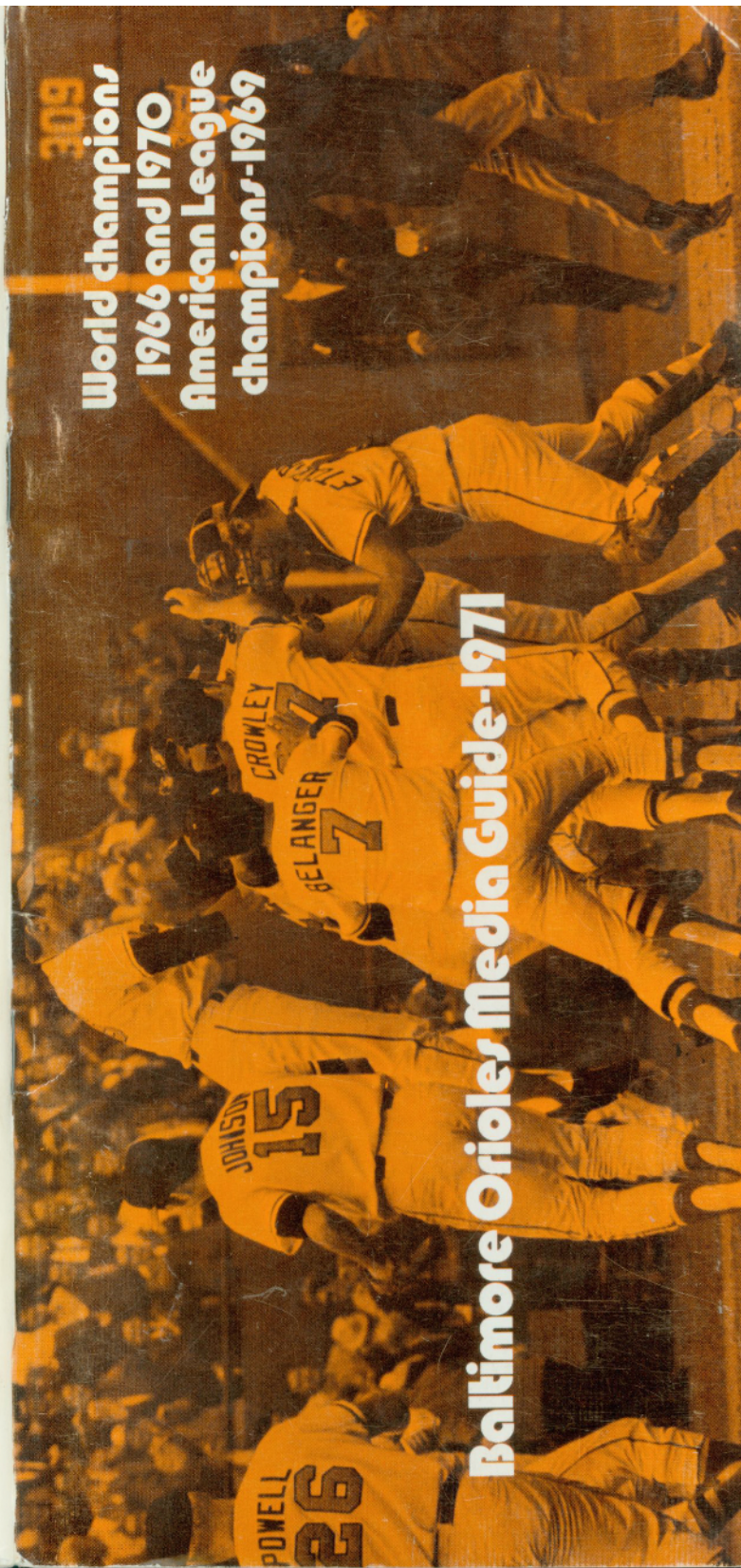

NOTES: The Orioles enjoyed the distinction of having, in 1970, two players win "Minor League Player of the Year" awards. . . . Rochester outfielders Don Baylor and Roger Freed were both so honored. . . . Baylor received THE SPORTING NEWS award after playing in every game (140) and pacing the league in total bases (296), doubles (34), triples (15), and runs (127), while hitting .327 and finishing second in hits (166), two behind Freed. . . . Freed, whose contract was traded to the Phillies for Grant Jackson, Jim Hutto, and Sam Parrilla in December, finished runner-up in THE SPORTING NEWS balloting, but captured the TOPPS CHEWING GUM trophy. . . . Roger led the International League in rbi (130), while hitting .334, with 24 homers. . . . Over the past five seasons, the Baltimore organization has produced four top minor league player winners. . . . In addition to Freed and Baylor, Mike Epstein won in 1966 and Merv Rettenmund in 1968.

In 1970 for the ninth consecutive year (beginning 1962), the Orioles farm system finished over ".500" with a composite record of 354-320, .525. . . . Over the past ten seasons ('61 thru '70), the overall record of Orioles minor league clubs is 4020-3683, .522, tops among all major league farm systems. . . .

In 1970, two Baltimore farm teams won pennants. In each of the past nine seasons at least one Orioles affiliate has captured a league crown, beginning in 1962 (a total of 17 pennant winners in that period). . . . For the third straight year, Miami won the Eastern Division championship of the Florida State League (88-45) and for the second consecutive season, emulated the parent club, by going on to win (two games to none) the league title.

In addition, the Bluefield Orioles in the all-rookie Appalachian League also won the pennant with a 37-19 record. . . . The top two clubs in the Orioles

ATTENDANCE NOTES: The Orioles' largest regular season crowd at home in 1970 was 40,602 for a Friday night game against the Twins on July 17th. . . . In second place was a turnout of 39,322 for a Tuesday, August 4th night game vs. Boston, preceded by an "exhibition" softball game between the Orioles and their wives. . . . Opening day against Detroit on April 10th drew 33,638. . . . The best attended series of the year, featuring three night games against the Yankees on July 7-8-9, attracted 85,317.

On the road the Orioles set a club record for total attendance in one season while leading the American League away from home for the second straight year. The Birds three-date series in Detroit on July 10-11-12 produced the two biggest crowds of the season as well as the largest attendance for one season. . . . The Orioles and Tigers played a Sunday doubleheader on July 12th that attracted 53,959, the third biggest turnout in Orioles history, home or away. . . . On Friday, July 10th, 44,568 watched the two clubs in a single night game. . . . Overall, the attendance for that series was 125,822.

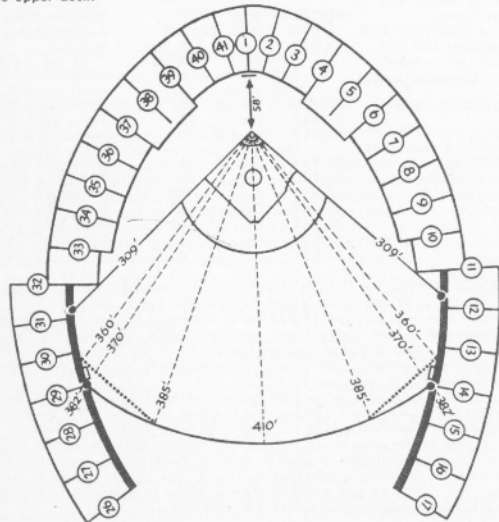

The Birds skipper started Jim Palmer on the mound and Jim responded with three innings of scoreless one-hit pitching . . . Brooks Robinson took over for starter Harmon Killebrew at third in the bottom of the fifth and played the rest of the game, went 2-for-3, scored the A.L.'s second run and tripled in two more that gave the junior circuit a 4-1 lead in the 8th . . . The N.L. tied the game with a 3-run 9th then won in the 12th when Jim Hickman singled Pete Rose home from second . . . The N.L.'s 8th straight win.

In addition Mike Cuellar and Dave McNally were selected to the squad though they didn't pitch and Elrod Hendricks, Pete Richert and Ed Watt went along for batting practice . . . Ralph Salvon was the American League trainer.

Brooks Robinson has appeared in the last 14 all-star games including two each in '60, '61 and '62 . . . His 2-for-3 performance in the '70 game was a forerunner to his fantastic World Series effort . . . Won '66 Arch Ward Memorial Trophy as game's outstanding player with 3-for-4 at bat with a triple and 8-for-8 defensively . . . Was serious contender for same award in '64 and '70 games also . . . His lifetime all-star figures: AB-35, R-5, H-12, 2B-0, 3B-3, HR-1, RBI-5, PO-9, A-25, E-0 . . . Avg. .343 . . . Brooks has started 7 games.

Frank Robinson was selected to the National League all-star teams in '56, '57, '59, '61, '62 and '65 and has been chosen four times in five years in the A.L. including three times as a starter . . . Lifetime all-star average .238 (5-for-21, one HR, one RBI).

Billy O'Dell was selected the outstanding player in the 1958 game played in Baltimore and won by the American League, 4-3 . . . O'Dell retired all nine batters he faced to protect a one-run lead over the last three innings.

1970 HIGHLIGHTS— ORIOLES vs. OPPONENTS

BOSTON: The O's were 13-5 for the year against the Red Sox, including 8-1 at Memorial Stadium.

Longest Day: The O's longest game of the year, from a time standpoint and innings played, was against the Red Sox June 25 at Fenway Park . . . The Orioles scored 5 runs in the 14th to win, 13-8, in an even 5 hours . . . The O's tied a club record with 21 hits.

Great Series: The 4-game set at Fenway Park June 22-25 turned out to be a full serving of entertainment for the fans, with a little bit of everything thrown in . . . In the first game, with a national television audience tuned in, the Sox scored 6 runs in the first to grab a big lead, but the Orioles eventually tied it with 5 tallies in the 7th . . . After the Red Sox scored single runs in the 7th and 8th, the O's rebounded with three in the 9th to win by a 9-8 score.

The following night Ray Culp hurled a three-hitter as Boston won, 5-1 . . . The night after that, the Orioles were ahead 5-1 going into the last of the 7th when Boston broke loose with 5 runs to win, 6-5 . . . In the series finale the following afternoon, the two teams went 14 innings before the Orioles scored 5 runs to win, 13-8.

5 Hits: Brooks Robinson had 5-for-5, including two home runs, in the September 4 game at Fenway Park . . . It was the second time in his career he had 5 hits in a game—the other occurrence was more than 10 years earlier (7/15/60 vs. Chicago).

CALIFORNIA: The Orioles won four of six games against the Angels in Baltimore and got a split in their series at Anaheim Stadium to finish with a 7-5 mark against the Angels.

Super Mike: For the second straight year, Mike Cuellar was practically invincible against California . . . He won four without losing while going the distance in each game and posting two shutouts . . . In two seasons against the Angels, he has a 7-0 record with six complete games and three shutouts. In the May 29 game, he tied a major league record with four strikeouts in an inning.

Blair Hit: Oriole centerfielder Paul Blair suffered a multi-fractured nose, damage to his left eye and other facial injuries when he was struck by a pitch from Ken Tatum May 31 . . . Blair underwent surgery at St. Joseph's Hospital in nearby Orange, Cal., was kept there 8 days and spent three weeks on the disabled list before returning to action June 21 vs. Washington.

Tight Games: Six of the 12 games between the two clubs were decided by one run, with each team winning three.

CHICAGO: The Orioles beat the White Sox 9 times in 12 games during 1970 . . . The O's won five of six at Memorial Stadium and four of six in Chicago.

Blair's Blasts: Paul Blair became the third Oriole in club history (joining Boog Powell and Curt Blefary) to smash three home runs in a game when he did it against the White Sox April 29 at Comiskey Park.

Powell Power: Boog Powell had the White Sox on his side in the MVP voting, after what he did to them during the year . . . He ripped Chicago pitching for a .405 average (15-for-39) with 6 homers and 17 rbi in 12 games . . . In the past two seasons, he has a .432 average vs. Chicago with 14 home runs and 31 runs batted in.

Top Output: The O's had their best single-game run production of the year against Chicago April 29 when they beat the White Sox, 18-2.

Ellie's Series: Ellie Hendricks had a great series July 19-20 vs. the Sox when he had 5-for-10 in three games with two doubles, two home runs (one a grand-slam) and 8 runs batted in.

CLEVELAND: The Orioles started the year with 8 straight victories against the Indians and finished with a 14-4 record, posting 7-2 marks in Baltimore and Cleveland.

Opening Day: Dave McNally started off the 1970 season for the O's with an 8-2 win over the Indians on Opening Day, setting a personal career high with 13 strikeouts.

Lucky Sevens: The Tribe scored 7 runs on 7 hits in the 7th inning of the August 7 game to deal the O's a 10-4 setback.

Club Twenty: Jim Palmer joined Mike Cuellar and Dave McNally in the circle of 20-game winners when he pitched a four-hitter while beating the Indians, 7-0, on September 20 . . . His triumph enabled the Orioles to become the first club to have three 20-game winners on its staff since 1956 when Cleveland did it with Early Wynn, Herb Score and Bob Lemon.

Life at 40: Dick Hall observed his 40th birthday September 27 by working three perfect innings against the Indians to gain credit for a 4-3 victory, his 10th of the season.

DETROIT: The Orioles were 11-7 against the Tigers in 1970, faring much better at home than in Detroit . . . The Orioles won 7 of 9 at Memorial Stadium but were only 4-5 at Tiger Stadium.

Big Gathering: A crowd of 53,959—Detroit's largest home crowd in 9 years and the biggest of the season to see the O's play—jammed Tiger Stadium to see the July 12 twin-bill . . . They saw the Tigers win the opener, 7-3, but the Orioles bounced back in the nightcap to rout Denny McLain en route to a 13-3 victory . . . Dick Hall worked 6.1 innings of relief in the second game and held the Tigers to one hit.

No Power—No Game: An East Coast power shortage forced a postponement of the Orioles-Tigers scheduled night game September 23 at Memorial Stadium . . . The game was played the next afternoon and the O's won, 7-4, as Paul Blair was a one-man power supply with four hits, including a pair of home runs.

Cut Short: The Orioles started the 1970 season with five straight wins before the Tigers dealt them their first setback on April 12, 7-2.

1970 HIGHLIGHTS— ORIOLES vs. OPPONENTS

KANSAS CITY: The Orioles were 12-0 against Kansas City in 1970 and set a major league record by increasing to 23 the number of consecutive victories over the Royals . . . KC won the first game ever played between the two clubs (May 9, 1969) but the O's have won every one since then.

Tough Job: Despite the lopsided margin the O's held in 1970, the wins did not come easily . . . Five of the victories were by one run and four others by two runs . . . The Orioles took a three-game series from the Royals in Kansas City in mid-July and all three wins were by one run.

Home Run Show: There were 19 home runs in the first four games of the year between the two clubs, as the O's hit 11 . . . In the April 24 game, the first meeting of the year between the two teams, the Royals hit four and the Orioles three.

Close Call: The Royals on May 7 came within one out of ending their losing streak at 16 against the O's . . . KC led, 6-4, with two outs in the 9th . . . After pinch-hitters Terry Crowley and Merv Rettenmund drew walks, Frank Robinson unloaded a three-run homer to win it for the Orioles.

Bufford—Hero: The Orioles scored 5 runs in the first inning of the April 26 game but needed a three-run home run by Don Buford in the 8th to earn a 10-9 victory over the Royals.

Ejected: Frank Robinson was tossed out of the April 26 game by Umpire Jim Odom following an argument about called strikes . . . Robinson was thrown out after he neatly placed his bat on the plate and stalked away . . . His ejection was the only one all season involving an Oriole player.

MILWAUKEE: The Orioles took the season series from the Brewers, 7-5, but had their share of problems with the expansion club, especially at Memorial Stadium . . . The O's were 2-4 vs. the Brewers in Baltimore.

Grand Slams: Merv Rettenmund and Don Buford both belted grand-slam homers against the Brewers in 1970 . . . Rettenmund hit his on June 15 and Buford got his in the second game of an August 28 twin-bill . . . Both were hit in Memorial Stadium.

Big Gene: The Orioles dropped two of three decisions to Gene Brabender, their one-time teammate . . . Brabender has a 4-3 mark against the O's the last two seasons.

Whiffs: Southpaw Pete Richert turned in a splendid relief performance in the nightcap of the August 28 twi-nighter . . . He worked the last three innings and fanned 6 of the 9 batters he faced, to gain the win.

Big Gun: Merv Rettenmund smashed 6 home runs off Milwaukee pitchers.

MINNESOTA: There was only one club that had a winning margin against the O's in 1970—Minnesota . . . The Orioles dropped 7 of 12 decisions to the Twins, including 4 of 6 at Memorial Stadium . . . Despite the lack of regular-season success against the Twins, the O's swept three straight from the Western Division champions in the A.L. Championship Series.

The Leader: Harmon Killebrew hit 6 home runs against the Orioles in 1970 to run his career total vs. Baltimore to 60.

Name Game: Hall beat Hall when the Orioles defeated the Twins, 6-5, on July 25 . . . Dick got the win, Tom took the loss.

Top Crowd: The Orioles' top turnout of the year at home, 40,602, saw the Twins edge the O's, 6-5, on July 17.

End of Streak: The Orioles had an 8-game winning streak ended by the Twins, 5-4 in 10 innings, on May 13 at Metropolitan Stadium.

All But One: The Orioles had 16 hits in their 11-1 victory over the Twins July 26 and all but one were singles . . . The lone extra-base blow was a big one, a grand-slam home run by Boog Powell that broke the game wide open.

Misfortune: Ron Ferranoski was simply great against the Orioles during the regular 1970 season, posting a 2-0 record, recording four saves and not allowing a run in 15.1 innings . . . But he hates to see the Orioles in post-season play . . . No wonder—with the Dodgers in the 1966 World Series and with the Twins in the Championship Series of 1969 and 1970, he has seen his team play 10 games against the Orioles and lose every time.

NEW YORK: The Orioles were 11-7 vs. the Yankees in 1970, compiling a 6-3 record at Memorial Stadium and a 5-4 mark at Yankee Stadium . . . In the past 6 seasons, the Orioles have played .704 ball against New York with a 76-32 record . . . Since 1954, when the Orioles returned to the American League, they have a 168-166 record vs. the Yankees.

Big Finish: Brooks Robinson provided the Orioles with a glorious ending in the July 7 game when he hammered a grand-slam home run in the 10th inning to give the O's a 6-2 victory.

Pitchers' Parade: The two clubs tied an American League record in their August 9 doubleheader at Yankee Stadium when they used a total of 21 pitchers . . . The Yankees employed 12 and the Orioles 9 as the clubs split the twin-bill . . . Both games lasted 11 innings and there were 31 runs, 48 hits and 7 errors during the day.

Drama: The Yankees were one strike away when victory turned into defeat for them July 8 at Memorial Stadium . . . New York had an 8-6 lead going into the 9th when Frank Robinson led off with a home run to reduce the margin to one run . . . The O's then loaded the bases with no outs, but relief pitcher Lindy McDaniel struck out the next two batters and quickly ran the count to no balls and two strikes against Don Buford . . . On McDaniel's next pitch, Buford singled to right field to score two runs and win the game, 9-8.

Explosion: The Yankees scored 7 runs in the third inning of the May 18 game to down the O's, 10-4.

1970 HIGHLIGHTS— ORIOLES vs. OPPONENTS

OAKLAND: The Orioles won their last five meetings of the year against the A's to capture the season series, 7 games to 5 . . . The O's were 4-2 against the A's at home and 3-3 in Oakland.

No. 20: Dave McNally became the first pitcher in the majors in 1970 to win 20 games when he defeated the A's, 5-1, on August 25 . . . It was the third straight year he reached the 20-victory plateau.

Replay: Sal Bando and Frank Fernandez each homered in the June 3 game as the A's won, 4-1, then the same duo did it the following night when the A's won again, 4-2.

Mark Tied: The O's and A's tied a Memorial Stadium record with 7 home runs in their June 13 game, which Oakland won by a 10-7 score.

WASHINGTON: The Orioles were 12-6 vs. the Senators in 1970 . . . Since 1961, when the current Senators were created, the Orioles have played .678 ball against Washington teams with a record of 122-58.

Unbeaten: Dave McNally won five against the Senators in 1970 without losing to run to 9 his string of consecutive victories over Washington . . . In the past three seasons he has beaten the Senators 12 times in 13 decisions to run his career record to 19-4 against them.

Fastest Game: The Orioles played their fastest game of the year (1:48) on September 17 against the Senators . . . The O's went into that game with the knowledge that they had clinched the divisional title earlier in the day . . . The Senators won, 2-0, behind Dick Bosmar, but that did not temper the customary post-game celebration.

Extra Work: The Orioles and Senators played 5 extra-inning games during the season, with the O's winning four.

Right Spot: Jim Hannan gained credit for victories in relief on consecutive nights, June 27 and 28, against the Orioles.

SUMMARY OF 1970 SEASON

On and on they went in 1970. First they charged through the American League's Eastern Division winning 108 games (and setting a two-year A.L. record with 217 regular season victories). Then they brushed aside Minnesota in three straight games to claim the league crown. Finally, in a confrontation for the biggest prize of all, they junked the Big Red Machine from Cincinnati.

A year before, the Orioles had a shot at it all—and missed. In 1970, following nearly the same pattern, they created a second chance for themselves. This time they grabbed it all.

When the season ended on a jubilant note with the World Series victory over the Reds, the Orioles were rolling along at a high-powered pace unparalleled in the club's history. It really started on September 8 when the Orioles defeated Detroit to initiate a 7-game winning streak. Between that time and the end of the regular season the O's logged 19 wins in 22 games—including the last 11 in succession, the longest streak in Oriole annals. The Orioles had won the Eastern Division title by 15 games as they squared off with Minnesota in the A.L. Championship Series. Just like the year before, the Orioles swept the Twins in three games and ran their winning streak to 14 games.

The Orioles extended that streak to 17 before Cincinnati won the fourth game of the Series and put an end to it. The next day, October 15, the O's started a new streak and ended the season by winning the game and the Series. In five weeks, the Orioles had won 26 of 30 games and were World Champions for the second time in five years.

The Orioles started the year with a winning streak, five games, and moved into first place permanently in the Eastern Division on April 26. At the all-star game respite, the O's had a record of 54-33 and a lead of 6 full games. A week later, July 19, that margin had been trimmed to three games. Exactly a month later the Birds were 11 games on top.

On September 17, the Orioles went to Washington to play the Senators. As they stepped off the bus at RFK Stadium, they learned the Yankees had lost—the Orioles had the divisional title clinched. The Orioles lost that night to the Senators, but it didn't matter. Nor did it temper the first of three upcoming clubhouse victory celebrations.

★ ★ ★

SHRINE OF IMMORTALS: The Shrine, jointly sponsored by the Orioles and Maryland Professional Baseball Players Association, was created in 1960 to recognize men with Maryland backgrounds who have distinguished themselves in professional baseball . . . To qualify, a candidate must either be a native of Maryland or have been a player or official of the Orioles, International or American League, for a minimum of three years . . . One new member is added each year by vote of the MPBPA, providing a candidate receives sufficient support.

There are presently 19 members in the Shrine: Frank (Home Run) Baker, Jack Bentley, Max Bishop, Joe Boley, Jack Dunn Sr., Jimmy Foxx, Lefty Grove, Buck Herzog, Merwin Jacobson, Charlie Keller, Fritz Maisel, Bill Nicholson, Johnny Neun, Babe Phelps, Dick Porter, Jack Ogden, Eddie Rommel, Babe Ruth and Tommy Thomas.

RULES OF INTEREST

FREE AGENT DRAFT RULE—A BRIEF SUMMARY: Major League and National Association clubs participate in two meetings a year for the purpose of drafting free agent player talent . . . Selection of a free agent entitles the club to the exclusive right of negotiation with that player for a specified period (from date of selection until 15 days prior to next draft meeting).

Draft meetings are held in Summer (June) and Winter (January).

There are two phases to each draft meeting:

(1) **Regular Phase**—selection of free agents in inverse order of major league standings . . . Limitations on number of selections by each organization at each level: Major League (1), "AAA" (1), "AA" (1), "A" (unlimited) . . . Minor league clubs select in the same relative order as their parent clubs.

(2) **Special Phase**—selection of free agents who had been drafted at a previous meeting, but who were not subsequently signed before the negotiation right expired . . . It is possible for a club to redraft a player whom it had been unable to sign after the original selection, but only with express written consent of that player . . . Order of selection in the special phase is determined by lot.

SUSPENDED GAME RULE: A game terminated by curfew or by a pre-arranged time limit is a suspended game only if it has progressed far enough to be an official game (i.e. 4½ to 5 innings).

A game terminated by light failure is a suspended game anytime after it begins.

Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension immediately preceding the next scheduled single game between the two clubs on the same ground . . . If this is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in American League Regulation 3.8.

A game called at the END of a completed inning AFTER NINE INNINGS for any reason shall be a SUSPENDED game. This rule became effective in 1969. Formerly, the game would have been declared a tie and replayed in its entirety at a later date.

BALTIMORE CURFEW: Night Games—see A.L. Regulation 3.4 (13)—Saturday night—play must be called at 11:59 P.M. regardless of the game situation . . . All other nights—no inning may be started after 11:59 P.M., but any inning which begins before that time may be completed.

Sunday Games—see A.L. Regulation 3.7—No Sunday game at Baltimore may start before 2:00 P.M.

BATTING/PITCHING (ERA) CHAMPION QUALIFICATION: 502 or more plate appearances. 162 or more innings.

ROOKIE QUALIFICATIONS: To qualify as a Rookie a player may not have spent more than 45 days on a big league roster between cut-down dates (the 31st day of season and Sept. 1), AND may not have exceeded 90 official at bats or 45 innings pitched at major league level.

"SAVE" RULE (10:20): (a) Credit a save to a relief pitcher who enters a game with his team in the lead if he holds the lead the remainder of the game, providing he is not credited with the victory.

(b) A relief pitcher cannot be credited with a save if he does not finish the game, unless he is removed for a pinchhitter or pinchrunner.

(c) When more than one relief pitcher qualifies for a save under the provisions of this rule, credit the save to the relief pitcher judged by the scorer to have been most effective. Only one save can be credited in a game.

ITEMS OF INTEREST

ORIOLES—MAJORS BIGGEST WINNERS: The Orioles have won more regular season games than any other club in either major league over the past 13 years (1958 thru 1970) . . . In that period that Birds are 1167-911 . . . followed in order by: 2-San Francisco (1151-925); 3-New York Yankees (1151-926); 4-Los Angeles (1124-954); 5-Detroit (1114-967); 6-Cincinnati (1112-960); 7-Milw.-Atl. (1105-971); 8-St. Louis (1103-969); 9-Wash.-Minn. (1084-995); 10-Chi. White Sox (1084-998).

During the last two years, the Orioles have won 217 regular season games to set an American League record formerly held by the Yankees of 1927-28 (211) . . . The major league mark is held by the Chicago Cubs of 1906-07 . . . Note: The Yankee and Cub teams, it must be admitted, were playing only 154-game schedules.

The Orioles rise to respectability began in earnest, perhaps, in 1957 when they finished at ".500" for the first time with a 76-76 record after a three-year apprenticeship in Baltimore ('54-'55-'56) during which the Birds were 180-282.

In the 14 years that have followed, the Orioles have won 1249 American League games (if you will allow some statistical sleight of hand here), exactly the same number as the Yankees (but including the Birds six straight playoff wins over the Twins in '69 and '70) . . . Excluding the ALCS victories, Baltimore since the start of 1957 has won 1243 games to rank second in the majors to the Yankees in the 14-year span of its ascendancy.

1970 FINANCIAL STATEMENT: The Baltimore Baseball Club, Inc. earned a net income of \$346,161 during the fiscal year ending October 31, 1970. This is compared to 1969 earnings of \$232,238 (this figure would have been approximately \$90,000 higher except for losses incurred by the Baltimore Bays, a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Baseball Club, disbanded in September '69).

The Baltimore Baseball Club, Inc. declared a 1970 dividend of \$1.40 per common share to stockholders of record 12/4/70 . . . The Baltimore Orioles, Inc., the holding company which owns nearly 74% of Baseball Club, Inc., also declared dividends on the common stock amounting to \$1.40 per share . . . It was the fourth time in 17 years that both corporations had declared dividends.

The National Brewing Company owns nearly 68% of the common stock of Orioles Inc.

ORIOLES TO TOUR JAPAN: The Orioles have formally accepted an invitation to take a month-long exhibition tour of Japan in the fall of 1971.

Mitsuo Mutai, president of the *Yomiuri Shimbun*, the largest newspaper in Japan, issued the invitation to the Baltimore club, and it has been accepted by Jerold C. Hoffberger, the Chairman of the Board of the Orioles, with the consent of Bowie Kuhn, the Commissioner of Baseball.

Plans call for the Orioles to leave for Japan by way of Hawaii in late October 1971. While in Japan, they will play an 18-game schedule against Japanese teams of the Central and Pacific Leagues, the two major leagues of Japanese baseball.

Host club in Japan will be the Tokyo Giants, who have won the Japanese professional baseball championship for the past six seasons. The Giants are owned by the *Yomiuri Shimbun*, and the first game of the tour will be played in Tokyo's Korakuen Stadium against the Japanese titleholders on Saturday, October 23rd. The Giants are led by two of the greatest stars ever produced in Japan, first baseman Sadaharu Oh and third baseman Yetsuo Nagashima. Oh, who is known in the Orient as "the Babe Ruth of Japan," was honored in December at the Major League Awards banquet in Los Angeles.

Sixty members of the Oriole organization have been invited to make the trip, including the wives of the players and front office executives. All expenses of the tour will be defrayed by the *Yomiuri Shimbun*.

A group of United States baseball players visited Japan back in 1913, and, since that time, numerous all-star teams have made the trip. The St. Louis Cardinals were the last club to tour Japan, having made a junket, similar to the one planned for the Orioles, in 1968.

MOST VALUABLE ORIOLES: This award is presented annually by the Sports Boosters of Maryland, based on a vote taken by the announcers and writers who travel with the club . . . Winners have been: Chuck Diering (1954), Dave Philley (1955), Bob Nieman (1956), Billy Gardner (1957), Gus Triandos (1958), Gene Woodling (1959), Brooks Robinson (1960), Jim Gentile (1961), Brooks Robinson (1962), Stu Miller (1963), Brooks Robinson (1964), Stu Miller (1965), Frank Robinson (1966), Frank Robinson (1967), Dave McNally (1968), Boog Powell (1969), Boog Powell (1970).

LONG HOME RUNS/MEMORIAL STADIUM: The longest "measured" home run ever hit in Memorial Stadium was a 471' drive by Harmon Killebrew on May 24, 1964 off Milt Pappas over the hedge in left center field . . . This exceeded by two feet the only other blast that has ever cleared the hedge . . . That was one by "Boog" Powell 469' to the same area off Boston's Don Schwall on June 22, 1962. Aside from these there have been three balls hit into the hedge (approximately 450'), by Mickey Mantle in 1954, by Powell in 1965 and by Frank Robinson in 1967.

Frank Robinson is the only player to have hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium. In the second game of a doubleheader with Cleveland on May 8, 1966, Frank hit a Luis Tiant offering over the left field stands and into the parking lot beyond, a drive that measured 451' on the fly and rolled to a stop 540' away from home plate.

NO-HITTERS: Orioles pitchers have contributed four no-hitters to the club's 17-year history (see page 9) . . . but the Birds, themselves, have been victimized only once—by Bo Belinsky on May 5, 1962 for the Angels at Dodger Stadium, 2-0, over Steve Barber.

Member of both the board of directors and executive committee of Fairchild-Hiller and the United States Brewers Association . . . Trustee of Johns Hopkins Hospital and Goucher College . . . Also a member of the National Cabinet of the National Jewish Appeal and of the executive committee of the Greater Baltimore Committee . . . Has served as a civilian aide to the secretary of the army . . . Born: April 7, 1919.

ZANYVL KRIEGER, Chairman of Executive Committee and Treasurer . . . Was one of principal figures in bringing St. Louis Browns franchise to Baltimore in late 1953, and also played a primary role in re-establishing a professional football franchise in Baltimore earlier that year . . . Subsequently served as a vice-president and director of the Baltimore Colts . . . Has been on Orioles' board from the beginning and became treasurer in 1957. Has been board chairman of the Baltimore Clippers (American Hockey League) since their founding in 1962.

Baltimore native . . . Graduate of Baltimore City College (1924), Johns Hopkins University (1928) and Harvard Law School (1931) . . . Partner in law firm, Krieger and Sweeten . . . He and wife, Isabelle, are parents of two daughters . . . Served four years in U.S. Army Air Force during World War II . . . Was discharged with rank of major . . . Before the war was Assistant Attorney General of Maryland for three years during the tenure of Attorney General William C. Walsh.

Is a director of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, the John F. Kennedy Institute for Rehabilitation of Retarded Children and the National Jewish Hospital, and serves as a trustee of Park School . . . Born: April 1, 1906.

J. FRANK CASHEN, Executive Vice-President since joining the Orioles in October 1965 . . . Is organization's principal operating authority and all division and department heads are responsible to him . . . Elected to Board of Directors in January 1971.

Baltimore native . . . Graduate of Loyola College (Baltimore) and University of Maryland Law School . . . Member of the Maryland State Bar . . . Worked at the *News-American* for 17 years, 15 of these as a sportswriter . . . Won four national writing awards and is published in "Best Sports Stories" . . .

Was General Manager of Baltimore Raceway (trotting) and the Bel Air Race Course before becoming Executive Assistant to Jerold C. Hoffberger at the National Brewing Company . . . Immediately prior to his present assignment he was Director of Advertising for the brewery . . . He and his wife, Jean, are the parents of seven children, five boys and two girls. Born: September 13, 1926.

HARRY I. DALTON, Vice-President and Director of Player Personnel, is responsible for the Orioles' entire player operation at both major and minor league levels . . . Selected major league "Executive of the Year" for 1970 by THE SPORTING NEWS . . . Appointed to player personnel post in December 1965 and became a vice-president in January 1966 . . . Joined the ball club in December 1953 as assistant farm director to Jim McLaughlin . . . Elevated in 1961 to the post of Farm Director.

In game one the Reds established a pattern they followed in four of the five games . . . taking the early lead . . . With Palmer on the hill for Baltimore, the Reds scored once in the first on Johnny Bench's two-out single, after Bobby Tolan doubled . . . The machine's lead ballooned to 3-0 on Lee May's 3rd inning home run. Meanwhile, Gary Nolan set the O's down in order in the first three innings.

However, Boog Powell homered deep into the left field stands in the 4th following a Paul Blair single to reduce the home team's advantage to one. Then Ellie Hendricks reduced it to zero with a game-tying swat to right to lead off inning five . . . Nolan settled down immediately and fanned the side in order (Johnson, Belanger, and Palmer).

Perhaps the most exciting and significant inning of the entire World Series was the Cincinnati 6th . . . First, Lee May, who had homered and singled off Palmer earlier, led off by rifling a ground shot one hop over the bag at third bound for extra bases; but Brooks made a miraculous stop and while his momentum carried him into foul territory, he somehow stopped and threw almost blindly to first without really turning his body. His throw took a perfect astro turf hop right into the stretching Powell's glove and nailed May by a step. The importance of the play soon became apparent.

Palmer then walked Bernie Carbo and gave up a single to Tommy Helms that sent Carbo to third. Ty Cline, a pinch-hit hero in the Reds playoff victory over Pittsburgh, came in to hit for shortstop Woody Woodward, but succeeded only in hitting a dribbler that bounced high in front of the plate . . . Hendricks stepped out to grab it. Umpire Ken Burkhardt also went out to position himself to call it fair or foul and surprise, surprise, Carbo was coming from third . . . Palmer yelled "tag him, tag him," then all hell broke loose . . . Carbo came in on the foul side of the line, Hendricks dove at him from the fair side and both made contact with Burkhardt, who ended up sitting down with his back to the plate. There was no question that Hendricks tagged the runner with his gloved hand, but the ball was in the other and subsequent photos and film proved that Carbo didn't touch the plate on the way in . . . Burkhardt called the runner out (and that's when Carbo finally touched the plate running across it accidentally to argue with Burkhardt). A vehement argument ensued.

After tempers had cooled, both Anderson and Burkhardt handled themselves like big leaguers and the Cincinnati skipper summed it all up when he said, "If Ken hadn't been in the way, Carbo would have been out by a mile."

The score was still tied at 3 when Brooks hit a 7th inning home run off Nolan and that was to be the clincher . . . Palmer allowed Perez to get to second in the bottom of the 7th on a walk and a wild pitch, but nothing happened . . . In the 8th the Reds went down 1-2-3 and in the 9th, Palmer fanned pinch-hitters Jimmy Stewart and Angel Bravo to open the inning, his first two strikeouts of the game . . . However, he then lost Rose on a walk, and Earl Weaver went to Richert to pitch to Tolan . . . It took Pete one pitch to dispose of the Reds centerfielder on a soft liner to Mark Belanger and the Birds led the series 1-0.

The Reds jumped away with three unearned runs in the first off Mike Cuellar . . . The inning featured a two run double by Lee May, an rbi single by Tony Perez, and another safety by McRae plus errors by Belanger and Blair.

In the 3rd, Tolan homered to make it 4-0. After Cuellar walked Johnny Bench, Tom Phoebus replaced him and faced May who bid for another hit with a smash to the hole but Brooks fell to his knees, came up with the screamer, whirled quickly in a clockwise turn and started a brilliant double play to end the Reds threat.

The Orioles got one back on Powell's second series homer in the fourth, then took command in the 5th . . . They scored five times on six hits while sending nine men to the plate . . . With one out Chico Salmon, batting for Phoebus, singled and so did Buford . . . Blair followed suit scoring Chico. McGlothlin was yanked for young Milt Wilcox. Powell greeted him with another run-scoring single, then after Frank went out, Brooks knotted the score with a safety to right.

Elrod Hendricks, a notorious pull-hitter, crossed up the Reds next by slicing a shot down the left field line good for a double, two rbi and a 6-4 Baltimore lead. With Drabowsky now on the mound the Reds didn't threaten in the 5th, but Bench led off with a homer in the sixth to narrow the Orioles lead to one . . . In the 7th, however, Cline singled for Woodward, Bravo sacrificed him to second and Rose walked . . . Lopez came on to face lefty Tolan with the tying and lead runs on and got him on a pop to Brooks. Then Hall was summoned and he retired the side on Perez's force-out grounder.

A pitchers duel between 24-game winners Mike Cuellar and Jim Perry never materialized amid a 23 mph wind and 57° temperature. With the score tied at 2 in the fourth inning Cuellar highlighted a 7-run outburst with a wind-blown grand slam that was unquestionably foul when it left the bat, then acquired distance and direction and curled around the foul pole in right. Don Buford followed immediately with another home run that kayoed Perry. Boog Powell wound up the scoring that inning with still another four bagger, off reliever Bill Zepp, to give the Birds a 9-2 lead.

But it wasn't Cuellar's day on the mound either. The Twins scored one in the home 4th, then rallied in the 5th for three more on a Killebrew homer (437') and a two-run single by George Mitterwald. At this point with just one out, Manager Weaver summoned Dick Hall who forced second baseman Danny Thompson into an inning-ending double play grounder.

Powell's 7th inning single provided the game's only other run while 40-year old Hall finished up allowing just one hit—a single by Tony Oliva—over a scoreless 4²/₃ inning stint. He fanned 3 and walked none, of course. Hall was ably assisted by Paul Blair who made a great long running catch with his back to the plate on Brant Aleya's 430-foot drive to deepest center after Oliva's safety in the 7th. Oliva, who had doubled twice earlier off Cuellar, had also been deprived of yet another hit on one of Blair's over-the-shoulder specialties in the 1st.

Brooks Robinson was 3-for-3 with a double and a sac fly . . . The umpire strike brought veteran umpires John Stevens and Charlie Berry out of retirement and, to fill out the staff, two young umpires, Bill Deegan (Southern League) and Darold Satchell (International League), were drafted . . . Stevens called balls and strikes . . . Hall contributed a single in two trips and scored a run . . . Perry was charged with 8 runs (7 earned) in 3¹/₃ innings.

In one of the closest 11-3 games ever played, the Birds and Dave McNally protected a one-run lead (4-3) from the 4th thru the 8th then staged their second 7-run inning in two days, in the 9th, to ice it.

The Orioles jumped out to a 4-0 lead after 3¹/₂ innings . . . A first inning double by Powell, a two-run homer by Frank Robinson in the 3rd and McNally's single in the fourth provided the early scoring off starter Tom Hall.

However, after McNally walked lead-off man Leo Cardenas in the 4th, he yielded successive bombs to Killebrew and Oliva and with none out the Baltimore lead had been trimmed to one. McNally then retired the side in order and despite frequent trouble (Twins had at least one runner in each inning from the 5th thru the 9th) he blanked Minnesota the rest of the way.

A clutch play by Merv Rettenmund kept the Twins from tying it in the 5th. McNally issued a one out walk to Stan Williams (the third Twins pitcher), then Cesar Tovar and Cardenas singled. When Williams tried to score from second on Cardenas' safety, Rettenmund nipped him at the plate with a perfect strike to Andy Etchebarren. McNally followed by getting Killebrew on a pop-up to end the inning.

In the 8th, an inning before the O's big outburst, Ron Perranoski came in to pitch (his fifth appearance in as many ALCS games over two years). Operating on intelligence information picked up the day before from Jim Frey and Eddie Watt, Weaver requested that plate umpire Tom Haller (the strike had been settled before the game and the regular arbiters returned to work) inspect the vet reliever's pitching hand. Haller found evidence of an illegal foreign substance and ordered Perranoski to the clubhouse for a thorough cleansing (the rules empowered Haller to eject Perranoski from the game) . . . When Perranoski returned, he gave up a lead-off single to Brooks and a couple of other hard-hit balls but retired the side without damage.

In the 9th, however, Perranoski's year-long success against the O's ended abruptly (credited with 34 saves and 7 wins in the regular season overall, he was 2-0 with 3 saves while pitching 15¹/₂ scoreless innings vs. Baltimore) . . . In the 7-run 9th, he was blasted for 5 of the Orioles tallies.

After McNally led off with a double, Buford singled him to 3rd. Following a strikeout, a walk to Frank loaded the bases . . . Boog then hit a 2-run double and Rettenmund singled in another. Tiant came on to relieve and threw up a 3-run homer to Dave Johnson, after an error by Cardenas had admitted the 4th score of the inning.

Whereas the first two games of the ALCS seemed much closer than the final scores of 10-6 and 11-3, game three was rarely in doubt. Jim Palmer, who has now pitched complete game victories to clinch all three of the Orioles American League titles ('66, '69 and '70), scattered 7 hits and 3 walks while striking out 12.

The Birds started fast and by the end of three innings led 5-0. Buford greeted starter Jim Kaat with a lead-off single in the first and scored two outs later on a Powell single. In the second, centerfielder Jim Holt failed to catch Palmer's fly ball and it dropped for a two-base error; then Buford doubled over Tovar's head in left to score Palmer . . . In the 3rd, Brooks opened with a double—the second of his 3 hits—went to third on a single by Johnson and scored on a grounder to short, but only after he had jostled Cardenas' throw to the plate out of catcher Paul Ratliff's possession. The Birds' final run resulted from a 7th-inning homer by Johnson off Perry, the Twins fourth and final pitcher.

The Twins didn't really have scored at all. In the 5th Tovar's fly ball dropped for a triple when Frank lost it in the sun and Cardenas followed with an rbi single.

Although it was a Monday afternoon, the third-game crowd of 27,608 was better than either of the weekend crowds in Minnesota . . . The Orioles did not commit an error in the three games while the Twins were charged with six.

Paul Blair was 0-for-12 in the ALCS before coming up with a scratch infield single the last time up. Paul then went on to lead the O's in hitting during the World Series with a .474 average . . . In 1969 he had hit .400 in the playoffs then slumped off to .100 in the World Series.

Orioles pitchers more than held their own at the plate . . . Collectively they went 5-for-13 (.385) with a double, a home run, 4 runs scored and 6 rbi.
