FARM NOTES: In 1968, for the seventh consecutive year, the Oriole farm system finished above the break-even point with a composite 357-353 won-lost record . . . Since 1962, the overall record of the system is 2,750 wins and 2,411 losses, a .533 percentage—tops among all major league organizations.

Miami won the only championship in the system in 1968, capturing the Eastern Division flag in the Florida State League but then losing the post-season play-off finals to Orlando . . . The Marlins had an 87-55 record . . . Rochester finished third in the International League with a 77-69 mark and Elmira placed third in the Eastern League with a 77-63 record.

One change has taken place in the system for 1969 . . . The Orioles have shifted their Double-A operation from Elmira to Dallas-Ft. Worth in the Texas League . . . The Orioles again have a working agreement with Aberdeen in the Northern League, marking the twenty-fourth straight year the two clubs have worked together.

Each club in the chain will have a new manager in 1969 . . . Cal Ripken moves from Elmira to Rochester . . . Joe Altobelli, who handled Stockton last year, takes over at Dallas-Ft. Worth . . . Bill Werle has shifted from Aberdeen to Stockton.

The Orioles will play the Ports in Stockton on June 2nd, and will also play an exhibition against a Triple A club, but no date has been set.

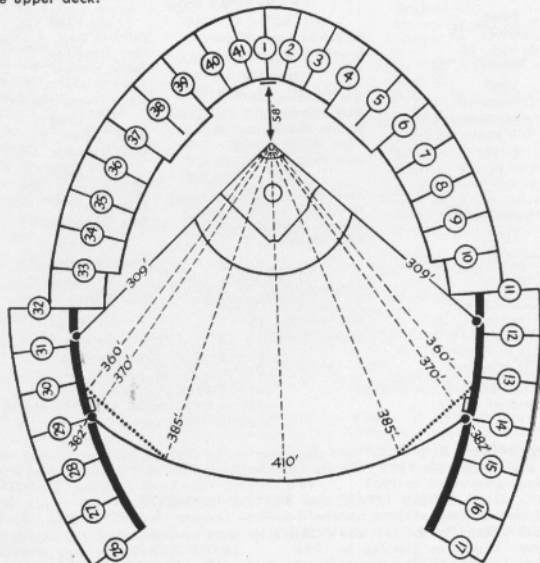

EXPANSION DRAFT: The Orioles lost four pitchers, a catcher and a first baseman in the American League expansion draft last October 15 in Boston . . . Righthander Roger Nelson, selected by Kansas City, was the first to be chosen in the draft of 60 players . . . The others lost by the Orioles in order of selection were: Mike Fiore, 1B (K.C.), Wally Bunker, RHP (K.C.), Larry Haney, C (Seattle), Moe Drabowsky (K.C.) and John Morris (Seattle). The price paid for each player by the expansion clubs was \$175,000.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT: The consolidated operations of the Baltimore Baseball Club and its wholly owned subsidiary, the Baltimore Bays of the North American Soccer League, showed a net income in fiscal 1968 of \$551,305. This profit was made possible by an "extraordinary item" of non-recurrrable income, namely, the expansion draft of six players, which netted \$737,765 (gross income from expansion was \$1,050,000) . . . Prior to the draft, the ball club and subsidiary had sustained a combined operating loss of \$186,460.

"SUMMER FUN" PROGRAM . . . The Orioles in cooperation with the City of Baltimore organized a program in 1968 to accommodate large groups of underprivileged children at Oriole home games free of charge during the summer months . . . Under the capable leadership of Morgan State College Football Coach Earl Banks, assisted by former Baltimore Colt football players Jesse Thomas and George Taliaferro, more than 35,000 youngsters, mostly nine to 14, attended some 36 games between June 25th and August 29th.

They were seated in the leftfield bleacher area which was set aside exclusively for their use and designated "Birdland '68" . . . The City furnished bus transportation for children from Baltimore and chartered buses were provided by sponsoring groups in outlying counties and cities in the state. "Summer Fun" will operate again in 1969 with Banks directing the program.

BOSTON: The Orioles and Red Sox split their series for the year, each winning 9 . . . The O's won 6 of the 9 games played in Baltimore and the Red Sox did the same in Boston . . . Oriole success at Fenway Park fell off considerably from the previous two years, when the O's won 14 of 18 games.

No-Hitter: Tom Phoebus fired a no-hitter against the Sox April 27 at Memorial Stadium . . . He fanned 9, walked three and threw 110 pitches . . . Game delayed one hour, 23 minutes at start because of rain . . . Brooks Robinson saved gem with 8th inning catch of line drive off bat of Rico Petrocelli.

Nelson's Effort: Roger Nelson put on an outstanding pitching show at Fenway Park September 18 . . . He had no-hitter for six full innings with 13 strikeouts . . . He weakened in 7th, gave up three runs and Red Sox eventually won, 4-0.

Longest Game: The Orioles were involved in their longest game of the season August 25 at Memorial Stadium against the Red Sox . . . O's finally got a run in the 18th to win, 3-2 . . . Game lasted 5 hours, 27 minutes to set Oriole club record.

Miscellaneous: Nine dates at Fenway drew 213,559, an average of 23,729 per date . . . A.L. bat champion Carl Yastrzemski hit .418 vs. Orioles with 23-for-55 . . . Frank Robinson led Orioles vs. Red Sox with .400 average (14-for-35) . . . O's scored 6 runs or more in 7 games vs. Red Sox . . . O's set club record by stranding 21 runners in 18-inning marathon.

CALIFORNIA: O's were 5-4 at both Memorial Stadium and Anaheim Stadium against the Angels.

Eruption: O's had their biggest single inning of the year when they scored 7 runs in the 9th inning of the April 21 game.

Shutouts: Oriole pitchers tossed five shutouts at the Angels, including four at Memorial Stadium.

Perfect Log: Dave McNally had a 3-0 record against the Californians . . . Before 1968, his career mark vs. the Angels was 4-5.

Miscellaneous: O's held Angels to two hits in three different games . . . Tom Satriano went 5-for-5 vs. Orioles in August 11 game . . . O's and Angels played 15 innings in final meeting of season August 22 at Anaheim Stadium . . . Game ended at 3:45 A.M. Baltimore time.

CHICAGO: The Orioles were 11-7 vs. Chicago, exactly the reverse of their 1967 performance against the Sox.

Hardin's Success: When Sox beat Jim Hardin, 2-1, on September 20, it marked their first win over him after losing 5 straight since he joined O's in mid-1967 . . . Each of his wins was a complete game and he did not allow more than 6 hits in any one of the victories.

Close Games: Ten games between the clubs were decided by one run, with the O's winning 6 . . . Three other games were decided by two runs.

Good Pitching: Oriole hurlers held Sox to four hits or less in 6 of the 18 games between the two clubs . . . Dave Leonhard led the way with a Memorial Day two-hitter, which he won by 5-0 score.

CLEVELAND: Indians completely dominated play between the two clubs in the first half of the season, winning 8 of 9 games . . . O's rebounded to win the next four but finished with just a 7-11 record vs. the Tribe, their worst mark against any opponent.

One-Hitter: Sonny Siebert tossed one-hitter in beating O's 2-0 in nightcap of May 19 twin-bill . . . Curt Blefary's 7th inning double was only Oriole safety.

Zeroes: The strong Cleveland pitching staff shut out the O's 6 times, including four times over an 8-game span from May 10 through May 19.

Hitting: Orioles hit just .188 as a team vs. Cleveland with 105-for-558.

Pitching: Indians nosed out O's for team ERA title, 2.655 to 2.660.

DETROIT: Orioles won 5 of 9 games in Tiger Stadium but only three of 9 at home to finish the year with an 8-10 mark vs. the American League and World Champions.

1968 HIGHLIGHTS— ORIOLES vs. OPPONENTS

G(r)ate Attraction: O's and Tigers drew very well when they met . . . Eight dates at Detroit attracted 296,252, an average of 37,032 per date . . . A three-date series at Tiger Stadium July 19-21 pulled in 133,524 while another three-date series, August 30-September 1, drew 124,247 . . . In three dates at Baltimore July 26-28, attendance was 107,228, including the O's top home crowd of the year (45,729) for the July 27 game.

McLain: Orioles had more success against Dennis McLain than any other club in the league . . . The O's beat the 31-game winner three times in 5 decisions, the only team to have a winning margin against him.

Lolich Beaten: O's ended a 9-game losing streak against Mickey Lolich by beating him, 5-1, on July 28 . . . It was the Orioles' first win against him since May 6, 1964.

Triple Play: Tigers performed a triple play in the third inning of the September 1 game.

Streak Enders: Detroit was involved both times when the Orioles ended their longest winning and losing streaks of the year . . . Tigers halted 8-game winning streak by beating O's, 2-1, on May 1 . . . O's then plunged into a losing streak that reached 7 straight (longest for the club since 1958) before snapping it May 15 with a 10-8 win over the Tigers.

MINNESOTA: Orioles were 10-8 vs. the Twins for the year, winning 5 and losing 4 both home and away . . . Twins won 5 of the first 7 games between the clubs, but the O's bounced back to capture the series for the year by winning 8 of the last 11.

Runs: Five times the Orioles scored 6 or more runs against the Twins . . . For the year, the Orioles outscored the Minnesotans by a 75-54 margin.

Bat Leader: Dave Johnson paced the Orioles in hitting against the Twins with a .313 mark, 15-for-48 . . . He started with just 2-for-21 but went 13-for-27 after June 30 . . . At one point, he had 9-for-11.

Killer: Harmon Killebrew hit one home run vs. the Orioles before his injury in the All-Star game . . . The homer was No. 52 of his career against the Orioles.

Chance: Orioles beat Dean Chance two out of three games to raise their career record to 14-10 against him.

NEW YORK: For the third time in the last four seasons, the Orioles had a 13-5 record vs. the Yankees . . . Since the start of the 1965 season, the Orioles have played .750 ball vs. New York by winning 54 and losing 18 . . . The O's have had even more success in games played at Yankee Stadium starting July 16, 1964 . . . Since then, the Orioles have played .791 ball with 34 wins in 43 decisions.

Hitting: O's batted .253 (148-for-586) vs. Yankees, their highest mark against any club.

Walk Mark: Oriole pitchers set a club record by giving up 14 walks in April 30 game, but still won, 6-5, as Yankees left 13 runners on base.

Miscellaneous: Orioles beat Stan Bahnsen, Rookie Pitcher of the Year, four times without losing . . . Eleven of the 18 games between the two clubs were decided by one or two runs . . . Dave Leonhard picked up three wins over Yanks, including the first of his major league career when he won, 6-1, on May 1.

OAKLAND: The O's and A's split their series for the year, each club winning 9 . . . Orioles were 5-3 at home but only 4-6 at the Oakland Coliseum . . . One game was transferred from Baltimore to Oakland.

Twin-bills: The two clubs played four doubleheaders, with the Orioles winning one, splitting one and losing two.

Inaugural: O's helped unveil major league baseball in Oakland April 17, but spoiled occasion by beating A's, 4-1, before 47,223 cash customers.

Home Runs: O's hit 20 home runs during the year against Oakland, 10 at home and away.

Odom's Bid: John Odom had a no-hitter for 8.2 innings against the Orioles June 7 at Memorial Stadium, but Dave Johnson ruined the bid with a single to right field . . . Odom walked 8, but won by a 6-1 score.

MOST VALUABLE ORIOLES: This award is presented annually by the Sports Boosters of Maryland, based on a vote taken by the announcers and writers who travel with the club . . . Winners have been: Chuck Diering (1954), Dave Philley (1955), Bob Nieman (1956), Billy Gardner (1957), Gus Triandos (1958), Gene Woodling (1959), Brooks Robinson (1960), Jim Gentile (1961), Brooks Robinson (1962), Stu Miller (1963), Brooks Robinson (1964), Stu Miller (1965), Frank Robinson (1966), Frank Robinson (1967), Dave McNally (1968).

SHRINE OF IMMORTALS: The Shrine, jointly sponsored by the Orioles and Maryland Professional Baseball Players Association, was created in 1960 to recognize men with Maryland backgrounds who have distinguished themselves in professional baseball . . . To qualify, a candidate must either be a native of Maryland or have been a player or official of the Orioles, International or American League, for a minimum of three years . . . Two new members are admitted to the Shrine each year . . . One is selected by the MPBPA and the other by a vote of fans at Memorial Stadium on Shrine of Immortals Night.

There are presently 18 members in the Shrine: Frank (Home Run) Baker, Jack Bentley, Max Bishop, Joe Boley, Jack Dunn Sr., Jimmy Foxx, Lefty Grove, Buck Herzog, Merwin Jacobson, Charlie Keller, Fritz Maisel, Bill Nicholson, Johnny Neun, Dick Porter, Jack Ogden, Eddie Rommel, Babe Ruth and Tommy Thomas.

TRIPLE CROWN AWARD: This award, created in 1966 by the National Brewing Company, was established to honor players who lead their league in hitting, home runs and runs batted in, an accomplishment achieved only 13 times in major league history.

The first recipient of the award was Frank Robinson, of the Orioles, who received it in 1966 for leading the American League with a .316 batting average, 49 home runs and 122 runs batted in . . . Carl Yastrzemski, of the Red Sox, received the award in 1967 for his American League-leading .326 batting mark, 44 home runs and 121 runs batted in . . . Each winner receives the award for his permanent possession while a duplicate award has been donated to the Baseball Museum at Cooperstown, N. Y., which bears the names of all winners.

Actually, only 11 different players have won the Triple Crown . . . Rogers Hornsby (Cardinals, '22 and '25) and Ted Williams (Red Sox, '42 and '47) have won it twice . . . Other winners: Ty Cobb (Tigers, '09), Heinie Zimmerman (Cubs, '12), Jimmy Foxx (A's, '33), Chuck Klein (Phillies, '33), Lou Gehrig (Yankees, '34), Joe Medwick (Cardinals, '37) and Mickey Mantle (Yankees, '56).

PLAY-OFF SYSTEM: Winners of the Eastern and Western Divisions of both major leagues will participate in a best-of-5 play-off series to determine 1969 league champions. The winners then meet in the World Series in a best-of-7 series.

In the American League, the first two games of the play-offs are tentatively scheduled for October 4 and 5 in the city of the Eastern Division winner. October 6 has been arranged as a travel day with the remaining three games (if necessary) to be played October 7-8-9 in the city of the Western Division champion. The National League play-offs are tentatively scheduled on the same dates, but opening in the Western Division winner's city.

The 1969 World Series, barring a rain delay during the play-offs, will tentatively begin Saturday, October 11, in the city of the American League champion.

RULES OF INTEREST

FREE AGENT DRAFT RULE—A BRIEF SUMMARY: Major League and National Association clubs meet twice a year for the purpose of drafting free agent player talent . . . Selection of a free agent entitles the club to the exclusive right of negotiation with that player for a specified period (from date of selection until 15 days prior to next draft meeting).

Approximate dates of draft meetings: Summer (June 10) and Winter (last Saturday of January) . . .

There are two phases to each draft meeting:

(1) **Regular Phase**—selection of free agents in inverse order of major league standings . . . Limitations on number of selections by each organization at each level: Major League (1), "AAA" (1), "AA" (1), "A" (unlimited) . . . Minor league clubs select in the same relative order as their parent clubs.

(2) **Special Phase**—selection of free agents who had been drafted at a previous meeting, but who were not subsequently signed before the negotiation right expired . . . It is possible for a club to redraft a player whom it had been unable to sign after the original selection, but only with express written consent of that player . . . Order of selection in the special phase is determined by lot.

SUSPENDED GAME RULE: A game terminated by curfew or by a pre-arranged time limit is a suspended game only if it has progressed far enough to be an official game (i.e. $4\frac{1}{2}$ to 5 innings) . . .

A game terminated by light failure is a suspended game anytime after it begins.

Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension immediately preceding the next scheduled single game between the two clubs on the same ground . . . If this is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in American League Regulation 3.8 . . .

A game called at the END of a completed inning AFTER NINE INNINGS for any reason shall be a TIE game and NOT a SUSPENDED game, and must be replayed in its entirety.

BALTIMORE CURFEW: Night Games—see A.L. Regulation 3.4 (13) —Saturday night—play must be called at 11:59 P.M. regardless of the game situation . . . All other nights—no inning may be started after 11:59 P.M., but any inning which begins before that time may be completed.

Sunday Games—see A.L. Regulation 3.7—No Sunday game at Baltimore may start before 2:00 P.M.

BATTING/PITCHING (ERA) CHAMPION QUALIFICATION: 5C2 or more plate appearances. 162 or more innings.

ROOKIE QUALIFICATIONS: To qualify as a Rookie a player may not have spent more than 45 days on a big league roster between cut-down dates (the 31st day of season and Sept. 1), AND may not have exceeded 90 official at bats or 45 innings pitched at major league level.

"SAVE" RULE (10:20): (a) Credit a save to a relief pitcher who enters a game with his team in the lead if he holds the lead the remainder of the game, providing he is not credited with the victory.

(b) A relief pitcher cannot be credited with a save if he does not finish the game, unless he is removed for a pinchhitter or pinchrunner.

(c) When more than one relief pitcher qualifies for a save under the provisions of this rule, credit the save to the relief pitcher judged by the scorer to have been most effective. Only one save can be credited in a game.

LONG HOME RUNS/MEMORIAL STADIUM: The longest "measured" home run ever hit in Memorial Stadium was a 471' drive by Harmon Killebrew on May 24, 1964 off Milt Pappas over the hedge in left center field . . . This exceeded by two feet the only other blast that has ever cleared the hedge . . . That was one by "Boog" Powell 469' to the same area off Boston's Don Schwall on June 22, 1962. Aside from these there have been three balls hit into the hedge (approximately 450'), by Mickey Mantle in 1954, by Powell in 1965 and by Frank Robinson in 1967.

Frank Robinson is the only player to have hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium. In the second game of a doubleheader with Cleveland on May 8, 1966, Frank hit a Luis Tiant offering over the left field stands and into the parking lot beyond, a drive that measured 451' on the fly and rolled to a stop 540' away from home plate.

1960 TO PRESENT: During the Orioles first six years of operation in Baltimore (1954 to 1959) they never made the first division and had a combined record of 404-517 (.439) . . . Since then, from 1960 through 1968, a period of nine seasons, the Birds have come about sharply with a cumulative 802-645 (.554) log and seven first division finishes . . . Only one other club in the league has turned in a better record during this span, the New York Yankees (807-639, .558) . . . Strangely enough, it is the Yankees the Orioles have beaten most during these nine campaigns. They are 100-66 vs. New York.

In competition against other opponents since the start of 1960, the Birds have a losing record against just one club, the Tigers (79-87) . . . They have played the Minnesota Twins (incl. Washington in '60) to a standoff at 83-83 and hold edges over all the others: Boston (95-71), California (77-66), Chicago (86-80), Cleveland (86-80), New York (100-66), Oakland (nee K.C.), (99-65) and Washington (97-47).

Here are the total won-lost records of other American League clubs from 1960 thru 1968: Boston (677-770), California (614-679), Chicago (784-666), Cleveland (721-727), Detroit (792-657), Minnesota (incl. Washington in '60) (765-782), New York (807-639), Oakland (nee K.C.) (598-848) and Washington (521-768).

LAST FIVE YEARS: . . . During the last five seasons the Orioles have put together the second best total won-lost record in the majors, 455-352 . . . One National League club has won two more games in this stretch . . . Which one is it? . . . The St. Louis Cardinals who have won three pennants since 1964? . . . Good guess, but wrong . . . It's the San Francisco Giants who have won no pennants but finished in second place four times to accumulate a record of 457-352 . . . The Cardinals are a very close third at 454-354.

SUMMARY OF 1968 SEASON

In 1968, the Orioles took an early lead in the race, fell far back at the halfway point and then put on an impressive drive at the three-quarter mark before settling back to finish a comfortable second.

The O's were sole occupants of first place from May 3 through May 8 with a record of 16-8 on the latter date . . . From that point on, until the All-Star break, the club played at a .473 pace with a 26-29 record and dropped back to third place.

At the All-Star break, with the club 10½ games behind the league-leading Tigers, Earl Weaver replaced Hank Bauer as manager and the club immediately responded by winning 6 straight when play resumed . . . The O's gradually chipped away at the Tigers' lead and moved to within 4 games after taking a two-night doubleheader from Oakland on August 27.

With two games coming up against Washington, a team the O's were 12-0 against for the year, followed by a three-game set with the Tigers, the club appeared ready to make its move . . . However, Frank Howard waylaid the O's with a home run in each game that sent the Orioles down to defeat . . . Meanwhile, the Tigers picked up a pair of wins to run their lead to 6 games when the two clubs opened a 3-game series in Detroit August 30.

Earl Palmer pitched and batted the Tigers to a 9-1 victory in the opening, but Dave McNally turned back the Bengals the following day by a 5-1 score . . . The final game of the series, played on a rainy Sunday afternoon, pitted Jim Hardin against Dennis McLain . . . The Tigers were ahead, 4-2, going into the third when the Orioles quickly scored one run and had Curt Blefary at second, Frank Robinson at first, nobody out and Boog Powell coming to the plate . . . Powell laced a line drive back toward the mound which McLain speared and turned into a triple play . . . That play killed the rally and the season for the Orioles . . . The Tigers went on to win the game, the pennant and the World Series.

For the Orioles, it meant playing out the season and a second-place finish—12 games behind the Tigers . . . Under Weaver, the Orioles had a 48-34 record and occupied second place from July 23 until the end of the season.

1966 WORLD SERIES REVIEW

The Baltimore Orioles have been involved in one World Series since returning to the American League in 1954. That was in 1966 when the Birds swept four straight from the Los Angeles Dodgers to become World Champions. Here is a review of that Series:

Game No. 1—Orioles 5-9-0, Dodgers 2-3-0

A brilliant relief pitching effort by Moe Drabowsky and first inning home runs by Frank and Brooks Robinson carried the Orioles to victory at Dodger Stadium. With one out in the first inning, Dodger starter Don Drysdale walked Russ Snyder and Frank Robinson immediately followed with a home run to left. Brooks Robinson was the next batter and he also homered to left to give the Orioles a quick 3-0 lead. Oriole starter Dave McNally, working on a 4-2 lead in the third inning, ran into control problems and was replaced by Drabowsky. Working the remaining 6-2/3 innings, Drabowsky allowed only one hit and set a Series record by fanning 11. He tied another record with 6 straight strikeouts in the fourth and fifth innings.

Game No. 2—Orioles 6-8-0, Dodgers 0-4-6

Jim Palmer, 9 days short of his 21st birthday, became the youngest pitcher in World Series history to toss a shutout as the Orioles moved 2-up in the Series. A shoddy Dodger defense that committed 6 errors (including three in one inning by centerfielder Willie Davis) aided the Oriole victory, but the day belonged to Palmer. The strong-armed right-hander struck out 6 and walked three as he stopped the Dodgers cold. The Orioles broke a scoreless deadlock in the fifth inning with three tallies, mainly because Davis dropped two fly balls and was charged with a throwing error. The Orioles added another run in the sixth and two more in the eighth to wrap up the game. The losing pitcher was the incomparable Sandy Koufax, appearing in his final game with the Dodgers. Dave Johnson, with a sixth inning single, earned the distinction of getting the final hit off Koufax.

Game No. 3—Orioles 1-3-0, Dodgers 0-6-0

The Orioles extended their Series lead to three games as Paul Blair and Wally Bunker teamed up to give the Orioles the win at Baltimore's Memorial Stadium. Blair belted a 430-foot home run to left-center in the fifth inning to account for the game's only run while Bunker, bothered much of the year by a sore right elbow, fanned 6 and walked only one. Fine defensive plays by leftfielder Curt Blefary and shortstop Luis Aparicio eased Bunker's path to victory. Dodger southpaw Claude Osteen, who suffered the loss, pitched very well as he gave up just three hits and a walk in the seven innings he worked.

Game No. 4—Orioles 1-4-0, Dodgers 0-4-0

The Orioles became World Champions by defeating the Dodgers in four straight as Dave McNally's arm and Frank Robinson's bat brought the Series to an end. McNally, who started the first game and failed to last through the third inning, was brilliant as he retired the Dodgers in order in seven of the nine frames. Robinson, who homered in the first inning of the first game off Don Drysdale, did it again in this game as he unloaded a fourth inning shot deep into the left field seats. The blow not only won the game but earned him the Series MVP award. McNally's pitching stretched to 33 the number of consecutive innings in which the Dodgers were held scoreless. Two great plays by the centerfielders highlighted the defensive phase of the game. In the fourth frame, Willie Davis leaped high against the centerfield fence and snared a drive off Boog Powell's bat that was over the top of the barrier. In the eighth inning, Blair, who entered the game as a defensive replacement at the start of the inning, ran to the fence in leftcenter and jumped to make a great catch on a ball hit by Jim Lefebvre that appeared to be a home run.

NOTES: The Orioles handled 141 chances in the Series without committing an error . . . Boog Powell was the only player in the Series to hit safely in all four games and paced the hitters with a .357 mark (5-for-14) . . . Orioles' shares as winners amounted to \$11,683.04 while the Dodgers each got \$8,189.35 as losers . . . Orioles voted 34 full shares . . . Orioles used only 13 players in the Series . . . Attendance for the four games was 220,791: 1st game, 55,941; 2nd game, 55,947; 3rd game, 54,445; 4th game, 54,458 . . . Among the more noteworthy records: the 33 consecutive scoreless innings hurled by Oriole pitchers; Drabowsky's 11 strikeouts in relief in 1st game; Willie Davis' three errors in the 5th inning of the second game, which tied the existing mark; Drabowsky's 6 straight strikeouts in the 1st game, which also tied a record; the largest gate receipts for a game (\$557,384 for Game No. 2).

JEROLD C. HOFFBERGER (49), Chairman of the Board since October 1965 . . . Has been president of National Brewing Company since 1947 . . . National holds controlling interest in ball club . . . One of five members of Planning Committee created in December by major league club owners to study and recommend ways to re-structure organized baseball . . . Was instrumental in helping to arrange the transfer of American League franchise from St. Louis to Baltimore in 1953.

Baltimore native . . . Attended University of Virginia . . . Served with U.S. Army in World War II and achieved rank of captain . . . He and wife, Alice, have three boys and one girl . . . Ardent horseman and long time breeder of thoroughbred horses.

Is a director of Maryland National Bank, Sinai Hospital, the United States Brewers Association and several other corporate and civic organizations . . . Member of both the board of directors and executive committee of Fairchild-Hiller . . . Trustee of Johns Hopkins and Mercy Hospitals and Goucher College . . . Also a member of the National Cabinet of the National Jewish Appeal and of the executive committee of the Greater Baltimore Committee . . . Has served as a civilian aide to the secretary of the army . . . Born: April 7, 1919.

ZANYVL KRIEGER (62), Chairman of Executive Committee and Treasurer . . . Was one of principal figures in bringing St. Louis Browns franchise to Baltimore in late 1953, and also played a primary role in re-establishing a professional football franchise in Baltimore earlier that year . . . Subsequently served as a vice-president and director of the Baltimore Colts . . . Has been on Orioles' board from the beginning and became treasurer in 1957. Has been board chairman of the Baltimore Clippers (American Hockey League) since their founding in 1962.

Baltimore native . . . Graduate of Baltimore City College (1924), Johns Hopkins University (1928) and Harvard Law School (1931) . . . Partner in law firm, Krieger and Sweeten . . . He and wife, Isabelle, are parents of two daughters . . . Served four years in U.S. Army Air Force during World War II . . . Was discharged with rank of major . . . Before the war was Assistant Attorney General of Maryland for three years during the tenure of Attorney General William C. Walsh.

Is a director of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, the John F. Kennedy Institute for Rehabilitation of Retarded Children and the National Jewish Hospital, and serves as a trustee of Park School . . . Born: April 1, 1906.

J. FRANK CASHEN (42), Executive Vice-President since joining the Orioles in October 1965 . . . Is organization's principal operating authority and all division and department heads are responsible to him . . .

Baltimore native . . . Graduate of Loyola College (Baltimore) and University of Maryland Law School . . . Member of the Maryland State Bar . . . Worked at the *News-American* for 17 years, 15 of these as a sportswriter . . . Won four national writing awards and is published in "Best Sports Stories" . . .

Was General Manager of Baltimore Raceway (trotting) and the Bel Air Race Course before becoming Executive Assistant to Jerold C. Hoffberger at the National Brewing Company . . . Immediately prior to his present assignment he was Director of Advertising for the brewery . . . He and his wife, Jean, are the parents of seven children, five boys and two girls. Born: September 13, 1926.

HARRY I. DALTON (40), Vice-President and Director of Player Personnel, is responsible for the Orioles' entire player operation at both major and minor league levels . . . Appointed to player personnel post in December 1965 and became a vice-president in January 1966 . . . Joined the ball club in December 1953 as assistant farm director to Jim McLaughlin . . . Elevated in 1961 to the post of Farm Director . . .

Born in West Springfield, Mass. (Aug. 23, 1928) . . . Graduated from Amherst College in 1950 . . . Served 37 months as a U.S. Air Force officer (First Lieutenant) . . . Earned Bronze Star for outstanding work as combat press officer in Far East . . . Was sportswriter with Springfield (Mass.) *Daily News* for five years while still in high school and college . . . He and wife, Pat, have three daughters.

JACK DUNN (47), Vice-President for Business Affairs, supervises the club's ticket sales, stadium operations and concessions . . . Baltimore native . . . Has been directly associated with professional baseball since his early youth . . . Is grandson of the late Jack Dunn who owned and managed the International League Orioles to seven straight pennants from 1919 through 1925 . . . Was president, general manager and part time manager of and player for the pennant winning Centreville Orioles in the Eastern Shore League in 1946 . . . Served at various times as owner, president, general manager and manager of the International League Orioles before the Browns' franchise was shifted to Baltimore in 1953 . . .

Since then has been traveling secretary, assistant to the general manager, public relations director, play-by-play broadcaster, administrative assistant to Lee MacPhail and was appointed to his present position in October 1965 . . . Is third largest Orioles' stockholder . . . Was fighter pilot during World War II . . . Graduate of Boys' Latin School (Baltimore) and Princeton University . . . He and wife, Mary Rose, have one boy and one girl. Born: October 22, 1921.

JOSEPH P. HAMPER, JR. (43), Secretary and Vice-President for Financial Affairs . . . Joined Orioles in February 1954 and became controller in 1958 . . . Was elevated to present position in 1966 . . . Is also Executive Vice-President of the Baltimore Bays (North American Soccer League) . . . Certified Public Accountant . . . Attended Johns Hopkins University . . . During World War II he served in U.S. Infantry . . . During his tour he spent three months as a prisoner of war in Germany . . . Bachelor . . . Born: January 28, 1926.

SPRING TRAINING NOTES

The Orioles return to Miami Stadium for the 11th straight year . . . Last year the Birds averaged 3,147 paid admissions for 15 Miami dates . . . The permanent seating capacity at Miami Stadium is 9,548 but the Orioles and Yankees drew 12,464, including standing room for a Sunday afternoon game on March 14, 1965 . . . The Orioles have played to almost one-half million fans in their ten years at Miami Stadium (461,864).

In 1968, "Boog" Powell led the club in spring training with a .310 average (26-for-84) and 19 RBI . . . Pete Richert, with a 3-0 record, was the leading pitcher.

Some Orioles spring training records: Hitting—Don Lenhardt (.462, 22-for-52) 1954 and Al Pilarcik (.435, 40-for-92) in 1958 . . . Home Runs—8, Tito Francona (1956) and Frank Robinson (1966); Runs Batted In—25, Francona (1956) and Gus Triandos (1959).
