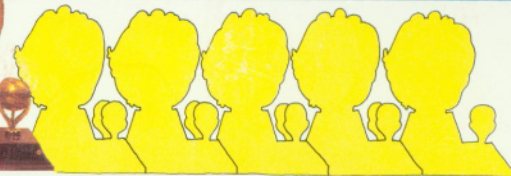

BIRDS' FIRST GAME IN BALTIMORE IN '54

The modern American League Orioles made their Baltimore debut in Memorial Stadium on April 15, 1954 before a crowd of 46,354 including Vice President Richard M. Nixon who threw out the first ball. Behind the seven hit pitching of Bob Turley who fanned nine, the Orioles of Jimmy Dykes defeated Paul Richards' White Sox, 3-1, in Baltimore's first American League game in 52 years. Chico Carrasquel, the Chicago shortstop, was the first to bat in the new stadium and singled off Turley.

Clint Courtney won the distinction of hitting the first home run in the brand new stadium (built on the site of the previous municipally owned ballpark used by the International League O's). It was a bases empty blast off Virgil Trucks who also yielded a solo homer to Vern Stephens in the fourth and was the losing pitcher.

The Birds' starting lineup in that game was: Bobby Young, 2b; Eddie Waitkus, 1b; Gil Coan, cf; Vic Wertz, rf; Sam Mele, lf; Stephens, 3b; Billy Hunter, ss; Courtney, c and Turley, p.

1976 ATTENDANCE NOTES: The largest home crowd for a regular season game in the Orioles' 23-year history attended the Crown Central Petroleum Jersey Night game vs. the Royals on May 8—51,195—exceeding the previous record of 48,042, set the previous year on Crown Jacket Night . . . An Orioles' opening day record was also set when 46,425 paid to see the O's and Red Sox on April 9. Another huge crowd of 47,153 witnessed the August 28 Jacket Night game against Texas, co-sponsored by WJZ-TV.

Total home attendance of 1,058,609 was the highest at Memorial Stadium since 1969. It was the tenth time the O's have gone over one million at home since 1954.

On the road, the Birds went over one million for the 11th straight time and the 13th time overall, with a draw of 1,307,920, third highest in club history and less than 4,000 admissions below the existing record set in 1970.

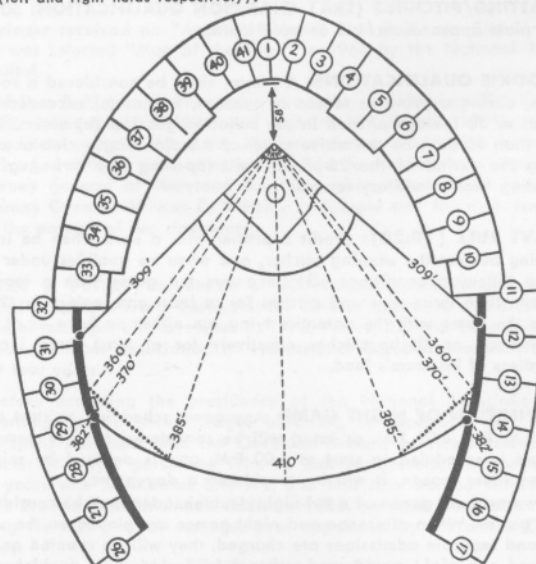

RULES OF INTEREST

MAJOR LEAGUE TRADING REGULATIONS

A.L. waivers are not necessary to assign a player contract from one club to another within the league from midnight on the last day of the season thru midnight, June 15 (Pacific time).

A.L. waivers are necessary to assign a player contract from one club to another within the league from 12:01 A.M., June 16 thru midnight, the last day of the season (Pacific time).

A.L. waivers are necessary before a player contract may be assigned from the American League to the National League except during inter-league trading periods. Both A.L. and N.L. waivers are necessary between 12:01 A.M., June 16 and midnight, the last day of the season.

Inter League Trading Periods

From 12:01 A.M. on fifth day after completion of world series thru midnight preceding the last scheduled day of the winter meetings, and

From 12:01 A.M., Feb. 15 thru midnight, March 15.

SUSPENDED GAME RULE: A game terminated by curfew or by a pre-arranged time limit is a suspended game only if it has progressed far enough to be an official game (i.e. 4½ to 5 innings).

A game terminated by light failure is a suspended game anytime after it begins.

Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension immediately preceding the next scheduled single game between the two clubs on the same ground . . . If this is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in American League Regulation 3.8.

A game called at the END of a completed inning AFTER NINE INNINGS for any reason shall be a SUSPENDED game. This rule became effective in 1969. Formerly, the game would have been declared a tie and replayed in its entirety at a later date.

BALTIMORE CURFEW: Night Games—see A.L. Regulation 3.4 (13)—Saturday night—play must be called at 11:59 P.M. regardless of the game situation . . . All other nights—no inning may be started after 11:59 P.M., but any inning which begins before that time may be completed.

In other American League cities not governed by local curfews, no inning may start after 1:00 A.M., but any inning beginning prior to 1:00 A.M. may be played to completion.

BATTING/PITCHING (ERA) CHAMPION QUALIFICATION: 502 or more plate appearances/162 or more innings.

ROOKIE QUALIFICATIONS: A player shall be considered a rookie unless, during a previous season or seasons, he has (a) exceeded 130 at bats or 50 innings pitched in the major leagues; or (b) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a major league club or clubs during the period of the 25-player limit (opening day thru Aug. 31) excluding time in military service.

SAVE RULE (10:20): Credit a pitcher with a save when he is the finishing but not the winning pitcher, and when he qualifies under one of the following conditions—(1) he enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitches for at least one inning; or (2) he enters the game with the potential tying run either on base or at bat, or on deck; or (3) he pitches effectively for at least three innings regardless of his team's lead.

DEFINITION OF NIGHT GAME: Any game scheduled to start after 6:00 P.M. (i.e. 6:01 P.M. or later) will be considered a night game. If a game is scheduled to start at 6:00 P.M. and is delayed by rain or for any other reason, it will be considered a day game.

However, both games of a two-night doubleheader shall be considered night games. When afternoon and night games are played on the same date and separate admissions are charged, they will be counted as one day and one night game, and will not be included in doubleheader statistics.

BALTIMORE BASEBALL CLUB OFFICERS

JEROLD C. HOFFBERGER has been chairman of the board since October, 1965. In that span of eleven seasons, the Orioles have won two world championships, four pennants and five eastern titles.

He was president of the National Brewing Company for 28 years (1947 to 1975) until October, 1975 when he became board chairman, president and chief executive officer of Carling National Breweries, Inc., formed by the joining together of The Carling Brewing Co., U. S. and the National Brewing Company. (National's participation involved only its brewing assets and did not include its stock in the Baltimore Orioles.)

In addition to his interest in the Carling National Breweries and the Baltimore Orioles, Mr. Hoffberger is a Director and Chairman of the Executive Committee of Fairchild Industries, a Director of the Maryland National Bank, the Motor Freight Express, and a number of other corporations. He is also a Director of the United States Brewers Association, and a member of its Executive Committee.

In November, 1975, Hoffberger was elected president of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds of North America. He is an officer and director of numerous other organizations including the boards of Johns Hopkins and Sinai Hospitals.

He was named "Man of the Year" in 1966 by the Advertising Club of Baltimore and "Outstanding Man of Industry" in 1971 by the Baltimore Jaycees.

Baltimore native . . . Educated at the University of Virginia . . . Served with the U.S. Army in World War II and achieved rank of captain . . . He and wife, Alice, have three boys and one girl . . . Ardent horseman and longtime breeder of thoroughbred horses.

ZANVYL KRIEGER, Treasurer and Chairman of the Executive Committee, was one of the principal figures in bringing the St. Louis Browns franchise to Baltimore in late 1953, and also played a primary role in re-establishing a professional football franchise in Baltimore earlier that year. He has been on the Orioles' board from the beginning and became treasurer in 1957. He has also served as a vice-president and director of the Baltimore Colts, and was board chairman of the Baltimore Clippers (America Hockey League) from their founding in 1962 to 1974.

Krieger, counsel to the law firm of Weinberg and Green, is a director of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, the John F. Kennedy Institute for Rehabilitation of Retarded Children, the National Jewish Hospital, the Greater Baltimore Committee and the Baltimore Promotion Council. He is also a trustee of Associated Jewish Charities and a member of the Baltimore City College Hall of Fame.

Krieger received an "Award of Merit" from Baltimore City in 1970 and was selected "Man of the Year" in 1968 by the National Jewish Hospital.

He is a Baltimore native and a graduate of Baltimore City College (1924), Johns Hopkins (1928) and Harvard Law School (1931) . . . He served four years in U.S. Army Air Force during World War II and was discharged with the rank of major . . . Prior to the war, he was assistant attorney general of Maryland for three years, during the tenure of Attorney General William C. Walsh . . . Krieger and his wife, Isabelle, are the parents of two daughters.

HENRY J. PETERS, a veteran of 30 years in professional baseball, officially replaced Frank Cashen as the Orioles' executive vice-president/general manager on November 3, 1975. Peters, 52, had been president of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues for the past four years.

Before accepting the presidency of the National Association (the governing body of minor league baseball), in December, 1971, Peters had spent five years with the Cleveland Indians as vice-president and director of player personnel. Prior to that assignment, he had logged ten years with the Kansas City A's, and had also worked with the St. Louis Browns and Cincinnati Reds. In 1965, he had the distinction of being the last general manager ever appointed by A's owner Charlie Finley.

A St. Louis native, Peters broke into baseball in 1946, following three years with the U.S. Army in World War II during which he spent most of his duty in England, Germany, and Czechoslovakia. He started with the hometown Browns in the minor league department under Farm Director Jim McLaughlin (now the Orioles' coordinator of scouting and player development) and General Manager Bill DeWitt. When that franchise was sold and moved to Baltimore in October, 1953, Peters took a job as general manager of the independent Burlington, Iowa club in the Class B Three-I League.

After the 1954 season, he joined the new Kansas City A's organization as farm director and remained in that position through 1960. In early 1961, Peters left the A's, following a disagreement with Finley, and spent the balance of the year working, again for DeWitt, as farm director of the Cincinnati Reds (who won the N.L. pennant that season).

He returned to the A's in December, 1961, as assistant general manager and farm director and was appointed general manager in 1965. During his tenure in Kansas City such future stars as Jim "Catfish" Hunter, Bert Campaneris, Reggie Jackson, Sal Bando, Joe Rudi, Rick Monday, Gene Tenace, and Rollie Fingers were developed in the A's farm system.

Peters moved to Cleveland in 1966 and remained there until he was elected to succeed retiring National Association President Phil Piton. At that time, National Association headquarters were located in Columbus, Ohio, but in September, 1973, Peters relocated the office in St. Petersburg, Fla.

Hank and his wife, Dorothy, whom he met while both were working for the Browns, have been married for 26 years. They have two children: Sharon (21) and Steve (24), who is business manager of the Ft. Lauderdale Yankees in the Florida State League.

J. FRANK CASHEN accepted the position of senior vice-president, marketing services of Carling National Breweries, Inc. in November, 1975. He had been executive vice-president of the Orioles since October, 1966 and general manager since October, 1971. Cashen remains as a vice-president of the ball club and a member of its board of directors.

JACK DUNN, Vice-President for Business Affairs, supervises stadium operations and concessions. A Baltimore native, he has been directly associated with professional baseball since his early youth. He is the grandson of the late Jack Dunn who owned and managed the International League Orioles to seven straight pennants from 1919 through 1925.

Dunn was president, general manager, part-time manager and a player for the pennant winning Centreville Orioles in the Eastern Shore League in 1946 . . . He served at various times as owner, president, general manager and manager of the International League Orioles before the Browns franchise was transferred to Baltimore in October, 1953.

Since then he has been traveling secretary, assistant to the general manager, public relations director, and play-by-play announcer, and became a vice president in 1965. He is the third largest Orioles stockholder.

A graduate of Boys Latin School and Princeton University, Dunn was a fighter pilot during World War II. He and his wife, Mary Rose, have two children: Jack IV and Barbara.

JOSEPH P. HAMPER, JR., Secretary and Vice-President for Financial Affairs, joined the Orioles in February, 1954, became controller in 1958, and was named a vice-president in 1966. He served as executive vice-president of the Baltimore Bays of the North American Soccer League, a wholly owned subsidiary of the Orioles, from 1967 through 1969.

A certified public accountant, Hamper has attended Johns Hopkins University. During World War II he served in the U.S. Infantry and spent three months as a prisoner of war in Germany. He is a bachelor.

FARM SYSTEM—1976

In 1976, for the 15th consecutive season,* the Orioles' farm system compiled a composite winning record. The Birds' five-club minor league network posted a 315-245 record (.563), while producing a total of 15 all-star team selections. Four of the teams captured at least a share of first place in their respective leagues:

—**Rochester** (Class AAA) won its fourth International League pennant in six years before losing to Richmond in the playoffs.

—**Charlotte** (Class AA) took the first half of the Southern League's eastern division race, finished third in the second half, then dropped a one-game playoff to Orlando for the division title.

—**Miami** (Class A) edged Ft. Lauderdale to win the southern division of the Florida State League by half a game, then lost to Lakeland in the semi-finals of post-season playoffs. It was 7th first place finish for Miami in last nine seasons.

—**In the Appalachian League** (Rookie), where there is no playoff action, the Bluefield Orioles won the northern division title. The Pulaski franchise, co-sponsored by the Orioles and Phillies in the same league, was the only entry in the system to finish out of the "money" and with a losing record.

*During this 15 year period (beginning 1962) Orioles farm teams have compiled a percentage of .538 (5571-4785), highest among the major league farm systems.

The Orioles have been chosen as the Topps "Baseball Organization of the Year" three times: 1966, 1971 and 1972. The winner of that annual award is determined by a formula that emphasizes the quality of individual prospects in a baseball system rather than team won-lost records.

FARM SYSTEM—1976 (Cont.)

ROCHESTER

The Red Wings (88-50) were only 12-18 and in seventh place on May 25; but, from that point on, went 76-32 (.704), put together winning streaks of 16 and 14 games, took over first place permanently June 30, and wound up with a 6½-game lead over Syracuse (Yankees).

Plagued by 20 rainouts (14 of them at home), the Wings were forced to play the staggering total of 22 doubleheaders, but prospered under the pressure, sweeping 12, splitting nine and losing only one while putting together an overall won-lost record of 33-11 in twin bills.

Three Rochester players were named to the International League all-star team including second baseman Rich Dauer, the batting champion (.336), and pitchers Dennis Martinez and Scott McGregor, voted the top righthander and top lefthander respectively.

Martinez, who later became the first Nicaraguan ever to play in the majors when he joined the Orioles in September, topped the I.L. in wins (14-8), era (2.50), strikeouts (140), and complete games (16) over 180 innings. McGregor, 12-6, started the season with Syracuse, but was sent to Rochester as part of the 10-player June 15 deal between Baltimore and New York. He was tops in the circuit in shutouts (6) and was second to Martinez in complete games (14).

Dauer, who won the batting championship on his final time at bat, also paced the I.L. in hits (176), drove in 78 runs, and finished in a three-way tie with Syracuse shortstop Mickey Klutts and Toledo first baseman Joe Lis for "most valuable player" honors.

Kiko Garcia did not win an all-star berth, but turned in his best pro season since signing with the Orioles in 1971. He batted .276, led the league with 10 triples, and was first among International League shortstops in chances accepted and double plays.

Manager Joe Altobelli, who will pilot the San Francisco Giants next year, was honored as the International League's "manager of the year" for the third time. His teams won four pennants during his six-year tenure at Rochester and barely missed a fifth in 1975.

CHARLOTTE

Charlotte (74-66 composite; 37-28 first half and 37-38 second half), managed by Jim Schaffer, contributed righthander Dave Ford, first baseman Eddie Murray, second baseman Blake Doyle, and third baseman Marty Parrill to the Southern League all-star squad.

Ford, the O's top draft choice in June, 1975, was voted the league's outstanding pitcher. He led in wins (17), complete games (19), innings (212), strikeouts (121), and tied in shutouts (4). Murray batted .298 with 12 home runs and 46 rbi prior to his July promotion to Rochester where he hit .274 and added 11 home runs and 40 rbi.

Doyle, brother of Red Sox' second baseman Denny, was also selected as the Southern League's "top hustler." His 529 at bats and 158 hits were league highs, and his .299 average placed him fourth among leading qualifiers. Parrill was the league's best defensive third baseman with a .951 fielding percentage. He batted .274 with 16 home runs and his 66 rbi were high for the club.

Among other Charlotte standouts were outfielder Rafael Liranzo, who tied for the league lead in triples (10), and righthanded relief pitcher Randy Miller, the loop's top fireman with 19 saves. Tony Chevez, a Nicaraguan like Dennis Martinez, was 7-3 for Charlotte after going 9-2 at Miami, giving him a 16-5 record overall and making him the second biggest winner (behind Ford) in the Baltimore farm system.

MIAMI

Miami (79-63), under the direction of manager Len Johnston, logged its seventh first place finish in the last nine years after being on top nearly all season. The Miami pitching staff, which fashioned a composite 2.79 era and logged 63 complete games, offset the club's general lack of power as indicated by the Miami Orioles' total of 13 home runs in 142 games.

Three Miami players received league all-star recognition: first baseman Tom Chism, from Chester, Pa., who hit .287 and was among the leaders in rbi (62) and walks (69); outfielder Marshall Edwards, the loop's third ranking hitter at .296 and the top base stealer in both the FSL and the Orioles' organization with 57; and righthander Rick Mayo, the winningest pitcher (15-7). Designated hitter Bobby Glenn Smith won the batting crown (.324), but was not named to the all-star team.

FARM SYSTEM—1976 (Cont.)

BLUEFIELD AND PULASKI

At Bluefield (42-28), managed by Ben Hines, Appalachian League "player of the year" Mark Corey hit an even .400 to become the fourth player in that league (since 1937) to reach that lofty figure (Tony Oliva was the last to do it in 1961). The rookie from Central Arizona Junior College set league records for most hits (114) and most total bases (191) and led in four other offensive categories: runs (62), triples (8), home runs (17), and rbi (59).

Four other "Baby Orioles" also made the all-star squad from Bluefield: outfielder Vernon Thomas (.317), who led the league in doubles (19); first baseman Jim Skaalen (.278); shortstop Jim Smith (.290); and righthander Clint Thomas (11-4), who led the league in wins and complete games (8).

Lefthander Pete Torrez (9-2) paced all pitchers in starts (15), innings (19), and strikeouts (102).

Manager Art Mazmanian's Pulaski club was shut out of all-star mention, but outfielder Jose Perez Torres batted .354 in 51 games and hit 14 doubles.

FARM SYSTEM MANAGERS—1977

KEN BOYER, former National League "most valuable player" (1964) who batted .287 and hit 282 home runs in 15 major league seasons, will manage the Rochester Red Wings in 1977.

Boyer, manager of the Tulsa Oilers, the St. Louis Cardinals' affiliate in the AAA American Association the past three seasons, replaces Joe Altobelli who left Rochester after six years as manager to pilot the San Francisco Giants in 1977.

One of five brothers who played professional baseball (including two others who also played in the majors—Clete and Cloyd), Boyer spent 11 full seasons with the Cardinals, from 1955 thru 1965, after working his way up through their farm system. Later he played for the Mets, White Sox and Dodgers.

Upon his retirement following the 1969 season at Los Angeles, Boyer returned to the St. Louis organization. He managed their Texas League farm club (Little Rock) in 1970, coached for the Cardinals in 1971 and 1972, then resumed his managing career in 1973 at Sarasota in the Gulf Coast League.

In 1974, his first year as manager at Tulsa, he won a division title, then captured the league championship in post-season playoffs. Under his direction, Tulsa finished second and third respectively in 1975 and 1976.

The 45-year-old Liberty, Missouri native, who now lives in Hermann, Missouri (near St. Louis), was a prime candidate to succeed Red Schoendienst whose 12-year tenure as Cardinals' manager ended in October. However, that job eventually was awarded to Vern Rapp.

Boyer compiled a yearly average of 91 rbi and 23 homers in the majors. In total he enjoyed five ".300" seasons, and drove in 90 or more runs while hitting 20 or more homers eight times.

His "mvp" season, 1964, was to be his last big year. In addition to a career high 119 rbi, he hit 24 homers, scored 100 runs and batted .295, then hit a grand slam home run during the Cardinals' seven-game conquest of the Yankees in the world series.

After the 1965 season, he was traded to the Mets for infielder Charlie Smith and pitcher Al Jackson. Less than two full years later, during the 1967 campaign, he was dealt to the White Sox with infielder Sandy Alomar in a deal that sent catcher J. C. Martin and a minor league infielder to the Mets. The White Sox released him in May, 1968, but he signed on a few days later with the Dodgers and played out his career in Los Angeles.

Boyer, a five-time "gold glove" third baseman, was named to The Sporting News Major League All Star Team once (1958), and was selected to the TSN's National League All Star Team four times (1961-62-63-64). He played in a total of 10 All Star Games and had a lifetime average of .348 (8-for-23).

He was originally signed as a pitcher, in 1949, by Hall of Famer George Sisler, but, because of his bat, became a full-time third baseman-outfielder during his second season. Though the Red Wings

were one of two Cardinals' AAA clubs during Boyer's climb to the majors, he never played with Rochester, having skipped directly from AA (Houston, Texas League) to the majors in 1955.

* * *

In addition to Cletis and Cloyd, brothers Ron and Len also played professionally, but did not reach the majors. Clete, best known for his outstanding defensive ability as third baseman for the Yankees (1959 thru 1966), completed his playing career last year, at the age of 38, with the Taiyo Whales in Japan's Central League. Cloyd, 49, pitched for the Cardinals and A's for part of five seasons between 1949 and 1955. He is currently the Yankees' pitching coach.

JIMMIE SCHAFFER, 40 (4/5/36), returns for his sixth season as a manager in the Orioles' farm system, and his third year in the Southern League.

A veteran of 16 years as an outstanding defensive catcher in pro ball, Jimmie retired after playing at Rochester in 1970 and began his managing career in 1971 by winning a pennant in Bluefield and "manager of the year" award (Appalachian "Rookie" League).

For the next three years (1972-73-74), he managed the Lodi Orioles in the California League. In 1973, he won another "manager of the year" trophy after winning the California League championship in an unusual way. Lodi won the first half championship, but then dropped to seventh in the second half before rallying to defeat the Bakersfield Dodgers, who had finished first in the second half, in post-season play-offs, two games to none.

He moved to the Southern League in 1975 at Asheville where he finished third. Last year he accompanied the franchise to Charlotte and guided the club to a first half title, then wound up third in the second half, and lost a one game playoff to Orlando for the division championship.

During his playing career he saw service in 304 major league games with six different clubs from 1961 thru 1968. He broke into the majors with the Cardinals and later played for the Cubs, White Sox, Mets, Phillies and Reds, and also served a tour of duty in the Dodgers' organization. In his first pro season at Decatur, in 1955, he once played all nine positions in a single game.

Jim makes his home in Coopersburg, N. Y. with his wife, Jeannine, and five children: Jimmie Mark, Steven, Thomas, Eric and Traci.

LEN JOHNSTON (Miami) was a newcomer to the Orioles' organization last year, but not to professional baseball or to Hank Peters for whom Johnston worked in the Cleveland farm system.

The 48-year-old Western Michigan University alumnus played 16 seasons in the minors, 12 of them at the Triple-A level and also managed for eight years. A lefthanded hitting outfielder, Johnston was known for his speed and consistency rather than for his power. In 1,718 games, from 1952 to 1967, he batted .286; hit over .300 four times; once stole 64 bases in a season and amassed 71 lifetime triples, nearly three times his home run total (24).

Johnston, who played in the White Sox, Yankees, Phillies, and Reds systems, spent the last seven years of his career at Indianapolis in three different Triple-A leagues.

In 1967, he joined the Washington organization as playing manager at Burlington in the Class A Carolina League, and spent two seasons there, followed by a year as a coach at Buffalo in the International League.

He was hired by Peters, then the Indians' player personnel director, in 1970, as manager of the Sumter Club in the Western Carolinas League, and remained with the Cleveland organization as a scout and spring camp coordinator as well as a manager through 1973. In 1974, he managed a co-op team at Peninsula in the Carolina League, then stayed out of baseball in 1975 except for a front office assignment with the Indianapolis, Indians.

FARM SYSTEM MANAGERS—1977 (Cont.)

BEN HINES, 39, a one time Orioles' farmhand and more recently a highly successful baseball coach at LaVerne College (LaVerne, California), will again manage the Bluefield Orioles in the Appalachian Rookie League. Last season his Baby Birds won the Northern Division title.

It was at Bluefield, 17 years ago (1960), that Hines made his minor league debut as a catcher-infielder by hitting a grand slam home run in his first professional plate appearance. He later played at Leesburg (Florida State) and Stockton (California League) before drawing his release in 1961.

A three-sport star (baseball, football, and basketball) as an undergraduate at LaVerne, Hines returned there in 1960 as head baseball coach, a position he held for 15 years (through 1974). In that period, he experienced only one losing season, in his first year, and went on to compile a won-lost percentage of .662 (392-202).

Under Hines' leadership LaVerne won the NAIA national championship following a 33-8 season in 1972. During his tenure there, Hines, who holds both a B.A. and an M.A. degree from the college, also served as an assistant football coach (defensive coordinator).

In addition to coaching at the college level, Hines spent several summers managing in top amateur leagues and in 1974 managed in the minors at Ogden, Utah in the Pioneer League.

In 1975 he piloted the Boulder Collegians (Big Five College League) to the championship in the prestigious National Baseball Congress Tournament in Wichita, Kansas.

Hines has conducted countless coaching clinics and has written numerous articles on baseball fundamentals.

FARM SYSTEM COACHES—1977

RAY MILLER, a 31-year old former relief pitcher, is in his fourth season as the Orioles' minor league pitching instructor. After serving at Rochester in 1973 as a pitcher-coach under Joe Altobelli, he moved into his present assignment when his predecessor, Herman Starrette, joined the Atlanta Braves as their major league pitching coach (Starrette is now pitching coach for the San Francisco Giants under Altobelli).

Ray joined the Baltimore organization during the 1971 season from the Cleveland farm system and in three years at Rochester appeared in 106 games, won 11, lost 8 and saved 18. He has been in organized baseball since 1964 when he broke in at Lexington in the Western Carolinas League. He pitched at the Triple-A level during his last six seasons as an active player.

A Tacoma Park, Md. native and a graduate of Suitland (Md.) High School, Ray lives with his wife, Judith, and son, Raymond, in New Athens, Ohio.

RALPH ROWE, 53 (7/14/24), joins the Orioles this year as minor league batting instructor after 18 years with the Twins-Senators. During his tenure in the Calvin Griffith organization he played the outfield, managed for 12 years, coached third base for the big league club for four seasons (1972-73-74-75), and last year served as special assignment scout and hitting instructor in the Minnesota farm system.

Rowe, who was born and still lives in Newberry, S.C., is highly regarded as a teacher of hitting. During his minor league playing career, the 5'6" outfielder batted over .300 six times in 15 seasons spanning 20 years from 1942 to 1961 with time out for military service.

He signed originally with the Cleveland Indians then later played as well in the Chicago Cubs and Minnesota Twins systems (played as high as AAA in 1949 with Los Angeles).

As a manager, Ralph had three straight first place finishes—in 1967 and 1968 at Orlando in the Florida State League, and 1969 at Charlotte in the Southern. He also had four second place clubs. He last managed in 1971 at Portland in the Pacific Coast League.

GRAND SLAM NOTES: The Orioles hit six grand slams in 1976, two below the club record set in 1970 . . . Reggie Jackson hit three of them while Doug DeCinces, Lee May and Ken Singleton added the others . . . Four of the six were hit in Memorial Stadium . . . Bobby Darwin (Bos.) and Chris Chambliss (N.Y.) hit the only two slams vs. the O's, both off Rudy May, in Baltimore and New York respectively.

Jim Gentile set an American League record and tied a major league mark in '61 when he hit five home runs with the bases full. The major league record had been established by Ernie Banks in '55 . . . Gentile also set a major league standard by hitting consecutive bases loaded home runs at Metropolitan Stadium (Minnesota) on 5/9/61 in the 1st inning off Pete Ramos and the 3rd off Paul Giel . . . In addition, Gentile also had a run producing single in that game to set a club record for rbi in a game (nine).

Frank Robinson became the second player in history to hit consecutive grand slams on 6/26/70 at R.F.K. Stadium in Washington, in the 5th off Joe Coleman and 6th off Joe Grzenda. Since then, Jim Northrup (then with Detroit) duplicated that feat. Four other players (Lazzeri, Tabor, York and Cloninger) have hit two grand slams in a game, but they were not on consecutive plate appearances.

Brooks Robinson once blasted bases loaded homers in successive games—at Dodger Stadium off Angels' Ken McBride on 5/6/62 and at Memorial Stadium off the K.C. A's Ed Rakow on 5/9/62.

One of Dave McNally's two grand slams was hit in the '70 World Series, off the Reds' Wayne Granger (3rd game) . . . Dave's was the 12th grand slam in series history, but the only one ever hit by a pitcher . . . Mike Cuellar hit his grand slam in the '70 ALCS off the Twins' Jim Perry in Met Stadium . . . Mike remains the only player ever to hit a bases loaded home run in championship series competition in either league.

Four opponents have hit two grand slams in Memorial Stadium: Roy Sievers (Wash.), Bill Skowron (N.Y.), Mike Epstein (Wash.) and Rico Petrocelli (Bos.) . . . In all, opponents have hit 50 grand slams off Baltimore pitching including 25 in Memorial Stadium . . . Neither Harmon Killebrew nor Mickey Mantle has ever hit a grand slam against the O's although Killebrew has hit more home runs vs. O's than any other opponent as well as more in Memorial Stadium—67 (30) and Mantle ranks second with 54 (25).

LONG HOME RUNS/MEMORIAL STADIUM: The longest "measured" home run ever hit in Memorial Stadium was a 471' drive by Harmon Killebrew on May 24, 1964 off Milt Pappas over the hedge in left-center field . . . This exceeded by two feet the only other blast that has ever cleared the hedge . . . That was one by Boog Powell 469' to the same area off Boston's Don Schwall on June 22, 1962. Aside from these there have been three balls hit into the hedge (approximately 450'), by Mickey Mantle in 1954, by Powell in 1965 and by Frank Robinson in 1967.

Frank Robinson is the only player to have hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium. In the second game of a doubleheader with Cleveland on May 8, 1966, Frank hit a Luis Tiant offering over the left field stands and into the parking lot beyond, a drive that measured 451' on the fly and rolled to a stop 540' away from home plate.

Notes On 20-Game Winners

During the nine years that George Bamberger has been the Orioles' pitching coach (starting in '68), the Birds' staff has produced 17 20-game winning performances. In the club's first 14 years of operation only one pitcher was able to reach that plateau—Steve Barber in 1963.

In this period Jim Palmer has been a 20-game winner six times while Mike Cuellar and Dave McNally have reached that level four times each, and Pat Dobson, Mike Torrez and Wayne Garland once each.

In 1971 four Baltimore pitchers reached the 20-win level. The only other foursome in the entire history of major league baseball to have achieved that feat were four hurlers from the 1920 White Sox (51 years earlier): Urban "Red" Faber-23, Claude Williams-22, Dickie Kerr-21 and Ed Cicotte-21. Despite that achievement, incidentally, the White Sox that year finished second, two games back of Cleveland.

The four Orioles pitchers all reached the 20-win plateau within six days: McNally was first on 9/21, then in the same weekend series in Cleveland, the other three joined him: Cuellar (9/24—1st game—clinched pennant), Dobson (9/24—2nd game), Palmer (9/26).

ORIOLES SET A.L. RECORDS FOR CONSECUTIVE SHUTOUTS (5) AND CONSECUTIVE SCORELESS INNINGS (54) IN 1974

The Orioles pitching staff set two A.L. records in early September, 1974 by putting together a string of five straight shutouts and by blanking their opponents over a stretch of 54 consecutive innings. The scoreless streak actually started in the 9th inning of a game in Kansas City on September 1. Dave McNally gave up his only run in the 8th and then pitched a scoreless 9th while beating the Royals, 7-1. The streak ended six games later in the 9th inning on September 7 when Ross Grimsley working on a 3-0 lead gave up a two-run home run to Cleveland's Charlie Spikes. Grimsley who was the winner anyway by a 3-2 score was relieved at that point by Bob Reynolds. That also ended another string, of six straight complete games, but extended the Birds' winning streak to 10.

The previous A.L. record of 47 consecutive innings was held by the 1948 Cleveland Indians and the mark of four consecutive shutouts had been accomplished four times, most recently by the Orioles' foursome of Hal Brown, Billy Loes, Connie Johnson, and Ray Moore between June 24 and 28, 1957.

Notes: The "Gold Glove" awards have been presented annually since 1957 by *The Sporting News* in cooperation with the Rawlings Sporting Goods Company to those players adjudged to be the best at their respective defensive positions by vote of league managers and coaches. TSN correspondents in each league city plus one play-by-play announcer from each league city. Selection is based not only on consistency (i.e. fielding percentage), but on overall ability and effectiveness.

Last year the Orioles won three Gold Gloves. It was the 8th time in the last nine seasons that the Orioles had copped at least three such awards. The Birds have won four Gold Gloves five different times. Only three other clubs have won as many as four in a season, none as often as the Orioles. Other four award winners—Cincinnati (three times: 1974-1975-1976), and the Chicago White Sox (1960) and St. Louis Cardinals (1963) once each.

The Orioles have now won 40 Gold Gloves (including 28 in the last eight years), more than any other major league club. The Reds rank second with 32 and the Cardinals third with 31.

In 1976 Brooks Robinson's string of 16 straight Gold Gloves ended when he was supplanted by the Tigers' Aurelio Rodriguez. Paul Blair who had won seven in a row (and eight in nine years) just missed adding another. Mark Belanger won his sixth in eight years and Bobby Grich picked up his fourth in a row.

Jim Palmer won his first Gold Glove as the A.L.'s top fielding pitcher succeeding Jim Kaat who had won 13 in a row thru 1975, then went over to the Phillies and won another in his first National League season.

ALL STAR GAME NOTES

Elected Starters: Selection of the starting team (excepting pitchers) was returned to the fans in 1970 under the sponsorship of the Gillette Co. in cooperation with Major League Baseball. Following the ballot box "stuffing" incident in Cincinnati in 1957, selection of the starting teams had been entrusted to major league players for 12 years ('58 thru '69).

Last year Bobby Grich who had started the 1972 game by appointment was elected to the A.L. starting team at second base for the first time in 1976. He polled 2,043,904 votes (nearly one half million more than received by runner-up Willie Randolph) and finished fourth overall in the balloting following: Fred Lynn, Thurman Munson and Carlton Fisk. Grich went 0-for-2.

Mark Belanger was second in the 1976 voting at shortstop behind Toby Harrah (and ahead of Fred Patek). He made his first all star game appearance ever when he played the middle three innings and went 0-for-1.

Other Orioles who have been elected to starting positions by fan vote: Boog Powell ('70, '71), Brooks Robinson ('71, '72, '73, '74) and Frank Robinson ('71).

In 1976 a record 8,370,145 computerized ballots were cast in the All Star election.

Orioles MVPs: Three Orioles have won "mvp" honors in all star competition: Billy O'Dell (1958), Brooks Robinson (1966) and Frank Robinson (1971). O'Dell, the former Orioles lefthander who also pitched for the Giants, Braves and Pirates, hurled the last three innings of the only all star game ever played in Baltimore, and retired all nine batters he faced to protect a one-run lead, thus giving the A.L. a 4-3 win. . . . Brooks won the '66 Arch Ward Memorial Trophy on the strength of a 3-for-4 effort at bat (including a triple) and an 8-for-8 performance afield. He was the first player from a losing team to be so honored. . . . Frank's fourth inning home run at Detroit in '71 put the American League on top to stay and earned him "mvp" honors. It was the A.L.'s first all star victory since 1962.

MAJOR ORIOLES WORLD SERIES RECORDS

Individual

Jim Palmer ranks as the youngest player ever to pitch a world series (ws) shutout. He was 20 yrs., 11 mos. and 21 days old when he blanked Sandy Koufax, 6-0, in 2nd game, 1966. Jim also holds record for receiving most bases loaded walks in one game (2, 2nd gm., 1971).

Brooks Robinson holds record for most total bases, 5-game series (17 in 1970) while he and Paul Blair, plus 6 others, are tied for most hits, 5-game series (9 in 1970). Brooks (1966) and Don Buford (1969) are two of 13 who have homered on their first ws at bat. Brooks is also one of five to have reached safely five times in a 9-inning game, batting 1.000 (3 hits, 2 walks, 2nd gm., 1971) and is one of 35 to have had four hits in one game (4th gm., 1970). No one has ever had more.

Dave McNally is the only pitcher ever to hit a ws grand slam (gm. 3, 1970) and one of only 12 players to have hit a slam in ws play. He is tied with Bob Gibson for most homers, total series (2, 1969 & 1970).

Moe Drabowsky set two records in the 1966 opener—most strikeouts by a relief pitcher (11 in 6.2 innings) and most consecutive strikeouts in a game (6).

Merv Rettenmund is among 16 to have hit safely twice in one inning (2nd gm., 1971) and is one of nine to have played three positions in a series (1971). Boog Powell (and Lee May) scored six runs in 1970 to tie the mark for most runs in a 5-game series.

Club

Orioles pitchers hold the ws record for most consecutive shutout innings, one series (33 in 1966) and most consecutive shutout innings, total series (39, 1966 & 1969) . . . They are tied for most consecutive shutouts pitched, one series (3, 1966) and for fewest players used in a 4-game series (13 in 1966).

The Birds hold the record for most homers (10), most total bases (87) and highest slugging pct. (.509), all for a 5-game series (1970). They also hold records for lowest batting average (.146) and fewest hits (23) in a 5-game series (both 1969) and for lowest batting average by a ws winner, 4-game series (.200 in 1966).

The O's were also responsible for several marks in a 4-game series set by the Dodgers in 1966. Among these are fewest hits (17), fewest runs (2), fewest total bases (23) and lowest batting average (.142).

The club has a share of the record for most batters hit by pitch in one game (3, gm. 4, 1971) and most consecutive homers, inning (2, 1st inn., 1st gm., 1966, by Frank and Brooks Robinson). This is a feat that has been performed seven times in ws history.

Fielding

The Orioles hold the record for highest fielding average in a 4-game series (1.000, 1966) as does Dave Johnson at second base for having accepted 24 chances in 1966 without error. Frank Robinson is tied for most putouts by a right fielder in one game (7, gm. 5, 1971) while Mark Belanger holds a share of the mark for most assists by a shortstop, inning (3, gm. 6, 1971) and Brooks Robinson for most double plays in a 5-game series by a third baseman (2, 1970).

ORIOLES WINNING STREAKS: The longest regular season win streak in club history is 14 set in 1973 from Aug. 12 thru 27 . . . When it started the O's were second, 1½ games behind. When it ended they led the division by five games.

In three of Baltimore's division winning seasons, the Birds staged long win streaks at the very end of the season: in 1970 they won their last 11 then extended the string to 17 in post-season by sweeping the Twins in the ALCS and winning the first three games of the World Series vs. Cincinnati . . . in 1971 they again won the last 11 regular games, won three in a row from the A's in the ALCS and the first two WS encounters vs. Pittsburgh before the Pirates stopped the string at 16 . . . in 1974 the O's took their last nine in a row and then made it 10 straight with a win over the A's in the ALCS opener.

The Orioles, in addition to the nine game end of season string in 1974, also won 10 straight from Aug. 29 thru Sept. 7. During the final six weeks of that campaign, flanked by these two long streaks, the Birds enjoyed their longest sustained success in club history. On Aug. 28, they were 63-65, in second place, eight games behind Boston. From that point on, they won 28 (15 by one-run), lost only six and won the division title by two games over the Yankees (who won 27 of their last 38). The Red Sox in the meantime had dropped to third, seven games back.

★ ★ ★

100 RBI MEN: The Orioles did not produce a 100 rbi hitter during their first seven Baltimore seasons ('54 thru '60). In 1961 Jim Gentile broke the barrier with gusto while accumulating 141 rbi, still a club record. Since then four Orioles have accounted for eight 100 rbi performances—Boog Powell (three times), Brooks and Frank Robinson (twice each) and Lee May (once)—1964-Brooks, 118 . . . 1966-Frank, 122; Boog, 109 and Brooks, 100 . . . 1969-Boog, 121 and Frank, 100 . . . 1970-Boog, 114 . . . 1976-Lee May, 109.

THE ORIOLES 1976 REVIEW

LATE SURGE FALLS SHORT

The Orioles played the Yankees even (in games) after the all-star break with a 48-32 record (.600) compared to New York's 47-31 (.603). Unfortunately, the Birds started their second half surge with a 10 1/2-game handicap.

The only major league club with a better record over the second half than the Yankees and Orioles was Cincinnati (49-27, .645). The Royals were 39-41 and the Phillies 45-36.

It was the fourth straight year the Orioles had started slowly and then made a rush in the latter stages. It was the second year in a row that the second half spurt fell short of its goal. The Birds were eliminated from the race on Saturday, September 25, some eight days and seven games from the end of the season. It was Baltimore's earliest elimination since 1968 (Sept. 17—with 12 days and nine games to play).

Ironically, the closest the Orioles came to the Yankees during the second half was seven games on September 24, the day before elimination. Five days earlier, on September 19, the Birds had been 12 games back, following a Sunday doubleheader loss in Cleveland. However, the O's won their next five, including four straight from the Yankees (which prevented New York from clinching its title at home at the Birds' expense), while the Yanks were losing six of seven in this period (including six in a row before they downed Detroit in the second game of a Friday, September 24, twin bill). The Birds had not been as close as seven games from the top since June 23.

INCONSISTENCY

If there was a consistency about the Orioles on the field in 1976, it was their inconsistency. In June they lost nine games in a row, then turned around immediately and won seven straight. They had a total of ten winning streaks of from four to seven games, yet could not pass thru the .500 barrier permanently until August 5 (53-52). The Birds won 25 of 35 games from August 25 thru September 28 (to jump 18 games over .500 for the only time all year), but then suddenly went flat and lost their last four games of the season.

TURNING POINTS

The Orioles reached low ebb after losing nine straight games from June 6 thru 13. The last four of those losses were at the hands of the Royals who out-scored the Birds in that series 26-10.

At that point the Orioles were 24-31 in fifth place and eight games out, but an immediate turnaround in which they reeled off seven straight wins averted annihilation and pulled the Birds back up to .500 at 31-31 on June 21.

The Birds had won 10 of 13 a week later when they went to Boston for a three-game series (34-34, .500). All three games were close but the O's dropped all of them, falling again into 5th place, a full 10 games off the pace.

Again in late July, after having won 10 of 12, the future looked bright with the Brewers (against whom the O's have enjoyed great success thru the years) moving into town for a four-game series. Milwaukee, however, swept that set and when it ended, on July 25, the Birds at 46-48 were 14 1/2 games behind. That was to be their biggest deficit of the year.

CHANGE AND TRANSITION

For the Orioles, 1976 was also a year of change and transition. The status quo began to fade with the appointment of Hank Peters as executive vice-president and general manager (November) and then crumbled with the completion of two "blockbuster" deals.

Late in spring training (April 2) the Orioles acquired the flamboyant Reggie Jackson and lefthander Ken Holtzman from the Oakland A's (plus minor league pitcher Bill Van Bommel) while parting with Don Baylor and pitchers Mike Torrez and Paul Mitchell. Jackson did not report to the club for a month, a full three weeks into the regular season, accounting in part for a 6-9 April.

The season was still young when it became apparent that the Orioles and Holtzman were not meant for each other. Subsequently, on June 15, he was traded to the Yankees with three long-time Orioles—Ellie Hendricks, Grant Jackson, and Doyle Alexander—and minor league hurler Jimmy Freeman in exchange for pitchers Rudy May, Tippy Martinez, Dave Pagan, and Scott McGregor (assigned from Syracuse to Rochester) plus catcher Rick Dempsey.

CHANGE AND TRANSITION (Cont.)

1976 was also the year that the great Brooks Robinson, a Baltimore tradition almost from the start of his 22 years with the Orioles and a man who has played in more American League games than anyone save Ty Cobb, finally relinquished his role as a regular. Two other principals in the Orioles' often glorious past, gold glove centerfielder Paul Blair and four-time 20-game winner Mike Cuellar, were also relegated to supporting roles.

INDIVIDUAL HIGHLIGHTS

The Orioles who had not produced a home run king or rbi champion since Frank Robinson won the triple crown in 1966 suddenly came up with two contenders for both titles in Lee May and Reggie Jackson. May, the "most valuable Oriole" of 1976, did lead the league in rbi with 109 and Jackson with 27 homers, two more than May, tied for second for the league leadership with Oakland's Sal Bando behind New York's Graig Nettles who hit 32.

Jim Palmer, despite a slow start, became a 20-game winner for the sixth time in seven years, while tying Randy Jones of San Diego for the major league lead in victories (22), and later Wayne Garland, who jumped from the bullpen to a regular starting role in June, became the 17th 20-game winner the Orioles have produced since 1968.

The Orioles' keystone partners, Mark Belanger and Bobby Grich, were brilliant as usual defensively, and Belanger enjoyed his best year at the plate since 1969.

Ken Singleton, the club's most valuable player and leading hitter in 1975, overcame a disastrous start (he was batting only .185 on June 2) to once again top the club in batting, with a .278 average; and speedy Al Bumbry stole 42 bases, more than any Oriole ever except for Luis Aparicio who swiped 57 in 1964.

1976 MISCELLANEOUS

Orioles' Record by Month: April 6-9 . . . May 16-12 . . . June 12-16 July 17-12 . . . August 17-12 . . . September 20-10 . . . October 0-3.

Days in Each Position: 1st (2, first 2 days of season), 2nd (102), 3rd (23), 4th (14), 5th (25), 6th (12).

Winning Streaks of from four to seven games were commonplace during the Orioles' hot spells . . . They put together two 7-game strings, one 6, four 5's, and three of 4 games duration . . . On the losing side, apart from the nine-game nosedive, there were only two others of four in a row (including the last four games of the season).

Fielding: The Orioles led the A.L. in fielding for the third straight year (.982). The Birds have now finished first ('63, '64, '66, '69, '74, '75, '76) or second ('60, '61, '68, '70, '71, '72, '73) in each of the last nine years and 14 times in the last 17 seasons. The Birds made 118 errors, lowest total in the league. (See Gold Gloves on page 22.)

Hitting: The Orioles were 11th in hitting (.243) ahead of the Angels (.235). The Twins led at .274. Despite the low batting average, the O's ranked substantially higher in runs scored (619, 6th) and homers (see below) . . . Orioles' designated hitters batted .253 collectively, 7th best in the A.L.

Home Runs: The Orioles hit 119 home runs to finish a surprising third in the league behind Boston (134) and New York (120). This, despite a decline, albeit small, from last year's total of 124 which ranked no higher than 6th. The home run total in the A.L. this year dropped sharply from 1,465 to 1,122.

With closer fences to shoot at in the power alleys, home run production at Memorial Stadium increased, but not dramatically. . . . The O's jumped from 46 homers here a year ago to 58 this year, but opponents' collective totals slipped from 45 to 38. So the overall gain in homers at Memorial Stadium was from 91 to 96.

The Birds hit six grand slams in 1976. Reggie Jackson hit three, while Lee May, Doug DeCinces, and Ken Singleton each hit one. No club record though. The Birds hit eight in 1970 and seven in 1960.

Pitching: The Birds' pitching staff, which had led the league in era in six of the past seven years thru 1975, finished fourth last year (3.32) behind New York (3.19), Kansas City (3.21), and Oakland (3.26).

1976 HIGHLIGHTS ORIOLES vs. OPPONENTS

BOSTON: The O's were 7-11 vs. the Red Sox, winning five of nine at home but only two of nine in Fenway Park.

Top Draw: An Opening Day record crowd of 46,425 at Memorial Stadium watched the O's start the season with a 1-0 victory over the Red Sox . . . Jim Palmer and Dyar Miller combined efforts for the shutout.

One-Hitter: Rick Wise blanked the Orioles on one hit June 29 at Fenway Park, a 6th inning single by Paul Blair.

Streak Ends: The Red Sox snapped a seven-game winning streak for the O's June 22, 6-5, at Memorial Stadium, in a 15-inning marathon that consumed 4 hours and 41 minutes . . . Both clubs scored four runs in the first frame, Boston's coming on Bob Darwin's grand-slam homer.

Lynn's Hitting: Young Red Sox star Fred Lynn hit O's pitching at a .365 clip (19-for-52) to raise his career average to .346 (41-for-118) in little more than two full seasons against Baltimore.

Career First: Wayne Garland, who eventually became a 20-game winner, pitched his first major league career complete game and shutout when he stopped the Red Sox 2-0 June 21 . . . He had a no-hitter for 7.2 innings, before giving up a single to Rico Petrocelli . . . Garland recorded three of the O's seven wins against Boston.

Inside Job: Rookie Butch Hobson, former Alabama football player, hit an inside-the-park homer against the O's at Fenway Park June 28.

Finale: In the last game of the season, October 2 at Fenway Park, the two clubs battled for 15 innings before the Red Sox won, 3-2.

CALIFORNIA: The Orioles won eight of 12 against the Angels, posting identical 4-2 records in Baltimore and Anaheim.

Lone Homer: The Angels hit just one home run off O's pitching all year . . . Tony Solaita, a mid-season acquisition from Kansas City, hit it off Dyar Miller July 18 at Memorial Stadium.

Hassle: Players came running from all directions to take part in a typical ball game tussle (no blows thrown) April 19 at Anaheim Stadium . . . It all started when Andy Etchebarren was hit by a Wayne Garland pitch immediately after Dave Chalk had hit a three-run triple in the 7th inning . . . In the O's 8th inning, lead-off batter Mark Belanger was low-bridged by a Frank Tanana fastball, which brought players from both sides onto the field . . . Belanger claimed the pitch hit him, umpire Russ Goetz said it did not, Earl Weaver was thrown out and Belanger eventually struck out.

Stunning Debut: Righthander Fred Holdsworth, who had been with the club two weeks but had seen no service, made his Orioles debut a memorable one against the Angels July 17 . . . He came on in relief in the 5th inning and was perfect the rest of the way, retiring 14 batters in succession.

Lefthanded Apology: Before the O's-Angels game in Anaheim July 9, umpire Ron Luciano called a press conference to apologize to O's skipper Earl Weaver for comments attributed to him (Luciano) in a Chicago paper . . . The press reports quoted Luciano as saying he "doesn't care who wins, as long as it's not Earl Weaver." . . . That night Weaver was ejected from the game in the 5th inning, by Bill Haller not Luciano . . . The following day Weaver was tossed out of the game in the third inning by Haller.

CHICAGO: The Orioles were 8-4 vs. Chicago, winning four of six in Baltimore and Chicago.

Brawl & Late Finish: Reggie Jackson and Clay Carroll were the principal combatants in a brawl in the second game of a two-nighter August 14 in Baltimore . . . In the 7th inning, after Jackson had hit a grand-slam homer in his previous at-bat, a pitch from Carroll sent the O's slugger sprawling in the dirt . . . On the next pitch, Jackson swung and missed but let the bat fly in Carroll's direction . . . Players from both teams poured on the field and both Jackson and Carroll were ejected. The second game did not end until 1:16 A.M.

May Slam: In the first game of that two-nighter, Lee May highlighted a six-run O's inning in the second with a grand-slam homer . . . Jackson had hit a two run homer in the first inning.

1976 HIGHLIGHTS ORIOLES vs. OPPONENTS

Streak Stopped: The Orioles put the brakes on a nine-game losing streak—their longest in 18 years—when they beat the White Sox, 4-0, in Chicago June 15.

Top Output: The Orioles boomed out 22 hits in a game August 21 in Chicago, their best production of the year, but it was to no avail as the O's lost, 11-10, in 12 innings to the White Sox . . . The hit total tied a club record for the Orioles.

Timely Blast: Reggie Jackson, ever the one for dramatics, pulled off a one-man trick against the White Sox in the first game of a double-header in Chicago August 22 . . . Jackson was not in the line-up on this day because he fouled a ball off his right ankle the night before . . . However, with the score tied 2-2 he entered the game as a pinchhitter in the ninth inning and belted a grand-slam homer to give the O's a 6-2 victory.

CLEVELAND: For the first time since 1972, the Orioles lost the season series to Cleveland . . . The Indians won the series, 11-7 . . . The Tribe won five of nine in Baltimore and six of nine in Cleveland.

Little Larvell: One of the smallest players in the American League, Larvell Blanks, fired a big salvo to send the O's down to a double defeat May 31 . . . Blanks had four hits in the first game to key a 4-1 triumph and hit a two-run homer in the second game that aided the Tribe to a 4-3 victory.

20 Again: Jim Palmer became a 20-game winner for the sixth time in seven years when he beat the Tribe, 3-1, September 8 . . . At the same time he became the first 20-game winner of the year in the American League.

Dobber: Pat Dobson, who pitched for the Orioles in 1971-72 and won 38 games, had five wins in six decisions for the Indians against his former mates last year.

Win Skein Halted: The Orioles, in a belated September drive to overtake the Yankees, had a seven-game winning streak ended by the Indians in the first game of a twin-bill September 18.

DETROIT: The Orioles won twice as many (12-6) against Detroit as they lost . . . The O's were 6-3 against the Tigers in both Baltimore and Detroit.

Beat the Bird: Mark Fydrich, the rage of the American League, was only 1-2 against the Orioles . . . Fydrich beat the O's, 4-0, before 51,000 in Detroit July 3; lost by a 1-0 score to Rudy May before 44,000 in Detroit July 29 and lost to Wayne Garland in Detroit September 7, 5-3. "The Bird's" era vs. Baltimore was an impressive 0.67 (2 earned runs in 27 innings).

Grand-Slams: The Orioles used the bases-loaded homer as their chief weapon to inflict defeats on the Tigers in successive games . . . Doug DeCinces smashed a grand-slam homer against the Tigers to help beat them, 8-5, in Baltimore May 21 . . . The next day Ken Singleton hit one out with the bases loaded in the 9th inning to give the O's an 8-4 victory.

Comeback: The O's staged one of their best comebacks of the year when they beat the Bengals, 9-7, in Baltimore September 14 . . . The Orioles were down, 6-0, after two and a half innings but scored five in the 3rd and four in the 7th to gain the win . . . The victory went to Dennis Martinez, a young righthander making his major league debut . . . He pitched 5.2 innings of scoreless ball in relief to pick up the triumph.

Mora and Rain: The Orioles beat the Tigers, 1-0, in Baltimore September 15 in a game decided by two factors: A home run by Andres Mora in the third inning and a downpour that stopped the game after the 6th inning.

KANSAS CITY: The Orioles and the Royals split their 12 decisions . . . The Royals won six of the first seven, but the O's won the last five in a row.

1976 HIGHLIGHTS ORIOLES vs. OPPONENTS

All-Time Gate: The largest crowd in regular-season history for the Orioles, 51,195, attended Jersey Night, co-sponsored by Crown Central Petroleum, at Memorial Stadium May 8 and saw John Mayberry drive in five runs to lead the Royals to a 6-3 win.

Hero Al: A home run by Al Bumbry with two outs in the last of the 9th inning gave the O's a 4-3 victory over the Royals May 7 in Baltimore.

Many Happenings: A lot happened in the O's June 12 nationally televised 7-6 loss to K.C. . . . The loss for the O's was their 8th in a row . . . Reggie Jackson hammered a three-run homer in the 9th with two outs to put the O's within one run of a tie but the Orioles could not pull it off . . . Lee May got nailed in the head by a Marty Pattin pitch following Jackson's homer . . . May was back in the line-up the next day and had two hits.

Holtzman Trade: Pitcher Ken Holtzman, unsatisfied with the Orioles, was traded to another American League club while the O's were in Kansas City June 10-13 . . . The deal was contingent upon Holtzman reaching a contract agreement with his new club . . . He could not agree to terms with that club and two days later (June 15) was dealt to New York as part of a 10-player trade.

Homer Outburst: The O's belted four home runs while smashing the Royals, 10-3, in Kansas City July 20 . . . Lee May hit two of the circuit clouts and Bob Grich and Reggie Jackson each had one . . . Jackson and May homered back-to-back off Larry Gura in the 5th inning, each drive going an estimated 450 feet.

MILWAUKEE: The Orioles were 11-7 against the Brewers, winning the first five in succession, losing six in a row and then winning six of the final seven . . . The O's are 83-40 (.675) against the Brewers since the club was established in Seattle in 1969 . . . Since the Brewers moved to Milwaukee in 1970, the Orioles have posted a 41-16 record (.719) at County Stadium.

RJ's First: Reggie Jackson hit his first home run with the O's May 12 at County Stadium and it was a big one—with the bases loaded off Jerry Augustine . . . It was also the first of three grand-slams Jackson was to hit during the season, all off lefthanders . . . He hit only one in his eight-year career with the A's.

One and Only: Hank Aaron, the game's greatest home run hitter, smashed the only homer of his career at Memorial Stadium May 19.

Skein Stopped: When the O's dropped a 13-inning, 4-3 decision to Milwaukee July 23, it was their first loss to the Brewers after 10 straight victories over two seasons.

Muser Connects: Tony Muser, never known for his home-run prowess, hit his first round-tripper in two years September 13 in Milwaukee . . . Muser had appeared in 312 games and batted 626 times between homers.

Thanks, Robby: The final game of the year at Memorial Stadium, September 29, was billed as "Thanks to Brooks Robinson Night," in recognition of his long and illustrious career with the O's . . . Robinson received several standing ovations during the evening, the biggest when he singled to center in the 8th inning and then left the game.

MINNESOTA: The O's lost the season series, 8-4, to the Twins . . . Minnesota won four of six in Baltimore and at Metropolitan Stadium.

Hisle's Heroics: Larry Hisle has made a career of terrorizing O's pitchers . . . In 1976 he hit .391 against the Orioles with 18-for-46, second highest among all opponents (25 or more at bats) . . . The year before he was the leading hitter in the league against the O's with a .444 average (12-for-27) . . . In four seasons he has batted .363 (58-for-160) against Baltimore.

An example of his effectiveness against the O's in 1976: He hit for the cycle in front of 35,000 fans on Cap Night at Memorial Stadium June 4, with his two-run homer giving the Twins an 8-6 victory in 10 innings . . . The O's led at one point, 6-0.

One-Hitter: Jim Palmer hurled the fourth one-hitter of his career when he beat the Twins August 10 at Memorial Stadium . . . The lone safety off him was a second-inning single by Mike Cubbage.

1976 HIGHLIGHTS ORIOLES vs. OPPONENTS

Big Time: Lee May had one of his most productive games of the year August 17 in Minnesota when he had a single, triple and homer and drove in five runs.

No. 1,000: The Orioles scored their 1,000th win at Memorial Stadium June 5, a 5-1 triumph over the Twins . . . Major league baseball returned to Baltimore in 1954.

More Hitters: Both Steve Brye and Mike Cabbage hit .455 vs. the O's (10-for-22) though both were used sparingly.

NEW YORK: Even though the Orioles finished 10½ games behind New York in the AL East standings, the O's had little trouble beating the Yankees in head-to-head competition . . . The Orioles won 13 of 18 from the Yanks, taking five of nine at Memorial Stadium and winning eight of nine at Yankee Stadium . . . The Orioles are two games under .500 (99-101) from an all-time standpoint at Yankee Stadium.

Starting in 1964, the Orioles have played .633 ball against the Yankees with a 145-84 record.

Ross' Mark: Lefthander Ross Grimsley won only eight games for the O's in 1976, but specialized in beating the Yankees and Catfish Hunter . . . He was 4-1 against the American League champs and each time Hunter was the opposing pitcher of record.

Five Defeats: Catfish Hunter had a particularly tough year against the Orioles, losing five of six decisions.

No Celebration: The Orioles prevented the Yankees from clinching the Eastern Division title at Yankee Stadium by sweeping a four-game set in New York September 21-23 . . . The "magic number" for the Yankees was three at the start of the series and remained there.

Jackson Decked: Slugger Reggie Jackson was struck in the face by a pitch from Dock Ellis at Memorial Stadium July 27 . . . The incident happened in the 8th inning and in the following frame Jim Palmer hit Mickey Rivers in the back with a pitch.

Jackson suffered no broken bones, but missed several games . . . He homered on his first at-bat upon returning to the line-up July 31 against Detroit.

Doyle Downed: Doyle Alexander, sent by the O's to the Yankees in a 10-player deal June 15, lost two starts against the Orioles, including one July 28 when he had a no-hitter into the 6th inning.

OAKLAND: The O's were 4-8 against the A's, posting 2-4 records in both Baltimore and Oakland.

Jackson Debut: Reggie Jackson, obtained April 2 from Oakland, made his debut with the Orioles in the second game of a May 2 double-header against the A's at Memorial Stadium . . . He received a standing ovation from the crowd of 24,800 when he came to the plate in the first inning.

Big Finish: The A's scored seven runs in the 9th inning on the way to an 11-1 victory over the O's April 30.

Dead-Eye Rick: The A's ran their way into the American League record book with 341 stolen bases in 1976, but that didn't faze the O's Rick Dempsey in the July 5 game in Oakland . . . He nailed three would-be thieves in a row, Bert Campaneris twice and Don Baylor once.

Quick Lead: Veteran Tommy Harper started the April 18 game against the A's with a home run off Vida Blue . . . The O's could score no more and ended up losing, 2-1, in 12 innings.

TEXAS: The O's were 8-4 against the Rangers, winning all the games in succession . . . The Rangers won the first three and the final one in the season series . . . The O's were 6-0 at Arlington Stadium.

First Relief: Mike Cuellar made the first relief appearance in his eight years with the O's when he was called out of the bullpen June 7 against the Rangers . . . Cuellar had made 275 regular season starts in succession for the Orioles.

Huge Throng: A Jacket Night crowd of 47,153 at Memorial Stadium August 28 saw the Orioles defeat the Rangers, 6-4 . . . It was the largest crowd ever to see the Rangers anywhere.

BIGGEST LIFETIME WINNERS-LOSERS

vs. ORIOLES

Whitey Ford, the Yankee Hall of Famer, still holds the distinction of having beaten the Orioles more often than any other pitcher, active or retired. Ford who was 30-16 lifetime against the Orioles is followed by: Mickey Lolich (25-19), "Catfish" Hunter (24-21), Billy Pierce (23-11), Early Wynn and Frank Sullivan (both 21-8), Jim Kaat (21-20), Jim Perry (20-22), Earl Wilson (20-9) and Camilo Pascual (20-23).

Pascual is the all time biggest loser to the Orioles with 23 defeats. Others oft-beaten by the Birds are: Jim Perry (22), Hunter (21), Fritz Peterson (14-21), Lolich (19) and Sam McDowell (9-19).

Lefthander Bud Daley enjoyed the most productive year ever against the Orioles when he compiled a 6-1 record against them for the K.C. A's in 1959. Ford had back-to-back 5-2 seasons vs. Baltimore in 1959 and 1960 while Bob Lemon (Cle.) was 5-0 against the O's in 1956 and Mike Garcia (Cle.) was 5-1 in 1954. Joe Coleman, Det. (1973) and Pat Dobson, Cle. (1976) are the only two pitchers to have beaten the Orioles five times in a season since expansion (starting 1961).

Four pitchers have lost five times to the Orioles in a single season. Three were 0-5: Ned Garver (K.C. A's), 1957; Dick Stigman (Min.), 1963 and Stan Williams (Cle.), 1969, while "Catfish" Hunter was 1-5 in 1976.

Luis Tiant of the Red Sox compiled a 2-2 mark to bring his lifetime record to 17-18. Though still under .500, the ace righthander has gone 16-9 since losing nine of his first 10 career decisions (thru 1968) to the Orioles while still with Cleveland.

Hunter, the biggest winner vs. the Orioles in 1975 with a 4-2 record, was the biggest loser last year at 1-5.

ORIOLES 1976 FINANCIAL STATEMENT: The Baltimore Baseball Club, Inc. sustained a net loss of \$102,531 for the fiscal year ended October 31, 1976. The company experienced a loss of \$3,192 in fiscal year 1975.

General Manager Hank Peters attributed the loss primarily to an increase of \$308,000 in major league playing expense over the 1975 level. That figure included increases of \$183,000 in player payroll, \$85,000 in the Orioles' contribution to the player pension fund, and \$26,000 in transportation from city to city.

Since major league baseball instituted divisional play in 1969, the Orioles have won five division championships, and in each of those years the company has earned a profit. However, in the three years that it did not finish first in its division (1972, 1975 and 1976), the ballclub has suffered a loss.

The Baltimore Baseball Club, Inc. is one of the few publicly held companies in professional sports, and, consequently, its financial statements are a matter of public record. The corporation's common stock is traded over-the-counter.

EARL WEAVER

Born: Aug. 14, '30; 5'8"; 165; Batted, R; Threw, R.

Born in St. Louis, Mo. but now makes home in Baltimore . . . Has managed Orioles to three American League pennants, five eastern division titles and one world championship in eight full years on the job.

The Orioles have compiled 812-551 record since he was named manager July 11, 1968 succeeding Hank Bauer. His major league won-lost percentage of .596 ranks third in baseball history behind Joe McCarthy (.617, 2126-1335) and Cincinnati's Sparky Anderson (.607, 683-443) among managers with five or more years service.

His club's total of 318 wins during the 1969-70-71 seasons established an A.L. record for most victories in three consecutive seasons, surpassing the previous mark (313) set by the 1929-30-31 Philadelphia A's . . . Named "manager of the year" by A.P. in 1973.

His clubs have compiled 12-6 record in five American League championship series and were 10-0 until A's won second game of '73 ALCS . . . Managed A.L. all star team in 1970, 1971 and 1972 and was named honorary manager for the 1974 classic.

Served as first base coach for Orioles in first half of 1968 season, after spending 11 years honing skills as manager in Orioles farm system . . . Compiled an excellent record as his clubs won three pennants and finished second five times . . . Flag winners were at Appleton (1960) in the Three-I League, Elmira (1964) in the Eastern League and Rochester (1966) in the International League.

Since his first full season as a manager in 1957, Earl has finished in the first division 23 times in 25 tries (including five winter league teams) . . . From 1960 to the present, he has skippered 23 teams and finished either first or second with 21 of them.

Started pro career in 1948 as an infielder in the Cardinals' chain . . . Signed to first contract by Walter Shannon, former scouting director for the Orioles . . . Never played in the majors but went to spring training with the Cardinals in 1952 . . . Primarily a second baseman . . . Played on pennant winning teams in each of his first four years . . . Led leagues in fielding in all but two seasons during playing career . . . Had lifetime pro batting average of .267.

Most valuable player in three different leagues: West Frankfort, Illinois State League (1948), St. Joseph, Western Association (1949) and Omaha, Western League (1951) . . . Named to all star teams five times during playing career . . . Got start as manager with Knoxville (Sally League) in 1956 when he ran club for last several weeks of season . . . Managed Santurce in Puerto Rican League during winters of 1966-67 and 1967-68 . . . Won post season playoffs the first year and pennant the second year.

Graduate of Beaumont High School in St. Louis . . . Golfing and gardening enthusiast . . . He and his wife, Marianna, live in the Perry Hall section of Baltimore County.

The major league draft is held annually at baseball's winter meetings, and is followed with a separate selection by National Association clubs from class aaa to a levels . . . Until 1958 major league clubs could draft players within a range between \$15,000 (for aaa players) and \$2,000 (for class d players) . . . In 1958 the price for big league drafts rose to \$25,000.

However, in 1959, a first year player draft at the big league level was set up to discourage the payment of inordinately large bonus payments to free agents. The new rule provided that first year players could be selected at the major league level (if not protected on a major league team's 40 man roster) for \$12,000. In 1961 an even lower draft price was set up for more recent first year players. That figure was \$8,000.

That year, incidentally, the Baltimore organization set a record of sorts by being relieved of 19 eligible first year players (seven during the big league selections and 11 more during the minor league draft). In 1965 the first year player draft began to lose its significance and then disappeared in 1970.

1976 Season: Was a 20-game winner for the sixth time in last seven years and won third Cy Young Award in last four years ('73, '75, '76) . . . Tied for major league lead with San Diego's Randy Jones (N.L. Cy Young winner) in wins-22, starts-40 and innings-315.

His six shutouts tied him with four others for second in major leagues (with Blue, Blyleven, Mattack and Montefusco) behind Nolan Ryan (7) . . . He and Frank Tanana were tied for third in majors in complete games with 23 behind Randy Jones (25) and Mark Fidrych (24) . . . Led the O's also in strikeouts (159) and era (2.51, fifth best in A.L.).

Started slowly, was only 6-7 with a 3.33 era thru June 10 and had walked 49 batters in 116.1 innings (nearly 4 per nine innings) . . . Thereafter, he was 16-6 with a 1.86 era and issued only 35 more base on balls in his last 198.2 innings (just over 1 1/2 per nine innings).

Won eight of nine between June 15 and July 27, and won six of his last eight . . . Defeated every team in the league at least once . . . Was 13-7 vs. west and 9-6 vs. east.

Had 4-0 record vs. Sox, boosting career mark to 19-7 . . . Has now beaten Chi Sox eight straight times since losing to them June 16, 1974.

'76 Honors: TSN A.L. Pitcher of the Year (3rd time in 4 years) . . . Righthanded pitcher on A.P. major league all-star team (Jim, Joe Morgan and Randy Jones were only repeaters on that team) . . . U.P.I.'s A.L. all-star team . . . Joe Cronin Award for Significant Achievement (winning 20 six times)—joined three previous winners: Nolan Ryan, Al Kaline and Rod Carew . . . Gold Glove Award (TSN and Rawlings Sporting Goods) as top fielding pitcher in A.L. (replaced Jim Kaat who had won in A.L. for 13 straight years, and won again in '76, but in N.L. with Phillies).

In capturing Cy Young Award, Jim polled 108 votes (5-3-1 point system) including 19 first, four seconds and a third to finish well ahead of Fidyrych who had remaining five first-place votes and a point total of 51 . . . Jim was only pitcher to be named on all 24 ballots (two per league city) for the second straight year. Became third to win three Cy Youngs in 20-year history of that award (started '56), joining Sandy Koufax and Tom Seaver . . . Is also only third to have won two in a row . . . Seaver and Denny McLain, who shared his second with Mike Cuellar in 1969, were the others.

Career: Has 151-78 record (.659) over last eight years starting 1969 . . . His career won-lost percentage (.652, 174-93) is highest in majors today . . . Has lowest era (2.61) of any A.L. pitcher in last 50 years (2,000 or more innings) . . . Not since Walter Johnson retired after 1927 season with a figure of 2.17 has anyone fashioned a lower era . . . Among active major leaguers, however, he ranks second to Tom Seaver (2.47) . . . During his six 20-win seasons, he has finished first in A.L. in era twice ('73, '75), second twice, third once, fourth once and fifth once.

With six 20-win seasons, Jim ranks second in majors to Fergie Jenkins (7) . . . Catfish Hunter is third with five . . . Has winning record against every opponent lifetime . . . Has four career complete game 1-0 wins—three in '75 and one in '71.

Was 6th among active A.L. pitchers in career major league wins at end of last season behind: Gaylord Perry (231), Jenkins (203), Hunter (201), Mike Cuellar (185) and Tiant (179) . . . Ranked ninth in majors (Kaat-247, Seaver-182 and Don Sutton-176).

Strikeouts/Walks: Has fanned 10 or more batters 11 times including a career high of 13 strikeouts at Cleveland on July 1, 1971 . . . Has struck out 11 Twins three different times, all at Memorial Stadium ('70-1, '72-2) . . . Has twice walked eight batters in a game, both times in first appearance of year (1966 and 1970).

1975: Led majors with 2.09 era and 10 shutouts and tied Hunter for most wins . . . Set club records in innings (323), complete games (25) and shutouts . . . Was highest total of shutouts in A.L. since Dean Chance's 11 for Angels in 1964 . . . Was first in majors to reach 20-win level . . . Six of his 11 losses were by one or two runs . . . The O's were 28-11 in games in which he appeared . . . Led A.L. pitchers in total fielding chances (88).

Injuries: In 1974, his only losing season in majors (7-12), Jim had sore elbow that put him on disabled list for six weeks (6/20 to 8/13) . . . Prior to that he had lost seven in a row (4/30 thru 6/7) . . . Had never lost more than three straight before and hasn't since.

Back and shoulder miseries nearly ruined career in 1967-1968 . . . Pitched in only two games for O's between June 8, 1967, and start of 1969 season . . . Pitched in Rochester, Elmira and Miami during those two years trying to shake the ailments, but it wasn't until a stint in the Puerto Rican League, after the 1968 season, that he began to shake his physical problems.

Made dramatic comeback in 1969 and was 9-2 when he tore shoulder muscle (6/29/69) and went back on disabled list for 42 days . . . Pitched his no-hitter only four days after coming off the list (his 2nd start) and wound up with 16-4 record.

'70-'71-'72-'73: Was one of three 20-game winners on O's staff in 1970 (with Cuellar and McNally) and one of four in '71 (add Dobson), but was only Oriole to reach that level in both 1972 and 1973.

Winning Streaks: Won 10 straight in 1973 (7/14 thru 8/26) and in 1972 captured eight in a row (5/15 thru 6/25) and 13 of 14 (5/15 thru 8/6) . . . Lost seven straight in 1974.

No & Low-Hitters/Shutouts: Has only one regular season lifetime shutout vs. Oakland, but that was a no-hitter on Aug. 13, 1969 (8-0 over Chuck Dobson in Bal.), only four days after coming back from six weeks on disabled list . . . Experienced two near-misses in 1973, both in Baltimore: Had perfect game with one out in 9th vs. Texas on June 16 (had retired first 25 batters) when Ken Suarez singled . . . Jim ultimately won a 9-1 two-hitter . . . On July 27, a leadoff single in 8th by Cleveland's George Hendrick was only hit allowed.

Hurled no-hitter for Aberdeen in Northern League in 1973, his first pro season.

Has pitched four 1-hitters: 5/12/67 vs. N.Y., 7/27/73 vs. Cle., 6/8/75 vs. K.C. and 8/10/76 vs. Min. . . . Has also hurled seven 2-hitters, 13 3-hitters and 18 4-hitters.

In accumulating 42 career shutouts (plus one vs. Dodgers in '66 WS and one vs. A's in '73 CS), he has pitched at least one vs. every opponent: N.Y. and Cle.-6 each; Bos.-5; Cal., K.C., and Mil.-4 each; Chi., Det., Min., and Tex.-3 each; Oak.-1.

In Relief: Relieved 21 times in 1965, his rookie year, and three times in 1969 . . . However, since June 28, 1969, he has relieved only twice in 267 regular season appearances and picked up saves in both: July 3, 1973 vs. Mil. (for Grant Jackson) and July 19, 1975 vs. Oak. (for Ross Grimsley) . . . Also relieved Doyle Alexander in fifth game of 1973 ALCS.

Previous Honors/Awards: Has won TSN American League Pitcher of the Year Award three times ('73, '75, '76) . . . Twice chosen "Most Valuable Oriole" (1972 and 1973) and has finished second last two years to Ken Singleton in 1975 and to Lee May in 1976 . . . Was second to Reggie Jackson in A.L. "MVP" balloting in 1973 and was fifth in 1975 . . . Won "Comeback Player of Year" citations in 1975 by both TSN and U.P.I.

All-Star Games: Member of American League all-star teams in 1970, 1971, 1972 and 1975 . . . Has performed very well in all-star competition, allowing no runs and three hits in eight innings . . . Started 1970 game at Cincinnati and 1972 game at Atlanta . . . Pitched three innings of one-hit ball in 1972 game . . . Did not play in 1975 contest . . . Has eight strikeouts and two walks in all-star play.

Cy Young, '73 & '75: Was named on 20 of 24 ballots in 1973 . . . Had 14 firsts and six seconds (88 points) to beat out Nolan Ryan (52 points) . . . In 1975, Jim was named on all 24 ballots (15-7-2) and totaled 108 points to win over Catfish Hunter (74 points) . . . Ironically, he has not pitched in the all-star game in any of the years he has won "Cy" . . . He was not selected to the team in 1973 and 1976 (was 9-6 and 10-8 respectively at time managers made picks) and was chosen, but did not pitch in 1975 game because of tender elbow.

Miscellaneous: Made major league debut on April 17, 1965, at Boston in relief (no decision) . . . Picked up first big league win on May 16, 1965, also in relief vs. Yankees' Pete Mikkelsen . . . Was leading winner on 1966 World Championship team (15, McNally was second with 13) . . . Won 100th game on Sept. 24, 1972, at Milwaukee . . . Has three lifetime home runs (vs. Jim Bouton, N.Y., here in '65; Dave Morehead at Bos. in '66; and Rich Hand, Cle., in '70 here) . . . Has gone 12 innings four times during his career, but has not had a decision in any of those games . . . Has gone beyond 9 innings in 14 games and has a 4-2-8 record in those.

Personal: Signed to bonus contract with O's by Jim Russo and Jim Wilson . . . Outstanding three-sport athlete at Scottsdale High School, earning all-Arizona honors in baseball, basketball and football . . . Excellent golfer . . . Has participated in Superstars competition in Florida in 1975 and 1976 . . . Has actively served as national sports chairman for Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation last 6 years . . . Excellent after-dinner speaker . . . He and his wife, Susan, were married February 25, 1964, and are the parents of two daughters: Jamie Michelle (11/16/66) and Kelly Christina (6/5/69).

Durability: Played in 97% of all Orioles' games from July 9, 1959 (the day he returned from the minors for the last time) thru May 16, 1976 (a period of 16½ years plus) . . . Games played last two years have been lowest since 1965, when he missed 18 games as a result of broken thumb (hit by a Hank Aguirre pitch) and a shoulder injury.

Brooks' durability is even more notable when considered that he has been "beamed" seven times: Earl Wilson ('55), Ned Garver ('57), John Buzhardt ('63), Phil Niekro ('67), Steve Blass ('68), Mike Nagy ('70), and Woodie Fryman ('72).

Since the St. Louis Browns franchise was transferred to Baltimore prior to the 1954 season, the Orioles have compiled the fourth best record in the majors and second best in the American League. This, despite the fact that the Birds were 180-282 during their first three years of operation in Baltimore (1954-55-56). ---THE BIRDS AND THE BROWNS---

The Baltimore Orioles were charter members of the American League when it began operation in 1901. However, after two seasons the club was moved to New York where it ultimately became known as the New York Yankees.

The franchise from which the current Orioles descend came into the A.L. in 1901 representing Milwaukee, but in 1902 was transferred to St. Louis and named the Browns. In 52 seasons (1902 thru 1953) the Browns were, perhaps, the most unsuccessful team in major league history. They were 3,416-4,465 (.433) and finished in the second division 40 times. They won their only pennant in 1944 then lost the world series in six games to their home town rivals, the Cardinals.

In June, 1951, Bill and Charles DeWitt sold their controlling interest to Bill Veeck who operated the club for the next 2½ seasons. On September 29, 1953, he sold his shares to a group of Baltimore businessmen who brought major league baseball back to this city after a 51-year lapse.

---MAGIC NUMBER---

To calculate: Determine number of games to be played by first place club . . . Add 1 . . . Subtract the number of games first place club is ahead of second place club in the all-important lost column (A.I.L.C.). The result represents the magic number . . . Example: If first team has 20 games to play and is six games ahead of second team . . . $20 + 1 = 21$. . . $21 - 6 = 15$. . . 15 is the magic number.

When, in any combination, first team wins added to second team losses equal the magic number, first team has clinched the championship . . . From another angle—with each subsequent first team win or second team loss, the magic number is decreased by one . . . When the "M.N." is down to one, first team has clinched a tie, when it is reduced to zero, first team has won the title.

SPRING TRAINING NOTES

This is the 19th straight spring the Orioles have trained in Miami. Over the past 18 years, some 780,000 have watched the Birds in exhibition games at Miami Stadium (including 29,123 for an abbreviated eight game slate last year).

The permanent seating capacity at Miami Stadium is 9,548, but the Orioles and Yankees drew a standing room crowd of 12,464 for a Sunday afternoon game on March 14, 1965.

Last year the Orioles because of on-going negotiations between players and owners did not begin training until March 18. The first exhibition game was not played until March 23 (ten days after the scheduled opener) forcing cancellation of the first 10 games.

The Orioles were 4-11 in 1976 spring exhibitions. Al Bumbry (.375, 9-for-24) was the club's leading hitter while Bob Grich (.333, 15-for-45), Don Baylor (.321, 9-for-28), Doug DeCinces (.313, 5-for-16) and Ken Singleton (.300, 12-for-40) also hit over .300 among the regulars . . . Paul Blair led the club in rbi (8) and he and Grich were tops in homers with two each.
