12 seasons and was a member of the 1993 World Series Champions where he led the team with nine RBI and batted .333 in the six WS games. Was selected to play on five All-Star teams, including four with Toronto, and won four straight AL Gold Glove Awards at shortstop from 1986-1989 with the Blue Jays. Ranks 11th on the all-time hits list for a Dominican born player (2,276 total).



Cito Gaston

MANAGER

CITO GASTON led the Blue Jays to two World Championships, two American League Championships and four American League East titles in nine seasons as the Manager from 1989 to 1997. Began as the Blue Jays hitting coach in 1981 where he groomed many young players including George Bell, Lloyd Moseby, Cecil Fielder, Jesse Barfield and Fred McGriff. In 1989 he served as the interim manager of the club before he was named the 5th manager in team history on May 31, 1989. Had the honour of managing in two All-Star games, 1993 and 1994. During his years as manager Cito gave much of his time to charity events throughout Toronto including the annual Cito Gaston Golf Classic. Gaston returned to the Blue Jays for two seasons as hitting coach in 2000 and 2001. Was named Club Ambassador and Special Assistant to the President and CEO, along with former Blue Jay right-hander Pat Hentgen, in early 2007. On June 20, 2008 was named Manager of the Toronto Blue Jays, his 2nd stint as the club's skipper. In 2010, Cito's last season as manager, led the Blue Jays to an 85-77 record. Has a club-high 913 victories as the Blue Jays manager (913-851 overall).



Pat Gillick

GENERAL MANAGER

PAT GILLICK, who was instrumental in building the organization from an expansion team in 1977 to World Series Champions in 1992 and 1993, was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown on July 24, 2011 along with the player he brought over from San Diego to Toronto, Roberto Alomar. Was the 6th man to be honoured by the Toronto Blue Jays to the Level of Excellence in August of 2002. Began his career with the Blue Jays in 1976 as the VP of Player Personnel. Was responsible for the development of players like Dave Stieb, Jesse Barfield and Jimmy Key through the draft and utilized the Major League Rule 5 draft to secure talents such as Willie Upshaw, George Bell, Jim Gott and Kelly Gruber. Was known for completing shrewd trades to acquire the likes of Alfredo Griffin, Damaso Garcia, Fred McGriff, Roberto Alomar, Joe Carter and assembling talent like Tom Henke, Devon White, Dave Winfield, Jack Morris and Paul Molitor. During his tenure, the Blue Jays produced 11 consecutive winning seasons from 1983 to 1993 and in that span, brought five American League East Division titles to Toronto, two American League Championships and World Series victories in 1992 and 1993.



Dave Stieb

PITCHER

DAVE STIEB is the franchise leader in wins (175), IP (2873.0), SO (1658), GS (408), ShO (30) and CG (103). Spent 15 seasons with Toronto, longer than any player in franchise history. Appeared in an AL record seven All-Star games and was the starting pitcher in both 1983 and 1984. Recorded the only no-hitter in Blue Jays history on September 2 1990 vs. the Indians in Cleveland. In 1982, was named the Sporting News Pitcher of the Year after a 17-14 season with a 3.25 ERA and led the league in IP (288.0) and CG (20). Was the Blue Jays Pitcher of the Year six times, a three-time winner of the AL Pitcher of the Month and a three-time winner of the AL Player of the Week.

WORLD SERIES RINGS

The Toronto Blue Jays commissioned Tiffany & Co., the world-renowned purveyor of fine jewelry, timepieces, and arts of the table to design rings commemorating both their 1992 and 1993 World Series victories.

To commemorate the 1992 Blue Jays victory, the 14 karat gold ring's design features the team's logo: the head of a Blue Jay with a maple leaf on a baseball backdrop. The eye of the bird is set with a solitaire diamond. Sixteen diamonds representing each year of the club's history surround the bird and the maple leaf is enamelled in red to match the team's official colour. The inscription of World Champions 1992 wraps around the bezel. One side depicts the team's name - Toronto Blue Jays - set in two lines across the top. The 1992 World Series logo is set in a maple leaf with the inscription - Canada's 1st - positioned below the logo denoting the first Canadian World Series victory. The other side depicts the player's name and the jersey number, the American League logo and the team's 1992 season attendance record - 4,028,318 - positioned below the American League logo. Each side of the ring is accented with two rows representing the stitches of a baseball.

The 1993 World Series Championship ring features the symbols of the Toronto Blue Jays and Canada. A field of 45 diamonds in a pave style setting surrounds the Toronto Blue Jays' logo: the head of a Blue Jay enamelled in the team's official colours overlapping another Blue Jay in gold. The eye of the Blue Jay is set with a diamond solitaire stone. Two Maple Leafs, enamelled in red, symbolize Canada's back-to-back World Series victories. Two baseballs overlay each other in the background. Each ring is personalized with each player's name and jersey number, and incorporating the American League logo and the World Series logo with the inscription "Back to Back" and the years 92-93.

CLUB AWARDS

BOBBY MATTICK AND AL LAMACCHIA AWARDS

In 1996, the Blue Jays organization established two awards: the **Bobby Mattick Player Development Award** and the **Al LaMacchia Scouting Award**. The awards were created to acknowledge the dedication, success and work ethic of Blue Jays baseball operations personnel, attributes so aptly displayed by the awards' namesakes. The Bobby Mattick Award was named after the longtime baseball executive who had spent 25 years of his career with the Blue Jays. The late Bobby Mattick was responsible for the development of many of the young players who have gone through the Blue Jays system. As well as being Director of Player Development for many years he also managed the Major League Blue Jays for two seasons in 1980 and 1981. The Al LaMacchia Award was named after the veteran scout who spent 20 seasons with the Blue Jays. The late Al LaMacchia's scouting talents have been deeply etched in the Blue Jays short history. In 2003, the Blue Jays introduced a **Community Service Award**. In 2009, the Blue Jays began giving out an award for the **Pro-Scout of the Year Award**.

1991 ALL-STAR GAME

The 1991 All-Star Game was played at SkyDome (now Rogers Centre) in Toronto on Tuesday, July 9, 1991...It was the first time that the game had been held in Toronto and just the second time that it had been held outside of the United States (Montreal 1982)...Three Blue Jays players were selected to participate in the 63rd All-Star Game: second baseman Roberto Alomar, outfielder Joe Carter and pitcher Jimmy Key as well, manager Cito Gaston was a coach and Tommy Craig was named AL trainer...52,382 fans came to SkyDome to watch the action unfold in person and millions more watched and listened to the mid-season classic on television and radio...56 players from both the National and American Leagues came to Toronto to participate...Of those 56 players, 49 saw action as the American League defeated the National League by a 4-2 count...Toronto pitcher Jimmy Key was credited with the win in his second career All-Star Game appearance... Joe Carter was 1-1 with a run scored and Roberto Alomar went 0-4...It was the fourth consecutive win for the American League dating back to 1988.

DOUBLEHEADER

The Blue Jays have played 107 doubleheaders in franchise history and have a 22-40-45 record...The Blue Jays last played back-to-back doubleheaders on July 28 & 29, 1997 in Milwaukee and lost all four games...Toronto has played 10 back-to-back twin bills and are 2-6-2, including four straight doubleheaders over six days in 1978 from June 11-16...Have played nine split gate doubleheaders (split DH do not count as doubleheaders)...In 1980, the Blue Jays posted their best doubleheader record at 5-1-4, while in 1978 they lost a franchise high eight, winning three and splitting six.

DOUBLEHEADER SHUTOUTS

Did you know that the Blue Jays have never shut out opponents in both ends of a doubleheader? Conversely, the Blue Jays have been shut out in both ends of a doubleheader twice, losing 8-0 and 6-0 to Boston at Toronto on September 5, 1977, and 15-0 and 2-0 to New York at Toronto on September 25, 1977.

10 CONSECUTIVE HITS

The Toronto Blue Jays tied an American League record September 4, 1992 at SkyDome by collecting 10 consecutive hits in an eight-run second inning against the Minnesota Twins.

The Blue Jays tied the mark set by the Boston Red Sox on June 2, 1901 and equalled by the Detroit Tigers on September 20, 1983.

The Major League record of 12 straight hits was set by the St. Louis Cardinals in 1920 and equalled by the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1930.

With one out in the second, Toronto's Kelly Gruber reached on an infield single against Twins' starter Kevin Tapani. Singles by Pat Borders and Manuel Lee scored Gruber to cut Minnesota's lead to 3-1.

Devon White doubled in a run and Roberto Alomar followed with a two-run single to give the Blue Jays a 4-3 lead. Joe Carter tripled home Alomar and scored on Dave Winfield's single off reliever Tom Edens. Winfield was thrown out at second for the inning's second out, but John Olerud singled and scored on Candy Maldonado's triple to open a 7-3 cushion. Gruber's bloop double to right-center scored Maldonado which snapped the string of 10 straight hits.

Borders fled to center to end the inning.

Toronto's previous club record was nine consecutive hits, set against California on July 3, 1992.

HOME RUN TRIVIA

PLAYER WHO HOMERED IN THEIR FINAL MAJOR LEAGUE AT-BAT

WILLIE AIKENS, April 27, 1985. He came to bat for last time, pinch-hitting at Texas in the 9th inning. Batting for Tony Fernandez against Tommy Boggs, Aikens crushed a dramatic game-tying, two-run homer and Toronto went on to win 9-8. Three days later, Aikens was "designated for assignment" winding up in the minor leagues.

TWO IN ONE INNING, BATTER

JOE CARTER was the first Blue Jay to hit two home runs in one inning. He had his two on Oct. 3, 1993 at Baltimore in the 2nd inning.

EDWIN ENCARNACION became just the 2nd player in club history to hit two home runs in one inning. He had his two on July 26, 2013 vs. Houston in the 7th inning.

40 HOME RUN SEASONS

In 1999 **CARLOS DELGADO** with 44 home runs and **SHAWN GREEN** with 42 home runs, became the first Blue Jays tandem to each hit 40 or more home runs in the same season. In 2000, the Blue Jays again had two players, **CARLOS DELGADO** and **TONY BATISTA**, each hit 40 plus homers in a season. In 2015, **JOSH DONALDSON** hit 41 home runs while teammate **JOSE BAUTISTA** hit 40, marking the 3rd time in club history in which two teammates each hit 40. Overall the Blue Jays have had nine different players, done 12 times, hit 40 or more home runs in a season. **JOSE BAUTISTA** hit a club-record 54 HR in 2010 and became just the 2nd Jay to collect 40+ HR in back-to-back

seasons, the first since **CARLOS DELGADO** (1999-2000). **CARLOS DELGADO** is the only Blue Jay player to hit 40 or more home runs in a season three times (1999, 2000, 2003).

HOME RUNS BY THE FIRST TWO BATTERS OF GAME

DEVON WHITE and **ROBERTO ALOMAR** on August 18, 1991 at Detroit accomplished this feat for the first time in Blue Jays history. The second time occurred on June 14, 2006 vs. Baltimore when **ALEX RIOS** and **FRANK CATALANOTTO** did so. The third such start came on May 22, 2016 at MIN, via homers from **JOSE BAUTISTA** and **JOSH DONALDSON**. The more recent occurrence came on July 27, 2018 at CWS, when **CURTIS GRANDERSON** and **LOURDES GURRIEL JR.** accomplished the feat.

MOST PLAYERS WITH 30 OR MORE HOME RUNS

The 2000 Blue Jays had four players hit 30 or more home runs, which tied the MLB record. It was just the second time the feat had been accomplished in the AL as the Anaheim Angels also had four players hit 30 plus homers in the 2000 season.

20 HOME RUNS AT THE ALL-STAR BREAK

The 2000 Blue Jays became the first team in Major League history to have four players hit 20 or more home runs at the All-Star Break. **CARLOS DELGADO** hit 28, **TONY BATISTA** hit 24, **RAUL MONDESI** hit 22 and **JOSE CRUZ Jr.** hit 20.

HOME RUNS, FIRST MAJOR LEAGUE AT-BAT

When **AL WOODS** batted for Steve Bowling in the 5th inning on Apr. 7, 1977, he became the 11th player in Major League history to hit a home run as a pinch-hitter in his first at-bat.

JUNIOR FELIX became the 11th Major Leaguer to homer on his first ML pitch on May 4, 1989 vs. California's Kirk McCaskill (solo).

J.P. ARENCIBIA became the 3rd Blue Jay to homer in his first MLB plate appearance and 2nd to do so on the first pitch, on Aug. 7, 2010, off Tampa Bay's James Shields (2R)...Became the 5th player in MLB history to hit two homers in his first game and was the first catcher to do so.



WALK-OFF HOME RUNS (TOR – 80/OPP. – 93)

The Toronto Blue Jays have recorded 80 total walk-off home runs in franchise history...On July 30, 2017 vs. LAA, Steve Pearce capped a dramatic 9th-inning comeback with a walk-off grand slam as the Blue Jays overcame a 10-4 deficit to earn an 11-10 victory...Pearce hit a walk-off grand slam three days earlier in the Jays' 8-4 win in 10 innings against OAK...That is the shortest span between walk-off grand slams by any player in Major League history, the previous shortest being 100 days by the Mariners' Jim Presley in 1986...Pearce, Presley, and Cy Williams for the 1926 Phillies are the only players to have hit two walk-off grand slams in the same season (*courtesy of Elias*)...There have been four walk-off grand slams in team history (Steve Pearce – 2x, 7/30/17 vs. LAA & 7/27/17 vs. OAK; Gregg Zaun – 9/6/08 vs. TB, 13th inning; George Bell – 9/4/88 vs. TEX, 9th inning)...On June 15, 2003 vs. the Chicago Cubs, Reed Johnson hit a leadoff home run and ended the game in the 10th inning with a walk-off blast...Johnson became then just the 4th player in ML history to accomplish that feat...The most walk-off home runs hit in a single season by Toronto is six, accomplished in 2011...In 2015, Josh Donaldson set an individual club record with three walk-off home runs...Cecil Fielder is the only Blue Jay to hit a pinch-hit walk-off home run, which he accomplished on Sept. 4, 1987 vs. SEA (10th inning-solo HR).

PITCHERS AT THE PLATE

In 1997, with the introduction of Interleague play, Blue Jays pitchers took their turn hitting. **Woody Williams** became the first Blue Jays pitcher to come to bat and also had the first hit, a single, in his second at-bat off Curt Schilling on June 13, 1997.

On June 21, 2003 at Montreal, **Mark Hendrickson** became the first Blue Jay pitcher to hit a home run in Interleague play (1R off Sunny Kim).

Marcus Stroman made his mark as the only other Toronto pitcher to go deep, hitting a solo home run off Julio Teheran in Atlanta on May 18, 2017. The home run followed up a blast by catcher Luke Maile, forming the first back-to-back home runs by battery mates in the post-DH era (*courtesy Elias*).

GIL KIM **DIRECTOR, PLAYER DEVELOPMENT**

Gil Kim is entering his fourth season with the Blue Jays after being named as Director, Player Development on January 23, 2016. He spent seven years (2009-2015) in the Rangers organization, the last two years as the club's Director, International Scouting. Kim served in scouting roles within the Texas organization, focused both in Mexico and the Dominican Republic. He originally joined the Rangers front office following a three-year playing career that saw him make stops in the Netherlands, China, Australia, Spain and Venezuela. In his role, Kim oversees the commitment of Player Development leaders and staff to include each player in the process of creating and realizing their physical, mental and fundamental goals.



CHARLIE WILSON **DIRECTOR, MINOR LEAGUE OPERATIONS**

Born and raised in Toronto, Charlie Wilson graduated from Trinity College School in Port Hope, Ontario in 1992. There he was a member of the school's football, rugby and downhill skiing teams, and also played amateur baseball in Toronto in the summers. He then attended Bishops University in Lennoxville, Quebec. Wilson first joined the organization working the summer seasons in the Public Relations Department between 1993-1996, while continuing his post-secondary studies at Bishops University. Shortly after his graduation from Bishops, he joined the club's Baseball Operations Department as a Baseball Assistant, working specifically in player development and scouting, and was promoted to the position of Scouting Coordinator in December, 2000. Wilson worked in that capacity until August 20, 2003, when he was elevated to the position of Manager, Minor League Operations. On October 9, 2009, he was appointed to his current position where he oversees the day-to-day operations of the Blue Jays' farm system. Wilson was honoured with the 2015 Howard Starkman Award, granted annually to the Employee of the Year for the Toronto Blue Jays Baseball Club who best exemplifies the values of integrity, innovation, accountability, team work and a passion for winning. He still resides in Toronto and is now married with four children.



JOE SCLAFANI **ASSISTANT DIRECTOR, PLAYER DEVELOPMENT**

Joe Sclafani is entering his fourth season overall as well as first season as Assistant Director, Player Development with the Blue Jays. He joined the organization after playing four years (2012-2016) in the Houston Astros organization, culminating in a Triple-A national championship in 2015. Sclafani participated in the Arizona Fall League in 2014, helping the team to the AFL championship. He was also a member of Team USA in the fall of 2015, taking home a silver medal in the inaugural Premier 12 tournament in Taiwan and Japan. In 2018, he was inducted into the "Wearers of the Green", Dartmouth College's Athletic Hall of Fame. In his new role, Sclafani helps drive the creation and implementation of development plans for each player as well as oversees the growth of the hitting department.



ERIC WEDGE **FIELD COORDINATOR**

Eric Wedge is entering his fourth season with the Blue Jays organization and third as Field Coordinator. He joined the club on February 5, 2016 after being named as a player development advisor. The former Seattle Mariners and Cleveland Indians skipper owns a career managerial record of 774-846 (.478) over 10 seasons. He was named the 18th manager (15th full-time) in Mariners history on October 18, 2010 and managed the Mariners from 2011-2013, compiling a 213-273 (.438) record. Wedge was the 2007 AL Manager of the Year after leading the Indians to a Major League-best 96-66 record (tied with Boston). He then led Cleveland to the ALCS, losing in seven games to the Red Sox. From 2005-2008, Wedge managed the Indians to a 348-300 record (.537), the 7th-best record over that stretch. Over his nine seasons in Cleveland, he posted a record of 561-573 (.495). In 2002, he was named The Sporting News Manager of the Year for Triple-A Buffalo. A year earlier, he was named Baseball America Minor League Manager of the Year. Originally drafted by Boston in the third round of the 1989 First-Year Player Draft, Wedge appeared in 39 career games for the Red Sox and Rockies, posting a .233 average with five home runs.





RYAN MITTLEMAN
DIRECTOR, PROFESSIONAL SCOUTING

Ryan Mittleman joined the organization in 2005 as Manager of Baseball Information in the communications department. He then moved into the scouting department in 2006 and spent the next five seasons as the Coordinator of Amateur Scouting. Mittleman became Assistant Scouting Director in 2011 before spending 2012 as a Pro Scout, and spent 2013-2014 as Coordinator of Advance Scouting and Video. Mittleman served as Major League Advance Scouting Coordinator from 2015-2016, providing advance scouting and handling in-game replay operations, and was named to his current position on January 4, 2017, where he oversees the direction of all professional scouts in the organization. Born in Providence, Rhode Island, he has resided in Toronto since 1985. Mittleman excelled in hockey, playing on the US under-17 and

under-18 teams, winning silver medals with both squads while leading the under-17 club in goals. He attended Boston College, and played Division I hockey for the Eagles from 1995-1997.



STEVE SANDERS
DIRECTOR, AMATEUR SCOUTING

Steve Sanders will be his 11th season working in professional baseball and third as Director of Amateur Scouting with the Blue Jays, a position he has held since Sept. 29, 2016. He spent two seasons as an intern in the Dodgers organization (2009-2010) before joining the Red Sox in the same capacity for the 2011 season. Sanders was then hired full-time as an Amateur and International Scouting Assistant in 2012, a position held until being promoted to Amateur and International Scouting Coordinator in 2014. He spent one season in that role before accepting the title of Assistant Director of Amateur Scouting prior to the 2015 season in Boston. Originally from Los Angeles, CA, Sanders pitched for Northwestern University, where he majored in economics with a minor in business.



JOSE "SANDY" ROSARIO
DIRECTOR, INTERNATIONAL OPERATIONS

Jose Sandy Rosario Valdez, born in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic on August 11, 1973 and is now married with three children. He played as an amateur in the Parallel League and served as a bullpen catcher for the DSL Pirates in 1994. 

CREDENTIALS: To obtain media credentials to cover Toronto Blue Jays 2017 home games, please log on to <http://credentials.mlb.com>. Credential requests for individual games must be submitted at least 48 hours in advance of the requested game date, subject to the discretion of the Toronto Blue Jays.

We will respond to your request as soon as possible. If you are not contacted by someone from our office, please call at least one day in advance, to confirm that you have credentials before arriving at the ballpark.

Credentials will be issued only to members of the working media 18 years of age and older. No spouses, guests or children of members of the media will be issued passes.

Media passes are not transferable. Media passes must be visible at all times and will be checked by stadium security.

Any violation of these guidelines will result in immediate revocation of the credential and future access. Only credentials issued by the Toronto Blue Jays, Major League Baseball or the BBWAA will be honoured.

SEASON CREDENTIAL APPLICATIONS: The Blue Jays will issue full-season credentials to those media members who cover the club on a regular basis throughout the season. Media will be asked to submit their requests for Blue Jays season media credentials through the MLB credential system under TBJ 2017 Season Credentials (FC only). All requests for season credentials must be submitted by Tuesday February 28, 2017.

CREDENTIAL PICKUP: Members of the media can pick up approved daily credentials inside Gate 9 at Rogers Centre, photo identification is required. Using the Gate 9 elevator, the media centre is located on the 300 level and the broadcast booths are located on the 400 level. Press Gate opens 4 hours prior to game time.

CLUBHOUSE ACCESS: The clubhouse is open to media with proper credentials for working purposes 3 ½ hours prior to each game and closes at the start of batting practice. The clubhouse will re-open no later than 10 minutes following the final out of each game. Access to the visiting clubhouse is subject to the visiting club's guidelines.

FIELD ACCESS: Only credentialed media with field access will be allowed onto the field prior to the game. No media will be allowed in fair territory or beyond the first and third base bags. All non-uniformed personnel must clear the field at the conclusion of visitors batting practice unless that individual has credentials expressly for in-game field privileges (photo passes, pre-game ceremonies, etc)

LIVE TRANSMISSIONS: Television and radio stations not holding broadcast rights for Blue Jays games will be allowed to transmit live reports prior to and after Blue Jays games. All live television shots will be done on the field. No live shots will be permitted from the clubhouses. No live transmissions inside the stadium by non-rights holders will be permitted while the rights holders are on the air or the game is in progress. Radio stations will be permitted to provide "scene setters" and score updates between innings but these reports may not continue once an inning is underway. Any violations of these policies will result in revocation of credentials.

AUTOGRAPHS: No member of the media may use their access to solicit autographs or equipment from players or staff of either participating team. Any autograph needs should be directed to the Baseball Media Department. Failure to do so will result in the revocation of credential privileges and forfeiture of any items obtained.

NOTES & STATISTICS: Game information is available in the media centre two hours prior to first pitch, as well, this information is available at www.mlbpressbox.com and www.bluejayspressbox.com.

MEDIA GUIDES: Media Guides are available upon request in the media centre. As well, all MLB club media guides are available at www.mlbpressbox.com.

POST GAME PROCEDURES: Manager John Gibbons will be available to the media immediately after the game in the Interview room adjacent to the Blue Jays clubhouse. Post-game interviews with the manager and players, conducted by the media with deadlines should be related to game comments.

FREELANCE: The Toronto Blue Jays do not credential freelance writers or photographers.

An exception can be made if, and only if, the writer or photographer is on assignment with a specific news organization, and all photographs taken are to be used for newsgathering purposes or official licensed products. It is the responsibility of the requesting affiliation to confirm receipt, and subsequent approval/denial of access to the game requested.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Credentials will be issued to those photographers on assignment for legitimate newsgathering organizations and those representatives of companies licensed by Major League Baseball.

INTERNET MEDIA/WEBSITES: Due to the growth of on-line services and our limited number of press box seats, the Blue Jays will only issue daily credentials to those websites affiliated with a recognized news gathering organization.

LOST CREDENTIALS: Those members of the media who lose their Blue Jays Credential will be asked to make a \$50.00 donation to the Jays Care Foundation prior to being issued a replacement credential.

TELEPHONES: As a courtesy, charge-a-call phones are available for media use in the press box. To order a dedicated phone line at a specific press box location, please contact the Blue Jays Baseball Media Department at (416) 341-1303.

INTERNET CONNECTION: We are pleased to offer both wireless and hard wire internet connections in the media centre and wireless connection in the photo dugouts. Please contact a member of the Baseball Media Department for assistance.

MEDIA DINNING: Located on the 300 Level of the Media Centre, there is a \$13.00 CDN or \$12.00 US charge per meal. Media dining is open for service two-and-a-half hours prior to first pitch to accredited members of the media.

MAJOR LEAGUE BASEBALL DRESS GUIDELINES: Clothing should be appropriate for a business casual work environment. No flip-flops, no t-shirts bearing offensive, disrespectful or inappropriate messages and no ripped jeans are permitted. Clothing bearing MLB club logos should not be worn in press areas. Sheer or see-through clothing, excessively short skirts, dresses or shorts are not permitted. Tank tops, muscle shirts, one-shouldered or strapless shirts as well as clothing exposing bare midriffs or visible undergarments are not permitted.



2019 REGULAR SEASON CLUB/MEDIA REGULATIONS

The following are Major League Baseball's regulations for Club/Media Relations. They are to be observed by all parties:

1. All accredited press, radio and TV representatives shall have pre-game access to the clubhouse from three hours and 30 minutes prior to game time until one hour prior to game time, except that: (a) the media shall not have access to the clubhouse when the club is on the field for batting practice; and (b) the media may not return to the home clubhouse once the home club has taken batting practice. No Club may provide pre-game access prior to three hours and 30 minutes prior to game time. The media shall have access (outside of the clubhouse) to the home Club's manager, players or coaches after home batting practice to discuss developments (such as lineup changes, injuries, and workouts) that occur after the clubhouse closes.
2. Absent unusual circumstances that require a team meeting immediately following a game, the working media shall have access to both clubhouses no later than 10 minutes following the final out of each game (including doubleheaders and day/night split admission games). When such unusual circumstances exist, and such instances are expected to be rare, the working media shall have access to the clubhouse no later than 20 minutes following the final out of the game. The Commissioner's Office reserves the right to require access to the clubhouse 10 minutes following the final out of all games if the "team meeting" exception is abused.
3. The working media's access following a game shall be for a period no longer than one hour unless reasonable access to players is not provided during that time; provided, however, that card-carrying members of the Baseball Writers Association of America ("BBWAA") will have unlimited access after the post-game opening of the clubhouse. If reasonable access is not provided, the clubhouse must remain open. Members of the media, other than BBWAA members, may make arrangements with the club PR Director for extended access.
4. Media credentials are not transferable.
5. Clubhouses, the dugouts and the field are off-limits except to appropriate club, Commissioner's Office personnel and media bearing appropriate credentials. Club credentials are not to be issued to unauthorized personnel. The Commissioner's Office reserves the right to revoke inappropriately issued credentials.
6. Players will be available to the media before and after games for interviews. These periods should not be limited except for the pre-game period described in #1 above, and the post-game period described in #2 above. Upon request by the media, players who had key roles in the first game of a doubleheader are to be made available for a time between games.
7. The trainer's room and players' lounge may be off-limits to the media, but each club controls these areas, and it is vital these areas not be used as a sanctuary for players seeking to avoid the media. It is very important to our game that ALL players are available to the media for reasonable periods and it is the player's responsibility to cooperate.
8. Ropes or other restraining barriers are not permitted to bar the media.
9. A general code is to be observed by the media so uniformed personnel may do their work unimpeded. Media are to be allowed in foul territory, in an unrestricted manner, in an area that is to be not less than the territory between first and third bases, and which territory includes the area around the batting cage, except the dirt area around the batting cage.

10. Under no circumstances shall any club discriminate in any fashion against an accredited member of the media based upon race, creed, sex or national origin.

11. Physical abuse or threats directed to members of the media (and/or official scorers) by baseball personnel will not be tolerated. Disciplinary action, including fines and suspensions, will be considered in any cases that arise.

12. Visitors in the clubhouse, including accredited media members, should conduct themselves in a professional manner. There shall be no seeking of autographs, no touching or removing of equipment or personal items from lockers, and no sampling of players' food spreads. Clubhouses are work places. Clubhouse business should be conducted as expeditiously as possible with a minimum of disruption of regular game routines. Members of the media should not excessively linger in the clubhouse when not interviewing players. Members of the media who violate the code of conduct set forth in this paragraph shall be subject to sanctions, including the loss of their accreditation as provided for in paragraph 17 below.

While in the clubhouse, members of the media are expected to be doing business. Members of the media are expected to conduct themselves in a professional manner and to respect the privileges and environment of restricted areas and working press areas at all times. Any media member in violation of this conduct policy is subject to revocation of his or her privileges and may be subject to immediate ejection.

13. Live TV and/or radio interviews with uniformed personnel during the course of a game are not authorized or permitted, nor is attaching a microphone to any uniformed personnel permitted without approval from the Commissioner's Office. Microphones may not be placed in or adjacent to dugouts and/or bullpens in a manner that will allow uniformed personnel's remarks or conversations to be overheard during the course of a game without the prior approval of the Commissioner's Office.

14. Live telephone interviews are not allowed from the clubhouse or the field without prior approval of the club. Mobile telephones with digital photography capabilities are prohibited.

15. Telephones from both dugouts to the press box are to be maintained in working order for the purpose of providing information regarding special circumstances to the media during the course of a game. Explanations of injuries should be made as soon as possible (to both the media and fans in the stadium).

16. Any club whose personnel violate these regulations will be disciplined. Any member of the media who violates these regulations will lose his or her accreditation.

17. BBWAA members are not required to sign in for clubhouse or other restricted area access but may be logged in by club personnel, subject to individual club policies. Other accredited media may be required to sign in for clubhouse access, subject to individual club policies





BUCK MARTINEZ PLAY-BY-PLAY ANNOUNCER

Buck Martinez returns for a 10th season in the broadcast booth after returning to the Blue Jays for the first time since managing the club in 2002. The 70 year old brings with him 52 years of baseball experience, including 20 years as a player, 37 years in broadcasting, and two as a manager. Beginning in 1967 when he was signed by the Philadelphia Phillies, Martinez spent 20 years as a catcher in professional baseball with the Kansas City Royals, Milwaukee Brewers and his final six seasons with the Blue Jays. He appeared in the postseason with Kansas City in 1976, batting .333 in the five-game ALCS against the New York Yankees. Has written three books about his experiences with the Blue Jays, "From Worst to First" (1985), "The Last Out" (1986), and "Change-up" (2016). Among his 14 seasons associated with the Blue Jays, he served as manager for Toronto in 2001 and part of the 2002 season, compiling a 100-115 record. In 2006, he managed the United States team in the inaugural World Baseball Classic. Martinez' first experience with broadcasting came in 1982, when he covered the American League Championship Series, the World Series and the All-Star Game for the Telemidia Radio Network. His television broadcast career began in 1987 as a colour commentator for the Toronto Blue Jays on TSN. He began his work with ESPN radio and television in 1992, and in 1995, Martinez was awarded a Sports EMMY Award for his work on ESPN's coverage of Cal Ripken's 2,131st consecutive game. He worked as a television analyst for the Baltimore Orioles from 2003-2009, for which he won another EMMY, and has also served as a co-host of XM Radio's Baseball This Morning show on the MLB Home Plate channel. Martinez contributed colour commentary for Sunday afternoon games on TBS, as well as for the network's postseason coverage. Most recently, he has worked the All-Star game and the World Series over the last two seasons for MLB International. A California native, Martinez attended Sacramento City College, Sacramento State University, and Central Missouri State University. He and his wife, Arlene, have been married for 44 years and now reside in New Port Richey, FL. They have one son, Casey, a 47th round pick by Toronto in the 2000 First-Year Player Draft.



DAN SHULMAN PLAY-BY-PLAY ANNOUNCER

Dan Shulman returned to the Toronto Blue Jays broadcast booth in 2016 after a 15-year absence. The Toronto native began his broadcasting career locally in 1990 at CKBB in Barrie before moving to the FAN 1430 (now Sportsnet 590 The FAN) in 1991, where he hosted a number of shows, including Prime Time Sports, The Major League Report and Baseball Today. He began serving as the Blue Jays' play-by-play commentator in 1995 alongside current Blue Jays play-by-play announcer, Buck Martinez. Following his departure from Toronto's broadcast booth in 2001, he joined ESPN full-time after having worked for the network part-time beginning in 1995. The graduate of Western University was the voice of Wednesday Night Baseball (2002-2007), Monday Night Baseball (2008-2010) and served as ESPN's Sunday Night Baseball play-by-play announcer from 2011-2017. In addition, Shulman has called ESPN Radio's MLB postseason since 1998, including World Series action since 2011. He has been a play-by-play voice for NCAA basketball for ESPN since 1995, including the network's signature Saturday Primetime games since 2007. Shulman has received several honours and accolades for his work, including being named the 2011 NSSA National Sportscaster of the Year. Additionally, he is the first two-time winner of the Sports Media Canada Broadcaster of the Year award (2000, 2007).



PAT TABLER COLOUR COMMENTATOR

Pat Tabler brings a wealth of experience to Rogers Sportsnet as the network's baseball colour commentator. A former Major Leaguer, Tabler started as a studio analyst on TSN Baseball Tonight in 1993. In 2001, Tabler became the network's full-time analyst on Blue Jays telecasts. The native of Cincinnati, OH, began his Major League career with the Chicago Cubs in 1981 before stops in Cleveland, Kansas City, New York and eventually Toronto, where he won a World Series in 1992. An All-Star in 1987, Tabler was perhaps best known to baseball fans as one of the game's greatest career clutch hitters, batting nearly .500 in bases loaded situations. Tabler was a 1st round pick of the New York Yankees in the 1976 amateur draft and had a career batting average of .282 over 12 Major League seasons.



JAMIE CAMPBELL HOST, BLUE JAYS CENTRAL

Jamie Campbell got his start in sports broadcasting at CBC Sports in 1987. He was a sports anchor at CBC Edmonton from 1993 to 1997 before moving on to CJOH Ottawa for a year. In 1998, he became one of Sportsnet's original broadcasters and co-hosted the first edition of Sportscentral (now Sportsnet Central). He's hosted coverage of the Grey Cup, Super Bowl, NHL Draft, MLB All-Star Game and MLB post-season. He called play-by-play for the Toronto Phantoms of the Arena Football League from 2002-2003, the CFL on Sportsnet in 2004, and was the play-by-play voice of the Toronto Blue Jays from 2005 to 2009. In 2010, at the Olympic Winter Games in Vancouver, millions of Canadians were watching when Campbell announced the country's historic first gold medal won in Canada by Alexandre Bilodeau. He also called the play-by-play for cycling at the London Olympics in 2012. Campbell has been part of the Blue Jays' broadcast team since 2005 and is in his 9th season as host of Blue Jays Central.





JOE SIDDALL
ANALYST

Entering his 6th season with Sportsnet, Joe Siddall was a member of the Blue Jays radio team for four years before moving to television in 2018 as an analyst on Blue Jays Central along side Jamie Campbell. He spent the previous 12 years assisting the Detroit Tigers with batting practice for home games. Signed as a free agent by the Montreal Expos in 1987, Siddall played 13 years professionally as a catcher with Expos, Marlins, Tigers and Red Sox (1988-2000), spending parts of four seasons in the Major Leagues with Montreal (1993, 1995), Florida, (1996) and Detroit (1998). He hit his lone Major League home run on August 7, 1998 off Seattle LHP Jeff Fassero at Tiger Stadium in Detroit. Born and raised in Windsor, Siddall attended Assumption High School before accepting a football scholarship to Central Michigan University as a quarterback. Joe and his wife (Dr. Tamara Siddall) have four children - Brooke, Brett, Mackenzie and Kevin (deceased).

RADIO

THE SPORTSNET RADIO NETWORK



BEN WAGNER
PLAY-BY-PLAY ANNOUNCER

Entering his 2nd season as the radio voice of the Toronto Blue Jays, Ben Wagner spent the previous 11 seasons with the club's Triple-A affiliate, the Buffalo Bisons (2007-2017), handling broadcast duties on radio and television. The native of New Paris, Indiana started his professional career in baseball with the Lakewood BlueClaws (2004-2006). Wagner attended Indiana State University where he was the sports director at WISU for three years and broadcasted baseball, football and basketball. Away from the ballpark, he covers Division I college basketball on television and radio.



MIKE WILNER
PLAY-BY-PLAY ANNOUNCER

In his 18th season as a member of the Blue Jays' broadcast crew, Wilner moves into a full-time play-by-play role, partnering with Ben Wagner. The first Blue Jays radio play-by-play broadcaster who was born and raised in Toronto, Ontario, Mike hosted the pre- and post-game (BlueJaysTalk) shows from 2002-2018, while serving as the back-up on play-by-play for the past eight seasons. A graduate from the University of Toronto in 1994 (B.Sc. Psychology; Ethics, Society and Law), he began his radio career with University of Toronto Radio in 1988, where covering the Blue Jays was among his duties. Mike was named Sports Director in 1989, and did play-by-play of hockey, football and basketball. He started his professional play-by-play career at age 19 with the Single-A Welland Pirates, later broadcast for the Single-A Watertown Indians and Double-A Hardware City (New Britain) Rock Cats. Mike is also the fiercely proud father of two teenage daughters.



LE BASEBALL DES BLUES JAYS



JACQUES DOUCET
PLAY-BY-PLAY ANNOUNCER (FRENCH)

For 33 years on CKAC, Jacques Doucet was the voice of the Montreal Expos. Followed suit with the play-by-play calls for the Capitales de Québec of the Can-Am league. Inducted into the Québec (2002) and Canadian (2003) Baseball Hall of Fame, he met again with his long-time friend Rodger Brulotte to put together again the celebrity duo that is so synonymous with the Montreal Expos, but is now the French-speaking voice of the Toronto Blue Jays. Doucet was the recipient of the Jack Graney Award in 2004.



RODGER BRULOTTE
PLAY-BY-PLAY ANNOUNCER (FRENCH)

Rodger Brulotte's association with the Expos began in 1969 as a member of the club's scouting department. The following year he was named administrative assistant to the director of scouting and player personnel, Mel Didier. Brulotte had also been in public relations and marketing as well as serving as the team's traveling secretary from 1977-1978. He spent 17 seasons with Jacques Doucet on the Expos' French radio network. For his work on television, more than 20 years at RDS analyzing Expos games, Major League baseball games, All-Star games and post season games, he and his partner, Denis Casavant, were nominated twice for a Géméaux Award for sports broadcasting. In 2013, Brulotte was honoured with the Jack Graney Award joining Jacques Doucet, Jerry Howarth and Tom Cheek as members of this elite group. As of August 2012, he joined TVA Sports Network as an analyst on the Blue Jays' French broadcasts. His hobbies are golf, books and movies.

As the only sports and entertainment venue of its size and design in Canada, *Rogers Centre* has hosted some of the greatest music, sport, trade and community events of our time.

Rock stars, entertainers, athletes, religious figures and inspirational leaders have all delighted audiences under the dome.

Rogers Centre is one of the most dynamic and versatile entertainment centres in the world. No other venue has the diversity of events that *Rogers Centre* hosts on an annual basis across over 200 event days. Since its spectacular opening on June 3, 1989, *Rogers Centre* has achieved the highest honours in the stadium entertainment industry and currently is a leader in the fight for corporate environmental responsibility. Formerly known as SkyDome, the venue was renamed *Rogers Centre* on February 2, 2005.

Structurally, *Rogers Centre* remains the same today as it was when it opened in 1989 with the exception of several key cosmetic changes over the last few years. Widened concourses, updated and upgraded suites, new video and broadcast technology were just some of the areas touched during an extensive \$20 million rejuvenation project.

One of the unique features of *Rogers Centre* is that it can be transformed to meet the needs of any event by converting between two primary modes; baseball and football. The 100 level seats sit on a railway track system that allows them to rotate between each mode within hours.

In addition, *Rogers Centre's* fully retractable roof allows the venue to be an open-air facility with the ability to close pending weather conditions. This innovative roof function ensures that no event needs to be cancelled due to inclement weather. The roof system features a series of three moveable panels and one stationary panel which takes 25 minutes to open or close fully. The roof weighs 11,000 tons and covers an area of 339,343 square feet. The highest point stands 282 feet above field level.

Architects Rod Robbie and Michael Allen designed the building patenting its retractable roof system. Preparation of the site began in April 1986, with groundbreaking taking place in October of that same year. The last exterior concrete was poured in November 1988 and the first test of the moveable roof panels was performed in January 1989. More than 10,000 person-years of employment were created with the construction of *Rogers Centre*.

Rogers Centre is home to impressive technology including the video and ribbon boards located in the north end and around the circumference of the 300 Level. Purchased in 2005 from Daktronics, the screen is one of the industry's leading with PROSTAR® VIDEOPUS which uses state of the art LED technology. Measuring 110 feet wide by 33 feet high, the video board is capable of projecting 4.3 trillion colours.

The Toronto Blue Jays have seen significant changes to their playing surface for the start of the 2016 season. After extensive offseason research a decision was made to retrofit the field from its original state (four separate concrete pits filled with dirt forming Home, 1st, 2nd and 3rd base) to an all dirt infield.

The new dirt infield allows for greater material depth which ensures the best quality infield surface and one that is more consistent with the rest of Major League Baseball. The infield, now approximately 12,000 square feet in area, is made up of five distinct layers starting with the under fill, the existing sand and gravel base below the concrete floor. A 2" layer of pea gravel is above that which provides an area for excess water to go. Above the pea gravel is a 4" layer of sub-angular sand, which is an important part of the moisture management system. The remaining 6" is filled with baseball dirt

which is a product that is processed specifically for baseball fields. This product contains a blend of 60% sand, 20% clay, and 20% silt. Sitting on top of the baseball dirt is the top layer, also known as top dressing which is a loose layer of material made up of calcined and vitrified clay.

The rest of the field remains the "roll up" synthetic turf system made up of the AstroTurf 3DXtreme 60 product, installed for the 2015 season. This product is a blend of monofilament and slit-film face fibres combined with a texturized thatch and reinforced backing that looks, feels and plays more like a natural grass field. The 3DXtreme product differs from past surfaces in the type of infill required between the turf fibres.

The field is comprised of 85 panels for the baseball configuration. The largest roll is 52 metres (170 feet) long by 4.5 metres (15 feet) wide with a roll diameter of 1.4 metres (4.5 feet). With a symmetrical layout in baseball mode, the field measures 328' down the foul lines, 375' to the power alleys and 400' to dead centre field. The diamond is centred two degrees off perfect north with a 10 foot high outfield wall, fully padded for the protection of the players. The pitcher's mound is constructed on a fibreglass dish that is lowered and raised by a hydraulic system.

FIRST GAME PLAYED AT EXHIBITION STADIUM

The Blue Jays slugged their way to a 9-5 triumph over the Chicago White Sox in their April 7, 1977, debut.

Despite snow flurries before the game and near-freezing temperatures, 44,649 fans witnessed the exciting contest, which featured 16 hits by the Blue Jays and 15 by Chicago.

The Blue Jays played 968-games from April 7, 1977-May 28, 1989 at Exhibition Stadium posting a record of 492-476 with 23,213,567 fans passing through the turnstiles.

DUNEDIN STADIUM

Located at the corner of Douglas Avenue and Beltrees Street in Dunedin, Florida. Dunedin Stadium has been the training home for the Toronto Blue Jays since the Club's first season in 1977 and home of the Dunedin Blue Jays of the Florida State League (A+).

From 1977 to 1989 the Blue Jays played at Grant Field in Dunedin, which had a seating capacity of 3,417. In 1990, the City of Dunedin, at a cost of approximately 2.4 million, built a new stadium for the Blue Jays, Dunedin Stadium at Grant Field. The stadium was designed by the architect firm of Johnston Dana Associates and was built by Case Contracting Company of Plant City, Florida. With the construction the stadium saw an increase in the seating capacity from 3,417 to 6,106.

On September 8, 2000, the City of Dunedin and the Toronto Blue Jays reached an agreement to keep the Blue Jays in Dunedin for a minimum of 15 years pending approvals. Under the agreement major renovations would be made to Dunedin Stadium and a new minor league facility would be constructed. The \$12.5 million renovation was shared between the State of Florida, Pinellas County, the City of Dunedin and the Toronto Blue Jays.

The renovations to Dunedin Stadium in February 2002 were designed by the architectural firm HOK Sports + Venue + Event and were built by J.A. Jones Construction. The changes to Dunedin Stadium included a new two-story building beyond the right field wall, which holds the Blue Jays clubhouse, training room and weight room on the ground floor with office space for the major league club on the second floor. The visiting clubhouse is now located on the third-base line. As well, the bleacher seats along the right-field foul line were removed and permanent seating installed. The dimensions of the Stadium increased from 315 feet to 327 feet. The capacity of the Stadium is 5,509.

Construction on the Minor League facility was completed for the 2003 season. The Bobby Mattick Training Center is located on the same grounds of the Englebert Complex. The facility features new clubhouses, offices, weight room, five full fields and a half field. Four of the fields are arranged in a cloverleaf pattern with an observation tower in the middle.

The largest ever spring exhibition game crowd was 6,218 on Tuesday March 27, 1990 for the game between the Blue Jays and the Kansas City Royals and on Wednesday March 13, 1985 for the Blue Jays and the New York Mets. The first ever Blue Jays game played at Grant Field was on March 11, 1977. The Blue Jays defeated the New York Mets by a score of 3-1.



GLOSSARY OF MEDICAL TERMS

ABDUCT – Movement of any extremity away from the midline of the body. This action is achieved by an abductor muscle.

AC JOINT – Acromioclavicular joint; joint of the shoulder where acromion process of the scapula and the distal end of the clavicle meet; most shoulder separations occur at this point.

ADDUCT – Movement of any extremity towards the midline of the body. This action is achieved by an adductor muscle.

ANTERIOR – In front of; the front surface of.

ANTERIOR CRUCIATE LIGAMENT (ACL) – A primary stabilizing ligament within the center of the knee joint that prevents hyperextension and excessive rotation of the joint. A complete tear of the ACL necessitating reconstruction could require up to 12 months of rehabilitation.

ANTI-INFLAMMATORY – Any agent which prevents inflammation, such as aspirin or ibuprofen.

ARTHROGRAM – X-ray technique for joints using air and/or dye injected into the affected area; useful in diagnosing meniscus tears of the knee and rotator cuff tears of the shoulder.

ARTHROSCOPY – A surgical examination of the internal structures of a joint by means of viewing through an arthroscope. An arthroscopic procedure can be used to remove or repair damaged tissue or as a diagnostic procedure in order to inspect the extent of any damage or confirm a diagnosis.

BONE SCAN – An imaging procedure in which a radioactive-labeled substance is injected into the body to determine the status of a bone injury. If the radioactive substance is taken up by the bone at the injury site, the injury will show as a “hot spot” on the scan image. The bone scan is particularly useful in the diagnosis of stress fractures.

CARTILAGE – Smooth, slippery substance preventing two ends of bones from rubbing together.

CAT SCAN – Use of a computer to produce a cross-sectional view of the anatomical part being investigated from x-ray data.

CHARLEY HORSE – A contusion or bruise to any muscle resulting in intramuscular bleeding.

CONCUSSION – Jarring injury of the brain resulting in dysfunction. It can be graded as mild, moderate or severe depending on loss of consciousness, amnesia and loss of equilibrium.

CONTUSION – An injury to muscle and tissues cause by a blow from a blunt object.

DEBRIDEMENT – Removal of non-healthy tissues and foreign material from a wound or burn to prevent infection and permit healing.

DELTOID MUSCLE – Muscles at the top of the arm, just below the shoulder, responsible for shoulder motions to the front, side and back.

DISC – A flat, rounded plate between each vertebrae of the spine. The disc consists of a thick fibering which surrounds a soft gel-like interior. It functions as a cushion for the spinal column.

FEMUR – Thigh bone; largest bone in the body.

FIBULA – Smaller of the two bones in the lower leg; runs from the knee to the ankle along the outside of the lower leg.

FRACTURE – Breach in continuity of a bone. Types of fractures include simple, compound, comminuted, greenstick, incomplete, impacted, longitudinal, oblique, stress or transverse.

GADOLINIUM MRI – The chemical gadolinium is injected into the joint being studied so as to enhance the diagnosis of the structure under investigation.

GLENOID – Cavity of the scapula into which the head of the humerus fits to form the shoulder girdle.

GRADE ONE INJURY – A mild injury in which ligament, tendon, or other musculoskeletal tissue may have been stretched or confused, but not torn or otherwise disrupted.

GRADE TWO INJURY – A moderate injury when musculoskeletal tissue has been partially, but not totally torn which causes appreciable limitation in function of the injured tissue.

GRADE THREE INJURY – A severe injury in which tissue has been significant, and in some cases totally, torn or otherwise disrupted causing a virtual total loss of function.

GROIN – Junction of the thigh and abdomen; location of muscles that rotate, flex and adduct the hip.

HEMATOMA – Tumor-like mass produced by an accumulation of coagulated blood in a cavity.

HYPEREXTENSION – Extreme extension of a limb or body part.

IMPINGEMENT SYNDROME – Pinching together of the supraspinatus muscle and other soft tissue in the shoulder. The most common (throwing) arm injury, which represents many pathologies and general involves supraspinatus overuse.

INFLAMMATION – The body’s natural response to injury in which the injury site might display various degrees of pain, swelling, heat, redness and/or loss of function.

LABRUM (Labrum Glenoidale) – The cartilage of the glenoid cavity in the shoulder. A lip-edge or lip-like structure.

LATERAL – To the outside of the body.

LIGAMENT – Band of fibrous tissue that connects bone to bone, or bone to cartilage and supports and strengthens joints.

MAGNETIC RESONANCE IMAGING (MRI) – Imaging procedure in which a radio frequency pulse causes certain electrical elements of the injured tissue to react to this pulse and through this process a computer display and permanent film establish a visual image. MRI does not require radiation and is very useful in the diagnosis of soft tissue, disc, and meniscus injuries.

MEDIAL – To the inside of the body.

MEDIAL COLLATERAL LIGAMENT (MCL) – Ligament of knee along the medial aspect that connects the femur to the joint.

MENISCUS – Crescent shaped cartilage, usually pertaining to the knee joint, also known as “cartilage.” There are two menisci in the knee, medial and lateral. These work to absorb weight within the knee and provide stability.

METACARPALS – Five long bones of the hand running from the wrist to the fingers.

METATARSALS – Five long bones of the foot, running from the ankle to the toes.

POSTERIOR – At the back part, or rear of the body.

POSTERIOR CRUCIATE LIGAMENT (PCL) – A primary stabilizing ligament of the knee that provides significant stability and prevents displacement of the tibia backward within the knee joint. A complete tear of this ligament necessitating reconstruction could require up to 12 months of rehabilitation.

QUADRICEP MUSCLES “QUADS” – A group of four muscles of the front thigh that run from the hip and form a common tendon at the patella; they are responsible for knee extension.

ROTATOR CUFF – Comprised of four muscles in the shoulder area that can be irritated by overuse. The muscles are the supraspinatus (most commonly injured), infraspinatus, teres minor and subscapularis.

ROTATOR CUFF IMPINGEMENT SYNDROME – A microtrauma or overuse injury caused by stress. The four stages are: 1) tendinitis with temporary thickening of the bursa and rotator cuff 2) fiber dissociation in the tendon with permanent thickening of the bursa and scar formation 3) a partial rotator cuff tear of less than 1 cm and 4) a complete tear of 1 cm or more.

SHIN SPLINT – A catch-all syndrome describing pain in the shin that is not a fracture or tumor, and cannot be defined otherwise.

SPRAIN – Injury resulting from the stretch or twist of the joint and causes various degrees of stretch or tear of a ligament or other soft tissue at the joint.

STRAIN – Injury resulting from a pull or torsion to the muscle or tendon that causes various degrees of stretch or tear to the muscle or tendon tissue.

STRESS FRACTURE – A hair-line type of break in a bone caused by overuse.

SYNOVITIS – Inflammation of the synovial lining of a joint.

TENDINITIS – Inflammation of the tendon and/or tendon sheath, caused by chronic overuse or sudden injury.

TENDON – Tissue that connects muscle to bone.

TIBIA – Larger of the two bones of the lower leg and is the weight-bearing bone of the shin.

ULNAR NERVE – Nerve in the elbow commonly irritated from excessive throwing.

ULTRASOUND – An electrical modality that transmits a sound wave through an applicator into the skin to the soft tissue in order to heat the local area for relieving the injured tissue and/or disperse edema.

NOTE: This list is not meant to be all inclusive, nor should it be used as a substitute for a physician’s diagnosis and/or description of an injury or illness.



