



BEST MINOR LEAGUE RECORD: For the 11th straight year the Orioles minor league system finished with a composite record of better than ".500" (.387-.314, .552) . . . During the period '62 thru '72, the O's farm clubs were 4261-3653 (.538), the best won-lost percentage in this span among all major league farm systems (the O's major league club owns the best record over the past 16 years).

1972 SEASON: In 1972 for the third time in seven years and the second year in a row the Orioles were awarded the Topps "Baseball Organization of the Year" trophy. The Birds had also earned the distinction in both '66 and '71. The winner of this annual award is determined by a formula that emphasizes the quality of individual prospects in a baseball system rather than team won-lost records.

Overall three Orioles farm teams finished in first place: Asheville, Miami and Lewiston. The Miami Orioles (73-57) after winning the FSL's southern division title, captured two rounds of playoffs against Tampa (Reds) and Daytona Beach (Dodgers) to win their fourth straight league championship.

Asheville (81-58) won the Southern League's eastern division championship, but lost to Montgomery (Tigers) for the league title. The Lewiston club (54-26) won the championship of the Northwest League which did not hold post-season playoffs.

Elsewhere in the system, Rochester (76-68) wound up fourth in the regular International League season, then was eliminated in the first round of Shaughnessy playoffs. Lodi (67-73) finished 3rd and 6th in the California League's split season system and the Bluefield O's in the all-rookie Appalachian League finished fifth in an eight team loop, but, with a 36-32 record, were only 4½ games off the top.

FARM SYSTEM NOTES

MINOR LEAGUE PLAYER(S) OF THE YEAR: The Asheville Orioles' Mike Reinbach who led the AA Southern League in seven different offensive categories was co-winner of the annual J. G. Taylor Spink Memorial Award presented by the Topps Chewing Gum Company. Reinbach, an outfielder, shared the honor with Albuquerque's first baseman Tom Paciorek (Dodgers). It was the first time in the 13 year history of this presentation that co-winners were selected (by vote of National Association Baseball Writers), and it was only the second time that a player has been chosen from "AA" ranks.

Reinbach became the sixth Orioles farmhand in the past seven years to be honored as "minor league player of the year" either by Topps with its Spink Award, or by *The Sporting News* which chooses its own candidate (by vote of TSN staff members). (Do you see the irony here?) . . . It started for the Orioles in '66 when Mike Epstein won both awards . . . In '68 Merv Rettenmund was also a dual winner . . . In '70 there were two different selections, but both were Orioles prospects: Don Baylor was tapped by TSN while Roger Freed, a Rochester teammate, was the Topps winner . . . Bobby Grich captured both trophies in '71 . . . Reinbach was co-winner of the Topps trophy last year, but Paciorek was the exclusive choice for the TSN award.

INDIVIDUAL AWARDS/LEAGUE LEADERS: Reinbach who led the Southern League in batting (.346), runs (123), hits (169), total bases (301), doubles (32), home runs (30) and rbi (109) was selected as the "mvp" in his league as well as co-winner of the Topps trophy. In addition 24-year old speedster Al Bumby (the fastest player in the Orioles system) also earned significant honors. Bumby jumped from Asheville to Rochester in June, then went on to lead the International League in batting (.345) and triples (15). He was chosen "player of the year" in the International League.

Here are some other league leaders from the Orioles farm system in '72—**Asheville, Southern:** Paul Mitchell (rhp), wins (16) . . . **Lodi, California:** Larry Harlow (of), walks (90) and stolen bases (63) . . . **Miami, Florida State:** Chuck Heil (1b/of), hits (134); Orlando Pena (rhp), wins (15) . . . **Lewiston, Northwest:** Jim Buckner (of, brother of Dodgers' Bill, selected to the Topps Class A all star team), average (.345), hits (113), doubles (17), triples (12), home runs (18), total bases (208) and runs (75); Nate Clayton (of), rbi (58) and stolen bases (50) . . . **Bluefield, Appalachian:** John O'Rear (ss, Birds 2d selection in regular phase of '72 summer draft), triples (9); Blake Doyle (2b, brother of Phillies second baseman Denny Doyle and O's 4th choice in '72 summer draft, regular phase), stolen bases (20).

Cal Ripken (Asheville) . . . The 37-year old former catcher has spent 17 years with the Orioles organization as player, coach and manager . . . He returns to Asheville this year after winning the eastern division title in the Southern League a year ago. Cal has managed in the Orioles system since '61 in such places as Leesburg (FSL), Aberdeen, S.D. (Northern), Tri-City (Northwest), Miami (FSL), Elmira (Eastern), Dallas-Ft. Worth (Texas), Rochester (International) and Clearwater (Fla. Instructional) . . . He has twice won pennants: at Aberdeen ('64) and Tri-City ('65) and in both years was elected "manager of the year." In addition to managing, Cal also serves as field coordinator for the Birds minor league spring training camp at Biscayne College in Miami. As a player Cal had a lifetime batting average of .253 for six seasons and progressed as high as "AAA". He began in '57 at Phoenix (Arizona-Mexico), was a playing manager in '61 and '62, then retired from active status after the '62 season. Cal is a native of Aberdeen, Md. and still lives there with his wife, Val, and four children: Ellen; Cal, Jr.; Freddie and William Oliver.

Bobby Malkmus, 41, former infielder with the Braves ('57), Senators ('58, '59) and Phillies ('60 thru '62), will manage the Miami Orioles this season after leading the Lewiston club to a Northwest League pennant in '72, his first year in the Orioles organization. Since his retirement as a player after the '66 season (at the time he was in the Phillies minor league system), he has managed in the Philadelphia and Montreal organizations . . . He is not new to the FSL, having managed the West Palm Beach Expos in '71 . . . Malkmus makes his home in Union, N. J. with his wife, Ruth, and children: Robin and James.

George Farson, like Cal Ripken, is a catcher turned manager. The 31-year old from Vernon Hill, Va. will return to Bluefield where he began his managing career last year. Farson will also serve as a staff member at the Birds minor league complex at Biscayne College. As a player, he caught for ten years in the Baltimore system, from Bluefield to Rochester. George and his wife, Sarah, live in Vernon Hill during the off-season with their three children: Tammy Lynn, Sandi Lea and Michael.

FRED HOFMANN MEMORIAL AWARD: Named in memory of the long time Orioles scout and former major league catcher who died in '64 at the age of 70, this award is presented annually to a member of the Orioles' scouting and player development staff for outstanding service and dedication to the baseball "profession."

Last year the Hofmann Award was presented to Frank McGowan, the Birds' long time New England Scouting Supervisor and a former International League Orioles outfielder and manager. McGowan, 69, a New Haven, Conn. resident who has scouted for the O's since '54, played professionally for 21 years including five seasons in the big leagues with the Philadelphia A's ('22 and '23), St. Louis Browns ('28 and '29) and Boston Bees ('37).

Previous winners of the Hofmann award were: Barney Lutz ('65), Walter Youse ('66), Earl Weaver ('67), Jim Russo ('68), Don McShane ('69), Harry Dalton, honorary ('69), Arthur Ehlers ('70) and Cal Ripken ('71).

Frank Robinson became the second player in history to hit consecutive grand slams on 6/26/70 at R.F.K. Stadium in Washington, in the 5th off Joe Coleman and 6th off Joe Grzenda. Since then, Jim Northrup (Detroit) has duplicated that feat. Four other players (Lazzeri, Tabor, York and Cloninger) have hit two grand slams in a game, but they were not on consecutive plate appearances.

Brooks Robinson who has hit more at Memorial Stadium (4) than any other player once blasted bases loaded homers in successive games—at Dodger Stadium off Angels' Ken McBride on 5/6/62 and at Memorial Stadium off the K.C. A's Ed Rakow on 5/9/62.

One of Dave McNally's two grand slams was hit in the '70 World Series, off the Reds' Wayne Granger (3rd game) . . . Dave's was the 12th grand slam in series history, but the only one ever hit by a pitcher . . . Mike Cuellar hit his grand slam in the '70 ALCS off the Twins Jim Perry in Met Stadium . . . Mike remains the only player ever to hit a bases loaded home run in championship series competition in either league.

Four opponents have hit two grand slams in Memorial Stadium: Roy Sievers (Wash.), Bill Skowron (N.Y.), Mike Epstein (Wash.) and Rico Petrolcelli (Bos.) . . . In all, opponents have hit 43 grand slams off Baltimore pitching including 23 in Memorial Stadium . . . Neither Harmon Killebrew nor Mickey Mantle has ever hit a grand slam against the O's although Killebrew has hit more home runs vs. O's than any other opponent as well as more in Memorial Stadium—65 (30) and Mantle ranks second with 54 (25).

★ ★ ★

LONG HOME RUNS/MEMORIAL STADIUM: The longest "measured" home run ever hit in Memorial Stadium was a 471' drive by Harmon Killebrew on May 24, 1964 off Milt Pappas over the hedge in left-center field . . . This exceeded by two feet the only other blast that has ever cleared the hedge . . . That was one by Boog Powell 469' to the same area off Boston's Don Schwall on June 22, 1962. Aside from these there have been three balls hit into the hedge (approximately 450'), by Mickey Mantle in 1954, by Powell in 1965 and by Frank Robinson in 1967.

Frank Robinson is the only player to have hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium. In the second game of a doubleheader with Cleveland on May 8, 1966, Frank hit a Luis Tiant offering over the left field stands and into the parking lot beyond, a drive that measured 451' on the fly and rolled to a stop 540' away from home plate.

20-GAME WINNERS: During the five years that George Bamberger has been the Birds' pitching coach (starting in '68), the Orioles staff has produced 13 20-game winning performances. In the club's first 14 years of operation only one pitcher was able to reach that plateau—Steve Barber in '63 with a 20-13 record.

In this period Dave McNally has been a 20-game winner four times, Mike Cuellar and Jim Palmer three times each and Pat Dobson once: McNally ('68 . . . 22-10, '69 . . . 20-7, '70 . . . 24-9 and '71 . . . 21-5); Cuellar ('69 . . . 23-11, '70 . . . 24-8, '71 . . . 20-9), Palmer ('70 . . . 20-10, '71 . . . 20-9, '72 . . . 21-10) and Dobson ('71 . . . 20-8).

In '71 four Baltimore pitchers reached the 20 win level. The only other time in the entire history of major league baseball that this had been done was back in 1920 (51 years earlier) when a quartet of Chicago White Sox pitchers went over the 20 mark: Urban "Red" Faber-23, Claude Williams-22, Dickie Kerr-21 and Ed Cicotte-21. Despite that achievement, incidentally, the White Sox that year finished second, two games back of Cleveland.

The four Orioles pitchers all reached the 20 win plateau within six days: McNally was first on 9/21, then in the same weekend series in Cleveland, the other three joined him: Cuellar (9/24-1st game), Dobson (9/24-2d game) and Palmer (9/26).

FIELDING NOTES: For the third straight year the Orioles finished second in the league in fielding percentage trailing the Tigers (.984) by .001 with an average of .983 . . . The Birds have finished first ('63, '64, '66, '69) or second ('60, '61, '68, '70, '71, '72) ten times in the past 13 seasons.

Three individual Orioles led the league in percentage at their positions: Brooks Robinson at third base (.977) for the tenth time in his career; Dave Johnson at second base (.990) and catcher Johnny Oates in his rookie year (.995) . . . Brooks Robinson was also awarded his 13th straight "gold glove" while Paul Blair received his fourth in a row and fifth in six years . . . O's have won 13 "gold gloves" in last four seasons.

O's major league records: The Orioles hold two significant major league records as a team, both set in '64: (1) highest fielding percentage—.985, and (2) fewest errors, season—95 . . . At the same time the Birds also hold the modern major league record for most passed balls, season (49) set back in '59 when Hoyt Wilhelm was an Orioles starter.

Triple Plays: The Orioles have executed only three triple plays in 19 American League seasons. The most recent one occurred on 8/6/69 when K.C. Royals catcher Eliseo Rodriguez bounced into an "around the horn" triple killing from Brooks Robinson to Dave Johnson to Boog Powell . . . The other triple plays were on line drives, in 1955 and 1959 . . . On the other hand, the Birds have been the victims of 10 triple plays since 1954, including one last year in Boston on 5/25 when Ellie Hendricks lined into one started by first baseman Duane Josephson . . . Brooks Robinson has lined into three and bounced into one.

1972 SEASON SUMMARY

Among the most appropriate adjectives to describe the Orioles' 1972 season are: disappointing, unusual (at least in recent years), strange and unexpected. When the campaign began, many anticipated that the Birds would again combine a top pitching staff with a superior defense and strong hitting to produce a fourth straight pennant . . . In the end, it was the lack of just one of these ingredients, solid hitting, that precipitated the Birds' decline to a third place finish.

Pitching and defense were the major supports that kept the club in contention for most of the season, but the mysterious lack of hitting prevented the O's from detaching themselves from the other contenders. The hitting malady touched not just one or two, but seemed to overcome nearly all the hitters. Compared with the year before, the team batting average dropped 32 points and home run production was off by 58. Translated into runs, it meant a difference of 223 less than the previous season. Further evidence was that the club won only 22 and lost 31 in one-run games.

The O's spent most of the early part of the season out of first place. On June 6, the club was tied for second and trailed first place Detroit by four games. At that point the club embarked on a nine-game winning streak—longest of the season—which thrust them into a first place tie as of June 17. The Orioles finally moved into first place alone by beating Chicago on the Fourth of July.

The club was in and out of the top spot over the following two months as it engaged Detroit, Boston and New York in one of the tightest races in American League history. The Orioles clung to a half-game lead through September 3, but fell to fourth place in the next 48 hours by losing two of three to New York. Elimination day for the Orioles was September 29 when they lost to Boston and Luis Tiant.

Strange won-loss patterns were compiled by the club. From the start of the season until Memorial Day the O's were 14-4 at home but only 6-11 on the road. Between May 30 and July 12 the team went 16-5 on the road but exactly the reverse at home. The Orioles ended the year with a 38-39 record at home, their first losing year at Memorial Stadium since 1967.

1972 HIGHLIGHTS— ORIOLES vs. OPPONENTS

BOSTON: The Orioles were 7-11 against the Red Sox, winning four and losing five at Memorial Stadium and posting a 3-6 record at Fenway Park.

All Even: After 19 years, the Orioles and Red Sox have fought to a stand-off with 185-185 records against each other.

Tiant Tops: Righthander Luis Tiant registered four wins over the Orioles without a loss, including the game of September 29 which eliminated the O's from the Eastern Division title race.

Triple Killing: The Red Sox executed a triple play against the Orioles at Fenway Park May 25 . . . The O's had runners on first and second when Ellie Hendricks lined to first baseman Duane Josephson, who stepped on first and threw to second for the final out.

Game Plan: The Orioles skipped batting practice before the August 6 game because the club was in a slump, then went out and battered Boston pitching for 15 hits, including seven for extra bases, en route to an 11-2 win behind Jim Palmer.

Miscellaneous: Boston pitchers recorded three shutouts against the O's . . . Doyle Alexander was involved in back-to-back decisions May 23-24, losing the first and winning the second, both in relief . . . Mike Cuellar struck out 13 Red Sox and Bob Grich homered leading off the 9th for a 2-1 victory August 11.

CALIFORNIA: The Orioles were 4-2 against the Angels at home but only 2-4 at Anaheim Stadium.

Hit Spree: The Orioles had 16 hits while winning, 12-2, on April 28.

Right Move: Scheduled starter Clyde Wright came up with a stiff arm a few minutes before the April 30 game and was replaced by Rick Clark . . . The move paid off as Clark and reliever Lloyd Allen combined to defeat the Orioles, 4-3.

Miscues: The Orioles usual gold defense turned to sand as it committed four errors to aid a 6-3 California victory June 21.

Blanks: The Angels shut out the Orioles in the last two games of the season between the two, 2-0 on September 2 and 1-0 the following day.

No. 1: Don Baylor's first major league home run, a three-run blast, and six doubles were among 11 hits used by the O's to win 6-1 on April 29.

CHICAGO: The Orioles were 8-4 vs. the White Sox, winning five of six in Baltimore and splitting six in Chicago.

Sweeps: It was all or nothing for one or the other when the O's and White Sox met . . . Chicago swept a three-game series May 12-14 . . . The O's took a three-game set (all by one run) in Chicago July 4-6 and a four-game series in Baltimore July 14-16.

Downpour: Rain, falling with unrelenting fury, turned Memorial Stadium into a bog and forced postponement of the second game of a double-header July 16 . . . The rains hit with such force in the 7th inning of the first game that the ground crew never had a chance to get the infield completely covered . . . The O's were leading, 6-1, when the water-filled skies ruptured.

1972 HIGHLIGHTS— ORIOLES vs. OPPONENTS

First Win: When Stan Bahnsen beat the Orioles 9-3 on May 13, it was his first win ever against the O's after 10 losses.

Make-Up: Rain-forced postponements made it necessary on August 17 for the White Sox to make a one-day trip to Baltimore . . . The trip was worthwhile as the Sox won, 6-1 . . . Rain fell all morning of the game, which was 35 minutes late starting and was played in semi-fog . . . A crowd of 655, smallest in the club's history, saw the contest.

CLEVELAND: The Orioles, for the first time since 1968, lost the season series to the Indians . . . The Orioles were 5-4 at home but only 3-6 in Cleveland.

Four-of-a-Kind: The O's swept a four-game series at Memorial Stadium May 26-29 as the rotation of Cuellar-McNally-Palmer-Dobson each went the distance.

Ball Night: A crowd of 39,714 turned out on Ball Night May 27 and saw Terry Crowley's 8th inning home run give the Orioles a 4-2 victory . . . The crowd also saw Manager Earl Weaver ejected for piling dirt on second base following a run-in with umpire John Flaherty.

Big Hit: Boog Powell smashed a bases-loaded home run off Steve Mingori at Cleveland April 21 to lead the O's to a 6-0 win.

The Master: Cy Young Award winner Jim Perry won four of five decisions against the Orioles . . . His most impressive effort was September 27 when he won, 3-0 . . . Rain stopped the game in the bottom of the sixth and after a one hour and 29 minute delay Perry came back to pitch one-hit ball over the last four innings.

DETROIT: The Orioles went 10-8 against the Tigers, winning five and losing four at home and in Detroit.

Explosion: In a nationally-televised game July 3, the Orioles crushed the Tigers, 15-3, and set a club record with 21 hits . . . The O's bombarded the Tigers with 17 hits and 15 runs in the last four innings . . . The Tigers led, 2-0, through five innings but the Orioles scored six in the 6th, seven in the 8th and two in the 9th.

Tigeritis: Detroit manager Billy Martin predicted in late June that Pat Dobson would suffer "Tigeritis" while pitching at Tiger Stadium the following week . . . Dobson, who started his major league career in Detroit, strode to the mound June 30 at Tiger Stadium and pitched a four-hitter while taming the Tigers, 3-2, to get the last laugh on the Tigers skipper.

Gate Mark: A four-game series at Tiger Stadium June 30-July 3 drew 170,335, which set a club record for the O's.

Good Job: Doyle Alexander turned in a superior relief effort against the Tigers May 16 in Detroit . . . He entered the game in the first inning after starter Mike Cuellar allowed three hits and two runs while retiring only one . . . Alexander went the rest of the way and gave up only three hits to gain credit for an 8-3 victory.

Nemesis: Frank Howard, obtained by the Tigers from Texas on the first of September, hit only one home run the remainder of the season but it came in a prime spot and against a familiar victim . . . He unloaded a three-run shot against Dave McNally September 13 to aid the Tigers to a 6-5 victory . . . It was Howard's 13th career home run off McNally.

Super Catch: Jim Northrup's electrifying catch which he turned into a doubleplay put a sudden end to an Orioles threat and the game July 1 at Tiger Stadium . . . The Tigers led, 2-0, with one out in the ninth and Tom Shopay on first base when Dave Johnson belted a line drive into left centerfield that appeared headed over the fence and into the lower deck . . . But Northrup raced to the fence, leaped and speared the ball above the fence . . . His throw to the infield was relayed to first base in time to double off Shopay to end the game.

KANSAS CITY: The Orioles broke even with the Royals, winning three and losing three at home and on the road.

Last-of-a-Kind: Boog Powell's long home run July 21 off Bruce Dal Canton cleared the right field fence at Kansas City's Municipal Stadium and landed on Brooklyn Avenue . . . Only a handful of players have achieved the feat in the 17 years of major league baseball at Municipal Stadium and Powell ranks as the last, since the Royals have moved into newly-built Royals Stadium.

7-Come-11: The Royals shattered a 4-4 tie in the July 12 game with seven runs in the 11th inning, highlighted by Cookie Rojas' grand-slam home run.

Some Save: Royals southpaw Tom Burgmeier was the beneficiary of a save April 26 without throwing a pitch . . . He was summoned to the mound in the 6th inning with the Royals ahead, 5-3, and the Orioles threatening . . . However, the game was delayed by rain before he threw a pitch and was eventually called without play resuming.

Record Tied: The Royals tied a major league record with 10 doubleplays against the Orioles in two successive games May 5-6 . . . The Royals reeled off four the first night and six the next night.

Heart-Breaker: Mike Cuellar went from would-be winner to positive loser July 10 when the Royals scored twice in the 9th with two outs . . . Cuellar, who had allowed only four hits to that point, was leading by a 2-1 score when Richie Scheinblum looped a handle-hit to center field . . . Lou Piniella followed with a pop fly down the left field line that landed in the third row of seats for a two-run homer and a 3-2 K.C. win.

1972 HIGHLIGHTS— ORIOLES vs. OPPONENTS

MILWAUKEE: The Orioles compiled a 10-5 record vs. the Brewers, winning four of six at Memorial Stadium and six of nine in Milwaukee . . . The first three games on the schedule, including the home opener for the O's, were cancelled because of the player strike.

Streak Stopped: The Orioles had a 10-game winning streak halted at County Stadium when the Brewers won, 4-2, on May 19 . . . The loss was the first for the O's there since June 6, 1970.

One Hit: Skip Lockwood and Ken Sanders combined for a one-hitter June 25 at Memorial Stadium . . . The only safety was Bob Grich's 4th inning single off Lockwood.

Two in One: Don Baylor belted a pair of home runs May 21 in Milwaukee, the only Oriole to hit more than one in a game all year.

Noteworthy Plateau: Jim Palmer notched his 100th career win by defeating the Brewers, 4-2, in Milwaukee September 24.

MINNESOTA: The Orioles won two and lost four against the Twins in Baltimore and did the opposite in Minnesota, to gain a split for the year.

Ribbies: Bob Grich had five runs batted in August 29, the best individual effort of the year among the Orioles.

Long Game: The O's and Twins went 15 innings June 6 before Minnesota won, 6-4 . . . The game lasted 4 hours and 25 minutes and was the longest of the year from a time standpoint . . . The Twins sent the game into extra innings by scoring three runs in the 9th to tie the score, 4-4.

Broken at 9: The Twins ended a nine-game winning streak for the Orioles—their longest of the season—by winning, 4-3, on June 18.

Rains Runs: When it stopped raining rain it started raining runs for the Twins in the August 30 game at Minnesota . . . The O's and Twins were involved in a scoreless game when rain intervened in the 7th inning . . . After a 34-minute delay, the Twins came up with seven runs on seven hits when play resumed.

NEW YORK: The Orioles were 7-6 vs. the Yankees, posting a 4-4 record in Baltimore and a 3-2 mark in New York . . . Five games were cancelled at the beginning of the season because of the player strike, four in New York and one in Baltimore.

Early Delay: The season was only eight minutes old when the first rain delay took place . . . The season was scheduled to begin April 15, but that game was rained out . . . Opening Day then became April 16 when the Yanks and O's were to meet in a doubleheader . . . Eight minutes after the game started, and before the Orioles came to bat, there was a delay because of rain . . . The clubs played into the 7th inning before the remainder was called off because of the weather.

Quickie: The O's defeated the Yankees 4-0 June 28 in a game that was played in one hour and 44 minutes, the fastest of the season.

Six for Lyle: Southpaw relief ace Sparky Lyle earned a save in every one of Yankees' six wins against the Orioles . . . He got two on July 31.

A Long Wait: When the Yankees won a doubleheader from the Orioles July 31, it was their first twin-bill sweep of the O's since September 18, 1960.

Mike's Efforts: Mike Cuellar had a 3-0 record against the Yankees to run his career mark to 12-3 against them . . . He had three complete games, two shutouts and allowed only three runs in 27 innings.

OAKLAND: The Orioles and A's split their season series as each had far more success in the other's ball park . . . The O's lost five of six at home but won five of six in Oakland.

Big Turnout: A crowd of 50,182, attracted by half prices on a family night promotion, saw the O's edge the A's, 1-0, June 12 at the Oakland Coliseum . . . Pat Dobson was the winner over Vida Blue.

Rallies: On successive nights, August 25-26, the Orioles staged 9th inning rallies to defeat the A's . . . On August 25 the O's were down, 3-2, but scored three times in the 9th to win and the next night scored four times in the last inning to crack a 1-1 tie.

Double Shutouts: The A's did something against the O's June 4 that had not been done for nearly 14 years—shut them out in a doubleheader . . . The A's won both by 2-0 scores and it was the first time since June 15, 1958 the O's had been blanked twice in one day . . . In the first game Jim Hunter was the winner and it was his 100th career win.

Streak Ends: The Orioles had a nine-game winning streak against the A's halted June 3 . . . The O's had defeated the A's in their last five meetings in 1971, took three straight in the 1971 ALCS and won the first game in 1972 between the two clubs.

TEXAS: The Orioles had plenty of trouble with the Rangers at home but not at Arlington Stadium . . . The O's were only 1-5 at Memorial Stadium but 5-1 in Texas.

Dandy Dave: Two wins without a loss by Dave McNally raised his lifetime record to 25-4 against Texas, including 15 victories in succession . . . The last time he lost to them was September 12, 1968, when the club was in Washington.

Sweeps: The Orioles and Rangers each swept a series from the other . . . The Orioles won all three in a series in Texas June 9-11 and the Rangers took four straight from the O's at Memorial Stadium July 7-9.

Long Night: The two clubs battled through 15 innings at Arlington Stadium July 18 before the O's won, 2-1.

Joe the Hero: In the July 9 game at Memorial Stadium, young Joe Lovitto tripled home the tie run in the 8th and doubled home the deciding run in the 10th as the Rangers won, 3-2.

ALL STAR NOTES: The National League won the 43rd All Star Game in Atlanta, 4-3, on Joe Morgan's (Cinn.) 10th inning, one out single off Dave McNally which scored Nate Colbert (S.D.) from second . . . McNally who came on in the 10th opened the inning by walking Colbert who was sacrificed to 2d by Chris Speier (S.F.), then Morgan followed with his game ending safety which earned him the Arch Ward Memorial Trophy.

The American League had gone ahead, 3-2, in the 8th on a two-run homer by Cookie Rojas (K.C.) after an earlier two-run blast by Hank Aaron in the 6th had put the National League up by 2-1 . . . The N.L. tied the game in the 9th on a force out grounder by Lee May (Houst.) after Wilbur Wood (Chi.) had yielded singles to Billy Williams (Cubs) and Manny Sanguillen (Pirates).

This was the ninth win in the last ten games for the N.L. and padded its overall edge to 24-18 with one tie.

Earl Weaver, managing the A.L. stars for the third year in a row, lost for the second time . . . His starting lineup included three Orioles. Brooks Robinson who received the second highest vote total (behind Dick Allen) in the A.L. started at third for the ninth time and played in his 16th straight game while Jim Palmer and shortstop Bobby Grich were appointed starters.

Palmer, pitching in his third straight game, worked three scoreless innings, gave up just one hit and one walk while striking out three. In addition he contributed a sacrifice in the 3rd that moved Bill Freehan to second and enabled him to score a moment later on Rod Carew's beseit that gave the A.L. an early lead. Palmer has not allowed a run in eight all star innings and has held the N.L. to three hits . . . He has walked two and fanned eight.

Grich was added to the squad late after shortstop starter-elect Luis Aparicio (Bos.) and the Rangers' Toby Harrah both scratched because of injury leaving Weaver with just one shortstop, Campy Campaneris (Oak.) . . . Earl then decided to start Grich who played the entire game, and played impressively on defense though he went hitless in four trips.

Robinson was hitless also, 0-for-2, before being replaced by Sal Bando (Oak.) . . . However, he still maintains a .325 (13-for-40) all star average with three triples, one home run and five rbi . . . In addition he has handled 39 chances without error (10 putouts and 29 assists) . . . Brooks who in 1971 received more votes than any one else in the A.L. (1,110,469) was the 1966 winner of the Arch Ward Memorial Trophy as the game's outstanding player following a 3-for-4 performance at bat with a triple and 8-for-8 demonstration on defense. He was a near winner on two other occasions, in '64 (went 2-for-4 with a two-run triple and great defensive play on an Orlando Cepeda smash) and '70 (went 2-for-3, hit a triple and drove in two runs).

Two other Orioles have earned all star game "mvp" honors: Billy O'Dell in '58 in the only game ever played in Baltimore and Frank Robinson at Detroit in '71. Frank won the award with a two-run homer that put the A.L. ahead to stay in the junior circuit's only victory since '62.

BITS ABOUT THE BIRDS

JAPAN TRIP '71: Three days after losing the '71 World Series to the Pirates in seven games, the Orioles embarked on a 31-day trip, spanning more than 20,000 miles, to play 18 games against the best baseball players in Japan. While traveling to 14 different cities via plane, train, bus, ferry and hydrofoil, the O's won 12 games, lost two and tied four before an estimated 450,000 fans.

The trip was sponsored by the *Yomiuri Shimbun*, one of the largest newspapers in the world and owners of the perennial Japanese champion Tokyo (Yomiuri) Giants.

The Orioles' principal opponents on the tour were the Giants, kingpins of the Central League, who had just won their seventh straight Japan Series (equivalent to our world series between pennant winners from Central and Pacific Leagues), and have since won their eighth such title in a row. The Giants have won 13 national championships since the present two league structure was adopted in '50 and have finished first in their league 27 times in the 37 years since professional baseball was inaugurated in Japan in '36.

In head to head competition, the Orioles did not lose to the Giants. The Birds won eight and tied three (all in extra innings) vs. Yomiuri. Against combination teams and all star groups, the O's were 4-2-1.

Boog Powell emerged from the tour as the Birds' most productive hitter with club leading figures of six homers and 14 rbi and a .397 average (23-for-58). Ellie Hendricks led the Birds in hitting with a .400 (16-for-40) mark. Pat Dobson who was 3-0 achieved a first in the long Japan-U.S. baseball association when he pitched a no-hit, no-run game against the Giants in Toyama City on November 2d.

The two most famous and highest paid players in Japan are Giants' first baseman Sadaharu Oh and third baseman Shigeo Nagashima . . . Oh who has now (thru '72) won 11 straight Central League hr championships was battling a severe slump during the Orioles tour, but still managed to hit three homers to lead all Japanese players . . . Nagashima, "Mr. Baseball" of Japan, hit an impressive .268 after a slow start . . . The leading Japanese hitter, however, was right fielder Tamio Suetsugu who belted Orioles' pitching at a .319 clip (15-for-47). Giants right-hander Tsuneo Horiuchi who worked in six of the 18 games was the most impressive of the Japanese pitchers (47 ip, 44 h, 27 so, 3.64 era). Horiuchi, 24, was 26-9 during this past season and was chosen the most valuable player in the Giants Japan Series victory over the Hankyu Braves.

JAPANESE-AMERICAN RELATIONS: In '72 the distinguished president of the Lotte (Tokyo) Orions of Japan's Pacific League, Mr. Nagayoshi Nakamura, purchased the Lodi franchise in the Class A California League, and entered into a working agreement with the Baltimore Orioles. The terms of the contract provided that the Orioles supply a manager (Jim Schaffer) and most of the players while Mr. Nakamura furnished a general manager (Ichizo Aoki), a business manager (Marty Kuehnert), and three players from the Lotte Orions farm system.

Although this was the first time that an American minor league club had been operated under Japanese ownership, the Lotte Orions were not strangers to U.S. baseball since they had trained in Arizona in '71 and '72, and had played numerous exhibitions against big league clubs also training in that area.

Since last season Mr. Nakamura has terminated his association with the Orions and became owner-president of the Pacific Club (Taiheiyō) Lions, another Pacific League team based in Fukuoka in southern Japan (Kyushu). As a result of this change the Lodi franchise will now be known as the "Lions" and up to five players from the Pacific Club team (rather than from the Lotte Orions) will be assigned to the Lodi roster.

The relationship between Mr. Nakamura, a prominent business and political figure in Japan, and the Orioles developed further during the winter when the Pacific Club Lions purchased the contracts of Don Buford, the Birds' premier lead-off man of the past five seasons, and outfielder Roger Repoz, the former major leaguer who played for Rochester last year. Both reported to training camp in Fukuoka in February. Buford signed a two year pact with the Lions.

BITS ABOUT THE BIRDS

MOST VALUABLE ORIOLES: In '72 Jim Palmer was the unanimous winner of the 19th annual "most valuable Oriole" award presented by the Maryland Sportsboosters after a vote of baseball writers and announcers covering the club on a regular basis. Palmer is the fourth Birds pitcher to have been afforded this honor.

Previous winners were: Chuck Diering ('54), Dave Philley ('55), Bob Nieman ('56), Billy Gardner ('57), Gus Triandos ('58), Gene Woodling ('59), Brooks Robinson ('60), Jim Gentile ('61), Brooks Robinson ('62), Stu Miller ('63), Brooks Robinson ('64), Stu Miller ('65), Frank Robinson ('66), Frank Robinson ('67), Dave McNally ('68), Boog Powell ('69), Boog Powell ('70), Brooks and Frank Robinson ('71).

ORIOLES—BIGGEST WINNERS: Over the past 16 years (from '57 thru '72) the Orioles have won more games (regular season) than any club in either league. In that period the Birds are 1424-1118 followed in order by: (2) Yankees, 1410-1138; (3) Dodgers, 1382-1167; (4) Giants, 1379-1168; (5) Tigers, 1369-1184; (6) Reds, 1366-1176; (7) Cardinals, 1355-1189; (8) Pirates, 1354-1190; (9) Braves, 1352-1194; (10) White Sox, 1340-1212; (11) Twins (nee Senators), 1290-1257; (12) Red Sox, 1257-1293; (13) Indians, 1233-1316; (14) Cubs, 1195-1349; (15) Phillies, 1168-1375; (16) A's, 1167-1380.

It was in 1957 that the Birds began to jell. That year for the first time the Birds finished at .500 (76-76), after having gone 180-282 in their first three seasons in Baltimore ('54, '55, '56).

100 WINS: The Orioles won more than 100 games in each of three straight seasons—'69 (109), '70 (108) and '71 (101). Only two other clubs have achieved this feat in the history of major league baseball: the '29-'30-'31 Philadelphia A's (104-102-107) and the '42-'43-'44 St. Louis Cardinals (106-105-105).

NUMBER "20" RETIRED: After Frank Robinson was traded to the Dodgers following the '71 season, his uniform number "20" was retired as an expression of respect and gratitude for his many achievements during six Baltimore seasons that produced four American League pennants and two world championships. Frank was the first Orioles player to be so honored. Following is a list (complete, we hope) of other baseball players and/or managers whose uniforms have been permanently retired:

American League: Boston (9-Ted Williams), Chicago (4-Luke Appling), Cleveland (5-Lou Boudreau and 19-Bob Feller), New York (3-Berra Ruth, 4-Lou Gehrig, 5-Joe DiMaggio, 7-Mickey Mantle, 8-Yogi Berra and Bill Dickey, and 37-Casey Stengel).

National League: Atlanta (21-Warren Spahn, and 41-Ed Mathews*), Cincinnati (1-Fred Hutchinson), Los Angeles (32-Sandy Koufax, 39-Roy Campanella and 42-Jackie Robinson), New York Mets (14-Gil Hodges and 37-Casey Stengel), Philadelphia (36-Robin Roberts), Pittsburgh (1-Bill Meyer, 20-Pie Traynor and 33-Honus Wagner), St. Louis (6-Stan Musial), San Francisco (4-Mel Ott, 11-Carl Hubbell and 24-Willie Mays).

* Mathews' number was re-activated when he returned to the Braves as a coach in '71 . . . Note that Stengel's #37 has been retired by both New York clubs . . . The Yankees' #8 was retired last summer in honor of its two most distinguished wearers.

1972 FINANCIAL STATEMENT: The Baltimore Baseball Club, Inc. sustained operating losses in fiscal '72 of \$430,301. These losses, however, were reduced to \$214,582 after a tax refund of \$215,719. The BBC, Inc. had earned \$321,453 ('71), \$345,161 ('70) and \$232,239 ('69) during the three years previous.

The BBC, Inc. is a publicly held Missouri based corporation. The Baltimore Orioles, Inc., a Maryland corporation, is a holding company which owns approximately 74% of BBC, Inc.'s common stock. The National Brewing Company in turn owns nearly 68% of the common stock of Baltimore Orioles, Inc.

ORIOLES BASKETBALL TEAM: The Orioles' basketball team comprised of players and front office personalities who live in the Baltimore area during the off-season enjoyed a perfect 12-0 season this winter to bring their four year record to an impressive 34-2.

Paul Blair (30 pt. avg.) and Jim Palmer (27 pt. avg.) were the club's leading scorers while Palmer was the top rebounder followed by Merv Rettenmund. Terry Crowley who averaged 16 points per game was the O's third leading scorer. Other mainstays for Coach Bud Freeman's all winning five were: Tom Shopay, Brooks Robinson, Dick Hall, Tom Jasper (Orioles' fan relations department) and Freeman, himself.

The Birds basketball program was originated in January '70 to give players the opportunity to keep in good physical condition while at the same time providing a vehicle to raise money for worthy causes.

RULES OF INTEREST

FREE AGENT DRAFT RULE—A BRIEF SUMMARY: Major League and National Association clubs participate in two meetings a year for the purpose of drafting free agent player talent . . . Selection of a free agent entitles the club to the exclusive right of negotiation with that player for a specified period (from date of selection until 15 days prior to next draft meeting).

Draft meetings are held in Summer (June) and Winter (January).

There are two phases to each draft meeting:

(1) **Regular Phase**—selection of free agents in inverse order of major league standings.

(2) **Secondary Phase**—selection of unsigned free agents drafted within previous 13 months . . . (all unsigned free agents drafted more than 13 months before revert to regular phase status) . . . it is possible for a club to redraft a player whom it had been unable to sign after the original selection, but only with the express written consent of that player . . . order of selection in secondary phase is determined by lot.

SUSPENDED GAME RULE: A game terminated by curfew or by a pre-arranged time limit is a suspended game only if it has progressed far enough to be an official game (i.e. 4½ to 5 innings).

A game terminated by light failure is a suspended game anytime after it begins.

Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension immediately preceding the next scheduled single game between the two clubs on the same ground . . . If this is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in American League Regulation 3.8.

A game called at the END of a completed inning AFTER NINE INNINGS for any reason shall be a SUSPENDED game. This rule became effective in 1969. Formerly, the game would have been declared a tie and replayed in its entirety at a later date.

BALTIMORE CURFEW: Night Games—see A.L. Regulation 3.4 (13)—Saturday night—play must be called at 11:59 P.M. regardless of the game situation . . . All other nights—no inning may be started after 11:59 P.M., but any inning which begins before that time may be completed.

Sunday Games—see A.L. Regulation 3.7—No Sunday game at Baltimore may start before 2:00 P.M.

BATTING/PITCHING (ERA) CHAMPION QUALIFICATION: 502 or more plate appearances. 162 or more innings.

ROOKIE QUALIFICATIONS: A player shall be considered a rookie unless, during a previous season or seasons, he has (a) exceeded 130 at bats or 50 innings pitched in the major leagues; or (b) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a major league club or clubs during the period of the 25-player limit (excluding time in military service).

"SAVE" RULE (10:20): (a) Credit a save to a relief pitcher who enters a game with his team in the lead if he holds the lead the remainder of the game, providing he is not credited with the victory.

(b) A relief pitcher cannot be credited with a save if he does not finish the game, unless he is removed for a pinchhitter or pinchrunner.

(c) When more than one relief pitcher qualifies for a save under the provisions of this rule, credit the save to the relief pitcher judged by the scorer to have been most effective. Only one save can be credited in a game.

A pitchers duel between 24-game winners Mike Cuellar and Jim Perry never materialized amid a 23 mph wind and 57° temperature. With the score tied at two in the 4th inning Cuellar highlighted a seven run outburst with a wind blown grand slam that was unquestionably foul when it left the bat, then acquired distance and direction and curled around the foul pole in right. Don Buford followed immediately with another home run that kayoed Perry. In one of the closest 11-3 games ever played, the Birds and Dave McNally protected a one run lead (4-3) from the 4th thru the 8th then staged their second seven run inning in two days, in the 9th, to ice it.

The Orioles jumped out to a 4-0 lead after three and one-half innings . . . A 1st inning double by Powell, a two run homer by Frank Robinson in the 3rd and McNally's single in the 4th provided the early scoring off starter Tom Hall.

However, after McNally walked lead off man Leo Cardenas in the 4th, he yielded successive bombs to Killebrew and Oliva and with none out the Baltimore lead had been trimmed to one. McNally then retired the side in order and despite frequent trouble (Twins had at least one runner in each inning from the 5th thru the 9th) he blanked Minnesota the rest of the way.

A clutch play by Merv Rettenmund kept the Twins from tying it in the 5th. McNally issued a one out walk to Stan Williams (the third Twins pitcher), then Cesar Tovar and Cardenas singled. Whereas the first two games of the ALCS seemed much closer than the final scores of 10-6 and 11-3, game three was rarely in doubt. Jim Palmer, who has now pitched complete game victories to clinch all three of the Orioles' American League titles ('66, '69 and '70), scattered seven hits and three walks while striking out 12.

The Birds started fast and by the end of three innings led 5-0. Buford greeted starter Jim Kaat with a lead off single in the 1st and scored two outs later on a Powell single. In the 2nd, center fielder Jim Holt failed to catch Palmer's fly ball and it dropped for a two base error; then Buford doubled over Tovar's head in left to score Palmer . . . In the 3rd, Brooks opened with a double—the second of his three hits—went to third on a single by Johnson and scored on a grounder to short, but only after he had jostled Cardenas' throw to the plate out of catcher Paul Ratliff's possession. The Birds' final run resulted from a 7th-inning homer by Johnson off Perry, the Twins fourth and final pitcher.

Though three Oakland homers, two by Reggie Jackson, kept the A's in the ballgame until the end, Palmer turned on the gas in the 9th and fanned the side in order (Tenace, Hegan, Belfary) to nail down Baltimore's fourth pennant in six years.

A's Manager Dick Williams chose Diego Segui to start game three. His two aces, Vida Blue and Jim Hunter had already pitched, and 15-game winner Chuck Dobson was unavailable because of injury. Segui loaded the bases in the very 1st inning but held the O's to a single run on a sacrifice fly by Ellie Hendricks.

Jackson's first home run tied the game at one-all in the 3rd. Then in the 5th Brooks Robinson's two run single with the bases loaded put the O's ahead to stay and Segui shortly departed. Bando's homer in the 6th cut the lead to one (3-2), but the O's scored twice more in the 7th on an rbi double by Frank Robinson and another on a Darold Knowles wild pitch and now led 5-2.

It was, of course, the third straight three game sweep of the ALCS by the Orioles since that annual event was inaugurated in 1969.

Ed Watt who came on in the 8th yielded two hits in the 9th but worked out of the jam forcing the game into extra innings . . . The O's threatened but didn't score in the 10th . . . In the home half, Dick Hall yielded a lead off double to Grote . . . Weis was intentionally passed and Pete Richert came on to face J. C. Martin, batting for Seaver . . . Martin dropped a bunt down the first base line; Richert fielded it but his throw hit Martin in the back and rolled into right field, allowing Gaspar (running for Grote) to score the winning run from second. Ty Cline came in to hit for shortstop Woody Woodward, but succeeded only in hitting a dribbler that bounced high in front of the plate . . . Hendricks stepped out to grab it. Umpire Ken Burkhart also went out to position himself to call it fair or foul and surprise, surprise, Carbo was coming from third . . . Carbo came in on the foul side of the line, Hendricks dove at him from the fair side and both made contact with Burkhart, who ended up sitting down with his back to the plate. There was no question that Hendricks tagged the runner with his gloved hand, but the ball was in the other and subsequent photos and film proved that Carbo didn't touch the plate on the way in . . . Burkhart called the runner out. A vehement argument ensued.

The score was still tied at three when Brooks hit a 7th inning home run off Nolan and that was to be the clincher . . . In the 9th Palmer fanned pinch hitters Jimmy Stewart and Angel Bravo to open the inning, his first two strikeouts of the game . . . However, he then lost Rose on a walk, and Earl Weaver went to Richert to pitch to Tolan . . . It took Pete one pitch to dispose of the Reds center fielder on a soft liner to Mark Belanger and the Birds led the series 1-0.

With the Reds trailing 5-3 and just two innings from total annihilation in four straight, Lee May blasted reliever Eddie Watt's first pitch into the left field seats with two aboard to give the "BRM" their only series win, 6-5.

The first world series night game ever played (after 397 day games) drew a record baseball crowd for Pittsburgh and the largest TV audience ever for a baseball event, an estimated 62,330,000.

The game, itself, was decided by a pair of 21-year old Pirates: Bruce Kison and Milt May. Kison, who relieved starter Luke Walker in the 1st with the Birds already ahead 3-0, proceeded to pitch six and one-third scoreless innings during which he allowed just one hit and no walks though he did set a series record by plunking three Baltimore batters with pitched balls.

The Pirates battled back to tie the game in the 3rd off Pat Dobson who had not worked in 15 days, and in the 7th, young May, batting for Kison with two on and two out, singled home Bob Robertson with the tie breaking (and winning) run. Premier reliever Dave Giusti then retired six straight Orioles over the last two innings to preserve the narrow margin.

Dobson left with one out in the 6th after yielding 10 hits and three walks, but Grant Jackson bailed the Birds out of a tough spot. Watt came on in the 7th and was the victim of singles by Robertson and Sanguillen that preceded May's winning safety.

The most controversial play of the series occurred in the 3rd inning when Clemente, batting with one out and Richie Hebner on first, lined a shot to right field that cleared the inside fence near the foul line. Umpire John Rice who was covering the right field line in this game ruled that it was a foul ball, but to many it appeared to have been fair. Frank Robinson's aching legs produced the winning run in the 10th inning to prevent elimination and tie the series at three games apiece. With Bob Miller, the Pirates fourth pitcher, on the mound, Frank drew a walk with one out. Suffering from a painful Achilles tendon injury in his right foot, Frank nevertheless streaked all the way from first to third on Rettenmund's ground single up the middle. Vic Davalillo's throw to third baseman Hebner might have been in time, but Frank dove to the outside of the bag and evaded the tag. Enroute, he pulled a muscle in his left thigh.

Then Brooks hit a 1-2 pitch to medium center. After the catch by Davalillo, Frank came home and slid over safely as Davalillo's two bounce throw hopped high forcing Manny Sanguillen to go up in the air after it.

This dramatic finish concluded an uphill battle for the Birds in this "must" game. Robertson's 2nd inning single following an Al Oliver double and Roberto Clemente's homer in the 3rd gave the Pirates an early 2-0 lead off Jim Palmer. Don Buford led off in the O's 1st with a single, but it wasn't until Brooks singled in the 5th that the Birds hit safely again off starter Bob Moose (thru five innings of this game, the Birds had not scored in 22 straight innings and had managed just four hits in 21).

Buford hit a solo homer in the 6th to put the Birds on the board. Then the O's tied in the 7th when Dave Johnson singled off Giusti to score Belanger.

Palmer, meanwhile, had settled down and pitched shutout ball from the 4th thru the 9th. He was pitching so effectively that manager Weaver declined to pinch hit for him in two threat situations in the 4th and 7th innings.

The Orioles threatened off Giusti in the 9th but didn't score.

Dobson came on to pitch the 10th and with one out Cash singled and stole second while Richie Hebner fanned. The O's walked Clemente on purpose, then Dave McNally, who had started the fifth game, came out of the bullpen to make his first relief appearance since July 19, 1969, to face the lefthand hitting Willie Stargell. While Steve Blass went the route limiting the Orioles to four hits and a single run, Mike Cuellar pitched almost as well. Thru the eight innings Mike worked, he too yielded just four base hits, but a home run by Roberto Clemente in the 4th after Cuellar had retired all 11 previous Pittsburgh hitters broke the ice, and then in the 8th, a single by Willie Stargell, followed by Pagan's hit and run double that scored Stargell all the way from first, gave the Pirates a 2-0 lead.

In the first seven innings, the Birds nipped Blass for two harmless safeties. In the home half of the 8th, down by two, the Birds finally scored. Hendricks opened with a single thru shortstop then Belanger looped a single to center. With none out Tom Shopay batted for Cuellar and sacrificed the runners to second and third. When Buford bounced to Bob Robertson at first, Hendricks scored. But with the tying run on third, Blass retired Dave Johnson to end the inning.

Blass was up to the final challenge in the 9th and set down Boog Powell, Frank Robinson, and Merv Rettenmund in order to give Pittsburgh its fourth world championship in six world series. All four Pirate series wins have been in seven games.

EARL WEAVER

Born: Aug. 14, '30; 5'8"; 165; Batted, R; Threw, R.

Born in St. Louis, Mo., now makes home in Baltimore . . . Has managed Orioles to three American League pennants, plus one world championship, in four full years on the job . . . O's have compiled 446-272 record (.621 percentage) since he was named manager July 11, 1968, succeeding Hank Bauer . . . His club's total of 318 wins during the 1969-70-71 seasons established an A.L. record for most victories in three consecutive seasons, surpassing the previous mark (313) set by the 1929-30-31 Philadelphia A's.

His clubs have never lost a game in American League championship series competition, winning nine straight over three seasons . . . Despite success, has never been named "Manager of the Year" . . . Considered excellent strategist.

Served as first base coach for Orioles in first half of 1968 season, after spending 11 years honing skills as manager in Orioles farm system . . . Compiled an excellent record as his clubs won three pennants and finished second five times . . . Flag winners were at Appleton (1960) in the Three-I League, Elmira (1964) in the Eastern League and Rochester (1966) in the International League.

Since his first full season as a manager in 1957, Earl has finished in the first division 19 times in 21 tries (including five winter league teams) . . . From 1960 to the present, he has skippered 19 teams and finished either first or second with 17 of them.

Started pro career in 1948 as an infielder in the Cardinals' chain . . . Signed to first contract by Walter Shannon, former scouting director for the Orioles . . . Never played in the majors but went to spring training with the Cardinals in 1952 . . . Primarily a second baseman . . . Played on pennant winning teams in each of his first four years . . . Led leagues in fielding in all but two seasons during playing career.

Most valuable player in three different leagues: West Frankfort, Illinois State League (1948), St. Joseph, Western Association (1949) and Omaha, Western League (1951) . . . Named to all star teams five times during playing career . . . Got start as manager with Knoxville (Sally League) in 1956 when he ran club for last several weeks of season . . . Managed Santurce in Puerto Rican League during winters of 1966-67 and 1967-68 . . . Won post season playoffs the first year and pennant the second year.

Graduate of Beaumont High School in St. Louis . . . Golfing and gardening enthusiast . . . He and his wife, Marianna, live in the Perry Hall section of Baltimore County.

ATTENDANCE NOTES: In '72 the Orioles dropped below one million paid at home for the first time in four years (since '68) . . . The biggest crowd of the year at Memorial Stadium was 43,851 for a "tee shirt nite" game against the Texas Rangers on 7/7 (Friday) . . . The second largest was 39,714 for a "ball nite" attraction against Cleveland on 5/27 (Saturday).

On the road the Orioles drew 1,265,353. It was the seventh straight time the Birds have pulled more than 1,100,000 away from home. The Orioles nine dates in Tiger Stadium drew 302,567, the largest attendance in the Birds' history for a season series on the road . . . One four game (four date) set in Detroit on 6/30 and 7/1-2-3 attracted 170,335, a club record for any series either home or road.

Rainouts were again numerous in Baltimore in '72. Eight dates (including the delayed opening day) were rained out, all before the all star game. The year before 14 home games were postponed by rain plus one championship series and one world series game. The Orioles have experienced 22 regular season postponements at home in the past two years, plus five on the road (but only one last year).

BIRDS' FIRST GAME IN BALTIMORE IN '54

The modern American League Orioles made their Baltimore debut in Memorial Stadium on April 15, 1954 before a crowd of 46,354 including Vice President Richard M. Nixon who threw out the first ball. Behind the seven hit pitching of Bob Turley who fanned nine, the Orioles of Jimmy Dykes defeated Paul Richards' White Sox, 3-1, in Baltimore's first American League game in 52 years.

Clint Courtney won the distinction of hitting the first home run in the brand new stadium (built on the site of the previous municipally owned ballpark used by the International League O's). It was a bases empty blast off Virgil Trucks who also yielded a solo homer to Vern Stephens in the fourth and was the losing pitcher. The Birds' starting lineup in that game was: Bobby Young, 2b; Eddie Waitkus, 1b; Gil Coan, cf; Vic Wertz, rf; Sam Mele, lf; Stephens, 3b; Billy Hunter, ss; Courtney, c and Turley, p.

First half performance (10-7) earned him a berth on the A.L. All Star team, but he turned out to be the losing pitcher in the N.L.'s 4-3 win . . . Dave came in to pitch the 10th and with one out and Nate Colbert on second, yielded a tie-breaking game-ending single to Joe Morgan.

Record after the all star break was only 3-10 and he lost seven of last eight decisions. Only win after August 13 was over California, 3-2, on September 1 . . . Best outing of year was against Oakland, June 14 . . . Went 10 innings in 2-1 win over Jim Hunter and allowed just four hits while walking none . . . Hitting: Hit two homers in '72 (vs. Milwaukee, August 9 and Oakland, August 27) to boost his lifetime total to nine (including grand slam off Oakland's Chuck Dobson) in regular season play (all since start of 1968 season). Also hit two home runs in world series play vs. the Mets in '69 (off Jerry Koosman) and one with bases loaded against the Reds' Wayne Granger . . . This is only grand slam ever hit by a pitcher in a world series.

That string ended on August 3, 1969, on Minnesota pinch-hitter Rich Reese's grand slam homer. Put together a 13-game win streak in 1971, despite missing five weeks of that season with strained flexor tendons in left elbow.

In addition to most wins ever by an Orioles pitcher, Dave holds or shares several other club records: most wins, season (24); most starts (40), most strikeouts (202), and lowest era (1.95) . . . Three-time member of American League all star squad ('69-'70-'72) . . . Selected to A.L. all star team by *The Sporting News* in 1969, and was named "most valuable Oriole" that season as well as being chosen the lefthanded pitcher on the all time Orioles' team.

ALCS/WS: Has performed magnificently in post season play during career . . . Has 4-2 record in four world series, and 3-0 mark in three championship series . . . Defeated Dodgers, 1-0 (on Frank Robinson's homer), in fourth and final game of 1966 World Series . . . Pitched 11-inning, three-hit shutout against Twins in second game of 1969 ALCS and struck out 11 to post 1-0 win over Dave Boswell . . . Lost to Mets, 2-1, in second game of 1969 World Series despite a complete game six hit. In 1970 he again went the route to beat the Twins in second game of ALCS and protected a one run lead for four innings before O's scored seven times in 9th to put game away . . . Against the Reds that year he won the third game, 9-3.

Won the opening game of the 1971 ALCS against Oakland, 5-3, with help from Eddie Watt in the 8th, then captured two of three decisions in four appearances in the world series against Pittsburgh; won first game with complete game effort, 5-3; lost the fifth game, 4-0, then won game six in relief. Also appeared in relief in game seven.

Miscellaneous: Signed to big bonus contract with Orioles in 1960 by Jim Russo and Jim Wilson after brilliant career in American Legion ball in Billings where high school did not field a team . . . Tossed two-hit shutout against K.C. A's in major league debut on September 26, 1962. Nearly pitched no-hitter against the Twins on May 15, 1969, but Cesar Tovar's one-out ninth-inning single ruined it. He nevertheless wound up with a 5-0 one-hit victory.

Most disappointing year in career was 1967 when, troubled by sore elbow, Dave finished with 7-7 record . . . Excellent golfer . . . He and his wife, Jean, are the parents of three children: Jeff (3/19/63), Pamela (6/16/64), and Susan (9/23/69).

Last year for the first time the Orioles were able to consolidate their entire spring training operation in the same geographical area by signing a five year agreement with Biscayne College to provide playing, housing and boarding facilities for all players in the Birds' minor league system (Rochester, Asheville, Lodi and Miami rosters) plus staff members during the spring training period which will begin this year on March 13. The Miami Dolphins also conduct their pre-season training on the Biscayne College campus.

In recent years, the Orioles top farm club, the Rochester Red Wings, trained at Daytona Beach while the other minor league teams in the system were stationed at Fernandina Beach near Jacksonville.
