EDWARD BENNETT WILLIAMS

When Edward Bennett Williams (owner, chairman of the board and president) officially purchased the Orioles on Nov. 1, '79, he acquired a franchise that had won more games than any other club in the majors over the previous 20 years. It was a tough act to follow.

What have the Orioles done during his 5 years as club-owner? Well, they've won more games than any other club in the majors.

Mr. Williams made a public commitment to winning at the time he took over and has repeated it many times since. Last winter, he made some very dramatic moves to re-emphasize his intent.

The O's who had won a world championship in '84 sputtered last season and fell to 5th place 19 games back of the Detroit Tigers. Though the Orioles won 85 games (there were 18 clubs with lesser records including all 7 in the A.L.'s western division), it was not a fitting ending for the winningest club in baseball.

During the off-season he moved swiftly and boldly to prevent a reoccurence ... Working in concert with his Executive Vice-President/
General Manager Hank Peters, the O's owner acquired the services of
three front line free agents (Fred Lynn, Lee Lacy and Don Aase) to
shore up the apparent weaknesses of his ballclub and was looking to improve the team even more as spring training began.

Finishing in the second division in '84 obviously did not sit well with the 64-year old Hartford, CT native. Losing has never been an acceptable alternative to this distinguished Washington attorney who has honed his intense competitive instincts during nearly 40 years in the courtroom and two decades as president of the Washington Redskins.

Williams, the founder and senior partner of the Washington law firm, Williams & Connolly, left Hartford to attend Holy Cross College and after graduating summa cum laude in '41, served in the United States Army Air Force during World War II. Upon his return to civilian life, he attended Georgetown University Law School, graduated in '45 and was admitted to the D.C. Bar. He has been a Washington resident ever since.

The father of seven children (Joe, Ellen, Bennett, Ned, Dana, Tony and Kimberly), he lives with his wife, the former Agnes Anne Neill (also a Georgetown University Law School graduate), and family in Potomac, MD.

Mr. Williams taught Criminal Law and Evidence at Georgetown Law School from 1946 to 1958; was guest professor of American Criminal Law at the University of Frankfurt in West Germany in '54; and, in '71, as visiting lecturer at Yale University Law School where he taught Constitutional Litigation. He holds honorary degrees from 12 universities.

He was chairman of the American Bar Association Special Committee on Crime Prevention and Control from 1970 to 1972. In 1966 the D.C. Bar Association presented him with its "Lawyer of the Year" award . . . He is a Fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers and was a member of its board of regents from 1968 to 1972.

By appointment of the Chief Justice of the United States in March 1965, Mr. Williams served on the U.S. Judicial Conference Advisory Committee on Federal Rules of Evidence until 1974 and, from 1971 to 1974, on the Chief Justice's Committee on Court Facilities and Design.

From 1971 to 1978, he served as chairman of the Judicial Nomination Commission for the Sixth Judicial Circuit of Maryland.

By appointment of President Gerald Ford, Mr. Williams served on the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board in 1976 and 1977. In 1977 President Jimmy Carter appointed him a consultant to the National Security Agency (NSA) ... In November 1980, President-elect Ronald Reagan appointed Mr. Williams, as one of three prominent Democrats, to serve on the Foreign Policy Advisory Board to assist in the presidential transition, and is now serving on the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board.

Mr. Williams was treasurer of the Democratic National Committee from 1974 to 1977; has served as general counsel of Georgetown University since 1949; is chairman of the board of trustees of Holy Cross College; is general counsel of the Motion Picture Association of America and of the 20th Century Fox Film Corporation.

HANK PETERS

HENRY J. (HANK) PETERS has been the Orioles' executive vicepresident and general manager for the last 9 seasons, since he signed a 5-year contract in November, 1975. At that time, he replaced J. Frank Cashen who had resigned to join the Carling National Brewery.

As an indication of his success with the Orioles, Hank's contract was extended for another 5 years (thru '84) after '79 season, and was extended again a year ago for still another 5 years (thru '89).

A veteran of 38 years in professional baseball, Hank has twice earned major league "executive of the year" honors ('79, '83) from the SPORTING NEWS, and won UPI's major league executive award in '79 as well.

The 60-year old (Sep. 16,'24) St. Louis native has shown an amazing ability to adjust to the abrupt and rapid changes that have affected player-management relations during the past several years. It has been an invaluable asset.

Hank came to Baltimore after 4 years as president of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues (the governing body of minor league baseball). Before accepting that position in Dec, '71, he had spent 5 years with the Cleveland Indians as vice-president for player personnel.

Prior to that, he had been with the Kansas City A's for a decade. During his tenure in Kansas City, he had the distinction of being the last general manager appointed by club-owner Charles O. Finley (who later became his own gm). He has also worked with the St. Louis Browns and Cincinnati Reds.

He first broke into baseball in '46 after serving 3 years in the U.S. Army in World War II during which he was stationed in England, Germany and Czechoslovakia.

He got his start with the hometown Browns in the minor league department, working for Farm Director Jim McLaughlin, who later served the Orioles in the same capacity (and still lives in Baltimore), and BIII DeWitt, the general manager.

When the franchise was moved to Baltimore in Oct. '53, Hank took a job as general manager of the independent Burlington, lowa club in the Class B Three-I League.

After the '54 season, he joined the new Kansas City A's (who had just moved from Philadelphia) as farm director, and remained in that position thru '60. In early '61, following a disagreement with owner Finley, Hank resigned and spent the balance of the season working again for DeWitt (then gm at Cin.), as farm director of the Reds who won the N.L. pennant that season.

However, in Dec. '61, he returned to the A's as assistant general manager/farm director. In '65 he was appointed general manager, and during his tenure such future stars as "Catfish" Hunter, Bert Campaneris, Reggie Jackson, Sal Bando, Joe Rudi, Rick Monday, Gene Tenace, and Rollie Fingers were signed and developed in the A's farm system.

Hank moved to Cleveland in '66 and remained there until he was elected to succeed the retiring National Association President Phil Piton. At the time, the National Association was headquartered in Columbus, OH, but in Sep. '73, Hank moved the office to its present site, in St. Petersburg, FL.

He and his wife, Dottle, whom he met while both were working for the Browns, have been married for 34 years . . . They have 2 children: Sharon and Steve, and 2 grandchildren: Shannon Nicole Torrez, born Dec. 12, '80, and Christopher Henry Peters, born on Oct. 16, '83, the day the Orioles clinched the '83 World Championship.



1984 ATTENDANCE NOTES: The Orioles set a club record in home attendance in 1984, drawing 2,045,784, to surpass the two million mark for the 2nd straight year. The club has drawn at least one million fans for 10 straight years and 18 of 31 years.

The new mark exceeded the previous high, set in 1983, despite one less date (76). The O's also set a club record in average attendance, 26,918, 5th best in the league. The total attendance ranked 8th in the league.

The largest crowd of the season, 51,764, attended a June 10 double-header vs the

Detroit Tigers. It was the 5th best regular season crowd in club history, and the top draw for a day twin-bill in the Orioles' 31 years. That date culminated a 3-date, 4-game series (June 8-10) which drew 146,529, the best-attended series for the year and 5th best all-time.

The Orloles drew over 50,000 on three occasions, between 40,000 and 50,000 on three occasions and between 30,000 and 40,000 14 times in '84.

Five series in 1984 drew over 100,000, led by the June Tigers series mentioned above and a 4-date series vs the White Sox July 12-15 which drew 137,389. In 31 years, the club has drawn over 100,000 for a series 36 times, 27 coming in the last 6 seasons (starting '79).

Frank Robinson is the only player to have hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium. In the second game of a doubleheader with Cleveland 0.3 May 8, 1966, Frank hit a Luis Tiant offering over the left field stands and into the parking lot beyond, a drive that measured 451 ' on the fly and rolled to a stop 541 ' away from home plate.

GRAND SLAM NOTES

1984: The Orioles' eight grand slams led the majors for the fourth straight year ('81-5, '82-8, '83-8 tied with Angels, '84-8). The total tied the club record achieved four times previously ('70, '79, '82, '83).

The Orioles hit their first four slams in a 6-week stretch from May 27 thru July 7, then hit their final four in September. They hit six of eight on

the road, and in the last two years have hit 11 of 16 away after hitting 12 of their previous 13 ('81-'82) at Memorial Stadium.

Eddie Murray, Ken Singleton, and Wayne Gross had two each, while Gary Roenicke and Mike Young had one apiece. Murray's pair gave him the club career record (9), breaking his tie with Boog Powell (7). He set another club record by hitting his sixth at Memorial Stadium, moving ahead of Lee May who had five.

Ken Singleton had the lone pinch grand slam for the O's September 1 at Seattle. Baltimore has had one pinch slam each of the last two years after setting an American League record and tying a major league mark

with three in 1982. Gary Roenicke's slam June 17 at New York not only broke a 2-2 tie in the 8th inning giving the O's a 6-2 win, but won a million dollars for a College Park (MD) housewife whose name was randomly drawn in WMAR-TV's "Homerun Sweepstakes Inning," sponsored by Equitable Trust Bank on Orioles televised games.

The Orioles yielded three grand slams, to Jim Presley August 31 at Seattle off Mike Flanagan, the first he had ever allowed, to Robin Yount September 15 at Milwaukee off Sammy Stewart, and to Mike Pagliarulo September 17 at New York off Dennis Martinez.

Previous Years: The Orioles first hit 8 grand slams in a season in 1970, including one in the ALCS and one in the WS. They have now hit 8 each of the last 3 years.

The individual club mark for slams in a season is five, set by Jim Gentile in '61. That is an American League record and matches the major league standard set in '55 by Ernie Banks of the Chicago Cubs.

Gentile is one of seven to have hit two in one game and was the first of three to do so in consecutive plate appearances. That event took place on May 9, '61 at Minnesota (off Pete Ramos and Paul Giel).

Subsequently, the Tigers' Jim Northrup hit back-to-back slams in '68, then two years later, the Orioles' Frank Robinson hit consecutive slams at Washington (RFK Stadium) in the 5th and 6th innings on June 26, '70.

Brooks Robinson blasted bases loaded homers in consecutive games in '62: on May 6 at Dodger Stadium vs. California (Ken McBride) and May 9 at Baltimore vs. K.C. A's (Ed Rakow).

Dave McNally, who hit one in the third game of the '70 WS off Cincinnati's Wayne Granger, remains the only pitcher ever to hit a world series . Mike Cuellar was the first player to hit a grand slam in ALCS competition, connecting off Minnesota's Jim Perry in game one of the '70 series at Metropolitan Stadium. That was the only slam in ALCS history until '82 when Don Baylor of California hit a bases loaded homer off the Brewer's Moose Haas in game four at Milwaukee ... The Dodgers' Ron Cey and Dusty Baker are the only two to hit slams in the NLCS (both in '77).

Opponents: In 31 years, the Orioles have "out-slammed" their opponents 116-66 (including a 62-29 advantage at Memorial Stadium).

Seven opponents have hit two career slams against the O's (nobody has hit more), including three who have hit both at Memorial Stadium: Roy Sievers (Was.), Moose Skowron (N.Y.) and Mike Epstein (Was.).

Grand Slam Gophers: A total of ten opposing pitchers have yielded two grand slams each to the Orioles (no one has allowed more than two) . The three still active are Aurelio Lopez of the Tigers (to John Lowenstein 9/212/83 and Mike Young 9/3/84, both at Detroit), Don Aase (to Lee May 5/5/79 and Doug DeCinces 8/27/81, both at Baltimore), and Lamarr Hoyt of the White Sox (to Terry Crowley 8/5/80 and Doug DeCinces 8/15/81, both at Baltimore).

Among Orioles' pitchers, Milt Pappas was the most generous. He gave up six bases loaded homers during his tenure in Baltimore while Dave McNally was victimized four times. On the other hand, Jim Palmer, in 558 games spanning nearly 4000 innings, never allowed a grand slam. Among the current O's, Dennis Martinez and Sammy Stewart, the only hurlers who have allowed more than one, have each yielded three.

Notes On 20-Game Winners

In '84 Mike Boddicker became the first Oriole to win 20 games in 4 years, since Steve Stone and Scott McGregor both reached that level in '80. However, Baltimore pitchers have still produced 23 20-game seasons in the past 17 years (starting '68), far and away the most in the majors over that period.

From '68 thru '80, a span of 13 years, at least one Oriole pitcher accumulated 20 or more victories to set a major league record. The old standard was 12 by the New York Giants from '03 to '14, a mark single handedly assured by Christy Mathewson who won 20 + in each of those

years. In 1971 four Baltimore pitchers reached the 20-win plateau. The only other foursome in the entire history of major league baseball to have achieved the feat were four hurlers from the 1920 White Sox (51 years earlier): Urban "Red" Faber-23, Claude Williams-22, Dickie Kerr-21 and Ed Cicotte-21. Despite that achievement, the White Sox finished second that year, two games behind Cleveland.

The four Orioles all won their 20th games within six days: McNally was the first on 9/21; then in a series in Cleveland, the other three joined him: Cuellar (9/24-1st game-clinched division title), Dobson (9/24-2nd game), and Palmer (9/26).

Stone was the earliest 20-game winner in club history, winning his 20th game on August 19 en route to team record 25 victories in '80. Three other Orioles' hurlers have recorded their 20th wins in August: McNally (8/25) and Cuellar (8/27) in '71 and Palmer (8/30) in '75.

The first Oriole to win 20, and the only one in the club's 1st 14 seasons in Baltimore ('54 thru '67) was lefthander Steve Barber in '63.

RULES OF INTEREST TRADING AND WAIVER REGULATIONS

Within League:

A.L. Waivers Necessary: June 16 thru last day of season No Waivers Necessary: First day of off-season thru June 15 next. Between Leagues:

A.L. and N.L. Waivers Necessary: June 16 thru last day of season

A.L. Waivers (only) Necessary: At all other times EXCEPT during interleague trading periods.

No Waivers Necessary (Inter-League Trading Periods):

(2) Fifth day following end of World Series thru the day PRECED-ING the last SCHEDULED day of the winter meetings.

National Association Assignments: Waivers are required at all times for assignments to National Association clubs, EXCEPT for optional assignments within three years of date player first reported to the major leagues.

SUSPENDED GAME RULE

A game terminated for any of the following reasons will be a suspended game IF it has progressed far enough to be an official game (i.e., 41/2 or 5 innings):

(1) a curfew imposed by law

(2) a pre-arranged time limit, and

(3) darkness where local law prohibits turning on the lights, or where lights are not available

LIGHT FAILURE: A game terminated by light failure or malfunction of a mechanical device under the control of the home club will be a SUS-PENDED GAME ANYTIME AFTER IT STARTS.

INNING IN PROGRESS (added in 1980): If WEATHER forces the termination of a legal game while an INNING IS IN PROGRESS, it will become a SUSPENDED game if EITHER of the following two conditions exists:

(1) The VISITING TEAM has scored one or more runs to TIE the game, and the HOME TEAM has not scored.

(2) The VISITING TEAM has scored one or more runs to take the lead and the HOME TEAM has not tied the score, or taken the lead.

NOTE: If a legal game is TIED when called because of weather and NEITHER of the above situations prevails, it is a TIE GAME and must be RE-PLAYED in its entirety.

PROCEDURES FOR RESUMPTION OF PLAY: Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension IMMEDIATELY PRECEDING the NEXT SINGLE game between the two clubs on the SAME GROUND. If this is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in A.L. Regulation 5.2 (c).

CURFEW

A.L. RULE: No inning may start after 1:00 A.M., BUT any inning that BE-GINS PRIOR to 1:00 A.M. may be PLAYED TO COMPLETION. Curfews shall be waived for the final series of the season in each of the two parks of two contesting teams.

SAVE RULE (10-20)

Credit a pitcher with a save when he is the finishing, but not the winning pitcher, and when he qualifies under one of the following conditions

(1) he enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitches for at least one inning, or

(2) he enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, at bat, or on deck, or

(3) he pitches effectively for at least three innings regardless of his

The current rule was adopted in 1975. Saves became official for the first time in '69 . . . The original rule was amended in '73 then revised again in '75.

Batting/ERA Title Qualifications: 502 or more plate appearances . . . 162 or more innings . . . Rookie Qualification: A player shall be considered a rookie unless, during a previous season or seasons, he has: (1) exceeded 130 at bats or 50 innings pitched in the majors, or (2) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a big league club(s) prior to Aug. 31.

During the 29 years from '56 thru '84, the Orioles have won more games than any other club while compiling the best won-lost percentage. In that period they are 593 games over .500,

If you go back to the '54 season (a span of 31 seasons) when the franchise came to Baltimore from St. Louis, the Birds rank 3rd in overall standings (.552, 2695-2188) behind the Yankees (.565, 2763-2130) and Dodgers (.557, 2728-2174) . . . Not bad for a club that was 86 games under .500 after its 1st 2 years of operation.

During those 31 years, the O's have won 100 or more games 5 times ('69, '70, '71, '79 '80), an achievement exceeded only by the Yankees (6 times). Baltimore's 5 100-win campaigns over the last 16 seasons is un-surpassed.

Since Start of Divisional Play

Divisional Play was initiated in '69 and in that period of 16 years, the O's also rank #1 in the majors (.592, 1489-1026), with the **Dodgers** 2nd (.556, 1408-1124), the Reds 3rd (.555, 1402-1126), the Yankees 4th (.551, 1391-1132) and Red Sox 5th (.545, 1377-1148).

Last 10 and 5 Years

In the last decade ('75 thru '84) the O's have won 903 games, ahead of the Yankees (888), Phillies (872), Dodgers (865), Red Sox and Royals (860 each).

The same goes for the '80s to date (5 years), the period during which Edward Bennett Williams has owned the franchise. In that time, the O's have registered 436 wins while the Tigers are 2nd (423), the Yankees 3rd (419), Dodgers 4th (413) and the Phillies 5th (410).

The Tigers who paced the majors in victories in '84, also hold the edge in the last 2-3-4 years with Baltimore in 2nd place in each of those 3 periods.

The American League's Eastern Division

The 5 major league clubs with the best won-lost percentages over the past 7 years ('78 thru '84) are all members of the American League East: 1.—Orioles (.585 628-445) ... 2.—New York Yankees (.564, 608-470) ... 3.—Detroit Tigers (.550, 594-486) ... 4.—Boston Red Sox (.543, 585-494), and 5—Milwaukee Brewers (.54217, 585-494) The Los Angeles Dodgers (587-496) have won 2 more games than either the Red Sox or Brewers but have lost more as well for a percentage of .54201.

-- 100 WINS --

The Orioles won more than 100 games in each of three straight seasons—'69 (109), '70 (108) and '71 (101). Only two other clubs have achieved this feat in the history of major league baseball: the '29-'30-'31 Philadelphia A's (104-102-107) and the '42-'43-'44 St. Louis Cardinals (106-105-105).

Consecutive Game Hitting Streaks: A consecutive-game hitting streak shall not be terminated if all the player's plate appearances (one or more) result in a base on balls, hit batsman, defensive interference or a sacrifice bunt. The streak shall terminate if the player has a sacrifice fly and no

This award is presented annually by the Sports Boosters of Maryland to the most valuable Oriole player by vote of sportswriters and broadcasters who cover the club on a regular basis.

In 1984, Eddie Murray won a club record fifth 'MVO' honor, surpassing Brooks Robinson's four awards. It was Murray's fourth consecutive award (he shared '83 honors with Cal Ripken), his fifth in his 8-year major league career (he also won it in '78), and his third unanimous selection ('81 and '82 also).

Murray received all 17 first place votes for 85 points in the 5-3-1 scoring system. Mike Boddicker, with 10 second place and seven third place votes, was second with 37 points. Cal Ripken, with 31 points, finished third (seven second place and 10 third place votes). Murray, Boddicker, and Ripken were the only players named on the ballots.

BIGGEST LIFETIME WINNERS-LOSERS vs. 0's Winners: Whitey Ford, the Yankee Hall of Famer, still holds the distinction of having beaten the Orioles more than anyone else, even though he's been retired since '67 Ford was 30-16 vs. the O's.

Ford is one of 11 pitchers to have posted 20 or more wins against the O's in 31 Baltimore seasons. The others: "Catfish" Hunter (26-24), Mickey Lolich (25-19), Billy Pierce (23-11), Early Wynn and Frank Sullivan (both 21-8), Jim Kaat (21-21), Earl Wilson (20-9), Luis Tiant (20-21), Jim Perry (20-22) and Camilo Pascual (20-23).

Among currently active pitchers, the biggest anti-Orioles winners are: Tommy John (15), Bert Blyleven (14), Larry Gura (13) and Frank Tanana (12).

Losers: Hunter, the second biggest winner against the O's, is also the biggest lifetime loser (24) . . . It wasn't always thus . . . At one time, he was 23-16 then lost 8 of his last 11 decisions from '76 thru '79.

There have been 4 other 20-game losers: Tiant and Jim Perry (22 each), Fritz Peterson (14-21), and Jim Kaat (21) . . . Other big losers were Lolich (19), Gaylord Perry (12-19) and Sam McDowell (9-19) . . . From a percentage standpoint, Jim Colburn, formerly of Mil., K.C. & Sea. (3-17, .150) and Rudy May (3-15, .167) rank near the bottom of the heap.

Actives who have had little success against Baltimore include: Geoff Zahn (2-11), Matt Keough(1-8), Milt Wilcox (4-12), Jim Beattie (3-10) and and Mike Caldwell (3-9) . . . In terms of gross losses Tommy John, the biggest active winner, is also the biggest loser (15-14) followed by Wilcox (12), Zahn and Blyleven (11 each).

JOURNEY TO JAPAN '84

The Orioles spent 3 weeks in Japan last fall (Nov. 25 thru Nov. 16), at the behest of the **Yomiuri Shimbun**, the largest newspaper in the world and owner of the Tokyo Yomiuri Giants. The invitation was extended to the O's immediately after they had won the '83 World Series.

It was the sponsor's hope that the O's would repeat in '84 and that a matchup against the '84 Japan Series winners would result in the first ever confrontation between the two national champions*. Yomiuri also hoped, of course, that the Giants would capture the Japan title. That's not quite the way it worked out. The Giants were 3rd in the Central League and the O's, of course, finished 5th in the American League's eastern division.

The O's played 14 games on the tour and came away with 8 wins, 5 losses and a tie in 14 games (one scheduled game was rained out).

It was a modest record compared to standards set by many previous visiting American clubs (including the '71 O's who were 12-2-4), but there were some notable achievements:

(1) 4-1 Vs. Japan Champions: The O's played their 1st 5 games against the '84 Japan Champion Hiroshima Carp, and captured that highly publicized series by sweeping the final 4 games after dropping the opener 1-0 at Tokyo's Korakuen Stadium.

The Carp's 24-year old lefthander **Kazuhisa Kawaguchi** had the distinction of pitching 1st game shutout and driving in the only run of the game. He was the only pitcher on either side to go the route on the entire tour.

(2) 4-1 vs. Giants: The O's also downed the Tokyo Giants, managed by the world's s most prolific home run hitter Sadaharu Oh (868), 4 games to 1. Despite their 3rd place finish in '84, the Giants, the winningest and by far the most popular team in Japanese baseball history, have won 23 Central League titles (and 16 Japan Series, their equivalent to our World Series) in the last 32 years ('53 thru '84).

*Five teams have gone to Japan during the same year they won the pennant, but in all cases those clubs had lost in the World Series: '55 Yankees, '56 Dodgers, '66 Dodgers, '68 Cardinals and '71 Orioles.

JOURNEY TO JAPAN '84 (Cont.)

The Giants' 10-5 victory over the O's on Nov. 14 in Shizuoka in the final game between the 2 clubs represented their 1st win ever against Baltimore in 17 lifetime games (O's are now 13-1-3). The O's beat the Giants in Miami in a spring training matchup in '71, then went 8-03 against them on the Japan tour that fall.

(3) 35 Home Runs: As a club the O's excelled in the power game, bashing 35 home runs in the 14 games. The average of 2½ homers per game was a record for a touring American team (excluding the major league all stars of '53 who whacked 42 long balls in only 12 games) and was 2nd in gross output only to the '56 Brooklyn Dodgers who hit 40 in 19 games.

(4) Not-So-Secret Weapon, Eddie Murray: His stats tell the story. He batted .367 (18-for-49), with 3 doubles, 9 homers, 9 walks, 22 rbi (in 14 games mind you) and drove in the game-winner in 5 of the O's 8 victories.

Thru the first 4 games of the tour, **Eddie** was 4-for-14 (.286) with 4 rbi and no home runs. In the last 10 games, he hit .389 (14-for-36) with 9 homers and 18 rbi.

One of those home runs stood out above the rest. it was a shot off Giants' righthander **Hiromi Makihara** at Fukuoka's Heiwadai Stadium on Nov. 11. The grive a 2-run shot completely cleared the rightfield stands while traveling, according to some estimates, as far as 600 feet. It was one of the longest home runs veteran Japan baseball observers have ever seen.

(5) Rookie Standouts: Two rookies in the Q's 29-player entourage enjoyed outstanding success in Japan. Outfielder Larry Sheets tied Al Bumbry for the club lead in batting at .400 (16-for-40) and was 2nd in rbi (11 in 13 games) and homers (tied with Cal Ripken and Todd Cruz).

Nate Snell who like Sheets came up with the O's in September relieved in 7 games and compiled a 4-0 record with a nifty 1.08 era (2 er, 16.2 ip) and 15 strikeouts.

Jim Traber who had a banner year at Hagerstown and Charlotte before making his big league debut in the final 2 weeks of the season also had his moments. He batted .286 (28-8), hit 2 homers (both in the same game) and drove in 6 runs.

(6) Other Good Shows: After a slow start, Cal Ripken came alive. After 5 games he was batting only .231 (26-6) with one home run and one rbi . . . In the last 9 games, Rip raised his average to a final .315, hit 3 more homers and drove in 8 more runs.

Todd Cruz who hit only 3 home runs in 146 at bats during regular season, had 4 in 17 at bats on the tour including 2 in the O's 1st win against the Carp... Al Bumbry batted .400 (25-10) and hit 2 homers in a game for the 1st time in his pro career (there were 5 2-homer efforts on the trip including 2 by Murray)... In limited duty, Jim Dwyer batted .300 (20-6).

Summary: As a club the O's had a slight edge over their Japanese opponents in hitting .266 (512-136) to .261 (460-120), out-scored them 87 to 77, had a commanding lead in home runs 35 to 12, and out-pitched them 4.94 to 6.00 (though neither figure was much to write home about). There was one area in which the Japanese totally dominated. They stole 22 bases in the 14 games while the O's swiped only 6.

With the exception of **Snell's** performance, the O's pitching staff was generally ineffective, a problem compounded by **Mike Boddicker's** illness and the absence of **Tippy Martinez** and **Scott McGregor**, neither of whom made the trip because of injuries.

Sammy Stewart had a kind of "Jekyll and Hyde" experience in Japan. He appeared in 5 of the O's 1st 6 games, picked up 4 saves and didn't allow a run in 6 innings. After that, in 3 additional outings, Sammy was touched for 10 earned runs in 5 innings.

Lenn Sakata, the only current major leaguer of Japanese ancestry (he's a 4th generation American), hit only .207 (29-6), but had the gwrbi on a 2-run 9th inning single in the game that clinched the series against the Carp and later added a home run.

NOTES

Japanese Baseball: Japan has 2 major leagues, the Central and Pacific, each with 6 clubs . . . There are 7 teams in the Tokyo (Kanto) area including 4 in Tokyo proper and one each in Yokohama, Kawasaki and Tokorazawa and 4 clubs in or near Osaka (Kansai). Only 2 franchises are located outside those 2 regions: Hiroshima Carp and Chunichi (Nagoya) Dragons.

The Carp won the right to play the Orioles in the 1st 5 games by

besting the Pacific League champion Hankyu Braves (Osaka) in a 7 game Japan Series. One of the secrets to the Carps' success in the series was silencing the big bat of the Braves **Boomer Wells**, the former Twin and Indian and "Minor League Player of the Year" in '82.

During the regular season (130 games in Japan) Wells became the first "gaijin" (foreigner) to win a triple crown. He led the Pacific League in average (.355), home runs (37) and rbi (130) as well as in total bases (309) and gwrbi (21).

Japanese teams may sign up to 2 foreign players each, but the only American to see action vs. the O's was former Rangers hurler Dave Rajsich (Now under contract to the Rochester Red Wings) for the Carp. Their other American was Tim Ireland (former KC Royal) who had be sidelined with a broken collarbone. The Giants had Reggie Smith and Warren Cromartie (former Expo) in '84, but Smith retired at end of the season and Cromartie had returned home.

Travel: The 103 passenger contingent on the Japan Air Lines DC 8 charter (including wives, companions, media representatives and other friends of the club) was led by Orioles owner Edward Bennett Williams, Executive Vice-President Hank Peters and former Baseball Commissioner Bowie Kuhn.

The flight left Baltimore-Washington International Airport at 11:38 A.M. and, after a stop in Anchorage, Alaska, arrived at Tokyo's Narita International Airport just short of 16 hours later at 5:30 P.M. Japan time (In Japan it is 14 hours later than in Baltimore (13 when U.S. is on daylight time).

The O's played their 14 games in 12 different ballparks from Tokyo to Kumamoto on the southern island of Kyushu and traveled between cities by airplane, "bullet train" (shinkansen) and bus.

Governor/Mayor: During their stay the O's had plenty of support from home. Governor Harry Hughes led a contingent to Japan from the State of Maryland and the Economic Development Council of Greater Baltimore for business and good will purposes early in the tour. That year climaxed by a large reception at the Okura Hotel in Tokyo, hosted by the State, the EDC and the Orioles in honor of the Yomiuri Shimbun.

Toward the end of the trip, Mayor William Denald Schaefer escorted a delegation on a similar visit to Kawasaki, Baltimore's Sister City, (near Tokyo) where the Mayor formally presented a gift to the people of Kawasaki, a large sculpture ("The Red Buoyant"), designed by local sculptress Mary Ann Mears, from the citizens of Baltimore. Among those who accompanied the Mayor, was Dr. Hiroshi Nakazawa, president of the Baltimore-Kawasaki Sister City Committee.

Sadaharu Oh came to Baltimore in January to accept a special retroactive "Babe Ruth" Crown at the 32nd annual "Tops in Sports" baseball dinner, sponsored by the Maryland Professional Baseball Players Association. The crown is presented selectively to former players for past home run exploits. The man who made the presentation to Oh-San was Hank Aaron whose 755 career home runs represent the American Record. It was the 1st time that award had been presented to someone who had not played major league baseball in the U.S.

The crowd of some 2,300 baseball fans greeted **Oh** enthusiastically several times during the evening with a special chant, "Oh, Oh, Oh," then accorded him a full standing ovation when he received his award. He was the hit of the evening. Deservedly so!

During his 22 years as a player ('59 thru '80), all with the Tokyo Yomiuri Giants, **Oh** averaged 39 homers and 99 rbi, batted .301, won 15 home run titles, was a 5-time batting champion, captured 2 triple crowns, led the Central League in rbi 13 times, won 9 "mvp" awards and 9 Diamond Gloves (for fielding excellence at 1st base) and drew 2,504 walks (average 114 per year). He also played on 14 pennant winners, including 9 straight Japan championship teams ('65 thru '73).

Miscellaneous: There are 4 Japanese stadiums with artificial turf and all other ballparks are natural except that the infields are all dirt. Only the outfields have grass ... Murray's 9 homers matched Johnny Bench's output for the Reds in 17 '78 games, and was only 2 shy of Hank Sauer's record 11 for the New York Giants in '53 (14 games) ... Babe Ruth hit 16 in '34, but that was before Japanese professional baseball had developed ... Twenty-two former Orioles have played for teams in the Pacific and Central Leagues, including Don Buford, Dave Johnson, Jim Gentile, Jerry Adair and Bob Nieman.

Media: Baltimore baseball writers Jim Henneman (Evening Sun) and Richard Justice (Morning Sun) accompanied the O's as did Jon Miller and Tom Marr, the O's two radio play-by-play broadcasters, who did the first 9 games back to Baltimore via the O's flagship station WFBR.

WMAR-TV (Ch. 2), the O's commercial tv flagship, also sent a crew led by Sports Director John Saunders to do features during the 1st week of the tour, and Home Team Sports (HTS) which carries O's games on cable televised the opening game of the trip with old Japan hands Marty Kuehnert and Wayne Graczyk handling the description.

out at home . . . 36-2 (G. Triandos, W. Miranda, H. Smith). The Orioles have hit into 13 triple plays in 31 seasons, the last victim being Gary Roenicke against Oakland at Baltimore on May 7, '79. He grounded to third baseman Wayne Gross, who started an "around the horn" 5-4-3 triple play, the first executed against the Orioles since 1972. On four of the 13 occasions that Birds' opponents have completed triple plays, Brooks Robinson has been the batter. Brooks grounded into one, lined into another, and two were "gidp's", with a runner then being thrown out between third and home.

ORIOLES 1984 SEASON SUMMARY "THE YEAR OF THE TIGER"

For the Orioles and the rest of the American League's Eastern Division, 1984 was the season without a pennant race. It was the "Year of the Tiger" from start to finish.

Detroit became the 1st club in 57 years (since the immortal 1927 Yankees) to hold 1st place on every day of the season. After the Tigers jumped out to their incredible start (16-1, 35-5), the Toronto Blue Jays managed to creep within 3½ games of the Tigers on June 6, but neither they nor any other club would get that close again.

Traditionally the month of April has been unsuccessful for the Orioles and their 1984 start was even worse than usual. They were 2-10 on April 29 (Detroit was 9-1 and 8 games ahead of them on that date), and endured their 7th losing April in the last 10 years at 10-13.

When Detroit was 16-1 on Apr. 26, the Orioles were 6-13 (11 games back). When the Tigers were 35-5 on May 24, the O's were 23-20 (13½ games behind). The closest the Birds came to 1st place after that was 8½ games out on June 6 (same day Blue Jays were only 3½ back) . . . Late in the season the O's fell behind by as much as 20 games.

There was one notable 6½ week stretch when the O's actually played better than the Tigers . . . From April 26 thru June 9, the Birds went 28-11, a full 2½ games better than the Bengals (25-13) over the same period. Unfortunately, that edge began to erode sharply on Sunday, June 10 when the Tigers swept a doubleheader in Baltimore to capture a 4-game series. 3 games to one.

That double defeat pretty much ended any realistic hopes of getting back into contention. After that the O's went 52-51 over the rest of the season while Detroit which, by now, led the Birds by 12½ games went 61-44.

The Orioles' slow start and general inability to contend for the championship was largely attributable to a lack of team-wide offense. In '83 the O's scored 799 runs, one off the White Sox' major league leading total. In '84 the O's produced 118 fewer (681).

Cleanup hitter Eddie Murray, the club's "mvp" for a record 5th time, had another fine season (he led A.L. in walks, intentional walks, on-base pct. and gwrbi) and so did #3 hitter Cal Ripken (3rd in league in total bases). Both played every inning of every game.

Newcomer **Wayne Gross** hit 22 home runs and had 63 rbi despite a .216 average, and rookie **Mike Young** rebounded from a disappointing beginning to enjoy a productive last 2 months (his 17 homers and 52 rbi were 4th best on the club in each category).

For the most part, however, the rest of the batting order did not live up to expectations. Though **Murray** and **Ripken** both hit over .300, the O's team batting average ranked last or next-to-last virtually all season long (finished 12th at .252, ahead of California-.249 and Chicago-.247).

The quality that allowed the O's to remain in contention for 2nd place was good solid starting pitching. Despite the release of 268-game winner Jim Palmer in May, the O's starting quartet (Scott McGregor, Mike Flanagan, Mike Boddicker and Storm Davis) was consistently effective and the 5th starter, Dennis Martinez, occasionally returned to the level that made him a consistent winner prior to 1983.

During most of the 2nd half, the Orioles' staff era ranked 1st or 2nd (finished 2nd at 3.71 behind the Tigers' 3.49). Unfortunately, a broken finger sustained on Aug. 28 eliminated **McGregor** for the rest of the year, and **Mike Flanagan** was the frequent victim of inadequate offensive support . . Young **Davis** was 12-4 after 6 straight wins on Aug. 6, and his era was below 3.00 all year until the final 10 days of the season.

The Orioles best pitcher in 1984 was the gritty **Boddicker**. The A.L.'s "rookie pitcher of the year" in 1983 and a hero in both playoffs and world series, **Boddicker** lost his 1st 3 decisions in '84, but then went on to lead the league in wins (the A.L.'s only 20 game winner) and era (2.79). That he did not finish higher than 4th in A.L. Cy Young balloting remains a mystery.

The bullpen was a different story. **Tippy Martinez**, the acknowledged leader of the Orioles' relief corps, was troubled much of the year with a sore left shoulder (didn't pitch at all after mid-September). That was a handicap the Birds could not overcome, though **Sammy Stewart** enjoyed his most effective season in short relief.

1984 was also the 1st year the O's had failed to win 90 games (excluding '81, the short season) since '76. They also had a losing record

(36-42) against their Eastern Division opponents for only the 2nd time in the 16-year history of divisional play.

Interestingly, despite the 5th place finish, the O's had the best ¼ record among the 4 divisional winners of '83: 1—O's (85-77); 2—Phillies (81-81); 3—Dodgers (79-83); 4—White Sox (74-88).

In all there were 18 clubs with worse '84 records than the 0's, including all 7 clubs in the A.L.'s western division.

Mathematical elimination came on Sep. 17. It was the earliest the 0's pennant hopes had been dashed since 1963 (21 years previous). They plunged into 5th place during the last week of the season. It was their lowest finish in 17 seasons (since '67 when they tied for 6th . . . Also a year following a world championship season).

Artificial Turf: In '84 the Orioles were 10-15 in the A.L. ballparks with artificial turf (K.C., 2-4; Min., 1-5; Sea., 5-1; Tor., 2-5) tying them with New York for the 3rd worst record in the A.L. on the turf (Cle. 9-16 and Bos. 8-16 brought up the rear, and Det. 16-8 and Tor. 60-39 were the best).

Baltimore's lifetime mark on the carpet is 124-117. The O's are 90-89 in A.L. stadiums (K.C., 25-42; Min. 9-9; Sea., 28-15; Tor., 28-23) and 7-4 in 4 world series ('70 Cin., 2-0; '71 Pit., 0-3; '79 Pit., 2-1; '83 Phi., 3-0).

The Birds were 16-8 on the carpet in '83 (tied with Chi. for the best winning pct.), 12-13 in '82, 5-3 in '81, 9-10 in '80, 14-7 in '79 (including world series).

Batting/Home Runs: Although the Orioles' team batting average of .252 was 12th in the A.L. (ahead of California, .249 and Chicago, .247) the O's were 4th in the major leagues in home runs (160) and 1st in grand slams (8).

It marked the 3rd straight season the O's have hit 8 home runs with the bases loaded and the 4th consecutive year that Baltimore has led or tied for the major league lead in grand slams. As a team the O;s have hit 29 grand slams over the last four seasons, 12 more than the closest team (California, 17).

In addition, the O's were shut out only 5 times, one more than major league leader Toronto, and led the majors in walks with 620.

In other categories, the O's were 2nd in intentional walks (48), 5th in on base pct. (.328), 7th in runs (681, fewest since '78 except strike shortened '81), 7th in slugging pct. (.391) and 9th in total bases (2134). They were also 3rd in men left on base (1203), 3rd in strikeouts (884, 2nd highest in 12 years and the most since '77), tied for 6th in GIDP's (132). The O's 1374 hits were their fewest in a season (except for '81) since '76.

Baltimore batted .250 (712 for 2853) with 70 home runs and 352 runs scored in 85 1st half games and .254 (662 for 2603) with 90 home runs and 329 runs scored in 77 2nd half games. Only Detroit (101) and Boston (94) hit more homers than the O's in the 2nd half.

Close Games/Late Inning Wins: While their record in 1-run games (20-28, .417) was the O's 1st losing mark in that category since '75 (25-27, .480), and the 2nd worst in the A.L. (Chicago was 17-32, .347), Baltimore had the league's best record in 2-run games (22-14, .611) for the 3rd straight year. Combined the O's were 42-42 in 1- and 2-run games.

The O's came from behind to win on 35 occasions, just 1 less than '83, and were 23-26 in games decided in the 7th inning or later. Baltimore was 61-12 in contests which it led entering the 7th inning.

The Orioles won only 3 games in "sudden death" at Memorial Stadium, their lowest total ever. The O's defeated Chicago, Minnesota and Texas. They were beaten in "sudden death" 5 times on the road, losing twice to Chicago and Toronto and once to Kansas City.

The O's finished with 4-6 record in extra-inning games, 11th in the A.L. It was their first losing record in extra-inning games since '76 (7-8) and their worst record in extra-innings since '72 (5-9).

Day/Night: Baltimore had the A.L.'s 3rd best record in day games at 29-23 (.558), topped only by Detroit (36-15, .706) and Boston (28-22, .560). In night games the O's were 56-54 (.509), 6th in the league.

Days in Each Position: 1st (0), 2nd (0), 3rd (131), 4th (10), 5th (14), 6th (11), 7th (13).

Detroit became the first team in 57 years ('27 Yankees) to hold first place on every day of the season, and after April 27 the Toronto Blue Jays were never out of 2nd place. A 2-10 start in April left Baltimore in last place, 8 games out of 1st, on April 19. They were 11 games back on April 26 and 13 back by May 24.

The closest they drew to the Tigers was 8% behind on June 6. It wasn't until May 6 that the O's climbed into 3rd place and remained there for 94 days, and 126 out of the next 128. Three times closed to within 1% of 2nd place Toronto, the latest Sep. 10, but got no closer. The O's relinquished 3rd place for good the final week of the season.

Designated Hitters: Orioles designated hitters combined for a league low .219 average (133-for-607), the O's worst dh average since the rule was instituted in '73. Baltimore designated hitters hit 11 homers (12th in the A.L.), and had only 68 rbi (14th in the league). They also had a league-high 25 GIDP's. For the 3rd consecutive year, most of the dh chores were handled by **Ken Singleton** (.217, 77-for-355), 6 hr, 35 rbi, 103 games. Though he hit for career lows in each category, Singleton did hit a pair of grand slams in Sep.

Other O's to see action in the dh role were **Benny Ayala**, .235 (81-19), 3 hrs, 19 rbi; **John Lowenstein**, .215 (65-25), 2 hrs, 6 rbi; **Joe Nolan**, .303 (33-10), 0 hrs, 4 rbi; **Dan Ford**, .226 (31-7), 0 hrs, 0 rbi; **Eddie Murray**, .286 (7-2), 0 hrs, 2 rbi; **Wayne Gross**, .000 (5-0), 0 hr, 0 rbi; **Jim Dwyer**, .000 (5-0), 0 hrs, 0 rbi; **Al Bumbry**, .000 (4-0), 0 hrs, 0 rbi; **Todd Cruz**, .000 (0-0) 0 hrs, 0 rbi; **Victor Rodgriguez**, .000 (0-0), 0 hrs, 0 rbi.

Doubleheaders: The Orioles participated in 5 doubleheaders, winning 4 and losing 1. the Club's .800 winning percentage in twinbills was the A.L.'s 2nd best behind Oakland's .875 (7-1). Baltimore was 2nd in this category in '83 as well.

The O's sweeps, all twi-nighters, were vs. Toronto, May 9; vs. Kansas City, July 7; vs. Chicago, July 12; and vs. New York, Sep. 24. The Orioles lost their only day doubleheader to Detroit on June 10.

Fielding: The Orioles finished 1st in the A.L. in fielding with a .981 fielding mark, committing 123 errors in 6351 total chances. It was the 8th time in the last 11 seasons and 12th occasion in the last 22 years that the O's won the fielding title. It was also the 19th time in 24 years that the Orioles have finished either 1st or 2nd.

The Orioles regained the title (last won in '82) by a narrow margin over the Chicago White Sox (.9806299 to .9805763). The O's led the league in assists (1910), total chances (6351) and tied for 3rd with Toronto for most double plays (166). The club's catching corps had 9 passed balls, 5th lowest in the A.L.

Individuals: Cal Ripken, who for the 2nd straight season played every inning of every game at shortstop, set an A.L. record for most assists by a shortstop in a season (503) and his 880 chances (excluding errors) were the most by any A.L. shortstop since Twins Leo Cardenas handled the same number in '69. He led all shortstops in the chances (906, incl. 26 errors), double plays (122) and putouts (297). His .971 fielding percentage (26 e) tied him with Milwaukee's Robin Yount for 5th among A.L. shortstops.

Eddie Murray, the A.L.'s "Gold Glove" recipient at 1st base for the 3rd straight year, led the league's 1st sackers in putouts (1538), assists (143), total chances (1694) and double plays (152). His .992 fielding mark tied him for 4th best in the A.L.

Mike Boddicker tied A.L. record for most putouts in a season by a pitcher (49). He led all major league pitchers in total chances (105), double plays (6) and errors (7 all on pickoff attempts).

Gary Roenicke was ranked 3rd among qualifying outfielders with a .985 percentage (204 tc, 1 e) in 117 games. He went the final 105 games of the season without an error.

Although **Rich Dauer** committed a career-high 11 errors, the O's 2nd baseman made only 2 after the all-star break (58 games). His career fielding average (.987, 4211 tc, 54 e) remains well above the existing A.L. mark for highest percentage, 10 or more years, or 1000 games, both held by the late Nellie Fox (.984). Dauer (8 years, 892 games) doesn't have sufficient tenure to qualify for that record.

DETAILED SUMMARY (Cont.)

Home and Away: Baltimore was tied for 5th in the A.L. with a 44-37 (.543) record at home. The O's have had a winning record at home for 12 straight seasons and 26 of their 31 seasons in Baltimore. It was the 1st time since '76 that the club fell below a .600 won-lost percentage at Memorial Stadium.

The Orioles had one of only 4 winning road records in the A.L. The Birds 41-40 (.506) record marked the 16th time in the last 17 seasons (starting '68) that the team has been above .500 in road games.

Injuries: The O's catching corps and their outfielders were hit hardest by injuries. Rick Dempsey was bothered behind the plate all season with a sore right shoulder, which 1st sidelined him for six games beginning April 27. The injury hampered his throwing ability almost the entire season. He was also out nearly a week when he injured his left index finger on June 10 on a catcher's interference call. Catcher Joe Nolan underwent arthroscopic surgery on his right knee and was out of action from May 7 thru August 9.

Outfielder **Dan Ford** made 2 trips to the disabled list. Ford, who was bothered by a sore left knee in training camp, played in six games then underwent arthroscopic surgery on April 20 after the knee locked on him. He returned July 20, but sprained his right ankle running out an infield hit in its very 1st at bat and missed four more days. Ford played in 18 more games then suffered a fractured right wrist on August 8 when he collided with Cleveland catcher **Chris Bando**. He was placed on the disabled list August 20 and remained there the remainder of the season.

Jim Dwyer missed most of the 2nd half of the season after undergoing arthroscopic on his left knee July 19. He was activated August 29, but the O's outfielder saw little action the rest of the way. John Lowenstein was another Oriole bothered much of the season by several injuries. He missed nearly 3 weeks after pulling a right rib muscle on August 1. He returned for 3 weeks, but sat out the final 3 weeks with a badly bruised heel.

O's lefthander **Scott McGregor** suffered a serious injury when he sustained a broken ring finger on his left hand after being struck by a line drive against California on August 28. He spent the remainder of the season on the disabled list. **Tippy Martinez** was bothered much of the season by tendinitis in his left shoulder, particularly late in the season. Martinez made only one appearance after Sep. 8.

Ken Singleton missed 2 weeks (May 15-30) with a bruised right foot. Third baseman Wayne Gross was out 9 days when he strained a ligament in his right knee sliding into 3rd base vs. Cleveland on April 15. Gary Roenicke, Rich Dauer and Floyd Rayford also missed short periods of time with assorted problems. (See individual biographies for more details on injuries).

Month-By-Month: Apr: 10-13 (.434); May: 18-8 (.692); June: 14-14 (.500); July: 15-13 (.536); Aug.: 15-13 (.536); Sep.: 11-14 (.440).

Pinch-Hitting: The O's pinch-hitting corps were the busiest in the A.L. with 254 plate appearances. Orioles' pinch hitters raised their collective average 31 points over '83 to a .256 mark, the 7th best in the league. They also hit 8 homers, 2nd to leader Chicago's 9.

Baltimore pinch hitters were tied for 1st in the A.L. in at bats (215), runs scored (29), doubles (11), and walks (30). They were also 2nd in rbi (40) and hits (55) and 4th in total bases (90). On the other side, O's pinch swingers were 2nd in strikeouts (53), and 1st in GIDP's (10). The Orioles tied an A.L. record on September 25 when they used 8 pinch-hitters vs. New York.

Individuals: Benny Ayala was 8th in the A.L. in pinch-hitting (min. 20 at bats) with a .310 average (9-for-29). Ayala also led the league along with Detroit's Barbaro Garbey for most pinch-hit rbi (9).

Others: Todd Cruz, .357 (5-for-14), 1 hr, 2 rbi; John Shelby, .333 (4-for-12), 1 hr, 1 rbi; Wayne Gross, .308 (4-for-13), 0 hr, 2 rbi; Mike Young, .286 (2-for-7), 1 hr, 1 rbi; Joe Nolan, .267 (4-for-15), 1 hr, 3 rbi; Jim Dwyer, .259 (7-for-27), 1 hr, 5 rbi; Floyd Rayford, .250 (1-for-4), 0 hr, 2 rbi; Gary Roenicke, .238 (5-for-21), 0 hr, 2 rbi; John Lowenstein, .231 (6-for-26), 0 hr, 3 rbi.

Pitching: For the 2nd straight season, the Orioles were 2nd in the league in earned run average (3.71) and 1st in shutouts (13). It marked the 19th time in the last 28 seasons (starting '57) that the Birds have finished among the top 3 in era. The Orioles' pitching staff walked 512 batters, the most since '67 (566). O's hurlers walked 302 batters thru the 1st 85 games before the all-star break and 210 in 77 2nd half contests.

The Orioles had a 3.59 era the 1st half and 3.85 in the 2nd half. Birds' starters were 68-56 with a 3.64 era (1072 ip, 434 er) while the bullpen went 17-21 with a 3.92 era (367.1 ip, 160 er).

Since '54, O's pitchers have combined for the lowest era in the A.L. with a 3.35 mark (41,250 ip, 15,397 er). The Yankees are 2nd with a 3.38 era (41,288 ip, 15,512 er).

Platoning: Injuries seriously affected the O's platoning, an area of remarkable success the past 2 seasons. In leftfield, where the O's got a combined 35 homers and 131 rbi out of several players in '83, and 41 homers and 123 rbi in '82, production was down to 21 home runs and 81 rbi. That position was shared by John Lowenstein, Gary Roenicke, Mike Young and Al Bumbry. The Orioles had Floyd Rayford, Wayne Gross and Todd Cruz teaming at 3rd base, where they combined for 26 homers (22 by Gross) and 83 rbi.

Streaks: In '84 the O's won 6 in a row once (Apr. 26 thru May 1), their longest streak of the year and lost no more than 4 straight (3 times).

Wins: Although their 5th place finish was the O's lowest in 17 years (since '67 when they tied the Washington Senators for 6th), they did post their 17th consecutive winning season, the longest current streak of its kind, and tied for 2nd in major league history with the Chicago White Sox ('51 thru '67). The all-time standard is 39 by the Yankees from '26 thru '64 and the N.L. high is 15 by the Cardinals ('39 thru '53).

The O's have won more games than any other major league club over the past 29 years (starting '56) with a 2584-1991 record (.565). See page 19 for more details.

ORIOLES VS. OPPONENTS-1984

vs. BOSTON ('84: 6-7... Lifetime: 267-273)... The Red Sox continue as the only franchise with a lifetime winning record against Baltimore (6 over)... Cleveland has the 2nd best record against the O's (3 under .500)... In '84 the O's won the 1st 2 and the last 2 games of the season series, but the Sox won 7 of 8 in the middle.

Though Boston out-hit the O's .296 (459-136) to .264 (458-121), the Birds outscored Sox 59 to 55 . . . That .296 average was the highest by any club vs. Baltimore.

Red Sox Batting: Tony Armas, the major league hr leader (43), hit 5 in the season series (tied with Carney Lansford-Cal for most by one opponent) while batting .319 (47-15) and totaled 14 rbi in 11 games . . . In 7 previous A.L. seasons, he had never hit above .240 against Baltimore (his lifetime average is .216, 287-62), but that has not prevented him from doing extensive damage with his bat. In the last 5 seasons Armas has hit 21 homers and driven in 50 runs in 55 games against the O's.

Jim Rice has hit both for average (.325, 504-164) and for power vs. the O's during his 10 full seasons in the A.L. In 128 games, he's pounded out 32 home runs and driven in 98.

Red Sox Pitching: Dennis (Oil Can) Boyd was the Sox' #1 workhorse in the season series. He was 2-2 in 4 games, completed 2 of 3 starts and fanned 25 Orloles in 28 innings. He pitched one shutout, and in one of his losses pitched 6 hitless innings on June 20 at Fenway. In the 7th, Cal Ripken broke the spell with a double and Mike Young's 3-run double highlighted a 4-run rally which produced a 4-1 win for the O's ... Both winner Mike Boddicker and Boyd went the route. The Sox had no other multi-winners or losers though Bob Stanley was 1-1 with 2 saves in 4 appearances.

Sox' rookie Roger Clemens was clocked at 96 mph on June 27 at Baltimore, but Scott McGregor beat him 3-1 in Clemens' only appearance vs. the Birds.

Orioles Batting: Ripken was the leading O's hitter against Boston at .358 (53-19) and Mike Young the most productive with 12 rbi in 13 games ... Mike batted .282 (57-16) despite 20 strikeouts ... Both he and Cal hit 2 homers in the season series, tops on the club.

Eddie Murray experienced an off-year vs. the Sox with a .118 average (51-6), 1 hr & 6 rbi. Lifetime, though, he's still hitting .288 (379-109) against Boston ... Fred Lynn batted .324 (34-11) in '84. Lifetime, he's at .274 (124-34) ... See page 42.

Orioles Pitching: Mike Boddicker was 2-1 including his 20th victory, a route-going 12 hitter (no walks) on Sep. 29 at Boston (Bruce Hurst lost). Mike Flanagan, victimized by sparse support much of the year, was the beneficiary of the O's 15-1 rout of the Sox at Baltimore on Sep. 20. The win evened his lifetime record at 9-9.

Mark Brown, like Flanagan a New Hampshire native and Univ. of mass, alumnus, posted his 1st major league victory at Boston on the last day of the season (Sep. 30) in relief on 2 scoreless innings, beating Boyd (also pitching in relief), 5-3.

Dennis Martinez was 0-1 and is now 10-14 lifetime . . . His games (29), innings (85.1), losses and home runs allowed (20) against Boston are all career highs . . . Storm Davis was 0-2 in 3 starts as Sox hit .375 (72-27) against him. Storm yielded 17 er in 15.2 innings (9.77 era) plus 13 walks. He's 1-4 lifetime.

vs. CALIFORNIA ('84: 8-4 ... Lifetime: 186-144) ... Over the last 6 seasons (starting '79) the O's are 50-26 (.658) against the Angels (incl. 3-1 in '79 ALCS). They have won 5 season series and tied one in that time, while going 24-14 (.632) at Anaheim and 26-12 (.684) at Baltimore.

The '84 season series presented a schizophrenic picture of the Orioles pitching staff . . . The O's went 5-1 at home, compiled a 2.33 era (54 ip, 14 er), yielded only 3 homers and held the Angels to a composite .207 average (193-40).

At Anaheim, where the Birds split 6 games, the staff era was nearly 3 runs per game worse, i.e. 5.19 (52 ip, 30 er) . . . The Angels hit 11 homers and batted .260 (200-52) in the Big A ... See more details under "Boddicker" in "Orioles Pitching" below.

Angels Batting: Juan Beniquez led the Angels in hitting with a .452 average (31-14). Over the last 3 seasons, he's been the most consistently effective hitter in the A.L. vs. Baltimore (.470, 66-31), and has a lifetime mark of .340 (324-110), 2nd highest among all active players with 100 or more at bats against the O's. Larry Herndon is 1st at .348 and Rickey Henderson is 3rd with a .338 career average.

Other Angels who found Orioles pitching to their liking included: young Mike Brown (.353, 17-6), Rob Wilfong (.333, 24-8), and Fred Lynn (.323, 31-10) who also hit 3 homers, all off Mike Boddicker.

One old Orioles nemesis, Rod Carew, was only 1-for-12 on the year and that lone safety snapped an 0-for-16 spell against the O's over a 2-year period. Ironically, Carew was batting .600 (25-15) vs. the O's in '83 when he started the skid . . . One of his biggest problems on the O's staff has been Boddicker against whom Rod is 1-for-11 lifetime (.091) . . . His career average in the A.L. is .330 (8872-2929) ... Vs. the O's he is hitting .313 (684-214).

For the 1st time since his rookie year ('67), the O's held Reggie Jackson without a home run. However, his 40 career homers (incl. 2 in ALCS) against the Birds rank 3rd (tied with Al Kaline) on the list behind Harmon Killebrew (70) and Mickey Mantle (44).

California Pitching: Rookie Ron Romanick was 2-0 in 3 starts and at the other end of the spectrum was Mike Witt who was 0-3 in 4 starts (5.40 era, 25 ip, 29 h, 15 er, 20 bb) . . . He could have pitched perfectly in those 3 losses and still not won . . . His teammates were blanked on all 3 occasions. In his no-decision, the Angels got him 7 runs, but that didn't work either . . . He's 2-6 lifetime . . . Geoff Zahn was 0-1 to drop his career record to 2-11 against Baltimore with a 5.42 era (89.2 ip, 54 er).

Orioles Batting: Al Bumbry, at .406 (32-13), was the O's top hitter in the season series . . . Eddie Murray batted .386 (44-17) with 3 home runs and 13 rbi in 12 games against the Angels, and with 10 walks, had a .500 on-base pct. (54-27) ... Lifetime Eddie is hitting .325 (351-114) with 18 homers and 68 rbi while having played in all 93 of the Angels-O's games since he joined the club in '77.

Rich Dauer batted .326 (43-14) to continue his long run of success vs. Cal. Over the past 5 seasons (starting '80), Rich has batted .343 (230-79) against the Angels, and now has a career average of .313 (320-100), tops for him vs. a single opponent . . . Cal Ripken also hit .326 (46-15) in the season series. Ripken (.318, 148-47), Dauer and Murray are 3 of 5 current Orioles with .300 + career averages against Cal. along with Dan Ford-.301 (292-88), and Gary Roenicke - .306 (147-45).

Rick Dempsey hit 4 of his 10 homers off California pitching (incl. 2 in one game at Baltimore on Aug. 19), more than doubling his previous output vs. the Angels (he now has 7 lifetime vs. both Cal. and Bos., career highs).

Orioles Pitching: Boddicker and Scott McGregor were both 3-1. Boddicker shutout the Angels twice in 2 tries at Baltimore (May 16 and Aug. 24, both times against Witt). In 18 innings, he allowed 10 hits (a 6-hitter and a 4-hitter). At Anaheim where he was 1-1, his era soared to 5.63 (16 ip, 17 h, 10 er) and in those 2 games at the "Big A" Mike was

touched for 7 home runs. Overall, his era vs. the Angels was 2.65 (34 Ip, 27 h. 10 er)

McGregor maintained his mastery over the Angels until the bottom fell out on Aug. 28 . . . In the 1st inning at Anaheim, a shot (by Brian Downing) thru the box broke his left ring finger, ending his season abruptly.

The run he gave up in that inning also resulted in his being the losing pitcher, snapping a 10 game winning streak at the "Big A." That string was constructed in 10 starts and included his pennant clinching shutout in the final game of the '79 ALCS ... It was only his 2nd defeat ever at Anaheim (he's 10-2). The other one occurred exactly 6 years to the day earlier (Aug. 18, '78).

Overall, Scotty who is 16-5 lifetime plus 1-0 in ALCS vs. the Angels, has won 17 of his last 20 decisions against them (incl. ALCS) . . . That stretch included a 12 game winning streak that extended from July 8, '79 until Steve Renko beat him July 19, '82 . . . He has held California batters to a .235 lifetime average (634-149) while compiling a 2.60 era (161.2 ip, 47 er), both figures including ALCS.

The Angels maintained the distinction of never having lost to Tippy Martinez who was 0-0 with no saves. Lifetime, he is 0-2 with 9 saves . Tippy has beaten every other club in the league at least once. Sammy Stewart is 4-0 with 3 saves lifetime . . . Mike Flanagan was 1-2 and is 3-7 lifetime.

vs. CHICAGO ('84: 7-5 . . Lifetime: 253-227) . . . The White Sox and O's who were 1-2 in the majors in runs scored in '83 (Sox-800, O's-799), dropped to 10th ((Sox-679) and 9th (O's-681) respectively in the A.L. last year.

O's won 5 of the last 6 games against the ChiSox (all in July)... The O's are 12-6 vs. Chicago (incl. ALCS) starting Aug. 13, '83 . . . In the last 17 vears, the O's have gone 12-3-2 in season series vs. Chi. (starting '69).

The White Sox average (.201, 393-79) was the lowest of any opponent just as the Orioles 2.77 era (110 ip, 34 er) was the lowest against a single adversary . . . Birds 18 homers were high against one team. The Sox hit

"Presidential Visit:" President Ronald Reagan became the 13th president to throw out an opening day 1st ball (the 3rd outside of Washington) when O's and Sox opened the season April 2nd in Baltimore The President then spent the 1st inning sitting in the O's dugout with Commissioner Bowie Kuhn and O's owner Edward Bennett Williams

before returning to Washington. The Sox scored twice in the 1st and

went on to win 5-2 before 51,327.

The custom started with William Howard Taft in '10 . . . Reagan was the 1st since Gerald Ford in '76 (Texas at Minnesota). There have been 48 presidential opening day 1st balls total . . . Reagan also threw out the 1st ball for the opening game of the '83 World Series (from Mr. Williams' box on press level) and Jimmy Carter did the honors for game #7 of the '79 World Series from the box seats along 3rd base.

Chicago Batting: The top Sox hitter was Tom Paciorek (.385, 13-5) but he played in only 5 games ... Harold Baines batted only .189 (37-7) vs. O's but led his club in rbi during the season series (8) . . . Baines was 0-for-14 lifetime against Mike Flanagan until he homered off him July 14 ... Ron Kittle batted only .108 (37-4) with 2 homers and 3 rbi and Greg Luzinski hit .111 (27-3) with 1 hr & 1 rbi.

Back up catcher Marc Hill has played sparingly against Baltimore the past 2 years, but has a .385 average (26-10) vs. the O's in that time . . . Julio Cruz has stolen 19 bases in 26 attempts lifetime (pct. .731) vs. Balto.

Chicago Pitching: Both Richard Dotson and Lamarr Hoyt were 1-2 .. Dotson yielded 6 homers in 21 innings (tied with Larry Gura for most gophers vs. Baltimore) . . . Including '83 ALCS, **Dotson** has lost 5 of his last 6 decisions, and is 6-7 lifetime. No other Sox pitchers had more than one win or loss.

Orioles Batting: Cal Ripken had a big year vs. Chicago . . . He hit .440 (50-22) with 7 home runs and 16 rbi in the 12 games. Eleven of his hits were for extra bases (3 doubles, 1 triple) and his slugging pct. was .960 (50 ab, 58 tb) . . . Cal had been hitting .211 (90-19) lifetime against the Sox thru '83, but has boosted the average to .293 (140-41). That matches Eddie Murray's career mark (314-92) . . . Among current O's, Fred Lynn's .304 (303-92) is tops. Lynn in '84 had 5 hr & 10 rbi vs. Chicago despite a .250 average (40-10).

Murray hit 4 homers and Wayne Gross 3 . . . Despite an off year, Gary Roenicke has driven in 29 runs in his last 32 games against Chicago ('82 thru '84 and including '83 ALCS) . . . Lenn Sakata went 3-for-15 and is now 5-for-94 (.053) lifetime. He was 0-for-66 until getting his 1st career hit

against Floyd Bannister on Aug. 11, '83 . . . Three of Lenn's 5 hits vs. Sox have come off Bannister.

Orioles Pitching: Mike Boddicker (1-0 in '84) is 3-0 lifetime, plus 10 in the '83 ALCS . . . In the last 2 seasons he has pitched 4 complete games in 5 starts (also incl. ALCS) . . . Storm Davis' 2-1 win over Hoyton July 12 was his 1st (and remains his only) career decision against the ChiSox.

Scott McGregor at 2-1 was the only multi-winner vs. Chicago in '84 ... He's 10-6 lifetime ... Jim Palmer did not have a decision in one appearance and wound up with a career 24-10 record against the Sox.

vs. CLEVELAND: ('84: 7-6 ... Lifetime: 272-269) ... Over the last 5 seasons, the 2 clubs have played to a 29-29 standoff ... Indians have 2nd best career record against O's ... Only the Red Sox who are over .500 vs. Baltimore (273-267) have a better one.

31-Year Rivalry: Though the O's 3-game lifetime edge over Cleveland is slim, it's amazing that it exists at all . . . After the Birds 1st3 years in the A.L. ('54-'56), they had an 11-55 record vs. the Tribe ('54: 3-19, '55: 3-19, '56: 5-17) and after 6 seasons (thru '59), the O's were down 40-90.

It wasn't until June '79 that the O's went over .500 for the 1st time against the Indians, and they have maintained a modest winning edge ever since . . . During the past 16 years (starting '69), Baltimore has gone 146-99 (.596) vs. Cleveland.

Longest Game: The O's lost their longest game of the year on May 2 on a 16th inning sac fly by **Brook Jacoby**. A total of 470 pitches were thrown in that game (248 by Tribe and 222 by O's)... It was only a week after the Indians had downed the White Sox 8-4 in 19 innings (Apr. 27).

That May 2nd game had added significance—Jim Palmer was the losing pitcher in his final major league decision. He was 29-12 against the tribe.

Cleveland Batting: Andre Thornton batted .317 (41-13) and led the Tribe in homers (2) and rbi (8) vs. the O's . . . He also had 3 gwrbi in the season series, and, on May 2 tied a major league record, set by Jimmy Foxx (Bos. '38), by drawing 6 walks (in 7 appearances) in the 16 inning game.

Julio Franco batted .327 (52-17) and Joe Carter hit .389 (18-7). Tony Bernazard who hit .488 (36-17) against the Birds in his rookie year ('81), has since batted only .176 (125-22) vs. Baltimore pitching.

Cleveland Pitching: Bert Blyleven with a career mark of 14-11 is 2nd only to Tommy John (15 wins) in career victories against the O's among active pitchers . . . In '84, Blyleven's era was a lofty 4.33 (27 ip, 13 er), but he went 3-1 in 4 starts and fanned 24 in 27 innings . . . Eddie Murray has hit only one home run vs. Blyleven, but has a .400 career average (35-14) against him.

When Rick Sutcliffe left the A.L. last summer, he took with him a 6-1 career record against the Birds ... Ernie Camacho enjoyed considerable success vs. the O's last year ... He was 1-0 with 3 saves in 7 appearances.

Orioles Batting: Wayne Gross led the O's in average at .433 (30-13) and in homers (3), and Gary Roenicke was the rbi leader with 10 in 11 games.

Eddie Murray continued to excel against the Tribe. He batted .326 (46-15) with 11 walks and a sac fly and had a .448 on-base pct. (58-26) ... In his last 4 seasons, Eddie has driven in 37 runs in 43 games against the Indians, batted .393 (150-59) and compiled an on-base pct. of .495 (184-91). His .350 (363-127) career average vs. Cleveland is his highest against a single opponent ... Since joining the O's in '77, Murray has played in 99 of the O's 101 games against the Indians.

Cal Ripken also had a good '84 vs. Cleveland... He had a .354 (48-17) and a .466 (58-27) on-base pct.... Former Indian John Lowenstein, on the other hand, has struggled against his ex-teammates over the past 2 seasons during which he batted only .132 (53-7)... Fred Lynn has a .006 career average against the Indians (409-125) and has homered 21 times against them, one less than hs career high (22 vs. Minnesota)... In '84 vs. the Tribe, he hit .436 (39-17).

Orioles Pitching: Mike Boddicker was 3-0 in 3 starts with a 1.78 era vs. the Indians (25.2 ip, 5 er) and fanned 20... Storm Davis was 2-0 (2 cg in 3 starts) and had a 2.25 era (24 ip, 6 er)... Sammy Stewart was also 2-0 despite a 7.88 era (8 ip, 7 er) in 6 appearances... Scott McGregor was 0-3 in 4 starts, but still holds a 10-7 career edge.

vs. DETROIT ('84: 7-6... Lifetime: 289-258)... The O's and Red Sox were the only 2 clubs with a winning record against the World Champion Tigers in '84 (both were 7-6).

However, the O's doubleheader loss to the Tigers on June 10 at Baltimore diffused any excitement engendered by the overall winning record vs. Detroit. The Tigers double victory that day allowed them to leave Baltimore with an 11 game lead and the O's never seriously challenged the leaders after that.

Starting Sep. 21, '82 the Tigers have gone 11-4 (including 4-3 in '84) in Baltimore and in 6 of those wins have scored exactly 9 runs . . .

The O's actually led the league in era on Sep. 10 with a figure of .356071, a hair better than Detroit's 3.5641. However, by season's end, 3 weeks later, the Bengals had moved way out on top 3.47 to 3.71.

Detroit Batting: A.L. MVP Alan Trammell hit .365 (52-19) and led the Bengals with 9 rbi vs. the O's . . . Howard Johnson was a .458 hitter (24-11) and Kirk Gibson batted .333 (39-13) with 8 rbi . . . Darrell Evans was the only Bengal with 2 home runs . . .

Larry Herndon didn't have a good year overall, but hit .303 (33-10) vs. the O's and his 3 year career average against the Birds is .348 (132-46), tops among all active opponents with 100 or more career at bats.

Detroit Pitching: The Tigers had a 2.84 staff era in the 13 games against the O's, led by **Dan Petry** who was 3-0 in 3 starts with an 0.83 era (21.2 ip, 2 er) and held the O's to a .150 average (73-11)... **Petry's** 1st 19 innings against the O's were scoreless (streak was terminated by Rick Dempsey's home run on Sep. 11).

His best effort was a 3-hit shutout in the 2nd game of that fateful June 10 doubleheader (O's had gone thru 1st 58 games without being shutout until then). He has beaten the Birds 5 straight times since losing to Scott McGregor at Detroit on July 2, '83, and is 9-6 lifetime.

Cy Young winner **Willie Hernandez** saved 3 games in 5 appearances and allowed only one run in 9.1 innings (era 0.96).

Jack Morris, on the other hand, was 0-2 in 2 starts with a 7.24 era (13.2 ip, 11 er)... He has a 6-8 career mark vs. the O's... Juan Berenguer was 1-2 despite a 1.83 era (19.2 ip, 4 er)... See Mike Flanagan below for the reasons why... Milt Wilcox was 1-1, and is now 4-12 lifetime (not including 0-1 for Cincinnati in '70 WS) after once being 0-9.

Orioles Batting: The Tigers held Eddie Murray (.186, 43-8) and Cal Ripken (.227, 44-10) pretty well in check... However, Murray's 24 homers and 77 career rbi vs. Detroit are both career highs against one club... Eddie has never missed a game vs. the Tigers. He's played in all of the O's 108 games against them since he joined the club in '77.

The O's rbi leader against Detroit was John Lowenstein with 6, despite a .179 average (28-5) ... Mike Young's .290 (31-9) was the highest by an O's regular, and 6 players hit below .200 ... Todd Cruz is on an 0-for-23 skid against the Tigers since he made his O's debut on July 1, '83 and drove in 6 runs at Detroit on a 3-run double and 3-run homer.

Fred Lynn hit .304 (46-14) for the Angels against Detroit and is batting .318 (447-142) lifetime . . . His 86 rbi vs. the Bengals are a career high.

Orioles Pitching: Mike Flanagan was 3-1 vs. Detroit. Only one other pitcher, the Royals' Bret Saberhagen, downed the champs 3 times. He was also 3-1 including one win in relief . . . Mike beat Wilcox 2-1 (June 3), then downed Berenguer 4-0 June 9, lost to him 1-0 (un-earned run) on Sep. 5, then beat him again 3-1 Sep. 10. In all, Flanagan had a 0.51 era (35 ip, 25 h, 3 r, 2 er). He held the Tigers to a .195 average (128-25) . . . Two of the 3 runs he gave up were solo homers by Tom Brookens and Gibson.

No other Oriole won or lost more than one game . . . Scott McGregor was 0-1 and is now 1-6 against the Tigers since winning 10 of his 1st 11 decisions.

vs. KANSAS CITY ('84: 5-7 . . . Lifetime: 104-80) . . . The O's have won only 2 season series in the last 9 years against the Royals (W-2, L-4, T-3).

At K.C. the Birds have enjoyed only 2 winning campaigns in the 12 season history of Royals Stadium, in '81 and '83 (W-2, L-7, T-3), and overall they are 25-42 (.373) on the K.C. carpet (O's were 17-7 at Municipal Stadium during the Royals' 1st 4 years in the league).

However, the Orioles still hold a 24 games edge in the rivalry, and are 62-31 (.667) against the Royals in Baltimore . . . The O's overall edge was constructed primarily in '69 & '70 when they beat the Royals in 23 of 24 outings, including 23 straight after **Dick Drago** beat **Dick Hall** on May 9, '69 at Baltimore in the 1st game ever between the 2 clubs. Since that streak ended, the O's advantage is only 81-79.

ORIOLES VS. OPPONENTS (K.C. Cont.)

Royals Batting: Don Slaught, now with Texas, was the Royals' top hitter against the O's for the 2nd year in a row. He hit .457 (28-11) last year and .481 (52-25) over the past 2 seasons . . . However, Jim Sundberg, has been a Baltimore nemesis for longer than that . . . The veteran catcher batted .313 (32-10) against the O's last year, has hit .362 (69-25) over the past 2 campaigns and sports a .301 (362-110) career mark in 11 AL. seasons . . .

Hal McRae batted .393 (28-11) vs. the Birds in '84... Over the last4 years he has batted .381 (147-56), and is a .301 (428-129) lifetime hitter against Baltimore, not including the '70 WS during which he hit .455 (11-5) for Cin...

In his 1st 7 years in the A.L., **George Brett** batted .377 (292-110) vs. O's pitching ... Over the last 4 seasons, however, he has hit only .200 (145-29) ... Lifetime, he has a .318 (437-139) average against the O's...In '84 **Pat Sheridan** hit .364 (33-12) in the season series.

Steve Balboni hit only .103 (39-4), but 3 of his hits were homers and he led the Royals in both home runs and rbi (7) against Baltimore.

The Royals stole 12 bases in 14 tries against the Birds, led by Willie Wilson who was 5-for-5... Lifetime, Wilson is 27-for-31 (.871) vs. 0's.

Royals Pitching: Dan Quisenberry was 1-0 with 3 saves in 5 appearances . . . Lifetime, he's 2-2 with 11 saves in 27 games and has a 1.58 era (40 ip, 7 er) . . . He has given up 3 homers to the O's during his career: to Ken Singleton ('82), Eddie Murray ('83) and Mike Young ('84), but has held Birds to .229 (144-33) career average.

Larry Gura was 2-1 in 4 starts despite a yield of 6 home runs, 11 walks and 2 hit batters (3.41 era, 29 ip, 22 h, 11 er)... Lifetime, he is 13-8, trailing only Tommy John (15) and Bert Blyleven (14) for most career wins vs. the O's among active A.L. pitchers.

Orioles Batting: Rick Dempsey hit .423 (26-11) against the Royals last year and hit 2 home runs, both against Gura ... Murray had a .357 average (42-15) and led the O's in rbi with 11 (also hit 3 hr) ... Cal Ripken was the home run leader vs. K.C. with 4 and batted .354 (48-17) ... Rich Dauer hit .346 (26-9).

The leading lifetime hitter vs. K.C. among current O's is John Lowenstein at .295 (224-66)... John who batted a combined .553 (38-21) in '82 & '83 dipped to .125 (16-2) last year... Murray who has played in 88 of the O's 89 games vs. K.C. since he joined up in '77 has a .286 (332-95) career average against the Royals.

Orioles Pitching: Mike Flanagan was 2-1 including a shutout, but is still 3 under .500 lifetime at 9-12 . . . Scott McGregor was 2-1 and is 7-6 overall . . . Both Mike Boddicker and Tippy Martinez were 0-2.

vs. MILWAUKEE ('84: 7-6 . . . Lifetime: 145-79) . . . The O's are 13-3 in season series since the Brewers franchise started in Seattle in '69 . . . The O's record in that period (pct. .6473) vs. the Brewers is 2nd only to their log against the Mariners (60-26, .698) and just a trifle better than their mark vs. Toronto (66-36, .6471).

Though they were only 3-4 at County Stadium in '84, the O's hold a lifetime 67-41 (.620) record there in 15 years vs. the Brewers. Only Texas and Seattle have been friendlier foreign ports for the Birds.

Over the past 3 years, the O's are 27-12 (.692) vs. the Brewers, and are 14-3 against them at Memorial Stadium starting Oct. 1, '82.

Statistical Oddity: Pitching was not a strongpoint in the season series last year. The 2 staffs had identical stats in era-4.06, ip-133, h-107 and er-51 in 13 games.

Milwaukee Batting: Ben Oglivie led the Brewers in hitting with a .351 (37-13) average, followed by Robin Yount at .333 (51-17) . . . Yount has maintained that .333 level for the past 3 years against the O's (159-53).

Jim Gantner batted only .137 (51-7), but led the Brewers with 11 rbi ... Cecil Cooper was the only Brewer with 2 homers, but hit only .220 (50-11) ... In his 1st 5 years with the Brewers, he owned the O's as attested by his .344 average (209-72). During the past 3 seasons, however, the Birds have held him to .195 (154-30). Against the rest of the league in that 3 year span, he has batted .308 (1764-544).

Milwaukee Pitching: No Brewer pitcher has more than one win, but reliever Ray Searage earned 2 saves in 3 appearances . . . Don Sutton was 0.3 and gave 27 hits and 12 earned runs in 17 innings (6.53 era) . . . He's 2-4 lifetime but one of those wins clinched the Brewers only division title ('82).

Moose Haas, the Baltimore native, was 1-0 and is now 5-7 lifetime ... Mike Caldwell made only one brief appearance (no decision) and remains 3-8 lifetime with a 5.67 era. In 15 career efforts vs. Baltimore he's yielded 20 home runs and the O's have hit a .319 against him (348-111)... Pete Ladd made big league debut in Bal. June 4... He threw 69 pitches in 1st 2 innings, went 4 & was loser.

Orioles Batting: Floyd Rayford was the leading hitter in the series at .364 (22-8) . . . Eddie Murray batted .356 (45-16) and had a .482 on-base pct. (56-27, including 11 walks and an hp) . . . He also hit 4 homers and over the last 4 years has homered 13 times while driving in 37 runs in 46 games against the Brewers . . . His 22 homers and 74 rbi in 99 career games vs. Milwaukee are 2nd only to his totals against the Tigers (24 hr, 77 rbi).

Cal Ripken hit only .189 (53-10) in the season series but led the club with 9 rbi boosting his career total to 32, a personal high vs. one opponent.

Orioles Pitching: Scott McGregor was 2-0 with 2 complete games including a shutout and a yield of only 1 run in 18 innings (0.50 era) ... Mike Boddicker was 2-1 with 3 complete games, a shutout and a 1.73 era (26 ip, 5 er) and is now 4-1 lifetime ... Storm Davis was also 2-1 and also sports a 4-1 career mark against Milwaukee ... The only multiple loser was Mike Flanagan (0-2).

Jim Palmer who did not pitch against Milwaukee finished with a 21-12 record . . . Dennis Martinez didn't have a decision but holds a 10-5 advantage vs. the Brewers.

vs. MINNESOTA ('84: 5-7 . . . Lifetime: 181-145, Min. only) . . . The Twins won the season series for the first time in 8 years (since '76) . . . The O's had gone 6-0-1 during the interim . . . Despite the setback, the O's are 45-21 (.621) vs. the Twins in the last 6 seasons and 33-15 (.688) starting July 21, '80

The Birds have won 20 of the last 26 games (.769) against the Twins at Baltimore where Minnesota has won only one series over the past 6 campaigns... Since moving to the Upper Midwest in '61, the Twins have made 54 trips to Baltimore and have swept only one series, a 3-game set on May 23-24-25, '83.

The O's are now 9-9 lifetime at the "Hump" after winning only one of 6 games there in '84. That lone victory occurred in the final game at Minny, on July 4th, when **Dennis Martinez** beat **Al Williams** in a battle of Nicaraguans.

Minnesota Batting: Tim Teufel batted .405 (42-17) vs. the O's while Mickey Hatcher hit .367 (49-18) and led the Twins with 10 rbi in 12 games ... Hatcher has a .333 lifetime mark vs. Baltimore (138-46) . . . Dave Engle batted .344 (32-11).

Kent Hrbek who had homered only once in 2 previous seasons in 21 games vs. Baltimore connected 4 times in '84. A statistical oddity re: Hrbek. In the 1st 6 games of the season series, he fielded 23 ground balls for outs.

Minnesota Pitching: John Butcher was 4-0 in 4 starts with a 1.80 era (35 ip, 28 h, 7 er) and hurled 3 complete games . . . He was the 1st to win that many against the O's in one season since Pat Dobson went 5-0 in '76 for Cleveland . . . Butcher is 5-0 lifetime against the Birds (including a 2-hit shutout for Texas in '83) . . . His career era is 2.05 (48.1 ip, 11 er).

The two hurlers who came over from Texas in the Gary Ward deal, Butcher and Mike Smithson (2-2) accounted for 6 of the Twins 7 wins against the O's in '84... Williams won the other.

Orioles Batting: Fred Lynn's .338 career average (376-127), and 22 home runs vs. Minnesota are personal highs against one team (he's hit 21 hrs vs. Detroit) ... Lynn is one of 6 current O's with .300 + career marks against the Twins: Cal Ripken—.336 (143-48), Gary Roenicke—.326 (181-59), Eddie Murray—.317 (331-105), Lenn Sakata—.308 (78-24) and Rich Dauer—.305 (233-71) ... Rick Dempsey is close at .297 (219-65).

Memorable Game: **Ripken** tied or broke 4 club records in the O's 13-0 win at the "Hump" on Sep. 3, '83 . . . He had 5 hits (to tie club mark), hit his 22nd & 23rd homers (to break **Ron Hansen's** team standards for a shortstop), hit his 37th and 38th doubles (to tie **Brooks'** record), and logged 13 total bases (to tie **Boog** and **Murray**).

The O's total of 39 total bases that day also matched a club record and their 6 homers were the most ever given up by the Twins in one game (since moving to Minny) . . . One of those homers was a **Ken Singleton**

Orioles Pitching: No Oriole won more than one game while Mike Boddicker was 0-3 and Mike Flanagan 1-2 . . . Flanagan's 1st loss, on Apr.

7, snapped a personal 14 game winning streak vs. the Twins... He hadn't lost to Minny since dropping his 1st 2 career decisions against them, the latter on May 29, '77. He'd gone almost 7 years between losses to the Twins... Lifetime, he's 15-4.

Scott McGregor was 1-1 and is now 11-4 . . . Tippy Martinez has worked in 33 games against Minnesota (50 ip) and has given up only one home run. That was to Tom Brunansky in Tippy's final '84 effort against Minny (at HHH) on July 4 . . . Sammy Stewart has never lost to the Twins . . . He's 4-0 with 2 saves.

vs. NEW YORK ('84: 5-8 . . . Lifetime: 282-261) . . . The O's lost the season series to the Yankees for the 2nd year in a row, but are still 15-5-1 in the last 21 years (starting '64), and 17-7-2 (starting '59) after losing the first 5 ('54 thru '58).

0's vs. Yankees Lifetime: The O's are the only club with a lifetime winning record vs. New York (282-261, .519) . . . The O's were 32-76 (.296) against the Yankees from '54 thru '58, but, from '59 thru '84 (26 years), the've gone 250-185, (.575), and , over the last 21 years from '64 thru '84, the O's record is even better (199-135, .596).

Detroit ranks 2nd against the Yankees with a .476 (788-868) pct. and the Brewers are 3rd (Mil. only) at .465 (100-115).

At Baltimore: The O's have gone 15-7 in the last 22 games vs. New York at Memorial Stadium, and are 149-122 (.550) lifetime against the Yankees at home

At New York: At Yankee Stadium, the O's are 124-130, the best lifetime record by any visiting club. The Twins (Minny only) are 2nd at .420 (63-87) and the A's (Oakland only) are 3rd (.404, 36-53).

Since the new Yankee Stadium opened in '76, the O's are 33-30 there ... In one 4-year stretch ('65-'68), the O's were 30-8 at old Yankee Stadium and they won 12 straight in "The House that Babe Ruth Built" between May 1, '65 and June 21, '66.

Sweeps: In 31 years, there have been 62 series sweeps (3 games minimum) in the rivalry, 31 by each club... The O's are 19-11 in sweeps at home and 12-20 at New York.

The O's have twice swept 5-game series vs. N.Y. (both in Baltimore): Aug. 22-24, '62 and Sep. 13-16, '82 \dots The only other sweep of a 5-game set in O's history was against the Twins, also in Baltimore, July 1.3, '66.

Yankees Batting: The Yankees had a .294 team average vs. the O's in '84 (449-132). Eight Yankees with 20 or more at bats hit .300 or more vs. the O's including Butch Wynegar—.405 (42-17), Don Baylor—.353 (34-12), Bobby Meacham—.351 (37-13) and Don Mattingly—.326 (46-15).

Baylor who led the Yankees with 12 rbi in 10 games has hit Baltimore pitching at a .351 clip (168-59) over the past 4 years with 13 homers and 38 rbi in 45 games . . . His lifetime mark against the Birds is up to .298 (363-108).

Dave Winfield, a .255 (200-51) career hitter vs. the O's, hit 8 home runs in his 1st 2 A.L. seasons against the Birds, but none in the last 2... Lou Piniella who started his big league career with the O's in '64, ended it against them, at Yankee Stadium on June 16, '84.

Rickey Henderson had a modest season against the O's in '84 (.275, 40-11), but his lifetime totals remain very impressive. His career average is .338 (237-80) 3rd among actives behind Larry Herndon .348 and Juan Beniquez .340 (100 at bats minimum) and, with 46 walks, his on-base pct. is .445 (283-126) ... Henderson has also stolen 36 bases in 44 attempts over 64 games for a pct. of .818.

New York Pitching: Jay Howell, 2-0 in 5 appearances including one start, was the Yankees only multiple winner vs. the O's and Dennis Rasmussen (0-2) the only multi loser . . . Dave Righetti, in relief, was 0-1 with 3 saves in 4 appearances, but gave up 2 homers and 4 runs in 6 innings and O's batted .333 (27-9) against him.

Joe Cowley was 1-0 in 2 starts, despite a yield of 4 homers and 8 earned runs in 8.2 innings. Clay Christiansen saved 2 games in 3 appearances though the O's went 7-for-16 (.438) against him.

The O's hit .372 (43-16) against **Phil Niekro** who was 0-0 in 2 starts . . . Against the 2 knuckleball specialists in the A.L. (**Niekro** and **Charlie Hough** of Texas), the Birds batted .418 (67-28) . . . **Hough** was 0-2.

Ron Guidry was 0-1 in 2 games (1 start)... He has lost 6 of his last 8 decisions against the O's and is now 7-7 lifetime.

Orioles Batting: Al Bumbry batted .500 (22-11) and hit 2 of his 3

homers against the Yankees ... Among his 53 lifetime home runs, 10 have been hit-off New York pitching.

Gary Roenicke who led the O's with 7 rbi vs. New York also hit 2 homers including a grand slam off Rasmussen on June 17, a blast that netted Anne Sommers of College Park, Md. \$1,000,000 in WMAR-TV's "Home Run Sweepstakes."

Rich Dauer had a .361 average (36-13), and Jim Dwyer went 5-for-9 to boost his career mark against the Bombers to .308 (39-12)... Dwyer is the only Oriole with a .300 career avg. vs. N.Y. The previous leader was Ken Singleton who finished at .282 (475-134)... Eddie Murray hit .214 (51-16) in the season series as did Fred Lynn (35-11).

Orioles Pitching: Mike Flanagan was 2-0 against the Yankees, and has now won his last 5 decisions. His career vs. N.Y. has been very streaky.. After starting at 1-2 against the Bombers, he won 5 in a row, lost 5 straight, and has now compiled another 5 game winning streak.

Mike Boddicker was 2-1 and is 5-1 lifetime including his 1st major league win in Sep. '82... Scott McGregor, 0-2, has lost 4 straight to the Yankees over the last 2 years... He's 6-9 lifetime and 5 of his 6 wins have been shutouts.

Tippy Martinez was 0-2 with 2 saves in 4 games . . . Lifetime, he has made 56 appearances against the Yankees (a career high vs. one club) and is 9-6 with 13 saves and a 2.31 era (81.2 ip, 21 er).

Jim Palmer who did not work against the Yankees last year finished with a 30-16 record ... He ranks 8th on the all-time anti-Yankee list (Walter Johnson tops the list with 60 wins) and was number one among his contemporaries at the time of his retirement ... Jim was 16-7 at Yankee Stadium including 7-3 in the new facility.

vs. OAKLAND ('84: 6-6 . . . Lifetime, Oak only: 118-88) . . . The O's have not lost a season series to the A's since '76 . . . In the 8 years since then, the Birds have won 7 and tied one, and gone 62-31 (.667).

The Orioles were 4-2 at Oakland in '84 . . . Starting July 8, '76, they have gone 33-15 (.688) in the East Bay Area, and are 61-44 (.581) there lifetime, not including 3-3 in 3 ALCS.

Baltimore provided the opposition in A's 1st home game ever (after moving from K.C. for the '68 season)... The date was Apr. 17 and Dave McNally pitched a 2-hitter to beat Lew Krausse, 4-1... Boog Powell had the gwrbi and hit the 1st home run, both in the 2nd inning... Mark Belanger and Brooks also homered for the O's as did Rick Monday for Oakland.

Oakland Batting: Carney Lansford dominated the A's offense vs. the O's, leading in avg. (.370, 46-17), runs (12), hits (17), hr (5) and rbi (8)... He has hit over .300 4 straight years against Baltimore and in that time has a composite .346 average (136-47)... Dwayne Murphy was a .364 hitter (33-12).

The Birds managed to fairly well neutralize **Dave Kingman** who was held to 2 homers and 7 rbi in 12 games while batting .255 (47-12) ... **Rickey Henderson** had an off-year, for him, against the Birds . . . See "vs. New York" for details.

Oakland Pitching: Bill Krueger was 2-0 in 2 starts with a complete game and a 1.56 era (17.1 ip, 3 er)... In 4 career appearances over the last 2 years, he's 3-1 with a 1.52 era (29.2 ip, 5 er). Both Steve McCatty and Mike Warren were 0-2.

Orioles Batting: Wayne Gross had a big year against his ex-teammates with a .381 average (21-8), 2 homers and 9 rbi . . . Wayne drove in all 5 of the O's runs in Storm Davis' 5-1 win over McCatty on May 13 in

Floyd Rayford hit .350 (20-7) and Eddie Murray .308 (39-12) with 1 hr & 8 rbi in the season series . . . Murray, incidentally, has played in all but one of the O's 93 games vs. the A's since he joined the club in '77 . . . Fred Lynn had a big year against Oakland (.367, 49-18) as an Angel.

Orioles Pitching: Mike Boddicker was the O's only multiple winner at 2-1 while both Storm Davis (1-2) and Dennis Martinez (0-2) were multilosers . . . Dennis was undefeated in Baltimore against the A's lifetime (5-0) prior to the season, but lost twice to them at Memorial Stadium in '84.

Mike Flanagan, 1-0, extended his career record at the Coliseum to 10-0 with a 4-2 victory over Ray Burris on Aug. 25 . . . In 13 lifetime starts at Oak., Mike has hurled 6 complete games (including 2 shutouts) and compiled a 1.88 era (96 ip, 62 h, 20 er) . . . He's beaten Rick Langford there 4 times and Matt Keough 3. Overall, Mike is 15-4 against the A's (i.e. 5-4 at Baltimore).

ORIOLES VS. OPPONENTS (Oak. Cont.)

Jim Palmer pitched in his final A.L. game in Baltimore May 12th, against the A's in relief. He did not have decision, **Jim** was 20-15 lifetime against the A's.

vs. SEATTLE ('84: 9-3 . . . Lifetime: 60-26) . . . The O's lifetime record vs. the Mariners (.698) is their best against any opponent . . . In 8 years the 0's have won 7 season series and tied one.

At Baltimore, the Birds are 32-11 (.744) ... They won the 1st 14 games the M's ever played at Memorial Stadium until former Oriole Mike Parrott beat Sammy Stewart on July 25, '79. Since then the O's have maintained an 18-11 record in Baltimore. The 2 clubs have played 16 series here and the M's have won only 2 of them ... At the Kingdome, the O's went 5-1 in '84, boosting their lifetime mark there to 28-15 (.651).

0's on West Coast: In '84 the Birds went 12-6 on the west coast vs. Cal., Oak. and Sea. Over the past 7 seasons, starting '78, the Birds have gone 78-43 (.645) in the Pacific time zone: vs. Cal. 25-16, .610; vs. Oak. 27-15, .643; vs. Sea. 26-12, .684.

Seattle Batting: Rookie **Jim Presley** provided more than his share of heroics during a 2-day period in Seattle last Aug. 31 and Sep. 1, hitting 3 homers and driving in 7 runs . . . On the 31st he became the 1st ever to hit a grand slam off **Mike Flanagan**, and the next night hit 2 home runs, good for 3 more rbi.

The M's leading hitter in the season series was the **Dave Henderson** who hit .350 (20-7) in limited action . . . During his 3 + seasons in the A.L., **Dave** has a .369 average (84-31) average against the O's . . . The veteran Al **Cowens** batted .333 (45-15) . . . He also led with 10 rbi in 11 games . . . **Jack Perconte** hit .311 (45-14).

Seattle Pitching: Ed VandeBerg was the M's only multiple winner against the O's at 2-1, despite the fact the Birds batted .365 (52-19) at his expense... Ed Nunez saved 2 games in 3 appearances and didn't give up a run in 6.1 innings.

Both Mike Moore and Jim Beattie were 0-3... Moore who walked 12 and fanned 17 in 20 innings has a career mark of 1-5... Beattie is 3-10... Paul Mirabella, an Oriole briefly in '83, went 0-2 vs. the O's in '84.

Orioles Batting: Ken Singleton's retirement is good news for Mariner fans ... In 8 seasons against them, Ken was devastating ... Overall, he hit .341 (255-87) with 24 home runs and 77 rbi in 73 games ... At the Kingdome, he had 14 homers and 42 rbi in 35 games ... As a parting shot, he hit a grand slam off VandeBerg at Seattle on Sep. 1.

Eddie Murray hit only .185 (82-15) vs. the M's in '82 and '83, but last year broke out of that slump with a vengeance. He batted .425 (40-17) with 3 home runs and 13 rbi in 12 games, drew 11 walks and was hit with a pitch . . . His on-base pct. in the season series was an awesome .547 (53-29).

Cal Ripken led the O's in homers with 4 and batted .319 (47-15) and Todd Cruz who hit .218 overall went 7-for-18 (.389) vs. his former teammates.

Orioles Pitching: Storm Davis was the O's only multi-winner is the season series . . . He was 2-1 in 3 starts and is now 5-2 lifetime . . . Mike Flanagan went 1-0 and is now 9-3 lifetime as did Dennis Martinez who upped his career log vs. Seattle to 12-4 . . . Jim Palmer did not pitch against the M's and retired at 2-3 lifetime, his only losing record vs. one opponent.

Tippy Martinez was the losing pitcher in 2 of the O's 3 losses to Seattle (he was 1-2). Prior to '84 he had never lost to the Mariners . . . His career mark is now 3-2 with 4 saves.

vs. TEXAS ('84: 9-3 ... Lifetime-Texas only: 87-57) ... The O's have had more success at Arlington than in any other foreign port ... They are 51-22 (.699) there lifetime, and have gone 20-7 (.740) in Texas since the Rangers swept them in a 3-game set in Texas on July 2-3-4, '79.

Conversely, the Rangers have the best record in Baltimore among all visiting clubs, 35-36. However, their record has deteriorated sharply over the past 3 years during which they have gone 5-13 at Memorial Stadium.

In each of the last 3 seasons, the Birds have gone 9-3 overall, and during the last 4 campaigns, they are 29-10 (.744) against the Rangers... Since the franchise moved to Texas in '72, the O's have won 8 season series, lost 2 and tied 3, and haven't dropped one since '77.

Odds and Ends: The "go-go" Birds stole 4 bases in a game, one shy of the club record, at home against the Rangers last July 31st on a pair of double steals (Murray & Ayala, and Dempsey & Shelby) . . . Billy Sample handled 9 putouts in left field on July 30, 2 short of the major league mark . . . Jeff Kunkel hit his 1st big league homer at Baltimore, on July 31, off Dennis Martinez . . . O's won 1st 7 games in '84 season series.

Texas Batting: The O's held the Rangers to a .217 team average (the O's hit only .243), and Texas scored only 35 runs, fewer than 3 a game ... Mickey Rivers batted .333 (18-6) in 7 games and Gary Ward hit .292 (48-14) ... The rbi leader with 6 against the O's was George Wright and Larry Parrish led in homers (3).

Buddy Bell batted only .176 (34-6) and now has a lifetime average of .246 vs. the O's (606-149).

Texas Pitching: Though he was 1-2 against the O's, Frank Tanana had a 1.47 era (18.1 ip, 3 er)... His career record is 12-10 with a 2.47 era (193.1 ip, 53 er)... The only other Texas pitchers to beat the Birds were Danny Darwin (1-0) and Odell Jones, a non-roster pitcher in the O's camp this spring, also 1-0.

Charlie Hough was 0-2 in 2 starts with a 24.75 era (4 ip, 11 er)... The Birds batted .500 against Hough (24-12) and against the 2 knuckleball specialists in the A.L. (Hough & Phil Niekro who was 0-0 in 2 starts), the O's had a combined .418 average (67-28).

Orioles Batting: Eddie Murray (.347, 49-17, 2 hr, 12 rbi) and Cal Ripken (.362, 47-17, 2 hr, 7 rbi) excelled against the Rangers as did Jim Dwyer (.667, 12-8), but the rest of the club hit a composite .191 (304-58)... Nine O's batted under .200... Ripken who is batting .347 lifetime (147-51) vs. Texas, his highest average against one team, had 17 hits in the season series, 12 of them for extra bases (7-3-2).

Orioles Pitching: The O's staff fashioned a 2.84 era against Texas, 2nd only to the Birds' 2.77 vs. the White Sox. Three of the O's starters (Storm Davis, Mike Boddicker and Scott McGregor) remain undefeated against the Rangers lifetime.

Davis, who was 3-0 with a 1.04 era (26 ip, 3 er) and completed 2 of 3 starts in '84, is now 4-0 lifetime with a 1.70 (53 ip, 10 er) and has yet to throw a home run ball to a Ranger batter.

Boddicker was 2-0 and also has a 4-0 career record. His era is 2.22 (44.2, 11 er). **McGregor** went 1-0 last year to improve his lifetime log to 6-0 in 12 lifetime appearances (3.15 era, 71.1 ip, 25 er).

Another Orioles pitcher, **Tippy Martinez**, fell from the unbeaten ranks when he lost to **Jones** on July 31. However, **Tippy** picked up 3 saves during the season and is now 6-1 with 9 career saves and a 2.33 era (47.1 ip. 23 er) in 32 relief appearances.

Dennis Martinez was, like Davis and Boddicker, a multiple winner (2-0) vs. Texas in '84...He's 7-5 lifetime...Mike Flanagan was the loser in 2 of the Rangers' 3 victories...He's 6-5 overall against them.

vs. TORONTO ('84: 4-9)... Lifetime: 66-36)... The O's had won all 7 season series against the Blue Jays (.77 thru '83) until 1984... After the 1st 6 years, Baltimore held a 55-21 edge (.723), but in the last 2 years have gone only 11-15 vs. Toronto (incl. 7-6 in '83).

Despite the setback in '84, the O's lifetime pct. against Toronto (.64706) is their 3rd highest behind: (1) .698 Sea., 60-26, and (2) .64732 vs. Mil., 145-79.

The O's who once won 19 in a row at home against the Jays (Sep. 19, '77 thru May 2, '81) are 38-13 (.745) lifetime vs. Toronto at Baltimore despite going 2-4 in '84 . . . At Toronto, the O's are 28-23 (.549).

Memorable Games: There have been many memorable moments in the O's Blue Jays rivalry including the "Earl Weaver Forfeit" on Sep. 15, '77, and the 24-10 pasting the Jays handed them, also at Toronto, on June 26, '78.

However, for the Orioles, the game that stands out above the rest was the "3 pickoff game" in Baltimore on Aug. 24, '83... The O's were down 3-1 with 2 on and 2 down in the 9th when they suddenly tied the score on rbi singles by **Benny Ayala** and **Al Bumbry** and forced the game into overtime.

Because of extensive offensive maneuvering, the O's took the field in the 10th with strangers at 3 positions . . . John Lowenstein was at 2nd base, Gary Roenicke was at 3rd, and, for the 1st time in his professional career, Lenn Sakata was catching.

Cliff Johnson led off the 10th with a home run off Tim Stoddard to

put the Jays back on top. When Barry Bonnell followed with a single, in came Tippy Martinez who proceeded to retire the side without retiring a batter. First, he picked Bonnell off 1st, then he walked Jesse Barfield and picked him off, and finally yielded a single to Willie Upshaw before nailing him the same way.

Cal Ripken led off the home 10th with a game-tying homer, and 2 outs later with 2 on Sakata gave the O's a "sudden death" 7-4 win with a 3-run homer off Joey McLaughlin.

The next night, the 2 clubs were in a scoreless tie until Bonnell homered in the 10th. But, the Birds bounced back on singles by Joe Nolan and Bumbry and a game-winning 2-run double by Dan Ford to win again in "sudden death."

Toronto Batting: Garth lorg and Rance Mulliniks, who platooned at 3rd base for the Jays, combined to hit .341 (44-15) in the season series (lorg-.360, 25-9, and Mulliniks-.316, 19-6.

Dave Collins stole 7 bases in as many attempts, and 4 of them came in the same game on Aug. 5 at Baltimore . . . That nite Upshaw stole 2 and Lloyd Moseby one for a total of 7, one shy of the record for steals in a game vs. the O's (set by K.C. on Sep. 27, '65).

Cliff Johnson who hit .314 (35-11) against the O's made history that same evening when he hit his major league record setting 19th career pinch home run

Toronto Pitching: They Jays staff had a 2.64 era (116 ip, 34 er) in the season series, lowest among all O's opponents. Jim Clancy went 2-2 in 4 starts with a 2.64 (30.2 ip, 9 er) . . . Clancy had only 5 complete games in 36 starts last year, but pitched 3 of them against the Orioles . . . Lifetime, he is 7-10.

Dave Stieb also made 4 starts vs. the O's, but was only 1-0 despite a 1.78 era (25.1 ip, 5 er). His career record vs. Baltimore is 3-7.

Newly-acquired Bill Caudill has fanned 21 of the 49 Orioles batters he's faced over the last 3 years . . . In that time, he's gone 3-0 with 4 saves in 11 appearances (era 3.85, 11.2 ip, 5 er) and held O's batters to a .233 average (43-10).

Orioles Batting: The O's scored at the rate of just over 3 runs per game (37 in 12 games) while batting only .237 (430-102) as a club Nobody hit more than one home run . . . Eddie Murray led the O's in rbi (7) and batted .319 (47-15) . . . In 100 lifetime games vs. the Jays he is batting .324 (361-117) with 19 homers and 68 rbi .

Other O's who hit well against Toronto were: Todd Cruz .417 (12-5), Joe Nolan .444 (9-4), Mike Young .350 (20-7), and John Lowenstein .333 (18-6).

Orioles Pitching: Mike Flanagan is 15-6 lifetime vs. Toronto, but has not beaten the Jays in 2 full seasons (since a win on Aug. 25, '82) Since then, he's 0-2, both in Baltimore where he has a career mark of 10-2 against them.

Tippy Martinez had never lost to Toronto until going 1-2 in '84 Lifetime he is 6-2 with 6 saves ... Mike Boddicker (1-0 last year) is 3-0 lifetime and Scott McGregor (who once saved 2 games in one day vs. the Jays in Toronto, on Sep. 14, '77) was 2-2 in '84 and is 11-4 lifetime Dennis Martinez has an 8-5 career edge, but is 0-3 since he last beat the Jays Sep. 1, '82.

ALL-STAR GAME NOTES

1984: Cal Ripken became the Orioles' 1st elected starter since '81 (see below) and Eddie Murray and Mike Boddicker were selected by A.L. manager Joe Altobelli for the July 10 game at San Francisco's Candlestick Park.

Ripken, in his 2nd all-star appearance was 0-for-3. Murray, selected for the 4th straight time and 5th overall, was 1-for-2 with a double, the only hit off New York Mets' rookie Dwight Gooden. Boddicker did not

Ripken was joined by his father, Cal Ripken, Sr., who assisted in the A.L. bullpen. They are believed to be the 1st father-son combination ever on an all-star squad (not all coaches were listed in some early all-star games). A record 21 batters struck out in the game, won by the N.L., 3-1, their 12th win in the past 13 years.

Elected Starters: Ripken was the O's 1st starter since Ken Singleton was tabbed in '81. Other O's who have been elected to starting positions are Boog Powell ('70, '71), Brooks Robinson ('71, '72, '73, '74), Frank Robinson ('71) and Bobby Grich ('76)

Selection of the starting team was returned to the fans in '70 under the sponsorship of the Gillette Company in cooperation with Major League Baseball. Following the ballot box "stuffing" incident in Cincinnati in '57, responsibility for choosing the starting teams was entrusted to major league players for 12 years ('58 thru '69).

Orioles All-Star MVPs: Three Orioles have won "mvp" honors in allstar competition: Billy O'Dell ('58), Brooks Robinson ('66) and Frank Robinson ('71).

O'Dell, the former Orioles lefthander who also pitched for the Giants, Braves and Pirates, hurled the last three innings of the only allstar game ever played in Baltimore and retired all nine batters he faced to protect a one run lead, thus giving the A.L. a 4-3 win.

Brooks won the '66 Arch Ward Memorial Trophy on the strength of a 3-for-4 effort at bat (including a triple) and an 8-for-8 performance afield. He was the first player from a losing team to be so honored.

Frank's fourth inning home run at Detroit in '71 put the A.L. on top to stay and earned him "mvp" honors. It was the first all-star victory since '62 for the A.L. which did not win another all-star game until '83.

ORIOLES GENERAL POST-SEASON NOTES

ALCS: The O's hold many ALCS/LCS records including: Most LCS (7, in 16 year history of divisional play), Most LCS won (5), Most LCS games (26), Most LCS games won (18), and Most LCS games hosted (13) . . . Their w-l percentage (.692, 18-8) is surpassed only by the Red Sox (.1000, 3-0), Mets and Tigers (.750, 6-2) and Dodgers (.706, 12-5).

The O's won the 1st 10 ALCS games they played (including the 1st 9 ever played) . . . They swept the Twins twice ('69-'70) and A's ('71) in the 1st 3 ALCS, then won game #1 in '73 against Oakland in '73 before losing the 2nd game that year . . . The Orioles are 9-4 at home and on the

WORLD SERIES: Baltimore has gone 3-3 in 6 WS, but has a .576 2-1 pct. in games (19-14) ... The Birds are 10-7 at home and 9-7 on the road.

POST-SEASON TOTAL: In 59 post-season games, the O's are 37-22 (.627). They are 19-11 at home and 18-11 away.

ATTENDANCE: In 26 ALCS games, the O's have played to 1,020,384, an average of 39,246. They've played 13 of those at home and have drawn 548,443 (average 42,188).

In 33 WS games attendance has totaled 1,769, 179 (average 53,611). At home for 17 WS dates the Birds have pulled 877,518 (average 51,619).

The Orioles 59 total post-season games have attracted 2,789,563 (average 47,281). At Memorial Stadium there have been 30 post-season events which have drawn a total of 1,425,961 (average 47,514).

The 3 biggest crowds to watch the O's in a WS were games 5, 4 & 3 (67,064; 66, 947 and 65,792) of '83, all at Philadelphia. The largest attendance for a WS game in Baltimore was 54,458 for game #4 (final game) vs. Dodgers in '66

The biggest house for an Orioles LCS game was 52,787 for game #1 at Baltimore vs. the Angels in '79 (the "Tonight, Let it be Lowenstein" game).

ORIOLES WORLD SERIES SHARES BY YEAR

Since 1960 (the 1st year they qualified for a share), the O's have finished in the 1st division 21 times in 25 seasons, thereby qualifying in all but 4 years ('62, '67, '78, '84) for a share of the WS pool (combined since '69 with the LCS).

The Baltimore Orioles were charter members of the American League when it began operation in 1901. However, after two seasons the club was moved to New York where it ultimately became known as the New York Yankees.

The franchise from which the current Orioles descend came into the A.L. in 1901 representing Milwaukee, but in 1902 was transferred to St. Louis and named the Browns. In 52 seasons (1902 thru 1953) the Browns were, perhaps, the most unsuccessful team in major league history. They were 3,416-4,465 (.433) and finished in the second division 40 times. They won their only pennant in 1944 then lost the world series in six games to their home town rivals, the Cardinals.

In June, 1951, Bill and Charles DeWitt sold their controlling interest to Bill Veeck who operated the club for the next 2½ seasons. On September 29, 1953, he sold his shares to a group of Baltimore businessmen who brought major league baseball back to this city after a 51-year lapse.

FARM SYSTEM-1984

Baltimore's 5 farm teams finished with a cumulative record of 233-268 (.465). Over the past 22 seasons the O's minor league organization record is 7505-6851 (.523). In that period the Birds have been selected as the Topps "Baseball Organization of the Year" 3 times ('66, '71, '72).

The Orioles' AAA club at Rochester failed to qualify for the International League playoffs for the 2nd straight year after 3 consecutive appearances. The Red Wings finished 7th with a 52-88 record. Outfielder Leo Hernandez led the league in total bases with 237.

Class AA Charlotte won the Southern League championship after finishing the 1st half in last place in the Eastern Division with a 29-43 record. The O's then to bounded, knocked off Orlando (Twins) in a one-game "sudden death" playoff to capture the 2nd half title with a 46-29 log, then defeated 1st half winner Greenville (Braves) 3 game one and swept Western Division titlist Knoxville (Blue Jays) in 3 games to earn the league crown.

Ken Dixon was named the league's top pitcher while leading the circuit in wirs (16), strikeouts (211), innings pitched (240) and complete games (20). Reliever Nate Snell tied for 1st with 17 saves and catcher Al Pardo topped the league in game

Hagerstown, of the class A Carolina League, finished 3rd in the Northern Division in the 1st half (32-38) and sank to 4th the 2nd half (28-42). Kurt Leiter tied for the league lead in complete games with 7.

Newark (class A) had the best overall record in the New York-Penn League (46-28) and won the Western Division, but lost the circuit championship 2 games to one to Little Falls (Mets), marking the second straight year they have fallen in the league

Designated hitter Randy Riley was named the league's "star of stars" as the N.Y.-Penn's top hitter with a .351 average. First baseman Chuck Lynn (.274, 18 homers, 58 rbi) was named to the league's all-star squad along with outfielder Dave Dahse (.272, 18 of 21 stolen bases). Reliever Richard Caldwell's 9-1 record gave the best winning percentage in the league (.900).

Bluefield (rookie league) was 32-38 and 4th in the Appalachian League's Northern Division. Catcher Curt Beamesderfer was the all-league catcher for Bluefield while Greg Talamentez tied for the league leadership in strikeouts with 93 in 75 innings and was selected as one of the league's top 3 prospects by Baseball America.

Clyde had spent 41 years in baseball when he passed away at the age of 61.

CHUCK THOMPSON

A veteran of 43 years in broadcasting, Chuck Thompson is in his 26th season as a play-by-play announcer for the Orioles. At the end of the '82 season, Chuck decided to curtail his broadcast schedule and in '85 he'll team once again with Brooks Robinson to do games on television only.

Chuck began his announcing career in 1939 at WEEU in Reading. Three years later he became a staff announcer for WIBG in Philadelphia, where he covered Temple University football.

After seeing combat in three major European campaigns for the U.S. Army in World War II, he returned to Philadelphia to describe the action of the Phillies and A's, Warriors, Eagles, and Rockets (ice hockey).

He came to Baltimore in 1949 to do play-by-play for the International League Orioles, the Baltimore Bullets, U.S. Naval Academy football, and the Colts in the All-America Conference.

In 1955 Chuck joined the National Brewing Company's team of announcers and during the 24 years of that association did American League Orioles baseball for 19 years ('55-'56 and '62 thru '78), Colts football, Washington Senators baseball (1957-61), and the NBC-TV "Gameof-the-Week" (1959-60).

He has been named the outstanding sportscaster in Maryland by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association on numerous occasions. A golfing and fishing enthusiast, Chuck and his wife Rose, have 3 children and 5 grandchildren. They reside in Timonium.

BROOKS ROBINSON (See Biography on page 72)

WFBR is in the 3rd year of a 4-year contract to broadcast the Orioles thru '86. This is the 7th season that WFBR has carried the O's as the original 4-year agreement was signed after the '78 campaign. In addition to 11 spring training games (see exhibition schedule), WFBR will carry all 162 regular season games.

WFBR is the flagship station of a network comprising approximately 65 stations including WTOP (News Radio 15) in Washington, WOYK in York, PA, plus others in Maryland, Delaware, Pennsylvania, Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina, and Florida.

JON MILLER

Jon Miller starts his 3rd season on the Orioles' radio network after 3 seasons as a radio play-by-play announcer for the Boston Red Sox. His major league baseball experience also includes radio and television with the Texas Rangers in '78 & '79 and with the Oakland A's in '74. He broadcast his 1st major league game at age 22 with the A's.

Jon also has an extensive background in basketball, soccer, and hockey during his 14 years in broadcasting. He did 10-15 games a season for the NBA's Golden State Warriors from 1979-82 and prior to that, was the voice of University of San Francisco basketball for 5 years. He has also announced MISL games for the San Jose Earthquakes and did both television and radio for the Washington Diplomats in '77. He's broadcast soccer for the CBS, TVS, and Satelcast networks.

A reknowned mimic, Jon can be heard to imitate such outstanding baseball announcers as Al Michaels, Vin Scully, and Chuck Thompson during breaks in the action (rain delays, etc.).

A native of the San Francisco Bay area, Jon lives in Cockeysville.

TOM MARR

Tom Marr begins his 7th season on the Orioles' radio broadcast team. A veteran of 25 years in broadcasting, he has been with WFBR radio for the last 19 years. He made his debut as a major league play-by-play announcer in '79.

He began his broadcasting career doing a high school sports show at WWDC in Washington, and later worked at stations in Rhode Island, Connecticut, and Virginia before coming to WFBR. He covered Baltimore's pro sports teams for the CBS Radio Network from '69 to '75 and was the weekend sports anchor at WMAR-TV for 3 years prior to joining the O's broadcasts.

Possessing an extensive background in both news and sports, Tom participated in WFBR's award-winning discussion program, "Conference Call" as a regular panel member for many years.

Born and raised in Montgomery County, Maryland, Tom is a graduate of Montgomery Blair High School in Silver Spring and a veteran of the U.S. Marine Corps. He is married and the father of 5 children. His wife, Sharon, is a Baltimore City Police detective.

HOME TEAM SPORTS is available to cable systems in the six-state "Capital Region" (all of Maryland, Virginia and Delaware and parts of North Carolina, West Virginia and Pennsylvania).

HTS, owned and operated by Group W Satellite Communications (GWSC), will televise 90 Orioles' games in '85 including eight spring training games, 56 home games, 24 road games, plus two telecasts to be announced during the season.

Home Team Sports, which operates out of Washington, D.C., will also televise Washington Bullets and Washington Capitals games, plus many more major professional, collegiate and high school events of regional interest.

MEL PROCTOR

Mel Proctor returns for his second season as the Orioles' play-byplay announcer for Home Team Sports. Mel, who also is in his second season as the radio voice of the New Jersey Nets basketball team, is in his 13th year as a broadcaster.

He brings to HTS a wide variety of broadcast experience, having covered college football and basketball, as well as professional basketball and football during his career.

Mel served as sports director at the CBS-TV affiliate in Hawaii (KGMB) from '73 until '78. While there, he worked the microphone for Hawaii Islanders (AAA) baseball, University of Hawaii football and basketball, and did one season of play-by-play for the Hawaiians of the World Football League.

He came to work in the Nation's Capital for the first time in 78 when he began a five-year stint as play-by-play announcer for Washington Bullets basketball on flagship station WTOP-AM. During the Bullets' off-seasons, Mel worked in Arlington, Texas, as the TV and radio voice of the Texas Rangers. In '82 and '83, he supplemented his work with the Bullets by doing college basketball games for NBC-TV for two seasons.

Mel began his work with the Nets in '83 and also served as play-byplay man for the "NFL Game of the Week" for the Mutual Broadcasting System. A native of Denver, Colorado, Mel resides in Oakland, New Jersey with his wife, Julie, and their two children, Bill and Maile.

REX BARNEY

Rex returns for his second season as color commentator for Home Team Sports. Known as the "Voice of Memorial Stadium since 1970, he will continue to handle the stadium's public address announcing, as he did a year ago, when it doesn't conflict with his color work.

Rex, who also served as the stadium public address announcer for the Baltimore Colts from '69 to '83, has hosted a variety of radio sports shows in Baltimore and currently hosts a weekly call-in show on Orioles' flagship station WFBR-AM.

A former major league pitcher himself, Barney played with the Brooklyn Dodgers for six seasons (1943, '46-50). He appeared briefly with the Dodgers in 1943 before being called into the service for three years of military duty. He returned to the Dodgers in '46, compiling a career record of 35-31. His best season came in '48, when he won 15 games, including a sparkling 2-0 no-hit victory over the New York Giants.

Rex began his broadcasting career in '52 in New York City. He did Mutual Radio's Game of the Day from '55 to '57, and also broadcast games in the New York area for WOR-TV.

In '82 and '83, Rex served as color commentator for 16 Orioles' telecasts on subscription television. A native of Omaha, Nebraska, Rex resides just a half-mile from Memorial Stadium.

LARRY KING

The Peabody Award winning interviewer and host of Mutual Broadcasting's all-night radio show which bears his name, Larry King will interview special pre-game and between-inning guests during HTS telecasts of Orioles' games. He has been with HTS since the network launched in April, 1984. Larry also writes weekly columns for USA Today and The Sporting News and hosts an interview show on WJLA-TV in Washington, D.C.

HALL OF FAME

Was elected to Baseball Hall of Fame in landslide on Jan. 12, '83 ... Received 92% of votes cast (344 of 374), 9th highest pct. in history of BBWAA elections (surpassed only by Ty Cobb, Hank Aaron, Honus Wagner, Babe Ruth, Willie Mays, Bob Feller, Ted Williams and Stan Musial).

Is one of only 15 elected in first year of eligibility (including Lou Brock who elected this year, but excluding the 5 chosen in the Hall's first election).

Was 3rd of 6 modern Orioles to be elected. The others (year of election in paren): Robin Roberts ('76), Frank Robinson ('82), George Kell ('83), Luis Aparicio ('84) and Hoyt Wilhelm ('85).

Brooks was inducted with Kell, Juan Marichal, and Walter Alston into the Hall of Fame on Sunday, July 31, 1983 as an estimated record crowd of some 12,000 people (most of those from Baltimore) looked on.

PERSONAL

Brooks is doing color commentary on the Orioles' television network with **Chuck Thompson** for the 8th straight year (and 7th on WMAR, Channel 2, the Orioles' flagship station).

He is also active as a vice-president of Personal Management Associates (PMA)* and as a special assistant with the Crown Central Petroleum Company.

Brooks and his wife, Connie, a former United Air Lines flight attendant whom Brooks met on an Orioles' charter flight (K.C. to Boston) in 1959, have been married for 24 years. They live in Lutherville, Md. (north of Baltimore) with their four children: Brooks David (7/24/61), Chris (2/22/63), Michael (3/11/64), and Dianna (2/22/68).

BROOKS ROBINSON (Cont.)

Brooks' uniform #5 was officially retired on opening day, 1978, the year after he retired. Frank Robinson's #20 and Earl Weaver's #4 are the only other numbers that have been retired by the Orioles. *PMA is a company which provides athletes comprehensive counseling and support in their professional, financial, and personal lives.

BIG LEAGUE CAREER

Brooks officially spent 20 years and 72 days as a player in the American League, spanning 23 seasons.

He played in 2,896 major league games, all of them with the Orioles, 7th on the all-time list (Carl Yastrzemski leads at 3,308).

Only Yastrzemski (3,308) and Ty Cobb (3,033) have played more American League games, and only 3 others in history have played more with one franchise: Yastrzemski (3,308), Hank Aaron (3,076), and Stan Musial (3,026).

Durability: Played in 97% of all Orioles' games from July 9, '59 (when he returned from minors for the last time) thru May 16, '76, a period of more than 161/2 years . . . Played at least 153 games in 14 of 15 years from '60 thru '75.

In Orioles' 30-year history, only one other third baseman has played as many as 200 games at third base (Doug DeCinces-792).

Opening Days: Started 20 consecutive opening day games for the Orioles from '57 thru '76, and batted .316 (25-for-79) with six home

Home Runs/RBI: Led A.L. in rbi (118) in '64 and also achieved career high of 28 homers that year . . . Hit 17 or more homers nine times, 11 or more 11 times . . . His last year in "double figures" was '71 when he hit 20 . . . Holds record for most lifetime homers in Memorial Stadium (139). Had six career grand slams, four of them in Baltimore.

Hitting: Hit most home runs (37) and drove in most runs (167) against the Red Sox . . . Twice put together strings of eight straight hits: July 10 thru 15, '60, and Aug. 21 thru 23, '63 ... Holds A.L. record for most sacrifice flies, career (114).

Holds club career records for games, at bats, runs, hits, doubles, triples, total bases, rbi and extra base hits . . . Has one-season mark for games (163, '61 & '64) and at bats (668, '61).

Fielding: Committed only 263 errors in 9,165 chances at third base for a lifetime percentage of .971 ... Appeared in a total of 29 games at second base (24) and shortstop (5) and committed only one boot in 31 tries ... Did not play anywhere defensively but at third base

Major League Lifetime Records, 3B: Highest fielding percentage, 100 or more games (.971) ... Most seasons (23) ... Most games (2,871) ... Most chances accepted, excluding errors (8,902) ... Most putouts (2,697) . . . Most assists (6,205) . . . Most double plays (618) . Most seasons leading league in games (8) . . . Most seasons leading league in assists (8).

American League Lifetime Records, 3B: Most seasons leading league in fielding (11) ... Most seasons leading league in chances accepted, excluding errors (8 tie) . . . Most games season (163, '61 and '64) . . . Most home runs (266) 2nd to Graig Nettles (320).

Nothing is Forever, '77: His 268th and last home run provided one of the most emotional experiences in Orioles' history. It was April 19 at Memorial Stadium, the O's trailed the Indians, 5-2, in the 10th. With one out and runners on 1st and 2nd, Lee May singled in a run. The O's now trailed by 2 as Brooks came to the plate as a pinch-hitter for Larry Harlow. He ran the count to "3&2," fouled off a number of pitches, then hit a home run into the left field stands off southpaw Dave LaRoche to win the game 6-5. There were only 4,826 fans at the ballpark that night, but none of them will ever forget the moment.

Signed for 1977 as player-coach, but became coach exclusively on Sunday, Aug. 121, when he went on the voluntarily retired list (in Minnesota) to make room on the roster for catcher Rick Dempsey who was returning to duty after six weeks on the disabled list.

An Orioles' record regular season crowd of 51,798 attended "Thanks, Brooks" Day on Sunday, Sep. 18, against the Red Sox to pay tribute to the most important and beloved Oriole of modern times.

The major league draft is held annually at baseball's winter meetings, and is followed with a separate selection by National Association clubs from class AAA to A levels . . . Until 1958 major league clubs could draft players within a range between \$15,000 (for AAA players) and \$2,000 (for class D players) . . . In 1958 the price for big league drafts rose to \$25,000.

However, in 1959, a first year player draft at the big league level was set up to discourage the payment of inordinately large bonus payments to free agents. The new rule provided that first year players could be selected at the major league level (if not protected on a major league team's 40 man roster) for \$12,000. In 1961 an even lower draft price was set up for more recent first year players. That figure was \$8,000.

That year, incidentally, the Baltimore organization set a record of sorts by being relieved of 19 eligible first year players (seven during the big league selections and 11 more during the minor league draft). In 1965 the first year player draft began to lose its significance and then disappeared in 1970.

-- BIRDS' BIGGEST DEAL --

In November-December 1954 the Orioles and Yankees engineered a 17 player deal, one of the biggest in baseball history. General Manager Paul Richards sent the following players to New York: pitchers Mike Blyska, Don Larsen and Bob Turley; catcher Darrell Johnson, first baseman Dick Krykoski, shortstop Billy Hunter, and outfielders Ted del Guerico and Jim Fridley . . . The Birds in turn acquired the contracts of: pitchers Harry Byrd, Jim McDonald and Bill Miller; catchers Hal Smith and Gus Triandos; second baseman Don Leppert, third baseman Kal Segrist, shortstop Willie Miranda and outfielder Gene Wooding.

ORIOLES "HALL OF FAME"

The Orioles' "Hall of Fame" was founded in 1977 by the Oriole Advocates in cooperation with the ballclub to honor the outstanding players, managers and coaches to have represented the Orioles during the modern major league era which began in 1954.

Since that time, 11 men have been inducted by vote of selected writers, announcers, and veteran members of the Orioles Advocates.

Brooks and Frank Robinson ('77) were charter inductees, followed by: Dave McNally ('78), Boog Powell ('79), Gus Triandos ('81), Luis Aparacio and Mike Cuellar ('82), and Mark Belanger and Earl Weaver ('83).

The 1985 selections will be announced sometime in the spring.

To become a member, a candidate must be mentioned on 75% of the ballots cast. To qualify for nomination, he must have spent at least3 seasons with the Orioles and must be one year removed from the capacity in which he is being considered (i.e. Jim Palmer, Al Bumbry and Ken Singleton will not be eligible until next year).

Allen Barrett and Jack Buckley, both past presidents of the Oriole Advocates, were instrumental in making the Orioles "Hall of Fame" a reality. The chairman of the Oriole Advocate's Hall of Fame Committee this year is Joe Karey.

WILHELM 6TH EX-ORIOLE IN BASEBALL HALL OF FAME

Former knuckleball specialist **Hoyt Wilhelm** became the 6th former Oriole to be elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame when he was chosen along with **Lou Brock** in January. It was also the 4th straight year that a one-time Orioles player has been so honored.

The 61-year old Wilhelm (born July 26, '23) who will be inducted at Cooperstown, N.Y. on Sunday, July 28, received 331 of a possible 395 votes (84%) while Brock was named on 315 ballots (80%) in his 1st year of eligibility.

The late Nellie Fox, former White Sox 2nd baseman, fell 2 votes short of admission (295). Others who polled substantial support were Billy Williams (252), Jim Bunning (214) and Catfish Hunter (212) among some 41 eligible candidates.

Other Orioles already enshrined are: Robin Roberts ('76, 87%), Frank Robinson ('82, 89%, 1st year of eligibility), Brooks Robinson ('83, 92%, 1st year of eligibility), George Kell ('83, Veterans Committee election), and Luis Aparicio ('84, 85%).

During his long career in the majors ('52 thru '72), **Wilhelm** appeared in a record 1,070 games, and was 143-122 with 227 saves and a 2.52 era. His career ended just 5 days shy of his 49th birthday when the Dodgers released him on July 21, '72. Not bad numbers for a man who spent his first 7 pro seasons in the minors (interrupted by 3 years in military service during World War II) and his first 3 with the same Class D ballclub (Mooresville, N.C.).

Though known primarily as a reliever, Hoyt's tenure with the O's (late '58 thru '62) was highlighted by his achievements as a starting pitcher. On Sep. 20, '58 he pitched the Orioles 1st no-hitter a 1-0 gem against the Yankees at Memorial Stadium. His batterymate, Gus Triandos, provided the game's only run with a home run, his 30th (which tied Yogi Berra's A.L. record for most homers by a catcher).

Then in '59 continuing as a starter, he won his 1st 9 decisions for the O's after which he had a 0.996 era. He went on to a 15-10 record and a league leading 2.19 era. He thus became the only pitcher in history to have led both major leagues in earned run average, having topped the N.L. as a rookie with the Giants in '52 (2.43).

Despite his successes, **Hoyt's** good fortune was tempered by difficulty experienced by his catchers in handling his elusive knuckleball. Most of the major league passed balls were set by catchers working with **Wilhelm**, and the O's backstops were no exception.

Finally, in '60 Manager Paul Richards designed a special catchers mitt, some 50% larger than the standard model. The results were substantial, but he ultimately drifted back to the bullpen (in '60) and remained there for the balance of his career.

The O's traded him to the White Sox in Jan. '63 with Ron Hansen, Pete Ward and Dave Nicholson for Luis Aparacio and Al Smith.

Since retiring as a player, he has been a pitching coach, first for the Atlanta Braves organization, and, for the past 10 years, with the New York Yankees farm system.

ORIOLES ADVOCATES, INC.

The Oriole Advocates, Inc. is a unique non-profit corporation dedicated to promoting and stimulating interest in the game of baseball at both the amateur and professional levels. The organization this year will celebrate the 25th anniversary of its founding, back in July of 1960.

Membership of the Oriole Advocates compromises some 75 men and women drawn from a broad cross-section in the Baltimore area.

Thru the years, the Advocates have made substantial financial contributions, primarily to youth organizations, have played a major role in the restoration of Babe Ruth's birthplace on Emory Street, and have provided the leadership in establishing the Baltimore Orioles "Hall of Fame."

They have also served as an essential right arm of the Orioles' public relations and promotions program. Probably the biggest contribution of all in that area have been the formation and annual administration of the Junior Orioles program which began in '63 with 750 youngsters and reached an all-time high of 20,000 members (in '77). It is a massive undertaking, a quality "knothole" program that requires much care, time and effort.

Among a myriad of other activities, the Advocates also administer the "souvenir giveaway" dates at the ballpark, making sure that all eligible fans receive the items to which they are entitled.

ORIOLES "DESIGNATED HITTERS"

The Orioles "Designated Hitters" have been selling season tickets for the ballclub for 6 years (starting '80) and, in that period, the O's preseason sale has leaped from 1,623 in '79 to a projected all-time high of the equivalent of 12,200 to 12,500 season seats (figures estimated because the "selling season" will continue to opening day).

Mayor William Donald Schaefer and a select group of Baltimoreans working closely with the Orioles' front office, created the organization in Sep. '79. Their purpose was to enlist the talents of successful men and women from the area business community to serve as the principal sales force for the annual season ticket campaign . . . Since then, the "DH's" have expanded into group sales.

During the first year of operation (for '80 season) 28 of 45 candidates qualified for membership after stringent sales requirements. That number has grown significantly. This year between 55 and 60 will meet the required sales minimums. The membership formula is based on a blend of new sales and renewals, and everyone must re-qualify each year.

Last year, Glenn Babcock and Bob Hawkins led the veteran members in sales while John Pettigrew and Howard Weinberg were tops among the "rookie" members.

Incentives for members included a trip for 2 to the Oroles' spring training headquarters in Miami, a special custom "DH" blazer, an Orioles weekend in Boston during the season, a non-baseball trip to London, and a junket to the World Series.

The "Designated Hitters" have their own officers (Hal Hackerman was president in '84) and board of directors, by-laws, newsletter and softball team (of less than major league caliber). They conduct their own meetings and subscribe to what can only be called an active and aggressive social schedule.

Mayor Schaefer, the three charter members of the organization (Owen Daly, Bill Beasman and Chris Hartman), Orioles director for business affairs Bob Aylward, and executive director of sales Lou Michaelson (the DH's top seller in each of the 1st 4 years before joining the O's full time in '83) have been instrumental in directing the program thru its 1st 6 years. So have former club vice-president Al Harazin (now with the Mets), and the O's current DH coordinator Dan O'Dowd.

The Orioles' escalating season ticket sales figures by years: '79 (1,623); '80 (4,018); '81 (5,215); '82 (5,430); '83 (6,051), '84 (11,738).

He led club in steals 5 times, batted over .300 on 3 occasions, was the 1st Oriole ever to amass 200 hits in a season (205 in '80), won the A.L. "Rookie of the Year" award in '73 and was the O's "most valuable player" in '80.

Ranks alongside Brooks Robinson, Jim Palmer and Ken Singleton among the most active players in Orioles history in terms of community involvement and appearances.

Spring '85: Was invited to the San Diego Padres training camp in Yuma, AZ on a trial basis.

'84 Season: Alternated in center for most of season with John Shelby . . . Finished the year on a high note with a .325 average (83-27) over the last 6 weeks (starting Aug. 24).

Enjoyed the only 2 home run game of his pro career in Kokura, Japan against the Tokyo (Yomuri) Giants' Shoji Sadaoka on Nov. 10 . . . "Bee" hit .400 (25-10) on the Japan tour.

'80 Season: Easily his best major league season . . . His .318 average remains the 3rd highest in club annals (among qualifiers), and his 205 hits surpassed Brooks Robinson's old standard of 194. (Cal Ripken broke Bee's record with 211 safeties in '83).

That year he also set personal highs in games (160), runs (118, 4 shy of club mark), rbi (53), stolen bases (44), and walks (78) and had a .392 onbase pct. (729-286).

Was named to A.L. All-Star team and played last 4 innings in L.A. ... Was picked as centerfielder on The Sporting News A.L. postseason all-star team by vote of fellow players.

'73 Season: Al and teammate, Richie Coggins, finished 1-2 in the "Rookie of the Year" balloting ... Al hit .337 and Coggins .319, batting 1-2, though neither qualified ... As lefthanded hitters, the 2 rookies platooned against righthanders (Don Baylor and Merv Rettenmund played primarily against lefties) ... Had a .399 on base pct. (393-157).

Centerfield: Came to the majors as a leftfielder . . . Made his 1st start in center on July 4, '76 and shared that position for the next 21/2 seasons before becoming the O's regular centerfielder from '79 thru '82 ... Alternated there the past 2 years with John Shelby.

Vs. Opponents: Hit over .300 lifetime vs. 3 clubs: Seattle-.320 (247-79), Milwaukee - .310 (452-140) and Toronto - .300 (293-88) . Hit 10 of his 53 career A.L. homers against the Yankees (5 of them off Catfish Hunter).

Odds and Ends: In '78 Al became the 1st Oriole, eligible for free agency in the re-entry system, to re-sign with the O's (Birds had lost the first 7 eligibles to other clubs in '76 and '77) . . . Played a total of 22 post-season games in 4 ALCS and 2 WS.

Set club mark and tied A.L. record with 3 triples in one game against Milwaukee on Sep. 23, '73, the day O's clinched the eastern division title .. Had 3 doubles in a game twice in '75 (vs. K.C. May 23 and vs. Det. July

2) ... Beat out 3 bunts for hits against California on July 10, '75.

Vs. LHP/RHP: "Bee" has a lifetime average of .289 vs. righthanders (4121-1191), and .253 vs. lefthanders (837-212).

Minors: Led International League in batting (.345) and triples (15) in '72 when he was named Topps/National Association "Player of the Year" in that league . . . Started that campaign in Asheville (AA), ended it in Baltimore and wound up hitting over .300 for 3 different teams.

After returning from 2 years of active duty in the U.S. Army, Al played at Aberdeen, SD in '71 and finished 2nd in Northern Leaugue bat race to teammate Bob Bailor.

Amateur Background: Went to Virginia State College in Petersburg (graduated '68) on a basketball scholarship after averaging 32 points per game as a senior at Ralph Bunche H.S. in King George, VA.

Played 4 years of basketball at Virginia State, but didn't play baseball until his senior year. Won the Central Intercollegiate Athletic Assoc. batting title (.378) that season and was all-CIAA in basketball and baseball . . . Started playing baseball in college at the urging of the late Dick Bowle, who later signed him for the O's in June '68.

Personal: Was called to duty as a 2nd lieutenant (ROTC) in June '69, just 2 months after starting his pro career . . . Served 11 months in Vietnam as a platoon leader, earned a Bronze Star, and was discharged as a 1st lieutenant in May '71.

Finished tied for 2nd in the '81 balloting for the Roberto Clemente Award, presented annually by Major League Baseball to the player who "best exemplifies the game, both on and off the field."

In recent years he has been involved with numerous charities including the Maryland League for the Handicapped, the Santa Claus Anonymous Fund, Maryland Special Olympics and the Muscular Dystrophy Foundation.

During off-seasons, he has made numerous appearances for the O's and still plays for the club's basketball team . . . Single.

SUMMARY

Unquestionably the finest pitcher in the Orioles' 31-year history, Jim holds many club records including: most wins (258), losses (152), games (558), innings (3947.2), shutouts (53), complete games (211), strikeouts (2212) & walks (1311).

He won 20 games 8 times, earned 3 Cy Young Awards, pitched the pennant clinching game 4 times, and was 8-3 in post-season play while hurling for one club over a span of 20 years ('65 thru '84).

During his entire career he never gave up a grand slam home run in regular or post-season play.

'84 Season: Lost 1st 2 starts to Minnesota (Apr. 8) and Toronto (Apr. 18), then made his final appearance as a starter on Apr. 23 at Chicago, but was not a pitcher of record.

Was losing pitcher in 16th inning vs. Cleveland at Baltimore after a 3 inning relief stint on May 2, then pitched in his final game as an Oriole on May 12 at Memorial Stadium against Oakland, but was not involved in a decision.

On May 17, Jim was granted his unconditional release after choosing not to go on the "voluntarily retired" list.

Lifetime Wins/20-Win Seasons: Jim ranks 26th on the alltime list in victories . . . He is one of only 3 pitchers in the 82-year history of the A.L. to have won 20 or more games in 8 or more seasons along with Lefty Grove (8, last time in '35) and Walter Johnson (12, last time in '25). The last major leaguer to accomplish that feat was Warren Spahn (13 times, the last in '63).

Only 6 who have worked exclusively in the 20th century have won 20 or more 8 times, and in the entire history of the major leagues, Jim is one of 16. He put that string together over a 9 year period from '70 thru '78 (was 7-12 in '74).

Earned Run Average: His 2.86 era is 5th on the all-time list (since era became an official statistic, '12 in NL and '13 in A.L.) among pitchers with 3,000 or more innings behind: (1) Walter Johnson - 2.37; (2) Grover C. Alexander-2.56; (3) Whitey Ford-2.74, and (4) Tom Seaver-2.80. His career era is the lowest in the A.L. since Johnson retired in '27 . . . He twice led the A.L. ('73 & '75) and was in the league's "top 5" 10 times.

Won-Lost Pct.: His .638 w-l pct. ranks 11th among those with 200 or more decisions and who pitched only in the 20th century. The alltime leader is Whitey Ford (.690, 236-106) ... Note: Ron Guldry, currently at .680 (132-62), is only 6 decisions from qualifying on this list.

Pennant Clinchers/Post-Season: Jim went the route to win the games that clinched the Orioles 1st 4 pennants ('66, '69, '70, '71). Since then Scott McGregor ('79) and Tippy Martinez ('83) have added their names to the list.

His overall record in 17 post-season appearances including 15 starts was 8-3 with a 2.61 era (124.1 ip, 36 er).

In '66 he became the youngest ever to pitch a World Series shutout when, at the age of 20 years-11 months-21 days, he blanked Sandy Koufax of the Dodgers, 6-0 on 4 hits (and 6 L.A. errors) in game #2 at Dodger Stadium . . . That was Koufax' final game in the majors.

In '83, he became the only pitcher in history to have won a World Series game in each of 3 decades. In that game (#3 at Philadelphia) he bested Steve Carlton after pitching 2 scoreless innings in relief of Mike Flanagan.

He holds a number of ALCS records including: most wins-4 (tied with Catfish Hunter), most complete games (5), most strikeouts (46) and most walks (19, tied with Mike Cuellar).

Cy Youngs: He is one of only 4 pitchers to have won as many as 3 Cy Youngs ('73, '75, '76) ... Steve Carlton has won 4 and both Tom Seaver and Sandy Koufax 3 ... The award has been presented since '56 with individual league awards beginning in '67.

Jim, Koufax and Denny McLain are the only ones to have earned the award in 2 consecutive seasons.

All-Star Games: Jim was named to the A.L. All Star team 6 times and started 4 games ... Ironically, he did not pitch in the midsummer classic in any of the years he went on to win the Cy Young . . . He was picked to the squad in '73 and '76, and was on the club but did not pitch in '75 because of a tender arm.

In his first 3 All-Star appearances, Jim pitched a total of 8 scoreless innings while allowing only 3 hits and 2 walks and striking out 8 (70, 71, 72).

No-Hitter/Near No-Hitters: Jim no-hit the Oakland A's On Aug. 13, '69 at Baltimore, beating Chuck Dobson, 8-0, only 4 days after coming off a 6-week stretch on the disabled list (2nd start).

In '73 he had 2 near-misses, both in Baltimore ... Had a perfect game with one out in 9th vs. Texas on June 16 when Ken Suarez singled . Jlm ultimately won a 9-1 2-hitter . . . Only July 27, a leadoff single in the 8th by Cleveland's George Hendrick was the only hit he allowed.

Shutouts: He is tied for 15th (with Gaylord Perry) on the alltime list with 53 (Walter Johnson is #1 with 113) . . . His 10 shutouts for the O's in '75 are a club record and represent an A.L. high since Dean Chance hurled 11 in '64.

During an 18-day period in '78 (May 24 thru June 10), he hurled 4 shutouts in 5 starts, 3 of them in succession, which gave him a piece of the club record along with Jack Fisher ('60), Hal Brown ('61), Milt Pappas ('64) and Tom Phoebus ('67).

1-0 Wins: Had a 9-3 record in complete game 1-0 decisions and was 10-5 overall . . . In '78, during the period he pitched 4 shutouts in 5 starts (see above), he went route to win 1-0 3 times.

Long Games: Pitched more than 9 innings on 19 different occasions: 10 inn.—11 times . . . 11 inn.—4 . . . 12 innings—4 . . . He was 5-6 with 8 no decisions in those long outings . . .

In Relief: Relieved in 37 of 558 regular season appearances (including 21 times his rookie year), and twice in 17 post-season games . . . He was 7-3 with 3 saves as a fireman, including the '83 WS victory.

vs. Opponents: Won 20 or more vs. 11 of 13 A.L. clubs. No other pitcher in baseball history has won 20 against as many clubs (e.g. Tom Seaver has 20 career wins against 10 N.L. clubs while both Steve Carlton and Phil Niekro are 20 + against 9 N.L. opponents).

Ranks 8th on Yankee beater list with 30 (Walter Johnson, as usual is 1st with 60) . . . Was 16-7 lifetime at Yankee Stadium and 7-3 since that ballpark was renovated and re-opened in '76 . . . Had a winning record vs. all opponents except Seattle.

Versus: Bos. 22-16; Cal. 25-10; Chl. 24-10; Cle. 29-12; Det. 21-12; K.C. 21-12; Mil. 22-10; Min. 21-12; N.Y. 30-16; Oak. 20-15; Sea. 2-3; Tex. 22-16, and Tor. 9-8.

Home Runs: Yielded 303 home runs in 558 games, but never threatened the A.L. or major league "gopher" record held respectively by Catfish Hunter (374) and Robin Roberts (502).

He never yielded a grand slam home run in a regular or post-season major league game . . . Fred Patek hit one off him in spring training (Ft. Myers) and Johnny Bench hit a slam in a '67 International League game for Buffalo while Jim was at Rochester.

Injuries: Back and shoulder injuries nearly ended his career in . He worked in only 2 games for O's between June 8, '67 and the start of '69. After jumping out to a 9-2 start in '69, he tore shoulder muscles in late June and was sidelined for 42 days.

After that Jim spent 3 more tours on the disabled list: '74 (8 weeks)-elbow; '79 (44 days)-elbow; and '83 (3 months)-back.

Signing/Early Career: Signed to a bonus contract with the O's by Jim Russo and Jim Wilson . . . Was a 3-sport athlete at Scottsdale H.S. (graduated '63), and was all-Arizona in baseball, basketball and football.

Pitched 1st pro game at age 18 on May 1, '64 for Aberdeen Pheasants (Northern League) at Grand Forks, but wasn't a pitcher of record . . . His manager was Cal Ripken, Sr. . . . One week later (May 8), also vs. Grand Forks, he was his 1st decision and hurled his 1st shutout, a 3-hitter.

Made big league debut in relief at Bos. on Apr. 17, '65, then earned his 1st win, also in relief, vs. Yankees' Pete Mikkelsen in Baltimore . . . Led O's in wins in '66 (15), the club's 1st pennant winning season.

Personal: In '84, he will continue as color man for ABC-TV with which he has been associated since '78 . . . Last season he worked with his former manager Earl Weaver on ABC's "Monday Night Baseball" telecasts ... Will also do color for some Orioles games on Home Team Sports this season.

Has worked actively on behalf of the Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation for the past 14 years, serving most of that time as national sports chairman.

Jim has been the highly publicized sports representative for Jockey Underwear since spring of '80 . . . In '83 he was the sports recipient of the American Image Award, sponsored by the Male Apparel Industry and the Men's Fashion Association of America.

Has attended both Arizona State and Towson State Universities . . . Has 2 daughters: Jamle Michelle (11/16/66) and Kelly Christina (6/5/69).

SUMMARY

Ken was a 3 time "Most Valuable Oriole" ('75, '77, '79), hit .290 or better 5 times in 10 years for the O's (3 times over .300), and set the existing club record for highest average in a season (.328) in '77 (surpassing Bob Nieman's .322 of '56) . . . In addition to his Orioles heroics, he had an outstanding season for the Expos in '73 when he hit over .300 (.302) for the 1st time.

He was 2nd in club history in walks with 885, only 4 shy of Boog Powell's record 889 ... Ranks in "top 5" in games (1,446), runs (684), hits (1,455), doubles (235), home runs (182), rbi (767), gwrbi (95) and total bases (2,274).

His 1,262 career walks in the majors put him 20th on the all-list ... He drew 99 or more in 6 different seasons and holds one season record for both Montreal (103, '73) and Baltimore (111, '79).

Is 3rd all-time in home runs by a switch-hitter with 246 behind Mickey Mantle (536) and Reggle Smith (314), and just ahead of Eddle Murray (227) and Ted Simmons (226).

Is one of the most community oriented players in O's history (alongside Brooks Robinson, Al Bumbry and Jim Palmer) ... Became 2nd Oriole to win the Roberto Clemente Award in '82, presented annually by Major League Baseball to the player who best exemplifies the game, both on and off the field (Brooks earned the honor in '72).

'84 Season: Used as a designated and pinch-hitter exclusively for the 2nd straight year and hit .215, a career low ... Became 150th player in history to reach the 2,000 hit level on June 25 ... Finished on a high note with 3 homers, including 2 grand slams, and 16 rbi in his last 21 games (starting Aug. 31) ... As usual, he crushed Mariners' pitching (see "Seattle" below).

Accompanied O's on Japan trip in the fall ... It was his 2nd trip, having been a part of the major league all-star entourage that toured Japan in '79.

Switch-Hitting: Though a natural lefthander, Ken was a righthanded hitter until '65 (late in his amateur career) . . . Lifetime in the majors, he batted .291 lefthanded (5088-1483) with 187 home runs, and .260 righthanded (2101-546) with 59 homers.

He averaged one home run for every 27.2 at bats lefthanded and was 1-for every 35.6 at bats from the right side.

In the American League only, he hit .296 lefthanded (3664-1079) with 137 homers and .259 righthanded (1451-376) with 45 rbi ... His best year from the right side was '77 when he batted .377 (59-for-158), and .310 lefthanded

In '80, **Ken** and **Eddie Murray** became only the 2nd pair of switchers (on same team) to produce 100 rbi each in a single season . . . The only others were **Ted Simmons** and **Reggie Smith** for the '74 Cardinals.

On-Base Pct.: Had a career on-base percentage of .388 (8528-3308) in the majors, and .388 (6054-2350) in the American League. In that category, he ranks 2nd in O's history behind Bob Nieman (.393), and ahead of Don Buford (.385).

His best year from an on-base standpoint was '77 when he compiled a .438 average (651-285), a club record ... Bob Nieman had a .442 (477-211) in '56, but fell short of the qualifying minimum of plate appearances.

Batting Average: Led the O's in batting in each of his first 4 years with the O's '75 thru '78, and just missed the next year when Murray beat him out by .00064 (though both hit .295 officially).

Vs. Seattle: Ken consistently excelled against the Mariners ... In 8 years he batted .341 (255-87) with 24 home runs and 77 rbi in 73 games overall vs. Seattle, all career highs vs. one team . . . At the Kingdome, he hit 14 homers and drove in 42 runs in 35 games.

Vs. Other Opponents: He hit over .300 against 2 other clubs: Boston (.319, 432-138) and Minnesota (.309, 340-105).

"MVP" Contender: In addition to his 3 "MVO" awards, Ken was runner up to Don Baylor for the '79 A.L. "MVP," and was named on the '80 hollots. In '77 he was 3rd behind Rod Carew and Al Cowens.

all 28 ballots . . . In '77, he was 3rd behind Rod Carew and Al Cowens.

'79 & '77 Seasons: In '79 he set career highs in homers (35)
and rbi (111), won the O's "MVO" and was 2nd in A.L. "MVP" . . . Was only
the 2nd switch-hitter ever to hit as many as 35 homers . . . Mickey
Mantle is the other (he did it 6 times).

In '77, he set club record with his .328 average and .438 on-base percentage, hit 24 homers and drove in 99 runs while winning his 2nd "MVO" award.

Post-Season: Hit a combined .333 (57·19) in 17 post-season games for the O's... Had only one at-bat in the '83 WS vs. Philadelphia because the dh rule was not in effect that year, but in game #4 at Philadelphia drew a bases loaded walk from John Denny to force in the tying run in the O's decisive 6th inning rally.

All-Star Games: Was elected to the starting team in '81 and responded with 2 hits, one of them a home run off Tom Seaver at Cleveland ... He is one of 3 O's, along with Brooks and Frank, to have homered in All-Star competition ... Also appeared in the '77 and '79 games.

April '81: He hit .472 (53-25) that month with 7 hr & 14 rbi in 15 games, had a .517 on base percentage and a .981 slugging average . . . Was named the A.L.'s "player of the month."

He also set a club record during that spree with 10 straight hits over a 2½ game span including 4 doubles and 2 homers... His final hit in that stretch was a home run off Richard Dotson. The old club mark in that category was 8 by Brooks Robinson (twice) and Bob "Rocky" Johnson.

Other Notable Achievements: Despite a .251 average in '82, he hit .342 (120-41) with runners in scoring position . . . Led majors in '80 with 19 gwrbi . . . In '76 he was hitting only .185 thru June 2, but batted .312 the rest of the way (hitting safely in 91 of 112 games) and edged Reggle Jackson for club lead, .278 to .277.

Won the "MVO" award by slim margin over Jim Palmer in '75, his 1st year with O's, hit .300, drew 118 walks (one off lead) and led A.L. in plate appearances (714).

Elbow Operation: On Dec. 19, '77 he underwent surgery on his right elbow for removal of bone chips and transplantation of the ulnar nerve, then went on the enjoy 3 more banner seasons.

National League: Ken was Mets' #1 pick in Jan. '67 free agent draft (signed by Clarence "Bubber" Jonnard) . . . Made big league debut with Mets in June '70 after being recalled from Tidewater where he was leading I.L. in batting (.388).

Picked up his 1st 2 hits in his 3rd game (at Montreal for Mets) including his 1st career homer (off Expos' BIII Stoneman) on June 26, '70.

Ken's 1st outstanding season in majors was in '73 for Montreal, a full year after the Mets had traded him in the Rusty Staub deal... That season he set Montreal club records in runs (100), rbi (103), and walks (123) and hit .300 ... Played in every game and led majors in outfield assists (20).

Amateur Background: Ken was a baseball and basketball standout at Mt. Vernon H.S. in New York ... Went to Hofstra (Hempstead, L.I.) on a basketball scholarship, but also played baseball there (one year) ... Averaged 18 points freshman year.

Hit 36 home runs in 3 seasons in fast semi-pro Bronx Federation League where he started at age 15 and played against **Rod Carew**.

Personal: In addition to winning the Roberto Clemente award in '82, he was also a recipient of a major Baltimore area honor, the

Jimmle Swartz Medallion, for his extensive community service.

Ken has served as honorary chairman of the Maryland Assoc. of Sickle Cell Services and for United Cerebral Palsy of Central Maryland, and is actively involved in other charities . . . For the past 4 years, he has purchased a block of tickets for Orioles Sunday home games for distribution to needy senior citizens.

He was born in New York City, but moved out to Stamford, CT when he was 8, and a year later to Mt. Vernon . .

His brother, Fred (5 years younger) was a hurdler at Penn State and is now a track coach at White Plains (N.Y.) H.S. . . . His father, Joseph, worked for the U.S. Postal Service for many years in Manhattan, but now lives in Baltimore . . . His uncle, Harvey (Buddy) Singleton, was once a tackle for the Toronto Argonauts.

Ken met his wife, the former Colette Saint-Jacques of Vercheres, Quebec while she was working at the Forum in Montreal . . . They were married Jan. 5, '74 and have 2 sons: Matthew Kenneth (11/24/76) and Justin Charles (4/10/79) ... The Singletons live in Lutherville in **Baltimore County**.

During the last several off-seasons, Ken has worked for WBAL-TV ... This summer he will do color commentary for the Toronto Blue Jays cable station (22 games) as well as minor league games for Home Team Sports.

MEMORIAL STADIUM-A BRIEF HISTORY

Construction of Baltimore Memorial Stadium began on the site of old Municipal Stadium in 1949. However, when the original Baltimore NFL franchise left town after the '50 football season, work on the new facility was suspended until '52.

Despite the construction the International League Orioles continued to play their home games here on 33rd Street (thru '53) as did the current Baltimore Colts franchise when it re-located from Dallas (Texans) prior to the '53 football season.

The new stadium was completed essentially in October, '53, but refinements continued on thru the spring of '54, the A.L. Orioles first in Baltimore

The original Municipal Stadium was built for football and completed in 1924. However, when old Oriole Park (29th Street and Greenmount Avenue) burned down on the night and early morning of July 3-4, 1944, the Orioles moved into the big ballpark (in those days home plate was in what is now dead center field).

Baltimore Memorial Stadium was built for \$6 million on 28% acres of city owned property and financed by two city bond issues.

Over the years, there have been some changes made. In '54, the distance from home plate to the fence in dead center was 450'. That has been whittled down gradually to its present 405'.

The Orioles dugout was originally on the first base side, but when some 2,600 field boxes were installed in front of the original boxes in '61 (prior to that there was an 8' wall between the front row of the boxes and the field, and Baltimore led the world in foul territory), new dugouts had to be constructed and the home team moved over to third base.

In 1964 additional upper deck sections were added, increasing the capacity by another 2,600 seats. In 1970 (mid-season) a new scoreboard was installed. In recent years the old splintery wooden benches (without backs) have been completely replaced by chairs and nonwooden benches with back rests, and a 35th row has been added to the upper deck.

In 1980, six new towers, housing a new ticket window and additional ticket office space, storage areas and rest rooms, were completed.

During the past winter, construction began on new administrative office for the Orioles. The project is expected to be completed on or about June 1, this year. In addition, a new Diamond Vision video board (by Mitsubishi) should be operational by Opening Day (in right centerfield).

JOE ALTOBELLI (Cont.)

Orloles' Manager: Joe was appointed as the 7th manager in Baltimore's history on November 12, '82... He succeeded Earl Weaver, who had guided the club for 14½ seasons since July 11, '68... 17th season with Orioles organization.

1983: In his 1st year as manager, Joe guided the Orioles to the world championship, the club's 1st since '70. He was named as the American League "manager of the year" by United Press International.

Joe became just the 9th manager in major league history to win the world series in his 1st year as manager of that club. The last to do it had been Alvin Dark (Oak., '74).

In addition, he is only the 7th man to ever manage teams that won pers, to the International League title. The Clippers finished first in the staged annually between the champions from the triple-A leagues. Joe won the Junior World Series at Rochester in '71 (see below). The most recent to accomplish that feat had been Ralph Houk (Denver & New York).

He was the American League's 3rd base coach at the major league all-star game on July 6 at Chicago.

Yankee Organization: He served as third base coach for the New York Yankees in '81 and '82 . . . In '80, his first year in the New York organization, he guided the Yankees' top farm club, the Columbus Clippers, to the International League title. The Clippers finished first in the regular season with an 83-57 record, then defeated Richmond and Toledo in the playoffs to capture the crown. For his effort, he was selected as the I.L.'s "manager of the year," the third time he had been selected for the honor (see below).

San Francisco Skipper: Joe was named as manager of the San Francisco Giants on October 7, '76, replacing Bill Rigney, and finished fourth in the National League's western division with a 75-87 mark in '77.

The following year, the Giants improved to 89-73, the club's most victories since '71. San Francisco led the N.L. West for all but three days in a three-month period from May 12 thru August 15 before going 20-23 over the final month and a half to finish third. For his efforts, Joe was chosen as the N.L.'s "manager of the year" by the Associated Press. Jim Dwyer played under Joe for part of the '78 season.

In '79, the Giants won seven of their first nine games but were in fourth place with a 61-79 record when Joe was replaced by third base coach **Dave Bristol** on September 6.

System from '63-'76, the final 11 as a very successful manager at all levels. His record in that span was 787-613 (.562) with his 11-year tenure matching Earl Weaver for the second longest in O's history behind Cal Ripken, who logged 13 plus seasons as a minor league skipper. Joe gulded his clubs to five first place finishes and was named his league's "manager of the year" three times.

Rochester: In his six seasons as manager of Baltimore's triple-A farm club ('71-'76), Joe led the Red Wings to a 502-351 record (.589), including four regular season first place finishes and two league championships. In his first season at Rochester, the Wings won the league crown and defeated American Association champ Denver to capture the Junior World Series, earning Joe "manager of the year" honors in the International League. That club included league "mvp" Bobby Grich, Don Baylor, and 12 others who played in the majors.

The Wings also won the league championship in '74 when he was selected both as the I.L.'s top skipper and as "Minor League Manager of the Year" by the **Sporting News**.

Five current Orioles played under Joe in the minor leagues, all at Rochester: Rich Dauer ('75 & '76, was I.L. "mvp" and batting champ in '76); Mike Flanagan ('75 & '76, was I.L. top lhp in '75); Dennis Martinez ('75 & '76, was I.L. top rhp in '76); Scott McGregor (was top lhp in '76); Eddie Murray ('76) . . . In addition O's pitching coach Ray Miller played for Joe from '71-'73.

Other Levels: After serving as a player-coach at Rochester in '65 and the first part of '66, Joe was named manager at Bluefield in June '66 . . . He guided the O's to the Appalachian League pennant in '67 and was named the loop's top manager. He played briefly at Elmira prior to the start of the Appalachian League season in '67 and also saw action in 11 games (two as a pitcher) for Dallas-Fort Worth in '70.

Previous Playing Career: Joe played 15 full professional seasons as a first baseman with the Cleveland Indians, Los Angeles Dodgers, Minnesota Twins, and Orioles' organizations ... He signed originally with the Indians and in his first pro season in '51 he finished fourth in the Florida State League in batting (.341) and second in hits (.204). That year he also hit in 36 consecutive games, an F.S.L. record that still stands.

He spent all or parts of 12 seasons at the triple-A level and led the international League with 31 homers and 105 rbi at Montreal in '60.

Majors: He made his major league debut with Cleveland in '55 and also played most of the '57 campaign with the Tribe as a reserve first baseman-outfielder . . . He also saw action in 41 games for the Minnesota Twins in '61, the Twins' first season in Minnesota after moving from Washington.

Personal: He was an all-city selection in baseball, football, and basketball at Detroit's Eastern High School (graduated '50) . . . Joe also played American Legion baseball in Detroit.

He has lived in Rochester for many years and spent several offseasons working for the Rochester recreation department . . . Is very involved in a number of charities in the Rochester area . . . Hobbies: hoting and woodworking . . Joe and his wife, the former Pat Wooten, were married on May 3, '52, and are the parents of four boys: Mike (7/8/53), Mark (5/23/55), Jerry (5/7/63), and Joe (7/13/69) and two girls: Jody (10/26/56) and Jackle (4/9/60).

Pinch-Hitting: One of 9 players in major league history to have over 100 career pinch-hits ... Sixth on all-time list with 109 ... Lifetime pinch-hit average is .260 (109-for-420, 5 hrs, 69 rbi and 53 walks) ... Onbase pct. of .353 (174-for-493) ... With O's only as a pinch-hitter he batted .285 (79-for-277, 5 hrs, 54 rbi, 32 walks) with an on-base mark of .383 (87-for-218).

Pinch-Homers: Hit 5 lifetime pinch-hit homers including 2 grand slams . . . Hit them off Cleveland's Larry Andersen at Baltimore on Sep. 9, '77 and Kansas City's Mike Armstrong, Aug. 8, '82.

1982: Hit career pinch-hit no. 100 off Kansas City's Dan Quisenberry on Aug. 6... Also contributed 2 of the O's record-setting 11 pinch-hit home runs that season.

Best Season '80: Set personal highs in runs (30), hits (67), home runs (12) and rbi (50) . . . Hit 3rd grand slam of career off Chicago's LaMarr Hoyt on Aug. 5 and drove in winning run 3 times in late innings.

ALCS/WS: Appeared in 2 world series with O's ('70, '79) and one with Cincinnati ('75) ... Played in LCS each of those years ... Hit .250 (3-for-12) in post season.

'79 World Series: Delivered the game-winning hit of game #4 in O's 9-6 win over Pittsburgh ... Blasted a bases-loaded double off Pirate reliever Kent Tekulve scoring tying and winning runs ... His blow highlighted a 6-run 8th inning for the O's.

Minors: Spent parts of 7 seasons in the minor leagues ... Had best year at Rochester in '77, his last in the minors . . . Led International League in homers (30), despite being called up to Baltimore on Aug. 12 .. Finished 2nd in IL "MVP" voting to Pawtucket's Ted Cox ... Picked for all-star team . . . Hit .308 (124-for-403) that season with 80 rbi.

Amateur Background: "Crow" was scouted and signed for the O's by Frank McGowan, Walter Shannon, and the late Joe Torre, Sr.... He enjoyed an outstanding baseball career at Staten Island's Curtis High and later played baseball at Long Island University.

He is one of several 1st basemen to have made it to the majors from New York City: Lou Gehrig, Frank and Joe Torre, and Joe Pepitone, Mike Flore, Ed Kranepool, and Curt Blefary (born in Brooklyn) are among the others.

Personal: Terry and his wife, the former Janet Boyle, have 4 children: Karlen (1/19/64), Terry, Jr. (1/2/68), Jimmy (10/16/69), and Karen (8/29/76). He operates a baseball camp in Cockeysville during the summer.

ELLIE HENDRICKS (Cont.)

Coach: Ellie was appointed bullpen coach in Nov. '77 ... He also served as a player-coach for parts of the '78 and '79 seasons ... He has also supervised off-season workouts the last 5 winters for players living in the Baltimore area.

He was the American League's batting practice catcher and bullpen coach for the 1982 all-star game in Montreal.

'79 Season: He coached exclusively all year until Sep. 1 when the roster expanded to 40 men . . . He made only one appearance, in a game at Detroit on Sep. 19, and went 0-for-1 with a throwing error from behind the plate . . . He was not eligible for post-season play.

'78 Season: He started the season as a coach, but was activated six weeks later (on May 18) replacing **Gary Roenicke** who was optioned to Rochester. Ellie remained on the player list for the remainder of the year while also continuing as a coach.

Last Home Run: Ellie hit his last big league home run on Aug. 23, a blast off Oakland's Dave Heaverlo.

'78 Batting/ERA Leader: In 13 games Ellie batted .333 (6-for-18), and in his one career pitching stint he compiled a 0.00 era, thus leading the club in both categories (actually he tied **Dave Ford** in era ... Ford pitched 15 scoreless innings in Sep.).

His pitching career took place in Toronto on June 26 where the 0's were absorbing a 24-10 pasting by the Blue Jays . . . Ellie worked 2.1 innings, allowing no runs, one hit and one walk while putting an end to the carnage that had been inflicted on four predecessors (Mike Flanagan, Joe Kerrigan, Tippy Martinez and Larry Harlow) . . . Don Stanhouse then pitched the final inning and, inspired by Ellie's effort, he, too, held the Jays scoreless.

Yankees, '76-'77: In '76 Ellie played in 26 games for the Yankees after the June 15 trade from Baltimore and batted .210 (12-for-57).

Ellie spent '77 shuttling between New York and Syracuse. He played in only 10 games for the Yankees and was not eligible for post-season play.

Orioles ('68-'76): Ellie had been with the O's for nearly 9 full years when he was traded to the Cubs for Tommy Davis in Aug. '72... However, when the season ended, he was reacquired by Baltimore.

100 Qamesi/Year: Ellie played in more than 100 games in each of the O's 3 pennant-winning seasons of '69-'70-'71 ... He and Andy Etchebarren more or less split the regular catching job from '68 thru '71

Weaver/Lane: Earl Weaver and Frank Lane were instrumental in convincing the O's to draft him from the Angels' AAA Seattle affiliate in Nov. '67... Ellie had played for Weaver in Puerto Rico previously and Lane had scouted him in Mexico.

Odds and Ends: Ellie hit 2 grand slams for the Birds, both in Memorial Stadium: July 20, '70 off Chicago's Barry Moore, and Aug. 18, '75 off the Twins Dave Goltz . . . He nearly alway caught when Mike Cuellar was pitching . . . He led the O's in batting on the '71 Japan tour with a .400 average (16-for-40).

ALCS/WS: He compiled a .273 average (18-for-66) in 23 postseason games for the O's and Yankees (comprising five championship and four world series).

'70 WS: Ellie hit .364 (4-for-11) against the Reds with a home run and double and contributed significantly to the O's wins at Cincinnati in games 1 and 2.

In the opener, the Reds jumped out 3-0, but Ellie tied it in the 5th with a home run off **Gary Nolan** and the O's went on to win on Brooks' homer in the 7th... There was a play in the Cincinnati 6th in which Ellie was involved and that was as important as the home run ... See "Carbo-Burkhart Incident" below.

"Carbo-Burkhart" Incident: One inning after Ellie had tied the game with his home run, the Reds had Bernie Carbo on 3rd, representing the lead run, and only one out (Brooks had retired Lee May leading off the inning on a sensational play).

Pinch-hitter Ty Cline then chopped a high bouncer in front of the plate ... As Ellie went out and grabbed it, Carbo headed home. Ellie dove and tagged Carbo a few feet up the line and Umpire Ken Burkhart, who had been spun around by the runners as they converged so that his back was to the play, called Carbo out.

Films later revealed that Ellie had tagged Carbo with one hand while holding the ball in the other, and that Carbo had missed the plate.

Puerto Rico: Ellie played for Santurce in the Puerto Rico Winter League each year from '60-'77, except in '71 when the O's went to Japan . . . His 112 homers in that loop rank him second on the all-time list to former St. Louis Browns outfielder Willard Brown (120).

Minors: He enjoyed his best minor league seasons in Jalisco in the Mexican League (AAA) where he hit 109 homers in 4 years and was known as the "Babe Ruth of Mexico" . . . In his last season there (67), he led the league in homers (41) and was second in rbi (112).

He started his career in the Milwaukee Braves' organization ('59-'60), then spent 2 years at Winnipeg in the Cardinals system ('62-'63) before going to Mexico.

Personal: Ellie is one of the most popular personalities ever to wear an Orioles uniform ... He is an accomplished after-dinner speaker and is very active in community projects in the Baltimore area ... Speaks fluent Spanish ... Plays the flute.

Ellie was selected as the first "man of the year" by the Baltimore chapter of the National Conference of Christians and Jews in Feb. '83 in recognition of his outstanding service to the community.

He has operated a two-week baseball camp for youngsters the past 3 summers.

He and his wife, Merie, were married Jan. 14, '70 and are the parents of two sons: Ryan (8/3/72) and Ian Christopher (11/28/76). They have lived in the Randallstown area, near Baltimore, since the early '70's.

Ellie has 4 children by a previous marriage: Abegall (7/13/62), Elrod, Jr., (4/7/64), Elroy (10/17/65), and Berecla (8/25/67).

Coach: Cal joined the Orioles' coaching staff in '76, replacing George Staller, who had retired after the '75 season... Served as the O's bullpen coach until June 27, '77, when he took over at 3rd base following Billy Hunter's appointment as manager of the Texas Rangers.

Father and Son: Cal's son, Cal, Jr. joined the Orioles in '81, giving the Birds one of the few father-son combinations on the same team in major league history. Among the others are Connie (manager) and Earle (player) Mack of the Philadelphia A's (1910-11, 1914), Jim (coach) and Mike (player) Hegan of the New York Yankees (1964, '66-'67, '73) and Yogi (mgr.) and Dale (player) Berra also of the Yankees. For biography on Cal, Jr., see page 162.

In addition, Cal's youngest son, **Billy** was selected by Baltimore in the June '82 free agent draft (11th round, regular phase). Billy, an 18-year-old shortstop, played at Bluefield (Appalachian League) in '82 & '83 and at Hagerstown last year.

Scout: In '75, he turned to scouting, primarily at the professional level . . . In addition, did some free agent scouting and also served as a "trouble shooter" in the farm system.

Managing: Cal managed in the Orioles' farm system from '61 thru '74, a span of 13 plus seasons that is the longest tenure of any minor league skipper in O's history. Earl Weaver and Joe Altobelli are tied for 2nd with 11 years each . . . During that period, Cal managed at all levels except "rookie" league.

As a player-manager had a losing record in 2 seasons, then retired from active status following the '62 campaign . . . In 12 years as a non-playing skipper finished below .500 only once.

Won the 1st of 2 pennants at Aberdeen (Northern League) by 12 games with a club that included Jim Palmer, Andy Etchebarren, Eddle Watt, and Mark Belanger... Was chosen "manager of the year" in that loop ... Finished 1st again in '72 at Asheville in the AA Southern league.

Was the Rochester manager in '69 and '70 (preceding Joe Altobelli), then moved to Dallas-Ft. Worth (AA-Texas) in '71 ... Last 3 seasons as a manager were at Asheville, '72 thru '74.

Earlier had managed clubs in Leesburg, Fla. (his 1st managerial assignment in '61); Appleton, Wis. ('62); Aberdeen, S.D. ('63, '64, '66); Kennewick-Richland-Pasco, Wash. (Tri-City) ('65); Miami, Fla. ('67); and Elmira, N.Y. ('68).

Playing Career: Was a catcher in the O's organization although also played 3rd base and the outfield and even pitched . . . Enjoyed best year under Earl Weaver at Fox Cities (I.I.I. League) in '60 . . . Became a player-manager for 1st time midway thru the '61 season.

Personal: Conducts a number of clinics and works for the O's speaker's bureau during the off-season . . . His brother, Bill, played the outfield in the Brooklyn Dodgers' organization.

Cal and his wife, VI, were married on Nov. 30, '57... They have 4 children: Ellen Leigh (3/22/59), Calvin, Jr. (8/24/60), Fred (11/25/61), and Billy (12/16/64).

FRANK ROBINSON

Born: Aug. 31, '35; 6'1"; 195; Batted, R; Threw, R; Position: OF

Birthplace/Residence: Born in Beaumont, Texas, but grew up in Oakland, Cal.... Now lives in Bel Air, Cal. (near Los Angeles).

Tenure: Beginning his 33rd year in professional baseball including 26½ years in majors as player, manager, and coach.

Originally Signed with: Cincinnati.



Frank begins his 3rd tour of duty with the Orioles, his 2nd as a coach ... This will be his 10th season in an O's uniform.

Hall of Fame: He was elected to the Hall of Fame at Cooperstown in '82 along with Hank Aaron after being named on 89% of the ballots cast (370-415). That was the 1st of 4 straight years during which a former Oriole has been elected to the Hall. Frank is one of only 15 to have been elected to the Hall in his 1st year of eligibility (that list includes former teammate Brooks Robinson and Lou Brock who was chosen in Jan. '85.

Frank was the 2nd of 6 ex-O's to be so honored (date of election in paren): Robin Roberts (76), Brooks Robinson (83), George Kell (83), Luis Aparicio (84) and Hoyt Wilhelm (85). In his official portrait at Cooperstown, he is wearing a Baltimore uniform.

MANAGING/COACHING

He has managed the Cleveland Indians ('75-'77), Rochester Red Wings ('78) and San Francisco Giants (81-'84), as well as the Santurce Crabbers in the Puerto Rican League for 8 winters and the Culiacan club in the Mexican Pacific Winter League ('77-'78).

Made a dramatic debut as playing manager on Apr. 8, '75, before some 55,000 opening day fans at Cleveland Stadium. In his 1st at bat of that 1st game (he was dh, batting 2nd), Frank homered off Doc Medich (Boog Powell later homered in the same half-inning).

The Indians went on to win, 5-3, and that effort was voted "most memorable moment" in Tribe history by fans during baseball's observance of the U.S. Bicentennial celebration.

In that 1st year, the Indians fell 15 games below .500 by late June, but rallied and wound up 4th, just one game under . . . The next year, '76, they were 3 over. However, after a slow start in '77, Frank was released and succeeded by Jeff Torborg.

Frank became a big league coach for the 1st time after the Indians let him go as manager in '77. He joined Dave Garcia who had been his 3rd base coach at Cleveland ('75-'76) and was then managing the Angels.

He returned to Baltimore and coached for the O's for part of '78 and all of '79 and '80. During that period, he was responsible for vastly improving the quality of the O's outfield defense, and in '80 replaced Jim Frey (who left to manage the K.C. Royals) as the O's batting & 1st base coach.

Last season after being released by the Giants, he served the Milwaukee Brewers as batting coach.

San Francisco Glants: Was named manager Jan. 14, '81, replacing Dave Bristol (who had in turn replaced Joe Altobelli), and led the club to its first winning season since Altobelli did it in '78, and the first back-to-back winning seasons in a decade ('81 & '82)... After finishing 3rd in '82, the Giants dipped below .500 in '83 and '84 and on Aug. 4 last year Frank was dismissed in favor of Danny Ozark who was named interim skipper.

During his tenure with the Giants, two former O's served on his coaching staff—Don Buford and Herm Starrette.

Rochester '78: Started the season as an O's coach, but after the late Ken Boyer was named manager of the St. Louis Cardinals (Apr. 28), Frank replaced him (May 9) at the Red Wings' helm.

He was 58-64 at Rochester which finished 6th. Doc Edwards was hired to manage the Wings in '79, and Frank returned to the O's as a coach, helping the O's to an A.L. pennant.

Cleveland '75-'76-'77: Joined Indians as player on Sep. 12, '74 from California in trade that ultimately sent Rusty Torres and Ken Suarez to the Angels . . . Then, 3 weeks later, on Oct. 4, the day after that season ended, he was named the first black major league manager in baseball history, replacing Ken Aspromonte.

PLAYING CAREER

Major League Leader: He played for 21 seasons in the majors and is among the top ranking players of all time in 10 categories.

His 586 home runs represent the fourth highest figure in major league history behind Hank Aaron (755), Babe Ruth (714), Willie Mays (660)... Harmon Killebrew (572) and Mickey Mantle (536) are fifth and sixth respectively.

In addition, Frank ranks high in the following: games-2,808 (9th), at bats-10,006 (11th) . . . runs-1,829 (9th) . . . hits-2,943 (18th) . . . doubles-528 (17th) . . . rbi-1,812 (9th) . . . total bases-5,373 (6th) . . . walks-1,420 (13th) and hit by pitch-198 (2nd) . . . The only player to have been hit with more baseballs is Ron Hunt (243), former National League infielder.

"MVP," Both Leagues: He is the only player ever to win BBWAA "mvp" award in both major leagues... He won the N.L. award in '61 and the A.L. in '66... In addition, he was "mvp" in the '66 World Series and '71 All Star Game.

Triple Crown: Is one of only 11 players to have won the "triple crown" (accomplished 13 times, two each by Ted Williams and Rogers Hornsby) . . . Frank did it in '66 with the O's. He, Mantle ('56), and Carl Yastrzemski ('67) are the only triple crown winners in the past 31 years (since Williams' second in '47).

HOME RUNS

He hit 343 in the N.L. and 243 in the A.L. . . . 388 were hit off right-handers and 198 off lefthanders.

Vs. N.L. Opponents: Astros (Colts)-11 ... Braves-54 ... Cardinals-46 ... Cubs-54 ... Dodgers-42 ... Expos-0 ... Giants-49 ... Mets-12 ... Padres-1 ... Phillies-38 ... Pirates-34 ... Reds-2.

Vs. A.L. Opponents: Angels-14 ... A's-20 ... Brewers (Pilots)-14 ... Indians-25 ... Orioles-6 ... Rangers (Senators)-31 ... Red Sox-37 ... Royals-15 ... Tigers-28 ... Twins-22 ... White Sox-17 ... Yankees-14.

33 Parks: Frank holds the major league record for hitting home runs in most ballparks (33), including both regular season and world series play . . . Hank Aaron is second at 32.

Among those, Crosley Field in Cincinnati (176) and Memorial Stadium in Baltimore (103) rank one-two in frequency...There were four stadia in which he played but did not hit a home run: Houston's Astrodome, Montreal's Expos Stadium, Sicks' Stadium in Seattle ('69 only) and Busch Stadium in St. Louis.

In regular season play Frank homered in 32 parks . . . His 33rd was Pittsburgh's Three Rivers in the '71 World Series . . . Aaron homered in 31 parks in regular season but added Yankee Stadium in the '57 World Series .

Grand Slams: Hit a total of seven slams, five of them in the N.L... His only two bases loaded homers in the A.L. were hit in successive innings on Aug. 20, '70 at R.F.K. Stadium in Washington off Senators' Joe Coleman and Joe Grzenda... Frank, Jim Gentile, and Jim Northrup are the only ones ever to hit slams in successive plate appearances, though a total of seven have hit two in one game.

FRANK ROBINSON (Cont.)

2 or More/Game: Hit two or more homers in a game 54 times (ranks 5th in major league history) ... Hit three in a game for Reds at Crosley Field vs. St. Louis on Aug. 22, '59 ... Had 16 two-homer games for O's.

HR Odds and Ends: Hit his first at Wrigley Field off the Cubs' Paul Minner on Apr. 28, '56 and his last at Anaheim Stadium on July 6, '76 off the Angels' Sid Monge ... Hit most off N.L. righthander Larry Jackson (10) . . . Hit the first homer and scored the first run in ALCS history, in game one '69 at Baltimore off the Twin's Jim Perry.

HRs-Orioles: Hit his 500th major league homer in Baltimore in the second game of a twi-night doubleheader against the Tigers' lefthander Fred Scherman Sep. 13, '71. At the time, he ranked 11th on the all-time list just behind Harmon Killebrew who had reached that milestone earlier that year ... After leaving Baltimore, Frank jumped past Killebrew, Mel Ott, Ernie Banks, Eddle Mathews, Ted Williams, Jimmy Foxx and Mickey Mantle.

Frank became the first (and only) player ever to hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium on May 8, '66 (second game) when he blasted a Luis Tlant (Cleveland) offering over the left field stands into the parking lot beyond . . . The drive measured 451' on the fly and rolled to a stop 540 away from the plate (the longest measured hr in Memorial Stadium history was hit by Killebrew 471' on the fly to center off Milt Pappas on May 24, '65).

He set a major league record by hitting ten home runs in the month of April, '69, but that mark has since been pushed to 11 by Willie Stargel, Mike Schmidt and Graig Nettles.

Set a club record with 49 homers in '66 . . . Also set marks that year for most homers by an Oriole against one opponent (11 vs. Det.) and most home runs, Memorial Stadium (27).

Last Game as a Player: Frank played in his last game on Sep. 18, '76 at Cleveland vs. Baltimore. He put himself in as pinch-hitter for Frank Duffy in the eighth inning and singled in a run off Rudy May.

All-Star Games: Appeared in 11 all-star games as a player (six with Cincinnati, four with Baltimore and one with California) and served as a coach in '76 while managing for Cleveland . . . Was "mvp" in '71 game at Detroit . . . Hit a two-run homer off Dock Ellis to put A.L. ahead to stay in third inning (Reggle Jackson hit another with one on off Ellis in same inning) . .

Hit .250 (6-for-24) in all-star play with two home runs . . . Went 3-for-3 for the N.L. in '59 (at L.A. Coliseum) and homered off Early Wynn.

World Series: Hit two key homers in '66 vs. Dodgers, both off Don Drysdale, to win Sport Magazine sports car . . . Hit his first in the opening inning of game one in Dodger Stadium with Russ Snyder aboard (Brooks followed immediately with another and the O's led 3-0 before the Dodgers batted) . . . O's won the game 5-2 . . . In game four his fourth inning solo provided the only run as the O's completed their sweep behind Dave McNally, 1-0.

In '71, game six vs. Pittsburgh in Baltimore, Frank's base running in the 10th inning allowed the O's to tie the series at three games apiece... He drew a one out walk, and despite ailing legs and sore Achilles tendon, went from first to third on Merv Rettenmund's single up the middle just evading Richie Hebner's tag with a head first slide . . . Then, he scored on Brooks' short sac fly to Vic Davalillo in center.

Cincinnati: Spent ten full years with the Reds after three seasons in their farm system. Was N.L. "rookie of the year" in '56... Tied league record for homers by a rookie (38, set by Wally Berger of the Braves), and set a rookie mark by being hit by pitched balls 20 times.

Won gold glove in '58 . . . Led the N.L. three straight years in slugging percentage ('60-'61-'62) ... Set personal career highs in '62 in average (.342), hits (208), doubles (51) and rbi (136) . . . Set N.L. record by leading in hit by pitcher for six straight years ('60 thru '65).

Baltimore: O's won four A.L. pennants and two world championships during his six years in Baltimore.

Won triple crown, and "mvp" awards in A.L. and world series in '66 ... In addition to leading the league in average (.316), home runs (49) and rbi (122), he also paced the loop in total bases (367), runs (122) and slugging percentage (.637).

Was batting .337 in late June '67 when he sustained serious injury in a second base collision with the White Sox' Al Wels . . . Missed a month and suffered from double vision for a year and a half afterward ... Though he wound up with a .311 average that year, he slipped to .268 (with 15 homers and 52 rbi) in '68 while still recovering from that injury, compounded by an attack of the mumps and a muscle tear in his right

He returned to form the following spring and helped lead the O's to three straight pennants in '69, '70 and '71.

Following his trade to the Dodgers in Dec. '71, Frank's uniform #20 was retired. He was the first Oriole player to be so honored . . . In '77 he and Brooks became the first players to be inducted into the new Orioles Hall of Fame, originated by the Oriole Advocates in cooperation with the ballclub. Dave McNally has since joined them.

Dodgers-Angels: After one year ('72) with the Dodgers, Frank was traded to the Angels with infielders Billy Grabarkewitz and Bobby Valentine, and pitchers Bill Singer and Mike Strahler in deal for infielder Ken McMullen and pitcher Andy Messersmith (Dec. 2, '71).

Personal: One of 11 children . . . Graduated from McClymonds High School (Oakland) . . . Was basketball teammate of Bill Russell and played baseball there with Vada Pinson, Willie Tasby and Charlie Beamon . . . Hobbies: movies and music . . . Attended Xavier University in Cincinnati.

Frank and his wife, the former Barbara Anne Cole, were married Oct. 28, '61 ... They have two children: Frank Kevin (9/8/62) and Nichelle (8/24/65) . . . Barbara is a real estate agent in the Bel Air area.

seasons, including a pair of league championships.

In '80 he led the O's class AA team at Charlotte to the Southern League crown ... The O's won the Eastern Division first half title but slipped to fourth in the second half before rebounding in the playoffs to beat Savannah, three games to none, and Memphis, three games to one, for the title . . . In '79 Charlotte also won the first half title but was eliminated by Columbus, Ga. in the first round of the playoffs.

The previous year, his first with the Orioles, Jimmy directed class A Miami of the Florida State League to the second half title, knocked off FL Myers in a one-game divisional playoff, then erased the Lakeland Tigers in a best of three final to win the pennant.

Managing/Coaching Background: Jimmy has logged 17 years as a minor league manager in the farm systems of the Dodgers (63, '64, '76-'77), A's ('65 thru '69), Astros ('70 thru '74) and Orioles and owns over 1100 wins . . . He also spent the '75 season as the third base coach for the Houston Astros on the major league level.

His first of four pennants came in the Florida State League when he managed for the A's at Leesburg in '66 . . . That year his club was 50-14 in the first half, fell to fifth in the seond half, but came back to beat St. Petersburg in the FSL playoffs . . . That club led organized baseball with 232 stolen bases in 132 games, a FSL record that still stands, while Allen Lewis, who went on to become Charlie Finley's "designated runner" stole 116, also a league mark . . . Jimmy also managed at Leesburg in '67 and put in another FSL campaign with the Astros at Cocoa in '72

Jimmy joined the Houston organization in '70 and won a pennant at Columbus in the Southern League (he also managed at Columbus in '74) ... He has managed at every level but "rookie" including four years at AAA: '69 (Des Moines), '71 (Oklahoma City), '73 (Denver), all in the American Association, and '77 (Alburquerque) of the Pacific Coast League.

He has also managed in: Santa Barbara ('63, California), Grand Forks ('64, Northern), Shelby ('65, Western Carolinas), Newport News ('68, Carolina), and Lodi ('76, California) . . . Served as a player-coach at Omaha (American Association) in '62.

Playing Career: He played for 18 years ('47 thru '64) as an outfielder in the Dodger's system including occasional appearances in his first two years as a manager . . . He was outstanding in his first professional season in '47, earning "rookie of the year" honors in the Wisconsin State League and batting a composite .367 with three different clubs That year he amassed 163 hits, 27 doubles, 15 triples, 12 homers, 121 rbi and 24 stolen bases in 117 games.

In '49 at Pueblo, he broke a Western league record with 42 stolen bases (in 43 attempts) . . . That mark was later broken by current Orioles' scout and field coordinator Len Johnson who swiped 64 at Colorado Springs in '53.

Jimmy never played in the majors but put five seasons at the AAA level ('55 thru '57 at Montreal in the International League) and '59 and '62 in the American Association . . . He hit over .300 in five different seasons.

Personal: Jimmy graduated from DeLaSalle High School in Toronto where he lettered in baseball, hockey, football, and lacrosse ... He played minor league hockey (right wing) for the old Boston Olympics in the early 1950's and still performs as a defenseman for Pueblo's top semi-pro team in the off-season . . . His other hobbies include golf, tennis, and remodeling homes.

Jimmy and his wife, the former Lorraine Elliott, were married Sep. 21, '50 . . . They have two sons, Chris (6/10/52) and Kirk (11/11/56) and one daughter, Julie (2/19/61). He was honored as Pueblo's "Sportsman of the Year" for 1983.

On Oct. 18 **Dr. Lewis Yocum** performed surgery which included transplantation of a tendon from his left wrist to the right elbow...Did not pick up a baseball for the next 9 months, then embarked on a long and gradual program in which he ultimately began throwing on the side and eventually worked up to 3/4 of velocity... However, he did not pitch competitively again until spring training of '84.

Developed tendinitis of right elbow while still in minors during '75 season . . . Condition worsened in '76 (eliminating Red Sox' plan to promote him) and he did not pitch over last 2 months . . .

Became exclusively a relief pitcher on Aug. 3, '80 (has not started since) . . . As a **starter** his career figures are: 30-32 with a 4.25 era (559 ip, 264 er) over 91 games . . . In **relief** he is 15-9 with 27 saves and a 2.76 era (228.1 ip, 70 er) in 114 appearances.

Septembers: Has had notable success pitching in the heat of the pennant race in September since breaking in with the Red Sox during stretch run in '77 . . . Went 6-2 after coming up late in July and was 3-1 in Sep. that year.

Is 1-6 lifetime vs. O's . . . His only victory, a 6-4 verdict in relief over Tippy Martinez on May 1, '82 at Baltimore.

California Angels: Was 1st Orange County native ever to play with Angels . . . In '78, his 1st year with Angels, he was 8-8 thru August, then went 3-0 in Sep. as Cal. finished tied for 2nd with Texas behind the Royals (Angels best finish ever to that point) . . . That late spurt gave him a 6-1 Sep.-Oct. mark in 2 big league seasons.

In both '79 and '80 he opened season as starter, but went to bullpen during the 2nd half . . . His shift to the bullpen in Aug. of '80 represented a career change (See "Relieving/Starting above) . . . Was 8-9 as a starter in '79 and only modestly successful in relief (1-1, 1 sv, 6.30 era).

In '80, however, after compiling a 5-13 record and a 4.90 era as a starter, he was 3-0, with 2 saves plus an era of 2.08 in 19 relief appearances. That success precipitated his permanent assignment to the bullpen ...

MIKE BODDICKER (Cont.)

Received 3 1st place votes for BBWAA's A.L. Cy Young Award ... Totaled 41 points in the voting (5-3-1) to finish 4th behind Detroit's Willie Hernandez (12 1sts, 88 pts.), Kansas City's Dan Quisenberry (9 1sts, 71 pts.) and Cleveland's Bert Blyleven (4 1sts, 45 pts.).

Second in the major leagues in complete games (16), tied for 2nd in shutouts (4) and was 5th in innings pitched with a career-high 261.1.

Named as the righthanded pitcher on A.L. all-star teams selected by TSN and UPI... Selected for all-star game, but did not pitch... Twice selected A.L. "player of the week" and named the league's "pitcher of the month" in May.

After losing all 3 decisions in April (4.23 era), was 20-8 (233 ip, 68 er, 2.61) the rest of season . . . Led O's in strikeouts (128) . . . Tied with Mike Flanagan for most starts (34).

May: Posted a 6-1 record and a 1.72 era (57.2 ip, 11 er) and was named A.L. "pitcher of the month" ... First victory of season came on May 1, a 3-0 6-hit shutout vs. Cleveland's Bert Blyleven, which included a season-high 9 strikeouts ... Began month with string of 36.2 innings allowing only 2 earned runs ... Won 7 of 8 beginning May 1 (66.2 ip, 12 er, 1.62 era) ... Was 10-4 (109 ip, 31 er, 2.56 era) from May 1 to the all-star break.

Six Straight: Had a loss and no decision in 1st 2 starts after all-star game, but reeled off 6 straight wins from July 23 to Aug. 24 (50 lp, 12 er, 2.15 era) . . . Streak was broken in California on Aug. 29 . . . Streak was a career high a:id tied O's season-high with Storm Davis.

Strong Finish: Won 10 of his final 13 starts (108 ip, 32 er, 2.65 era) . . . Completed his last 5 starts, starting Sep. 9 and was 3.2.

20 Wins: Gained his 20th win in 1st and only attempt in last start of season Sep. 29 at Boston . . . Scattered 12 hits in 6-3 win . . . Became the O's 25th 20-game winner and 23rd over the last 17 seasons . . . First since '80 when both Steve Stone (25 wins) and Scott McGregor (20) reached that level . . .

Only one other Oriole has had a 20-win season so early in his major league career (**Wayne Garland** won 20 in '76, his 2nd full season).

The major leagues had 2 other 20-game winners in '84: Joaquin Andujar of the St. Louis Cardinals and Rick Sutcliffe, who won 4 games with Cleveland and 16 with the Chicago Cubs . . .

By Month: Apr.: 0-3, 5 gs, 4.23 era ... May: 6-1, 7 gs, 1.72 era ... June: 3-2, 5 gs, 3.09 era ... July: 3-2, 6 gs, 3.51 era ... Aug.: 4-1, 5 gs, 2.55 era ... Sep.: 4-2, 6 gs, 2.52 era.

Complete Games: Mike's 16 complete games were 2nd only to Charlie Hough of Texas, who had 17 to lead the majors . . . Most by an Oriole since Dennis Martinez had 18 and Mike Flanagan 16 in 79.

Near Finishes: In his last 15 starts, dating back to the all-star break, pitched at least 7.1 innings each time out ... In last 30 starts, failed to reach the 8th inning only 4 times ... Went at least 7 innings in all 20 wins.

1-Hitter: On Aug. 13, he threw the 25th one-hit game in 0's history ... Beat host Toronto, 2-1 ... Rance Mulliniks doubled and scored in the 3rd inning for Toronto ... Was also involved in a one-hitter Oct. 2, '83 teaming with Tippy Martinez and Sammy Stewart to beat New York, 2-0.

Shutouts: His 4 shutouts tied him with 7 others for the 2nd highest total in the majors behind California's Geoff Zahn and Boston's Bob Ojeda, who had 5 each ... Shut out California 5-0 on 6 hits on May 16 and 1-0 on 4 hits on Aug. 18 ... Beat Angels' top winner Mike Witt both times. Blanked Cleveland on 6 hits May 1 and shutout Milwaukee on 4 hits Sep. 19 ...

Took 2-hit shutout into the 9th vs. Cleveland on July 29, but needed relief help from Sammy Stewart to get a 3-1 combined 3-hit win . . . In 6-2 victory over Milwaukee on June 4, Mike lost a shutout with 2 out in the 9th on a 2-run homer by Cecil Cooper . . . Beat Seattle 8-2 on May 30 with out allowing an earned run.

Durable: His 261.1 innings were a career high (previous best was 202.2 ip in '83 with Baltimore, 179 ip, and Rochester, 23.2 ip)... Tied Joaquin Andujar of St. Louis, N.L. leader, for 4th in major leagues behind Dave Steib of Toronto (267.0), Charlie Hough of Texas (266.0) and Doyle Alexander of Toronto (261.2)... Mike's innings were the most by an Oriole since Dennis Martinez led A.L. with 292 in '79.

Vs. A.L. East: Finished with an 11-4 record against the A.L. East (124 ip, 34 er, 2.46 era) with 9 complete games . . . Eleven wins were most by any pitcher vs. the East . . . Beat Cleveland 3 times; Boston, New York, Milwaukee twice each; Detroit and Toronto once.

Feast or Famine vs. Angels: Shut out the Angels twice at home, but was treated roughly at Anaheim yielding 11 runs (10 earned) and 7 homers in 16 innings . . . Was 3-1 with a 2.65 era (34 ip, 10 er) vs. Angels . . . Pitched more against them than against any other club.

Fielding: Led all major league pitchers in successful total chances (98) and double plays (6) ... Detroit's Dan Petry was 2nd in majors in successful chances with 72 ... Mike tied an A.L. record for putouts by a pitcher in one season with 49 ... Also led league in errors with 7, all on pick-off plays.

Miscellaneous: Was 12-5 on road (141 ip, 52 er, 3.32 era), but had better era at home—2.17 (120.1 ip, 29 er) despite 8-6 record ... Threw only 4 of his 23 home run balls at home ... Half of his wind followed 0's losses and 5 times he ended losing streaks of 2 or more ... Allowed 2 runs or less in 20 of his 34 starts ... Appeared in one game as pinch runner and scored a run (July 4 at Min.).

1984 AND CAREER

ERA Leader: Mike's 2.79 era (261.1 ip, 218 h, 81 er) edged Toronto's Dave Steib (2.83 era, 267 ip, 215 h, 84 er) for the A.L. crown ... M.L. leader was Alejandro Pena of Los Angeles with 2.48 era (199.1 ip, 186 h, 55 er) ... Became 3rd Oriole to win the A.L. title ... Jim Palmer did it in '73 (2.40) and '75 (2.09) and Hoyt Wilhelm was 1st in '59 (2.19).

In '83, Mike's 2.77 era (179 ip, 141 h, 55 er) was 2nd lowest in the A.L. to Rick Honeycutt's 2.42 (174.2 ip, 168 h, 47 er) ... Though Honeycutt was traded by the Texas Rangers to the Los Angeles Dodgers on Aug. 19, he pitched more than the minimum qualifying standard of 162 innings and won the title.

O's All-Time: Mike's winning pct. (.649, 37-20) is 2nd best in O's history (minimum 50 decisions) to Steve Stone (.656, 40-21).

Career Starts: In 61 career starts (regular season), he has 26 complete games, 9 shutouts, and has pitched 7 innings or better on 40 occasions . . . Allowed 2 runs or less 35 times . . . Yielded 11, 10 and 12 hits in final 3 starts of '84, but has given up more than 9 hits only one other time in major league career.

Since WW 2: Since World War II, only 6 major league pitchers have won more games through their 1st 2 full seasons—Boo Ferriss, Boston, '45-46, 46 wins; Steve Busby, Kansas City, '72-74, 41 wins; Ron Guidry, NY Yankees, '77-78, 41 wins; Harvey Haddix, St. Louis, '52-54, 40 wins; Gary Peters, Chicago White Sox, '63-64, 39 wins; Larry Jansen, NY Giants, '47-48, 39 wins.

Among Major League Leaders: His 9 shutouts are the most in the majors during the past 2 seasons... His 36 wins are bettered only by Detroit's Jack Morris (39), and San Diego's Lamarr Hoyt, Detroit's Dan Petry, Chicago Cubs' Rick Sutcliffe, all with 37 ... Chicago's Richard Dotson has also won 36 games the past 2 seasons.

Tied for 2nd on club with 26 doubles (with Murray & behind Ripken-37) ... Was toughest Oriole to strikeout for 7th straight year (see "Strikeouts" below).

Batting: After May 18, his average hovered between a high of .263 (55-for-209) on June 17 and a low of .239 (78-for-236) on Aug. 25.

Fast Finish: Hit .324 (23-for-71) in final 24 games to raise his average from .239 to .254 . . . Snapped a 2-for-22 slump with a 7-for-9 effort in a 2-game stretch on Aug. 26 & 27 (at Oak. and Cal.) including 6 straight hits and also drove in the winning run in the 2nd game with a sac fly.

Closed strongly 2 previous years as well. Hit .312 (34-for-109) in last 37 games in '83 and .407 (22-for-54) over last 14 games in '82.

Strikeouts: Was 4th hardest to fan (min. 300 at bats) in A.L. at 1 for every 18.52 plate appearances behind Boston's Marty Barrett (1/21.04), New York's Don Mattingly (1/20.09) and Minnesota's Dave Engle (1/19.27). Three National Leaguers ranked ahead of Rich also, including major league leader Tony Gwynn of San Diego (1/29.34).

Went 30 games (87 plate appearances) without striking out (June 25 thru Aug. 8) ... His longest career streak was 32 games (141 plate appearances) in '81.

Led A.L. in strikeout "in-frequency" in '80 (1/32.5), was 3rd in '81 (1/22.44) and 2nd in '82 (1/18.41).

Lifetime among current players, he ranks 5th with 1 for every 18.78 appearances (212 k's in 3983 appearances) behind: Bill Buckner (1/22.66), Pirates' Johnny Ray (1/20.38), Gwynn (1/19.51) and the Dodgers' Bob Bailor (1/19.37), a former Oriole.

Vs. Opponents: Continued to excel against Angels ... Hit .326 (14-for-53) and picked up 2 of his 4 gwrbi at their expense. Has lifetime mark of .313 (100-for-220) vs. Cal. and has hit .364 (31-for-85) the past 2 seasons ... Batted .361 (13-for-36) against Yankees, including 8-for-18 (.444) at Yankee Stadium.

O's All-Time: One of only 8 players to have appeared in 1,000 games for the Orioles. Ranks 8th in games (1,055), hits (942) and at bats (3,621) . . . Is tied for 7th in doubles (186) with Dave Johnson and is 10th in runs (423) . . . Only Johnson has played more games at 2nd base for the O's than Dauer (944 to 892).

Miscellaneous: Bruised left shoulder against Boston June 19 and missed 5 games (Aug. 9-14) ... Missed 3 games in late May to be with wife, Chris, for birth of their 2nd daughter.

FIELDING

2nd Base: His .980 fielding average (11 e, 561 tc) was the lowest of his career (ranked 7th, tied with Damaso Garcia) ... Committed 9 miscues before all-star break and only 2 thereafter . . . Went 31 games without a boot between Aug. 3 and Sep. 16.

His career .987 percentage (54 e, 4,211 tc) is substantially higher than the existing major league record of .984, held jointly by Nellie Fox and former Pirate Dave Cash. However, a minimum of 1,000 games at the position is required to be eligible and Rich is currently at 892.

Ranked 1st in '81 (.989), 2nd in '82 (.987) and 4th in '83 (.988) among A.L. 2nd basemen.

Played 76 consecutive errorless games at 2nd (400 tc) from July 12, '80 until Apr. 25, '81 ... That was 2nd longest streak of career (see "Fielding Records" below).

RICH DAUER (Cont.)

3rd Base: Played only 3 games at 3rd base in '84, a career low Has appeared in 225 games at hot corner for O's including a high of 61 in '82 . . . Career pct. there is .964 (17 e, 470 tc).

Fielding Records: Holds 2 A.L. one season records for 2nd basemen, both set in '78 (Apr. 10 to Sep. 30); (1) 86 consecutive errorless games, and (2) 425 consecutive errorless chances.

At the time both were major league records, but they were eclipsed by Phillies Manny Trillo in '82 (89 games and 479 chances without error). Until he threw a ball away in the final game of '78, he hadn't made a 2nd base error all season.

Rich's errorless chance record broke the existing major league standard set by the late **Ken Hubbs** (Cubs) in '62 (418). Ironically, **Hubbs** who was killed in a crash of a plane he was piloting in Feb. '64 was from **Rich's** hometown of Colton, Ca.

Despite his nearly perfect season defensively at 2nd in '78 (.998), **Rich** did not qualify for fielding percentage leadership because he played too few games (87 played, 108 required).

PREVIOUS CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

1983: Despite fast finish, hit for lowest career average (.235) ... Went 1-for-25 in first 7 post-season games, then exploded in 4th game of World Series at Philadelphia, and went 3-for-4 with 3 rbi in the 0's 5-4 win.

1982: Set career highs for games (158), at bats (558), runs (75), triples (2), and walks (50) while leading O's with 11 sacrifice hits ... Played almost exclusively at 2nd base until early July, then alternated between 2nd (vs. righthanders) and 3rd (vs. lefthanders) the rest of the season . . . That change was a result of Cal Ripken's moving from 3rd to shortstop.

1981: Led the Orioles in doubles and topped A.L. 2nd basemen in fielding . . . Was batting .284 thru Aug. 28 but hit just .226 the rest of the way.

1980: Had best overall season ... Set personal highs in 7 offensive categories, including average (.284) and rbi (63), led A.L. in strikeout "in-frequency", and was 2nd among league's 2nd basemen in fielding percentage.

1979: Tied Eddie Murray for the club lead with 14 gamewinning rbi and set a career high with 9 homers ... Drew 4 of his 36 walks in one game, vs. Oakland on May 8 at Baltimore.

1978: Became a full-time regular on June 12, 1st as a 3rd base substitute for the injured **Doug DeCinces**, then when **Doug** returned, as starting 2nd baseman.

1976-77: Came up to O's 1st time in Sep. '76 and went 4-for 39 in 11 games. Then in '77, started as regular at 2nd, but went 0-for -26 until May 13 and was only 1-for -41 thru May 31 ... At that point his major league career average was .063 (5-for -80). Also had 0-for -25 string at Memorial Stadium (including 0-for -5 in '76) before getting his 1st hit at home on June 11, '77 (off Chicago's Ken Brett).

After 1-for-41 start, Rich batted .278 (73-for-263) the rest of '77 ... Recorded his 1st big league hit in his 1st at bat, on Sep. 11², '76, a single off Brewers' Jim Colborn at Milwaukee.

Minor League Career: Spent only 3 seasons in the minors after jumping directly from Univ. of Southern California campus to the "AA" Southern league in '74 after being signed by Ray Poitevint ... Had been selected 3 times previously in free agent draft by Oakland (twice) and Cleveland before chosen 1st by Baltimore in June '74.

Won International League batting title at Rochester in '76 (.336)... Was also selected as league's "co-mvp" with Mickey Klutts of Syracuse and Toledo's Joe Lis, named to I.L. all-star team, and topped loop in hits (176).

String was snapped at Tor. Aug. 11 . . . Took 2-1 lead into 9th but lost 3-2 on 2-run homer that inning by George Bell.

Sub 3.00 ERA: Was 2-5 with 5.21 era (57 ip, 33 er) in final 9 games bringing era from 2.41 to 3.12 . . . Era rose over 3.00 for 1st time all season Sep. 22, after his next to last start, an 8-0 loss to Boston.

Home Runs: His major league low home run-to-innings ratio (1 homer every 32.14 innings—7 homers in 225 innings) bettered N.L. leader Dwight Gooden of Mets (1hr/31.14 innings, 7 homers in 218 innings) . . . 1982: Hit .300 for the 1st time in his career (.304) while compiling a .411 on-base percentage . . . Hit .383 (18-for-47) in his last 15 games of the year, including .550 (11 for 20) in the last 7.

Reached base safely a club record 13 consecutive times on 8 hits (7 singles & a double) and 5 walks from final appearance on Sep. 29 thru final appearance on Oct. 2 . . . Fell 3 shy of Ted Williams' major league mark of 16 in Sep. '57 (2 singles, 4 hr, 9 bb, 1 hp).

1981: Batted .271 (23-for-85) in the 1st half but just .143 (7-for-49) after play resumed in August ... Gave Dennis Martinez a 1-0 win with "sudden death" homer in bottom of 9th off Detroit's Dan Petry, Sep. 23.

Red Sox: Set career highs in '80 in at bats (260), runs (41), hits (74), homers (9), and rbi (38) despite missing 27 games with injuries . . . Batted .538 (21-for-38) as a dh that year.

In '79 joined Boston in spring training and went on to be Red Sox' top pinch-hitter at .318 (7-for-12) with 5 rbi.

National League: Logged all or parts of 6 seasons in N.L. from '73 thru '78 with St. Louis, Montreal, New York, and San Francisco . Also did time in Cubs' organization but did not appear in a big league game for them.

'78, St.L.-S.F.: Started season with Cardinals but was traded to Giants June 15 after batting .215 in 34 games . . . Hit .225 with Giants in 73 games with 5 gwrbi, 7 steals in 7 tries and 7 outfield assists.

'77, Chi.-St.L.: Acquired by Cubs in Dec. '76 and went to spring training as non-roster player . . . Spent entire season at Wichita (American Assoc.), won batting title (.332) and led circuit in runs (113), hits (154) and doubles (38) . . .

Despite that effort, Cubs released him in Sep. and he signed with St. Louis where he appeared in 13 games in the final month of the year.

'76, Mtl.-N.Y. Mets: Began year with Expos, but hit only .185 in 50 games and was traded to Mets July 21 . . . He was optioned to Tidewater Aug. 27, but recalled Sep. 6.

'75, St.L.-Mtl.: Hit .194 in 31 games for Cardinals before being optioned to Tulsa (American Assoc.) in mid-June . . . Was traded to Montreal July 25 and played in 60 of Expos' final 69 games, batting .286 with 3 homers and 20 rbi . . . Batted .478 for Expos during week of July 28 thru Aug. 3 to earn N.L. "player of the week" honors.

Despite a .500 record (13-13) in '84, Mike maintained the distinction of never experiencing a losing full season in the majors during his 8 years as a regular starter (excluding his 2 partial campaigns in 75 and

Was 8-5 thru June 28 then lost 6 of his next 7 decisions thru Aug. 4, including a career high 5 in a row (July 14 thru Aug. 4) . . . After that was 4-2 in his final 10 starts.

Vs. Detroit: Was nearly invincible against the World Champion Tigers . . . In 4 starts, Mike was 3-1, pitched 4 complete games in 4 starts and had an 0.51 era (35 ip, 25 h, 2 er).

Beat Milt Wilcox, 2-1, on June 3 at Detroit and Juan Berenguer, 4-0, June 9 at Baltimore (in successive starts) ... Then he lost to Berenguer on an unearned run, 1-0, at Detroit on Sep. 5 before downing him again, 3-1, Sep. 10 at Baltimore (also successive starts).

The Royals' Brett Saberhagen was the only other pitcher to beat Detroit 3 times (also 3-1 including one win in relief).

Scant Support: The O's sharp decline in run production in '84 vs. '83 (down 118) affected Mike significantly . . . In 18 of his 34 starts the Birds scored 3 or fewer runs (including 2 or fewer 12 times) . . . Ironically, he was the beneficiary of the club's highest scoring effort, a 15-1 win over the Red Sox on Sep. 20.

First Slam: Had never given up a grand slam until Seattle's Jim Presley connected off him Aug. 31 at Seattle . . . Started season as one of 2 veteran O's who had never thrown a bases loaded gopher along with Jim Palmer who retired unscathed.

By Month: Apr. (2-2, 4.15, 5 g) . . . May (1-2, 5.18, 6 g) . . . June (5-1, 2.06, 6 g) . . . July (1-5, 3.13, 6 g) . . . Aug. (2-1, 4.46, 6 g) . . . Sep. (2-2, 3.00, 5 g).

Lifetime, like the Orioles in general, has had trouble with April (13-15) . . . Has winning record in every other month: May 23-10, June 22-17, July 16-15, Aug. 23-14, Sep. 26-15, and Oct. 2-1.

Miscellaneous: On May 20 he discarded the cumbersome knee brace he had worn since returning to active duty in Aug. '83 (after 111/2 weeks on the shelf recovering from injury to ligament in left knee) ... Celebrated the occasion with a victory over Seattle.

Was 1-1 in 3 starts on the Japan tour . . . In his 1st start he blanked the Japan champion Hiroshima Carp for 5 innings and was the ultimate winner 5-2. That was the final game of the series against the Carp, won by the O's 4 games to one.

Was 8-4 at home and 5-9 on the road; 9-6 in 1st and 4-7 in 2nd half.

1984 AND MAJOR LEAGUE CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

Winning Workhorse: Since he became a regular starter for the O's at the start of '77 (8 full seasons), has started more games (257) and pitched more innings (1736.2) than any other A.L. hurler ... Ron Quidry ranks 2nd in both categories (232 and 1735.2). In that same period, only Guidry has more wins (132 to 122).

During those 8 years, the O's have the highest won-lost percentage in the majors (725-509, .588). In that span, Mike's is even higher (122-81, .601).

Pick-offs/Caught Stealing: Picked 8 runners off base (including those scored as caught stealing), one less than club leader Scott McGregor ... Mike now has a career total of 55 pick-offs, an Orioles record.

In his 8 years in the O's regular rotation, opposing runners have had less than an even chance to steal a base on him . . . A total of 61 have made it, but 64 haven't.

O's All-Time List: Ranks 4th on O's win list (125) behind Jim Palmer (268), Dave McNally (181) and Mike Cuellar (143) . . . Is 3rd in strikeouts (1,037) behind Palmer (2,212) and McNally (1,476). Is also 4th in complete games (91) and innings (1831.2).

ALCS/WS: Has 3-1 record in 6 post-season games with a 3.48 era over 31 innings.

Won game 3 vs. White Sox in '83, beating Richard Dotson by a final count of 11-1. That was game in which Mike hit Ron Kittle in the knee, and Dotson retaliated by hitting Cal Ripken and throwing at Eddle Murray, a tactic that resulted in a 2-run O's 5th inning which gave Birds commanding 6-1 lead.

Started against Steve Carlton in '84 WS #3 at Philly but left after 4, trailing 2-0 . . . Palmer ultimately picked up the 3-2 win in game featuring 3 former Cy Young Award winners.

Won 2nd game of '79 ALCS vs. Angels after O's staked him to 91 lead thru 3 innings . . . Was still leading 9-4 but was in trouble when Don Stanhouse relieved him in 8th and O's barely won, 9-8.

In WS vs. Pirates, Mike won opener, 5-4, after being staked to 50 lead in 1st...Lost game #5 at Pittsburgh though he trailed only 2-1 when he left for pinch-hitter. Pirates went on to win 7-1... Was one of 5 relievers to pitch in 9th inning of 7th game won by Bucs, 4-1.

Cy Young/Other Awards: After going 23-9 in '79, was landslide winner of BBWAA award, capturing 26 1sts and 2 2nds among 28 ballots cast for a total of 136 points (5-3-1)... Was only one named on all ballots and was well ahead of Yankee lefties Tommy John (1 1st, 51 points) and Ron Guidry (1 1st, 26 points).

That was one of 6 Cy's won by O's in 12 year period from '69 thru '80 . . . See list under "Awards" on page 23.

That year also he was named A.L. "pitcher of the year" by TSN and was picked as top southpaw on TSN, AP & UPI All-Star Teams ... Was 6th in "mvp" balloting (highest ranking pitcher) and was named "graduate of the year" by both Junior American Legion and Babe Ruth programs.

Home and Away: has a .683 won-lost percentage at home (71-33), but is only .500 on the road (54-54) lifetime . . . His era is 3.34 in Baltimore and 4.17 away from home . . . Has appeared in 142 games home and 142 on road.

His '84 stats were comparable: 8-4 with 2.90 era at home and 5-9 with 4.12 era on road.

Vs. Opponents: Was 6-5 vs. east (3.26 era) in '84 and 7-8 (3.75 era) against west in '84 . . . Lifetime, he is 61-45 (.575) vs. east and 64-42 (.604) against west.

See Page 30 for '84 and lifetime stats vs. each opponent . . . See "vs. Detroit" under "84 Season Summary" above. Has had most trouble against California Angels against whom he is 3-7 with 6.02 era.

Is 15-4 against Minnesota despite a 1-2 record in '84 . . . His loss to Twins in his first '84 outing (Apr. 7) snapped a 14 game winning streak against that club. It was his 1st defeat vs. Minny in nearly 7 years. He had lost his 1st 2 lifetime decisions (the latest on May 29, '77) and that was it until '84.

Was 2-0 against Yankees and has now beaten them 5 straight times. Immediately prior to the current streak he had lost 5 in a row to the Bombers and before that had beaten them 5 consecutive times... His 2 '84 victories were back-to-back against Dennis Rasmussen on June 17 and 22... Lifetime, he's 11-7 against New York, and hasn't lost to them since Tommy John beat him in Baltimore on Aug. 15, '80.

Was 1-0 vs. **Oakland** and in beating **Ray Burris**, 4-2, last Aug. 25 at the Coliseum, ran his perfect lifetime record there to 10-0 . . . Overall, is 15-4 against the A's.

For the 2nd straight year Mike failed to beat Toronto (was 0-1 in both '83 and '84), but his 2.76 career era against the Jays is his lowest vs. a single opponent, and his 15-6 record is bested only by the 15-4 marks he's posted against Minny and Oakland ... He's 10-2 lifetime against Toronto at Memorial Stadium.

Injuries: In '78 was plagued thru 2nd half of season with painful bursitis in left ankle which severely hampered his efficiency.

In '80 though he missed no time, his performance was diminished by a sore left shoulder that developed in late June. After that season the problem was diagnosed as "tired arm" by Dr. B. Stanley Cohen of Baltimore and Dr. Arthur Pappas, the Red Sox physician. They prescribed a continuing physical therapy and weight program.

Mike's string of 157 straight starts without missing a turn ended late in '81 when he tore a muscle in his left forearm Aug. 23 . . . Didn't pitch again for 26 days . . . Hadn't missed an assignment in more than 4 years (since '77), but had begun feeling stiffness as early as May 14 that year ('81).

On May 17, '83 sustained ligament damage to his left knee while fielding a ground ball in 1st inning vs. Chicago. He apparently twisted knee after catching spikes in the ground . . . Did not require surgery, but missed 11½ weeks, returning to active status Aug. 7.

Near No-Hitter—'78: Is one of 7 Oriole pitchers over the past 31 years deprived of a no-hitter in the 9th inning ... On Sep. 26, '78 in Baltimore he had 2 down in 9th when Cleveland's Gary Alexander homered into the low rows of the rightfield seats. He then gave up 2

singles before Don Stanhouse came on to preserve the victory.

The other victims: BobTurley—'54, Don Ferrarese—'56, Dave McNally and Mike Cuellar—both '69, Jim Palmer—'73 and Storm Davis—'83.

Singleton Homers: Ken Singleton hit only 6 homers in '84, but 3 of them were drilled in games started by Flanagan, including his final one on Sep. 20, a grand slam off Boston's Al Nipper in Baltimore.

During the 8 full seasons Mike has been an O's regular, Singleton hit 170 homers, 50 of them in games Mike started (29%).

ORIOLES CAREER HIGHLIGHTS BY YEAR

1983: Jumped off to fastest start ever, going 6-0 in 1st 8 starts with a 2.73 era (52.2 ip, 16 er) . . . It was best beginning for an Oriole since Dave McNally went 15-0 to open '69 season.

Included in that stretch were 3 complete games including a 1-0 shutout vs. Seattle (G. Perry) for win #6 on may 11.

On his next start, May 17 (1st game) vs. Chicago at Baltimore, he severely injured ligaments in left knee fielding ground ball (see "Injuries" above) in 1st inning and was sidelined for 11½ weeks.

Re-activated Aug. 7 and lost his first 2 starts, both to Chicago's Lamarr Hoyt before beating Texas on Aug. 27 for his 1st win in 14 weeks. From Aug. 28 thru Sep. 17, reeled off 5 straight wins in 5 starts and was 6-1 during O's stretch run from Aug. 13 thru Sep. 25 during which Birds were 34-10.

1-0 Games: Had never been involved in a 1-0 game until '84 when he picked up a pair of wins by that score: vs. Seattle's Gaylord Perry May 11 and against Minnesota (Frank Viola) Sep. 2 at Minny with 9th inning help from Tim Stoddard. That was 1st 1-0 game in Metrodome history.

1982: Was only 8-10 on Aug. 13, but won 7 of last 8 including 7 in a row (from Aug. 17 thru Sep. 19)... His final win of year (Sep. 19) vs. Indians was his 100th career victory.

1980-81: Both seasons were marred by arm trouble (see "Injuries" above). His combined figures for those 2 seasons which followed his Cy Young year were 25-19 and a 4.14 era... Despite his problems in '80, was 12-8 as late as Aug. 6, and he tied **Steve Stone** for 2nd with 37 starts behind **Dennis Leonard** (38).

1979: Won Cy after leading majors with 23 wins and tying for most shutouts (5, with 5 others) ... Was 10-6 with a 4.05 era on July 7, then went 13-3 in last 18 starts with a 2.22 era and 10 complete games.

From Aug. 8 thru Sep. 13, won 8 in a row in 8 starts...Credited much of his success to development of a change-up taught him by Scott McGregor.

1978: Was 11-4 thru June 22 and had gone 24-6 since the previous June 27... Was hampered by rest of season by tendinitis in left ankle and went just 8-11 thereafter... Lost bid for a 20 win season when he lost to Tigers on final day of season.

Had distinction of being one of only 3 pitchers to beat Yankees' Ron Guidry (25-3) along with fellow lefties and "Mikes" Willis (Tor.) and Caldwell (Mil.) . . . Was on A.L. All-Star staff but did not pitch in game at San Diego.

1977: Started the season 2-8, but from June 27 to end, won 13 of 15, including last 6 straight.

1975-76: Made big league debut Sep. 5, '75 at home vs. Yankees with no decision, then started for 1st time Sep. 28 at Yankee Stadium, losing that final game of season 3-2, to Larry Gura.

Started '76 with O's but was 0-3 in 10 appearances when he returned to Rochester July 2... Came back to Baltimore Aug. 11 after going 6-1 for Red Wings, but dropped his 1st decision ... Was 0-5 lifetime when he broke into win column with 6-hit, 7-1 victory over Royals Sep. 1, '76.

MINOR LEAGUE CAREER/AMATEUR BACKGROUND

Minors: Was 35-16 in 3 plus minor league seasons and 19-5 in 1½ years at Rochester . . . Was chosen as International League's top lefty in '75 (Scott McGregor earned that distinction in '76).

Signing: Was Baltimore's 7th pick in June '73 draft ... Probably would have been picked on earlier round except for elbow problems that developed originally in high school ... Was signed by John Stokoe who was convinced his arm was sound again.

Was drafted in '71 by Houston but opted to go to U. of Massachusetts (at Amherst).

MIKE FLANAGAN (Cont.)

College: Was 12-1 in 2 years at U. of Mass., and led Yankee Conference in wins (9), strikeouts (89) and era (1.72) as a sophomore. That year ('73) in one game, he hit 3 homers, fanned 15 and pitched a 1-hitter against U. of Maine in a regional tournament . . . Played outfield while not pitching.

Was a starting guard on U. of Mass. freshman basketball team that went 18-1 . . . Once played against Julius Erving in a frosh-varsity scrimmage.

High School/Other: Played 4 years of baseball and basketball at Memorial High in Manchester (graduated '71) ... The school won 2 state titles in each sport while he was there.

Once struck out 31 batters in an extra inning game ... Holds New Hampshire schoolboy record for most points in a state tournament championship basketball game (44) and was picked as one of New Hampshire's 5 best high school basketball players in the 70s.

His prospects took a downward turn in summer of '70 when he came out of an American Legion Junior World Series game at Klamath Falls, Oregon with a sore elbow ... On July 9th, '82, Kathy gave birth to their 1st child—8 lb., 8 oz. Kerry Ellen—who became first "in vitro fertilization" baby bom in America thru normal delivery.

Started 100 games but missed a total of 32 of 39 games in July, due to knee injury . . . Hit homers in 3 consecutive games (May 18-19-20) and drove in game winning run in 3 straight starts (May 17-18-19).

His homer off Chicago's Richard Dotson with 1-out in the 9th inning broke up no-hitter and gave O's 1-0 win on May 18 at Memorial Stadium.

Hit homer off Steve Carlton in 6th inning of game #3 of World Series in O's 3-2 win over Phillies . . . In game #2 was hit on the helmet by a pitch from Willie Hernandez in the 5th inning. Despite breaking his glasses, stayed in game and singled of Larry Andersen in 7th inning.





1st & 2nd Halves: Has been a .309 hitter (2488-770) with 111 hr and 417 rbi before All-Star break, and .279 (2257-630) with 84 hr and 374 rbi after.

Vs. East & West: Has hit .292 (2486-727) against East and .298 (2258-673) vs. West.

Vs. Opponents: Has .300 + career averages against 5 clubs (Chi., Cle., Det., Min., and Texas) with a high of .338 (376-127) against the Twins ... Has also established home run (22) high at Minnesota's expense ... His rbi high is 86 against Detroit ... Has a .291 (423-123) career average vs. O's with 11 hrs, 61 rbi ... See Lifetime vs. Each Opponent on page 42.

His career low is .215 (218-60) against a club he hasn't faced in 4 years, the Angels.

Major Injuries: Has been disabled twice: '77 (Mar. 24 to May 6 with injured left ankle) and '80 (Aug. 29 to end of season with broken toe on right foot . . . Other significant injuries: '76 (6 different physical problems limited him to 132 games); '81 (twice damaged left knee breaking up dp's, and underwent arthoscopic surgery Sep. 23); '82 (broke rib while running into wall making catch at Detroit); '83 (groin and wrist injuries forced him to miss 45 games).

PREVIOUS CAREER HIGHLIGHTS BY YEAR

1983: An early season groin pull and an injury to his left wrist late in the campaign limited his service to 117 games, but he still hit 22 homers . . . Didn't play after Sep. 8 because of wrist . . . Angels were 13-32 in games he missed . . . Hit a slam (his 2nd lifetime in regular season off Milt Wilcox at Anaheim Apr. 27 (went 5-for-12 with 2 hr and 9 rbi vs. Wilcox in '83) . . . Also hit All-Star grand slam.

Had 17 rbi in 11 games Apr. 15-29 . . . Scored at least one run in 8 straight games May 27-June 7 . . . Had 5 gwrbi in an 11 game span May 20-June 3.

1982: Raised average 80 points from .219 of '81 to .299 ...

... Hit 1st career slam, July 15 at Cleveland off Rick Waits.

THE 1984 SEASON

Though he did not enjoy a particularly successful season professionally, 1984 was a very important year for Dennis as a person. During a long and agonizing winter during which he admitted to alcoholism, he took the first positive, courageous steps to controlling the disease.

Started season in the bullpen where he was 1-2 (thru June 5) with no saves and a 6.58 era (26 ip, 30 h, 19 er) in 14 appearances.

On June 10 returned to starting rotation where he remained for rest of season and fared somewhat better, compiling 6-8 record with a 4.67 era (115.2 ip, 115 h, 60 er) in 24 games, but has still not regained form which made him a winner in 5 of his 1st 6 full seasons in the A.L.

His 2 top efforts (his 2 complete games) were against the A.L.'s 2 best teams: Detroit (a 6-1, 6-hitter on Sep. 12) and Toronto (a 3-hitter in 2-0 loss Aug. 10 at Tor.) . . . He beat ChiSox' Richard Dotson on July 15 for his 1st win at Memorial Stadium in more than a year (beat Oakland July 11, '83) . . . During interim he had lost 6 in a row at home.

Control was Dennis' principal forte . . . He walked only 25 batters in 20 starts (an average of less than 2 per 9 innings) . . . Overall, he fanned more than twice as many as he walked (77 to 37) . . . Sometimes his control was too fine. He led the staff with 26 home run balls.

Spent part of the winter pitching for Frank Verdi at Santurce in Puerto Rican League. Was 0-1 in 3 starts during O's Japan tour last fall (had also accompanied Earl Weaver, Ken Singleton, Rick Dempsey and other major league all stars to Japan in '79.

1984 AND MAJOR LEAGUE CAREER

Starting/Relieving: As a starter he is 84-75 lifetime in 212 assignments with 4.10 era (1410.2 ip, 1442 h, 642 er) . . . In 70 career relief appearances, is 11-7 with 5 saves and a 3.54 era (178 ip, 166 h, 70 er).

Vs. Opponents: Was 2-0 in '84 against Texas, the only club he defeated more than once (take that, John Blake) . . . Has 12 career wins (4 losses) vs. Seattle and 10 each against the Red Sox (lost 14) and Brewers (lost 5) ... His 14 losses to Boston are also a career high . Though he's lost his last 3 decisions to Toronto (including 2 in '84), his 2.14 career era against the Jays represents his best vs. a single opponent . Conversely, his 4.66 against the Carmines is his highest against one club.

Boston: Has pitched far more against Red Sox than any other team (29 games, 185.1 innings, 24 decisions).

Milwaukee: Had no decisions against Brewers in '84, but has won 6 of last 7 decisions against them.

Oakland: Was 0-2 vs. A's in '84 and lost to them for 1st time ever at Memorial Stadium (in relief) on May 12 and is now 6-1 here . . . Overall, he's 8-3.

Seattle: Won his 1st 7 decisions vs. M's thru '79 ... Is 5-4 against them in last 5 seasons including 1-0 in '84.

Toronto: Has thrown only 4 home run balls in 118 career innings vs. Jays (less than one every 27 innings) . . . The only home run he has ever yielded at Toronto was of the inside-the-park variety to Tony Fernandez last Aug. 10.

Long Outings: Has pitched 10 or more innings in a game 9 times in majors and has 3-1 record with 5 no decisions ... Threw 11 shutout innings at California Aug. 20, '78 and 10 scoreless frames at New York on June 3, '81 but was not a pitcher of record in either game.

1st Nicaraguan: In '76, Dennis became the 1st Nicaraguan ever to play in majors ... Tony Chevez, who pitched briefly for O's in '77, was 2nd and in '80 Twins hurler Al Williams 3rd to make it ... Cardinals outfielder David Green became the 4th in '81.

Post-Season: Did not pitch in either the ALCS or WS in '83 . . .

Was O's starter in game 3 of '79 ALCS at Anaheim . . . Pitched well thru 8 innings and carried 3-2 lead into 9th before Angels rallied to win, 4-3 (loss went to Don Stanhouse).

Started game 4 of WS at Pittsburgh, but gave up 6 hits and 4 runs in 1.1 innings before Sammy Stewart came on . . . O's rebounded from 4-0 deficit to win behind Tim Stoddard, 9-6.

Fielding: Is one of best fielding pitchers in league . . . Has led A.L. in chances 3 times ('78, '79, '81) and also topped major league hurlers in putouts (20), assists (44) and chances (66) in '81.

1983: Struggled all season while setting career high for era (5.53) and matching his highest loss total (16 in '79) ... Won only one game over final 2 months of season.

1982: Equalled his best win total (16 in '78) and was among A.L. leaders in starts (2nd, 39), innings pitched (5th, 252) and wins (8th) . Won 5 of last 6 decisions, including key victories over Milwaukee in each of his last 2 starts (O's tied Brewers on next-to-last day of season) Was 10-4 at home and won 14 straight decisions at Memorial Stadium between losses on Aug. 16, '80 and July 1, '82.

1981: Tied 4 others for major league lead with 14 wins while leading O's in won-lost percentage (.737, 14-5), starts (24), innings (179), strikeouts (88) and complete games (9) ... Was 4-1 in Sep. and shared A.L. "pitcher of the month" honors with Larry Gura ... Was 8-0 with 2.27 era at home.

Suffered a 4-inch cut on his head when hit by a bottle thrown by a White Sox fan in Chicago on Apr. 22 ... Pitched in relief the following

1980: Was 11-18 from June 24, '79 thru the '80 season . Hampered by shoulder problems in 1st half of '80, and pitched in only 7 games before the All-Star break ... Came off DL in mid-July and split time between starting and relieving rest of season.

Pitched for Ray Miller at Caguas that winter . . . He was 6-2 with a 1.39 era and won the final game that gave Caguas the Puerto Rican championship.

1979: Led the A.L. in starts (39), innings (292) and complete games (18) . . . Was 10-2 thru June 20, including a career high 10 game win streak . . . At that point in his career, he was 41-22 (.651), but went 5-14 after that and finished with only losing record on O's staff (15-16) ... Nine of those 14 losses were by one run.

1978: Was 7-7 with 5.13 era thru July 28 ... From then on, went 9-4 (including 8-1 after Aug. 1) with a 1.72 era and 12 complete games in last 15 starts . . . Voted top righthander in the International League in '76, leading circuit in wins (14), complete games (16), strikeouts (140) and era (2.50). Scott McGregor was the top lefthander in the I.L. that year . . . Selected to both Topps National Association AAA and International League allstar teams.

Amateur Background: Pitched for Nicaragua in amateur world series in both '72 and '73 . . . In '73, he lost to U.S., 1-0 in 10 innings at Managua . . . Played Little League and Babe Ruth baseball.

Personal: Dennis and his wife, the former Luz Marina Garcia, were married Apr. 29, '73 . . . They have 3 children, Dennis (11/16/73), Erica (9/19/74), and Gilberto (4/3/82) . . . Now lives year around in the Baltimore County suburb of Randallstown, but also owns an apartment in Key Biscayne, FL.

-- BIRDS' FIRST GAME IN BALTIMORE IN '54 --

The modern American League Orioles made their Baltimore debut in Memorial Stadium on April 15, 1954 before a crowd of 46,354 including Vice President Richard M. Nixon who threw out the first ball. Behind the seven hit pitching of Bob Turley who fanned nine, the Orioles of Jimmy Dykes defeated Paul Richards' White Sox, 3-1, in Baltimore's first American league game in 52 years. Chico Carrasquel, the Chicago shortstop, was the first to bat in the new stadium and singled off Turley.

Clint Courtney won the distinction of hitting the first home run in the brand new stadium (built on the site of the previous municipally owned ballpark used by the International League O's). It was a bases empty blast off Virgil Trucks who also yielded a solo homer to Vern Steaders in the fauth but

Vern Stephens in the fourth and was the losing pitcher.

The Birds' starting lineup in that game was: Bobby Young, 2b; Eddie Waitkus, 1b; Gil Coan, cf; Vic Wertz, rf; Sam Mele, if; Stephens, 3b; Billy Hunter, ss; Courtney, c and Turley, p.

Many have forgotten that the O's opened that first season on the road, at Detroit, where Don Larsen lost to Steve Gromek, 3-0, on April 13 (the Birds' first game ever) . . . The next day at Tiger Stadium (Apr. 14) Duane Pillette gave the O's their first victory, a 3-2 decision over Ray Herbert.

Home Runs: Yielded 9 homers in '84 and 19 the past 2 seasons, but has thrown only 43 "gopher" pitches in his A.L. career ... Twice gave up 2 homers in one game in '84 (vs. N.Y. on June 23 and K.C. on July 8) only the 2nd and 3rd times of his career ... Only other time was at Cle. April 9, '83 when he gave up 1st grand slam to George Vukovich and a back-to-back homer to Julio Franco.

Detroit has hit the most off him (9), but 2 opponents haven't hit any lifetime: California and Oakland (also Baltimore) ... Of 43 lifetime homers he's yielded, 17 have been at Baltimore.

Individually, Texas' **Cliff Johnson** is the only player to have as many as 3 homers against **Tippy** ... Four others have hit 2, including **Larry Herndon** of Detroit, the only player to have more than one at **Memorial Stadium**.

Was 0-3 with 2 saves and a 7.98 era (14.2 ip, 17 h, 13 er) thru May 8. In 64 appearances thereafter, he was 8-5 with 14 saves and a 2.58 era (80.1 ip, 64 h, 23 er)

Saved both ends of a doubleheader vs. the Yankees on Sep. 14...lt was the 1st time in 5 years to the day that feat had been accomplished by an Oriole since Scott McGregor did it at Toronto Sep. 14, '77. Tippy saved another against New York the following day, giving him 3 in a row.

1979: Retired 23 straight Oakland batters on July 23rd at Baltimore . . . After walking 1st batter he faced, he pitched 7.2 perfect innings and earned the win on a Pat Kelly slam.

Over 5 straight appearances starting July 23, he yielded only one hit and no walks and retired 36 of 38 batters faced . . . Also set down 18 of 19 hitters in consecutive appearances June 22 & 23, both vs. Detroit, and won both in "sudden death" . . . Did not pitch in ALCS, but did relieve in 3 WS games (#2, 5, 7).

1978: Hampered by tendinitis and finished with highest era of career (4.83). All 3 of his losses were to Yankees . . . Went 26 days between appearances, Sep. 2 to 29.

Yankees: Was originally signed for the Yankees by Sam Suplizio as an un-drafted free agent off the Colorado State (Ft. Collins) campus in '72 . . . One year later, he led the Carolina League in saves (15), went 13-8 and fanned 160 in 105 innings.

Joined Yankees for 1st time in Aug. '74, then almost made the club at the start of '75. However, an injury to Dick Tidrow (rhp) necessitated adding another righthander to the staff instead. Won the James P. Dawson Award as the top rookie in the Yankees' '75 spring camp.

Was recalled from minors July 16, '75 and went on to lead the staff. in saves (8) . . . Lyle was 5-7 with only 6 saves that year for N.Y.

Amateur Background: Played football, basketball and baseball at La Junta High School, and was drafted as an outfielder by the Washington Senators after his senior year on a late round in June '69, but chose to attend Colorado State.

Personal: Tippy is of Spanish-Mexican descent, but is a 3rd generation American and speaks little Spanish . . . He and his wife, the former Carol Sarlo, were classmates at La Junta High (graduated '69) . They have 2 children: Jacen Anthony (8/2/70) and Courtney Ann (10/10/78).

THE 1984 SEASON

His season ended on Aug. 28 at California when a ground ball off the bat of Brian Downing, in 1st inning, broke the ring finger on his left hand . . . To add insult to injury, he was also the losing pitcher that night, having yielded one run during his one inning effort (O's lost 4-2) . . . Was on disabled list for rest of year . . . Had won 3 straight starts at time of injury.

Lost 3 of his 1st 4 starts thru April 19, then (starting Apr. 23) won 5 straight decisions (thru May 27), 7 of 8 (thru June 11) and was 11-4 over the next 2 months (thru July 17) . . . His last 3 efforts during the longest stretch were consecutive complete game wins over K.C. (July 7), Chi. (July 12) and Min. (July 17) during which he allowed only 3 runs (earned) over 27 innings.

A 4 game loss streak followed (July 22 thru Aug. 7) before he won his last 3 decisions prior to the injury.

Although he missed, perhaps, 6 starts, was 2nd on staff in wins (15), shutouts (3) and tied for 2nd in complete games with Mike Flanagan (10) behind Mike Boddicker.

Was scheduled to make Japan tour with O's, despite injury, but was scratched just before take-off because of need to begin therapy on his broken finger.

By Month: Apr. (3-3, 3.98, 6 g) . . . May (3-0, 3.32, 6 g) . . . June (3-3, 4.42, 6 g) . . . July (3-3, 4.23, 6 g) . . . Aug. (3-3, 3.74, 6 g) . . . Note: He was 3-3 in 4 of the 5 months he pitched and appeared in exactly 6 games in each of those 5 months.

Miscellaneous: His final victory, on Aug. 22 vs. Twins, was 111th of his career, moving him past Milt Pappas into 5th place on O's all-time list (see page 9 for list) . .

Was 11-4 at home and 4-8 on road, a sharp reversal from '83 when he was only 4-6 in Baltimore but 14-1 away (regular season) . . . Led staff in pitcher pickoffs with 9 (see "pickoffs" below under "84 & Major League Career").

Has won 13 or more for 7 straight seasons . . . His lone wild pitch on June 27 snapped a string of 64 straight games without one (see "Control" below) ... Walked an average of nearly 2.5 batters per 9 innings, well above his career standard (1.95).

1984 AND MAJOR LEAGUE CAREER

Post-Season: Has 3-3 record with 1.63 era (9 er.49.2 ip) in 6 post-season starts, and holds distinction of pitching shutouts to clinch the A.L. pennant (vs. Angels) in '79 and the World Championship in '83 (vs. Phillies) . . . All 3 wins have been on road and 3 losses at home.

SCOTT McGREGOR (Cont.)

1983: Hurled 5-hitter to beat Phillies in decisive 5th game of WS, winning 5-0 at Vet Stadium (his 15th win in 16 road decisions in '83) ... Was 2nd Oriole to hurl a shutout in a WS clincher ... Dave McNally blanked Dodgers in '66 game #4 to give O's 1st world title.

Lost his other 2 starts, game one of ALCS to Chicago and game one of WS, both at home and both by 2-1 scores to eventual Cy Young Award winners (Lamarr Hoyt and John Denny).

1979: Became 1st Oriole other than Jim Palmer to win a pennant clincher for O's when he blanked Angels at Anaheim in 4th ALCS game, 8-0 on a 6-hitter (see "vs. California" below) . . . Tippy Martinez joined that select group in '83.

Went route to beat Pirates at Pittsburgh in game #3 of WS, 8-4, but lost the 7th game at Memorial Stadium. In that one, he led 1-0 (on Rich Dauer hr) after 6th, and was trailing only by 2-1 when he left after 8 for pinch-hitter (final score was 4-1).

Winning: His 93-50 (.650) record over last 6 years ('79-'84) represents highest won-lost pct. in majors for that period, just ahead of Steve Carlton (106-58, .646) and Ron Guidry (91-51, .641).

Is 4th in majors in wins over same period (6 years) behind Carlton (106), Jack Morris (103) and Joe Niekro (98), and ahead of Guidry (91) and Mike Flanagan (88) . . . With 80 victories in last 5 seasons, trails only Carlton (88) and Morris (86).

Was 3-9 at the start of his O's career, but from Apr. 30, '78 thru '84, is 108-63 (.632).

By Month Lifetime: April is the only month in which he has a career losing record (10-11) ... May 22-8; June 18-11; July 22-11; Aug. 20-16; Sep. 17-12; Oct. 2-0.

Control: Has thrown only one wild pitch in more than two seasons... In that period, since Aug. 10, '82, he has worked in 77 games and pitched 501 innings... The wild pitch charged on June 27 against Boston snapped a streak of 64 games and 417 innings without one.

Though his '84 base on balls ratio of nearly 2.5 per 9 innings was unusually high (nearly a walk a game more than in '83, and well above his 1.95 career average), he issued 2 or fewer walks in 22 of his 30 starts: 0 walks-7, 1 walk-7, 2 walks-8.

His career yield (1.95) ranks 3rd on O's list (minimum 500 innings) behind: Dick Hall (1.47) and Robin Roberts 1.81 . . . Was 2nd in majors in '83 at 1.56 behind Lamarr Hoyt (1.07), among qualifiers, and led A.L. in '79 at 1.18.

Over the last 7 years, has walked no more than one batter in 129 of 216 appearances . . . In one month-long '79 stretch, pitched 46.1 consecutive walkless innings (June 29 to July 29).

Has twice walked as many as 6 batters in a game: Sep. 9, '78 vs. Toronto (won by shutout) and Apr. 2, '84 vs. Chicago (opening day, lost 5-2) . . Two of walks in latter effort were intentional.

Shutouts: Pitched 3 shutouts in '84; June 6 vs. Mil. (3 hits), July 12 vs. Chi. (4 hits) and Aug. 22 vs. Sea. (9 hits) . . . Also combined with Tom Underwood and Bill Swaggerty to blank Angels on 4 hits May 27.

Ranks in tie for 5th on O's all-time list with Steve Barber (19)... Has pitched all 19 career shutouts over last 7 seasons (778-'84) and is tied with Ron Guidry for most in A.L. in that period (Dave Stieb and Mike Caldwell are tied for 3rd with 18 apiece).

Despite 6-9 lifetime record vs. Yankees (see "vs. N.Y." below), has shut out the Bombers 4 times and one other victory was a combined shutout ... Has blanked Minnesota and Toronto 3 times each and Chicago & Seattle twice each.

Pitcher Pickoffs: Led O's staff with 9 pick offs (including caught stealings when runner had broken before throw to 1st), one more than perennial club leader Mike Flanagan . . . Lifetime, Scott has picked off 33 runners, 2nd among current O's to Flanagan's 55.

Vs. Opponents: Was 10-4 in 16 starts vs. western teams and 5-8 against the east in 14 tries . . . Has winning record against all opponents but Boston (4-8) and New York (6-9) . . . See full stats vs. each opponent on page 00.

Boston: Has won his last 2 decisions against Carmines including one in '84 following a 5 game losing streak ... Is only 4-8 lifetime.

California: Went 3-1 against Angels in '84. His only loss

occurred on Aug. 28 when he broke his left ring finger (ground ball) in 1st inning after giving up one run and had to leave game.

That defeat ended a string of 10 consecutive wins (in 10 starts) at Anaheim (including shutout win in decisive 4th game of '79 ALCS) . . . It was only his 2nd lifetime defeat in the Angels' stadium (1st one: Aug. 18, '78).

Has more regular season victories vs. Angels (16) than against any other opponent . . . Lost his first 2 decisions to them (both in '78). Since then he's gone 16-3 (not including a pennant winning shutout in '79 ALCS).

That stretch included 12 straight wins vs. Cal. (beginning July 8, '79) in as many starts (including the ALCS triumph), a streak which was finally snapped by **Steve Renko** on July 19, '82... Is 5-2 vs. California in last 2 years ... Has held California batters to a .235 lifetime average (149-for-634) while compiling a 2.60 era (162.2 lp, 47 er).

Cleveland: Was 0-3 in 4 '84 starts, but still holds 10-7 lifetime edge.

Milwaukee: Beat Don Sutton in back-to-back complete games (June 6 & 11), 3-0 and 3-1, allowing only 10 hits and 1 run in 18 innings. Has now beaten Brewers 5 straight times since losing 5 of his first 6 decisions against them. His last loss was on May 10, '80 to Lary Sorensen.

New York: Was 0-2 against the Yankees and has now lost 4 straight since his latest victory, on Sep. 6, '82 (over Ron Guldry) . . . Is 6-9 lifetime.

His first 5 wins against Yankees were shutouts (4 solos and a combination with **Tippy Martinez**), and 3 were 1-0 decisions. In his most recent win (Sep. 6, '82) which he won 8-2, he pitched 5.2 scoreless innings before being relieved.

One of his shutouts was a 3-0 rain-shortened triumph on Aug. 13, '78. In that game, led 3-0 thru 6 innings, but was touched for 5 runs in top of 7th ... However, it started to rain in bottom of that inning, play was halted and game was subsequently called. Score reverted to last completed inning, giving O's a 3-0 win ... The rules have since been changed to prevent a re-occurrence.

Oakland: Had no '84 decisions, but has won 4 in a row since a loss on Aug. 22, '81 . . . He's 7-3 lifetime.

Texas: Boosted his spotless career record vs. Rangers to 6-0... Did not pitch against Texas for 21/2 years between July 29, '80 and May 14, '83.

Toronto: Was 2·2 in '84 . . . His loss to Jim Clancy on Apr. 19 snapped a 7 game winning streak vs. Jays . . . He hadn't lost to them since Tom Underwood beat him on June 26, '80.

His career 2.60 era vs. Toronto is tied for lowest against one opponent (with California).

Injuries: Has had disabling arm problems several times ... Weak muscles in his left shoulder bothered him for most of 2nd half of '82 and he worked just 82 innings after the all-star break . . . Underwent a therapy and exercise program for the shoulder the following winter, and enjoyed a banner '83 season.

In spring of both '79 and '80, was troubled by inflamed muscles in left elbow, but overcame the malady thru therapy prior to the spring of '81.

PREVIOUS CAREER HIGHLIGHTS BY YEAR

1983: Rebounded from injury-plagued '82 to lead O's in wins (18), starts (36), innings (260, career high) and complete games (12) and compiled his best era (3.18) in 7 big league seasons.

Was 14-1 on road and 4-6 at home (plus 1-0 on road and 0-2 at home during post-season) . . . A string of 14 consecutive road victories over a 2-year period was snapped by Yankees on Sep. 9 (hadn't lost on road since Aug. 19, '82) . . . At season's end (including WS) he had won 16 of his last 17 road decisions . . . Conversely, did not win at home after July 30.

In 20 starts from May 28 thru Sep. 3, was 13-2 with 9 complete games and a 2.20 era (39 er, 159.2 ip)... Was 9-4 before the all-star break and 9-3 after... Was only O's starter who did not miss a turn.

Was named lefthander on AP's major league all star team and was 6th in Cy Young vote . . . Gave up a club high 24 home runs . . . Did not throw a wild pitch all season . . .

1980: Became 20-game winner for 1st time when he defeated Cleveland's Len Barker (also going for 20th win) on final day of season ... Was 19-6 after May 21 ... Didn't make 1st start until Apr. 22 because of arm problems.

1979: Recovered from sore elbow and an 0-2 record over the 1st 2 months to go 13-4 with 2.94 era starting June 11 . . . Had A.L.'s best ratio of men on base to innings pitched + 15 (175 ip/165 h, 22 bb, 2hb)... Was named A.L. "player of week," Aug. 27-Sep. 3.

Amateur Background: Was teammate of George Brett (whom he out-hit senior year) at El Segundo High School where he was 51-5 with an 0.29 era (including 18-1 as a senior) in 4 seasons ... Also played basketball.

Played Little League, Babe Ruth and American Legion baseball ... His El Segundo team won Babe Ruth world championship in '69.

Personal: Orioles' player representative . . . Attended El Camino Jr. College ... Very active in Fellowship of Christian Athletes and coordinates Orioles chapel services ... Arranged 2 charity basketball games during past winter, Orioles vs. "Meadowlark" Lemon's All-Stars, for benefit of building fund for The Rock Church in Baltimore County.

Scott and his wife, the former Cara Bell, were married in Baltimore on Sep. 27, '76 ... They have 2 children: Eric Scott (11/22/78) and Katherine Noel (10/28/80).

Eddie enjoyed another outstanding season. Led American League and tied for major league lead in game-winning rbi (19, with Gary Matthews) and on-base pct. (.410, with Matthews and Tony Gwynn). Led majors in walks (107) and intentional walks (25).

Also led club in batting (.306), hr (29), rbi (110), slugging pct. (.509), and sacrifice flies (8). Was also among league leaders in avg. (8th), hr (9th), rbi (5th), total bases (299, 9th), and slugging pct. (10th).

Batted .300 or over and drove in 100+ runs, both for 3rd straight season and 4th in last 5. Hit over 20 hr for 8th year in a row. Hit .306 for 2nd straight year.

Has had more rbi in last 5 years than any other major leaguer. Has averaged 28 hr and 101 rbi per year in 8 big league seasons.

He and teammate Cal Ripken were only major leaguers to play every inning of every game.

Won a record 5th "Most Valuable Oriole" Award, received his 3rd consecutive "Gold Glove Award," and was named to the American League All-Star team for the 5th time.

Hit .367 (49-18) with 9 homers and 22 rbi in 14 games on Japan Tour (see page 43 for details).

1st Hot Stretch: Hit only .195 (41-8) with 1 hr and 4 rbi in the 1st 12 games thru Apr. 19 (O's were 2-10).

On Apr. 20, with O's trailing Twins at home, 2-1 in 7th, hit 2-out gametying single off Ron Davis, then hit 2-run hr in 10th, also off Davis, to win 4-2 and launch O's on a 29-12 stretch (.707 pct.) thru June 4.

EDDIE MURRAY (Cont.)

From Apr. 20 thru May 30, hit .389 (131-51) with 9 hr, 43 rbi, and a .503 on-base pct. in 37 games. Had 12 gwrbi in this stretch, during which the club was 26-11.

Thru May 30, had incredible .525 avg. (40-21) with men in scoring position.

Player of Month/Week: Was honored in May for hitting .385 (91-35) with 6 hr, 24 rbi, and 26 walks in 26 games. Had .648 slugging pct., and .513 on-base pct.

Was player of the week May 14-20. Hit .350 (20-7) with 3 hr and 10 rbi.

Is one of only 3 4-time winners of player of the month honors (Rod Carew and Jim Rice are the others) since award was instituted in '75. Also won it Sep. '81 & '82 and April '82.

6-RBI Game: Gave O's one of year's most thrilling wins June 19 at Boston. After fanning 1st 3 times, came up in 8th with bases loaded and O's down 7-1. Crushed reliever **Bob Stanley**'s 1st pitch into centerfield bleachers.

Came up again in 9th with bases loaded, O's now trailing 7.6, and drilled a 2-run single off **Steve Crawford** for 8-7 lead. O's won, 9-7.

2nd Hot Stretch: In 37 games from Aug. 1 thru Sep. 10, hit .383 (133-51) with 6 hr and 26 rbi.

22-Game Hitting Streak: Hit in 22 straight games from Aug 17 thru Sep. 10, breaking Doug DeCinces' single season club record 21 set in '78. Tied DeCinces' club mark over two seasons ('78-'79).

Was longest streak in A.L. history by a switch-hitter, topping the 20-game streaks achieved by **Walter Schang** (Phi., '16) and **Dave Philley** (Phi., '53).

Batted .442 (77-34) with 5 hr and 20 rbi during streak

Walking Man: Led the majors and set career highs by walking 107 times and drawing 25 intentional passes. Set A.L. record for most int. walks by a switch-hitter, exceeding Mickey Mantle's 23 established in '57.

Also set club mark for int. walks, breaking **Ken Singleton**'s 19 set in '83.

Miscellaneous: Hit .310 (142-44) with runners in scoring position, 2nd on club to Ripken's .311. Had .344 pct. (122-42), driving in men in scoring position with less than 2 out, 2nd best on club to Wayne Gross' .391.

Had 51 multi-hit games (2nd on club to Ripken's 55), including 9 3-hit games and 2 4-hit games.

Had 10-game hitting streak (May 5-15) in addition to 22-game string (see above).

Injury: Was hit above right wrist sliding into 2nd base by Tony Phillips' relay to first at Oak. May 22. Was limited to DH role for 3 games (May 23, 24, 28).

Most Valuable Oriole: Won a record 5th "MVO" award, surpassing Brooks Robinson's 4. Was his 4th straight honor (shared with Cal Ripken in '83) and 5th in his 8-year career (won 1st in '78). Was unanimous selection for 3rd time (also '81, '82). (See "Most Valuable Orioles," p. 23).

1984 AND MAJOR LEAGUE CAREER

Average: Hit .300 for the 4th time in his 8-year career. Has never hit less than .283. Raised his lifetime avg. to .298, 4th on O's all-time list.

Led club in batting for 4th time in last 5 years. Only Brooks Robinson has led more times (5). Frank Robinson and Ken Singleton also led 4 times.

Hitting at Home: Easily led club in hitting at home with 18 hr, 57 rbi, and .329 avg., (283-93), 42 points ahead of runner-up Cal Ripken (.287). Hit .285 (305-87) with 11 hr and 53 rbi on road.

Lifetime had career .30225 (2220-671) avg. at Memorial Stadium, 2nd in club history to **Frank Robinson's** .305 (1380-421). **Tommy Davis** is 3rd (.30215, 834-252). They are the only 3 players in Orioles history with lifetime averages over .300 at home.

O's "Triple Crown:" Led the club in avg., hr, and rbi in '84 for 3rd time ('81 and '82 also). Is only Oriole ever to lead in all 3 categories in one season 3 times. Frank Robinson achieved the distinction twice ('66 and '67), and Gus Triandos ('55), Jim Gentile ('61), and Boog Powell ('63) earned the honor once each.

Home Runs: Led the club in hr for the 5th straight year and 6th time overall ('77, tied with Lee May), a club record.

Hit 2 grand slams (see below), 5 3-run shots, 9 with one on, and 13 solos.

O's All-Time: Ranks 3rd in club history (227) behind Powell (303) and Brooks Robinson (268).

In Majors: Has 148 in last 5 years (starting '80), 2nd only to Mike Schmidt (154).

in span of 8-year career (starting '77), only Schmidt (294), Jim Rice (256), and George Foster (234) have more hr. Dave Kingman (227) has as many. Others nearby: Reggie Jackson (222), Don Baylor and Dale Murphy (200 each).

20 or More 8 Straight Years: Has hit at least 22 hr in each of his 8 big league seasons. Only Powell (8) has had as many 20-hr seasons in club history. Is 2nd to Schmidt (11 straight) among current major leaguers in consecutive 20-hr seasons.

Among Switch-Hitters: Ranks 4th on all-time hr list for switchers, trailing Mickey Mantle (536), Reggie Smith (314), and Ken Singleton (246). Ted Simmons (226) ranks 5th. (See "Switch-Hitting" below).

Is one of only 3 switchers in major league history to have multiple 30-hr seasons (Mantle 9, Murray 3, Smith 2).

Multi-HR Games/HR from Both Sides: Has homered twice during a game 10 times (9 reg. season), most recently the decisive 5th game of the '83 World Series at Philadelphia (Oct. 16).

Has tied club record with 3 hr in a game twice: Aug. 29 (2nd game) '79, at Min. (2 off Geoff Zahn, 1 off Mike Marshall) and Sep. 14, '80 at Tor. (2 off Jackson Todd, 1 off Mike Barlow). Only other Oriole to accomplish the feat more than once was Powell (3 times).

Has also hit homers both righthanded and lefthanded in the same game 5 times in his career, tied for 3rd all-time behind Mantle (10), Smith (6). Roy White (also did it 5 times). Accomplished it twice in '82, tying Mantle's major league record.

Grand Slams: Hit 2 slams in '84 to set club career record (9) and break tie with Powell (7). Hit 1st June 19, at Boston off Bob Stanley (See "6-RBI Game" above) and the 2nd July 7 (1st game), at home off K.C.'s Larry Gura. Was 3rd 2-slam season. (See p. 13 for more details.)

Set another club mark by hitting his 6th slam at Memorial Stadium, breaking tie with **Lee May** (5).

Only 28 players in baseball history have hit more slams lifetime, including 4 who are active: Dave Kingman (14), George Foster (11), Jeff Burroughs and Reggie Jackson (10 each). Rusty Staub also has 9.

Only Mantle (9) has hit as many slams among switch-hitters alltime.

Runs Batted In: Led club in rbi for 5th straight year (starting '80) and 6th overall ('78 also). Is only player in Orioles history to lead club in rbi 6 times.

1984: Drove in 6 runs, all in last 2 innings, June 19 at Boston for his season high. (See "6-RBI Game" above).

Of his 110 rbi, 40 (36%) drove in tie or lead run, including 16 in 7th inning or later. Both marks led the club.

Career: Ranks 3rd in club history (807) behind Brooks Robinson (1,357) and Powell (1,063).

Drove in over 100 runs for 4th time in '84, the most 100-rbi seasons ever by an Oriole. (Powell had 3.)

Has had 95 or rbi in all but 2 seasons, his rookie year (88 in '77) and strike-shortened '81 (78, which led the league). Has averaged 101 rbi per year for 8 years.

Among Major League Leaders: Had 5th best total in majors (and in A.L.) in '84, tied with Don Mattingly.

In last 5 seasons (starting '80), has more rbi than any other major leaguer (525). Mike Schmidt (514) is 2nd in that period.

In the span of his 8-year career, only **Jim Rice** (876) has more rbi. Is tied with **Schmidt** for 2nd (807). **George Foster** (796) is 4th.

Switchers: In '80 he and Singleton (104) became only 2nd switch-hitting duo to drive in 100 runs apiece in last 50 years. Ted Simmons and Reggie Smith of the '74 Cardinals were the other pair. (See "Switch-Hitting" below).

EDDIE MURRAY (Cont.)

Game-Winning RBI: Tied Gary Matthews for major league lead in '84 (19). Had gwrbi in 6 of 8 wins spanning 11 games starting Apr. 20 thru 30.

Has 82 gwrbi since the stat became official in '80, the most by any major leaguer. His 96 since the stat was first kept by the league ('79) is also tops among major leaguers.

Has 131 lifetime, 3rd in O's history behind Brooks Robinson (184) and Boog Powell (140).

Every Inning, Every Game: Became 2nd Oriole ever to play every inning of every game (including 3 as DH). He and Cal Ripken (who did it in '83 and '84) are the only major leaguers to achieve that distinction since Sal Bando did it for the Oakland A's in '69.

Was one of 5 major leaguers to play every game of season (Ripken, Gary Gaetti, Dwight Evans, and Dale Murphy were the others).

Has now played in 164 consecutive games (starting Oct. 1, '83).

Ironman: Has missed only 29 games in 8 years while playing in 97.6% of all Orioles games (1206 of 1235) in that period.

Played in 444 straight games Aug. 21, '77 thru July 13, '80, 2nd longest streak in club history (See p. 142 for more details).

1st Half/2nd Half: (See p. 40).

By Month: May was best month in '84, which lifetime is his worst. Had worst month in September, normally his best.

1984: Apr.: .296 (81-24), 4 hr, 23 rbi, 23 g; May: .385 (91-35), 6 hr, 24 rbi, 26 g; June: .260 (104-27), 4 hr, 15 rbi, 28 g; July: .298 (104-31), 7 hr, 18 rbi, 28 g; Aug.: .371 (105-39), 4 hr, 23 rbi, 28 g; Sep. .233 (103-24), 4 hr, 7 rbi, 29 g.

Had best month ever in Apr. '82. Hit .441 (68-30). Best month for hr was June '78 (11). Most rbi in a month was 30, Sep. '80. (See "Great Endings" below).

Switch-hitting: Had better avg., slugging pct., and hr frequency as a lefthanded batter. Has career high avg. from right side, but higher power figures as lefthander. (See "Home Runs" and "Runs Batted In" above.)

1984: Hit career high .320 (438-140) as lhb. Averaged a hr every 18.25 ab (24 hr), and had .541 slugging pct.

As an rhb, hit .267 (150-40), averaged a hr every 30 ab (5 hr), and had a .413 slugging pct.

Career: Has hit better as Ihb 4 times in 8 years, including last 2. Has also had better hr frequency as Ihb 4 times ('84 was 1st time since '80). Has had better slugging pct. as Ihb 5 times, including last 2 years.

Lifetime figures: As rhb: .303 avg. (1408-426), 66 hr, .502 slugging pct (707 tb), 1/21.3 hr frequency.

As lhb: .296 avg. (3138-929), 161 hr, .510 slugging pct (1599 tb), 1/19.5 hr frequency.

Natural righty: Turned to switch-hitting in '75 and '76 while in the minors. Cal Ripken, Sr., and Jim Schaffer were instrumental in assisting with switch.

East Vs. West: Hit over .300 vs. 4 of 6 East teams, but only .269 (283-76) with 11 hr and 35 rbi overall. Feasted on West teams, batting .341 (305-104) with 18 hr and 75 rbi, batting over .300 vs. 6 of the 7. (See "Vs. Opponents" below and p. 40 for more details.)

Lifetime has fared slightly better vs. East, with .299 avg. (2270-678), 118 hr, and 407 rbi. Vs. West has hit .297 (2276-677) with 109 hr and 400 rbi.

Has led league in total chances twice (also in '78) and been 2nd 4 times ('79, '80, '81, '83).

Other Positions: Defensively has played 1b exclusively starting Apr. 10, '78. Played 3 games at 3rd base in '78 and 3 in left field in '77

All-Star Games: Was selected as a reserve for the 4th straight year and 5th lifetime ('78 also).

Entered in bottom of 4th inning and played rest of game. Doubled off Mets sensation **Dwight Gooden** in 1st at bat, then was fanned by **Goose Gossage.** Is now 1-for-7 in All-Star competition.

Ironman: Has played in 442 consecutive games since sitting out 2nd game of doubleheader on May 29, '82 (Floyd Rayford played for him at 3rd base)... Third longest streak in O's history and 2nd longest among current major leaguers to Atlanta's Dale Murphy (495)... One of 5 major leaguers to play every game last season.

Has played 3,991 consecutive innings, starting June 5, '82 (not including 82 post-season innings in '83). . . . Began inning streak at 3rd base and switched to shortstop July 1, '82 . . . First major leaguer to play every inning of every game in consecutive seasons since Rudy York of the Detroit Tigers in '40 and '41 . . . Only 7 players have ever done it.

Four other O's have played in every game of a season (Brooks Robinson 4 times, Eddle Murray 3, Billy Gardner and Bobby Grich once each), but only Murray has played every inning (in '84 including 3 games as a dh).

Awards: Named to The Sporting News and UPI A.L. All-Star teams and to A.P.'s Major League All-Star squad ... Also won TSN-Hillerich & Bradsby "Silver Slugger" Trophy as the league's most productive shortstop.

Batting: Became only the 6th to hit .300 in 2 or more seasons in an Orioles' uniform (F. Robinson 4, Murray 3, Ken Singleton 3, B. Robinson 2, Al Bumbry 2) and only 3rd to do it consecutively (F. 1984 AND CAREER

Fielding: In addition to his A.L. record 583 assists (see "Season Summary" above), also led major league shortstops in total chances (906), double plays (122) putouts (297).

His 880 chances (excluding errors) were most by an A.L. shortstop since Leo Cardenas handled the same number in '69. Ozzle Smith is the only shortstop in majors with more successful chances in one season since WW II (909 in '80). The major league record is 984 by Giants' Dave Bancroft in '22.

Had only 13 errors in 1st 120 games (664 total chances & .980 pct.) thru Aug. 16, and went 26 games without a miscue from June 15 thru July 7. Then committed 13 errors in last 42 games, including 10 in a 23-game stretch from Aug. 17 thru Sep. 11. Had a final .971 percentage tied for 5th with Robin Yount.

In '83 led all big league shortstops in assists (534) and led A.L. in double plays (113) and total chances (831), 3 fewer than M.L. leader Ozzle Smith. Ranked 4th in fielding at .970.

Started '82 as the O's regular 3rd baseman . . . Played both shortstop and 3rd after coming up in Aug. '81 . . . Moved to short for good on July 1, '82.

Home Runs: Led club in multi-homer games with 3 in '84, all 2-homer games, bringing career total to 5 ... Has now hit at least 2 homers in every A.L. park except one, Toronto, where he has not hit any ... Has averaged 27 homers and nearly 94 rbi in his 3 full big league seasons.

Only 5 shortstops have hit more homers in one season (Ernle Banks, Chicago Cubs, '55, '57.'61; Vern Stephens, Boston, '48.'50; Rico Petrocelli, Boston, '69.'70; Woody Held, Cleveland, '59; Robin Yount, Milwaukee, '82...Only Banks, Petrocelli and Stephens have hit more in 2 consecutive seasons.

Since '83: Over the past 2 seasons, leads the majors in total bases (670), extra base hits (147) and doubles (84)... He is 2nd in the majors in hits (406) and multi-hit games (106) to Boston's Wade Boggs (413 hits, 125 multi-hit games)... His .313 average over the past 2 years is 3rd in the A.L. among qualifying hitters behind Boggs (.342) and Detroit's Alan Trammell (.316).

O's All-Time: Currently ranks 5th among O's career batting average leaders (minimum 1200 at bats) with a .293 mark . . . However, official playing rule 10.22 called for earned run averages to be figured after rounding off the number of innings pitched to the nearest full inning. When this was done, McCatty had the lower era 2.32258 (rounded up to 186 innings) to Stewart's 2.33036 (rounded down to 112 innings). After a review of the situation, the Official Scoring Rules Committee declared McCatty the winner with Stewart placing 2nd. The rule was changed at the '81 annual baseball meetings to determine era on actual innings pitched, including fractions, effective with the '82 season.

Had Sammy won the title, he would have been the 1st A.L. era leader with a losing record (4-8) in 58 years.


