The Orioles have added Miami to their system for 1966 and dropped Tri-City (Northwest League) and Appleton (Midwest) . . . Stockton and Tri-City won pennants in 1965 . . . Elmira finished second in the Eastern League, only one game out . . . Manager Earl Weaver, who has been promoted from Elmira to Rochester for 1966, has never finished out of the first division in 9 years as a pilot in the Orioles' minor league system.

The Birds will play Rochester in an exhibition game at Rochester on July 25. . . . There were five no-hitters pitched in the Orioles' system last year, two of them by Eddie Watt and one by Ed Barnowski, both of whom are now on the big league roster.

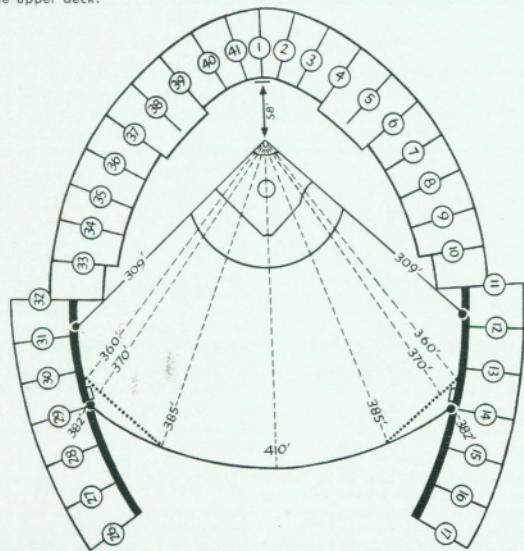

ITEMS OF INTEREST

FRED HOFFMAN AWARD: Named in honor of the late Orioles scout, the first annual "Fred Hoffman Award" was presented in 1965 to Barney Lutz for "outstanding service and dedication to his profession" . . . Lutz who scouts the New York State area for the Birds has scouted and managed in the Orioles system since the franchise was moved from St. Louis in 1954.

* * *

FREE AGENT DRAFTS: In the first free agent draft meeting held in June, 1965 the Orioles selected some 70 players, second highest total among all 20 big league clubs. They ultimately signed 28 of them, including the top four choices (Scott McDonald—rhp, Dick Horton—c, Frank Tepedino—1b and Ken Purvis—of), and 7 of the first 10 . . .

In the winter draft held in January, 1966 the Birds selected a total of 20 players, more than any other club in the majors . . .

* * *

FLORIDA INSTRUCTIONAL LEAGUE CHAMPIONS: The Clearwater Orioles under the guidance of Manager Vern Hoscheit easily won the Florida Instructional League title last fall with a 34-17 record . . . They finished the two month season with a 7½ game lead.

* * *

SHRINE OF IMMORTALS: The Shrine was created jointly in 1960 by the Orioles and the Maryland Professional Baseball Players Association (MPBPA) to recognize men with Maryland backgrounds who have distinguished themselves in professional baseball over long periods . . . Membership is limited to those who have been natives of the state of Maryland or who have played for the Orioles, International and American League, for a minimum of three years . . . Each year two new names are added to the Shrine Membership . . . One is selected by vote of Orioles fans at Memorial Stadium while the other is chosen by the MPBPA . . .

There are presently 12 members: Frank "Home Run" Baker, Max Bishop, Joe Boley, Jack Dunn, Sr., Jimmy Foxx, Lefty Grove, Charlie Keller, Fritz Maisel, Johnny Neun, Eddie Rommell, Babe Ruth and Tommy Thomas . . .

* * *

TRAVEL: During spring training and the regular season the Orioles will make some 62 inter-city jumps while covering roughly 33,000 miles . . . There will be 43 trips by air, including 31 charter flights (United Air Lines will be the carrier on 38 of the airplane jaunts), 15 by bus and 4 by train . . . The total cost of these city-to-city travels will be an estimated \$103,000 . . .

Some Orioles will spend as many as 16 weeks in hotels from February 21 until the end of the season, and the anticipated expense of feeding and housing the club in spring training and on the road during the regular campaign will approximate \$85,000 . . .

Regular season travel figures: miles—28,000; total trips—49, airplanes—37, (charter air—27), buses—8, train—4; expenses—\$87,000; hotels—58 nights, expense—\$15,000; meals expense on road—\$33,000 . . .

Spring training travel figures: transportation expense—\$16,000; hotels and meals expense—\$36,000 . . .

1960 TO PRESENT: Over the last six years from 1960 thru 1965, the Orioles have built up a winning record over every club but the Twins (nee Senators) whom they trail 55-57 . . . Other records: Boston (64-48), California (49-41), Chicago (59-53), Cleveland (62-50), Detroit (59-53), Kansas City (69-53), New York (59-53), Washington (62-28) . . . Overall from 1960 the O's are 538-426 . . . In the six years before that (1954 thru 1959) they were 404-517 . . .

ITEMS OF INTEREST

LAST TWO YEARS: Over the past two seasons, only the Chicago White Sox (193 wins) have won more games than the Orioles (191 wins) among all 20 major league clubs . . . Other leaders: Giants (185), Reds and Twins (181), Phillies and Dodgers (177) and Yankees (176).

SUSPENDED GAME RULE: A game terminated by curfew or by a pre-arranged time limit is a suspended game if it has progressed far enough to be an official game (i.e. 4½ or 5 innings) . . .

A game terminated by light failure is a suspended game anytime after it begins.

Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension immediately preceding the next scheduled single game between the two clubs on the same ground . . . If this is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in American League Regulation 3.8 . . .

A game called at the END of a completed inning AFTER NINE INNINGS for any reason shall be a TIE game and NOT a SUSPENDED game, and must be replayed in its entirety.

* * *

MINIMUM MAJOR LEAGUE SALARY: A player is entitled to a minimum rate of \$7000 per year if he is on the roster during the period June 15 thru August 31 . . . If such a player was on the roster before June 15 he is also entitled to the \$7000 rate retroactive to the date he joined the club during that season.

A player who is on the roster before June 15, but who is no longer with the parent club on that date, as well as a player who joins the club after August 31 will be paid at the rate of at least \$6000 per year for each day of service.

LONG HOME RUNS/MEMORIAL STADIUM: While there may have been other longer home runs hit in Memorial Stadium, the lengthiest belt ever measured here was 471' over the hedge in left center field by Harmon Killebrew on May 24, 1964 off Milt Pappas . . . This exceeded by two feet the only other drive ever hit over the hedge . . . That one was by "Boog" Powell 469' to the same area off Boston's Don Schwall on June 22, 1962 . . . Aside from these there have been two drives into the hedge on the fly (approx. 450'), one by Powell in 1965 and the other by Mickey Mantle in 1954 . . .

No one has ever hit a ball completely out of the ballpark, i.e. over the stands in left or right field . . .

VS. YANKEES: The Orioles are the only club in the league with anything like a winning record against the Yankees in the past seven years . . . The Birds are 71-63 . . . Others: Boston (55-79), Chicago (59-75), California (from 1961, 32-58), Cleveland (54-80), Detroit (63-71), Kansas City (40-94), Minnesota (incl. Wash. in '59 & '60, 55-78), Washington (from 1961, 27-63) . . .

PLAYER LIMITS: 28 players from opening day thru 30th day of season . . . 25 players from 31st day of season thru August 31 . . . 40 players from September 1 thru end of season.

Players in military service do not count against the "under control" list while on active duty . . . Upon separation from the service a player will be reinstated to his club's normal player limits after he has completed a 15 day trial period or has participated in a championship game, whichever comes first.

FRONT OFFICE RE-ALIGNMENT

The front office operation of the Orioles underwent several significant adjustments late last year as the result of a change in the club's ownership and the resignation of former President-General Manager Lee MacPhail to become Executive Administrator to Commissioner William D. Eckert.

Three men have been charged with the basic responsibility for running the club:

Frank Cashen as Executive Vice-President is the organization's principal operating authority and all division and department heads are responsible to him.

Limitations on number of selections by each club per meeting: Majors (1), "AAA" (2), "AA" (4), "A" (no limit).

Approximate dates of the draft meetings: Summer (June 7-8); Legion Draft (August 23) for selection of recently eligible American Legion players, and Winter (January 29) . . .

If a club fails to sign a drafted free agent in a specified period, that player is eligible to be drafted again by another club at a special draft. Rights to sign players selected in both the summer and legion sessions expire 15 days before the winter meeting, while all winter selections must be signed no later than 15 days before the summer meeting.
