FARM NOTES: Oriole farm clubs had a combined 353-344 (.506) won-lost record during 1967, the sixth straight year the system as a whole finished above the break-even level . . . In that time, the overall record of the system stands at 2393 wins and 2058 losses, a .538 percentage—best among all 20 major league organizations.

Two pennants and a near-miss highlighted the 1967 season . . . Flags were won by Elmira in the Western Division of the Eastern League and by Bluefield in all-rookie Appalachian League . . . Rochester, in the International League, finished the season in a first place tie with Richmond, then lost a one-game play-off for the title.

With the elevation of Earl Weaver to the Oriole coaching staff from the managerial post at Rochester, each of the six clubs in the chain has a new manager for 1968: Billy DeMars moves to Rochester from Elmira; Cal Ripken to Elmira from Miami; Joe Altobelli to Stockton from Bluefield; Harry Malmberg to Miami from Stockton . . . Bill Werle, former major league pitcher, has assumed the reins at Aberdeen . . . The Bluefield pilot was unnamed at press time.



1967 HIGHLIGHTS— ORIOLES vs. OPPONENTS

BOSTON: The Orioles were 10-8 against the American League champions, the only first division club over which they held an edge for the year . . . The Orioles won the first and last parts of the annual series, while the Red Sox captured the middle . . . The O's won the first four games, the Red Sox took six of the next seven and the Orioles won five of the last seven.

Fenway Homers: The Orioles hit 18 homers at Fenway Park, an average of two per game . . . In the past two years, the Orioles have belted 37 home runs in 18 games there.

Fenway Wins: The O's were 6-3 at Fenway during '67 and have won 14 while dropping four there in the last two years.

Fireworks: The Orioles put on the greatest power show in the club's history at Fenway Park May 17 . . . A major league record was established when seven different players hit home runs (Blair, B. Robinson, F. Robinson, Etchebarren, Bowers, Powell and Johnson) as the Orioles won, 12-8 . . . The O's tallied nine times in the seventh frame as Etchebarren-Bowers and Powell-Johnson hit back-to-back homers.

Miscellaneous: Jim Lonborg had a 4-1 record vs. Baltimore . . . Three times the O's shut out the Sox 10-0 . . . The Orioles held a 103-83 advantage in runs scored for the year . . . Frank Robinson hit seven home runs against Boston, four off Darrell Brandon.

CALIFORNIA: The Orioles won four of the first six games of the year between the two clubs, then California took nine of the next 11 . . . One game in the yearly series was cancelled.

Big Sweep: The O's had a great day at the plate while sweeping a pair against the Angels June 6 at Anaheim Stadium by scores of 16-4 and 11-1 . . . The Angels used 12 pitchers as the Orioles rapped out 33 hits in the two games . . . In the opener, Curt Blefary drove in seven runs with three homers (one with the bases loaded) while Paul Blair batted home four runs.

Twin Bills: The two clubs played five doubleheaders with the Orioles winning one, losing two and splitting two.

Miscellaneous: Ten different California pitchers gained wins over the Orioles . . . Twelve of the 17 games were decided by one or two runs . . . Andy Etchebarren had the best bat mark (.353) for the O's against the Angels.

CHICAGO: The Orioles were 7-11 vs. Chicago for the year . . . When Tom Phoebus beat the Sox, 4-1, on June 29, it brought to an end a streak of nine straight Oriole losses to Chicago . . . Three of the setbacks were left over from 1966.

Triple Play: The Sox performed a triple play, around-the-horn, in the nightcap of the August 6 doubleheader . . . With Boog Powell on second and Frank Robinson on first, Brooks Robinson hit a hard grounder to Ken Boyer at third . . . Boyer stepped on third for the first out, threw to Don Buford at second to force F. Robinson and Buford's relay to Tom McCraw at first beat B. Robinson to complete the triple-killing.

Sox Homers: Chicago hit more home runs (10) at Memorial Stadium than any other visiting A.L. club in 1967.

Low-Hitters: In five games Oriole pitchers restricted the White Sox to four hits and to three hits in another game.

Blair Tops: Paul Blair was the only Oriole regular to hit over .300 against Chicago last year . . . He hit a resounding .373 with 25-for-67.

CLEVELAND: The Orioles and Indians split their series for the year, 9-9.

Drabo Loses: The Indians handed Moe Drabowsky his first loss in two years as an Oriole (after 12 straight wins) when Tony Horton hit a home run in the bottom of the 12th inning July 28 at Cleveland for a 1-0 victory.

Extra Innings: The two clubs played three long extra-inning games during the year and Cleveland won each of them . . . The scores were 5-4 in 14 innings June 30; 1-0 in 12 innings July 28 and 2-1 in 13 innings August 10.

Curfew: The Baltimore midnight curfew halted the nightcap of the June 30 two-night doubleheader, after the first game consumed four hours and 53 minutes before the Tribe won, 5-4, in 14 frames . . . The second game was stopped after five innings with the O's leading on a Boog Powell homer . . . When action resumed the following afternoon, the Orioles erupted for six runs in two innings and went on to win easily, 8-1.

DETROIT: The Tigers completely dominated the year's play, winning 15 and losing three . . . The O's won the opener of the series but Detroit

took the next nine in succession . . . Brooks Robinson's two-run homer gave the Orioles a 2-1 win on August 2 to snap the streak, but the Tigers roared back to win five more in a row.

Riots: A three-game series in Detroit July 25-27 had to be shifted to Baltimore because of riots in the Motor City . . . In return, two Tiger games at Baltimore September 12-13 were transferred to Detroit.

Earl Wilson: The ace of the Tigers, Earl Wilson, was 4-0 against the Orioles last year to improve his lifetime mark to 16-5 vs. Baltimore . . . He has won 15 times in his last 17 decisions against the Orioles.

Big Four: The four Detroit starters had a prosperous year against the Orioles, winning 14 of 15 decisions . . . Earl Wilson and Mickey Lolich were 4-0, Joe Sparma 3-0 and Denny McLain 3-1.

No-Hitter: The Tigers failed to get a hit but got a 2-1 win over the O's in the opener of the April 30 twin-bill . . . The Detroiters tallied both runs in the top of the ninth inning, one scoring on a wild pitch by losing hurler Steve Barber and the other on an error . . . Barber went 8.2 frames while absorbing the setback and Stu Miller got the final out.

KANSAS CITY: The Orioles were 10-8 against the Athletics last year.

Quick Game: The O's played their fastest game of the year, one hour and 47 minutes, while beating the A's 2-1 on September 1 as Pete Richert bested Jim Hunter.

Richert's Record: Richert, after joining the O's May 29, beat the A's four times without losing . . . He also picked up a win over them while with Washington to post a 5-0 mark for the year.

Catfish: Jim (Catfish) Hunter logged a 4-1 record against the Orioles in '67.

Great Year: Frank Robinson had a tremendous year against the A's . . . He hit .422 (27-for-64) with five home runs and 15 runs batted in.

MINNESOTA: The O's were 8-10 vs. the Twins, winning four and losing five at home and away.

Robby's 400th: Frank Robinson got the 400th home run of his major league career off Jim Katt September 9 at Memorial Stadium . . . He hit No. 399 off Dean Chance 11 days earlier at Metropolitan Stadium.

Hot Series: Tony Oliva collected 15 hits in 21 at-bats in a five-game series September 7-10 at Memorial Stadium . . . He collected five doubles and a triple among the safeties and at one point lashed out nine straight hits.

Killer Connects: Harmon Killebrew hit five home runs against the Orioles last year to raise his lifetime total to 51 off Baltimore pitching.

Big Series: The O's and Twins drew 101,959 in four dates at Metropolitan Stadium August 28-31, an average of 25,490 per date.

NEW YORK: The Orioles had more success against New York than they did against any other club last year, winning the season's series 13-5 . . . The O's were 7-2 at Yankee Stadium and, since July 16, 1964, have compiled a 28-6 record (.824) there.

Oriole Pitching: The Orioles shut out the Yankees five times, limiting them to a total of 17 hits in these games . . . In nine games Oriole pitchers held the Yanks to four hits or less . . . The collection included a one-hitter (by Palmer), a two-hitter (by Phoebus) and seven four-hitters.

Trio of Wins: Tom Phoebus and Pete Richert each had 3-0 records vs. New York last year.

Two Homers: The Yankees managed to hit just two homers at Memorial Stadium last year . . . Mickey Mantle hit one and Joe Pepitone the other.

Pacesetter: Frank Robinson led the Oriole hit parade against the Yankees with a .404 average (19-for-47).

WASHINGTON: The Orioles held a 10-8 margin over the Senators with each team having better success in the other's park . . . The O's were 6-3 at D. C. Stadium while the Nats were 5-4 at Memorial Stadium.

Long Games: Five Oriole-Senator games went into extra innings, with Baltimore winning four . . . The Orioles played the longest game in their history when they went 19 innings June 4 at Memorial Stadium before winning 7-5 on Andy Etchebarren's two-run homer.

Swift Attack: The Senators struck suddenly for seven runs in the sixth inning of the July 22 game to win, 7-5.

Top Total: Camilo Pascual gained two victories over the Orioles to increase to 20 his lifetime victory total against Baltimore . . . He ranks first among currently active hurlers in career victories over the Orioles.

Hit Leader: Brooks Robinson led the Oriole assault for the year against Washington pitching with a .403 average.

RULES OF INTEREST

FREE AGENT DRAFT RULE—A BRIEF SUMMARY: Major League and National Association clubs meet twice a year for the purpose of drafting free agent player talent . . . Selection of a free agent entitles the club to the exclusive right of negotiation with that player for a specified period (from date of selection until 15 days prior to next draft meeting).

Approximate dates of draft meetings: Summer (June 10) and Winter (last Saturday of January) . . .

There are two phases to each draft meeting:

(1) **Regular Phase**—selection of free agents in inverse order of major league standings . . . Limitations on number of selections by each organization at each level: Major League (1), "AAA" (1), "AA" (1), "A" (unlimited) . . . Minor league clubs select in the same relative order as their parent clubs.

(2) **Special Phase**—selection of free agents who had been drafted at a previous meeting, but who were not subsequently signed before the negotiation right expired . . . It is possible for a club to redraft a player whom it had been unable to sign after the original selection, but only with express written consent of that player . . . Order of selection in the special phase is determined by lot.

SUSPENDED GAME RULE: A game terminated by curfew or by a pre-arranged time limit is a suspended game if it has progressed far enough to be an official game (i.e. 4½ or 5 innings) . . .

A game terminated by light failure is a suspended game anytime after it begins.

Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension immediately preceding the next scheduled single game between the two clubs on the same ground . . . If this is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in American League Regulation 3.8 . . .

A game called at the END of a completed inning AFTER NINE INNINGS for any reason shall be a TIE game and NOT a SUSPENDED game, and must be replayed in its entirety.

BATTING/PITCHING (ERA) CHAMPION QUALIFICATION: 502 or more plate appearances. 162 or more innings.

ROOKIE QUALIFICATIONS: To qualify as a Rookie a player may not have spent more than 45 days on a big league roster between cut-down dates (the 31st day of season and Sept. 1), AND may not have exceeded 90 official at bats or 45 innings pitched at major league level.

"SAVE" RULE (as formulated by Sporting News)—Credit a save if a relief pitcher: (1) faces the tying or winning run at any time and finishes the game while preserving a lead . . . (2) enters the game in the final inning with a two-run lead and finishes the game while preserving a lead . . . (3) enters with a three-run lead and pitches two or more innings while preserving a lead . . . Ordinarily a pitcher must finish a game to be credited with a save, except in a case when a pitcher faces the tying or winning and then is removed for a pinch-hitter, and the subsequent pitcher(s) does not face the tying or winning run while finishing the game.

ITEMS OF INTEREST

MOST VALUABLE ORIOLES: This award is presented annually by the Sports Boosters of Maryland, based on a vote taken by the announcers and writers who travel with the club . . . Winners have been: Chuck Diering (1954), Dave Philley (1955), Bob Nieman (1956), Billy Gardner (1957), Gus Triandos (1958), Gene Woodling (1959), Brooks Robinson (1960), Jim Gentile (1961), Brooks Robinson (1962), Stu Miller (1963), Brooks Robinson (1964), Stu Miller (1965), Frank Robinson (1966), Frank Robinson (1967).

SHRINE OF IMMORTALS: The Shrine, jointly sponsored by the Orioles and Maryland Professional Baseball Players Association, was created in 1960 to recognize men with Maryland backgrounds who have distinguished themselves in professional baseball . . . To qualify, a candidate must either be a native of Maryland or have been a player or official of the Orioles, International or American League, for a minimum of three years . . . Two new members are admitted to the Shrine each year . . . One is selected by the MPBPA and the other by a vote of fans at Memorial Stadium on Shrine of Immortals Night.

There are presently 16 members in the Shrine: Frank (Home Run) Baker, Jack Bentley, Max Bishop, Joe Boley, Jack Dunn Sr., Jimmy Foxx, Lefty Grove, Merwin Jacobson, Charlie Keller, Fritz Maisel, Bill Nicholson, Johnny Neun, Jack Ogden, Eddie Rommel, Babe Ruth and Tommy Thomas.

TRIPLE CROWN AWARD: This award, created in 1966 by the National Brewing Company, was established to honor players who lead their league in hitting, home runs and runs batted in, an accomplishment achieved only 13 times in major league history.

The first recipient of the award was Frank Robinson, of the Orioles, who received it in 1966 for leading the American League with a .316 batting average, 49 home runs and 122 runs batted in . . . Carl Yastrzemski, of the Red Sox, received the award this past winter for his 1967 American League-leading .326 batting mark, 44 home runs and 121 runs batted in . . . Each winner receives the award for his permanent possession while a duplicate award has been donated to the Baseball Museum at Cooperstown, N. Y., which bears the names of all winners.

Actually, only 11 different players have won the Triple Crown . . . Rogers Hornsby (Cardinals, '22 and '25) and Ted Williams (Red Sox, '42 and '47) have won it twice . . . Other winners: Ty Cobb (Tigers, '09), Heinie Zimmerman (Cubs, '12), Jimmy Foxx (A's, '33), Chuck Klein (Phillies, '33), Lou Gehrig (Yankees, '34), Joe Medwick (Cardinals, '37) and Mickey Mantle (Yankees, '56).

EDDIE WEIDNER RETIRES: Trainer Eddie Weidner, an institution in his own right, retired following the 1967 season after 52 years with Oriole clubs . . . Weidner joined the International League Orioles in 1916 as scoreboard operator, later became clubhouse man and was promoted to trainer in 1922—a position he held 45 years.

He worked under 15 managers, from Jack Dunn Sr. to Hank Bauer, and was on the scene for all seven of Dunn's consecutive International League pennant winners (1919-1925) . . . He was head trainer for the American League in the 1958 and 1967 All-Star games and lists the Orioles' 1966 world championship year as his greatest thrill in baseball.

He and his wife, Margaret, have been married nearly 43 years and are the parents of four children: Peggy, Evelyn, Eddie Jr. and Joan . . . They also have 9 grandchildren . . . Ralph Salvon, who worked for two years as Weidner's assistant, succeeded him as Oriole trainer.

HANK BAUER

Born: July 31, '22; 6'0"; 200; Batted, R; Threw, R.

Born in East St. Louis, Ill., and now makes home in Prairie Village, Kan. . . . Beginning sixth year with Orioles and fifth as manager . . . Has guided the O's to a pair of third place finishes, a pennant and world championship and a tie for sixth . . . His Oriole teams have played .564 ball while winning 364 and losing 281 . . . Manager American League all-star team in 1967, which lost 2-1 in 15 innings to National League at Anaheim Stadium.

Named Major League "Manager of the Year" for 1965 by SPORTING NEWS and selected the American League's top pilot by the two major wire services, Associated Press and United Press International . . . Accorded same honor by wire services in 1964 . . . Rewarded with two-year contract after O's won American League pennant in 1966.

Played more than 13 years as outfielder in A.L. . . . Had 277 lifetime average . . . Played 1,544 major league games . . . Appeared in 9 World Series over 11 full seasons with the Yankees . . . Still holds Series record for hitting safely in 17 consecutive games . . . Hit four home runs in 1958 classic against Milwaukee with eight RBI's and a .323 batting average . . . Appeared in three all-star games . . . Has been a member of 8 world championship clubs in 10 Series exposures.

Traded by Yankees to A's with Don Larsen, Marv Throneberry and Norm Siebern for Kent Hadley, Joe Demaestri and Roger Maris December 11, 1959 . . . Replaced Joe Gordon as K. C. manager June 19, 1961 . . . Resigned after 1962 season and joined Orioles as coach in 1963.

Served four years with U. S. Marines during World War II and saw considerable combat in Pacific Theater . . . Awarded two Purple Hearts and Bronze Star.

Married Charlene Friede in 1949 . . . She was secretary to Kansas City Blues (American Assn.) General Manager Lee McPhail when Hank played there . . . They are parents of four children: Hank Jr. (11/9/50), Bernadine (8/5/54), Herman (7/12/56) and Kelly James (2/16/58).

GEORGE BAMBERGER

Born: Aug. 1, '25; 6'0"; 190; Batted, R; Threw, R.

Born in Staten Island, N. Y., and still lives there . . . Named Oriole pitching coach October 3, 1967 . . . Served as minor league pitching instructor for the O's the past four years . . . Playing career spanned 18 seasons, including 15 at Triple-A level . . . Retired as player after 1963 season.

Originally signed by New York Giants . . . Appeared briefly with Giants in 1951 and 1952 and the Orioles in 1959 . . . Made 10 appearances in majors but was not involved in any decisions . . . Won 213 games in minors . . . Pitched no-hitter for Ottawa against Toronto in International League in 1951, winning 1-0 . . . Holds Pacific Coast League record for most innings pitched without walking a batter (68.2), which he set with Vancouver in 1958 . . . Spent 7 years with Vancouver, from 1956 through 1962, and won 85 while losing 74 . . . Inducted into Vancouver's Sports Hall of Fame in 1966.

Has worked with Oriole pitchers in spring camp and with the young hurlers at Clearwater in the Florida Instructional League each of the past four years . . . He and his wife, Wilma, are the parents of three daughters: Judith, Nancy and Lori.

VERNARD HOSCHEIT

Born: Apr. 1, '22; 5'9"; 195; Batted R; Threw, R.

Born in Brunswick, Nebr., and makes home in Cedar Rapids, Iowa . . . Has lengthy background in baseball as player, manager, club and league official . . . Spent 12 years as minor league catcher, breaking in with Norfolk in the Nebraska State League in 1941 and reaching the Triple-A level . . . Started managerial career in 1948 while playing at McAlester in the Sooner State League and won pennant . . . His clubs won post-season play-offs every year from 1950 through 1954.
