

Attendance Notes: The three largest gate attractions at Memorial Stadium in 1973 were all Saturday night giveaways: 1—42,180 vs. Oak. (helmets) on July 7...2—30,574 vs. Chi. (autographed balls) on Aug. 18...3—29,509 vs. Det. (caps) on July 28. The opening day turnout of 26,543 on Fri., Apr. 6th (vs. Mil.) represented the fourth largest crowd of the home season.

On the road the Orioles drew 224,376 more than they did at home while topping the one million mark for the 8th straight year. In all the Orioles played to four crowds in excess of 40,000 on the road and three others over 30,000 (i.e. a total of seven dates of 30M or more on the road vs. only two at home) ...

The Orioles two biggest crowds of the year were both in Detroit—48,273 for a Sunday doubleheader on July 1 and 46,389 for opening day at Tiger Stadium on April 11th. The Birds also played to 43,571 for a Monday family night in Oakland on July 16 and 40,257 for a Sunday game at Anaheim Stadium on July 20.

Best Minor League Record: All five teams in the Orioles' farm system produced winning records last season and finished with a composite record of over ".500" for the 12th consecutive year in 1973, with 341 wins and 295 losses (.536). During the 12-year period beginning in 1962, the Birds' minor league system has achieved the highest won-lost percentage (4602-3948, .538) among all 24 big league organizations.

The Orioles have been chosen as the Topps "Baseball Organization of the Year" three times in the past eight years: 1966, 1971 and 1972. The winner of the annual award is determined by a formula that emphasizes the quality of individual prospects in a baseball system rather than team won-lost records.

The 1973 Season

Rochester won the American Division championship of the International League with a 79-67 record under Manager Joe Altobelli on the final day of the regular season head to head with second place Pawtucket (Red Sox). However, the Red Wings were eliminated in the first round of playoffs and Pawtucket ultimately won the International League title. It was the tenth time in the 13 years (beginning 1961) that the Orioles

have worked with the Wings that they had qualified for the playoffs. They also led the league in attendance for the 12th straight year.

Slugging outfielder Jim Fuller was selected as the International League's "most valuable player" after leading the league in home runs (39), rbi (108) and total bases (279). He fell just three short of Rochester's home run record, set in 1949 by Russ Derry, and was just two shy of the league's strikeout record (199, set by Dave Nicholson in 1968). Fuller was the fifth Rochester player to have won the league "myp" award in the past eight seasons: Mike Epstein ("66), Merv Rettenmund ("68), Roger Freed ("70) and Bobby Grich ("71).

Third baseman Doug DeCinces joined Fuller on the International League's all star team after finishing second on the club in homers (19) and rbi (79), tieing Fuller for the doubles leadership (25) and hitting .267.

Asheville finished second in the eastern division but did not qualify for playoffs since only the two division winners are eligible in the Southern League. The Orioles boasted the league's best "keystone combination" in second baseman Rob Andrews (brother of former Oakland infielder Mike), who led the league in hitting (.309), hits (167) and runs (98) while driving in 80 runs, and shortstop Bob Bailor, a .293 hitter who was second in the league in steals with 38. Each led at his position in double plays and both were Southern League all star team selections. Another all star selection was catcher Don Hickey (.291), from Arlington, Va. Taylor Duncan, who came to the Orioles in the Earl Williams deal from Atlanta, led the league in doubles with 30 on a .293 average, and designated hitter-catcher Terry Clapp paced the league in both home runs (35) and rbi (98) and was the only Southern League player chosen to the National Association Baseball Writers "All-AA" team.

Among pitchers, Randy Stein was the leader with a 14-6 record and

Lodi breezed to the California League's first half championship with a 46-24 record, but slumped to seventh with a 31-39 mark in the second half, then rallied to beat Bakersfield, the Dodgers' farm team that won the second half title, in a best of three playoff to capture the California

Jim Schaffer was elected "manager of the year" in the California League, while first baseman Mike Satterlee, a second round choice in the 1970 summer draft, and pitcher Larry McCall made the loop all star team. Satterlee hit 300 with 19 homers while McCall, an undrafted free agent back in 1971, was 14-7, led the league in complete games (16) and walked only 35 batters while striking out 139 in 207 innings.

The Lions, owned for the past two seasons by prominent Japanese businessman Nagayoshi Nakamura who also owns the Taiheiyo Club Lions in Japan's Pacific League (the club for which Don Buford and Roger Repoz played in 1973), have been sold to a group of Lodi businessmen.

Miami ended its string of four straight Florida State League titles and five consecutive southern division titles by finishing second to the West Palm Beach Expos. The Baby Birds were then eliminated in the first round of playoffs. Second baseman Kim Andrew paced the Florida State League in hitting with a 386 average while lefthander Ken Califano, former Essex Community College athlete, posted an 11-5 record and a 2.58 era.

Miami General Manager Red Morcroft, a National Football League official since 1960, served as the umpire in the officiating crew that worked the Miami-Minnesota Superbowl Game at Houston in January.

Bluefield first baseman Ed Murray, Baltimore's third pick in last summer's free agent draft, was voted "rookie of the year" in the Appalachian League after hitting .331. He was joined by three other Orioles on the league all star team: outfielder Rodney Lee, a 1972 free agent draft who hit .303; pitcher Russ Peach, who was chosen the league's top lefthander after posting a 5-1 record; and Mike Parrott, the Birds first choice in the summer draft of 1973, who was one of three righthanders tapped for the all star team. He was 5-4.

Minor League Player(s) of the Year: Six Orioles' farmhands have been named "mino: league player of the year" in the past eight years, either by Topps Chewing Gum with its Spink Award or by The Sporting News which chooses its own candidate by vote of staff members. It started for the Orioles in 1966 when Mike Epstein won both awards. In 1968 Merv Rettenmund was also a dual winner. In 1970 there were two different selections, but both were Orioles prospects. Don Baylor was tapped by The Sporting News, while Roger Freed, a Rochester teammate, was the Topps winner. Bobby Grich captured both trophies in 1971 and Mike Reinbach was the 1972 co-winner of the Topps Trophy along with the Dodgers' Tom Paciorek.

Farm System Managers and Minor League Pitching Instructor

Farm System Managers and Minor League Pitching Instructor
Joe Altobelli will return for his fourth season as manager of the Red
Wings. He has finished first in two of his three seasons at Rochester. In
1971, his first year there, the Wings, under his leadership, not only won
the International League pennant, they captured two rounds of intraleague playoffs, then defeated American Association champion Denver in
the junior world series. Joe, a 41-year-old native of Detroit, was chosen
that year as the International League's "manager of the year."

He began his managerial career in June 1966, at Bluefield in the
Appalachian Rookie League, and won a pennant there in 1967. He ran
the Stockton club (California League) in 1968 then managed at Dallas-

Ft. Worth (Texas League) in 1969 and 1970. Joe spent 16½ years as a player (first baseman) in pro ball and saw limited major league service with two clubs: Cleveland (1955 and 1957) and Minnesota (1961), and compiled a .210 average in 166 American League games.

Most of Joe's playing career was at the triple-a level. In 1960, while playing at Montreal, he led the International League with 31 home runs. Later he played 3½ seasons for the Red Wings before retiring in 1966 to begin his managing career.

He now makes his home in Rochester with his wife, Pat, and five children: Michael, Mark, Jody, Jackie and Jerry.

Cal Ripken (Asheville), a 38-year-old former catcher, has spent 18 years in the Orioles organization as player, coach and manager. He will return to Asheville this year for his third straight season in the Southern League. Cal has managed in the Baltimore system since 1961 in such places as Leesburg (FSL), Aberdeen, S.D. (Northern), Tri-City (Northewest), Miami (FSL), Elmira (Eastern), Dallas-Ft. Worth (Texas), Rochester (International) and Clearwater (Fla. Instructional). He has twice won pennants, in Aberdeen in 1964 and Tri-City in 1965, and was chosen "manager of the year" both years. In addition to managing, Cal also serves as field coordinator for the Birds' minor league spring training camp at Biscayne College in Miami.

As a player Cal had a lifetime batting average of 253 for six seasons.

As a player Cal had a lifetime batting average of .253 for six seasons and progressed as high as triple-a. He began in 1957 at Phoenix (Arizona-Mexico), was a playing manager in 1961 and 1962, then retired from playing status after the 1962 season. Cal is a native of Aberdeen, Md., and still lives there in the off season with his wife, Vi, and four children: Ellen, Cal Jr., Freddie and William Oliver.

Jim Schaffer (Lodi), "manager of the year" in the California League last year after piloting the Lodi Lions to a loop championship, will return to Lodi for the third straight season. A veteran of 16 seasons as a catcher in pro ball, Jim retured at the end of the 1970 season and has since won two pennants in three seasons as a manager. During his career he saw service with six major league clubs, five in the National League. He broke into the majors with the Cardinals and later played with the Cubs, White Sox, Mets, Phillies and Reds, and also served a tour of duty in the Dodgers organization. He batted .223 in 304 major league games. He once played all nine positions in a minor league game.

In Jim's first year as a manager he won a pennant with the Bluefield Orioles in the Appalachian Rookie League, and was promoted to Lodi the next season.

He makes his home in Coopersburg, Pa., with his wife, Jeannine, and five children: Jimmie Mark, Steven, Thomas, Eric and Traci.

George Farson. like Cal Ripken and Jim Schaffer, is a catcher turned manager. The 32-year-old from Vernon Hill, Va., will manage the Miami Orioles in 1974, after two impressive seasons at the helm of the Bluefield rookies in the Appalachian League. He will also serve as a staff member at the Birds' minor league training camp at Biscayne College in Miami. George began his managing career in 1972 after ten seasons in the Baltimore system, from Bluefield to Rochester.

George and his wife, Sarah, live in Vernon Hill during the off season with their three children: Tammy Lynn, Sandi Lea and Michael.

Bobby Malkmus. 42, former infielder with the Braves (1957), Senators (1958-1959) and Phillies (1960 thru 1962), will manage at Bluefield in 1974 after piloting the Miami Orioles last year and the Birds' Lewiston farm team in the Northwest League where he won a pennant in 1972. After his retirement as a player following the 1966 season (at the time he was in the Phillies system), he managed in the Philadelphia and Montreal organizations before joining the Orioles in 1972.

Bobby makes his home in Union, N. J., with his wife, Ruth, and children Robin and James.

Ray Miller, a 28-year-old relief specialist who served at Rochester last year as player-pitching coach, is the Birds' new minor league pitching instructor, replacing Herman Starrette who went to the Atlanta Braves as their major league pitching coach.

Ray was acquired from the Cleveland organization during the 1971 season, and in the ensuing three years at Rochester appeared in 106 games, won 11, lost 8, and saved 18. Last season, however, he appeared in only 14 games and had a 1-1 record. He has played in organized baseball since breaking in at Lexington in the Western Carolinas League in 1964 and has pitched at the triple-a level for the past six seasons.

Ray, a native of Takoma Park, Md., now lives with his wife in New Athens, Ohio.

Fred Hofmann Memorial Award: Named in memory of the long-time Orioles scout and former major league catcher who died in 1964 at the age of 70, this award is presented to a member of the Orioles' scouting and player development staff for outstanding service and dedication to the baseball "profession." Past winners: Barney Lutz (1965), Walter Youse (1966), Earl Weaver (1967), Jim Russo (1968), Don McShane (1969), Harry Dalton (honorary, 1969), Arthur Ehlers (1970), Cal Ripken (1971) and Frank McGowan (1972). No award was made in 1973.

Barney Lutz Player Award: The Orioles established this award in 1968 to honor the memory of Barney Lutz, an Orioles scout who died two years earlier. It is given "in recognition of his aggressiveness, competitive spirit, hustle and dedication to professional baseball." Past winners: infielder Billy Scripture (1968), pitcher Fred Beene, now with the Yankees (1969), infielder Paul Flesner (1970) and second baseman Rick Emard (1971). No award was made in 1973.

GRAND SLAM NOTES: Jim Gentile set an American League record and tied a major league mark in '61 when he hit five home runs with the bases full. The major league record had been established by Ernie Banks in '55... Gentile also set a major league standard by hitting consecutive bases loaded home runs at Metropolitan Stadium (Minnesota) on 5/9/61 in the 1st inning off Pete Ramos and the 3rd off Paul Gel... In addition, Gentile also had a run producing single in that game to set a club record for rbi in a game (nine).

Frank Robinson became the second player in history to hit consecutive grand slams on 6/26/70 at R.F.K. Stadium in Washington, in the 5th off Joe Coleman and 6th off Joe Grzenda. Since then, Jim Northrup (Detroit) has duplicated that feat. Four other players (Lazzeri, Tabor, York and Cloninger) have hit two grand slams in a game, but they were not on consecutive plate appearances.

Brooks Robinson who has hit more at Memorial Stadium (4) than any other player once blasted bases loaded homers in successive games—at Dodger Stadium off Angels' Ken McBride on 5/6/62 and at Memorial Stadium off the K.C. A's Ed Rakow on 5/9/62.

One of Dave McNally's two grand slams was hit in the '70 World Series, off the Reds' Wayne Granger (3rd game) . . . Dave's was the 12th grand slam in series history, but the only one ever hit by a pitcher . . . Mike Cuellar hit his grand slam in the '70 ALCS off the Twins Jim Perry in Met Stadium . . . Mike remains the only player ever to hit a bases loaded home run in championship series competition in either league.

Four opponents have hit two grand slams in Memorial Stadium: Roy Sievers (Wash.), Bill Skowron (N.Y.), Mike Epstein (Wash.) and Rico Petrocelli (Bos.) . . In all, opponents have hit 43 grand slams off Baltimore pitching including 23 in Memorial Stadium . . Neither Harmon Killebrew nor Mickey Mantle has ever hit a grand slam against the O's although Killebrew has hit more home runs vs. O's than any other opponent as well as more in Memorial Stadium—65 (30) and Mantle ranks second with 54 (25).

LONG HOME RUNS/MEMORIAL STADIUM: The longest "measured" home run ever hit in Memorial Stadium was a 471' drive by Harmon Killebrew on May 24, 1964 off Milt Pappas over the hedge in left-center field . . This exceeded by two feet the only other blast that has ever cleared the hedge . . That was one by Boog Powell 469' to the same area off Boston's Don Schwall on June 22, 1962. Aside from these there have been three balls hit into the hedge (approximately 450'), by Mickey Mantle in 1954, by Powell in 1965 and by Frank Robinson in 1967.

Frank Robinson is the only player to have hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium. In the second game of a doubleheader with Cleveland on May 8, 1966, Frank hit a Luis Tiant offering over the left field stands and into the parking lot beyond, a drive that measured 451' on the fly and rolled to a stop 540' away from home plate.

Notes On 20-Game Winners

During the six years that George Bamberger has been the Orioles' pitching coach (starting in '68), the Birds' staff has produced 12 20-game winning performances. In the club's first 14 years of operation only one pitcher was able to reach that plateau—Steve Barber in 1963.

In this period Dave McNally and Jim Palmer have each been 20-game winners four times, Mike Cuellar has been there three times and Pat Dobson once.

In 1971 four Baltimore pitchers reached the 20-win level. The only other foursome in the entire history of major league baseball to have achieved that feat were four hurlers from the 1920 White Sox (51 years earlier): Urban "Red" Faber-23, Claude Williams-22, Dickie Kerr-21 and Ed Cicotte-21. Despite that achievement, incidentally, the White Sox that year finished second, two games back of Cleveland.

The four Orioles pitchers all reached the 20-win plateau within six days: McNally was first on 9/21, then in the same weekend series in Cleveland, the other three joined him: Cuellar (9/24—1st game—clinched pennant), Dobson (9/24—2nd game), Palmer (9/26).

FIELDING NOTES: For the fourth straight year the Orioles finished second in fielding percentage, this time trailing the Tigers (.982) by .001 with an average of .981. . . . The Birds have finished first ('63, '64, '66, '69) or second ('60, '61, '68, '70, '71, '72, '73) 11 times in the past 14 seasons.

Grich/Adair: Bobby Grich established a major league record for second basemen in 1973 by putting together a fielding percentage of .995 based on only five errors in 945 total chances while playing in all 162 games. He thus surpassed the former standard of .9939 set by Jerry Adair while with the Orioles in 1964. . . . At the same time Grich tied Adair's major league mark for fewest errors—5 (150 or more games)—also set in 1964.

Adair, however, retains exclusive hold on two other marks he set with the Birds in 1964-65: most consecutive chances accepted without error (458, 7/22/64 thru 5/6/65) and most consecutive errorless games (89, 7/22/64 thru 5/6/65).

O's major league records: The Orioles hold two significant major league records as a team, both set in 1964: (1) highest fielding percentage—985 and (2) fewest errors, season—95. . . At the same time the Birds also hold the modern major league record for most passed balls, season (49), set back in 1959 when Hoyt Wilhelm was an Orioles starter.

Triple plays: Despite two triple plays last year, the Orioles have only executed five during their 20 seasons in the American League while having been victimized with the same weapon ten times. Strangely enough, the last three triple plays pulled off by the Orioles have all been of the rare around-the-horn, ground ball variety, and all have been started by Brooks Robinson:

Elrod Hendricks was the last Oriole to hit into a triple play, in Boston on 5/25/72. Duane Josephson (1b) caught his line drive, stepped on first then threw to Luis Aparicio at second for the third out. . . . On four of the 10 occasions that Birds' opponents have executed triple plays, Brooks Robinson has been the batter. Brooks grounded into one, lined into another and two were "gidp's" with a runner then being thrown out between third and home.

-BIGGEST LIFETIME WINNERS VS. ORIOLES-

Whitey Ford's recent election to the Baseball Hall of Fame came as no surprise to the Orioles. The former Yankee lefthander who retired after the 1967 season with a lifetime mark of 236-106 for 16 seasons still holds the distinction of having beaten the Orioles more often than any other pitcher, active or retired. Ford who was 30-16 vs. the Birds is followed by: Billy Pierce (23-11) and Mickey Lolich (23-14), Early Wynn and Frank Sullivan (21-8), Earl Wilson (20-9) and Camilo Pascual (20-23).

In addition to Lolich, other still active pitchers with high win totals against the Birds are: Jim Kaat (18-18), "Catfish" Hunter (17-14) and Jim Perry (17-20).

Pascual is the biggest all-time loser to the Orioles with 23 defeats. Others oft-beaten by the Birds are: Jim Perry (20), Sam McDowell (9-19), Bill Monbouquette (10-17), Dean Chance and Denny McLain (both 11-16), and Ford (16).

Lefthander Bud Daley enjoyed the most productive year ever against the Birds when he compiled a 6-1 record against them for Kansas City in 1959. Whitey Ford had back-to-back 5-2 seasons vs. the O's in 1959 and 1960, while Bob Lemon (Clev.) was 5-0 vs. Baltimore in 1956 and Mike Garcia (Clev.) was 5-1 in 1954.

Three pitchers have lost five times to the Orioles in a single season; all were 0.5: Ned Garver (K.C.), 1957; Dick Stigman (Minn.), 1963; and Stan Williams (Clev.), 1969.

1973 SEASON SUMMARY

During the glory years of 1969-71, when they won three straight American League pennants plus a world championship, the Orioles clouted their opponents into submission with a long-distance punch. In 1973, while winning the eastern division crown and missing the A.L. title by only one game, they did it more on speed than on power. The other ingredients were there—base hits galore, superior defense and excellent pitching—but it was speed that made it a different club. The O's turned into thieves as they set a club record and led the American League with 146 stolen bases. No less than eight players stole at least 11 bases, paced by Don Baylor with 32.

The excitement generated by the club matched that of the pennant-winning years and heading the list of thrill-makers were a couple of first-year youngsters, Al Bumbry and Rich Coggins. Despite playing only against righthanders, they ran their way into the hearts of Orioles fans. The educated bat of Tommy Davis, the league's leading designated hitter, was also a significant factor in the Birds comeback effort.

Through April, the O's had a share of first place in the eastern division although they were unable to detach themselves from the others. The O's, after posting only a 10-12 record during May, went into June in fourth place, 3½ games behind Detroit. Over the following five weeks things picked up and by the Fourth of July the Orioles were second but still four games behind front-running New York, which had displaced Detroit. The O's whittled that Yankee lead down to 1½ games by the all-star break.

August 12 stands out as one of the most significant dates of the seak—all

August 12 stands out as one of the most significant dates of the season, since it was on that day the O's started a 14-game winning streak—all against western clubs—which boosted them to the top of the eastern division for good, beginning August 15. The streak, longest in club history for a single season, lasted until August 28 and by that time the Os were five games ahead and headed for a final margin of eight over runner-up Boston.

It was a year for individual achievement and awards. Jim Palmer, a 22-game winner, received the Cy Young Award as the best pitcher in the league. Bumbry was named A.L. Rookie of the Year by The Sporting News and BBWAA, and there were four Gold Glove winners: Brooks Robinson (his 14th straight), Paul Blair, Mark Belanger and Bob Grich, who set an all-time major league record for second basemen as he committed only five errors while handling 945 total chances, a .995 percentage. Lastly, but by no means the least important, one person received an award that many felt was long overdue—Earl Weaver was named A.L. Manager of the Year by the Associated Press, the first time he has been so honored.

The Longest Day: The two clubs split a day-night doubleheader September 3 at Fenway in which offense was featured both day and night . . In the day game, won 13-8 by the O's, Paul Blair had two home runs and Earl Williams added another . . . One of Blair's was an inside-the-park with two runners aboard . . . In the nightcap, the Red Sox erupted for seven runs in the 8th to wipe out an 8-2 deficit and gain a 9-8 win.

Classy Duel: Luis Tiant and Jim Palmer matched pitches for 12 innings September 4 before Palmer made a mistake and Ben Oglivie hit it out for a home run that gave the Red Sox a 2-1 triumph at Fenway.

Blair's Efforts: The O's most potent batsman against the Red Sox was Paul Blair, who hit .397 (25-for-63) with five home runs and 13 rbi.

CALIFORNIA: The O's and Angels split the season series right down the middle, each winning three and losing three home and away.

Show of Stardom: In his first appearance against the Orioles, April 24 at Anaheim Stadium, Frank Robinson clouted a three-run homer that keyed a 6-5 comeback win for the Angels in 10 innings . . . The O's had a 5-0 lead into the 6th, when Robinson launched a 435-foot drive over the left field wall.

More Stardom: The O's presented Robinson with his Baltimore uniform iersey (No, 20) before the May Agame at Manacial Stadium.

His third homer of the night was a two-run blow in the 10th that won the game . . . The O's were down, 8-3, but tied it with a five-run rally in the 9th . . . Stanton ranks with Cleveland's Rocky Colavito and Manny Jimenez of the A's as the only players ever to hit at least three homers in a game at Memorial Stadium . . . Colavito hit four in a game in 1959 and Jimenez got three in a game in 1964.

CHICAGO: The Orioles won twice as many as they lost against the White Sox, finishing with an 8-4 record . . . The O's took five of six at Memorial Stadium and split (3-3) in Chicago.

Boomers: Richie Allen hit two booming home runs against the O's May 1 at White Sox Park, including one that landed atop the left field roof . . .
Only 15 others had done that previously.

Big Frame: Seven runs were scored by the O's in the 8th inning of the June 6 game which topped off a 14-4 rout of the Sox.

Orioles MVPs: Three Orioles have won "mvp" honors in all star competition: Billy O'Dell (1958), Brooks Robinson (1966) and Frank Robinson (1971). O'Dell, the former Orioles lefthander who also pitched for the Giants, Braves and Pirates, hurled the last three innings of the only all star game ever played in Baltimore, and retired all nine batters he faced to protect a one-run lead, thus giving the A.L. a 4-3 win. . . . Brooks won the '66 Arch Ward Memorial Trophy on the strength of a 3-for-4 effort at bat (including a triple) and an 8-for-8 performance afield. He was the first player from a losing team to be so honored. . . Frank's fourth inning home run at Detroit in '71 put the American League on top to stay and earned him "mvp" honors. It was the A.L.'s first all star victory since 1962.

Brooks Robinson: Brooks has now played in 17 consecutive all star

Brooks Robinson: Brooks has now played in 17 consecutive all star games (including two games each in '60, '61, and '62) and has been a starter ten times, starting with both games in 1961 and including eight of the last 11 (beginning 1964). His lifetime average is .310 (13-for-42) with three triples, one home run and five rbi. He has also handled 43 chances (11 putouts, 32 assists) without error.

In addition to winning the "mvp" award in the 1966 all star game Brooks came close on two other occasions. In 1964 at Shea Stadium he went 2-for-4 with a two-run triple and made a sensational defensive play on an Orlando Cepeda smash, then in 1970 at Cincinnati went 2-for-3, hit another triple and drove in two runs.

Jim Palmer has pitched in three all star games ('70, '71, '72), started twice, worked a total of eight innings, and has not allowed a run while yielding only three hits, walking two and striking out eight. Ironically enough, in 1973, the year he won the Cy Young Award, he was not selected to the all star team.

The 1973 game: Last year in Kansas City's impressive new Royals Stadium, the National League won for the tenth time in the last 11 all star games and improved its overall record to 25-18-1 with a 7-1 victory. After spotting the A.L. a 1-0 lead in the second, the National League stars went ahead in the third to stay. Johnny Bench, Bobby Bonds and Willie Davis homered while Bonds also doubled and, though he was not in the starting lineup, was voted the Arch Ward Memorial

SUSPENDED GAME RULE: A game terminated by curfew or by a pre-arranged time limit is a suspended game only if it has progressed far enough to be an official game (i.e. 41/2 to 5 innings).

A game terminated by light failure is a suspended game anytime after it begins.

Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension immediately preceding the next scheduled single game between the two clubs on the same ground . . . If this is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in American League Regulation 3.8.

A game called at the END of a completed inning AFTER NINE INNINGS for any reason shall be a SUSPENDED game. This rule became effective in 1969. Formerly, the game would have been declared a tie and replayed in its entirety at a later date.

BALTIMORE CURFEW: Night Games—see A.L. Regulation 3.4 (13) —Saturday night—play must be called at 11:59 P.M. regardless of the game situation . . . All other nights—no inning may be started after 11:59 P.M., but any inning which begins before that time may be completed.

In other American League cities not governed by local curfews, no inning may start after 1:00 A.M., but any inning beginning prior to 1:00 A.M. may be played to completion.

BATTING/PITCHING (ERA) CHAMPION QUALIFICATION: more plate appearances/162 or more innings.

ROOKIE QUALIFICATIONS: A player shall be considered a rookie unless, during a previous season or seasons, he has (a) exceeded 130 at bats or 50 innings pitched in the major leagues; or (b) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a major league club or clubs during the period of the 25-player limit (opening day thru Aug. 31) excluding time in military service.

NEW SAVE RULE (10:20): A relief pitcher can be credited with a save when-(1) in entering the game the potential tying run is either on base or at the plate and he preserves the lead, or (2) he pitches at least three effective innings and preserves the lead.

When more than one relief pitcher qualifies for a save under this rule, the save shall be credited to that relief pitcher judged by the official scorer to have been the most effective. It is not mandatory to credit a save. Only one save can be credited in any game.

DEFINITION OF NIGHT GAME: Any game scheduled to start after 6:00 P.M. (i.e. 6:01 P.M. or later) will be considered a night game. If a game is scheduled to start at 6:00 P.M. and is delayed by rain or for any other reason, it will be considered a day game.

However, both games of a twi-night doubleheader shall be considered night games. When afternoon and night games are played on the same date and separate admissions are charged, they will be counted as one day and one night game, and will not be included in doubleheader statistics.

BITS ABOUT THE BIRDS

JAPAN TRIP '71: Three days after losing the '71 World Series to the Pirates in seven games, the Orioles embarked on a 31-day trip, spanning more than 20,000 miles, to play 18 games against the best baseball players in Japan. While traveling to 14 different cities via plane, train, bus, ferry and hydrofoil, the O's won 12 games, lost two and tied four before an estimated 450,000 fans.

The trip was sponsored by the *Yomiuri Shimbun*, one of the largest newspapers in the world and owners of the perennial Japanese champion Tokyo (Yomiuri) Giants.

The Orioles' principal opponents on the tour were the Giants, kingpins of the Central League, who had just won their seventh straight Japan Series (equivalent to our world series between pennant winners from Central and Pacific Leagues), and have since won their eighth and ninth in a row. The Giants have won 14 national championships since the present two league structure was adopted in '50 and have finished first in their league 28 times in the 38 years since professional baseball was inaugurated in Japan in '36.

In head to head competition, the Orioles did not lose to the Giants. The Birds won eight and tied three (all in extra innings) vs. Yomiuri. Against combination teams and all star groups, the O's were 4-2-1.

O's BIGGEST WINNERS FOR LAST 17 YEARS: It was in 1957 that the Orioles first began to jell as a team. That year they finished at .500 (76-76) for the first time after having gone 180-282 in their first three Baltimore seasons ('54, '55, '56). During the 17 years that have elapsed, from 1957 thru 1973, the Orioles have gone on to win more games than any other major league club, 1521-1183, .563.

O's BIGGEST WINNERS FOR LAST 14 YEARS: Perhaps a more significant starting point for the Orioles' emergence from a perennial also-ran to a consistent contender would be the 1960 season, the year the Orioles made their first bid for the pennant. On Labor Day eve that season, they held a two game lead over the Yankees and as late as September 15 were in a virtual tie with the Bombers. They ran out of gas at that point, but still finished second with an 89-65 record. It was the first time the O's had ever finished in the first division.

During the 14 years that have elapsed from 1960 thru 1973, the Birds have wound up in the first division 12 times and have won more games than any other club in either league. In fact, with a record of 1297-948 (.578), they have won 62 games more than their closest competitors, the Cincinnati Reds. 100 WINS: The Orioles won more than 100 games in each of three straight seasons—'69 (109), '70 (108) and '71 (101). Only two other clubs have achieved this feat in the history of major league baseball: the '29-'30-'31 Philadelphia A's (104-102-107) and the '42-'43-'44 St. Louis Cardinals (106-105-105).

NUMBER "20" RETIRED: After Frank Robinson was traded to the Dodgers following the '71 season, his uniform number "20" was retired as an expression of respect and gratitude for his many achievements during six Baltimore seasons that produced four American League pennants and two world championships. Frank was the first Orioles player to be so honored. Following is a list (complete, we hope) of other baseball players and/or managers whose uniforms have been permanently retired!

EAST vs. WEST: Last year for the fourth time in five seasons the eastern division teams of the American League won more games than their western counterparts in inter-divisional play. The west held the edge in the first phase of competition between the divisions, but the east came back to win the next three and finished with a 226-206 advantage. -BIRDS' FIRST GAME IN BALTIMORE IN '54-

The modern American League Orioles made their Baltimore debut in Memorial Stadium on April 15, 1954 before a crowd of 46,354 including Vice President Richard M. Nixon who threw out the first ball. Behind the seven hit pitching of Bob Turley who fanned nine, the Orioles of Jimmy Dykes defeated Paul Richards' White Sox, 3-1, in Baltimore's first American League game in 52 years.

Clint Courtney won the distinction of hitting the first home run in the brand new stadium (built on the site of the previous municipally owned ballpark used by the International League O's). It was a bases empty blast off Virgil Trucks who also yielded a solo homer to Vern Stephens in the fourth and was the losing pitcher. The Birds' starting lineup in that game was: Bobby Young, 2b; Eddie Waitkus, 1b; Gil Coan, cf; Vic Wertz, rf; Sam Mele, lf; Stephens, 3b; Billy Hunter, ss; Courtney, c and Turley, p.

---- SHRINE OF IMMORTALS---

The Shrine, jointly sponsored by the Orioles and Maryland Professional Baseball Players Association, was created in 1960 to recognize men with Maryland backgrounds who have distinguished themselves in professional baseball . . . To qualify, a candidate must either be a native of Maryland or have been a player or official of the Orioles, International or American League, for a minimum of three years.

There are presently 19 members in the Shrine: Frank (Home Run) Baker, Jack Bentley, Max Bishop, Joe Boley, Jack Dunn Sr., Jimmy Foxx, Lefty Grove, Buck Herzog, Merwin Jacobson, Charlie Keller, Fritz Maisel, Bill Nicholson, Johnny Neun, Babe Phelps, Dick Porter, Jack Ogden, Eddie Rommel, Babe Ruth and Tommy Thomas.

--- ORIOLE ADVOCATES, INC.--

The Oriole Advocates, Inc. is a unique non-profit corporation dedicated to promoting and stimulating interest in the game of baseball at both the amateur and professional levels. The organization, founded officially in July 1960, comprises 50 regular members and 12 associates drawn from a wide cross section of the business community.

Thru the years the Advocates have made substantial financial con-The the years the Advocates have made substantial financial contributions primarily to youth organizations, and have played a major role in the restoration of Babe Ruth's birthplace on Emory Street. They have also become an essential arm of the Orioles public relations and promotions program. On "give away" days it is the Advocates who distribute the items to the fans, and it was they who originated "camera days" at Memorial Stadium. At virtually every Orioles promotion the Oriole Adovcates are heavily involved.

Their biggest contribution of all, however, has been the formation and annual operation of the Junior Orioles program that began back in 1963 with 750 youngsters and has now grown to over 15,000 members every year. It is a massive undertaking, a "knothole" program with class, that requires a great deal of time and effort. There's an old saying that if you want something done well, ask a busy person to do it . . . The Oriole Advocates are a case in point.

-- MAGIC NUMBER -

To calculate: Determine number of games to be played by first place club . . . Add 1 . . . Subtract the number of games first place club is ahead of second place club in the all-important lost column (AILC). The result represents the magic number . . . Example: If first team has 20 games to play and is six games ahead of second team . . . $20+1=21\ldots 21-6=15\ldots 15$ is the magic number.

When, in any combination, first team wins added to second team losses equal the magic number, first team has clinched the championship . . From another angle—with each subsequent first team win or second team loss, the magic number is decreased by one . . . When the "M.N." is down to one, first team has clinched a tie, when it is reduced to zero, first team has won the title.

During the fiscal year ending October 31, 1973, the Baltimore Baseball Club, Inc. realized a net profit of \$45,521 (pre-tax profit was \$85,190). This was made possible by income of approximately \$350,000 derived from participation in the five game championship series with Oakland. Exclusive of championship series revenue, the club would have sustained a net loss of \$264,810.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT

In 1972, the only year in the past five that the Orioles have not been involved in post-season play, the club suffered a net loss of \$214,582 (reduced from \$430,301 by a tax refund from prior years).

The major league draft is held annually at the opening session of baseball's winter meetings, and is followed with a separate selection by National Association clubs from class aaa to a levels . . . Until 1958 major league clubs could draft players within a range between \$15,000 (for aaa players) down to \$2,000 (for class d players) . . . In 1958 the price for big league drafts rose to \$25,000. However, in 1959, a first year player draft at the big league level was set up to discourage the payment of inordinately large bonus payments to free agents. The new rule provided that first year players could be selected at the major league level (if not protected on a major league team's 40 man roster) for \$12,000. In 1961 an even lower draft price was set up for more recent first year players. That figure was \$8,000. That year, incidentally, the Baltimore organization set a record of sorts by being relieved of 19 eligible first year players (seven during the big league selections and 11 more during the minor league draft). In 1965 the first year player draft by major lague clubs began to lose its significance as the result of tighter restrictions designed to limit wholesale raids on first year talent, and then disappeared in 1970.

In game one the Reds established a pattern they followed in four of the five games . . . taking the early lead . . . Meanwhile, Gary Nolan set the O's down in order in the first three innings.

Umpire Ken Burkhart also went out to position himself to call it fair or foul and surprise, surprise, Carbo was coming from third . . . Carbo came in on the foul side of the line, Hendricks dove at him from the fair side and both made contact with Burkhart, who ended up sitting down with his back to the plate. There was no question that Hendricks tagged the runner with his gloved hand, but the ball was in the other and subsequent photos and film proved that Carbo didn't touch the plate on the way in . . . Burkhart called the runner out. A vehement argument ensued.

The score was still tied at three when Brooks hit a 7th inning home run off Nolan and that was to be the clincher . . . In the 9th Palmer fanned pinch hitters Jimmy Stewart and Angel Bravo to open the inning, his first two strikeouts of the game . . . The first world series night game ever played (after 397 day games) drew a record baseball crowd for Pittsburgh and the largest TV audience ever for a baseball event, an estimated 62,330,000.

The game, itself, was decided by a pair of 21-year old Pirates: Bruce Kison and Milt May. Kison, who relieved starter Luke Walker in the 1st with the Birds already ahead 3-0, proceeded to pitch six and one-third scoreless innings during which he allowed just one hit and no walks though he did set a series record by plunking three Baltimore batters with pitched balls.

The Pirates battled back to tie the game in the 3rd off Pat Dobson who had not worked in 15 days, and in the 7th, young May, batting for Kison with two on and two out, singled home Bob Robertson with the tie breaking (and winning) run. Premier reliefer Dave Giusti then retired six straight Orioles over the last two innings to preserve the narrow margin.

Dobson left with one out in the 6th after yielding 10 hits and three walks, but Grant Jackson bailed the Birds out of a tough spot. Watt came on in the 7th and was the victim of singles by Robertson and Sanguillen that preceded May's winning safety.

The most controversial play of the series occurred in the 3rd inning when Clemente, batting with one out and Richie Hebner on first, lined a shot to right field that cleared the inside fence near the foul line. Umpire John Rice who was covering the right field line in this game ruled that it was a foul ball, but to many it appeared to have been fair. Thru the eight innings Mike worked, he too yielded just four base hits, but a home run by Roberto Clemente in the 4th after Cuellar had retired all 11 previous Pittsburgh hitters broke the ice, and then in the 8th, a single by Willie Stargell, followed by Pagan's hit and run double that scored Stargell all the way from first, gave the Pirates a 2-0 lead.

In the first seven innings, the Birds nicked Blass for two harmless safeties. In the home half of the 8th, down by two, the Birds finally scored. Hendricks opened with a single thru shortstop then Belanger looped a single to center. With none out Tom Shopay batted for Cuellar and sacrificed the runners to second and third. When Buford bounced to Bob Robertson at first, Hendricks scored. But with the tieing run on third, Blass retired Dave Johnson to end the inning.

Blass was up to the final challenge in the 9th and set down Boog Powell, Frank Robinson, and Merv Rettenmund in order to give Pittsburgh its fourth world championship in six world series. All four Pirate series wins have been in seven games.

Born in St. Louis, Mo., now makes home in Baltimore . . . Has managed Orioles to three American League pennants, four Eastern Division titles, plus one world championship, in five full years on the job . . . O's have compiled 543-337 record (.617 percentage) since he was named manager July 11, 1968, succeeding Hank Bauer . . His club's total of 318 wins during the 1969-70-71 seasons established an A.L. record for most victories in three consecutive seasons, surpassing the previous mark (313) set by the 1929-30-31 Philadelphia A's. Named "Manager of Year" by A.P. in 1973 . . . Has best won-lost percentage (.617) among all managers with five or more years service in major league history (see page 37).

His clubs have compiled 11-3 record in four American League championship series and were 10-0 until A's won second game of '73 ALCS . . . Managed A.L. all star team in 1970, 1971 and 1972.

Served as first base coach for Orioles in first half of 1968 season, after spending 11 years honing skills as manager in Orioles farm system . . . Compiled an excellent record as his clubs won three pennants and finished second five times . . . Flag winners were at Appleton (1960) in the Three-I League, Elmira (1964) in the Eastern League and Rochester (1966) in the International League.

Since his first full season as a manager in 1957, Earl has finished in the first division 20 times in 22 tries (including five winter league teams) . . . From 1960 to the present, he has skippered 20 teams and finished either first or second with 18 of them.

Started pro career in 1948 as an infielder in the Cardinals' chain . . . Signed to first contract by Walter Shannon, former scouting director for the Orioles . . . Never played in the majors but went to spring training with the Cardinals in 1952 . . . Primarily a second baseman . . Played on pennant winning teams in each of his first four years . .
