EXECUTIVE PROFILES

LEWIS WOLFF

Owner and Managing Partner

Lew Wolff, one of the nation's leading real estate developers and hotel magnates, enters his seventh season as Owner and Managing Partner of the Oakland Athletics.

Heading a limited partnership group that purchased the A's on April 1, 2005, Wolff wasted little time in emblazoning his stamp on one of baseball's most successful and storied franchises. The very next season, the A's made their fifth postseason appearance in seven years in 2006, advancing to the American League Championship Series for the first time since 1992.

Since then, Wolff has worked tirelessly in exploring possible locations to build a much-needed new ballpark venue, as well as supporting GM Billy Beane's efforts in building a strong foundation for future championship teams through player development and acquisitions. According to many baseball experts, the young and talented A's are now on the threshold of another winning era in Oakland.

Wolff's impact on the Bay Area sports landscape is not limited to baseball. In May of 2006, he reached an agreement with Major League Soccer in an attempt to bring professional soccer back to the Bay Area. The expansion San Jose Earthquakes returned to action in 2008, playing their home games at Santa Clara University's Buck Shaw Stadium. Wolff and the Earthquakes ownership group continue to work on securing a soccer-only facility for the team in the South Bay.

Under Wolff's ownership, the A's continue to be one of the most community-minded organizations in all of sports. Last year alone, the A's Community Fund donated approximately \$600,000 to various community programs. In 2006, the Wolff family, led by his daughter, Kari Wolff, implemented "Dinner on the Diamond," which has raised nearly \$500,000 for the A's Community Fund since its inception. Lew is also an active participant in the A's Home Run Readers program.

The *San Jose Mercury-News* ranked Wolff first in its annual listing of the Bay Area's 25 Most Powerful Sports Figures in both 2006 and 2007.

In September 2008, the Silicon Valley Leadership Group also presented Wolff with its prestigious "Community Cornerstone Award." The award is given to "a Silicon Valley leader who has displayed a lifetime of impeccable ethics, business achievement and community engagement."


Along the way, the personable Wolff has made a favorable impression among those who follow the team on a regular basis with his easy-going, straight-forward manner and quick-witted humor.

Wolff is the founder of Wolff Urban Development and co-founder of Maritz-Wolff, entities that are involved in the development, acquisition and management of a wide range of commercial, office, parking and hotel properties in a number of California cities including San Jose, Los Angeles, Pasadena and Burbank to name a few.

Wolff's ownership interests in representative hotels and resorts include properties such as The Carlyle in New York City; Four Season Hotels in Houston, the Park Hyatt in Carlsbad; The Ritz-Carlton in St. Louis; Fairmont Hotels in San Jose and San Francisco; Rosewood managed hotels including The Mansion in Dallas, Little Dix Bay, Virgin Gorda, Inn of the Anasazi, Sante Fe plus other brands such as Marriott. In addition, Maritz Wolff has a 50 percent interest in the Dallas-based Rosewood Management Company, which owns and operates luxury hotels and resorts throughout the world.

Wolff began his career in real estate economics and appraisal in his hometown of St. Louis, Mo. before relocating to Los Angeles. In addition to his real estate analysis work, he also served as the President of the 20th Century Fox Realty & Development Company where he managed Fox's worldwide real estate activities.

Wolff is a former minority owner of the St. Louis Blues, the Golden State Warriors and the San Jose Missions, a now-defunct minor league baseball team. He holds a bachelor's degree in business administration from the University of Wisconsin in Madison, a

master’s degree in business administration from Washington University in St. Louis and is also a member of the American Institute of Real Estate Appraisers (MAI).

In 2009, he was appointed to the Board of Directors of the new MLB Television Network, which launched in January 2009 with an unprecedented 50 million subscribers, and he continues to serve on the board of Major League Baseball’s Enterprises, which oversees national television and radio contract negotiations, national sponsorship and licensing programs as well as the overall marketing of the industry. Wolff is a director and co-chairman of the NYSE Company, Sunstone Reit and a member of the Board of Directors of Century Bank, Los Angeles.

Lew resides in the Westwood section of Los Angeles with his wife, Jean. The Wolffs have three children and four grandchildren.

MICHAEL CROWLEY

President

Michael Crowley, one of the rising executives in professional sports today, enters his 14th year with the Athletics’ organization and his 13th as team president. He was named to his current position Sept. 28, 1998 and his tenure as president equals the longest in Oakland history (since 1968).

A limited partner in the Athletics ownership group, Crowley is responsible for the overall day-to-day functioning of the Athletics’ organization both on the business and baseball sides of the operation, working directly with owner and managing partner Lew Wolff.

In a dual role, Crowley also serves as managing director of the Major League Soccer’s San Jose Earthquakes. He oversaw the Earthquakes’ first-year launch in 2008, and he continues to spearhead the team’s efforts to build a new state-of-the-art, soccer-only stadium in San Jose.

After spending three years in the San Jose office of Price Waterhouse and nine years with I.C.I./Fuller O’Brien Paints, Crowley joined the Athletics organization in July 1997 as vice president and chief financial officer. Considered a key figure in the A’s resurgence as one of baseball’s elite franchises, Crowley has been committed to fielding a championship caliber team with homegrown talent. He works closely with General Manager Billy Beane on key player decisions and issues relating to the baseball operations’ overall objectives and philosophies.

Crowley developed a business model with goals and objectives designed to provide an affordable entertainment product on the field, as well as delivering the absolute highest levels of customer service to fans attending games at the Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum. While Crowley stays involved with all aspects of the organization’s business affairs, including finance, sales, marketing, public relations and community affairs, he has been at the forefront of building an outstanding team that continues to deliver premium value.

Crowley also serves on Major League Baseball’s International Committee.

Crowley’s leadership skills and business acumen have also served the A’s well in their ongoing efforts to build a new ballpark in the near future.

The A’s president also perpetuates the Athletics’ tradition of commitment to the greater community. Under his leadership, the A’s organization continues to be active in the Oakland community and surrounding areas. The Oakland A’s Community Fund supports charitable organizations in their efforts to improve educational programs, aid the underprivileged, assist in crime prevention, service children, seniors and those who work to improve the quality of life throughout the Bay Area.

In 1999, Crowley and his wife, Kathy, played a key role in implementing Breast Cancer Awareness Day, which has raised \$1.145 million for the American Cancer Society over the last 11 years. Crowley currently serves on the Bay Area’s Board of Trustees of KIPP schools, which aims to create a respected, influential and nationwide family of schools that are successful in helping educationally underserved students develop the knowledge, skills and character to succeed in college and the competitive world beyond. He also served on the board of top business

executives and community leaders which attempted to land the 2012 Summer Olympic Games in the Bay Area.

A native Californian, the 47-year old Crowley graduated from the University of Notre Dame in 1985 with a degree in business administration with an emphasis in accounting. He earned his MBA from Duke's Fuqua School of Business in 1992. In November of 2002, Crowley was named one of *Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal's* "40 Under 40", honoring the nation's top sport executives under the age of 40.

Michael resides in Los Gatos, Calif. with his wife, Kathy, and their three children.

BASEBALL OPERATIONS

BILLY BEANE

Vice President, General Manager

Considered one of the most progressive and talented baseball executives in the game today, Billy Beane has molded the Athletics into a perennial postseason contender since assuming the general manager's duties shortly following the 1997 season.

Under Beane's watch, the A's have compiled a 1132-972 (.538) record over the last 13 seasons, which is the fourth-best record in the American League and sixth best in all of baseball during that time frame. The A's have won four American League West titles (2000; 2002-03; 2006) and secured one AL Wild Card spot (2001) during that span. His teams have posted 90 or more wins in six of the last 11 years. The A's five postseason appearances since the 2000 season are seventh most among all Major League teams, trailing only New York-AL (10), St. Louis (7), Atlanta (7), Boston (6), Los Angeles-AL (6) and Minnesota (6).

In addition, Oakland A's players have garnered numerous individual accolades during his tenure as general manager. Jason Giambi and Miguel Tejada earned American League Most Valuable Player awards in 2000 and 2002, respectively. Barry Zito was named the American League's Cy Young Award winner in 2002 while Bobby Crosby (2004), Huston Street (2005) and Andrew Bailey (2009) have all won AL Rookie of the Year honors.

Beane continually remolds a team that has posted one of the majors' best records over the last past decade. Over the years, his ability to land players such as Kevin Appier, Johnny Damon, Mark Ellis, Cory Lidle, Jermaine Dye, David Justice, Billy Koch, Justin Duchscherer, Keith Foulke, Ted Lilly, Ray Durham, Jose Guillen, Mark Kotsay, Octavio Dotel, Jason Kendall, Dan Haren and Jay Payton has proved instrumental in keying several playoff runs. The additions of Hideki Matsui, David DeJesus, Josh Willingham, Grant Balfour and Brian Fuentes this past off-season are the most recent examples of his GM handiwork.

During the past three years, Beane has also re-stocked the A's minor league system with elite prospects which will enable the team to sustain winning teams well into the next decade. Remarkably, Beane and Assistant GM David Forst have acquired 22 highly coveted young players by trading essentially eight Major League players (Nick Swisher, Rich Harden, Joe Blanton, Chad Gaudin, Matt Holliday, Orlando Cabrera, Haren and Kotsay) since the end of the 2007 season.

Under Beane, the A's have adopted an organizational philosophy that stresses plate discipline and pitchers who command the strike zone. Young players on the lowest-level minor league teams receive the same doctrine on developing a solid understanding of the strike zone and control pitching as do the players in the majors.

Beane's executive talents and the organization's baseball philosophy were the subject of Michael Lewis' best-selling book "Moneyball: The Art of Winning an Unfair Game," which opened the eyes of many of the top sports executives and business CEOs in the nation. The book has since been made into a full-length motion picture featuring Brad Pitt in the starring role, due to premiere this fall.

As a result, Beane remains in great demand on the national speaking circuit, where he regularly addresses top companies on his management approach of identifying and using undervalued assets to create and sustain a competitive edge. He also sits on the board of directors of several companies, including Easton-Bell Sports, ProTrade and NetSuite, Inc.

Beane was named The Sporting News' Executive of the Year in 1999 and earned Major League Baseball's Executive of the Year honors by Baseball America magazine following the 2002 season. In No-

ember of 2001, Beane was named one of Street & Smith's Sport Business Journal's "40 Under 40" list, honoring the nation's top 40 sports executives under the age of 40. In 2004, he was rated 16th on Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal's list of Baseball's Heavy Hitters.

Further demonstrating his eclectic tastes and unique interests, Beane was invited to speak at Rupert Murdoch's News Corp. management retreat in Pebble Beach, Calif. in 2006, an event that focused on issues such as volunteerism, technology and politics, and featured leaders and luminaries from around the world. Among the VIP who attended were British Prime Minister Tony Blair, Israeli Vice Premier Shimon Peres, former President Bill Clinton, former Vice President Al Gore, former House Speaker Newt Gingrich, former Harvard President Lawrence Summer and U2 lead singer Bono.

In 2008, Beane also collaborated with Gingrich and Sen. John Kerry in co-authoring an article in the New York Times offering possible remedies for the U.S. health care crisis.

Beane joined the A's front office staff in 1990 as the club's major league advance scout. In 1993, former A's President and General Manager Sandy Alderson promoted him to the assistant general manager's position when Walt Jocketty left the organization to accept the assistant general manager's job in Colorado. Alderson handed over his general manager's duties to Beane on October 17, 1997.

A first round draft pick (23rd overall) of the New York Mets in the 1980 June Free Agent Draft, Beane played six major league seasons as an infielder, outfielder and catcher for the Mets, Minnesota Twins, Detroit Tigers and Oakland A's. His final season in uniform was 1989 when he was a utility player on the A's World Championship team. Beane retired as an active player in the spring of 1990.

A native of San Diego, Calif., Beane attended Mt. Carmel High School and UC San Diego, where he studied economics. Billy and his wife, Tara, reside in Danville, Calif. with their twins, Brayden and Tinsley. His daughter, Casey, attends Kenyon (Ohio) College.

ERIC KUBOTA

Director of Scouting

Eric Kubota is in his 27th season with the Athletics organization and his 10th as director of scouting.

Kubota has overseen the club's last nine drafts that have produced dozens of players who have risen to the major leagues with various clubs, including current A's Andrew Bailey (2006), Dallas Braden (2004), Trevor Cahill (2006), Brad Kilby (2005), Cliff Pennington (2005) Landon Powell (2004), Tyson Ross (2008) and Kurt Suzuki (2004). Kubota's talents as an evaluator helped assemble the majority of the A's minor league system that has combined for a 3415-3119 (.523) record over the last nine seasons

Prior to assuming his current position, Kubota served as the club's supervisor of international scouting for three seasons, overseeing the scouting staff and player evaluations in the Dominican Republic and Venezuela.

Kubota, 46, began his baseball career in June of 1984 while he was an undergraduate at the University of California, Berkeley, spending the better part of six seasons working in the A's media relations department. Drafted by the Detroit Tigers in the 1982 June First Year Player Draft, Pittaro made his major league debut with the Tigers in 1985, batting .242 in 28 games. PAMELA PITTS

Director of Baseball Administration

Pamela Pitts enters her 30th season in the organization and 19th as director of baseball administration. Her responsibilities include managing the day-to-day business side of the baseball operations department, including governing all major and minor league staff contract administration, player records, waivers, payroll issues and transactions. She started her baseball career with the A's in November of 1981 as the minor league and public relations secretary. Pamela resides in Danville, Calif. with her husband, Dan Dunn.



GRADY FUSON

Special Assistant to General Manager

Grady Fuson, former Oakland Athletics' scouting director and one of the game's most respected scouts and baseball executives, returned to the A's last year as a special assistant to the general manager.

Fuson, who began his career as an area scout with Oakland in 1982, has now spent 20 seasons with the A's organization, including seven years as scouting director from 1995-2001. Prior to his current position with the Athletics, he served as vice president of scouting and player development with San Diego from 2006-09 after joining the Padres in 2005 as a special assistant to the general manager.

His first stint with the A's ended in 2002, when he joined the Texas Rangers as assistant general manager, spending three seasons in charge of the Rangers' scouting and player personnel.

Formerly the head baseball coach at the University of Puget Sound in Washington, Fuson was hired by the A's in 1982. During his tenure in Oakland, he played a prominent role in drafting such players as Eric Chavez, Tim Hudson, Mark Mulder and Barry Zito, which provided the impetus for the franchise to feature five playoff teams over a seven-year period from 2000-06.

JIM LEAHEY

Vice President, Sales and Marketing

Jim Leahey enters his fifth season with the Oakland Athletics as vice president, sales and marketing. He oversees the team's sales and marketing efforts, including ticket sales, premium seating sales and service, corporate partnerships, advertising, and promotions. Leahey is spearheading the organization's efforts to deliver exceptional value through an outstanding fan experience.

Prior to joining the A's, Leahey spent 14 years with Sony Corporation, working in a series of product development, marketing and general management roles. Spending time in Sony's US and global operations, he worked in Latin America as general manager and country manager of Sony Peru, and in the United States as general manager and vice president of the Peripherals and Enhancements (accessories) Group. Leahey joined the A's in December of 2006.

A native of Rhode Island, Leahey earned his bachelor's degree in economics from Brown University in 1988 and his master's in business administration from the Harvard Business School in 1993. Jim resides in Danville, Calif. with his wife, Kira, and their three children.



KEN PRIES

Vice President, Broadcasting and Communications

Celebrating his 21st season with the Athletics organization, Ken Pries was promoted to his current position of vice president, broadcasting and communications in March of 2000 after serving as the team's senior director for broadcasting and communications for the previous three years.

Pries oversees all of the A's television and radio matters, in addition to the club's community relations, public relations and Diamond Vision departments.

Pries is responsible for negotiating all of the team's broadcast agreements, which include the A's Radio Network, and television partnership with Comcast SportsNet California. The A's will televise over 145 games this year, all in High Definition.

Last season, the A's Community Fund distributed approximately \$600,000 to various projects and made donations to over 1,500 various charities throughout Northern California. The annual A's Community Fund Golf Tournament, held at the Castlewood Country Club in Pleasanton, raised more than \$125,000 and the 11th Annual Breast Cancer Awareness Day raised more than \$70,000 for the American Cancer Society and the Northern California Cancer Center. The A's 11th Annual MUG Root Beer Float Day raised over \$31,000 for the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation.

Prior to joining the A's organization in 1991, Pries worked seven years with KSFO radio, where he was an executive producer for A's broadcasts, as well as Stanford football and men's basketball broadcasts. Before his KSFO stint, Pries served as a sports coordinator at KNBR radio from 1979-84, where he worked on the station's broadcasts of San Francisco Giants baseball games, along with University of San Francisco and Golden State Warrior basketball games.

A native of Alameda, Calif., Pries attended San Francisco State University, where he majored in broadcast communicational arts. He resides in San Ramon, Calif. with his wife and their two children.



DAVID RINETTI

Vice President, Stadium Operations

David Rinetti enters his 31st season with the A's organization and his 11th as vice president, stadium operations.

In his current position, Rinetti coordinates event management, oversees all game day employees, including ushers, security officers, ticket takers, parking attendants and grounds crew, and assists in all construction related issues at Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum. PAUL WONG

Vice President, Finance

Paul Wong enters his 16th season with the Athletics organization and 11th as vice president, finance. Assistant Athletic Trainer

Director of Strength and Conditioning

With nearly 30 years of coaching experience, Bob Alejo returned to the Oakland A's in 2009 for a second stint as the Director of Strength and Conditioning. Previously, he served in a similar capacity from 1993-2001. In his role, he is responsible for all aspects of the organization's year-round physical preparation at both the major league and minor league levels. Prior to rejoining the A's in 2009, Bob was the Director of Strength and Conditioning at UC Santa Barbara from 2005-2008 during which time he was also a member of the 2008 U.S. Olympic Team as strength and conditioning coach for the Gold medal-winning men's beach volleyball team of Todd Rogers and Phil Dalhausser. From 1984-1993,



Alejo was the strength and conditioning coach at UCLA where he worked with 23 men's and women's teams. During his tenure in Westwood, the Bruins racked up 25 national championships and produced more than 100 All-Americans. An accomplished lecturer and author, Alejo is a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist (through the National Strength and Conditioning Association's Certification Commission) and holds the advanced NSCA Registered Strength and Conditioning Coach distinction. He has also been elected to three halls of fame: Chico State Athletics, Chico State Baseball (inaugural inductee) and the Chico Professional Baseball "Legends of the Diamond."

Major League Massage Therapist

Ozzie Lyles enters his third season as the Oakland A's team massage therapist. He previously worked several years with many professional athletes, while also studying and practicing sport and medical massage since 1992. He was employed at Oakbay Chiropractic in Oakland from 2004-09 under the Oakland Raiders' team orthopedic surgeon, Dr. Warren Strudwick, and also has worked for Dr. Steve Isono, the Olympic and track and field orthopedic physician, in Emeryville. The Oakland, Calif. native also worked at Club One in Oakland.



LARRY DAVIS

Coordinator of Medical Services

Larry Davis begins his 39th season with the A's organization and fourth as coordinator of medical services. He oversees and administrates all health and injury issues throughout the organization. Before his current post, Davis served 10 seasons (1998-2007) as the A's head trainer and 14 previous years (1984-97) as an assistant trainer for the big league club. A native of Tucson, Ariz., Davis attended the University of Arizona where he majored in physical education. He began his baseball career in 1973 as the head trainer, traveling secretary and equipment manager of the Tucson Toros, then Oakland's Triple-A affiliate. He remained in that capacity for 11 seasons as the affiliate moved to San Jose, Vancouver, Ogden and Tacoma. Larry makes his home in Mesa, Ariz. with his wife, Suzi.



THE A'S ELEPHANT

After helping form the American League in 1901, New York Giants manager John McGraw dismissed the A's with contempt by calling them "The White Elephants," implying Connie Mack should not be allowed to spend money without supervision. Mack defiantly adopted the White Elephant as the team insignia and in 1902, the Athletics won their first American League pennant.


The White Elephant remained the team's mascot and later that decade, made its first appearance on the A's team sweaters. In 1918, the Elephant saw its first game action when Mack had the pachyderm symbol (in blue with a white "A" inside) placed on the left sleeve of every player.

By 1920, Mack had fully adopted the Elephant as the team's symbol. The traditional "A" on front of the team's jersey was replaced by a blue elephant logo. After a few poor seasons, Mack decided change was in order. So, in 1924, the blue elephant was replaced by the traditional white elephant on the team's jersey and the A's played better ball for the next few years.

In 1928, Mack decided the elephant had worn out its brief welcome on the A's jersey fronts and replaced the logo with the familiar "A" on the uniform. The A's went on to win two World Championships and an AL crown in the next three years, although the resurgence was probably due more to the additions of Foxx, Simmons, Grove and Cochrane than the elephant's absence.

That was the last year for the elephant on the A's uniform until 1955, when the A's, now in Kansas City, added the patch to their uniform sleeves. However, when Charlie Finley purchased the team in the early 1960's, the elephant was once again sent packing and replaced by, of all animals, a mule.

Prior to the 1988 season, the A's brought back a new, more aggressive A's Elephant. In 1995, the traditional A's elephant was reincorporated into many of the team's promotional items and publications and is now a prominent feature on the A's uniform.



CLUBHOUSE AND STAFF

MICKEY MORABITO

Director of Team Travel

Mickey Morabito enters his 32nd season as the Athletics' director of team travel. He is responsible for arranging the transportation and accommodations of the team during spring training and the regular season, with additional responsibilities in spring training scheduling, payroll and ticketing. He has the second longest tenure with one club among active major league traveling secretaries. Morabito's career in professional baseball spans four decades, dating back to 1970 when he served as a batboy for the New York Yankees. He worked in the Yankees public relations department for seven seasons, working as an assistant from 1974-76 before taking over the director's duties in 1977. While with the Yankees, he managed the club's media relations efforts during the club's back-to-back World Championship seasons of 1977 and '78. Morabito joined the Athletics organization in the spring of 1980, handling dual roles as the club's director of public relations and traveling secretary. During his long career, he has been a part of six World Series teams, three with the A's and three with the Yankees. A native of Brooklyn, NY, Morabito attended Lafayette High School in Brooklyn and later earned his bachelor of arts degree in physical education from Hunter College in New York City. A fan of Frank Sinatra, Dean Martin, fine dining and hockey, Mickey makes his home in Alameda and Manhattan Beach with his wife Barbara.



STEVE VUCINICH

Equipment Manager

A fixture in the A's organization ever since the club moved to Oakland in 1968, Steve Vucinich enters his 18th season as the club's equipment manager after serving as the visiting clubhouse manager from 1974-93. An Oakland native, Vucinich joined the A's organization as a ball boy in 1968 when the franchise relocated from Kansas City. From 1969-73, he served as an assistant in the home clubhouse before being named visiting clubhouse manager in 1974. Vucinich is a past president of the Major League Baseball Equipment Manager's Association and currently serves on the MLBMA's board of directors and as well as the advisory committee for Major League Baseball Properties. Vucinich graduated from St. Joseph's High School in Alameda and Chabot College in Hayward. An avid golfer, he makes his off-season home in Scottsdale with his wife, Valerie, and daughter, Kayla.



MIKE THALBLUM

Visiting Clubhouse Manager

The 2010 season marks Mike Thalblum's 31st season in the A's organization and his 18th as the visiting clubhouse manager. He began his baseball career when he was 13 years old, serving as a clubhouse assistant in the team's spring training clubhouse in Phoenix. 

Robert Paul Melvin

Named as A's interim manager, June 9, 2011

Bob Melvin was named interim manager of the A's for the remainder of the 2011 season June 9. He replaced Bob Geren, who compiled a 334-376 (.470) record in four-plus seasons as manager. Melvin has a record of 493-508 (.493) in seven previous seasons as a Major League manager with the Seattle Mariners (2003-04) and Arizona Diamondbacks (2005-09). He is the 29th manager in franchise history and the 17th in Oakland history.

In his previous managerial stint, he guided Arizona to a 337-340 (.498) record in four-plus seasons. He was named manager of the D-backs Nov. 5, 2004 and led the club to a 77-85 mark in his first season, a 26-game turnaround from a franchise-worst 51-111 mark in 2004. After a 76-86 finish in 2006, Melvin was named National League Manager of the Year by the BBWAA in 2007 after guiding Arizona to a league-best 90-72 record. He also earned NL Manager of the Year honors from *The Sporting News* and the Negro League Baseball Museum's C.I. Taylor Legacy Award. The Diamondbacks followed up their NL West title with a second place finish in 2008, finishing 82-80. Melvin became the winningest manager in Arizona history that season when he earned his 304th win Aug. 14, surpassing Bob Brenly. He was ejected from a game twice during the 2008 season and has 19 career ejections as a manager. Melvin was relieved of his duties as D-backs manager May 8, 2009 after a 12-17 start.

Prior to being named A's manager, Melvin had rejoined the Diamondbacks as a special baseball advisor to President & CEO Derrick Hall in May of 2011, assisting the baseball operations department and other business divisions of the organization. He was a professional scout for the New York Mets in 2010.

Melvin began his managerial career in 2003 and guided to the Mariners to a 93-69 record in his rookie campaign, shattering the team record for wins by a first-year Mariners manager set by Lou Piniella in 1993 (82-80). His 93 wins also tied for the 15th-most by any rookie manager in Major League history. The Mariners then fell to 63-99 in 2004 and he left Seattle with a 156-168 (.481) record in two seasons.

Melvin began his coaching career as Manager Phil Garner's bench coach from 1999-2000, first with the Brewers in 1999 and then in 2000 with the Tigers. While with the Brewers, he also managed the Maryvale team in the Arizona Fall League in 1999. He then served as Bob Brenly's bench coach with the D-backs from 2001-02 when the club won back-to-back NL West titles and the World Series in 2001. Prior to those bench coach roles, he spent three seasons with Milwaukee in various capacities, serving as a scout in 1996, roving instructor in 1997 and as assistant to General Manager Sal Bando in 1998.

A 10-year Major League veteran, Melvin's playing career included stops in Detroit (1985), San Francisco (1986-88), Baltimore (1989-91), Kansas City (1992), Boston (1993), New York-AL (1994) and Chicago-AL (1994). He posted a .233 batting average with 35 home runs and 212 RBI while playing in 692 games.

The former catcher was drafted by Detroit as its first choice in the secondary phase of the 1981 January draft and hit .220 in 41 games in his rookie season of 1985. Melvin spent the next three seasons sharing the catching duties with Bob Brenly for the Giants and hit a career-high 11 home runs in 1987. After three seasons in Baltimore, he batted a career-high .314 in 32 games with Kansas City in 1992.

Melvin graduated from Menlo-Atherton High School in Menlo Park, Calif. in 1979 and later attended and played baseball at the University of California in Berkeley. He and his wife, Kelly, reside in Lower Manhattan, NY. Their daughter, Alexi, is a recent graduate of the prestigious Lee Strasberg Theater & Film Institute in New York.



Bob Geren has compiled a 307-340 (.474) record in four seasons as manager of the Oakland A's. He was named the 28th manager in franchise history and the 17th in Oakland history on Nov. 17, 2006.

Geren guided Oakland to an 81-81 record and second-place finish in the American League West in 2010 after posting losing seasons in each of his first three years at the helm. He was also named to the coaching staff for the American League All-Star team last year. The A's used the disabled 23 times in 2010, which was second most in Oakland history, and the 23 players combined to miss an Oakland record 1,397 games. After employing an Oakland-record 54 players and tying the club record by using the disabled list 22 times in 2007 en route to a 76-86 record, the A's utilized 51 players in 2008 and set a new Oakland record by using the DL 25 times while finishing 75-86. The A's utilized 51 players again in 2009 and used the DL 17 times in a 75-87 season. Oakland has now used the DL 87 times during Geren's four seasons as manager – a total surpassed only by the Texas Rangers (98) – and has employed 129 different players.

Geren has been a member of the A's coaching staff for the last eight seasons, serving as the club's bench coach in 2006 after spending the previous three seasons as bullpen coach. He joined the A's organization in 1999 as manager of Single-A Modesto and spent the next three seasons (2000-02) at the

helm of the Triple-A Sacramento River Cats. He also managed in the Boston Red Sox farm system for three seasons, guiding Utica of the New York-Penn League in 1995, the Red Sox Gulf Coast League team in 1996 and Sarasota of the Florida State League in 1998. His seven-year managerial record on the minor league level is 452-390, including a 319-253 record in the A's system.

He gained further managerial experience in the 2005 off-season, leading Escocido in the Dominican Winter League.

Geren was named the California League's Manager of the Year in 1999 after his Modesto club finished 88-52 and won both halves in the Northern Division of the California League. He then led Triple-A Sacramento to consecutive first place finishes in the Southern Division of the Pacific Coast League, as the River Cats posted a 90-54 record in 2000 and 75-69 mark in 2001.

A former catcher, Geren's professional playing career spanned 15 seasons, including five years in the major leagues with the New York Yankees and San Diego Padres. Originally a first round pick of the Padres in 1979, Geren was traded to the St. Louis organization prior to making his major league debut with the Yankees in 1988. He played four seasons with New York from 1988-91 and enjoyed his best season in 1989 when he batted .288 and hit a career high nine home runs. After spending the 1992 season in Boston's minor league system, Geren finished his playing career with San Diego in 1993. He owns a .233 career batting average in 307 Major League games.

A native of San Diego, Geren attended Clairemont High School. Bob and his wife, Pam, reside in Danville with their sons, Brett and Bobby. Bobby was drafted by the A's in the 36th round of the 2010 First-Year Player draft but did not sign and now attends Princeton University.

Mike Gallego completed his second season as the A's third base coach in 2010, but it was his 14th season in the Oakland organization, which includes 12 years as a player.

Gallego joined the A's from the Colorado Rockies organization, where he spent nine seasons, including four as third base and infield coach on Clint Hurdle's major league staff, including a storybook 2007 season when they won the National League Pennant. Under his tutelage, the Rockies set a major

league record for fielding percentage with a mark of .98925 in 2007. Shortstop Troy Tulowitzki led major league shortstops with a .987 fielding percentage that year and Todd Helton topped all National League first basemen with a .999 fielding percentage. Gallego joined the Rockies organization as a roving infield coordinator in 2000, a position he held until joining the major league coaching staff May 1, 2002. He returned to his minor league duties in 2003-04, before rejoining the major league staff in 2005. Gallego began his coaching career as Boston's minor league infield instructor in 1999.

Gallego's professional career began when the A's drafted him in the second round of the 1981 June draft out of UCLA. He made his major league debut with Oakland in 1985 and spent 13 seasons in the majors with Oakland (1985-91, 95), the New York Yankees (1992-94) and St. Louis Cardinals (1996-97). He is a .239 career hitter with 42 home runs and 282 RBI in 1111 games, including .232 in 772 games with the A's. A valuable utility infielder, he played in three straight postseasons with Oakland from 1988-90 and was a member of the 1989 World Champion A's. In 1993, he won the Good Guy Award from the New York Press Photographer's Association and New York Baseball Writers after enjoying his best season, batting .283 with 10 home runs and 54 RBI.

A native of Whittier, Calif., Gallego graduated from St. Paul High School (Santa Fe Springs, Calif.) and attended UCLA for three years before being drafted by the A's. He and his wife, Caryn, have twin sons, Nicholas and Joseph (12/29/88) and a daughter, Allison (12/12/90), and reside in Phoenix, Ariz.

HITTING COACH

Gerald June Perry

Named A's hitting coach, October 20, 2010

Birthdate: October 30, 1960

Birthplace/Resides: Savannah, Georgia / Marietta, Georgia



Gerald Perry returns to Oakland in 2011 as the club's new hitting coach, a position he previously held with the A's in 2006.

Perry, hitting coach for Boston's Triple-A affiliate in Pawtucket last season, began his major league coaching career in Seattle under Manager Lou Piniella in 2000. During his three seasons there, the Mariners reeled off a 300-186 record (.617), including a 116-win playoff season in 2001 that set an American League record and tied the Major League mark (1906 Chicago Cubs) for most victories in a season. Perry, who enters his 28th season in professional baseball this spring, has also served as hitting coach with Pittsburgh (2003-05), Oakland and the Cubs (2007-09).

During the 10 major league seasons as a hitting coach, his teams have advanced to the playoffs five times, including Mariners teams that played in the ALCS Series in 2000 and 2001, and the 2006 A's club that also appeared in the ALCS.

In his second stint as hitting coach with Piniella, his 2008 Cubs ranked second in the National League in batting average (.278) and paced the NL in runs scored (855). The average was the franchise's highest mark in 71 years. That 2008 Chicago club also finished first in the National League and second in the majors with 636 walks. It marked the fifth time in which Perry helped an offense rank first or second in the league in walks (also 2000-02 with Seattle and 2006 with Oakland).

During his three-year stay in Seattle, the Mariners led the majors in on-base percentage (.357) and walks (2018), and paced the American League in batting average (.278) and runs scored (2648).

Besides last season, Perry previously spent three years in the Boston organization as a minor league hitting coach with Single-A Michigan (1997) and Triple-A Pawtucket (1998), and was the club's minor league hitting coordinator in 1999.

Originally an 11th round selection by Atlanta in the 1978 Draft, Perry played parts of 13 major league seasons with the Braves (1983-89), Kansas City Royals (1990) and St. Louis Cardinals (1991-95). A .265 lifetime hitter with 59 home runs and 396 RBI in 1,193 games, the Savannah, Ga. native was named to the National League All-Star Team in 1988 when he batted .300 with 29 doubles, eight homers, 74 RBI and 29 stolen bases for the Braves. The previous season, 1987, he set an Atlanta record with 42 stolen bases, the most by a full-time Major League first baseman since Rod Carew swiped 49 with Minnesota in 1976. When he finished his career in St. Louis, he left as the Cardinals' all-time leader in pinch hits (70).

Perry is a 1978 graduate of H.E. McCracken High School in Buffton, S.C. He and his wife, Tara, have three children, Portia, Falon and Gerald Jr.



Rick Rodriguez begins his first season on the A's coaching staff as bullpen coach but it is his 27th year in the Athletics organization. His tenure includes seven seasons as a player and 19 as a minor league coach.

Rodriguez has spent 10 of the previous 11 seasons (2000-02, 04-10) as the pitching coach at Triple-A Sacramento. The one exception was in 2003 when he managed the A's Single-A affiliate at Modesto to a 74-66 record and postseason appearance. Rodriguez' first coaching assignment came in 1992 with the A's affiliate at Scottsdale in the Arizona Rookie League. He spent the next two seasons with Southern Oregon of the Northwest League and also coached five seasons at Modesto from 1995-99.

Rodriguez was originally selected by Oakland in the second round of the 1981 June draft and spent seven seasons with the A's organization, including two in the majors with Oakland. He went 1-2 with a 6.61 ERA in three starts in 1986 and 1-0 with a 2.96 ERA in 15 relief appearances in 1987. Rodriguez also pitched for Cleveland (1988) and San Francisco (1990) in his big league career and compiled a 3-4 record and 5.73 ERA in 31 games, including eight starts. His playing career concluded in 1991 when he made three appearances for Triple-A Phoenix in the Giants' farm system.

An East Bay native, Rodriguez was born in Oakland and graduated from Castro Valley High School in 1978. He attended Chabot Junior College in Hayward and the University of California, Riverside.



Ron Romanick begins his first season as the A's pitching coach in 2011 after spending three seasons on the A's major league coaching staff as bullpen coach.

Romanick joined the A's coaching staff in 2008 and assisted former pitching coach Curt Young in developing one of the best young pitching staffs in baseball over the past three seasons. During that three-year period, the A's have posted the best earned run average (3.95) and fewest home runs (444) in the American League, and ranked second in the AL in both shutouts (34) and lowest opponents' batting average (.254).

Romanick joined the Oakland organization in 1999 as the A's minor league roving pitching instructor and spent nine seasons in that role. He also served as a pitching coordinator in the Seattle Mariners organization for seven seasons (1992-98).

Romanick's major league career spanned three seasons (1984-86) with the California Angels, compiling a career record of 31-29 and a 4.24 ERA in 82 appearances, all starts. He made 33 starts for the Angels as a rookie in 1984 and posted a 12-12 record and a 3.76 ERA. Romanick followed up his rookie season with a 14-9 showing in 1985. After going 5-8 in 1986, he was traded to the New York Yankees organization and spent the 1987 season with Triple-A Columbus. He retired in 1988 after spending one year in the Milwaukee farm system.

Romanick pitched at Arizona State before being drafted by the Angels in the first round of the Secondary Phase of the 1981 January Draft.

A native of Bellevue, Wash., Ron makes his off-season home in Fountain Hills, Ariz.

Joel Patrick Skinner

Named A's bench coach, October 20, 2010

Birthdate: February 21, 1961

Birthplace/Resides: La Jolla, California / La Jolla, California

Joel Skinner, who previously served nine seasons (2001-09) on the Cleveland Indians' coaching staff, begins his first season as the A's bench coach in 2011.

Skinner, who managed Cleveland's Double-A affiliate Akron to a 71-71 record last season, served on the Indians' major league staff for nine years, including the 2001 and 2007 clubs that advanced to the postseason. The La Jolla, Calif. native was named third base coach in 2001 and held that position for parts of eight seasons (2001-05, 2007-09). He was named interim manager of the Indians midway through the 2002 season, posting a 35-41 record after replacing Charlie Manuel. Skinner also served as bench coach for Cleveland during the 2006 campaign.

Son of former major league outfielder Bob Skinner, who played 12 seasons with Pittsburgh, Cincinnati and St. Louis, Skinner played 15 seasons in professional baseball prior to his coaching career, including nine years on the big-league level with the Chicago White Sox (1983-86), New York Yankees (1986-88) and Indians (1989-91). He registered a .228 batting average with 17 home runs and 136 RBI in 564 career games.

He was the youngest (41) manager in the majors the second half of the 2002 season, as he and his father (Phillies, 1968-69; Padres, 1977) became only the second father/son managerial tandem in Major League Baseball history. The elder Skinner played in three All-Star Games and was a member of the 1960 World Series championship Pirates team.

He logged seven seasons as a minor league manager, including three years in Akron (1998-99, 2010), and has notched a career winning percentage of .562 (519-404). Skinner guided five of his minor teams to the playoffs, earning Minor League Manager of the Year awards from *Baseball America* and *The Sporting News* after guiding Triple-A Buffalo to the International League championship in 2000. He also served as a coach on Team USA at the 2000 Futures Game. In 1998, he was named *USA Today Baseball Weekly's* "Manager of the Year" with Akron, and earned additional "Manager of the Year" honors in 1997 while at Kinston (Carolina League) and in 1995 with Watertown (New York-Penn League) after leading the Indians' Single-A teams to league titles. He spent the 1994 season as a roving catching instructor after retiring during the season.

Skinner was originally selected by the Pittsburgh Pirates in the 36th round of the 1979 Draft and was later picked by the Chicago White Sox in the 1982 Compensation Draft. The former catcher spent the last three seasons of his playing career (1992-94) battling back from right shoulder surgery after the 1991 season.

The La Jolla, Calif. native played baseball and water polo at Mission Bay (Calif.) High School. He and his wife, Jennifer, have three daughters, Kate, Erin and Tara, and one son, Cameron.

Tye Waller returns to the first base coaching box in 2011 after spending the previous two seasons as bench coach. He was the A's first base coach in 2007 and split his duties between first base and third base in 2008. The 2010 season was Waller's fourth on the A's coaching staff and his sixth on a major league staff, as he was San Diego's bullpen coach in 1995 and first base coach in 2006.

Waller spent 19 years in the Padres organization, beginning in 1988 as a coach with the Padres rookie-level club in Spokane, Wash. He then served as the club's minor league outfield and base running instructor from 1989-93 before taking over the managerial duties at Spokane for the 1994 season. Following his one-year stint on the major league staff in 1995, Waller served as San Diego's coordinator of minor league instruction from 1997-99 and as director of player development from 2000-05.

Selected by the St. Louis Cardinals in the fourth round of the 1977 First-Year Player Draft, Waller played 11 seasons professionally, including parts of four seasons in the majors. In his first season of professional ball, he batted .320 for Calgary and led the Pioneer League in hits, runs and RBI on his way to league MVP honors. He made his major league debut with the Cardinals in 1980 and appeared in five games for the Redbirds. He was traded to the Chicago Cubs in the off-season to complete a deal that sent Leon Durham and Ken Reitz to the Cubs for Bruce Sutter. He appeared in 30 games for the Cubs in 1981 and finished the season batting .268 with three home runs and 13 RBI. Waller was traded to the White Sox in December of 1982 and signed a free agent contract with the Astros in 1983. He appeared in 11 games for the Astros in 1987, his last season of professional ball.

A native of Fresno, Calif., Waller graduated from Hoover High School and attended San Diego City College for two years. Tye makes his off-season home in San Diego with his wife, Cynthia. The couple has four children—Elliott and triplets Todd, Terrence and Tiffany.

Lowered his ERA by more than a run from his rookie campaign of 2009 but two stints on the disabled list with elbow problems limited him to just 19 starts in 2010...was 7-6 with a 2.80 ERA after going 11-11 with a 4.06 ERA in his first season...tossed 112.1 innings and did not qualify for the league leaders... however, based on a minimum of 100 innings pitched, he ranked fifth in the American League in ERA... also ranked fourth in fewest home runs per nine innings (0.48), fifth in fewest walks per nine innings (1.76) and lowest run support (3.53), eighth in strikeout to walk ratio (3.41) and ninth in opponents slugging percentage (.353)...is now 15-10 with a 2.88 ERA in 36 starts since June 29, 2009...his ERA is second lowest among AL pitchers with 200 or more innings pitched over that span (Hernandez, SEA 2.33) and sixth lowest in the majors...opponents batted .257, which included .243 (80 for 329) by right-handed hitters and .299 (32 for 107) by left-handers...his career splits are .246 (203 for 826) against righties and .308 (89 for 289) against lefties...allowed all six of his home runs to righties...five came at home, five were hit in night games and five were with the bases empty...his opponents batting average dropped to .225 with runners in scoring position after yielding a .314 average with RISP in 2009... however, the opposition hit .315 when leading off an inning...received run support of one run or fewer in eight of his 19 starts and was 0-5 in those games...had a 7-1 record in his 11 starts with support of two runs or more...is now 0-14 in 20 career starts with zero or one run of support and 18-3 in 29 starts with at least two runs of support...tied for eighth in the AL with four pickoffs and now has eight in two seasons...the A's were 8-11 (.421) in his starting assignments and are 22-27 (.449) in his career...tossed six or more innings 14 times, allowed two runs or fewer 13 times and walked two batters or fewer in 18 of his starts.

OAKLAND: Did not allow a run in his first two starts of the season April 8 against Seattle and April 13 at Seattle to become the first starting pitcher in Oakland history (among pitchers who began the season with the A's) to start the season with two consecutive scoreless outings...the last Athletics pitcher to do it was Alex Kellner of the 1953 Philadelphia A's, who started the season with back-to-back complete game shutouts...was charged with the first wild pitch of his career in the game on the 13th, snapping a career-opening streak of 31 starts and 186.1 innings without a wild pitch...the streak of 31 consecutive starts without a wild pitch tied for sixth longest by a starter in Oakland history...agreed to terms April 16 on a four-year contract through the 2013 season with club options for 2014 and 2015...had his season-opening scoreless streak snapped at 14.0 innings in his third start, an 8-3 loss to Baltimore... that was the third longest season-opening streak by a starter in Oakland history and the longest since Matt Keough set the record with a 16.0 inning streak in 1980...was 1-1 with a 2.35 ERA in four starts before going on the 15-day disabled list April 27 retroactive to April 25 with left elbow inflammation

and a proximal medial forearm strain...it was his first career stint on the DL...made one rehab start with Triple-A Sacramento May 24 against Nashville and had a no decision in the River Cats' 8-3 win (3.0 ip, 6 h, 2 r, 2 er, 1 bb, 1 so, 1 hbp)...was reinstated from the DL May 29 and had a win and a 2.35 ERA in two starts before returning to the DL with left elbow inflammation June 4...made four more rehab starts, going 0-0 with a 3.00 ERA in two starts with the A's affiliate in the Arizona Rookie League and 1-0 with a 3.48 ERA in two starts with Sacramento, before he was reinstated July 30...went 5-5 with a 2.98 ERA in 13 starts following his return...yielded a career-high tying 10 hits in 5.1 innings in a 6-1 loss July 30 at Chicago but picked up the win in his next start Aug. 4 against Kansas City...then had a career-high tying four-game losing streak from Aug. 10 to Sept. 1...went 0-4 despite a 3.21 ERA over that five-start span, receiving no run support three times, including Aug. 27 at Texas when he left after 2.0 innings with a mild hyper extension of his right knee...the 2.0 innings pitched matched his career low (June 3, 2010 at Boston)...then finished the season with a career-high tying four-game winning streak, posting a 2.18 ERA and holding the opposition to a .233 batting average over his final six starts...walked a season-high three batters Sept. 11 against Boston, snapping a 22-start streak dating back to Aug. 19, 2009 where he walked two batters or fewer...that was the second longest streak by a starting pitcher in Oakland history, falling four short of the record of 26 by Gil Heredia (April 10-Aug. 28, 1999)...went 3-1 with a 2.23 ERA and .237 opponents batting average in six starts in September...is now 7-1 with a 2.25 ERA (16 er in 64.0 ip) in 10 career starts in September and is 11-16 with a 3.94 ERA (98 er in 223.2 ip) in 39 starts the rest of the season.

CAREER

2009—Was one of two 21-year olds to spend the season in the A's starting rotation...set an Oakland rookie record with 150 strikeouts...led the A's pitching staff in strikeouts and wins (11) and finished second in starts (30)...compiled an 11-11 record and 4.06 ERA...led all Major League rookies in strikeouts...tied for third among American League rookies in games started, ranked fourth in innings pitched (175.1) and tied for fourth in wins...his strikeouts broke the previous Oakland rookie record of 141 set by Rick Langford in 1977...fell one short of the Oakland rookie record for wins...became the eighth Oakland rookie to make 30 or more starts...is one of four 21-year olds in Oakland history to win 10 or more games and his 30 starts tied for fifth most in Athletics history by a pitcher under the age of 22...was 3-7 with a 5.74 ERA, .304 opponents batting average and 13 home runs allowed over his first 13 starts...then went 8-4 with a 2.96 ERA, .237 opponents batting average and seven home runs over his final 17 starts, beginning June 29...his ERA from June 29 through the end of the season was fourth best in the AL...was charged with 15 unearned runs, which tied for the most in the AL...also ranked tied for fifth in grounded into double plays (24), tied for seventh in shutouts (1) and pickoffs (4), eighth in walks per nine innings (2.31) and strikeout to walk ratio (3.33), and 10th in strikeouts per nine innings (7.70)...received run support of one run or less in 12 of his 30 starts and his season run support of 4.62 was eighth lowest in the AL...was 11-2 in 18 starts with run support of two more...did not have a wild pitch and his 175.1 innings were the most in the majors among pitchers with no wild pitches...they were third most in Oakland history...allowed a .265 opponents batting average, which included a .247 mark against right-handed hitters and .313 against left-handers...yielded a .314 average with runners in scoring position, which was fifth highest in the AL...however, that marked dropped to .239 from June 29 through the end of the season...compiled a 7-4 record and 3.14 ERA in 17 starts on five or more days rest and was 4-7 with a 5.19 ERA in 13 starts on four days rest...did not commit an error in 29 total chances, all assists...since 1954, the only other pitchers to make at least 30 starts in a season without recording a putout are Randy Johnson (SEA, 1991) and Bob Veale (PIT, 1970)...tied for the lead among AL pitchers in double plays (5) and tied for fourth in assists...the A's were 14-16 (.467) in his starting assignments...tossed six or more innings 16 times, allowed two runs or fewer 11 times and walked two batters or fewer 25 times...was ranked number 7 on *Baseball America's* Top 100 Prospects lists entering the season...made the A's Opening Day roster at the age of 21 years and 64 days, making him the seventh youngest player on an Opening Day roster in Oakland history...was the losing pitcher in his Major League debut, a 5-4 A's loss to Seattle April 10...at the age of 21 years, 68 days, he became the seventh youngest pitcher in Oakland history to start in his debut...allowed five runs in 6.0 innings, with all five runs coming in the second inning...left his starts April 28 at Texas and May 4 against Los Angeles with a blister on his finger...went 0-4 over his first six starts, all A's losses...the only longer career-opening streak of consecutive starts in team losses in Oakland history was by Mike Morgan, who went 0-9 over his first nine career starts from June 11, 1978 to July 24, 1979...was 0-4 with a 6.03 ERA over the first six starts of his career before recording his first Major League win May 20 at Tampa Bay...yielded four runs on four hits and no walks in 6.0 innings in a 7-6 A's win...at the age of 21 years, 108 days, he became the

sixth youngest pitcher in Oakland history to record his first ML win...tossed a complete game two-hit shutout in the A's 6-0 win at Boston July 6 (2 bb, 9 so)...at the age of 21 years, 155 days he became the fifth youngest pitcher in Oakland history to toss a shutout and the youngest since Mike Norris July 4, 1976 against Kansas City...did not allow a run over his next two starts, including July 19 against Los Angeles when he retired each of the first 20 batters he faced before Bobby Abreu singled with two outs in the seventh inning to break up the perfect game...became the second rookie in Oakland history to take a perfect game into the seventh inning (Mike Norris, June 28, 1976)...had a career-high 23.0-inning scoreless streak from July 6 to 24, which was the fourth longest scoreless streak by a rookie in Oakland history...finished July with a 2-1 record, 1.87 ERA and .168 opponents batting average in five starts...then went 1-2 with a 4.66 ERA in six starts in August...was named American League Rookie of the Month for September after going 4-0 with a 2.28 ERA in four starts...struck out a career-high 10 batters and tossed 6.0 shutout innings in a 2-1 win over Cleveland Sept. 18...lost his final start of the season Oct. 1 at Seattle, snapping his winning streak at a career-high four games.

2008—Combined for an 11-5 record and a 3.69 ERA in 20 games, 19 starts, with Single-A Stockton and Double-A Midland in his first season in the A's organization...also pitched for the United States team in the All-Star Futures Game at Yankee Stadium July 13 (1.0 ip, 1 h, 1 bb) and for Team USA in the Summer Olympics in Beijing, China...was 1-0 with a 4.97 ERA (12.2 ip, 13 h, 8 r, 7 er, 3 bb, 10 so, 2 hr) in two starts during the Olympics...was rated as the A's number one prospect and the fourth best prospect in the California League by *Baseball America* following the season...was also tabbed as having the Best Slider and Best Control in the magazine's Best Tools survey for A's prospects...with Stockton and Midland, he allowed a .237 opponents batting average, which included a .234 mark by right-handed hitters and .245 by left-handers...opponents hit .235 with runners in scoring position...struck out 118 and walked just 27, a strikeout to walk ratio of 4.4 to 1...averaged 10.1 strikeouts per nine innings...allowed eight home runs, six of which were solo shots...began the year at Stockton and was 9-4 with a 4.14 ERA in 14 games, 13 starts...tied for the team lead in wins despite spending just three months with the Ports...did not allow a run in four of his first six starts to start the season 5-1 with a 2.43 ERA...went 4-0 with a 1.82 ERA over his final five games, four starts, with Stockton...was named California League Pitcher of the Week, June 9-15...won both of his starts and allowed just one run in 14.0 innings, while striking out 16...was promoted to Midland June 24 and was 2-1 with a 2.61 ERA in six starts with the RockHounds...struck out a season high 12 in 6.0 innings in his first Double-A start June 26 at Arkansas...then tossed 3.2 shutout innings July 7 against Springfield and 1.1 scoreless, hitless innings July 11 at San Antonio before going to New York for the Futures Game July 13...returned to Midland and went 1-1 with a 1.93 ERA in two starts July 18 and 23 before joining Team USA for the Olympics...had a no decision Aug. 16 in a 5-4 win over Canada (5.2 ip, 9 h, 4 r, 3 er, 4 so)...then started and won in the Bronze Medal game Aug. 23 against Japan, an 8-4 win (7.0 ip, 4 h, 4 r, 4 er, 3 bb, 6 so)...made one final start for Midland Aug. 28, a no decision in a 6-4 win over San Antonio.

2007—Was Arizona's second round pick in 2006 but did not sign until Sept. 1, 2006...made his professional debut in 2007 and was a combined 11-7 with a 3.07 ERA in 23 games, all starts, with Single-A South Bend and Single-A Visalia...ranked third in the Diamondbacks farm system in wins and ERA...allowed a .270 opponents batting average, including .215 by left-handed hitters and .283 by right-handers...that mark dropped to .171 with runners in scoring position...struck out 125 in 120.1 innings, an average of 9.3 per nine innings...walked just 21 for a strikeout to walk ratio of 5.95 to 1...only one of those walks was issued to a left-handed hitter...walked two batters or fewer in all but one of his 23 starts...was 8-4 with a 2.21 ERA in 14 starts at South Bend and was a *Baseball America* Low Class A All-Star...was also named the number three prospect in the Midwest League by the magazine...tied for the Silver Hawks team lead in wins despite being promoted to Visalia June 21...compiled a 1.84 ERA in five starts in April, but was just 3-2...had a season best five-game winning streak over a seven-start stretch from May 10 to June 11 (1.67 ERA)...was 3-3 with a 4.85 ERA in nine starts with Visalia...made one postseason start for the Oaks and took the loss (4.0 ip, 3 h, 1 r, 1 er, 1 bb, 4 so, 2.25 ERA)...was traded to the A's on December 14 and was named Oakland's third best prospect by *Baseball America*.

Anderson was originally signed by Diamondbacks scout Joe Robinson...graduated from Stillwater (OK) High School...was a *Baseball America* 1st Team High School All-America selection in 2006 after going 9-0 with two saves and a 0.37 ERA in 12 games as a senior...struck out 102 and walked just nine in 57 innings...his father, Frank, is the head baseball coach at Oklahoma State University...

was part of the A's 2010 Holiday Caravan, which featured many public appearances around the Bay Area, including autograph sessions at a holiday party for Oakland elementary school children and an after school mentoring program, hosting a holiday shopping event for children from the Salvation Army Garden Center Shelter, and visiting a local adolescent substance abuse treatment center.



Batted .273 with 10 home runs, 57 RBI and an American League-leading 110 walks...the walks fueled a .393 on-base percentage, which was fifth best in the AL...also ranked second in the league in pitches per plate appearance (4.39), tied for second in times on base (265), tied for fourth in sacrifice hits (12), seventh in games (159) and tied for ninth in triples (5)...led the A's in games, at bats (556), runs (79), hits (152), doubles (33), walks, on-base percentage and slugging percentage (.405), and tied for the lead in sacrifice hits...the slugging percentage is the lowest by a team-leader in Oakland history...the previous low was established in 2009 by Kurt Suzuki (.421)...the sacrifice hits were the most by an Athletic since A.J. Hinch had 13 in 1998, the most by a first baseman in Oakland history and the most by any Major League first baseman since Rod Carew had 16 for California in 1982...all 12 occurred over his first 99 games...had no sacrifice hits over his final 60 games, beginning July 30...stole seven bases, which led AL first basemen and were third most by a first baseman in Oakland history...they were the most since Don Baylor had 24 of his 52 steals in 1976 as a first baseman...led AL first basemen in games (157), games started (155), total chances (1492) and putouts (1404) but committed 10 errors, which tied for second most...his .993 fielding percentage was second lowest among AL qualifiers...had seven errors over his first 30 games (.976 fielding percentage) but just three over his last 127 contests (.998)...the games played, games started, total chances and putouts set Oakland records for a first baseman...the games were second most in Athletics history (Norm Siebern, 162 in 1962)...struck out 102 times, marking the 14th time in Athletics history a player has reached the century mark in walks and strikeouts in the same season...batted .310 with a .490 slugging percentage against left-handed pitching and .259 with a .372 slugging percentage against right-handers...hit nine of his 10 home runs on the road...has hit just six of his 26 career home runs in the Coliseum...also had nine home runs at night...hit .233 with runners in scoring position, including .181 with RISP and two outs...made a team-leading 149 starts hitting second...also hit third five times and sixth once...went 0 for 3 with two strikeouts as a pinch hitter and is now 1 for 13 (.077) with two RBI and eight strikeouts in his career in the pinch.

OAKLAND: Walked a Major League-leading 22 times during the spring, the most walks by an Athletic since spring stats were first available in 1991...the previous best was 17 by Mark McGwire in 1991...then walked three times in the opener, April 5 at Seattle...that tied the Oakland Opening Day record set by Sal Bando in 1975 and matched by Barton in 2008...had his first career four-RBI game April 8 against the Mariners...drove in seven runs over his first five games but then had a career long 16-game streak without a RBI from April 10 to 27...the streak ended when he homered April 28 at Tampa Bay, snapping a career-long 41-game homerless streak...it was his first home run since Sept. 11, 2009...

fractured the volar plate in the middle finger of his right hand April 25 against Cleveland but did not miss any games...homered in the 11th inning May 11 at Texas and added the game-winning RBI single in the 13th...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the first Athletic to have a RBI hit in two different extra inning at-bats in the same game since Harry Simpson did it for the Kansas City A's June 12, 1956 in a 9-3, 15-inning win at Washington...had a career-high 11-game hitting streak from May 25 to June 4...hit .341 (14 for 41) during the streak...had a second 11-game hitting streak from Aug. 17 to 28 (16 for 39, .410)...hit safely in 15 consecutive road games from May 25 to June 16 (20 for 58, .345)...tied an Oakland record with three doubles June 26 against Pittsburgh (23rd time, last by Ryan Sweeney, Sept. 14, 2009)...added four RBI, becoming just the third player in Oakland history with three doubles and at least four RBI in a game (Sweeney and Ben Grieve, Sept. 3, 1997 vs. San Francisco)...was ejected from the game July 6 by home plate umpire Mike Winters after striking out in the fifth inning...it was his first career ejection...was ejected for a second time Sept. 12 by Hunter Wendelstedt after striking out to end the game against Boston...homered in the fifth inning July 10 against Los Angeles to snap a career-high tying 0 for 20 streak (also Sept. 8-16, 2008)...it also snapped a 34-game homerless streak...scored a career-high four runs Aug. 28 in Texas when he went 2 for 3 with a home run and two walks...set an Oakland record with five consecutive multi-walk games from Aug. 28 to Sept. 1...reeled off his best month of the season in August when he batted .311 with three home runs, nine RBI and 27 walks (.466 on-base percentage) in 27 games...boasted a .281 average entering September, but he hit .226 with no home runs and four RBI in 28 games in the month...then had his first career two-homer game and drove in a career-high six runs Oct. 1 at Seattle...hit a solo home run in the first inning, his first career grand slam in the second and added a RBI double in the sixth.

CAREER

2009—After spending the entire 2008 season with the A's, Barton split 2009 between Triple-A Sacramento and Oakland...hit .261 with nine home runs and 48 RBI in 70 games with the River Cats and .269 with three home runs and 24 RBI in 54 games with the A's...was batting .147 with a home run and three RBI with Oakland when he was placed on the 15-day disabled list July 28 retroactive to July 27 with a strained left hamstring...hit .302 with two home runs and 21 RBI in 37 games following his return...batted .212 with five extra base hits in Oakland compared to .333 with 11 extra base hits on the road...had more walks (26) than strikeouts (25)...hit .359 with 16 of his 24 RBI against American League West teams and .183 against everyone else...batted .324 with nine RBI in the eighth inning or later and .252 with 15 RBI over the first seven innings...had a .271 batting average with two of his three home runs and 16 of his 24 RBI with two strikes...hit .333 when leading off an inning...batted .231 against a pitcher the first time he saw him in a game and .339 after that...hit .192 with two outs and .306 with less than two outs...appeared in 51 games, including 46 starts, at first base and made just one error for a .998 fielding percentage...opened the season with the River Cats but was recalled by the A's June 8...hit .118 with one RBI in 12 games, four starts, before he was optioned back to Sacramento June 28...recalled for a second time July 20 and hit .176 with a home run and two RBI in five starts before going on the DL with the hamstring injury...began a rehab assignment with the A's affiliate in the Arizona Rookie League Aug. 13 and hit .278 with a home run, three RBI and six walks in six games...was transferred to Single-A Stockton Aug. 20 and went 0 for 4 in one game...was reinstated from the DL the next day and started 37 of the A's final 42 games at first base...hit .310 with two home runs, 16 RBI and 19 runs scored in 24 games in September...drove in a run in six consecutive games from Sept. 20 to 26 (nine RBI total)...had his first career four-hit game Sept. 26 at Los Angeles to boost his batting average to a season-high .281...then went 5 for 25 (.200) over his final seven games...led Sacramento with nine hit by pitches and added 45 walks for a .386 on-base percentage...batted .184 with the bases empty and .368 with runners on (including .400 with runners in scoring position)...hit .273 with seven of his nine home runs against right-handed pitching and .239 against left-handers...committed four errors in 67 games at first base for a .994 fielding percentage...had a 10-game hitting streak from May 6 to 16 (12 for 37, .324)...was batting .203 entering play May 18 when he hit his first home run of the season against Round Rock...went 24 for 77 (.312) with three home runs and 12 RBI over his next 20 games to earn his first promotion to Oakland June 8...was optioned back to Sacramento June 28 and hit .321 with six home runs, 16 RBI and 12 walks (.463 on-base percentage) in 15 games before returning to Oakland for good July 20...had a season best 13-game hitting streak over two stints with the River Cats from June 2 to July 7 (19 for 53, .358).

2008—Struggled in his first full season with the A's as he batted .226 with nine home runs and 47 RBI in 140 games...the average was third lowest in the American League and seventh lowest in Oakland

history...also had the third lowest slugging percentage in the AL...led AL rookies in walks (65) and ranked third in triples (5)...the triples tied for third most by a rookie in Oakland history and the walks tied for fifth most...led the A's in triples, sacrifice hits (6) and intentional walks (5)...his batting average included a .208 mark against right-handed pitching and .273 against lefties...hit .218 in night games, which was the lowest in the AL...batted under .200 in three months including .139 in May, .160 in July and .198 in August...hit at least .269 in the other three months, including .278 in April, .269 in June and .279 in September...compiled a .303 batting average when leading off an inning...hit eight of his nine home runs on the road and six came after the All-Star Break...made a team leading 124 starts at first base and committed 13 errors for a .988 fielding percentage...led AL first basemen in errors and lowest fielding percentage and tied for second in double plays (128)...his fielding percentage was the lowest by a first baseman in Oakland history and the errors tied for second most, falling one short of the record of 14 by Jason Giambi in 1998...also appeared in one game at third base...was the A's Opening Day starter at first base March 25 against Boston in Tokyo and at the age of 22 years, 222 days, he was the A's youngest Opening Day starter since Eric Chavez started at third base in 2000 at the age of 22 years, 117 days...walked three times in the game to tie the Oakland Opening Day record for walks, set by Sal Bando in 1975...went 0 for 4 in the A's Coliseum opener April 1 against Boston...that snapped a career opening streak of 20 consecutive games reaching base via hit or walk, which was the longest such streak to start a career in Oakland history...the previous mark was 14 by Bruce Robinson in 1978...went 4 for 49 (.082) over an 18-game stretch from May 3 to 25...finished May with a .139 batting average, which was the second lowest May batting average in Oakland history to John Donaldson, who hit .134 in 1968...walked in all four plate appearances June 1 at Texas, the first four-walk game of his career...was batting .224 with three home runs and 25 RBI in 89 games before he was placed on the 15-day disabled list July 19 retroactive to July 14 with a neck strain...hit .194 with a home run and three RBI during an eight-game rehab assignment with Triple-A Sacramento from July 24 to 31 and was reinstated from the DL Aug. 1...went 8 for 68 (.118) over his first 20 games following his return, but then hit .307 with four home runs and 15 RBI over his final 31 games...snapped a career long 0 for 20 streak with a RBI double in the sixth inning Sept. 16 against Los Angeles...made his Major League debut at third base Sept. 20 against Seattle...had surgery on his right hip Oct. 24.

2007—Spent the entire regular season at Triple-A Sacramento and also played for the River Cats in the first round of the Pacific Coast League playoffs before he was selected by Oakland Sept. 10...started all 18 games at first base for the A's following his promotion and batted .347 in his Major League debut...of his 25 hits, 13 were for extra bases (nine doubles, four home runs) and he had a .639 slugging percentage...added 10 walks for a .429 on-base percentage...based on a minimum of 75 plate appearances, he had the third best single season batting average in Oakland history, the sixth best slugging percentage and the ninth best on-base percentage...reached base safely via hit or walk in all 18 of his games and had nine multiple hit games...hit .378 with three of his four home runs against right-handed pitching compared to .296 against left-handers...batted .419 on the road and .293 in Oakland...did not commit an error in 159 total chances at first base...made his ML debut Sept. 10 at Seattle and went 2 for 3 with a double and two walks...walked in his first two plate appearances before doubling off Ryan Feierabend in the sixth inning for his first ML hit...had nine hits in his first five games, which tied the Oakland record for most hits by a player in his first five ML games...shares the mark with Mitchell Page (1977), Jeff Cox (1980) and Ben Grieve (1997)...hit his first ML home run Sept. 14 against Texas, a two-run shot off Kason Gabbard in the third inning...batted .293 with nine home runs and 70 RBI in 136 games with Sacramento...led the River Cats in games, runs (84), hits (151), doubles (38), RBI and walks (78)...tied for fourth among all Triple-A batters in walks (78)...led the A's farm system in hits...batted .304 with eight of his nine home runs against right-handed pitching...hit .321 before the All-Star break and .246 after the break...batted over .300 in just one month and that was in July when he hit .454 with 14 doubles, two home runs and 20 RBI in 27 games...appeared in 115 games at first base, 18 at third base and five at designated hitter...had a grand slam and a season high five RBI May 3 at Las Vegas...had a 24-game hitting streak from June 5 to 29, which was the longest streak in the PCL in 2007...hit .490 (49 for 100) during the streak with 14 doubles, two home runs, 20 RBI and 24 runs scored...that included a streak of 10 straight multiple hit games from June 15 to 25 (27 for 40, .675)...went 11 for 20 (.550) with four home runs and 10 RBI in five games against Salt Lake in the first round of the PCL playoffs before he was promoted to Oakland.

2006—Batted .259 with two home runs and 22 RBI in 43 games with Triple-A Sacramento...his season was cut short after fracturing the radial head of his left elbow in a game against Iowa May 23...batted

.338 in 22 road games compared to .171 in 21 home games...hit .326 with runners in scoring position...hit .361 against left-handed pitching compared to .225 against right-handers...hit safely in 19 of his first 25 games, going 28 for 90 (.311)...went 10 for 57 (.175) over his next 18 games before going on the disabled list...played two games with the A's affiliate in the Arizona Rookie League Aug. 15 and 16 and went 1 for 5 with a double...batted .500 with three RBI in four games for Este in the Dominican Winter League...also hit .182 with a home run and three RBI in three playoff games.

2005—Split his season between Single-A Stockton and Double-A Midland and batted a combined .317 with 13 home runs and 89 RBI in 135 games...added 97 walks for a .426 on-base percentage...tied for fourth in all of Minor League Baseball in walks...tied for the best batting average in the A's farm system and ranked fourth in RBI...batted .380 with runners in scoring position and two outs...reached base safely via hit or walk in 123 of his 135 games...appeared in 113 games at first base, 20 at designated hitter and one each at catcher, third base, left field and right field...began the year at Stockton and hit .318 with eight home runs and 52 RBI in 79 games with the Ports...batted .404 with 24 RBI, 23 runs scored and 22 walks in 25 games in June...reached base safely via hit or walk in 40 consecutive games from May 3 to June 13...hit .306 with 37 walks for a .451 on-base percentage during the streak...had three four-hit games with the Ports and all came over an eight-game span from June 16 to 23...was promoted to Midland July 4 and hit .316 with five home runs and 37 RBI in 56 games with the RockHounds, including .348 in August...played for the United States team in the Futures Game July 10 at Comerica Park and went 0 for 1...had a season best 20-game hitting streak from August 7 to 28 and batted .390 during the streak, which equaled the second longest hitting streak in the Texas League in 2005...then hit .303 with a home run and two RBI in nine postseason games to help Midland win the Texas League Championship...played for the Arizona Fall League Champion Phoenix Desert Dogs and hit .267 with one home run and 10 RBI in 24 games...tied for the AFL league lead in walks (21) and had a .429 on-base percentage.

2004—Was named to the Midwest League Postseason All-Star team at catcher while playing for Single-A Peoria...led the Midwest League in on-base percentage (.445), ranked third in batting (.313) and was fourth in slugging (.511)...his on-base percentage ranked second among all minor leaguers and his batting average ranked second among all minor league catchers...ranked fourth in the St. Louis farm system in batting and RBI (77)...also ranked fourth in the ML in walks (69) and fewest strikeouts per plate appearance (8.93)...appeared in just 90 games for Peoria, as he did not join the club until May 16, but led the team in RBI, walks, on-base percentage and slugging and tied for the team lead in home runs (13)...batted .409 with runners in scoring position...appeared in 52 games at catcher and had a .975 fielding percentage...tossed out 18 of 71 (25.4%) attempted base stealers...hit safely in each of his first 12 games from May 16 to 29, his longest hitting streak of the season (20 for 41, .488)...was named Midwest League Player of the Week for the week of May 24-30...had his only two homer game of the season June 7 against Battle Creek...had a season high five RBI July 7 at Battle Creek as part of a streak of nine consecutive games with an RBI from July 5 to 17 (14 RBI total)...went 3 for 12 (.250) with two walks and two stolen bases in three playoff games for Peoria.



Had one of the most memorable performances in Oakland history with his Mother's Day Perfect Game yet finished the season with an 11-14 record despite a 3.50 ERA... the ERA was sixth lowest in Oakland history among pitchers with a losing record and was the lowest since 1978 when Matt Keough went 8-15 with a 3.24 ERA and Rick Langford posted a 7-13 mark and a 3.43 ERA... the last Major Leaguer with an ERA of 3.50 or lower and a winning percentage of .440 or worse was Omar Daal, who was 8-12 with a 2.88 ERA for Arizona in 1998... had the fourth-lowest run support in the American League (3.60)... ranked fifth in the AL in fewest walks per nine innings (2.01) and had the eighth lowest opponents on-base percentage (.294)... also tied for the league lead in shutouts (2), tied for second in pickoffs (8) and ranked fourth in complete games (5)... now has 19 career pickoffs... since 2007, only Mark Buehrle (31) and Andy Pettitte (23) have more pickoffs... opponents were successful in just 1 of 3 (33.3%) stolen base attempts, which tied for the lowest percentage in the AL... has yielded just one stolen base over the last two years, while opponents are 4 for 11 (36.4%) off him in his career... tied for fifth in the AL in losses (14), becoming just the second A's pitcher over the last 12 years to lose at least 14 games (Greg Smith, 16 in 2008)... averaged 14.8 pitches per inning, which was third fewest in the AL... had career bests in nearly every category, including ERA, opponents batting (.249), opponents on-base percentage and opponents slugging (.373)... is now 19-23 with a 3.66 ERA over the last two seasons, with his ERA ninth lowest among AL pitchers with 300 or more innings over that span... opponents hit .249 in 2010, including .242 by right-handed hitters and .271 by left-handers... entered the season with a .295 mark against righties and .236 against lefties... yielded a .239 mark with runners in scoring position after entering the season with a .315 career mark with RISP... was 6-11 with a 4.15 ERA in 18 starts on four days rest and 5-3 with a 2.55 ERA in 12 starts on five days rest or more... yielded 48 of his 83 runs in the fifth through seventh innings... had a 2.18 ERA over the first four innings of a game and 5.70 from the fifth inning on... received run support of two runs or fewer in 17 of his 30 starts... had 17 runs of support in his 14 losses (83.1 ip, 1.84 RSA) and now has 36 runs of support in his 35 career losses (192.0 ip, 1.69 RSA)... is 2-32 in 45 career starts with support of two runs or fewer, compared to 22-3 in 31 starts with run support of three or more... has career run support of 3.62 (181 rs in 450.0 ip) as a starter... made 10 starts with Landon Powell as his catcher, a pairing that produced a 4-6 record with four complete games, two shutouts and a 2.75 ERA (22 er in 72.0 ip) in those starts, including the perfect game... was 7-8 with a 3.95 ERA (53 er in 120.2 ip) in his other 20 starts... was part of four double plays on defense, which tied for second among AL pitchers... the A's were 13-17 (.433) in his starting assignments and are 33-43 (.434) in his 76 career starts... tossed six or more innings in 22 of his 30 starts, allowed two runs or fewer 14 times and walked two batters or fewer 27 times.

OAKLAND: Struck out a career-high 10 batters in his first start of the season, April 6 against Seattle, but had a no decision in a 2-1, 10-inning loss...then won each of his next three starts to give him a career-high four-game winning streak dating back to July 31, 2009...allowed a career-high 11 hits in a 4-2 loss to Texas May 3...matched that hit total May 30 at Detroit and June 9 against Los Angeles...pitched the 19th of the 20 perfect games in Major League history May 9 against Tampa Bay (including Don Larsen's in the 1956 World Series)...it was the second by an Athletic and came 42 years and one day after Catfish Hunter did it against Minnesota May 8, 1968...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the first pitcher to throw a perfect game against a team entering the day with the best record in the majors...it came in his 68th career appearance, which is third fewest among the 20 pitchers with a perfect game...was named American League Player of the Week for his effort...it was the sixth no-hitter by an Oakland Athletic, the first since Dave Stewart on June 29, 1990 against Toronto...Braden's came at the age of 26 years, 269 days, making him the second oldest pitcher to toss a no-hitter in Oakland history (Stewart was 33 years, 130 days)...it was the 11th nine-inning no-hitter in Athletics history...tossed 109 pitches, 77 for strikes...it was the first complete game of his career, snapping a career-opening streak of 52 consecutive starts without going the distance...that is an Oakland record, topping the previous mark of 51 by Todd Van Poppel from Sept. 11, 1991-Sept. 12, 1995...it was the fourth longest streak at any point in Oakland history...in fact, had tossed fewer than eight innings in each of his first 52 starts, which was the longest streak of consecutive starts of fewer than eight innings in Oakland history...in his first start following the perfect game, May 14 at Los Angeles, he retired the first two batters he faced to extend his consecutive batters retired streak to an Oakland record-tying 29 (also Hunter, May 3-8, 1968)...the streak ended on a two-out double by Abreu in the first inning but he retired 11 straight after that for a stretch where he retired 40 of 41 hitters...blanked the Angels on three hits over the first five innings to extend his scoreless streak to a career-high 16.0 innings...finished with a complete game seven-hitter, but was the losing pitcher in the A's 4-0 loss...of the 16 perfect games since 1922, only Len Barker followed with another complete game and he also lost...is the first A's pitcher to toss back-to-back complete games since Mark Mulder had three straight from May 9-21, 2004...the loss to the Angels began a five-game losing streak as he went nine starts following his complete game without a win...would not win again until July 25 against Chicago...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, the nine consecutive starts without a win following a no-hitter or perfect game is the longest streak in major league history...the previous was eight by Mark Buehrle following his perfect game in 2009...posted a 4.10 ERA and allowed a .319 opponents batting average over the nine starts but received just 12 runs of support (2.05 RSA)...left consecutive starts early May 19 against Detroit (flu-like symptoms) and May 25 at Baltimore (sprained left ankle)...both times the problems were pre-existing conditions...went 1-4 despite a 3.15 ERA in six starts in May, tying for the AL lead in losses...the Twins' Danny Valencia stole second base in the second inning June 4, the first stolen base he allowed since Aug. 20, 2008, also against Minnesota (Punto)...had gone 229.2 innings without allowing a stolen base...was placed on the 15-day disabled list July 3, retroactive to June 23, with left elbow stiffness...it was his second career stint on the DL...made one rehab start for Single-A Stockton July 15, a no decision in the Ports' 10-9 win over Visalia (4.0 ip, 7 h, 3 r, 3 er, 1 bb, 4 so)...was 4-7 with a 3.83 ERA in 15 starts before the injury, then went 7-7 with a 3.19 ERA in 15 starts after he was reinstated July 20...logged a 3-2 record and a 2.19 ERA in five starts in August, ranking eighth in AL in ERA for the month...fired his second shutout of the season Aug. 28 at Texas, a four-hitter in a 5-0 A's win...tossed a career-high 120 pitches, becoming just the second Athletic pitcher with a shutout (or complete game) at Rangers Ballpark (Brett Tomko, Sept. 14, 2009)...then went 1-5 with a 4.42 ERA in six starts in September...became just the second A's pitcher since 1999 to lose five games in one month (Joe Kennedy, Sept., 2005)...tied for the AL lead in losses (Vargas, SEA)...lost his first four starts in September, including Sept. 12 against Boston when he issued a season-high four walks...that snapped a 20-start streak with two walks or fewer from May 3 to

Sept. 7, which tied for the third longest such streak by a starting pitcher in Oakland history... finished the season by going 2-1 with a 2.25 ERA over his final three starts.

2009—Was the A's Opening Day starter and went 8-9 with a 3.89 ERA in 22 starts before a rash led to nerve damage in his left foot, ending his season in August... allowed a .268 opponents batting average, including .203 against left-handed hitters and .290 against right-handers... allowed just nine home runs in 136.2 innings, an average of 0.59 per nine innings... that was the fourth lowest mark in the American League among pitchers with 100 or more innings pitched... was 7-7 with a 3.12 ERA and .255 opponents batting average in 18 starts before the All-Star Break and had the seventh lowest ERA in the AL... then went 1-2 with a 7.40 ERA and .324 opponents batting average in four starts after the break before he was placed on the 15-day disabled list Aug. 8 retroactive to Aug. 1 with a rash on his left foot... the rash led to nerve damage and he was transferred to the 60-day DL Sept. 11... received run support of one run or less in 10 of his 22 starts... his season run support of 3.95 was fifth lowest among AL pitchers with 100 or more innings... was 1-8 in his 10 starts with run support of one run or less and 7-1 in his other 12 starts... did not allow a stolen base and his 136.2 innings pitched were the most in the majors among pitchers who did not allow a steal... had a roller coaster season with his ERA as he posted a 2.10 ERA in April, 4.86 in May, 2.51 in June and 5.54 in July... his opponents average increased to .306 with runners in scoring position... allowed a .227 average to batters leading off an inning... opponents batted .240 with three home runs in 325 at bats over his first 60 pitches in a game and .311 with six home runs in 212 at bats after that... compiled a 3.18 ERA in nine starts during the day compared to 4.39 in 13 starts at night... went 0-2 in three interleague starts despite a 2.95 ERA and .211 opponents batting average... committed three errors, which led the A's pitching staff and tied for fifth in the AL... the A's were 9-13 (.409) in his starting assignments... tossed six or more innings in 16 of his 22 starts, allowed two runs or fewer 12 times and walked two batters or fewer 17 times... was named as having the third best pickoff move in the AL in *Baseball America's* best tools survey... made his first career Opening Day start April 6 at Los Angeles and was the losing pitcher in the A's 3-0 loss... was hit on the left hand and throat by a Vernon Wells line drive in the first inning May 10 against Toronto but remained in the game and tossed 6.0 innings in a 5-0 loss... the A's were shutout in three of his first seven starts... had an eight-start stretch from May 31 to July 11 where he allowed two earned runs or less in each start... that was the longest such streak by a left-handed pitcher in Oakland history, topping the mark of seven by Vida Blue (1970-71), Dave Hamilton (1974) and Barry Zito (2001)... however, was just 3-2 over that stretch despite a 2.45 ERA and .216 opponents batting average... left with the lead in two of his no decisions only to have the bullpen blow the save... allowed one run in 7.0 innings July 1 against Detroit for his sixth win of the

season but missed his next scheduled start July 7 at Boston as he was placed on the bereavement list July 6...reinstated from the BL July 11 and allowed two runs in 6.0 innings for his seventh win...issued a career-high six walks and yielded 10 hits in 5.2 innings in a 7-5 loss at New York July 26...picked up the win in his final start July 31 against Toronto despite allowing five runs in 6.2 innings.

West, 17-15 with a 4.51 ERA (122 er in 243.2 ip) against everyone else...went 3-0 with a 2.42 ERA in four interleague starts, tying for second in the majors in wins (Buehrle, CWS 4)...compiled a 1.50 ERA and .182 opponents batting average in the first inning...was 6-2 with a 2.20 ERA in nine starts during the day, 12-6 with a 3.29 ERA in 21 starts at night...had the third lowest day ERA in the AL...yielded three grand slams, which tied for the most in the majors (Santana, NYM)...it also tied the Athletics' franchise record set by Ed Rakow in 1961...led AL pitchers with 54 assists and tied for second with 61 total chances...the assists tied for third most in Oakland history...the A's were 21-9 (.700) in his starting assignments and are 37-25 (.597) in his career...tossed at least seven innings in 15 of his 30 starts, allowed one run or fewer 15 times and walked two batters or fewer 20 times...the A's bullpen has never blown a save in his 62 career starts.

2009—Was one of two 21-year olds to spend the season in the A's starting rotation and led the Oakland pitching staff in starts (32), innings pitched (178.2) and losses (13)...was 10-13 with a 4.63 ERA...led Major League rookies in games started...ranked second among American League Rookies in innings pitched, tied for seventh in wins and ninth in strikeouts (90)...the games started fell one short of the Oakland rookie record and he is one of eight rookie 10-game winners in Oakland history...set an Oakland rookie record by allowing 27 home runs...it tied the franchise record set by Dan Pfister in 1962...his 13 losses were fourth most by an Oakland rookie...is one of four 21-year olds in Oakland history to win 10 or more games and his 32 starts were fourth most in Athletics history by a pitcher under the age of 22...fellow 21-year old Brett Anderson had 11 wins in 30 starts, making the A's the 13th team since 1900 to have two pitchers under the age of 22 win 10 or more games (last: Kansas City, 1984 with Mark

OAKLAND: Made his Major League debut Sept. 13 at Kansas City at the age of 30 years, 320 days, to become the fourth oldest player to make their ML debut in Oakland history...was the oldest Athletics pitcher to make a start in his big league debut since Steve Gerkin started the second game of a doubleheader for the Philadelphia A's against St. Louis May 13, 1945 at the age of 32 years, 175 days...was the winning pitcher against the Royals, allowing just one run on four hits and a walk while striking out four in 5.1 innings...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is just the fifth pitcher since 1950 to start and win their Major League debut at age 30 or older...the other four were all Japanese veterans (Masato Yoshiii, Hiroki Kuroda, Koji Uehara and Kenshin Kawakami) making Cramer the first American-born pitcher to start and win his debut at the age of 30 or greater since John "Jocko" Thompson did it for the 1948 Phillies at the age of 31...is the oldest pitcher in Athletics history to start and win his debut...also won his second start Sept. 19 at Minnesota to become the fourth pitcher in Oakland history to win each of the first two games of his career, along with Dave Hamilton (4 in 1972), Bill Krueger (2 in 1983) and Vin Mazzaro (2 in 2009)...lost his third start, his only home game Sept.

24 against Texas, and had a no decision in his final start Sept. 29 at Los Angeles, despite allowing just one run in 6.2 innings.

OAKLAND: Was placed on the 15-day disabled list April 3 with a fractured left pinky, an injury suffered in the third inning April 2 at San Francisco in a caught stealing at second base in a spring training game...went 5 for 6 with a home run and three RBI during a two-game rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton, May 18-19...that raised his career minor league average from .299 to .301...was reinstated from the disabled list May 21 and started two games in center field before straining his right intercostal muscle...went 2 for 3 with a double and two RBI in his first game May 21 against San Francisco and





2009—Batted .263 with 10 home runs and 61 RBI in 105 games...missed 55 games while on the disabled list from April 29 to June 27 with a strained left calf...the 105 games were his fewest since appearing in 98 games during his rookie season of 2002, but his 61 RBI were the second best total of his career...had career lows in walks (23) and on-base percentage (.305)...appeared in 105 games at second base and made five errors for a .990 fielding percentage...fell three games short of qualifying for the league leaders in fielding but he had the fourth best fielding percentage among American League second basemen with 100 or more games...batted .337 with runners in scoring position, including .423 with RISP and two outs...the mark with RISP and two outs was the best in the AL in 2009 and the best by an Oakland Athletic since 1974 (min. 50 PA)...hit .331 with two outs and .229 with less than two outs...was batting .219 in 31 games before the All-Star Break and then hit .279 in 74 games after the break...hit .219 over his first 43 games through July 27, .344 over a 42-game stretch from July 28 to Sept. 12 and .182 over his final 20 games...batted .314 with four of his 10 home runs in the ninth inning...hit .294 at night compared to .197 during the day...batted .336 with seven home runs in 30 games against AL Central teams and .233 with three home runs in 75 games against everyone else...started games in every spot in the order except first and fourth but made 93 of his 101 starts in the bottom four spots in the order...had a .344 average in 26 games batting eighth...made his fifth consecutive Opening Day start at second base April 6 at Los Angeles...was batting .206 with no home runs and nine RBI in 18 games when he was placed on the 15-day disabled list April 29 with a strained left calf...was transferred to the 60-day DL May 20...began a rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton June 15 and went 0 for 4 with a walk in two games before he was transferred to Sacramento June 18...hit .182 with a double and three RBI in eight games with the River Cats before being reinstated from the DL June 28...fashioned a 52-game errorless streak from April 18 to Aug. 17...had a season best 10-game hitting streak from July 26 to Aug. 5 (15 for 40, .375)...went 4 for 6 with a pair of doubles and four runs scored July 28 at Boston...the runs matched his career-high (June 17, 2008 at Arizona)...it was his eighth career four-hit game but he went a perfect 5 for 5 with four RBI Aug. 10 at Baltimore...tied the Oakland record for hits in a game...at the time, it was the 27th five-hit game in Oakland history and the 19th time an Oakland player

went 5 for 5...did not score a run, one of six times in Oakland history a player had five hits and no runs in a game...it was the first time in Oakland history an A's player had five hits in a game while playing the entire game at second base...was named American League Player of the Week for the first time in his career for the week ending Aug. 16 after batting .571 (12 for 21) with three doubles, a home run and 11 RBI in six games...hit his third career walk-off home run Aug. 16 against Chicago and all three have come with two outs...it was his fifth career game-ending hit, his second off Bobby Jenks (single, April 10, 2007)...batted .340 with 22 RBI in 29 games in August...the RBI were his most ever in a month and they tied for seventh most in the AL...had a career best streak of 12 games and 53 plate appearances without a strikeout from Sept. 17 to Oct. 2...hit his 77th career home run as a second baseman Sept. 19, breaking Dick Green's A's franchise record for homers by a second baseman.

2008—Led Major League second basemen in fielding for the second time in the last three years but batted a career low .233...established new career highs with 53 walks and 14 stolen bases...appeared in just 117 games...missed the final month of the season as he had surgery on his right shoulder Sept. 19...committed just four errors in 115 games at second base for a .993 fielding percentage...ranked second on the A's in stolen bases and third in home runs (12)...it was his fourth straight 10-homer season...his 14 stolen bases were the most by an A's second baseman since Lance Blankenship had 15 in 1992...batted .256 with 11 of his 12 home runs against right-handed pitching compared to .176 against left-handers...his mark against lefties was the lowest in the AL and second lowest in the majors (Schumaker, STL .168)...since 1974, the only Athletic with a lower mark against lefties is Scott Brosius, who hit .160 in 1997...hit .282 on the road compared to .189 at home...had the lowest home batting in the majors and it was second lowest in Oakland history to Mark McGwire, who hit .185 in 1991...it was the lowest home average by an AL batter since 1991 when Kevin Maas hit .178 for the Yankees...made a team leading 38 starts in the leadoff spot where he batted .224 with 26 walks for a .349 on-base percentage...homed in the first inning of the opener March 25 against Boston in Tokyo for the first Opening Day home run of his career...then went 0 for his next 18, the longest hitless streak of his career...had four hits April 9 at Toronto and also had the first two-steal game of his career...hit his first career "walk-off" home run in the 10th inning May 7 against Baltimore...was batting .242 with three home runs and 13 RBI in 39 games when he strained his left hamstring May 11 at Texas...did not go on the DL and missed nine games before returning May 23...did not commit an error in his first 58 games following the injury (through Aug. 2), equaling the second longest errorless streak of his career...hit a walk-off grand slam June 8 against Los Angeles, the fifth in Oakland history...it was his third career grand slam and his second walk-off home run...six of his 12 home runs came in the eighth inning or later and five gave the A's the lead...that game started a season best eight-game hitting streak where he batted .457 with three home runs and 10 RBI...capped the streak with his second career two-homer game June 17 at Arizona, going 3 for 4 with four RBI, a double and a career high four runs scored...that lifted his season totals to .265 with eight home runs and 28 RBI in 61 games...would go on to bat .196 with four home runs and 13 RBI over his final 56 games...was ejected from a game for the first time in his career June 22 against Florida after striking out in the seventh inning...hit .170 in July, his lowest batting average ever in a month...broke Dick Green's Oakland record of 721 games played as a second baseman Aug. 1 at Boston...led off the game with a home run Aug. 18 at Minnesota, the third leadoff home run of his career...left the game Aug. 22 at Seattle with his shoulder injury and would not start another game in 2008...pinch ran Aug. 27 at Los Angeles and struck out as a pinch hitter Aug. 30 against Minnesota...had surgery Sept. 19 but was not placed on the disabled list until he was added to the 60-day DL Sept. 21 to clear a spot for Donnie Murphy on the 40-man roster following an injury to Jack Hannahan...agreed to terms on a two-year contract through 2010 with a club option for 2011 Oct. 10.

2007—Had one of the best seasons by a second baseman in Oakland history as he batted .276 with 19 home runs and 76 RBI in 150 games...set an Athletics' franchise record for home runs by a second baseman, topping the previous mark of 16 held by Jimmy Dykes (1921) and Davey Lopes (1983)...set an Oakland record for RBI by a second baseman...tied for second among American League second baseman in home runs and was third in RBI...ranked second among AL second baseman with a .994

fielding percentage, 302 putouts and 499 assists...set Oakland records for assists and double plays (104) by a second baseman...the assists were second most in Athletics history to Jimmy Dykes' 522 with Philadelphia in 1921 and the double plays were the most since Jerry Lumpe had 105 with Kansas City in 1961...committed just five errors in 150 games at second base and set an Athletics franchise record for second basemen with a 102-game errorless streak from May 14 to Sept. 10...had 540 consecutive errorless chances during the streak...had career highs in at bats (583), runs (84), hits (161), doubles (33), home runs (19), RBI (76), hit by pitches (10) and total bases (257) and matched his high in strikeouts (94)...led the A's in at bats and total bases and tied for the team lead in games (150), runs and hit by pitches...batted .313 with 11 of his 19 home runs against left-handed pitching...tied for second in the AL in home runs against left-handers...appeared exclusively at second base where he played in 150 games...made his fourth Opening Day start at second base April 2 at Seattle...tied his career high with five RBI April 4 in Seattle...had the game-ending RBI single in the bottom of the ninth April 10 against Chicago, his second career "walk-off" hit...singled in the third inning May 4 at Tampa Bay for his 500th career hit...committed two errors on one play in the third inning May 13 against Cleveland...it was his third career two-error game, his first since May 18, 2003 at Cleveland...began his 102-game errorless streak the next day...hit his second career grand slam May 18 against San Francisco and matched his career high with five RBI...the home run was the 40th of his career as a second baseman, which broke Dick Green's Oakland record for home runs by a second baseman...became a father for the first time June 1 when his wife, Sarah, gave birth to a boy (Briggs William) and then hit .330 with five home runs, 18 RBI and 12 multiple hit games over his next 28 games from June 2 to July 2...hit for the 17th cycle in Athletics history June 4 against Boston...it was the sixth in Oakland history and the second in Coliseum history...had his first career two homer game July 23 at Los Angeles...had an 11-game hitting streak from Aug. 16 to 26 (13 for 44, .295)...had 10 hits over a three-game span from Sept. 9 to 11 to tie an Oakland record...made his first career start batting fourth Sept. 16 against Texas and was 2 for 5 with a home run and three RBI...batted .351 with 20 RBI in 24 games in September.

2005—Was one of the top comeback stories in baseball as he hit a career high .316 after missing the entire 2004 season with a torn labrum in his right shoulder...did not qualify for the league leaders but, based on a minimum of 400 plate appearances, his batting average ranked fifth in the American League and eighth in Oakland history...led the A's in batting, slugging (.477), on-base percentage (.384) and triples (5) and tied for the team lead in sacrifice hits (4)...in addition to posting career highs in batting, slugging and on-base percentage, he matched his bests in triples...appeared in just 122 games as he shared second base duties the first half of the season...started just 47 of the A's first 92 games at second

base and 62 of the final 70...earned his playing time later in the season as he hit .344 with 38 RBI and 57 runs scored in 66 games after the All-Star break...ranked third in the AL in batting after the All-Star Break and had the fifth best post-break batting average in Oakland history...hit 12 of his 13 home runs after the break...hit .316 as a second baseman which was the second best batting average among Major League second basemen...ranked third among AL second basemen with a .989 fielding percentage...also appeared in seven games (five starts) at shortstop and made his professional debut at first base (two games)...had never hit higher than .300 in one month before hitting .304 in June...followed that up by hitting .323 in July, .310 in August and .368 in September...the A's were 11-2 in games in which he homered...hit .352 during day games and .357 in nine interleague games...made his professional debut at first base May 14 against New York...went 3 for 6 Aug. 6 at Kansas City to boost his average to .300...average never dropped under .300 the rest of the way...had four three-hit games over a five-game span from Aug. 6 to 11...homered in consecutive games Aug. 24 and 25 at Detroit and three straight games from Aug. 27-29 at Baltimore, giving him five home runs and nine RBI over a six-game span...the home run on the 24th led off the game, his second career lead-off home run...had his second career four-hit game Sept. 9 at Texas...that was part of a 13-game stretch from Sept. 6 to 20 where he batted .482 with 10 multiple hit games, including five games of three or more hits...ended up batting .368 with 23 runs in 27 games in September...had the best on-base percentage in the AL in September (.446).

2004—Dislocated his right shoulder during spring training and a subsequent MRI revealed a torn labrum in his right shoulder...missed the entire season...the injury occurred March 25 in Phoenix against the Chicago Cubs when he and Bobby Crosby dived for a hit up the middle by Sammy Sosa and collided...was placed on the 15-day disabled list retroactive to March 26 and was transferred to the 60-day disabled list Sept. 3.

2003—Spent the entire season with the A's and batted .248 with nine home runs and 52 RBI in 154 games...led the A's in sacrifice hits (9)...tied for seventh in the American League in sacrifice hits and was eighth in pitches per plate appearance (4.07)...appeared in 153 games at second base which was third most in Oakland history...led Major League second basemen in total chances (793) and putouts (324)...committed 14 errors which was fourth among AL second basemen and he had the fifth best fielding percentage (.982)...seven of his home runs were solo shots, four either tied the game or put the A's ahead, and the final seven all came in Oakland...batted .217 against left handed pitching which ranked ninth lowest in the AL...hit his first career grand slam Sept. 21 against Seattle (Sasaki)...made a team leading 64 starts batting leadoff and hit .264 with a .324 on-base percentage...set an Oakland record for doubles in April with 11...hit his first career leadoff home run April 25 against Cleveland...had a 10-game hitting streak from July 24 to Aug. 2 (11 for 41, .268)...had a career high five RBI Sept. 21 against Seattle...had a 51-game, 172-at bat homerless streak from June 17 through Aug. 15...started all five games at second base against Boston in the ALDS and was 2 for 17 (.118).

2002—Had two stints with the A's and took over as Oakland's starting second baseman during his second stint...started a team leading 83 games at second base, made seven starts and third base and one start at shortstop...batted .272 in 98 games and added 44 walks for a .359 on-base percentage...was named to the Topps Major League Rookie All-Star team as the second baseman...ranked second among American League rookies in runs scored (58) and fourth in batting, on-base percentage and walks...tied for the A's team lead in triples (4) and led the club with eight sacrifice hits...tied for sixth among all AL players in sacrifice hits...his batting average improved to .324 with runners in scoring position...batted leadoff a team leading 54 times...began the season at Triple-A Sacramento but was called up by Oakland April 7 when Randy Velarde went on the disabled list...made his Major League debut April 9 at Texas as a pinch runner but did not play again until April 18 against Anaheim when he made his first ML start and professional debut at third base...singled off Ramon Ortiz in the seventh inning for his first ML hit...was optioned back to Sacramento April 26 after going 1 for 4 in four games with the A's...had a .298 batting average in 21 games with Sacramento when the A's called again June 6...spent the remainder of the season with Oakland...started 83 of the A's final 102 games at second...hit his first ML home run June 28 against San Francisco off Jay Witasick, a solo shot in the sixth inning...had an Oakland record tying two triples Aug. 3 against Detroit...started all five games of the Division Series against Minnesota at second base and batted .368 with a home run and four RBI...had three hits in Game 2 and the homer was a three-run shot in the bottom of the ninth inning of the A's 5-4 loss in Game 5.

2001—Was acquired by the A’s organization prior to the season as part of the Johnny Damon trade and spent the entire season at Triple-A Sacramento...led the River Cats in doubles (38)...his .273 batting average broke down to .269 against left-handers and .274 against right-handers...average improved to .305 with runners in scoring position and two outs...appeared in 131 of Sacramento’s 144 games at shortstop...committed 19 errors after making 31 in 2000...batted .317 in June and .311 in July...hit .158 in five playoff games for Sacramento...played for Phoenix in the Arizona Fall League and hit .308 in 30 games...added 21 walks for a .421 on-base percentage and also stole nine bases.



of 16 save chances...combined with Jason Jennings and Tom Martin on the first one-hitter in Rockies franchise history June 20 vs. Oakland...was selected to pitch for a team of MLB players touring Japan from Nov. 2-8, making two appearances...tossed a shutout ninth inning to save MLB's 8-6 win Nov. 4 in Tokyo...blew the save in his final game Nov. 8 in Fukuoka, allowing one run on three hits in 0.2 innings.

2010 HIGHLIGHTS

2008—Combined to go 10-2 with a 2.07 ERA in 25 games, all starts for Oakland and Chicago (NL)...was acquired by the Cubs in a six-player trade July 8...the 2.07 ERA was the lowest figure in any season in his professional career (majors or minors)...it was the lowest ERA of any pitcher in baseball with at least 25 starts, the lowest such figure in any year since Roger Clemens had a 1.87 mark with Houston in 2005...had the best ratio of strikeouts per nine innings (11.01) among all big league pitchers with 25 or more starts, as that figure was a career best...also posted the highest total of strikeouts (181) in his career, with his best strikeout-to-walk ratio (2.97) in any season...opponents batted just .183, the lowest single-season figure for any pitcher with 25 or more starts since Pedro Martinez had a .167 mark with Boston in 2000...had 10-or-more strikeouts in six contests, including five with the Cubs...compiled a 1.061 WHIP figure that was lowest of his career...was on disabled list from April 3 to May 10 with a right shoulder strain, making rehab appearances with Single-A Stockton and Triple-A Sacramento...went 5-0 with a 2.25 ERA in his first 12 starts with Oakland...joined Chuck Dobson in 1971 and Dick Bosman in 1976 as the only Oakland pitchers to go undefeated through their first 12 starts...following the trade, posted 10 strikeouts in each of his first three starts for the Cubs...according to Elias, he was the first pitcher since 1900 to strike out 10-or-more in each of his first three career starts for a team...had 39 strikeouts in his first four starts for the Cubs...since 1900, just three other pitchers have had that many strikeouts in their first four starts for a club: Randy Johnson (44, Arizona, 1999), Pedro Martinez (44, Boston, 1998), and Herb Score (40, Cleveland, 1955)...was unbeaten in his last 10 starts (5-0, 1.99 ERA)...was unbeaten in five of six calendar months, with his only two losses coming in July...started for the Cubs in Game 3 of the NLDS, Oct. 4 at Los Angeles, and was tagged with the 3-1 loss.

2007—Had his season interrupted by injury for the third consecutive year as two stints on the disabled list limited him to seven games, including four starts...was 1-2 with a 2.45 ERA...went 1-1 with a

1.42 ERA in three starts before going on the DL for the first time April 23 retroactive to April 16 with a strained right shoulder...was reinstated June 21 and made three relief appearances and one start...was placed back on the DL July 12 retroactive to July 8 with a strained right shoulder and missed the remainder of the season...was 1-2 with a 2.91 ERA in his four starting assignments and 0-0 with a 0.00 ERA in his three relief appearances...allowed a .202 opponents batting average, which included a .098 mark against right-handed hitters...opponents were just 1 for 14 (.071) with runners in scoring position...did not allow a run (11.0 ip) and held the opposition to a .086 batting average in four games on the road...first batters faced were 0 for 3 with two strikeouts in his three relief appearances and he did not inherit any runners...took the loss in his second start, the A's home opener on April 9 against Chicago...it marked his first loss since Aug. 9, 2005 against Los Angeles and snapped his winning streak at a career high tying six games...left his third start April 15 against New York in the seventh inning with tightness in his right shoulder...went on the disabled list and made one rehab appearance with Triple-A Sacramento before he was reinstated from the DL...was placed in the bullpen upon his return...did not allow a run or hit in three relief appearances and retired 12 of the 14 batters that he faced...made his fourth and final start of the season July 7 against Seattle, a loss in the A's 4-0 decision...left after 2.2 innings...went back on the DL and continued to rehab towards a possible late season return...was transferred to the 60-day DL on Aug. 22 and was eventually shut down for the remainder of the season in late September.

2006—Had his season interrupted by injury twice for the second consecutive year and was limited to just nine starts...was 4-0 with a 4.24 ERA in those starting assignments...had two stints on the disabled list, missing 34 games from April 27 to June 3 with a muscle strain in his back and 94 games from June 5 to Sept. 20 with a sprained ligament in his right elbow...allowed a .191 opponents batting average, which broke down to .176 against left-handed hitters and .211 against right-handers...his opponents average dropped to .179 with runners in scoring position...opponents were 6 for 44 (.136) with five walks (.224 on-base percentage) when leading off an inning...did not allow a run in the first two innings of his first start on April 4 against New York to extend his career high scoreless streak to 18.1 innings dating back to Aug. 14, 2005...left his April 26 start at Texas after 3.1 innings with a muscle strain in his back and was placed on the 15-day disabled list the next day...made one rehab start for Triple-A Sacramento and was reinstated from the DL June 4...started that day against Minnesota and had a no decision in the A's 5-1 win...was placed back on the DL June 8, retroactive to June 5, with a sprained ligament in his right elbow...the A's were 9-0 in his starting assignments and 8-11 in games started by his replacements...was reinstated from the DL for the second time Sept. 21 and went 1-0 with a 5.40 ERA over his final three starts...was the winning pitcher in the A's division clinching 12-3 victory at Seattle Sept. 26...tossed five shutout innings (2 h, 1 bb, 5 so)...made one postseason start and was the losing pitcher in the A's 3-0 loss at Detroit in Game 3 of the ALCS Oct. 13 (5.2 ip, 5 h, 3 r, 3 er, 5 bb, 4 so)...did not pitch in the ALDS against Minnesota as he was scheduled to start Game 4 in the A's three-game sweep.

July 14...tossed just 80 pitches which was the fewest by an Oakland pitcher in a nine-inning complete game since pitch counts were tracked starting in 1988...retired each of the first 22 hitters before Soriano singled with one out in the eighth...allowed a career high 12 hits in an 8-4 win over Detroit July 29...went 5-1 with a 2.77 ERA in six starts in July...those were his most wins ever in a month.

2004—Was one of the top pitchers in the American League after the All-Star Break as he went 8-2 with a 3.49 ERA and a .229 opponents batting average in 15 starts...tied for fifth in the AL in wins after the break and ranked sixth in opponents batting average and ERA...was 3-5 with a 4.52 ERA and .254 opponents batting average before the break...was 11-7 with a 3.99 ERA and .242 opponents batting average in 31 starts overall...ranked eighth in the AL in strikeouts with a team leading 167 and tied for seventh with 81 walks...allowed just 16 home runs in 189.2 innings, an average of 0.76 per nine innings which was fourth lowest in the AL...tied for second in opponents slugging (.366) and tied for the fifth in opponents batting (.242)...had a 2.65 ERA in the first four innings of a game and 6.42 after that...had 13 no decisions which tied for third most among AL starting pitchers...allowed one run or fewer in nine of his starts but was just 3-0 with six no decisions in those starts...including two no decisions in two starts when he did not allow a run...was 6-3 with a 3.02 ERA in 15 starts in Oakland and had the fourth best home ERA in the AL...ranked seventh in the AL with a 3.74 ERA during night games...his opponents batting average broke down to .227 against right-handers and .254 against left-handers...allowed a .213 opponents batting average when leading off an inning which was fourth lowest in the AL...came out of spring training as the A's fifth starter and was optioned to Triple-A Sacramento April 3 as the A's had two off days over the first eight days of the season...made one start for the River Cats and was recalled to Oakland April 15...left his start June 26 against San Francisco after just 2.1 innings with a left shoulder subluxation...was injured covering first base on a Ray Durham ground ball...began the second half of the season with a career high six-game winning streak from July 15 to Aug. 31...went 6-0 with a 2.55 ERA and .208 opponents batting average over that 10-start stretch...tossed a career high 125 pitches in 8.2 innings July 20 against Toronto and did not allow a run but ended up with a no decision in the A's 1-0 win in 14 innings...went 4-0 with a 2.97 ERA in six starts in August.

of doubles April 18 at Toronto and the first was his 200th in the majors... singled off David Huff in the fifth inning April 26 against Cleveland for his 1,000th ML hit... finished April with a .273 batting average but then hit .184 in May... had the game winning RBI single in the 10th inning of the Angels 4-3 win at Seattle May 8... it was the 1500th RBI of his career, including his time in Japan... hit his sixth Major League grand slam June 26 against Colorado... now has 12 grand slams in his professional career... batted .318 with a season best 19 RBI in the month of June but then hit .228 in July... was batting .243 through August 13... then had a season high in hits Aug. 14 against Toronto when he went 4 for 4 with three runs, a double, home run and two RBI... that began a season-ending stretch where he hit a Major League-leading .371 with seven home runs and 27 RBI... hit safely in a season high 10 consecutive games from Aug. 11 to 25... batted .486 (18 for 37) during the streak with 11 runs, six doubles, two home runs and 12 RBI... drove in a season high tying four runs Aug. 19 at Boston... finished August with a .304 batting average and then hit .344 in September.

2007—Hit .285 with 100 runs, 25 home runs and 103 RBI in 143 games...made 111 starts in left field and 32 at designated hitter...drove in 100 runs for fourth time in the majors and scored 100 runs for third time...was on the 15-day disabled list from April 8 to 22 with a strained left hamstring and missed 12 games...recorded the 2,000th hit of his professional career with a double in a May 6 win vs. Seattle... became the 46th member honored into Japanese “Golden Players Club”...award is akin to Hall of Fame for professional baseball players in Japan...drove in at least one run in six consecutive games from June 5-10, matching the longest streak of career...named American League “Player of Month” for July after leading the majors with 13 home runs, 31 runs and a .735 slugging percentage while batting .345...the runs and home runs were the most in any month of career...homered in three straight games July 21-22 for the second time in his ML career...established a career-high with five hits in a July 22 win vs. Tampa Bay...hit the 100th home run of his ML career in an Aug. 5 win against Kansas City, becoming the first Japanese-born player to reach the 100 plateau in ML history...started all four Division Series games against Cleveland at designated hitter and batted .182...underwent arthroscopic surgery to clean the inside of his right knee Nov. 14.

Hideki Matsui (pronounced “He-DECK-ee” “Mat-SOO-ee”)...married in March of 2008...nickname “Godzilla” began and grew in 1992 after making the last of four appearances in the National High School Baseball Championships for Seiryō High School...developed a fearsome and legendary reputation with a record 60 home runs...the pitchers of Meitoko High were so intimidated by Matsui that they deliberately walked him five times, a feat unheard of in high school baseball...was so good at yakyu (Japanese baseball) as a child, even playing against boys several years his senior, that he handicapped himself by batting left-handed, which he eventually adopted as his now “natural” side...is a first-degree black belt in Judo and won a city-wide sumo tournament as a youth...does not charge admission to the Hideki Matsui House of Baseball in his hometown of Neagari...acts as a foster parent for 10 kids in Vietnam...donated 50 million Yen (\$481,000) to the Japanese Red Cross Society for Asia’s tsunami victims...has donated over \$600,000 to aid victims and relief of earthquakes in Japan and surrounding areas, including the Hanshin Awaji earthquake in 1995, the Niigata Chuetsu earthquake in 2004, the Indonesia Sumatra earthquake in 2004 and the Ishikawa/Noto earthquake in 2007...worked with Japan’s Eco-Safety Drive campaign in 2008, encouraging citizens to decrease their car pollution.



Completed his fourth Major League season in 2010...has started 445 of the A's 555 (80.2%) games behind the plate since Jason Kendall was traded July 16, 2007...his 389 starts over the last three seasons are second most among ML catchers to Kendall (398)...has 465 games caught in his career, which ranks fourth in Oakland history...has led the A's in RBI in each of the last two seasons and is just the second catcher in Athletics history to lead the club in RBI...had two pinch homers in 2008 and is 7 for 15 (.467) with a double, two home runs, six RBI, two walks and a hit by pitch in his career in the pinch...made his Major League debut with 68 games in 2007...named to the Texas League All-Star team in 2006 at Midland...played for United States in the All-Star Futures Game that year at Pittsburgh...was originally drafted by the A's in the second round of the 2004 draft...is the fourth Hawaiian born player to play for the Athletics, joining Shane Komine (2006), Ron Darling (1991-95) and Lenn Sakata (1986).

2010 HIGHLIGHTS

Continued to be one of the most durable catchers in the American League, tying for second among AL backstops with 121 starts, despite missing 19 games while on the disabled list and three on the bereavement list...has started 389 games at catcher over the last three seasons, which is second most in the majors behind Jason Kendall (398)...tied with Kevin Kouzmanoff for the team lead in RBI (71) and tied for second in home runs (13)...it marked the second consecutive season he led the club in RBI, as he became the first catcher in Athletics history to lead the team in RBI more than once...the only other time an A's catcher led the team in RBI was in 1944 (Frankie Hayes)...however, the RBI were second fewest by a team leader in Oakland history (Mitchell Page, 70 in 1978)...had career-highs in triples (2) and hit by pitches (12) but posted career lows with a .242 batting average, .303 on-base percentage and .366 slugging percentage...the batting average was ninth lowest in the AL and the on-base percentage was 10th lowest...ranked fourth in the AL in plate appearances per strikeout (11.10) and tied for fifth in hit by pitches and grounded into double plays (22)...in addition to RBI, he also led the team in hit by pitches, grounded into double plays and go-ahead RBI (21)...A's pitchers had a 3.27 ERA with him behind the plate, which was the lowest mark in the AL and third lowest in the majors...they had a 4.46 ERA with the other three catchers...ranked second among AL catchers in total chances (868) and putouts (825) and was third in games (123)...committed a career-high eight errors for a .991 fielding percentage, which ranked fourth lowest among the 14 AL qualifiers behind the plate...tossed out 10-of-76 (13.2%) attempted base stealers, which was the lowest percentage in Oakland history...the previous low was 15.1% by Jason Kendall in 2005...his caught stealing percentage was third lowest in the AL...has thrown out 50-of-281 (17.8%) in his career...ranked second among AL catchers in RBI (66) and tied for third in home runs (13)...the RBI were fourth best by a catcher in Oakland history...was batting .266 with 12 home runs and 46 RBI in 76 games over the first four months of the season...then hit .207 with one home run and 25 RBI over his final 55 games since Aug. 1...now has a .281 (305-for-1087) career average through July 31, .239 (172-for-721) from Aug. 1 through the end of the season...hit .213 against left-handed pitching and .253 with 11 of his 13 home runs against right-handers...now has a .228 (108-for-474) career average against lefties, compared to .277 (369-for-1334) against righties...was just

1-for-10 (.100) with the bases loaded...hit three home runs with an 0-2 count, which tied for the most in the majors...now has six career 0-2 homers...since pitch counts were tracked in 1988, only Mark McGwire and Miguel Tejada, with seven each, have more 0-2 homers as an Athletic...batted .241 against the National League but has a .315 (57-for-181) career average in interleague play...in addition to his 121 starts at catcher, he also hit .259 in seven starts at designated hitter and was 0-for-1 as a pinch hitter...hit .222 in 59 starts batting third and .272 with nine of his 13 home runs in 48 starts hitting clean-up...also batted fifth 21 times...had a .338 average with one out and .198 with zero or two outs.

OAKLAND: Made his third straight Opening Day start at catcher, April 5 against Seattle...committed two errors, the first two-error game of his career...had his seventh career walk-off hit April 7 against Seattle, a double...it was his third walk-off double, which ties Terrence Long for the most in Oakland history...hit a three-run home run in the first inning April 22 against New York, then grounded into a triple play in the sixth inning...it was the seventh triple play turned against the A's in Oakland history, the first since Geronimo Berroa hit into one May 14, 1994 at Kansas City...was batting .254 with four home runs and 11 RBI in 17 games when was placed on the 15-day disabled list April 30, retroactive to April 24, with an intercostal strain...it was his first career stint on the DL and it marked the first time over the last three years he has gone more than two consecutive games without starting at catcher...went 3-for-8 (.375) with four runs, two doubles, a home run, five RBI and two walks in three starts at catcher on a rehab assignment with Triple-A Sacramento from May 11 to 15...was reinstated from the DL May 16 and started each of the A's first 11 games at catcher following his return, matching the longest consecutive games started streak at catcher of his career (June 6-18, 2008 and July 21-Aug. 2, 2008)...started 11 straight behind the plate again from June 21 to July 3...drove in the winning run May 18 against Seattle with a RBI single in the bottom of the 10th inning...it was his second walk-off hit of the season and eighth of his career (three singles, three doubles, two home runs)...the eight walk-off hits are tied for third most in Oakland history...had a career best streak of four consecutive multiple hit games from June 1-4 (8-for-19, .421), including June 3 at Boston when he had his first career two-homer game...matched his career-high with four hits June 8 against Los Angeles and Aug. 28 at Texas and now has five career four-hit games...was placed on the bereavement list June 11, missing the three-game series at San Francisco before returning to action June 15...started 83 of the A's final 97 games at catcher but hit just .228 following his return...batted .292 with six home runs in June...the home runs tied for seventh in the AL and were his most ever in a month...is a .311 (88-for-283) career hitter in June with 13 home runs, both of those marks his best for any month of the season...agreed to terms on a four-year contract through the 2013 season with a club option for 2014, July 23...hit .128 (10 for 78) over a 22-game stretch from July 31 to Aug. 26, including a 0-for-22 streak from Aug. 19 to 26...the hitless streak was one short of his career-high (23, May 7-14, 2008)...batted .185 in August, which tied for third lowest in the AL and was the lowest one month average of his career...his previous low was .204 in July, 2007...homed in the final game of the season, Oct. 3 at Seattle, to snap a career long 56-game homerless streak...it was his first home run since July 28 at Texas.

2009—Led American League catchers in games started for the second consecutive season (132) and continued to improve offensively...had career-highs in runs (74), hits (156), doubles (37), home runs (15), RBI (88), stolen bases (8) and slugging percentage (.421)...led the A's in hits, doubles, RBI, slugging, hit by pitches (8), sacrifice flies (7), multiple RBI games (20) and go-ahead RBI (18)...became just the second catcher in Athletics history to lead the club in RBI...the other was Frankie Hayes, who had 78 RBI for Philadelphia in 1944...the last A's catcher to lead the team in doubles was Hal Smith of the 1957 Kansas City A's (26)...led the A's in hits for the second consecutive season but his slugging percentage was the lowest ever by an Oakland team leader at the time...struck out 59 times for an average of 10.41 plate appearances per strikeout...that was the sixth best ratio in the American League...however, walked just 28 times for an average of 21.93 plate appearances per walk, which was fifth highest in the AL...also tied for ninth in the AL in sacrifice flies and reaching base on an error (8)...in addition to games started, he also led AL catchers in innings (1173.1), putouts (923) and total chances (996)...tied for the lead in games (135), ranked second in assists (68) and was fourth in fielding percentage (.995)...the total chances were second most in Oakland history to Jason Kendall's record of 1044 in 2005 and the assists and fielding percentage were fourth best...however, tossed out just 17 of 98 (17.3%) attempted base stealers...was named as the third best defensive catcher in the AL in *Baseball America's* best tools survey...led AL catchers in doubles (34), RBI (83) and stolen bases (8), ranked second in runs (71) and third in hits (144)...the doubles were an Oakland record for a catcher, topping the previous mark of 31

set by Terry Steinbach in 1991...they were the most by an Athletics catcher since Mickey Cochrane had 35 in 1932...the RBI were second best by a catcher in Oakland history and the steals tied for third best...batted .311 on the road compared to .234 in Oakland...had 10 home runs and 51 RBI in 68 games after the All-Star Break...ranked eighth in the AL in post-break RBI...combined for a .333 batting average in the eighth and ninth innings...batted .230 with six of his 15 home runs with two strikes...was 1 for 4 (.250) with two walks, a hit by pitch and two RBI as a pinch hitter...started games at every spot in the order except ninth and saw his most action with 33 games in the five spot, where he hit .299...matched his career-high with four hits April 21 at New York...drove in a run in each of his first seven games against the Yankees, matching the Oakland record for consecutive games with a RBI against New York (Jose Canseco, Aug. 24, 1988-Aug. 30, 1989)...finished April with a .343 batting average, his best single month mark in 2009...was hitting .331 with 12 doubles over his first 30 games through May 15...struck out in the first inning May 19 at Tampa Bay, snapping a streak of nine games and 41 plate appearances without a strikeout...stole a career-high two bases June 10 against Minnesota to become the fourth catcher in Oakland history to steal two bases in a game, joining Jason Kendall (three times), Mike Heath (twice) and Mickey Tettleton (once)...went back-to-back games without starting for the only time June 11 and 12...had three assists in the fifth inning June 18 at Los Angeles (NL) and all were putouts to different players (first base, second base and shortstop)...not since 1976 had a catcher recorded three assists in an inning, with the putouts going to three different positions...the last catcher to do it was Atlanta's Vic Correll, also in the fifth inning against the Dodgers, Sept. 17, 1976...had a career-high 10-game hitting streak from July 1 to 12 (16 for 42, .381)...went a career-high 26 consecutive games without a walk from July 6 to Aug. 5...lined out as a pinch hitter July 30 against Boston, snapping a career-opening 21-game hitting streak against the Red Sox (29 for 83, .349)...it was the longest hitting streak in Oakland history against Boston...committed an error Aug. 2 against Toronto, snapping a career best 84-game errorless streak dating back to April 10...it was the sixth longest errorless streak by a catcher in Oakland history...made his first career start batting cleanup Aug. 19 against New York and was 1 for 4...had the game-ending RBI single in the bottom of the ninth inning Aug. 22 against Detroit...hit .264 in September, but had 24 RBI, which tied for third in the AL.

2008—In his first full season in the majors, he led American League catchers in games (141) and games started (136) while hitting a team leading .279 for the A's...that was the lowest batting average by an A's team leader since Jeff Burroughs hit .277 in 1982...also led the A's in hits (148), hit by pitches (11) and multiple hit games (36) while tying Jack Cust for the team lead in games played (148)...became the first catcher to top the club in games since Jeff Newman in 1979 (143) and his games played were the fewest by an A's team leader since Scott Spiezio led the club with 147 games in 1997...had the fewest hits by an A's team leader in a non-strike season since Rickey Henderson in 1982 (143)...tied for seventh in the AL in hit by pitches and tied for 10th in grounded into double plays (20)...batted .241 over his first 45 games through May 24, hit .358 over a 51-game stretch from May 25 to July 28 and finished the year by compiling a .237 average over his final 52 games...hit .291 with six of his seven home runs and 37 of his 42 RBI against right-handed pitching...batted .318 at home, which was the ninth best home batting average in Oakland history...was 1 for 13 (.077) with the bases loaded, the third lowest mark in the AL...was 5 for 8 (.625) with a double, two home runs and four RBI as a pinch hitter...tied for the AL lead in pinch home runs and tied for fifth in pinch hits...his batting average was the best among AL pinch hitters with five or more plate appearances...hit .389 with two home runs and 10 RBI in 15 interleague games...in addition to leading AL catchers in games and games started, he also ranked first in innings caught (1215.0), total chances (986) and putouts (927)...his putout total was second best in Athletics history by a catcher to the record of 986 set by Jason Kendall in 2005...his innings were third best in Oakland history...tossed out 16 of 71 (22.5%) attempted base stealers...started games at every spot in the batting order except clean-up...had his first career four-hit game April 14 at Chicago...was batting .327 over his first 16 games before being inserted into the leadoff spot in the order April 18...batted leadoff in each of his next 20 starts through May 13 and hit .200 over that span...had a career long 0 for 23 streak from May 7 to 14...was 4 for 5 with two doubles, a home run and five RBI June 20 against Florida...the RBI were a career high and he matched his best in hits (second time)...became the second catcher in Oakland history with four hits and five RBI in one game (Gene Tenace, Sept. 14, 1973 vs. Texas)...three of the five RBI gave the A's the lead, including his third career walk-off RBI, a double in the 11th inning...is the first Oakland Athletic to have three go-ahead RBI in one game since the stat was tracked beginning in 1974...finished June with a .370 batting average, which ranked third best in the American League...then hit .326 in July...connected for his first career pinch hit home run July 10 against Seattle...had the game-ending pinch hit home run Aug. 15 against Chicago...it was his second career walk-off home

run...the A's were 6-1 in games in which he homered...had the game-ending pinch hit double Aug. 28 against Minnesota, his second game-ending pinch hit of the season...is just the second player in Oakland history with two game-ending pinch hits in the same season (Frank Fernandez, 1970)...it was the second game-ending pinch hit double in Oakland history (Tommy Davis, April 10, 1971 vs. Kansas City)...missed consecutive games Sept. 23 and 24 at Texas following a collision at home plate Sept. 22...it marked the first time he went back-to-back games without a start since Jason Kendall was traded July 16, 2007.

2007—Made his Major League debut with Oakland in June and spent five weeks as the back-up to Jason Kendall before starting 56 of the A's final 70 games at catcher following the trade of Kendall July 16...made 61 starts total behind the plate...since 1988, the only Oakland rookie to start more games at catcher is A.J. Hinch, who started 109 games in 1998...batted .249 with seven home runs and 39 RBI in 68 games with the A's...hit .281 against right-handed pitching and .290 with runners in scoring position...five of his seven home runs came with runners on base (three two-run, one three-run and one grand slam)...batted .288 with five of his seven home runs in the seventh inning or later...hit .333 during the day...had six home runs from the nine spot in the order, which was third most in the American League...appeared in 66 games at catcher and tossed out 7 of 36 (19.4%) attempted base stealers...hit .185 over his first 21 games through July 28, .312 over his next 28 games through Sept. 2 and .212 over his final 19 games...was selected from Triple-A Sacramento June 10 and made his Major League debut June 12 at Houston...grounded out as a pinch hitter in his first at bat in the 10th inning...collected his first ML hit June 14 at Houston, a pinch hit single off Brian Moehler in the 11th inning of the A's 6-5 win...hit his first home run in his fourth game June 19 against Cincinnati, a solo shot off Todd Coffey in the eighth inning...had a 0 for 21 streak from July 2 to 20...caught Shane Komine July 17 against Texas to become the first Hawaiian born batter in Major League history...hit his first career walk-off home run Aug. 16 against Chicago, a three-run shot off Matt Thornton with two outs in the bottom of the 10th inning in an 8-5 win...hit his first career grand slam in the second inning Sept. 10 at Seattle...closed out the A's season with a walk-off single in the bottom of the ninth inning in the A's 3-2 win over Los Angeles Sept. 30...began the year at Sacramento where he batted .280 with three home runs and 27 RBI in 55 games...hit .344 against left-handed pitching and .327 on the road...tossed out 16 of 42 (38.1%) attempted base stealers...batted .306 over his first 32 games through May 11, went 5 for 39 (.128) over his next 10 games through May 23 and then hit .333 over his final 13 games.

Baldwin HS (Wailuku, Maui, Hawaii) in 2001...majored in Kinesiology at Cal State Fullerton...won the Johnny Bench Award following the 2004 season, given annually to the nation's top collegiate catcher...was also an All-America selection by *Baseball America* and *Collegiate Baseball* and was named Big West Player of the Year after batting .413 with 16 HR and 87 RBI...led Fullerton to the College World Series championship as his two-out RBI single in the bottom of the seventh inning broke a 2-2 tie to lead the Titans to a 3-2 win over Texas in the championship game...along with his wife, raised over \$61,000 for the Jon Wilhite Recovery Fund, to help alleviate medical costs accrued by his friend and former Cal State Fullerton teammate who was injured in the tragic car accident that took the lives of Angels' pitcher Nick Adenhardt and three others in 2009...was named the co-recipient of the 2009 Dave Stewart Community Service Award which is given annually to an A's player for outstanding work in the community.

JIM "CATFISH" HUNTER AWARD


In 2004, the Oakland Athletics implemented the Jim "Catfish" Hunter Award, which is given annually to an A's player whose play on the field and conduct in the clubhouse best exemplifies the courageous, competitive and inspirational spirit demonstrated by the A's late Hall of Fame pitcher.

A native of Hertford, North Carolina, Hunter posted a 224-166 record to go along with a 3.26 ERA in his 15-year Major League career with the Kansas City/Oakland Athletics and New York Yankees. He holds Oakland's all-time career mark for wins (131) and won 20 or more games in five consecutive seasons (1971-75). In 1974, he won the American League's Cy Young Award after winning a career-high 25 games.

"Catfish" earned five World Series rings during his career and was 4-0 with one save in seven World Series appearances with the A's. An eight-time All-Star, he made his major league debut in 1965 with the Kansas City Athletics and did not miss a start until the 1977 season. He was inducted to the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1987.

"Catfish" was diagnosed with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (Lou Gehrig's Disease) in September of 1998 and died of complications from the disease on September 9, 1999 at the age of 53.

Winners of the Jim "Catfish" Hunter Award include Tim Hudson (2004), Mark Ellis (2005; 07), Jason Kendall (2006), Mike Sweeney (2008), Kurt Suzuki (2009) and Ben Sheets (2010).



2008—Began his career with a 39.0 inning scoreless streak, which set three records and tied another...it set the modern (since 1900) Major League record to start a career (previously 25.0 by George McQuillan in 1907, PHI-N), the American League record for a rookie (37.0 by Hank Thormahlen in 1918, NYY), and the Oakland record (37.0 by Mike Torrez in 1976)...it tied the modern ML record for the longest single season streak by a reliever (39.0 by Al Benton in 1949, CLE)...the streak tied Christy Mathewson (NYG, 1901) for the second longest streak by an ML rookie and fell two innings short of the record of 41.0 set by Grover Alexander (PHI-N, 1911)...it equaled the longest by an AL pitcher in the designated hitter era (since 1973), matching Kenny Rogers' 39.0 inning streak with Texas in 1995...it was the third longest in Athletics history (53.0, Jack Coombs in 1910; 43.2, Rube Waddell in 1905)...had his ERA under 1.00 until his final outing of the season and finished the year with a 1.06 ERA, which was the lowest among all ML relievers (min. 50 ip)...using the 50 inning minimum, his ERA was sixth lowest in AL history since the earned run became an official stat in 1913...it was second lowest by an Athletic to Dennis Eckersley's 0.61 in 1990...compiled a 3-0 record in 47 games and converted 11 of 13 (84.6%) save opportunities and was named to the Topps Major League All-Rookie team and the *Baseball Digest* Major League Rookie All-Star team...led ML rookies in saves...took over as closer Aug. 8 and his 11 saves thereafter tied for third most in the AL during that final seven week period...opponents grounded into 20 double plays, which tied Texas' Josh Rupe for the lead among ML relievers...those were the

most GDP by an A's reliever since the statistic was tracked beginning in 1974...topped the previous mark of 17 by Jim Todd in 1975...averaged 3.02 GDP per nine innings, which is the highest mark by any ML pitcher with 30 or more innings since 1974...allowed just two home runs in 59.2 innings for an average of 0.30 per nine innings, which ranked seventh lowest among AL relievers...struck out just 30 batters for an average of 4.53 per nine innings, which was fifth lowest among AL relievers...allowed a .236 opponents batting average, which included a .198 mark against right-handed hitters and .280 against left-handers...opponents hit .290 with the bases empty and .174 with runners on base...including .116 with runners in scoring position...first batters faced hit .250 and he allowed 5 of 22 (22.7%) inherited runners to score...did not allow a run in 41 of his 47 outings...began the season at Triple-A Sacramento and was selected by Oakland May 30...made his Major League debut the next day at Texas, allowed a RBI single to the only batter he faced (Kinsler) and then picked him off for his first ML out... according to Retrosheet, he became the 13th pitcher since 1956 to record his first ML out on a pickoff... is the second Athletic (Mike Norris April 10, 1975 against Chicago)...recorded his first ML win June 8 against Los Angeles when he tossed 1.2 scoreless innings...retired 19 consecutive batters from June 20 to July 7...tossed a career high 3.0 innings July 30 against Kansas City...recorded his first save Aug. 8 at Detroit by tossing 2.0 scoreless innings...posted a 2.55 ERA in 20 outings after taking over as closer Aug. 8...extended his scoreless streak to 39.0 innings with a scoreless eighth inning Aug. 14 against Tampa Bay but then allowed a RBI double to B.J. 





2010 REVIEW

SEASON IN REVIEW

2010 RECAP: The A's finished the 2010 season with an 81-81 record, snapping a streak of three consecutive seasons with a losing record...it was the A's best mark since winning the American League West with a mark of 93-69 in 2006...we were exactly .500 a total of 22 times after the All-Star Break and 33 times for the season, which is an Athletics record...the previous high was 23 in 1947...also played .500 ball over the final 88 games of the 2009 season, giving the A's a 125-125 record since June 29, 2009...2010 marked the second time in Oakland history the A's ended the season exactly .500 (also 1987)...finished in second place in the AL West, nine games behind Texas...that is the A's best finish over the last four years as they finished fourth in 2009 and third in 2007 and 2008...have now finished second or better in the West in nine of the last 12 seasons...the only major league teams with more first or second place finishes over that span are the Yankees (11) and Red Sox (10)...spent 25 days alone in first in 2010, eight days tied for first, 74 days in second, 12 days tied for second, 59 days in third and one day in fourth...tied for fifth in the AL Wild Card, 14 games behind New York...spent 33 of the first 60 days of the season with at least a share of first place in the AL West...moved into first after the third game of the season and remained there every day through May 1, despite posting a 13-12 record...peaked at 9-4 on April 17 and had a season best 2½ game lead...spent most of May in second place, falling as far back as four games on May 21, before a four-game winning streak from May 26 to 29 moved the A's back into first with a 27-23 record...were 29-26 following the conclusion of play June 3 and were tied for first with Texas...that would be the A's last day in first place in 2010 as they went 5-14 over a 19-game stretch from June 4 to 24 while Texas went 16-3...that put the A's a season high 11 games out of first entering play June 25...Oakland then went 43-35 from June 25-Sept. 23 while the Rangers went 40-40...were never closer than seven games nor farther back than 10 games over that stretch...a win in the first game of a four-game series with Texas Sept. 23 gave the A's a 77-75 record and put them seven games behind the Rangers with 10 games remaining...then lost a season-high six consecutive games before finishing the season with a four-game winning streak...were officially eliminated from the West in game 154 after being eliminated from the Wild Card in game 147.

PITCHING: The A's compiled a 3.56 ERA, which was the lowest mark in the American League and fourth lowest in the majors...it was also the lowest ERA by an A's team since 1990 (3.18) and it was third best by an AL team over the last 18 years (Toronto, 3.49 in 2008 and Seattle, 3.54 in 2001)...also led the AL in shutouts (17) and opponents slugging percentage (.379) and ranked second in opponents batting average (.245) and opponents on-base percentage (.313)...the 17 shutouts were third best by an A's team in the designated hitter era and were the most since the 2002 club had 19...topped the majors with 27 pickoffs...allowed the fewest doubles (232) and extra base hits (402) in the AL and the second fewest triples (17)...the triples were the fewest in Oakland history...had the second fewest wild pitches (42) and hit batters (38) in the AL...had 1431.2 innings pitched, which were third fewest in Oakland history in a non-strike season and the fewest since 1984 (1430.0)...the A's now have a 3.97 ERA since 2000, which is the best mark by an AL team over that span and third lowest in the majors behind the Braves (3.90) and Dodgers (3.92).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers were 64-58 with a Major League-leading 3.47 ERA...that was the lowest ERA by an American League team since Boston had a 3.32 ERA in 1990 and the lowest by an A's team since 1989 (3.34)...it was more than a run lower than 2009's mark of 4.76 and it marked the first time the A's led the majors in ERA since 1974 (2.98)...also had the lowest opponents slugging percentage in the majors in 2010 (.373)...led the AL in opponents batting average (.243), ranked second in opponents on-base percentage (.307) and issued the fourth fewest walks (327)...Trevor Cahill led the A's with 18 wins and Gio Gonzalez had 15, marking just the third time in Oakland history the A's had two players under the age of 25 win at least 15 games (Mark Mulder and Barry Zito did it in 2001 and 2002)...it is just the 17th time in the post-World War II ERA a Major League team has done it...Gonzalez (33), Cahill (30), Anderson (19) and Mazzaro (18) combined to start 100 of the A's 162 games, making the A's the first AL team since the 1977 Milwaukee Brewers to have four starting pitchers under the age of 25 make at least 18 starts each...A's starters also led the AL in fewest extra base hits (270), doubles (158) and wild pitches (20) and tied for the lead with three complete game shutouts.

THE BULLPEN: The A's bullpen compiled a 3.75 ERA, which ranked sixth in the American League... converted 38 of 51 (74.5%) save opportunities, which was third best in the AL... the 13 blown saves tied for the fewest in the AL, but the save opportunities were third fewest and the saves tied for fourth fewest... also ranked fourth in the AL in opponents batting average (.248), fifth in on-base percentage (.325) and eighth in slugging percentage (.394)... held first batters faced to a .214 batting average, which was the third lowest mark in the AL... it was the lowest average by an A's team since 1989 (.199)... allowed 27.1% of inherited runners to score, which was fourth lowest in the AL... compiled a 17-23 (.425) record, which was the second lowest winning percentage in the AL and fourth lowest in Oakland history... it was the lowest by an A's team since 1986 (15-29, .341).

OFFENSE: The A's ranked ninth in the American League with a .256 batting average and .324 on-base percentage but their .378 slugging percentage was second lowest as was their .241 average with runners in scoring position... the average with RISP was the lowest by an A's team since 1997 (.239)... had the fourth fewest runs scored in the AL with 663, marking just the second time in the last 28 years the A's scored fewer than 700 runs in a non-strike season (had 646 in 2008)... averaged 4.09 runs per game, which was the seventh lowest figure in Oakland history... had 30 triples, which were the most by an A's team since 1987 (33)... that ranked sixth in the AL, which was the highest finish by an A's team since 1981 (5th)... placed fourth in the AL with 43 sacrifice hits, which were the A's most in a season since 1998 (58)... had 527 walks for the second consecutive season, which is the A's fewest in a non-strike season since 1985 (508)... were walked just 16 times intentionally, matching the 2009 A's for second fewest by a Major League team since the intentional walk became an official statistic in 1955... the only team with fewer than 16 is the 1961 Kansas City A's (10)... had the second fewest extra base hits in the AL with 415, which was the fewest by an A's team in a non-strike season since 1992 (385)... led the AL in reaching base on an error (60).

ON THE BASES: The A's stole 156 bases, which ranked third in the American League and the majors... it was the ninth best single season total in Oakland history and the most since the 1989 club had 157... were caught stealing just 38 times for a success rate of 80.4%... that led the AL and ranked second in the majors (PHI, 83.7%)... it was the second best mark in Oakland history (80.7% in 2008)... led the majors with 32 steals of third base... Rajai Davis (50), Coco Crisp (32) and Cliff Pennington (29) combined for 111 of the A's 156 stolen bases... those are the most steals by three Oakland teammates since 1983 when Rickey Henderson (108), Mike Davis (32) and Bill Almon (26) combined for 166... had two players with 30 or more steals for the first time since 1995 (Henderson and Javier) and three with 20 or more for the first time since 1992 (Henderson, Wilson and Blankenship)... had 18 different players steal a base, matching the 1998 club for most in Oakland history... had a 57-30 record when stealing at least one base and were 24-51 in games when they did not steal a base.

THE LONG BALL: The A's hit 109 home runs, which was second fewest in the American League (Seattle, 101) and third fewest in the majors (Houston, 108)... it was the fourth lowest total in Oakland history in a non-strike season and the fewest since the 1979 club hit 108... Kevin Kouzmanoff led the A's with 16 home runs and that was the fewest by a team leader in Oakland history... the previous low was 17 by Mitchell Page in 1978 and Dwayne Murphy and Davey Lopes in 1983... the last time the A's team leader finished with 16 or fewer home runs was in 1967 in Kansas City when Rick Monday led the club with 14... the A's number three hitters combined for a major league low seven home runs, which were the fewest in Oakland history.

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's ranked fifth in the American League with a .984 fielding percentage, which was the sixth best mark in Oakland history... had the fifth fewest errors in the AL (99) but the errors led to the fourth most unearned runs (60)... this marked the sixth time in the last seven years the A's committed fewer than 100 errors... had a 52-35 record when going errorless and a 29-46 mark when making one or more errors.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's compiled a 47-34 (.580) record in Oakland compared to 34-47 (.420) on the road... had their best home mark since 2006 but posted a losing record on the road for the fourth consecutive season... the pitching staff had a 3.02 ERA at home compared to 4.13 on the road... led the American League in ERA at home and ranked third on the road... had the lowest home ERA by an AL team since 1992 (Milwaukee, 2.74)... allowed just 62 home runs at home, which was the fewest in the AL, and 91 on the road, which tied for second most... hit .261 at home and .252 on the road... ranked

ninth in the AL in batting at home and eighth on the road...tripled 19 times at home to set a Coliseum record for triples in a season, breaking the previous mark of 18 in 1979...homered just 46 times at home, matching the 1979 club for second fewest in Oakland history (had 38 in 1968)...scored just 309 runs on the road for an average of 3.81 per game, which is fourth lowest in Oakland history and the lowest since the 1978 A's averaged 3.06 runs per game on the road...won 18 home series, lost six and split two compared to 10 road series wins and 16 losses.

NIGHT AND DAY: The A's posted a 35-21 (.625) record during day games compared to 46-60 (.434) at night...had the second best day winning percentage in the majors behind the White Sox (31-18, .633) but the fourth lowest mark at night in the American League...compiled a Major League-leading 3.03 ERA during the day and had a 3.84 ERA at night, which was third best in the AL...the A's day ERA was the lowest by an AL team since Minnesota in 1992 (2.89) and it ranked fifth lowest in Oakland history... hit .248 during the day and .260 at night.

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's used the disabled list 23 times, which was the second highest total in Oakland history to the record of 25 in 2008...the 23 players combined to miss an Oakland record 1397 games, an average of 60.7 per games per stint...the previous mark for games missed was 1259 in 2007... have now used the DL 87 times since the start of the 2007 season, which is second most in the majors over that span to Texas (98)...had at least five players on the DL all year and at least nine every day from July 1 through the end of the season...the season high was 11 from July 21-29, August 12-15 and August 20-21...have not had fewer than three players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season when they had one...three players missed the entire season (Devine, Meloan and Outman) and four players had two stints on the DL (Anderson, Crisp, Duchschere and Jackson).

PLAYERS USED: The A's used 49 players in 2010, which was second most in the American League (Boston, 53) and tied for fourth most in the majors...those were the A's fewest players over the last four years but it tied for the fourth most players used in a season in Oakland history...have now used 129 different players over the last four years, ranging from Jack Cust (533 games) to Kevin Melillo, Eric Munson and Chad Reineke (one game each)...set an Oakland record by using 14 different left fielders, breaking the previous mark of 13 set in 1993 and 2007...used 16 outfielders total, which is second most in Oakland history to the record of 18 in 2007.

CLOSE CALLS: The A's went 4-7 (.364) in extra inning games, which was the third worst record in the American League...the 11 games tied with Toronto for the fewest in the AL...are now 7-17 (.292) in extra inning games over the last two seasons...were 23-20 (.535) in one-run games, which ranked fifth in the AL, but were 13-21 (.382) in two-run decisions, which was third worst...have finished with a winning record in one-run games in 11 of the last 12 seasons...were 19-21 in games decided in the seventh inning or later, including 11-14 in games decided in the last at-bat...ranked last in the majors in last at-bat wins for the second consecutive season...were last in the AL in comeback wins (24)...had six walk-off wins...overcame a deficit of three or more runs seven times and were 4-3 in those games...the biggest deficit overcome to win was four runs July 20 against Boston...blew a lead of three or more runs 10 times and were 2-8 in those games...the largest lead in a loss was four runs June 1 at Boston.

BEFORE AND AFTER THE BREAK: The A's went into the All-Star Break with a 43-46 record, the second consecutive season they had a losing record at the break (were 37-49 in 2009)...it marked the first time the A's have gone into the break with a losing record in back-to-back seasons since 1996-99 when it happened in four consecutive seasons...then went 38-35 after the break, marking the first time the A's finished over .500 after the break since 2006 (48-26)...led the majors with 91 stolen bases after the break...those were the most post-break steals by an American League team since 1993 (Toronto, 93) and the most by an A's team since 1983 (126).

MONTH BY MONTH: The A's finished the month of April with a 12-12 record...it marked the third time in the last six years Oakland finished April with exactly a .500 record (12-12 in 2005 and 2006)...the bullpen had just three save opportunities, their fewest in any month of 12 or more games since April, 1981 when they had just one...went 16-12 (.571) in May, just the second time in the last six seasons the A's finished May with a winning record...posted a 10-17 (.370) record in June, which was the third worst record in the American League (Baltimore and Toronto, 9-17)...it was the A's worst record in June since going 7-22 (.241) in 1986...walked just 67 times, which were the A's fewest walks in a month of 12 or more games since they had 60 in July, 1987...went 14-10 (.583) in July after going 29-49 (.372) in the month over the previous three seasons...finished August with a 13-15 record, their third consecutive losing August...led the majors in ERA (2.83) and opponents batting (.221) in August but were last in the AL in batting (.231), home runs (15) and slugging (.342)...the slugging percentage was the A's lowest in a month of 20 or more games since June of 1982 (.322)...also went 13-15 in September...led the majors with 36 steals in September, which were the A's most in a month since May of 1992 (39) and their most in September since 1980 (41).

IN THE PINCH: A's pinch hitters batted .236 (21 for 89) with three home runs, 18 RBI and 14 walks...tied for second in the American League in home runs and RBI, tied for third in walks and ranked fourth in batting...the batting average was the best by an A's team since 1999 (.270) and the home runs equal the A's combined total over the previous five seasons...Oakland is now batting .199 (196 for 983) in the pinch since 2000, which is the second lowest mark in the AL over that span (Baltimore, .193)...however, have 160 RBI, which is third most.

DESIGNATED HITTERS: A's designated hitters batted .246 with 15 home runs and 74 RBI...ranked eighth in the American League in RBI, 10th in batting and had the second fewest home runs...led the AL with 172 strikeouts, which set an Oakland record for designated hitters, breaking the mark of 170 established in 2009...those are the most strikeouts by an AL team since Texas had 178 in 1988...also ranked third in the AL in walks (75), sixth in on-base percentage (.338) and 11th in slugging (.386).

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: The A's went 8-10 (.444) in interleague play, their second consecutive season with a losing record against the National League (went 5-13 in 2009)...it was just the fourth time in 14 seasons of interleague play the A's finished with a losing record...are now 70-74 (.486) against the NL since 2003 but are 136-112 (.548) all-time, which is tied for the sixth best record in the majors...ranked fourth in the majors in 2010 with a 3.34 ERA in interleague and were 11th with a .267 batting average...hit just eight home runs, which tied for second fewest in the majors and was second fewest in Oakland history (6 in 2006).

WINS AND LOSSES: The A's had a 43-54 record against teams that were at or above .500 when the A's played them and were 38-27 against teams that were below .500...were 68-17 when scoring four or more runs in a game and 13-64 when scoring fewer than four...posted their best record against Baltimore (7-3) and have not had a losing season against the Orioles since 1998...had their worst mark against New York (1-9) and the .100 winning percentage equaled the Athletics worst ever against the Yankees (went 2-18 in 1919)...it was their worst against any American League team since going 1-11 against Los Angeles in 1997...had a 30-27 record against the AL West, marking the first time the A's finished with a winning record against divisional foes since 2006...compiled a 73-1 record when leading after eight innings, which was the second best mark in the AL (Tampa Bay, 81-1) and fourth best in Oakland history...had a 63-27 record when scoring first and were 18-54 when the opposition scored first...were 37-16 when the starting pitcher tossed seven or more innings and 44-65 in other games...combined for a 30-22 record on Saturday and Sunday and were 51-59 during the week...were 24-28 in the first game of a series and 29-23 in the last game.

ATTENDANCE: The A's drew 1,418,391 fans in 2010, which was second fewest in the Major Leagues ahead of Cleveland (1,394,812)...it was an increase of 9,608 over their total from 2009, ending a streak of six consecutive seasons with a decrease in attendance...averaged 17,511 per game and were one of four teams to average fewer than 20,000 (Cleveland, Florida, Pittsburgh)...had two sellouts, both against San Francisco...drew 2,407,313 on the road, which was fourth best in the American League.

HOW THE A'S WERE BUILT

DESIGNATED HITTER RULE

A hitter may be designated to bat for the pitcher in any spot in the batting order in any game without affecting the status of the pitcher. The designated hitter must be selected and be included on the lineup cards presented to the umpire-in-chief prior to the game. Failure to do so precludes the use of a designated hitter for that game.

The designated hitter is "locked" into the batting order but may be removed for a pinch-hitter or pinch-runner, who in turn becomes the designated hitter. The designated hitter, while still in the game, may be used defensively but the pitcher then assumes the batting order of the replaced defensive player, thus terminating the designated hitter role. The designated hitter is eligible for all American League batting titles.

A pitcher is credited with a save when he meets all three of the following conditions:

1. He is the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club, and
2. He is not the winning pitcher, and
3. He qualifies under one of the following conditions:
 - a. He enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitches for at least one inning, or
 - b. He enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, at bat, or on deck (that is, the potential tying run is either on base or is one of the first two batsmen he faces), or
 - c. He pitches effectively for at least three innings



NINTH INNING COMEBACKS

The A's won the game when Eddie Guardado walked Nick Swisher with the bases loaded, scoring Jay Payton with the winning run. Prior to this contest, the last time the A's rallied from a deficit of four or more runs in their last at bat to win a game was on July 4, 1957 in the first game of a doubleheader against the Chicago White Sox. The A's trailed 4-0 heading into their last at bat, only to rally for five runs to pull out a 5-4 victory. Gus Zernial's single to left off Dixie Howell scored Hector Lopez and Joe DeMaestri with the tying and winning runs.





A control pitcher with a sneaky fastball, Catfish Hunter enjoyed a 15-year major league career with the Kansas City/Oakland Athletics and the New York Yankees...posted a 224-166 career record with a 3.26 ERA before arm trouble ended his career at the age of 33...holds Oakland's all-time career mark for wins (131)...won 20 or more games five consecutive seasons (1971-75), including his Cy Young Award-winning season of 1974 when he won a career-high 25 games... won five World Series rings, three with the A's and two with the Yankees...was 4-0 with one save in seven World Series appearances with the A's...signed a free agent contract with the Yankees in 1975 and helped New York to three straight pennants (1976-78)...was an eight-time All-Star...pitched a perfect game on May 8, 1968 against the Minnesota Twins...made his major league debut in 1965 with the Kansas City Athletics and did not miss a start until 1977...a good hitting pitcher, he batted .350 (36-for-103) in 1971 and had a .226 lifetime average with six home runs... nicknamed "Catfish" for effect by A's owner Charles O. Finley...soft-spoken and humble with a dose of country charm, he was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1987.



Almost as famous for his handlebar mustache as his pitching, Rollie Fingers is one of the greatest relief pitchers in major league history...in his 17-year career spent with Oakland (1968-76), San Diego (1977-80) and Milwaukee (1981-85), the seven-time All-Star chalked up 341 saves to go along with a 114-118 career mark...made his ML debut in 1968 and began the 1969, '70 and '71 seasons as a starter, but finished all three seasons in the bullpen...became a full-time reliever in 1972, winning 11 games in relief and saving 21 to help Oakland to its first World Series appearance...saved 22 games and posted a 1.92 ERA in 1973...earned a win and two saves in the '74 World Series against the Los Angeles Dodgers...in 1975, pitched the final two innings of a four-pitcher no-hitter as he, Vida Blue, Glenn Abbott and Paul Lindblad combined to blank the California Angels, 5-0...signed a free agent contract with San Diego following the 1976 season and promptly led the National League in appearances (78) and saves (35)...posted a career high 37 saves for the Padres in 1978...returned to the American League in 1981 after being traded to Milwaukee and led the AL in saves with 28 to go along with a 1.04 ERA as the Brewers made their first-ever postseason appearance... captured both the Cy Young and Most Valuable Player Awards in 1981 after figuring in 55 percent of the Brewers victories...retired following the 1985 season... inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1992.



Was originally selected by the Kansas City Athletics in the first round of the 1966 June Draft and played for 21 seasons in the Major Leagues, including nine seasons in Oakland (1968-75; 1987)...was a .262 career hitter with 563 home runs and 1702 RBI...named American League Most Valuable Player in 1973...appeared in 12 All-Star Games, 11 League Championship Series and five World Series..."Mr. October" played in five World Series (27 games) and was a part of four world championship clubs...earned World Series MVP honors in 1973 with Oakland and again in 1977 with New York...belted three home runs in Game Six of the 1977 World Series, all on the first pitch...once said, "Some people call October a time of pressure. I call it a time of character"...stole 228 bases in his career...finished among the AL Top 10 in home runs 13 times and led the circuit on four occasions...had 16 seasons of at least 20 home runs which ties an AL record...had six seasons of 100 or more RBI...when his number was retired on May 22, 2004, he ranked second on Oakland's career charts in home runs (268), double (230) and extra base hits (521)...became the eighth player to have his number retired by at least two teams and third to have two different numbers retired...inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1993.






Dennis Eckersley blazed a unique path to the Hall of Fame that most likely will never be repeated, beginning his career as a highly-touted starting pitcher before transforming into arguably the best closer the game has ever seen...from 1988 to 1992, Eck averaged 44 saves a season and helped the A's to four American League West crowns, three AL pennants and a World Series title in 1989...had 15 career postseason saves, including four when he was named 1988 ALCS MVP against Boston...was a six-time All-Star, including four times with Oakland (1988, 90-92)...earned both the American League Cy Young and Most Valuable Player Awards in 1992 after recording a league leading, career high and Oakland record 51 saves in 54 opportunities...finished his Oakland career as the Athletics career leader in saves (320)...tossed a no-hitter against California on May 30, 1977 as a member of the Cleveland Indians...ended his 24-year major league career with a record of 197-171 to go along with 390 saves and a 3.50 ERA...inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2004...had his number retired by the Oakland Athletics on August 13, 2005.

Rickey Henderson is one of the greatest leadoff hitters in baseball history...when his 25-year career concluded following the 2003 season, he was Major League Baseball's all-time leader in runs (2295), stolen bases (1406) and walks (2190)...he also banged out 3,055 hits, 297 home runs and 1,115 RBI with a .401 on-base percentage...he also hit 81 home runs leading off a game, still a ML mark...Henderson made his ML debut with Oakland in 1979 and had four stints with the A's (1979-84, 89-93, 94-95, 98)...he also played for both New York teams, San Diego, Boston, Los Angeles, Anaheim, Seattle and Toronto...Henderson was a 10-time All-Star and was named 1990 American League Most Valuable Player after batting .325 with 28 home runs, 61 RBI, 119 runs scored, 97 walks and 65 stolen bases...he set the ML single season stolen base record with 130 in 1982 and led the league in steals 12 times...inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2009...had his number retired by the Oakland Athletics on August 1, 2009...at the time, he was Oakland's all-time leader in games (1704), at bats (6140), runs (1270), hits (1768), doubles (289), triples (41), walks (1227) and stolen bases (867).


One of the most beloved owners in the history of the Athletics organization, Walter A. Haas, Jr. purchased the A's from Charles O. Finley in 1980, saving the team from potentially moving out of the area...during his 15-year ownership period, the A's won one World Championship (1989) and captured three consecutive American League pennants (1988-90)...team broke franchise attendance records each of those seasons, attracting a record 2.9 million fans to the Coliseum in 1990...long considered one of the top business and civic leaders in the United States, Haas headed some of the finest corporations in the country, including Levi Strauss, Bank of America, United Air Lines and the Pacific Telephone Company...former A's slugger Mark McGwire once described Haas as "the nicest man who has ever been put on this earth"...the A's paid tribute to his ownership reign on September 17, 1995 on Haas Family Tribute Day, when an honorary jersey was retired...Haas passed away on September 20, 1995.

Jackie Robinson burst onto the scene in 1947, breaking baseball's color barrier and bringing the Negro leagues' electrifying style of play to the majors...quickly became baseball's top drawing card and a symbol of hope to millions of Americans...led the Dodgers to six pennants in his 10 seasons...dominated games on the base paths, stealing home 19 times while riling opposing pitchers with his daring baserunning style...was named National League MVP in 1949, leading the loop in hitting (.342) and steals (37), while knocking in 124 runs...passed away on October 24, 1972 in Stamford, Conn...was named to Major League Baseball's All-Century Team...number 42 was retired by every Major League team in 1997.

THE CHAMPIONSHIP YEARS

1910: Finished with a 102-48 record and outdistanced the New York Highlanders by 14.5 games in the American League standings... defeated the Chicago Cubs in five games to win the first of five World Championships in Philadelphia...102 wins set a new American League record...opened the season in Washington in a game attended by President William Howard Taft, who honored the game by throwing out the first ball, setting a precedent which was followed by each of his successors until the Senators left Washington following the 1971 season...the pitching staff, headlined by Jack Coombs, Chief Bender, Cy Morgan and Eddie

Plank, finished with a 1.79 ERA... Coombs emerged as the ace of the pitching staff and finished with a 31-9 record and a 1.30 ERA, including 13 shutouts...compiled a 46-inning scoreless streak during the season...the infield of Stuffie McInnis, Eddie Collins, Jack Barry, and Frank Baker would become known as the "\$100,000 Infield"...won the first three games of the World Series before the Cubs took game four, 4-3 in 10 innings...Coombs won his third game of the series in Game 5, out pitching Mordecai Brown to lift the A's to their first world title.

1911: Dominated the American League for the second straight season, finishing with a 101-50 record...defeated the New York Giants in six games to capture a second straight world championship...offense was paced by Eddie Collins, Frank Baker, John "Stuffie" McInnis, Eddie Murphy and Bris Lord...Baker captured the American League home run title with 11 round trippers, earning him the nickname "Home Run" Baker...clinched the pennant on Sept. 26 with an 11-5 win over Detroit at Shibe Park, as Baker hit two doubles and two home runs...faced the New York Giants in the World Series in a rematch of the 1905 Fall Classic, won by the Giants...Christy Mathewson and Chief Bender square-off in Game 1, just as they did in the 1905 Series finale...a run-scoring double by New York's Josh Devore in the seventh inning breaks a 1-1 tie as the Giants capture the first game...the A's won Game Two, 3-1, behind the pitching of Eddie Plank and a home run by Baker...A's took a 2-1 lead in the series by winning Game Three, 3-2 in 11 innings at the Polo Grounds...after heavy rains forced postponement of the series for a week, the A's captured Game Four at Shibe Park, 4-2, as Bender outdueled Mathewson...the Giants staved off elimination by winning Game Five at the Polo Grounds, 4-3 in 10 innings...the A's routed the Giants, 13-2 in Game Six to capture their second straight World Series title.

1913: The Athletics post a 96-57 regular season record and outdistanced Washington by six and a half games to reclaim the American League pennant...defeated the New York Giants in five games to capture its third World Series title in four years...moved into first place in April and stayed atop the AL standings the rest of the way...Jack Coombs, three years removed from a 31-win season, missed the entire campaign with typhoid fever...Chief Bender (21-10), Eddie Plank (18-10), Boardwalk Brown (17-11), Byron "Duke" Houck (14-6) and rookie "Bullet" Joe Bush (14-6) anchored the pitching staff...the "\$100,000 Infield" turned in another solid season...Frank Baker hit .336

to go along with an American League-best 12 home runs and 117 RBI... Stuffey McInnis hit .324 with 90 RBI, Collins finished with a .345 average while Barry batted .275...the Athletics and Giants split the first two games of the series before the A's win Games Three, Four and Five to capture their third World Series title.

1929: Behind a high-powered offense that featured six .300 hitters and the league's best pitching staff paced by Lefty Grove and George Earnshaw, the A's finish with a 104-46 record and capture the American League pennant by 18 games over the New York Yankees...defeat the Chicago Cubs in five games to win their fourth

World Series title...the championship is the culmination of a long journey back to the top of the baseball world for Connie Mack's club...after winning the 1914 pennant, the A's spent the next seven seasons in the AL cellar before finishing seventh in 1922...A's finished sixth in 1923, fifth in '24, second in '25, third in '26 and second in '27 and '28 before winning the pennant in 1929...Al Simmons leads the American League with 157 RBI and finishes second with a .365 batting average...Jimmie Foxx hits .354 with 33 home runs while catcher Mickey Cochrane finishes with a .331 average...Bing Miller (.335), Jimmy Dykes (.327) and Mule Haas (.313) also top the .300 mark for the season... Earnshaw (24-8, 3.29) and Grove (20-6, 2.81) combine for 44 wins.

1930: After posting a 102-52 regular season record, the Athletics successfully defend their World Championship by defeating a hard-nosed St. Louis Cardinal team in six games...offensively, Al Simmons leads the AL with a .381 average to go along with 36 home runs...Jimmie Foxx hits .335 and his 37 home runs rank tied for third in the league behind Babe Ruth (49) and Lou Gehrig (41)...Mickey Cochrane finishes the year with a .357 average...Lefty Grove posts a 28-5 record to go along with a 2.54 ERA while George Earnshaw finishes with a 22-13 record and a 4.44 ERA...the 1931 Athletics won a franchise record 107 games, but were denied a third straight championship after losing to the St. Louis Cardinals in a seven-game World Series...after finishing second in 1932 and third in 1933, the A's would average 92 losses a season for the next 21 years before relocating to Kansas City for the 1955 season.

1972: The Swingin' A's finished with a 93-62 regular season record and held off the Chicago White Sox to capture a second straight American League West title...defeated the Detroit Tigers in five games in the American League Championship Series to advance to the World Series, where they defeated the heavily-favored Cincinnati Reds in seven games...the pitching staff, led by Jim "Catfish" Hunter (21-7), Ken Holtzman (19-11), John "Blue Moon" Odom (15-6) and closer Rollie Fingers (11-9, 21 saves), finished second in the American League with a 2.58

ERA...a contract dispute forced Vida Blue, who won both the AL Cy Young Award and league MVP honors a year before, to miss spring training and he did not make his first start until May 28th...led by Mike Epstein (26) and Reggie Jackson (25), the A's led the American League with 134 home runs...Jackson tore a hamstring muscle in the fifth game of the ALCS vs. Detroit and was sidelined for the World Series...Gene Tenace, who hit just .225 with five home runs during the regular season, hits a then-Fall Classic record four home runs to go along with a .348 average to earn World Series MVP honors.

1973: The A's claim their third straight AL West title with a 94-68 record and dispatch the Baltimore Orioles to win a hard-fought five-game ALCS...defeat the New York Mets in seven games to capture a second straight World Championship... Reggie Jackson leads the American League in home runs (32) and RBI (117) and hits .293 to earn AL MVP honors...after hitting just .143 against Baltimore in the ALCS, Jackson earns World Series MVP honors after hitting .310 with three doubles, a triple and a home run against the Mets... third baseman Sal Bando hits .287 with 29 home runs and 98 RBI while playing all 162 games at third base... All-Star shortstop Campy Campaneris

reaches the 150-hit plateau for the second consecutive season and for the sixth time in 10 years...hit .333 vs. Baltimore and set then-ALCS records for total bases (14) and stolen bases (3) and ties an ALCS record with two home runs...hit .290 with six runs, three stolen bases, a triple and home run vs. the Mets in the World Series... Dick Green bounces back from an injury-plagued 1972 campaign to set a then-Oakland record for highest fielding percentage by a second baseman (.988)...Bill North, acquired in a trade with the Cubs in the off-season, emerges as the A's everyday center fielder, but a late season ankle injury forces him to miss both the ALCS and World Series... catcher Ray Fosse is acquired from Cleveland during spring training and establishes career highs in games played (143), at bats (492), doubles (23) and triples (2)...pitching staff is paced by 20-game winners Catfish Hunter (21-5), Ken Holtzman (21-13) and Vida Blue (20-9)...Hunter posts his third straight 21-win season despite missing a month of the season with an injury...strung together 13-straight victories from June 2 to September 5... Hunter posted two wins over Baltimore in the ALCS, including a 3-0 shutout in Game 5...he kept his perfect record perfect in World Series play, winning Game 6 against the Mets...Holtzman wins seven games in the month of May and finishes with four shutouts among his 16 complete games...after a slow start, Blue wins 11 of his last 13 decisions down the stretch to notch his second 20-win season in just his third full Major League season...Blue tossed a team-high four shutouts during the season...Manager Dick Williams resigns shortly after the season after failing to come to terms on a new contract.

1974: Under new manager Alvin Dark, the A's defeat the Los Angeles Dodgers to claim their third straight World Series...finish the regular season with a 90-72 record and win their fourth straight AL West title by five games over Texas...defeat the Baltimore Orioles in a four-game ALCS to set up the first ever All-California World Series against the Dodgers...Catfish Hunter captures the American League Cy Young Award after winning a career high 25 games to go along with a 2.49 ERA... Rollie Fingers makes a career high 76 appearances to set a then-Oakland record...he was named World Series MVP after chalking up a win, two saves and a 1.93 ERA in four appearances...Fingers earned the win in Game One as he worked 4.1 innings

in relief of Ken Holtzman...Campy Campaneris hits a career high .290 and steals over 30 bases for the 10th straight season...Campy batted .353 in five World Series games against the Dodgers...Joe Rudi led the AL in doubles (39) and total bases (287) while finishing third in RBI (99), fourth in slugging (.484) and fifth in hits (174)...Sal Bando finishes second in the American League with 103 RBI... he hit game winning home runs in the second and third games of the ALCS vs. Baltimore...Reggie Jackson starts the season by batting .399 with 15 home runs and 42 RBI over the first 50 games...he made his fifth All-Star Game appearance in six years and amassed over 3.5 million votes in the fan balloting, nearly 800,000 more than runner up Hank Aaron...after a blazing start, Jackson hits just .239 with 14 home runs and 51 RBI over the final 104 games of the season...Claudell Washington made the jump from Double A to appear in 73 games and is named to Topps Rookie All-Star Team...

1989: The A's posted a regular season mark of 99-63 and finished seven games ahead of Kansas City in the American League West Division...defeated Toronto in five games to win a second straight American League pennant...swept the San Francisco Giants in the “Battle of the Bay” World Series, which will always be remembered for the devastating earthquake that struck on Oct. 17 at 5:04 pm, just minutes before the first pitch of Game 3 at Candlestick Park... for the second straight season, won more regular season games than any team in the Majors...never led the AL West by more than 4.5 games until the final week and never were more than three games out of the division lead... were an injury-plagued team for the first four months of the season as 11 different players spent time on the disabled list, including Jose Canseco, Mark McGwire, Storm Davis, Walt Weiss, Dennis Eckersley and Bob Welch...pitching staff posted the lowest ERA in the American League (3.09) for the second straight season...tossed a Major League-best 20 shutouts on the year...starting pitchers Dave Stewart (21-9), Mike Moore (19-11), Storm Davis (19-7) and Bob Welch (17-8)—combined for a 76-35 record with a 3.25 ERA...Stewart became the first pitcher to string together three 20-win seasons since Hall of Famer Jim Palmer accomplished the feat from 1975-78...became just the second player in Oakland history to reel off three straight 20-win seasons since Catfish Hunter won 20 or more games during a four year stretch from 1971-74...was 4-0 in four postseason starts and earned World Series MVP honors...third

baseman Carney Lansford set an Oakland single-season record with a .336 batting average, which was the second best mark in the AL...offense received a tremendous boost when the team reacquired Oakland native Rickey Henderson in a trade with the New York Yankees on June 20th... Henderson hit .294 and reached base safely in 80 of the 85 games he played with Oakland down the stretch...tied Wade Boggs for the AL lead in runs scored (113) and topped the loop with a career high 126 walks...was named ALCS MVP after hitting .400 with 15 total bases, eight runs scored, five RBI and seven walks in five games vs. the Blue Jays...hit a combined .441 in nine postseason games... Dave Parker topped the team with 97

McGwire ranked third in the AL with 33 home runs and ranked 10th in RBI (95)...Mike Gallego, who was thrust into the starting shortstop's role with Weiss sidelined for 65 games with an injury, finished the season with career highs in virtually every offensive category, including average (.252), runs (45), hits (90) home runs (3) and RBI (30)...Canseco, who won AL MVP honors the year before, missed the first 88 games of the season due to a stress fracture of the hook of the hamate bone in his left hand...despite missing the first half of the season, still managed to finish third on the team in homers (17) and fourth in RBI (57)...hit a tremendous home run in Game 4 of the ALCS off Mike Flanagan, a blast that carried into the fifth deck in Toronto's SkyDome.





GREG SPARKS

Minor League Roving Hitting Instructor

Greg Sparks enters his eighth season as the organization's minor league roving hitting instructor. He previously served as a manager in the A's minor league system for six years, compiling a 359-352-1 record during that span. Sparks managed at Midland in 2003, Single-A Modesto from 2000-02 and Single-A Southern Oregon of the Northwest League from 1998-99. He earned co-manager of the year honors in 1999 while with Southern Oregon. Sparks joined the A's organization as a coach at Single-A Visalia in 1997.

Originally a fifth-round January draft pick of the San Diego Padres in 1984 out of Mesa Community College, Sparks' playing career spanned 12 seasons and took him to 16 different cities in nine Major League organizations. He also played for an independent team and the Mexico City Tigers. He was in the San Diego farm system for three seasons before signing with the A's organization as a free agent prior to the 1987 campaign. His only two stops at the Triple-A level came in 1991 and 1992, when he played 55 games for Buffalo and 23 games for Toledo, respectively. Sparks concluded his playing career in 1995 in the Atlanta farm system.

GIL PATTERSON

Minor League Roving Pitching Instructor

Gil Patterson returns for his fifth season as the A's minor league roving pitching instructor. Patterson previously served as the pitching coach for the Yankees affiliate in the Gulf Coast Rookie League for two seasons and served as the pitching coach for Triple-A Columbus in 2005. Patterson joined the Toronto Blue Jays in 2001 as the bullpen coach and served as their pitching coach from 2002-04. He spent the previous four seasons with the Arizona Diamondbacks as their minor league pitching coordinator.

Patterson originally joined the Oakland organization in 1991, coaching in the Arizona Rookie League in Scottsdale. He coached for the A's Single-A affiliate in Madison from 1992-93, Single-A West Michigan in 1994 and the Rookie League Scottsdale A's in 1995 before serving as the roving minor league pitching instructor in 1996. He began his coaching career in Triple-A Columbus and Single-A Oneonta with the New York Yankees organization in 1984.

Patterson was the Yankees first selection of the secondary phase of the 1975 June draft. He made his professional debut in 1975 with Single-A Oneonta, leading the New York-Penn League in strikeouts (97). Patterson tossed a no-hitter on June 28, 1976 with Double-A West Haven before being promoted to Triple-A Syracuse. He opened the 1977 season in Syracuse before making his Major League debut with the Yankees at age 21. He appeared in 10 games (six starts) with the eventual World Series champions in 1977 while posting a 1-2 record and 5.45 ERA. Patterson suffered a torn rotator cuff and spent considerable time on the disabled list in 1978 and 1979. He pitched in the Yankees minor league system in 1980-81 and the San Francisco Giants organization in 1982 before having career-ending "Tommy John" surgery following spring training in 1983. In total, Patterson underwent eight operations during his career.

Patterson makes his offseason home in Odessa, Fla. with his wife, Jan. The couple has four children — Brandy, Raquel, Kyle and G.T.



JUAN NAVARRETE

Minor League Roving Infield Instructor

Juan Navarrete enters his eighth season as the A's minor league roving infield instructor after serving two years as the organization's minor league roving hitting instructor. Navarrete spent the previous seven seasons as a minor league manager and compiled a 390-338 record during that span. In his first two seasons as a manager for the A's Arizona Rookie League team (1995-97), he earned manager and co-manager of the year honors after guiding the team to first- and second-place finishes, respectively. Navarrete was promoted to Single-A Modesto in 1998 and took over the managerial duties at Single-A Visalia in 1999, where he guided the Oaks to playoff appearances in two of his three seasons.

A former infielder, Navarrete's playing career spanned 21 years (1970-90). He spent the majority of his career with the Saltillo Saraperos of the Mexican League as a player (1970-71; 78-82) and as a player-manager (1983-85). Navarrete was an eight-time all-star and a member of Saltillo's 1980 championship squad. He also played six seasons in the Montreal organization (1972-77). Navarrete spent his winters in the Mexican-Pacific Winter League (1972-90) and is among the all-time leaders in various statistical categories. In 1998, Navarrete was inducted into the Mexican Baseball Hall of Fame.

Navarrete makes his home in Saltillo, Mexico with his wife, Maria, and two daughters, Airam and Ana.



RON PLAZA

Minor League Roving Instructor

Ron Plaza begins his 29th season as the A's minor league roving instructor. He joined the Oakland organization in 1983 after 14 years in the Cincinnati Reds organization. Plaza was the Reds minor league roving instructor from 1970-77 before serving on the Major League coaching staff for six seasons (1978-83). He managed on various levels in the Cardinals chain from 1963-68, and was named Florida State League manager of the year in 1967. In 1969, he worked as a base coach for the Seattle Pilots.

A former infielder, Plaza played in the St. Louis Cardinals minor league system for 12 seasons (1951-62), including six years on the Triple-A level.

Plaza makes his offseason home in St. Petersburg, Fla.

Darren Bush enters his first season as manager at Sacramento, having managed Midland the past two years. 
SCOTT EMERSON

He was named manager at Single-A Stockton in 2005 and guided the Ports to a 78-62 record and playoff appearance. Steverson returned to Stockton in 2006, then spent one year at Double-A Midland in 2007 before moving to Triple-A Sacramento. His River Cats compiled an 83-61 record and won their second consecutive Triple-A and Pacific Coast League championships in 2008. Steverson began his coaching career in the St. Louis Cardinals farm system and spent five seasons with Potomac (1999; 2001-02), Peoria (2000) and Palm Beach (2003), all Single-A affiliates.

Steverson played professionally for seven seasons, including two seasons in the Major Leagues with Detroit (1995) and San Diego (1996). He compiled a .256 batting average, two home runs and six RBI in 31 games, including 30 with the Tigers and one with the Padres. Steverson was drafted by St. Louis in the sixth round out of Culver City (CA) High School in 1989, but did not sign and attended Arizona State University. Three years later, he was a first-round pick (25th overall) of Toronto and spent three seasons in the Blue Jays farm system before he was selected by Detroit in the Rule 5 draft. He concluded his playing career at Triple-A Memphis in 1998.

Steverson makes his offseason home in Phoenix, Ariz., with his wife Theresa, daughter Joya and son Jaryn.


STEVE SCARSONE

CRAIG LEFFERTS

Pitching Coach

Former Major League pitcher Craig Lefferts enters his ninth season as a pitching coach in Oakland's minor league system, his first with Stockton. He previously spent seven seasons with Vancouver (2004-2010) and one season with Midland (2003). Additionally, Lefferts served in the same capacity at Double-A Tennessee (2000-02) and Medicine Hat (1999) in the Toronto Blue Jays system.

In his 12-year Major League career, Lefferts compiled a 58-72 record with a 3.43 ERA, which included stints with the Cubs, Padres, Giants, Orioles, Rangers and Angels. A ninth-round selection by the Cubs in 1980, Lefferts made his major league debut with Chicago in 1983. In 1984, Lefferts posted a career-best 2.13 ERA for the National League West Division champion Padres and tossed 10 scoreless innings in six postseason appearances. He was the winning pitcher in the final two NLCS games against Chicago and earned the save in the Padres only World Series victory against Detroit.

In 1987, Lefferts made 44 appearances for San Francisco, including three scoreless outings in the NLCS against St. Louis. In 1989, he matched Gary Lavelle's team record for saves by a left-handed pitcher with 20 and appeared in five postseason games, making two appearances in the NLCS versus Chicago and three against the A's in the World Series. After recording 23 saves in 1991, he was converted to a starter in 1992 and finished with a 13-9 record to go along with a 3.69 ERA in 27 starts for the Padres. Lefferts retired after making 30 appearances for the California Angels during the 1994 season.

Lefferts and his wife, Wendy, reside in Anthem, Ariz. with their five children, Brock, Brady, Taylor, Tanner and Lindsay.



BRIAN MCARN

Hitting Coach

Brian McArn enters his first season as hitting coach at Stockton after serving in the same capacity for the last six seasons at Sacramento. He was also the hitting coach for Midland in 2004, and spent the previous six years with Single-A Modesto of the California League.

Prior to joining the A's organization, McArn spent one season as the hitting coach for the Single-A Vermont Expos in the New York-Penn League. McArn began his coaching career at American River Junior College in Sacramento, where he served as an assistant coach.




CASEY MYERS

OAKLAND'S 20-GAME WINNING STREAK

During the 2002 season, the Oakland Athletics set an American League record by winning 20 consecutive games from August 13 to September 4. It was the third longest winning streak in the Major Leagues since 1900 and was the longest in 67 years. The streak broke the previous American League record of 19 set by the 1906 Chicago White Sox (Aug. 2 to 23) and matched by the 1947 New York Yankees (June 29 to July 17). The streak also bettered the previous Athletics franchise record of 17 set in 1931 (May 5 to 25) as well as the previous Oakland record of 14 set in 1988 (April 23 to May 9). The A's outscored the opposition 141-65 during the streak and trailed in just 10 of the 180 innings. Here's a game-by-game look at Oakland's American League-record 20-game winning streak.


MARCUS JENSEN

Manager

Marcus Jensen begins his third season as manager of the Arizona A's after spending two years as the hitting coach.

Jensen, a former catcher, was drafted by San Francisco in the 33rd round of the 1990 June draft. He spent the first six years of his career playing at various levels in the Giants minor league system before making his Major League debut on April 14, 1996. Ariel Prieto enters his third season as pitching coach of the Arizona A's.

A former A's first round draft selection (5th pick overall) in the June 1995 draft, Prieto spent five seasons with Oakland (1995-2000) and one campaign with Tampa Bay (2001). He was the A's Opening Night starter in 1997, recording a career-high 22 starts and team-best six wins that season. The right-handed pitcher spent stints on the disabled list each season before undergoing multiple surgeries in 1998 and missing all of the 1999 season due to injury. He compiled a 15-24 record and 4.85 ERA in 70 career appearances, 60 starts. From 2003-05, Prieto played in the minor leagues. He was with a winter league team in Mexico in 2006.

Prieto is a graduate of Fajardo University in the Isle of Pines, Cuba. He was a member of the Cuban National team from 1990-94, where he set the national team record for strikeouts in one game when he fanned 20 at Nicaragua in 1990.

Hitting Coach

Juan Dilone is in his second stint (third season) as hitting coach for the Arizona A's. He also held the position in 2004 before spending four seasons as coordinator of Dominican instruction. He previously served as hitting coach at Visalia (2002) and Vancouver (2003).

Dilone signed a free agent contract with Oakland in 1990 and spent six seasons (1991-94; 96-97) in the A's farm system. A former infielder, Dilone spent his final two seasons at Single-A Modesto, where he batted a career-best .265 with 14 home runs in 1996.

A native of Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic, Dilone makes his offseason home in Higuey, Dominican Republic.

OAKLAND-ALAMEDA COUNTY COLISEUM



The Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum plays host to concerts, conventions and other large gatherings in addition to serving as the home for the Oakland Athletics and Oakland Raiders.

The A's have used the facility to their advantage over the years, posting the fifth best home record (579-393, .596) in the Major Leagues over the last 12 seasons. In 2003, the A's set an Oakland record for home wins as they finished with a 57-24 (.704) record in the Coliseum, marking the most home wins in franchise history since 1931 when the Philadelphia Athletics went 60-15 at home. In addition, two of the A's World Championships have been clinched on the Coliseum's turf. The Coliseum's exceptional sight lines, fine weather and sizable staging areas have all contributed to its popularity among performers, promoters and the Bay Area public.

The facility is conveniently located adjacent to I-880 with two exits (Hegenberger Road/66th Avenue) leading directly to the complex. Along with the Oracle Arena, which is located adjacently, it is the only major entertainment facility with a dedicated stop on the Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) system. The Oakland International Airport is less than a two-mile drive from the Coliseum with shuttle service to several local hotels and restaurants.

In October of 1995, the Coliseum began a one-year, \$120 renovation project that added 22,000 new seats, 90 luxury suites, two private clubs and two state-of-the-art scoreboards.

The first crowd filled the Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum on Sept. 8, 1966, when the AFL's Oakland Raiders played the Kansas City Chiefs. The adjacent arena celebrated its grand opening on Nov. 9, 1966, when the Oakland Seals met the San Diego Gulls in hockey. In the ensuing 44 years, the facility has hosted every conceivable event in the entertainment industry. Audiences numbering nearly 100 million have made the Coliseum and Arena the premier entertainment facilities in Northern California.


The Coliseum is currently one of only two stadiums in the country that houses both a MLB and NFL team, the others being Sun Life Stadium in Miami, Fla. (Marlins and Dolphins).

ATHLETICS BIGGEST COMEBACK

On July 20, 2009, the A's set an Oakland record by overcoming an eight-run deficit to win. Trailing Minnesota 12-2 entering the bottom of the third inning, the A's scored three times in the third, twice in the fourth and seven times in the seventh to win 14-13. The all-time Athletics record is also the Major League record, set by the Philadelphia A's on June 15, 1925 against Cleveland. The A's trailed by 12 runs in that game and scored 13 times in the bottom of the eighth to win 17-15.

MEDIA INFORMATION AND POLICIES

WORKING PRESS CREDENTIALS: Credentials will be issued only to legitimate media. Season credentials will be issued to those news agencies that cover the Athletics on a daily basis. Requests for daily credentials must be made by the affiliation's editor, producer or director on official company letterhead 24 hours in advance of the game. All credentials are non-transferable. All members of the media must be on assignment. No freelance journalists will be credentialed. Please submit all credential requests to Debbie Gallas, media services manager.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Photo passes will be issued to photographers on assignment from legitimate news gathering organizations and representatives licensed by Major League Baseball. The Oakland A's will not issue credentials to freelance photographers. Priority in all photo areas will be granted to news organizations on deadline and those holding season credentials. All photographs taken are to be used for news-gathering purposes or officially licensed products. Any other use of photographs will be considered a violation of existing trademark and copyright restrictions.

ON-LINE CREDENTIALING POLICY: Media credentials for on-line media services will be granted only to those agencies licensed by Major League Baseball (MLBAM, News Digital Media and ESPN Internet Ventures) to provide "real-time" accounts and descriptions of A's home games; or to those on-line services that are part of a national newsgathering agency; reach a broad audience; produces original content; has an established record of producing original content; and employ full-time journalists. This policy is encouraged by Major League Baseball and allows the Oakland Athletics to maintain quality control in the press box and clubhouses.

ROVING CAMERAS: Television cameras are prohibited from roving in the stands at all times. For the comfort of fans, interviews are to be conducted on the concourse and not in the stands while the game is in progress.

PRESS WILL CALL: Starting two-and-a-half hours before game time, credentials may be picked up at Press Will Call located on the Plaza Level between the Stadium and the Arena. Prior to that, credentials may be picked at the Ticket Services Office located in the Coliseum across the plaza from the A's executive offices.

CLUBHOUSES: The Athletics clubhouse is located on the third base side and the visitors' is located on the first base side. Access can be obtained by taking the press elevator to the first floor or through the door on the right near the end of the hall after you enter through the North Press Gate. Only credentialed media with clubhouse access will be admitted. TV cameras and photographers are not allowed in the clubhouse prior to the game and only TV cameras are permitted in the clubhouse following the game (no still photographers). The A's clubhouse is open to the media three and one-half hours prior to the game and then will close during the A's posted batting practice time. The clubhouse will then reopen at the conclusion of batting practice and will close one hour prior to game time. The clubhouse will open no earlier than five minutes or no later than 10 minutes following the game. At times, certain additional restrictions may be imposed. **Please do not lounge in the clubhouse at any time.** The break area, the trainer's room and the umpire's dressing room are off limits to the media. If a comment or interpretation from the umpire crew chief is needed, a pool reporter may be assigned.

FIELD ACCESS: Only credentialed media with field access will be allowed onto the field. All media must clear the field immediately following batting practice. Only newspaper and magazine photographers will be allowed on the field level during the game.

POST-GAME PROCEDURES: Manager Bob Geren will be available to the media in the media interview room immediately after the conclusion of the game. Please ask any questions of the manager related to the game during this post-game session. Following Geren, the A's PR staff will bring the team's starting pitcher into the interview room followed by any star players in a victory. Also, please be respectful of those members of the media who are on deadline when directing questions to the manager and players. **Once again, please do not lounge in the clubhouse or attempt to conduct full-length interviews after a game.**

LIVE TRANSMISSIONS: Non-rightsholders are permitted to transmit live reports from Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum prior to and after every game. Live television shots by non-rightsholders are prohibited while the rightsholder is on the air and the game is in progress. Radio stations and assigned correspondents for out-of-town reports are allowed to give inning or half-inning updates. Reports must be confined to between-innings only, limited to 60 seconds in length, and limited to six per game. A violation of these Major League Baseball guidelines may result in the revocation of credentials.

Media Information and Policies, continued

CELLULAR PHONES: The use of cellular phones for radio interviews is prohibited on the field or in the clubhouse. All phone interviews must be arranged through the Athletics Public Relations Department.

FLIP CAMS: No flip cams are allowed in the A's clubhouse.

SCOUTS: Major League scouts are not allowed to scout from the press box during the game. However, scouts are welcomed in the press box prior to first pitch to pick up game information.

PRESS BOX: The press box and all broadcast positions are located on the loge level. Access is by the press elevator only. The first base side of the press box is reserved for print media while the third base side is reserved for electronic media. The press box is a working area. Cheering and loud conversation will not be permitted. The Oakland A's prohibit any person under the age of 18 from entering the press box on game days without prior approval from the A's public relations department. **Guests are not allowed in the press box without prior approval from the A's Public Relations Department.**

PRESS LOUNGE: The press lounge is located behind Section 117 (level one from the press elevator). It opens two hours prior to the game and closes at game time. The charge is \$10.00 and meal tickets are available for purchase in the lounge. Media members must be properly credentialed for admittance into the dining room.

PUBLIC RELATIONS OFFICE: The Oakland Athletics Public Relations Office is located within the team's executive offices on the east side of the Coliseum Arena. The offices are located directly across the plaza from the Ticket Services Office.

PRESS BOX SERVICES: Game notes, statistics, starting lineups and other pertinent news releases from both teams are available on the first base side of the press box for working press and scouts only. Post-game notes and the game's box score will be available shortly after the conclusion of the game. Information guides for all clubs are available upon request from a member of the A's public relations staff in the press box.

AUTOGRAPH POLICY: Credentialed members of the media are prohibited from requesting autographs or equipment on the playing field, in the dugout or in the clubhouses. Any violation of this policy will result in immediate revocation of the credential and bar future use.

TELEPHONES, WIFI SERVICE: Phone lines in the main press box may be ordered by calling Doug Tsang of AT&T at (510) 334-4175. Additionally, complimentary WiFi service is available in the press box.

TICKETS: All requests for media complimentary tickets must be made to Debbie Gallas at least 48 hours prior to game time. When available, tickets may be picked up at Press Will Call. There is a limit of two tickets per game.

KEN KORACH

Radio Play-by-Play

The 2011 season marks Ken Korach's 20th year in the American League, his 16th season with the A's, and his sixth as the team's lead radio announcer.

In the long history of the A's in Oakland, only the legendary Bill King has spent more years doing radio play-by-play for the team.

Korach began his baseball career in 1981, when he worked the first of two seasons with the Redwood Pioneers of the California League. He also spent five full seasons broadcasting in the Pacific Coast League, in 1986-87 for Phoenix and 1989-1991 for Las Vegas.

Korach was hired by the Chicago White Sox in 1992 and he spent four years with the Sox, working mostly weekend games.


Korach began his broadcasting career at KTOB Radio in Petaluma in 1980, and he was hired as a sports anchor and voice of San Jose State football by KCBS Radio in San Francisco in 1985. He spent 22 seasons broadcasting college basketball and 14 seasons of college football for Sonoma State University, San Jose State and UNLV, where he spent 12 seasons as the voice of the Runnin' Rebels on radio and television.

Korach was inducted into the Nevada Broadcasters Hall of Fame in 2003, was the 2001 Nevada Sportscaster of the Year, and his 1986 KCBS broadcast of the San Jose State-Fresno State football game was voted the top play-by-play performance that year for California and Nevada by the Associated Press Radio and Television Association.

Korach's national work includes broadcasting selected major league games for ESPN Radio in 2009, and several bowl games, including the Peach and Senior Bowls. Ken made his acting debut last year, playing himself in the Moneyball movie, which is scheduled for release in September 2011.

Korach's charitable work includes the establishment of Ken Korach's A's Winning for the Community, which raised over \$50,000 for the high school baseball programs in Oakland, including Ken's personal donation of \$15,000. Korach was honored with a proclamation by the Oakland School Board in 2009, and he currently serves on the advisory board for the Oakland Tech High School Field of Dreams.

Ken is a graduate of UC Santa Barbara and lives in Henderson, Nev. in the off-season with his daughter, Emilee, and wife Denise, the director of baseball administration for the Las Vegas 51s of the PCL.



VINCE COTRONEO

Radio Play-by-Play

Vince Cotroneo begins his sixth season in the A's radio booth, where he again will work with broadcast partners Ken Korach and Ray Fosse in continuing the team's tradition of broadcasting excellence.

Prior to joining the A's, Cotroneo spent six seasons (1998-2003) as an announcer on the Texas Rangers broadcasts, where he partnered with Eric Nadel on the Rangers Radio Network. He also worked a handful of games on the television side during the 2002 season. Cotroneo joined the Rangers broadcast team in 1998 after spending seven seasons (1990-96) with the Houston Astros.

A 22-year broadcasting veteran, Cotroneo began his career with the Single-A Lynchburg Mets in 1984. He spent the next three seasons with the Double-A El Paso Diablos in the Milwaukee system before moving onto the Triple-A Iowa Cubs for the 1988 season. In his only season with Iowa, he was selected as the National Association's Minor League Announcer of the Year. Cotroneo joined the Astros organization the following season and was the radio voice of the Tucson Toros for two seasons (1989-90) before landing his first Major League job with the Astros in 1991.

A 1983 graduate of the University of Central Florida, Cotroneo and his wife, Veronica, have three children, Dominic, Olivia and Sophia.



RAY FOSSE

Radio and Television Analyst

Ray Fosse, former two-time major league all-star catcher and Emmy Award-winning broadcaster, celebrates his 26th consecutive season on radio and his 23rd season in the television booth as the A's game analyst.

Fosse, a 12-year major league veteran, played for the Cleveland Indians, Oakland A's, Seattle Mariners and Milwaukee Brewers, compiling a .256 batting average with 61 home runs. A native of Marion, Ill., Fosse attended Southern Illinois University, and was Cleveland's No. 1 draft pick in 1965. He made his major league debut with the Tribe in 1967 and spent the next six seasons in Cleveland. Fosse enjoyed his most productive season in 1970 when he batted .307 with a career-high 18 home runs and 61 RBI. He was named the American League All-Star catcher, received the Rawlings Gold Glove as the best defensive catcher in the American League, and was voted Co-Man of the Year with Sam McDowell that season.

In 1971, Fosse was named starting catcher for the American League All-Star Team and received his second Rawlings Gold Glove. He was traded to the Oakland A's in 1973, and played for the 1973 and 1974 World Champions in Oakland. In 2002, Fosse was voted one of the 100 greatest players in Cleveland Indians' history.

Ray and his wife, Carol, were married April 4, 1970, and reside in California and Arizona, where they are active in several charitable organizations. They have two daughters, Nikki and Lindsey, and one grandson, Matthew.



GLEN KUIPER

Television Play-by-Play

Glen Kuiper begins his eighth season in the A's television booth as the club's lead play-by-play voice.

He has also handled sideline reporting duties for select National Football League games on Fox. Kuiper has won seven Northern California Emmy Awards for his coverage of Bay Area Sports teams.

Glen is the youngest brother in a talented broadcasting family. His oldest brother, Duane, is a long-time member of the San Francisco Giants announcing team while older brother, Jeff, produces the Giants Comcast SportsNet Bay Area telecasts.

Kuiper graduated from San Francisco State University with a bachelor's degree in broadcasting. He also attended the University of New Orleans and spent three years in the minor leagues. A native of Racine, Wis., Kuiper resides in Danville, Calif. with his wife, Amanda and two children, Jack and Annette.

A'S TELEVISION AND RADIO

COMCAST SPORTSNET CALIFORNIA: The Oakland Athletics entered into a long-term agreement with Comcast SportsNet California in 2009. Under the new contract, over 145 A's games are televised exclusively on the Northern California cable outlet with Glen Kuiper and Ray Fosse calling the action. For the first time in club history, the A's began airing all games in High Definition, beginning in 2010. CSNCA will also produce a pre- and post-game show for every telecast.

XTRA SPORTS 860 AM: The Oakland Athletics and XTRA Sports 860 AM are in the second year of a 10-year contract for the station to serve as flagship of the A's Radio Network. XTRA Sports 860 AM, a San Francisco-based station featuring a daily talk format, will broadcast all 162 regular season games, plus 17 Spring Training games. The 50,000-watt signal will provide a clear and consistent broadcast throughout the Bay Area and Northern California.

The Oakland Athletics organization, in conjunction with the A's Community Fund, strives to make a positive impact in the Bay Area and Northern California. A's players, coaches, and front office employees, together with fans and sponsors, are committed to meeting the social, cultural and educational demands in the community. The A's host numerous fundraising events, implement several educational programs and support various organizations that reach out to people of diverse backgrounds throughout the community.

OAKLAND A'S COMMUNITY FUND: The Oakland A's Community Fund supports more than 1,500 charitable organizations through monetary contributions and donated auction items in its efforts to support charitable organizations in improving the quality of life for people throughout the Bay Area. The Fund supports endeavors to improve educational programs, aid the underprivileged, assist in crime and drug prevention, promote health awareness, and champion children and senior welfare. The A's Community Fund believes in the need to invest in the community's future by donating approximately \$600,000 annually to various community programs.

A'S BREAST CANCER AWARENESS DAY:

The A's host a Breast Cancer Awareness Day each year to raise funds for breast cancer education and research. Funds are raised through commemorative pins and caps, an A's autographed quilt raffle and sponsor support. Pre-game ceremonies include the formation of a symbolic human pink ribbon on the field by over 500 Bay Area survivors, the release of white doves as a symbol of hope and a presentation of the "Gift of Faith" grant, which donates \$5,000 annually to a local breast cancer charity in memory of the late longtime KTVU news reporter, Faith Fancher.

Over the past 12 years, the A's have raised over \$1 million for breast cancer education and research.



MUG ROOT BEER FLOAT DAY:

Each year the A's and Pepsi host MUG Root Beer Float Day to raise funds for the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation. Proceeds are raised through the sale of root beer floats, tips given to "celebrity scoopers," the sale of autographed mugs and a silent auction of sports memorabilia. Since 2003, the A's have raised over \$300,000 for the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation through MUG Root Beer Float Day.


Oakland A's In The Community, continued

HOME RUN READERS PROGRAM: The A's Home Run Readers program encourages teachers to establish reading goals for their students based on each child's individual reading level. As incentives, A's players, coaches, mascot Stomper and A's staff visit participating schools to congratulate the students and to encourage them to continue reading, both inside and outside of the classroom. Students who participate in the program attend the game on Home Run Readers Day as guests of the A's.

"MATHLETICS" PROGRAM: The "Mathletics" program is a unique program designed to stress the importance of students utilizing math in their daily lives. The A's design and distribute workbooks to participating schools which use simple formulas for calculating statistics of A's players. Students who complete their workbooks correctly and submit the answer sheet to the A's receive two ticket vouchers. In addition, one school that demonstrates outstanding participation in the program receives a visit from an A's player. The "Mathletics" program is sponsored by Ross Dress For Less and Comcast SportsNet California.

GREEN STAMPEDE HOMEWORK CLUB: Before select A's home games, volunteers from local public schools offer tutoring for at-risk students at the Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum. Students who attend the study group are rewarded with tickets to that night's game and if they attend all eight sessions they receive a visit from an A's player.

WELLS FARGO SCHOOL SUPPLY DONATION AND EDUCATOR FUND PROGRAM: This program collects school supplies at every A's Friday home game at A's Guest Relations behind Section 119 to benefit local schools in need. Fans who donate a new school supply, worth \$5 or more, receive a two-for-one Field Level ticket voucher for a future A's game. At the end of the season, collected supplies will be donated to various schools in the East Bay and the children may receive a visit by the A's mascot Stomper. In addition, throughout the season the A's will honor local teachers for their dedication to education in a special on-field pre-game ceremony and Wells Fargo will provide additional funding to those schools.



TAKE THE FIELD WITH THE A'S: Prior to select home games, members of local baseball and softball teams accompany A's players as they take the field, stand with them during the National Anthem and receive an autographed baseball.

LITTLE LEAGUE DAYS: Members of organized youth baseball programs are offered discounted group ticket prices to attend one of the two designated Little League Days with the A's. Little Leaguers (age 14 and under) attend a pre-game festival and participate in the on-field parade that honors youth baseball. A's Little League Days are sponsored by Chevy.

A'S DINNER ON THE DIAMOND: This annual dinner with A's players and their families is hosted by A's Owner and Managing Partner Lew Wolff and his daughter Kari Wolff with proceeds benefitting the Oakland A's Community Fund and a designated local charity. The A's Dinner on the Diamond is sponsored by the Wolff and Fisher families.

A'S AMIGOS: The A's Amigos program gives Hispanic children the opportunity to hear an A's player speak about the importance of education, sportsmanship and hard work. In addition to a pre-game visit, each child receives a game ticket and an A's cap. The A's Amigos program is sponsored by XFINITY, Home of the Most Live Sports.



LITTLE A'S: Each year, over 10,000 children from low to moderate-income families are treated to A's games and receive a Bank of America water bottle and family passes to the Oakland Zoo. The Little A's program is sponsored by Bank of America and supported by Clorox and the Oakland Zoo.

HOLIDAY PARTY: The A's Community Fund, Round Table Pizza and the Oakland Zoo host an annual holiday party for local school children. Current and former A's players are present to sign autographs and distribute gifts to each child. The holiday festival features an animal presentation in the Wildlife Theater by the Oakland Zoo, lunch, face painters, arts and crafts, and a visit by Santa and the A's mascot Stomper.



HOLIDAY CARAVAN: During the offseason, current and former A's players and the A's mascot Stomper make stops around the Bay Area during the A's Holiday Caravan. The caravan features visits to schools, hospitals, shelters, meet-and-greets and appearances at holiday parades and malls and other public places.

TICKET PURCHASE PROGRAM: Oakland A's players, the A's Community Fund and corporate sponsors purchase and donate thousands of game tickets to various charitable and non-profit groups each season.

SILENT AUCTION: The A's Community Fund holds silent auctions of various sports memorabilia behind section 120 on all Saturday and Sunday home dates. The A's Community Fund donated a portion of the proceeds to designated charitable groups as a silent auction partner on selected dates throughout the season.

FIELD RENOVATIONS: The A's Community Fund, in partnership with the Good Tidings Foundation, renovates a local baseball or softball field in order to provide local youth a state-of-the-art facility.
