FARM SYSTEM NOTES

BEST MINOR LEAGUE RECORD OVER LAST DECADE: The 1971 season was the best ever for the Orioles farm system from the standpoint of wins and losses. The overall records of the Birds' six minor league clubs was 401-292, 579, and further strengthened the Orioles claim to the best won-lost record among all minor league systems over the past decade: 3874-3339, 537, 1962 thru 1971. Note: the Orioles have the best major league record over the past 15 seasons.

Three of the six clubs won everything in sight, another finished a solid second and only two teams failed to contend. The Rochester Red Wings finished first in the International League, then captured successive Shaughnessy Playoffs from Syracuse and Tidewater, and finally defeated Denver, the American Association kingpin, to win the best of seven Junior World Series.

The Miami Orioles won their division championship for the fourth straight year while winning 94 games (more than any other minor league club) then captured their third straight Florida State League title by successfully battling through two rounds of playoffs. The Bluefield Orioles in the Appalachian Rookie League also won their league title and Dallas-Ft. Worth finished second in the Texas League. The Stockton (California) and Aberdeen (Northern) clubs finished "out of the money."



FIELDING NOTES: In 1971 the Orioles finished in second place in team fielding behind Detroit (.983) with a .9814 percentage (finishing just slightly ahead of four other clubs who also had a .981 figure). The Orioles have finished first ('68, '64, '66, '69) or second ('60, '61, '68, '70, '71) in fielding percentage nine times in the last 12 seasons.

Though no individual Oriole finished first at his position in percentage, four were chosen for Rawlings "Gold Glove" awards by vote of American League managers and coaches as the best in the league at their positions. They were: Brooks Robinson (for the 12th straight time), Paul Blair and Dave Johnson (each for the third straight time), and Mark Belanger (for the second time in three years) . . In all, these four players have accumulated a total of 11 "Gold Gloves" in the past three seasons.

Brooks Robinson holds the following major league lifetime records as a third baseman: Most Games, Lifetime—2182; Most Assists, Lifetime—4628; Most Chances Accepted (excluding errors), Lifetime—6791; Most Double Plays, Lifetime—479; Highest Fielding Average, Lifetime, 1000 or More Games—971.

In addition, he also holds the following records: Most Games, Season (A.L.)—163 (1961 & 1964): Most Years Leading League in Games (M.L.)—8; Most Years Leading League in Fielding Percentage (M.L.)—9 (1960 thru 1964, 1966 thru 1969); Most Years Leading League in Assists (M.L.)—7 (tied with Ron Santo).

When Brooks committed three errors in the 5th inning of a July 28th, 1971, game against Oakland (two on wild throws and one on a fumbled grounder), he didn't even get into the record book. The American League record for errors in one inning is four set by a fellow named James T. Burke for Milwaukee in 1901.

Jerry Adair established three major league records for second basement with the Orioles: Highest Fielding Percentage, 150 or More Games—985 (1964); Fewest Errors, Season (150 or More Games)—5 (1964); Most Consecutive Chances Accepted Without Error—458 (7/22/64 thru 5/6/65) and Most Consecutive Errorless Games—89 (7/22/64 thru 5/6/65).

As a team the Orioles hold two significant major league records both set in 1964: Highest Fielding Percentage, Season—985, and Fewest Errors, Season—95. On a more dubious note, the Birds also hold the modern major league mark since 1900 for Most Passed Balls, Season—49, set in 1959 when Hoyt Wilhelm was with the club.

Triple Plays: The Orioles have executed only three triple plays in 18 American League seasons. The most recent one occurred on August 6, 1969, and it was on an "around the horn" ground ball hit by K.C. Royals catcher Eliseo Rodriguez from Brooks to Dave Johnson to Boog Powell. The other two triple plays were on line drives, in 1959 and 1955.

1971 HIGHLIGHTS-ORIOLES vs. OPPONENTS

BOSTON: The Orioles and Red Sox split 18 games, each winning six and losing three at home.

Same Ending: In the final game of the regular season, the O's blanked the Red Sox, 1-0, to wind up the campaign just as they did the year before—with 11 straight wins.

Sonny Shines: Sonny Siebert did it all for the Red Sox against the Orioles during the course of the year . . . He beat the O's four times without losing and was a terror at the plate as he socked Orioles pitching for four home runs and 11 rbi.

Foul: The Boston chapter of the Baseball Writers Association of America lodged a formal complaint with the Baseball Commissioner after NBC-TV was allowed to take a camera into the Orioles bullpen at Fenway Park during a game May 15, with color man Tony Kubek conducting interviews.

Twin-Bill Action: In a doubleheader before 40,267 at Memorial Stadium May 23, the O's had their biggest inning of the year as they scored seven times in the 4th enroute to a 12-3 win in the opening game . . During the game, home plate umpire John Rice issued warnings to Jim Palmer and Steve Nagy about low bridge pitches . . . In the nightcap, plate arbiter Bill Kunkel called George Scott out on three pitches and then tossed out coach Eddie Popowski and manager Eddie Kasko after they argued violently about the calls.

Big Weekend: The O's and Red Sox drew 112,696 in four Fenway Park dates during the July 25-27 weekend, highlighted by a day/night doubleheader June 26.

CALIFORNIA: The Orioles were 7-5 vs. the Angels, winning four of six decisions at Memorial Stadium and splitting six at Anaheim Stadium.

Inside Job: Dave Johnson hit an inside the park homer against the Angels in the first game of a July 25 doubleheader at Memorial Stadium, the only such homer of the year among the Orioles.

Sudden Ending: Roger Repoz unloaded a grand slam home run off Dick Hall in the last of the 9th inning to give the Angels a 7-4 win April 24 at the Big A.

CHICAGO: The Orioles won twice as many as they lost to Chicago during the year, posting an 8-4 record, including five wins in six games at Memorial Stadium.

The Buford incident: Don Buford was the focal point of a skirmish at Comiskey Park May 31 . . . In the 8th inning of the second game of a doubleheader, after earlier hitting two home runs, Buford was struck in the back by a pitch from Bart Johnson and then charged the mound . . Buford carried the bat with him but there were no blows struck and both stayed in the game . . When Buford went to his position in left field in the bottom of the inning, he was the target of garbage, paper and parts of seats that came flying out of the stands.

In the 9th inning, as he was in the on deck circle, Buford went to the box seat railing and admonished a fan for using abusive language . . . At that time a fan crossed the field from the third base side and jumped Buford, who was immediately aided by practically the entire Orioles team. Buford was ejected, the fan was taken away and the Orioles scored five runs in the inning.

Two nights later, when the clubs played their next game, Buford was bood lustily each time he batted. There were some firecrackers and smokebombs thrown in his direction and some home made signs appeared, but no further trouble developed.

Lengthy Streak: Starting with the game in which the problem involving Buford took place, the Orioles ran off nine straight wins before the White Sox ended the streak June 12 in Baltimore . . When the streak started, the O's were in second place one and a half games behind Boston—when it ended they were in first place by four games and stayed there the rest of the year.

As Ally, Despite gatting dowed frequently during the year the Orioles.

An Ally: Despite getting doused frequently during the year, the Orioles had the rainmaker on their side in a game August 26 at Memorial Stadium . . . The O's were leading, 8-7, going into the 9th inning when the White Sox scored twice to take the lead . . . However, it rained for the next hour and a half, the game was finally called, the inning was never finished and the score reverted to the 8th inning with the Orioles the victors.

CLEVELAND: The Orioles were 13-5 for the year against the Indians, winning six of nine at home and seven of nine in Cleveland.

Clincher: The O's clinched the Eastern Division title with a 9-2 victory over the Indians in the opener of a twi-night doubleheader September 24 in Cleveland . . . Mike Cuellar got the win, his 20th.

Brilliant: Dave Leonhard, in his first appearance with the O's following his recall from Rochester four days earlier, pitched 8.1 innings of one hit ball in relief to beat the Tribe, 11-3, in the first game of a twi-night doubleheader July 10 at Memorial Stadium . . . The only safety off him was a 9th inning single by Chris Chambliss.

K's: Jim Palmer (13) and Sam McDowell (11) struck out 24 batters between them in a game July 1 . . . Neither, however, was around for the decision, won by the Indians, 3-2, as both worked eight frames.

Historic Feat: Three of the Orioles "Big Four" won their 20th games in Cleveland in one weekend series: Cuellar (9/24—first game), Dobson (9/24—second game), and Palmer (9/26).

DETROIT: The Orioles were 8-10 vs. Detroit, compiling a 5-4 record in Baltimore and a 3-6 mark at Tiger Stadium . . . Detroit was the only club that had a winning record against the Orioles for the season.

No. 500: Frank Robinson's 500th career home run came against Detroit in the night cap of a twin bill at Memorial Stadium September 13... The two run blow was in the 9th inning against Fred Scherman... Robby got No. 499 in the first game against Mike Kilkenny.

Suspended Game: The O's and Tigers battled through 13 innings June
28 before the game was halted by curfew at Memorial Stadium . . .

Mickey Lolich and Brooks Robinson were the heroes in the nationally

and made only one mistake—he served up a three run homer to Robby in
the last of the 9th that tied the game . . . There were two outs, two on
and no balls and two strikes when Brooks homered . . . The game was
completed the following evening when the Tigers scored five in the 15th
to win, 9-4 . . . In the regularly scheduled game that night, the O's
bounced back with a 15-6 win, the most runs they scored in a game
all year. all year.

Mickey's Year: Mickey Lolich beat the Orioles four times in five decisions during the year to run his career record to 18-9 against the O's.

KANSAS CITY: The Orioles were 6-5 vs. the Royals with one game cancelled because of weather . . . The O's were 4-1 at home but only 2-4 in Kansas City.

Record Streak: The Orioles' 23-game winning streak against K.C., longest of its kind in major league history, ended April 30 when the Royals scored a run in the 9th inning for a 5-4 victory... It was the first win for the Royals over the Orioles since May 9, 1969, when the clubs met for the very first time.

One Hitter: Mike Cuellar threw a one hitter against the Royals May 12 Baltimore . . . The only hit off him was a 3rd inning single by Jerry

Monsoon Help: Rain may have prevented an Orioles loss, or denied a possible victory, in the O's-Royals game of August 1... The O's trailed, 2-0, in the bottom of the 5th inning. K.C. hurler Al Fitzmorris walked Ellie Hendricks to start the inning, then fanned the next two batters... Mike Cuellar, batting for himself, had two strikes when he delivered a single to right field, then Don Buford walked to load bases... Rain intervened at this point and put an end to the game.

Merv's Mark: Merv Rettenmund hit .483 for the year against the Royals with 14-for-29.

Dandy Dave: Making his first start for the O's in two years, Dave Leonhard blanked the Royals on five hits, 4-0, July 22.

MILWAUKEE: The Orioles had a 9-3 record against the Brewers, including six wins without a loss at Milwaukee's County Stadium.

Comebacks: In a three game series in Milwaukee August 16-18, the Brewers took the early lead in each game but the Orioles rallied to win each time and swept the series.

May Day: Former Orioles outfielder Dave May had a productive twin bill against the O's August 29 in Baltimore . . . He went 4-for-4 in the first game and 2-for-4, a home run and triple, in the nightcap.

Hot Series: Ellie Hendricks went 8-for-11 in three games against the Brewers June 4-6 at Milwaukee.

MINNESOTA: The Orioles went 10-2 against the Twins, winning five and losing one both home and away.

DJ's "Cousins": Dave Johnson hit .405 against the Twins for the year with 17-for-42 . . In 44 games against the Twins dating back to June 30, 1968, he has batted .399 with 59-for-148.

Mike Cuellar and Jim Kaat matched pitches for 10 innings June 9 before the O's won, 2-1.

Hammerin Harmon: Slugger Harmon Killebrew smashed two home runs off Mike Cuellar August 10 at Metropolitan Stadium—the first one was No. 500 in his career . . Despite the homers, Cuellar beat the Twins, 4-3 . . . The home runs boosted Killebrew's career total vs. Baltimore

Wild Game: The Orioles beat the Twins, 11-8, in a runfest at Metropolitan Stadium May 29... The O's led at one point, 7-0, then allowed the Twins to gain the lead before rebounding for the win ... Former Twins hurler Dave Boswell, in his first Orioles appearance, gained credit for the victory.

NEW YORK: The Orioles posted an 11-7 record against the Yankees, winning six of nine in Baltimore and five of nine at Yankee Stadium.

Streak Stopped: Pat Dobson had a 12-game winning streak halted by the Yankees August 6 when he lost by a 12-3 score . . . It was his first setback since losing to Chicago June 12.

Big Attraction: The Orioles and Yankees drew 112,681 in four dates at Memorial Stadium June 17-20.

Grand Slam: Brooks Robinson unloaded a grand slam home run off Roger Hambright in the 8th inning to give the O's a 6-2 victory September 16.

Gloved Assist: Ellie Hendricks' towering drive to right-center field in the June 17 game at Memorial Stadium went off Bobby Murcer's glove and over the fence for a home run that gave the O's a 3-1 victory . . . Hendricks hit well against the Yankees throughout the year as he had 14-for-33, a .424 average.

1971 HIGHLIGHTS— ORIOLES vs. OPPONENTS

OAKLAND: The Orioles won their last five against Oakland to finish with a 7-4 record . . . One game was cancelled . . . The O's were 3-2 at home and 4-2 in Oakland.

Bat Hero: Brooks Robinson was a home run hero twice against the A's within a nine day period . . . He belted a grand slam homer July 18 as the O's won by a 7-3 score, then unloaded a two run homer with two outs in the 9th to give the Orioles a 6-4 win July 27 . . . However, the next night was his—

Worst Ever: It was a game Brooks Robinson would like to forget . . . He committed three errors, all in the same inning, and at the plate hit into two doubleplays and fouled out to the catcher . . . It did not matter, though, because the O's won, 3-2.

Burned Fingers: Righthander Rollie Fingers lost three games—two in succession—to the Orioles during the year, all on late inning home runs . . . Don Buford tagged him with a 3-2 loss on an 8th inning solo homer April 29 . . . Brooks Robinson's 9th inning homer gave the O's a win in the nightcap of a July 27th twin bill, and the very next night Frank Robinson hit one over the fence in the last of the 9th to give the O's a dramatic 3-2 victory . . . Robinson's home run followed singles by Don Buford and Mery Rettenmund and came on the first pitch from Fingers, working in relief.

Gate Sale High: A club record 31,626 tickets were sold at the gate for the Orioles May 9 doubleheader with the A's at Memorial Stadium . . . A crowd of 43,307 that day, the best home turnout of the year for the O's, watched the A's win the two games.

TEXAS: The Orioles were 13-3 against the Senators, when the team was in Washington . . . The O's were 6-1 at home (with two games cancelled) and 7-2 at RFK Stadium.

Two of a Kind: Dave McNally and Jim Palmer both had 4-0 records against the Senators for the season . . . In McNally's case, the wins raised his lifetime mark to 23-4 against the Senators, including 13 in succession and 16 of 17 . . . The last time the Senators beat him was September 12, 1968.

Quickie: The Orioles played their fastest game of the year (1:48) against the Senators in the first of two July 6 at Memorial Stadium . . . Fans arriving a few minutes late missed the explosion because Don Buford, Brooks Robinson and Merv Rettenmund homered in the 1st inving.

Milestone; Frank Robinson's three run homer in the July 8 game was the 2,500th hit of his major league career.

1971 SEASON SUMMARY

Looking for a match to light the fuse? Would a ball in the back do?

Coincidentally or not, the second game of a doubleheader in Chicago, May 31, in which Don Buford got drilled in the back by a pitch from Bart Johnson set the Orioles off and winging in 1971. In that game, the Orioles started a nine game winning streak which swept them from second place into first for good and on to their third straight American League pennant.

Until the day Buford was struck by Johnson's pitch, which happened after he had belted two home runs, the Orioles had been a second place club for a month (4/30 thru 6/1) and trailed Boston at one time by as much as four games.

In the nine game winning streak the O's overtook the Red Sox in a week and kept right on going. They took over first place permanently on June 5th. The Birds clinched the Eastern Division title with an opening game win over Cleveland in a doubleheader September 24 and finished the season 12 games in front of second place Detroit. In mid-September, the Orioles experienced a brief slump, losing six out of seven (including five straight to Detroit) from September 13th thru 18th and their lead over the Tigers dropped to five games (9/18). Then the O's won 11 straight.

As a tune up for the 1971 American League Championship Series, the Orioles followed the identical pattern of the year before as they won their last 11 regular season games in succession. In the showdown match for the pennant and a role in the world series, the Orioles moved by Oakland just as they did Minnesota in the two previous championship series—in three straight games.

The Orioles won the first two games of the 1971 World Series against Pittsburgh and appeared on their way to successfully defending their world championship. Then came Clemente, Blass, Kison, Robertson, et al.

JOURNEY TO JAPAN

Just three days after losing the world series in seven games, the Orioles embarked on a 31-day trip, spanning more than 20,000 miles, to play 18 games against the best players and teams in Japan.

While traveling to 14 different cities via airplane, train, bus, ferry boat, and hydrofoil, the Orioles won 12 games, lost two, and tied four before an estimated 450,000 fans.

The trip was sponsored by the Yomiuri Shimbun, one of the largest newspapers in the world and owners of the perennial Japanese champion Tokyo (Yomiuri) Giants. Included in the official traveling contingent which landed in Tokyo via a Japan Airlines DC-8 on October 21st were: Commissioner Bowie Kuhn, American League President Joe Cronin, Orioles' Board Chairman Jerry Hoffberger and Executive Vice President Frank Cashen, Umpire Jim Honochick, Manager Earl Weaver, two coaches, 24 Orioles players, Trainer Ralph Salvon, five additional Orioles officials, Major League Public Relations Director Joe Reichler, two newspapermen (Ken Nigro of the Baltimore Sun and Al Cartwright of the Wilmington News-Journal), and many wives.

The Orioles' principal opponent on the tour was the Giants, kingpins of the Central League, who had just' won their seventh straight Japan (Nippon) Series by defeating the Pacific League titlists, the Hankyu Braves, four games to one. The Giants have won 12 national championships since the present two league structure was adopted in 1950 and have finished first in their league 26 times in the 36 years since professional baseball was inaugurated in Japan in 1936.

In head to head competition, the Orioles did not lose to the Giants. The Birds won eight and tied three (all in extra innings) vs. Yomiuri. Against combination teams and all star groups, the Orioles were 4-2-1.

Boog Powell emerged from the tour as the Birds most productive hitter. Still suffering from a painful wrist injury at the start of the trip, Powell was only 2-for-15 in the first four games, but then went on to lead the club in home runs (six) and rbi (14) while hitting .397 (23-for-58). The big first baseman just missed the "triple crown" when Elrod Hendricks, finishing with a rush (seven hits in his last 11 at bats), wound up leading the club in hitting with a .400 average (16-for-40). The only other Oriole to hit over .300 was Tom Shopay (.375, 6-for-16). Brooks Robinson finished second in homers with five, while Frank Robinson and Don Buford were second in rbi with 11 each.

Two of the Orioles' 20-game winners, Mike Cuellar and Pat Dobson, were 3-0 in Japan. Dobson established a first in the long Japanese-American baseball rivalry when he pitched a no-hit, no-run game against the Giants in the city of Toyama on November 2nd. In his first three starts, which also included a rain shortened five inning shutout, Dobson limited the Giants to one run and just five hits in 23 innings. In his fourth and final outing, however, the Giants caught up to him and Pat retired after four innings. (The game finally ended in a tie.)

Cuellar pitched the most innings, 31.2, did not allow a home run, and boasted the lowest era among starters, 2.27.

Jim Palmer was 2-1 in five starts and one of his victories was a shutout, but the hard throwing righthander was saddled with wildness throughout (27 walks in 29 innings). Dave McNally, whose left arm had become tender during the world series, pitched only once but produced seven shutout innings and picked up a win.

Despite five shutouts, Manager Weaver was forced to go to the bullpen often (he used 42 pitchers in the 18 games) and, in a losing cause near the end of the next to last game, Jerry DaVanon volunteered to make his pitching debut by working the last 2.2 innings. Jerry has decided to remain an infielder.

The two best known and highest paid Japanese players are 31-year old first baseman Sadaharu Oh and third baseman Shigeo Nagashima, 35, both Giants.

Oh has won 10 straight Central League home run crowns and in 13 seasons has hit 486 roundtrippers. He has led the league six times in rbi, three times in hitting, and has been elected myp five times.

Nagashima, who reportedly earns \$135,000 annually (\$15,000 more than his teammate Oh), has also won five mvp awards (in fact, nobody but these two has been so honored since 1962) to go with six batting titles (including 1971), five rbi crowns, and two home run championships.

Although he led the Giants with three home runs, Oh hit only .111 against the O's (6-for-54) while continuing to battle a slump that had, in the regular season, brought him below ".300" for the first time in (Continued on page 26)

nine years. Nagashima, after a slow start, wound up with a .268 percentage (16-for-62), but looked much better than that while leading the Japanese in rbi with eight. The Giants' leading hitter on the tour was right fielder Tamio Suetsugu who belted Orioles pitching at a .319 clip (15-for-47).

The Giants most impressive hurler was workhorse Tsuneo Horiuchi, a 23-year old righthander, who worked in six games, pitched 47 innings, yielded 44 hits, and compiled an era of 3.64, while striking out 27.

Touring American professional baseball teams began visiting Japan as early as 1913, when John McGraw's Giants and Charles Comiskey's White Sox stopped off while on an around the world junket. On five other occasions since then major league all star teams have played with great success in Japan.

It was in 1953, however, that a formal program under the direction of the Yomiuri and Mainichi newspapers was inaugurated to bring entire big league ballclubs to the Far East.

The Orioles were the ninth team to make this tour which is now (since 1966) sponsored exclusively by the Yomiuri Shimbun.

The Japanese, in trying to choose a top flight club on each occasion, have been exceptionally farsighted (the selections must be made well in advance) in picking pennant winners, five of them in all. However, their goal of hosting a "world championship" team has never been fulfilled.

In 1955, the Yankees made the trip after losing the world series to the Dodgers. The following year, ironically enough, the Dodgers went over, after losing to the Yankees. The Dodgers again went to Japan as National League champions in 1966, but this time after losing four straight aames to the Orioles in the world series.

In 1968, the Cardinals were tapped, and not only finished first in the National League, but also took a three to one lead in the world series before dropping the last three games to Detroit. And, of course, in 1971, the Orioles (who were selected by Yomiuri the year before) won their third straight American League title, and jumped off to a two to nothing lead in the series before the Pirates caught them and went on to win in seven games.

ALL STAR NOTES: The Orioles played a big role in the American League's 6-4 win over the National League in the 42nd all star game in Detroit. Frank Robinson's two run homer in the 3rd off Dock Ellis put the A.L. ahead to stay and Frank was subsequently voted the Arch Ward Memorial Award as the game's outstanding player. Frank and Brooks Robinson were both starters (voted by fans) on the winning club managed by Earl Weaver for the second straight year, and Brooks played the whole game while going 1-for-3; Jim Palmer and Mike Cuellar both contributed scoreless two inning stints to protect the A.L.'s lead and Don Buford was 0-for-1 as a pinch hitter. Boog Powell was also elected to the starting team but withdrew because of injury and Norm Cash replaced him.

The A.L. had to come from behind to win its first all star game since 1962. Vida Blue, the starting pitcher, yielded a two run homer to Johnny Bench in the 2nd, and a solo blast to Henry Aaron in the 3rd to give the N.L. a 3-0 lead. In the home half of the 3rd, Reggie Jackson hit a tremendous shot to right field off Ellis with Luis Aparicio, on base via a single, scoring ahead of him. Moments later in the same inning Rod Carew walked, then Frank poked another Ellis pitch into the right field seats to give the A.L. a 4-3 lead.

In the 6th, Harmon Killebrew contributed still another two run swat to put the A.L. in a commanding position. Roberto Clemente closed out the scoring with a bases empty blast in the 8th off Mickey Lolich.

In addition to winning the "mvp" award, Frank also became the first player ever to hit home runs for both leagues in all star competition. Frank, incidentally, was the third Oriole to be tapped as the outstanding player . . . Billy O'Dell in 1958 and Brooks Robinson in 1966 were similarly honored . . . Frank's lifetime average is .261 (6-for-23).

For Brooks, who received more votes than any other A.L. player (1,110,469), it was his 15th straight all star game dating back to 1960 (and including two games each in '60, '61, and '62). His lifetime all star figures: AB-38, H-13, R-5, 2B-0, 3B-3, HR-1, RBL-5, AVG.-342; PO-10, A-28, E-0... In 1966, when he won the all star "mvp" trophy he was 3-for-4 with a triple and went 8-for-8 defensively. He was also a serious contender for the award in 1964 and 1970 (when he went 2-for-3, hit a triple, scored a run and drove in two others).

In his two all star game appearances ('70 & '71), Palmer has pitched five scoreless innings and allowed but two hits and one walk, while striking out five.

RULES OF INTEREST

FREE AGENT DRAFT RULE—A BRIEF SUMMARY: Major League and National Association clubs participate in two meetings a year for the purpose of drafting free agent player talent . . . Selection of a free agent entitles the club to the exclusive right of negotiation with that player for a specified period (from date of selection until 15 days prior to next draft meeting).

Draft meetings are held in Summer (June) and Winter (January).

There are two phases to each draft meeting:

(1) Regular Phase—selection of free agents in inverse order of major league standings . . . Limitations on number of selections by each organization at each level: Major League (1), "AAA" (1), "AA" (1), "A" (unlimited) . . . Minor league clubs select in the same relative order as their parent clubs.

(2) Secondary Phase—selection of free agents who had been drafted at a previous meeting, but who were not subsequently signed before the negotiation right expired . . . It is possible for a club to redraft a player whom it had been unable to sign after the original selection, but only with express written consent of that player . . . Order of selection in the secondary phase is determined by lot.

SUSPENDED GAME RULE: A game terminated by curfew or by a pre-arranged time limit is a suspended game only if it has progressed far enough to be an official game (i.e. $4\frac{1}{2}$ to 5 innings).

A game terminated by light failure is a suspended game anytime after it beains.

Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension immediately preceding the next scheduled single game between the two clubs on the same ground . . . If this is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in American League Regulation 3.8.

A game called at the END of a completed inning AFTER NINE INNINGS for any reason shall be a SUSPENDED game. This rule became effective in 1969. Formerly, the game would have been declared a tie and replayed in its entirety at a later date.

BALTIMORE CURFEW: Night Games—see A.L. Regulation 3.4 (13)
—Saturday night—play must be called at 11:59 P.M. regardless of the game situation . . . All other nights—no inning may be started after 11:59 P.M., but any inning which begins before that time may be completed.

Sunday Games—see A.L. Regulation 3.7—No Sunday game at Baltimore may start before 2:00 P.M.

BATTING/PITCHING (ERA) CHAMPION QUALIFICATION: 502 or more plate appearances. 162 or more innings.

ROOKIE QUALIFICATIONS: To qualify as a Rookie a player may not have spent more than 45 days on a big league roster between cut-down dates (the 31st day of season and Sept. 1), AND may not have exceeded 90 official at bats or 45 innings pitched at major league level.

"SAVE" RULE (10:20): (a) Credit a save to a relief pitcher who enters a game with his team in the lead if he holds the lead the remainder of the game, providing he is not credited with the victory.

(b) A relief pitcher cannot be credited with a save if he does not finish the game, unless he is removed for a pinchhitter or pinchrunner.

(c) When more than one relief pitcher qualifies for a save under the provisions of this rule, credit the save to the relief pitcher judged by the scorer to have been most effective. Only one save can be credited in a game.

ITEMS OF INTEREST

NUMBER "20" RETIRED: The Orioles have retired number "20" immortalized by Frank Robinson these past six years during which the Orioles won four American League pennants and two world series. Frank is the first Orioles player to be honored in this fashion. To the best of our knowledge, the only other baseball players whose uniforms have been retired are the following: Yankees—Babe Ruth (3), Lou Gehrig (4), Joe DiMaggio (5), and Mickey Mantle (7) . . . Indians—Bob Feller (19) . . . Red Sox—Ted Williams (9) . . . Cardinals—Stan Musial (6) . . . Phillies—Robin Roberts (36) . . . Braves—Eddie Mathews (41—but now being worn by Mathews as Braves coach) . . . Giants—Mel Ott (4), Carl Hubbell (11). The uniform of Manager Casey Stengel (37) was retired by both the Yankees and Mets, and the Reds retired manager Fred Hutchinson's number (1).

MOST VALUABLE ORIOLES: It was perhaps fitting that in 1971, the final year the two Robinsons, Brooks and Frank, were to play on the same team, they finished in a consensus tie for the annual "Most Valuable Oriole" award as voted by the writers and announcers who cover the club on a daily basis. Third in the balloting was lead off man Don Buford.

It was the fourth time Brooks had been so honored and the third time in six years that Frank had been chosen. Previous winners by year: Chuck Diering (1954), Dave Philley (1955), Bob Nieman (1956), Billy Gardner (1957), Gus Triandos (1958), Gene Woodling (1959), Brooks Robinson (1960), Jim Gentile (1961), Brooks Robinson (1962), Stu Miller (1963), Brooks Robinson (1964), Stu Miller (1965), Frank Robinson (1966), Frank Robinson (1967), Dave McNally (1968), Boog Powell (1969), Boog Powell (1970).

ORIOLES—BIGGEST WINNERS: Over the past 15 years the Orioles have won more regular season games than any club in either major league. From 1957 through 1971 the Birds are 1344-1044, followed in order by (2) New York Yankees, 1331-1062; (3) San Francisco (New York) Giants, 1310-1082; (4) Los Angeles (Brooklyn) Dodgers, 1307-1097; (5) Detroit Tigers, 1283-1114; (6) Atlanta (Milwaukee) Braves, 1282-1110; (7) St. Louis Cardinals, 1280-1108; (8) Cincinnati Reds, 1271-1117; (9) Chicago White Sox, 1253-1145; and (10) Minnesota (Washington) Twins, 1213-1180.

It was in 1957 that the Orioles began to jell. That year for the first time the Birds finished at ".500", 76-76, after having gone 180-282 in their first three seasons in Baltimore (1954, 55, and 56).

100 WINS: The Orioles have won more than 100 games in each of the last three seasons (109-108-101). Only two other clubs have achieved this feat in the history of major league baseball: the 1929-30-31 Philadelphia Athletics (104-102-107) and the 1942-43-44 St. Louis Cardinals (106-105-105).

TWENTY GAME WINNERS: Only twice in the history of major league baseball have four pitchers on one staff won 20 or more games in one season. Last year of course the Orioles' foursome of Dave McNally, Mike Cuellar, Jim Palmer and Pat Dobson accomplished the feat. The only other occasion was in 1920 (51 years earlier) when a quartet of Chicago White Sox pitchers went over the 20 mark: Urban "Red" Faber-23, Claude Williams-22, Dickie Kerr-21 and Ed Cicotte-21. Despite the accomplishment, the White Sox finished second, two games back of the Indians.

The four Orioles hurlers all won #20 within six days. McNally was first when he reached that level on September 21st (he later won his 21st on September 28th), then in one weekend series in Cleveland, the three others joined him: Cuellar (September 24th, first game), Dobson (September 24th, second game) and Palmer (September 26th).

In 1970, McNally, Cuellar, and Palmer each won 20 or more. In 1969, McNally and Cuellar did it and in 1968 it was McNally alone, giving the Orioles 10 20-game winners in the past four seasons. McNally, of course, has done it four straight times, Cuellar three consecutive seasons and Palmer twice in a row.

LONG HOME RUNS/MEMORIAL STADIUM: The longest "measured" home run ever hit in Memorial Stadium was a 471' drive by Harmon Killebrew on May 24, 1964 off Milt Pappas over the hedge in left-center field . . . This exceeded by two feet the only other blast that has ever cleared the hedge . . . That was one by Boog Powell 469' to the same area off Boston's Don Schwall on June 22, 1962. Aside from these there have been three balls hit into the hedge (approximately 450'), by Mickey Mantle in 1964 by Powell in 1965 and by Frank Pohlipson in 1967.

in 1954, by Powell in 1965 and by Frank Robinson in 1967.
Frank Robinson is the only player to have hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium. In the second game of a doubleheader with Cleveland on May 8, 1966, Frank hit a Luis Tiant offering over the left field stands and into the parking lot beyond, a drive that measured 451' on the fly and rolled to a stop 540' away from home plate.

NO-HITTERS: Orioles pitchers have contributed four no-hitters to the club's 17-year history (see page 9) . . . but the Birds, themselves, have been victimized only once—by Bo Belinsky on May 5, 1962 for the Angels at Dodger Stadium, 2-0, over Steve Barber.

Vida Blue, the A's Cy Young Award winner and principal secret weapon, led 3-0 after three and one-half innings and was still ahead by 3-1 when the Birds erupted for four runs in the home 7th to win the first game of the 1971 ALCS in a come from behind thriller.

Curt Motton, who two years earlier had won game two of the ALCS against Minnesota with an 11th inning single, delivered a clutch two out double off Blue (batting for McNally in the 7th) that tied the game, then Paul Blair followed with another two base hit that drove in both the winning run and an insurance tally.

Blue had only one bad inning thru the first six. That was in the 4th when he allowed three hits (the only safeties the Birds had until the 7th) and two of these, back to back doubles by Dave Johnson and Merv Rettenmund, produced the 0's first run. In only one other inning thru the 6th did he even allow a base runner (the 3rd when he walked Belenger).

Frank Robinson opened the 7th with a walk, then after Blue fanned Powell, Brooks singled, but Etchebarren followed with a fly to right for the second out. Belanger then chipped in with a single to center that scored Frank and set the stage for Motton and Blair.

Oakland's early 3-0 lead developed when, in the 2nd, Sal Bando doubled, Angel Mangual tripled and Dick Duncan doubled in order to produce two runs.

Mangual came back in the 4th with a two base hit that plated Tommy Davis from first with the A's third and final run of the day, which looked very big at the time with Blue on the mound.

Eddie Watt, who finished up for McNally, yielded lead off safeties in both innings he worked but pitched out of trouble both times and finished with a flourish in the 9th when, with none out and Bando on first, he forced Mangual to bounce into a double play, then fanned pinch hitter Mike Epstein for the final out.

When the Orioles won league titles in 1966 and again in 1969 and 1970, it was Jim Palmer who went the route to win the clincher. In 1971 it was the same old story.

Though three Oakland homers, two by Reggie Jackson, kept the A's in the ballgame until the end, Palmer turned on the gas in the 9th and fanned the side in order (Tenace, Hegan, Blefary) to nail down Baltimore's fourth pennant in six years.

A's Manager Dick Williams chose Diego Segui to start game three. His two aces, Vida Blue and Jim Hunter had already pitched, and 15-game winner Chuck Dobson was unavailable because of injury. Segui loaded the bases in the very 1st inning with two walks sandwiched around a single by Paul Blair, but held the O's to a single run on a sacrifice fly by Ellie Hendricks.

Jackson's first home run tied the game at one-all in the 3rd. Then in the 5th Brooks Robinson's two run single with the bases loaded put the O's ahead to stay and Segui shortly departed. Bando's homer in the 6th cut the lead to one (3-2), but the O's scored twice more in the 7th on an rbi double by Frank Robinson and another on a Darold Knowles wild pitch and now led 5-2.

Oakland threatened only once more. In the 8th, Jackson led off with his second home run and Mike Epstein singled, but Bando followed with a double play grounder and Palmer was in full command thereafter.

It was, of course, the third straight three game sweep of the ALCS by the Orioles since that annual event was inaugurated in 1969.

A pitchers duel between 24-game winners Mike Cuellar and Jim Perry never materialized amid a 23 mph wind and 57° temperature. With the score tied at two in the 4th inning Cuellar highlighted a seven run outburst with a wind blown grand slam that was unquestionably foul when it left the bat, then acquired distance and direction and curled around the foul pole in right. Powell's 7th inning single provided the game's only other run while 40-year old Hall finished up allowing just one hit—a single by Tony Oliva—over a scoreless four and two-third inning stint. He fanned three and walked none. Hall was ably assisted by Paul Blair who made a great long running catch with his back to the plate on Brant Alyea's 430-foot drive to deepest center after Oliva's safety in the 7th.

Brooks Robinson was 3-for-3 with a double and a sac fly . . . An umpire strike brought veteran umpires John Stevens and Charlie Berry out of retirement and, to fill out the staff, two young umpires, Bill Deegan (Southern League) and Darold Satchell (International League), were drafted . . . Stevens called balls and strikes . . . Perry was charged with eight runs (seven earned) in three and one-third innings.

In one of the closest 11-3 games ever played, the Birds and Dave-McNally protected a one run lead (4-3) from the 4th thru the 8th then staged their second seven run inning in two days, in the 9th, to ice it.

The Orioles jumped out to 4-0 lead after three and one-half innings ... A 1st inning double by Powell, a two run homer by Frank Robinson in the 3rd and McNally's single in the 4th provided the early scoring off starter Tom Hall.

However, after McNally walked lead off man Leo Cardenas in the 4th, he yielded successive bombs to Killebrew and Oliva and with none out the Baltimore lead had been trimmed to one. McNally then retired the side in order and despite frequent trouble (Twins had at least one runner in each inning from the 5th thru the 9th) he blanked Minnesota the rest of the way.

a clutch play by Merv Rettenmund kept the Twins from teing it in the 5th. McNally issued a one out walk to Stan Williams (the third Twins pitcher), then Cesar Tovar and Cardenas singled. When Williams tried to score from second on Cardenas' safety, Rettenmund nipped him at the plate with a perfect strike to Andy Etchebarren. Whereas the first two games of the ALCS seemed much closer than the final scores of 10-6 and 11-3, game three was rarely in doubt. Jim Palmer, who has now pitched complete game victories to clinch all three of the Orioles' American League titles ('66, '69 and '70), scattered seven hits and three walks while striking out 12.

The Birds started fast and by the end of three innings led 5-0. Buford greeted starter Jim Kaat with a lead off single in the 1st and scored two outs later on a Powell single. In the 2nd, center fielder Jim Holt failed to catch Palmer's fly ball and it dropped for a two base error; then Buford doubled over Tovar's head in left to score Palmer . . . In the 3rd, Brooks opened with a double—the second of his three hits—went to third on a single by Johnson and scored on a grounder to short, but only after he had jostled Cardenas' throw to the plate out of catcher Paul Ratliff's possession. The Birds' final run resulted from a 7th-inning homer by Johnson off Perry, the Twins fourth and final pitcher.

The Twins should not really have scored at all. In the 5th Tovar's fly ball dropped for a triple when Frank lost it in the sun and Cardenas followed with an rbi single.

Although it was a Monday afternoon, the third game crowd of 27,608 was better than either of the weekend crowds in Minnesota . . . The Orioles did not commit an error in the three games while the Twins were charged with six.

The Orioles fell behind early (just like they had done in four of the five games against the Reds in 1970) when Dave McNally's wildness plus a couple of throwing errors (by McNally and Mark Belanger) and an rbi single by Dave Cash netted the National Leaguers three unearned runs in the 2nd.

However, a solo home run by Frank Robinson in the bottom of inning 2, followed by Merv Rettenmund's three run blast (both off starter and loser Dock Ellis) after singles by Belanger and Don Buford, put the O's ahead to stay. Buford added an insurance tally in the 5th with the Birds' third home run, this one off Bob Moose.

McNally continued to struggle into the 3rd yielding a lead off single to Roberto Clemente, then a walk to Willie Stargell. From that point on, however, he was in complete command. He fanned Bob Robertson and Manny Sanguillen then got Jose Pagan on a fly ball to end the inning, enroute to retiring 19 straight and 21 of the last 22 hitters he faced. For McNally who registered a season high total of nine strikeouts it was victory number 16 in his last 17 decisions.

The only base runner after the 3rd was Sanguillen who reached on Belanger's two base throwing error (the third wild toss by the Birds) with one out in the 9th. With the tieing run at the plate, McNally forced Pagan to fly out and then fanned pinch hitter Al Oliver to end the game.

After being rained out in Memorial Stadium on Sunday, the series continued on Monday afternoon. The rainout was no surprise to Baltimoreans. During a soggy season, it had already washed out 14 regular season games plus the first game of the championship series against Oakland.

While the O's scored all their runs on homers in game one, this day they hit nothing but singles, 14 of them, and aided by seven walks and an error scored 10 times in the middle three innings to take an 11-0 lead. Brooks Robinson with three hits and two walks tied a world series record for reaching base while driving in three runs and contributing a typical defensive gem—a diving stop of Manny Sanguillen's lead off grounder in the 8th, followed by a strike to Boog Powell to nip the fleet Pirate catcher at first.

Merv Rettenmund also tied a series mark with two hits in one inning, the six run 5th, and Jim Palmer picked up two rbi with a pair of bases loaded walks. Bob Johnson, the first of six Pirate hurlers, was the loser. Palmer, who yielded seven hits and eight walks, and threw 168 pitches, came out after eight innings. Richie Hebner's three run homer in the 8th cost Palmer his shutout—Jim struck out 10. Dick Hall picked up a save with a scoreless 9th.

The first world series night game ever played (after 397 day games) drew a record baseball crowd for Pittsburgh and the largest TV audience ever for a baseball event, an estimated 62,330,000.

The game, itself, was decided by a pair of 21-year old Pirates: Bruce Kison and Milt May. Kison, who relieved starter Luke Walker in the 1st with the Birds already ahead 3-0, proceeded to pitch six and one-third scoreless innings during which he allowed just one hit and no walks though he did set a series record by plunking three Baltimore batters with pitched balls.

The Pirates battled back to tie the game in the 3rd off Pat Dobson who had not worked in 15 days, and in the 7th, young May, batting for Kison with two on and two out, singled home Bob Robertson with the tie breaking (and winning) run. Premier reliefer Dave Giusti then retired six straight Orioles over the last two innings to preserve the narrow

Walker opened the game by yielding consecutive singles to Paul Blair, Mark Belanger, and Merv Rettenmund. After a Manny Sanguillen passed ball admitted Blair, Frank Robinson was passed intentionally, then Brooks and Boog Powell delivered back to back sacrifice flies before Kison came on to put out the fire.

Consecutive doubles by Willie Stargell and Al Oliver each produced a run off Pat Dobson in the bottom of the 1st, and Oliver picked up a second rbi in the 3rd with a single that plated Hebner with the tieing

Dobson, who had pitched two innings in relief on September 28th but hadn't started since the 24th when he won his 20th game, left with one out in the 6th after yielding 10 hits and three walks, but Grant Jackson bailed the Birds out of a tough spot. Watt came on in the 7th and was the victim of singles by Robertson and Sanguillen (plus a dropped fly ball by Blair which worked out ok because Paul recovered and nailed Sanguillen off second) that preceded May's winning safety.

The most controversial play of the series occurred in the 3rd inning when Clemente, batting with one out and Richie Hebner on first, lined a shot to right field that cleared the inside fence near the foul line. Umpire John Rice who was covering the right field line in this game ruled that it was a foul ball, but to many it appeared to have been fair, and a rubbarb featuring coach Don Leppert and manager Danny Murtaugh ensued. After the argument cooled, Clemente singled putting Hebner in position to score the tieing run on Oliver's subsequent single. Later testimony by fans in the disputed home run area as well as by members of the Pirate bullpen confirmed the accuracy of Rice's call.

Frank Robinson's aching legs produced the winning run in the 10th inning to prevent elimination and tie the series at three games apiece. With Bob Miller, the Pirates fourth pitcher, on the mound, Frank drew a walk with one out. Suffering from a painful Achilles tendon injury in his right foot, Frank nevertheless streaked all the way from first to third on Rettenmund's ground single up the middle. Vic Davalillo's throw to third baseman Hebner might have been in time, but Frank dove to the outside of the bag and evaded the tag. Enroute, he pulled a muscle in his left thigh. left thigh.

Then Brooks hit a 1-2 pitch to medium center. After the catch by Davalillo, Frank came home and slid over safely as Davalillo's two bounce throw hopped high forcing Manny Sanguillen to go up in the air after it.

This dramatic finish concluded an uphill battle for the Birds in this "must" game. Robertson's 2nd inning single following an Al Oliver double and Roberto Clemente's homer in the 3rd gave the Pirates an early 2-0 lead off Jim Palmer. Don Buford led off in the O's 1st with a single, but it wasn't until Brooks singled in the 5th that the Birds hit safely again off starter Bob Moose (thru five innings of this game, the Birds had not scored in 22 straight innings and had managed just four hits in 21) hits in 21).

Palmer, meanwhile, had settled down and pitched shutout ball from the 4th thru the 9th. He was pitching so effectively that manager Weaver declined to pinch hit for him in two threat situations in the 4th and 7th

In the bottom of the 9th, however, Belanger coaxed his third walk of the day (he also singled), and Tom Shopay batted for Palmer but flied out. Then Buford delivered his third hit, a double to right, and Belanger scurried around to third with the potential winning run. At this point Giusti stiffened and retired Dave Johnson on an inning ending grounder.

Dobson came on to pitch the 10th and with one out Cash singled and stole second while Richie Hebner fanned. The O's walked Clemente on purpose, then Dave McNally, who had started the fifth game, came out of the bullpen to make his first relief appearance since July 19, 1969, to face the lefthand hitting Willie Stargell. Dave walked the major league's home run champion, but got Al Oliver, also a southpaw, to fly out to center to end the inning and set the stage for Frank's base running heroics. heroics.

While Steve Blass went the route limiting the Orioles to four hits and a single run, Mike Cuellar pitched almost as well. Thru the eight innings Mike worked, he too yielded just four base hits, but a home run by Roberto Clemente in the 4th after Cuellar had retired all 11 previous Pittsburgh hitters broke the ice, and then in the 8th, a single by Willie Stargell, followed by Pagan's hit and run double that scored Stargell all the way from first, gave the Pirates a 2-0 lead (and, as it turned out, all it took to win). it took to win).

In the first seven innings, the Birds nicked Blass for two harmless safeties: a 3rd inning single by Don Buford and Ellie Hendricks' 5th inning double. In the home half of the 8th, down by two, the Birds finally scored. Hendricks opened with a single thru shortstop (Hernandez was shifted over behind second base) then Belanger looped a single to center. With none out, Tom Shopay, who set a record for most pinch hitting appearances in a series, batted for Cuellar and sacrificed the runners to second and third. When Buford bounced to Bob Robertson at first, Hendricks scored. But with the tieing run on third, Blass retired Dave Johnson to end the inning.

Pat Dobson took the mound in the 9th and picked up two quick outs before yielding back to back singles to Robertson and Manny Sanguillen. McNally then came on for the second straight day in relief (as had Dobson) and got Stargell on a ground ball to keep the Birds in the game.

However, Blass was up to the final challenge and set down Boog Powell, Frank Robinson, and Merv Rettenmund in order to give Pittsburgh its fourth world championship in six world series. All four Pirate series wins have been in seven games.

Roberto Clemente, voted the outstanding player in the 1971 World Series, Koberto Clemente, voted the bustanding pure in the 1771 trolla deller, contributed two homers, one triple, two doubles, and seven singles plus four rbi to the Pittsburgh offense. Overall, he was 12-for-29 (.414) while hitting sofely in all seven games. The 36-year old superstar from Puerto Rico has hit safely in all 14 world series games he has played (1960 & 1971).

many ways, Steve Blass was equally valuable to the Pittsburgh effort. With the Pirates down two games to none, he pitched a three hitter in game three while going the route in a 5-1 win. Then with everything hinging on game seven, Blass again pitched a complete game and limited the Birds to one run—this time on just four hits. Statistically, he worked 18 innings, gave up two runs and seven hits, struck out 13 and walked only four.

In game one the Reds established a pattern they followed in four of the five games . . . taking the early lead . . . With Palmer on the hill for Baltimore, the Reds scored once in the 1st on Johnny Bench's two out single . . . The lead ballooned to 3-0 on Lee May's 3rd inning home run. Meanwhile, Gary Nolan set the O's down in order in the first three innings.

However, Boog Powell homered deep into the left field stands in the 4th following a Paul Blair single to reduce the home team's advantage to one. Then Ellie Hendricks reduced it to zero with a game tieing swat to right to lead off inning 5.

Perhaps the most exciting and significant inning of the entire World Series was the Cincinnati 6th . . . First, Lee May, who had homered and singled off Palmer earlier, led off by rifling a ground shot one hop over the bag at third bound for extra bases; but Brooks made a miraculous stop and while his momentum carried him into foul territory, he somehow stopped and threw almost blindly to first without really turning his body. Umpire Ken Burkhart also went out to position himself to call it fair or foul and surprise, surprise, Carbo was coming from third . . . Carbo came in on the foul side of the line, Hendricks dove at him from the fair side and both made contact with Burkhart, who ended up sitting down with his back to the plate. There was no question that Hendricks tagged the runner with his gloved hand, but the ball was in the other and subsequent photos and film proved that Carbo didn't touch the plate on the way in . . Ed Watt who came on in the 8th yielded two hits in the 9th but worked out of the jam forcing the game into extra innings . . . The O's threatened but didn't score in the 10th . . . In the home half, Dick Hall yielded a lead off double to Grote . . . Weis was intentionally passed and Pete Richert came on to face J. C. Martin, batting for Seaver Martin dropped a bunt down the first base line; Richert fielded it but his throw hit Martin in the back and rolled into right field, allowing Gaspar (running for Grote) to score the winning run from second. Subsequent photos showed that Martin was running out of the three foot lane during that last 45-foot stretch to first when the ball hit him, but umpire Crawford did not see it that way.

Robinson, who homered in the 1st inning of the first game off Don Drysdale, did it again in this game when he unloaded a 4th inning shot deep into the left field seats. The blow not only won the game but earned him the series myp award. McNally's pitching stretched to 33 the number of consecutive innings in which the Dodgers were held scoreless. Two great plays by the center fielders highlighted the defensive phase of the game. In the 4th frame, Willie Davis leaped high against the center field fence and snared a drive off Boog Powell's bat that was over the top of the barrier. In the 8th inning, Blair, who entered the game as a defensive replacement at the start of the inning, ran to the fence in left-center and jumped to make a great catch on a ball hit by Jim Lefebvre that appeared to be a home run.

MINOR LEAGUE PLAYER OF THE YEAR: Every year, The Sporting News and Topps Chewing Gum independently present awards to the "Minor League Player of the Year". . . Last year, both organizations chose Bobby Grich who became the fifth player from the Orioles' system to have won either or both of these trophies in the past six years. In 1966, Mike Epstein won them both and in 1968 Merv Rettenmund did the same . . Then in 1970, Don Baylor was tapped by The Sporting News, and Roger Freed, who played in the same Rochester outfield with Baylor, was selected by Topps.

NEW CLUBS: There will be three new franchises in the Birds' six club minor league system in 1972. Asheville, N. C., of the Southern League will replace Dallas-Ft. Worth which was dissolved when the Washington Senators became the Texas Rangers. The Lodi club, owned by the Tokyo (Lotte) Orions of the Japan Pacific League, will work with the Birds in the California League as a substitute for the Stockton team which is now associated with the Angels; and a replacement will be found for the Aberdeen, S. D., franchise which went out of business when the four team Northern League folded during the winter. This ended, incidentally, the longest working agreement in the history of professional baseball. The Orioles and their predecessors, the St. Louis Browns, had worked with the Aberdeen club continuously for 27 seasons.

The acquisition of the Lodi franchise by the Tokyo Orions represents another step, according to the parent club president Nagayoshi Nakamura, toward the achievement of their ultimate goal, the establishment of a "real" world series between Japanese and American teams. The Orions took a first step last spring when they trained in Arizona and played a full schedule of exhibitions against major league clubs training in that area, and are returning again to the U.S. this spring.

The Orions (owned by the Lotte Corporation, a major producer of chewing gum and candy in Japan) will provide a general business manager, George Yoshinaga, and three players from their own farm system, while the Baltimore organization will supply the field manager, Jim Schaffer, and the rest of the Lodi players.

THE FRED HOFMANN MEMORIAL AWARD: Named in memory of the long time Orioles scout and former major league catcher who died in 1964 at the age of 70, this award is presented annually to a member of the Orioles' scouting and player development staff for outstanding service and dedication to the baseball "profession."

The 1971 honoree was Aberdeen, Maryland, native Cal Ripken who has spent 17 of his 36 years in the Baltimore organization. He first joined the system as a catcher in 1956, and began the transition to managing in 1961. Since then he has piloted Orioles farm clubs in eight different cities, managed the Birds' Clearwater entry in the Florida Winter Instructional League, and this spring will be field coordinator for the minor league spring training camp at Biscayne College, before going on to manage the Orioles' "AA" farm club at Asheville, N. C., in the Southern League.

Previous winners of the Hofmann Memorial Award were: Barney Lutz (1965), Walter Youse (1966), Earl Weaver (1967), Jim Russo (1968), Don McShane (1969), Harry Dalton, honorary (1969) and Arthur Ehlers (1970).

THE BARNEY LUTZ PLAYER AWARD: The Orioles established this award in 1968 to honor Barney Lutz, an Orioles scout who died suddenly two years earlier. It is given each year to a player in the Baltimore minor league system "in recognition of his aggressiveness, competitive spirit, hustle and dedication to professional baseball."

The 1971 winner was 23-year old second baseman Rick Emard wolayed last year at Miami and Dallas-Ft. Worth where he hit .267 and .297 respectively. Other winners: 1968—infielder Billy Scripture; 1969—pitcher Fred Beene; and 1970—infielder Paul Flesner.

1971 FINANCIAL STATEMENT: The Baltimore Baseball Club, Inc., earned a net income of \$321,453 during the fiscal year ending October 31, 1971. This represented a decrease of \$23,708 from 1970 earnings of \$345,161. In fiscal 1969 the corporation earned only \$232,238. However, that figure would have been approximately \$90,000 higher except for losses incurred by the Baltimore Bays, then a wholly owned subsidiary of the Baseball Club (disbanded in 1969).

The Baltimore Baseball Club declared a 1971 dividend of 50¢ per share. The Baltimore Orioles, Inc., the holding company which owns approximately 74% of the Baltimore Baseball Club, Inc., declared a 40¢ dividend. It was the fifth time in 18 years that both corporations have declared dividends (including the last three years).

The National Brewing Company owns nearly 68% of the common stock of Baltimore Orioles, Inc.

AWARDS: Orioles players have won three American League "Most Valuable Player" Awards in the past eight years: Brooks Robinson (1964), Frank Robinson (1966), Boog Powell (1970). . Both Brooks and Frank have also earned Sport Magazine's award as outstanding player in the World Series ('70 & '66), the prestigious Hickok Belt ('70 & '66), and the Arch Ward Trophy as outstanding players in the all star game ('66 & '71).

In 1969, Mike Cuellar was co-winner, along with Denny McLain, of the Cy Young Award given annually to the best pitcher(s) in each league. The Birds have also cleaned up on "Gold Gloves," having won 11 in the past three years (see page 16 for details).

In one seven day stretch from July 29th thru August 4th there were four postponments, one other game was shortened to five innings after delays totaling nearly two hours, another game was played to completion despite a 32-minute interruption, and still another was played without a break during a constant downpour. There was only one game in that period played without the influence of the elements.

At the end of that homestand, it was estimated that more than 100,000 rain-At the end of that nonnestand, it was estimated that were rained out were a Vida Blue-Jim Palmer matchup for which 35,000 tickets had been sold, and the second annual players-wives softball game night. Actually the softball game was played, but the 31,000 fans actually in their seats went home moments later when a massive cloud burst erased the main event just before the first pitch.

The largest crowd of the year was 43,307 for a "Bat Day" game against the A's on May 9th (Vida pitched also) . . . A Sunday doubleheader between the Orioles and the Red Sox, who were leading the Birds by three games at the time, pulled 40,267 and a June 18th "Ball Night" date against New York drew

The O's-Yankees series of June 18-19-20 was played to a total audience of 112,681, the third largest count for a home series in the Birds' 18-year history.

The "Opening Day" attendance for a Senators game on Wednesday afternoon, April 7th, was 36,423.

The top 1971 crowd on the road was 37,829 for a night game in Detroit on July 2nd. A total of 112,696 watched the Orioles and Red Sox in a four game series at Fenway Park July 25-26-27. See also page 18.

For the first time in the Orioles 19-year history, all the players in their system will be training in the same community. While players on the Orioles roster are conditioning in Miami Stadium, the other athletes in the Baltimore organization (Rochester, Asheville, Lodi and Miami rosters) will be training some 140 blocks north (starting approximately March 15th) on the campus of Biscayne College.

The Orioles and Biscayne College have entered into a five year agreement during which the college will provide playing, housing and boarding facilities for both minor league players and staff each spring. The Miami Dolphins also conduct their pre-season training at Biscayne College.

In recent years, the Orioles top farm club, the Rochester Red Wings, has trained at Daytona Beach while the other minor league clubs in the system worked out in Fernandina Beach near Jacksonville.
