EDWARD BENNETT WILLIAMS

Edward Bennett Williams, world-renowned Washington attorney, officially purchased the Orioles on November 1, '79. At that time, the Orioles had won more games than any other club over more than a generation. In the six seasons that have elapsed in the Williams' administration, the Orioles have maintained that tradition, having again won more games than any other club in baseball.

Despite this distinction, it is a fact that the ballclub has not played up to its normal standard the past two seasons after winning the world championship in '83.

And what has the club done, under the leadership of Mr. Williams and his Executive Vice-President **Hank Peters**, to correct the deficiencies of these past two years? Plenty!

They have made many changes aimed at eliminating weaknesses and have, in the process, put together one of the most formidable offensive units in baseball today as well as in Orioles history. Last year the pitching surprisingly turned sub-par for no apparent reason. Confident that the quality of the staff effort will return to expectations in '86, Messrs. Williams and **Peters** are optimistic that Orioles fans are in for another banner season.

The 65-year old Hartford, Connecticut native is no stranger to winning. He's done it for some 40 years in the courtroom and during 20 years as president of the Washington Redskins.

Mr. Williams, the founder and senior partner of the Washington law firm, **Williams & Connolly**, was a 1941 summa cum laude graduate of **Holy Cross College**. He served in the U.S. Air Force during World War II. Then, upon returning to civilian status, attended **Georgetown University Law School** where he graduated in '45 and was admitted to the D.C. Bar. He has been a Washington-area resident ever since.

The father of seven children (**Joe, Ellen, Bennett, Ned, Dana, Tony, and Kimberly**), he lives with his wife, the former **Agnes Anne Neill** (also a **Georgetown University Law School** graduate), and family in Potomac, MD.

Mr. Williams taught Criminal Law and Evidence at **Georgetown Law School** from 1946 to 1958; was guest professor of American Criminal Law at the **University of Frankfurt** in West Germany in '54; and, in '71, as visiting lecturer at **Yale University Law School** where he taught Constitutional Litigation. He holds honorary degrees from 12 universities.

He was chairman of the **American Bar Association Special Committee on Crime Prevention and Control** from 1970 to 1972. In 1966, the **D.C. Bar Association** presented him with its "Lawyer of the Year" award . . . He is a Fellow of the **American College of Trial Lawyers** and was a member of its board of regents from 1968 to 1972.

By appointment of the **Chief Justice of the United States** in March 1965, Mr. Williams served on the **U.S. Judicial Conference Advisory Committee** on Federal Rules of Evidence until 1974 and, from 1971 to 1974, on the **Chief Justice's Committee** on Court Facilities and Design.

From 1971 to 1978, he served as chairman of the **Judicial Nomination Commission for the Sixth Judicial Circuit of Maryland**.

By appointment of **President Gerald Ford**, Mr. Williams served

on the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board in 1976 and 1977. President Jimmy Carter appointed him a consultant to the National Security Agency (NSA) . . . In November 1980, President-elect Ronald Reagan appointed Mr. Williams, as one of three prominent Democrats, to serve on the Foreign Policy Advisory Board to assist in the presidential transition. From '82 to '85, he again served on the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board, and is presently General Counsel to the Board.

Mr. Williams was treasurer of the Democratic National Committee from 1974 to 1977; has served as general counsel of Georgetown University since 1949; is chairman of the board of trustees of Holy Cross College; is general counsel of the Motion Picture Association of America.

HANK PETERS

Henry J. (Hank) Peters has been the Orioles' executive vice president and general manager for the last 10 seasons, since he signed a 5-year contract in November, 1975. At that time, he replaced J. Frank Cashen who had resigned to join the Carling National Brewery.

As an indication of his success with the Orioles, Hank's contract was extended for another 5 years (thru '84) after the '79 season, and was extended again 2 years ago for another 5 years (thru '89).

A veteran of 39 years in professional baseball, Hank has twice earned major league "executive of the year" honors ('79, '83) from THE SPORTING NEWS, and won UPI's major league executive award in '79 as well.

The 61-year old (Sep. 16, '24) St. Louis native has shown an amazing ability to adjust to the abrupt and rapid changes that have affected player-management relations during the past several years. It has been an invaluable asset.

Hank came to Baltimore after 4 years as president of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues (the governing body of minor league baseball). Before accepting that position in Dec. '71, he had spent 5 years with the Cleveland Indians as vice-president for player personnel.

Prior to that, he had worked with the Kansas City A's for a decade. During his tenure in Kansas City, he had the distinction of being the last general manager appointed by club-owner Charles O. Finley (who later became his own gm). He has also worked with the St. Louis Browns and Cincinnati Reds.

He first broke into baseball in '46 after serving 3 years in the U.S. Army in World War II during which he was stationed in England, Germany and Czechoslovakia.

He got his start with the hometown Browns in the minor league department, working for Farm Director Jim McLaughlin, who later served the Orioles in the same capacity (and still lives in Baltimore), and Bill DeWitt, the general manager.

When the franchise was moved to Baltimore in Oct. '53, Hank took a job as general manager of the independent Burlington, Iowa club in the Class B Three-I League.

After the '54 season, he joined the new Kansas City A's (who had just moved from Philadelphia) as farm director, and remained in that position thru '60. In early '61, following a disagreement with owner Finley, Hank resigned and spent the balance of the season working again for DeWitt (then gm at Cin.), as farm director of the Reds who won the N.L. pennant that season.

However, in Dec. '61, he returned to the A's as assistant general manager/farm director. In '65, he was appointed general manager, and during his tenure such future stars as "Catfish" Hunter, Bert Campaneris, Reggie Jackson, Sal Bando, Joe Rudi, Rick Monday, Gene Tenace, and Rollie Fingers were signed and developed in the A's farm system.

Hank moved to Cleveland in '66 and remained there until he was elected to succeed the retiring National Association President Phil Piton. At the time, the National Association was headquartered in Columbus, OH, but in Sep. '73, Hank moved the office to its present site, in St. Petersburg, FL.

He and his wife, Dottie, whom he met while both were working for the Browns, have been married for 35 years . . . They have 2 children: Sharon and Steve, and 2 grandchildren: Shannon Nicole Torrez, born Dec. 12, '80, and Christopher Henry Peters, born on Oct. 16, '83, the day the Orioles won the '83 World Series.



2 MILLION, 3RD STRAIGHT YEAR: The O's exceeded 2 million and set a club record in home attendance, both for the 3rd straight year. The '85 figure of 2,132,387 broke the '84 standard by 86,456.

In all, 11 of the 26 big league teams drew over 2 million at home last year, but only 4 have done so for at least the past 3 years. In addition to the O's: Dodgers (13 straight 2 million seasons), and the Cardinals and Angels who have drawn 2 million plus for 4 consecutive seasons.

The Cubs and O's were the only 2 million clubs who didn't finish in the top 3 in their divisions.

O'S HAVE BEST RECORD IN MAJORS

Over the Last 30 Years

During the last 30 years ('56 thru '85), the Orioles have won more games than any other club in the major league while also compiling the best won—lost record. The O's in those 3 decades have won 2,667 games and forged a .563 percentage (598 games over .500).

Despite back-to-back mediocre seasons ('84-'85) during which they are only a composite 13 games above .500, the O's hold a 12 game edge over the Yankees in the 30 year period.

Their first 2 Baltimore seasons ('54 & '55), the O's were 111-197 (.360) . . . They improved in '56 (69-85), and really began to jell in '57 (76-76), their first .500 season in Baltimore.

Since O's Moved from St. Louis in '54

Over the last 32 campaigns dating back to 1954, the year the O's began operating in Baltimore (after moving from St. Louis the previous winter), the Birds rank 3rd in the majors (2778-2266, .551) behind the Yankees (2860-2194, .566) and the Dodgers (2823-2241, .557).

Since Start of Divisional Play

In 17 years of divisional play which was initiated in 1969, the O's lead the majors with a record of 1572-1104, .587. The Dodgers are 2nd (1503-1191, .558), followed by: (3) Cincinnati (1491-1198, .55448); (4) Yankees (1488-1196, .55440), and (5) Boston (1458-1229, .543).

During Edward Bennett Williams' Tenure as O's Owner

In the 6 seasons that have elapsed since Edward Bennett Williams officially purchased the Orioles (starting '80), the Birds are also tops in the big leagues with 519 wins, ahead of the Yankees (516), Dodgers (508), and Tigers (507).

The O's with 896 wins in the last decade (starting '76) are 2nd only to the Yankees (902) in that span among the 26 teams . . . In the last 5 years, the Birds have won 419 games and trail only the Tigers (423).

ATTENDANCE NOTES (Cont.)

OVERALL RANK: In both overall attendance and average, the Orioles ranked 6th in the A.L. and 11th in the majors . . . The O's averaged 26,654 per home date, 2nd highest in club history (behind '84, 26,918).

BIG CROWDS: In '85 the O's drew between 20,000 and 29,000 28 times; between 30,000 and 39,000 on 22 occasions, and 40,000 or more on 6 dates . . . Some 23,000 tickets were sold at the stadium on the day of the Sat., May 11th nite game vs. Twins. The attendance that evening was 49,094. It was 2nd only to the 49,388 that attended Opening Day.

The largest "walk-up" sale in O's history was 31,626 for a May 9, '71 week night game matching Vida Blue vs. Jim Palmer . . . The total that night was 43,307.

100,000+ SERIES: Memorial Stadium was host to 9 series which attracted 100,000 or more, the most ever in one season (8 was previous high in '83). The O's and White Sox played the best attended series of the year in Baltimore. A total of 149,455 showed up for the 4-game set July 11-14, 5th highest in club history at home.

The 120,207 total for an April (25-28) set with the Indians was good for 2 milestones: (1) It was the O's 1st ever 100,000 series at home in April, (2) and the first ever against the Indians in Baltimore.

In 32 years, the club has played to a total of 47 series attracting 100,000+ fans, 36 of them in the last 7 years, starting in 1979.

Six different Orioles have hit 30 or more home runs in a season 15 different times. In '85, Eddie Murray did it for the fourth time tying Boog Powell for the club's all-time high. Frank Robinson accomplished the feat three times, Jim Gentile twice and Gus Triandos and Ken Singleton once each. Triandos was the first Oriole to achieve that mark when he hit 30 homers in '58, earning him a share of the A.L. record for a catcher that stood for 24 years until Detroit's Lance Parrish broke it in '82.

GRAND SLAM NOTES

O's Led Majors Last 5 Years: The O's have led the major leagues (or tied for the lead) in grand slams in each of the past five years: '81 (5); '82 (8); '83 (8—tied with Angels); '84 (8); '85 (7).

In that span, the O's have hit 36 grand slams while the Angels rank 2nd with 23, followed by Pittsburgh (18) and Boston (16). Over the five years, O's pitchers have yielded only 12 bases loaded home runs, including 3 in '85.

Home & Road: In '81-'82, the O's hit 13 slams, 12 of them at Memorial Stadium, but in the last 3 years have hit 16 on the road and only 7 at home.

Eddie Murray has already hit 12 grand slams, including 3 last year, in his 9 year career and ranks in a 6-way tie for 11th place on the all-time list (see **Murray's** blog for the complete list), topped by **Lou Gehrig's** 28. Only one active player, **Dave Kingman** (14) has more, and the Mets' **George Foster** also has 12.

Thru the Years: In 32 years ('54-'85), the O's have "outslammed" their opponents 123-69 (including a 64-31 advantage at Baltimore).

Gentile Hit Record 5 in '61: **Jim Gentile** set an American League record and tied the major league standard in '61 when he hit 5 bases loaded home runs. The only prior player to reach that total was the Cubs' **Ernie Banks** in '55.

Two in a Game: Only 7 players have hit two grand slams in one game in baseball history and only 3 have hit them on consecutive at bats. In both situations, two of them were Orioles: **Gentile** hit two in a row at Minnesota on May 9, '61 (Metropolitan Stadium off **Pete Ramos** and **Paul Giel**), and **Frank Robinson** did the same on June 26, '70 at RFK Stadium in Washington (off **Joe Coleman**, Jr. and **Joe Grzenda**).

Another Oriole who came close was **Brooks Robinson** who, in 1962 on May 6 (Dodger Stadium) and May 9 (Memorial Stadium), hit bases loaded homers in back-to-back games.

Post-Season Slams-Slugging Pitchers: Only two pitchers have ever hit grand slam home runs in post-season play. Both were Orioles at the time, and both did it in 1970. In game one of the '70 ALCS, **Mike Cuellar** hit one off the Twins' **Jim Perry** (at Minny) and in the 3rd game of the World Series vs. the Reds, **Dave McNally** found the range off **Wayne Granger** (at Baltimore).

The blast by **Cuellar** was the only ALCS grand slam ever until **Don Baylor** hit one for the Angels vs. Milwaukee in '82 (off **Moose Haas**) ... Only two bases loaded homers have ever been hit in NLCS play: the Dodgers' **Ron Cey** and **Dusty Baker** in '77.

Opponents: Seven opponents have hit two career slams each against the O's. Nobody has hit more ... Three have hit two at Memorial Stadium: **Roy Sievers** (Was.), **Moose Skowron** (N.Y.), **Mike Epstein** (Was.).

Grand Slam Notes (Cont.)

There have been 10 alien pitchers to throw up two grand slams each to Baltimore batters, including three still active: **Aurelio Lopez** (Det.) to **John Lowenstein** ('83) and **Mike Young** ('84), both at Detroit; **Don Aase** (Cal.) to **Lee May** ('79) and **Doug DeCinces** ('81), both at Baltimore; **Lamarr Hoyt** (Chi.) to **Terry Crowley** ('80) and **DeCinces** ('81), both at Baltimore.

Orioles "Gophers:" Among Orioles pitchers, **Milt Pappas** was the most generous. He gave up 6 bases loaded homers during his tenure in Baltimore while **Dave McNally** was victimized 4 times. On the other hand, **Jim Palmer** never allowed a slam in 558 games spanning nearly 4,000 innings. Among current O's, **Dennis Martinez** has thrown up the most—3.

Notes on 20-Game Winners

Baltimore pitchers have produced 23 20-game seasons in the past 18 years (starting '68), far and away the most in the majors over that period.

From '68 thru '80, a span of 13 years, at least one Oriole pitcher accumulated 20 or more victories to set a major league record. The old standard was 12 by the New York Giants from '03 to '14, a mark single-handedly assured by **Christy Mathewson** who won 20+ in each of those years.

In 1971 four Baltimore pitchers reached the 20-win plateau. The only other foursome in the entire history of major league baseball to have achieved the feat was a quartet from the 1920 White Sox (51 years earlier): **Urban "Red" Faber**-23, **Claude Williams**-22, **Dickie Kerr**-21 and **Ed Cicotte**-21. Despite that achievement, the White Sox finished second that year, two games behind Cleveland.

The four Orioles all won their 20th games within 6 days: **McNally** was the first on 9/21; then in a series in Cleveland, the other three joined him: **Cuellar** (9/24—first game-clinched division title), **Dobson** (9/24—2nd game), and **Palmer** (9/26).

Stone was the earliest 20-game winner in club history, winning his 20th game on August 19 en route to a team record 25 victories in '80. Three other Orioles' hurlers have recorded their 20th wins in August: **McNally** (8/25) and **Cuellar** (8/27) in '71 and **Palmer** (8/30) in '75.

The first Oriole to win 20, and the only one in the club's first 14 seasons in Baltimore ('54 thru '67) was lefthander **Steve Barber** in '63.

MOST VALUABLE ORIOLES

This award is presented annually by the Sports Boosters of Maryland to the most valuable Oriole player by vote of sportswriters and broadcasters who cover the team on a regular basis.

In 1985, Eddie Murray won the award for the 5th time in a row and the sixth time in his 9-year career ('78, '81, thru '85). Only one other Oriole, Brooks Robinson, has won it more than 3 times. Robinson earned the honor 4 times ('60, '62, '64 and '71).

Murray received nine of a possible 15 first place votes while amassing 63 points in the 5-3-1 scoring system. Cal Ripken, with two first place votes and a total of 36, was second to Murray in the voting.

Mike Young was third with 3 first place votes and a total of 23 points, while Floyd Rayford was fourth with 20 points (one first place vote). Fred Lynn was the only other Oriole named on a ballot. He received one point.

Notes: For only the 3rd time in the last 26 seasons, an Oriole player did not win a Gold Glove last year ('80 and '81 were the other years without one). At one point the O's had a string of 20 straight seasons ('60 thru '79) with at least one Gold Glove. The club has received four in a season five times, three awards twice and two in six different seasons.

With a total of 48 Gold Gloves since the inception of the award in '54, the Orioles lead the majors. St. Louis, which had two winners in '85 is second with 43. Other leaders are Cincinnati-37, New York Yankees-35, Pittsburgh-32, and Philadelphia and Boston-31 each.

Eddie Murray had won 3 consecutive Gold Gloves prior to '85. Only George Scott and Vic Power (7) have won the award more times among American League first basemen. The only Baltimore first baseman to win a Gold Glove, Eddie is the seventh Oriole to win at least three.

Other Orioles who have been multiple winners are: Brooks Robinson—16 (tied with Jim Kaat for most ever by one player); Paul Blair and Mark Belanger—8 each; Jim Palmer and Bobby Grich—4 each; Dave Johnson—3; and Luis Aparicio—2.

The Gold Glove Awards are presented by *The Sporting News* in cooperation with the Rawlings Sporting Goods Company to those players considered to be the best at their positions by vote of league managers and coaches. Selection is based not only on consistency (i.e. fielding percentage) but also on range, overall ability, and effectiveness.

THE BIRDS AND THE BROWNS

The Baltimore Orioles were charter members of the American League when it began operation in 1901. However, after two seasons, the club was moved to New York where it ultimately became known as the the New York Yankees.

The franchise from which the current Orioles descend came into the A.L. in 1901 representing Milwaukee, but in '02 was transferred to St. Louis and named the Browns. In 52 seasons ('02 thru '53) the Browns were, perhaps, the most unsuccessful team in major league history. They were 3,416-4,465 (.433) and finished in the 2nd division 40 times. They won their only pennant in '44 then lost the world series in 6 games to their home town rivals, the Cardinals.

ARTIFICIAL TURF: In '85, the Orioles were 11-12 (.478) in the A.L. ballparks with artificial turf (Kansas City, 4-2; Minnesota, 3-3; Seattle, 3-3; Toronto, 1-4) placing them 8th in the league behind leader Toronto (64-34, .653)

Baltimore's lifetime record on the carpet is 135-129 (.511). The O's are 128-125 (.506) in A.L. stadiums (Chicago, 27-24 from '68 thru '75; Kansas City, 29-44; Minnesota, 12-12; Seattle, 31-18; Toronto, 29-27) and 7-4 in 4 world series ('70 Cincinnati, 2-0; '71 Pittsburgh, 0-3; '79 Pittsburgh, 2-1; '83 Philadelphia, 3-0).

BATTING: (See also "home runs.") The O's were tied with Milwaukee for 7th in the A.L. with a .263 (5517-1451) team batting average. In other categories, the Orioles were 3rd in the majors in on-base pct. (.336) behind the Red Sox (.347) and Yankees (.344); 3rd in the A.L. in bases on balls with 604, the 5th straight year they have finished among the top 3 in the A.L. in that category; 3rd in strikeouts (908), 2nd highest in 13 years and the most since '77; 7th in GIDP's with 132, the same total as in '84.

Baltimore batted .259 (2912-755) with 105 homers and 432 runs scored in 85 first half games and .267 (2605-696) with 109 home runs and 386 runs scored in 76 second half games.

Runs: The Orioles established a club record for runs scored with 818, bettering the old mark of 805 set in '83. Only 3 clubs in the majors scored 800 or more runs in '85: Yankees, 839; Orioles, 818; Red Sox, 800.

The O's scored 8 or more runs in a game 34 times (they were 30-4, .882); 6 or more 64 times (they were 56-8, .875) and 5 or more 75 times (they were 61-14, .813). When held to 4 runs or less the Orioles were 21-64 (.247).

They also scored 6 or more runs in an inning 18 times, 2 more times than the O's had done it in the 4 previous seasons combined ('81 thru '84). The Birds scored 5 or more runs in an inning 29 times; 10 runs-once; 8-once; 7-5 times; 6-11 times; 5-5 times.

Slugging: The O's also set club records for total bases with 2,370, surpassing the old standard of 2,333 set in '83. Only the Red Sox (2,455) had more among major league teams in '85. The Birds' major league leading .430 slugging pct. also was a club record breaking the previous high of .421 set in '83.

With Runners in Scoring Position: The Orioles leading hitters with runners in scoring position were: Alan Wiggins, .380 (50-19); Jim Dwyer, .368 (57-21); Eddie Murray, .358 (137-49); Cal Ripken, .321 (165-53); Lee Lacy, .319 (113-36); John Shelby, .317 (41-13); Gary Roenicke, .296 (54-16); Larry Sheets, .292 (72-21); Team, .288 (1252-360).

CLOSE GAMES/LATE INNING WINS: The Birds were 19-12 (.475) in 1-run games, 10th in the A.L. ahead of Oakland, Boston, Cleveland, and Texas. It was the 2nd straight year the O's had a losing record in 1-run games, but only their 3rd in the last 12 seasons and only their 10th in 32.

Baltimore was 2nd in the A.L. behind Oakland with a 19-12 (.613) record in 2-run games. The Birds had led the league in that department in '82, '83 and '84. Combined the O's were 38-33 in 1-run and 2-run games.

The O's were 17-19 in games decided in a club's final at bat. The O's came from behind to win on 48 occasions and were 27-22 in games decided in the 7th inning or later. Baltimore was 63-11 in contests which it led entering the 7th inning.

The O's won 8 games in "sudden death" at Memorial Stadium. Three of those coming on 9th inning home runs by Fred Lynn, including 2 in consecutive games vs. the Twins, May 10-11. The Orioles were beaten in "sudden death" 7 times on the road, including 3 such losses at New York and 2 at Seattle.

The O's finished 11th in the A.L. in extra inning games (3-8, .273). It was their worst record in overtime games since '63 (4-11). It was also their 2nd consecutive season with a losing record in extra inning games, but only their 6th in the last 22 seasons.

DAY/NIGHT: Baltimore was 6th in the A.L. in day games with a 24-23 (.551) record. Thru Aug. 24, the O's were 22-12 in day games, but managed to win only 2 of their final 13 day games. The Birds were also 6th in the league in night games with a 59-55 (.518) mark.

DAYS IN EACH POSITION: First (21); 2nd (28); 3rd (42); 4th (64); 5th (26); 6th (1). Toronto maintained sole possession of first place from May 20 thru the end of the season. The Orioles got off to an unaccustomed fast start and occupied first place 19 of the first 35 days of the season.

After 11 straight days in first, however, the O's were nudged out of the top spot by Toronto on May 13 and except for two days (May 17, 19) when the O's shared first place with the Jays, no other team was in first in the A.L. East the remainder of the '85 season.

After May 26, the O's could get no closer than 4 games out of first, the latest was June 18. The Orioles last occupied 2nd place on June 9, and then after a 2-day hold on third, they spent 83 of the next 86 days in either 4th or 5th place.

The Birds regained 3rd place on Sep. 6 and held it the remainder of the month. However on the final day of the regular season, the Tigers clubbed the O's 11-3 breaking a 3rd place tie between the 2 clubs. The Orioles were eliminated after 148 games, exactly the same number of games when their elimination occurred in '84.

DESIGNATED HITTERS: Orioles designated hitters were 10th in the A.L. in batting with a .232 average (613-142), the club's 2nd lowest dh average since the rule was instituted in '73. The Birds' dh's hit .219 (607-133) in '84.

The O's were tied for 5th in homers in the A.L. with 26 and drove in 82 runs. Only Toronto had less (78). Baltimore dh's also bounced into 21 double plays, only Cleveland (23) had more, and fanned 117 times, 5th highest figure in the league.

Individuals: Rookie **Larry Sheets** served as the Orioles dh in 93 games and batted .262 (294-77) in that role with 13 hrs and 43 rbi. **Sheets** was 4th in batting among dh's who appeared in at least half of their team's games.

DOUBLEHEADERS: The Orioles participated in only 5 doubleheaders, matching the club record for fewest ever ('80 and '84) and failed to win a twinbill for the first time in the club's history. The Birds lost 2 twin bills and split 3 giving them a 3-7 record (.300) in doubleheader games. Only Texas (1-3) had a lower pct. in the A.L. Baltimore went 9-2-2 in doubleheaders during the '83 and '84 seasons combined.

For comparison's sake: In '55, the O's played a club record 32 doubleheaders.

FIELDING: The Orioles finished the season tied for 8th in fielding in the A.L. with a .979 mark (6127 tc, 129 e). It was their lowest fielding pct. since '61 (.979) and the 129 errors were the most committed by the Birds since '59 (146). In the previous 24 seasons, the O's had finished first or 2nd in the A.L. in fielding 19 times, 3rd twice, 4th once and 5th twice.

Orioles catchers set a club record allowing only 4 passed balls, 2nd in the A.L. to Toronto (3). The Birds turned 168 double plays, 3rd best in the league.

Individuals: **Cal Ripken**, who for the 3rd consecutive season played every inning of every game at shortstop, led all A.L. shortstops in putouts (286) and double plays (123) and was 2nd to **Tony Fernandez** in successful total chances (760) and assists (474). His .967 fielding pct. (786 tc, 26 e) was 4th in the A.L. among qualifying shortstops.

Rich Dauer finished the '85 season with a .9875 (4512 tc, 57 e) career fielding mark at 2nd base, well above the existing A.L. record for highest pct. (.984 held by 4 others). **Dauer**, however, with 9 years and 965 career games at 2nd, is shy of meeting the 10 years or 1,000 games qualifying standards.

Fred Lynn was 4th in the A.L. in fielding among qualifying outfielders with a .994 pct. (322 tc, 2 e).

Mike Boddicker was 2nd in the A.L. in double plays by pitchers (6), 3rd in total chances (74), 4th in assists (46) and 5th in putouts (26), despite missing 3 starts due to injury. He led the majors in successful chances in '84 (96).

Storm Davis didn't commit an error in his 31 appearances (35 tc's). Only Detroit's **Dan Petry** (62 tc), K.C.'s **Mark Gubicza** (49 tc) and Minnesota's **Bert Blyleven** (49 tc) handled more chances without an error.

HOME AND AWAY: The Orioles were tied for 6th in the A.L. with a 45-36 (.556) record at home. The Orioles have had a winning record at home for 13 straight seasons and 27 of their 32 seasons in Baltimore. It was the 2nd straight year (and only their 2nd since '76) that the club has fallen below a .600 winning pct. at Memorial Stadium.

The O's were 38-42 (.475) on the road marking only the 2nd time in the last 18 seasons (starting '68) that the team has been below .500 in away games.

HOME RUNS: The Orioles hit a club record 214 home runs, tops in the majors and the 7th highest total in major league history. The previous club record was 181 in '79. The Tigers were 2nd with 202. It was the first time in history that two clubs in the same league hit 200 home runs in the same season.

The O's 214 homers accounted for 43% of their total run production (355 of 818). The Birds also hit a club record 103 homers at home and the combined total of Orioles and opponents home runs at Memorial Stadium was 190, also a record.

Baltimore hit 3 or more in a game 25 times; 7-once; 6-once; 5-once; 4-four times; three-18 times. They tied a club record with 7 hrs in one game at California on Aug. 26. Cleveland and Detroit felt the Orioles home run power most. The Birds hit 26 against each.

Orioles with 10 Or More: A total of 9 Orioles hit 10 or more homers tying a major league record with 9 other clubs. **Lee Lacy** hit his 8th and 9th homers on Aug. 25, then went without a homer over his last 31 games.

Grand Slams: The Birds also led the majors with 7 grand slams. It marked the 5th straight season the O's have led or tied for the major league lead in grand slams ('81 thru '85). The Orioles have hit 36 grand slams during that span, 13 more than the closest team (California, 23).

Eddie Murray led the club with 3 grand slams and rookie **Fritz Connally**, who was subsequently sent to Rochester, became the 7th player in big league history to make his first 2 major league homers both grand slams. **Murray** now has 12 lifetime, tied for 2nd among major league active with **George Foster** (Mets) behind the A's **Dave Kingman** (15).

Pinch Hit Homers: The Orioles also topped the A.L. in pinch hit homers with 6, one more than Minnesota and Detroit and one less than major league leader Chicago (Cubs).

INJURIES: Orioles pitchers were hit hardest by injuries beginning with **Mike Flanagan**, who ruptured his left Achilles tendon in a charity basketball game on Jan. 23. **Flanagan** missed the entire first half of the season and was not activated until July 20.

Rookie reliever **Nate Snell** was on the disabled list for one month after he suffered a broken rib on his right side when he was struck by a line drive off the bat of Minnesota's **Mike Stenhouse** on July 9. **Snell** was activated on Aug. 8.

Mike Boddicker missed his last 3 starts while suffering from tendinitis in his left knee, an injury that nagged him throughout his last 4 outings. **Storm Davis** also missed his last 3 starts after **Mike Pagliarulo**'s line drive hit him on the right wrist in a game against the Yankees on Sep. 21. **Davis** suffered nerve and tendon damage to the wrist.

Tippy Martinez, for the 2nd straight year, was plagued by a sore left shoulder. **Tippy** was left particularly ineffective the first half of '85. He received a cortisone shot at the all-star break which alleviated much of the pain in the 2nd half.

Rick Dempsey missed 3 games after suffering a bruised left shoulder in a collision at home with Seattle's **Jim Presley** on Sep. 1. **Dan Ford** aggravated his left knee in a pre-game mishap on June 8 and was placed on the disabled list for the remainder of the season. He was operated on July 17 and spent the rest of the season at his home in California.

Lee Lacy tore a ligament in his right thumb in an exhibition game vs. Montreal on March 12. He was placed on the disabled list on March 28 underwent surgery on April 3. **Lacy** missed 28 regular season games before returning on May 13.

Fred Lynn tore ligaments in his left ankle in Minnesota on July 22, but continued to play until he reinjured it in Oakland on Aug. 24. **Lynn** missed more than 3 weeks before returning on Sep. 16. He was also bothered periodically by muscle spasms in his lower back, an injury which originally occurred on June 28 in Boston. He missed approximately 10 games throughout the year due to the back injury.

Joe Nolan was put on the disabled list on July 2 with chronically sore knees and remained at his home in St. Louis the rest of the season. **John Shelby** tore cartilage in his rib cage during the pre-game practice on Sep. 24 and appeared in only one game the final 2 weeks of '85.

MANAGERIAL CHANGE: Before he was dismissed, **Joe Altobelli** managed the Orioles thru June 12, compiling a 29-26 record. **Cal Ripken, Sr.**, served as interim-manager on June 13 and was winner in his one game. **Earl Weaver** began his 2nd tour with the club on June 14 and the O's went 53-52 thru the rest of '85.

MONTH-BY-MONTH: **April:** 12-7 (8-2 at home); **May:** 14-12 (5-4 at home); **June:** 11-15 (7-8 at home); **July:** 14-14 (7-10 at home); **Aug.:** 16-11 (8-3 at home); **Sep./Oct.:** 16-19 (10-9 at home).

PINCH HITTING: For the 2nd straight year, the Orioles pinch hitters were the busiest in the A.L. with 264 plate appearances. O's pinch swingers, however, managed only a .186 (220-41) collective batting average, a 70 point drop from '84. The O's were 11th in pinch hitting average in the A.L., but did lead the league with 6 pinch homers.

Baltimore pinch hitters were also first in the A.L. in at bats (219), runs (29), total bases (72), doubles (tied, 9), triples (2), sac flies (6), walks (36) and strikeouts (49).

Larry Sheets and **Wayne Gross** hit back-to-back pinch home runs on Aug. 12 off Cleveland's **Jerry Reed**, tying a major league record. The last time the Orioles did it was on Aug. 26, '66 when **Boog Powell** and **Vic Roznovsky** both homered off Boston's **Lee Stange**.

Individuals: **Larry Sheets'** 2 pinch hit home runs tied 4 others for the league lead. **Gary Roenicke** was the A.L.'s 3rd busiest pinch hitter with 40 plate appearances. **Jim Dwyer** tied for 3rd in the A.L. for most pinch hit rbi (8). **Lee Lacy** (.500, 4-2, 0 hr, 0 rbi) and **Mike Young** (.333, 18-6, 0 hr, 4 rbi) were the O's most successful pinch hitters.

PITCHING: The Orioles 4.38 era, 8th in the A.L., was the highest in club history, breaking the old mark of 4.21 established in '55. O's hurlers also set new highs for runs allowed with 763 (previous high- 754 in '55); hits allowed with 1,480 (previous high- 754 in '55); and home runs allowed with 160 (previous high- 147 in '62 and '82). Likewise, opponents batted .270 (1480-5491), the highest mark ever against the Orioles.

The 32 complete games were the least by an Oriole staff (excluding abbreviated '81 season) since '67 (29). The O's threw only 6 shutouts, lowest total since '54 when they also had 6. Their 568 walks were the most allowed since '61 (617) and 4th highest total in the O's history.

The O's trailed after the first inning 52 times and went 20-32 in those games. They allowed at least one run in the first inning on 62 occasions for a total of 117 runs. O's starters failed to get past 4 innings on 41 occasions (O's were 9-32 in those games).

The Birds staff had a 4.38 era thru 85 first half games and the same mark thru 76 2nd half games. O's starters were 60-60 with a 4.69 era (946.2 ip/493 er) while relievers were 23-18 with a 3.76 era (480.2 ip/201 er).

Since '54, O's pitchers have combined for the 2nd lowest era in the A.L. with a 3.393 mark (42,677.1 ip/16,091 er) to the Yankees' 3.391 (42,728.2 ip/16,102 er).

STREAKS: In '85, the O's longest winning and losing streaks were each 6 games. The O's won 6 in a row (Aug. 13-19) and lost 6 straight (Sep. 28-Oct. 3).

WINS: Although they finished with their lowest victory total (excluding the abbreviated seasons of '72 and '81) and winning pct. since '67 (.76-85, .472), the Orioles did post their 18th consecutive winning season, giving them the longest current streak of its kind, the 2nd longest in major league history behind the Yankees' all-time record of 39 consecutive winning campaigns from '29 thru '64.

With 85 wins in '84 and 83 in '85, the Orioles failed to win 90 games in consecutive seasons for the first time since '62-'63. The Birds also finished below 2nd place in consecutive seasons for the first time since '64-'65.

Baltimore has still won more games than any team in the majors over the past 30 years (starting '56) with a 2667-2069 (.563) record. The Yankees are 2nd with a 2661-2087 slate (.561). See page 00 for more details.

REVIEW OF ORIOLES' 1985 SEASON

For the Orioles, the 1985 Season, was perhaps best characterized by five principal elements: (1) Personnel changes; (2) A fast start and a slow finish; (3) Prolific scoring and home run production, that smashed existing team standards; (4) The least efficient pitching in the team's 32 Baltimore based seasons; (5) Club record home attendance in excess of 2,000,000 for the third straight year.

A YEAR OF TRANSITION

The turnover in Orioles uniformed personnel between the end of the '84 season and Dec. '85, a period of 14 months, was extensive. So much so that by the end of that span, less than half of the players who had worn the Orioles colors in the '83 World Series remained on the scene.

Thirteen players, a manager and two coaches had departed, to be replaced by a like number of newcomers in a major re-building project.

Perhaps it all started when **Jim Palmer** stepped down in May '84, but the program took on steam at the end of that season. Two other Orioles legends, the veterans **Al Bumbry** and **Ken Singleton** were not re-signed, and neither was **Benny Ayala** nor **Tom Underwood**.

Long time batting instructor **Ralph Rowe** moved on and was replaced by the O's former pinch-hitting specialist **Terry Crowley**. Another former Oriole of legendary distinction, **Frank Robinson**, also re-joined the club's coaching staff.

In the meantime, the O's went out into the free agent market and acquired talented veterans **Fred Lynn**, **Lee Lacy** and **Don Aase**.

Todd Cruz didn't make the spring training cut, and early in the season **Joe Nolan** & **John Lowenstein** retired and **Dan Ford** played his last for the Orioles.

Four rookies helped take up the slack. On opening day, **Fritz Connally**, **Larry Sheets**, **Ken Dixon** and **Nate Snell** were among the 25, and, by the time **Connally** had been sent down to Rochester, rookie catching prospect **Al Pardo** had been re-called.

Joe Altobelli who had been at the helm in '83 when the O's won their 3rd world championship was replaced in mid-June by **Earl Weaver**. A week later **Ray Miller** left to manage the Minnesota Twins and minor league pitching instructor **Ken Rowe** was promoted to plug the gap.

Soon after that, the O's signed fleet footed 2nd baseman **Alan Wiggins**, adding some badly needed speed to the offense.

The changes continued into the off-season. Two veteran infielders, **Rich Dauer** and **Lenn Sakata**, were not re-signed. General Manager **Hank Peters** traded **Gary Roenick** to the Yankees for pitcher **Rich Bordi** and infielder **Rex Hudler**. Then he sent the O's long-time long reliever **Sammy Stewart** to the Red Sox for infielder **Jackie Gutierrez**.

By the time opening day rolls around, other changes are likely as the Orioles continue to make the moves designed to thrust them back into the mainstream of the pennant race from which they've been absent the past 2 seasons.

FAST START, SLOW FINISH

After a deliberately Spartan spring training regimen designed to counter the club's decade long propensity for desultory regular season starts, the O's won their first 4 games, and went on to post an 18-9 record by May 11th. At that point, they were tops in the tough eastern division.

It was the Birds' most bullish start in years. Unfortunately, it didn't last. They went 65-69 the rest of the way while posting the club's lowest won-lost percentage since '67 (83-78), .516.

However, it was also the 18th consecutive season the Orioles had logged a winning record, a feat surpassed by only one franchise, the New York Yankees whose 39 straight winning campaigns from '26 thru '64 constitute the major league record.

And, despite being out of the pennant race down the stretch, Orioles fans set a club attendance record for the 3rd straight year while exceeding 2 million at home, also for the 3rd season in a row.

A SCORING MACHINE

The O's scored a whopping 818 runs (topping the previous club record of 805 set in '80). In that category they were 2nd in the majors, to the Yankees' 839.

In home runs, the Birds were second to none. In fact, their 214 homers ranked 7th on the all-time list (the '61 Yankees top the ledger at 240). Among those many long balls were 7 grand slams, enabling the O's to lead the majors in that category for the 5th straight year.

The long ball power helped produce runs in clusters as illustrated by the fact that on 29 different occasions they scored 5 runs or more in an inning, and 75 times they scored 5 or more in a game. The O's also set club records in total bases (2370) and slugging percentage (.430).

PITCHING PROBLEMS

With an 18-9 start, un-precedented power and scoring capacity, why did the O's play at less than a .500 pace for the last 5 months of the season?

Though it might be something of an over simplification, the appropriate one-word answer is "pitching".

The Orioles, whose distinction of being the winningest club in the majors over the past 30 years is probably due more to pitching than to any other single commodity, were out of character. It was eerie, like celebrating Halloween all-season long.

REVIEW '85 SEASON (Cont.)

The staff's community effort resulted in several significant negative club records: highest era (4.38), most runs and earned runs yielded (764 & 694), most hits (1480) and most home runs balls (160).

The opposition combined to hit .270 vs. the O's as the Birds recorded their lowest totals in shutouts (6) since '54, fewest complete games (32) since '67 and most walks (568) since '61. The O's trailed after the 1st inning 52 times and went 20-32 in those games. When their starters failed to get past 4 innings as they did on 41 different occasions, the Birds went 9-32.

Perhaps the following statistic best illustrates the O's primary conflict, their ability to score contrasted by their inability to keep the other fellow from following suit: When the O's scored 5 or more runs, they went 61-14, (.813). But, when they scored 4 runs or less, they were a mere 21-64 (.247).

INDIVIDUAL ACCOLADES

Both **Eddie Murray** and **Cal Ripken** scored and drove in more than 100 runs each (interesting sidelight: though their combined total of stolen bases was 7, they both out-scored the Cardinals' rookie speedster **Vince Coleman** who swiped 110).

Ripken also played every inning of every game to extend his totals to 5457 innings (believed to be a major league record) and 603 games.

Floyd Rayford effectively patched up a problem at 3rd base (.306 average, 18 hr) and also doubled as a solid back-up catcher to **Ridley Dempsey**.

Dempsey set career highs in both rbi (52) and home runs (12).

Lee Lacy, whose opening day was 5 weeks late because of a spring training hand injury, hit .300 most of the year before a late season slump deflated the final figure to .293.

Sophomore **Mike Young** came into his own (28 homers, 81 rbi) trailed only **Murray** and **Ripken** in productivity and enjoyed a single month (August) like no other Oriole before him (32 rbi, 11 homers).

Fred Lynn played an excellent centerfield (though his "Rambo" style perhaps made him more vulnerable to injury), and specialized in 9th inning homers, 6 of them in total (and 3 of those game winners) before his wounds caught up with him in late season.

Accolades are also appropriate in the cases of 3 relievers: newcomer **Don Aase** who shook off a shaky start to become the club's top short man (10-6, 14 saves); 32-year old rookie **Nate Snell** who was on a season long roll until a line drive broke a rib on July 9th; and **Sammy Stewart** who was the O's top reliever in the early months before succumbing to late-season blahs.

The rookie **Ken Dixon** also deserves plaudits for his 9-3 record as a starter. His 4.00 era in that capacity was the lowest on the staff among starters.

SOME HIGHLIGHTS/LOWLIGHTS

Apr. 8 . . . Opening Day: The O's didn't get their 1st '85 hit until the 7th inning but still led the Rangers' 2-1 thanks to **Charlie Hough**'s 8 walks and 2 **Don Slaught** passed balls. Rangers tied it in 8th, but **Eddie Murray** won it with a 2-run homer off loser **Dave Rozema** in the bottom of the 8th.

Apr. 19 . . . Connally's First Grand Slam: Rookie **Fritz Connally** whose first 2 major league home runs were grand slams hit his first at Toronto off **Doyle Alexander** on the 14th pitch thrown to him in that plate appearance. **Connally** fouled off 9 pitches before connecting to give O's 4-1 lead in 5th, but O's lost 6-5.

May 5 . . . Rip goes 5-for-6 vs. Twins: The day after he broke **Brooks Robinson**'s club record for consecutive games played, Rip enjoyed a big day at the Metrodome while going 5-for-6 with 4 rbi. The O's won 10-5, beating nemesis **John Butcher** for the first time ever after 5 straight losses to the Twins right-hander.

May 10-11-12 . . . Lynn vs. Twins: Lynn sent fans home happy 2 nights in a row (May 10 & 11) with game-winning "sudden death" 9th inning homers, off **Ron Davis** and **Curt Wardle** respectively (**Davis** was the loser both nights). Those 2 victories put the O's in 1st place with an 18-9 record.

No Oriole had ever won 2 games in a row with "sudden death" homers though **Dick Kryhoski** ('54) and **John Steffero** ('83) had broken up consecutive games with game-ending singles.

The next afternoon, **Lynn** delivered a home run in the 9th inning for the 3rd straight time, though this time the O's were well behind and lost 7-3.

Jun. 3 . . . Lacy's First A.L. Homer: **Lee Lacy** chose the right time for his 1st A.L. homer. It was a 2-run bottom of the 9th inning shot off the Angels' ace reliever **Donnie Moore** to rightfield climaxing a 4-run rally enabling O's to beat California 7-5 after entering the final inning with a 5-3 deficit.

Jun. 4 . . . Longest A.L. Game of Year: It took the Angels 5:04 and 15 innings in Baltimore to put the O's away 6-5 on **Mike Brown**'s single off loser **Ken Dixon** . . . It was longest game by time in A.L. and matched the Red Sox-Angels game of Apr. 30 at Anaheim as longest by innings.

Jun. 10 . . . Lacy's Broken Bat Homer: **Lacy** led off game at Tiger Stadium with a broken bat home run to the opposite field (right), a rare if not unique occurrence, off **Jack Morris**. The Tigers insisted on an inspection of **Lacy's** bat, but no foreign substances were found.

Lacy, in one of most exciting games of year, also hit a home run off **Aurelio Lopez** in the top of the 11th to give the O's a one run-lead but the Tigers then rallied in the home half to win on **Barbaro Garvey**'s lead off homer and a subsequent game-winning single by **Lance Parrish**.

Earlier **Parrish**'s 7th inning homer off **Tippy** who had just relieved **Dennis** had tied the game at 5 . . . With 2 down in the 9th and the O's trailing by one, **Floyd Rayford** homered off **Willie Hernandez** to tie the game again.

Jun. 12 . . . Alto's Last Game: The O's dropped their 5th in a row, 6-2 to the Tigers at Detroit, and **Joe Altobelli** was relieved the following day. At the time, the O's were 29-26, in 4th place, 8 games behind.

Jun. 14 . . . Earl's Return: After **Cal Ripken Sr.** guided the O's to an 8-3 win over Milwaukee in Baltimore on Thursday the 13th, **Earl Weaver** returned to the helm against the same opponent he faced in his final game before retiring, on Oct. 3, '82, the Brewers.

Earl got a good look at the O's biggest problem in the very first inning (pitching) when starter **Storm Davis** spotted Milwaukee a 3-0 lead on 43 first inning pitches. However, **Storm** settled down and threw only 82 more over the last 8 innings as the O's came from behind to win 7-5.

Just as his big power man, **Boog Powell**, stole 2nd in the first inning of **Earl's** big league debut in July, '68, so did **Eddie Murray** in the opening inning of his return.

There were 3 in uniform for the comeback who had been in the starting lineup for the '68 debut: **Frank Robinson**, **Andy Etchebarren** and **Frank Howard** (for the Senators) . . . Some 14,000 "walk-up" tickets were sold for **Earl's** homecoming.

Jul. 11 . . . Lynn does it Again: Lynn's 2-out 3-run homer off Chicago's **Mike Stanton** in the bottom of the 9th capped a 4-run rally that gave the O's a 7-6 win over the Sox. It was Lynn's sixth 9th inning homer of the year and his 3rd "sudden death" game winner (see more details on that game under "vs. Chicago" on page 43).

Jul. 13 . . . Near Miss vs. ChiSox: Trailing Chicago's **Britt Burns** 9-0 after 4½ innings, the O's scored 8 times over next 2 frames, but could get no closer. After that **Burns** stiffened, and went the route, winning 9-8 on a 144 pitch effort. **Gary Roenicke** hit 2 homers, one a grand slam, to account for 6 rbi. **Carlton Fisk** and **Tony LaRussa** were both ejected.

Aug. 21 . . . 10-Run Inning: The O's tied a club record by scoring 10 runs in the 3rd inning at Seattle and led 10-0, then held on to win 11-8.

Aug. 23 . . . Late Foot at Oakland: Held scoreless on one hit by the A's **Jose Rijo** and **Steve Mura** thru 8 innings the O's scored 7 times in the top of the 9th to beat the A's and their relief ace **Jay Howell**, 7-2.

Aug. 26 . . . Eddie's Big Night at Anaheim: Eddie Murray put on a memorable performance with a club record tying 9 rbi on 4 hits including 3 homers, one of them a grand slam (his 12th

lifetime). Eddie wasn't alone, however, as the O's blasted California, 17-3, on a 17-hit attack featuring 7 Baltimore home runs. (For more details, see "Vs. California" on page 41.)

Sep. 7 . . . Young Beats 5-Man Infield: With bases loaded none out and O's **Mike Young** batting in bottom of 9th vs. Angels Manager **Gene Mauch** inserted **Gus Polidor** (his major league debut) as a 5th infielder (replacing right fielder) and spotted him on right side of the infield between 2nd baseman **Rob Wilfong** and 1st baseman **Bobby Grich**.

However, Young smashed a game-winning single down the line past Grich off **Donnie Moore** to end it.

Sep. 8 . . . 43 Players: The O's (20) and Angels (23) combined to use 43 players, a record for an Orioles game as Angels scored 3 in top of 11th to beat O's 7-4 . . . **Polidor** who had debuted the day before defensively ignited a game-winning 11th inning rally with a base hit in his first major league at bat.

ORIOLES VS. OPPONENTS—1985

VS. BOSTON ('85: 5-8 . . . Lifetime: 272-281) . . . The O's lost the season series to the Sox for the 2nd straight year and for the 3rd time in 4 seasons. The Carmines are the only club in the A.L. with a lifetime winning record vs. Baltimore.

FIRST DEAL IN 25 YEARS: The O's-Red Sox deal on Dec. 17 in which **Sammy Stewart** went to Boston in exchange for Jackie Gutierrez, was the first between the 2 clubs in a quarter century. On that occasion, the Birds swapped outfielder **Willie "Razzama" Tasby** to the Carmines for another outfielder, defensive whiz **Gene Stephens**. The date was June 9, '60.

The only other transaction between them in that span was a cash deal in '66 (Aug. 15) when the O's sold the contract of lefthanded pitcher **Billy Short** to the Red Sox.

1985 SEASON SERIES: At home the O's won only once against the Sox (1-5) while being out-scored 19-46 in 6 games. The lone victory occurred in the final game of the season between the 2 clubs (2nd game of dh, Oct. 3, 9-8), on a 5-run come-from-behind uprising in the 8th inning. That was **John Habyan's** 1st big league victory (in relief) and **Eddie Murray's** 2-run double was the decisive blow.

That success snapped Boston's 8-game winning streak in Baltimore. So the Red Sox go into '86 having won 8 of their last 9 at Memorial Stadium, and own a 10-3 mark here in the last two full seasons.

Overall, the Sox batted .313 (473-148) in the 13 game season series while scoring 71 runs, including a .332 mark (229-76) in 6 games at Memorial Stadium. The O's hit .250 (440-110) and tallied 53 times.

The Sox sweep of the 3 games series on June 7-8-9 (8-4, 2-12-0), was their first at Memorial Stadium in 8 years (since '77).

RED SOX BATTING: Eleven of the 18 Red Sox who batted against the O's in '85, hit .292 or better (9 hit over .300). **Jim Rice**, a .393 hitter vs. the Birds (28-11, 3 hr, 7 rbi in 8 gms), has a .32 career average in his 11 A.L. seasons against the O's (532-115) with 35 homers and 105 rbi in 136 games.

In the last 6 years, **Tony Armas** has driven in 55 runs vs. the O's in 60 games while pounding 23 homers . . . Though **Armas** has only a .226 lifetime average against Baltimore pitching (305-69), he's hit .338 over the last 2 seasons (65-22).

The most productive of the Sox' hitters in the seasons series was **Dwight Evans** who drove in 13 runs in 13 games on a .360 average (50-18) with 3 homers. Rookie **Mike Greenwell** made an auspicious beginning against the O's with a 4-for-6 including a home run first time up off **Eric Bell** (it was his 3rd major league hit and 3rd homer on Oct. 1).

Bill Buckner in two A.L. seasons has a .284 average against the Birds (109-31). So what, you say? Well, he's hitting .436 (55-24) at Memorial Stadium and only .130 (54-7) at Fenway vs. the O's . . .

Marty Barrett is batting .340 lifetime vs. the O's (94-32), well above his .277 career average . . . **Wade Boggs**, on the other hand, has a .317 career mark against Baltimore (183-58), substantially below his .354 overall lifetime figure.

RED SOX PITCHING: Dennis "Oil Can" **Boyd**, Bruce **Hurst** and **Bobby Ojeda** were all 2-1 vs. the O's in '85. No one else had more than one decision.

The O's were the last of 26 clubs to be shutout in '85 when **Boyd** did the job in Baltimore on June 9. It was the first time the O's had been blanked since Sep. 21, '84. **Boyd** was the perpetrator on that occasion as well. The O's evened the score somewhat 3 weeks later (Jun. 29 at Boston) when they jumped on **Boyd** for 9 hits and 7 runs in 4 innings enroute to a 16-4 victory on 19 safeties. Lifetime, "Oil Can" is 4-4 vs. the O's.

The O's won't miss **Ojeda** (now with the Mets) who started and completed 3 games against them in '85. He held the O's to a .183 average (93-17) in 27 innings, walking only 3 and striking out 18. **Ojeda** leaves the A.L. with a 6-3 lifetime mark vs. the O's (4-1 at Memorial Stadium).

ORIOLES BATTING: **Floyd Rayford** was the leading hitter in the season series, topping both clubs' regulars with a .405 (37-15) average . . . **Eddie Murray** drove in 12 runs in 13 games and shared home run leadership with **Mike Young** (each had 3 vs. Carmines) . . . All 3 of **Young's** were hit off **Bruce Hurst**.

John Shelby (.333, 30-10) and **Lee Lacy**, in his first A.L. season, (.310, 42-13) also hit well vs. the Sox, but both **Fred Lynn** (.150, 20-3) and **Jim Dwyer** (.056, 18-1) had their troubles.

Rayford is the O's leading lifetime hitter vs. the Red Sox with a .353 average (68-24), and a has a .455 (33-15) average at Fenway Park.

ORIOLES PITCHING: While the Red Sox had 3 pitchers with 2-1 records, the O's had a trio who went 1-2: **Mike Boddicker**, **Storm Davis** and **Dennis Martinez**.

Don Aase (0-0) was touched for 12 hits in 20 bats by the Sox in his first 2 outings against them (June 7-9) along with 9 runs in a total of just 3.2 innings. After that, however, he was stingy as hell in 4 appearances, allowing no runs and one hit in 4.1 innings while picking up 3 saves.

Dennis Martinez is now 11-16 lifetime against Boston . . . His games (32), losses, innings (102.1) and home runs allowed (24) are all career highs vs. a single opponent . . .

Davis is only 2-6 lifetime against the Red Sox who have hit him at a .360 clip the last 2 years (136-49) . . . None of the O's lefthanders had a decision against the Red Sox in '85 . . . **Mike Flanagan** is 9-9 lifetime, **Scott McGregor** 4-8 and **Tippy Martinez** 1-1 with 9 saves.

★ ★ ★

VS. CALIFORNIA ('85: 7-5 . . . Lifetime: 193-149) . . . The O's haven't lost a season series to the Angels since '78. Meanwhile, they've won 6 and tied one while compiling a 57-31 (.648) record, including 3-1 in the '79 WS [28-16 (.636) at Anaheim, and 29-15 (.659) in Baltimore].

In '85 the O's out-hit the Angels .303 (433-131) to .227 (414-94) and outscored them 67-55.

The 15 inning game of June 4th at Baltimore, won by the Angels 5-4 on **Mike Brown's** single off losing pitcher **Ken Dixon**, was the longest of the year by time in the A.L. (5:04). The O's 2nd longest game (4:01), on Sep. 8th, was also against California and in Baltimore and was also won by the Angels, on a 3-run rally in 11th, 7-4.

Some 43 players (Cal.-23, O's-20) saw action in that Sep. 8th game, most ever to appear in an Orioles game.

Probably the most sensational defensive play of the year at Memorial Stadium was authored by **Gary Pettis** on Sep. 7 . . . He made a sensational catch, while sliding on his back, of an **Alan Wiggins** fly ball after a long run, then from a sitting position in left-center field threw a strike to 1st base to double off **John Shelby**.

ANGELS BATTING: **Juan Beniquez** was the top-hitting Angels regular in the season series (.319, 47-15) and the top run producer (8 rbi). See **Beniquez'** biog for more details.

Rod Carew hasn't fared well against the O's over the last 2 1/2 years. Since mid-'83 he is batting only .215 (32-4), but he still has a .312 (696-217) lifetime average against them.

ORIOLES VS. OPPONENTS (Cal. Cont.)

Reggie Jackson has not hit a home run against Baltimore pitching in 2 years while batting only .185 (54-10), but his career long belt against the O's (incl. 2 in ALCS) rank 3rd (tied with **Al Kaline**) behind **Harmon Killebrew** (70) and **Mickey Mantle** (44) on the O's all-time opponents' list.

Gus Polidor's major league debut, in Baltimore on Saturday, Sept. 7th was unique. With the score tied and the bases loaded in the 9th and **Mike Young** coming to the plate, **Gene Mauch** pulled right-fielder **Ruppert Jones** and inserted **Polidor** as a 5th infielder between 1st baseman **Bobby Grich** and 2nd baseman **Rob Wilfong**. **Young** then hit a smash down the 1st base line past **Grich** to win it for the O's.

The next day **Polidor** entered the game as a late inning defensive replacement at shortstop and, in his first major league plate appearance, singled off **Tippy Martinez** to start a game-winning rally in the top of the 11th.

Dick Schofield, a .162 hitter (37-6) in the season series, has a .175 mark against the O's in 2 A.L. seasons (57-10) . . . Rookie **Jack Howell** went only 4-for-27 (.148) against the O's but 2 of his hits were home runs, both on Aug. 27 [the night after **Murray**'s big blow out at the Big A (see below)]. The 2 long balls were good for 5 rbi inasmuch as one of the **Howell** homers was a slam off **Scott McGregor**.

ANGELS PITCHING: **Donnie Moore** was the Angels' dominant pitcher against the Birds . . . he appeared in 6 games and was 1-2 with 2 saves . . . **Geoff Zahn** who did not face the O's in '85 is 2-11 lifetime with a 5.42 era (89.2 ip, 54 er).

ORIOLES BATTING: Eight O's hit .300 or better, led by **John Shelby** at .571 (21-12) and **Cal Ripken** who batted .377 (53-20) against the Angels.

However, **Eddie Murray** was the big newsmaker. On Aug. 26, Monday night in Anaheim, he put on an awesome show: 4-for-6 with 3 home runs, 9 rbi, a walk and 3 runs scored . . . He hit the homers off **John Candelaria** (1) and **Alan Fowlkes** (2).

The O's won that game 17-3 and among their 17 hits were a total of 7 homers (**Shelby**, **Floyd Rayford**, **Gary Roenicke**, and **Rick Dempsey** in addition to **Murray**'s 3) . . . There were a total of 3 homers in the game (**Beniquez** & **Grich** connected as well).

Eddie drove in a total of 19 runs in the 12 game season series while batting .349 (43-15) with 3 doubles and 6 homers and a .49 on-base pct (57-28). In the last 2 years, he has accumulated 32 rbi in 24 games, smacked 9 homers, batted .368 (87-32) and had a .495 (111-55) on-base pct.

Lifetime, **Murray** who has never missed a game against the Angels since he join the O's in '77 (109 games) is batting .330 (401-134) with 24 homers and 92 rbi and a .419 on-base average (447-200), including the '79 ALCS.

He is one of 5 current O's with .300 career averages vs. the Angels. **Shelby** (.377, 69-26), **Ripken** (.333, 201-67), **Larry Sheets** (.317, 41-13), and **Alan Wiggins** (.300, 20-6) are the others.

Mike Young has homered against every opponent except the Angels.

ORIOLES PITCHING: **Dennis Martinez** was 3-1 with a 2.0 era (30.1 ip, 16 h) and one shutout. The Angels batted only .15 (103-16) against him in 4 starts . . . Lifetime, **Dennis** is 12-9 and has won 4 of his last 5.

Scott McGregor was only 1-1 in 3 starts with a 5.19 era (17.1 ip, 16 h, 10 er), but he is still 17-6 lifetime (.739) plus 1-0 in the 7 ALCS . . . Including ALCS, he has won 18 of his last 22 decision vs. California. That stretch includes a 12 game win streak that extended from July 8, '79 until he lost to **Steve Renko** on July 19, '81 . . . His lifetime era is 2.85 (IP-180, ER-57).

Scott has an 11-3 lifetime record at Anaheim (including ALCS). His 10 game winning string at the Big A was snapped on Aug. 21, '84, the same day that **Brian Downing**'s drive thru the box in the first inning broke his left ring finger and disabled him for the balance of the season . . . **Mike Flanagan**, 3-7 lifetime vs. the Angels, has never won in Anaheim where he is 0-4.

Mike Boddicker, 4-3 lifetime vs. California, has had his problem at Anaheim . . . He is 1-3 there, and has been touched for 31 hits in 18 earned runs and 10 homers in 4 starts totaling 23 innings (ER-18).

7.04). In Baltimore he's 3-0 with a 1.33 era (IP-27, H-16, ER-4, HR-0, CG-3).

Tippy Martinez has never beaten the Angels (he has defeated every other club at least once) . . . **Tippy** is 0-3, but he has saved 9 games against them.

★ ★ ★

VS. CHICAGO ('85: 8-4 . . . Lifetime: 261-231) . . . The O's are 20-10 against the White Sox starting Aug. 13, '83 (including 3-1 in '83 ALCS), and are 13-3-2 in season series vs. Chicago over the last 18 years (starting '69).

The O's out-hit the White Sox .283 to .253, out-scored them 73-50, and out-homered them 21-7 . . . The Sox' staff era (6.20) vs. the O's was the highest among all 13 opponents.

BAD DAY FOR CHISOX: The Sox suffered a serious blow—both short and long range—on July 11th at Memorial Stadium. They led 6-3 with 2 out and nobody on in the bottom of the 9th and their relief ace **Bob James** in total control on the mound.

Suddenly, **James**, one out away from his 18th save, injured his knee while pitching to **Lee Lacy** and had to leave the game. **Mike Stanton** relieved him. Moments later, after **Lacy**'s single, a walk to **Cal Ripken**, **Eddie Murray**'s rbi single, and a 3-run homer by **Fred Lynn** (his 3rd 9th inning game winning homer of the year), the O's won it. Not only had Chicago lost what seemed a certain victory but they also lost **James**' services for 3 weeks.

WHITE SOX BATTING: **Carlton Fisk** led the Sox vs. the O's in homers (2) and rbi (8) and **Tim Hulett** was the top hitter at .394 (33-13) . . . **Ron Kittle** over the last 2 seasons has batted only .107 (56-6) vs. the O's with 2 homers in 18 games and lifetime has a .185 average (92-17) with 4 homers and 13 rbi in 28 games.

WHITE SOX PITCHING: **Tom Seaver** was 2-0 and is now 3-1 lifetime vs. the O's (plus 1-1 in '69 WS). He and **Britt Burns** (5-5 lifetime, 1-2 in '85) turned in gritty back-to-back winning marathons on July 13, and 14.

On Saturday the 13th, **Burns**, staked to a 9-0 lead, nearly blew it as the O's pulled to within 9-8 in the 5th (**Gary Roenicke** hit a pair of homers off him in the 4th & 5th, one of them a grand slam), but he hung on, and went the route, allowing the O's only one hit over the last 4 innings, and won 10-8 with a 144 pitch performance.

The next afternoon, **Seaver** earned his 297th win on a 137 pitch effort.

Floyd Bannister was 0-3 vs. the O's in 3 starts to even his lifetime mark at 6-6 (excluding 0-1 in '83 ALCS). He has lost 4 straight to the O's (including ALCS) . . . **Gene Nelson** was 0-2 . . . **Richard Dotson** who did not pitch against Baltimore in '85 is 6-7 lifetime (regular season) . . . he's lost 5 of his last 6 decisions to the Birds (including ALCS).

ORIOLES BATTING: **Cal Ripken** hit .386 vs. the Sox (44-17) with 4 home runs and 14 rbi in 12 games . . . During the past 2 seasons, **Rip** has a .415 average (94-39) with 11 homers and 30 rbi in 24 games . . . His lifetime mark vs. the Sox is .315 (184-58).

Lee Lacy and **Alan Wiggins**, both in their first A.L. seasons, batted .375 (40-15) and .303 (33-10) respectively vs. Chicago . . . **Wiggins** stole 4 bases in 4 tries.

Fred Lynn is batting .300 lifetime (337-101) against Chicago . . . **Lenn Sakata** finished his Orioles career with an .053 (95-5) average vs. the Sox . . . **Larry Sheets** has an rbi against every A.L. opponent except the ChiSox . . . **John Shelby** has a .175 career average (80-14) vs. Chicago.

ORIOLES PITCHING: **Rookie Ken Dixon** was 2-0 vs. the Sox in '85 and **Mike Boddicker** was 2-1 to boost his lifetime mark to 6-1 (including '83 ALCS). **Don Aase**, on the other hand, was 0-2 (but did have 2 saves) and is now 1-6 lifetime with 5 saves (he's 1-5 at Comiskey).

At 11-6 **Scott McGregor** is the staff's biggest career winner against the White Sox while **Dennis Martinez**, at 6-8, is the biggest loser . . . **Tippy Martinez** has career 11 saves vs. Chicago, 2nd only to his career high 16 against New York, and is 6-4 . . . **Storm Davis** has only 2 career decisions against the Sox, both victories, in 4 A.L. seasons.

ORIOLES VS. OPPONENTS (Cle. Cont.)

VS. CLEVELAND ('84: 8-5 . . . Lifetime: 280-274) . . . The Indians have the 2nd best lifetime record in the A.L. (6 under .500) vs. the O's. Only the Red Sox who are 281-272, 9 over .500) have a better log against Baltimore.

Both clubs scored 77 runs in the season series . . . The Indians out-hit the O's .296 (442-131) to .271 (436-118), but the Birds homered the Tribe 26-9. The O's also hit 26 homers against the Indians, a high for any major league club against another in '85.

32-YEAR RIVALRY: Though the O's hold only a 6 game edge over the Indians, the fact that they have a winning record at all is surprising . . . After the Birds 1st 3 years in the A.L. ('54-'56) their record against the Indians was 11-55 ('54: 3-19, '55: 3-19, '56: 5-17), and, after 6 seasons ('54 thru '59), the O's were down 40-90.

It wasn't until June '79 that the O's went over .500 for the 1st time ever against the Indians, and they have maintained a modest winning edge ever since. During the past 17 seasons (starting '79) Baltimore has gone 154-104 (.597) vs. the Tribe.

COME-FROM-BEHIND: The O's enjoyed their biggest come-from-behind victory on April 28 in Baltimore . . . The Tribe jumped on **Storm Davis** for 6 runs in the 2nd inning and led 7-1 thru 3 1/2.

Still trailing by 7-5, the O's rallied for 3 to win in the 8th. **Eddie Murray** tied it with a 2-run double off **Tom Waddell**, and **John Lenenstein**, playing the next to last game of his career, drove in the game-winner with a sac fly. **Don Aase** won it and **Waddell** took the loss.

INDIANS BATTING: **Julio Franco** (.396, 48-19, 11 rbi), **Mike Tabler** (.395, 43-17, 1 hr, 13 rbi) and **Brook Jacoby** (.347, 49-17, 12 rbi) all enjoyed banner seasons against the O's.

The top current Indians lifetime hitters vs. the O's are **Tabler** (.41) and **Franco** (.318, 148-47) . . . **Tony Bernazard** hit .488 (36-41) vs. Baltimore as a rookie in '81 . . . Since then however, he's batted only .195 (159-31) against the O's.

INDIANS PITCHING: In '85 lefty **Curt Wardle** went 2-0 for the O's after going 0-1 for the Twins against Baltimore. Rookies **John Roman** and **Rich Thompson** were both 0-2 and the veteran **Mike Ruhle** was 1-2.

ORIOLES BATTING: **Larry Sheets** (.381, 21-8) and **Rick Dempsey** (.317) each had 4 home runs and 10 rbi against Cleveland . . . **Rick** thus doubled his previous career homer output vs. the Tribe to 8. **Cal Ripken** also drove in 10 runs vs. Cleveland in '85.

Fred Lynn batted .340 (47-16), has a .384 log (86-33) vs. the Indians over the last 2 years and is batting .309 lifetime (456-141) . . . **Alan Wiggins** in his first A.L. exposure hit .429 (21-9) with 5 steals in 5 tries.

Eddie Murray had a modest season against the Indians (.279 hr, 8 rbi), but over the last 5 seasons he has driven 45 runs in 133 games vs. Cleveland while batting .368 (193-71) and putting together a .468 (235-110) on-base percentage . . . Lifetime, he is batting .3406 (139) against the Tribe, a career high vs. one opponent. **Eddie** has played in 111 of 114 Orioles games vs. Indians since he broke in in '77.

In his last 19 games vs. the Indians, **Wayne Gross** had batted .412 (51-21) with 5 home runs and 11 rbi. He has gone 16-for-57 in his last 10 games at Cleveland.

Mike Young has 7 homers and 18 rbi in 18 career games vs. the Indians. Though he is hitting only .241 (58-14) vs. the Tribe at Cleveland, he has 4 home runs and 11 rbi in 9 games lifetime.

ORIOLES PITCHING: **Don Aase** and **Sammy Stewart** were both 2-0 in the season series and **Dennis Martinez** was 2-1. **Scott McGregor** was 0-2 in 4 starts and now has lost 6 straight decisions (in 9 starts) to the Indians since he beat **Bud Anderson** on Aug. 4, '83 at Cleveland.

Lifetime **McGregor** (10-9) and **Dennis** (10-8) are the biggest career winners vs. the Tribe among current O's while **McGregor** is the biggest loser . . . **Dennis** is 6-3 lifetime at Cleveland Stadium . . . **Tippy**, on the other hand, has never won a game on the lakefront, but has earned 4 saves there.

VS. DETROIT ('85: 6-7 . . . Lifetime: 295-265) . . . The O's & Tigers were in a 3rd place tie going into the final game of the season, won by Detroit 11-3 (**Frank Tanana** over **Dennis Martinez**).

These 2 clubs were the most prolific home run hitting teams in the majors with a combined total of 416 for the year (O's-214, Tigers-202) . . . During the 13 game season series, they smacked 46 long balls (O's-26, Tigers-20) . . . The O's also hit 26 against Cleveland, most in the majors by one club against another.

Despite the Orioles edge in homers, the Tigers out-scored them 77-62 and out-hit them in the season series, .271 (458-124) to .247 (461-114).

The Tigers have gone 14-7 at Baltimore starting Sep. 21, '82 . . . Over the last 8 seasons, each team has won 4 season series, 6 of them have been decided by a single game and the O's hold a slight 55-51 edge in that period starting '78. During the 4 years immediately prior to that ('74 thru '77), the O's had a large 50-17 advantage.

O'S SET TOTAL BASES MARK IN DETROIT: The Orioles set a club record for total bases in one game (41) on Sep. 16 at Detroit while downing the Tigers 14-7 (**Dennis Martinez** was the beneficiary) on a 19 hit attack that featured 4 doubles and 6 homers . . . The Bengals also contributed 3 homers. It was one of 2 Orioles games in which 9 homers were hit (also at California on Aug. 26, O's 7, Angels-2).

WILD ONE: **Lee Lacy**'s first game ever at Tiger Stadium (June 10) was a memorable one. It was also one of the most exciting of the year for the O's though it has an unhappy ending. **Lacy** led off the game with a broken bat home run off **Jack Morris** to the opposite field (Tigers thought the bat was corked but umpire **Jim McKean** and **Dick Butler** who was on the scene examined and found no such thing).

Later he hit a 2-out homer off **Aurelio Lopez** in the 11th to put O's up by one but the Birds still managed to lose. In the bottom of that inning **Barbaro Garvey** homered to tie off **Sammy Stewart**, and **Lance Parrish** ended it 4 batters later with a "sudden death" single. To get into extra innings, the O's needed a clutch homer by **Floyd Rayford** in the 9th off **Willie Hernandez**. In all, there were 6 lead changes in the game.

After a rainout the following night, the Series ended on Wed., June 12 with another O's defeat (their 5th straight) following day-long speculation that **Joe Altobelli** would be fired. That rumor turned to fact the following afternoon.

TIGERS BATTING: **Darrell Evans** led the Tigers in rbi vs. the O's with 12 in 13 games, 4 of them from a grand slam on July 2 at Baltimore, the first (and only) one ever thrown by **Storm Davis**. That blast gave Tigers 4-0 lead in 1st, but O's rallied to win. **Cal Ripken** homered off **Hernandez** with 2 out and none on in 9th to tie, then **Mike Young** won it with a lead off homer in 10th off **Hernandez**.

Parrish and **Chet Lemon** each hit a club high 3 homers. Two of **Lemon**'s came on the final day of the season. Playing only part time for the Twins, **Dave Engle** has been a .372 (43-16) hitter against the O's the last two years.

John Grubb hit .400 (20-8) vs. the O's to boost his lifetime bat mark vs. the O's to .312 (157-49) . . . **Larry Herndon** hit only .207 (29-6) in the season series, but still has a career average of .323 (161-52) against the Birds. **Kirk Gibson** hit only .256 (43-11), but drew 12 walks and was 5-for-5 in stolen base attempts.

TIGERS PITCHING: **Dan Petry**, now 11-7 lifetime, was 2-1 vs. the O's in '85 . . . His 7 game winning streak vs. Baltimore came to an end on Oct. 4 when **Scott McGregor** beat him. It was his first loss to the O's since **McGregor** defeated him 2 1/2 years earlier on July 2, '83 . . . He's now won 7 of his last 8 against the O's.

Frank Tanana (2-0 as a Tiger vs. Baltimore after losing one decision against the O's while still with Texas) is now 14-11 lifetime. He and **Bert Blyleven** have identical career records vs. the O's and trail only **Tommy John** (15-16) for most wins against Baltimore among active pitchers.

Jack Morris, 6-8 lifetime, is 1-6 vs. the O's in the last 4 years (spanning 11 starts) and has lost his last 2 decisions to them. He was 0-0 in '85 in 2 starts and 0-2 in 2 starts in '84.

ORIOLES VS. OPPONENTS (Det. Cont.)

Hernandez and Lopez were touched for a combined total of 12 innnings vs. Baltimore (3 each).

ORIOLES BATTING: Cal Ripken hit 5 of his 26 home runs off the Tigers while he and Floyd Rayford who hit 12 home runs in 12 innnings vs. Baltimore (3 each).

Eddie Murray has had a rough time against the Tigers these past 2 years during which he has batted only .170 (94-16) in 26 games against Detroit pitching while he and Floyd Rayford who hit 12 home runs in 12 innnings vs. Baltimore (3 each).

Larry Sheets also struggled against the Bengals (.143, 28-4). Fred Lynn is a .314 lifetime hitter (475-149) vs. Detroit. Lynn has hit 4 home runs in his last 7 games against Dan Petry . . . He has driven in 50 runs in 64 games lifetime at Tiger Stadium.

ORIOLES PITCHING: McGregor not only snapped Petry's 7 game winning streak vs. the O's on Oct. 4, he also broke his own 5 game losing streak against the Bengals at Baltimore. It was his 1st win over Detroit at Memorial Stadium since he beat Milt Wilcox on Sep. 18, '80 in Balmer.

Scott is 13-8 lifetime vs. the Bengals, 8-3 at Tiger Stadium and 5-5 at home. He won 10 of his first 11 lifetime decisions vs. Detroit but has gone 3-7 since then. He is the club's leading active winner vs. Detroit followed by Mike Flanagan (12-8). Speaking of Flanagan, Mike has won 4 of his last 5 decisions against the Tigers (8-4-'85).

Mike Boddicker (0-2 in '85 2-5 lifetime) has had his problems with the Bengals . . . Don Aase was 2-0 with 2 saves in 5 '85 appearances and had an 0.93 era while holding Detroit to a .187 average (33-6) . . . Ken Dixon (0-0) limited the Tigers to a .146 (46-6) average (33-6) . . . Storm Davis did even better (.083, 24-2) despite an 0-0 record in 2 starts . . . Davis, 4-2 lifetime, has held Tiger batters to a .201 (201-41) career average.

★ ★ ★

VS. KANSAS CITY ('85: 6-6 . . . Lifetime: 110-86) . . . The O's have won only 2 season series against the Royals in the last 10 years ('81 & '83) . . . In that time, they have won 2, lost 4 and tied 4. During the 6 years of the 80s, the two clubs are 34-34 against each other.

Last year, befitting a series in which the clubs were 6-6, both Royals and O's scored 62 runs apiece, and each hit 11 home runs in the 12 game season series.

ON THE CARPET: In '85, the O's were 4-2 at Royals Stadium. It was only the 3rd time in the 13 year history of that facility that the O's had had a winning record there (also '74 & '83) . . . However, it was the 2nd time in 3 seasons that the O's had prevailed on the K.C. carpet, where they have a 10-8 record in that period.

Lifetime, the Birds are only 29-44 (.397) at Royals Stadium, after going 17-7 vs. the Royals at old Municipal Stadium during the KC club's first 4 years in the league.

17-YEAR RIVALRY: The Orioles still hold a 24 game edge in the rivalry that began in '69, and are 64-35 against the Royals in Baltimore (.646). The O's overall edge was constructed primarily in '69 & '70 when they beat the fledgling Royals in 23 of 24 outings including a major league record 23 consecutive times after Dick Drago beat Dick Hall on May 9, '69 at Baltimore in the first game ever between these 2 clubs.

Since that streak ended, the O's advantage is only 87-85.

ROYALS BATTING: George Brett hit .366 (41-15) vs. the O's after a 4-year stretch ('81-'84) in which he batted only .200 (145-29) against Baltimore. He also hit 3 homers, drove in 10 runs, scored 11 and walked 11 times. His on-base pct. was .500 (52-26). Lifetime Brett is batting .322 (478-154) vs. Baltimore.

Jorge Orta led the Royals in batting vs. the O's (.414, 29-12) as well as in rbi (11) . . . Willie Wilson batted .370 (54-20), scored 12 runs and stole 6 bases in 6 tries . . . Lifetime Wilson has swiped 33 bases against the O's in 37 attempts (.892).

Hal McRae, a thorn in the O's side for many years, had an uncharacteristically off year against the Birds (.091, 22-2) . . . However, he still has a .295 lifetime (461-136) average vs. the O's if you include his 5-for-11 in the '70 World Series for Cincinnati.

ROYALS PITCHING: Dan Quisenberry gave up 7 runs in 12 innnings, as many as he had yielded in his entire career before '85 (40 ip, 7 er), but still picked up 4 saves in 7 appearances (W-0, L-0) . . . Lifetime, Quisenberry is 2-2 with 15 saves in 34 appearances and a 2.42 era (ip-52, er-14) and has held O's batters to a collective .237 average (190-45) . . . He's been touched for 4 home runs by the O's thru the years: Ken Singleton ('82), Eddie Murray ('83), Mike Young ('84), Cal Ripken ('85).

Cy Young Winner Brett Saberhagen was 0-2 with a 5.40 (ip-15, er-9) and so was Bud Black (era-9.00, ip-11, er-11) . . . in 2 A.L. seasons, Saberhagen is 1-2 vs. the O's but has held them to a .214 average (84-18) . . . Mike LaCoss (1-0) didn't allow the O's a run in 11.2 innnings.

Charlie Leibrandt was 2-0 vs. the O's in '85 and is 3-0 lifetime . . . Danny Jackson was 2-1 and has a 2-2 career log.

ORIOLES BATTING: Mike Young hit .375 (40-15) in the series with 4 doubles, 3 homers and 11 rbi in 12 games. Lifetime, he is batting .311 vs. the Royals (61-19) . . . Eddie Murray hit .341 (44-15) with a club leading 11 rbi, but did not hit a home run against the Royals.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Scott McGregor was 2-2 to boost his career mark to 9-8. He and Mike Flanagan (9-13) are the biggest winners on the current O's staff against the Royals and Mike has the most career losses.

Don Aase has been effective against the Royals throughout his career. Lifetime he is 6-0 with 2 saves.

★ ★ ★

VS. MILWAUKEE ('85: 9-4 . . . Lifetime: 154-83) . . . The O's have gone 36-16 (.692) against the Brewers over the past 4 years. At Memorial Stadium, the Birds are 20-4 against them (.833) starting Oct. 1, '82, including 6-1 in '85.

The Brewers' lone win in Baltimore in '85, 5-2 on Sep. 19 (Bill Wegman over Mike Boddicker in last game of year between the 2 clubs) snapped an 8 game losing streak at Memorial Stadium. It was their first win in the Monumental City in over a year (since Sep. 7, '84).

The O's are 14-3 in 17 season series against the Milwaukee franchise which began in '69 as the Seattle Pilots.

Overall, the O's lifetime record of 154-83 (.650) against Milwaukee (nee Seattle Pilots) is their 2nd best vs. a single club behind Seattle Mariners (.673, 66-32). The Texas Rangers, excluding D.C. Senators, rank 3rd in that category (.622, 97-59).

At Milwaukee (not including Seattle in '69), the O's are 70-44 lifetime (.614), their 3rd best record in a foreign port behind: (1) at Texas (.696, 55-24), and (2) at Seattle Mariners (.633, 31-18).

The O's out-hit the Brewers .308 to .248, out-scored them 79-51 and out-homered them 20-10 in '85 . . . The .308 average was the highest by the O's against a single opponent . . . The O's era in the season series was 3.63 and the Brewers' 5.43.

The O's have hit over .300 against the Brewers 3 times in the last 4 years and in that span (starting 1982) are batting .300 even (1845-53) vs. Milwaukee, and have hit 70 home runs in 52 games.

Earl Weaver who managed his last game before retiring in '82 against the Brewers (won by the Brewers on the last day of season to clinch their only division championship) returned to uniform 2½ seasons later, on June 14, '85, to resume his managerial career, also against the Brewers.

BREWERS BATTING: The Brewers' best hitter in the season series was Jim Gantner (.400, 40-16). He raised his career average vs. the O's from .194 to .227 (251-57). Cecil Cooper led in rbi with 11 in 12 games. Lifetime, Paul Molitor has the highest average vs. the O's among current veteran Brewers at .287 (317-94).

BREWERS PITCHING: Rookie Wegman and Jaime Cogan were both 2-0, accounting for all the Brewers' '85 wins vs. Baltimore . . . Wegman decisioned Boddicker on Sep. 19 (5-2) to snap the Brewers 8 game loss streak in Baltimore, then, 5 days

later, downed **Scott McGregor**, 10-6, to terminate Scott's 8 game winning string against the Brewers.

In those 2 games **Wegman** received a lot of support from **McClure**, **Wegman** worked a total of 10.2 innings (12 hits, 6 runs) in the 2 starts and **McClure** who saved both pitched 7.1.

Cocanower appeared in 3 games vs. the Birds, pitched a shutout in his only start (beat **Mike Flanagan** on Sep. 25, 3-0) and had a 0.50 era (ip-18, er-1). **Cocanower** is now 4-0 vs. Baltimore lifetime.

The only multiple loser was **Danny Darwin** at 0-2, his first 2 losses ever to the O's against whom he was 5-0 prior to '85 . . . **Mo Haas** (0-1), the Baltimore native and Franklin High School graduate is 5-8 lifetime against his home town team.

Rookie Pitcher of the Year **Ted Higuera** appeared in 4 games for the Birds including 3 starts and was 0-1 with an 8.79 era (ip-14, h-20) . . . The O's batted .323 (62-20) against him.

ORIOLES BATTING: Ten of the 21 Orioles who bat against the Brewers in '85 hit .300 or better, including **Alan Wiggins** (.500, 12-6), **Wayne Gross** (.467, 15-7), **Eddie Murray** (.423, 32-22), **Fred Lynn** (.412, 34-14), **Larry Sheets** (.333, 36-12) and **John Shelby** (.333, 24-8).

Lynn and **Cal Ripken** each had 10 rbi and **Lynn** paced the O's with 5 home runs against the Brewers.

Lifetime, there are 5 current Orioles with lifetime averages .300+ vs. Milwaukee: **Eddie Murray** whose .331 mark (423-140) is his highest vs. one opponent; **Sheets** (.333, 36-12), **Jim Dwyer** (.330, 103-34), **Floyd Rayford** (.313, 48-15), **Shelby** (.306, 85-25).

Ripken's 42 lifetime rbi against the Brewers are a personal high vs. one opponent. **Dwyer's** average against Milwaukee is also career high . . . Since joining O's he's hit .375 (32-12) at County Stadium.

ORIOLES PITCHING: **Scott McGregor** (3-1 against Milwaukee in '85) who was 1-5 after his first 6 career decisions against Milwaukee has since gone 8-1 vs. the Brewers. His loss to **Wegman** (9/24) snapped an 8 game win streak vs. the Brewers. He had lost to them since **Lary Sorenson** beat him on May 10, '80. **Scotty** is now 9-6 lifetime.

Nate Snell gave up 5 runs and 13 hits in 10 innings vs. the Brewers but still emerged with a 2-0 record in 5 relief appearances.

Dennis Martinez, 1-0 in '85, is the biggest career winner vs. Milwaukee among current O's at 11-5. **Dennis** is 6-0 lifetime vs. the Brewers at Baltimore . . . **Storm Davis** is 5-1 and **Mike Boddicker** is 5-2. The only O's hurler with a losing record is **Mike Flanagan** (8-10) who has lost 7 of his last 9 decisions vs. Milwaukee.

★ ★ ★

VS. MINNESOTA ('85: 6-6 . . . Lifetime: 187-151, vs. Twins only: 11-13) . . . O's have gone 6-1-2 in last 9 season series vs. Twins . . . One loss in that period was in '84 (5-7) . . . From '79 thru '83, the O's were 40-14 (.741) against Minnesota, but in last 2 years have gone 11-13 (.458).

Ray Miller, the O's pitching coach for 7½ years (starting '78), left the club on June 21 to manage the Twins . . . In 6 games against the Birds, **Miller** was 4-2 against his old mentor **Earl Weaver**.

Though the Twins out-hit the Orioles .293 (433-127) to .265 (411), the Birds held the edge in both runs scored (63-61) and home runs (15-11).

The O's were 3-3 at the "Humphrey Dome" in '85 and now hold a 12-12 lifetime record there (they were only 1-5 at Minny in '84).

TWINS BATTING: **Kirby Puckett** was Twins' top hitter with a series at .388 (49-19) . . . In fewer than 2 full A.L. seasons, **Puckett** has a .356 (73-26) lifetime mark vs. O's. **Gary Gaetti** is another who has hit well against the Birds. He batted .348 (46-16) in '85 and sports a .310 career average (168-52) vs. Baltimore.

The O's aren't unhappy to see **Mickey Hatcher** depart . . . His lifetime mark as a Twin was .320 (178-57) against the Birds . . . **Ken Hrbek** topped the Twins in rbi in the season series with 11.

TWINS PITCHING: **Frank Viola** was 2-0 in 2 starts (incl. cg), yielding only 11 hits and 3 earned runs in 17 innings. Lifetime he's 3-2.

Ron Davis was 1-2, but picked up 4 saves in 8 appearances . . . He was thus involved in 5 of the Twins' 6 wins against the Orioles. His 2 losses came on successive nights (5/10-11) on 9th inning "sudden death" homers by **Fred Lynn** at Baltimore.

Ron threw the "gopher" on May 10, but not the one the next night. **Curt Wadde** had that distinction, but **Davis** allowed the first 2 hitters to reach via singles on May 11 before **Lynn's** 3-run smash and they became the tying and winning runs.

Ken Schrom was 1-2 in 4 starts . . . **John Butcher** (1-1 in '85) finally lost to the Birds after posting a 5-0 lifetime record against them. The defeat was at the hands of **Mike Boddicker**, 10-5, on May 5 at HHH.

Lifetime, **Butcher** is now 6-1 including a 2-hit shutout for Texas in '83. His 4-0 mark vs. the O's for the Twins in '84 represented the most wins against Baltimore in one season since **Pat Dobson** went 5-0 for Cleveland in '76. **Joe Cowley** matched **Butcher's** 4-0 mark in '85 for the Yankees.

Bert Blyleven didn't pitch vs. the O's after re-joining the Twins, but he did start twice against them while still with the Indians and was 0-0.

In one effort at Memorial Stadium on Apr. 28, **Blyleven** was ko'd in the 8th inning after being charged with 6 earned runs and on his way to the shower offered an extended middle digit to fans near the dugout. He was subsequently fined by A.L. President **Dr. Bobby Brown**, and that money was donated to Baltimore charities.

Blyleven is 14-11 lifetime vs. the O's, tied for 2nd among actives with **Frank Tanana** for most anti-Orioles victories behind **Tommy John**, the biggest winner and loser at 15-16. Over the last 3 years, **Blyleven** is 3-1 (all in '84) but in that time has posted a 5.02 era against the Birds (ip-37.2, er-21).

ORIOLES BATTING: **Lynn**, **Eddie Murray** and **Cal Ripken** each drove in 10 runs against the Twins. **Lynn** hit 4 home runs off Minnesota pitching, 3 of them in successive 9th innings (May 10-11-12) at Baltimore . . . The first 2 won games in instant fashion (see **Ron Davis** above) while the final one could not offset a big Twins lead . . . The last 2 **Lynn** homers in that stretch were to left field off left-handers **Wardle** and **Viola**.

Lynn has excelled vs. Minnesota throughout his career and his totals in average (.330, 415-137), home runs (26) and rbi (92) in 114 games are all lifetime highs.

Lynn is one of 6 current O's with .300+ career averages against the Twins along with **Jim Dwyer** (.302, 63-19), **Lee Lacy** (.318, 22-7), **Murray** (.310, 381-118), **Ripken** (.337, 196-66) and **Larry Sheets** (.345, 29-10). In addition, **Rick Dempsey** who began his major league career with the Twins in '69 has a career .283 average (240-68), his highest against one opponent.

The top Orioles hitters in the '85 season series were **Dwyer** (.391, 23-9), **Sheets** (.345, 29-10) and **Ripken** (.340, 53-18) . . . **Cal** was 10-for-15 (2bh-3, hr-2) with 8 rbi and broke **Brooks Robinson's** Orioles consecutive games record during a 3-game series at the MetroDome May 3-4-5.

Cal has had 3 five-hit games in the majors, 2 of them at HHH. One was last May 5th, and the other on Sep. 3, '83 when he also tied or broke 4 club records as the O's won big, 13-0. Among the records tied that day was most total bases, game (13). Lifetime, **Rip** is batting .359 (103-37) at the "Hump" with 8 doubles, 6 home runs and 19 rbi in 24 games.

ORIOLES PITCHING: **Mike Boddicker** was 3-1 while hurling 2 complete games in 4 starts with a 2.51 era and 26 strikeouts in 32.1 innings . . . The year before **Mike** had gone 0-3 vs. Minny . . . **Don Aase** was 2-1 with a save in 5 appearances . . .

Mike Flanagan who didn't pitch against the Twins in '85 is 15-4 lifetime against them, and has won 15 of his last 17 decisions including 14 in a row at one point (that streak was snapped in '84 when he dropped 2 of 3 decisions to Minnesota).

Scott McGregor is 11-6 lifetime . . . **Tippy Martinez** had no decisions or saves in 4 appearances vs. the Twins in '85, but hurled 5.1 scoreless innings. He has allowed one Minnesota home run lifetime in 37 games spanning 55.1 innings. That was a blast by **Tom Brunansky** at Minny on July 4, '84 . . . Former Twins hurler now with

ORIOLES VS. OPPONENTS (N.Y. Cont.)

ORIOLES BATTING: Lee Lacy was the O's top regular in the season series at .317 (41-13) and Wayne Gross hit .316 (19-6) limited action. With considerable late foot (24-10 in last 6 games) Eddie Murray wound up at .304 (46-14).

Cal Ripken on the other hand batted only .205 (44-9) in the game season series with no homers and Fred Lynn wound up a .194 (36-7) ... Lynn, however, boasts the current Orioles highest lifetime average against the Bombers (.284, 402-144).

ORIOLES PITCHING: Mike Flanagan, like Guidry vs. the O's, has been very streaky against the Bombers. He started his career 1-2, then won 5 straight before losing 5 in a row, and he now has a 6 game win streak alive thanks to his Sep. 20 victory ... Lifetime, he is 12-7.

Don Aase was 0-2 with a save and both Dennis Martinez and Scott McGregor were 0-2 ... McGregor, 6-11 lifetime, has lost in a row to the Yankees over the last 3 seasons ... Five of his career wins have been shutouts.

Tippy Martinez is 9-6 with 13 saves against the organization which originally signed him, and with which he subsequently made his big league debut. His 61 appearances vs. the Yankees are a career high against one opponent.

★ ★ ★

VS. OAKLAND ('85: 7-5 ... Lifetime: 125-93, vs. Oakland only ... In the last 9 years, the O's have won 8 season series and tied one while compiling a 69-36 (.657) record vs. the A's. Oakland hasn't won a season series from Baltimore since '76.

At Oakland, starting July 8, '76, the O's have run up a 36-18 (.667) record ... Lifetime, the Birds are 64-47 (.577) there, not including 3-3 in 3 ALCS.

A'S FIRST GAME IN OAKLAND: The Orioles participated in the A's first game ever in Oakland in '69 (after the A's moved from K.C. following the '68 season). The date was Apr. 17 and Dave McNally pitched a 2-hitter to beat Lew Krausse, 4-1 ... Boog Powell had the gwrbi and hit the first home run in the Oakland Alameda County Coliseum, both in the 2nd inning ... Man Belanger, Brooks Robinson and the A's Rick Monday also homered in that game.

WEIRD ONE: In one of the most unusual games of '85, Aug. 23 at Oakland, the O's were held scoreless on one hit thru 8 innings by Jose Rijo and Steve Mura and trailed by 2-0. In the top of the 9th, however, the Birds struck for 7 runs on 6 hits and won going away, 7-2. Mike Boddicker went the route to win and Jay Howell who was touched for 5 runs in 1/3 of an inning took the loss.

A'S BATTING: The A's hit only .220 (382-84) and scored only 36 runs in the season series, both "lows" by a single opponent vs. the O's. The O's batted .239 (410-98), scored 62 runs and out-homered the A's 15-10.

Alfredo Griffin was the A's top hitter at .341, (44-15) while Dwayne Murphy led in rbi (7) and home runs (3) ... Murphy enjoyed a big day at Baltimore on Labor Day ... He went 4-for-4 with 2 home runs (both off Scott McGregor), a single and double, but McGregor won 12-4 on a superb relief job (3.1 scoreless innings) by Ken Dixon.

Six A's with 20 or more bats hit .200 or less vs. the O's: Bruce Bochte (.154, 26-4); Dave Collins (.200, 25-5); Mike Davis (.195 41-8); Donnie Hill (.150, 20-3); Carney Lansford (.154, 26-4); Tony Phillips (.100, 20-2).

Minor league sensation Jose Canseco made his big league debut in Baltimore on Sep. 2 & 4, striking out both times as a pinch-hitter. Mike Davis has a .188 (85-16) career average vs. the O's.

A'S PITCHING: The Orioles pitching staff fashioned a 2.48 era (ip-108, er-30), while the A's had a 4.71 (ip-107, er-56).

Rookie Tim Birtsas who has spent '84 at Ft. Lauderdale in the Class A Florida State league (came to A's in Rickey Henderson deal along with Jay Howell and Rijo) was the A's only multiple winner. He went 2-0 vs. the Birds with a complete game in 2 starts. Rijo was 1-0 in 2 starts and held O's hitters to a .100 average collectively (40-4).

Don Sutton was the only multiple loser (1-2) before moving on to the Angels. Another veteran, former Dodger Tommy John, started

one game and was rocked for 6 hits and 6 runs in 1.1 innings on Labor Day in Baltimore. Among active pitchers at the end of last season, John led O's opponents in both wins and losses lifetime vs. the O's (15-16).

ORIOLES BATTING: Eddie Murray was the O's top hitter vs. the A's at .326 (46-15). He and Cal Ripken each had 9 rbi, tops on the club against Oakland ... Rip led in homers with 4 ... Wayne Gross who had been away from A's for 2 seasons has batted .361 (36-13) with 4 homers and 13 rbi in 17 games against his former teammates and has led the O's vs. the A's in each of the 2 years he's been away from Oakland ... Aside from Gross, Murray leads the current O's in lifetime hitting vs. Oakland (.298, 366-109).

ORIOLES PITCHING: Scott McGregor was 3-0 with 2 complete games in 3 starts while holding the A's to a .205 club average (83-17). He is now 10-3 lifetime including 5-0 at Memorial Stadium and has won 7 straight from the A's since he last lost to them on Aug. 22, '81.

Mike Flanagan's perfect 10-0 career record at Oakland Coliseum came to an end on Aug 25 when he was blasted for 5 runs in 4.1 innings and took the defeat, losing 10-4 to Birtsas ... Mike is 15-5 lifetime vs. the A's, and 10-1 at Oakland where he has posted a 2.22 era (IP-101.1, H-71, ER-25) with 6 complete games in 14 starts.

Despite a 1-3 record, (his 3 losses were by total of 4 runs) Mike Boddicker had a 2.36 era (IP-34.1, ER-9) vs. the A's, and is now 3-4 ... Storm Davis, 1-0 in 2 starts, had a 1.06 era (17 ip, 2 er) while going 1-0 in 2 starts and holding the A's to a .155 average (58-9) ... Lifetime, Storm is 5-2 with a 2.59 era (IP-66, ER-19) ... Dennis Martinez (1-0 in '85 vs. Oakland) is 9-3 lifetime ... Rookie Nate Snell who had one save limited the A's to 2 hits in 21 at bats (.095).

Six current O's pitchers have career earned run averages of below 3.00 against the A's: Don Aase, Boddicker, Davis, Ken Dixon, Tippy Martinez and Snell.

★ ★ ★

VS. SEATTLE ('85: 6-6 ... Lifetime: 66-32) ... The Orioles' 66-32 (.673) record vs. the Mariners is their best against a single opponent ... In 9 years, the O's have not lost a season series to the M's. They've won 7 and tied 2.

At Baltimore the O's are 35-14 (.714) also tops vs. one club ... The M's have won only 2 of 18 series played in the "Monumental City" ... The Birds won their first 14 games against the Mariners in Baltimore until former Oriole Mike Parrott beat Sammy Stewart July 25, '79. Since then, the O's advantage at Memorial Stadium is 21-14 (.600).

At the Kingdome, Baltimore has maintained a 31-18 (.633) log.

UNUSUAL SERIES: The final series of the year between the O's and M's, played in Baltimore, presented a study in contrasts. In the first 2 games (Aug. 29 & 30), the O's pitching dominated as first Mike Boddicker and then Storm Davis blanked Seattle on a combined total of 9 hits while out-scoring them 13-0 ... In the last 2 games of the set, Mike Moore shutout the O's 6-0, and then Matt Young, assisted by Jack Lazorko, set the Birds down 10-2.

O'S ON WEST COAST: The Orioles have not posted a losing record on the west coast since '77 ... In the last 8 seasons, they've compiled a combined 87-52 (.626) regular season record in California (28-19, .596), Oakland (30-18, 625) and Seattle (29-15, .659).

MARINERS BATTING: Though the Orioles led the majors in home runs, the Mariners who ranked 4th out-homered them in the season series 14 to 11. The O's, however, had the edge in runs scored, 61 to 51.

Jack Perconte batted .439 (41-18) vs. Baltimore pitching in '85, and now ranks first among all O's opponents (100 or more career at bats) with a lifetime average of .362 (105-38). Perconte enjoyed his first career 5-hit game in the majors on Sep. 1 at Baltimore.

Dave Henderson is 3rd on that list at .350 (120-42). In between is Rickey Henderson, the hands down leader among those with 200 or more lifetime at bats, with a .359 (289-103) figure.

At the other end of the spectrum is Gorman Thomas whose .205 career figure vs. Baltimore (.361-74) is the lowest among all active American Leaguers vs. the O's (200 or more at bats). Thomas, in '85, hit only .174 (23-4), but all of his hits were for extra bases (1-2bh, 3-hr) and he led the M's in homers and rbi (9) vs. Baltimore.

ORIOLES VS. OPPONENTS (Sea. Cont.)

MARINERS PITCHING: Mike Moore is only 3-6 lifetime vs. the O's, but you'd never guess it based on his '85 efforts against the Birds. He was 2-1 in 4 starts (one of which he left early with a ground pull), completed 3, compiled a 1.59 era (ip-28.1, er-5), fanned 22 and held the O's to a .172 team average (99-17) . . . Matt Young also had a 2-1 record in the season series and is now 2-3.

Conversely, Jim Beattie, 3-11 lifetime against the O's, continues his run of inefficiency vs. Baltimore batters. They put together a .32 average against him (43-17) while Beattie was posting an 0-1 record and a 9.90 era (ip-10, er-11).

ORIOLES BATTING: Eddie Murray hit .378 (45-17) against the M's . . . Over the last 2 years he has batted .400 (85-34) and reached base safely at a .495 rate (105-52) vs. Seattle. Lammy Sheets (.423, 26-11) and Floyd Rayford (.417, 36-15) also had big years against the M's . . . So did Fred Lynn (.333, 27-9) and Alan Wiggins (.310, 29-9).

Lifetime, Murray is tops among current O's with a .298 average (356-106) since Ken Singleton retired. Ken had a .341 average (255-87) with 24 home runs and 77 rbi in 73 career games vs. the M's . . . Lynn is hitting .296 lifetime (328-97) and Cal Ripken .28 (191-56).

ORIOLES PITCHING: Mike Boddicker (3-0), Storm Davis (7-2), Mike Flanagan (9-4) and Dennis Martinez (14-5) have enjoyed notable successes against the Mariners . . . Dennis' 14 wins are a career high vs. one opponent . . . At one time he was 7-0 against them. Since then he's 7-5. Dennis has been particularly successful at the Kingdome where he is 9-3 . . . He was 2-1 vs. the M's in '85.

In 3 years Boddicker who was 1-0 with a shutout in his only outing has a career 0.57 era (ip-31.1, er-2) and has held Marin batters to a .167 average (108-18). has never thrown a "gopher" to a Seattle hitter, and has a string of 18 straight innings in which he hasn't allowed them an earned run.

Davis was 2-0 in '85 with a 2.25 era (ip-24, er-6) while completing 2 of 3 starts.

★ ★ ★

VS. TEXAS (1985: 10-2 . . . Lifetime: 97-59, excluding Wash.) The O's were 4-2 at Arlington where they've enjoyed more success than the years than any other ballpark on the road. Lifetime, they are 55-24 (.696) in Texas and are 24-9 (.727) there since the Rangers swept them in a 3 game set July 2-3-4, '79.

Conversely, the Rangers have one of the better won-lost percentages at Memorial Stadium among the 13 visiting clubs (they are 4th at .455, 35-42). This, despite the fact, that the Rangers are only 5-19 in Baltimore over the past 5 seasons (incl. 0-0 in '81) . . . After their first 9 Texas based seasons ('72 thru '80), they were 30-23 here in Balmer. The Rangers are the only club ever to go undefeated over the course of one entire season in Baltimore. That was in '75 (5-0).

Overall, in the last 4 years the O's have gone 9-3, 9-3, 9-3, & 10-3 for a 37-11 mark (.771) vs. Texas.

Since the Senators moved to Texas in '72, the O's have gone 9-3 with 3 ties in 14 season series and haven't dropped one since going 4-6 in '77.

In '85, the O's out-hit the Rangers (.284 to .245), out-scored them (76-35). Each club hit 12 home runs in the season series . . . The Rangers' have scored exactly 35 runs vs. the O's in each of the last 2 years, each time the fewest among all 13 O's opponents.

RANGERS BATTING: Toby Harrah was the highest hitting regular vs. the O's at .267 (30-8) . . . He also had a .463 on-base percentage (41-19) thanks to 11 walks.

Rookie Oddibe McDowell hit only .182 (22-4) with 3 steals and Steve Buechele batted .087 (23-2) . . . In all the Rangers batted into 18 double plays in the 12 games.

Pete O'Brien has a career .179 (123-22) average vs. the O's, lowest in the American League among opponents with 100 or more at bats.

RANGERS PITCHING: Charlie Hough had never beaten the O's until '85 when he was 2-0 in 3 starts while holding the Birds to a .091 collective average (77-7) including 0-for-17 on opening day on which he did not have a decision. He allowed only 4 earned runs in 23.2 innings (era 1.52) while walking 14 and striking out 18.

The year before the O's had gone 12-for-24 against Hough and had built their record against him lifetime to 5-0.

Chris Welsh didn't fare as well. In 3 appearances, all within an 8 day span in August, he was 0-2, his era a lofty 23.63, and the O's average against him a prodigious .571 (35-20).

Mike Mason was 0-3 in 6 appearances including 3 starts (is 0-4 lifetime) . . . He was touched for a .368 average (57-21) in 11.2 innings during which he yielded 16 runs (11 er, 8.49 era), issued 12 walks, and allowed 34 baserunners.

Greg Harris had no decisions or saves but fanned 10 in 6 appearances spanning 6.2 innings.

ORIOLES BATTING: Mike Young led the O's against Texas with a .390 average (41-16), 17 rbi, 4 doubles and 4 home runs in 11 games . . . His on-base percentage against the Rangers was .479 (48-23) and his slugging average .854 (41-35) . . . At Texas in '85 he hit .476 (21-10) with 3 homers and 9 rbi in 5 games.

Others who excelled in '85 vs. Texas were: Floyd Rayford .379 (29-11), Rick Dempsey .371 (35-13), Lee Lacy .357 (28-10), and Cal Ripken .349 (43-15). Rip also had a .472 on-base average (53-25).

Jim Dwyer has batted .464 (28-13) against the Rangers the last 2 years. Prior to '84, he was hitting .174 (46-8) vs. Texas. He's now up to .284 (74-21) lifetime.

Lifetime Ripken is hitting .347 against the Rangers (190-66), his highest average vs. one opponent . . . Mike Young is hitting .321 (56-18), and Fred Lynn .308 (367-113) lifetime.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Two veteran Orioles pitchers Storm Davis (7-0) and Mike Boddicker (6-0) are unbeaten lifetime vs. the Rangers while two others have lost only once: Scott McGregor (7-1) and Tippy Martinez (6-1, 10 saves).

Boddicker has a 1.98 era (ip-59, er-13) and Davis a 2.07 (ip-82.2, h-19) and Storm has held Rangers batters to a .206 average (296-61) . . . The biggest career winner on the O's staff against Texas is Dennis Martinez (8-5).

At Texas, Boddicker, Davis and Tippy are all 4-0 lifetime and Tippy has 10 saves in Arlington. Don Aase is 1-4 there lifetime with 2 saves.

★ ★ ★

VS. TORONTO ('85: 4-8 . . . Lifetime: 70-44): The Jays captured the season series for the 2nd straight year and are 17-8 vs. the O's in that span. Overall, the O's have won 7 of the 9 season series.

Though the O's were only 5-8 vs. Toronto at Baltimore in '84 and '85, they hold a 41-17 (.707) lifetime advantage at Memorial Stadium . . . The O's once won 19 in a row vs. the Jays in Baltimore (Sep. 9, '77 thru May 2, '81). At Toronto the O's are only 29-27 lifetime.

Eight of the 12 games in the season series were decided by one (6) or 2 runs (2) . . . The Blue Jays' 9 game winning streak, the longest in their club history, was snapped by the O's on July 30, 4-3, in 10 innings on a sac fly by Lee Lacy . . . Don Aase was the winner in relief . . . It was only the Jays 2nd loss in 11 extra-inning games. (They were 12-5 on the year).

The 2 clubs resumed the season in Toronto after the 2-day baseball strike on August 8, and the Jays swept a doubleheader, 7-2 & 7-4. That was the first doubleheader of the season for the O's.

MEMORABLE GAMES: There have been many memorable moments in the O's-Blue Jays rivalry over the past 9 seasons including the "Earl Weaver forfeit" on Sep. 15, '77 and the 24-10 pasting the Jays handed the O's in Toronto on June 26, '78 (the night Ellie Hendricks and Larry Harlow pitched).

However, for the Orioles, the game that stands out above the rest was the "3 pickoff" game in Baltimore Aug. 24, '83 . . . The O's were down 3-1 with 2 on and 2 down in the 9th when they suddenly tied the score on rbi singles by Benny Ayala and Al Bumbry and forced the game into overtime.

ORIOLES VS. OPPONENTS (Tor. Cont.)

Because of extensive offensive maneuvering, the O's took the field in the 10th with strangers at 3 positions . . . John Lowenstein was at 2nd base, Gary Roenicke at 3rd and Lenn Sakata was catching for the first time since Little League.

Cliff Johnson led off the 10th with a home run off Tim Stoddard to put the Jays back on top. When Barry Bonnell followed with a single, Tippy Martinez came on and proceeded to retire the side without retiring a batter . . . First, he picked off Bonnell, then he walked Jesse Barfield and picked him off, and finally yielded a single to Willie Upshaw before nailing him the same way.

Cal Ripken led off the home 10th with a game-tying homer and 2 outs later with 2 on, Sakata gave the O's a "sudden death" 7-6 win with a 3-run homer off Joey McLaughlin.

The next night, the 2 clubs were in a scoreless tie until Bonnell homered in the 10th. But, the Birds bounced back on singles by Joe Nolan and Bumbry and a game-winning 2-run double by Dan Fort to win again in "sudden death". Tippy was the winning pitcher in both games.

BLUE JAYS BATTING: The Jays out-hit the O's .255 (41-105) to .218 (395-86), out-scored them 60-47 and out-homered them 18-15.

Jesse Barfield led the Jays against the O's, batting .405 (37-15) with 4 home runs (most by an O's opponent in '85) and 11 rbi in 12 games . . . Willie Upshaw hit 3 homers while batting .325 (40-13) and George Bell also connected 3 times though he batted only .236 (46-11) in the season series.

Lifetime Barfield has a .339 average (118-40) with 8 home runs against the Orioles.

BLUE JAYS PITCHING: Doyle Alexander was 3-0 vs. the O's in 3 starts and struck out 15 in 20.2 innings. He is now 9-4 lifetime against the O's since they traded him to the Yankees in June 1976, and is 4-1 against them for the Blue Jays.

Rookies Tom Henke and Tom Filer were both 2-0 . . . Henke in 3 appearances did not allow a hit or a run in 7 innings (O's went 0-for-21).

Jimmy Key who made his first big league start after 63 relief appearances on April 12th and took the loss was the only multiple loser for the Blue Jays in the season series (0-2).

Despite 1.93 era, Dave Steib was 0-0 in 2 starts and remains 3-7 lifetime . . . Steib in the last 2 seasons has started 6 times against Baltimore and is only 1-0 despite a 1.83 era (39.1 ip, 8 er) . . . Jim Clancy, who did not pitch vs. the O's in '85 is 7-10 lifetime.

ORIOLES BATTING: Floyd Rayford was the only O's regular to hit over .300 (.429, 21-9) as the Jays effectively contained: Cal Ripken (.163, 49-8), Eddie Murray (.207, 29-6) and Fred Lynn (.239, 46-11) . . . Murray did, however, hit 3 home runs and drove in 8 runs in 9 games.

Lifetime, Jim Dwyer is the current O's top hitter vs. the Jays at .328 (128-42) while Murray is hitting .315 (390-123) . . . His 22 home runs vs. Toronto and 12 at Exhibition Stadium are believed to be highs for a Blue Jay opponent.

Rookie Fritz Connally, who hit .455 (11-5) against the Jays before being sent down to Rochester in June, hit his first major league home run at Toronto on April 19. It was a grand slam off Doyle Alexander on the 14th pitch thrown to him on that time at bat . . . He had fouled off 9 pitches before connecting.

ORIOLES PITCHING: Mike Boddicker was 0-3 vs. the Jays with a 5.92 era (ip-24.1, er-16) and is now 3-4 lifetime . . . No other Oriole had multiple wins or losses, but Storm Davis also had a rough time. In 2 starts he was 0-1, worked only 4 innings and was touched for 10 runs (22.50 era) and the Jays average against him was .455 (22-10).

Lifetime Mike Flanagan is 15-6 vs. the Jays with a 2.73 era (ip-76.2, er-22), his lowest vs. one opponent, but hasn't beaten them in 3 full years (not since a win on Aug. 25, '82) . . . Since then he's 0-2, both in Baltimore where he is 10-2 lifetime. Mike was 0-0 last year.

Others who have excelled against Toronto are: Dennis Martinez (9-6, 2.30 era, ip-133, er-34); and Scott McGregor (12-5, 2.79 era, ip-142, er-44). McGregor once saved 2 games in one day vs. the Jays in Toronto on Sep. 14, '77 (the day before the tarpaulin forfeit).

Dennis, despite his 9-6 record, has lost 4 of his last 5 decisions against the Jays.

Tippy Martinez is 7-3 lifetime with 8 saves, but is only 2-3 over the last 2 years . . . Don Aase is 6-2 with 2 saves and a career era of 2.58 (ip-76.2, er-22).

VOLUNTARY DRUG TEST PROGRAM

On January 30, the Orioles announced the first voluntary substance abuse program. Approved by the Commissioner, the one-year pilot program offers drug abuse therapy to players when needed.

The program calls for confidential, independent drug abuse testing thru The Johns Hopkins Hospital and Medical Center under the supervision of three Johns Hopkins physicians—Dr. Paul R. McHugh, Dr. Frank J. Oski and Dr. Alan Romanoski.

Dr. James McGee, Chief of Psychology at the Shepherd and Enoch Pratt Hospital will continue to serve as a director of the Orioles employees assistance program which provides for testing of minor league players and other personnel.

Urinalysis substance abuse testing, the cost to be assumed by the ballclub, will be conducted from 3 to 6 times a year on a spot and confidential basis. The players identity and test results will not be disclosed without consent of the player.

BIGGEST LIFETIME WINNERS/LOSERS VS. O'S

Winners: Whitey Ford, the Yankees Hall of Famer, still holds the distinction of having beaten the Orioles more than anyone else, even though he has been retired since '67... He was 30-16 against the Birds.

Ford is one of 11 pitchers to have posted 20 or more lifetime wins against the O's in 32 Baltimore seasons. The others: "Catfish" Hunter (26-24), Mike Lolich (25-19), Billy Pierce (23-11), Early Wynn and Frank Sullivan both (21-8), Jim Kaat (21-21), Earl Wilson (20-9), Luis Tiant (20-21), Jim Perry (20-22) and Camilo Pascual (20-23).

Among currently active pitchers, the biggest winners against the O's are Tommy John (15-16), followed by Bert Blyleven and Frank Tanana (both 14-11).

Losers: Hunter, the 2nd biggest winner vs. Baltimore, is also the biggest lifetime loser (24)... At one time "Catfish" had a 23-16 lifetime record vs. the O's, but then lost 8 of his last 11 decisions against them from '76 thru '79.

There have been 4 other 20-game losers: Tiant and Jim Perry (22 each), Fritz Peterson (14-21), and Kaat (21)... Other big losers were Lolich (19), Gaylord Perry (12-19) and Sam McDowell (9-19)... From a percentage standpoint, Jim Colborn, formerly of Brewers, Royals and Mariners, with a .150 (3-17) and Rudy May at .167 (3-15) rank near the bottom of the list.

Others who've had little success against Baltimore include: Geoff Zahn (2-11), Matt Keough (1-8), Mike Wilcox (4-12), Jim Beattie (3-11) and Mike Caldwell (3-9).

Among actives, Tommy John is the biggest loser (16), just as he's the biggest winner (assuming he makes a big league roster on opening day)... Jim Slaton (11-12) is next followed by Blyleven, Beattie and Tanana (11 each).

Ralph Salvon, the American League's senior head trainer, is in his 19th year in that capacity with the Orioles since he replaced Eddie Weidner in '66. Ralph has been a baseball trainer for 34 years since graduating from Gu Mauch's Trainer's School in '52, and has spent 30 years with the O's organization (including one year with the Orioles' predecessors, the St. Louis Browns).

He worked in the farm system from '53 thru '61, went to the Houston Astros for the next 4 years, then returned in '66 and spent 2 seasons as Weidner's assistant before moving up to the top job. A native of Fitchburg, MA, Ralph and his wife, Jane, live in Phoenix, MD.

Richie Bancells, 30, has already spent 10 seasons in the Orioles organization and is now in his 3rd year as the club's assistant trainer. He had served as head trainer and traveling secretary for the Orioles' AAA affiliate Rochester Red Wings for four years before coming to Baltimore in '84, but has been assisting Ralph Salvon at the O's big league camp in Miami since '80.

A Key West, FL native and a graduate of Miami's Biscayne College (now St. Thomas University), he first joined the organization as assistant trainer for the Miami O's (Florida State League) in '78-79.

Richie and his wife, Carol, are the parents of two children. They reside in Joppa, MD.

ALL-STAR GAME NOTES

1985: For the first time since '72, the Orioles had two players in the A.L.'s starting lineup. Eddie Murray, playing in his 6th all-star game and 5th straight, was a starter for the first time. He was joined in the infield by Cal Ripken, Jr., who was making his 3rd all-star game appearance, 2nd as starter. Ripken, the first Oriole elected to start in consecutive years since Brooks Robinson in '73 and '74, led A.L. players in votes (1,398,901) finishing just ahead of runner-up George Brett (1,394,334).

The presence of Murray in the starting lineup may have been something new, but the outcome of the game certainly wasn't as the N.L. won for the 13th time in the last 14 years, 6-1 at the Hubert Humphrey Metrodome in Minnesota on July 16, in the 56th All-Star Game.

Murray was 0-for-3 while Ripken had a single off Nolan Ryan in 3 trips to the plate, one of only 5 hits managed by the A.L.

Elected Starters: It was a late surge by his supporters that helped Murray to his first starting berth in an all-star game. He trailed Rod Carew by as many as 50,000 votes at one point and by 10,000 entering the final week. On the final count, however, Murray received 50,000 more votes than Carew.

The last time the Orioles had 2 elected starters was in '71 when Frank Robinson and Brooks Robinson were both in the lineup. Twelve O's have been elected to start in the 16 years of fan voting. In addition to Murray and Ripken, Orioles who have been elected

to starting positions are **Boog Powell** ('70, '71), **Brooks Robinson** ('71, '72, '73, '74), **Frank Robinson** ('71), **Bobby Grich** ('76), **Ken Singleton** ('81).

Selection of the starting team was returned to the fans in '71 under the sponsorship of the Gillette Company in cooperation with Major League Baseball. Following the ballot box "stuffing" incident in Cincinnati in '57, responsibility was entrusted to major league players for 12 years ('58 thru '69).

Orioles All-Star MVPs: Three Orioles have won "MVP" honors in all-star competition: **Billy O'Dell** ('58), **Brooks Robinson** ('66) and **Frank Robinson** ('71).

O'Dell, the former Orioles lefthander who also pitched for the Giants, Braves and Pirates, hurled the last three innings of the only all-star game ever played in Baltimore and retired all nine batters he faced to protect a one run lead, thus giving the A.L. a 4-3 win.

Brooks won the '66 Arch Ward Memorial Trophy on the strength of a 3-for-4 effort at bat (including a triple) and an 8-for-8 performance afield. He was the first player from a losing team to be honored.

Frank's fourth inning home run at Detroit in '71 put the A.L. in top to stay and earned him "mvp" honors. It was the first all-star victory since '62 for the A.L. which did not win another all-star game until '83.

MEMORIAL STADIUM—A BRIEF HISTORY

Construction of Baltimore Memorial Stadium began on the site of old Municipal Stadium in 1949. However, when the original Baltimore NFL franchise left town after the '50 football season, work on the new facility was suspended until '52.

Despite the construction the International League Orioles continued to play their home games here on 33rd Street (thru '53) as did the Baltimore Colts franchise when it re-located from Dallas (Texans) prior to the '53 football season.

The new stadium was completed essentially in October, '53, but refinements continued on thru the spring of '54, the A.L. Orioles first in Baltimore.

The original Municipal Stadium was built for football and completed in 1924. However, when old Oriole Park (29th Street and Greenmount Avenue) burned down on the night and early morning of July 3-4, 1944, the Orioles moved into the big ballpark (in those days home plate was in what is now dead center field).

Baltimore Memorial Stadium was built for \$6 million on 28 1/4 acres of city owned property and financed by two city bond issues.

Over the years, there have been some changes made. In '54, the distance from home plate to the fence in dead center was 450'. This has been whittled down gradually to its present 405'.

The Orioles dugout was originally on the first base side, but when some 2,600 field boxes were installed in front of the original boxes in '61 (prior to that there was an 8' wall between the front row of boxes and the field, and Baltimore led the world in foul territory) new dugouts had to be constructed and the home team moved over to third base.

In 1964 additional upper deck sections were added, increasing the capacity by another 2,600 seats. In 1970 (mid-season) a new scoreboard was installed. In recent years the old splintery wooden benches (without backs) have been completely replaced by chair and nonwooden benches with back rests, and a 35th row has been added to the upper deck.

In 1980, six new towers, housing a new ticket window and additional ticket office space, storage areas and rest rooms, were completed.

During the past year, construction was completed on new administrative offices for the Orioles. The project also included a new Diamond Vision video board (by Mitsubishi) situated in right center field.

ALCS: The O's hold many ALCS/LCS records including: Most (7, in 16 year history of divisional play), Most LCS won (5), LCS games (26), Most LCS games won (18), and Most LCS games hosted (13) . . . Their w-l percentage (.692, 18-8), is surpassed by the Red Sox (.1000 3-0), Mets and Tigers (.750, 6-2) and Dodgers (.706.)

The O's won the first 10 ALCS games they played (including first 9 ever played) . . . They swept the Twins twice (69-70) and ('71) in the first 3 ALCS, then won game #1 in '73 against Cas in '73 before losing the 2nd game that year . . . The Orioles are at home and on the road.

WORLD SERIES: Baltimore has gone 3-3 in 6 WS, but has a pct. in games (19-14) . . . The Birds are 10-7 at home and 9-7 on road.

POST-SEASON TOTAL: In 59 post-season games, the O's are 37-22 (.627). They are 19-11 at home and 18-11 away.

ATTENDANCE: In 26 ALCS games, the O's have played 1,020,384, an average of 39,246. They've played 13 of those home and have drawn 548,443 (average 42,188).

In 33 WS games attendance has totaled 1,769,179 (avg 53,611). At home for 17 WS dates the Birds have pulled 877,514 (average 51,619).

The Orioles 59 total post-season games have attracted 2,785,383 (average 47,281). At Memorial Stadium there have been 30 season events which have drawn a total of 1,425,961 (average 47,514).

The 3 biggest crowds to watch the O's in a WS were games #2 & 3 (67,064; 66,947 and 65,792) of '83, all at Philadelphia. The largest attendance for a WS game in Baltimore was 54,458 for game #4 (final game) vs. Dodgers in '66.

The biggest house for an Orioles LCS game was 52,787 for game #1 at Baltimore vs. the Angels in '79 (the "Tonight, Let it be Love" game).

NO-HITTERS BY OPPONENTS

Two no-hitters have been pitched against the Orioles in the 32 years they have been back in the American League, both by the Angels. **Bo Belinsky** was the first, on May 5, '62 at Dodger Stadium, winning 2-0 over **Steve Barber** . . . In 1975 **Nolan Ryan** no-hit the Orioles on June 1 at Anaheim Stadium, defeating **Ross Grimsley**, 1-0.

FARM SYSTEM—1985

Baltimore's 5 farm teams finished with a cumulative record of 278-288 (.491), but over the past 23 seasons the O's minor league organization record is 7783-7139 (.522). During that time, the Birds have been selected as the Tops "Baseball Organization of the Year" three times ('66, '71, '72).

Only 5 minor league teams in baseball have been affiliated with the same big league club continually for the past 25 years and 2 of those teams are Orioles affiliates.

Bluefield has been a member of the Orioles' farm system for the past 28 years equalling baseball's longest running affiliation (the San Francisco—Fresno). Rochester has been an O's affiliate for 25 years.

In the footsteps of the big league club, Rochester, the O's International League (AAA) affiliate, and Charlotte, of the Southern League (AA), both led their respective circuits in home runs. On the pitching side, three Oriole farmhands led their respective leagues in strikeouts—Rochester's **Brad Havens** topped the International League with 130; Charlotte's **John Hoover** tied for the Southern League lead with 128; Hagerstown's **Eric Bell** fanned 162 to lead the Carolina League (A).

Rochester finished 7th in the International League with a 58-81 record. The Red Wings posted a 41-40 mark after **Mark Wiley** replaced **Frank Verdi** as manager on June 17. Shortstop **Kelly Paris** was named to the IL all-star team. **Bill Swaggerty** led the league in complete games (10) and innings pitched (19).

Charlotte duplicated its '84 feat by winning the Southern League's Eastern Division Championship. Unlike '84, however, the Orioles lost out to Western Division champ Huntsville, 3 games to 2, in the SL championship series. After a 4th place finish in the first half, the O's rebounded to win the division's 2nd half season and down first half winner, Columbus, 3 games to 1 in the playoffs. Charlotte righthander **John Habyan** was named to the league's all-star team. **Michael Skinner** set a league record for best winning pct. with an 11-1 record (.917).

Hagerstown owned a 41-28 record in the first half, placing them 2nd in the Carolina League's Northern Division. In the 2nd half, however, the Suns went 24-44, the worst mark in the league. Shortstop **D.L. Smith** and first baseman **Chris Padgett** were named to the league's all-star team. League strikeout leader Bell also tied for the league lead in games started with 26.

Newark (class A) failed to reach the N.Y.-Penn. League championship playoffs for the first time in 3 years as they finished third in the McNamara Division with a 41-36 record. **Jeff Ballard** tied for the league lead in shutouts (3) and complete games (6) and was named to that circuits' all-star team.

Bluefield (rookie league) was 36-34 in the Appalachian League. Third baseman **Craig Worthington** was named to the all-star team. Righthander **Chester Stanhope** led all Appy. League pitchers in appearances with 26.

The major league draft is held annually at baseball's winter meetings, and is followed with a separate selection by National Association clubs from class AAA to A levels . . . Until 1958 major league clubs could draft players within a range between \$15,000 (for AAA players) and \$2,000 (for class D players) . . . In 1958 the price for big league drafts rose to \$25,000.

However, in 1959, a first year player draft at the big league level was set up to new rules provided that first year players could be selected at the major league level (if not protected on a major league team's 40 man roster) for \$12,000. In 1961 an even lower draft price was set up for more recent first year players. That figure was \$8,000.

That year, incidentally, the Baltimore organization set a record of sorts by being relieved of 19 eligible first year players (seven during the big league selections and 11 more during the minor league draft). In 1965 the first year player draft began to lose its significance and then disappeared in 1970.

ORIOLES "HALL OF FAME"

Jim Palmer, the 268-game winner who holds virtually every Orioles record for a starting pitcher, and Ken Singleton, a three-time "Most Valuable Oriole," who hit .290 or better five times in 10 Baltimore seasons, have been elected to the Orioles' Hall of Fame for '86 and will be inducted in special ceremonies prior to the O's-Yankees game on June 14.

They joined the 12 others who have been elected by vote of selected sports reporters and veteran members of the Oriole Advocates since the Orioles' Hall of Fame was founded in '77 by the Advocates. The purpose of the institution is to honor those players, managers, and coaches who have made exceptional contributions to the franchise since Baltimore returned to the major leagues in '54.

Allen Barrett and Jack Buckley, both past presidents of the Oriole Advocates, were instrumental in making the Orioles' "Hall of Fame" a reality. The chairman of the Oriole Advocates' Hall of Fame Committee this year is Chuck Lippy.

ORIOLES IN BASEBALL HALL OF FAME AT COOPERSTOWN

ORIOLES AT COOPERSTOWN (Cont.)

Baltimore born **Babe Ruth** signed his first pro contract with **Jack Dunn Sr.** in 1914 and made his debut with the Orioles that year as a pitcher . . . He was of course elected to the Hall of Fame as an outfielder . . . Other native Marylanders in the Hall of Fame include **Baker, Grove**, and three who never played for the O's: **Jimmie Fox** (Sudlersville), **Judy Johnson** (Snow Hill) and **Al Kaline** (Balmer).

Baltimore has been represented in 3 recognized major leagues: National Association (1872-74); National League (1892-99) and American League (1901-02, '54-86). From 1903 thru 1953 (51 seasons), the Orioles were in the International League (known as Eastern League until 1916).

ORIOLE ADVOCATES

The Oriole Advocates, Inc., a non-profit organization dedicated to promoting and stimulating interest in the game of baseball at both the amateur and professional levels, was unique when it was created in July, 1960 and remains so today, 26 years later.

The membership of the Advocates, comprises some 75 men and women drawn from a broad cross-section in the Baltimore area.

Through the years, the Advocates have made substantial financial contributions, primarily to youth organizations; have played a leading role in the restoration of Babe Ruth's birthplace at 216 E. Street, and its conversion into a Babe Ruth and Orioles Museum and established in '77 the Orioles "Hall of Fame".

The organization has also served as an essential right arm of the Orioles' public relations and promotions departments. Probably the biggest contribution of all in that area has been the formation and annual administration of the JUNIOR ORIOLES program. Originated in '63 with an enrollment of 75 youngsters, the Junior Orioles grew to a record 20,000 members in '77. It is a high-quality "knothole" program, a huge undertaking requiring much care, time and effort.

Among a wide variety of other activities, the Oriole Advocates also serve as distributors on Orioles souvenir giveaway promotion dates at the ballpark, making sure that all eligible fans receive the items to which they are entitled.

The Oriole Advocates don't get paid for anything they do. They are all volunteers constantly demonstrating just how important are the qualities of competence and dedication.

ORIOLES "DESIGNATED HITTERS"

The Orioles "Designated Hitters" have sold season tickets for the O's for the past 7 years (starting '80) and, in that period, the O's pre-season sale has jumped dramatically from 1,623 in '79 to a projected figure of more than 12,000 for 1986 (final figures will not be available until April because the "selling season" continues to opening day).

Membership in the "Designated Hitters" is expected to grow this year to an all-time high of between 60 and 65 business men and women who live and work within the Orioles drawing area (Birdland).

To achieve membership candidates must meet required sales minimums. The formula is based on a blend of new sales and renewals, and everyone must *requalify each year*.

Last year, **Allen Becker** and **Glenn Babcock** were the leading veteran members in sales while **Jennifer Scalfani**, **Jake Jacobson** and **David Hubbard** were tops among "rookie" members.

Incentives for members this year include: the annual weekend outing to the O's spring training headquarters in Miami and a special custom "DH" blazer for all qualifiers.

For those "DH's" who rank among the higher qualifiers, there will be a special trip to the World Series and a weekend in Chicago to watch the O's and the White Sox in a series at Comiskey Park.

However, if the "Designated Hitters" collective goal of 12,345 season tickets sold (the equivalent of 1,000,000 game tickets) is reached, then all qualifiers will make the "Windy City" trip.

And, for those at the very top of the sales ladder, a mid-summer junket to Paris and Monte Carlo is scheduled.

The "Designated Hitters" organization, patterned after the Kansas City Royals' highly successful "Royal Lancers", was founded in September, '79 by Mayor **William Donald Schaefer** and a select group of Baltimoreans working closely with the Orioles front office.

The idea was to enlist the talents of successful people from the business community to serve as the principal sales force in an effort to expand the Orioles season ticket base. In 7 short years, should the '86 goal be met, the O's season sales will have increased a whopping 754%.

Along with Mayor Schaefer, the "founding fathers" of the "Designated Hitters" included **Owen Daly**, **Bill Beasman** and **Chris Hartman**; the Orioles director of business affairs, **Bob Aylward**; executive director of sales **Lou Michaelson**, and former club vice president **Al Harazin**, now with the New York Mets.

The importance and scope of the "Designated Hitters" activities have grown to such an extent that today there are two Orioles coordinators, **Roy Sommerhof** and **Vince Dunbar**, working full time to keep the program prospering.

The "Designated Hitters" have their own officers (**Bill Jones** is the current president) and board of directors, as well as their own bylaws, newsletters and what is laughingly called a softball team. They conduct their own meetings and pursue an aggressive social program that is not designed for the faint of heart.

WMAR is in its 8th year of carrying Orioles baseball. WMAR and the O's signed their original 4-year agreement after the '78 season, extended that another 2 years, and are currently in the middle of a 3-year contract. The station will televise 5 spring exhibition games (Mar. 11, 19, 22, 25, 29) and 40 regular season (4 home, 36 road) games in '86.

In addition, an Orioles' television network comprising the following stations will carry major portions of the WMAR television schedule: WDCA (Ch. 20), Washington D.C. . . . ANNOUNCERS

REX BARNEY

Rex returns for his third season as a commentator for Home Team Sports. Known as the "Voice of Memorial Stadium" since 1970, he will continue to handle the stadium's public address announcements when it doesn't conflict with his color work.

This season, Rex will provide insightful interviews during HTS' pre-and post-game shows.

Rex, who also served as the stadium public address announcer for the Baltimore Colts from '69 to '83, has hosted a variety of radio sports shows in Baltimore and currently hosts a weekly call-in show on Orioles' flagship station WFBR-AM.

A former major league pitcher himself, Barney played with the Brooklyn Dodgers for six seasons (1943, '46-50). He appeared briefly with the Dodgers in 1943 before being called into the service for three years of military duty. He returned to the Dodgers in 1946, compiling a career record of 35-31. His best season came in 1948 when he won 15 games, including a sparkling 2-0 no-hit victory over the New York Giants.

Rex began his broadcasting career in '52 in New York City. He hosted Mutual Radio's Game of the Day from '55 to '57, and also broadcast games in the New York area for WOR-TV.

In '82 and '83, Rex served as color commentator for 16 Orioles' telecasts on subscription television. A native of Omaha, Nebraska, Rex resides just a half-mile from Memorial Stadium.

TOM DAVIS

Baltimore native Tom Davis will host the HTS' pre- and post-game show and provide in-game score updates, a position he handled during the '85 season. He has handled various on-air assignments for HTS including play-by-play for the Orioles and college basketball, in-studio talk shows, pre-game host of hockey telecasts, coverage of the Washington Redskins, boxing and college football.

The 38-year-old Davis has spent 15 years on the Baltimore sports scene. He has been named "Baltimore Sportscaster of the Year" in '78, '84 and '85. Davis gained national exposure with ABC-TV as sideline reporter during United States Football League telecasts and with the Mutual Broadcasting System as a sports anchor and college football play-by-play man.

A graduate of the University of Baltimore, Davis began his career as a sports reporter at WBAL radio in '72. He later worked as part-time sports anchor at WJZ-TV and WBAL-TV and as sports director at WCBM radio. While at WCBM, he was also the radio voice of the Baltimore Colts.

He can currently be heard mornings on WBAL radio. Tom and his wife Linda, have two children. They reside in Baltimore.

JOHN LOWENSTEIN

Former Oriole John Lowenstein returns for his second season as color commentator for Home Team Sports. He played his last game for the Orioles on May 4 last year and later that month began his sportscasting career calling the Orioles' games on HTS. His insight and humor were key elements of the '85 telecasts.

Lowenstein's major league career began in '70 with the Cleveland Indians. He remained with Cleveland until '78 when he was traded to the Texas Rangers. After one year at Texas, Lowenstein, was sold to Baltimore where he spent the last seven years of his career with the Orioles.

John compiled a .253 (3476-881) lifetime batting average in 1,368 big league games. His best season came in '83, when he batted .320 (322-103) with 24 home runs and 66 RBI in 122 games for the world champion O's while platooning the leftfield duties with Gary Roenick. The duo combined to produce a .292 average (612-179) with 35 home runs and 131 RBI.

TOM MARR

Tom Marr began his 8th season on the Orioles' radio broadcast team. A veteran of 26 years in broadcasting, he has been with WFBR radio for the last 20 years. He made his debut as a major league play-by-play announcer in '79.

He began his broadcasting career doing a high school sports show at WWDC in Washington, and later worked at stations in Rhode Island, Connecticut, and Virginia before coming to WFBR. He covered Baltimore's pro sports teams for the CBS Radio Network from '69 to '75 and was the weekend sports anchor at WMAR-TV for 3 years prior to joining the O's broadcasts.

Possessing an extensive background in both news and sports, Tom participated in WFBR's award-winning discussion program, "Conference Call" as a regular panel member for many years.

Born and raised in Montgomery County, Maryland, Tom is a graduate of Montgomery Blair High School in Silver Spring and a

veteran of the U.S. Marine Corps. He is married and the father of children. His wife, Sharon, is a Baltimore City Police detective.

JON MILLER

Jon Miller starts his 4th season on the Orioles' radio network after 3 years as a radio play-by-play announcer for the Boston Red Sox. His major league baseball experience also includes radio and television with the Texas Rangers in '78 & '79 and with the Oakland A's in '74. He broadcast his first major league game at age 22 with the A's.

Jon also has an extensive background in basketball, soccer, and hockey during his 14 years in broadcasting. He did 10-15 games a season for the NBA's Golden State Warriors from 1979-82 and prior to that, was the voice of University of San Francisco basketball for 5 years. He has also announced MISL games for the San Jose Earthquakes and did both television and radio for the Washington Diplomats in '77. He's broadcast soccer for the CBS, TBS, and Satcast networks.

A renowned mimic, Jon can be heard to imitate such outstanding baseball announcers as Al Michaels, Vin Scully, and Chuck Thompson during breaks in the action (rain delays, etc.). Popular on the banquet circuit in the off-season, Jon attended numerous such functions across the country last winter.

A native of the San Francisco Bay area, Jon now lives in Cockeysville, MD.

MEL PROCTOR

Mel Proctor returns for his 3rd season as the Orioles' play-by-play announcer for Home Team Sports. Mel, who handles a variety of on-air assignments for HTS including play-by-play for Washington Bullets basketball and college football, is in his 14th year as a broadcaster.

He began his career as sports director at the CBS-TV affiliate in Hawaii (KGMB) from '73 until '78. While there, he worked the mike for Hawaii Islanders (AAA) baseball, University of Hawaii football and basketball, and did one season for the Hawaiians of the World Football League.

He came to work in the Nation's Capital for the first time in '78 when he began a five-year stint as play-by-play announcer for Washington Bullets' basketball on flagship station, WTOP-AM. During the Bullets' off-seasons, Mel worked in Arlington, Texas, as the TV and radio voice of the Texas Rangers. In '82 and '83, he supplemented his work with the Bullets by doing college basketball games for NBC-TV for two seasons.

For two seasons ('83-'84 and '84-'85), Mel served as the play-by-play man for NBA's New Jersey Nets. At that time he also began providing the commentary for the NFL Game of the Week" for Mutual Broadcasting System.

A native of Denver, Colorado, Mel resides in Columbia, MD with his wife, Julie, and their two children, Bill and Maile.

BROOKS CALBERT ROBINSON, JR.

HALL OF FAME

Was elected to Baseball Hall of Fame in landslide on Jan. 12, 1983. Received 92% of votes cast (344-374), 9th highest pct. in history of BBWAA elections (surpassed only by Ty Cobb, Hank Aaron, Honus Wagner, Babe Ruth, Willie Mays, Bob Feller, Ted Williams, and Stan Musial).

Is one of only 15 elected in first year of eligibility (excluding the chosen in the Hall's first election).

Was 3rd of 6 modern Orioles to be elected. The others (years of election in paren): **Robin Roberts** ('76), **Frank Robinson** ('82), **George Kell** ('83), **Luis Aparicio** ('84) and **Hoyt Wilhelm** ('85).

Brooks was inducted with Kell, Juan Marichal, and Walter Alston into the Hall of Fame on Sunday, July 31, 1983 as an estimated record crowd of some 12,000 people (most of them from Baltimore) looked on.

PERSONAL

Brooks is doing color commentary on the Orioles' television network with **Chuck Thompson** for the 9th straight year (and 8th on WMAR, Channel 2, the Orioles' flagship station).

He is also active as vice-president of Shapiro-Robinson and Associates* and as a special assistant with the Crown Central Petroleum Company.

Brooks and his wife, **Connie**, a former United Air Lines flight attendant whom Brooks met on a Orioles' charter flight (K.C. to Boston) in 1959, have been married for 25 years. They live in Lutherville, MD (north of Baltimore) with their four children: **Brooks David** (7/24/61), **Chris** (2/22/63), **Michael** (3/11/64) and **Dianna** (2-22-68).

Brooks' uniform #5 was officially retired on opening day, 1978, the year after he retired. **Frank Robinson's** #20, **Earl Weaver's** #4 and **Jim Palmer's** #22 are the only other numbers that have been retired by the Orioles.

BIG LEAGUE CAREER

Brooks officially spent 20 years and 72 days as a player in the American League, spanning 23 seasons.

He played in 2,896 major league games, all of them with the Orioles, 8th on the all-time list (**Pete Rose** leads at 3,490).

Only **Carl Yastrzemski** (3,308) and **Ty Cobb** (3,033) have played more American League games, and only 3 others in history have played more with one franchise: **Yastrzemski** (3,308), **Hank Aaron** (3,076) and **Stan Musial** (3,026).

Durability: Played in 97% of all Orioles' games from July 9, '59 (when he returned from minors for the last time) thru May 16, '76, a period of more than 16½ years . . . Played at least 153 games in 14 of 15 years from '60 thru '75.)

In Orioles' 30-year history, only one other third baseman has played as many as 200 games at third base (**Doug DeCinces**—792).

Opening Days: Started 20 consecutive opening day games for the Orioles from '57 thru '76, and batted .316 (25-for-79) with six home runs, 17 rbi.

Home Runs/RBI: Led A.L. in rbi (118) in '64 and also achieved career high of 28 homers that year . . . Hit 17 or more homers nine times, 11 or more eleven times . . . His last year in "double figures" was '71 when he hit 20 . . . Holds record for most lifetime homers in Memorial Stadium (139). Had six career grand slams, four of them in Baltimore.

Hitting: Hit most home runs (37) and drove in most runs (167) against the Red Sox . . . Twice put together strings of eight straight hits: July 10 thru 15, '60, and Aug. 21 thru 23, '63 . . . Holds A.L. record for most sacrifice flies, career (114).

Holds club career records for games, at bats, runs, hits, doubles, triples, total bases, rbi and extra base hits . . . Has one-season mark for games (163, '61 & '64) and at bats (668, '61).

Fielding: Committed only 263 errors in 9,165 chances at third base for a lifetime percentage of .971 . . . Appeared in a total of 29 games at second base (24) and shortstop (5) and committed only one boot in 31 tries . . . Did not play anywhere defensively but at third base after '63.

Major League Lifetime Records, 3B: Highest fielding percentage, 100 or more games (.971) . . . Most seasons (23) . . . Most games (2,871) . . . Most chances accepted, excluding errors (8,902) . . . Most putouts (2,697) . . . Most assists (6,205) . . . Most double plays (618) . . . Most seasons leading league in games (8) . . . Most seasons leading league in assists (8).

Nothing is Forever, '77: His 268th and last home run was April 19 at Memorial Stadium, the O's trailed the Indians in the 10th. With one out and runners on 1st and 2nd, Lee singled in a run. The O's now trailed by 2 as Brooks came in to plate as a pinch-hitter for **Larry Harlow**. He ran the count to 3-0, fouled off a number of pitches, then hit a home run into the left stands off southpaw **Dave LaRoche** to win the game 6-5. There were only 4,826 fans at the ballpark that night, but none of them ever forgot the moment.

Signed for 1977 as player-coach, but became coach exclusively on Sunday, Aug. 21, when he went on the voluntarily retired (Minnesota) to make room on the roster for catcher Rick Dempsey who was returning to duty after six weeks on the disabled list.

An Orioles' record regular season crowd of 51,798 attended "Thanks, Brooks" Day on Sunday, Sep. 18, against the Red Sox to pay tribute to the most important and beloved Oriole of all times.

There are now 11 "Diamond Vision" boards in big league stadia: Shea, Yankee, Dodger, Comiskey, Three Rivers, Arlington, Kingdome, Astrodome, Jack Murphy and Oakland.

The "black & white" board in left center field has been in use since the middle of the 1970 season.

CHUCK THOMPSON

A veteran of 44 years in broadcasting, Chuck Thompson is in his 27th season as a play-by-play announcer for the Orioles. At the end of the '82 season, Chuck decided to curtail his broadcast schedule and in '86 he'll team once again with Brooks Robinson to do games on television only.

Chuck began his announcing career in 1939 at WEEU in Reading. Three years later he became a staff announcer for WIBG in Philadelphia, where he covered Temple University football.

After seeing combat in three major European campaigns for the U.S. Army in World War II, he returned to Philadelphia to describe the action of the Phillies and A's, Warriors, Eagles, and Rockets (ice hockey).

He came to Baltimore in 1949 to do play-by-play for the International League Orioles, the Baltimore Bullets, U.S. Naval Academy football, and the Colts in the All-America Conference.

In 1955 Chuck joined the National Brewing Company's team of announcers and during the 24 years of that association did American League Orioles baseball for 19 years ('55-'56 and '62 thru '78), Colts football, Washington Senators baseball ('57-'61), and the NBC-TV "Game-of-the-Week" ('59-'60).

He has been named the outstanding sportscaster in Maryland by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association on numerous occasions. A golfing and fishing enthusiast, Chuck has 3 children and 5 grandchildren. He resides in Timonium.

MANAGER AND COACHES

EARL S. WEAVER

Born: Aug. 14, '30; 5'8"; 165; Batted, R; Threw, R; Position: 28

Birthplace/Residence: Born and raised in St. Louis, MO . . . Now lives in Hialeah, FL (Miami).

Contract Status: Signed thru '86.

Tenure: Joined O's 29 years ago this spring (Mar. '57) as minor league player-manager and has spent all but 20 months of that time with the Orioles organization (see "Sabbatical" below).

This will be his 39th year of association with organized baseball as player, manager, coach, scout, consultant, and radio-television commentator since he began as a 2nd baseman in the Cardinals.

Signed Originally with: St. Louis Cardinals in '48.

'85 Return: After being out of uniform for 2 years, 8 months Earl returned as Orioles manager on Friday, June 14. He went 53-52 the rest of the way finishing the season in 4th place (83-78), one game back of the Detroit Tigers, and 16 games behind the division winning Blue Jays.

O's Hall of Fame/Number Retired: Earl (#4) is one of only 4 Orioles whose uniform has been retired (when he's not wearing it), and the only non-player. He shares that distinction with Frank Robinson (#20), Brooks Robinson (#5) and Jim Palmer (#22).

He is one of 14 to have been elected to the Orioles Hall of Fame.

Sabbatical: Upon his retirement as Orioles manager after the '82 season, Earl remained with the club as a consultant and special assignment scout.

In October, '83 prior to serving as an ABC-TV color commentator for the Orioles-Phillies World Series, he relinquished his position with the O's as required by ABC to avoid any "conflict of interest" speculation.

He had inherited a 4th place club with a record of 30-26, 7 games out of 1st (29-26 under Joe Altobelli), and 1-0 for Cal Ripken, who had managed the club on June 13.

Original Tour: Earl was serving as the O's 1st base coach when he was 1st appointed manager of the O's, replacing Hank Bauer on July 11, '68. He had been brought up from Rochester at the start of that year following a highly successful career managing in the minors.

He led the Orioles over the next 14½ seasons before stepping down at the end of the '82 campaign.

Winning: Earl has won 6 Eastern Division titles ('69, '70, '71, '73, '74, '79), 4 American League pennants ('69, '70, '71, '79) and one World Series ('70) . . . He has finished 1st or 2nd in 13 of 16 tries (O's were 3rd in '72, and 4th in both '78 and '85).

Under his leadership, Baltimore has won 90 or more games in 12 of 14 full seasons, including 100 or more 5 times.

He had a losing record at Fitzgerald, Ga. in '57, his first full year as a manager (and first year in the O's organization), but has been over .500 in each of his next 26 seasons including '85.

In 21 of his last 25 seasons (or portions thereof), his clubs have finished 1st or 2nd . . . He has finished as low as 4th only twice ('78 and '85) in the last 22 seasons (after Fox Cities in '61).



All-Time Wins List: Earl ranks tied for 17th on the all-time managerial wins list (20th century exclusively) with the modern O's first skipper, Jimmie Dykes at 1407. The list is topped by Connie Mack (3776) and another former Orioles manager, John McGraw, (2840).

100-Win Seasons: Earl has won 100 or more 5 times ('69-109, '70-108, '71-101, '79-102 and '80-100). He is tied with Connie Mack for 2nd place behind Joe McCarthy, a 6-time 100-game winner.

Sparky Anderson, Frank Chance and John McGraw have managed four 100-game winning clubs and Billy Southworth had 3.

During his first 3 full seasons ('69, '70, '71), his teams tied the major league record for most consecutive 100-win campaigns joining the Philadelphia A's ('29-'30-'31) and the St. Louis Cardinals ('42, '43, '44).

Vs. Individual Managers (thru '85): In head to head competition against his most frequent adversaries, Earl is: vs. Ralph Houk (119-75, .613) . . . vs. Sparky Anderson (39-26, .600, including 4-1 in '70 WS) . . . vs. Gene Mauch (49-36, .576), and vs. Billy Martin (94-86, .522, including 3-0 in '69 ALCS).

Sep.-Oct. Record: Earl's won-lost record (regular season only) in September-October is 301-181 (.624) which breaks down to 281-171 in September and 20-10 in October.

Last year the O's were only 16-19 in that period, but in his final full season as the Birds' manager, 1982, they went 22-10 (.688) in Sep.-Oct. and 33-11 (.750) from August 20 thru the end of the season. That was the year the O's beat the Brewers 3 straight times in the final series of the year to tie Milwaukee for 1st place before losing the final game and the pennant on the last day.

Ejections: Earl was ejected from 4 games in '85, boosting his lifetime total to 93 including one spring training exhibition ('80) and a '69 World Series game. The O's are 46-47 in games from which Earl has been ejected.

He had been back on the job for 5½ weeks last year before being thumbed by Dale Ford in Minny on July 22 for disputing a catch-trap call on a play by Twins outfielder Randy Bush. Before leaving the premises that night, Earl paid a call to Bush in left field just to get his point of view.

John Hirschbeck threw Earl and Rick Dempsey out of a game in Texas on August 11. Then on September 29, he was ejected twice—in the 1st game by Nick Bremigan and while exchanging lineups for the 2nd game by Jim Evans.

That double elimination was the 2nd of his career and drew Earl his 6th lifetime suspension. He had been bumped twice on August 15, '75 at Baltimore by Ron Luciano.

Speaking of Luciano, he and Marty Springstead lead the parade of ejectors with 7 apiece, followed by Evans and Bill Haller(5) . . . Among those who never threw Earl out of a game were Jim Honochick and the late Nestor Chylak.

Earl's busiest ejections season was 1975 when he exited early on 10 occasions. He has been tossed out by 41 different arbiters, including two amateurs during the '79 umpires' strike. One of those was Jim O'Connor, a Baltimore teacher who umpires locally, but once worked at the AAA level in the minors.

His 6th suspension which he served Oct. 1-2-3 was of 3 games duration. The only longer one imposed on him was the result of an incident with Terry Cooney at Memorial Stadium on July 17, '82 after which he sat down for a week. That resulted from physical contact between Earl and Cooney.

EARL S. WEAVER (Cont.)

Clinching/Elimination: The earliest an Earl Weaver club has clinched a division championship was September 13, 1969 after 146 games when the Birds with a record of 101-45 held a first place lead of 18½ games.

The earliest elimination in Earl's career was September 23, 1971 after 148 games. The O's at that point were 79-69, in 3rd place and 14½ games back of Toronto.

CSWS: Earl shares with **Sparky Anderson** the major league record for Most LCS (6), and Most LCS Games Managed (22), and is 2nd to **Anderson** in LCS Games Won (17 to 15).

Weaver's clubs have won 4 of 6 ALCS with an overall record 15-13 (swept in '69, '70 & '71; lost 2-3 in '73; lost 1-3 in '74 and won 3-1 in '79).

He is 1-3 in 4 World Series, 11-13 in games (lost 1-4 in '69; won 4-1 in '70, lost 3-4 in '71 and '79). He is 26-20 (.565) overall in post-season play.

He is one of 12 in big league history to have managed in 4 or more World Series. Tops on that list is **Casey Stengel** (10), followed by **Joe McCarthy** and **John McGraw** (9 each). Among active **Anderson** (5) is the leader, and Earl is next with 4.

All-Star Games: Earl managed in 4 All-Star games ('70, '72, '78, '80). Though he was only 1-3, he had the distinction in 1971 as Detroit of leading the A.L. All-Stars to their lone victory between '72 (2nd game) and '83. **Frank Robinson** was the MVP of the '71 game.

Earl was also the A.L.'s "honorary manager" in '74. He was named to manage the A.L. in May because **Dick Williams**, who had won the pennant the year before (at Oakland) was un-employed at the time. However, **Williams** returned to baseball July 1st (to manage Angels) and was appointed A.L. skipper.

Winter Leagues/Japan: He managed Santurce in the Puerto Rican League during the winters of '66-'67 and '67-'68, winning the post-season playoffs the first year and the pennant the next . . . He also managed the O's Arizona Instructional League clubs at Scottsdale during a number of off-seasons.

He has twice managed in Japan on post season tours. In '79 he led a group of A.L. stars against the National League on a 3-week tour and in '71 he directed the O's to a 12-2-4 record against Japanese competition on a month-long trip.

Manager of the Year & Other Awards: Earl made a clean sweep of the "Manager of the Year" awards for the first time in '73 . . . He was picked as the major league's top skipper by THE SPORTING NEWS for the 2nd time in 3 years ('77, '79); by the Associated Press as the A.L.'s best for the 3rd time in 7 years ('73, '77, '79), and by United Press International, also as the A.L.'s best, for the first time ever.

In '77 when he captured the TSN & AP awards, UPI's went to **Bob Lemon**, then with the White Sox.

He is one of 4 Orioles skippers to have earned one or more major "Manager of the Year" awards along with **Paul Richards**, **Hank Bauer** and **Joe Altobelli**.

In the Beginning: His managing career began while Earl was playing for the independent Knoxville club in the Class A South Atlantic (Sally) League in '56. Late in the season the club was 20 games under .500 and Manager **Dick Bartel**, a former 18-year infielder in the majors, was fired and Earl named to pilot the club thru the rest of the schedule. He went 10-24.

That winter, **Jim McLaughlin**, then the Orioles' farm director, and his assistant, **Harry Dalton**, both of whom knew Earl as a player and were impressed with his potential as a manager, hired him to run the Fitzgerald club, one of 8 teams in the O's farm system.

"Thanks Earl" Day/Fond Farewell: He was honored on a beautiful Sunday afternoon September 19, '82, just a couple weeks prior to his retirement. Some 41,127 turned out to pay their respects during an often emotional and moving one hour, 15 minute pre-game ceremony on "Thanks Earl" Day.

The dramatic quality of the day was further enhanced by **Rich Dauer** whose 2 out, bottom of the 10th inning home run gave the O's a "sudden death" victory over the Indians, and by an impromptu post-game fan demonstration of affection.

Then, exactly 2 weeks later, he was honored, informally, again after the final game of the season, in which the O's lost the division title in a head-to-head fight with the Brewers.

While the Brewers celebrated their 1st division championship in the middle of the field, most of the 51,462 fans in the stands remained to bid the home town team and its outgoing manager a fond farewell that lasted for some 45 minutes.

It was perhaps the most heart-warming and emotional ad lib display of affection ever displayed at Memorial Stadium.

PLAYING CAREER

Earl was a minor league 2nd baseman for 13 years, mostly in the St. Louis Cardinals system, and played as high as "AA". He was signed for the Cardinals by **Walter Shannon** who later served as the O's farm director.

Earl trained with the Cardinals big club in the spring of '52, but that became an academic experience when **Red Schoendienst**, the incumbent 2nd baseman, ended a holdout and signed his contract.

He played on pennant winner during each of his first 4 pro seasons; led his league in fielding 5 times, was a 3-time league "MVP" (Illinois State League—'48 . . . Western Association—'49 . . . Western League—'51), and was named to league all-star teams 5 times.

PERSONAL

He is a graduate of Beaumont High School in St. Louis . . . An ardent golfer and a dedicated gardener . . . Earl and O's Groundskeeper **Pat Santarone**, long-time friends who first met when both worked with the Elmira Pioneers in the Eastern League, wage an annual competition to see who can grow the largest tomatoes.

They collaborated several years ago in developing a plant food ("Earl and Pat's Tomato Food"), and it has become a best seller . . . Marketed and manufactured by Plantabbs Corporation, it can be used with any vegetable harvested above ground.

Earl and his wife, **Marianna**, now live permanently in Hialeah, FL (their home overlooks a golf course) . . . He has 3 children by a previous marriage: **Michael Earl** (Atlanta), **Rhonda Lee** (Houston), and **Theresa Ann** (St. Louis), and a step-daughter, **Kim** (Baltimore), plus 6 grand-children.

Led International League in homers (30), despite being called up to Baltimore on Aug. 12 . . . Finished 2nd in IL "MVP" voting to Pawtucket's Ted Cox . . . Picked for all-star team . . . Hit .308 (124-for-403) that season with 80 rbi.

Amateur Background: "Crow" was scouted and signed for the O's by Frank McGowan, Walter Shannon, and the late Joe Torre, Sr. . . . He enjoyed an outstanding baseball career at Staten Island's Curtis High and later played baseball at Long Island University.

He is one of several 1st basemen to have made it to the majors from New York: Lou Gehrig, Frank and Joe Torre, and Joe Pepitone, Mike Flory, Ed Kranepool, and Curt Blefary (born in Brooklyn) are among the others.

Major League Career: When he first joined the O's in '61, Ellie had spent 9 seasons in the minors . . . During the 18 years that have elapsed since then, he has been with Baltimore for nearly 16½ years.

He played for the Cubs during the last 6 weeks of '72 (Tommy Davis deal) before returning to the O's that winter, then logged 11 years in the Yankees organization from June '76 thru the '77 season before rejoining the Birds.

Coach: Ellie was appointed bullpen coach in Nov. '77 . . . He also served as a player-coach for parts of the '78 and '79 seasons . . . He has also supervised off-season workouts the last 7 winters for players living in the Baltimore area.

He was the American League's batting practice catcher and bullpen coach for the 1982 all-star game in Montreal.

'79 Season: He coached exclusively all year until Sep. 1 when the roster expanded to 40 men . . . He made only one appearance in a game at Detroit on Sep 19, and went 0-for-1 with a thrown error from behind the plate . . . He was not eligible for post-season play.

'78 Season: He started the season as a coach, but was activated six weeks later (on May 18) replacing Gary Roenick who was optioned to Rochester. Ellie remained on the player list for the remainder of the year while also continuing as a coach.

Last Home Run: Ellie hit his last big league home run on Aug. 23, a blast off Oakland's Dave Heaverlo.

'78 Batting/ERA Leader: In 13 games Ellie batted .333 (6-for-18), and in his one career pitching stint he compiled a 0.00 era, thus leading the club in both categories (actually he tied Dave Ford in era . . . Ford pitched 15 scoreless innings in Sep.).

His pitching career took place in Toronto on June 26 where the O's were absorbing a 24-10 pasting by the Blue Jays . . . Ellie worked 2.1 innings, allowing no runs, one hit and one walk while putting an end to the carnage that had been inflicted on four predecessors (Mike Flanagan, Joe Kerrigan, Tippy Martinez and outfielder Larry Harlow) . . . Don Stanhouse then pitched the final inning and, inspired by Ellie's effort, he, too, held the Jays scoreless.

Yankees '76-'77: In '76 Ellie played in 26 games for the Yankees after the June 15 trade from Baltimore and batted .210 (12-for-57).

Ellie spent '77 shuttling between New York and Syracuse. He played in only 10 games for the Yankees and was not eligible for post-season play.

Orioles ('68-'76): Ellie had been with the O's for nearly 9½ years when he was traded to the Cubs for Tommy Davis in Aug. '71 . . . However, when the season ended, he was reacquired by Baltimore.

100 Games/Year: Ellie played in more than 100 games in each of the O's 3 pennant-winning seasons of '69-'70-'71 . . . He and Andy Etchebarren more or less split the regular catching job from '68 thru '71.

Weaver/Lane: Earl Weaver and Frank Lane were instrumental in convincing the O's to draft him from the Angels' AAA Seattle affiliate in Nov. '67 . . . Ellie had played for Weaver in Puerto Rico previously and Lane had scouted him in Mexico.

Odds and Ends: Ellie hit 2 grand slams for the Birds, both in Memorial Stadium: July 20, '70 off Chicago's Barry Moore, and Aug. 18, '75 off the Twins Dave Goltz . . . He nearly always caught when Mike Cuellar was pitching . . . He led the O's in batting on the '71 Japan tour with a .400 average (16-for-40).

ALCS/WS: He compiled a .273 average (18-for-66) in 23 postseason games for the O's and Yankees (comprising five championship and four World Series).

'70 WS: Ellie hit .364 (4-for-11) against the Reds with a home run and double and contributed significantly to the O's wins at Cincinnati in games 1 and 2.

In the opener, the Reds jumped out 3-0, but Ellie tied it in the 5th with a home run off Gary Nolan and the O's went on to win on Brooks' homer in the 7th . . . There was a play in the Cincinnati 6th in which Ellie was involved and that was as important as the home run . . . See "Carbo-Burkhart Incident" below.

"Carbo-Burkhart" Incident: One inning after Ellie had tied the game with his home run, the Reds had Bernie Carbo on 3rd, representing the lead run, and only one out (Brooks had retired Lee May) leading off the inning on a sensational play.

Pinch-hitter Ty Cline then chopped a high bouncer in front of the plate . . . As Ellie went out and grabbed it, Carbo headed home, Ellie dove and tagged Carbo a few feet up the line and Umpire Ken Burkhart, who had been spun around by the runners as they converged so that his back was to the play, called Carbo out.

Films later revealed that Ellie had tagged Carbo with one hand while holding the ball in the other, and that Carbo had missed the plate.

Puerto Rico: Ellie played for Santurce in the Puerto Rico Winter League each year from '60-'77 except in '71 when the O's went to Japan . . . His 112 homers in that loop rank him second on the all-time list to former St. Louis Browns outfielder Willard Brown (120).

Minors: He enjoyed his best minor league seasons in Jalisco in the Mexican League (AAA) where he hit 109 homers in 4 years and was known as the "Babe Ruth of Mexico" . . . In his last season there ('67), he led the league in homers (41) and was second in rbi (112).

He started his career in the Milwaukee Braves' organization ('59-'60), then spent 2 years at Winnipeg in the Cardinals system ('62-'63) before going to Mexico.

Personal: Ellie is one of the most popular personalities ever to wear an Orioles uniform . . . He is an accomplished after-dinner speaker and is very active in community projects in the Baltimore area . . . Speaks fluent Spanish . . . Plays the flute.

Ellie was selected as the first "Man of the Year" by the Baltimore chapter of the National Conference of Christians and Jews in Feb. '83 in recognition of his outstanding service to the community.

He has operated a two-week baseball camp for youngsters the past 4 summers at McDonogh School in Owings Mills.

He and his wife, Merle, were married Jan. 14, '70 and are the parents of two sons: Ryan (8/3/72) and Ian Christopher (11/28/76). They have lived in the Randallstown area, near Baltimore, since the early '70's.

Ellie has 4 children by a previous marriage: Abegail (7/13/62), Elrod, Jr. (4/7/64), Elroy (10/17/65), and Berecia (8/25/67).

Coach: Cal joined the Orioles' coaching staff in '76, replacing George Staller, who had retired after the '75 season . . . Served as the O's bullpen coach until June 27, '77, when he took over at base following Billy Hunter's appointment as manager of the Texas Rangers.

Father and Son: Cal's son, Cal, Jr. joined the Orioles in '76, giving the Birds one of the few father-son combinations on the same team in major league history. Among the others are Connie (manager) and Earle (player) Mack of the Philadelphia A's (1910-11, 1913-14), Jim (coach) and Mike (player) Hegan of the New York Yankees (1964, '66-'67, '73) and Yogi (mgr.) and Dale (player) Berra (also of the Yankees). For biography on Cal Jr. see page 188.

In addition, Cal's youngest son, Billy was selected by Baltimore in the June '82 free agent draft (11th round, regular phase) as an

10-year old shortstop. Billy played at Charlotte (Southern League), Hagerstown (Carolina League) and Daytona Beach (Florida State League) last year.

Managing: Cal managed in the Orioles' farm system from '61 thru '74, a span of 13 plus seasons which represents the longest tenure of any minor league skipper in O's history. Earl Weaver and Joe Altobelli are tied for 2nd with 11 years each . . . During that period, Cal managed at all levels except "rookie" league.

As a player-manager had a losing record in 2 seasons, then retired from active status following the '62 campaign . . . In 12 years as a non-playing skipper finished below .500 only once.

Won the 1st of 2 pennants at Aberdeen (Northern League) by 12 games with a club that included Jim Palmer, Andy Etchebarren, Eddie Watt, and Mark Belanger . . . Was chosen "Manager of the Year" in that loop . . . Finished 1st again in '72 at Asheville in the AA Southern League.

Managed at Rochester in '69 and '70 (preceding Joe Altobelli), then moved to Dallas-Ft. Worth (AA-Texas) in '71 . . . Last 3 seasons as a manager were at Asheville, '72 thru '74.

Earlier had managed clubs in Leeburg, Fla. (his 1st managerial assignment in '61); Appleton, Wis. ('62); Aberdeen, S.D. ('63, '64, '66); Kennewick-Richland-Pasco, Wash. (Tri-City) ('65); Miami, Fla. ('67); and Elmira, N.Y. ('68).

Scout: In '75, he turned to scouting, primarily at the professional level . . . In addition, did some free agent scouting and also served as a "trouble shooter" in the farm system.

Playing Career: Was a catcher in the O's organization although also played 3rd base and the outfield and even pitched . . . Enjoyed best year under Earl Weaver at Fox Cities (I.I.I. League) in '60 . . . Became a player-manager for 1st time midway thru the '61 season.

Personal: Conducts a number of clinics and works for the O's speakers' bureau during the off-season . . . His brother, Bill, played the outfield in the Brooklyn Dodgers' organization.

Cal and his wife, Vi, were married on Nov. 30, '57 . . . They have 4 children: Ellen Leigh (3/22/59), Calvin Jr. (8/24/60), Fred (11/25/61), and Billy (12/16/64).



FRANK ROBINSON (Cont.)

Hall of Fame: He was elected to the Hall of Fame at Cooperstown in '82 along with Hank Aaron after being named in 89% of the ballots cast (370-415). That was the 1st of 4 straight years during which a former Oriole has been elected to the Hall. Frank is one of only 15 to have been elected to the Hall in his 1st year of eligibility (that list includes former teammate Brooks Robinson).

Frank was the 2nd of 6 ex-O's to be so honored (date of election in paren): Robin Roberts ('76), Brooks Robinson ('83), George Kell ('83), Luis Aparicio ('84) and Hoyt Wilhelm ('85). In his official portrait at Cooperstown, he is wearing a Baltimore uniform.

He has managed the Cleveland Indians ('75-'77), Rochester Red Wings ('78) and San Francisco Giants ('81-'84), as well as the San Jose Crabbers in the Puerto Rico League for 8 winters and the Culiacan club in the Mexican Pacific Winter League ('77-'78).

Made a dramatic debut as playing manager on Apr. 8, '75, before some 55,000 opening day fans at Cleveland Stadium. In his 1st at bat of that 1st game (he was dh, batting 2nd), Frank homered off Doc Medich (Boog Powell later homered in the same half-inning).

The Indians went on to win, 5-3 and that effort was voted "most memorable moment" in Tribe history by fans during baseball's observance of the U.S. Bicentennial celebration.

In that 1st year, the Indians fell 15 games below .500 by late June, but rallied and wound up 4th, just one game under . . . The next year, '76, they were 3 over. However, after a slow start in '77, Frank was released and succeeded by Jeff Torborg.

Frank became a big league coach for the 1st time after the Indians let him go as manager in '77. He joined Dave Garcia who had been his 3rd base coach at Cleveland ('75-'76) and was then managing the Angels.

He returned to Baltimore and coached for the O's for part of '78 and all of '79 and '80. During that period, he was responsible for vastly improving the quality of the O's outfield defense, and in '80 replaced Jim Frey (who left to manage the K.C. Royals) as the O's batting & 1st base coach.

After being released by the Giants in '84, he served the Milwaukee Brewers as batting coach.

San Francisco Giants: Was named manager Jan. 14, '81 replacing Dave Bristol (who had in turn replaced Joe Altobelli), and led the club to its first winning season since Altobelli did it in '78 and the first back-to-back winning seasons in a decade ('81 & '82) . . . After finishing 3rd in '82, the Giants dipped below .500 in '83 and '84 and on Aug. 4, '84 Frank was dismissed in favor of Danny Ozark who was named interim skipper.

During his tenure with the Giants, two former O's served on his coaching staff—Don Buford and Herm Starrette.

Rochester '78: Started the season as an O's coach, but after the late Ken Boyer was named manager of the St. Louis Cardinals (Apr. 28), Frank replaced him (May 9) at the Red Wings' helm.

He was 58-64 at Rochester which finished 6th. Doc Edwards was hired to manage the Wings in '79, and Frank returned to the O's as a coach, helping the O's to an A.L. pennant.

Cleveland '75-'76-'77: Joined Indians as player on Sep. 12, '74 from California in trade that ultimately sent Rusty Torres and

Ken Suarez to the Angels . . . Then, 3 weeks later, on Oct. 4, the day after that season ended, he was named the first black major league manager in baseball history, replacing Ken Aspromonte.

PLAYING CAREER

Major League Leader: He played for 21 seasons in the majors and is among the top ranking players of all time in 10 categories.

His 586 home runs represent the fourth highest figure in major league history behind Hank Aaron (755), Babe Ruth (714), Willie Mays (660) . . . Harmon Killebrew (572) and Mickey Mantle (536) are fifth and sixth respectively.

In addition, Frank ranks high in the following: games-2,808 (11th), at bats-10,006 (11th) . . . runs-1,829 (10th) . . . hits-2,943 (20th) . . . doubles-528 (17th) . . . rbi-1,812 (12th) . . . total bases-5,373 (8th) . . . walks-1,420 (16th) and hit by pitch-198 (2nd) . . . The only player to have been hit with more baseballs is Ron Hunt (243), former National League infielder.

"MVP", Both Leagues: He is the only player ever to win BBWAA "MVP" award in both major leagues . . . He won the N.L. award in '61 and the A.L. in '66 . . . In addition, he was "MVP" in the '66 World Series and '71 All Star Game.

Triple Crown: Is one of only 11 players to have won the "Triple Crown" (accomplished 13 times, two each by Ted Williams and Rogers Hornsby) . . . Frank did it in '66 with the O's. He, Mantle ('56), and Carl Yastrzemski ('67) are the only Triple Crown winners in the past 38 years (since Williams' second in '47).

HOME RUNS

He hit 343 in the N.L. and 243 in the A.L. . . . 388 were hit off righthanders and 198 off lefthanders.

Vs. N.L. Opponents: Astros (Colts)-11 . . . Braves-54 . . . Cardinals-46 . . . Cubs-54 . . . Dodgers-42 . . . Expos-0 . . . Giants-49 . . . Mets-12 . . . Padres-1 . . . Phillies-38 . . . Pirates-34 . . . Reds-2.

Vs. A.L. Opponents: Angels-14 . . . A's-20 . . . Brewers (Pilots)-14 . . . Indians-25 . . . Orioles-6 . . . Rangers (Senators)-31 . . . Red Sox-37 . . . Royals-15 . . . Tigers-28 . . . Twins-22 . . . White Sox-17 . . . Yankees-14.

33 Parks: Frank holds the major league record for hitting home runs in most ballparks (33), including both regular season and World Series play . . . Hank Aaron is second at 32.

Among those, Crosley Field in Cincinnati (176) and Memorial Stadium in Baltimore (103) rank one-two in frequency . . . There were four stadia in which he played but did not hit a home run: Houston's Astrodome, Montreal's Expos Stadium, Sicks' Stadium in Seattle ('69 only) and Busch Stadium in St. Louis.

In regular season play Frank homered in 32 parks . . . His 33rd was Pittsburgh's Three Rivers in the '71 World Series . . . Aaron homered in 31 parks in regular season but added Yankee Stadium in the '57 World Series.

Grand Slams: Hit a total of seven slams, five of them in the N.L. . . His only two bases loaded homers in the A.L. were hit in successive innings on Aug. 20, '70 at R.F.K. Stadium in Washington off the Senators' Joe Coleman and Joe Grzenda . . . Frank, Jim Gentile, and Jim Northrup are the only ones ever to hit slams in successive plate appearances, though a total of seven have hit two in one game.

2 or More/Game: Hit two or more homers in a game 54 times (ranks 5th in major league history) . . . Hit three in a game for Reds at Crosley Field vs. St. Louis on Aug. 22, '59 . . . Had 16 two-homer games for O's.

HR Odds and Ends: Hit his first at Wrigley Field off the Cubs' Paul Minner on Apr. 28, '56 and his last at Anaheim Stadium on July 6, '76 off the Angels' Sid Monge . . . Hit most off N.L. righthander Larry Jackson (10) . . . Hit the first homer and scored the first run in ALCS history, in game one '69 at Baltimore off the Twin's Jim Perry.

HRS—Orioles: Hit his 500th major league homer in Baltimore in the second game of a two-night doubleheader against the Tigers' left-hander Fred Scherman Sep. 13, '71. At the time, he ranked 11th on the all-time list just behind Harmon Killebrew who had reached

that milestone earlier that year . . . After leaving Baltimore, Frank jumped past Killebrew, Mel Ott, Ernie Banks, Eddie Mathews, Ted Williams, Jimmy Fox and Mickey Mantle.

Frank became the first (and only) player ever to hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium on May 8, '66 (second game) when he blasted a Luis Tiant (Cleveland) offering over the left field stands into the parking lot beyond . . . The drive measured 451' on the fly and rolled to a stop 540' away from the plate (the longest measured hr in Memorial Stadium history was hit by Killebrew 471' on the fly to center off Milt Pappas on May 24, '65).

He set a major league record by hitting ten home runs in the month of April '69, but that mark has since been pushed to 11 by Willie Stargel, Mike Schmidt and Graig Nettles.

Set a club record with 49 homers in '66 . . . Also set marks that year for most homers by an Oriole against one opponent (11 vs. Det.) and most home runs, Memorial Stadium (27).

Last Game as a Player: Frank played in his last game on Sep. 18, '76 at Cleveland vs. Baltimore. He put himself in as pinch-hitter for Frank Duffy in the eighth inning and singled in a run off Rudy May.

All-Star Games: Appeared in 11 all-star games as a player (six with Cincinnati, four with Baltimore and one with California) and served as a coach in '76 while managing for Cleveland . . . Was "MVP" in '71 game at Detroit . . . Hit a two-run homer off Dock Ellis to put A.L. ahead to stay in third inning (Reggie Jackson hit another with one on off Ellis in same inning).

Hit .250 (6-for-24) in all-star play with two home runs . . . Went 3-for-3 for the N.L. in '59 (at L.A. Coliseum) and homered off Early Wynn.

World Series: Hit two key homers in '66 vs. Dodgers, both of Don Drysdale, to win Sport Magazine sports car . . . Hit his first in the opening inning of game one in Dodger Stadium with Russ Snyder aboard (Brooks) followed immediately with another and the O's led 3-0 before the Dodgers batted) . . . O's won the game 5-2 . . . In game four his fourth inning solo provided the only run as the O's completed their sweep behind Dave McNally, 1-0.

In '71, game six vs. Pittsburgh in Baltimore, Frank's base running in the 10th inning allowed the O's to tie the series at three games apiece . . . He drew a one out walk, and despite ailing legs and sore Achilles Tendon, went from first to third on Merv Rettenmund's single up the middle just evading Richie Hebner's tag with a head first slide . . . Then, he scored on Brooks' short sac fly to Vic Davalillo in center.

Cincinnati: Spent ten full years with the Reds after three seasons in their farm system. Was N.L. "Rookie of the Year" in '56 . . . Tied league record for homers by a rookie (38, set by Wally Berger of the Braves), and set a rookie mark by being hit by pitched balls 20 times.

Won Gold Glove in '58 . . . Led the N.L. three straight years in slugging percentage ('60-'61-'62) . . . Won N.L. "MVP" in '61 . . . Set personal career highs in '62 in average (.342), hits(208), doubles(51) and rbi (136) . . . Set N.L. record by leading in hit by pitcher for six straight years ('60 thru '65).

Baltimore: O's won four A.L. pennants and two world championships during his six years in Baltimore.

Won Triple Crown, and "MVP" awards in A.L. and World Series in '66 . . . In addition to leading the league in average (.316), home runs (49) and rbi (122), he also paced the loop in total bases (367) runs (122) and slugging percentage (.637).

Was batting .337 in late June '67 when he sustained serious injury in a second base collision with the White Sox' Al Wels . . . Missed a month and suffered from double vision for a year and a half afterward . . . Though he wound up with a .311 average that year, he slipped to .268 (with 15 homers and 52 rbi) in '68 while still recovering from that injury, compounded by an attack of mumps and a muscle tear in his right shoulder.

He returned to form the following spring and helped lead the O's to three straight pennants in '69, '70 and '71.

Following his trade to the Dodgers in Dec. '71 Frank's uniform #20 was retired. He was the first Oriole player to be so honored . . . In

'77 he and Brooks became the first players to be inducted into the new Orioles Hall of Fame, originated by the Oriole Advocates in cooperation with the ballclub.

Dodgers-Angels: After one year ('72) with the Dodgers, Frank was traded to the Angels with infielders Billy Grabarkewitz and Bobby Valentine, and pitchers Bill Singer and Mike Strahler in deal for infielder Ken McMullen and pitcher Andy Messersmith (Dec. 2, '71).

Personal: One of 11 children . . . Graduated from McClymonds High School (Oakland) . . . Was basketball teammate of Bill Russell and played baseball there with Vada Pinson, Willie Tasby and Charlie Beaman . . . Hobbies: movies and music . . . Attended Xavier University in Cincinnati.

Frank and his wife, the former Barbara Anne Cole, were married Oct. 28, '61 . . . They have two children: Frank Kevin (9/8/62) and Nichelle (8/24/65) . . . Barbara is a real estate agent in the Bel Air area, and Nichelle works for the O's PR department during the summer.

LONG HOME RUNS/MEMORIAL STADIUM

The longest "measured" home run ever hit in Memorial Stadium was a 471' drive by Harmon Killebrew on May 24, 1964 off Milt Pappas over the hedge in left-center field . . . This exceeded by two feet the only other blast that has ever cleared the hedge . . . That was one by Boog Powell 469' to the same area off Boston's Don Schwall on June 22, 1962. Aside from these there have been three balls hit into the hedge (approximately 450'), by Mickey Mantle in 1954, by Powell in 1965 and by Frank Robinson in 1967.

Frank Robinson is the only player to have hit a ball completely out of Memorial Stadium. In the second game of a doubleheader with Cleveland on May 8, 1966, Frank hit a Luis Tiant offering over the left field stands and into the parking lot beyond, a drive that measured 451' on the fly and rolled to a stop 541' away from home plate.

KENNETH (KEN) A. ROWE

Born: Dec. 31, '33; 6'2"; 200; **Batted, R; Threw, R; Position:** P

Birthplace/Residence: Born in Ferndale, Michigan, grew up in nearby Northville (both in Detroit area), but now lives in Atlanta, Georgia.

Tenure: Entered professional baseball as a 19-year-old pitcher in '53 . . . Has been a pitcher, minor league manager, coach and instructor for 29 of last 33 years. This is his 15th season in the Baltimore organization.

Signed Originally with: Detroit Tigers.



O's 4th Pitching Coach: Ken Rowe was promoted from his post as the O's minor league pitching instructor to Orioles Pitching coach when **Ray Miller** was appointed manager of the Minnesota Twins on June 21, '85.

He is only the 4th to hold that position in the Orioles 32 year history in Baltimore. His predecessors: **Harry Brecheen** ('54 thru '67), **George Bamberger** ('68 thru '77) and **Miller** ('78 to '85). Ken played for **Brecheen** in majors, for **Bamberger** in minors (when George was O's minor league pitching instructor), and worked closely with **Miller**.

Pitching Career: Pitched for 15 seasons from '53 thru '85 (excluding '57 when he was serving in the U.S. Army).

Minor Leagues: After his rookie year, he was primarily a starter until '62 when he converted to relief and appeared in 70 games . . . In the last 7 years of his pitching career, he relieved in all but 3 of 365 appearances.

In '64, he set what was then a pro record with 94 appearances including 88 in the Pacific Coast League (16-11 with 19 saves) and 6 with the Orioles.

Spent his first 3 pro seasons in the Detroit system, then was drafted by the Dodgers in Dec. '55. However, he spent most of the next 2 years serving in Germany with the army.

Was chosen to league all star teams 6 times: Sally League ('56-'59), Southern League ('61), Pacific Coast League ('63-'64) and International League ('67) . . . The Orioles purchased his contract from Los Angeles in Sep. '64. Ken was assigned to Rochester in May '65 after starting the year with O's and spent 3 years with Wings . . . Pitched under manager **Earl Weaver** in '66 & '67 (Wings won pennant in '66).

In '68 he began coaching while winding up his pitching career with the O's California League affiliate at Stockton (see "Coaching/Managing" below).

Major Leagues: Spent parts of 3 seasons in the majors with the Dodgers ('63) and Orioles ('64 & '65) and was 2-1 . . . His lone A.L. decision was a win against the Twins on the day he first reported to the O's in '64 (Sep. 14).

He relieved **Milt Pappas** in a tie game in the 9th, retired all 3 batters he faced, then became a winner on **Luis Aparicio's** "sudden death" sac fly in the bottom half. The losing pitcher was **Allan Worthington**.

Ken made big league debut in Sep. '63 and helped Dodgers clinch N.L. pennant.

Coaching/Managing: Ken retired as an active pitcher during the '68 season at Stockton to become manager of the Bluefield Orioles (Rookie Appalachian League), then managed the Aberdeen Pheasants (Class A, Northern League) for the O's from '69 thru '71.

He was out of baseball from '72 thru '74, then returned as a pitching instructor for the Atlanta Braves farm system in '75, an assignment he held thru '78. He joined the Phillies in a comparable position for one season ('79), before returning to the O's in '80 as minor league pitching instructor.

Personal: Played baseball, basketball and football at Northville High School (class of '52) . . . Enjoys hunting, fishing and golf . . . Has two children by a previous marriage: **Kimberly** and **Kristina** . . .


JAMES (JIMMY) B. WILLIAMS

Born: May 15, '26; 5'10"; 180; **Batted, R; Threw, R; Position:** OF

Birthplace/Residence: Born and raised in Toronto, Ontario, but has lived in Pueblo, CO for many years.

Tenure: This is his 40th season in professional baseball and his 9th with the Baltimore organization.

Signed Originally with: Brooklyn (Los Angeles) Dodgers.



Coach: Jimmy was appointed to the coaching staff in January '81 to replace **Frank Robinson**, who resigned to become manager of the San Francisco Giants. He serves as 1st base coach and works with the outfielders and baserunners.

Baltimore Organization: Jimmy became a manager in the O's farm system in '78 and guided clubs to the playoffs in each of his three seasons, including a pair of league championships.

In '80 he led the O's class AA team at Charlotte to the Southern League crown . . . The O's won the Eastern Division first half title but slipped to fourth in the second half before rebounding in the playoffs to beat Savannah, three games to none, and Memphis, three games to one, for the title . . . In '79 Charlotte also won the first half title but was eliminated by Columbus, Ga. in the first round of the playoffs.

The previous year, his first with the Orioles, Jimmy directed class A Miami of the Florida State League to the second half title, knocked off Ft. Myers in a one-game divisional playoff, then erased the Lakeland Tigers in a best of three final to win the pennant.

JIMMY WILLIAMS (Cont.)

Managing/Coaching Background: Jimmy has logged 17 years as a minor league manager in the farm systems of the Dodgers ('63, '64, '76-'77), A's ('65 thru '69), Astros ('70 thru '74) and Orioles and owns over 1100 wins . . . He also spent the '75 season as the third base coach for the Houston Astros on the major league level.

His first of four pennants came in the Florida State League where he managed for A's at Leesburg in '66 . . . That year his club was 50-14 in the first half, fell to fifth in the second half, but came back to beat St. Petersburg in the FSL playoffs . . . That club led organized baseball with 232 stolen bases in 132 games, a FSL record that still stands, while **Allen Lewis** who went on to become **Charlie Finley's** "designated runner" stole 116, also a league mark . . . Jimmy also managed at Leesburg in '67 and put in another FSL campaign with Astros at Cocoa in '72.

Jimmy joined the Houston organization in '70 and won a pennant at Columbus in the Southern League (he also managed Columbus in '74) . . . He has managed at every level but "rookie" including four years at AAA: '69 (Des Moines), '71 (Oklahoma City), '73 (Denver) all in the American Association, and '77 (Albuquerque) of the Pacific Coast League.

He has also managed in: Santa Barbara ('63, California), Grand Forks ('64, Northern), Shelby ('65, Western Carolinas), Newport News ('68, Carolina), and Lodi ('76, California) . . . Served as a player-coach at Omaha (American Association) in '62.

Playing Career: He played for 18 years ('47 thru '64) as an outfielder in the Dodgers' system including occasional appearances in his first two years as a manager . . . He was outstanding in his first professional season in '47, earning "rookie of the year" honors in the Wisconsin State League and batting a composite .367 with three different clubs . . . That year he amassed 163 hits, 27 doubles, 15 triples, 12 homers, 121 rbi and 24 stolen bases in 117 games.

In '49 at Pueblo, he broke a Western league record with 42 stolen bases (in 43 attempts) . . . That mark was later broken by current Orioles' scout and field coordinator **Len Johnston** who swiped 64 at Colorado Springs in '53.

Jimmy never played in the majors but put five seasons at the AAA level ('55 thru '57 at Montreal in the International League) and '58 and '62 in the American Association . . . He hit over .300 in five different seasons.

Personal: Jimmy graduated from DeLaSalle High School in Toronto where he lettered in baseball, hockey, football, and lacrosse . . . He played minor league hockey (right wing) for the old Boston Olympics in the early 1950's and still performs as a defenseman for Pueblo's top semi-pro team in the off-season . . . His other hobbies include golf, tennis, and remodeling homes.

Jimmy and his wife, the former **Lorraine Elliott**, were married Sep. 21, '50 . . . They have two sons, **Chris** (6/10/52) and **Kirk** (11/11/56) and daughter, **Julie** (2/19/61). He was honored as Pueblo's "Sportsman of the Year" for 1983.



Longest Outings: Don worked a season high 4 innings on July 12th and did not yield either a hit or run against the White Sox at Baltimore to save a 10-3 victory for **Ken Dixon**. He fanned 2 and walked 2 in that outing . . . He worked exactly 3 innings on 8 different occasions.

His longest stretch since returning from a 2-year injury sabbatical was 4.1 innings for California on Sep. 25, '84 (his final appearance of that season) at Kansas City.

Orioles Debut: Earned the win on opening day at Baltimore, beating the Rangers' **Dave Rozema**, 4-2, on **Eddie Murray's** 2-run homer in the bottom of the 8th . . . Don had relieved **Storm Davis** in the top of the 8th and yielded the tying run on a **Pete O'Brien** single.

1985 AND MAJOR LEAGUE CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

Arm Injury/Recovery: Went on disabled list June 3, '82 with "muscular strain", but was re-instated June 26 . . . On July 17, however, he came out of a game in Cleveland with a right arm that "felt like it was on fire from the elbow down".

On Oct. 18 Dr. Lewis Yocom performed surgery which included transplantation of a tendon from his left wrist to his right elbow . . . Did not pick up a baseball for the next 9 months, then embarked on a long and gradual program in which he ultimately began throwing on the side and eventually worked up to $\frac{3}{4}$ speed. However, he did not pitch competitively again until spring training of '84.

When he pitched on June 18, '84 vs. the Rangers at Anaheim, it was his first major league regular season appearance in one year 11 months. He started the season on the DL, then went to Redwood in the California League May 10 for "injury rehabilitation". Returned to Angels May 30 and was activated June 13.

His save on July 2nd at Toronto ended a drought of nearly 2 years. His last had been on July 11, '82 vs. New York.

Did not allow a run in his first 4 appearances . . . Never pitched two days in a row during that '84 season . . . Worked his longest stint (4.1 innings) on his last appearance of the year (Sep. 25 at K.C.).

Had one other major injury earlier in his career. Developed tendinitis in right elbow while still in minors during '75 season . . . Condition worsened in '76 (scrubbing Red Sox' plan to promote him) and he did not pitch over the last 2 months.

Relieving/Starting: Was a starting pitcher originally and continued in that role during his 1st and 2nd seasons in the majors . . . Began relieving in 2nd half of '79 season for Angels, but returned to starting rotation the following spring.

Became exclusively a relief pitcher on Aug. 3, '80 (has not started since) . . . As a starter his career figures are: 30-32 with a 4.25 era (559 ip, 264 er) over 91 games.

In relief he has appeared in 168 games, gone 25-15 (.625) with 41 saves and a 3.04 era (ip-316.1, er-107).

When The Days Dwindle Down: Has had notable success pitching in September & October since breaking in with the Red Sox during the stretch run of '77 . . . He went 6-2 after coming up late in July and was 3-1 in September that year.

'85 was no exception. He was 2-1 with 8 saves in 12 appearances in Sep.-Oct. In those 2 months he has most wins (12), fewest losses (4), most saves (12) and lowest era (2.97) lifetime.

Vs. Opponents: Lifetime he is 25-26 with 26 saves and a 4.49 era vs. the **East** with a 4.49 era (ip-427.1, er-213); and 30-21 with 15 saves and a 3.17 era (ip-448.1, er-158) against the **West**. See complete stats vs. each opponent on page 66.

Was 1-6 lifetime vs. the Orioles . . . His only victory, a 6-4 verdict in relief over **Tippy Martinez** on May 1, '82 at Baltimore.

Vs. Boston: Gave up 9 runs over 3.2 innings in back-to-back efforts against the Red Sox June 7 & 9 (including 7 in 0.2 innings on the 9th), but held the Carmines scoreless in 4 other appearances and picked up 3 saves.

Vs. California: The Angels are the only opponent against which he has not recorded a career save . . . He's 2-1 in 4 lifetime appearances.

Vs. Chicago: Was 0-2 in '85 with 2 saves . . . Lifetime he's 1-6 with 5 saves.

Vs. Detroit: Yielded only one earned run and fanned 10 Tigers in 9.2 innings while going 2-0 with 2 saves in 4 games with an 0.93 era.

Vs. Kansas City: Is 6-0 with 2 saves and a 2.37 (ip-76, er-20) era vs. the Royals and has appeared in more games against them (23, one more than against the A's) than vs. any other single opponent.

Vs. Cleveland/Minnesota: Has beaten each a career high 7 times (7-3 vs. Cle. and 7-2 vs. Minny).

Vs. New York: Pitched in 7 games against the Bombers in '85, a high vs. one club, and was 0-2 with a save . . . His 6 saves lifetime are a career high.

California Angels: Was first Orange County native ever to play for the Angels.

Earned 7 of his 8 '84 saves against the A.L. East . . . Was one of only 3 A.L. hurlers to beat the Tigers' Cy Young Award winner **Willie Hernandez** . . . Suffered only loss to Boston's **Bob Stanley**. Won his last 4 decisions.

In '82 before he was beset by elbow injury, he jumped off to a 3-0 record with 2 saves and an 0.67 era (ip-27, er-2) in 10 games. Despite the abbreviated '81 season, Don set a career high (since surpassed) of 11 saves.

In both '79 and '80 he opened the season as a starter and moved to the bullpen in the 2nd half . . . Was 8-9 as a starter in '79 and only modestly successful in relief (1-1, 1 sv, 6.30 era).

In '80, however, after going 5-13 with a 4.90 era as a starter, he was 3-0 with 2 saves and an era of 2.08 in 19 relief appearances . . . That success precipitated his permanent assignment to the bullpen.

Was Angels' lone winner in '79 ALCS vs. O's . . . Beat Don Stanhouse in game 3 at Anaheim . . . Held O's to one run in last 3 innings, but was behind 3-2 until Angels rallied for 2 runs in bottom of 9th.

In '78, his first year with California, he was 8-8 thru August, then went 3-0 in September. That effort gave him a 6-1 Sep.-Oct. record after less than 2 full seasons in the majors.

Boston Red Sox: Was called up to the Red Sox July 26, '77 (from Pawtucket) in the midst of a pennant race and went 6-2 the rest of the way, all as a starter.

His first 2 big league efforts were highly notable . . . In his debut on July 26, '77, the day he joined the Sox, he fanned 11 Brewers (still a career high) enroute to a 4-3 complete game win . . . The next time out, July 31, he pitched a 3-hit 1-0 shutout against the Angels in his native Orange County.

Minor League: Signed by Red Sox scout Joe Stephenstone at age of 17 . . . In his first 2 pro seasons, led his league both times in losses: 0-10 in '72 New York-Penn League, and 12-15 in Florida State League the following year . . . Was 12-25 after 2 pro campaigns.

That all changed dramatically in '74 at Winston-Salem where he was the Carolina League's "pitcher of the year" while leading the loop in wins (17), era (2.43), starts (30), complete games (18) and innings (230).

By '76 the Red Sox expected to bring him up to the big club mid-season, but arm trouble set in, delaying his promotion until '77.



Vs. Texas: Has hit .378 (74-28) vs. the Rangers beginning Sep. 24, '82, including .412 (34-14) in '85.

Vs. Lefthanders: Topped the Angels in hitting vs. lefthanders for the 3rd straight season with a .355 (169-60) mark . . . Batted .366 (161-59) vs. lefties in '84 and .319 (144-46) in '83.

Lifetime (excluding '76-'78) has a .317 (1137-360) average against southpaws and a .250 (1483-371) mark vs. righthanders.



THE 1985 SEASON

Mike's 3rd full season in the majors was a disappointment. His 17 losses were the most by an Oriole since **Dave McNally** posted a 17-17 mark in '73 ... Only 3 others lost as many in the A.L. last year (1978, 1979, 1980). **Danny Darwinn**, Milwaukee, 18; **Neal Heaton**, Cleveland, 17.

Tendinitis in left knee bothered him in his final 4 starts (all losses) and forced him to sit out the final 2½ weeks of the season.

Though he missed 3 or 4 starts, still led the club in complete games (9), shutouts (2) and strikeouts (135) and was 2nd in starts (32) and innings pitched (203.1) ... Issued a club-high 89 walks, 10th most in league.

MIKE BODDICKER (Cont.)

Averaged 3.94 walks per 9 innings, 9th highest mark among A.L. starters (min. 20 starts) . . . Had averaged 2.72 walks during '83 and '84 combined . . . Opponents batted .286 against him, 8th highest mark among A.L. starters . . . Limited opposing batters to a .225 average in previous 2 seasons . . . Led majors in '84 with 7.2 innings per start, but averaged just 6.1 in '85.

Hot Start: Began the season 6-1 (2.98 era, 54.1 ip, 18 er) after 1st 8 starts, giving him 16-4 record in his last 20 starts dating back to July 23, '84 . . . Beat Chicago, Texas and Minnesota twice each for his 6 wins . . . Split 1st 2 decisions then won 5 straight.

Broke string with 3-2 loss at Oakland on May 21 when he walked in the winning run with the bases loaded and two out in the 10th inning, the 1st of 5 straight losses (longest such streak of career).

Strange Turnaround: Following win streak went 6-16 (4.47 era, 149 ip, 74 er) in 24 starts the rest of the season . . . Failed to complete the 4th inning in 7 of those 24 starts and gave up 5 or more runs on 9 occasions.

Snapped 5-game losing streak with 9-1 win vs. Milwaukee on June 16 and won 2 of his next 3 decisions giving him 9-7 record . . . Was 3-10 (4.00 era, 87.2 ip, 39 er) in his last 14 starts including season ending 4-game losing streak.

By-Month: April (3-1, 3.09, 5 g) . . . May (3-2, 3.71, 5 g) . . . June (2-4, 5.24, 7 g) . . . July (2-4, 3.76, 6 g) . . . Aug. (2-2, 4.30, 5 g) . . . Sep.-Oct. (0-4, 3.97, 4 g).

Miscellaneous: Lost 4 one-run games and 4 2-run games . . . O's were 13-19 in his 32 starts . . . Was 7-8 on the road (4.77 era, 100 ip, 53 er) and 5-9 (3.40 era, 103.1 ip, 39 er) at home . . . Pinch ran in 2 games and scored a key run in 9th inning of 7-5 win vs. Angels (June 3).

1985 AND CAREER

Wins: Experienced the 1st losing season of his 8-year pro career in '85 . . . Despite winning only 12 games, has won 48 during the past 3 seasons ('83-'85), 5th in majors during that period behind **Jack Morris** (55), **Ron Guidry** (53), **Dan Petry** (52), and **Lamar Hoyt** (52).

Was the A.L.'s only 20-game winner in '84 and one of only 3 in the majors (**Joaquin Andujar** and **Rick Sutcliffe**, who won 4 with the Indians and 16 with the Cubs, also won 20 games) . . . Is the only Oriole to win 20 since **Steve Stone** (25) and **Scott McGregor** (20) both did it in '80.

Complete Games: Led Orioles with 9 complete games and has now thrown 35 in career, already ranking him 10th on O's all-time list . . . Has thrown all 35 complete games in the last 3 seasons ('83-'85) tying him with **Fernando Valenzuela** for 6th in the major during that span . . . Ranks behind **Jack Morris** and **Charlie Hough** (42), **Bert Blyleven** (41), **Mario Soto** (40), **Ron Guidry** (37).

Completed 43% of his starts (26 of 61) prior to '85 . . . Completed only 28% (9-32) in '85 . . . Was 2nd in the majors with 17 in '84.

Shutouts: His 2 shutouts led the O's staff . . . Shut out Boston, 3-0 on 8 hits at Fenway on June 30 . . . Also blanked Seattle on 5 hits, 7-0, at Memorial Stadium on Aug. 29, his last win of '85 . . . Twice lost shutouts in the 9th . . . In 9-1 win over Milwaukee gave up lone run with 2 outs in 9th inning . . . Took 1-0 lead into 9th vs. Minnesota, but lost 2-1.

Has thrown 11 since the beginning of '83, tying him with **Valenzuela** and **Dwight Gooden** for 2nd in the majors during that period behind **John Tudor** (13). Tied for 8th on O's all-time list with **Tom Phoebus** . . . 2nd in the majors in '84 with 4.

Vs. Opponents: Was 2-10 (5.79 era, 84 ip, 54 er) vs. the A.L. East and 10-7 (2.87 era, 119.1 ip, 38 er) against the West . . . Went 11-4 vs. the East in '84 . . . Entered '85 with a 12-8 combined record vs. New York, Detroit, Boston and Toronto, but lost 8 of 9 decisions to that group last season . . . Lifetime is 28-16 vs. the West and 21-21 vs. the East.

Vs. California: Has found either feast or famine vs. the Angels . . . Only '85 start came in Anaheim where he suffered 10- defeat . . . In 4 career starts there is 1-3 with a 7.04 era (23 ip, 21 r, 18 er, 10 hrs) . . . In 3 starts vs. the Angels at Memorial Stadium is 3-0 with a 1.33 era (37 ip, 4 r, 4 er, 0 hrs, 3 cg's).

Vs. Chicago: Lost to the White Sox and **Tom Seaver** 5-3 on July 14, his 1st loss in 7 career decisions vs. the Pale Hose, including a 5-0 win in game #2 of the '83 ALCS.

Vs. Minnesota: After going 0-3 against the Twins in '84, he captured half of the O's wins against the Twins in '85 winning 3 of 4 decisions against them . . . A 2-run homer in 9th by **Tom Brunansky** gave him 2-1 defeat on July 10. Has thrown more innings vs. the Twins than against any one opponent (76.2) . . . His 3-1 career record in the Metrodome is the best among O's starters.

Vs. Oakland: Had a 2.36 era vs. the A's in '85, but was 1-3 losing all 3 games by a total of 4 runs . . . Held Oakland to .235 (119-28) team batting mark.

Vs. Seattle: Owns career-low 0.57 era (31.1 ip, 2 er) vs. Mariners . . . Has shut out the Mariners in his only 2 starts at home against them . . . Has yet to give up a home run to Seattle and has not allowed an earned run against them in his last 18 innings . . . Has held Mariners to .167 (108-18) team batting average.

Vs. Texas: Has a 6-0 lifetime mark vs. the Rangers, most wins against one opponent. The Orioles have won all 7 games he has started against Texas . . . Has given up 2 runs or less in 5 of those 7 starts . . . Had a 6-0 lead over Rangers on Aug. 18 at Baltimore, but game was rained out in the O's 3rd inning.

Era: In each of his first 2 seasons, his era had been over 4.00 after May 1st for a combined total of just 7 days, but in '85 his era was over that figure the entire 2nd half of the season (from July 14) . . . ERA reached high point of 4.51 on June 25.

In '84, his 2.79 era (261.1 ip, 81 er) edged Toronto's **Dave Steib** (2.83) for the A.L. crown . . . Became the 3rd Oriole to win the era title (Jim Palmer did it in '73 (2.40) and '75 (2.09) and Hoyt Wilhelm was 1st in '59 (2.19)).

In '83, his 2.77 era (179 ip, 55 er) was 2nd lowest in the A.L. to **Rick Honeycutt's** 2.42 . . . Though **Honeycutt** was traded by the Texas Rangers to the Los Angeles Dodgers on Aug. 19, he pitched more than the minimum qualifying standard of 162 innings and won the title.

PREVIOUS CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

1984: Became the first Oriole to win the era crown and lead the A.L. in victories outright in the same season . . . Received 3 first place votes for BBWAA's A.L. Cy Young award. Totaled 41 points in the voting (5-3-1) to finish behind Detroit's **Willie Hernandez** (88), Kansas City's **Dan Quisenberry** (71) and Cleveland's **Bert Blyleven** (45).

Finished 5th in majors in innings pitched with a career-high 261.1 innings, was 2nd in complete games and tied for 2nd in shutouts.

Named as the righthanded pitcher on the A.L. all-star teams selected by TSN and UPI . . . Selected for all-star game, but did not pitch . . . Twice selected A.L. "player of the week" and named the league's "pitcher of the month" in May.

After losing all 3 decisions in April (4.23 era), was 20-8 (233 ip, 68 er, 2.61) the rest of the season . . . Led O's in strikeouts (128) . . . Tied with **Mike Flanagan** for most starts (34).

In May, he posted a 6-1 record and a 1.72 era (57.2 ip, 11 er) and was named A.L. "pitcher of the month" . . . Was 10-4 from May 1 to the all-star break . . . Had a loss and a no decision in first 2 starts after the all-star break and then won career-high 6 straight.

Won 10 of his final 13 starts and completed his last 5 starts . . . Gained his 20th win in 1st and only attempt in last start of season of Sep. 29 at Boston.

Allowed 2 runs or less in 20 of his 34 starts . . . Pitched at least 7.1 innings in all 15 starts after the all-star break . . . In his last 30 starts, failed to reach the 8th inning only 4 times.

MIKE BODDICKER (Cont.)

1983: Began season in Rochester, but joined O's in May when injuries hit staff (came up when **Jim Palmer** went on DL) . . . Shut out Chicago on 5 hits in 2nd game of doubleheader on May 17 . . . only his 2nd major league start . . . Became regular from then on as **Mike Flanagan** missed next 3 months with knee injury suffered in the opener of that doubleheader.

Went on to a 16-8 record, most wins for a rookie that season . . . Was 12-4 in final 17 regular season starts . . . Second on team in victories, complete games (10) and strikeouts (120) . . . Led A.L. in shutouts (5).

Selected A.L.'s "rookie of the year" by The Sporting News . . . Named as the righthanded pitcher on the Topps Major League all-rookie team.

Exceled in post season . . . Became the 1st rookie in LCS history to pitch a shutout . . . Blanked Chicago on 5 hits, 4-0, in game #2 at Baltimore, bringing O's back from one game deficit . . . Fanned career-high 14 batters tying the LCS record previously accomplished by Detroit's **Joe Coleman** in '72 and **John Candelaria** of Pittsburgh in '75 . . . Named '83 ALCS "most valuable player" . . . First pitcher to be so honored.

Again brought O's back from 1-0 deficit with a 4-hit, 3-1 victory over Philadelphia in game #2 of World Series on Oct. 12 at Baltimore . . . Allowed only an unearned run, struck out 6 and walked none.

At the time of his recall, was 3-1 at Rochester with a 1.90 era in 4 starts . . . Was one of the O's final cuts in spring training after being hampered by sprained ankle.

1982: Mike was recalled from Rochester on July 29 and pitched 7 times in relief over the last 2 months . . . Earned his 1st major league victory against New York on Sep. 13, allowing one run in 3 innings.

After a slow start at Rochester, was 8-1 in his last 12 starts . . . Was leading the Wings in most pitching categories at the time of his recall.

Drove in game-winning runs with 2-run pinch double to beat Toledo on June 26 in 1st professional at bat . . . Mike was forced to hit when Rochester manager **Lance Nichols** had to put his designated hitter **Tim Derryberry** into the game defensively. The Wings had no position players remaining so Mike batted for pitcher **Nate Snell** with 2 out in the bottom of the 9th and Rochester trailing, 4-3.

1981: Mike led the Rochester staff in starts (29), shutouts (3) and strikeouts (109) . . . Was recalled by Baltimore on Sep. 10 and pitched twice in relief over the final 6 days of the season.

1980: Finished 2nd in the I.L. with a 2.18 era and tied for 2nd with 13 complete games . . . Was the circuit's top control pitcher with lowest ratio of walks per 9 innings pitched (1.66) and best figure of innings pitched (190) to base runners (hits-149, walks-35, hit by pitch-4) with a "minus 2" . . . 



Beat Seattle on 3-hitter, 6-0 on Aug. 30, retiring the first 17 batters, then took 3-hr shutout into 9th vs. Oakland on Sep. 4, but yielded homer to **Bruce Bochte** and settled for 6-1 win.



1985 SEASON SUMMARY

For the 2nd straight year Rick set a career high in home runs (12) and also set a personal standard for rbi (52) . . . Has hit 20 home runs in his last 167 games starting Aug. 17, '84.

He enjoyed the most productive month of his career in April (17 rbi along with a .305 average in 19 games) and also threw out 9 of the first 14 runners trying to steal on him. That month included several big days including his 3rd career 2-homer game, at Cleveland on Apr. 18 (off Bert Blyleven and Jamie Easterly).

His late-season low was .231 (186-43) on July 3rd and his high was .259 on September 16 (324-84).

He caught 131 games and has now logged 1,101 games behind the plate for the O's. He ranks well ahead of Gus Triandos (784) whose record he surpassed in '83 . . . In '85 he committed only 2 passed balls and made 8 errors in 632 chances for a .987 average.

Rick hit .321 for the year against lefthanded pitching (156-50), and hit for a slightly higher average (.255) in the first half than in the second, an unusual occurrence (see "1st Half/2nd Half" below for details).

1985 AND CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

Eraser Rate: Despite a .262 (sb-76, cs-27) percentage against base-stealers in '85, Rick has an Orioles career percentage of .389 (sb-461, cs-294), and has picked off an additional 19 runners. For comparison's sake, since Rick became an Oriole, the league average vs. the stolen base has been .364 (sb-13,734; cs-7,852).

He tossed out 9 of 14 runners attempting to steal from opening day thru April 28.

In post-season play, he has tossed out 6 of 11 base-stealers... Threw out the first 9 base-stealers to run against him in '82 and in spring training that year nailed 10 in a row at one stretch... Is the only catcher ever to nip **Julio Cruz** twice in one game, on Sep. 1, '82 (with **Steve Stone** pitching).

Threw out 4 Angels in one game on May 12, '77 at Anaheim (**Bobby Grich**, **Gil Flores**, **Jerry Remy** and **Don Baylor**) and has gunned down 3 in one game 7 times (most recently July 8, '83 Seattle—**Spike Owen** twice and **Dave Henderson**).

Catching: Has a career fielding percentage of .987 in the A.L. (TC-6,001, E-74) and .988 (TC-5,554, E-61) for the O's... Has twice led the league's backstops in percentage: '81 (.998, 1 error in 428 chances) and '83 (.997, 2 errors in 658 chances).

He has made only 41 passed balls lifetime, 38 with the Orioles... To put that into perspective, **J.C. Martin** of the '65 White Sox had 33 in just one season.

Vs. LHP/RHP: His .321 (156-50) average vs. lefthanders was 117 points better than the .204 (206-42) he batted against righthanders... He hit 7 of his 12 home runs off lefthanded pitching.

Lifetime, the difference is not so desperate: **vs. lefthanders**—.266 (1169-311) and **vs. righthanders**—.232 (2069-479)... He's hit 30 homers against lefthanders and 32 vs. righthanders.

Over the last 2 seasons, Rick has batted .307 (241-74) off left-handed pitching... In the 10 years he's been with the O's, he has had a higher average against southpaws 6 times.

1st Half/2nd Half: Since joining the O's Rick has batted .254 (1516-385) after the All-Star game and .227 (1775-403) prior... In '85 he hit .255 (212-54) in the first half and .253 (150-38) in the 2nd.

However, he was a more consistent 2nd half hitter. After batting .305 in April he hit only .198 (121-24) over the next two months, whereas, after batting .295 in July, he hit a much more respectable .264 (121-32) from August thru the balance of the season.

He has had a better 2nd half average in 7 of his 10 seasons in a Baltimore uniform. The biggest difference was in '82 when he hit .304 (158-48) after the break compared to only .215 (186-40) in the early part of the season.

Vs. Opponents: Batted .371 (35-13) against the Rangers, his seasonal high. His lowest average (.136, 22-3) was against the Angels, against whom he had batted .423 (26-11) with 4 home runs the year before... He was most productive vs. the Indians against whom he hit 4 home runs and drove in 10 in 13 games while batting .317 (41-13).

Despite a .143 (21-3) '85 average vs. the Twins, Rick's .283 lifetime mark (240-68) against the club that originally signed him and brought him to the majors is his highest vs. a single opponent.

He has hit a high of 8 career homers against the Red Sox, Angels and Indians... Outside of Baltimore he has hit most home runs in Fenway Park, Boston (5)... His rbi high is 37 lifetime vs. California.

Post-Season: Has career post-season average of .304 (17-36) in 19 games (7 ALCS & 12 WS)... Has appeared in 19 of O's 20 post-season games during his tenure in Baltimore.

Was unanimous '83 WS "mvp" ... His 5 hits were all for extra bases (4 doubles and a homer), a 5-game WS record, and batted .385 (5-for-13) ... Was awarded a Pontiac Trans Am from **SPORT Magazine**.

Had gwrbi double off **Charlie Hudson** in game 2, contributed 2 doubles in game 3, then homered (off Hudson again) and doubled in decisive game 5. Also threw out **Joe Morgan** twice in 3 tries trying to steal (no other Phillie attempted to run) ... Started all 5 games (also started all 4 ALCS games in '83).

Batted .400 (4-for-10) vs. Angels in 4 game '79 ALCS.



THE 1985 SEASON

Missed the entire first half of '85 after suffering his 2nd major injury in the past 3 seasons . . . Tore left Achilles Tendon in January while playing basketball . . . Was feared lost for the season, but quick recovery allowed him to start the O's 2nd game after all-star break (for further details see below under "Injury")

Although he experienced his first losing record since his rookie season ('76), has not had a losing *full* season in the majors.

Was activated on July 20 and started at home that day vs. Kansas City . . . Lost 7-5, in 3 inning effort (5 h, 5 r-er, 2 bb, 2 so).

Went 8 innings in each of next 2 starts, equalling his longest outings of year . . . Won at Chicago, 5-1, on July 25 (3 h, 1 bb, 3 so), his first win since Sep. 20, '84, and took no decision vs. Toronto on July 30 (4 h, 1 bb, 2 so).

Struggled in all 6 starts during August losing 3 of 4 decisions (7.12, 30.1 ip, 24 er) . . . A 6-0 loss to Seattle on Aug. 31, left him 2-4 with a 5.84 era (49.1 ip, 32 er) after 9 starts.

Returned to form in September going 2-1 (3.09, 35 ip, 12 er) in 5 starts that month . . . Highlight was 4-2 win over New York and teammate **Rich Bordi** on Sep. 20, the Orioles only win over the Yankees in '85.

Lone loss in September was 3-0 defeat at Milwaukee on Sep. 25, his only complete game of the season and first since Sep. 10, '84 . . . In 2 other starts that month he left late in game with 2-run leads, but failed to get win either time when O's relievers failed (3-1 lead vs. California on Sep. 8 and 4-2 lead at New York on Sep. 30).

Injury/Rehabilitation: Tore Achilles Tendon while playing in charity basketball game with O's team on Jan. 23 in Laurel, MD . . . Underwent surgery the next day . . . Cast was not removed until April 2 . . . Began running in June and threw batting practice for first time on June 19.

Assigned to Hagerstown for rehabilitation and pitched in one game on July 10 . . . Threw 6 shutout innings vs. Kinston, allowing only one hit (4 so, 4 bb).

For details on other injuries in career, see below under "Previous Injuries".

Miscellaneous: Fanned a season-high 9 batters at New York on Sep. 30 in no decision . . . O's were 7-8 in his 15 starts . . . Nearly half of his runs allowed (23 of 49) resulted from home runs . . . He was charged with 14 homers in 86 innings.

Was 3-1 (4.56, 49.1 ip, 25 er) vs. the Eastern Division and 1-4 (5.89, 36.1 ip, 24 er) against the West.

1985 AND MAJOR LEAGUE CAREER

Winning Workhorse: Despite missing the first half of '85, has still made more starts (272) than any other A.L. hurler since he became a regular starter for the O's at the start of '77 (**Ron Guidry** is 2nd with 265).

During those 9 years, has logged 1,822.2 innings, bettered by only 2 other A.L. pitchers: **Guidry** (1,994.2) and **Jack Morris** (1855.1) . . . **Scott McGregor** is next on the list with 1,820.2 innings . . . Flann's 126 wins during that period are 2nd to **Guidry's** 154 and just ahead of **McGregor's** 125.

O's All-Time List: Ranks 4th on O's all-time win list (129) behind **Jim Palmer** (268), **Dave McNally** (181), and **Mike Cuellar** (143), just ahead of **Scott McGregor** (125).

Is 3rd in strikeouts (1,079) behind **Palmer** (2,212) and **McNally** (1,476) . . . Is 4th in complete games (92) and innings (1,918).

Needs one game to become only the 8th pitcher to appear in 300 or more games in an Oriole uniform.

ALCS/WS: Has 3-1 record in 6 post-season games with a 3.48 era over 31 innings.

Won game 3 vs. White Sox in '83, beating **Richard Dotson** by a final count of 11-1. That was game in which **Mike** hit **Ron Kittle** in the knee, and **Dotson** retaliated by hitting **Cal Ripken** and throwing at **Eddie Murray**, a tactic that resulted in a 2-run O's 5th inning which gave Birds commanding 6-1 lead.

Started against **Steve Carlton** in '84 WS #3 at Philly but left after 4, trailing 2-0 . . . **Palmer** ultimately picked up the 3-2 win in game featuring 3 former Cy Young Award winners.

Won 2nd game of '79 ALCS vs. Angels after O's staked him to 9-1 lead thru 3 innings . . . Was still leading 9-4 but was in trouble when **Don Stanhouse** relieved him in 8th and O's barely won, 9-8.

In WS vs. Pirates, **Mike** won opener, 5-4, after being staked to 5-0 lead in 1st . . . Lost game 5 at Pittsburgh though he trailed only 2-1 when he left for pinch-hitter. Pirates went on to win 7-1 . . . Was one of 5 relievers to pitch in 9th inning of 7th game won by Bucs, 4-1.

Cy Young/Other Awards: After going 23-9 in '79, was landslide winner of BBWAA award, capturing 26 1sts and 2 2nd among 28 ballots cast for a total of 136 points (5-3-1) . . . Was only one named on all ballots and was well ahead of Yankee lefties **Tommy John** (1 first, 51 points) and **Ron Guidry** (1 first, 26 points).

That was one of 6 Cy's won by O's in 12 year period from '69 thru '80 . . . See list under "Awards" on page 24.

That year also he was named A.L. "pitcher of the year" by TSN and was picked as top southpaw on TSN, AP & UPI All-Star Teams . . . Was 6th in "mvp" balloting (highest ranking pitcher) and was named "graduate of the year" by both Junior American Legion and Babe Ruth programs.

Pickoffs/Caught Stealing: Picked 2 runners off base (including those scored as caught stealing) . . . Now has a career total of 57 pickoffs, an Orioles record . . . In his 9 years in the O's regular rotation, opposing runners have had less than an even chance to steal a base on him . . . A total of 67 have made it, but 68 haven't.

Home and Away: Has a .676 (73-35) lifetime record at home, but is only 56-57 (.496) on the road . . . Owns a winning record in only four enemy ballparks - Minnesota HHH (3-2), Oakland (10-1), Yankee Stadium (7-4) and Toronto (5-4).

His era is 4.18 (950.1 ip, 441 er) on the road, and 3.44 (967.2 ip, 370 er) at home.

By-Month Lifetime: April: 13-15; May: 23-10; June: 22-17; July: 17-16; Aug.: 24-17; Sep.: 28-16; Oct.: 2-1.

Vs. Opponents: Has a losing lifetime record against only 3 clubs: California (3-7), Kansas City (9-13), and Milwaukee (8-10) . . . Was 3-1 in '85 vs. the East (4.56 era, 49.1 ip, 25 er) in '85 and 1-4 (5.89 era, 36.2 ip, 24 er) against the West . . . Lifetime he is 64-46 (.582) vs. the East and 65-46 (.586) vs. the West. See page 67 for '85 and lifetime stats vs. each opponent.

Vs. Detroit: Although he failed to survive the 2nd inning in no decision against the Tigers in his last start on Oct. 5, has won 4 of his last 5 decisions against them over 6 starts while tossing 4 complete games.

Vs. Milwaukee: At one time owned a 6-3 record against the Brewers, but has lost 7 of his last 9 decisions to them beginning in '80.

Vs. Minnesota: Did not pitch against the Twins in '85 and was 1-2 against them the previous season, but has a 15-4 lifetime mark, best against a single opponent . . . Won 14 straight against the Twins from May 29, '77 to Apr. 7, '84.

Vs. New York: Earned the O's only victory against the Yankees in '85 and was the club's most effective pitcher against the Bronx Bombers (2.51 era, 14.1 ip, 4 er) in 2 starts . . . Has now defeated them 6 straight times over his last 9 starts . . . Hasn't lost to them since **Tommy John** beat him at Memorial Stadium, 4-3, on Aug. 15, '80.

Immediately prior to win streak had lost 5 straight and before that had won 5 straight . . . Lifetime is 12-7 against New York.

Vs. Oakland: Suffered first loss ever at the Oakland Coliseum, 10-4, on Aug. 25 in only '85 appearance against the A's . . . Has a 10-1 lifetime record there and a 2.22 era (101.1 ip, 71 h, 25 er) while completing 6 of 14 starts . . . Overall is 15-5 against the A's.

Vs. Toronto: Has not beaten Toronto since 8-3 win at home on Aug. 25, '82 and is 0-2 in 4 starts since . . . However, his lifetime era of 2.73 (181 ip, 55 er) is his lowest against an opponent and his 15-6 record is bettered only by his marks against Minnesota and Oakland . . . He's 10-2 lifetime against Toronto at Memorial Stadium.

Previous Injuries: In '78, was plagued thru 2nd half of season with painful bursitis in left ankle which severely hampered his efficiency.

In '80, though he missed no time, his performance was diminished by a sore left shoulder that developed in late June. After that season the problem was diagnosed as "tired arm" by **Dr. Stanley Cohen** of Baltimore and **Dr. Arthur Pappas**, the Red Sox physician. They prescribed a continuing physical therapy and weight program.

His string of 157 straight starts without missing a turn ended late in '81 when he tore a muscle in his left forearm Aug. 23 . . . Didn't pitch for 26 days . . . Hadn't missed an assignment in more than 4 years (since '77), but had begun feeling stiffness as early May 14 that year ('81).

On May 17, '83 sustained ligament damage to left knee while fielding a ground ball in first inning vs. Chicago. He apparently twisted knee after catching spikes in the ground . . . Did not require surgery, but missed 11½ weeks, returning to active status Aug. 7 . . . Continued to wear brace on knee while pitching until discarding it on May 20, '84.

Scant Support: The O's averaged 5.1 runs per game in '85, but scored an average of only 4.0 runs in Flannery's 15 starts, the lowest average among the O's starters.

In '84, the Birds scored 3 or fewer runs in 18 of 34 starts (including 2 or fewer 12 times).

Near No-Hitter—'78: Is one of 8 Oriole pitchers over the past 32 years deprived of a no-hitter in the 9th inning . . . On Sep. 26, '78 in Baltimore he had 2 down in 9th when Cleveland's **Gary Alexander** homered into the low rows of the rightfield seats. He then gave up 2 singles before **Don Stanhouse** came on to preserve the victory.

The other victims: **Bob Turley**—'54, **Donn Ferrarese**—'56, **Dave McNally** and **Mike Cuellar**—both '69, **Jim Palmer**—'73, **Wayne Garland**—'74 and **Storm Davis**—'83.

1-0 Games: Had never been involved in a 1-0 game until '84 when he picked up a pair of wins by that score: vs. Seattle's **Gaylord Perry** May 11 and against Minnesota (**Frank Viola**) Sep. 2 at Minny with 9th inning help from **Tim Stoddard**. That was first 1-0 game in Metrodome history.

ORIOLES CAREER HIGHLIGHTS BY YEAR

1984: Was 8-5 thru June 28, then lost 6 of next 7 decisions thru Aug. 4, including a career-high 5 in a row (July 14 thru Aug. 4) . . . After that was 4-2 in his final 10 starts.

Was nearly invincible against the World Champion Tigers . . . In 4 starts against the Tigers, was 3-1 with 4 complete games and a 0.51 era (35 ip, 25 h, 2 er) . . . Gave up first grand slam of career to **Jim Presley** at Seattle on Aug. 31.

Was 1-1 in 3 starts in the Orioles' fall tour of Japan . . . In first start, blanked the Japan champion Hiroshima Carp for 5 innings and was the ultimate winner, 5-2.

1983: Jumped off to fastest start ever, going 6-0 in 1st 8 starts with a 2.73 era (52.2 ip, 16 er) . . . It was best beginning for an Oriole since **Dave McNally** went 15-0 to open '69 season.

Included in that stretch were 3 complete games including a 1-0 shutout vs. Seattle (**G. Perry**) for win #6 on May 11.

On his next start, May 17, (1st game) vs. Chicago at Baltimore, he severely injured ligaments in left knee fielding ground ball (see "Previous Injuries" above) in 1st inning and was sidelined for 11½ weeks.

Re-activated Aug. 7 and lost his first 2 starts, both to Chicago's **Lamarr Hoyt** before beating Texas on Aug. 27 for his 1st win in 14 weeks. From Aug. 28 thru Sep. 17, reeled off 5 straight wins in 5 starts and was 6-1 during O's stretch run from Aug. 13 thru Sep. 25 during which Birds were 34.10

1982: Was only 8-10 on Aug. 13, but won 7 of last 8 including 7 in a row (from Aug. 17 thru Sep. 19) . . . His final win of year (Sep. 19) vs. Indians was his 100th career victory.

1980-81: Both seasons were marred by arm trouble (See "Injuries" above). His combined figures for those 2 seasons which followed his Cy Young year were 25-19 and a 4.14 era . . . Despite his problems in '80 was 12-8 as late as Aug. 6, and he tied **Steve Stone** for 2nd with 37 starts behind **Dennis Leonard** (38).

1979: Won Cy Young after leading majors with 23 wins and tying for most shutouts (5, with 5 others) . . . Was 10-6 with a 4.05 era on July 7, then went 13-3 in last 18 starts with a 2.22 era and 10 complete games.

From Aug. 8 thru Sep. 13, won 8 in a row in 8 starts . . . Credited much of his success to development of a change-up taught him by **Scott McGregor**.

1978: Was 11-4 thru June 22 and had gone 24-6 since the previous June 27 . . . Was hampered rest of season by tendinitis in left ankle and went just 8-11 thereafter . . . Lost bid for a 20 win season when Tigers beat him on final day of season.

Had distinction of being one of only 3 pitchers to beat Yankees' **Ron Guidry** (25-3) along with fellow lefties and "Mikes" **Willis** (Tor.) and **Caldwell** (Mil.) . . . Was on A.L. All-Star staff but did not pitch in game at San Diego.

1977: Started the season 2-8, but from June 27 to end, won 13 of 15, including last 6 straight.

1975-76: Made big league debut Sep. 5, '75 at home vs. Yankees with no decision, then started for 1st time Sep. 28 at Shea Stadium losing that final game of season 3-2, to **Larry Gura**.

Started '76 with O's but was 0-3 in 10 appearances when he returned to Rochester July 2 . . . Came back to Baltimore Aug. 11 after going 6-1 for Red Wings, but dropped his 1st decision . . . Was 0-5 lifetime when he broke into win column with 6-hit, 7-1 victory over Royals Sep. 1, '76.

MINOR LEAGUE/AMATEUR CAREERS

Minors: Was 35-16 in 3 plus minor league seasons and 19-5 in 1½ years at Rochester . . . Was chosen as International League's top lefty in '75 (**Scott McGregor** earned that distinction in '76).

Signing: Was Baltimore's 7th pick in June '73 draft . . . Probably would have been picked on earlier round except for elbow problems that developed originally in high school . . . Was signed by **John Stokoe** who was convinced his arm was sound again.

Was drafted in '71 by Houston but opted to go to U. of Massachusetts (at Amherst).

College: Was 12-1 in 2 years at U. of Mass., and led Yankee Conference in wins (9), strikeouts (89) and era (1.72) as a sophomore . . . That year ('73) in one game, he hit 3 homers, fanned 15 and pitched a 1-hitter against U. of Maine in a regional tournament . . . Played outfield while not pitching.

Was a starting guard on U. of Mass. freshman basketball team that went 18-1 . . . Once played against **Julius Erving** in a frosh-varisty scrimmage.

High School/Other: Played 4 years of baseball and basketball at Memorial High in Manchester (graduated '71) . . . The school won 2 state titles in each sport while he was there.

The **Joneses** have developed an international reputation over more than 40 years of practicing, teaching and conducting gynecological research . . . Much of that time they spent at Johns Hopkins Hospital.







BIRDS' FIRST GAME IN BALTIMORE IN '54

The modern American League Orioles made their Baltimore debut in Memorial Stadium on Apr. 15, 1954 before a crowd of 46,354 including Vice President Richard M. Nixon who threw out the first ball. Behind the seven hit pitching of Bob Turley who fanned nine, the Orioles of Jimmy Dykes defeated Paul Richards' White Sox, 3-1, in Baltimore's first American League game in 52 years. Chico Carrasquel, the Chicago shortstop, was the first to bat in the new stadium and singled off Turley.

Clint Courtney won the distinction of hitting the first home run in the brand new stadium (built on the site of the previous municipally owned ballpark used by the International League O's). It was a bases empty blast off Virgil Trucks who also yielded a solo homer to Vern Stephens in the fourth and was the losing pitcher.

The Birds' starting lineup in that game was: Bobby Young, 2b; Eddie Waitkus, 1b; Gil Coan, cf; Vic Wertz, rf; Sam Mele, if; Stephens, 3b; Billy Hunter, ss; Courtney, c and Turley, p.

Batted a club-high .364 (107-39) in July.

In his last 63 games, he batted .250 (236-59) . . . Was hampered the final 2 weeks of the season with re-occurring thumb pains . . . Started only 3 of the last 10 games.

Injury: Ruptured ligament in right thumb in an exhibition game vs. Montreal in Miami on March 12 . . . Continued to play thru March 26 and finished the spring as the O's leading hitter (.341, 41-14) in 15 games.

Pain persisted and he was placed on the disabled list on March 28 . . . Underwent surgery at Children's Hospital in Baltimore on April 3 . . . Doctors re-attached the ligament to the bone and a chip of cartilage was removed . . . A pin was inserted to stabilize the joint.

Took batting practice for the first time on April 30 and worked out at Hagerstown for 3 days . . . Was activated on May 13, replacing **John Lowenstein** who was designated for assignment.

Hitting Streak: Hit safely in 20 straight games from June 26 thru July 20, tied with **Don Mattingly** for the 2nd longest streak in the majors (behind **Wade Boggs'** 28) . . . Batted .452 (84-38) during the streak with 9 multi-hit games.

Was 2 games shy of club record (22) held jointly by **Doug DeCinces** ('78-'79) and **Eddie Murray** ('84).

Home Runs: Needed only one more homer to make the Orioles the first team in major league history to have 10 players with at least 10 home runs . . . Hit numbers 8 and 9 on Aug. 25 at Oak., but went homer-less in his last 31 games.

Added the 2nd 2-homer game of the year and 3rd of career with 2 at Detroit on June 10 . . . Broke his bat while hitting his first home run to rightfield in that game off **Jack Morris** . . . 



Despite back and ankle injuries that plagued him throughout the 2nd half, Fred finished with 23 home runs matching the 2nd highest output of career . . . Enjoyed his 4th straight 20+ home run season and the 7th of career.

Played in 79 of the O's first 85 games before all-star break (started the first 62) and hit .265 (294-78) with a club-high 16 home runs and 50 rbi . . . Appeared in only 45 of 76 2nd half games and batted .260 (154-40) with 7 homers and 19 rbi.

Tore ligaments in his left ankle in Minnesota on July 22, but despite injury continued to play until he re-injured it in Oakland on August 24 . . . During that span, batted only .216 (21-97, 3 hrs., 7 rbi) in 27 games, dropping average from .270 to season-low .257.

Missed more than 3 weeks before returning on Sep. 16 . . . In first 3 games back, went 5-for-9 with 6 rbi and a home run in each game, but missed 5 days in between with sore back.

Was bothered periodically by muscle spasms in lower back, an injury which originally occurred on June 28 in Boston . . . Missed approximately 10 games throughout the year due to back injury.



Vs. Oakland: Has a 9-3 lifetime mark vs. the A's including a 7-2 record at Memorial Stadium . . . Won 9 of his first 10 decisions against them, but was 0-2 in '84, his only 2 losses at home vs. the A's . . . Rebounded with a win at -home last year on May 31 in only '85 appearance.

Vs. Milwaukee: In only '85 start vs. the Brewers, beat them 9-1, on Sep. 26, one of 3 complete games of '85 . . . Has won 7 of last 8 decisions against Milwaukee. Is 6-0 lifetime at home vs. the Brewers in 13 appearances.

Vs. Minnesota: Made 3 starts vs. the Twins in '85, including disastrous back-to-back starts (May 4 and 10) . . . The Twins batted .531 (26-14) against him in the 3 starts combined and plated 14 earned runs in a total of 8 innings (15.75) . . . Has career-high 6.36 (93.1 ip, 66 er) lifetime era vs. the Twins.

Vs. New York: Has lost 3 straight decisions to the Yankees since he last beat them 9-4 on June 11, '82 . . . Is 2-9 lifetime.

Vs. Seattle: Has career-high 14 wins vs. the Mariners, including 2 in '85 . . . Both wins came at the Kingdome where lifetime he is 9-3 . . . Won his first 7 decisions vs. M's thru '79 . . . Is 7-5 against them in last 6 seasons.

Vs. Toronto: Had thrown only 4 home run balls to Toronto in 118 career innings prior to '85, but gave up 3 in one game at Memorial Stadium on July 31 last year . . . Was 8-2 lifetime against them thru '82 . . . Has lost 4 of 5 decisions to Toronto over the last 3 seasons . . . Still has career-low 2.30 era (133 ip, 34 er) vs. the Blue Jays.

Long Outings: Has pitched 10 or more innings in a game 9 times in majors and has 3-1 record with 5 no decisions . . . Threw 11 shutout innings at California Aug. 20, '78 and 10 scoreless frames at New York on June 3, '81 but was not a pitcher of record in either game.

First Nicaraguan: In '76, Dennis became the first Nicaraguan ever to play in majors . . . **Tony Chevez**, who pitched briefly for O's in '77, was 2nd and in '80 Twins hurler **Al Williams** third to make it . . . Brewers' outfielder **Dave Green** became the 4th in '81.

Post-Season: Did not pitch in either the ALCS or WS in '83. Was O's starter in game 3 of '79 ALCS at Anaheim . . . Pitched well thru 8 innings and carried 3-2 lead into 9th before Angels rallied to win, 4-3 (loss went to **Don Stanhouse**).

Started game 4 of WS at Pittsburgh, but gave up 6 hits and 4 runs in 1.1 innings before **Sammy Stewart** came on . . . O's rebounded from 4-0 deficit to win behind **Tim Stoddard**, 9-6.

Fielding: One of the top fielding pitchers in the league . . . Handled 44 chances with only one error (.977) in '85 . . . Only **Mike Boddicker** handled more chances on O's staff.

Lifetime has a .973 (452 tc, 12 er) fielding mark . . . Has led A.L. in chances 3 times ('78, '79, '81) and also topped major league hurlers in putouts (20), assists (44) and chances (66) in '81.

1984: Started season in bullpen where he was 1-2 thru June 5 with no saves and a 6.58 era (26 ip, 19 er) in 14 appearances . . . Returned to the starting rotation on June 10 and fared somewhat better, compiling a 6-8 record and a 4.67 era (115.2 ip, 60 er) in 24 games.

His top 2 efforts were against the A.L.'s best teams: Detroit (a 6-1, 6-hitter on Sep. 12) and Toronto (a 3-hitter in 2-0 loss Aug. 10) . . . Broke a 6-game losing streak with a win over Chicago on July 15.

Walked only 25 batters in 20 starts (an average of less than 2 per 9 innings) . . . Overall he fanned twice as many as he walked (77 to 37) . . . Led staff in home run balls with 26.

1983: Struggled all season while setting career high for era (5.53) and matching his highest loss total (16 in '79) . . . Won only one game over final 2 months of season.

1982: Equalled his best win total (16 in '78) and was among A.L. leaders in starts (2nd, 39), innings pitched (5th, 252) and wins (8th) . . . Won 5 of last 6 decisions, including key victories over Milwaukee in each of his last 2 starts (O's tied Brewers on next-to-last day of season) . . . Tippy experienced his least effective season since '78 and did not lead the O's in saves for the first time in 5 years (since '80) . . . His

saves total (4) was his lowest since '79 (he'd averaged 15 from '80 thru '84), his appearances lowest since '79 (except for abbreviated '81 season) and his innings lowest since '78 (except '81) . . . His era (5.40) was the highest of his pro career.

Though he was never on the disabled list, he did suffer from time to time with a sore shoulder as he tried to snap back from shoulder problems that had sidelined him in September of the previous year.

Nevertheless, he boosted his club record for career saves to 104 (Stu Miller is 2nd with 88) and jumped his total appearances as an Oriole to 485, 2nd only to Jim Palmer's 558.

First Batter Efficiency/Inherited Runners: Was tops on the staff in inherited runners scored (.763 efficiency) and he retired 39 of 48 1st batters (.822).

Save Opportunities: Though no one has yet come up with a mutually agreed upon definition for "save opportunities", Tippy converted only 4 of 11 according to our system.

Miller-Brown Reliever Rating System: Tippy ranked 4th on the staff (see Don Aase's blog for '85 rankings) with only 6 positive points: 13 holds (+13), 3 wins (+6) and 4 saves (+12), less 19 squanders (-19) and 3 losses (-6).

The system was devised in '82 (see O's pr people for specs) and in the 1st 3 years, Tippy was: '82—1st (59 points), '83—1st (84 points), '84—2nd (30 points, Sammy Stewart had 40).

Miscellaneous: Opponents batters hit him at a .261 clip (268-70). Saved games for Don Aase, Mike Boddicker, Mike Flanagan, and Dennis Martinez.

His longest outing of the season was 6.2 innings on Oct. 3 against the Red Sox at Baltimore, his last appearance of the season . . . In that effort in which he had no decision or save, Tippy fanned a season high 7 batters while allowing only 2 hits and one run. It was one of his best performances of the year.

Orioles Only: Since the Yankees traded him to the O's in June '76, Tippy has gone 52-38 (.578) with 104 saves, compiled a 3.41 era (ip-737, h-647, er-279), walked 354 and fanned 563.

Starts: He has started only 2 games in 529 major league appearances, both losing efforts for the Yankees in '75—to Boston July 27 and to California on August 24.

Sudden Death: Has won 33 games lifetime at Memorial Stadium, 18 of them "sudden death". Has lost only 4 on the road in "sudden death".

Vs. Yankees: Though he didn't have a decision or save vs. the Yankees in '85, he still has more wins (9), losses (6), saves (16), appearances (61) and innings (86.2) against the club with which he signed originally and broke into the majors. His career era vs. New York is 2.39 (er-23).



THE 1985 SEASON

Although Scotty's string of 7 straight winning seasons was snapped, he beat Detroit, 5-2, in his final start to avoid first losing season since rookie campaign in '77 . . . Led club in wins (14), lowest total to lead the O's since '67 (excluding abbreviated '81 season) when Tom Phoebus also won 14 . . . Lost a career-high 14 games, and allowed major league career-highs in era (4.81), home runs (34) and walks (65).

Topped the Birds in starts (34) and innings pitched (204) and was tied for 2nd in complete games with Storm Davis (8) . . . His 34 home run balls tied with Milwaukee's Danny Darwin for league lead and were one shy of club record set by Robin Roberts in '63 (35).

Didn't get past the 4th inning in 8 starts and didn't finish 5 innings in 11 outings . . . Was knocked out 3 times before completing the 2nd inning. Had been KO'd that early only 5 times in 223 starts prior to '85 . . . Averaged just under 6 innings per start, a career-low.

Suffered the slowest start of his career . . . Plagued by blurred vision in several early starts (apparently caused by improper diet) . . . After his 7th start, a 5-3 loss to Kansas City on May 14, he was 1-4 with a 7.92 era (30.2 ip, 27 er, 0 cg's).

Following that loss, he was diagnosed as having a slight weakness in his throwing arm . . . Skipped a start, began a weight program and then won his next 3 starts all in complete games beginning with a 3-0, 3-hit win at Oakland on May 22.

From May 22, thru July 28, he was 8-4 (3.54 era, 99 ip, 39 er, 5 cg's) in 14 starts . . . Then went 1-4 (9.39 era, 23 ip, 24 er) in his next 6 starts . . . Finished strong going 4-2 in his last 7 turns (3.88 era, 48.2 ip, 21 er).

By-Month: April (1-2, 5.40, 4 g) . . . May (2-2, 5.97, 5 g) . . . June (3-2, 2.36, 6 g) . . . July (3-2, 5.13, 7 g) . . . Aug. (1-4, 8.88, 6 g) . . . Sep.-Oct. (4-2, 3.70, 7 g).

Miscellaneous: Has won 13 or more in 8 straight seasons . . . Orioles were 19-15 in his 34 starts . . . Was 2nd on club with 3 pickoffs (Dennis Martinez led the club with 8) and lifetime has now picked off 35 runners, 2nd among current Orioles to Mike Flanagan (57) . . . Was 8-6 at home, tying for club lead in wins at home with Don Aase, and was 5-1 in his last 7 starts at Memorial Stadium.

Worked 1.1 innings of relief vs. Chicago on July 14, his first relief appearance since Sep. 12, '81 . . . Brought a career standard of 1.95 walks per 9 innings into '85 season, but walked an average of 2.87 last year.

1985 AND MAJOR LEAGUE CAREER

Winning: Though he won only 3 of his first 12 career decisions, has gone 107-64 (.626) record over the past 7 years ('79-'85) representing 2nd highest won-loss pct. in majors for that period (min. 100 dec.), trailing only Ron Guidry (.665, 113-57) . . . Ranks just ahead of Steve Carlton (.618, 107-66) and Lamar Hoyt (.612, 90-57).

In the 8 seasons since becoming a regular starter ('78-'85), has won 122 games, tied for 4th most in the majors during that span. Guidry leads with 138, followed by Carlton and Joe Niekro with 123. Tied with McGregor are Phil Niekro and Jack Morris . . . With 94 wins in the last 6 seasons ('80-'85), trails only Morris (102) and Guidry (95).

Shutouts: Hurled only one shutout in '85, a 3-hit, 3-0 win at Oakland on May 22 . . . Ranks 5th on O's all-time list . . . Has pitched all 20 career shutouts over the last 8 seasons ('78-'85) and is tied for 4th in the majors during that period behind Fernando Valenzuela (23), Ron Guidry (21) and Bill Rogers (21) . . . Nolan Ryan, Dave Steib and Steve Carlton also have 20 apiece.

Despite 6-10 lifetime record vs. Yankees (see "vs. New York" below), has shut out the Bombers 4 times and one other victory was a combined shutout . . . Has blanked Minnesota and Toronto three times each and Chicago and Oakland twice each.

By-Month Lifetime: April is the only month in which he has a career losing record (11-13) . . . May 24-10; June 21-13; July 25-13; Aug. 21-20; Sep. 20-14; Oct. 3-0.

Control: Threw 2 wild pitches in a 5-game span, but has thrown only 3 wild pitches in his last 112 games (705 innings) . . . Had a streak of 64 games and 417 innings without one from Aug. 10, '82 to June 27, '84.

While his base on balls ratio of 2.69 per 9 innings over the past 2 seasons has been uncharacteristically high, (he had a 1.88 career ratio thru '83) he has a 2.05 career yield that ranks 4th on O's all-time list (min. 500 innings) behind **Dick Hall** (1.47), **Robin Roberts** (1.81) and **Hal Brown** (1.98) . . . Was 2nd in majors in '83 at 1.56 behind **Lamarr Hoyt** (1.07) among qualifiers, and led A.L. in '79 at 1.18.

Over the last 8 years he has walked no more than one batter in 142 of 251 appearances . . . In one month long '79 stretch, pitched 46.1 consecutive walkless innings (June 29 to July 29).

Vs. Opponents: Was 8-6 vs. the West in 18 starts and 6-8 vs. the East in 17 tries last year . . . Lifetime is 54-48 vs. the East and 71-35 against the West . . . Has a winning record against all opponents but Boston (4-9) and New York (6-11) . . . See full stats vs. each opponent on page 68.

Vs. Boston: Is 4-9 lifetime vs. the Carmines (including 0-1 in '85) and has a 4.68 lifetime era, highest against any opponent . . . However, in his last 4 games against them is 2-1 with a 1.61 era (28 ip, 5 er).

Vs. California: Went 1-1 vs. the Angels in '85 and is 17-6 lifetime . . . His lone win came in Anaheim (6-4 on May 27) and improved his career record there to 11-2, including a shutout of the Angels in Game #4 of the '79 ALCS which clinched the pennant for the O's.

Had won ten straight at the "Big A" (in 10 starts) before suffering a loss on Aug. 28, '84 when he broke his left ring finger (ground ball off bat of **Brian Downing**) in 1st inning after giving up one run and had to leave the game . . . His only other loss there came on Aug. 18, '78.

His 17 regular season wins vs. Angels are 4 more than against any other opponent . . . Among active pitchers, only **Bert Blyleven** (24) has more wins against the Angels . . . Lost his 1st 2 decisions to them (both in '78), then won 16 of his next 18 before losing 2 of his last 3 against them.

His 16-2 stretch vs. California included 12 straight wins (beginning July 8, '79) in as many starts (including the ALCS triumph), a streak which was finally snapped by **Steve Renko** on July 19, '82 . . . Has held Angels to a .235 team batting average (165-701) while compiling a 2.85 era (180 ip, 57 er).

Vs. Cleveland: Was 0-2 in 4 '85 starts and has lost 5 straight to the Tribe over 8 starts . . . Has not beaten them since Aug. 4, '83 (4-3 over **Bud Anderson** at Cleveland) . . . Still holds a 10-9 lifetime edge.

Vs. Detroit: Won his last 2 starts against them in '85, but is only 3-7 in his last 11 starts vs. Tigers . . . Lifetime has 13-8 mark . . . Has yielded 21 homers to the Tigers, most by an opponent . . . Is 8-3 lifetime in Tiger Stadium.

Vs. Kansas City: Was only Oriole to beat the '85 world champions twice . . . Lost first 2 decisions, but won both starts against them in July.

Vs. Milwaukee: Went 3-1 vs. the Brewers in 4 starts . . . Won his 1st 3 '85 starts against them giving him 8 straight against the Brewers, but lost, 10-6, Sep. 24 at Milwaukee . . . Hadn't lost to them since May 10, '80 . . . Was 1-5 against the Brewers before win streak.

Vs. New York: Was 0-2 against the Yankees and has now lost 6 straight since his latest victory on Sep. 6, '82 (8-2 over **Dave Righetti** at New York) . . . Is 6-11 lifetime.

His first 5 wins against the Yankees were shutouts (4 solos and a combination with **Tippy Martinez**), and 3 were 1-0 decisions. In his most recent win he pitched 5.2 scoreless innings before being relieved.

One of his shutouts was a 3-0 rain-shortened triumph on Aug. 13, '78. In that game, led 3-0 thru 6 innings, but was touched for 5 runs in top of 7th . . . However, it started to rain in bottom of that inning, play was halted and game was subsequently called. Score reverted to last completed inning, giving O's a 3-0 win . . . The rules have since been changed to prevent a re-occurrence.

Vs. Oakland: Won all 3 '85 starts vs. the A's (2 cg's) and has now won 7 straight against them over his last 9 starts . . . Is 10-3 lifetime vs. Oakland including 5-0 at Memorial Stadium.

Vs. Texas: Suffered 1st career loss to the Rangers (6-1 at Texas on Apr. 22) . . . Had won his 1st 6 decisions against them . . . In only other '85 start vs. the Rangers he beat them 9-2 at home on Aug. 17 giving him 5-0 lifetime mark at M.S. and 7-1 overall.

Vs. Toronto: Won 9 of 1st 11 career decisions against them but is 3-3 the past 2 seasons including 1-1 in '85 . . . Had a 7-game win streak against them from '80 thru '83 . . . His career 2.79 era vs. Toronto is lowest against one opponent.

Injuries: The '84 season ended early for him after he broke the ring finger on his pitching hand when he was struck by **Brian Downing's** ground ball in the 1st inning of a game on Aug. 28 at California . . . Had completely recovered by '85 spring training, but did not accompany the club on '84 fall tour of Japan.

Has had disabling arm problems several times . . . Weak muscles in his left shoulder bothered him for most of 2nd half of '82 and he worked just 82 innings after the all-star break . . . Underwent a therapy and exercise program for the shoulder the following winter and enjoyed a banner '83 season.

In spring of both '79 and '80, was troubled by inflamed muscles in left elbow, but overcame malady thru therapy prior to spring of '81.

PREVIOUS CAREER HIGHLIGHTS BY YEAR

1984: Although he missed perhaps his last 6 starts due to broken left ring finger (see above under "Injuries"), was 2nd on staff in wins (15), shutouts (3) and tied for 2nd in complete games (10).

1983: Rebounded from injury-plagued '82 to lead O's in wins (18), starts (36), innings (260, career high) and complete games (12) and compiled his best era (3.18) in 7 big league seasons.

Was 14-1 on road and 4-6 at home (plus 1-0 on road and 0-2 at home during post-season) . . . A string of 14 consecutive road victories over a 2-year period was snapped by Yankees on Sep. 9 (hadn't lost on road since Aug. 19, '82) . . . At season's end (including WS) he had won 16 of his last 17 road decisions . . . Conversely, did not win at home after July 30.

In 20 starts from May 28 thru Sep. 3, was 13-2 with 9 complete games and a 2.20 era (39 er, 159.2 ip) . . . Was 9-4 before the all-star break and 9-3 after . . . Was only O's starter who did not miss a turn.

Was named lefthander on AP's major league all star team and was 6th in Cy Young vote . . . Gave up a club high 24 home runs . . . Did not throw a wild pitch all season.

1982: Suffered shoulder problems in 2nd half and had 2nd highest era of pro career (4.61), but also set personal high with 37 starts . . . Was 2-6 in 13 starts beginning Aug. 1 (6.83 era).

1981: Led O's starters in era (3.26) and tied for 2nd in A.L. in wins (13) . . . Selected to A.L. all star team but did not pitch in game at Cleveland.

1980: Became 20-game winner for 1st time when he defeated Cleveland's **Len Barker** (also going for 20th win) on final day of season . . . Was 1-2 after May 21 . . . Didn't make 1st start until Apr. 22 because of arm problems . . . O's were only staff in majors with two 20-game winners—**Steve Stone** (25-7).

1979: Recovered from sore elbow and an 0-2 record over the 1st 2 months to go 13-4 with 2.94 era starting June 11 . . . Had A.L.'s best ratio of men on base to innings pitched + 15 (175 ip/165 h, 22 bb, 2 hb) . . . Was named A.L. "player of week," Aug. 27-Sep. 3.

1978: In 1st year as regular starter, opened slowly with 0-3 record and 13.50 era thru Apr. 24 . . . After that, was 15-10 with 2.74 era . . . Retired 1st 20 batters against K.C. on Aug. 20 before **Hal McRae** doubled with 2 out in 7th.

1977: Was 2-1 in 5 starts and 1-4 with 4 saves in 24 relief appearances . . . Earned 1st big league win as starter vs. Cleveland Apr. 20, then waited 4 months and 4 days for next victory, in relief vs. ChiSox . . . Saved 2 games in one night at Toronto Sep. 14th to keep O's in pennant race (it was night before forfeited game).

1976: Made big league debut in relief on Sep. 19 at Cleveland after being recalled from Rochester. Made 1st start and absorbed 1st loss in majors on Sep. 29th, losing to Milwaukee's **Jerry Augustine** at Memorial Stadium.

Minor Leagues: Started '76 at Syracuse (Yankees) but came over to Rochester in mid-June after 10 player trade . . . Named top left-hander in International League after going 12-6 and leading league in shutouts (6).

Was Yankees' 1st pick in June '72 free agent draft . . . Went to spring training 4 straight years with Yanks at Ft. Lauderdale ('73-'76), but never spent a day on regular season roster.

Led Eastern League in '73 and International League in '74 in complete games and innings.

Amateur Background: Was teammate of George Brett (whom he out-hit senior year) at El Segundo High School where he was 51-5 with an 0.29 era (including 18-1 as a senior) in 4 seasons . . . Also played basketball.

Played Little League, Babe Ruth and American Legion baseball . . . His El Segundo team won Babe Ruth world championship in '69.

Personal: Orioles' player representative . . . Attended El Camino Jr. College . . . Very active in Fellowship of Christian Athletes and coordinates Orioles chapel services.

Scott and his wife, the former **Cara Bell**, were married in Baltimore on Sep. 27, '76 . . . They have 2 children: **Eric Scott** (11/22/78) and **Katherine Noel** (10/28/80).



"The Murray Game": Had the most outstanding single-game performance of his career in 17-3 win Aug. 26 at Anaheim. Had 3 hr and 9 rbi, all in 1st 5 innings. Hit 3-run hr in 1st and had rbi single in 2nd, both off **John Candelaria**. Then hit solo homer in 4th and grand slam in 5th, both off **Alan Fowlkes**.

Drew curtain call, standing ovation and "Edd-dee" cheers from the Angels fans. Flied deep to center and walked in final 2 appearances.

The 9 rbi tied **Jim Gentile's** club mark ('61) and the 13 total bases tied club marks held by himself ('80), **Boog Powell** ('66), and **Cal Ripken** ('83).

Hit hrs from both sides of the plate (see "Multi-HR games/HR from Both Sides" below). The grand slam was his 3rd of the year (see "Grand Slams" below).

Making Contact: Had his best career strikeouts total, fanning only 68 times in 677 plate appearances. Had drawn 107 walks and including 25 intentional passes in '84, and reduced those to 84 and 12, respectively, in '85.

Scoring runs: He and **Ripken** became 1st Orioles to score 100 runs 3 times. **Frank Robinson** ('66, '69) is only other multi-100-run achiever.

Most Valuable Oriole: Won a record 6th "MVO" award, his 5th straight. (see page 23 for more details).

1985 AND MAJOR LEAGUE CAREER

Average: His .298 lifetime mark is 4th best in club history. Has hit .300 or better 4 times, .294 or better in 7 of 9 seasons, and has never hit below .283.

Led club in batting (among those with qualifying appearances) for the 5th time in the last 7 years. Only **Brooks Robinson** has led the club as many times (5).

Home/Road: Batted .296 at home and .298 on the road in '85. His .301 (2511-757) lifetime average at Memorial Stadium is 3rd best in Orioles history, trailing **Frank Robinson's** .305 (1380-421) and **Tommy Davis's** .302 (834-252). They are the only 3 Orioles with lifetime averages over .300 at Memorial Stadium.

O's "Triple Crown": Led the club in '85 in avg., hr., and rbi for the 2nd straight year and 4th time overall, all in the last 5 years. (**Ripken** led in avg. in '83).

He is the only Oriole to lead the club in avg., hr., and rbi in one season more than twice. **Frank Robinson** achieved the distinction in '66 and '67, while **Gus Triandos** ('55), **Jim Gentile** ('61), and **Powell** ('63) earned the honor once each.

HOME RUNS

Led the club in hr for the 6th straight year and 7th time in his 9-year career ('77, tied with **Lee May**), a club record.

Hit 3 grand slams, 4 three-run shots, 9 with one on, and 15 solos.

O's All-Time: Ranks 3rd in club history, trailing **Powell** (303) and **Brooks Robinson** (268).

In Majors: Over last 5 years (starting '81), ranks 4th with 147 hr behind **Mike Schmidt** (175), **Dale Murphy** (158), and **Tony Armas** (152). Close by are **Dave Kingman** and **Dwight Evans** (137), **Jim Rice** (135), **Lance Parrish** (130), **Dave Winfield** (127), and **Reggie Jackson** (120).

In the span of his 9-year career (starting '77), ranks 3rd in majors with 258 behind **Schmidt** (327) and **Rice** (283). **Kingman** (257), **Foster** (255), and **Jackson** (249) are close.

20 or More 9 Straight Years: Has hit at least 22 hr in each of his 9 big league seasons, a club record. **Powell** (8 straight 20-hr seasons) is 2nd. Is 2nd to **Schmidt** (12 straight) among current major leaguers in consecutive 20-hr seasons. Is 11th player in major league history to begin career with 9 or more consecutive 20-hr seasons (**Eddie Mathews** holds mark with 14).

Among Switch-Hitters: Moved past former teammate **Ken Singleton** (246) into 3rd place on the all-time list behind **Mickey Mantle** (536) and **Reggie Smith** (314). **Ted Simmons** (238) ranks 5th. (see "Switch-Hitting" below).

Had his 4th 30-hr season, one of only 3 to ever have multiple 30-hr seasons. (**Mantle**-9, **R. Smith**-2).

Multi-HR Games/HR from Both Sides: Had the 3rd 3-hr game of his career Aug. 26 at California (See "The Murray Game" above), tying the club marks for most hr in a game (see page 13) and most times hitting 3 hr in a game (with **Powell**). His previous 3-hr feats were: Aug. 29th, '79 at Minnesota (2 off **Geoff Zahn**, one off **Mike Marshall**) and Sep. 14, '80 at Toronto (2 off **Jackson Todd**, one off **Mike Barlow**).

Has had 9 2-hr games, plus one Oct. 16, '83 in the WS at Philly. His most recent reg. season 2-hr game was Sep. 22, '83 at Detroit.

In his 3-hr game Aug. 26 at California, hit hrs from both sides of plate for 6th time in his career, tied for 2nd (with **Reggie Smith**) behind **Mantle** (10). Did it twice in '82, tying **Mantle's** major league mark.

Grand Slams: Hit 3 in '85 to extend club career record (12). Hit one at home to extend his Memorial Stadium mark (7). Hit 1st July 9 off **Curt Wadsworth** vs. Minnesota at home; 2nd was at Chicago July 25, off **Floyd Bannister**. The final one came Aug. 26 at Anaheim off **Alan Fowlkes** (See "The Murray Game" above). Was 1st 3-slam and 4th multi-slam season. (see page 14 for more details).

His 12 slams are tied for 11th in major league history and are the most ever by a switch-hitter. Is 2nd to **Kingman** (15) among active players (**Foster** also has 12).

RUNS BATTED IN

Led club in rbi for 6th straight year (starting '80) and 7th overall ('78 also), extending his own club record.

1985: Set a career high with 124, the 2nd-best mark in club history (**Gentile**, 146, '61). Had career-high 9 Aug. 26 at Anaheim, all in 1st 5 innings. (See "The Murray Game" above).

Trailed only **Mattingly** (145) in A.L. and **Dave Parker** (125) in the majors.

Career: Ranks 3rd in club history (931) behind **Brooks Robinson** (1,357) and **Powell** (1,063).

Has had 5 100-rbi seasons in his 9-year career, including 4 straight, both club records.

Has had at least 95 rbi in all but 2 seasons, his rookie year (88 in '77) and the abbreviated '81 season (78, which led the league). Has averaged 103 rbi per year.

All-Star Games: Was elected by the fans to a starting berth for the 1st time, outpolling **Rod Carew** by 50,407 votes. It was the first time anyone had beaten Carew since the voting returned to the fans in '70. Murray had trailed by as much as 50,000 during the polling before a late surge.

Was his 5th straight year on the squad and 6th overall ('78 also). See page 73 for more details.

Great Endings: Has hit a combined .319 (1062-339) with 60 hr and 206 rbi in 279 Sep.-Oct. (reg. season) games. Has hit over .300 in this period in 7 of 9 big league seasons.

Had his career high rbi for any month (30) in Sep., '80, when he hit .342 with 4 hr. It is one of only 5 times an Oriole has driven in 30 runs in a month.

ALCS: Was 0-for-8 thru 1st 2 games of ALCS (0-for-29 in last 7 post-season games), then crashed 3-run, 1st-inning hr off Richard Dotson in Game 3 at Comiskey Park, leading O's to 11-1 rout. Scored 4 runs to tie CS record. Was 3-for-5 in game 4.

WS: Was 2-for-16 thru 4 games, then dominated decisive 5th game, crushing 2 homers (a solo and 2-run shot, both off Charles Hudson) while going 3-for-4 to ice 5-0 victory. His 5 WS hits tied for club lead.

1979: Was leading hitter in ALCS, batting .417 (12-5) and reaching safely 10 of 17 appearances. Led in rbi (4) and hit 3-run hr off Mark Clear in game 2.

Reached 7 of 1st 8 appearances in WS, and hit hr off Bert Blyleven in game 2. However, was 0-for-21 in final 5 games.

During the last 6 years has visited Baltimore schools, working in association with the Department of Education to impress upon youngsters at all grade levels the importance of discipline and staying in school.

1985 SEASON SUMMARY

An infrequent starter throughout his big league career, Floyd was moved into the starting lineup just after the all-star break and went on to lead the club in batting with a .306 mark (110-359), 78 points higher than career average prior to '85 (Officially Eddie Murray led club in hitting because Floyd didn't qualify.) . . . Was the lone Oriole above .300 . . . Average was below .300 only 3 days after May 1.

Saw action in 78 games at third base and 29 behind the plate, but played mostly at third after becoming a regular.

Played in 105 games in '85, a career high, and produced more runs (55), hits (110), doubles (21), triples (1), home runs (18), and rbi (48) than he had in his previous 184 big league games.

Also led the O's with a .521 slugging pct . . . Had the 5th best slugging average in the A.L. and the 7th best batting average, but was 117 plate appearances shy of qualifying.

By July 1, had played in only 18 of 72 games, but was batting .380 (19-50), thanks mainly to a 16-for-38 (.421) surge over 12 games beginning May 23.

Batted .329 (26-79) with 3 hr, 10 rbi in the first half while playing in 30 of 85 games . . . Played in all but one of the O's 76 2nd half games and hit .300 (84-280) with 15 hr. and 38 rbi.

Starter: Beginning with '75, when he started pro career, and extending thru '84, had made only 107 starts in parts of 4 major league seasons . . . Became an everyday starter on July 19 (2nd game after the all-star break) and started 70 of the O's last 75 games . . . Had started only 18 of the first 86 games.

Went 3-for-21 (.143) in first 6 starts of 2nd half, bringing average down to late season low of .287 on July 25 . . . Rebounded to go 11-for-20 (.550) in next 4 games, including 3 straight 3-hit games, and hit .314 (81-258) the rest of season (67 games, 64 starts) . . . His 81 hits during that stretch were the most on the club.

After becoming a starter, his longest stretch of hitless games was just 2, (3 times) . . . Hit safely in 51 of last 64 starts.

Hot Stretches: Batted .366 (52-142) in 35 games from July 26 to Sep. 4 . . . Was the O's leading hitter during a 16-8 surge from Aug. 10 thru Sep. 4 with a .354 (35-99) average, including career high 10-game hitting streak . . . Had 6 homers and 14 rbi in a 13-game span from Sep. 12 to Sep. 24.

Home Runs: Hit 15 home runs in last 65 games beginning July 29, after hitting only 3 in previous 77 games . . . Hit 10 in a 29-game stretch from Aug. 25 thru Sep. 24 and had 2 others taken away from him on robbing catches by Oakland's **Dwayne Murphy** and **Mike Davis** at Baltimore on Sep. 3 in 3-2 loss . . . (that game also snapped his 10-game hitting streak).

Homered in 3 consecutive games twice . . . Hit consecutive game-winning home runs vs. Boston on Sep. 12 and 13 . . . Hit 2-out, 9th inning, pinch homer off **Willie Hernandez** at Detroit on June 10 to tie game O's eventually lost 7-6 in 11 innings.

Multi-Hit Games: Batted at least twice in 92 games and had 32 multi-hit games (2h-23, 3h-8, 4h-1) . . . Had 13 multi-hit games in first 30 starts . . . Had 31 in 88 starts.

By-Month: April .250 (1-4), 0 hr, 0 rbi . . . May .417 (5-12), 0 hr, 1 rbi . . . June .355 (11-31), 2 hr, 5 rbi . . . July .303 (23-76), 2 hr, 7 rbi . . . Aug. .333 (35-104), 6 hr, 14 rbi . . . Sep.-Oct. .267 (35-131), 8 hr, 21 rbi.

1985 SEASON SUMMARY

In his 4th full A.L. season, Cal drove in a career high 110 runs, played every game and every inning to extend his streaks in those 2 categories (603 games and 5457 innings, see "Ironman" below).

And for the **THIRD STRAIGHT YEAR**:

- Scored 116 runs to become the first Oriole ever to reach triple figures in 3 different seasons.
- Led all major league shortstops in runs, home runs (26), rbi (110), slugging percentage (.469) as well as in double plays (123).
- And, was awarded the following honors:
 - "Silver Slugger" Award (TSN/Hillerich & Bradsby) as the major league's best offensive shortstop;
 - TSN's A.L. All Star team;
 - A.P. Major League All Star team (this year beating out **Ozzie Smith**, 67 to 48);
 - U.P.I.'s A.L. All Star team.

Cal, over the past 3 years, led the majors in extra base hits-218 (Dale Murphy had 211), and doubles-121 (Wade Boggs had 117). He was 2nd in total bases-969 (Murphy had 984, and Murray 917 for 3rd place) and hits-587 (Boggs had 653). Cal ranked 3rd in runs (340) behind **Rickey Henderson** (364) and **Murphy** (343).

For the 2nd season in a row he was elected to start at shortstop for the A.L. in the All Star game (see "All Star Game" below), and, along with **Eddie Murray**, formed the first Orioles "elected entry" since 1972.

Was 2nd in the A.L. in runs with 116, behind **Henderson's** 146. (Murray was 3rd with 110); 6th in rbi (110), tied for 5th in gwrbi (15) and tied for 8th in total bases (401).

Was either first or 2nd among the Orioles in 12 positive offensive categories: **1st:** G, AB, R, H, 3BH, GWRBI (tie) and SF (tie); **2nd:** 2BH, HR, BB, AVG, & AVG with men in scoring position (.321, among qualifiers).

He also set a club record for most GIDPs (32), surpassing **Brooks Robinson's** 1960 total (29) and ranked 2nd in the A.L. behind **Jim Rice** (35).

In addition to leading major league shortstops in double plays, he paced A.L. shortstops in putouts (286), and was 2nd by a hair to Toronto's **Tony Fernandez** in both assists & total chances (see details under "Fielding" below).

Ironman: Extended his consecutive game streak to 603, a club record, surpassing **Brooks** (463) and **Murray** (444) who had ranked 1-2 at the start of the season.

He has not missed a game since sitting out 2nd game of a double-header on May 29, '82 (**Floyd Rayford** subbed for him at 3rd base) . . . This is the 2nd longest current streak in the majors behind Atlanta's **Dale Murphy** (657).

Every Inning: His streak of 5457 consecutive innings represents what is believed to be a major league record. It spans a stretch of 599 games and began on June 5, '82 (the day after **Jim Dwyer** pinch hit for him in the 9th inning and 6 days after he started his consecutive games string). The 82 post-season innings Rip played in '83 are not included in the totals.

At the time the innings streak began, Cal was a 3rd baseman, but he switched to shortstop on July 1, '82.

Baseball researcher **L. Robert Davids** has concluded that the two longest consecutive innings streaks in major league history, prior to Ripken, were established by a pair of old Carmines (Red Sox) back in '02-'03-'04. **Buck Freeman**, a 1st baseman, played every inning over some 534 games (July 28, '01 to June 5, '05), and teammate **Candy LaChance**, an outfielder who played every inning during '02-'03-'04, extending his string to 424 games before it was terminated Apr. 28, '05. Both **Freeman** and **LaChance** were uncles of Sox Road Secretary **Jack Rogers**.

CAL RIPKEN, JR. (Cont.)

Rip is the first major leaguer to have played in every inning for at least 2 consecutive years since **Rudy York** of the Detroit Tigers ('40 & '41). In addition to Ripken, **LaChance**, and **Freeman**, the only other major leaguer to have played in every inning in 3 full seasons (not consecutive) was **Mickey Vernon** ('42, '47, '53 with the Pesky Nats). Only 9 have done it in 2 seasons (not necessarily consecutive).

Four other O's have played in every game of a season: **Brooks**-4, **Eddie**-3, **Billy Gardner** and **Bobby Grich**-one each . . . However, **Murray** is the only other to have played every inning in a season ('84 including 3 games as a dh).

Odds and Ends: Was last at the .300 level (at .302) on June 5 after going 11-for-20 in a 4-game stretch . . . His late-season high was .287 (578-166) on Sep. 18 & 20, and his late-season low was .263 on Aug. 9.

He had a 17 game hitting streak, a career high (Aug. 23 thru Sep. 10), and hit safely in 31 of 34 (Aug. 14 thru Sep. 18, .353, 136-48) . . . Rip also had a 12 game streak embedded in a 25 of 27 stretch (Apr. 20 thru May 21; .352, 108-38).

Enjoyed his 3rd 5-hit game in the majors (and 2nd at Minnesota) on May 5 and picked up 4 rbi . . . On Sep. 2 at Baltimore he set a career high with 5 rbi while hammering 2 home runs against Oakland.

Though Rip stole only 2 bases and **Eddie Murray** only 7, both of them scored more runs than Cardinal's Rookie **Vince Coleman** (107) who led the majors with 110 steals.

His 8 home runs in Sep.-Oct. '85 and Apr. '84 are career highs and his 23 rbi in Sep.-Oct. '85 also represent a high . . . Rip's .385 (143-55) in Sep.-Oct. '83 in his top monthly average.

Fielding: In '85 Cal fielded .967 (TC-786, E-26) while leading the majors in double plays (123) for the 3rd year in a row and the A.L. in putouts (286) for the 2nd straight season. The Blue Jays' **Tony Fernandez** nosed him out in assists (478 to 474) and in successful chances, i.e. excluding errors, by just one chance (761-760) . . . The '85 big league leader in that category was **Ozzie Smith** (813).

In '84 Rip set an A.L. record with 583 assists (broke **Roy Smalley's** '79 mark of 572) and also led big league shortstops in total chances (906), double plays (122) and putouts (297).

His 880 successful chances in '84 were the most by an A.L. shortstop since **Leo Cardenas** handled the same number in '69 . . . The Cardinals' **Smith** is the only major league shortstop since World War II to have handled more chances excluding miscues (909 in '80). The major league record is 984 by the Giants' **Dave Bancroft**.

In '83 Cal led all big league shortstops in assists (534) and led A.L. in double plays (113) plus total chances (831), only 3 fewer than major league leader **Smith**.

Played both 3rd base and shortstop after coming up in August '81, but started '82 as the regular 3rd baseman . . . Moved to short for good on July 1, '82 . . . Already ranks 3rd in games played at shortstop by an Oriole (591) behind **Mark Belanger** and **Luis Aparicio** (713).

His career fielding average at shortstop is .970 (TC-3017, E-92) . . . By year, '81 thru '84: '81-.946 (TC 37, E-2); '82-.972 (TC-457, E-13); '83-.971 (TC-831, E-25); '84-.970 (TC-906, E-26).

He has played 77 games at 3rd base ('81-6, '82-71) and also has a .970 percentage at that position (TC-232, E-7).

Cycle: Hit for the cycle at Texas May 6, '84 . . . Homered off **Dave Tobik** on final at bat in 9th inning to complete the job . . . Was 4-for-5 with 2 rbi . . . **Brooks Robinson** is the only other Oriole to have hit for cycle (July 15, '60 vs. White Sox) during the O's 32 seasons in the A.L.

Clutch Hitting: Batted .321 (165-53) with runners in scoring position in '85 and has a lifetime figure of .293 (638-187) in that situation . . . Has hit over .300 ('83-.313, '84-.311) in each of the last 3 campaigns with men on 2nd and/or 3rd and has batted at a .315 clip (476-150) in that span..

Tied with **Eddie Murray** for club lead in gwrbi (15) last year, and was 2nd to **Eddie** in "key runs produced", 76 to 58 (rbi that put O's within one run of a tie, tied game, put O's ahead, or gave O's 2 run lead) and lead runs, of which Cal drove in 40, 5 behind **Murray**.

Home Runs: Has been very consistent in 4 full seasons with yearly totals of 28 ('82), 27 ('83 & '84) and 26 ('85). Has now hit home runs in all current A.L. parks after connecting for the first time at Toronto's Exhibition Stadium on April 20, '85 off **Luis Leal** . . . His 8 career homers in Tiger Stadium are a career high for one ballpark on the road (he's hit 54 in Memorial Stadium).

Only 5 shortstops have hit more than 27 home runs in one season as Rip did in both '83 & '84: **Ernie Banks**-6 times; **Vern Stephens** and **Rico Petrocelli**-3 times; **Woody Held** and **Robin Yount** ('82)-once each.

Batting .300: Has hit .300 twice ('83-.318, '84-.304) and is one of only 6 Orioles to have done so along with: **Frank Robinson**-4 times; **Eddie Murray** & **Ken Singleton**-3 times; **Brooks Robinson** and **Al Bumbry**-twice . . . He, **Frank Robby** and **Murray** are the only O's to have hit .300 officially twice in a row.

Runs Scored Leader: Has scored 121-103-116 runs (average 113) in last 3 seasons, the only Oriole ever to penetrate the century mark 3 times, let alone 3 in a row.

Vs. East/West: Discounting '81, Cal has batted .321 (1288-413) with 64 homers & 223 rbi in 334 games against the West . . . Within the Eastern Division, he has hit .272 (1221-332) with 44 home runs and 168 rbi in 311 games.

In '85, he hit .315 vs. the West (336-106) with 16 home runs and 64 rbi and .245 (306-75) against the East with 10 homers and 46 rbi in 77 games.

Vs. Opponents: (see pages 59, 60 for more details).

Vs. Boston: His 19 rbi against the Red Sox (52 games) are a career low as are his 4 home runs (tied with Cleveland).

Vs. California: Batted .377 (53-20) against the Angels in '85 and is now up to .333 (201-67) lifetime.

Vs. Chicago: Rip hit .386 (44-17) in the '85 season series and drove in 14 runs in 12 games . . . Over the past 2 years he has batted .415 (94-39) vs. the Sox with 11 homers and 30 rbi in 24 games . . . In '84 he hit .440 (22-for-50) with 7 homers and 16 rbi in 12 games.

Lifetime, he is hitting .315 (184-58) . . . His 14 career homers against the Pale Hose are a career high vs. one club, and his 39 rbi are 2nd only to the 42 he has amassed against the Brewers.

Vs. Cleveland: His 4 lifetime homers are a career low vs. one opponent (tied with Boston).

Vs. Detroit: Hit 5 of his 26 homers against the Tigers in '85 while leading O's regulars against the Tigers in hitting as well (327, 55-18).

Vs. Milwaukee: Has a career high 42 rbi in 55 lifetime games vs. the Brewers.

Vs. Minnesota: Has had 2 of his 3 five-hit games vs. the Twins at the "Hump", including May 5, '83 . . . In that series at Minny (May 3-4-5) he went 10 for 15 with 8 rbi and snapped **Brooks'** club record for consecutive games played.

On Sep. '83, his other 5-hit game in the Metrodome, he broke or tied 4 club records, included 13 total bases (tied) as O's won big (13-0).

Vs. New York: Has a career low .254 (197-50) average against the Yankees, and last year hit only .205 (44-9) with no homers and 4 rbi.

Had 17 rbi in 13 games against the Yankees in '83 . . . **Brooks** (19

in '70, 18 gms.) is the only Oriole ever to drive in more vs. the Bombers in one season. **Brooks** ('66) and **Boog Powell** ('69) also had 17 rbi seasons against the Bombers, but never in as few as 13 games.

Vs. Seattle: No current Oriole has a .300 career average vs. the M's . . . Cal ranks 3rd (.293, 191-56) behind **Murray** (.298, 356-106) and **Lynn** (.296, 328-97).

Vs. Texas: Rip has a career .347 mark vs. Texas (190-66), his highest average vs. a single opponent . . . In '85 he had a .472 on-base percentage against the Rangers (53-25).

Vs. Toronto: Exhibition Stadium was the only current stadium in which he had not hit a home run until he connected off **Luis Leal** on April 20, '85. Hit only .163 (49-8) vs. the Jays in '85.

All Star Games: Made All-Star debut in '83 at Chicago as a defensive replacement for starter **Robin Yount**, but did not have a plate appearance . . . Elected to starting team in '84 with a total of 1,442,082 votes, out-polling **Alan Trammell** (1,154,353). Rip ranked 3rd in overall vote behind **George Brett** and **Lance Parrish**.

In '85 Rip was the top American League vote getter with 1,398,901 to beat **Brett** by a hair (1,394,334). At shortstop he had a comfortable margin over **Trammell** (669,057).

His one hit in 6 lifetime All Star at bats was a single off **Nolan Ryan** in '85 at Minnesota.

MAJOR AWARDS

Most Valuable Player: Rip shaded teammate **Murray** in '83, 322 to 290 . . . They were the only 2 players named on every ballot . . . Cal polled 15 firsts, 9 2nds, 3 3rds and a 4th (system: 1st-14 points, 2nd-9 points, 3rd-8 points, 4th-7, etc.).

Became first ever to win BBWAA "Rookie" and MVP awards back-to-back, a distinction eclipsed only by **Fred Lynn** who won both in '75.

Rookie of the Year: In '82, he registered 130 points to beat out the Twins' **Kent Hrbek** (90 points), the only other to be named on all ballots. **Wade Boggs** finished 3rd . . . Rip polled 24 firsts and 2nds.

Rip was the 5th Oriole to earn the BBWAA "Rookie" Award. Previous winners were: **Ron Hansen** ('60), **Curt Blefary** ('63), **Al Bumbry** ('73) and **Eddie Murray** ('77).

Most Valuable Oriole: Was co-winner in '83 with **Murray**; finished 2nd to **Murray** in '85 and has ranked 3rd in the balloting twice: in '82 behind **Murray** and **Jim Palmer**; and in '84 behind **Murray** and **Mike Boddicker**.

Player of the Year: Chosen Major League "Player of the Year" in '83 by *The Sporting News* and A.L. "Player of the Year" by both *TSN* and *Baseball America*.

PREVIOUS YEARS

1984 Season: Set A.L. record in assists (583) . . . First Oriole elected to starting All-Star team in 3 years (since **Ken Singleton** in '81) . . . Went as long as 3 games without a hit only once (Sep. 5-7-8) . . . Produced 52 key rbi, including 25 tying or go-ahead runs . . . Led O's regulars in batting with men in scoring position (.311, 148-55).

Hit safely in 121 games and reached safely in 135 of 162 by hit or walk . . . Went as many as 3 games without a hit only once (Sep. 5-7-8) . . . Hit 8 homers in April (career high).

During a 43 game period (May 10 thru June 26), he hit only .244 (168-41) and his average dipped from .347 to a season low of .287 . . . Experienced two 0-for-14 spells (June 23-27 & Sep 5-9).

Batted .355 (242-86) over 60 games from June 27 thru Sep. 1, boosting his average to a late season high of .318 . . . Hit .382 (110-42) in July, his 2nd best month ever . . . From Sep. 1, '83 thru May 9, '84, a stretch of 63 games, Rip hit .372 (258-96) with 16 homers and 41 rbi.

1983 Season Chosen A.L. MVP and *TSN* "Player of the Year" and shared Most Valuable Oriole honors with **Eddie Murray** to name just a few of the laurels he won that season.

Played on A.L.'s first winning All-Star team since '71 and also played on winning team in both ALCS and World Series.

Batting: Led majors in hits (211) and doubles (47), both club records; led A.L. in runs (121) and extra base hits (76, 2nd in majors to Expos' **Andre Dawson**-.78); was 2nd in majors in total bases to **Jim Rice** (343 to 344); and ranked among A.L. leaders in gwrb (3rd, tie with **Murray**-.17); batting (5th, .318); slugging (5th, .517); rbi (9th, 102), and homers (9th, tie, 27).

His .318 average was the 3rd highest in club history behind **Ken Singleton**'s 328 in '77 and **Bob Nieman**'s .322 in '56.

Stretch Run: During the 44 games from Aug. 13 thru Sep 25, a period in which the O's went 34-10 to win the Eastern Division, he hit .391 (192-75) with 14 doubles, 9 homers, 30 rbi and 40 runs scored.

ALCS/WS: Batted a combined .273 (33-9) in 9 post-season games. Drove in O's only run in 9th inning of ALCS game 1, won by **Lamarr Hoyt**, 2-1. Had 7th inning rbi in game 2 of the WS off Phillies' **Larry Andersen** (O's won 4-1) . . . Made final putout of WS when he caught **Gary Maddox**' line drive in 9th inning of game 5.

1982 Season: Came by his "rookie" award honestly after leading all big league first year men in doubles (32), homers (28), rbi (93), total bases (284), gwrb (11, tie with **Von Hayes**), games (160), at bats (598) and runs (90).

Paced the O's in games, at bats, runs, doubles, and triples (5) and was 2nd to **Murray** in homers, rbi and gwrb.

Slow Start: Despite a glittering opening day on which he went 3-for-5 with his 1st big league double, home run (off KC's **Dennis Leonard**) and rbi, Rip plunged into a deep slump (55-4). By May 1st, after 18 games, he was batting .117 (60-7) on the year and .121 lifetime (99-12) in 41 major league games.

Start of Something Big: The next day, May 2, he picked up a pair of scratch hits; was benched May 3 by fellow rookie **Mike Moore**, but missed only one game. Then his comeback began in earnest on May 6 . . . Hit .281 (538-151) from May 2 to end of season.

Miscellaneous: Missed only 3 games all year, none after May 29 (the day his consecutive game string began) . . . Didn't miss an inning after June 5th . . . Recorded his first major league stolen base the hard way by stealing home (on front end of double steal with **Lenn Sakata**) vs. **Jon Matlack** (Tex.) on May 31 at Baltimore.

Played 44 straight errorless games at 3rd base from Apr. 24 thru June 14 while handling 137 chances . . . Was A.L.'s "player of the week" for week ending Aug. 27 (.444, 12-for-27, with 4 homers and 11 rbi in 7 games).

1981 Season: Recalled from Rochester on Aug. 8 just after strike was settled . . . Made big league debut as pinch-runner Aug. 10 . . . Singled off Chicago's **Dennis Lamp** Aug. 16 for first hit.

Played in 12 games at short (9 starts) and 6 at 3rd . . . Did not bat and played in only 2 games after Sep. 11.

Rochester '81: Despite missing last 3 weeks of season (called up to O's), he was voted I.L.'s "rookie of the year" and was named as 3rd baseman on all-league team . . . In survey of I.L. managers and coaches, Rip was picked as the loop's top major league prospect (**Von Hayes** was 2nd).

Played in 85 games at 3rd and 35 at shortstop (primarily when **Bob Bonner** was injured).

Winter Ball '81: Played in Venezuelan League after '81 season under **Ray Miller** and was voted Caguas' "mvp" . . . Led league with 49 rbi, was 3rd in hr (10) and hit .314 . . . Came close to winning "triple crown".

1980 Season: Was Southern League's all star 3rd baseman . . . Tied for league lead in games (144) and sac flies (9) and led Charlotte in runs (91), hits (144) and 2b (28) . . . Hit 25 homers and was one of 2 players to break Charlotte's existing hr record . . . The other was **Drungo Hazewood** who hit 28 . . . Cal had homered only 8 times in his first 2 pro seasons.

Was S.L.'s top fielding 3rd baseman (.933, 28 e in 415 tc) . . . In Puerto Rico that winter he hit .279 with 6 homers and 38 rbi and Caguas won loop title.

1979 Season: Was picked as shortstop on Topps' Class A all-star team . . . Actually played more games at 3rd (58) than short (52) . . . Led FSL in doubles (28).

1978 Season: Signed by the late **Dick Bowie** . . . Played shortstop mostly that year at Bluefield and led league in putouts . . . Played in Florida Instructional League in both '78 and '79.

Amateur Background: Pitched and played shortstop at Aberdeen (MD) High (graduated '78) . . . Was 7-2 with an 0.70 era as a senior with 100 strikeouts in 60 innings while batting a county best .492 with 29 rbi in 20 games . . . Pitched a 2-hitter and fanned 17 to win '78 Maryland Class A baseball championship.

Also earned 2 letters in soccer. Was team captain and both an all-county and all-metropolitan selection.

Played Little League, Babe Ruth and Mickey Mantle League baseball.

Personal: Son of **Cal Senior**, the O's 3rd base coach, giving Baltimore one of the few father-son combinations on the same team in major league history (see **Cal Senior's** blog on page 100) . . . Single.

Cal plays an active role in the community . . . He purchases 25 tickets to every Orioles game for use by under-privileged youngsters and senior citizens in his native Harford County; has made significant contributions to the Harford Center, a day-care center for retarded citizens, the Harford County Humane Society and to the School for the Performing Arts in Baltimore.

He has also served as honorary chairman of Easter Seals, and March of Dimes campaigns as well as for the United Way Softball Marathon. He has served as the regional spokesman for the Middle Atlantic Milk Marketing Association, and has also worked on behalf of Santa Claus Anonymous, Project Survival, the Baltimore Symphony, and The Johns Hopkins Hospital's Children's Center.

His younger brother, **Billy**, was the O's 7th round pick in June '82 free agent draft . . . Also a shortstop, **Billy** played at Charlotte, Hagerstown and Daytona Beach in '85 . . . He is on the '86 Rochester roster.



Early career: In rookie season ('78), led Appalachian League in rbi (48 in 67 games) and was 2nd in homers (11) . . . He did finally report to Bluefield for the final 3 games of the season ('79), but remained in college again the following spring ('80).

In June '80, reported to Bluefield and was outstanding . . . Led league in homers (14) and drove in 47 runs in 37 games . . . Was promoted to AA Charlotte late that season . . . In October, '80, had bone chips removed from right elbow.

Did not play at all in '81 and did not go to spring training in '82 . . . Reported to Hagerstown in June '82 and played in 88 games . . . Hit 18 homers and knocked in 59 runs.

Amateur Background: Played 3 varsity seasons at Robert E. Lee High (Staunton) and hit 18 homers, 10 of them his senior year ('78) when he batted .536 (30-56) with 20 extra base hits . . . 



THE BIRDS AND THE BROWNS

The Baltimore Orioles were charter members of the American League when it began operation in 1901. However, after two seasons, the club was moved to New York where it ultimately became known as the New York Yankees.

The franchise from which the current Orioles descend came into the A.L. in 1901 representing Milwaukee, but in '02 was transferred to St. Louis and named the Browns. In 52 seasons ('02 thru '53) the Browns were, perhaps, the most unsuccessful team in major league history. They were 3,416-4,465 (.433) and finished in the 2nd division 40 times. They won their only pennant in '44 then lost the world series in 6 games to their home town rivals, the Cardinals.

In June, 1951, Bill and Charles DeWitt sold their controlling interest to Bill Veeck who operated the club for the next 2 1/2 seasons. On September 29, 1953, he sold his shares to a group of Baltimore businessmen who brought major league baseball back to this city after a 51-year lapse.





Rochester: After a disastrous first half, turned things around and wound up leading the International League in innings (189) and complete games (10) . . . His 13 wins led Rochester and his 3.24 era was 7th best in the league . . . For the 2nd time in career, he was the top fielding pitcher in the IL (47 tc, 0 e) and was first in assists (35).

Lost his first 6 decisions and after 18 games (14 starts) entered July with a 2-10 record (4.53, 93.1 ip, 47 er, 1 cg) . . . Then threw 6 straight complete game wins (July 5 thru Aug. 1) allowing just 36 hits and 6 earned runs in 53 innings (1.02 era).





THE 1985 SEASON

Began the season with San Diego, but missed the first 8 days because of a (right) knee injury (medial collateral ligament). After recovering, he appeared in only 10 games for the Padres, the last on Apr. 24 at San Diego vs. the Braves.

Left the club the following day because of personal problems. Was placed on the rehabilitation list Apr. 27, then sent to Las Vegas (PCL) on injury rehabilitation June 18.

After he was acquired by the O's (June 27), he went to Rochester on Saturday, June 29, and appeared in 6 games for the Red Wings. He then joined the O's in Kansas City June 5 and was immediately thrown into the starting lineup, the first of his 74 starts for the Birds.

Despite playing in only 76 games with Baltimore, stole a club-high, 30 bases, 8th in the A.L. . . Also led club with 6 sac hits . . . Was 4th on club in batting (.285) and led the O's in batting with runners in scoring position (.380, 50-19).

ALAN WIGGINS (Cont.)

Jumped off to a good start (.381, 22-7) in first 5 games, but a 3-for-34 (.088) slump followed and left him with a season low .179 (56-10) average on July 24 after 15 games with the O's.

He then hit safely in 24 of 26 games (including an 11-game streak) while hitting .356 (104-37) to raise his average to .294 (164-48) on Aug. 23 . . . His best stretch was from July 26 thru Aug. 13 (2½ weeks) when he hit .383 (68-26) in 16 games . . . In final 61 games beginning July 25, he batted .310 (242-75).

1985 AND MAJOR LEAGUE CAREER

Stolen Bases: Became only the 4th player in Orioles history to steal 30 bases in one season (Al Bumbry did it 3 times and Don Baylor and Luis Aparicio did it twice).

Was the A.L.'s 2nd leading base stealer from his first day with O's (July 5) thru the end of the season . . . Only Rickey Henderson stole more (44-30) during that period.

Career stolen base rate is 201-254 (.782) 11th best among active major leaguers (min. 100 stolen bases) . . . Despite playing only 2 full seasons, is 26th among active major leaguers with 201 stolen bases.

Became only the 4th National League player since the turn of the century to steal 5 bases in a game when he did it against Montreal on May 17, '84 . . . Joined Dennis McGann (New York, '04); Davey Lopes (Los Angeles, '74); and Lonnie Smith (St. Louis, '82) in that elite group.

Twice during '84 he stole home . . . First off Jerry Reuss on April 12 at Dodger Stadium and again on Aug. 24 against Mike LaCoss at Houston . . . Led the Padres in steals in '82, '83 and '84.

Tough to Fan/Double Up: Was the toughest player to strike-out in the A.L. (min. 300 plate appearances) striking out only 16 times in 335 p/a's, an average of one per 20.93. Ranked just ahead of Minnesota's Mickey Hatcher (1/20.30) and Boston's Bill Buckner (1/19.94).

Was 3rd in N.L. in '84 in that department (1/12.1) . . . During big league career has whiffed only 139 times in 1,941 app's (1/13.95).

Has bounced into only 12 double plays in 1,702 big league at bats (1/141.8) . . . Was first in that category in the N.L. in '84 (596-2, 1/298) and 2nd in '83 (503-3, 1/167.6).

Opponents: Was the O's leading hitter vs. the Eastern Division with a .314 mark (118-37) . . . Was also the club leader vs. Cleveland (.429, 21-9), Detroit (.412, 17-7) and Milwaukee (.500, 12-6) . . . In first trip to Comiskey Park, went 9-for-18 in 4 game series vs. White Sox.

Vs. Tigers: Including play in the '84 World Series has batted .385 (39-15) in 9 games vs. Detroit.

Switch-Hitting: A natural righthanded hitter . . . Started switch-hitting in first year of pro ball with Angels' organization . . . With O's batted .314 (105-33) righthanded and .269 (193-52) lefthanded . . . Has a .303 (541-164) career mark righthanded and .246 (1161-286) as a lefty . . . Has hit all 4 career hrs from the right side.

Fielding: Committed 14 errors in 76 games at second base . . . Had made only 4 in first 44 games, but committed 8 in 16-game stretch from Sep. 6 thru Sep. 29².

Miscellaneous: Has not homered in his last 122 games (524 plate appearances) . . . Last home run came Aug. 20, '84 off Sid Fernandez of the Mets.

1984: Set San Diego club records for runs (106) and stolen bases (70) . . . Was 3rd in N.L. in stolen bases behind Montreal's Tim Raines (75) and Philadelphia's Juan Samuel (72) . . . Tied for 2nd in league with Raines in runs scored behind Chicago's Ryne Sandberg (114).

Played in career-high 158 games, all at 2nd base . . . Also led club with 14 sacrifice hits, tied for 2nd most in N.L.



Was 2nd on the club in homers (28) to **Murray**, and has now hit 45 in his first 2 full seasons . . . Finished 3rd to **Murray** and **Cal Ripken** in rbi (81), runs (72), game-winning rbi (9), total bases (231), and key runs produced (43).

On July 5, was batting only .231 (143-33) with 6 hrs and 19 rbi and had started only 32 of O's first 76 games . . . Record Month: Set a club record for most rbi in one month with 32 in August . . . Broke record of 31 held jointly by **Doug DeCinces** (July '78) and **Boog Powell** (July '69) . . . Batted .298 (94-28) in August . . . During the month had five 2-rbi games, four 3-rbi games and a 5-rbi game.

Had best stretch from Aug. 1 thru 17, when he drove in 24 runs in 14 games while batting .347 (49-17) with 9 hrs and 13 runs scored . . . Drove in 17 runs (with 6 hrs) in 7 games (Aug. 11-17).

Was A.L. "player of the week" from Aug. 12-18 when he hit .368 (19-7) with 5 hrs (all at home), including 3 game-winners, and 13 rbi in 6 games.

RULES OF INTEREST TRADING AND WAIVER REGULATIONS

Player assignments may be made within a major league or between major leagues **without waivers** at any time **except** between August 1 and 5 p.m. on the day following the final game of the regular season. Major league waivers will be required for all such assignments during that period. (There are no longer individual league waivers.)

National Association Assignments: Waivers are required at all times for assignments to National Association clubs, EXCEPT for optional assignments within three years of date player first reported to the leagues.

SUSPENDED GAME RULE

A game terminated for any of the following reasons will be a suspended game **IF** it has progressed far enough to be an official game (i.e., 4½ or 5 innings):

- (1) a curfew imposed by law
- (2) a pre-arranged time limit and
- (3) darkness where local law prohibits turning on the lights, or where lights are not available

LIGHT FAILURE: A game terminated by light failure or malfunction of a mechanical service under the control of the home club will be a **SUSPENDED GAME ANYTIME AFTER IT STARTS**.

INNING IN PROGRESS (added in 1980): If **WEATHER** forces the termination of a legal game while an INNING IS IN PROGRESS, it will become a **SUSPENDED game** if EITHER of the following two conditions exists:

- (1) The **VISITING TEAM** has scored one or more runs to **TIE** the game, and the **HOME TEAM** has not scored.
- (2) The **VISITING TEAM** has scored one or more runs to take the lead and the **HOME TEAM** has not tied the score, or taken the lead.

NOTE: If a legal game is **TIED** when called because of weather and **NEITHER** of the above situations prevails, it is a **TIE GAME** and must be **RE-PLAYED** in its entirety.

PROCEDURES FOR RESUMPTION OF PLAY: Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension IMMEDIATELY PRECEDING THE NEXT SINGLE game between the two clubs on the **SAME GROUND**. If this is not possible, other provisions for resumption are specified in A.L. Regulation 5.2 (c).

CURFEW

A.L. RULE: No inning may start after 1:00 A.M., BUT any inning that **BEGINS** PRIOR to 1:00 A.M. may be **PLAYED TO COMPLETION**. Curfews shall be waived for the final series of the season in each of the two parks of two contesting teams.

SAVE RULE (10-20)

Credit a pitcher with a save when he is the finishing, but not the winning pitcher, and when he qualifies under one of the following conditions:

- (1) he enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitches for at least one inning, or
- (2) he enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, at bat, or on deck, or
- (3) he pitches effectively for at least three innings regardless of his club's lead.

The current rule was adopted in 1975. Saves became official for the first time in '69 . . . The original rule was amended in '73 then revised again in '75.

Batting/ERA Title Qualifications: 502 or more plate appearances . . . 162 or more innings . . . **Rookie Qualification:** A player shall be considered a rookie unless, during a previous season or seasons, he has: (1) exceeded 130 at bats or 50 innings pitched in the majors, or (2) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a big league club(s) prior to Aug. 31.


