THE MANAGER AND HIS COACHES

BILLY HITCHCOCK was born in Inverness, Alabama on July 31, 1916, the youngest of eight children . . . Now resides in Opelika, a town of 18,000, 120 miles from both Atlanta and Birmingham.

Attended Staunton Military Academy (Va.) for one year after high school . . . Was all-state there in three sports and maintained 96.8 average.

In 1934, went to Auburn where he starred in football (once an all southeast conference halfback) and baseball . . . His brother Jimmy had been Auburn's first all-American in 1932.

Sustained torn knee cartilage late in college career . . . Injury almost ended athletic career . . . After graduating from Auburn in 1938 with a B plus average, he was operated on at Johns Hopkins. That fall went to Emory University (Ga.) Law School, but the knee responded to treatment and, after one term, signed for a bonus with the Yankees in 1939.

Joined the Kansas City Blues (Amer. Assoc.) that year and played third on infield which also included Phil Rizzuto at short, Gerry Priddy at second and Johnny Sturm on first . . . Club won pennants in 1939 and 1940. When Rizzuto moved up in 1941, Billy went over to shortstop.

In 1942, contract was sold to Detroit . . . He played 85 games for Tigers then joined Army Air Corps as second lieutenant . . . Was discharged for years later with rank of major.

Played total of nine years in American League with Detroit, Washington, St. Louis, Boston and Philadelphia and had lifetime average of .243 . . . Last year in majors as player was 1953 with Detroit.

Manager at Buffalo in 1954 and then coached third base for Tigers for next six seasons . . . Last year, returned to managing at Vancouver in Milwaukee system and finished second.

Was married to the former Rebecca Rice, then an Auburn co-ed, in 1941 . . . Has one son, Johnny (age nine) . . . Is co-owner of hardware store in Opelika where he works whenever possible during off-season.

HARRY BRECHEEN is the only member of the ball club who has been with the Birds since their 1954 opening in Baltimore . . . He has been with the franchise a total of nine years, including one season with the St. Louis Browns.

Harry was a standout lefthand pitcher for 11 seasons in the majors, all but one of these with the St. Louis Cardinals . . . He had a lifetime record of 133-92, a fabulous career e.r.a. of 2.92, and won four of five decisions spread over three world series. He is the only lefthander to have won three games in one series (1946 vs. Boston) in the history of that classic. Perhaps his best season in the majors was 1948. That year he won 20, lost only 7 and led the National League in percentage (.741), strikeouts (149), e.r.a. (2.24) and shutouts (7).

CAL ERMER is a 37-year old native of Baltimore who has been managing in the minors for the last 12 seasons and actually received his first managing job at the age of 22 (1947) . . . Has finished in the first division eight times and won four pennants . . . After winning Southern Association flag at Birmingham in 1958 was selected by the *Sporting News* as "Minor League Manager of the Year."

Last season managed Yankee farm at Richmond in International League . . . Started as an infielder in the minors in 1942 and reached the majors briefly with the Washington Senators in 1947.

Manager at Ponce in Puerto Rican League last two winters . . . Graduate of Patterson Park High School . . . Current residence is Chattanooga where he managed in Southern Association for six years (1952 through 1957).

GEORGE STALLER is anything but a stranger to Baltimore baseball. Now 44, George was an outfielder for the International League Orioles in 1942, 1943, 1946 and 1947, and has been managing in the Birds' minor league system since their return to the majors in 1954. At least ten players on Oriole roster have played for him in the minors.

Managed at Ardmore in the Texas League last season and in 1960 was manager at Vancouver (Pacific Coast League), immediately preceding Billy Hitchcock in that capacity.

Broke into baseball in the Dodgers' chain in 1937, and eventually earned a tryout with the parent club at spring training in 1941, but a broken arm interceded. He did, however, make the majors briefly with the Philadelphia Athletics in 1943 before joining the U. S. Marine Corps.

Began his managerial career in the Athletics' system in 1948, and remained with that organization until joining the Orioles as manager at York in the Piedmont League in 1954 and 1955. He later piloted clubs at Aberdeen, Knoxville and Amarillo as well as at Vancouver and Ardmore.

FARM NOTES: The Orioles have advanced 15 farm system products to the major leagues since 1954, more than any other club in the American League. . . . This will be Earl Weaver's sixth season as a manager in the Bird's minor league organization and Billy Demars' fourth. . . . A survey of all 37 players the Orioles sent to Winter Instruction Leagues in 1959 and 1960 reveals that 27 successfully jumped one classification the following season, and 16 of these hurdled two classifications. . . . Boog Powell jumped two after the first winter and three following the 1960 winter league season. . . . The working agreement with the Aberdeen franchise represents what is perhaps the longest unbroken association between a major and minor league club in organized baseball today. This will be the 17th straight season that the Orioles and their predecessors the St. Louis Browns have been connected with Aberdeen. The tie-up was originated in 1946.

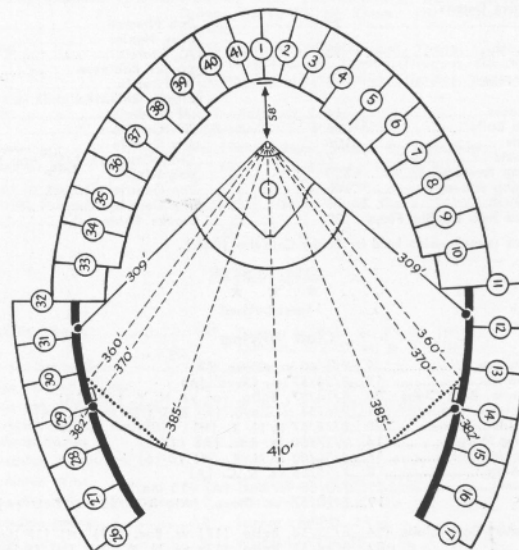
